Candidates debate police, land use plan

Land use Wednesday topped the concerns of candidates for seats on the Canton Board of Trustees, and contenders in the race offered views on the township's recently adopted master land use plan, the township's reserve police, taping of board meetings, and other township issues.

Speaking out at a candidates night sponsored by the League of Women Voters and the American Association of University Women, the candidates spurred campaign efforts to capture the Democrat and Republican nominations for supervisor, treasurer, clerk and two four-year trustee posts in the Aug. 3 primary election.

In the township race are 15 candidates—10 Democrats and five Republicans.

Vying for the Democratic nomination for the supervisor's seat are incumbent Robert Greenstein and Harold Stein. Peter Bundarin runs unopposed for supervisor on the Republican ticket.

Seeking the clerk's seat are incumbent John Flodin, a Democrat, and Republican Pat Dombek. Democrats Carl Parsell, incumbent treasurer, and Ann Bradley will battle it out for the Democratic nomination to the treasurer's post, while Bart Berg runs unopposed for the treasurer's seat on the Republican ticket.

Five Democrats and two Republicans are seeking two four-year trustee seats on the Canton board. Democrats are Eugene Goldsmith, incumbent Gerald Cheske, Lynne Goldsmith, Joyce Willis and Noel Culbert. Republicans are incumbent Jim Poole and George Hall.

Greenstein, Flodin, Parsell, Cheske and Ms. Willis are running as a slate in the township election, as are Stein, Ms. Bradley and Daley.

INCUMBENT CANDIDATES at Wednesday's meeting pointed to their accomplishments on the Canton board as just cause for re-election. Challengers criticized the incumbents' record and the Greenstein slate, and they offered their views on changing the township's recently adopted master land use plan.

Poole was unable to attend Wednesday's meeting because of illness in his family.

Bundarin, Republican challenger for supervisor, began Wednesday night's criticism of the present administration with his opening remarks. The township, he said, is now fragmented, with 25 per cent of its residents behind the present administration, 25 per cent against the Greenstein slate and 25 per cent "looking for something better."

"The first few months the present administration was in office, I thought they were doing a good job," Bundarin recalled. "But, like many of you, I soon became disenchanted."

The Republican candidate called the township's controversial master land use plan, which zones about 5,600 acres west of Canton Center for agricultural use, "a confiscation of property rights that will cause accelerated development in areas where we can least afford it."

Bundarin, like Dombek and Hall, favors implementation of California's Petaluma Plan, under which building permits are limited to a specific number each year.

"This is the type of planning I'd like to see in Canton," Bundarin told approximately 40 residents present at Wednesday's meeting. "Each year, the township would assess sewers, schools and so forth and lay out the township in that manner."

"Right now, the feeling of east and west is tearing this township apart. By limiting growth to 500 units a year, you won't have a problem with growth."

Stein, who will challenge Greenstein on the Democratic ticket for supervisor Aug. 3, offered other criticisms of the land use plan. Like Ms. Bradley and Daley, other members of his slate, Stein says more industrial and commercial growth are needed in Canton. Open space, he says, is needed on the east and west sides of the township.

"I'm not against the open space concept," Stein says. "But I think if the farmers on the west side are going to get a tax break, the east should too."

IN HIS OPENING remarks, Stein spoke of "accountability" in township government.

"Township government is your business, because it's your tax dollar," Stein said.

"The only way we're going to get accountability is by truly representative government—getting input, encouraging commercial and industrial growth, and following proper board procedures and rules."

"If I'm elected supervisor, you'll have accountability in Canton. You're paying for it now and not getting it."

Greenstein, Canton's supervisor for the past two years, defended actions taken under his administration and called them "tremendous strides forward." Incumbent members of his slate, the supervisor said, have fulfilled all but one of the campaign promises made two years ago. "You'll forgive me if I don't speak in terms of criticism," Greenstein said. "It's interesting how everyone criticizes the present administration, but no one says what they're going to do."

REFERRING TO the township's master land use plan and some candidates' remarks that the plan is "illegal," Greenstein continued, "Some of the best legal and planning brains in the country have decided our plan is legal."

"We ask you not to be fooled by rhetoric, and look at our accomplishments. What we have made are tremendous strides forward. If you don't like the advances Canton has made, then seek another candidate."

Criticism and discussion of the master land use plan did not stop with remarks by supervisor candidates.

"I voted no against the master plan," said Berg, a member of the township planning commission and former president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce. "I'm not opposed to saving agricultural land, provided it is good agricultural land."

"If anyone is going to be hurt over the transition," Berg added, "then I could not vote for it."

Daley, Ms. Goldsmith and Culbert, candidates for trustee, said the plan reserves too much land for agriculture.

"I question the saving of 5,600 acres," said Ms. Goldsmith. "I'm not convinced all that land is being actively farmed. I would like to see more questions raised about feasibility."

Added Culbert: "I wish I had the answers. I do think retaining 5,600 acres is just too much. It could be that the whole plan has to be chucked."

Ms. Bradley, candidate for treasurer on the Stein slate, said the plan would raise the taxes of residents in the eastern half of the township. She fears the plan will devalue the farmers' land investment.

UNDER THE PLAN, township officials will tax agricultural land according to its agricultural use as opposed to its potential, developed use.

"I believe that land is the people's retirement," Ms. Bradley said. "I don't feel we have the right to take that farmland away from them. I say the township should be fully developed with 50,000 people on the east side and 50,000 people on the west, with open space on both sides of the township."

But members of the Greenstein slate opposed their rivals' point of view. The land use plan, they maintained, will not raise the taxes of residents in the eastern half of the township, because agricultural land will not require additional taxes for the construction of schools and sewage lines.

"When you carry this over a long term," said Greenstein, "you'll find revenues demanded by agriculture are negligible. Consequently, this is a savings to taxpayers, not a burden."

"You'll find the vast majority of farmland is under beautiful cultivation," said the supervisor, referring to some candidates' remarks that the farmland was unfit for cultivation. "Our ordinance provides for all other kinds of uses compatible to farmland to preserve open space."

Greenstein said the land use plan does not preclude implementation of the Petaluma Plan, advocated by some candidates.

"We can easily implement the Petaluma Plan with the master plan exactly as it is today," he said. "But the Petaluma Plan only controls growth. It does not preserve agricultural land."

Ms. Willis, the only candidate on the Greenstein slate who has not served on the township board, advocates the land use plan as it currently stands.

"I would make no changes," she said.

Political signs of time

Greenstein imposter circulating to misdirect Cantonites' wrath

Unknown opponents of Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein and his running mates in the Aug. 3 primary election are apparently steering a course of shady political maneuvering this election year.

The opponents are apparently posing as the supervisor or supporters of his policies in efforts to dirty the Greenstein name.

The latest political trick occurred Thursday, when a pair of alleged police officers approached the home of John and Phyllis Evans, 43160 Arlington in Windsor Park, at 12:30 a.m. and ordered the couple

to remove a garage sale sign at the corner of Arlington and Sheldon.

The alleged officers, Mrs. Evans said, ordered removal of the garage sale sign under authority of the supervisor.

BUT WHEN AN angry Mrs. Evans Friday approached Greenstein at the township offices, she learned the supervisor had issued no such order against garage sale signs. In fact, the supervisor told her, the township does not enforce its sign ordinance against the placement of garage sale signs.

"We have no political biases," said Mrs. Evans before telling her story. "We do not support Mr. Greenstein or anyone else. It's just that someone is apparently going around the township using Greenstein's name and harassing citizens. I just really think it's unfair to him, and people should know about it."

The incident began at 11:30 p.m. Thursday, when Mrs. Evans and her husband placed a sign for their garage sale at the corner of Sheldon and Arlington. At the time, Mrs. Evans said, the couple noticed a car with police-type lights parked nearby.

The couple returned home and went to bed. At about 12:30 a.m., Mrs. Evans said, they were awakened by a flashing white light from a car parked on the street, and a knock at the door. Two men, dressed in police-type uniforms, stood outside the door.

"I assumed they were police officers," Mrs. Evans said, "but they never told me their names or offered identification cards. They asked if we had put up the garage sale sign, and I said yes."

THE CANTON resident tried to reconstruct the visitor's exact words.

"I think they said, 'You'll have to get them down,'" she recalled. "Mr. Greenstein says, according to the Canton ordinance, you can't put those signs up. If you don't take them down immediately, we'll have to write a summons."

Mrs. Evans and her husband walked to the corner at 12:45 a.m. and removed the sign. The next day she paid a visit to Greenstein.

provide the deputy with protection until the matter settled down.

"In writing the letter requesting police protection, I described why I felt the situation was serious enough to warrant such a request. Sheriff Postill, apparently, feels some of my description was malicious and he's filed a libel action."

"My intent was malicious—my intent was just what I did, to ask for police protection because I felt it was needed. That was my intent. But the man wants to file a lawsuit, and that's his right."

Parsell is named in Sheriff's suit

Carl Parsell of Canton has been named as a party in a libel lawsuit filed by Washtenaw County Sheriff Fred Postill last week in Washtenaw Circuit Court.

