Hunting ban hearing slated for section five

Canton residents living in section five of the township will have a chance to air their views March 24 on why hunting should be banned in the one-square mile section bounded by Joy, Ridge, Warren and Beck.

The Hunting Area Control Committee, composed of one member from the DNR, the county sheriff, the state police and the township board, will hold the hearing in township hall starting at 7 p.m.

An earlier attempt by residents to get hunting banned in section five met with failure several years ago.

Currently, 19½ of the 36 one-mile square sections in Canton are off limits to hunters.

All land east of Canton Center, the Centennial Education Park site and land in the southern half of section six, a region

bounded by Warren, Ridge and Napier, is closed to hunting.

TOWNSHIPS, unlike cities, cannot control hunting through firearms regulation, and must rely on a long and complicated process to ban hunting.

Final jurisdiction on the matter lies with the state Joint Administrative Rules Committee, a legislative body composed of three state senators and five representatives.

The rules committee acts on a recommendation by the Hunting Area Control Committee which must be approved by the township board.

If the rules committee approves the recommendation, it must be verified by the attorney general's office. Before the ban can be instituted, an identical ordinance must

be passed by the township board.

BRUCE ANDREWS, DNR conservation law executive says the process takes at least six months and can be considerably longer, if the recommendation is stalled at any stage of the process.

Residents in western portions of Plymouth Township attempting to get hunting banned west of Beck made little progress recently, when it was ruled that while hunting would be banned in certain portions of the area they requested, other areas in the township previously closed to hunting would be reopened.

Residents asking for the ban had to wait nearly a year for the compromise solution, but the final answer from the joint rules committee has not been made.

Tax deadline extended

Delinquent taxpayers got a break Tuesday night when the Canton board of trustees agreed to extend the property tax deadline from Feb. 14 to March 1.

Late tax bills can be submitted at the township hall up to that date, but after March 1, all taxes must be paid to Wayne County.

Payment before March 1 can be made in person at the township hall, by mail, or at one of six local banks.

They are Wayne Bank, Detroit Bank and Trust, Bank of the Commonwealth, National Bank of Detroit, Security Bank or Standard Federal Savings and Loan.

Checks should be made out to Carl Parsell, Treasurer, and mailed to him at 44508

Geddes Road, Belleville, 48111.

After the new deadline, all payments must be sent to Louis H. Funk, Wayne County Treasurer, 208 City-County Building, Detroit 48184.

All late bills will be subject to a three per cent penalty fee and one per cent per month thereafter.

PARSELL REMINDS all residents filling out federal income tax forms to make sure they fill in the portion on the 1040 or 1040A form requesting to know in what county and township they live.

The information is requested by the Census Bureau and used to determine how much federal revenue sharing money the

township gets in 1976.

According to the Census Bureau, many citizens are confused as to where they live because of the several levels of local government, and because many areas, like Canton, are serviced by several post office outlets.

Parsell said regardless of what zip code and mailing designation township residents have, they should make sure to place the name Canton in the appropriate box.

The box is located on the front of both the 1040 and 1040A form near the top of the page.

Taxes to rise 12 per cent in 1976

County announces factor increase

Watch for your tax bills to increase by 12 to 17 per cent in 1976.

City and township officials in the Plymouth-Canton area have received notice from Wayne County that property taxes will be increased because local assessments haven't kept pace with inflation in the real estate market.

This means the property taxes in the City of Plymouth and Canton Township will increase by 12 per cent and by 17 per cent in Plymouth Township.

The county will increase all taxable properties in this area by that amount—as required by the Michigan constitution—unless local units reassess.

Officials from Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth Townships all agree they will study conducting a local re-assessment in the future, but won't in 1976.

THUS, the county will apply its equalization multipliers against all real property to raise the tax bases to a level equal to 50 per cent of the true market value.

This factor, because it is approved finally by the state, is applied to all property values and is known as the State Equalized Valuation (SEV) factor.

If a local municipality assesses its property at 50 per cent of true market value, the SEV multiplier is 1.00 and the local tax base remains unchanged.

The Wayne County Bureau of Taxation

has set a tentative equalization factor of 1.12 for Canton, 1.17 for Plymouth Township and 1.12 for the City of Plymouth.

THE COUNTY arrives at the "true market value" by sampling real estate sales transactions for a three-year period, and uses this average sales index as the yardstick to test local assessments.

According to the county's figures, Plymouth Township's factor is higher because its local assessments are furthest from the 50 per cent level.

The figures released by Clarence A. Hicks Jr., director of the county bureau of taxation, show that Plymouth Township is assessed locally at 42.96 per cent of true market value, Canton at 44.81 per cent, and the City of Plymouth at 44.65.

For both townships, local property assessments are conducted by the county bureau of taxation. The city's assessing is done by its treasurer, Kenneth Way.

THE CITY is contemplating at least some re-assessments in 1977, but not this year.

"We have been working with Wayne County and are considering re-assessment to bring our factor back to 1.00. We will be studying where the problems are and how best to correct them."

The last time the city re-assessed its

property was in 1973. For 1973 and 1974 the city had an SEV factor of 1.00, but inflation caught up last year, and the city received a factor of 1.06. "Normally, a complete re-assessment will keep the factor at 1.00 for three years. This time, our factor only lasted two years which indicates how inflation affects our real property values much faster."

BARBARA PRAY, who handles assessment matters for Plymouth Township, said she was pretty sure there would be no local reassessments in 1976.

"We will be taking a look at re-assessing in the future, but won't this year," she added. Plymouth Township had its last local re-assessment about four years ago.

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein said he had asked Hicks for a re-assessment in Canton, to avoid the factor, but was told the taxation bureau couldn't handle the task for three to five years because of county budget cutbacks.

"As the factor keeps going up, it is quite possible the real estate market value isn't going up as quickly and so that's why we wanted the re-assessment. I suspect the valuations might come out lower, at least for some taxpayers, if a complete assessment of the township was conducted."

IF THE TENTATIVE multipliers are the final factors approved, taxes are likely to

increase for all residents, businessmen and industrialists.

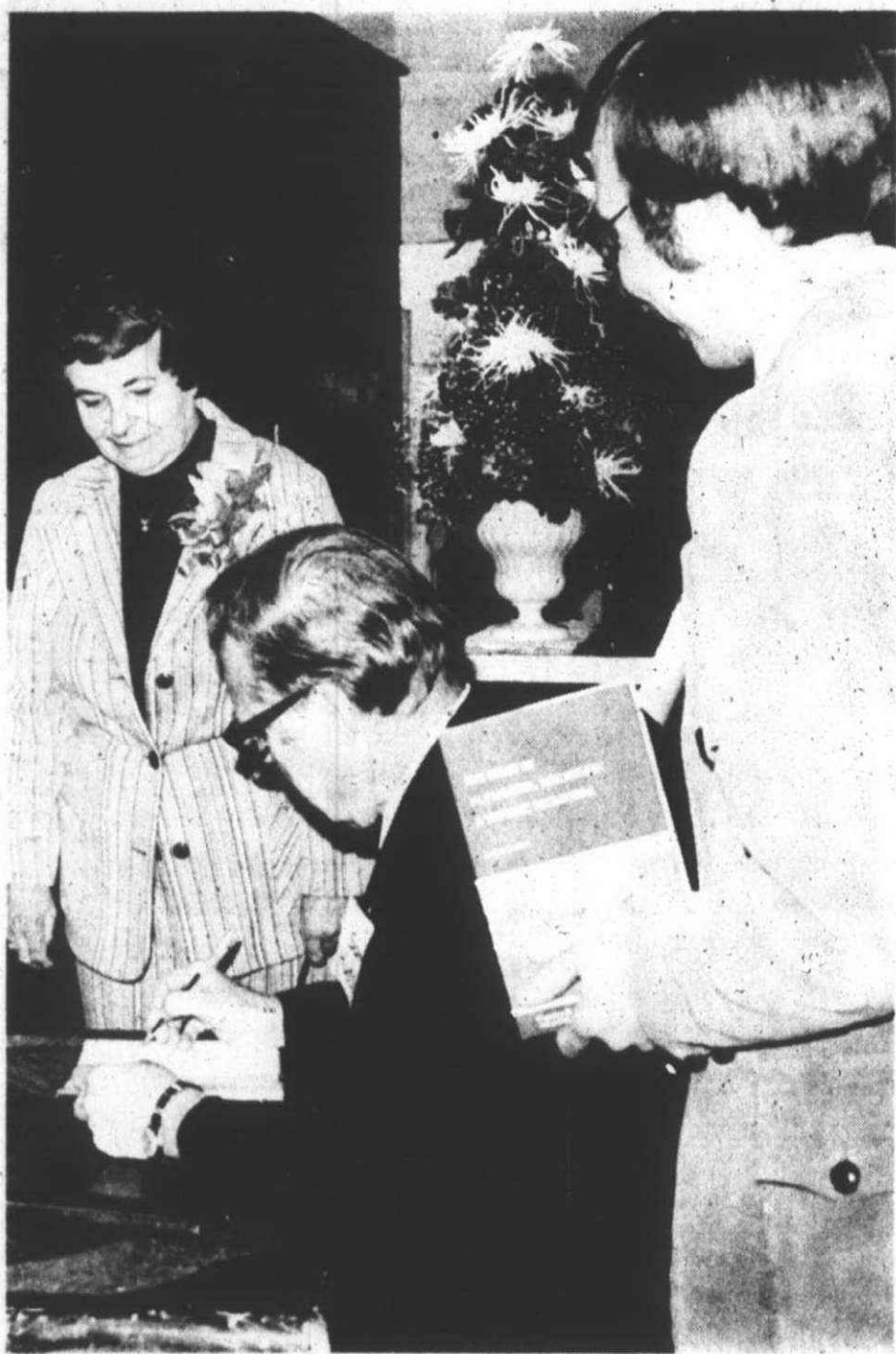
Any governmental unit always has the option of lowering its millage rate in proportion to the increase in the SEV factor so taxes collected will remain stable. Most governments don't, however, because the SEV increase produces additional revenue to keep pace with its rising operating expenses.

