Canton will pump \$65,000 interarks

Canton, Michigan

Canton officials soon will pump more than \$65,000 in federal funds into the township's recreation program.

Township officials, who recently learned Canton's application for the funds had been approved, hope to receive the \$65,225 in Community Block Grant funds. administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and allocated to Wayne County communities by the county, sometime within the next few months, according to Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein

According to the township's application, officials will use a generous portion of the funds to develop the township's recreational site and the remainder to augment and improve Canton's recreational program for senior citizens

Officials have earmarked \$2,950 in funds to air condition the senior citizen center at the township recreation center and an additional \$26,000 in funds for the purchase of four vans for senior citizen transportation. Employes of the Canton Recreation Department will use the vans to transport senior citizens to and from recreational program activities and as a dial-a-ride vehicle for senior citizens, Greenstein said. Officials hope to use the vans to transport other residents to recreational programs, if HUD approves.

CANTON OFFICIALS have allocated the remainder of the federal funds for development of the township recreation field, located on Canton Center north of Cherry Hill.

The township hopes to use \$30,770 of the funds to improve the park site and match a \$38,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, for which the township has already applied.

Township officials will use the grant monies to install drinking fountains, tennis courts, bleachers, two baseball backstops, 6,000 linear feet of bicycle paths, bicycle racks, and a 1,036-square-foot outdoor shelter for picnics at the recreation field. Officials will use \$3,000 a park development plan, needed to receive DNR funds

# Silvers has trust in Reserves; asks public, 'keep the faith'

When Carl Silvers says the Canton reserve police won" be "fooling around," it is hard not to believe him- after 25 years on the Detroit Police Force, Silvers has a no-nonsense look about him.

Square-jawed and straight-shooting, Silvers at 54, is one of the biggest boosters of the reserve in Canton- and with good reason- he will be their commander when they graduate and start work in early August.

If he had his way, the reserves would not be a political issue.

"This whole thing has gotten out of hand," he says in reference to attacks on the reserves, first by the Wayne County deputies union and then by the director of the reserve school, Al Stewart.

"These people can do a job for the residents in Canton if they're given the chance. It will take awhile, but the people will see some results if they just give them a chance.'

LIKE CRITICS of the reserve force, Silvers willingly admits the reserves will not be bonafide police officers when they graduate from the Michigan Reserve Police Training School. Even the extra training they are receiving won't make them professional officers when they begin working in Canton, Silvers says.

"You have to crawl before you can walk," Silvers says. "There's nothing that can take the place of street experience."

But the reserve coordinator stresses that the reserves will be involved in the public service end of police work anyway. "In this area, 98-99 per cent of police work is public service," he explains.

"It's helping people in snow storms, it's public relations. Have you ever seen the look of a woman who can't find her child? "We'll be doing that sort of thing, help-

ing find lost children, and giving first aid at accidents until the rescue squad or Sheriff can get there.

"When people go on vacation, we'll drop by their houses once a day and make sure everything is O.K. That's the bulk of police work anyway, and that's what we'll be doing

"I know these people are not fully

trained police officers and I know it's going to take time.

"But they're intelligent, they have integrity, they're willing to learn, and I intend to bust my butt to see they are taught."

SILVERS SAYS he has enlisted the aid of outside agencies and officers to see that the Canton reserves get continuous training in first aid, firearms, arrest powers, and all the areas good policemen should be knowledgeable in.

We're not bringing in rinky-dinks,

we're bringing in the best to train our people.

"And in one year, I challenge Stewart or anyone to see if they can compare any reserve force to us in anything," the commander says.

He adds, "When one of our dars goes down the street, I want the kids and the people to react like it's a Good Humor truck.

"But, if we lose the support of the people before we ever get started, we'll never get off the ground."

# **Stewart denies Reserve blasts**

Captain Al Stewart of the Michigan Police Reserve Training Council has issued a statement that the police reserve unit in Canton is properly constituted and that there is no legal problem with the super-

visor's serving as police chief. Stewart. executive director of the training council, issued a statement July 19 describing as "totally erroneous" a number of claims made in a July 15 story on the reserve program in the Canton Observer & Eccentric. Stewart was the main source of that report.

The basic clarification issued by Stewart was that the training council had never scheduled a meeting to discuss the fate of the Canton Police Reserves and that Supervisor Robert Greenstein can function legally as police chief over the reserves. He also added clarification on his remarks about the scope of power of police reserve officers.

STEWART FIRST SPOKE about a report July 15 that "The fate of Canton's first class of Police Reserves will be decided tonight (Thursday, July 15) . . .

"The fact is that at no time did I, or to the best of my knowledge did any other member of the Training Council Board, give you that information or even infer that such was the case," said Stewart. "No vote had been scheduled on the Canton matter, because there was no matter before the board requiring a vote.

"The question of clarification of Canton recruit training under the auspices of the Michigan Police Reserve Training Council had been resolved several weeks earlier when Greenstein and Carl Silvers met with out board at our meeting on June 24." Silvers is the coordinator of the Canton Reserves

The executive director of the training council, headquartered in Redford, categorically denied stating the council's board had planned to take a vote July 15 on the Canton matter. "My statement was that while 1 felt that the clarification of length of training had been made as requested. that I could not speak for other members

discussed at our monthly board meeting. There was no reference made that there would be a vote on that discussion."

STEWART ALSO denied that he had 'some legal questions as to the scope" of the Reserves' power.

"I am fully aware of what the legal powers and authority of the reserve officers are," stressed Stewart. "As a matter of information, it was based on my inquiry that the attorney general issued his opinion on Dec. 15, 1975 on the subject of reserve officers power and authority."

Stewart then referred to a letter he sent Lt. Eugene Daly of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department. (Daly also is a Democratic candidate for trustee. running on the Harold Stein slate against the Greenstein slate in Canton).

"You correctly quote me as saying. 'The training provided does not qualify the reserve or auxiliary officers to perform the police function except in the accompaniment of full-time police officers.'

'You failed, however, to quote that portion of my letter that states. 'This is not to say that the individual reserve officer may not, through additional training and experience, gain the knowledge and expertise to function alone . . .

"To continue your quote from my letter to Lt. Daley. you quote me as saying, "The recruits from Canton will not be qualified to be put on the street in any capacity . . . .' You fail to clarify that I am discussing qualifications based solely on having completed the Michigan Folice Reserve Training Council program. The additional training being provided for the Canton recruits by other agencies may very well be sufficient to qualify them to perform police duties.

"I did not state, as you claim, that reserve officers must be under the supervision of a 'certified police officer.' The attorney general's opinion makes no reference to reserve officers' being supervised by 'accredited officers.' The reference is to 'full-time' police officers."

# Crossing guards unresolved

Plymouth Township and Plymouth School District officials may soon stage a joint meeting to discuss the funding and existence of school crossing guards in Plymouth Township next fall.

Faced with the demands of about 15 township residents to continue the crossing guard program, members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees Tuesday realfirmed their refusal to share the cost of crossing guards with the school district but unanimously agreed to call a joint meeting with school board members to resolve the crossing guard problem.

Although not part of the resolution, board members informally agreed to broach a suggestion of Clerk Helen Richardson to place a safety millage on the schools' Sept. 2 ballot to finance crossing

guard services. With township Trustees Russell Ash and Gerald Burke absent from Tuesday's meeting, board members refused to support a motion of Trustee Richard Gornick to fund 50 per cent of the crossing guard cost in Plymouth Township next year. Gornick's motion, if carried, would have

Gornick's motion, it could guard services next year. According to a resolu-tion approved by the school board last fall, the services of crossing guards will cease this September in any muncipality which refuses to share 50 per cent of the cost.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP, according to the school board's resolution, must pay the

well as a \$12,700 bill for services rendered during the previous two years or face cutoff of crossing guard services altogether.

The township is the only municipality in the school district which has refused to pay. Canton has paid its share of the cost. while the City of Plymouth has placed its money in escrow until Plymouth Township agrees to pay or the school board cuts off

crossing guard services in the township. Gornick offered his motion to pay last year's crossing guard bill, despite his earlier stance that the township refuse to pay. "We could argue this ad infinitum," the

trustee said, "but I do not want to use any citizen as a pawn to prove a philosophical point. Philosophically, I feel the school board is responsible, but I do not wish to use children as leverage."

Although Gornick's motion brought a round of applause from residents at Tuesday's meeting, board members greeted the move with a negative re-

"The next thing the schools are going to ask is to pay for buses," responded Clerk Helen Richardson. "It's the responsibility of schools to get children to school. We shouldn't pay for it, the city shouldn't and Canton shouldn't.

"If the school district needs millage for safety and crossing guards, then it should ask that a millage for those purposes be

OTHER BOARD members agreed with Mrs. Richardson's point of view and reiterated their stance that crossing guards are

obligation of either school districts or municipalities to provide crossing guard services.

"The school board never cuts what they say they will," maintained Trustee Frank Millington. "If we refuse to share this cost, I guarantee you they won't take the crossing guards away."

Residents at Tuesday's meeting stressed their point of view-crossing guards are







"Goin' up north to the lake?" asked the neighborhood sleuth as he watched us packing the car with picnic gear: "Nope. South." I said as I wedged the cooler into the trunk between the towels and the golf clubs and the rest. "South"!" Nothin' but Toledo down that way." He was stumped, and I was glad.

