Bundarin, Greenstein ask recount

Robert Greenstein and Peter Bundarin, unsuccessful candidates for the office of supervisor, have both paid the \$50 fee to the township clerk demanding a recount of votes in all 10 Canton Township precincts.

Greenstein filed his request Tuesday morning and Bundarin got his in the afternoon. Oddly enough, both Greenstein and Bundarin hope the recount will uncover more write-in votes. But, for Bundarin, that would only be the first step in a complicated post-election strategy in which he hopes to unseat Harold Stein, the apparent winner.

Just before the deadline, Trustee James Poole filed for a recount in precincts four and 10. Voters in precinct 10 told Poole that when they pulled the Republican lever, no x was recorded by his name.

Poole lost to Democratic candidate Eugene Daley by 11 votes.

Bundarin hopes a recount shows that Greenstein has a majority with the write-in stickers. If that happens, Bundarin said he will challenge all write-in sticker votes, because people did not mark an 'X' next to the names on the write-in stickers. If his argument holds up, Bundarin said the township would have to schedule a new election.

Greenstein had hinted previously that he would probably file for a recount, but Bundarin's request came as a surprise.

"We're going into this recount hoping to find more write-in votes," Bundarin said. "If we find more and then are successful in throwing them out, then that will effectively invalidate the election. The courts will order a new election where election results will change because of improper procedure."

Bundarin, who has been in law practice for about a year, said he has researched state election law with a lawyer employed by the 15th District Republican Party and they both feel the write-in votes were not done properly.

CITING MICHIGAN COMBINED Laws Annotated (MCLA) section 168.805, subsection 11, Bundarin said no votes shall be counted unless a cross is marked at the straight party designation or at the place next to a candidate's name.

"The stickers which were counted didn't have crosses next to them," Bundarin said. "Attorney General Frank Kelley delivered a 1968 opinion which said that even with write-in stickers, there must be a place to mark a cross. You can't even have stickers printed up with the cross already on it. According to Kelley, the voter must place the cross or 'X' on the sticker himself."

"So, in essence, when people put a sticker on the machine, they are putting the candidate's name on the ballot, but are not voting for him."

Bundarin was asked why he said after the election he would accept his defeat and become active in Canton's politics.

"I said that I was not really defeated but that my day of victory had merely been delayed," Bundarin explained. "I didn't think there was anything I could do about the results of the election."

"Then people in the community started to come up to me and say that the will of the people was not really met in the election," Bundarin said. "Stein's 37 per cent does not reflect the will of the majority. My original assessment of the write-in was correct. I said it would split the subdivision vote between me and Greenstein."

and Stein would slip in.

Everyone said that Greenstein's write-in would split the Democrats and would help me. I started to believe them. My original intellect was correct."

IF NOTHING ELSE is accomplished, Bundarin said he would like to end the rumors and "discourage write-in campaigns of this type."

"You have a right to a write-in when you cannot get on the ballot by some procedural difficulty," Bundarin said. "Write-ins are not meant to be used where a candidate was on the ballot in the primary and lost. All the Canton write-in did was bring chaos to the election process."

Both Bundarin's and Greenstein's recount requests ask the county board of canvassers to examine the machines in all 10 precincts. In Greenstein's letter, he requests that the canvassers start at Precinct 10 and work their way down to Precinct 1. Only supervisor votes will be looked at even though in the trustee race, James Poole lost to Eugene Daley by only 11 votes.

Precinct 10 and 9 have been pinpointed by supporters of the write-in effort, who claim they were "shortchanged" by pollworkers at both precincts.

Jim Donahue, co-chairman of the Committee To Re-elect the Greenstein Team, said that in Precinct 10 pollworkers could have missed write-in stickers on ballots that were marked straight ticket. In Precinct 9, Donahue claims write-in stickers that were damaged or wrinkled in the machine were not counted if less than half of the sticker was unreadable. Donahue said "a crinkled sticker shows intent and should be counted."

GREENSTEIN was asked if he thought, as a lawyer himself, that Bundarin had legal grounds for attempting to throw out absentee ballots because voters did not mark an "X" next to the sticker name.

"I haven't researched the law in this matter," said Greenstein. "When I first heard about it from him I said it didn't seem to me possible that these people who

voted write-in could be cheated out of their vote.

"Thom Carman tells me that the write-in committee went to local, county and state officials asking them what the proper procedure for a write-in was. They followed these election officials' instructions

Here's local official tally

When the county board of canvassers conducts the recount of 10 Canton Township precincts, which could be in late December, they will confirm or change the following certified election totals.

According to the official, locally certified vote totals Harold Stein won five precincts: 2, 3, 5, 6 and 9. Stein came out on top of the heap with 3,808 votes.

Write-in candidate Robert Greenstein won four precincts: 1, 7, 8 and 10, with 3,354 votes.

