Sewer fees to be paid under protest

The books of the Detroit Metropolitan Water Department (DMWD) may be opened to the public if some members of the Wayne County Board of Public Works have their way.

Public Works Commissioners Freddie C. Burton and Michael Berry last week indicated they want the books opened to audit, and that they may express their displeasure with the 50 per cent hike in sewer rates in western Wayne County by paying the fees under protest when they become effective Sept. 1.

The rate will jump from the current \$94.18 per one million gallons of waste treatment up to \$140.96.

THE WAYNE County Board of Public Works is the supervising agency for the Rouge Valley Sewer District, comprised of 14 communities in Wayne County including Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Redford Township.

The board had agreed at a June 6

meeting with the proposed rate hike, but at a public hearing last week the board reversed its position.

The hearing was attended by a small number of suburban representatives, including Canton Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein, who urged the board to change its position.

"I WAS ABLE to get personal assurances from Mr. Burton and Mr. Berry that they would oppose the rate hike because Detroit has not submitted to

questions on the necessity of such a large hike," Greenstein said.

The supervisor said the action by the public works board would help bring about an outside audit of DMWD books, something he said was necessary to prove the need for the rate hike.

Greenstein said the rules under which DMWD operates allow the charges to suburban customers to cover "reasonable costs of maintenance and treatment."

He argues provisions for a return on

capital investment, a depreciation reserve, and proposed repairs and replacements within Detroit's system did not appear, to him, to be "reasonable."

ACCORDING TO acting DMWD Director Ernest Cedroni, the costs are allowed under the water department's charter.

"I felt I explained the rate increase as well as I can in hearings in Oakland and Macomb counties, and in a meeting with the public works board in June.

"We are faced with problems of inflation and additional requirements to meet EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) standards," Cedroni said.

The charges for the capital improvement fund were a necessary requirement of the bonding by which the water department funds improvements to the system, he added. "They're part of the bond act and ordinances, and we'd be in violation of the

law if we didn't place the funds into that account."

Cedroni explained that excess funds from capital improvement revenues, must be held in the depreciation reserve until they are needed.

Detroit City Council was scheduled to hold a public hearing on the sewer rate increase earlier today (Aug. 4), and its approval or rejection of the increase will be the final word on the matter, barring any decisions by the courts.

Attempts by Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn to block the increase with a court injunction have failed.

However, the courts have not made a decision on whether to hear arguments on why the DMWD should open their books to public scrutiny.

Cedroni said he doesn't think the issue will be heard by the courts. "The Michigan Supreme Court has heard this all before in 1949 and ruled that we were legitimate."

Water weaponry used in dispute?

Is the Detroit Metropolitan Water Department using water as a political weapon to pressure suburban members of its board to approve a capital improvements budget?

Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia, the western Wayne County representative on the board, thinks there is a possibility of that happening and wants other suburban officials to discuss it.

He has called a meeting scheduled to be held today (Monday) to discuss the problem of low water pressures and other water department problems.

INVITED were 30 cities and townships which get their water from Detroit. Area communities expected to send representatives are Westland, Garden City, Redford Township, Farmington, Farmington Hills, City of Plymouth and the townships of Plymouth and Canton.

McNamara said that while Livonia hasn't had any water pressure problems recently, its neighboring cities and townships have.

Westland reported its pressure dropped to as low as five pounds per square inch—with a normal pressure being 40 to 60 pounds.

McNamara indicated that the water department administration may have intentionally reduced the water pressure to force the board, which has four Detroiters and three suburban members, to approve the capital improvements budget.

He said the approval has been delayed because the suburban board members feel that the budget is too high and that too much of the subu-

nan water revenues are being used to finance system improvements which would benefit only Detroit.

McNamara admitted that "I'm suspicious as hell about being brought to our knees."

Officials at today's meeting will discuss the continuing problem of failure to get an independent audit of the department's books and review the existing rate structure, which McNamara feels has the suburbs supporting Detroit.

He added that although the City of Detroit doesn't own its own sanitary sewer system—it was sold during the 1960s to the water department—the water budgets are based partially on covering Detroit's investment in the sewer system.

THE MAYOR said that he will suggest today that a "war chest" or funds be donated by the 96 water department customers to retain a law firm to represent them.

McNamara said some issues the law firm would probably look into would be the ownership of the water and sewer departments, the auditing of books and the "equity in disbursements in spending dollars."

He added that the department's expansion program, which has new water mains installed in outlying and undeveloped areas, results in the existing water customers "financing our own demise."

McNamara said that new mains lead to new developments and help existing residents move farther out.

The suburbs now paying into the system are financing the bond issues that pay for those water main expansions, he said.

Schools save on tax note

The Plymouth Schools will be spending less this year when borrowing \$5.6 million to pay the bills until taxes are collected in December.

