## Dingeldey era closes in Canton Township

CANTON — Phillip Dingeldey, the bald pated gent who is ending 32 years of public service, first as a trustee, then as treasurer and finally as township supervisor, leaned back in his big leather chair and confided he is "one of the most fortunate fellows in the world."

"I have been fortunate in having the opportunity to be part of the growth of Canton Township," he smiled, "and along the way I've had the chance to meet and talk with many people. Not many farm boys do that."

LOOKING AT the calendar which showed he has only until Nov. 19 to serve as the supervisor, he revealed that he was going back to the farm and have some more fun restoring an old farm house he recently purchased in Washtenaw County.

"I am not going to quit working and am looking forward to spending most of my time with the family on the farm."

Phil was born and raised on the farm at Haggerty Road and Cherry Hill and helped farm the land there until he entered public service as a

member of the board of trustees in 1942.

"I still worked on the farm," he stated, "but I started giving of my time to the job as a trustee. Later I was elected treasurer and then, in 1965, I was appointed supervisor to succeed Louis Stein."

Looking back over the years he recalled that he saw the population grow from 5,322 in 1960 to 27,200 in 1974 and had a role in: establishing a water supply system in 1959; the conversion of the area to a charter township in 1961; hiring of a full time planning consultant; and, getting the township into the sewer business in 1964.

"I sure was fortunate to be here when all of this was going on and someone must have been looking over my shoulder."

"Not many men get an opportunity like that. Besides I have a nice family. My wife and I raised eight children (six boys and two girls) and we have 19 grandchildren. A fellow can't ask much more."

AS THE MEMORIES came tumbling through the years Dingeldey leaned forward, possibly for emphasis, and said: "It seems everything I

did was good for me and I was most fortunate."

Because of what he calls good fortune he is leaving office with no regrets. But he has one wish. He is hopeful township officials will lease or purchase the old school house on Canton Center Road at Proctor and establish it as a museum.

"Canton has such a rich history that much of it should be preserved. That's one of the reasons I purchased the farm. I want to do something my children and the grandchildren can enjoy. I want them to see how apples grow and how bees make honey, and I'll get enjoyment along with them."

Not all of his time will be spent on the farm. Some time ago he and his wife purchased a 30-acre plot that included a log cabin, near Torch Lake.

He dug out the swamp, established a pond, stocked it with fish, and uses it as a place to rest a bit and enjoy the outdoors with the family.

NOW 64 years old, Dingeldey recalled his life on the farm and that his family here goes back to 1876

when his grandfather came from Germany to avoid the draft.

"Our family farmed the land at Haggerty and Cherry Hill and as I got older and active in public life, I went into the tractor and farm equipment business in 1962."

"That took a lot of my time and eventually I gave it up for public service, and I've enjoyed every minute of it."

The retiring supervisor is certain Canton Township has a great future, and that the guidelines have been set to regulate the growth.

"It can't help but grow and become a valued segment of Wayne County, and I'll always have many fond memories."

"You know," he concluded, "the best part of a man's life is the people he meets and I sure had a chance to meet them and become involved in the building of the area."

And so he is ready to close the book on an interesting career that started on a farm and now is taking him back to the soil.

## Lewiston rezoning tabled

CANTON—Heated words marked an intense debate Thursday night at township hall over the rezoning of the Embassy Square subdivision. The 78-acre subdivision, which is bordered by Sheldon and Canton Center Roads on the east and west and Saltz Road and the Edison power lines on the north and south, may, if rezoned, become virtually a uniform subdivision of 268 60-foot lots.

Richard Lewiston, in making the presentation for the development firm of Practical Homebuilders, suggested that the character of adjacent areas would be conducive to R-1C zoning (60 foot lots), currently the area is zoned AG (5-acre lots) and R-1BC (80-foot lots). Lewiston contended that the suggested rezoning followed the master land use plan perfectly and was legally acceptable according to township ordinances.

He explained that the real divider in the township is Canton Center Road, not Sheldon, "which is just a glorified sidestreet." He claimed that Canton Center would eventually be a six lane highway.

John Cojei, secretary of the Northwest Homeowners Association, responded that the planning commission was being "snowed" by Lewiston, "a man who doesn't even live in Canton." He felt the commission was getting too chummy with developers and this was leading to an unnecessary wholesale building expansion in the township.

He referred to the aesthetic failure of Windsor Park, an "overbuilt" subdivision where "mansions" have been erected on 60-foot lots. "You can't even squeeze between houses there," he asserted. "Let's stop this policy of giving developers blank checks with our land."

Chairman Joseph Kinnick took offense at Cojei's comments, and he directed his response at the fuming resident. "We aren't being snowed, we haven't passed the zoning change." This angered Cojei sufficiently to cause him to leave the meeting.

Further debate continued concerning both the density problems that might arise from an R-1C zoning and whether or not the "needs of future residents of Embassy Square" were even being considered.

When the debate ended, Commissioner Grant Campbell moved to table the matter until the new master land use plan becomes effective. The motion passed by a 5-2 margin.

Also considered at the meeting was the rezoning of 2½ acres from R-0-1 (restricted office) to C-2 (general business). The land is located next to Walker Elementary and is owned by Mrs. Artie Barnhart. Mrs. Barnhart wants to sell the land to McDonald's

to build a drive-in restaurant.

"I just want to sell the land and get out of here," she asserted. Roy Kly, principal of the school noted that such a change would not adversely affect the school, but the commission, acting on a recommendation from the Wayne-Westland school board, voted not to rezone.

Commenting on the decision, Mrs. Barnhart said, "I think it stinks. The rest of land around there on both sides of the street is full of businesses, and the traffic already goes 55 miles per hour—I don't see what's wrong with it."

The commission also studied a proposed extension of the sanitary land fill now in existence at the corner of Hannah and Michigan Avenue. Hillis Timmer, a spokesman for Waste Management Co., a nationwide firm, stated that the additional 40 acres

## The Meijer philosophy remains

CANTON—It all started in 1934 when the town barber in Greenville decided to open a market, or rather a neighborhood store with the assistance of his wife, son and daughter.

For Hendrik Meijer, who operated a barbershop for 29 years before retiring, it was sort of a dream coming true. He had always wanted to get into the grocery and meat market business but had operated the barbershop in Greenville for so many years it didn't seem like he would ever get the chance.

Then, during the greatest depression this country has ever known up to this time, Hendrik decided to go into business but still go on with his barbershop.

HIS PHILOSOPHY as a barber was that any person who walked through the front door was entitled to barbering service. It didn't make any difference to Hendrik whether they were dirty from their work in the shops, or whether they were farmers coming in from the farms covered with cow manure and smelling to the high heavens...to him they were customers and he took care of them.

When he decided to open the neighborhood grocery and market he followed the same policies. He merchandised items for the rich and middle class but he was always looking for the goods the less fortunate could buy.

"And he never deviated from that policy to his dying day," said his son Fred, now president of the huge Meijer Thrifty Acres chain which will open the largest store in the group on Nov. 19 in Canton Township at the intersection of Ford and Canton Center Roads.

"When Dad started in the grocery business, I was only 14 but I worked fulltime along with my mother and sister Johanna," recalled Fred.

"MY FATHER and I worked side by side for 30 years in developing Thrifty Acres to what it is today and always followed his original policies."

"We opened our second store in 1942 and followed with the third in 1946 with the only change that now we

were getting into the supermarket period and the stores were of that type."

"It was in 1946 in one of the stores I met my wife who was one of the employees. She worked for Thrifty Acres for five years after we married and then left to become a mother and take care of our family which finally reached a total of three sons."

Meijer told of the rapid expansion during the period of 1949-1959 when Thrifty Acres opened 10 stores in the Grand Rapids area.

Then the expansion moved along in Western Michigan to include stores in Muskegon and other communities before Meijer and his associates decided to go into Lansing and Holland.

"In 1962 we had 16 Thrifty Acres stores," he said. "The volume of business was between \$20 and \$30 million. The new operation we are opening in Canton Township will be our largest to date and will be the 25th store in our chain. We also have 17 gas stations with stores."

## Canton O&E welcomed

CANTON—Word that the Observer & Eccentric has added a twelfth paper with today's first edition of the Canton Observer & Eccentric was met with happy reactions by many officials in the Canton community.

"I'm very happy for you and very pleased," noted township clerk John Flodin. "I wish you well and hope you get adequate coverage of the township."

Plymouth Community Schools Trustee Thomas Yack said he felt the new paper was a good idea, adding, "There's enough news in Canton to warrant its own newspaper."

Supervisor-elect Robert Greenstein also passed along his congratulations noting, "This is the first time a newspaper with a reputable background in a number of other communities will offer complete coverage of Canton news."

"This is a great boost to Canton Township's identity. Canton can now stand on its own."

"I think it's a long time overdue," noted planning commission chairman Joseph Kinnick. "We've had so many different news media, nobody's been doing justice in the township. It's a tremendous step in the right direction."

"THE CANTON facility, which will have its grand opening on Tuesday, Nov. 19 is our first venture into the Detroit area. We do have plans for others in and around metropolitan Detroit, probably on the same level as the Canton store."

"It has been an interesting life and I wouldn't have missed it for anything else in the world. But believe you me it was a lot of hard work."

Meijer, who is extremely proud of his Thrifty Acres which had a volume of more than \$400 million in 1973, attributes a great deal of the success to the guidance of his father and the manner in which the father and son team was able to surround themselves with so many excellent aides.

"As I told you I have three sons," he said, "and whether they decide to follow my footsteps into the business will be their decision. Hendrik is a graduate of the University of Michigan. Doug is a junior there and Mark is a senior in high school."

# Shakespeare opens Nov. 15

The Schoolcraft College Theater Department is busy rehearsing its upcoming production of William Shakespeare's comedy, "A Midsummer Night's Dream." Contributing some behind-the-scenes help are J. Patrick Sutton and Philip Molby, artists-in-residence during the fall semester at Schoolcraft.

Their specialties are costume and technical direction for theater productions, especially for puppet shows. The team has an extensive background in community theater and "loves working with students."

They have worked in the Grosse Pointe Community Theater (children's theater), St. Clair Shores Community Theater, on lighting, stage design, set construction and directing; and Time Community Playhouse, on make-up.

During the winter of 1974 they were artists-in-residence at Michigan State University instructing miniature theater.

"THE SCHOOLCRAFT production is my first Shakespearean show," says Sutton, who has spent most of his time on costume design.

He has multiple sclerosis and does most of his work from a wheelchair. Despite the MS, Sutton deftly operates his sewing machine and has nearly completed the show's wardrobe.

Molby, the other half of the team, has an extensive background in set construction. He has executed all different forms of technical work and toured with several marionette companies. He is known as the "puppet master."

Molby says his technical skills developed mainly out of necessity.