Precinct 4 is the only precinct where Republican candidate Peter Bundarin came out on top. His tally was 3,014 votes.

Broken down by precinct, Stein received 451 votes in precinct 1 (Fire Station No. 1); Greenstein won with 451 votes, and Bundarin received 345 votes.

In Precinct 2 (Recreation Building) Stein won with 554 votes compared to Bundarin's 201 votes and Greenstein's 168.

In Precinct 3 (Gallimore School), Stein picked up 547 votes, Bundarin received 396 and Greenstein got 204 votes.

Precinct 4 (Miller School) voters gave Bundarin 510 votes; 383 people voted for Greenstein and 381 voted for Stein.

Precinct 5 (Sheldon School) voters gave Stein an edge with 597 votes, compared to Bundarin's 304 and Greenstein's 289.

Holiday Park Mobile Home residents vote in Precinct 6. Some 194 people in Precinct 6 voted for Stein; Bundarin got 88 votes and Greenstein received 50 votes.

Precinct 7 and 8 are located in Plymouth Canton High School. Greenstein came out

on top in 7 with 426 votes. Bundarin received 369 votes in second place and 219 people voted for Stein. Precinct 8 voters chose Greenstein with 268 votes; Stein picked up 216 and Bundarin received 180.

Precinct 9 and 10 have been the target of criticism from members of the write-in team who feel election procedures shortchanged the sticker campaign. In Precinct 9, Stein received 445 votes; Bundarin took 422 and Greenstein had 371.

THE 10TH PRECINCT, where 1,323 of Canton's 10,637 voters cast their ballot, was won overwhelmingly by Greenstein. The write-in committee pushed absentee ballots as an admitted campaign tactic. Greenstein received 735 votes; Stein received 303 votes and Bundarin got 199.

We take mobility for granted

How many times a day do you get in and out of your car? Go up steps? Cross streets?

Chances are you never think about it. But for those with physical handicaps, the simple, everyday activities can be, and often are, major obstacles.

In an effort to increase community awareness of the difficulties that face the physically handicapped, the Kiwanis Club of Colonial Plymouth sponsored a presenta-

tion on the Mobility Awareness Team on Thursday at the Mayflower Hotel.

The speaker was Angie Corrieri, a Canton resident who was paralyzed from the waist down in an automobile accident five years ago.

"After I had my accident," Ms. Corrieri said, "I wanted to get to where I could live the way everyone else did, but I can't, because then there would be no changes made."

Ms. Corrieri is a member of the Mobility Awareness Team, a group of people who get involved in community activities to pro-

mote knowledge of the handicapped and recognize achievement by the handicapped.

There are no formal rules of membership involved in being on the Mobility Team and no hard and fast responsibilities. The main requirement is the desire to work for social and legal change to allow the handicapped to live lives that are as full and productive as possible.

THE MAJOR PART of Ms. Corrieri's presentation was a film which graphically demonstrated that our society pays little or no heed to the particular problems of the handicapped.

The film opened with a woman in a wheelchair leaving a rehabilitation center and followed her through her efforts to find a job, locate an apartment, and use public facilities.

Although for the normal person these activities take little or no concentration, for those with less than full mobility it is a different story.

When the woman stops at a roadside public phone to make a call about a vacant apartment, she finds the booth is too small for her wheelchair. She cannot get inside.

Next we see the woman at apartment complex after apartment complex as she tries to locate one without numerous flights of stairs, or one that has a ramp in addition to the stairs.

In applying for jobs, the situation is the same. She is unable to gain entrance to buildings, because of stairs and curbs with no ramp cuts.

We see her as she tries to use a restroom in a public building. She cannot comb her hair because the mirror is too high; she cannot use the facilities because the stalls are too narrow.

"We just don't know what they go through, do we?" said John L. Miller, second vice president of the Kiwanis and this year's program chairman.

AFTER THE FILM Ms. Corrieri discussed the Ms. Wheelchair Michigan Pageant, which she helped to organize and which she won in 1972.

"The pageant is not a beauty contest per se," said Ms. Corrieri. "We are interested in recognizing individual skill and achievement on the part of the participants."

She added that the annual contest gives handicapped people a chance to get together for informal talks and to share ideas and information.

Ms. Corrieri said the major emphasis of the Mobility Team was keeping current on legislation affecting the handicapped, and through community activities, letting people know that there is a need for more legislation.

She discussed as examples the Curb-Cut

Hayrides happen at 2 area farms

Crisp cold air, a rumbling ride through fields and woods, and friendly fights with fistfuls of hay are all the ingredients needed to make a fun-packed hayride this fall and winter.

Although the hayride season traditionally begins in September and ends at Christmas, owners of two recreational farms in Canton say their facilities offer hayrides the year round.

Jim Fraser, owner of Real Life Camp and Farm, located at 48700 Geddes, west of Beck, says many of his customers brave the cold weather for a hayride.

