April 5 tax vote may be cancelled

The Plymouth Board of Education is expected to take action tonight (Monday) to cancel its April 5 election date and wait until June before putting a proposal before the voters.

At the same meeting, the board is expected to take further steps to reduce the operating-fund imbalance in the 1975-76 operating budget. Among the considerations will be eliminating the positions of five media specialists and using those employees as permanent substitutes.

The meeting, open to the public, begins at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High School, 8415 Canton Center Road.

BASED ON RECENTLY acquired information on state-equalized-valuation (SEV) figures and proposed state-aid formulas, Supt. John M. Hoben will ask the school board to cancel the April 5 election date requested by earlier board resolution.

Hoben believes it is now possible that operating millage is within the grasp of the district to meet its financial needs, and that an operational millage request might better serve the district than a building-and-site sinking-fund election April 5.

"Based upon this information, I am recommending to the board of education that

we inform the Wayne County Election Scheduling Committee of our intent to remove from the calendar the April 5, 1976 election," says Hoben.

The effect is the district can save the cost of an April election and might find it can request additional operating millage without being penalized by the state-aid formula.

Depending upon later information, and what happens in the June election if a ballot proposal is drawn up, the district will have time to come back in the fall with ei-

ther a operating-millage request or a building-and-site sinking-fund proposal.

THE ADMINISTRATION is likely to recommend tonight that five media specialists (librarians) be reassigned as substitute teachers to save \$11,000 in expenditures for the balance of the fiscal year.

Hoben has indicated, however, that he might make a substitute recommendation to save that \$11,000 which could allow the five librarians to remain in their present positions.

Administrative staffs at the middle, ele-

mentary and high school levels have been given the challenge of coming up with cuts totalling \$11,000. If this is done, Hoben said he will offer these cuts as a substitute.

With other adjustments which had occurred by the middle of last week, the potential operating deficit of \$215,000 had been reduced by \$76,200 which leaves the district with a fund-equity expenditure of about \$138,000.

In looking at early figures for the budget next year, 1976-77, it is expected the operational budget will have a deficit of \$1 million without any increased tax levy or

changes in state-aid funding.

IN OTHER action tonight, the board will hear a report on the CASTLES in-service training project from its directors, Gordon Hill and Mac McDonald and receive in interim report on the 45-15 (year-round school) program at Miller Elementary.

The board also is expected to take action on a proposed cost-savings incentive plan, award furniture bids for the three new elementary schools, and act on a request from WSDP-FM—the student-operated radio station at Plymouth Salem—to broadcast board meetings.

Audit reveals surplus in Detroit Water Dept.

The revelation this week of a \$5 million surplus in the 1975 operating budget of the Detroit Water Department may be enough ammunition to thwart an increase in water rates until at least July 1.

It has been learned that the preliminary draft of the audit report of Arthur Young Associates, Certified Public Accountants, indicates the water department ended its 1974-75 fiscal year with a \$5 million surplus, and is operating under a "balanced" budget for fiscal year 1975-76 which ends June 30, 1976.

Members of the water board were unaware of the \$5 million surplus from 1975

until Arthur Young Associates issued its preliminary report, says John Lamerato, Oakland County's representative on the water board.

"We adopted a balanced budget for fiscal year 1975-76 without any knowledge that we ended 1975 with a \$5 million surplus. The obvious question which must be answered now is why is a rate increase needed during the present fiscal year based on the figures we have just received from Arthur Young Associates?"

The water department had told board members the system would end the 1975-76 fiscal year with a deficit of \$2.6 million, necessitating a rate increase effective May 1, 1976. "That rate increase would apply to

water consumption in April, May and June—the last quarter of our present fiscal year. With our latest figures, I personally look askance at the projected deficit and need for a rate increase before June 30.

"Although there may be a need for a rate increase for the 1976-77 fiscal year, starting July 1, I see no need for a rate increase before the present fiscal year ends this June. There is a need for some kind of a rate increase, but not 39 per cent."

THE AUDITING firm was hired to do an independent audit and was to have issued its final report by Dec. 31.

The auditors were unable to meet that deadline, however, because it found it impossible to conduct a budget analysis because actual expenditures in the water department lacked a direct relationship to the line items in the budget adopted by the water board.

In its preliminary report, Arthur Young reports it cannot conduct a budget analysis but is able to verify that the transactions were legal and can confirm total budget figures.

"Because of the accounting system used in the water department it is impossible to analyze line-figure expenditures with the budget. We can tell if the water department lives within the total budget but have no way of knowing if, for instance, it overspends in one category such as salaries," adds Lamerato.

ONCE THE auditors issue the final report, the suburban opponents of the water-rate hike may be able to use that report to delay any rate increase until at least July 1.

Another delaying tactic the suburbs will use is a recent legal opinion from Attorney General Frank Kelley that any water-rate adjustment in Detroit must be approved by the Detroit Common Council.

After meeting recently in Livonia at a meeting called by Mayor Edward McNamara, the suburbs agreed to create a legal fund to be generated by each member community contributing monies on a per capita basis—five cents per person living in the community. Some 99 communities are expected to join in a lawsuit against the Detroit Water Board.

In discussing the financial condition of the water system, one suburban official has pointed out that the water department books hadn't been audited for 18 months.

