

Full high school day option is restored

The Plymouth Board of Education voted Monday night to set the tax rate request at 4.75 mills for the Sept. 2 special election.

After agreeing on seeking 4.75 mills (\$4.75 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) for operation expenses over a five-year period, the board took related actions involving budget cuts necessary if the millage fails.

One related matter was changing board policy to now require that children won't be bused if they live within 1½ miles of school. This is a change from an earlier policy which allowed pupils from grades K-2 to be bused if they lived a mile or more from their school.

The board also approved an expenditure of \$7,000 which would make provisions for high school students to have a full class schedule if the millage is approved Sept. 2. Earlier the cost to provide this option was \$20,000 but that was trimmed by a proposal to use some 25 volunteers on a crash program to get students on a full schedule if the millage is approved.

THE MOTION to set the millage request at 4.75 was made by E.J. McClendon, supported by Marcia Borowski, and passed 6-0 with George Lawton absent.

Board president Joe Gray commented that some recommendations of the Citizens

Advisory Council (CAC), when and if implemented, could result in financial savings. If the financial savings are significant enough to make full levy of the 4.75 mills unnecessary, Gray added, the full amount won't be collected. "I'm sure the board will levy only that portion of the 4.75 mills which is absolutely necessary. Right now it all appears necessary, but if CAC recommendations are implemented and re-

sult in significant money being saved, maybe we can levy less than 4.75."

Ray Hoedell, administrative assistant for business, reported that the board has until its Sept. 13 meeting to set the total tax levy for the 1976-77 school year.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN reported to the board that principals at the high schools had met with central administration and

came up with a procedure to attempt to obtain a full schedule at the Centennial Educational Park should the millage pass.

The board Monday night voted 6-0 to approve an expenditure of \$7,000 to place the high school class schedules in a standby mode so a concerted effort can be made to set up a full schedule if the millage passes.

The budget without the 4.75 mills calls for limiting high school students to 5-5½ hours, instead of 6-6½, a school day—55 minutes shorter than in the 1975-76 school year.

Originally the cost to run a dual schedule through the computer to provide the op-

tion of a full class schedule if the millage passes would have cost \$20,000.

That cost was trimmed to \$7,000 by a plan in which administrators and area coordinators, counselors and students from the National Honor Society will volunteer for a crash program from Sept. 2-9 to put together a new class schedule if voters approve the 4.75 mills.

If the millage does pass, some 40 per cent of the students at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton will have to be contacted before a full schedule of classes can be implemented, said Hoben.

Campaign heats up, 'dirty tricks' charged

Charges and counter-charges of political wrong-doings are heating up in Canton this election year.

One of those charges, leveled by Brian Foust, recording secretary of the township's Citizens Advisory Council (CAC) and a teacher at Allen Elementary School, accuses township Supervisor Robert Greenstein of screening recommended members to the CAC before submitting applicants' names to the township board.

Foust believes those charges against the supervisor may explain the alleged rash of threatening phone calls and harassment Foust says he has encountered the past two weeks.

Greenstein, seeking the Democratic nomination to the supervisor post next Tuesday, calls Foust's charges unjustified and attributes the resident's harassment to the supervisor's apparent political foes, who, he says are trying to make him look "like some kind of a nut."

ACCORDING TO FOUST, the first of three threatening phone calls occurred about two weeks ago, after the CAC member accused Greenstein of withholding the names of CAC applicants from members of the township board.

One of the functions of the CAC, formed to study township issues and submit recommendations to the township board, is the study of areas in the township not represented on the CAC and the submission of recommended members by names to township officials.

Foust says Greenstein failed to submit the names of three residents, submitted originally by CAC vice chairman Dick Kirchgatter as possible CAC members, to other township officials.

ACCORDING TO FOUST, Greenstein told committee members at a CAC meeting that township board members had vetoed the residents' membership on the CAC because of the areas in which they lived.

But Foust says Greenstein never submitted the names to the township board. After the CAC member accused Greenstein of withholding the names, Greenstein wrote a letter to Foust, saying his statements at the CAC meeting were only his personal point of view.

"NOT ONLY WOULD I not presume to speak for the board," Greenstein wrote, "but I often do not like even to be associated with some of the board members long enough to speak for them."

Greenstein says Foust's charges are unjustified and that Kirchgatter's recommendations were not recommendations of the CAC.

"The CAC has not recommended any names," he maintains. "The names were a recommendation of Kirchgatter and a personal thing between him and me."

But Foust disagrees. "I feel that the CAC is supposed to be a citizens group," he said. "I think it's time the community know that it's not being run for and by citizens but by chairman Greenstein."

In addition, Foust attributes an alleged rash of threatening phone calls and harassment to members of the Greenstein camp.

According to the CAC member, Foust received an anonymous phone call about two weeks ago, warning him "to lay off Greenstein, if you know what's good for you."

The Canton resident received another phone call Sunday at the local church where he works part-time during summer months. A woman threatened the life of Foust's dogs, told Foust's wife "to cool it," and ordered Foust "to leave Greenstein and his slate alone."

When the CAC member left work Tuesday morning, he was allegedly greeted with four deflated automobile tires. Foust said he pumped air into the deflated tires and drove to a nearby credit union. When he emerged from the office, his tires were deflated again.

At work he received another phone call. "A gal said, 'Ha, ha, I heard you had some flat tires today,'" Foust recalled.

Said the CAC member, "I am very concerned for my family and personal belongings. I'm six-foot-four and weigh 210 pounds, and I can take care of myself. But I do worry about about my wife and dogs."

"I think it takes a sick person to follow me around. I don't want to believe it's someone related to government," he added, "but, after Watergate, you can believe anything."

FOUST, AN OUTSPOKEN opponent of Greenstein, believes supporters of the supervisor are behind the threats.

"The whole thing is leading me to believe it's someone from his camp. But then again, I'm anti-Greenstein and could be biased," Foust admits. "I really don't know what to think. I just think it's a sick, demented person who's doing this."

Foust contacted Greenstein after the alleged tire deflating incident and demanded the supervisor question his supporters about the alleged incidents. But, instead, Greenstein pointed his finger at his opponent in the Aug. 3 primary—Harold Stein.

"What you have here is another attempted smear," the supervisor said. "He isn't accusing me as much as repeating what they told him. If someone called and said they were Harold Stein supporters, he'd tell you Harold Stein did it."

"I swear on the lives of my children that no one in my group had anything to do with this," Greenstein said.

But Foust called Greenstein's reaction "a paranoid personality showing through."

And Gene Daley, Democratic candidate for trustee and a member of the Stein slate, said neither he nor his running mates had ever heard of Brian Foust.

Said Stein, "We are running a clean campaign, but I don't believe the opposition is. We're not going to stoop to their tactics."

A piece of jobs bill

Canton seeks federal monies

Township administrator's hopes of receiving federal aid for a host of public works programs were bolstered last week when both houses of Congress overrode President Ford's veto of a \$3.9 billion job bill.

The bill, expected by its backers to create or preserve about 350,000 jobs throughout the nation, was a smaller version of a jobs bill Ford also vetoed earlier this year.

That bill, a \$6.1 billion measure, was passed by both houses of Congress in January, but Senate backers were unable to

muster a two-thirds override.

Ford vetoed the measure calling it inflationary.

The reduced version passed by a wide margin in both houses, but the president vetoed it as well, citing the same problem, inflation.

The smaller package will provide some \$2 billion in public works grants, \$700 million for waste treatment plants, and about \$1.3 billion in special aid to areas where unemployment exceeds six per cent.

'Imposters' turn out to be sheriff

Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein's accusations of dirty campaign politics, based on an incident involving two police officers and a garage sale sign, has focused on the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

Greenstein had earlier charged that two apparent political opponents were involved in the incident, posing as police officers to anger residents and dirty his name.

According to Inspector Robert Sullivan of the Sheriff's Department, however, two deputies were involved. The deputies last week responded to a complaint of a Windsor Park Subdivision resident over the placement of a garage sale sign at the intersection of Arlington and Sheldon.

After receiving the complaint at 11:30 p.m. last Thursday, the deputies awakened John and Pyllis Evans of Arlington, who had placed the sign at the intersection, and asked the couple to remove the sign as soon as possible, according to the Sheriff's report.

The deputies cited Canton's sign ordinance, which prohibits the placement of signs on the public rights-of-way.

Greenstein said the township does not enforce its sign ordinance in relation to garage sale signs. Greenstein said he believed the move was a ploy by his opponents. Mrs. Evans strengthened the supervisor's belief, when she said the officers failed to identify themselves and cited Greenstein's name when asking her to remove the sign.

ACCORDING TO Greenstein, under-sheriff Loren Pittman outlined the Sher-

iff's Department's procedures in answering complaints, and cited deputies' instructions to leave investigation of routine complaints for the day shift. Pittman, according to Greenstein, said deputies are not supposed to wake citizens for minor complaints or use a local official's name as a source of their authority.

Although Pittman was not available for comment, Sullivan believed the garage sale sign incident does not constitute a "dirty political trick."

"When a car gets a call, he damned better go on that run," Sullivan said. "We're not selective about answering calls. As far as I'm concerned, this is a neighborhood dispute."

Sullivan said waking residents to solve a complaint is left to the discretion of the officer.

"It would call for a little thought on the officer's part," Sullivan admits, "but these officers didn't know this was going to be a serial. We're making a federal case about waking a person."

SULLIVAN SAYS he does not believe Mrs. Evans' claim the officers used Greenstein's name as a source of their authority. "I would deny that vehemently—especially these two officers," he said.

But Greenstein disagreed. The Sheriff's deputy union has endorsed the slate of Harold Stein, Greenstein's opponent for the supervisor post in the Aug. 3 primary election, he noted.

"It was just such a bizarre way for a police officer to conduct himself," the supervisor said. "These officers just decided

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Martha Mahan is dead of cancer

A long fight against cancer ended with the death Friday of Martha Mahan, Observer & Eccentric staff writer whose name has come to mean courage to her fellow workers and many friends in these communities.

Mrs. Mahan, 59, died in Harper Hospital. Her stay there, several weeks in duration, was the last of many trips in and out of hospitals over the past 10 years.

The wife of A.F. (Pete) Mahan and mother of two daughters, Mrs. Martha Marcelyn Haines and Joyce Sager Mahan, she had covered news for radio station WXYZ and the Associated Press Detroit bureau before joining the staff of this newspaper in August 1968.

Her reporting, first for the Observer

Newspapers Inc., and later for the merged operation of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers Inc., won her wide respect in many communities, including Livonia, Farmington, Southfield, Plymouth, Garden City, Westland and Redford Township.

"MARTHA MAHAN was one of the great old pros of our business," said Philip H. Power, Observer & Eccentric co-publisher.

"Her career was remarkable for its breadth, reaching all the way from wire

service work to investigative reporting for suburban newspapers.

"Throughout, she was a first class reporter and a fine writer. Her passing leaves a big hole for all of us."

Mrs. Mahan was born in Vincennes, Ind., daughter of Ben F. Sager, a prosecuting attorney, and Ella Hughes Sager. Following her father's death, she moved with her mother and two brothers to Detroit.

A graduate of Wayne State University, she was the first woman to serve as man-

aging editor of the student newspaper, The Daily Collegian, a post she held in the academic year of 1938-39.

After graduation, she was on the news staff of WXYZ and in 1943 joined the Associated Press as head of its Michigan radio news network.

SHE WAS MARRIED in 1961 to Pete Mahan, also an AP staff member, now retired after a long reporting career with the wire service.

She resigned from the AP in 1966 to devote full-time to her westside Detroit home and two daughters, and resumed her news career 12 years later as a reporter on the staff of the Livonia Observer.

There she specialized first in school board coverage and human interest stories in Livonia. Later her reporting took her into other communities in the Observer chain.

Her assignments were made especially on stories that required thorough and factual reporting and those that required a particular compassion in garnering the details.

THE ILLNESS that had begun before her start in suburban reporting took her out of action for frequent periods, but she kept returning to her work with a determination and competence that amazed many younger newsmen.

Her daughters both are students. Martha, wife of Richard Haines, is a graduate of Wayne State and studying law at the University of Michigan. Joyce attends Alma College.

Mrs. Mahan also leaves a brother, James Elgin, an attorney in New York City, and a step-son, A.F. Mahan Jr., of Springfield, Va. Another brother, Ben, died several years ago.

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County commissioner candidates talk issues

(To aid voters in making their selection for Wayne County Commissioner from the 27th district, the Observer & Eccentric requested the candidates answer a seven question survey—Editor)

Four men, Democrats Royce Smith, the incumbent, Walter Hink, and Republicans Owen Arrowsmith and Coleman Flaskamp were asked to respond.

The questions they were asked are:
1. How should the county handle its finances in view of the fact it is facing gargantuan deficits? Should it be done by budgeting, cutting programs, or is there another solution?

2. What part of county government is most important in terms of the services it delivers?

3. How should county employee groups be dealt with?

4. What facilities should the county provide western Wayne County with?

5. Should the sheriff's services be continued in the outcounty regions at no further cost to the townships?

6. What concerns do you think are most important to the voters of the 27th district in terms of county government?

7. State any other concerns you consider relevant.

WALTER HINK 30, a Belleville resident, is an attorney for the Campbell Development Co. in Detroit. A University of Detroit Law School graduate, he majored in business at Wayne State University as an undergraduate.

1. Wayne County can operate within its present budget of \$335 million. What is needed is budgetary efficiency on the part of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners. At the present time \$190 million or 57 per cent of the county budget is spent on health and welfare. I feel that waste should be put to work in essential services such as law enforcement.

2. All departments of county government are important because each provides essential services to the people of Wayne County. The county board of commissioners is responsible for a multitude of county agencies and departments from the judicial system to civil defense.

3. County employees should be dealt with fairly in collective bargaining.

4. In western Wayne County there is a real need for increased law enforcement in terms of manpower from the Wayne County Sheriff's office and this can only be accomplished by eliminating the waste within the county budget. I also believe that the county roads should be paved and improved with the same priority.

5. The sheriff's office is working with an

allocation of \$28 million or approximately eight per cent of the total county budget. If we can stop the cheating in the welfare programs and reduce the present health and welfare allocation from 57 per cent to an efficient level, outcounty regions will not have to spend additional monies for increased police protection.

6. I believe that people today are concerned about the honesty of their elected officials. No longer can the people be taken for granted. What is needed is government morality and integrity. Government is responsible to the public and not to a few special interest groups.

7. Government must begin to run as efficiently as private enterprise. With our cities in bankruptcy, government must take on the responsibility of providing public services within the financial means of the taxpayers. No longer can "wholesale cheating" within the welfare system be tolerated. Government officials have the responsibility of making the system work. I have a degree in business finance and law and if elected I will fight to see that these goals are accomplished.

