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

## Moceri development receives final approval as public OKs compromise



A lengthy battle between Canton Township officials and developer Dominic Moceri was finally concluded Monday night when township board members unanimously approved a settlement, earmarked for a consent judgment in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The judgment, designed to govern use of 195 acres at the southeast corner of Sheldon and Joy, is an alternative to a long court battle with Moceri, who filed a lawsuit last year over the township board's refusal to rezone 65 acres for construction of a regional shopping center.

Residents of the Canton and Plymouth communities voiced favorable reactions toward the plan at Monday's meeting and a public hearing held in August.

Under the agreement approved by board members Monday night, plans for a regional shopping center have been discarded. Developer Richard Lewiston—not Moceri—will develop the site.

**OTHER MAIN** points of the settlement include:

- Donation of about 23 acres of wooded land, abutting the Windsor Park Subdivision, to the township for a park site.

- The developer will construct the half-mile of Morton Taylor Road which dissects the Moceri site.

- About 24 acres of commercial use and nine acres of office use on four separate sites within the development. Permissible uses are clearly outlined in the agreement.

- No multiple family dwellings, high-rise buildings or duplexes, as Moceri originally proposed.

- Larger lots and less density on the portion of the land earmarked for single-family use. Original plans showed 768 houses on 60-foot lots. The agreement outlines 336 houses on lots ranging from 65 to 100 feet in width.

- Donation of about 25 acres for the Canton Center-Sheldon cutoff.

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein calls the final agreement "substantially the same" as the proposal presented to residents in August. Minor changes include:

- Expansion of one subdivision street, leading to the Plymouth Community School District's Windsor Park school site, to 37 feet wide and eight inches thick to accommodate school buses. Lewiston has agreed to build a platform for children boarding and embarking from the buses.

- Expansion of residential lots abutting commercial property from 120 to 160 feet in length.

- Expansion of the right-of-way on

Morton Taylor near the park sites from 120 to 150 feet to provide parking areas.

Board members also stipulated addition of some verbiage to the agreement in their votes of approval.

**ADDITIONAL** clauses will require "slight" architectural control over commercial sites one and two, presentation of the overall plan to prospective home buyers, and application of the township's sign ordinance to commercial and office sites.

Under a consent judgment, owners of the land must comply with the use outlined in the judgment, unless the township agrees to modify permissible use of the land.

The agreement specifically outlines permissible uses of the commercial and office sites.

The developer may construct medical, dental or professional offices as well as restaurants and optical studios on office sites one and two, as long as the facilities are housed under one roof. The developer may construct separate structures to house a bank, savings and loan association or credit union.

**TOWNSHIP** officials envision construction of separate commercial structures, resembling homes more than stores, on commercial site number one, located at the southwest corner of Joy and the proposed Morton Taylor Road.

That site will contain "specialty shops," such as interior decorating establishments, bicycle shops, carpet stores and small retail furniture stores.

Use of commercial site number two, located at the southeast corner of Joy and Morton Taylor, is limited to buildings which offer entertainment or leisure activities. Permissible uses include theaters, health establishments and tennis clubs within "completely enclosed" buildings.

Plymouth School Supt. John M. Hoben stamped his approval on the plan in a letter to township board members. Lewiston Monday congratulated board members on the progress of negotiations and the final agreement.

"I've been in the development business for 15 years, and I've never seen a situation handled as beautifully and openly as negotiations for this site," Lewiston told board members amid rounds of residents' applause.

"I came into the negotiations at an advanced stage. But, I just want to say, it's been a pleasure for me to be in on it."

## Floyd A. Kehrl, banker, dies

Funeral services for Floyd A. Kehrl, Plymouth banker and friend of Schoolcraft College, will be at 11 a.m. Friday in the First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, the Rev. Phillip Rogers Magee officiating. Entombment will be in Riverside Mausoleum.

Kehrl, 72, died Tuesday in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor, of heart failure during surgery.

Kehrl was active in support of Schoolcraft College during its formative years. He and his late first wife, Shirley, contributed the carillon tower and chiming bells that are a landmark on the college's Haggerty Road campus.

The college awarded him an honorary associate of applied science degree in 1972. He later was appointed to fill a six-month term on the college board.

Born on a turkey farm in Livonia, Kehrl graduated from Plymouth High School, briefly attended the University of Michigan and embarked on a banking career that lasted 47 years. He rose from teller to president of the old First National Bank in Plymouth. When it merged with National Bank of Detroit in 1952, he became a regional vice-president for NBD. He retired in 1968.

Kehrl served on the board of directors of Adistra Corp., Plymouth. He and his second wife, Marian, lived at 41525 Eight Mile, Northville.

Surviving besides his wife, Marian, are a brother, the Rev. Arnold Kehrl, and two step-children, Lucinda Johnston of Plymouth and Jeffrey Johnston of Northville.

## Musical present given to symphony

Plymouth Symphony Society members recently received an unexpected bicentennial gift through the mail. The package, a gift of the JCPenney Co., contains "The Bicentennial Musical Celebration" with scores and parts for 35 orchestral, band and choral works. Among five specially commissioned pieces are compositions by Roger Nixon, Norman Dello Joio and Adolphus C. Hailstork III. Historic works include a full arrangement of "The Battle of Trenton," composed by James Hewitt in 1792, and a Sousa march. The collection has received a certificate of recognition from the American Revolutionary Bicentennial Administration, making it an official part of America's 200th birthday celebration. Plymouth Symphony Orchestra director Wayne Dunlap is expected to review the compositions for the orchestra's possible use. The JCPenney Co. has presented the bicentennial package to 20,000 groups in the United States, including community music organizations, high schools, colleges and universities.

## Canton joins action against electric bill

Canton Township residents will not have to finance the costs of street light installations, if a legal battle, staged by Canton, Livonia and other municipalities, is a success.

Members of the Canton Board of Trustees have empowered township attorney Walter J. Guth Jr. to add Canton's name to a complaint, filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission (PSC) by numerous municipalities against Detroit Edison.

The municipalities are attempting to block PSC approval of a Detroit Edison request that would halt the

company's coverage of steel light installation charges.

The municipalities, according to Guth, are alleging a violation of Detroit Edison's franchise agreements, under which the company holds a monopoly on electrical supply rights within the municipalities.

