## Canton landfill controls to save environment

CANTON—The township board is making sure future landfills do not permanently transform areas of Canton into garbage dumps and jeopardize the health, safety and welfare of township residents.

Board members last week unanimously approved a landfill ordinance, designed to control the operation and location of disposal areas. The ordinance, drafted by engineers from

Wade, Trim and Associates, will go into effect 30 days after publication.

"This was desperately needed," said Supervisor Robert Greenstein. "This is probably the most all-encompassing landfill ordinance in existence today—at least in this area."

THE TOWNSHIP, Greenstein said, has had a moratorium on landfill application approvals pending the ap-

proval of the ordinance. A few landfills are already located in the township.

The measure is designed to ensure a future alternative use of a landfill area.

Under the ordinance, the disposal of human wastes, hazardous materials and dead animals is prohibited at a landfill area. Other refuse must be spread in a compacted, two-foot layer

and covered with at least six inches of an approved earth cover at the end of each working day.

Within one week after the refuse is deposited, the owner of the landfill must cover the disposal site with an additional two feet of earth and seed the area. Within a year, the owner must add four inches of topsoil and seed the area with hardy, perennial grass. The final cover must be main-

tained for at least two years.

The final elevation of the completed disposal area cannot exceed 10 feet of the original elevation.

THE ORDINANCE outlines a detailed procedure for landfill site approval. All future disposal areas must be established on minimum 80-acre sites in areas zoned for general industrial use.

Owners of proposed landfills must

submit a detailed preliminary application to the township board. If the application contains sufficient site plan information, the township board will submit the application to the planning commission, township engineer and township planner for their recommendations on approval.

Violation of the ordinance is a misdemeanor, punishable by a maximum \$500 fine, 30 days in jail or both.

## Thousands will gather for July Fourth Parade

PLYMOUTH—More than 15,000 area residents are expected to line the streets of downtown Plymouth Friday to watch the Fourth of July Parade and a brief ceremony in front of city hall for the city's sister city, Plymouth, England.

Robert Jarmol and Paul Campbell are co-chairmen for the parade sponsored annually by the Plymouth Jaycees.

MORE THAN 40 units have been lined up thus far for the parade which will begin at 12:30 p.m. at Union and Main Streets and proceed down Main to Middle School East.

The Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce will enter a float featuring a replica of the 1776 flag to commemorate the nation's upcoming bicentennial.

A group from Redford Township, tagged "The New Majority," will enter a float with a 14-foot statue of Uncle Sam seated behind a birthday cake. Its theme will be "America, you are getting older but you are getting better."

Musical groups in the parade will include the Centennial Educational Park Marching Band, a band from Windsor the Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps, Milford High School Band, Taylor High Band, and the Clan MacRae Band.

Grand marshal for this year's parade will be W.W. "Eddie" Edgar of the Observer & Eccentric. Edgar, author of The Stroller and the In the Pocket bowling column, has served as editor of the Plymouth Observer, is a long-time member of the Rotary Club of Plymouth, and has been inducted

into the Michigan Amateur Sports Hall of Fame, Detroit Bowling Congress Hall of Fame, and University of Michigan Media Hall of Fame.

THE PARADE will be interrupted for a short period of time for a special service at the stone in front of Plymouth City Hall.

Back in Plymouth, England, city officials on July 4 will hoist the American flag in recognition of America's anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. As a reciprocal gesture, a Union Jack flag will be raised along with Old Glory during the services Friday.

Edgar will present a talk on the tradition of Plymouth's sister city, British Consulate J.J. Hyslop will talk, and Plymouth Mayor Beverly McAninch will make a few remarks.

When the short ceremony ends, the parade will begin its procession down Main Street.

THE SISTER CITY tradition began in 1967—the year the City of Plymouth observed its 100th anniversary.

As part of that anniversary, the city sent invitations to some 17 cities in the U.S. which had the name Plymouth and to Plymouth, England, to join in the observance.

None of the 17 Plymouths in America showed up but a representative from Plymouth, England, did and brought with him a stone taken from the dock from which the Mayflower sailed from when the Pilgrims left for America.

Plymouth officials got word that the British city was interested in obtaining some Moraine locust trees and obtained some as a gift. The trees went back to England and were planted on the municipal lawn.

Another important event in the sister city tradition was when Plymouth, England, was observing the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower. A number of local delegates traveled to England to join the observance and present another tree.

The tradition will continue Friday and is certain to take on added significance when Plymouth and America celebrate its bicentennial next year. It is predictable both Plymouths will also be represented in the parade on July 4, 1976.

## Our House seeking volunteer counselors

PLYMOUTH—The volunteer staff of Our House Crisis Center in Plymouth would like you to make their house your house too.

Gearing up for the summer season when they expect more drug-related incidents to be reported, Our House is conducting training sessions beginning July 11 for volunteer counselors.

According to volunteer Barbara Woods, training sessions consist of 40 hours, including one weekend session on Friday night and most of Saturday.

"We're constantly in need of more volunteers," Mrs. Woods said. "Our volunteers come and go according to their own needs, so we have to be recruiting."

House are three social workers, two ministers, some with bachelor's degrees in psychology, registered nurses, a teacher, a seminarian, a businessman and two people under the direct supervision of a psychologist of the Huron Valley Transactional Analysis Institute.

"We also have some well-informed teens and young adults."

While a diploma is not a prerequisite for placement as a volunteer, passing a personal examination is.

## \$500 loan launches bicentennial

CANTON—A \$500 loan from township coffers may soon kick off Canton's bicentennial celebrations.

The township last week unanimously agreed to grant the request of Joseph DeLauro, chairman of the township's bicentennial commission, for the \$500 loan.

The money is needed to print bicentennial bumper stickers, planned to promote the township's bicentennial projects, and help finance construction of a booth at the upcoming Jaycee fair.

DeLauro said the bumper stickers will sell for \$1 each at the fair and other township events, and the proceeds will help repay the township's \$500 loan.

The bumper stickers will feature the township's bicentennial emblem—the white symbol of a tree with the word "Canton" written among its branches and the years "1776" and "1976" framing its trunk.

The bicentennial commission hopes to plant 1,776 trees in the township as part of the bicentennial celebration. Persons willing to donate trees, money or labor are asked to call township offices, 44508 Geddes.

The commission is also gathering data for a history of Canton.

## Miller staff prepped for year-round school

CANTON—While most principals in the Plymouth Community School District last week scurried pens over end-of-the-year paperwork, Shirley Spaniel busily combined two major administrative tasks—those needed to open and close Miller Elementary School.

A group of 230 students will return to Miller on July 14 to begin the pilot 45-15 program, while other schools in the district echo with the sounds of summer cleanup work. The remaining 570 children enrolled in the year-round program will return to school on Aug. 4, Aug. 25 or Sept. 15.

