At hazardous Canton intersection

Youngster killed in wreck

A two-car accident Wednesday afternoon left one Canton youth dead, and injured two others.

But quick thinking by a pair of school crossing guards, saved close to 50 Miller Elementary School students from possible injury.

Dead of multiple injuries is Munna Mohla, 4, of 5894 Wedgewood, Canton Township. Injured in the collision and listed in

satisfactory condition at Wayne County General Hospital are Priya Sriraman, 5, of 43119 Hanford and Jesse Perkins, 23, of 1912 Marlowe, Canton, driver of one of the two cars involved in the accident.

A fourth youth, Vikas Bhatia, 4, of 43130 Avon, Canton was treated and released at the hospital Wednesday.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Hanford and Sheldon at 3:45 p.m., just

after school had let out from Miller, and as a group of students were preparing to cross Sheldon from Hanford.

Mrs. Akila Sriraman was stopped on southbound Sheldon and was preparing to make a left turn onto Hanford, when her car was rammed from behind by a car driven by Perkins, according to the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

THE THREE CHILDREN in the back seat of her car were returning from the Montessori pre-school in Plymouth.

Sheriff's deputies have not determined how fast Perkins' car was travelling at the time of the collision, but said both automobiles suffered extensive damage.

No charges have been filed yet. The matter is still under investigation.

According to Shirley Spaniel, principal of Miller, moments before the accident, both crossing guards had warned students to stand further back from the curb.

Mrs. Sue Goodchild, one of the crossing guards, said she didn't see the actual collision, but when she looked up moments later, "both cars were 50 feet in the air."

"They didn't move down the road, they went straight up into the air. Everything was flying, glass, gas—everything. One of those cars could have come down on top of everybody."

"I'm just thankful."

Mrs. Goodchild said she was crossing children from one side of Hanford to the other, while the other guard, Mrs. Cindy Monks, was holding children on the east side of Sheldon who were waiting to cross Sheldon.

"She was holding the kids back and she was standing by the curb. One of cars came down on her stop sign. We always keep the kids back because we've had cars jump the curb before."

Mrs. Spaniel said the intersection is very dangerous, and praised the guards, noting they've always done an "excellent" job.

"They do a magnificent job with the children—they're very concerned and conscientious."

"In this instance, they were superb. They kept track of the children and directed traffic with the help of Mrs. Rita Ringer, who lives near there."

"**FRANKLY**, I'm surprised we haven't have a fatal accident there before. The speed limit is 45 on Sheldon and a lot of drivers go faster than that—it's quite hazardous."

Mrs. Spaniel said about 200 children use the crossing daily, although according to Mrs. Goodchild about 50 students were at the crossing at the time of the accident.

"We're lucky," Mrs. Goodchild said. "There could have been about 40 or 50 death certificates."

Mrs. Billie Whitely, formerly safety representative from Miller, said the school has been trying to get a full phase traffic signal at the intersection for several years. Presently there are only a pair of small yellow blinking lights on the roadside and one road sign indicating children cross at the intersection.

"In 1974 we sat down with the Wayne County Road Commission and asked for a full phase stop and go signal. They said absolutely not, the traffic didn't warrant it."

"So we asked for a flashing light like they have at Gallimore and they said no, we couldn't have that either."

"We were supposed to have another traffic count last spring, a year ago, but we haven't heard anything from the road commission. All they were willing to give us

Feds to study funding of development rights

A story in a recent issue of a Detroit newspaper suggesting that U.S. representatives William Ford (D-Taylor) and James O'Hara (D-Utica) "lauded" Canton's newly passed land use plan brought strong responses from both congressmen.

Both Ford and O'Hara said while they were interested in the plan because of its different approach to land use planning, neither endorsed it "in any way."

"Mr. (Canton Supervisor Robert) Greenstein brought the proposition to us several weeks ago," Ford explained, "to see if there is any existing federal legislation that might be utilized."

"We turned the matter over to legal researchers at the Library of Congress to answer the question."

"It's an interesting proposition, and of course when he submitted it to us he was quite enthusiastic—but all we're doing is identifying possible sources of federal funds to buy development rights."

"You can't take a proposition like that and throw it up in the air and hope it sticks somewhere—there has to be a legal basis for getting funding."

"But under no circumstances are we attempting to advise the people of Canton how to plan for land use," the congressman added emphatically.

"We are doing what we do for any local official in my district. Any official that has an idea that has county and national appli-

cation has the right to see if federal funding is available."

"That's all we're doing—we're seeing if the plan is feasible in terms of federal resources."

Greenstein estimates that it would take approximately \$11 million to buy the development rights to about 5,600 acres of land that would become agricultural if the plan is implemented.

On several occasions, he has said that federal funding might be available to buy those rights and that Canton might become a pilot project for the nation.

When Ford held his annual local officials conference in early May, Greenstein and Treasurer Carl Parsell approached the two congressmen about the possibility of federal funding for the plan.

"We spent the whole afternoon with Ford and O'Hara," Parsell said. "We answered questions, but when we left, we had no idea what they were going to do. I don't think they were convinced when we left that this was a valid plan."

"The last word we got was that they would check into it and get back to us later. So far we haven't heard anything from them."

William Phillips, administrative aide to O'Hara, said, "we're not lauding or endorsing (the plan) or anything else. We don't even know if there is a federal role in this thing at all."

"All we've done is asked for a feasibility study for funding of it. It's the first time

we've seen a plan like this and that's why we've asked the researchers to take a look at it—but it is by no means an endorsement or anything more than an inquiry."

"It's not a high priority item because the researchers are concerned with legislation coming up and that takes precedence over a study like this."

"But the plan does have far reaching implications for the entire state, and the federal government has been looking at land use for some time."

Phillips said because the research has been "put at the bottom of the barrel" it may be as long as six months before the congressmen have an answer.

Frank Rathbun, administrative aide to Ford, concurred that the research might take time. "We're having it run by the experts, but if it were to be put into legislation, it would take a long time. It won't happen next week or next year."

"I don't know what is available in the way of federal funding but I don't think anything exists that is that encompassing."

While Ford said he wouldn't reject any research on the basis that a plan might not work, he did admit to having some questions about the plan to buy development rights.

"THE PLAN RAISES a basic question as to whether the development rights to property can be sold in perpetuity. At this stage we're just talking about concepts."

"A second problem exists in how you manage to develop an overall pattern that is not discriminatory in getting the rights."

"That's a hurdle that Canton will have to get past with the state legislature."

"There's no way Washington can authorize what a township in Michigan can do."

Ford added that "being able to own and alienate property as one wishes is a very basic right," and the government is very "careful about exercising any restraint on it."

"You can't take away a piece of property unless your overall plan is to protect

the general health, safety and welfare of the people."

"But I wouldn't attempt to shoot down this plan on the basis that it won't work. People said the Wright Brothers wouldn't fly."

Berg to seek board seat

Bart Berg, longtime resident of Canton and charter member of the township planning commission, will seek the office of treasurer as a Republican this fall.

Former president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce for two years, and a resident of the southwest portion of the township for 31 years, Berg said more "independent thinking is needed on the township board."