THERE ARE THREE Huron-Clinton Metroparks to the south of us, and it turns out they're a lot closer than the proverbial



River Drive. Park admission is \$1 a car, but we always get a \$5 season pass that lets us in all 10 metroparks.

Dave Laidlaw, HCMA director, said Willow Metropark cost more than \$4.5 million. with \$1.9 million coming from that state recreation bond issue we passed a few years ago and \$400,000 from a federal open space grant.

Willow isn't the only metropark down that way

LOWER HURON Metropark. just east of Belleville, is one of the most scenic spots in southern Michigan.



north lakes HCMA, the authority which runs them. is sinking good money into them, and so the civilized portions of the facilities are new and first-class.

WILLOW METROPARK, six miles directly south of Metropolitan Airport, has a new Olympic-size swimming pool and games area.

The pool facility has a bathhouse with heated showers and coin-operated lockers for clothes checking, a food service building and patio, and central plaza.

They charge you 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for kids under 12 to use the pool. another quarter if you want to check a batch of clothes in a coin-operated locker. Weekday hours are 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. with longer hours on weekends.

We pack a lunch, as a matter of principle, but you can buy hamburgers or hot dogs if you want.

The games area has four basketball courts. 10 shuffleboard courts and two tennis courts. Shuffleboard and baskeball areas are free. and they'll even give you equipment. Tennis courts rent for \$1.50 an hour, and you bring your own equipment.

A NEW feature for metroparks is the tot lot, with a village of child-sized homes, a

factory, supermarket, gas station and li'l red schoolhouse.

A tricycle highway rolls across gentle hills. The kids can also use swings, a spiral slide and bench.

If you haven't been there, the park entrance is on Willow oad just west of Huron

It. too, has a po ers and food bar at the same prices as Willow

Naturalists can take your group on the Paw Paw and Bob White trails, or you can hike the trail yourself.

The 18-hole golf course is a par 3, which means the distance between holes is 50 to 110 yards.

There's no family camping, but groups such as scouts and Camp Fire girls may camp there. Lower Huron has been a popular spot for scout winter Klondike expeditions.

FURTHEST SOUTH is Oakwoods Metropark, with 1,700 acres just west of Flat Rock.

Its chief asset is the year-old Nature Center, a \$240,000 project. There are an indoor turtle pond, a small auditorium for study groups, and a raft of exhibits.

The nature study area has several bayous and woods populated by frogs, muskrats, turtles, fish, ducks and several uncommon wildflowers.

The entire spot is rich in history because it was once part of the Wyandot (Huron) Indian reservation in the 1880s.

Four hiking trails in the nature area vary from 700 feet to two miles in length. Bring your camera.

# Stewart clarifies views on Reserves

#### (Continued from page 1A)

Stewart said Greenstein is correct in his claim that police officers in departments of less than three officers are exempt from mandatory training certification. "The question raised in my letter to Lt. Daly was not whether or not Greenstein qualifies as a police officer, but rather whether he legally qualifies as a full-time police . chief

GREENSTEIN COMMENTED Tuesday that the reserve training council was upset that Daly had requested the letter from Stewart in his capacity as an officer of the

Wayne County Sheriff's and then used contents of the letter for political purposes.

"I have submitted a complaint to the undersheriff about a member of his department using his official role to obtain correspondence and then using some of that in-formation for political reasons," Greenstein said.

A special meeting of the reserve training council was held July 18 at which time the board voted to approve the following statement regarding Stewart's comments:

"The purpose of the Michigan Police Re-

serve Training Council is, as has been published, to provide basic law enforcement training to reserve and auxiliary police officers. Education is our function, not politics.

"It is not to the advantage of the council to interfere in the internal affairs of any municipality or police department, nor is it our intention to do so."

The statement was issued by Lt. John Hart of Farmington. first deputy director of the training council.

JOHN BANTON, secretary of the Reserve Training Council, stressed Tuesday that the council's board does not question

the legality or propriety of Greenstein's position as police chief of Canton Township. "State statutes clearly stipulate the re-

quirements of such an office." said Banton, "and it is not within the board's responsibility or authority to interpret such statutes

"Finally, recent newspaper articles have appeared which contain erroneous statements and out-of-context quotations from a letter addressed from an officer of this board to Lt. Daley ....

"It was not the intent nor the purpsoe of the board that the contents of such correspondence (letter to Daley) to a recognized police agency be used for public dehate.

# **Museum hires** new director By W.W. EDGAR

The Plymouth Historical Society did not have to go very far to find a director to succeed Mark Hunt, the young Kansan

After searching the country from ocean to ocean since the museum opened the man they found is Archie Stobie, who lives at 1063 Starkweather, only a few blocks from the Plymouth Historical Museum.

Stollte, who has a rich background in historical museum work, applied for the position some time ago and, when Hunt resigned unexpectedly, his name was at the top

The new direrctor, who moved from Lansing to Plymouth only three months ago, was highly elated with his selection and stated that the Plymouth Museum was the kind of a challenge that would spur him on

Stobie is no stranger to the area, having helped the City of Livonia with its activity at Quaker Acres on Seven Mile Road. And he has done considerable work at Greenfield Village where he was about to be

Born in Sault Ste Marie, Ontario, on Aug. 10, 1934, he was educated in the Soo high schools before enrolling at Superior State College. After two years at that institution he enrolled at Central Michigan University where he earned his bachelor's

After graduating from CMU he turned to teaching and spent nine years in the Utica

It was from there that he made his first bold move toward historical museum science by entering the the graduate school at Cooperstown, N.Y. There he earned his egree in 1968. Meanwhile, he spent considerable time in the East doing one of the outstanding members of the alumni.

It is from his desk in Lansing that he is coming to the Plymouth Museum.

AT THE SIGNING of his contract Friday morning Margaret Dunning, donor of the building and the guiding light of the museum, stated that she was well pleased with the choice because Stobie is no stranger to the Plymouth area.

Richard Gornick, president of the Society, also was well pleased with the selection and now is looking forward to an active program in the museum in which all the citizens can show an interest.

Stobie is the third director since the museum opened little more than a year ago. Phil Marowski, the first , resigned to enter the business world. And Hunt, who succeeded him, resigned to go back home to a job in his home town of Topeka, Kan.

Now, as a resident of Plymouth. Director Stobie voiced his sentiment when he confided:

" I am very excited about the opportunity that is being offered-and I hope to make the most of it."

"The likelihood of a motorcycle rider being involved in an accident is greatest during his first six months of riding.


"The 16-20 age group with less than six months experience is involved in twice as many secidents as the same age group

# St. Joe River carves a path through history

Follow the St. Joseph River by cance or by car through the horse-and-buggy country of Michigan's Amish farmers and the factory towns of Indiana to the white sandy beaches of Lake Michigan's angler paradise.

While all but four of the river's 210 miles are rated canoeable, the nine-mile stretch from the river's headwaters at Baw Beese Lake near Hillsdale to Jonesville has received the most attention in recent years.

For the past two years it has been the site each May of the annual Jonesville Frontier Canoe Race. The race takes about 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours and requires contestants to negotiate a 200-foot-long tunnel which runs under buildings in downtown Hillsdale. Other obstacles include 10 portages around water pipes, fallen trees, low bridges and Stock and Jonesville dams.

The serious canoeist will want to tackle

the 60-mile stretch of the St. Joseph that runs from Sturgeon Lake near Colon in St. Joseph County to the river's outlet at St. Joseph-Benton Harbor.

This canoe trip takes two to four days and requires portages around dams at Three Rivers; Constantine; Mottville; Elkhart and Mishawaka, Ind.; Niles and Berrien Springs.

Farm country lines both sides of the river in Michigan. Campers must obtain the land owner's permission for overnight stays. Bring your own canoe because Gardner's Favorite Sports and Marine at Benton Harbor and Three Rivers Sportland are about the only canoe liveries on the St. Joseph, advises the Automobile Club of Michigan. It is easy to find a spot for picnicking since there are parks in almost all of the many towns along the river.

History buffs will find many attractions

along the St. Joseph. At Centreville, the Langley Covered Bridge—a large red wooden structure—still carries traffic over the river as it has since 1887.

On the farmland around Centreville, many Amish plow the fields with horsedrawn plows and shun the modern world.

At Three Rivers' Scidmore Park, travelers can see the historical marker which identifies the junction of the Rocky, Portage and St. Joseph rivers as a favorite campsite for Indians centuries ago. The park has a spacious picnic area and a zoo with an extensive display of animals, including deer, elk, bear, wildcat and fox.

Following the river into Indiana, the canoeist paddles through densely populated stretches of lank dotted with expensive homes and factories. At one point, the river runs adjacent to the Notre Dame campus at South Bend. Still farther downstream at Niles is the site of Fort St. Joseph, founded in the late 1600s on land given by the French government to the Jesuits for a mission. The fort later fell into English hands and for several days in 1791 was under Spanish control. When the American government came into full control of the Northwest Territory, the Niles area became the only place in Michigan to have been governed under four flags.

The Fort St. Joseph Museum, headquartered in an 1882 carriage house, has collections that include relics from the original fort and artifacts relating to Bull and Oglala Sioux.

