## School millage may be scheduled tonight

The Plymouth Board of Education may decide tonight (Monday) to reserve April 5 as a date for a millage election.

Although the present thinking is to seek millage for equipment replacement and maintenance, the only official action which would be taken tonight would be setting the date for the election.

A recommendation from the administration is expected to be on the agenda for tonight's meeting which begins at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High School.

THE ADMINISTRATION and school board have been studying the idea of seeking a building and site sinking millage.

If this approach is taken, the fund would be used for building renovation, fixing of roofs, replacement of equipment such as boilers, some capital outlay equipment, and possible for maintenance.

Repair and equipment of roofs and boilers now is coming from the general operating fund. The theory is that a special building and site sinking fund would give relief to the operational fund and possibly

prevent programs from being cut in the future if state aid continues to decline as anticipated.

The other supporting argument for a building and site levy lies with proposed legislation which has a penalty clause for districts with operational levies at the level of the Plymouth Community School District. If passed, Plymouth would lose state aid in proportion to any additional operating millage local residents approve. The result is the district would have to

levy more millage than normally needed to obtain the necessary revenue.

Building and site millage, however, is expected to be exempt from the penalty clause if the legislation is adopted. The district could thus levy a nominal millage for building and site and free up funds in its operating budget without being penalized by loss of state aid.

THE BOARD doesn't have to specify, however, what type of millage will be

asked for when it reserves the date for an election—and it isn't expected to do so.

If the state aid funding legislation is amended, the board and administration might shift gears and seek an operational levy. Thus, the type of millage and number of years to be levied won't be decided for about a month.

By state law, the school district must make a decision by Feb. 9 if it wishes to hold an election on April 5. Other choices for elections are April 12 or the annual June school election.

To reserve a date with the Wayne County Election Scheduling Committee, the school board must adopt a resolution making the request 50 days before the election date desired.

Administration is concerned because the cuts already made in the 1975-76 operational budget has eliminated funds for replacement of equipment such as boilers, and cut to a bare minimum funds for equipment repair and maintenance. With these cuts, equipment breakdowns could be a big problem next year if not in 1976.

## Sherwood Park owner agrees to meet codes

Residents of the Sherwood Mobile Home park at Michigan and Haggerty Roads got a reprieve last week when the park's new owner Spencer Partrich agreed to cooperate with township officials to fix health and building code violations.

"The place is just in a generally run down condition," explained township ordinance officer Bruce Phillips. "Some things have been done since the first time we inspected the park last winter, but not enough has been fixed."

"There are still lighting, water and electrical hazards. If the new owner had not been willing to comply, I'm afraid we would have had no choice but to notify the people that they had to leave."

"NO ONE wants to put them out, but it's a question of their safety. We'd hate to see someone get hurt."

About a year ago, at the urging of township trustee Robert Myers, Phillips and inspectors from the Wayne County Health

Department inspected the park and found many trailers and facilities to be sub-standard.

The owner promised action, and some violations were corrected, but according to Phillips, much is left to be done.

A list supplied by building inspectors Al Thompson, Ernie Palon, Charles Thompson, head of the department, and Phillips included the following violations: •Electrical work to start on Jan. 26 and be completed in 15 days. •Laundry building to be rehabilitated and made safe for use—heat, sanitary and electrical work involved. •Sewer connections for all mobile homes to comply with plumbing code. •All trash and junk (including cars) to be removed. •Swimming pool to be filled with soil. •Continue use of trash dumpsters or if not satisfactory, use on-site containers. •All rental units to be inspected and brought into compliance within two weeks. •All lots to be graded where drainage is bad as soon as weather permits. •Street lighting to be repaired to comply with zoning ordinance. •Domestic animals not to be allowed to run at large. •Telephone cables that are not buried must be elevated a minimum of seven feet. •Everything including storage units to be removed from beneath trailers. •Pads on lots for mobile homes that are deteriorating are to be repaired as soon as conditions permit.

Partrich and his partner Stan Worth took over proprietorship of the park Dec. 24. The park was tied up in foreclosure proceedings, with Partrich acting as a consultant for the bank involved.

"WE DIDN'T know who to talk to while the park was in receivership," explained Phillips. "There really was no one single owner, but now we know who to deal with."

Partrich has promised complete cooperation with the township, and work has already begun to bring the 38-acre park up to code.

"The park has been plagued just like everyone else with recession problems," said the new owner. "We knew there were problems when we bought it, but we didn't know how extensive."

"We were kind of bombed by the township. There pretty much all small things, but there's lots of them and it adds up to quite a bit of money."

"We came here to fix it up and not to perpetuate the problems and we will continue on a steady upgrade program. Already we've removed 30 old trailers."

Township officials said they had given Partrich one month, until the middle of February, to complete repairs on the park.

"I HOPE I can get everything done within their deadlines," said Partrich. "but it's hard to do 18 things at once, especially in winter."

"I just hope I can please them, they've been straightforward with me."

"I want to make clear that I inherited these problems and I don't want to get killed on the deal, but that I am going through their list and doing all that they've asked."

## Supervisor rips tax-sharing plan

The governor's proposal for tax base wealth sharing, made in his state of the state address, isn't being received locally with enthusiastic support.

City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township officials have misgivings about the proposal but are withholding specific reactions until obtaining details of the plan from Lansing.

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, however, isn't waiting until word comes down from Lansing before making his position known. Greenstein is dead set against it and feels the results would be a disaster.

GOV. MILLIKEN'S proposal would shift part of the tax yields in fast-growing suburban communities to low-business growth communities.

The proposal applies only to new industrial and commercial tax base. It wouldn't affect existing industrial and commercial tax base, would have no effect on residential tax base, and would exempt school districts.