"Detroit Edison has been given the exclusive right to operate within the township," said Guth. "Under past practice, they've put up the poles because they sell electricity. Why should the people pay for what turns out to be capital improvement? Detroit Edison would still own the poles."

## Group to study disaster needs

Canton Township officials have launched a special committee, designed to prepare township employees and residents for disasters that could arise.

Township board members recently unanimously agreed to establish a township civil defense committee to ensure preparedness for disastrous events.

Township Trustee Gerald Cheske was appointed chairman of the new committee. Other appointees are: Fire Chief Mel Paulun, vice chairman; DPW superintendent Jake Dingeldej; constable Tim Murphy, and resident John Longridge.

A recent train derailment and ruptured gasoline pipeline near Stonybrook Apartments indicated the necessity for such a group, according to Supervisor Robert Greenstein.

"We were able to cope with that situation," said Greenstein. "But we feel there should be an active group to research equipment needed to deal with those kinds of emergencies."

### Energy saving group under way

Effective energy conservation means a coordinated program, agree members of the Plymouth Community School District energy conservation committee.

That agreement was reached at the committee's first meeting when administrators, custodians and a school board member met with Dr. Charles Wells of the Wayne County Intermediate School District to plan for savings in energy consumption and spendings.

THE FIRST STEP is to define energy saving measures. It was noted, for example, that it is worthwhile to turn off fluorescent lights for a 15 minute or longer period while it saves electricity to turn off regular lights for any amount of time.

Electricity is also conserved by using low wattage bulbs, turning on power gradually instead of all at once, and removing bulbs from some light fixtures.

In considering moves to save energy, the committee had to take into account other factors. Reducing exterior lighting could cause an increase in vandalism. Insulating roofs might save enough to effect a long-term saving. Investing in an automated monitoring system could pay off in relatively few years.

AFTER ENERGY conservation measures have been defined, the next step is to publicize them.

Reference was made to the energy outback letter from Supt. John M. Hoben sent to all schools on Nov. 13.

1973. Brochures, posters, stickers by light switches, and a slide presentation were suggested as ways to make persons aware of the campaign.

Monitoring energy use was listed as the third step. Energy consumption charts for each building could be maintained, compensating for weather conditions.

Wider participation on the energy conservation committee, including cafeteria and transportation personnel and students, could help keep track of conservation measures.

Four committee members will attend a conference on energy conservation sponsored by Detroit Edison for the Wayne County Intermediate School District on Nov. 20.

A report will be made on the conference at the committee's next meeting Tuesday, Nov. 25, at 9:30 a.m. in the PCSD Administration Building, 454 S. Harvey in Plymouth.

### Principals flip coin for graduation dates

A toss of a coin will decide graduation dates for the Classes of '76 at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools. The Plymouth Board of Education approved dates of Thursday, June 10, and Friday, June 11, for commencement exercises for the schools.

Salem Principal Bill Brown and Canton Principal Kent Buikema will flip a coin to decide which school gets which night.

Only 15 per cent of the seniors from both schools voiced their opinions on graduation date choices. Consensus of the group was June 10 and 11.

Ceremonies will be on the Centennial Educational Park athletic field. If it rains, they will be transferred to the Plymouth Salem gymnasium.

# Campaign nears end on W-W bond issue

"Let's think positively," Wayne-Westland Schools Supt. Timothy Dyer told a group of about 50 persons attending a bond issue "rally" at John Marshall Junior High School Monday night.

Dyer was trying to rekindle the hopes of the group, who will spearhead the campaign for voter approval of two bond issues—one for repairs and special ed and vocational ed facilities and the other for swimming pools—on Dec. 1.

The previous issue combining pools with repairs and new buildings for Lincoln and Jefferson Elementaries and for central office administration was turned down by district voters last June by a vote of 4,229 to 3,776.

"Out of a total of 8,000 votes cast, less than 500 made the difference," Dyer said. "A lot of us felt clobbered. The emotional effect was hard on all of us. But we must remember that it lost by only 10 per cent."

Dyer and the Wayne-Westland board hope their timing will be better this winter than it was last spring. The board voted 6-1 to shoot for bond approval on Dec. 1. Trustee William White voted against the measure because he felt the district should have gone after the same package it sought in June.

Ballots, which will be ready Nov. 15, will ask voters to approve Proposition A: a \$19.8 million issue for renovation of existing buildings, especially elementary schools and the 55-year-old board offices building.

ABOUT \$12.5 MILLION will be spent for repairs and renovations. The remainder will go toward vocational education and special educational upgrading.

Proposal B, if approved, will be used to build swimming pools in each of the district's junior high schools.

The combined total of the two proposals is still less than the \$28.2 million voters turned down in June.

Because the district taxes its residents at a level of seven mills for debt retirement (it has for the past 12 years), it is eligible to participate in the state's School Bond Loan Fund.

The fund would provide the district with up to 10 per cent of the money needed to make loan payments.

For Wayne-Westland School District residents, it would mean an increase in their tax rate of 0.6 mill, bringing the debt retirement total to 7.6 mills. But, as the district's older bonded indebtedness is paid off, the rate would fall back to seven mills.

The district now carries the heaviest school tax burden in the state—44 mills.

According to Dyer, it owes about \$58 million (principal and interest) and currently has 17 bond issues in effect. The latest, if approved Dec. 1, will be paid off in 30 years—in the year 2005.

A school district is generally permitted to go into debt, up to 25 per cent of its total wealth, but anything beyond that is considered hazardous.

"We are now in debt to the extent of 11 per cent of our wealth," said Dyer.

Timing was an important factor in placing the two proposals on the Dec. 1 ballot.

THE BOND ISSUE vote had to be kept apart from the Nov. 4 city elections, but be placed before voters before holiday spending and end-of-year tax bills, the district felt.

The need for the improvements, especially in Proposal A, is evident, says Dyer.

He said the district is undergoing a "slow burn" or gradual deterioration of facilities, not visibly apparent to outsiders but obvious to principals and administrators.

"The Board of Education ceiling collapsed and the heat is either on or off (nothing in between). The drainage (of the board building) causes reverberations throughout the building."

Because of poor insulation, Dyer said it costs about 28 cents a square foot to heat the board offices, whereas it costs only about 11 cents a square foot to heat the Adams School.

