Concerned Parents consider suit, recall

Concerned Parents of Plymouth is considering a number of alternatives, including the possibility of a recall campaign against the school board, for use in its fight against modular scheduling at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

Officers of the group are studying whether to start legal action against the Plymouth Community School District, whether to recall at least two trustees, and whether to run two candidates in the June school election.

"Before any final decisions are made," said George Merchant, president, "we'd like to hear more opinions and comments from the public. Residents may submit their views in writing to Post Office Box 577, Plymouth 48170."

A CROWD of about 300 crowded into East Middle School Feb. 4 to share their

feelings about problems at the CEP.

After hearing a presentation of alternatives, those present were polled so the Concerned Parents leadership could learn their preference.

"We were very pleased with that turnout," adds Merchant, "which was very indicative of parental concern in this community about the problems in our schools. But we'd also like to hear from more residents—from those who disagree or agree with our positions—so we can get a broad representation of community opinion."

Mrs. Barbara Olson, vice-president, said it is quite likely the group will screen and select two candidates to run for the board of education in June. "Any resident interested in serving on the board could make it known in writing now."

Merchant said a recall campaign is being studied because the election of two trustees in June, coupled with the recall of two others, "would provide a majority of

four on the board to represent the community. Right now, the majority is in favor of taking a liberal approach to education."

At the Feb. 4 public meeting, those present made donations, and more than \$400 was collected to pay for legal services. Merchant says any financial or moral support is desired.

"We are considering writing the state department of education about specific problems in the school district. The alternatives of starting legal action against the district, of initiating a recall plan running two candidates in June are courses of action we'd like to receive opinions from the community on before a decision is made."

Rumors of a recall campaign being under way have been filtering throughout the community during the last couple weeks, but it was only this week that Concerned Parents was linked to the effort.

In the June election, Board President Marda Benson is due to seek re-election.

The other person up for election is Flossie Tonda who recently was appointed to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Gary Mirto.

IN A STATEMENT circulated by Concerned Parents before its public meeting, the group reviewed briefly its actions since organizing and commented on the school board's reaction to its public-opinion survey.

"The survey was conducted, and eventually we contacted more than 3,700 families. The results have been widely published and, suffice to say, the results indicated that we weren't a few dissidents but a group that did express a viewpoint held by many parents and citizens in the community."

Those results were submitted to the Plymouth Board of Education with a request that the board advise Concerned Parents of its plans. At that time, Con-

cerned Parents suggested that modular scheduling be allowed in only one high school building and traditional in the other to separate the two systems of class scheduling.

"The school board saw fit, for the most part, to ignore us or give us brief lip service as if we were a handful of irate parents. About all the board recognized on the need of our schools was to start its own citizens advisory group."

"The people have spoken and will continue to speak, and it won't cost the school board one red cent to listen. We would have to conclude that the school board believes the high schools are in excellent shape and the board is going to do as it pleases and let the citizens be damned."

We have tried our best to operate within the existing system, but, frankly, the school board seems to have its own system which has little respect for attitudes different from its own."

MRS. OLSON, speaking about the 300 present at the Feb. 4 meeting, comments:

"These weren't just irate parents but parents who are just plain fed up. There were parents from Geer School area wondering why the board wants to close Geer School to save \$4,000 and yet is spending \$6,000 on the Wayne State University study of modular scheduling, can find the money to run the CASTLES program, and is spending money on the Glasser project—'Schools Without Failure.'"

Spokesmen for Concerned Parents stress that a decision to begin a recall drive hasn't been made and will be addressed by the leadership after public sentiment is known. The group seems to have decided, though, to run two candidates in the June election. At a meeting of officers tomorrow (Tuesday) night, the Concerned Parents board will further discuss legal action which can be taken.

Informal survey inconclusive

Are votes there for master land-use plan?

Many questions remain to be answered and even more remain to be asked about the township's new master land use plan.

Is it confiscatory? How much will it cost the taxpayers, if anything? Is it legal?

The most obvious question, perhaps thought to be a foregone conclusion by many, is will it pass.

After conducting an informal survey, the Observer & Eccentric decided it was hardly a foregone conclusion.

Only three members of the township board at this time were willing to give the plan an unequivocal yes vote.

Two said unless changes were made, they would be forced to reject it. One was undecided, and one member, assumed by those opposing the plan to be against it, was unavailable for comment.

ALTHOUGH THE township board never votes on the master land use plan itself, it does decide the fate of the zoning ordinance, the document that implements the land use plan.

The planning commission conducts the hearings on the master land use plan, and votes to accept or reject it.

Unless the zoning ordinance that accompanies it is passed by the township board, the master land use plan is an impotent, unenforceable document.

Those opposing the plan list several problems with it.

Despite assurances of planner Mike Manore and Supervisor Robert Greenstein, that reducing assessments on farmland in the western half of the township won't create an additional tax burden on all others in the township, some trustees said suf-

ficient evidence hadn't been provided them to prove it.

Others voiced concern over the lack of provisions for lower income housing because the plan calls for a minimum of 70-foot lots, and the remaining 60-foot lots weren't thought to be cheap enough already for lower income people.

Other board members are concerned that the map of the master land use plan and the zoning text guidelines aren't fully coordinated—that what appears to be on the map one type of land use is, according to the zoning text, another.

Some board members are upset that people who have been paying taxes for commercial land for many years will suddenly find their land has been rezoned as residential, and will be faced with a substantial financial loss.

While some board members indicated the reasons they opposed the plan are minor and subject to compromise, others said they are miles apart from agreeing with the plan.

SUPERVISOR Robert Greenstein, however, was surprised that any board members opposed the plan.

"We went through it piece by piece and everything was done by consensus. There was more unanimity among the board than there was among the planning commission. No vote was taken, but we didn't move on until everyone was satisfied. I

think the plan has the full support of the board," he explained.

Other board members agreed the work was done by consensus, but they contended that some points were skipped over and never returned to for settlement.

Among those supporting the plan, one was careful to note that public reaction at the hearing March 1 may affect the decisions which both the planning commission and the board make.

He said, "The public's comments will weigh very heavily with us."

"The first time we had a public hearing in September 1974, it changed the whole outlook of the plan—and that's why we have this plan now."

"We have to wait to see what the public says."

Regardless of the outcome of the public hearing, one thing is clear. The plan is not an automatic shoo-in as it now reads.