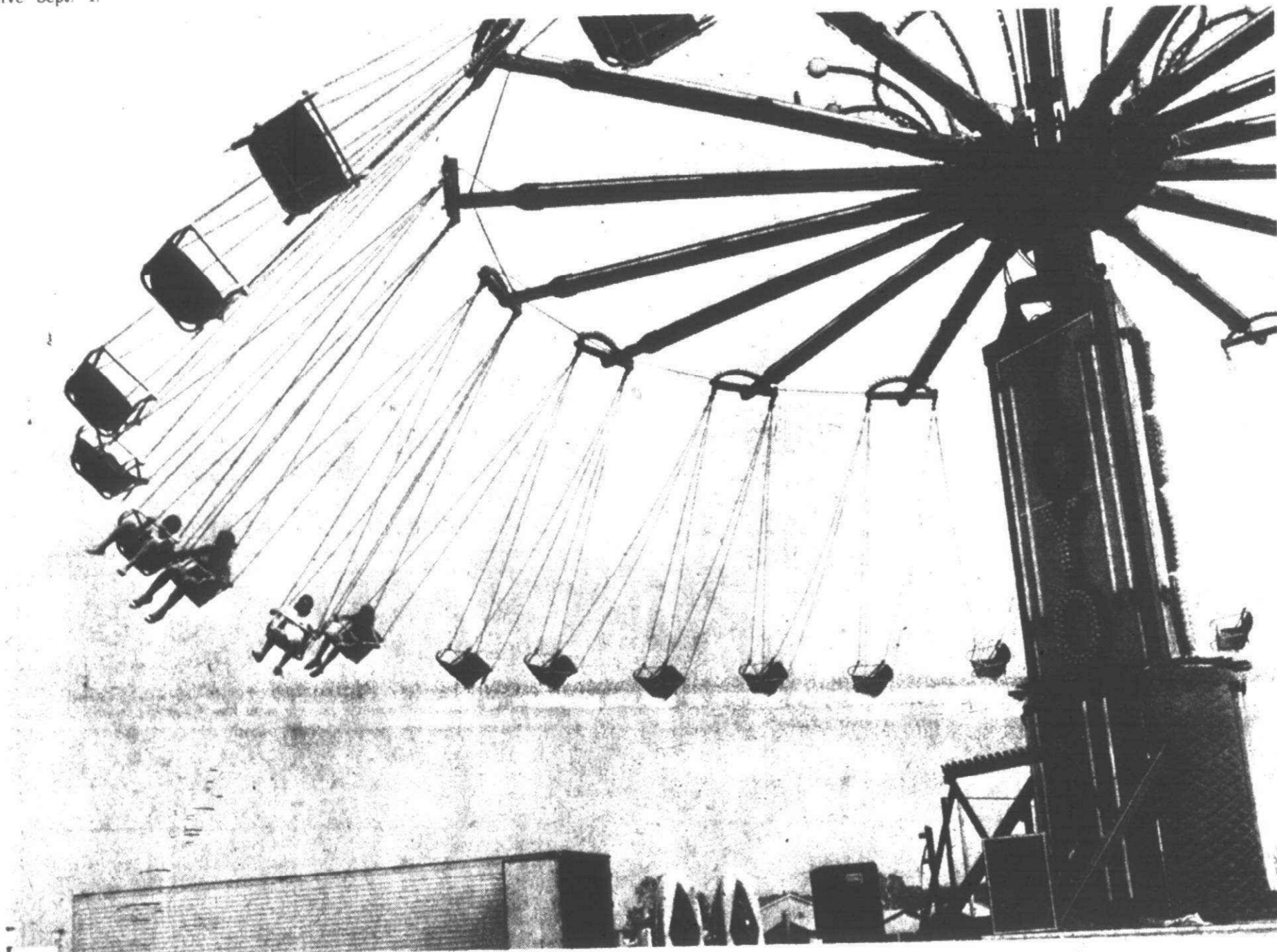
School board members approved a bid of 4.29 per cent interest on the note offered by National Bank of Detroit. This year's loan will cost the district \$162,161, a substantial savings over last year's 6.64 per cent loan.

While the cost of borrowing the money over the next six months has been reduced over last year's figures,

business manager Ray Hoedel explained the board would be receiving less interest income on its short-term investments while it is holding on to the money.

The loan is necessitated by the need for operating funds until taxes are paid in the middle of the school year.

Hoedel said he has discussed the loan rate with several bankers who remarked the interest rate is one of the lowest they have seen this year.

New Canton citizen group seeks strength in unity

A new citizen group in Canton Township is trying to add punch to democracy and unify efforts of government and the people.

"Everyone is struggling," said Bruce Young, organizer of Total Citizens' Power of Canton Township. "but no one is struggling together. What power does a citizen have? He doesn't have much as an individual, but he certainly does tied together."

Young expects membership of the new group to reach 200 to 500 persons. About 17 persons committed themselves to membership at the group's first meeting, held a few weeks ago. Since that time, about 100 persons have contacted Young about the new group.

Total Citizens' Power has tentatively scheduled its next meeting for Aug. 13 at Plymouth Canton High School. A special committee, headed by Canton resident Betty Hamann, is expected to present a proposed constitution and by-laws for ratification at that time.

The group, as envisioned by Young, will investigate all aspects of township issues and residents' concerns and present both sides of the issues to members. The group will sponsor public hearings and attitudinal elections and present its findings to the board of trustees.

"We're trying to establish an open forum and an investigative committee to determine truth of both sides," explained Young. "After all the facts have been presented, we'll allow the citizen to pass judgment on them. How the citizen feels must be taken into consideration."

"It's the philosophy on which our country was founded," Young maintains. "We're reversing back to the theory of how the community can aid and assist and demand how they want things."

The group will provide better inroads to government affairs than township-sponsored public hearings, Young says.

"A public hearing in township hall is like going before a traffic court judge—you feel you don't stand a chance. It shouldn't be like that, but it is."

Total Citizens' Power will represent members of all interest groups, he ex-

plained, and present sound information on which government officials can base their decisions.

"As it is, the only way I could sit in a trustee's chair is to vote by ear," Young said. "I wouldn't have a score before me. The only input a government official has is from individuals of special interest groups. The official may doubt if what he's getting is the true opinion of the group."

Young first envisioned formation of the group a few months ago, when the township board proposed establishment of a consumer protection agency.

"I felt before we initiate such a pro-

gram, we should investigate its effects," Young said. "It belongs in the hands of the people."

"I dreamed about this group, and I suddenly realized we had to have a meeting. I was listening to various people complaining about things and expressing interests, and I said, 'We've got to do something.'"

"We are suffering from a social sickness of apathy," Young said. "This would restore interest. We want the youth, and we want a restoration of interest among older people."

Dangerous Canton corner may receive traffic lights

Canton Township officials are trying to make the "accident-prone" corner at Canton Center and Cherry Hill a bit safer for residents.