"I've looked over the list of candidates and there's no representation from the western half of the township—I'd like to offer that."

While Berg said he expected the incumbents to make most of the issues of the campaign, he said it was unfortunate the land use plan would become an issue.

"A man's home and property is consid-

ered his castle, and it shouldn't be bargained for in the political arena."

Berg, one of two planning commissioners to vote against the recently passed plan so heavily endorsed by Supervisor Robert Greenstein, said he had nothing against the concept of retaining agricultural land.

"AS I have said time and time again, I have great concerns about the way this plan will be implemented. I don't want to make an issue out of the master land use plan, but we should make sure no is hurt over the transition."

Berg said he also was concerned about the failure of the township to negotiate union contracts with three employee groups: building inspectors, DPW workers and township firefighters.

"In spite of the negotiator they hired, they still haven't got a contract. It appears a considerable amount of time has lapsed and there's been no report of progress."

"Arrangements should be made so this dilly-dallying can be stopped. The employees are entitled to a decision—perhaps they should call in an arbitrator."

Berg said he was tired of the "vote situation on the board."

"There seems to be a lot of 4-3 and 5-2 votes—and I'm a little tired of this slate pact. There appears to be some need for independent thinking."

AS TREASURER, Berg said he would provide a thorough explanation of all invoices to all board members. "Everything would be thoroughly explained," he said. "There wouldn't be any of this not approving the bills—that's a disgrace to anyone holding the position."

"I'd get someone in charge of bidding who also would be controller of bid prices. Anytime there was a bid overrun, I'd have it approved by the board before we would proceed with the work."

BERG CITED HIS chamber ties as an asset, and said he thought he could help improve the relationship of the board with township merchants.

"There's been tremendous improvement in the relationship between the business community and the administration and I hope it continues."

"But I think in the area of signs and terms there are many alternatives that could be offered to make the business community happier," Berg said.

Berg said he will cooperate with other Republican candidates but will not run as part of a slate or team. "I'm sure we'll have agreement in some basic areas, but I'm not running as part of anybody's slate."

Officials hassle over recreation

The equity of sharing recreational facilities and activities in the Plymouth-Canton community was among the topics discussed Wednesday by the Inter-governmental Committee.

The discussion began with whether the City of Plymouth was discriminating against Plymouth Township residents by charging a differential fee for recreation activities.

Also discussed was the question of sharing the costs for providing crossing guards. The committee decided to schedule a public hearing this month to offer residents an explanation on the historical perspective of the issue and to receive public input.

Date, location and format is being worked out and will be announced at a later date.

THE QUESTION of equity in present sharing of recreational facilities and activities arose from a discussion of complaints made by Plymouth Township residents.

"The Plymouth Township Board is quite upset because while we are mouthing platitudes about cooperation between the governmental units, the city is charging a differential fee against non-residents for use of the Cultural Center, which runs counter to all our earlier discussions on joint recreation sharing," commented Richard Gornick, Plymouth Township trustee.

Norb Battermann, Plymouth City commissioner, clarified the grievance by pointing out the city isn't charging non-residents more for use of the Cultural Center itself but is only imposing a 10 per cent dif-

ferential fee to cover administrative expenses for recreation activities.

"The differential fee charged to Plymouth and Canton township residents is only for those activities offered by the City of Plymouth Parks and Recreation Department. The fee covers the administrative expense of running a baseball team, for example, and is charged regardless of whether the activity is inside the Cultural Center, on the grounds of the Cul-

tural Center, or at another site," stressed Battermann.

Battermann added that the differential fee does represent a change of policy which was made about six months ago by the city commission.

"The administration of parks and recreation department is an expense paid for from the city's general fund and the city didn't feel it equitable that money in the general fund generated by our residents'

taxes should benefit non-residents without some differential charge."

Gornick pointed out that the township originally gave some \$38,000 to help the city build the Cultural Center with the understanding township residents wouldn't be charged differently for use of the Cultural Center. He added that the township doesn't charge city residents any differential fee

Culbert to run for trustee

A Livonia-based attorney has joined four other Democrats and two Republicans in the race for two trustee seats on the Canton Township Board.

Noel Douglas Culbert, 29, of 1706 Woodbridge Ct., Canton, has announced his intention to seek the Democratic nomination for a four-year trustee position.

Other Democrats seeking the posts are incumbent Gerald Cheske, Joyce Willis, Lynne Goldsmith and Gene Daley. Republicans in the race are Jim Poole, an incumbent, and George Hall.

In his candidacy announcement, Culbert emphasized the need for balanced zoning with the need for some farmland, less stringent commercial zoning regulations, wider residential lots, and industrial "strips."

Culbert called the land use advisory question, which appeared on the presidential primary ballot, an example of "shoddy politics at its best."

"The voters were given two choices," Culbert said, "full development with a population of 200,000, or a rural community with only 100,000 persons. The City of Livonia used to be a township the same geographical size as Canton. Livonia is now almost fully developed, and its population is only about 110,000."

"**NO COMMUNITY** in its right mind would have full development as proposed on the last ballot. To say this was a victory is an insult. It's like saying, 'Heads I win, tails you lose.' The voters should have been given many choices. We were given an irrational and improbable choice."

Although Culbert favors the retention of some farmland, the attorney said zoning should not financially harm farmers or investors.