The SEV hikes also mean additional revenue for the school district, although not in direct proportion because state aid is reduced as local tax wealth increases.

For the school district the most significant is Plymouth Township's factor of 1.17 because the township contributes more tax revenue to the schools than Canton Township or the City of Plymouth.

City of Plymouth residents will first notice the increases in tax monies paid out when tax bills arrive in June. For township residents, the effect won't be felt until December.

In Wayne County this year, the only municipalities with a multiplier of 1.00 were Harper Woods and Highland Park. The highest factors applied were against: Brownstown Township, 2.70; Huron Township, 2.84; Redford Township, 2.54; Van Buren Township, 2.25; Dearborn, 2.36; Belleville, 2.27; Dearborn Heights, 2.80; Livonia, 2.20; Romulus, 2.26; and Southgate, 2.24.

MASTER LAND-USE PLAN: PART 4 Hotaling endorses plan

Editor's note: The following story is the fourth and final installment of the Canton Observer & Eccentric's series on the new proposed master land use plan. It features an interview with Michigan State professor of planning Robert Hotaling.

Canton township has a solid future—at least that's what Michigan State professor Robert Hotaling says.

An expert in regional and urban planning with a history of 33 years in the field, Hotaling was commissioned by the town-

ship board to evaluate the proposed master land use plan—a plan he finds satisfactory in most areas.

Hotaling submitted his report to the board and planning commission in early January, laying out "the legal and policy framework to support the plan."

"I pointed out where the plan was taking them and explained what should be done to make sure they are on sound ground legislatively, financially and administratively," Hotaling said.

"With the influence of the Plymouth name, Ford Road, Michigan Avenue, I-275, and M14 in the north, Canton seems assured of a good future with a fair share of the residential, commercial and industrial growth in the area."

The access to a metropolitan economy is the key to any township's economic future, and Canton has the necessary access to give it a continual shot in the arm. It's an attractive area."

WHILE HOTALING sees a bright future for the township, he attributes some of that optimism to good planning—planning he says that separates urban growth from rural development.

"The problem has been urban sprawl," Hotaling explained. "Land in the eastern half of Canton has been capitalized. Subdivisions have been built and sewer and water has been installed. But areas have been skipped over and the pressure to build in the west has been started prematurely."

"There's still enough land in the east to

build on for 20 years. Hopefully, with good planning, the capitalization (sewer and water) will be paid off before any more pressure is put on the west."

According to Hotaling, development patterns, unchecked, result in a haphazard building patterns, where land is wasted. Lots in developed areas go unused as the push continues westward.

It results, he says, in "depressed areas." "With the land not used properly, you get depressed service levels. Development is unevenly spread, and the result is that it costs more to provide municipal services."

"That's why you have the competition

for real estate tax base, the demand for industry and commercial.

"With more efficient planning, less dispersed development patterns and more ef-

Chamber elects new board

Five incumbents and one new officer were elected to the Canton Chamber of Commerce board of directors last week.

Incumbents re-elected for three year terms were President Bart Berg, Alfred Daly, Mary Perna, Bill Brown and Eldon Johnson.

Elected to fill two one-year unexpired terms were Arnie Williams, an incumbent, and Norman Frick.

The first meeting for the new board of di-

rectors will be held Feb. 18 in the Hillside Inn in Plymouth at 6:30 p.m.

At that time, the board will vote to fill the offices of president, first and second vice presidents, secretary and treasurer.

Elected officers will begin their terms in March at the annual meeting of the chamber.

For the first time in its history, the chamber will have a full-time employee, because of \$8,000 in federal grant money received through the Comprehensive Employ-

ment Training Act (CETA) this year.

It's the hope of president Berg that the \$8,000 will help free enough chamber money to hire a part-time executive director to help chamber members with any problems and attract new membership.

Berg said he expected a big year for the chamber with membership rising dramatically if an executive director is hired.

"We're looking for a retired man, experienced in this field," said Berg.

Youngsters enjoy EMU theater

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The play, "Let's Go! Movin' On," will be presented to six schools in the Plymouth Community School District within a three-month period.

The drama has been performed by the Little Theatre of the Young of Eastern Michigan University for Farrand and Smith elementary schools.

This month the performance will be put on for Central and Tanger elementary schools and in March for Miller and Bird elementary schools.

EACH YEAR thousands of youngsters in southeastern Michigan are entertained by the Little Theatre of the Young (TOY).

Last year, four traveling companies of TOY gave 105 performances, reaching out to 20,060 in audiences ranging in age from pre-school through college for schools, hospitals, libraries and professional organizations in 60 locations.

TOY's purposes include introduction of the arts to new audiences at all levels by bringing live theatre into the center of the school environment, experimentation with innovative forms of drama to heighten audience involvement and to reach and serve disadvantaged areas—both rural and urban.

"Let's Go! Movin' On" uses stories, music and movement from America's folklore to celebrate the bicentennial.

Language and movement are used extensively to "penetrate the minds and hearts of children—this time with a Cherokee Indian tale, an Alaskan story, a tall tale of Pecos Bill and more," says Virginia Koste, director of EMU's dramatic arts for children program.

THE MANY performances are made possible, in part, by a grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts. Schools or other organizations are requested to pay \$60 to help the group meet expenses.

Because of demand, the Little Theatre of the Young recently decided to extend its touring season into April, but many requests still will have to be denied, adds Ms. Koste.

Ms. Koste, who joined the speech and dramatic arts faculty about 14 years ago, earned a bachelor's degree from Vassar College in drama and child study and a master's degree in theatre from Wayne State University.

The museum is a privately-funded institution dependent upon admission fees.

TCP hosts land use plan hearing

A small but interested crowd of Canton residents gathered Thursday night at a Total Citizen's Power hearing on the proposed master land-use plan to prepare a "question bank" on the plan.

The meeting, held in the Plymouth Canton High School cafeteria, was hosted by TCP officers Bruce Young and Frank McMurray and featured a short presentation on the plan by planning commission chairman Robert Miller.

"What we wanted to do," explained Young, "was prepare a master list of questions on the plan. We want to compile a complete log of questions which we will forward to the planning commission for answers."

Young said he hoped TCP, an apolitical, nonprofit township organization, could provide a second forum on the plan to answer the questions raised Thursday night.

Residents attending Thursday night's forum, the first ever conducted by TCP, raised several questions on the legality of the plan, particularly about the new agricultural-industrial district.

According to the plan, large tracts of land in the western portion of the township will be zoned as agricultural-industrial for commercial farming and taxes on the land will be reduced in some instances by more than 50 per cent.

RESIDENTS ATTENDING the meeting wanted to know how that would affect

their taxes, and whether they would have to subsidize the farming interests in the community.

Others were concerned that the down zoning of property along Canton Center between Ford and Warren from commercial to residential uses would result in substantial financial losses for people holding that land.

Bart Berg, chamber president and last charter member of the planning commission was in the audience, and he agreed that if the plan is to be implemented, safeguards must be established to prevent financial loss for property owners—although he was quick to point out that he was not concerned about speculators, but rather, residents who have owned land in the township for years.

Other residents were concerned that sewers would not be extended to the western parts of the township, keeping the value of their land low, while some residents voiced concern over the lack of north-south roads in the township.

One resident wanted to know how the agricultural-industrial classification would affect land zoned for farming, but not held by farmers, and land currently not being farmed.

An official public hearing on the plan, directed by the planning commission will be held March 1 at 7:30 in Plymouth Salem High School auditorium.

ficient capitalization, you don't need as much taxbase to provide services."

While Hotaling says the concepts to prevent urban sprawl from wasting land have been around for "40 or 50 years," he considers Canton's plan a pioneer in the field of planning.

