## Coalition report finds

# Block grant requests point to segregation

If a cross-district busing plan is considered by the federal courts within the next year, it is likely to be because of an admission of guilt of de jure segregation by the suburban governmental units themselves.

It was announced Friday by the Coalition for Block Grant Compliance that there is evidence of de jure (deliberate) segregation relating to housing patterns on the part of many Detroit suburban communities — including Livonia, Southfield, Redford Township, Westland, Rochester and Garden City.

The Coalition discovered the possible evidence while analyzing block grant applications made by 26 suburbs. The major finding was that the applications "flagrantly underestimate or fail to estimate" housing needs of low-income persons who work but don't live in suburban communities, reports Clifford Schrupp of the Northwest Interfaith Center for Racial Justice.

These findings have been turned over to the legal staff of the NAACP and attorneys for the Detroit Board of Education. NAACP attorneys are considering introducing the evidence at a future point before U.S. Judge Robert DeMascio to argue that the existence of de jure segregation requires a cross-district busing solution to integrate Detroit School District, explained Joe Madison, executive director of the Detroit NAACP.

THE APPLICATIONS for federal funding under the Community Development Act (CDA) were submitted before March 1 by each suburb to the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) for review.

While the applications were being

processed by SEMCOG, Coalition volunteers handcopied each application which was then analyzed by full time Coalition staff persons.

Schrupp said the applications failed to plan adequately for meeting housing needs of non-elderly lower-income families. "Many communities appear to be failing to meet the housing needs of their own lower income non-elderly residents simply because they fear that some non-residents might also be included."

There is little evidence, he added, that communities are geared up to comply with the civil rights requirements of the Community Development Act.

Notification of these exclusions of low-income persons has been made by

the Coalition to SEMCOG and the Michigan Civil Rights Commission. Within the next week to 10 days each of the 26 suburbs will be given specific comments about the application failures from the coalition.

"It is clear to us that in their present form these applications, taken together," stresses Schrupp, "constitute a systematic and pervasive pattern of official governmental action which will have the effect of discriminating against Blacks and members of other minority groups."

"If approved in their present form, the racial and economic divisions in the metropolitan area will be increased, significant housing needs of lower income persons will not be met."

## 45-15 delayed

PLYMOUTH—The fate of the 45-15 year round school program, tentatively planned for Miller School this summer has met with another delay.

Meeting in a special Saturday morning session, the Plymouth school board set a special meeting for tomorrow (Tuesday) at 8 p.m. at the board offices to discuss the costs and other matters of implementation with Miller School principal, Shirley Spaniel.

The delay by the board, came after several board members noted their confusion over cost figures for implementing the program, tentatively set to begin in July of this year. Estimates by an administrative committee reached the \$90,000 mark, in a report which was partially presented to the board by Supt. John M. Hoben.

Board vice president Marda Benson noted her concern that Mrs. Spaniel and other administrators were not present at the meeting. "I think it's unrealistic to discuss 45-15, when the people who know the most about the program are not here," Mrs. Benson said.

FOLLOWING further questions to the superintendent on the reasons for the increased costs for the 45-15 program, Trustee George Lawton moved that discussion be delayed until Mrs. Spaniel could be present.

"45-15 is quickly becoming a political issue," said trustee Gary Minto. "I've spoken to Mrs. Spaniel and she is less than enthusiastic about the program. I'm concerned about the effect that 45-15 will have on the upcoming millage election."

"The survey that was taken last year may no longer be valid and as a board member I don't know who the hell to believe."

A survey of residents in the Miller School area last year indicated a strong majority favored implementation of the 45-15 program. Set to begin in July of last year, the plans were

scrapped, when teachers declined to begin the program without a new contract.

BUD THOMAS, a resident of the Miller School area, said he had petitions signed by 128 residents in the Miller area. According to Thomas, "only 30 signed petitions in favor of 45-15."

Hoben told residents and board members that alternatives to 45-15 would also cost money, including the possibility of putting in portable classrooms at the Miller site, or busing students to other schools.

Mrs. Benson urged the residents present to consider the 45-15 program on the basis of its impact throughout the district. "It's a great tendency to be extremely provincial and be concerned only with what happens at Miller. Please take the time to consider the effects on the program districtwide."

She said that if students could not be housed at Miller, other schools would be affected with the transfer of Miller students into their schools.

School board secretary Marcia Borowski explained to residents the board was attempting to "maintain the integrity of attendance areas" within the district.

ACCORDING to figures presented by Hoben in the 45-15 report, without the 45-15 program, Miller would handle 733 students in the fall. With 45-15 the school would be housing 865 students, an increase of 132.

The board also voted to begin planning for a survey of residents throughout the district on their opinions of the 45-15 program.

Noting time was running short for the planning of the program, if it is to be implemented, the board also will attempt to set a timetable for the program at its Tuesday night meeting. That meeting will be held in the board offices, 454 S. Harvey.

## Plymouth Twp holds firm on refusal to share light costs

CANTON—Another attempt to determine who will pay for the Joy Road bridge lights over I-275 met with failure Tuesday.

Members of the Plymouth and Canton Township Board of Trustees met jointly to see if Plymouth Township officials would consider footing a portion of the lighting costs, estimated currently at \$14,000.

Speaking informally, members of the Plymouth Township Board told Canton officials they were not interested in paying for any of the lighting.

Plymouth Township Clerk Helen Richardson summarized the sentiment of the board when she said, "I think it's a state or county problem, it's certainly not ours and I don't even think it should be Canton's. None of our residents live near the bridge and the only people the lighting would affect would be people driving over the

bridge. They could be from Superior Township or anywhere else."

She added, "I've driven across plenty of bridges in my time and personally I don't think they even need lights in the first place."

THE PROBLEM of the bridge light controversy has been ongoing for three years. Residents of the Holiday Park Subdivision, located just east of the bridge, complained that the bridge might cause traffic problems.

With the support of the Canton Township administration, they brought suit against the State Highway Department and the Wayne County Road Commission in the fall of 1973. They listed 13 complaints.

In December, Circuit Court Judge John J. O'Hair signed a consent judgment ordering that both Plymouth and Canton Townships pay for the lights because Joy Road bordered on both townships.

Canton Township Clerk John Flodin wrote Detroit Edison asking for a study on the lights. In November 1974 Edison responded that seven lights located on the east and west embankments of the bridge would do the job.

The cost of the electricity would be \$189 a month. Several weeks later they informed Flodin that they would not install the lights. Cost of installation has since been estimated at \$2,000 a light or \$14,000 total.

Canton officials contacted Mrs. Richardson in December 1974 and asked if Plymouth Township would chip in on the cost of the lighting.

The Plymouth Township board in-

dicated in January that they were not interested.

Following that decision, Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein contacted township attorney William Sempliner. He informed Greenstein that legal precedent existed for forcing Plymouth Township to pay.

A joint meeting was then arranged between the township officials last Tuesday.

While Sempliner has stated that Plymouth Township can be legally forced to pay, the township's attorney, Don Morgan has indicated otherwise.

Says Mrs. Richardson, "Our lawyer

Township officials received the fi-

nancial section of the airport study late last week and were not "conversant on the matter" at deadline time.

# SC tuition rates hold

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees voted 6-0 last Wednesday (March 19) to keep 1975-76 tuition rates at the current level, but gave itself the option of increasing tuition if the economic situation of the college changes.

In-district students presently pay \$11 per credit hour while out-district students pay \$22, and out-of-state students pay \$33. The Schoolcraft district includes the Plymouth, Northville, Li-

von, Westland and Garden City school districts.

Dr. Nelson Grote, Schoolcraft president, told the board that based on all the facts and unknowns (executive appropriations) tuition should remain at the 1974-75 level.

"Revenues could shift, however, and in that case we're not absolutely bound by this certification," said Grote. "If the economic situation ne-

cessitates a change we can reconsider the current rates."

State law requires that each community college certify its tuition and fees for 1975-76 no later than April 15.

Tuition has not increased at Schoolcraft over the past three years. The tuition rate at other area community colleges including Henry Ford Community College (HFCC), Dearborn and Oakland Community College (OCC) is \$10 for in-district students. No increase is being discussed at HFCC, while tuition may go to \$12 for residents at OCC.

IN OTHER action, Grote announced 1974-75 commencement exercises will be held Sunday, April 27 at 2 p.m. in the physical education gym on the Schoolcraft campus.

Keynote speaker will be Sarah Power, a member of the University of Michigan Board of Regents.

Mrs. Power, an Ann Arbor resident, was educated at Vassar College and New York University Graduate School of Politics and International Relations. In New York she served as executive director of the United States Nations-New York City Host Advisory Committee and executive director of New York City Commission for the United Nations.

She is married to Philip H. Power, chairman of the board of Suburban Communications Corp., and co-publisher of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

Schoolcraft will award more than 700 associate of arts and associate of applied science degrees, also certificates of completion in vocational areas and other two-year non-degree programs.

IN FURTHER action, trustees voted:

•To table further discussion of changing the board of trustees from eight to seven members until Trustee Arch Vallier is present. Vallier, vaca-

tioning in Florida, has not attended the last two board meetings. The item will be on the April 23 agenda.

•Granted sabbatical leaves to John Kyriacopoulos, English 1975-76 school year. Kyriacopoulos plans to spend the winter semester studying Greek and contemporary Greek poetry in Greece. Bloom will spend the fall and winter semesters studying for his doctorate of musical arts in choral conducting at the University of Iowa.

•Send Trustee Ron Cowden to the 1975 National Conference on Trusteeship in Washington DC. The weekend conference, April 20-22, is sponsored by the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges.

# Students like IM program

PLYMOUTH—"The kids run it and they love it," says East Middle School physical education teacher Dan Riggs explaining the middle schools' intramural program.

The intramural program has been in existence for years, but for the time, teams from each of the four middle school in the community will compete with one another.

Comments Riggs, "What's nice about the inter-school competition is that it provides recognition and an alternate program for kids who wouldn't normally participate in the interscholastic sports."

The intramural program is designed as a supplement to the half year of physical education provided children at the middle school level. It is for boys and girls who are not interested in joining the school teams or for sixth graders who are not allowed to by law.

While Riggs and Mrs. Janet Lawson oversee the intramurals at East, it is the students who organize the teams from their homerooms, choose which sports to enter, officiate, and keep all the records and statistics.

"We have had more than 95 per cent participation here and I understand the other middle schools are running at better than 80 per cent," says Riggs, "and that's good because it really gives a kid a chance to be good at something."

Adds the teacher, "A nice feature of the program is that we are able to introduce the students to more sports. We don't duplicate what we offer in

class. If we have softball in gym class during the spring, then we have another sport for the intramural participants. It gives us more of a chance to specialize in our classes.

"For instance, Janet is offering archery this year in her class. If we didn't have the intramurals, she probably wouldn't have been able to."

While teams participate in football, basketball, swimming, track and field and baseball for boys; and track and field, swimming, volleyball and softball for girls, the number of sports available to intramural participants is far greater. They can choose from a myriad of events, including chess, European handball, and wrestling. Fourteen individual and team sports are offered in the intramural program.

**THE FIRST** intramural inter-school championship for eighth graders was held on March 12 and both the girls' and boys' teams from East defeated Pioneer Middle School entries in the finals of floor hockey. According to Riggs, the sixth and seventh grade teams will play sometime after Easter.

The intramural games are currently played during lunch at East (half of the 45 minutes is devoted to eating and the other half to playing), but Riggs hopes to see the program expand in the future to after school games and night games for the finals.

He adds, "I think the kids would get a real kick out of playing under the lights, and if the crowd at the hockey finals is any indication, I'm sure the parents would like to see their kids out there."

# Bicentennial group begins joint effort

An areawide bicentennial commission took its first steps off the ground last week, as representatives from the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township and the Plymouth Community School District met for the first time to discuss 1976 celebration projects.

According to Elizabeth Folger, acting chairperson of the City of Plymouth's bicentennial commission, the committee will serve as an advisory board to local commissions and help stimulate areawide interest in the bicentennial.

The areawide bicentennial concept was first launched by Plymouth City Commissioner Norbert Battermann, who maintained that many bicentennial projects concern the entire Plymouth-Canton area, at a recent intergovernmental council meeting.

At their organizational meeting last week, representatives of the commission endorsed one project, proposed by the city's bicentennial commission, and started the wheels turning for the areawide concept.

**COMMUNITY** commission members agreed to ask their governmental units for a \$200 contribution to cover the commission's administrative costs and appointed a committee, chaired by Brian Kidston, to draft the commission's bylaws.

In addition, the group agreed to create an Advisory Bicentennial Board, composed of area organizations wishing to contribute to the 1976 celebration. The first advisory board meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, May 21.

"The board will promote and stimulate interest in the bicentennial on a wider basis than local groups can do," Mrs. Folger explained. "The purpose is to stimulate as much local interest as possible. The bicentennial is going to be a people's celebration."

To keep the public informed of community bicentennial plans and invite its participation, the group appointed R. T. Thompson, managing editor of the Plymouth-Canton editions of the Observer & Eccentric, and John Foley, III, co-publisher of the Community Crier, as ex-officio members.

ALTHOUGH the group will have no funding authority, Mrs. Folger said the areawide commission will direct groups in applying for state or federal

bicentennial funds and channel local contributions to area projects.

The first project endorsed by the commission will outfit the Plymouth Fire and Drum Corps in 1776 uniforms and equipment, patterned after the Washington Guard Corps of the Revolutionary era. The corps is applying for a \$3,750 state grant. Mrs. Folger said, to match the \$3,750 it hopes to raise.

According to Mrs. Folger, the commission hopes to gain official "state fire and drum corps" status for the 50 member marching group.

For state funding purposes, the commission will consider endorsement of a 30 to 45-minute videotape. "A Plymouth-Canton Bicentennial Salute," at its next meeting.

**THE PLYMOUTH** branch of the American Association of University Women plans to produce the film in conjunction with Plymouth Salem High School's communication students. Featuring past and present community activities, the tape will be shown at the Dunning-Hough Library during the 1975 Fall Festival.

Commission members also encouraged publication of a community history, written by Sam Hudson, author of the "Plymouth Past and Present" columns in the Observer & Eccentric.

Also discussed were plans of the Plymouth Community Arts Council to commission a sculpture, commemorating the bicentennial.

Meetings will be held on the third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the school district's administration building.

and many suburban communities will continue to use federal dollars to maintain their racial and economic exclusiveness."

**JOE GUGGENHEIM**, a member of the Coalition and executive director of the Michigan Committee on Law and Housing headquartered in Detroit, says it is hoped the suburbs will voluntarily amend their applications to comply with the law.

Under a timetable established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which administers CDA grants, suburbs have until April 15 to amend their applications.

Guggenheim says the Coalition hopes each suburb will voluntarily amend its application to comply with the intent of the law. "But if these applications are not revised to comply with the requirements of the CDA we will have no alternative but to insist that HUD, and ultimately the federal courts, block the distribution of these federal funds."

**MADISON** of the NAACP commented: "The implication of the U.S. Supreme Court busing decision is that if equal opportunity laws had been followed to begin with, you may not have had a cross-district case."

"One of the major causes of segregation of the school system is housing patterns," he continued. "and the Supreme Court has left the back door open for us to prove that housing patterns in the metropolitan area is a cause of segregated schools."

Madison continued that housing patterns reflect "primarily racism and segregation on the basis of class. There are many poor whites also being discriminated against."