ROYCE SMITH a Belleville resident is 60. He served 16 years as mayor of Belleville and was on the old Board of Supervisors for five years. He is finishing his first term as county commissioner and is presently serving as vice chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the county, and vice chairman of the labor board. He is chairman of the manpower advisory council for the county.

1. Although Wayne County faces a deficit, it is nowhere near the magnitude of the deficits facing the City of Detroit and many other cities. Belt-tightening and tighter budgeting controls can and should be utilized for sound fiscal policy, regardless of whether or not a deficit is projected. Reducing and cutting programs is, of course, a primary method of reducing expenditures. However, another important resource is to finance county programs and services by direct federal and state grant funding.

2. Law enforcement programs and the criminal justice system in general are the greatest concerns to me and to the citizens of the western Wayne County communities I represent. Priorities must continue to change in terms of providing more than just adequate law enforcement services for our communities. As county commissioner during this past term, I have continually stressed these important facts. Increases have been made in this area both in terms of percentages and total dollars appropriated, however, much more needs to be accomplished.

3. County employee groups should be

dealt with fairly and firmly. Government employees are no different than private or business sector workers, and should therefore have equity. However, as vice-chairman of the Wayne County Labor Relations Board, I have consistently applied the old adage "an honest day's work for an honest day's wage" in negotiating firm and fair agreements with the various labor groups.

4. I personally favor a better management of existing recreational programs and public parks, rather than just adding unneeded facilities. I would like to see outcounty circuit courts and probate courts for handling the tremendous two-three year backlog of cases that now exists; and I'm now working toward this end.

I am also working hard in attempting to bring to western Wayne County a new federal solar research center, which would provide 1,500-2,000 high paying jobs.

5. Absolutely yes—the sheriff's services should be continued in the outcounty regions at no further cost to the townships. This has always been my position. All townships and cities are entitled by state statutes to law enforcement protection from both the state and county. Although most cities choose not to use the road patrol service, the crime-lab services and metro narcotics squad services are widely used by all. I have actively and vehemently opposed the county phasing out road patrol services.

6. I believe the primary concern to voters in my district of western Wayne County is the inadequate return of services in proportion to the taxes paid. The outcounty total

equalized assessments for 1975-76 represent approximately 60 per cent of the total county assessments, and yet outcounty realizes only 48 per cent of total county services.

7. Other vital services that need expansion include programs involving jobs for the unemployed, senior citizens' programs, community development programs, to name just a few. As chairman of the manpower council, I have been gratified in succeeding to provide many jobs for the unemployed and underemployed citizens of this county.

Many millions of dollars have been obtained from the federal government under the Manpower Act—this past week \$9 million more was obtained. Also this past week, congress enacted the Public Works Act which provides an additional \$4.5 million for jobs in Wayne County. I would like to continue the important work that I have pursued as a fulltime working commissioner, and therefore ask for voter support to accomplish these goals.

OWEN ARROWSMITH, Republican, 4902 S. Wayne Road, Wayne, age 37; married with four children; attended Albion College; 30 hours graduate psychology at U of M; courses in banking through American Institute of Banking; worked 10 years in banking and finance partner Arrowsmith Brothers Painting, journeyman painter, and now employed with Wayne County Road Commission.

1. Finances: I feel an outside audit is necessary now and regularly. Sundown reform should be brought to county programs and agencies. Budget review is a must to establish priorities in service and spending.

2. Health is one of our prime concerns. The county health department touches all our lives in some way: environmental protection, disease control, health services for

young and old, and the facilities of the Wayne County General Hospital.

3. I would recommend that the county be represented at contract talks by the best professional negotiators it can obtain. Existing contracts, state laws, and court decisions have already established the ground rules in Michigan. The union representatives are experienced; the county should be as well advised professionally.

4. A court and an overnight only jail facility should be considered for western Wayne County. Savings of thousands of dollars would result to each community as well as more police protection remaining at home—not wasting countless, often fruitless hours going to Detroit. Bring service back to the communities!

5. Sheriff's service: This question needs a thorough review. All communities are entitled to service. With township growth increase, it seems to be more of a local decision as to the amount of police protection they require. Parks or county tax-free facilities should be adequately protected irrespective of location.

6. Concerns: More taxes are expected with less outward return. Inequity of service, adequate police protection, and general disenchantment with county government concerns everyone.

7. How can the county be made more responsible to the people? This is my main concern. The key is communication. I would hold open meetings on a regular basis, in the district. I intend to write a monthly article for the local newspapers, briefing upcoming programs, votes being taken including how commissioners voted, and specific opinions on what effect decisions will have on this district.

1. I believe the county should handle its

finances by budgeting. I feel that there is little that can be cut in the way of programs and to do so would hurt someone vitally affected by that particular program.

2. County government is most important in terms of services it delivers to those who are the disadvantaged. With high unemployment more citizens than ever have had contact with the county by reason of seeking assistance for themselves and their families.

3. County employee groups should be dealt with in a fair and understanding manner. They need a fair wage and benefits so qualified employees will be attracted and remain with the county. County employees also need to be given a sense of dignity and worth that at times is lacking now.

4. Western Wayne County should be provided with the facility of a hospital that is considered excellent in health care so that both the average citizen and those who are unable to afford the best may find it at Wayne County General. If feasible branch offices of county offices maintained.

5. The Sheriff's services should be continued in the out-county regions at no further cost to the townships. In spite of the Appeals Court ruling, I feel that the intent of the law is for the county to provide this service within unincorporated areas.

6. I feel that efficient use of tax monies are of concern to 27th District voters. The average citizen has minimal contact with the county and therefore is concerned as to where their taxes are going.

7. The residents of the 27th District need support in their efforts to stop the unfair collection of the drain tax by the drain commissioner when for years absolutely nothing has been done to keep the drains clear. This particular issue points out why people are cynical about their government and it should be made highly visible to them that their elected representatives oppose this type of action.

Principals reassigned

A shifting of principals at the elementary level was approved Monday night by the Plymouth Board of Education.

In a move related to the principal reassignments, the board also approved the transfer of some 80 pupils from LakePointe Village in Plymouth Township from Tanger to Farrand. Also approved was changing the duties of Deputy Supt. Earl Hogan to assistant administrator in charge of instruction.

EARL GIBSON, principal at Tanger Elementary, has been reassigned as principal of Farrand Elementary.

The board then named John Howe as principal of both Tanger and Starkweather elementaries and named Ed Kleinsmith, assistant principal of Pioneer Middle School as principal of Fiegel Elementary.

Each of the assignments were approved 5-1 by the board with Marcia Borowski voting no and George Lawton absent.

Ms. Morowski explained she was voting no because she didn't think the assignments were being done well from an administrative, educational or budget standpoint.

Flossie Tonda asked if it were possible for each elementary school to have a separate principal if the millage passed Sept. 2.

Joe Gray, board president, said it was a possibility. "There will be a lot of decisions we will have to make if the millage passes. Do we want to spend money for principals or a curriculum director, for instance. We will have to face those decisions after the millage passes, if it does."

The board voted 5-1, with Ms. Borowski voting no, to reassign Dr. Hogan's duties to assistant superintendent in charge of instruction. "The deputy has performed a tremendous variety of roles for the district," commented E.J. McClendon. "One of the most critical things in any school district is its instructional program—more critical, in my mind, than business or personnel assistants is leadership for instruction."

AT THE BEGINNING of the meeting, some residents from LakePointe spoke during the citizens comments portion of the agenda to urge the board to vote against transferring the 80 pupils from Tanger to Farrand.

William Rivard of Amber Ct. asked what the major reason for the transfer was, and was the primary factor the need for money to pay for a crossing guard. He asked if students were being bused to Farrand from any other section of the district and, if so, from where.

Hoben said that money for crossing guards was a factor but not the primary reason for the shift of pupils. He said a primary reason for the shift was to have all students from LakePointe attend Farrand and to balance the classroom use for both Farrand and Tanger.

Hoben added that the attendance areas of Tanger and Farrand are experiencing declining enrollment and would be underutilized except for an overload of student population in the southeast section of the district (Canton) from where students are bused in to make full use of both buildings. There are four to five different attendance areas which attend Tanger now, Hoben added, including an area of about 1½ square miles in Northville Township. About 85 students from Canton are bused to Tanger, primarily from Deer Creek and Stonybrook apartments.

The superintendent added that there is the possibility of a development in Northville Township involving some 400 residential units which would increase the enroll-

ment very substantially at Tanger in the near future.

"The enrollment relief we will get from the three new elementary buildings will be very short-lived," commented Hoben, "and it won't be too long before we are right back to where we were last school year."

KEVIN CUMMINGS of LakePointe said Tanger should serve students who live closest to it with a lower priority being given to those who live further away and have to be bused in. "We purchased our home because Tanger was just one block away." Upon questioning from the board, Cummings said Farrand was seven blocks away.

Another parent from LakePointe objected that the board was considering

"pushing our kids out of Tanger to bring in bused students from rentals who may not be here in six months or a year."

McClendon commented that 10 years ago, as a citizen, he appeared before the board as a parent to complain that his children were being transferred from Farrand to Tanger and he purchased his home expecting his children would attend Farrand, which was originally built to service the LakePointe area. "These are natural and human concerns you are expressing. But Farrand meets the criteria for your children that exists for other elementaries in the district—it is in the center of a subdivision and Farrand is much closer to where you live than many other elementary schools are to subdivisions."

Ms. Borowski commented she felt the

Crackdown planned for park

Seven police chiefs, a township supervisor, state police representatives and an inspector from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department have met with three county commissioners to discuss increasing vandalism, drug and alcohol abuse in Hines Park.

They pinpointed drug dealing, alcoholism among young people, harassment of law abiding citizens, vandalism and litter as the offenses most prevalent and difficult to enforce.

"As we continue to improve facilities, more people flock to our parks. With increased usage, unfortunately a bad element has crept in, causing problems for law abiding citizens," explained Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia).

"WE MUST maintain our strict enforcement of park rules and regulations," Richard M. Novak, senior inspector from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department emphasized. "Our parks have become a haven for dope pushers preying on our children. There is constant harassment of people who use the parks properly."

"We have had a startling rise in citizen complaints along with assaults on officers," he said. "It is a highly volatile situation. A single policeman cannot operate safely when there are gangs of kids tossing bottles, shouting obscenities. We simply must have more manpower to keep the peace, to protect legitimate citizens."

County Commissioner Richard Manning (R-Redford Township), an attorney, surveyed the situation. "The park system is gradually being destroyed by dope pushers playing their trade, making it impossible for parents to allow their children to use the parks without personal supervision."

"Our parklands are so extensive, it's difficult for the police to patrol them closely

enough to be effective, in view of the shortage of available manpower as required by local communities."

"We have asked the county corporation counsel to prepare a definitive statement on the power of sheriff's department officials and local police departments to disperse and remove disorderly persons from park property when it is apparent they are endangering the safety and morals of people making lawful use of parks," he explained.

COMMISSIONER ROYCE E. Smith commented: "I feel there is a definite need for more law enforcement. Lt. Novak has asked for 18 additional sheriff's patrol people. I support this request."

"If someone could figure out how we could put these kids to work who are creating the problem, I would like to hear about it," Smith said. "The offenders should be required to clean up our parks and make them safe for the residents desiring fun and wholesome entertainment."

Northville Township Chief of Police Ronald L. Nisun spoke of the "Beer Hill" section of Cass-Benton Woods. "At times there have been as many as 500 kids causing problems on Beer Hill. It backs up to a housing development of 450 homes. This caused a most unpleasant environment for people living there. They moved into an area that was supposed to provide them with a lovely, natural environment, but for some it has been a nightmare."

"This has become a well-known gathering spot for drug dealers. Many of them come from out of state. It is not our local people who are causing the problems," he

explained. "We simply don't have the manpower to patrol the 2½ miles of park under our jurisdiction. We rely on the sheriff's department to handle it."

"AS A RESULT of this meeting, we have asked the county legal staff to study current park rules with the intent of updating and strengthening them," Mrs. Dumas stated. "We are considering preparing a park manual to be distributed to local police departments and the sheriff's department personnel. This will define not only park rules but set down the legal powers and responsibilities regarding search and seizure, crowd dispersal, parking restrictions and use of alcoholic beverages in parks."

In addition to Commissioners Dumas, Manning and Smith, Inspector Novak and Chief Nisun, attending were a number of police chiefs: Edwin J. Gleaza of Redford Township, William L. Rechling of Westland, Donald R. Loose of Dearborn Heights, Terry S. Williams of Sumpter Township and Donald J. Harrison of Trenton.

Betty M. Lennox, supervisor of Northville Township, was present as were Michigan State Police Sgt. Reuben R. Johnson and Trooper David A. Sass.

The law enforcement personnel present requested that a follow-up meeting be held which would include representatives of the Wayne County Road Commission Parks Division, state department of natural resources, county corporation counsel, prosecutor's office, the district and court benches.

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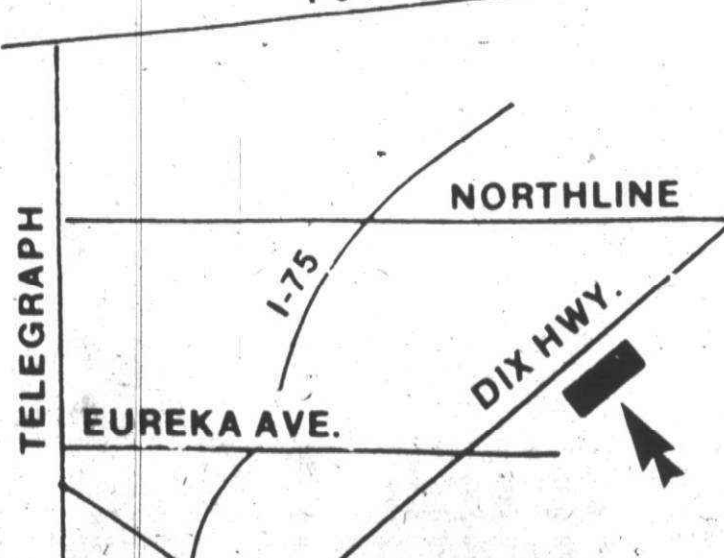
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DNR director promises swans for Wilcox Lake

Don't be surprised one of these mornings if you should see a group of white swans gliding majestically on Wilcox Lake.

For several years the possibility of having swans adding to the beauty of the lake has been discussed. But the idea never came to fruition.

Now help is coming from another source.

DURING HIS short stay in Plymouth last week Dr. Howard Tanner, director of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) let it be known that having these eye catchers paddling on the lake was not a remote possibility.

"If you folks were talking of a whole flock of them like they have at Traverse City," he said "that may be difficult. But one or two pair is another matter. They should not be difficult to obtain. I will do all I can to help you."

The DNR director is the first of the top state officials to lend any support to the program. And when he departed the city he called, "I won't forget the swans."