"WHAT'S SO unusual about the plan, is that it has taken so long for someone to do it this way. Very few people have the political guts and are willing to carry out the true meaning of good planning and land use zoning."

"I think Canton is the first to do it in its most advanced form."

Hotaling said somewhat similar plans aimed at "the orderly withdrawal of rural land" had been attempted elsewhere, particularly in Hawaii, California and Oregon but that in Michigan it was a first.

"Michigan is a very institutionalized state, and this move represents a step in the right direction."

Although Hotaling agrees with the basics of the plan, he said he expected it would be tested in court.

"I'm no lawyer," he commented, "but the court system has consistently ducked the issue of broad comprehensive planning."

"What they have looked for under the constitution is loss of property rights and whether compensation or rezoning is needed."

But they haven't commented on zoning legislation.

"The main thing is whether or not thorough planning and zoning for the public health, safety and welfare is of greater priority rights."

"WHAT'S THE one question that has never been answered in this state and in that light. If the courts rule one way or the other, it will totally validate or invalidate all the legislation on the books for local and land use planning."

Hotaling said he expected one suit would provide the answers.

In areas that are already under fire in Canton's plan, Hotaling backed the plan.

He said the proposed rezoning of commercial frontage on Canton Center Road to residential was a "policy decision" necessitated to stop development before it spread west of Canton Center.

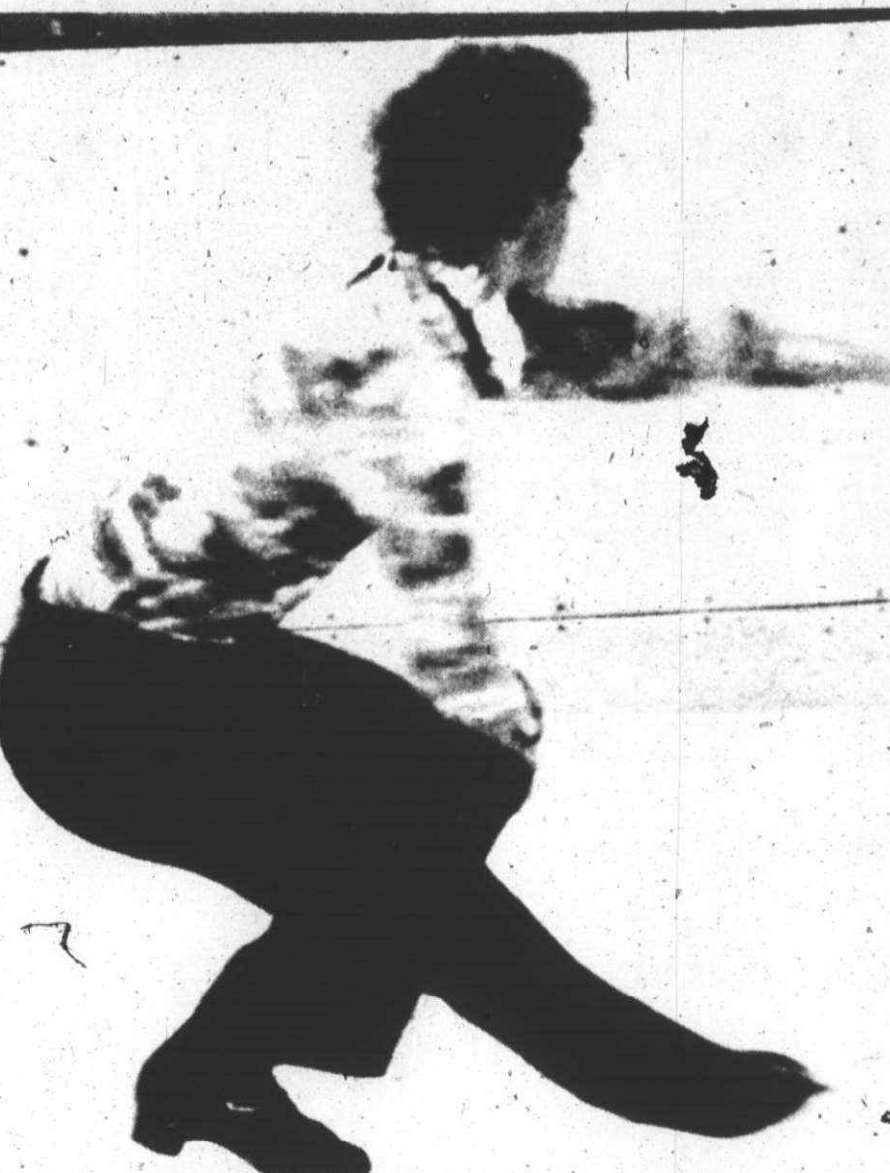
He said it was poor planning to have commercial adjacent to farm land, and a step down zone of residential along Canton Center was needed.

Hotaling agreed with planner Mike Manore that the reassessment of lands, "classified agricultural-industrial would present little tax burden on other township residents."

"Spread across the township, the amount would be infinitesimal," he said.

He added that landholders in the western part of the township had been subsidizing the east in the past because land values had been inflated in the west by development in the east.

HOTALING'S LONE disagreement with the plan concerned Michigan Avenue. He said more stepdown zoning should be used.

Capture 10 medals

When Dorothy Hamill captured the Olympic gold medal last Friday, her dream of attaining the zenith of success in women's figure skating was finally realized.

Miss Hamill's success also was shared by a growing number of figure skating enthusiasts throughout the country.

Besides skiing, figure skating is one of the fastest growing winter leisure activities in the United States.

The Plymouth Department of Parks and Recreation is an example of the blooming interest in figure skating.

Carol Holcomb, director of the parks and recreation skating program, supervises the ice skating activity at the Plymouth Community Cultural Center.

"We have over 1,000 persons enrolled in figure skating classes that range from beginners to advanced freestyle to ice dancing," she said.

OF THE SKATERS who take instruction at the center, those who wish to compete may join the Plymouth Figure Skating Club (PFSC), after they pass through seven phases of skating instruction.

"We have four regular instructors and four professionals who coach those competing members of the PFSC, you have to have some experience to join the PFSC because the professionals work with those skaters who want to prepare for competition," said Mrs. Holcomb.

The program teaches skaters the basics, and prepares them for competition as a feeder system to the PFSC, if those skaters choose to meet the financial responsibilities and the unending hours of early morning practice.

The program has grown since its inception in December 1972. One major reason for increasing interest in skating is the wide range of age groups that actively participate.

SKATERS INCLUDE three-year-old toddlers just learning how to stand on the slippery rink, as well as 65-year-old "youngsters" heading out onto the ice for a few spritely laps at the center.

The Ice Skating Institute of America recently held competition among 14 clubs in

the Fraser Ice Arena. Members and non-members of the PFSC competed, placing second in team standings with several outstanding performances.

In the tournament, the skaters were classified by the number of tests, given by the United States Figure Skating Association, which they had passed.

In the Blue Division, Julie Collins, a 10th grade student at Salem High School, earned first place honors, receiving a trophy and medal for her efforts, as did Gail Rowlands, in the 10th grade at Salem. She conquered the White Division.

Other medalist finishers for Plymouth in the White Division were Kathy Donnelly (third), Lisa Tedd (fourth) and Linda Kaumeyer (fifth).

Perhaps the strongest showing from the Plymouth-Canton contingent was in the Senior White Division where locals went one-two-three.

Wendy Hayrynen won the event with Jim Sellman finishing in the runnerup position, and Jim Speen completed the sweep with a third place finish. Another contribution to the team effort was made by Jan Lewis who placed fourth in the Blue Division.

At 78:

She's out getting the vote

If there were more election campaigners like Enid Chisholm, millage proposals would breeze their way to passage. Mrs. Chisholm, of 34630 Glenwood, is a senior citizen who is also a super citizen. She's 78 years old and an amputee who requires a walker to get around, but that doesn't prevent her from going door-to-door in an effort to convince Wayne-Westland

voters of the need for more money for district schools.

According to pollsters and politicians, senior citizens are not even supposed to vote in favor of increased millage, let alone campaign for it.

After all, they say, it's not in the best self-interest of the senior citizens to support millage because the elderly's children have all grown up and moved away from home and they have no reason to want better schools, since they no longer have children who will use them.

But Mrs. Chisholm would argue with that theory.

"I think it behooves every citizen to vote for millage," she says. "If they're good citizens, they'll vote for it regardless."

Why should a senior citizen, like Mrs. Chisholm, vote in favor of millage? "Be-

cause good schools help everybody and make it a better community," says Mrs. Chisholm.

"I've always been interested in education," she says.

She has been a Wayne-Westland area resident for 50 years and she has never missed an election. She voted for the recently defeated attempt to pass new millage for school renovations and repairs. The proposal went down to defeat in December.

But she's more optimistic about the chances of voters passing the upcoming renewal proposal March 1.

The proposal would provide 21 operating mills for the district for five years, representing \$10 million in revenue.

