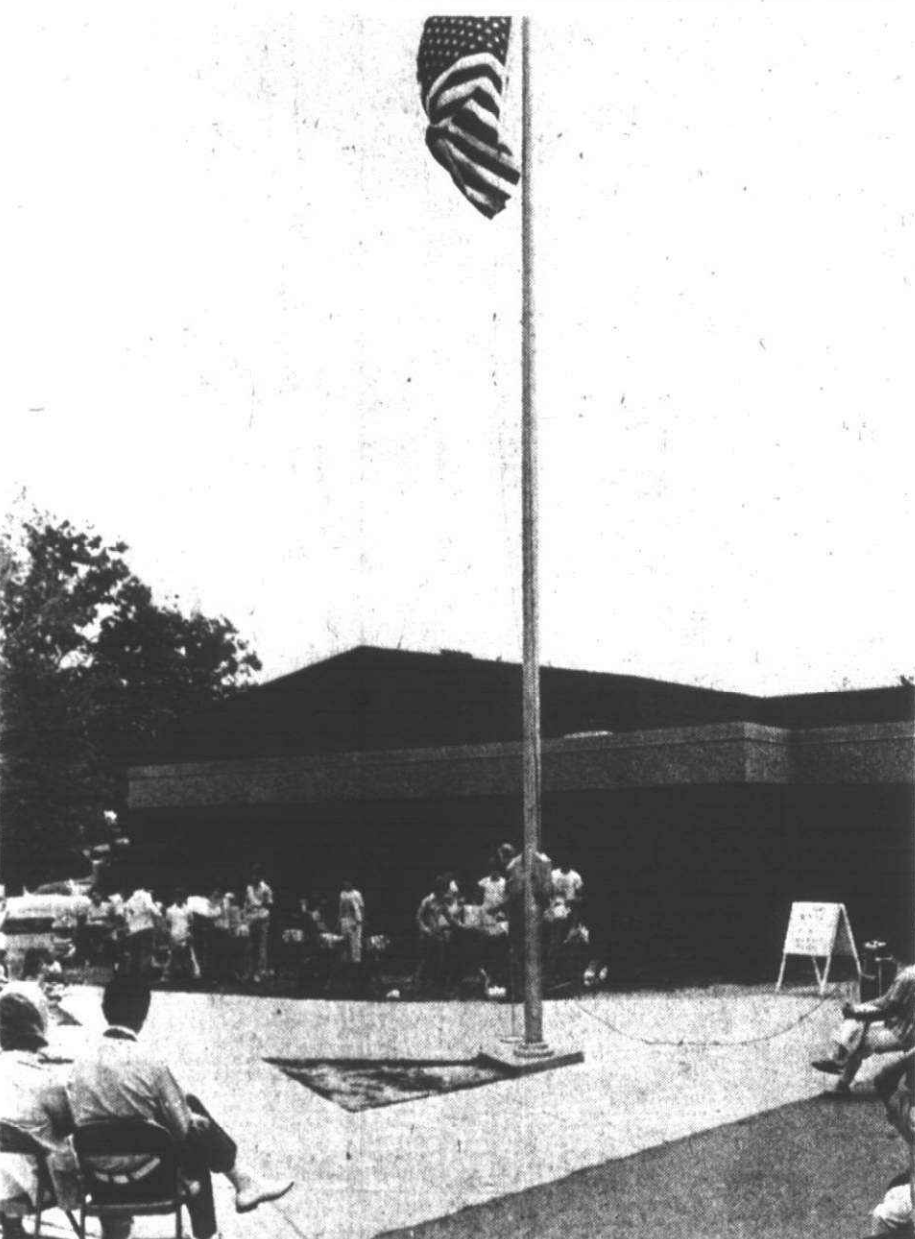

Neighborhoods take aim

Section 5 hunting issue revived

Residents of Canton Township's Section 5 will have another opportunity to launch an attack on hunting in their neighborhood, despite a recommendation last April to keep the area open to the hunting sport.

Members of the township's second hunting area control committee (HACC) will hold another public hearing on the issue in late July or early August, according to Canton Trustee Gerald Cheske, who will represent the township on the group.

The hearing and HACC recommendation could overturn an earlier opinion, issued in April by another hunting committee, to keep the one-mile square area, bounded by Joy, Warren, Beck and Ridge, open to hunters.

That committee, composed of Canton Clerk John Flodin, Bruce Andrews, conservation law executive of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and representatives of the Michigan State Police and Wayne County Sheriff's Department, unanimously voted against a hunting ban sought by Section 5 residents.

According to Flodin, HACC members based their decision on the generally open

character of the area. The DNR will recommend hunting bans only in densely populated areas.

But members of the Canton Board of Trustees refused to accept the HACC's recommendation and recently voted 5-2 to request another public hearing on the matter.

Flodin and Supervisor Robert Greenstein, who fear a hunting ban in Section 5 could jeopardize large-lot zoning in northwest Canton, voted against the request for a second hearing. Flodin resigned from his position on the HACC.

"I voted against closing Section 5 to hunting," the clerk explained, "and I don't think much has changed there. My opinion was you could safely hunt there. I don't have a quarrel with those people who are having problems with hunters, but there are laws they can resort to."

Under state trespassing laws, persons can hunt on private property only with the owner's permission. All land within Section 5, Flodin noted, is privately owned.

But other members of the township

board feel residents of the area should have another opportunity to be heard.

"There's quite a bit of pressure to stop hunting there," Cheske said. "I think the people of that area deserve another hearing."

"Personally, I believe that if the vast majority of the people want hunting banned," Cheske said, "we should do all we can to meet their wishes. Section 5 isn't that heavily populated, but I feel there are enough people to make hunting a hazard."

Members of the township's second HACC will meet in July and schedule a public hearing on the issue, Cheske said.

"I definitely think we have to get this question settled," he said. "I'd like a decision by the start of hunting season."

SINCE CHESKE'S presence on the HACC will change the composition of the

Fire district approved, board to set levy later

Costs may well outrun income this year as the township begins work on its second fire station, to be located at Haggerty and Warren roads.

Board members Tuesday night unanimously established a fire special assessment district following the first of two public hearings on the matter, and while reiterating the pledge they would not levy more than 1.5 mills, a new estimate revealed the cost of construction and staffing of the new station may exceed expected revenue from the additional levy by \$115,000.

The estimate indicated that total first year costs of building the station, equipping and staffing it will run almost \$430,000.

A levy of 1.5 mills is expected to raise only \$314,000.

Treasurer Carl Parsell said, however, that the township can borrow the shortfall from the general fund this year and repay it from revenue generated in 1977 because almost \$260,000 are one-time only costs for construction and equipment.

A REVISED architectural rendering of the second station, reduced expected cost of the physical facility to an estimated \$215,000, cutting the original cost of the station in half.

The station, a bare bones plant, may be added on to in the future, and the architects, at the request of the board noted that the portions of the original building as planned were deleted because of insufficient funds.

"There is a good chance that federal money will be available to pay for the community room and the other items that were deleted," Supervisor Robert Greenstein said.

"We have information from Washington that a second public works bill will be introduced and that there are enough votes in Congress to override a presidential veto."

"Any extension to the building won't be built with millage money—we think we have a good chance of getting federal dollars if the bill goes through."

While the board acted Tuesday to establish the district, the actual amount of the levy won't be determined until a second public hearing is held, scheduled for 7-9 p.m., July 13.

BOARD MEMBERS indicated they would not levy more than 1.5 mills, but it was not revealed until Trustee Jim Poole and Treasurer Carl Parsell engaged in a yelling match.

Poole said that even though the board had promised before the May 18 ballot that it would not levy more than 1.5 mills, the voters had approved a special assessment district that allows the board to levy up to 10 mills for capital expenditures and an un-

limited amount of millage for operation of the new station.

Parsell argued that the voters had only approved 1.5 mills for the district. "If Mr. Poole wants to make it 10 mills that is his business, but we promised to levy only 1.5 mills and we intend to stick by that."

Greenstein added, "The board offered a resolution of 1.5 mills and if we do anything else I think we are guilty of fraud. I think the voters would have the right to set aside the election or they could recall us."

Turning to the audience, he said, "You won't see more than 1.5 mills—I guarantee that. If you do, we'll quit. As long as I sit here that will be the maximum, and I know that Mr. Cheske (Trustee Jerry Cheske) Mr. Flodin (Clerk John Flodin) and Mr. Parsell feel the same way and that's four votes out of seven."

One township property owner commented, "I'll take your word as long as you're there that you won't tax more, but will you be here as long as I pay taxes?"

Greenstein replied that he couldn't "possibly foresee" the need to increase the levy higher than 1.5 mills. "If future members of this board do, you always have the right to recall, they did it in Redford over half a mill."

GREENSTEIN SAID he expected that the millage might decrease to .75 mills in the third year, because at that time all of the construction and equipment costs will be paid for, and the operating costs are estimated at \$170,000.

By the third year, the levy can either be lowered or maintained at 1.5 mills and the excess money can go toward purchasing property for a site for a third station, the supervisor explained.

Flodin added that the increasing tax base of the township is a second reason why residents can expect the levy to decrease in the future. "Each year, each mill will raise more township-wide, so I think we can expect to levy less."

Most of the operating cost of the second station will be tied up in salaries and fringe benefits for the nine firemen working there.

According to Chief Mel Paulun, the station will be staffed in three-man shifts, with the new station handling all runs north of Ford Road with the present station serving the rest of the township, and acting as a backup for the new satellite facility.

The chief said no new equipment will be needed in the near future because some of the present equipment was purchased in anticipation of the new station.

"Rescue runs composed 66 per cent of our job, and that's where the new station will be of the biggest help. We'll be able to reduce response time greatly. Right now it takes anywhere from nine to 14 minutes to respond to a call in Holiday Park."

"With the new station, our response time should be about four minutes. We should be able to save anywhere from six to 10 minutes on many of our runs."

Manual approved

Reserve rules get green light

Stressing that the Canton reserve police force is based on the concept of "augmentation rather than replacement" of regular law enforcement agencies protecting the township, the Canton board of trustees Tuesday night approved a rules and regulation manual for the auxiliaries by a 4-3 vote with trustees Robert Myers, Brian Schwall, and Jim Poole dissenting.

Adoption of the manual keeps the reserves on the schedule hoped for by Supervisor Robert Greenstein, who would like to see the reserves on the street at the time the Jaycee Fair starts Aug. 4.

The manual, a compilation of several similar documents from nearby communities is the work of Greenstein, Treasurer Carl Parsell, and the man they hope will head the reserve force, Carl Silvers, a 25-year veteran of the Detroit Police Department.

It covers authority, responsibilities, power, dress and grooming, use of weapons and the hierarchy of Canton's auxiliaries.

"This is tailored to meet the needs of Canton's force," Greenstein said, "and it explains fully the responsibilities and duties of the reserves."

Greenstein turned to Silvers, now a federal employee working for the postal inspection service, to handle questions on the reserve.

SILVERS STRESSED the back-up nature of the force, commenting, "We will assist and cooperate with the state and sheriff in any way. By state law when they are at the scene of an accident or crime, they will give orders to our reserves."

Several residents questioned the powers given the reserves, and Peter Bundarin asked if the reserves were assumed to have full police power limited only by restrictions in the manual or if they were assumed to have no power except as specified by the board.

Greenstein replied that the reserves will have full police power while on duty and none while not on duty.

"They will have full authority, but we are telling them that they should when possible call in the sheriff or state police to make arrests."

"We are encouraging them not to pursue violators unless it absolutely cannot be avoided and there is a threat to public safety."

Bundarin asked if the reserves would carry guns off duty, and Greenstein replied that they could not unless they had a permit to carry a concealed weapon, the same as any other citizen. "We cannot give them power, and if they do carry a gun off duty without a permit, it's a felony."

Greenstein replied that the reserves were not being encouraged to make any arrests.

"We don't want them to miss work to go to court. They've already put up with enough for free."

SILVERS ADDED, "We discourage any

chases by our reserves. We're simply not trained for it yet. These people are capable of learning—they're good, intelligent, conscientious people, but they're not trained."

"But they're willing to learn. Let's stop this adverse publicity. Give these people a chance to do a job for you—show them a little trust, if you do I think you'll be pleased with the results."

Silvers added, "There's not going to be any fooling around on this force. The way we see our job, it will be as public assistance officers. We will be highly visible driving through the subdivisions and on the main thoroughfares—that's the whole concept."

"We'll serve a crowd control function at fairs and school events."

He added, "What the public has to realize is that 85 per cent of police work is public service and that's the part we're emphasizing. If we come across criminal activity, we'll call in the sheriff or the state."

"If the courts continue to rule that the sheriff can be pulled out of Canton, then what we'll be doing is taking over 85 per cent of the sheriff's work—the public service aspect of it."

"We realize that all the classroom training in the world won't teach officers how to handle people on the street. There's no such thing as a fully trained police officer until he has 7-10 years on the job, so we'll be trying to get in as much time as we can getting the reserves to ride with the sheriff and state police as part of their training."

Silvers said the manual is particularly strict about control and use of firearms.

Greenstein added, "We're just getting this force off the ground and there will be a lot of things that have to be ironed out on an intradepartmental basis, but this manual will provide guidelines to get us started."

FOLLOWING THE close 4-3 vote, the board approved a second class of reserves to start this September, all of whom will be going to attend the reserve academy after chosen through the same screening process as this year's class.

"We'd like to think that we'll be able to keep all the people who will graduate this year, but we know that some will leave," Greenstein said.

Silvers said a reserve force of 40 would be the optimal size. This year, 28 men and women are expected to graduate from the academy.

Cost of the reserves has not yet been established, although the board has already paid almost \$1,500 for guns, and approved another \$300 per reserve Tuesday for uniforms.

But the question of hourly pay for the reserves is still undecided, although board members said if they are paid, the cost will not exceed \$2.50 an hour. Each reserve is expected to serve a minimum of 20 hours a month.

Poole outlines plan for fire prevention

Canton Trustee Jim Poole hopes to save lives and money through a smoke detector program, sponsored by the township.

The program, if accepted by the board of trustees, would provide smoke detectors to residents at bulk-rate prices, reduce runs of the Canton Fire Department and, most importantly, save property and lives.

If Poole's idea is accepted, township officials would purchase 3,000 or 4,000 smoke detectors at bulk-rate prices and sell them to residents at the purchase price. Members of the township fire department would recommend three or four brands of smoke detectors, before township officials advertised for bids.

"The program would make smoke detectors more available to more people at more reasonable prices," Poole explained.

"THE BIG ADVANTAGE is you'd get more people using them, because they're

cheaper. By the fire department selecting them, people would know they're good. Ultimately, the program would probably reduce runs for the fire department."

According to Poole, township officials considered an ordinance, making installation of smoke detectors mandatory in new homes, three years ago. Board members rejected the idea in favor of a voluntary approach to the matter.

Poole credits Canton resident Tom Salapatek with the idea for the bulk-rate smoke detector program.

"He sent me a letter suggesting this," Poole explained, "and I think it's a hell of a good idea. I think we should seriously consider it. I wish more people would send me good ideas. They're thousands of them out there, I'm sure."

Poole plans to introduce the smoke detector plan to township board members in the near future.

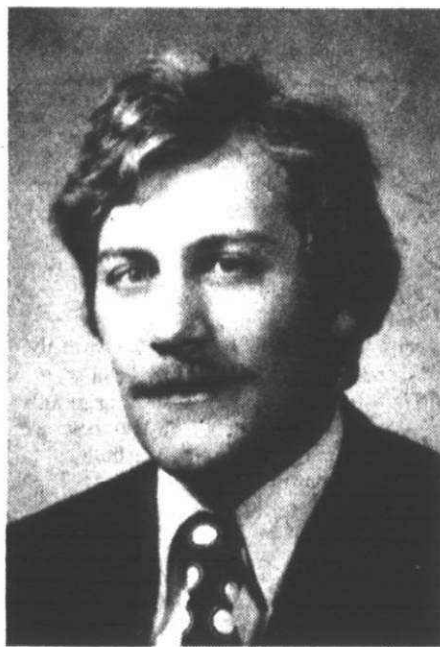

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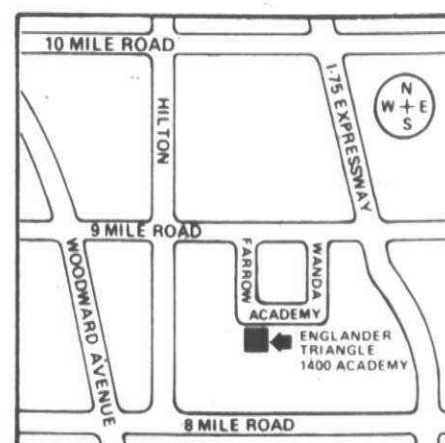
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Bicentennial crafts in park tonight

The first Plymouth Community Band Concert of the 1976 summer season and crafts demonstrations by members of the Plymouth Community Arts Council (PCAC) are scheduled for the fourth Bicentennial-in-the-Park program tonight.