"I'M CLOSING" and opening school simultaneously," said Mrs. Spaniel, principal of Miller School, as she gazed at the reams of paperwork surrounding her desk. "We've had to close and get everything ready for the start of school at the same time."

For Mrs. Spaniel and other Miller office workers, the opening of school on July 14 will only mark the beginning of a continuous deluge of paperwork.

Starting Sept. 15 when students enrolled on Track A take their first three-week vacation, three tracks of students will continually pack the school. The 45-15 program, under which four tracks or groups of students will attend school for nine weeks and remain home for three, will allow Miller to house 25 per cent more children than under the traditional school calendar year.

FOR MILLER'S administration, that means more work.

"From a management point of view, it's going to be a tremendous task," said Mrs. Spaniel. "There's going to be so many teachers and chil-

dren coming and going. It's going to be like running four schools at once.

"A lot of the research on 45-15 says the biggest headache is for the principal."

To keep tabs of students, the administration must replace its one record attendance book with four. Testing of students, which traditionally takes place during the first week of classes each fall, must now take place four times.

Student evaluations must take place 16 times a year, and the school must sponsor eight teacher inservice days instead of two. Four open houses, sponsored by the school's PTO, must be held to accommodate students on all four tracks.

A new group of teachers and students will enter the school every three weeks. That means an almost continual influx of kindergarten students during the first portion of the year, and an exodus of fifth graders during the latter. Because of the tight schedule, teachers must use weekend days

to pack their belongings at the beginning and end of each nine-week session.

"DESPITE ALL THIS, the staff is very enthusiastic," Mrs. Spaniel said. "They're excited to try it."

The teachers feel they'll have a chance to review kids every nine weeks. A three-week period will give them a chance to catch their breaths.

Numerous parents in the Miller School attendance area have voiced loud criticisms of the 45-15 plan. But, according to Mrs. Spaniel, fewer parents are now objecting than a few months ago.

More than 60 parents had originally decided to pull their children from the 45-15 program and bus them to Allen, East or Fiegel elementary schools. That number has dwindled to about 50. "I think the administration has tried, very hard to accommodate the needs of people."

Teachers, she explained, were al-

# SC approves lease of GC school

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees Wednesday voted 7-0 to approve a five-year lease with the Garden City School District for use of Harrison Elementary School beginning on a limited basis in September. The board also accepted plans for a park-

ing lot at the site, which will cost \$73,000.

The lease for Harrison begins July 1, 1976, with a provision to rent eight rooms from Sept. 1, 1975 through June 30, 1976, at \$100 per-room per-month.

During the 1975-76 school year, Schoolcraft will continue to operate the Garden City Instructional Center (Florence School) under the terms of that lease.

The Florence school lease will be extended for one month at \$975 to accommodate moving to a new site in 1976.

Schoolcraft will lease only Harrison School according to the agreement at an escalating annual payment of \$16,000 for the first year and increasing \$1,000 annually for the next five years.

"That's about \$1 per square foot per year," explained Kenneth Lindner, vice president for administrative affairs. "The school district had originally asked for a \$20,000 annual payment, but we pointed out that the college is making a capital improvement."

Under the terms of the lease, Schoolcraft has the right to sublet for educational purposes and can make any necessary structural alterations with the approval of the Garden City School Board. The board accepted the lease at its June 23 regular meeting.

Trustees also approved the parking lot, contingent on a letter from the engineering firm (Hoyem & Associates) stating there wouldn't be any problems with surface drainage on the lot.

The project was initially estimated at \$60,000, but additional asphalt, stripping and improved drainage materials increased the price tag by \$13,000.

Trustee Arch Vallier questioned whether the engineer's recommenda-

tion to use corrugated steel pipe would sufficiently handle drainage in the area.

"I'm sick and tired of fighting engineers that don't understand the drainage problem," said Vallier. "Without proper drainage the lot is a waste of taxpayers' money."

Vallier's charges persuaded the board to add a contingency clause to its approval.

In other action the board:

- Approved phase one of a \$133,000 campus drainage correction and restoration plan. Architects for the project are Ralls-Hammill-Becker-Carne Inc., of Livonia. Plans are to replace the concrete portion of the college's central mall, between the administration building, library and Waterman campus center with sidewalks and a grassy area. Access ramps for handicapped persons also are slated.

- Lindner said the college has applied for a \$24,000 state grant to help finance the cost of ramps.

- Voted to renew Schoolcraft membership in the Association of Community College Trustees and pay annual dues of \$625.

- Voted to approve a concurring resolution with Wayne State University, in which the two schools will cooperate in providing postsecondary education to persons in the Schoolcraft district. The one-year agreement may be renewed every year for five years.

- Accepted a \$109,400 grant from the National Science Foundation for "Development of a Two-Year Petroleum Technology Program." John Bedford, Schoolcraft geology instructor, has been designated as project director. Under the grant, Schoolcraft will provide \$3,000 for equipment the second year of the program.

- Appointed Ronald Griffith as dean of community services. Griffith pre-

viously was director of community services until the board voted to upgrade that position.

• Appointed Trustee Rosina Raymond as chairperson for the July 7 organizational meeting. Outgoing chairman John LaRue plans to move to Washington later this summer. The board presented LaRue with the gavel he used during his two-year term as chairman.

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## County urges Ford's approval of crime bill

WAYNE COUNTY—The Detroit-Wayne County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council unanimously adopted a resolution, sponsored by Commissioner Mary E. Dumas (R-Livonia), urging President Ford to approve a congressional appropriation of \$25 million for combatting juvenile delinquency.

The May 22 resolution urges the President to sign a supplemental appropriation bill which includes an outlay for funding the Juvenile Delinquency Act of 1974.

"We believe the funding and implementation of the act will provide the means to prevent and control juvenile crime and delinquency," the resolution declares.

In citing the need for the program, the resolution notes that juveniles under age 17 account for approximately 22 per cent of all arrests for serious crimes including murder, rape, burglary, larceny, felonious assault and auto theft.

The resolution points out that the current high unemployment rate has increased the incidence of crime in Detroit and Wayne County.

## 1st woman is elected to AIN president spot

The first woman elected president of the Association of Interpretive Naturalists is the supervising naturalist at Kensington Metropark near Milford.

Patricia Eising was elected president at the AIN annual meeting held recently in Natural Bridge, Va. AIN is an international organization with more than 1,000 members.

Miss Eising has been with the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority since 1965.

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# W-W trustee blasts away for farewell

WESTLAND—Anne Harbison, defeated Wayne-Westland School Board trustee, has lashed out at colleague Robert Reichard for taking a woman companion along with him to school board conferences.

Mrs. Harbison, who was defeated in the June 9 election, made her statement at last week's school board meeting which was her last. Agnes Greene, Reichard's running mate, will become a board member in July.