Treasurer billing for unpaid fees

If early returns are any indication, the township's hopes of recovering unpaid planning and engineering fees from builders and developers may be realized.

Mailings to recoup some \$800,000 in lost fees and sewer front-footage charges from builders began last week, and early responses are good, according to treasurer Carl Parsell.

"We've gotten some replies, some checks and a lot of questions," said Parsell.

"The hardest part, and most time consuming, is proving that they owe us

money," said the treasurer. "We're only sending out bills that we can thoroughly substantiate."

Special audits of the water and sewer department budgets for the past five years, 1971-75, indicated the township was owed almost \$850,000, money that had not been paid for several reasons: failure to bill properly, property changing hands and forgetfulness.

"I don't think it's a case of anyone trying to cheat us," said Parsell. "It was more a failure to keep the books straight. There were no checks and balances to see that bills were mailed and paid."

PARSELL, recently elected to serve on the Wayne County Treasurers' Association, would not predict how much money would be recouped.

"If someone believes they owe us the money, I think they'll pay. But in some instances the property has changed hands, and it's not legally clear whether the new owner has to assume the liabilities of the previous owner."

"Others are under the impression that they've already paid—really it's up to us to substantiate that they owe us the money and then I think they'll pay."

Of the more than \$800,000 owed the town-

ship, almost half is for services the township has provided. Fees paid to planning consultants and engineers that were supposed to be transferred to the builder, were not paid, and the township, instead, footed the bill.

Some of the money is for sewer front-footage certificates that have not been used by builders and, as yet, the township has not suffered any financial loss.

According to the treasurer, more than 100 concerns have been contacted about the failure to pay, including school districts and utility companies. "It's not just the private builders," explained Parsell.

Urbanization of east to continue for 20 years MASTER LAND-USE PLAN

Editor's note: Part two, today's feature on the proposed master land use plan, takes an in depth look into housing patterns in the township and what the future portends through the eyes of planner Mike Manore. On Thursday, the Observer & Eccentric will take a look at industry and commerce in the township and what the overall tax-base will look like under the proposed plan.

The rapid residential expansion experienced by Canton in the past seven years will not be a footnote in the history of the late 1960s and early 1970s in the township.

The growth that started in earnest in 1968, instead, will be a trend that will continue for the next 15-20 years—until the eastern half of Canton is saturated with housing.

Those are the expectations of planner Mike Manore and they are reflected in the proposed master land use plan.

Although the planning for residential regions in the township is not as radical as the part of the plan dealing with retention of agricultural lands, substantial changes have been made.

"The goal of the plan is to create a choice for those coming into the community," said Manore. "We want to be able to meet the lifestyles of all the people that want to move into Canton."

To meet that goal, changes in laws about

lot sizes and percentages of multiples, and single family dwellings have been made.

Planned unit developments (PUDs), which once flourished in the township, have been eliminated.

MINIMUM LOT widths have been raised from 60 to 70 feet, and greater numbers of 80, 90, 100, and half-acre lots will be available if the plan is passed.

"Basically, we're airing out the township," said Supervisor Robert Greenstein. "This plan will reduce the density of the urbanized portions of the township and will provide a greater variety of housing for

people interested in moving into the township."

"We have and will continue to have a multitude of 60-foot lots in the township for quite some time and now we will be able to offer more in the way of larger lots."

"In the Sunflower subdivision, which offers larger lots, we're starting to get people who wouldn't have moved to Canton because the large lots weren't available. Now we can offer something to those people."

The supervisor said houses built on

Suburbs continue fight against water rate hike

Suburban officials will meet in Livonia tonight (Monday) to plan a fight to stop or reduce a proposed 39 per cent rate hike approved several months ago by the Detroit Metropolitan Water Board.

The meeting will be hosted by Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia at 7:30 p.m. in the Livonia Senior Citizens' Center, 15218 Farmington Rd., south of Five Mile.

McNamara, who led a successful fight last spring and summer to stop a previous water-rate hike, wrote Detroit City Councilman Jack Kelley and his colleagues asking them to reject or reduce the proposed increase.

THE DETROIT City Council has the last word over water rates since the water department is legally considered a city department.

McNamara wrote Kelley that "policy matters and rates should be controlled directly by the elected representatives of the people."

"Policy and rates administered by appointees and bureaucrats don't always represent the best interests of citizens," he added.

McNamara served on the water board for 18 months. He was appointed by Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and removed last October. Young charged that McNamara was using the water board for his own political purposes.

Young appoints all seven water-board members, who serve at his discretion.

McNamara told Kelley and his colleagues: "By exercising responsible control over the water rates charged by this board, you act as a check and balance for the policies of that board. It is our hope that the elected legislative representatives act prudently and wisely so that requesting the judiciary to give us justice will not be necessary."

THE MAYOR said, several months earlier when the Monday night meeting was first scheduled, that the suburbs may hire an attorney to initiate a lawsuit to fight the rate increases.

In defending his views, McNamara wrote that the water department budget approved earlier last year by the water board without calling for a rate boost is now "being ignored" by the board.

McNamara urged the Detroit council to

wait for the results of an outside audit of the water department's books before deciding on the rate increase.

He noted that the auditing firm of Arthur Anderson has been hired for \$130,000 to review the rate setting procedure of the water department.

McNamara stressed that numerous points haven't been answered since the water board approved the rate boost by a 4-3 vote last fall.

The mayor said the audit being conducted by an outside accounting firm "can't reconcile the budget with actual expenditures," and that "there are several millions of dollars that appear to be surplus in the general water-board fund."

McNAMARA ADDED that there is a \$25 million bond issue for capital improvements in the budget "but the (water) board neither needs that much, nor do

they intend to sell that amount."

The expansion of the water system will "open new territories for development and cause additional flight from Detroit and the older suburbs," he said.

"The new budget adds over 50 new personnel to the water budget and about the same number to the sewer activity."

"The great majority of these people are in administration and not in productive areas."

McNamara led the opposition to the proposed rate boost last spring and summer.

During that period, he called several meetings of suburban officials and discussed with them methods of controlling the water board and future rate changes.

At the same time, the Michigan House of Representatives created a study committee which tried and failed to get the water department to open its records for review.

Avid navigator braves cold for winter flights

That sensation of flight experienced by Jonathan Livingston Seagull is what lures Alan Krugler out in the midst of winter to fly radio-controlled airplane models.