"I'm essentially interested in production and that includes stage tech. As a puppeteer/producer you have to know how to do everything because the companies are so small."

For the Schoolcraft production Molby has supervised the set construction and acted in an advisory capacity.

He finds the Schoolcraft presentation a challenge because of the tight budget.

"We've had to show a lot of ingenuity in using everything we have," says Molby.

THE PAIR have been working together since 1958. "I was rehearsing a presentation of 'Finian's Rainbow'

when Phil saw me and asked if I would do the voice for his puppet show," recalls Sutton. They became partners in the Mobly Marionettes and have traveled throughout Michigan and the United States performing puppet shows.

Besides costuming Sutton has done script writing and technical work for the puppet show "Rumpelstiltskin," which toured the U.S. last year.

He was affiliated with the Kungsholm Miniature Grand Opera in Chicago during the 1964-65 season and is the only American puppeteer to perform with a European marionette company.

Molby's interest in theater, in par-

ticular puppetry, began as a child. "Like any other child I received a puppet and was so inclined."

MOLBY ALSO did technical work at Kungsholm Miniature Grand Opera and has toured with many puppet theaters.

The artists work along with the entire cast and director, Ralph B. Kelly, can be seen Nov. 15, 16, 17 and 22, 23 and 24 in the Liberal Arts Theater at Schoolcraft College.

Friday and Saturday performances are at 8 p.m. and Sunday performances are at 7.

Tickets, at \$2 and \$1 for students, are available at the campus bookstore and at the door for all performances.

Madonna College, the setting for Northville Town Hall lectures for the first time this year, is located at Schoolcraft and Levan roads.

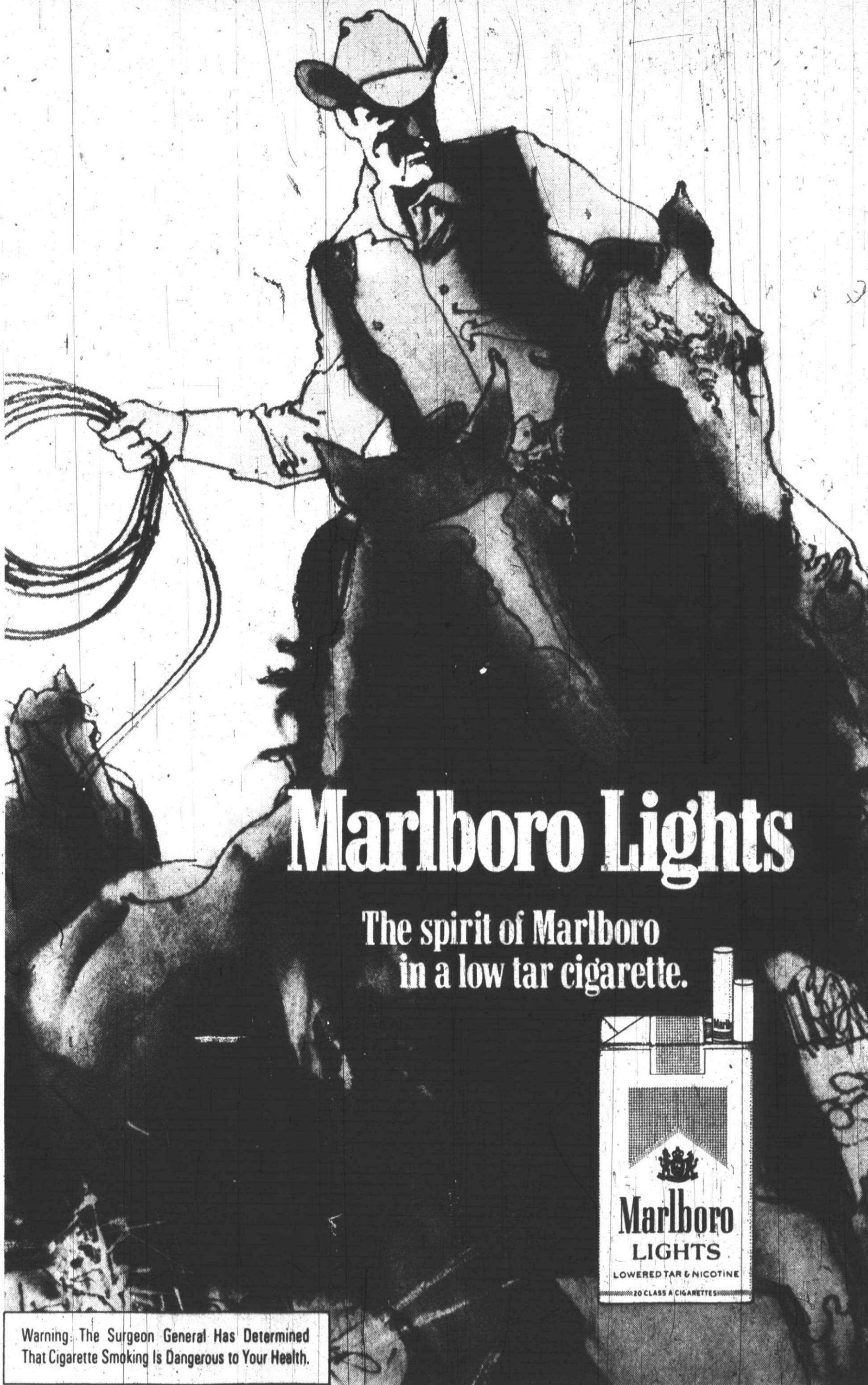
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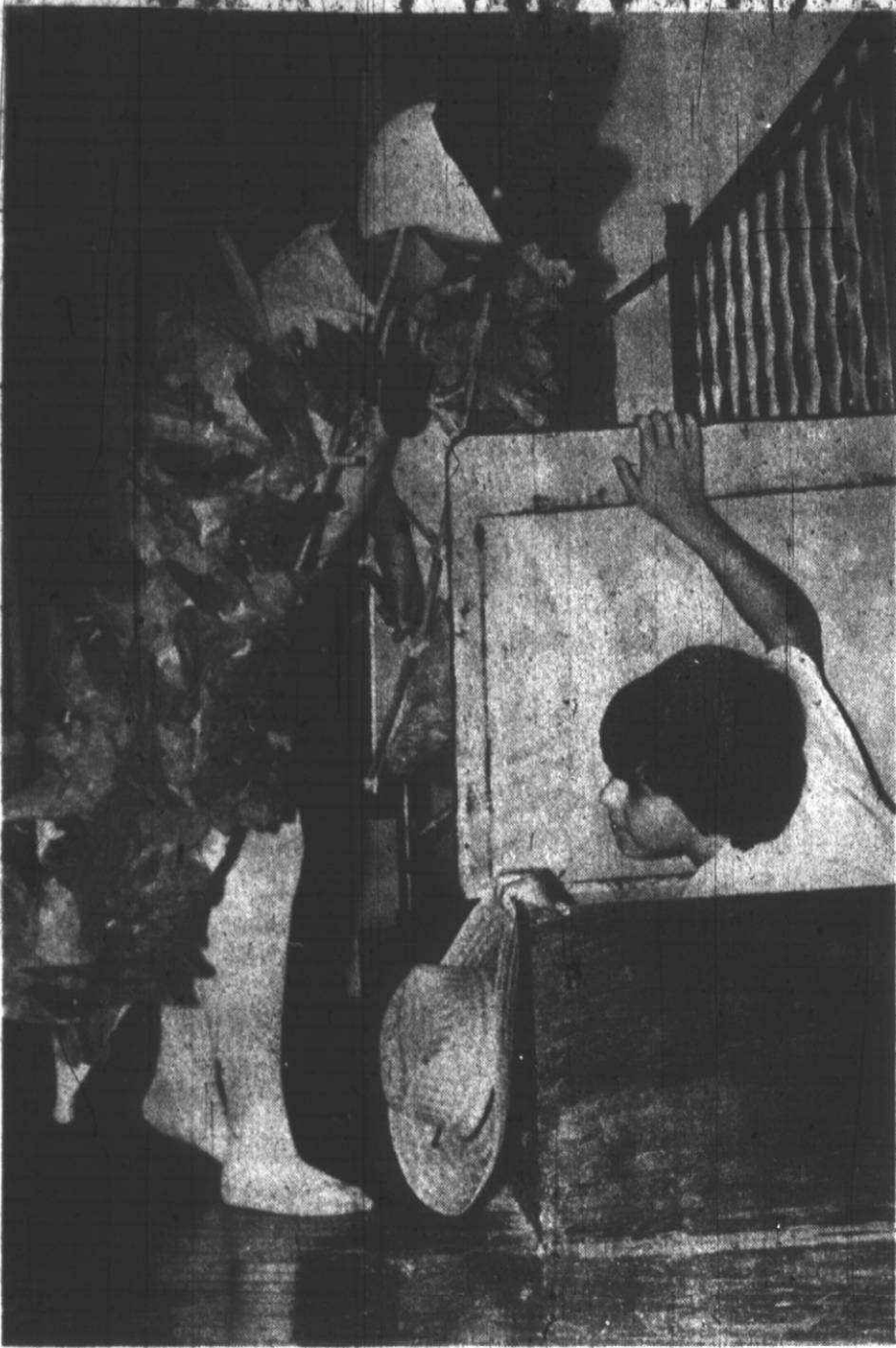

PLYMOUTH—Fairy tales have come a long way since the days of simple morals as attested by the Central Middle School drama class which will present Jack Beanstalk and Friends complete with a W. C. Fields character and a scrawny giant who is drafted as a gardener.

The class of Mrs. Nola Lutey, comprised of sixth, seventh and eighth grade students, will be presenting their play to Central School audience Nov. 13-15 and will spend the following week taking the play to Starweather, Smith, Farrand, Bird, and Tanager elementary schools.

And the senior citizens of Tonquish Manor will be cast as audience at 7 p.m. Nov. 15. Transportation is being provided by the Plymouth Fine Arts Council.

Entering into their final week of rehearsals, the cast expressed both excitement and nervousness about their debut.

As the cast assembled for a dress rehearsal, the students were in awe of the scenery donated to them by the Plymouth players and were eager to get things right.

"You ought to see the stage," they exclaimed. "It has curtains."

"Are the lights OK, Mrs. Lutey?" a couple of student technicians asked.

The plot of the fairy tale thickens as Jack, played by sixth grader Carl Paloyne, trades his sick cow to W. C. Fieldston, played by Andrea Graham, for a potion which relieves, corns, rheumatism, and the heartbreak of psoriasis in addition to growing hair and removing bumper stickers.

Jack, optimistic despite his empty stomach, dreams of a pumpkin turning into a coach or one of his mother's slippers summoning a handsome prince.

"I'm starving and he makes like Hans Christian Anderson," moans Jack's mother, portrayed by Kelli Heaton.

