Crime in Canton continues to rise

Although figures are still sketchy for all of 1975, the general impression of police officers from the state police and the Wayne County Sheriff is that crime is on the rise in both Plymouth and Canton townships.

Information supplied by the City of Plymouth Police indicates the situation is not as bad in the city.

In Canton, still-incomplete state police reports show that significant rises in shoplifting, breakings and enterings (B&Es), rubber checks, and larcenies have been recorded.

In Plymouth Township, the same figures indicate a strong increase in B&Es, larcenies, and robberies.

In the city, Chief Tim Ford said the most obvious increase has been in assault cases, particularly aggravated assaults, and it caused him to comment, "I'm personally concerned with the evidence of increased violence we are experiencing in the city."

Figures available from the county were not yet broken down into the seven different communities the road patrol services, but for the entire group, arrests had risen from 3,997 to 4,506 in 1975.

COMPLAINTS RECORDED by the Sheriff's office reached an all-time high in 1975 at 48,671, up more than 700 over 1974 figures.

Sheriff's spokesmen said the in-

creases followed a trend for the last three years of an increase in complaints county-wide.

Complaints, however, are merely entries onto the police log and should not be regarded entirely as criminal activity, Sheriff's spokesmen explained. They include phony calls, and minor traffic violations.

Perhaps most significant, was the number of arrests registered in Canton and Plymouth townships in 1975. Road patrol officers arrested 358 suspects in Canton in 1975, compared to 228 in 1974, while in Plymouth Township, the figure rose from 119 in 1974 to 140.

The greatest single rise in county figures were in armed robberies and Inspector Richard Page commented, "Continued high unemployment and a rapid population in Plymouth and Canton are primarily responsible for the increase in crime."

Service from the county remained the same for 1975, with 28 men assigned to the road patrol, which covers Huron, Brownstown, Northville, Sumpter, and Van Buren townships, aside from Plymouth and Canton.

STATE POLICE coverage was beefed up in Plymouth and Canton this year when the Detroit post quit supplying men for patrolling I-96, and in turn transferred the officers to the Plymouth post.

Forty men now operate out of Plymouth, which puts anywhere from one car at night to five cars on the road during high crime hours.

"We have more manpower here now," explained Sergeant Darrell Hasler, "but I don't think the higher figures are a reflection of that. Of course the more time you spend, and the more men you have, the more activity you'll find."

The city, however, operated with less men in 1975. "We were short for most of the year and we had to do a real balancing act to maintain our level of community service while operating two men short," said Chief Ford.

Chamber gets CETA money

Money coming from the federal government via Wayne County to the Canton Chamber of Commerce may have a big effect on membership of and services provided by the chamber in 1976.

"I feel the department did a remarkable job."

Overall, Ford said the crime rate was not high in Plymouth for 1975, but added that it has never been.

Assaults rose from 59 in 1974 to 75 in 1975, while aggravated assault more than doubled, going from 28 to 59.

Only two of the aggravated assault cases involved guns, the rest involved knives, beer bottles, tire irons or baseball bats—"whatever was available."

"A LOT STEMMED from bar incidents or were between spouses," explained Ford. Most were in the privacy of the home under the protection of the constitution, and involved persons related to each other or who know each other."

Burglaries were up 34 cases over the 100 recorded in 1974, but four involved multiple burglaries from office buildings where more than one office was burglarized. Ford said if those were discounted, the total figure would have been under 100.

Larcenies, drug arrests, and personal injury traffic accidents were down in 1975, while drunkenness cases soared 50 per cent from 25 in 1974 to 38 in 1975.

Ford noted that next year there will be no arrest for drunkenness because of a change in state law. At that time, police will perform a taxi cab service and just take the offender home.

While drug arrests were down, Ford said the problem has not been reduced. Drug trafficking in the city involved more hard stuff, and many cases were jointly investigated by state and federal authorities.

IN CANTON, the greatest rise in crime, according to state figures, involved shoplifting.

Trooper Michael Garrison, who works for the state crime prevention bureau, attributed the rise to the greater number of stores in Canton, particularly KMart and Meijers.

While reported rape cases handled by the state stayed about the same in

Report due shortly

Disaster contingency plans readied

Procedures for handling natural disasters are expected to be drawn up in a couple of months. Then the procedures will be presented for approval to the Canton Township Board of Trustees.

The civil defense committee, chaired by Trustee Gerald Cheske, has been meeting for about a month now to establish a set of procedures to be followed in case of disaster.

Other members of the committee are Fire Chief Mel Paulin, vice-chairman, DPW Supt. Jake Dingeldey, and John Longridge of 7521 Pronvinal. Longridge, a Ford Motor Co. employe, worked in civil defense during the five years he spent with the U.S. Army.

AMONG THE recommendations

will be location of a command center and alternate center to be used in case of a disasters such as blizzards, tornados, large fires, or an evacuation such as the one prompted in 1975 by the C&O train derailment.

The committee is putting together a list of equipment needed by Canton to complement a civil defense operation, and is listing the equipment Canton already has and exactly where it is and should be, and how the equipment should be used.

The four men also are compiling a list of persons who could be called upon in case of emergencies. When asked if this manpower would include the township firefighters, auxiliary police officers being formed, and DPW employes, Cheske commented:

"We probably would rely on the auxiliary officers but the firefighters, in case of almost any disaster, already would be on the scene at work. We are putting together a list of people who could be called on to supplement the fire department."

THE COMMITTEE also has been to the federal supply warehouse in Lansing which stocks, among other items, surplus equipment from the military.

The committee was "shopping" for equipment Canton needs and might be able to obtain at reasonable prices, such as a generator.

Among the recommendations to be made will be that the township supervisor would be the person to take charge in case of disaster.

"Money is an important factor now," Cheske said. "We'd like to have, of course, a fulltime paid civil defense director but that's not possible. Eventually, we would like to have appointed a fulltime civil defense director who would serve on a volunteer basis. Somebody who would

be in Canton most of the time and could be relied upon.

"Such a volunteer director would be valuable in coordinating civil defense procedures and activities. He would, of course, be answerable to the supervisor and township board.

"Right now, except for Chief Paulin, no one knows the procedures which should be followed in case of disaster. That's why the committee has been formed."

Cheske added that the committee is checking with Wayne County into the possibility of Canton receiving federal financial support. "It's possible we might get federal money to buy some equipment—maybe something like an alert alarm system."

Before submitting its report to the township board, the committee hopes to have a list of persons it could call upon, such as heavy equipment drivers. It also hopes to specify buildings in Canton which could be used for emergency shelter or to house equipment.

Bands to offer variety show

PERFORMING will be the 92-member symphony band, 94-member concert band, 67-member varsity band, 18-member stage band and 190-member marching band.

"Variety is..." is a family-type show which attempts to provide something for everybody. Besides the performances of the bands, individual acts have become a prominent part of the two-hour show.

This year, for the first time, one of the band parents will be a featured performer. James Mortensen, father of Jim who is trombonist in the symphony band, will resurrect his ventriloquist act that put him through college.

Student acts will include Bill Sweeney, Diane Harder, David Messacar and Fred Nelson in a jazz version of Bach. Freshman Bill Heiney, trombonist in the concert and marching bands, will present his latest feats of magical illusions.

Seniors Gene Whitlock, Barbara Kirby and Lee Ladd will be featured in a skit entitled "Humaning Around" from Planet of the Apes. Two take-offs on Bob and Ray TV commercials will be presented by Bill Collins, Tom Smith and Gary Seiber. Master of ceremonies will be senior David Messacar.

Kerhl will bequeath gifts to community

The will of Floyd A. Kerhl was filed for probate in Judge Frank S. Szymanski's court early last week. The Plymouth banker and philanthropist died Nov. 5, 1975, leaving an estate estimated at between \$1.75 million and \$2 million.

Among the beneficiaries named by Kerhl were: Huron Valley Humane Society, \$2,500; Detroit Humane Society, \$2,500; Plymouth Salvation Army, \$5,000; First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, \$20,000, and the Northville

Historical Society, \$10,000, and Anti-Cruelty Association of Detroit, \$2,500. Schoolcraft College in Livonia will receive \$100,000 to establish student aid fund to be known as the Floyd A. and Shirley Kerhl Student Aid Fund.

DR. NELSON GROTE, president of the college said this would be the largest single gift in the history of the college. Kerhl had served on the Schoolcraft Board of Trustees. He had contributed the distinctive Schoolcraft

tower and, later, a Christmas lighting display for the tower.

In 1972 graduation ceremonies at the college, Kerhl received an honorary associate degree of applied science.

"We are delighted that Floyd remembered Schoolcraft," Grote said, adding that the board would be pleased to comply with his request.

Lt. Dallas Raby said it was standard policy of the Salvation Army to designate a bequest of this type to cap-

ital improvements. He added that perhaps now they would be able to complete surfacing their parking lot, a project which had been stopped when they ran out of funds.

Raby said several projects for improvement had been just in the thinking stage and they would have to decide which had top priority.

THE REV. PHILIP MAGEE of First Presbyterian Church said, "It was typical of Floyd Kerhl in remembering a church which he attended

but was not a member." He added, "We are also grateful for his past consistently generous contributions."

