## Schools move ahead with 45-15 plans

PLYMOUTH-Students in the Miller Elementary School attendance area will be starting the 45-15 year-round school program in mid-July.

That was the decision reaffirmed by the Plymouth school board Tuesday night on a 5-0 vote directing administration to proceed with plans for the

At the same time, the board has requested a survey of parents to give them the option of choosing to send their children to another school, if 45-15 is not to their liking. The survey will begin on March 31, according to Supt. John M. Hoben.

A group of more than 30 residents from the Miller area joined in the board discussion, with close to 20 voicing objections to 45-15.

Those parents asked the board to consider other options of using portable classrooms, or busing some students out of the Miller area to other schools

"This district has been short of schools for years," commented Trustee George Lawton, "and that's one reason why 45-15 has been proposed '

'I'm guilty of being sold on the idea that 45-15 provides an equal educational program and a viable method of housing students.'

Discussing alternatives to 45-15, Hoben said the district could purchase three portables for the Miller site which would handle an added 90 students. Hoben estimated the cost of the portables and the added staff for the school at approximately \$68,000, with approximately \$20,000 coming from building and site funds for the cost of the portables and their furnishings.

The 45-15 cost projections, pared down by more than \$25,000 from a meeting on March 22, were set at close to \$63,000. That total would be taken out of general operating funds.

The board spent the first portion of the meeting listening to concerns of Miller Principal Shirley Spaniel, as voiced by Assistant Supt. James Leary. Mrs. Spaniel was unable to attend the meeting because she was on vacation.

both Mrs. Spaniel and some members of the Miller community that had supported the program last year. When asked why Mrs. Spaniel had changed her mind on the program, Leary said "concerned over the real educational benefits that will be derived."

Lawton said he felt Mrs. Spaniel's main concern was over the "polarization" that has taken place within the Miller area over 45-15. Lawton told residents present that whether for or against 45-15, they should "get over the polarization that has been taking place over the last few weeks." He asked residents to consider the 45-15 issue one that affects the entire school district "and not just your child."

Miller currently houses 733 students, with a capacity of something under 700. With the addition of 45-15, the capacity of the school will be 900 students, and enrollments for the school in July is expected to be approximately 832 students.

Leary suggested that the district consider starting with only two tracks of the 45-15 program to guage its acceptance, but board members said that two tracks would not take care of the overcrowding at Miller. "The best interests are served by implementing the 45-15 program on a four-track basis," said Lawton.

Noting her commitment to the 45-15 program, Board Vice President Marda Benson said, "I have never kept it a secret that I will not go back for additional bonding to build new schools that we have.'

Lawton said, however, that if there were compelling reasons why 45-15 wasn't working, "the community would not be stuck with it for the next 50 years.

Adding concerns about overbuilding, Lawton said, "All you have to do is look to the east of us (Livonia) and see what an improper building plan can do." Livonia currently has more than 50 classrooms which are vacant throughout the district.

Leary said he was concerned with and allow them to opt out to schools the lack of enthusiasm for 45-15, by other than Allen, Fiegel and East elementaries, but Hoben said that other neighboring schools, including Gallimore and Smith, were already filled to capacity.

Another resident asked what would he didn't know. He said he was also happen in the event of a teacher strike. Personnel director Norman Kee explained that the current conteact with the Plymouth Education Association includes language to prevent a strike by teachers at Miller for one year after the expiration of the current contract in August 1976. "The contract provides for no interruption in the 45-15 program until August 1977.'

The 45-15 plan was originally introduced last year and was planned to begin in July, 1974. A last minute refusal by teachers to begin the program without a contract, forced the school board to drop the plan.

Under 45-15, each student will still attend the required 180 days of classes each year. Each of four tracks would begin school on a staggered basis, with one-fourth of the total number of students beginning school every

By the end of the ninth week, the first track would leave for a 15-day vacation, while the fourth track would be beginning.

The school would be completely shut down for a two-week period during the summer, and this, plus the students' three weeks off some time during the summer, would replace the usual summer vacation.

Miller school was selected for the program because it is the only elementary school in the district that is air conditioned, and because the area is schools until we have fully utilized the currently experiencing the greatest rate of growth in the district.

The treasurer said it was unfortunate the council had not been formed earlier. The six who form the advisory councilwill report back to their entire membership March 31.

On April 1, prior to the joint study session of the board and planning commission, the committee as a whole will discuss the matter further with the entire township board.



## U.S. court asks more briefs in school segregation case

DETROIT-U.S. District Court Judge Robert E. DeMascio has 'delayed a ruling on whether 83 suburbs will be excluded from cross-district school busing, if the Detroit system is told to implement busing.

In other words: If the Detroit school system gets busing, are the suburbs off the hook?

DeMascio Wednesday ordered that attorneys for the Detroit Board of Education submit briefs by April 7 in gregation case. Attorneys for the suburbs will file responsive briefs on April 11.

DeMASCIO ASKED that the briefs be addressed to the issue of whether a new cause of action aimed at bringing about a metropolitan remedy for inter-district segregation is precluded once a plan designed to eliminate segregation within the Detroit school system has been undertaken.



## Lt. Gov. Damman optimistic following state investigation

LANSING-Lt. Gov. James J. Damman remained determinedly optimistic about his personal future this week following a searching inquiry into his public and private conduct as a Troy city official by Atty. Gen. Frank Kel-

'I am naturally pleased . . . that the attorney general's investigation is completed and that the governor and I can now put this matter behind us," Damman said in a brief statement Monday afternoon.

Damman said he looks forward "to working closely with the governor in addressing the critical issues of our

Touching briefly on the reason for Kelley's detailed examination of the lieutentant governor's background, the statement said there is "an urgent need" for comprehensive conflict of interest laws at the state level to guide the conduct of public officials "at all levels of government." Damman added that all public officials ought to avoid "the appearance of impropriety-even where impropriety does not exist."

With the state Senate in recess until April 7 after Wednesday, Damman plans to continue his activities with the Michigan Bicentennial Commission next week. A routine speech also has been scheduled for him in South Haven, aides said.

Milliken also adopted a business-asusual attitude this week and promised "to move forward" with his handpicked running mate to serve "all the people of Michigan." Like Damman, the governor urged passage of a strong state conflict-of-interest law to "provide better guidelines for . . . local officials.'

"WHILE PRESENT law prohibits certain kinds of contractual relationships on the part of local public officials, there is a need to strengthen this law," Milliken said.

Meanwhile, it remains for ordinary citizens to digest the meaning of Kelley's report to determine if Damman's activities as a land speculator in Troy and his position as a city councilman in the late 1960s were ethically correct.

Kelley himself flatly refused to dis cuss ethical considerations with reporters this week, saying only that he had been asked to determine if Damman violated existing state law regarding conflicts of interest among local officials. The attorney general found that Damman had not violated

"We have determined the facts as best we can, and we have applied the law to the facts," he said. "He (Damman) engaged in a certain course of conduct, none of which was illegal. There's a possibility there's something we've missed, but I don't know of any untraced lead to date."

Kelley said he does not believe there is sufficient reason for another agency, such as a grand jury, to conduct a similar probe of Damman's ac-

"UP UNTIL July 1, the Detroit water board was literally a 900 pound gorilla."

The commission had no power to remove the system's director. "The staff ran the water board, not the commission." Now, Young said, the director and deputy director serve at the pleasure of the board, which in turn serves by appointment from the Detroit mayor.

"I think that makes it pretty clear who runs the water department." When McNamara challenged the

rate increase and budget, it was the "first payoff" from the charter change, Young said.

"For the first time...the customers have a right to challenge a figure."

Young said an increase may be needed in sewer use charges because of a new plant and new pipes.

ALTHOUGH CRITICAL of the

"not asking for a busing solution although I will accept cross-district busing if I can't get anything else."

Comments from the city officials, about two-thirds of whom were from Wayne County, mostly concerned whether the state should be involved in regulating water rates.

Westland Mayor Eugene McKinney recommended a task force to study the problem.

"I don't have that much confidence in boards and commissions, McKinney said. A watchdog committee of suburban representatives would be better than having a state board regulate rates.

"I'm not sure the answer's in the state legislature.'

Plymouth City Manager Fred Yockey said the issue will get "too far afield" if it goes before the legislature. The Detroit city charter should say each county in the area should have a representative on the commis-

"A lot of people are very concerned about the grant and there is a possibility we might withdraw. I, personally am not ascritical of HUD. They get blamed for all the errors, and every timesomeone asks a question they have to develop more regulations This program is no bed of roses to administer," she said.

"I will say this, however, the original intent of the Community Develop Act of August 1974 (that created the block grant program) was to remove all the guidelines and stipulations forspending the money. Since then, HUD has placed more and more restrictions on theuse of the money."

Presently, the county stands to receive \$700,000 if HUD approvesthe application. An advisory council composed of 15 people, 10 representing the 19 municipalities, and five representing the coutny outlined the allocation of the fundsat a meeting in Allen Park March 24.



