The Plymouth-Canton area won a gold star on the map Tuesday night, as the Michigan Lottery's Million Dollar Drawing dumped its three top prizes on the community.

Harold and Betty Parker, 1599 Nantucket, Plymouth, reaped the \$1 million jackpot in Grand Rapids when Mrs. Parker's name was pulled from the rich slot.

Moments before, Carl M. Aldridge, Jr., a former Canton Township resident who recently moved to Florida, received second prize of \$100,000. Shirish Sanghvi, an industrial engineer for Burroughs Corp. in Plymouth, reaped a \$50,000 prize.

Two residents from the neighboring community of Westland, Richard Plocharczyk, 39, and William Tatro, 23, were among the 12 finalists and collected \$5,000 each.

THE PARKERS sat in their brick, ranch-style home Wednesday morning and just couldn't believe it.

"We were more excited last night than we are today," admitted Mrs. Parker, 46, an assistant cafeteria manager at Miller Elementary School. "It seemed real when we were in the studio, but it just doesn't seem real today. I just can't believe it."

Her husband, Harold, 44, a metallurgist at General Motors Hydromatic Division at Willow Run, described his feelings as "super."

"Right now I don't have any plans for the money except what I'm doing now," said Parker, who planned to go to work in the afternoon.

Parker said, the money will provide a ready-made scholarship fund for the two youngest Parkers, Jeff, 16, a junior at Plymouth Canton High School, and Sue, 14, an eighth grader at West Middle School. Both hope to attend the University of Michigan after high school graduation.

The two youngest Parkers have already submitted requests for their portions of the money—a new stereo for Jeff and a new wardrobe for Sue—while the family's poodle, Midnight, asked for a new doggie bed.

"Midnight's going to get his new bed," Mrs. Parker laughed. "We missed his birthday a few weeks ago, and I think we owe it to him."

OTHER PLANS include a new car

to replace Mrs. Parker's 1964 model and the possible purchase of a cottage up north.

Other than that, the \$50,000 checks coming in for a 20-year period will not change the family's lifestyle too much.

Parker plans to continue his work at GM, and Mrs. Parker has not yet decided if she will quit her three-year-old job at Miller School. Jeff hopes to obtain a job at McDonald's.

"I don't know if I'll get it, now that

we're millionaires," Jeff said.

His millionaire mother decided she could afford to take Wednesday off work, however.

"I told them I wouldn't be in if we got past the \$10,000 mark," Mrs. Parker laughed. "I haven't decided if I'll quit my job yet, because I really enjoy it. If I do decide to quit, I'll at least finish out this school year."

The whole family journeyed to

School site may be moved

PLYMOUTH—Administrators and board members alike are taking a close look at alternative sites for an elementary school, currently planned for the Windsor Park subdivision in Canton Township.

Architects for the school district received word recently that the Wayne County Road Commission will not approve plans for the school unless a temporary access road is provided to the school site, east of Sheldon and south of Joy.

RESIDENTS of the subdivision have appeared before the board on two occasions to ask it to reconsider an earlier position not to build the temporary road.

The board rejected the temporary road last month, when it was learned cost of the road and a bridge over the Tonquish Creek could cost the district upwards of \$100,000.

School officials and concerned residents were scheduled to meet last night (Wednesday) to discuss possible alternatives to the access problem, which would now direct construction traffic down two residential streets within the subdivision, Fleet and Arlington.

School Supt. John M. Hoben said: "Maybe that site is not suitable for building at this time. The board has to decide where the greatest growth will occur."

Hoben said there are several other

sites within the district on which the new school could be built "and we could justify any of them as viable sites."

"The real question is where and when do we get access to serve the greatest number of students."

ASKED ABOUT possible delays in construction if the site for the school is moved, Hoben said he doubted there would be much delay. "Site plans would have to be altered, but I think we could proceed with the bidding on schedule."

School board trustee George Lawton said construction of the road would be taking away from money that could be spent on the new school. "When voters approved the bond issue last year, they gave us money to build and equip schools, not roads."

Lawton said he would like to see the school on the Windsor Park site, but added: "I would rather move the school to another site before spending \$40,000, \$50,000, or \$60,000 on a temporary road."

According to both Hoben and Lawton, property available for construction of an elementary school include: the Hough site, near Warren and Haggerty; the Maben site, near Maben and Beck; the Centennial Education Park, at the south end of the site off Canton Center and north of Ford; or the Bartlett site, north of Ford between Canton Center and Sheldon.

Planner 'teaches' Canton officials

CANTON—"Townships in Michigan are where the action is and will continue to be and that's why townships

have to be leaders in planning," commented urban planner and Michigan State University professor Robert Hotelling while addressing a joint meeting of the township board and planning commission Tuesday evening.

"More than 90 per cent of the new development in the last few years has occurred in the townships. Four million people have moved to the suburbs since the 1970 census and the primary impact of that has been on the townships," explained Hotelling.

The professor said more than half the population of the state is presently located in the 1,200 townships throughout Michigan and "the economic power and brains in the state are also in the townships."

"PLANNING is for people," commented the professor. "The fundamental concern of the planning process is

Fiery crash leaves one dead

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—An Ypsilanti man was decapitated and burned Monday night, when the Volkswagen he was driving collided head-on with a semi-truck on Ann Arbor Road near Ann Arbor Trail.

Wayne County Sheriff's deputies state that the dead man, James A. Sortor, 22, had apparently tried to pass an eastbound Allied Foods semi-truck, driven by Robert Dear, 46, of Ypsilanti.

Sortor failed to pass the Allied truck and was hit by a westbound Kroger semi driven by Thomas Kern, 34, of Dearborn, shortly after 9:30 p.m.

Both truck drivers escaped injury, suffering only minor scrapes and bruises, according to the sheriff's department.

Shortly after impact, both the Sortor car and the Kroger truck exploded from a rupture of the car's gas tank. According to Plymouth Township Fire

Chief James Gignac, the fire spread to two diesel fuel gas tanks, which ignited a propane gas tank used for refrigeration of the semi.

The propane tank fire spread to the interior of the truck, leaving firefighters working well into the early morning hours to extinguish it.

Traffic on Ann Arbor Road was rerouted for 4½ hours as a result of the accident, while fire and police personnel cleared the wreckage.

Neighboring residents heard the crash and rushed out of their homes to see flames shooting into the sky. Fire covered the roadway on Ann Arbor Road from the point of impact, slightly west of Ann Arbor Trail, to the point where the wreckage came to a halt, 135 feet down the road.

Racing to the scene to see if he could help, Gordon Champion said when he arrived, both vehicles were engulfed in flames. "I could see one person off fire in the VW, but he was obviously dead."

Another nearby resident, William Frazee, said he heard "several explosions" and ran out of his house to see the sky lit up all around him.

Frazee said debris was strewn all along the roadway. "It looked like he could have been going either way," Frazee said in the five years he has lived near the intersection of Ann Arbor Road and Ann Arbor Trail he has seen many accidents, and "quite a few close calls."

Frazee said "A lot of cars and trucks are traveling too fast. We hear wheels squeaking all the time as people come out of the curve (west-bound on Ann Arbor Road)."

Gignac said the accident was the "worst I've seen in Plymouth Township in terms of damage."

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Schools in bind

Inflation erodes state aid

How to convince an already tax-burdened public that school costs are still rising despite declining enrollments is the most troubling problem faced by school superintendents and state legislators.

The problem was reiterated Monday in the Livonia Board of Education offices at a public hearing called by the joint State House and Senate appropriations subcommittee on state school aid. Despite short notice, school officials from Clarenceville, Garden City, Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Washtenaw County and elsewhere packed the room.

The chief problem was that while enrollments are declining, fixed costs—heat, light, maintenance—are not. On top of that, there are problems of personnel contracts, state mandated programs and just plain inflation.

Conducting the hearing were Sen. Dale Kildee (D-Flint) and Rep. James O'Neill Jr. (D-Saginaw), co-chairmen; Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth); Sen. Joseph Young (D-Detroit); Rep. Richard Young (D-Dearborn Heights); and three fiscal analysts, including former State Rep. Clifford Smart. Also at the hearing was Rep. John Markes (D-Westland).

AT ISSUE was Gov. Milliken's recommendation for \$844 million in state aid for fiscal 1975-76 and how to divide it for local school needs.

State aid for the past three years under the so-called Bursley Bill has attempted to equalize taxing ability and at the same time provide a local taxing incentive of a matching grant method of state aid. This means that every school district with a specified state equalized valuation (SEV), retaining the same level of tax effort, will have the same number of dollars per pupil to spend.

The current formula provides a maximum per pupil allowance of \$975 equalized at \$39,000 SEV per student with a deductible millage rate of 25 mills.

For 1975-76 the governor has proposed the maximum per pupil allowance be increased to \$1,120.50 providing equalization at \$41,500 SEV with a deductible millage rate of 27 mills—an increase of about five per cent.

Milliken's proposal strictly curtails provisions of the Bursley Bill, which would have allowed an unlimited amount of local millage for the upcoming year.

"We saw the Bursley Bill as a promise, and now we're not getting the promise," said David McDowell, Clarenceville superintendent.

A PROMISE denied was the least of the superintendents' problems; they now face backing out of their budgets while meeting the costs of personnel contracts, state mandated programs and inflation.

TESTIFYING FIRST, Dr. George Garver, Livonia superintendent, addressed three of the most commonly felt problems: declining enrollment, categorical state funding and mandatory programs.

"It is impossible for a school district to immediately recover the total per capita costs for each student when there is a decline of enrollment," he said.

"As an alternative suggestion to our current philosophy, I would offer for your consideration the premise that school districts should be allowed to use, for purposes of student count, the enrollment of their current year, or the enrollment of the previous school year, whichever is higher. This concept will allow school districts one year's lead time to make adjustments in their operation when there is a decline of enrollment," he said.

Ronald Wyszynski, Garden City administrative assistant, suggested the state might use a figure of 98 per cent of the previous year's enrollment to handle the problem of declining membership. To handle the decline in just one year would be "monumental," he said.

Wyszynski stressed that despite declining numbers of students, overhead and fixed charges do not decline.

ON CATEGORICAL funding, direct state reimbursements for specified programs such as reading and drivers' training, Garver said: "I would also like to take this opportunity to personally endorse the concept of expanded categorical state funding. This position is a complete reversal from one I held a few years ago. My point is motivated by the fact that we have seen school programs reduced substantially over the last few years in

order to allow districts to meet the financial demands of the collective bargaining process.

"Categorical aid stipulates that a district must operate a given program in order to receive state reimbursement for that activity. This means that a district would incur little or no advantage to dismantle a given activity, for if that program were discontinued, the district would not receive that financial assistance."

Categorical funding also helps educators look at other areas than they normally might assess in determining the educational program for youngsters, Garver added.

ON MANDATORY programs, the Livonia superintendent said: "We have seen a proliferation of many activities which are state mandated with little, or no, additional revenue channeled to the district to assist the district to implement these new directives. These directives flow both from legislative mandate and actions of the State Department of Education or the State Board of Education."

Several of the mandates and the problems they pose, Garver said are:

• Unemployment compensation: school districts will incur a potential liability when they attempt to reduce staff as enrollment declines. The appropriateness of unemployment compensation is not in question.

• Employment placement service for students: An unfunded act which further erodes local autonomy and which remains untouched even if other programs are reduced; also a duplication of the Michigan Employment Security Commission's effort.

• Mandatory Special Education Act: While these children deserve every benefit, if a district must eliminate programs for other children because of a lack of funding and maintain special ed programs under law, this concept "certainly does not guarantee equality of educational opportunity."

NICK A. IANNI, superintendent of

Washtenaw County Intermediate School District, said: "Some programs in special education run up to \$4,000 per student. But I say you have to compare that to the cost of between \$7,000 and \$8,000 per student for institutionalization. We've made a commitment, and we shouldn't haggle about the cost factor."

"The big thing is that the program is not funded and will cost \$25 million, with \$8 million of that coming from mental health funds. If that kind of money is not forthcoming every school district is going to take a bath, a good bath, and the money will come out of the general operating budget."

Other areas Ianni identified as difficult were the cooperative education fund and regional educational media centers.

SPECIAL EDUCATION poses stringent problems for the Northville School District, according to its superintendent, Raymond Spear. Because six state treatment centers are located in the district, it is conceivable that up to 1,100 additional youngsters from the centers may have to be educated by the district. While the cost of educating these youths is borne by their parents' home districts, the cost of educating those over the age of 18 falls to Northville.

"In August 1974 Wayne County voters OK'd one mill for special education, and they probably did this without thinking they would have to pay for institutionalized kids. We have to use the money for a job beyond what the millage was approved for," Spear said.

WHILE PLYMOUTH Community School District does not face declining enrollment, its other costs have gone up, and it faces the loss of student count from the Detroit House of Correction where it conducts educational programs.

John Hoben, Plymouth superintendent, also stressed the need for continuing reading support services. "Our

reading program is excellent, and in the third year it is still showing significant progress. If we lose the program we will have to pick up 17 staff members and integrate them into the regular program."

Backing up Hoben, Shirley Spaniel, principal of Plymouth's Miller Elementary School and a former reading specialist, said: "If any special funding affects the lives of boys and girls more than reading, I'd be surprised... We stand to lose very good programs if we lose the funding."

THE MATTER of funding came under scrutiny from Barbara Sowers, president of the Livonia Education Association. She said: "The house a person lives in is not a good yardstick to measure one's wealth. The property tax does not tax true income or wealth. Thus, this tax is not an equitable way to finance the education of children."