2 groups endorse W-W millage bid

Both the Wayne-Westland Area Council PTA and the Wayne-Westland Democratic Club have offered their support to the Wayne-Westland School District's millage election slated for March 1.

Both groups cited reduced educational programs if the 21 mill renewal failed.

Area council president Joan Moranty emphasized the election will ask for a millage renewal and not a new tax rate.

"Those of us close to the action at the schools can attest to the belt-tightening and economizing that has gone into effect to balance this year's budget," Mrs. Moranty said.

"Without really hurting our program and therefore our kids, there is no way to operate on less millage."

These are tough economic times as our family budgets certainly indicate. However we have worked hard and we have sacrificed to make this school district what it is. Wayne-Westland as a community has placed a high priority on the education of our kids. We can't let them down now."

Mrs. Moranty cautioned that a millage rejection could lead to the laying off of close to 900 employees.

"Our executive board was most concerned by the snowballing financial obligation the district would incur if 900 employees were laid off," she said. "Along with the disastrous effect on our school programs, the district, because of recent legislation, would have to reimburse the state for the amount paid to these people in unemployment compensation."

"This would result in an additional deficit of \$4 million out of the 1977-78 budget."

RON BLACKBURN, Wayne-Westland Democratic Club cited education as "the most important reason that people move into our community."

"Half days of school with no sports or other after school activities is a poor educational program and allows too much free time—that's when kids find trouble," Blackburn said.

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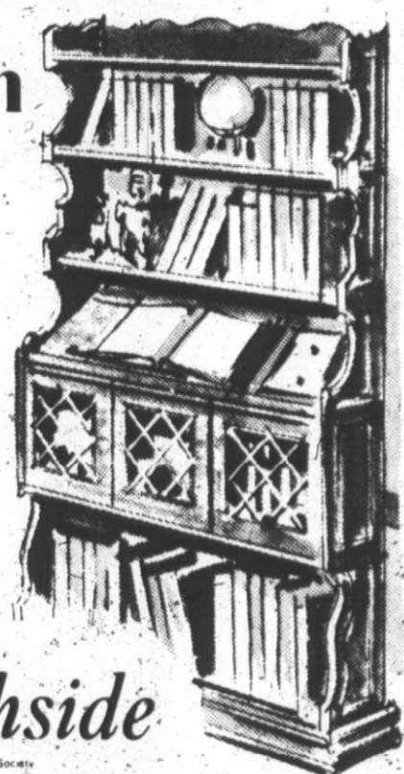
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Tennis fans to see stars in tournament

The printing jumps from the page in every Virginia Slims advertisement. You've come a long way, baby.

Indeed the Virginia Slims Circuit and the Women's Tennis Association has come a long way from their first tournament in 1970 when Rosie Casals defeated Judy Dalton in the finals for the \$1,500 winner's share.

When the Slims circuit comes to Detroit Feb. 17-22, Rosie will again be gunning for first place but this time the purse is \$75,000 with a \$15,000 first prize.

Rosie stopped in Detroit for a few hours last week to promote the Slims Tournament at Cobo Hall, the fifth stop on the women's tour this year. The circuit has already set an attendance record when 22,500 people watched the finals of the Washington, D.C. tournament several weeks ago.

But from the way Rosie tells it, it wasn't always easy to attract the crowds, the money or the press.

At the start, she said, the top three or four players were the top promoters of the tour. Ann Jones, Françoise Durr, Billie Jean King and herself were the advance persons who tried to drum up some interest in upcoming tournaments.

"It was hard to sell women's tennis and hard to get coverage or interviews," Rosie said. "We'd call a press conference and sometimes to have three press people there to talk to us was great."

"This went on for three or four years," she said. "It was tough because we were also playing to empty stands."

Without Virginia Slims support, Rosie admitted it would have taken longer to get the tour rolling along.

The women's circuit wouldn't exist today, she insists, without a handful of people who wanted it to happen.

"What turned women's tennis into something big was a combination of women's hit and women players who were strong enough to yell and make certain we weren't ignored."

Rosie said that the U.S. Tennis Association (USTA) had ignored women's tennis so we either had to get out or die. We decided to die trying if we had to. We tried and made it."

Women's tennis turned the corner in 1973, Rosie said and the USTA wanted a piece of the action. "We told them we didn't need their help."

Now the women's tours draws greater crowds and offers larger purses than the men's.

Rosie, the former captain of the Detroit Aces, took last year off so she could take a rest from the constant traveling but

plans didn't work out like she had hoped.

But she's back on the tour this year and she believes she could surprise some people because of the extensive training she's done recently.

She underwent a 17 day crash conditioning course in Montreal, an idea of Billie Jean King, and she's been running two miles a day during her three hour work outs at her California home.

"I feel physically fit which has been a lot of my problem in the past," Rosie said. "Since I'm short (5-2) I have to chase everything down. I must go into a match in good shape because it's important that I don't get tired. This could be my year."

The reason for all the extensive training before the season is the tougher competition on the women's circuit.

"The competition is much greater now than it was several years ago," Rosie pointed out. "You can't take time off and then walk into the tournament as a third seed anymore. The competition is that good because there are many kids eager to get into the top positions."

"You just can't afford to relax anymore."

Rosie figures that Chris Evert and Martina Navratilova are the ones to beat on the tour. But, she adds, both can be beaten.

"Chris has been more emotional lately because she's been becoming more involved with people. This is hurting her concentration and makes her game more vulnerable."

"She hasn't played as well lately as she can and she seems to be feeling the pressure of being number one. She just couldn't believe it when Martina beat her in the Houston finals."

"She's won so much in the past that maybe she doesn't know how to cope with it (losing)."

Martina is the 19-year-old Czech who defected from her homeland last year to take up permanent residence in this country.

"She's big, aggressive, strong and her left handed serve gives Chris trouble. But her inexperience and temperment hurt her at times—I think all the attention she's been getting has gone to her head."

"She also let herself go last year and she put on 20 pounds. It's important for her to stay in shape."

The Detroit Slims tournament is co-sponsored by the Junior League of Birmingham which contributed \$92,000 of tournament earnings in 1975 to 42 charitable organizations in Wayne and Oakland County.

Rosie was in town just long enough to finish a steak for lunch, then she rushed to the airport to catch a plane to Chicago where she was scheduled to play her first match in the Slims Tournament there.

Students were told that good dental care includes a good diet, visits to a dentist, use of fluoride, proper brushing and flossing.

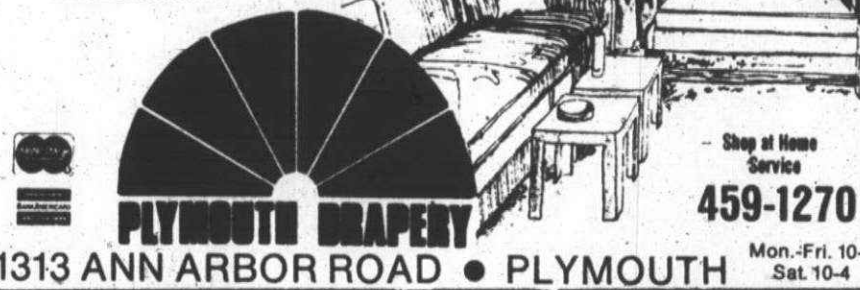
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VFW hosting blood mobile

Those donating should remember to eat a light meal before donating and avoid fatty foods.

Residents can donate blood unless they weigh less than 110 pounds, have donated blood in the last eight weeks, have a history of jaundice or hepatitis or close personal contact with anyone having these diseases in the last six months, have been pregnant in the last six weeks, have any history of malignancy (minor skin cancer excluded), have had teeth extractions or oral surgery within the past three days, have had a smallpox vaccination within two weeks.

Persons also are disqualified from donating blood if they are a diabetic on medication, have had penicillin within 30 days or antibiotics of any kind within two weeks, have had anti-malarial drugs in past three years, have had major surgery in past six months.

Persons on daily medication of tranquilizers may generally donate. Persons with high blood pressure medication can usually donate if blood pressure is normal at the time of donation.

It wasn't unusual that the after dinner conversation turned to taxes. This is the season for it. But much to the surprise of the Stroller, in the midst of all the complaining—the puzzle of school taxes rising with falling enrollments and the usual cry of "what do we get for our taxes?" one of the neighbors asked "What do you suppose the taxes would be if it wasn't for our volunteer workers?"

Up to that time no one had given thought to that phase of our every day existence. But the question got us to discussing the many fine contributions the volunteers make during the course of a year. What's more, it was agreed that, perhaps, things would be a lot different without them.

When one looks around and sees the work that is being done—and with wholehearted enthusiasm—only the worst cynic wouldn't agree that we couldn't afford the labor bill on many of the fine things we are enjoying . . . free.

While you may not agree with local government actions in your area and feel that your tax money is not being spent wisely, you can't overlook the work of the various commissions and committees that are contributing their time just for the joy of being involved.