Around the next bend near Buchanan, travelers will find Bear Cave, a natural limestone cave where guided tours take visitors through a succession of fascinating

formations-stalactites, flow stones, petrified leaves and vegetation. Adjacent to the cave is Bear Cave Park, where riverside picnic tables and campsites are nestled among wooded hills and deep ravines. At the mouth of the river, where is empties into Lake Michigan, Father Jacques Marquette became the first white man to set foot in Berrien County. Father Marquette discovered the St. Joseph in 1675 and named the stream "River of the Miamis" for the Miami Indians who occupied its valley.

Later La Salle followed and built Fort Miami on the present site of St. Joseph. By 1769 there was a thriving trading and military post there.

The Twin Cities—Benton Harbor and St. Joseph—celebrate the Blossomtime Festival each May and in the spring of the year the orchards lining the river are a mass of blossoms. The St. Joseph is a fisherman's paradise so bring your rod and reel. The state record chinook salmon (44 pounds, two ounces) came out of the St. Joseph at the Berrien Springs Dam. The state record steelhead (26 pounds, eight ounces) was taken off the mouth of the river in Lake Michigan.

A fish ladder—a \$300,000 structure— was operated for the first time last fall at the Berrien Springs Dam, and salmon-watching became even a bigger sport.

Except for the industrialized areas, the St. Joseph shore abounds with waterfowl, deer and small game. Motorists wishing to share some of the river's splendor can drive one of the roads—M-99, M-60, US-12. M-86, M-103, US-31 and US-33—that parallel or cross the St. Joseph at several points.

# **Ohio Indian massacre worse than Custer's Last Stand**

Just about anyone who has ever been exposed to American history has heard the dramatic tale of Gen. George Custer's defeat by Chief Crazy Horse in an 1876 battle at the Little Big Horn.

But, according to Philip Mason, Wayne State University professor and archivist, the U.S. Army suffered an even more crushing loss to Indian warriors in 1791.

"A much more impressive and crippling defeat of the U.S. Army was the near annihilation of the army of Gen. Arthur St. Clair in Ohio by joint Indian forces Nov. 4, 1791," Mason said.

"St. Clair's army suffered about 670 fatalities and had almost another 300 wounded. The Indians killed 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> times more soldiers in Ohio than were lost in Custer's last stand. And the St. Clair defeat seriously impeded the westward expansion of the United States," the professor adds.

ACCORDING TO Mason, the English had ceded the Northwest Territories including the present states of Ohio. Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin to the U.S. in the treaty which ended the Revolutionary War. But the British retained control of the territory and the Indians who lived there because the U.S. didn't have the power to make them move.

The defeat of the St. Clair forces followed another Indian conquest a year earlier of an army commanded by Gen. Josiah Harmar.

"I think the situation after the bloody defeat of St. Clair's forces must have been one of the darkest periods of President George Washington's administration," said Mason.

"By arming the Indians and encouraging them to raid and burn pioneer settlements through such agents as the famous renegade Simon Girty, the English effectively retained control of the territory and the rich fur trade north and west of the Ohio River. The American government seemed powerless to assume the control of the western forts they had won in the Revolution," Mason continued.

THAT WAS the picture when George Washington appointed Revolutionary War hero "Mad Anthony" Wayne. Wayne had earned his nickname in the Revolution through his daring in such battles as the

successful storming of Stony Point.

Gen. Wayne took command of the Legion of the United States in June 1792 and began to whip the undisciplined frontiersmen into a trained army. In early skirmishes he gained the respect of his Indian foes. Little Turtle, chief of the Miamis, called him "Chief Who Never Sleeps" because the Indians were never able to surprise him.

Finally, Aug. 20, 1794, in an area covered with trees toppled by a tornado along the Maumee River southwest of Toledo, Gen. Wayne's forces routed the combined Indian armies. The victory by Wayne accomplished what Gen. Washington had hoped for.

Within three months, the British had agreed to evacuate the western forts as part of the Jay Treaty. A year later, the Indian tribes of the Northwest Territory met with Gen. Wayne at Fort Greenville in Ohio and signed a treaty accepting the Americans as their new allies.

A FORCE from Gen. Wayne's legion arrived in Detroit July 11,1776 and raised the

first U.S. flag over Michigan. July 11 is now recognized by the Michigan Legislature as Anthony Wayne Day. Following the departure of the British.

Following the departure of the British, ges all of Michigan and much of Ohio, Indiana, par

Illinois and Wisconsin was named Wayne County by an appreciative government. "Anthony Wayne may have been the big-

gest reason why the United States expanded beyond the original states along the Atlantic Coast and became a world power instead of just another country in the western hemisphere. His contribution to the development of the nation is largely unappreciated, "Mason said.

# Milliken asks for sunset law

The sun never sets on Michigan now, but Gov. William Milliken says he has directed his staff to work with legislative leaders to develop "sunset" legislation

Under the sunset law concept, specific programs are given an expiration date at the time of their inception. To be continued beyond their expiration date, they must be individually reviewed and justified.

In a letter to House Minority Leader Dennis Cawthorne, Milliken concurred with Cawthorne's recommendation to study the feasibility of incorporating sunset legislation into the 1977-78 Executive Budget. Milliken has employed the concept previously in creating various state offices, such as the Office of Drug Abuse, the Office of Youth Services and the Office of Services to the Aging.

Milliken told Cawthorne in the letter, "There is obviously some duplication of governmental programs and agencies.... It is also apparent that, after a period of time, many programs become redundant and in some cases totally ineffective... I am interested in a mechanism which would create an incentive for periodic and comprehensive legislative evaluation of existing programs and agencies. "I believe that accountability of government in the public eye would be improved by looking seriously at this kind of legislation."

Milliken spoke in favor of sunset legislation at a recent National Governors' Conference.

He said that while there may be problems in assuring that such legislation is carefully developed, it "is well worth the risk if it helps make government responsive to the people."

The governor also told his fellow governors there is danger that functions at various levels of government can become "unresponsive, inbred and arrogant."

# Annexation controversy began in the 1950s

#### (Part IV)

The city manager who followed Harold Cheek was Albert F. Glassford, who took office in June 1949. Glassford, who worked for the city during the time his predecessor was the manager, was acting manager for a short time before he was officially named to the top spot.

During the 15 years Glassford was Plymouth city manager, controversy erupted with Plymouth Township on several occasions, primarily over attempts by city officials to annex township property.

After a proposition to annex the entire township was defeated by township voters in 1955, the city, under the leadership of Glassford and Mayor Russell M. Daane, succeeded in annexing 85 acres of the Cassady farm in the township as a site for the Western Electric plant. In the same year, the city attempted to annex the Burroughs Corporation property in the Township of Plymouth on Plymouth Road at Haggerty. The move was successfully posed by the township and Burroughs.



IN HIS 1955-56 report, Glassford conceded that the city's efforts to annex the. Burrough's property would be 'vigorously opposed." and added that "the city's legal proposition must be based upon law, fact and integrity."

In 1957, while Glassford was manager, the city purchased the old Christian Science church building and property at the corner of Dodge and Main. This was acquired to provide part of the site needed for the present city hall. The cornerstone for this new municipal building was laid on May 22, 1964, seven months before Glassford left Plymouth.

Glassford resigned in December 1964, to

accept the position of city manager at Albion. He retired from that job in 1971. He now is reported to be part-time assessor for Springfield, Mich.

KEN FISHER, then director of public safety, was acting city manager from the time Glassford left until a new manager arrived in August 1965. Fisher was chief of police from 1954-60.

From 1960-65, he was director of safety, responsible for the police, fire and building departments. From 1965-67, when he resigned, he was chief of police.

In August 1965, Plymouth got one of its youngest and tallest city managers. Richard D. Blodgett, about 30 when he arrived here, was 64 in height. Blodgett held a master's degree in public administration from the University of Michigan where he studied under Arthur W. Bromage, nationally-recognized professor of political science, known for his expertise on city management.

BLODGETT HAD been assistant to the

city administrator in Ann Arbor, then city manager at Marysville, Ohio, before accepting the position in Plymouth.

He served here five years, leaving when he received an offer from a city with a much larger budget-Bloomington, Ill. Blodgett is reported to have left the job in Bloomington about a year ago to become part owner and operator of Woodspur Lodge, a skiing establishment in Winter Park, Colo., about 70 miles west of Denver.

The acting city manager after Blodgett left was Eugene Slider, the city clerk (who died in 1972). In January 1971, Norman M. Gaffney, a resident of Port Huron where he had been on the city commission, became Plymouth's next city manager. He had held a similar position in Dowagiac, Mich., before coming here. Gaffney's tenure was one of the shortest. He left in December 1972, after rubbing some of the city commissioners the wrong way.

Ken Way, the city treasurer, was acting city manager after Gaffney left and until the arrival, in March 1973, of the present

## city manager-Fred L. Yockey.

YOCKEY, Plymouth's 11th city manager in the 58 years since the community adopted the commission-manager form of government, is a native of Alpena.

He graduated from Michigan State University in 1950 with a bachelor's degree in business and public service. Yockey arrived here from Midland, Mich., where he had been city manager for seven years. Prior to that, he had been city manager at Hunington Woods from 1952-66. Yockey and his wife have four grown children.

Yockey has been active on numerous governmental boards in the greater Detroit area. He was a board member of the Michigan Municipal Employee's Retirement System for six years and was chairman for four of them. He was a member

of the Michigan Municipal League Legislative Committee for 15 years. In 1971, he was president of the Michigan Chapter of the International City Management Association

During a recent interview, I asked City Manager Yockey what he considered the city's major problems were today.