Culbert feels officials should attract more industry to the township to build up

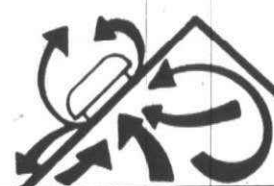

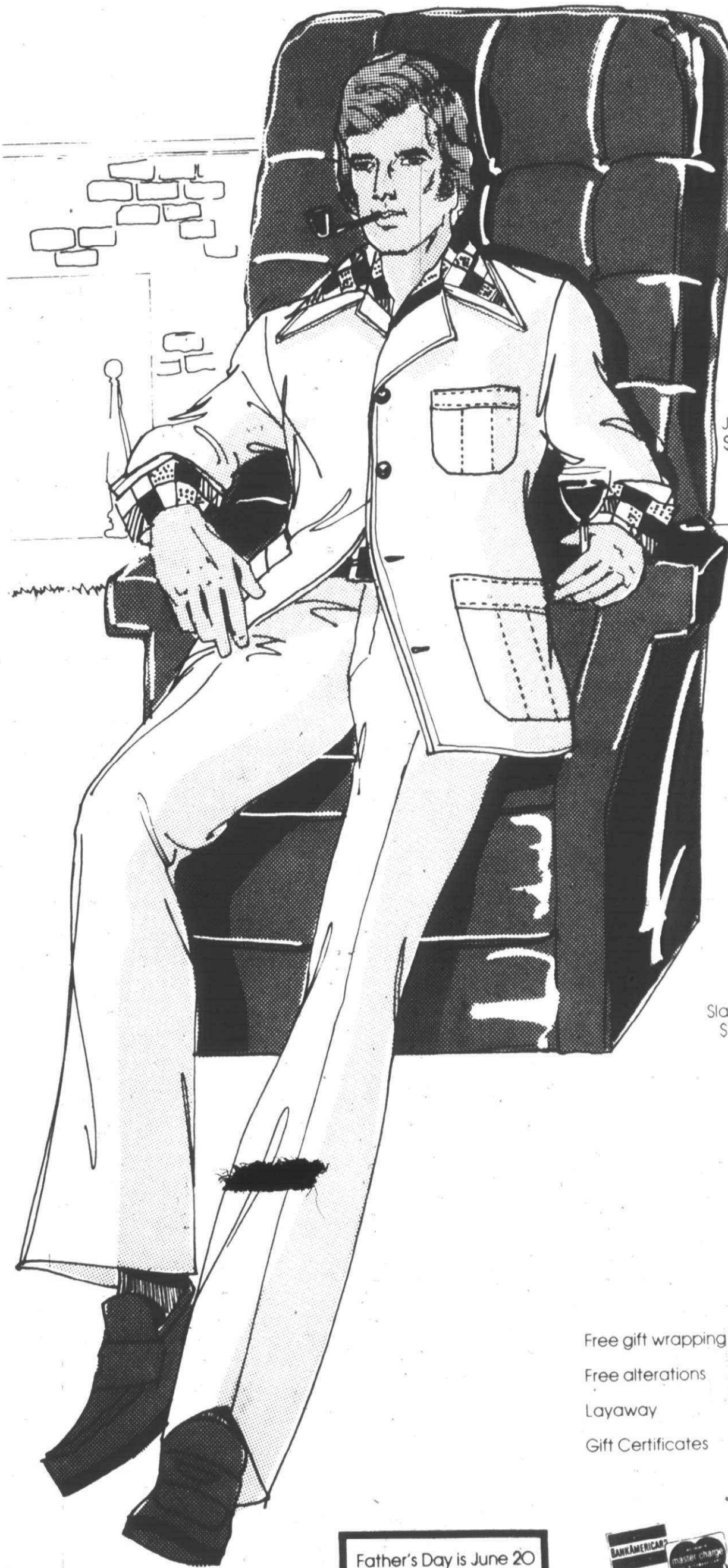

YMCA day camp, classes to begin

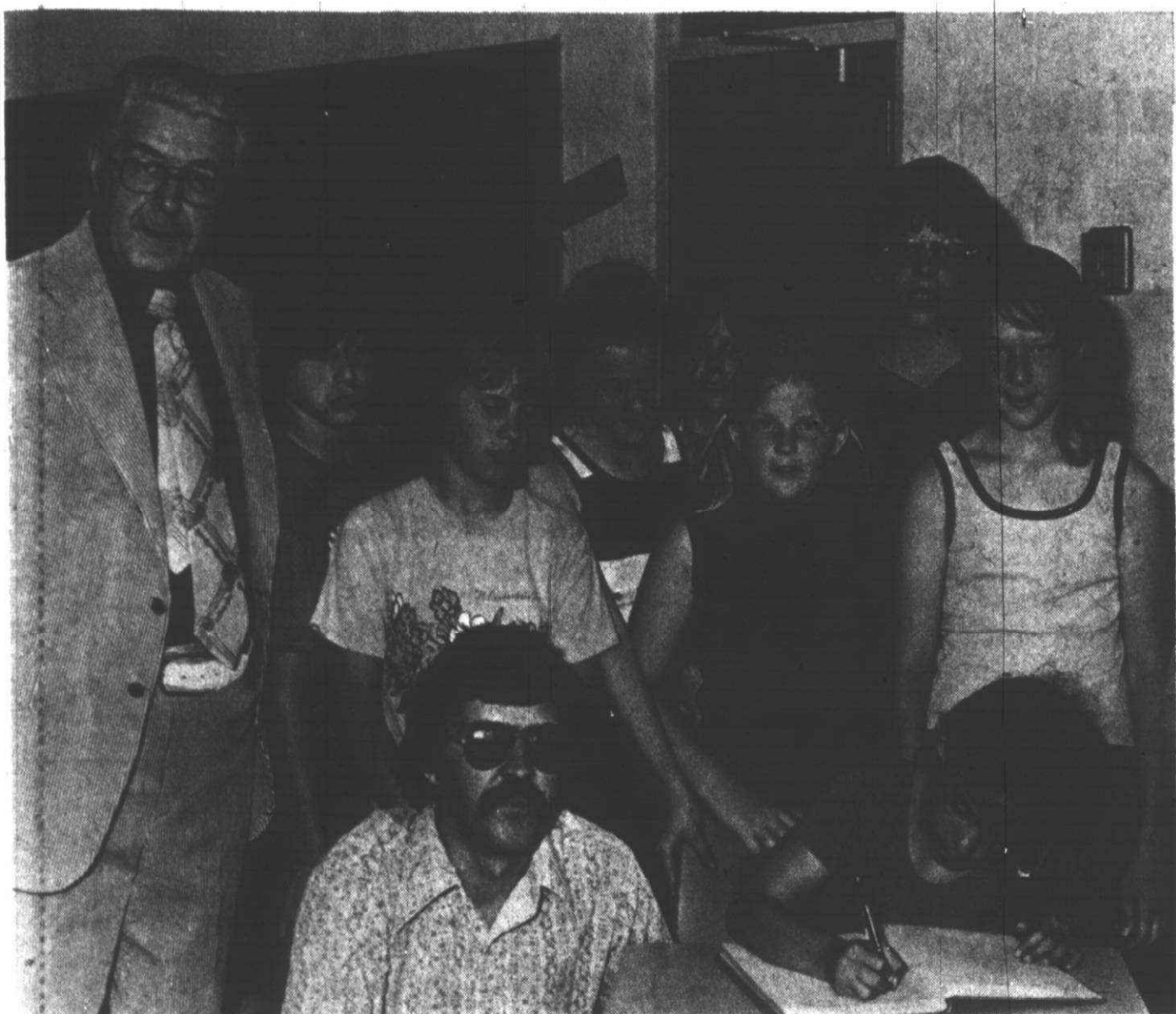

A 1972 graduate of John Glenn High School and a 1976 graduate of the University of Michigan, where he earned a straight A average and a bachelor's degree in mathematics, Bell has accepted a graduate assistantship at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, Mass., where he will teach and begin work on a PhD in mathematics next fall.

The son of George and Ruth Bell of 41950 Woodbrook in Canton, Bell plans a career of teaching mathematics at the university level. He hopes to conduct research work in the field of functional analysis.

Bell's undergraduate years at U-M are filled with a string of awards and achievements.

As a college freshman, Bell won the Branstrom prize for ranking in the top five per cent of his class.

He was named a James B. Angel Scholar for academic excellence during each of his four years at U-M and was granted the Distinguished Scholar Award for the highest academic rating in the College of Engineering as a senior.

Bell says mathematics has always been his chief field of interest.

"Since I was in junior high, I've always known I'd be in math," Bell said. "It's the 'cleanest' thing there is. In math, everything always works the way you want it to."

Bell's other interests include literature and music. He played euphonium with the U-M Marching Band for two years and plays other instruments, including organ, piano, clarinet and saxophone.

Bell's father is principal of Wayne High School in the Wayne-Westland School District.

for use of the township golf course. Battermann said the commitment to the township is still being kept in that the charge for use of the Cultural Center facility itself is the same for city and township residents.