She also took a Senate bill to freeze property values to task and asked the subcommittee to consider abolishing the limit on the millage rate used in the Bursley Bill.

"One problem in the Legislature is that there are limitless needs and limited resources," said Kildee. "When we reach the limit, we look for alternatives... Whenever we face an agonizing decision, any expression of support is helpful," referring to the 7/10ths of a per cent additional income tax already passed by the House and now awaiting a Senate vote.

McDowell said the Clarenceville board has informally supported the additional tax, as has the Livonia Education Association, according to Miss Sowers.

Pursell said the subcommittee will conduct four more hearings statewide and will probably work through the summer on the state aid appropriation.

"This is the most iffy budget presented to the appropriations committee," Kildee, an 11-year veteran, said. "Of course this is the most iffy economy."

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CEP band gets invite from the governor

Michigan's most prestigious accolade for a high school musical organization — a command to perform for

the personal enjoyment of the governor — has come to Plymouth's Centennial Educational Park Symphony Band.

However, Gov. William Milliken isn't stingy; the concert he commanded in a personal letter to Bandmaster

James R. Griffith stipulates that it be presented in the 10,000-seat Lansing Civic Center.

Curtain time will be 8 p.m., Wednesday, April 30, and the concert will be heard without charge to all who can crowd into the Lansing auditorium.

Known as the annual "Governor's Concert," this evidence of increasing emphasis on the arts under the Milliken administration was conveyed to the band Tuesday by a three-man governor's delegation as the talented musicians of Plymouth-Salem and Plymouth-Canton High Schools were about to begin a routine rehearsal.

BEARING THE good tidings were Bruce Galbraith, managing secretary of the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association; Frank Mills, chairman of the Governor's Concert executive committee, and Craig Hodnett, also a member of the executive committee.

Griffith knew in advance what was coming, but the nearly 90 young men and women of the band did not. However, presence of Board of Education President E. W. McClendon, Supt. John M. Hoben, Deputy Supt. Earl Hogan, and Salem Principal Bill Brown indicated more was afoot than

just the presentation of another plaque.

"You will represent all the high school bands of Michigan in this concert for Gov. Milliken, his wife and family," said Galbraith as he addressed the band. "Plymouth is known across the entire country for its outstanding music, and we're happy with this selection."

It was Mills who read aloud the personal letter to Griffith from the governor:

"I am most pleased to extend congratulations to you and members of the Plymouth Centennial Park Symphony Band on being selected as winner of the third annual Governor's Concert."

"Hard work, competition and final success are stimulating and very satisfying experiences, and this recognition is one of which each of you can be justifiably proud."

"I am sure the talent you display in your command performance at the Lansing Civic Center on April 30 will bring pleasure to all and attest to your outstanding musical skill."

"Kind personal regards."

"Sincerely,

"William G. Milliken, Governor."

THE DAY-LONG, association-financed experience will include luncheon en route to Lansing, followed by a rehearsal session in the Civic Center prior to introduction of the band to the State Senate and House of Representatives in the State Capitol later in the afternoon.

Following that will be a banquet in the band's honor at the Civic Center at which time each member will receive a special recognition medal from the governor. Other state dignitaries also will attend, and Plymouthites also will be welcome — with the charge for this particular function as it pertains to parents, family members and citizens to be announced later.

Supt. Hoben, extending congratulations to Griffith and the band on behalf of the entire school district, likened the band's accomplishments to the championships attained in football and basketball — calling it "a fantastic year for Plymouth."

Previous recipients of the Governor's Concert honor have been Saginaw and Ann Arbor. Detailed specifics of the April 30 schedule will be announced by Griffith as they become available.

W-W schools seek CETA job funds

WESTLAND — The Wayne-Westland School District may get federal money under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA).

That's the word brought back by Supt. Timothy Dyer after testifying before the U.S. House Subcommittee on Manpower, Compensation and Health and Safety this week.

Purpose of the testimony was to encourage the subcommittee, and subsequently Congress, to include schools as prime agents to carry out Title VI of CETA, said Dyer.

Dyer says that school districts in the Midwest have been excluded from receiving CETA funds because of a differing ways districts are run throughout the country. In many eastern states, city governments and school districts are linked, therefore the money gets to schools. In Michigan, school districts and municipalities are separate governmental units.

"It is difficult to draft legislation for the differing systems," said Dyer. "But, schools are ideally suited for providing jobs for the unemployed."

WHILE THE Wayne-Westland district employs more than 2,400 persons from 45 communities, and could employ more with the funding, the city halls are complaining they can't think of anymore jobs to create, he said.

"The extension of this emergency job program is important to the economic health of our district and is vital to industrial states like Michigan," Dyer told the subcommittee.

"My concern is that the Title VI Emergency Jobs Program funds are not regularly making their way into our school district. In terms of cost effectiveness, this appears to be unfortunate because we have available human and material resources and are organized and ready to give guidance, training and placement."

MSU awards degrees to 3 from Plymouth

PLYMOUTH—Three Michigan State students from Plymouth received bachelor degrees at winter term commencement ceremonies.

Bachelor of science degrees were awarded to Caryl A. Davis, 11696 Russell, in criminal justice; and Richard M. Goepf, 9475 Canton Center, in animal husbandry.

Vicky J. Stoyanoff, 11300 Aspen, received a bachelor of arts degree in communications.

Because of programs in which the district is involved, it is suited for training and retraining employees. Three areas for training stressed by Dyer were paraprofessional aids for educable mentally impaired, for training orthopedic and physically handicapped and for assisting with transporting special education youngsters to and from school.

"We are proud that we can provide quality education for these special people," said Dyer. "Obviously, it takes many hands to work with the youth who have special problems. In many instances, paraprofessional staff can be trained on-the-job to assist in special education."

Ten positions were allocated for paraprofessional aids for educable mentally impaired programs in 1974-75 but weren't filled because of lack of funds, said Dyer. These positions, he said, could lead to entry into paraprofessional field.

"The McGrath Special education facility located in conjunction with the Roosevelt Elementary School is one of the finest facilities for the physically handicapped in the state. Training in this program would lead to entry into similar positions either in Wayne-Westland or surrounding districts."

The needs for aides to supervise handicapped students could also be fulfilled by using CETA funds, he said.

"We have the local capabilities for guidance, on-the-job training and placement in continuing work situations. Wayne-Westland Schools operate a continuing education program for adults, vocational and technical programs for in-and-out-of school populations, cooperative programs with business and industry and job placement."

BECAUSE THE DISTRICT has adopted the philosophy of "Life Long Learning," it provides programs from pre-school through senior citizen. This requires additional funding, he says, but fills an important void.

"Because only 35 per cent of our graduates continue their education beyond high school, our program is also geared to provide for students seeking a salable skill for the job market upon graduation."

Areas cited by Dyer in which the district has facilities for training persons for future employment were education aides, technicians, clerical and secretarial, service and skilled workers, unskilled labor and student jobs.

Dyer also pointed to the many industrial and commercial firms in the area which provide employment opportunities for persons trained in the district.

Area communities hit by big assessment hikes

Property owners in the City of Plymouth and Plymouth and Canton townships are not vehemently opposing rises in 1975 property assessments this year, if the numbers at board of review sessions are indicative of concern.

Although tentative equalization factors for the municipalities indicate a six to 12 per cent rise in 1975 figures and a subsequent jump in taxation, the same or fewer number of residents are casting complaints before their boards of review this year, according to reports of local officials.

The Wayne County Bureau of Taxation has assigned tentative equalization factors to all communities in the county. The factors pull property assessment and equalization figures, used to compute municipal, school and county taxes, to 50 per cent of actual market value.

INFLATION has pushed market values upwards in most areas of the county, according to a sales study spanning a three-year period, said Clarence Hicks, director of the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation. The equalization factors compensate for the in-

flationary rise, and push property assessment figures upwards.

The highest tentative equalization factor applied to local communities this year is a 1.12 factor, pushing property assessments in Plymouth Township up 12 per cent.

That means the county equalized value of a house in Plymouth Township, assessed at \$20,000 in 1974 with an attached 1.12 equalization factor, is \$22,400, reflecting an increase in market value from \$40,000 to \$44,800.

If the township's millage remains at the 1974 rate of 49.42 mills (\$49.42 per \$1,000 of state equalized value) for township, county and school taxes, that homeowner would see an increase in his tax bill of \$118.60, from the 1974 rate of \$988.40 to the 1975 figure of \$1,107.

Property owners who have made structural improvements also will find an assessment increase, based on the market value of the addition, which will push their tax bills upwards.

THE WAYNE COUNTY Board of Commissioners will review the tentative equalization factors, recommended by the county taxation bureau, on April 23. If the factors are approved,

1974 property assessment figures plus 1975 equalization factors will total the county equalized value of a piece of property.

The State Board of Equalization will scrutinize county equalized values in May to insure that all property within the state is assessed on an equitable basis. County equalized values will then become state equalized valuations.

According to Hicks, Plymouth Township's tentative equalization factor is high this year, because values have not been reassessed for four years.

The same is true of Canton Township, where the county taxation bureau has proposed a tentative equalization factor of 1.07, pushing property assessments up seven per cent, Hicks said.

The taxation bureau had originally proposed a tentative equalization factor of 1.09 for Canton, Hicks said, but reduced the figure, when township officials agreed to impose an additional five per cent increase in assessed valuations on commercial property.

"THERE WAS clear indication that commercial property was under-assessed in relation to residential and agricultural property," Hicks explained.

The seven per cent equalization factor means the county equalized value of a house in Canton Township, assessed at \$20,000 in 1974 would jump to \$21,400, reflecting an increase in market value from \$40,000 to \$42,800.

At the current millage rate of 51.17 (\$51.17 per \$1,000 of state equalized value) for township residents living in the Plymouth Community School District, that means a jump of \$71.63 for 1975 taxes from the current rate of \$1,023.40 to \$1,095.03.

Residents living in the Wayne-Westland School District would see a slightly higher tax increase, since the current millage in that area is pegged at 58.54 mills (\$58.54 per \$1,000 of state equalized value).

The tentative equalization factor for the City of Plymouth, pegged at 1.06, is lower, Hicks explained, since property in the city was reassessed two years ago.

Using the same example of a house assessed at \$20,000 in 1974, the equalization factor means a \$1,200 increase in the county equalized value of the property. At the current tax rate of 61.62 mills (\$61.62 per \$1,000 of state equalized value), that means a tax

bill hike of \$73.94 from the current rate of \$1,232.40 to \$1,306.34.

DESPITE THE equalization factors which would result in higher tax bills, no more residents complained of their assessments this year before boards of review in all three communities than in previous years.

According to Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren, only about 50 residents have complained in board of review meetings held so far.

"We don't have as many complaints as last year," McLaren said. "Maybe people don't understand what a 1.12 equalization factor means."

The township board of review will hold as many meetings as needed to accommodate complaints, McLaren said. No adjustments in assessment rolls have yet been made.

All persons, whose property is marked for assessment increases because of structural improvements, were notified of the assessment change, he said.

About 130 Canton Township residents appeared before the board of review last week, according to chairman Phil Dingeldey. About the same number complained last year, when the township's equalization factor was one.

"WE COULDN'T give some people answers," Dingeldey said, "and we told them we'd review their problems."

City Assessor Kenneth Way called this year's board of review sessions in the City of Plymouth "routine" and "nothing unusual." The last session was held Monday night.

The board of review made some adjustments in taxpayers' assessment rolls, Way said, but added that adjustments were nothing "unusual."

"We had about 45 people show up in all," Way said. "We usually have about 35."

According to law, municipalities must turn over their assessment rolls to the county taxation bureau by Monday, April 7. The assessment rolls total the assessed valuation of all real (immovable) and personal (movable) property within the community.

Once approved by the county and the state, the figure becomes the state equalized value of each community.

Local state equalized values for 1974 are \$177.3 million for Plymouth Township, \$141.7 million for Canton Township and \$81.5 million for the City of Plymouth.

Parisi removed from MTA post

LANSING—Joseph Parisi, who had served as executive director of the

Michigan Townships Association for 18 years, has been removed from office by the association's board of directors.

Members of the board would not comment as to whether Parisi's removal was for wrongdoing while in office. The board simply stated that the change was "due to the extended nature of his illness, the uncertainty of his return in the future and various other reasons."

The association membership would not explain the "various other reasons" for dismissing Parisi, who had been hospitalized until a few days ago.

ROBERT R. ROBINSON, who had served as acting executive director was appointed executive director by the executive committee of the board.

Parisi, 58, a resident of Kalamazoo, had suffered a heart attack in October 1973 and re-entered the hospital in

January of this year for a "re-evaluation of his condition," according to Robinson.

Thelma Spencer, Avon Township clerk and secretary of the townships association, concurred that the removal was "basically for health reasons."

Roy G. Lord, president of the 42-member board of directors, also agreed that the dismissal was for reasons of health.

Mary Lou Carey, Huron Township clerk, said that the board did not feel the "other reasons" need be made public. However, Robinson has indicated that more information regarding Parisi's removal may be forthcoming.

The decision to remove Parisi came at a Feb. 21 board meeting but was not announced until March 14.

The Michigan Townships Association was founded in 1953 "to strengthen township government, to educate township officials and to engage in lobby-

ing activities," according to Robinson.

Parisi was named executive director in 1957, but had served with the association since it was founded.

Robinson had been deputy executive director.

to serve the people, now and in the future. We must recognize the economic realities of the world and work around them.

"Our objective as planners is to make a more livable and enjoyable environment for people—all people across the board. That means we should provide housing for people of all incomes, not just the upper 10 per cent."