"I'd rather see open housing laws enforced and so we will give the suburbs the opportunity to revise their applications. Our attorneys have the Coalition's report and will determine if we can enter a case after the Detroit-only busing plan is resolved."

The findings of the Coalition may prove at a later point there may be de jure segregation by the suburbs, Madison said.

son continued, and might be used in an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court against a Detroit-only plan.

"Frankly, I think the Coalition's findings show that governments at all levels have been remiss in enforcing the open housing laws."

Guggenheim and Schrupp stressed the Coalition's interest is that the law be complied with and that suburbs indeed will provide housing for low-income persons who work in the suburb but live elsewhere.

Although the NAACP is a member of the Coalition, as of a month ago, it is interested in the findings to support an argument de jure segregation exists. "We are not prepared to state whether our findings will help the NAACP attorneys," said Guggenheim, "That is not our main concern."

A SUMMARY of evidence in CDA applications that result in discrimination against Blacks and other minorities, prepared by the Coalition, include that:

About half of the 26 suburbs failed to measure "persons expected to reside in the community because they work there," or had no provision to survey the housing needs of those expected to reside;

Almost all didn't measure "persons expected to reside for minority workers," didn't propose any housing to meet needs of those expected to reside, and in their statement of needs failed to consider special needs of minority workers in their community;

About one-third inappropriately measured persons expected to reside, and two-thirds planned housing for senior citizens while ignoring large numbers of non-elderly minority persons. The federal guidelines define "persons expected to reside," explains Guggenheim, as those now

working in the city but not living there.

**THE POSSIBILITY** the suburbs might once again be made part of the busing lawsuit was forecasted earlier by L. Graham Ward of Livonia, a former assistant attorney general who was a participant in the busing (Bradley vs. Milliken).

Ward is now a practicing attorney in Redford Township and an assistant professor of Eastern Michigan University.

The state argued that the U.S. Constitution imposes no duty on school officials to overcome racially imbalanced housing patterns through the administration of school district attendance and feeder patterns, Graham comments.

cities can do for an individual.

Traver, now approaching his 26th birthday, is sold on the community college concept. But it wasn't always that way. In fact, he dropped out of Wayne Memorial High School to join the Army after the ninth grade.

"I really didn't care much about school and decided to enlist," the stocky, dark-haired Traver says. "But when I came out of service in 1969, Richard Burlingame, one of my counselors, advised me to attend night school and finish high school. I was working in a small shop at the time and realized my future was limited. It took me four nights a week to make it but it was worth every minute of it."

After receiving his high school diploma in 1971, he set his sights on becoming a lawyer and is pursuing that goal in Wayne Community College.

"I'll have 60 credit hours at the end of this summer for my associates degree, the equivalent of two years of college."

The aspiring lawyer drove a truck 12 hours a day during the summer besides taking 12 credit hours of college.

"My wife, Jan, and my two boys, Daryl, 5, and Derek, 3, have given me a lot help."

"I'd recommend community college to anyone. In fact, I talked 12 of my buddies into attending WC3, Taylor Kennedy Center," Traver says fervently.

"Every teacher I've had has been great, especially Mike Delehanty, our sociology teacher."

"He's Mr. Contemporary," chimes in classmate Judith Wolkers, 33, a 1959 Wayne Memorial graduate and a secretary at Ford Motor Company.

"Delehanty can really communicate," says Mrs. Wolkers, who concedes she returned to school to get out of a rut.

"You get in that 9-to-5 everyday pattern and you need to get on the outside to find out what's happening. College has been great for me and I've recommended it to all my friends, but they all think it'll be a drag."

Her husband, Royal, also is employed by Ford Motor Company, and he happily watches Kenneth, 7, and Kristen, 4, while his wife attends night college.

These are just some of the happy students who John Harrison, assistant director of Continuing Education and Community School Programs, delights in.

There are many remarkable people among the 400 students at John Glenn Center of WC3," says Harrison.

**HARRISON**, who oversees the community college program at Glenn, for Wayne-Westland schools, cites five main reasons why he feels persons should attend Wayne Community College.

"There is a branch within 15 minutes of anyone in Wayne County. We have an open door policy, which means anyone can attend even without a high school diploma. Credits are transferrable. It's only \$11 per credit hour (as compared to three times that elsewhere) and the teaching is excellent."

has advised us that it is not our responsibility. We can't be named in the suit since we weren't party to it. We were not even advised of the suit in the first place and then we weren't asked to join in the study of the problem after the suit. We really haven't had our day in court so to speak."

Flodin commented, "We could sue them I suppose, it's one possibility we'll have to discuss. They seem to feel that since we have five mills and they only have one they shouldn't have to pay. We will ask for another study from Edison, to see if we can't light the bridge for less money. We are also investigating the legal possibilities as far as having the federal government pay for the lights. They funded the bridge. It might be their obligation to light it."

He added, "If we do pay for the lighting it could be an awfully bad precedent for us. We might be obliged to light all the bridges across the township--and believe me there are plenty of them."

The clerk said, "Let's just say that we are making haste slowly, we don't want to obligate ourselves too soon."



# Board hears school site arguments

Financial questions are blurring the site of a new elementary school in the Plymouth Community School District, as alternative site and access road dollar signs compete for the school, proposed for the Windsor Park Subdivision.

The estimated \$25,000 to \$100,000 additional-cost issue will face school board members at tonight's (Monday) meeting. The answer will determine the fate of the Windsor Park school site near Sheldon and Joy and a temporary access road, required by the Wayne County Road Commission for site plan approval.

School and Canton Township officials met with concerned residents and representatives from the Wayne County Road Commission and Drain

Commissioner's Office Wednesday night to discuss the access road and a possible alternative site for the elementary school, one of three scheduled for a September 1976 opening.

THE SCHOOL board's decision will ultimately hinge on the cost of an alternative site and the cost of an access road. But, if cost figures estimated at last week's meeting are correct, the decision will not be difficult.

Larry Morris, a representative of the architectural firm designing the school, estimated a \$100,000 additional cost for moving the school to another site.

About \$5,000 already has been poured into the Windsor Park site in surveying and soil testing fees, Morris said. Another site would require additional surveying, soil testing and architectural engineering as well as a two-month delay in construction work.

"There would be a penalty for that delay," Morris maintained. "How much I really don't know. But, in our opinion, the construction market has seen its bottom. At this point, I would think you might experience about a two per cent escalation in construction costs for a two-month delay."

Estimated costs of a temporary access road, which would divert con-

struction traffic from two residential streets, Fleet and Arlington, in the Windsor Park Subdivision, are hazier.

GLEN ROBERTS, a representative of Canton Township's engineering consultants, estimated cost of the temporary road and bridge, which would span Tonquish Creek, at \$20,000 to \$25,000.

According to School Supt. John M. Hoben, the school district's estimate is pegged at \$50,000 to \$80,000.

"I CAN UNDERSTAND the residents' concerns," said Mrs. Borowski. "But since I honestly don't believe we have the funds to build an access road, I'd like to know if these people (Canton Township and Windsor Park residents) would like to chip in."

To that, Greenstein retorted, to a round of applause. "The township does not have the funds. I want to remind the school board in the gentlest of terms that you forget you represent the people, and they fund all the things you want to do."

"It seems to me that when you have a \$25,000 expenditure, any consideration not to build that access road or the school should warrant the harshest of criticisms. The suggestion I just heard is preposterous. I urge

you to get off this thing and find the money."

School Board Trustee Carl Berry added, "I have to take a sympathetic opinion to what Mrs. Borowski said. But I do believe the access road is the direct responsibility of the school district because of the safety factor, and because the only people using it would be building the school."

THE ESTIMATED cost of the three elementary schools has risen since the bond issue to build them was approved, Mrs. Borowski said. The access road would subtract from equipment funds.

But, as Morris pointed out, the state of the economy could generate lower construction bids than estimated.

Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith was present at last week's meeting and urged school board members to approve the temporary access road.

"I actually don't think we're even talking \$20,000," Smith said. "I don't think these people are unreasonable in asking for it."

Deputy School Supt. Earl Hogan said school board members will consider last week's discussion in making their decision.

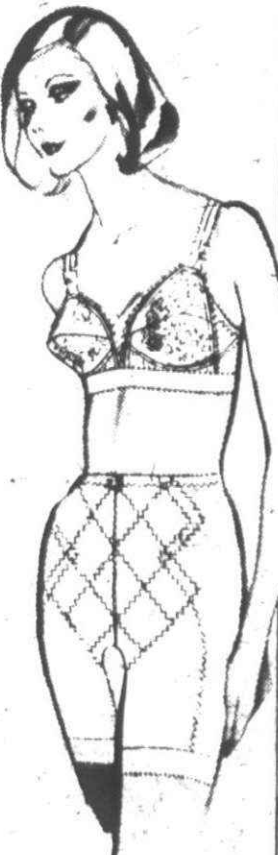

# '74 gas shortage caused commuter serendipity

For a small group of residents of Plymouth and Livonia, last year's gasoline shortage was not all bad. It launched them into unaccustomed roles as bus commuters to their jobs at the Ford Motor Co. in Dearborn.

Today, while the number of daily commuters has dropped from 78 to 25, bus transportation is still a viable way for these Ford employees to reach their jobs.

Lack of fuel early last year caused Bart Quello of Plymouth to amass about 150 signatures of Ford employees, who thought they might be interested in an alternative method of commuting.

He took the names to the South-

eastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA), which early in March, 1974 obliged the residents of Livonia and Plymouth with a commuter run. The service is called Direct Access Shuttle (DASH).

The bus originated at the Ford plant near Sheldon and Five Mile, Plymouth, and then traveled express to Wonderland Shopping Center, Livonia. At the west end of the center it picked up commuters and sped off for Dearborn by way of Plymouth and Evergreen roads and the Southfield expressway.

When the system began, four buses made the trip in the morning, three from Plymouth and one from Livonia. SEMTA records of ridership indicate that on March 7, 1974, 32 morn-

ing commuters took the first bus, 13 took the Livonia bus, 23 took the third bus and 10, the fourth.

DASH dropped its riders off at the Ford Division building, the engineering buildings, at scientific research, body engineering, the design center and the Engine and Electrical Engineering buildings.

By summer, however, the love affair between Ford employees and public transportation cooled considerably. Gas became more available, although expensive.

Responding to their new ridership figures, SEMTA reduced the rolling stock by half in August. By October, it limited DASH to one bus for the hard-core riders who remained faithful.

"OUR BUSES are not the most comfortable in the world," said Quello, a products development engineer in the Mustang-Pinto department. "But SEMTA tells us new ones are coming, maybe the ones with the latest recliner seats and air conditioning."

"That would be a grand way to go." For him, commuting is working out well. "I think the majority of other riders would say they like it," he said. "You don't have to worry about wear and tear on the car, and it gives you a good chance to catch up on your reading."

Quello is a bus captain, selected by SEMTA as the person to transmit passenger suggestions and problems to the authority. According to Linda Zenger, passenger representative at

SEMTA, the bus captains on DASH's various lines are effective.

"They're the reason it really works," she said.

Quello added: "I wouldn't handle this if I didn't think it is a fine way to go to work and relax on the way. It will make my car live longer. I enjoy the comradeship on the bus. We all kid around a little."

LIVONIAN Bill Sellars agrees with him.

"I like commuting very much," he said. "It is very relaxing, and you don't have to fight the weather. It gives you a chance to unwind on the way home from work."

Like Quello, Sellars also gets some reading done. DASH allows him to

leave his two cars for his wife and teen-age daughters, who need them to commute to jobs.

"We have a friendly group—by now I know most of the people who ride," he added. "The service has been good. We've only had a couple of delays. I think the bus makes as good time as we would driving."

The bus leaves Plymouth at 6:55 a.m., and Livonia at 7:17 a.m. Its first stop in Dearborn is at 7:49 a.m. In the evening it departs the Ford complex at 4:35 p.m., arriving at Wonderland at 5:12 p.m., and in Plymouth at 5:37.

A Plymouth commuter pays \$34.10 for a monthly roundtrip ticket. A Livonian pays \$28.60.

## Workers ignored

# Suburbs asked to revise housing applications

Twenty-six suburbs in the metropolitan Detroit area will be notified within 10 days they stand to lose federal Community Development Act (CDA) funding unless they comply with civil rights requirements by April 15.

The Coalition for Black Grant Compliance, headquartered in Detroit, has analyzed applications from 26 suburbs for CDA money and announced they

were in flagrant violation of the act.

The suburbs have, under guidelines of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), until April 15 to revise applications.

THE COALITION has already notified HUD, the Michigan Civil Rights Commission, and Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) that immediate corrective actions are needed from the 26 suburbs — which include Livonia, Westland, Redford, Southfield, Rochester, and Garden City.

If the suburbs don't revise their applications by April 15, the coalition reports it will insist that HUD, and ultimately the federal courts, block distribution of CDA funds.

The charge of systematic and pervasive housing discrimination patterns was made by the coalition

Friday after completing an analysis of the 26 applications submitted before March 1 to SEMCOG.

"This analysis indicates that little or no housing has been proposed to meet the needs of non-resident workers 'expected to reside' in these municipalities, and that the types of housing proposed in most cases are types of housing that are not likely to be available to minority group families," states Clifford Schrupp of the Northwest Inter-Faith Center for Racial Justice and a coalition leader.

Joe Guggenheim, another coalition leader and executive director of the Michigan Committee on Law and Housing, explained congress assumes persons working in the community should be "expected to reside" in that city at some point in the future.

The 26 suburban applications asked for a total of about 2,700 housing

units. Of the total, 1,970 units were to house senior citizens; 360 units were of owner-occupied housing to be rehabilitated for present occupants, and 368 units were rental housing for the non-elderly.

Of the 368 units of rental housing, 322 would be existing housing that's up to code and would likely be occupied by residents. Only 46 units would be either rehabilitated housing or newly constructed housing for non-elderly families.

The 322 units of vacant existing housing would be made available through municipal housing commissions, says Schrupp, and will most likely be occupied by present residents.

LIVONIA is entitled to a first-year grant of \$266,000 and has 41 black residents, the coalition's analysis reported.

Census data and information from the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) indicate Livonia has a need to provide 255 units for the elderly. It is planning 150 units. The same sources indicate Livonia has a need for 497 units for the non-elderly. But with a 497-unit need, the city has planned for only 38 units.

WESTLAND is entitled to a \$276,000 grant the first year and has a black population of 2,234 persons.

Data indicates Westland has a need for 317 senior citizen units and plans to provide 300, and a need for 1,940

non-elderly units and plans to provide for 358.

GARDEN CITY in the first year would receive \$208,000 and its population includes 10 blacks.

The data shows Garden City has a need to provide 130 units for senior citizens, yet it is planning to build 190. It has a need for 342 units for the non-elderly and plans to build "0" units.


REDFORD TOWNSHIP would receive \$202,000 the first year and has 17 blacks.

Data indicates Redford has a need for 841 units for its elderly and is planning 10 units, and a need for 777 units for the non-elderly and is attempting 10 units. All would be financed through HUD.

THE COALITION points out that the congressional intent in adopting the CDA was:

"The committee wishes to emphasize that the bill requires communities, in assessing their housing needs, to look beyond the needs of their residents to those who can be expected to reside in the community as well. Clearly, those already employed in the community can be expected to reside there."

# College parking rules get teeth

Anyone parking his or her car on the Schoolcraft College campus better heed posted parking areas and other traffic regulations, or run the risk of receiving a ticket.

