

Improper vote postpones budget cuts

The legal opinion that the Plymouth Board of Education improperly elected its officers July 1 will delay any decisions on budget reductions or holding a second millage election until the July 12 meeting of the board.

Because the board doesn't have any officers, and was unable to get a unanimous vote at Tuesday's special meeting to elect officers, a scheduled special meeting Tuesday had to be adjourned without any action being taken.

The board had been scheduled to discuss budget cuts, resolution of how to open Miller School on July 19, and adopt a motion calling for a second millage election sometime in September. Those items of business are now pushed forward to the agenda for Monday's meeting. The first

item of business Monday, however, will be an election of officers.

Because Monday's meeting is a regularly scheduled meeting, a unanimous vote won't be required to elect officers as was the case for Tuesday's special meeting.

THE DELAY could result in a late opening of the next term for Miller Elementary which is scheduled to start another term in its year-round slated on July 19.

Depending on how the board votes on cuts at Miller School, the July 19 opening date might be in jeopardy. If the decision made requires a revamping of programs, or a change in the hours per day now planned, the opening could be delayed a week. Parents also have to receive written notification of changes to be effected. The main decision to be made by the

board concerning Miller is whether to eliminate 5½ teaching positions beginning July 19 now held by specialists in art, music, physical education and the humanities.

Some trustees feel the district has a moral commitment to retain the 5½ specialists positions to insure that pupils at Miller enjoy the same program benefits as other elementary pupils did during the 1975-76 school year. Two tracks, or groups of students, will be finishing up their 75-76 school year during July and August. Another group, Track A, will be starting its 1976-77 school year July 19.

The administration is now beginning talks with leadership of the Plymouth Education Association (PEA), the teachers' union, to negotiate a special, temporary agreement to allow the 5½ specialists at

Miller to continue as substitutes, or temporary help, until the second millage election is held.

The PEA must agree to such a special contract or the district would be exposing itself to a liability for "damages in a lawsuit," the board was told Tuesday by Charles Fine, newly appointed labor attorney for the board.

At this point, it is uncertain what the board would do Monday if the PEA leadership doesn't agree to a special contract for the specialists at Miller.

THE BOARD also is expected to set a date for a millage election at Monday's meeting.

Although some trustees are considering calling for an election on Sept. 13, there is

some sentiment for a vote on Sept. 7.

According to the timetable of deadlines which must be met by state law to set an election, the board could vote Monday for either a Sept. 7 or Sept. 13 ballot date.

Once the election date is set, a major area of discussion by trustees will center on whether to implement all cuts immediately or wait until the outcome of the September election and then make the cuts if the second millage request is defeated.

Trustee George Lawton has argued in favor of delaying any cuts until after the second millage election. If cuts are made now, he argues, damage could be done to programs at Miller and to football which couldn't be undone by passage of the mil-

lage. Lawton argues it is unfair to penalize football and Miller pupils because other programs and students would be hurt less if the millage passes in the fall.

Other trustees, however, led by E.J. McClendon argue that the board has committed itself to a series of cuts in Budget E if the millage was defeated in June and should follow through and make those reductions.

Once the board officers are properly elected, and an election date agreed upon, the trustees will then tackle the issue of whether to cut now or wait until September. And much of what happens to programs at Miller, and the football teams and marching band, will hinge on how the board resolves that issue.

Officer vote illegal

Election is voided

Joe Gray's tenure as president of the Plymouth Board of Education hasn't yet started.

Tuesday afternoon the school board's attorney issued an opinion that the election of officers at the July 1 organization meeting was done improperly and is now void.

THE BOARD WILL operate without officers until Monday when another attempt will be made to elect a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

A special meeting could be held before Monday by request of at least two trustees, but officials don't expect that action to be taken since Monday is just a few days away from Tuesday's unsuccessful attempt to elect officers.

After learning that July 1 balloting was improper, the board was going to add election of officers as an agenda item for its July 6 special meeting. The special meeting was called to set a date for a second millage election and to discuss and possibly take action on budget cuts.

Dodge had advised that the election could be added to the agenda only by a unanimous vote. In case a unanimous vote wasn't obtained, Dodge had recommended that the special meeting be adjourned because any action taken could be challenged as the board would be operating technically without officers.

E.J. McClendon made the motion Tuesday to add election of officers to the agenda. The vote failed by 6-1 with George Lawton voting no. A motion was immediately made to adjourn and was approved 7-0.

The meeting, which lasted less than two minutes, left a number of questions remaining in the minds of the large audience which turned out to see what action, if any, the board would take on budget cuts. The meeting was over without even any discussion of items on the printed agenda for the special meeting.

After the meeting, Lawton explained he voted "no" to buy more time to study issues involved with budget cuts—especially those involving athletics and Miller Elementary.

"My 'no' vote had nothing to do with the election of officers," Lawton told the Ob-

server & Eccentric. "As far as I'm concerned the election could be held tonight (Tuesday) because the outcome wouldn't be any different from last Thursday. But I don't feel prepared to vote on the agenda items involving budget cuts and want time to do more research between now and Monday."

Supt. John M. Hoben said he felt the board was correct in adjourning immediately after Lawton's "no" vote. "Given the opinion of our attorney, I would hate to see the board continue the meeting and set an election date and then have it challenged in the future on a legal, procedural question. Setting the election date is too important a matter to risk a challenge."

HOBEN SAID after the meeting that he intended to place on Monday's agenda an item to suspend board bylaws to allow a secret ballot to elect officers.

"I don't know if that's the board's intent or not but to avoid the problems we encountered July 1, I will place it on the agenda and the board can vote for or against suspending bylaws."

The July 1 organizational meeting would have been proper, and the officers still would be holding their positions, if it hadn't been for the secret ballot. On July 1, McClendon had made a motion to suspend bylaws to allow a secret ballot. Tom Yack and Marcia Borowski voted against suspension of rules for a secret ballot.

When Ms. Borowski raised a point of order that a unanimous vote was required, Richard Arlen suggested that a 5-2 vote was sufficient because Robert's Rules of Order required two-thirds of a majority to waive rules. McClendon also argued that a majority vote of the board was proper to suspend rules.

During that discussion July 1, Hoben and administrative assistant Florence Beier pointed out that their understanding was the bylaws required a unanimous vote.

When asked by Ms. Borowski to make a ruling, chairman Gray declined stating the issue was too perplexing and should be decided by legal counsel.

Tuesday, legal counsel made that decision and ruled the election would have to be repeated. "The board's bylaws take precedent over Robert's Rules," said Dodge, "and without written notice of an

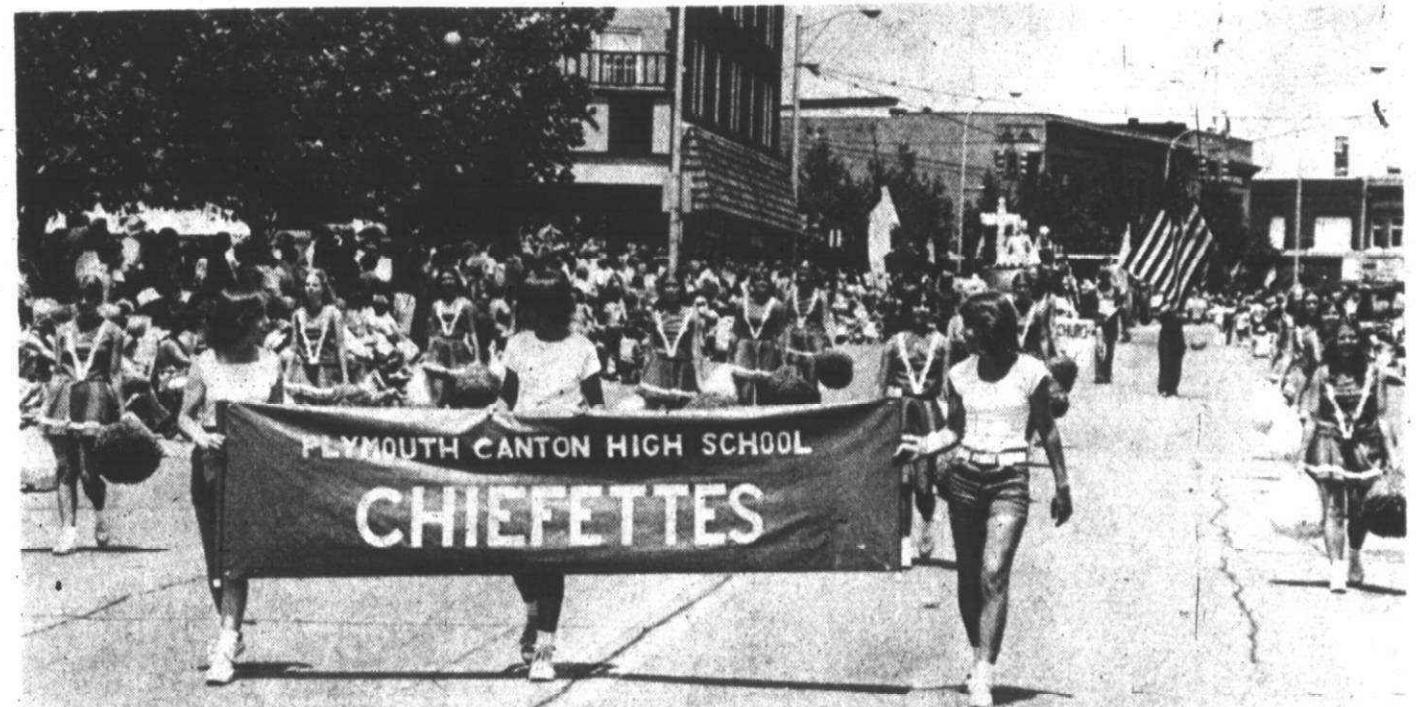
intent to suspend rules, a unanimous vote is needed."

The portion of the bylaws (9009.3) which states the rules provides that: "The By-laws of the Board of Education shall be subject to suspension only upon a majority vote of all the members of the Board at a meeting in the call for which the proposed suspension has been described in writing, or upon a unanimous vote of all the members of the Board when no such written notice has been given."

THERE WAS SOME question whether Tuesday's special meeting could even begin since the notice calling the meeting was signed by Gray as president.

Dodge issued an opinion that Gray could call the meeting under a "presumption of validity." Gray had acted in good faith in calling the meeting, Dodge explained, because he had assumed he was duly-elected president. On that basis, he added, Gray could properly call Tuesday's meeting to order.

Canton considers airport buy

Faced with the chance that Willow Run Airport may be purchased and expanded by the Wayne County Road Commission, members of Canton's planning commission and township board Tuesday agreed to investigate the possibility of jointly purchasing and running the facility with several other Wayne and Washtenaw county townships.

Although not affected as adversely as Van Buren Township, a substantial portion of southern Canton could be beneath the flight patterns of the airport if it is expanded.

While cost of the venture is presently un-

known, actual purchase of the airport would be insignificant, according to Van Buren Supervisor Elton Gollwitzer.

Addressing a joint meeting of the planning commission and township board, Gollwitzer told Canton officials the airport, presently owned and run by the University of Michigan, will probably be deeded to the new owners for \$1.

"The only way to stop the airport expansion is to own it," the supervisor said. "We've tried to stop it with the EPA, the DNR, our congressman and they won't touch it right now."

Gollwitzer said he had asked U.S. Reps. William Ford (D-Taylor) and Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor) and U.S. Sen. Rob-

ert Griffin (R-Michigan) to intervene.

He said he got the same response each time—"they said they would get involved only when the possibility of expansion got further along."

"Our worry is that by then, we can't stop it."

If the airport were expanded according to plans the Wayne County Road Commission submitted in 1972, a wide path of land in Canton, running from the southern boundary of the township with Beck on the west and Morton-Taylor on the east, would be directly under the flight pattern of planes using the airport.

GOLLWITZER SAID Canton's situation was similar to that of Taylor and Dearborn Heights several years ago. Some residents of those communities now own houses that are unsalable because they are in the flight path of the airport.

In Van Buren, more than 700 homes would be affected along with a park on Belleville Lake that would be right at the end of a proposed runway.

Mortgages from FHA and VA would be impossible to get in a wide region surrounding the airport well as in regions that would be in the flight path.

Gollwitzer said he expected conventional mortgages would also be unavailable in those areas. Parts of Canton beneath the flight path would be similarly affected.

"The people who have to sell their homes because they would be in the way of the airport are the lucky ones," Gollwitzer said.

"At least they break even. Those who are not forced to sell won't be able to sell at all and they will be stuck with those houses."

WHILE GOLLWITZER said the road commission has stated it will abandon the specific plan it presented several years ago to expand the airport, once it gets control of the facility it may change its position.

"By then it will be too late," he said.

But the fly in the soup, according to Gollwitzer, is that the FAA must approve any transfer of ownership of the airport.

"They would prefer to see the road commission own it, instead of a bunch of bumbling locals. They'd like to see the whole United States turned into airports and the best way to do that here is to have the road commission get the airport."

"They're both bureaucracies and the problem is that they can spend money without a vote of the people. That's their gimmick. 'Bureaucracies do what they want in spite of the people—and you can't stop them from getting what they want.'"

Gollwitzer said the road commission was adept at getting federal funds, and could if it pleased expand the airport if it gained ownership.

"The road commission spent \$20 million on the international terminal at Metro which is presently used at eight per cent capacity—they never proved the need—and they could the same thing with Willow Run."

Gollwitzer said if the matter were to put a vote in Wayne County, the road commission couldn't get half a mill to expand the airport.

"But the problem with the road commission is that it doesn't have to go to the people to finance its projects," he said.

The Van Buren supervisor said if local communities purchased the airport, it would be fixed up gradually and developed slowly as the need arose.

IN ORDER to purchase the airport, Gollwitzer proposed forming a commission composed of local communities using the same legislation that allowed the road commission to become involved in airports in the 1960s.

"The problem is getting FAA approval—they have big ideas," he said.

Presently only Ypsilanti Township and

Wilcox Lake to be skate rink

While the heat of the summer sun beats down on them the work crews under contract to the Wayne County Road Commission are preparing a Christmas gift in the form of a huge ice skating rink for the entire Plymouth community.

It is being constructed in Wilcox Lake in a most unusual way.

According to R.H. McCracken, the part of the Rouge River that flows between Hines Drive and the island is being dredged to make room for a steel retaining wall that will divert the water to the other side of the island.

The contract, according to McCracken, calls for a steel retaining wall from the bank of the river to the island, a matter of about 170 feet.

When the wall is built there is still a question whether it will have a concrete or a steel top. But one thing is certain. The water between the wall and the east end of the island will be quiet.

With the calm water, McCracken explained, "the ice will remain in better condition through the winter. It won't be disturbed and should provide a great skating pond."

APPEARANCE OF the huge machinery and the dredging came as a surprise to the community.

For some time it has been known that work is to be started on construction of a huge fishing dock in Wilcox, as a companion to the two now under construction in neighboring Newburgh Lake. Nothing ever was announced regarding the skating rink.

As the contractor spoke the water was filled with algae—so noticeable in all parts of the lake as it reared its ugly head to the surface.

"When we divert some of the water coming down from Northville it will help to reduce the algae problem. It doesn't thrive on running water," Contractor McCracken said.

The dredging now under way is a signal that the time may not be far away when the entire lake will be dredged, especially the part that lies beyond the bridge toward Northville.

At the moment the dredging will be only enough to provide a road to the island to support the equipment necessary to sink the steel pillars that will serve as the retaining wall.

THE WORK OF the skating rink and the building of the fishing docks is the start of what is expected to be the rehabilitation of the three lakes—Phoenix, Wilcox and Newburgh.

The plans have been spoken of for years, but it wasn't until the state, through the Department of Natural Resources had its request for the necessary funds placed in the budget.

One of the prime movers in the improvement of the lake has been State Senator Carl Pursell (R-Ply), who started his campaign a decade ago when he was president of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce.

He followed up while a member of the Wayne County Commission and later as the state senator where he is a member of the appropriations committee.

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Drought stunting local corn crop

Wilford Bunyea, one of the leading authorities on the raising of sweet corn in western Wayne County, peered out over a large area of stunted stalks and said that this is one of the worst growing seasons we have had in years.

What he saw as he scanned the field were stalks that were scarcely a foot high, and with little chance of getting much taller.

According to the old-time farmers' theory, sweet corn should be knee high by July Fourth and shoulder high by Labor Day.

The corn on the Ridge Road farmland was scarcely above Wilford's ankles and the entire crop as far as one could see was stunted.

"We never have had anything worse than this that I can remember," Bunyea said. "We have had some years that were just as bad, but never worse."

What would cause such a condition?

"There are several things," he said. "First, is the drought. We haven't had enough rain—in fact, we have had very little."

"Second is the fact that there is a lot of clay in the soil and it requires more than average rain. Third, it was planted in hot weather when the ground lacked moisture and the plantings just laid there."

"When the rains came it was a bit too late and the corn didn't have a chance to grow any taller."

Bunyea, who has raised many an acre of corn, went on to explain that future rains would help the stunted stalks, but that the corn would be of a poor variety.

"If the stalks do get taller and bear the ears, you will find that the kernels will be soft, and not as satisfactory or as tasty as the type of corn we have been used to around here."

Asked if the stunted plants would have any effect on the corn for the Plymouth Rotary Club barbeque, Bunyea pointed out that there always is a danger.

Years ago, to guard against this, the "Rotary corn" was grown in three seven-acre sections in three different parts of the county. It is watched very carefully so that it would be ready for the big day (the Sunday following Labor Day).

This is the one time when the corn must be raised to meet a target of a single day. Otherwise a few days late wouldn't matter. With three plots to choose from the Rotary Club never has been in trouble. But the drought and the stunted growth is certain to bring about a shortage in the local areas.

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An unusual hobby Bennett spends hours fixing reed, pipe organs

One never would suspect that a science teacher would spend his spare hours repairing old reed and pipe organs—that is, not until you met LeRoy Bennett who has this unusual hobby.

Once you visit him in his home, 14387 Northville Road, you'd realize the unusualness of the hobby as he now possesses 28 organs of vintage dating back to the old "rocking melodian" of 1840.

You'll find organs in every room in the home, some on the front porch and there even was one on the walkway.

World War II," LeRoy stated, "and the folding type was used—even as late as the Korean War."

WHILE HE IS well pleased with the progress of his students in the science classroom, there is a gleam in his eye when he talks about the old organs.

He confides that he likes nothing much better than to take an old frame and then work on it, get the parts, and rebuild it into playing condition.

Not alone is he proud of the rebuilding of the musical instrument parts, but he is es-

pecially interested in bringing the wooden cabinets and the frames into old time standards.

