

# Second school millage try set for Sept. 2

The second millage election this year for Plymouth Community School District will be held on Thursday, Sept. 2.

The paperwork was filed Tuesday for a Sept. 2 election after tentative approval was given for that date by the Wayne County Election Commission. Formal confirmation will be made by the county before Saturday.

The verbal request for a Sept. 2 election date was made Tuesday morning at the direction of the Plymouth Board of Education the night before.

At its regular meeting Monday night, the school board instructed the administration to request a millage election at the earliest possible legal date. In its motion, the board's first choice was Sept. 2, with other preferences being Sept. 4 and Sept. 7, in that order.

**THE AMOUNT OF MILLAGE** on the ballot will be decided by the board July 26.

At Monday's meeting, a motion to hold the election on Sept. 7 was made by E.J. McClendon and supported by Dick Arlen.

Arlen then asked about the possibility of holding the election on the preceding Saturday, Sept. 4. Joe Gray questioned the ability of the district to get a large voter turnout because that Saturday was in the middle of Labor Day weekend and a lot of people would be out of town.

Marcia Borowski backed Arlen's suggestion for a Saturday election. "I realize that weekend will be summer's last fling, but we are faced with enormous scheduling problems and decisions on staffing, and we don't have the luxury of holding an election on the traditional Monday and Tuesday days."

"Absentee ballots will be available for residents who know they will be out of town that weekend, and voting absentee is often more convenient anyhow. But a Sept. 7 election, with school to open the next day, poses very serious problems."

"How can you teach a course with just one day's notice?" This would be robbing the students."

George Lawton, supported by Ms. Borowski, then made a motion to amend

McClendon's motion to allow the election date to be either Sept. 2 or 4 if approved by the election commission. The amendment and original motion passed 7-0.

Although the board hasn't passed a formal motion, the assumption is that the district will again request 4.75 (\$4.75 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) additional operating mills.

Discussions on cuts to be made in case of millage defeat in September have all centered on the need to cut \$2.6 million,

which is the amount of revenue which would be restored in the budget by 4.75 mills.

Florence Beier, administrative assistant who was co-leader of the June millage effort, commented Tuesday: "It is very important for residents to make plans now for the Sept. 2 millage election. I'm sure most realize, after June's result, that every vote indeed does count. I hope people will either apply for absentee ballots or arrange their schedules to be in town Sept. 2 to vote."

## Contracts approved

Two years of negotiations ended this week as the township board voted to ratify labor contracts with the firefighters, DPW and building employees' unions.

Tuesday night the township board voted 6-1 to approve the three-year agreement with the DPW and building department

and the two-year contract with firefighters.

"The negotiations have been lengthy," said Clerk John Flodin, "but I think we have fair and equitable contracts. I recommend ratification of both."

Treasurer Carl Parsell noted that this was the first contracts negotiated since the

employees unionized in May 1974. "With the first contract, there are always problems involved in working out exact language and that's why these negotiations took so long. I'm sure the next contract will be negotiated and ratified within a much shorter period."


"Neither side is completely satisfied, which is always true, but we have a contract everybody can live with."

The contracts will be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1976. For the firefighters the contract will expire Jan. 1, 1978 and for DPW and building it will expire Jan. 1, 1979.

Prior to approval, Trustee Jim Poole asked questions to clarify the contract's intent regarding bereavement leave and seniority rights in case of a leave of absence.

Both the DPW and building department employees are members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) union.

The firefighters voted to ratify their contract on Sunday while other employees had voted to ratify earlier this summer. The building inspectors had been negotiating for more than one year while firefighters and DPW employees have been at the bargaining table for about two years.

## Board sets fire levy at 1.5 mills

After receiving acceptable bids for a new fire station, and completing its second public hearing, the township board voted 6-0 Tuesday night to levy 1 1/2 mills to build, equip and operate Canton's second fire station.

With \$215,000 budgeted as estimated expense for construction of the new station at Warren and Haggerty, the board opened 11 bids Tuesday night and recorded the low bid of Cumberland Construction at \$198,500.

The administration was instructed to approve the bid recommended by the architect, providing it was the low bid. Should another bid be recommended, the board will make a decision at its August meeting.

Treasurer Carl Parsell said construction of the station should begin in about 1 1/2 weeks after acceptance of the bid with the station being ready for operation in about a year.

**THE PUBLIC HEARING** was the second held on the special assessment for fire protection. After the hearing was completed, the board voted to levy 1 1/2 mills for the coming year—a process which will be repeated next year.

Supervisor Robert Greenstein began the public hearing by noting the cost estimates are \$429,100 to construct, equip and operate the new station for the first year.

A resident from Windsor Park asked why the 1 1/2 mills wasn't placed on the ballot as the specific amount of tax needed for the fire hall.

Greenstein said the state law allowing special assessment districts for fire protection required that the ballot wording call for a levy of up to 10 mills.

Trustee James Poole, noting that the township intended to levy only 1 1/2 mills, said the 10 mills was for capital expenses only and that if necessary more than 10 mills could be levied for operational expenses.

Parsell added that it was difficult to specify the millage rate on the ballot because by the time exact cost estimates were known the millage would have been on the August ballot instead of on the May primary. "If we waited until the August election, there was a good possibility we wouldn't have time to collect the tax during the next fiscal year."

Greenstein commented that the special

## Academy to decide reserve fate

The fate of Canton's first class of police reserves will be decided tonight (Thursday) by the board of directors of the Michigan Police Reserve Training Council. The action follows a series of incidents that led to the publication of a letter in three area newspapers by Supervisor Robert Greenstein explaining that Canton's reserves will receive only 100 hours of training at the reserve academy.

That letter, which appeared several weeks ago, came at the prompting of Albert Stewart, executive director of the reserve academy.

"We talked to Mr. Greenstein and we told him there was some misrepresentation relative to the amount of training being given to Canton's reserves. We wanted to clarify exactly what Canton's reserves were getting."

According to Stewart, letters in several newspapers written by Canton residents answering criticisms of the force indicated the reserves would be getting 150 hours of training at the academy. A newsletter sent out with the water bills indicated the same thing, he said.

"GREENSTEIN explained to us that it was not a deliberate misrepresentation of the facts, and that what was intended was that the reserves will get additional training outside of the academy adding up to 150 additional hours."

When Stewart met with Greenstein, the supervisor was presented with a letter which said the Canton reserves would face expulsion from the school if the clarification was not made publicly in print.

According to Stewart, that letter was not forwarded to the school's advisory board when it was agreed that Greenstein would make the correction.

Stewart said the board of directors tonight will vote to determine if Greenstein's letter is sufficient to prevent the expulsion of Canton's reserves from the school.

"I think he has met what we asked of him," Stewart said, "but I don't know how the other board members feel."

Stewart added, however, that he doubted the Canton reserves would be expelled.

**WHILE STEWART** said he thought Greenstein had clarified the matter concerning number of hours training, he had some legal questions as to the scope of the reserves' power.

Answering a letter sent to him by Gene Daley, a candidate for trustee running against Greenstein's slate, and also a lieutenant in the sheriff's department, Stewart said, "the training provided does not qualify the reserve or auxiliary officer to perform the police functions except in the accompaniment of full-time police officers."

"Based on the opinion of the attorney general of the state of Michigan, reserve and auxiliary officers have peace officer power and authority only while on duty and functioning under the supervision of full-time police personnel."

"While this opinion does not say that the reserve officer must be in the company of a full time officer, it does state that he must be under the supervision of a full-time officer."

Stewart continued, "To be even more specific and to answer your direct question regarding Canton Township recruits, it is my opinion that with the exception of Carl Silvers, who is a retired Detroit police sergeant, the recruits from Canton will not be qualified to be put on the street in any capacity."

**THE CRUX** of the legal matter, Stewart said, is whether Greenstein as chief of police fulfills the legal obligation of full-time accredited police officer.

According to the attorney general's opinion, if the reserves are to have police powers while on duty, they must be under the supervision of a certified officer, and Stewart questions Greenstein's credentials.

"Further, I do not believe Mr. Greenstein's chief's commission is sufficient to qualify him as a full-time police officer, thereby blanketing the reserve officers of that department and disqualify them under the attorney general's opinion."

"As to their being armed once they have completed sufficient training to be qualified to perform the police functions, I feel that it would be an unnecessary risk to them if they were not armed."

Stewart added, "Mr. Greenstein's commission as police chief, in my opinion, is questionable. I do not believe that he can legally be a full-time supervisor and a full-time police chief without entering into an area of conflict of interest."

"As stated elsewhere in this letter, the attorney general is very specific in his opinion that reserve officers must be under the command of full-time police supervision. I do not feel that Mr. Greenstein qualifies under the attorney general's opinion as full-time police officer."

Stewart later stressed that his opinion was his alone and that the matter needed further legal research.

**GREENSTEIN RESPONDED** that state law allows police departments with three officers or less to be exempt from the state training requirements for certification.

"By state law, since we have less than three men in our department, I qualify as a regular officer, and the reserves will therefore be under the direction of a full-time officer."

"There's absolutely no question that I am fully authorized peace officer in a department under three men and that I am allowed to direct the reserves. There's absolutely no conflict of interest between being supervisor and police chief."

## Professional cops to join reserves

A group of certified police officers will join Canton's reserve police force next month, when members of the voluntary agency are scheduled to begin their law enforcement tasks.

Canton officials, originally against the use of professional policemen on the reserve force, have now changed their stance to welcome residents who earn their livings as police officers.

According to Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein, officials' fears over the use of professional policemen on the force revolved around fears of the officers' ability to shed their certified police powers while working with the reserve agency.

But, after talking to certified officers during the last six months, Greenstein, township Treasurer Carl Parsell and reserve force coordinator Carl Silver agreed their fears were unfounded.

"WE WERE worried that the certified policeman would go out and still be a regular cop," Greenstein explained. "But, after talking to many regular police officers, we were all assured that they'd have no difficulty adjusting."

According to Greenstein, the certified officers will guide and supervise the other volunteers.

"We think this will strengthen the reserve unit tremendously and get around the worse fears of our critics," he said, referring to some residents' fears that the armed volunteers would abuse their powers.

"We'll have men certified by the state with the experience to guide and supervise our regular reserves. I think they will add confidence in the minds of the citizens. Ultimately, they will certainly add greater professionalism to the force."

Greenstein eventually hopes to add 10 or 15 certified police officers to the present reserve force of 30, scheduled to graduate next week from the Michigan Police Reserve Training Council. Ideally, the supervisor says, one certified police officer would ride with an uncertified volunteer in each reserve car.

**SO FAR**, Canton officials have accepted three certified officers into the reserve force, but, Greenstein says, many other policemen who live in Canton have applied. Policeman Al McKewen is the most recent addition to the force. Silver, who now works with the U.S. Post Department, and Bill Unger, deputy coordinator of the reserve force, are both certified police officers.

The certified policemen and other volunteers are scheduled to begin their reserve duties at the Canton Jaycoes fair Aug. 4-9. Greenstein says the officers will man a police reserve booth at the fair near Ford and Lilley and police the event.

Although the presence of certified police officers may help quell the fears of residents over an armed voluntary force, Greenstein called those fears "idiotic."

"Members of the force are instructed to

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# If union agrees, Miller to open on time

Miller Elementary will begin the next semester in its year-round schedule on time Monday, provided an agreement is reached this week with the teachers' union.

The Plymouth Board of Education voted 7-0 Monday night to allow a full program for pupils at Miller completing their current 1975-76 school year.

The vote became unanimous after the board learned that to offer the full program would require temporary contracts for only two teachers, instead of nearly six, which was the previous information given the board.

To offer a full program to pupils finishing up the 1975-76 school year, the district must first negotiate a special agreement with the Plymouth Education Association on the two teachers. The agreement basically would allow for a special contract for the two instructors to be employed at Miller only until the September millage election.

If the millage fails, the two would be laid off and Miller would receive the same budget reductions which would be made for all elementaries in the district. If the millage passes, the two would be offered permanent contracts, as would music, art, physical education and humanities specialists throughout the district.

The school board's labor attorney, Charles Fine, has strongly recommended against any temporary agreements to facilitate a full program at Miller until September unless the PEA agrees.

The board's motion Monday was to offer a full program, beginning July 19, provid-

ing the PEA signs a letter of intent to approve the special arrangement.

If the union balks, and agreement isn't reached this week, then Miller would begin its next track Monday, with cuts in effect, unless the board were to call a special meeting to take alternative action.

**THE DECISION** to allow a full program at Miller until September was a deviation from Budget E—the list of cuts which would be made if the millage failed in June.

The rationale of the board was that Miller pupils in the same school year as those from other schools closing in June should not be penalized by the millage defeat. To maintain equity, the board decided that cuts would be effected at Miller until at least the September millage election.

Trustee George Lawton argued that, in making cuts totalling \$2.6 million, the board should avoid any reductions which would affect educational programs which take effect before the second millage vote.

Lawton said this category included the Miller program, fall athletics, and the expense of dual scheduling to leave open the opportunity of offering course electives at the high schools in case the millage is approved.

When asked about the PEA's stance on a special agreement for two teachers at Miller, Supt. John M. Hoben said the union leadership is willing to cooperate, but was not yet in a position to offer any guarantees.

Hoben added that labor law, and advice of legal counsel, precludes the district

from retaining the three teachers at Miller who had taught there last year. The two teachers hired on a temporary basis until September, he added, will be called on the basis of seniority from the list of pink-slipped teachers.

By opening Miller July 19 with a full program, the district is facing a cost liability of about \$28,000, Hoben told the board.

**AFTER SOME** discussion of other budget ramifications, Lawton made a motion supported by Marcia Borowski to allow a full program for Miller through the summer, to allow for football this fall, and to pay the expense of running dual class schedules for the high schools through the computer so a full day of classes could be

offered in case the millage passes.

McClendon said he could support the full program for Miller, as only two teachers were involved instead of six, but was opposed to dual scheduling because he felt the district would be faced with very serious legal liabilities.

Lawton stated that the 45-15 year-round school program at Miller was imposed on parents by the district, and it would be unfair to penalize those pupils with cuts because of the timing of the June millage defeat. He also argued that he believes the community wants an opportunity for unlimited course selections at the high schools, and failure to offer both would seriously hurt chances of the millage passing in September.

Dick Arlen supported McClendon's position, stating he favored the Miller portion of Lawton's motion but would like to vote on athletics and dual scheduling separately.

In arguing for separation of the motion, McClendon said: "I have been in favor of flexible modular scheduling at the two high schools for some time, but we cannot buy what we cannot pay for."

"We must start Miller July 19, and so must make a decision, but we can give further thought to athletics and dual schedules."

Answering a question from Trustee Tom Yack, Personnel Director Norm Kee said running a full program at Miller through the summer would require two teachers.

The six teachers, he added, are those needed for a full program all year in case the second millage attempt is successful.

McClendon then made a motion to delete athletics and dual scheduling from Lawton's motion on Miller School. McClendon added it was his preference that the deleted items be dealt with at a subsequent meeting. The motion to delete athletics and dual scheduling passed 5-2, with Lawton and Ms. Borowski voting "no."

When asked for a clarification on what the remaining portion of Lawton's motion meant to the administration, Hoben said he saw it as a direction to operate Miller until Aug. 29 with a full school day and with art, music and physical education specialists.

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
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# Farmers refused answer on equity question

A motion to offer "fair and equitable compensation" to Canton farmers financially harmed by the new master plan was tabled by a 4-2 vote of the township board Tuesday night.

The motion, made by James Poole and supported by Bob Myers, asked that fair and equitable compensation be made based on land value which existed prior to disclosure of the new master plan. Voting to table were Bob Greenstein, Carl Parsell, John Flodin and Jerry Cheske with Brian Schwall absent.

The motion was introduced after a request by farmer Jim Ammerman that the board take a position on compensation prior to enactment of the zoning ordinance which would lock most land west of Canton Center Road into agricultural use.

The administration argued the request was premature as it shouldn't be considered until after enactment of the zoning ordinance, and that action taken now would "absolutely destroy" the master plan.

AMMERMAN TOLD the board that fair payment should be made to landowners for land value lost as a result of the master plan.