"The major problem of the area, not just the city," he replied, "is to find a method of consolidating the city and the township into a viable governmental entity. Lacking this, we will continue to have two divided, wasteful governmental units at cross purposes with each other. At present, there is considerable duplication. including two police departments, two fire departments, two of everyting." (Part V will conclude the story of

# **Candidates debate pros/cons** of establishing local police

One of the issues facing Plymouth Township residents on the Aug. 3 ballot is whether to approve two mills to raise revenue to organize a township police department. The two mills (\$2 per \$1,000 state equal-

ized evaluation) would be used to hire personnel and purchase necessary vehicles and equipment for a fulltime police force. A mixture of positions has been given on

the question of the police millage and the issue of the most economical and efficient way of providing police protection in the township

HELES RICHARDSON, township clerk running unopposed, supports a "yes" vote on the two mills Aug. 3.

"I personally feel that the township can best meet its needs for police protection by the formation of our own police department as this will give better control, opportunities for ordinance enforcement as well as a savings to the taxpayers," she says

Joe West, also running unopposed for township treasurer, says he heartily supports the police millage because he believes it is the best vehicle for providing police protection in the township.

cause of what they have to offer. The township would get more for its money because of back up services of detective and youth bureaus, helicopter and scuba diver services plus patrol. By contract with Sheriff, the township avoids the problem of baying to replace a damaged vehicle or substitute cost for an injured officer and will be able to avoid union negotiation problems.

"With the same money the two mills will buy, the township could buy much more police protection from the Sheriff than by starting its own force," says Pruner. George Wheeler, also 'a trustee candidate, states: "Until it is decided whether Plymouth Township will become the City of Plymouth Heights, I believe the best thing to do is contract with another police department. I believe, in the long run, it would be more beneficial to contract with the City of Plymouth than with Wayne County Sheriff."

SOREN PEDERSEN, a candidate for supervisor, comments: "If the citizens want increased protection, I feel that they will have to vote the millage for it.

"personally, I feel that a locally controlled force would be the best. In addition, it would provide for better res

own police department, through the millage vote, we can provide the necessary protection that we presently need."

LOYD SHARLAND, a trustee candidate, says he is personally satisfied with the police protection furnished by the Michigan State Police and Wayne County Sheriff "for which we are currently taxed.

"If the majority of the township citizens seriously desire a police department to the extent of voting taxes earmarked for this purpose, they can have as much police service as they are willing to pay for."

Mrs. Barbara Saunders, trustee candidate, recommends a "yes" vote on the two mills. "I believe this to be the best way for residents to obtain adequate police protection, better enforcement of township ordinance, and a better understanding of any problems in the township."

Weyona "Lee" Fidge, trustee candidate, says: "First establish nucleus of small township force. Contract police services (personnel, vehicles). However, all super-

protection. Determination to contract additional scout cars or add personnel to the township police force could be made as additional police protection becomes necessary. This provides on-the-job study of what exactly is needed rather than just 'paper protection' before total commitment for establishing township police force is made."

G.W. Dean, candidate for supervisor, comments: "If the township residents feel that they need more law enforcement-in addition to the excellent police protection from the nearby Michigan State Police Post-the results of all investigations and recommendations show quite clearly that a township police department will provide better enforcement of local ordinances at lower cost than we could get from either the City of Plymouth or the County Sheriff.

Nathan Frank, Jr., a candidate for trustee, states: "Because I am a member of the Wayne County Sheriff Department and I am familiar with the county operation only, it would be unfair for me to make a judgment at this time. If elected I certainly will study and review all options to obtain the best police protection for Plymouth Township residents."

Maurice M. Breen, former supervisor now running for trustee, takes a less favorable position on the millage request. He believes a better option would be for the township to contract with the City of Plymouth for police protection.

"I am unhappy with the lack of choice given to us as to the tax for police purposes. I don't consider a proposed police department of Plymouth Township composed of a chief, lieutenant, sergeant and three officers anything but a financial drain

"I am not in favor of contracting with the Sheriff. A contract with the city, if properly negotiated, seems the best solution. However, this would mean a realistic stance on the part of the city and township-this has not yet happened."

SUPPORTING THE idea of contracting with the Wayne County Sheriff's is Andrew R. Pruner, a candidate for trustee.

"We should continue with the Sheriff be-




ALAN GOVE, city engineer, reported the volume of building construction increased substantially last month over June 1975. To date, the building department has completed 25 multi-family housing inspections





Pierce, a doctor who operates a medical center in Ann Arbor for low-income patients, said that the bill vetoed by the president would have created an estimated 350,000 new jobs.

The candidate. talking in the home of Tom Curran, 19911 Schoolhouse, Northville, said:

"President Ford continues to make perfectly clear his lack of understanding and lack of sensitivity to the problems of people who want to work for a living and can't find jobs.'

Pierce said "weeks and months pass by with the unemployment rate remaining inthe situation, despite the fact that this bill

passed by an overwhelming margin in both the House and Senate He said the bill would have funnelled money to state and local governments for public works projects and to help those governments avoid laying off workers because of the recession.

"I believe it should be federal policy to take a counter-cyclical role in boosting the employment situation," the candidate said. "In other words, when the economy is rolling well, the government will stay out. But in recessionary times, the government would attempt to create or preserve jobs. thus easing the effects of the up-and-down economic cycle has on many people who would otherwise be put out of work."

Marvin Stempien, Democratic candidate for Congress in the 2d District, has endorsed the concept of a "sunset" law to require all federal agencies and programs to justify their continued existence.

# Senate should control oversight, Esch says

The United States Senate is an exclusive club of 100 members while the house of representatives is a gaggle of 435 where each frog has only a tiny share of the pond

But Marvin L. Esch, a 10-year house veteran, has another reason for wanting to graduate to the upper chamber: "The senate needs a sense of history.

He goes on: "With a sense of history, a group which stands for election only every six years could decide where the country ought to be five or 10 years from now. Most importantly, the senate can develop a procedure of legislative oversight, a system of effective controls over the programs we've already passed.'

ESCH, AN Ann Arbor Republican. senses a strong "anti-Washington feeling" among audiences across Michigan.

Yet the 2nd District congressman is the only one of four men in the GOP senate primary who has spent more than a couple of years in office there.

Esch was one of the "Class of '66" which then Gov. George Romney pulled in on his coattails. And depsite his five terms in Washington in this anti-Washington year, Esch is leading the pack in the primary, according to the polls.

The former speech professor from the University of Michigan and Wayne State University is crisscrossing the state just as hard as he crisscrossed the unknown territory of Livonia four years ago when that suburb was added to his reapportioned congressional district. He carried Livonia, even though his Democratic opponent was a Livonia legislator.

The guts of his campaign theme is that Congress must do a vastly more efficient job, not of passing more laws and programs, but of making certain the present laws and programs are meeting people's needs.

In an auto trip from his campaign headquarters in Southfield to a speaking engagement in Grosse Pointe, Esch. 49, puzed aloud over the question of whether Congress can actually make government perform better.

"PEOPLE SEE government as an adversary, interfering with how they live, with the performance of industry, with local government. I've had more response to this from audiences than from any other attude

The Environmental Protection Agency fould be of assistance to communities. Instead, the attitude (of EPA) seems to be, 'Here's one more, form to fill out.'

"The CETA bill (Comprehensive Employment Training Act), which I wrote, is another. I hear complaints of lots of bureaucratic regulations, but the intent of the law is to let them (the communities) run it. That's what they're supposed to do. "Our response in the last 10 years in Congress has been 'one more law, one more law.' It's legislative redundancy."

ESCH'S THEME about Congress' need to check on how existing laws and programs are working isn't new

In 1968, the then-freshman congressman wrote the last chapter in a party publication called "Republican Papers" in which he argued that Congress was failing to fulfill one of its major functions by its inability to review government perform-

He is still saying so. And he is saying the senate is the place to fulfill the function of legislative oversight.

"All kinds of efforts are being started now," Esch said. He cited steps toward zero-base budgeting (making an agency justify its appropriation from scratch each year rather than taking last year's figure and adding a percentage). He also cited discussions of "sunset" laws (where an agency's life would expire in a certain number of years unless Congress reviews and renews it).

Only half-jokingly Esch suggests that Congress pass no new laws for a year. He would then use that time to investigate how present laws and programs work.

He would have departmental secretaries, assistant secretaries and civil servants in grades 14 and 15 spend one week a month in hearings on Capitol Hill "to see how the legislative mandate is being carried out."

ANOTHER ESCH method is to do away with the traditional congressional hearing in which a committee, sitting like an appellate court, takes testimony from witnesses, one at a time.

Instead, he said, experts should be called in for a group conversation, with congressmen and staffers later joining in. He says this eliminates the flambovant taking of hard, fixed positions associated with congressional posturing and television news coverage.

The method is already being tried in the House Science and Technology Committee, of which he is a member.

ESCH'S DECISION to run for the senate was something of a surprise to those who know him well. In past years, he had professed no interest in the senate because he felt it would mean selling his soul to major interest groups

What changed his mind?

"The new campaign laws," he answered. "The new laws make it a whole new world. I've been conducting five or six fundraisers a week at \$76 a ticket. You used to have to go to a few big contributors and get \$10,000 or \$20,000 or \$50,000 apiece from them."

