Schools seek June 10 millage vote

PLYMOUTH—Plymouth Community Schools will seek a 5.15 mill tax renewal and 0.46 mills in added operating funds in the June 10 election.

School board members voted unanimously to adopt the millage proposals for the ballot, while still weighing estimates for the 1975-76 school year budget.

Supt. John M. Hoben said the 0.46 mills, if approved, would not mean a tax increase for property owners in the district.

"We are asking the voters to ap-

prove funds which were allocated in different accounts in the past," Hoben said.

With the end of a one-year 0.4 safety millage and the reduction of the debt retirement millage by .06 during the next school year, the added 0.46 operating mills will keep the total tax levy for the district at the same level.

Marcia Borowski, school board secretary, said the additional 0.46 mills would represent a cost of \$9 a year for a resident living in a home valued at \$40,000.

"I can't see someone voting no on this millage, just to lower their taxes by \$9 a year," Mrs. Borowski said.

Hoben said the 5.15 mill renewal represents income of \$2.2 million for the next school year, approximately 13 per cent of the tentative budget of \$17 million. The 0.46 in additional operating funds will provide another \$192,000 for the school district's day-to-day operations.

The board also voted unanimously to "go on record" with district residents, and levy the 0.46 mills only if

current financial projections are accurate.

Hoben said that the projected loss to the district in more than \$70,000 in state aid for reading support programs has a slim chance of being reinstated. He added that the general state aid could come in higher than has tentatively been projected, although he added that it could also be lower than current projections.

The district expects to receive approximately \$4 million in total state revenue, an increase of 25 per cent over last year. Projected enrollments

are pegged at 13,300 students, up five per cent over this year's 12,668.

The board considered the possibility of earmarking the 0.46 mill proposal for capital improvement and maintenance, but declined after Trustee George Lawton questioned what the failure of the millage would mean to the district.

Hoben said that cuts would have to be made in areas other than maintenance and capital improvements if the 0.46, earmarked or not, went down to defeat.

Both the 5.15 mill renewal and the 0.46 mill levies will have six-year terms expiring in 1981.

The board also was asked to consider putting the two proposals together in one question for 5.61 mills.

Hoben said the citizens millage election committee recommended that the board place the proposals to the voters separately.

"The committee felt that in total honesty, we should go for them separately, because the 0.46 is not a renewal," he said.

Appeal weighed in patrol suit

Plymouth and Canton township officials are recovering from the shock of Circuit Court Judge Thomas J. Foley's March 27 opinion declaring that the county does not have to pay for the sheriff's road patrol.

Officials from Plymouth and Canton will meet with representatives from Brownstown, Sumpter, Northville, Huron, and Van Buren townships to discuss the opinion and strategy for the future today (Thursday) at the Canton Township offices.

According to Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, the discussion will be centered around appeal possibilities and whether or not to retain attorney Louis Wechsler.

Greenstein said, "I have read the opinion in a cursory manner and I cannot agree. If the townships cannot go to the courts and ask for police protection for their residents then the courts have outlived their usefulness and are of no value whatsoever."

The county has 10 days in which to draw up an order of dismissal to be signed by Judge Foley. After that the townships have 20 days to file an appeal.

Commented Greenstein, "I am going to suggest that the office of Burt Burgoyne be hired to conduct an appeal of the decision. This decision should be appealed and tested. If we fail to appeal, theoretically 20 days after the order is signed the sheriff can withdraw his services—and that is not about to happen."

According to Greenstein, as long as the decision is being appealed the sheriff cannot legally withdraw his services.

Plymouth Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren said he had not seen the decision. "All we know right now is the county is not obligated to pay for the sheriff's road patrol. I really don't know what we will do until after we meet."

According to McLaren, Wechsler was hired several years ago "before my time." Each of the seven town-

ships appropriated \$1,000 when Wechsler was retained.

"He was hired by consensus of the seven supervisors. He outlined his method of approach to the issue and the supervisors agreed. He brought in another trial lawyer, Saul Levin, when the court action was instituted, and some of the supervisors disagreed with his ideas," explained McLaren.

According to McLaren, the \$1,000 has been exceeded. He said, "the money was allocated a long time ago, but we never used it. It just lay in escrow. Now, we find after the court action, that we have overspent our limit slightly."

According to Greenstein, the townships recently received a bill from Wechsler for \$3,015, or \$430 per township. That covered the period from August 30, when the injunction was filed, to the end of January, when an amended complaint was filed.

Canton Clerk John Flodin said he recalled receiving a bill earlier for approximately the same amount.

The injunction was filed and granted at the end of August 1974 when the county threatened to quit funding the road patrol entirely for the last fiscal quarter of 1974 (September-November). Wechsler asked for a declaratory judgment that would outline the county's responsibility in funding the road patrol, and further asked the current level of service be maintained.

He amended the complaint in January 1975 by stating the current level of service was inadequate and more protection was necessary.

Lawyers for the county in turn asked that the case be dismissed on the grounds it was a legislative matter.

On March 27, Foley granted the motion for dismissal.

Greenstein said that the reasoning behind Foley's opinion was that the funding and level of service for the road patrol was a legislative matter. He said, "The main thrust of the opin-

Farms to receive disaster relief

Help may be on its way for farmers in the Plymouth-Canton area, who lost thousands of dollars in crops during last year's growing season.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners is expected to act April 15 on a proposal to declare western Wayne County an agricultural disaster area, enabling farmers to obtain emergency federal loans at a low interest rate.

The loans will enable county farmers to recover from last year's \$3.5 million crop loss, caused by a trio of devastating weather conditions—excessive rainfall which delayed spring planting; a summer drought; and an early frost in September.

UNDER THE federal loan program, funded by the Farmers' Home Administration (FHA), an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, farmers could apply for loans at an interest rate of 5 1/2 per cent and purchase the seeds, fertilizer and equipment needed for the upcoming planting season.

"In 1974, we were hit by drought and excessive rains in the wrong time of the year," explained county extension director Donald Juchartz. "The

farmer generally is working on such a small margin of profit that he doesn't have enough money to plant next year's crop without a loan when such a disaster occurs.

"This is something we can't afford not to do," Juchartz continued, "because we're running out of food suppliers now. We can't afford to let this type of thing go on."

If the board of commissioners approves the program on April 15, loan applications from the Wayne County committee of the federal Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ACS) will soon be available, according to Juchartz. Farmers may apply for one to three-year loans to cover costs of the upcoming planting season.

But the loans, Juchartz stressed, will not constitute a hand-out. Applicants must demonstrate a loss due to weather conditions and show records of crops planted and sold during the 1973 and 1974 growing seasons.

"THE GOVERNMENT is not in the business of getting into private enterprise," he said. "Only those people who can demonstrate that their yields were really depressed will be eligible."

Some farmers in the Plymouth-Can-

ton area are patiently awaiting approval of the program and believe their 1974 crop yields will speak for themselves.

Teacher learns plight of blindness

WESTLAND—Earl Bryant tensed his body Friday night as he suddenly lost sight in his left eye.

Less than a minute later, he was plunged into a world of darkness as his right eye also went blind.

His wife, Gayle, who caused him to go blind stepped back and smiled.

As Earl groped in the darkness he tried vainly to get his bearings—his mind feverishly striving to recall his surroundings before everything went totally black. He eased back in his chair and relaxed. He had accomplished the first stage of his project. He had started his 45-hour journey into darkness.

Bryant, an industrial arts teacher at John Glenn High School, also teaches a blind Vietnam war veteran how to do wood-working with his hands. To get a better idea how Jerome Sankowiak, the 28-year-old blind man, receives instructions and feels, Bryant was urged by the Veterans Administration to undertake the three-day "blind" experiment.

"Because of the seriousness of being blind three days, I checked with my doctor to see if there was any danger from being blindfolded 45 hours," Bryant said. "He directed my wife how to apply a sterile pad over each eye, four cotton balls each about half the size of a golf ball and bound securely with white surgical tape."

Bryant, a staunchly independent man, knew it would help him tremendously to know more keenly how Sankowiak felt and his attitude in receiving Bryant's instruction. "Success or failure of our proposed two-year vocational proficiency program would hinge on Jerome's attitude," said the 38-year-old Bryant, who has a mas-

ter's degree from the University of Michigan.

"THE HARDEST THING about being blind is your limited freedom and your total dependency upon others," Bryant explained. "Anyone who knows me knows I am by nature a very oriented person—I didn't say organized—that is, I know where I am, where I'm going and what I'm doing. I'm a very active person, independent and always on the go," said Bryant.

All that changed at 9 p.m. on a Friday night and lasted until 6 p.m. Sunday evening, 45 hours later. The

bearded Bryant became almost totally dependent upon his wife, Gayle, during that span of time.

"Our roles were almost completely reversed," she explained. "Normally, I seldom drive, now I had to do all the driving. Earl usually cooks supper because he gets home first from work but I had to prepare supper."

Mrs. Bryant confessed her patience was tried when she failed to give Earl complete directions to lead him through his blindness.

"I'M NOT time-oriented or direction-oriented and when I would pause to give thought to Earl's question, he

would get put out with me. Since he could only 'see' through my verbal communication, I became extremely aware of the need for precise answers and directions," she added.

To make the experiment all the more meaningful, Bryant didn't stay at home, but went out to eat at a restaurant, visited an art exhibit at Westland Center and helped do the washing at the local laundromat.

"Unless you're blind, you don't realize what happens when you ask a question," Bryant pointed out. "If the person doesn't immediately answer, you

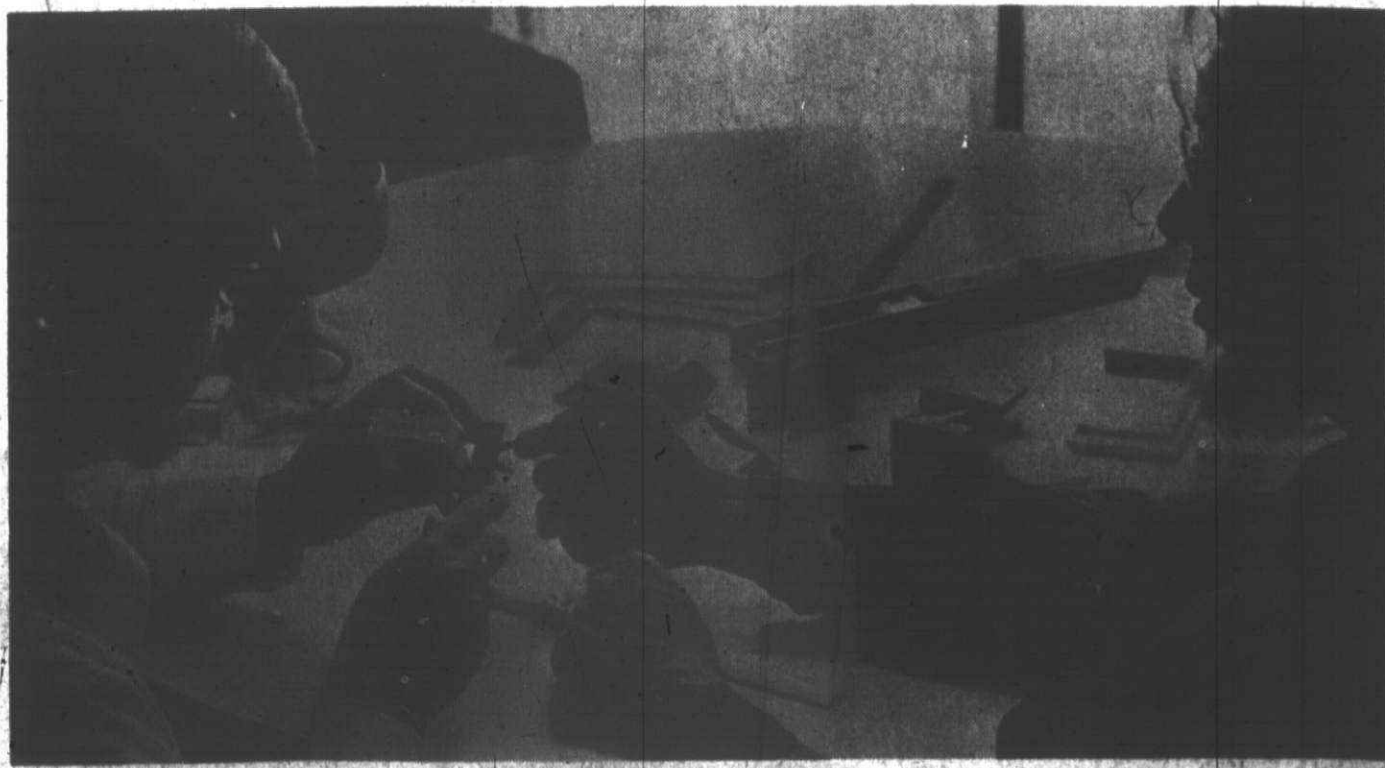

New DNR director issues call for unity

Somewhere between preservation and progress is a middle ground which has been ignored. And as newly appointed director of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Dr. Howard Tanner intends to find it.

Tanner this week was introduced to area environmentalists at a seminar hosted by the Observer & Eccentric and state Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth.)

"We have people on the left hand like the Sierra Club who are for strict preservation," Tanner said. "On the right hand are people who are for progress and who say the bigger the project, the better."

"I hear a lot of rhetoric that seems to deny a middle ground."

"There's no turning back. It's not possible nor desirable to live like Daniel Boone did in Kentucky."

"And it's equally wrong to ignore the problems of waste and the fact that in the environment one event is always tied to another."

"We recognize we live in a technological state in a technological country. We're going to do the things which are necessary for man in regards to transportation and building."

"But we're going to do it in a more orderly, planned fashion."

TANNER SAID he regretted the DNR's image of one simply promoting hunting and fishing.

"This image is not broad enough," he said. "It ignores the impact we have on people. We're responsible for quality land, water and air controls everywhere but in southeast Michigan."

Tanner described the DNR in terms of a triangle with the first part consisting of the Legislature and the DNR commission. The second is the department itself and the third is the

"stockholder" or user group.

"If the three know one another and the lines of communication are functioning, then we'll have a strong, working department responsible to the needs of the people."

While Tanner said the DNR is expanding its services in southeast Michigan, he was not optimistic about progress in the area, thanks to present economic conditions.

"Until five years ago, the DNR spent a minimum of money, time and personnel in the metropolitan area. But the planning is going forward for more fishing, better air and better land quality."

"But most programs are severely strained. If you accept that as true, then it is reasonable to assume it is true for programs in the Upper Peninsula as well as programs in southeast Michigan. It's part of the democratic process."

ANOTHER PROBLEM the democratic process has prompted for Tanner is the question of multiple use for game areas.

"There are extensive lands in southern Michigan which were purchased with firearms taxes acquired through the years," Tanner said.

"They were acquired for hunting opportunities, but as more people visit the lands they visit for reasons other than hunting—from nut collecting to just walking."

"Multiple use is a never-ending problem. As we zone, these problems aren't going to go away. They're probably going to intensify. And with the energy crisis I expect more pressure, not less."

Tanner said he is disappointed with the DNR's progress on solid waste disposal and water pollution control.

"We're behind states we should be ahead of," he said.

"I think local citizens have a right

to expect three things from the state when it comes to cleaning up these areas.

"They should be aware of an overall policy for solid waste disposal."

"We should be giving them the technology as to how to achieve the policy and how to do it at the best cost benefit. Finally we should be giving them financial aid to go ahead and get the job done."

Tanner, named to his position in January, taught fisheries at Colorado State University and was director of the Colorado fish program. A native of Michigan, he served as director of Michigan State University's Natural Resources Department and chaired the Michigan Environmental Review Board. He also is the former head of the DNR's Fisheries Division.

Maybury Park to open May 1

Maybury State Park will open its gates on a limited basis May 1 but those wishing to take advantage of paved bike paths and a petting zoo will have to wait until June 1.

That's the word from Department of Natural Resources district parks supervisor Al Masini.

The state has spent \$125,000 tearing down the former sanitarium buildings and has erected a chain link fence around the park.

An entrance road and parking for 200 cars has been built. Pit toilets have been dug.

Bike paths measure six miles, and the farm will feature chickens, pigs and sheep.