Gornick objected that the township wasn't notified of the policy change six months ago when approved by the city commission. "Instead, we learn of it when we get irate calls from our citizens and we have no answers to give them because the city hasn't provided us any information. Why didn't this information come to the Intergovernmental Committee?"

Battermann agreed the city should have

conveyed its changed policy, and the reasons for it, to the township and that it could have been discussed earlier at the Intergovernmental Committee level.

Tom Yack, Plymouth Board of Education member, pointed out there is no uniformity between the governmental units on sharing recreation activities. "In Canton, for instance, you are only allowed four non-residents on a softball team and there are some recreation activities open to Canton residents only."

Yack and Gerald Cheske, Canton Township trustee, pointed out that the current misunderstanding between Plymouth and Plymouth Township indicates the need for a recreation workshop to discuss the value

of and extent to which recreation facilities and programs can be shared by the Plymouth-Canton community plus Salem and Superior townships.

The discussion on holding a public hearing on the crossing guard issue began as a result of a recent legal opinion from Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley. Kelley ruled that neither the school district nor a municipality was under any legal requirement to provide crossing guards and that either could voluntarily pay or share in the expense.

It was felt that, in light of this opinion, a hearing to air the issue might be in order before the school board reaches the point where it decides it necessary to eliminate crossing guards.

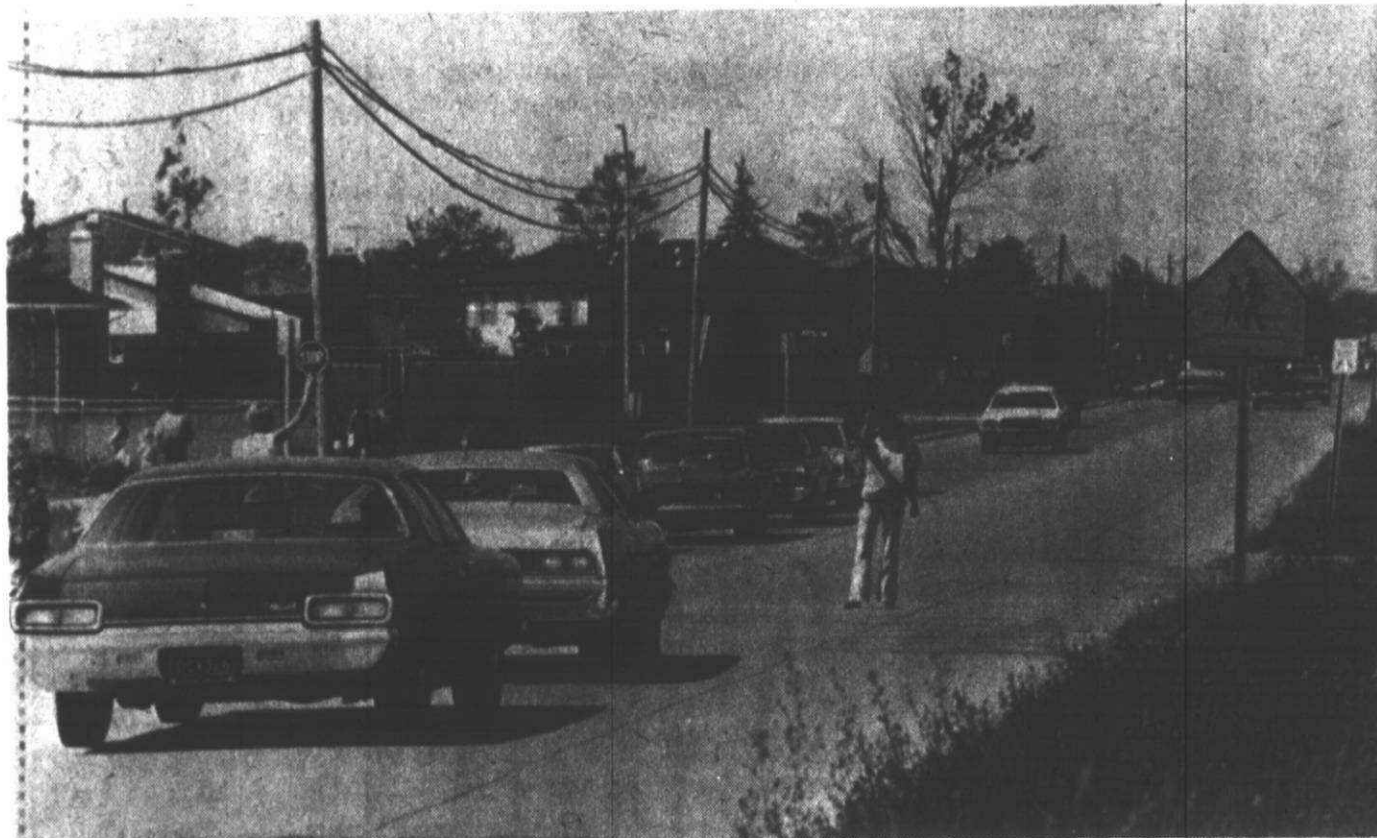
"There's only one there right now, and Harrison said more would be posted on both Hanford and Sheldon."

Reserves to get .357 magnums

After relative calm for most of the May 25 meeting, township board members erupted into argument over arming the Canton auxiliary police force.

Treasurer Carl Parsell and Supervisor Robert Greenstein said they had been busy preparing regulations and rules for the officers and that all items needed for the auxiliary force could be purchased without delay, except for handguns and campaign hats.

Greenstein asked the board for advance approval on purchasing the hats and the guns needed for the 30 officers.

Saying he had done a "lot of soul searching" on the matter, Greenstein asked the board for its approval to purchase 15 .357 magnum hand guns for the 30 officers—adding that the officers would be required to use .38 caliber ammunition.

Greenstein said the heavier .357 magnum capability of the gun and the fact that it was a "heavier duty gun" made sense.

"We've looked all over and we can get them for \$98 apiece," the supervisor said, "but we have to order soon if we want them by the time the Jaycee fair starts on Aug. 4."

After a motion by trustee Bob Myers to table the matter failed, trustee Jim Poole raised the question of where the weapons would be stored.

Greenstein responded that the shift officer would be responsible for dispersing and collecting the guns, and that the guns would be stored in the township safe when they were not in use.

BUT MYERS was dissatisfied with the choice of guns. "I want to check into the weapons, I don't think they need .357 magnums."

Greenstein asked the trustee if he was deaf, referring to the fact that the reserves would be using .38 caliber ammunition.

"They could buy armor-piercing bullets if they wanted—why don't you back off. I'm not dumb," Myers responded.

Greenstein replied that the guns were capable of using the heavier magnum load and the normal .38 caliber police issue.

"It was suggested by everyone," the supervisor said.

"If you want to buy an elephant gun to kill people," Myers suggested sarcastically, "why don't you get 44 magnums."

Trustee Gerald Cheske said Myers' comment was ridiculous and added, "The issue is whether or not we give them guns."

Greenstein said, "The reason for the .357 is that they're better, safer, heavier and they give us the option of the .357 load in the case of future emergency."