Under the proposal, if the new commercial-industrial tax base in the Plymouth-Canton community increased by a hypothetical \$6 million in 1977, the local municipalities could apply a tax levy against only \$3 million of the new tax base. The remaining \$3 million in new tax base would be "pooled" statewide and be distributed to non-growth cities such as Detroit, Royal Oak, Ferndale and Wyandotte.

In his address, Milliken said: "We must recognize that neighboring local communities share a common economy. We must alter the local property tax distribution to encourage sound cooperative planning."

"I will propose to the Legislature a plan for tax base sharing among neighboring units of government in Southeastern Michigan. The plan, which could be expanded to other regions as desired, will provide for a partial sharing of future growth in non-residential property tax base. No local government would lose any of its current tax base, nor any of its powers or responsibilities."

FRED YOCKEY, Plymouth City Manager, commented that the idea isn't that new and has been discussed for many years—primarily in the area of school financing.

"The theory has been, to help education, that any new industrial tax base shouldn't accrue exclusively to the political subdivision but should be spread statewide to aid school districts."

"I haven't seen the specifics of the governor's proposal and hesitate to say much at this point. As far as the cities are concerned," Yockey continued, "something must be done for the central cities where tax bases are declining."

"We, in the suburbs, cannot afford to let

Detroit die but that is what we are doing now. There must be some serious consideration given to Detroit's financial plight, but I'm not sure this is the direction to take."

Plymouth and Canton townships stand to lose more than the city because their availability of land gives them potential for future industrial and business expansion.

THAT'S WHAT alarms Greenstein who described the proposal as being a "typically incompetent Republican idea."

"If there is one thing a growing community needs to meet the demands for local services it is the development of revenue derived from the economic expansion which puts the demand on for more services."

"If the governor is successful in pushing this proposal, all he will do is to force the expansionary communities to begin zoning against and fighting new growth to stop it. Who needs the hassle and burden of new industry if the community doesn't receive the tax benefits?"

"If we are going to give Detroit the money, then let Detroit provide police and

fire protection for us. Detroit doesn't have to provide the police and fire protection, water and sewer services to the great extent which growing communities like Canton must."

"This is a cheap political, headline-grabbing cover up on the governor's part. He knows the plan will never work. The governor is covering up because of the sad condition this state is in."

"When he came into office, the state had a surplus budget—now we have a deficit. The reason he's looking towards suburban tax growth to bail out Detroit is because the state no longer has the money in its coffers to give special grants to save Detroit."

When asked if there was an alternative for Detroit's financial problems, such as raising the non-resident income tax, Greenstein replied:

"It seems to me that Detroit, or any other community, can be saved if they knuckle down and get rid of some of the fat in their budgets—eliminate patronage in city jobs, and stop wasting money on studies of things that will never be done."

Detroit should spend more time deciding how to spend its money more wisely instead of trying to steal money from its brother cities."

## Homeowners win again

Residents of three subdivisions in Canton apparently have another victory over builders under their belts following a meeting Wednesday that included several builders, representatives from Camelot West, Westbrook and Parkwood, and Supervisor Robert Greenstein.

Milton Eisler, owner of York Building Company apparently agreed to sell 19 lots on Manton Road to Norman Long, another builder in the township.

Eisler had proposed building 960-square foot houses named "Pebbles" in a neigh-

borhood composed of houses priced primarily between \$45,000-\$50,000.

Residents feared the 19 houses, priced at \$35,000 would lower their property values.

Earlier, at a regular meeting of the township board, those same residents had flocked to the township meeting hall to complain of the problem and ask the board for assistance.

Although the board offered no concrete aid, the public pressure of the residents en masse forced another builder, Sandy Pearlman of Huntley Homes, to promise he would not build 16 cheaper homes called "Mt. Vernon" on the other side of Manton.

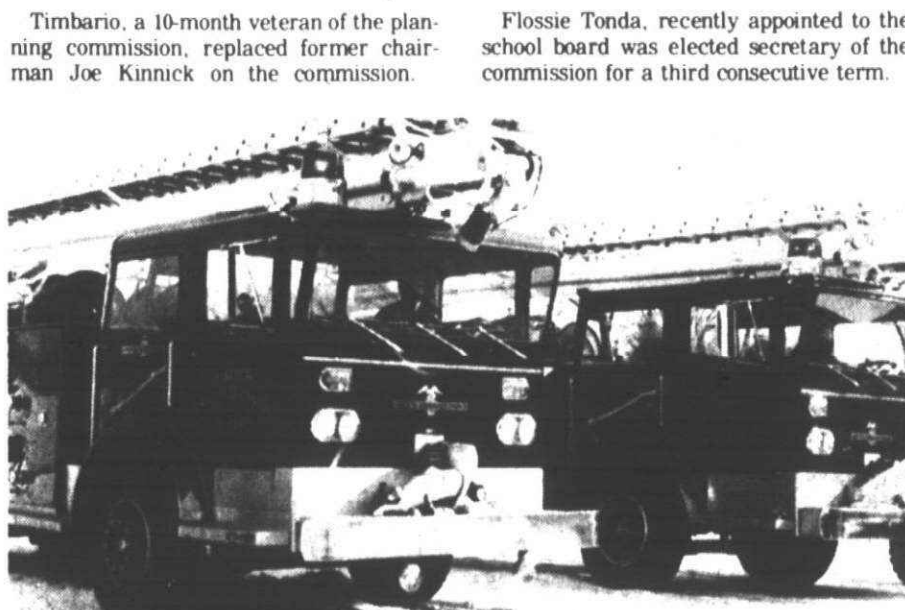
Those houses, too, were priced in the \$35,000 bracket, although they were larger at 1,400 square feet.

RESIDENTS COMPLAINED of aluminum siding on the model, along with the fact that it had no garage or family room.

Most houses in the neighborhood are brick, and residents said the Mt. Vernon would not fit in, as well as depreciating the worth of houses already occupied.