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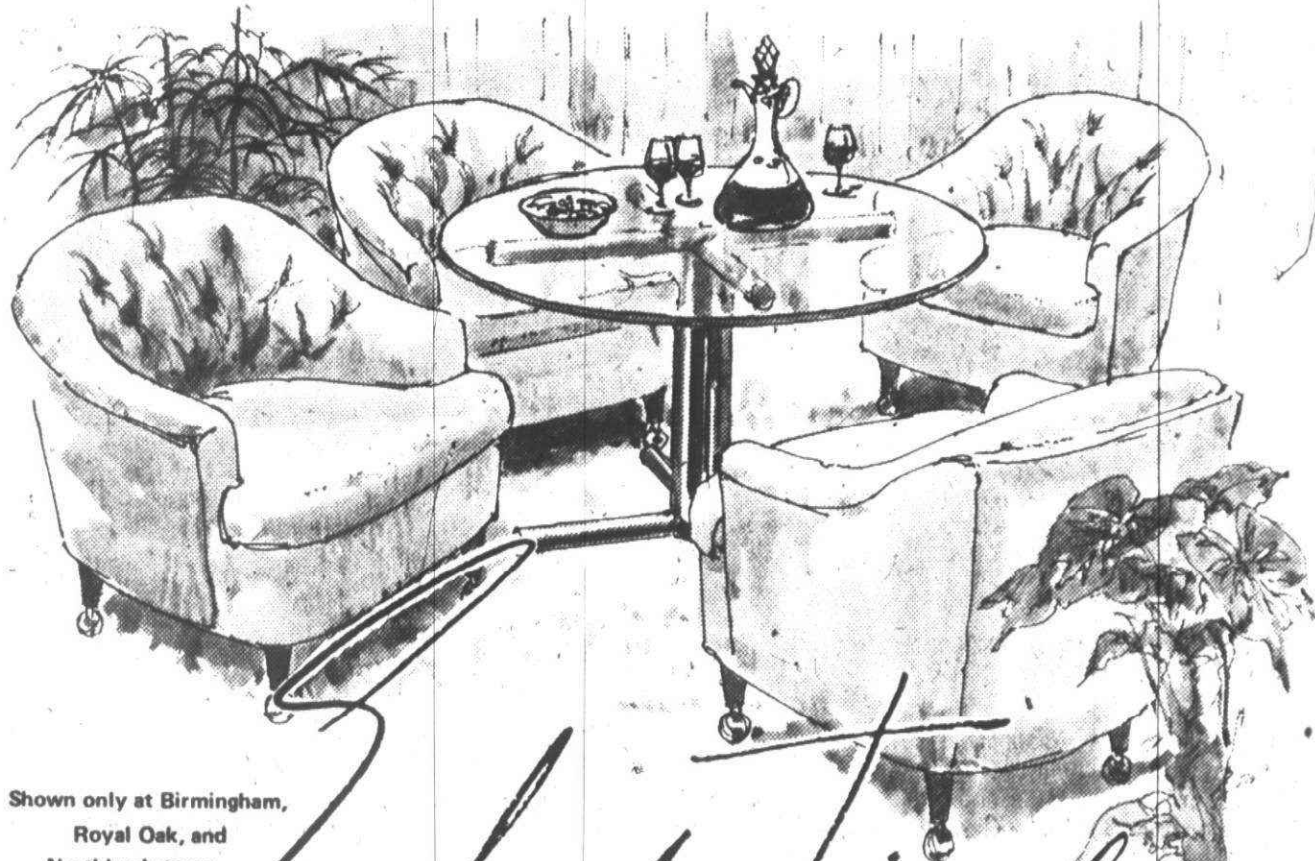
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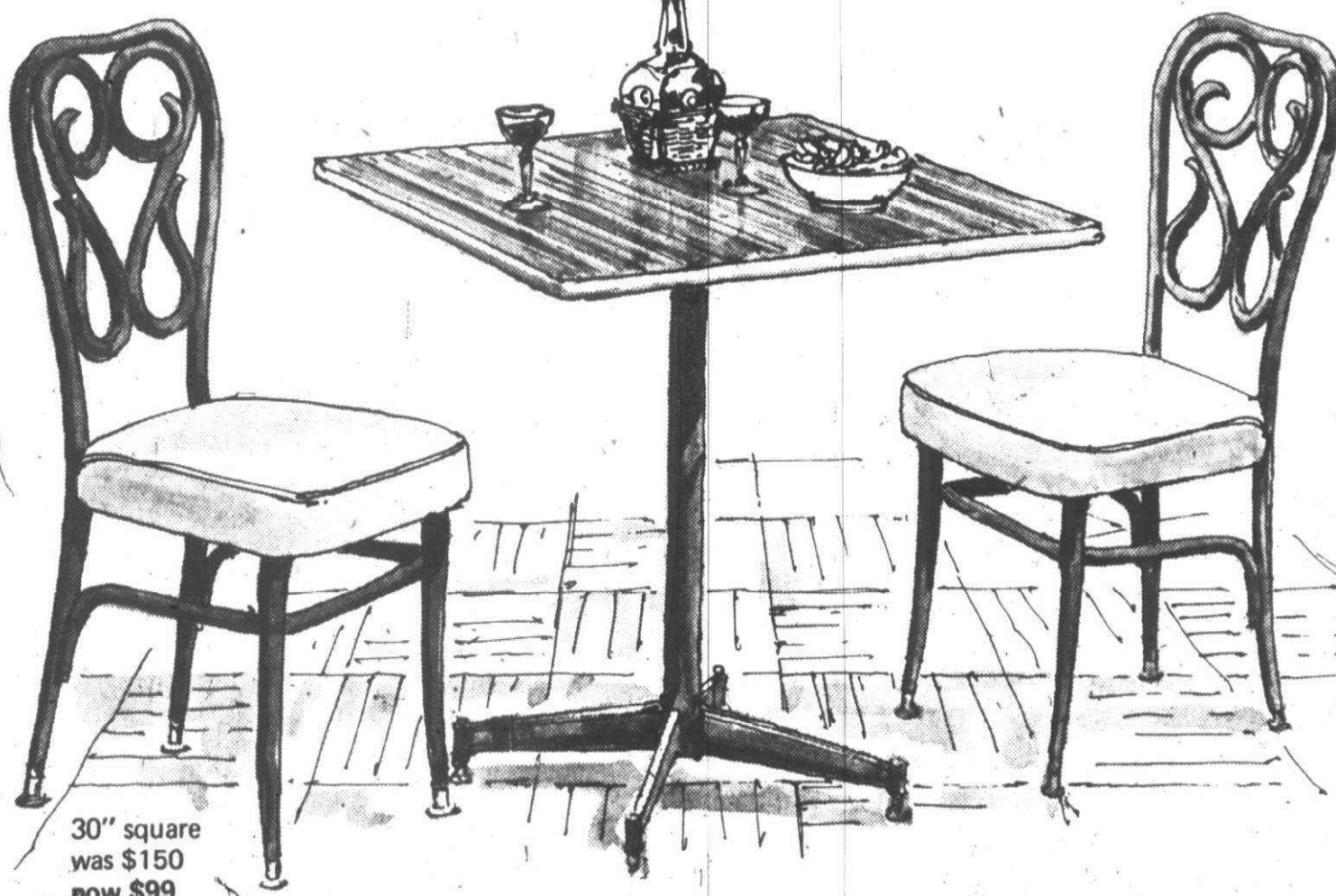
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How W-W schools control those 'skippers'

WESTLAND—Absence may make the heart grow fonder in some cases. But in the Wayne-Westland School District, absence may land you in a lot of trouble.

In Wayne Memorial and John Glenn high schools, racking up more than seven unexcused absences can cause a student to fail at the end of a marking period.

Being absent without leave can also lead to suspension.

School officials estimate that willful absences constitute only one or two per cent of the total number of absences.

They prefer to stress their attendance figures. Tom Blacklock, deputy superintendent, explains that last year the attendance record of Wayne-Westland elementary schools was 93.1 per cent.

In junior highs it was 91.2 per cent and in high schools, 90 per cent.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS FIGHT the absentee problem on two fronts. Thinking positively, they try to establish interesting educational programs that will draw students to school and keep them there.

Thinking realistically, they also make use of a computer to keep class by class records of high school absenteeism.

Two principals credited the varied activities in their schools as the main

factor in high attendance levels.

Principals Timothy Baxter of McKee Elementary School and Don Bedard of Adams Junior High School both believe that most of their students like coming to school.

However, both give a pat on the back to parents, who make sure that the youngsters who hate to get out of bed, make it to school each day.

"There is no problem here," says Baxter, whose elementary school has a 94 per cent attendance rate this year. "Most of our absenteeism is caused by illness or trips."

"We have been very hardnosed about unexcused absences here. If a problem begins to develop and the child has no legitimate excuse, we make a parent call. Parents understand what a child is missing if he is not in school."

Baxter feels the great thing about McKee is that the students like school and make an effort to achieve perfect attendance records.

"We have a balanced and varied program," he says. "The children find things to do that they enjoy. That is the key. We have interest centers, a chess club, choir, and an assembly every month with the children putting on the program."

"We also have band and orchestra, and drama taught by students from John Glenn High School."

Bedard claimed "an excellent situation" at Adams Junior High, where attendance this year hovers between 92-

95 per cent. He reckons willful absenteeism at about one per cent.

TO KEEP TRACK of those who do not answer at roll call, each teacher sends to the office an attendance card on each absent pupil. When he returns, the youngster must bring a note explaining his absence. This reason is placed on the card, which is returned to his teacher.

The school secretary checks on those who are gone for several days.

"If a youngster starts setting a pattern of many absences, or maybe he just misses every Friday, we send a referral to the attendance officer at the board of education," says Bedard.

"The attendance officer will then talk to the child's parents."

He notes that "we check absences regularly so as to nip in the bud any tendency toward truancy."

"We make sure we are working with the parents on the problem. If a child continues to be truant, he can be taken to court. Some years we get two or three of these youngsters, some years not any."

At Adams an effort is made to push students into the many activities offered by the school.

"The kids like to go to school," Bedard claims. "We have good assembly programs—choruses from Wayne Memorial will come in to do a program for us. Recently we put on an operetta, which involved the work of 200 students."

"Our athletic programs for girls has helped girls' attendance a great deal. We have athletic contests involving both girls and boys almost every night, and this helps us."

"I think the key to getting kids to school is involvement."

But at high school age, cars, worldly interests, good weather and other distractions daily compete with math, chemistry and Shakespeare for the teen-ager's attention.

Absenteeism at both Wayne Memorial and John Glenn is higher than at the two other schools mentioned. Terry Byrnes, assistant principal at Glenn estimates that attendance at his school hovers around 90 per cent this year.

"This has probably not varied more than one per cent over the past 10 years," he says. Intentional absenteeism, he estimates, accounts for a small percentage of those not in school.

Thomas Svitekovich says that Wayne Memorial's attendance is at 92 per cent level, with 150-160 students absent each day for a variety of reasons.

Skippers number only 1-2 per cent of those not in attendance, both estimate.

Students and administrators at these schools believe that absenteeism is cut down by the hourly use of records fed to a computer.

Records are kept in every class. At the end of the day teachers turn in a data card for every student absent in their classes.

Shipped to the data center in Wayne Memorial, this information turns up on a report next day for each teacher.

If a student's absence has been explained, this will be indicated on the card. If not explained, the teacher will issue an absence report, copies of which will be sent to the main office and the counseling center.

Seven unexcused absences will give a student a failing grade in a marking period. However, Byrnes points out, this general rule is not a rigid one.

IF EXTENUATING circumstances are found during a talk with a teacher or counselor, the student may not be punished. "However, if absenteeism continues it can be cause for suspension, usually one day, and the contacting of the student's parents."

"We never suspend without this parent contact. It is most important in solving the problem. It has to be a cooperative effort."

"Most parents still care about their children being in school. There is not as much parental apathy as people would have you believe. But kids are a little looser about attendance than they were five or six years ago."

To judge by four students interviewed at Glenn, the attendance policy is well understood by the student body.

"Everybody knows what the policy is," says Lisa Martin, a twelfth grader. "It is well explained. I think it is fair. Most everyone goes to class."

Bill Bona feels the policy is better this year than last.

"Last year they took attendance the first and eighth hour," he says. "So you could go to those two classes and miss the rest. This year attendance is taken in every class."

"I think having an attendance policy is a good idea. I was out with a strep throat for a while and found it hard to make up what I had missed. It is a way to make the students keep up with their classes and it helps to keep them in school."

Steve Tauriainen, an 11th grader, used to skip last year.

"But I'm not skipping at all this year because I want to keep my grades up," he says. "I want to go to class to keep up with what's going on."

"Last year they didn't have as good a way to find out about skipping."

Tauriainen speaks forcefully when asked whether students should be able to skip whenever they want.

"Of course, they shouldn't," he declares. "They come to school to learn. Our Phase system is excellent. There is no reason to skip when you can pick your own level of courses."

The Phase program is one of the factors both Byrnes and Svitekovich point to as aiding the attendance situation. Under this plan, many courses are marked with numbers to indicate their level.

Easier courses are marked with a one, more difficult ones with a five, with two, three and four indicating classes on an intermediate level.

Citizen council future questioned

CANTON—The future of a second citizens advisory council in Canton is unsure.

Gary Sands, a member of the committee to form a citizens advisory

council gave a final recommendation to the planning commission and township board Tuesday. Members of the board said they would take the matter under advisement.

Several proposals have been discussed by both the citizens and board members and the greatest area of disagreement concerns the composition of the proposed council.

Several board members favor having the council composed of representatives from homeowner groups. The citizens who submitted the recommendation favor having the members selected on a proportional basis from either the eight voting precincts in the township or from each of the 28 census districts.

Sands, speaking for the members of the citizens committee to form the new council, paraphrased their fear, "Our genuine concern is that representation on the citizens advisory council should include as much as possible representation from all areas and interests in the township. We have suggested a few ideas on how this can be done and this is what we are most anxious about."

The citizens began meeting several months ago with planning consultant Mike Manore. In February they submitted a proposal to the board. Manore, with the support of Supervisor Robert Greenstein, filed an alternate proposal which differed primarily in the method of selection for members of the council. Following the first rec-

ommendation, the board officers, Greenstein, Treasurer Carl Parsell, and Clerk John Flodin met with six representatives of the citizens group last week.

Little agreement was reached and the six citizens reported back to the entire committee on March 31. They drew up a final draft of their recommendation and submitted the proposal Tuesday.

According to Sands, "Both recommendations were essentially the same except the final recommendation suggested more specifically how to select members for the council."

The final proposal said the purpose of the council "was to act as a medium of communication between the local unit of government and the citizens of the community, informing citizens about the community and providing a mechanism for citizens' input into the local unit of government."

The advisory council would be sanctioned by the board and receive funds from the township when necessary.

Greenstein was specific about the duties of the proposed council. "The board or planning commission would give them areas to study. If we were considering a farmer's market we would ask them to study it and report back."

Traffic in Canton will be surveyed

CANTON—Township officials should have a better understanding of traffic patterns and problems by the end of the year, according to Trustee Gerald Cheske.

Cheske, also an employee of the Automobile Club of Michigan (AAA), has made the preliminary arrangements for a traffic survey in Canton.

"The earliest we might have the survey results is by the end of September," Cheske commented, "but more likely we won't get it until the end of the year. We have to figure out what we want in it before we ask for it."

The survey will be conducted by the safety and traffic engineering department of AAA, and will be free of charge.

Said Cheske, "It's a public service AAA performs for municipalities in the state. So far they have done more than 250 in Michigan."

He added, "It won't be a full scale survey. We will probably just ask them to study the northeastern portion of the township because it is the most populated and traveled. We'll probably have a study from the eastern border to Canton Center between Joy and Ford."

"We'd like to have another along Canton Center south to Michigan Avenue."

The trustee explained that a study of overpasses and street lighting also will be suggested.

"We'd like to have all the overpasses around I-275 examined in view of the situation at Joy Road. That's where we'd really like to have a comprehensive study," he said.

According to Cheske, the township board has to meet sometime in April to decide what they want in the survey. Then the auto club has to be contacted. Depending on how busy they are, the survey would take place during the next several months.

"The actual survey and traffic count only take three weeks," said Cheske, "but then they have to study the accident reports and write their own report, and that is quite time consuming. I would imagine it'll take another six months before we have it."

The report will be used by township officials for planning, and as evidence in arguments with the county for better road maintenance said the trustee.

Northwest cleanup Saturday

CANTON—The Northwest Canton Homeowners Association is sponsoring a "Spring Cleanup" Saturday, April 5. Fifteen to 20 Boy Scouts under the leadership of Gary Savage, and a crew of volunteers from Our Lady of Good Counsel have volunteered to help in the spring roadside pickup.

The township has volunteered a truck for the debris, but according to organizer John Cojei, more pickup trucks are needed. Those interested in joining the cleaning effort should contact Cojei, or Mike Zeleji.

People participating in the cleanup will meet at the corner of Ridge and Warren at 8 a.m.

the corn," Bordine said, "while the wet weather hurt the wheat. It was an unusual and terrible year. I didn't even get enough money to pay for the seeds or the cost of harvest. If it wasn't for my factory job, we would have gone under."

"I had one field of wheat I didn't even bother harvesting," Bordine continued. "There wasn't enough wheat there to pay the expenses."

THE BUNYEA family, 50480 Powell, Plymouth Township, lost half of its pumpkin crop and much of its corn.

"We went in the hole," Mrs. Patricia Bunyea said bluntly. "We didn't even get enough money out of our corn to pay for fertilizer and seeds."

Side jobs, which her husband, Guy, performs in bulldozing and snow plowing work, covered the loss, Mrs. Bunyea said, but she added, "We're debating on whether we should stay in farming. We might as well not farm and keep the profit."

Donald M. Korte, 6934 Beck, Canton Township, said corn and soybean yields on his 500-acre farm were down

50 to 75 per cent last year compared to previous seasons.

"That represents quite a loss," said Korte, a member of the county's ACS committee. "We started off with a cold, wet spring and then had no rain until fall, when an early frost came. Those are three critical factors."

Other counties in southeastern Michigan, including Washtenaw, Oakland, Macomb and Monroe, have already applied for the federal loan program, Juchartz believes. In order to be declared an agricultural disaster area, the board of commissioners of each county and Gov. William Milliken must sign a disaster certificate, he explained.

"Our county commissioners are just working a little slowly," Juchartz said.

According to the county's ACS committee, which requested the agricultural disaster specification, 75 per cent of the county's 700 farms suffered substantial crop losses in 1974 because of weather conditions.

Nearly two-thirds of the county's corn crop, one-third of its soybean crop and more than half of its hay crop were lost, according to the ACS report.

Prisoners released to avoid overcrowding of county jail

Court defendants whom judges feel are poor risks are being released pending trial to keep the population of the Wayne County Jail within a court-ordered limit.

That policy was conveyed to a nine-member House committee which met recently with county and court officials in Detroit. The legislative panel included Rep. Robert Geake (R-Northville) whose district includes part of Livonia.

The committee was told additional jail facilities are definitely needed by Sheriff William Lucas, Roscoe L. Bobo, chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, and Tom Downs, a court-appointed jail monitor.

LUCAS SAYS present measures to keep the jail population below the 799-prisoner limit ordered by a three-member panel of the Wayne Circuit Court have held to the point that the

majority who remain in jail are "the hard core of repeat offenders and potentially dangerous defendants."

"I'm convinced that many of the judges are releasing persons on bond or on their own recognizance who ordinarily would be put in jail," claims Lucas. "The jail population has been reduced, but there is doubt we have paid a price for it."

BOBO SAYS the county already has acquired a building site near the present jail and that architects have almost completed design of a 400-cell jail, but financing problems haven't yet been resolved.

"We have found no feasible way to raise the necessary money out of present revenues without resorting to unacceptably drastic cutbacks in necessary public services."

Downs, an attorney appointed by the court to monitor the jail, told legislators "there has been a tremendous improvement in the management and conditions at the jail." He believes, however, there is an immediate need for additional jail space.

REP. WILLIAM RYAN (D-Detroit), committee chairman, announced another hearing will be held in Lansing later this month.

"We'll hear from appropriate state departments and then I believe we will be ready to make recommendations," said Ryan.

The committee vice-chairman, Rep. Richard A. Young (D-Dearborn Heights), said the April meeting will include the director of the Michigan Department of Corrections, representatives of the Municipal Finance Commission and the Attorney General's office.

The 799-prisoner limit was set as the result of a lawsuit which alleged the constitutional rights of inmates were being violated by overcrowding and other jail conditions.

Bobo notes that the board of commissioners has adopted a master plan

calling for the downtown jail expansion and for another pre-trial detention and circuit court complex in western Wayne County.

The downtown facility, says Bobo, would include a 100-bed overnight lock-up for the Detroit Police Department, would cost about \$22 million out of a total package cost of up to \$40 million.

In 1972, voters defeated a levy of six-tenths of one mill (60 cents per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) to finance additional jail facilities. The proposal was defeated by a margin of nearly 98,000 out of 796,000 votes cast.

Among the alternatives discussed with legislators was a low-interest state advance of funds proposed by Robert E. FitzPatrick, former county commission chairman, state assumption of various county court costs, and legislation to permit the county to levy construction millage without a vote.

Conflicting opinions from two law firms which specialize in bond issues, as to whether the county now has authority to issue bonds and levy the millage to finance them, also were reviewed.

Young suggested the possibility of the state building a combined jail and court facility in the metropolitan Detroit area.