"Six months ago we came up with this and now Myers says he wants to hold off. Mr. Myers is trying to sabotage the police."

Parsell commented, "It's unfortunate that Mr. Myers says anyone is going to be killed."

Myers said that while it was the intention of the township that the officers use .38 ammunition, there was nothing to "preclude the officers from purchasing 'dum dum' bullets or armor piercing ammunition."

CHESKE MOVED the purchase be approved and after Parsell seconded the motion, Poole asked if the township also should purchase bazookas.

Poole asked why it was necessary to have the police armed and ready for the Jaycee fair.

"It's a travesty to say they'll be killing people," Parsell said, "but if we're going to send them out, they should have full gear."

Greenstein added that the "most progressive reserve force," in Farmington Hills carried .357 magnums.

Then growing more irritated by Myers remarks, he said, "This is the first time we brought this up and you come up with the worst, most brainless statement."

"I ask you to rethink it, Mr. Myers, before it appears in the papers. A man would have to be an absolute slob to come out with such idiotic statements."

"Do I get a rebuttal?" Myers asked.

"You can stick that rebuttal in your ear," Greenstein replied, and the motion passed, 4-2, with Poole and Myers dissenting, and trustee Brian Schwall absent.

the tax base and keep residential taxes low.

"Our commercial zoning regulations can't be so strict that they scare off businessmen," Culbert said. "I get the impression that the current administration is trying to discourage business development in Canton."

"We need an industrial strip similar to those created by other cities," he continued. "This would contain industry to certain areas, instead of allowing industrial development to be spread piecemeal over the township."

Culbert took issue with a recent 4-3 decision of the board of trustees to discontinue taping of township board meetings after a taping system was installed in the township meeting hall.

"ANY ELECTED official who does not want to go 'on the record' at a public meeting should not be holding elected office," Culbert said. "The recent spectacle of the supervisor calling in sheriffs to remove two trustees (who were taping the meeting) was shameful and casts a black mark on the administration."

Culbert continued, "I am worried that a political machine exists in Canton—that is, Mr. (Supervisor Robert) Greenstein and those who go along with him."

"The only way we can have true representation of the community is to have officials speak their minds and not rubber stamp the views of the incumbent political machine, or play ball with that machine. I like to think I am an independent thinker who does what he thinks is best for the community."

Culbert also stressed the need for road improvement in the township.

A Canton resident since February, 1975, Culbert graduated from the Detroit School of Law in 1973 and received a liberal arts degree from Michigan Tech in 1968. A graduate of Livonia Bentley High School, he served two years in the U.S. Army and spent one year in South Vietnam as an infantryman.

READERS' FORUM

Facts of millage
need voter review

Editor:

I notice that in a recent issue you took a middle-of-the-road approach to the June 14 millage issue and asked each voter to do a little thinking. I would like to offer residents some facts on which to base their decisions. While I will use Plymouth Township as the example, the rest of our area is generally affected.

Last year our tax rose 12 per cent due to county equalization. We just passed the millage. The county has added 4.45 per cent more to our homes through equalization. On the August ballot there will be levies for police and fire departments. Schoolcraft College wants a half mill. Schools want 4.75 mills.

If all millage passes, the total increase for this year could be the equivalent of 10.5 mills or 20 per cent over 1975.

What are the basic facts of the school millage? The information being given us by the school administration bears questioning. Figures given in their newsletter showing increased enrollments and number of teachers hired over the last five years works out to 21 pupils per teacher? The Observer & Eccentric of May 27, quoting the school administration, states 13,595 enrolled with 940 teachers or 14.5 pupils per teacher. We need answers.

And now, let us look at the money picture. Contrary to what has been indicated, our SEV (tax base) has gone up and not

down. Keep in mind that the loss in the published SEV figure has been replaced by the single business tax. The state reimburses us for this loss plus six per cent yearly. On top of this, we had a growth in actual SEV of \$47.5 million or 10 per cent over 1975, equalling a total of \$524 million. If we approve an additional 4.75 mills, this will add another 16 per cent for operation (current 29.01) or a grand total increase of 26 per cent over this year. A 26 per cent increase in one year is too much in my mind.

Over the years the school administration has consistently supplied us with SEV figures which are always low in order to influence voters to approve millage. Last year they were 10 per cent low in their forecast as was proven when the actual figure was released by the county. Why do they do this? Surely the voters could be trusted to analyze factual information and use reason as a basis for their vote. Consider your priorities on all tax issues and vote accordingly.

In closing, the union negotiators are bidding their time, waiting to see how big a cut they can get from a larger pie. No doubt the schools need our sympathy on this score. They have mine. I realize that anyone opposing school millage publicly will get no plaudits.

with modular plan

It has been brought to my attention that there could be serious flaws in the Plymouth School Board's modular scheduling program.

I recently talked to a Plymouth Canton tenth grader, Linda P., and her parents who told me the following story. Linda only has two classes: basic writing and intermediate writing. Unfortunately, basic is required for intermediate and, incredibly enough, here she is taking both classes at the same time. She is, understandably, having trouble in intermediate writing.

She started the school year also with algebra but, for some unexplained reason, her teacher dropped her from the class. Linda now has less than two hours a day actually spent in class and the rest is free time. She receives little or no counseling. She now has lost almost an entire year of education because of modular scheduling. She should have had counseling to help her schedule her classes; yet, she never received it. Linda will not be able to graduate on time.

Furthermore, modular scheduling is supposed to be optional with the students. She picked the traditional program, yet was placed into modular scheduling. She has

many friends in the same situation. Also, teachers apparently never take attendance, and if they do, parents are rarely notified of their child's class-cutting.

Linda's story is shocking. I cannot see how a responsible school board can let something like this happen. There is no telling how many other students' educational programs are ruined like Linda's. I am a resident of Canton Township and pay taxes which should provide a quality education. I now have serious doubts as to whether modular scheduling is providing quality education.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Poole and unanimously carried that the following ordinance relative to enforcement of Handicapped Parking be adopted and given immediate effect as an emergency ordinance.

Ordinance No.

An Ordinance to implement courtesy vehicle parking privileges for disabled veterans and physically handicapped persons, to provide space therefore, to regulate the exercise of privileges implemented hereunder and to prescribe penalties for the violation hereof.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDAINS:

SECTION I, PURPOSE:

This ordinance has as its purpose the implementation pursuant to P.A. 1949, No. 300 - 675 (e), 803 (d), hereinafter referred to as the Michigan Vehicle Code.

SECTION II, DEFINITIONS:

a. Disabled veteran. A veteran who is honorably discharged from any of the armed services of the United States and who has a service connected disability equivalent to disabilities described in - 1 of Public Law 187 of the 82nd Congress, First Session.

b. Physically handicapped. A person who possesses material incapacity for ambulation.

c. Certificate of identification. A certificate issued by the Michigan Secretary of State to a disabled veteran or physically handicapped person pursuant to the Michigan Vehicle Code.

d. Special registration plates. Vehicle registration plates issued by the Michigan Secretary of State to physically handicapped persons pursuant to the Michigan Vehicle Code.