He said it was way too early to say what would be done with the bequest, but he was certain it would not be used for current expenses.

After provisions for family and friends, Kehrl asked that the residue and remainder go to Alma College with the stipulation that a main building on the campus be named after him.

Guile Graham, vice president in charge of institutional relations at Alma, said, "Mr. Kerhl had been a friend of the college for some time."

"We appreciate what he did in his lifetime and in his estate plans to provide for the continuing needs of education for young people in Michigan."

Kerhl's widow, Marian Kerhl, estimates that after taxes, the bequest to the private Presbyterian college would be about \$500,000.

Hudson series to be hardbound

A compilation of Sam Hudson's Plymouth Past and Present columns, which have appeared in the Plymouth and Canton Observer & Eccentric newspapers, soon will be available under one cover.

The hardcover book is at the publishers and Hudson told members of the Plymouth Historical Society that Jimmy the Greek was making book that the historical museum and his publication would be ready at about the same time.

Besides the O&E columns, the book will contain 27 full pages of illustrations—many never before published. Hudson said the chapters are arranged in chronological order and the index facilitates finding references to people and events.

The first chapter describes the years 1820-35.

"The stories of the early settlers are not speculation," said Hudson. "These are eye-witness accounts."

THE 12 CHAPTERS deal with: Underground railroad activities; a stroll through the village in 1867, the year Plymouth was incorporated; the forming of the WCTU; economic development and Henry Ford's close association with the community.

He describes the rise and fall of the Alter car, the railroads, and the fall fairs. Chapter Six covers 1900 through

the '20s—Carrie Nation's visit and the prohibition era.

Following chapters tell of the depression days of the '30s, the '40s with the infamous recall, the forming of churches, schools, the symphony orchestra, historical society, and service clubs.

The final chapter is an assessment and conclusion.

Hudson said although he was an English major and has always been a history buff, he had not planned to write a history of the Plymouth area. He was launched on his career as historian during the planning of the 1967 Plymouth centennial celebration. Hudson suggested a book containing the history of the area was needed. He was appointed to write the book.

"MY ORIGINAL plan was to complete it in one year," he said.

He sent out a plea for old photographs of the area, expecting to receive a few dozen. The response was unexpected—he soon had more than 500 pictures.

At that time Hudson was going to school, working fulltime, and working on his doctorate. "The book was sort of put on the back burner" until he began to receive calls asking, "When can I get my pictures back?"

The decision was made to compile a pictorial history. The Plymouth Rotary Club advanced \$2,500 to have it published and the Historical Society sold it.

The original pictorial history will be reprinted soon with the addition of five years of progress in the city.

Hudson recalled that work on the manuscript progressed slowly. He spent hours interviewing and reading. He gained a wealth of information from Karl Starkweather, Coella Hamilton, Romeo Woods, Carl Shearer, Davis Halmer and Sidney Strong.

He also named as valuable sources: Norma Cassidy, Frank Arlen, Cass Hough, George Burr, Clara Todd, Clarence Stephens, Elizabeth McDonald,

Walter Even, Clyde Smith, Ezra Rotnour and Frank Henderson.

Ernie Henry, Perry Richwine, Gladys Tillotson, Jack Wilcox, Hanna Strasen and Fred Beitner added to the lore of Plymouth history.

A CONVERSATION at the Detroit Press Club with Philip Power, publisher of the Observer newspapers, opened a new avenue of thought on writing the book.

Power suggested Hudson do a series

of columns for this newspaper. The columns later could be compiled and published in book form. The copyrighted column was immensely popular with the readers. Since that meeting, 83 of Hudson's Past and Present articles have been published.

Hudson thanked the members of the Historical Society for their help in gleaming information for his history. The society is sponsoring the publication as one of its bicentennial projects.

Baker off and running

Deane Baker, owner of the Plymouth Hilton Inn and a University of Michigan regent, has officially announced his Republican candidacy for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Philip Hart (D-Michigan).

In making the announcement, Baker says he hopes to attract the independent voter and members of both political parties who want strong lead-

ership in "facing profound challenges and magnificent opportunities in the years ahead."

"Change is America's destiny and we must live with it," Baker added. "A changing society cannot have all its decisions made in a central place without grievous hurt to the individual and society. The decision-making process has become more concentrated in

our federal government and must, once again, be disbursed to the people."

Baker commented: "I'm not a politician but a problem-solver, an independent businessman who for 20 years has worked solving complicated problems, building factories, erecting housing, creating jobs, as well as working to solve local social problems. It is this problem-solving experience which I present to the people of Michigan as an alternative to the politicians who have failed us."

Since January 1975, Baker has campaigned in Michigan, traveling more than 15,000 miles to build a base of support before making the official announcement.

Baker is president of The Deane Baker Co. which builds office, industrial, commercial and warehouse buildings. He is president of The Plymouth Hilton Inn Corp. of Plymouth.

In 1972 Baker was elected to the eight-member U-M Board of Regents, receiving more than 1 1/2 million votes in a statewide election. Earlier, from 1969-72, he served on the board of control of Grand Valley State College.

He has an MBA from Harvard Graduate School of Business and a BBA from University of Wisconsin. He served as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force from 1943-45 and from 1951-53.

Baker was considered by the Republican State Central Committee as a candidate for U.S. Senate in 1970 before Lenore Romeny received the GOP's preferred designation.

He has been active in Republican Party affairs since 1960, including serving as chairman of the 2nd Congressional District Milliken campaign committee. He lives in Ann Arbor.

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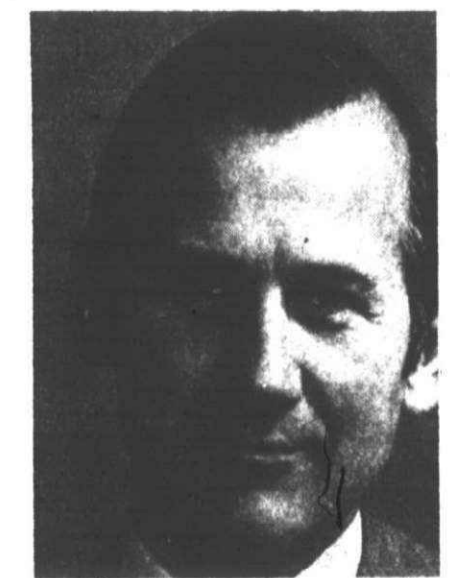

Resident starts firm

Here's a visionary approach to blind dates

Remember blind dates? Remember how the date was always described beforehand as possessing a "wonderful personality"?

There's a new Southfield dating service that apparently thinks there are enough dissatisfied blind daters in the Detroit metropolitan area to warrant a new approach to the dating service game.

Video-Mate, which originated in New York, has located its Southwestern Michigan-area home in South-

field's Northland Square Building on Northland Drive.

The firm uses video tape and television in matching partners and its slogan is, needless to say, "the end to the blind date."

"We're not out to get people married," said Video-Mate director Robert Culver, a Plymouth resident. "We're simply an organization aimed at improving our clients' social lives. We feel people should fill up and enjoy their weekends and social schedules."

Video-Mate works on a more personalized basis than most other dating services, according to its directors.

A typical applicant at Video-Mate would first come in and fill out a short questionnaire regarding their own lifestyle and the lifestyle they would like their "ideal partner" to have.

THE SELF-ASSESSMENT and personality profile probes into categories of appearance, marital status, occupation, religion, income, interests, hobbies, personality characteristics and

how one feels about dating relationships.

A professionally-trained Video-Mate interviewer then reviews the finished questionnaire and prepares the applicant for the video taping session.

This is where Video-Mate differs from most similar services. Most services attempt to match an applicant with a mate regarding his personality profile. Video-Mate furnishes a tape of the applicant discussing interests on a closed-circuit television.

Throughout the taping session, the interviewer asks the applicant various questions while the video tape recorder records the applicant's answers as well as mannerisms. Thus, an applicant of the opposite sex can actually see their prospective date's mannerisms, hear the voice and in the end know that "what they see is what they get."

Clients do not get to see the taped interviews of all applicants of the opposite sex. Applicants are initially

screened by interviewers regarding likes and dislikes.

After the initial screening an applicant gets to watch the taped interview of a prospective date who fits into his preference profile. In turn the prospective date can watch the taped interview of the other applicant.

IF BOTH AGREE to meet each other, the prospective date becomes a reality.

"A client is never forced to date any of the people he or she has previewed in a tape...it is all on a voluntary basis. If the agreement does not work out, then both names are kept on file for six months and within that time given a date, or the money is refunded," said Linda Cooper, one of three of the firm's directors.

The third director and owner, Stephen Scheerhorn, 28, of Northville agrees with Ms. Cooper, 25, and Culver, 30, that the main problem in the Video-Mate system is the public's perception of the firm's dating program. Ms. Cooper said, "People tend to

think of all dating services as a fly-by-night hoax that attracts weirdos and strange people and many computer dating programs are...but Video-Mate is a licensed, non-risky, personalized service to very normal people who are tired of awkward glares and the insecurity of standing in a singles bar."