"It is my understanding that Arthur Young has told the water department it cannot come up with a meaningful audit because the department doesn't follow its own budget procedures. Once the water-board passes a budget, the department

Chamber elects officers for '76

Canton's Chamber of Commerce now has a new slate of officers to go with its new quarters at Northwood Realty in the Harvard Square Plaza.

On Wednesday, the 15 members of the executive board picked Alfred Daly as president, Mary Perna as first vice-president, Eldon Johnson as second vice-president, Bill Brown as treasurer, and Harold Fischer as secretary.

Daly, president of Daisy Plastics on Lilley Road, replaces Bart Berg, who held the office for the last two years and could not by chamber bylaws succeed himself for a third consecutive term.

MRS. PERNA, manager of the Wayne Bank replaces Don Korte, while Johnson, a member of the law-firm of Tiller, Weinberg, and Necker is the first to fill the newly created role of second vice-president.

Tax rise much lower

Property taxes paid in 1976 will be more than last year but the increase will be much less than was reported in the Feb. 16 edition of the Observer & Eccentric.

The error occurred in a report on equalization factors to be imposed by the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation on property valuations in the City of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth Townships.

The actual increase in property tax valuations during 1976 will be: 4.46 per cent for Plymouth Township, 4.67 per cent for Canton, and 5.66 per cent for the City of Plymouth.

Thus, the tax increase in 1976 for local residents—barring any millage changes—will be much less than reported. The error is regretted.

The new officers will assume their duties March 25 at the annual meeting of the chamber at Vittorio's on Plymouth Road in Livonia.

Daly, who said he wasn't seeking the presidency, said he "was surprised" by his selection.

"I SEE A GOOD year for membership increases," commented Daly. "With the CETA money and the fact that we can now hire a part-time director, I look forward to a fine year—I certainly intend to do my best to see that it is."

Berg, under whose direction the chamber membership grew to 90, bows out after almost two years at the helm.

Offered the part-time position of executive director of the chamber, he declined saying, "Because of the time involved, I don't think I can accept the job."

"But I will take the position on a temporary basis and help locate someone to fill the job on a permanent basis, inasmuch as the idea was approved under my administration here."

Berg said he too expected a big year for the chamber.

"Al is a very dedicated man and as far as the chamber interests are concerned, he's an excellent choice."

"He doesn't have that much background in chamber work, but I intend to bend over backwards to help orient him."

"THERE'S BEEN a strong spirit of cooperation here, and I would like to see it continue."

Berg added, "I'm not sorry to leave the presidency of the chamber. I pushed for the bylaw change so a man couldn't succeed himself in the same position for a third term."

"The chamber, like any organization, needs new blood, a new train of thinking and new direction. It can't be imbedded with the same leadership."

Township administrator's attempts at getting almost \$5 million worth of public improvements through federal monies went up in smoke Thursday when the U.S. Senate failed to override President Ford's veto on a \$6.1 billion public works jobs bill by three votes.

The bill, intended to create 600,000 jobs, provided for 100 per cent federal financing of new state and local public works projects on which work could have begun within 90 days of project approval.

IN ANTICIPATION of the Senate's ability to override the president's veto, Supervisor Robert Greenstein asked both Michigan Senators, Robert Griffin and Philip Hart for assistance in obtaining applications for projects last Tuesday.

Greenstein wrote the senators listing public works projects that "appeared to fit the act."

They included almost \$5 million worth of construction. Greenstein asked for money for:

•\$475,000 for sanitary sewer relief on the Sheldon-Cherry Hill sewer.

•\$770,000 for commercial and industrial sewers.

•\$200,000 for a sanitary sewer in McIntyre Manor.

Senate vote evaporates hopes for \$5 million

•\$275,000 for a water main extension in area of low water pressure.
•\$50,000 for water meter pit renovation.
•\$1.3 million for work on five drains. Truesdell, Deer Creek, Travis, Bradner and Hannan.
•\$600,000 for a fire house, community and maintenance building.
•\$91,000 for pavement of parking lots at the township offices, recreation building and fire house.
•And \$135,000 for 27,000 feet of bicycle paths at the township park and along the Detroit-Edison easement.

GREENSTEIN also asked for \$2 million for a new township office complex.

The supervisor said all the projects seemed to fit the intent of the act and would provide jobs for the unemployed in Wayne County as well as Canton.

He added that presently the county is registering 13 per cent unemployed, even though figures from the township's mid-decade census showed that Canton had five per cent of its work force unemployed.

In all cases, the supervisor said the projects could begin within 90 days.

Despite the Senate's inability to override Ford's veto, Greenstein was optimistic.

"I think it's a shame they couldn't do it. As far as I know, we were first in line for the money in the state. I think we had a very good shot at it."

"But I called Washington and I am given to understand that both Republicans and Democrats will reintroduce a similar

measure in the near future. "If that passes, our applications will still be good."

"It's a shame though—just another example of rotten politics. If you look at the vote, all those that voted against it aren't up for election this year."