While on the subject of adding beauty to the lake, the DNR director gave his approval to several other ideas that have been discussed from time to time.

Among these was the towering fountain that was proposed for the island in the center of the lake. It was proposed several years ago to act as a beacon for the folks travelling on the new freeways—M-14 and I-275—to let them know that a place like Plymouth existed.

PROPOSERS of the plan suggested that the fountain be built to shoot water at least 300 feet in the air and that colored lights be played on it at night.

They pointed out that millions of people travel miles to see "Old Faithful" in Yellowstone National Park and it would be a tourist attraction for Plymouth.

At the time, City Fire Chief George Schoenneman promised a nozzle that would do the trick and the Plymouth Rotary Club was considering taking it on as a project.

"That certainly would be a fine thing," Tanner commented. "Our department never would be opposed to anything like that."

Before he departed, Dr. Tanner also put his blessings on another proposal. This one had to do with establishment of a "Show Boat" on the lake, much like those that have been so popular through the years at Chesaning and Lowell in outstate Michigan.

"You have a great setting for it," he said, "with that bank helping to form an amphitheater. It could handle a goodly crowd."

All that is required to prepare for the "Show Boat" is to clear the bank of the wild bushes and shrubbery. It is a "natural" and to add to the attractiveness is the fact that there is plenty of parking available.

So Dr. Tanner passed along his views and promised that he would do all in his power to help them along if the projects get started.

That's why it wouldn't be too surprising to see one or two pair of white swan gliding majestically along one of these mornings on Wilcox Lake.

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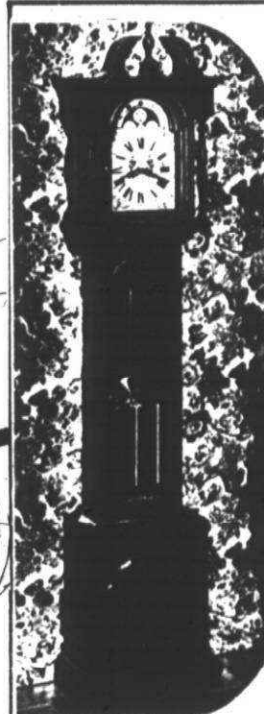
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Out-county to get circuit court services

Western Wayne County communities may have more police officers available for street patrol this fall—because they won't be tied up in downtown Detroit courtrooms.

A new pilot program will allow them to participate in pretrial criminal proceedings in two western Wayne County satellite courts and probably before a Livonia judge.

The project will empower selected suburban district and municipal judges to handle all criminal felony pretrial work in local courtrooms, according to several

area commissioners who helped get a \$95,000 federal grant for the project.

UNDER THE PLAN four or five satellite courts will be set up in existing court-houses at various out-county locations. Under consideration are: the downriver corridor (probably Trenton); western Wayne County (probably Livonia); midwestern Wayne County (perhaps both Westland and Dearborn); Hamtramck; Highland Park; and the Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods area. Four or five district or municipal judges will serve as acting circuit judges on a ro-

tating basis, according to Chief Circuit Court Judge James Canham. "They will conduct felony criminal arraignments, pretrial plea bargaining and plea taking in the community where the crime occurred or in a nearby community," he said. Criminal trials would continue to be held in downtown circuit courtrooms. "We're only moving the pretrial service out-county," Canham emphasized.

DAVID KASUNIC, administrator of the out-county project, said Canham has already tapped three district judges for the service. District judges James Mies (18th District, Livonia), James B. Stone (34th District, Romulus) and Jerry McNally (33rd District, Trenton) "were ready to

step in when called," according to Kasunic. All have been serving on a study committee to improve out-county circuit court services, Canham said. "This program has to be flexible," Canham said. "We'll be asking other judges to serve and intend to work closely with those communities which lend us their courtrooms so that we don't interfere with local court activities." Also, because judges cannot wear two hats, he said they would have to serve outside their own districts when performing circuit court duties.

KASUNIC SAID the \$95,000 grant went into effect July 1 and covers a 15-month period. It will be matched by \$5,000 from both

the state and the county. "The first three months is for gearing-up," he said. "We're using this time to get recommendations from local mayors, police chiefs and commissioners as to existing court space, dockets and the availability of judges," Kasunic explained. "But we expect to be in full swing by October," he promised.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER Royce Smith (D-Bellefonte) said the program would mark the first time in the history of circuit court that service would be brought directly into suburban communities. "Suburban police officers involved in criminal cases now lose precious hours

that could be devoted to police work because they've got to drive downtown and babysit a prisoner, often for an entire day, while he goes through the pretrial process," he said.

"This new program will put policemen back on the streets faster and take them out of the babysitting and chauffeuring business," Smith said.

THIS "NEIGHBORHOOD court" concept means that a policeman could perform his court duties and be back on patrol in five or 10 minutes, according to Commissioner Mary Dumas (R-Livonia).

SEMTA receives \$10 million

A recent \$10.1 million federal grant will allow the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority to purchase 153 new air-conditioned buses and other significant improvements for both SEMTA and Detroit Department of Transportation facilities.

In addition to the buses, the grant, approved by the Urban Mass Transportation Administration, will assist in buying 69 bus stop shelters; 3,200 bus stop signs; 22 new supervisory vehicles; 128 bus destination

curtains; and the repainting of buses acquired from previously private suburban companies.

"The infusion of more than \$10 million into the SEMTA region's transit services will significantly upgrade the quality of those services and should encourage more travelers to use our improved public transportation facilities," said Clarence Genette, SEMTA general manager.

CB'ers lend hand in police program

Although Citizen's Band radio operators have often been pictured as trying to thwart police by giving "smoke reports" to speeders, an increasing number of CB users are counting the Michigan State Police among their "good buddies" as they participate in a new police program.

The program involves 25 state police patrol cars and base stations along the I-94 and I-96 freeway corridors. Patrol cars monitor CB channel 19 and base stations stay tuned to channel 9 (the national emergency channel) for passing motorist's reports that range from assistance calls to spotting murder suspects.

In fact, one Oakland County CB'er spotted a vehicle driven by a murder suspect and relayed it to police, while another CB-relayed call enabled a trooper to provide first aid to a motorist heart attack victim. Two other CB reports led to drug case policing.

According to the program's supervisor, Lt. Roderick LaMore, head of the selective enforcement section of the traffic division, the state police made 1,004 contacts with CB radio operators since the program began during Memorial Day weekend.

LaMore said 290 of those contacts were law violation reports and 714 were reports concerning dangerous conditions or assistance calls. Of the violation-type reports by CB'ers, 128 involved speeding vehicles. Of those cases the state police issued 72 traffic law violation tickets and nine verbal warnings. Another 83 reports concerned suspected drunk driving, with the police making 23 traffic arrests and six other arrests. Warnings were given in four cases.

In addition there were 37 non-traffic calls, including 26 misdemeanor cases and 11 felony cases.

Of the 714 dangerous condition and assistance calls, 173 concerned traffic accidents, another 30 involved car fires, 23 were for stranded motorists, and 18 involved sick persons.

Other calls dealt with parked vehicles, objects on the road, attempts to locate and requests for direction. Of the 714 calls, state police handled 514 cases, other police 136. There were 58 "not located" cases and six "out of position."

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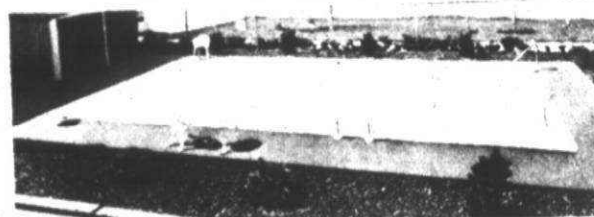
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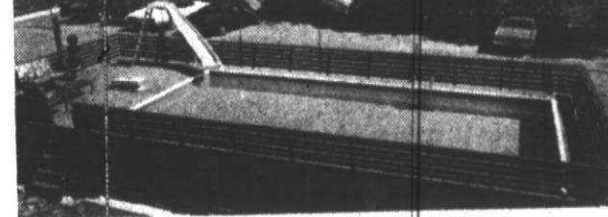
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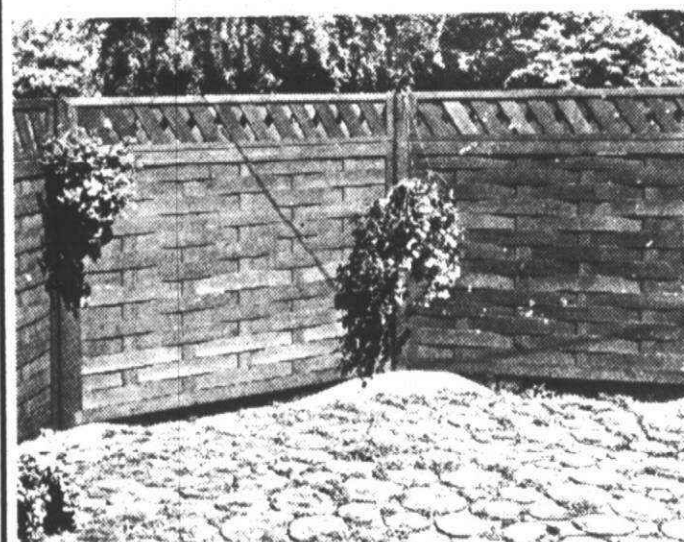
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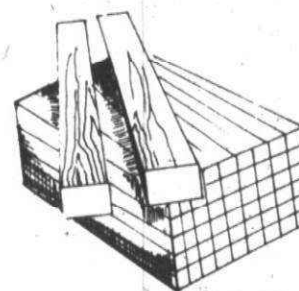
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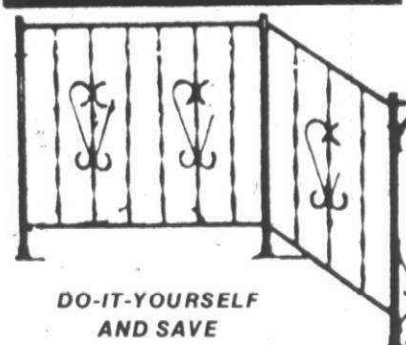
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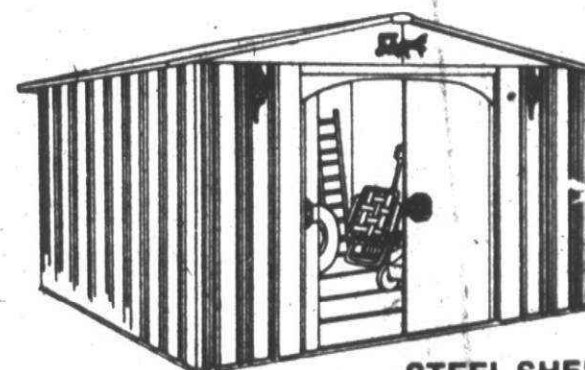
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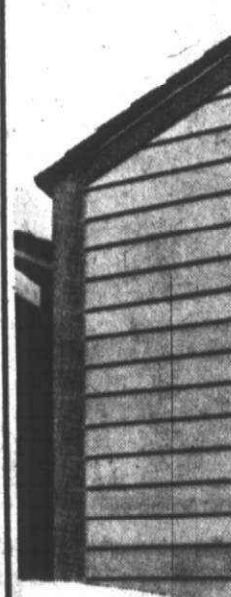
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Youngblood denies irregularities

Charges by an Ypsilanti daily newspaper that a state audit of Wayne County Drain Commissioner Charles N. Youngblood's office revealing fiscal irregularities was being withheld until after the Aug. 3 primary election have been attacked by Youngblood and an official of the state treasury department.

The paper, in an article that appeared Monday said the charges of fiscal irregularities lodged against the drain commissioner's office by Canton Township and five other areas and townships in a lawsuit had been substantiated by a state audit.

Citing unnamed sources in the state treasury department and two other government sources in Lansing, the paper said "misuse of funds and other charges of irregularities have been unfolded in audits of Youngblood's office by the Michigan Department of Treasury."

YOUNGBLOOD told the Observer & Eccentric "he had nothing to hide. Someone's in trouble and the facts had better be checked. There's nothing irregular in this office and someone is making false statements."

The drain commissioner, who is contested in the primary next Tuesday, said all his records were in order. "It's all in black and white in my office if you'd care to take a look."

He said all work was documented but declined further comment, saying, "I don't conduct my business over the phone."

The Ypsilanti paper also said the treasury department had been accused of playing politics by not releasing the findings of the audit.

Youngblood's opponent in the primary, former state senator Terry Troutt (D-Romulus) said, "My sources in Lansing indicated the audit is not favorable and the state treasurer's office is holding back their findings until after the primary election."

The paper said Chief Deputy State Treasurer Carol C. Newton admitted to irregularities discovered in the audit, but then backtracked. "His attempts to veil the audit results were feeble at best, if not farcical," the paper reported.

The paper said other sources indicated the irregularities were substantial and that the misuse of funds amounted to thousands of dollars.

Terming the commissioner's books "a confused mess," one Lansing source told the paper that "tax dollars from one community were being used to finance projects and investments in other communities."

NEWTON TOLD the Observer & Eccentric the treasury department was not "sitting on the audits" and that no substantial irregularities have been uncovered. "We've completed audits of 22 drains

and there were some accounting errors found. It's not unusual and we often help people make correcting entries."

"The errors we found were not of any magnitude."

Newton said the department had nothing to hide and said he would give copies of the audits to the newspapers to look at.

"We're continuing to work on these audits, but there are about 150 drains that need to be audited over a long period of time—it's quite time consuming."

Newton said the audit came at the request of the Wayne County Drainage Board, and not at State Senator William Faust's as the Ypsilanti paper reported.

"They had a shortage, an employee was fired and we were asked to check the books. There's no supposition that anything is wrong."

PRIOR TO helping start the lawsuit earlier this month, Canton supervisor Robert Greenstein repeatedly charged the township had been assessed for work never done by the drain commissioner's office.

He charged that bills amounting to more than \$20,000 had been paid to the drain commissioner for work never done.

Presently, the township has unpaid bills amounting to "at least \$2,000 or \$3,000," the supervisor said.

"After an extensive investigation with reference to Canton, I could not possibly authorize payment of one dime of the township's money until the whole matter has

been cleared up by state auditors and the lawsuit brought by the six cities and townships settled."

"The present drain commissioner is the kind of public officer which this country cannot afford. He won't respond to letters, he won't answer phone calls, he won't work with Canton, he won't work with anyone."

"IT SEEMS HE thinks he was appointed by the good lord, not elected by the people of this county," Greenstein said.

The lawsuit, filed in Wayne County Circuit Court early this month alleges that special assessments have been improperly levied and used to pay for work that should be paid for out of the county general fund.

The suit asks for a return of those monies, for a permanent injunction against further bills, and that until the matter is resolved, money owed to the drain commissioner's office be put in escrow.