According to the firm's directors, 50 per cent of Video-Mate's clientele are divorced and most are professionals ranging from 25-35 years old. The owners add that Video-Mate's clientele is comprised of 55 per cent men and 45 per cent women.

ALTHOUGH THE program does not guarantee a successful date, Culver stated that the firm hasn't had any complaints since their first day of business, Dec. 1.

Culver said, "More than being thought of as an end to the blind date, we consider ourselves an introduction service; sort of a middle-man bringing those people together who mentally and physically belong together."

Blunk voted leader of '76 Fall Festival

Those attending the annual meeting of the Plymouth Community Fall Festival Jan. 7 received the news that the 1975 Fall Festival generated total sales of \$120,650.

The sales income generated was a record for the Festival—up from last year's receipts of \$110,000. The 1975 receipts would have been even higher, if rain hadn't greatly reduced receipts for the fish dinner sponsored by the Plymouth Lions Club.

At the annual meeting, besides the financial report, the Festival committee elected officers and directors for the 1976 Fall Festival and heard commendations from Martin for the coming year.

ELECTED PRESIDENT of the 1976 Fall Festival was Doug Blunk of the Colonial Kiwanis Club of Plymouth. Blunk operates Blunk's Inc.—a carpet retail store in Old Village.

Scott Dodge, Plymouth attorney, Robert Richardson, a member of the Plymouth Lions, employed by Burroughs Corp. in Plymouth, and a member of Plymouth Township Clerk Glen Richardson, was selected second vice-president.

Elected to the Festival board of directors were: Paul Campbell and Gene Kalifa for one-year terms; Norman Kee, Elaine Kirchgatter and Robert Bake for two-year terms; Betty Ginds, Sandra Davis, Ron South for three-year terms expiring in 1978; and

Martin as an ex-officio member.

In 1975, Martin reports, some 32 organizations participated in the Festival with \$49,270 net income returned to the community through the various groups. The total Fall Festival board expenses were \$21,740.

Improvements in the 1975 Festival included: a new electrical system; addition of two booths; mobile home furnished for managers' office and phone; walkie-talkies for managers; expansion of booths to Fralick Street; old cars on Penniman; arts and craft and antique show largest ever; increased security patrol at night; improved trash removal; more entertainment than ever; and the most participants of any Fall Festival.

Items which the Fall Festival board assumed responsibility for include: electrical service to all booths and service areas; trash removal; chairs and tables; booths and serving areas; publicity for all participants; toilet facilities; fulltime manager and assistant; free entertainment on all four days of Festival; tents; and all awards.

DURING 1975 the Festival Board held 16 meetings and had 97 per cent of all board members in attendance.

After all 1975 expenses were met, the Festival financial statements show a balance \$25.45 for 1976. Among the major expense items were: capital improvements, \$6,924; publicity, \$2,110; entertainment, \$1,745; manager's salaries, \$2,500; chair and table rental, almost \$1,800; insurance, \$1,125; labor, \$2,800.

The dates set for the 1976 Fall Festival are Sept. 9, 10, 11, 12.

Among the suggestions being considered for this year's Festival are: increase the application fee from \$15 to \$25; paint the serving line and ticket booths; provide identification badges for all board members to wear during Festival; establish a firm deadline for application submission; consider more "game type" booths; seek an organization to sponsor the vegetable tent; establish the Fall Festival Bugler as the symbol on all awards; obtain entertainment in the bicentennial theme.

The general manager for the 1976 Festival will again be Ed Page, director of special education for the Plymouth Community School District.

The Plymouth Rotary Club with its chicken barbecue was the organization with the number one sales volume in 1975—some \$48,600.

Other organizations with large sales volumes were: the Plymouth Business and Professional Women, \$6,200 from its German dinner; Kiwanis Club of Plymouth, \$5,750 with its pancake supper; Nativity of Our Blessed Virgin Mary of Plymouth, \$5,100 with its Greek food sales; the Plymouth Lions, \$4,850 with its fish dinner; Plymouth Symphony League, \$4,665 from its antique mart; and the Plymouth Grange, \$3,200 in receipts from its hot lunches, home baked goods, hot doughnuts, and flea market.

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Schools to decide on educational goals

Goals for schools can be many and varied. The Plymouth Community School District's Board of Education sat down in the summer of 1975 and agreed on 24 goals for education here.

As representatives of the residents in the PCSD, the board is responsible for deciding what kinds of programs will be offered in our schools. Programs are chosen which lead to the stated goals.

The PEPSII (Plymouth Evaluation and Planning System for Improving Instruction) measures progress toward objectives that are part of the goals.

ALTHOUGH THE board of education is elected and accountable, the members need assurance that the community understands and agrees with the goals they have adopted.

It is helpful to know how parents evaluate present programs in light of the goals and which goals residents see as most important.

Parents and any other interested persons are invited to rate the PCSD goals at meetings on Jan. 13, 14: Details of these meetings to be announced separately.

The questions to be answered are: Do you agree with the goal? How well are the schools meeting this goal?

Input is wanted on school goals

Input from residents is being sought on local goals for education in the Plymouth Community School District.

For that reason, two special hearings have been scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 13, and Wednesday, Jan. 14, for Plymouth and Canton residents to express their opinions on the goals of the school district.

The district wants to know if residents understand the goals set, if they agree with them, and if residents feel the schools are meeting these goals.

"For the sake of convenience, the two sessions are being held at 12 different elementary schools in the district so residents can attend a meeting in a neighborhood school. But the sessions are for parents of high school students and interested residents, not just for parents of elementary pupils," stresses Florence Beier, com-

How would you rank these goals according to importance?

THESE ARE the 24 goals of the school district and board of education members as ranked by trustees in July 1975:

- Board and administration will pilot the Plymouth Evaluation and Planning System for Improving Instruction (PEPSII): Employs working toward specific objectives, which reflect system-wide or instructional level goals as well as others unique to the individual.

- Self-worth: Responding to each person's need to develop a positive self-image within his or her own heritage and the total society.

- Equality of educational opportunity: Structuring all activities and processes to provide equal educational opportunity for all and to eliminate institutional oppression of any group, where it exists. Must also provide for an educational environment conducive to learning. All aspects of the school program should recognize all groups and accommodate diverse values of our society.

- Citizenship and social responsibility: Development of mature and responsible citizens with consideration for social justice and equal rights. Learning experiences should involve students from different social, religious, economic and ethnic groups.

- Creative, constructive and critical thinking: Learning to solve new problems by thinking and acting in an independent, self-building and responsible manner.

- Social skills and understanding: Understanding of value systems, cultures, customs, and history with an appreciation of human differences; understanding and acting responsibly on current social issues, participation in society and government, and seeking a society where every person has equal access to lawful goals. Each person must learn to develop and maintain effective interpersonal relationships.

- Basic skills: Assurance of the best possible individual mastery of: Comprehension through reading and listening, communication through writing and speaking, mathematical operations and concepts, and identification, consideration, solution of problems.

- Physical and mental well-being: Good health and safety habits and an understanding of the conditions necessary for physical and mental well-being.

- Preparation for family life: Understanding and responsiveness to the needs and responsibilities of family life by cooperation among school, parents, and community.

- Preschool education: Cooperation with parents and other agencies to provide preschool experiences for children as part of their total development.

- Parental participation: Involving parents in the educational development of their children and encouraging them to meet their responsibilities in this regard.

- Community participation: Using community resources and making these resources available to the community.

- Occupational skills: Development of marketable skills to help students reach their goals.

- Sciences, arts and humanities: Enrichment of personal values and approach to living by experiences in natural sciences, social sciences, humanities, and creative and fine arts.

- Allocation of financial resources: Publicly financed education must be maintained at acceptable levels in all communities, but a school district should be able to raise money for quality education.

- Education of the exceptional person: Providing for the special educational needs of the academically talented and those who are considered physically, mentally or emotionally handicapped. Procedures shouldn't penalize minority or low socio-economic status children and should facilitate movement into and out of special classes.

- Environmental quality: Appreciation, maintenance, protection, and im-

provement of the physical environment.

- Economic understanding: Critical understanding by all students of their role as producers and consumers of goods and services and the principles involved.

- Continuing education: Encouraging every individual to take advantage of educational opportunities beyond formal schooling.

- Rights and responsibilities of students: Recognition and protection of

the individual and legal rights of students as people and as citizens, regardless of race, religion or economic status. Together with these rights, students must accept responsibilities and disciplines essential to society, including corresponding rights of others.

- Career preparation: Helping each individual select and prepare for a career through evaluation of progress and aptitudes and counseling on alternatives. Each individual should be exposed to the adult working world.

- Morality: Development of youth

as citizens who have respect for themselves, for others, and for the law.

- Preparation for a changing society: Responsiveness to an ever-changing social, economic and political environment, both here and throughout the world, and an appreciation of the possibilities for continuing self-development.

- Education of the non-English speaking person: Students whose native tongue isn't English should be helped to retain their own language while developing fluency in English.