Because of increasing parking problems the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees voted unanimously March 19 to authorize college security officers to issue citations under existing Livonia city ordinances. The program is being administered under an agreement between the City of Livonia and the board of trustees.

Under the new procedure, tickets will be payable in 16th District Court, Five Mile and Farmington roads, Livonia. The policy will go into effect Monday, April 7.

UNDER Livonia Ordinance 1130, campus security officers also may tow and impound vehicles that are parked in fire lanes and other marked towing zones. Cars will be taken to the Livonia pound on Levan, north of Schoolcraft.

The board also voted 5-1 to approve a second resolution to take care of outstanding tickets. Under the plan, all outstanding tickets will be summarized and notice of violations will be sent to each person. An individual will have 10 college working days in which to file an appeal with the SC traffic appeals board.

The appeals board is composed of three students, one faculty member, one administrator, a member of the office staff, and a chairperson, who presently is a student. The appeals board will schedule hearings.

THE COLLEGE will now be able to collect fines either voluntarily or at the time when an employee leaves

Schoolcraft. Student violations, if not paid voluntarily, will be collected before graduation or any subsequent registration. The college will withhold a student's transcript of records until outstanding tickets are paid.

Trustee Rosina Raymond voted against the second resolution, saying the procedure should be postponed to allow more feedback.

Richard Arlen, president of the Schoolcraft Faculty Forum, said the faculty will file a grievance against the board because it was not given a chance to discuss the parking question. Arlen said working conditions are a part of the teacher's contract and should be negotiated.

"If a grievance is filed, so what," replied Trustee Gerald Cox. "This has been discussed thoroughly at open meetings." (The matter was discussed at a regular board meeting Feb. 26).

IN OTHER related matters the board voted 6-0 to dissolve the Citi-

zen's Advisory Committee—Career Needs of Women.

Dr. Nelson Grote, Schoolcraft president, pointed out that since the 23-member committee was formed in 1971 many members have moved out of the district. "Lifestyles have changed and there are people who no longer are interested or have the time to serve on this committee."

Grote added the administration will

immediately appoint a new committee to work in cooperation with the college Women's Resource Center. The new committee will include former members who want to serve and other interested persons.

"The new committee will continue to expand and develop specialized programs and services for all women in the community," Grote said.

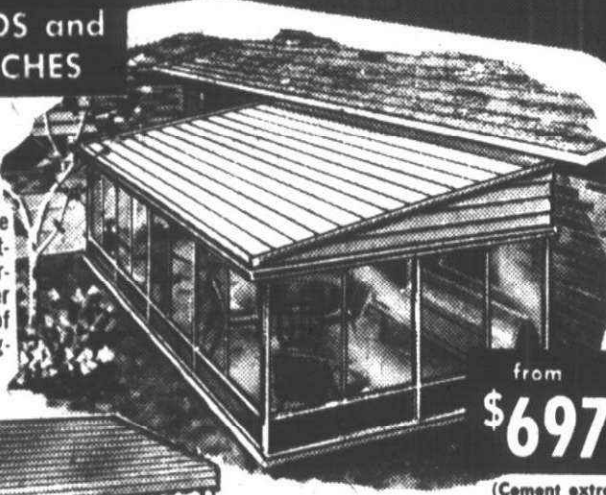

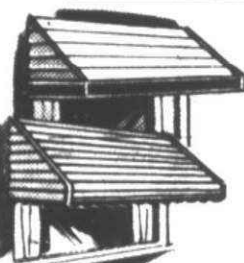

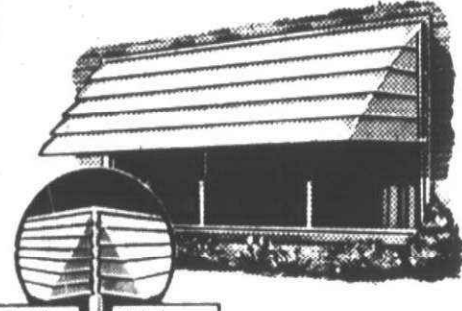

# CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON

## Board Proceedings

A regular meeting of the Township Board of the Charter Township of Canton was held on March 11, 1975 at 8:00 P.M. at 128 Canton Center Road.

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor Greenstein.

Members Present: Greenstein, Flodin, Parsell, Cheske, Poole, Schwall

Members Absent: Myers

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the Minutes of February 4, 1975, be approved as read.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that the Minutes of February 11, 1975 be approved as read.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the Minutes of February 19, 1975 be approved as read.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the Minutes of February 25, 1975 be approved as read.

A motion was made by Flodin and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the Treasurer's Report be approved as presented.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Schwall that the proposed change of zoning of the C-2 property on both sides of Canton Center Road between Ford and Warren Roads from 600' to 400' be tabled.

Yes: Poole, Schwall

No: Greenstein, Flodin, Parsell, Cheske

The motion failed.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Cheske that the subject properties on the east and west side of Canton Center Road between Ford and Warren Roads be rezoned to C-2, General Business to a depth of 400' pending the adoption of the new master plan.

Yes: Greenstein, Parsell, Cheske

No: Flodin, Poole, Schwall

The motion failed.

A motion was made by Schwall and supported by Cheske that Section i, which permitted political signs only in residential districts be removed.

The motion failed.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Schwall and carried that a ground sign serving shopping center developments may exceed 60 square feet in area but not more than 150 square feet.

Yes: Greenstein, Flodin, Parsell, Cheske, Schwall

No: Poole

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that section 424 of the Zoning Ordinance relating to signs be introduced and published:

### Section 4.24 Signs

#### a) Signs General

##### 1. Measurement of Area of Sign

The entire area within a circle, triangle or parallelogram enclosing the extreme limits of writing, representation, emblem, or any figure of similar character, together with any frame or other material or color forming an integral part of the display or used to differentiate such sign from the background against which it is placed; excluding necessary supports or uprights on which sign is placed but including any sign tower.

Where a sign has two or more faces, the area of all faces shall be included in determining the area of the sign, except that which two such faces are placed back to back and are at no point more than two (2) feet from one another the area of the sign shall be taken as the area of one face if the two faces are of equal area, or as the area of the larger face if the two faces are of unequal area.

##### 2. Permit Required.

Except as otherwise provided in this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to erect, alter, relocate or maintain within the Township of Canton any sign or advertising structure, without first obtaining a permit from the Township Building Inspector. A sign not expressly permitted by Section 4.24, is prohibited.

(i) The Township Building Inspector shall provide application forms and may require of the applicant such information and descriptive material, plans or drawings so as to determine compliance with this and other applicable ordinances of Canton Township.

(ii) A permit fee shall be paid to the Township of Canton at the time the permit is applied for, according to a fee schedule adopted by the Township Board.

(iii) The provisions of this section shall not apply to the normal servicing, changing of an existing sign, message, or to the cleaning of a sign, the changing of advertising on a sign specifically designated for periodic change of message without a change in structure such as a billboard, bulletin board of similar type of sign.

(iiii) Any sign that is moved to another location either on the same or to another premises, shall be considered a new sign and a permit shall be required for any work performed in connection therewith when required by this Ordinance.

(iii) As an additional condition precedent to obtaining a permit the contractor, at his expense, shall provide and keep in force during the entire year, comprehensive general liability insurance in the minimum limits of liability insurance to bodily injury of one hundred thousand dollars for each person and three hundred thousand dollars for each occurrence; and in respect to property damage, fifty thousand dollars for each accident. Said policy of insurance shall be conditioned to hold the Township of Canton harmless of every damage of whatsoever nature, whether to persons or property, for which the Township may be held liable by reason of, or which is occasioned, by the doing of an act or the exercise of the privilege for which the permit was granted.

##### (iiii) Abandoned Signs.

(a) Deposit at time of application. The applicant shall deposit with the Township cash, as established by the Township Board the amount of which shall be sufficient to cover the cost of removing a temporary sign.

(b) The deposit will be retained by the Township throughout the life of the temporary sign and will be returned to the owner as soon as possible after the sign has been completely removed from the premises at the owner's expense.

(c) If the business or activity to which the sign pertains appears to be abandoned, the Township Building Inspector or Ordinance Officer shall exercise all reasonable means at his disposal to determine whether abandonment actually has occurred. If, after completion of his investigation, he determines that the business or activity has been abandoned for a period of ninety (90) days or more, the deposit will be considered forfeited and the Township will undertake to remove and dispose of the sign.

##### 3. Material Requirements.

Materials of construction for signs and sign structures shall be of quality and grade as specified by the Canton Township Building Code.

(a) Underground Wiring: Where illumination is desired, underground wiring shall be required for all signs not attached to a building.

(b) Hours of illumination: External signs may not be illuminated between the hours of 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. except those pertaining to a business open during these hours.

(c) Illumination of signs shall be directed or shaded so as not to interfere with the vision of persons on the adjacent highways or adjacent properties. Such determination shall be made by the Building Department.

##### 4. Nonconforming Signs.

(i) It is the intent of this section to recognize that the eventual elimination as expeditiously as is reasonable, of existing signs that are not in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance, is as much a subject of health, safety and welfare as is the prohibition of new signs that would violate the provisions of this Ordinance. It is also the intent of this Section that any elimination of nonconforming signs shall be effected so as to avoid any unreasonable invasion of established private property rights.

##### (ii) No nonconforming Signs:

(a) Shall be changed to another nonconforming sign;

(b) Shall have any changes made in the words or symbols used or the message displayed on the sign unless the sign is designed for periodic change of message;

(c) Shall be structurally altered so as to prolong the life of the sign or so as to change the shape, size, type or design of the sign;

(d) Shall have the face or faces changed when such sign is not of a type of construction to permit such a complete change of face;

(e) Shall be re-established after the activity, business or usage to which it relates has been discontinued for ninety (90) days or longer; and

(f) Shall be re-established after damage of destruction if the estimated expense of reconstruction exceeds fifty (50%) percent of the appraised replacement cost as determined by the Administrator.

##### 5. Signs Permitted in All Zoning District.

The following signs are permitted in all zoning districts where the principal permitted use to which they are related is a permitted use in that district.

(i) Signs permitted and not requiring a sign permit;

(a) House numbers, name plates (apartments and professional) identifying the occupant or address of a parcel of land and not exceeding two (2) square feet in area.

(b) Memorial signs or tablets, names of buildings and date or erection, when cut into any masonry surface or when constructed of bronze or other incombustible material.

(c) Signs painted on or permanently attached to motor vehicles which are legally licensed and primarily used upon the highways for the transporting of persons, goods or equipment; provided that no such vehicle displaying a sign may be parked within the required setback of any business for the purpose of advertising any product or service of that business.

(d) Flags bearing the official design of a nation, state, municipality, educational institution, or noncommercial organization.

(e) Traffic or other municipal signs such as the following: legal notices, railroad crossing, danger and other emergency signs as may be approved by the Township Board.

(f) Community special event signs approved by the Township Board.

(g) Theatre-hotel marquee advertising, provided that said advertising is wholly contained within the basic marquee face.

(h) Gasoline service stations only may display the following special signs which are deemed customary and necessary to their respective businesses:

-- Customary lettering or other insignia on a gasoline pump consisting of the brand of gasoline sold, lead warning sign, and any other sign required by law and not exceeding a total of three (3) square feet on each pump.

-- A single non-illuminated double-faced sign per gasoline pump island, each of which shall not exceed four (4) square feet in area, may be placed on a gasoline pump island; said sign may extend a maximum of two (2) feet above the pumps.

(i) Signs not exceeding two (2) square feet which contain only noncommercial messages including designation of rest rooms, telephone locations and direction of door openings.

(j) Signs, non-illuminated, advertising land or buildings for rent, lease and/or sale when located on the land or building intended to be rented, leased, and/or sold and not exceeding five (5) square feet in area. Signs indicating that land or buildings have been sold are limited to thirty (30) days before being removed from premises.

(k) Institutional use bulletin board, non-illuminated, not exceeding eighteen (18) square feet in area or an overall height of six (6) feet, for churches, schools or public buildings or uses.

(l) Political signs permitted only in Residential districts. See Section 4.24 (b), (i), and (ii).

(ii) Signs permitted and requiring a sign permit:

(a) Institutional bulletin boards subject to the area, height and placement regulations for ground-pole or wall signs.

(b) Private traffic control signs which conform to the requirements of the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices published in accordance with Section 608 of Public Act 300 of 1949, as amended.

##### (c) Freestanding Ground Signs:

Signs pertaining to a real estate development designed to promote the sale of lots or buildings within a subdivision located within the Township, may be permitted on a temporary basis in any use district, but shall be located upon such land that is part of the subdivision or property being advertised for sale and shall be subject to the requirements and conditions of all applicable codes and ordinances of the Township, as approved by the Building Inspector, and a temporary permit issued. Such non-accessory signs shall not exceed one hundred and twenty (120) square feet in size nor an overall height of twelve (12) feet. Placement shall comply with the building setback requirements. A sign indicating a model dwelling unit's name may be permitted within the front yard setback provided the sign does not exceed two (2) square feet. Residential real estate subdivisions may be allowed two (2) directional signs within the Township by the Board of Zoning Appeals provided such signs are no larger than twenty (20) square feet and are located in such a manner as not to create a traffic hazard are not injurious to the surrounding neighborhood and are not contrary with the spirit and purpose of this Ordinance.

Setback Requirements: All ground signs shall be setback, ¾ off the distance required for building setback.

A one hundred (\$100.00) dollar deposit for each temporary sign to insure proper maintenance and removal shall be made to the Township to be reimbursed, minus administrative and inspection fee, as established by the Township Board, upon removal of this temporary sign.

Add Section 4.31. Site Plan Review. For the purposes of this Ordinance, a site plan shall be defined as a map or drawing of the entire lot or parcel of land upon which building or structure is to be constructed.

a) Procedures. Fifteen (15) copies of the site plan shall be submitted by the proprietor to the Township. At a regular Planning Commission meeting these copies shall be distributed to the Township Fire Chief, Engineer, and Planner. At a subsequent regular Planning Commission meeting, written reports regarding the site plan shall be submitted for review by the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission shall review the plans and make a recommendation to the Township Board. The proprietor shall then submit ten (10) copies of the site plan to the Township Clerk and be placed on the Township Board agenda. At a meeting of the Township Board, the plans shall be reviewed and approved or disapproved. If approved by the Township Board, the proprietor can submit construction plans to the Building Inspector for a permit to build.

##### b) Implementation.

An approved site plan shall be immediately transmitted to the Building Department and all non-building requirements of such site plan shall be installed prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy unless otherwise specifically approved by the Township Board, and shall, thereafter, be maintained with materials of equal or greater quality as the materials originally installed.

##### c) Limitation.

Whenever the Township Board approves a site plan, such approval shall continue to be valid for a period of one (1) year only from the date of such action by the Board. If the applicant does not obtain a building permit and commence construction within one (1) year period or be granted a time extension by the Board such site plan approval shall be deemed void at the expiration of said period. The one (1) year limitation shall become effective on all site plans at the time of adoption of this amendment. This does not, however, exempt all site plans approved prior to this Amendment from meeting new site plan review standards or other Zoning Ordinance changes adopted by the Township Board.

##### d) Conditional Right.

Approval of the site plan under Section 4.31 by the Township Board shall confer upon the proprietor for a period of one (1) year from the date of approval, the conditional right that the terms and conditions of the Zoning Ordinance under which approval was granted will not be changed.

##### e) Review Considerations:

In the process of reviewing the site plan, the following will be considered:

1. Is the proposed use or uses in harmony with the purposes of the Zoning District and is the general public health, safety and welfare protected?