Hotaling said that planning, while based on facts, is a judgmental process. He commented, "There is great confusion among the experts. It's no secret that there is no unanimity among planners. The numerous court cases we have will attest to that. Planning is still a young tool, less than 50 years old, and it will take time before it becomes institutionalized. The first zoning laws weren't introduced until 1926."

The professor added that good planning is a balance between meeting the needs of the people and making the environment more convenient, and ecological concerns. A second balance, that between no zoning ordinances at all and "exclusionary zoning" must also be reached, he commented.

"TO PLAN for a community like Canton, you have to get the facts first—the facts about the people and the economy. You look at the history of the area and the landmarks and you evaluate all the relevant facts. From that you get the 'personality' of a township and you work from there." From that you can get a good master plan. But you must constantly update

your facts and constantly re-evaluate the situation. Planning is a dynamic process."

A third balance, between the public and private sectors, is also necessary, commented the professor. Good planning, he added, demands that an equilibrium between the individual's needs and the requirements of society for social services must be met.

Zeroing in on the specifics of Canton, Hotaling said, "I have looked at the data for Canton and it is one of the fastest growing areas in the state. I foresee industrial and commercial corridors along Haggerty, next to I-275, along Ford road and along the old Chicago Road corridor (Michigan Avenue).

"THE FUTURE depends, on the whole area, however, the economic picture for Detroit, Livonia Westland, Plymouth and Van Buren. It depends on the job opportunities and the general condition of the West side of Detroit." Planning is not just a local concern, it must be integrated into the area, regional and national picture."

Commenting on the need for a stronger tax base, Hotaling declared, "Make industry pay for itself. Any project you attract here should pay for itself. Sell the good locations Canton offers, but make sure you don't give too big a break to industry." The professor pointed to the lesson of the south where municipalities built plants for industrial concerns and granted tax breaks, only to find industry leaving when the tax breaks ended.

THE PROFESSOR said that township officials must make an effort to see that growth is orderly. "Devel-

opment often goes in leaps and bounds, leaving open spaces in between that cannot be or are not developed. There is still land in the eastern part of the township that can be developed."

He added, "One of the primary reasons for premature ripening of land is the real estate tax system. Comparable assessments on neighboring properties often force farmers to sell their land for development too early."

As for PUDs, the noted planner said, "They are a good tool if used properly. As long as they satisfy the land use requirements and fit the master plan they can be good. PUD agreements can be made most favorable for townships."

Body discovered in Fowler Creek

CANTON—The badly decomposed body of a Detroit man was found March 16 floating in Fowler Creek, half a mile from the intersection of Geddes and Denton roads in the southwest portion of Canton Township.

Canton resident Danny Mullins, 14, and an older friend Gabel Ratliff, spotted the body hung up on barbed wire in the stream behind the Mullins' residence early Sunday afternoon.

State police from the Ypsilanti post were called and they reported the

dead man had been tentatively identified as Johnny Eugene Haynes, 24, of Euclid Avenue.

Spokesman for the police said Haynes had died from a bullet wound to the head.

Police hypothesize that Haynes had been dumped into the stream near the intersection of Geddes and Denton and had drifted for some time before being discovered.

Detectives say no motive has been established for the apparent slaying.

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How to best use the teas, herbs that heal



Whether or not your great-grandma was a witch, chances are she grew and gathered herbs to dry for teas to soothe the body and comfort the spirit.

Today many are discovering the healing and comforting effects of these long-forgotten teas. Health food stores are springing up in almost every neighborhood, and even the huge supermarket chains are beginning to stock the better known teas such as rose hip, chamomile, peppermint and jasmine.

Tea bags are handy, but the ritual of brewing a pot of herbal tea seems, in itself, to have a soothing psychological effect and make the drinking of that tea even more enjoyable.

TEA MADE from leaves or flowers should be brewed in a teapot, using one teaspoon of tea leaves or blossoms to each cup of boiling water, plus one extra teaspoon. Thus, for four cups of tea, use five teaspoons of tea leaves; for five cups, six teaspoons, etc. Place the leaves in the pot and cover with boiling water. Allow the brew to steep several minutes before pouring.

To make tea from roots, berries or bark, use the same proportions, but prepare the brew by placing the tea in the boiling water and then simmering three to five minutes over a low flame before pouring it into the pot.

In either case, the teapot should always be warmed ahead of time by rinsing it with very hot water.

Some people like to sweeten their tea with honey. This often helps one to sleep better, since it causes the body to retain liquid. Do not use honey if you are using the tea for a diuretic or you will defeat your purpose.

HERE ARE a few interesting herbal teas and their traditional uses. You may like to try some of these, for any or all may be enjoyed for their flavor alone.

Anise—made by pouring boiling water over anise seed. It is said to relieve colic, expel gas and stimulate passion. It has a most delightful flavor; children love it.

Cinnamon—made by simmering cinnamon sticks in boiling water. It is believed to have a domesticating effect on those who drink it.

Dandelion—made from the roasted

roots of the dandelion plant. It's a great substitute for coffee. Most people can't detect the difference in the taste, and it is hailed by many as a stomach tonic.

Juniper berry—very tasty and has a mild diuretic effect.

Red clover—a delicious tea that is said to have a calming effect on the nerves. In the past, it was used to restore mental health.

Sage—tastes terrible but is believed to have an aphrodisiac effect and cure impotency when drunk regularly.

Juniper, chrysanthemum—both fine teas to serve to a member of the opposite sex in a romantic setting, for they are said to inspire love.

Valerian—made from valerian roots and is a strong cathartic. It is also said to heighten one's awareness and sharpen one's psychic powers. I

wouldn't know because it smells like dirty socks, and I've never been quite able to get up the courage to taste it.

Hibiscus—made from the blossoms of the African red hibiscus. It's a ruby red color and tastes like fine wine. It's delicious hot or cold, sweet-

ened or plain, and is known the world over as "the drink of good health."

Other points to consider for bicentennial

Several weeks ago The Stroller suggested that one of the better things to do next year to help celebrate the country's bi-centennial was to arrange a trip to Philadelphia and spend a few hours visiting such places as Independence Hall, where the Continental Congress met and where the Liberty Bell is on display. He also suggested that some time be spent at the Betsy Ross

home to live again the moments when she made the first American flag. And to go from there to Old Christ Church and sit in the same pew to worship in which George Washington sat during the trying days of our country's birth.

The Stroller went a step further. He suggested the senior classes in our schools switch their annual trip from

Washington D.C. where many of them go to study the nation's capital, to Philadelphia where they can see firsthand where the country was born and enjoy a visit that would live with them for the remainder of their lives.

Since then The Stroller has been asked by well meaning folks in the suburban areas for some other suggestions that wouldn't involve travel and

much expense in these days of unstable economy.

"What can we do right here at home?" many of them ask and then add, "We'd like to make a real contribution to the celebration and do something that would be a permanent reminder of this stage of our history."

Well, that's quite a question. But there are a great many things that

can be done and The Stroller always is willing to help.

Let's start by getting pictures of our main buildings as they are today—buildings that may be razed in the years to come to make way for progress—and thus provide a foundation from which future committees can work.

One of the prized historical pieces

in Plymouth, for instance, is the picture of the intersection of Main Street and Penniman Ave., taken in 1924, that is now hanging in the historical museum. This should be a must to see when the museum is opened. There are few such links of the past available.

Then there is the need to preserve some of the old buildings that have played a part in the early days of your community. The City of Livonia has a committee working on such a project—and it is certain to be worthwhile.

There isn't a community that doesn't have something that should serve as a link. The first city hall in Livonia is a fine example. Situated across from the present city hall, it is a one story brick building now used as an aid center. But it once housed the offices of the mayor, city clerk, city treasurer, the water department and a branch of the fire department along with serving as council chambers. No one building ever has served so many purposes at the same time.

In Plymouth, every effort should be made to preserve the building where the Daisy Air Rifle was made. The building now used by the D.S.I. is invaluable as a historical site. There are others. Every community has something about which it can boast as a link with the past. These all should be preserved. More than that, all the old pictures available should be gathered and preserved so that each community can take pride in its heritage and thus become part of the master celebration. As an example, why shouldn't the Hough family and the Hamiltons be remembered for all time. They spread the name Plymouth around the world through the manufacture of air rifles. Coming generations should be able to know them and some of the other "giants" who made the area possible. How about some of the old schools, some of the old teachers, and some of the well remembered officials. They should all be remembered in a Hall of Fame.

Too many of us are prone to forget those who made things possible and we take for granted the places and the people who went before us. Remembering them would enable you to take pride in your community and this combined show of pride and respect for the past would be part of the whole that would make the bicentennial one of which every citizen could well be proud.

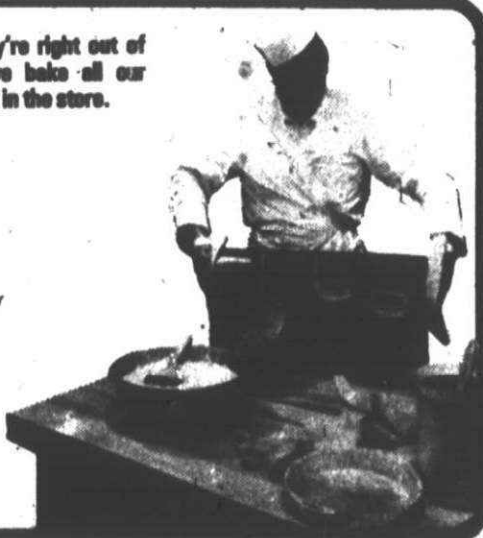
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Society must change values, exhorts Dr. Salk

"We only have one billion more years in which to adjust from an either intellectual or intuitive society to a society in which both intellect and intuition are present," said Jonas Salk, MD, developer of the first effective polio vaccine.

Speaking at the recent Second Annual Life Sciences Convocation for High School and College Students, Dr. Salk presented his views on the present condition of the human race and his work at the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in LaJolla, Calif.

The convocation was sponsored by the Metropolitan Chapter of the March of Dimes.

HIS MAJOR point dealt with the present condition of society.

Esch bill would speed up hiring in public sector

Legislation has been introduced by U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) which, if adopted, would speed up and increase the hiring of the unemployed in public service jobs.

The bill is also intended to resolve bureaucratic delays that have prevented hiring under the Public Service Jobs program, explains Esch whose 2nd District includes Livonia, Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

THE BILL extends the Emergency Public Jobs program authorized under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) through June, 1977 and provides unlimited authorizations to allow Congress to appropriate dollars needed for jobs without having to wait for time-consuming authorizing legislation.

"It is clear the need has arisen and that the \$2.5 billion appropriated thus far will not be enough to make much of a dent in the nation's unemployment rate," says Esch.

AMONG provisions of the legislation are:

- Extend unemployment insurance benefits to employees not covered under existing state laws by 13 weeks, for a total of 39.
- Allow funds for the first time to be contracted out by localities for labor intensive capital construction as long as 80 per cent of those on the job have been previously unemployed.
- Funds may be used for equipment and material needed for employment of public service employees.
- Extend the law to prevent localities from having to suddenly lay off thousands of employees when CETA expires in 1976.

The council is the anti-crime agency which approves all applications for federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) grants originating within the county. Since its inception in 1971, the council has distributed \$41 million to the county and 43 communities within Wayne County.

State regulates trout fishing

The state has acted to prevent "slaughtering" of hatchery-reared trout on the Huron River below Proud Lake.



Trout stocked there have been easy to catch, and some fishermen, unfortunately, have made pigs of themselves by catching their limits of five two or three times in a single day.

At the urging of local fishermen, the Natural Resources Commission has imposed these regulations on trout fishing on the Huron River from Moss Lake to the Milford Millpond, a stretch of three miles on either side of Wixom Road in the Proud Lake State Recreation Area:

•April 1-May 31—Artificial flies only, catch and release; no fish may be kept.

•June 1-30—Artificial flies and lures, two 10-inch or larger trout per day.

Normal statewide regulations would apply after the first of July.

The new rules will mean a drastic reduction in the number of fish that may be taken before July 1, and it will be tougher for fishermen to catch 'em, on flies.

But a small, relatively clear stream like the Huron doesn't give fish as much maneuvering room as a large lake does. Without these rules, puritanical as they seem to us common worm anglers, the trout will get slaughtered. It seems to be the price we'll have to pay.

TROUT AREN'T the sole property of the northern reaches of the state. A number of southeastern Michigan streams have been stocked with the king of the sport fish, and the DNR has designated these as official trout streams:

OAKLAND COUNTY: Kearsley Creek from Lake Louise to the county line; Duck Creek, the entire tributary to Kearsley Creek; Highbanks Creek, entire tributary to Kearsley Creek; Paint Creek, from Lake Orion dam to Rochester; Trout Creek, from the dam in the Bald Mountain State Recreation Area to Paint Creek; Gallagher Creek, entire tributary to Paint Creek; and the Huron River from Moss Lake to the Milford Millpond.

MACOMB COUNTY: East Pond Creek from East Millpond (Eldred Road) downstream; and the North Branch of the Clinton River upstream from 27 Mile Road.