Residents also complained the houses would be ugly because they were to be built in a row.

According to Greenstein, the meeting went smoothly, although Eisler balked at not erecting the smaller homes.



### Two to tango

The Canton Fire Department recently received delivery of a new piece of equipment, a Tele-squirt, a twin to the one the department got last spring. The two units cost \$74,000 each when purchased. Today, the cost would be from \$120,000 to \$130,000. Ladders on these trucks extend 55 feet, have a 1,000 gallon per minute capacity on each ladder hose. With this new unit, the Canton fire department now has two ladder trucks, two engines, and three rescue units, one of which is in the process of being finished by the firemen. # Plymouth, Canton join mental health drive

In the face of mental health cutbacks, about 75 people from northwestern Wayne County and several service agencies are beginning the task of setting up a comprehensive community health center and association.

The new group is called the Fieldbrook Mental Health Association and takes in the cities of Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, and the townships of Plymouth, Canton, Redford and Northville.

While recent state law requires that 12 areas of mental health be served by a "comprehensive community mental health and retardation center," that does not mean one building will serve all.

Persons at the Fieldbrook informational meeting last week were asked to join the association and work on areas that show

the most immediate demand, rather than try to tackle everything at once.

MARGARET CHAVEY, who organized the meeting held in Livonia's city hall, says although the lack of funding is discouraging, "there is much this group can accomplish."

"There must be a fine line between realism and pessimism," said Mrs. Chavey, a former administrator at Northville State Hospital who now works as a voluntary probation officer in Livonia.

Mrs. Chavey puts an out-patient, after-care and emergency clinic as the most immediate mental health priority in the Fieldbrook area. A clinic of this kind would fill a crisis intervention need, says Mrs. Chavey.

The center would service people outside of an institution.

Presently, the Fieldbrook building at Northville State Hospital is the only designated mental health center for the area.

Mrs. Chavey lavished praise on Dr. Sung Ran Cho, director of Fieldbrook, but believes the facility at Northville is inadequate because "it is understaffed and over-taxed with chronic patients already."

"BESIDES, there is that stigma of driving through the gates of Northville State Hospital," said Mrs. Chavey. "If a person seeking out-patient help has to drive through those gates for help, they think 'oh-oh.'"

Under Public Law 94-63, "comprehensive" community health centers would be required to serve 12 facets of mental health:

- crisis intervention services
- out-patient psychiatric services
- partial hospitalization
- in-patient services
- consultation
- services for children
- services for the elderly
- after-care services for patients released from state hospital
- screening services for referral purposes
- specialized programs for former institutional patients
- alcohol abuse
- drug abuse

MRS. CHAVEY and John Reynolds, director of regional mental health planning for the Michigan Department of Mental Health, say the association cannot hope to serve all those needs with one super-center for mental health. The cost would be fantastic and, in some cases, the center would be duplicating services already provided by agencies in the community.

Reynolds told the audience the success of any mental health center depends on cooperation between various levels of government and an elimination of provincial attitudes. He said he was encouraged by the fact that people from Plymouth, North-

ville, Livonia and Redford Township were at the first meeting.

"We have to cut across boundaries," said Reynolds. "A city like Northville cannot stand isolated and the different mental health departments can't do that. You and the people we are trying to serve can't afford that."

"Our first move is to become aware of what's already available in the community. If you find there's nothing available in one of these 12 essential areas, then move with determination to secure that service."

DONALD KERN, acting deputy director of the Detroit-Wayne County Mental Health Board, took a similar position, warning Fieldbrook area residents not to "put all your eggs in one basket."

"My advice to you people tonight is that it would be ill advised to concentrate all your energies on developing a community health center plan only."

"Funding for an all-inclusive center would require local and state funds to match federal dollars, even if those were available. Think in terms of services that are absolutely necessary, and we achieve some of these more modest services and facilities."

"But, by all means start the association. Get your foot in the door and you will gain community support, become recognized and get high-priority status if you plan well."

Persons interested in joining the Fieldbrook Mental Health Association steering committee should contact James Inglis, administrative aide to the mayor, at Livonia City Hall, 33001 Five Mile.

BILL SARISAN, a psychiatrist from Redford Township, said after the meeting that he agreed with the suggestion to start small.

"I'd like to see some kind of community crisis intervention center with out-patient facilities," said Sarisan. "There is a division of Northville that serves young people in this capacity, but things are pretty sparse for adults. I think the most immediate need is for adults."

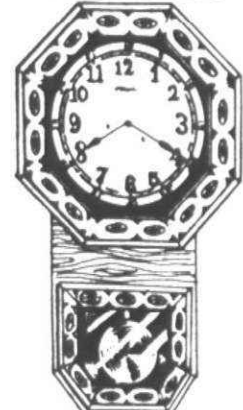
Carl Gunderson, of the Metropolitan Child Guidance Center, said there are laws guaranteeing rights for the retarded, "but when it comes down to coughing of the money that's another story." Gunderson said he was both surprised and encouraged at the degree of representation from political units and mental health agencies at the meeting.

Representatives from the Wayne County Health Department attended along with people from the Department of Social Services, Northwest Guidance Clinic, Plymouth Center for Human Development, Madonna College, Redford's Information and Counseling Center on Drugs, Livonia-Westland Community Commission on Drug Abuse, Insight International, Livonia Association for Retarded Citizens, Redford Township Police Department, the Livonia Senior Citizens group and others.

Although the meeting turnout was a bit top-heavy with mental health administrators and professionals, the steering committee for the Fieldbrook Association must be comprised of at least 51 per cent mental health "consumers." This means people who have used mental health services themselves or have family members using the services.