Five other communities, the cities of Romulus and Riverview, and Van Buren, Huron and Brownstown township are party to the suit.

According to Greenstein, several of those communities have been billed much more than Canton, and in some instances special assessments have been levied against private property owners, instead of the municipality.

"The whole thing is a big ripoff," Greenstein said.

Schools seek 2d shot at millage

Dick Arlen said he supported the intent of the motion because it gave the board an option to pursue, and the \$7,000 cost was much different than the \$20,000 expense. "But this in no way precludes that there are other ways things can be done at the high schools," Arlen stressed, "such as enforcement of all attendance policies, and applying athletic programs evenly between the two high schools and between men and women as well as broadening participation beyond an elite few."

"I would like the board to re-evaluate what has become a proliferation of courses at the high schools. Serious effort should be made to eliminate superfluous classes and to make sure the courses we do offer have some real substance."

Hoben commented that it would be helpful if the board held another study workshop to discuss the implementation of recommendations from the CAC.

Gray pointed out that, under the modular scheduling system, students could carry more than 5½ hours by taking advantage of independent study time even if the millage is defeated. Kent Buikema, principal of Plymouth Canton High, agreed this was true but said it would be more difficult, or teachers to have time to work with students on independent study if the millage went down and high school teachers were laid off.

Tom Yack said he believed the administration was sensitive to the need to work toward continuing improvement in modular scheduling. "The option on offering a full class schedule at the high schools like Miller action, and unlike action taken on athletics, keeps all our options open of millage. So, if it's successful, we can restore as much of a full program as possible."

THE CHANGE in transportation policy was approved by a 6-0 vote of the board.

Last year the district would bus pupils in grades K-2 if they lived a mile or more from school. The change means that pupils K-2 must live 1½ miles or more from their school before they will be bused.

The district will still make exceptions to policy, as done in past years, when hazardous conditions or special safety problems warrant students within 1½ miles from a school being bused.

McClendon pointed out that state law allows for busing students who live 1½ miles or more from a school, but it had been a tradition to bus K-2 students living a mile or more from school. "The state doesn't reimburse us for students bused who live less than 1½ miles from school. In fact, we are financially penalized for every student we bus who lives less than 1½ miles from school."

Flossie Tonda, board secretary, commented that the four areas which will be

affected most by the change in busing policy are the Bird, Halstead, Fiegel and Miller elementary attendance areas. She added that often a bus driver's time must be paid for just to bus 15 or fewer students K-2 who had met requirements of the former mile or more policy.

IN OTHER ACTION related to the operating budget which will be in effect if the millage fails, the board approved shorter school days for the high school, middle

school and elementary levels.

High school hours will be changed from 7:30-2:20 to 8-1:55, a reduction of 55 minutes, middle school hours from 8-2:50 to 8:30-2:25, a reduction of 55 minutes, and elementary hours changed from 8:45-3:30 to 9-10:30, a reduction of 50 minutes.

they'd get involved in politics while in uniform which, I think, is worse than if it had been an ordinary citizen," he added, referring to earlier beliefs that police "imposters" had approached the Evans' home.

"The last time officers got involved in politics was in Nazi Germany."

Greenstein says opponents of his administration's stance on the master land use plan and other issues have posed as the supervisor or supporters of his policy in efforts "to make me look like some kind of nut."

Greenstein said those opponents have gathered behind Stein.

"I don't say all this is going on behind his back, and he doesn't know what's going on," Greenstein maintained. "He knows what's happening."

Stein denied all charges of political wrongdoing.

"I have nothing to hide," the Democratic candidate said. "I would gladly take a lie detector test and sign a sworn affidavit that we're not involved in so-called punk politics."

"We are running a very clean campaign, but I don't believe the opposition is. We're not going to stoop to those tactics."

Stein accused Greenstein of misrepresenting the Democratic challenger's platform. The supervisor, Stein says, has published information alleging Stein's commitment to a contractual agreement for police protection with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

"I have never said that," Stein said. "Why would he continually print things on flyers, if they're not the truth? Why is he resorting to these tactics? If his record is so great, why doesn't he rely on that?"

transfer of the 80 pupils to Farrand was unwise. "The attendance and boundary committee wrestled with this problem and its recommendation was for the pupils to remain at Tanger. The major reasons for them remaining was for stability of student population and to maintain a good socio-economic mix."

She answered the comment about apartment dwellers being rentals: "Apartment residents also pay taxes, usually more than their fair share in relation to the value of their homes. But apartment dwellers do tend to be transient and to have a stable population at Tanger the attendance committee recommended leaving the Lake-Pointe students at Tanger."

McClendon commented that Farrand was originally built to serve Lake-Pointe and the transfer will bring all Lake-Pointe pupils into a single building which will become a center for neighborhood activities. "This represents a return to our original projections to have attendance boundaries follow major roads."

Hoben commented: "The defeat of the millage in June requires us to have one principal for Tanger and Starkweather schools and we are recommending changes to make that situation manageable by balancing use of classrooms between Farrand and Tanger."

Mrs. Tonda stated that safety was a cause of concern for her and she felt the transfer of the pupils to Farrand was good from that standpoint.

Arlen pressed the superintendent for an answer on what was the single critical reason for the move of pupils and was told it was to balance use of classrooms between the two schools.

The motion to approve the transfer of pupils passed 4-2 with Arlen and Ms. Borowski voting no.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board authorized Hoedell to negotiate a lease for New Morning School to use the Truesdell School in Canton for the 1976-77 school year. Truesdell, used this past year for kindergartners, won't be used now that the new elementary are opening.

The board also voted to notify the Canton Township Planning Commission of its intent to look for a school site in the general area between Cherry Hill and Proctor roads east of Sheldon. The district is considering the need for a new school to serve the area east of Sheldon between Palmer and Cherry Hill.

Farmers Have Been Refused Fair & Equitable Consideration

On June 16th the Wayne County Planning Commission approved the proposed Master Land Use Plan only after an amendment was added to the motion that the plan should be implemented only after some way has been established to protect the equity of owners.

On July 13th a group of farm land owners presented a request for a motion to the township board, recommending that fair and equitable compensation be made - based on land values as they were prior to the disclosure of the new Master Land Use Plan.

This motion was defeated by a 4 to 2 vote, thus indicating that fair equity to land owners is not intended.

One trustee stated, "I intend to be fair whenever possible." (At what point can exceptions be made to fairness?)

IF YOU sneeze on New Year's Eve, you will be cursed throughout the coming year unless you hurry to visit three homes before midnight, thereby breaking the curse.

In Estonia, it is said that if two pregnant women sneeze at the same time, one of them will have twins.

Some say that Pope Gregory the Great started the custom of blessing sneezes in the sixth century when the great plague swept Europe. The sneeze was one of the early symptoms of the plague, and it became customary to say "God bless you" when someone sneezed or for the sneezer to cry out, "God help me."

HISTORIANS SAY that the familiar nursery rhyme "Ring Around the Rosy" refers to the great plague; "Atishoo, atishoo, we all fall down" refers to the sneeze, the fatal symbol of the plague and the ensuing death.

Still other early peoples believed that when a person sneezed, his soul actually left his body. Therefore, demons and devils could easily enter and take possession at that time. Thus, they blessed the sneezer.



Fernando DeSoto, when he first landed on this continent in 1539, was surprised to find out that the Florida Indians blessed their sneezers just as the Spaniards did back home.

Chinese people have been known to put jade in their nostrils to keep their spirits in and the demons out. The Brahmins touch their ears when they sneeze to keep evil spirits from entering their bodies while their souls are temporarily out.

MY OWN favorite superstitions about sneezes are contained in this old folk rhyme: Sneeze on Monday, sneeze for danger. Sneeze on Tuesday, kiss a stranger; Sneeze on Wednesday, get a letter; Sneeze on Thursday, something better; Sneeze on Friday, sneeze for sorrow; Sneeze on Saturday, joy tomorrow; Sneeze on Sunday, see your sweet heart on Monday.

Kavanagh urges law grads to help public

Michigan Supreme Court Chief Justice Thomas G. Kavanagh urged an end to "legal pollution" and stressed the need for "quality legal aid at reasonable costs" in a recent commencement address to graduates of the Detroit College of Law.

Nancy C. Cook of Livonia received the Burton Memorial Scholarship Award for proficiency in law of real property at the conclusion of commencement exercises.

Kavanagh defined legal pollution as the overuse of the court system by attorneys and their clients in settling problems which could be better handled elsewhere.

Kavanagh also told the 245 DCL graduates that a growing concern of thoughtful lawyers is the responsibility of the legal profession to provide quality legal assistance to all who need it at a reasonable cost.

"Our profession exists to meet need of people for legal assistance, not to provide an income for lawyers. The public has a legitimate expectation of high standards of justice," he said.

Abuse of the court system could be halted by finding quicker and less expensive ways of legal settlement, then counseling and educating clients to use those alternative methods, said Kavanagh.

"You must also pay attention to reducing the actual cost of providing legal serv-

ices. The survival of the profession depends on attention to availability, cost and competence of legal aid."

Referring to the graduates as the "bicentennial class of '76," Kavanagh reminded them that the nation's founding fathers devised the nation's judicial system for a total citizenry which today equals one-fourth the population of the state of Michigan.

"There have been some changes since, but perhaps the system now needs a drastic overhaul,"

Kavanagh commented that the real thrust of the current legal controversy over specialization is that until valid standards of specialization can be set, lawyers will continue to be disciplined on their moral rather than professional lapses.

The 83d annual commencement of Detroit's oldest law school was held at the Masonic Temple. G. Cameron Buchanan, president of DCL, presided, and handed out diplomas with John S. Abbott, dean of the college.

An honorary Doctor of Laws degree was presented to Chief Justice Kavanagh.

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Grote's contract OK'd

The president of Schoolcraft College, C. Nelson Grote, can look forward to at least another four years in that position, but he won't know if he's going to get a raise until this fall.

Grote, a resident of Livonia, had his contract extended through June 30, 1980 at a special meeting held by the college's board of trustees. Discussion on a pay increase to go with the extended contract must wait until a collective bargaining contract for the college is written.

"I was very pleased when the board indicated that they wished to extend my contract," Grote said.

He added, "I am also pleased that last year the board made my contract a four-year one instead of the three-year contract I held previously."

GROTE FORESEES a difficult job ahead of him over the next few years. "The millage loss creates a host of administrative problems like the financial limitations we are facing at Schoolcraft. In fact, higher education throughout America is facing limited resources," he said.

Grote commented wryly on the college's financial situation by saying, "It makes the job more interesting."

The recent defeat by voters of the college's request of about one-half mill for operating costs may have another impact on Grote. When the collective bargaining contract for faculty negotiations is written,

the question of whether to give the president a salary increase will be raised. "I would anticipate a salary increase," Grote

said, "but I would think any increase would be affected by the millage defeat." Any raise will be retroactive to July 1.

THE PRESIDENT'S long-range plans for the college include focusing on having a new instructional center in Canton Township. "Canton Township is one part of the community that is growing rapidly. I think that area has, in the most part, been ignored by the college. I hope to see us better serve Plymouth and Canton in the future," he said.

Grote also thinks the college's greatest growth will be in the areas of community services and adult programs. "We at Schoolcraft are still growing and our projections show us that we are continuing to grow. I see 1977 as a much brighter year," he said.

Grote said he plans to stay at Schoolcraft at least for the next five years. "My first objective personally is to obtain a vested interest in the Michigan Teachers' Retirement System. I plan to stay here another five years, since I have five years active membership in the MTRS and need five more before I can receive benefits," he said.

The college president has also considered teaching again before he retires. "I might want to consider going back in the class room at some institute for higher learning—say, the University of Michigan," he added.

 Fred Yockey, Plymouth's 11th city manager since 1918 when the community hired its first village manager, believes that consolidation of the city and township into one governmental unit is inevitable.
 I asked him when this consolidation would take place.
 Yockey smiled and tilted his 59, 195-pound frame back into the chair behind the neat, uncluttered desk in the small but pleasant office at the northeast corner of the municipal building.
 "I won't predict," he said, "but it will happen. It usually takes place when costs between the two units begin to equalize. That's when it becomes obvious to taxpayers in both units that there is a better way to get the job done."
 "The township now has less government than it will have when it begins to provide the city-type of services which increasing population will demand. When population reaches a density of about 1,500 people per square mile, residents in a township usually begin asking for city-type services."
WHAT IS THE ideal minimum population for a city?
 "Ideally, a city should have at least 30,000 people in order to be able to provide the amenities and services that most people would like to have. If the city and the township were together, the combined governmental unit could afford, among other things, to have a city planner on its staff."

Is there an optimum size beyond which a city ceases to function at its best?
 "I used to think it was about 100,000," Yockey responded, "but now I'm beginning to think that it may be as high as 200,000. If a city gets too big, it begins to have problems New York and Detroit are having now."
 What other problems are down the road for the City of Plymouth?
 "The city has no room for growth, and little possibility for increased valuation. Because of that we will be faced with new methods of taxation."
 "Plymouth has an identity that many suburban communities do not have. We have, for example, a definite downtown area unlike Livonia and Westland. We also have a small-town atmosphere which many people prefer."
 "We have a clean, non-partisan type of government in which politics are kept at a minimum. When I was hired for this job, I was not asked what my political leanings are, or what my religion is. Since I have been here, I have had nothing but excellent cooperation from everyone on the city commission."
 What effect will the opening of the two new expressways have on the City of Plymouth?
 "Well, for one thing, it will accelerate the growth of the area, and that should be beneficial to local business and employment."
THE FIRST large city to adopt the council-manager plan of government was Day-

ton, which began to use it in 1913 (four years before it was voted in at Plymouth.) By the late 1960s, according to Orin F. Nolting of the International City Managers' Association, more than 2,100 municipalities had a city manager.
 The council-manager form of government had surpassed the mayor-council plan and the commission plan as the leading form of government among U.S. cities with populations of more than 25,000. The plan also has spread abroad; 1,850 local governments in Finland, Germany, Ireland, Norway and Sweden are now operating under the council-manager form.
 Under the plan, the city manager is the principal executive and administrator of the municipality. The commission acts only collectively and its individual members, including the mayor, have no executive functions. Unlike the commission members, the city manager is not popu-

larly elected; he is hired by the commission, which can remove him from office.
 By 1970, Michigan led the nation in the number of cities having city managers, and Michigan was among six states having almost half of the cities which have adopted the city manager plan. The other states are California, Florida, Maine, Pennsylvania and Texas.
IS THE TREND still toward the council-manager form of government in the United States?
 "Yes, it is," Yockey told me. "Even some of the larger cities such as Cincinnati, Miami, Kansas City, San Diego, Houston, Dallas and others now have city managers. And in all cases where large cities have turned to the council-manager form of government, none of the cities has had the financial difficulties that have plagued New York City and Detroit."