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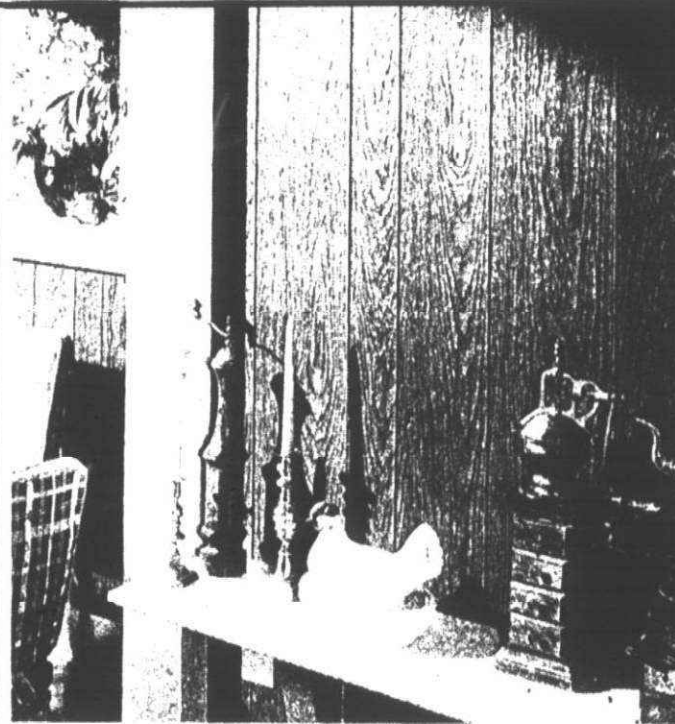
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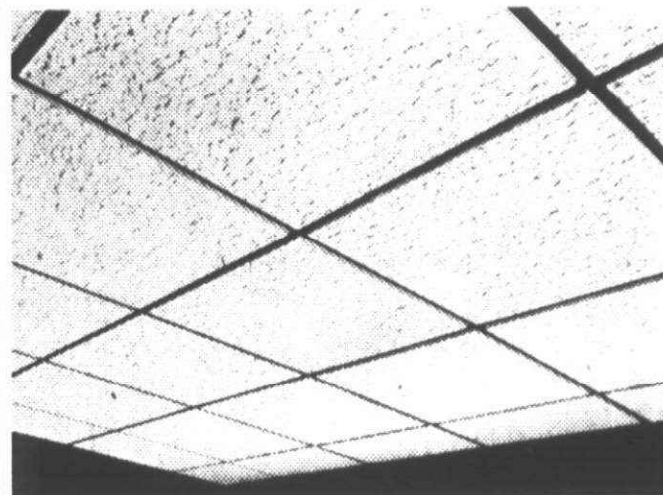
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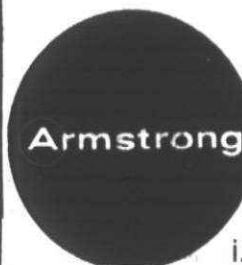
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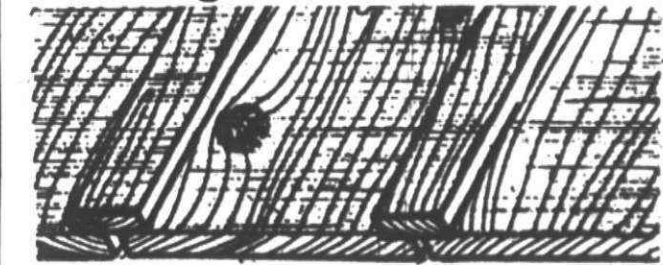
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EMU opens new center for consumers

A \$14,238 grant from the National Bank of Detroit will be used to establish a satellite of Eastern Michigan University's Consumer Education Center at Wayne State University in order to extend consumer education services in the Detroit area.

Wayne's Family and Consumer Resources faculty, directed by department chairman Mary Jane Bostick, will serve as advisor to the project, expected to be in operation March 1.

Susan Klein, a graduate assistant, will staff the center, whose hours will be 2-7 p.m., Monday through Friday, in WSU Purdy Library.

The center will give in-service training to Wayne County teachers through workshops, conferences and special courses. It also will provide consulting services to schools, colleges, community organizations, consumer groups and senior citizen organizations.

Other services provided at the WSU center will include consumer information services including textbooks, curriculum guides and other printed and audio-visual materials.

Mrs. Rosella Bannister, director of the EMU center, emphasized that consumer competence is not an automatic talent, it must be learned.

NBD second vice-president Daniel S. Voydanoff said, "Greater public understanding of how to manage money,

familiarity with laws affecting and protecting consumers, and knowledge of our economics system are all essential parts of consumer education."

Other consumer education programs supported by NBD include a public schools money management program for students, now offered in Detroit and several other Michigan communities, and the Consumer Survival Kit, a 30-minute program on WTVS-TV (Channel 56).

UM-D group updates file

A man and two women from Livonia are working on a project to index land in the metropolitan Detroit area.

New recreation centers, hospitals and other community facilities in southeastern Michigan may be more ideally located in the future because

of the project now conducted by the Center for Urban Studies at the University of Michigan-Dearborn (UM-D).

Ten UM-D students, under the direction of William Ladd of Livonia, the center's associate director, now are working on the geographic base file for the tri-county area. The plan is financed by a \$36,500 contract from the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments.

Assisting Ladd in the research are Patricia Key and Susan Platts of Livonia.

The completed project "will provide local governments and other organizations with the potential to obtain information for any parcel of land in the Detroit region," according to Ladd.

Esch backs ozone study legislation

Legislation initiating full-scale research into the possible dangers of chlorinated fluorocarbons in the atmosphere has been co-sponsored by U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Mich.), ranking minority member of the Science and Technology Committee's environment and atmosphere subcommittee, and Rep. Paul G. Rogers (D-Fla.).

The bill would provide a twofold study conducted by the National Academy of Sciences and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and would impose a ban on all aerosol spray cans if the studies confirm existing reports that the ozone layer is being seriously threatened.

"This approach does not call for an immediate ban on aerosols and, in fact, does not include 'closed' systems, such as refrigerators," Esch said.

"What it does do is take a careful, rational approach, utilizing the best scientific advice we have available, to affirm or deny the findings of the University of Michigan and others that indicate a serious health hazard."

Less service needed for cars

F. Hager Green, plant manager of the Fisher Body-Livonia plant and chairman of the GM Livonia Plant City Committee, says 1975 GM models offer reduced maintenance and operating costs.

Green says a check of the 1975 model GM passenger car maintenance schedule highlights the changes which have taken place.

For example, 20 years ago a 1954 Chevrolet was scheduled for routine servicing 49 times in the first 50,000 miles. The 1975 Chevrolet is scheduled for only six service visits during the first 50,000 miles.

The oil change interval for 1975 has been lengthened from four months or 6,000 miles in 1974 models to six months and 7,500 miles. The spark plug change has been increased from 12,000 to 22,500 miles.

All other recommended vehicle maintenance has been set up in increments of 7,500 rather than 6,000 miles as in previous years.

Green says these improvements are due to benefits from catalytic converters, high energy ignition systems, radial tires and unleaded gasoline.

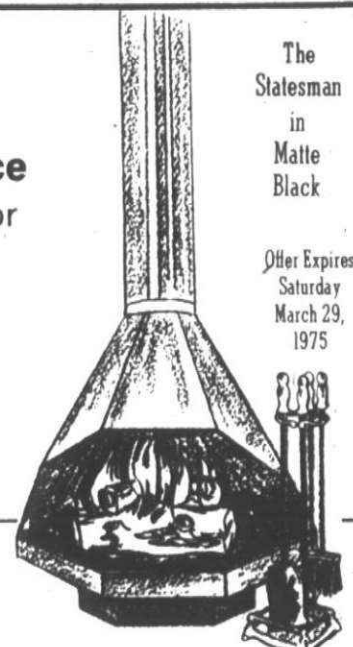
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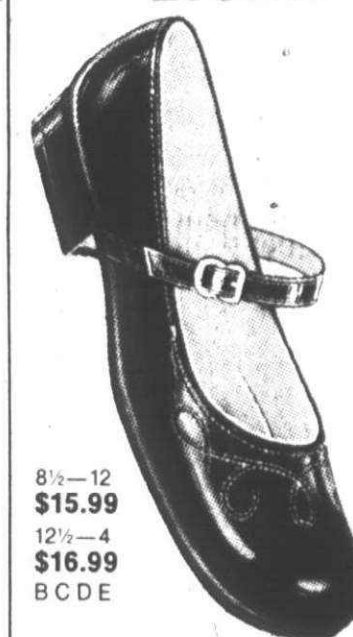
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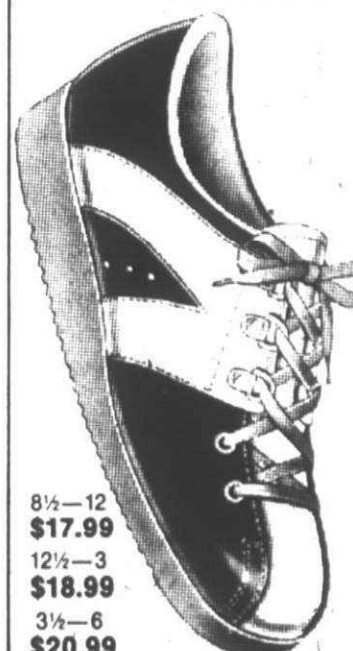
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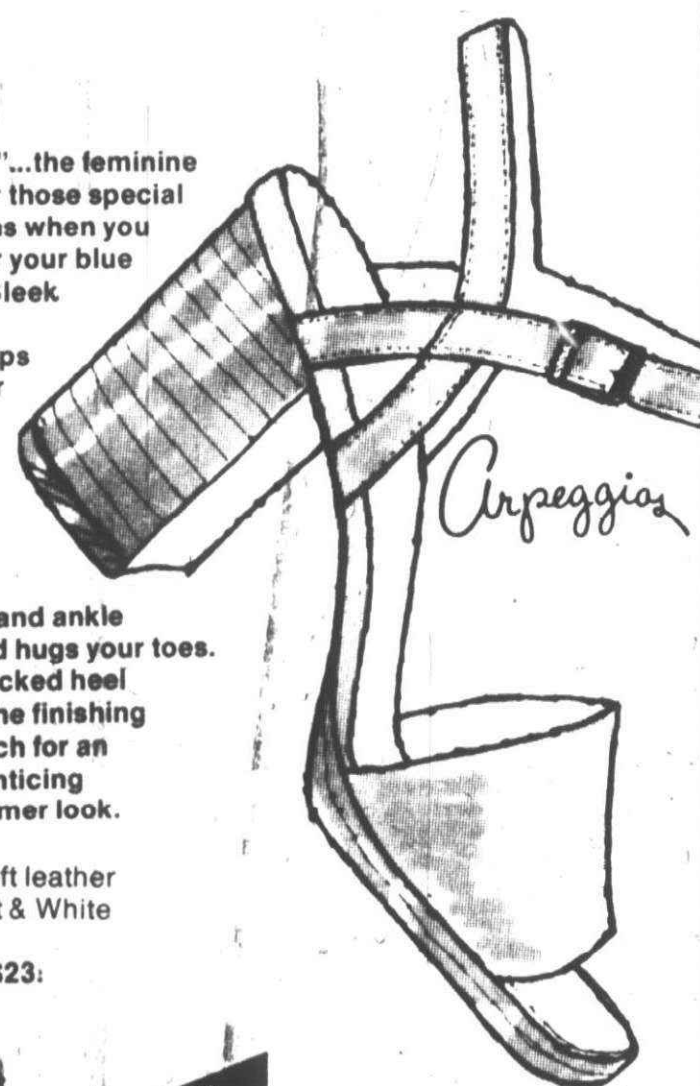
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Publisher Ross dies from stroke

Needed: A new brand of economics

In the business pages of today's paper, there is an interesting and controversial article on how to help the auto industry and cure the recession written by Irving Rozian, a suburbanite with engineering and economics training.

Rozian's idea is to have the federal government pay the auto companies a re-employment subsidy to get laid-off workers back on the job. The companies, in turn, would reduce the selling price of cars, which would stimulate demand and strengthen the economy.

Although Rozian's plan on its surface appears expensive, he makes the argument that by the time you calculate the costs of unemployment compensation and welfare payments to workers off the job and add to it the loss in taxes that reduced auto sales entail, government re-employment subsidies would be cheaper than continuing the present system.

THERE IS much to evaluate in Rozian's thinking, which has received attention in the White House, but there can be no doubt that he has made a contribution to a central problem of this era.

This problem is that the theories about how to run an economy originally proposed by John Maynard Keynes, after a spectacular run of success in the 1960s, are simply not working today. Keynesian theory simply does not account for price-gouging for raw materials that we recently experienced from the Arabs, nor does the theory give us much practical guidance about how to break out of the inflation-recession syndrome with which we are now afflicted.

In fact, if you talk over the problem with economists, even the most self-confident ones look upon the theoretical and practical breakdown of their discipline with something pretty close to terror.

Obviously, a new economic synthesis is needed; Rozian's article is one small step in this direction.

PERHAPS ANOTHER important step surfaced last week, when the news media carried stories to the effect that both UAW President Leonard Woodcock and Ford Motor Co. Chairman Henry Ford II were beginning to discuss with favor the whole notion of planning in an economy.

Most people associate planning in running an economy with socialist or communist states, in which some board of planners directs the way investment and production are to be handled, regardless of the forces of the market. This notion contrasts with the free-market economy, in which resources and production are allocated on the basis of the market forces of supply and demand.

For many years, however, many countries in Europe have used something called "incentive planning" in running their economies. Such planning involves establishing certain social goals in the economy (for example, building up industries

that operate on a business cycle which oscillates counter to previously established industries, thereby gaining employment stability for the whole economy), and then setting up incentives such as

Will 2 crimes in 5 years kill an entire industry?

A bill has been introduced in the Legislature making it illegal for newspaper carriers who are minors to collect money from their customers.