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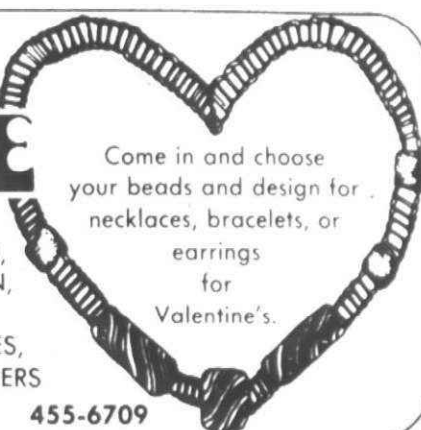
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## Bloc grant meeting set for Wednesday

Governmental officials from throughout Wayne County will be meeting in Canton Township Wednesday night to select a bloc grant advisory committee which will be charged with making decisions on the allocation of 1976 federal funds under the Community Development Act of 1974.

The advisory committee is picked by those governments—including Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships—which have applied for CDA funds through Wayne County. The funds are administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

UNDER RULES set by HUD, municipalities with less than 50,000 population may apply for the federal CDA funds through their county government. This choice was made locally.

During 1975, Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein served as chairman of the advisory committee and has called for Wednesday's meeting to be held in the meeting room at the Canton Fire Station, Cherry Hill and Canton Center roads.

Planning officials are now considering specific recommendations on how to spend the funds, which will then be forwarded to the local governmental units for approval before being passed on to the county advisory committee.

The City of Plymouth, which received \$32,000 in 1975, expects its 1976 allocation will be about \$64,000 as does Plymouth Township. The city plans to spend the funding for housing-related programs.

Plymouth Township expects to invest its funds to improve township parks and the recreation department facilities, to build sidewalks and ramps, and for public safety.

Mike Manore, Canton planner, is presently drawing up a "shopping list" of all possible areas where the money could be spent under the guidelines set by HUD. When this list is completed, it will be forwarded to the township administration to be narrowed down and submitted to the township board for approval.

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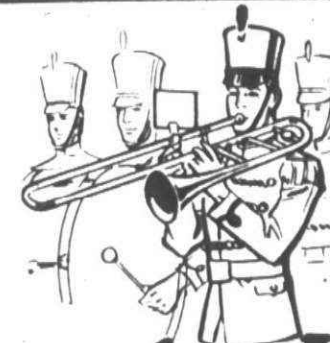

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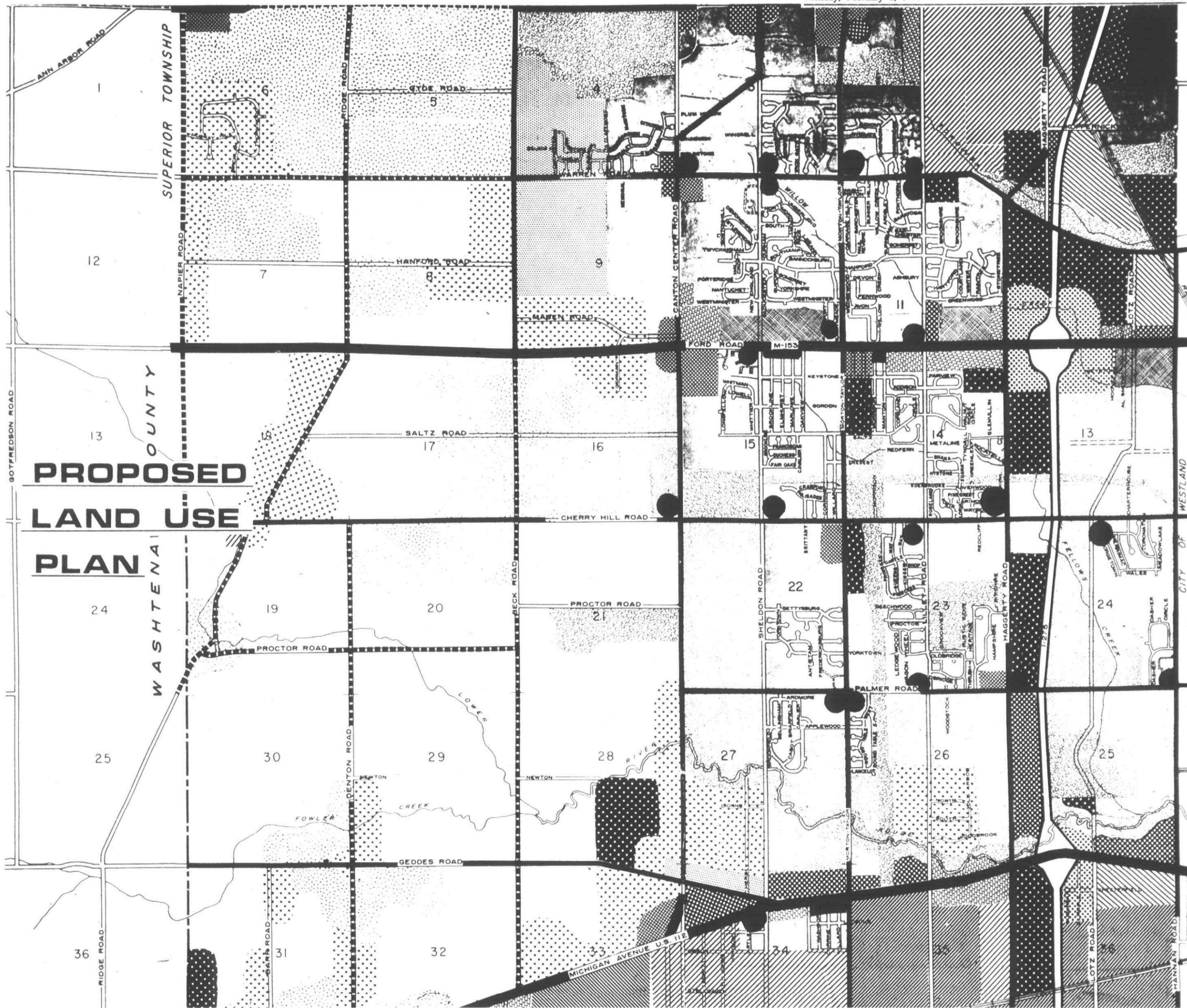

# Land use plan to save farms, reduce density

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following article is a quick overview of the proposed master land use plan that will come before the public for comment March 1. Most of the article is gleaned from a summary of the plan issued by the township planners and those summaries are available at three locations in the township, in the township business offices, 44508 Geddes Road, in the township firehall, at the corner of Canton Center and Cherry Hill, and in the chamber of commerce office in the Harvard Square Shopping Center, at Ford and Sheldon. The Observer & Eccentric will begin an indepth look at the plan, the reasoning behind it, and the people involved in it in a series beginning next Thursday.