NOTICE OF MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION INQUIRY AND PUBLIC HEARINGS INTO CENTRAL METERING AND RESELLING OF GAS AND ELECTRIC SERVICE

CENTRALLY METERED GAS OR ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS AND RESELLING CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY AND THE DETROIT EDISON COMPANY

AND TO

ULTIMATE CONSUMERS; TENANTS; MOBILE HOME OWNERS; CONDOMINIUM OWNERS; ASSOCIATIONS OF MOBILE HOME OWNERS, MOBILE HOME PARK OWNERS, CONDOMINIUM OWNERS, LANDLORDS AND TENANTS; GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES AND OTHERS WHO MAY BE INTERESTED OR THINK THEY WOULD BE AFFECTED

On December 8, 1975, in Case No. U-4985, the Michigan Public Service Commission initiated a general inquiry into the regulations and procedures of gas and electric utilities pertaining to centrally metered customers, including reselling customers, and to provide for appropriate service standards and rate classifications for centrally metered gas and electric utility service.

The Commission desires to fully explore problems and complaints associated with centrally metered and resale service to apartments, condominiums, cooperatives or mobile home parks, including problems with rates, from the standpoint of the reselling or centrally metered customer of the utility, the ultimate consumer of the gas or electric service, and utilities. The Commission is interested in developing equitable and workable standards, rules and regulatory policies related to these matters.

Phase I of the inquiry is for soliciting comments and submissions about these problems from the public. Phase II will consider data which the Commission has required utilities to file, submissions by parties intervening in the proceedings pursuant to Commission rules, and recommendations by the Commission's Staff. Phase III will cover proposed remedies for problems considered in Phases I and II as applicable to individual utilities.

PHASE I PUBLIC HEARINGS WILL BE HELD:

- (1) On the Orchard Ridge Campus, Oakland County Community College, "J" Building, Room 293, 27055 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills on January 22, 1976 commencing at 1:30 PM and 7:30 PM.
- (2) In the 1st floor auditorium of the Law Building at 525 W. Ottawa Street in Lansing on January 26, 1976 commencing at 1:30 PM and 7:30 PM.
- (3) In the City Council Chambers, City Hall, 1101 South Saginaw, Flint, on January 27, 1976 commencing at 1:30 PM and 7:30 PM.
- (4) In the City Council Chambers, 9th Floor, City Hall, 300 Monroe Street, NW, Grand Rapids, on January 28, 1976 commencing at 1:30 PM and 7:30 PM.

At Phase I public hearings the Commission is interested in receiving submissions or comments limited solely to the following subjects:

1. The appropriate rate under which service should be rendered to centrally metered customers where the ultimate consumption is for residential use.

Note: This would concern the rate charged by the utility for service to apartments, condominiums, cooperatives, or mobile home parks where gas or electricity is either included in the rent as an incident of tenancy or is resold by the landlord, association or park owner to the tenants.

2. Problems related to requirements that reselling customers sell utility service to ultimate consumers at the same rate applicable to customers of the same class who are direct customers of the utilities.

Note: Reselling customers who sell to residential users are generally required to resell at the utility's residential rates and reselling customers who resell to commercial users at the utility's commercial rates.

3. The revenue impacts on utilities of any revision of current rate patterns for centrally metered or resale service.

Note: A utility's rates to all of its customers generally assume the continuation of established rate patterns. Changing one rate may require changes to others.

4. Problems related to enforcement by utilities of standards of service requirements on reselling customers which are conditions of service to such customers.

Note: Primarily, enforcement of service standards is presently limited to discontinuance of service to landlords which would result in loss of service to tenants.

5. Means of providing for continuity of service to tenants of reselling customers where a reselling customer may be in violation of Commission rule, Commission-approved utility rule or the Michigan Gas Safety Code.

Note: Tenant service continuity problems and possible financial consequences to utilities in case of abandonment of utility service distribution systems by centrally metered or reselling customers.

6. It has been suggested by the Commission Staff that all resale service be prohibited in

the future and that all existing resale customers (landlords, associations, park owners, etc) be required to agree to uniform service, billing, customer relations, meter testing and auditing standards as a condition to continuing as a resale customer. Further, some landlords or park owners may, for financial reasons or due to enforcement action, seek to abandon service to their tenants, jeopardizing the tenants' gas or electric service, or expect the utilities to bear the cost of making repairs, replacements or improvements necessary to serve tenants directly.

7. Rights and obligations of reselling customers and their tenants and extent of Commission jurisdiction, if any, related thereto.

Note: Primarily concerned here is the question of extending the Commission's Consumer Standards and Billing Practices, which are available to a utility's residential customers, to the reselling customer's tenants.

PHASE II PUBLIC HEARINGS

The Commission has determined that the utilities shall file certain information with it to aid in its general inquiry. This information is scheduled to be filed on January 30, 1976, and a public hearing to receive and cross-examine this evidence and testimony is scheduled in Lansing at the Commission's offices in the Law Building at 525 W. Ottawa for 9:30 AM on February 17, 1976. Further hearing dates will be scheduled by the presiding Administrative Law Judge as necessary.

Persons, other than the utilities and the Commission Staff, who wish to participate in the Phase II public hearings as a formal intervenor pursuant to Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure of the Commission should file with the Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 at least five (5) days prior to February 17, 1976, an original and twelve (12) copies of a petition to intervene conforming to the requirements of Rule 11. A copy should also be mailed (First Class) to Consumers Power Company, Legal Department, 212 West Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201; and to The Detroit Edison Company, Legal Department, 2000 Second Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48226.

PHASE III PUBLIC HEARINGS

It may be necessary for the Commission to hold evidentiary or administrative-type hearings for the purpose of adopting rules, regulations, service standards or rate changes as a result of the determinations made by the Commission in Phases I and II. These would be the subject of a separate notice and future hearings.

Copies of the order of the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4985 can be obtained from the Public Service Commission's Executive Secretary, 5th Floor Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 and are available for inspection at Consumers Power Company's Division offices in the cities of Alma, Battle Creek, Bay City, Pontiac, Flint, Grand Rapids, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Muskegon, Saginaw, Traverse City, East Detroit, Royal Oak and Livonia; and are also available at Detroit Edison's Division offices.

The Michigan Public Service Commission emphasizes that it has formed no conclusions relative to the issues raised in its order initiating this inquiry. The final outcome of the inquiry will result from the relevant evidence presented to the Commission in its full and complete record as possible.

'Hidden feelings' is MACLD topic

If the initials MACLD mean nothing to you, that might be good reason to attend the Jan. 21 meeting of the Plymouth-Northville Chapter of the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities (MACLD).

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Pioneer Middle School, 46081 Ann Arbor Road.

Dr. Aza Brown, director of the interdisciplinary learning disabilities program at Wayne State University, will speak about the "Behavior Considerations of the LD Child."

"We as members of the MACLD are perplexed that parents and the community of Plymouth are still unaware of MACLD and its benefits," comments Patsy Rollins of Oregon Trail, Plymouth.

"The MACLD is an organization dedicated to finding and helping the child with 'hidden' feelings.

"The child with such handicaps is essentially normal in all aspects save one—his learning performance doesn't measure up to his learning capabilities as tested by the schools."

The MACLD is an organization of parents and professionals who are interested primarily in the child who is normal but who has trouble learning by conventional methods.

"MACLD can offer support, information, programs, literature and a voice in obtaining for your child what he needs as an individual," explains Mrs. Rollins. "MACLD can inform you of your rights. We can participate with you in just demands of your school in

final okay on the money.

"The funds come through the county," explained Ms. Willis, but it is distributed by the Communities United For Action organization located in Taylor. Now for the first time we can hire someone fulltime in the office."

BETWEEN HIRING someone else to look for new members and assist old ones, rent and office supplies, most of the chamber's money will be used up and Berg said all chamber functions would have to be self-supporting.

"It's not a matter of choice," he explained, "all outside projects will have to support themselves."

Among those expected in the coming year will be the dinner-dance scheduled for Jan. 17, and the spring trade fair.

Steps also have been taken to make the monthly newsletter self-sufficient by selling advertising space in it.

Although the CETA grant only lasts through June, it is expected the grant will be renewed for the rest of the year.

"We had hoped to increase membership to 125 this year," said Berg, "but with a director, it's possible we could go as high as 150. That's what we're hoping for."

The chamber presently has 90 members, an increase of 65 over at the end of 1974, and a dramatic rise over the 24 that were members when Berg took over in June 1974.