Parsell was named a party in the lawsuit for statements he made in a letter acting in the role as executive director of the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM). Parsell is also Canton Township Treasurer and a leader amongst Canton Democrats.

The libel suit filed by Sheriff Postill names the POAM, Parsell, Ann Arbor News and others as defendants against an alleged malicious attack against his character.

The lawsuit stems from an incident at a wedding party in Chelsea where a fight supposedly broke out between Postill and another deputy who is supporting the Sheriff's opponent in the upcoming election in Washtenaw. Postill, who allegedly attacked a deputy at the party, has since been formally charged with assault and battery.

"I'm not involved in the political situation out there," Parsell told the Canton Observer & Eccentric. "My only involvement was a letter I wrote as executive director of the POAM."

"A lot of charges have been bandied about on what actually happened at the wedding party. I don't know what the detailed facts of the situation are but the reports received by the POAM convinced me that the situation was very volatile and quite serious. And so I mailed a letter to the Michigan State Police requesting the deputy, who was allegedly attacked, be given 24-hour around-the-clock police protection."

"The POAM was concerned because there was a case where a deputy was supposedly attacked by his superior officer, with threats made. Because of it being a political situation, it might take awhile to be settled in court. And so the POAM felt it would be best to have the State Police

Plymouth Twp. OKs new restaurant plan

Members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees last week rezoned a parcel of land on the south side of Ann Arbor Road west of Sheldon to allow construction of a Big Boy restaurant on the site.

Township officials unanimously agreed to rezone the parcel from multiple residential to commercial as requested by owners Andrew and George Ansara, who already operate 11 Big Boy restaurants in Michigan.

In other action, board members granted final preliminary plat approval to developers of Quail Hollow Subdivision and tabled a request for final plat approval of Plymouth Meadows Subdivision, pending action of the Plymouth Township Planning Commission.

PLANNING COMMISSION members had recommended approval of the Ansaras' rezoning request to allow construction of the Big Boy restaurant on the Ann Arbor Road parcel.

The site, measuring almost an acre, is too small for a multiple residential structure, an attorney for the Ansaras told board members. The land offers space for only an eight-unit apartment building; the cost of construction and maintenance for that small a building is relatively high compared to that for larger apartment complexes.

According to the restaurant's site plan, not yet approved by the township board,

the Ansaras would construct a 4,000 square foot building with a seating capacity of 135 persons. The building is brick with wood-shake siding near the roof line. The Ansaras propose 63 parking spaces, berms in front of the restaurant and a masonry wall at the side and rear.

The developers would remove an existing structure, owned by Diack Brown, to build the restaurant.

IN OTHER action, board members unanimously agreed to grant final preliminary plat approval to Tamarack Development Co. for development of Quail Hollow Subdivision, located east of McClumpha between Ann Arbor Road and Ann Arbor Trail, as recommended by the planning commission.

Board members unanimously agreed to table a request by Sharon A. Downes for final plat approval of Plymouth Meadows Subdivision, located north of Joy near the Centennial Educational Park site, because the planning commission has yet has not considered the matter.

Ms. Downes had requested placement of the platting matter on the agenda of Tuesday's board meeting, even though the planning commission was not scheduled to consider the issue until its Wednesday meeting.

Ms. Downes had requested action on the matter at the township board level, so she could begin selling lots in the development

and construction of homes could begin this year.

But board members denied Ms. Downes' request to avoid setting a precedent for other developers. Under the usual procedure for plat approvals, planning commission members submit their recommendations to the township board, before trustees take action.

Ms. Downes must now wait until the board's next meeting on Aug. 17 to conduct further work on her development.

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N'ville seeks police millage

Both Northville and Plymouth townships will have police millage issues on the Aug. 3 primary ballot.

Plymouth Township, as previously publicized, is seeking voter approval for two mills to organize the township's own police department of six full-time persons.

Northville Township residents are being asked to vote for a tax increase of 1½ mills (\$1.50 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) to support their police department.

Mrs. Betty Lennox, Northville Township supervisor, reports the 1977-78 budget for the police will be about \$87,000 which is \$49,000 less than the present allocation for police services. If voters approve the 1½ mills, the department would receive about \$125,000 which adds to the \$87,000 for a total police budget of \$212,000.

The millage, if approved, would allow the township to increase its police officers by four to a total of 10 officers. If the mil-

lage is defeated, adds Mrs. Lennox, it will mean a lay off of at least three police officers, elimination of the midnight shift and part of the afternoon shift plus the layoff of three dispatchers—closing the police station for 16 hours each day.

"The effect of a millage defeat would be far reaching and disastrous," says Northville Township Police Chief Ron Nisun. "I believe the majority of the township residents do not want such a drastic cut in police services and if properly informed will vote to increase their taxes by this small amount."

"The people of Detroit were upset and rightfully so when it was learned 20 per cent of their police department was to be laid off. Well, I believe the people of Northville Township will be even more upset to learn that we will be forced to lay off 50 per cent of our police officers and 75 per cent of our dispatchers."

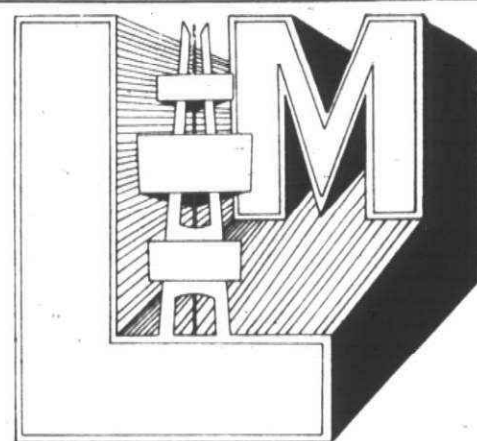

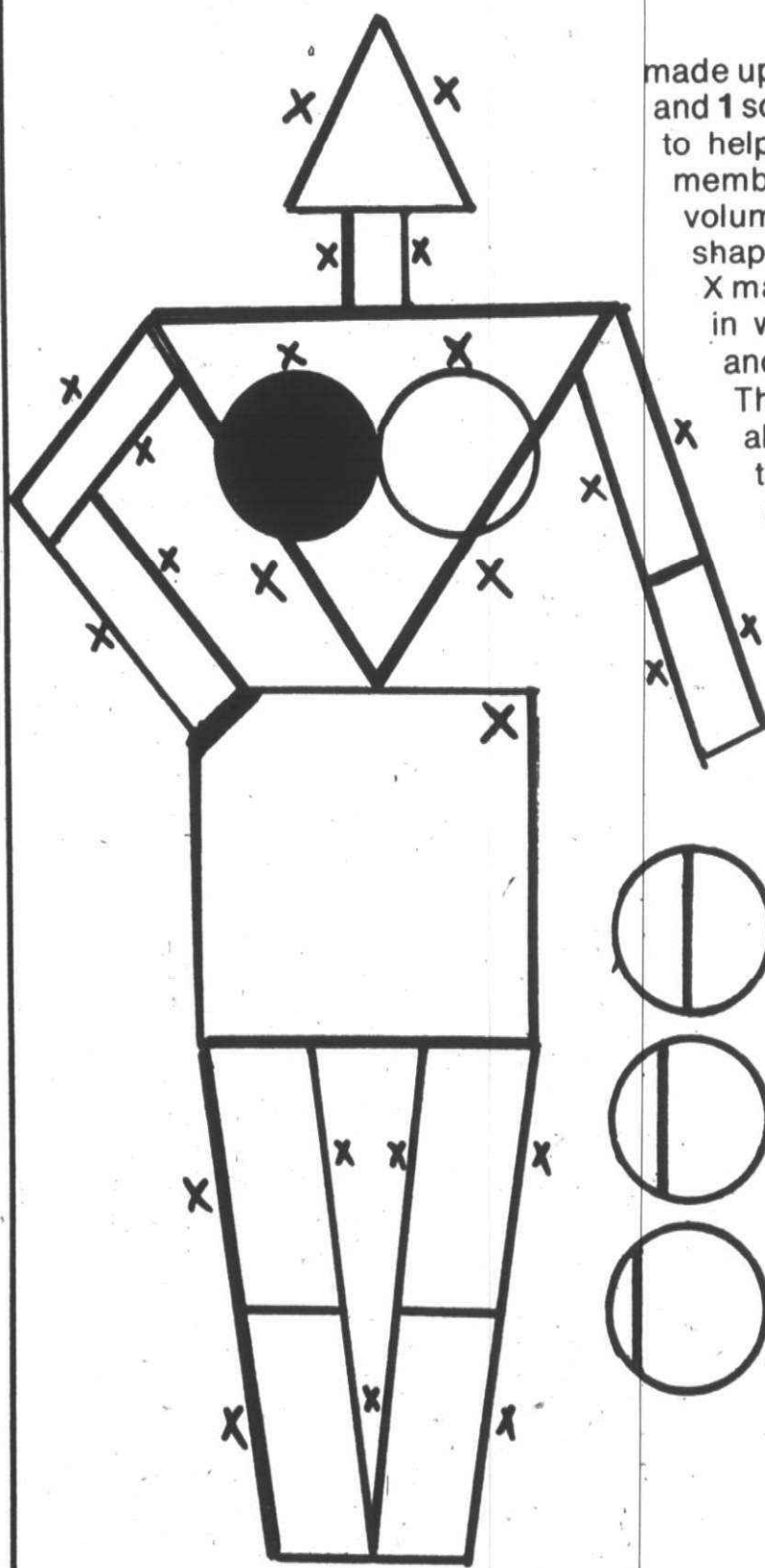

League provides Canton Voters Guide

The following Voters Guide information was prepared by the Plymouth, Northville, Canton, Novi League of Women Voters as a service for the Aug. 3 primary. Each candidate was given the opportunity to respond to the questions below, with the same word limit for answers designated for each.