Here are our choices for township board

Township residents exercising their franchise in the Aug. 3 primary will have decisions to make in four races for the Canton Township Board of Trustees.

Up for grabs in the Democratic Party primary are two four-year trustee positions, and the supervisor's and treasurer's jobs. No Republican races exist in the primary, and

the office of clerk is uncontested on the Democratic side.

FOR TOWNSHIP supervisor, we endorse incumbent **Robert Greenstein** on the basis of his administration's accomplishments of the past two years.

While we have taken him to task on many issues in the last two years and disagree with his stands on taping, meeting rules of order, his handling of the police reserves and the citizen's advisory council, overall, on the basis of his administrative skills, we feel he is the best choice for Democratic candidate for supervisor.

The mid-decade census, Canton's success in getting supplemental block grant funds, and the township's own ZIP codes are but a few indications of Greenstein's administrative preparedness.

Innovative thinking in the area of using the Edison corridor as a recreation site is a progressive move.

Passage of a special assessment district to construct and staff a sorely needed second fire station is also a feather in the Greenstein administration's cap.

While there remain many grave questions to be answered as far as the land use plan, we feel Greenstein's approach is a step in the right direction, and the better choice offered by the two Democratic candidates.

In the Democratic race for treasurer, we endorse incumbent **Carl Parsell** as the better qualified.

IN THE RACE for trustee, one candidate far outdistances the field. She is **Lynne Goldsmith** and she has shown, in the past, her interest and concern in her community.

An independent, she would be a welcome voice on the board, unencumbered by any slate or team leanings.

Her position that meetings should be taped and that rules of order are needed for township meet-

ings are solid, and she has done her homework on the master land use plan.

She has shown her willingness to be involved in the past, contributing much time to the League of Women Voters, and to a committee to form a citizen's advisory council.

In the race for the second trustee position, we favor **Gene Daley**. A longtime township resident, he offers a knowledgeable viewpoint and appears to be an independent thinker.

Well-voiced on the issues, his interest in the township is evidenced by his record of attendance at township board meetings—one that equals that of almost any of the present board members.

Incumbent **Jerry Cheske** is qualified and has proven a hard worker, but has shown few signs of independent thinking, voting almost all the time with the Greenstein slate.

Also qualified is **Joyce Willis**, but she, like Cheske, may be too slate-minded.

Austin charges must be viewed in context

The race producing by far the most controversy for next Tuesday's primary election is that for the Democratic nomination to fill retiring U.S. Senator **Philip A. Hart's** seat.

Four candidates are running, with the biggest rumpus having been stirred up by Birmingham attorney **James Ellsman's** charges that his opponent, Secretary of State **Richard Austin**, has been financing his campaign by kickbacks from branch office managers.

Given Austin's previous excellent record for integrity and decency, these are serious charges.

BUT THEY must be understood in context if they are to be properly evaluated.

1) The practice of making Secretary of State branch managers patronage appointments with kickbacks paid to whichever political party controlled the office is as old as the hills. When former Secretary of State, Democrat **James Hare**, took over the office from the Republican incumbents, he found the patronage system already in place; he developed and refined it.

2) When Austin was elected Secretary of State in 1970, he started eliminating the patronage system for branch managers. Although the agreement that eventually all branch managers should be under civil service was bi-partisan, Austin worked diligently to implement it. In addition, after Ellsman made his charges, Austin unilaterally announced that henceforth he would operate all branch offices on the merit system and that he would not solicit campaign contributions from branch managers.

3) The custom of branch managers giving their boss gifts was also established when Austin entered office in 1970. Evidently, he accepted the gift for only one year and thereafter stopped the practice. In addition, it appears that the size of the gift—around \$2,000—is not particularly large when compared with the approximately \$700,000 in political contributions that Austin raised for himself and his party from branch managers during his tenure.

THE POINT of all this is not to minimize the issue raised about **Richard Austin's** fitness to hold office in the Senate. Rather, it is to try to place

the charges in a context and to try to insure that a fine man's reputation is not unfairly smudged. Each voter will have to make up his or her minds about the charges on Tuesday.

One important factor in this evaluation is whether the charges of financial impropriety, which inhere in the patronage system surrounding the Secretary of State rather than in **Richard Austin** personally, are really relevant to the Senate race.

There are a number of important differences on the issues and in qualifications between Austin and his major opponents, Reps. **James O'Hara** (D-Mt. Clemens) and **Donald Riegle** (D-Flint).

I happen to prefer O'Hara, on the basis that he has 18 years of experience in Washington, has been thinking hard about national issues for those 18 years, and has a solid record as a productive, sensible legislator.

Austin has been an excellent Secretary of State, humanizing the office and running it with efficiency. He is a person of decency, humanity, and a remarkable concern for people. He is somewhat more liberal than O'Hara on issues such as bus-

ing and abortion, and for voters who prefer a liberal he would be an excellent choice. Riegle's campaign so far has been characterized by a bewildering use of supposed poll results to prove he is leading; two weeks ago, his press secretary resigned from the campaign, charging that Riegle was misrepresenting his polls.

The point of all of this is that while the charges against Austin are serious, they must be evaluated in a context. Given that context, there is then a real question about whether they are relevant to the important issue in the senatorial primary: Whether the man will make a good successor for **Phil Hart**.

Martha Mahan was a true woman of valor.

She was a gutsy lady, unafraid to tackle the struggle and laugh in its face.

Martha was a topnotch newspaper reporter, a real pro, pecking away with two fingers on her typewriter and breaking the shell of the toughest "clam" to get a story—and a damn good one.

She had a rendezvous with death, but with her unconquerable spirit, she postponed that meeting for more years than even her doctors believed possible. She refused to fold her hands and acquiesce.

"LET THE surgeons and the chemotherapists worry about my cancer," she would say with a laugh that rang with Martha's courage and determination. "I'll worry about staying alive."

And stay alive she did, through pain and suffering and deterioration and long days and nights in hospitals where she was poked and probed and cut and treated with powerful drugs to prolong the battle. Always smiling, she would say, "I feel just fine. I can't wait to get back to work."

Martha clung to life with superhuman power. She had goals to fight for and they all revolved around her family. One was to see her eldest daughter, "little Martha," happily married and settled.

The mother of the bride plunged into preparations for the wedding in defiance of her weariness after putting in an eight-hour day on the Observer Newspaper. MARTHA INSISTED her younger daughter, **Joyce**, go away to college and begin to cut the apron strings in preparation for the inevitable. That was another goal she lived to see fulfilled. She encouraged her girls to

make their own lives and become self-reliant women instead of keeping them too close though she needed their help.

Martha used to work for the Associated Press and so did her husband, **Pete**, who retired a few years ago because of illness. Martha fought with all her strength to share her indomitable heart and soul with Pete and leave him a legacy of courage.

Martha drank deeply of life. She was a lover of stringent words said rightly, not of small words, hiding and simpering lightly. She was a lover of truth, earthiness and ultimate words that leaving, snap the jaw shut.

She might have said, "Let beauty not die for me. Let dawn and sunset, twilight, color, sunlight and the touch of earth hold their thrill to the last. Make the music sweet and still the noise that time makes passing by."

WHEN WE remember Martha, we think of her smoking cigarettes, drinking coffee, reading a mystery novel, getting the scoop no other reporter could dig up, laughing from her toes. She said when she could no longer do things for herself with dignity and pride, she'd be ready to toss in the sponge.

In the many hospital rooms she lay in, more and more towards the end, a pair of boxing gloves hung over the bed. A fellow newspaperman gave them to her for luck, a symbol of the tough fighter she was. The gloves were there until the end. But Martha's luck ran out and the fight was over.

In her weakness, she said, "I never thought I'd be a quitter. I never wanted to give up and I don't want to leave Pete and the girls. But I can't live like this." That was the first time I saw her cry. And then she uttered a typical Marthasm about how crappy life can be. And we both laughed.

MARTHA'S DEATH July 28 was a technical knockout. She was a champion prize-

fighter who had won every round but the last. But she still went down on the count of 10.

There's a poem by **Edmund Vance Cooke**, written many years ago, and it could have been dedicated to Martha. If it wasn't then, it is now.

Let's defeat litter lobby

The "bottle bill" will be on the Nov. 3 ballot despite the powerful efforts of powerful groups to bury it.

The bottle bill is the effort to ban throwaway beverage bottles by requiring a 10-cent deposit on pop and beer bottles.

For that kind of money, litterbugs are less inclined to discard their empties in the parks and along the roadsides. Even if they do continue to litter, however, the 10-cent deposit is a strong inducement for others to pick up the bottles.

THE BOTTLE BILL was brought to the ballot by the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and a host of organized and individual helpers.

Weeping crocodile tears, the enemies of the bottle bill went to court attempting to halt the effort. They attacked the title on the petitions and the time frame in which the petition signatures were collected. Recently, they lost.

The enemies were the litter lobby (they call themselves "convenience packagers"), the AFL-CIO (representing the unions involved) and the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce.

Their court arguments rang falsely. They weren't concerned with legal niceties. They make money out of producing litter—that's the long and the short of it.

The role of the state chamber in helping the litter lobby was particularly disturbing. We had expected a higher level of environmental concern from the chamber because a clean environment is, after all, very good business.

HAVING LOST its effort to keep the bottle bill off the ballot, the litter lobby can now be relied upon to conduct an expensive, rough campaign laden with bad statistics to con voters into rejecting the ballot proposal.

We base this judgment on the way the litter lobby behaved when arguing its case in front of the State Resource Recovery Commission. First,

the litter lobby demanded time to argue the matter. Then it bawled out the Resource Recovery Commission for "wasting" so much time considering the matter.

That is colossal arrogance. That is the way the litter lobby operates. The going may get unpleasant before the votes are counted.

THE ESSENCE of the litter lobby campaign, as we have seen it, is that the bottle bill won't really solve the problem; that pop and beer bottles and cans are only a small portion of the litter problem; and that the solution is "education."

You can test those arguments for yourself in the coming months:

• If you see beverage bottles and cans as the most prevalent kind of nondegradable litter in shopping center parking lots—

• If you walk a mile of county or state road and count the pieces of litter you see, and calculate what proportion are beverage containers that would be banned by the bottle bill—

• If you visit a park on a Sunday afternoon and see what has been left on the ground—

You will convince yourself that the litter lobby is, in fact, responsible for the mess. You will also no doubt conclude that the vast amounts of education about litter have failed, and that the only course is to vote for the bottle bill and try to ban the junk.

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Voters duped on fire millage

On May 18, 1976, the voters were asked to approve a fire millage which they did. It would seem reasonable that any intelligent, fair-minded, elected government body would have had estimates of the cost of building and equipping a fire station prior to a request to the electorate for funding.

The millage approval ballot should have reflected the actual costs of the station as needed.

Alas!—Not so under the direction of the Canton supervisor with his team. (Note, a well-trained team responds to the driver.)

Requests at prior board meetings by residents to put on the ballot only that exact cost which was needed were completely ignored.

The "team" and driver balked. One might as well have discussed the requirements with an educated fool as with the present controlled board team (excluding Poole, Myers, and Schwal).

The team apparently searched the statutes to find a law which would legally allow a millage limit far in excess of that which was needed.

Behold! We have found one—PA33 which allowed assessment up to 10 mills for 10 years on all property in the fire district.

Over the expressed objections of some of the residents at the township board meeting, the supervisor-controlled team had a rushed-through ballot put up before the voters. This recently approved ballot permits the board of trustees to assess up to 10 mills for 10 years.

According to the citizen's advisory council, which conducted a study of the millage requirements of the second fire station, the requirements were as follows; approximately one to 1 1/2 mills for the first year for construction and equipping the first year, and declining to zero for the third year for construction and equipping a second fire station. Extra fire trucks were available at the first station.

Talking horse sense

Giddy-ap-gee—whoo—backup—haw easy—whoo—backup—steady—easy whoa....

The above language is familiar to old-timers, but younger residents may wonder about such gibberish.

First, we would describe a "team."

To a farmer, a team usually meant a pair or more of horses or mules harnessed and used to perform tasks requiring power on farms, ranches, in lumbering—etc.

Two to five horse teams were used for power on farms in this area before the introduction of the farm tractor.

The signals from a team driver were usually as follows: giddy-ap or gidap, an order to go ahead; whoa or whoo, an order to stop; gee, an order to veer right; haw, an order to veer left; or backup, an order to reverse.

It should be noted that a team of two-three-four or more horses was invariably controlled by the driver, who called out all orders to the team.

However, the driver also held a pair of reins, which were securely fastened to a "bit" in each horse's mouth.

Tough-mouthed horses were fitted with "pinch" bits in their mouth. If the team did not respond to verbal command, a tug on the reins by the driver sharply pinched the bit on the horse's tongue to remind him to do what the driver ordered.

We farmers thought that during these days when so much self-credit is usurped by a "team" it would be well to let those unfamiliar with teams know that a team is always under direction and order from one driver (even football teams).

A team is under the ultimate control of one man by means of reins (or strings) and the string or rein controlled team is not allowed freedom of action.

In conclusion, we urge all voters to vote for candidates who are not a team with strings or reins attached who must respond to the driver.

Stempien urges crime reforms

Marvin Stempien, a Democratic candidate for Congress, has urged that there be "no more crime without punishment."

Stempien discussed the need for new crime control measures at a Superior Township Democratic Club meeting.

"It is said that a person born in urban America today stands a greater risk of being murdered than he would have faced in combat in World War II," Stempien said. "We can't counter crime with law and order slogans. We must translate our concern through firm public leadership."

Stempien spoke of the urgent need for a new overall approach to crime prevention.

"Greater emphasis should be placed on giving law enforcement departments the manpower and equipment they need to prevent crime and apprehend those who commit it," Stempien said.

He endorsed the need to reduce congestion in the courts by making them more efficient, and by increasing the number of judges and prosecutors.

"Mandatory sentences, especially for violent crimes," he said, "must be imposed quickly or the deterrent effect may be lost."

Stempien has also called for reform of penal laws, by reducing good time parole provisions that allow still dangerous criminals to be released prematurely into society.

Pierce hails Mondale choice

Dr. Ed Pierce, a Democratic candidate for the 2d Congressional District nomination in Tuesday's primary, has hailed the nomination of Walter Mondale as the party's vice-presidential candidate.

Pierce, who runs the Summit Medical Center in Ann Arbor for low-income families, said he is "delighted with the choice of Mondale," a U.S. Senator from Minnesota, "because it further reassures me that the Democrats have a ticket which will have a compassionate as well as a sensible view toward solving our domestic problems."

Pierce also said that he is confident that Jimmy Carter, the Democratic presidential nominee, "could become a strong president, who would help to unify the country."

An American history class required a project, and Karen, whose grandmother was living with her family at the time, chose to research her family tree.