Although much demand for hayrides at Children's Farm and Riding School, 2350 Denton, between Michigan and Cherry Hill, end at the beginning of December, owner Jack Morris says he'll drive children and adults through woods and fields on piles of hay "as long as people want."

"This is the hot season right now. Everyone mostly thinks of hayrides in the fall,

but it's becoming popular all year," Fraser said.

Both recreational farms offer hayrides pulled by tractors and gear their business to scouts and church groups. Employees at both facilities build campfires for their customers after the ride, so children and adults can roast marshmallows and grill hamburgers and hot dogs brought from home.

At Real Life Camp and Farm, a hayride is part of a three-hour package. After the ride, visitors can ride horses in a fenced corral and eat picnics in one of nine outdoor or three sheltered areas. Children can view farm animals, play on rope-type swings in a three-story barn and ramble over huge pyramids of rubber tires and other climbing equipment.

Groups should submit requests for hayrides in advance at both facilities.

Each recreational farm offers day camp programs for children during spring and summer months.

Detailed maps sold by MUCC

As a service to sportsmen, official government quadrangle maps of Michigan and nautical maps of the Great Lakes are now available from the Michigan United Conservation Clubs.

The non-profit citizens organization is serving as a clearing house for the quadrangle (topographical) maps prepared by the U.S. Geological Survey and the nautical charts prepared by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Precisely drawn, the quadrangle maps feature high detail which clearly shows hunting areas, lakes, rivers, streams, trails and wilderness terrain.

Each map covers an area about 17 miles measured north to south, and 12 miles measured east to west.

MUCC spokesman Kenneth Lowe sug-

gests that the topographical maps could also benefit prospective buyers of land or cottages.

NAUTICAL CHARTS are useful to divers, boaters, fishermen and swimmers. They show landmarks, shoals, reefs, bays, markers, and water depth.

The MUCC also distributes hydrographic maps of the state's inland lakes and a book containing individual maps of Michigan's 83 counties.

A free index of the quadrangle and nautical maps may be obtained by sending a long (No. 10) self-addressed stamped envelope to MUCC, Box 30235, Lansing, Mich. 48909.

Proceeds from the map sales are used in conservation programs sponsored by the MUCC.

City asks Detroit to halt its billing

The City of Plymouth has asked the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department to stop sending bills to industrial and commercial firms in the city for a \$50 fee for monitoring sanitary sewer flow.

City Manager Fred Yockey sent the letter Monday, notifying the water board that lacked the legal authority to mail the bills and expect payment. Yockey also told the water board he was advising all industries to ignore the billing and refuse to pay.

The confusion arises over a governmental jurisdictional dispute between the Detroit Water Board Sewer Division and Wayne County over which unit will conduct surveillance of industrial and commercial sanitary sewers, as required by federal anti-pollution laws.

The City of Plymouth has always relied on Wayne County for the surveillance and had not requested Detroit to perform the service.

Thus, Yockey was suprised when he learned that the water board in October had sent a bill to various industries and businesses in Plymouth directing them to pay a \$50 industrial surveillance fee.

Yockey informed the water board that the city "does not consider that the City of Detroit has any legal right to pass an ordinance affecting property owners within another municipality. We are so informing all industries who make contact with the City of Plymouth and advising them to ignore your request."

Yockey also informed the water board that the Plymouth City Commission on Nov. 1 passed a resolution authorizing Wayne County to provide the required industrial surveillance.

The city manager also asked the water board to provide the city with a list of all sewer users to whom the \$50 bill was mailed to so the city can inform them the service is being provided by Wayne County.

Yockey asked the water and sewer department to return any funds collected in Plymouth so duplicate charges for the same service can be avoided.

Hendry seeks state approval for expansion

The owners of Hendry Convalescent Center, a nursing home at 105 Haggerty, Plymouth, are seeking state approval from the Michigan Department of Public Health to expand the facility's size.

An application for a certificate of need for the project now is on file with the division of health facility planning and construction of the State Health Department.

The proposed plan calls for the construction of a three-story addition to the present building and the conversion of the existing bookkeeping office into a two-bed patient room. The change in utilization of the bookkeeping room would increase the facility's total bed capacity to 127 beds.

Deputy supt. job won't be filled

The position of deputy superintendent for Plymouth Community School District is being eliminated as part of a reorganization and beefing up of central administration.

Dr. Earl Hogan, deputy superintendent, is leaving the school district to accept a position as superintendent of the Buchanan School District in western Michigan.

When he departs Plymouth, the position of deputy superintendent won't be filled, although that step already was being taken before Hogan's resignation as part of an effort to build an instructional team to place emphasis on curriculum.

LAST YEAR Hogan accepted responsibility for elementary curriculum development with Supt. John M. Hoben guiding secondary curriculum.