2. Does traffic circulation assure:

a) Safety and convenience of both vehicular and pedestrian traffic both within the site and in relation to access streets?

b) Satisfactory and harmonious relations between the development on the site and existing and prospective development.

3. Are public utilities adequate to serve the development?

4. Is storm drainage adequate to ensure that adjacent properties are protected from undue storm water runoff?

5. Are landscaping, fencing, and setback areas sufficient to adequately buffer adjacent properties from possible detrimental environmental and nuisance hazards?

All landscape treatment of the site, including the labeling of all materials as to type and size, when installed, shall be provided.

6. Are the requirements of this Ordinance and other applicable Township Ordinances, site planning standards and development guidelines adequately met?

Change Section 8.04. Site plan review to read: Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Change Section 9.02 (6) to read:

(6) Approval of Site Plan. Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Change Section 12.05 to read: Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Change Section 13.05 to read: Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Add Section 14.08. Site plan Approval. Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Add Section 15.03. (e): Site Plan Approval. Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Add Section 16.04. Site plan approval. Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

Add Section 17.06. Site plan approval. Site plan approval shall be required as indicated in Section 4.31.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that Section 8 and 12 of the Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows and introduced and published.

### ARTICLE VIII

#### R-M MULTIPLE DWELLING RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

2. In Section 8.03 change height of fence to five (5) feet.

#### 3. Add Section 8.06 Design and Requirements.

The following design standards in the RM Districts shall apply:

a) No principal or accessory building shall exceed two hundred and fifty (250) feet in length.

b) Dual access throughout a multiple site is required for emergency vehicle access. No dead end street shall be more than three hundred (300) feet in length. A suitable turning space shall be provided for vehicles at the terminus of all dead end streets.

c) All main access drives in a multiple site must be free of on-street parking. The minimum width of an access drive shall be twenty-four (24) feet.

d) Parking within the required front yard shall be prohibited. Parking within the required side and rear yards shall be permitted, except that parking lots, or access drives adjacent to single-family districts must be located a minimum of ten (10) feet from the property line.

e) No building shall be closer than twenty-five (25) feet to any street, private access road or driveway.

f) No dwelling unit in a development shall be located more than one hundred (100) feet from a street, private access road or parking lot.

g) No entrance to a dwelling unit or building shall be more than one hundred and fifty (150) feet from a parking lot, measured along the sidewalk leading to the parking lot.

h) Where multiple family zones abut freeway right-of-ways, a visual and highway noise buffer composed of a six (6) foot high contoured earth berm with densely planted evergreens of a type which at maturity will extend a minimum of four (4) feet above the berm shall be provided. Such plantings shall be composed of at least two (2) staggered rows, planted ten (10) feet on center. Approval of planting shall be determined at site plan approval time.

i) Modifications of the foregoing requirements may be made by the Township Planning Commission in order to accommodate site plans which may not be conventional in design and to which these provisions do not practically apply; provided that such modifications shall not violate the intent of the Ordinance and insure that such modifications will result in a healthy and safe living environment within the development and will not be in any way detrimental to adjacent properties.

#### 4. Add Section 8.07 Height and Placement Requirements.

Area, height and placement requirements for the RM, Multiple Dwelling Residential District are defined in accordance with the attached Schedule of Regulations, Article XVIII.

#### Add Section 9.02 (7)

(7) Pads and Piers. Each mobile home site shall be provided with a concrete pad, not less than four (4) inches in thickness, or of equal bearing strength if reinforced concrete is used. In no case shall the pad be less than the overall length and width of the mobile home. In addition to pads, piers with a minimum forty two (42) inch foundation shall be provided at all stress points of the mobile home.

### ARTICLE XII

#### C-2 GENERAL BUSINESS DISTRICT

#### 1. Delete Section 12.03 a) and add:

a) Automatic automobile car wash establishments when completely enclosed within a building, including steam cleaning, provided further that:

Minimum frontage shall be seventy (70) feet with a minimum depth of three hundred (300) feet.

2) No automatic automobile car wash shall be within one hundred fifty (150) feet of a residential zone.

3) Off street parking and waiting spaces in accordance with Article VI.

4) The principal building shall be set back not less than eighty-five (85) feet from the public right-of-way.

Self-service or coin operated auto washes when completely enclosed within a building provided further that:

1) Vacuuming facilities may be outside the building but shall not be in the front yard and shall not be closer than one hundred (100) feet from any Residential District.

2) The building shall not be less than one hundred and fifty (150) feet from a Residential District.

All off-street parking areas shall be hard-surfaced and dust free and shall be in conformance with Article VI.

Any lights used to illuminate the area shall be directed away from adjacent residential properties.

2. Outdoor sales space for sale of new and used vehicles or of new and used house trailers or boats, provided that there may be sales space for used vehicles only if carried on by an authorized new car dealer in conjunction with a regularly authorized new car sales or trailer and service agency which is housed in a permanent building.

(1) A used car lot or trailer and service agency must have direct access with at least one hundred and fifty (150) feet of frontage along a major thoroughfare with an existing or proposed right-of-way of 121 feet.

(2) There shall be a minimum lot area of fifteen thousand (15,000) square feet.

(3) All off-street parking and display areas shall be hard surfaced and dust free.

(4) No vehicles shall be parked less than forty (40) feet from a public right-of-way.

(5) All lighting or illuminated display shall not reflect onto any adjacent properties and that lights shall not be strung out.

(6) Pennants, streamers or other forms of display matter shall be prohibited.

#### 3. Change j) to read:

j) Wholesale stores, warehouses and distributing plants provided such buildings shall not be closer than one hundred and fifty (150) feet from a residential district.

# ARTICLE XVIII

## FOOTNOTES TO SCHEDULE OF REGULATIONS

- Does not include area of porches, terraces, breezeways, attached garages, utility rooms, attics or basements. A house without a basement shall increase its floor area by two hundred (200) square feet of floor area.
- The lot depth shall not be greater than two and a half times (2½) the lot width.
- Accessory farm buildings may increase height restrictions to forty (40) feet and a silo may be increased to one hundred (100) feet in height.
- Water refers to a public water system; sewer refers to a public sewage system.
- All accessory farm buildings for uses other than those usually incidental to the dwelling, shall be located not less than one hundred (100) feet from any dwelling and not less than twenty five (25) feet from any lot line or property boundary, with the exception that the main farm building shall not be less than one hundred and fifty (150) feet from the front property line. This requirement shall not apply to the alteration or addition to an existing barn or other farm buildings which are located closer to the road and which existed prior to the adoption of this Ordinance.
- Every lot on which is erected a principal building or structure used for non-dwelling purposes, such structure, other than its accessory building, shall have a side yard on each side of such structure and each such side yard shall not be less than thirty-five (35) feet in width. With an increase of one (1) foot in width for each five (5) feet or part thereof by which the said principal building or structure exceeds thirty-five feet (35) in overall dimension along the side yard; and also an additional one (1) foot for every two (2) feet in height in excess of thirty-five (35) feet.
- Depth need not be doubled for two-family units.
- For every lot on which an apartment or townhouse building is erected, there shall be provided a yard space on each side of the lot. This yard space shall be increased beyond the yard spaces indicated by two (2) feet for each ten (10) feet or part thereof by which the length of the apartment or townhouse building exceeds forty (40) feet in overall dimension, along the adjoining lot line.

Distances between buildings shall be provided based on the following building relationships:

- end to end - twenty (20) feet
- end to rear or front - fifty (50) feet
- front to front or rear to rear - forty (40) feet plus two (2) feet for each ten (10) feet by which the combined length of the buildings exceed eighty (80) feet.
- Each additional bedroom in excess of three (3) bedrooms, shall contain a minimum of eight (80) square feet.
- A mobile home park or trailer coach park shall be constructed or maintained on a lot or a parcel which has a width of at least two hundred (200) feet frontage on a major thoroughfare and a depth of at least four hundred (400) feet.
- Where motels are permitted in C-2 and C-3 Districts, a minimum of two hundred and forty (240) square feet of floor space per motel unit shall be provided. Where kitchen facilities are provided, a minimum of three hundred and forty (340) square feet of floor space shall be provided.
- On a corner lot which abuts upon a street on the same side or on the opposite side of the same block and is zoned a Residential District, there shall be provided a setback twenty (20) feet on the side of the residential district.
- Parking is permitted within the front yard setback. If parking is placed in the front yard setback then a greenbelt strip along the front property line according to the following schedule is required:

- C-1 Local Business District - Ten (10) foot greenbelt with a minimum three (3) foot high berm and appropriate landscaping.
- C-2 General Business District - Fifteen (15) foot greenbelt with a minimum four (4) foot high berm and appropriate landscaping.
- C-3 General Highway Oriented - Twenty (20) foot greenbelt with a minimum four (4) foot high berm and appropriate landscaping.
- C-5 Planned Shopping District - Thirty Five (35) foot greenbelt with a minimum four (4) foot high berm and appropriate landscaping.
- M-1 Light Industrial - Thirty five (35) foot greenbelt and with appropriate landscaping.
- M-2 General Industrial - Fifty (50) foot greenbelt with appropriate landscaping.

(o) Loading and unloading space shall be provided only in the side and rear yards and is subject to the requirements of Article VI.

(p) Where M-1 and M-2 Districts abut directly upon any Agricultural or Residential District, the side yard adjacent these districts shall be increased to forty (40) feet for the M-1 Light Industrial district and fifty (50) feet for the M-2, Heavy Industrial Zone. A landscaped greenbelt, as defined in Article II, shall be provided and maintained along its entire length by the users of the M-1 or M-2 zoned property. The remainder of the side yard area shall be in well kept lawn or other materials acceptable to the Planning Commission. All landscaping shall be maintained in a health growing condition, neat and orderly in appearance. If the M-1 or M-2 zoned property abuts a railroad spur or siding located along the property line or within a required yard space, then this particular yard requirement may be modified or waived by the Planning Commission.

(q) The requirements for each mobile home site within a mobile home park are:

- Minimum site size: Single - Area - 5,000 Sq. Ft.  
Width - 50 Ft.  
Doublewide - Area - 6,000 Sq. Ft.  
Width - 60 Ft.
- Minimum yard space: Front - a mobile home shall be at least twenty-two (22) feet from the front of the mobile home site.
- Rear - a mobile home shall be at least fifteen (15) feet from the rear of a mobile home site line.
- Side: Each mobile home will be at least twenty-five (25) feet from the nearest mobile home.

(r) Residences with attached garages facing street may have each side yard five (5) feet in width minimum.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that a moratorium be placed on the issuance of sign permits until the amended Ordinance is in effect.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the proposed Consumer Protection Agency Ordinance be introduced and tabled.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the following resolution in connection with the application for Federal Flood Insurance be adopted:

WHEREAS, the CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON has adopted and is enforcing the TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE and

WHEREAS, Section 19.03 PERMITS of the aforesaid prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the BUILDING INSPECTOR, and

WHEREAS, the BUILDING DEPARTMENT must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON as follows:

1. That the BUILDING DEPARTMENT shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage; and

2. That the BUILDING DEPARTMENT shall review subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments to assure that (i) all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and

3. That the BUILDING DEPARTMENT shall require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that the sanitary sewer in Sunflower Village Subdivision No. 2 be accepted for use and maintenance.

## CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDINANCE NO.

### SOIL EROSION AND SEDIMENTATION CONTROL ORDINANCE

An ordinance to provide for the control of soil erosion and to protect the waters of the Township from sedimentation; to prescribe the powers, duties and functions of the Township Enforcing Agency; to provide for the promulgation of rules; to establish a fee schedule; to establish design standards and specifications, and to provide remedies and penalties for violations thereof.

#### ARTICLE I. GENERAL

Sec. 101 Purpose: The purpose of this Ordinance is to control soil erosion and the resulting sedimentation and to protect the waters of the Township by requiring adequate provisions for water disposal and protection of soil surfaces in order to promote the safety, public health, convenience and general welfare of the community.

Sec. 102 Definitions: Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this Ordinance shall be as follows:

- "Agricultural Practices" means land tillage operations necessarily associated with the planting and harvesting of crops.
- "Authorized Public Agency" means a local, State or County agency designated by the State Department of Natural Resources to enforce soil erosion and sedimentation control requirements.

(3) "Building Inspector" is the Chief Building Inspector of the Township or his authorized representative.

(4) "Earth Change" means a man-made change in the natural cover or topography of land, including stripping, cutting, and filling activities, which may result in or contribute to soil erosion or sedimentation of the water of the Township.

(5) "Excavation" is any act by which soil or rock is cut into, dug, quarried, uncovered, removed, displaced, or relocated.

(6) "Fifty Year Flood Plain" is that area which would be inundated by flood waters which would occur with a fifty (50) year recurrence frequency.

(7) "Grading" means any stripping, excavating, filling, stock piling or any combination thereof.

(8) "Grading Permit" is a permit issued to authorize work to be performed under this Ordinance.

(9) "Grading Plans" means plans which specify that earth changes will occur as a result of grading operations.

(10) "Land Development Regulations" means standards and specifications for soil erosion control as used by the Wayne County Soil Conservation District.

(11) "Land Use" means a use of land which may result in an earth change, including but not limited to subdivision residential, commercial, industrial, recreational or other development, private and public highway, road and street construction, drainage construction, logging operations, agricultural practices and mining.

(12) "Person" means a natural person, firm, corporation, partnership, agency or association.

(13) "Rules" means the standards and specifications promulgated in the Land Development Regulations.

(14) "Sedimentation" means solid particle matter, mineral or organic, that has been deposited in water, is suspended in water, is being transported, or has been removed from its site of origin by the processes of soil erosion.

(15) "Soil Erosion" means the wearing away of land by the action of wind, water, gravity, or a combination thereof.

(16) "Township Enforcing Agency" is the Building Department.

(17) "Watercourse" means those rivers, creeks, streams and ditches noted on the Township Master Storm Drainage Plan.

#### ARTICLE II. COMPLIANCE REQUIREMENTS

Sec. 201 Grading Plan Approval. No grading plans shall be approved unless said grading plans shall include soil erosion and sediment control measures consistent with the requirements of this Ordinance and Land Development Regulations.

Sec. 202 Occupancy Permit Approval. No certificate of occupancy will be issued until the requirements of this Ordinance and all soil erosion and sediment control measures have been completed.

#### ARTICLE III. PERMITS AND FEES

Sec. 301 Requirement of Grading Permit: Except as exempted by Article V of this Ordinance, no person shall make any earth change which is connected with any land use activities which disturb a parcel an acre or more in area or if the earth change is within 500 feet of a watercourse unless he has a grading permit issued by the Building Inspector.

Sec. 302 Permit Application: A separate application shall be required for each grading permit. A grading plan, specifications and schedules shall be submitted with each application for a grading permit. The plans shall be prepared or approved and signed by a professional engineer or architect. The Building Inspector may waive the preparation or approval and signature by the professional engineer or architect when the work entails little hazard to the adjacent property and does not include the placement of fill upon which a structure may be erected.