One of the things that was surprising in his explanation is the difference in the reed and pipe organs. And he pointed out that in modern times the pipes that are visible on an organ are just plain wooden tubes, and don't have much to do with the quality of the music.

"They are just for show," he said.

The science teacher should know, because with his unusual hobby he has become an expert on organs.

TO MAKE the hobby more unusual is the fact that LeRoy, who is a science teacher at Holmes Junior High School in Livonia and a member of the board of trustees at Schoolcraft College, is the fact that he doesn't read music.

"I have been fascinated by organs ever since I was a child," LeRoy confided. "My grandmother had one down in Indiana and I liked it as a child. I never have lost the love of the organs since then."

After he married, he and his wife, who can read music and play, they decided to purchase an organ. This was done when they spotted one of their liking in the antique shop in Northville.

"This was a fine instrument," he went on, "but it didn't have all the things my wife thought it needed."

"There was nothing else to do, but purchase another one and got what we needed."

This started him in the rebuilding of old organs.

"I went to the library and even out to Greenfield Village to study old organs," LeRoy continued. "At Greenfield Village I got acquainted with a Dr. Eliason, curator of music at the famed Ford museums."

"It wasn't difficult to learn with such a teacher and the fact that my grandfather was a fiddler and my wife a player."

AS HE SPOKE the science teacher fondled his favorite—the Rocking Melodian—that he obtained in Concore, New Hampshire.

"This is the first type of instrument we had in the United States," he said as he rocked the instrument back and forth and up and down on his lap.

His wife, Lynette, smiled as he explained the early instruments, then sat down and played one.

Following the rocking melodian came the table models, and later the cabinets were introduced about 1860.

According to Bennett, the high type organ didn't arrive on the scene until about 1881. Then came the player piano and almost ran the pipe organ men out of business.

"The organ again became popular in

Board to face farmer equity problem Tuesday

On Tuesday, July 13, a group of 17 or 18 farmers from Western Canton will be seeking some answers from the township board about the fate of their property.

They have questions, as do other township residents about the recently passed master land use plan and whether they will be reimbursed financially for their depreciated property.

The farmers own almost half of the land that would be zoned agricultural-industrial. Under the plan, about 5,600 acres would be zoned agricultural-industrial and would be subject to a tax break which would allow the land to be taxed on its "use-value" rather than its potential as developable property.

The farmers expected to be on hand Tuesday night own about 2,500 acres in the agricultural-industrial district.

Bart Berg, one of two planning commissioners to vote against the plan, and one of the spokesmen for the group, emphasized that the farmers don't oppose the plan, but want to know if and how a solution will be provided so they will not lose money.

WHILE SUPERVISOR Robert Greenstein, a strong advocate of the plan, has said that some property owners should be reimbursed, he has presented no concrete plans.

Presently U.S. Reps. William Ford (D-Taylor) and James O'Hara (D-Utica) are investigating the possibility of using federal funds to purchase the development rights of the affected properties.

But they said existing legislation probably won't cover Canton's plan.

Greenstein has suggested purchasing the development rights as one would purchase mineral rights to land, so the farmers can continue to till the soil while getting at least a portion of the money they might receive if they sold it as developable property.

Several weeks ago, following the approval of the plan at the township planning commission level, the Wayne County Planning Commission gave its approval to the plan conditionally.

The county planners said they approved of the plan as long as due consideration was given to equity.

Greenstein said, however, that not all affected property owners would be paid, and that those paid would not receive the full value of their land.

He added he didn't know when the development rights would be paid, and that the hardship cases and sensitive lands would be handled first.

"WHAT WE'RE looking for is a formula—that's what we want the answers to," Berg explained. "Mr. Greenstein has made a commitment that the farmers will be handled fairly, but we don't know when or how."

"Some of us have been taxed as if the land were going to be developed for 10 to 12 years, and there's got to be some compensation for that."

Berg said he didn't know if the board or Greenstein would have any concrete answers about reimbursing the farmers, and added, "we can be left in limbo for only so long."

Berg said the farmers were not fighting the plan. "If we can get these development rights paid off fairly, I know a lot of farmers will stay and continue to farm in Canton."

"They've even said they'll buy land from those who want to leave—but it's just a question of how fairly it's handled."

Perhaps the most significant question the farmers want answered is how their land will be appraised, assuming the development rights will be purchased.

"It's a question of what year they'll use as a base for determining value," Berg explained. "Ever since talk started about this plan the values have dropped. Would it be fairer to use values prior to the disclosure of the plan or values based on recent past property sales transacted in the area involved?"

Berg added, "It's gotten to the point where no one even wants to talk about buying land out there because of the plan."

JOE HUDSON, of J.L. Hudson Real Estate in Plymouth concurred with Berg's assessment of the situation. "The bottom of the market has fallen out," he said.

Referring to a piece of property on Warren Road west of Canton Center that went for \$4,500 several years ago, he said it would be hard to get more than \$1,500 for it now.

"I'd say values have dropped at least 50 per cent and more in some instances," he commented.

"In some places you can't give it away."

Berg said if the board can't give some answers about a timetable and formula for reimbursing the farmers for development rights, he may ask the board to put the issue on the November ballot to see if township residents would be willing to pay.

Gollwitzer said he is traveling to Chicago tomorrow in an attempt "to pin down the FAA" on what the townships have to do.

"I want to know what we have to do that the road commission doesn't."

The supervisor said the FAA may request that the townships form an authority to run the airport.

IN THAT case he said, it would be necessary for the member communities to pass a tax hike—probably one-half mill.

"That doesn't mean we'd ever have to collect the money," Gollwitzer said. "It would depend on how the airport does."

The Van Buren supervisor said it's hard

to determine if the airport would be a successful financial venture.

"It depends on whose financial studies you look at. It seems that when the air freight business is going well the airport makes money, and when it's down, it doesn't."

But, he said he expected with efficient management, something he thinks the airport doesn't have now, it could be run at at least a break-even point.

Gollwitzer added whimsically that he expects the FAA to be uncooperative. Saying the federal agency is of a "similar stripe" to the road commission, he commented, "I expect them to tell us that we aren't financially capable of managing the airport."

"I expect they'll set the financial criteria above whatever we can raise."

William Sutherland, assistant director of transportation for the road commission, expects work to begin on a segment extending from the Penn Central Railroad crossing north to Michigan Ave. in the "near future." Plans call for a two-lane road with widened pavement near Michigan.

The road should be completed this year, Sutherland said, providing weather conditions are favorable.

Van Buren have consented to join the commission, but Gollwitzer said he has hopes that other governmental entities in Wayne and Washtenaw will join—although the relationship with some Washtenaw communities has been strained as a result of Van Buren's endorsing the road commission's superpower plan.

Gollwitzer said he is traveling to Chicago tomorrow in an attempt "to pin down the FAA" on what the townships have to do.

"I want to know what we have to do that the road commission doesn't."

The supervisor said the FAA may request that the townships form an authority to run the airport.

IN THAT case he said, it would be necessary for the member communities to pass a tax hike—probably one-half mill.

"That doesn't mean we'd ever have to collect the money," Gollwitzer said. "It would depend on how the airport does."

MSU scores high in business

The Michigan State University College of Business has been ranked one of the top in the country by business school department chairmen, according to a survey published in the Journal of Business.

Chairmen, members of the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business, were asked to list the five schools which they believed had the best programs in their functional areas.

A total of 750 survey requests were sent to chairmen in five areas. The researchers received a response rate of 36.8 per cent.

MSU ranked in accounting, finance, marketing and management (organization theory and behavior). Rankings were also made in management science, however, MSU does not offer this program.

MSU's accounting program rated a sixth place at the doctoral level and 10th at the master's level. The finance master's program ranked 14th. Marketing ranked eighth at the Ph.D. level and seventh at the master's level. MSU was 15th at the Ph.D. level in management and 10th at the master's level.

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Canton bus route heads for Detroit

For the first time ever, Canton residents may board a bus to downtown Detroit from a stop in their own municipality.

The Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) recently established Route 240, which will take residents from the Ford and Canton Center intersection to downtown Detroit.

A SEMTA bus will take residents on the Canton-Detroit journey each weekday. Pickup is scheduled Monday through Friday at 6:03 a.m., 6:33 a.m., 7:03 a.m. and 7:33 a.m. at the Ford and Canton Center intersection. Drop-off is scheduled at 6:09 p.m., 6:34 p.m. and 7:04 p.m.

The bus will make stops at Ford and Wayne roads; Cherry Hill and Wayne; Cherry Hill and Merriman; Cherry Hill and Inkster; Cherry Hill and Telegraph; Cherry Hill and Outer Drive; Michigan and Military; Michigan and Monroe; Michigan and Greenfield; Michigan and Schaefer; Michigan and Wyoming; and Shelby and Michigan.

The bus will then begin its westbound journey and make an additional stop at Michigan and W. Grand Blvd. Detroit-bound passengers may transfer to other SEMTA routes at Cherry Hill and Inkster.

On Saturday, Canton residents may board a bus to downtown Detroit at Ford and Venoy roads at 7:35 a.m. and embark from the bus at the same intersection at 6:34 p.m.

Other routes are scheduled from stops in Westland Monday through Friday. For additional information on bus routes, residents may call SEMTA toll-free at 1-800-462-5161.

Senior citizens may travel for half fare on SEMTA buses Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. Half fares are also in effect all day Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

Countries added to direct phone line

Canton telephone customers in the 397 and 981 exchanges may now dial direct to Chile, New Zealand, Peru and Singapore.

The four additions to the International Direct Distance Dialing (IDDD) network brings to 36 the number of countries that Michigan Bell customers with the new service can dial without operator assistance.

More than 600,000 business and residence telephone customers in Canton and the Detroit metropolitan area have IDDD service, according to Haze Wilson, local Michigan Bell manager. The service can be offered only in exchanges served by electronic switching systems.

In addition to the four countries recently added to IDDD, customers may call Andorra, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Taiwan, Costa Rica, Denmark, El Salvador, France, Germany, Greece, Guatemala, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Philippines, the Republic of South Africa, San Marino, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, the Vatican City and Venezuela.

Wilson said the United Kingdom heads the "frequently-called" list with about half of all IDDD calls from Michigan. Belgium, France and Germany are next with about seven per cent of the total.

A three-minute IDDD daytime call to Western European countries that have IDDD service costs \$6.75, Wilson said, and, in most cases, the rates are even lower at night. A three-minute IDDD call to the United Kingdom costs \$3.60 day or night.

About 70 Detroit telephone exchanges currently have IDDD service. The service will be offered to more customers in the future, Wilson said, when Michigan Bell replaces older switching systems with new electronic ones.

Later Dodge said those elected officers July 1 would perform necessary functions as officers until Monday under the presumption of validity. "They can function under a presumption of validity unless challenged," Dodge added, "although, admittedly, this presumption is weakened by tonight's (Tuesday) recognition by the board that officers were improperly elected."

Although some board members expect the outcome of the election will be unchanged Monday, there are reports of political pressures being applied against at least one trustee to change his or her vote on the chairmanship. That pressure conceivably could change the election results Monday.

Lawton and Yack denied any knowledge of behind-the-scenes maneuverings and stated their belief the election outcome wouldn't change.

When he left the village manager's job in 1927, Sidney Strong returned to the profession for which he had been trained. He opened a local office as surveyor and civil engineer.

Strong, a native of Kalamazoo, held a BA from Kalamazoo College (1905) and a BS in civil engineering from the University of Michigan (1907). Before coming to Plymouth, he worked 12 years at Sault Ste. Marie in the U.S. Engineer's office, and had been city engineer and assistant city manager at the Soo for two years.

ONE OF STRONG'S first jobs at the U.S. Engineer's office was to make hydraulic computations for a series of compensating gates to be placed across the St. Mary's River to control the level of Lake Superior.

His computations, which took two years to complete, were applied to the construction. When he visited the locks 50 years later (in 1959) he found that his figures were still being used.

From 1944-54, Strong worked for the Wayne County Road Commission. After he retired from that job, he continued to practice civil engineering from his home at 1251 William Street. Although he was no longer village manager, he continued to serve the community in many capacities. He spent many years in appointed municipal posts. For decades he was a member of the Plymouth Planning Commission. He was its chairman for more than a dozen years.

He was a charter member of the Plymouth Rotary Club and was one of the area's most prominent Scout executives. In 1922, he organized Troup P-1 here and held many high level positions in scouting, including that of special commissioner of the Sunset Division.

Mrs. Strong also was prominent in local civic affairs. Alice Strong served nine years on the Plymouth Board of Education, and was the first woman to be president of the board. The Strong's observed their 50th wedding anniversary here in 1959. Mrs. Strong died in July 1966, and Sidney in October 1969 at the age of 85.

STRONG WAS followed as village manager by a Detroitier whose name he could not recall. Then came Adolph J. Koenig, an ex-school teacher. Koenig was Plymouth's last village manager before the community adopted the city form of government.

In his 1929 report, issued when George Robinson was president of the village, Koenig noted that the village budget for the year was \$108,585. That compares with the city budget in 1976 of \$2,485,620. The tax rate in 1929 was 15 mills on an assessed valuation of \$7.2 million compared to a rate of 16.45 mills on a state equalized valuation of \$84 million in 1976.

In 1930, when the village population was 4,484, Koenig reported that laying dust on Plymouth streets that year consumed 70 tons of calcium chloride. In the same year, the village covered, with asphaltic compound, the unused interurban rails on Main Street.

THE FIRST MAN to manage Plymouth, after it was incorporated as a city, went on to become city manager of Kansas City and nationally-known in his field.

L. Perry Cookingham, who took office here in 1932, served in World War I, attended Detroit Institute of Technology, worked in the public works department in Flint, and was village manager at Clawson (1927-31) before he succeeded Koenig in Plymouth.

Plymouth had adopted the city form of government by popular vote on March 14, 1932. An organizational meeting of the first city commission was held on March 23. Robert O. Mimmack, who was to die in office on Aug. 27, 1932, became Plymouth's first mayor. On May 20, 1932, the village began to function as a city.

It was in May that 31-year-old Perry Cookingham arrived. The nation then was in the depths of the Great Depression. The new manager was told that the primary object of Plymouth's first city administration was to reduce taxes with as little curtailment of services as possible.

Cookingham went at his job with dispatch. He cut expenses to the bone. Herald Hamill, who did civil engineering work for the city while Cookingham was city manager, said he got the impression that "Cookingham would have fired even himself if he could have found anyone else to do the job better."

In his 1932-33 report, Cookingham announced that, working strictly on a cash basis, he had "operated the municipality during the first year of city form of government at a tax savings of \$23,700 under the last year of village government."

In 1933-34, while serving as city manager, Cookingham also served as deputy administrator of the Wayne County Emergency Relief Administration.

DURING COOKINGHAM'S administration, the old village hall was rebuilt and the dispute which arose between the city and township, when the village became a city, was settled.

During the fiscal year 1934-35, the city had obtained a judgment against Plymouth Township in the amount of \$4,425. The township told the city commission that the case would be appealed to the supreme court. The matter was settled out

of court, however, as a result of a joint meeting between the city commission and the township board during which it was agreed that the township would pay only \$2,212, or 50 per cent of the judgment. Other things that Cookingham did during

the depression years in Plymouth have been reported in chapter seven of my book, "The Story of Plymouth, Michigan: A Midwest Microcosm." (Part III will continue the story of Plymouth's city managers.)

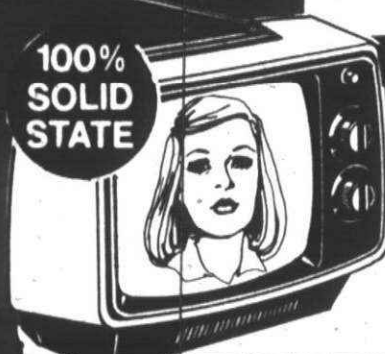


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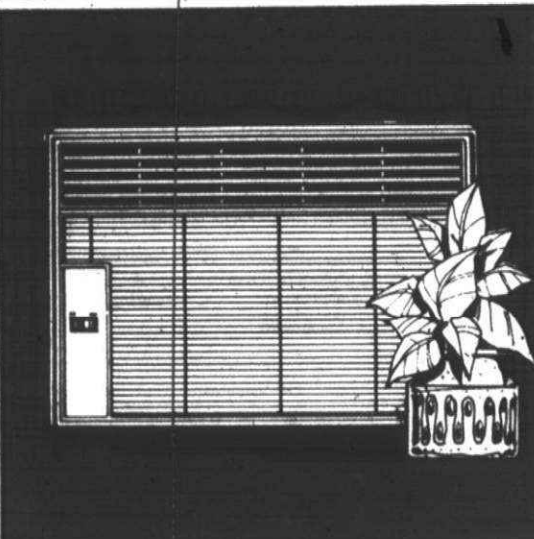


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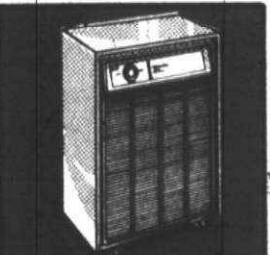


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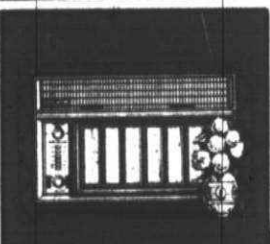
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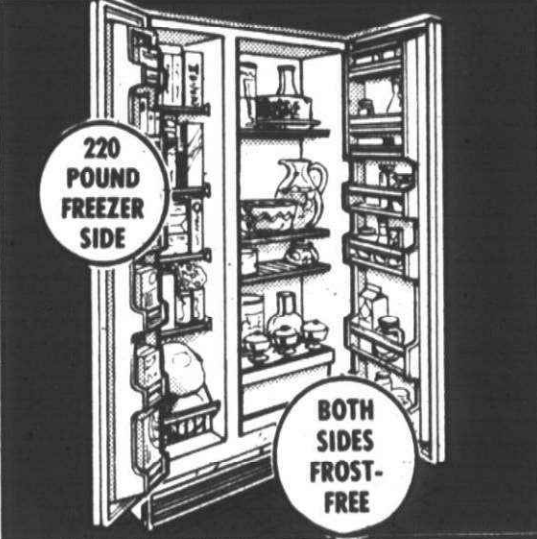


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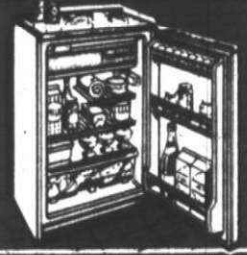