If they were paid for their time at the same rate they receive for their daily employment in office and factory no city could afford them.

IT IS THE SAME with the various fraternities and service clubs that have made valuable contributions that would be out of reach if the citizens had to pay for them. One doesn't have to look far to find some fine examples.

No one could believe the hundreds and hundreds of hours that have been contributed to make the Plymouth Historical Museum a reality. But for more than two years a dedicated group has been working most every day—just for the joy of helping to make a fine contribution to the city.

And no finer example of team work could be had than Kellogg Park right in the center of the community. The picturesque fountain was a donation by the Rotary Club from the receipts of its annual chicken barbecue. The Kiwanis Club provided the material and the labor for the brick promenades. And the women's clubs spearheaded the drive for the old gas

lights and the overall beautification program.

MUCH THE SAME is true in Redford Township. Garden City and Westland where the service clubs have done—and are doing—a great job of contributing services with the hope of making their communities better places in which to live.

And mind you, while the volunteers are contributing tangible things, don't forget their work goes beyond beautifying an area.

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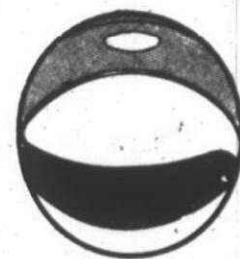
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Parking ban meant to stop vandals

In another of a long series of attempts to control park vandalism, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners has banned parking of cars along all park drives during hours the parks are closed.

Presently, the county parks open at 5 a.m. and close at 10 p.m., except for Elizabeth Park in Trenton where a 9:30 p.m. closing hour is in effect.

The commissioners imposed the parking ban Feb. 5 on recommendation of its public safety and judiciary committee and at the request of the county road commission which administers the parks system.

Commissioner Edward K. Michalski (D-Detroit), chairman of the public safety and judiciary committee, said he hopes the

ban will have "particular impact" along the 18-mile length of Edward Hines Drive where the Cass-Benton or "Beer Hill" section has become infamous for youth rowdiness and drug abuse.

Other parks affected include Bell Creek and Lola Valley parks in Redford, Holiday Park in Westland and the Lower Rouge Parkway which passes through Wayne, Inkster, Dearborn, and Westland.

In the past, both the public safety and judiciary committee and the full board have considered a variety of measures to solve the park problem. These have included more park employees, a Sheriff's park sub-station, better lighting and a ban on all "no deposit, no return" containers.

Other proposals have included a ban on deposits of all rubbish, litter and garbage, with fines for leaving picnic refuse, and prohibition of alcohol, including beer.

Another plan that has been reviewed would establish a cash reward program with payment to citizens upon the arrest and conviction of vandals. Under this program, parents would be financially responsible for damages caused by juveniles found guilty.

Last year, the Board also endorsed a proposal by Commissioner John J. Korney (D-Detroit) that urges judges to consider sentencing convicted vandals to work terms in the parks.

In the proposal, Korney estimates that

vandalism and litter cost taxpayers up to \$650,000 a year and occupy maintenance workers who otherwise could be improving park facilities.

"We believe that to sentence offenders to work in the parks, repairing other people's destruction and picking up other people's litter, would have a deterrent effect and save the taxpayers some money," Korney said.

Snow slows meter readers

Consumers Power Company customers who get estimated bills this month can blame it on the weather.

A company spokesman said the accumulation of snow and its slow melting rate has added to the other meter reader problems, such as unfriendly pets, the homeowner's absence, and locked gates.

Although attempts are made to read the meter every month, the company will base an estimated bill on an 18-month history of the customer's usage and weather data.

Customers who receive estimated bills will find EE or GE printed at the bottom of the service code column. The estimate will be adjusted after the next actual meter reading, the spokesman said.

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Public employee politics bill OK'd

With a handful of Republicans joining a solid bloc of Democrats, the Michigan House of Representatives approved, 81-24, a bill allowing public employees to participate in politics.

House Bill 5629—similar but not identical to a bill vetoed by Gov. William Milliken last year—would allow public employees to join political party committees, serve as convention delegates and run for elective office without obtaining leaves of absence.

It will require an employee of a local unit of government or school district to resign or take a leave of absence if elected to a post within that unit.

SUPPORTING it were Reps. John Bennett (D-Redford), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), William Keith (D-Garden City), John Markes (D-Livonia) and Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti).

Opposed was Rep. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville).

A motion to give the bill immediate effect was defeated when it failed to get a two-thirds majority. The bill, if approved,

by the Senate, will take effect in April 1977.

Local representatives voted identically on the immediate effect question as on final passage.

GOV. MILLIKEN'S chief legislative aide, C. Patrick Babcock, said the substance of the bill was little different from the one Milliken vetoed.

He added that the governor has taken no stand on the new version.

Milliken had vetoed the earlier version, charging it might directly conflict with Civil Service Commission rules prohibiting political activity by employees.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Howard Wolpe (D-Kalamazoo), said the new version is written so that if there is a court challenge to the section allowing state civil service employees to participate in politics, the remainder of the bill—applying to employees of local governments—will remain valid.

Metropark car permits go on sale

Five Huron-Clinton Metroparks offices now have for sale the Metro-park annual vehicle entry permits for 1976, which will be in effect from May through September.

The annual windshield-type stickers cost \$5 and with a special \$3 rate for senior citizens starting at age 62, with proof of vehicle registration.

These offices are: Metro Beach Metropark near Mt. Clemens; Stony Creek Metropark near Utica; Kensington Metropark near Milford; Hudson Mills Metropark near Dexter; and Lower Huron Metropark near Belleville.

These parks and five other metroparks will also offer daily vehicle entry permits costing \$1 when charges begin in 1976.

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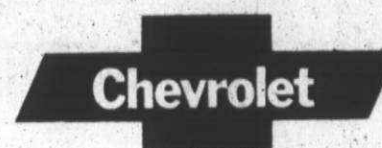
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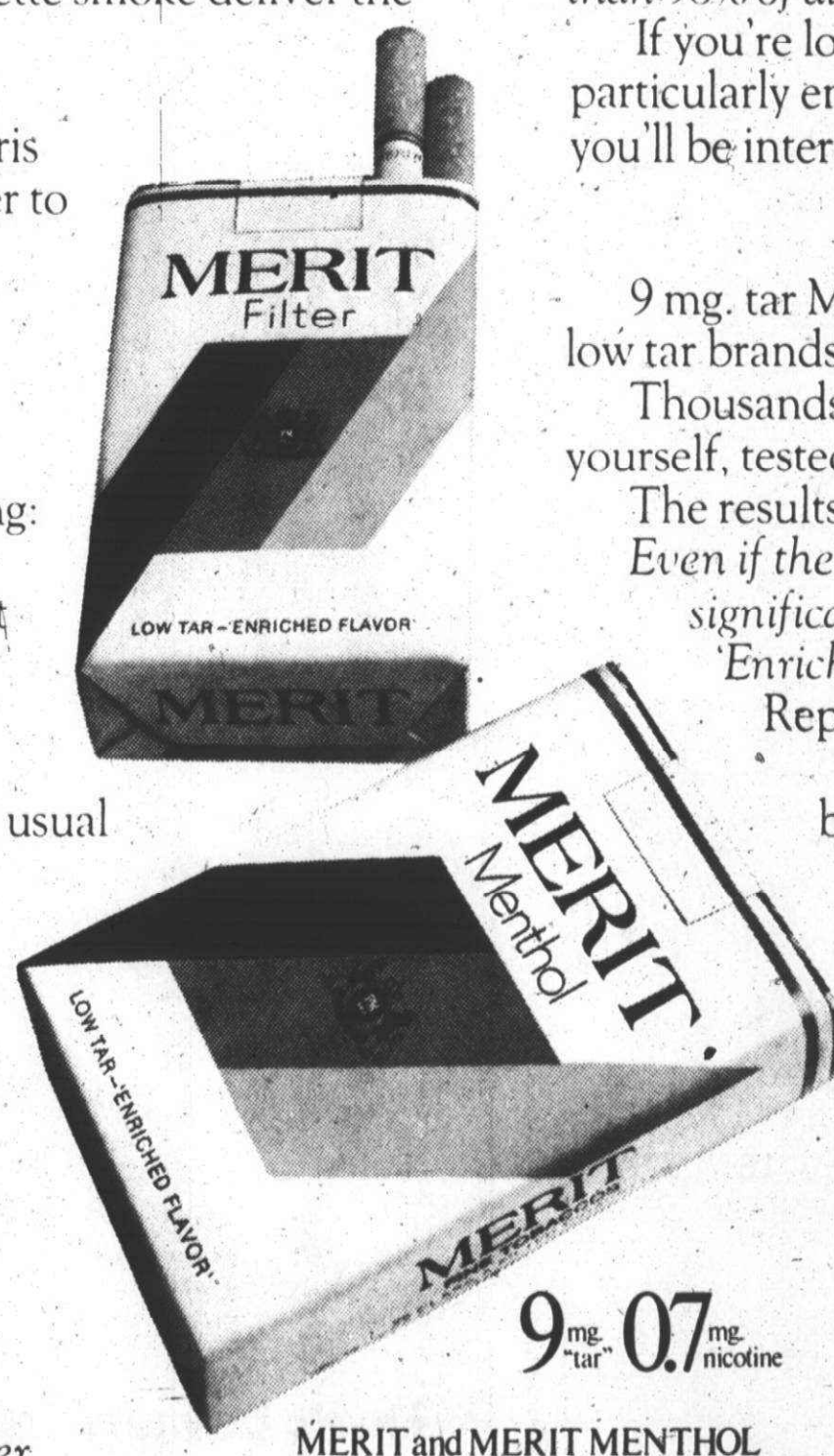
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Winter camping snows sports enthusiasts

The camping boom continues to explode across Michigan with approximately two-thirds of the state's 118 private campgrounds operating this winter expecting business to increase an average 15 per cent over last year, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

Good snow conditions for outdoor enthusiasts also should boost pressure at Michigan's 61 state parks with winter camping facilities.