Krugler of Thornwood Street, Canton Township, is a member of the Rib Crackers Club for aviation enthusiasts which is sponsored by the Livonia Department of Parks and Recreation. He works as an engineering supervisor for Ford Motor Co. in Dearborn and works for fun flying models.

KRUGLER IS one of about a dozen members of the Rib Crackers who continue flying during the winter months.

"We have to use ether to get the engines started and have rigged up the planes with special skis that we are experimenting with for winter flight."

Krugler, who has lived in Canton three

years and in Livonia for four years before that, says flying is a sport, hobby and science.

"It is a very fast growing sport. There are more than 100,000 radio-controlled flyers now in the United States. I've been into flying for about two years now, but have been interested for a long time."

MOST OF THE time, Krugler flies his models in Bicentennial Park on Seven Mile west of Farmington Road in Livonia. His wife, though, tells of the time he was on a field near Ann Arbor flying models in the midst of a blizzard.

The day photographer Art Emanuel caught him in action, Krugler was flying a "Sweet Stick" model with skis attached. "I have about a dozen models," he says, "of which six to eight are flyable. I usual-

ly fly four to six hours a week. This tapers off a bit in the winter, but in the summer I try to get out every weekend."

Krugler says his engineering discipline has helped in building and flying. "The sport involves aerodynamics, electricity, communications and mechanical engineering. It isn't so complex that a non-technical person cannot learn the sport."

"Many of our club members aren't in technical professions, but do get help and advice for those of us who are. That's one of our club's objectives—to teach members how to fly models and help them with the technical aspects. The other objective, of course, is safety. You have to be careful because these planes fly pretty fast. The 'Sweet Stick,' for instance, flies about 40 mph."

CAC members named

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), as finally approved by the Plymouth Board of Education, has done quite well in reaching its goal of a cross-representation of community interests.

The members approved by the school board has 78 women and 49 men. Broken down geographically by governmental units, there are 34 representatives from the City of Plymouth, 66 from Plymouth Township and 23 from Canton Township.

Some 21 members do not have children in the Plymouth Community School District. Of those parents of children, three are parents of pre-school children, 27 of elementary, seven of middle school, 15 of high school and 51 parents have children at more than one level.

OCCUPATIONALLY, there are 34 homemakers, 13 teachers, 12 engineers and eight students.

Among the occupations and positions represented on the CAC are: financial, emission and purchasing analysts; Realtors; accountants; cafeteria aide; salesman; clergyman; physical therapist; policeman; paper delivery agent; copywriter; bus driver; registered nurse; assistant principal; assistant professor; bank manager; instructor, University of Michigan; director of the Senior Citizens Housing Commission; cashier; lunch and bus supervisor; counselor; plant managers; social workers; secretaries; and manufacturers' representative.

There are also retired persons, former school teachers, member of personnel planning for Ford Motor Co., an industrial vice-president, a nutritionist, rink attendant, photographer, chemical engineer, and geologist.

THE 12 subcommittees of the CAC, which are now meeting every Wednesday, will study:

Pre-school education; scheduling for grades K-5; classroom organization;

maintenance operations; special programs; extra-curricular activities; legislation and communication; vocational and career education; scheduling for grades 6-12; general curriculum; the exceptional child; and inservice training and CATTLES.

The 12 subcommittees have 12 members each who will meet for 12 weeks and issue a combined report—approved by the entire CAC—to the board of education in April 1976.

10 regional parks

Battle over jail looms

City officials in Westland and other suburbs are threatening to go to court to block a Wayne County Board of Commissioners plan to house prisoners in a renovated building at the Wayne County General Hospital site.

The county board last week voted 16-5 to spend an estimated \$15 million to renovate the vacant M building on the hospital grounds at Michigan and Merriman roads in Westland.

Supporting the move were Commissioners Mary Dumas of Livonia and Richard Manning of Redford Township. Opposed were John Barr of Dearborn Heights, the newly appointed Thomas Presnell of Westland and Royce Smith of Belleville.

WESTLAND MAYOR Tom Taylor threatened to seek a restraining order Wednesday morning, after the plan officially is to take effect.

Taylor is seeking city council support but said he is prepared to file as a citizen if council declines to act.

"The first thing an escapee would do," said the former police sergeant, "is attempt to get a hostage. What better than a nurse, a physician or a patient?"

"The first floor (of M building) has 10 doors, and the facility has hundred of windows."

A former county commissioner, Taylor called the board's plan "hastily conceived. The county is suggesting the use of a kind of commercial lock instead of standard jail locks because it's readily available. They're using a toilet facility that is not traditionally used in jails because there is a back order on the kind that is used in jails."

BUT COUNTY officials called the chance of prisoner escapes "extremely remote" and said surveillance will be better than at the main jail.

Sheriff William Lucas said, "We are going to assign our very best and experienced command officers and men out there. Inmates will have no access to doors or windows."

"There is the headquarters of the sheriff's patrol a few hundred yards away with patrol cars constantly in the area."

"In the extremely remote possibility that a prisoner might escape, he would not hang around the area where he would stick out like a sore thumb in his jail uniform. He would get out of the area," said Lucas.

M.H. (Bill) Ashley, county buildings supervisor, said prisoners would be enclosed in 20-man wards with heavy steel security screening to prevent access to windows.

Because of a five-foot walk for guards between the screen and the outer wall, Ashley said, "there will be better vision for a guard stationed there than at the jail. These people probably will receive more surveillance than at the jail."

THE PLAN to renovate M building came after commissioners had rejected N building, the former nursing care facility.

M building is a former mental ward which Taylor said was built in 1920. M can house 250 prisoners.

The county building department estimated it would take 12 weeks to complete the first phase of renovation to house 60-80 prisoners.

Completion of the project would take an estimated 17-20 weeks.

In the interim, the county will use three

barracks at the Detroit House of Correction in Plymouth Township. Renovation of the Dehoco barracks will cost \$50,000 and operations some \$500,000.

Mrs. Dumas said she would have preferred to build a new jail, but voted for the M building renovation because of the "crisis" situation created by a circuit court order that the main jail's population be reduced to 720 prisoners. The main jail currently houses nearly 900.

She called the N building proposal bad because it is too close to psychiatric facilities and medical buildings.

SMITH SAID the renovation of M building would still fail to meet state standards, "but the state has indicated that as long as we're pursuing construction of a new jail, they'll go along with it."