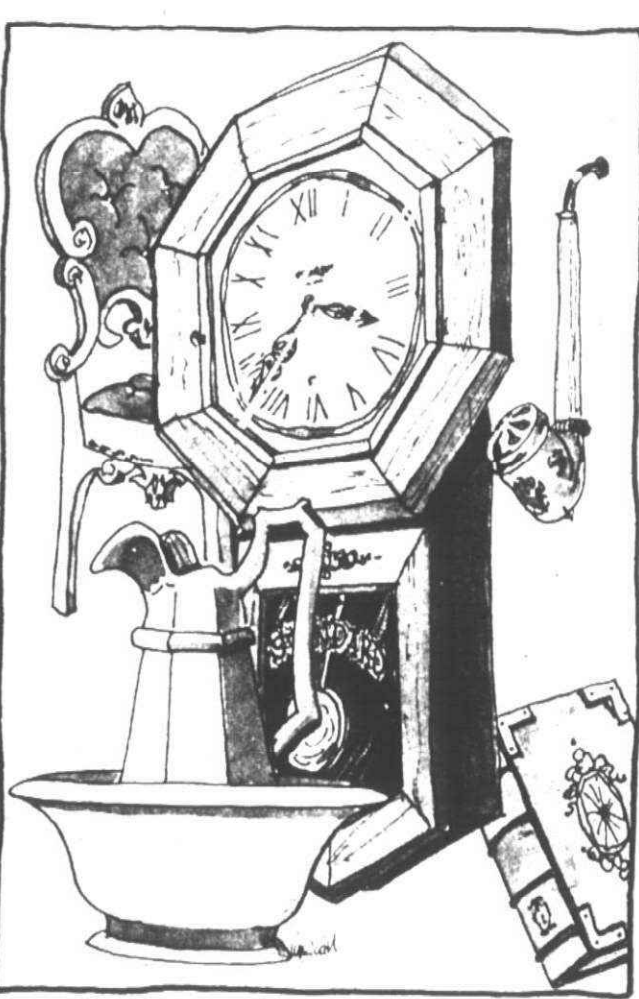

Rock grapplers nip Trenton

Plymouth Salem grapplers broke a long losing skein against Trenton Thursday night in stunning fashion as heavyweight Dave Kolb pulled free of his opponent to take a 3-1 decision to give the Rocks a 26-24 victory over the Trojans.

Surprising Chiefs walk over Mott, 68-61

"I think we bring out the best qualities when we play a team," commented Waterford Mott coach Ray Robinson minutes before his encounter with the Plymouth Canton Chiefs.

Ironically, it was Plymouth Canton who jumped into an early lead and never trailed the rest of the way, defeating Mott, 68-61.

Canton played ball control offense in the first quarter, taking only eight shots but sinking five of the attempts. Mott also hit on five field goals in the opening stanza, but the difference was the Corsairs defense, which committed seven fouls.

Waterford's foul-plagued defense set the pattern early and Canton would benefit from those errors by shooting 37 free throws in the contest, including four technicals.

Leading 18-11 after the first quarter, Canton padded its margin when Mott turned cold, making only one of their next 11 field goal attempts. Canton outscored Mott 14-2 in the following four minutes to hold an eventual 35-23 halftime lead.

Both clubs kept turnovers to a minimum, as the Chiefs canned 10 of 17 shots from the floor adding 15 free throws to control the play in the first half.

Canton coach Casey Cavell employed a three guard offense, utilizing Tom Close, Rob Mandle, and Keith Osborne. This combination produced a hefty balanced amount of scoring, as Mandle led with 20, Close totaled 19 with four technical foul conversions and Osborne chipped in with 18 and leading the club in rebounds with 11.

Mott's shooting during the opening moments of the third session was

to cut the deficit to 51-39 at end of the quarter.

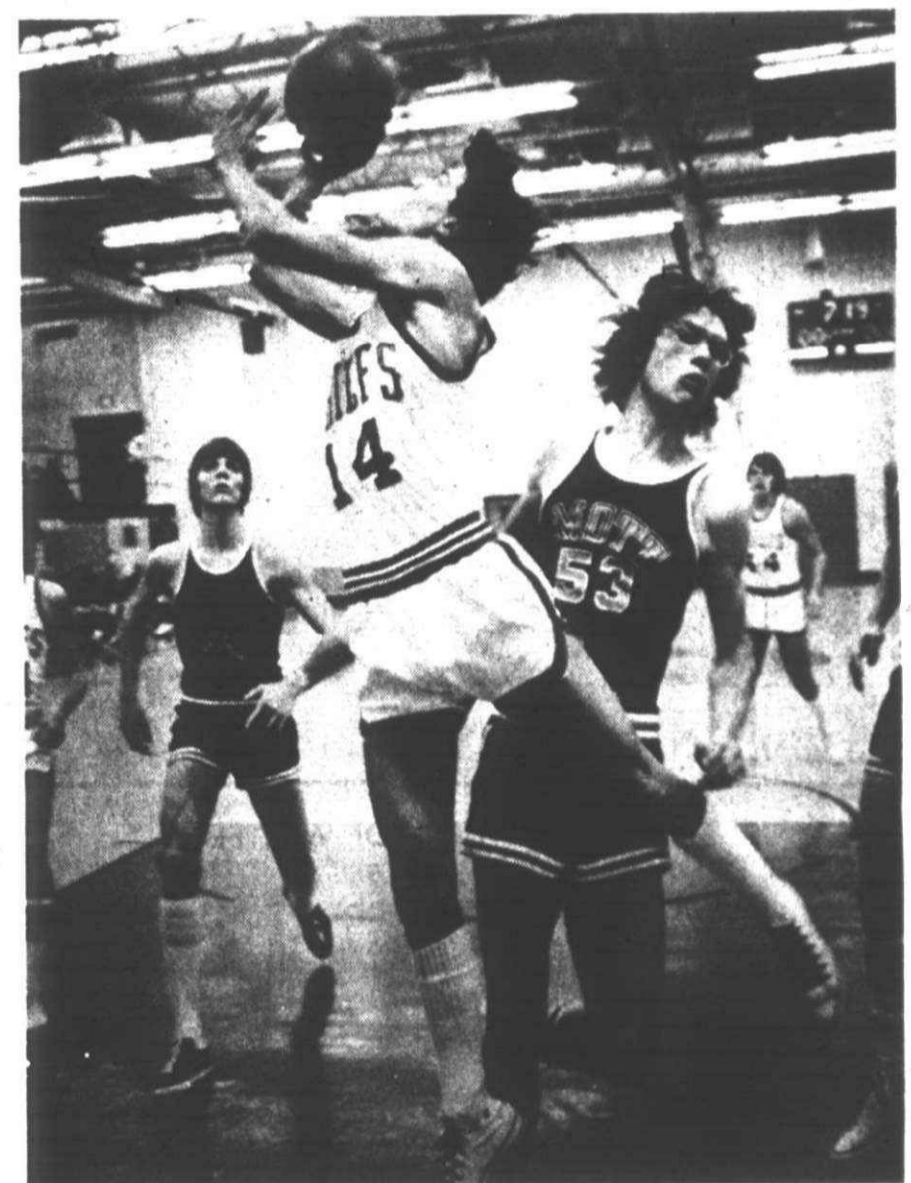
The Corsairs didn't let up, scoring the first two buckets of the fourth quarter and hitting a free throw when Steve Salyer fouled out for Canton.

Trailing by seven, Mott drew a technical foul. This one was charged to forward Dave Bair for defensive interference.