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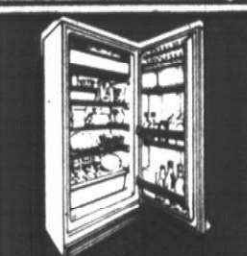
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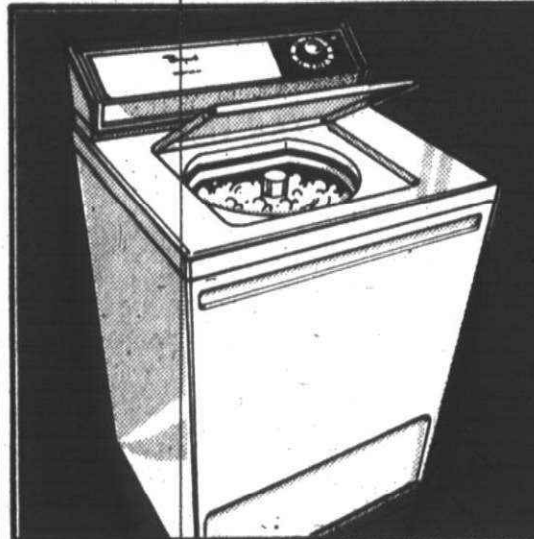


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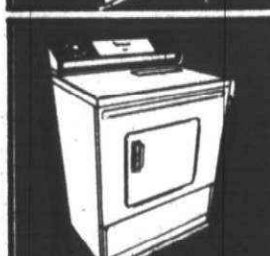
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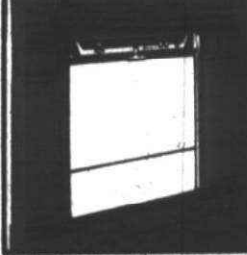


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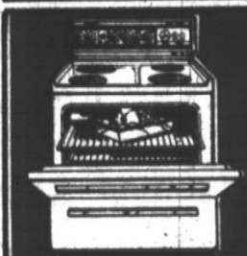
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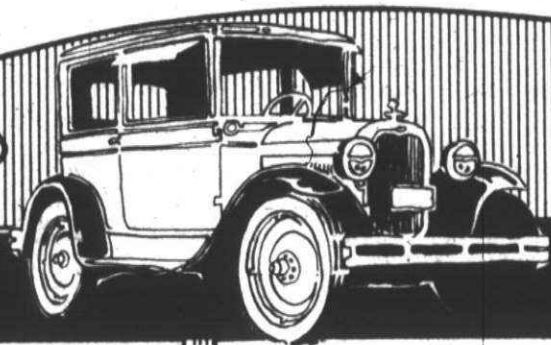
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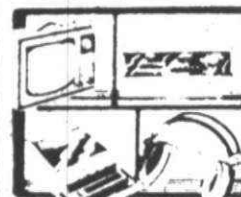


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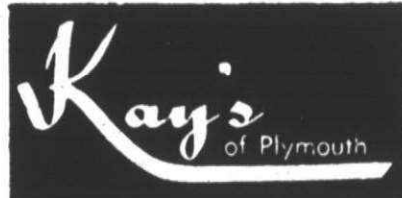
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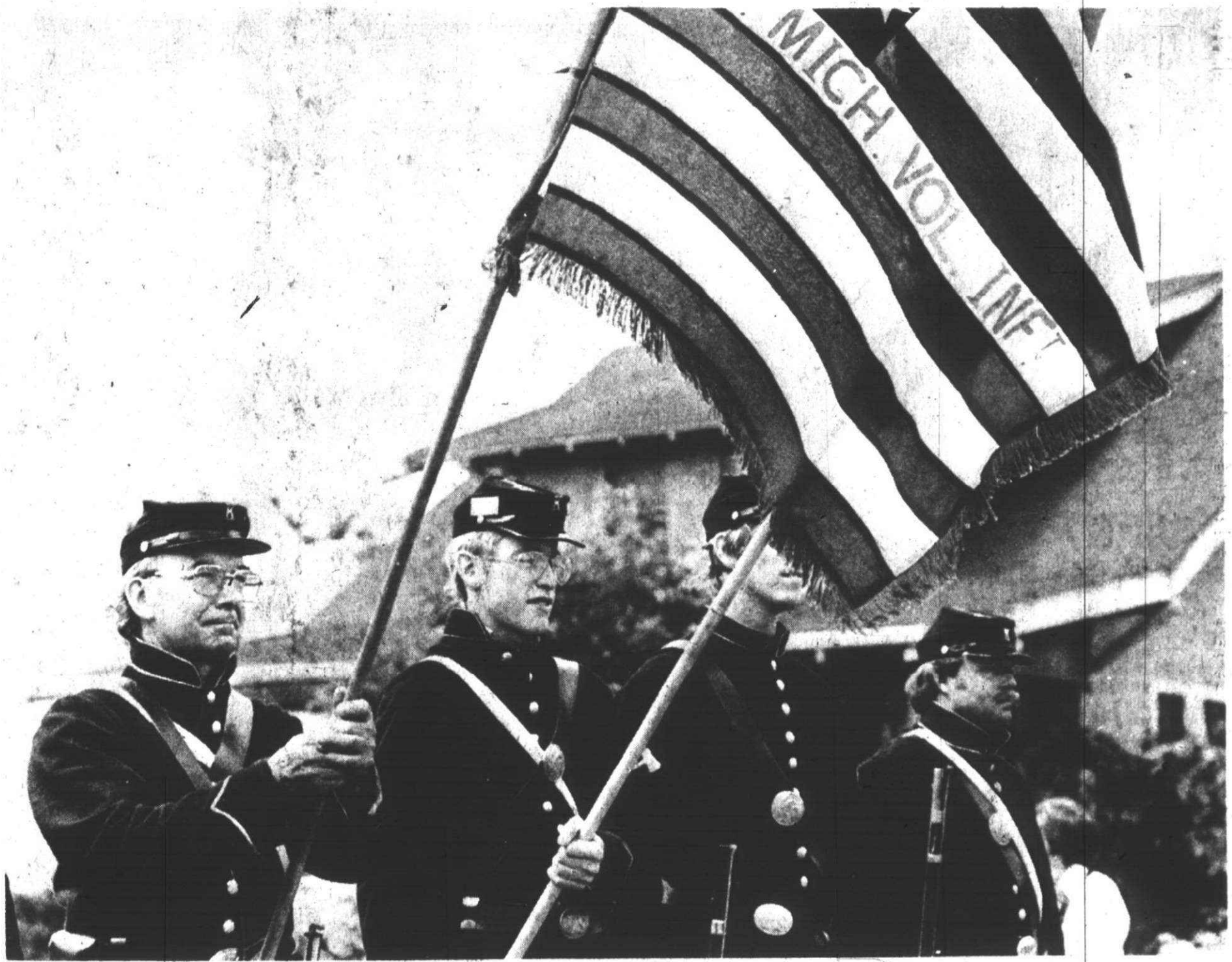

Thousands of spectators enjoy more of everything

Thousands lined Main Street Sunday to watch one of the largest parades on July Fourth in local history.

There were more floats, more bands, more marching units—more of almost everything, except for elephants of which there were two.

The Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps, senior unit, won the award for best band. Other first place awards went to: Plymouth Salem Rockettes, majorettes; Boy Scout Troop 1531, marching unit; Plymouth Business and Professional Women, first in floats, adult category; St. Peter Lutheran youth group, first in floats, youth category.

Members of the judging committee were W.W. Edgar of the Observer & Eccentric; Garey Beglinger, Doug Hincker, Marda Benson, and Edward Wendover of the Crier.

THE PARADE was staged without any serious problems although there were some long delays between units which kept spectators waiting. There were a couple antique automobiles which broke down enroute and couldn't finish, including the Alter car which is kept year-round in the Plymouth Historical Museum.

The elephants appeared in the parade, as is the tradition, under the sponsorship of Fred Hill. A couple weeks ago there were some fears the elephants would be unavailable this year, but arrangements were finally made. And again, as in past years, when the parade was ended the elephants were taken in by Jack Wilcox for watering down and a cool drink.

And the evening of July Fourth there also were thousands of spectators who showed up for the fireworks demonstration. After filling up the first parking lot, the Jaycees asked and received permission from Burroughs Corporation to open up the remaining parking lot to take care of the crowd of spectators. Nearby, parking lots at Hillside Inn were filled to capacity and cars were lined up along Plymouth Road from Mill east to Ann Arbor Road.

ONE OF THE groups in the parade which caught Plymouth's fancy was the all-girls marching band from Copenhagen, Denmark.

The band also had a busy weekend, appearing in Tiger Stadium to play the night before and appearing in Windsor for Canada's freedom festival. The band was unfortunate enough to appear the night the Bird was pitching for the Tigers, however, and were ushered out of the stadium after performing without being able to watch the game.

The night the group went to Windsor, some members had forgot their birth certificates and hurried phone calls were placed to host parents in Plymouth-Canton with many getting out of bed to rush down to the bridge with birth certificates.

MANY RESIDENTS will remember the Bicentennial Mile lantern passing, particularly those who participated in the event.

Before the lantern began its journey, Helen Gilbert of the Plymouth Historical

Society made these remarks: "Paul Revere—I give you this lamp—a symbol of our American liberty—the last great hope of mankind—may this brave beacon out of the past light our way with hope and faith—with charity and justice for all—may it serve as a guidepost in our continuing pursuit of life, liberty and happiness. Long live the Republic! Godspeed Paul Revere!"

ANOTHER message of the day came in the form of a letter from Arthur Floyd, the mayor of Plymouth, England, to the Plymouth community.

"Once again, it is the pleasurable duty of the Lord Mayor of Plymouth, England, to extend to the mayor and citizens of Plymouth, Michigan, the sincere greetings of the people of Plymouth, England," the mayor wrote.

"On this particularly significant Independence Day, 1976, when American citizens the world over will be celebrating the bicentennial of your country, it is of especial pleasure to us in Plymouth, England, to be able to indicate our particularly close ties with our namesake city in Michigan by means of the flying of our two national flags side by side adjacent to the four Imperial Locust trees originally presented by the people of Plymouth, Michigan, to one of my illustrious predecessors, the late Alderman Frank Chapman, in 1967.

"The trees, I am delighted to say, are in fine condition. Those damaged some little while ago are now almost fully recovered, and the display they form comprises a delightful feature of our civic precinct. Our thoughts are with you."

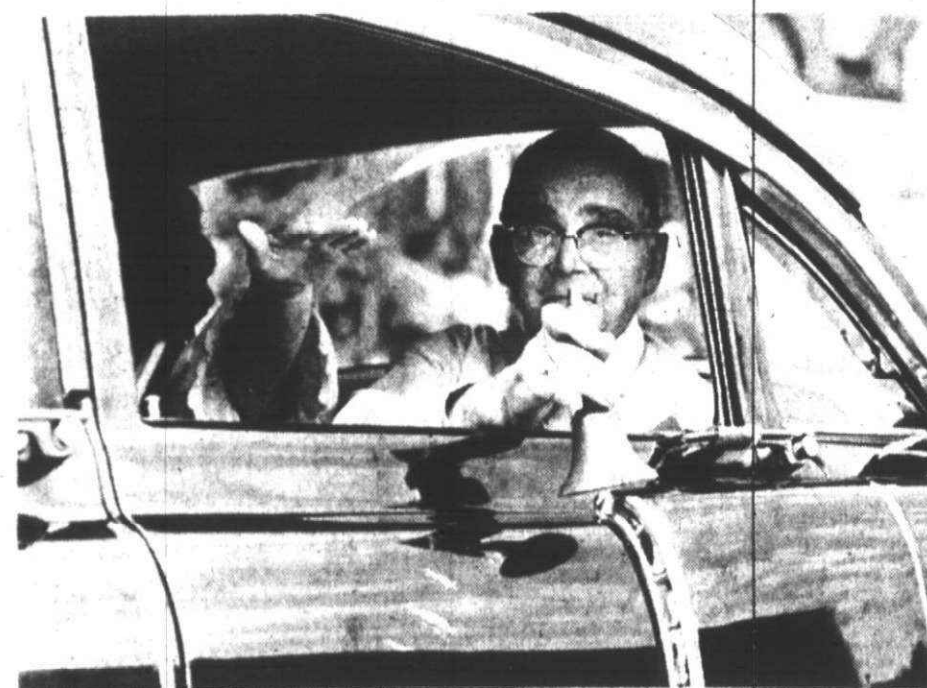
Charged with stabbing William Bruno Wolf, 12382 Risman, Plymouth, was Edward James Stinson, 898 Byron, Plymouth.

After the waitress returned an additional dollar to the defendant, Stinson found a \$1 bill on the ground and pointed it out to a friend. 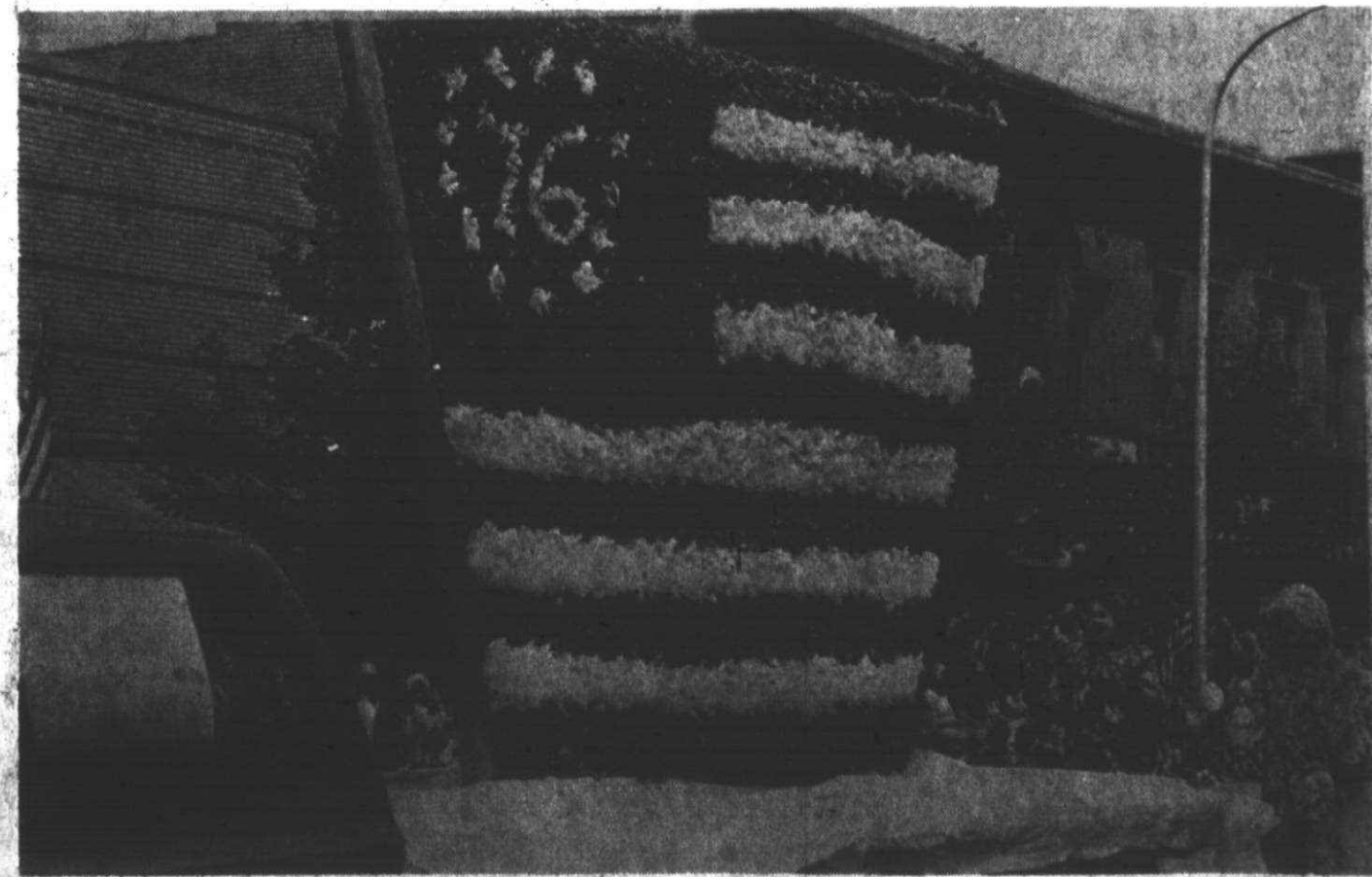
According to the police report, Stinson and Wolf began arguing. Stinson allegedly pushed Wolf in the chest and stabbed him in the left side of his abdomen.

4 local youths involved

Vigilantes 'arrest' tire slashers

A vigilante-like group of citizens "arrested" four young people during the early morning hours of July 4, after more than 40 vehicles in the Joy-Hix area of Livonia and Westland had their tires slashed.

Minimum damage estimates are in excess of \$2,500.

People on the 38500 block of Grandon in Livonia blasted the police for slow response time; while the police criticize the residents for adopting a policy of "street justice."

Three 15-year-old juveniles from Canton Township, Plymouth and Redford Township were released to their parents and await a hearing in juvenile court. A 19-year-old man, Milton F. Trombley of 8329 Caprice, Plymouth Township, has been arraigned before Judge Arpo Yeman on a felony charge of malicious destruction of property. He pleaded innocent.

WESTLAND'S Westwood Villa Apartment residents reported 16 complaints of tire slashings to Westland police. The apartment complex is less than 1/4 mile east of Hix and Joy Road, near Grandon.

By Tuesday, Livonia police had received 19 tire slashing complaints from people on Grandon and one from a person on Pere.

One family, on the corner of Hix and Grandon, had a total of ten tires slashed on four vehicles at their house. Some residents had to stay home on the Monday holiday because of the destruction.

"The people on this block were mad," said Thomas Lynch of 38527 Grandon. "They were mad about their tires being slashed and they were mad that the police took more than two hours to send somebody out here to question the suspects we had detained."

Lynch's neighbor, Frank Bitner, 38727 Grandon, spotted the four suspects walking down Grandon at Hix about 1:05 a.m. while he was searching for the culprits on a bicycle.

Bitner says the four were "strolling down the street eating donuts." It was evident, said Bitner, that three of the young people "had no business walking the streets after 1 a.m."

So, Bitner said, he told the four to stick around until the police came and pounded his flashlight into his fist to emphasize the point. Lynch was also there by that time with a pistol which he kept inside a case. Neighbors surrounded the four young people under "citizen's arrest" who sat on the grass waiting for police to arrive.

"I told them, 'Go ahead and run. I'll blow your back out,'" said Lynch. "We didn't search them or hit them and they didn't go anywhere. They sat there on the edge of the curb, on the grass."

Lynch said he and Bitner had to stop a few irate residents from trying to avenge their tire slashings against the four young people who were being held.