"I've seen the jail, and the facilities are not as bad as the papers make them out to be. I read about prisoners not having towels. Well, the reason they don't have towels was because they flushed them down the toilets. There's one cellblock of hard core prisoners who won't sweep the floors."

"Give 'em a newspaper and they'll shred it to pieces. I still think we should spend money on the honest people."

A proposal to build a new jail was on the 1972 ballot, but county voters rejected it.

Presnell said total cost of the M building project would actually be about \$4.3 million—including some \$3 million for operations.

"To me that's a lot of money for a temporary solution to a permanent problem," Presnell said.

larger lots would be somewhat costlier than those built on the current standard of 60 feet. But he added that some of the additional cost of the extra footage would be swallowed by the builders.

One of the most important changes in the new plan is the demise of the PUD as a building unit in Canton.

THE PUD is a contract agreement between a developer and the township not subject to normal zoning restrictions and subdivision ordinances.

They provide for a mix of land uses in one development parcel, usually a large piece of land ranging from 22 to 500 acres. Currently there are 18 PUDs in the township but Greenstein and Manore claim they have outlived their usefulness.

"They started in 1968," said Manore, "when the market was for multiples and that's all the builders wanted to construct."

"With the PUD, we were able to get more single family housing, and open space for parks in the developments. Sidewalks were provided on major thoroughfares and school sites were preserved."

"But now the market has shifted back to single family homes and they are no longer needed. Most of the larger parcels in the eastern half of the township are gone now, and PUDs can't be built on small parcels of land. The one that is 22 acres now is too small."

Greenstein commented "There were other problems, too. People were misled when they bought houses. They didn't know they'd have to join homeowner associations, pay and take care of the parks, and many were not aware they'd be living next to multiples."

"THE OPEN space was left ungraded and unseeded in many cases, with all the junk the builders had lying on it."

"Also, because they aren't subject to normal ordinances, improvements and upgrading of codes cannot be enforced."

Greenstein said many of the contracts signed as early as 1969 haven't been developed yet. "The problem is once we sign that contract, we lose all control over the project."

"The codes change and we can't do anything about it."

The supervisor said legal avenues were being explored to see if PUD contracts where construction hasn't started could be voided.

Although much of the remaining land in the eastern half of Canton is expected to be developed in subdivisions with smaller lots, pockets of acre lots will be provided in "carefully identified areas which, without zoning, have established a certain character."

Although most of those areas will be in the southeast section of the township, larger lots will be available in northwest Canton as well.

ACCORDING TO Manore there are enough 60-foot lots to last for at least six years.

"We have 4,000 available now and room to build 1,000 more. We had 800 houses built this year and that rate we can expect the 60-foot lots to last a minimum of six years."

"When we get to the larger lots, the boom should slow down."

Manore said he expected the growth rate to remain about the same or increase with an average of 3,000-3,800 people moving into the township annually.

By 1995, under the new plan, most of the development will be finished and the total population of the township will be about 105,000.

The rapid increase in population will put

a strain on the budget of the township, he said, at least until 1980 when a new census will provide for more federal shared revenue.

THE 1975 mid-decade census will help the township recoup lost state aid but, as far as the federal government is concerned, until 1980 there are still only 11,000 people in Canton, Manore said.

The planner added "Of course we can't be sure the development will continue at the same pace because external forces outside of Canton determine the fate of the housing market."

"But the same influences that caused the boom, the extension of utilities, large parcels bought from farmers by single developers, the Plymouth name, the middle-range lot sizes and the fact that Canton is on the western fringe of Detroit still exist."

As for the type of people moving to Canton, Manore expected more of the same kind of people reflected in the 1975 census.

They will probably be moving west from Garden City, Westland, Livonia, Redford, seeking a second or third home. They will have higher than average incomes, probably in the \$15,000-\$25,000 range, and they will probably be white collar workers.

But whether the continued rapid growth will include a push for cityhood is a question that remains in the air, according to Manore and Greenstein.

"It will depend on the orientation of the people that move in," said Greenstein. "It will depend whether or not they want the sophistication of city services. It will depend on whether or not they want control and ownership of the roads, and whether or not they will want the highly sophisticated kinds of fire and police protection that only cities can provide."

"It's up to the people. If they demand it, they'll get it—but they'll also have to pay for it."

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In paramedic program

Firemen learn rescue skills

Those fire department ambulances seen everyday racing through the streets and highways aren't just manned by firefighters. The men assigned to these emergency vehicles are well trained in handling injured and ill persons.

An example of the training these dedicated men receive is taking place today at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia.

The hospital and its staff offer, free of charge to area fire departments, a complete course in EMT, Emergency Medical Technician studies.

Currently attending the two-day-a-week classes are three firefighters from Canton, two from Plymouth Township and one from the City of Plymouth fire department.

Dr. John Rogers, a member of the hospital staff, is director of this program which has been offered by the hospital for the past four years.

The state approved course gives the firefighters 100 hours of training spread over four months. The group meets every Tuesday and Thursday from 8:20 to 11:30 a.m. in the hospital where members of the staff instruct the men in various life-saving techniques.

Mrs. Al Headley, a registered nurse, said the men also are allowed to observe the techniques used in the hospital's emergency room.

Mrs. Headley, who is one of the many volunteer instructors at the hospital, said the firefighters are taught methods of

basic life support, the care and treatment of injured persons, the way to treat wounds and extrication of persons trapped in a vehicle.

"All the men taking the course, and we have them from many communities, are currently assigned to rescue units," she said. "When they complete the course, they receive a state certificate showing they have passed the course." The present class ends April 8.

She said that if the men choose to do so, they can take further training and will then be eligible for a national test.

The Canton Fire Department has three men enrolled in the current course: David Champagne, Donald Oelke and David Hamilton.

Tom Lenaghan of the City of Plymouth Fire Department is a member of the class as are Barney Maas and Sgt. Ernie Honke of the Plymouth Township Fire Department.

This community service project of St. Mary Hospital has turned out dozens of well-trained fire department rescue teams that are trained to care for accident and ill patients while transporting them to a hospital.

There is no official record of how many lives have been saved by these men, but the fire stations all have letters of thanks from relatives whose loved ones have been saved through the efforts of the trained firefighters.

Schools' battle for state aid dropped

Wayne-Westland, Livonia and Plymouth school districts have agreed to drop plans to initiate a lawsuit against the state over school aid setbacks.