"About two thirds of the schools in the district need new roofs," said Dyer.

Proposal A would do the following:

- Provide new plumbing, electrical, heating and ventilation systems at Lincoln and Jefferson elementaries and at the central administration building.
- Construct special education classrooms, orthopedic therapy rooms and an orthopedic pool.
- Construct a vocational education center at John Glenn High School.

THE VOC-ED center would offer programs in computer maintenance, auto body repair, welding and medical lab technology. Such facilities could be used by adult education students as well as high school students.

According to Dyer, 70 per cent of Wayne-Westland students do not go on to college and the voc-ed center would help them enter the job market.

Proposal B would build swimming pools that could be used on a "walk-in" basis by about 23,000 students.

The district's two pools now serve about 130,000 persons, according to the administration. New pools would teach water safety and would be available to district residents at a nominal fee.

Proposal A would add ½ mill to the present levy; Proposal B would add one tenth mill.

The bond issue campaign will begin with a mailing of 25,000 circulars to district homes.

"We can't take anything for granted," Dyer stressed.

# W-W students find identity in fine arts

John Glenn High School fine arts department felt its students had an identity crisis, but even it didn't know how much of a crisis it was until one-third of the school showed up for a fine arts activity.

"We had no idea before that there were that many students involved in our programs," Bruce Graden, department chairman said.

Since then, the department's teachers have been looking for ways to make their students more visible and to continue to work to intermingle the arts wherever possible.

The first step was the calling together the department's students to build a fine arts float for the Glenn homecoming game.

To identify both the float and the students, the art department drew up a banner depicting all phases of art as combined into the department.

With the success of the group float, the department is hoping the emblem will soon be emblazoned on T-shirts for students.

"Athletes always had either their jerseys or their letters to wear, and now the fine arts students will have something to identify themselves," Bob Curtis, visual arts instructor, said.

WITH THE IDENTITY crisis helpfully solved, the department is furthering plans to widen the horizons of its students.

"We're interested in the inter-relationship of all knowledge," Graden said. "It's the people here who will make

this work. They believe in their art and they believe in the importance of the others."

Aside from the float, which teachers hoped would give students "a sense of pulling together," plans have been made for a wide variety of field trips for students to be able to experience an art form different from their own.

Trips include seeing dance troupes, hearing the Detroit Symphony and seeing Marcel Marceau.

"We recognize there is an overlapping of the arts into all of learning and we want to see the kids recognize that too," Curtis said.

Graden and his colleagues consider Glenn to be one of the top fine arts schools in the state. Their department consists of vocal and instrumental music, drama, dance, debate and visual arts.

"IT ALL SEEMS SO easy now for us to go from one department to another and seek help with our productions," Graden said.

"But we can all remember times when we felt pigeon-holed. We tell people from other schools how our department is able to work together and people are amazed."

"If we want sets made we go down to the art department and a class will work on what we want. It's the same with lighting or music."

GRADEN AND CURTIS credit the amount of interest in their offerings to a changing attitude in education.

"We've become less a dumping ground by counselors who were just looking for a place to put people.

They now realize the students have to be motivated," Graden said.

"I've had parents say to me that they hoped their children could have found fine arts before. They tell me that if it hadn't been for fine arts, their kid wouldn't bother to come to school."

"Self expression is more immediate in our area," he said.

Curtis contends that much of the interconnection of the arts activities is unconscious.

"We realize the scope of the department," Curtis said. "It's an unconscious thing. A lot of our students cross from one art to another."

"We try to break things down and suggest students see different teachers to help them out on projects involving more than one form of expression."

"We encourage exposure to plays, exhibitions. Whenever we have a concert or a play, we try to have an art show correlated with it."

CURTIS IS a member of State Sen. Jack Faxon's joint legislative committee on the arts.

Because of Curtis's participation, Glenn has been selected to put on a simulated television program involving all of its fine arts departments early in the year at the state capital.

The fine arts staff is hoping to securing rights to the Beatles' "Eleanor Rigby" for presentation of a program dealing with a loneliness theme.

Faxon's committee has been seeking more funding for arts programs in education.

# Resident teaches Carnegie course

The Dale Carnegie course will again be offered to Plymouth-Canton residents. Only this year it will be taught by a Plymouth resident.

John Czubaj, 28 of Doe Lane, Plymouth, moved to town three years ago when he joined Top Inc., an international insurance agency on General Drive.

He enrolled in the Carnegie course as a student and became so excited about its ability to help persons reach their full potential that Czubaj left his job to join the Carnegie staff full-time.

CZUBAJ—pronounced "Shoe-by"—was a pretty good athlete at Grand Rapids West Catholic High and was quite active as a student at Central Michigan University.

At CMU he earned a teaching degree majoring in recreation. He officiated basketball games for the Mount Pleasant recreation department, taught social ballroom dancing and other recreation-type classes to work his way through college. worked at

the State Home and Training School in that city, and gave dancing exhibitions with the college gymnastic team

and taught some freshmen social dancing classes.

After graduating from CMU in 1969, he joined a federal war on poverty program under the auspices of the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO).

At age 23 he became the youngest executive-director of a nonprofit, private corporation for a four-county area near Mount Pleasant—one of 900 such corporations established by OEO.

"I RECEIVED my training in education and teaching is my real trade," explains Czubaj when asked why he left private industry to join Carnegie.

"I've been interested in teaching since I met my first good teacher as a youngster. Since then I've wanted to teach and coach, and that's what the Carnegie course requires—teaching and coaching.

"After spending five years in business, I could see how the principles in the Carnegie training can really help a business person to grow and succeed, and experience growth.

"This course has the potential of being the most exciting experience in learning anyone will ever encounter. The techniques we use cause people to see themselves in a different, yet positive, way which gives them a

great deal of self-satisfaction."

The Carnegie training program in Plymouth is being offered in cooperation with the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce.

The 66 hours of instruction involves the use of five books written by Carnegie, plus other materials. Stress is placed on: communication skills; building relationships with others that are more meaningful and rewarding; and how to constructively deal with worry, stress and boredom.

"There are no lectures in the training. People learn by doing with the participants given the opportunity during the course to build up self-confidence."