The League of Women Voters is a national nonpartisan organization that encourages political responsibility through active and informed participation of citizens in government. The League does not support or oppose political parties or candidates.

SUPERVISOR

Peter Bruce Bundarin attended Cornell University in 1963 and Wayne State University Law School in 1974. He was a member of the Plymouth Optimist Club from 1967-70, was the chairman of the Plymouth Youth Inc. in 1970 for six months, belonged to the Michigan State Bar Association in 1974, and was the chairman for the Republican Independent Club.

Bundarin resided in New York state until June 1963. From there he joined the Ford Motor Co. and worked at the Wayne Assembly Plant, the Dearborn Assembly Plant, and the AADGO. Bundarin opened Canton's first law office.

Robert E. Greenstein "I believe two years as the supervisor of Canton, two years as a Canton judge, an AB and JD degree graduate from Wayne State, being the first president of the Northwest Canton Homeowners, and first president of the Federation of Canton Homeowners qualify me for the position of supervisor," stated Greenstein.

Harold Stein has worked for the Consulting Engineers in the cities of Livonia, Plymouth and Wayne. He has owned and operated a contracting company, and engaged in municipal, state and federal work. Stein was the chairman of collective bargaining and labor negotiations. He was educated in civil engineering and business. He has served in Jaycees, on the School Parent Advisory and as a United Foundation Chairman.

BUNDARIN "As an attorney in Canton

accurate record of township board meetings?

BUNDARIN "I unqualifiedly support the taping of township meetings."

GREENSTEIN "Township attorneys have strongly advised against taping or verbatim transcribing of meetings because of the certainty of lawsuits arising from the words spoken—even innocent words. We have two people taking and comparing notes to assure accuracy of the record without the dangers of expensive and dangerous litigation."

STEIN "The present administration seems to be operating without a written set of rules of order and did recently ban the taping of board meetings. Consequently, citizens have no means of holding government accountable for their actions. Meetings should be run by established rules and officially tape recorded."

Discuss the proposed land use plan, addressing yourself to the following areas: a) Senior citizen housing, b) Residential growth, c) Commercial and industrial development and d) Recreation land.

BUNDARIN "The proposed master land use plan is patently illegal because of its discriminatory application to classes of citizens and areas of the township."

(a) I support having a designated area in the township for a community of senior citizens housing and services.

(b) I support residential building permit limitation ordinance in the township that regulates growth to an average of 500 new residences annually over the next 10 years.

(c) I support greater commercial and industrial development within designated areas of the township to give the community more jobs, better services and a broader tax base.

(d) The Citizens Advisory Council should investigate this issue."

GREENSTEIN "The land use concept approved by the voters is the most revolutionary and progressive plan of its kind in the country answering the problems of the inner cities and the suburbs. It provides for senior citizen housing, regulated residential growth, ample commercial and industrial space, and marvelous recreation and open space. The plan provides for the retention of our agricultural lands, the

Township it was only natural that many individuals, associations and groups would seek my assistance and advice concerning their problems with the present township government. From this experience it became evident to me that the township citizens are extremely dissatisfied with the present administration."

GREENSTEIN "I am a candidate because I have spent almost two years of my life proving to the voters that an elected official can be honest, hardworking, and government can really accomplish great and innovative things with the proper leadership. We have compiled a great record. I want to finish the job."

STEIN "Government should represent all citizens. Yet (in Canton Township) the present administration is unaccountable, uninterested and blatantly discouraging to citizens input. What should be the duties of a reserve police officer? Do you see the need for a full-time police force now or in the near future?

BUNDARIN "Crowd maintenance; Traffic control; Checking homes of vacationing residences and checking business establishments after hours; plus assisting certified police officers. Until there is a court decision in regard to the township's suit over the Wayne County Sheriff's patrol, I prefer not to comment on an alternative approach."

GREENSTEIN "Reserve duties are to protect the life and property of the residents of Canton and to assist the regular police agencies. More police protection is needed now, but not by blindly obligating the people to another three mill tax to pay \$600,000 to the sheriff for two cars."

STEIN "Reserve police should act as ears and eyes to assist professional police. We, in Canton, do not need our own police force at this time. If it becomes necessary, we can contract for this service with the Wayne County Sheriff Dept."

STEIN "I feel the master land use plan in its present state will haunt the township citizens in years to come! It's inequitable, unfair and an injustice to the businessman and all taxpayers. Senior citizen housing should be seriously studied and planned for. Residential growth should be continued but at a regulated pace. Commercial and industrial development should be encouraged, in order to stabilize a solid tax base and lessen the tax burden on residents. The open space concept could be encouraged by the development of recreation land."

Patricia Dombecki was a Ford delegate representing Canton at the state Republican convention in Grand Rapids, June 1976, and precinct delegate from Canton. She is a member of the League of Women Voters. She has held various positions in business and education as a legal aid, 1975-76, secretary and clerk for Ford Motor Co., nine years; Household Finance, two years; Redford Union High School, one year; Lola Valley Methodist, two years; and secretary for the Republican Independent.

John W. Flodin has lived in Canton Township most of his life. After attending Wayne Community Schools, the University of Detroit and Michigan State University, he became Canton Township's first full-time employee as building inspector in 1963 and held other related duties until he became the clerk of Canton Township in 1966, a position he now holds.

Why are you a candidate?

DOMBECKI "Because of my strong concern and support for a balanced physical growth between the areas of housing, schools, fire and police protection, roads, sidewalks, and parks. I also wish to maintain good farm land zoned as agricultural, establish senior citizen housing, publicize regulations on budget control."

FLODIN "I am presently the clerk of

Canton Township, and seek re-election to the office. I believe I am capable and qualified to perform the duties of the clerk."

What should be the duties of a police reserve officer? Do you see the need for a full-time police force now or in the near future?

DOMBECKI "If the lawsuit should go against us, a commission should be appointed by the township board to study all the alternatives available to provide police protection, taking into consideration costs needs and the like."

FLODIN "The duties should be to aid and assist the Wayne County Sheriff and the state police in the performance of police functions. The presence of additional police vehicles on the streets of the township should prove a deterrent to crime. I do not believe Canton Township needs a full-time police force."

What are your suggestions for keeping an accurate record of township board meetings?

DOMBECKI "I support taping of township board meetings in a free and open atmosphere."

FLODIN "The present system of keeping minutes provides an accurate record of the board's proceedings. If an error is found in the board proceedings, it can be corrected at time of approval by the township board. The present system was in use when I took office, and has worked well through the years."

Discuss the proposed land use plan, addressing yourself to the following areas: a) Senior citizen housing, b) Residential growth, c) Commercial and industrial development and d) Recreation land.

DOMBECKI "a) Provisions should be made for a designated area for senior citizens, including housing to meet all incomes, services needed and recreational facilities."

b) Neither our township nor our schools can absorb our rate of growth without tremendous impact on our tax structure. We should limit our growth as in the Petaluma plan in California.

c) We should invite commercial and industrial development along our expressways and other designated areas to give us a strong tax base.

d) We need an investigation as to the needs of recreation facilities and as to what areas are to be developed for parks, sports etc."

FLODIN "The land use plan should provide for all life styles. Housing for senior citizens should have top priority. A census taken in 1975 indicated fewer citizens than was expected. Steps should be taken to provide senior citizen housing in 5 to 7 years. It would be nice to legislate growth in Canton, but who would make the decision on who should be allowed to live here? Commercial development is showing nice growth in Canton, and there is every indication it will continue to grow. With completion of I-275, there will be an acceleration of industrial growth. Recreation land should be acquired as we can afford it."

TREASURER

Bart J. Berg, is owner and operator of his own business and past president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce. He also is a charter member of the Canton Planning Commission. A resident of Canton Township since 1945, Berg attended high school in Menominee, and college at Ferris and Wayne State Universities.

Anne Bradley, a resident of Canton Township for 30 years, is presently the treasurer and office manager of B&K Sales. She also was the acting supervisor of the cashier's department and executive secretary at Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. She is a member of the United Foundation, Goodfellows, and the Women's Club for the Handicapped. She attended the School of Business and the School of Business Machines.

Carl Parsell, a retired Detroit police officer, past-president of the Detroit Police Officers Association, past-president of the International Conference of Police Associations, is presently the Executive Director of the Detroit Police Officers Association of Michigan. He has served on a sub-committee of New Detroit, Mayor Gribb's committee for Neighborhood Preservation, a member of the Catholic Church Council and past-president of Windsor Park Civic Association. The incumbent treasurer attended Wayne State University.