The division of labor was made following the departure the year before of the district's assistant superintendent for instruction.

Last spring the school board decided that a greater effort needed to be placed on curriculum and put in the budget for fiscal year 1976-77 money for an elementary curriculum coordinator and a secondary curriculum coordinator. Starting this fall

Hogan began functioning as an assistant superintendent for instruction with the idea of heading a curriculum team once the coordinators were hired.

"Education is our business and we want to establish a strong curriculum team with high emphasis on instruction," says Hoben. "Actually, each coordinator may specialize in elementary or secondary but they will be involved in the whole curriculum area. They will work with each other and the assistant superintendent for instruction."

"So starting in September, 1977, there will be no position of deputy superintendent. But Dr. Hogan had already began as assistant superintendent for instruction so this change isn't that major. The addition of the curriculum coordinators will, however, give us some much needed instructional depth."

THE OPERATING budget for this year also calls for the addition of four new positions.

Besides the two curriculum coordinators, the district will be adding a controller for the business department and a labor relations director in the personnel department.

The positions of labor director and controller were both recommended by Eastern Michigan University which did the study on the efficiency of the central administration set-up.

"With a district our size, one man no longer can run the business-financial department. Ray Hoedell now has to manage the cafeteria, transportation and maintenance as well as the instructional accounts. We need to separate budgeting and financial control functions from all the other jobs done in the business department."

"Since last April I have practically been operating without a personnel director as Norm Kee has had to spend fulltime on labor negotiations. We need a labor director to handle negotiations so Kee can spend the time he needs in the personnel department."

"These changes will bring some much needed strength to the central administration," Hoben added. "I have been operating with 10 fewer people in the central office than my predecessor as superintendent had five years ago. Especially important is the strength being added for curriculum."

There will be three classes beginning Dec. 2 through Dec. 16 to be offered Thursdays from 7-9 p.m. Holiday arrangements which will be made include a straw wreath, Santa sleigh and a centerpiece.

The YMCA also is offering a mini creative class for preschoolers beginning Nov. 29 and ending Dec. 23 on Monday through Thursday mornings. Creatives includes varied activities for youngsters age three to five.

Both classes have limited enrollment. Interested persons should call the Y office at 453-2904 to enroll as soon as possible.