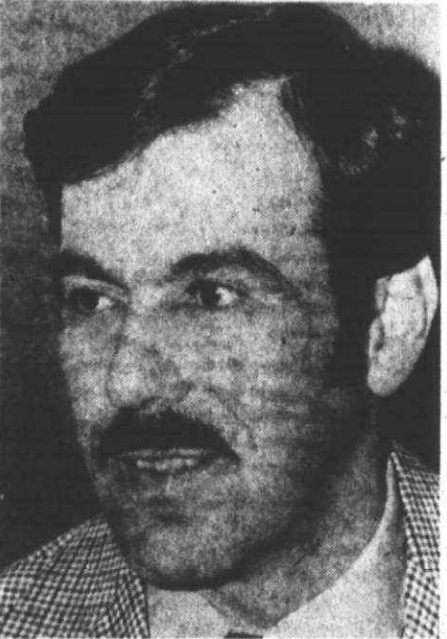

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Late books are costly

Increasing concern about overdue library materials has led media specialists to take stronger measures at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

Overdue notices, personal reminders and telephone calls home have long been the standard procedure, with some success. Some students, however, persist in abusing the checkout privileges and neglect to return materials.

The negligent users had assumed distressing proportions by the close of the first term of this school year. Some 1,290 books were overdue at the two libraries. This represented a total dollar investment of \$8,700. In time of stringent budgets this has been an intolerable and costly situation.

And so report cards were pulled for those having long overdue materials with rewarding results. As of Feb. 10, 66 per cent of the outstanding items have been cleared up at the Plymouth Canton library, representing \$1,848 in resources, and 60 per cent of the overdue books at Plymouth Salem have been taken care of, with a dollar value of \$5,588.

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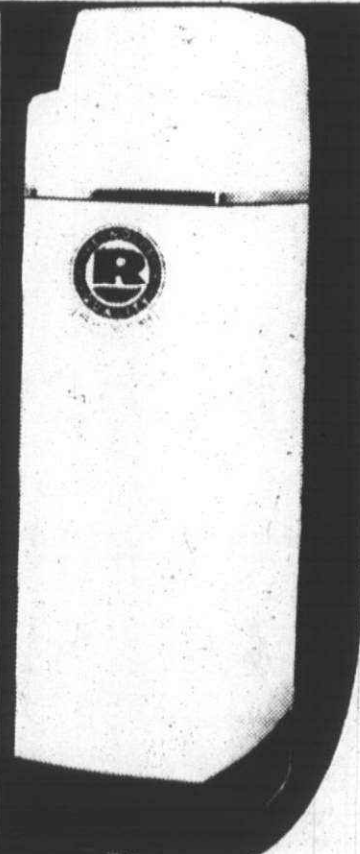
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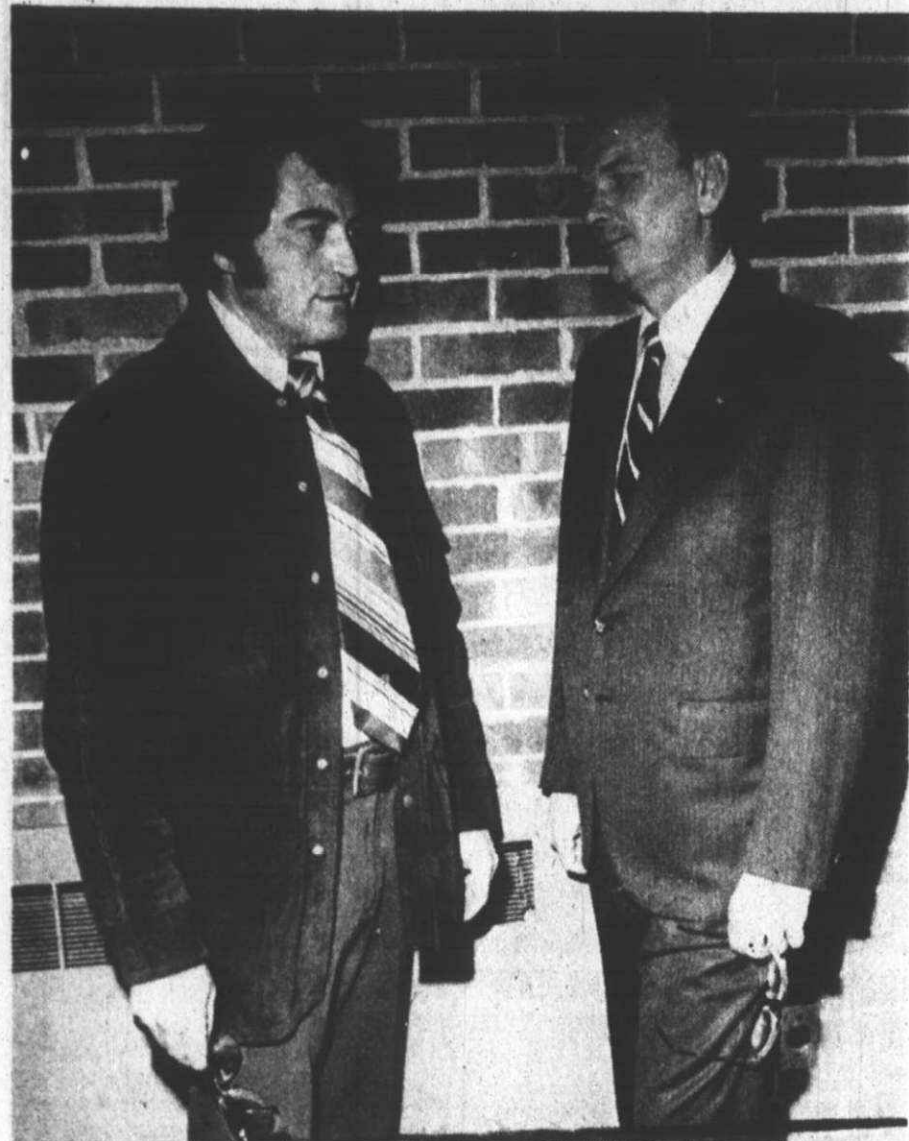
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Reserve school teaches much to many

Expanded program readies officers

The reserve police officer has come a long way since the day of the posse and the deputy appointed on the spot. Today the reservists are getting the same basic course as a regular policeman, but in a modified version.