The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. in Kellogg Park, or in the event of rain in the auditorium of Plymouth Salem High. All area residents are invited to come to the park to listen to the band music and to watch the craftsmen at work.

HERITAGE CRAFT demonstrations will begin at 7:30.

Eight local artists will demonstrate crafts practiced in America during colonial days. All the crafts featured are cur-

rently enjoying a revival, and many people are taking time to learn these "old-fashioned" arts today.

During the evening, Caroline Kleinsmith will show how to make corn husk dolls. Gloria Teter will demonstrate spinning, and Teresa Ohno will show the art of lace making.

Grace Kabel will work with basketry, and Thelma Cuper will be set up for quilting. Two colonial embroidery techniques will be demonstrated as Margaret Moon does crewel stitchery and Carol Noffz works on count thread embroidery. Ms. Noffz also will demonstrate paper quilting. Betty Porter will be arranging dried flowers.

All crafts demonstrated have been taught at the PCAC offices on Main Street. Classes in these arts will be offered again when the 1976 fall season begins.

AT 8 P.M. the Plymouth Community Band, directed by James Griffith, will open its 17th summer concert series.

This first concert will feature light listening music, primarily marches and show tunes. The Community Band has been a popular summer park attraction in Plymouth since 1959. During the 1976 season the group will perform each Thursday night in Kellogg Park from June 24 to July 29.

Again the Plymouth, Northville, Canton,

Novi League of Women Voters will be set up to register area voters in the park. Residents of the City of Plymouth, Plymouth and Canton townships may register from 7:30 to 9 p.m.

'Hey, good buddy,' protect your CB

Citizen band radios are providing hours of entertainment as well as frustration for residents of the Plymouth-Canton area this year.

According to spokesmen for the Automobile Club of Michigan (AAA), the City of Plymouth Police Department, and the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, the radios are becoming a new target of thieves.

In the City of Plymouth alone, about 45 CB radios have been reported stolen since February, according to Police Chief Tim Ford, who cannot remember a single CB theft report before that date.

Although the Wayne County Sheriff's Department does not keep specific records of CB radio thefts, Det. Robert Pond says reports of CB thefts have "snowballed" in western Wayne County this year.

A 78-DAY survey, conducted by AAA from January to March of this year, reports reimbursement for 1,048 CB thefts in Michigan for an average replacement cost of \$228 each, a figure that includes repair of dashboards and windows, according to Paul Johnson, group claim manager.

The survey was conducted during winter months, when automobile thefts usually hit an annual low, Johnson said. The insur-

ance agency predicts \$5 million worth of Michigan CB radios will enter thieves' hands this year.

Although AAA does not break down claim statistics for individual offices, Dick Roberts, manager of the Plymouth office at Ann Arbor Road and Sheldon, says claims for CB thefts have increased at his office too.

AAA spokesmen and law enforcement officers place a major blame for the rash of CB radio thefts on the exposed antennas which advertise the radio's presence.

"It's like waving a flag," Ford said of the antennas.

"If people would come up with collapsible antennas, it would stop a lot of this."

FORD SAID most, if not all, of the CB radios stolen from Plymouth this year were connected to exposed antennas. Pond said most of the CB radio thefts handled by the Sheriff's Department involved the exposed equipment.

Johnson recommends installation of a collapsible antenna as a first and foremost precaution against a CB theft.

"Motorists who wish to minimize the chances of having a CB unit stolen should be sure doors are locked and the car is in an observable location when parked," Johnson said. "When possible, equip the car with a collapsible antenna, because the antenna is the first visible indication

that an automobile is CB-equipped."

vise motorists to remove slide-in CB units when the car is parked and park automobiles with permanently installed units in garages when possible. Engraving the motorist's drivers license number on the unit will help residents' recover units if they are stolen.

Stan-Gard Systems of Royal Oak sells electric car alarms for less than \$100 as a protection against CB and other automotive thefts, according to a recent edition of AAA's "Motor News." In addition, CB radio locks are manufactured by a Texas firm.

"CBs have become the real in-thing in the past year," observed one AAA spokesman. "It's becoming profitable to steal, because the demand for the units outweighs the supply. Anything that forces a thief to use a tool or take more time is going to cut down on the chances for theft."

W-W schools score \$500,000 in grants

Wayne-Westland School District has been awarded a half million dollar grant over three years to develop a model program in American Indian education for the kindergarten-12th grade levels.

"One of the major components of the application is to bring an awareness and understanding of the North American Indian heritage and culture to the nearly 1,600 urban children of Indian heritage living in Wayne-Westland," Supt. Dr. Timothy J. Dyer told the board of education Tuesday.

"Our survey of the district showed a surprisingly large Indian population spread evenly throughout the district."

"The grant recognizes that much has been done for the reservation Indian, but little for the urbanized Indian. It is hoped that this program will develop a national prototype for the urban area native North American Indians."

"Many people still believe in the stereotype of the Indian living on the plains. We will be emphasizing their contributions and their culture such as art and architecture, which is not communicated in most books."

IN ADDITION to developing curriculum offerings in classes, the district will also employ home coordinators to identify specific needs of eligible children such as dental, medical and clothing needs as well as tutoring in basic skills.

"During the first year we'll be trying to determine the basic personal needs of the 1,600 Indian children," Dyer said.

"We will also be field testing programs in several schools to determine how we can best emphasize the contributions to the Indian culture in general."

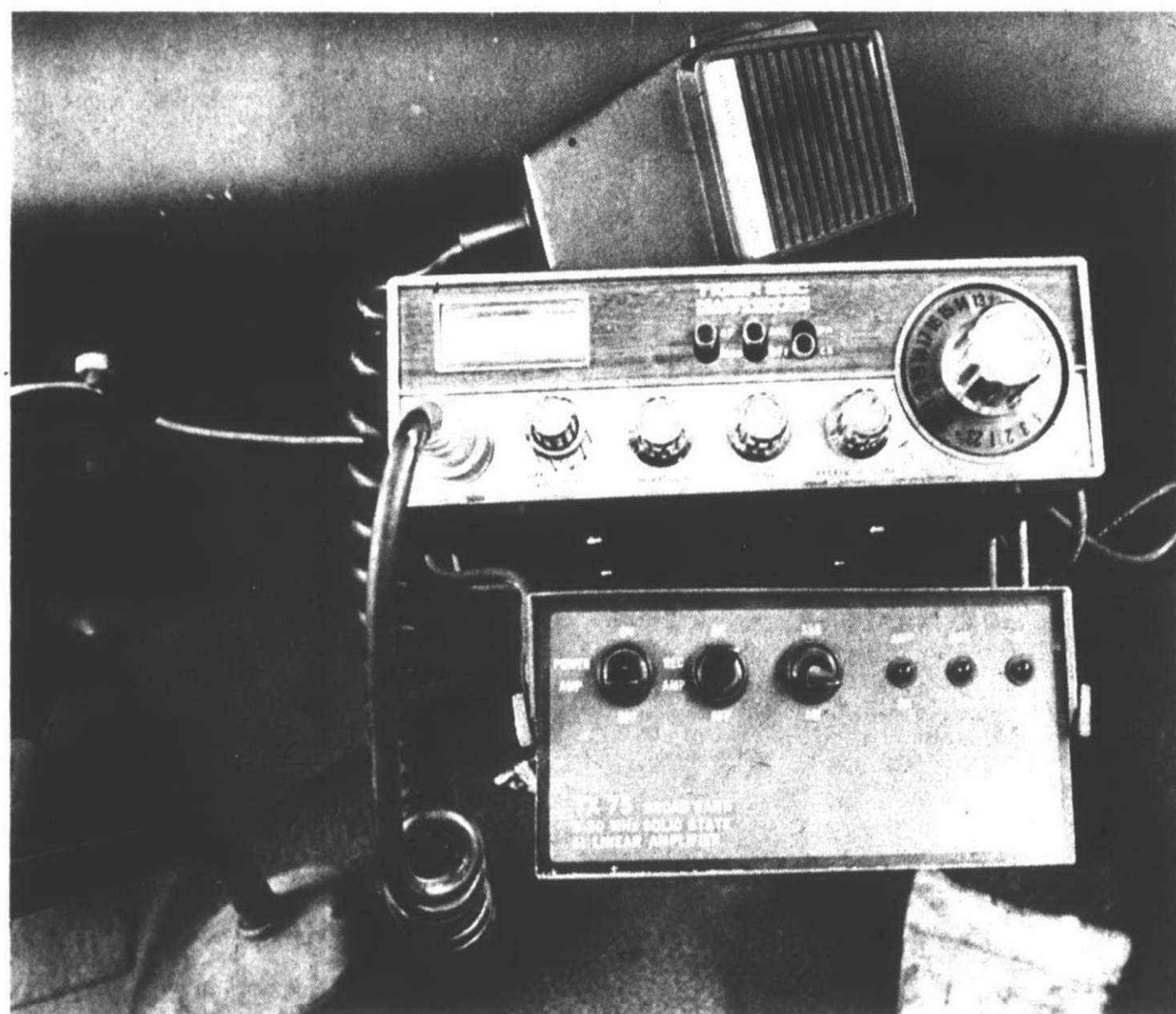
The grant was researched and written

by Dr. James R. Doyle, district director of research.

"Not many people realize that Doyle has worked with Indians in the metropolitan area for the last three years. During that time, Doyle assisted the American Association of Detroit in developing several programs."

DYER ADDED the district was recommended for the grant by the state department of education based on its reputation for "completing successfully difficult and innovative programs" such as the SPARK-KEY pre-school program, the metric program and the state accountability model.

The grant, the largest ever awarded Wayne-Westland from the department of health education and welfare, gives the district \$163,500 for three years for a total of \$490,500.

Watch for parade traffic

Residents should allow themselves an additional 10-15 minutes to drive to church July 4.

That is the advice given by Plymouth Police Chief Tim Ford who is coordinating re-routing of traffic to accommodate the parade and ceremonies July 4.

"With July 4 falling on a Sunday this year, and ceremonies slated to begin at 11:30 a.m.," says Ford, "we can end up with some bad traffic snarls unless residents fully realize the potential problems and plan ahead."

Because of the lantern-passing ceremony to begin at 11:30 a.m. July 4, the police will begin closing Main Street from Theodore to Ann Arbor Trail about 10:45 a.m. Thus, Main will be closed during the peak period when many residents will be enroute to church services.

Baricades will be set up and police officers will be re-routing traffic onto Harvey

and Mill. Motorists shouldn't experience any special difficulty getting to church or other destinations, especially if they are familiar enough with the city's street layouts to know alternate routes. But motorists should leave home at least 10 minutes early, Ford advises, to arrive at church in time.

The chief has contacted by phone ministers from six churches which will most seriously be affected by the diversion of traffic. Among those affected are First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, Central Baptist Church, St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church and Main Street Baptist.

Depending on how long the line gets for the 1,776 persons to be in the Bicentennial Mile for the lantern-passing, Ann Arbor Trail might have to be closed. The chief now plans to keep the Trail open. If it is

closed, other churches also would be affected, such as the Christian Science First Church of Plymouth.

The ministers will be making announcements from the pulpit this weekend, but those who miss services should be alert to the problems which await them July 1.

"I want to keep Ann Arbor Trail open if at all possible during the lantern-passing," Ford says. "But it will be closed during the parade."

The parade, slated to start about 12:30 p.m., will result in Main being closed from Theodore to Hartsoogh. After the parade ends, units will go east on Hartsoogh to East Middle School to disband.

Another area of traffic congestion will be the Burroughs parking lot on Plymouth Road east of Mill for the fireworks display. The fireworks will be set off at twilight in the ball diamond across the road from the parking lot.

NBD donates \$200 for trees

National Bank of Detroit has awarded a \$200 Bicentennial grant to the Canton Township Bicentennial Commission for use as part of the 1776 tree planting project underway this year.

"We're pleased to contribute to this project," said Robert K. Barbour, Vice President and officer in charge of NBD's Metro West Regional Banking Center.

"The beautification of the area by planting trees will result in a lasting and positive addition to Canton Township that may be enjoyed by residents for years to come."

In all, NBD awarded 13 metropolitan Detroit communities a total of \$10,000 in

grants for their major bicentennial projects.

Grants were made to those bicentennial projects that best typified the criteria of having a permanent and positive influence on their community.

These suburban grants are in addition to the \$10,000 donated by NBD to the Detroit Bicentennial Commission.

A panel of impartial judges reviewed applications submitted by communities officially listed with the state Bicentennial Commission.

On May 20, 1976, the judges made funding recommendations for each project—

awarding grants on a combination of merit and financial need based on each project's total budget.

The judges were: David Glick, Manager, Adult Education, Greenfield Village-Henry Ford Museum; Mrs. Alma Stallworth, Deputy Director, Detroit Historical Museum; Ms. Martha Gibser, Community Special Projects Coordinator, Michigan Council for the Arts; Jack Steiner, Secretary, Contributions Committee, Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce; and Mrs. Alice Alligan, Chief, Burton Historical Collection, Detroit Public Library.

NBD plans to formally present the grant to Canton within the next several weeks.

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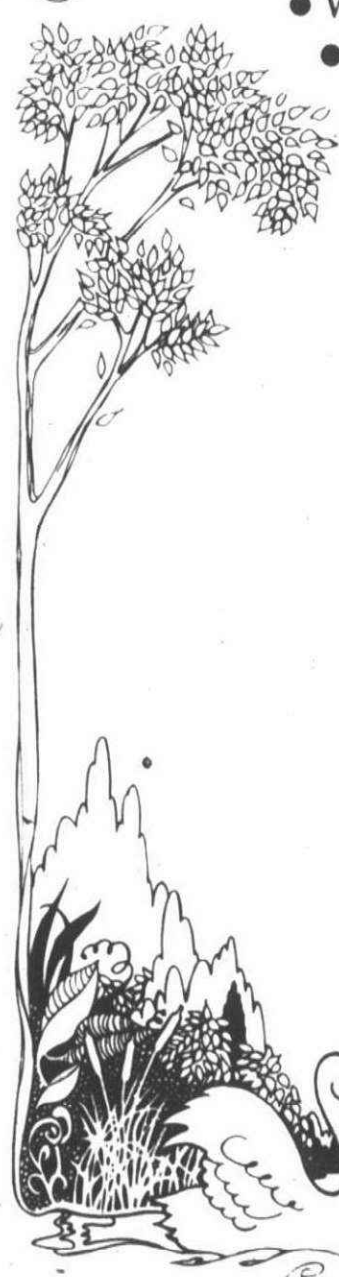

Apologies to our readers who were left hanging on the telephone line election eve with a busy signal beeping in their ears instead of election results.

School election 1976 was of the sorts which won't be repeated for some time, if ever. The high interest in the election, and confusion which surrounded the close result, left us unprepared for the rash of calls which greeted us.

Many of our readers were left on the phone one to two minutes waiting for an answer. Some called back after waiting awhile, and others gave up entirely. I'm sure it was very hectic for our callers because it was equally hectic for us facing a telephone which had four phone calls waiting to be answered simultaneously from 10 p.m. to beyond midnight. We were glad to provide the service, but only wish we had anticipated the interest and unusualness of this election so calls could have been handled more quickly.

NORMALLY, from past elections, two persons handling the phones is sufficient because the calls for results aren't overwhelming. There usually is a period of 30-40 minutes when the calls are heavy, and

then the number of calls is light for the rest of the evening.

But Monday night proved to be an overwhelming exception. There's absolutely no way of estimating the calls received, but there had to be 2,000 to 3,000 calls coming in within a two-hour period.

Our plans were to begin receiving phone calls at 10 p.m. But by that time the millage results weren't in yet, and we were waiting 'til the last moment in hopes that complete results could be given the first caller.

At 10 p.m. when we rushed into our local office, the phone already was alive with five callers and God knows how many were receiving busy signals. A third staffer was present, and so for about the first half hour, there were three persons attempting to keep up with the calls—but there was no hope.

For the first couple hours, the only results we could report were for the Plymouth Board of Education and the Schoolcraft millage. Our carefully laid plan, now shot to pieces, was for Elinor Graham to handle the calls and I would pick up the results and come in to assist her. Based on past elections, results were expected by 10 p.m.