Also discussed was a proposal by a real estate broker that a surplus J.L. Hudson Co. warehouse be converted into a jail facility and be purchased or leased with option to buy by the county.

In a related development, the county commission's public works committee has recommended that the county board spend \$225,000 to renovate the 54-cell overnight lockup in Detroit Police headquarters across from the jail.

The lockup would be used to house overflow jail prisoners, but must first be brought into conformance with the state jail code before prisoners may be housed there around the clock.

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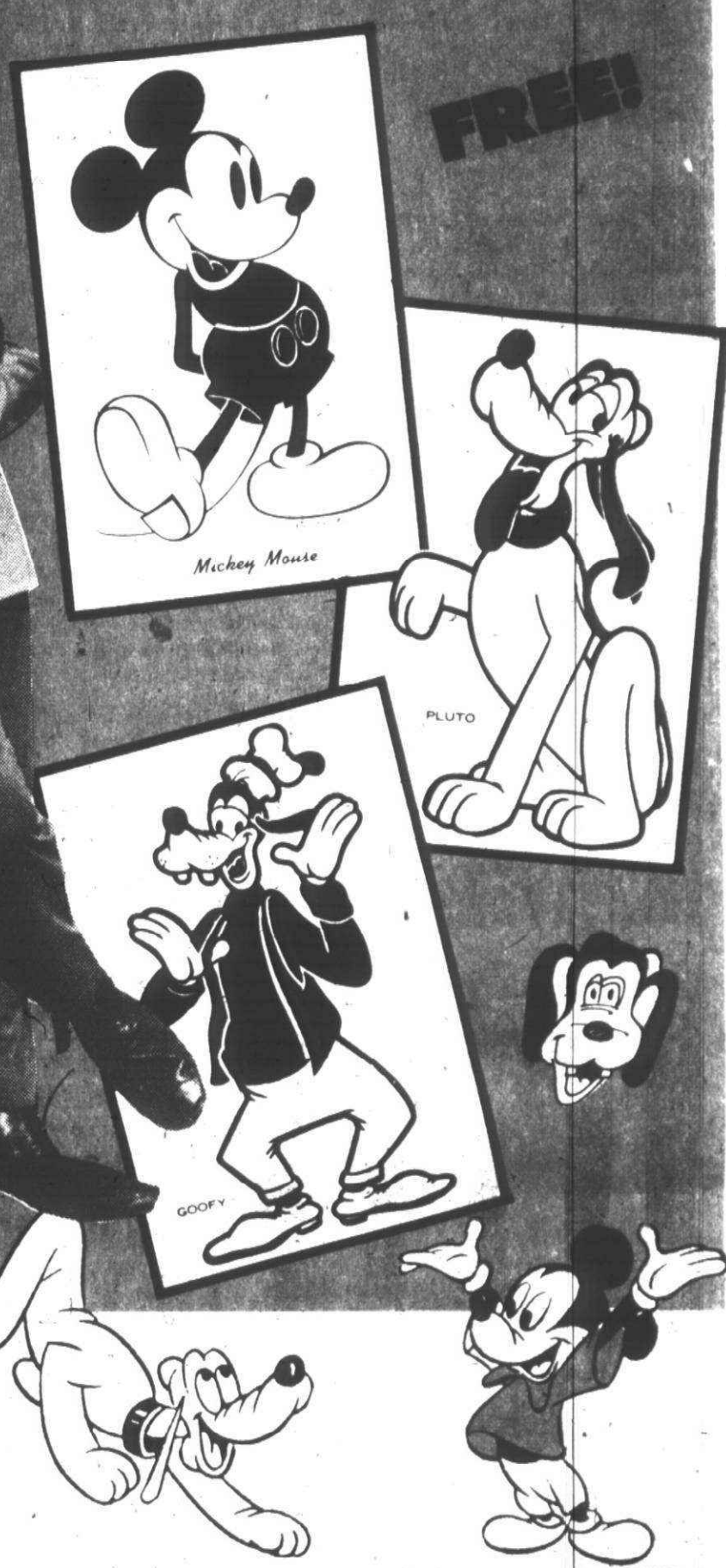
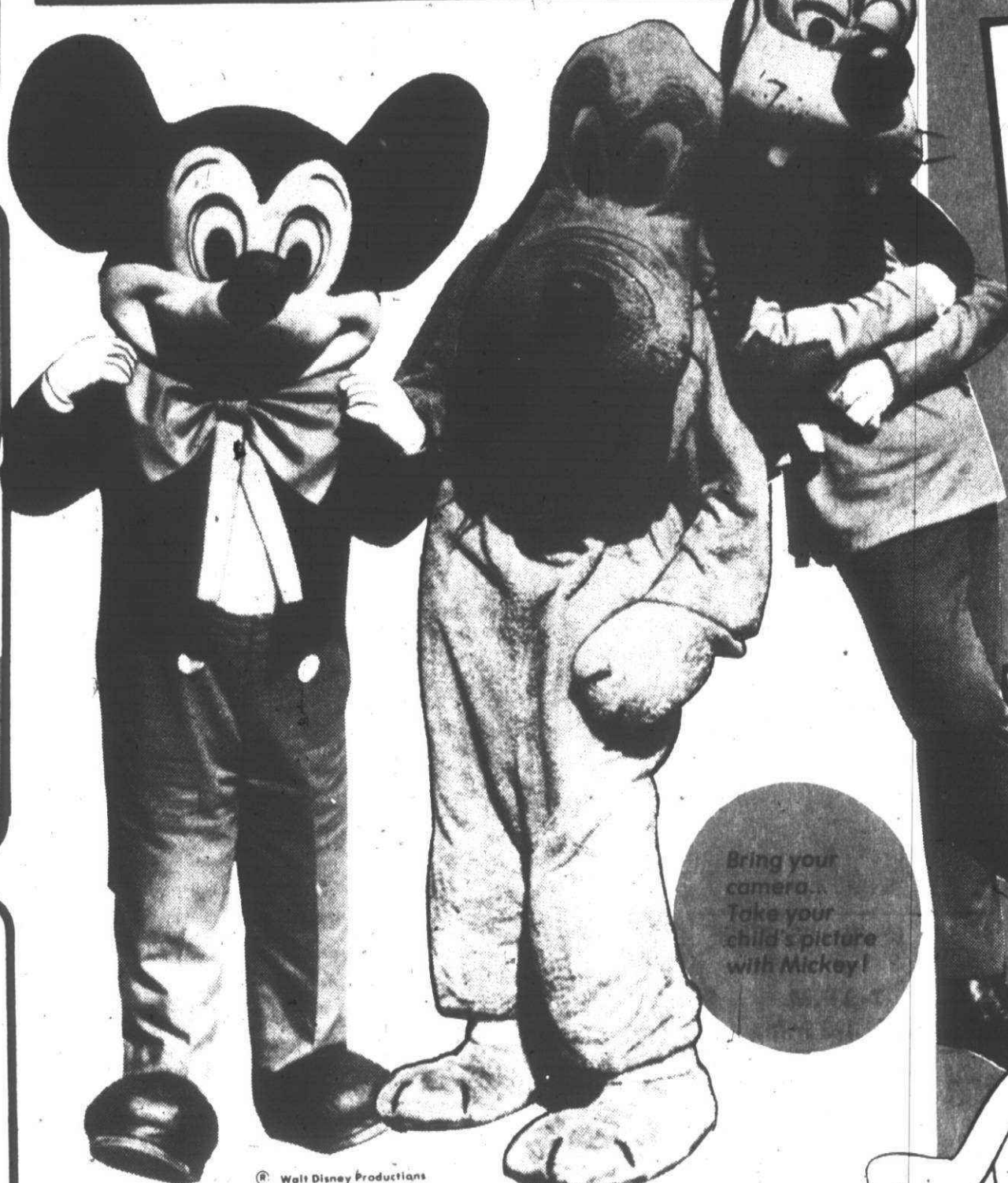


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
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
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


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Teacher learns plight of blind students

wonder: Are you still there? Did you hear me? Did you leave? Why don't you answer?"

When the Bryants went out to eat at a restaurant, it was a relatively simple matter.

"For instance, potatoes were at 12 o'clock on the plate, eggs at 6 o'clock, toast at 3 o'clock and sausage at 9 o'clock," Earl said. "The only difficulty I had was when I knew where the sausage was, but it was lying in the same direction I was trying to cut. Also, cabbage was very difficult for me to cut at another meal."

A diary of Bryant's journey through darkness would go something like this. After being blindfolded at 9 p.m. Friday night, he and his wife "watched" television until 11 p.m. when they went to bed. "I felt frustration when I heard noises on the programs which were not identified. There was a 'bang, bang, bang' on one story which I couldn't make out and it was never explained."

"I felt the need to explain what was happening on TV," explained Gayle. "But Earl said he could picture in his mind most of what went on."

SATURDAY MORNING the Bryants went out for breakfast and Gayle told Earl where the food was on his plate. Bryant had a word of advice for waitresses serving blind people.

"A waitress must acknowledge who she's talking to when she takes your order. Since I couldn't see, I didn't know if she was talking to me or my wife and who should answer first. Also, a waitress should identify which table she's speaking to, since her voice carries and if she's close to several booths or tables, the blind person doesn't know who she's talking to."

Bryant was driven home by a friend while his wife went to work for half a day. He helped a friend carry a table upstairs from the basement which pro-

ved to be a tough experience. Then he watched TV from 1 until 3 p.m.

It was here that Bryant felt his first loss of orientation. "I turned on the TV set and slowly reached for the arm of the couch. I felt the arm of the couch and sat down - right on the living room floor. I missed the couch by three feet. I again was frustrated by the sounds that I couldn't distinguish or recognize on TV," said Bryant.

The sightless industrial arts instructor then accompanied his wife to Westland Center to visit Hudson's art and sculpture department. "I very quickly became aware that minimal texture and color tone is very important to me but you can't really tell this when you're blind. I handled many objects and recognized most of them by touch," added the antique collector.

When his wife would inadvertently stroll off to another aisle of the store, Bryant's helplessness would be forcibly brought home. He'd softly call to his wife, but there was no answer. He was perplexed where she had 'disappeared' to, although she had simply walked over a couple aisles to check some merchandise. "It's this total helpless feeling that gets you," Bryant stressed. "It kind of scares you to think you've been left alone. I guess it's just not knowing what's going on that is frustrating."

On Sunday Earl helped his wife wash and dry the clothes. "I changed four dollar bills into the exact change," he boasted. When asked how he achieved it, he answered, "I got all dimes and I knew I needed 40 dimes for the four dollar bills." He helped fold the towels, wash cloths and other clothes. He even identified a lavender towel by the way it was shaped.

His trip to the laundromat gave Bryant ideas how the blind could be served.

"Laundromats could service the blind better if they would put braille

switches showing permanent press and regular. Also they could do the same with high, medium and low."

BRYANT FOUND many aspects of his journey through darkness very frustrating. His total dependence upon someone taking his arm and guiding him. The "lost" feeling when that person lets go of his arm and strolls away without saying anything. Various unidentified noises also left him in a maze of confusion.

But the project also did wonders in helping Bryant be a better teacher, not only for Jerome Samkowiak, but for his regular day students, too.

"During my experiment I spent many hours in thought, trying to make my teaching process more relevant to Jerome and my other students. I'm much more critical of what I see now and I'm very aware to be careful about saying to a student,

'You don't understand me.' Now I say, 'Maybe I didn't make myself clear enough.'"

"Jerome's entire program is based on his total recall and how accurate I am in presenting that instruction," said Bryant. "In functioning with Jerome, I'm aware that he's putting maximum effort into the learning situation. If a sighted student is putting any effort into the learning situation, and not learning it's plain that I didn't make myself clear in giving instructions."

Bryant quoted from a magazine article, "Speaking of Design" by Aarre Lahti, "We get 83 per cent of our learning by seeing, 11 per cent through hearing and six per cent by touch, taste and smell. We retain 30 per cent of what we see, 20 per cent of what we hear and 50 per cent of what we both see and hear."

"This experience has definitely made me aware that clear instructions and explanations are necessary, even vital, not only for the blind, but for everyone," Earl added.

How did the 45-hour experience affect Bryant physically? "My eyes felt very rested when I took off the blind-

fold Sunday evening, but my mind was exhausted from trying to figure out everything that was going on."

As for his wife, Gayle, it was a delightful experience. "Having my super-active, aggressive husband dependent upon me for three days was wonderful. It was like being on vaca-

ion was that the court was being asked to interfere with the duty of the legislature. He built his case with constitutional cases.

"It's strange to me, however, that the Circuit Court judges themselves a couple of years ago took the sheriff and county board of commissioners to court for more probation officers," Greenstein said.

The state supreme court upheld their position and more officers were

hired. Now, two years later, they turn around when the townships are asking for more officers and tell us that it is a legislative matter."

Greenstein said that Burgoyne was the attorney who argued the case before the state supreme court. "He has indicated a willingness to accept our case," said the Canton Supervisor.

Repeated attempts were made to contact Wechsler and Levin, but they were unavailable for comment.

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Criminal justice public hearings will be Monday

A series of public hearings on criminal justice will be held April 7 in the City-County Building, Detroit, by the Michigan Commission on Criminal Justice.

Topics to be covered include victimless crime from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the 13th floor auditorium; capital punishment from 2-5 p.m. in the 13th floor auditorium; and gun control from 2-5 p.m. in the common council chambers.

The commission has scheduled the hearings in Detroit and elsewhere as part of its efforts to study existing Michigan laws and practices, federal legislation, court decisions and alternatives to present laws.

In May, the commission plans to consider all the proposals submitted by three task forces, and when adopted, they will be presented to Gov. Milliken.

Property tax abolition sought

The Michigan Citizens for Property Tax Reform has decided to petition the Legislature to amend the state constitution to abolish all property tax.

The group hopes to have petitions ready for distribution at its next general meeting on Tuesday, April 8, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the school library of Clifford Smart Junior High on Commerce Road west of Union Lake Road, Commerce Township.

Signatures will be solicited throughout Michigan. In this area, the group has established representation in Wall Lake, Union Lake, Warren, Lake Orion, Southfield, Roseville and White Lake. Persons interested in forming chapters in their communities may contact the group at 225 Darnell, Wall Lake.

showed that 55 per cent of Michigan residents believe capital punishment should be allowed in cases of first degree murder, kidnapping and terrorism.

A total of 30 per cent said they believe it should never be allowed; eight per cent said it should be allowed only in cases of first degree

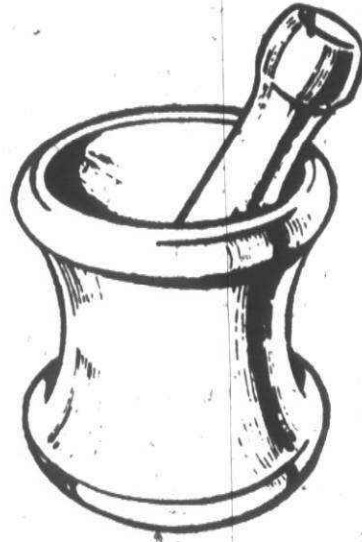
murder of law enforcement or prison employees; and seven per cent said they didn't know.

The gun control task force, chaired by William Delhey, Washtenaw County prosecutor, will be looking at current Michigan laws controlling possession of guns.

The Michigan Commission on Criminal

Justice, created by the governor in June 1973, is a 75-member advisory body headed by former Lt. Gov. James H. Brickley, now president of Eastern Michigan University.

Its membership includes judges, police chiefs, sheriffs, social service experts, local and state officials, legislators and citizens.

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Lure for bass: black plastic worm

In fishing, miracle lures come, and miracle lures go, but one rig that seems to be holding its own is the plastic worm favored by bass fishermen.

This angler has long contended that a fisherman should use what he's good at, and no one is good with everything. The man who is expert with a popper or fly is usually mediocre with a spinner or spoon, and so on.

But an hour at the Southeastern Michigan Bass Masters' demonstration at the recent Outdoorama convinced me nearly anyone can learn to use the black plastic worm.

IT'S IMPORTANT to know how a



bass hits a plastic worm. Mr. Bass doesn't clobber it the way he does a Hula Popper or a spinner, no sir.

The bass blows water through his gills and pumps the worm up from the bottom, on the same principle as the vacuum cleaner. All you feel is a slight tap. The expert angler puts one hand in front of the reel and lets the line run across his finger so he can feel even the lightest disturbance.

You can buy plastic worm lures with three hooks and a fancy leader,

Manning asks funding to clean Rouge

A proposal to refund cleaning of the Rouge River for the third consecutive year, made by Wayne County Commissioner Richard E. Manning (D-Redford), is now under consideration by the board of commissioners.

The public works committee is studying a Manning resolution to set aside in the budget \$50,000 for the annual summer cleanup project.

The cleanup has been conducted jointly by Wayne County and the Detroit Board of Education since 1973, and has provided summer job opportunities for youths between 15-18 years of age.

Last year, some 280 youth worked on a 14-mile stretch of the Rouge from Warren Road to Seven Mile. Jams were cleared and about 1,000 cubic yards of debris removed from the riverbed during the six week program.

Manning says he hopes other groups or agencies from Redford and Livonia will join in sponsoring the program this year.

"During this current period of low employment and high interest in ecology, I am certainly hopeful the board and others will decide to continue this valuable program. The Rouge is one of our finest attractions, and I believe every effort should be made to preserve it."

but that's not the way the Bass Masters do it. They take a plain No. 2-0 hook, run the point through the head of the worm and out, then embed the point of the hook in the worm's body. Thus, there's no point of a hook exposed to catch weeds or snags.

These experts also have a sliding sinker just above the hook. That way, when the bass vacuums up the worm, the line slides smoothly through the sinker, and the bass can't feel the lead weight.

TOSS THIS weedless lure out around weed beds, trees, stumps, sunken cars. Like human beings, bass love shelter, too.

Bounce the rig along the bottom, stopping a few seconds to let the natural water currents wiggle it.

When the fish taps it, strike hard, almost violently, because that hook has to come out the other side of the worm and sink into Mr. Bass' hard mouth. For about three seconds, the fish is stunned and surprised; use those precious moments to reel him away from the obstructions so he doesn't tangle your line. Then the fight is on!

A MORE exciting way of catching bass, to the purists, is the surface lure, like the artificial frog.

Move the lure with slow pulls, reel in the slack and let the lure sit for a few seconds. When the bass hits, he really wallops it.

The ordinary fisherman brings in a spinner lure steadily, but these Bass Master experts use a little variety, especially in deep water. They pump as they retrieve, letting the lure sink as much as five feet below the surface. Sometimes the bass hits the lure as it flutters down.

The experts I saw didn't seem to have exotic equipment—quite the reverse. Said one: "You're the one catching the bass. The line is just a tool. It's no better than the fisherman."