It all started three years ago in Redford when reserve Capt. Al Stewart and Police Chief Edwin Gleza decided formal schooling was needed for the men who were accepted as police reservists.

In the current class held every Thursday evening at Schoolcraft College, there are 150 men from departments in Canton, Garden City, Redford, Northville, Livonia as well as Farmington Hills.

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein is one of 32 persons from Canton, including two women, who are attending the 30-week, 100 hour course.

Stewart said that the first school in Redford in 1973, had 265 officers graduate. When word of the school spread throughout the area, applications for the course grew so numerous that arrangements were made with Schoolcraft College to hold the classes there.

Handling public relations for the council is Fred Peterson of Northville Township.

INSTRUCTORS come from all fields of law enforcement including local officers, as well as state and county officers. Judges and prosecutors also serve as instructors.

Stewart said the instructors volunteer their time. Students pay \$15 each to cover the cost of material used in the course. Each department or the individual pays the tuition.

The course includes road patrol duties and functions, arrest procedure, commu-

nications, community relations, crime scene search evidence preservation, bombs and explosives, narcotics and dangerous drugs and crowd and riot control.

Weapons training is another facet of the course. The students receive a complete NRA (National Rifle Association) basic pistol course and a police combat course conducted on a firing range.

"All must pass this phase of the test or they aren't graduated," Stewart said.

All weapons teachers are NRA police fire-arms instructors.

The training council is recognized by the Michigan Law Enforcement Officer Training Council and is accredited throughout the state by various police organizations.

"WE NOW get applications from not only Wayne County police departments but Oakland and Macomb as well," Stewart said.

Last year's class graduated 127 reserve officers.

"In the three years we have conducted the school, less than 10 per cent have dropped out," Stewart said.

It's a tough course, though. An average of 28 per cent fail.

A student is allowed to be absent only three times before being dropped.

"In some cases the person may have to drop out due to a change in his work schedule. Then there have been cases where a person figures the course is more than he cares to take on," Stewart added.

While there are only two women in this year's class, there were 14 in the class last year and seven in the first year.

The school is put on by the Michigan Police Reserve Training Council, made up of a 10-man board of directors from nine po-

lice departments, in conjunction with Schoolcraft College.

Stewart is executive director with Lt. Eugene Stout of Redford a director of training.

Advisors include Chief Robert Behrendt of Garden City, Chief Edwin Gleza of Redford and Sheriff William Lucas of Wayne County.

WOMEN WHO enter the course receive the same training as do the men, Stewart added.

"This includes training in personal defense and use of the night stick."

Debra Murray and Barbara Unger, two Canton students, said they joined the reserves because they were interested in police work.

Ms. Murray said she hoped someday to become a regular policewoman.

Ms. Unger said she felt this was a good way to get involved in the community. Both said they are enjoying the course and

expect no quarter because they are women.

Stewart said he believes it is vital for all reserve officers to have basic police training.

"In most instances today, a police department won't put a recruit on the road until they have basic law enforcement training."

The training sessions run from 7:30 to 11 p.m. each week. This class will graduate Sept. 16 when those who have passed the complete course with an average of at least 70 per cent will receive diplomas recognizing them as qualified reserve officers.

So strong is Stewart's feeling that all reservists must be trained that next week he and Peterson are going to Lansing to meet with State Sen. Carl Pursell to discuss proposed legislation requiring mandatory reserve training statewide.

Appeal process lengthy

McIntyre wait for sewers continues

With the help of the City of Detroit and Attorney General Frank Kelley, McIntyre Manore residents could have sanitary sewers before the year is out.

The sewer project for the subdivision, located at the southeast corner of Ford and Sheldon, was first requested by residents several years when septic tanks and fields in the 50-year-old subdivision began to malfunction.

Earlier, the previous township administration approved the project as part of a multi-million dollar bond issue under the Canton-Van Buren Sewer and Water Authority.

The new administration re-examined the issue and cut many projects.

The McIntyre project was pared so that it would serve only current residents of the subdivision and not all the lots, excluding those that were unoccupied.

The project received approval from the township board in early January, only to have the entire project stalled because of

a recent court case that found current procedures for municipal bonding illegal.

THE RULING in the case, Harter versus Swartz Creek, a Genesee County case, held that State Act 188, the statute that provides for municipal bonding, was unconstitutional.

Since the appeals court ruled on Jan. 7, all municipal bonding has been stopped.

Swartz Creek asked the court to rehear the case and reverse the decision, and recently, support of a speedy rehearing has come from many quarters, including Kelley and the City of Detroit.