"The payment should be fair and agreeable to both sides as is done when government condemns land for public use," he argued. "Transfer of land value by zoning shouldn't be an exception to excuse government from this obligation."

"The county planning commission has stated farmers should get equity, some board members have said we will be treated with equity. We'd like the board to define equity and who's entitled to receive it. I don't think it's premature to make the request now. In fact, I think the board has the cart before the horse when it plans to adopt the zoning ordinance and afterwards contemplate how it will compensate landowners."

"The farmers ask that upon implementation of the plan that prompt payment be made to landowners, based on the value of

the land prior to disclosure of the master plan," Ammerman concluded.

GREENSTEIN CAUTIONED the board not to take such action now because the legalities of the issue were complex.

He referred to one county in the U.S. which enacted a similar plan to Canton's and had to sell a bond issue of \$65 million to purchase development rights from farmers.

"There are some areas involved which should be classified as hardship cases because the farmers have owned their land for many years and aren't speculators," Greenstein said.

"But for the land west of Ridge Road, where there is no sewer or water service, the land won't be developable for 7-10 years," he added, "and so there is no value being lost until at least seven years because of the master plan or zoning."

"About 90 per cent of the land west of Canton Center Road is zoned agricultural today and has always been zoned agricultural. The township is not responsible for people's hopes and expectations. There are some areas where the township does have a responsibility, but we must adopt the zoning first to determine those areas. By then we may know if and how much federal money will be available to purchase development rights."

U.S. Rep. James O'Hara (D-Utica) has said he is trying to get the Canton master plan accepted as a pilot program for the U.S. to preserve farmland and, if this were done, federal monies would be available.

"This township has the right and duty to take action in the best interests of our citizens," Greenstein proclaimed. "We will do our best to protect the property interests of farmers, but farmers have no legal right to any zoning. All zoning is subject to change, based on the best interests of the entire township."

"This board has a legal obligation to treat any property owner fairly and if we don't the courts can make a ruling on that."

AMMERMAN COUNTERED that, regardless of government's intent, unfair things do occur and it would be cumbersome and time-consuming to go to court.

"We would rather be assured by formal action by this board that your intent is to compensate the land owners adequately."

Parsell asked if it was really necessary for the board to adopt a resolution that it intended to be fair to farmers, or anyone. "We can't put in any specific dollar amounts now. What kind of resolution can we adopt?"

Poole commented that the total price tag to compensate for lands "confiscated" could be \$10-\$12 million and could be as high as \$35 million. "Let's say it were \$10 million. Based on our present population, that would cost each taxpayer \$5,000 if every farmer were to be compensated."

Greenstein accused Poole of making his motion only for public relations purposes. "You may make the farmers happy by making that motion but you know quite well the rest of the board won't support it. If your motion passes, what would happen is that Canton would have a lottery bigger than the state lottery. Your motion would absolutely cripple the master plan and destroy any chance Canton has of getting federal money."

"If you tell the federal government what rules it has to play by, by determining compensation now, they won't play."

After hearing heated comments from some farmers in the audience, Greenstein snapped: "We will do everything possible to treat you equitably, but I don't like being called a liar and other names. I'm not seeking any money for myself and won't receive a dollar from this plan. You are the ones who want the dollars."

"Well, you didn't 'pay' for your present zoning and you won't pay for any future zoning. If farmers, or any other landowner, sell and make a profit they don't pay the township any share of that profit. The township doesn't pay for losses just as it doesn't collect for land sale profits."

CHESKE DECLARED he intends to be fair whenever possible but that the board had to study the issue of compensation before making any decisions.

"I don't understand the legal ramifications on this, and I don't think Poole does either."


"I want to be fair to the farmers," Cheske added, "although I don't care about the speculators."

Poole argued that his motion only called for fair and equitable compensation.

Greenstein countered that the motion called for every landowner west of Canton Center Road be compensated. "We have never said we'd purchase the development rights of every single acre involved."

Parsell noted that Poole is in the real estate business and asked him what price he would consider fair value for the total 55,000 acres involved. "I have no idea," Poole answered.

"I understand your position on this all along—you haven't been in favor of the master plan," Parsell told Poole. "There are legal and political implications here and so I propose that we table the motion until we can get a legal opinion on the whole issue. This board is in no position to act now."

## Officers elected legally, Gray is new president

The Plymouth Board of Education elected its officers for the coming year Monday night, with no change from a similar attempt July 1.

By a voice vote for each office, the board elected Joe Gray president, E.J. McClelland vice-president, Dick Arlen treasurer, and Flossie Tonda secretary.

The election had to be repeated because the board had improperly suspended bylaws and voted by secret ballot on July 1. An attempt to elect officers July 6 was unsuccessful when George Lawton voted "no" on a motion to hold the balloting, a motion which required a unanimous vote.

THE MEETING began Monday with Supt. John M. Hoben assuming the chair to conduct election of president.

"An item was on the agenda to suspend bylaws and allow a secret ballot, but no one made that request, and the election was conducted by voice vote."

In the balloting for president, Gray, Arlen, McClelland and Mrs. Tonda voted for Gray while Tom Yack, Lawton and Marcia Borowski voted for Ms. Borowski. McClelland was elected vice-president 5-1-1 with Ms. Borowski voting "no" and McClelland abstaining. The vote was unanimous, 7-0, for Arlen and Mrs. Tonda. No other nominations were made for the of-

fices of vice-president, secretary and treasurer.

THE ELECTION portion of the meeting began with Gray's being nominated for president by McClelland, supported by Mrs. Tonda. Yack then nominated Ms. Borowski.

Yack then offered an explanation of his nomination to the audience: "It is my interpretation of our election process that the board, when it elects officers, identifies individuals it feels can conduct business in such a way as to lead this board through the many obstacles it will face during the coming year. I identify myself with those members with whom I have the greatest faith."

"The presidency carries heavy responsibilities," Yack continued, "and the board should identify that member capable of conducting effective meetings and leading it through parliamentary pitfalls, some of which you have seen the board stumble through in the most recent past."

"We need a president who can commit hundreds of hours to meet the duties of the presidency. The job calls for a person capable of keeping this board on course. Marcia Borowski has demonstrated over the past two years that she has this ability, al-


though I have not always agreed with what she has said or with how she has said it. But she's qualified for the office and committed to those things that are good for kids."

McClelland, in making nominating remarks for Gray, said it was critical to elect a president who represented the thinking of the community.

"I think it is evident that Joe Gray has the confidence of the community. Although I hear talk of the philosophy of individual board members as somehow being a factor in their qualification for president, I stress that no one person's individual philosophy shall prevail at this board."

"A good sense for the democratic process and a regard for others are among the qualifications Joe Gray has," McClelland added, concluding: "I have every confidence Joe Gray will rise to the challenge of the office."

The election Monday marks a complete change in the slate of officers from last year. The board officers who ended their tenure at the end of June were: Marda Benson, president, who was defeated in a bid for re-election in June; Ms. Borowski, vice-president; Lawton, secretary; and Yack, treasurer.



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

"What are they supposed to do if they see a woman being raped? Referee? It's insanity to ask any volunteer to go out in a marked car without protection. They may be asked to go into a dangerous situation."

The reserve officers, the supervisor noted, received 100 hours of training at the reserve training school. They are expected to receive their second weaponry certification from the National Rifle Association next week.

Members of the Canton Board of Trustees have already approved the addition of 25 or 30 more uncertified officers to the corps of 30, scheduled to graduate next week. The applicants will take written examinations and oral interviews as part of the screening process.

## No promises made — Stein

Harold Stein, running against Robert Greenstein in the August primary as a Democrat for township supervisor, denied Tuesday he had made any promises to Jim Akhtar, president of the Wayne County Sheriff's local 502, that if elected supervisor he would contract with the sheriff if the township lost its suit that the sheriff's services be provided by the county.

The Observer & Eccentric reported last week that Stein had promised Akhtar he would contract with the sheriff if the lawsuit was lost.

"All I did when I met with him was show him my position paper," the challenger for supervisor said. "It's the position I held when I started this campaign and it's the same that I hold now."

In that position statement, Stein said "I feel all necessary services for the township should be solicited on a competitive basis, especially police protection. Rather than make large capital expenditures for our own special departments, I feel these positions should be contracted for."

## Homeowners deny flyer

Members of the Stonegate Civic Association Inc. deny they had anything to do with a flyer circulated in Canton this week that attacks the slate of Supervisor Robert Greenstein.

The flyer, allegedly circulated by the Stonegate Homeowners Citizens Group, purports to be an endorsement of Greenstein but alleges personal misconduct on his part and fiscal improprieties by his present administration.

In a statement read by Carol Bodenmiller, a resident in the Stonegate subdivision, members of the civic association said, "any flyers or other form of communication of a political nature which seem to come from either the Stonegate Civic Association, Inc. or Stonegate Homeowners Association are neither supported nor endorsed."

"The opinions of the officers of either association are not representative of group endorsement. We strongly disapprove of any abusive use of our good names to further any political interests."

Mrs. Bodenmiller said the associations are prohibited by their own bylaws from partisan politics.

## Absentee ballots are now available

Applications for absentee voter ballots for the Aug. 3 primary election are now available at Plymouth City Hall, Canton Township offices and Plymouth Township offices.

The applications will be available at all three locations until July 31 at 2 p.m. Registered voters must return their absentee ballots to their city or township clerk by the time the polls close on election day.

According to state law, registered voters may submit absentee ballots if they expect to be absent from their resident municipality on election day; if they cannot attend the polls because of tenants of their religion; if they are precinct workers at a precinct other than where they must vote; if they are 60 years of age or older; or if they are confined to jail.

Canton Clerk John Flodin says many residents of his municipality vote by absentee ballot.

"The numbers depend on the interest in the election," he said, "but a lot of people vote that way. It's particularly difficult for older people to come to vote, so many of them vote by absentee ballot."

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# Football salvaged amidst school budget cuts

Football season will begin on schedule this fall at Plymouth Salem and will begin on time for Plymouth Canton High providing a coaching staff can be hired.

That confirmation was made by the Plymouth Board of Education Monday night when it voted \$2.6 million in budget cuts which will be made if millage is denied Sept. 2.

The board voted 4-3 against a motion to eliminate all contract riders, including those for football coaches, pending a successful millage election.

The vote to deny elimination of contract riders means football teams will begin practices as normally scheduled. Voting against elimination of contract riders were Dick Arlen, Joe Gray, E.J. McClendon and Flossie Tonda.

**REGARDING FOOTBALL**, the only factor which could delay opening of the season is hiring of a coaching staff for Plymouth Canton High.

A few months ago the head coach, Jim Muneio, and his assistants resigned in protest of what they described as meddling in the Canton football program by Gray. Since then, two of Muneio's assistants have joined the football staff at Salem.

The Canton coaching positions have been posted for two months now and there hasn't been a single application from within the district for those jobs. In a letter to the board at the time of Muneio's resignation, the coaching staff of the district indicated they would not fill those positions if the resignations were allowed.

Supt. John M. Hoben says the district is searching for coaches from outside the district to run the Canton football program. "They will be given contract riders only to coach football and won't be offered teaching contracts."

**THE VOTE** to eliminate contract riders for all sports and extra-curricular activities followed a motion to do so by Tom Yack.

Yack was relying on a May 10 resolution of intent by the school board which stated all contract riders "could be" eliminated if the millage were defeated with some of the savings used to restore four reading support specialists.

Gray explained that his understanding of the May 10 resolution was that a vote of the board was required to eliminate contract riders because of the "could be" language.

"Budget E, the list of what would be cut if the millage were defeated, is the board's commitment on specific cuts. Any other cuts would have to be by amendment, with the board voting to do so."

Answering a question from George Lawton, Hoben said the football squads must begin practice three weeks before the season starts by state law in order to play the first game. Because of this requirement, he added, football was the only fall sport which couldn't have a full schedule if the millage passed in September.

Hoben added that the administration's recommendation was to approve the budget E cuts and then reduce the total athletic budget by another 25 per cent with the savings used to restore reading support specialists.

This option, if approved, would allow the football teams to begin their schedules with cuts being made for other sports in case of millage defeat.

The other fall sports, which could be eliminated or reduced in case of millage defeat, include cross country, golf, basketball, tennis and swimming. Of the six fall sports, three are for boys and three for girls. The cost of running a reduced fall athletic program is estimated at \$36,000.

Hoben said the administration recommended the 25 per cent cut, instead of elimination of all riders, as a compromise between the two factions on the board and "so we don't have a generation of students completely devoid of the opportunity for any of these programs."

**MARCIA BOROWSKI** asked the status of cheerleaders, pompon girls, and the Water Waves which, by earlier board action, was cut out of the athletic budget with the provision that the activities would be picked up in the instructional or activities budget.

Kent Buikema, principal of Plymouth Canton, said these items have not been budgeted in the activities fund and that he hopes the central administration could find some place in the budget to pick them up. Buikema pointed out that Water Waves don't begin until the spring, but cheerleaders and pompon girls would start their programs in the fall.

Paul Cummings, a coach at Salem, told the board that normally football teams would begin practice Aug. 23 and that the first football game this season was scheduled for Sept. 27.

Yack suggested cancelling the first scheduled football games, if necessary, at both schools since they were non-league games and could be dropped without endangering league commitments.

Cummings said the first league game was a Salem contest on Sept. 24 which, to be held, would require that practice begin Sept. 8.

When asked what constituted a legal practice, Hoben said there would have to be an adult supervisor to oversee a practice being held for the purpose of physical conditioning and team organization.

Lawton commented that he has always viewed athletics as an important extension of the educational process, and he was against having football penalized by being unable to start its season even with a successful millage vote.

Yack argued that practice could be held even if contract riders were eliminated because coaches could volunteer to coach without pay as was done in the last teachers' strike.

"By taking this action, we commit ourselves to a full athletic program only after we know how much money we have as a result of the September vote. The league games wouldn't be interrupted, if residents voted 'yes,' and it seems quite likely the non-league games also would be played," added Yack.

McClendon argued that Yack's motion tied the board's hand when it didn't have a need to act.

"We need a master contract yet with the teachers," he said, "and need to explore our options. I think it extremely unwise to box ourselves in now on football and band."

Yack countered that no new information would come before the board between now and September which will have any bearing on athletics and the marching band. "By not acting now, we are impairing our millage chances."

Gray disagreed, stating that completely eliminating sports and marching band would definitely hurt the district's chances of getting the millage passed.

During the meeting, Hoben interjected that it would be very difficult for the administration to ask the new Canton football coaches, being offered a contract rider only, to volunteer their services without pay pending the millage result.

The only danger to the marching band before the Sept. 2 millage vote, Hoben

assessment approach was better for the public because each year the board would have to conduct public hearings and justify the tax levy for the coming year.

"The traditional method is to levy a tax for 10 or 20 years and it's collected for that period whether needed or not. I think it's better for residents to have a public hearing each year when they can challenge the necessity for the amount of millage proposed."

**ANOTHER RESIDENT** asked what would happen if the actual expenses exceeded the amount of revenue that will be raised by 1 1/2 mills.

It was explained that any shortage would be made up by a loan from the general fund. Whatever amount was borrowed from the general fund in one year would have a bearing on how much millage was levied the following year, explained Parsell.

Fire Chief Mel Paulun said the fire department has enough vehicles now to meet the needs of the second department for five years.

The motion to approve the 1 1/2 mills was made by Parsell, supported by Clerk John Flodin, and passed 6-0 with Trustee Brian Schwall absent.

Parsell commented just before the vote that it would be a year before the station was ready to be occupied and, at that time, the administration would be in a position to better determine exact operating cost for the fiscal year and would then know how much, if any, would be borrowed from the general fund.

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# Regional Roundup

## TAX REDUCTION?

Wayne-Henly School District, one of the most heavily taxed districts in the state, may gain some tax relief. Supt. Timothy Dyer said the recently passed state aid bill provides benefits for high millage districts in the third year of the bill. Previously, districts received no state money for any additional millage beyond 30 mills.