Now Michigan's most liberal Republican representative talks about the problems of industry a lot more, these days: How auto companies know how to make vehicles but the federal government interferes with productivity y requiring the filling out of forms; how Kellogg Co. must spend a lot of time and money wading through a 3,800page lawsuit filed by the Federal Trade Commission.

WHAT MAKES HIM different from other anti-Washingtonites, however, is that Esch says he believes in "active govern-

ment" that will aid education, promote economic security and look out for welfare.

It's not the anti-Washington feeling of the Wallaceites and depression-era Republicans, he says. And he sums it up:

"For any of these goals to be achieved, the first priority must be a government that works.'





# Rouge oil source is mystery

## By TIM RICHARD

State investigators were unable to determine the source of an oil sheen that floated down the Middle Rouge River to Newburgh Lake for two days last week.


The oil covered at least half of the river's width and flowed steadily July 14 and 15, according to a nearby resident. Ducks, both wild and domesticated, were dovered by the oil.

Origin of the spill was between Plymouth Road and Hines Drive

AN INVESTIGATOR for the state water resources commission (WRC) doubted Associated Spring Corp. (ASC) in Plymouth Township was the source.

The investigator, Gary Bailey, told the WRC Lansing office he discussed the oil spill with ASC officials and, based on his past experience with the company, concluded there must be another source.

Bailey, who is stationed at the WRC's Pointe Mouille office at Rockwood, said he would not talk to reporters. The Observer-& Eccentric had to place a call to the WRC in Lansing, where officials in turn



WRC OFFICIALS could only speculate on the cause of the spill, which had nearly dissipated by Friday morning. Another company may have been responsible. Or there may have been residual oil in a combination sewer that spilled out, they said. The latter explanation was admittedly unlikely because spills from sewer holding basins are generally associated with heavy rains, and there had been no heavy rains



What? \$7 an hour!

While feasting on his morning cereal, the Stroller almost choked when he listened to the morning news coming over the air waves.

He had just heard the newscaster tell the world that the union officials had begun their bargaining sessions with the Big Three and were asking for an hourly wage of \$7 with an additional \$4 in fringe benefits.

He just couldn't believe his ears. Why that was more than he was paid for a 55hour week when he entered the work force in the shops back home. AS HE SAT there in almost disbelief, the Stroller couldn't help recalling that he climbed aboard the pay car at the Atlas cement works and received an envelope containing \$7.60 in cash for a fortnight of labor on the floor of the machine shop.

Now the men in the shops are getting almost that much each hour—along with fringe benefits. It just didn't seem possible. But it proves ust how much things and times—have changed since he was a youth.

Sitting there at brekfast with his mind now turned to his early working days, the Stroller recalled that even after he finished his four years of apprenticeship the going rate for machinists was 20 cents an hour—with an additional nickel an hour if you chose to work the long night shift.

There were no such things as eight hour shifts in those days, and the Stroller chose the night shift of 13 hours. Even then he drew only \$16.25 a week. And that was thought to be good wages.

But there was more to it than that. To cement your job with the company, you lived in a company house. And you did all of your grocery shopping at the company store.

By the time you paid your rent and the grocery bill, there was little left. ,When the Stroller heard—over the air that fringe benefits included dental care for the family, he gulped.

In his day in the shops, there was no such thing as a company doctor. The employee was on his own with the lone exception of receiving treatment for stomach cramps. And looking back now, that is a real laugh.

For some reason or other, the company decided that the best place for a first-aid room was the machine shop. So the mechanic on duty during the night was supplied with bandages for cuts and sprains.

Most of the complaints on hot nights were brought about by stomach cramps. The Stroller knew little about such things, but, with the aid of an imaginative helper, we concocted a scheme.

We purchased four medicine-type bottles and a bag of soda mint tablets. We had a different amount of tablets in each bottle.

When a worker came in with a complaint during the night, we feigned taking his pulse. Then we'd give him a selection of pills (soda mint tablets) and tell him to take one from the blue bottle every hour and one from the green bottle every two hours.

It was surprising what miracles were performed. Scarcely was there a time when the "sick" man didn't return before the shift was over and ask where he could purchase pills like those, saying, "They sure fixed me up."

# Esch supports curbs on busing orders

U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch has met with the president, the autorney general, the secretary of health, education and welfare, and House and Senate leaders on the issue of the president's proposals on school busing.

"I believe that the president's proposals for future legislation on school busing are constructive in that, similar to the Esch amendment, they will more clearly restrict the use of busing by the courts," Esch said.





Some primaries were held, and state conventions took place, each indicating candidates' relative strength and each scrutinized by the power brokers. Finally, one candidate or another would develop enough commitments from the power lords to amass enough votes to get the nomination at the national convention.

THIS PROCESS took place almost entirely within the framework of the political party.

The power elite derived their power from their positions within the party, and the forces of money and manpower they controlled came from within the political party organization.

During these years, it was inconceivable that a member of the party elite could never have met a serious candidate for the presidential nomination.

ALL THIS began to change in the late 1960s.

The war in Viet Nan produced a vast number of ordinary citizens whose disgust with the war rove them into the political process and provided the driving force for the chaos of the Chicago Democratic convention of 1968. At that time, the old-line forces backing Sen. Hubert Humphey prevailed, but only after a struggle.

The fallout from the war, the rising impact of television and the increased number of primary elections paved the way for Sen. George McGovern's nomination in Miami in 1972.

The Democratic convention of last week in New York saw the process brought to its ultimate conclusion. Gov. Jimmy Carter's victory was brought about by a series of victories in primary elections, aided by the vast impact of television as a national medium, peopled by large numbers of vol-

and the Averill Harrimans of this world have been pushed aside.

As MIT's respected political scientist, Walter Burnham, remarked: "This is personalistic politics under a thin party label-blank check politics with an individual (Carter) who is still not very well known. Carter completely bypassed the old Democratic structure. He will be the Democratic. nominee, but the phrase means anything he makes it mean."

IT WAS this dynamic which made last week's convention so odd.

To watch it on television was to watch a spectacle, pitched not to the delegates who supposedly possessed the power to nominate but rather toward the American people who in fact nominated.

To cover the convention from the floor of Madison Square Garden was to cover an event populated by the power elite who recognized that their involvement in Carter's nomination was, although important, by no means crucial.

Even the demonstrations lacked force and power. Watching the demonstration following Carter's nomination. I was reminded of William Jennings Bryan's remark: "A convention feels about demonstrations somewhat like the big man who had a small wife who was in the habit of beating him. When asked why he permitted it. he replied that it seemed to please her and it did not hurt him." The Carter strategists would have agreed.

It was a new kind of convention, fueled by new kinds of forces in our politics. As I watched Carter's acceptance speech. I scrawled down a sentence that summarizes my feelings as a journalist covering something new:

"The absolutism of good, predicated on a new and strange populism, mediated by fashionable uncertainty and limited grasp, sold by the slickest technique I ever saw."

# Capital punishment: Greatest deterrent

When persons are convicted of a crime, it is up to the courts to sentence them or mete out a punishment. If judges are not severe in their sentenc-ing, there is little to beter criminals from repeat-ing their crimes.

It has been a long time since the State of Michigan has had capital punishment.

Capital punishment is a very final thing. It leters crime; it is the ultimate in separation. While it has no rehabilitative value, it contains retribution in that the community feels the criminal has paid for his crime.

Capital punishment should not be used as a reat and should not be used frivolously. Yet, if we don't go back to making the punishment fit the crime, society has neither a way of discouraging violent crimes nor separating from soclety on a permanent basis a criminal who has been guilty of repeated acts of violence.

THE OPPONENTS of capital punishment have said no man has a right to take another man's life and that we should avoid Hammurabi's philoso-

phy of "an eye for an eye," But turning it around, when it is not safe to walk on the streets of major cities of the United tates, it is time for society to act to deter people om taking eyes and lives.

In the past, capital punishment was arbitrarily meted out to the point where minorities and the poor seemed to dominate the death chambers. The court ruled that the punishment could no



two trials are held-one in which the judge and jury have tried the accused for guilt or innocence, followed by a separate trial to determine the proper punishment, based on the severity of the crime.

THE DECISION CLEARS the air and, essen tially, saves for the ultimate punishment the most violent, anti-social acts.

But more important, the supreme court ruling says capital punishment is an appropriate punish ment for some crimes and that not to provide for it in our laws means that we have removed the greatest deterrent from the minds of people who might commit an unsocial act.

If our streets are to be made safe and our homes to remain sacred, it is time that the Mich igan Legislature consider enacting a capital pur-ishment statute.





Opinions differ because information gathered from the current 10-year census serves as the basis for computing the amount of federal and state aid to local governments. It also is used to apportion an area's legislative and congressional delegation.

MUNICIPALITIES WHICH have lost population since the 1970 census are: Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms, Franklin Village, Redford Township, Garden City and the City of Plymouth.

Livonia and Bloomfield Hills experienced little change in population from 1970 to the present

Those which gained fewer than 5,000 residents are: Plymouth Township, Farmington, Farmington Hills, Lathrup Village, City of Orchard Lake, Bloomfield Township and Rochester.

Registering gains of more than 5,000 residents each are: Avon, West Bloomfield and Canton townships, Troy, Southfield and Westland.

# **Motorist-aid system** planned by county

Although the Michigan State Highway Department plans to take bids on the installation of a highly sophisticated emergency motorist-aid system on a 25-mile stretch of metropolitan freeway, no one is sure yet where this system will be placed.