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# The Stroller An old grad's memories of Biggie

It is always interesting to sit with a group of old grads, especially the football heroes of another day, and listen to them reminiscing of their college days and the moments that have lived with them through the years.

The Stroller was given this privilege the other afternoon while enjoying lunch with Mary McFadden, co-captain of the 1951 Michigan State University football team, and now the personnel director at the Chevrolet Spring and Bumper plant in Livonia.

"I'll never forget our game with Notre Dame in 1951." he said. "and the job "Biggie" Munn did in getting us ready to meet the Fighting Irish."

(It was ironical that the group didn't learn of Biggie's death until the lunch period ended. But for a few moments of kindly reminiscing Biggie lived again right there in the dining room.)

"We had been reaching a peak all week, " Mary explained, "and the thought of meeting Frank Leahy and his Fighting Irish, then the national champions, had us all on edge.

"CAME SATURDAY and after we dressed quietly for the game Biggie walked to the end of the dressing room and locked the door ..

The former Spartan grid captain's face took on a serious look as he recalled "the most emotional speech I ever heard.

With the door locked. Biggie stood in front of us and very bluntly remarked. "You fellows are a bunch of nobodys. Nobody knows you'.

"Pointing his finger at us. Biggie went on. 'You nobodys- just think of your kind old mother at home-- the woman who possibly has worked day and night, and made sacrifices, hoping that someday you would be somebody. Just think of her'

From the expression on his face one would think that Mary was back in that dressing room, getting ready for

"Then Biggie continued: 'And think of your father, struggling and saving. and dreaming- ves, dreaming of the day when you would be somebody and he could be so proud of you.

"Just think of him." Biggie shouted, and then sent us en our way.

Here Mary smiled as the mem came back. "You should have seen us. We literally knocked the door down and looked like a bunch of wild men as we passed the Notre Dame players.

"NO TEAM COULD HAVE beaten us that afternoon. If you recall, Dick Panin, the young lad from Detroit Denby High School, ran almost the length of the field for an early touchdown and we never were headed. It was a great victory-- and as we came back to the dressing room amid all of the excitement. Biggie took the center of the room and shouted, "Now you are somebody."

"WHY DID YOU DO IT?" we demanded of Biggie when we returned to the dressing room. We wanted to square accounts and run up a score Michigan wouldn't forget. Why did

"Biggie just stood there, with a broad smile, and answered very se-

"I didn't want to make an ass of my self like someone else I know. That was Biggie Munn and Marv McFadden, like many others who played for him, have good reason never to forget "the old coach." Is it any wonder that friendly chats with old grads are always so inter-

esting.?





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## Village of Plymouth was 'Mudville' until 1908

(Part I) For the first 46 years there were no sidewalks and no paved roads in Plymouth. In the spring and fall of each year, when the rains came. parts of Main Street were approached with caution by wagon drivers wary of mud-traps.

The first wooden sidewalk made its appearance in 1872. Fittingly, it was installed in front of the home of E. J. Penniman, one of Plymouth's Big Five. The Big Five-Penniman. George Starkweather, and three brothers, Siron, Josiah and Cassius Kellogg-then owned most of the land in

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Plymouth. Penniman was president of Plymouth's first bank, the First National, whose offices were in the rear of Roswell Root's Drug Store on Main Street.

The Penniman home was on Sutton (later Penniman) near the corner of Church Street, where the Catholic manse is now located. Eventually, the boardwalk was extended from Penniman's home along the north side of Sutton to Conner's Hardware store on the corner of Main Street. In a short time, wooden walks sprang up on all main thoroughfares in the village.

Boardwalks kept Plymouth pedestri-

ans out of the dust and mud for almost two decades. In the early 1880s, however, the walks began to succumb to the ravages of the Michigan climate. Women tore their long dresses on projecting nails, and men stubbed their toes on warped boards.

1891. Charlie Bennett, who was born in Plymouth in 1863, and who wrote an interesting account of the community as it was when he was a boy, said that L.C. Hough & Son, who ran the Plymouth Elevator (now McLaren's) bought some of the first cement to come into the United States from Germany.

L.C. Hough, W.O. Allen, T.C. Sherwood and E.C. Leach, all of whom lived along the western side of North Main Street, installed the first concrete sidewalks in Plymouth. Ed Hough, son of L.C., told Bennett that

cents a square foot. They lasted more than 50 years.

Road paving in Plymouth followed paving of sidewalks by almost two decades. The need was obviously there long before action was taken. Charlie Bennett said the worst mudholes on Main Street were at the corner of Main and Penniman, and in front of 173 North Main, near Central Middle School. At the latter. Bennett saw two horses and a farm wagon stuck in the mire until help arrived. He said the scene was not unusual.

THERE HAD BEEN pavement, of

CEMENT CAME to Plymouth about the cost to build the walks was 25 sorts, on part of North Main from 1850 to 1872, when plank roads ran from Plymouth to Detroit and to Northville.

The plank road movement had gained impetus when one of its ardent supporters. Governor Epaphroditus Ransom, signed a law in 1848, granting charters to private companies to build and operate the wooden roads. One Michigan historian attributes "the plank road craze" to the abundant timber in the state and claims that preoccupation with plank roads retarded the building of railroads in Michigan.

The 1848 law stipulated that the plank road had to be a minimum of 16 feet wide, eight feet of which was to be built of three inch planks. The planks were nailed to heavy stringers or sometimes laid directly on the

The private corporations, awarded charters, established toll gates where fees were collected from those who used the road. The rate was one cent a mile for a one horse vehicle and two cents for a two-horse wagon.

THE PLANK ROAD in Plymouth was chartered by a man named Otis on May 5, 1850. An 1860 map shows the planks ran from Church Street along Main to Mill Street, then down Plymouth Road to Detroit, and up Mill Street to Northville.

The Plymouth toll gate was on North Main Street, corner of Mill. Although the 1848 law stipulated that oak planks be used. Charlie Bennett said the surface of the Plymouth road as far as Grand River was made of soft pine logs. At Grand River, the road merged with a two-lane plank road going into Detroit.

Karl Starkweather told me that only the right half of Plymouth Road was covered with wood. That was for use by the heavily-laden wagons going to market. The wagons moving back to Plymouth, considerably lighter after the produce had been sold, were expected to use the dirt portion of the

No toll was exacted for the homebound trip.

ALVA G. PECK, when he was 80. told Karl Starkweather in 1927 that toll gate 1 was on Plymouth Road two miles west of Grand River. Gate 2 was on top of the hill east of the River Rouge. Gate 3 was one mile east of "Rough and Ready corners." Gate 4 was the one at the intersection of Main and Mill in Plymouth. A stone marker has been placed near the site by the D.A.R.

The gatekeeper in Plymouth. J.J Covert, collected fees from farmers headed to the Detroit market. As time went on those who used the road complained about paying the fee. saying that the wooden planks were not kept in good condition. Warping made the roadbed uneven. Rotted wood was dangerous for the horses. Some farmers began to "run" the gates when the gatekeeper was not alert.

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
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


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
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
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
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## Glenn students create model United Nations

WESTLAND-You need not travel in international circles to enter into an argument about the relevancy of the United Nations; you only have to travel to John Glenn High School.

At Glenn, members of an advanced debate and Enlish class have wrapped up two months of study on the United Nations which was topped off by participating in a five-day model United Nations Assembly in Ann Arbor.

The 14 students acted as delegates to Kenya and New Zealand. The model assembly called for students to vote on issues as they wished, without regard as to how the country they represented might have voted on the

AS MEMBERS of the Kenya delegation, some students saw the UN'S power as being in the hands of the socalled third world powers, which they believe are anti-United States.

"The third world powers vote as a bloc and have all the power," Richar6 Taracks said. "They run the whole show. The United States should get out of the UN.'

His opinion was refuted by other members of the delegation.

According to Jim Colwell, peace can only be obtained through understanding, and the UN is the only place where world problems can be discussed.

Ray Stickney, who headed the Kenya delegation, said dissolving the UN would not be feasible.

"We've got too much money tied up in the UN. And the UN proved in

Korea that it can do the job. Now we're facing other crises in the

Mideast and with the energy crisis. "Where else can we go to start to

solve the problems?" John Etherington, who headed the New Zealand delegation, contended that too much dependency is put on the United States, but he was against withdrawing from the UN.

"Most of the financial burden is carried by the United States," he said. "We should be trying to achieve more equality by trying to convince countries like Russia of the advantages of supporting the UN."

Jeff Stratton saw the veto power of the five Security Council countries as defeating the purpose of the conclave.

"The bigger countries should be equal to the smaller ones," he said. "But I don't think they will go along with the idea of equality.

"The countries have to learn to be able to bargain without getting up and walking out. But the trouble is that the countries are too stubborn to lis-

AFTER MEETING in committee, the delegations voted on such issues as expelling South Africa from the United Nations, establishment of a Palestinian state with Jerusalem as an international city, and a women's rights proposal.