## SCHOOL LAWSUIT

The Redford Union Board of Education Monday voted to join with other member districts of the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) in fighting a lawsuit brought about by a Romeo teacher who claimed she was denied pregnancy disability benefits. If the schools lose, other teachers could claim benefits totaling \$40 million, according to RU School Supt. Robert Juhnke.

## HOUSING PLANS

The Livonia Planning Commission took action on two housing developments, one for senior citizens and one for expensive single-family houses. The housing for the elderly will be on the north side of Lyndon, west of Farmington Road, while the single-family houses will be on the south side of Six Mile, west of Newburgh, part of

the \$50 million Laurel Park development. The commission endorsed a rezoning plan which would eliminate a proposed 192-units for senior citizens to make room for the 25 new homes, to be in the \$50,000-60,000 price range.

## NTC ROLLS AGAIN

The Nankin Transit Commission, which provided mini-bus transportation for senior citizens and handicapped persons in Garden City, Westland and Wayne, now includes Inkster. After suffering through the final stages of incorporation last week, the NTC is back in business this week. The mini-bus runs daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The NTC board, presently studying a survey of riders, is planning to expand the program to include possible Saturday service for NTC patrons.

## CONTRACTS RATIFIED

After more than two years of negotiations, Canton Township Tuesday ratified union contracts with three groups of township employees: DPW workers, building inspectors, and firefighters. The union contracts were the first for all three groups. According to township administrators, the lengthy bargaining was necessary because the contracts were the first for all parties involved.

## OLD VET DIES

Charles Scarlett, 97, formerly a 35-year resident of Redford Township and one of the four known surviving veterans of the Spanish-American War from the Detroit area, died last week. Burial was Saturday in Livonia. Scarlett is survived by a son and a daughter now living in Redford.

## SECOND MILLAGE VOTE

The Plymouth Board of Education has set a Sept. 2 election date for new operating millage, after a request for 4.75 additional mills was defeated by one vote June 14. To balance its budget, the board has approved cuts of some \$2½ million, although it voted against making the starting of football season contingent upon a successful millage vote. The \$2½ million cuts include the layoffs of some 83 teachers.

## CANTON APPROVES 1.5-MILL LEVY

Canton Township board members Tuesday approved a 1.5-mill fire levy for construction, staffing and equipping of a second township fire station. The levy was set by the board after township voters approved a special fire assessment district May 18. The station is expected to be completed sometime next year.

Democrats and Republicans were "grandfathered" on the November ballot because of their previous capture of the vote, as are the Human Rights and American Independent parties. The American Independent Party (AIP) has split into two parties, each with a separate slate, and the court will have to decide which party is going to be considered the AIP.

The important thing to remember about the primary ballot is that a voter may only vote in one party, as in all primary elections in Michigan. Voters may not vote for candidates in either the Democratic or Republican parties and vote to see one of the minor parties on the November ballot. Voting in more than one section of the ballot will invalidate the ballot.

## Your vote can count in 1 of 3 ways

The ballot for the Aug. 3 primary election is going to be different than any previously seen in Michigan.

The difference is that voters will be offered an opportunity to vote for a minor political party in order to allow that party's candidates to appear on the general election ballot.

This alternative has never been on the primary ballot before. It is the direct result of a fear of election officials that voting machines could not handle the 10 or more parties which might be on the November ballot. Voting machines cannot handle more than nine parties, if 10 were approved it would force a return to paper ballots.

Minor parties will qualify for the presidential election ballot if they receive a vote totalling more than 0.3 per cent of the

total number of ballots cast in the primary election.

VOTERS WILL have the choice of voting in one—and only one—section of a three-sectioned ballot: 1) Democratic Party candidates; 2) Republican Party candidates; and 3) a listing of minor parties which qualified for the ballot under a law signed by Gov. William Milliken in April this year.

The wording of the third section, either in a row or a column, will be: "I desire that the party indicated below shall have its name, party vignette and candidates listed on the next general election ballot."

Minor parties appearing on the Oakland County ballot, for example, are: Socialist Worker, Socialist Labor, Communist Labor, Libertarian and U.S. Labor.

## County schools schedule hearing

A public hearing on the \$3.9 million 1976-77 budget of the Wayne County Intermediate School District will be at 9:30 a.m., July 21 at the Education Center, 33500 Van Born, Wayne.

The county school board already has been approved by the county's 36 local school districts.

## Long-time fire volunteer retires from public service

One of the most revered firefighting buffs in western Wayne County, Norbert H. Fitzner of Plymouth, finally is going to retire.

After 21 years of service, during which he has answered most every fire alarm—morning, noon or night—Fitzner has informed Plymouth Fire Chief George Schoenneman that he has gone to his last fire.

To mark his retirement, other volunteers and city officials will honor Fitzner at a retirement party in the Cultural Center on July 29.

NOW A REAL ESTATE salesman, with


an ice cream parlor on Ann Arbor Road as a side business, Fitzner has been a firefighting buff since the days of his youth.

He long has held membership in that unusual group that can't resist a call when the fire alarm sounds.

"Norbert has been one of our most enthusiastic volunteers," Chief Schoenneman said, "and he sure will be missed when the first fire alarm is sounded in August."

According to official records, Fitzner has been on the list of volunteers for 21 years, four years longer than any other member of the group.

"He came to us in 1955," Schoenneman explained, "and he rarely has missed a fire since. Next to him, we have Ron Wood,



the City of Plymouth as the "dean of American city managers." One wonders if his proficiency in later years was conditioned by his experiences here, during a period when a dollar was hard to come by.

C.H. ELLIOTT, who succeeded Cookingham as city manager here in 1936, came from Pontiac where he had held a similar position.

Elliott served under five consecutive mayors in Plymouth, including Arthur

Bluhk, Henry Hondorp, L.E. Wilson, Mrs. Ruth Huston-Whipple and Stanley T. Corbett.

During Elliott's second year in office, the good old days in Plymouth, from a parking standpoint, came to an end. In 1937, at the request of local merchants, the commission passed an ordinance limiting parking in the business district to a maximum of two hours.

On May 14, during the same year, Elliott requested and received a report on local privies. It was called an "outside toilet survey." The report showed privies existed at 40 locations in the city. The owners were notified to discontinue the use of the "back-houses" and to arrange to connect to the city sewer system.

ELLIOTT'S REPORT for the 1936-37 fiscal year indicated that the Burrough's Adding Machine Co., then preparing to build a plant in Plymouth Township adjacent to

the city, had requested permission to run plant sewage through the city's disposal plant. On April 22, 1937, the city commission agreed to the request.

In 1938, the city commission passed a dance ordinance setting up "certain regulations for the public good." The law was prompted by a petition circulated by residents who objected to dances held in the Grange Hall and in the Jewell and Blach Hall.

In the 1940-41 fiscal year, the commission adopted a trailer ordinance.

"It became apparent, due to the larger employment in defense industries in the vicinity of Plymouth," Elliott wrote, "that the property owner would lose a considerable valuation of his property by having vacant lots throughout the city used for trailer purposes. Wisely, the commission passed the ordinance before the influx."

One of the local defense plants Elliott may have had in mind was put up on Eekles Road during Lend-Lease days by the British government before the United States entered World War II. It was the machine gun factory run by Kelsey-Hayes in the building later occupied by Evans Products Company.

DURING THE 1941-41 period, about 60 years after Pasteur discovered his method of preventing fermentation in milk, the milk ordinance in Plymouth was amended making it mandatory that milk sold within the city be pasteurized.

In June 1942, when the nation was involved in World War II, and the Detroit area was a prime producer of war material, the Plymouth City Commission decided to be on the safe side by adopting a black-out ordinance.

At about that time, the commission approved Elliott's recommendation, "as a war economy," to have all residential rubbish picked up at the curb, rather than making it necessary for city employees to make pick-ups at the rear of homes. Like temporary taxes, this temporary war-time policy inevitably became a permanent practice.

ELLIOTT LEFT here in May 1946 to become city manager of Jackson and later of Kalamazoo.

Assessing his tenure here, a resident who worked for him says Elliott impressed her as being an efficient city manager. Another citizen, who felt that Ruth Whipple in or out of office wielded too much power at city hall, says Elliott was unduly influenced by Plymouth's first woman mayor.

The man who succeeded Elliott as city manager of Plymouth was certainly not under Mrs. Whipple's or anyone else's thumb, and he had a turbulent three years here.

Harold Cheek, who assumed the position in June 1946, had been city manager of Big Stone Gap, Va. He arrived here, however, after two year's service in the U.S. Navy from which he was discharged as a lieutenant, senior grade.

Generally conceded to be an efficient administrator, even by his opponents, Cheek had difficulty establishing rapport with a large part of the population. Many resented what one characterized as Cheek's "my-word-is-law" attitude, perhaps picked up during his service in the Navy.

Cheek left Plymouth in September 1949 after precipitating a major controversy which led to the recall of four of the five members of the city commission. The struggle between the pro-Cheek and anti-Cheek forces in Plymouth during the summer of 1949 is described in detail in chapter eight of my book on the history of Plymouth.

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## Schools earn federal grant

The Plymouth Community School District has earned a federal grant to finance a model accountability program with three other school districts.

Funding for the district's participation in the state accountability consortium has been approved by the State Board of Education, which must grant approval to the federal funding. Word received here July 12 was that \$34,370 would be available to Plymouth Schools.

The proposal for participation in the consortium was developed by Supt. John M. Hoben, Deputy Supt. Earl E. Hogan, and

Samuel D. Ulsaker, administrative assistant for research, program planning and federal projects.

Through the PEPSII Model of Management, Plymouth Schools hopes to improve accountability at all levels, explains Hoben. The federal funds for the consortium will be used to develop and implement this program of management by objectives.

Other school districts participating in the accountability consortium are Grand Rapids, Wayne-Westland and Waterford.

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

# The Stroller More on Bird

Like many other former baseball writers who have covered the national pastime in the press boxes across the country for more years than they care to remember, The Stroller has been letting his memory run rampant to learn if there ever was anything to match the astounding career of The Bird.

Ever since the Tigers turned him loose on the mound a few months ago, Mark Friedych has become the idol of the thousands of fans from one ocean to the other. And folks are quick to comment: "There never has been anything like him."

This is high praise for a youngster who has yet to finish a half season in the major leagues and it may be a long time before we have another rookie honored with the starting assignment in the all-star game.

He has become a real character—the young player who has writers trailing him day and night as he spends his time in the spotlight.

OVER THE YEARS there have been many other characters in the game and many of them are still the subject of wild tales when the old time writers get together, especially at all-star game or World Series time.

Long before he ever visited any of the nation's major league ball parks, The Stroller had heard of the legendary "Rube" Waddell of the old Philadelphia Athletics managed by the venerable Connie Mack.

He was a fire buff and no matter what city he happened to be in he would visit the fire halls. Many are the times that he rode to the ball park on a fire truck.

He is the pitcher who called in the outfielders, telling them they weren't needed, and then retired the side.

One of the best stories about Waddell, however, is the tale they tell of Ossie Schreck, his old battery and room mate. One year when it came time to sign his contract, Ossie balked. He told Mack that the financial terms were OK, but there was one thing he wanted in the contract.

"If you are going to make me room with Waddell again," he said to the Athletics owner, "I want a clause in his contract forbidding him to eat crackers in bed." And he meant it.

THERE HAVE BEEN many others through the years—Casey Stengel, for instance when he carried a pigeon under his cap when he went to the plate to take his turn at bat.

And no one fractured the English language more than Yogi Berra, now a coach with the Yankees.

Introduced to Emil DeVallera, the Brooklyn man who later became a high official in Ireland, Yogi remarked, "It could happen only in America."

Yogi also is the character who, explaining that Detroit was on daylight savings time, said, "It gets late, here early."

The character that comes closest to matching The Bird within The Stroller's memory is the late, lamented Paul "Dizzy" Trout, the rookie from Sandcut, Ind., who took the Tiger camp by storm in 1937.

On being introduced to Mickey Cochrane by The Stroller, he calmly said, "Mike, your worries are over. I'll take care of the pitching for you."

Being hounded by the writers of his time, Dizzy told all who would listen that his red bandana pitch would carry him through.

After begging Cochrane to get a starting assignment in the spring exhibition season, he finally got his wish. The first thing he did was bet Cochrane the opposition wouldn't get a hit off him. And they didn't.

He went along for four games in which he pitched three innings in each one, without allowing a hit. He was the talk of the south.

Then came an Easter Sunday in Daytona Beach, Fla., where the Tigers met the St. Louis Cardinals in a replay of the 1934 World Series. It was a day never to be forgotten.

Dizzy, now a cocky kid by this time, walked passed the Cards dugout and asked, "How do you hillbillies feel with shoes on?" That was the wrong thing to say to the Gas House Gang as the Cards were known in those days.

So when Dizzy took the mound in the fourth inning, The Cards started to ride him. They shouted at him, "Is that the best you have." They left the dugout and screamed at him with the result that Dizzy got mad, walked six batters and was taken from the game.

Arriving back at the bench he shouted at Cochrane, within ear shot of the writers, "What in hell did you take me out for?" I walked nine batters one time down at Sandcut and we won the game."

But he never was the same character on the field after that.

In the mid-40s he became one of the Tigers best hurlers but that spring of 1937 down at Lakeland in the training camp and the Grapefruit League, he was a fabulous character.

But, unlike The Bird, he never got to start an all star game.

## Biologists discover how Vitamin C helps fish

Scientists have known for years that fish use vitamin C for proper bone growth and to increase their tolerance to environmental stresses. Yet they never knew exactly how this occurred. Now they do, and the discovery may help biologists in combating the effects of pollution on fish, the Department of the Interior announced.

Biologists at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Fish Pesticide Laboratory in Columbia, Mo., first learned of the mechanism while studying catfish that were affected by the insecticide toxaphene. This pesticide is widely used on cotton crops in the South where channel catfish are also commercially raised.

About six years ago, biologists noticed that the channel catfish grown on fish farms in that area were developing a curvature of the spine that, in extreme cases, broke the fish's back and stunted growth as much as one-third. Last year, Fish and Wildlife scientists linked this syndrome to toxaphene residues in the water. Concentrations as low as 37 parts per trillion in the water were found to have serious long-term effects on catfish. Earlier this year, they documented for the first time the specific role vitamin C plays in this process, and the implications of fish in the wild, the discovery of its importance in fish metabolism has been quite beneficial to the multi-million dollar fish farming business of the South, where up to five per cent of pond-cultured catfish showed the symptom. Vitamin C is now included in many commercially prepared fish foods, and its inclusion in the diet of farmed catfish is helping to eliminate the "broken back syndrome."

However, the discovery of vitamin C's importance in fish metabolism is equally beneficial to biologists studying the chronic effects of pollutants. Biologists believe that the mechanism which fish use in detoxifying toxaphene is the same used to neutralize the effects of other pollutants,

but further studies are necessary before any firm conclusions can be drawn.

## IN FOCUS:

Students in the Plymouth Community Schools will be able to tell their grandchildren how they observed the nation's 200th birthday. And they should have some yellowed clippings from their hometown newspaper, the Observer & Eccentric, describing their activities. Stories and pictures of plays they enacted, flag ceremonies they attended, the costumes they wore, cupcake flags assembled then consumed, and the models of historic significance they manufactured.

It was the year the Plymouth Historical Museum opened, the Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps was equipped with new uniforms, and bicentennial flags were flown from every flag staff. There were Bicentennial-in-the Park concerts, planting of three centennial seedlings, 1776 bicentennial trees in Canton Township, and red, white and blue gardens.

Main Street became the Bicentennial Mile and on the

Fourth of July residents took part in a lantern-passing ceremony which commemorated the ride of Paul Revere. The Chamber of Commerce had a Bicentennial Ball in the Meeting House which attracted a full house and British visitors who brought birthday greetings from Plymouth, England. And with notebook or camera in hand the Observer & Eccentric staff was there — recording history as it happened — carrying on the tradition of its predecessor, the old Plymouth Mail, the community's first newspaper.

# Open meetings bill stalls in the state senate until fall

The Michigan Senate will wait until September to take up an open meetings bill passed earlier by the house and amended slightly in a conference committee.

On the closing day of the session, the senate rejected the conference report 19-8, with 20 votes needed for passage.