Why are you a candidate?

BERG "Because of common sense, and reasonableness. Fairness and understanding does not prevail with the present board power group. The business community and the rural area of Canton Township has no representation on the board and I feel that these very important areas should have a voice in formulating the destiny of Canton Township."

BRADLEY "Our present administration is not representing all the taxpayers in our township. I know I would do a much better job than our current treasurer."

PARSELL "As township treasurer, I have kept the promises made two years ago on which basis the voters elected me to office. I now want to bring to fruition the plans and ideas I instigated or have been part of. My accomplishment record supports why I should be re-elected."



HAROLD STEIN

What should be the duties of a reserve police officer? Do you see the need for a full-time police force now or in the near future?

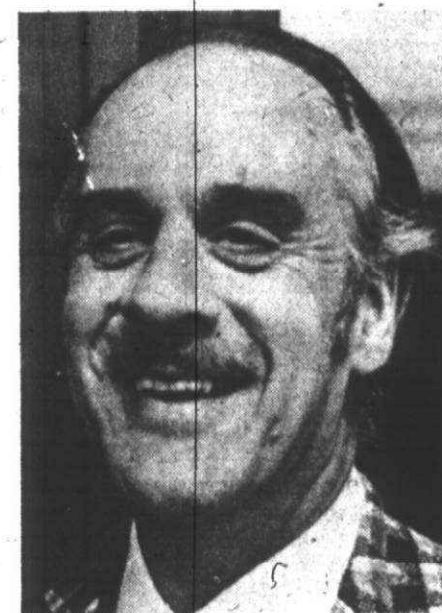
BERG "If we must have reserve police officers, their duties should be confined to crowd and disaster control. The township is premature in establishing a police force. Now with the inadequately trained officers who are armed, it is not my fear that they do not know how to use a firearm, but rather they do not know when not to use it."

BRADLEY "Assisting Wayne County Sheriff's patrol and the state police for crowd and traffic control (the duties of a reserve officer). I feel our current police protection is sufficient for now. Establish a police force when the population is much greater than it is."

PARSELL "Full-time police department is not a question to answer, but a question to be studied long and hard. The past state police commissioner recommended a department for Plymouth Township, Romulus, which is smaller than Canton, contracted \$1,200,000 for four sheriff's cars. Until the court case is settled, we will use the reserves. Note, Canton's entire budget is \$1,400,000."

What are your suggestions for keeping an accurate record of township board meetings?

BERG "I believe that the clerk should have at his or her disposal any aid that is necessary to keep accurate records. This could be a tape recorder, staff shorthand expert or dictaphone. Every elected official should be accountable for his or her vocal official statements."

BRADLEY "Taping of board meetings should be mandatory, this is the only way there can be an accurate accounting of board meetings."

PARSELL "Our attorneys warned that a growing community will spend much time pressuring builders and developers, but don't do it on tape. Why spend money for legal advice and ignore it? Would you go to a doctor and not take the medicine? No one has challenged our present record keeping."

Discuss the proposed land use plan, addressing yourself to the following areas: a) Senior citizen housing, b) Residential growth, c) Commercial and industrial development and d) Recreation land.

BERG "Development of senior citizen housing should be evaluated and studied. An effort should be made to keep senior citizens in natural surroundings. Transplanting them to towering apartments and unfamiliar surroundings is a disservice. Residential control will taper off and control will be governed by availability of sanitation facilities. Growth control legislation is beginning to appear in other areas. If the need arises established controls can be investigated. Commercial and industrial development has been curtailed in Canton Township. A complete review of present policies should be undertaken and immediate action taken to employ an expert in this field."

BRADLEY "a) Senior citizen housing should be planned and provided for in the very near future."

b) Residential growth should be spread out through the whole township."

c) Commercial and industrial development should be encouraged in our township to bring in tax dollars and help take the burden off the homeowner."

d) Recreation should be developed for

the taxpayer on the east as well as on the west side of the township."

PARSELL "Past plan provided for 200,000 people, border to border. Over 40 per cent was multiple housing and absolutely no agricultural or open space. We eliminated new multiples, cut the entire population in half and provided over 40 per cent open or farm land yet, applied zoning as Supreme Court has set precedent. We have provided space for all residential zones. Canton's entire maximum population will be 100,000 which will take many years, if ever. Commercial land has been incorrectly placed by past boards giving the misconception of too much—we need more! We need more recreation and it will never be cheaper than today."

TRUSTEES

Noel Douglas Culbert, a lawyer, has been in private practice since 1974. He is a former stockbroker and is on the board of directors and treasurer of Community Alternatives Co. He attended Michigan Tech and the University of Detroit Law School.

Eugene Daley, a Canton Township resident for the past 25 years, was a county employee for 28 years. He also has 12 years investigative experience with the Wayne County Sheriff's Dept. Daley is a past member of the VFW, Plymouth PTA, Asst. Scoutmaster, Goodfellows and was the past-president of the Metropolitan Club-Spirit 88.

C. Lyane Goldsmith, is a member of the League of Women Voters. She has actively participated on the following LWV committees: Environmental Quality, Committee to Study Canton Land Use and was a past board member. She was chairperson Carriage Hills Homeowners Association, member of the Environmental Awareness Committee and past member of the committee to draft organization for the Canton Citizens Advisory Council. She attended Sacramento State College in California.

George D. Hall, is presently an industrial engineer with Ford Motor Co. and treasurer of the Republican Independents Club. He attended Northwestern University after being in the Marine Corps from 1956-59.

James L. Poole, a trustee since 1972, has been the township representative to SEMTA and SEMCOG. A retired USAF major, he graduated from the University of Southern Mississippi with a BS in political science. He is also a member of the Plymouth Elks 1780, and Schoolcraft F&AM 519.

Joyce E. Willis is currently the asst. manager of the Wayne Bank at Ford and Haggerty. She is a member of the League of Women Voters, past secretary of the Miller School PTO, past member of the Canton Newcomers and is currently serving on the Canton Township Board of Zoning Appeals. She attended Northern Colorado University receiving an BA in education.

Gerald (Jerry) Cheske, an incumbent, was named outstanding young man of the year in 1976 by the Jaycees. Co-founder of the Windsor Park Civic Association, he is also a member of the Canton Democratic Club, the Canton Homeowners Association, Area Inter-Governmental Committee and Chairman of the Canton Civil Defense League.

The Stroller... On checkers champ

It long has been said of the newspaper business that persons engaged in the field of journalism meet such interesting people, are admitted to the top social events, and the major competitions in the sports world.

It was during a discussion of this phase of newspapering that one of the listeners turned to The Stroller and asked: "You have been around for a long time, walking with the kings and queens of sport and the leading personalities in the various communities. Who was the most fascinating character you ever have met?"

That was quite a question and it set The Stroller to allowing his memory to take him back through the years and then choose the most fascinating.

THERE WERE MANY who were interesting. The late F.J. Navin, owner of the Tigers, was an interesting character. So was Johnny Smith, who rose from the role of Detroit post master to the mayor's chair.

And one of the most exciting was Al Cobo, the late mayor for whom Cobo Hall is named.

There were hosts of others. For instance Joe Louis, who rose from the task of "hustling" axes at the Ford Motor Co. to then heavyweight boxing throne. And Gar Wood was another exciting acquaintance as he was a mechanical genius and one never knew what to expect from him.

In football, there never was a nicer and more capable coach than the late Gus Dorais at the University of Detroit and one of the most fascinating was "Dad" Butler, the trainer who was "Dad" to all who knew him.

All these fellows passed in review—Mickey Cochrane, one of the keenest competitors of all time—and lately "The Bird" who seems to have the baseball world in his hands.

AFTER THEY ALL passed, though, The Stroller had to select a gray-haired chap who stepped into the sports department one night seeking publicity for an upcoming checker exhibition.

"I am Newell Banks, the world champion," he said, "and I am going to play 16 fellows while blindfolded. No other checker player ever has attempted that."

He was so serious, but his words almost fell on deaf ears. For if there was one thing about which the world wasn't excited at the moment, it was checkers.

Finally he said, "I've got to get home, I'm in training for the match."

Training for a checker match. That was fascinating. How does one train?

"Well, I walk about 10 miles a day," Newell answered. "Then I read a lot to keep my eyes at their peak. I watch my food, and get eight hours sleep each night. At other times I just sit and concentrate."

"You might snicker at this," he added, "but during the two days before a match, I eat mostly green onions. They're the best thing you get for your eyes."

This was just enough to have The Strol-

ler go to the downtown hotel to watch the exhibition.

In one of the ballrooms they had 16 tables set up with a checker board on each one. Newell was in an adjoining room.

"I'm not going to be blindfolded," he said, "I am going to stay in this room until all my opponents make their moves. That's even better."

After the match started, at a given signal, Newell would walk along the line of tables and make his moves. The Stroller walked along marvelling at his concentration and wondering how the champion could keep the mental picture of each board.

FOR A SHORT TIME The Stroller, always skeptical, figured the match might be faked and that all parties knew just what moves to make.