A free demonstration lecture will be given Tuesday, Nov. 11, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Mayflower Meeting House at Ann Arbor Trail and Main Street, Plymouth. An orientation meeting will be held Nov. 25 and then the course will begin for a period of 14 weeks. Each class will be on Tuesdays from 7 to 10:30 p.m. in the Meeting House.

Czubaj, who is married and has one child, works with Ralph Nichols with offices in Southfield on offering Carnegie training programs. He hopes the Plymouth course will become an annual happening.

School Supt. John Hoben is keeping close watch on the joint appropriations committee's response to Gov. William Milliken's state aid cuts announced Oct. 27.

After consulting with sources in Lansing, Hoben says it would be premature to estimate the effects of the cuts on local school financing.

"We know there will be cuts," he said, "but we also expect amendments which could make radical changes in the amount."

**HOBEN EXPECTS** five state aid financing bills to be introduced in the State Legislature.

The Faxon Bill will be reintroduced by Sen. Jack Faxon (D-Detroit).

The State Board of Education is expected to make a recommendation. Sen. William Fitzgerald (D-Detroit), and Sen. Bobby Crimm (D-Davison) have bills in the offing.

The governor is expected to come through with a straight 29-mill recommendation through Jim Phelps, his administrative assistant for education.

Hoben says the Crimm bill probably will be some form of the Bursley Bill. It is being drawn up by educational aide James Caesar who worked on the Bursley Bill.

Hoben considers the Faxon Bill best suited to suburban communities. It is based on the doctoral thesis of Dr. Harry Howard, former superintendent of schools in Wayne-Westland and now school superintendent in Ann Arbor. Regional 9 superintendents worked on the concept, including James Rossman when he was with the Plymouth schools.

In the meantime, school administrators are adopting a wait-and-see attitude. The cuts are coming, but they don't know where or how much.

## Plymouth JCs to host state '76 convention

Plymouth Community School District Board of Education approved a request by the Plymouth Jaycees to rent school facilities.

The local club plans to host the state Jaycees convention in November 1976. The request was for Nov. 13.

Marcia Borowski, board vice president, questioned the legality of allowing a private organization, which discriminates against women, to use school property.


Trustee E.J. McClendon said a recent MASH publication included a legislative update which proved her reservations to be unfounded.

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



## Court rule won't affect area schools

A recent U.S. Supreme Court decision allowing teachers and administrators to spank students over parental objections will have no effect on area school districts' policies.

The court affirmed, without comment, a lower court decision allowing spankings as a last resort in the case of a sixth grade pupil in North Carolina. The student's mother had objected to this kind of discipline.

Districts including Livonia, Clarenceville, Wayne-Westland, Garden City, South Redford and Plymouth agree that corporal punishment is used, but only as a last resort.

**MOST ADMINISTRATORS** don't like to admit it, but corporal punishment is used at times.

"Human nature being what it is, it (padding) does happen," confessed Paul Johnson, Livonia deputy superintendent.

Livonia's policy recognizes that corporal punishment is a possibility, but it should be used only as a last resort. It must have a positive effect on the student's behavior and must not be done for punitive reasons, Johnson said.

Most often, a principal will administer a spanking in the presence of another adult, to insure that it is not extreme. Elementary school pupils are usually the only ones to feel the sting.

In Garden City, paddings are not administered to girls after the fourth grade because of their physical and psychological development, said Supt. Bracken Snow. Before resorting to padding, "a heck of a lot of common sense should be used," he added.

"I never touch a child," Wayne-Westland Supt. Timothy Dyer countered. "I don't think it's effective."

**ONE OF** the first steps taken by area districts in disciplining a student

is to call his parents and involve them in the decision.

Plymouth's code of conduct involves parents quickly and replaces the antiquated corporal punishment method, explained Supt. John Hoben.

Due process is allowed each student, said Hoben. The parents, principal, teacher and student are involved in the final action.

Snow also includes parents in any disciplinary action from a warning to suspension. "We only do what a normal, prudent parent would do," he said.

**JOHNSON CONSULTS** with parents if there is a major problem but feels most teachers can control normal misconduct through interpersonal relationships in the classroom.

The general Livonia policy is to find alternate means of discipline such as allowing students greater voice in determining rules of behavior or sending pupils to the principal or helping teacher, who is specifically employed to aid classroom teachers with discipline.

Livonia also has a committee, under the direction of the principal, for investigating the behavior of chronic misbehavers. Recommendations often include referral to a psychologist or social worker or a special room assignment for slow learners.

**JUST WHAT** is corporal punishment? Clarenceville Supt. David McDowell asks whether straightening a student in his seat might be considered physical punishment by some.

Occasionally, a parent will complain when a teacher grabs or restrains a student in the hall, Snow said. Even a tap on the head could upset some parents, he added.




They were carried to England, however, where they flourished for five or six centuries.

# Area UM-D staffers receive many honors

Five area educators at the University of Michigan-Dearborn (UM-D) have been chosen for national and international honors.

Dr. Donald Brown of Plymouth, UM-D's director of counseling, has been invited by the University of Malaya in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, to evaluate a dissertation on "Vocational Interests and Occupational Choices."

# Union contract signed at O&E

Press and composing room employees of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers have reached accord on a two-year contract with the company.

Representatives of Detroit Newspaper Printing and graphic Communication Union No. 13 ratified the contract with the O&E in late August and signed the document Oct. 17.

The contract calls for a 3.25 percent across-the-board wage increase for the 53 members of the bargaining unit during the first year of the contract. A wage reopener is included in the agreement for the second year of the pact.

Union employees at the company's Livonia plant remained on the job after expiration of the previous contract on June 30. Salary adjustments will be retroactive to that date.

Other additions to the contract include a dental care package, three additional sick and personal days, and modification of the grievance procedure.

The union represents workers in the company's Livonia composing and press room, and janitorial, maintenance and transportation department employees at the Livonia offices.

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# Esch backs suburbs on revenue sharing

Suburban officials this week are making a two-pronged effort to get an extension of the federal revenue sharing program.

After meeting Monday in Pontiac with some 80 persons from 38 Oakland County communities, U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) was scheduled to testify Nov. 6 before a House government operations subcommittee in support of extended revenue sharing.

Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy is coordinating efforts to get area officials to Washington Nov. 18 where they will rally and travel to Capitol Hill to buttonhole congressmen.