Reichard, who is separated from his wife, admitted to taking a woman along with him to four conferences, but protested Mrs. Harbison's statement, saying his personal life wasn't anybody's business.

"When the school district starts paying my companion's way to conferences, then you can tell me who to take. Until that time it is my business," said Reichard.

PRESENTLY, only board members' expenses are paid by the school district when they attend conferences. Persons accompanying trustees must pay their own way, according to district administrators.

Mrs. Harbison said Reichard's action of being accompanied by a woman to which he is unmarried was inappropriate for a board member. "Integrity is still a word in the dictionary," she said.

Reichard said he was proud to accept the blame for Mrs. Harbison's defeat, saying a new board trustee was needed. He also defended his relationship with his lady friend.

"When I left my wife, I made no bones about it. As far as making an account for the trips, why didn't you bring that out when you were a board member?" Reichard queried Mrs. Harbison.

He accused Mrs. Harbison of contacting his wife and attempting to get her involved in the campaign against him. His wife refused to become involved, he said. He also accused Mrs. Harbison of trying to get school administrators involved in this issue. They, too, refused, he said.

"I cannot sit back and be made to look like a bad guy," he said.

Mrs. Harbison vowed that she would make a comeback. She has served one term as a trustee.

"I'm not going to fade away. I still care for kids. I thank the community

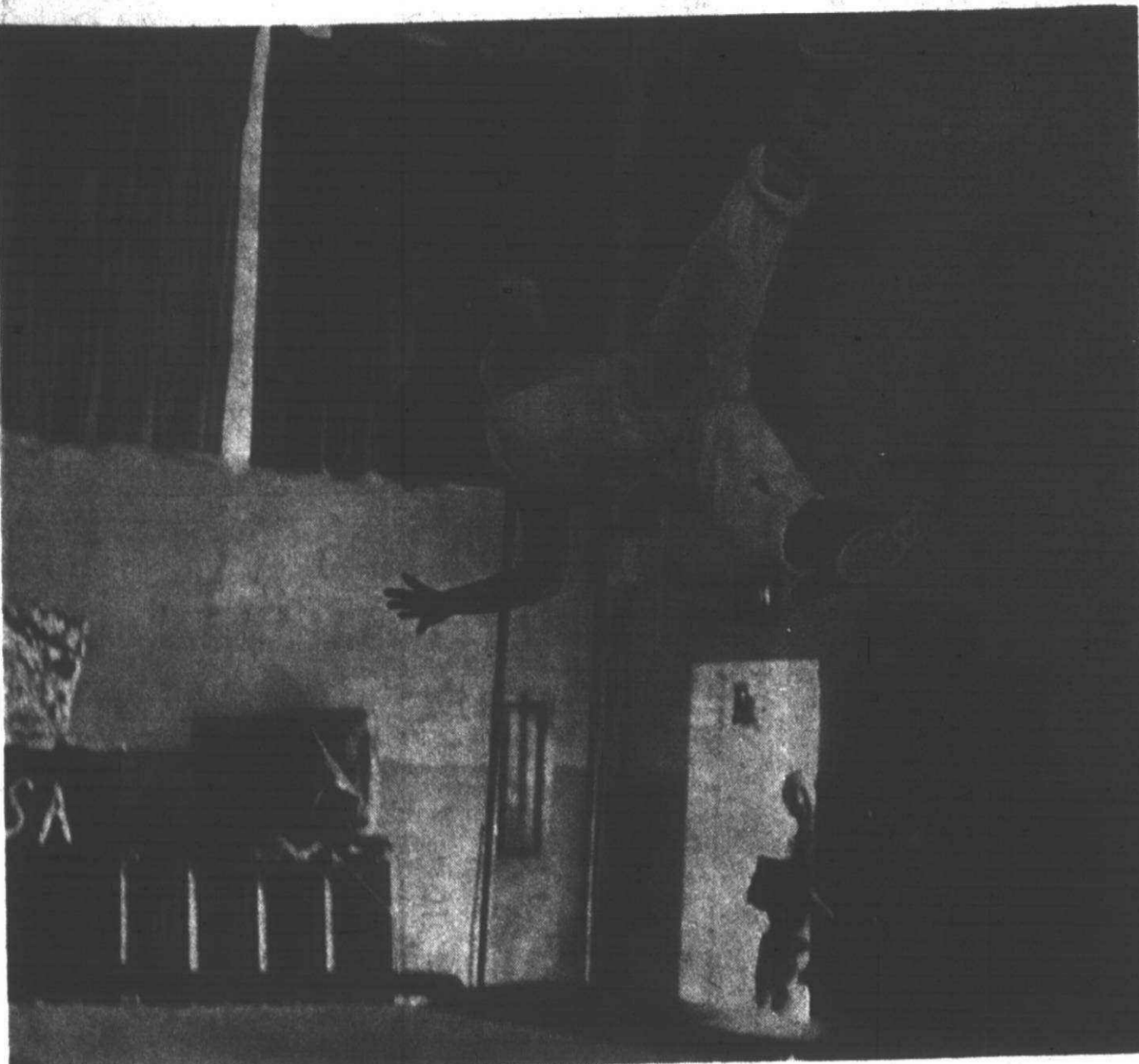
for allowing me to serve," she said. She defended her action in walking out of negotiations during the teachers' strike last year, an action for which she was criticized during the recent campaign.

"I left the negotiations because there was only one issue left: Would we pay the teachers to strike? I left after I registered a negative vote," she said.

REICHARD blasted Mrs. Harbison on that count also, saying her action could have caused an incident which "made Crestwood look like a sand-box."