Supporting it were Senators Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) and William Faust (D-Westland). Opposed were Senators Donald Bishop (R-Rochester) and Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth). Absent was Sen. Bill S. Huffman (D-Madison Heights).

"I CAN'T TELL whether it was a good or bad bill," said Pursell.

"I served on 13 conference committees, and I was absolutely exhausted. I was upset at Dave (Plawecki of Dearborn Heights) for trying to ram it through on the last day of the session."

The vote came during the final hours before the legislature began its summer recess, according to a Democratic state-

ment, and was conducted with a number of senators absent.

State Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), chairman of the house towns and counties committee which drafted the bill, said conferees from the senate and the house worked three hours the night before adjournment.

The conference report made a number of amendments, mostly in technical language, without damaging the strong "openness" of the bill, said Brown.

ONE CHANGE senators insisted on, said Brown, was to remove the section calling for automatic removal from office of any public official convicted of intentionally violating the act twice within the same term.

This stiff penalty was replaced by a provision making a second violation a high misdemeanor with a possible fine or jail sentence.

Most vocal critics, Brown said, were the Michigan Municipal League, an organization of cities and villages; some commu-

nity colleges, and public hospitals.

The house version of the bill requires public officials to conduct nearly all business at public meetings, making exceptions for early real estate negotiations and such matters as personnel and student conduct problems.

"Any public official who could not live and operate within the provisions of this act, as it passed the house, or even more so as it emerged from conference committee, should not be allowed to hold public office and serve the people of this state," Brown said, adding:

"Most persons running for office promise the voters that they will open things up and stay in touch with the people when elected or appointed. Yet, when the time came for these same people to cast their voices for strong legislation to protect the public from secret meetings and closed-door dealings, they choose to run to their lobbyists and fight the bill every step of the way."

## Elsman presses Austin on funds

Birmingham lawyer James L. Elsman, seeking the Democratic nomination to the U.S. Senate, said he still wants Michigan Secretary of State Richard Austin to return campaign contributions he received from his license plate branch managers.

Elsman said last week he would continue with a court suit to force return of money already collected. Austin, front runner in the senate primary, announced earlier last week he would end the kick-back system and collect no further funds by

that method, but he would not return past collections.

Elsman, who has never held public office, had been running fourth in the polls, which showed him getting one per cent of the Aug. 3 vote to U.S. Rep. Donald Riegle (D-Flint) and 11 for U.S. Rep. James O'Hara (D-Utica).

Elsman said he "felt like David slaying Goliath" after Austin announced he would end the system. And Elsman indicated he expected an improved showing in the polls.

He said he began criticizing Austin on the issue as far back as May 13. Major attention was given the issue in recent weeks by a Detroit daily newspaper and some outstate newspapers.

THE SECRETARY of state has maintained that the contributions received from branch managers were voluntary. Austin has collected some \$50,000 through the system since April. Since 1971, he and other Democrats have garnered more than \$700,000 in contributions.

For decades, branch managers have been appointed by the secretary of state's office and have been solicited for contributions.

After Austin's announcement that the system would end, Elsman said, "It appears he will benefit from it this year. He's keeping all the money he's collected so far."

Elsman charged contributions may still be channeled to the Democratic Party and that Austin would benefit if he wins the party's senate nomination.

ANOTHER SENATE hopeful, Riegle, also criticized Austin for not returning past contributions.

"If ethical considerations arose now, why is future money any different from funds raised heretofore?" Riegle said. "I am opposed to the patronage money tree. Austin should compete for free-will donations like the rest of us."

Riegle opened the barrage on Austin in January by asking Michigan television stations not to broadcast public service commercials on license plates that ended with an appearance by Austin. Most stations immediately cut the film footage on Austin.

The other Democratic senate hopeful, O'Hara, had no immediate comment.

# Padden wants 'more equitable' juries

Michigan courts may have the largest and most representative crop of juror prospects in this century if a downriver lawmaker is successful with legislation he recently introduced in the state house.

Rep. Jeffrey D. Padden (D-Wyandotte) recently introduced a five-bill package for reform of the state jury system.

The jury reform package has bipartisan sponsorship from 21 representatives, eight

of whom are members of the judiciary committee.

"With citizens' inconvenience eliminated," Padden maintains, "it is possible to get on with needed improvements for more equitable practices."

Padden's proposals would allow for generous deferrals, as is customary in the recently streamlined courts of Wayne County, but the only conditions which would dis-

qualify a person from jury service are those which are currently in effect.

An area still concerning Padden is the number of existing exemptions which narrow the pool of juror prospects.

"We have found that most jury pools are heavily weighted with women. This is because certain exempted occupation fields are male-dominated."



## Digitals' accuracy depends on sand

Digital watches are among the most sophisticated of consumer products, but just a few grains of sand are responsible for their accuracy, explains Lawrence Giacoleto, professor of electrical engineering and systems science at Michigan State University.

Digital watches depend on silicon, the stuff of beach sand, for the quartz crystals and miniature transistors that keep the new time pieces running with an accuracy as fine as five to 10 seconds per month. The solid-state digital watch, Giacoleto says, is basically an American invention, with much of the technology and development capital coming from our computer industry.

"Other countries simply have not been able to keep pace with American solid state and integrated circuit expertise," Giacoleto says.

WITH DIGITAL WATCH prices falling from about \$125 to \$20 in 15 months, there's not much incentive for new manufacturers to get into production.

Horology, the science of time and time pieces, took a giant step about 10 years ago when engineers built small quartz crystals that could vibrate about 32,000 times per second.

To mark the passing of each second, a miniature transistorized circuit containing

as many as 2,000 transistors simply counts the vibrations. For each 32,000 vibrations, the circuit sends a signal to a display device that records the time.

BUT DIGITAL watches have their problems.

They are bulky because of the electric battery required to keep the crystal vibrating and the display device visible.

The battery has to be replaced about once each year at a cost of a few dollars, which is not necessary with a conventional wrist watch.

Visibility of the display is another problem. Digital watch displays come in two basic varieties. Each has its own peculiarities.

THE LIGHT-EMITTING diode (LED) display is even easy to see in the dark, but it drains a relatively large amount of current from the battery. LED watch circuits are designed to shut off power to the LED until a button is pushed. But if both hands

are full you'll have to use your nose or go without the correct time.

To get around push buttons, some manufacturers use liquid crystals to produce digital displays. Liquid crystal displays have a lower current drain, so they can be left operating all the time. They do not give off their own light and can't be seen in the dark the way an LED display can.

WHAT'S IN store for the watch-wearer of the future?

"The quartz crystal, integrated circuit, digital watch is here to stay," Giacoleto says, "and the problems with digital watches may be solved in some novel ways."

Engineers at some companies are studying the idea of a solar-powered watch that could use sunlight or artificial light to charge a permanent battery.

The possibility of using the daily fluctuations in barometric pressure to operate a miniature electric generator is also under consideration.

"In any case, I believe the State of Michigan has every reason to be proud of our medical school," Gronvall concluded.

## U-M med school among top 10

The University of Michigan Medical School has been listed among the top 10 in the nation by Medical Economics.

The national magazine, which circulates to 176,000 physicians, ranked U.S. medical schools in categories, such as which ones attracted the greatest number of appli-

cants, those ranking highest in state licensing exams, and those producing the greatest number of board certified specialists.

Other categories in the Medical Economics evaluation included schools which rank highest in producing medical school faculties and deans. Finally, the publication listed the top 10 schools in amounts of research grants from the National Institutes of Health.

THE U-M Medical School placed among the top 10 in three of these categories, and thus won a position in the "composite best ten." (Actually a top eleven, since there was a three-way tie for ninth place.)

The U-M placed second in the number of schools producing board certified specialists; was among the top ten in producing medical school faculties; and among the top eleven in producing deans for other medical schools.

Adding up the ratings in each of the publication's categories to determine the "best," Medical Economics revealed that its list differs considerably from the 1974 ratings of American professional schools published in Change Magazine.

THE COMPOSITE best 10 medical schools in the country, according to the latest Medical Economics figures, include Harvard, University of Chicago, Columbia, Johns Hopkins, New York University, University of Pennsylvania, Cornell, Washington University, Albert Einstein University, the U-M, and the State University of New York at Brooklyn.

"Naturally we are pleased," said John A. Gronvall, M.D., dean of the U-M Medical School. "But it would appear that one has to be as wary of favorable polls as he might be disappointed with unfavorable ones," he added.

## What are 'the basics,' football or reading?

There is a lot of truth to comments made during the recent school board campaign that it's time to reprioritize goals of the Plymouth Community School District. With action taken Monday night, the current board has made it painfully clear that the present list of priorities has little bearing on the running of the district.

An item which is especially open to question is the call for a return to "the basics." Candidates, plus trustees who weren't up for election, have mouthed platitudes that the district must "get back to the basics." In cutting \$2.6 million from the budget, this school of thought maintained, the board must preserve the basics and make whatever cuts are necessary elsewhere.

ALTHOUGH A CLEAR definition of basics has never been given, residents assumed that the basics included the 3 Rs—reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic.

The board vote Monday raises doubt about its commitment to reading as one of the "basics" which ought to be preserved. The board refused to make a decision to allow varsity athletics in the fall only if a successful millage vote is obtained in September. Football will begin regardless of the millage outcome.

The intent of the motion, offered by Tom Yack, was basically an announcement that athletics aren't any more important than reading, libraries, music programs or 83 teaching positions to be eliminated. But the motion failed with no votes cast by Richard Arlen, Joe Gray, E.J. McClendon and Flossie Tonda.

Another consequence of Monday's meeting is that at both high schools, students will be limited to five courses per semester regardless of the outcome of the September millage vote. With seven hours in the school day, and only five courses al-

lowed, basic 'rithmetic suggests the school day may have to be shortened. And so 3,000 high school students will suffer regardless of the millage outcome.

THE ARGUMENT made against eliminating fall sports is that the athletic budget already has been reduced and elimination would save only \$36,000—a paltry sum compared to the \$2.6 million which must be cut.

But Yack's motion would have allowed a complete fall schedule of varsity athletics—if voters approve the millage Sept. 2. There would have been no athletic cuts imposed—if voters say yes Sept. 2.

What the board has said is that there will be football this fall—even if voters say no on Sept. 2.

The choice was to offer athletics if voters want to pay the cost. Four members of the board didn't want to place athletics' fate on the wishes of the electorate.

THE SET OF priorities of the district now on paper gives the basics a higher rating than athletics. Based on the decision Monday, the board should redraw those priorities.

The community has a right to know what's really important to the school board in designing an educational program with limited funds.

Is reading to be taught only in the classroom with a ratio of 35-1? If Johnny has reading problems and his lone teacher can't solve them, are we ready to deny him an opportunity for remedial help? Can children increase their reading abilities by spending less time in libraries? Is football more important than reading?

What is meant by the call for a "return to the basics?" Apparently the assumption that "the basics" somehow equates to the 3 Rs is incorrect. If so, the board should declare what is meant.

## Say hello to punk politics

The politics of Canton have been and probably will continue to be as sticky and tacky as those of any community in the Detroit Metropolitan area.

In the last few years, we have come to expect spirited debate, personal insults, and even some mudslinging.

But at least one township political faction has reached the depths of despair—circulating a campaign flyer that is filled with partial truths, cheap shots and bilge.

Unfortunately we don't know what group is behind it. We are referring to a flyer allegedly circulated by the "Stonegate Homeowners Citizens Group."

No such organization exists, and the Stonegate Civic Association Inc., the subdivision's real homeowners' association, has denied it has anything to do with the circular. By its own by-laws it is non-political.

IT IS ONE thing to campaign against a candidate and take him to task over his stand on the issues. That is fine.

## Stadium good setting for youth, rock concert

I wondered why 60,000 persons would want to jam themselves into a football stadium to hear a balding, over-30-year-old rock musician.

My kids wanted to attend, but they are used to the over-amplification of sound which they call music these days, and a rock concert is sort of an informal gathering of their peer group.

Out of curiosity, both as to the presentation of the music and to see if all the weird tales of what youngsters do at concerts are true, I spent Sunday night at Pontiac Stadium listening to Elton John.

I came away from the experience with a very good feeling.

ONE PROBLEM of rock concerts has been their lack of control.

In order to justify the performer's enormous fees, large crowds have to be attracted. In most cases, this has been done outdoors in large spaces, which allowed everyone to do what they wanted to do, whether illegal or legal, socially acceptable or not.

A rock concert in a place like Pontiac Stadium is a setting where most of the bad things can be eliminated. It is big enough to accommodate a large crowd, but it is small enough to be policed, thereby eliminating antisocial acts.

Acoustically, the stadium is better because it has walls. You can hear the music better than at an outdoor performance.

And believe it or not, even for the older generation, the rock beat gets into one's system and makes one want to get up and dance.

PONTIAC STADIUM has improved tremendously since the football season. We had no

trouble getting into the parking lot, and while we waited awhile after the performance, we had no trouble getting out of the lot.

There has been some concern as to whether the new domed stadium in Pontiac would be a white elephant, providing a home for Bill Ford's Detroit Lions but being a drag on the taxpayers of Pontiac because of inability to use the structure in non-football seasons.

A rock concert has to be a tremendous surprise for the promoters of the stadium. When you can get 64,800 people at \$10 a head on a Sunday night, it is bound to help the cash flow in paying off the stadium bonds.

BUT MORE IMPORTANT than that, teenagers get into trouble when they are bored and have nothing to do. To create a place and an atmosphere that is totally theirs, yet where their youthful exuberance can be controlled, can help to solve many social problems of the area.

I was impressed by what happened at the stadium Sunday night. I even have to admit that the spirit of the occasion led me to be one of the people doing the bumps up in the press box. Those awful things they say about rock concerts just didn't happen, and I am sure there is a future for rock concerts in our area.

## The Bills should listen: Suburbs don't hate transit

Bill Milliken and Bill Ryan don't listen so good.

Gov. Milliken, reflecting on the House of Representatives' massive defeat of a rapid transit bill embodying his and Detroit Mayor Coleman Young's ideas, said the legislators had "no excuse." He called the bill's defeat "extremely unfortunate."

Rep. Ryan (D-Detroit), former House speaker and still the most powerful man there, deplored a "societal attitude that anything that helps a city called Detroit is wrong."

The house smashed Ryan's version of the rapid transit bill 28-65, a margin that should have humiliated the man. The vote was taken after a full morning of debate, and as I said, Milliken and Ryan didn't listen so good.

As governor, Milliken had other things to do and couldn't attend. Ryan was there but didn't pay much attention to what opponents of his bill were saying or he would never have made that crack.

THERE ARE, to be sure, some outstate legislators who hate Detroit, just as there are some Detroit politicians who think everything west of Novi Road is tree stumps. But that group can't put together 65 votes in the House—no way.

Had Milliken and Ryan been listening, they would have heard Rep. Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham) say she "would like to support it." She wasn't bothered that Detroit proper would be first to benefit from the system "because you have to start somewhere."

And you would have heard her say that the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) board shouldn't be restructured until Detroit's bus system is merged with SEMTA's—a change Detroit has been resisting.

They would have heard Rep. Sandy Brotherton (R-Farmington) say he supports the concept of mass transit but that the proposed taxes were "unfair and unequitable to Oakland County." He's right, when you consider the hard facts: Oakland

would pay 50 per cent more per capita than the average in Ryan's bill. Western Wayne County would probably get nicked almost as hard but not get a transit line until sometime after the year 2000.

Those are just samples of thoughtful suburban Republicans and Democrats who want to see the southeast Michigan region get a rapid transit system but who couldn't stomach the gerrymandering of the SEMTA board, the lack of good faith shown by Detroit's administration and the weird effects of some of the proposed tax systems. The plain truth is that Ryan's bill is as full of rusty fishhooks as an old Belle Isle fisherman's tackle-box.

THERE'S A DIFFERENCE between helping out the metropolitan area with a transit system and doing Mayor Young a big, fat political favor. Milliken and Ryan need to learn the difference.

Ryan's bill confused the two. To be against Ryan's version of a transit bill is not the same as being against rapid transit. Milliken and Ryan were unfair in their criticism of the whopping majority that buried Ryan's bill.