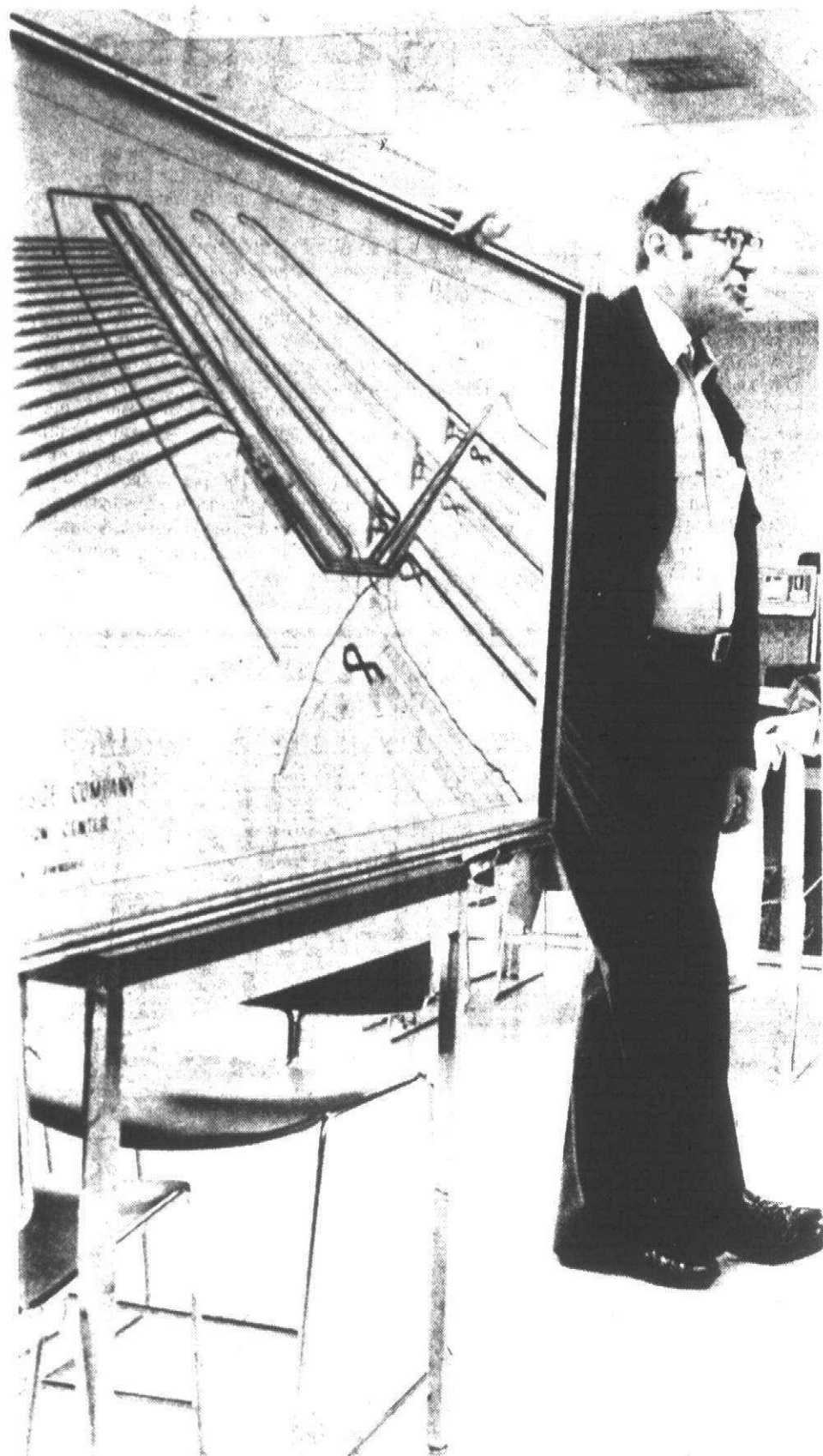

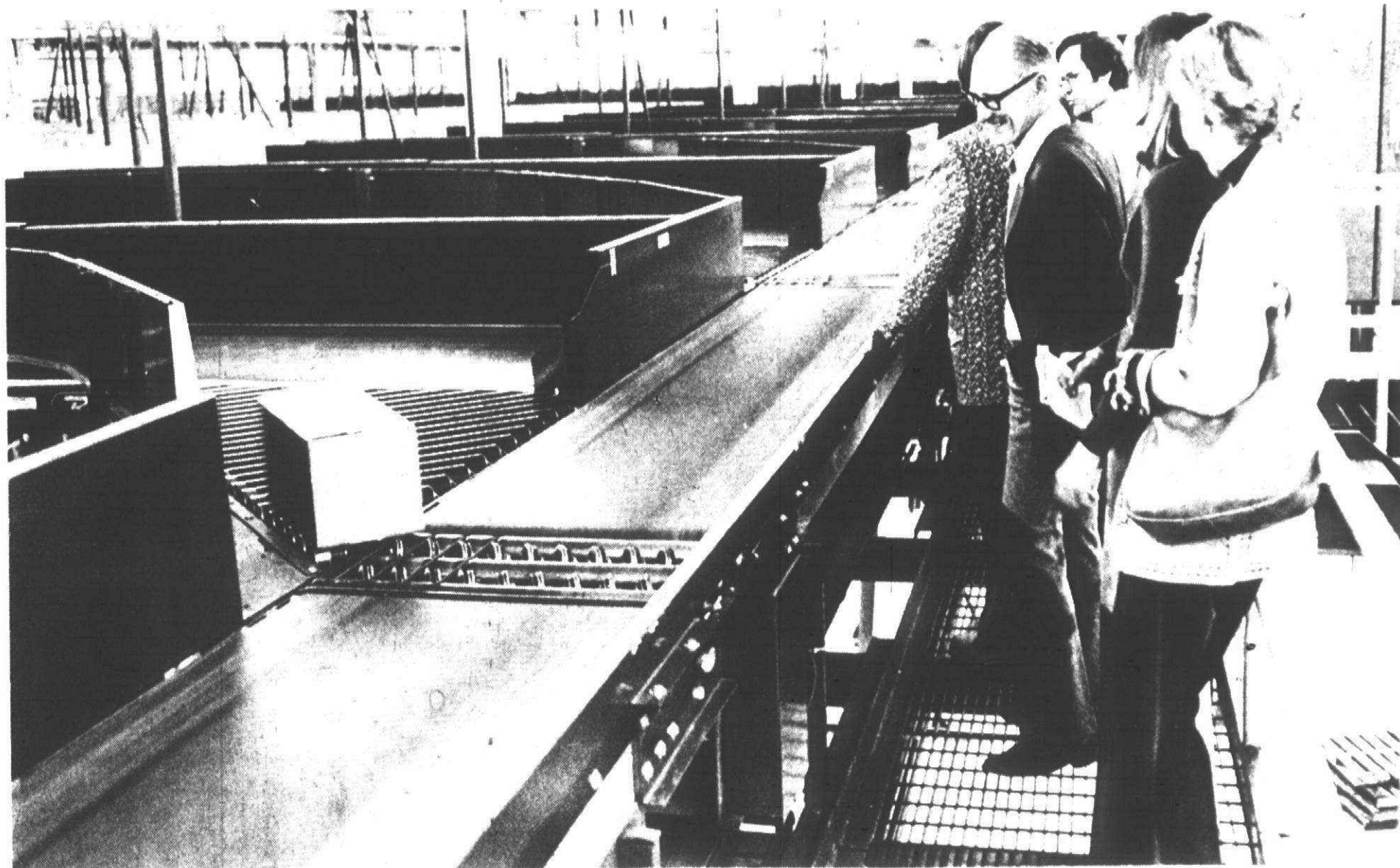

Sophisticated computers know in what sequence the packages are traveling. The key punch operator at the sortation center has already indicated which ramp the goods should enter. Angled rollers pop up when they're supposed to to deflect the