She talked to Mrs. Binnie and listed the various family members and their progeny. She became so interested in the project that the next summer her mother offered her a trip to Bolivar, Pa., where Mrs. Binnie grew up and where a number of relatives still lived.

Karen worked on the genealogy some through the next year. But then after graduation she went to Schoolcraft College and then married Kenneth Burman and then they lived in several parts of the country as the Army moved them around, and somehow the notebook filled with family history got pushed aside.

THEN SEVERAL THINGS started turning her thoughts, and those of others in the clan, back to family history.

Gets her money back

Determined Debbie refuses to be taken by travel firm

Your are about to be introduced to a young woman who wouldn't allow herself to be ripped off.

Meet Debbie Rzeppa, a resident of Livonia, who began her own consumer protection fight more than two years ago. After much patient persistence, she finally won her battle.

"I'd do it again," declared Miss Rzeppa, who received the \$237 for which she sued plus an additional \$12.50 for her costs. Unfortunately, she received no compensation for the hours spent preparing and fighting her case, except unless you count a useful store of legal and financial information in case she should ever decide to hang out a shingle as a lawyer.

"If more people sued, companies would be less likely to do these things, especially if the judges were behind the people," she said.

Miss Rzeppa found our legal system confusing.

"There should be some better way people can get their money back from companies which are not ethical," she continued. "It took almost a year from the decision of the judge to the time I cashed the check paid to me."

Despite her new legal information she has not been drawn toward the legal profession as a career. Instead, she hopes to take up occupational therapy, her interest prodded recently because of the foster child with cerebral palsy living in her parents' home.

MISS RZEPPA became involved in her fight in 1973 while a senior at Stevenson High School. Class members planned a trip to Acapulco, a destination that was changed to the Bahamas when the travel company selling the trip went bankrupt.

Claiming they were doing it out of the goodness of their heart, another company picked up the students' trip. "But they were the same people we were dealing with before," claimed Miss Rzeppa.

Close to departure time, the company, Campus International Travel Corp., announced it was having trouble locating a plane and would have to use an airship smaller the originally planned. Therefore, only those who had paid their full \$229 plus an additional \$20 could go.

Miss Rzeppa had paid in full but didn't have check stubs to prove it, so was sidelined. The group went to Freeport without her.

More than 200 bucks is important to everyone, and especially important to a teen-ager, so she naturally wondered about her money.

A letter from the Ann Arbor firm told her that if she would cancel the agreement, they would send her \$100.

ABOUT THEN our heroine moved into that physio-psychological state known as getting her dander up. She wanted justice. She wanted her money.

Filing complaints with the Better Business Bureau and the Consumer Protection

Agency in Lansing were the initial steps taken.

"Next I went to the free law day on May 1 put on by the Livonia Bar Association," she said, referring to a time set aside by area lawyers in honor of national law observance day on which they will advise members of the public on general legal questions and the more simple matters that can be handled easily.

"As a result, on my way home I stopped in at the 18th district court in Livonia and picked up the papers I would need to take the company to court," continued Miss Rzeppa. "I filled them out and returned them by evening."

Court day was about a month later. "I was very nervous," she laughed. "My knees were shaking when I went before the judge."

Judge James R. McCann came through for her and awarded a judgement in her favor.

"I waited a month and didn't get the money," she said.

BACK TO COURT went the plaintiff to find out what to do next. She filled out a paper which would enable the court to obtain property from the company and sell it for the complainant.

But that didn't work. Back she went to sign further documents of this kind, a second time, a third time.

"I kept going every Friday to the court house to see if the money had come in and to find out what progress was being made," she explained.

But the key of the matter lay in the firm's bank account, and after it was discovered what bank this was in, she signed a garnishment on the account.

"I waited 30 days to see if they paid, then another 30 days," she said. "After that they sent the money through the court."

THE SCHOOLCRAFT College graduate who now attends Eastern Michigan University, said she felt relieved when she pocketed her cash because she had spent so much time on it.

"I was bound and determined they were not going to do this to me," she maintained. "At times I felt like giving up, it was so discouraging. The money kept me going. I wasn't working, and whenever I needed money I thought about that check."

Miss Rzeppa believes that there were quite a few in the Stevenson group who lost more than \$100 on the ill-fated venture. "But as far as I know no one else tried to sue."

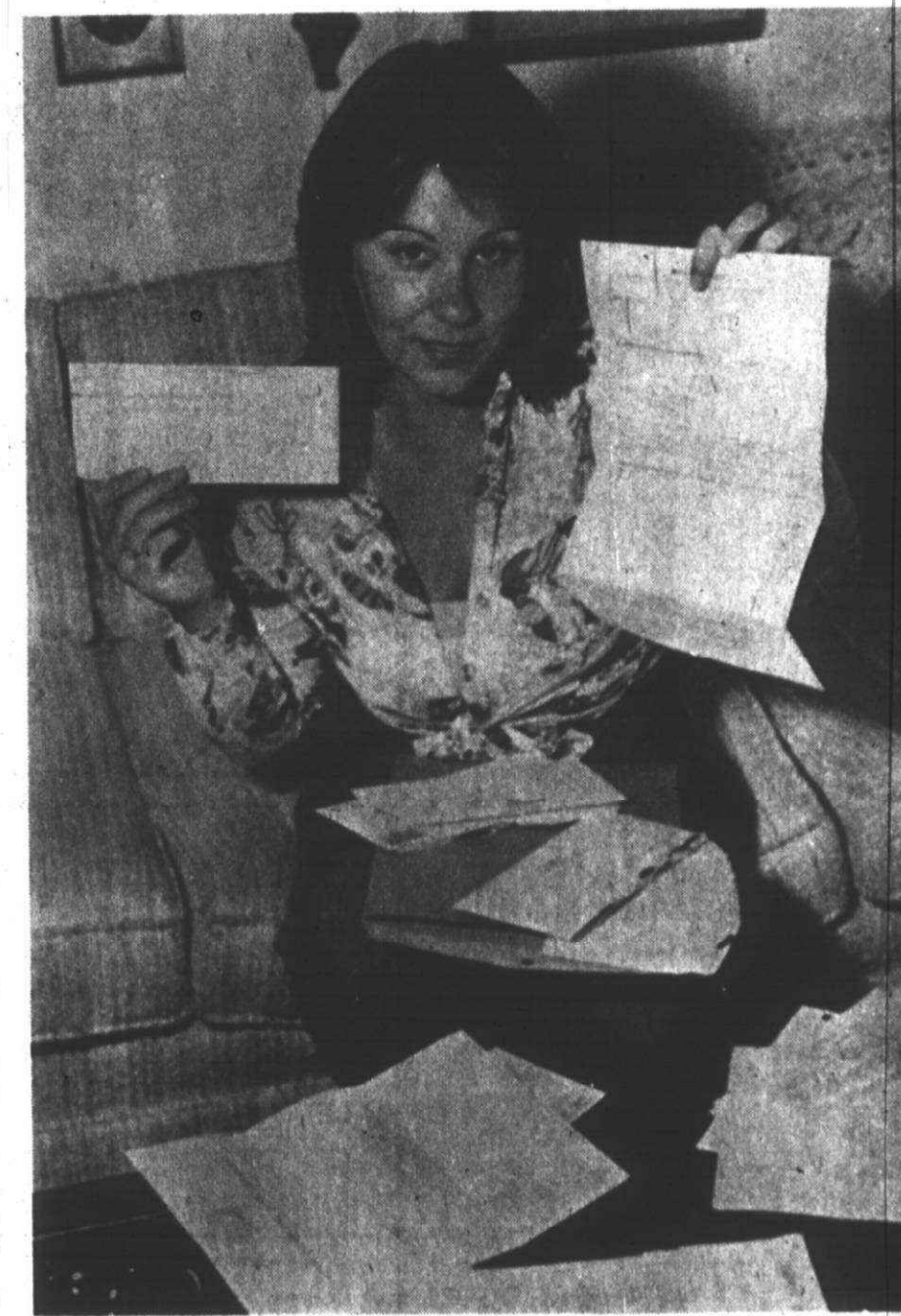
She added that she finally got her trip to the Bahamas with a different company.

Will the experience make her a more careful consumer?

"In something that large I would be more careful," she stated. "With a small sum of money probably not. But it pays to be careful with a large amount."

However, she apparently feels strongly as ever about standing up for her consumer rights.

"The company which arranged our trip to the Bahamas promised us a party," she said. "When they didn't give it, we complained, and then got it."

Don't forget to be a blood donor

The American Red Cross urged individuals to give blood before they leave on vacation to keep hospital blood demands at maximum levels during the summer months.

It also urged vacationers to drive safely and be extra cautious in unfamiliar surroundings.

Blood donors must be at least 17 years old and weigh 110 pounds. They may give blood every eight weeks, but not more than five times a year.

The entire procedure takes only 40 minutes, and 30 minutes of the time is spent getting the donor's medical history, blood pressure, temperature, and giving him a short rest with refreshments after the donation.

Livonia's blood donor center is located at 15425 Middle Belt. Its hours are from 2-4 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Thursday and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday and Friday. Saturday hours are from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

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

For Martha Mahan, my colleague both at the Associated Press and later on this newspaper, faced problems that might have overwhelmed most of us with determination and a matter-of-fact approach I could only watch in amazement.

Knowing her and working with her as she battled cancer for years, I lost count of the trips to hospitals for treatment as new problems developed. I imagine she lost count too.

But always, she just put her mind on doing or having done what was necessary so she could get on with her life.

SHE KNEW a great deal of pain, but rarely did anyone else know about it. She kept a cheerful outlook and went to work turning out copy.

She knew a great deal of worry over a husband also plagued by illness. There

were times when they were in two separate hospitals, and she seemed more mindful of his problems than her own.

She knew the joys and frustrations familiar to any of us who have borne and reared children. She gave her daughters a great love she expressed through understanding and respect.

She did much fine reporting, but in recent years, her decreased mobility and frequent sick leave time left her handling more and more of the routine, less exciting tasks. To these, she always gave her best.

SHE PUT ASIDE personal problems to take on family and professional life with lively interest and appreciative enjoyment.

A lot of nice things are being said about her this week, but I think none would please her more than the comment of one longtime associate: "She sure was a lot of fun."

Time and again, when no one thought Martha could bounce back, she did just

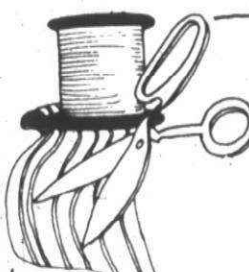

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Catholic Social Services opens branch office

A new source of help for needs ranging from family counseling to adoption home studies is on hand in this area with the opening of a Livonia office of Catholic Social Services of Wayne County.

Two social workers and a secretary began operations last week in a suite of offices at 17316 Farmington Road, just south of St. Aidan Catholic Church.

The agency, which elected to locate its third office in the northwest suburbs because of many requests, will hold open house from 4-6 p.m. Friday, July 30, to show its new facilities to the public.

Catholic Services, emphasized assistant director Bernard Kazyak, is not a denominational social agency. Rather, he said, it draws the major portion of its support from the United Foundation and is open to all who wish to avail themselves of its services.

"WE RECEIVED about 20 calls in the first few days we were open and started immediately to set up appointments," Kazyak said.

"We are starting with marital and family adjustment counseling, and will soon be offering a full range of services, including adoption."

Problem pregnancy counseling will be included in the agency's services, he added, and it will be concerned with alternatives to abortion.

"We follow the Catholic Church's position on that matter," Kazyak stated.

KAZYAK AND Mrs. Margaret Meyers, a Westland social worker who will work with Karen Dorjath in staffing the new branch, indicated the range of requests for service here are pretty similar to those received in the first two offices, one located on Hamilton Street in Detroit and the other in Taylor.

"People are seeking help on all kinds of relationship problems," said Mrs. Meyers, who has done psychiatric social work at Wayne County General Hospital.

"There seem to be many who need help on marital problems, and also requests for working out difficulties with teen children and in employment situations."

"More men are seeking counseling, and that's good. They seem to be more willing than formerly to come in with their partners, and they are making the initial call more often."

COSTS FOR COUNSELING at the agency are in the area of \$35 an hour with adjustments possible based on individual ability to pay, Mrs. Meyers said. "And we don't refuse service to anyone," she added.

There also is a ceiling on the number of hours of paid counseling, so that in cases of long-term needs the United Foundation money picks up the payments.

Mrs. Meyers and Miss Dorjath both have the degree of Master of Social Work.

THE AGENCY newly locating here represents a merger of several help groups with histories going back to 1870.

At that time the Daughters of Charity and Providence Hospital both began service to unmarried mothers, and that led to functioning as an adoption agency.

St. Vincent de Paul was founded in 1912 as a foster care service for children who for various reasons could not stay in their own homes, and in 1946 the Catholic Family Services began to offer a full range of family counseling services. In 1957 came the merger of the Daughters of Charity, St. Vincent de Paul and the Catholic Family Services into the Catholic Social Services of Wayne County as it is known today.

Orchard Lake Schools to host national meeting

The Orchard Lake Schools will be the scene of an all-day national conference Aug. 12, involving 19 members of the Catholic hierarchy from Poland and leaders of the Polish American community.

The special meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. last until 3 p.m. with a break for lunch at noon on the schools' campus northwest of Detroit.

An invitation is extended to all Polish American priests and religious, both men and women; to Polonia's leaders, especially the national officers of the Polish American fraternal and other important organizations; and to Polish Americans generally who are interested.

More detailed information may be obtained from the office of the president-rector of Orchard Lake Schools.

LED BY CARDINAL Karol Wojtyla, of Krakow, the Polish bishops will be at Orchard Lake Aug. 11-12-13 after spending a week at the 41st International Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia.

The conference at Orchard Lake fulfills one of Cardinal Wojtyla's main wishes for coming to America, to have the bishops meet with as many important individuals of the American Polonia as possible.

"Cardinal Wojtyla repeatedly has asked us to provide an opportunity to meet with Polish American community leaders," Fr. Walter J. Ziemia, president-rector of the Orchard Lake Schools, said. "We at Orchard Lake have agreed to act as hosts for this special conference."

Cardinal Wojtyla will open the conference with introductory remarks on the church in Poland today.

Other bishops will speak on topics including the clergy and vocations, the laity and their organizations, pastoral care of the faithful, liturgy; religious education of youth and children, building of churches, mass media, education and culture in Poland, and dangers and hopes for the future.

A discussion and question-and-answer period will follow.

WHILE AT ORCHARD LAKE, the bishops will experience the same busy schedule that will mark their entire six-week visit to the United States.

After the conference, the bishops will be the concelebrants at a mass in Polish at 5 p.m. at St. Albertus Church in Detroit and, after the mass, the guests of honor at a reception at the Warren Chateau in Warren. Tickets are available by contacting Orchard Lake.