So it's back to the drawing boards in Lansing. In September the lawmakers will try again. This time, the powers that be should listen to those thoughtful, regionally minded legislators who are trying to help the cause.

Those 65 votes against Ryan's fishhooks didn't come from tree stumps.

## Convention at peace

## Dems' biggest problems: Getting tickets

NEW YORK—It was like Muzak wafting soft Mozart on a happy, noisy, rock party.

While Walter Cronkite and the other national TV pundits tried desperately to find ways to fill holes in the action at this, the most peaceful (or boring, if you prefer) Democratic National Convention in my memory, life went on down on the floor and in the Michigan delegation with all its rococo human frenzy.

One Michigan delegate read a book on Victorian literature while Ohio's Sen. John Glenn tried unsuccessfully to get the attention of the crowd during his keynote speech.

Other delegates speculated on where the good parties might be, while endless welcoming speeches rolled on. And delegates, press and hangers-on wandered, caucused, gossiped, laughed, chatted and formed and reformed into small knots in the narrow aisles of Madison Square Garden.

The Michigan delegation met in caucus Monday morning to consider the only big fight of the convention: Whether the rules for the 1980 convention would give women equal representation in delegates. The discussion went on for exactly 8½ minutes of friendly, restrained comment.

Then the delegation broke into a 35-minute argument about how guest passes for friends and relatives were to be drawn. "At last we've got something to fight about!" grinned Troy's Morley Winograd, state party chairman.

THE ONLY time the delegates were stirred was during Texas Rep. Barbara Jordan's keynote speech.

As she said, "Our nation's greatest danger is that we will cease to be one nation and become instead a collection of interest groups, each seeking to fulfill private dreams, each seeking to satisfy its private wants," the entire convention broke into applause.

Otherwise, Michigan's delegates seemed content. They gossiped about who Jimmy Carter's choice for vice-president might be, but nobody could imagine a floor fight over the selection.

Redford Township's Frank Bosak Jr. complained about the prices (\$2 for two eggs, 90 cents

for a pack of cigarettes in the Garden). Livonia Mayor Ed McNamara went sight-seeing with his wife, Lucille. Orchard Lake's Gene Kuthy stood happily in the aisles as speeches washed around his head.

THE SECURITY system, much better than the tight-fisted failures of the past, jockeyed much comment and a certain amount of jockeying for top place in the pecking order.

In order to get to various places in Madison Square Garden, you have to get daily a four-by-seven inch colored cardboard pass which you string around your neck with an elastic band.

Delegates, the kings of the roost, got blue cards Monday, which enabled them to go virtually anywhere. A few super-delegates (suburban Congressman James O'Hara, running for the U.S. Senate in Michigan, was one) got red passes designating them convention officers.

Minor press types get yellow "perimeter" cards, enabling them to get into the Garden but virtually no place else. Daily or weekly newspaper reporters receive orange or rose cards, which allow them into the press work area but not on the floor.

Most sought after, other than a delegate's card, is the violet floor pass, which gets the bearer almost anywhere.

Guards are everywhere, but they are courteous and, by and large, helpful. At the 1968 Chicago convention, I watched a television reporter being beaten up on the floor by security guards. Monday night in New York, I saw a guard literally leading a lost reporter by the hand into his place in the press section, while the rest of his colleagues dozed.

It's that kind of a convention.

# Extension service aims to help consumers

Consumerism. The word has become as household as Kleenex.

But many don't realize that consumer services have been around long before the word became fashionable.

Wayne County Cooperative Extension Services has provided consumers with helpful hints since 1916 when Congress awarded Michigan State University a land grant in order to extend the teaching and knowledge of the university to the people.


Because only the wealthy were able to attend MSU in the late 1800s, Congress felt there was a need for a people's college, where all could benefit from the knowledge of the university.

This was the birth of the county cooperative extension services. There are 72 in Michigan and 3100 in the United States.

MSU being mainly an agricultural school at the time, and Wayne County being chiefly agrarian, the extension services programs dealt predominately with farming.

DONALD JUCHARTZ, Wayne County extension director, explained that times have changed and so has the extension services program.

"We've had to adapt our program from

the farm to the city," said Juchartz. Sponsored jointly by Wayne County, the State of Michigan and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the extension service

covers four main areas.

•Agriculture—Fourteen to 15 per cent of Wayne County is still commercial farms. It leads the state in production of sweet corn and fresh market vegetables. Programs include information on production, management and marketing.

•Family living education—Once called home ec, this program includes consumer information, food preservation, home management, family finance, clothing, home furnishing and parenting.

•Resource development—public policy—This program helps people in the community in planning, zoning and land use. It is also used as a training center for government officials.

•4-H Club—There are 20,000 youth members in the Wayne County chapter. Projects range from dog training to baby sitting.

"These projects teach the youth how to be good citizens. They learn while doing," said Juchartz.

HE EXPLAINED that programs are designed for solving problems local residents face.

"Each county has their own needs and wants. We have 197 individuals working through advisory councils and community

organizations, guiding the services' programs."

A major advantage of working in cooperation with MSU is that direct access to all teaching and research of the university is available.

"We are constantly introducing new knowledge and techniques that only a land grant university can offer."

New programs are developed in tune with the needs of Wayne County residents, while immediate services continue.

COMMERCIAL FARMERS meet about

three times a year to discuss product techniques and marketing programs, while a parenting group may meet several nights a week for several weeks discussing the problems encountered raising children.

"Sessions are held according to the groups demands," said Juchartz.

In between sessions, 600,000 newsletters are circulated, relaying new information that consumers may not receive until the next meeting.

Six hundred radio and television helpful hints are aired yearly, and one million bulletins are distributed.

ABOUT 240,000 people attended the 900 various extension services sessions last year.

"We are one of the most efficient and successful extension service in the country," said Juchartz. "We belong to the people."

Each reserve has not only given his time voluntarily for training but will be giving his time, for free, to protect people and property against crime.

With crime on the increase, I am still at a loss to know why Akhtar would be bucking us so.

I do know, however, many regulars feel reserves are trying to take their overtime away.

This is not it, Mr. Akhtar. We are greatly needed. I don't have to remind you how seldom you have time to patrol our residential streets.

Each police department had to start from scratch, and I am almost sure the

sheriff's department didn't start with 100 per cent seasoned officers.

Each reserve not only gets the training, but we have to study probably twice the number of hours we spend in class, as the academy is very strict as far as grades and training go. They make sure no garbage-toting cowboys hit the street.

Incidentally, there are approximately 160 in our class, many of whom are already police officers taking advanced training.

The Michigan Police Reserve Training Council is one of the highest training courses in the state and probably ranks second to the state police.

So why don't you give us a chance Jim? We won't take your jobs away.

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# Detroit must re-attract suburbanites

Just think: an entertainment center with an outdoor amphitheater, sports facilities, marina dinner clubs and perhaps a casino; 3,000 units of low- and high-rise housing; an industrial park, a shady park and promenade—and all of it stretching out along Detroit's riverfront.

No, the vision isn't Renaissance Center. It's a major redevelopment proposal for the city's riverfront area just to the east of the Renaissance Center designed by graduate students in the University of Michigan's urban planning program.

Prof. Gerald Crane, chairman of the program, says if Detroit is to survive as a city, it must find ways to re-attract residents and industries now fleeing to the suburbs.

THE STUDENTS involved in the program acknowledge that a project of this type is not likely during Detroit's present financial crisis. "But it's the kind of thing Detroit is going to have to do eventually to reverse current trends," says Crane, who has designed many buildings in central Detroit.

## New routes to mortgage under study

Future home buyers may find an increased number of options open to them in financing their purchase.

The Federal Home Loan Bank board has undertaken a major research program on alternative designs for home mortgages with the study expected to be completed early in 1977.

It appears that borrowers, lenders and some members of Congress recognize that changing times may be catching up to the traditional fixed-rate, level-payment mortgage. They said it has worked well in the past largely because the economy was characterized by stable monetary conditions, modest inflation and relatively low interest rates.

Now with conditions subject to more rapid change, periods of double digit inflation, rising patterns of interest rates in the money market, sporadic declines in savings going to thrift institutions and occasional inadequate supplies of residential mortgage credit, the time apparently has come for re-examination of the traditional mortgage system.

AMONG COMPLAINTS against it is its inability to recognize a wide variety of borrower income patterns. These include rising income patterns of young working families, the more level and then declining income pattern of persons near retirement, and the periodic lapses of income of the temporarily unemployed or incapacitated homeowner.

The main purpose of the study is to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the many types of new mortgage instrument designs that have been proposed in recent years by various agencies. Included are such new forms as reverse annuity, deferred interest, shared equity and graduated payment.

Various new types of mortgages have been tested in the past but few gained a great deal of acceptance, possibly because the right conditions did not exist at the time of the introduction.

ONE THAT aroused considerable interest, particularly among young couples, was a plan of flexible payments. This would permit smaller loan payments during the early years of the mortgage with larger payments later when income could be expected to have increased. However, this found only limited usage.

The UNRA members said rising costs, higher taxes and inflation are making it increasingly difficult for the average family to purchase even a median-priced home. Part of this difficulty also may stem from relatively inflexible mortgaging systems, they add, and they express hope that the new study may bring in needed relief.

## Kelley files suit against 6 agencies

Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley announced that he has filed suit to collect over \$500,000 in unpaid taxes from six of the nation's largest insurance companies.

Michigan law requires all out-of-state insurers to pay a tax on the premiums collected from their customers. In addition, a 1965 attorney general's opinion requires the companies to include the cost of insurance benefits to company employees in the gross premiums.

Kelley's suit, filed in Ingham County Circuit Court, charged that none of the six company employees in the gross premium companies had included their employees' benefits since he issued that opinion 11 years ago. He also asked the court to collect interest and penalties.

The listed firms include: Guardian Life Insurance Co., Penn Mutual Life Insurance Co., Prudential Insurance Co., Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., Equitable Life Assurance Co., and New York Life Insurance Co.

Kelley also said that Mutual of New York had not complied with the law either but was not listed in this suit because it has brought suit, claiming to be exempt from the Michigan law.

The major objective of the plan, the group says, is to provide a realistic lure for citizens and industries, and help fill the city's tax coffers once again.

The area in question is a narrow 360-acre parcel extending from the Renaissance Center east to the MacArthur-Belle Isle Bridge. The area is now covered largely with warehouses, abandoned machinery and some viable industry to the east.

Hoping that maximum use could be made of this riverfront area, the students would like to see creation of an entertainment center, park, promenade and high-density housing developments along the river. They propose that existing viable industries upriver serve as the focal point of

a planned industrial park. They would also like to see further planned development of the commercial area along Jefferson Avenue, possibly including such innovations as an "auto mall" centralizing auto dealerships in the area.

"THE RIVER," Crane says, "is Detroit's greatest natural asset. But, for the past century, it has been virtually ignored for use by people."

The students believe their proposed riverfront project area is a prime site for redevelopment because, unlike other areas of the city, it would not be plagued by the problem of rundown sections on the fringes. To the west is the Renaissance Center, to the north the Lafayette Park and Elmwood Park housing developments,

and to the east the Mt. Elliot industrial corridor.

Some 40 students participated in the U-M design and planning project over the past two semesters, including graduate students in urban planning, architecture and landscape architecture.

Crane, who is one of the principals responsible for the design of Detroit's Elmwood Park residential area and Detroit Medical Center, praises the Renaissance Center project, but fears that, as an isolated "dazzling project," it will not by itself lead to a true renaissance for the city.

"We will know Detroit is experiencing a renaissance when one sees young families move back into the city, eager to buy new housing and to send their children to the schools," he says.

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





## A new hand is at Madonna's helm

Sr. Francilene was graduated just 11 years ago

It took Sister Mary Francilene just 11 years to move from graduate of Madonna College to president of Madonna College.

And her school had seen many changes during those years—1965 to 1976.

But there are constants, even on rapidly-growing college campuses, and a dozen of the Felician Sisters who were her teachers when she was an undergraduate still are members of the Madonna faculty.

"It makes for a very supportive situation," said the young administrator, already taking over the reins of Madonna's leadership although her presidency begins officially Aug. 15.

"There's no difficulty at all."

The reason, Sister Francilene firmly believes, is the feeling of support and help that she has always found among the Felician Sisters, the order that founded and operates the Livonia school.

"Among members of our order there is a deep dedication to all our apostolates, our service-oriented careers," she said. "We here at Madonna regard higher education as a most important apostolate, and we all support each other in advancing it."

SISTER FRANCILENE has been "interning" for two years in the Madonna top administration, so it was no surprise when she was appointed by Mother Mary Columbine when Sister Mary Danatha announced her resignation as president in May.

But, lookie, she confesses to be a rather amazed music teacher when she first received word that she would be serving the college as administrative assistant and then as academic dean, with a view to preparation for the school's top position.

"It's a lot different than music," she said, "but I consider it a great honor and challenge."

HER PREPARATION, in addition to working closely with Sister Danatha and Sister Mary Lauriana, vice-president for planning and development, has included earning a doctorate in educational administration from Wayne State University.

She has completed the course work and hopes to have her dissertation done by September.

The dissertation is on guidelines and principles for budgeting and decision-making in the area of student services in a small college.

"It's a study," Sister Francilene explained, "of what it costs to give student services like admission and registration, financial aid, housing, health, placement and counseling."

Research involved studying 47 small colleges, some larger than Madonna and some of lesser size. She is sure her study will be of value as Madonna continues the growth and development that advanced a long distance under the administration of Sister Danatha and Sister Lauriana, who took office just as Sister Francilene was graduating.

LOOKING AHEAD to her own administration, she sees a continued strong emphasis on Madonna's Christian and Catholic heritage, along with a new push toward integrating it into the programs that have brought the college its changed profile.

Then she speaks with enthusiasm of ongoing development of a couple of those programs in particular—training people to work with the elderly and "integrating" the Madonna campus to include those in the deaf studies curriculum.

The campus, she new president said, has an "exciting difference with its increasing community orientation."

"But I'm happy that the liberal arts concept never has been sacrificed as a basic philosophy," she said.

"In this age of secularism, we do ask our students to maintain a Christian philosophy, and a religious study course is a requirement in all degree programs."

But while strengthening the liberal arts concept, a new thrust at Madonna is to redirect it.

"Members of the humanities faculty are going through an intensive study with the object of the devising of a series of classes that are closely linked with specific study fields," Sister Francilene said.

By way of example, she mentioned the possibility of an ethics course—covering history and practical study of justice—in the criminal justice curriculum that is one of the main reasons for the big increase in Madonna's male enrollment.

EDUCATION FOR the deaf and special training for persons who work with the elderly are two programs in which Sister Francilene already has been closely involved in her role as administrative assistant and academic dean.

Both are marked for expansion.

The former program is made possible through a \$85,000 grant from the Fund for Improvement of Post-secondary Education (FIPSE), and Sister Francilene hopes to see it lead to a bringing together of the deaf, the hearing impaired and the hearing on the Madonna campus.

"What that means is that all the hearing persons on campus—the staff, faculty and students—will have the opportunity to take classes in manual communication, or hand-signing," she said. "Tuition will be waived for those classes."

"We're saying we feel that if you bring a new group of people onto the campus you need to be able to communicate with them."

"This has to be a learning process on both sides, and I believe Madonna will be the first campus in the country to be taking this integrating step."

MADONNA'S CONTINUING classes and activities in the area of gerontology are moving in three new directions, with the aid of funding through Title III of the Older Americans Act, Sister Francilene said.

A second year of training is being offered for paraprofessionals in the health fields who work closely with the elderly—people like aides in nursing homes.

There will be increased training of volunteers to work with older persons, both in institutions and those on their own.

The third portion of this program, for which a grant is available through the office of human development of the federal department of Health, Education and Welfare, is preparation of a set of teaching aids to incorporate in various career programs.

"It's an interdisciplinary approach to teaching geriatrics," Sister Francilene explained, "and it should help spread further needed knowledge about the needs of this large section of people."

THE LADY HEADING all these educational advances is one who never had any doubt that she would eventually enter the religious life.