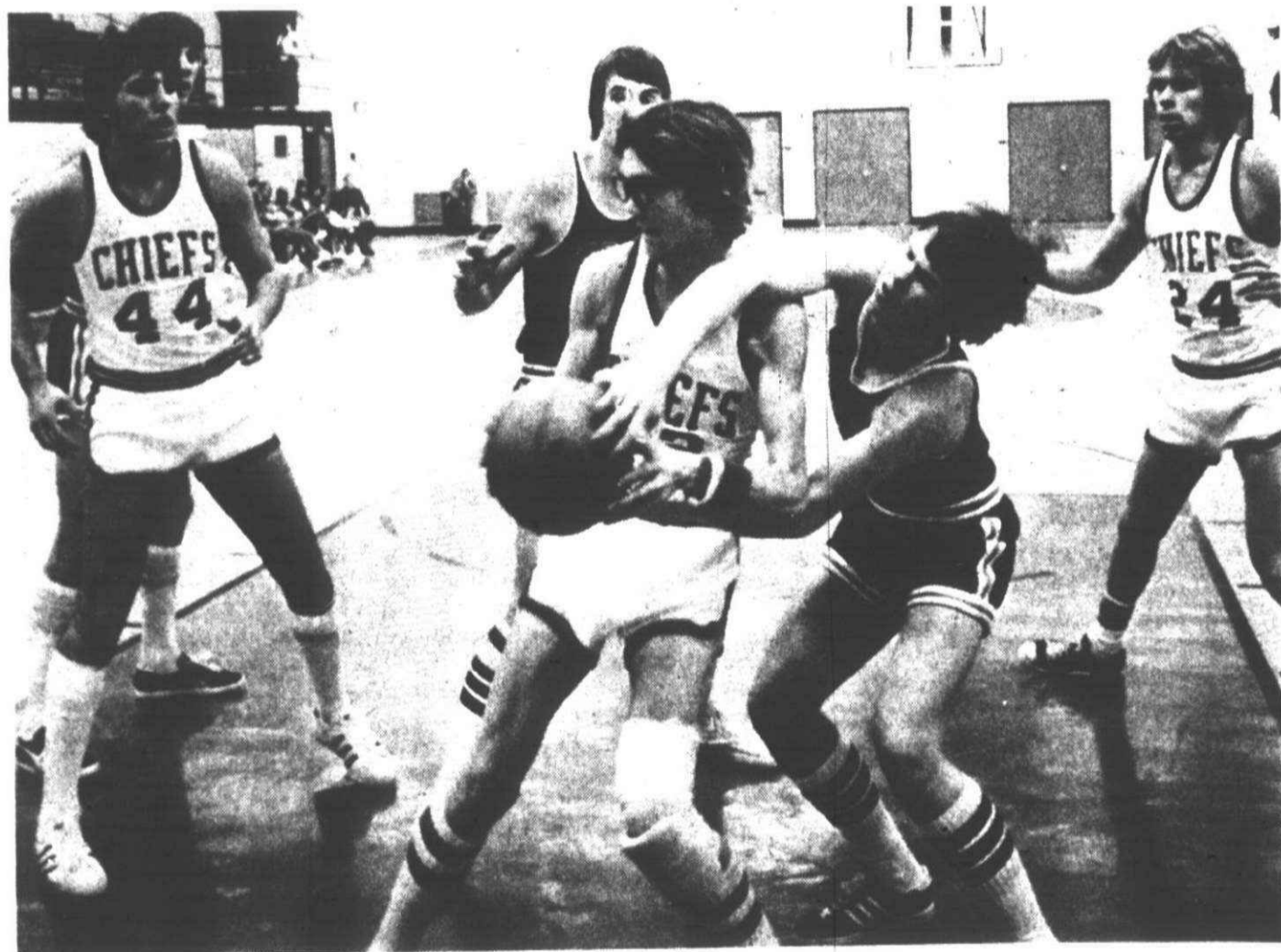

It's close, but Rocks win

State-ranked Plymouth Salem overcame its No. 1 basketball hex by winning for the first time in three seasons on the Belleville High School court Friday, whipping the Tigers 70-65 despite a typically frenzied fourth quarter rally by the home club.

Beaten only once previously in seven starts, Coach Tom Niemi's Tigers went after the Rocks tooth and nail from the opening tipoff and the lead changed hands 11 times in the first quarter alone before Salem edged in front, 19-18.

With Plymouth's all-state prospect, 6-8 Jim Ellinghausen, notching 25 of his night's 37 points in the first half, Salem was out in front at the intermission, 39-31.

Then, with five players sharing the scoring load, the Rocks posted an 18-11 third quarter advantage for a 15-point lead at 57-42 when suddenly Belleville's Dennis Easley, Kevin Barnes and Narvell Turner started making like the Harlem Globetrotters and scared the pants off the unbeaten Rocks in the final stanza.

Ellinghausen again was unstop-

pable, making 17 of 23 shots from the floor from every possible angle whether in close or long range.

Despite 21-3 and 22-3 records the last two campaigns, the Rocks had not been able to solve the mystery of winning at Belleville in either season. Friday's satisfying reversal of that tide boosted Salem's overall record this winter to 9-0, and kept the Rocks in first place in the Suburban Eight at 4-0.

Brian Wolcott with 10 points was Plymouth's only scorer in double figures besides Ellinghausen.

Their hot hands in the fourth period pushed four of the Tigers into double digits, Turner ending with 20 points, Easley getting 13, Jim Thompkins, 12, and Barnes, 10.

Salem outshot Belleville from the floor, 33 field goals to 27, and it was well that the Rocks did for they had only five chances at the free throw line all night in a fast paced physical battle that saw the officials let combatants go at it as though they were trading eye for eye and tooth for tooth.

Tom Ellinghausen, Mark Gothard, Chris DeBear and Bruce Gerish were the only Plymouth substitutes who got into the game to spell starters Jim Ellinghausen, Wolcott, Howard Inch, Bob Evans and Mike Primeau, an indication itself of the intensity of the battle in a season which often has seen Coach Fred Thomann clear his bench.

"Every one of them did exactly the job he was supposed to do and we couldn't have won it otherwise," said Thomann. "Primeau was just super in the way he handled Easley defensively, and Evans did a magnificent job in battling Thompkins on the boards."

Rebounding was almost a standoff, the Rocks holding a 21-20 edge paced by 12 grabs by Jim Ellinghausen.

In the key third quarter Wolcott, Inch, Primeau and both of the Ellinghausen brothers all put points on the board. Then, when things started to go their way for the quick-handed, ball-hawking Tigers in the final few minutes, again it was Primeau and the two Ellinghausens who kept peppering away to give the Rocks all the points they needed for victory No. 9.

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Trenton, Ford, RU win in Sub eight

Salem's big win over Belleville Friday night kept them atop the heap in the Suburban Eight, with the Rocks' next big test coming up Tuesday against a strong Edsel Ford team.

Ford mowed down the winless Bulldogs in overtime, 83-77, to even its record at 2-2. Bentley coach Larry Jackson, still searching for that first victory, came close, pushing Ford into overtime before losing.

In other league action, Redford evened its record at 2-2 by dumping Allen Park, also 2-2, and second-place Trenton at 3-1 knocked off Dearborn, 48-42, now 1-3.

Belleville, following its loss to the Rocks Friday night, is also in the middle of the pack with a 2-2 mark in league action.

Ford-Bentley

A gallant comeback, in which Livonia Bentley erased a 20-point deficit midway through the third period to force an overtime, fell just a little short of a Cinderella finish, as Dearborn Edsel Ford dumped the Bulldogs Friday night in basketball action, 83-77.

Edsel Ford led all the way, by as many as 16 points in the first half and by 20 in the third quarter. Bentley kept plugging away, however, which paid dividends during the final period when the Dearbornites cooled off considerably and the Bulldogs picked up momentum.

"In the overtime," said Bentley coach Larry Jackson, "we had some shots but they didn't go. They hit some free throws and that was it."

In spite of the defeat, Jackson said he was pleased by the effort turned in by his charges. "This is the best we have played so far. Maybe we're coming around the corner now."

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

Kerhl's generous example is a precedent to follow

There was a depression song that said "the rich get richer, the poor get poorer," and that is particularly true among colleges. The private Ivy League schools and the giants like the University of Michigan are always at the top of the list of those receiving gifts and bequests.

And so it was more than an act of generosity when Floyd A. Kerhl's will provided \$100,000 for Schoolcraft College. There was a lesson for all of us.

U-M literature always said that gifts from alumni and private citizens provided the "vital margin" that made the school great. Well, some folks believe Schoolcraft, a two-year community college teaching both the academics and trades, deserves its own vital margin. Floyd Kerhl was such a believer.

The money will establish a student aid fund to be known as the Floyd A. and Shirley Kerhl Student Aid Fund. The bequest is particularly noteworthy today because of the unfortunate possibility the college may have to raise tuition.

College President C. Nelson Grote called the Plymouth banker's bequest the largest single gift the college has received in its history. Before his death last Nov. 5, Kerhl had also given the college its distinctive bell tower and a Christmas-season lighting display.

Kerhl's will must go through probate, and in time the Schoolcraft board of trustees will gratefully accept the fund and issue the appropriate thank-yous to the survivors.

The moral of the story, however, is that Floyd Kerhl provided more than money—he provided an example for everyone. You can't live forever. You will leave your wealth, large or small, to someone. Let Schoolcraft College be among those someones.

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IT'S ONLY AN ANIMAL

Dying in a steel-jaw, leghold trap. An animal that feels pain much like we do. Imagine having your fingers crushed in a car door. Nobody opens the door for 24 hours. That's what happens in a steel-jaw trap. Less than half the states have laws requiring trappers to even check traps every 24 hours. No one has cared much. *It's only an animal.*

Every winter millions of fox, lynx, raccoons, minks, otters, muskrats, beavers, badgers, bobcats, skunks, and other animals suffer in these primitive traps. Why? Because humans think fur coats are "glamorous and chic." **There is nothing glamorous about being clamped in a trap for hours or even days, exposed to the weather, without food or water, in pain and fear, waiting for the trapper and death.** Some even chew or wring off their toes or paws to escape. But then, *they're only animals.*

This trap hasn't changed much since the days early fur traders and mountain men used it to nearly wipe out the beaver in this country. That was well over 100 years ago. Today trapping is a sport... a hobby... a recreation. Few people trap for survival. The reasons have changed but the trap has not. The pain and suffering it has inflicted on wild animals over the years is impossible to comprehend. Still, little has been done about more humane traps. *Again, the victims are only animals.*

It is time to change, time to stop making excuses for this needless suffering. It is time to outlaw the steel-jaw trap.

It is the only decent thing to do—for the animals. Please help.

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The Stroller... Job training at last

At the breakfast table the other morning The Stroller couldn't help smiling as he read in the public prints that the trend in education during the coming year would be more toward vocational training than on the current system of stressing degrees in the institutions of higher learning.

He had to smile because this trend was a long time coming. As he read the plans he recalled that it was more than a half century ago that the pioneer work on this type of program was started in his little home town of Catawauqua, Pa., in the foothills of the mountains.

It was a novel idea at the time but much needed. Few fellows in his class came from families that could afford sending a boy to college. As a result they were tossed into the work force right after graduation with little preparation for the future.

The lone fault with the pioneer program was the fact that lack of funds (an old story with schools) prevented the pioneers from installing the type of equipment and machinery that would start a boy on the way to learning a trade.