"It's one of the darkest and busiest corners we have," said township Treasurer Carl Parsell. "There are accidents there all the time. I think safety has got to come in here someplace."

Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein met with county officials last week in efforts to replace the intersection's flashing yellow light with a three-color stop light. Parsell pledges to place a street lamp at the corner.

The intersection was the scene of last week's traffic accident between a Wayne County Sheriff's Department patrol car and a 1974 Ford, driven by Doris Ritchie, secretary of the Plymouth Township Planning Commission.

According to Parsell, five accidents occurred at the corner during the preceding week. Five persons have died in traffic accidents at the intersection during the last three or four years.

"Last week's accident just brought it to a head," Parsell said. "It's probably going to happen again. We ask people to come to the firehall (located

at the corner) for public meetings, and there are accidents all the time."

Although last week's accident occurred during daylight hours, Parsell attributes many of the accidents to darkness of the intersection at night.

"One way or another, the township is going to light that corner up," he promised. "I'm going to demand that a street light is put up there somehow, so people can cross the street under safe conditions."

Parsell said he will broach the street lamp topic at the township board's next meeting, scheduled for Aug. 12.

Teacher strike bill 'a small miracle,' Keith says

Gov. William Milliken has promised to veto the recently passed school strike bill, and one area legislator predicts "it will be 10 years before another bill will hit the floor of the legislature, and that will be a dirty shame."

Seven Republicans joined with 53 Democrats when the House July 30 voted 60-43 to accept the Senate version of the bill which would penalize teachers with a loss of pay after the second week of an up-to-four-weeks authorized strike. Ten Democrats and 33 Republicans voted to reject it.

Only one area Democrat, Rep. John Bennett of Redford, voted to reject the bill.

Democrats in the Observer & Eccentric area favoring the measure were Reps. Thomas Oak of Westland, Joseph Forbes of Oak Park, William Keith of Garden City and John Markes of Westland.

Four area Republicans who opposed

the bill were Reps. Wilbur Brotherton of Farmington, James Defebaugh of Birmingham, Richard Fessler of Union Lake and Ruth McNamee of Birmingham.

Republicans voting to accept were R. Robert Geake of Northville, Melvin Larsen of Oxford and Roy Smith of Ypsilanti.

MILLIKEN SAID "the bill still con-

tains features that actually could become incentives to strike. The Senate version fails to take adequate steps to discourage teacher strikes.

"A full, complete, uninterrupted education is a fundamental right of all Michigan children and their parents. Any legislation that does not take all reasonable steps to protect that right will be vetoed by me."

"If the governor vetoes this bill after the bloodbath we've gone through, I predict it will be 10 years before another bill will hit the floor of the legislature, and that would be a dirty shame," said William Keith. His Garden City hometown underwent a 42-day teacher strike last fall.

Keith headed a special House-Senate committee to write a teacher strike control bill. His amendments, co-sponsored by Sen. David Plawecki in the Senate, were favored by Milliken but not adopted by either house.

"It represents a small miracle to get a bill of this magnitude on the governor's desk and it would be a real shame for it to go down the drain for a difference of five days."

He referred to the governor's preference for authorized strikes of up to three weeks with a loss of income after the first week.

"and it has a lot of pluses that aren't given attention because of the five days."

Under the dates outlined in the bill, a strike couldn't go beyond Sept. 16, Keith said.

Hospital plan OK'd

LANSING—The bed way has been cleared for the 81-bed Redford Community Hospital, 25210 Grand River, to spend \$932,000 in remodeling. The state has approved the project.

Local health planners, the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan, have approved the hospital's proposal in principle

but not for Certificate of Need purposes.

The reversal by the state of decisions of local health planners, although infrequent, sometimes does occur because the final authority in approving certificates rests with the state.

The plan for the project includes the replacement of the operating and recovery room duties and the intensive and coronary care unit, the expansion of the emergency and outpatient facilities, and the remodeling of Building-A to correct certain licensing deficiencies.

Joan Marie Petitpren, 3925 Palmer, was nominated to fill the seat of former Civil Service Commissioner Joseph M. Herron, a Garden City resident who recently resigned to accept an appointment to the Wayne County Road Commission.

Ms. Petitpren, 43, is an assistant professor at Eastern Michigan University and a PhD candidate at University of Michigan. A Wayne County resident for 33 years, Ms. Petitpren taught in the Wayne-Westland School District from 1961 to 1964.