"THEY DEFINITELY feel it's been a successful program," said Esch after Monday's meeting.

"Revenue sharing has meant a minimum amount of paperwork—there are only two forms to fill out. It's a minimum amount of bureaucracy and a maximum amount of money spent—only 100 employees in the revenue sharing office of the Treasury Department to administer a \$30 billion program."

The reason for the hurry, Esch said, is that the congressional subcommittee isn't planning to act on revenue sharing until next spring. "But the local budget process goes on from January to April, so for predictability we need to pass revenue sharing in a timely fashion."

"Some people at the meeting said that with the federal deficit, we shouldn't be extending this. In the next year, we really do have to decide what's essential for the federal government to spend money on," Esch said. But he added that he was an original sponsor of the concept in 1972 and is co-sponsor of the bill (HR 3244) to extend it six more years.

MURPHY, in his first year as Oakland County executive, said revenue sharing has less than a 50-50 chance of passage in this Congress.

"Revenue sharing has become important to nearly every local government, particularly in southeast Michigan, which has been hit so hard by the recession."

Murphy said that since the program began, Oakland County government has received \$8.4 million, with about half (\$4.4 million) going to expand the Children's Village facility.

Other uses included: \$1.6 million to care for patients in hospitals or state institutions; \$600,000 for court-appointed attorneys to defend the poor; \$450,000 for juveniles under the county's care; and \$400,000 each for the medical examiner's office, Camp Oakland and drain projects.

Esch said local officials generally are using 60 per cent of their receipts for capital improvements and 40 per cent for operating expenses, much of that for law enforcement.

Elections for seven freshman representatives to the Student Senate at Schoolcraft College have been set for Nov. 13-14 and 17-19.


Qualifications include being a registered Schoolcraft student, having earned less than 26 hours of credit, and filing a nominating petition containing at least 30 registered student signatures.

According to election committee co-chairman Steve Akey, 11 petitions have been checked out, with five returned and approved.

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
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
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
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


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

# Local orchestras fill Detroit Symphony void

Metropolitan Detroit suffered serious blows to its prestige with the strike by Detroit Symphony Orchestra musicians, the charges of decline in quality, and the decision by maestro Aldo Ceccato to leave at the end of next season.

But a decline in metropolitan prestige is far different from a loss of musical offerings because there are many suburban orchestras to fill the void.

The five in the Observer & Eccentric area do have an occasional squawk in the brass section, or a whine in the strings, admittedly, but the overall truth is that their musical offerings are excellent. Many of their first chair performers are Detroit Symphony musicians; others are college and high school music instructors; others are just plain dedicated amateurs; and still others are students whose ability sometimes takes your breath away.

If you have been a Detroit Symphony fan who goes to the Ford Auditorium each week, you can pick a suburban symphony almost every weekend, get a ticket for the price of a first-run movie and park free. Consider:

The granddaddy of the bunch is the 30-year-old **Plymouth Symphony Orchestra**, whose next performance is Sunday, Nov. 9 at 4 p.m. in Plymouth Salem High's excellent auditorium. Director Wayne Dunlap does sophisticated programming designed to stretch one's mind without bogging it. The flute will be on center stage.

If you're shopping at Westland Center about 8:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 14, check out the **Westland Symphony Orchestra**, now in its fifth season. Michael Endres' five-year-old group has had a struggle to stay alive, but this year it's preparing four concerts. The composers will be familiar: Rimsky-Korsakov, Saint-Saens, Copland and Bernstein.

## An anti-secrecy bill with teeth

Not all the news coming out of Lansing is financially depressing. Now comes State Rep. Perry Bullard (D-Ann Arbor) with a refreshing House bill aimed at opening up the secret workings of government to the voter.

All public bodies of state and local government would be prohibited from holding any meetings in secret under the Bullard bill. That's refreshing, but here's what's really important:

Governmental bodies which persist in meeting secretly would be subject to criminal fines and civil penalties as well as having their decisions invalidated. At present, taxpayers groups and newsmen who seek to stop secrecy have to bear the expense of going to court, and there is no punishment for officials who hold secret meetings.

It's not enough to say, as some officials do, that city councils and school boards take their votes in public after the important decisions have been made behind closed doors.

We contend the public (1) has a right to know what options the board discussed, (2) who influenced the board in its discussions, (3) what other options the board considered, and (4) the reasons for the board's decision.

And we insist that the public be able to know what a board is contemplating **before** it acts, so the folks can squawk ahead of time, not just after the board makes expensive decisions.

Too many councilmen and trustees genuinely believe in secret meetings, which they euphemistically refer to as "executive sessions." It's time we got some sunshine into the proceedings of local government and passed an open meetings law with teeth.

### Sense And Nonsense

**THE FEDERAL** Paperwork Commission, created to cut down on federal paperwork, went into operation recently. To get started, it had to fill out 350 forms.

**THE U.S. POSTAL** Service announced that as of Oct. 11 there would no longer be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery. An announcement to that effect was received by the local post office and time-stamped Oct. 14—three days later. No doubt the announcement was mailed.

Newest orchestra is **West Bloomfield**, whose second concert will be Nov. 23 in the local high school. Conductor Felix Resnick programs traditional concert fare. He showed a lot of courage tackling Dvorak's "New World" symphony with a new orchestra last time out, but he pulled it off.

**Oakway Symphony**, in its third season, rotates between auditoriums in Birmingham, Southfield, Farmington and Livonia. Next program is Nov. 30 at 4 p.m. in Southfield-Lathrup High School with violinist Ida Kavafian performing Tchaikovsky. Conductor Frank DiBlasi is a crowd-pleaser with lots of theater music.

Struggling with financial problems, the **Redford Civic Symphony** still manages to keep going and is in its 28th year. Conductor John Gajec's orchestra emphasizes home-grown talent and will soon audition for soloists for the "family concert." Next regular concert will be Sunday, Dec. 14 at 3 p.m. in Redford Union High School. It performs four times a season, alternating between RUHS and Thurston High.

Mourn for the Detroit Symphony, if you wish, but don't stay home if you're a good music lover when orchestras like our local groups are performing.