The oldest of six children in an east side Detroit family, young Patricia Van de Vyver decided early to become a nun.

As a teen-ager, she made her decision to join the Felician Sisters "because we are governed by the rule of St. Francis."

"My parents both are members of the third order of St. Francis, a discipline for lay persons," she said, "and living by that rule was what I wanted."

She entered the order and took as her religious name a form of Francis as she was beginning her studies at Madonna.

Her home during student days was the Felician Motherhouse close to the campus. Not only those who had taken their vows lived there then; it was before the campus dormitories had been built.

Sister Francilene made music education and piano her major studies, and after graduation taught first in elementary schools in the Detroit area and then at Ledywood High School.

And after a few years it was back to Madonna, to train for leadership.

In her new role as president, Sister Francilene spends a lot of time consulting with Madonna's academic dean, Sister Mary Damascene, (above.) In the photo below, she enjoys a rare opportunity to get back to the piano.

## These adoptions are special

When Jimmy was adopted last September by Don and Millie Driesbach, it was difficult for him to sit unassisted. Walking was out of the question. Nine months later he is walking with braces and can sit and play like a normal four year old.

As members of the Michigan chapter of Aid to Adoption of Special Kids (AASK), the Driesbachs want to encourage parents to adopt children who have special needs.

The chapter has planned a family picnic for that purpose.

All families with special kids or those interested in seeing what the group is doing are invited to join AASK members at 1:30 p.m., Sunday, July 18, at Hudson Mills Metro Park on N. Territorial, five miles west of US 23.

"A lot of people assume a physical handicap means a mental handicap as well," explained Mrs. Driesbach. But the term "spe-

cial needs" also can mean older children, especially those not released for adoption until later ages, the emotionally impaired, bi-racial children, as well as those with physical or mental handicaps.

Alan and Judy Prince, who founded the Michigan chapter of the national group, believe their experience as parents of children with special needs can be useful for other parents who face that "avenue of red tape ahead."

LIKE JIMMY Driesbach, Danny Prince had polio before he was adopted last December. "His records indicated he was retarded and would never walk," said Mrs. Prince. "At 18 months, he weighed 16 pounds and was as limp as a dishrag, without use of one arm and couldn't sit up."

Now Danny can sit up and play with both hands, has use of one foot, and with the aid of a special brace, is learning how to stand in preparation for leg braces that will help him walk.

"Now he tests at his age or above intellect-wise," said Mrs. Prince.

"Some of that progress comes from having the stability of a home," explained Mrs. Driesbach, but she also pointed out that children's records sometimes give the worst possible picture, when actually a lot can be accomplished.

AS AASK MEMBERS, Mrs. Prince and Mrs. Driesbach have exchanged resources and programs they have individually discovered in their search for help for their children.

"I always wondered what happened when you donated to Easter Seals and found an Easter Seal day camp for handicapped children that is marvelous," said Mrs. Driesbach.

Using AASK resources, both families discovered an innovative orthotist (brace-maker) Jim Tye, who designed plastic and aluminum leg braces for Jimmy that weigh about two pounds instead of the traditional 12 pounds. "He can even wear tennis shoes with these braces," said Mrs. Driesbach.

WITH ABOUT 40 members in Michigan, Judy Prince hopes different areas will be able to establish chapters, as get-togethers are difficult with members spread throughout the state.

"We hope to start koffee klatches and have professionals contribute resources," said Mrs. Prince, who is working on a resource handbook.

One of the big problems for physically handicapped children is the lack of toys, especially those that allow them to be outdoors with some mobility.

"Most equipment is over the \$80 mark in price, and we'd like to find bikes or equipment that would allow the children to be as mobile as possible within their limits," explained Mrs. Driesbach.

Agencies are also trying to reduce fees on harder-to-place children, but both mothers emphasize that you don't have to be wealthy to adopt "special kids." Proving you can afford to feed another child and arrange for care is sufficient.

SINCE BOTH Danny Prince and Jimmy Driesbach are polio victims, their parents are anxious to encourage parents to have their children immunized. "There could be another polio epidemic, because parents aren't aware of the threat."

Having adopted four children, Mrs. Driesbach believes she can alleviate some of the worries of prospective adoptive parents.

"Most parents that have adopted handicapped children will agree that they do much better in the home than the experts might have thought," she added. "Other children in the home benefit as well, because it makes them aware of the needs of others and brings out the best in the siblings."

"There's lots to be said for that special spark that these kids have that you are not aware of until you get them home."

# Proposed health care act viewed of 'highest priority'

Wilbur J. Cohen, dean of The University of Michigan School of Education, has lent strong support to the proposed Maternal and Child Health Care Act, calling it "the highest priority in health and medical care in the nation."

Moreover, the former U.S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, said he is convinced that the program can be implemented efficiently and economically, at a very small net cost to the taxpayer and to the economy in general.

The bill, H.R. 12937, would establish a program of comprehensive health care for all children up to 18 years of age and maternity benefits for all women.

"Under the proposed bill, part of the cost is levied as a percentage of payroll," Cohen told the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives.

"While Blue Cross-Blue Shield premiums are deducted on a flat rate basis, this legislation provides that employee contributions would vary according to salary level. The new plan is more progressive and less burdensome for the lower-paid worker."

HE ESTIMATED the federal government's contributions of approximately \$2.2 billion toward children's medical care (in fiscal year 1974) and the additional \$1.4 billion from state and local governments could be held at approximately the existing level, except for price increases.

"One of the key benefits," Cohen said, "lies in the possibility of reducing poverty through an effective family planning program as part of a comprehensive maternal and child health care plan."

"About two-thirds of all the children living in poverty in the United States are in families of more than four persons," he explained. "Family planning services should be available to every person who wishes them, and reimbursement for such services should be included under the program."

COHEN EXPRESSED strong support for the inclusion of dental services for children and for reimbursement for specified drugs. But he recommended that a separate effective date be set for implementing those phases of the program.

"I favor a comprehensive national health plan covering everyone in the nation," Cohen told the committee. "However, to implement such a colossal undertaking all at once might well tax the managerial genius of American enterprise. Hence, I favor the maternal and child health care proposal as a constructive and cost-effective starting point."

"Recent cost increases in medical services have been lowest in the child age population," he noted, "and that age group is not likely to increase substantially in the immediate years ahead. I believe that the financing of maternal and child health care costs through a public system is likely to be more equitable than it is at present."

"The possibility of overutilization, abuse, fraud and errors is probably least among providers and patients of maternal and child care," he added.

"THERE ARE PRESENTLY about 20 million children in the age group up to six years, about 22 million aged 6 to 12, and about 25 million up to age 18. Adding the three million births per year and their three million mothers, this legislation would affect 73 million persons."

Quoting from the Congressional findings, Cohen concluded, "adequate medical care for pregnant women and children has the greatest potential for improving the health status of the general population."


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## Alcohol forum prepares program

To raise the awareness of women of Michigan concerning alcohol, the Michigan Forum on Women and Alcohol is preparing a series of video tape cassettes showing women in alcoholic situations.

An announcement will be made when the tapes are ready to be shown to church groups and civic clubs around the state.

One of the tapes, "Helpers," concerns a woman with a drinking problem. She is encouraged by the people in her life, her best friend, her doctor, a policeman, a clergyman, even her husband to ignore the problem instead of dealing with it.

All of these people are not willing to confront her with her own potential alcoholism, but are unintentionally driving her deeper into an alcoholic state of mind.

In a tape called "Loneliness," the everyday inconveniences and distractions of a housewife are shown as possibly contributing to her potential alcoholism.

The third tape deals with the potential female alcoholic in a work situation. It highlights the trap people may fall into on the job.



The tapes are not designed to give answers, but to provoke questions from the audience. They attempt to show some of the little known aspects of alcoholism.

One of these is dual addiction, which seems more prevalent in women than in men.



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

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

## Aged, disabled get legal protection

A new Michigan law is aimed at curbing abuse or exploitation of aged, blind and disabled persons now have legal underpinning.

Public Act 136, given immediate effect by the Legislature and signed by Governor Milliken, gives the state's Department of Social Services responsibility to "provide protective services for adults who are in danger of exploitation, abandonment, cruelty or abuse by children, guardians, custodians or others."

DSS officials said that although abuse and neglect is generally linked in the public mind with children, thousands of adults may face similar danger. Now that the needed legislation has been passed, the Department of Social Services will begin drafting rules and procedures for carrying out the legal mandate.

Those rules must answer a number of questions about what legal services will be needed to translate new law into reality, and how those services may be obtained.

As a first step toward meeting these and other issues, the Michigan Department of Social Services is asking each county Social Services office to look at community resources and determine what particular approaches will work and what community agencies should be involved.

In addition, DSS Basic Adult Services workers around the state will be introduced to the new law during a series of two-day training sessions.

## Hire septic tank cleaner with care

A polite but firm "no" is your best answer if someone comes to your door offering septic tank cleaning services.

Jim Boyd, Michigan State University Extension housing specialist, said that door-to-door solicitation for septic tank pumping is occurring in some Michigan counties. Reputable, licensed cleaners do not solicit business in this way, he stated, and the Michigan Septic Tank Association has declared door-to-door solicitation an unethical practice.

Before hiring a cleaner to pump a septic tank, be sure he has a Department of Health number and check with the local health department to be sure the operator is legitimate.

Beware of a septic tank cleaner who charges by the pound removed, Boyd warned. Charging by the pound would involve a weight certificate with before and after weights determined by a state-certified scale. Check with your local health department to see how charges should be figured.

Don't wait until cold weather to have your septic tank cleaned, Boyd concluded. The material is usually removed from the tank and plowed into the ground. If the ground is frozen, arrangements must be made with a municipal sewage plant to take the material.

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
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## Long but safe

# Muskegon dares pro or novice

The sounds of spinning logs floating downstream to mill towns which once dominated life on the Muskegon River have been replaced by the hushed tones of canoes gliding on the calm waters.

The Muskegon (West Michigan's greatest logging river during the 1800s) is an outstanding recreational facility, providing Michigan residents with many pleasurable hours of canoeing, fishing and wildlife viewing.

Although human activity prevents the Muskegon from being a true wilderness river, several species of birds and animals are commonly sighted, and the solitude which graces this safe, shallow stream combine to make it an excellent choice for a canoe trip.

A PICNIC basket and camera are musts for short ventures, while overnight supplies are essential for longer journeys.

According to the Automobile Club of Michigan, outdoor enthusiasts will find 10 liveries, 15 campgrounds and such fish as salmon, rainbow, walleye, pike and bass in the river. Naturalists will be entertained by an abundance of whitetail deer, beaver, muskrat, blue heron and other rare and beautiful birds.

The river's two-foot average depth provides an excellent testing ground for novice canoeists while its 227-mile-long length is a hearty challenge for experienced paddlers. Auto Club advises allotting up to 14 days for canoeing its length.

MEANDERING THROUGH portions of northern and central lower Michigan, the Muskegon begins at Houghton Lake and passes through seven west Michigan counties before emptying into Lake Michigan.

Naturalists will find wildlife and dense forests through the upper stretches of the river from Houghton Lake to M-115. The stream is free flowing through this area with only two portage points near its beginning.

Dead Stream Swamp—one of the state's most extensive swamp areas—is situated between Houghton Lake and the Reedsburg Dam and features 30 square miles of unspoiled wilderness.

Fewer than 15 miles downstream at the Missaukee-Roscommon county line, a department of natural resources (DNR) deer farm may be visited. Situated about 200 yards from the river, the farm is a 160-acre facility with deer roaming free and in pens.

## 3 rivers offer scenic journey

The Pine, Chippewa and Tittabawassee rivers are central Michigan waterways winding through rolling hills, flat farmlands, forests and major industrial centers.

Each river has its own personality, offering excellent fishing along more than 300 miles of water, safe even for novices. These rivers offer less than day-long trips or up to week-long journeys for the adventurous.

The 110-mile-long Pine River originates in Mecosta County and meanders through five counties before merging with the Chippewa River south of Midland. The Pine is shallow and weedy in summer.

According to the Automobile Club of Michigan, four to seven days are required to canoe the river from Pine Lake to Midland. Those planning a trip on the western half must bring their own craft or rent one at Howard City. There are two canoe liveries at Midland.

Canoeists can launch their craft at Pine Lake or at Milbrook. Other launch sites are at Elm Hall and at the Midland Nature Center.

AN INTERESTING variety of one- or two-day trips may be made. For wild, wooded country, start a one-day trip at Pine Lake or at Milbrook, ending at Elm Hall.

From Elm Hall, paddle one day along the Pine to Alma through woods and farmlands. Take out at Ely Street in Alma, just above the dam. For the bicentennial year,

## State closes 196 ramp at Freedom Road

The 196 westbound on-ramp from Freedom Road in Farmington is now barricaded and removal of the ramp is scheduled as soon as possible. It is located just east of Farmington Road and Nine Mile.

Motorists normally using this access are advised by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation to continue on Freedom for approximately two miles and enter westbound 196 at the Grand River Road interchange at 10 Mile.

Removal of the ramp was requested by the Farmington City Council May 17.

State Highway and Transportation Director John P. Woodford said planning and engineering studies are underway to determine future traffic needs in the area, including possible construction of an entirely new interchange at Farmington Road.

That section of 196 will be replaced by the new I-96/I-275 freeway presently under construction along Haggerty.

## Washington arrives

On April 13, 1776, Gen. George Washington arrived in New York where the bulk of the Continental forces involved in the siege of Boston had settled.

CANOEING REMAINS relatively easy until paddlers enter the Big Rapids area and encounter the first of four portage points in a 25-mile section to Croton Dam. Chief attraction here is the Paris fish ponds, north of Big Rapids, where about 600 rainbow and brown trout are contained in four ponds.

Canoeing in the Rogers, Hardy and Croton Dam areas is the most difficult part of the Muskegon, with portage points varying from 100 yards to nearly one-quarter mile. The backwaters of these dams are more like a lake than a free-flowing stream.

The final stretch of river from Croton Dam to Muskegon Lake is swifter since the river narrows once again, and good salmon runs occur in both.

MAJOR ATTRACTIONS include Fremont's Windmill Village and Oldtown, which are highlighted by beautiful gardens and the historic Ensley Tower Windmill.

At Muskegon, the Charles Hackley House, belonging to the city's first great benefactor, has been restored and has many artifacts of this onetime lumber baron on display. Heritage Village is being developed near downtown Muskegon with an 1880-vintage firehouse open to the public.

Canoe rentals along the river run \$8 and up for a one-day trip, with varying rates for longer trips. Most liveries will place cars at various points on the river and pick up canoes.

Liveries along the river include: Happy River, near Houghton Lake, campground included; White Birch, near Merritt, campground; Old Log, near Marion, campground; Curiosity, near Ewart; Sport-N-Life, near Paris fish ponds, adjacent campground; Sawmill, near Big Rapids; Derks and Wisner, both near Newaygo; Vic's, near Grant, and Bert's, near Muskegon.

Private campgrounds without canoe liveries include: Sportsman, at Hardy Dam; Chinook, between Grant and Fremont; Brower, near Rogers Dam; Muskegon River, near Ewart; Croton Township and Shaw Municipal, both near Newaygo; Riverside, near Ewart, and two small canoe camps on the river, southeast of Merritt.

Campers also will find Newaygo State Park located on the river with three miles of frontage on Hardy Dam Pond, and Muskegon State Park situated on Muskegon Lake.

the entire downtown area of Alma has been designated as an historic site by state and national bicentennial committees.

For a two-day canoe trip on the Pine, start at the dam in St. Louis and parallel Riverside Drive and Pine River Road into Midland. That scenic, 26-mile stretch is equally enjoyable for motorists.

A trip down the 75-mile Chippewa takes three to five days.

The main stream of the Chippewa is canoeable from the Winchester Dam at the Martiny Lake Wildlife Flooding Area, where the Chippewa merges with the Pine and the Tittabawassee.

A four- to five-hour trip can be made from Martiny Lake to Barryton. Day-long trips can be taken from Barryton to Lake Isabella, from Mount Pleasant west to Lake Isabella, or from Mount Pleasant to Midland.