In 1970, a Pontiac news carrier was killed while making his collection rounds. In 1974 a news carrier in Detroit was stabbed to death during his collection rounds. In both cases, the alleged assailants also were young people.

Obviously, I am a little prejudiced in the matter but, because two persons were killed in the state over a five-year period, some legislators have decided that a very old institution should be put out of business.

There are very few opportunities for very young teen-agers to learn about business.

BECOMING A NEWS carrier requires a youngster to develop responsibility in doing a job and learning how to handle money through the process of buying and selling newspapers.

Many successful people attribute their experience as a little independent merchant as the thing that got them started in business. Now, because two boys have been killed, some people want to take this opportunity away from the young folk.

In our operation we have more than 1,600 carriers and have never had a problem.

We receive the same report from newspapers all over the state.

I AM NOT UNSYMPATHETIC to the plight of newsboys trying to collect money in the city of Detroit. But to end an institution because two persons were killed in the state over a five-year period is like throwing out the baby with the bath water.

There is no clamor to close all of the schools in the State of Michigan. Yet, two persons were killed in Detroit public schools within the last year.

There is no clamor to close Cobo Hall because a girl was killed in a stairwell last year.

Accident list grows along I-96 'big ditch'

The man with the long scythe, known in many circles as the "Grim Reaper" hasn't struck yet on Schoolcraft Road, but judging from the way accidents are beginning to pile up, it won't be too long.

So while the State Highway Department continues to drag its feet in making the new expressway safe while under construction, more and more motorists are skidding and rolling over into the big ditch.

There was a time when the excavation for the depressed highway was known as the Schoolcraft Corridor. But with all the dangers that have cropped up with the closeness of the deep excavation to the curb of the service drive, it has a new name. That is the one used above.

Two weeks ago two separate accidents were reported in which both cars wound up at the bottom of the excavation. Just a few days ago another accident happened on the eastbound lane near Middle Belt Road, but fortunately none was injured.

IF THE HIGHWAY department had insisted the contractors install safety barriers, as their contracts call for during the excavating, then none of the accidents would have occurred.

The cars would have bashed into the barriers and caromed off with considerable damage to the car but not too much to the drivers.

'Tis true enough the highway department has borne down on the contractors handling that portion of the highway between Beech and Inkster Roads. However, whoever is making the decision apparently hasn't discovered the dangerous spots in Livonia.

IN THE LATEST accident, a young woman, driving in the eastbound lane, struck a contractor's truck parked half on the highway and half on the shoulder.

It has always been our thought that when trucks were parked along the service drive, the contractor should have a big arrow indicating that drivers should move over to the other portion of the lane. Apparently the truck had nothing but flasher lights and the car was on the truck before the young woman noticed.

She ran into the end of the truck, both cars swerved and rolled into the big ditch. With all of the deep mud, neither car turned over and the driver, Jacquelyn Erma Greer, 21, of Detroit, suffered only minor injuries.

According to the police, no tickets were issued. We would take issue with the police and wonder why the truck driver wasn't given a ticket for illegally parking. Schoolcraft Road, from Telegraph to Newburgh Road in Livonia, has no parking at any time signs posted.

Since the truck did not have the arrow telling drivers to get out of the inside lane, then he is just as guilty of the violation as would be any motorist parking his car in the same position.

WE REALIZE there are many problems in the construction of a highway, whether depressed or not. We also realize the State Highway Department has certain duties and one is making certain the roads are safe while the highway is under construction.

We had a promise from the Wayne County district traffic offices that barriers would be erected all along the highway before the middle of January.

We have to admit that some work has been done. But little action was noticed in Redford Township until two Thurston High students skidded off the highway, the car flipped in the air and rolled end over end to the bottom. One of the two was seriously injured, and for a while it was thought he might have a broken back. As it was, he was hospitalized for 10 days and then sent home. However, his swimming career may have ended with that accident.

After that accident was brought to the attention of the highway department, things began to move. Barriers were erected at practically all T-intersections along the service drives in Redford Township. Barriers were placed at several spots but none in front of the Thurston High building until last week.

The highway department lowered the speed limit in Schoolcraft Road to 35 miles per hour two weeks ago as a safety measure. This action was taken without informing the media so the driving public would know of the new speed limit.

Apparently the highway department does realize the dangers of the corridor or it wouldn't have reduced the speed limit. One can't understand why it would take safety measures on one side and then seem to forget the contractors are contract-bound to provide the safety barriers.

And it doesn't appear to us that barrels placed some 30 feet apart are a safety barrier.

Some ideas on constructive harassment

It's hardly a secret that motorborne vandals have discovered a new way to increase their destructive capacity on suburban lawns. The 2 a.m. marauders used to be content to drive across the grass, leaving a set of tire tracks. Today, however, they also spin their wheels so that they dig nice trenches into the spongy grass.

The problem with that kind of stupid destruction is that it hurts the innocent. A more useful prank might be to go to a supermarket parking lot and look for the adult jerks who park in the fire lane, blocking traffic, and just walk across the hoods of their cars. The boors who park in fire lanes deserve to receive some kind of mischief.

There's not much you can do about the guy in the supermarket checkout line who goes into the express lane with three or four items, but then decides to cash a big check and holds up other shoppers for several minutes.

But there is something you can do at the bank when some hog decides to refinance his house and close three savings accounts at the drive-in window. You can honk. A simple check cashing and deposit transaction shouldn't take more than two minutes; so if the inconsiderate customer ahead of you takes too much time, start honking at him every 30 to 60 seconds, and then be sure to tell the teller why you honked. Drive-in windows were intended for short transactions, and the teller really should tell the time-consuming customer to come indoors.

Honking at time hogs isn't vandalism; it's constructive harassment, and we should do more of it.

Here's an excellent way to harass telephone solicitors: When someone gets on the phone with a spiel about credit cards or Florida real estate, tell them to hold on because the baby's crying or the soup's boiling over. Then just leave the phone dangling. The telephone solicitors harass you, so why not harass them right back?

Constructive harassment of that sort does no harm to the innocent, it punishes the guilty, and it sure beats vandalism.

THERE IS A PROBLEM of crime in the streets of the City of Detroit. The stabbing of the carrier last year is only a symptom of that problem, and the Legislature should be working on solutions to the problem, not the symptoms.

Proponents of the legislation say that this will not end carrier delivery because people can pay in advance and a boy could still deliver the paper. But these legislators apparently don't understand the voluntary-pay system that some newspapers such as ours use, where the carrier's compensation is based on his collections.

THE LEGISLATORS also don't understand that the lifeblood of a newspaper is its circulation, and if they prevent the newspaper salesman, the young carrier, from trying to sell subscriptions, then they are cutting the heart out of the whole character-building program.

It's easy for some people to sit back and think of other solutions so that the carrier does not have to collect money in the street, but most of the people who fantasize these solutions have never been in the business of trying to circulate a newspaper.

We have seen the automobile industry strangled by government legislation. The newspaper industry has no desire to suffer the same fate.

Take starch out of disposition

Grocery carts piled high with pop, potato chips and frozen cream pies sail through supermarket checkout lines—to be paid for with food stamps.

A Garden City school food service director points to vending machines and the district's "open lunch" policy as contributing to poor nutrition.

High school cafeterias nearly everywhere offer vending machines full of pop, potato chips, candy. Home economists lament: "They don't teach nutrition as they used to."

Good nutrition is something the average family can afford. Margaret Miller of our staff recently wrote about nutritionist Irene Cameron, who sug-

gests a nutritionally sound, "basic four" menu which will feed a family of four for one day. Total cost: \$4.86.

A Plymouth middle school teacher set up an experiment in the front hallway of her school to show how nutrition—or lack of it—would affect six white rats. Two rats fed a normal "teenage" diet developed scaly tails, poor fur and dispositions so nasty that they bit their keepers.

Natural Nutrition Week was designated recently—but not observed by the majority.

Try eating the "basic four" way—meat or fish; grains; fruit and vegetables; and dairy products. It may improve your disposition.

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Milliken urges legislative speed on malpractice

Gov. William Milliken has directed state agencies to begin implementing recommendations aimed at easing the medical malpractice insurance crisis in Michigan.

the deadline of June 1 for a total solution to the problem.

IN A LETTER to seven state agencies, the governor called for immediate action to implement 11 recommendations of the "Report on Medical

Malpractice in Michigan" — developed by Deputy Commerce Director Michael A. Dively and State Insurance Commissioner Daniel J. Demlow.

Agencies spurred by Milliken include the State Insurance Commis-

sion, Michigan Civil Service Commission, State Health Planning Advisory Council, Department of Licensing and Regulation, Medical Practices Board, Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination, and the Board of Podiatry.

"The critical needs of providing and containing the costs of malpractice insurance in our state have already been widely provides a sensible approach toward a comprehensive solution to our immediate problems.

"Among the recommendations are a number of administrative actions that can be taken to improve the regulation of the health care professions, to provide for better collection and use of malpractice information, to encourage citizen participation in easing the problem, and to commence a comprehensive study of health care problems."

OEN SHORT-TERM form of relief came over the weekend when the State Bar voluntarily agreed to a schedule limiting contingency fees attorneys may charge clients for personal injury tort litigation.

The State Bar acted after the State Supreme Court decided to initiate hearings on whether such a limit should be imposed and what fee schedule would be enforced.

Expressing pleasure at this short-term relief, Milliken commented:

"We must now turn our full attention to legislative action on the other elements of a comprehensive solution. In particular, we must complete our work on the design of a mechanism to insure the availability of malpractice insurance."

"The legislative leadership and I are committed to a June 1 deadline for a total solution. I urge the Legislature to keep that tight timetable in mind as it continues its deliberations."

New term April 7 at CLL

The Weekend College Program with-in CLL is designed for working adults. Students holding full-time jobs can still carry a full course load of 12 credit hours by taking TV courses in early morning or evening, attending weekly workshops with an instructor and one or two weekend conferences each quarter on or off campus.

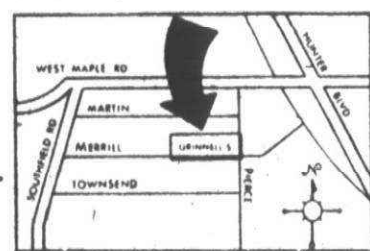
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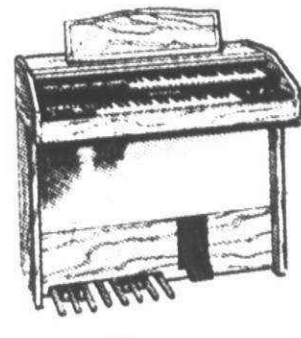
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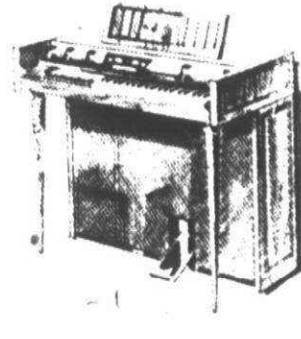
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6 who aided in arrests cited by county detectives

Five Chargers on squad

Churchill dominates O&E All-Area hockey team

Charging may be worth two minutes in the penalty box where most hockey teams are concerned, but the 1975 Observer and Eccentric hockey team has a definite "Charger" look.

Five of the 12 All-Area positions are held down by members of the Suburban Hockey League champion Churchill Chargers and with good reason. Churchill finished the year with a 21-2-1 record and went through the league season with a perfect 14-0 record -- the first time that trick has ever been turned.

Livonia Franklin landed three players on the team while Bentley and Stevenson each placed two players on the team.

THE GOALIE POSITION has to be the mainstay of the All-Area team with Churchill's Phil Rose taking first team honors and Franklin's Chuck Latour placing as the second team netminder.

Rose, a 6-0, 180 pounder, is only a junior. He boasts a fine 2.58 goals-against average for 1975, appearing in 19 games.

"Rose has an excellent glove hand and very quick reflexes," said Churchill hockey coach, Adam Mitchell.

Bill Finn of Stevenson and Ken Franklin of Franklin are the men directly in front of Rose on the All-Area team.

Franklin was the defensive

mainstay for the Patriots. "He's a hard hitter, a good skater and really makes the opposition keep their heads up," said Franklin head ice man Paul Ferguson.

Bill Finn shored up the defense for Stevenson. He scored 10 goals and added 12 assists ranking him among the top "offensive" defensemen in the area.

THE SCORING POWER of the first team All-Area team comes from a pair of Chargers, Todd Bond and Kevin Kardos, and Jerry Dirusso of Stevenson.

There's no doubt that Kardos would have been a standout on any team in the state. Only 5-8 and 155 pounds, he scored at an unprecedented rate. Kardos has the college scouts stand-

ing in line and excels academically also, boasting a 3.7 overall average in the classroom. Kardos piled up 125 points this season on 70 goals and 55 assists.

Bond has little trouble finding the nets himself. The senior forward clicked on 36 goals and added 26 assists as a linemate of Kardos. Bond saw triple duty for Churchill as his work on the power play and killing penalties gave him more action than the two-dollar window at post time.

Dirusso led the Spartans in scoring this season with 22 goals and 28 assists. These statistics are in spite of

the fact that his linemates suffered a variety of injuries and suspensions during the year and as a result, Dirusso scored in spurts.

THE SECOND TEAM goalie, Chuck Latour, averaged 3.3 goals-against this year despite facing some of the toughest competition in the state. Latour, a junior, will be back to frustrate enemy attackers for Franklin next year.

The second team All-Area defensive pair stopped more enemy blitzes than British Spitfires in 1942. Sam Bird was Churchill's top man in front of the netminder while Steve Lemieux's con-

sistency anchored the Bentley defense.