## We need moratorium on new laws

President Ford, in discussing the impact of federal regulations on our economy, said, "Although most of today's regulations affecting business are well intentioned, their effect, whether designed to protect the environment or the consumer, often do more harm than good. They can stifle growth in our standard of living and contribute to inflations."

Dick Halladay, editor of the "Michigan Challenge," which is a magazine published by the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, was even more specific and I would like to share his remarks with you because they sum up the problem in a nutshell.

"The people who make our laws have a bottom-line responsibility for many of today's economic and social problems. They are the legislators who think their sole duty is to pass laws; the legislators who somehow feel that continuous, whirlwind lawmaking activity is akin to sexual potency—and that any indication of a slowdown may be misinterpreted by the folks back home as an appar-

ent loss of manhood. Or womanhood.

"But our legislators also have a responsibility not to make laws that result in pyramidal bureaucracies which are expensive, wasteful, unnecessary and often counter in action to what may originally have been a good intention.

"Sound advertising and promotion can persuade citizens to sample just about any product or service once. It can even get legislators elected, once. Although consumers can react quickly to faulty products and services by getting money back or by not repurchasing, voters are hamstrung when elected officials fail to live up to the advertised

promise. Citizens simply are stuck with them...for two, four or six years, during which time those same officials are busy trying to win favor with party leadership, jockeying for power positions to help perpetuate their jobs, and passing more and more laws that may be liked less and less by their constituents.

"Let's do something of lasting significance to celebrate our country's 200th birthday: let's declare a one-year moratorium on law-making, starting Jan. 1, 1976. Instead of wasting our collective energy and funds in the worship of Bicentennially-embossed plastic cups, \$1,850 sets of presidential miniatures, and less-than-memorable local celebrations, let's insist that our federal and state legislators use 1976 to honestly, objectively evaluate existing laws—with an eye toward actually legislating some laws out of existence. And, with them, some of the regulatory bureaucracies that are strangling American's free-enterprise system, and doing irreparable damage to the interests of Michigan citizens."

## N.Y. vs. U.S.: a way to compromise

agement, then New York State is to blame for allowing it.

The federal government is hardly to blame. Federal aid to states and local units has virtually exploded with the advent of revenue sharing in this decade.

**IF THERE'S ANY** "ripple" effect, it will be the message our governors and mayors will receive if the federal government does bail out New York City: You can spend to your hearts' content, fellows, and Uncle Sugar will pick up the pieces.

And yet it would be heartless to allow New York's services to fall apart and to rob its luckless creditors, so you can figure the friendly feder-

al government will help out somehow.

Wouldn't it be fair, then, to put a price on any federal aid? Wouldn't it be appropriate to make sure Mayor Abe Beame never again would go running to Capitol Hill threatening the rest of us with demonstrations if we didn't bail him out? In short, wouldn't it be gentlemanly and businesslike for the mayor, the comptroller and perhaps the head of the sanitation workers union (remember that wildcat strike?) to resign before the rest of us agree to pay their bills?

It's one thing for a city to spend itself into trouble. It's quite another for the leaders of that organization to prosper politically afterwards. New York should be helped by the federal government, but New Yorkers should be willing to do some kind of penance for their money-grabbing sins. Heads should roll, beginning with the mayor's.

## Road men get a lesson

Oakland County Executive Dan Murphy has come up with a plan to raise the vehicle license fee an average of \$7.50 per car. Twin objects: To finance rapid transit construction in this region, and to give county road commissions half the funds.

Wayne County's Tom O'Rourke, managing director of the road commission, says he may have to lay off 120 employees next year because of a shortage of funds.

**WHAT'S WRONG?** O'Rourke stated the case well for all 83 county road commissions: "People are just not buying as much gas as they did in past years, and consequently the state is not rebating as much money as we need for our operation.

"Last year (Wayne) county received about \$1.5 million less than the previous year, and this year we received \$1.5 million less than that. Next year we anticipate a reduction of \$2 million more.

"Meanwhile, the cost of maintaining county roads or building new ones is up 20 per cent."

**BEFORE PASSING** a bill to implement the Oakland plan, the Legislature should take another look at the whole notion of financing certain operations through so-called "user" fees. The scheme of "earmarking" taxes has proven faulty in other areas of government, and it's now proving to be faulty with our gasoline taxes, weight fees and roads.

In the Great Depression, Michigan chose to fi-

nance K-12 schools by earmarking two cents of the three-cent sales tax for education.

The trouble was that by 1960 the teachers' appetite for salary increases far exceeded the consumers' ability to purchase food, medicine, clothing and cars. Michigan wisely gave up the idea of earmarking taxes for education and left it up to the Legislature to allocate money for schools.

The result was a great infusion of state aid to local school districts. It didn't keep up with teachers' demands, of course, but it was better than two cents of the sales tax.

**COUNTY ROAD** commissions today are in just about the same fix education was in 15 years ago. Earmarking taxes just won't work.

Even the Oakland proposal to lift the vehicle tax has flaws. What, for example, is going to happen to that line of revenue when we're all driving VWs, Chevettes and Ponys?

Road needs are just like any other needs. A legislative body needs to weigh the need for roads, new and repaired, against the needs for police, schools, health facilities and the rest.

No longer can we afford the archaic system of saying that roads get X amount of dollars because a certain tax produces X amount of revenue.


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# Yes, some mind if you smoke

The straws are in the wind. For the past few months, indications have appeared all around us that the non-smoker is standing up and beginning to fight for his right to breathe clean air.

"Smoking will not be permitted at the meeting" read a sentence at the bottom of a small press release from the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council concerning an event in Plymouth.

No one noticed at the time, but it may have been a landmark statement.

Not long after, an attempt was taken to bring fresh air to Livonia school board meetings when Martin Seitz, then a trustee, asked for a smoking ban.

He said he wanted the board to set a good example and protect the health of the public. His motion was not passed.

However, the 100-member representative assembly of the Livonia Education Association (LEA) put in its support with a resolution in behalf of the non-smoker.

It decided that if someone objects to smoking at a school meeting in which LEA members are in attendance, it can be banned at that meeting.

IN LANSING, State Sen. Carl Purcell, who represents Redford Township, Livonia and Plymouth, introduced a resolution favoring lower insurance rates for non-smokers.

"I am convinced that non-smokers offer insurance companies lower risks in property and auto insurance as well as health insurance," he said.