"The growing popularity of winter camping in Michigan can be traced to cost savings for winter sports enthusiasts as well as the excitement of braving the cold weather in the warmth and comfort of a self-contained recreational unit," said Joseph Ratke, Auto Club touring manager.

"Snow enthusiasts interested in enjoying a winter vacation without straining budgets will find camping a great way to do so," Ratke added.

The Auto Club official said 78 of the 89 private parks operating the last two years reported winter business up an average 15 to 20 per cent in 1974-75 compared to the previous winter season.

"Several campgrounds near popular ski and snowmobile facilities in northwest Lower Michigan experienced business spurts of 300 per cent last year," he said.

Camping enthusiasts not interested in hauling trailers will find that 106 of the 118 private parks listed on Auto Club's 1976 Campground Guide offer winter storage plans.

"The convenience and fuel-saving economy of parking camping units on a winter site are major reasons for the number of private campgrounds open during winter in Michigan growing from 20 to 118 in the last seven years," Ratke said.

"The fact that 90 per cent of the private parks are open seven days a week is another popular feature with campers."

feature with campers.

"Campers should find winter storage rates easily within their budgets with prices ranging from \$25 to \$50 monthly to a high of \$300 for the entire season," said Ratke. Campers pay only for the days they use their site with storage rates taking care of the remainder of the month.

Services offered by Michigan's private campgrounds are another factor for their increasing popularity during the cold-weather months, Auto Club noted.

Eighty-nine, or 75 per cent, of the private facilities have heated shower and toilet buildings. All but one park listed by Auto Club offers electrical hookups at campsites. A few of the parks even offer such luxuries as sauna baths.

Nearly one-third of the private parks have general stores for shopping convenience, laundries and heated activities buildings.

Sixty-one state parks offer winter camping but none of the service buildings are open in winter. Many state parks also are without electricity.

Many parks open to winter campers attract outdoors enthusiasts with marked snowmobile and cross-country ski trails

and inland waters for ice fishing. Some parks even offer special weekend events, such as snowmobile safaris.

Campers seeking private park accommodations will find that East Michigan has the largest number, 44; West Michigan has 41; Southeast Michigan, 13, and the Upper Peninsula, 20.

He has been a member of the state's Supreme Court since 1968.

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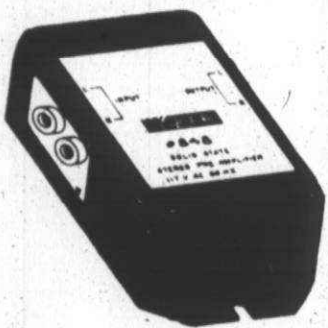
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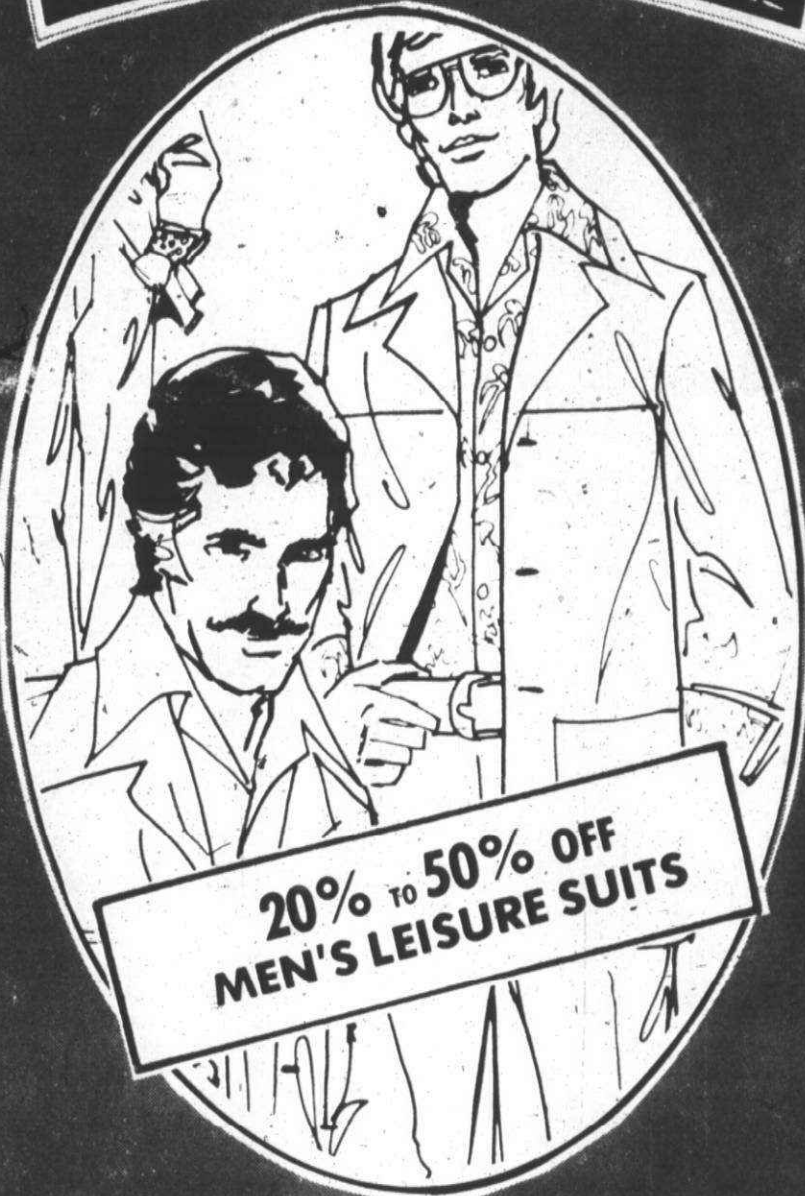
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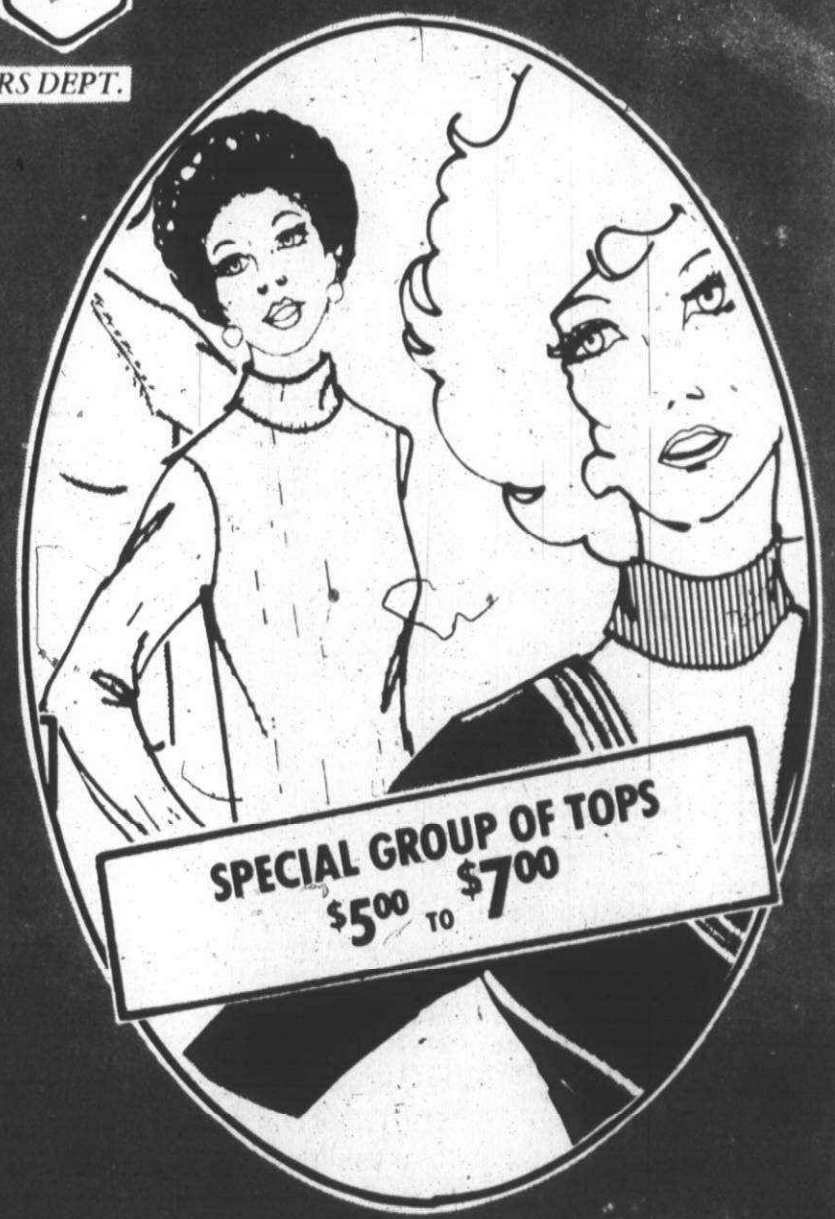
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Aroused Tigers hand Rocks 1st loss

The rarified atmosphere at the top of the mountain was more than Plymouth Salem could stand.