"Normally the rehearing would take some time," explained township engineer Dale Townsend, "but with Detroit involved, I think we can expect substantial pressure will be applied to the courts. Perhaps it will result in expedited action on the case."

Kelley announced his interest in the case, noting that the court decision could

affect as much as \$250 million worth of water and sewer projects statewide this year.

"A speedy final decision is required," Kelley said. "Until the case is finally resolved on its merits and remedial steps can be taken, if needed, the credit of municipal units could be adversely affected."

Kelley is also chairman of Michigan's Municipal Finance Commission.

He added, "It is in the public interest to resolve the issues as promptly as possible."

IN HIS LAWSUIT, Harter, a Swartz Creek landowner and taxpayer who resides in Bloomfield Hills, claimed that the Michigan law did not provide him with adequate notice of a proposed public project which would involve an assessment against his property.

Even though Swartz Creek followed current procedure by placing an advertisement in the local newspaper, the court found the statute unconstitutional because it failed to provide for notice to a property owner who did not live in the city where the property in question was located.

But even if the decision is reversed by the appellate court, an appeal to the state supreme court seems assured, according to Townsend.

"What we've heard, is that Harter will appeal if the court overturns the previous decision," he said.

According to Townsend, an appeal to the state supreme court would, under normal circumstances, take about six months.

But with the pressure of Detroit and Kelley, Townsend said an appeal might be acted on in four months.

"I can't really make any guesses as to

when the case will be ruled on," said Townsend, "but I would imagine it would probably move faster because of the pressure."

"Hopefully, we can get the sewers in this year."

The contractor who was awarded the bid before the bonding was stalled has agreed to extend his bid on a 30-day basis, as long as he is allowed to pass on any cost increases in material.

But according to Townsend, at the end of any of the one-month extensions, the contractor can withdraw his bid.

If that happens, McIntyre residents can expect an additional two- to three-month delay for rebidding, sale and delivery of the bonds.

doesn't pay any attention to it but spends as it wishes.

AT ITS LAST meeting, the Plymouth City Commission voted 7-0 to approve the five-cent per capita assessment for the city's share of the legal fund. The initial expense is expected to be about \$500.

"That cost is likely to rise as we hire attorneys, auditors, and other experts," commented City Manager Fred Yockey, "but I'm sure the savings to our residents will compensate for what we spend now."

Yockey said one of his greatest objections is the inequity of the proposed 39 per cent increase. "The proposal is to raise water rates 39 per cent for both suburban

and Detroit customers. But the suburbs are already paying more per cubic foot to cover the expense of installing the system has already been covered and it's unfair to charge us 39 per cent now."

Yockey pointed out that the effect of the proposed 39 per cent hike would be to raise the cost to Detroit users from \$1 to \$1.39 per cubic foot while the increase for the City of Plymouth customers would be from \$1.91 to \$2.65 per cubic foot. "That's a 74 cent increase for Plymouth residents and a 39 cent increase for Detroit users. Here's the inequity."

Plymouth Township Board of Trustees has already voted to approve the interim five-cent per capita assessment for the legal fund, and Canton Township voted two weeks ago to do likewise.

'Grand River fever' hit settlers

(Part II)

"The Life of Lettie Teeple," in the fall 1974 issue of Michigan History, includes her recollection of the "ague," or malaria, which afflicted her when she was a young girl at Cooper's Corners in the 1830s. Lettie had the ague for a year, and it left her "a near skeleton." "Some days," she wrote, "we would all be sick with it at the same time."

The malaria was transmitted by the swarms of mosquitoes that infested the swamps in Michigan. Lettie pointed out that mosquito netting was unknown to the early settlers, who relied on smudging to drive away the insects.

Lettie's sister, Jane, who was three years older, attended school at Cooper's Corners. The school "was about 20 rods from the Corners," wrote Lettie, who would run to meet Jane when she returned from school. "She would reward me for it with flowers, mosses, bright little stones or anything she thought would please me."

TOWARD THE END of her stay here, wrote Lettie:

"Our home was growing more beautiful all the while. Stumps were disappearing from the fields. A thrifty young orchard was growing; about 70 acres were cleared and well fenced; the rails were up to stay. Our farm lay on both sides of the road so we did not have very near neighbors. But the woodsman was slaying the timber in every direction. We could see through to our neighbors fields and dwelling."

It was then that Peter Teeple got, along with others in the area, what, in 1836, was jokingly called "Grand River fever." He decided to pick up stakes and move his family to the Grand River country in the wilds of Kent County in Western Michigan. Against the wishes of his wife, who did not want to leave the improved farm in Plymouth, he decided to move west, because he wanted to enlarge his land ownership. He offered his Plymouth farm for sale and it was soon bought by a Mr. Gates.

Zenbaard and Hoffman, who edited Lettie's manuscript, identify Gates as Captain Myron Gates, who commanded a military company during the Black Hawk War (1832) and the Toledo War (1835). Gates owned 80 acres in the northwest corner of Section 29 of Plymouth Township. If this was part of the property he bought from Peter Teeple, it would mean that Lettie lived near the corner of Ridge and North Territorial. This jibes with Lettie's remark that her home was a mile and a half from the Cooper's Corner's School. Her grandfather, William Teeple, may have lived near the corner of Beck and North Territorial.