Canton's new master land use plan has been labelled "revolutionary" by a number of people associated with it, including township planner Mike Manore, township Supervisor Robert Greenstein, and Professor Robert Hotelling, a noted land use expert teaching at Michigan State.

Three years in the making, it will, if found legal and acceptable by the people, save almost 40 per cent of the township's land for agricultural use.

That land, most of which is west of Canton Center, will be taxed at a special rate, and urbanization in the eastern portion of the township, already fully under way, will continue but at reduced residential densities.

Overall growth of the township, if the plan is passed, will stop sometime near 1995, with a final population of about

100,000, some 105,000 less than originally estimated in an earlier plan.

At that time, when the township is fully developed, about 31,000 dwelling units of differing sizes and classifications will have been constructed in Canton.

**OF THE TOWNSHIP'S 23,215 acres:**

- 8,900 or 38.3 per cent will be devoted to both agricultural-industrial and agricultural small farm.
- 9,300 or 40.1 per cent will be allocated for various types residential uses.
- 1,225 or 5.3 per cent will go towards commercial uses.
- 2,470 or 10.6 per cent will be allocated to both heavy and light industrial usage.
- And 1,320 or 5.7 per cent will go to open space.

Perhaps most innovative about the plan, is the effort to save agricultural land—a problem the planners term "national as well as state and local."

The planners say farmers have been forced to abandon their land and sell it because of the state's tax structure, a system that does not allow for profitable farming in areas that are growing or are near urban centers.

Land is taxed on future use and value rather than actual use, and farmland has been taxed at its potential value as development property, forcing farmers to sell prematurely.

According to the planners, if Canton's plan is sound enough, Wayne County and the state will agree to assess agricultural acreage in Canton as farmland, thereby alleviating the tax burden on farmers.

**ALTHOUGH THE** net result will be less tax revenue for the township and the school systems, the tax burden will not be transferred to other residents of the township, the planners explain.

Much of the deficit will be made up by state aid to the schools, and reduced need for services on agricultural land will greatly diminish the loss of tax dollars to the township.

In already developed areas, mostly the eastern section of the township, densities will be reduced, and a minimum lot size of 70 feet will be instituted. Eighty-, 90- and 100-foot lots will become more prevalent, and high urban densities will compose 6-12 per cent of the township.

Planned Unit Developments (PUDs), which incorporate many kinds of land uses in a single development parcel, will be discontinued.

Heavy and light industry, for the most part, will be located in the southeastern section of the township along the Michigan Avenue corridor, although some land in the northeastern quadrant will be available for light industrial usage.

The purpose of the plan, according to the planners, is to "promote the public health, safety and general welfare and to encourage the use of resources in accordance with their character and adaptability."

The township planning commission is responsible by law for adopting the plan, although the Zoning Ordinance that will implement it is the responsibility of the township board of trustees.

The German-American Club of Plymouth is holding its second annual fasching party at 8 p.m. Feb. 14, in the Plymouth Cultural Center, 525 Farmer Street.

Part of the fasching celebration is the traditional "masken ball" and the local club is encouraging costumes at the party. There will be prizes for singles and doubles in costume.

According to club president Bob Fitzner, the costumes are usually a spoof of anything political. One would wear lederhosen to a fasching party—it would be almost a desecration of the national costume.

The fasching celebration is to the Germans what Mardi Gras is to the French. The celebration varies in different parts of Germany. In some towns, offices and stores close for up to a week. Merchants donate foods and wines and there is constant partying with snake dances in the streets.

Fitzner said fasching is so important some persons mortgage their holdings to finance participation.

**FAMILIES** of German descent in this area have fasching parties in their homes. Friends travel from party to party making it almost a round-robin celebration.

There will be beer, imported wines, sausages, special rolls and pickles at the club's party. Music will be provided for dancing by The Sorgenbrecher (Breakers of Sorrows) in the beer hall atmosphere.

"I think they're the best German band in the Great Lakes area," said Fitzner.

The fasching party was a sellout last year. Tickets are available at \$6 per couple from McKeon Inc., Real Estate, C.L. Finlan Insurance, Observer & Eccentric office on Main Street, and from any club member.

Schools must pay back wages

U.S. District Judge Ralph M. Freeman has ordered the Plymouth Community School District to pay \$10,000 in back pay found due to 26 employees in a wage-hour case filed by the U.S. Department of Labor.

The Federal District Court, Michigan, also granted the request of the Labor Department and issued a permanent injunction prohibiting the school district from further equal pay violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act—the federal wage-hour law.

The issue involved 26 female custodians who had been paid a different scale than their male counterparts. The employees will receive \$200 to \$400 each in back pay.

The Labor Department argued, and Freeman agreed, that the female custodians did essentially the same work as male custodians who were placed in a higher pay classification. The Labor Department had asked for \$37,000 in back pay but the parties involved reached a settlement for \$10,000.

In its original complaint, the Labor Department charged that the school district had discriminated on the basis of sex and had failed to provide equal pay for equal work.