New Zealand abstained on the women's rights and South African issues and voted against the establishment of a Palestinian state.

Kenya voted for South African expulsion and for the Palestinian state but voted against the women's rights

issue. The students said they preferred voting on their own rather than following the voting patterns of the countries they represented.

"We voted the way we thought we needed to vote after doing the research," Ray Stickney said. "If we would have had to follow patterns, it would have been like feeding us through computer. It would have been like reading a script."

Desiree Carter summed up the feelings of the group by saying: "We didn't know that much about the UNhow it performed and what procedure was needed. Even if some of us didn't get a chance to voice an opinion, we really learned a lot."

Copies of the results of the assembly will be sent to the U.S. House of Representatives and the United Na-

## CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON **Board Proceedings**

Section 4.24 Signs

a) Signs General

1. Measurement of Area of Sign

The entire area within a circle, triangle or parallelogram enclosing the extreme limits of writing, representation, emblem, or any figure of similar character, together with any frame or other material or color forming an integral part of the display or used to differentiate such sign from the background against which it is placed; excluding necessary supports or uprights on which sign is placed but including any

Where a sign has two or more faces, the area of all faces shall be included in determining the area of the sign, except that which two such faces are placed back to back and are at no point more than two (2) feet from one another the area of the sign shall be taken as the area of one face if the two faces are of equal area, or as the area of the larger face if the two faces are of unequal area.

Permit Required. Except as otherwise provided in this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to erect, alter, relocate or maintain within the Township of Canton any sign or advertising structure, without first obtaining a permit from the Township Building In-

spector. A sign not expressly permitted by Section 4.24. is prohibited. (i) The Township Building Inspector shall provide application forms and may require of the applicant such information and descriptive material, plans or drawings so as to determine compliance with this and other applicable ordinances of Canton

(ii) A permit fee shall be paid to the Township of Canton at the time the permit is applied for, according to a fee schedule adopted by the Township Board. (iii) The provisions of this section shall not apply to the normal servicing, changing of an existing sign, message, nor to the cleaning of a sign, the changing of advertising on a sign specifically designated for periodic change of message without a

change in structure such as a billboard, bulletin board of similar type of sign. (iiii) Any sign that is moved to another location either on the same or to another premises, shall be considered a new sign and a permit shall be required for any work performed in connection therewith when required by this Ordinance. (iiiii) As an additional condition precedent to obtaining a permit the contractor, at his expense, shall provide and keep in force during the entire year, comprehensive general liability insurance in the minimum limits of liability insurance to bodily injury of one hundred thousand dollars for each person and three hundred thousand dollars for each occurrence; and in respect to property damage, fifty thousand dollars for each accident. Said policy of insurance shall be conditioned to hold the Township of Canton harmless of every damage of whatsoever nature, whether to persons or property, for which the Township may be held liable by reason of, or which is occasioned, by the doing of an act or the exercise of the privilege for which the permit was granted.

(a) Deposit at time of application. The applicant shall deposit with the Township cash, as established by the Township Board the amount of which shall be sufficient to cover the cost of removing a temporary sign.

(b) The deposit will be retained by the Township throughout the life of the temporary sign and will be returned to the owner as soon as possible after the sign has been completely removed from the premises at the owner's expense.

(c) If the business or activity to which the sign pertains appears to be abandoned, the Township Building Inspector or Ordinance Officer shall exercise all reasonable means at his disposal to determine whether abandonment actually has occurred. If, after completion of his investigation, he determines that the business or activity has been abandoned for a period of ninety (90) days or more, the deposit will be considered forfeited and the Township will undertake to remove and dispose of the

3. Material Requirements.

(iiiiii) Abandoned Signs.

Materials of construction for signs and sign structures shall be of quality and grade as specified by the Canton Township Building Code.

(a) Underground Wiring: Where illumination is desired, underground wiring shall

be required for all signs not attached to a building. (b) Hours of illumination: External signs may not be illuminated between the hours of 11:00 P.M. and 7:00 A.M. except those pertaining to a business open during these hours.

(c) Illumination of signs shall be directed or shaded so as not to interfere with the vision of persons on the adjacent highways or adjacent properties. Such determination shall be made by the Building Department. Nonconforming Signs.

(i) It is the intent of this section to recognize that the eventual elimination as ex-

peditiously as is reasonable, of existing signs that are not in conformity with the

change the shape, size, type or design of the sign;

provisions of this Ordinance, is as much a subject of health, safety and welfare as is the prohibition of new signs that would violate the provisions of this Ordinance. It is also the intent of this Section that any elimination of nonconforming signs shall be effected so as to avoid any unreasonable invasion of established private property (ii) No nonconforming Signs:

(a) Shall be changed to another nonconforming sign;

(b) Shall have any changes made in the words or symbols used or the message displayed on the sign unless the sign is designed for periodic change of message; (c) Shall be structurally altered so as to prolong the life of the sign or so as to

(d) Shall have the face or faces changed when such sign is not of a type of construction to permit such a complete change of face;

(e) Shall be re-established after the activity, business or usage to which it relates has been discontinued for ninety (90) days or longer; and

(f) Shall be re-established after damage or destruction if the estimated expense of reconstruction exceeds fifty (50%) percent of the appraised replacement cost as determined by the Administrator.

Signs Permitted in All Zoning Districts. The following signs are permitted in all zoning districts where the principal permitted use to which they are related is a permitted use in that district.

(i) Signs permitted and not requiring a sign permit; (a) House numbers, name plates (apartments and professional) identifying the occupant or address of a parcel of land and not exceeding two (2) square feet in area. (b) Memorial signs or tablets, names of buildings and date or erection, when cut into any masonry surface or when constructed of bronze or other incombustible ma-

terial. (c) Signs painted on or permanently attached to motor vehicles which are legally licensed and primarily used upon the highways for the transporting of persons, goods or equipment; provided that no such vehicle displaying a sign may be parked within the requiring setback of any business for the purpose of advertising any product or service of that business.

(d) Flags bearing the official design of a nation, state, municipality, educational institution, or noncommercial organization.

(e) Traffic or other municipal signs such as the following: legal notices, railroad crossing, danger and other emergency signs as may be approved by the Township Board.

(f) Community special event signs approved by the Township Board. (g) Theatre-hotel marquee advertising, provided that said advertising is wholly con-

tained with the basic marquee face. (h) Gasoline service stations only may display the following special signs which are deemed customary and necessary to their respective businesses:

-- Customary lettering or other insignia on a gasoline pump consisting of the brand of gasoline sold, lead warning sign, and any other sign required by law and not exceeding a total of three (3) square feet on each pump.

- A single non-illuminated double-faced sign per gasoline pump island, each of which shall not exceed four (4) square feet in area, may be placed on a gasoline pump island; said sign may extend a maximum of two (2) feet above the pumps. (i) Signs not exceeding two (2) square feet which contain only noncommercial messages including designation of rest rooms, telephone locations and direction of door

(j) Signs, non-illuminated, advertising land or buildings for rent, lease and/or sale when located on the land or building intended to be rented, leased, and/or sold and not exceeding five (5) square feet in area. Signs indicating that land or buildings have been sold are limited to thirty (30) days before being removed from premises. (k) Institutional use bulletin board, non-illuminated, not exceeding eighteen (18) square feet in area or an overall height of six (6) feet, for churches, schools or

public buildings or uses. (1) Political signs permitted only in Residential districts. See Section 4.24 (b), (i), and (ii).

(ii) Signs permitted and requiring a sign permit:

(a) Institutional bulletin boards subject to the area, height and placement regulations for ground-pole or wall signs.

(b) Private traffic control signs which conform to the requirements of the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices published in accordance with Section 608 of Public Act 300 of 1949, as amended. (c) Freestanding Ground Signs:

Signs pertaining to a real estate development designed to promote the sale of lots or buildings within a subdivision located within the Township, may be permitted on a temporary basis in any use district, but shall be located upon such land that is part of the subdivision or property being advertised for sale and shall be subject to the requirements and conditions of all applicable codes and ordinances of the Township, as approved by the Building Inspector, and a temporary permit issued. Such non-accessory signs shall not exceed one hundred and twenty (120) square feet in size nor an overall height of twelve (12) feet. Placement shall comply with the building setback requirements. A sign indicating a model dwelling unit's name may be permitted within the front yard setback provided the sign does not exceed two (2) square feet. Residential real estate subdivisions may be allowed two (2) directional signs within the Township by the Board of Zoning Appeals provided such signs are no larger than twenty (20) square feet and are located in such a manner as not to create a traffic hazard are not injurious to the surrounding neighborhood and are not contrary with the spirit and purpose of this Ordinance.

Setback Requirements: All ground signs shall be setback, 3/2 off the distance required for building setback. A one hundred (\$100.00) dollar deposit for each temporary sign to insure proper maintenance and removal shall be made to the Township to be reimbursed, minus administrative and inspection fee, as established by the Township Board, upon removal of this temporary sign.