Rated for just one week in most of the popularity polls as the No. 1 Class A basketball team in Michigan, the Rocks tasted defeat for the first time this winter as Belleville's Tigers led from wire to wire in posting a 63-57 triumph in Suburban Eight League competition.

The Tigers shot Salem off its perch Friday night before a capacity throng in the Rocks' own gym with a dazzling jumping-jack brand of basketball that gave them an edge in rebounding and a decided advantage in overall defense.

Nonetheless, the Plymouth club, which

now is 16-1 overall, still leads the Sub 8 in its drive toward a third straight undisputed championship with a 10-1 mark. Belleville, 14-3 for the season, is second at 9-2 and each team has three games yet to play before jumping from the frying pan into the fires of state tournament competition.

"THEY BEAT US square up," admitted Coach Fred Thomann of the Rocks as he avoided offering any form of alibi.

"Belleville was at a high emotional pitch and there's no doubt they played extremely well. We made just four of 13 shots in the first quarter and four of 15 in the third. Because we weren't putting the ball in the hole, they had plenty of opportunities for their fast break.

"Their exceptional jumping ability also

tipped many of our passes away from the target.

"Now we just have to go back to work to try to win our last three games and get ready for the state tournament."

The Rocks now will be idle competitively until hosting Edsel Ford next Saturday night, Feb. 21. After that they will travel to Allen Park on Tuesday, Feb. 24, and will be at home against Dearborn High in the final game of the regular schedule the night of Friday, Feb. 27.

BELLEVILLE ASTOUNDED the packed house by racing to a 13-0 lead in the first five minutes, and from then on it was all up hill for the Plymouth troops.

Narvell Turner, the 6-3 sharpshooter of the Tigers, never was better than he was in the opening period as he canned seven of 11 shots from the floor to help give the Tigers a 24-9 edge when the quarter mercifully ended.

Before the night was over, Turner went on to net 25 points and at that mark he shared game scoring honors with Salem's all-star, Jim Ellinghausen.

The second quarter unquestionably belonged to the Rocks as they found the range for 17 points while pulling the defense together to limit Belleville to only four, thus leaving the floor on the short end of a 28-26 count at halftime.

Jim Ellinghausen had nine points in that healthy second period surge, his brother, Tom, had four and single buckets were posted by Brian Wolcott and Mike Primeau.

THEN A COLD third period in which Salem could pick up only nine points left the Rocks downwind again, although at the beginning of the fourth quarter, it looked as though they finally had found the basket.

Trailing 41-30, 10 successive points from the Ellinghausen brothers, Wolcott, Primeau and Bob Evans cut Belleville's lead to one point at 40-40. It was the moment for the Rocks' storm ahead, but in-

stead it was Belleville which got hot with nine points in a row to light up the board at 50-40. After that there was little question as to the outcome.

Although Belleville's brilliant, quick-handed ball stealing tactics and its torrid offensive spurts stole the fans' attention, Coach Tom Niemi attributed the upset victory primarily to the overall defensive play.

"It was our 'triangle and two' defense that did it and the way the kids handled it," he said. "I'm proud of these kids."

And then Niemi turned with his two top stars in tow, Turner and Dennis Easley, to introduce them to John Orr, head basketball coach at the University of Michigan, who had watched the game from the court-side press table. At least for the moment Niemi held the winning hand.

Waterford Mott squeaks by Chief cagers, 53-52

After spotting Waterford Mott a 14-point lead at the end of the first quarter, Plymouth Canton staged a three-quarter rally that took this Western Six clash down to the wire, with Mott hanging on to avenge an earlier loss administered by Canton, 53-52, before a partisan crowd in the Mott gymnasium.

Mott sped to its biggest margin with plenty of sharp-eyed shooting from the outside.

Four of the Corsairs starters tallied four points in the opening frame to give them the lead they would desperately need to gain the victory.

While Mott was shooting more than 70 per cent, Canton could sink two of its 18 field goal attempts for an 11 per cent mark.

"After that first quarter we played a beautiful ballgame," said Canton coach Casey Cavell. "I've never seen them work as hard as they did," he said.

Besides Osborne's 11 snares, Rob Mandle cleared the glass for nine rebounds of his own. Osborne, Close and Mandle once again carried the bulk of the Canton scoring.

Close's 14 points was good enough for a share of game scoring honors with Rob Mandle. Keith Osborne and Mike Albright rolled up 11 and 10 points respectively.

Mott held the Chiefs in check during the third quarter with Bill Madonyo playing an excellent game on defense for the Corsairs. The duo of Tim McKay and Dave Blair was the only pair to break into double figures.

Senior guard McKay paced the Mott scoring with 13, while Blair connected on all five free-throw attempts to total 11 points. Six other players scored for Mott with the club going 11, for 15 from the free-throw line.

The stage was set for the final stanza with Mott maintaining a 46-38 lead after three quarters.

Canton tightened up its defense, going into a press and mixing its man-to-man setup with a couple of zone combinations to force Mott into scrambling for points when it had the ball.

"I didn't use a press earlier in the game because we hadn't been playing good defense in the past few games," said coach Cavell. "We need to play good defense before we could go to a press, and we certainly played well on both ends of the floor before we went to the press."

Canton outscored Mott in the final ses-

sion, 14-7 with controversy erupting in the games waning moments.

With 26 seconds to go, Canton took the lead, 52-51; the Chiefs got the ball back.

"The play was in our end and the ball was knocked out of bounds by a Mott player," said coach Cavell.

"The call went in Mott's favor and they scored to take the lead that gave them the game, although we didn't make a shot in our last attempt to win the game with a few seconds left," he said.

The loss gave Canton a 3-5 league mark to go with an overall 5-11 record.

"I feel the players should determine the outcome of a game, not the referees. The officiating was inconsistent. For our players to work as hard as they did and lose the game on a call like that really upsets me," said the Canton coach.

Canton is home tomorrow night with Li-

vonla Bentley who defeated the Chiefs in a thriller at Bentley in overtime, 66-63.