package down the proper loading ramps at 17 different "switch tracks." The rollers drop back down without a split second to spare to allow the next package to pass over it on its way to another chute farther down the line.

5 miles of conveyers in plant!

Marvin A. Miller makes it very clear right off the bat that he is general manager of a product distribution center, not a (shudder) warehouse.

The S.S. Kresge Distribution Center at 41425 Joy Road surely doesn't fit most people's image of a dark, cramped warehouse.

Opened in February 1976, the central regional office for Knärt and Kresge is a fully-automated monster that is one mile, 47,000 feet large sitting on 49 acres of land in Canton Township.

If those figures sound impressive, think of the five miles of computerized conveyers that hum above the head of the space number of workers inside the state-of-the-art plant.

Pressed to pin down how many people work in the plant, Miller said "upwards of 100 people."

The concept of the center is different from the traditional warehouse.

"We don't warehouse stock," said Miller. "we distribute it to the stores where it can be sold quickly."

Miller claims his entire stock is completely turned over in 90 days time.

MILLER ACTED AS host to 19 members of the Canton Township Chamber of Commerce Tuesday who took a full tour of the facility.

Al Daly, president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce and owner of Daisy Plastics, was flabbergasted by the size of the plant.

"Why you could pick up my plant and put it way over there in the corner of this place and nobody'd notice it," Daly said.

Miller explained that nearly 400 stores in the greater midwest area are serviced by the Canton distribution center. The trucks travel as far east as Buffalo, as far south as West Virginia and as far west as Chicago.

After filling everyone in on statistics, Miller proceeded to lead everyone into the plant.

Logically, the group started out viewing the first steps in the process and ended up at the 17 loading docks.

A number of train cars, parked inside the building, were being unloaded by hand by the workers. Up to 20 rail cars a day can be unloaded at the distribution center.

The cases of stock are first entered on the computerized conveyor system at the individual "order-picking modules." Packages as big as 24 inches deep and 24 inches wide will fit on the conveyor if they weigh 85 pounds or less.

One person works in each narrow module line setting boxes which carry all-important coded labels. The person does not leave the module with a load of goods piled on a hi-lo bound for the loading docks. He sets the proper orders on a conveyor belt at the beginning of a long ride.

From there, the packages travel up to the mezzanine to a "merge control" station which narrows the nine lanes from the order modules into three lanes. Rollers are regulated to make sure that each package merges into the three busy lanes without colliding with a case of glassware. The merging process caused a couple of the people on the tour to wince expecting a pile-up. But each package follows the other, without a split-second to spare.

After the merge control trauma, the packages pass through a human-operated checkpoint at the sortation area.

Here the person operating the computer key-punch machine punches out the number on the package which tells in which truck the package should be loaded.

As the case of canned nuts speeds down the feeder lane, a row of rollers pops up at a 45-degree angle to the traffic and switches the nuts to the number five conveyor chute.

THERE ARE 17 chutes—one leading to each loading dock. The chute angles downward to the edge of the truck trailers, and the packages move slowly as they near the end of the line.

No wooden pallets are used in loading the trucks, Miller explained that they were too costly, take up room and are unnecessary in loading trailers with the mechanized process.