6. Signs Prohibited in All Zoning Districts;

(i) The following signs shall not be permitted, erected, or maintained in any zoning

(a) Signs which incorporate in any manner any flashing or moving lights other than for the conveyance of non-commercial information which requires periodic

(b) Banners, pennants, spinners and streamers.

(c) String lights used in connection with commercial premises for commercial purposes, other than holiday decorations. Christmas tree lots and other temporary uses may provide string lights, not to exceed five (5) weeks in any calendar year, upon receiving a permit and being inspected by the Electrical Depart-

(d) Any sign which has any visible moving part, visible revolving parts or visible mechanical movement of any description or other apparent visible movement achieved by electrical, electronic or mechanical means, including intermittent electrical pulsations or by action or normal wind currents, other than for the conveyance of noncommercial information which requires periodic (e) Any sign or sign structures which (a) is structurally unsafe, or (b) con-

stitutes a hazard to safety or health by reason of inadequate design or fabrication, mounting, maintenance, dilapidation or abandonment, or (c) is not kept in good repair, or (d) is capable of causing electrical shocks to persons likely to come in contact with it. (f) Any sign which by reason of its size, location, content, coloring or manner

of illumination, constitutes a traffic hazard or a detriment to traffic safety by obstruction of vision of drivers, or by obstructing or detracting from the visibility of any traffic sign or control device on public streets and roads. (g) Any sign which obstructs free ingress to or egress from a required door,

window, fire escape or other required exit way. (h) Signs which make use of words such as "Stop," "Look," "Danger," or any other words, phrases, symbols or characters, in such a manner as to interfere with, mislead or confuse traffic. (i) Any sign or other advertising structure containing any obscene, indecent or

immoral matter.

(j) Any sign unlawfully installed, erected or maintained.

(k) Any sign now or hereafter existing which no longer advertises a bona fide business conducted, or a product sold.

(1) Portable Signs. (m) Any sign, except traffic or other municipal signs, that is located in, projects into, or overhangs a public right-of-way or dedicated easement.

(n) Any sign that exceeds the height limitation of the zoning district in which it is located or if a wall sign extends beyond any architectural feature by more

than one (1) foot. (o) Roof signs: A sign that is mounted on or over the roof of a building or structure.

(p) Bill posting: No placard, poster, circular, showbill, handbill, cards, leaflets or other advertising matter whatsoever except as herein defined, shall be posted, pasted, nailed, placed, printed, stamped or in any way attached to any fence, wall, post, tree, sidewalk, pavement, platform, pole, tower, curbstone, surface or in or upon any casement, right-of-way or on any public property what soever in the Township of Canton. Provided, however, nothing herein set forth shall prevent official notices of the Township, County, State or Federal Government from being posted on any public property deemed necessary.

(b) Signs Permitted by Zoning District. (i) Single Family Residential Districts

- One (1) political sign, not exceeding five (5) square feet shall be permitted within the front yard setback of occupied single family lots not more than thirty (30) days prior to a political election and provided that such sign is located with permission of the owner and is removed by the owner within one (1) day after election.

 For structures and uses other than residential, one institutional use bulletin board shall be permitted, not exceeding eighteen (18) square feet in area or an overall height of six (6) feet.

Placement shall comply with the Building setback requirements. - For single residential use, one name plate and set of house numbers identi-

fying the occupant and address, not exceeding two (2) square feet in area. Roof signs are not permitted in the single family residential district. (ii) Multiple Family and Mobile Home District.

- Signs as permitted in b), (i) above

- Freestanding ground signs, not exceeding sixty (60) square feet in area or an overall height of six (6) feet. Placement shall comply with the building setback requirements, and shall be located no closer than one hundred (100) feet to any single family zoning district boundary. - Roof signs are not permitted in the Multiple Family and Mobile Home Dis-

- One (1) political sign, not exceeding five (5) square feet shall be permitted within the front yard setback of occupied multiple of mobile home properties no more than thirty (30) days prior to a political election and provided that such sign is located with permission of the owner and is removed by the owner within one (1) day after the election. (iii) Restricted Office District.

- Each office unit occupying a building is permitted one (1) sign, not exceed-

ing two (2) square feet in area, indicating name of occupant and profession.

For each office building one wall sign and/or one free-standing ground sign, not to exceed eighteen (18) square feet in area or six (6) feet in height, is permitted. Placement may encroach upon the required front setback, but shall not be less than fifteen (15) feet from the street right-of-way. (iv) Commercial (C1, C2, C3, C5) Districts

All signs as permitted below shall meet the following requirements:

Each parcel of land shall be permitted one wall sign, except that when more than one ground floor business or usage occupies a single parcel of land each such ground floor business or usage have a separate sign. A business center, however, shall be permitted only one (1) ground sign.

In the case of reverse lots (lots held under one ownership fronting on two streets), the number signs shall be determined as though the lots were held by separate owners. In the case of a corner lot situated on two or more streets signs may be permitted on each street in accord with this Ordinance. -- Area, Height and Placement of wall signs two (2) square feet of total signing per one (1) linear foot of building frontage. Maximum sign area of two hundred (200) square feet.

Maximum heights of sign not to extend above roof line. Maximum extension from face of building not to exceed twelve (12) inches. - Ground Signs.

A shopping center development when six (6) or more business establishments

are contiguous or on the same parcel and under the same management, shall be allowed one (1) free standing ground sign, identifying the development and the establishments therein. No other ground signs are allowed. - Area, height and placement of ground signs.

Sign surface area shall not exceed sixty (60) square feet, nor shall the signheight exceed twenty-five (25) feet. Ground signs serving shopping center developments may exceed sixty (60) square feet in area but not more than one hundred fifty (150) square feet. Placement is permitted within the required building setback but not closer

than one hundred (100) feet to any residential district boundary. Window Signs. Window copy, painted or otherwise attached to the window surface, shall be

limited in area to ten percent (10%) of the total window surface of the window to which the sign is attached. Words or symbols three (3) inches or more in height shall be counted as an

item of information. (v) Industrial (M1 and M2) Districts - Wall and ground signs as permitted in commercial districts.

- Billboards. No billboard or outdoor advertising display sign may be erected or maintained.

Savings Clause. - This Ordinance and the various parts, sections and clauses are hereby declared to be severable. If any part, section or clause is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid, it is hereby provided that the remainder of the Ordi-



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
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## Westland school board approves cost saving personnel changes

**WESTLAND** — Creation of a deputy superintendent position and an assistant superintendent of student relations are the highlights of a major reshuffling of the administrative staff by Supt. Timothy Dyer.

The reorganization is estimated to save Wayne-Westland \*taxpayers \$176,890. The school board approved Dyer's plan at this week's meeting.

In presenting the reorganized staff plan, Dyer emphasized the cost saving through streamlining the total organization were realized by the elimination of 10 positions throughout the district. All persons presently holding these positions are either being reassigned to existing vacancies or are retiring from their positions.

Duties that have been performed by these individuals are being assigned to other persons, thus permitting the savings, says Dyer.

"No one needs to be told that we are in an economic crunch. Good management dictates that we tighten our belts while keeping the best interest of the kids in mind," says Dyer.

'This reorganization requires that fewer people must do more work. However, by streamlining the operation with greater emphasis on the team approach to administration, Wayne-Westland will continue to improve and to provide exemplary educational services at less cost.'

UNDER THE plan the district will be divided into two divisions, each being headed by a deputy superintendent. The division of operations will be headed by Tom Blacklock, while the division of instruction will be headed by Dennis O'Neill.

Blacklock will be responsible for the general supervision of the department of business and finance and the department of physical plant and operations. He also will perform the district's legal affairs, coordinate central office management, chair administrative cabinet, supervise new construction, evaluate non-certified personnel, handle appeals from employe groups.

Under the previous administrative structure, Blacklock served as the sole deputy superintendent

O'Neill will chair the administrative council, perform the duties as secretary of the board, direct the department of community relations, coordinate all citizen advisory councils and supervise the evaluation of all certified personnel

Previously administrative aide to Dyer, O'Neill will handle special assignments as directed by the board of superintendent. He will be general supervisor for the departments of curriculum, employe relations and student relations.







## Ethics heart of 'Damman thing,' but laws are toothless and

Those who know Jim Damman breathed a big sigh of relief this Monday when Atvorney General Frank Kelley released a report on the lieutenant governor's alleged conflicts of interest while a Troy councilman.

The opinion held that Damman was not guilty of criminal conduct, although it did conclude that he was a partner in a Troy land investment company that operated in secret and that he did vote as a councilman on matters in which he and his partners had a personal interest. Kelley, however, refused comment on the ethics of Damman's conduct during this period.

This newspaper's reporter in Lansing notes that both Damman and the man who picked him as a running mate, Gov. William Milliken, are adopting a "business as usual" attitude, although both are urging reform of the state's conflict of interest legislation.