Up front for the second team are John Vella of Franklin, Dave Manogian of Bentley and Brian Veasey of Churchill.

Vella earned his keep with fleet skates and 20 goals. Manogian captained the Bulldogs and piled up 47 points. Veasey was the "unsung hero" of Churchill's championship team, according to Mitchell.

What it adds up to is a team with power, defense and a pair of lightning quick goalies that "charged" area hockey fans all year long.

'Walking the dog' keeps this Livonian, family pet in shape

Every night, 49-year-old Max Nemazi comes home from his job as an engineer at Detroit Diesel and takes the family dog out for a little exercise.

If that sounds pretty normal, let it be known that the dog, a five-year-old labrador retriever dubbed "Cap" may be the healthiest dog in the Detroit metropolitan area.

The reason for the shining eyes and glossy coat of the family pet is that for Nemazi, as he approaches his 50th year and the golden age of life, a little exercise consists of an eight mile, one hour run through his Franklin-West Chicago Road neighborhood.

THAT, OF COURSE is only during the week. On weekends, the pace

picks up to 15 miles and two hours of picking 'em up and laying 'em back down.

Nemazi, it seems, has late in life caught that most curious of athletic diseases. He has turned himself into a long distance runner and like most long distance runners, he believes in jogging for the masses.

"I have been running now for two and one-half years. I feel much healthier and I have lost 20 pounds," he said.

For the weight watchers, Nemazi claims that he can take off three pounds in a good day's run. He claims running is good for the mind and soul as well as the body.

"I don't get at all bored when I run. I look at the birds or I think about the day's problems or I meditate," he said.

NEMAZI IS ONE of the area's top runners in the "Masters" (over 40) category. He recently won his age group award from the Motor City Striders, one of the largest running clubs in the Detroit area. He finished fifth in last year's Motor City Marathon — not bad at all for a man of his age 8 who claims he has not peaked yet.

"Some day I suppose it will all catch up to me, but I feel that I have not run my best times yet," Nemazi said.

The marathon is the favorite of all serious long distance runners. It consists of 26 miles, 385 yards of torture and Nemazi is currently in training for the biggest marathon of all — the world famous Boston Marathon on April 21.

Nemazi competed in the race last year, finishing well back.

"I was 1m240th out of 1750 runners. But, of course, I did not expect to do very well. I run in the Boston Marathon for the experience and challenge, not because I expect to do well," Nemazi said.

NEMAZI RAN THE grueling distance in three hours, 24 minutes last year. He said his personal goal for this year is three hours, 10 minutes.

Nemazi, who has lived in Livonia for 20 years, got interested in running through the physical fitness program at the Livonia YMCA.

"I had to start out slowly and it wasn't until six months after I started that I really felt in shape. At one time I was not at all interested in running. I thought it would be rather senseless. Now I think differently," he said.

"For me, running is like taking a hike. I don't huff and puff and as long as I don't push myself, I'm not exhausted when I'm finished running. I intend to keep running as long as I can," said Nemazi who pointed out that was a 96 year-old starter in last year's Boston Marathon.

And so Nemazi, who is big and friendly as well as healthy, continues to trot along the streets of Livonia preparing for a race which he knows he cannot win.

As long as Cap's legs hold out, Max Nemazi will at least not know the loneliness of the long distance runner.

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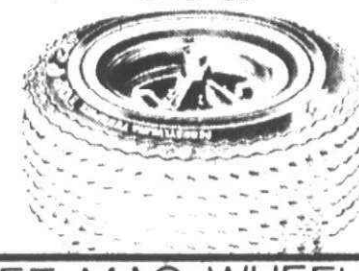

Area coach of year Mitchell gives teams 'scientific' look

If ice hockey can be termed a science, Adam Mitchell has a distinct advantage over his coaching contemporaries—and that advantage shows up in the win column.

Mitchell, who has taught science at Livonia's Riley Junior High School for seven years, applied the precise principles of his trade to Churchill's hockey team this year. The experiment was a great success as the Chargers came up with 21-2-1 record and the Suburban Hockey League title.

For his efforts, Mitchell has been named all-area hockey coach of the year.

Success is nothing new to Mitchell's teams. The Livonia resident, who has been playing and coaching hockey at all levels for 20 years, has a four year overall high school record of 57-12-9.

THIS YEAR'S CHURCHILL team was scientifically typical of the teams Mitchell has coached—high energy output.

"All 16 boys on this squad worked for one common cause—the team. Al-

though we had one outstanding scorer, it did not distract from the other players giving their all," Mitchell said.

That one outstanding scorer, Kevin Kardos, piled up a league record 70 goals and 55 assists in 24 games this year.

"But we didn't have any real star, we just played very well together," Mitchell said.

Churchill ended up with a 14-0 league record and No. 3 ranking among state ice powers.

AS WITH ALL coaches, there is more behind Mitchell's success than can be seen on the ice or in the locker room.

"I have to give my wife Rosemary a lot of credit. She put up with a lot during the course of a long, rough season," Mitchell said.

Mitchell and his wife have two children, Kimberly, three years and David, nine months. His future goals are hockey oriented.

"My main goal as far as hockey is

concerned is to have a state high school championship team and eventually coach college hockey. As far as high school players are concerned, my main goal is to prepare them for college hockey," he said.

Mitchell also looks to develop the well rounded individual in his coaching.

"The opportunities for American hockey players are now there for the asking. The only thing many players forget is that they must also have good grades as well as hockey ability," he said.

Mitchell is already looking forward to next season when he will have several performers from this year's team back for a go at a second straight title.

"I was very sorry to see this season end, but I'm certainly looking forward to the challenge of next year," he said.

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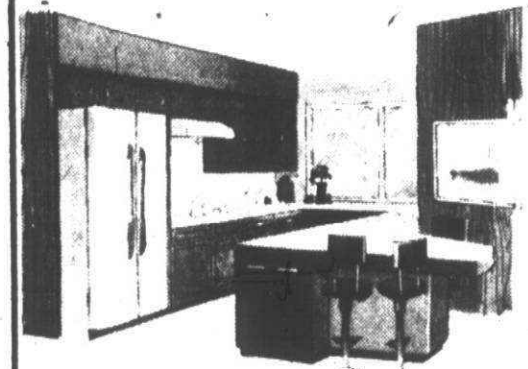
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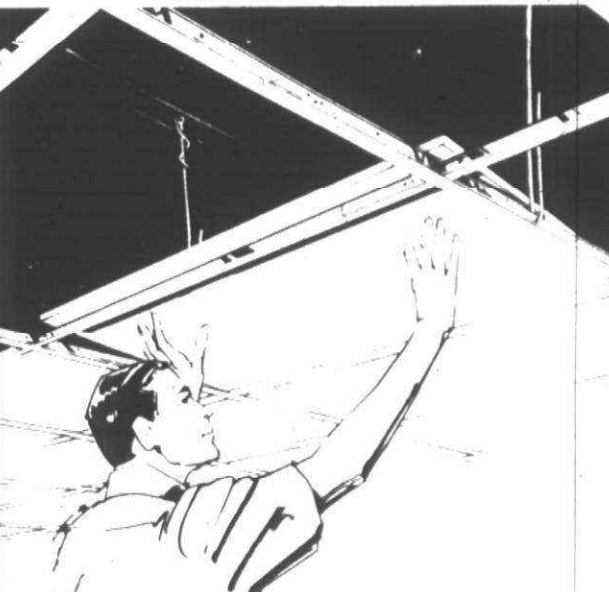
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Turf Tips, Quips

One would have to believe the days of Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley are numbered. What may be the final blow to dismiss him from office came from State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) who has a letter in the hands of Gov. Milliken urging immediate dismissal.

Pursell's communication follows letters from the Northville City Council and groups representing the thoroughbred owners, trainers and jockeys. Each has requested the governor to remove the racing commissioner from office.

Shirley has been under fire for several months and there was an earlier rumor he would be removed shortly after Gov. Milliken had taken the oath of office. But at that time the commissioner was involved in a law suit with Northville Downs over the failure to allot it summer dates.

THAT SUIT wasn't resolved until three weeks ago. Inasmuch as the ruling by Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley, of Plymouth, favored the commissioner, many thought he was out of trouble.

Apparently such is not the story and Pursell took his action after listening to complaints from horsemen, trainers, fans and track operators.

"It is my personal feeling, after listening to the numerous complaints that the commissioner is not acting as one would expect a man in that position to perform," said Pursell. "I have two of the racing plants in my district and I feel it would be for the betterment of racing if a change is made. The quicker, the better."

There is considerable doubt that the

governor would take any action this week. The commissioner is out of town attending the National Association of Racing Commissioners convention where he was slated to become the new president.

MANY NAMES have been thrown into the hopper as a possible successor but it is that of Dr. Fedele Fauri, a vice president at the University of Michigan, which seems to have the inside track.

In the meantime a special committee headed by Sen. Bill Hoffman, (D-Hazel Park), is making a study of the Racing Act with the thought of making some necessary changes.

One change, which has support of the thoroughbred and harness horsemen and track managements, is to change the format to a three-man commissioner.

Under this plan, one commissioner would have knowledge of harness racing, the second of thoroughbred racing and the third, with knowledge of both, to serve as an administrator.

Such a commission has been recommended in Illinois and probably will be adopted before another season. There are some states in the east with three-man boards which have worked much better than the racing czar type of the past.

The newest development is interesting inasmuch as rumors about the appointment of Dr. Fauri have been heard since last fall. One thing is certain, he has to have considerable knowledge of the thoroughbreds since he was a former jockey.

THE DETROIT RACE Course.

which had its first million dollar Saturday, came right back with a big \$600,000 on Monday and appears on the way. The Monday handle was in spite of the fact the program only had eight races.

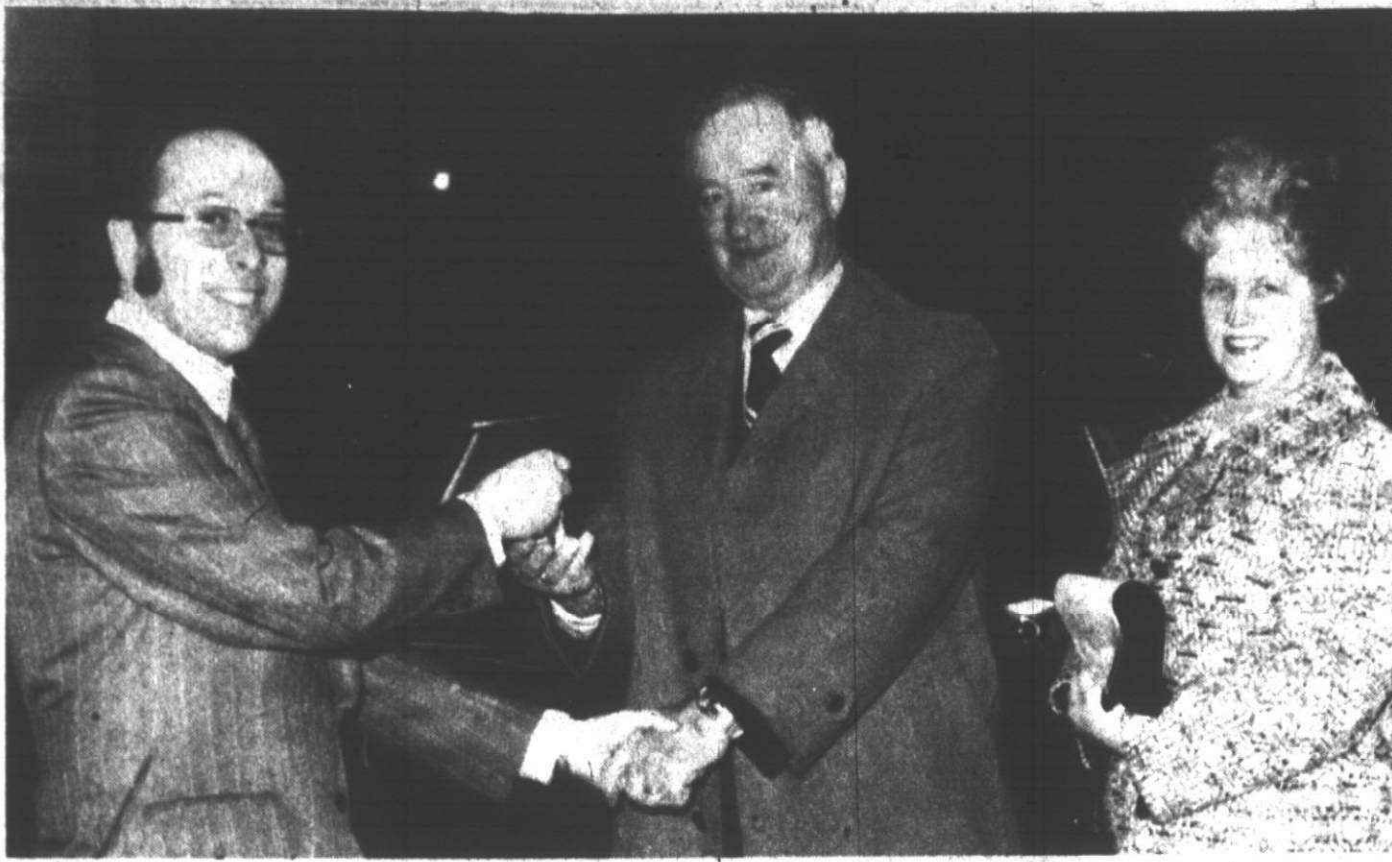

Miss Krumpoch was graduated from OU in 1972, receiving her bachelor's degree in history. She's now taking courses at OU toward her master's degree in management.