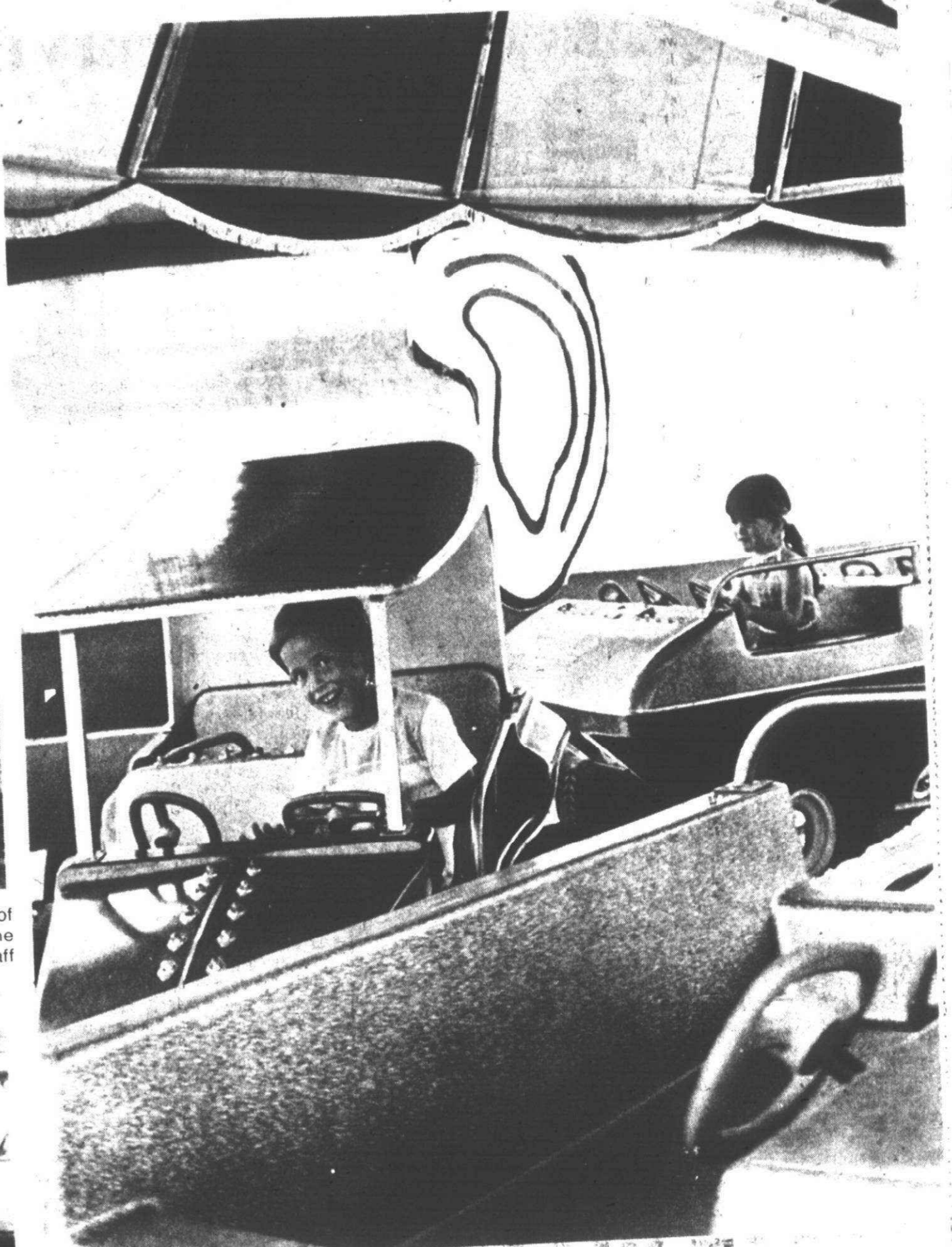

Miss Hilton becomes top woman in Wayne-Westland schools

WESTLAND—According to Marsha Hilton, it "never occurred" to her that she would reach the highest level ever attained by a woman in the history of the Wayne-Westland School District.

"I was concerned basically with the responsibilities of the job, and they were foremost when I applied for it," she said.

Effective January 1976, the 32-year-old psychologist will assume her new post—administrative assistant for student relations under Ray Rafford, the assistant superintendent for student relations.

Miss Hilton is a five-year veteran in the district. She holds a master's degree in clinical psychology in education from Wayne State University and received a bachelor's degree in psychology and sociology from the same school.

Her new responsibilities will involve the coordination of Rafford's "cabinet," a collection of educational specialists.

Inevitably, she will have to give up most of the direct contact she now has with students and parents in the school district.

"She will have many leadership responsibilities in her new job," said Rafford. "But I think she is well-qualified to handle them. She has a good perception about people, and I feel she has gained the respect of her colleagues."

Miss Hilton, whose specialty is learning disabilities and special education, has begun phasing into the new position, she said, and has begun undertaking some of the administrative paperwork even though she will not totally assume the position until January.

According to Rafford, she fulfills requirements set down by the state, which allocates money to the district. The state requires that the job be filled by a person with a teaching certificate and a background in specialized education.

As a psychologist in the student relations department, she concentrated on working with children with a variety of learning disabilities and with their parents.

She conducted psychological testing and counseling among pre-schoolers and youngsters with speech, learning, visual, emotional and intellectual impairments.

"I think the district has some very

exceptional programs," said Miss Hilton. "The McGrath Center is one, for example, and the pre-school programs also."

Miss Hilton, an Ann Arbor resident who takes piano lessons and plays tennis in her spare time, will earn \$23,000 when she moves into her new position.

She was born in Detroit and attended Livonia Bentley High School before entering Wayne State.

She is a member of the Council for Exceptional Children; the Michigan Association for School Psychologists, and Phi Beta Kappa.

The Wayne-Westland Board of Education approved her appointment along with nine others recommended

by Supt. Timothy Dyer at its last board meeting.

The appointments were part of an administrative reorganization begun in the spring.

Before the appointment and board approval of Miss Hilton, the highest-ranking woman in the Wayne-Westland District was Helen Avery, formerly director of elementary education, a "sub-cabinet" post.

With the appointment of Miss Hilton, however, a woman has attained full cabinet status in the district.

But according to her, she hasn't really considered the "status" side of the appointment. "I'm just looking forward to my new job," she said.

Young is currently forming a separate committee to represent those residents who are not necessarily represented by other civic or homeowner associations in making their needs known to the board of trustees.

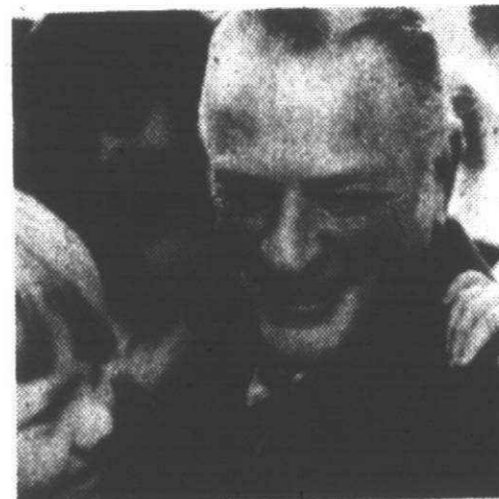

Barbecue tips— for tastier meat

Getting ready for a backyard barbecue? If you've got steaks or other meat to put on the grill, follow these tips:

- Have meat at room temperature.
- Trim fat from outer edges.
- Slash edge from outside and through tendon but not into meat to prevent meat from cupping and curling.
- Don't pick meat with fork or it will lose juices. Turn with tongs.
- Salt meat after cooking.
- Be careful of scorching when using any sugar-based barbecue sauce.