SECTION III, DETERMINATION OF NECESSITY - PRIVILEGES IMPLEMENTED:

a. The Township Supervisor, shall, upon a determination of need therefore by physically handicapped persons or disabled veterans, designate and set aside a reasonable number of parking spaces clearly marked as such by the words "Reserved for Disabled Persons Only" or similar language only, upon any highway or other place open to the general public including any area designated for the parking of motor vehicles except as herein restricted by Section IV of this ordinance.

b. A person holding either a certificate of identification or special registration plates is hereby entitled to courtesy vehicle parking privileges, which privileges shall have the effect of relieving such persons from liability for the violation of vehicle parking ordinances or regulations of the Charter Township of Canton, except as herein below provided.

SECTION IV, RESTRICTIONS:

Notwithstanding courtesy vehicle parking privileges referred to in Section III of this ordinance, a person holding either a certificate of identification or special registration plates is hereby prohibited from parking on any street or highway which has been designated a fire lane or on a thoroughfare carrying heavy traffic during morning and afternoon rush hours.

SECTION V, DISPLAY:

A person holding either a certificate of identification or special registration plate shall display same in conformity to the requirements of the Michigan Vehicle Code.

SECTION VI, UNAUTHORIZED USE:

a. It shall be unlawful for any person, who is not a disabled veteran or physically handicapped person as defined by this ordinance, and who has not been issued a certificate of identification, or a special registration plate, to park, stand a motor vehicle, or otherwise occupy a parking space set aside, or reserved for use, for any disabled veteran or handicapped person.

b. This ordinance may be enforced by any law enforcement officer of the Township, by the Wayne County Sheriff, his assistants and deputies and by the Michigan State Police.

SECTION VII, PENALTIES:

Any person who shall violate this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be assessed a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days or both, in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION VIII, EFFECTIVE DATE:

This ordinance shall take effect upon its publication.

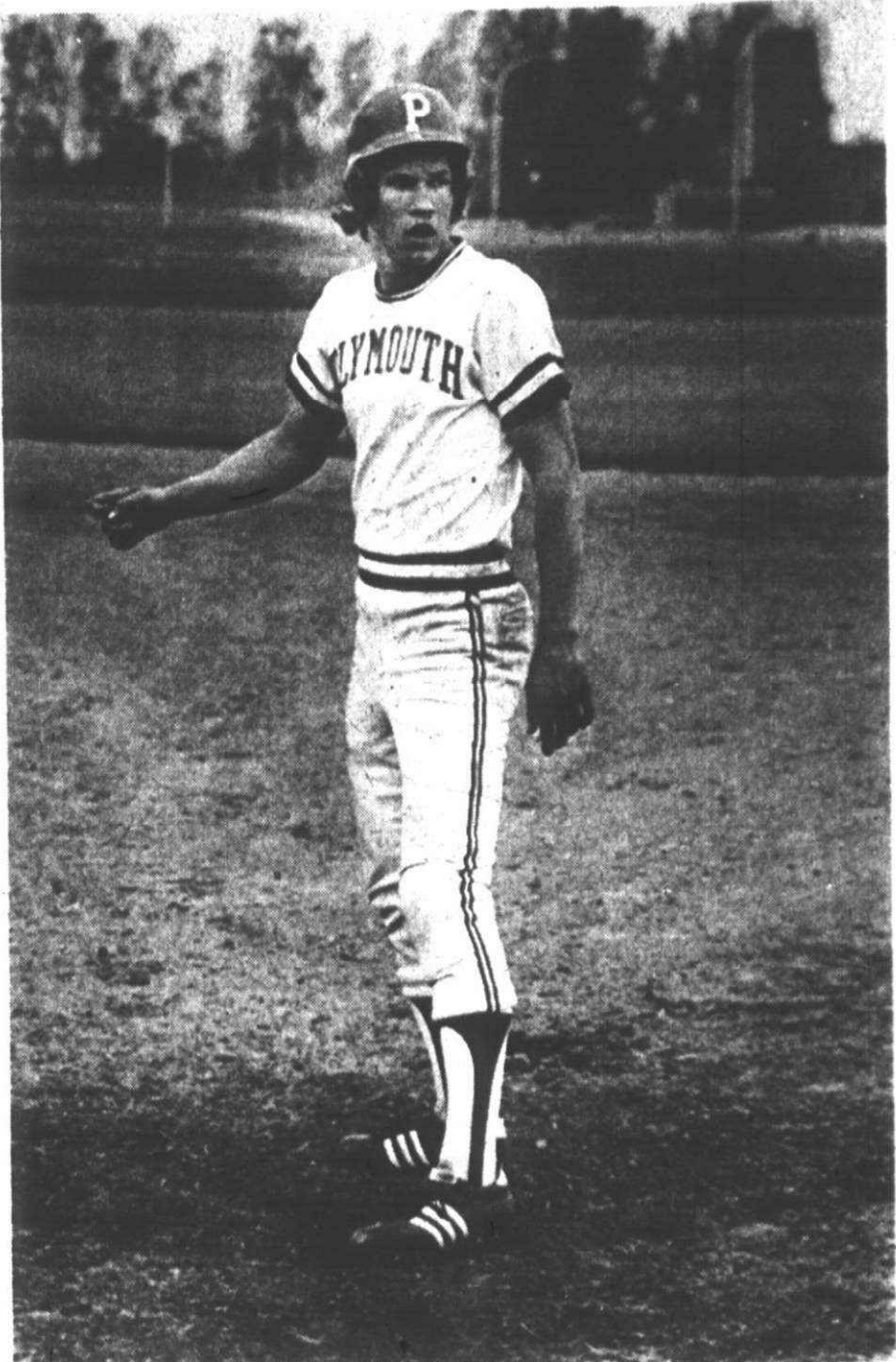
The Rocks left the bases loaded in the first and third frames and according to Gilles, "was a factor in the outcome."

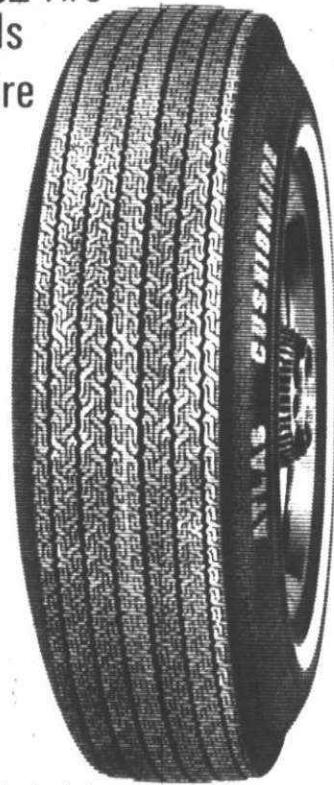

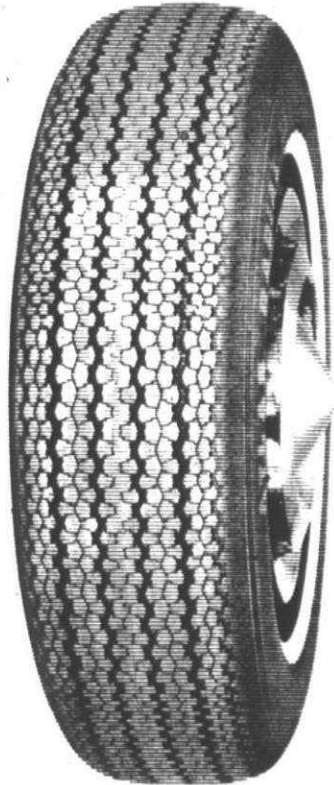

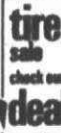

Chiefs cop 2d 'Six' league baseball crown

The citadel of Plymouth Canton's athletic program delivered its second consecutive baseball championship by conquering Livonia Churchill Thursday afternoon in a scoring fest that wasn't decided until Tom Close blasted a two-run homer in the sixth inning to propel the Chiefs to a 12-10 victory.