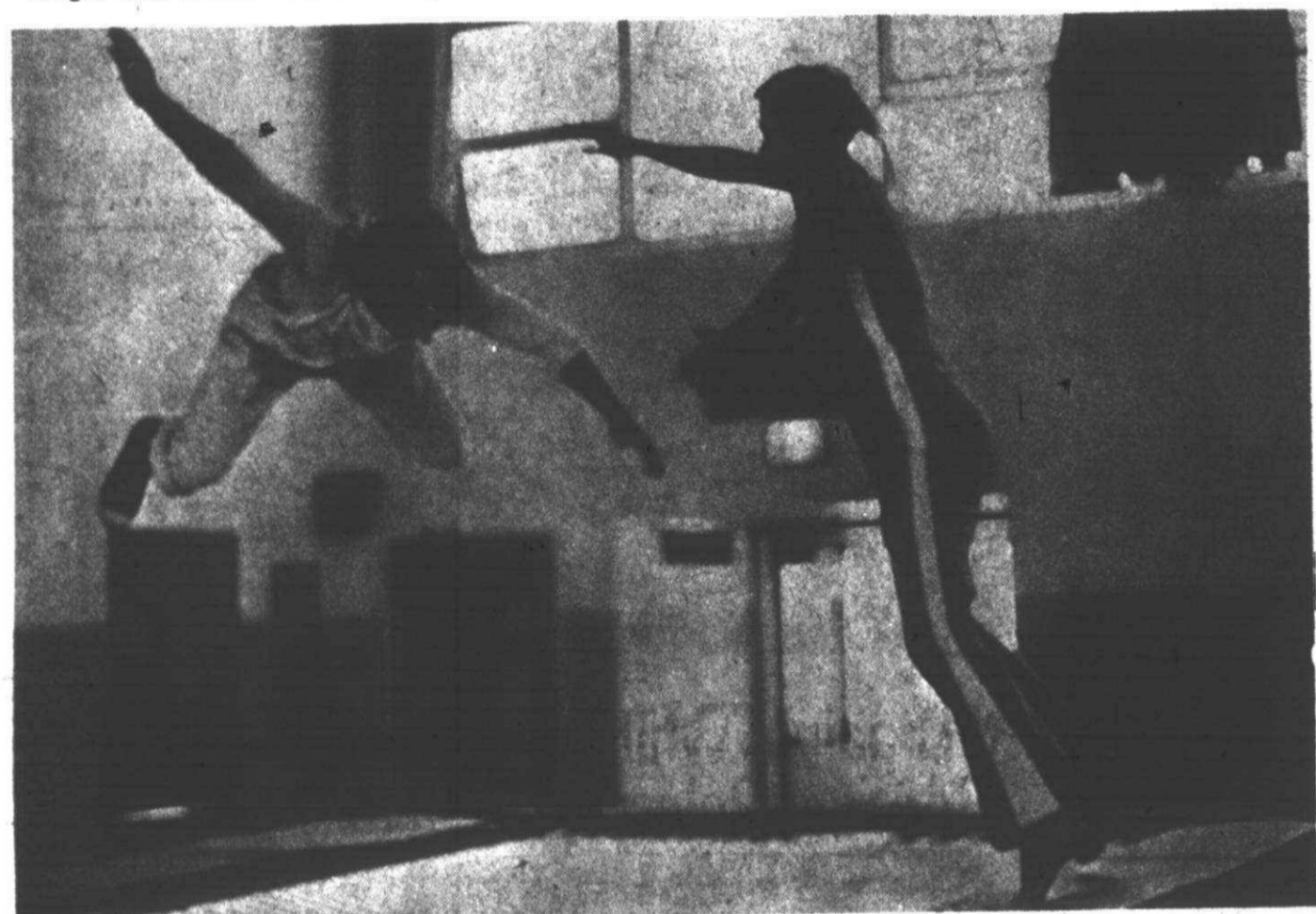
Concerning school board conferences, Mrs. Harbison recommended that a policy be adopted limiting board members' attendance to two conferences a year. She also recommended that board members file a report on what was learned at conferences. These reports, she said, should be read in public.

She defended the accountability survey of her performance sent out before the election, saying she was attempting to set precedent for board members to be rated by the community.

# School-within-school concept is expanded

PLYMOUTH—The name "West Middle Schools" may aptly describe the building at Ann Arbor Trail and Sheldon come next fall.

While the majority of West students sit in more traditional classrooms, a group of 150 sixth, seventh and eighth graders will study in their own wing of the school, under the instruction of a five-teacher team.

WEST'S SCHOOL within-a-school concept, used to some degree at other elementary schools throughout the Plymouth Community School District, is a first for middle schools in the district, according to Jim Leary, assistant superintendent for instruction.

According to the teachers who will

teach West's "second school," the program stresses individuality, creative thinking, self-direction and the needs of each student.

"I'd want my child to be in this program, where he has more room to grow and be creative," said teacher Linda Gratsch. "He has five adult models to emulate and different aged kids to relate to."

The program, taught by Mrs. Gratsch, Dolly McMaster, Jim Szczepkowski and Tom Williams, is open to 60 sixth graders, 60 seventh graders and 30 eighth graders.

In each learning unit, students will be assigned work that teachers think is essential. Students will work at their own individual pace and attend "interest seminars," taught by any of the five teachers, to complete the learning unit.

"In this program, the child has a chance to say, 'I already know this. Can't I do something else?'" explained Mrs. McMaster. "We want kids to develop their own interests, but many times they don't know what they want, so we have to push them a little."

THE STRUCTURE of the program will become looser as time goes on and students become more accustomed to the individual pace, explain the teachers. More seminars and options will be offered toward the end of the year.

The students and their five teachers will occupy a five-classroom wing of West to separate them from the rest of the school. Each teacher will keep records of the educational needs and achievements of 30 students.

The students will mingle among pupils from other grades. An eighth grader may tutor a younger student in a specific subject.

"The tutoring would reinforce a skill that an eighth grader has," said Mrs. McMaster. "A teacher who prepares something to teach really becomes a master of that subject. Tutoring would make a student feel real worth. By being tutored, a sixth grader would have a good model to emulate."

Mrs. McMaster and the other teach-

ers hope to continue the program for at least three years. Next year's sixth graders could remain with the same teachers through ninth grade.

INVOLVEMENT IN THE program is strictly voluntary, the teachers stress.

The school's administration has sent parents information about the program. Parents may learn more on July 22 when the school sponsors a meeting between West parents and teachers.

"We're inviting anyone into this program who wants to get into it," said Szczepkowski.

lowed to select the tracks they wanted to teach, and all requests were granted. Students were placed on tracks according to the neighborhoods in which they live, but parental requests for different tracks than those assigned were granted.

Parents must provide transportation for children enrolled in the recreational program, Mrs. Spaniel said. The cost of the program will be "minimal."

"I'M SURE there are a number of people who are still very skeptical," said Miller's principal. "But once they see the nice recreational schedule—which isn't provided to children in other schools—maybe they'll be more accepting."

"I honestly believe the program will be very successful. It probably will be an inconvenience for some families, and I honestly feel for parents who have children on different schedules. But then I've heard some moms say it would be nice not to have the all the kids home at the same time."