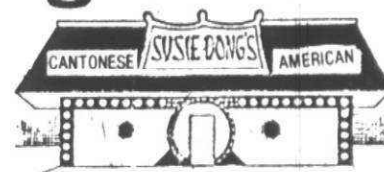

Here is a recipe for a drink called "honey mead." In the days of the Vikings, this drink was served to newlyweds for 30 days (one moon) after

the wedding to insure a life of wedded bliss. Our word "honeymoon" was derived from this.

Try getting your parents to drink this for a second "honeymoon." You might even get your father to start brewing it in his basement as a hobby. This would get him out of your mother's way for a while and have almost as magical an effect as the drink itself.

ANCIENT HONEY MEAD

In a cauldron or large pot, put two cups of honey, a half-cup of brown sugar, the juice and grated rind of one lemon, one egg (slightly beaten), and two pinches each of powdered mace, cloves, nutmeg, ginger, cinnamon, pepper, dried rosemary and catnip. As expected,
new tax cut
won't work out

Perhaps you've heard of Murphy's Law: When nothing can go wrong, it will.

It's a fundamental proposition about the nature of the universe, well known to engineers, economists and newspapermen on deadline—to cite only a few.

Like any fundamental proposition Murphy's Law has a number of corollaries which apply remarkably well to our current economic situation.

1) **NOTHING** is ever as simple as it seems. Everybody knows that the way to get the economy back into good shape is to have a tax cut. But instead of giving us a simple tax cut, the Congress wound up with a complicated measure that also provided for subsidies for home purchases (certainly expensive and probably ineffective in helping the housing industry), elimination of the oil depletion allowance (only partial, though, and long overdue) and a negative income tax (an important change in the tax law, but inappropriate as an afterthought).

2) **EVERYTHING** always costs more money than you have, and takes longer.

Most economists agree that what was needed was a quick, simple tax cut that would get money back into people's pockets in a hurry. What we finally got was a \$22.8 billion measure that took the Congress 10 weeks to fool around with, that will not get money back to the public for another month, and that probably will cost at least \$5 billion more than necessary.

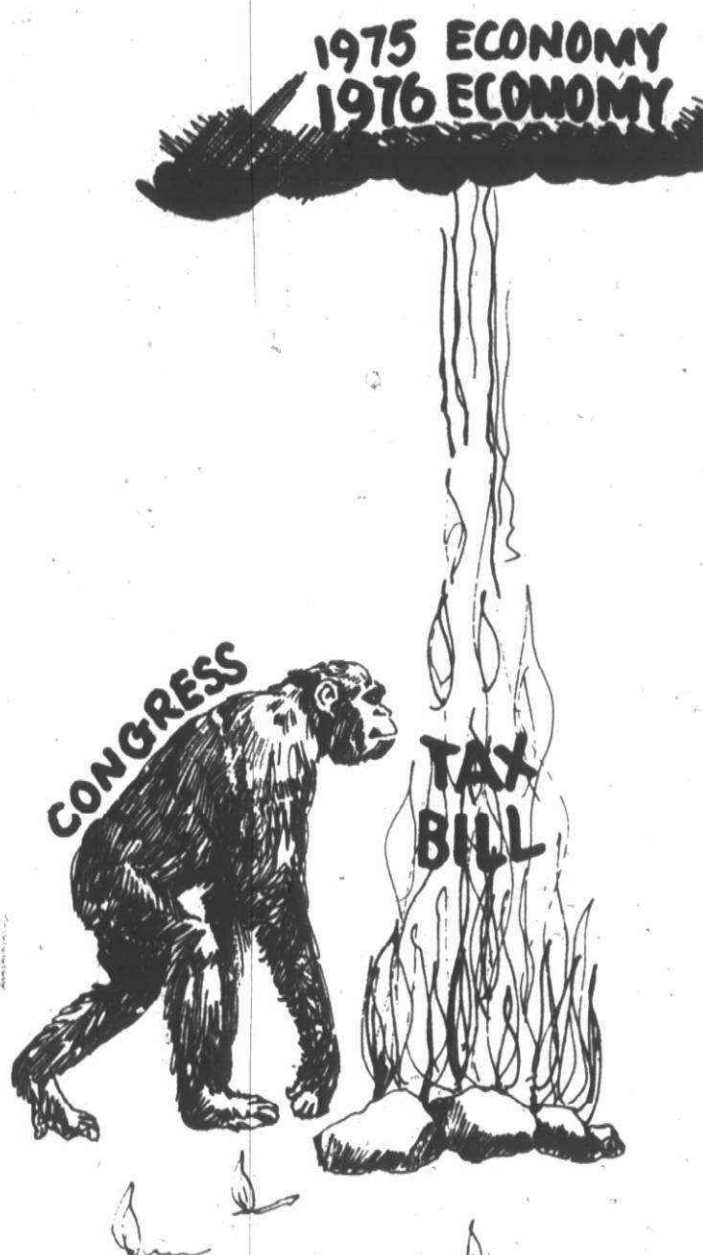
3) **IF YOU** fool around with a thing long enough, it will eventually break.

For the past 25 years, successive Congresses and administrations have been fooling around with the tax laws. Some see them as a method of redistributing income; others see them as a method of fine-tuning the economy; a few others see them as a method of providing incentives for investment in certain areas of the economy to accomplish social objectives.

What in fact has happened is that our tax system subsidizes inefficient companies; penalizes the poor, the elderly and the unmarried; and mystifies nearly everybody except high-priced tax advisors. It's nearly broken.

4) **IT IS** easier to get into a thing than to get out of it.

We have now passed a big tax cut, just at the point that the economy is beginning to turn around. That, plus the more than \$60 billion deficit in the federal budget next year, will very likely produce another spasm of inflation beginning some time in 1976. At which point some

bright public servant will propose wage and price controls, which will hold inflation down at the cost of another recession beginning (say) in late 1977. Then we'll do it all over again.

5) **WHATEVER** you want to do, you have to do something else first.

There are two major causes for our economic problems today. First, the costs of energy are very much higher than they have ever been, and we are very much more dependent on others for our energy than we should be; second, we lack a method of planning the direction in which our economy should develop, and hence we allocate our resources inefficiently and too late. The tax cut measure does nothing about these two problems, but we had to have it to get the economy moving again. At which point, something else will come up to distract us.

6) **IF YOU** explain something so clearly that no one can misunderstand, someone will.

President Ford, nearly all economists, quite a few businessmen, and assorted savants have been telling the Congress that the risks of running a deficit of the order of \$60 billion are enormous. They include renewed inflation, increased social instability, and erosion of the purchasing power of those least able to afford it. If anyone in Congress is listening, I have yet to notice it.

7) **IT IS** a fundamental law of nature that nothing ever quite works out.
No comment necessary.

Travel people tell us, however, that the nature of the tourists has changed this year, with fewer going first class and more looking for bargains.

There are several different ways of getting to Florida. You can fly and go first class, coach or get 20 per cent off and fly night coach.

You can drive and take advantage of the new economy motels along the route.

An alternative that is getting more popular is to go to Florida in a motor home.

THE CAMPING business has really taken off and the number of new recreational vehicle parks is growing by geometric progression.

You can rent motor homes in the area, ranging from the new G.M. unit at \$325 a week and 12 cents a

Suburbs have stake
in fight for park aid

A paperwork battle is going on in the federal bureaucracy of the Interior Department, and its outcome may determine how close the Wayne County suburbs are to public parks.

On one hand, the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority (HCMA), the folks who brought us the Kensington and Lower Huron metroparks, among others, is seeking 50 per cent federal funding for \$6 million worth of land in western Washtenaw County. Its goal: A 3,500 acre Mill Creek Metropark.

On the other hand, a unit of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) is bluntly critical of the Mill Creek project. SEMCOG planners frankly think HCMA is on the wrong track building giant parks on lakes in the region's hinterlands. They would rather see a second generation of parks, smaller, not necessarily on water, and closer to the urbanized area we inhabit.

The issue is of more than academic importance, because one of SEMCOG's proposed sites is in Salem and Superior townships of Washtenaw County, just seven miles away from downtown Plymouth. Mill Creek is a good 30 miles away from downtown Plymouth.

THE MILL CREEK issue has been a hot one ever since the HCMA board uncorked the idea three years ago.

Some folks in Washtenaw County like the idea. But strong opponents include Jerome Fulton, the environmentalist drain commissioner there; the Lima Township board; Detroit officials and the Livingston County planning commission, to name a few.

The case against Mill Creek was summed up by the Regional Clearinghouse Review Committee, known as RC2, a SEMCOG agency that comments on applications for federal funds.

RC2 raised questions about what HCMA's plans for impounding Mill Creek might do to water qual-

ity; it noted that SEMCOG's 1990 plan puts a lower priority on sites such as Mill Creek; it argued that much agricultural land would be taken by the Mill Creek project.

But RC2's biggest argument was that funding Mill Creek might endanger financing for other sites: "Smaller parks, closer to where people live, are specified by the committee as deserving closer examination" in the environmental impact statement.

DAVID LAIDLAW, head man at HCMA, seems unworried about RC2's negative review.

Laidlaw says the real environmental complaint is the point about water quality, adding: "Their review says we raise some more questions on hydrology. If this is all they find wrong with it, it (the plan) must be pretty good."

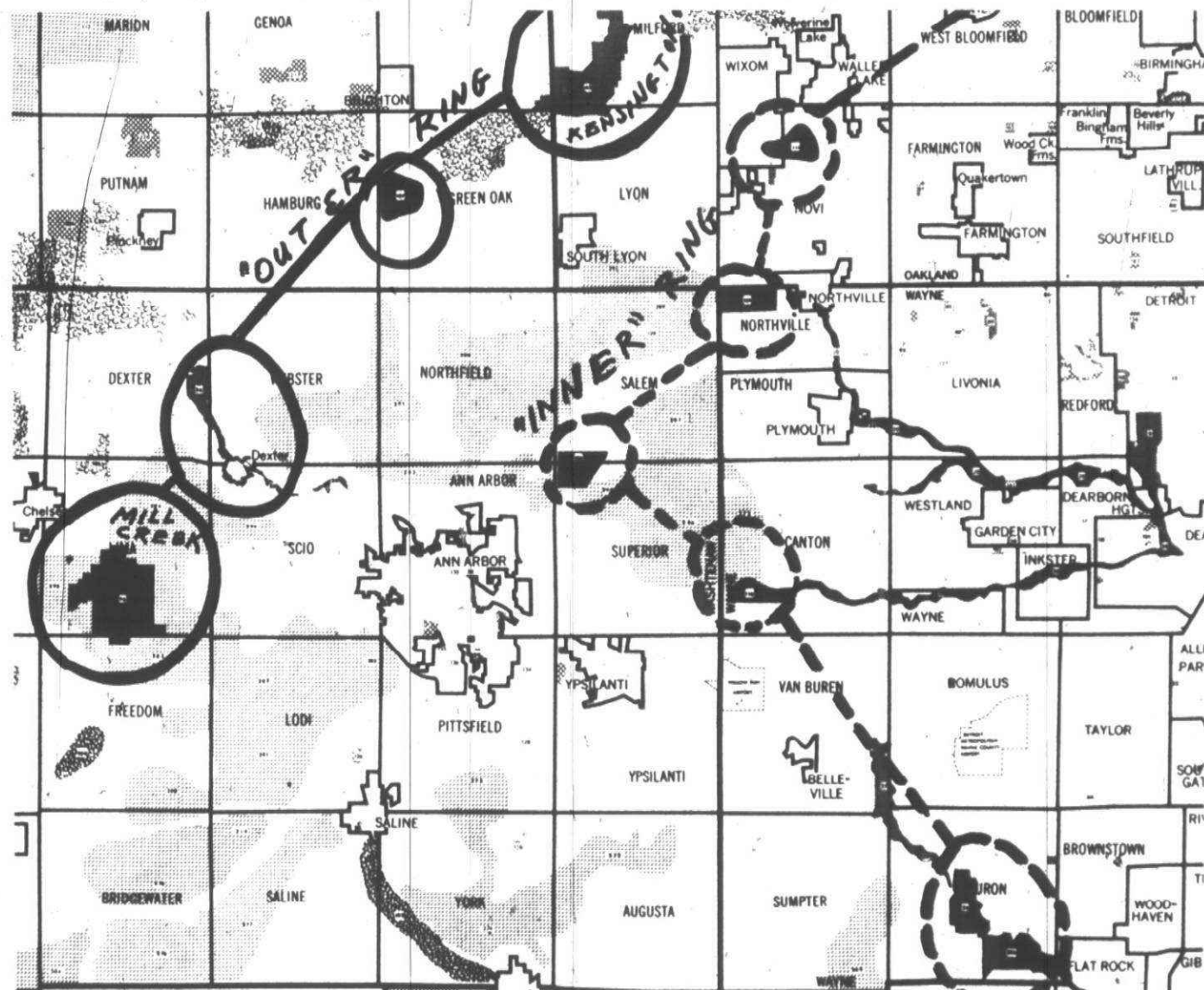
Laidlaw interprets most of RC2's comments as saying the environmental impact statement needs to be expanded.

Indeed, he takes one of RC2's arguments—that Mill Creek metropark would eat up farmland—and turns it right around: If that farmland doesn't become a park, it will become subdivisions in some future year.

Laidlaw contends that the high price of fuel will prompt boaters who would otherwise drive north to Higgins Lake for a weekend to use the metroparks increasingly.

And as for the Salem-Superior site, he calls it good for a county park site but not for HCMA's kind of metropark.

Frankly, this reviewer thinks Laidlaw is optimistic. The SEMCOG review is negative toward Mill Creek. If HCMA gets turned down for federal funds—which may take months to find out—SEMCOG will have asserted itself as having the clout to make its regional plans effective.

'John Wayne' syndrome may be harmful to cops

One of the last bastions of professional masculinity is tottering and may be on the verge of tumbling down.

Perhaps more than any other occupation, police work has until recently demanded that its practitioners be stoical, unemotional, objective and impassive. At least outwardly, most have played the role.

But according to a federally funded study of 400 policemen in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties, maintaining their cool is causing cops real physical problems.

DALE MONROE-COOK, a doctoral candidate at Michigan State University who conducted the study, says police often fall into the "John Wayne" syndrome—displaying a swaggering, cool and aloof, cynical attitude.

They have to keep their "everything's-under-control" facade intact amidst death, assault, rape and murder.

Yet deep inside they are seething, according to Monroe-Cook; their emotions range from compassion to rage.

The problem, he says, is that they are given little if any formal training in how to handle these emotions.

"They hide them from other people and from themselves," he says.

ACCORDING to police officials in western Wayne County, where a similar study likely will take place in the future, what Monroe-Cook says makes sense.

"There's no question about it," says Garden City Police Chief Robert Berens. "Policemen are placed in the position of being forced to make split-second decisions on problems that other persons second-guess them on later.

"Often, citizens are belligerent and pugnacious, and they get out of their cars ready to take a swing at the policeman. The officer, however, must maintain his decorum. A citizen might attempt to smash a policeman but if the policeman strikes back it's police brutality. It's one heck of a problem.

"A policeman may experience five or six previous situations in which he has had to exercise great self-control. Then, when he encounters his seventh, he may just blow up," says Berens.

ROBERT TURNER, Livonia police chief, essentially agrees with Berens, and adds that police tension takes its toll in many ways.

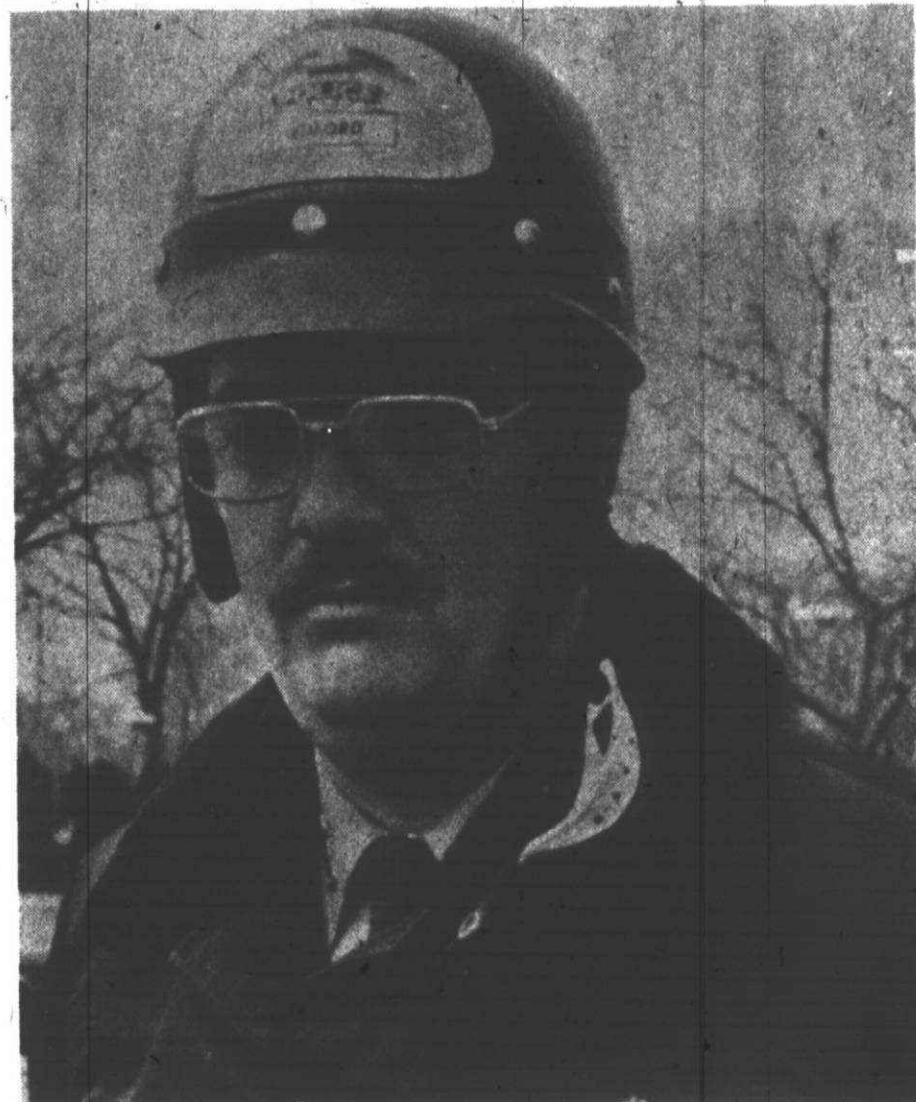
"Tension is definitely there," says Turner. "A policeman might get two or three tight patrols in a row and this can even affect his home life. Certain jobs just don't fit certain people and we usually try to transfer those who might not be able to handle the stress.

"But there are reactions to stress, such as ulcers, headaches, even divorces. A policeman may have to follow the rules of police procedure all day long, and then when he goes home he lets off steam. I've been through it myself.