Lynch said no one knew if these were the people who committed the vandalism "but we weren't about to let them run off in case they were."

NEIGHBORS AND POLICE dispatch records agree that the first police car arrived at 38882 Grandon at 1:14 a.m. answering the first report of a tire slashing. The police say they had not yet received word from a later call, that four suspects had been apprehended by Bitner and Lynch, so, after taking the report, the police car was sent on another run.

Mrs. Bitner says she called police to tell them four young people were being held at 1:12 a.m. and claims that the neighbors had to wait until after 3 a.m. before police returned.

One of the people on Grandon said police referred to the Grandon Street residents as "troublemakers." This could stem, according to the man, from the fact that police were repeatedly called during a recent graduation party held in the field behind Grandon.

Neighbors on Grandon say it took police more than two hours to come back to question, and eventually arrest, the four young people.

Richard Widmaier of the Livonia Police Department says the police records show that the call informing police that four young people were being held by residents came in at 1:12 a.m. Widmaier says "the damage had been done" and when dispatchers informed the officers of the new information, the patrol car had already left on another call.

"WE WERE informed that there were four subjects sitting on the grass," said Widmaier. "We told the people that there were no units free at the time, that they were all tied up at the moment. There was no indication of an emergency and the people were evidently informed that a car would be sent as soon as possible."

Widmaier says the log shows the patrol car returned to Grandon at 2:06 a.m. to begin questioning the neighbors and the four young people detained by citizens. Widmaier says the police log indicates that the patrol car left Grandon at 3:40 a.m. after arresting Trombley and the three youths.

Chief Robert Turner bristled at the neighbor's complaints about police reaction time.

"I hate to use profanity to say what I think of it," said Turner. "These people are so far off it's pathetic."

Turner said people on Grandon became upset when the police left after taking one damage report.

"The officer on the scene saw that there were 25-30 cars slashed," said Turner. "These people wanted that officer to take a report from each of those persons. They would have liked to have seen all five cars out there taking reports all night. We told them to come in the next morning and fill

out a report at the station. But I don't know where they get this two hours stuff."

Turner said that since "this was no murder, no stick-up" the car was sent back when it was free—at 2:06 a.m.

The chief criticized the residents vigilante tactics saying, "You can't hold street justice."

"Those four kids were lucky to get out of that street alive," said Turner. "I know the people were hot about the destruction but they had no legal right at that point to arrest those kids. Later, the officer found a sheath that fit a knife found at the scene, and that's the first time there was a probable cause for arrest."

Lynch, one of the people who made the "citizen's arrest," defended the resident's action saying, "If police aren't going to come when you need them, it's up to the citizens to take the proper steps. In the constitution, I am guaranteed the right to protect my property and given the right to bear arms."

Lynch was the one who found the alleged slashing tools, which police are using as evidence against Trombley. A pen knife, a hunting knife and an ice pick were reportedly found stuck into the sod in front of Trombley's house where the four young people sat waiting for police to arrive.

INSURANCE COMPANIES will handle most of the complaints, but many of the residents said they want the young people to pay for the damage if they are convicted of the crime. "And that includes the three juveniles," said one of the people on the street.

The three juveniles are scheduled to appear in juvenile court on the matter and are reportedly ready to testify against the 19-year-old Trombley, according to police.

Trombley's trial exam is set for July 13 in 16th District Court and he is being held on \$5,000 bond.

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Every American is familiar with the story of George Washington and his troops suffering through the agonizing winter of 1777-78 at Valley Forge without food, clothing or warmth.

Starving (or fasting) men often experience hallucinations, visions and unusual psychic experiences. The father of our country was no exception. He described his experience to his close friend, Anthony Sherman of Philadelphia.

Sherman was so impressed that he took care to write down every detail right away. He told the story again and again during his long lifetime. It was published in a Mormon periodical in 1865 and in the National Tribune in December 1880.

AFTER SPENDING several hours alone

in his quarters, Washington came out and told Sherman and another officer that he had looked up to see a beautiful woman standing beside him.

Whether she was a ghost or an angel, he could not say. But his unearthly visitor addressed him as "Son of the Republic" and implored him to "look and learn" as a white vapor rose and scenes from the future were played out before him.

The slave problem, the Civil War and the Union's triumph all were foretold in detail. It is true that these things had already taken place at the time of the National Tribune report in 1880. However, Washington's vision did not stop there.

The apparition also disclosed to him great cities, the likes of which he had

never seen, springing up from the Atlantic to the Pacific; three earth-shattering world wars, the third to be the most fearful; and internal turmoil much like that our government has experienced recently.

Washington's words were, "I don't know whether it is owing to my own anxiety of mind or what."

Whatever caused him to have this vision, it has proven quite accurate to date.

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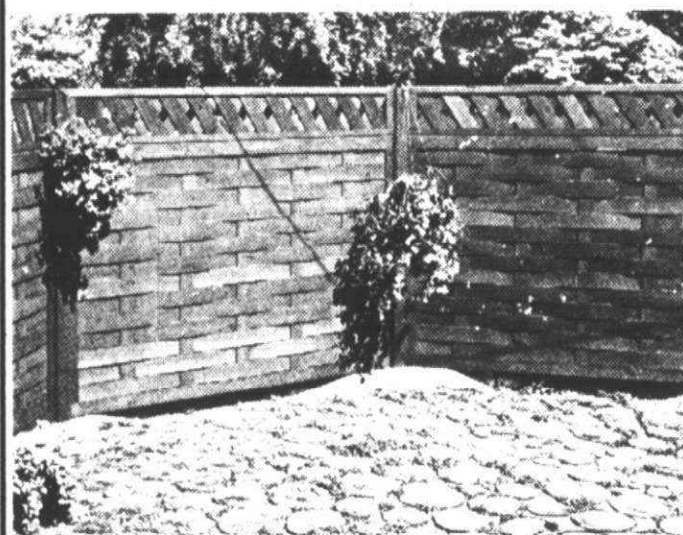
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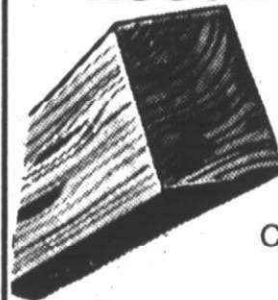
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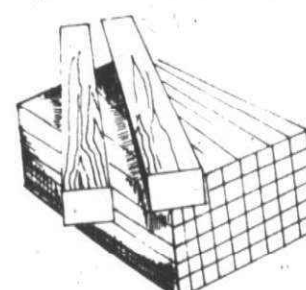
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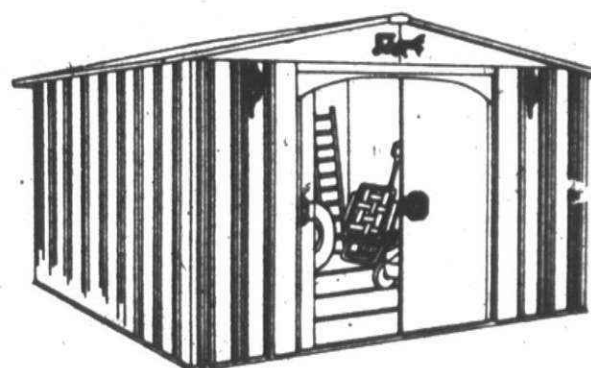
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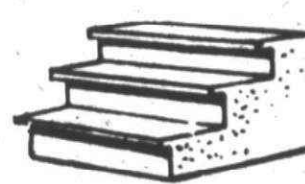
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Metric system better, says EMU math prof

Eastern Michigan University mathematics professor Donald Buckeye predicts the demise of the antiquated English system of weights and measures now used in the U.S. by 1980.

"They just don't measure up to the more logical, internationally used metric system," he said.

"Children now in Michigan's elementary schools will never use the English system when they get older," Buckeye said.

"Michigan is one of 13 pilot states which has committed itself to teaching the metric system. The department of education has already set up a number of clinics in the metric system for teachers."

Buckeye, author of "I'm OK-You're OK. Let's Go Metric" and "Introducing the Metric System with Activities," has been conducting workshops on the metric system around the country. He emphasized that in order to learn the system, you have to think metric.

"The only way to learn the metric sys-

tem is to use it," he said. "Converting English weights and measurements into metric equivalent is often difficult, so we try not to teach conversion at all."

Buckeye bases his methods on the activity approach, and has come up with projects and games which teach the metric system by using it. Many of these games and teaching aids are available for teachers to borrow from Buckeye's Metric Center on the EMU campus.

BUCKEYE SAID he might begin an introduction to the metric system by drawing an analogy between it and America's monetary system.

A dollar, he said, might be equivalent to a meter. One tenth of a dollar is a dime; one tenth of a meter is a decimeter. One tenth of a dime is a cent; that portion of a decimeter is a centimeter. A cent broken down into tenths is a mill; a tenth of a centimeter is a millimeter.

"It's much easier than most people think," he said. "It's all based on tens.

Once you're using the metric system, to do conversions, you simply divide or multiply by 10.

"For instance, 356 centimeters equals 3.56 decimeter, which equals 3.56 meters. Try doing the same thing with inches, feet and yards."

A GOOD ACTIVITY for metric system beginners, said Buckeye, is to have children make a metric string complete with markings from a metric tape measure. The students would then measure their height and various parts of their bodies.

Among his other think metric exercises are the following activities:

- Have a millimeter worm and an inch worm crawl along the same measured distance—compare the number of units each travels.

- Make a daily weather report entirely in metrics, with temperature in Celsius degrees, windspeed in kilometers per hour and visibility in meters or kilometers.

• Have a bad word contest, in which each person who uses an English unit of measure is assessed a simple, humorous penalty.

An Ohio, public school teacher for 15 years before coming to EMU, Buckeye

said children should have few problems learning the metric system if they are taught properly.

"It will be a larger problem for adults and teachers who have learned the English system."

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Know your contractor before signing

It's summertime and you may be thinking about fixing up your home or building a new one. Unless you're an unusually skilled do-it-yourselfer, this means hiring someone to do that job for you.

Since a home is probably your largest single investment, be careful about whom you pick to work on it.

In Michigan, state law requires a person who builds homes to be licensed as a residential builder.

People who do repair work must be licensed maintenance and alteration contractors. This includes everything from put-

ting in a swimming pool or air conditioning to putting up new siding or even moving a house.

Before you have any work done, ask to see a contractor's license. If he doesn't have one, find someone who does. And be sure to tell your county prosecutor about any contractor working without a license because he is breaking the law.

If you don't like a contractor's work, say so. If you can't get satisfaction, you can enlist the help of the state government by sending a written, signed statement of the problem to: Department of Licensing and

Regulation, Builders Division, 1033 South Washington, Lansing 48926.

The department will investigate your problem and report its findings to everyone involved. It may even set up an informal conference between you and the contractor to talk over your differences while a department representative acts as a referee.

If this doesn't work, the department can hold a formal hearing which works much like a trial. Both you and the contractor may present evidence, question witnesses and have an attorney present.

Parks offer bicentennial publications

Looking for historic reading material to whet your appetite for knowledge during the bicentennial year?

If so, Michigan's Mackinac Island State Park Commission has a few suggestions.

"Dr. William Beaumont: The Mackinac Years," selling for \$1, is a favorite of history buffs, says David Armour, assistant superintendent of state parks at the island and nearby Mackinaw City.

"The publication traces the day-to-day

experiences of the life of Dr. Beaumont, post surgeon at Fort Mackinac from 1820-25, who is best known for his experiments and observations of the human digestive system," added Armour.

In 1822, a young fur trader named Alexis St. Martin was accidentally shot in his chest and abdomen at close range at an island store established by John Jacob Astor. Beaumont was summoned and treated St. Martin for nearly three years

before he realized that he could observe the process of digestion—through an opening in the man's stomach that had not healed.

Beaumont made the first report on his observations in 1826, and a subsequent book published in 1833 is still considered one of the classics in research by medical doctors.

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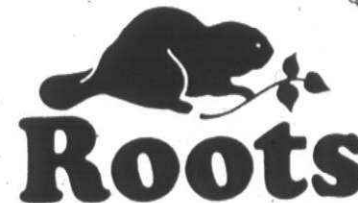
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Stargazers look up to Milky Way

The next time you're out enjoying an early evening stroll, stop for a minute and look up at the sky.

Rising almost parallel to the eastern horizon and extending as a giant arch from north to south is a broad hazy band of light known as the Milky Way.

Until the invention of the telescope, nobody knew what the nature of the Milky Way really was. According to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel Losh, ancient peoples saw it as a starry path, others as a glistening river or heavenly snake.

"Some American Indians saw it as dust kicked up by a buffalo and horse racing across the sky," Prof. Losh says. Today, she adds, modern instruments show that the cloudy appearance of the Milky Way is caused by myriads of stars which cannot be separated by the unaided eye. It is believed to be the projection of our galaxy.

"IT IS thought that we are located three-fifths of the way between the center and edge of the galaxy," she observes.

"It is unusually bright in summer because we are looking through its farther border and therefore through a greater number of stars than during the winter."

The Michigan astronomer notes that several constellations are projected against the Milky Way, including Cygnus, the Swan, which may be seen "flying south along the starry path."

"In Cygnus are bright star clouds and here the 'stream' splits into two branches, the western extending to Scorpius, the eastern to Sagittarius."

Sagittarius, the Archer, contains the richest star clouds in the sky. In this region, according to Prof. Losh, is the "vast nucleus of the galactic system, some 30,000 light-years away."

THROUGHOUT JULY, the planet Venus will be emerging in the west as an evening star even though its proximity to the setting sun will make it difficult to discern. The red planet Mars, the target of the Viking space missions, will be found in the constellation Leo in the beginning of the month," she says.

Jupiter is serving as the bright morning planet, rising from two to four hours ahead of the sun in the constellation Taurus, Prof. Losh adds. Saturn, already too close to the sun for easy observation, passes behind it on July 29 and will be lost to view altogether for some time.

Wayne Dems left out of at-large delegation

A psychology professor, two full-time politicians and two attorneys are among the at-large delegates from suburban Michigan Democrats are sending to their national convention next week in New York City.

In the Observer & Eccentric circulation area, five persons from Oakland County communities and none from western Wayne County will be in the 33-member at-large portion of the 133-member state delegation.

The suburban contingent includes five delegates and three alternates. They were picked recently by the Democratic State Central Committee, governing body of the organization between conventions.

DELEGATES at-large will include: Morley Winograd of Troy, uncommitted. Now chairman of the Michigan Democratic Party. Winograd, 33, was in the haberdashery business when he was chairman of the Oakland County Democratic Committee.

Juanita Collier of Farmington Hills, for Jimmy Carter. "As a clinical psychologist (at Wayne State University), my major concern is the suggesting of humanistic models for infusion in our governmental process," she said.

Ms. Collier, 45, has been active in the 17th Congressional District organization.

Mary Novak Meyers of Troy, for Carter. Mrs. Meyers, 38, was deputy campaign

manager for Carter's Michigan effort in which the former Georgia governor picked up nearly half the May 18 vote. She is a member of the Democratic State Central Committee and Women's Caucus and is active in local party politics.

Robert F. Nederlander, Birmingham, for Carter. An attorney and University of Michigan regent, Nederlander, 43, is a member of the family that owns the Fisher Theater. He was Carter's finance chairman in Michigan and helped in the national Carter campaign.

Stuart F. Hertzberg, Bloomfield Hills, for Morris Udall. An attorney, Hertzberg, 49, has been a top party financial leader for 13 years and has been a national convention delegate five times in the past.

ALTERNATES from the area are: Patricia Anderson, 33, of Southfield, for Carter. A statewide Carter volunteer coordinator. Mrs. Anderson lists her occupation as wife and mother.

Donald F. Tucker, 29, Birmingham, for Udall. Active in past campaigns of Sen. Philip Hart and presidential nominee George McGovern, Tucker is a member of the party's finance committee.

Eugene W. Kuthy, 45, Orchard Lake, for Udall. The party's nominee for Oakland County executive in 1974. Kuthy has long been active in county Democratic politics and was a national convention delegate in 1964 and 1968.

State name might have been different

The name Metropotamia may sound a little strange to you, but if Thomas Jefferson had had his way you would have been living in a state by that name.

According to Francis Scannell, state librarian, that was one of the names Jefferson suggested in 1784 when Congress began discussing what to do with the Northwest Territory.

Jefferson's plan called for the creation of eight roughly rectangular states, each corresponding in size to the average of the original 13 states, which cross-hatch the five midwestern states we have today.

The other state names Jefferson sponsored ranged from Polypotamia (southern Illinois and Indiana) to Sylvania (northern Wisconsin, most of Upper Michigan and part of Minnesota).

Ultimately, however, Congress decided

that from three to five larger states would be more practical because it was thought that the land was less fertile in the Northwest Territory than in the East.

Also there was a growing concern that the new states, counting those being formed south of the Ohio River, could come to outnumber the original colonies in the Congress.

In those days, no one ever thought that the United States would come to possess the immense tracts between the Mississippi River and the Pacific Ocean.

It wasn't until 1802, however, that the first state, Ohio, was carved out of the territory. Under that act, the rest of the Midwest was referred to as the Indiana Territory.

Michigan, which Jefferson would have placed on the west side of Lake Michigan, became a state in 1837.

Law sets up bike paths

A new state law encourages townships to construct bicycle paths and sidewalks parallel to state highways and county roads.

The law amends Public Act 188 and sets up procedures for special assessments for bicycle paths and walkways.

The act also allows townships to write a hardship exemption, which could be used to grant full or partial exemptions to senior citizens on fixed incomes.

"This is significant legislation which complements the state's own bicycle path construction program and should promote the construction of more bikeways," Gov. William Milliken said.

The governor pointed out the state has

completed 25 bicycle path projects. About a half-dozen more are under construction now. The largest is a 40-mile bicycle path which parallels I-275 between Monroe and Novi. The department of state highways and transportation has spent about \$1 million on bicycle path development.

"It is important to continue our plans of bicycle path construction at the state level and to do what we can to promote such construction by communities, if for no other reason than to remove non-motorized vehicles from our roads and highways. Safety statistics show that 68 bicyclists were killed and 4,173 were injured in 1974, Milliken added.

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Ryan transit bill beaten; suburbs solidly opposed

Rapid transit isn't dead in southeastern Michigan. It just needs more work before the state legislature will pass an enabling bill.

That was the analysis of State Rep. W.V. (Sandy) Brotherton (R-Farmington) and others as the house of representatives Friday dealt a stunning defeat to a transit bill offered by Rep. William Ryan (D-Detroit), the house's single most powerful member.