"We're making the decision on legal advice following the attorney general's ruling," W-W Supt. Timothy Dyer said.

In December Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled that an executive order concerning state aid cutbacks was constitutional.

According to the Dyer, the only course left to the three districts would be to proceed on a "slim procedural error" which the district could quickly remedy.

All three of the districts are high millage districts and feel the state aid formula penalized districts which levied more than 27 mills—the cutoff point after which no additional state aid funds are released.

"Although we believe that it is grossly unfair, the best place to correct this problem is in next year's state aid act and you can be sure that it will be at the top of our priority list to recommend that to the legislature."

"Our local legislators have been most supportive and hopefully we can convince enough of their colleagues to join them so we can incorporate a fair procedure for reducing revenues to districts who find it necessary to tax themselves in excess of 27 mills."

STATE AID CUTS to the districts included close to \$700,000 for Wayne-Westland, \$725,000 for Livonia and \$325,000 for Plymouth.

In addition to objecting to the basic school aid formula, the three districts also disagreed with the way state aid cuts are made.

While the districts only receive aid based on the first 27 mills, the cutback formula is based on the districts' entire operating millage.

"The formula is unfair because it doesn't recognize total local effort on the pay-out of state aid, while it penalizes high millage districts in the cutback."

"We will try harder in next year's state aid act to bring an elimination of unfairness in appropriating state school aid allotments," Dyer said.

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Indians say thanks for gifts

Indians in several western Michigan settlements have sent pictures of their Christmas parties to the Observer & Eccentric with thank-you notes to the persons here who contributed food and gifts.

"This party fills the heart with laughter and happiness. But for this special event, there would be tears of sadness for many," said The Proud Eagle, newsletter of the Traverse Bay Area Indian Center.

"THIS IS OUR third Christmas party, and each year they get bigger and bigger. More children, more people registered for toys this year, causing some extra scurrying about in Santa's workshop."

Santa, in this case, is represented by the persons and groups who contributed to the work of the Indian-affairs committee of the Western Wayne County Conservation Association.

Clothing and a sewing machine came from Girl Scout Cadet Troop 66, Coolidge School in Livonia. Holy Childhood mission school in Harbor Springs received a mitten

tree from Trinity Church of the Brethren, Redford Township.

Senator blisters mandatory jail law

An Oakland County state senator pointed to the Wayne County Jail crisis as he bitterly denounced passage of a bill requiring mandatory prison sentences for gun-carrying felons.

Sen. Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park), whose district includes Southfield and Farmington, took the unusual step of having his remarks inserted in the Senate Journal after that body gave 28-8 passage to HB 5073.

Cooper said lawmakers had overlooked the high cost of running jails and prisons. Additional funds needed to provide for persons who may be incarcerated under the new law are estimated by corrections officials at \$240 million.

"WE HAVE today in the news a sheriff in Wayne County, a decent, honorable man, who has been held in contempt of (circuit) court for overcrowding the

Wayne County Jail," said Cooper.

"The issue is so critical," he added, "that they are now struggling to find alternate sites in which to incarcerate people."

"In the face of statistics from the department of corrections that the Michigan prison system is overcrowded, this legislature saw fit to pass a bill which will increase the amount of inhabitants in that system without one bit of regard as to where we are going to put them or how to fund it."

Cooper also doubted mandatory prison sentences would be a deterrent to crime.

THE BILL was supported by three other area senators—Bill Huffman (D-Madison Heights), Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and William Faust (D-Westland).

Absent was Sen. Donald Bishop (R-Rochester).

Gov. Milliken has expressed support for the measure, which takes effect next Jan. 1.

The \$240 million price tag on increased costs was made by Perry Johnson, director of the state department of corrections. He predicted, however, that defendants would engage in plea bargaining with county prosecutors and arrange to plead guilty to lesser offenses.

The bill's author, Rep. Dennis Hertel (D-Detroit), said the new law will be "no panacea for crime but an attempt to deter

some criminals who will know they will go to prison if caught."

Guardianship hearings held at Plymouth center

It was business as usual when Wayne County Probate Court Judge Ernest C. Boehm convened court—except for one difference. Court was convened in the Plymouth Center for Human Development auditorium, and Judge Boehm was handling guardianship hearings for 25 non-ambulatory, mentally retarded, adult residents of the center.

Judge Boehm is the first probate judge to hold such hearings at the center, although similar in-hospital hearings have been instituted at Ypsilanti State Hospital and Alpine Center in Gaylor.

"There wasn't one of them that could have stood the strain of an ambulance ride to the courtroom," Judge Boehm said after completing the initial 25 hearings.

"The patients have to have a guardian before they can get medical attention and many are in no condition to go to court."

THE JUDGE said most of the patient care facilities are too far away for probate judges to travel to.

"We don't have the manpower to handle these cases out of court, but we have to fig-

ure out how to give these people a hearing," Judge Boehm said.

For the present, Judge Boehm sees no other way of insuring hearings for the mentally ill or retarded who are incapable of traveling to courts.

"I have no doubt that there will be more of these hearings at Plymouth Center," he said.

PETER D. SCHWEITZER, community relations director for the center, said, "It would have involved a lot of expense and staff time to transport the residents involved to and from the regular court in ambulances."

"I think it's a great idea to have hearings at the center," he added.

Judge Boehm said he would prefer to hold the hearings in court, but sees no way to resolve the problem.

A Colorado blue spruce has been planted at Schoolcraft College in honor of the college's first practical nursing class.

It is the first evergreen tree to be planted on campus and its purchase was the gift of Helene Durfee of Orlando, Fla. Formerly a resident of Northville, Mrs. Durfee was a member of the first P.N. class.

Two other members of the class, Beverly Bladwin and Frances C. Smith, both of Garden City, were present with Harriett Sattig, director of health careers, for tree-planting ceremonies in front of the Applied Sciences Building.

The tree is the second gift from class members who last year gathered for their 10-year reunion. At that time, they presented the college a check for \$100 for the purchase of instructional materials.

Practical nursing and occupational therapy assistant students are the two groups which have formed active alumni associations among Schoolcraft's health career graduates.