REDFORD TOWNSHIP Police Chief Edwin Gleza cites a high incidence of divorce among policemen.

"Yes, it exists but I don't know the answer. Studies are being conducted to determine how it might be possible to make policemen unwind and relax.

"Policemen have a record high divorce rate as a result of stress, but the situation is difficult to deal with.

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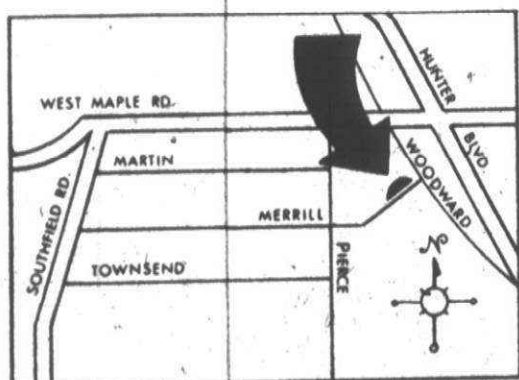
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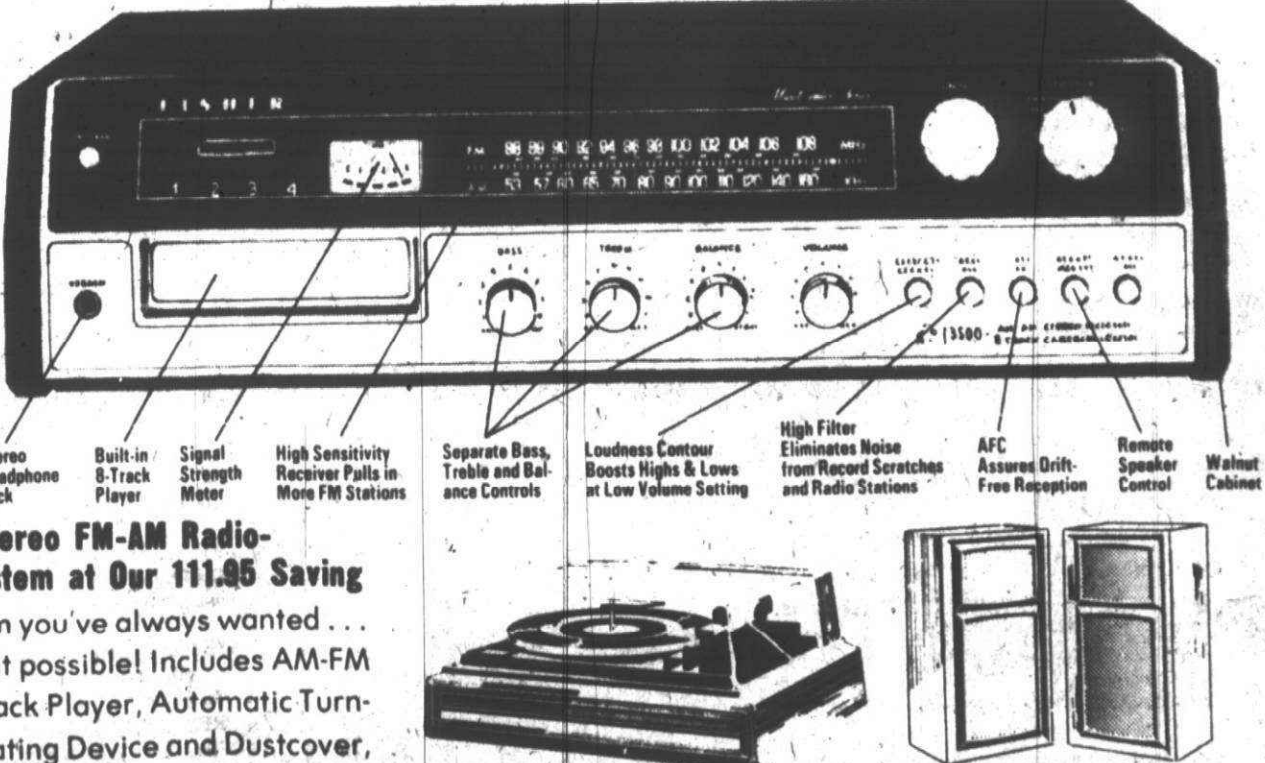

County acts to relieve lay-offs

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An exchange agreement between Wayne County and the City of Detroit to transfer federal job funds has been approved by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The agreement was proposed by County Commissioner Richard E. Manning of Redford, chairman of the General Government Committee.

The exchange is necessary because of residency requirements of the federal Comprehensive Education and Training Act program, which provides

money directly to Wayne County, Detroit, Livonia and Dearborn, called prime sponsors.

Under CETA regulations, a prime sponsor cannot hire outside its own community or service area, making some kind of financial trade necessary when employees live and work in different communities.

Under the present arrangement 25 road commission employees living in Detroit, seven Detroit public health nurses and librarians living in Detroit but working outside the city—all laid-off—will be rehired.

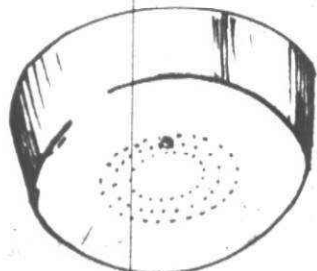
Manning said the county eventually will arrange similar reciprocal agreements with the cities of Livonia and Dearborn.

In other action March 20, the County Board of Commissioners:

- Voted unanimously to urge Congress to immediately free some \$400 million of federal funds for Michigan that are reportedly bottled-up in the Environmental Protection Agency.

- Unanimously adopted a resolution establishing a new countywide human services advisory council to improve the quality and delivery of health care and other personal services, to be called the Human Services Executive Coordinating Council.

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Huron Relays opens track season for area teams

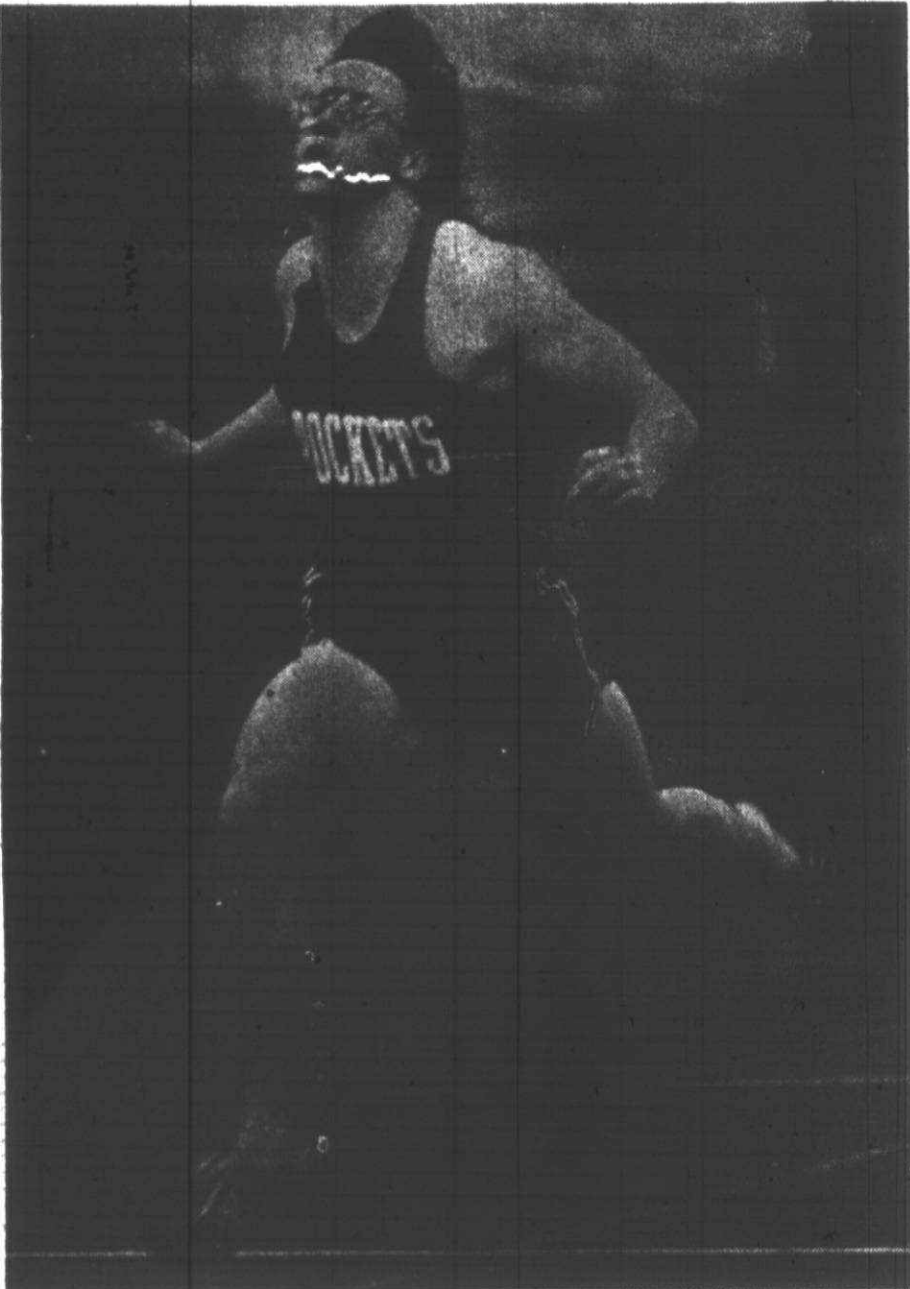

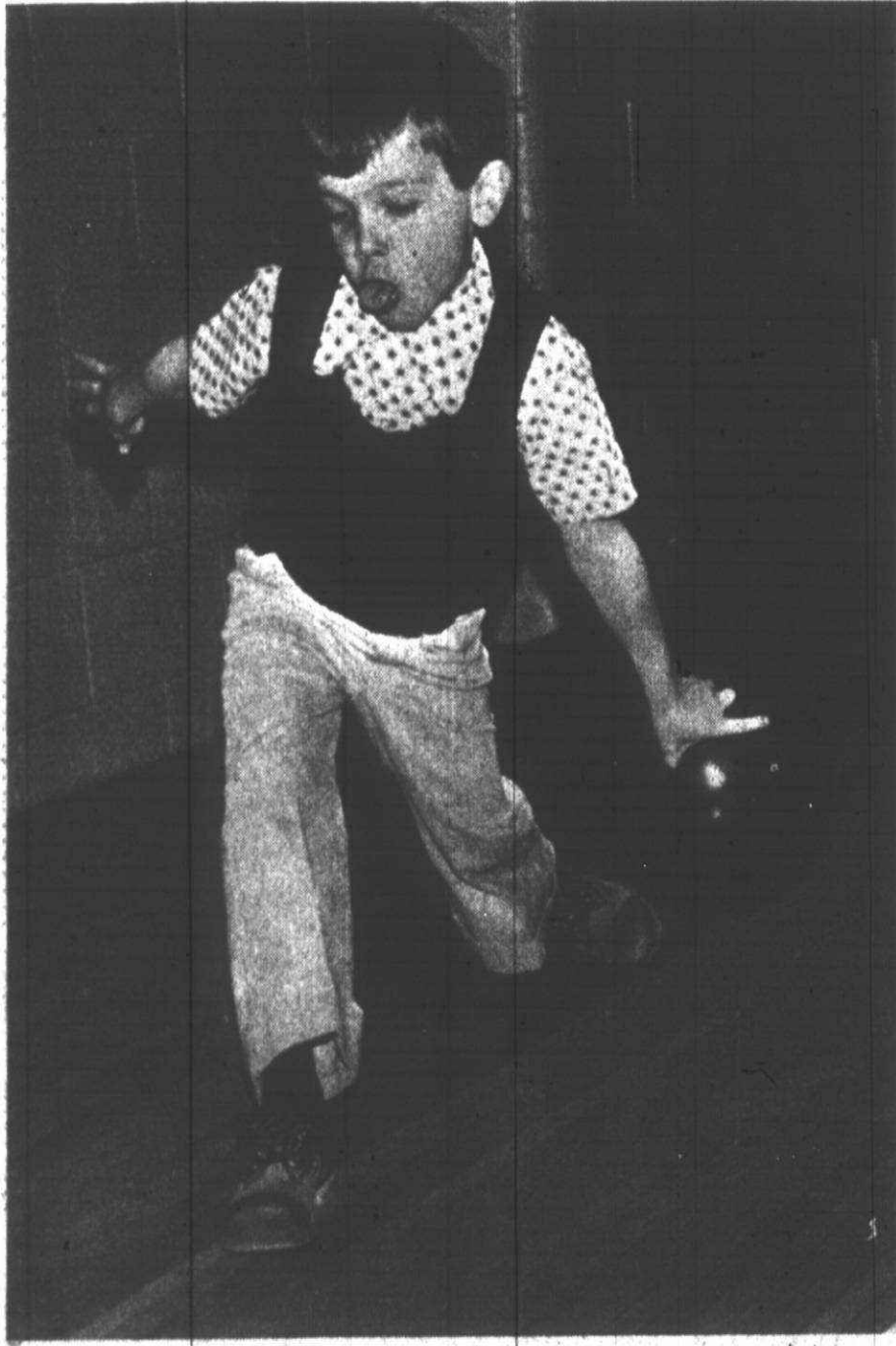

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In The Pocket.

When Barbara Waling rolled her perfect game in the mixed Classic at Farmington Lanes, she focused attention again on the major strides women have been in bowling. After watching her pile up the string of strikes, Fred Hamlin, owner of Farmington Lanes, remarked, "It just doesn't seem possible that the women have come so far in scoring."

"There was a time, not long ago, when it was considered outstanding when a woman rolled a 600 series. Now look at them. Rolling a 600 series is more or less a common thing. Then along comes a woman like Barbara

and boosts the peak this season to a 756. It is almost unbelievable."

Barbara's big count, which included the eighth perfect game in the area's history by a woman bowler, placed her sixth on the national honor roll. The top score of the season thus far is a 790 rolled by Pat Guenzler, of St. Louis.

WHILE THIS BIG count was phenomenal, the perfect game, in which all of the strikes were in the pocket, placed her in very select company. Only seven other women have rolled 300 games sanctioned by the Detroit Woman's Bowling Association.

These seven and the years in which they performed the feat are:

Hattie Wooster, 1943-44; Doris Knechtges, 1948-49; Edna Pikulinski, 1950-51; Catherine Harmon, 1959-60; Ann Setlock, 1969-70; Marge Lewandowski, 1971-72; Roslyn Stewart 1973-74 and now Barbara.

Her perfect game was the second rolled this season in the women's ranks in Michigan. Charlene Grossman, of Rothbury, posted the other early in the season.

THERE WERE SOME close battles in the Westland Classic, but no one broke the 700 barrier. The closest anyone came was Tony Loiacano with a closing 253 for 688.

Behind him came Dan Emmett with 658 and Hal Jolley with 644, while Dave Diomed had high single of 267 and Bob Chamberlain followed with a 265.

ONE OF THE BEST performances of the week was turned in by Shaun McLaughlin at Garden Lanes. Carrying only a 130 average, he fired a 243 in a 502 series.

Other high scores at Garden included Terry David's 647 that topped the junior house league, while Ed Tatisko followed with 629 and Al Morda landed third with 624. In the Good Hope circuit, top honors went to Walt Rams with a 638.

ASIDE FROM BARBARA WALING'S big series at Farmington Lanes, several other girls did well, too. Jean Dembeck topped the ladies classic with a 230 in 633 and Isabella Howard had a 234 in 565 in the Wooddale PTA league. Among the men in the mixed league, Tom Hay was high with a 232 in 627.

SUE KUHN had one of the best days of her career at Merri-Bowl when she linked games of 236, 210 and 198 for 640. Meanwhile, at Plymouth Bowl, Dave Sash paced the Chevy midnite league with a 242 in 591 and Dave Russell had a 257 in 559. The best of the week in the Bowl was Robert Tressler, of the Sundowners with a 266 in 598.

GERRY ZANDE scored a double victory in the Livonia Ladies when she won the final game, 213-251, and the series with a handicap count of 514-114-628.

In the other games, Lois Merriman with a 193-24-217, tied Janice Gale with a 188-29-217, while Dot Fulton won the middle game with a 199-33-232.

In the ladies house league Pam Lowry, who carries a 157 average, came through with a 195 to help her

team win four points and take the lead. Another good showing was that of Mary Worden, who holds a 132 average, and added games of 200 and 187.

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Churchill favored in West 6

Area schools will play the roles of favorite and darkhorse in this year's Western Six track title race.

Livonia Churchill is the defending champion in that league and also has the Observer & Eccentric area title to defend. Veteran Charger coach Fred Price has lot some key individuals, particularly in the speed events, but should have enough to repeat in the Western Six.

If the Chargers are hurting in the dash events, it's about the only place as Price has a multitude of good athletes back from last year.

Leading the pack in the field events will be senior Bill Reardon who specializes in the shot put. Reardon heaved the iron ball 54.4 recently and

should be one of the area's standouts in that event. Two senior pole vaulters, Paul Shultz and Rick Powers, are both up around the 13-foot mark while Joe Kline will perform in the high jump along with Kevin Chappel. Larry Janowski is over 20 feet in the long jump.

Versatile Craig Gulle has been clocked in 51.4 in the quarter mile but will run at longer distances at least for the first part of the season. Gully has gone the mile in 4:33 and the half in under two minutes.

Junior speed men Jim Wright and Mike Striecher must come through for Price if Churchill is to dominate while sprinters Tim Kumbier and Ron Wilkes show promise and may develop.

Juniors Mike Fox and Brian Hanna will handle the hurdle events for the Chargers and Fox will double in the relays.

"This is basically a junior team except for the field events. I would be disappointed if we weren't a factor in the league race," Price said.

Price added that he saw Waterford Mott as the prime challenger for his team's title and thought that Canton and Northville would threaten.

PLYMOUTH CANTON—is faced

with a "thin" squad this year, with only 30 candidates out for track, and Schwall sees tradition as the reason for the slight turnout.

"It's tough getting a program going. You don't get a lot out until you build a winning tradition, but you don't build a winning tradition until you get some people out. It's a vicious circle," Schwall said.

In spite of a less-than-hoped-for turnout, Canton boasts several standout performers who should rack up points throughout the season.

The best of the lot may be half-miler Mike Potter who has a 1:58.6 time for that distance. Brian Bennett and senior Steve Sally will provide depth at the distance events.

Phil Schulte will see double duty for the Chiefs, handling the hurdles as well as the quarter mile.

Canton's major problem will be in the speed events where a number of freshmen will be tested for the sprints.

"We came on well toward the end of last season, but we're nowhere near ready right now," said Schwall.

Schwall said that he expected defending champion Churchill to be the team to beat for Western Six honors this spring.

"I would think that we would have to be considered the top team in our division," he said.