So there were both of us, answering the phone without let up, except for about three moments of some 10-20 seconds each from 10 p.m. to midnight. What went awry was that there was no one to be at the board office to pick up the results. So every 15-20 minutes I would let the calls pile up and phone the board office hoping to get the results of the absentee ballot count. Each time I called, however, the count wasn't completed and there were that many callers backed up waiting for results.

ABOUT THIS TIME we were rescued by two young ladies who walked in the front door to get the vote results. They had been trying unsuccessfully to get through on the phone and decided to walk up to our office and get the news.

I was sitting at the front desk and flashed a quick smile towards them while busily answering calls. They stood quietly at the counter—I handed them a tally sheet to read while answering more calls—they watched the confusion and sensed the hopelessness prevailing. The ladies kindly volunteered to help us man the

phones, which allowed me time to run over to the board office and find out what was happening. By this time, it was apparent this election was not typical and something was happening at the absentee ballot board. After returning with news of the tie votes, the four of us continued to handle calls. They left quietly, and Ellie and I finished handling the calls which were diminishing in volume after midnight.

After catching our breath, we discovered that neither one of us knew our volunteers. We each assumed they were friends of the other. To this day, we don't know their identity but are certainly thankful for their intervention. I'm also sure our readers appreciate the volunteer efforts of these two readers who gave their time late Monday night to tell others what had happened to the millage question.

The calls didn't stop Monday night. There were more calls throughout the day Tuesday and on Wednesday. In fact, we received a couple calls Thursday morning for election results. This unusual volume of calls indicates an unprecedented high degree of interest among residents in the June 14 election. And that fares well for the commonwealth.

Busting pushers a 7-day job

A \$125,000 heroin buy in Arizona. A \$60,000 heroin buy in Texas and a \$30,000 buy in California.

That's the score registered by a group of Westland-based police officers, who in the past four months have confiscated 14 pounds of pure heroin valued at \$35 million, all of it destined for the Detroit metropolitan area.

Responsible for these raids are members of the Wayne County Sheriff Metropolitan Narcotic Squad (Metro Squad) whose headquarters are at the sheriff's road patrol station, 3100 Henry Ruff.

The 21 undercover officers, including two women, are under the command of Lt. Richard L. Stover, a 12-year veteran with the sheriff department.

The Metro Squad is made up of volunteers from the sheriff department along with two Detroit officers from the Detroit Central Narcotics Bureau.

In addition to the agents, the Metro Squad includes a chemistry laboratory where confiscated drugs are analyzed.

ALTHOUGH THE squad concentrates its efforts in the Wayne County area, duties often lead them to other states. The \$35 million bust was made recently in three states—McAllen, Texas, Phoenix, Ariz., and San Francisco, Calif.

In the Texas raid, agents seized 60 pounds of pure heroin and aided in closing three illegal drug laboratories.

One of the raids resulted in the discovery of a group who were offering 1975 Mark IV automobiles, stolen from Ford Motor Co., for \$3,500 each. This case has been turned over to the Michigan State Police, according to Lt. Stover.

"Most of our activity is behind the scenes, getting leads and later working with other agencies," the lieutenant said.

A Metro Squad agent usually works alone, invading suspected dope pads and attempting to gain the confidence of a suspected dope peddler.

"The officer will not carry a gun or wear a badge, will have nothing on his person to give away the fact he is a police officer," said Stover.

A NARCOTICS officer usually stays with the squad on the average of two years.

"When we feel he or she has had too much exposure, he is transferred to another division," the lieutenant explained.

An eventual raid may start somewhere in Wayne County but lead to another state where the "higher ups" in a dope ring are located.

"We often work with police agencies from other cities along with agents from the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration," explained Stover.

Last November Metro Squad agents, in cooperation with the Wayne County Organized Crime Task Force, a regional officer of the San Francisco Drug Enforcement Administration and other police agencies, made a hand-to-hand purchase of one pound of heroin and three ounces of cocaine, the largest hand-to-hand narcotic purchase in the history of that area. Street value placed on the purchased drugs was about \$1 million.

It was undercover officers of the Metro Squad who made the initial contact in Detroit and who carried out the undercover buy in California.

Money for the purchase of these narcotics, \$17,000, was supplied by the California officer of the Drug Enforcement Administration with additional money supplied by the Wayne County Organized Crime Task Force and the Detroit Police Department Central Narcotic Bureau.

"We get great cooperation from police agencies in other states," the lieutenant said.

"IN THE CASE of the \$125,000 buy in Phoenix, local agencies there financed our agents' plane fare and lodging while there."

Stover said these raids have cut off some of the major dope dealers in the Detroit area. All of the recent arrests were of persons who are major suppliers in Wayne County.

"Approximately 90 per cent of the heroin brought into the Detroit area comes from Mexico."

"There is a Mexican faction there that works somewhat like the Mafia—the whole operation is controlled by families," said Stover.

His squad is allotted \$20,000 a year from Wayne County for drug buys.

"This is just a drop in the bucket in many instances. Having enough money to operate is the key to the success of halting the drug traffic."

"Bureaucratic control of finances is what is hurting the fight against narcotics," he added.

Commissioner Plymouth bound

Area race tracks will breathe a sigh of relief when the state racing commission moves into its new offices tomorrow.

Instead of having to drive to the State Fairgrounds in Detroit to conduct business, owners, trainers, jockeys and riders will be making the trip to downtown Plymouth instead.

The geographical closeness of Plymouth to the major tracks was the prime reason for the move, explains Fidel Faure, state racing commissioner. "Our new office will be in the center of horse racing activity in Northville, Livonia, and Jackson and offers a great deal more convenience for the commission itself and those who must come to our office for licenses and hearings."

The office at 485 S. Main, right next to the Observer & Eccentric office in Plymouth, is four miles from Northville Downs, eight miles from the Detroit Race Course in Livonia, and about 25-30 miles closer for the Jackson Raceway.

THE STATE headquarters for the racing commission was located at the Michigan State Fairgrounds years ago when the DRC was located there.

In the mid 1950s the DRC relocated to Livonia, but for the past two decades the commission's office remained at the fairgrounds, Eight Mile east of Woodward. The closest track to the fairgrounds is Hazel Park, but the driving distance was considerable for track personnel at DRC, Northville Downs or Jackson Raceway.

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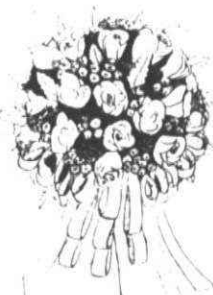
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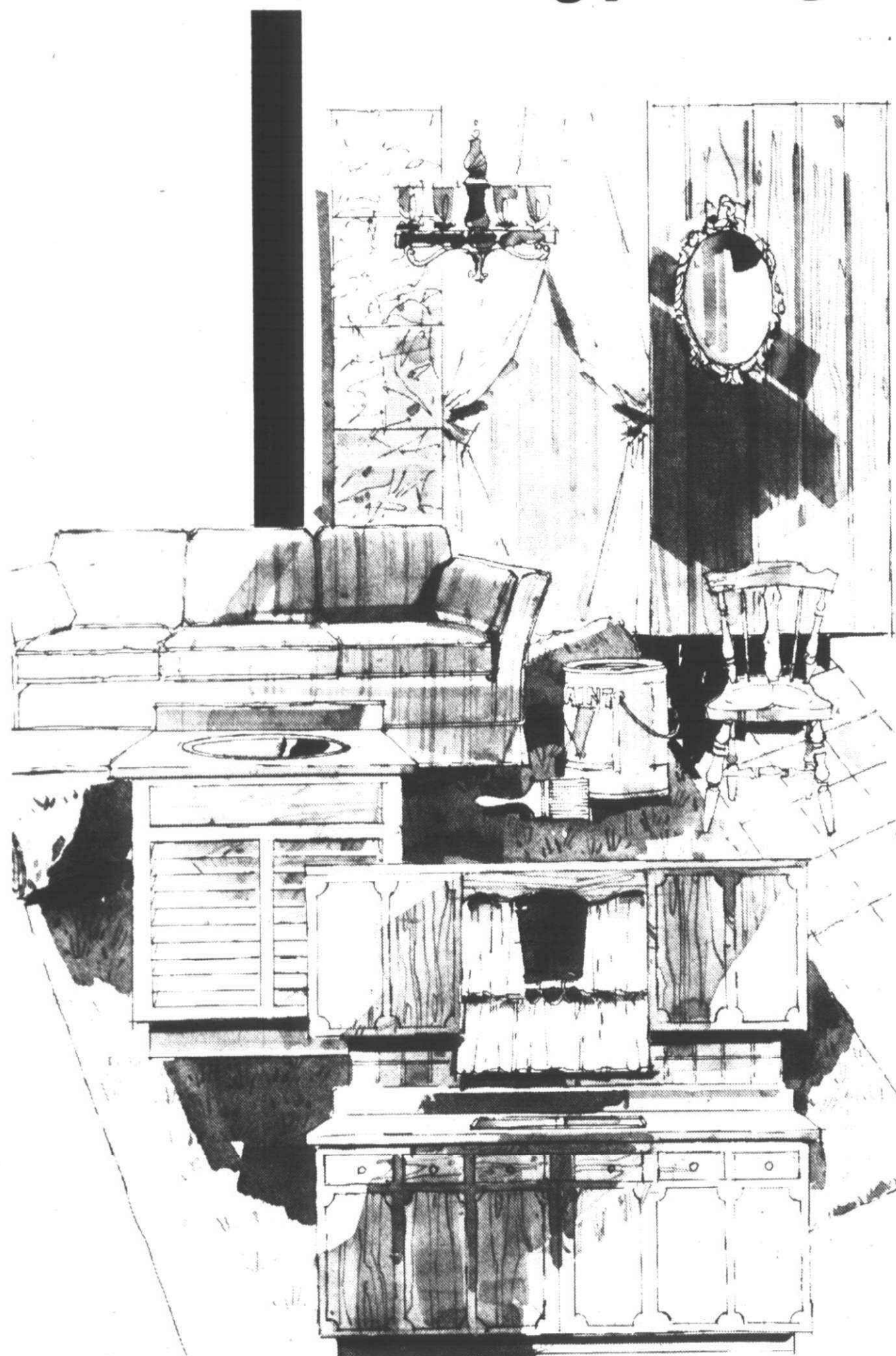
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Teddy whistle-stopped in Plymouth in 1913

The most exciting place in Plymouth in the early 1930s, before railroads felt the impact of the automobile, was the depot at train time.

Eighteen passenger trains pulled in and out of the village every 24 hours. Passengers arriving from Detroit and Grand Rapids were driven home by friends in horse and buggy, or rode in Harry Robinson's horse-drawn "bus."

Those standing on the platform were treated to tantalizing aromas from the kitchens of the two restaurants close to the depot. Those who had a desire for something more spirited than sarsaparilla repaired to the nearby Hotel Victor (now the Nelson).

THE DEPOT WAS alive with activity. Aside from those waiting for trains, those seeing friends off, or those awaiting arriv-



als, numerous station employees bustled about doing their work.

In 1911, the depot employed two clerks, two telegraphers (the telephone came late on the railroads), a baggage man, and the man who oversaw all of their activities—the station agent.

The station agent in 1911 was a new man—Frank W. Hamill—a recent in Plymouth (then known for its air rifles). He came here from Rose City, Mich., (then known for its ice houses) with a four-year stopover at Wixom. As station agent, Hamill was in charge of ticket sales, the processing of bills of lading, and the requisitioning of freight cars. He also was paymaster for the line's local train crews and the Plymouth round house work-force.

BY 1916, more than 100 residents, all working in Plymouth, were on the Pere Marquette payroll, making the railroad the community's largest employer (with the possible exception of Daisy). The payroll handled by Frank Hamill in 1916 was \$7,763 a month.

Hamill, who was born in Otisville near Flint in 1876, started railroad work at Rose Center in 1900. In 1907 he transferred to Wixom, where he was station agent for two railroads—the Grand Trunk and the Pere Marquette. When he arrived in Plymouth in 1911, he was accompanied by his wife, Christine Davidson, a daughter, Alta, and a son, Herald. A second daughter, Doris, was born here.

The Hamill family first lived at 139 E. Pearl Street; then in a house at 555 Starkweather, for which Herald and his father made the cement bricks. They mixed the mortar by hand, and made use of a brick machine which turned out three bricks at a time. It was two years before they had enough bricks. "The house is still there and in good shape," says Herald.

Herald Hamill was in the sixth grade when the family moved to Plymouth. He recalls the excitement at the railroad station in 1913 on the day Theodore Roosevelt visited Plymouth.

THE FORMER president arrived here by train on a whistle-stop tour promoting his Progressive ("Bull Moose") candidacy for re-election in the 1913 presidential race.

Local schools were let out. The children watched and listened as the energetic "Teddy" spoke from the platform of his observation car. Flashing his famous grin, and bristling his equally famous mustache, he lashed out at the Republican nominee, the incumbent William Howard Taft, and at the Democratic contender, Woodrow Wilson who won the election.

The local freight dock was never idle when Herald Hamill was a boy. Plymouth was a transfer point for freight arriving here from four points of the compass. Herald worked at the dock from 1915 to 1918 during the summer, when he was on vacation from "the university" (to old grads the University of Michigan requires no further designation). He recalls the massive Clydesdale which hauled to the freight station the heavy wagon full of air rifles and BBs from Daisy's plant on Union Street.

Lading shipped from Plymouth in 1911 also included the output of the Hamilton and the Markham factories. Hamilton made .22 calibre rifles and Markham, who sold out in 1912, began the air rifle industry in Plymouth. From 1914 to 1916, freight shipments from Plymouth also included automobiles made at the Alter Motor Car Company's plant on Farmer Street, near Karmada.

FRANK HAMILL retired as Plymouth Station Agent in 1943 after 33 years at the local depot.

To the time of his death at age 73 in 1964, he lamented the shifting of business from the railroads to other forms of transportation. His son, Herald, used to tell him it was the railroad's own fault—that they had done nothing to keep up with the times. "I went to Detroit by train in 1919," recalls Herald, "and the coaches were still the same dirty old cars the line had used in 1900."

Herald, who graduated from Plymouth High School in 1916, the year the building burned, received his degree in civil engineering from U-M in 1920. He became interested in civil engineering after reading

a magazine article about a bridge being built across the Great Salt Lake. After working in various parts of Michigan, he established his own business here in 1926.

Ironically, one of Hamill's first jobs in Plymouth made travel easier for the automobile. He worked with Village Manager Sidney Strong, inspecting the work done on the extensive paving program conducted in the village in 1929. A short time later, Hamill was hired to plan the city sewer and water systems. In the 1940s in 1956, he began a long-time relationship with Plymouth Township, for which he has supervised the installation of about 82 miles of water main.

Herald Hamill was municipal judge in Plymouth for one year in the 1930s. He served three terms on the Plymouth School Board (1930-39). He was a Plymouth Township Trustee (1956-58). Today, age 75, Hamill is still active in civil engineering as a member of the firm of Brender-Hamill & Associates located in Plymouth Township.

"The railroads went down hill," he recently told me, "because neither they nor the bankers, who were unwilling to risk capital for improvements, realized until too late the extent to which autos, trucks, buses and planes were taking business from them."

The Plymouth Stu Rockafellow Amateur Radio Society (SRARS) will hold its annual field day starting 2 p.m. Saturday at the Plymouth Township Recreation Field, Ann Arbor Trail and McClumpha.

The field day is an annual highlight for SRARS (W8NJK) members who set up portable generators and portable radio units outdoors for a 24-hour drill.

The equipment is maintained by teams of amateur radio operators to demonstrate their ability to serve the public in times of disaster. The public is welcome to stop by between 2 p.m. June 26 and 2 p.m. June 27 to see what amateur radio is all about.

The club, now in its 16th year, meets at 8 p.m. on the third Tuesday of each month—except for July and August when meetings aren't held—in the Plymouth

Community Credit Union. Persons interested in joining the club may contact Sean T. O'Callaghan, 42037 Brentwood, Plymouth Township.

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New boom towns lure suburbanites

The line between city dwellers and suburbanites has always been carefully drawn. But is there really a basic difference between the two? Why do people choose to live where they do?

In a two-part article, the Observer & Eccentric will explore these questions. Part one will look at the ever-increasing ring of outward-bound migration. Part two will examine the average suburbanite versus the city resident to see if there really is a wide gap between their wants and needs.

Some 15 years ago, the dream of many Detroiters was to turn in the keys to their city home and move into a bright, shiny new three-bedroom colonial in the suburbs.