Lettie's last view of Plymouth was on Jan. 1, 1837, when the family said goodbye to Grandpa and Grandma Teeple and headed for Ann Arbor and the Grand River country. Her father did return to Plymouth on several occasions; once to pick up some more household goods, once to get a load of fruit trees (which were still bearing fruit when Lettie wrote 50 years later), and once to buy a colt. When it died of the cold, he returned to Plymouth once more to trade a horse for a yoke of oxen.

ON ONE OCCASION, in the spring of 1827, two of Peter Teeple's horses left his 641-acre farm in Kent County, eight miles from Grand Rapids, and tried to find their way back to Plymouth. Teeple recovered one horse, but never found the other.

Among the songs that Lettie said were popular in her youth were "Jim Along Josey," "Old Zip Coon," "Old Dan Tucker," "The Long Trained Blue," "Such a Getting up Stairs" and "The Girl I Left Behind Me."

Before she married, Lettie taught

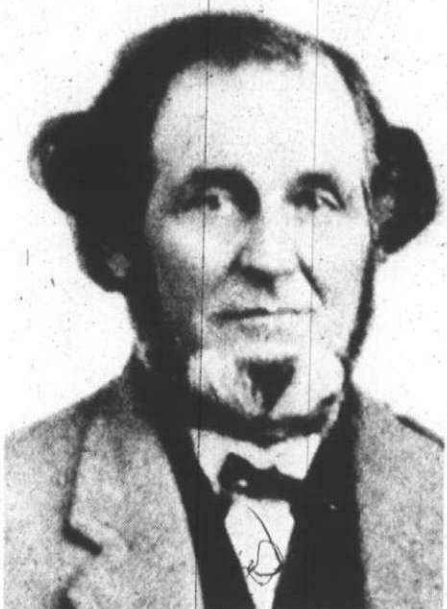

school. When 20, she married and had a daughter by a young man who soon deserted her. In 1853, she married again, and had five more children. Her second husband, a hotel keeper and political figure in Michigan, died in 1886.

Lettie began to write the story of her life in 1885, when she was 56. In 1890, she abandoned the manuscript and left for Oregon where, at 61 and alone, she lived on a timber claim 11 miles from the nearest settlement. She died in Seattle, in 1911, at 82.

PLYMOUTH HAS been the home for the past 82 years of another girl who was also

born at Cooper's Corners.

Mrs. Norma Cassidy, a former merchant and a well-known resident of the city, was born on the Baker farm at the corner of Beck and Territorial in 1883, more than half a century after Lettie moved away.

In 1837, the year the Teeple's headed westward, Samuel Baker moved his family to Cooper's Corners from Richmond, New York. He acquired 80 acres at the east corner of Beck at North Territorial. Forty acres of the Baker farm were on each side of North Territorial.

Baker, who had been an orchardist back east, put many fruit trees out here. He also opened a cooper's shop on his farm for the production of apple barrels.

One of Baker's sons, Chauncey, was the father of Mrs. Cassidy. Born in 1835, Chauncey Baker was postmaster here during the second administration of President Cleveland. As a boy, he attended Cooper's

Corners School which was located east of Beck and south of North Territorial on the Baker property. A Civil War veteran, Chauncey was almost 60 when Mrs. Cassidy was born.

The settlement at Cooper's Corners may have begun because some of the earliest settlers staked claims in its vicinity. John, William and Allen Tibbits, who some consider to be the first settlers in Plymouth Township, owned property in that area.

John Tibbits' property, granted March 11, 1825, was at the northeast corner of Section 28. It extended from North Territorial Road through to Ann Arbor Road and encompassed the terrain later owned by the Durfees (which Ralph Garber later owned) and the property on which the Township Recreation Park is now located, adjacent to Hilltop Golf Course.

One can only speculate on why Cooper's Corners declined and disappeared, as Plymouth Corners continued to grow.

Soft touch evades Chiefs

Canton falls to Harrison

Boasting the best defense in the Western Six conference, the Farmington Harrison Hawks stymied a hustling Plymouth Canton Chief team Friday evening, 71-59, to stay in contention for a possible league championship with Livonia Churchill.

Harrison opened up a 12-4 lead with the scoring spread around the starting five players.

Throughout the night the Hawks counted

on balanced scoring to keep the Chief defense off guard.

The first quarter ended with Harrison on top 15-8 with Rob Mandle giving Canton some momentum when he canned a 45-footer at the buzzer.

With the Hawks playing a man-to-man defense, Canton made several turnovers in the first half. This kept them from taking the lead when they were within two points.

Harrison stretched its lead to 21-10 with 6:09 left in the half as the rebounding of

Mike Styles complimented the shooting of Mark Brozek and Mike Slotnick.

Canton, playing in spurts, picked up the hot hand for the next four minutes and cut the Harrison deficit to 23-21 with 2:14 left in the half.

BILL PARSON, a 6-2 senior forward, was largely responsible for the Chiefs revival during that span in the second quarter.

Parson hit five points with two field goals coming on follow up shots, while clearing the boards with some rugged defensive play.

Just when Canton rallied from a deficit and seemed to have the momentum in its favor, Harrison's defense would force the Chiefs to take another low percentage shot.

"We were taking a lot of shots from bad angles," said Canton coach Casey Cavell.