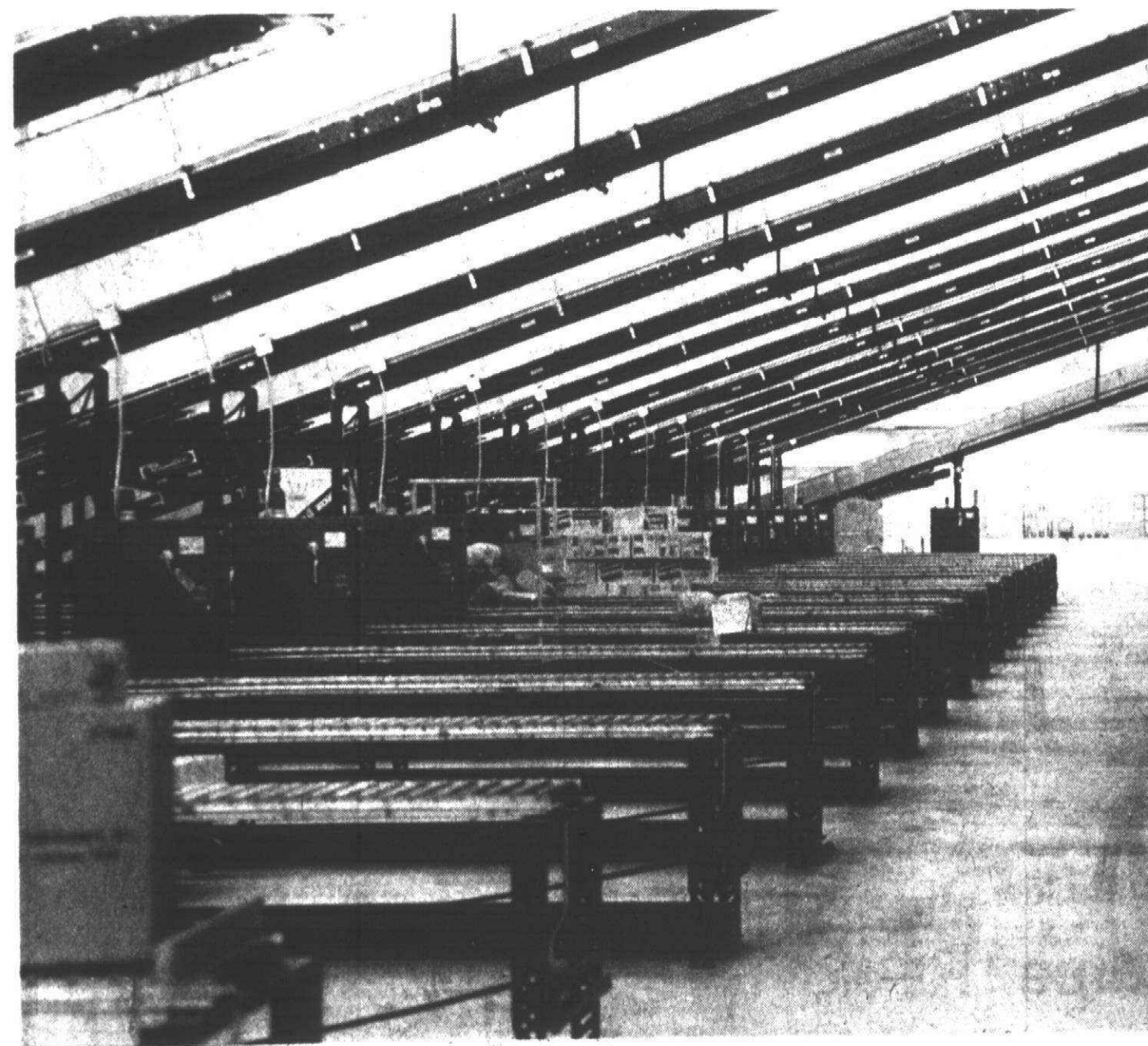
Most of the tour group were impressed

with the final process where boxes are diverted to their proper destination with split-second precision.