Instead of finding the goose that lays the golden legs in the home of the giant, Jack runs across a chicken.

"I may not lay any golden eggs," cackles the chicken, played by

Raymond Hahn "But I can whip up a mean omelet."

The cast spent a week selecting a play and have been rehearsing for five weeks.

As Jack, Carl dons baggy trousers and an oversize T-shirt for his part and admits that he like the chance to play a different character.

"I haven't been nervous so far but I know I will be when I get down to playing in front of the school," Carl Payone said.

And while he admitted he was having fun, he conceded that there was work involved.

"It's hard to learn all your lines," he said. "But I know them now or at least I better know them."

For her role as W. C. Fieldston, Andrea Graham donned her father's suit, hat and cane.

"I've never seen any of the W. C. Fields movies but I have watched the commercials and that's how I learned to do my imitation of him," she said.

"I still have to work on my voice but even if I get that right, I don't think I'll ever be able to play pool like him."

Raymond Hahn, in his role as Chicken, has a unique problem with his part.

"The hard part about it is coming out on stage in these," he complained, pointing to the girls' white tights he wears.

He also wears a white T-shirt and bathing cap which he says squashes his ears. The costume is accented by a red felt comb and orange and yellow wings.

The giant, who professes not to have a green thumb, is played by Julie Edmister. She solves Jack's food dilemma by promising to return to his house to be the gardener.

The drama class is an elective subject at Central and Mrs. Lutey feels she has some aspiring actors on her hands.

"The kids took to their parts like ducks take to water," she said.

The cast is rounded out by three narrators who include Lisa Simpson, Cindy Gordon and Dawn Hamlin.

The stage crew is headed up by Carl Lambert.

sought by his firm would allow the landfill to be converted into a golf course in 10 years when it is finished. Grant Campbell, outgoing township treasurer, stated that the landfill would destroy adjacent industrial property. Robert Greenstein, newly elected township supervisor, "speaking for the last time as a private citizen," noted that the landfill company could do as it pleased with the land when it was finished as a landfill.

"It's entirely possible," he said, "that they might use the land for a

motorcycle race track, if that's most profitable for them."

Trimmer responded that after the site was contoured with the clay excavated to make the fill, it could be used for nothing but a golf course.

Although the zoning board of appeals had already approved Trimmer's suggestion, the planning commission decided to refer the matter to chief planner Mike Manore. On Nov. 19, after Manore has investigated the proposal, the commission will reconsider it.

# Proposition C's passage may hurt township budget

CANTON—There's a lot of concern among township officials, old and new in Canton—and it has to do with the recently passed budget.

The biggest worry of the township officers, specifically Clerk John Flodin, Treasurer-elect Carl Parsell and Supervisor-elect Robert Greenstein, is the lack of money that will be rebated to the township from the state sales tax.

The recent passage of Proposition C will undoubtedly reduce the township's income, the extent of which is currently unknown. "We'll have a 'soft' budget for the first half of the year," said Parsell. "Until we know just what the effect of the amendment will be." (The amendment will repeal the four per cent sales tax on food and limit the sales tax on prescription drugs to two per cent.)

Last year, a substantial portion of the township's revenue came from the sales tax rebate.

This year projected revenue from the state rebate is up \$2,000 but down

about four per cent due to the increase in the budget.

The current budget calls for about \$150,000 from the sales tax rebate, but now with the amendment, the accuracy of that projection is at best questionable.

Flodin and Greenstein hope that the rebate can be made up in some other fashion, perhaps a larger rebate on income tax paid by area residents to the state, although Parsell contends that this is unlikely. According to Flodin, the situation is further aggravated by the slumping auto sales which provide a large part of the sales tax, says Flodin.

The issue assumes even greater gravity because of the failure of the safety millage. Parsell and Greenstein were extremely disappointed by the township electorate's reaction, and attributed the defeat of the millage to the current administration's inability to educate the voters.

"They promised to go out and tell the voters why we need a new fire station and they simply didn't," said Greenstein. "I think this millage would have passed if the voters had

truly been informed," he continued. Parsell echoed this sentiment and added, "They were scared. The thing wasn't presented in the proper fashion. All they saw was the lump sum of three mills over 10 years and naturally they thought that was too much money."

Greenstein is now afraid that it will take a tragedy to rectify the situation. "One fire station just can't cover 36 square miles."

Plans for a second fire station have been drawn but the officials see no way to raise money for it. Even if they can generate funds to build the station, there will be no money to operate and man it. All three officials agree that bonding to raise money is not an answer.

The problem could be aggravated if the township loses its suit against Wayne County, currently in Circuit Court. The suit is to prevent the county sheriff from withdrawing protection, a move that is currently prohibited by injunction. Should the township lose its case, there will be an added problem of money for local police protection. However, Greenstein

says that the lawyers he has talked to are hopeful of a positive ruling for the townships. (Several townships have joined in the suit.)

In the face of this current adversity, last week's concern over procedural improprieties in presenting the budget have taken a back seat. Explains Flodin, "We've given the budget to the attorney for the Michigan Townships Association, rather than have our own attorney ratify it. That way the results will be more credible to our constituents."

Greenstein has become calmer on the issue, but he still maintains that the budget should be open to public hearing regardless of the attorney's decision. If the attorney finds the budget legitimate, then Greenstein sees no reason for a special meeting to hear public sentiment on the new budget. "We could just set aside part of a regular meeting for a public hearing on it," he explained.

Parsell was less forgiving about the procedural error. "It's just another example of the old board losing the confidence of the people. In future years things like that just won't happen."

## New supervisor says

CANTON—Increasing citizen input and controlling township growth were two of the mainstays of Robert Greenstein's campaign for his soon-to-be supervisor's job in the township.

And talking with him last week, Greenstein expanded on some of the ways he thinks his ideas can become realities.

"The first thing we have to do is hammer out a master land use plan and rework all of the zoning ordinances. We've got to change the direction of the growth that has taken place in the township."

WHEN HE TALKS about change, his main concern is the number of single family residential lots of 60-foot variety with an eye toward severely limiting future rezonings for multiple housing developments.

"We need to preserve more agricultural land and I think we can do that with a new zoning classification: industrial agriculture. This would place agriculture as the highest possible use of land as opposed to having it as a category that can be used as a land bank for future residential development."

Greenstein noted the zoning classification, if approved by the county and the rest of the township boards, would provide for assessments on farmland at the \$500 per acre mark, so the farmer would be able to economically keep his land in farming.

"The county would be willing to reduce the assessments on the property for a very simple reason: The money saved on not putting in roads and other facilities necessary for development, would more than make up for the loss in property tax revenue."

THE NEW supervisor's plan for increasing citizen input include some rather interesting innovations that might not set well with prospective developers.

The first class will be indoors and will provide orientation on the sport as well as information and registration. At the following nine sessions held at Mt. Brighton, persons can join lessons starting at 12:30 p.m. Saturdays beginning Dec. 7, or at 1:30 p.m. on Sundays commencing Dec. 8.

## County officials say

# Child diseases on rise

WESTLAND—Measles, mumps, and chicken pox—most young children at some time contract these "normal childhood diseases."

But last year a Bay City youngster contracted polio, a disease that doctors had considered licked, and no longer a threat to the American child.

But according to Henry Downs, Wayne County Health Department immunization advisor, nearly 40 per cent of the county youngsters are no longer immune to the disease which can cripple and even kill.

"Parent apathy," is a contributing factor to the lack of protection among youngsters, according to Downs.

"In order to be fully protected against polio, a series of three oral doses of vaccine is required," Downs says.

All too-often the child may receive

one or two doses, and not the third. "An underprotected child is just as susceptible as one who has not had any immunization," Downs says.

"We know the disease is present in the area because of the Bay City case. All it needs is a new start in Wayne County, and we may have an epidemic of a disease that we thought was no longer a threat."

MEASLES, ALTHOUGH not considered a harmful disease by itself can lead to serious complications, including ear damage, pneumonia, encephalitis (sleeping sickness) or even death.

Measles is almost 100 per cent in communicability, and once it strikes in an area, can reach epidemic proportions.

"It is not a good idea for parents to try and expose their children to the disease if it can be avoided," says Downs. And measles can be avoided.

Prior to 1966, and the development of the measles vaccine more than 1,000 deaths occurred from measles complications in Wayne County.

Since widespread distribution of the measles vaccine, the number of deaths has consistently dropped, and last year there were less than 100.

Rubella, which causes the most injury to a fetus in the first trimester of pregnancy is damaging in that many people don't even know they have the disease.

In the early 1960s, 20,000 fetal deaths and 40,000 serious birth defects were directly linked to rubella.

But the immunity level to both rubella and measles is dropping, according to Downs, and the results are all too well known to health department officials.

Nearly 30 per cent of pre-schoolers lack immunity to rubella. Last year Wayne County had the highest incidence of measles of any county in the state. The outlying county areas recorded more cases of measles than did the city of Detroit.

Until recently, mumps vaccine was not considered a priority and the health department did not have the funds to distribute the vaccine locally.

Although vaccines and immunity levels to diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), and tetanus is fairly high, if people get lax with these diseases, they could again strike high numbers of children with devastating results.

Although there is a state law that requires all students entering public schools to be immunized against diseases, "there is no teeth to it," according to Downs. "We have means of enforcement, and the community suffers because of the health department official admits."

BUT PARENTS can protect their children and themselves from the diseases. Those who missed Sunday's clinics at St. Mary's Hospital of Livonia, Garden City Osteopathic Hospital and other locations throughout the county, can stop by the Wayne County Health Department.

No appointment is necessary at the Merriman and Michigan Ave. health department, and there is no charge for the inoculations or vaccine given by the health department.

An hour or two of preventive medicine can be the difference between sickness and health.

## Best bandsmen featured

"This has been in the back of the minds of the band directors for a long time," Mike DiCuirci, music man at Central Middle School said.

"When you're in the classroom you always have to teach to the middle of the road students. Now we have the chance to teach the advanced students exclusively."

Coordinating the program with DiCuirci is Jeff Drifmeyer of West Middle School, Stan Towers of East Middle School and Dale Baer of Pioneer Middle School.

"This is strictly a coordinated effort," DiCuirci said. "We're bringing together advanced students to give them the chance to play with others on a common meeting ground of capability."

The 78-student ensemble was formed, based on selection of students on director's recommendations.

### Friends of Wine now in 10th vintage year

Les Amis Du Vin (Friends of Wine), the world's largest wine club, started out as an exclusive club limited to 100 members.

But gabby newspaperpeople who attended Les Amis du Vin gatherings in Washington, D.C., where the club was born, talked about it in print and the rush was on to join.

Today the club has 15,000 members in the United States. In Michigan, local chapters include ones in Oakland County and Livonia.