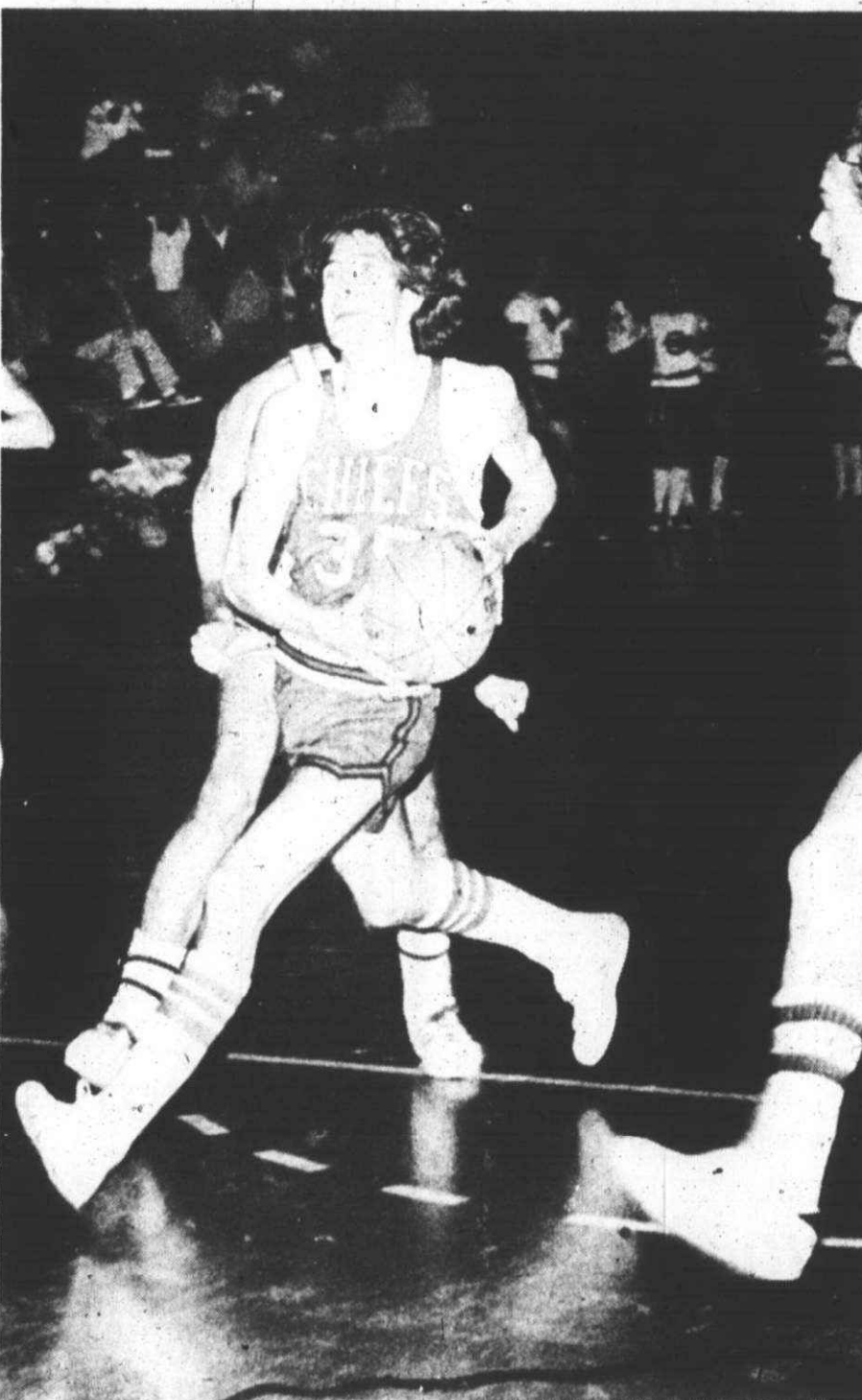

Thirteen was not an unlucky number and

took the lead in the final eight minutes.

"We split their seams in the third quarter and were able to get inside," said Churchill coach Pat Montagano in explanation of his squad's comeback. "In the first half, we were shooting from rebound."

The Chargers' coach added that he was mystified on exactly what happened to Harrison during the second half. "They got good shots and ran their offense with finesse," he stated. "I don't know what happened to them."

Churchill received balanced scoring in the march to victory, spearheaded by Matt Foster with 14 points, Scott Shepard and Dave Clare, 11 apiece, and Tom Bay, nine.

Mike Styles was the only Harrison double-digit man, connecting for 11 points, while Mark Brozek and Bob Slotnick chipped in eight each.

Churchill now sits atop the conference heap with a 6-2 mark, while Harrison holds down the runner-up position at 5-3.

Montagano is confident that his Chargers can hold on for the title this year after finishing in the basement last season. "This (Harrison) was the team we had to beat," he said.

Both teams are in action tomorrow (Tuesday) night, with Bob Sotter's Hawks hosting Livonia Franklin, and Churchill entertaining Farmington.

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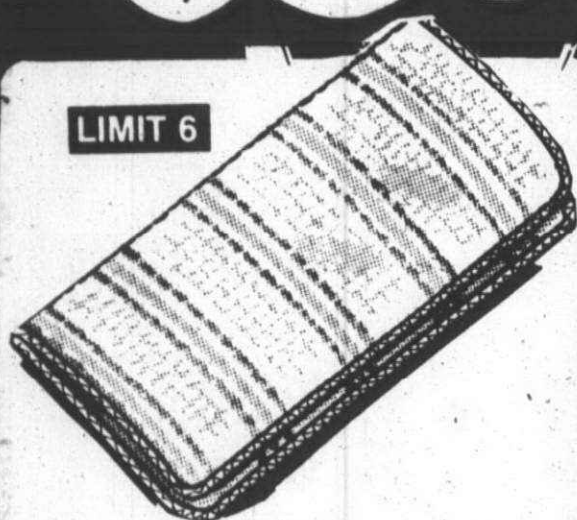
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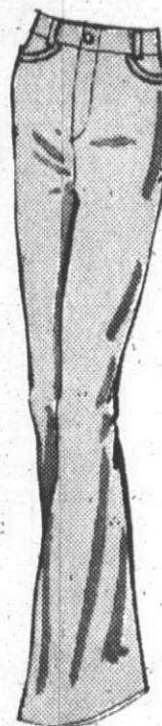
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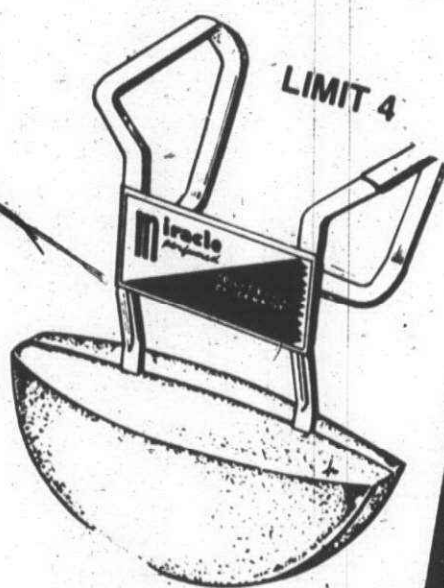
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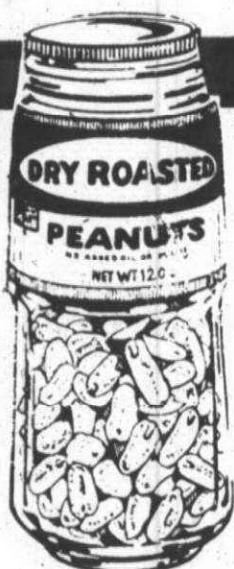
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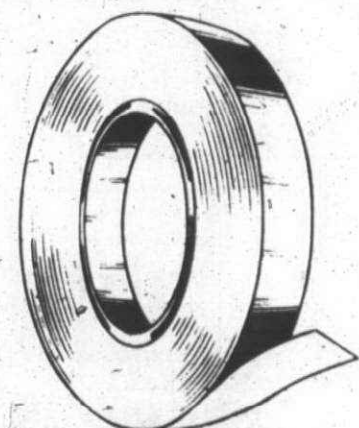

A grand place for browsing

Members of the Plymouth Historical Society sat down to a potluck dinner that would have nourished the Continental Army during its winter at Valley Forge. They heard Nancy Tanger describe the life of George Washington, father of his country.

Irene Waldorf, chairman of opening ceremonies of the Plymouth Historical Museum, called on the "father of the museum."

He was the force behind the fund-raising drive to buy the property for the site. He put up the partitions, installed the doors, repaired furniture.

"He kept an eagle eye on expenditures while working eight to nine hours a day, often seven days a week, and driving thousands of miles," said Miss Waldorf.

"The pleasure's been all mine," said Clarence Moore when the members gave him an opportunity to speak after a standing ovation.

He admitted it had sometimes been exhausting and discouraging and "without loyal, moral support and determination by all, tonight's climax would not be here."

"We finally got to thinking about hours, and now it's down to minutes," he said, adding his thanks "to all of you who accepted the responsibility of building and maintaining this museum."

"NO ONE is happier to see this day," said Margaret Dunning. "This is a living, growing museum, a source of joy, satisfaction and learning to man."

Miss Dunning had played many roles in bringing a dream into reality. She had pro-

vided the Dunning Memorial Building to house the museum, painted, sanded, and run errands. A few days before the opening of the museum, Miss Dunning stripped the finish from an old icebox for the Victorian kitchen.

"Six years ago in a living room on Penniman Avenue, an idea was conceived," said Clella Smith as she pinned an orchid corsage on Miss Dunning and a boutonniere on Moore. "You get the land and I'll put up the building," said one. "Let's get together on that," said the other. That was the beginning."

Ground was broken May 10, 1972. One year and 10 days later, on an unseasonably warm May 20, the Dunning Memorial Building was dedicated. This was the beginning of the second phase—years of planning, carpentering and cataloging. The volunteers would find objects stacked outside the doors. Some would have no indication where they came from, or what they were. George Burr and Norma Cassidy were two of the many who gave weeks of their time.

"We've lived museum, 24 hours a day, for years," said Miss Waldorf.

"I WOULDN'T have believed it a week ago," said Mark Hunt, museum director, as visitors thronged the Main Street and lower-level exhibits.

Persons browsing through the museum may realize they possess artifacts which would add to the displays. They should talk it over with Hunt and discuss lending or donating them to the museum. Hunt will not be on hand for next weekend's visiting hours, Feb. 21 is his wedding day.