Application Data Required: The grading plans and specifications accompanying the grading permit application shall contain the following data:

- narrative summary of the plan or project.
- A vicinity sketch at the scale of 1"=200' indicating the site location as well as the adjacent properties within 250' of the site boundaries.
- A boundary line survey of the site on which the work is to be performed.
- A legal description of the site.
- A plan of the site at a minimum scale of 1"=100' showing:
  - Name, address and telephone number of the owner, developer, and petitioner.
  - A description of general soil conditions or a soils map.
  - A schedule indicating the anticipated starting completion dates of the development sequence and the time of exposure of each area prior to the completion of effective erosion and sediment control measures.
  - An estimate of the quality of excavation and fill involved.
  - Existing topography at a maximum of two (2) foot contour intervals.
  - Proposed topography at a maximum of two (2) foot contour intervals.
  - The projects proximity to lakes, streams and rivers.
  - Location of any structure of natural feature on the site.
  - Location of any structure or natural feature on the land adjacent to the site and within fifty (50) feet of the site boundary line.
  - Location of any proposed additional structures or development on the site.
  - Elevations, dimensions, location, extend and the slope of all proposed grading (including building and driveway grades).
  - How the site is affected by the proposed earth changes.
  - Plans of all drainage provisions, retaining walls, cribbing, planting, anti-erosion devices, or other protective devices to be constructed in connection with, or as a part of, the proposed work together with a map showing the drainage area of land tributary to the site and estimated runoff of the area served by the drain.
  - Other information or data as may be required by the Building Inspector.

Sec. 303 Fees: At the time of filing an application for a grading permit, a plan checking fee shall be paid to the Township, non-refundable and at a rate of ten (\$10.00) dollars per acre of site area involved with a fifty (\$50.00) dollar minimum.

Sec. 304 Bond Requirements: A grading permit shall not be issued for grading involving the movement of more than 1,000 cubic yards of soil unless the permittee shall first post with the Township a bond executed by the owner and a Corporate Surety with authority to do business in this State as a surety.

The bond shall be in a form approved by the Township Attorney and in the amount of the estimated total cost of the work authorized by the permit. The Township may waive all or part of the amount to the extent that it is determined that the hazard or danger created by the work does not justify the full amount.

The total amount of bond requirements shall be determined by the Building Inspector. In lieu of a surety bond the applicant may file with the Township a cash bond or an instrument of credit approved by the Township Attorney in the amount equal to that which would be required for the surety bond.

Every Bond and instrument of credit shall include and every cash deposit shall be made on the conditions that the permittee shall comply with all of the provisions of this Ordinance with all of the terms and conditions of the grading permit to the satisfaction of the Building Inspector and shall complete all of the work contemplated under the grading permit within the time limits specified in the grading permit, or if no time limit is so specified, within 100 days after the date of the issuance of the grading permit. Cancellation of the Bond will require a certification by the Building Inspector that the work has been satisfactorily completed.

Sec. 305 Extension of Time. If the permittee is unable to complete the work within the specified time he may, prior to the expiration of the permit, present in writing to the Building Inspector a request for an extension of time setting forth the reasons for the requested extension. If in the opinion of the Building Inspector, such an extension is warranted, he may grant additional time for the completion of the work.

Sec. 306 Failure to Complete Work. In the event of failure to complete the work or failure to comply with all the requirements, conditions and terms of the permit, the Building Inspector may order such work as in his opinion, is necessary to eliminate any dangerous conditions and to leave the site in a safe condition or he may order the work authorized by the permit to be completed to a safe condition to his satisfaction. The permittee and the surety executing the bond or person issuing the instrument of credit or making the cash deposit shall continue to be firmly bound under a continuing obligation for the payment of all necessary costs and expenses that may be incurred or expended by the Township in causing any and all such work to be done. In the case of a cash deposit, any person unused portion thereof shall be refunded to the permittee.

Sec. 307 Denial of Permit: Grading permits shall not be issued where:

- the proposed grading would cause hazards to the public safety and welfare or;
- the work as proposed by the applicant will damage any public or private property or interfere with any existing drainage course in such a manner as to cause damage to any adjacent property or result in the deposition of debris or sediment on any public way or into any waterway or create an unreasonable hazard to persons or property; or
- the land area for which grading is proposed is subject to geological hazard to the extent that no reasonable amount or corrective work can eliminate or sufficiently reduce settlement, slope instability or any other such hazard to persons or property; or
- the land area for which the grading is proposed may lie within the fifty (50) year flood plain of any stream or watercourse which may or may not be specifically designated and delineated by the Township as an area subject to flood hazards unless a hydrologic report, prepared by a Professional Engineer is submitted to certify that the proposed grading will have, no detrimental influence on the public welfare or on the total development of the watershed.

Sec. 308 Modification of Approved Plans: All modifications of the approved grading plans must be submitted to and approved by the Building Inspector. All necessary sustaining reports shall be submitted with any proposal to modify the approved grading plan. No grading work in connection with any proposed modification shall be permitted without the approval of the Building Inspector.

Sec. 309 Responsibility of Permittee. During grading operations the permittee shall be responsible for:

- The prevention of damage to any public utilities or services within the limits of grading and along any routes of travel of the equipment.
- The prevention of damage to adjacent property, no person shall grade on land so close to the property line as to endanger any adjoining public street, sidewalk, alley or any public or private property without supporting and protecting such property from settling, cracking or other damage which might result.
- Carrying out the proposed work in accordance with the approved plans and in compliance with all the requirements of the permit and this Ordinance.
- The prompt removal of all soils, miscellaneous debris or other materials spilled, dumped or otherwise deposited on public streets, highways, sidewalks or other public thoroughfares during transit to and from the construction where such spillage constitutes a public nuisance or hazard.

Sec. 310 Maintenance Requirements: Persons carrying out soil erosion and sediment control measures under this Ordinance, and all subsequent owners of property concerning which such measures have been taken, shall maintain all permanent anti-erosion devices, retaining walls, structures, plantings, and other protective devices.

## ARTICLE IV. DESIGN STANDARDS FOR EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL

All grading plans and specifications including extensions of previously approved plans shall include provisions for erosion and sediment control in accordance with but not limited to the minimum control measures contained in the Land Development Regulations duly approved by the Township Board may adopt by resolution from time to time such rules and regulations related erosion and sediment control as it may deem advisable. Copies of said Land Development Regulations shall be available for inspection in the offices of the Township Clerk and the Building Inspector.

## ARTICLE V. VARIANCE AND EXCEPTIONS

Sec. 501 Zoning Board of Appeals Review: The Zoning Board of Appeals shall have the authority to interpret this Ordinance and may in specific cases grant variances or exception to these requirements providing such variance or exception is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the requirements.

Sec. 502 Agricultural Exceptions: A person engaged in agricultural practices may enter into an agreement with the local soil conservation district to pursue such agricultural practices in accordance with and subject to the rules promulgated by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources under Act 347 of the Public Acts of 1972. Where a person enters into an agreement with the local soil conservation district, the district shall notify the Township, under formal agreement and in compliance with the provisions of Act 347 of the Public Acts of 1972, a person will not be subject to any grading plan approvals, or permit requirements, but shall be subject to enforcement after January 1, 1973.

Sec. 503 Authorized Public Agency Exceptions: A Public Agency, such as, a School Board, Road Commission, Drain Commissioner, State Highway Department or any other local or regional public body, authority, board or commission which has been declared by the Department of Natural Resources to be an "Authorized Public Agency" is not required to submit plans for approval by the Township. The field operations of these agencies are subject to inspection by the Township Building Inspector for compliance with the Township Land Development Regulations.

## ARTICLE VI. INSPECTION AND ENFORCEMENT

Sec. 601 Authority of the Building Inspector: The requirements of this Section shall be enforced by the Building Inspector. The Building Inspector shall inspect the work and shall require adequate inspection of compaction by a soil engineer or by a soil testing agency, approved by the Building Inspector unless he determines that such inspection requirements may be waived due to the non-hazardous nature of the grading. If the Building Inspector finds any existing conditions not as stated in any application, grading permit or approved plan, he may refuse to approve further work until approval of a revised grading plan which will conform to the existing conditions.

Sec. 602 Right of Access for Inspection: The Township Building Inspector may enter at all reasonable times in or upon any private or public property for the purpose of inspecting and investigating conditions or practices which may be in violation of this Ordinance.

Sec. 603 Soil Conservation District Assistance: The Township may request assistance and advice from the Wayne County Soil Conservation District in overseeing and reviewing compliance with adequate soil erosion and sedimentation control procedures and in reviewing existing or proposed land uses, with regard to technical matters pertaining to soil erosion and sedimentation control.

## ARTICLE VII. VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

Sec. 701 Written Notices: Any person found to be violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be served by the Township with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice permanently cease all violations.

Sec. 702 Penalties: Any person who shall continue any violation beyond the time limit provided for in Section 701, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in the amount not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or 90 days in jail or both, for each violation. Each day in which any such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

Sec. 703 Liability: Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the Township for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned by the Township by reason of such violation.

Sec. 704 Legal Action by the Township: Notwithstanding the existence of pursuit of any other remedy, the Township may maintain an action in its own name in a court of competent jurisdiction for an injunction or other process against any person to restrain or prevent violation of this Ordinance.

Sec. 705 Notification to the State of Violations: The Township shall notify the Water Resources Commission of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources of violations in accordance with Act 347 of the Public Acts of 1972.

## ARTICLE VIII. SEVERABILITY

Sec. 801 Severability Clause: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance; it being the intent of the Council that this Ordinance shall stand, notwithstanding the invalidity of any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion hereof.

## ARTICLE IX. EFFECTIVE DATE

Sec. 901 Effective Date: This Ordinance shall take effect on and after ten (10) days from date of its legal publication.

A motion was made by Flodin and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the Township negotiate a lease for the Store Building at Sheldon and Michigan and the Supervisor and Clerk be authorized to sign the lease.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Parsell and unanimously carried that the Township express its objection to the proposal of the Wayne County Road Commission to establish an airport in Western Wayne County.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Parsell and unanimously carried that Canton Township join the proposed Intergovernmental Bicentennial Committee which will be comprised of those communities within the Plymouth School District.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the Township table and study the proposal of the Plymouth Community School System to collect school taxes twice a year.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Parsell and unanimously carried that the Supervisor and Clerk be authorized to sign a contract with Ralls-Hamill Becker-Carne, Inc. to cover Phase #1 of the Civic Center Development and the design of a Township Administration Building for a fee not to exceed \$6,000.00.

A motion was made by Flodin and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that the following resolution be adopted:

## CENSUS RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, identical bills have been introduced in both Houses of the Michigan Legislature to enable a County, City, Village, Township or other political subdivision to request the Secretary of State to have conducted under his supervision a special mid-decade census of the population of that political subdivision; and

WHEREAS, many political subdivisions in Wayne County have experienced significant population growth since the 1970 U.S. Census; and

WHEREAS, upward adjustment of their official population figures would result in increased revenues for political subdivisions which receive or share in any state sales, intangibles or income taxes on a per capita basis; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, by the Canton Township Board this 11th day of March, 1975, that the State Legislature hereby is importuned to enact enabling legislation as set forth in House Bill No. 4172 and Senate Bill No. 128; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the House Committee on Taxation, the Senate Committee on Municipalities and Elections, members of the Legislature from Wayne County and all appropriate political subdivisions in Wayne County as evidence of our earnest solicitation of their support for said legislation.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Township of Canton has been ordered by the Wayne County Circuit Court to install lights on the bridge at Joy and the I-275 Highway and;

WHEREAS, several subdivisions have applied for and have been approved for street lighting, namely Carriage Hills Subdivision 5 & 6 and Windsor Park 4, 5, and 6 and;

WHEREAS, the Township of Canton is dedicated to the principal of street lights in all subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, the Detroit Edison Company has applied for a hearing in front of the Michigan Public Utilities Commission to permit Edison to discontinue the construction of street lights.

THEREFORE, let it be resolved that the Charter Township of Canton go on record protesting the position of Detroit Edison in that they wish to get out of the street lighting business.

1. The Township attorney be instructed to represent our position in front of the Michigan Public Utilities Commission.

2. The Supervisor and the Clerk request all associated or neighboring cities and Townships join in this issue. Also, the Clerk is to inform all associations, i.e. M.T.A., Supervisors Association, Clerks Association, Inter-Governmental Committee, to join in this issue; as well as informing organizations and individual citizens of Canton and other areas to send letters to the Public Utilities Commission.

MAY IT FURTHER BE RESOLVED, finally that we send a letter of our intent to Detroit Edison with a final request that the lights that have been already approved, namely Carriage Hills 5 & 6 and Windsor Park 4, 5, and 6, be installed immediately.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Parsell and carried that the Supervisor, Clerk, and Treasurer, as officers of the Board, meet with 6 members of the Citizens Advisory Group prior to the first Planning Commission meeting in April to work out the ground rules for the establishment of the Citizens Advisory Committee.

A motion was made by Schwall and supported by Parsell and unanimously carried that the Planning Commission be directed to study the present zoning of Item 3 SIC and 35A-SIB2.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that the Township go on record as being in favor of Senate Bill 344 and urge Representative Thomas Brown and Senator William Faust to support it.

A motion was made by Cheske and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that bills in the amount of \$31,538.32 be paid.

A motion was made by Poole and supported by Flodin and carried to adjourn.

## 'Haute cuisine' cook cuts calories, time

What comes to mind when someone uses the term "haute cuisine?" The French chef's ultimate in cooking skill?

The best of ingredients, the most complicated of recipes, the most subtle of flavors?

Rich food and a lot of it, served in many courses?

Hours and hours in the kitchen?

Right on some counts, says Paris-born Madeleine Kamman, who not only cooks in the manner French but teaches how to do it and writes about it.

But not necessarily right on all of them in these days of calorie-counting and faster-paced living, she emphasized in a recent visit to Redford Township.

**TO PROVE HER POINT**, she prepared an elegant gourmet meal in an hour and a half before a crowd that gathered in the Kitchen Glamor store on Grand River.

But she brought a lot of her secret with her—cooking stocks in covered bottles for the lamb and scallops courses she prepared.

"This is 'la cuisine nouvelle,'" said Mrs. Kamman. "You do the food that is just as beautiful, but you do not spend so much time."

"All you need is stock, and all that you need to make fine stock is to boil water. But the quality of food is absolutely not to be compared when you do."

**MRS. KAMMAN**, who heads Modern Gourmet, an elite cooking school in Boston, and has authored several books on French cooking, chose for

her demonstration three recipes from her yet-to-be-published book, "When Women Cook."

She prepared *Selle D'agneau comme a dol de Bretagne* (crown roast of lamb), along with *Coquilles St. Jacques Normande a l'ancienne* (a dish of scallops) and *Fraises Printemps*, an elegant combination of strawberries and cream.

With these, in a gourmet meal served these days in France, would be a salad course and a cheese tray, Mrs. Kamman said. She didn't include these in her demonstration in the interest of simplification.

Serving both meat and fish courses in an elegant dinner—"that's the French way," this cook said. "Portions are very small, and very rich, and they go with two vegetables," she added.

She also said the strawberry dessert indicates the more modern trend to lighter meals.

"This is cream, very lightly-flavored with pistachio, with strawberries piled on top flavored with a raspberry puree. The French now are eating more of the fruits for dessert—not so many of the rich cakes and eclairs."

**THE NEW BOOK** on women's cooking in France, Mrs. Kamman said, grows out of her belief that "too much is said about the great chefs of France—not enough about their mothers and grandmothers who have been doing this simple cooking for many generations."

"The recipes I give in this book," she added, "are from the women in my own family. Not that they have written down these recipes, but I have learned from them a great deal that I

know about cooking, and I can remember how a dish tastes and then write down the recipe."

The recipes in her heritage, Mrs. Kamman said, come from all over France, Normandy, Brittany, Touraine, Alsace, Savoie.