With a gas grill, you're apt to go into more expensive cuts of meat, such as tenderloin, because you have perfect control.

Lauren Stone of What's Cookin' in Franklin, who provided the tips, also suggests you try a "pocket dinner," with the entire meal wrapped in aluminum foil. Any foil-packaged grill recipe has the advantage of being easy with no clean up.

FISH MEAL IN FOIL (4 servings)
1½ pounds fish fillets, divided into 4

portions 4 medium potatoes, scrubbed and quartered 1 large onion, sliced into 4 rings 2 fresh tomatoes, in 8 slices 4 tablespoons chili sauce Salt and pepper Melted butter

Cut heavy foil into four 12-inch squares. Oil one piece and layer the meal in this order: Quartered potato, onion slice, chili sauce, fish portion. Then top with two slices tomato. Season, drizzle with butter and seal foil tightly, folding ends double. Repeat for other portions.

Bake over medium coals 20-25 minutes, turning once. Test potatoes and onion for doneness before serving.

CHICKEN MARINADE IN FOIL (8 servings)

4 pounds chicken parts 1 cup wine marinade ½ cup melted butter ¼ teaspoon pepper ½ teaspoon salt

Soak chicken in wine marinade for several hours. Brush each piece of chicken with butter. Place two or three pieces of chicken on heavy foil. Sprinkle with seasonings and moisten with butter. Bring edges of foil together

and seal tightly with a double fold. Grill 40 minutes, turning once.

Marinade

½ cup oil ½ cup white wine 1 onion grated 1 clove garlic, mashed ½ teaspoon salt ½ teaspoon celery salt ½ teaspoon pepper ¼ teaspoon thyme ¼ teaspoon marjoram ¼ teaspoon rosemary

Shake all ingredients in quart jar.

GREEK EGGPLANT AND ZUCCHINI (6 servings)

Peel eggplant and cut in ½-inch slices. Sprinkle with salt and let stand 10 minutes. Pat dry. Cut unpeeled zucchini into ½-inch slices. Peel two large tomatoes and slice. Sear eggplant and zucchini over hot coals. Transfer to six pieces of oiled heavy foil, dividing evenly, placing eggplant on bottom.

Top with tomato slice and round slice of Swiss cheese. Season with salt and pepper, paprika and oregano. Seal foil tightly, holding ends double. Bake over hot coals 10 minutes each side.

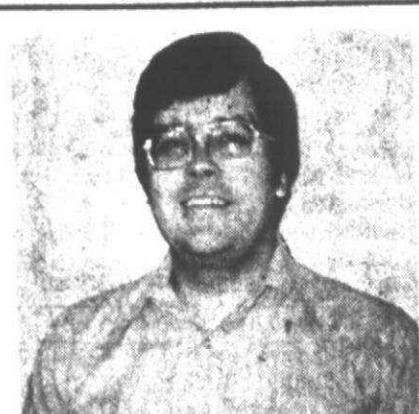

Redford takes Adray League crown

It's August. The long hot days draw on endlessly, broken now and then by a welcome rain or a cool wind from the north. And Redford Adray begins its preparations for a trip to Johnstown Pa., for competition in the national tournament. Redford did it again last Wednesday. After Westland Burger King had given the team all it wanted and more, Redford came from behind in the second game of the night to edge Burger King 5-4 and earn the right to represent the Livonia league in national competition. Westland had won the first game 5-3 to force the final playoff encounter. The only obstacle in the way of Red-

ford's 11th straight trip to Johnstown remains a best two-of-three playoff with the champion of the Ann Arbor League. Redford has had little trouble beating the Ann Arbor titlists in encounters the last two years. "I just think that the closeness of these two games shows the quality of the league," said Redford coach Bob Atkins. Atkins has led his team to the prestigious trip to Johnstown, where the best 19-and-under baseball talent is annually displayed, in each of the 11 years since the league has been formed. "I CERTAINLY THINK we have the talent to compete at Johnstown, but we're not looking past Ann Arbor one bit," he said.

Redford, traditionally the bully of the league, ran across hard times early this season and at one point had a 3-7 record. According to Atkins, the team decided to start taking the games one at a time at that point and has rebound to a 20-9 record and another title. "It's always good to win but I especially savored this one. There were other significant factors that make this title especially important to me," he said. Redford had to fight back from deficits in every game which it won in the tournament this year. "The team never gave up. It fought back all the way," said Atkins. Redford did not fight back far enough in the first game of the tournament. In that game, Westland took a 4-0 lead after two innings and held on to force the second game. Westland had lost to Redford in opening round action of the two-game knockout tournament, 8-3 and thus needed to sweep both games while Redford need only a split.

"He just didn't have his stamina," said Atkins. Westland got to Bara right from the start. Jojo Scarpace opened the game with a single and was erased on a fielder's choice off the bat of Bill Redwood. Redwood then suffered the same fate on a grounder by Bob Ganzak. Bara and Redford were given an idea of things to come when Ken Robinson followed with a triple down the left-field line. Jeff Hodgkins then followed with a single to make it 2-0. Westland scored two more in the bottom of the second on a two-out rally. Gary Beyrand started things when he was awarded firstbase because of interference by Redford catcher John Broder. Scarpace then followed with his second single of the night and Redwood's ensuing basehit then scored Beyrand. Scarpace then came home on an error by Redford secondbaseman Dan Burke. REDFORD GOT one run out in the fourth when, with two out, Wasilewski doubled and Mark Yourchock was safe on an error. Redford scored two more in the sixth to pull within one run, 4-3. Wasilewski walked, Yourchock singled.