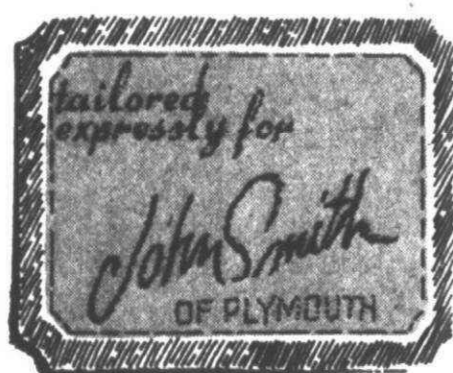



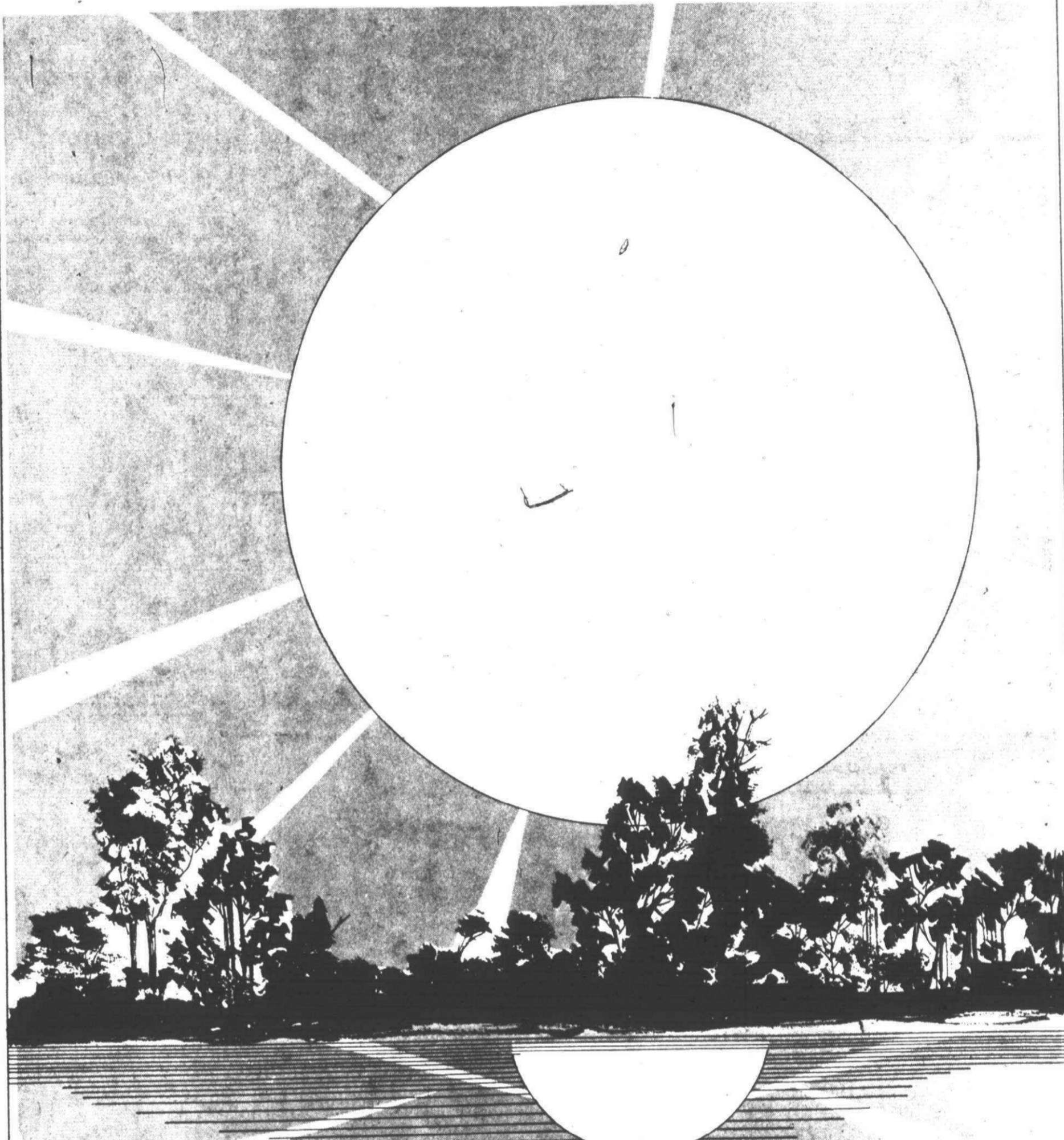

## Hilton requests more parking

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Patrons of the Plymouth Hilton Inn, tentatively scheduled for an early fall opening, may have plenty of spaces in which to park come grand opening day.

The township planning commission last week agreed to recommend the rezoning of a parcel across from the hotel from residential to vehicular parking. The rezoning depends on whether Deane Baker, owner of the hotel and parcel, reaches a satisfactory agreement with adjacent homeowners on Hamill.

Doris Ritchie, planning commission secretary, said residents at last week's public hearing did not object to the proposed rezoning but asked that a wall be built to screen their property from the parking lot.

## Goulet wins planning post

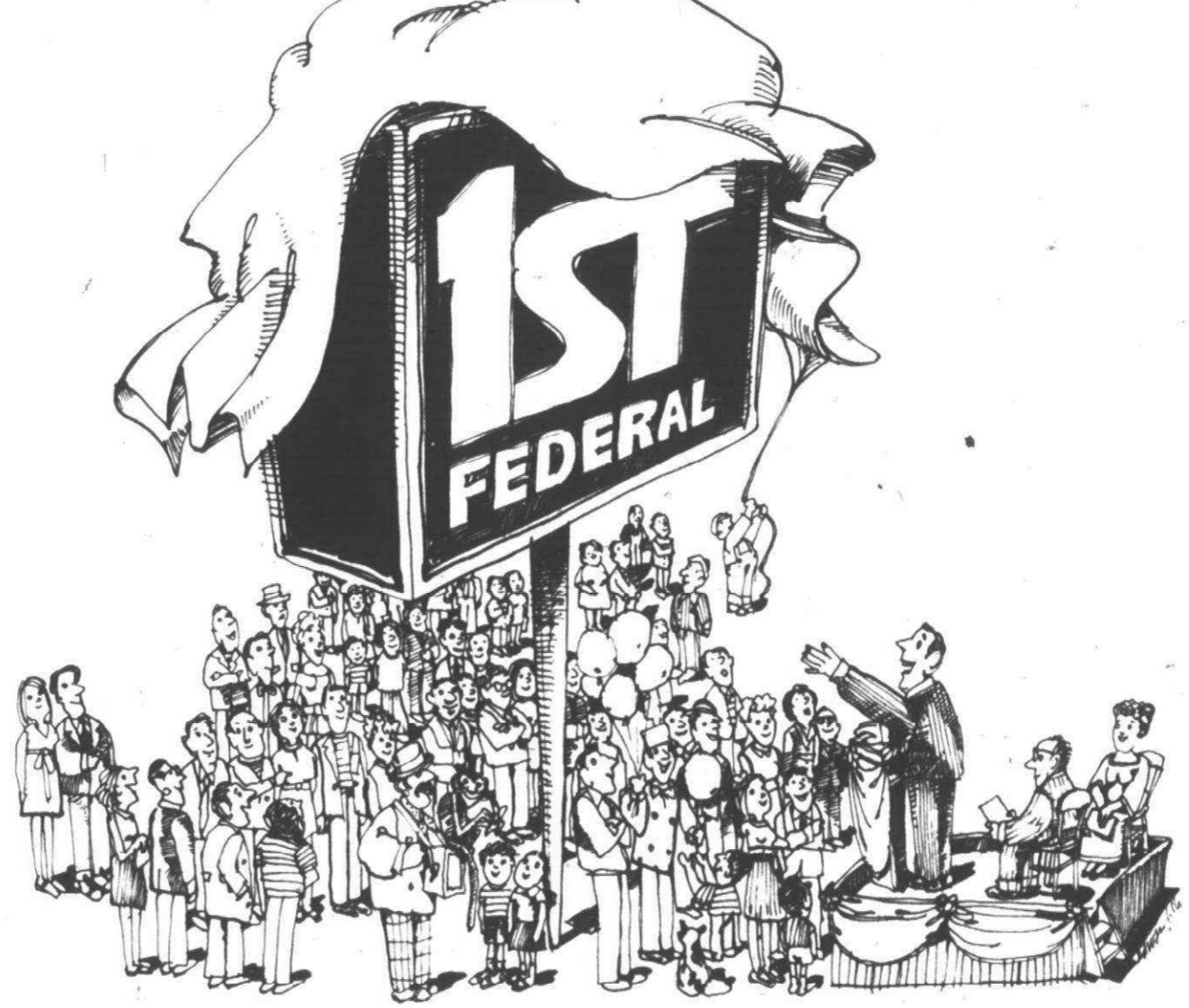
PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Planning commission member John Goulet last week was elected to fill the position of vice-chairman.