This skepticism faded when we walked along the line, after about the sixth move. As Newell stopped at one of the boards, he stared at the checkers, rubbed his chin, then said to his opponent: "You've been trying to cheat. You made two moves, which one do you want to keep?"

The opponent blushed, admitted his guilt, and left the board.

The Stroller has been around quite a bit, but this was one of the most fascinating characters he ever had seen at work. Imagine keeping a mental picture of 16 checker boards—and detecting an illegal move.

That always will be tops—and Newell, now past 80, is still championing the cause of checkers.

Sewer drain covers hazard to bicycles

"Reach for your bike instead of your car keys."

That's the motto of an unusual cyclist the Free Wheeler chanced upon the other day.

For those of you who might not know Joe Williams, he's a 75-year-old bicycle enthusiast from Birmingham whose been actively involved in cycling for years. And ever since he climbed onto his bike for the first time, he's been promoting bike safety.

Joe's responsible for several major safety innovations around the state and has even gone as far as Washington to propose safer riding procedures.

In 1972, when the state revised its driver's manual, Joe practically wrote the entire chapter on bike laws and procedures to inform motorists of what's proper out on the road.

He also managed to have the state highway department change its sewer and drain covers to the now standard, three crossbar type. Prior to Joe's crusade to rid the roads of this potential bicycle safety hazard, the highway department was using covers that looked like parrell wanes.

IF A RIDER drove over this sewer cover, his tire was sure to fall between the cover's sections, causing the bike to suddenly stop and toss the rider into the path of traffic.

He's also been working for federal bicycle legislation and other local and state

ordinances which make riding safer for all.

Besides his push for safer streets, Williams manages to pedal his bike more than 100 miles per week. He owns a 1969 model car that has recorded about 21,000 miles.

That's almost the same amount of miles Joe has racked up in his years of free-wheeling by himself, with American Youth Hostel and other Oakland and regional riding clubs.

But Joe prefers to ride alone, saying it gives him a chance to think about life and what he can do to improve the streets and roads for his fellow cyclists.

"The roadway is for all the people," Joe explains while trying to vent his frustrations about motorists who think the streets belong only to cars.

"What most motorists don't know is that the law gives the bicyclist the same rights on the road as a car," he continues. "It's a never ending problem of trying to develop this idea in the motorists' mind. Traffic on the roadway isn't just the motor vehicle, it's the bike, too."

Along with his desire to improve these conditions, he also has several gripes about those with whom he shares the road.

SOMETIMES IT'S JUST not safe on the road because drivers don't know how to react to bicyclists riding in the street," he says. "It's a constant problem of education, both for the motorist and the rider."

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Con artist exterminators worse pests than termites

Which of these cause the most damage to homes: hurricanes, tornadoes, or windstorms? Actually the answer is none of these. The most home destruction, to the tune of \$500 million worth of property a year, is caused by the tiny termite.

According to the Better Business Bureau, the termite is the costliest household pest. It is one of the few animals which use the cellulose found in wood for food. Termites will also munch their way through books, papers and clothing—anything with cellulose.

There are four types of termites. Dry-wood and dampwood termites are found mostly in southern areas, along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Formosan termites,

the most aggressive type, are a threat mainly in Hawaii, but have also been discovered along the Gulf Coast. Subterranean termites are native to practically every region of the country.

Accounting for about 95 per cent of termite damage nationally, according to National Pest Control Association (NPCA) estimates, the subterranean termite rarely appears above ground, but can easily wind its way through a house by a series of mud tunnels.

Although a single termite is nearly invisible to the human eye, they sometimes can be detected in swarms. It is important to learn the difference, however, between swarms of termites and flying ants. If you

get close enough to see, you will notice termites have thick waists while ants' waists are pinched.

IT IS A MISTAKE, though, to wait for swarms to tell you there are termites. These greedy creatures could have quietly dined on all of Shakespeare's tragedies before being discovered. For this reason, it is a good idea to have a thorough inspection by a termite control company.

Choose a company carefully, for a disreputable firm can eat up money faster than the termites can eat up a house. Ask friends and neighbors to recommend a company or write to the NPCA, 8150 Leesburg Pike, Suite 1100, Vienna, Va. 22180, for names of NPCA members in your area. The NPCA is an organization which helps members enforce safe and effective industry practices. Check with the Better Business Bureau to see if complaints have been filed against the company and how they were resolved.

A reputable business will have an established address. Beware of the itinerant stranger who volunteers a free home inspection. Warning the owner that the house is near collapse, the "inspector" may offer to save the house from ruin for "only the price of the number of gallons of poison to be used."

A pest control expert, however, will tell you the type of termite, extent of infestation and the steps necessary to combat them. Different types of termites require different treatment. For example, drywood termites should be fumigated, while for subterranean termites, the area adjacent to the foundation should be drilled and the poison pumped in.

GET SEVERAL estimates. Be suspicious of both too-high and too-low estimates; the work may not be correct for the type of termite and extent of damage. After deciding on a company, make sure you completely understand the contract. It should cover the exact type of work to be done, how long the treatment will take, the type of pesticides used and the price. If a warranty is provided, be sure to read it and keep a copy.

After one such treatment, carry through on annual inspections. Particularly when buying a home, be sure the house has been certified as free of termites. Indeed, some real estate, county or other local regulations require that a house be certified as free of termites.

Federal laws to take effect in late 1977 will require that pest control supervisory personnel be state-certified, according to Environmental Protection Agency standards. Many state and local authorities already require certification. More extensive exams and regulation of pest control companies will probably discourage con artists.

Some pest control associations have local grievance committees which encourage calls from consumers. Public comments can encourage high standards within this industry. And consumer knowledge can prevent homes from turning into mess halls for troops of hungry termites.

Local groups aid Indians

Indians in two parts of the state received aid recently from the Western Wayne County Conservation Association.

The Indian Mission School at Harbor Springs received 100 boxes of clothing and 800 cans of food. A church, whose members asked to remain anonymous, and the owner of a truck collected the gifts and made the delivery.

Club member Ed Baker hauled a load of toys and clothing to Indians at St. Catherine Catholic parish near L'Anse, according to Hank Chruscial, chairman of the club's Indian affairs committee.

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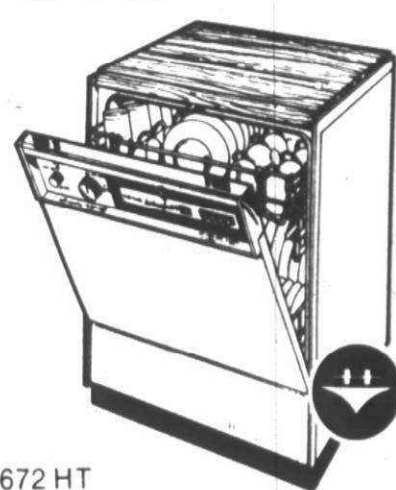
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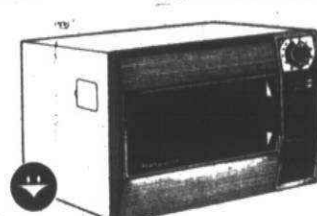
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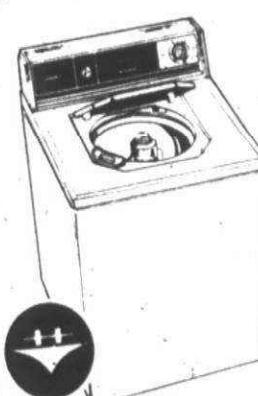

Why are you a candidate?

CULBERT "I feel that Canton Township is being mismanaged. I think there is a political machine here which cares less about citizens' rights, uses its power to discourage business from coming here, and harasses its enemies. The administration has repeatedly lied to the people and given us 'half truths'."

DALEY "I oppose division of the township as planned by the present administration. No present effort is being made to attract an industrial tax base. I do not like

the present administration's fiscal policies, employment practices, and the method of conducting township business. I also question the legality of several things done by the present administration."

GOLDSMITH "I believe a township board should be composed of independent members, voting their individual conscience. Key issues should not be decided by a 'team' of the same people always voting together. I will offer that independence, as well as time and desire to do the job properly."

HALL "Canton is a growing community. I want Canton to become a healthy, economically stable township and feel the only way possible is through a governing body that is responsive to its citizens needs and desires. I want to be part of this type of administration."

WILLIS "Having acquired substantial knowledge of Canton through a position with the chamber of commerce, demonstrated sincere interest in township government through regular attendance at board meetings, proven ability to make fair, impartial decisions as member of ZBA, I have developed a strong desire to become active in the decision-making process of township government."

POOLE "Why candidate? I need the aggravation. Why does a dentist pull teeth? Because of his training! Spent 19 years getting my degree and 25 in personnel and administration. Received my degree at age 36. I don't like a 'closed shop' or private dynasty in local politics so I ran and was elected."

CHESKE "I have been dedicated and willing worker during my two years as trustee. I helped negotiate the Mocer settlement, brought improved street lighting to Holiday Park and have taken countless assignments, including efforts to bring a hunting ban to northwest Canton Township. I will continue this dedication through a second term."

What should be the duties of a reserve police officer? Do you see the need for a full-time police force now or in the near future?