The complaint was filed following investigation by the department's wage-hour division, area office in Detroit, under the supervision of Frank Modetz, area director.

Bradbury asks traffic study

The Plymouth Township Board has asked Wayne County to conduct a traffic study of the intersection of Joy Road and Newport Drive.

The request for a study was made following communication to the township by the Bradbury Parkhomes Condominium Association.

In a letter to the board, Thomas I. Calkins, chairman of the Bradbury steering committee, explained the need for and requested a traffic control device on Joy at Newport Drive.

Calkins said the intersection has motorists from more than 600 homes trying to obtain access to Joy Road.

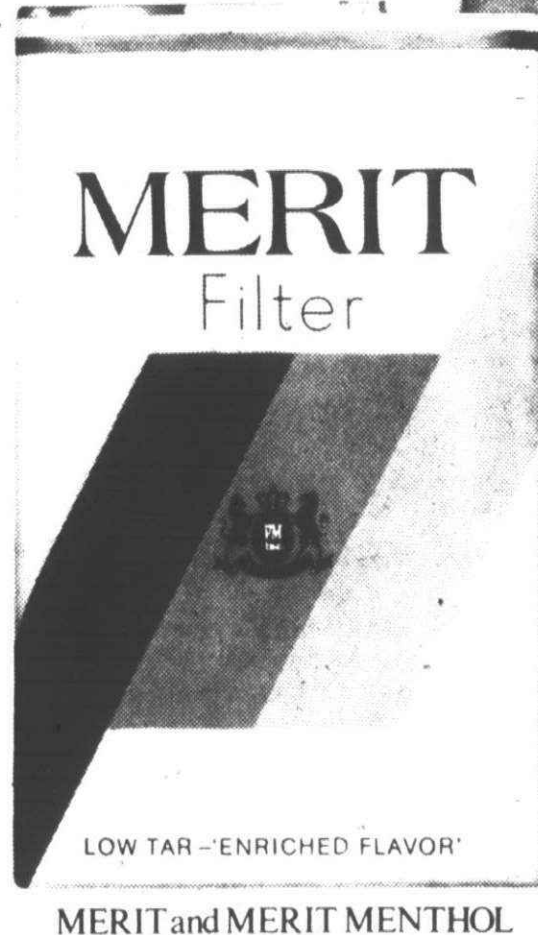

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# Anti-trapping ads appear legitimate

Several well-meaning readers have written to object to advertisements the Observer & Eccentric has published from the Animal Protection Institute of America.

mal Protection Institute of America. That's the ad which begins: "It's only an animal—dying in a steel-jaw, leghold trap."  
In what appears to be a concerted campaign, the readers have sent either clippings or photocopies of a Jan. 13 National Enquirer article headlined: "Humane Organization' Collected \$904,466—But Not One Dime Was Spent on Animals."  
As the readers requested, we checked up on the Animal Protection Institute (API), relying heavily on material from a pro-trapping group.

WE'RE CONVINCED the API is an entirely legitimate organization, and we will continue to accept their ads.  
Just as it would be unfair for us to accept the ads of one political party and reject the other party's ads, so it would be just as unfair to reject API's ads. API has a story to tell. It opposes trapping. It seeks changes in state and federal laws to stop trapping. It's working in the open. That's fair politics.  
Whether API's story is convincing is for each reader and lawmaker to decide. The fact that we accept their ads doesn't mean we endorse one point of view over another, any more than we would ever endorse Hudson's over Crowley's.

NATIONAL ENQUIRER has done a noteworthy job exposing the sex life of the late President Kennedy, but in dealing with money and environmental matters, it is in over its head.  
The Enquirer piece acts as if it were some sensational revelation that API spends its money on staff salaries and advertising. The revelation is common knowledge in politics. That's precisely what lobbying groups spend their money on. And there was no evidence to indicate any subterfuge—no bribes to lawmakers.

An article in the Jan. 16 Buck Tales reports: "In recent months, over a hundred organizations such as Friends of Animals and the Animal Protection Institute of America have taken it upon themselves to oppose the use of leg-holding traps for the taking of raccoons, fur-bearing and predatory animals."