While the Chiefs hit an inept 37 per cent in their field goal attempts, Harrison placed most of its shots in the hoop, dumping 26 of 47 attempts for a sharp 58 per cent.

"We had four men in double figures and that spread the scoring around somewhat," said Harrison mentor Bob Sutter.

After Canton's brief surge, the Hawks padded their margin with buckets by Larry Pump and Mark Borzek.

Harrison took a 32-25 lead at halftime into the locker room with both teams playing even in the second stanza, scoring 17 points apiece.

Canton's Steve Salyer amazed the crowd as he sank a 35-foot shot to end the half.

MIKE STYLES played his first varsity contest against Plymouth Canton in two years, as he led both teams in rebounds.

The last Canton-Harrison encounter saw the Chiefs fritter away an eight-point lead in the final three minutes to give the Hawks a one-point win.

This time around it was Canton who was missing one of its starting members.

Keith Osborne sat out Friday's game

with a severely sprained ankle he injured in the Canton game with Livonia Bentley.

Osborne will be out for at least a week, and Canton hopes to have him back by tournament time next week.

Harrison drew first blood in the second half and continued its consistent shooting by cashing in on its first four shots of the quarter.

The Hawks held the biggest margin of the game in the third period, 42-29, at the 4:12 mark.

Canton revived its sporadic offense to narrow the score to 46-41 at the end of the third quarter.

MIKE ALBRIGHT'S eight points coupled with a pair of clutch baskets by Rob Mandle left the game somewhat in doubt at the conclusion of the third stanza.

Mandle and Kevin Randazzo led Canton in scoring with 14 and 13, respectively.

Harrison erased all doubts as to the outcome of the game by shooting more than 70 per cent to even its seasonal mark at 9.

Chief tankers nipped by Hawks

Although the Plymouth Canton swim team has slumped to a 3-7 dual meet record, its pattern of consistency may be the factor that could lift the Chiefs into the upper bracket of the Western Six.

Coach William Faunce has been a swim instructor for 18 years, including eight years in Ohio and two years as an assistant at Florida State University before arriving on the Plymouth High School tank scene eight years ago.

"In all my years of coaching I've never had a team that has kept improving from meet to meet like this year's squad," said coach Faunce.

Thursday evening Canton went down to the last race before losing to Farmington Harrison, 89-81.

AFTER WINNING six of 11 events and getting nipped in the final relay, Faunce was puzzled as to what he could say to his swimmers. "It was a very good meet for us, nearly everyone improved and yet we still got edged," he said.

STEVE WOOD established a new school record in the 100-yard butterfly by a full second better than the previous mark set by Kevin Harris.

Wood's time of 58.5 was nearly three seconds better than his best in that event this season.

Harris was the only dual winner for the Chiefs, as he swam to victory in the 50 and 100-yard freestyle events.

Harris bettered his best time in the 50-yard freestyle by a tenth of a second, with a 23.5 clocking in the event.

He came back to capture first place in the 100-yard freestyle with a time of 51 seconds flat. Both of his times he swam in those events are the best in the Western Six conference to date.

The 200-yard medley relay team of Mark Retting, Tim Greenleaf, Wood, and Jamie Greenwood bested the team's seasonal mark by two seconds with a clocking of 1:51.5.

When Greenleaf wasn't a member of the winning 200-yard medley relay group, he was soloing to victory in the 100-yard butterfly. Greenleaf hit his best time of the campaign by covering the distance in 1:09.2, his finest by four-tenths of a second.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the meet was the return of Canton diver Scott Wales, who won the diving competition with a score of 201.75.

Wales had missed several meets, and his ability to be ready before the Western Six league meet was questionable. He had

practiced only a total of 30 minutes in three previous workouts.

With Canton's young squad continually making improvements, the question remains, will the ground they make up between now and the Western Six league meet be enough to carry them to the top of the league standings?

"We're coming along at a fine rate. Thursday night we swam very well. I think we're progressing right on cue," said coach Faunce.

Canton's final league tilt will be this Thursday afternoon at 4 p.m. at Walled Lake Western High School.

Dual meets do not figure in the Western Six league standings. Canton will go on to the Western Six league meet a week from this Thursday and Friday at Livonia Churchill.

SECTION 2: APPLICATION. Upon the request of either the owner or the person in charge of the general operation and control of the parking area, the Township Board may provide traffic regulation for said parking area in accordance with scope of regulations enumerated in Section 3.

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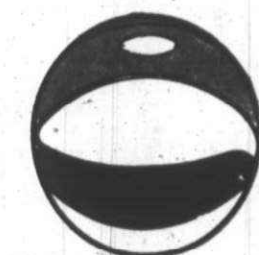

Cassady Players re-enact Plymouth life in 1830s

"Lady born, lady bred, dresses her feet before her head," Mariah Baker scolded her daughter Maryette. In spite of their pioneer home in the Michigan Territory, Mrs. William Baker was going to raise her daughters properly.

Members of the Business and Professional Women's Club were given an intimate view of area life in the 1830s as they watched the premiere performance of "Yesteryears in Plymouth." The one-act play was written and directed by Norma Cassady who played the role of her paternal grandmother, Mariah Baker.