They flocked in droves away from big city crime and disintegration to the new meccas of Birmingham, Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City and Southfield, where life was good and the only worry seemed to be fighting crabgrass on the lawn.

Today the flight continues, but this time suburbanites are trading in their slightly used colonials for even shinier new homes in the metropolitan area's latest boom towns.

And whether that community is called Troy, Farmington, Canton or West Bloomfield, it's bound to be just a little farther away from the hustle and bustle of the city.

DETROIT IS still the hardest hit by the population migration. In fact, the city's population has dropped to an estimated 1,334,100, a decline of 11.9 per cent from the 1970 official census figure of 1,514,063.

But the suburbs that grew fat from Detroit drop-outs are having to tighten their own belts. Birmingham, once one of the most desirable communities in the city-to-suburb shuffle, has experienced a 5.6 per cent decline in population, according to U.S. government estimates. Plymouth experienced a similar decline, and the communities of Garden City, Livonia, Redford Township, Westland and Southfield have all seen their phenomenal growth rate start to decline.

On the other hand, communities like Canton Township, which has almost tripled its official 1970 population of 11,026, and Troy, up almost 26 per cent, are among the most frequent stops for moving vans.

They are joined by communities like Farmington, with a growth rate of almost 42 per cent since 1970; Novi, whose population has risen almost 57 per cent during a four-year period; and West Bloomfield Township, which has grown about 10 per cent.

Thus, as many older suburbs take on a slight tinge of obsolescence, they are exchanged for the new "improved" environment offered by towns that sprang up where cows used to graze only a few years ago.

WHAT COMPELS these families to pack up every few years, forever searching for a new and better way of life?

Michael Glusac, executive director of SEMCOG, says, "When there are no problems in a community, such as crime or lack of facilities, people must have other reasons for leaving." Those motives might include wanting more space, a better quality of education and better tax rates, he says.

Glusac adds, "People tend to follow industries. For example, when the Ford paint plant moved from Highland Park to Utica, it definitely contributed to the development of that area."

"There is a tendency on the part of younger people to go to new structures."

"We're a very mobile society now," he says.

"As people began to be able to afford a personal vehicle, there was no longer any need to live in concentrated clusters."

According to Glusac, the rising cost of transportation is not yet a big enough factor to prevent dispersal.

The current trend of getting back to nature could also have some impact on migration. "The romance of the city is not what it used to be," Glusac says.

"It could be a desire for a more tranquil life."

FRANCIS BENNETT, director of planning for Wayne County's planning commission, attributed some of the moving mania to growing affluence. "Many people making this move are in an income class that considers it upward mobility to make the move," he said.

"They want all the gadgets a new house or apartment has to offer," Bennett added. Oakland County Planning Commission's

associate economist Jeff Kaczmarek agreed. "The Detroit region is well off in personal income, even if the region itself is not doing so well," he said.

"Those who are working are paid well."

According to Kaczmarek, the area around Troy is considered a desirable place to live, even though homes seldom sell for less than \$55,000. "Oakland is a rich county," he said.

BOTH COUNTY planning commissions are concerned about the growth of one community at the expense of another.

"This causes inequity in terms of economic opportunity and a competitive situation between communities results," Kaczmarek said.

Bennett said, "The commission has recommended that the region would be better served if the distribution of activities like employment, recreation and business is intermingled."

"The region should contain substantial areas of openness interspersed among nodes of development," he added.

ONE COMMUNITY that has these goals in mind is Canton Township. Mike Manore, who helped develop a master plan for the township's development, says, "Our plan is the most unique one in the state."

"It attempts to save agricultural land and promote industrial development only on the east side of the township," he says.

According to Manore, although Canton's rapid growth rate is mainly due to residential housing, much industrial development is anticipated.

Bennett cautioned, "It is possible that some areas that still have open space are not going to win in the competition for industrial development." He said this is not necessarily bad. "There are some cases where industry can't be taxed enough to pay for the financial impact it has on a community."

EVEN AS the new communities face the problems of a rapidly growing population, the older suburbs must learn how to deal with a declining one. One of the biggest problems for these suburbs is shrinking school enrollments.

Rex Wood of Oakland Schools said statistics have shown that area school districts along the Woodward corridor in Oakland County are losing school population while other districts are growing.

"The closing of schools has become a traumatic situation for the central district," Wood said.

"New communities are hiring teachers on a lower pay scale, which helps alleviate financial strain," he added.

In the older districts, teachers are hitting the top step (in salary and seniority) but the schools are losing enrollment. Because the master contract doesn't permit the schools to cut out the staff at a higher

level, they must cut down on the newer staff, which is already receiving lower wages."

According to Wood, neighborhoods generally resist the closing of school buildings in their locale because they perceive it as a form of erosion.

"The growing districts are going to have to find or build facilities for students that show up after labor day, while older districts must find ways to avoid closing down schools," he said.

The paradox of one community struggling to accommodate an overwhelming influx of people while its next-door neighbor copes with declining population may not be as unjust as it seems.

Unlimited growth often creates as many problems as it solves, and a town with a population that is leveling off may find a return of the smaller city lifestyle that made it popular in the first place.

And, as Kaczmarek comments, "You could say these communities got their years ago."

BUT WHAT ABOUT the city? Is it doomed to extinction? SEMCOG's Glusac doesn't think so. "The cost of new homes is becoming prohibitive, and condominiums are growing more popular," he said.

"I do believe there will always be a need for cities," Glusac added. "They will continue to be centers for service, banking, and business."

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County studies options for new jail

Wayne County officials still don't know whether they will be able to proceed with plans for the recently voter-approved county jail.

County engineers are studying whether the county will have to seek variances from City of Detroit and state building codes in order to meet the recommendations of a three-judge Wayne County Circuit Court panel, County Commissioner Richard Manning said Tuesday.

The panel, in an unusual advisory opinion issued two weeks ago, said that schematic plans for a new jail on the old Recorders Court site in downtown Detroit contain four sections which do not meet Detroit's building requirements. If the jail were built following these preliminary plans, it would be unlawfully constructed, the judges said.

If the county does decide to seek the variances but fails, alternate plans, including the twice-turned down renovation of a J.L. Hudson warehouse, will be considered.

ALSO COMMANDING commissioners' attention is a petition from the original plaintiffs in the jail overcrowding case demanding reconsideration of the warehouse plan.

The plaintiffs—five jail inmates and their attorneys—five years ago sued the county for inhumane conditions at the present county jail; the new jail was the court's order in that case.

The inmates have also filed a motion with the court, contending that the new jail plans are illegally drawn.

They want the court to rule in favor of the warehouse renovation which would have air-conditioned cells and a guaranteed cost of \$20 million to the county. In addition, warehouse spokesmen have said that 100 prisoners could be housed within eight months of the beginning of construction. Under both plans, about 400 prisoners would be housed.

"Eventually, I suspect, what will happen is that the court will have to make a decision based on expert testimony," Manning (D-Redford Township) said.

IF VARIANCES aren't granted and revisions must be made in the plans drawn by Giffels/Sims/Shorter, it could send costs soaring.

Financing of the \$20.6 million jail was accomplished May 18 when voters approved a half-mill tax increase for a five-year period. If the tax had been defeated, commissioners were legally bound to build the jail anyway and would have had to float bonds which would have ultimately cost taxpayers more.

"IF THE VARIANCES don't come through, if we're faced with erecting a \$30 million building instead of the \$20.6 million we now plan, we will have to look at the alternatives, including the warehouse proposal," said Board Chairman John Barr (D-Dearborn Heights).

"Our people believe the city building code was not intended to apply to jails in the first place," said Barr. "The corrections code provides for the granting of variances for sufficient reason."

Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia) hopes the board will obtain the necessary variances, because prolonging the jail issue "only creates more roadblocks," she said.

"We are not building a hotel or house. We are building a detention facility, where most inmates stay a maximum of 90 days," said Mrs. Dumas.

"If we were building a prison where some people spend most of their lives, then yes, cell size should follow residential regulations."

Mrs. Dumas said the most important consideration is that a jail be built immediately.

Milliken pleads for regional cease-fire

Gov. William Milliken has called for a truce in the war between cities and suburbs.

He said suburbs are beginning to share cities' problems and "they had better begin sharing the solutions."

Solutions will come with a "new consciousness," Milliken said while admitting, "this is not a popular position, and it is not a politically safe position."

Milliken said he is committed to restoring Detroit. It is a measure of his commitment, he said, that he has worked out a \$28 million state assistance plan to the city. He added that the aid is contingent on Detroit taking steps of its own, such as \$46 million in spending reductions and the imposition of a three-mill garbage tax on its residents.

"I AM asking you," he said to delegates to the Michigan District Exchange Clubs state convention, "to help me bring about a new consciousness that will foster an understanding of the commonality of interest between city and suburb in this state."

"I believe that Detroit is a testing ground for the values that have made this country as good as it is today. It is a testing ground for our fight to turn around the negative trend of our entire civilization."

"In the long run, however, the only hope for that city is this new consciousness, because the entire Detroit metropolitan area and its surrounding region must attack common problems together."

"ONE OF THE BEST hopes for that region, I believe, is the tax-sharing concept. Under this plan, neighboring units of government in southeastern Michigan would share future growth in the nonresidential property tax base. No local government would lose any of its current tax base or any of its powers or responsibilities."

"The reaction to this plan in some quarters of the region is an example of how far we have to go. I am referring to those who say: 'We will share nothing.'"

"But those surrounding cities and towns already are beginning to share Detroit's crime problems and drug problems and land-use problems and empty office-space problems and basic services problems and school problems . . . the list is very long. They had better begin sharing the solutions."

"IT DOESN'T matter if you live in a resort town, or in a rural area, or in a suburb adjacent to an urban area—there simply is no escaping the wrenching financial or social problems that are now tearing apart our older, central cities."

"These problems are greatly aggravated by what seems to me to be a total lack of cooperation between too many of our cities and their surrounding suburbs."

"These traditional city-suburban hostilities must end. There must be a truce in the war, or it will consume not only our cities, but our suburbs as well . . ."

"THE PEOPLE who have fled the cities must remember that our cities have always been the great centers of our economic and cultural life."

"The private institutions must remember that they have an obligation to assist in the effort to reclaim those cities that have given them so much."

"And the institutions of government must concentrate their full resources upon the effort to reverse the decline of the cities."

"IT SEEMS strange to me that in an era when preservation of our resources is of such great concern that so many people

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A Redford Township mother still awaits word from the Detroit Police Department about the Detroit police officer accused of killing her son. 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"I object to all outside influences, whether they come from the union, community groups or the warehouse firm," she said.

"We should now be thinking in terms of using the money that taxpayers allocated to build a detention facility."

COMMISSIONER ROYCE E. Smith (D-Belleville) still is not sold on the idea of a renovated warehouse jail facility.

"The only advantage the warehouse has is its immediate occupancy," said Smith. "But I am only in favor of spending extra money to build a jail in compliance with regulations, if extra expenses do not exceed \$1 million."

MANNING SAID said he is personally obligated to favor the plan which provides the most space for the least amount of money.



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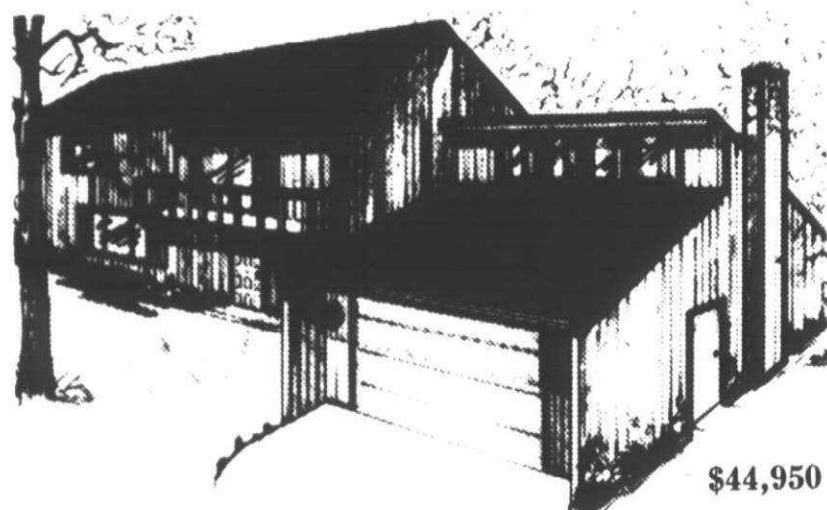
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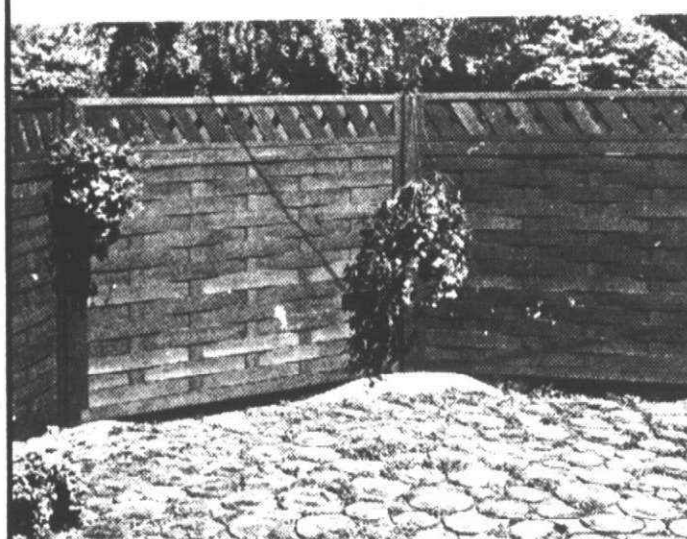
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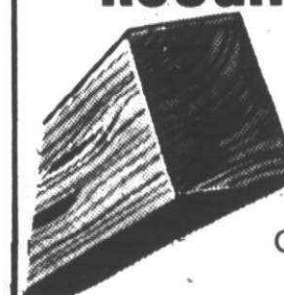
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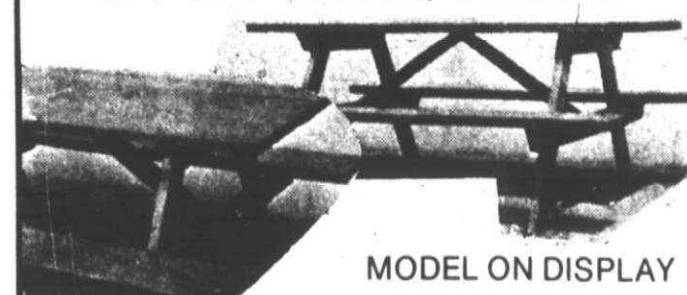
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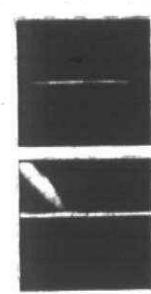
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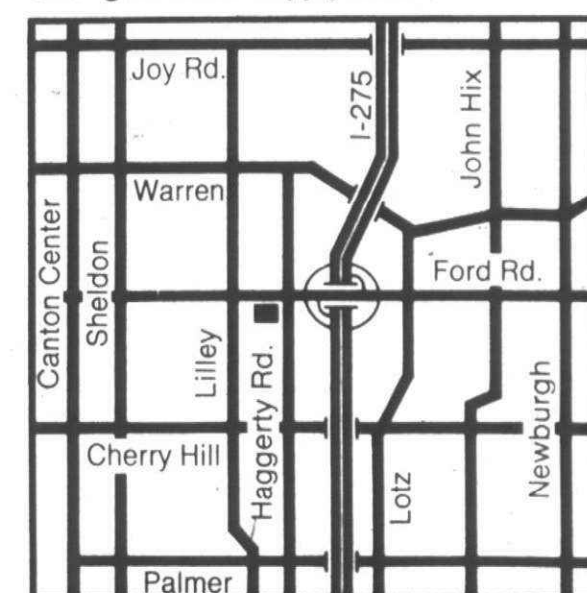
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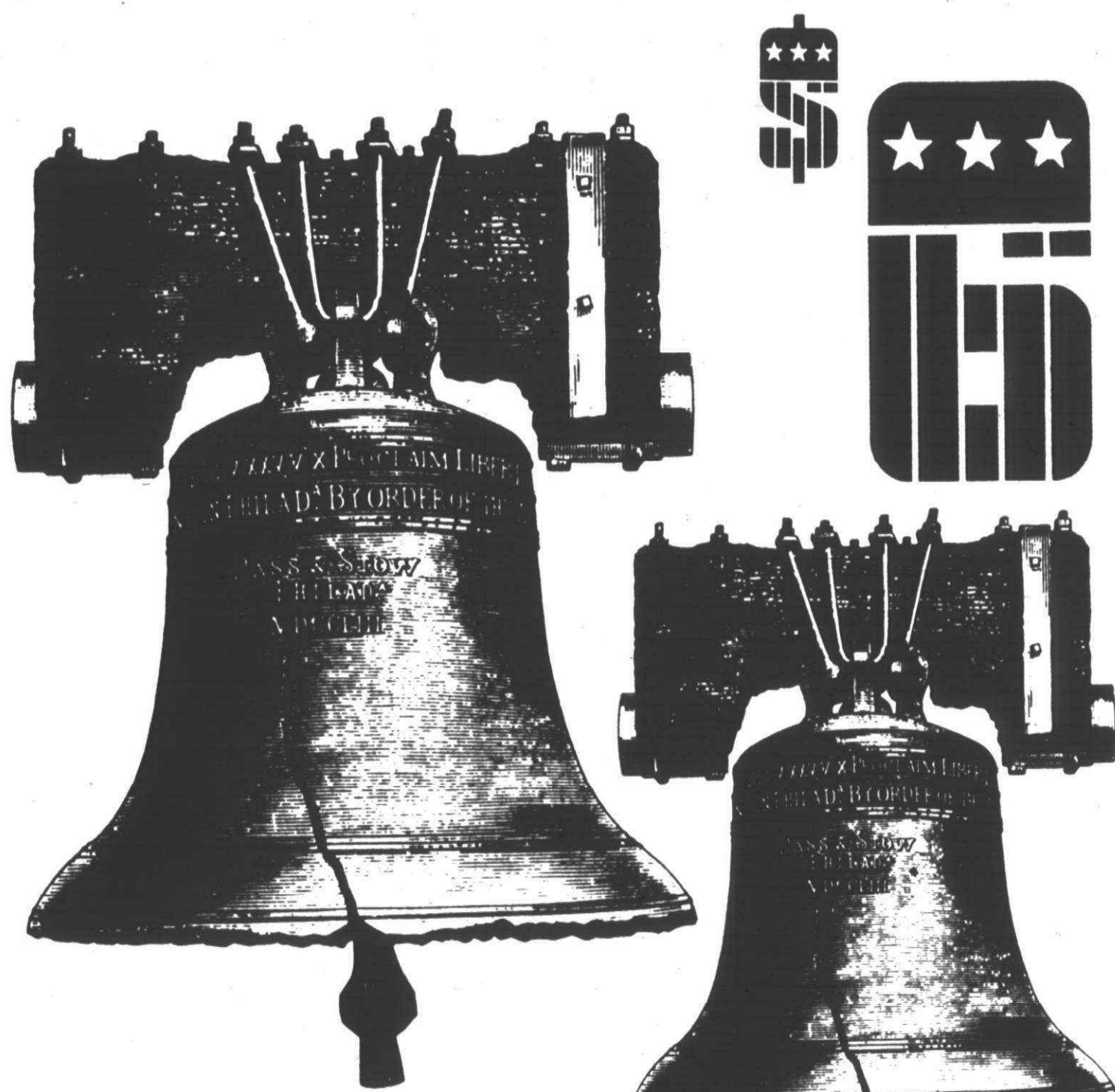