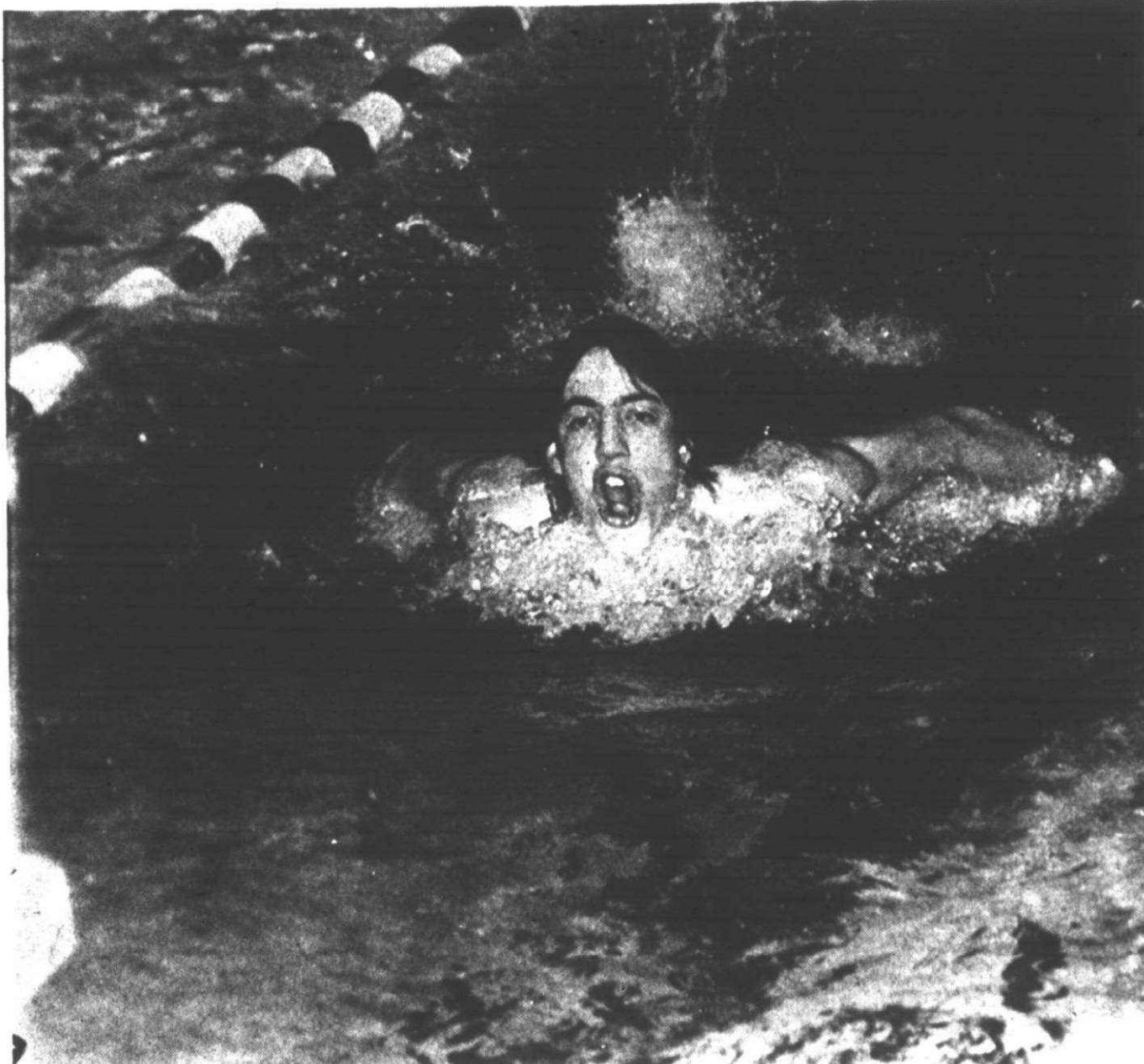
COACH FAUNCE said he was responding favorably to treatment and hopefully he would be back to normal by the time the Western Six league meet is held.

Clare and the other two members of the Churchill front court, Tom Bay and Matt Foster, combined for all but seven of the Chargers' points.

With 4:04 left in the game, Canton's Tom Close finished the Chief scoring to make the score, 56-48.

FROM THAT POINT on the Chargers piled up 17 unanswered points as the Chiefs' offense was a study in frustration during the final few minutes.

Canton mentor Casey Cavell was dismayed about his team's performance. "There isn't much you can say. We were outpositioned on the boards, our shooting was off, we just didn't play very well."

Canton will have another week of practice to collect themselves for this Friday's game against the Northville Mustangs. With the loss, the Chiefs drop to 3-3 in the conference to put them right in the middle of the pack. Plymouth Canton's overall record now stands at 4-9.

## Stevenson tankers set new marks

A pair of new school and pool records highlighted an Inter-Lakes swimming meet last week in which host Livonia Stevenson knocked-off Farmington for the second time this winter 101-71.

Coach Lois McDonald's troops grabbed first place finishes in nine of the 11 events, but the big story of the competition was the new standard set by Jerry Sieh in the 200-yard freestyle and Greg Johnson in diving.

Sieh stroked through the waters over the distance with a time of 1:55.4 and Johnson accumulated 236.45 points after his series of dives, both performances good enough for new school and pool marks.

In addition to his individual record-breaking effort, Sieh also swam a leg of the Spartans' victorious 400-yard freestyle relay team which also consisted of Doug Hickman, Bill Hoeft and Dave Mueller.

Hickman and Mueller, along with Greg Santo and Chip Golonka, bested the Farmington quartet in the 200-yard medley relay.

Mueller also scored a first place finish in the 50-yard freestyle. Golonka bested the field in the 100-yard breaststroke and Santo topped the pack in two individual races, the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard backstroke.

## Tigers nip Melvindale

In a meet which went right down to the heavyweight classification, the final match to be contested, John Rohrschick of Garden City West pinned his Melvindale opponent to give the Tigers a 32-25 victory and undisputed possession of first place in Tri-River League wrestling competition.

The Cardinals and Tigers, which finished as co-champions last season, met last Thursday in the showdown battle at West both sporting unblemished 4-0 conference marks.

The score was 26-25 in West's favor going into the heavyweight battle meaning that whichever grappler won would claim victory for his entire team. "I knew the the teams would end up within six points of each other one way or another," said West coach Stan Worrell.

savings accounts, however, I.R.A.'s offer a range of plans paying annual interest rates from 5-1/2 to 7-1/2 percent and are insured to \$40,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Incidentally, these are the highest interest rates that any bank can pay."

### Are there special regulations for I.R.A.'s?

"Yes. Regulations only permit you to save a maximum of \$1,500 a year, or 15% of your annual wages, whichever is less. You can open an Individual Retirement Account with just \$25, then it's up to you when and how much you want to deposit, in amounts of \$25 or more, up to your maximum each year. You can add to your account each payday and when your savings reach \$1,000 or more, you can convert them to 6-year 7-1/2% Investment Certificates; or if you make your annual deposit in one lump sum, you can put it into 6-year 7-1/2% Investment Certificates at that time. The money must remain on deposit at least until you reach age 59-1/2, unless you become permanently disabled.

Should you withdraw prior to that, Federal regulations for Investment Certificates require that you pay substantial penalties on the amount withdrawn, and I.R.A. regulations impose further penalties for premature withdrawals."

## Security tips for babysitters

The murders of two young women, one in Redford Township and the other in Birmingham, has triggered an increased uneasiness in babysitters and parents.