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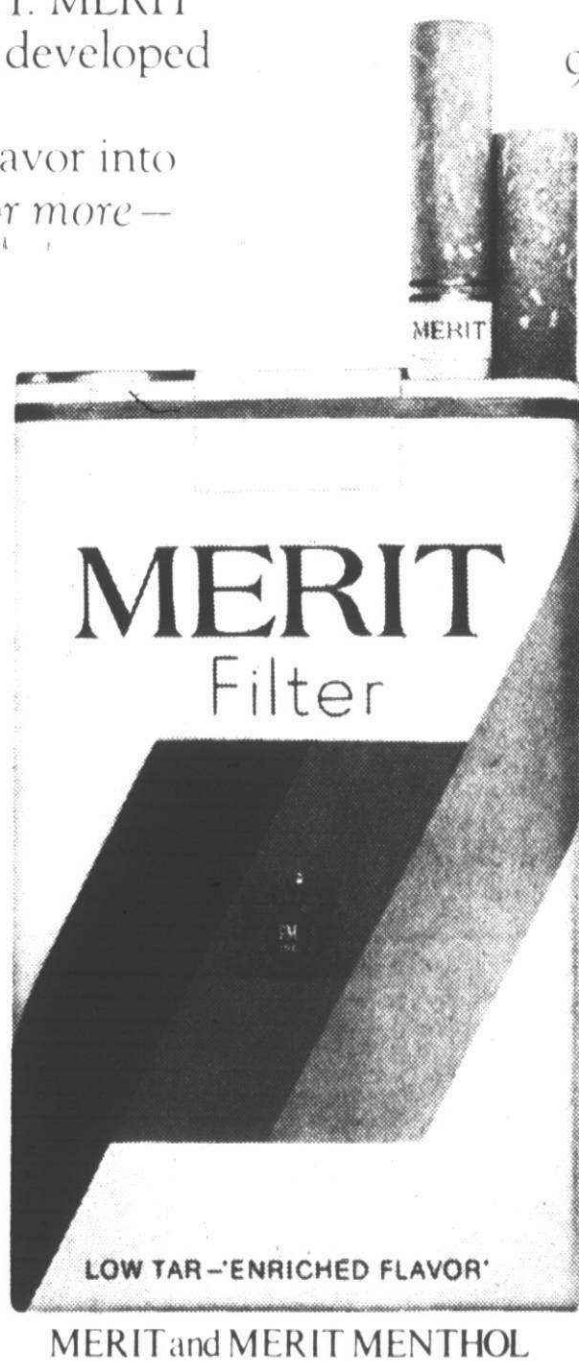
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Rocks are number 1

3 play hurt as Chiefs succumb to Mustangs

The Plymouth Canton Chiefs came up flat in the fourth quarter as their top three scorers all twisted ankles, allowing the Northville Mustangs to take a 63-50 decision. The loss was Canton's third in a row, dropping them into fourth place in the Western Six conference with a 3-4 record.

"We weren't moving very well, especially on defense. We didn't carry out the defensive plans we practiced," said Canton coach Casey Cavell.

Northville shot close to 50 percent en route to its fourth consecutive league victory, including triumphs over Churchill and Farmington Harrison, the first and second place teams in the league.

Canton's junior guard, Rob Mandle, scored the Chiefs first eight points in the first quarter as the Mustangs held a 13-11 advantage after the first quarter.

NOTTHVILLE increased the span to four at the half, 31-27, while Plymouth Canton's backcourt was sustaining injuries that would later hinder their comeback.

Tom Close and Rob Mandle suffered mild ankle sprains in the second quarter.

"Northville sets a lot of screens and picks on offense. They're a team that keeps the players in motion when they have the ball. All the players who received

sprained ankles couldn't take the shots like they usually would," said Cavell.

The opening of the third session saw both teams trade baskets. Canton connected again to make the score 33-31, but a mixup arose about the official score. After a meeting with the coaches, the score was readjusted to 35-31 putting Northville ahead by four.

"It's impossible to say what kind of difference that makes in a game. It didn't have an effect in our game but it was typical of what kind of a night it was for us," commented the Canton mentor.

Canton trailed 44-39 at the end of the third period with Rob Mandle drawing his fourth personal, and Keith Osborne becoming the third ankle sprain casualty of the evening.

WITH A FIVE-point lead and Canton's backcourt unable to play at full capacity, Northville went into a stall.

The Chiefs had to get the ball back and in doing so, they committed several fouls, starting the Mustangs parade to the charity stripe where they hit 11 of 14 free throw attempts.

Northville was paced by the Armada brothers, Chris and Tony, who clicked for 13 and 23 points respectively to set the

foundation of Northville's scoring.

"They both move toward the basket well, and use good moves to get between the defense. It's something we should've prevented," praised Cavell.

Osborne led the Canton scorers with 17 points; Mandle had 16 with all but two coming in the first half.

Canton is now 3-4 in the league and 4-10 overall with a game tomorrow night against Woodhaven, a team that hasn't won this year.

The Bulldog girls also got into the record-shattering act, as the 15-18 800-yard freestyle relay crew swam the distance in 8:15.4.

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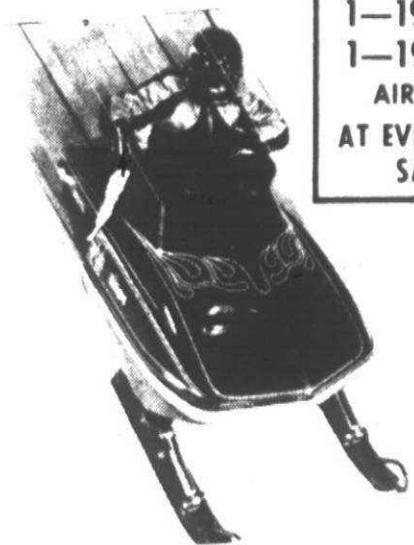
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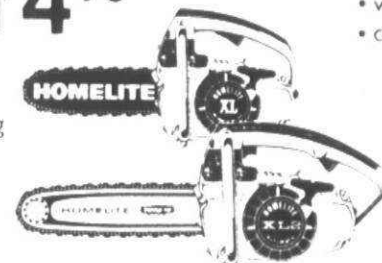