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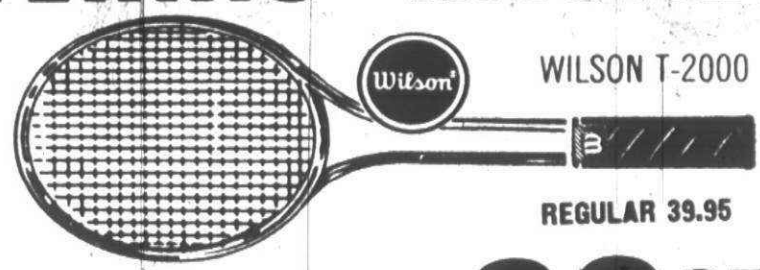


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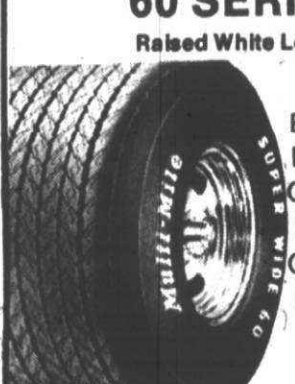
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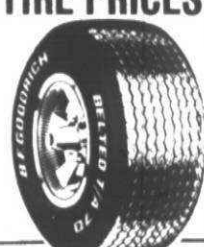
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Turf Tips, Quips

The racing business is booming every place and especially in the state of Michigan where the Detroit Racing Association and Northville Downs seem to be picking up steam daily and nightly.

The DRA opened its 90-day spring and summer meeting Tuesday with one of the biggest weekdays of the year. When the final tally was made at the end of the ninth race, a crowd of 8,019 had wagered \$813,640. That happens to be the best weekday in two years outside of Good Friday last week.

Northville Downs, in its final week of a meeting which ends next Tuesday, set wagering records on three successive nights. It started last Thursday when 5,026 poured \$510,432 through the wickets.

Then came Saturday when the largest crowd ever for a winter meeting in Michigan—7,435—bet an all-time high of \$678,038. That was the biggest night in the track's 32-year history, bettering the previous high of \$608,697 on July 3, 1971.

Then came Monday, when the 'Downs had the only game going in the area since the DRC was dark, and the turnstile count soared to 5,059 with a total handle of \$559,387, some \$50,000 better than any Monday.

The total for the three nights was \$1,747,857 for an average of \$580,986.

That's a record the track management dreamed of for years and now it becomes a reality with only six nights remaining of the season.

Despite the unprecedented mutual play, Northville executive manager John Carlo is still unhappy with the track's 1975 date assignments. Earlier he filed suit against Racing Commissioner Leo Shirley complaining that summer dates had been taken from Northville Downs and turned over to Wolverine Raceway and Hazel Park Raceway for back-to-back summer meetings.

Carlo has asked for a rehearing through his attorney, Arthur Brauer, of the lawsuit. Circuit Court Judge Thomas Foley will consider the matter Friday.

TOM MERRIMAN, who has won numerous races for Owner Bob Kalish of Southfield during the Northville meeting, will be back to defend his driving championship when the 82 night Hazel Park campaign begins next Wednesday.

Tom beat out Greg Wright, the brilliant Canadian, by the slimmest of margin, 341 to 334. Merriman made his last start of the meeting in the eighth race on the final night and finished second. If he had finished out of the money, Wright would have been the champion.

Tom's brother, Jim Jr., was eighth among the reinsmen at Hazel Park last season. He will return to improve on last season's effort. So will all the others who wound up in the top 10: Wright, Wally McIlmurray, Chris Boring, Ray Remmen, Bob Williams, Mike Novick, Shelly Goudreau and Pat Crowe.

At Hazel Park last year, Tom finished in the money in well over half of his races. He had a record of 18-28-19 in 117 starts. He has won \$1.2 million in purses and more than 1,000 victories.

Horses are expected to pour into Hazel Park during the latter part of the week with the anticipation that all stalls will be filled by the time of the first race.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors was scheduled to check in Thursday and handle the drawings for the opening program Saturday morning.

There will be 10 races nightly, with the exception of Sundays, with a post time of 8 p.m.

DRC WILL PRESENT its first Sabbath program next Sunday with 10 races on tap. The race week thereafter will be from Tuesday through Sunday with Mondays dark.

The minimum purse was raised to \$2,700 Thursday (today) with feature handicaps worth \$10,000. Post time for

Saturdays, Sundays and holidays will be 2 p.m. with 10 races. Weekday programs will total nine events with a 3:30 p.m. post prevailing.

The DRC admission prices for the summer meeting will be the same as in 1974, \$2 to the grandstand and \$3 to the clubhouse.

Trainer Jack Foran took the trophy for sending the most winners to the starting gate and Don Holmes was the leading jockey.

The big mile track averaged 7,375 in attendance for the 19-day spring season with the mutual handle up 17 per cent for a daily average of \$997,277.

FOLKS HAVE OFTEN asked about the meaning of the words "Three Guys From RPI," a stable which has had a great deal of success on Michigan tracks in recent years.

Turns out the three guys, who own the stable, were all graduates from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Rochester, N.Y. and used that in naming their stable.

Folks never will get to meet the three guys since one, Kip M. Siegel, an Ann Arbor industrialist and a world famous physicist and inventor in the field of optics, died recently in Washington, D.C. He suffered a stroke while testifying before the joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy.

Don't take bathroom lighting lightly

Home & Garden

What caused one of the biggest revolutions in the American lifestyle? Indoor plumbing!

Just about every home has the basics: here's how to make your bathroom work for you.

First think about color. For good illumination, walls, ceilings and counter tops should feature light tones to better reflect the glow from incandescents and fluorescents, and to keep shadows at a minimum.

DARK BASINS and counter tops

made of such materials as black marble, copper-tone tile, or dark plastic laminates absorb much light, thus wasting it.

Light colors make a small room appear larger. You love deepbrown or navy? Use them for accessories (towels, shower curtain or soap dish).

A well-lighted mirror is a bathroom essential. Poor mirror lighting means nicks from shaving and garish make-up effects.

Want to add real pizzazz? Create a plant corner in your bathroom. Plants love humidity; even hard-to-grow varieties will do better in the bathroom, as long as they have sufficient light.

PLACE FIXTURES at the top and sides of the mirror, so they light the person, looking into it, not the mirror itself.

Because the bathroom is sure to be the scene of nocturnal visits, install a nightlight.

Even if it runs continuously it will cost only pennies a year but will prevent the sleepy-eyed from bumping into the facilities.

The Green Thumb

Home improvement show April 10-13

The Home Improvement Council of Metropolitan Detroit, an affiliate of the National Home Improvement Council, is having its first home improvement show at the Northland Shopping Center, Greenfield and Eight Mile Road, Thursday through Sunday, April 10 to 13. Daily hours are from 9:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Fifty-five companies will be on hand to answer questions for all home improvement needs. Porches, home additions, kitchens, indoor and outdoor greenhouses, insulation and garages will be included in the display.

One thing this country hasn't learned to do is to conserve and recycle.

It's very strange. This newspaper pays around \$300 a ton for newsprint, yet scrap paper is practically worthless. You're lucky if you can get \$5 a ton for old papers.

Smart gardeners hate to toss old papers onto the dump pile and are using them as much. One thing you can do is run the papers through a soil shredder.

First, roll the papers into loose logs, soak them briefly in water (to prevent the wind from blowing them away after they leave the shredder), and then run them through the machine. You can place the shreds on a compost pile or on the garden and plow them under.

DON'T WORRY about lead in the papers poisoning you or your vegetables. Plants do not absorb lead through the roots.

You may get a temporary shortage of nitrogen, just as you would if you added sawdust, wood chips or heavy doses of manure. This is no problem because you can offset it by simply adding a nitrogen fertilizer.

Some gardeners lay the newspapers along the edge of their vegetable rows and weigh them down with soil, straw boards or whatever is available.

Another use for newspapers is to make logs for your fireplace. It's a lot more sensible than just tossing them out.

Note: If you have screen over your fireplace chimney to keep the birds out, be sure to clean the screen from time to time as ashes can build up underneath and prevent a draft in the fireplace.

MOST MUSKMELONS or cantaloupes are a long-season warm weather fruit, but it's surprising to note how many home gardeners grow sweet, luscious melons in their own backyards.

Order some seed now and start your own plants in peat pots about March 1. This gives them a head start so you can plant them in the garden as soon as warm weather rolls around. Give the seed plenty of bottom heat when you start them, 75 to 85 degrees.

Set the plants outside as soon as the soil is warm enough. We guarantee you'll have fruits in the fall. Fruits are ripe when the stem will slip from the melon with a slight touch of the thumb. If stem does not slip off easily, leave it on the vine longer.

Melons do not ripen well off the vine.

GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "We have access to plenty of cow manure. Is it safe to use on the garden?"

Answer: Yes. With the fertilizer shortage at hand, we're convinced that manure is pretty good stuff to use on the garden.

Schoolcraft 'expands' campus

LIVONIA—Schoolcraft College is planning to expand into the community of the five school districts it serves.

The college administration is talking with Livonia and Northville School District officials to use their buildings after the kindergarten-through-12th grade programs are completed for the day.

Dr. C. Nelson Grote, Schoolcraft president, told the Livonia Chamber of Commerce recently that the college is planning a second Garden City center, probably at Harrison Intermediate School, following the success in the past two years of the college center at the vacated Florence Primary School in Garden City.

Grote said the college planned for an enrollment of 250 students when it first opened a Garden City center—and an estimated 1,000 signed up for classes.

HE SAID that an expansion into the community instead of concentrating on new buildings on the campus on Haggerty north of Six Mile is based on two factors.

One is the philosophical belief that the college should get closer to the community and use existing buildings in the afternoons and evenings.

The other is that there is no money left in the college's building fund for new structures.

Schoolcraft is planning to lease the Wayne County Child Development Center in cooperation with Wayne State University.

Grote touched on numerous school topics before the estimated 75 businessmen.

HE TALKED about a possible property tax increase in the 1975-76 school year, problems of building a student spirit on a community campus, and

the large enrollment growth expected in the next few years.

Grote said no millage increase will be asked for in the current school year which ends June 30, but said there is a "high probability" of a tax proposal in the upcoming fiscal year, which starts July 1, to help offset rising costs.

"A tough problem" at Schoolcraft, Grote said, is the building of school spirit among students who drive to the campus for classes but don't stay for social or student activities.

He said that students are driving to the campus for classes, then going to their jobs and returning to the school again.

"It's hard to build an esprit de corps and spirit with student commuters and no campus residents," Grote said. "Schoolcraft is a shopping center—people come for what they want and leave."

He said there is less interest in social life and student activities since some students come from as far as Troy and Ypsilanti.

THE GROWTH of Schoolcraft has resulted in it being the eighth largest community college in Michigan.

Grote said the school is designed for 5,500 students but has 9,000 enrolled.

There has been a 70 per cent growth in the past 4½ years and the college expects a 4.75 per cent increase next fall and a 20 per cent boost by 1980.

The type of student has changed in the last few years, he said.

Schoolcraft started with students right out of high school and in the 18-20 age bracket, he said, and usually headed for a four-year college.

Now, many students are 25 and older with 43 to 62 per cent enrolled in occupational or career programs.

Hosted by WRIF disc jockey Art Penhallow, the evening begins at 7:45 p.m. and ends at 1 a.m. Admission is \$1.

The Special Olympics are held each year for physically handicapped and other children residing in state institutions. An annual project of the Civitans, this year's regional contests will be held April 26 and May 2 at Garden City.

The Special Olympics benefit children in Livonia, Westland, Garden City, and Plymouth.

Guldner named to top detective post

PLYMOUTH—Lieutenant William Guldner, a 25-year veteran of the Plymouth police force, was appointed recently to head the city's investigation and services bureau.

He replaces interim department head Sergeant Carl Berry, who held the post for 10 months.

Commented Police Chief Tim Ford, "Carl did one heckuva job. He really

was great, but under our present structure the position calls for a lieutenant, and Carl is a sergeant."

Berry was filling in for Lt. Roger Vanderveen who has been ill.

Said Ford, "Bill's an excellent choice for the job. He has all the credentials, the training and background to make a fine bureau head. We expect him to do the same kind of good work in his new position."

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD OF TRUSTEES - REGULAR MEETING MARCH 25, 1975

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor McLaren at 8:00 P.M. All members were present.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES - Regular Meeting, March 11, 1975. Mr. Burke moved to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting of March 11, 1975 as submitted. Supported by Mr. Gornick and carried unanimously.

Special Meeting, March 17, 1975 - Mr. West moved approval of the minutes of the Special Meeting of March 17, 1975 as submitted. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried with Mr. Burke abstaining.

READING, CORRECTING AND APPROVAL OF BILLS - Mr. Millington questioned the bill from Norman L. Dietrich & Associates, in the total amount of \$7,312.00. Regarding a \$5112 bill for preparation of the application for matching BOR funds for the recreation site and golf course. Mr. Millington did not recall this amount of money being approved. Mr. McLaren commented that the \$4040 is not a one shot deal and not related to the total bill but a prerequisite for application no matter what. In order to properly develop the recreation site, guidance was needed which has been previously determined by the Board. Mr. Gornick moved to approve payment of the bills in the total amount of \$111,316.04. Supported by Mr. West and carried with Mr. Millington voting "No."

1975-1976 BUDGET APPROVAL - Mr. Burke moved approval of the General Fund Budget in the amount of \$923,830.00 for fiscal year 1975-1976. Supported by Mr. West and carried unanimously.

Water and Sewer Department - Mr. Ash moved adoption of the Water and Sewer Department budget for 1975-1976 in the amount of \$729,900.00. Supported by Mr. Gornick and carried unanimously.

COMMUNICATIONS - James E. Gignac, Fire Chief - Re: Retirement of Martin Schomberger. Mrs. Richardson displayed the badge and read the citation to be given to Mr. Schomberger. Mr. Ash moved that it show on the minutes of this meeting recognition of the Township Board for the dedicated service of Martin Schomberger for his service for over 26 years in the Fire Department and that a letter be sent to Mr. Schomberger indicating the appreciation of the Board. Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS - Loren W. Gould, Gould Development Company. Re: Requesting an additional extension of the Tentative Preliminary Plat of the Plymouth-Joy Subdivision located west side of Lilley and North side of Joy Roads. Mr. Millington moved that an additional one (1) year extension of the Preliminary Plat of the Plymouth-Joy Subdivision, located west side of Lilley and north side of Joy Roads be granted to Mr. Loren W. Gould. Supported by Mr. Gornick and carried unanimously.

Kenneth Klinski, 39855 Birchwood - Re: Requesting adjustment on their water bill. Mr. Klinski commented that he did not feel he was responsible for the water used by the people who owned the home previous to him: he was questioning a billing for 111,000 gallons of water used over a period between August 26, 1970 and February 12, 1975. Mr. Kincaid commented that it is the responsibility of the real estate company to have an inside meter reading when finalizing a sale of a home. This was not done in this particular case, therefore, a portion of the water in question could have been used prior to the Klinski's purchasing the home. Mr. West moved that the bill including the amount in arrears, totaling approximately \$80.00 be split down the middle. Supported by Mr. Gornick.

Mr. Burke felt that a precedent will be set for splitting further bills down the middle and felt the Klinski's should be responsible for the amount of water used while residing at this location. Mrs. Richardson agreed that this would really establish a precedent and felt another solution should be arrived at. The following roll call vote was taken:

Daniel J. Ross, Hilltop Glen Golf Inc. Re: Application for a Class "C" Liquor License for Hilltop Glen Golf, Inc. Mr. Gornick commented that the current resort tavern license is not available to the new lessee, and there has been an existing Tavern License at this location for many years.

Mr. Gornick moved that the request for the Hilltop Glen Golf, Inc., to obtain a Class "C" liquor license be approved by the Township Board "above all others." Supported by Mr. West. The motion carried with Mr. Burke voting "NO."

Supported by Mr. West and carried unanimously.

Helen I. Richardson, Clerk. Re: Transfer of funds. Mr. West moved that the transfer of funds be approved as requested by the Township Clerk. Supported by Mr. Ash and carried unanimously.

Web Kincaid, D.P.W. Superintendent. Re: Requesting permission for Robert Rorabacher and DPW. Superintendent to attend a one day water supply Regional

Meeting to be held at the Ypsilanti Township Civic Center on April 8, 1975 at 8:00 A.M. Mrs. Richardson moved approval for Mr. Kincaid and Mr. Rorabacher to attend a one day water supply Regional Meeting to be held at the Ypsilanti Township Civic Center on April 8, 1975 at 8:00 A.M. and authorize the registration fee of \$6.25 each. Supported by Mr. West and carried unanimously.

Nicholas Kanakis, Clock Restaurant, 9488 So. Main Street. Re: Requesting permission to secure Class "C" Liquor License at 9488 So. Main St. Mr. Burke moved that Mr. Nicholas Kanakis, Clock Restaurant, 9488 Main Street, be added to the Township list of applications for a Class "C" liquor license. Supported by Mr. Millington. Mrs. Richardson stated there were approximately 10-15 names on the list.

Richard Gornick, Trustee. Re: Recommending a letter be sent to the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation voicing the Township's concerns over the locating of an Airport Facility in our community. Mr. Ash moved that the letter be sent to the agencies stated after the correction under paragraph "P" is made to read: Airports have historically begun operations... Supported by Mrs. Richardson and carried unanimously.

Web Kincaid, D.P.W. Superintendent. Re: Sewer Privileges for Canton Township Resident. Mr. Burke moved to approve the request include but not limit it to the items specified in Mr. Kincaid's letter with the understanding that there is no cost or expense to the Township. Supported by Mr. Ash.

Mr. Millington wondered if Mr. Burda's septic field would be rendered inoperative if the Centennial Educational Park were to be built a pond. Mr. Kincaid commented that in Mr. Hoben's communication he had stated they wanted the sewer privileges as the septic field may be rendered inoperative.

Mr. Hamill, Township Engineer, was concerned about what the plan would do to Willow Creek by building a dam. Mr. Hamill felt possibly a precedent may be established as only the church and a market are tapping into Township sewers.

Mr. Ash recommended voting against the motion as a more appropriate way would be to find out the ramifications involved, whether or not the building of the pond would adversely affect the Township before proceeding with granting any tap-ins. The motion failed with Mr. Burke voting "Yes"

Mr. Burke moved to empower the Supervisor to withdraw from the Community Development Block Grant Program at such time that it is no longer in the interest of Plymouth Township and its residents to continue in the association. Mr. Ash voted against the motion because he did not feel the burden of making the decision should be placed on the Supervisor.

Mrs. Richardson voted against the motion because there were no reasons given within the motion itself to empower the Supervisor to withdraw and felt those reasons could have been obtained by the Supervisor and the Planner and given to the Board prior to the April 8, 1975 meeting.