Plymouth Police Chief Tim Ford said that if enough babysitters evinced an interest, an "in home" security course could be set up by his department.

"If there is a community need," Ford said, "we could put on a course which would include general knowledge, defensive measures, and some basic first aid, including mouth-to-mouth resuscitation."

As a first step in alleviating fears of the unknown, Ford stressed the importance of the babysitter being completely oriented to the layout of the house, inside and out.

ON A FIRST visit, the babysitter should become acquainted with the exterior of the house. She should know if there is a fence, how the house sits in relation to other

houses in the neighborhood, and the natural approaches to the building. This also will make her aware of an escape route, if it should be necessary.

The parents should give the babysitter a complete tour of the house, upstairs and down. She should know if there is any part of the house, or a room, which could be closed off and barricaded. Escape routes, other than doors, should be established.

The baby sitter should be shown the position of every telephone in the house. Each telephone should have a list of telephone numbers—police, fire department, doctor and parents.

Ford also suggested adding the address of the house to the telephone number list.

"The first thing to say when you call the police is where you're at," said Ford. "If you have time, tell them who you are and the trouble."

"If they hear or see anything that doesn't look right, the simple answer is to call the police. We'd rather run 100 times than miss a real one."

"IN OUTSIDE situations, never open the door to anyone who is not authorized in the house. This means only the parents who are away."

"Don't open the door to strangers and have all the doors locked, preferably on a chain."

He added that if a friend is coming to stay with the babysitter, it first must be cleared with the parents.

Ford says babysitters should stay awake. Visual checks of the children are an absolute must.

"Radios, televisions and record players should be turned low," said Ford. "And if they hear anything outside they should

never go out to investigate—stay in."

Ford discussed the "gray age" when youngsters think they're too old for a babysitter and the parents believe they are too young to be left alone. Best solution is to have them invite a friend over to spend the night, and have them follow the same security measures a competent babysitter would maintain.

Neighbor cooperation can ease a case of babysitter jitters. Parents can make arrangements with a neighbor who is going to be at home that if something comes up the babysitter could call them to check it out.

Those interested in a police-sponsored workshop in security tips for babysitters should call Chief Ford. If there is enough response, the one-night course will be arranged.

## It's Girl Scout cookie time

It will be a case of "On your mark, Get set, Go!" for 654 area girl scouts at 4 p.m. Friday, Feb. 6. That is the magic hour set for the start of the 1976 Girl Scout cookie sale.

The scouts will take orders from that time until the close of the drive Feb. 15. Cookies will be delivered in March.

Sally Posthill of 12127 Arrowhead Court is cookie sale chairman for the City of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships. She will direct the efforts of the 28 junior, cadette and senior troops in the area. Mrs. Posthill's daughter, Ann, is a senior girl scout.

The scouts sold \$22,882 worth of girl scout cookies, crackers and tea last year under the chairmanship of Mrs. James Rorabacher. The price has gone up this year to \$1.25 a box, but, the monetary return to the troop is up to 20 cents a box.

AS AN ADDED incentive, troops which average the sale of 95 boxes per girl will receive 100 per cent fee for a troop camp weekend. Troops averaging 75 to 94 boxes per member will earn 75 per cent of the fee for a camp weekend.

The girls also can acquire a cookie patch and each scout will receive a cookie poster.

Choice of cookies includes lemon cremes, Oxford cremes, savannahs, scot-teas and thin mints. There also are sesame crisps and a package of 16 tea bags. Mary Lou Johnson, publicity chairman for the area, says each tea bag brews two or three good cups of tea.

When the cookies are delivered, purchasers will receive six recipes with the girl scout products as ingredients. The recipes are for frozen strawberry tarts, nutty cheese ball, fruit fluff squares, minty peach parfaits, crunchy peanut butter balls and chocolate banana dessert.

## Livonian's score perfect in real estate license test

Last Christmas the three children of Beth Nicholson of Livonia gave her a sledge hammer. It was just what she wanted.

Having entered the real estate business a few weeks earlier, she knew that one of her jobs as a salesperson is to pound into the ground "For Sale" signs.

Mrs. Nicholson was hired by Real Estate One after taking her pre-license training under the direction of Wilma Ravlin, senior instructor of the firm.

So effective were Mrs. Ravlin's teaching and her student's learning, that Mrs. Nicholson received a perfect score on her license test.

It is believed to be the first perfect score in 72,000 real estate license examinations during the past six years.

For this achievement, Mrs. Nicholson was awarded a special certificate by R.V. Griesinger, deputy commissioner of real estate in the Michigan department of licensing and regulation.

**NOW AT WORK** in Real Estate One's office in downtown Farmington, Mrs. Nicholson reflects a national movement toward real estate on the part of women in the county. They now outnumber men in the profession.

"Women rarely find any discrimination and have free entry into the field either as salespersons or as brokers," noted J.W. Goss of Investors Mortgage Insurance Co. He estimates that more than 500,000 women are in real estate.

Mrs. Nicholson finds it helps to be a woman when selling a home.

"We're the ones who work in the home," she said. "We know what in a house appeals to women. Even if the man discusses money and terms, very often it is the woman who decides what she wants and what she doesn't want."

"It is a good business for women to go in. If you want to make an effort, you can earn rewards. All they ask is that you work hard. Most women have worked so hard to raise children, that it is difficult for them to shift gears and slow down when the children grow up. I decided to pick a job in which I wouldn't have to slow down."

Irene Cameron, coordinator of communications, says that the extra heat applied to the new cream changes the nature of the protein and therefore needs to be whipped more than other cream.

"But stay with it," she urges, "it will whip up. Plan to spend two to three minutes instead of one. Customers afraid to whip it this long because of the fear of turning it to butter need not worry about immediate separation."