Broder doubled, knocking in one and Mike Kalil hit a sacrifice fly. But Westland got one back in the bottom of the inning when Randy Whitehouse singled, went to second on a wild pitch and scored in Gary Beyrand's single. Redford's Dan Burke walked with two out in the seventh bringing the tying run to the plate but Morency got Gary D'Ascenzo to lift a long fly ball to Redwood in right to end things. WESTLAND WENT ahead initially in the second game also, scoring a run in the top of the first on Bob Ganzak's solo homer. Scarpace had opened the inning with a single but was eventually thrown out on a perfect throw to third by Redford catcher John Broder following a passed ball. His run would be sorely missed by Burger King. Redford tallied three times in the botom of the inning to take the lead and chase Westland starter Harry Terrant from the mound. John Roy started things by walking but he was erased on a fielder's choice off the bat of D'Ascenzo. Dan Burke then walked and Wasilewski sent Terrant to the showers by powering a home run to deep left scoring three.

Westland came back for three runs of its own in the third when Ken Robinson homered over the rightfield fence at Ford Field scoring Scarpace, who had walked and Redwood, who had singled, in front of him. Redford scored the winning runs of the game in the fourth when Yourchock doubled and, with two out, Kevin Bara hit a double. John Roy followed with a single to knock in Bara with the game winner. Redford starter Roy Ivy went to two balls, no strikes on the first Westland hitter of the next inning, Jojo Scarpace, before giving way to reliever John Bolland. Bolland Scarpace who moved to second and was subsequently erased by a double play. But no other Westland runner reached base for the rest of the game against the powerful Northville High School product and Redford had all the cushion it needed to pull out the title. Redford will play against the winner of the Ann Arbor League Friday, Aug. 8 at 6 p.m. at Eastern Michigan University in the first of a three-game knockout series. The second game will be played on Saturday, Aug. 9 at 11 a.m. at EMU with a third game, if necessary, to follow immediately.

PHA, high school hockey conflict hits Plymouth

Despite this, John Sandmann, athletic director for the high schools, is confident that the program will succeed this year. "We will have high school hockey in Plymouth this year," Sandman said. "The problem with the PHA certainly concerns us, and we have certain apprehensions. We would like to have the better players play for the high schools, but what do you tell a kid who has a chance to take a trip to Sweden?"

While Sandmann said he would be happy to sit down and talk with the PHA, he said he had no plans to contact them. Similarly, while Randazzo stressed the necessity of ironing out the problems between the two groups as soon as possible, he said he was not aware of any immediate plans on the PHA's part to meet with Sandmann. Although Randazzo, an admitted pessimist when it comes to the issue, talked of a chance that the high school program would collapse this

year, it appears at this point that both Salem and Canton will field teams. The quality of the hockey played by those teams, however, will be subject to intense review and should show up in the scoreboard even though a good portion of the teams' games are scheduled against Taylor schools which are also starting a hockey program. "We're a neophyte program. Give us time," said Sandmann. Time, indeed, is what it will take. For Plymouth schools, which challenged for state honors in football, baseball and basketball last year, there will be no hockey trophies in the show-case for the hockey year 1975-76.

Several untimely factors have sparked a "bidding war" for prime high school hockey talent in the city of Plymouth and made the immediate future of the newly instituted high school hockey program cloudy. The "bidding war," which involves officials of the new high school program and the Plymouth Hockey Association, has arisen because both the high schools and the PHA are interested in the same aged-group athletes. That war is being won by the PHA due to several contributing factors. Primary among those is the PHA's planned trip for one and possibly two midget (high school aged) teams to Sweden in late November. That trip was planned prior to the completion of plans to institute hockey in the city late this spring. Other factors contributing to the PHA's predominance among the better high school players include the fact that the sport was not given approval in time for either Plymouth Salem or Plymouth Canton high schools to be scheduled for league play this year, making their schedules virtually exhibitions. Also, the only time the Plymouth school board found available for practice was early morning. Despite the fact that the ice rink in the Plymouth Cultural Center sits on school board property, the board made no special provisions to attain privileges for the high school teams. High School hockey has been in the planning stages in Plymouth for several years, and this lack of foresight by the school board means that both high school teams must practice together at 5:30 a.m. a few mornings per week. "I THINK a bidding war has already taken place to an extent," said Dick Randazzo, board member for the PHA. "We knew there would be problems, and we have to sit down and solve them," he said. Randazzo said the PHA has gone on record as supporting hockey at the high school level and that he was in favor of bringing both parties together to work out the problems which are going to arise because of the conflict. Randazzo also said that although he had had little personal contact with the high-school-aged players himself, it was his understanding that most of the better players had already committed themselves to the PHA. "It's a simple choice of whether a player who will be a senior wants to play one year of exhibition hockey games or whether he wants to play for a travel team which will go to Sweden," he said. The view that the better players would opt for the PHA has been backed up by several players who have publicly stated that they are planning to go to Sweden, thus passing up the chance to play high school hockey.


double steal, but Casterdale was nailed at the plate.

"They never even got anything close to a hit," said Wayne Sporkman, coach of the Elks.