Mr. Millington voted "No" because he felt too much burden is placed on the Supervisor to make a decision which is the decision of the Board to make. The motion carried, 4-3.

Conference attendees included Commander Charles Mauch of Livonia, retired from the U.S. Navy, Midshipman Cadet 3rd Class Liesel R. Muth of Livonia from the Navy ROTC at the University of Michigan, and Major General Naiff Keel of Farmington Hills who is commander of the Army's 70th Division Training units headquartered on Schoolcraft Road in Livonia.

CADET MUTH graduated from Livonia Churchill High in 1973 and is now a sophomore at U-M majoring in Spanish.

She was one of 12 ROTC cadets from Michigan colleges and universities to be sponsored by the Michigan ROA Department for the Washington DC conference.

Navy ROTC, a member of the Pershing Rifles, member of the color guard at U-M, and a National Merit scholar.

Faust eyes water law

Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) has introduced a bill in the Michigan Senate which would place large municipally owned water systems under the regulatory eye of the Michigan Public Service Commission (PSC). Only Detroit's system, which serves most of the suburbs, presently would be affected by the measure.

The bill, which would require PSC review annually and require PSC to fix uniform rates, has been referred to the Senate Committee on Commerce.

"Rates charged by municipally owned water systems have been historically matters of purely local concern," said Faust, whose district includes Westland, Garden City and Canton Township.

"Now, however, we have a situation where one large municipal water system serves not only the residents of that community but the residents of a number of neighboring communities as well.

"Unfortunately, the neighbors have no voice in the rates. Unless regulatory state action is permitted, the neighbors could one day be forced to foot most of the water bill with the home system residents getting 'discount' water bills," he said.

Tanner encourages area environmentalists

"Volunteers are always sincere, sometimes helpful and frequently lacking in input."

"But many groups are not effective critics and they are not making themselves heard."

Al Masini, DNR district parks supervisor, said his office in Pontiac has not turned down any groups which have offered their services.

"Sometimes we have good responses and sometimes the response isn't so good," Masini said.

"When we ask people to paint trash barrels, they sometimes turn us down, but a project to thin or plant a forest is accepted."

Masini encouraged groups developing their own plans to submit them to either his Pontiac office or the park where the group intends to work.

Cheryl finds opera career challenging

Cheryl Stewart loves music and the theater. Unable to make the choice which "one" to pursue as a career, she combined her interests and got what she considers the best of both—opera.

Miss Stewart, 24, of Livonia, recently completed her first season with the Michigan Opera Theater (MOT). She spent most of her time in the chorus and had a small part in MOT's last production "Die Fledermaus."

On her experiences with a professional company she says: "It was invaluable. I learned more in one season with MOT than in four years in the classroom."

MISS STEWART, a 1968 graduate of Stevenson High School, has studied piano "all her life." She sang in the Stevenson chorus, under the direction of Lowell Everson, and traveled as an alumna member when the group toured Europe.

After graduation Miss Stewart went to college with plans to major in chemistry. She continued to be active in the music and drama clubs despite a busy academic schedule.

During high school and college she performed with the Theater Guild of Livonia-Redford and the Lathrup Village Players.

"Community theater is an excellent training ground," she says. "It's very

satisfying to see a production finally come together."

After two years of college she decided chemistry wasn't her calling, and left for Philadelphia, where she worked as a nurses aid.

"All the while I was trying to sort out what music really meant to me. I never really thought of it as a career, but I was beginning to change my mind," recalls Miss Stewart.

"You really put up with a lot of confusion and frustration before you find the end. After working with MOT I'm sure I have the right decision for me."

AFTER HER BRIEF stay in Philadelphia, she returned to Michigan and enrolled in Western Michigan University, where she received a bachelor's degree in music and vocal performing.

She is presently living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Stewart in Livonia, and working in a clothes boutique in Birmingham. She plans to move to New York later this spring, and plunge full force into her theatrical career.

Her enthusiasm and optimism are tempered with just the right amount of realism. "It's not going to be easy, but it's my choice. I've already learned that an artist gives up a lot, and doesn't always get anything in return."

Miss Stewart feels opera is especially demanding.

"It's precise and very controlled. The performer must concentrate not only on vocal but theatrical aspects," she says. "Opera requires a great amount of self-discipline."

Her favorite opera form is comedy. She especially enjoyed "Die Fledermaus," and MOT's presentation of "The Elixir of Love," a melodrama staged in the American West around the turn-of-the century.

"ACTUALLY I liked them all. The season offering was well-balanced and provided variety from the traditional 'La Traviata,' to the vaudeville-type comedy 'Die Fledermaus.'"

Miss Stewart's eyes sparkle when she talks about what lies ahead in New York. "Even if I don't get many parts, the auditions are a learning experience. You can improve immensely by just accepting the criticism, recommendations and encouragement of other professionals."

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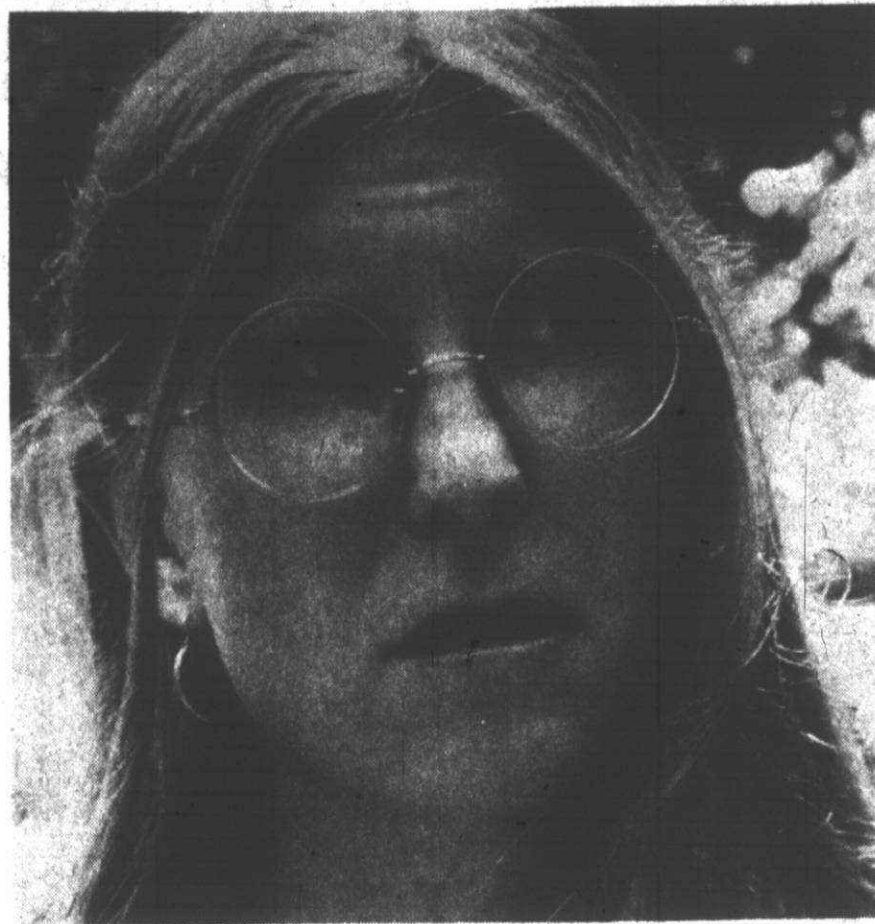

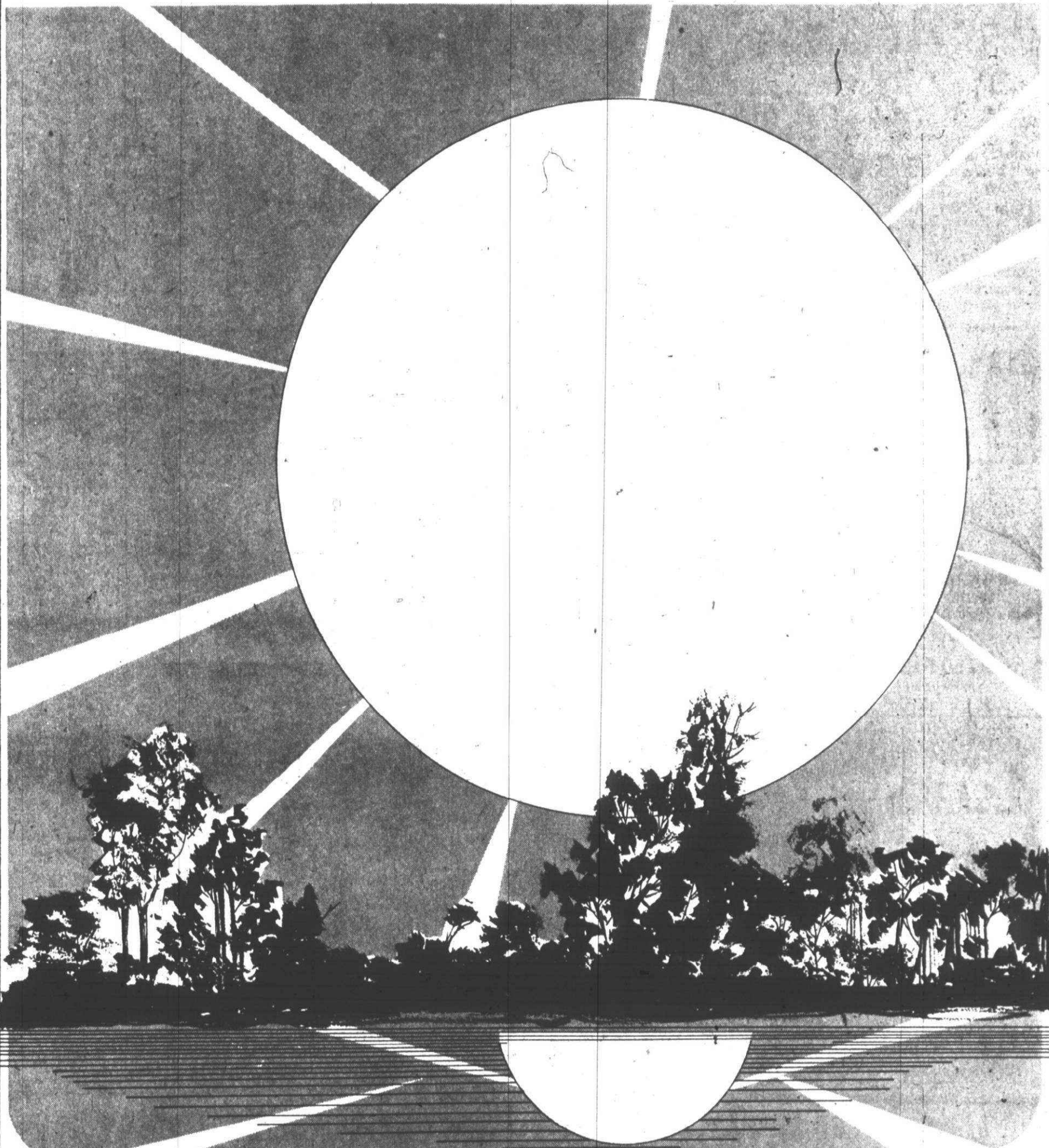

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Homemakers Holiday ready for spring term

Nora Nader, a program director for the YWCA of Western Wayne County, has a couple of personal reasons for being glad to see the start of the next Homemakers Holiday series on April 9 in Rosedale Gardens Presbyterian Church of Livonia.

For one thing, this Westland mother of two grown sons considers herself on of the original boosters of such "ladies day out" programs.

And besides that, when the classes get under way, she'll be back at one of the things she likes to do best, teaching dancing.

Mrs. Nader, who last fall joined the staff of the YW now located at 26279 Michigan, Inkster, will have a belly dancing class in the program to be run Wednesdays in the Rosedale church, 9601 Hubbard, Livonia.

The morning schedule also will include needlecraft, with Lillian Hickey as instructor, oil painting with Marie Kudrieko and yoga with Eve Cizek. There will be a nursery for pre-schoolers whose mothers are attending classes.

Bowing from 1 to 3 p.m., with Paul Howie as instructor, also is part of the program.

Classes are priced from \$10 to \$16, with the playroom cost \$1 per session. YW membership, which costs \$3.50, is required. Those interested should register by calling the Western Wayne Y.

NORA NADER is a long-time believer in programs for homemakers like this one.

Wife of optometrist Joseph Nader

and a Westland resident for 18 years, she used to make regular trips to the Highland Park YWCA to participate in a similar program.

"No place around here had a program like this for mothers and very young children when I needed it," she said. "My boys were potty-trained at the YW, and I loved every minute of the classes I took."

After Jimmy and Gordon Nader were in school, their mother, a ballroom dancing teacher by profession, spent some years assisting her husband in their home-office, scheduling appointments and helping those purchasing glasses choose proper frames.

During those years, though, she wanted to keep up with her dancing.

"So while waiting for ballroom dancing to get back in style, I heard of the new popularity of belly dancing," she said, "and I hired teachers to come into my home so I could learn it."

DURING THOSE not-so-long-ago days, she said, she was told by a Livonia adult education official that no class by that name ever would be scheduled, and teaching belly-dancing in a church would hardly have been considered.

It now has gained both respectability and popularity, and Mrs. Nader found her training most valuable when the big demand for teachers came.

She started teaching it at the Western YW last September, and while she was at it brought into the program some new dance classes, including her old favorite ballroom dancing.

She wants Livonia women to know this kind of dancing—really figure control exercising—doesn't require youth for participation.

"I'm 46," Mrs. Nader said, "and I started belly-dancing when I was over 40. It's good for everybody."

ABOUT THE ONLY problem with being one of the teachers in the Homemaker Holiday programs, she added, "is that I get so interested in everything going on that I want to be everywhere at once."

"I still find exciting this kind of program that breaks routine for mothers of young children. I'd love to take part in everything that's going on."

One of the spots in the current class line-up she should find especially fascinating is the needlework class Mrs. Hickey will be teaching.

It's a needlework pot-pourri—by design.

"A lot of teachers," said Mrs. Hickey, "like to have a set project for everyone to do, and want to start all class members off on something simple."

But I find the women who come into my classes often have something definite in mind. So I help them."

THUS, IN A CLASS with Mrs. Hickey, you might knit slippers or crochet an afghan or do embroidery or even try some broomstick lace, made on huge knitting needles.

"I had one woman who never had held a needle get an afghan nearly done by the end of the classes," she said. "She did a good job, too."

Members of her classes have ranged in age from teen to 80, she said, and one of the sessions included a husband on the enrollment list.

"He wanted to learn knitting, because he thought it would be relaxing," she said. "I'll be glad to have any men who want to enroll."

MRS. HICKEY, who taught herself needlework, always had plenty of projects to complete for her mother and five sisters and now she heeps busy with Christmas and birthday presents for 19 grandchildren. "Christmas starts in July," she laughed.

She also will fit the new series of classes in between preparations for the forthcoming wedding of her daughter, Mary. She's crocheting evening bags for the bride and her attendants, white for her daughter and pale green for the others.

Homemaker Holiday classes have been in Rosedale Gardens church for several years as a means of bringing the program of the western YW closer to women in this area.

A perennial favorite is the oil painting class taught by Marie Kudrieko. It also includes acrylics and is designed to teach basics, color mixing, perspective, and design.

Eve Cizek also is well known in this area as a teacher of yoga, the ancient method of better health through exercise relaxation, better breath control and physical awareness.

In the local program, needlecraft and oil painting will run from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., yoga from 10 to 11 a.m. and belly-dancing from 11 a.m. to 12 noon.

LOVE finding a way to help abused children

Child abuse is closer than you think. Recognizing this fact, Joan Duggan, director of the Livonia Office of Volunteer Energies (LOVE), is organizing a program through which local volunteers can learn to help parents who are abusing their children or worrying about doing so.

She anticipates about 10 women soon will be accepted as trainees in orientation sessions supervised by members of a team called SCAN (Suspected Child Abuse and Neglect), who are working to end child abuse.

Training will take place in Livonia's Senior Citizen building.

To aid her in acquainting area residents with the necessity for action in the child abuse situation, Mrs. Duggan recently invited to Livonia a number of individuals who constantly deal with abusive parents.

BERTHA LOPEZ of Protective Services of Wayne County, Northwest District, one of those present, explained that last year there were 6,170 cases of abuse and neglect of children under the age of 17 in the area covered by her office.

This includes Livonia, Redford Township, Plymouth, Northville, Garden City, Inkster, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, Westland and several other areas.

"Up to the beginning of March there were 14 abuse cases and 484 neglect cases in the district," Mrs.

Lopez said. "That is a lot for a two-month period."

"Any time there is economic stress, there is an increase of crimes of despair, such as neglect and abuse."

ALSO PARTICIPATING in the meeting were Grace Ball and Joyce Horston, pediatric social workers from the Wayne County General Hospital, both members of SCAN.

"Many of our cases involving child abuse come from the hospital's emergency room and clinic," said Mrs. Horston, chairman of a SCAN team.

"However, we also come in contact with many parents who are not physically abusive, but who have potential for abuse. Their children are medically neglected. They are not fed and clothed, or cared for properly."

Mrs. Horston added: "Some families are openly asking for someone to help them become better parents because they know they don't know how to raise children. We have a feeling of frustration when these families don't get the help they want."

ON HAND TO DESCRIBE a successful prototype of the kind of program Mrs. Duggan would like to see in Livonia, was Dee Dise, director of Family Focus in Birmingham. Three years ago her organization trained its first volunteer to work on a one-to-one basis with an abusive mother.

Mrs. Dise explained that Family Focus, which serves Oakland County, has a 24-hour crisis telephone which

can be used by abusive parents in need of help.

Family Focus volunteers also carry the parental abuse story through educational talks and films into area churches, hospital and schools.

But its biggest job is to educate volunteers to work with abusive parents. To date there are 35 mothers working in the program. All were trained in the Family Focus center, in the Redeemer Lutheran Church, 1800 W. Maple, Birmingham.

Twenty-two others began their training last week. The course takes 16-18 hours.

DRAWING A PROFILE of the ideal volunteer, Mrs. Dise said she would have a warm, loving personality, and be interested in becoming a friend to the woman to whom she would be assigned.

"The only treatment she would give is to help the mother build up her confidence," she said. "She would try to help her in the area of home-making and child-raising, and do what she could to find answers to her problems."

"She is not to give legal or medical advice, but find experts who can. She should be non-judgmental, have patience and find satisfaction in helping someone learn to function well in society."

MRS. DISE said most an abusive parents received inadequate parenting when children. "Most have missed for-

mal and informal education in child-rearing and homemaking," she added. She explained that as a result of their lack of knowledge about child-rearing, they have unrealistic expectations about their children.

"There is a tremendous increase, for example, in the abuse of children by adolescent mothers," she said.

"Often these are unwed mothers who keep their child to have someone to love them."

"They don't know that, for the most part, a child will not be able to give love until he is about three. Disappointed, the mother may then injure or neglect the child."