The resolution is now with the Senate business committee. If it is well received, Purcell may introduce it in the Senate as a bill. If passed by both

houses of the legislature, non-smokers could begin to enjoy financial rewards for their healthy habits.

State Rep. John Markes, who represents Westland and Livonia, has also made a contribution to the writing of a Bill of Rights for non-smokers.

He introduced the first bill in Michigan regarding smoking. Having passed the House, it is now before the Senate health committee.

It would end smoking in any store where food for home consumption is the principal item sold.

"Merchants in the field endorsed the bill," said Markes. "Under its provision their insurance cost would go down, and savings will benefit both smokers and non-smokers. The only opposition to the bill came from the American tobacco industry."

**HOSPITALS ARE** in the thick of the fight to protect the lungs of non-smokers. Dr. Perry Stearns, director of the Wayne County department of health, has banned smoking from the county health center in Westland.

He gave employees the right to request that the no-smoking rule be observed in their work area. He also directed employees not to smoke in public view.

At the time he invoked these regulations, he pointed out that two-thirds of the U.S. adult population are non-smokers.

No cigarettes are sold on the premises of St. Mary Hospital in Livonia. Visitors can smoke only in the public lounges. Employees can only smoke in the cafeteria.

"We would like to eliminate it entirely," said Sister Mary Calasantia, president of the hospital. "It's not good to have smoke around patients."

**WHAT WORRIES HOSPITAL** ad-

ministrators and physicians particularly are the facts that have been emerging recently concerning the effect of cigaret smoke on non-smokers.

The famous report from the Surgeon General back in 1972 did not merely state that smoking is dangerous to the health of the smoker.

Less publicized was its claim that cigaret smoke endangers the health of the non-smoker. It maintained that after breathing this smoke, a non-smoker's blood and respiratory system contains as much if not more carbon monoxide as the smoker's.

The American Lung Association uses the terms, "sidestream and mainstream" to describe the situation. Sidestream is the smoke that wafts into the air from the burning end of the cigaret. Mainstream is the smoke that issues forth from the smoker's mouth.

"The fascinating fact," says the association, "is that sidestream smoke has higher concentrations of noxious compounds than the mainstream smoke inhaled by the smoker."

"Some studies show there is twice as much tar and nicotine in sidestream smoke compared to mainstream. There is three times as much of a compound called 34 benzpyrene, which is suspected as a cancer-causing agent; five times as much carbon monoxide, which robs the blood of oxygen, and 50 times as much ammonia."

**THE LUNG ASSOCIATION** points to evidence that there is more cadmium in sidestream smoke than in mainstream.

"Cadmium is now under investigation as one of the compounds in cigaret smoke that damages the air sacs of the lungs and causes emphysema," it adds. "Once cadmium gets into your lungs, it stays there."

With such information regularly appearing, non-smokers are beginning to organize. They already have a lobby—the American Lung Association and the Southeastern Michigan Council on Smoking and Health—and a telephone number, 963-3029, which individuals can use for information about smoking withdrawal clinics and general smoking information.

Who knows, soon they may be marching to a fight song. "Smoke Gets in Your Lungs," and exchanging secret handshakes with those whose fingers are unsoiled by nicotine.

**THE COUNCIL** on smoking and health has many suggestions for non-smokers who want to defend themselves.

It suggests they obtain and wear

council buttons which say "Your Smoking Hurts My Lungs" and "Yes, I Mind If You Smoke."

Be vocal, the council suggests. Express your feelings about smoking.

Be visual. Use no-smoking decals, bumper stickers and posters to reinforce your vocal objections.

Remove invitations to smoke, especially ashtrays.

Request passengers not to smoke in your car.

Along with RSVP on invitations add NSP—No Smoking, Please.

At work, ask management to provide smoke-free sections of the cafeteria and smoke-free restrooms.

In restaurants request seating away from smokers. If none is available, indicate your disapproval. Patronize res-

taurants that honor non-smokers' rights.

Encourage your physician and dentist to support non-smoking regulations in all health care facilities. Too many people have looked straight in the face of a patient with a readily apparent cough or asthmatic wheezing, and then lit up.

In the hospital, request a room with a non-smoker. Ask visitors to abstain. Put up signs to this effect.

Ask that there be no smoking at meetings. If this fails, pass around a sign mentioning that many suffer discomfort from smoke.

Write letters to supermarkets, department stores, legislators and the media urging no-smoking.

# Most Alices did on Doesn't Day

This roundup on Alice Doesn't Day is going to be short. In the western suburbs most Alices were doing rather than doesn'ting. The day planned by feminists to show the world how necessary women are was observed in few offices or schools. An occasional woman donned an arm band with the inscription "Alice Doesn't," which signified to the world her solidarity with the idea, but her inability to miss work. "There was so much going on in the

chapter that we didn't talk much about it, or emphasize it," said Jeanette Stark Shanks, president of the Northwest Wayne Chapter of the National Organization of Women. "We mainly decided to respond on an individual basis. I think the reluctance of our members to get involved was due to the vague generality of the issue, and because of the economic situation today. "If you've worked hard to secure a position, you don't want to endanger it with an action like this." Mrs. Shanks expressed the belief that if members of a woman's family help with household tasks on a regular basis and give her status, then it was not necessary for her to stop work to show how important she is. "But if that isn't happening, I feel the woman should stop work for the day," she continued. "That will point up real fast how much she is needed." Several chapter members observed AD Day by taking money from their savings accounts and depositing it in the First Federal Feminist Credit Union in Detroit, she said. "There is not much action out here," reported Jean Christensen, head of women's services at Schoolcraft College. One of the college's counselors, Sylvia Vukminovich, former president of the NOW chapter, was on a visit to Wayne Memorial High School that day and found no response there.