FINNAN HADDIE

(a recipe from Scotland)
1 pound of fresh finnan haddie (smoked haddock)
2 1/4 cups milk or more, if needed
4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill, or one tablespoon dried dill
Sprigs of dill or parsley

1) Place the finnan haddie in a saucepan and cover with milk. Bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 20 to 25 minutes. Drain and reserve two cups of the milk. Tear the fish into bite-size pieces and reserve, stirring with a wire whisk. When the mixture is well blended, add the reserved milk, stirring vigorously with a whisk. When the sauce is thickened and smooth, add the finnan haddie. Stir in the chopped dill and serve garnished with sprigs of dill or parsley.

2) Heat the butter and blend in the flour. Yield: Four servings.

Here are two of my favorite recipes using dill:

AUNT ANNIE'S BREAD

1 package yeast
1/4 cup warm water

1 cup cottage cheese, warmed
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon dill seed
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon soda
1 unbeaten egg
2 1/2 cups sifted flour

Dissolve the yeast in 1/4 cup warm water. Add the warm cottage cheese. Add other ingredients, and use enough flour to make a stiff dough. Beat well. Butter top and set in warm place to rise. When double in bulk—about an hour—beat down with a spoon and place in well-buttered loaf pan. Butter top and bake in 325 degree oven for 25 minutes. Increase heat to 350 degrees and bake until well browned—15 to 20 minutes. Cool on rack. Makes one good-sized loaf.

This bread freezes very well, and you can make it ahead of time for a special occasion. It is an unusually nutritious bread with all that cottage cheese. It makes an unforgettable Sunday morning toast with wild plum or grapefruit marmalade.

Kids like this

The American Dairy Association recommends adding the liquid from canned red or green cherries to make a milk drink the kids will love. Add a scoop of ice cream and one of the bright cherries on top.

Add cream

Next time you make a cream soup, use part cream along with the milk called for, suggests the American Dairy Association. Heat gently and top with fresh chopped parsley or chives.

UM lowers tuition for part-time students

While most other state college students are faced with tuition hikes for the upcoming fall semester, fees for part-time University of Michigan undergraduates on the Ann Arbor campus will be lowered.

The UM regents approved the tuition reduction June 18, following a recommendation by the university committee on fees.

Frank Rhodes, vice-president for academic affairs, said the committee had been instructed to develop a fee model which would lower tuition for part-time students without reducing the University's overall fee income or credit-hour elections.

While existing fees for full-time undergraduates remain the same, Rhodes said possible changes in graduate and professional-graduate students are being investigated.

Under the new 1976-77 fee schedule, persons taking fewer than 12 credit hours per term will be charged less than presently. However, students taking more than 18 credit hours per term will pay more than at present.

Rhodes said the fee-change was initiated by a student-faculty-administration committee appointed by university President Robben W. Fleming in September 1973 to "review both the present university fee

structure and the philosophy upon which it may be based."

Rhodes noted that while the committee's report "drew generally favorable responses, the recommendation which probably drew the greatest and most universal support was the one which proposed a change in the fee structure to ease the financial burden imposed on part-time students."

Under the new tuition schedule, Michigan residents with fewer than 55 total credit hours will pay \$55 for the first credit hour, rather than \$92 under the present fee model. Fees will be similarly reduced through 11 credit hours.

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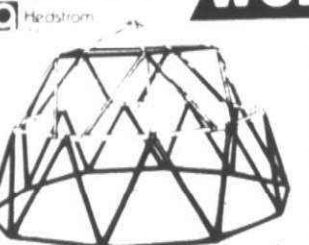

County is correct in discussing plan equity

Wayne County agencies are often the object of criticism by out-county interests and municipalities.

In recent months, the road commission for one has been attacked by Canton residents and officials.

On past occasions, the county planning commission has been the target of local wrath.

But for its resolution on the Canton master land use plan, the Wayne County Planning Commission is to be applauded.

Wayne County gave its approval to the plan, but only after introducing equity—the one little catchword that may serve to bring some peace to farmers in Canton—into the picture.

It is the one word that may allay the fears of Canton farmers who will be reimbursed to some degree for the years of high taxes they faced.

WHILE THERE has been discussion in the supervisor's office of reimbursing some farmers who may be hurt by the agricultural-industrial district on the west side of the township, little concrete has been said.

Money may be available here. Or there. Or somewhere else. Or maybe not at all.

"The township does not guarantee investments in land"—and on and on.

Unfortunately, the township missed a perfect opportunity see if the money was available at home.

The May 18 election could have been used to find out how dearly residents of Canton want to save open space and farmland.

Instead of asking if the people wanted a fully developed township or a half-developed township on the advisory ballot, the administration could have asked voters, "If you do want to save farmland, would you be willing to pay for it? And if so, how much?"

While voters said they wanted to live in a less populated, greener township, they didn't indicate how intense that desire was.

They weren't asked if they wanted to pay to play.

NOW THE COUNTY has said the burden shouldn't fall on a few farmers. It should fall equally on all who would like to enjoy the open space and farmland in the township.

Unfortunately, the county did little more than introduce equity into the picture. Commissioners worded the resolution so loosely that it was not clear who should be reimbursed, when and how much. No line was drawn between farmers, speculators and others who will be affected by the plan, but not by the agricultural industrial district.

For more than a few farmers, the time factor is very important. Timing is especially important to those who look at the farmland as their pension plan.

Equally unfortunate is the fact that the county's role in reviewing the plan is merely advisory.

The county is asked to make recommendations on master plans that come before it, but it makes suggestions only.

In other words, the county recommendations can be ignored.

We hope they're not. Let's have more than the vague possibility that the federal government will finance Canton's pioneering efforts in saving agricultural land.

Let's go back to the people in November and ask them if they are willing to foot the tab to keep farms in Canton Township.

Consumers pay the price for questionable regulation

Government Regulation IV

Consider how the Environmental Protection Agency has handled the catalytic converter, the device which it seized upon years ago as the most feasible means of reducing automotive exhausts to the levels prescribed by the Clean Air Act of 1970.

Back in 1971, Barron's National Business and Financial Weekly cited what happened in Japan when authorities ordered the lead content of gasoline cut in half.

Following the changeover in motor fuel, Tokyo suffered several "white smogs," caused by sulphuric acid mist, which led to thousands of cases of breathing difficulties, burning eyes and sore throats.

A year or so later, Herbert L. Misch, a Ford vice-president, said Ford had "noted the formation of some sulphuric acid particulates resulting from the use of catalysts (which) we reported to EPA . . . The phenomenon merits further study to determine whether the levels which would occur in the atmosphere are deleterious to health."

In the fall of 1973, the authoritative publication, Science, reported, "Tests made by the industry and EPA beginning in 1973 . . . showed that relatively large amounts of sulphuric acid . . . were coming from the tailpipes of catalyst-equipped cars."

Evidence pointing in the same ugly direction, i.e., that catalytic converters, while ridding automotive exhausts of some pollutants, cause dangerous emissions of sulphuric acid, continued to accumulate.

As a result, Russel E. Train, EPA adminis-

trator, last fall reluctantly announced he had granted auto makers their request for a one-year delay in imposing emission standards for 1977 model cars.

Not surprisingly, the move triggered a storm of protest from the hinterlands.

Upset at the response, EPA swiftly went back to the drawing board. A month later, believe it or not, the agency leaked a brand new study purporting to show that perhaps the threat of sulphuric acid was not so deadly after all.

Where the issue goes from here remains to be seen, but one thing is clear: The automobile industry, at official behest, already has spent several hundred millions of dollars working on a process which literally may do more harm than good.

The cost of the research and design of the catalytic converter is being passed on to the consumer in terms of higher car prices, which, in turn, has reduced the demand for cars and has caused unemployment in Detroit and Michigan.

Those who claim that we must accept some bad regulations with the good so that government can protect the consumer from the big bad businessman are blind to the fact that many regulations protect the businessman at the expense of the consumer.

The American people must realize this and ask congress to do something about it.

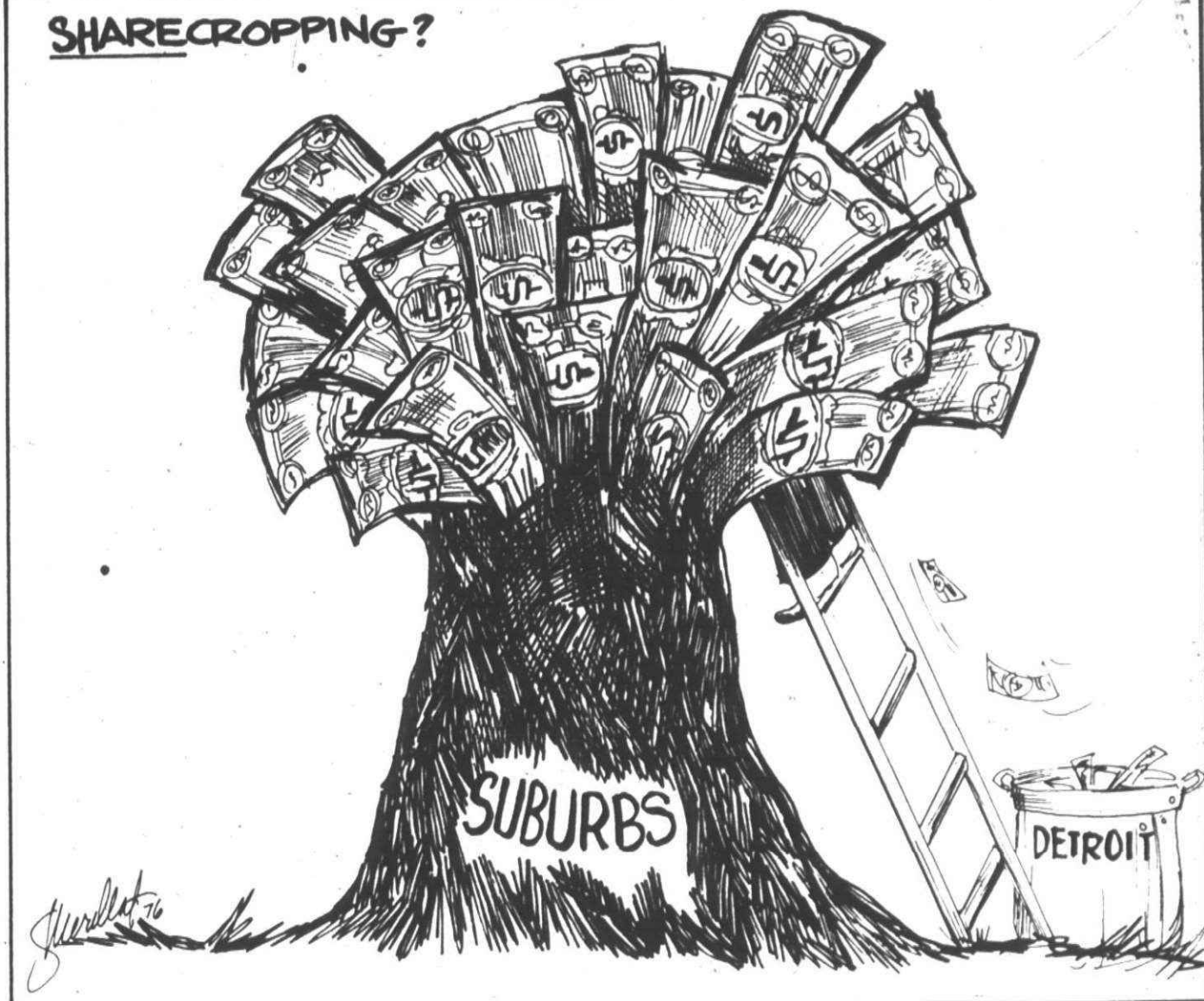


What is new about Gov. Milliken's remarks is that he is making them and that he is choosing to express them so bluntly. Bill Milliken, by personality and by political position, is not a blunt man. Obviously, he feels deeply enough about the city-suburban problem to speak out this time in the most forthright possible language.

What is also of interest is the timing of the governor's remarks.

Two months ago, Detroit Mayor Coleman Young journeyed out to the Unitarian Church in Birmingham to deliver an important speech on city-suburban problems. In it, he called for a "truce" in hostilities, while at the same time tak-

'Bail-out' benefits dubious

Some suburban legislators stoutly insist the \$27.9 million state appropriation to Detroit was a "bail-out" of the center city.

Gov. Milliken stoutly insists it isn't a bail-out. "Rather, it is a measure that will foster self-help, correct historic inequities that have put the city at a serious economic disadvantage and provide a fair measure of assistance for services and activities, now funded by the city, that are of regional and statewide benefit."

Who's right? Both, in part.

THE BILL provides \$5.5 million for the Detroit Public Library, \$700,000 for the Detroit Historical Museum and \$3.3 million for the Detroit Institute of Arts. That's \$9.5 million, one-third of the package.

Unquestionably, suburbanites and out-staters use the main library, the historical museum and the art institute. Unquestionably, suburbanites should pick up part of the tab.

But several things get overlooked:

First, there are private societies which help finance those facilities. Friends of the Detroit Library has reported 60 per cent of its members are suburbanites. One suspects even a larger percentage of the art institute's Founders Society is suburban.

Second, if you're a suburbanite, try to get a job at the art institute, the library or the historical museum. You can't. You have to be a resident of

Detroit, according to the city charter. Well, that's fair enough—as long as Detroit is paying the tab. But if the state is going to help what the governor calls facilities of a "regional and statewide benefit," then logically any Michigan resident should be eligible to apply for employment there.