Instead they furnished nothing more than lumber of all shapes and sizes, along with saws and the nails needed in building anything made of wood.

THIS WAS FINE. We went to work making benches, cabinets, table and chairs, but there is a limit to what a family can use. More than that not

every boy wanted to be a carpenter. It would have been a great world if the schools turned out nothing but carpenters.

So, the program faded in interest and the boys in The Stroller's class turned to other trades.

The Stroller, in dire need of work to help support a widowed mother and four sisters, turned to the machinist trade and enrolled at the Atlas Cement Co, then the largest plant of its kind in the world.

It was a harrowing experience. The first six months he did nothing but take a hammer and chisel in hand and chip the rough edges off the teeth of cast iron gears. He still carries some of the scars from the times his aim wasn't too good and he hit his hand instead of the chisel.

It wasn't the type of job a young fellow would care for, but after a year on the floor, The Stroller was graduated to the machines. He took his turn at the lathes, boring mills, planers, etc., until he became quite adept by the time his apprenticeship ended.

Through a friendly teacher and guide he was sent around to the various shops to pick up experience. This sort of training took him to the plant that made horseshoes, of all things, the foundries where the tubes were made for the Hudson tunnel in New York and finally to the Bethlehem Steel Works where he worked on the machining of English guns during the war years.

ALL THE WHILE The Stroller seemed to be climbing in stature as a machinist he was developing a hatred for the muck and grease of the shops—even after he had made night superintendent.

Then came the moment when his entire career changed. It was an unforgettable moment.

It was in the wee hours of the morning just before the sun was beginning to rise, when one of the machinists, wearing a rather dejected look, walked into the office and said, in a whisper, "I have just spoiled that job."

It was a 40-foot piece of nickel steel. He had fallen asleep and the cutting tool cut a huge groove in it that couldn't be repaired.

The piece was to have been shipped in the morning and The Stroller knew there would be quite a fuss. So, after he calmed down the unfortunate fellow who fell asleep, he returned to his little office, packed his tools in his well-worn chest, opened the window and tossed the entire collection into the Lehigh River, with a vow that he never again would enter a machine shop.

And he never has. For better or worse he turned to journalism and has had the pleasure of writing these pieces for years.

Had there been a good system of vocational training in school instead of trying to make carpenters of all of us, there is no telling what might have happened.

Response given on aides

As a volunteer mother at East Elementary School, I couldn't help but respond to some of the statements of M. Robbins published in the Dec. 15 edition.

Robbins asserted: "I have in the past voted on millage, but in the future I will think twice. Why? Because in our schools they want too many parent volunteers...I have four children in Plymouth Schools and they are being cheated by being taught by inexperienced mothers instead of so-called paid teachers."

The letter infers that "education" is solely the responsibility of the school district. However, the Plymouth Community School District has realized that to genuinely educate the total child there must be a shared commitment between the school and the home. Volunteers in the classrooms are concrete evidence that many parents are willing to acknowledge such a commitment.

Moreover, classroom involvement provides the opportunity for parents to understand how their children interact with others and adapt to particular educational programs. It enables us as parents to make intelligent decisions for our children based on reason rather than emotion.

Additionally, M. Robbins ignores an important point about the volunteers. These volunteers are a reference to be properly used by the teachers. **But the teacher as a professional must supervise the volunteers and bear the ul-**

timinate responsibility for the classroom. Also I believe it takes a teacher who is secure both as a person and as a professional to welcome parent volunteers into the classroom and appropriately utilize them.

Rather than school officials being

castigated for their efforts to help our children, the Plymouth Community School District should be commended for its healthy attitude toward education and community participation.

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Huron River sewerage still debated by WRC

What to do about Huron River water quality will again come before the Michigan Water Resources Commission when it meets Jan. 22 in the Delta Township hall near Lansing.

The solution is uncertain, said William Bradford, assistant chief of water development services for the state.

At November and December WRC meetings, the hall was crowded with Wayne and Washtenaw counties representatives and construction tradesmen protesting a proposed WRC moratorium on sewer construction. The moratorium would halt all further development along the Huron River shoreline until the issue is resolved.

Tradesmen, badly hurt by the recession, are anxious to see hundreds of millions of federal dollars flowing into the construction industry.

Local officials have been unable to reach agreement on a joint wastewater treatment plan required by state and federal law.

Wayne County Road Commission officials argue in favor of a large "super sewer" that would handle all treatment in a plant at the mouth of the Huron, on Lake Erie.

Washtenaw officials, however, prefer upgrading and expanding localized facilities, fearing the Huron could run nearly dry in a drought if all wastewater were pumped to the river's mouth.

A REMINDER TO ice fishermen: Get that license.

The price is \$5.25 this year, up a couple of dollars. We've heard some gripes about the price, but it's still a lot cheaper than other states. Montana, for one, sells licenses for \$1—a day!

Ice covers most lakes, but you have to be careful just the same on lakes with currents. A buddy of ours found nine inches of ice near shore, walked out to the middle where there was a current, and promptly fell through. We saved him but lost a \$10 auger.

SOME LOCAL folks will have leading roles at the "winter conference" of the Michigan Recreation and Park Association in Lansing Jan. 18-21.

U.S. Rep. James O'Hara (D-Utica), whose 12th district includes part of



the Rochester area, will be the speaker at the Monday breakfast, and Sen. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) will be on the issues forum Monday afternoon.

Donald Richards, manager of Rochester-Utica State Recreation Area, will be on a panel discussing "Park Vandalism" Monday afternoon.

YOU GET USED to ice on city streets, which tends to be flat, but ice on country lanes can be more treacherous. Wherever you drive, though, you have to realize that snow and ice increase your auto's stopping distance six to 12 times.

Pump the brakes with firm, fast strokes to prevent skidding. Don't push in and hold the brakes.

Steer in the direction your car is skidding.

And when climbing a hill, don't try to keep the same, steady forward speed; keep traction, even if it means slowing a little. So advises the friendly Traffic Safety Association.

HERE'S ONE to make your tongue hang out. Robert Sladick of Ludington was on Hamlin Lake in Mason County when he caught a 32-pound, 49-inch tiger muskie. It's a new state record.

A tiger muskie, by the way, is a hybrid between the northern pike and muskellunge. The hybrid doesn't spawn well, but it eats voraciously, grows to keeper size faster and consumes more little fish—good qualities in a lake with many stunted panfish.

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Canton is a housing leader in western Wayne County

Canton Township, alone among western Wayne County communities, continued to be a leader in new housing construction in the seven-county southeast Michigan region, according to building permit figures for the first half of 1975.

Canton ranked fourth in housing statistics compiled by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. Canton has consistently been in the top 10 for several years.

Detroit ranked second in the region in number of building permits issued, but when demolitions are figured in, that city suffered a net loss of more than 2,000 housing units.

Here is a rundown of Observer & Eccentric area housing starts for the first six months of 1975:

Canton—384 single-family houses, minus 11 demolitions, for a net addition of 373 new housing units.

Garden City—nine new single-family houses, six demolitions, a net addition of three.

Livonia—64 single-family houses, 19 demolitions, net addition of 45 units.

City of Plymouth—two new single-family houses, four demolitions, net loss of two units.

Plymouth Township—29 new single-family houses, 19 demolitions, net addition of 10 units.

Redford Township—six new single-family houses, two demolitions, net addition of four units.

Westland—30 new single-family houses, two demolitions, net addition of 28 units.

Inkster had an unusual showing. By adding 300 multiples, it was one of the top ranking communities.

For the region, the top 10 communities in issuance of building permits for the first half of 1975 were: Sterling

Heights (498), Detroit (394), Troy (391), Canton (384), Harrison Township (315), Inkster (302), Farmington

Hills (243), Clinton Township (209), West Bloomfield Township (154) and Novi (143).