## There's no excuse for board rudeness

The Plymouth Board of Education is generally quite open, as school boards go, in its deliberations and dissemination to the public. But the board fell flat on its face at its last meeting.

The meeting was delayed a few minutes while trustees met in a secret meeting from which the public was barred to discuss "personnel matters." But the delay wasn't too long, and the meeting began, and continued, and continued, and continued — and was continuing until 11:50 p.m. when the board president called for an "executive" session.

Those in attendance for 3½ hours had to wait 10 minutes for the board while it interrupted its "public" meeting to conduct a second secret session in one night — this time to discuss "procedural questions related to personnel matters."

THERE IS honest disagreement about what items legislators have a right to discuss in secret and what business must or should be conducted in the open.

School board members, city commissioners and township trustees will usually list a half-dozen items rightfully discussed in secret meetings — "personnel" matters, site acquisition, labor negotiations.

The last week in June, a bill was introduced in the Michigan Legislature which would prohibit all state or local government units from holding any meetings in secret.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Perry Bullard (D-Ann Arbor), is co-sponsored by more than 40 other state representatives from both parties, an indication that there are at least 41 non-journalists who feel public business is best conducted before the public.

Bullard's bill is based on Florida's "Sunshine Act" which requires open meetings without exception. New Mexico has also passed similar legislation during its last session. The subject has been kicked around in Lansing for the past few years and someday a bill will pass.

UNTIL THEN, the Plymouth Board of Education has some legal latitude to conduct public business in secret meetings.

But members should not grant themselves the latitude of interrupting a public meeting to hold a secret session. To stop a meeting, and reassemble behind closed doors, is just plain rude. Good manners dictate that this not be done.

Because it was done, members of the audience not only had to wait until midnight for the meeting to reconvene again but never knew the problem.

Was the secret meeting called because the board was concerned about one or more of the teachers on the list to be approved for hiring? Was the board unhappy because of nepotism, administrative politics, or sloppy screening of applicants? Or was the board meddling in administrative business?

Maybe none of these questions has relevance, but we will never know because the only reason given for recessing the meeting was "to discuss personnel matters."

Whatever the reason, it is hoped the school board in the future will exhibit enough empathy towards the audience — and concern for residents — that it will refrain from recessing a public meeting for secret talks.

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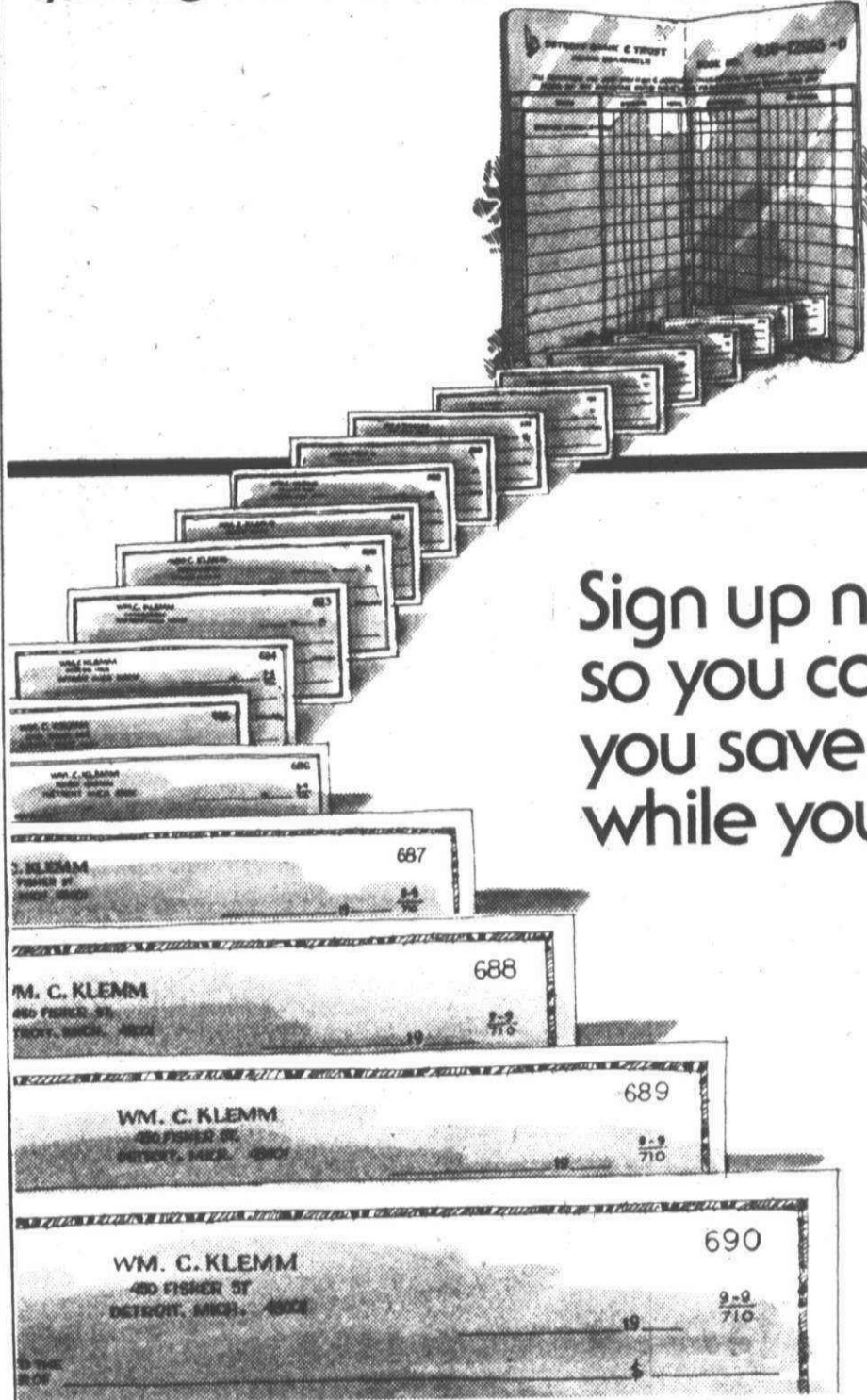