Third, Detroit's city council makes the rules for the art institute, historical museum and library. That's still fair enough—as long as Detroit alone is paying the tab. But if all of us are going to help pay the tab, then perhaps a change in the government system is in order.

THE OTHER items in the bill are: \$8 million for Detroit General Hospital, \$529,000 for the health department, \$600,000 for the health labora-

tory and \$9.2 million for the Detroit bus system's pension program.

How much suburbanites benefit from those programs is open to question.

We note wryly that of the suburban legislators from Observer & Eccentric Newspapers' circulation area, all who hail from the Oakland County portion voted in favor of the bill, and all from northwestern Wayne County districts were just as strongly opposed.

If you didn't already know it, the bill that contained all that aid for Detroit also contained

\$800,000 for Pontiac Stadium's subsidy. Indeed, some suburban Wayne legislators who approved of helping Detroit voted against the package because of that stadium subsidy.

The legislative cat was neither black nor white, but a somber grey.

troit. Lower tax rates, greater space, less dependence on city services, greater affluence and the lure of five-acre lots all have a lot to do with the trend.

But there is no doubt that as the affluent families move from the Redford Townships and Garden Cities of the area, other population groups will move in. They may be white or they may be black, or they may be mixed. But they, too, are moving from somewhere else—downtown Detroit.

The point is that our suburbs are one of the few cases in which the domino theory works. If Detroit collapses, the residue of the collapse will infect the inner belt of suburbs around the city. If that suburb collapses, the residue will infect the next layer. And so forth.

In this kind of development, there is literally no place to hide.

That, in turn, means that the only sensible solution is to make sure the process does not continue. And that means that the problems which infect Detroit must be cured by help from this entire area. Or else we're all going to be in trouble.

Farmington Hills reserves do carry .357 guns, but only after they have the amount of hours of training and qualifications as the regular police force receive.

But then too, Farmington Hills reserves are not issued ticket books and enforcing traffic laws, and work in conjunction with experienced, full-time police officers.

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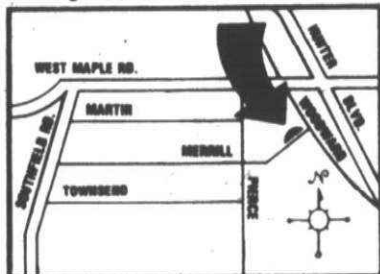


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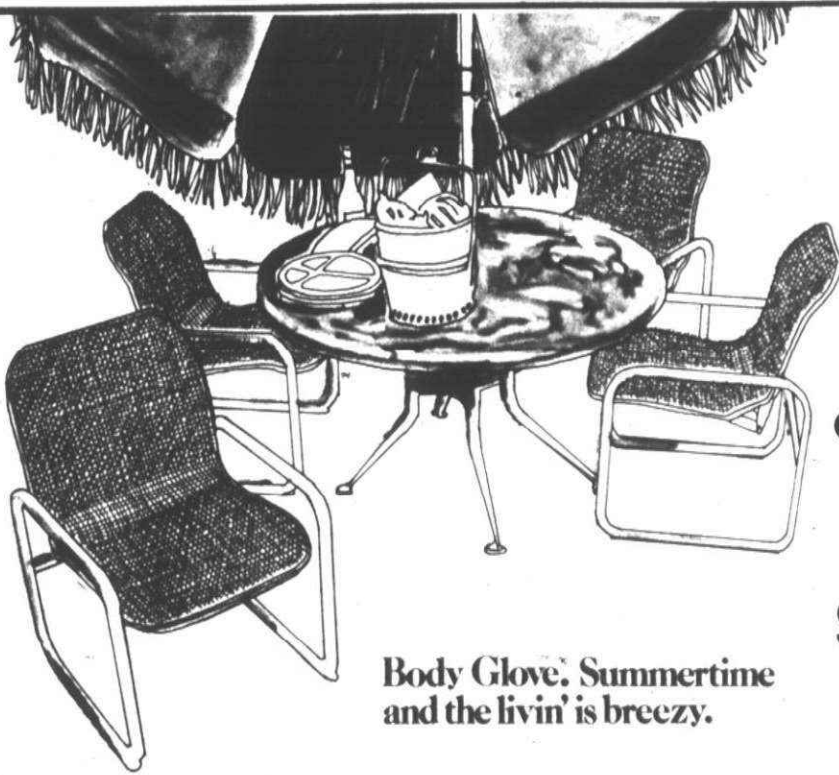


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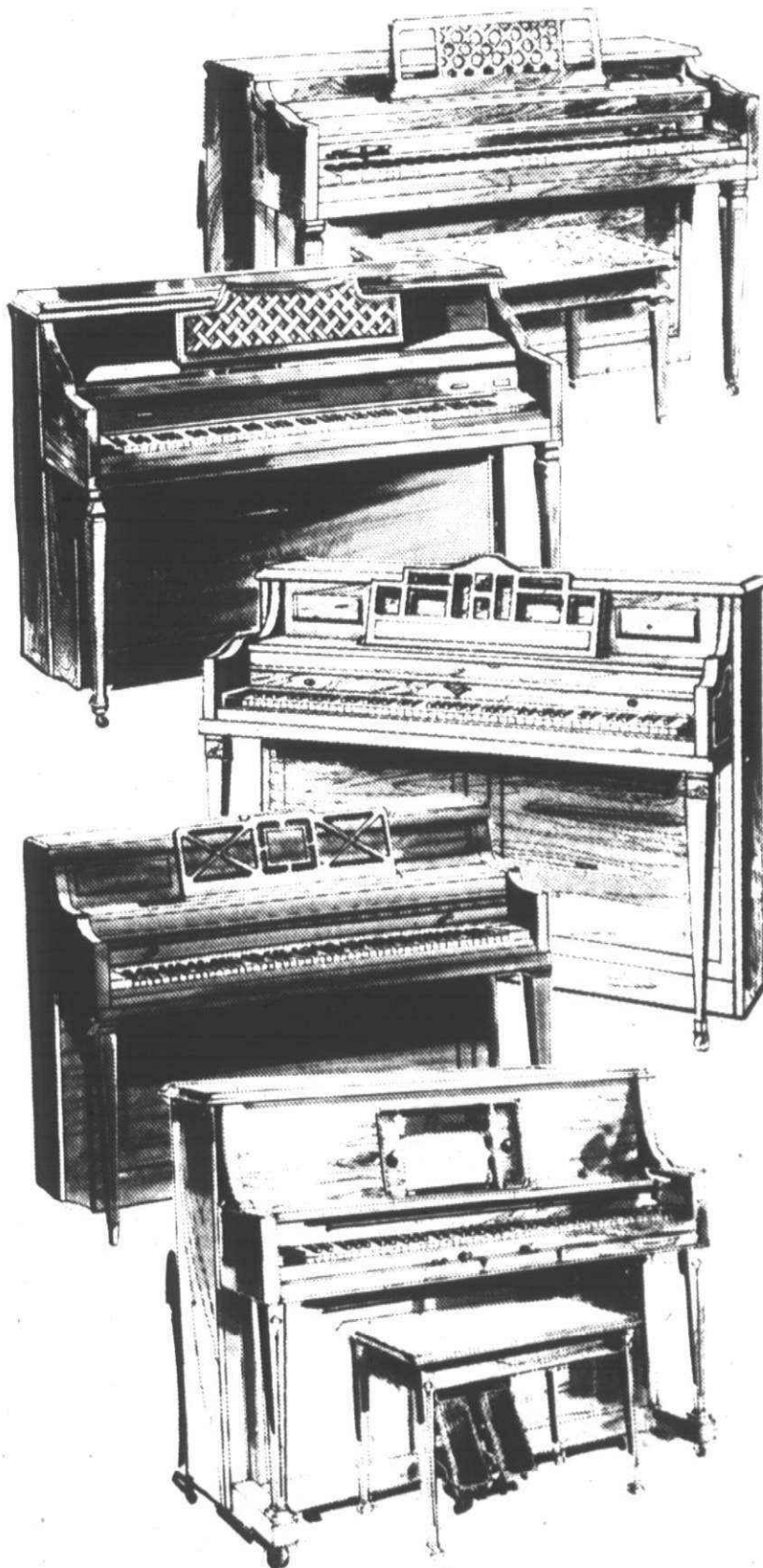
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Suburban gays rally for power

The film "Bob & Carol & Ted & Alice" may have shocked some people; if so, they should prepare for the latest suburban version of couples—Bob & Ted and Carol & Alice.

A newly formed group called the Association of Suburban People (ASP) is determined to change the laws that make sexual relations illegal between consenting adults of the same sex.

"I'm one of those middle-class, bourgeois persons who happens to be a homosexual," says one Southfield member of ASP. "I'm not interested in making a spectacle of myself but I want to be guaranteed my civil rights."

ASP says its primary function is to advance and defend the legal and civil rights of persons whose sexual orientations have subjected them to social and legal discrimination. Plans to achieve their goal include writing letters to legislators, inviting candidates to speak at their meetings, and raising funds to be able to support a lobbyist in Lansing.

THIS YEAR'S Gay Pride Week, now through June 26, will include the first formal suburban participation when ASP combines social and fund-raising efforts by sponsoring a dance to raise a bail bond fund for its membership.

Gay Liberation's recent history dates to 1969 when police raided a gay bar on Christopher Street in New York City and gays battled the police in the streets.

"The Stonewall gays had the guts to get out and fight in the streets when we were watching on our televisions," declares a Northville member. "Now it's time for us to continue the job."

Being a registered voter is the only membership requirement of the group. Businessmen, skilled tradesmen, teachers and other professionals constitute the membership as well as heterosexuals who are also interested in modernizing the Michigan Penal Code.

"I majored in history in college but was never aware that nearly 250,000 homosexuals were singled out and murdered in Nazi concentration camps during WW II," says a non-gay Farmington member.

"This was in my lifetime," adds a Birmingham member, "and who's to say if the laws don't change that it couldn't happen again?"

AT A RECENT ASP meeting, nationally-known gay activist Andy Barrer, a Lansing political consultant and former Southfield resident, urged the group to get involved in gay liberation.

"You can be denied a job as a potential felon," he says. "Anyone holding a license or certification can be affected because of a morals clause. The potential for arrest is there unless you change the laws."

Since male homosexual relations often involve sodomy, a felony in Michigan, the ASP chairperson as well as other members asked for anonymity.

The chairperson believes the recent arrests in Wayne County's Edward Hines Park have made suburban gays more conscious of their precarious status.

"The arrests gave some of us a heightened consciousness and sudden awareness of our lack of civil rights." Because the Detroit City Charter has a provision for non-discrimination for sexual discrimination, Detroit gays "don't always receive the same kind of hassle that suburban gays do."

According to Lt. Russell Gregory of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, 137 men and five juveniles were arrested in Hines Park from last October to the beginning of May this year.

All of those charged had approached undercover sheriff's officers for sexual favors and were arrested for "strictly accosting and soliciting," says Gregory, officer in charge of the parks. Accosting and soliciting is a misdemeanor under Michigan law, although prostitution was not involved in any of the arrests.

THE ASP chairperson charges that the sheriff's department needed to make a large number of arrests to continue funding of a division. Lt. Gregory denies this charge but agreed that gays in the parks were "fairly easy criminals to apprehend." Others arrested claim the undercover officers approached them initially.

Those arrested included doctors, lawyers, and "prominent figures," says Gregory. "Sixty per cent of them were upper class—professionals."

"By exposing them and keeping a record, they will then have a sexually-motivated crime sheet. At least we can identify them," maintains the burly 12-year law enforcement veteran.

Gregory, who admits to being old-fashioned when he refers to homosexuals as "queers and faggots," says he is not concerned about what gays do in their own homes but rather about their soliciting in public places.

Asked if he thought decriminalization of existing laws would make it easier for gays to meet each other in their own bars and clubs, Gregory said that it might and referred to the San Francisco area where gays have long been part of the community.

"I don't think Wayne County has that kind of atmosphere and I'd hate to be the politician that would sign that bill."

Some residents disagree, and one non-gay commented "I get tired of paying taxes that pay for these kinds of arrests when there is so much hard-core crime in the streets."

MICHIGAN GAYS believe they lost some ground when House Bill 4058 failed to include sexual orientation as a class protected against discrimination. According to Barrer, there is little pressure on legislative committee people to include gay rights in the civil rights bill.

ASP members are attempting to garner support for House Bill 5624, introduced by State Rep. Perry Bullard (D-Ann Arbor), of the 53rd district, that would in effect decriminalize most sexual relations between consenting adults.

Fourteen states have removed sodomy laws from the books but an ASP Dearborn member fears that Michigan could follow the Iowa example, which removed sodomy laws affecting heterosexual couples but retained the law affecting homosexuals.

Asked why suburban gays didn't join one of the already-established groups, one Southfield member responded: "Since most Detroit groups are religious or radically political in orientation, we felt there was a need for this kind of group—a group which wants to work within the system to change the laws."

ASP MEMBERS say it is society, and not them, who has the problem, referring to it as "homophobia," the extreme rage and fear reaction to homosexuals.

"Until attitudes are changed, until fears, hatreds, anxieties and misconceptions about gay people are overcome, I won't be able to do what I want in athletics," said ex-NFL player Dave Kopay in a recent issue of a national gay newspaper, The Advocate.

Kopay, who once played for the Detroit Lions, has been trying to get a coaching job but believes his coming out has prevented him from getting a job.

He is not entirely pessimistic. "My coming out has probably opened up a lot of new opportunities for me. That's probably another myth we can discredit. Some of us think public exposure is the end of the world. For me, it seems to be the beginning of a new one."

AS A GROUP of persons with generally middle-class backgrounds, ASP members have been quietly creating niches for themselves in their communities. Most maintain they have no desire for notoriety but would like to dispel public attitudes they believe detrimental.

"For instance, most people think homosexuals are sick," says a Garden City member. "I want them to know that both the American Psychological Association and the American Psychiatric Association have removed homosexuality from their official lists of mental disorders."

"We've received support from a lot of groups," he says, citing the National Organization of Women, the United Church of Christ, the California Federation of Teachers and others.

"What we want is tolerance and acceptance in the community. It's important that the average person's image of a homosexual be altered. We're not perverts and we're not out to seduce children or anyone on our way of life. But we do believe our

sex lives are not within the jurisdiction of the state. If societal attitudes can change to include homosexuals as productive members of the community, so much the better."

A community that watched with admiration the decade of growth Madonna College has known said "Godspeed" in fitting style to the school's retiring president and vice president.

Sister Mary Danatha and Sister Mary Lauriana, who have headed the administration of the Livonia school since 1965, were guests of honor at a luncheon that drew enough community leaders to fill the banquet room of Livonia's Idlewild municipal golf clubhouse.

They presented gifts, plaques and tributes to the two nuns who will leave soon for new responsibilities in the Felician order. Sister Danatha embarking on study towards a doctorate and Sister Lauriana taking for the time being a leave of absence to be with her ailing father.

THE WORDS of tribute ranged from a telegram from Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Mich.) commending the pair because "you have made our community a better place to live," to Joan Duggan's thanks to "these ladies who somehow shoved me through college."

Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara, who headed the luncheon committee with Mrs. Duggan's attorney husband, Pat, read the telegram from Esch, as well as messages from Michigan senators Philip Hart and Robert Griffin.

Mrs. Duggan, who became head of the Livonia Office of Volunteer Energies follow-

ing her years as an adult student at Madonna, wound up the program by presenting a calculator and luggage to each of the departing administrators.

In between, there were words of appreciation from several community leaders.

"YOU ARE A CREDIT" to your order, your community and your profession," said Dr. C. Nelson Grote, president of Schoolcraft College.

He told of working with the administrators of the school located close to his own and stated:

"I can say the two institutions are highly complementary. We are not competitive—we have helped each other become stronger."

Duggan, a Madonna trustee, set the tone of good-natured understanding that the two honorees were ladies who knew how to get things done.

He mentioned he had tentatively sent a bill for legal services on one occasion and received from Sister Danatha and appreciative "God love you."

State Rep. Robert Geake and State Sen. Carl Pursell followed suit.

Geake said he brought greetings "from your friends in the legislature from whom you have gotten so much—and done so much."

Pursell, for his part, recalled that when, as a youth, he had worked for his father, he often served as a delivery boy to the Felician Motherhouse before Madonna was built.

"Now working with the state senate appropriations committee, I feel sometimes

I'm still a delivery boy," he told the retiring administrators.