CULBERT "Duties should be auxiliary only and should be used only to supplement regular officers where the crowds are too large to handle, a good example being parades. There is no immediate need for a full-time force because of the little crime in Canton. Within several years, we will need a small police force."

DALEY "Reserve police officers should only be used when under the supervision of a regular police officer. I do not feel that Canton needs a full-time police force at this time, but may in the future. All options of full-time protection should be explored and selected upon least cost to the taxpayer."

GOLDSMITH "Reserves should perform only 'specific' police duties, as originally stated in the ordinance. Reserve's training is not intended to prepare officers for full police duties. I support disarming the reserves, and evaluating the need, cost and options of additional police protection or the possibility of a full-time police force."

HALL "Crowd and traffic control at township functions and to act as aides to

police officials. An investigative committee should be formed to look into the possibility of a safety district with Canton, Plymouth and Plymouth Township forming a single police force in the near future."

WILLIS "Because current police protection in Canton is inadequate to meet the needs of the citizens, duties of reserve officers will be to provide additional patrol and protection to the homes and residents of Canton. There is need for a full-time police protection in any community; reserve force offers immediate service when unable to fund police force."

POOLE "Duties reserve? To back up and augment regular officers. No need for full-time force now. May in the future. Refer to tape of meeting May 14. I suggested possibility of joining Plymouth and Plymouth Township for joint force. People are being set up for full-time force and more millage."

CHESKE "A Canton reserve officer will assist and back up regular police forces. Reserves will provide the visible means necessary to help reduce crime at the lowest possible costs to the residents. Since Canton can level only five mills, the citizens will decide whether a full-time force is needed by approving additional millage."

What are your suggestions for keeping an accurate record of township board meetings?

CULBERT "Board meetings must be taped or stenographically recorded. There is no other way. The record is replete with cases where some trustees claim the minutes are wrong of their vote was recorded wrong. The fact that the majority does not want recording shows something is amiss."

DALEY "Township should adopt rules of order for conducting meetings and all meetings should be taped for maintaining an accurate record of proceedings."

GOLDSMITH "According to the MANUAL FOR TOWNSHIP GOVERNMENT, '...another aid to good meetings is the use of electronic equipment such as a tape recorder...' Taping would serve to provide a more accurate record of meetings, as well as holding elected officials accountable for their actions."

HALL "Taping of meetings with a qualified attendant."

WILLIS "Keeping accurate records, not only of Township Board meetings, but of all official Township business, is the responsibility of the Township Clerk. As an elected official serving in this administrative capacity, he is accountable for keeping accurate minutes and responsibly recording the business of the Township."

POOLE "Record of Board Meetings. You promise not to call the Sheriff? Tapes, tapes, tapes. Only those who have something to hide or fear confession for their remarks object to tapes. The citizens have the right to accurate minutes. Our attorneys opinion did not prohibit taping. It was weasel worded."

CHESKE "The minutes as presently recorded by the township clerk."

CULBERT "In general, I think this Plan should be re-studied. There are no plan for development of senior citizen housing. We need this to provide a balanced community. We need it also because, as low-income housing, it qualifies for federal Community Development Act funds, which we could get. Also, senior citizens don't have school-age children and this would reduce the need for additional schools."

"For the sake of brevity, I refer interested readers to my Letter to the Editor in the Canton Eagle, July 15, for a thorough discussion of my views on the proposed Master Plan."

DALEY "(a) Planning should start now for Senior Citizens housing because there will be a need within the next ten years. (b) Explore the methods of controlling residential growth but do not feel it should be confined to just the east half of the Township. All attractive rolling land homesites are in the west half. (c) Current term and sign requirements are stopping commercial growth. Review of these are necessary. Industrial development is a must for tax tend facilities to industrial development sites. Explore tax break incentives. Industry also means jobs. (d) Recreational land should be preserved where economically feasible to large segment of community."

GOLDSMITH "(a) Provisions for Senior Citizen Housing are nonexistent. Special zoning category should be established to encourage and provide such housing near services. (b) The east is already saturated with high density housing. There are areas west of Canton Center where some growth could be directed, thus relieving congestion in the east, as well as saving actively farmed agricultural land (c) There should be a Development and Industrial Coordinator to coordinate development taking place, and to encourage new industry that would provide needed tax base. (d) The plan gives low priority to recreation land. Unique opportunities exist for park lands along the Rouge River."

HALL "The proposed Land Use Plan is arbitrary in its application. I would prefer a method regulating building permits issued per year, throughout the township, to control residential growth. A designated area should be set aside in the township

for senior citizens housing. An atmosphere welcoming commercial and industrial growth needs to be created, not an acceptance of commercial development as a necessary evil to be regulated to keep it from tainting the community. Recreation land should be set aside in areas accessible to the citizens. Not one big park, but, mini-parks throughout the township."

WILLIS "Development in Canton Township has required strong land use measures be adopted to control the rapid growth. Addressing itself to land uses and densities the master plan sufficiently accommodates the residential, commercial, and industrial needs of this community for many years to come, while at the same time controlling development in the western half of the Township, eliminating future haphazard planning and over-population. Although it is not the purpose of a land use plan to address itself to senior citizen housing or recreation, the plan does recognize those needs. Under separate studies the township will determine criteria for senior citizen housing and recreational development."

POOLE "Land use plan? Need a modified master plan. Canton citizens have heard too many untruths, half truths and have been used in regard to master plan, i.e. 'There will be no cost to the citizens of Canton. There will be no reimbursement to the land owners.' (March 1, 1976) 'We will get federal funds' etc. People approved a concept of 100,000 but credited with approving the master plan. Could cost \$15-30 million or \$500-\$1,000 per person. Implementation will be avoided prior to election because backers fear adverse publicity."

Should be provision for all citizens -100,000 east of Canton Center?"

CHESKE "The land use plan will bring Democratic controlled growth and drastically reduce Canton's projected population from earlier estimates of 200,000 to 100,000. Residential growth will be cut in half, which means 15,000 fewer school children and significantly reduced new services. Commercial and industrial development are included to meet citizen needs and provide a stable, healthy tax structure for business and residents alike. Recreation land would be a prime consideration. Senior Citizens housing is not part of a land use plan, but will be a significant part of future housing needs."

"The plan has already been approved by the planning commission. It's up to us to make a zoning ordinance to implement the plan."

"It's up to us to preserve that land," Ms. Willis added. "The current administration has had no control over growth in the eastern half of the township. We can have control over the western half."

OTHER CANDIDATES criticized the township board's establishment of a reserve police force.

"I have nothing against reserve police," said Daley, "but how can you have reserve police without a police force?"

If Canton and other townships in Wayne County lose a lawsuit with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, Culbert favors establishment of a professional police force in Canton.

"I don't want a kid walking around like Starsky and Hutch on a reserve force with a gun," said Culbert. "A kid could get emotional and shoot someone."

Ms. Goldsmith said she did not question the integrity of residents on the reserve force, but questioned why a reserve force was implemented.

Other candidates criticized the political bickering that often interferes with town-

ship board proceedings. They maintained there is a need to tape record and take accurate records of board meetings.

"A lot of people say going to a trustees' meeting beats going to the show," said Hall. "It says to me it's a government of dictatorship. I want to be a cooperative member of an administration that's willing to cooperate with me."

Ms. Goldsmith spoke against "team voting" on the township board.

"I believe key township issues shouldn't be decided by a team. The township board needs the incentive of an independent member."

"Township board meetings must be shortened, rules of order must be established, enough time for investigation must be provided to board members, and citizens should be considered by the board as informational resources," she said.

But Ms. Willis, a member of the Greenstein slate, says "cooperation" is needed on the board.

"My best qualification is an ability to work well with people," the candidate told residents at Wednesday's meeting. "My experience on the zoning board of appeals proves my ability to make clear and independent judgments."

"I firmly believe the future of Canton depends on a board of trustees that can set aside its conflicts and look out for the good of the people. I intend to make independent judgments. But, above all, I intend to work with the rest of the board. The time for petty politics is past," Ms. Dornbecki, candidate for clerk on the Republican ticket, favors "taping of township meetings in a free and open atmosphere."

INCUMBENT CANDIDATES seeking reelection to the township board pointed to their past records as township officials.

"I'm John Flodin," said the man who has been Canton's clerk for the past 20 years. "I'm proud of what's happened here. I think I have some experience and know things about Canton many people don't."

Said Cheske, "Two years ago, a group of concerned citizens came forward to save our township. I stand here with the achievements of the board, and I want to continue my contributions to this community."

Parsell, incumbent treasurer, also pointed to the board's accomplishments and fulfilled campaign promises.

"We know what our opponents are against, but we don't know what they're for," he said. "The issue is what's going to affect the homeowner, if our opponents get their way. I am with the Greenstein slate, and I'm proud of it."

School board might shuffle administration

Reassignment of administrative staff and a decision on how much millage to ask for Sept. 2 are among the major items to be taken up at tonight's meeting of the Plymouth Board of Education.

The school board will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High School. Also to be discussed will be the possible need to change starting times for school because of financial difficulties.