# Company president is a good scout

When Michele Austin of Livonia learned that her Girl Scout troop was in desperate need of a leader, she went to her father for help, asking him to take the job.

Busy as president of Contamination Control Laboratories, Inc. of Livonia, Dr. Philip Austin nonetheless said, "Why not?" After all he had been in Boy Scouts for years.

"I didn't want to see the girls not

get any scouting," said Dr. Austin. "So we combined two troops into Troop 191 and began to meet in John F. Kennedy School. I had two helpful co-leaders, Mrs. Mary Romig, and when she left, Mrs. Judy Gabel."

Dr. Austin found he enjoyed the experience. "The girls were loyal and happy. It didn't make a difference to them who was their leader."

ONLY ONE PROBLEM arose because their chief was a man.

"We couldn't go camping because I'm not a female," he said. "The rules are that there be no male personnel at the three area Girl Scout campsites."

"It was a most unusual situation. We went instead on daytime camping trips to Kensington Park where we hiked. But it was sad because camping is what the girls look forward to all year."

Dr. Austin wasted little time regretting the problem, however. He did his

best to make up for it by teaching the girls crafts he had learned in the Boy Scouts.

"I taught them how to improvise utensils and cooking apparatus out of coat hangers and natural materials," he pointed out. "Instead of relying only on a fire to make bread, we used heated rocks and a special type of solar oven using aluminum foil."

DR. AUSTIN ALSO added a new wrinkle to the traditional bike safety program.

"We got down and inspected the bike to see how it functions," he said. "Some brought wrenches and other tools and all of a sudden, found they could handle tools. My daughter is out now taking a wheel off."

Troop 191 also had a discussion of astronomy led by an expert who had earned his Ph.D. in astronautics and aeronautics. Their leader's firm sterilized items that were placed on the moon by the astronauts, and a subsidi-

ary of his company, Space Colonization Inc., is now involved in a 30-year project utilizing space technology to place a physical colony on the moon some day.

Dr. Austin does not, however, look to fathers as a solution to leader shortage in the Girl Scouts.

"I tried it once and I did it," he observed. "But I think it is better for the Girl Scouts to be led by a mother. She knows better the wishes of the girls."

# U-M Dearborn pledges ongoing affirmative action

Affirmative action—the effort to include qualified minorities and women candidates for all appointments—continues to be the byword on the campus of the University of Michigan-Dearborn despite budgetary limitations.

Dr. Eugene Arden, provost and dean of academic affairs, made that clear in a recent memorandum to deans, department chairmen and faculty search committees.

A continued search for representatives of all sections of society is required by law, he said, and added that

he considers it particularly necessary for a school such as UM-D seeking "an urban orientation."

"We should be particularly eager to appoint faculty and staff people who are of diverse backgrounds and orientations if we are to justifiably call ourselves an urban campus."

ARDEN POINTED OUT that "universities, including our own, have traditionally sought persons with earned credentials and demonstrable abilities."

"There is no reason why this should

change. It is not necessary for the campus to hire unqualified persons to demonstrate a commitment to affirmative action."

However, he said, new methods for recruiting faculty and staff now are eliminating overt discrimination against qualified minorities and women.

"Gone are the days when the 'old school tie' determined who gets the new appointments," his memorandum went on. "Now it is mandatory that all positions be posted within the university, that announcements be placed in national and professional journals and that efforts are made to contact women and minorities through special publications."

ARDEN CALLED attention to a recent policy statement by Peter E. Holmes, director of the office of civil rights of the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare (HEW).

This statement said affirmative action programs "do not require that

job requirements be waived or lowered in order to attract women or minority candidates, and that once valid job requirements are established, they must be applied equally to all candidates."

Figures compiled by the university

affirmative action office show the percentage of faculty women at UM-Dearborn increased from 15.6 per cent of the total faculty for the academic year 1972-73 to 20 per cent for 1973-74.

During the same period, the num-

ber of women on the professional administrative staff went up from 36.2 per cent to 37.5 per cent. Minority members comprised 7.5 per cent of the faculty for 1973-74 and six per cent of the professional and administrative staff.

# Youth marks All-Area girl's track team

"Youth now flees on feathered foot."

Robert Louis Stevenson wasn't really describing the 1975 Observer & Eccentric All-Area girls track team when he said that, but the theme is applicable to this year's squad.

Two freshmen, two sophomores, four juniors and only one senior make up the individual event team, which is as young, and as fleet, as any in memory.

The team includes such speedsters as Karen McDougal of Westland John Glenn and Lisa Bowman of Livonia Bentley. Middle distance runners are Salem all-around standout Jackie Croci in the 440 and Pam Beernink of Livonia Bentley in the 880.

First-team distance runners are freshman Sue Jarvis of Livonia Ladywood in the mile and Diane Lozon of Redford Union in the two mile.

Ann Cwik, another freshman with a

tremendous potential, took first-team berths in both the hurdles and the long jump, while Carolyn Booth of Stevenson and Kyle Gray of Livonia Churchill round out the field events with first-team postings in the high jump and shot put, respectively.

First-team relay teams were Bishop Borgess (mile), Livonia Stevenson (440) and Plymouth Salem (880).

McDougal took four firsts in every dual meet but one for the Rockets and had an area best time of 11.5 seconds in the 100 yard dash. Only a junior, she probably will specialize in the 440 yard event next season.

**BENTLEY'S BOWMAN**, one of two Bulldogs on the squad, ran in relay events as well as her specialty, the 220 yard dash for Bentley. Her top area time in the event was 26.1.

Salem's Jackie Croci, the only senior on this year's team, took third

place in the 440 yard dash in this year's Class A final meet after placing second in the meet last year. With a 57.9 top clocking, she was undefeated at that distance in dual meet competition. She holds the school record for 440 yards.