**TWO EARLIER BOOKS**, "The Making of a Cook" and "Dinner against the clock," bear out this cook's philosophy about her art.

"Some people are born cooks," she said. "They look at a refrigerator and start to prepare a meal. They know how to use what they have available."

"For others, the art must be taught, and it can be taught so they can prepare the food as beautiful as the one who is a born cook."

"In my school, I concentrate a great deal on techniques, and then on basic proportions. When you are thoroughly grounded in these, you can cook well without recipes. Although I would like people to buy my books, I really want my students to cook without them."

**A BIRMINGHAM COOK** who has studied under Mrs. Kamman both in Boston and in France seconded her description of her training.

"She really concentrates on techniques and she has taught me an amazing amount," said Mrs. Geri Rinschler, who helped make arrangements for Mrs. Kamman's visit to Kitchen Glamor.

"And she cooks by far the best food I ever have eaten."

Mrs. Rinschler teaches a cuisine workshop of her own in the Pembroke School in Birmingham under the district's adult education program.

"This kind of cooking really is an art, and Madeleine is the finest artist I know."

## Color coding's out

# Consider new approach in selecting table wine

Almost all wines go with almost all foods.

Now that the basic rule of reds with red meats and whites with poultry and fish has been thrown out and everyone is again awash in the hundreds upon hundreds of available wines, perhaps a more meaningful standard for the selection of table wine can be developed.

Table wine must first be differentiated from beverages served apart from a meal. Appetizers and after-dinner drinks generally stand on their own with hardy, distinct and sometimes dominant characters. Just as a rambunctious guest may disrupt a gathering, so a sherry or a port or any cordial can drown even a robust meal.

This differentiation leaves just a few hundred wines to confuse the casual entertainer.

**GREAT ENTERTAINING** demands a budget to match; a memorable meal with superior wine easily runs to \$15 a person at home, or astronomical cost at a restaurant. On some occasions the expenditure is warranted, but most of the time, and particularly in these times, simplicity is the usual policy.

**THIS** pares the list of choices to a couple hundred wines commonly available in this area, and the fun begins.

There are two types of people: Those who usually prefer red wines and those who tend to whites. The reasons behind these preferences are as obscure as a winetasters' debate. It's simply a fact of life to be lived with, like height and complexion.

The fact also makes the choice of table wine easier. Reds and whites are both serviceable with most dishes. Proselytizing for the other color can be done at a more convenient time, with a more convincing argument dressed in a more commanding, and incidentally, more expensive label.

**ACCOMMODATION** supplies the key word for casual wine selection. The stuff in the bottle is not meant to be the main course, unless something is very much wrong with the cook or, indeed, with those seated at table.

To enhance rather than complement the meal, choosing wine which supports and assists the dominant food is suggested. If a dinner consists of several courses with several wines, then the standard progression from easy-going appetizers to substantial main course capped by fulfilling dessert should be followed.

In any case, a wine can be selected for wholehearted agreement with the central character of the food. Describe the dish and you've described the wine. Light or rich, delicate, mellow or robust apply to the plate as well as the label.

It would be a disservice to suggest outright a few labels at the expense of neglecting hundreds of others. Half the joy in discovering good wines is exploring the myriad of tastes harvested, pressed and fermented in the great vineyards throughout the world. The other half comes by introducing friends to these discoveries.

**SEVERAL METHODS** of orderly exploration exist. One might concentrate for a time on wines of a specific region, as a few weeks with Bordeaux, then on to Tuscany, a stay with Portugal and a leap to California.

At this point, sacrilege could be advised for those who prefer keeping at home and within means.

California as well as New York produces a large number of very good wines with unvarying consistency. While New York's vines are indigenous to the continent, providing distinctively American wines like Catawba, the grapes of the California wines grow from European stalks

grafted to American roots.

A quick and cheap introduction to general descriptions of wines is at hand in domestic bottles.

**ARMED WITH** some vocabulary, the consumer can step into any of this area's wine shops and search out a trustworthy clerk as guide to the adventure of foreign wines.

Trustworthiness shows in a merchant who expresses his own preferences but can lead the buyer to specif-

ic labels which will satisfy a specifically described taste. After all, a good salesman wishes to please the customer in order to get more business.

Fast introductions to large selections of wine can be made through tasting parties, occasionally sponsored by large stores or by several universities.

In any case, a notebook is in order to record reactions and preferences. This becomes a handy reference for future shopping.

**AS ENJOYMENT**, consumption and knowledge increase, one can ultimately embark on new adventures: The building of a personal wine cellar and perhaps the serving of a great dinner.

## The Stroller Biggie's big moment

While the sports world is mourning the passing of Biggie Munn, former athletic director at Michigan State University, his death has unleashed a myriad of stories of his climb from a farm boy in Minnesota to All-America honors in 1931 and a coveted place in the athletic world as an administrator.

Up and down the sports trail they are retelling the story of his aggressiveness as a football player with the Golden Gophers that earned him a place in the national football Hall of Fame both as a player and a coach.

They're telling of his deeds as a coach, his parting of the ways with Fritz Crisler with whom he served as an assistant at the University of Michigan, and how he lifted Michigan

State from the status of a "cow college" to one of the nation's top powers.

**BUT THE ONE** The Stroller likes best is the heart warming tale that came from Biggie himself, and, strangely, it didn't concern football.

Sitting in his office on the Spartan campus one morning the conversation turned to big moments in sports and The Stroller asked, "Biggie, what was your greatest moment?"

With a broad smile he answered, "You may not believe this, but my greatest thrill came in track—the day in 1931 when I won the shot put in the Penn Relays and bettered the mark of Michigan's Ralph Rose that had been on the books for years."

This deserved a bit of explaining

and Biggie quickly unfolded a tale that would have warmed the heart of even the most cynical.

Calmly, he told of how he had been selected to represent Minnesota in the Penn Relays—that, in those days, were considered the top event in track.

"I was the only entry from our school," he said, "and I was sent to Philadelphia alone. I was given my fare and a ticket for residence. It was a big moment in my life."

Biggie's grin widened as he recalled that, for the occasion, he had purchased a camel hair top coat (so he wouldn't look like a farmer).

"I WENT OUT to Franklin Field early," he went on, "and being without a sweat suit I wore my new top coat to walk around and keep warm."

"I had taken my warm-up tosses and put the coat on again to await my turn for the official throw."

"Finally, it came my turn. But when the iron ball came back to me it was mud-covered and a horrible looking sight. Mind you, there was no trainer with me, no attendant to wipe off the ball or anyone to even speak with me."

"For a few seconds I didn't know exactly what to do," Biggie related, "then I made a drastic decision. I picked up the mud-covered iron ball and wiped it clean with my new camel hair top coat. I figured I was sent to the relays, not to look fancy and dress in style, but to put the shot for my school."

"I was almost in tears when my name was called as I thought of that coat. Right then I decided the loss of the coat would be a cheap price to pay for victory, so, I let go with all the power I had."

It is history now that he not only won the event, but removed one of the oldest records from the books, and was hailed as a conquering hero when he returned to the Gopher campus.

"That was the greatest thrill of my life," he confided, "There have been many more since then—but none to equal that big moment I enjoyed at the Penn Relays even though I almost ruined the coat of which I was so proud."

These are just a few of the tales they'll be telling.

## 'Eggsactly' right for the season

Eggs, like people, can be decked out at Easter time, and Mrs. Fred Kraft might be called the Christian Dior of the egg set.

"It isn't all that complicated," she told members of the Suburban West Valparaiso University Guild, which sponsored a recent demonstration in Hosanna-Tabor Lutheran Church in Redford Township.

Guild members were not so sure about that. The elaborately-decorated eggs set out by Mrs. Kraft, a resident of Dearborn.

"In early Christian times, eggs were dyed red at Easter time and exchanged as gifts," she said. "Each of you can express your own personality and decorating skills to make someone an Easter gift that could become a family heirloom."

WHILE USING MAINLY chicken eggs, Mrs. Kraft has also produced works of art from the eggs of quail, ostriches, ducks, turkeys and pheasants.

From these she has made vases, jewel cases, Christmas tree ornaments and various decorative pieces. Under her patient fingers, not only are the fragile eggshells cut, but they are also fitted with lids or doors that open with hinges.

Tools for the Kraft craft include long-nosed pliers, manicuring scissors, sewing scissors, wire clippers, tweezers with a point that will grip rhinestones, pearls and other jewels, and a single-edged razorblade.

TO START her students out simply, Mrs. Kraft showed them how to begin a simple vase.

"Start by poking a hole repeatedly in the same place at the side of the egg with manicure scissors," she said. "As soon as you can get the whole blade in, begin to snip small pieces in an ever widening circle until you have made the size hole you want."

"Leave the lining or membrane of the egg inside. That gives strength to the eggshell. Empty out the egg and wash and dry the shell thoroughly. It

can be used in a day or so. Or it can be stored for later use. I've stored some for as long as six or seven years.

MRS. KRAFT then selected a piece of braid from her workbox and pasted it along the edge she had just cut. "Use a lot of glue to fasten it down," she stressed. "An acetate based clear glue is best."

Again she turned to her large workbox, and bringing forth a row of pearls, which, after first applying more glue, she placed below the circle of braid.

"Try to put the place where the various rows of material meet in different places," she said. "The joint is less noticeable that way. Also make sure your first row of braid is on straight. Otherwise all succeeding rows will look crooked."

A velvet ribbon can be placed around the widest part of the egg because it will lie flat at that spot. Mrs. Kraft recommends a fabric velvet

rather than an imitation or plastic kind.

After a row or two more of braid and pearly, Mrs. Kraft stops decorating. She wants to leave a portion of the egg showing.

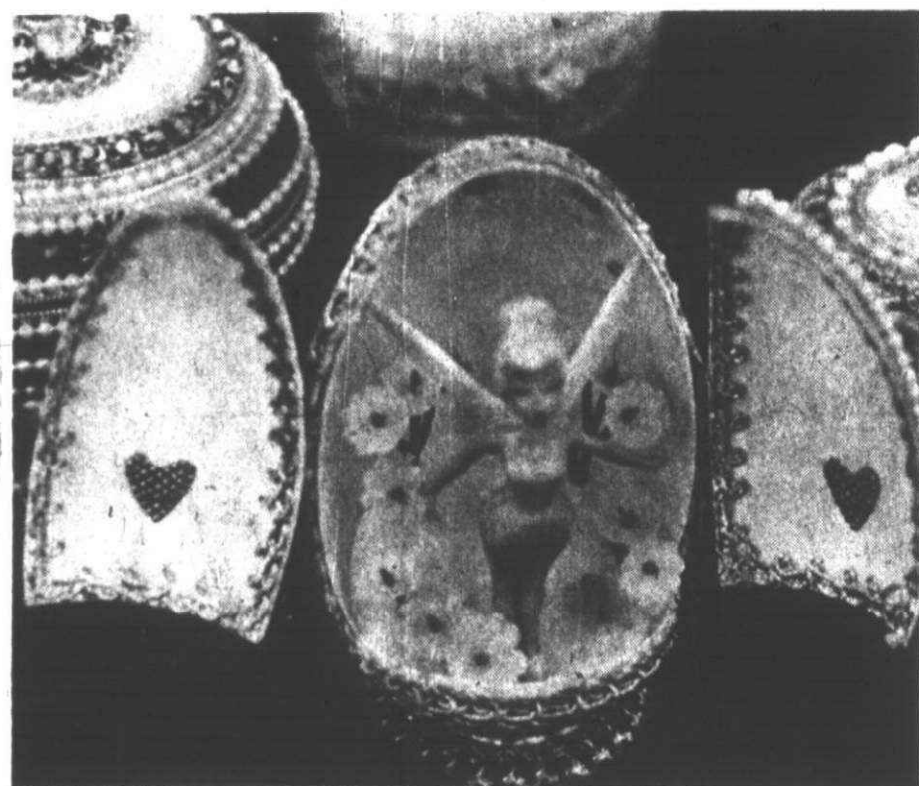
Bases for the new egg-vase can be made from jewelry found in hobby shops. "Or use four large pearls glued to the bottom, like feet," she suggested.

A razor blade is used on the more complicated task of cutting into doors or tops that will open, she added.

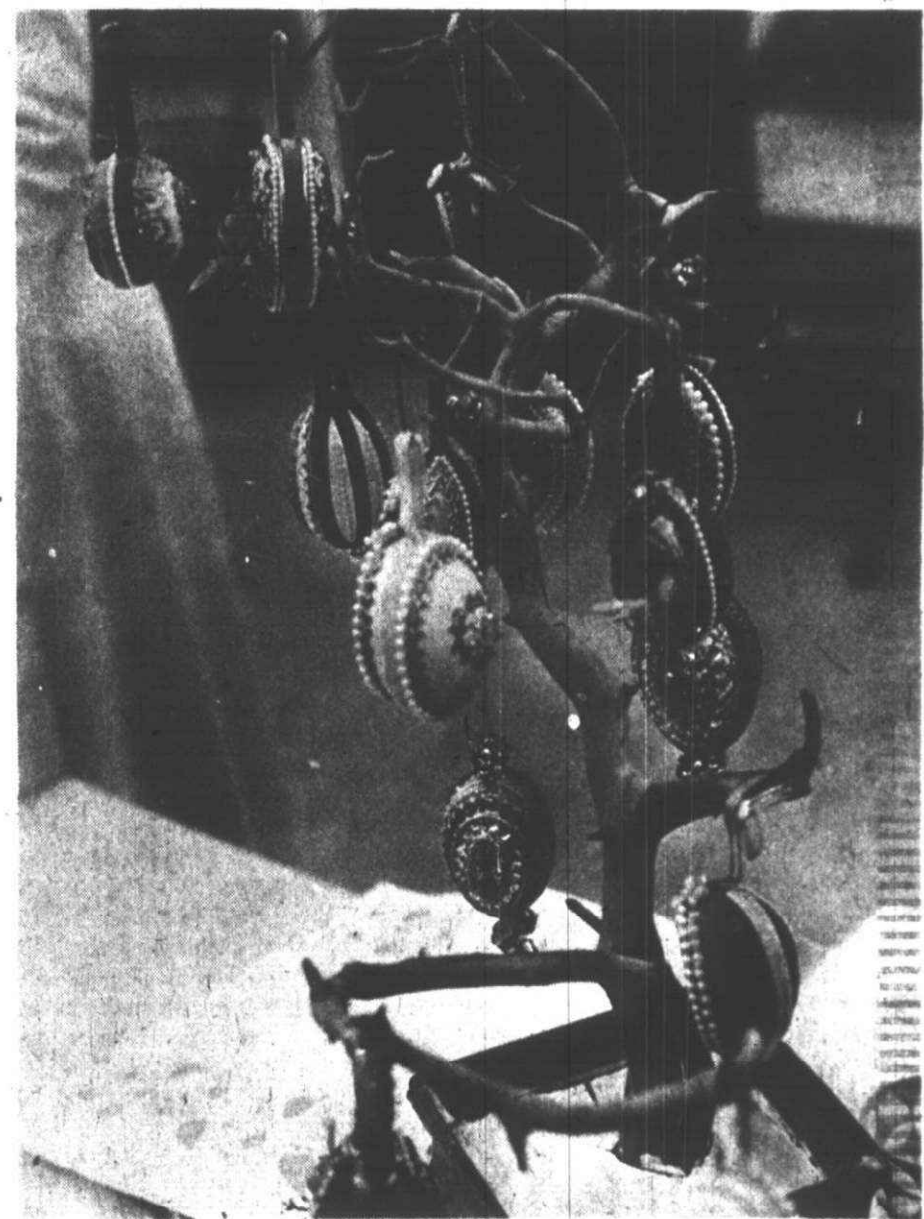
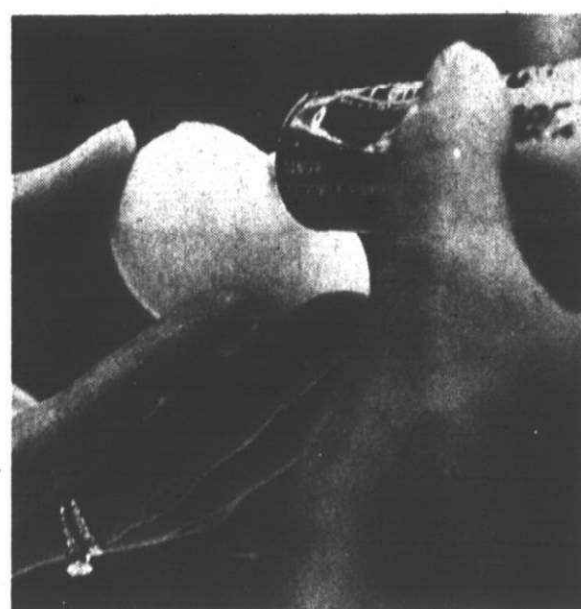
MRS. KRAFT TOOK UP eggery 16 years ago, long before it had a name or became the thriving business it is today.