Whether Damman will resign (as Tuesday's Detroit Free Press urged in a veiled manner) is, obviously, a matter for his own conscience. But the original disclosures in the press, followed by Kelley's report, have certainly damaged seriously Damman's future as a political force in the state.

IN THIS regard, it seems clear to me that Damman has had the misfortune to get caught in the heightened attention to ethics that has characterized the post-Watergate climate of opinion.

For many years now, these suburbs have had problems with conflicts of interest, particularly concerning real estate zoning and development.

The suburbs began as essentially unplanned communities, with large quantities of real estate gradually caught up in the booming growth of the past 30 years. It was inevitable that money was to be made in such situations. Real estate developer political contributions or land investors' sitting on planning commissions or city councils have been



the stuff out of which countless news stories in these suburbs have been written over the years. They defeated a long-time mayor of Livonia, they blew apart the old establishment in Farmington Township, and now they have damaged Damman.

Certainly, Damman was guilty of poor judgment, especially if he had any ambitions for further public office at the time he got tangled up with the Lincoln partnership. But just as certainly, many, many other people have made the same kind of ethical misjudgment and have not been exposed to the glare of harsh publicity and a post-Watergate environment.

All this is not to condone Damman's ethics; they must be scrutinized by any thoughtful person. What it is to say, however, is that Damman's problem is by no means unique in the suburbs.

WHICH BRINGS us to the shabby state of Michigan's conflict of interest law.

At present, the law forbids people in public service to also do business with the public body they serve and thereby engage in self-enrichment by self-dealing. But the law fails to set forth any ethical guidelines, such as proscribing a public official from voting on a matter in which he or she has a financial interest. Hence, the attorney general could rule that Damman was not in violation of the law, while withholding comment on the ethical questions involved.

. Yet it is precisely the ethical questions involved in public service that are at the heart of the problem. Here the law is vague, and has no teeth and hence is of little help in cleaning up gov-

The fuzziness of the law brings with it another danger. Any law that is vague can be interpreted in many ways by many persons; the risk of parochial interpretation of the state's conflict of interest law has prevented many businessmen or even moderately well-to-do persons from thinking of contributing their talents to the general good. "Why should I," they ask, "when the law is so vague that any ill-disposed lawyer could ruin my reputation by attacking me on conflict of inter-

It's a fair question, and it's a big problem. And somehow I'd like to have a law which permits people with some means to serve the public rather than deter them. At least, they wouldn't be as tempted to snitch as others might be.

TWO TRUSTEES are to be elected. Ron Cowden, who's still in his 30s and was recently named the Livonia Jaycees' outstanding young man, is an excellent bet to seek re-election and a very

John LaRue has retired from his work and is retiring from public life, so he will have to be replaced. His calm, wise act will be a difficult one

for anybody to follow. The faculty strike of 1970 and the dirty word controversy of the Vietnam War days are over: there are scars but hardly deep wounds. If anyone but the women's liberationists has a chip on his (her) shoulder, he (she) is being quiet about

The political divisions on the board have been smoothed over and to a great extent resolved. It's almost easy to forget good ol' Schoolcraft College.

BUT NOW IS an excellent time for voters and civic groups to re-examine the Schoolcraft board.

One reason is the heavy dose of professional educators on the board-five of the eight trustees. Cowden is an administrator in the Livonia School District, Leroy Bennett a Livonia district teacher, Dr. Gerald Cox a Detroit district teacher, Nancie Blatt a former substitute teacher, Rosina Raymond, a former college teacher.

I choose not, in this space, to find fault with any of them, but the college could probably profit from other points of view. Treasurer Paul Kadish

is an insurance man and a political expert of the most respectable sort, and trustee Arch Vallier knows construction and physical environment like the back of his hand.

But wouldn't a college like Schoolcraft benefit from a medical doctor on the board? A financial expert? A lawyer? A skilled tradesman with a union background other than the teachers unions? A commercial artist? A professional musician? A personnel expert from a manufacturing plant?

Hey, how about a person in the real estate business? I dislike seeing real estate persons on city councils, township boards and planning commissions, but I'll bet a year's property taxes that a real estate person could bring an interesting point of view to the Schoolcraft board.

We have five Livonia district residents, two from Plymouth and one from Garden City on the board. We deserve to hear from Northville and Clarenceville, too.

FINALLY, WE NEED some activity on the part of civic groups that don't have an axe to grind when it comes to hearing, interviewing and helping Schoolcraft candidates.

## Computer revolution

### Life will be easier, more complex

Several years ago I wrote a column about the future of the communications industry.

I told of how your television set would change into a combination of picture tube, copying ma-

chine and two-way computer system. I described how future newspapers, instead of being printed in a newsplant and delivered by mail or carrier boy, would be transmitted into the home through the facsimile reproducer (the copying machine) and the customer would be billed

through the computer. I talked of how, with cable television, each home would have up to 82 channels available to them, some with the usual programming and some devoted to cultural or sports events.

A HOUSEWIFE would be able to do her grocery shopping at home, with one channel having a television camera go up and down the aisles of a supermarket, showing each item with a number. She could type out her grocery list by number on the computer, insert her credit card, and a few hours later her groceries would be delivered to

New school buildings wouldn't have to be built because students would go to school only two or three days a week.

The rest of the time they would watch classes on their television set and be tested through the computer on what they had learned.

They would go to school only for consulting and peer relationships, such as athletics.

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## Murder hits the suburbs, but it's no time to lose faith

Two Livonia residents stabbed to death, a shooting death in Garden City, a rape-killing in Farmington Hills- all point to the reality that murder as a way of life is here to stay in the suburbs.

The murders occurring this weekend in western Wayne and Oakland counties brought to mind a conversation with a suburban police official a few months ago.

"The suburbs have been lucky up until now, as far as murder is concerned. But one of these days it will start and never stop."

THE CHALLENGE to the suburbanite is how to deal with the grisly reality. Fear is the culprit which can destroy a community, when such incidents happen. After a series of murders, residents warily start shutting off themselves from their neighbors.

Families stop sitting on their porches during the warm summer nights. Park concerts become sparsely attended. Community activities lose their punch because residents imagine it is dangerous

to go out at night. Psychologists, sociologists and the whole range of experts who spend their time pondering such things have yet to figure out why communities are suddenly inundated with seemingly violent and senseless murder.

The usual platitudes are thrown around about the victims and suspects, but after so many years of watching the murder rate grow and grow on the other side of Telegraph, the words seem even more empty than they really are.

THIS ATTITUDE doesn't happen overnight. It takes years perhaps. But slowly the fear takes its toll, until the community becomes an area of fragmented families in worlds unto themselves. Community identity and pride are lost. Then residents start moving.

But suburbanites can fight this overwhelming urge to run. More than ever, residents must become united. Courage must prevail to resist the corrosive attitude which silently, yet effectively, invades the minds of residents.

### Re-employment theory flawed

Editor:

The Rozian theory (on re-employment subsidy proposal) is flawed. The feature story in the Spotlight section (March 20) describes a government subsidy program for the auto industry which would provide a \$5,000 subsidy for every worker called back to work to build cars.

The theory has it that every worker builds 10 cars per year; therefore, the price of those cars can be reduced by \$500, thereby promoting sales. Of course, the federal dollars expended would be recovered by the savings in welfare and unemployment costs, and the government comes out ahead.


As is true of so many of the irrational schemes promoted by well-meaning but incapable people to involve the federal government in matters best left to the marketplace, the scheme is flawed. I am reasonably sure that our legislators will perceive the non sequitur and dismiss the proposal forthwith; however, for the benefit of your readers, I should like to identify the

Assuming the questionable premise that this scheme would re-employ all of the unemployed automotive work force, the current production rate would increase from 7.5 million to 9.0 million cars per year, a 20 per cent increase in production and employment. The subsidy must be divided among the total production of 9.5 million vehicles per year, not the additional 1.5 million units in order to be equitable.

This would result in a cost reduction of \$100 per unit, not \$500 as stated in the theory. Such a reduction would not generate the sales as did the \$500 rebate program just completed. I suspect it would merely generate more cars for the inventory lots, unemploy those just recalled, and impose an additional burden to the already intolerable burden of the nation's taxpayers.

Area prep grid coaches hail the recently approved Michigan High School football state tournament as "an idea whose time has come."

Of the five coaches contacted, none believed that such a tournament should not be implemented although each had suggestions or reservations about the tournament as it is structured

On March 21, directors of the Michigan High School Athletic Association announced approval of a state football tournament which had been tried out only on paper last year. Under those plans, the state would

be divided into four regions with one school from each region each class being selected on a point system to represent the region in a one-game knockout tournament.

Michigan high schools are divided into classes of A, B, C and D depending on their enrollment with A being the largest and D the smallest.

Under the point system, points would be given for both offensive and defensive efficiency, won-loss record. caliber of opposition and record of opposition.