Belgian-born Robert Gourdin is national director of Les Amis du Vin. Professionally he is U.S. sales director for France's Moet Chandon, producers of Dom Perignon—the prestige champagne—and largest producers of premium wine.

"LES AMIS du Vin is the only wine club in the United States for learning about wines," Gourdin says. Other notable wine clubs also extend interest to foods, and membership may depend on who you are, he claims.

Gourdin patterned Les Amis du Vin after an exclusive Club of 100 in Paris, to which he belongs. He had just come to Washington, D.C., from New York and was appalled at the lack of wine knowledge there.

Informality is the keynote in Les Amis du Vin. Gourdin was associated with a liquor store and was losing customers for them by refusing membership to interested persons.

He threw the membership open, and if someone called to ask about joining a club in their city, he would suggest they start one.

THE WASHINGTON, D.C.,

chapter, where the club is headquartered, has 3,000 members.

Gourdin speaks with a delectable accent and humorous thrust to his conversation.

The club's informality extends to its magazine, published bi-monthly and now out with its second issue. It's a slick-papered publication with a color cover.

"If someone wants to take and ad in our magazine, they call us, but we don't worry about ads," he says.

"WE SHOULD tell the truth about wine. In some magazines they say a wine is wonderful, you turn the page and there is a big ad for that wine."

Gourdin recently visited with members of the Oakland County Chapter of Les Amis du Vin, at a luncheon at the Roman Terrace in Farmington Hills and at a wine-tasting party at the Glen Oaks Country Club.

"We do have a wine explosion in this country," Gourdin declares. "Twenty percent of the people drink wine."

"But things have gone from the ridiculous to the sublime. People are either drinking cheap or sweet wine, or have gone into a crash course and are buying all expensive wines. The vineyards are not going to be extended."

HE SAYS: "You can buy a great French wine for \$5."

"All Italian wines are lousy," by comparison to French, according

to Gourdin. "They don't have the same soil. The Italians taught us how to make wine and we make it better."

He rhapsodizes, "Man does not make wine. It's the soil, the atmosphere, the air you breathe."

The vintage club Les Amis du Vin is 10 years old. Annual membership dues of \$15 include the magazine, wine-tasting parties, "Wine of the Month" selections at reduced prices and other benefits.

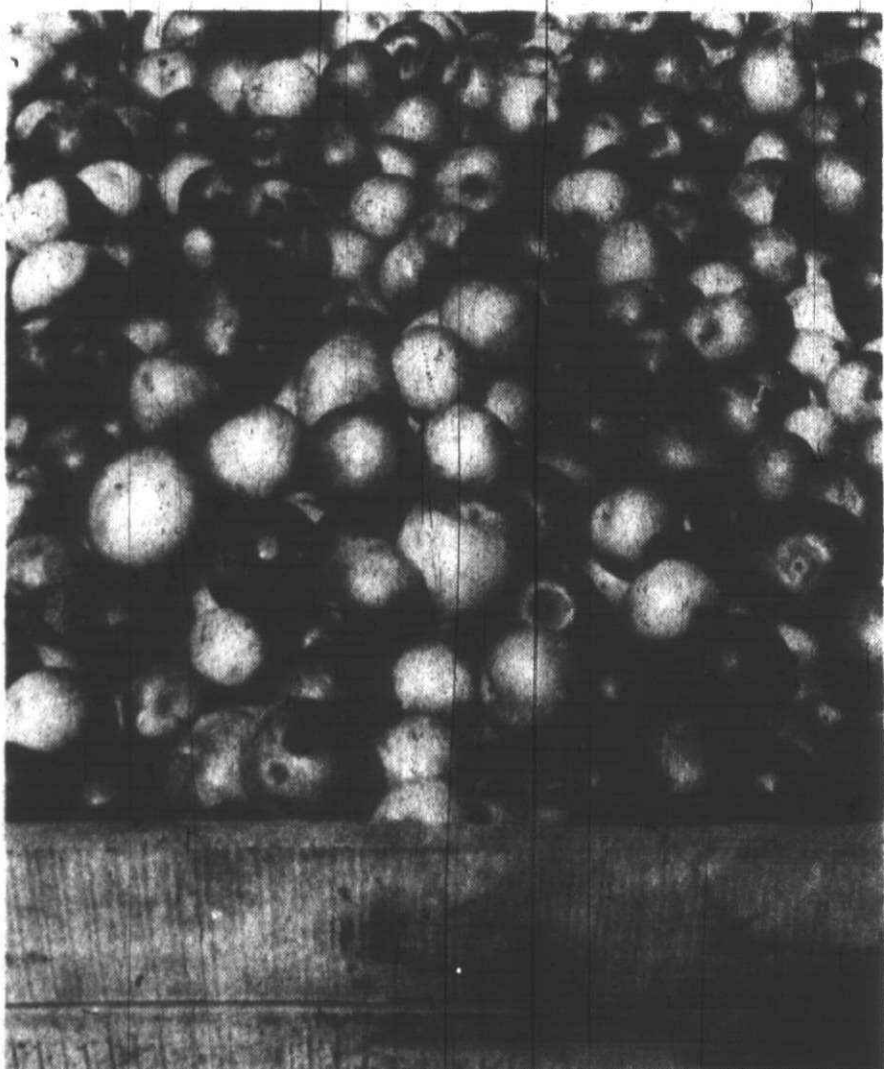

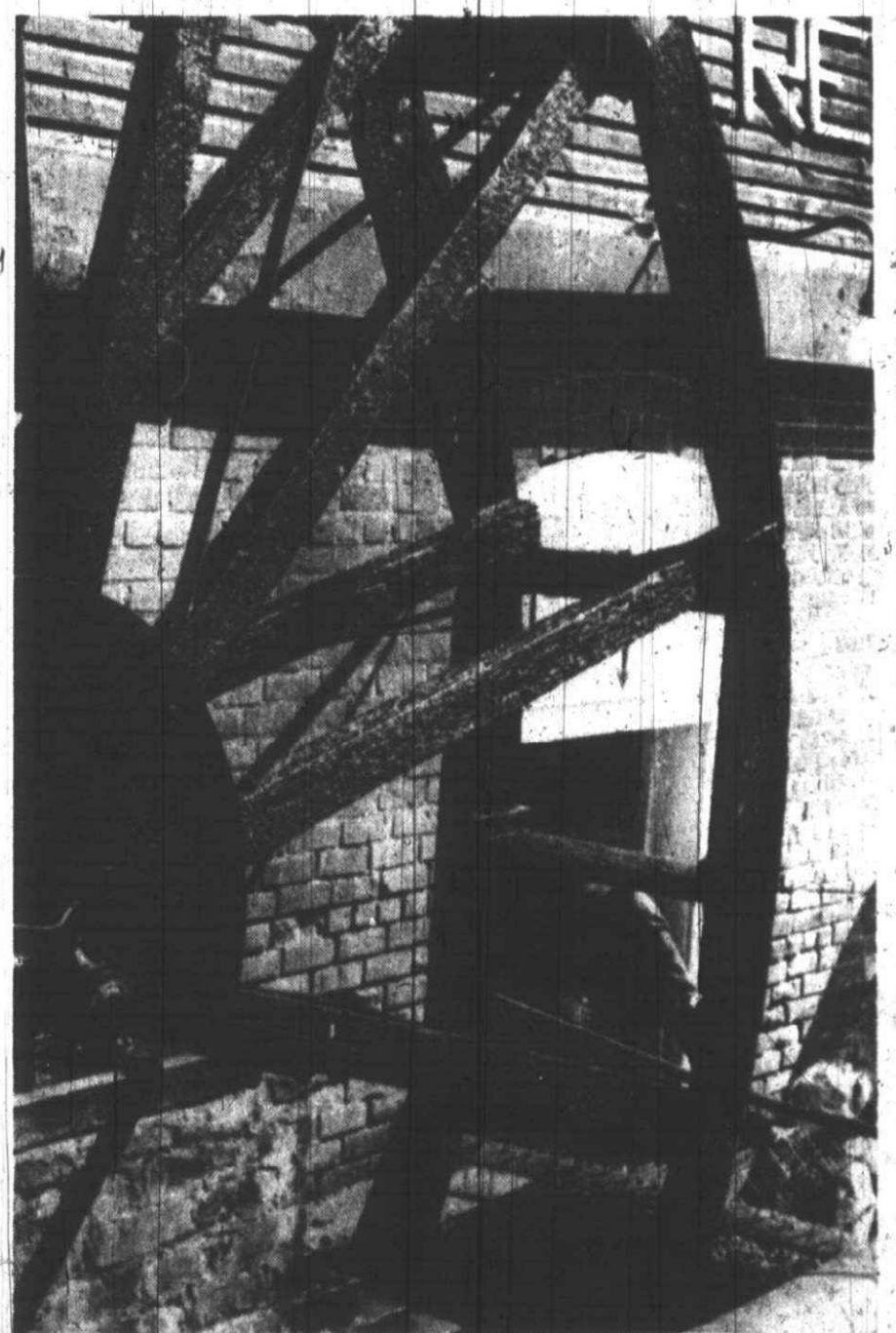

Whip egg whites (5) in a stainless steel bowl with a pinch of sugar and cream of tartar. The best type of mixer would be like a Kitchen Aid or by hand with a copper bowl.