Close had a field day at the plate, going three for four, belting two home runs, driving in six runs and scoring three times. As far as the game winning blow was concerned, Canton mentor Fred Crissey said, "It couldn't have happened to a better player than Close. He's been pressing himself for the whole season and has been playing under a lot of stress after being pursued by so many college and pro scouts," said Crissey.

Canton led 7-1 after three innings when Bill Parson and Steve Morman delivered a pair of singles that scored four runs in the early going. Morman went three or four for the afternoon, knocking in three runs and scoring three times.

Chief starter Mark Perkins was driven from the mound in the fourth inning when Churchill tallied five times on four walks and one single with the big hit of the inning coming in the form of a bases loaded double by Ron Griffen to make the score 7-6.

Close connected for a three run-homer in the fifth frame after a walk to Scott Col-

lins and Rob Mandle's second bunt single of the day.

The Chargers came back with three runs in the fifth inning on four walks, a hit batsmen and a single.

Crissey protested the hit batsmen call with the bases loaded as Churchill's Jim Foster was nicked on the helmet by reliever Doug Smith's curveball.

Crissey vigorously protested the verdict, claiming the Churchill batter leaned into

the pitch. After he went back to the Canton bench, he was ejected from the contest.

With Crissey out of the game, the intensity of the battle was magnified as the Chargers tied the game in the top of the sixth, 10-10, the beneficiaries of three Chief errors.

With one out in the sixth, Parson singled to left-center which set up Close for his winning second homer of the game and fifth of the season, lifting the Chiefs to the league title.

It was Canton's third homer of the game as Steve Dugan cracked a round tripper in the third inning.

Parson picked up the win, working the last two and one-third innings in relief, raising his seasonal mark to 8-2.

It is the first time in the seven-year history of the Western Six Conference that a team has laid claim to the league crown in baseball for two consecutive years.

"I am pleased to see that we won the league and have something to show for three months of effort," said Crissey.

"We've worked very hard, and the league championship is representative of our effort," he added.

The following day Canton defeated Highland Park 6-3 to finish the year at 16-9.

It was RU's ability to earn valuable points by placing in the second through fourth positions of most events which spelled team championship.

"We took only three firsts in the whole thing (league meet), but I'll tell you, we've got depth," Krafchak said. "That's what won it for us—all kinds of seconds and thirds."

Bentley, as expected, had several outstanding individual performers, but the Bulldogs did not have enough talent to catch the Panthers.

Sharon Dreyer won both the long jump and the 440-yard dash for the Bulldogs, setting a new track record with a clocking of 59.3 seconds in the latter.

Bentley's Pam Beernink broke a track standard with a 2:25 first-place effort in the 880-yard run. Jeri Reum set a new track mark with a 12:35.4 time in the two-mile run and the Bulldogs' mile relay quart-

et set a new track record with a 4:11.4 victory in that event.

Debbie Mays tied the track record in the high jump with a leap of five feet one inch.

Jeanne Sellman, who bested the field in the 220-yard dash, was Plymouth Salem's only individual champion. However, the Rocks' 440-yard relay foursome cracked the track record in the sprint relay with a time of 51.8 seconds.

RU, which sported an unblemished 6-0 conference dual-meet mark, reigns as league champion as a result of its overall performance at the conference meet.

The Stroller Tips for arthritis victims

It wasn't too surprising when the conversation at the luncheon table turned to a discussion on the many experiments now going on in the medical world to find a cure for arthritis.

One of the peculiar findings is that the few who did get some kind of relief swear that they, at last, have rid themselves of the pain and suffering.

All too often, it seems, these so-called "cures" only last a short while and are cast aside.

It all started when one of the diners

asked a victim of the painful malady, "Have you ever tried the gold shots?" Before the sufferer could answer in the negative, the diner said there was a time when he took at least 30 aspirins a day. "Then I tried the gold shots, and I have been fine ever since. I even play squash and have no ill effects."

The Stroller well recalls the case of an elderly lady who was a victim and finally read a book in which it was claimed that the Indians, who roamed the land before

the white man, came, used copper rings and bracelets. So, she followed suit and claims it all helped.

Such cases have been talked about for years, but few of them seem to provide a medium of relief for all concerned.

ONE OF THE finest examples is the little lady who runs our house. More than a decade ago, she became a victim, and her experience reveals the frustration that has gripped thousands who now are tagged with arthritis.

When first struck, she discovered she couldn't find relief in aspirin tablets. Then she turned to Butazolidin (a drug they sometimes give horses). That did little good, so she began treatments with cortisone—both injected and oral. Neither did the trick.

Undaunted, she went the rest of the way and ran the gamut from endocrine through whirlpool baths, hot steam packs, and motion, and even heeded the suggestion of a friend who had been given relief through acupuncture: It did not phase our little lady.

She didn't stop the search. Came Tylonol in its various degrees, and now she has gone back to such old remedies for pain as the use of Ben-Gay rub.

But through it all, the pain persists, and she still is in a quandary.

It didn't help, either, when The Stroller told her how his maternal grandmother

got relief in her later years.

IN THOSE DAYS, arthritis had not been heard of, and folks who suffered the pain were said to have rheumatism—or "rumatiz" as The Stroller's grandmother called it.

Doctoring for years to bring relief, the old country doctor finally told her that there was no cure for what ailed her, but that he might be able to bring about some relief.

She listened. Then she laughed. For he prescribed the wearing of a damp rag on top of her head at all times—and told her to learn to smoke a pipe.

Well, she tried. The damp rag was no trouble. But she couldn't stand a pipe until she hit upon a corn cob pipe—the kind the old men smoked. She claimed it helped.

The Stroller still smiles about it, as every Christmas he had a special gift for her—a can of Prince Albert pipe tobacco and a new corn cob pipe.

She never told any member of the family that her pain was gone. For years she sat at the window in her favorite rocker, with the rag atop her head, and the faithful corn cob pipe in her mouth.

And when she died, it was with a smile on her face.

Maybe the old remedy would help the moderns—and the treatment isn't costly. Just a can of tobacco, a pipe and a damp rag.

Republicans oppose real estate tax

Republicans from Livonia, Northville and Plymouth are against a proposed real estate tax for rapid transit, want to see the national debt eliminated, and stand behind welfare reform—but not unanimously.

Precinct delegates in the Wayne County portion of the 2d Congressional District were polled last week in their local convention as they elected delegates to the June 12 state convention.

The state convention will elect national convention delegates.