"Many materials for decorating eggs in this way can be obtained from hobby stores nowadays," she said. "When my aunt first taught me, we used to hunt rummage sales for jewelry, fabrics, braid and interesting bits and pieces."

"The hunt was part of the hobby. I never throw anything away."

Calloway, who brought into his talk commentary on current Broadway offerings and a number of dramatic excerpts, said a national, federally-funded theater shouldn't be limited to New York.

"Cities like Detroit should have companies putting new acting talent into new plays," Calloway added.

LACK OF SOCIAL commentary also came in for the speaker's criticism.

"My major complaint about the current selection on Broadway," he said, "is that they do not speak to the major concerns of our country and the world."

"They indicate that as a people we seem to prefer distraction instead of meeting our problems head-on."

But this season's Broadway offerings Calloway termed "the best in six seasons."

"You hear talk about Broadway being dead," he said. "Broadway has been rather ill, but I see some good signs of recovery."

PROBABLY THE LEADING figure on the Great White Way at this time, he said, is Joe Papp, producer of the revival of Ibsen's "A Doll's House" in the Lincoln Center.

"Liv Ullmann gives a brilliant performance in this play that was written

long ago but definitely talks about women's lib," Calloway said.

"It is this kind of production that should show people Papp is changing from his earlier tendency to be too avant-garde in his management of the Lincoln Center."

He gave a vote of approval to the many revivals now being staged, and said he would consider "a good revival better than a bad new show." He particularly mentioned the current production of Noel Coward's "Private Lives," and said it's "more popular than ever—the champagne hasn't lost its bubbles."

AN IN-THE-ROUND production of Candide, set to Leonard Bernstein's music, led Calloway to comment that "Bernstein's score is his most brilliant, but you get a crick in your neck watching the actors climb over you."

"They keep having members of the audience hold their props too," he added. "My feeling is that if I'm going to participate I would like to be paid for it."

Calloway appraisals of other Broadway offerings included:

EQUUS—The best new play in New York this season—a painless modern tragedy.

SEASCAPE—Edward Albee's play stars Deborah Kerr and Barry Nelson and two lizards had all the best lines.

SHERLOCK HOLMES—Lavish and absolutely tremendous.

THE MAGIC SHOW—Parents should enjoy it as much as the kids.

Calloway said this country's greatest contribution to the world's theatrical picture is the musical comedy.

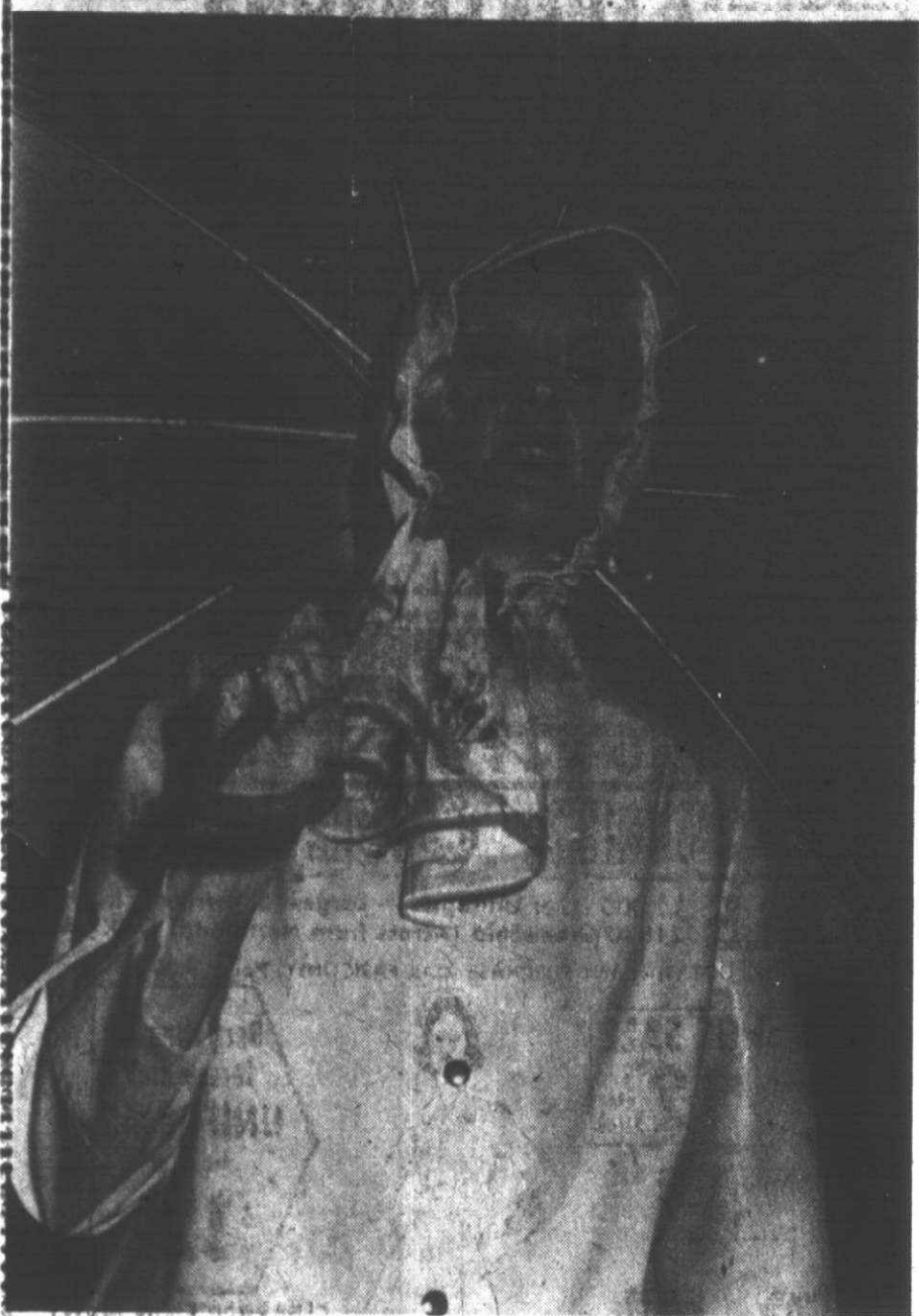
"No one can do it with the exuberance we put into it," he said.

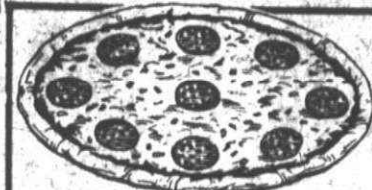

## Study examines teachers' psychological problems

The American obsession for technical proficiency in education is leaving teachers with a sense of boredom, aloneness and irrelevance.

That's the finding of Dr. Edward Bantel, professor of education at Oakland University, who addressed the Teacher Education Council of Wayne County on "The Successful Teacher" at Madonna College recently.

"Teachers are already feeling the psychological sting of their work," Bantel said. "They feel something must be wrong with them and are asking themselves, 'Why do I feel so bad when things are so good.'"

BANTEL'S STUDY is a comparison to one completed in 1950 in which teachers rated themselves on such traits as hostility and anxiety.

According to Bantel, teachers for the past 25 years have viewed themselves as feeling significantly less hostile and angry, but their feelings of loneliness, anxiety and homelessness have increased to the astonishment of the researchers.

Bantel said the study reveals that after five years in the classroom, teachers feel directionless.

"THE CONTEXT of education today robs teachers of richness. Society wants instant results and is pressured by parents who, in their ignorance, want to push their children beyond their limitations.

"The American solution to all this is to train another specialist and pass the child along to seven or eight educators.

"Teachers are losing both their power and their innocence."

Bantel views batteries of standardized tests as an enemy of the teaching profession.

"Measurements are the most trivial aspect of education. Tests hold no validity beyond what a teacher can see, and an experienced teacher can see the range of a child's intelligence as well as any clinician.

"A student is not going to learn until he knows and trusts his teacher. As a result, students don't work to their fullest potential with a stranger."

Strict reliance on testing programs and shunting students off to specialists "is intrusively destroying the setting which belongs to the teacher."

"It's only the teacher who can protest," Bantel said. "It's only the teacher who can claim the profession with pride and say he can do something which no laymen can duplicate."

BANTEL POINTED to another study which rated teachers' performances.

"As a teaching performance is judged to be poor, the more the behavior of these kinds of teachers is stereotyped.

"As you move toward superior performances, no two teachers look alike. It's the imprint of human personality which sets the superior teacher apart from the poor teacher."

"When a teacher stops looking at himself as a person and starts seeing the three Rs instead, he's in real trouble," he said.

IN CONTRAST to the highly technical world of today's education, Bantel pointed to a teacher whom he rated as "a genius."

"Her name is Muriel Pyrah and she is a person with a unique biography. She is receiving a kind of fame she doesn't fully appreciate. But educators are interested in her because she taught children of English coal miners, who previously never went beyond an elementary level of education. Under her guidance the majority of her students went through secondary schools."

Mrs. Pyrah was the daughter of florists and had to participate in the family business at an early age. Bantel said she was keenly observant and could detect deficiencies in plant life long before they appeared to wither.

Since she had an 11th grade education, far exceeding the education of other children in the area, she was selected to become the area's teacher.

"Because these children were taught to be seen and not heard, they came to school not with speech, but with grunts."

Mrs. Pyrah became their builder

of language, vocabulary and reading skills.

"And not only did she teach these children to read, but she taught them to learn to love reading as much as she did. She taught them not only to claim words as their own but taught them to claim their lives as their own."

"By the time her students were in the third grade, their aesthetic sensitivities had exceeded even hers."

IN CONTRAST to Mrs. Pyrah's method of keenly evaluating students in her own mind, Bantel said the American system of teaching is missing the point.

"We're sinning in massive doses," he said. "Our teachers don't realize they must know themselves before they know their children for what they are—their strengths and their limitations."

"We can't depersonate education any more. We're obsessed with evaluating to the point of pathology."

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor McLaren at 7:33 P.M. All members were present with the exception of Gerald Burke.

**APPROVAL OF THE CONTRACT WITH THE STATE OF MICHIGAN FOR REPLACEMENT OF FIRE STATION NO. 2.** The following Resolution was offered by Helen Richardson and supported by Richard Gornick:



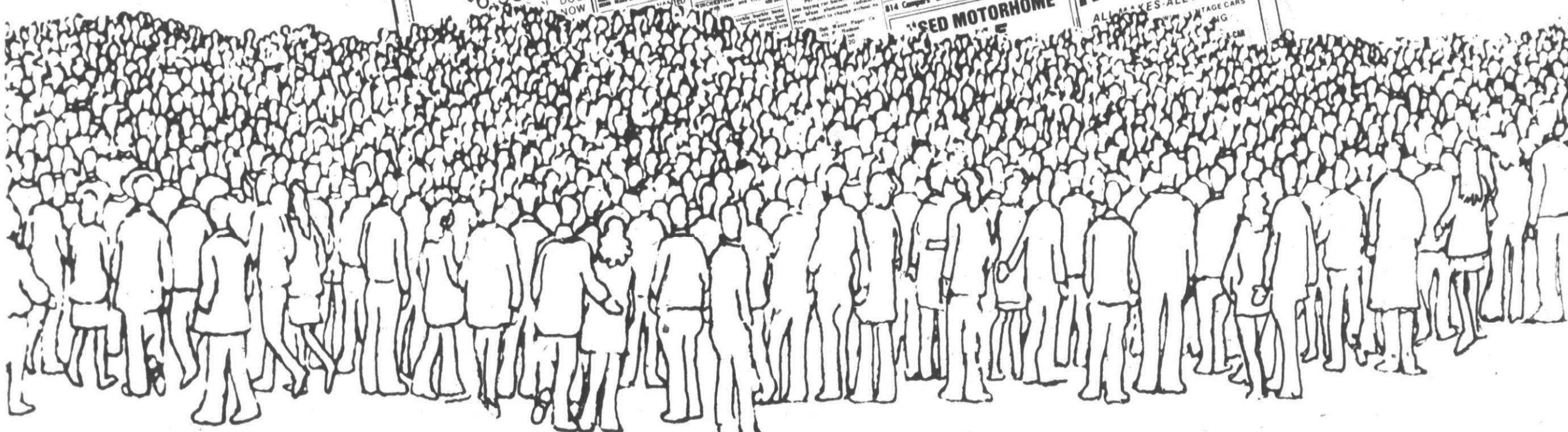

# Hot ice controversy

## Star hockey player Stan Mikita and State Senator Carl Pursell say junior hockey needs drastic change

**'The Battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eton.'**

The Duke of Wellington thus became history's first on-record advocate of competitive sports for the young set. And ever since the Duke uttered his immortal words about Napoleon's downfall, the value of sports for the young set and the inherent violence therein, has been a subject of constant controversy.

Earlier this year, that controversy flared in Michigan when a joint legislative committee, led by State Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), was formed to study organized amateur sports and their effects on youth.

That committee held its latest hearing Friday and the star of the show was Chicago Black Hawks All-star winger, Stan Mikita.

Mikita speaks with authority on the sport which he plays. The Hawks' veteran ranks among the top 10 players in career scoring, and led the National Hockey League in that category in 1967 and 1968.

BUT THE OTHER side of Mikita, the side for which he has been twice awarded the Lady Bing Memorial Trophy for sportsmanship, was more in presence at the session held in downtown Detroit's Ponchartrain Hotel.

Mikita is of the opinion, as is Pursell, that there is too much emphasis on winning in junior hockey programs. He also believes that the violence which too often surfaces in youth programs is detrimental to the sport.

"The same things that are wrong

with junior hockey programs all over the country are what is wrong with them in Michigan," Mikita said.

Mikita spoke from personal experience about the problems with the youth programs.

"When my son was six years old he was in a junior program. One day he came home from practice and told me that he didn't want to get spanked, but that he didn't want to play hockey anymore. The reason was that he couldn't perform the things that the coach wanted him to and he would get yelled at. And that's just the point. Kids up to 12, by and large, cannot grasp what their coaches tell them about hockey," he said.

"This is what we are running up against. Kids simply cannot do the things which are being demanded of them."