Egg whites become most frothy at room temperature and this is the entire principle of a soufflé, baking the encased air under hot heat so it can do nothing but rise. Opening the oven before the 20

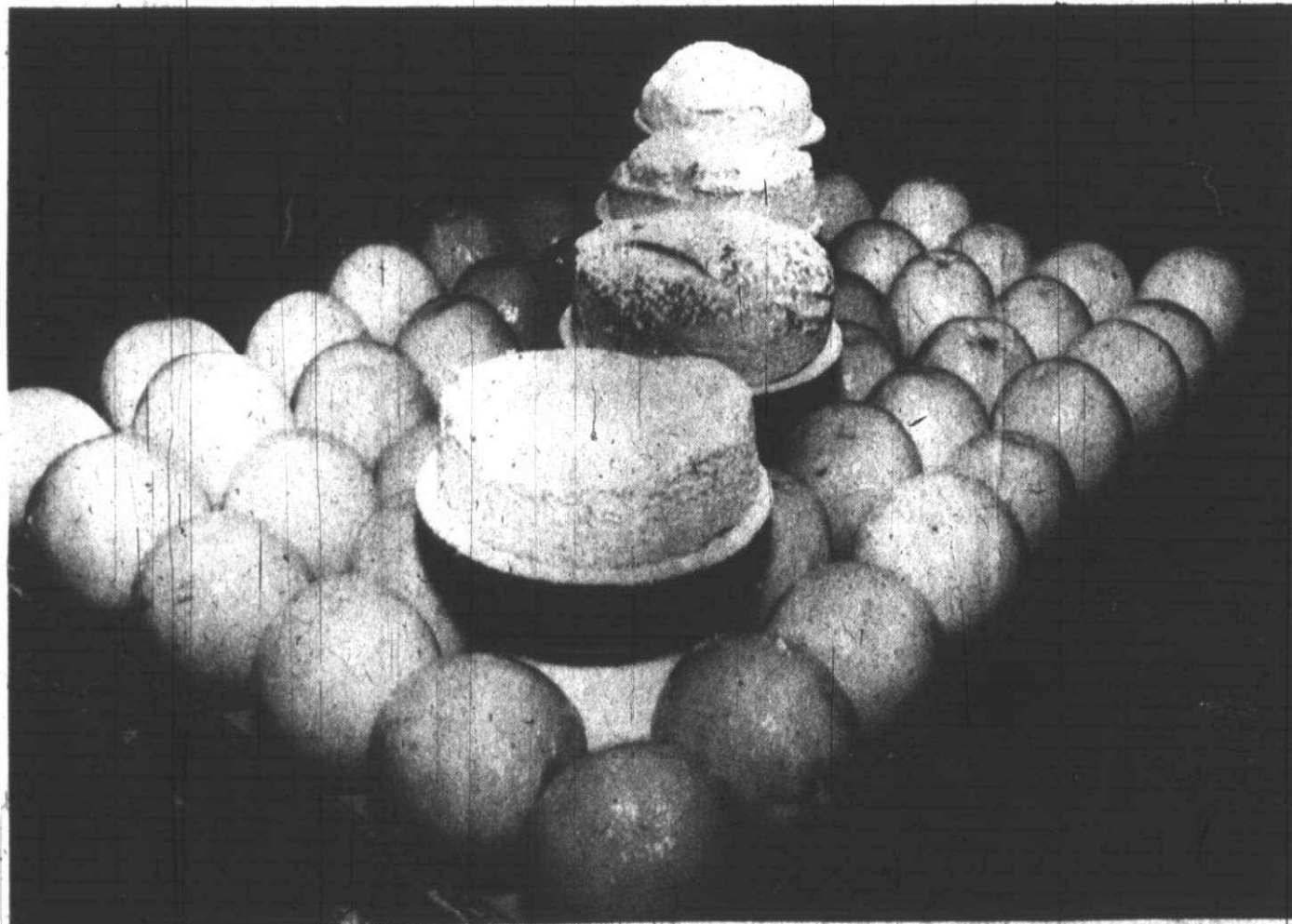
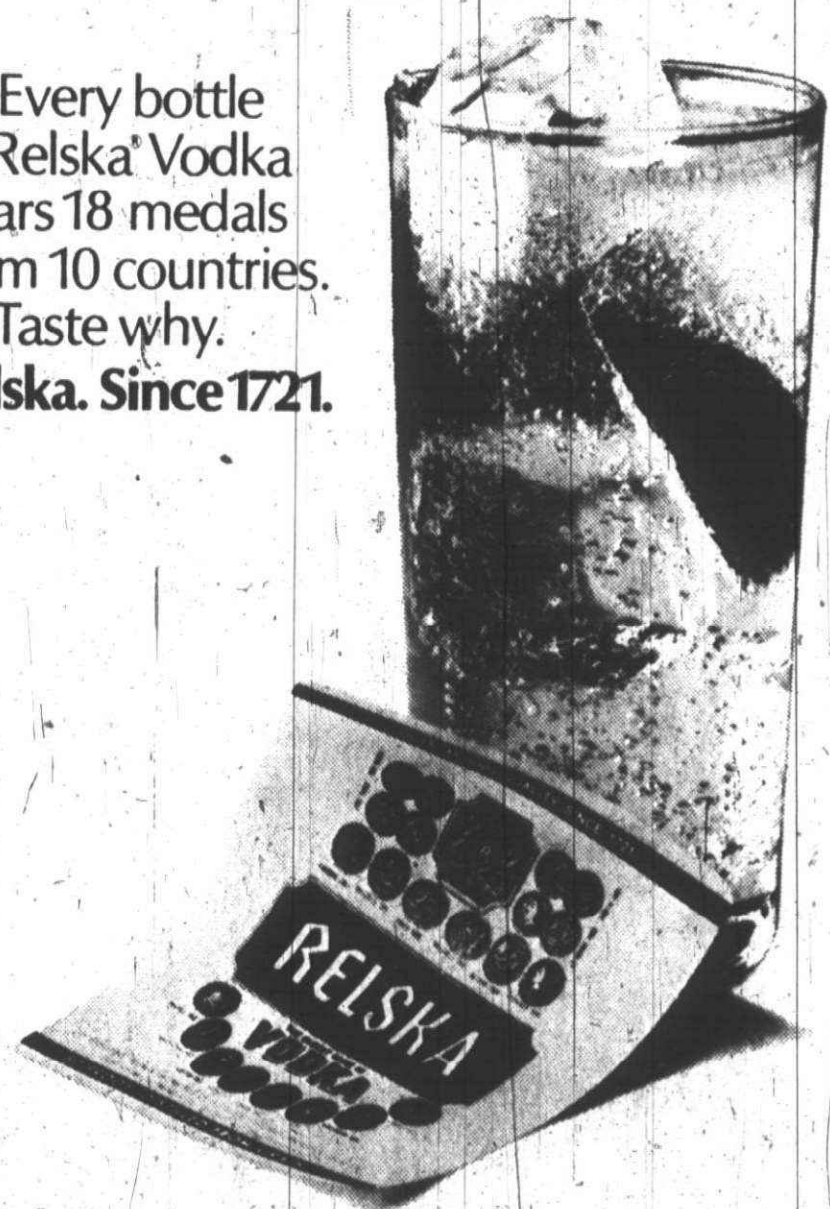

## Aging face bleak future

By LORAIN McCLISH

A great many aging adults are isolated, living in inadequate housing, eating inadequate food and have an income of under \$3,000 per year. More than 50 percent of them are in eight states: California, New York, Pennsylvania, Florida, Illinois, Ohio, Texas and Michigan, in that order.

Dr. John Bell, clinical psychologist with a Veterans Administration hospital in California, painted a bleak picture of the aging when he gave these facts to a gathering of professionals in social service and health fields in Oakland County this week. The conference was sponsored by Michigan State University's Graduate Center at Cranbrook.

His talk was sprinkled with suicide statistics, the fact that social security benefits are not keeping up with escalating prices and that the aging is the most neglected minority in public health.

Lack of transportation accounts for part of the aloneness of the elderly and tops the list of major problems, followed by housing and health.

**HOUSING FOLLOWS** on the heels of transportation as a major problem mainly because those in a low income bracket are spending 40 percent of their entire income just to get a roof over their heads.

"In surveys taken, their first choice overwhelmingly is to live independently in their own home," Bell said, "but income aside (and for a variety of reasons) only 18 percent have achieved this."

One out of five, he said, were living "in grossly inadequate housing."

Health has been pushed down the list to the number three problem since Medicare, but "arthritis and rheumatism are still with us." Lack of hearing is hard to correct and does a lot towards putting the aged into isolation.

All of these problems become further complicated "when you realize

that most persons over 65 years of age have not had the kind of education we have or that we are giving to our kids. Only 32 percent ever finished high school and this manifests itself particularly in communicating."

"The red tape and the complicated procedures we have for getting public aid or subsistence for whatever is needed, and is available, becomes so complex they just drop it," Bell explained.

Bell chooses to use the term "aging adults" when he talks about this group of people. "Aging is a process, not a state," he says, "and the word adult has some prestige, separating all of us from those under 18."

**OF ALL** terms used (elders, seniors, and such) Bell scorns most "golden agers" because "so many aspects of their lives are far from golden."

Bell said, "Some of us view the aging as children and talk to them that way. Some see them as incapable and treat them that way. Some see them as disengaged from life and want to keep them that way. Some see them as rigid, unable to learn, so we won't introduce them to anything new. Some over protect, some over demand. Some fear he's going to die on their hands if they get too near. Some see him as dull."

When he explored fears the aging have, he said "fear of death is not as extreme as we might imagine. The how is much more important than the fact. They are afraid of being alone when they die but they can talk of death in the abstract without emotion."

The aging are fearful of progressive illnesses, illnesses which lead to dehabilitation and, again, loneliness that this may bring, and "they will bear pain better if they know it will not bring isolation."

What they need most, Bell said, when all of the basics are taken care of, is "the need to love, (not be loved), the need to care (not be cared for) and the need to be useful."

## Society bypassing elderly?

The aged in our "super-industrial" society are caught in a time machine racing faster and faster into the future.

"As the rate of change speeds up, more and more older people feel the difference keenly," said Alvin Toffler in his book, "Future Shock." "They too, become dropouts."

The problem of keeping up in a society that is racing by is the dilemma of the elderly in the United States as well as other industrialized societies. The traditional roles of teacher and sage that once marked "the years of wisdom" have been robbed from the aged.

Another price of life in an industrial world is the demand for mobile workers ready to move off the land in pursuit of jobs. This contributed to the breakup of the extended family including grandparents, aunts and uncles.

**THE NUCLEAR** family emerged.

Today, only 20 percent of the aged in the United States are living with their children, ac-

cording to Professor Boaz Kahana, chairman of the Oakland University psychology department and lifespan developmental psychologist.

"More and more, however, older people are living with their adult children as they are needed to help with child care once mothers return to work," he said.

"We're conditioned to think the aged can't contribute to society because of the emphasis on youth, health and competition in our culture," Kahana said.

"But, the elderly can be an active part of society."