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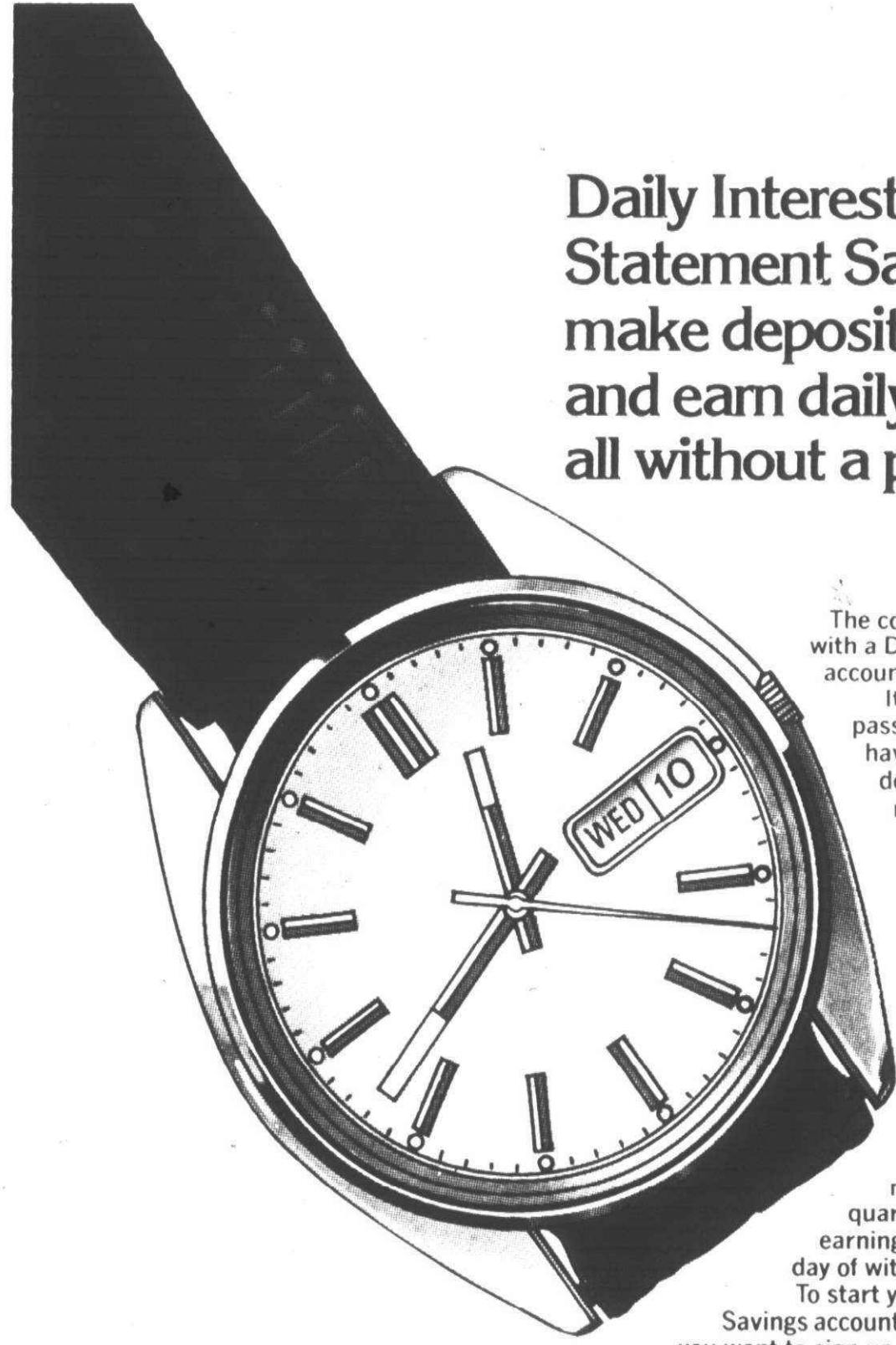
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Northville tankers sink Canton, 57-26

MARILYN DWYER, her hair a mass of floppy ringlets, was twirling her lornette in a most un-wicked manner.

But when the curtain rises on opening night, Marilyn will be a most convincing wicked Stepmother. She is an experienced hand in Plymouth Branch of American Association of University Women children's plays. Last year she was Tweedle-Dee in "Alice in Wonderland." In '74 she was in charge of cast and set design. She has produced, directed, played Queen Brangomar in "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," Henrietta Hen in "Jack and the Beanstalk," Jingles the Jester in "Sleeping Beauty," and Lord Chamberlain in "Princess and the Pea."

"Cinderella" is the 16th children's drama presented by the AAUW.

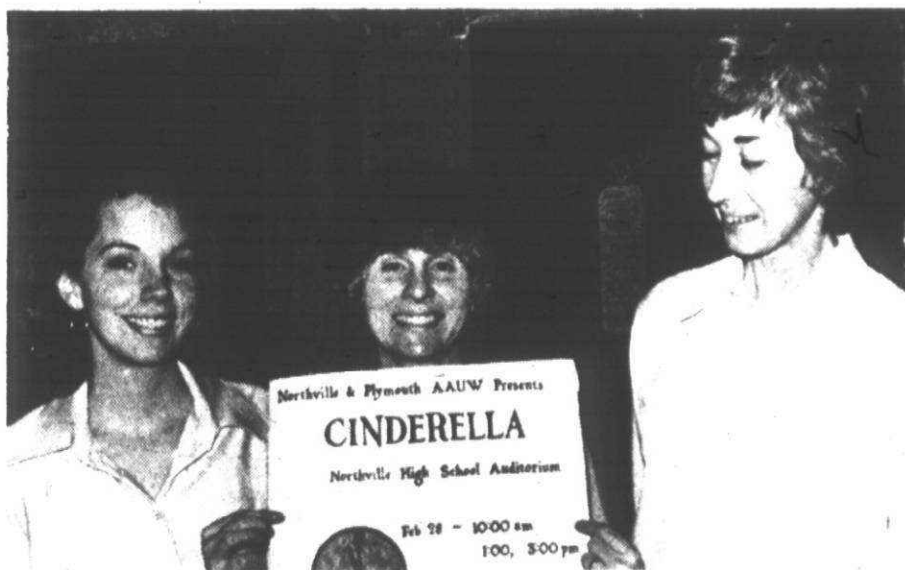

Williamsburg arrangements have Betty Porter touch

Stop in the Williamsburg Shop of a Jacobson's store anywhere from Toledo to West Bloomfield, Grand Rapids to Grosse Pointe, and you may see a familiar face.

The lady in early Williamsburg dress surrounded by dozens of attentive listeners has to be Betty Porter of Plymouth. And if it is Betty Porter, the gathering must have something to do with dried flower arrangements.