MCNAMARA also introduced "the Wayne County Commission's Mary Dumas, Mary Dumas," and that lady was quick with the response, "Can't remember your name—is it Tom or Dennis."

Commissioner Dumas then gave Sister Danatha and Sister Lauriana plaques and told them "they convey the best appreciation of the commission for all you have done for Madonna and the community."

Other plaques were presented by the Livonia city administration by Mayor McNamara, who said it was one time "the mayor and the commission agreed all the way," and by Senior Inspector Richard Novak of the Wayne County Sheriff Patrol, representing a large number of uniformed officers present for the festivities.

"I'm proud to be able to take part in this occasion honoring two beautiful, distinguished ladies," Novak said.

SISTER DANATHA told the gathering to "be assured we will always cherish these citations and the memory of this luncheon will live forever."

She added that although surprise had been expressed at the resignations "for me the move really is a year overdue, because my work in the order seems to have gone in 10-year cycles."

Madonna's growth, she said "has been the result of partnership between higher education and the community, and that is what is going to be needed for any in-

stitution that makes it in the 70s and beyond."

"This is a sobering time in higher education," Sister Danatha went on. "Statistics are very chilling, showing enrollment down and the percentage of the gross national product that used to be given to colleges is just not there. But Madonna is an atypical school, and while we struggled in the 60s we have found the 70s golden. We're not affluent, but we're quite healthy, and now, after a decade of rapid growth it is time for a change of administration."

She concluded:

"I've been told the life of a president is lonely. I never have found it so."

"God be with you—we'll miss you because we love you."

A five-week course titled "Self-directed Career Planning" is scheduled at four different times and with four different instructors.



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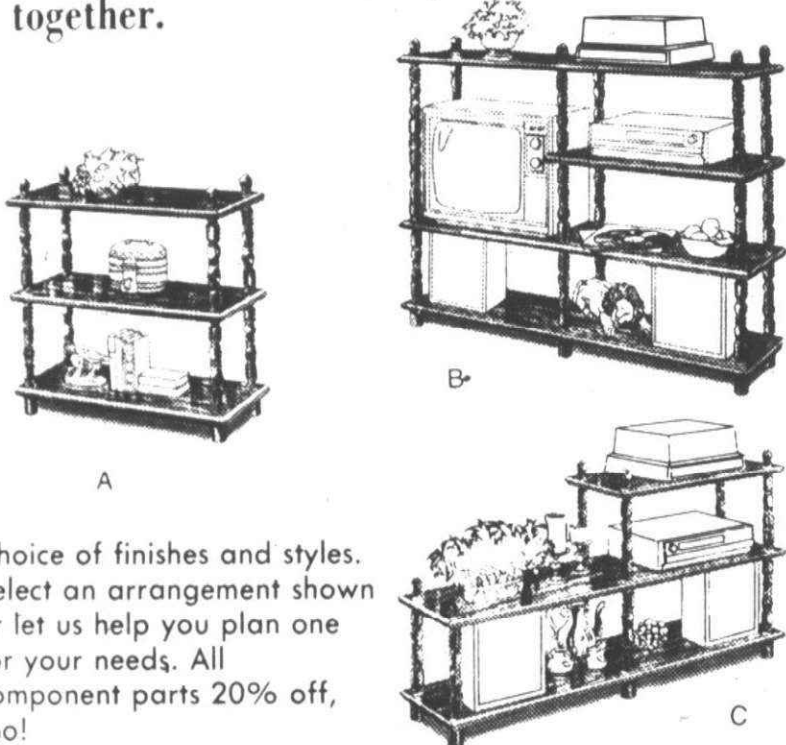
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The course is designed for women who are planning seriously to enter or re-enter the work world. Participants will examine their work history and do research on careers that interest them.

Strawberries ready

If you thought the strawberry season was over, there are some growers in these parts who want you to know there's another week left.

And, report a trio of representatives of the Belleville-Ypsilanti Strawberry Growers, the crop is a luscious one for those who would like to pick their own.

"There's just about a week to go," said Glenn Rowe of Ypsilanti, who owns one of the farms waiting to be picked clean. er and a different kind of marketing of the

The combination of unusual spring weather led to the call for pickers before the berries get overripe on the vines.

"We had to irrigate a lot this year because of the freeze," Rowe said, "and as a result, we seem to have saved every blossom. There are more berries than usual."

Rowe, Chuck Paas of Belleville and Ray Schultz of Ypsilanti explained that in the last few years they have found it better to sell their produce to those who come to pick instead of taking it to market.

"It's quite a thing these days to manage a large labor force and invest in containers and supply the transportation to market," Rowe said.

"And more and more city people are enjoying getting into the country," Schultz added. "The two things match up."

Five growers in the Belleville-Ypsilanti area sell the berries picked at their farms for 40 cents a pound, which amounts to about 55 cents a quart. It's a saving, the growers said, because the supermarket price is 99 cents a quart and more, but it still is up from last year, when pick-your-own strawberries were 35 cents a pound.

The growers advise would-be pickers to come by the end of this week, wear suitable clothing including a hat if it's sunny, leave small children at home and be prepared to supervise older children (10 and up).

Addresses of the farms with strawberries and directions for getting there can be obtained by calling a hot line number: 313-699-2088.

The Ypsilanti-Belleville area, the growers said, has become known as the strawberry capital of southeastern Michigan. Last year it yielded more than 300,000 pounds of berries, the crop appears even larger this year.

Turning back the church clock

When the Liberty Bell rings in the third century of these United States, the words of the Bible will vibrate to the sound. Circling the crown of the beloved bell are words from the Old Testament: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

At precisely 2 P.M. (EDT) Sunday, July 4, church bells all over the country will proclaim one of the most religiously significant, as well as historically important, events this generation of Americans will ever witness.

To commemorate the bicentennial moment, and to provide the nation's churches and synagogues with a meaningful memento of this historical occasion, the American Bible Society has published a 5-by-5 1/2 inch natural copper-colored photographic likeness of the Liberty Bell, die-cut in the exact shape of the bell and its fittings.

On the reverse side is a Scripture passage from Isaiah 61:1-4, which is particularly relevant as well as for the new century of independence. "And they shall build the old wastes," it reads, "they shall raise up the former desolations, and they shall repair the waste cities, the desolation of many generations."

Liberty Bell Scripture Selections can be ordered from the American Bible Society, 1865 Broadway, New York, N.Y. at \$2.46 per 100 unit.

St. Michael Lutheran Church of Canton Township recently held the kind of service used by the first Lutherans in this country, and the Rev. Robert E. Schacht was dressed for the occasion as an old-time pastor. He preached part of a sermon first used in 1826 and used an early order of service that had been translated from German. Members of the congregation, who meet in Gallimore School pending building of a church home, got into the spirit by wearing old-time dresses and by including eggs, a chicken and a few loaves of bread in the day's offering.

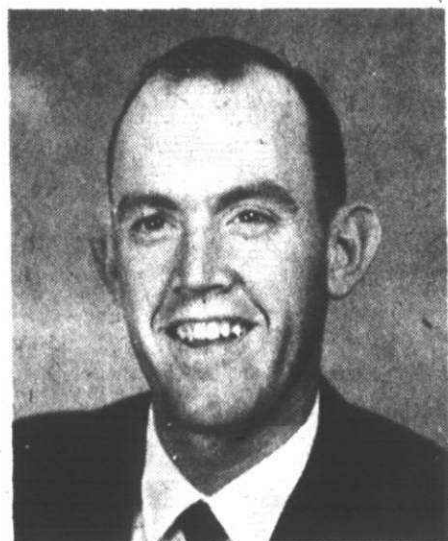

He fears reserves

EDITOR:

This is an open letter to Mr. Robert Greenstein, Canton Township supervisor. Dear Mr. Greenstein:

Because you do not seem to be able to comprehend the basis of the fears of Canton citizens like me, over your issuing magnum .357 handguns to the Canton reserve police force, I will try to explain it to you through this letter.

First, you misinterpret the citizens' fears when you try to quiet these fears by telling us how many hours of training the reserve officers are receiving in the use of this weapon.

This is not the basis of our fears. You have convinced us that the reserves will know how to take care of the weapon and how to accurately aim and shoot it at a live target.

Further, you misinterpret these fears when you try to remove them by telling us that the magnum .357 is a very safe weapon for the reserve officers.

Our fears are not only for the safety of the person behind the weapon.

The point is, Mr. Greenstein, you have not convinced us that the reserve officers, even with 150 hours of training in a reserve police training course, have adequate experience and training to know when to, and when not to, use the weapon.

We know that the Michigan State Police recruits are required to take 680 hours of actual police class training. That even with this amount of training, rookies are not allowed to ride in a police unit, unless accompanied by a more experienced fellow officer, for at least six months.

If a Canton reserve officer were to put in a 20-hour month, as you have suggested, under these standards, it would take over four years before he could ride alone in a Canton police unit without a fully experienced officer.

You may ask the propriety of my comparing a Canton reserve officer with a Michigan State police officer. The reason I do it is because you have been making the comparisons of Canton's force to regular police.

And, as you have constituted this force, these officers will probably more often than not be the first to arrive at an emergency call in the township, and with the full power and authority to act on their own.

You can argue that these fears are only imagined. However, I would like to remind you of just three incidents involving supposedly well-trained police officers.

First, in the City of Detroit a few weeks ago, an off-duty police officer shot and killed unarmed twin brothers in a park with his service revolver.

Second, in the city of Ypsilanti, two police officers shot and killed a young soldier home on leave in his own backyard.

Last, today's news reviewed a trial, taking place in Lansing of a police officer who had an argument with another police officer. They settled their argument when the one officer shot the other officer.

What we need, Mr. Greenstein, is greater assurance that there will not be any accidents in Canton involving our families.

One way of doing this would be to have an independent psychological testing agency test all potential reserve officers prior to their appointment and being allowed to roam the streets with weapons.

I would suggest intelligence testing, emotional security testing, and motivation testing. Also, I feel that any potential officers be required to pass a physical examination and a physical fitness test.

An alternative method would be to limit the scope of the reserves' authority and duties to that which most communities use reserve police officers and to limit the issuance of weapons.

U.S. survival historically amazing says Pursell

The women bowlers of Michigan lost one of their most dedicated leaders last week when Marge Stokis, of Grand Rapids, who served as secretary of the Michigan Women's Bowling Association for several decades, decided to retire.

She was only the second secretary the group has had in more than three decades, and under her supervision, the state tournament had grown to the largest in the country with more than 3,000 teams.

Marge announced her retirement at the

annual meeting. She will be succeeded by Bea Lane, of Ossineke, who has served as president for the past year.

When Marge took over the secretariat from Minnie Sackerman, another Grand Rapids resident who also was a dedicated soul, the state tournament drew close to 2,000 teams and ran several months. Now, with the large entry, it runs from February through the middle of June.

ANOTHER OF THE DEDICATED women bowlers was honored at the state meeting at Shanty Creek when Lillian Jacobs, who served for years as president of the Detroit Women's Bowling Association, was named a charter member of the new Michigan Women Bowlers Hall of Fame.

She was inducted along with Connie Powers, of Detroit, and Marion Ladewig, of Grand Rapids during colorful ceremonies.

DICK BEATTIE the Dearborn sharpshooter who does a lot of his bowling at Westland Bowl, had a disheartening experience last weekend in the Michigan Majors Association championship at Kingswood Lanes.

Bidding for an unprecedented sixth MMEA championship, he encountered Bob Chamberlin in the final game and lost 207 to 153.

To gain the title, Chamberlin won eight matches and averaged 217 for the 12 games.

Going into the final game, he was trailing Beattie by 52 pins and didn't seem to have too much chance of winning. But Dick lost his touch and bowed when on the threshold of a new record!

PRIOR TO THE MMEA championships, Dick had a great night in the Thursday Trio League at Westland when he put together games of 188, 265 and 226 for a

FREE WHEELING

with

Only two hours into our most recent free-wheeling adventure, a fellow cyclist, who was riding a borrowed 10-speed too small for his six-foot-two body frame, was exhausted.

We were pedaling wet on Seven Mile Road from Livonia on our way to Whitmore Lake, just north of Ann Arbor, when he stopped us.

Unfortunately, his exhaustion brought our weekly freewheeling adventure on this beautiful afternoon to a sudden end.

Our friend, an experienced rider from out of town, would be the first to tell you that a proper fitting bike means maximum riding comfort and power.

To help you achieve that, just a few hints before buying or riding your bike.

Buy a bike that is the proper frame size. If you can comfortably straddle the crossbar, then it is a good fit.

There should be no binding in this area. Preferably, when straddling the bike, there should be no more than two inches from inseam to the crossbar.

BEFORE SETTING off on those longer freewheeling adventures, check your handlebars and seat for proper adjustment.

The straight touring handlebars don't afford maximum comfort during the longer riders.

The rider using these bars becomes tired

more quickly because riding straight stretches out the cyclist's back.

On the other hand, when correctly adjusted, dropped handlebars allow a cyclist a maximum variety of positions depending on the various riding conditions.

With this type of handlebar, steering control increases and breathing rhythm becomes easier because the rider uses the power in his shoulders and arms rather than his back.

The best position for dropped handlebars is just about level with the seat tip. Straddle height is also important and determines the height your seat should be.

Most riding experts say the perfect height is when you are able to sit on the seat, with the heel of your foot straight out on the down pedal, so that when you are riding with the ball of your foot on the pedal, your leg will be slightly bent.

If the seat is too low, there will be too much bending of the knees. If too high, there will be a strain on the legs.

Riding with either of these improper positions creates more work to complete the pedaling cycle, without allowing you to attain full riding power and comfort.

HAND IN HAND with the proper straddle height is the proper riding technique. The best method of pedaling is called anking.

Once you cadence your riding with this method, you will increase your pedal power and efficiency.

To use anking, squarely place the balls of your feet on the pedals and stroke with even down turns. On the up pedal, the heel should be slightly lower than the toe. On the down turn, the toe should be lower and the heel up.

Toe clips and rattrap pedals make pedaling easier because they prevent the feet from slipping into an arch or flatfoot position.

Tires are one of the most important parts of your bike during your free-wheeling adventures.



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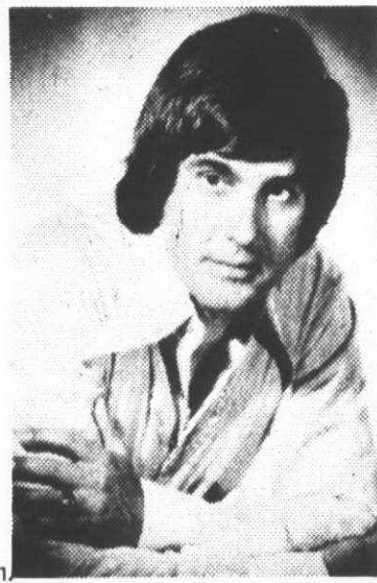
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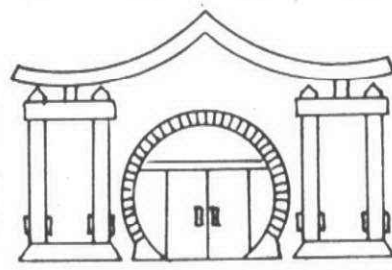
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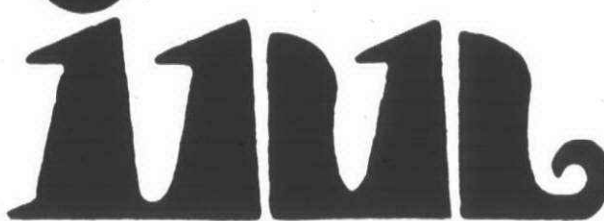
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Meadow Brook slates jazz, country, pop stars

In the fall, the group will be featured in a special benefit show for William Beaumont Hospital that will have pianist Roger Williams and television personality Frank Blair as special guests.



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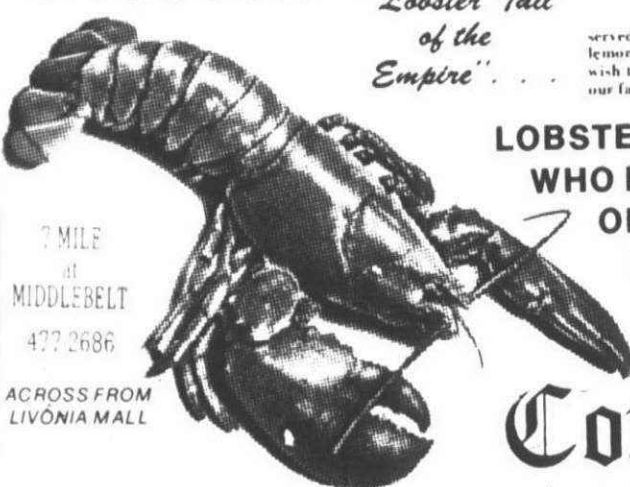
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Critical cold shoulder for 'SummerSnow'

"SummerSnow" left this 12-year-old reviewer cold, but it is a fun play for children nine and under.