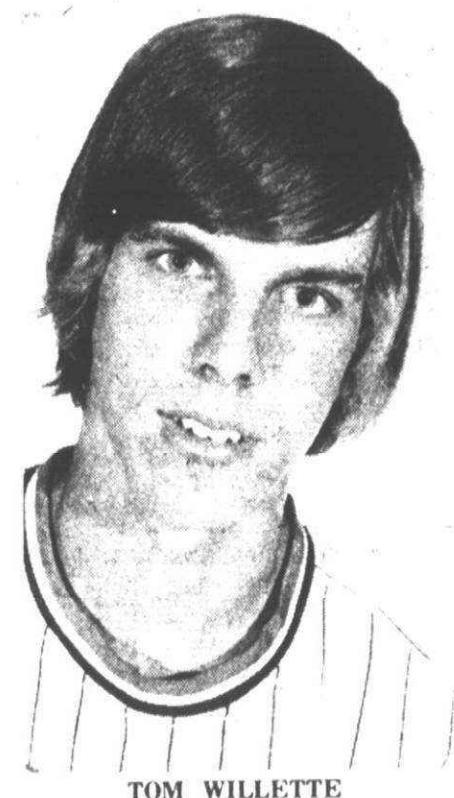
No ball was hit beyond the infield by Ypsilanti and all plays were rou-

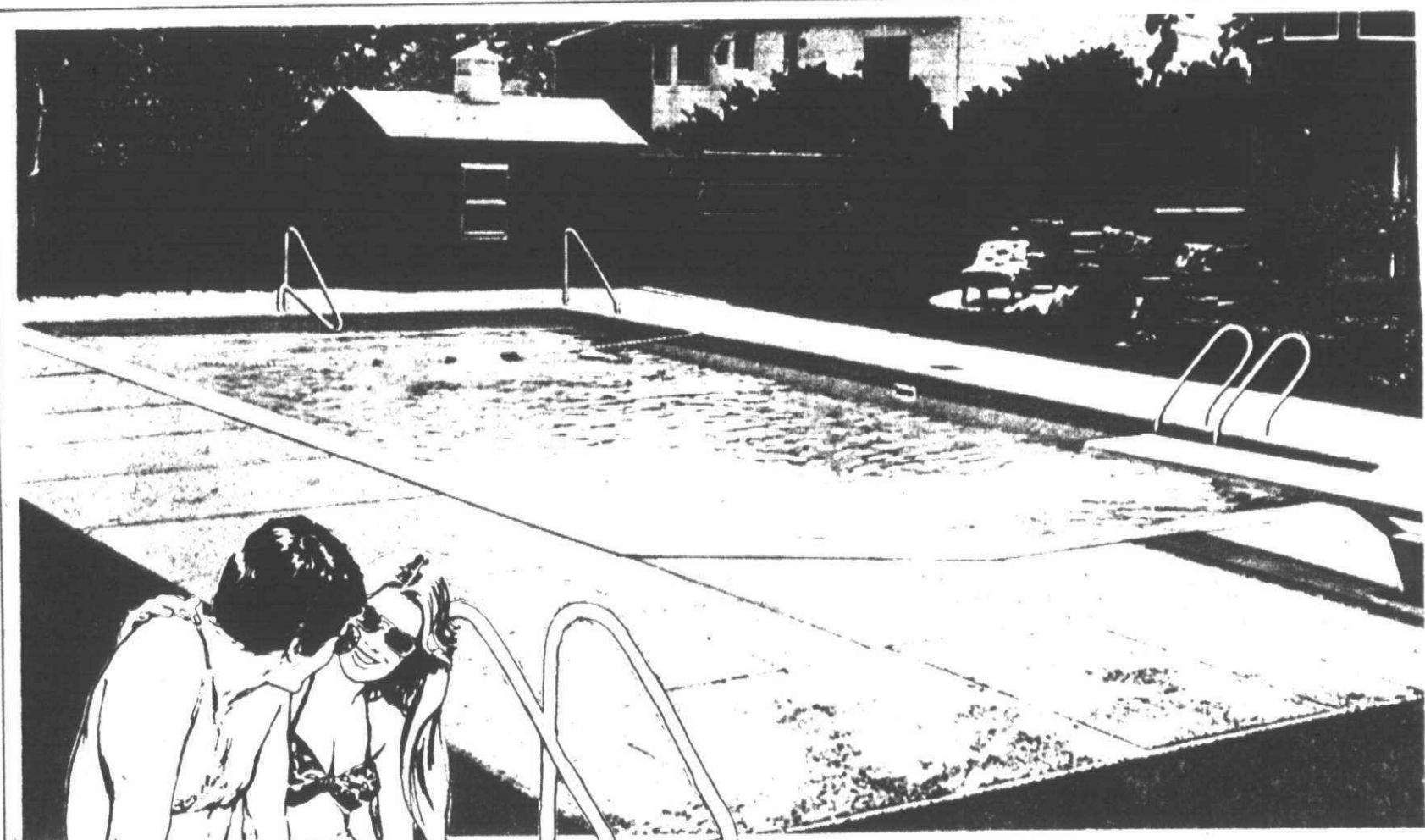
The new chairperson was one of two women appointed to the committee in 1972-73. Her term of office begins in July and continues through the 1975-76 academic year.

Family picnic planned for 'forgotten' children

About 160 children and young people will pour out of Binet Hall of Plymouth Home for Human Development on Aug. 21 and head for the picnic area with a feeling of anticipation.

These retarded youngsters have had picnics before but this one will have an exciting new ingredient. Joining them will be their parents or stand-in parents.

"This is the first time we've invited parents," said Peter Schweitzer, director of community relations. "We've had open houses before for people from the community. But we've never before involved parents and children in an activity."

"The picnic is the kind of normal event that hasn't been enjoyed by many of these children. Sitting down with a family at a picnic is completely new to them."

BUT TO MAKE the event a happy one for all the children, some help from the community is needed. Paul Napier, program director for Binet Hall, explained why.

Some of the children, he said, will be with their natural parents. These are the fortunate ones whose families

make regular visits to the child who cannot be cared for at home.

"But half the children participating are what we call forgotten," Napier continued. "This means they have not had any contact with their families or any person outside the institution for more than a year."

So, Napier said, volunteers are needed to serve as parents so these forgotten ones can share in the happiness.

ORIENTATION for those who volunteer will be Thursday, Aug. 7, at 7:30 p.m. Any adult taking a young person to the picnic must attend the orientation. To volunteer, call Pat Jones of the social service department at the center.