"I Does But My Alice Doesn't" was the enigmatic slogan worn on the coat of Bill Pate, director of the media center at Churchill High School, Livonia. "My Alice (Sue Kleino) is sitting here typing, working like a dog as usual," he reported. Elaine Didier, librarian at Plymouth-Canton High School, reported that some of the staff at the school had been interested in obtaining "Alice Doesn't" armbands, but had been unable to find any. Arlene Vanderleun of Westland, a member of the Mid-Western Wayne County Chapter of NOW had been planning to wear an armband. But she gave it up to her nine-year-old niece, Anne Marie Kubek, whose father runs a photography studio in Garden City. Anne Marie wanted to wear it to school. Yet while there was little overt observation of Alice Doesn't Day, many women made their feelings known in certain subtle ways. Clara Rousseau, administrative assistant to President C. Nelson Grote of Schoolcraft, planned NOT to make her husband's breakfast on AD Day. "But I forgot," she laughed. However, at least one secretary was reported to have refused to serve coffee to the men in her office. And female employees at an area bank, after making and enjoying their usual cup of coffee, poured what was left down the sink. The men had to make their own.

All lectures will be held in room 271 of the college located at 36600 Schoolcraft.



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



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
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# Symphony concert honors flutist

"I don't want a memorial concert to Nelson Hauenstein to be deadly or a dirge. He liked fun," says Wayne Dunlap, musical director of the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra.

The orchestra's concert at 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 9 is dedicated to Hauenstein, first chair flutist for nearly 25 years and an assistant dean of the University of Michigan School of Music until his death from cancer.

Cleon Chapin and other Hauenstein students will join guest conductor Emil Raab and the orchestra in the

auditorium of Plymouth Salem High School, Joy west of Canton Center roads.

"Nelson and his wife Louise were the backbone of the orchestra," said Dunlap, who first heard them in 1951. "There was a wholesome quality about the man. I liked his flute tone very much; it was a big tone. In this concert, I want to recall the efforts he made on behalf of the Plymouth Symphony."

Soloist Chapin, a U-M doctoral student, will be heard with the orchestra

in Griffes' "Poeme for Flute and Orchestra." An American composer is featured in each of Plymouth's six concerts this season.

Chapin, whom Dunlap described as "one of Nelson's last really good students," is now first flutist with the orchestra. His style is "French—lighter and more brilliant," said Dunlap, and a good match for the impressionistic style of Griffes.

All the former Hauenstein students who can be found will be mass soloists in Telemann's Suite in A Minor for Flute and Strings. "It's a piece that can accommodate two or 102 flutists. Baroque music is like that," said Dunlap.

The program will open with the suite from "Peleas and Melisande" by Faure, one of Hauenstein's favorite works. It will close with Brahms' first symphony, a giant work sometimes dubbed "the Tenth" because it

was worthy of Beethoven, who wrote nine symphonies.

Dunlap, recuperating from a mid-August heart attack, will attend the Nov. 9 concert. He is back part-time at his regular post as director of fine arts at Grand Valley State Colleges, Allendale.

Tickets are \$3.50 for adults at the door and \$1.75 for senior citizens. Admission is free to K-12 students.

Some memberships will also be sold, according to chairman Annette Heindryckx. Not only are memberships tax deductible, but they are cheaper than buying individual tickets. The Plymouth Symphony Society has 252 family memberships.

Society President Jane Moehle announced receipt of three boxes of musical scores spanning 200 years of American history. The gift came from the bicentennial committee of the JCPenney Co.

Livonia Franklin's 13-10 loss to city rival Stevenson early in the season just may turn out to be the key game if the Patriots do not make the state football playoffs this fall.

Franklin coach Armand Vigna and his players currently trail Birmingham Brother Rice in Class A Region II by a playoff point average of 110.5 to 97.13 and must not only beat tough Bentley Saturday, but hope Dearborn Divine Child beats Brother Rice in their Sunday Catholic League championship game.

Even then, it depends on what the opponents of Franklin and Rice do in their final season games to see who finally goes to the state playoffs in the complicated setup.

"We'll just have to wait and see," says Vigna on the eve of the Patriots' big season finale with arch-rival Bentley. "Hey, we've got to beat Bentley before we can even think about anything else and that's not going to be an easy chore," first-year head coach Vigna points out.

The Franklin-Bentley series has been one of the most dramatic and closest-fought battles anywhere. From 1963 to 1969, Franklin won four of seven games with four of them being decided by one point.

Franklin won 26-14 in 1972 and Bentley spoiled Franklin's perfect 1973 year when it upset the Patriots, 12-9. Then last year, Franklin's record again was 8-0 and Bentley 3-5 when the Bulldogs had a 7-7 halftime tie.

Glenn Goode's Bulldogs went ahead, 14-7, in the fourth quarter but Franklin moved 70 yards in 13 plays to tie it in the last minute, 14-all. Bentley scored in the first overtime but it was nullified by a penalty, and then when Franklin couldn't score in three plays, Dan Quinn kicked the deciding 20-yard field goal to win, 17-14.

"We're not kidding ourselves," Vigna says. "Bentley will give us the battle of our lives and we'll plan with that in mind."

Here's a rundown on the seven Friday and two Saturday games involving area teams.

FRIDAY, Nov. 7

Churchill at Stevenson, 8 p.m.





"I guess I just grew into liking it," she said, when revealing how she started.

"I was only eight months old when my father, who now is a coach at Highland Park High School, took me on his arms to see a football game. I've been a football follower all my life."

**TO PREPARE** for her present role, Sue studied under the Cramer course provided by the medical supply company and finished it in a week and a half.

"So far as we know," George Fefles, Bentley athletic director, stated, "she is the first girl in a trainer's role in the entire area."

When she volunteered we were a bit doubtful as to whether she would be accepted by the boys. But they have taken to her in great style and

she now is an important part of the program."

Sue works in a private room to do the taping and the boys must enter properly dressed. On game days she tapes the ankles of at least 15 players. And with the prospect of women's sports definitely on the rise, she is hopeful that there will be a place for her in college ranks.

Asked what her most difficult assignment has been, she quickly recalled that it was taping the ankle of Richard Cox, who had a badly sprained ankle that was placed in a cast. When the cast was removed, it became her responsibility to tape the ankle—and he now is coming along fine.

With the close of the football season, Sue is looking forward to a busy winter with the basketball teams where she will work with both boys and girls.

She has come a long way since looking at her first football game in her father's arms years ago.


Woodhaven was a distant third with 79 while Oak Park didn't have enough runners to qualify as a team.


rard Trujillo, who really came on strong the last part of the season as a runner.

Coach Heitman said Kavariak richly deserved the honor.

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


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## Dearborn captures Sub 8 cross country