The vote was 28-65, with all 12 area representatives voting against Ryan's version.

The house also decided against taking up the senate's version of the transit bill. Result: It will be September before the legislature can come up with a plan for the southeast Michigan region to raise its \$12 million annual share and qualify for federal and state rapid transit construction funding.

"THEY'RE SAYING we need the money now. That's not true," said Brotherton as he ate lunch at his desk following the tough morning debate.

The reasoning of transit supporters is that the supply of federal funds is being depleted, and southeast Michigan's chances are reduced with each passing day.

But Brotherton, a member of Ryan's urban affairs committee, countered: "Oct. 1 is a new fiscal year, and a whole new federal budget stream comes in."

The former Farmington mayor and Oakland County commissioner was harshly critical of the way funding for the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) has been handled in the legislature.

HERE'S THE THING that's incredible. When you come to a capital request, it's usually all spelled out—you want \$1 million for this building, \$2 million for that. But here (with SEMTA) we are being

asked to turn over \$12 million of revenue raising powers and \$26 million of state money and God-knows-how-much federal grants, and it's not spelled out.

"And no way is the federal money coming in until the City of Detroit agrees to sell D-DOT (the city bus system) to SEMTA."

Brotherton referred to the three years of negotiations between SEMTA and Detroit to unify the region's bus systems. SEMTA is opposed to legislative passage of any bill until the merger is completed.

RYAN WAS ALONE on the house floor with a crew of reporters after the vote, and the former speaker was philosophical about his bill's defeat.

"There's a societal attitude that anything that helps a city called Detroit is 'wrong,'" he said quietly. "We're going to give the federal government the image that our legislature can't put together a \$12 million bill while the New York Legislature shows it can get money for Buffalo."

Ryan wasn't angry with the road lobby, which had acquiesced to a combination of motor vehicle and property transfer taxes as a method of financing rapid transit construction.

But Ryan branded the real estate industry "absolutely irresponsible from beginning to end" in its heavy opposition to the property transfer tax increase.

SEVERAL OAKLAND County legislators took the floor to oppose Ryan's transit bill that morning.

Rep. Richard Fessler (R-Union Lake) called one part of the rapid transit program—a "people mover" for the Detroit Renaissance Center—"a tourist attraction" that shouldn't be financed from state or regional funds. Fessler condemned the property transfer tax because it applied to homeowners but not renters.

Brotherton said he supported the concept of rapid transit but found the tax plan "un-

fair and inequitable" and the program "a pig in a poke."

Rep. Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham) said she "would like to support it." But she cited resolutions from SEMTA and local governments urging the legislature not to restructure the SEMTA board until there was some assurance Detroit's bus system was to be merged with SEMTA's.

As if to answer Ryan's charge that legislators were antagonistic to Detroit, Mrs. McNamee said, "I'm not concerned with Detroit having the early benefit of rapid transit. You have to start somewhere."

Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Democratic floor leader in the house, at first voted for the Ryan measure. But when he saw the red lights from other representatives on the vote board indicating the bill was hopelessly defeated, he switched to a no vote.

THE HOUSE ALSO voted down, 46-49, an effort to bring up the senate version of the bill for action.

Supporting the parliamentary move were: R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), John Markes (D-Livonia), Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti), James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham), Forbes and Mrs. McNamee.

Opposed were: John Bennett (D-Redford), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), William Keith (D-Garden City), Brotherton, Mel Larsen (R-Oxford) and Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights).

The senate version, which passed that body 22-8 a week earlier, generally got more support from suburban legislators than Ryan's version.

The senate version called for a motor vehicle tax (instead of a combination of motor vehicle and property transfer taxes); a six-county tax (rather than a three-county tax); a 21-member SEMTA board with only four members from Detroit (instead of a 15-member SEMTA board with five members from Detroit).

SEMTA sets forum

The public will be invited to comment on different possible types of transit systems when the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) conducts the second in its series of open forums on public transportation policy.

One meeting will begin at 7 p.m., July 8 in the Oak Park Community Center, 14300 Oak Park Boulevard. The other will begin at 7 p.m., July 15 in the City-County Building at 2 Woodward, Detroit.

Express bus, light rail (the new name for streetcars), commuter rail and rapid rail will be the four modes under consideration.

These two citizen information meetings are the second round in a series sponsored by SEMTA in its year-long study of choices for a future public transit system, according to Joseph P. Bianco Jr., SEMTA board chairman.

Schoolcraft administrator at national workshop

Schoolcraft College director of physical education Marvin Gans attended the annual workshop for officers of state and district affiliates of the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education held recently in Washington.

"Right now while most communities see the importance of keeping our instructional programs in sports and physical education, others are making extensive cuts. We think these are ill-advised," Gans said.

"Children must learn while they're young to enjoy physical activity and care for their own health, or they never get to realize their full potential."

School board paying the price of secrecy

The signs are not healthy for openness in government based on the organizational meeting of the Plymouth Board of Education on July 1.

Although election of officers for 1976-77 will have to be held over again because it was conducted improperly, the community is left with the stain of slate politics and an attempt to decide board offices in a less-than-open manner.

The four majority votes last Thursday showed little confidence in the electorate when they moved to suspend the board's bylaws and cast secret, paper ballots for board offices. Any trustee who does not shrink from being accountable to the public should not have qualms about voting in the open by voice roll-call vote.

The many important decisions this board must make during the coming year will be made by voice vote. There won't be any secret, paper ballots on the tough decisions to be made in the months ahead. It was both wrong and silly to cast a secret ballot to elect officers.

IRONICALLY, the move to cast secret ballots was the one which has now placed the outcome of that election in question.

To vote by secret ballot, it was necessary to suspend the bylaws. To do so without advance written notice, the board attorney has since ruled, requires a unanimous vote of the board. But two trustees voted "no." And so, the election will have to be held again.

Apparently, Joe Gray, E.J. McClendon, Flossie Tonda and Richard Arlen were so intent on lining up votes for the chairmanship that they didn't bother to read the board's bylaws on how business is to be conducted. They came prepared to vote the slate in, but were ill-prepared for anything else.

Probably more important than the error in procedure is the fact that the wheeling and dealing had been completed prior to the organizational meeting. By the time the meeting had begun, the script had been written, and all that was left was the formal balloting—going through the motions to formally seal what had already been decided.

From a political standpoint, it may be seen as acceptable to line up your votes ahead of time and decide the outcome before the meeting begins. But such behavior is unbecoming a board which wishes to be accountable to the public and conduct its business in an open setting.

This newspaper hopes the four who lined up their votes for board offices will act independently, with the best interests of the community in mind, when it comes to voting on future issues. We expect they will, and have little reason to believe otherwise. But the beginning was less than reassuring.

The difficulty with slate politics is that individ-

ual members of the "team" feel obliged to vote one way on a particular issue because that's the way the team feels, instead of voting on one's individual judgment based on what's best for the community at large.

Trustees, in the past, have lined up on particular issues. But, in the past, those same trustees would side with other members on other issues. There was not a slate of any kind whose members would vote with each other on all issues. Because of that recent history, the Observer & Eccentric expects the current majority will continue to vote their consciences and will abandon the team approach. We regret, though, that the slate method had to be used to elect board officers. Government cannot mouth openness slogans. When the commitment is lacking, secrecy will creep out, and that's what happened July 1.

M-275: Road for the sake of a road

M-275, the proposed expressway to link I-96 and I-75 through western Oakland County, is an issue which has been simmering for a long time.

The main argument for the project is that it is a logical extension of the I-275 expressway now under construction in western Wayne County and southern Oakland County, linking Monroe on the south and Novi on the north. In this plan, it is interrelated with the long-standing hassle over the extension of Northwestern Highway, which would be a major connector for the proposed M-275.

Most if not all of these arguments came under a cross fire at a hearing set up by the state highway department on June 24 in Walled Lake. Even though the hearing was held in what amounts to secrecy (this newspaper was not informed of the schedule), both the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and the East Michigan Environmental Action Council, located in Troy, blasted the proposal.

Their reasons included destruction of the environment (especially a bog near Walled Lake), high noise levels, increased tax costs for local residents and property owners, and another corridor for "white flight" from Detroit.

ANY BALANCED evaluation of the M-275 proposal must take these arguments into account. An even more important point, particularly for people who live in northwestern Wayne County and southern Oakland County, is that of traffic congestion.

Anyone who has to drive on Haggerty Road, Pontiac Trail or Maple Road around rush hour has lived through one of the worst traffic jam problems in the entire metropolitan area. A strong argument can be made that M-275 would relieve this congestion by drawing traffic off the narrow roads and onto the multi-laned freeway.

made the perfectly valid point that "for every traffic jam M-275 would relieve, it would soon create two more somewhere else." But try telling that to someone who has been trying to get home in that area.

ANOTHER ASPECT of the discussion centers on a gradual change that has been taking place in the state highway department over the last 10 years. In the past, one had the distinct impression that the department advocated building expressways because that was its job.

Peter Fletcher, the new highway commission chairman, recognized the change recently: "We are no longer building roads just for the sake of building roads. I approach the entire issue of the building of new highways with a considerable degree of skepticism."

And, indeed, the MUCC advocated at the June 24 public hearing what it calls the "do-nothing alternative" toward M-275.

In response, the environmental impact study commissioned to examine the consequences of M-275, attacked this notion:

"Decreased accessibility resulting from increased travel time requirements would deteriorate advantageous characteristics of the project area and of the Detroit Metropolitan Area as a whole for the continued residential development

and for maintenance of pleasant residential surroundings."

After taking a while to puzzle through this officialese, what it seems to mean is that the highway department wants to build highways.

BUT FOR WHAT? And for whom?

The logic behind building expressways, in the last analysis, falls into one of two kinds of arguments: 1) To promote swift flow of existing traffic; 2) to encourage development.

As for the traffic flow argument, the Highway Department's proposal for M-275 makes some sense to relieve jams on southern Oakland County roads. It does not make sense when it tries to pretend that M-275 offers a way to bypass the metropolitan area for traffic coming along I-275. But it is just as effective—and much less expensive—to use I-96 and then northbound US 23.

The encouragement for development argument is harder to deal with, as one's position depends largely on whose ox is being gored.

For homeowners who prefer the peace and quiet of the countryside, or for those in search of calm recreational sites, the M-275 proposal is clearly wrong. For those who have an interest in development in the western part of Oakland County, the positions are reversed.

On balance, however, what we probably do not need more of in this already overcrowded metropolitan area is expressways.

M-275, as proposed, would accomplish little other than the temporary alleviation of traffic jams. On the negative side, it would spoil a lot of beautiful land, contribute to sprawl, and serve only the interests of those promoting development. The proposal should be stopped.

Conventions vs. democracy Dawdling DNR enforces the law when it's too late

It's political convention time again. The Democrats will meet next week in New York City, and the Republicans will meet next month in Kansas City.

A lot of money will be spent to further thwart the will of the people.

If you've never been to a political convention, you ought to try it sometime. All it takes is one to make you want to join the drive for direct election of the president by the voters, and the nomination of the parties' candidates by a single national primary election.

IT WON'T BE as bad this year at the Democratic convention, since it appears that the man who will be nominated has garnered the most popular votes in his party in the various state primaries.

However, he has not garnered more than 35 per cent of the votes cast for a Democratic candidate and really, then, represents a little more than a third of the people in his party who bothered to vote.

It will be worse at the Republican convention because the candidate, in a very tight election, will actually be nominated by the swing vote of people who were never elected to anything except convention delegates in very closed caucuses.

Delegates to national conventions are apportioned in a variety of ways, but primary based on the number of seats each state has in Congress.

In the case of the Republicans, since they have not elected a majority to Congress in a couple of decades, most of the delegates who will choose the Republican nominee will be from areas that will not support the candidate in the November election.

In addition, some states such as California, which had a winner-take-all-delegates primary, wash out the vote of a large percentage of the people who didn't happen to vote for the winner.

WE IN THIS COUNTRY take pride in calling ourselves a democracy. But we are not. We allow the candidate for the most important position in the country to be nominated by a group of party regulars and elected by an archaic electoral college.

Amendments to the Constitution have been offered over the last 10 years to make this country a true democracy.

The party insiders don't particularly want this to happen because they will lose their power. Yet, because of their political activity, the party regulars are the people who must decide what appears on what ballots.

We need electoral reform and yet, when we use those words, everyone thinks we are talking about campaign spending.

If we are to have a government of the people, by the people and for the people, then the people must elect their chief executive. This won't happen unless the people want it to happen and do something about it.



Dawdling DNR enforces the law when it's too late

A wildlife biologist from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources has written a note politely hinting that I should lay off whooping up enthusiasm for Nahanni, the educational wolf from rural Oakland County who was such a favorite among area schoolchildren.

The DNR, you'll recall, ordered Nahanni grounded after a biting incident involving not Nahanni but Caesar, the Westland lion. Nahanni's owners, Bob and Beth Duman of White Lake Township, asked for (and got) many letters from local folks asking for a change of heart at DNR. Alas, they have lost, and Nahanni today stays in her pen with her adopted puppy, Silver Chief.

Charlie Shick, the DNR biologist, wrote me: "It is unfortunate that the people who will be putting pressure on us to create a double standard in enforcing regulations didn't have the opportunity to read the attached news items."

Attached are articles about Caesar's biting the four-year-old deaf girl and a wire service story from New Jersey which reports a wolf chomped on a year-old girl when the child was held near it for picture-taking.

WELL, CHARLIE'S "double standard" remark made me gag just a bit. If anyone is guilty of a double standard of law enforcement, it's the friendly DNR. Consider: published feature stories on Caesar the lion's display during warm weather of 1975. DNR said nothing about it.

Last October, the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers published the feature on Nahanni, including a picture of her in a classroom; one of the television stations did its own feature soon afterward; newspapers across the metropolitan region and Grand Rapids have been publishing stories about Nahanni's visits to schools. DNR said nothing about it.

The incident of Caesar and the four-year-old girl occurred early in February 1976. A movie camera at the Lutheran School for the Deaf recorded the incident, and the film wound up on the television news.

At this point, the DNR swung into action.

grounding Caesar and Nahanni simultaneously under laws and rules that had been on the books for years.

One may fairly ask: If exhibiting Nahanni and Caesar was illegal to begin with, why didn't DNR crack down immediately instead of biding its sweet time until a child was hurt?

I'VE MET Nahanni and had no qualms about giving her a belly rub. I haven't met Caesar, but I would have no qualms about greeting him.

I'd have to agree it would be unwise, however, to let these animals, come in contact with children under the age of (say) 7 or with nervous or handicapped children.

Even if a predatory animal catches hold of a child in the gentlest way, it could do harm, even unintentionally, especially if the adults panic and try to pull the child away, which is what happened with Caesar and in the New Jersey wolf incident.

Wolves, moreover, pick out weak or diseased prey to kill. It would be most inadvisable, therefore, to expose a handicapped child to a predator.

It's regrettable that men, women and children will no longer be able to pet Nahanni and Caesar.

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Employers can get help for alcoholic workers

About eight per cent of the nation's work force suffers from a serious disease. It can cause an employee to lose his job, maim or kill himself in work-related accidents, have a high absenteeism rate and produce defective and dangerous products.

That disease is alcoholism, and until recently the only way employers dealt with it was by putting a pink slip in the employee's pay envelope.

Area employers now are beginning to recognize that alcoholism is a major problem among workers. A survey conducted for the Michigan Office of Substance Abuse by Michigan State University's marketing department revealed that 20 per cent of Wayne County companies are aware of employees with severe alcohol problems.

Knowing that a problem exists is just the first step. Companies and organizations are now starting to set up programs to help alcoholic employees through understanding rather than discipline.

TWO SERVICES in the metropolitan area now exist to teach businesses how to set up their own employee programs. Both the Office of Substance Abuse (OSA) Occupational Program and the Greater Detroit National Council on Alcoholism's (NCA) joint union-management program focus on re-educating the employer and keeping the worker on the job.

Each program is handled a little differently, but both have the same result in mind. Supervisors will be able to recognize and refer employees who appear to have problems with alcohol, and employees will be able to seek treatment without fear of losing seniority or their jobs. Both programs want management and labor to work together to aid the alcoholic employee.

LABOR UNIONS are among the strongest supporters of these programs, which they consider long overdue.

"Unions must keep prodding management. Companies are profit oriented, not

people oriented. They must remember they are dealing with people and not machines," says Berkley Watterson, a UAW community research staffer.

According to Watterson, the UAW has just published a manual on alcohol abuse and conducts conferences on the subject.

"In fact, our next negotiations will probably include discussions on how to develop these alcoholism programs further," he says.

"The programs are demonstrating that it is a joint project. It gives the worker some protection, some dignity," he says. "Both the UAW and management are committed."

The UAW spokesman also wants management to have patience with those undergoing treatment. "You can't expect a person who drinks compulsively for years to suddenly quit. The worker may have a number of relapses. The hope is that these relapses will become less and taper off."

According to Watterson, the UAW is concerned about treatment facilities.

"Some places are down in skid row. We are advocating facilities as nice as your doctor's office, rather than places where people are afraid to go for treatment."

Although the UAW has provisions to pay for such treatment under Blue Cross, not every employee has the same kind of company benefits. This may account for the fact that fewer than 10 per cent of the nation's alcoholics receive treatment.

BOTH THE OSA occupational program and the NCA joint union-management program are considering objectives listed by Watterson.

A company that participates in either program will select an advisor acceptable to both labor and management. The advisor will be someone who an employee can turn to in complete confidence.

This advisor will refer the employee to whichever treatment center in the area best suits his needs.

In both programs, confidentiality is stressed.

The basic difference between the two programs is that one deals only with alcoholism, and the other handles other forms of substance abuse as well.

THE NEWEST and most concentrated of the programs is the NCA joint union-management one established through a \$250,000 grant.

"Our program is unique insofar as it is geared only to alcohol problems," says John Helner, executive director of the organization.

"It is a pilot program, however, and industries involved must be unionized," he says.

According to Helner, a basic problem with alcoholism treatment is that many people do not need in-patient treatment and insurance often pays only for hospitalization.

"This conflicts with our goal to keep people on the job," Helner says.

Helner has high hopes for the program, which will serve only the Detroit metropolitan area. "We have lots of cooperation because the unions don't want to see their brothers and sisters go down the drain, and management knows the program will save it dollars and cents."

THE OSA occupational program has been around the longest, and deals with all

kinds of substance abuse on a state-wide basis.

"The occupational program is a joint effort on the part of labor and management to trust one another," says Gerald Gordon, manager of the occupational program section.

According to Gordon, businesses are informed about the program through contacts, word of mouth and literature. Almost every county in the state has an OSA coordinator who will set up training orientation to teach business supervisors how to recognize worker's problems and deal with them.