Under the system, unbeaten Plymouth Salem would have qualified for the state tournament from its region as it had the most points among

Class A competition. However Livonia Franklin, equally unbeaten and Birmingham Brother Rice also unbeaten and awarded all major newspaper and wire service mythical state championships, would not have qualified because both were in Salem's region.

THIS POSSIBLE INEQUITY which

teams being left out of the tournament, drew the most criticism from coaches questioned including Salem's Tom Moshimer.

"I think the tournament is a good thing, but I think certain things in it deserve some thought," he said.

"I'm particulary concerned about only four teams getting in from each class. I think they should look into the possibility of extending the tournament one week and taking eight team into it. I like the idea of taking the top team from each region and the next four top point getters-regardless of re-

Livonia Stevenson head coach Jack Reardon echoed Moshimer's senti-

"The only problem I see with the tournament is that there were three unbeaten teams in our area and only one of them, Plymouth Salem, would have gone into the tournament. You just don't come up with an unbeaten team that often.

"I would like to see some provision for getting unbeaten teams into the tournament. If that means extending the season another week, maybe that's what they ought to do. If they're going to do this thing, they should do it right."

WHILE THURSTON COACH Don Riehl favored the tournament, he said changes might have to be made in its format.

Detroit Race Course on Good Friday. Management has arranged a nine race program with the usual weekday starting tile of 3:30 p.m.

The management asked for and received permissiom from Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley for the Good Friday program.

The amended racing act, which was changed a year ago to allow Sunday racing at thoroughbred tracks, goes at the matter in kind of a backdoor manner. It provides there shall not be racing on Sundays, Good Friday or Christmas Day at Michigan harness racing tracks.

Therefore the assumption is that the thoroughbred track can operate every day of the year. That was the ruling of the commissioner in telling the DRC to go ahead.

At the same time there was talk of Easter Sunday racing but that was quickly squelched by DRA Vice President and General Manager Dick Wil-

"We aren't planning on Easter races this year nor in the future," he said, "We did decide to race on Good Friday because most religious services end at 3 p.m. and there isn't any good reason why we shouldn't race." The track will swing into its spring

and summer meeting next week. The big mile track will be closed Monday and then move into six day operations including Sunday.

Originally under the dates granted by the racing commissioner, the track would have been dark the first three days of next week for the changeover from a cheaper winter season to the better 90-day major meeting.

Effective Sunday, April 6, the DRC will start racing on the Sabbath for the first time. Then the weekly schedule will be racing on Sunday, dark on Mondays, and racing the remainder of the week. This schedule will be the pattern for the final 90 days.

So what has been a disaster for one track may prove to be a boon to the other. It means Northville Downs will be operating for more than two weeks with no competition.

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





If you have some shady spots and want a splash of color, there are three good plants you can try: impa-tions, colous and begonias. These are shady ladies well worth growing. Of these plants, impatiens (pronounced im-pay-she-enz) has gained quickly in popularity. Day plants not only work out well in the shaded areas in a suburban garden, but also

take conditions of extreme air pollu-

tion, and are tough enough to provide a continuous show of color for many It's time to be sowing seed of impatiens, and there's a trick in getting a

FIRST, impatiens should be exposed to light but not direct sunlight. That means you should not cover the seed after sowing. Fluorescent lights aid germination.

If you want impatiens for house plants, seed should be started as early as February. For outdoor plants, wait until April to start. Seed started too early will produce plants that are tall and spindly. If yours get too tall, pinch them back before setting them

TRICK NO. 2 is to start the seed in a loose mixture, using one of the soilless mixtures such as Jiffy Mix, Pro-Mix, or similar materials. Or you can use a mixture of one part sand and

one part peat. To keep the plants from becoming overgrown and poorly flowered, go

easy on the water and plant food. Cooler-grown plants flower earlier and are shorter than those grown warm. Day length (about nine hours) makes impatiens flower earlier on a shorter, bushier plant than a 12-hour day at 78 to 80 degrees F.

IF YOU'RE SHORT on garden space, plan on growing tomatoes and other vegetables in tubs and other containers. It's the perfect answer for growing crops without a garden. You

#### should start collecting tubs, half-barrels, boxes, etc. so you'll have them on hand when a busy planting season

rolls around. Besides tomatoes, you can grow cucumbers, pole beans, squash, gourds

and other climbing plants. They'll need a support such as wire, trellis or string.

### Plant of the week

Grevillea robusta or silk oak, a member of the Proteaceae family, is a rapid growing ornamental tree. Easy to grow, this houseuvt will withstand neglect and thrive in less than ideal conditions.

There are over 200 species of Grevillea, most growing freely in Australia. Grevillea robusta is sometimes used as a street tree in states with warm climates but will not withstand Michigan winters.

G. robusta grows to the height of a large tree but can be trimmed and shaped to keep it within the limits of a houseplant. It has finely divided, fer-

nlike foliage growing alternately, usually in pairs.

G. ROBUSTA produces flowers in its natural state but does not flower indoors when kept small. It is most often used as a houseplant at a height of one to five feet and is suitable for a decorative planter.

Horticulturists at Michigan State University say the following conditions are ideal for active growth of G. robusta. Remember that these are ideal conditions and G. robusta will withstand hard usage and neglect.

SOIL should consist of equal parts perlite or vermiculite, garden soil and peat or humus. Purchased potting soil can be used successfully.

WATER-Drench the soil thoroughly but allow it to become moderately dry between waterings.

TEMPERATURES should range between 50-55 degrees F at night and rise to 70 degrees on a sunny day.





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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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## Bond denied for murder suspects

Defendents in the Jan. 28 shotgun slaying of Canton Township resident Terry L. Buchman, 20, were arraigned before Circuit Court Judge James N. Canham Tuesday at the County Prosecutor's Office.

The three defendants, Barry L. Provow, 27, his wife Leslie, 18, and Robert Umney, 22, were denied bail in what Judge Canham termed the "classic criteria of a case where bond should not be granted." They were remanded to the Wayne County jail.

IN APPLYING for the bond, defense counsel for Barry Provow, Michael Pantel, called the case against his client one based purely on "inference and innuendo.

Gary Davis, attorney for Leslie Provow, 18 joined in the plea and said that his client wasn't shown to be directly involved.

The arraignment followed a preliminary examination before Judge Dunbar Davis in the 35th District Court in Plymouth.

In binding the defendants over for trial, Davis said the evidence presented him showed "probable cause that a crime had been committed and that the defendants were responsible." He termed the murder "an easy case and a gangland type execution."

Counsel for Umney, Plymouth attorney Robert Delaney did not join in the motion for bond; but he did

request the pretrial hearing be delayed so the defense could study the transcript of the preliminary exam. Judge Canham granted the delay after Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Murray Slomovitz consented.

Delaney explained the defense lawyers had not had time to study the transcript from the earlier hearing.

DAVIS MOTIONED that Leslie Provow be given prompt medical attention because she might be pregnant. Canham advised the sheriff of the problem and said the matter would be

The pretrial hearing is currently scheduled for April 8 and Delaney indicated the trial would probably begin 'some 30 to 60 days after the pretrial

According to Delaney, the hearing will be devoted to discussing evidence, witnesses, problems such as time, and consenting between the attorneys to what is admissible evi-

He said, "While it will be used primarily for the attorney to discuss the evidence, it is possible the attorneys might agree to a lesser charge for the defendants."

MUCH OF THE COUNTY'S case against the defendants is based on the testimony of Lloyd Cash, 20 who allegedly saw the murder.

## General Motors urges national energy policy

By DENNY COFFMAN

DETROIT-Gabriel N. Tiberio, director of energy conservation for General Motors Corp., is a little irked. "What irritates me is that the automobile industry

has become the target of those who talk about saving energy," says Tiberio.

"But, it is the American lifestyle that has to change, because energy is no longer a luxury but a necessity.

General Motors gave tangible acknowledgement to the "energy crunch" in late 1973 when it appointed Tiberio energy director to head up a special "energy section" on the 11th floor of the GM Building in Detroit.

THE CONCEPT is not new to the company, however: as early as 1956, one of the company's plants stressed the need to save electricity and natural gas.

Tiberio, too, has been in and out of corporate programs to either reduce pollution or save energy. Only this time it's different. GM's top brass, including E. M. "Pete" Estes, president, have been calling

for a national energy policy. The corporate staff is acquiring documentation of plant level achievements in energy conservation, including the amount of gas, oil, coal or electricity savedand passing the information along to each of the 150 GM plants across the nation.

GM engineers are at work developing new technology aimed at the utilization of relatively plentiful resources, such as coal.

CASE HISTORIES are legion, where plants used better insulation, better heat transfer or better heat treatment in order to save millions of Btu's of power. The energy section has acquired documentation showing 200 cases of conservation that have saved about 21/2 trillion Btu's in barely one year (125,000 Btu's equal a gallon of

The savings, though, are not simply for idealistic reasons. For the world's top company, "there has to be an economic payoff," says Tiberio.