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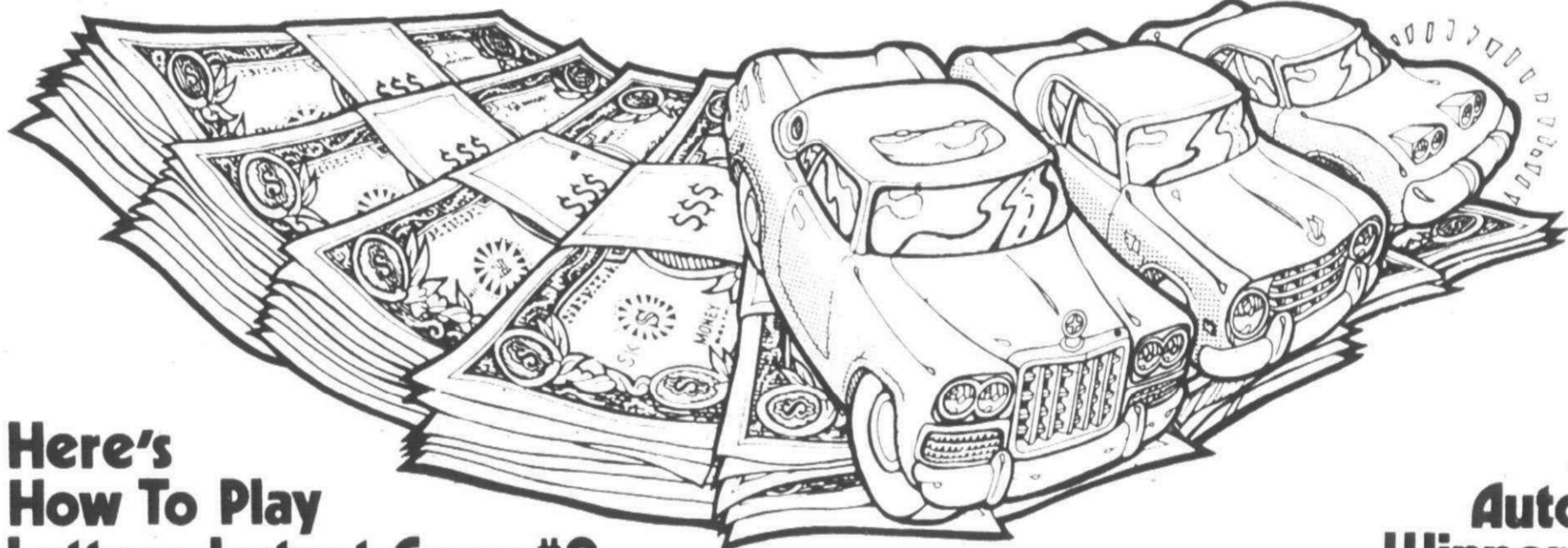

The great time robbery — or — Waiting at the gates for Chessie

As we enter the last quarter of the 20th century, braced to contend with future shock and the inevitable changes that will precede the year 2000, one thing remains constant. Those who live or work in the Plymouth community will have time to pause and reflect as the C&O goes lumbering by.

The romance of railroading is part of the American heritage.

What better time than this bicentennial year to share the lore of the rails with the youngsters in the car, a captive audience.

Children never tire of tales of buffalo and Indians on the plains, and the thrill of pounding that golden spike as the Atlantic and Pacific were joined by gleaming rails.

Parents, especially fathers, need not be reminded that this is an excellent opportunity to teach by example. Maintaining a jolly, relaxed attitude is imperative. Untoward impatience could be reflected in the children's vocabulary and result in biases against brakemen, engineers and trains which would carry into adulthood.

Better to join the kids in a game of Waito designed by Observer & Eccentric artist Glenn Merillat.

Ms. Merillat lives in Plymouth and drives to the O&E plant in Livonia every day. She claims that with a three-locomotive train, the whole card may be filled. Car rules prevail as to whether or not the center square is free.

OVERPASS? UNDERPASS?

The possibility of an overpass or underpass to solve Main Street stoppages does not loom in the immediate future.

After more than two years of construction, the Middle Belt underpass between Schoolcraft and Plymouth roads opened recently.

Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara said, "The improvement was first considered a Livonia-only project but was ultimately accepted as being eligible for federal funds with the government

finally paying half of the \$3.1 million contract.

But it wasn't easy to get the money from Washington, the mayor said. It was a question of reading the fine print in federal guidelines.

"The federal regulations indicated that such monies as we requested could be used only for work on intersections," he said.

"However, we noted that the word 'bottleneck' also appeared in the guidelines and we felt that if any street in the city was creating a bottleneck, it was Middle Belt.

"Our request for an interpretation was acted upon favorably" and the government then agreed to pay \$1.6 million for the project."

THE CITY put up \$1.1 million with the county road commission paying \$326,000 and the C&O Railroad spending \$100,000.

"Without the donation of property by Kroger Co., the Ford Motor Co., Cadillac Division of General Motors, and attorney George Haggerty, owner of the Detroit Race Course, the project would have cost the city a great deal more.

There are about 400 companies in Livonia's industrial corridor. They contribute some 52 per cent of the tax revenues, cutting the homeowners' share to 48 per cent.

"Not only does the industrial area contribute millions in spendable income, it also has created an estimated 30,000 jobs," said McNamara.

Middle Belt was widened from four lanes to seven, and the four companies the mayor mentioned donated the property for the expansion.

MAIN STREET is not a county road, and although the term "bottleneck" could be applied to stoppages, it is not on the same scale as Middle Belt with its race course and major industrial-plant traffic.

The C&O would be required to pay only 15 per cent of the cost of an underpass or overpass, or, on a federal project, just five per cent.

The new Kresge warehouse in Canton Township is the latest example of

the railroad's attracting industry to the area.

According to C&O Supt. James Ward, 20 cars each day will serve the warehouse.

The Sheldon Road Ford and Western Electric plants are here because of the C&O.

Taxes paid last year to the City of Plymouth by the Chessie system amounted to \$2,373.12. This was on four parcels of land owned by C&O and leased. Right-of-ways and other holdings are tax-free.

Maintenance costs for roadbeds and the eight crossings in the city—Farmer, Main, Lilley, Mill, Ann Arbor Trail, Starkweather, York and Sheldon—were \$5,020 for outside contractors and \$4,240 for materials.

Right-of-way maintenance costs totaled \$118,121; outside contractors, \$7,660; railroad labor (six trackmen, two inspectors, two equipment operators) \$81,821; and materials, \$19,380.

Ward points to the benefit in taxes and jobs provided by the industries which the C&O brought to the area.

WATCH-WATCHERS

Sometimes the only way to relieve the frustration of one more lengthy holdup at the tracks is to file a complaint.

The railroad is guilty of a misdemeanor if it blocks a crossing for more than five minutes without a valid reason.

Most area motorists automatically keep track of the time. They come mumbering into office or home. "Darn train—seven minutes on Mill Street, then it caught me again on Main."

The complainant must have the number of either the locomotive or the caboose. Veterans have been known to get out of their cars and trudge a quarter of a mile through a blizzard to get the number of a caboose.

When tales of aggravation are exchanged, none can top the exasperation of one long wait at the Sheldon crossing. As the minutes ticked by, all that was needed was the caboose number to make this a record holdup.

Suddenly an automobile sped by the lines of waiting motorists and stopped at the tracks. A railroad employee jumped out and detached two cars. The train started to move—half went one way and half the other. The gates went up and the would-be complainant never did get the number of the caboose.

COMPLAINTS are filed at city hall on Main Street unless the motorist is traveling south on Sheldon. Then the form is filled out and signed at the state police post on Mill.

Of 59 complaints filed in the city last year, 12 were not signed and were invalid.

Complaints go to the state prosecutor to be approved. The complainant receives notice of a court date within a few weeks and is expected to respond, saying whether or not he can be present on that day. A railroad attorney pleads guilty in most cases.

The C&O was fined \$100 and \$4 costs on 11 occasions last year, \$35 and \$4 costs nine times, \$75 and \$4 once, and \$50 and costs twice. The total, without costs, was \$1,590. All complaints filed after Oct. 9 were held over for court appearances in 1976.

A check of complaints in Redford Township and Livonia showed larger

finer than those handed out locally. Five to seven minutes brought \$250 and \$4, and for 10 minutes or more the railroad was fined \$400 or \$500 with the \$4 judgment fee.

Local court watchers say the complaints would have more clout with the C&O if they were not all nicely grouped on one date. They feel it is to the railroad's advantage to have its attorney make only one trip to Plymouth to cover several complaints.

A May 7, 1967 issue of this newspaper carries a story saying fines to date that year were \$3,000. In 1966 the C&O paid more than \$5,000.

MIXED REACTIONS


Jim Ward says, "The gates are for your protection." He cited a recent case in Detroit when a middle-aged couple tired of waiting. Their car was struck by a train as they attempted to cross with the gates down.

Ward says the C&O receives all kinds of suggestions for placating waiting motorists. One suggestion was to have a railroad employee stand in the middle of the road with a blackboard bearing an explanation: "We're having problems," or a more explicit description of what was going on.






The fact that C&O commuter service between here and Detroit is no longer available still rankles many area residents.

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Plymouth AAUW meeting to feature Detroit panel

The Detroit Panel of American Women, a group committed to bettering human relations, will be at the Jan. 15 meeting of the Plymouth Branch of the American Association of University Women.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. with a social hour in West Middle School cafeteria.

The panel is composed of women of diverse ethnic and racial backgrounds. It includes a Catholic, a Jew, a black and a white Protestant, and a moderator. Members of the panel try to help persons explore their differences and build bridges to unite them.

According AAUW member Janet Repp, the panel seeks to stimulate positive social attitudes, encourage posi-

tive actions, provide insight into the nature of prejudice, inform, update and discuss, and develop unity rather than uniformity.

PANEL members use varied techniques in presenting a humorous, provocative yet challenging approach to the subject of human relations.

It believes it is important for people to talk with each other. It stresses that problems of discrimination may be solved by working to eliminate prejudice within their own families and communities.

Since 1968 when four Detroit-area women organized the panel, more than 30 volunteers from Wayne and Oakland counties have spoken to more than 200 widely divergent groups.

The panel is part of a national association founded in 1958 in Kansas City and has grown to include panels across the United States.

The Detroit panel also sponsors the Green Circle, a human relations program for early elementary grades, and the Human Family for fourth through sixth grades.