The coordinator also works with local licensed clinics that treat employees referred to them.

"Talking without offering assistance is no good," Gordon says.

TYPICAL OF the type of service offered by OSA is the substance abuse program soon to be implemented for Wayne County employees.

Dan Wilson, OSA's Wayne County coordinator, says representatives from seven county departments will be chosen to serve as coordinators for each department.

These coordinators will refer employees to a diagnostic and evaluation agency. The agency will then send the employee on to a treatment clinic.

"In addition, any information about treatment that goes back to the employer must be screened through the same agencies," Wilson says.

According to Gordon, programs like this have about a 75 per cent success rate.

Wilson adds that an employee who has undergone treatment usually returns to his job with better performance than before. If the employee fails to stay with the treatment and continues his self-destructive course, the employer has no other alternative than to fire him.

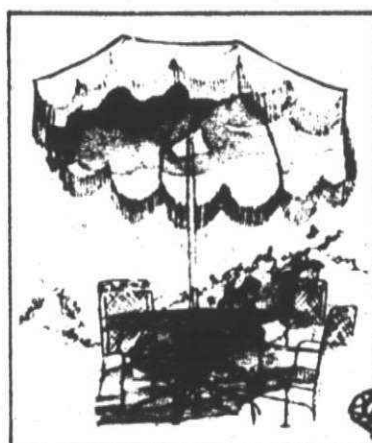
WILSON, WHOSE services to business are free, feels programs of this nature do a lot of good.

"It is estimated that each employee who is an alcoholic costs the company one-fourth of his salary to deal with the problems he causes. Also, it costs the employer more to hire someone (who may have the same problem) and train him then it costs to treat the present employee," he says.

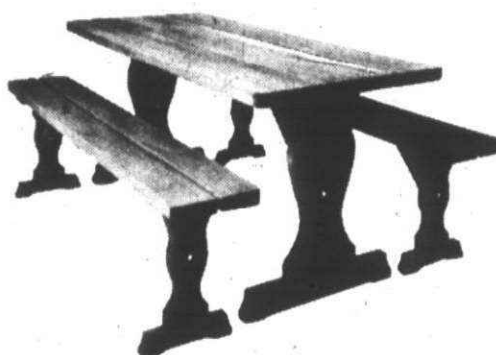
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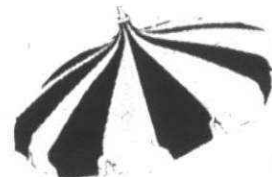


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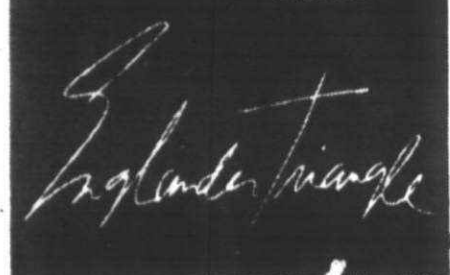
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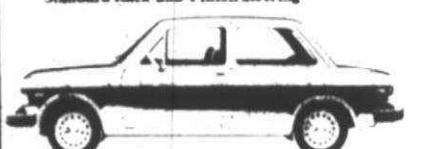
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Milliken extends lottery's deadline

Gov. William Milliken has signed a law, extending the state lottery until July 1, 1980. The original lottery law was to expire July 1.

The Michigan Lottery continues to be one of the most popular state lotteries operating," Milliken said. "Last year, the lottery generated approximately \$64 million in revenue, pouring more than \$1 million every week into the state's general fund."

Lottery money represents about two per cent of the more than \$3 billion that goes into the general fund each year.

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County readies free flu vaccine plan

The Detroit and Wayne County health departments have prepared a countywide plan to vaccinate 2.5 million people against the swine flu well before the swine flu season hits Michigan in December.

The federally financed vaccination program is expected to start Sept. 1, with the elderly and high-risk patients given top priority. It was announced jointly by health department directors Dr. Perry Stearns of Wayne County and Dr. William Clexton of Detroit.

It will be the largest single immunization program ever undertaken in the history of Detroit and Wayne County and one of the largest efforts in the nation because it is aimed at the entire population of nearly 2.7 million people, they said.

EXACT DAYS and times to get the flu shots at various sites throughout the metropolitan area will not be finalized until the vaccines arrive and there is a necessary statewide scheduling plan.

But the health directors said the vaccine and the state plan, which involves coordinating manpower and jet injector guns to painlessly administer the vaccine, will be ready in time to give citizens protection against a possible outbreak of the swine flu.

In the meantime, Detroit and county officials are prepared to open convenient free mass immunization clinics to the public.

A **TWO-PART** program has been devised with most of the immunization expected to

take place in September and early October.

Phase one will be directed at chronically ill individuals and those over 65, with phase two, planned to begin in late September, aimed at the general population.

Although the city and county are coordinating efforts to get the job done, each will operate its own independent program with the city serving Detroit residents and the county providing for out-county citizens.

THE WAYNE County phase one clinic program is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 1-7, at 10 locations.

The period includes a weekend and the hours will be flexible, probably 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Stearns said.

"We expect to vaccinate 110,000 people in this category," he added. "They will receive a bi-valent vaccination that will also give them protection against Victoria flu."

Wayne County plans to vaccinate the general population in phase two, in late September or early October.

Mass immunization clinics then will be set up at 50 county locations, most in a school or community setting.

"We estimate we'll be vaccinating 800,000 people in two or three weeks," Stearns said. "In the morning, our health workers will begin in elementary schools and end at a local high school."

"The adult population can then come to the school, probably between 3:30-8:30 p.m., for the vaccine."

BOTH HEALTH departments will make the vaccine available free to private physicians for distribution to their high-risk patients.

Clexton emphasized that it was particularly important for senior citizens and

those classified as high-risk to get the flu protection.

High-risk individuals are those suffering from heart disease, upper respiratory problems or other chronic illnesses.

Hospitals, long-term care centers, nursing and convalescent homes will also receive the free vaccine.

In addition, health authorities are inviting industrial and business firms with medical facilities to help out by giving the vaccinations to their employees.

The county has asked for \$140,000 from the state to administer the program. Detroit has applied for \$163,000.

STEARNS AND Clexton are co-chairing the Influenza Task Force organized in May to develop the large-scale health program, which, they said, was more encompassing than the polio program because it has to be done in such a short span of time and involves the entire population. It will also require extensive volunteer help, both medical and non-medical.

"I strongly recommend that everyone who could catch this potentially fatal illness get vaccinated," Stearns said. "There is some question about whether children—particularly those under five—need the vaccine, but as soon as we receive study results from the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, we'll advise the public."

People who are allergic to eggs or egg products should not be vaccinated, he said.

"We've tried to make the program convenient," Clexton explained. "There shouldn't be long lines because we'll have several centers open and the jet guns are quick and painless."

"With one gun, you can vaccinate 500 people in an hour. And we hope to have four jet injectors at some locations."

Regional roundup

PAY TIME?

Although an attorney general's ruling had been intended to clarify the right of former Westland Mayor Eugene McKinney's right to collect severance pay after his defeat in November, Mayor Tom Taylor has recommended city council look beyond the ruling. Taylor has recommended McKinney be paid based on rules which governed Nankin Township before the city's incorporation. The attorney general's ruling only applied to a local compensation board which had granted McKinney fringe benefits, but which did not clearly spell out the severance issue.

CANTON CONSIDERS AIRPORT PURCHASE

Members of the Canton Township Planning Commission and Township Board Tuesday night agreed to investigate the possibility of purchasing and running the Willow Run Airport with several other Wayne and Washtenaw county townships. Local officials fear that if they do not purchase the airport, the Wayne County Road Commission will. In that event, they fear the airport may be expanded substantially with the net effect of destroying large tracts for any kind of development.

FESTIVAL DRAWS

The Redford Township Sister City Festival drew large crowds to Redford Ice Arena over the Fourth of July weekend. As many as 3,000 persons attended each day and were entertained by dancers and musicians from St. Johann in Tirol, Austria. An ox roast and fireworks display were equally well attended.

GC SENIORS HAIL TOWERS

After five years of waiting, Garden City will get its much promised senior citizen's housing project. Nearly 100 senior citizens joined a host of city, state and federal officials and project developers last week to celebrate the groundbreaking. The 10-story, 160-unit Garden City Towers is expected to be completed in about 18 months. Delayed by lawsuits, federal hang-ups and a sagging economy, the project was finally funded after a successful bond sale by the state.

TIRE SLASHINGS

Livonia and Westland residents suffered more than \$2,500 worth of tire damage in a rash of tire slashings perpetrated around midnite on July 4.

Frank Bitner, one of the people on Grandon street whose car had been vandalized, came across four young people as he drove around the subdivision on a bicycle looking for the culprits. He and a group of neighbors made a citizen's arrest of the four suspects and held them until the police came.

WIDENING

The widening of Seven Mile, from Middle Belt to Grand River in Redford Township and part of Livonia, has been given the go-ahead by Wayne County. Work is scheduled to begin in August.

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She's free to think again after 2 years in a cult

Denelle is tiny—barely five foot and scarcely 100 pounds.

Her voice is soft, her manner shy. She seems young; it takes a few minutes of conversation to accept the fact that she's passed her 21st birthday.

And for all these reasons, it's hard to think of her selling flowers and candy at bar-closing time in the tough area of San Diego.

Yet that's what she was doing, to help fill the coffers of the Unification Church of the Korean known as Rev. Sun Myung Moon, when her parents in Westland received a telephone call from San Diego police during the pre-dawn hours of a cold February morning this year.

"The officer asked if we knew where our daughter was," Denelle's mother remembers, "and I said we knew only that she was somewhere in California with the Unification Church, and we wished we knew more."

"The officer was worried about her being in a neighborhood where a shooting had just occurred; and he wanted to put her on a plane and send her home. But she refused, just insisting she was doing the Lord's work."

BUT NOW Denelle is back with her family in Westland. She's undergone "deprogramming," a term used by those who fight cult groups. She says she now understands how mind-control techniques were used on her, and she is sure she won't again be drawn into the Unification Church.

She's even thinking about getting back to working with horses, the activity she loved before a summer afternoon two years ago when a chance encounter in a Minnesota town began a life detour for her.

Denelle and her family want to tell her story, because they know it's one that has been lived by thousands of young people. They hope that by telling it they may bring new understanding of cult groups to this area's young people and their parents.

They've asked that their family name be kept confidential, but they also have promised any help they can give to persons who contact them through the Citizen's Freedom Foundation, an anti-cult organization in the metropolitan area.

DENELLE'S STORY began just as she finished high school in Minnesota. Her family was moving to Westland, and she had elected to stay behind, living with her grandmother, working in a restaurant and caring for her three horses.

Kathy Buttery, Plymouth resident active in the Citizen's Freedom Foundation, pointed out that Denelle's position—being, on her own for the first time—made her typical of the kind of young person recruited by the Unification Church and other groups like it.

"Many freshmen are recruited on college campuses," Miss Buttery said.

For Denelle, that first contact was a young woman with a big box of flower arrangements. They met as Denelle was leaving work one afternoon.

"She said she was selling them for the Unification Church, a Christian youth organization," Denelle said. "I was pretty religious at the time, so I bought one for my grandmother."

Her new acquaintance invited Denelle to a meeting the next day, she remembers, and then there was a weekend five-state

seminar in Minneapolis she was urged to attend.

From there, it was a short step to taking off work for a weekend to go in a convoy of vans to New York's Madison Square Garden for a special session at which Moon was to be the speaker.

SOME OF THE REACTIONS Denelle reported show how she was brought into the cult.

At the beginning, she said, "they asked if I was religious and showed me a picture of Rev. Moon, and I thought he looked like a nice man."

Then, at the first meeting, "They went into their whole doctrine. Not much really penetrated, because it was fast, confusing and there were a lot of lecturers and a lot of singing."

Danelle decided to go to hear Moon. "I thought the only way to find out was to get it from the leader," she explained. "He said he came to bring a new truth and other religions were man-made and he had a lot of biblical things to back up what he was saying."

It was in New York, she said, that "there was more talking and singing, and I was convinced this was what I wanted to do."

BACK IN MINNESOTA, Denelle said, she sold her horses and closed out a couple of bank accounts, giving the money to the Unification Church. She was then sent to a center in Iowa to learn to "witness and teach."

Before long, there was announced a general reorganization, and she became a member of a Mobile Fundraising Team (MFT).

MFT members, she said, put in 16-hour days selling things like flower arrangements, candy and candles.

'When I joined I felt it was what God wanted me to do. But after I saw the patterns, and how they were used on me, I felt kind of disgusted, disappointed. I'm still a religious person.'

"We'd get up at 7 a.m.," Denelle explained, "and go to businesses and homes and make street sales and go into the industrial areas. We'd work weekdays until about 1 a.m. and weekends until after the bars closed."

"Sundays, we didn't go out mornings because the shopping centers didn't open until noon, so we'd hear lectures and listen to tapes in the morning and then go to centers and door to door for the rest of the day."

She said daily quotas expected varied among individuals, "But hardly anyone brought in less than \$100 a day." Her average, she remembered, was about \$150.

Denelle was a fund-raiser for many months, working on teams in Texas and California.

DID SHE EVER question the wisdom of spending her life that way?

"Well, sometimes I didn't want to get up in the morning and go out to work, and sometimes I wondered if it was really God's purpose."

But the answer, she said, was always that such thoughts, or, for that matter, any suggestion from her family that she return to visit, were ideas straight from Satan.

She remembers a couple of other things—talk of "sleep spirits" and a recommendation that she cut her long hair. "The

sleep spirits," she said, "were the things standing on your shoulder and causing your eyes to close when you'd doze off listening to lectures after a long day's work."

"And I was told to cut my hair because spirits were in it. I didn't believe that, but I had it cut anyway."

IN RETROSPECT, Denelle thinks it was doubt about the Unification Church and its teachings that were creeping into her consciousness when she started having personal problems with members of her team.

"I was hurting feelings and getting my own feelings hurt," was the way she put it.

These problems, one April day while she was fund-raising in California, led her to enter a telephone booth and place a call to her family in Westland.

Her mother described that call to a meeting of the Citizens Freedom Foundation, the first to be held in this area.

"She said she wanted to come home," the mother told the group gathered in Holy Cross Lutheran Church of Livonia, "and we told her to stay right there in the telephone booth."

"We made a couple of telephone calls to American Airlines and explained the situation, and they arranged for her to get the flight to Detroit the next day."

DANELLE LEFT without informing her team leader, without returning for her

clothes, without even retrieving her glasses from the van in which the fund-raisers were traveling.

"I was confused," she remembers. "I wanted to search out the meaning, find out if what I had been taught was the truth."

But it was several weeks—a time of planning to return, then deciding to stay just a bit longer with her family—before she agreed to talk to people about her beliefs.

The "deprogramming," reported Denelle's mother and Kathy Buttery, followed the methods used by the controversial Ted Patrick, a Californian who has become well known for getting young people out of the clutches of cult groups.

Two former cult members who had been deprogrammed by Patrick were among the five participants in Denelle's deprogramming.

"I knew what they were doing," Denelle said later. "The Unification Church had had problems with Ted Patrick, and some who had come back knew about him."

THE PROCESS went on for a day and a night, and it was all talk, often Biblical talk, Denelle's mother said.

"There was no violence," she added. "Either my husband or I was with her all the time, and quite a bit of the time our family pastor was there too, because he wanted to know more about cults."

"We sat with Bibles in our hands, discussing the teaching of the Unification Church, looking for proofs in the Bible, discussing what that book actually does say."

The talk went on a long time, added Miss Buttery, one of the deprogrammers, because "when you get something going, you can't stop."

"Deprogramming," she said, "is like breaking a record that has been playing—asking questions for which no answers have been programmed into the member's brain."

A **DEPROGRAMMED** Denelle is still sorting out feelings about the last two years.

She says she can "see where Moon got some of his ideas" and still thinks some of them are right. But she also can see how cult methods were used on her—the cutting off from family, the repetition, the aura of love, the overwork and resultant fatigue designed to prevent questioning. "Afterwards I felt kind of disgusted, disappointed," she said.

She still considers herself a religious person, she added, but if any of her younger brothers or sisters talked of joining any cult group, "I'd show them they were wrong—tell them about the patterns of cults and how they are used," she said.

HER MOTHER, for her part, feels an immense gratitude to the Citizen's Freedom Foundation and its members in this area.

"I had read just a little about the Unification Church and Moon," she said, "but it was when I saw the story in the Observer & Eccentric last year that I was able to get in touch with Kathy and learn what we were dealing with."

"The CFF was a great help to my husband and me. It was such a terrible feeling, not to know where to turn for help."

She also said parents should be more aware of the mode of operation of groups like the Unification Church, Children of God, The Way, and others.

"Those who have questions about groups that may be involving members of their family can get in touch with CFF by writing: Box 228, Utica, 48087," Kathy Buttery said.

She also recommended a new book by Ted Patrick, "Let our Children Go," for information on the entire subject of cults.

Citizens' Freedom Foundation answers

How do you spot a cult?

A cult, says the Citizens Freedom Foundation, is any group that uses mind control to keep its members in line.

It demands complete obedience of its members. It requires surrender of possessions and the breaking of family ties.

Though it may come across as a form of religion, its activities are mainly money-making ones, and its leaders may have political ambitions.

In the case of the Rev. Sun Myung Moon and his Unification Church, income for 1974, in large measure amassed from activities like Denelle's flower and candy selling, have been estimated at \$8 million. Moon has publicly proclaimed his ambitions to "conquer and subjugate the world."

What are its techniques?

A cult functions only in an atmosphere it creates completely. "You are on their ground, and they control what happens," said Kathy Buttery of the CFF.

It starts with an atmosphere of love and the building of trust. This changes slowly to the idea that love is ONLY in the cult and ONLY its people are worthy of trust, while family and former friends are workers of Satan. Thus love becomes complete dependency.

For new recruits, there is a high-pressure atmosphere, someone with them all the time, long lectures, hard work, mental and physical fatigue, no time to think. The mind becomes more open to suggestion.

A minimum of food is offered, and it is low in protein, increasing lethargy. Then the recruit is encouraged to talk about earlier indiscretions, and these increase the group's hold on him.

Deprogramming: What is it?

Deprogramming of a cult member, according to Miss Buttery, is simply giving him "a chance to find out what the other side is."

He is taken out of the cult atmosphere with no other members present, and given a evidence to refute claims of cult leaders.

"You show how different cults use the same techniques—isolation, fatigue and poor diet—and help him see how these were used on him," she continued.