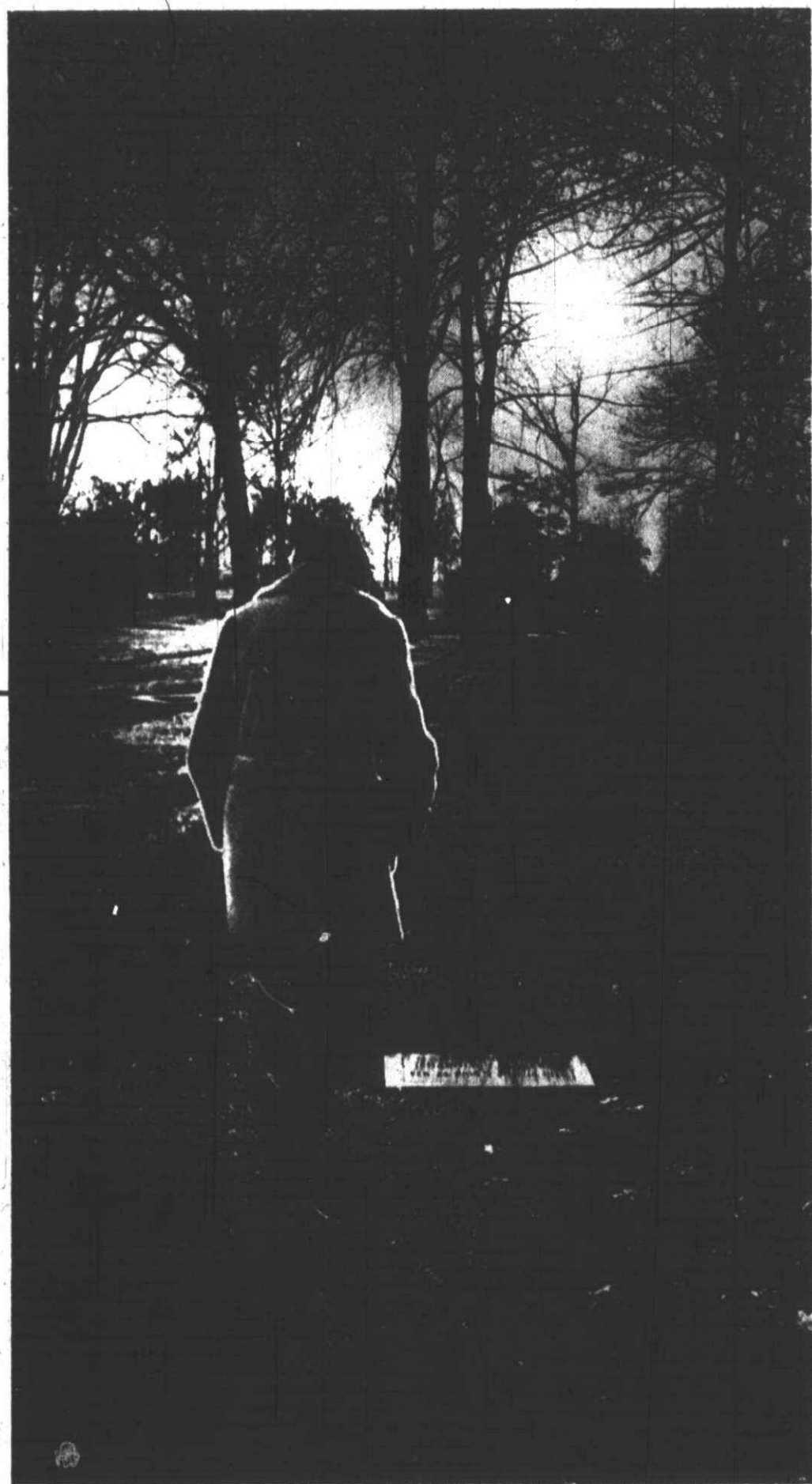
**KAHANA THINKS** we must find solutions to these problems as the lifespan increases for all.

Although most experts agree that the aged are better off in nonindustrial societies because they do have a role and status. "The grass isn't always greener. Life is not all peaches and cream for them," Kahana said.

Often status is in name only. "When you look at how he's actually treated, the elder doesn't have all the power in reality sometimes," Kahana explained.

**ALSO IN** nonindustrial cultures, the aged are a smaller percentage of the populace.

"In Thailand, the average life expectancy is 54. In the United States, it's 67 and in Norway, 71. Thus, nonindustrial societies can afford to give in to a smaller elderly population."

## Dearborn romps, 26-7

## Canton bows out a 3-6 loser

Plymouth Salem's Chiefs ended their second varsity football season in the same mood as a golfer who bird-

ies the 18th hole after shooting 17 straight bogies — confident he can do better and eager to give it one more try.

Down 20-0 at halftime to Dearborn High, the Chiefs stopped the invading Pioneers without a single first down after intermission and a total of only 20 yards by both ground and air for those last two quarters.

Canton's seven points with 1:45 left in the fourth period slightly more than offset Dearborn's third quarter six pointer that came on a blocked punt, but it didn't prevent the ultimate 26-7 loss that left the Chiefs a disappointing 3-6 for the season.

"Some of our kids played great ball and we're already looking to next year," commented Canton Coach Jim Munelo. "Our junior halfbacks, Jim Tiller and Steve Hanis, were especially outstanding."

There was support for the coach's statement in the fact that these two 145-pounders were Canton's top ground gainers. Tiller with 58 yards and Hanis with 37, and were the mainstays of two long drives by the Chiefs in the second half.

One of those consumed 58 yards but ran out of steam at the Dearborn seven yard line, while the other ate up 66 yards in nine plays and accounted for the Plymouth touchdown on a 10-yard pass from junior quarterback Tom Close to senior end Rick Thom.

Risti Mihailovich booted the extra point for the Chiefs' seventh point and there was more than just the solace of avoiding a shutout at the hands of the 6-3 Pioneers.

It was Canton that won the war of the statistics, getting 13 first downs to Dearborn's six and hogging the ball enough to run 61 plays from scrim-

mage to Dearborn's 45. However, the Pioneers were so dominant in the first two periods that the game was beyond Canton's reach despite the rally.

DEARBORN scored the third time it got the ball in the first quarter, moving 60 yards in four plays.

The big gainer was a 34-yard pass from Don Klopick to Lee Capatina, with John Leone then scoring on a 23-yard burst after 10:21 had been played. Bob Knoop's conversion made it 7-0.

An interception by Bob Scott gave the Pioneers possession on the Canton 30 to start the second quarter and eight plays later fullback John Shader plunged half a yard on fourth down for the second Dearborn tally. Knoop converted and it was 14-0.

Canton was forced to punt after the kickoff and on the first play, from his own 45, Klopick found Capatina wide open for a 55-yard, scoring pass, leaving it 20-0 at the half.

The Pioneers made it 26-0 at 9:54 of the third quarter when tackle Jason Hiltz scooped up a punt that had been blocked off the toe of Canton's Brian Stemberger and ambled 35 yards for the score on a virtual freebie.

AFTER THAT the Pioneers, who had tied for third in the Suburban Eight, were able to run only 10 more plays to 31 for Canton as Tiller and Hanis spearheaded the belated attack.

Losing the ball on downs at the Dearborn seven, the Chiefs came right back to take over on their 34 by virtue of an interception by Ray Mandie. This set up the drive that was capped by the touchdown pitch from Close to Thom.

The Chiefs were on the move into Dearborn territory again when time ran out. It left Canton with an 0-4 record for non-league competition after going 3-2 within the Western Six for a second place tie with Northville and Livonia Churchill behind Farmington Harrison.

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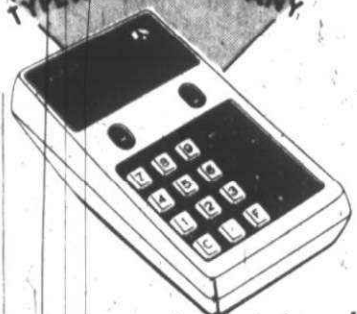
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## RU girl cagers tip Salem, 47-28

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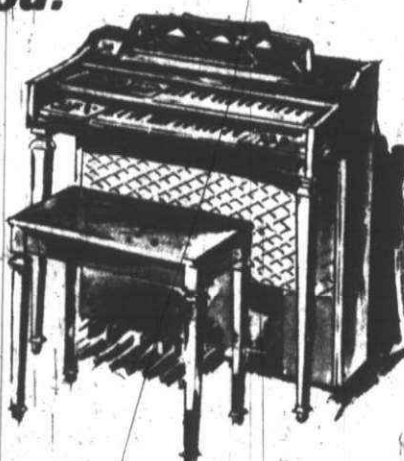


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# Plymouth Rocks crush Harrison, 28-7

The Michigan High School Athletic Association's version of the 1974 state Class A football championship belongs to unbeaten, untied Plymouth Salem as a result of the 28-7 mauling the Rocks gave previously unscarred Farmington Harrison Saturday afternoon.

Jack Cotton, president of the

MHSAA and by coincidence athletic director over all three Farmington high schools, made that clear after personally viewing Plymouth's convincing triumph before a crowd of more than 4,000 — perhaps a third of them from Plymouth — on the Hawk gridiron.

The MHSAA this year instituted a point system of rating teams according to the number of their own vic-

tories and the won-lost records of their opponents. Called the "paper playoffs," it is a prelude to putting into operation — hopefully next season — an actual head-to-head playoff pattern between the four Michigan teams rating highest in points in each class to determine an undisputed state champion.

Plymouth Salem, which has its first

9-0-0 season since 1952 and its first league championship since 1963, tops the 1974 Class A paper standings.

"THERE ARE inequities in the system, but I'm for it," said Cotton in the waning moments at Farmington as a Harrison team that put out to the fullest, all the way found it simply couldn't match the speed of the Suburban Eight titlists from Plymouth.

He added that the MHSAA couldn't do anything else except recognize the rocks as champions under the innovative point system.

Cotton granted that there will be others who are hailed as "opinion," champions perhaps, but added that once the real playoffs go into operation they will have to be accepted as final.

Coach John Herrington, whose Western Six title-holding Hawks finished 8-1 for the season, conceded that the Rocks "were too quick for us."

"Defensively, they jammed us and killed our running game by upsetting our blocking."

His happy counterpart, Coach Tom Moshimer of Plymouth, nurtured his first perfect season in eight years at the Rock helm with delight and told his happy charges in the post-game locker room:

"You're the greatest group of players I've ever coached, and that covers 16 years. You have done everything asked of you in winning them all and you deserve every honor coming to you."

Then, to a man, his team spent a full minute on their knees in personal prayer.

THIS WAS a slam-bang football game in which each team started out believing it could beat the other. If it were to be played again, that attitude would still prevail — for each is a champion.

But Saturday the Rocks had too many horses that were too swift, too durable and who executed the best they had in weeks.

Plymouth started its first scoring drive on its own 11 yard line after a Hawk punt late in the first quarter, capping it with Scott Agnew's eight-yard touchdown dash 1:22 into the second period.

The 89-yard march consumed only nine plays. The first "big" play to shock the Hawks was a 44-yard pass from quarterback Tim Dillon to end Dick Jenkins, who was hauled down by Paul Rogind on the Hawk 45. Moments later Dillon, a wizard on the triple option variations open to a wish-bone quarterback, kept for 22 yards and it was left to Agnew's smashing fullback power to put it in the end zone. Doug Tripp's conversion made it 7-0 which still stood up at halftime.

The closest Harrison could get to scoring in the first two quarters was the Plymouth 48 yard line as the Rock defense lived up to its nickname and proved impregnable. Try as they might, the combined efforts of such stars as quarterback Sam Pink and runners Dave Thorne, Bob Miller and Rogind could net the Hawks only two first downs in the opening 24 minutes.

AN INTERCEPTION of a Pink pass by Dan Ross on the third play of the second half set the stage for Plymouth's second score, and it was this one which started to make believers out of the Farmington troops.

Ross grabbed the aerial at mid-field and returned it to the Hawk 23 where Pink himself made the tackle. Seven plays later, the Rocks were two TDs in front.