STATE REPUBLICANS no longer deal with resolutions and a platform at local conventions. Instead, they take issues polls, which showed:

• Almost unanimous opposition to the

real estate transfer tax as a method of financing rapid transit construction in southeast Michigan.

• Approval of Congress' eliminating the federal debt and initiating a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. It passed 34-14, with one delegate arguing, "Don't clutter the constitution" with legislative matters.

• Approval of "reform of the welfare system" through a "work-incentive program designed to get cheats of the rolls and provide more assistance for those in real need." The vote was 49-2.

• Encouragement of private enterprise to develop energy sources "to enable the U.S. to become independent of foreign energy supplies." The vote was 49-1.

• Unanimous voice vote approval of a proposal to put a question on the Wayne County ballot to elect a county executive.

SUPPORT DEVELOPED to send district chairman Harry Greenleaf to the national convention as a delegate pledged to President Gerald Ford.

Greenleaf, of Livonia, is a Ford Motor Co. executive. The 2d District is entitled to three national delegates—two for Ford and one for Ronald Reagan.

George Kettunen, the only GOP precinct delegate from western Wayne County pledged to Reagan, was seeking support to be the Reagan delegate.

Another livonian, Sally Bennett, was also mounting an effort to be a Reagan delegate or alternate.

Stempien asks Hays quit post

Marvin Stempien, running for Congress in the Aug. 3 Democratic primary in the 2d District, has called for U.S. Rep. Wayne Hays (D-Ohio) to resign his chairmanship of the house committee on administration.

Stempien wrote to House Speaker Carl Albert and urged that House Democratic leaders approve a resolution calling for the resignation of Hays from the chairmanship.

The candidate, a Livonia lawyer, discussed the controversial Hays who has admitted hiring a woman as a committee secretary for \$14,000, with whom he had sexual relations.

The congressman is under investigation by the U.S. Justice Department for alleged illegal use of federal funds.

Stempien discussed the Hays issue recently while answering questions from senior citizens in a Monroe center for the elderly.

Stempien said that the integrity of the committee and the confidence of the public in its government is at stake.

"Whether he is eventually found guilty or innocent of a crime, Hays should immediately step down from his position of trust regarding the expenditure of public funds," he said.

Until the Justice Department and house ethics committee completes its investigation of the Hays controversy, "the seriousness of the charges casts grave doubts in the minds of average citizens about the basic honesty of the committee operation under Hays," Stempien said.

The candidate told the seniors that he has said many times in the campaign that "citizens have been rightly demanding openness, honesty and a return to morality to their public officials."

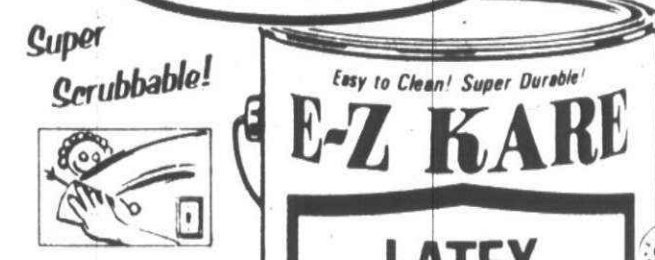
Hays would "do much to encourage those principles in the public by stepping down until the charges against him are cleared," Stempien said.

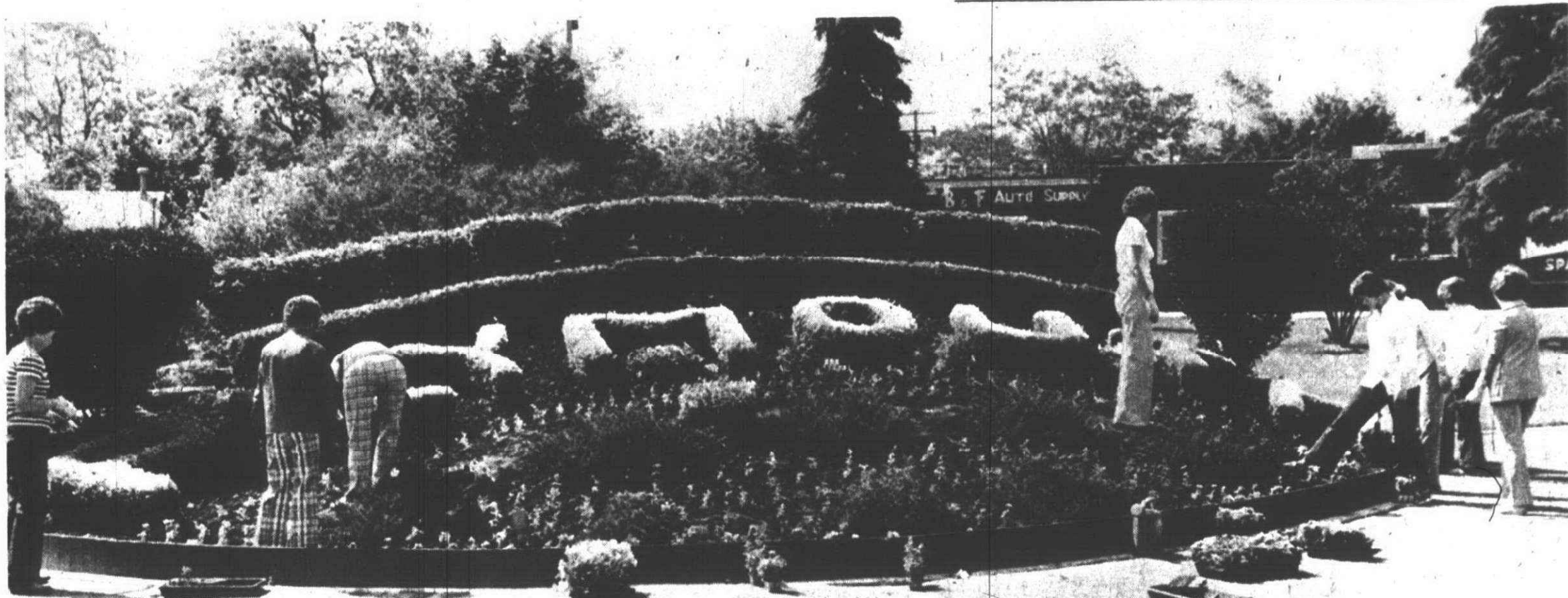

The question of whether the penal system should be improved in the U.S. was the subject of debate at a recent discussion tournament at Plymouth Canton High.





The CitiCar is coming—at under \$3,000. The non-polluting electric car can go 40-50 miles on a charge, and has a top speed of 35 m.p.h.

Plug it and leave it

If you want to hum to work, roll into Tamaroff Buick-Opel and look over the CitiCar. The electric CitiCar should be delivered to the Southfield dealership before July 15. The CitiCar base price is \$2,988, but options such as a rally stripes, tinted glass and cigar lighter are available. Spark plugs, water pumps, pistons and transmissions are not available. The car doesn't have any.

THE CITICAR, a two-passenger, multi-purpose vehicle, is a non-polluting electric car that has a top speed of 38 miles per hour and has a maximum range of 40-50 miles per charge (100 miles per day with intermittent charging).