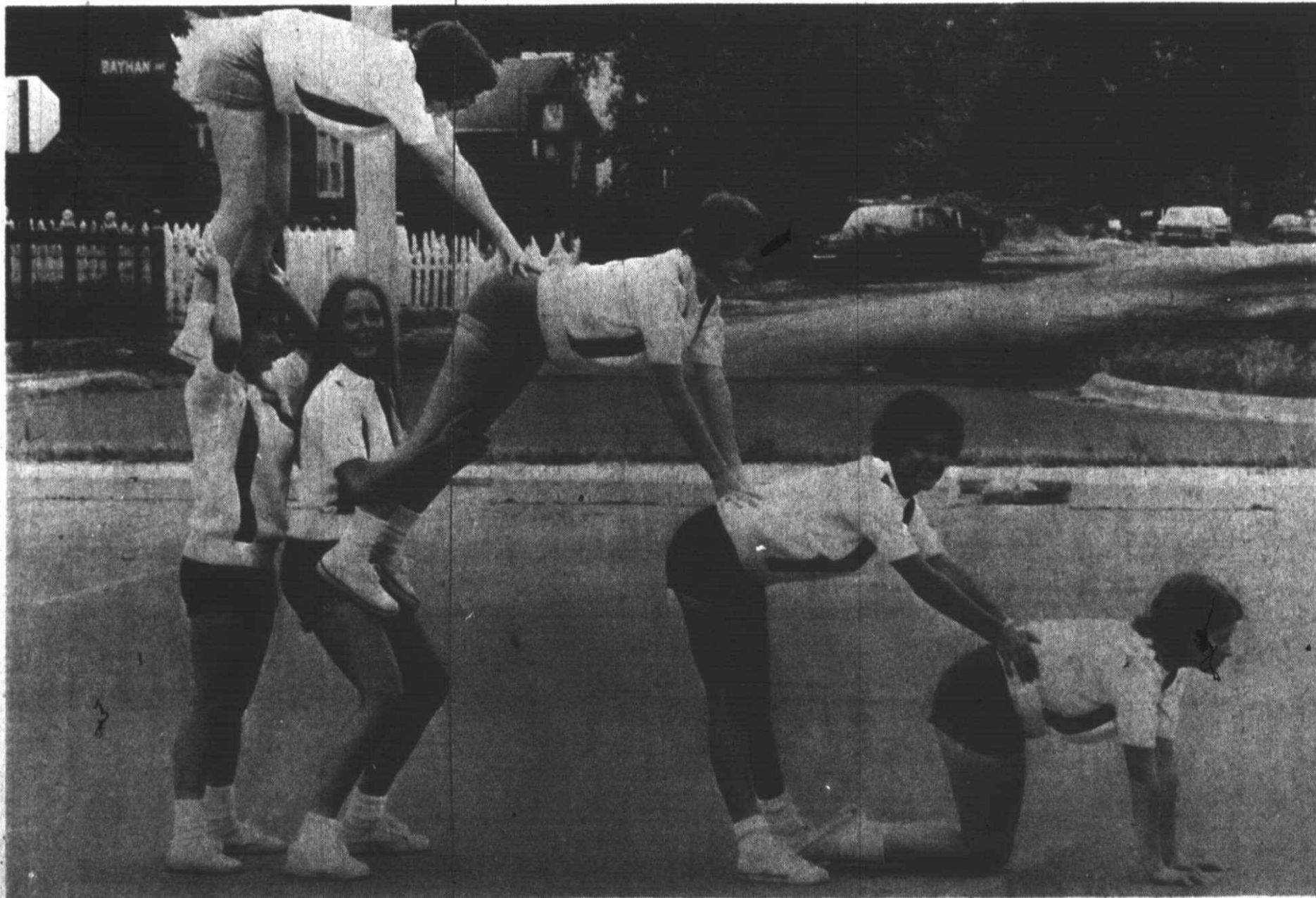
"Then you study scripture together and show how things are taken out of context for the cult's benefit."

Deprogramming also involves the shooting of challenging questions. A question like "Where does the money go after you collect it?"

"When you give a question without a programmed answer, he has to start thinking," Miss Buttery concluded. "When he starts to think, the hold of the cult begins to break."

New Garden City pastor began ministry on challenge

The new pastor of First United Methodist Church of Garden City is a man who entered theological seminary "on a kind of challenge" and stayed to make the ministry a rewarding career.

The Rev. Robert Charles Grigereit was assigned by the Detroit Conference UMC in June to serve the church at 6443 Merriman. Coming to Garden City from Calvary United Methodist in Ann Arbor, he succeeds the Rev. Glenn E. Kjellberg.

Three new ministers also have joined United Methodist churches in this area in recent weeks.

The Rev. John Ferris is the new associate minister of Newburg United Methodist in Livonia and First United Methodist Church of Plymouth has added two new staff members. The Rev. Dwayne Lee Kelsey as minister of education and the Rev. Frederick C. Vosburg as parish minister.

ROBERT GRIGEREIT, a native of Benton Harbor, said he grew up "without significant church background" and went to Michigan State University to study police administration.

During his undergraduate years he also was serving in the U.S. Army military police.

"It was about that time," he said, "that I began to wonder what my work was all about and started to take a hard look at what people can do for each other."

He said his inner struggle at that time and the persistent feeling that "there's got to be a better way" led him to counseling with a young pastor.

"To answer my question 'Is there a God?' he threw me a challenge," Mr. Grigereit said. "He asked if I was willing to give a year of my life to find out."

"I took the challenge and enrolled in seminary."

ALTHOUGH HE described himself as the "dumbest first year seminarian you ever saw," he came to the end of his course at Evangelical Theological Seminary in Naperville, Ill., with a BD degree and plans to become a minister.

"I guess I saw in the Christian faith not only clarifying values of love and humanitarian social service but also a more fulfilling career than I was finding in law enforcement," he said.

Ordained in 1962, he served churches in Ludington and Grand Rapids before going to Calvary in 1968.

In the Detroit Conference, Mr. Grigereit serves on the board of ministry, and he is a trustee of the Michigan Council on Alcohol Abuse.

A graduate of the Rutgers School of Alcohol Studies, he finds substance abuse "one of the areas where the church has a great deal to offer—far more than the church itself realizes."

Mr. Grigereit and his wife Carolyn are engaging this month in another Detroit Conference activity, leading a group of high school youth on a back-packing trip in the Adirondacks. Their sons David, 13, and Mark, 10, are being left with their grandparents. One of the Garden City UMC youth, Mike Riley, is joining them on the trip.

MR. KELSEY and Mr. Vosburg are joining the Rev. Samuel F. Stout in serving First United Methodist of Plymouth.

The former is a graduate of Ashbury College in Kentucky. Scarritt College in Tennessee and Methodist Theological School of Ohio and he has worked previously as an education assistant, administrator and director of education.

Mr. Vosburg is a graduate of Taylor University in Indiana and the Boston University school of theology. He received an honorary doctorate of divinity in 1955 from Albion College.

Serving churches in Royal Oak, Houghton, Marquette, Detroit, Flint and Dearborn, he has during his ministerial career been elected delegate to seven jurisdictional conferences and six general conferences.

JOHN FERRIS is on his first pastoral assignment at Newburg UMC, having graduated in June from Garrett Theological Seminary in Evanston, Ill.

A native of Detroit, he too developed an interest in the ministry after graduating from Adrian College with a degree in education. As a seminarian, he had an intern year at a church in North Canton, Ohio.

He and his wife Deb have a daughter Sonya, nearly two.

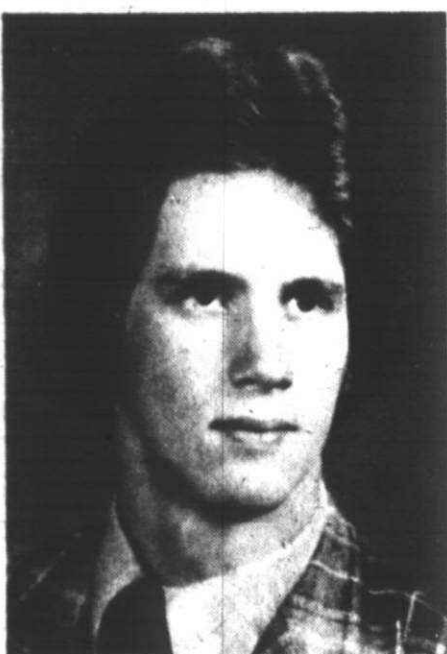

Muth, who will enter Alma College, was one of the medallion winners at Churchill's recent honors night for his 4.0 grade point average. He received departmental honors in music and Spanish.

A cellist, Muth has participated in a variety of musical groups at Rosedale, accompanying worship and providing special prelude and offertory music.

He played in many orchestral groups accompanying such productions as "Messiah" and several musical comedies.

In addition to the scholarship from the United Presbyterian Church, Muth has been awarded the Alma College trustees honors scholarship, the Alma honors scholarship and a scholarship from the state.

He will major in business administration and Spanish at Alma.

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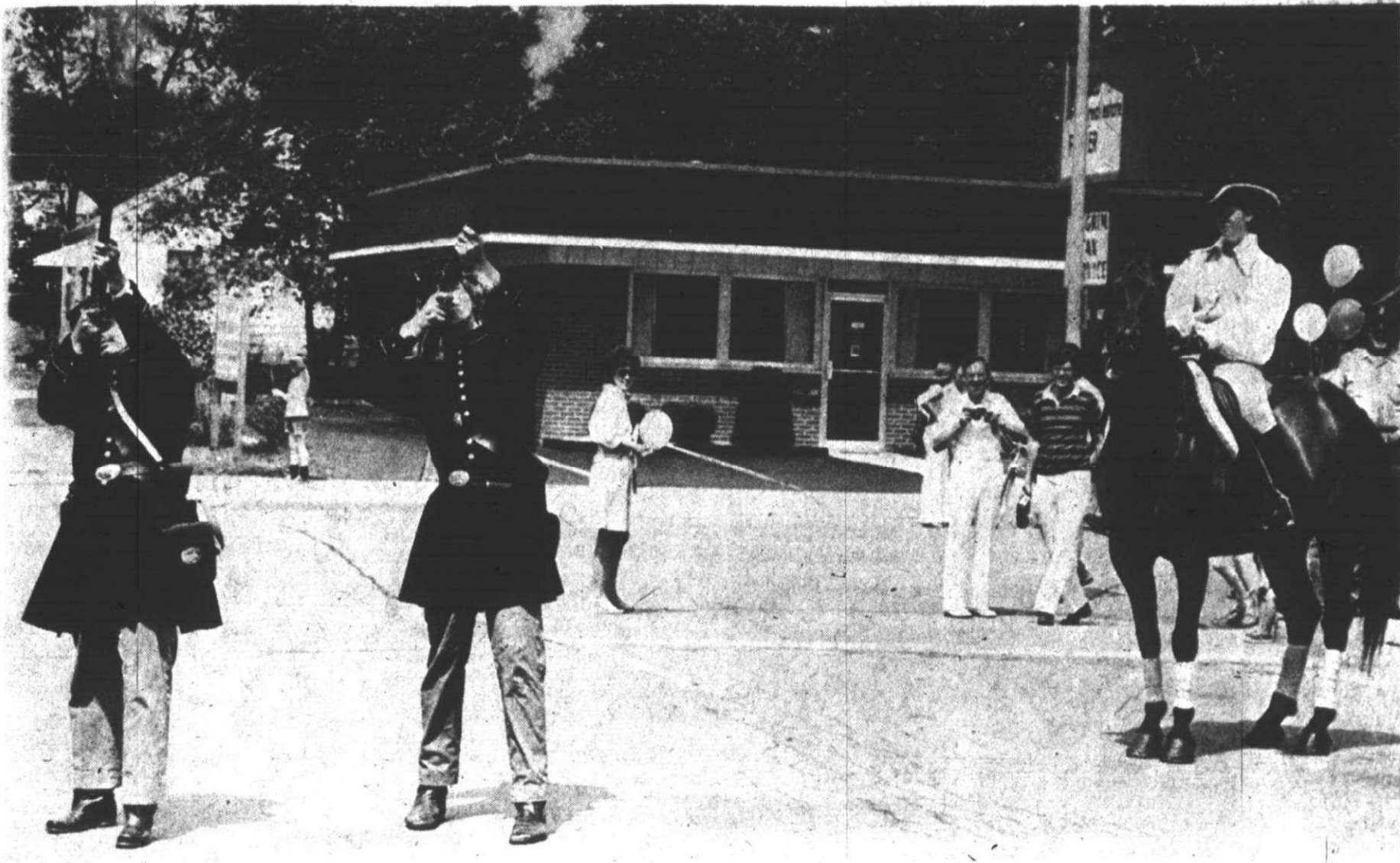

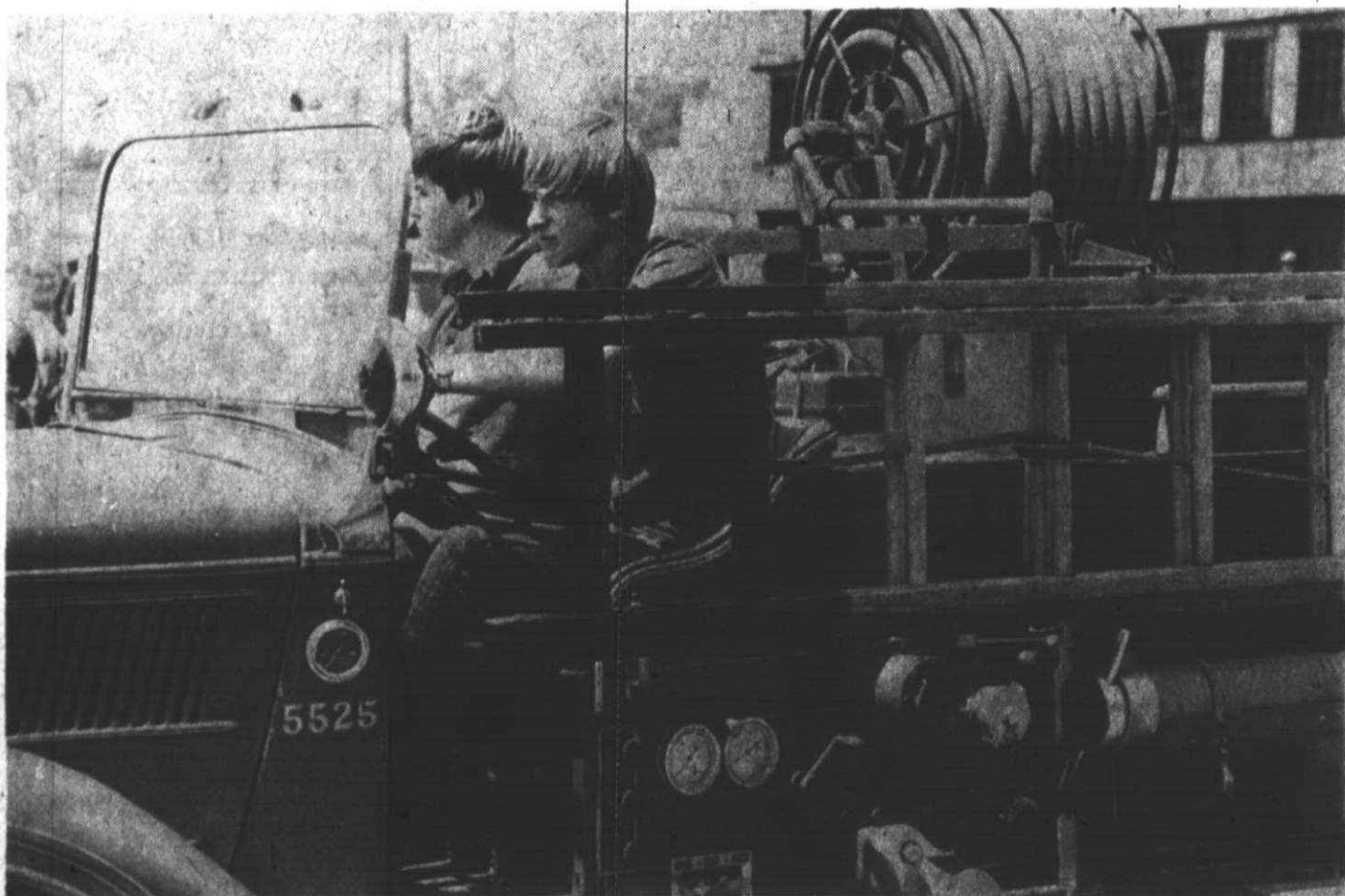

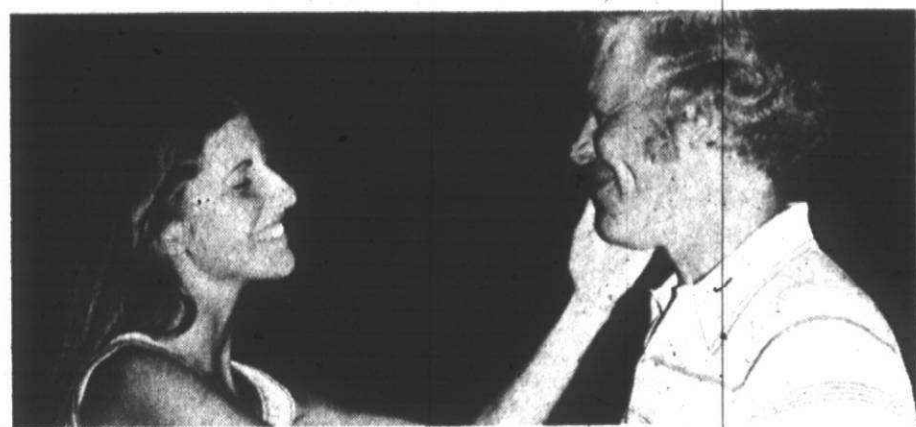

A member of the Detroit Symphony, a faculty member at Oakland University and an instructor on Schoolcraft's summer faculty, Francis will be heard in Easley Blackwood's recent Sonata for Violin and Piano.

Also performing in the Waterman Campus Center will be a faculty woodwind ensemble, which will be heard in Quintet by the late Alvin Ertler, and a string ensemble in Mozart's Serenade No. 12.

The third concert of the series has been shifted to Monday, July 19, instead of the previously planned Tuesday, July 20. Cellist Debra Fayroian will headline the program.

THE 10TH SUMMER series at Schoolcraft opened Tuesday with a form of music once very popular in the home but rarely heard today on the recital stage—a piano four-hands duet.

Schoolcraft piano instructor Donald Morelock has teamed with a former University of Michigan classmate, Lynne Lynch, to resurrect some absolutely charming works. Morelock-Lynch are a classically clean-cut and thoroughly professional duo who have been performing these two-persons-on-one-piano compositions in public for a little more than a year.