According to Wayne County Commissioner Clemens Bykowski, the location of the proposed project is still under study by highway traffic engineers and safety experts, but possible sites include I-94 (Edsel Ford Freeway), I-96 (Jeffries Freeway) and I-75 (Chrysler and Fisher Freeways). He adds that highway officials have esti-

mated the cost of the system as between \$700,000 and \$950,000. Bids will be taken in late fall of 1977.

"It was suggested earlier that highway

ford) also is opposed to a federal mid-dec-ade census. "Who is going to underwrite the expense?" he asks.

"The census has been every 10 years for almost a hundred years. Why change it now?" he adds.

Much of Bennett's opposition stems from the fact that Redford is no longer a growing community. "I think Redford is past its peak. We would stand to lose because our population has gone down. But if Redford was a growing community, I would probably favor the bill," Bennett says. "We lost out when the census would

have helped us," he adds."We were growing in the mid-1950s and there was no middecade census then.'

James Defebaugh, (R-Bloomfield Twp.) is a state representative for a growing community-West Bloomfield Township. Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield Township, Franklin Village and Beverly Hills-and favors the bill. "Although local governments within the State of Michigan can have their own census if they pay for it, I support a nationally held mid-decade census," he says.

Defebaugh adds, "Our society is so darn mobile now, and a great share of federal pass-through and revenue sharing money is on a per capita basis. The census would be worth the cost.

"Some persons are concerned that the census might cause another round of political reapportionment. I don't think that is a negative thing necessarily. Detroit may lose representation in the state senate because it is losing population, but smaller communities would pick up the differ-



officials were leaning to a section of I-94 from Detroit Metropolitan Airport eastward, perhaps as far a Harper Woods, but I've been told that any section of the three freeways is a possibility," Bykowski says.

DONALD ORNE, an engineer in the traffic and safety division of the highway department, says that any public communications system is "only as good as what happens on the receiving end.

Since the purpose of the callbox system is to put a motorist in distress in touch with a police agency, it's important for us to research the number of policing jurisdictions involved in the area of the project, and how they can be cooridinated to provide the best response," Orne said.

He adds, "The state will be committing significant funding to install a distress system, so we want to make sure we put it where the need is greatest.

"Traffic volume, the number of accidents in a given area, car theft and stripping problems and criminal harassment of stranded motorists are important in reaching our decision."

TWO TYPES of equipment are being evaluated by highway engineers: a wireless telephone unit that provides two-way communication between the motorist in trouble and a police officer, and a coded signal callbox which would send an appropriate signal directly to police headquarters with the motorist receiving a confirming signal that help was on the way.


According to Orne, either type of equipment would be installed at half-mile intervals. He adds that his department would come up with a final recommendation on the equipment and where it should be installed within six months.

BYKOWSKI SAYS, "I personally favor a wireless phone system because it provides a human response. We've tried television cameras and sensing devices, but if you're in trouble you want the reassurance of talking to someone.

The color-coded button system would be better than nothing, but it's highly vulnerable to pranksters who would be inclined to push the button calling for an ambulance, a police car or other services. When you have two-way communication, you will eliminate much of the temptation for false alarms.'

Bykowski also believes the best site for the project would be along the Jefferies Freeway, especially the new section now under construction that will run through Northwest Detroit, Redford Township and Livonia. According to the commissioner, there is great difficulty in finding telephones or gas stations that stay open after 6 p.m. along that route, and it involves eight lanes of traffic. Also, Bykowski says, it is easier to construct something on a road that's closed to traffic.



# **Goose management program starts**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced that a wildlife share-the-wealth plan to distribute Wisconsin's gaggles of wild geese throughout the Mississippi Flyway is underway.

The joint federal-state plan is being fostered by the Service and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to reduce the massive concentration of Canda geese at Horicon Marsh, a prisitine waterfowl complex in east-central Wisconsin.

The crux of the management strategy is to make government wild lands less attractive as goose habitat. Although the the plan is not expected to be competed before 1980, early changes are beginning to appear in the marsh, officials said.

The Horicon complex is a traditional way station for Canada geese that invade Wisconsin every fall after migrating from summer territories near James and Hudson Bay, Canada.

"The geese no longer obey their ancestral migratory timetable." said Ellis Klett, assistant regional director of refuges and olis.

Klett said the flock is in jepardy because the area's attractiveness has created an artificial holding pattern that is not working for the best interests of the birds.

"The area is so attractive as goose habitat it holds the flock, by voluntary self-restriction, from seeking other feeding and nesting areas in Wisconsin and the Mississippi Flyway. The upshot is that, annually, an artificial holding pattern exists as a threat to the geese.

The potential of a disease outbreak in the flock is becoming increasingly likely. the agencies claim. Encouraging the geese to move out of the area sooner should not adversely affect consumptive and nonconsumptive use of the wild resource, they added.

Early stages of the plan have been in motion at Horicon this summer. Around 700 acres of government land traditionally planted in winter wheat and corn were left unseeded this year, thus eliminating attractive agricultural crops. "Natural, moist soil plants are now growing on the 700

acres," Klett said. "This fall, the geese will be less inclined to linger at the 'dinner table' and they're expected to move out sooner in search of other food sources.

To further discourage a fall "residential" pattern" at Horicon Marsh, the Service has initiated drawdown operations to lower the marsh water supply. Klett said water management is recognized as a useful and available tool in waterfowl management. 'We're making adjustments in the water supply with care." he said, adding that both water and land management practices will be changed in transitional stages. of the program.

State Rep. John F. Markes (D-Livonia) has sponsored an amendment to the State School Aid Act which would provide for dollar-for-dollar inventory reimbursement to school districts for revenue lost because of the state's passage of the new single business tax (SBT).

"When the tax on business inventory was removed under the SBT, each school district was promised that they would not lose any revenue under this change." Rep. Markes pointed out.

"In actuality, however, many school districts will be hurt very much by the removal. Many districts in this area will not receive dollar-for-dollar return on their lost income. In other words, for the schools of the Livonia district, the state has taken away a major revenue source, and failed to replace it.

MY AMENDMENT simply fulfills the commitment we made to local districts in returning to them, dollar for dollar, their loss. This amendment will mean an additional \$546,000 for the Livonia School District.

"This amendment is the very minimum we can do to help the schools of Michigan," Markes said.

## Stempien backed by AFMSCME union

Marvin Stempien, Livonia attorney running for Congress, has won the political en dorsement of Metropolitan Council No. 23 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO. Stempien, seeking the Democratic Party's nomination in the Aug. 3 primary, said the endorsement was announced by Council President Robert Johnson. Six unions have now endorsed the candidate, a former state legislator.

Stempien said the endorsements "reflect the support that my campaign is continuing to receive from rank and file working people because of my years of work in the Michigan Legislature."

# Ms. Wheelchair title is one more victory for Canton mother

Margaret Chmielewski has "that little comething extra" and that's why this young Canton mother is the 1976 Ms. Wheelchair Michigan.

The description comes from Dan Goodfellow, Livonia Jaycee who headed the fourth annual Ms. Wheelchair Michigan Pageant at Madonna College last weekend.

But anyone who met the smiling, helpful young woman as she pushed her chair through the varied events might well have said the same thing.

The judges agreed easily that she was the best person to serve as a symbol for some 200,000 handicapped people in Michigan. The 13 other contestants agreed. They picked her as Miss Congeniality berause of her helpfulness.

And the young woman who was runnerup. Bonnie Scanland of Romulus, told Goodfellow later that "absolutely, they picked the right person."

MRS. CHMIELEWSKI has had to have a lot extra for a good share of her life, and the spark has been there when she has needed it.

Although paralyzed in the lower part of her body because of an automobile accident, she finished high school, earned two degrees from Wayne State University, worked as a secretary, lab assistant and teacher. married and had a child. Now she drives a car keeps house in the new home she and her husband, Jim, purchased recently and takes care of twowar-old Mark And she's already an outstanding spokesperson for the handicapped.

She had to battle the Detroit Board of Education and its position against hiring the handicapped when she did student teaching seven years ago, and she's ready now to take on a battle in Plymouth against what she considers thoughtless attitudes.

"I was shopping in one of the stores there recently," she said, "and saw a sign posted. It read 'Don't park in the spaces designated for handicapped—the police are giving tickets."

"That's not the reason for saving parking spaces for the handicapped. If people understood better they wouldn't put out signs like that."

THE NEW MS. Wheelchair Michigan won a competition sponsored jointly by the Mobility Awareness Team, Inc., and the Livonia Jaycees.

Its purpose is two-fold, to offer girls the opportunity to be in a pageant and to promote awareness of the need for community facilities that permit the handcapped to lead full lives.

This means, Goodfellow pointed out, things like curb ramps, adequate entrance ways and doorways, elevators and rails as well as specially-designated parking places.

The annual pageant, Goodfellow added, is an attempt to show "that there are many wheelchair people who aren't really handicapped at all—they are just mobility limited." MRS. CHMIELEWSKI was sponsored by the Plymouth Jaycees, and she will go on to a national competition in September. She also receives a cash award, and will represent the Mobility Awareness Team in a number of events in Michigan during the coming year.

Patricia Karl of Royal Oak was in this position for the year just ended. Previous winners were Patricia Nevin and Angie Corrieri, a Plymouth resident now president of MAT.