It was a drive which saw the return to action of Plymouth's Doug Ward, billed in advance of the season as the Rocks' No. 1 running back but idled since the opening game victory over 8-1 Bloomfield Hills Andover because of a broken arm.

Not only did Ward put the Rocks on Harrison's one yard line with a 12 yard gainer on a pitchout from Dillon, but he then scored from that point. Tripp again converting, to make it 14-0 only 4:25 into the half.

Before the third period ended, Plymouth had made it 21-0.

Recovery of a Hawk fumble put the Rocks on Harrison's 27 and on the very first play Ward took off like a shot around right end on a Dillon pitch to go the distance with only 6:07 of the period elapsed. Again the reliable Tripp kicked the extra point.

After three periods Harrison still had not come any closer to scoring than the Plymouth 48 yard line and still had only two first downs. This was true, however, only because a third quarter clipping penalty had nullified a fine run into Plymouth territory by Rogind, and a pushing penalty had similarly negated a Pink to Craig Valassis pass completion at the Rock 25.

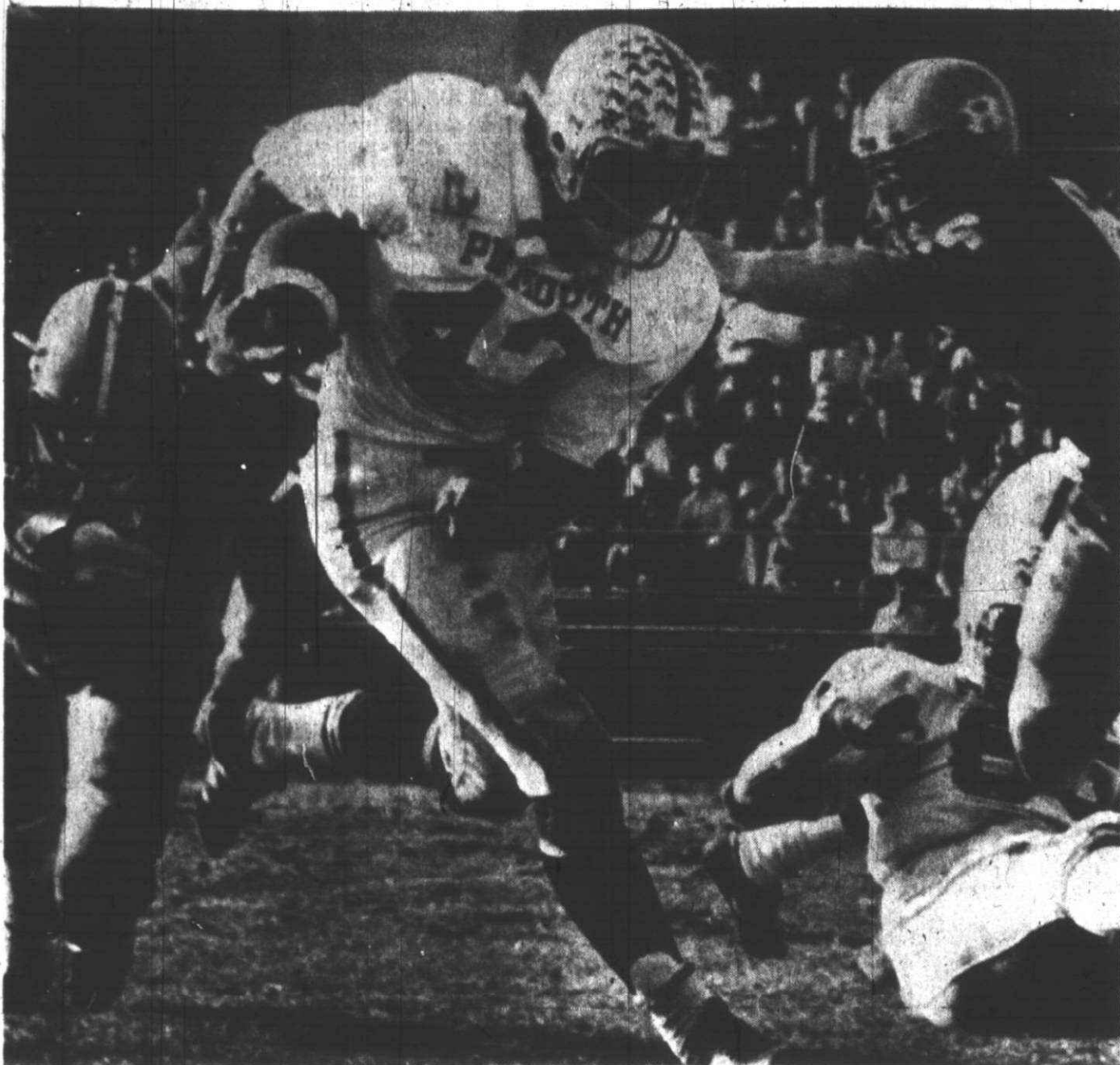
AS SOON AS the last period opened, the Hawks showed the stuff that had carried them to eight successive victories this fall.

The break came when Dillon fumbled Pink's punt when hit by Thorne. Rogind recovering smack dab at the 50.

An interference call against Plymouth moved the Hawks to the Rock 30 and Thorne then drove for 12 to the 18. The 165-pound senior was called on four of the next five carries, finally getting through the obdurate Rock line to the one yard stripe. On fourth down Pink went over on a quarterback sneak to avert a shutout, Rogind converting to make it 21-7.

There still were 5½ minutes to play and the action belonged all to Plymouth which got its final touchdown on a one yard sneak by Dillon with 1:48 left in the game. Tripp's customary conversion made it 28-7.

Even at that, there still was time for Plymouth to recover another Harrison fumble, and at the gun Ward scampered to the Hawk 10 yard line. At that point not even the Rocks cared that they had no chance to go the rest of the way, for their ninth victory in nine starts — and 17th in their last 19 games — was in the bag.

# RU nips Thurston in overtime, 41-40

Bob Atkins' Redford Union grid squad was without a win after nine contests — 36 quarters of football.

It took one overtime period after these 36 quarters to get RU into the win column and that wound up the end result of one of the greatest scoring spectacles ever in Redford Township.

RU NIPPED rival Thurston, 41-40, in overtime.

It was RU's solo-victory of '74 after dropping the first eight contests. For Don Riehl's Thurston Eagles it was another setback in a now finished 2-7 season.

It was also Atkins' fourth win against three losses against his township foes.

"This had to be the greatest spectator game ever," said the RU coach.

"It had about anything and everything you could imagine."

"Everything is usually thrown out the window for this rival game and this one was no exception."

This '74 finale also proved to be the most points ever scored against an Atkins' squad in a single game. The 40 points topped the 34 the Jaguars of Allen Park poured on the RU Panthers back in a '68, 34-19 lashing.

AFTER STOPPING RU on its opening drive, Thurston went right to the scoreboard.

Eagle quarterback Jerry Janssens lofted a 55-yard scoring toss to Brian Garber. Tom Szpond converted and it

was Thurston, 7-0, but just an inkling of things to come.

The Panthers, who had scored only 30 points total in their first eight games, struck back with Craig Barrowcliff hitting Craig Wood for a 15-yard TD play to cap an 81-yard march. George Willard converted and it was a tied clash at seven-all.

A 30-yard dash by Gary Abundis and a two-point conversion by Janssens put Thurston back in front on the following drive, 15-7.

With just 3½ minutes elapsed in the second quarter, RU bounced right back on a 64-yard Barrowcliff to Greg Johnson screen pass for six points. Willard's point after cut it to 15-14.

After a Thurston punt, Barrowcliff finished off a 49-yard drive with a one-yard plunge and the Panthers

were back up, 21-15, after a Willard conversion.

BUT ONCE AGAIN the Northwest Eagles rallied their forces and Janssens passed 12 yards to Dale Klopick to cap a 71-yard march and with 1:28 left in the first half, Szpond converted and it was 22-21 Thurston.

RU proceeded not to say die and took the second half kickoff, marched 51 yards and Mark Cigna carried it in from six yards out and Willard converted to put the Panthers in the lead, 28-22.

The Panthers stopped Thurston on the next drive but then played give-away football. Barrowcliff was hit dropping back to pass, fumbled and Don Teichman picked up the loose ball for Thurston and dashed 50 yards

for six. The kick after missed and it was 28-all.

With 2:06 left, Abundis scored his second touchdown of the evening on a one-yard plunge to finish off a 65-yard drive but again the Eagles missed the conversion to make it a six-point difference at 34-28.

Barrowcliff then took over and hit Hill on passes of 18 and 25 yards and Johnson on a 13 yarder to set up a four yard romp by Cigna for six with just 26 seconds remaining.

A Willard conversion would have all but ended it then, but the Panther kicker, who hadn't really had that much practice this season (RU scoring only four touchdowns in the eight games before this one), missed and it was a 34-all contest and into overtime.

THURSTON won the flip of the coin and went on defense.

On third down, Johnson scored for RU and Willard made good this conversion to make it 41-34.

On a fourth down play, Szpond scored for Thurston and Riehl elected to go for the win. Janssens had a receiver open in the end zone but Willard came through with a diving save and batted the pass down to give RU its first win of '74.

RU finished with 15 first downs and 145 yards on the ground with Barrowcliff hitting on 10 of 20 passes for 225 yards. Thurston collected 11 first downs, rushed for 102 yards and Janssens connected on eight of 15 tosses for 175 yards.

# Churchill upsets lackluster Stevenson, 17-6

One blocked quick kick turned Churchill's 1974 football story from a sober plot into a buoyant finale.

It was Ken Kaestner's Chargers of Churchill High over the Spartans of Stevenson, 17-6, in one of the upsets of the backyard rival neighbor clashes.

The blocked kick that fell into the end zone for a Churchill score with just 1:58 remaining paved the way to the upset with a field goal late in the third quarter and another burst for six in the fourth all but putting the "flat" Spartans away.

"This win just tickled me," commented Kaestner whose squad hadn't scored in 14 quarters prior to the blocked punt. "It has been a tough season for us. Harrison and Franklin simply embarrassed us but I am proud of the way these kids came back for this last one."

CHURCHILL, which wraps up the season 5-4 in the win-loss column, had been shut out three straight weeks by Harrison, 37-0; Northville, 7-0; and Franklin, 35-0.

"The way things had been going for us, we couldn't have scored on the 'sisters of the poor,'" added the Churchill coach. "We simply caught Stevenson flat."

"Our kids knew that if we started out hitting, we could beat them and that's just what we did."

For Stevenson and coach Jack Reardon, this finale had to be a tremendous disappointment in what had every sign of a fantastic year.

"We just came up flat," said Reardon whose Stevenson squad had lost to just state-ranked Franklin and

winds up '74 at 7-2. "I really don't know when we looked so bad."