The "payoff" has to be in dollar terms, he says. But more importantly, without the company's conservation effort, many plants would have closed for lack of fuel.

"If some of our plants continued to use the same amount of energy today they used in 1973, they could not function because of tighter controls on such fuels as

BUT, he says, GM's conservation program may be self-defeating.

While GM is saving fuel, he contends, other companies and individuals are making little or no effort at all. That means that a fuel, such as natural gas saved by GM simply goes to someone else, who consumes it as though there were no limit.

In effect, what's good for General Motors is bad for General Motors.

### In effect, what's good for GM is bad for GM

If an allocation system ever becomes a reality. GM's allocation for highly essential natural gas would be computed on a base period. If GM were diligent during that period and saved energy, future allocations would be

The solution advocated by Estes and Tiberio: a national energy policy. "I would like to see more activity by the government," says Tiberio - a seemingly ironic statement from a man whose company has experienced tight governmental scrutiny in such areas as pollution control and safety standards.

"Safety can be a political thing," says Tiberio, "but energy cannot. Yet, we are no closer to a national energy policy."

TIBERIO CLAIMS that new home construction almost always assumes the use of natural gas; and, every new home with a gas tie-in deprives industry of the precious fuel.

But if natural gas is the most "natural" fuel for homeowners, then oil is "the easiest alternative" for industry, according to Tiberio. It's easier, and in many cases cheaper, for companies to burn oil rather than coal to fire boilers, for example, thus eliminating any incentive to save oil.

GM, on the other hand, fires 60 per cent of its boilers with coal to generate steam and, says Tiberio, "we are looking at all our boilers to phase out the use of oil." "But why should we give up the use of oil if someone

else goes ahead and burns it wastefully?

GM and other large companies have been criticized because they pay less per unit for electricity than do residential users and Tiberio claims the criticism is not wholly justified.

"We save power companies millions of dollars by installing all the in-plant connections and even reading the meters. Economy of scale comes into play here. We save the utility companies money and we in turn receive savings in our bills."

GM CURRENTLY is in "phase II" of its energy conservation program. Phase I called for "the immediate elimination of any needless or wasteful use of energy.

Phase I entailed shutdown of equipment when not needed; improved maintenance and insulation, such as repairing compressed air and steam leaks; better scheduling; reduced lighting; ventilation and air temperature adjustments.

For example, Detroit Diesel Allison Division revised its office cleaning schedules to utilize more daylight hours. Savings: 3.5 billion Btu's a year.

Cadillac Motor Car Division reset paint bake and dry-

off oven temperatures to a lower temperature, resulting in savings of almost 30 billion Btu's a year. It achieved a 20 per cent reduction in the use of

energy, the goal set by GM corporate leadership. PHASE II, however, is what Neil DeKoker, an engi-

neer in the Energy Management Section, calls the

During this phase, the company plans changes in products, processes and controls, plus the use of new techniques-lasers, for example-in the machinery used to

Some of Phase II's accomplishments:

·Buick Motor Division provided a nitrogen atmosphere to cool furnaces, thereby allowing stock to remain in the furnace over the weekend. Savings: 7 billion Btu's a year.

·Guide Lamp Division took the hot exhaust from the sealed beam headlight manufacturing lines and combined it with the outside air for use as building heat during the winter months. Savings: 65.8 billion Btu's a

 Harrison Radiator Division designed and installed an air-to-water heat exchanger that takes hot exhaust from an oven and uses it to raise the temperature of the rinse water on a related process. Savings: 6 billion

IN ADDITION to searching for ways of saving old forms of energy, GM is studying two other important new sources for its own supply.

The use of waste materials offers a viable alternative with some economic benefits as well. The Buick plant in Flint uses pulverized coal boilers to burn solid waste and waste oil sludge. A similar system is being installed in the GMC Truck and Coach plant in Pontiac.

The Fisher Body-Pontiac plant recently demonstrated how 10 per cent of its boiler coal-feed could be provided by burning of 100,000 scrap tires. Tires were shredded and bead wire removed with a magnet, to provide the 90-10 mixture of coal and rubber.

Not only can waste oil be rerefined, but it can also be burned as a fuel when it can no longer be recycled as a lubricant. Power plants could burn part of the waste oil with their normal oil as part of their boiler feed.



GM even has gone so far as to purchase its own fuel sources. One of these is a natural gas field in Lordstown, Ohio. GM will buy the field and share its output with the State of Ohio.

As DeKoker puts it: "I think it's apparent that we've left an age of abundance and are now in an age of scar-

If GM pursues its conservation program with continued vigor, a statement by a former GM executive who later became Secretary of Defense, Charles Wilson, may ring true: "What's good for General Motors is good for the country.'

If the Plymouth group was going to place an advertisement that's how the message might read. The guild is presently working out of the Plymouth Central School on Main Street in Plymouth but feels it is about time it had a permanent home.

"We are revitalizing the theater" guild," says Leonard Pavia, guild president and Plymouth resident. "We want to grow as a cultural concern in the Plymouth area and feel a new home is necessary.'

The Plymouth Theater Guild is under the auspices of the adult education program of the Plymouth Community School District and does not have to pay for use of the school facilities. It is, however, charged a maintenance fee of about \$100 for its productions, says Mrs. Clemie Cyburt, guild vice president.

"The school has been marvelous," adds Mrs. Cyburt, "but scheduling has become increasingly difficult. Besides, the school facility is not ours."

Mrs. Cyburt says that before the P & A burned down the Plymouth guild



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## Livonia's first opera is lively, delightful

There are a few reasons why the first joint venture of the Michigan Opera Theater and the Oakway Symphony wasn't a total loss.

The two groups collaborated on a performance of Rossini's "Barber of Seville" Saturday in Churchill High School, Livonia.

First, the singers were well coached in their diction, and since the opera was sung in English nearly every word could be understood and laughed

SECOND, THE staging by Christopher Alden was lively and not so farfetched that it wasn't plausible. It was

delightful and engaging. Also a few of the voices were excellent. Rockwell Blake, for instance, has marvelous technique, and he gets a chance to show it off in the role of Count Almaviva.

Allan Glassman was creditable as the irrepressible Figaro, and Karen Ruczynski didn't get to sing enough for this reviewer's taste.

Nancy Fox Hoover was off in her singing. Her technique seemed weak and her voice unsupported. Even so, she performed charmingly the role of the coquetish Rosina. Her acting matched the enthusiasm of the rest of the cast which was on its toes through-

The same cannot be said for the Oakway Symphony, which was generally not aware of what was going onthat is, no two performers seem to be aware at the same time.

The score appears easy, but is deceptively difficult. Adding the vocal di- pany the MOT.

mension to the conductor's and instrumentalists' task was too much.

Mercifully, the opera includes much recitative, sung only with harpsichord accompaniment, so the orchestra did not continually have to carry what appeared to be an unbearable load.

ACT H'S SECOND scene was especially disheartening, when the intonation was bad on both the singers' and the orchestra's parts. Also the entrances throughout the opera were shoddy and unacceptable

When Almaviva appeared in the second act in his drunk scene, he appeared to be merely uncomfortable in a pair of new shoes. But it didn't matter, the point was made.

Unfortunately for opera in general, this kind of performance is what the neophyte opera goer spends his money on because he or she isn't sure he'll like it.

The MOT's residency program is designed to bring affordable and creditable opera to areas which don't have such experiences at hand often. Opera would have been better served, one thinks, by a smaller and more proficient ensemble accompanying rather than the larger, more unwidely ensemble which played Saturday.

Perhaps with more exposure to operatic literature and more practice in performing it, the Oakway will progress into an orchestra capable of playing such repertoire. At present it simply isn't up to it.

Another performance will be given April 26 at 8 p.m. in Plymouth-Salem High School Auditorium. This time, the Plymouth Symphony will accom-

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



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




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## How some experts view the drug scene

By MARGARET MILLER

Young people may turn to drugs and alcohol "because we've taught them to expect instant solutions to problems." believes psychiatric social worker Bobbi Toll.

Not as many take that course as some people think, says Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch, director of clinical research at Hawthorn Center. Maybe five to seven per cent of youth population, but that's plenty to mean tragedy for parents and society.

For those who do, an "equal treatment," no-coddling approach to rehabilitation is what's recommended by Barbara Reid, who runs a therapeutic day care center.

Parents worrying about their kids should watch their own actions, says Phyllis Tuttle, who coordinates an industrial drug and alcohol abuse program. How they drink and how they take prescription drugs is what she's talking about.

They also should remember, adds Dr. Edward Leibson, currently with the Wayne County department of substance abuse services, that "behavior patterns of those who take drugs are more important than the drugs themselves.

And all concerned should keep in mind that many agencies stand ready to help when substance abuse problems arise-that from Dr. J. Irwin Nichol, Dr. Liebson's counterpart on the state level.