UM-D adds new police program

Community college students completing the first two years of a law enforcement program now will be able to complete their studies at University of Michigan-Dearborn (UM-D) for a bachelor's degree.

Under a new "two plus two" program, the students can transfer to UM-D's College of Arts, Sciences and Letters (CAS&L) with full junior status. Following the completion of their second two years at UM-D, they will receive a bachelor of general studies degree.

Twelve credit hours in each of three

concentrations will be required of the UM-D degree candidates. Suggested areas are: psychology, sociology and political science.

"This is just the first of several co-operative programs we hope to establish with area community colleges to aid transfer students," explains CAS&L dean Joachim Bruhn. He notes that previously many community college transfers have lost credits when their programs did not corre-

spond with UM-D programs. According to Bruhn, the addition of the law enforcement program will not require the addition of new courses or faculty. He adds that the college also hopes to introduce some special seminars taught in conjunction with local community college faculty. Graduates of the UM-D program will be able to go into police work or master's level study in law enforcement.

Madonna gets state grant

Madonna College of Livonia is one of four Michigan colleges to receive a \$25,000 grant from the state board of education to fund competency-based teacher education programs.

The programs are part of an innovative approach to teacher education begun in 1972 which stresses establishment of competency goals for teacher education graduates followed by the development of materials to train students to meet those goals.

The programs, funded by legislative appropriation, are carried out as a co-operative effort between the college and nearby school districts where education majors do their student teaching.

Subsidy:

Is it a tool to revive sinking auto industry?

EDITOR'S NOTE: The White House, congressional committees, legislative leaders and the auto companies are studying a proposal for "re-employment subsidies" made by Irving Rozian, 49, a Plymouth Township resident. Rozian is president of Michigan Universities Consulting Service and a member of the State Boundary Commission. Neil Staebler, former Democratic national committeeman, and State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) were instrumental in bringing the proposal before legislative leaders in Lansing and Washington. Andrew Court, a retired GM economist, provided guidance in channeling it to the principal economic advisers of the auto industry.

The nub of my proposal is this: Instead of paying up to \$7,500 worth of unemployment compensation and welfare per year to a laid-off auto worker, the government should pay his previous employer \$5,000 to put him back to work. The auto company would then pass the \$5,000 through to the consumer as a price reduction to stimulate sales.

Because 10 cars a year are produced per employee, the price reduction could be as much as \$500 per car on the additional cars produced. (The actual reduction will depend on how many workers are re-employed and how the total subsidy to a given company is spread over all cars sold.)

THIS SOUNDS like a big government give-away, but the government and the taxpayer actually come out ahead by nearly \$8,000 per worker.

This is because the average auto worker produces cars which sell for a total of \$35,000 per year. Of that \$35,000 in sales, roughly \$5,000 goes back to the government in income and sales taxes of businesses and individuals. If workers are out of jobs and not producing cars, there is no \$5,000

income to the government.

Under the re-employment proposal, \$5,000 goes to a re-employment subsidy instead of the average \$7,500 in current unemployment compensation and welfare costs—a saving to the government of \$2,500. Add this to the \$5,500 tax revenue, and you get \$8,000 less cost to the public.

The auto company goes from \$1,000 loss per idle worker to a \$2,000 profit. The worker has \$1,600 more disposable income after taxes—plus his self-respect and confidence.

WHERE'S THE HITCH? The main uncertainty is whether the resulting price reductions will sell the extra cars produced.

The re-employment subsidy proposal anticipated, by more than a month, Chrysler Corp.'s introduction of the voluntary rebate program. That program has shown that a price reduction of \$200 to \$300 per car does indeed stimulate at least short-term sales and has reduced inventories.

However, profits on the rebate cars are near zero, so the companies cannot sustain these lower prices. The re-employment subsidy may be a timely follow-on to continue the upward sales trend.

An intangible argument in favor of the subsidy plan is that auto industry employment receives such widespread publicity that it affects employment and investor and buyer confidence throughout the economy.

THERE ARE some possible objections to the plan.

Some contend we shouldn't try to go back up from a 6.5 million car year to a 9.0 million car year, for reasons of energy and ecology.

There are five responses.

First, to the extent that we need to shift some auto workers to primary energy production, the subsidy could be paid to the new employer rather than the old one.

Second, the government-mandated

changes in our way of life should not be so sudden and severe that they force a depression.

Third, Americans still want cars, if they aren't unemployed or scared off by bad economic forecasts. The auto has become a key element in personal freedom.

Fourth, with both dollar devaluation and a price reduction, domestic producers should be able to recapture a half-million units now imported and export a few more also.

And fifth, an effective way to reduce both gasoline consumption and air pollution is to replace older cars with newer, more efficient, pollution-free models.

THE AUTO industry and unions may see the subsidy as further unwanted government involvement in their business. However, the growing hardship to both investors and workers may force a change of attitude.

Another criticism is that the subsidy tends to give the most support to the least efficient producer because he has the highest percentage of laid-off workers. For such reasons the plan should not be invoked unless all firms in an industry are in trouble and national unemployment is past (say) six per cent.

A possible variant would be to provide the subsidy for six months to any firm which would re-employ the man for at least one year.

There are other administrative problems, such as preventing fraudulent layoffs just to get the subsidy. As with any pump-priming scheme, there are questions of when to start and when to turn it off.

Nevertheless, when compared to the alternatives for the unemployed of either real privation or subsistence payments in idleness, a plan for immediate productive re-employment seems worth the effort to overcome technical problems. Reactions from the industry and labor are awaited.

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Would subsidy hike car price?

The Rozian re-employment subsidy is a complex idea with wide ramifications, so staff members of the Observer & Eccentric raised some questions, which Rozian promptly answered.

Q. Aren't government payments such as your re-employment subsidy in reality labor costs which would be added to the price of a car? And wouldn't your proposed subsidy be money entering the economy at a direct cost to the government, resulting in either a massive tax increase or an increase in the national debt?

A. Unemployment insurance and the supplemental unemployment benefit funds are deferred wages and are hence an extra cost item which must appear, in the long run, in the price of cars.

However, during a one or two year pump-priming period, I am looking for the most constructive possible use of savings or special reserve funds, whether public or private, just as I was looking for a way to get goods flowing again to match needs and to generate offsetting tax revenue.

As to the enormous jump in revenue required, detailed calculations show that the exact amounts required for the re-employment subsidy and the offsetting tax revenue which would be generated by increased sales will, in fact, cost less than our conventional

unemployment and welfare program.

This is particularly true at this phase of the recession, wherein private funds have dried up and the federal government must now back up states in carrying the whole unemployment and welfare load.

Q. You want to increase production in the automotive business. But why should the taxpayer subsidize production in an industry after the marketplace has indicated that large numbers of cars are either unwanted or unneeded or unaffordable?

A. I am not advocating that re-employed labor be wasted by further featherbedding or by make-work jobs constructed in the plant. Also, since the re-employment subsidy picks up only part of the cost of labor and materials involved in producing each car, companies will not continue to build up unneeded inventory.

In general, it appears that the present drop in demand for automobiles is not of a long-term sort, but rather was caused by the increased price of gasoline and then by the general deterioration of the economy.

My information is that, under normal economic circumstances, another two million or so American-made cars could easily be consumed by the public.

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Arts group brings opera close to home

Area residents will have an opportunity to experience a professional opera production without having to trek to downtown Detroit when the Michigan Opera Theater (MOT) and the Oakway Symphony Orchestra present "The Barber of Seville," Saturday, March 22 at 8 p.m. in Churchill High School Auditorium, Joy and Newburgh roads.

Saturday's performance of Rossini's comic-opera will culminate a week-long program in Livonia schools by MOT's opera-in-residence.

The event is being sponsored by the Livonia Arts Commission and Project CAMEO in the Livonia School District.

"We're trying to make the arts more accessible to people within their own community," says Wynne Garlow, chairman of the arts commission. "If this event is successful we hope to bring the MOT back next year."

THE OPERA production and in-residence program is the arts commission's first major project since its formation last fall.

Tickets at \$3 general admission and \$1.50 for students and senior citizens are available in Livonia city commis-

sions office, Five Mile and Farmington roads.

"Barber" is a two-hour comedy in two acts featuring Figaro, barber of Seville and jack-of-all-trades, especially those that involve intrigue. Figaro, sung by Allan Glassman, agrees to help Count Almaviva, sung by Rockwell Blake, win the hand of a beautiful girl, Rosina, sung by Nancy Hoover.

Their attempts are hampered by Rosina's guardian, Dr. Bartolo, sung by Davis Gloff, who also is planning to marry Rosina and inherit her large dowry.

The plot takes many interesting twists and turns and introduces a variety of characters. As in most romantic comedies true love prevails, and "all's well that ends well."

THE MOT cast is directed by Dr. David DiChiera, general director of the opera group and executive director of the Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts.

DiChiera is a Phi Beta Kappa from UCLA where he received his master's degree in composition and a doctorate in musicology. He was a Fulbright scholar and was formerly chairman of the music department at Oakland University. He is currently on leave

of absence from the university to devote full time to the opera theater.

The Churchill performance will be sung in English. The MOT's philosophy on opera is that it is musical theater. While in the past it has relied heavily on musical and vocal merit, there is a movement to give acting equal emphasis in the interpretation of an opera.

The MOT subscribes to the belief that what an opera may lose in poetic subtlety, it will gain in dramatic impact to an English-speaking audience.

THE OPERA started its in-residence-opera 1973-74 season. The program takes a group of four singers, two accompanists, two technical people and a coordinator into a community for a week of workshops, master classes, demonstrations, assembly program and a final performance.

The cost of the entire production to the Livonia sponsoring groups is \$2,500, along with a matching fund grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts. The MOT in-residence-opera will stage some 17 programs for Livonia students.

The MOT and the area sponsoring groups hope to convince residents that opera is an art form that presents exciting possibilities.

'Godspell' is grinspell for theatergoers

Perhaps a more apt title for the musical "Godspell" would be "Grinspell" because it teaches you a lot more about smiling than it does about God.

The University of Detroit-Marygrove College production at The Theatre capitalizes on the the-tapping quality of Godspell's songs, the cuteness of some of its characters and the smiles evoked by some of the lines. The result is an audience which loves the play as much as Jesus wished Pilate could have loved him.

A REMARKABLY well-balanced cast rounds out the 13 characters. The play depends on the lyrics and music of Stephen Schwartz to take up for what it lacks in plot, and the players don't let down playwright John-Michael Tebelak who had a little help from Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Dennis Bailey as Jesus is a stand-out. If his role were true in life, he'd probably have a lot more followers than just the original 12.

Each of the six female cast members was excellent in her own right, and each has leading lady potentials in musicals. Their styles range from better to folk singer. Whether they are in solo or as part of the chorus, they seem to have just the right touch needed for "Godspell."

AS FAR AS drama is concerned, "Godspell" is too much parable and not enough deep portrayal of a single character and his experiences.

In the second act we are flung from the variety show of the parables into the Last Supper. Even Judas isn't prepared for it and prefers another soft-shoe to the betrayal scene. Actually the scene is cleverly conceived because it calls for Jesus first to betray Judas, but within the continuous slapstick mood of the play, the betrayal of Judas is diminished.

Director Dominic Missimi has chosen a Detroit setting with the omnipresent automobile at the center of the

stage settings. Even the cast is initially introduced in mechanics' coveralls with the labels of your favorite automakers clearly in view.

The lines of the play are renewed,

and after some mention of Mary and Joseph being refused at the inn, the company breaks into a chorus of "What Has Sheraton Done for You Lately."

If you're in the mood for an evening of song and laughter, and if you don't mind a few jokes at the expense of Jesus, "Godspell" is highly recommended. The show closes this week-

end with performances at 8:30 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, March 21 and 22; a Sunday, March 23 matinee at 2 p.m. and Sunday evening performance at 7:30 p.m.

A young reference librarian who supports the Equal Rights Amendment and loves digging into Garden City history will compete for the title of Young Careerist of the Year in the Michigan Business and Professional Women's organization.

Dianne Bish, a member of the Garden City BPW, was selected Sunday from among four candidates for the honor or representing BPW District 9, including clubs from Livonia, Garden City, Westland, Plymouth, Redford Township and Northville.

The four careerists, all in their 20s, met with a panel of three judges and gave talks before the BPW members of District 9.

Chosen as runner-up, and the District 9 representative should Ms. Bish be unable to attend the state convention in Traverse City May 15 to 17, was Janet Lynn Lauritsen, Plymouth music teacher.

The other young women competing were Paula Joyner, Livonia resident and music teacher in the Farmington school district, and Dorothy Shipley, Northville resident and writer for the South Lyon Herald.

"IF I'M CHOSEN, I'll do my best to represent this district at the state meeting," said Ms. Bish, who has been with the sociology-economics department of the Detroit Public Library for a year and a half.

"If I'm not chosen, well, I'll still be around doing my best for this BPW district."

The District 9 representative will meet again with a panel of judges at the state meeting, and she will again give an address before the delegates. The state winner, and those from other states, will be honored during the BPW national convention in Las Vegas July 20 to 24.

Judges for the district competition were Marjorie Carter of the Farm-

ington BPW and administrative assistant to the executive vice president of United Northwest Realty Association; Barbara Geil, Schoolcraft College director of admissions, and Patricia Oshry, head of a fashion firm.