Pam Beernink rounds out Bentley's

contribution to the team. The fleet junior ran at several distances this year but was at home at 880 yards. She was the area best at that distance by nearly five seconds, with a top time of 2:21.2.

Sue Jarvis was a super runner for Ladywood this year who will keep getting better as her high school career blooms. Only a freshman, she was nearly unbeatable in the mile run this year, where she posted an area best of 5:27.7.

Redford Union's Diane Lozon was unbeaten in 10 meets at two miles. She finished 13th in the state and led

the Panthers to a perfect dual meet record. She ran her best time at the distance in RU's final dual meet against Southfield-Lathrup, with a 12:52.4 clocking.

Cwik has all the credentials to be a state champion as early as next year. In the course of the next three years, it is virtually assured that she can be among the state's best in several events. Although the freshman had never run competitively before this year, she took sixth in the state in the long jump, fifth in the hurdles and anchored the Spartan mile relay team to a fifth-place finish.

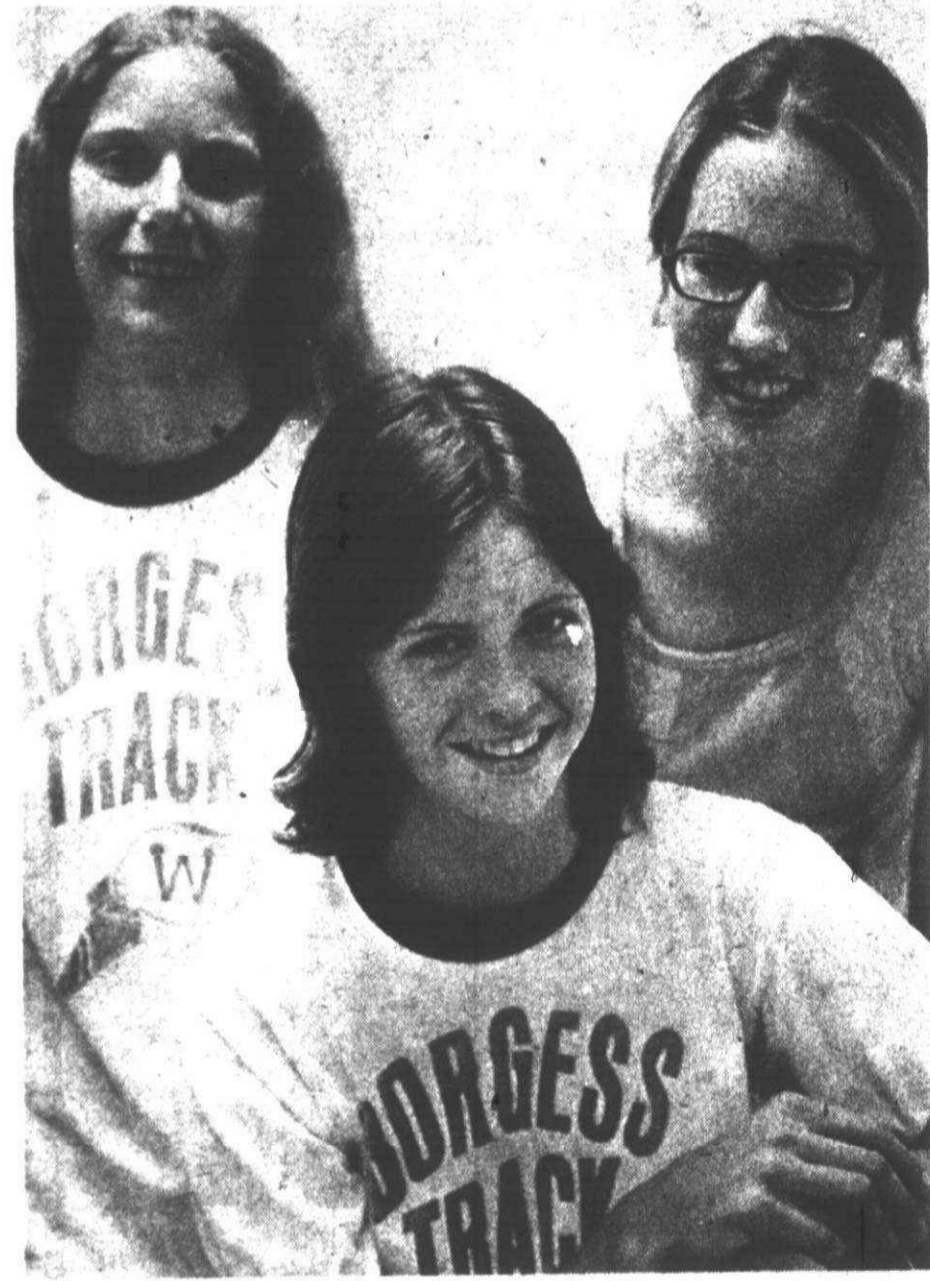
Her area's best were 17.3 in the long jump and 15.3 in the hurdles.

Carolyn Booth took area honors in the high jump with a top jump of 5-1. Her teammate at Livonia Stevenson had a dual meet area high of 5-2, but Booth's superior performance in the state meet gives her the edge.

Sophomore Kyle Gray of Livonia Churchill will be shooting at the 40-foot mark next year in the shot put. She posted an 8-1 dual meet record this season and set league and regional marks. Her best put this year was 37-11.

### HAVE A SAFE SUMMER!!!

DROWNING accidents are the fourth leading cause of accidental death in the United States. Swimming, sailing, canoeing, and other water activities are great fun, but it's a fact that most water-related accidents occur during recreational pastimes. Here's some tips, for safety's sake!

#### SWIMMING SAFETY

- (1) Be extra careful in unfamiliar swimming areas, since they may have strong currents, deep holes, debris, and other hazards. Beware of diving into strange waters.
- (2) Never leave a small child alone near water, even for a few seconds. Teach children to swim at an early age.
- (3) Swimming alone is dangerous; someone should be available in case of an emergency. Learning artificial respiration, first aid and basic rescues is worth the effort.
- (4) Do not swim right after eating, or when overheated or overtired.
- (5) Pushing, ducking or holding someone's head under water should be avoided.
- (6) Do not let children use tires or inflated toys to float in deep water. Approved life saving devices should be worn by young non-swimmers when near water.

#### BOATING SAFETY

- (1) Learn the nautical rules of the road. Be courteous and remember your wake can hurt others.
- (2) Keep a Coast Guard approved personal flotation device for each person on board your boat. In small boats, children and weak swimmers should wear the flotation device at all times.
- (3) Don't overload your boat. Follow the boats capacity rating. If you are using an outboard motor, match the motor to the boat.
- (4) If your small boat or canoe upsets, it usually floats. Hold on to it for support. And, whenever you are boating leave word with someone on your destination and when you will return.