At a recent four-hour demonstration in the West Bloomfield store, someone took a count. There were 175 women in the audience and several stayed the full four hours.

Mrs. Porter shows how to assemble, to best advantage, the contents of a "bouquet box" available in the Williamsburg Shop.

"I use delft containers, bricks and Revere bowls," she said. But her favorite is the posy holder, a five-fingered vase which was the choice of colonial Williamsburg ladies.

BETTY PORTER'S interest in flower arranging dates back to times, as a three-year-old, she watched her southern grandmother gather and assemble bouquets.

"Grandmother had a special touch, or knack, with flowers," she said.

Mrs. Porter attended every flower arranging course within traveling distance. The professional training, combined with her natural talent, resulted in innovations. Friends and neighbors were calling on her for assistance in putting together centerpiece and arrangements for special occasions. Soon she was instructing workshops and classes.

She found a valued mentor in Williamsburg, Va. Watching and talking to Edna Pennell was "almost like sitting at Buddha's feet," Mrs. Porter said. Ms. Pennell was responsible for all the floral pieces throughout the Williamsburg complex.

She opened her own flower shop, and called on Betty Porter for herbal wreaths. The Porters delivered 100 of the fragrant wreaths late in October.

"Half of them were sold the three days we were there," Mrs. Porter said.

SHE FOUND the pattern for her colonial gown in Williamsburg and had it made here. The fine print dress over the moss green under-skirt adds to the atmosphere of the demonstration.

With her present commitment to Jacobson's she has given up local classes. "I'll still work with the garden club and will do about three weddings a month."

The use of permanent bouquets for wedding parties has gained in popularity. Mrs. Porter "did" 106 weddings last year—all dried arrangements.

A dozen white roses in a bridal bouquet requires the gluing of each petal. The white roses change to a creamy yellow after drying.

"The brides have so many attendants now," she said, "as many as 10. At first it was just a few baskets of dried flowers for bridesmaids. Now it is the whole wedding party—even boutonnières for the men."

How does her husband, Bill, react to her busy schedule?

"He's terrific. He carries gloves and shears in his car and often brings home

dried plants he's found beside the road.

"When we're on a trip, I never seem to see anything below the horizon. He's the one who spots the wayside gems. Sometimes he fills the back of the van."

Mrs. Porter will be guest speaker at the Feb. 11 meeting of area Girl Scout leaders, registered adults and senior scouts in First United Methodist Church of Plymouth on North Territorial Road. She will share tips on collecting, drying and arranging to assist leaders in a bi-centennial project coming up later this year.

Representatives of 88 troops in the Plymouth-Northville area also will elect 11 adult and two girl scout delegates to the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council meeting.

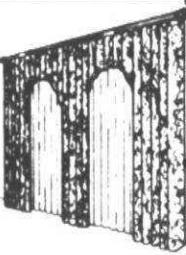

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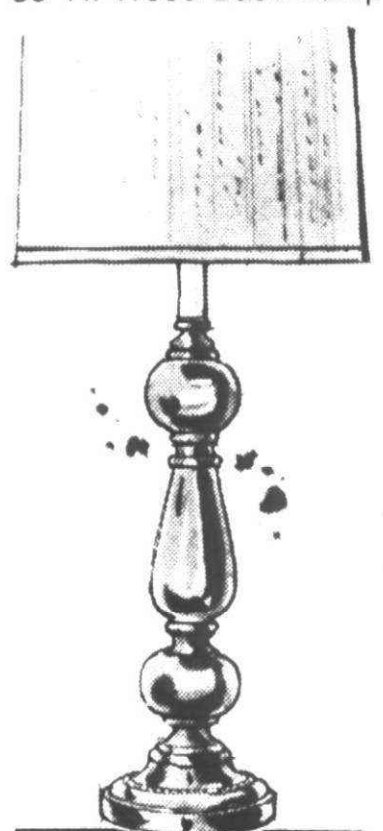

The Stroller: The innkeeper muses

What do you suppose would happen if the Pilgrims were landing here now with the country in the shape it is in?

This question was asked of The Stroller the other day. For a time he was nonplussed. So he kept repeating "What would the Pilgrims do?"

Then he got to thinking of the stories recorded in our history dealing with the common storehouse the Pilgrims set up in

those early days and ran on the basis, "if you didn't put anything in, you couldn't take anything out."

That's possibly one of the first things they would do—establish a common storehouse to take care of the economic and social problem brought about by the unemployment compensation act that pays a fellow for not working.

In fact, so great has this problem become in our bicentennial year that people prefer to live on unemployment compensation instead of working. In many cases the weekly stipends are almost the same, so why should a fellow work if he can get almost as much money for remaining idle. The Pilgrims no doubt would be shocked at this and you can bet they would do something about it.

THE STROLLER didn't realize how much of a problem the unemployment act caused until he spoke with an old friend at the corner gas station.

As usual, as a small businessman, he was singing the blues. "I don't know what we're coming to," he said, "but a lot of the stations are closing. They can't get men to pump gas. They can make almost as much staying home."

The old friend at the gas station is not the only one who is complaining. The Pilgrims would get the shock of their lives if they could listen to some of the tales of woe among businessmen.

All of this reminds The Stroller of the many ways the employers are devising to "survive" as one of them put it.

The latest plan to overcome the condition was offered the day by The Stroller's favorite innkeeper.

"I don't know how much longer we can take it," he said in discussing the plight of the "little man." Then he offered this plan.

"I'm thinking of dividing our dining rooms into sections," he explained, "and leasing them to the waitresses. They can then bid for them. To make it attractive I will sell them the food at a reduced price and, naturally, they can keep the tips."

Then he asked "Do you see what this will do?"

WITHOUT HESITATION he explained that the waitresses no longer would be his employees. They would be contractors, having their own place of business. And he pointed out that he would have only the cooks to pay.

"And best of all," he said, "I won't have unemployment compensation to pay."

Under this plan, he said, the waitresses can build up their own clientele. People can call up and reserve space with them and if you have a favorite waitress everything will be fine.

"I'd be happy to pay the sales tax on the food I sell to the waitresses and I honestly believe the plan would work to the betterment of all concerned."

The Pilgrims would have a difficult time trying to beat a plan like that—even with a common storehouse.

It would be something different to mark our bicentennial year.