"We are hoping to get adults who know the value of the family experience and would like to share some extra love with a child not as fortunate as their own," said Mrs. Jones.

Sam Cordaro, who is in charge of volunteers at the center, noted that many community organizations sponsor a forgotten child.

On special occasions, organization members send cards and gifts to "their" child. But as yet, few sponsors have actually met the child they are helping.

Cordaro hopes some of these sponsoring groups will send representa-

tives to the picnic and devote some time to the sponsored child.

"I THINK the child will enjoy the attention received," he said. "The effect should be a favorable one. Anything that resembles a normal activity has a positive effect. The trend now in institutions is to try to provide more normal experiences for the inhabitants."

"The children will be with the parents for only two to three hours, but that is better than spending no time at all."

Napier said the retarded persons involved range in age from four to 18. All are ambulatory, can feed themselves and have a good receptive vocabulary.

Eighty per cent have a limited expressive vocabulary. Children will be selected so that stand-in parents won't have a child that poses a problem. In addition staff members will be on hand to answer questions and help.

"It should be an evening of fun and excitement," said Napier. "The Farmington Elks motorized drill team will perform and we may have some clowns from the Shrine Circus. We hope to have a band, and there will be games for the children."

All the children need now is some volunteer parents.

Can your garden harvest but use safe methods

Don't believe it for a minute when someone tells you it's possible to can food safely in the oven or in an open kettle or with aspirin or by any other short cut method.

That's the message Johne Criner of the Michigan State University cooperative extension service brought to recent gatherings of economy and ecology-minded homemakers in Plymouth and Redford Township.

And it's the word from Ms. Criner, who spoke in the Plymouth Credit Union Building and the Redford Township Library, and Kathy Bufon, who has a session scheduled in the Northville Square lower level conference room Wednesday, Aug. 13, at 1:30 p.m.

The two home economists have been traveling all around Wayne County to fill several score requests for talks on preserving the harvests of this summer's small gardens.

Tips they are giving—in abundance and on just about any food preservation question asked—but they continue to emphasize the message that only the steam pressure method, which raises the temperature of food to 240 degrees, is adequate for low-acid foods like beans, beets, corn and meats.

MS. CRINER said men have attended some of the lectures she has given, and they are the ones who often press her to agree that other methods can be used safely.

"My answer to questions like that," she said, "is that I would not use such methods of canning and then feed the results to someone I loved."

The manual on canning that the home economists distribute with their talks warns of another way.

"Persons who use unreliable canning methods may have 'good luck' for years," the publication reads. "This is because heat-resistant bacteria are not always present. When these spoilage micro-organisms are absent, underprocessed foods may keep."

"But if they are present, underprocessed foods will spoil."

THE DANGER of botulism poisoning is, of course, the major threat in

faulty canning of low-acid foods, Ms. Criner said. She added that the extension service is taking its lectures to as many groups as possible because that deadly poisoning increased last year in the United States and the consensus was that a major reason was the increase in home canning.

"And we know that this year even more people are canning the vegetables they have grown or purchased in an effort to cut food costs," she said.

"Our lecture requests have increased 170 per cent over last year." In the local lectures, she also told how to recognize possible spoilage in home-preserved foods.

There will be a cloudy appearance, and possibly an off odor," she said. "If there is any reason to suspect spoilage, the food should be boiled for 10 minutes. This will not destroy the botulism, but it will increase the odor and make it certain that the food should not be eaten."

"If this happens, it's also important to sterilize—not just wash—the jar it was in."

THE STEAM-PRESSURE method, Ms. Criner said, involves use of a heavy kettle with a lid that can be clamped or locked down to make it steam-tight.

If people make the investment of a pressure cooker for this kind of canning, she added, "we recommend that they look at the recipe book that comes with it and maybe use it for other kinds of cannings—soups, chili sauce and meats as well as just garden vegetables."

The water-bath method, which processes food at 212 degrees, is safe for fruits, tomatoes and other high-acid foods, Ms. Criner said, because the boiling temperature destroys the bacteria, enzymes, molds and yeasts which can spoil such products.

The food preservation talks also covered jam and jelly making, and the safety features involved, as well as freezing vegetables and fruits.

"We are not concerned much about food safety in freezing processes," Ms. Criner said. "In this case, it's a

matter of loss of quality and nutrients if improper methods are used."

The commonest mistake made in freezing, she added, is failure to blanch, the process by which the vegetables to be frozen are placed in boiling water for a few minutes and then removed.

"When you blanch, you are stopping the ripening process," she explained. "This does not stop just by putting the vegetables in the freezer."

BESIDES DISTRIBUTING booklets on canning and freezing and recommending use of shelves of special book collections on the subject being offered in local libraries, Ms. Criner offered some tips to the women who attended her lectures.

She suggested that women forget the old adage that fruit slightly bruised or maybe past prime is "good enough for canning."

"I can remember hearing that when I was a child," she said, "but the fact is that what you can is only as good as the fruit you start with."

Kosher salt is best for pickles, she said, because it doesn't contain the additives in table salt that might make the product cloudy.

Jam and jelly recipes should never be doubled, she stated, because "it takes too big a pot and it just won't turn out right." Paraffin is the most economical way of sealing these, "but don't melt it over direct heat, and pour on just one thin layer."

She suggested that those interested in canning with artificial sugar look for recipes given by the manufacturers and try them, "but our experience has been that people are not too terribly happy with the results."

AND FINALLY, Ms. Criner offered a recipe for getting the most out of canning by doing it in small lots.

"Don't get so immersed in canning that you have bottles all over the house and it's a terrible chore," she said. "Try planning to process a few jars each day and see if you don't find it a really enjoyable part of home-making."

Three six-hour workshops designed to help individuals obtain or upgrade job entry skills will be offered by the women's resource center at Schoolcraft College in August.

The workshops are titled pegboard office systems, orientation to medical terminology and coding with H-ICDA.