IGNORANCE OF TOILET training

can cause a parent to try to train her child at too early an age, Mrs. Dise said. When the child fails to respond, abuse can take place.

"Discipline is another problem," she continued. "I've known cases where parents burn the bottom of the children's feet to keep them from getting out of bed."

Continued illness or fatigue can cause abuse, as can the use of alcohol or drugs.

"We try to bring the mother out of isolation and help her to learn to fulfill her jobs as homemaker and mother," Mrs. Dise noted.

She explained that Family Focus deals mainly with mothers because fa-

thers resist the idea they are abusive and feel threatened by the idea of asking for help.

MRS. DISE WARNED that a volunteer will find satisfaction in her work with abusive mothers, but not always right away.

"People can be rude in their agony about their problems," she said. "If you are thin-skinned, it can hurt."

But there are positive rewards in seeing someone get over her depression, learn to deal with her children and become part of the community again.

"I feel good when I see someone begin to enjoy her life and her relationships with other people."

Coverlet collection featured

A handsome woven coverlet that helped keep an Avon Township family warm more than a century ago will be one of the display items in the Michigan Antiques Show and Sale in the Chrysler Arena in Ann Arbor April 3 to 5.

The coverlet, woven in 1846 by Abram William Van Doren for Almira Scriber Churchill of the Oakland County community, is part of a collection of Jacquard work to be put on display for the first time.

Owners of the collection, Fred and Margaret Brusher of Ann Arbor, said they were showing the coverlets as part of a special bicentennial show in the arena located next to the U-M football stadium.

Also joining the show will be some 60 dealers from 17 states in the mid-west, south, east and New England. The displays will include room settings with furniture from several periods in this nation's history.

THE CHURCHILL COVERLET, like most of the collection of 56, bears the names of both owner and weaver as well as Avon and Oakland County.

Its owners, Warner and Almira Churchill, were born in New York state and married in Hemmingford, Canada, in 1835. They moved to Orion, Mich., in 1843 and established themselves as merchants.

Three of their five sons died in the Civil War, the oldest, William Asher Churchill, in the Battle of Antietam in 1862.

THIS COVERLET is like most of those produced in the pioneer times in that its creator was a man. Women gathered the material and did the spinning and dyeing, but men were the weavers. The artisans traveled from place to place and did their weaving on order.

The woven coverlets of the 1800s, sometimes referred to as American tapestry, take their name from Joseph Jacquard, who invented a device to place on looms and aid in the manipulation of warp threads.

This permitted the weaver to create his elaborate designs and imagery.

Woven of cotton and homespun wool, they were often as large as 80 by 90 inches and thus provided warmth as well as beauty to the homes where they were found.

THREADS WERE DYED in shades of blues, reds, browns and greens, with dyes obtained from natural substances. The combination of blue and white was most popular, with the early weavers charging 50 cents extra for the more expensive cochineal red dye.

Jacquard woven coverlets were not produced in any quantity after the Civil War, so those that have come down to the present day are considered fine antiques.

The Brushers' collection is considered the largest in the nation.

The show and sale will be open Thursday and Friday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Saturday from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Admission is \$2.

Local troops help ice GS cookie sale

Plymouth-Northville Girl Scouts sold 41,268 boxes of cookies to aid the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council soar over its goal in its annual cookie sale.

Seeking to sell 350,000 boxes of cookies in the area covered by the council, the Girl Scouts brought in orders for 380,364 boxes.

The sale resulted in a profit of \$129,323, which will be used to support camping programs and facilities development, as well as the council's operational budget.

This year's sale showed that in this area the thin mint cookie is the most popular delicacy, with 125,000 boxes ordered. It was followed by Savannahs at 91,000, Oxford cremes and Scot teas at 50,000 each, and lemon cremes at 36,000.

The two products introduced this year accounted for nearly eight percent of the sales, with 19,000 boxes of sesame crisp crackers and 9,800 boxes of girl scout tea ordered.

I struggle daily with the near-impossible task of keeping by the telephone something to write on and something to write with. But even when I succeed, more problems ensue.

"I DID write it down," I hear someone say. "I can't help it if it got dropped on the floor." (A scribbled note is being retrieved from under the telephone stand after another call has established that indeed a message was left.)

"PUT THEM UP on the bulletin board," is my next recommendation.

But we keep running out of thumb tacks at the psychological moment, and of course we're always out of Scotch tape. And anyway notes on needed groceries are posted there, so a valuable message is likely to go to the grocery store with someone picking up milk or eggs.

I'm not expecting a solution, you understand. I'm just letting everyone know that if you call us and don't get called back, try again.

We're working on it, and by the law of averages, sometime the message is bound to get through.

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Paving of Main Street caused dissension

(Part II)

"During my memory of the road," Karl Starkweather said, referring to the plank road which ran from Plymouth to Detroit, "those planks were terribly rutted and worn. They danced and teetered as vehicles passed over them. A farmer often took the dirt side of the road going in to Detroit rather than tolerate the plank side. Traveling on the wrong side, however, he had to move over onto the plank side whenever he met a homebound wagon."

The rotted condition of some of the plank roads in Michigan in later years prompted a remark from Mark Twain about a stage ride he took between Grand Rapids and Kalamazoo. "The trip would have been enjoyable, Twain wrote, 'had not some unconscionable scoundrel now and then dropped a plank across the road.'"

As a result of numerous complaints from farmers who used the road, Plymouth voted to eliminate the Main and Mill toll gate on July 10, 1872. Gates two and three, on the way to Detroit, continued to operate until about 1875. Starkweather said remnants of the plank road still existed near the Detroit end in 1901.

BAD AS THEY were when not kept in repair, plank roads were preferable to ruts and mudholes. By 1855, however, the 1848 State law was amended to permit the use of gravel instead of planks on the chartered roads. Gravel surfaces took the place of wooden roads on main arteries until the early 1900's when modern paving materials were introduced.

A section of Main Street, from Ann Arbor Trail to Mill, was the first to be paved in Plymouth. It was covered with brick in 1908. Concrete roads did not appear in the United States until the following year when the first mile of concrete road in the world was laid on Woodward Avenue, between Six and Seven Mile roads, in Detroit.

THE CONDITION of Main Street had long bothered the village fathers. The "sea of mud" which covered the street during rainy seasons was giving Plymouth a bad name. "Plymouth Mail" editorials declared that the road was "the worst Main Street in Michigan."

The village president in 1908 was Fred Bennett, Charlie's younger brother. It was Fred, supported by the "Mail," who led the drive to have Main Street paved with brick. In 1907, village voters had turned down a brick pavement proposal, claiming that macadam would do the job.

Opposition for another reason came from householders who lived on the elevated northwest side of Main Street from Church to Mill. Led by Seneca Everett, who lived at the corner of Main and Starkweather, they protested that the leveling of Main Street, necessary for the paving, would cut a deep bank into their prop-

erties, making unusually steep grades of their driveways. In some places, they maintained, the grade would be so steep that it would be impossible to drive a car up the bank.

"Sin" Everett's house, in particular, would be left high and dry. The concern of this group of dissidents is not difficult to understand; they were to be assessed for an "improvement" which, in their view, was really a detriment to their properties.

IN SPITE OF the opposition, the village council placed the matter on the ballot again in 1908, asking for an \$8,000 bond issue to finance the vil-

lage's part of the \$20,000 project. An additional \$8,000 was to come from property owners along the street and nearly \$4,000 from the street railway company. A record 428 votes were cast and the bond issue won.

Fred Bennett, knowing that the supporters of macadam would be hy-

percritical, decided to spare no effort in selecting the brick to be used. Bill Taylor, an employee of the Daisy Manufacturing Company, where Fred Bennett was then plant superintendent, told Charlie Bennett of the procedure Fred followed.

"They wanted to buy the best brick available for the purpose, and Mr. Bennett, the village president, had several brick manufacturers put in their proposals with samples of brick."

"Mr. Bennett came into the Daisy engine room carrying six galvanized pails and samples of brick, all numbered. He had each pail numbered as well. He left instructions to fill the

pails with water of 70 degrees temperature and to weight each brick to the exact ounce. The bricks were then to be put in the pails of water, keeping a record of the time and weight. Each brick was left in water 24 hours and taken out and weighed again with a record of the weight being kept. After this test was done several times, the village purchased the brick that absorbed the least amount of water.

WHEN A CARLOAD of brick was later delivered, samples were taken from the car and the same test was made again to make sure that the delivered brick were like the sample

first submitted. Several carloads were returned."

Karl Starkweather told me that the entire paving job was done by one man, a "whirlwind" bricklayer, who set every one of the 550,000 bricks used. Crowds gathered around to watch him work during the summer of 1908. The job was completed by mid-November.

Fred Bennett's exhaustive tests paid off. The bricks gave good service for over half a century. In the fall of 1961, the city had them covered with a blacktop cap. Bennett's bricks are still under the blacktop on Main Street providing a sturdy base.

If you were asked to name one of the most frustrating jobs a fellow could have, which would you pick? Chances are you wouldn't choose being a weather forecaster on the radio or TV. The Stroller would not have either until he glanced at the screen in his living room the other evening and saw

one of his favorite forecasters throw up his arms after looking at the satellite map and saying, "Tomorrow you can expect anything." This was the height of frustration for the simple reason that the weather forecasters always are bold enough to make predictions, and they don't even blush the next day when the

weather is just the opposite of what they claimed it would be. The forecaster who threw up his hands has had a rather bad time of it this winter. He missed the 19-inch snowfall entirely last November and his showing during the wild month of February was nothing to write home about.

One evening he predicted a two-inch snowfall for the following day and said it might go to four inches and "maybe to eight." You can guess what happened. The sun shone brightly the next day and there wasn't a flake of snow.

Just a few nights ago he predicted that we would have a nice Easter Sunday, though it might be a bit chilly. It was chilly all right and the wind whirled the snow around like a mid-winter storm as folks were en route to church services.

In view of such happenings, there is no question about it, forecasting the weather must be listed among the most frustrating of all occupations.

For years The Stroller believed that travelling up and down the country and making predictions on the major sports events offered more than its share of frustrations.

How well he recalls several of his most frustrating moments. One he never will forget was the September evening in 1936 when Max Schmeling knocked out Joe Louis in Yankee Stadium at New York.

In those days, Joe always confided to The Stroller on the day before the fight in which round he would stop his opponent. But the day before this fight he would not name the round and said, simply, "I'll do the best I can."

That night in his final advance story to his paper, The Stroller donned the robes of an "expert."

Boldly, he wrote that Mrs. Louis could determine the length of the bout, saying that if she wanted to go to a movie Joe would make it short. If she wasn't going out until later, Joe would let Max stay around a while.

Remember what happened? Joe suffered the first knockout of his career and the Stroller sought a timetable to learn which train would get him home in the dark of evening. Talk about being frustrated. He didn't want anyone to see him.

One of the worst pangs of frustration struck a colleague in the press box of the State Fairgrounds years ago when the running horses held sway.

This fellow not only wrote about the horses but he owned several and, supposedly, knew all about them.

This day, in his column, he had picked his horse to win. However, it rained all morning and the track was sloppy when the clans started to gather.

In desperation he phoned dozens of his friends, telling them he never had seen his horse run in the mud and that they shouldn't bet on it.

The track was still bad when the horses went to the post, but he sat back, serene in the knowledge that he had done a favor for his friends by warning them.

At last came the call, "They're off" and would you believe it, his horse took the lead and never was headed. As his horse crossed the line, The Stroller's colleague just stood there stunned.

With tears coming down his cheeks he moaned, "What will I tell the people I called? They'll think I double crossed them. I have never been so frustrated in my life."

Truly, there were frustrating moments along the sports trail. But we have company now and we'll move over to make room for the weather forecasters.

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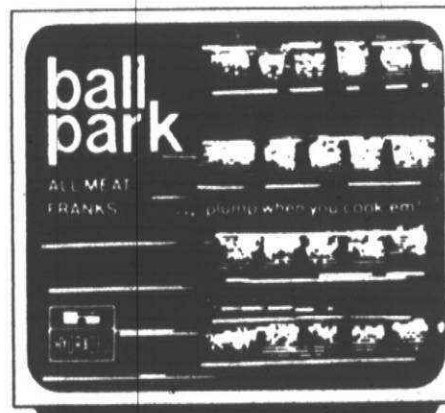

How to teach Sunday School and have fun

To many a church administrator trying desperately to fill out a list of volunteer Sunday School teachers, Barbara Burgess of Livonia would shine like a rare jewel.

Mrs. Burgess loves to teach Sunday School. "It's my little extra thing in life," is how she puts it.

This member of the church school staff at Mt. Hope Congregationalist is so enthusiastic that recently she wrote for "The Michigan Congregationalist," a denominational publication, an article titled "How to Teach Sunday School and Have Fun (Especially if you're not a professional teacher)."

BARBARA BURGESS has had the same class at Mt. Hope, located at 30330 Schoolcraft, for years, taking her young friends from elementary to high school age.

In those years, she's also taken them through a series of musicals that have turned out to be not only great teaching aides but also have become part of the curriculum offered for Congregational church schools.

One of these, a dramatization of the landing of the Pilgrims, found its way onto local television a few years ago.

Another, on the book of Romans, is the current project.

A musical on the book of Acts was the big work last year. "I wrote the words, and the kids did the music," Mrs. Burgess said. "We haven't offered it for the curriculum yet—I think it's so good we'd like to see if we can use it elsewhere first."

BUT A MUSICAL, as she explained in her article, is more the end result than the method of teaching for her.

"When you are working with a creative group, a production may come out of the study."

"We decided to do a tape of the Acts of the Apostles because we didn't want to lose any of the good thoughts and songs we had created along the way."

She added that since she is "a Sunday School teacher who can't carry a tune," she had worked with Helen Trudgeon, youth choir director, in carrying out direction of the musicals. That method might not be available to everyone, she added in her article, "but it is good to reach out when you have a weakness—let your Sunday School class overflow into the church."

RECORDING HER THOUGHTS on basic teaching methods, Mrs. Burgess said she likes "to go through the Bible one chapter and one line at a time."

She said she would not recommend starting at the beginning because "I worked long and hard on Genesis and still my class accused me of lifting the plots from the afternoon soap operas."

After selecting a biblical book, she wrote, a teacher may be tempted to use a Bible study guide. A good one may be helpful for background, she added, but it is not necessary to her "real way to prepare a lesson."

"EACH NIGHT, READ your Bible chapter for the following Sunday before you go to sleep," Mrs. Burgess recommended in her article.

"This adds up to reading one chapter six times. It won't take many minutes, so there is no excuse not to do it. Each night a different line will catch your attention. Now say a prayer, using the words and thoughts in your chapter. By Sunday you will have your own study guide etched on

the conscious level of your mind and underlined in your Bible."

In addition, she suggested "you will have a few interesting impressions floating around in your subconscious that might surface during class time."

IN CLASS DISCUSSION, she said, a teacher should listen to young

people's ideas and not assume that keeping a chapter ahead constitutes becoming a biblical authority. Then she added:

"Be open but demand equal time. Your ideas are as good as theirs. If you have some wise kid in the class who always questions your well-thought-out Bible interpretations,

thank the Lord for his presence. He isn't a threat. He is a blessing."

In concluding, Mrs. Burgess suggested that a teacher who has tried this method with New Testament books may then want to try Genesis again because "Paul goes back to the beginning so many times to prove a scriptural point."

"This time you may find yourself ready for the flaming passions of Genesis," she wrote. "With grace, you will be humble enough now to identify with those people of the Old Testament who loved, feared, hated, doubted and took revenge, but who ALWAYS listened to the voice of God."

In the morning worship, there will be a "bread-breaking," opening of small plastic loaves that members of the congregation have been filling with change for several weeks. Money so collected will be sent to disaster areas around the world to help feed hungry people.

MEMORIAL CHURCH OF CHRIST, 35475 Five Mile, Livonia, will begin a series of three "Faith Promise Rally" meetings during morning worship Sunday, April 6.

Gene Dulin, head of the Toronto Christian Mission and author of "The Faith Promise Missionary Conference" will be the first speaker.

Other speakers will be W. E. McGilvrey, research editor for Mission Services, on April 13, and Robert Migneault, professor at Great Lakes Bible College, on April 20.

Following the April 20 message, members of the congregation will make their promises for mission giving this year. The church's goal is \$10,500.

Methodists in this area seem generally in agreement with their bishop's call for fasting one meal per week, but empty plates aren't exactly commonplace yet.

Ministers of several churches, asked about the statement from Bishop Dwight E. Loder March 26, indicated there would be support of his call to join him in skipping a meal a week and give the money to help feed the world's hungry.

However, no definite plans for action in this area had yet been formulated.

Because the bishop's recommendation was made public just before the Easter festival services, most ministers said there had not yet been time to get boards geared for action in carrying it out.

They indicated general agreement with the Rev. Paul Cargo, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth, who stated:

"I will recommend that this congregation consider this discipline, and I believe the administrative board will approve the action."

"I imagine special envelopes in the pews will be the way to go in collecting our contributions."

Bishop Loder, leader of 310,000

United Methodists in the Detroit area and western Michigan, asked that all try missing one meal each week. He added:

Put the face of a starving child on your plate once a week. That empty plate can fill the stomach of a child in India for one month."

THE BISHOP said that special contributions made through this program would go first to supplying food and money to the Detroit Council of Churches to help feed the hungry in this area.

Two overseas projects also would benefit from the Michigan effort. Some \$250,000 worth of fertilizer would be sent to India as part of a revolving fund for producing more grain, and for immediate relief there would be a shipment of 1,000 metric tons of grain to India at a cost of \$200,000.

THE UMC OFFICIAL, who is president of the church's national council of bishops, said the UMC committee for overseas relief would match each dollar raised in Michigan in this way.

"If Michigan Methodists will respond, we alone can feed four million hungry people in India each week," he added.

Local United Methodist clergymen who joined Rev. Cargo in giving strong endorsement to the plan were the Rev. William Wager of Aldersgate UMC in Redford Township and the Rev. Glenn E.L. Kjellberg of the First United Methodist Church of Garden City.

"It's been in the offing for several weeks," said Rev. Wager, "and our social action committee has been formulating plans. I'm sure we will want to plan some kind of program."

"What he is trying to do represents a definite need and we all should respond to it," Rev. Kjellberg stated. "I think we will in this church."

REV. CARGO noted that the United Methodist Church already is much involved in both long and short range projects to alleviate world hunger.

"The short-range activities involve getting food and grain to areas where there is starvation," he said, "but United Methodist missionaries also are helping people all over the world to learn to produce more food and cut down the birth rate."

One clergyman in the area sounded a note of caution, however.

"We should be sure," he said, "we're not just supplying more food

to keep people functioning and thus keeping up the trends to over-population," he stated.

"This problem is too complex to be solved by merely increasing the food supply."