THE ADMINISTRATION will recommend that high school hours be from 8 a.m. to 1:50 p.m., middle school from 9:25 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., and elementary school from 8:40 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

If there is a "yes" vote on the millage

Sept. 2, the administration's intent is to revert to school hours in effect during this year: 7:30 a.m. to 2:20 p.m. at the high schools, 8 a.m. to 2:50 p.m. for middle schools, and 8:45 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the elementary.

The school board will be asked to approve the transfer of the principal of Tanger Elementary to principal of Farrand Elementary, and to approve the transfer of Lake Pointe pupils now attending Tanger to Farrand to "alleviate the potential problem of no crossing guard and to effect a proportionate balance between the schools with the limitation of staff that will be necessary to operate under a restricted budget."

Auto dealers wait out delay in new repair law

The new car auto dealers in the Plymouth community are in another period of watchful waiting.

They've grown accustomed to waiting for new models that go on display each fall. And every few years they keep their ear close to the ground, waiting the outcome of labor negotiations with the United Auto Workers and the Big Three—GM, Ford and Chrysler.

They have good reason to wait patiently, for the price of the new cars will depend to a great extent on the new contract terms when labor and management finally agree.

THIS YEAR, though, they have an extra period of watchful waiting, and it concerns the enactment of the Motor Vehicle Repair Facility Registration.

Under the terms of this law, all repair shops must be certified and the mechanics have the option of being licensed.

The bill was passed some time ago, but it was challenged immediately by the independent gas stations who succeeded in ob-

taining an injunction. The bill now is on the shelf for the time being.

"It will be a fine thing when the injunction is settled," Jack Selle, the Buick dealer confided. "I am all for the law. In fact our shop is licensed and all the mechanics have passed the state tests. And it will be fine to work under the terms.

"Of course," Selle commented, "it will require a great deal more paper work. But it will be worth it inasmuch as we will have more satisfied customers."

The American Motors, where Bob Cann is the service manager, has had the terms of the law in effect even before the state legislature approved it.

"Our company found that it worked so well out on the coast," he said, "that we are asked to put it in effect here last November. As a matter of fact, we had all the kinks worked out of it when the Michigan law was passed."

Cann was quick to point out the licensing of mechanics and furnishing estimates of the work to be done has proven one of the best of public relations activities.

"This law helps to avoid hassles with the customers who sometimes think they have been overcharged for repairs," he emphasized.

"No longer will we hear customers say 'I didn't think my bill would be that high.'"

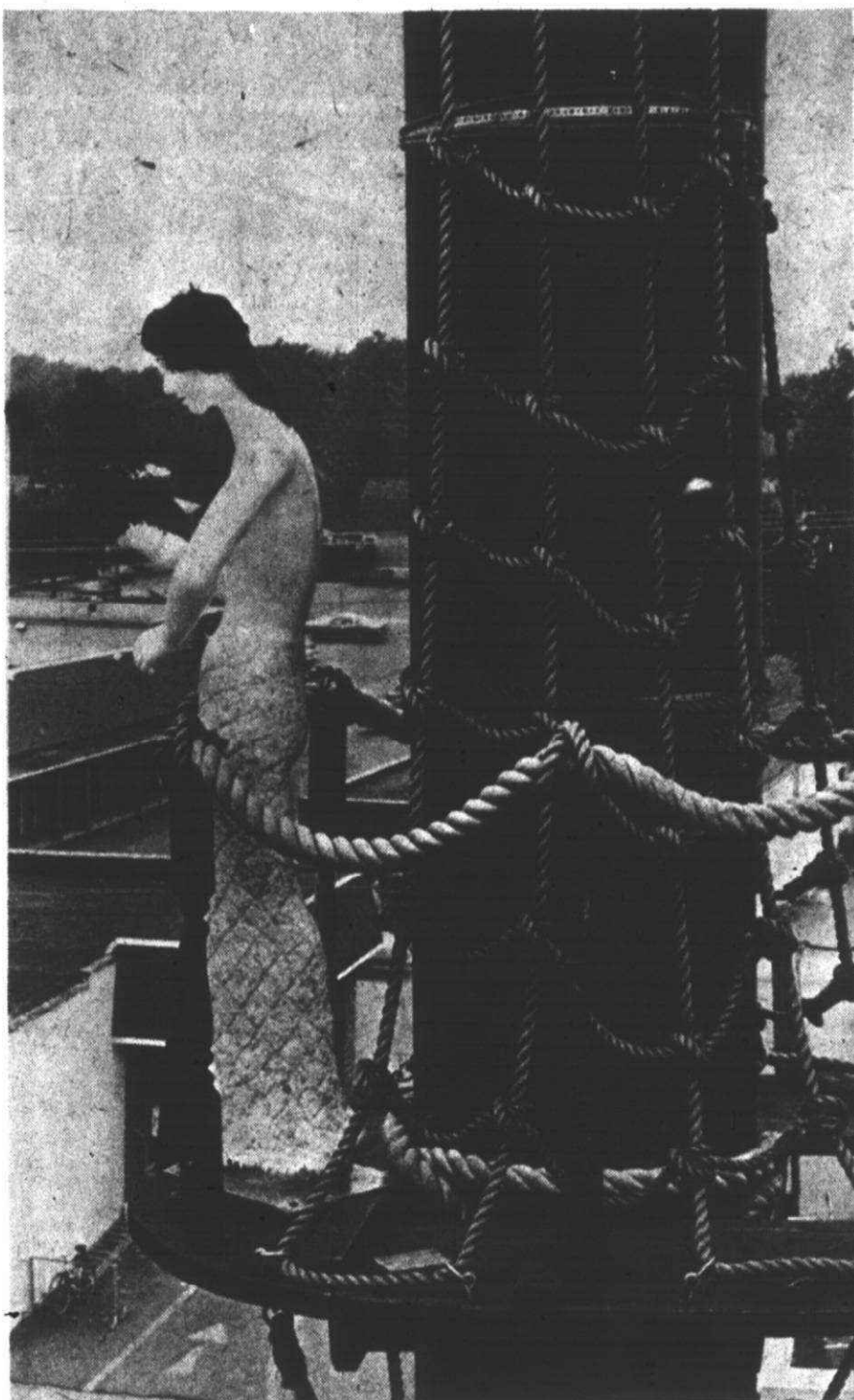
"Even in cases where the customer doesn't want an estimate and just asks to have the work done, regardless of cost, we tell him that we prefer to give him an estimate. That way there is no chance of a hassle."

ANOTHER DEALER who feels the same way is Lou LaRiche, who has the Chevrolet outlet on Plymouth Road.

"It will be a pleasure to do business under the terms of the law," he stated, "and the sooner the matter is taken out of limbo because of the injunction, the better off we dealers will be."

LaRiche, speaking in behalf of the bill, pointed to the fact that not many of the independent shops have the necessary tools or parts to do a complete job—and that's where the difference comes in—the dealers have the tools and the parts and all licensed mechanics.

Among the other dealers, Leo Calhoun was certain that the law, when put into effect, would be a boon and end a lot of hassles and eliminate a lot of dissatisfied customers.

Comfortable comraderie

If you're a single parent in need of a friend, Parents Without Partners is ready to lend a helping hand.

Each year divorce or widowhood cuts thousands of local people loose, to cope with the emotional and financial upheaval as they attempt to adjust to their new, single state.

Parents Without Partners addresses itself to the particular needs of the single parent. The only requirement for membership is to be a single parent with at least one living child.

A major problem of the newly-single person is making new friends. Divorced and widowed people often discover the no longer have anything in common with their married friends, that they don't "fit in" with married couples.

CHARLIE WHITESIDE, 33, of the Wayne-Westland area, was divorced recently after 11 years of marriage. He had been active in church activities while married, but as a divorced man church no longer satisfied his social needs. Few single people belonged to his church.

He was bored and restless, and he liked being with people. "At first I went to bars but didn't like that because everybody plays games."

He found the comfortable camaraderie he was seeking by joining Parents Without Partners.

Donna Bolton of Westland, was widowed seven-and-a-half years ago with six children. Since her friends and neighbors were married, she soon felt a gap in her life.

"I wanted to meet other single people, and I met them at PWP," she said.

Joyce Katke of Plymouth, who was divorced three years ago after 20 years of marriage, felt lonely and unsure of herself.

"I didn't know there were other people in the same boat," she said. The friends she has made through PWP share a common bond in being a single parent.

MOST AREA communities have PWP chapters, with general meetings, discussion groups, parties, dances and outings to keep its members busy. Often social events attract members from all over the area.

According to Mrs. Katke, a member of the Northville-Novl chapter, members could take part in PWP functions every day of the week of they wanted.

Whiteside, who is active in the Wayne-Westland chapter, finds the planned family activities — the picnics, Bob-Lo trips and parties — "give me something to do with my two children."

Recently the Northville-Novl chapter sponsored a bus trip to Pennsylvania. Some 44 people from several PWP chapters took the excursion to ride rubber rafts down a river.

"I'm sore from head to toe," laughed

Mrs. Katke, recalling how she fell into the water and bumped and scraped herself on the rocks.

"But we all had a great time."

PWP ISN'T JUST for parties and fun, though.