Ered Rogers of TV's "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood" has written an original musical play for children about a young child who struggles with feelings of jealousy. The play has only a few sparks of humor, but it does have a lesson made plain in the song about the people you like the most making you feel the maddest and the happiest.

In the end the main character, a young girl named Betty (Betty Aberlin) learns that even when friends do bad things, revenge is not the answer.

Air show scheduled in Detroit

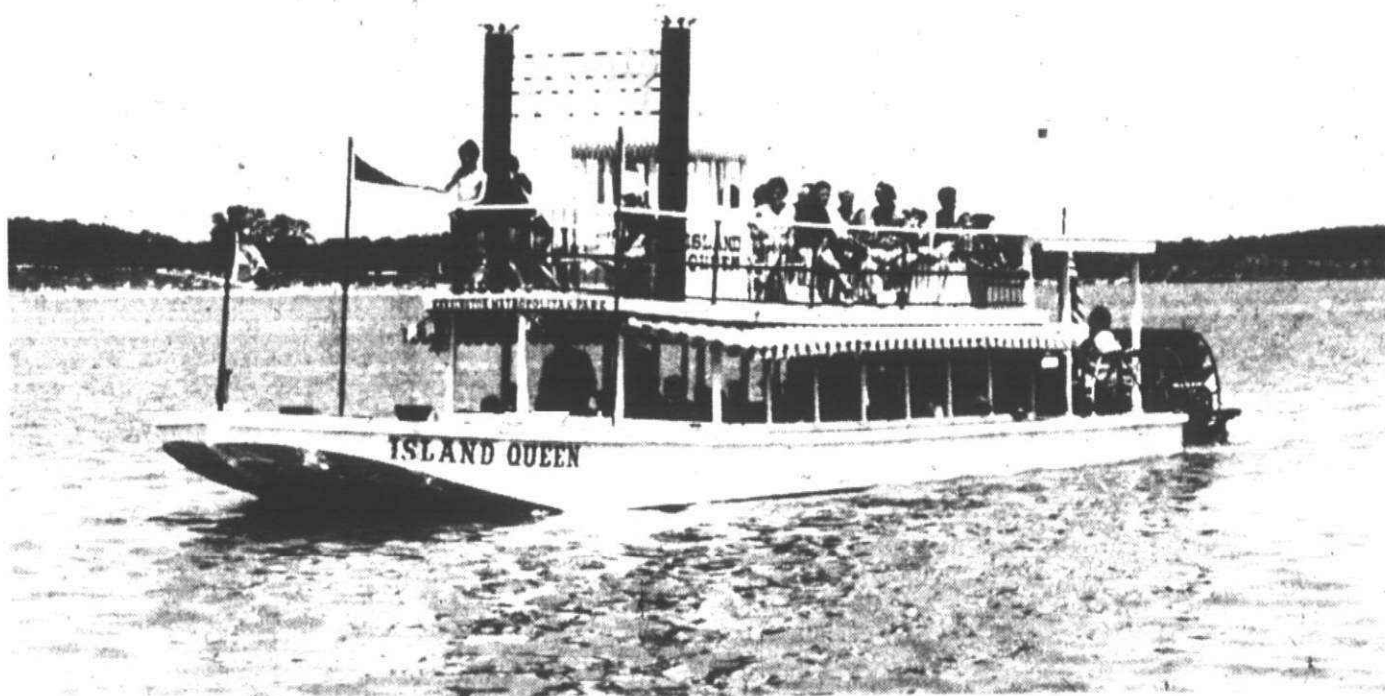

Northwest Sub thinclads dominate all-O&E squad

How does a panel of coaches go about selecting an all-area boys' track and field team when so many squads and individuals had fabulous seasons? Slowly and deliberately, that's how.

During the recently-concluded campaign, Westland John Glenn never lost a dual meet, claimed the Northwest Suburban League championship and won several relay meets.

Livonia Churchill took the Observerland Relays and the Western Six titles, while Redford Bishop Borgess and Livonia Stevenson placed second in their respective leagues.

Area coaches recently met to select the best individuals on the local track scene and came up with the following all-O&E & Eccentric squad.

FIRST TEAM

DAVID BOWLBY, Livonia Stevenson, shot put. Leader of the area's shot put listing virtually all season, Bowlby tossed the 12-pound iron ball farther than 50 feet in 10 of his final 12 meets.

His best effort of the year was 53 feet five inches. Bowlby was the individual champion at the Waterford Relays, placed second at the state regionals and the senior finished 10th at the state finals.

DAVE KIELTY, Livonia Churchill, discus. The sophomore placed seventh in the state finals and had the third best Class A sling in the final state ratings, 155 feet one inch.

A unanimous choice for the all-O&E first team, Kielty was Western Six champion, regional champion, Observerland Relays individual champion, Livonia-Dearborn All Star champion and winner of 11 of 12 dual meets.

He was selected as Charger Trackman of the Year and also played golf and basketball for Churchill.

JEFF BENNETT, Redford Union, high jump. Individual high jump winner at the Observerland Relays where he leaped six feet four inches. Bennett placed first in 11 of 13 dual and triangular meets.

The junior matched his best effort of the year at the Suburban Eight League conference meet and never jumped under six feet one inch in any of his league, invitational or relay meets.

DON FRANK, Garden City West, long jump. The highest point winner on the West team this spring with 153, Frank closed out his three-year prep career second on the Tigers' all-time scoring list.

He scored consistently in the long jump, the high jump, the 220- and the 440-yard

dashes and was selected West's most valuable player this year.

He is co-holder of the school high jump record and his best long jump of the 1976 campaign was 21 feet 3 1/2 inches.

BOB BABITS, Redford Union, pole vault. A constant leader of the area listing, Babits, undefeated in dual meet competition, had a best vault this season of 13 feet 8 1/2 inches.

Babits captured the Suburban Eight League championship, the individual title at the Observerland Relays and was the only area vaulter to clear the starting height at the state meet.

He soared 13 feet or higher in a like number of meets.

GARY HICKS, Redford Bishop Borgess, high hurdles. Borgess' most valuable performer, a four-year letterman and three-year captain, Hicks was voted by the panel of coaches as area Trackman of the Year.

Undefeated in the highs in dual meets, the senior placed first in the regionals, second in the Catholic League Championships and fifth in the state finals. His best time was 14.1 seconds.

Additionally, Hicks holds the Borgess' record in the 440-yard run (49.7 seconds) and shares school marks in the high jump, the mile relay and the shuttle hurdle relay.

He will attend the University of Michigan next year on a track scholarship. "Gary is the person who got our program started," credits Borgess coach Steve Strauch.

MARK NIEMCHAK, Livonia Stevenson, low hurdles. Regional champion, Inter-Lakes League champion and Livonia-Dearborn All Star champion, the junior's best effort of the year was 19.8 seconds.

Niemchak also competed in the high hurdles, the mile relay and the 100-yard dash for the Spartans. A two-year letterman and all-league both years, Niemchak credited extra coaching from his father for a good part of success.

TED UNOLD, Westland John Glenn, two-mile run. A junior, Unold placed second in the two-mile at the state finals. He holds the Glenn record in both the mile and two-mile and earned all-Northwest Suburban accolades last year in the former and this spring in the latter.

Co-winner of the Rockets' most valuable player award, Unold placed first in the open two mile at the Wayne Relays and the Wayne Invitational. His best time of the season was 9:28.0.

CRAIG REYNOLDS, Redford Thurston, mile run. A regionals winner, Reynolds was also all-Northwest Suburban League, winner of the open mile at the Waterford Relays and an eighth-place finisher at the state finals.

A three-year letter winner at Thurston, the senior had a best clocking of 4:24.5. Reynolds plans to run cross country and track at the University of Michigan-Dearborn next year.

CHUCK RONAN, Livonia Franklin, 880-yard run. Ronan easily out-distanced his nearest rival in the final area listing by almost two full seconds. His best time of the spring was 1:56.4.

JEFF COUTURIER, Westland John Glenn, 440-yard dash. A co-winner of the Rockets' MVP award, the senior transfer showed a wide range of abilities.

In addition to posting a personal best time of 49.9 seconds in the quarter mile, Couturier also high jumped, ran the half mile and anchored Glenn's 880-yard relay team.

"He ended up in four events each meet," said Glenn coach Barry Basel. "He's just a real solid runner."

DAVE SMITH, Livonia Franklin, 220-yard dash. League champion in the 220 as well as a member of the Patriots' 880 all-league relay crew, Smith's best clocking in the former was 22.7 seconds.

TERRY BIXLER, Westland John Glenn, 100-yard dash. The senior became the Rockets' all-time career point leader in this third season. Bixler placed first in the league meet and at the Ashley Relays. His best time was 10 seconds flat.

Bixler also holds the Glenn 220 record with a clocking of 22.4 seconds and is a member of the all-O&E 880-yard relay team. He also played football for Glenn.

CLIFF WILLIAMSON, **DAVE JOHNSON**, **KELLY FROST** and **JEFF COUTURIER**, Westland John Glenn, mile relay. Williamson, a junior began to show more consistency this season, according to Coach Basel, and ran the 220, the 440 and the 880 for the Rockets.

Johnson, a co-captain of the team, holds the school record in the high jump and competes in the 440 and the 880. Frost, the other co-captain, was second in the league in the mile run. He also high jumps.

The foursome ran in a prep exhibition at the NCAA Indoor Meet, placed first in the league meet, the Elks Relays and the Belleville Relays and never lost in a dual meet.

FRANK DELUCA, **TERRY BIXLER**, **CLIFF WILLIAMSON** and **JEFF COUTURIER**, Westland John Glenn, 880-yard relay. In addition to his work in the 880 relay, Deluca competed in the 100- and the 220-yard dashes and the hurdles. The quartet placed first in both the Elks and the Ashley Relays.

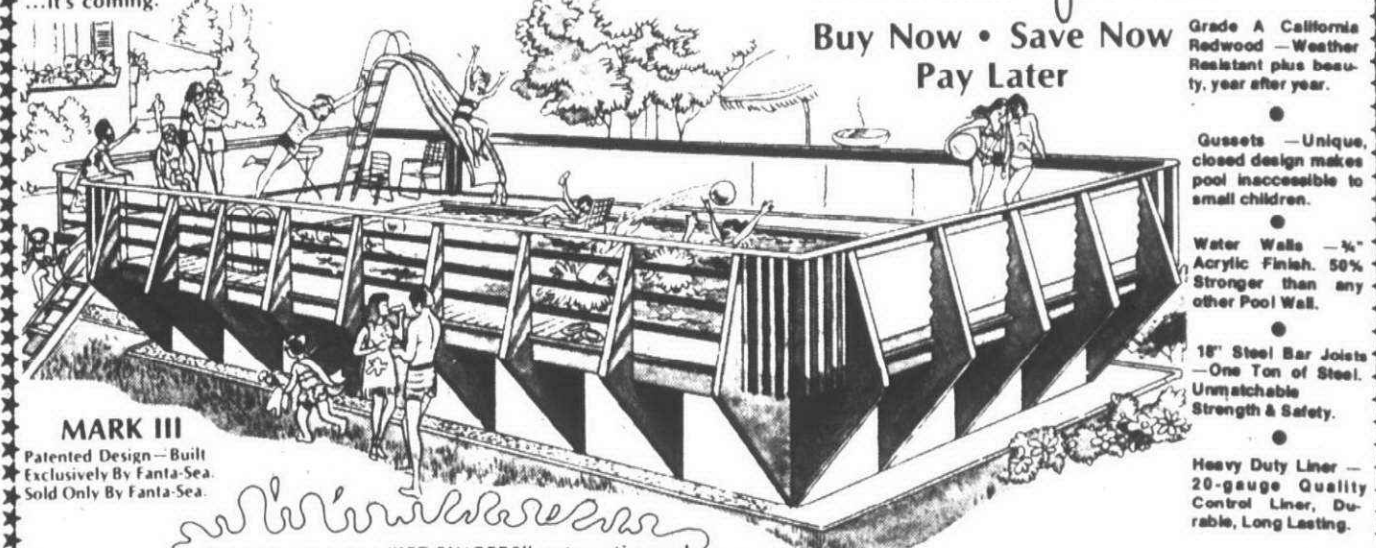

"Brent Erickson did a fine job" coach Pat Puvolo commented. Erickson pitched all but the seventh inning.

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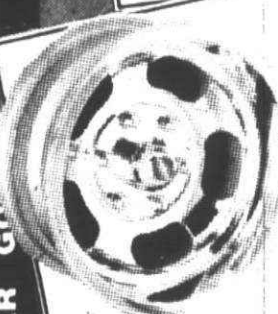
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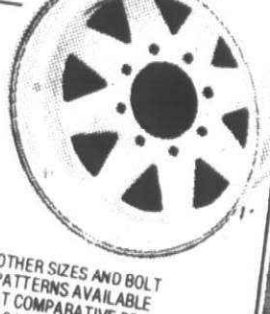

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Building with tradition will soon be torn down

When the wrecker's ball topples the old stock exchange building on S. Main and uncovers a series of new office suites and new exchange, it will unleash a flood of memories for Earl West, the retired auto dealer, and his brothers.

Earl, who visits the site most every day on his way to lunch, admits that it is rather emotional to realize that the site of their first business venture was going into the limbo of forgotten things.

"My brothers and I started with an International Harvester franchise. That was long before we went into the auto business and much of the area outside the city limits then was farm land."

Pointing to an old picture, he smiled when he explained that the view of the buildings, taken before 1946, showed only one tractor with rubber tires.

IN THOSE DAYS the building was much larger than it has been recently. After Ralph Lorenz, owner of the Mayflower

Hotel, bought the property in 1946 he started making all sorts of changes.

For years the building housed a series of little shops behind the stock exchange. In past years, however, under Lorenz's plan to redevelop the downtown area, he had a new building constructed. It now houses several legal offices and new headquarters for the stock exchange.

"One of these nights—about midnight—we'll have a group available to tear down the old building. When the businessmen awaken they will have an entirely different view of the area," says Lorenz.

"When the building goes down it will mark another step in the dream the West brothers had when they sold the building in 1946 and moved into their new building on Forest with a Mercury dealership.

"We figured we would have much more room in the new place," Earl said, "and it proved a good move. We remained in the auto business until a year or two ago when we sold to a new group that now operates the Hines Park Mercury dealership on Ann Arbor Road."

At the moment the West building is now

occupied by Dave Geddes and his antique car rehabilitation center.

But it is the sight of the old building on S. Main, now doomed to the wreckers ball that is interesting to Earl and his brothers: Joe, who is Plymouth Township treasurer, and Alfred, who was better known as "Dutch West" during their business days.

The razing of the old building is another step in Lorenz plan to develop a real business center on the south side of Ann Arbor Trail.

It started several years ago with the buildings of a motel in the rear of the Meeting House. Next came the addition to the Meeting House to establish the Plymouth National Bank and now there is a huge bank building in the final stages of construction.

But deep down in the new set-up there still will be many fond memories for the West brothers who operated a farm equipment center on the site more than three decades ago.

"They are fond memories," Earl confided, "but one can't stand in the way of progress."

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Social Security unjust to women—Stempien

Marvin Stempien, Democratic candidate for Congress in the 2d district thinks present social security laws discriminate against women.

"Social security has not caught up with the fact that increasing numbers of women must work either to help with family support or to provide all of the income needed for themselves and possibly their dependents," Stempien said. "The system as it now exists makes no accommodation whatsoever for women's diverse roles as wives, mothers, working women and widows."

Stempien made his remarks at the senior citizen center in Dundee, Michigan.

Stempien told the group that current regulations place women at the high end of the tax bracket while they are at the low end of the social security benefit schedule.

The candidate explained that women now earn 54 per cent as much as men but

since social security is based on the principle that payments are meant to replace earned income, working women will receive less because they have earned less money all their lives.

Dependent women are entitled to 50 per cent of their husband's social security benefits, said Stempien.

"Therefore if the amount they would receive as a result of the work they have been doing during their lifetime is lower, those women logically choose to take 50 per cent of the husband's benefits," he said.

"In that case, they receive not a single cent of what they have paid into social security in their working years," said Stempien.

Current regulations also discriminate against divorced women, according to Stempien.