ALL THE SPEAKERS participated in a panel discussion of "Is Your Child Next?" in alcohol and drug abuse, put on at Madonna College Monday night by the Michigan State Bar Association and the Lawyers' Wives of Michigan. Wayne County Probate Judge Ira G. Kaufman moderated and his wife, Lillian, was in charge of the event.

For a couple of hundred parents. teachers, students, counselors and clergymen, the panel approached the substance abuse problem from many angles, going into both prevention and treatment

Joining them in the presentation were Willie McKeever, an artist who has come through Ms. Reid's center, and a speaker who identified himself with the words "My name is Arnie, and I'm an alcoholic."

Both talked of the need for desire on the part of the user to end addic-

THE IDEA THAT SEEDS of substance abuse begin at home was pushed by both Ms. Toll, a Farmington Hills resident who works with young addicts, and Mrs. Tuttle, whose program is with Ford Motor Co. employ-

"We live in a society," Ms. Toll said, "that is addictive because it puts so much stress on instant solutions. Parents seem to tell their children, 'You have a problem? Take an aspirin, try a tranquillizer, go buy something.

"Young people are so used to getting things so quickly that they have not learned to cope.

"If you want to cope without working at it, taking a drug gives you a quick solution, and group identity and a full-time occupation too."

Ms. Toll said parents should "look for more lasting solutions, and teach them to our children and ourselves."

MS. TUTTLE SAID her work is concerned mainly with alcohol misuse, because "it's the drug of greatest use in the work place." and added that so far she has been dealing mainly with professionals and supervisors so that employes seeking help can find sympathetic viewing of their problems.

"I think the most effective educational device we have is our own actions," she stated. "I mean drinking in moderation if we choose to drink and trying to find more non-chemical approaches to problems rather than going so fast to prescription drugs."

Dr. Rabinovitch put his stamp of approval on the rehabilitation program described by Ms. Reid.

She pointed out that there are many kinds of addiction, and her counseling also involved those whose problem is obesity. Then she added

Dad teaches family, classes

"It's important to say that addicts are like other people-they, too, bleed

"So I try to treat them equally—I'm starting to demand of them what I would demand of myself. If my client is to be able to go on to a job. I must

THIS APPROACH Dr. Rabinovitch stated, seems to be a more popular one these days in dealing with problem drug users, "and I think it's all to the good."

"You must have concern for the person you are dealing with," he said, "and you need acceptance. But counseling used to end there in endless rapping. The next step should be a practical plan, one that does not over-demand but does not demean either."

The Hawthorn Center leader described six general categories of young people who turn to drugs and heavy use of alcohol.

These he listed as the kid who feels alienated and turns to drugs for peer acceptance, the kid who is depressed. maybe over a difficult family situation, the neglected kid, the over-indulged kid, the younger one used as a 'plaything' by older brothers, and the "generally delinquent, highly-cor-

HE ALSO pointed out that statistics may be deceiving when it comes to a true picture of drug and alcohol

"The indications are that 82 per cent of today's young people have tried these things by the time they finish high school," he said.

"But the kid who has a couple of beers a month or tries an occasional joint of marijuana hardly belongs in these statistics.

"It's a group of five to seven per cent we are talking about. And while this means tragedy for many parents, let's think too about the 95 per cent who do not abuse drugs or alcohol.'

lated, had been informed by the cab driver that he was charging \$75 to take them from the airport to the city, so they told him to let them off near a service station.

"He charged us \$25 just to open the trunk so we could get our luggage." she added indignantly.

Then she described her chic attire for the occasion.

"I was wearing a grey pantsuit," she said, "and I had been sitting so long the knee bulges stayed when I stood up. Then, it was cold, so I put on my golf socks. So there I was, with those little white balls hanging out of my high-heeled shoes."

AMONG THE QUESTIONS from the audience was one asking if Mrs. Cole and Christina Ford are friends.

"Christina and I are very good friends," answered Mrs. Cole. "We have a different life style. She has 27 servants. She has a lust for life and a good sense of humor. She's a nice gal, and so good-looking."

Asked about Mrs. Ford's reaction to current publicity about the arrest of her husband, she said:

"Christina was away watching a king being crowned. I don't know if Henry was next."

"Henry is a very gutsy guy- very straight forward," she added.

Her own husband she described as "the most brilliant man I know, and not just about cars."

WHILE MRS. COLE often mingles with the high and the mighty, she also spends time with the disadvantaged and the handicapped.

With a PhD in speech therapy, she worked in the past as a teacher to the mentally retarded, and continues to aid organizations involved with the handicapped. Last weekend she participated in an Easter Seal telethon.

"All my life I have been connected with the handicapped for some strange reason," she said. "I think it is because I feel so lucky to have four children who are mentally and phys-

"If you are lucky you have to do something to say thank you.

"When I was growing up," she concluded, "teaching speech therapy was my lifelong ambition. But the accomplishments for these handicapped children came so slowly. It made me want to push them hard, because I so anuch wanted them to improve."

He's up on Ukrainian egg art

"This is one of the most relaxing things I do," smiles Eugene Stadnik, as his fingers guide a wax-filled stylus across a smooth, white egg, creating an intricate and symbolic design.

Stadnik is practicing the ancient folk art of Ukrainian egg decorating, traditionally called "Pysanky." After dipping the egg in four differ-

ent colors of dye, Stadnik removes the beeswax and the egg is varnished, illuminating the brilliant colors and complex pattern. "I've been doing this all my life,

but didn't really start studying the art until about five years ago," says Stadnik. "I began by copying designs then gradually developed my own." Stadnik's mother taught him the art and now he is passing it along to his

sons, Micah, 9, and John Clifton, 13. His wife, Nina, also decorates but adds "my husband is the expert of the BESIDES TEACHING his family. this Livonia businessman conducts a

decorating class in Mt. Hope Congregational Church on Schoolcraft in Livonia. He presently has about 30 students, a mixture of adults and junior high school students. He also is cubmaster of Livonia Pack 900 in the Sunset District, and has offered his class to the scouts.

So far this year Stadnik has completed 10 eggs and plans to decorate about 10 more before Easter Sunday. His most elaborate creations require 12 hours of work. "The more detailed the design the more time it takes."

Besides being colorful and beautiful, the eggs are symbolic. Many of Stadnik's eggs are decorated with the netted triangle which suggests Christ fishing for men, a wheat sheaf which is the symbol of bread, and food for the soul, and animals which signify prosperity. Circles indicate good fortune and trees represent youth and good health.

STADNIK KEEPS a few reference books available to help introduce his family and classes to the various symbols, but adds that most people pick them up by just watching.

"Because the eggs are so symbolic they make great gifts," says Stadnik. "Ukrainian egg decorating is really suitable for all seasons," he adds while displaying a Christmas egg.

Stadnik has kept his sons' first attempts at egg designing and compares them with their most recent creations. He's obviously very proud of their progress.

Most of Stadnik's eggs will be given away as friendship gifts but a few 'special' eggs will remain in the family's collection. The Stadnik's oldest egg belongs to Mrs. Stadnik. It was an engagement present from her husband 18 years ago.

"It's an old Ukrainian custom to give your best egg as a love gift," ex-plains Stadnik. "When a girl likes a boy she gives him her finest egg. It's folklore that the girl who draws the straightest lines will make the best

In the Stadnik's case the tradition was turned around some and Mrs. Stadnik says it was probably for the best. "My lines are not very straight," she laughs.

EGG DECORATING is generally a family affair in the Stadnik household. The family gathers around the kitchen table. "I enjoy watching the children work and I like to supervise them since the process involves a lighted candle," says Stadnik. "I like to do this because it's fun," adds his son,

Stadnik says whether the boys continue the art is up to them. "Like all other youngsters they have other interests-Micah loves animals and John Clifton has a passions for cars." As for Stadnik, his egg designs get

more imaginative every year.

At its most recent session, as on earlier occasions, the board thanked Mrs. Vukmirovich for her interest and made no further response.





### 'Time for commitment now'

## Planner urges loop OK

PLYMOUTH-"This community should make a commitment once and for all to a bold and dramatic effort to create a downtown that will endure as a proud focal point, a point of community identity and a base for maintaining the physical, social, and most important, economic vitality of this city," commented planner Jay Eldridge to members of the Chamber of

Eldridge, a corporate vice-president of Vilican-Leman and Associates, told chamber members at a luncheon Wednesday that the city is "further from being committed to a program for development of the central business district than it was two years

He attributed the decreased probability of a rejuvenated downtown to outside economic problems, but added "the most depressing effect on all efforts to move downtown forward come from within.'

Vilican-Leman is the consulting firm that studied the loop road proposal, and Eldridge commented. "The center of a new and rejuvenated downtown revolves around the implementation of the loop road.

He added, "This cannot be done in a piecemeal manner if you want to be dramatic enough to attract attention and compete with other communities for developers and retailers. If you implement the loop road on a trial basis with use of road signs you invite fail-