"I guess the kids just weren't too excited about playing Churchill this year. We really laid a bomb."

"We didn't execute—we lost our poise, it was just a bad way to finish a season."

IT WAS ONLY the second loss for Stevenson in its last 12 games starting back on Oct. 26, 1973, but a sad ending for the Inter-Lake champions who had topped a better Charger squad last year, 9-7.

The first quarter saw Churchill run three plays and punt three times while Stevenson moved to the Charger 31 and 25 on two drives only to fumble one away and have Matt Foster intercept a pass on the other.

Churchill picked up its first first down with about four minutes remaining in the half when Mike Streicher connected with Foster on a 16-yard pass. That, combined with a personal foul, moved the Chargers down to the Stevenson 12.

Foster then twice failed to punch it in and on fourth down and one, Fred Groth was stopped on the two.

Stevenson took over with 3:06 left in the half and on its two.

On a third down play from the three, Reardon called for a quick kick. Paul Lokar seemed to give the play away by standing farther back than normal for a back but, once hauling in a pitch from quarterback Bruce Nichols, ran to the outside before kicking instead of dropping back for additional room.

Churchill's No. 84, John Curran, was there to block it and Scott Shepard picked up the loose ball and danced eight yards to payday.

Foster's conversion missed but the Chargers had a 6-0 lead at the half.

MIKE WELCH stopped Stevenson's first drive of the third quarter by pick-

ing off a Nichols' pass and Foster finished off that 37-yard drive with a 28-yard field goal to make it 9-0, 1:51 left in the third stanza.

Reardon's crew bounced back and

after moving to the Charger seven, John Dixon dropped Nichols back to the 19. And on a fourth down desperation play, Nichols found Joe Centers alone but the Spartan end caught it

out of the end zone.

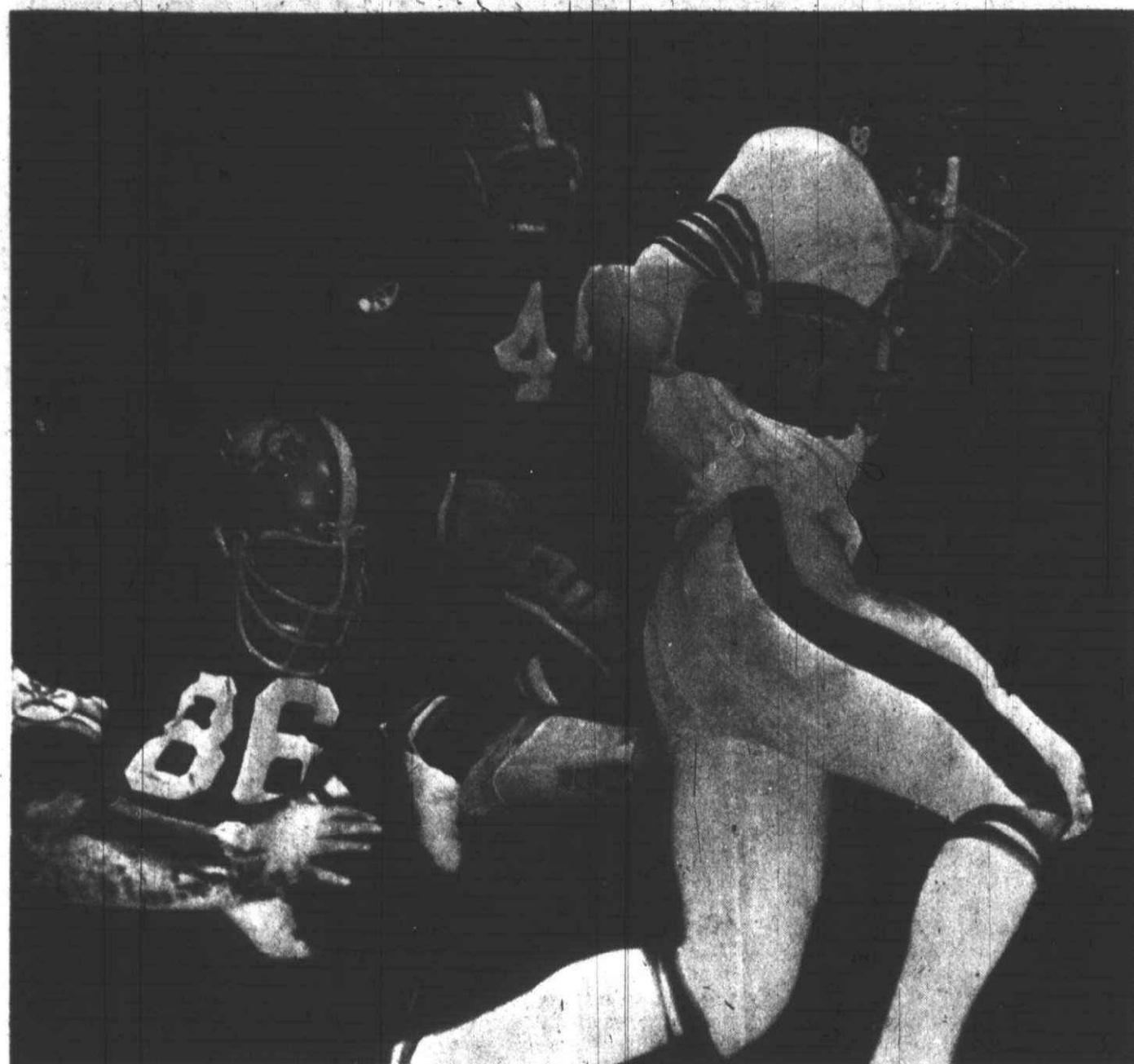
Streicher hit on eight of 16 for 145 yards and a touchdown for Churchill while Nichols connected on eight of 21 for only 75 yards.

# Unbeaten Franklin nips Bentley in overtime

For Coach George Lovich it was a grand finale to a great coaching career even though he thought at times his unbeaten Franklin team was about to run into the Bentley High jinx again.

As it was, the Bulldogs outfought the Franklin Patriots most of the way and certainly deserved a victory. But it was denied by a penalty in an overtime game and the Pats rolled to their ninth straight victory, 17-14.

**CAUGHT BY** a fired-up Bentley squad, Franklin seldom looked the team that marched through competition in the Northwest Suburban Conference and had to fight for its life to come out with a tie in regulation time.

Even then Bentley seemed to have a bit more in the extra period, taking to the air on the third play when Quarterback Bill Deacon fired into the arms of End Mike Robbins in the corner of the end zone for what appeared to be a touchdown.

But such wasn't to be since a Bulldog player was detected holding in the end zone and the touchdown was called back and Bentley penalized 15 yards back to the 25.

The ball went over to Franklin after a fourth down pass missed connections and the Patriots had their turn at scoring.

**THANKS TO** Dan Quinn, a workhorse all evening, Franklin got the job

done. In fact Quinn had the ball on the four plays.

He hit right tackle for four, smashed to the one yard line and then was stopped cold at the center of the line. But Quinn, whose placekicking has aided his team all season, came through with the biggest boot of all when he split the uprights with a placement that gave his team a 17-14 victory.

It must have been a bitter pill for the Bulldogs to swallow when they lined up in the middle of the field to congratulate the victors, but they did it in true Bentley sportsmanship fashion.

**THE GAME** had hardly started when Franklin received a break on the second play. Bruce Boudnek fumbled on the first play from scrimmage and Bob Picard recovered for the Patriots on the Bentley 24.

Quinn and Jim Casey picked up six yards in two thrusts before a Quinn to Sam Williams pass missed connections in the end zone where the latter was wide open. On the fourth play, Quinn took a lateral and sped 18 yards around left end for the touchdown. His placement was good and Franklin was ahead, 7-0, with 10:12 to play.

Bentley took the next kickoff and marched for a score in 14 plays aided by an unusual penalty that gave it possession after a punt when a Franklin player was detected clipping while the ball was in the air.

Boudnek was the big gun in the

drive, carrying the ball on nine of the 14 plays and finally across the goal line for the tying marker with 4:00 remaining in the quarter. Tim Oakley's placement was good and the score stood at 7-7.

The penalty came after Bentley had punted to Franklin on the 22. But the violation took place on the Franklin 35 and the ball went to the Bulldogs at that spot.

Boudnek and Deacon carried it to the 14 in four thrusts. Deacon skirted end for nine and Boudnek took the ball to the three.

Franklin tightened its defense and yielded 2 1/2 yards in three plays before Boudnek smashed through on fourth down for the six points. Oakley converted and it was 7-7.

**BENTLEY** started another drive late in the quarter after taking over on its own 25. Boudnek carried four times and a 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the Franklin 30.

It was trick play on the fourth down that kept the drive going. Glen Stevens dropped back into punt formation but tossed a lefthanded pass to Boudnek who raced 20 yards to the Franklin 30. Deacon followed a wave of blockers around left end for 12 to the 18.

A pass went astray and then Deacon pressed his luck for another aerial that was intercepted by Tim Hollandsworth who returned to the Bentley 48 before being hauled down by Deacon.

Franklin worked the ball down to the Bentley 25 where Quinn tried a field goal but it was wide and the half ended in a 7-7 tie.

**NEITHER CLUB** was able to do much in the third period but things broke wide open in the final stanza.

Early in the fourth period, Bentley had the ball on its own 26 after a punt. Exactly seven plays later the Bulldogs were in front 14-7.

It started when the Patriots were called for roughing the ball carrier and penalized 15 to the Bentley 46. Two plays netted a first down on the Franklin 44. Deacon caught the Franklin sleeping and fired a pass to Dale Allemang for a first down on the Franklin eight.

Boudnek tried left guard for five and Deacon completed the march when he sped through center on a keeper for the six points. Oakley converted again and Bentley had a 14-7 margin with 7:20 showing on the clock.

That left it all to Franklin and the Patriots responded after some brilliant work by Quinn. They had the tying touchdown in 13 plays and Quinn carried on but three.

The payoff came when Quinn slipped and fell on the Bentley six on third down. Downs faded back on the next play and found Rick Varterasian in the end zone for the score. Quinn booted the extra point and it was a tie game with only 1:16 to play.

**THAT SENT** it into overtime with the result reported earlier.

Bentley had an edge in first downs with 16, nine from rushing, three from passes and four on penalties. Franklin had 12, eight on rushes, two on passes and two on penalties.

Quinn was the workhorse for the Patriots with 128 yards in 25 rushes. Boudnek had 21 carries for 84 yards. Thus ends Lovich's coaching career at Franklin with 17 victories in 18 games over two years. He now will devote full attention to his new post of athletic director... and we wonder if he won't have some regrets come the 1975 campaign.

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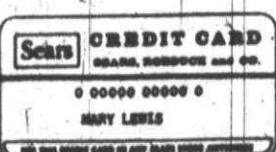