The bishops now are beginning to arrive in America. During the week of Aug. 1-8 they will be in Philadelphia for the Eucharistic Congress. Cardinal John Krol will be their host. A "side trip" to Doylestown, Pa., is also planned.

After the Congress, the bishops will spend two days in Washington, hosted by Archbishop Joseph Bernardin, chairman of the United States Bishops Conference, and Bishop James Rausch, secretary of the conference.

From Orchard Lake, the bishops will go their separate ways to visit the following dioceses of Boston, Buffalo, New York, Brooklyn, Scranton, Cleveland, Syracuse, Milwaukee, Hartford, Detroit, Toledo, Gary, Wilmington, Omaha, Pittsburgh, Miami, Providence, and Trenton.

LWV congressional voters guide

How do the 2d Congressional District candidates view the solutions to the unemployment problem, inflation and energy issues?

The League of Women Voters surveyed the two Republicans and five Democrats seeking their party's nomination in next Tuesday's primary.

The candidates' answers to three questions and their resumes were supplied to the Observer & Eccentric to help voters make up their minds.

The two Republican candidates are State Sen. Carl Pursell of Plymouth and Ronald Trowbridge, an Ann Arbor City Councilman.

The five Democrats are Delbert Hoffman, Monroe County commissioner; Dr. Edward Pierce of Ann Arbor, who came within 81 votes of winning the congressional nomination in 1974; Miss Mary Robek, Eastern Michigan University professor of administrative services and business education; John Spillson, unemployed Monroe resident who formerly worked for Monroe Auto Equipment Co., and Marvin Stem-

pien, Livonia attorney and former state legislator.

Pursell, 43, of 46200 N. Territorial Rd., Plymouth, has his BA and MA from Eastern Michigan University, is a former businessman and teacher, Plymouth Chamber of Commerce president, former county commissioner, and member of the state Senate for six years. He won the federal government's Environmental Protection Agency award for Michigan for his work in environmental issues.

Trowbridge, 38, is an associate professor of English at Eastern Michigan and has been on the Ann Arbor City Council for 18 months, has a BA, MA, and Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He is editor of the Michigan Academician of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters.

Hoffman, 31, of Monroe is a plant security man at Ford Motor Co. in Monroe and has been a township supervisor, county commissioner, Kiwanis Club member, dep-

uty sheriff and in church groups for many years.

Pierce, 46, of Ann Arbor, is a physician who founded the Summit Medical Center in Ann Arbor in 1968 for low-income families, and a former Ann Arbor City Councilman. He is a past member of the executive committee of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor.

Miss Robek, 49, of Ypsilanti, previously worked in the U.S. Office of Price Administration; Maritime Commission and the Manpower Training and Development program. She has a BEd from the University of Wisconsin, MA from Northwestern University, and a Ph.D. from University of Michigan.

Spillson, 27, of Monroe attended Cleary College, Eastern Michigan and Monroe Community College. He previously worked for an auto equipment company and was a siene and shrimp fisherman in Florida.

Stempien, 42, of 14322 Cranston, Livonia, served three terms in the state House of Representatives and was formerly House Majority Leader. He is an attorney with offices in Livonia and was the Democratic nominee for Congress in 1972. Stempien is also active in St. Michael Catholic Church Parish Council in Livonia.

List two ways Congress can help ease high unemployment.

Pursell: Congress must exercise fiscal discipline to control inflation. This would allow our economy to expand at a rate of six to seven per cent, thus new private jobs would be created. I do not support government being our "full time employer." Government can help in "emergency cases only."

Trowbridge: I would motivate private enterprise to create jobs through capital investment via the jobs creation act. I would reduce deficit spending and subsequent government borrowing so as to free up capital loans from lending institutions to private enterprise.

Hoffman: I would private an incentive program for business to create jobs of a permanent nature. People, physically and mentally capable, on programs like welfare should be required to work for the betterment of their community, like drain improvements, cleanup projects on rivers, parks, roadways and public grounds.

Pierce: Our unemployed must be put back to work, a job the current administration has not taken seriously. The federal government must provide tax incentives to private industry to diversify job opportunities in hard-hit areas like southeastern Michigan and when necessary become the employer of last resort.

Robek: I would cut taxes for industry so that it can use the money saved to replace obsolete plans and machinery and build new plants in order to be more competitive world-wide. For unskilled persons, the government should be the employer of last resort.

Spillson: Unemployment is part of the overall economic problem. The solution to the problem is inexpensive energy. Laser fusion is the answer. Laser fusion, coupled with the full strength of the Humphrey-Hawkins Bill, would provide the necessary means of attaining full employment.

Stempien: This should be the task of the private sector. Congress must limit the federal reserves' ability to restrict money supply which would reduce interest rates and allow the private sector to expand. Tax credits can also encourage private job creation. Government should assume the role of "employer of last report."

List two ways you would like to see Congress ease the high inflation rate.

Pursell: Congress and the President must say NO to excessive spending demands. Wasteful spending must be stopped. I do not support government establishing price and wage controls, however, there must be reasonable restraint

by business and labor to curtail excessive price and wage demands.


Trowbridge: I would cut spending growth so as to reduce heavy government borrowing that bids up inflationary interest rates. I would balance the budget so as to "reduce the liberal printing of new, inflationary money."

Hoffman: There should be a people-oriented federal investigation, like into food pricing, drugs and the like. The costs and savings should be passed onto the consumer. Large chains should have been able to sell it (soda pop) cheaper than a small store rather than higher.

Pierce: Inflation, which is literally eat-



ing the middle-class and poor, must be attacked. One way is to cut the fat from federal spending, specially the overblown military budget. If absolutely necessary, we also have at our disposal the tool of wage, price and profit controls.

Robek: I would cut all unnecessary federal spending and eliminate obsolete programs, and balance the budget.

Spillson: Inflation, same as unemployment, is part of the overall economic problem. The solution to it is contingent to inexpensive energy. Unless the demand-pull and cost-push inflation is checked, people will be unable to afford anything. An inexpensive source of energy such as laser fusion would take the stress off of commodities thus easing inflation.

Stempien: I would cut unnecessary government spending. Sunset laws, requiring

periodic re-examination of programs and zero-based budgeting are necessary steps. I would restore genuine competition to our free economy by strengthening anti-trust laws and Justice Department anti-trust division budget.

Do you consider conservation of present energy sources to be as important as the development of new energy sources? Yes or no. Explain.

Pursell: Absolutely (yes) as the Michigan recipient of the 1976 environmental award. I have spent years encouraging everyone to recycle and conserve. My resource recovery act is considered the best law in the U.S. We have been a wasteful nation. Education will play the major role.

Trowbridge: No. While conservation of present energy sources is extremely valuable, its value is exceeded only by the necessity of the U.S. to develop its own energy sources and to become less dependent

ent upon other countries. Compromise between conservation and self-sufficient energy production is necessary.

Hoffman: Yes. Recycling should be of major importance along with energy research. The 1975 budget has \$4 billion for pollution control and abatement, \$1.5 billion for energy research and development. Of the \$1.5 billion, about \$1 billion was for nuclear energy. There is much promise in solar, wind, hydrogen and other sources which can be of a lesser polluting nature.

Pierce: Yes. I consider conservation of present energy sources to be critical, because new sources are either limited themselves or not yet ready for safe and economical use. Conservation can allow us to develop new sources with careful pre-planning and help move us toward energy independence.

Don't destroy Wilcox Lake

Editor:

I am absolutely furious with W.W. Edgar's article concerning Wilcox Lake and Bob McCracken's horrendous ideas on dredging the lake to make a ski hill in order to attract new people to the Plymouth area.

Whatever happened to the idea of going to Hines Drive Park to take advantage of a little bit of green grass, picnic areas and swings?

The area across from Wilcox was dredged last year to make a larger, smoother ice skating pond. Now we are to destroy the last area to which the ducks could flee from the crowds of people we already have attracted to Plymouth. We are building a walkway to their island, for another smoother skating pond.

Two years ago I used to go to the park with neighborhood children to regularly feed the ducks and a Canadian goose. They are gone now and the few remaining ducks don't come close to shore anymore because of the way people have abused and even killed them.

McCracken should get together with the group from Beer Hill. They both are out to destroy the area, a little different motive and method, but the same end results.

League urges 'no' vote on the charter

Editor:

Voters in the proposed City of Plymouth Heights (all of Plymouth Township east of McCumpha Road) will vote Aug. 3 whether to adopt a charter which would create the new municipality.

The League of Women Voters of Northville, Plymouth, Canton, Novi is opposed to the adoption of the charter for the City of Plymouth Heights because it is opposed to the formation of that city.

In 1959 the City of Plymouth Heights was originated to avoid annexation, and the residents of that portion of Plymouth Township affected have not really had an opportunity since 1959 to indicate by vote whether they want a separate city, only a chance to accept or reject the charter.

There is no accounting for new community members and population increase.

The plan for a City of Plymouth Heights leaves a problem of equitable division of liabilities and assets between the proposed city and the remainder of Plymouth Township. The remaining portion of the township would have no real tax base.

This fragmentation of intergovernmental units (i.e., City of Plymouth, City of Plymouth Heights and Plymouth Township) would lead to competition and not co-operation among the governmental units, blocking orderly growth and development of the community.

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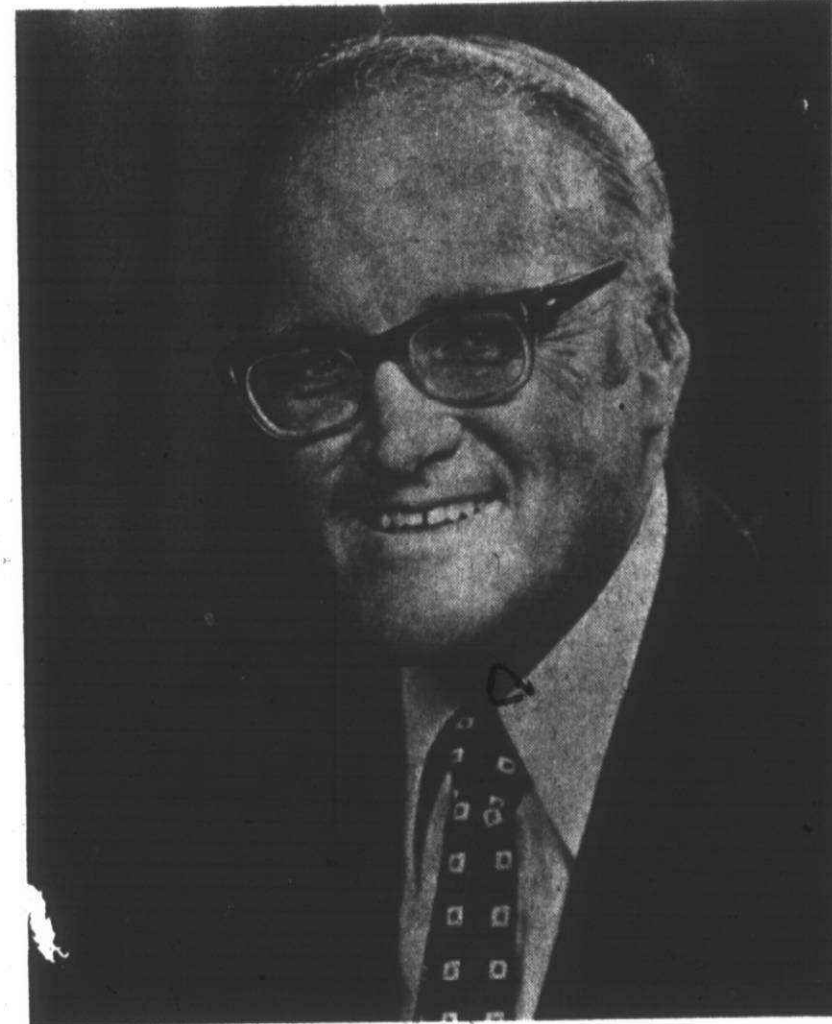

Included in the number are the Jackson County Fair and Petunia Festival at Jackson, Aug. 1-7; Ingham County Fair, Aug. 2-7; Mason; the Iona Fair—largest free fair of its kind—Aug. 6-15; Ionia; the Northern Michigan Fair at Cheboygan and the Western Michigan Fair, Ludington, Aug. 15-21; Upper Peninsula State Fair, Escanaba, Aug. 17-22; Northwestern Michigan Fair, Traverse City, Aug. 30-Sept. 5; and the Eastern Michigan Fair, Imlay City, Aug. 30-Sept. 6.

America's first State Fair and one of Michigan's biggest events, the Michigan State Fair, opens Aug. 27 for its annual 11-day spectacular engagement at the State Fairgrounds, Detroit. Among the names appearing on this year's star-studded enter-

tainment roster are the favorite son of TV's "Good Times," "J.J." Jimmy Walker, Boots Randolph, Freddie Fender and The Little Angels of Korea.

The complete list of fair dates is included in the Michigan Calendar of Travel Events available on request from the Travel Bureau, Michigan Department of Commerce, Lansing 48913.

On the ethnic scene, a Polish Festival at Yack Arena, Wyandotte, Aug. 6-8. Detroit's ethnic festival site on the riverfront near Cobo Hall will have the Arab World Festival in residence Aug. 6-8; the Polish Festival, Aug. 13-15; Scandinavian, Aug. 20-22; and East Indian Festival, Aug. 27-29. A fairy tale parade, tennis and slo-ball tournaments, strolling bands, food and refreshments are a few of the things that will attract visitors to the 12th Annual Danish Festival at Greenville, Aug. 20-22.

Regular and working displays will be included in the Upper Peninsula Gem and

Mineral Show in Lakeview Arena, Marquette, Aug. 6-8. Home cooking, dancing and an "Islanders vs. Mainlanders" baseball game will highlight Welcome Day and Homecoming on Beaver Island, Aug. 8.

The days when copper was king are the motivation for the Coppertown USA Festival, Aug. 8-15, at Calumet, thriving center of Michigan's copper boom.

Paray conducts with vitality

The music for Thursday's (July 22) Meadow Brook Music Festival concert was well chosen. All of it needed a full-time conductor — one who was on his toes to lead an orchestra that could respond to his direction.

The conductor who filled the bill was one of the Detroit area's favorites, Paul Paray. The orchestra, which in almost every case responded accordingly, was the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

The music was strictly gallic and full of rests, ritards and accelerandos. Paray, at a ripe 90 years of age, seems to be an ever-vital conductor despite the failing in his legs. His arms and expressions do not seem to belong to those legs which failed him slightly Thursday causing gasps from the audience.

From the playing of the emotional French national anthem through the Lalo, Berlioz, Bizet and Ravel, it was strictly a night for Francophiles.

PARAY CONDUCTED the Berlioz Overture to "Benvenuto Cellini" with great emotion. He took full advantage of every dramatic moment written into this music, although it proved to be far less interesting than the Chausson Symphony in B-flat which followed.