Many members feel a need to discuss such things as their feelings of being "tainted" by their divorce, problems with their children and their hopes for the future. Informal rap sessions and discussion groups, held in members' homes, provide a type of group therapy.

The atmosphere at a recent discussion was relaxed and comfortable, with everyone on a first name basis. One by one they drifted in, Marty and Al, Cookie, Barbara and Tom, and the others. There was much talking, laughing and joke telling.

This evening the topic was trust. Moderator Len Tintinalli, of the Wayne-Westland

chapter, finds the discussions "supportive," as members grow emotionally by sharing their experiences and feelings, finding acceptance in the group.

"You get outside yourself and help each other," he said.

PWP ALSO HAS teen discussion sessions. Al Golden of Plymouth, who is divorced with two children, often moderates teen rap sessions for the Wayne-Westland chapter.

Often the single parent does not know how to get competent, professional advice and assistance. What should I do about my son who is associating with undesirable kids? Should I get my car repaired or buy a new one?

Many PWP chapters compile lists of persons who can provide professional help for its members — ministers, attorneys, self-

help groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous, and repair services.

As members services director of the Northville-Novl chapter, Mrs. Katke is responsible for developing and maintaining this list of services for chapter members.

Bernice Parks of Westland, finds PWP

comforting. "I found that I'm not alone. There is a way to cope."

membership in the organization has helped her grow.

"We have discussion groups and interesting speakers at our meetings to give you a new outlook on things," she said. "And it always helps to be with people."

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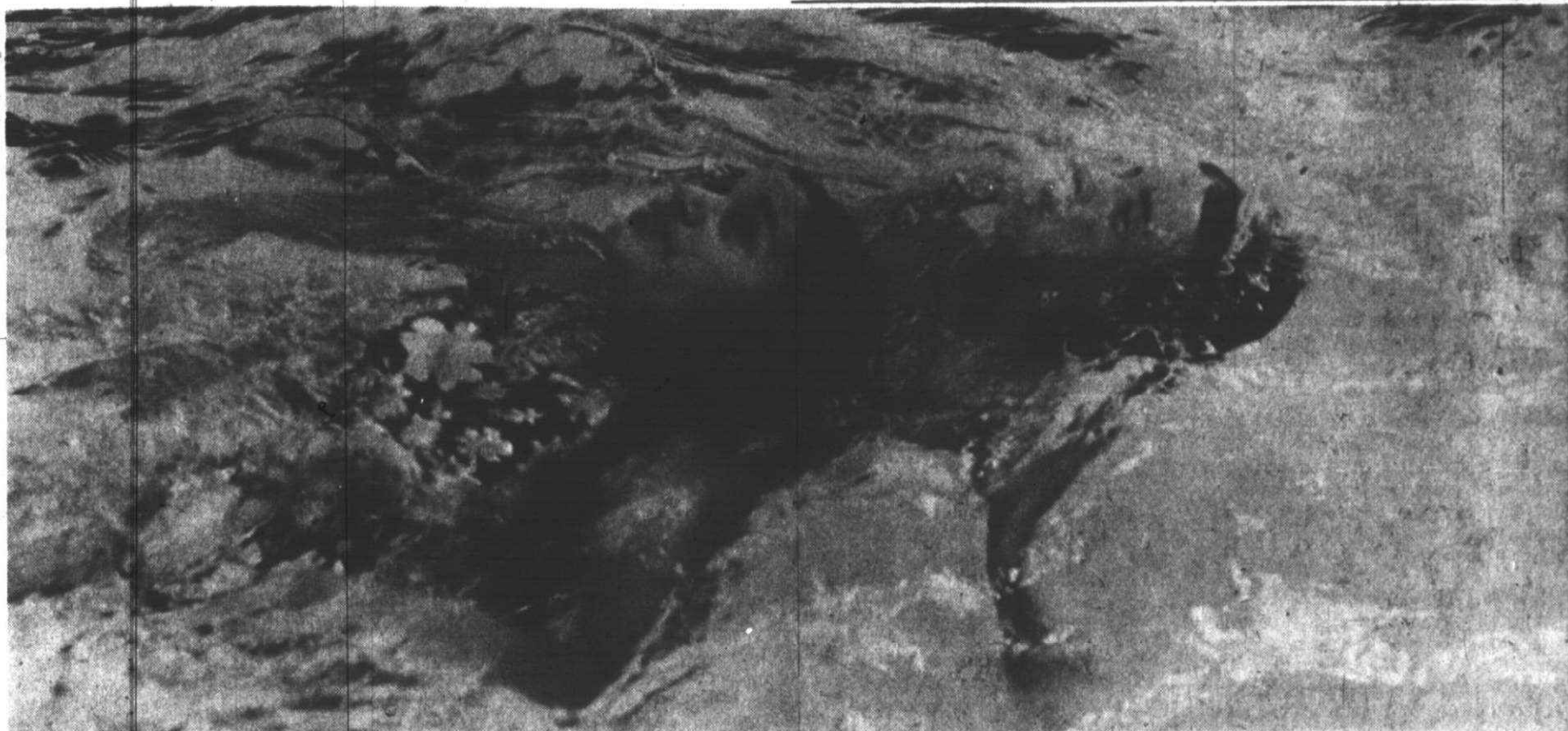

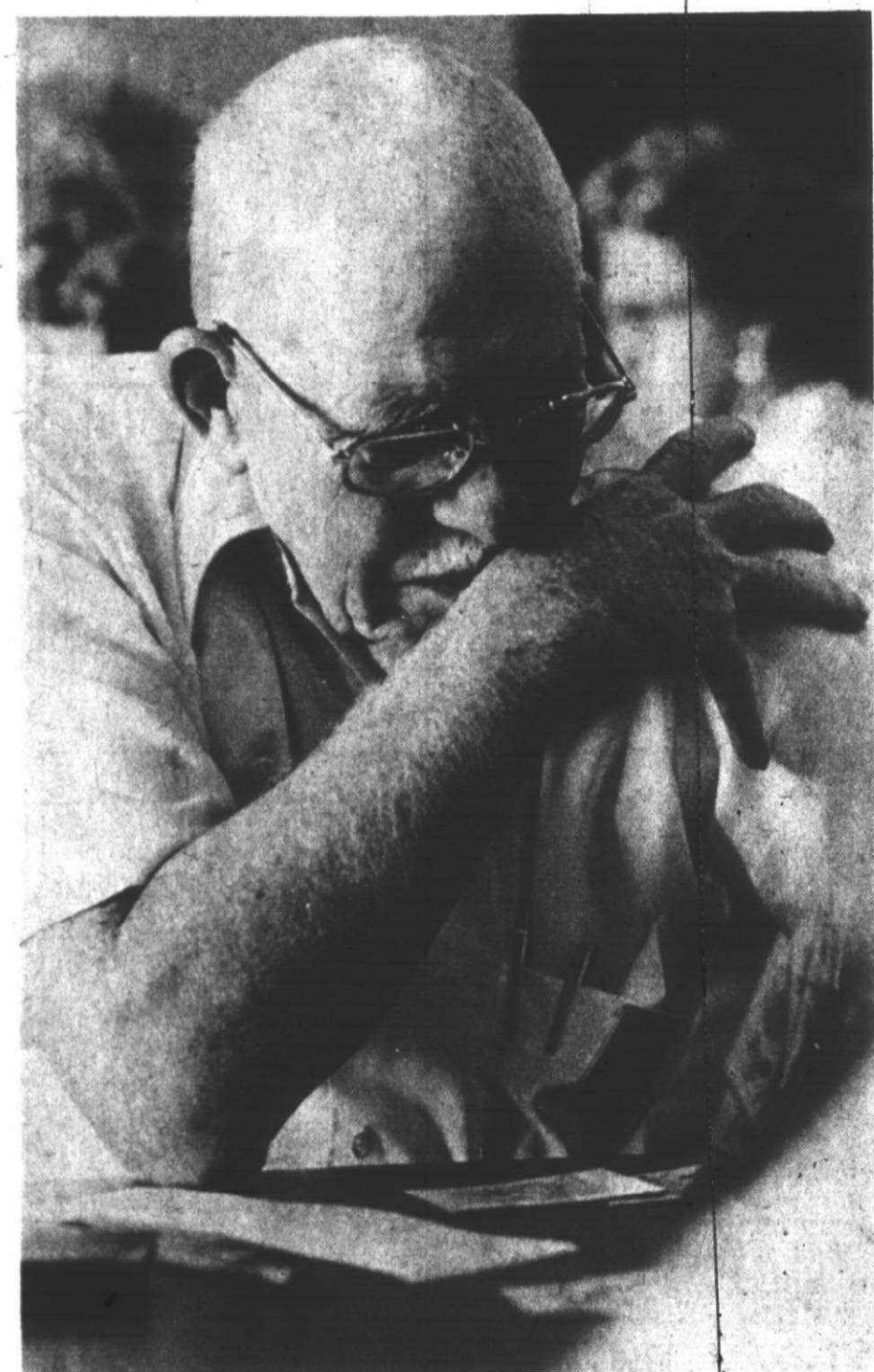