Mount Pleasant's Island Park is the site of the Isabella County Bicentennial Fair Aug. 22-28.

LIKE THE PINE, the Chippewa River has plenty of open and wooded country, but no campgrounds are available west of Midland.

The north branch of the Chippewa River is navigable from the launch point at Evergreen Road in northeast Mecosta County to the main stream at Barryton.

The north branch has two dams to portage, the Winchester Dam at Martiny Lake and at Barryton, where the north and main branches merge. The main stream also has two dams, at Coldwater Lake and at Mount Pleasant.

The Tittabawassee River offers real variety, from the northwoods flavor of its northern extremities in Gladwin County, to the resort atmosphere of Secord, Wixom and Sanford lakes or the flat farmlands approaching Midland and that city's industrial array. Midland has a boat launch site at Emerson Park.

Canoe trips on the Tittabawassee range from a scenic 30 miles, which takes one to two days, to a 120-mile, four- to seven-day journey extending from the river's northern reaches at Secord Lake to the city of Midland and on to Saginaw, where the Tittabawassee merges with the Saginaw River.

THE 30-MILE trip is easy and scenic canoeing, starting at Secord Lake, with only short portages around Secord, Smallwood and McKimney dams. There are several campgrounds along the way, including Secord Lake State Forest Campground and Wildwood State Forest Campground, both on the backwaters of the Tittabawassee.

For those canoeing the river's length, there are also dams at Edenville and the Dow Plant at Midland.

Canoe liveries serving the Tittabawassee are the Wixom Marina, east of Gladwin, and D&G Rental at Sanford.

As a bicentennial project, the city of Midland has restored the Bradley mansion, home of a pioneer family, and added a carriage house. They are along the Tittabawassee at Cook Street.

The City of Saginaw and property owners along the Tittabawassee have launched a bicentennial project to turn the riverbanks into a scenic greenbelt.

## Nightmares mar dream cruise

What would it be like to sail the blue waters of the Caribbean, spend Christmas in San Juan and drop anchor off Trinidad during the celebrated carnival?

It is the kind of adventure we read and dream about. It is what 18-year-old Mark Tomlinson did for nine months following his graduation from high school last June.

"An idea tossed around about sailing to the Caribbean," said Mark. My dad was reading Yachting magazine and said all of a sudden, "Why don't you take Aquarius down there?" I thought about it. I brushed up on my sailing and navigation. I made plans for a trip. I had to get a crew: a neighbor, a school chum and a guy from New York we got from an ad in Yachting."

Many factors worked against the success of such a venture. Two of the crew had never sailed before that summer. Tomlinson had to teach them what he knew while he learned celestial navigation and chart reading so he could adequately captain the 36-foot boat.

Space was another problem. In so small a boat, four men are continually in one another's way. "It's difficult living on a boat," explained Tomlinson. "Nothing is convenient. You have to go out of your way to do everything. It takes a certain kind of person to live like that and enjoy it."

**AIMING AT** a late August departure: "We spent the summer preparing the boat, beefing it up for ocean cruising. It took a lot of planning, stocking with food and outfitting for the ocean. We stopped work to make final preparation, installed a refrigerator and left on Aug. 22 from Grosse Ile Yacht Club," said Tomlinson.

The boat crossed Lake Erie, went through the Welland Canal to Lake Ontario, east to Oswego, south on the canal system to the Hudson River and emerged at New York Harbor. "It was really some thing to sailing under the Statue of Liberty," said the captain.

Stopping to visit friends at Stamford, Conn., and at Mystic Sea Port, Conn., which is "a living museum with an old New England style boatyard," they continued along their way to Cape May off Delaware.

"The wind was blowing to the nose at 30 knots and we lost our engine power a quarter of a mile off shore. We were tossing around in nine-foot seas with no control over the boat. Luckily one of the mates finally got the diesel going. It was pretty harried."

"Then, motoring up the Delaware River, the motor conked out again at a time when a freighter was approaching and a huge barge was coming up stern. We hoisted sail and just got out of the way of the barge by 50 feet."

**SOMEWHERE** in the Chesapeake Canal, the crewman from New York jumped ship for free passage on another boat. The trio of friends took their time, stopped at Annapolis, Yorktown and Norfolk. There they began the Virginia Cut, a series of canals in the intercoastal waterway to avoid the bad weather of Cape Hatteras.

Cape Hatteras is notorious for its treacherous sailing conditions, which are caused by the northward turning of the Gulf Stream and the opposing winds coming out of the north. The choppy water is difficult for sailing vessels.

The crew of Aquarius made it to Florida through Dismal Swamp, the Alligator River and a series of cuts, canals and sounds. Stopping along the route to visit a friend in Beaufort, the three took jobs with the railroad to replenish depleted funds. For three weeks, they worked on a trestle in "the hardest work I've ever done in my life," said Tomlinson.

Tomlinson planned the trek across 1,200 miles of sea to St. Thomas as the next leg of the journey. He phoned home to tell his parents about the plan and, suddenly, his father showed up "on business" and talked him out of it. So the trio continued south to Florida where the sailors put in at Cocoa

Beach, Fla., for Thanksgiving dinner with Mark's aunt.

**BY THE TIME** the Aquarius reached West Palm Beach, it had developed engine problems and had to be repaired before the 70-mile crossing to Grand Bahama Island. The repairs, low finances, and a desire to return home caused Tomlinson's two friends to reconsider the situation. They decided to leave for Southfield.

Tomlinson made necessary repairs himself and found a new crew: A sailor called George and his two female companions. The Aquarius finally departed for the Bahamas, checked through customs, sailed north of the Eleuthera Islands to avoid the Trade Winds which only blow south of the 23d parallel, north latitude.

"We planned to go east 500 miles, then south 500 miles. We left at the start of a norther, a wind which clocks around and blows from different directions. It never blew under 30 knots all the time out for two-and-a-half days and we made incredible time."

"Then we ran into the doldrums and had engine trouble and water pump trouble. But I worked up another pump and we powered 50 miles until we began to pick up wind. The Trade Winds came out of the east and it took us only another two days to get to Puerto Rico. We got into San Juan on Christmas night. It was just incredible traveling, we made 1,000 in 6 1/2 days."

**IT WAS CLEAR** sailing to St. Thomas where Mark met his parents for a two-week get-together. The two girls on the Aquarius flew off to Caracas, Venezuela for their own travels.

After spending the holidays sailing with their son, the Tomlinsons left again on Jan. 9. It was Mark's only attack of homesickness. He knew he would not see them again for several months.

From that point on, Mark and George sailed through the network of islands catching tuna and barracuda and stopping off the islands to explore. Climbing a 1,000-foot peak on Van Dyke Island, they could see all the Virgin Islands and plotted their course for the next week.

After many more stops and difficulties with engine and weather, the duo arrived in Trinidad to await George's girl friend's return from Venezuela. The three had happened along right at carnival time, an island version of the Mardi Gras, and an occasion not to be missed. During the celebrating, their boat was almost stolen, but the attempt was thwarted.

Picking their way through the Grenadines, the crew acquired a new member at Martinique. He was an Englishman taking five years to travel around the world. "The Grenadines are quiet, primitive islands. They're mountainous, lush, green. Green as you've never seen green before," Tomlinson described.

**BUT TIME WAS** getting short, so the Aquarius shot on up to Puerto Rico once again and west along the Exuma Bank, a 12-foot-shallow stretch of water, to Nassau. The following day was a 200-mile day, according to the log entry. The boat arrived in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., the next afternoon.

Waiting to greet him there was Mark's girlfriend, who had flown down on her Easter Vacation from high school. Yet, despite the homecoming, Tomlinson had to work on up the coast to get the boat home. Returning the way he had come, through the Dismal Swamp, the engine blew off its exhaust.

Aquarius limped along, building up diesel fumes in the hold until Tomlinson found someone along the way who could weld the exhaust pipe again. At Annapolis his crew departed and Tomlinson worked on the boat for a week, putting it into shape for sale by a broker. He returned home in time to take his girl to her senior prom.

What will the sailor do now that the adventure is over? He said he would work for the summer (the trip cost him about \$5,000) and then, perhaps, go to Oakland University in the fall. If the Aquarius doesn't sell, he will bring her back in late summer.

## New roles expected of Marian Librarian

Remember the story about the kid who asked an expert a question and remarked he found out more than he ever wanted to know?

Librarians, those experts at cataloging and disseminating massive amounts of materials, have begun to realize they sometimes have the same effect on inquisitive individuals.

James Lyons of the St. Louis, Mo. Public Library commented on this problem at a seminar he led recently at the Farmington Community Library.

The seminar was one of 25 held throughout the country to explain a pilot program, Learners' Advisory Service. The programs were sponsored by the College Entrance Examination Board of New York. The St. Louis library was one of 10 in the pilot project.

Lyons said that a person seeking information from the library to take an exam on the history of western civilization "could be just overwhelmed by the information available."

**THE THREE-YEAR** pilot program was designed to develop public libraries into community learning centers, train librarians to help adults design and implement their own independent learning projects, and eventually become test centers for college credit.

This examination for college credit is called CLEP, College Level Equivalency Program. It is possible to pick up sufficient credits for a degree through CLEP exams. There is no pass or fail on the CLEP exams, each college has a minimum score they will accept for granting credit.

The Learners' Advisory Service trains librarians to interview a CLEP exam candidate, assess his background knowledge of the subject, decide what learning methods are best suited to his needs and suggest appropriate materials.

This is part of what Lyons called, "a new, in depth relationship between the librarian and the adult, self-directed learner."

James Michael of the St. Louis library staff told the 30 librarians at the seminar, "We feel the librarian who points out all the books on Western Civilization to a person and then says 'you choose' is coping out."

"That way, the librarian doesn't have to deal with the individual. Libraries don't grant college credits, but we have the resources to help people prepare for the exams."

In the seminar discussions, the self-directed, adult learner was the prime concern.

For adults involved in non-traditional learning, Michael said, "Librarians must be involved as planners as well as reactors."

CLEP exams are one of many alternatives open to adult learners. There is a vast number of options available—night or daytime classes, credit and non-credit courses, television courses—the list is long and frequently baffling.

"In our area," Lyons said, "there are more than 1,000 non-credit courses available. There are so many alternatives people are overwhelmed. The libraries must become centers for learning the alternatives—places where people can become aware of the options. If the public doesn't know the options, then they are not free to choose."

Michael added, "It may be the only thing you librarians will do is give options—but, that's all right."

Lyons admitted most high school counselors are unfamiliar with all options for students, but counselors can, at least, pass some on to the students.

"The adult, self-directed learner has no counselor at all," he said.



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# His Livonia ministry stretched to 19 years

When the Rev. Arthur K. Beumler was a young pastor with just a couple of years service at Rosedale Gardens United Presbyterian Church, he told his new boss he'd really like to stick around Livonia until his second child had been born.

terian ministry always has been that an assistant resigns when a new senior pastor is called."

Dr. Richard Dunkelberger said yes indeed he'd be glad to have a seasoned assistant as he began his new ministry.

"But I certainly didn't think I'd be staying this long," Rev. Beumler laughed 17 years later.

Art Beumler and his family are leaving Livonia this week after 19 years at Rosedale Gardens Church. In a ministry that very few in Livonia can match, he has seen the congregation grow from 800 members to more than twice that number. He also has had the satisfaction of knowing the personally, through visiting and through membership classes, brought more than 2,700 into the church fold.

THE NEW family home will be Sioux City, Iowa, where Mr. Beumler will on Aug. 1 begin a new ministry as senior pastor of the Morningside Presbyterian Church.

"We all are looking forward to our new situation," said the clergyman, who served Rosedale as interim senior pastor for 20 months after Dr. Dunkelberger left and before the calling of the Rev. Robert Taylor.

During that time, he added, he realized he was interested in the work of directing a full church program.

He said also he is extremely pleased to be going to Morningside because, the various contacts that preceded the calling, included not only the pastor's wife, Joyce, but also their sons, Jim, Stephen and John.

"The boys were able to visit the schools and even enroll for fall, as well as making some friends in the young people's groups," he added.

"So they too can feel really good about the move, even though Livonia is the only home they've ever known."

MR. BEUMLER said he is especially interested in directing a total church program because "I've always thought of the church's whole role as a cradle-to-grave thing."

"It should offer programs so people can plug in according to their varied needs," he went on "so when people are growing—or perhaps hurting—the church takes on added importance in their lives."

"The gospel has a lot to say about ministering to specific needs that people have. I guess the problems for church leaders come in deciding how to translate the gospel to meet the problem at hand."

The son of a country doctor, Art Beumler was introduced early to the idea of a

life of service, but he decided he really didn't want to be as much on call as his father had been at all hours of day and night.

"But I found that being a minister is quite similar," he said.

"I guess caring about people is my main concern, and I've learned that bringing them together is one of my main strengths."

AT ROSEDALE Gardens, he started as assistant in the area of Christian education and later, working with Dr. Dunkelberger, became an associate pastor in a role that might be described as "the congregation's pastor."

"I did a large portion of the calling, both on members who needed some kind of help and on prospective members," he said.

"I also did the pre-marital counseling, no matter which of us performed the ceremony, and I've also done some marriage counseling."

He has served two terms as president of the Livonia Ministerial Association, and also was an early member of the Livonia Citizens' Committee for Better Human Relations.

That group he found "a good cross-section of people in this area with liberal ideas."

"I guess I'm a little left of center," he said, describing his own political philosophy. "I haven't carried a picket sign, though. I realize that is sometimes neces-

sary, but it can get in the way of a pastor's work."

"I think pastors who do this sometimes don't realize where the people are in their thinking. I guess I prefer trying to persuade through one-to-one relationships."

THE ROSEDALE congregation bade farewell with a reception last week for the Beumler family. Mrs. Beumler has been an active member of the United Presbyterian Women's group, which recently gave her a special award.

She also has served for a time as editor of the church newspaper, "The Epistle."

The three boys have been active in the church's youth and music programs, and all have been associated with musical organizations in the Livonia Schools. Jim recently graduated from Franklin High School with high honors and plans to attend Wooster College in Ohio. Stephen is entering high school and John the ninth grade.

THE BEUMLER installation in the fall will be the first big event in the 750th anniversary celebration of Morningside Church.

He has asked Dr. Dunkelberger, now director of Presbyterian Village in Redford Township, to preach his installation sermon, and Dorothy Hopp, an elder at Rosedale and chairman of the church's evangelism committee, will be part of the administrative commission for installation.

## World hunger needs our attention

Americans are eating more and feeding it less, according to a Michigan State University professor who believes this country should be doing more to help feed the rest of the world.

Georg Borgstrom, giving the keynote address at the recent annual meeting of the American Home Economics Association in Minneapolis, said Americans could consume about a third of their present intake and still be in good health.

He told the 8,000 members attending that Americans have an average intake of 72 grams (more than 2½ ounces) of animal protein per person per day, which is "three times more than any nutritionist would consider needed."

"But people do not eat averages," and we have on the one hand detrimental excess intakes not only of protein but also of sugar and fat, and on the other hand about 40 million Americans who do not earn enough to buy a satisfactory daily diet, despite food stamps, school lunches and other programs."

AMERICANS as a nation, he said, need to formulate a world food policy to accom-

modate the food needs of people everywhere, and to make this part of a comprehensive national nutritional program.

"We have not managed," he said, "to formulate guidelines that bring together the key areas of food, population, water and energy. Nor have we grasped the urgent need of coordinating agriculture and forestry with urbanization and industrial development. Our future as a nation and as a world partner hinges on our abandoning this fragmentation in our thinking."

The MSU professor of food science and geography cited trends in population, affluence, poverty and urbanization around the world, and said insufficient attention is being paid to these "highly upsetting" forces affecting the world scene and world food supplies and distribution.

The population growth, he predicted, will add more than a billion persons in 10 years, with 85 per cent of the births in developing countries.

The accelerating affluence of the industrialized world, he said, is chiefly responsible for the growing use of fuels, metals,

forest products and other natural resources, at a rate of double or triple that of the increase in world population.

THE POOR of the world, he said, are the prime target victims "when the world is hitting harsh limits in land, water, energy and other resources."