The turnout was the largest for an opening concert in Schoolcraft's summer series, which has emphasized chamber

and small ensemble music in its unique offerings in the metropolitan area. Some 275 or more turned out, and not all of them were even piano students.

THE REASONS were many. Schoolcraft's summer concerts are now free, the bill having been picked up by the lovable and enlightened Cultural and Public Affairs Series.

The college is becoming more public relations conscious and hustling out news material on its concerts.

There is a built-in audience builder when you offer a program that appeals to piano teachers, who in turn recruit their students to attend.

But the big reason has to be Morelock and Ms. Lynch. As the irrepressible Bob Jones, composer-in-residence and hilarious program annotator said, it's rare to find two first-rate pianists who can work together cheek-to-cheek, so to speak.

At one time, piano four-hands was the most popular kind of fine music in Europe. That was in the days before the phonograph, and piano four-hands was great home entertainment.

Great composers such as Mozart, finding they had a "hit" symphony or opera, would write a "reduction" of the same work that two persons could play on one piano. Much four-hands music was also written as a teaching technique. Jones added.



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
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
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
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

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Fishing map available

A big gap in southeastern Michigan's fishing information system has been closed through the joint effort of the state and industry.

A "Southeastern Michigan Fishing Map" has been published by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Metro Detroit Ford Dealer Association.

To get a free copy, visit any Ford dealer in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw, St. Clair and Monroe counties.

"THE DNR HAD it put together but didn't have the money to publish it," said Ed Schmid, chairman of the association.

The company's public relations office did the art work and took care of printing it.

"Until now, we really didn't know what's available for fishermen in the area," said Schmid.

"We feel the map accomplishes two things. It will aid you in your search for a lake or stream where fish are known to be plentiful, and it will help you catch them when you get there."

Maybe 50,000 fans turned out to watch The Bird in Tiger Stadium, but there are more than a million licensed fishermen in the metropolitan area.

With the state's efforts to improve water quality and add new stocks of fish to the waters, and with gasoline prices due to rise again this year, local anglers will find the map mighty handy.

IT LISTS 140 lakes in streams and shows them on a fairly clear road map.

The charts tell whether the body of water has a boat ramp, pier fishing or shore fishing. Only waters with public access and streams of general interest are included.

It lists species of fish that are available in "better than average" quantities. The list begins with the ever-present sunfish and goes through all the warmwater sport fish, concluding with five different species of the trout family.

Any special information—such as no

motors allowed or a particular stock of fish—are mentioned.

For example, nearby Belleville Lake is listed as having a boat ramp, pier fishing and shore fishing; species available include sunfish, crappie, walleye, largemouth and smallmouth bass.

STAN LIEVENSE, former DNR fishery biologist who's now with the state travel bureau, has written a description of each species along with tips on how to catch them.

Localized information came from Ron

Spitler, fishery biologist at the DNR's Pontiac district office, and many parks personnel and biologists throughout the region.

Bicycle touring promoted as recreation for all ages

There are thousands of bicyclists in the western suburbs with as many combinations of experience, equipment and age as there are numbers.

While these cyclists may have the means and desire to engage in touring—a sport which provides the best of both exercise and sightseeing—all too many may lack the direction.

That's where Gene Fayton, west side ride director of the American Youth Hostel (AYH), comes in.

Fayton's goal is to organize and promote bicycle touring in western Wayne County so that families and friends may ride, exercise and explore their community together.

When Fayton talks about community, he refers to the large territory consisting of Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw counties.

"I've noticed a lack of organized biking activity in the western suburbs," Fayton noted. "I think it's just a question of people not knowing about AYH."

AYH, as Fayton explained, "is an organization which is dedicated to any outdoor activity that is not motorized."

Hosteling organizations originated and remain quite popular with youths in Europe. Groups of young people hike, hitchhike or otherwise move about the continent in exploration trips during the day, then spend their evenings at moderately priced hostels designed especially for them.

While the concept of overnight hostels has not caught on to such a degree in the United States, one-day organized touring groups, consisting mostly of bicyclists, continue to grow.

"We have rides scheduled every weekend," Fayton said. "We have different classes and rides depending on level of experience, type of bicycle and condition of the rider and the bike."

Each trip is graded on an A to D scale based on the distance to be covered and

the average speed of the caravan. Class D is for beginners, Class C for most families, Class B for more advanced cyclists and Class A for experts.

All the tours—both long and short—are led by guides, Fayton said. Rest and food or picnic stops also are included.

The Detroit AYH Bicycle Committee has scheduled 15 trips during July. Routes include Kensington Park to Holly, Westland to the University of Michigan's Botanical Gardens, Westland to Greenfield Village and Livonia to Kensington Park.

For more experienced cyclists, an overnight jaunt from Farmington Hills to East Lansing is on the itinerary as well as a 62-mile ride through Ohio's Maumee Valley, the same route used by Gen. Anthony Wayne to defeat the Indian Confederation in 1794.

"Two years ago I began taking real slow

rides on Sunday morning," Fayton said, explaining how he got started in cycling. "I enjoyed it, bought a better bike and got involved in it even more. The bug bit, so I bought an even better bike. Now, I cycle 100 miles per week."

While the ride director indicated that he would hope prospective riders would join the AYH after becoming familiar with its program—sailing, canoeing and hiking in addition to bicycling—he said that membership is not necessary to tour.

"We have room for everybody," he stated. "Group riding encourages discipline, learning the rules of the road and looking out for the other guy."

Fayton added that anyone interested in programs and activities sponsored by the AYH—especially bike touring—may contact him at 933-3613 during the day or at 565-1364 in the evening.

Manager Jim Snyder turned the pitching duties over to Chuck Drewicz in the second

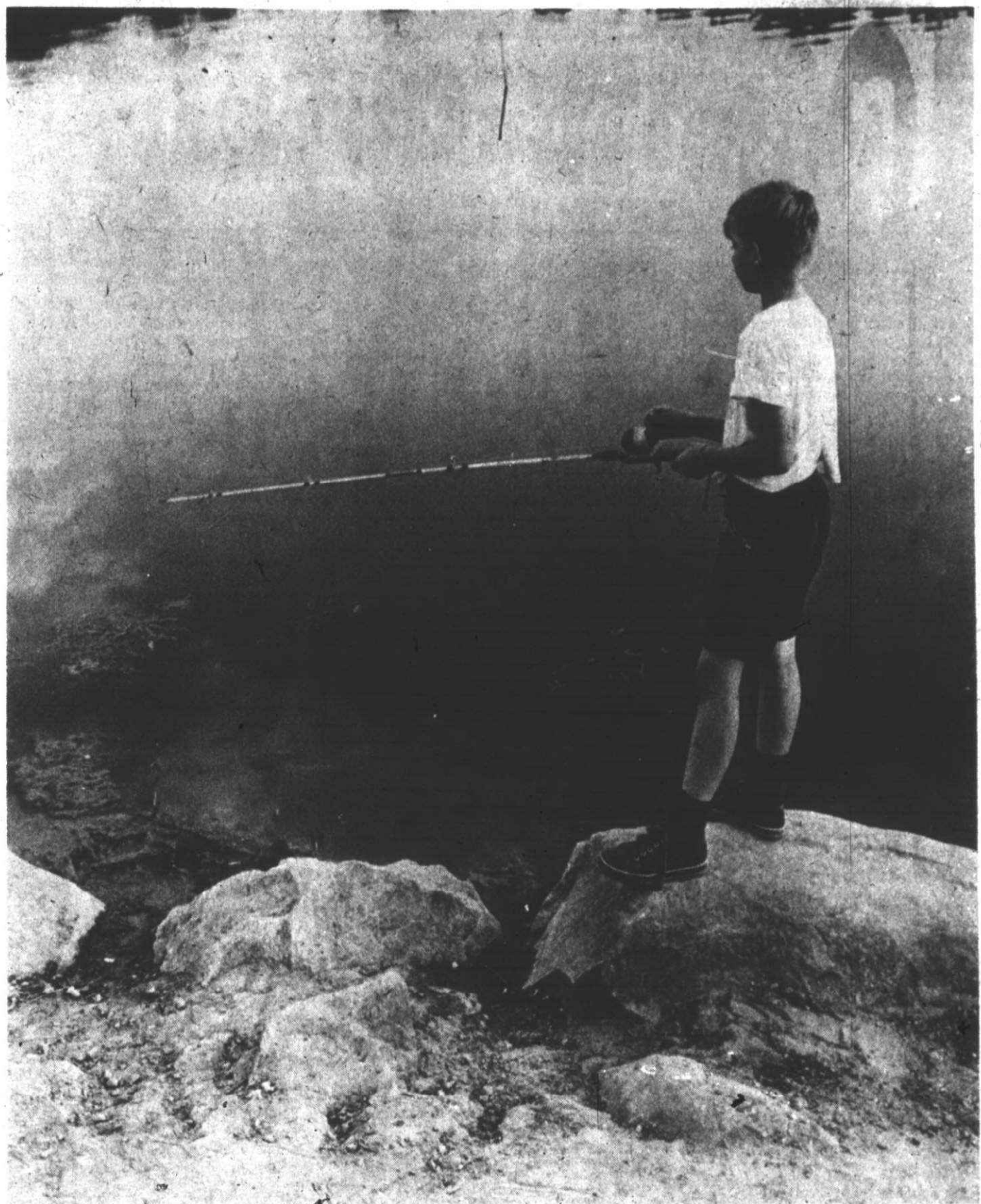
game and the result was the same—a four-hitter.

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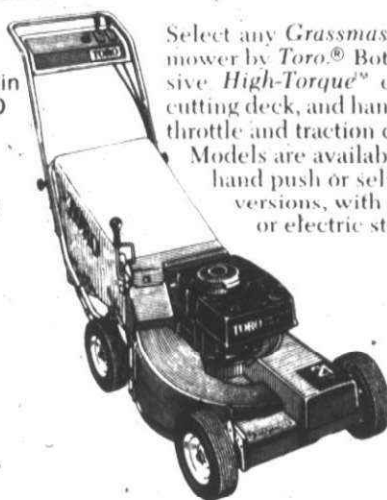
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In The Pocket

These are drama-filled days along the metropolitan bowling front and the spilling of the pins has no part of it.

These are the days when the league secretaries and proprietors of the bowling establishments are negotiating contracts for the fall and winter season—and the auto industry negotiating has little on that in the ten pin world.

What could they be negotiating? This always has been the question asked by the neophytes. And you'd be surprised by the issues that often have both sides deadlocked.

First, there is the item of date and time. Few bowlers want to bowl on the late shifts that start at 9:30 p.m. Likewise, few want the early time when leagues start at 5:30 p.m. As a result, most all leagues ask for 7 p.m. And there just aren't that many openings at that hour.

Next comes the price—and the fringe

benefits. Oh yes, there are fringe benefits in league bowling.

THERE WAS A TIME when the proprietors were forced to give rebates for league bowling. Inasmuch as it was guaranteed business, they felt they could afford a refund.

Then came the surprise request—turkeys at Thanksgiving time and hams at the Easter season. Why? Well, it was much the same as union members demanding dental care from their employers.

The turkey tradition started by the proprietor giving a turkey to the high scorer on a certain night in the league. Then, like everything else, it grew. The next step was the high scorer on each team. There seemed to be no end.

Just imagine what this would cost the proprietor of a large establishment like Thunderbowl in Allen Park where there are 94 lanes. That would mean 94 turkeys

on each shift and there are now five shifts a day in most places in the winter months.

One proprietor in those days threatened to start his own turkey farm. The turkey situation got out of hand and it is not done now as frequently as in the past.

But there is plenty of bartering still going on and it is most surprising the demands that are made in what should be only an ordinary league contract.

THE LONGEST tournament in the history of the Michigan Women's Bowling Association finally comes to an end during the coming weekend in Grand Rapids.

Competition started way back in February, which means that the event that drew an entry of more than 3,000 teams, ran for six months.

Both events are certain to be listed with ABC and WIBC list of oddities for the 1975-76 season.

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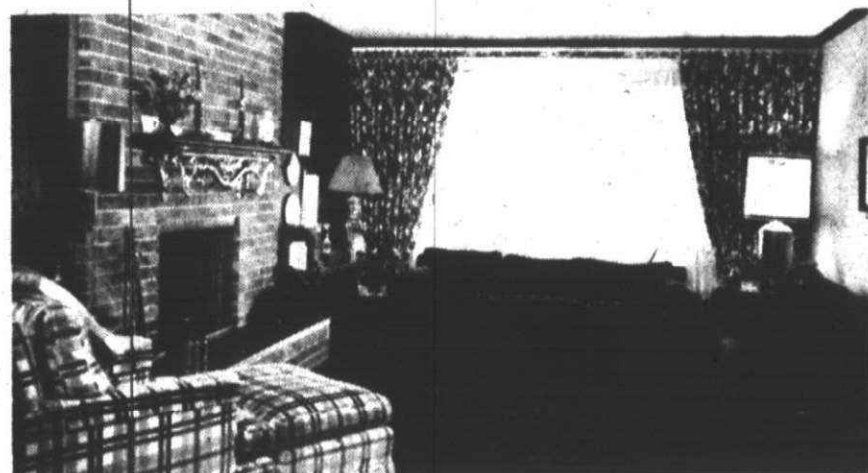
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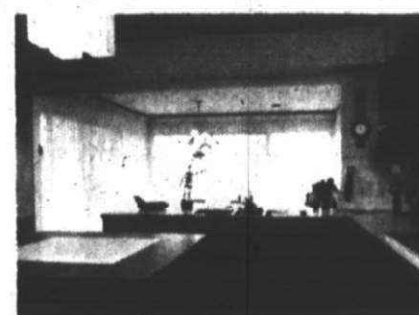
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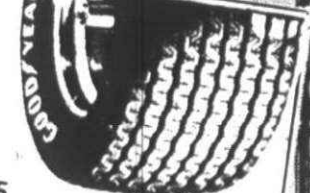


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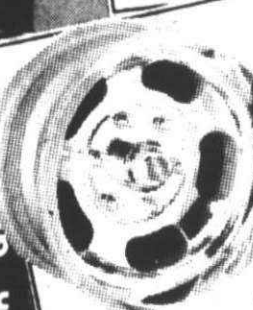
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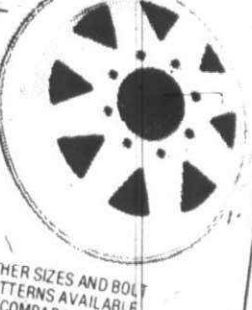
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McMurray maintains slim margin

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Inflation invades upper instruction

American educators are concerned about inflation. Not inflated money, but inflated grades.

"The gentleman C of a former day has become the gentleman B," observes University of Michigan psychologist Stanford C. Erickson. "The higher grading trend has several causes, and one is student pressure: 'Without an A in this course I won't get into medical school,' they plea, and there goes \$2 million in future earnings."

Grading decisions are rarely easy or comfortable to make," he writes in a faculty memo published by the UM Center for Research on Learning and Teaching.

significant single means by which a teacher shapes the academic values of the university," Erickson says.

"The grading mechanism has become a logistic necessity for managing a large number of students moving through an incredibly varied curriculum. Due to inflation, pass-fail grading and other changing concepts, the meaning of the final transcript may be blurred. We might consider redefining the function of grades," he suggests.

The teacher still faces two choices: to grade students according to how well they meet the standards set for the course or to grade them in competition with one another.

RESISTANCE TO absolute standards, often idiosyncratic and unreasonable, lead

to widespread use of relative standards in the '60s, Erickson relates. But the students strongly objected to grading on the curve, complaining that it pitted them against one another.

A 1966 statement by UM psychologist Martin Gold is recalled in the memo: "Grades ought to reflect how well a student has acquired the knowledge which he has committed himself to study. The evaluation of his learning should reflect his own performance; his classmates' performance should neither add nor detract."

"The instructor shares in the responsibility when a student fails," Gold added. "It may mean he did not motivate enough, was not clear enough or not objective and fair enough in the grading. I fear we take credit for too many of our successes and give blame for too many of our failures."

ment until the specified performance standards are met. Testing is used to show that each student has mastered the material, rather than to place them on a competitive scale which compares them with one another."

ONE OF the issues that has concerned contract grading proponents involves quantity vs. quality. Most students will opt for and complete the A-level requirements—yet the department may challenge the teacher who gives every student the maximum grade. Erickson advises designating the quantitative requirements for earning a B or C, while reserving the A for exceptional quality work.

"In other words, contract teaching does not take the teacher off the evaluation hook. In fact, it places a considerable extra load on the teacher, since he or she must carefully spell out the goals of the course and the resources for achieving them. The teacher must still prepare tests and other criteria through which the student can prove mastery of these goals."

"Most teachers are pedagogically conservative and feel more comfortable conducting a class in the same manner they experienced as students," Erickson continues. "Perhaps the strongest persuasion for faculty to enter into the rather demanding contract arrangement is the very positive reaction of students."

"Some colleges around the country have totally converted to competency-based instruction. We will have to see if this will complicate or clarify the meaning of grades."

Juvenile crime curb plan eyed

A \$948,000 plan to curb juvenile delinquency has been approved by Michigan's new juvenile justice advisory committee at a recent meeting in Lansing.

Wayne County Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), a committee member, reported that the new plan will concentrate on preventing truant youths from becoming adult offenders.

"We need to divert and salvage young offenders, who are responsible for 50 per cent of our crime, so they will be useful, productive citizens when they reach maturity," Mrs. Dumas said. "That is the charge our committee faces."

mend possible amendments and additions to the plan, and determine eligibility requirements of applicants for projects to be funded by the proposed plan.

The committee will meet at least quarterly, with the next meeting scheduled in the latter part of July. It is expected that at that time Michigan's program will be completed.

"STATUS OFFENDERS—that is, youths who have been picked up for such misdemeanors as running away, skipping school, truancy and other offenses which would not be considered crimes if the individual were over the age of 18—need to be diverted from the regular juvenile justice system," she explained.

"We must provide these young people with counseling and assistance in their home environment. We must work with the parent in handling the child."

"However, if the home environment is such that the child cannot be helped, then we must provide foster care or shelter-care placement facilities. This, along with positive programs of education, counseling and constructive recreation, will help us attack crime at the juvenile level," Mrs. Dumas said. "That is where we need to start with crime prevention."

THE COMMITTEE is composed of juvenile judges, representatives of local units of government, police agencies dealing with youths, boards of education, juvenile probation officers and department of social services representatives. One-third of the membership is drawn from youths under the age of 25. All areas, geographically, are represented.