The setting was in the Baker home at Coopers Corners which used to stand at the intersection of Beck and Sutton roads. Sutton was the old name for North Territorial. Coopers Corners was larger than the Starkweather settlement (Podunk) in what is now downtown Plymouth, or the Holbrook nucleus (Joppa) in the Old Village area.

The neighborhood women gathered for an exchange of community news, their hands busy with needlework as they chatted and took an occasional pinch of snuff. The snuffbox used in the play belonged to Mrs. Cassady's grandfather. It had been made by a neighbor out of a maple burl.

They discussed their children, new neighbors, the Indians, churches, and the first postmaster, Guideon Benton, who carried the mail tied in a handkerchief on his head.

THEY AGREED boys were especially mischievous. There were stories of stealing eggs, suspending a younger brother by his heels so he could reach the barrel of maple syrup in the cellar.

"And that sugar has to last us the whole year," the mother added.

Mrs. Baker suggested a good whack on the head with a thimble as a disciplinary measure. But, there was concern in her voice as she spoke of her sons sleeping in the loft with the snow sifting through the shingles on the roof. She told of them coasting down the hillside in the grain scoop—barefooted—their shoes outgrown and worn out.

News that the Presbyterians had paid the enormous sum of \$400 for a church brought oohs and ahs from the ladies. The fact that they were going to pay their minister \$100 every six months caused more shaking of heads.

Phoebe Root said the Indians went by her house on their way to Detroit to collect

their government money. She reminded them of the trail blazed through the woods by the Indians which they had followed to their new homes.

NEVER MISSING an opportunity to display daughter Caroline's talents, Mrs. Baker asked her to tell the ladies how the Indians first got their name. Caroline's father was teaching her to fiddle and she had already given a rendition of "Turkey in the Straw."

The schoolmaster had complained that Mrs. Berringer would open the door and shout, "Jonah, the beans are done!" The Berringer children would leave en masse, without his permission, and return to class when they had consumed the beans.

The ladies wondered how Mrs. Thompson managed with her 10 children. Mariah had been over to visit. The three little boys "hid behind the stove all the time I was there—they're so shy," she said. They were proud of the fact that Michigan was to become a state and lamented over their lack of the privilege to vote. They agreed that as long as they told the menfolk how to vote their status wasn't all that bad.

ALL THE INCIDENTS related in the play were real, as were the characters. Mrs. Cassady had heard the stories as a child during family get-togethers. In the days when "children were seen and not heard," they did a lot of listening to adults' conversation and reminiscence.

Elice Kulick has her spinning and weaving studio in the old Root house. Her daughter, Terese Whitten played the part of Maryette Baker. Mrs. Kulick's costume was a two-piece dress of creamy silk with many tucks and underskirts. It has a whale-boned waistline and is over 100 years old.

Ann Depa pottery in Scarab Club exhibit

Ann Depa, a Westland resident and art teacher in Allen and Smith elementary schools in Plymouth, has had her Raku pottery selected for the all-Michigan Scarab Club silver medal exhibition.

The show will be through March 7 in the club on Farnsworth at John R, across from the Detroit Institute of Art.

Raku is a Japanese method of making pottery which requires a special clay to withstand extreme changes in temperature.

Ms. Depa's pieces were fired in her own backyard kiln which she constructed from a 55-gallon drum. She lined the interior with 1/2-inch of insulating material used in the aerospace program. It is a mixture of fiber glass and other materials.

The pots are heated to 1,900 degrees with propane gas then removed to a bed of sawdust. More sawdust is piled on. The clay continues to burn without air, removing the oxides from the glaze.

While still very hot, the pots are plunged into ice-cold water or a snowbank.

Ms. Depa says the heavy snowfalls this winter have been ideal for cooling. Also, the snow method is more dramatic for her students.

"They love to see it steam and sizzle." The chromium, copper, tin and iron oxides used in the process result in lustrous colors of gold, blue and green when the oxide is removed. Depth of color depends on the amount of oxygen left in the glaze.

Crackled surface and luster are trademarks of the Raku process. "I love the cracks," she said.

Tips to save taxes

Any motorist itemizing deductions on 1975 federal income tax forms is entitled to list certain auto-related expenses.

A comprehensive guide detailing those expenses, "Automobile Income Tax Deductions," has been prepared by AAA. It lists and explains allowable personal and business-related deductions such as state gasoline taxes, depreciation and accidental losses not covered by insurance.

The extent of federal income tax deductions allowed a motorist depends upon whether vehicle use is personal or business-related.

Automobile deductions allowed even if the car is not used for business are:

- The cost of operating an automobile in connection with charitable activities or medical activities, such as driving to a doctor's office. Such deductions are subject to the "in excess of three per cent" rule for medical deductions.

- State gasoline taxes paid, nine cents per gallon in Michigan.
- Interest on money borrowed on the security of an automobile.
- Interest on gasoline credit card statements.

- Losses from fire, accident, storm or theft not compensated for by insurance or otherwise. The first \$100 of each fire, theft or casualty is not deductible. Damages are not deductible if they result from the taxpayer's willful act or willful negligence.

Auto Club members may obtain copies of the tax guide booklet from any AAA office in Michigan.

Others will find two IRS publications helpful: "Depreciation," Publication No. 534, or "Your Federal Income Tax," Publication No. 17. They may be obtained at any IRS office.