Borgstrom identified the poor as "the multimillion and rapidly growing armies of destitute, homeless, penniless, jobless, landless, and hungry."

• Their true requirements are not recognized in any field," he said. "Our programs are based on purchasing power. Food production needs to triple or rather quadruple within this century to meet their nutritional needs, and keep up with population growth."

The "rampant" urbanization, he said, will add more than 750 million to our cities, no less than 550 million of them in the poor world, the greater portion originating in a rural influx.

"Many major cities are growing up to four times faster than the growth of the countries containing them. All evidence

points to collapse, not the least in food and water. No viable urban ecosystems are created, as best evidence in an enormous backlog of need in housing and sewage systems."

WHILE NORTH AMERICA now accounts for 80 to 90 per cent of deliveries to the world cereal market, about two thirds of the grain flow is to Europe, Japan and the Soviet Union, not in order to starve off hunger, but to underpin their prodigality in feeding livestock rather than people, Borgstrom said.

"Currently, less than five per cent of the exported soybeans serves as human food and even less reaches the hungry world," he said.

Keys to formulating food strategy, he said, must be food utilization, nutrition, disease, and resources.

"Global endeavors are needed," he continued, "to fight waste and spoilage, to recognize nutritional needs, to starve off parasites and disease, to process and market foods, and to appraise available soil, water and other resources."

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# L-R's '1776' no carbon copy; get thee to it

On July 10, the Livonia Arts Commission gave area residents another reason to celebrate the bicentennial: a delightfully original production of the musical "1776."

No attempt was made to present a carbon copy of the Broadway or Hollywood productions, and, for the most part, this production by the Theatre Guild of Livonia-Redford succeeded on its own interpretation.

No doubt the major contributor was director Ron Otulakowski, who made this a more thoughtful and serious production than the other six that this reviewer has seen.

THE LAUGHS were abundant, but they were earned; there were no cheap shots

for a quick laugh. Otulakowski added to his honors by playing the role of John Dickinson.

This is the third time this reviewer has seen him in this part, and it is to Otulakowski's credit as actor and director that he did not allow his professional acting and singing to dominate the other actors.

Indeed, it would be difficult to try to dominate the other actors since they are generally a well-rounded group. Ron Worsey's Ben Franklin, after a nervous first scene, became a sprightly dirty old man with a clear and strong singing voice.

Irene Jordan played a witty and elegant Abigail Adams. Her voice was difficult to hear in the lower register, but in the upper register it filled the theatre.

MARC McCULLOUGH avoided the temptation to overplay Edward Rutledge and consequently gave a subtle menace to the

role; his singing of "Molasses to Rum," a condemnation of New England slave traders, was an example of a singing actor in complete command of his material.

Equally in command of his material was Doug Kerr, in superb voice and extremely serious as Jefferson. Some good acting was done by Ron Wheeler as Richard Henry Lee and Bonnie Gill as Martha Jefferson, but the former seemed unsure of his singing tempo and the latter had difficulty being heard in her one number.

The triumphs of the evening's acting, however, belonged to Howard Egan, Paul Maisano and Doug Wisby. These three did far more with their roles than this reviewer has ever seen done in amateur or professional productions.

EGAN'S ADAMS gave the musical a more serious — less sympathetic — star. His professional performance, his strong

and accurate singing voice, and his attentive reactions to other actors made no compromise with Adams' obstinacy of purpose.

Egan is his own man, his own actor. He has re-created the role of John Adams, and he has done it with consummate talent.

Paul Maisano played the featured role of the courier. He should star in "Candide." He has a rare sense of timing and professional discipline that an actor twice his age would envy. His glorious singing of "Mamma, Look Sharp" held the audience spellbound. Such moments in the theatre — and such talents — are to be treasured.

Doug Wisby also played a featured part. He was the secretary of congress, stuck in the deadly upstairs-left area for the entire show and limited to reading missives from "G. Washington" and the roll-call for the

signing of the Declaration. Watch him to learn how the slightest inflection of the voice and the subtlest half-beat of timing can make or break a performance.

The musical direction of Andrew Henderson is to be commended in that the orchestra seldom drowns out the singers. If the singers could not be heard at times, it was because of their lack of projection and not the orchestra's competition. Especially effective were the contributions of the harpist and the drummer. Less effective were the slow tempos of most of the numbers and the underscoring of the finale.

WHAT WAS NOT slowed down was the staging of "The Egg" by choreographer Milti Carroll. This number bubbled across the apron of the stage with Kerr, Worsey and Egan sharing honors. Ms. Carroll did much to enliven the normally so-so "He Plays the Violin."

There were some slow moments in the 30-or-40 minute "non-musical" section of the first act that some tighter direction might alleviate, but basically this is a well-paced production and one well worth seeing. If you just saw the film version on television last week, see THIS production to see how else this musical can be done. If you have never seen "1776," then, as Adams says, "Get thee to it!"

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# Chamber concert is off-beat treat

If you could bear missing The Bird make his all-star debut or the soul-stirring oratory from Carterland, Schoolcraft College was offering an off-beat chamber music concert Tuesday, the likes of which one rarely finds in a sun-bleached suburb.

The summer music school faculty performed an unusual dose of wind ensemble works and a violin-piano sonata featuring Derek Francis and Alexander Hanway, respectively.

It was a program designed to display to connoisseurs the rarely-heard works of modern, university-type American composers rather than to please a large crowd with hummable melodies. So only about 100 persons showed up, in contrast to the nearly 300 who heard the piano four-hands team a week earlier.

FRANCIS AND Hanway tested their skills with the virtuoso sonata of Easley Blackwood, a contemporary (he's 43) who makes his living with workshops, master classes and concerts.

The late Alvin Etler's Quintet for wind instruments featured Wendy Hohmeyer, flute; David Mariotti, oboe; Eugene Wade, horn; Paul Ganson, bassoon; and Oliver Green, clarinet.

For those of us slobos who like a catchy

tune to tap our feet to, an ensemble of eight wind instruments treated us to a skillful, intriguing Serenade No. 12 by Mozart. Far more serious than the typical serenades and divertimenti of classical lore, Mozart's work stood in philosophical contrast to the biting wit of the Eider quintet.

FIVE MORE concerts will round out Schoolcraft's 1976 offering of something different in the way of music:

•Tonight at 8, flutist Kathy Kitzman will perform in the Liberal Arts Theater.

•Monday at 8, cellist Debra Fayroian, a young instrumentalist with a growing collection of zealous admirers in these parts, will headline a program that will include the irrepressible Bob Jones and his patient wife Ann in a duo for harpsichord and viola da gamba in the Waterman Center.

•Friday at 8, the summer music school orchestra will be heard in the Liberal Arts Theater.

•Wednesday, July 21, at 8, there will be a student chamber recital in the Liberal Arts Theater.

•Friday, July 23, at 8, the final concert will bring the student orchestra and band to the Waterman Center, and everyone will have a chance to see what the kids have learned. Considering the quality of staff, it's likely to be quite a bit.

## Kostelanetz, Cleo starring

So you think the quest for high fidelity and stereo recordings must have originated with rock and modern jazz fans.

Not so. In fact, just the opposite. The man generally credited with pioneering high quality sound in musical recordings would likely be considered a longhair in the out-of-it sense by the now generation. But had he never lived, they might not yet be enjoying stereo sound in recordings of their favorite groups.

His name is Andre Kostelanetz, and he will conduct one of his world-famous pops concerts, with the Detroit Symphony orchestra at the Meadow Brook Music Festival's Baldwin pavilion Sunday on the Oakland University campus.

Both innovator and perfectionist, Kostelanetz recognized early in his career that recordings and live concerts are different ball games, requiring separate techniques. Accordingly, he rearranged his entire orchestra set-up for recording sessions to produce the precise tonal dynamics he desired. He was the first conductor to provide recording engineers with a marked musical score — and to insist they use it.

The marketplace has verified his wisdom. For the last 10 years, his Promenade semi-classical concerts at New York's Lincoln Center have played consistently to packed houses.

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
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
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
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

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
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# Livonian Ruhle: A young Tiger grows

Vern Ruhle, a tall, 25-year-old right-handed pitcher, is one of the many younger players whom the Detroit Tigers were forced to use in their rebuilding year last season.

The Bengals suffered the worst campaign in their 76-year history in 1975, en-

during 102 losses and a string of 19 defeats in a row.

However, many of the kids, including Ruhle, survived. The Michigan native, who now lives in Livonia, described his experiences during the nightmarish campaign.

"Last year was a time and place for myself and some of the other kids to start," Ruhle said. "We were concerned about making the team and showing what we could do. Now, we have jobs, so we can

concentrate on winning and nothing else."

Ruhle, who was 18-12 with a 4.03 earned run average in 1975—pretty fair stats for a rookie with a last-place team—is considered by many to be among the most promising right-handers in the American League.

So far, the 1976 season has been a disappointment for Ruhle. He possesses a 5-3 record, a 4.03 ERA and has completed only one game in 10 starts.

I've struggled from the start this year," Ruhle confessed, noting that he went the distance nine times last season. For the most part, Ruhle has seemed to pitch well for the first five or six innings, only to wilt in the end.

"I'm basically a control pitcher," the hurler said. "I feel my 65 walks in 190 innings were too many last year. I'd like to get my walks down to around 40 for every 200 innings I pitch."

"I should also strike out at least twice as many as I walk," he continued. "So, I'd like to improve on my 67 of last year."

During Ruhle's first 87 innings of work this season, he has fanned 47, a marked improvement over 1975. However, his 26 walks average out to an almost identical rate as last year.

Ruhle, born in Midland and raised in Coleman, moved to Livonia after he married. "My wife's family lives here, so she's not alone when I'm on the road."

During spring training, Ruhle said he figured that manager Ralph Houk would start with a four-man rotation, then add a fifth starter in the middle of May. Ruhle speculated that the starting four would be Joe Coleman, Ray Bare, Dave Roberts and himself.

Coleman, showing no improvement from two sub-par years, was subsequently sold to the Chicago Cubs. Bare, also ineffective, was moved to the bullpen.

The Tigers eventually were forced to junk their plans for a five-man rotation because they couldn't get five effective pitchers together.

Mark "The Bird" Fidrych, a non-roster player during spring training, has not only

made the starting rotation but is its ace. He now teams with fellow rookie Frank McCormack, Roberts and Ruhle to form the starting staff.

"We'll be a much better ball club this year," Ruhle predicted, "now that we have a year of experience under our belts. We'll surprise a lot of people."

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
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# New school aid legislation may offer W-W tax relief

By MARILYN FITCHETT

Wayne-Westland Schools Supt. Timothy Dyer hinted at the possibility of property tax relief for W-W residents thanks to the new school aid bill.

The district, according to Dyer has been fighting a traditional school aid provision of capping state funding beyond the 30-mill mark, causing high-millage districts such as Wyandotte to receive no additional compensation for the higher mills levied.

But the new state aid bill calls for no capping of funding in the third year of the bill.

"This is a major legislative victory for us," Dyer told a board of education audience Monday. "Within a few years, barring any problems with declining enrollments, we may be able to grant some property tax relief."

Under the new formula, districts will receive no extra funding beyond 28 mills. The second year of the bill, funding will be capped at the 29-mill mark. Wayne-Westland levies 36.85 mills for operating expenses—tops in the state.

ASIDE FROM THE over-30 mill provision, the bill will mean no unexpected windfalls for the district. But Dyer is counting his blessings the district was spared any substantial cuts.

While Gov. William Milliken has hinted he will sign the bill, Dyer said he has the authority to make line item vetoes of some sections to the bill which was passed in Lansing last week.

One provision the governor cannot erase is adult education funding.

"We have totally survived in the field of adult education," Dyer said.

"Because we operate the fourth largest adult education program in the state, we were especially wary of any cuts in this area."

"But under the bill, we are going to receive \$1 million to \$1.2 million in adult education funds. This has a double effect on us because we've been unable to offset de-

clining enrollment by increased adult education programs and we can collect state aid for the adult students.

Another provision which Dyer is smiling about is a modification of a business inventory tax. Under last year's formula, the district lost taxes of \$33 million worth of inventory. Dyer said the new bill appeared to have changed the formula, but it was too early to determine how this would affect the district's funding.

ALTHOUGH THE BILL will help the district in adult education, inventory tax and the over-30 mill provision, Dyer contended

## W-W seeks grant to curb dropouts

Wayne-Westland School District will be seeking a \$100,000 federal grant in hopes of decreasing the district's higher than national average dropout rate.

In a public hearing Monday, federal programs coordinator Jim Linderman outlined a program aimed at ninth and 10th grade students in the district's evening youth program. These are students who have already experienced difficulty with regular day classes.

"We don't have the career education facilities we'd like to," Linderman said. "We want our program to incorporate career counseling with a classroom component and on the job training."

If the grant application is successful, the district will offer the program to 30 students the first year and 60 the next.

Teacher-pupil ratio in the program will be 15-1.

"What we're trying to do is give these kids a better self-image and make our curriculum more relevant to them. If a youth

feels better about himself, perhaps he won't drop out," Linderman said.

"The actual money is not all that great," he said. "There were no additions in special education and very little in transportation."

One provision which will not help Wayne-Westland as much as other districts is a declining enrollment feature.

The W-W dropout rate is 7.85 per cent with the national average pegged at 7 per cent. But of the students who choose the alternative evening youth program, 25-30 per cent drop out a second time.

## Discrimination on price good?

Discrimination is a good thing, if you're talking about price, says a Michigan State University marketing authority.

"Price discrimination is an essential lubricant for keeping the wheels of a competitive system turning, says Dr. Eli P. Cox, professor of marketing, in "MSU Business Topics," a quarterly published by the Graduate School of Business Administration.

Cox suggests, however, that price discrimination may be falling into a "condemnation-by-label category" because the word discrimination connotes bias and unfairness, although the word once was synonymous with good taste.

PRICE DISCRIMINATION probably is practiced in some form by every institution which sells goods or services and explains the two types of price discrimination.

"Economic price discrimination exists when the vendor receives a different net return (stated price per unit, less cost of selling and delivering) per unit in sales to different buyers."

Pragmatic price discrimination exists when a vendor sells to two or more buyers at different prices, with differences based primarily on relative demand elasticities rather than on precise differences in costs of sales and delivery."

According to Cox, price discrimination may be the most common and pervasive element of the marketing mix as economic enterprises strive for institutional advantage. Tampering with it is dangerous, he says, and should not be done on a wholesale scale or on the basis of categorical thinking.

HE BELIEVES eliminating economic price discrimination, if it were possible, would result in reduced demand, higher fixed costs per unit, and higher prices per unit to all consumers. It's not practical in the real world.

"To determine the prices necessary to achieve zero economic price discrimination would require a separate cost-accounting project for each transaction or transaction class."

"This would not only bog down a firm with paper work, but because cost accounting procedures are so imprecise, it would be a rarity for two accountants to agree on cost allocations," Cox adds.

On the other hand, it would be simpler to eliminate pragmatic price discrimination, "at least until the system broke down." It would mean that each seller would set a single price and then sell only to those customer-classes that could be served profitably at that price.

district did not figure any student losses.

"The declining enrollment clause will not be that great a benefit to us," Dyer said. "We've chosen to fight that battle in other ways such as increasing adult and special education enrollments."

Rep. Bill Keith (D-Garden City), whose district includes part of Westland, was co-sponsor of the bill. He noted early passage of the bill will allow districts to firm up their school plans.


"There was a general feeling in the legislature this year of belt-tightening," Keith said. "It didn't want to fund any new programs no matter how important. That was the attitude in Lansing."

"I'm happy we approved almost \$90 million more than the governor recommended for the state school aid bill. That's good news for most districts."

UNDER THE PRESENT structure, the state will provide \$43.90 in basic state aid per pupil based on the first 20 mills levied by the local district. For the next eight mills, the state will pay out \$39.60 per pupil.

The legislature has put a ceiling on additional fundings. If more than the expected number of student losses are experienced statewide next year, the appropriated declining enrollment funds will be prorated to the districts seeking aid.

Wayne-Westland expects to lose 400 students in September. The district educates about 23,000 students.




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