The first movement of the Chausson was sluggish, but pretty despite its repetitiousness. The second movement was more dramatic, but the third movement was the killer.

In it the trumpet solo was lucid and very well played, as were all the brass passages. The orchestra was really up

for this movement and it made the whole piece come together.

The rendering of the Lalo Overture to "Le Roi D'Ys" afforded the oboe and clarinet players a well deserved bow. Brian Schweickhardt, clarinet, played very sensitively and beautifully in this piece as did his fellow woodwind player, oboist Robert Sorton.

ITALO BABINI, the DSO's first cellist, also played well in a sumptuous Lalo cello solo.

The woodwinds again triumphed in the playing of the Bizet "Carmen" suite. Ervin Monroe, Paul Schaller and Donald Baker got a chance to really show off in this work. But overall the work was conducted too slowly.

One of the most eloquent pieces of music Ravel ever wrote is the Pavane for a dead infant and it was no less than that Thursday evening. However, the tempo was disastrously slow in the beginning, finally picking up toward the end.

The brass section appeared to be out of tune for part of the playing, too. The phrasing seemed less well defined than possible, but the effect was interesting in the end.

Paray's intention with this work was to keep it dramatic, so perhaps the slowness in the beginning only helped to make it more so when the tempo picked up.

It was clear from the audience's reception of Paray's conducting that he'll be a welcome guest on Detroit stages for as long as he wishes to conduct. An unsteady moment or two was not enough to quell the enthusiasm which is inherent in this man's musical soul.

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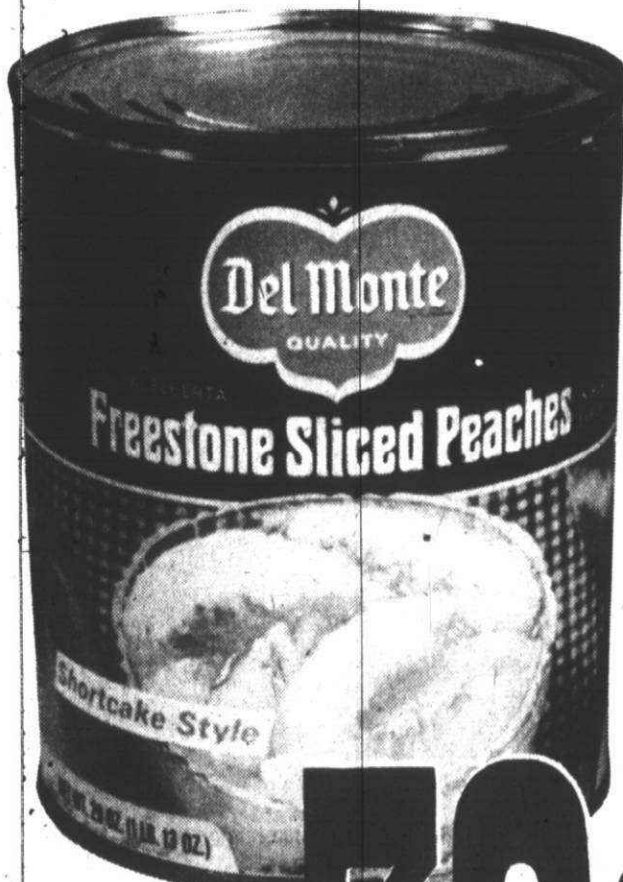
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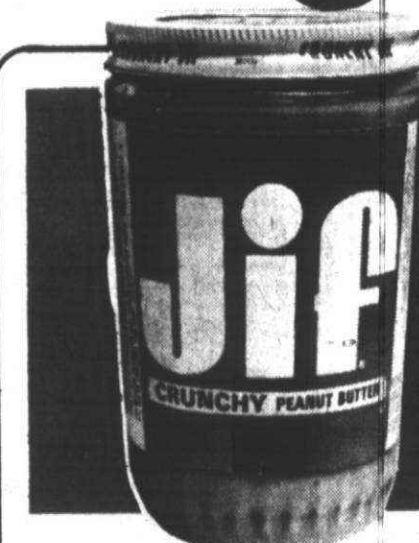
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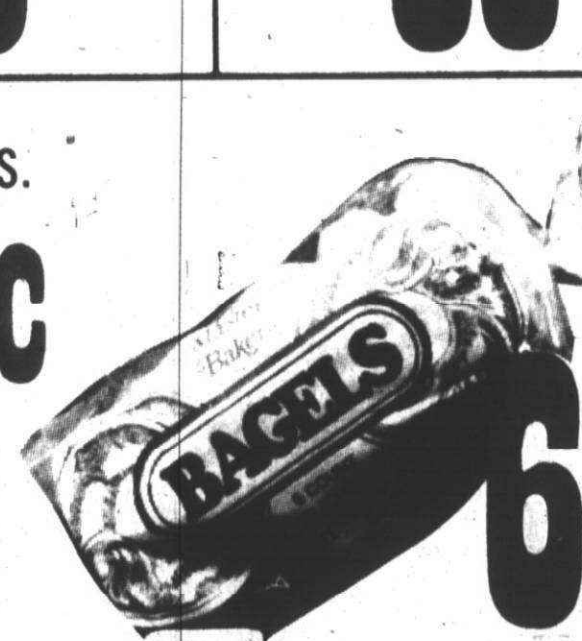
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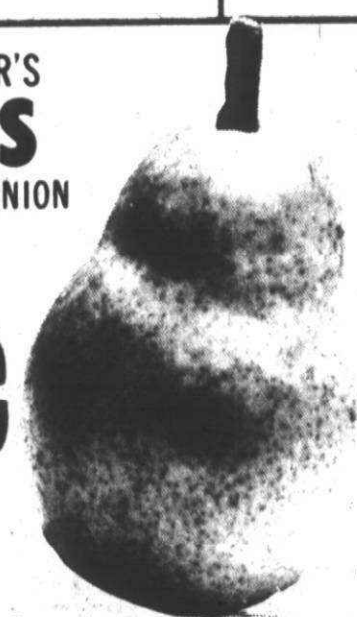
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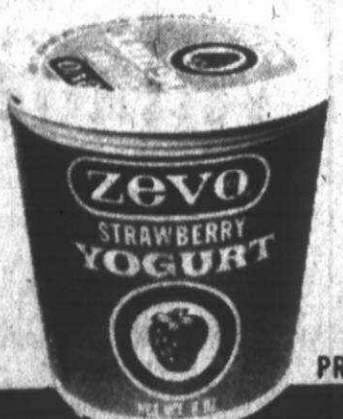

Area runners to compete in Farmington road race

Not everybody can be a winner in the Farmington Founders' Festival Mini-Marathon road race, which will be held this Saturday morning.

To be sure, there'll be lots of prizes and medals waiting for the tape-breakers at the finish line. And for those who don't win, but still manage to complete the 10-mile trot through the streets of Farmington and Farmington Hills, there'll be an unusual honor — the right to run down the middle of Grand River during the Festival parade.

The Mini-Marathon, sponsored by the Farmington YMCA, has been an important part of the Founders' Festival for the past six years. More than 100 runners are expected to participate in this year's race, according to meet director David Heiser.

"This race has had good response from the runners," Heiser said. "We have some outstanding runners from all over Michigan, plus some from Ohio and Canada. I think people like this race because it's always well organized. They can come here, run their race and still have their day free."

"The race is an important part of the Festival," Heiser continued. "It's one of the key events. We get a lot of people who come down just to watch the finish because they know so many people running in it."

The race has four competitive divisions — Open, ages 18-40; Master's, 40 years and over; Women's, 18 years and over; and Youth, boys and girls 17 years and under. The women and the youths will run a special five-mile course.

The runners will assemble at the Farmington Hills City Hall, Eleven Mile and Orchard Lake roads, at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday.

The race route winds west on Eleven Mile to Powers Road, north on Powers to Oakland Community College, through the OCC campus to Farmington Road, north on Farmington to Thirteen Mile Road, west to Drake Road, south on Drake to Grand River, and then on to downtown Farmington by way of Shawwassee and other side streets.

THE LAST half mile will be run down Grand River as the participants become part of the Founders' Festival parade.

"The race will probably finish up at the Farmington City Hall," Heiser said. "But we might extend it a couple of hundred yards and end it at the corner of Oakland and Grand River. There's more open space there, so it won't be so congested at the end."

Ending the race in the middle of the parade, with the marching bands and pretty girls, has become a popular feature, according to Heiser.

Lutri tapped as Glenn grid coach

Gerald Lutri, an assistant coach at Westland John Glenn since 1973, has been chosen to lead the varsity Rocket gridgers into battle during the 1976 campaign.

Lutri replaces Lloyd Carr, who has left Glenn to accept an assistant football coaching position at Eastern Michigan University.

"My background has been with defense," Lutri said. "We take a lot of pride in our defense here (Glenn) and I think that's where our strength lies and how we approach things at this point."

Lutri, admitting that he is very optimistic going into his first season as a head coach, will definitely have a tough act to follow.

The Rockets, under Carr's direction last season, compiled an 8-1 record with their only loss being a 28-13 verdict to eventual Class A state champion Livonia Franklin.

John Harrison, principal at Glenn and a member of the five-man committee which selected Lutri, had high words of praise for Lutri's qualifications and experiences.

Boys 17-20 participate in the Thorobred program.

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

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
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B & G, McNish top league foes

Morgan, a DRC jockey, to test his skills at rodeo

Jockey Mike Morgan first saw the Detroit Race Course and Livonia in 1973 when he was a 19-year-old apprentice. His experience that first day in town compared with a nightmare.

Kentucky owner D.E. Harris held young Morgan's contract at the time. Harris wanted to send a 10-horse contingent from his large stable to Detroit to race but he had no assistant trainers available to accompany the horses on the 400-mile van trip.

Harris trusted Morgan to take charge of the shipment and the young rider dutifully boarded the van and headed for the Motor City.

Unfortunately, when the huge van pulled up to the Middlebelt Road gate at the DRC, a security guard informed the driver that no horses were allowed on the grounds for another week until preparations were made for the new meet.

Morgan tells the story:

"Here I was, 19-years-old and in charge of 10 thoroughbreds with no place to put them and hardly any money in my pocket. I didn't panic. For some reason, I just walked across the street to Forest City, went into a phone booth and looked in the Yellow Pages for horse farms in the area."

"I found one not too far away, called the man and explained that I'd have to pay him later but that the horses' owner (Harris) was good for it and he let me bring that van load to his place and even found me a place to stay."

It's cool thinking like that which has made Morgan one of Detroit's better jockeys. He's extremely competitive on the racetrack as evidenced by his vigorous riding.

The Nebraska rider, who grew up in the town of Walthill (pop. 800), won 107 races at the recent Hazel Park meet and is off to a fine start at DRC.

Tomorrow (Friday) night at 8 p.m., and after a full day of riding at DRC, Mike

Morgan, foolishly some say, will realize a boyhood dream. Morgan never thought of becoming a jockey... he wanted to be a rodeo cowboy.

Morgan will attempt to ride a bull and will also compete in the bareback bronc competition at the fourth annual Farmington Founders Festival Rodeo sponsored by the Jaycees and sanctioned by the International Rodeo Association.

The rodeo will be held at the southwest corner of Twelve Mile Road and Farmington Road. There also will be shows at 2 and 8 p.m. Saturday.

Govt. agencies studying channelization

Two Federal agencies, often at odds over the controversial issue of stream channelization, have put their representatives to work to develop joint nationwide guidelines on that subject for their decisionmakers.

A drafting committee has been formed by the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service to arrive at a final set of rules by year's end if possible. Assisting the committee are the Environmental Protection Agency and the Council on Environmental Quality.

The group was formed as a result of issues which have developed between the two federal agencies which have competing interests in streams. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is interested in keeping the modification of streams to a minimum because of the potential damage which may result to fish and wildlife habitat. The Soil Conservation Service uses stream modification as one method to reduce flood damages or to alleviate drainage problems on lands adjacent to streams.

Both agencies recognize the needs and concerns of the other, and they have signed a memorandum obligating themselves to attempt to resolve this issue. Further, they have set a tentative deadline for the end of the year to arrive at a final set of guidelines that can be used nationwide by both agencies.

The basic design of the guidelines will concentrate on the process of reaching a decision to change or not to change a stream channel. The guidelines will necessarily address more than the technical aspects.

Mobil Lounge and Moeller finished in a tie for first place in the Canton Women's Slow Pitch League last week with Mobil winning the playoff game, 12-6.

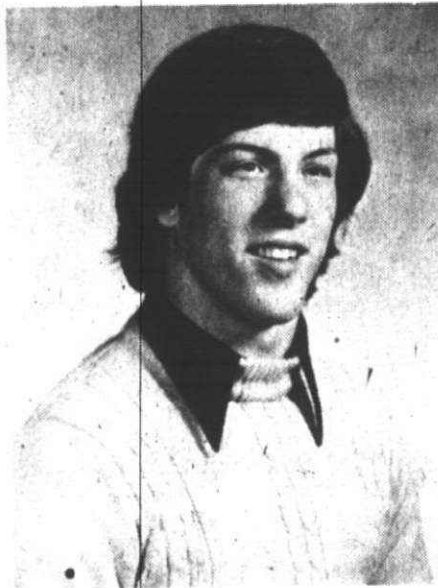

Township form better — Frank

Most residents seem to believe that the township form of government is better for Plymouth Township, reports Nathan Frank Jr., a candidate for Plymouth Township Board of Trustees.

"As I campaigned door to door the last few months, I talked to several hundred homeowners and voters. I found that most homeowners and voters are proud to live in Plymouth Township and have no real complaints about the township.

"They want to stay as a township and they even feel the taxes are much better than in some other communities. A lot of people are concerned about the police protection and asked what they could do to decide if we need a new police department or should we stay with the Wayne County Sheriff Department. Most seem very happy with the job the sheriff is doing, but are concerned about what will happen if the sheriff department cancels out its coverage with the township and what will be the cost for a new police department," Frank adds.

"Many of the people are concerned

about the friction between the school board and township board on who is to pay for crossing guards. They feel they pay a lot of taxes and their children should be protected. They don't care who pays for the crossing guards, but feel the school board should meet at once with the affected governments, make a final decision at once on a policy, and stick with it."

Residents are satisfied with the fire department, Frank added, but don't want large apartment buildings and industrial buildings to go up. "I found most residents to be quite like me and my family—homeowners with large mortgage payments, a car payment, job with security, lots of bills, but living better than ever."

Frank, 32, is married with a three-year-old child, served four years in the U.S. Army, and has been a Wayne County Sheriff deputy for the past five years. He graduated from Garden City High and attended Ferris State College. He is a member of Our Lady of Good Counsel parish, Knights of Columbus, Plymouth Elks and has lived in Plymouth Township eight years.