"She was very said. "There were a few tears, and she thanked everyone for the opportunity of entering and the other ship and support."

THANKS TO OTHERS has been Marge Chmielewski's style for the years since her accident.

"My family pushed me quite a bit," she said, remembering the time when living with disabling injury was new.

And her resume drawn up for entry into the pageant states that "if it were not for the intenseness of the therapy and counseling from my family and doctor, I fear I could not have achieved what I have."

This support, she wrote, plus the fact that "my personality as a teenager had always been a fiery one," made possible the beginning advances when "just getting out of bed in the morning was not easy."

INJURED IN 1963, Marge at first spent

eight months in a hospital, but despite the time lost graduated in 1964 with her class at St. Alphonsus High School in Dearborn. Although she had not before the accident planned on college. Vocational Rehabilitation scholarship tests placed her in a high percentile, so she enrolled at Wayne State University, living at the dormitory there and driving her own car.

A major part of her campus life was membership in Delta Zeta national sorority, which in her senior year nominated her for its top national award. She also served during her undergraduate time as chairman of the WSU panhellenic sing.

While going to school, she worked part time at Henry Ford Hospital's pathology lab, helping initiate a computer program for surgical and autopsy reports. After completing her student teaching at

Grosse Pointe North High School, she earned a degree in 1969 and began teaching at Our Lady of the Sea High School. A year later she headed back to Wayne State for a degree in guidance and counseling. During that year she served as her sorority's college chapter director and was active in weekend counseling at the Milan Federal Prison, a project she described as her" single most gratifying experience."

HER STORY after that reads like a success novel.

"I received my master's degree in December of 1972," she wrote, " graduating with a 3.8 average. It was in 1971 that I met Jim, whom I was to later marry.

"We had the most beautiful wedding in May, 1973, and I joined the teaching staff of Bishop Borgess High School and taught speech at night classes for Wayne County Community College.

"All I had strived to achieve those last few years were forgotten dor the moment as I found in early 1974 I was pregnant. I delivered a healthy boy in September. My little Mark is a joy to both Jim and me as we watch his world grow and he in it."

ANOTHER CONTESTANT in the 1976 competition was Donna McGuire, also of Canton.

Donna also is confined to a wheelchair and, recently married, does her own housework in the trailer where she and her husband live. Recently she has begun selling Avon products, an activity she finds most enjoyable because "I enjoy meeting people."

# Don Newcombe visits

# Athlete tells St. Mary doctors about alcohol

Don Newcombe, at 6'4" and 240 lbs. doesn't admit to being afraid of much but the one thing he fears most in this world is alcohol.

Newcombe is an alcoholic.

A former Dodger pitcher and "Rookie of the Year" in 1949, he also won the first Cy Young award in 1956 for outstanding pitcher in both major leagues. He now tours the country speaking or alcoholism as a representative for the National Clearinghouse on Alcohol Information.

"I bet my life that 75-80 per cent of baseball players drink heavily. It is how they relax after a game and it is something to do to fill their time." he told a group of doctors at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia.

After each game. Newcombe says that he would lose 12-14 lbs. Then he would drink beer to ward off his thirst.

"I didn't know that drinking beer could lead to alcoholism home and I started drinking it when I was eight years old. He said it would make us grow big and tall still alcoholics." he says.

Gaining weight aging, Newcombe keep trim.

"Staying in shape isn't hard if you're an athlete, but drinking does shorten your ca-

reer," he says. Newcombe. 50, retired from baseball at 32.

Most athletes don't continue playing after the ages of 32-33 and they are still relatively young, says Newcombe.

"I couldn't throw a fastball any longer, was I an old man at 32"" asks Newcombe.

HE WAS THE HARDEST WORKING pitcher in baseball, running three or four hours a day, he says. Alcohol slowed down his reflexes to the point where he was frequently getting hit by the ball, "I just couldn't get my arm up fast

enough." he says. If more athletes knew about what alcohol does to ones muscles and nerves Newcombe believes that it would curtail their drinking.

"We don't pay much attention to what the fans think. We think we're God's gift to the world when we're sitting on top of the ladder.

But one day you come tumbling down and reality hits you when you find out that there really aren't that many jobs available in baseball. A lot of us just, can't handle that and the traumatic experience makes us drink more." he says.

Last fall Newcombe was invited by the New York City Commisioner of baseball to travel around the spring training camps and talk about the problem of alcoholism.

The contracts weren't signed yet so Newcombe is hoping to be able to go to Florida this year.

"Hugh Casey, a relief pitcher for the Dodgers blew his brains out in Atlanta. He was a drunk," says Newcombe.

Alcohol can affect and athlete or a wellknown person as well as anyone else, he says. Five years ago it was a crime that the federal government was not paying attention to what alcohol was doing to the senators and congressmen.

"They turned their heads the other way and this represents the mentality of our society," he says.

Newcombe says that there are 10 million potential alcoholics in the United States. "A lot of people think that it is self-inflicted but I don't buy that story. It has to

start somewhere ——look I was being given beer when I was eight." he says. "Kids are drinking at a young age and I blame the parents for it. I blame them for the moral breakdown of the family struc-

ture." he says. Many kids come home from school and their mother is lying drunk on the coach. The attitude is. "If she's doing it, why can't I," he says.

Parents don't care and will only come to the scene when the youngster is in trouble. Then they play the distraught parent role, says. Newcombe. "KIDS NEED DIRECTION and this is the message to the adults. The adults aren't paying attention." he says.

Bringing down the age restrictions hasn't made one bit of difference. according to Newcombe.

"It's available and if they're going get it, they will." he says.

Newcombe had a liquor business in New Jersey for ten years and it was shut down four times for minors possessing alcoholic beverages sold from that store.

"We didn't sell to minors but they got caught on the street. All they had to do was bribe a wino or get someone to buy it for them." he says.

If one of his kids came home drunk. Newcombe says that he would sit down and try to do somehting about it.

"I wouldn't wring my hands and ask where did I go wrong." he says.

"If my 14-year-old kid would ask me if he should use alcohol or marijuana. I'd tell him marijuana though I've never smoked it," he says.

He's been in 32 states and he sees the same thing happening wherever he goes, "It's getting worse and we've go' to top

it, or at least stem the tide." he says. "I want to use myself as an example to encourage someone who may be addicted to or recovering from alcohol. If I have a message, it's directed to the kids."

## **Goose management** plan on schedule

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced that a wildlife share-the-wealth plan to distribute Wisconsin's gaggles of wild geese throughout the Mississippi Flyway is underway.

The joint federal-state plan is being fostered by the Service and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to reduce the massive concentration of Canda geese at Horicon Marsh, a prisitine waterfowl complex in east-central Wisconsin.

The crux of the management strategy is to make government wild lands less attractive as goose habitat. Although the the plan is not expected to be competed before 1980, early changes are beginning to appear in the marsh, officials said. The Horicon complex is a tradition way station for Canada geese that invade Wisconsin every fall after migrating from summer territories near James and Hudson Bay, Canáda. "The geese no longer obey their ancest-ral migratory timetable," said Ellis Klett, assistant regional director of refuges and wildlife resources for the Service in Minneapolis Klett said the flock is in jepardy because the area's attractiveness has created an artificial holding pattern that is not working for the best interests of the birds. The area is so attractive as goose habitat it holds the flock, by voluntary self-restriction, from seeking other feeding and nesting areas in Wisconsin and the Mississippi Flyway. The upshot is that, annually, an artificial holding pattern exists as a threat to the geese. The potential of a disease outbreak in the flock is becoming increasingly likely. the agencies claim. Encouraging the geese to move out of the area sooner should not adversely affect consumptive and nonconsumptive use of the wild resource, they added. Early stages of the plan have been in mo-tion at Horicon this summer. Around 700 acres of government land traditionally planted in winter wheat and corn were left unseeded this year, thus eliminating attractive agricultural crops. "Natural, moist soil plants are now growing on the 700 acres," Klett said. "This fall, the geese will be less inclined to linger at the 'dinner table' and they're expected to move out sooner in search of other food sources." To further discourage a fall "residential pattern" at Horicon Marsh, the Service has initiated drawdown operations to lower the marsh water supply. Klett said water management is recognized as a useful and available tool in waterfowl management. 'We're making adjustments in the water supply with care," he said, adding that both water and land management practices will be changed in transitional stages of the program. The management arithmetic calls for a reduction in the goose concentration in east-central Wisconsin from current fall levels of 200,000 geese to 100,000 by 1980. The agencies have indicated available tools to carry out the plan also include their "knowledge of waterfowl-information amassed over years of study." Klett admitted there are no pushbutton solutions for the Wisoconsin goose problem. "This situation has developed over a period of years. We re not attempting to reduce the concentration with a fast, belowthe-belt punch at the resource. What we are going to do is work with nature and the geese to effect gradual changes in the next four years.

# Hart backer has Carter tie

#### By PHILIP H. POWER

politicians throughout Michigan As scramble to forge links with the newlynominated Democratic national ticket of Gov. Jimmy Carter and Sen. Walter Mondale. they'll find a quiet suburban attorney there well before them.

Birmingham's Robert Nederlander holds the rare distinction of having been asked

by both Carter and Mondale for high-level money-raising help long before they were nominated.

Since April, Nederlander has been Carter's Michigan finance chairman and a vice-chairman of the Carter campaign's national finance committee.