Lucille Cutler, Northville realtor, served as district chairman for the competition. This is the first time the district has sponsored a Young Careerist event, although it has been part of the state program for several years.

DIANNE BISH grew up in Garden City and graduated from Garden City East High School in 1965, the last year that school served the entire city.

She earned a BA in economics and social sciences from Michigan State University in 1969. She also has an MA in library science from Wayne State University, and while working on that degree she served as the first law librarian for the Detroit law firm of Clark, Klein, Winter, Parsons and Prewitt.

Her career also has included a tour with the state of Missouri library, working in the legislative reference unit.

She was married last year to Joseph Velky, economist employed by Michigan Blue Cross and candidate for a doctorate in economics from WSU. The couple make their home in Westland.

MS. BISH IS an ardent proponent of the Equal Rights Amendment, and thinks it may become part of the constitution next year.

"It would be all-encompassing federal legislation that would get rid of a lot of outdated state and local laws," she said.

She also gives a strong vote of approval to women's organizations like the BPW, saying they are "doing a tremendous job around the country encouraging young women to enter business and careers."

A member of the Garden City Historical Commission, Ms. Bish said

that activity gives her an outlet for a couple of favorite interests, learning more about local history and restoration.

"What I'd really like," she said, "is to find a rambling old house to restore—and a lot of help in keeping it up."

In her not-too-abundant spare time, she added, she likes to do crewel embroidery and play the piano and the clarinet.

A CAREER CLARINETIST, Janet Lynn Lauritsen, came to her second-place selection in the BPW event via a much different route.

Mrs. Lauritsen, now teaching privately in this area, told of musical studies at Interlochen, both in summer programs and in the year-round arts academy, and of entering the Michigan State University school of music on a scholarship and earning a BA there.

She performed with the American Wind Symphony in Pittsburgh, studied in an international music school in Switzerland and earned a master's degree in performance from the University of Michigan. She now works with the Oakway Symphony in addition to teaching.

She related how a serious automobile accident almost ended her career and did give her a different outlook, and she credited Plymouth BPW member Lois McAllister for helping her get the right medical attention and encouraging her during a slow recovery.

"When you have something traumatic happen to you, you think more of what life is about," she said. "You know you could just look back on accomplishments, but it is far better to go forward. I want to help young people love music and learn from it as I have."

PAULA JOYNER told the group she has taken an active part in Livonia community activities along with her husband, William, because, "I think in politics women should help make the policy, not just the coffee."

She has been active in the Jaycee auxiliary and the Friends of the Barn and served as coordinator of the community Walk for Mankind last year.

"We as women can raise the levels of consciousness among our peer groups," she said. As a member of the BPW, she added "I've been pleased to work with women who give of themselves, and I believe now is the time we should assert our leadership."

Mrs. Joyner is a graduate of Central Michigan University and teaches at Warner Junior High School in Farmington.

NORTHVILLE'S Dorothy Shipley, a graduate of the University of Michigan, said that on her first job "I've realized that all those women who have been pushing for women's rights really knew what they were talking about—women's rights have become far more important to me."

Miss Shipley said she had elected to work instead of accepting an offer from her sorority, Zeta Tau Alpha, to help organize a new chapter while working on a master's degree.

"I am glad I made the decision," she said, "because I've become increasingly aware of the importance of knowing something of the business world in almost any field."

"So when I go back to school, and I definitely plan to do so, it will be to earn a master's in business administration."

'Is your child next?' panel asks

"Is Your Child Next?" is the topic for a free seminar on drug and alcohol abuse, scheduled in the auditorium of Madonna College, 36600 Schoolcraft, on Monday, March 24 at 8 p.m.

A panel discussion by authorities in the field, some first-hand reports by young people undergoing treatment and a chance for questions from the audience will be included in the program.

The Michigan State Bar Association and the Lawyers' Wives of Michigan are sponsors.

Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch, Hawthorn Center director of clinic research, will be one of the members of the panel, and he will interview student drug users.

Other panelists include Dr. J. Irwin Nichols, director of the Michigan Office of Substance Abuse Services, and Dr. Edward Leibson, former executive director of the National Addiction Rehabilitation Organization.

Completing the panel will be James F. Kipper, executive director of the Michigan Society for Mental Health, Barbara Reid of the Therapeutic Day Care Clinic and Phyllis Tuttle, corpo-

rate coordinator of the drug and alcohol abuse program sponsored by the Ford Motor Co.

MODERATING the discussion will be Wayne County Probate Judge Ira G. Kaufman.

Mrs. Lillian Kaufman, wife of the judge and Michigan chairman for the law wives' drug and alcohol abuse committee, said the program is being presented in several locations in the state over a period of months.

She said her organization hoped to reach a large number of persons with information on the subject because "this awful menace to society, especially to young children, is growing worse and causing so much more crime."

"The problem if drug and alcohol abuse is rampant," she added.

The program, she emphasized, is open to the public.

DR. RABINOVITCH will discuss the local drug and alcohol scene and the students he interviews will be some of those now receiving treatment at the Hawthorn Center. The students will tell how misuse of drugs and alcohol has affected their lives.

Dr. Rabinovitch is a nationally-

known authority on drug misuse among children. He will discuss family circumstances as factors causing drug abuse as well as prevention and treatment measures.

A discussion of drug misuse throughout the country and remedial programs in operation will be the contribution of Dr. Nichols, who, in his state post, is in close touch with the national office of substances abuse services in Washington.

Dr. Leibson will describe the drug abuse problem in the midwestern states. He has experience as a consultant to United Community Service, the crime control and narcotics committee of SEMCOG and the mayor's commission for rehabilitation of narcotics addicts.

KIPPER WILL REPORT on the mental health organization's program to prevent drug and alcohol abuse among young people. He has worked 10 years in administration of the society's community services, field services and public policy.

Following the program, refreshments will be served by members of the Detroit Lawyers' Wives Association.

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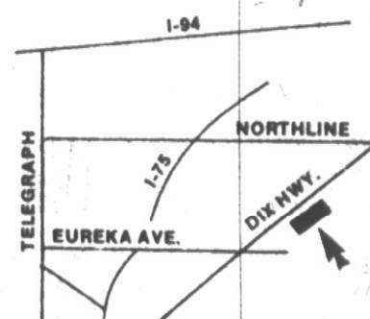
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Music to fill area churches

Ecumenical Reflections

Why celebrate Easter?

Should we celebrate Easter this year?

Easter is a time of great joy and festival observance of a rather incomprehensible event. It almost seems irreverent to make plans when so many of God's children are in trouble.

Consider: war in Cambodia and Vietnam which means death and destruction; economic disaster in our community with unemployment reaching higher and higher, which means persons facing a very bleak future; the energy problem is hovering over our heads with no solution in sight; we are facing multiple problems of environmental destruction.

Then think of the difficulties of finding food for the world's population and somehow stopping the rising number of violent crimes—each means persons are being hurt and even murdered.

A SUPERFICIAL LOOK at Easter would say we are turning away from the needs of persons in order to have a churchy celebration.

Yet, we assert strongly that Easter is exactly what we need. For the wisdom and understanding of life that comes through the Easter event speaks directly to what is needed in the world.

FIRST, EASTER is a confirmation, an assertion, the mystical and beautiful symbol that says we really do know God and his will for humanity. It is the "proof" that all that Jesus

did and said is absolutely true and reliable.

Proof? Yes, proof! Not like a lab experiment that can be repeated and thus proved. Not like a sociological study that verifies certain "facts" about culture. Not like any other proof we know.

But Easter is the transforming event that caused the Christian Church to become. It is the single most important phenomenon of all history—for us.

Despite all of our knowledge of life and the environment, science cannot explain the overall pattern nor probe the baffling meaning of human life. And, if this is so, who are we to demand scientific proof or rational explanations for Easter? The Resurrection of Jesus as Christ is something that we just know because it makes sense and unravels the basic meaning of life.

SECOND, EASTER—far from being removed from real life—is the key to being able to live with purpose and meaning. That is to say, the most frightening experience each of us faces is death, we will die.

The next most frightening experiences for each of us are the many pains and catastrophes that can enter our lives. We aren't just frightened about these things, we are scared. Easter puts all of life into perspective for us.

I do not mean to suggest that reading the Easter story is going to solve all problems—it cannot. What I do suggest is that the approval of God for Jesus' life means he truly represented

God to us and we can trust what he said and did. Jesus presented and lived a life-style that can be accepted for our own lives. Such a life isn't going to be found false and stupid by some new discovery.

IF WE HAVE ANY feeling for those in need, if we have any understanding of the difficulties that face fellow humans, if we can comprehend the endless night that faces so many of God's children, we can face those dark thoughts and emotions, because we know God and his way in the world.

John stated it so simply: "God loved the world so much that he gave his only son."

The life that Jesus presented was so radical, so different from what human beings had devised for themselves, that they could not even have Jesus around. The challenge was too great.

So, to maintain their pride and fulfill their expectations, the authorities executed the man who wanted to save them.

BUT GOD WOULD NOT let that stand—he caused the Resurrection, and the world has never been the same.

Seder meal gives meaning to Maundy Thursday

A Seder supper, designed to "take the Jewish Passover and turn it into a Christian meal," is one of the ways churches in this area will help worshippers find new meaning in commemoration of Maundy Thursday and the Last Supper on March 27.

The Seder is planned by St. Agatha Catholic Church, located on Beech north of Grand River in Redford Township. Following the meal, which will require reservations, there will be a special mass.

Maundy Thursday, the occasion in Holy Week marking Jesus' last meal with his disciples, will see tenebrae services in several other area churches.

Tenebrae takes its name from the word "darkness," and the service is one that dates back to the Middle Ages. In the service, candles are extinguished one by one until only one remains lit, as the symbol of Christ.

One church, St. Timothy Presbyterian, 16700 Newburgh, Livonia, plans a reenactment of the scene in the famed "Last Supper" painting for its Maundy Thursday service.

ST. AGATHA'S SEDER will combine ritual meal with parish potluck supper.

Deacon Ernest Bedard, who brought the idea from his home parish, St. Brigid in Detroit, said the church's co-pastors, The Rev. Kevin Britt and the Rev. Joseph L. Romano, would officiate for the Seder.

"The church will supply the Passover wine and the bitter herbs and ritual food," Deacon Bedard said. "Fam-

ilies in the church will bring the rest of the meal."

A good will donation will be taken, he added, to cover the cost of ingredients for the ritual meal. If money is left over, it will be donated to a charity to be decided by the parish council.

Following the supper, mass will begin at 8 p.m. with a ritual, washing of the feet. Then will come stripping of the altar, reservation of the Blessed Sacrament and adoration until midnight.

"We think this meal will add a real flavor of Holy Week to our parish experience," Bedard said. He and John Kaul serve the parish as deacons.

TENEBRAE SERVICES are planned in several churches Thursday night.

St. John Episcopal Church, 574 Sheldon, Plymouth, will use Moravian music for its service at 8 p.m., which will begin with the Eucharist, commemoration of the last supper, and continue with the tenebrae.

Scriptural responses will be entirely Moravian music sung by the choir. All of the anthems were composed by early American Moravian composers who also were ministers of the Moravian church which settled in Pennsylvania about 1740.

IN GRAND RIVER Baptist Church, 34500 Six Mile, Livonia, the Maundy Thursday service at 7:30 p.m. will include communion and tenebrae and a film created by college age students. Music will be by the chancel choir and guest soloists.

Religion Update

The sunrise service— is it 'for the birds?'

This is the time of year that ministerial associations plan what a small, but growing number of clergy regard as "the annual atrocity": the Easter sunrise service.

The wide variety of people who attend these outdoor ecclesiastical dawn patrols are usually guaranteed one invigorating, ecumenical mass experience. They freeze in unison.

For the clergy they are rarely in the habit of bedding down at sunset as did the slaves, whose very early morning services were the only possible time for corporate worship.

If most clergymen go to bed at 8 or 9 p.m. in order to prepare to greet the dawn—and to preach at as many as three more services—they find that sleep eludes them, particularly on the eve of so great a church festival.

Yet with two or three hours sleep,

ministers roll out of bed in the pitch black pre-dawn in order to prove that they are as pious and disciplined, as those saints who rose at 3 a.m. to pray.

ONE CLERGYMAN who has dared to defy this festival of more-nature-worship-than-Christ-worship is the Rev. John Lewis Gilmore, of Worland, Wyo.

This United Church of Christ minister, who is serving as pastor of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, has written in Christian Century magazine that "Easter sunrise services are for the birds."

He has several reasons why he feels that these services "ought to be dropped once and for all."

"They tend to appeal to the religious phony. In the dawn's early light I have spotted church members who

not once during 10 years of my pastorate have attended the regular services."

"Perhaps they think God will compliment them for their once-a-year courage, in dragging their bodies to a windswept hill at 6:30 a.m. Those who like to suffer couldn't find a better way to satisfy that desire. But we should stop encouraging the belief that such suffering leads to salvation."

"Let's get rid of the myth of the superiority of early risers! People who get up early do so because of their sleeping habits. God does not expect those of us who are up working half the night to roll out at dawn simply to meet a false standard of piety."

PASTOR GILMORE acknowledges that "the debate between the night owl Christian and the morning lark Christian invariably picks up steam" whenever the subject of Easter sunrise services is brought up.

And while readily admitting that there have been many devout figures who rose early to pray, he refers us at the same time to a number of great night owls. Among these was famed poet Robert Frost, who defied custom and milked his cows at midnight, rather than face pre-dawn. And the late Pablo Picasso once observed: "I realize why condemned men are usually executed at dawn. I just have to see the dawn to have my head roll all by itself."