Mikita's solution to the problem is, by his own admission, only a partial one.

"One of the things which we have to do is to let the kids practice more—set them up in controlled scrimmages and take the emphasis off standings and statistics. We have to let them just go out there and chase the puck and have fun," he said.

Mikita said that he sees the same trends which he dislikes at the amateur level taking over in the professional ranks.

"Playmaking is giving way to intimidation but I don't believe that intimidation has worked that well," he said.

But Mikita, who spent more than a few hours in the penalty box when he broke into the league because of what he describes as a "hit first and ask questions later" philosophy, points out a distinct difference between hockey at his level.

"WE'RE OUT THERE to make a living, not to have fun," he said. Mikita advocates the European sys-

tem of hockey education where a player is not allowed to play competitively until the age of 12, working in his younger days on fundamentals, skating and scrimmaging instead of actual playing.

"We're not going in the right direction in this country. We're trying to teach kids too much, too soon."

Pursell advocates much the same views but his committee has been criticized for an attempt to "legislate morality" by those who oppose stricter controls on the game.

"We are not, as yet, trying to legislate anything. There has been no legislation recommended and no bills introduced," Pursell said.

However, the senator did admit that he was receiving negative reactions from several groups already.

"It's no secret that several groups have gone on record opposing the study. I can only hope that they will look at our findings when we have finished the study and view them objectively," he said.

"They've taken up a study at the University of Windsor and applied to certain elements of Canadian hockey already to make the game safer and more enjoyable for the kids. I hope that we might be able to affect similar changes here," Pursell said.

## Local ice authorities disagree

Officials of two local hockey organizations reacted with surprise Friday after hearing of statements by Chicago Black Hawks star Stan Mikita regarding the state of amateur hockey in Michigan.

At a Friday morning hearing with the joint house committee led by Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) which is currently reviewing youth sports activities in general and hockey in specific, Mikita spoke out against violence and over-emphasis on winning in youth hockey programs.

MIKITA SAID he advocates the de-emphasis of league play and movement toward "controlled scrimmages" and the "European system" in which no competitive hockey is played until age 12.

"I find it hard to believe that Mikita said those things," said Don Peters, director of the Livonia Hockey Association.

Peters did not totally disagree with all of Mikita's statements, indicating that Mikita's claim that youngsters are not totally aware of the finer aspects of the game might be valid.

"As far as the analytical sense

goes, it's debatable and it varies from individual to individual as to what he grasps about the game," Peters said.

Peters said that he did not think it was practical to switch from the game situation to controlled scrimmage.

"The practicality of the game of hockey prohibits this kind of move. Ice time is simply too valuable and to maintain the interest of the parents, coaches and players, you have to make a game situation of it," he said.

PETERS SAID HE did not see the physical aspects of the contact sport as being detrimental to young players.

"On the contrary, the amount of physical contact involved in hockey is no more than what would be received if the kids were roughhousing in the sandbox. I think this is helpful to their development."

Peters had identical feelings about the value of competitive sports. "I personally think competitive sports are good for young people. They help them develop as individuals."

Peters said the philosophy of the Livonia Hockey Association was "defi-

nately not win-at-all-cost" and took a swipe at the entire committee which is studying the amateur sport system.

"Personally, I think there are more important things for the Legislature to be concerned about. The governing bodies of amateur sports do a fine job controlling themselves. They don't need a watchdog."

GINO D'AMBROSIO, sports director for Little Caesar's, which sponsors several teams off all age groups throughout the suburbs, said at most levels there is little or no emphasis on winning.

"The Mite games (ages 7-10) are the funniest things in the world to watch. There's no emphasis on winning at all."

"Our philosophy is that we'd like to win, of course, but it's not the end of the world if we don't. My God, they're only kids."

D'Ambrosio further stated that he saw no real problems with injuries in hockey.

"I coached high school football in the Detroit area for 20 years. Injuries are far more frequent and more serious in football than in hockey. In

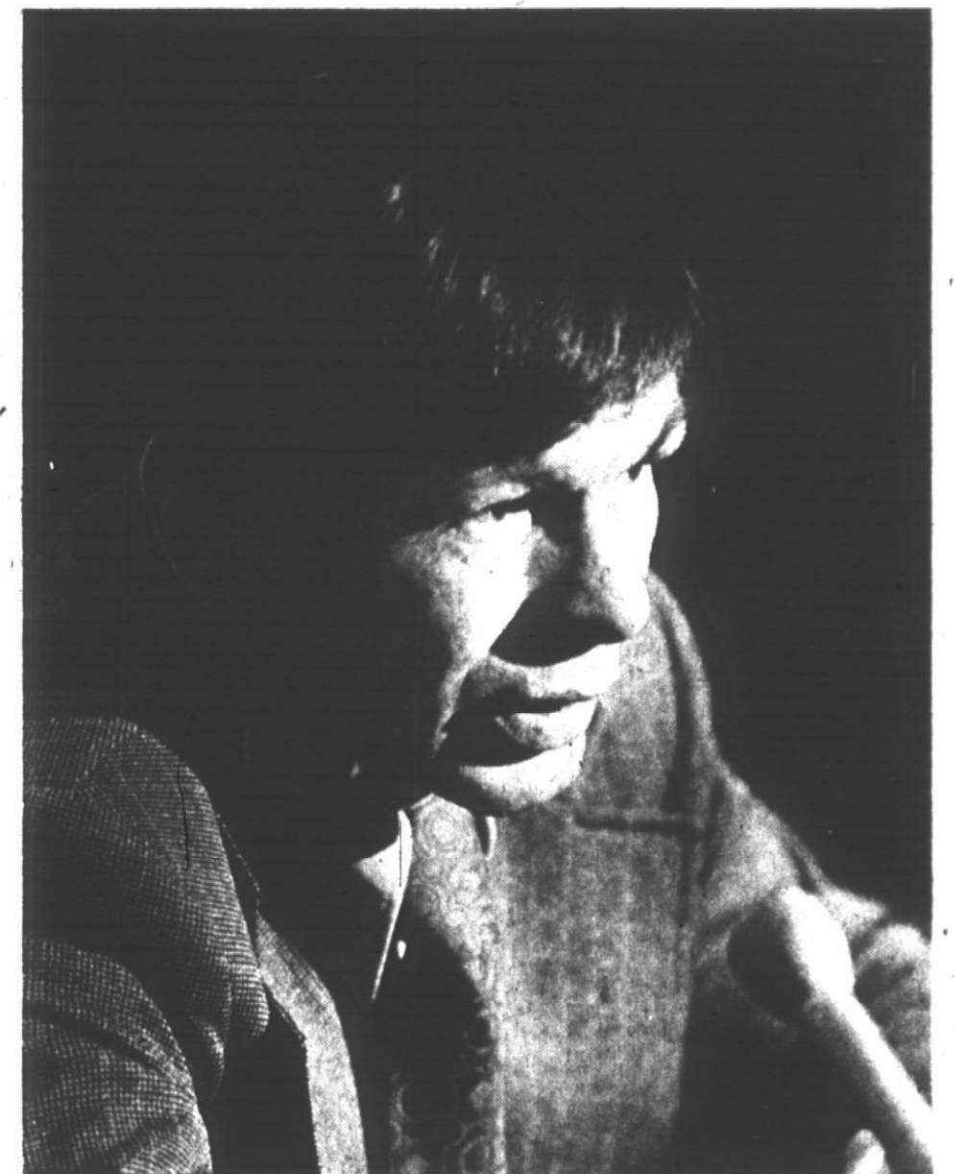
football, until they blow that whistle, it's legal mayhem," he said.

According to D'Ambrosio, the "long schedule" involving up to 90 games among youngsters on travel teams is commonly misunderstood.

"The most important thing about that is the games are running time. If they were broken down into games where the clock was stopped, the schedule would be closer to 25 games in terms of ice time."

Nevertheless, both D'Ambrosio and Peters said they will take any suggestions made by the committee into full consideration.

"We have nothing to hide," D'Ambrosio said.

# Turf Tips, Quips

For the first time in Michigan racing history there will be racing on Good Friday. The Detroit Racing Association plans a nine race program Friday at the Detroit Race Course... and of course everyone is wondering just how good the attendance will be.

The Legislature gave permission to the thoroughbreds to race on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, if the management wishes, in amending the racing act a year ago to approve Sunday racing.

It was done in sort of a backhanded manner. The amendment provides that there will be no Sunday or Good Friday racing at the harness tracks. Thus the inference is that such programs are approved for the runners.

We have no quarrel with the racing act in regard to Sundays at the running tracks, even though we did say some time back that it was a direct discrimination for the harness operations, but Good Friday is something else.

How can the Legislature say the runners can go in the afternoon on Good Friday but the harness tracks have to be dark... races will be staged in Windsor that night.

It is our feeling the amended racing act should be tested for its legality. There definitely is discrimination against harness racing and it should be corrected.

**THE DRA IS OFF** to a great start and management hopes the impetus continues once the season goes into the second part of the split season. Right now wagering is ahead of the disastrous meeting of last year with the past week one of the best in the winter in several seasons.

Purses have been boosted an average of \$200 and that should make the horsemen happy. However, there's an old saying that a meet is no better than the horses. Thus it might be a tip for the horsemen to get better steeds and boost the wagering which in turn will make for better purses.

In his decision upholding Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley's right to allot racing dates, Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley opined that instead of harness horsemen complaining about not getting starts in the summer, they should think of getting better horses.

In discussing his ruling, Judge Foley indicated he thought that if the Michigan horsemen had better stock

they wouldn't have to worry about the back-to-back dates allotted Hazel Park and Wolverine Raceways in the summer.

"I don't know that much about racing," he said, "but I do know if you have good horses there'll always be races they can enter. But if one has a flock of cheap horses, then he better go where horses of the same class are racing. Then there will be starts."

Judge Foley said he couldn't buy the remarks of Michigan horsemen who testified at the long trial which found Northville Downs contesting the right of the commissioner to take away its summer dates.

During the trial the horsemen told the court back-to-back racing at Hazel Park and Wolverine would just about put them out of business because they couldn't possibly compete with the better stables coming in.

If a judge, who knows little about racing, can come up with this kind of a conclusion, then it's about time for the Michigan horsemen to take heed and begin building better and stronger stables.

**YOUTHFUL CHARLIE** Smith, who has spent most of the winter in the hospital with operations on both legs,

is back in action at Northville Downs. He made his first start after the long layoff on Tuesday and wound up second.

But it was a different tale on Wednesday when he brought his horse out of the pack on the final turn and won handily. Charlie was filling in for Gordon who was sitting out a three-day suspension.

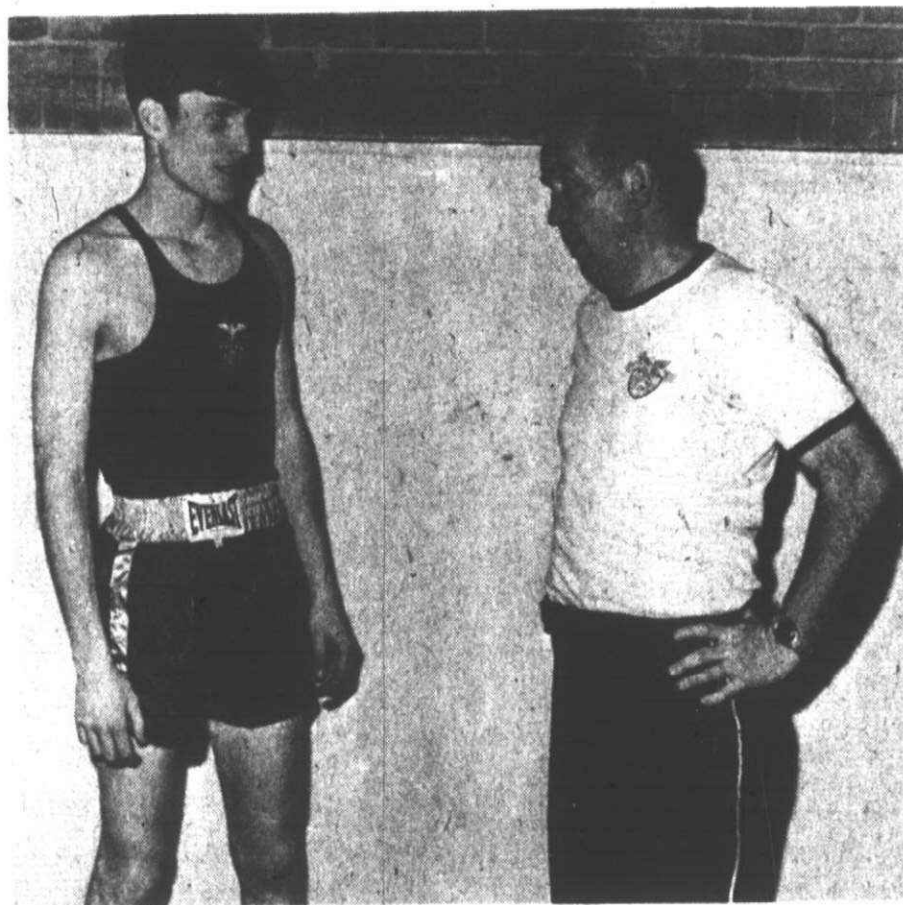
The management of the Northville Fair has announced the dates for the Wolverine Futurity three year old colt and filly paces and trots which have a value of more than \$100,000.

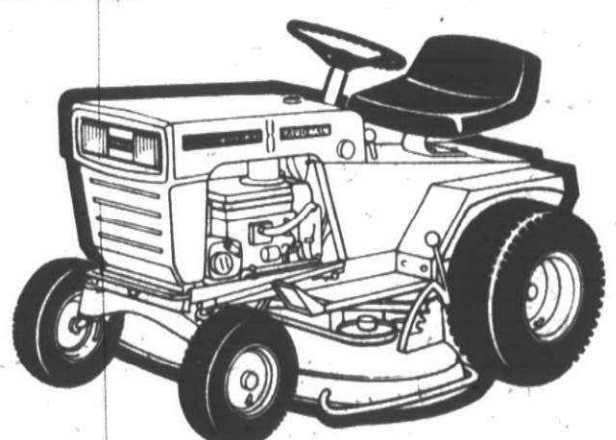

# In The Pocket.

The American Bowling Congress revived the old argument over the pro or amateur status of a bowler this week when it declared that Bob Hart, of the Stroh team, was no longer eligible to compete in the US trials to select the American team for the world championships next year.

The ruling was based on the fact that Hart is employed by the Stroh Brewery and, therefore, is paid for

bowling. Bob had qualified by reason of his showing last year with the Goebel team in the ABC tournament at Indianapolis. At the close of the season he joined Stroh to become what the brewery officials call a good-will ambassador.

The ruling this week came as a shock in that the Stroh team bowls in the All-Star Classic and the Michigan Open with other ABC bowlers and nothing ever has been said—officially.

Now the argument will wax furious until a much clearer statement is made by the ABC officials.

Not many years ago the ABC ruled that the "alley man"—the fellow who took care of the lanes—was a pro and that not more than one could be a member of any team. Even the proprietor was designated as an alley man and, therefore, ineligible to bowl on a team he sponsored.

When that was cleared up the argument turned to bowling for prize money. It was claimed that a real amateur was not permitted to bowl for cash—even though some of the money was part of his bowling fee.

That argument simmered down and all was quiet until this week when Hart was ruled ineligible. Now, there's no telling just how far the present squabble will go.

### BACK TO BASICS