Nederlander's links with Mondale go all the way back to October 1974, when the Minnesota senator asked him to become

NEDERLANDER is not known generally as a powerful politician with strong ties to politicians throughout Michigan and the country. But the 43-year-old attorney's active involvement in Democratic politics goes back to Philip A. Hart's successful first race for the U.S. Senate in 1958. Nederlander was elected to the University of Michigan Board of Regents in 1968; he now serves as the board's unofficial chairman and is seeking renomination at the Democratic state convention in August.

The story of Nederlander's relationship with Carter and Mondale is a fascinating example of how a man from a wealthy Detroit-area family (the Nederlanders own the Fisher Theater and have theatrical interests throughout the country) can get into politics with a low profile but great success.

"MY INVOLVEMENT with the Carter campaign goes back to February 1976," Nederlander explained. "His people had talked to an old friend of mine, Texas Sen. Llovd Bentsen, who evidently told them I would be very useful in raising money and spreading the word for Gov. Carter.

They called me, but I was on my way to China with a group from the University of Michigan, so we didn't get back together again until the middle of March.

"Steve Sellig, one of Carter's national finance people, became to Detroit at the end of the month, and we talked about the governor's positions and philosophy. I agreed to join the campaign in early April, and since then I have been very, very busy."

Nederlander held successful fund-raisers in Michigan for Carter in April and May, just before the Michigan presidential preference primary. WHY CARTER? Particularly so early in

the long presidential campaign?

"I've talked with Gov. Carter several times," Nederlander explained, "and by any standpoint he's terribly impressive. He's precise on the issues, he's highly intelligent, and he has enormous stamina and self-control.

"In addition, he was and is the only candidate who can unite the party-he's got support from blacks, labor, liberals, virtually all sectors.

"He'll be a very good president, toughminded and an imaginative policymaker. And he's not beholden to any particular special interest group, because of the way he got the nomination," Nederlander added.

NEDERLANDER'S involvement with Mondale began when he was asked to fly to Washington to meet the senator in October 1974.

"We talked alone for over two hours." Nederlander said. "exploring his philosophy. his problems and his chances. He's

way Mondale withdrew, citing the pressures of time and money which worked against a thoughtful candidacy.

Mondale is an excellent choice for vicepresident, according to Nederlander, citing his work on the senate finance and budget committees. "He knows the tax structure is inequitable, but he also realizes that you can't take away the incentive for free enterprise and individuals."

NEDERLANDER, WHO lives with his wife Karen and their two children, is an unusually quiet politician.

"I don't send out a press release every time I do something," he says with a smile. The limelight's not my style. If you do your homework and do your job, people will trust you and believe that your involvement is without ulterior motives. I try to support candidates because they are the best for the job, not because I'm going to get something out of it."

For Nederlander, who was a Carter delegate at-large to the national convention. politics is a "public duty, a responsibility I feel I must meet. It's a lot of work, but it has to be done."

Looking at his list of political meetings in New York following the convention, he adds. "I guess my work's really cut out for me from now on."







Admission is separate for the village and museum. Tickets are priced for adults and for children 6 through 12. Children under 6 are admitted free.







# Court Theatre keeps magic with 'Fantasticks'

By ETHEL SIMMONS As a setting for the Court Theatre, the Detroit Institute of Arts Kresge

Court has lost none of its magic. "The Fantastics," candlelight supper thea-ter offering, is a visual delight. Songs in this memorable show that

had a 17-year-run off Broadway (and just closed this spring) make it a tune-follow the dream." The musical's book and lyrics are by Tom Jones, music by Harvey Schmidt.

K. K. Harper (Luisa), who co-stars with Edward Coulter (Matt) as the idealistic young lovers, also did the chorography, and nice job of it, too.

Ms. Harper is pretty, with beautiful long blond hair. She certainly looks the part of the girl, who declares, "I'm 16 year's old and every day something happens to me and I don't know what to make of it."

SHE SINGS SWEETLY, acts nicely but is dressed too babyish, even puffed sleeves and matching headband

Her co-star also handles well his role of the man "nearly 20" who loves her. Coulter is red-headed, casually dressed and thoroughly amiable. His singing voice makes good listening.

My main complaint about the lovers, who must surmount their fathers' ruse to bring them together by keeping them apart, is that they didn't seem to really interact.

I didn't feel they had a romance going - it was more like a romance with the audience

As the fathers, Mark Atchison (Hucklebee) and Peter Psalm (Bellamy) had an easy romp. These strawhatted, suspendered and vest characters get the comic songs, one about their phony feud ("to manipulate children, you just say no") and "That's why I love vegetables . . . with chil-dren, you don't know until the seed is nearly sown what you've grown."

WITH ITS BASICALLY bare

peal to the imagination more strongly than sets.

First, there are a couple of characters that just take over the show. One portrays the garden "wall" separating the boy and girl, yet bringing them together, where they meet. Michael Haley (The Mute) wears white makeup, a black top hat, white tie and black leotard.

He stands motionless for long periods, moves in to supply the right touch: Sprinkling silvery rain on the lovers' heads as they sing, "Let it rain." Other props changing the time or season include a disk that is the moon on one side, reversing to the sun, hung on a hook.

Timothy Schoch as another character (the Narrator, or Bandit, El Gallo) is the bad guy in black: Sombrero, satin shirt, studded belt and trousers. But he's kind of like the Fonz, helping the principals along one way or another. The fathers hire him for a phony rape, or abduction, so the boy happily ever after.

Life has a way of interfering with the best of schemes. Before you know it, the lovers quarrel, he goes in search of an episode and finds despair, she almost succumbs to glittering decadence with the Bandit. El Gallo has style, and even dies with flair.

ALSO IN THE cast are Paul Petruccione (Henry) and Martin McCall (Mortimer), as a couple of delightful fellows who pop up out of a box whenever needed to further the plot.

A reprise of "Try to Remember" reminds us of human failing and challenge. "Who understands why we all must die a bit before we grow again?" is the bittersweet lesson.





# **Canton picks head football coach**

A new football coach has been selected to usher in the fall season at Plymouth Canton High School.

Plymouth Community Athletic, Director John Sandmann announced Monday afternoon that 41-year-old Dave Schuele, a defensive coordinator the past seven years at Highland Park High School, received the nod over several other applicants.

Schuele was selected by a committee consiting of Sandmann, Canton Principal Kent Buikema, Salem Principal Bill Brown, Personnel Director Norm Kee and C.E.P. Athletic Liaison Paul Cummings.

Schuele moves into the post vacated by former Canton coach Jim Muneio, who resigned along with the rest of the school's football staff as a result of a spring con-

troversy over leadership in the football program.

Schuele's resume indicates that he is an experienced veteran of the high school coaching ranks.

He was an assistant coach at Central Michigan University in 1962, head coach at Midland Meridian High 1962-64, an assistant coach at Okemos High 1964-69 and most recently, an assistant at Highland Park.

"With every new job, there's been a new challenge." Schuele said. "I hope with a lot of hard work we can accomplish a marked improvement in the program."

Schuele helped turn an 0-8 Okemos team into a squad that won two league championships, and while at Highland Park, asssisted in leading that school to a 6-2 mark

last season, the best for the Parkers since 1938

The head coach position at Canton will entail more than merely developing a high school football program in view of recent events that severly damaged the school's image.

Schuele realizes this and his attitude is positive when it comes to building solidarity in the Chiefs' program.

"I'm a very positive person," the ap-pointed stated. "I try to be positive in everything I do and I believe that Canton High has the material that can be molded into a winning squad.

"This program is theirs (the people in the community) as well as ours," Schuele continued. "I hope our supporters can get behind the ballclub and use their support in a positive manner

"I'm proud to be in a program where there is plenty of interest. I hope to bring a program that everyone can be proud of. Hopefully, we can get parental interest channeled in the right direction." Schuele takes a basic approach to foot-

ball

"I like to keep things relatively simple." he said. "I coach techniques and fundementals. I feel a team should learn a few things and do them well rather than a lot of things and be inconsistent.

"Last season when I was coaching at Highland Park, we didn't have a man on defense who weighed 200 pounds, but with a well-drilled team, we allowed only three touchdowns.


Schuele's offensive thinking runs along the same basic lines as his defensive philosophy

"You can't have a strong passing game without a strong running game," he noted. "I will try to run a balanced attack and pass when the opportunity presents itself. I like to use the pass to keep the defense honest. In the end though, it all boils down to playing basic football.'

Schuele will begin selecting a staff of assistants immediately.

Sandmann, obviously, was pleased with the selection of Schuele for the post. "The committee felt that Dave was the best for the job," said the Plymouth athletic director. "I feel he is very well qualified and we are happy to get him.'

Canton opens its grid season Sept. 11 against Livonia Bentley. Oddly enough, Schuele's daughter is the Bulldogs' trainer while his son is a possible varsity candidate for the squad as a 10th grader.





That means there were three times as many 300 shooters as there were 298's. And to make matters just a bit stranger, there were 20 games of 299-where one pin was left standing.

With these figures, a good argument can be made that the 300 club isn't as exclusive as many bowlers have been led to believe.

IT IS THE SAME with the 800 club. For years on end, the bowler who turned in a series of 800 or better was almost in a class by himself. Seldem were there more than one or two who high shot throughout the district.



In the Redford Township Police and Fire League Dennis Cox is the leader with 82 points, followed by Bob Breen and Gary Teschty with 71 points each.