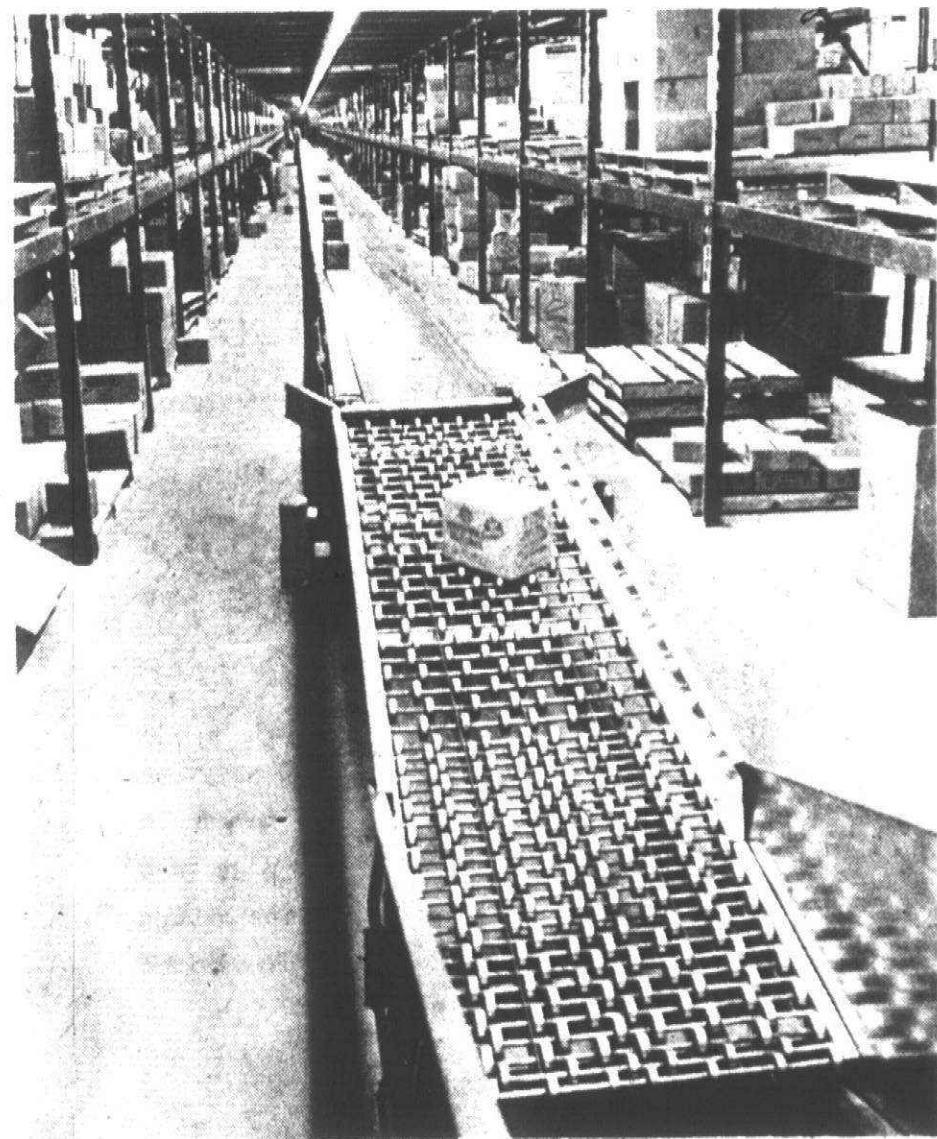

precisely. If the election officials advised them wrongly, I don't know what to say."
The recount request was submitted after "tremendous pressure from the write-in group," according to Greenstein.
"They have a legal right to protest what they feel may have been irregularities in various precincts. And the way to find out if there's anything wrong is through a recount. The candidate himself must request the recount. It's the least I can do for these people who've supported me."

But Greenstein claimed that he is not upset with the results of the election.
"The only upset I've got is coming," Greenstein said referring to his uncertain status as police chief of Canton.
"If Harold Stein fires me as police chief for political reasons, he'll have me on his back forever," said Greenstein. "I may not be a lot of things, but I am the best qualified man to run that police department."
CANTON'S NEW SUPERVISOR, Stein, called his two opponents recount requests

"ridiculous—an exercise in futility."
"If I lost, I'd congratulate the winners and run again in two years if I so desired," Stein said. "We can't keep up this on-going battle. I'm trying to pull together our community now that the election is over."
"I'm not the three-headed monster that

some people make me out to be."
Stein would not say, however, what his plans will be regarding the police reserves and their chief, Greenstein.
"You'll have to wait until the board meeting to find out," said Stein. "There won't be any problem."

Bill and the License Plate Bill, both passed in 1973.
The curb bill made it mandatory for sidewalks to be accessible to the handicapped, the license plate bill provided special symbols on car plates to allow parking privileges for handicapped motorists.
She particularly called attention to an ordinance passed in Canton which provides a fine of \$100 for anyone who parks illegally in parking spaces for the handicapped.

SHE SAID the two broad areas of legislation still lacking were civil rights and public transportation for the handicapped.
"We originally wanted to get in on the first civil rights amendment," she said, "but we didn't, and now there is a new one being proposed."
"As far as public transportation is concerned, we don't know yet. There are a number of governmental bodies working toward a definition of what per cent of public transportation has to be available to the handicapped."

The civil rights bill, if passed, would prohibit discrimination against the handi-

capped in housing, employment, and education.

At the end of her presentation Ms. Corrieri asked the audience to become members of the Mobility Team by working for change. "The more people who talk about this the better. Now that you know more about our problems and needs, I hope you will use your knowledge for constructive changes."

Commission debates propriety of releasing names of applicants

Forest City Dillon is being asked to allow two City of Plymouth officials to audit the applications for senior citizen housing in an attempt to validate the need of local residents for elderly housing.

The request was made by the Plymouth City Commission Monday night following a lengthy debate on whether such action was proper or necessary, and how such an audit should be done.

Commissioner Jack Moehle originally made the request to inspect the applications prior to the Nov. 2 city referendum on tax abatement for Forest City Dillon's proposed senior citizen apartments.

Moehle had made the request to City Manager Fred Yockey first who informed him there was no list of names as such but a stack of applications which belonged to Forest City Dillon. Moehle then asked Bernard Haar of Forest City if he could look at a list of applicants to validate residency claims and was told by Haar's attorney that the request couldn't be granted at that time.

At the Nov. 1 commission meeting, on the eve of election, Moehle introduced a formal resolution asking Forest City Dillon to allow the city commission to inspect the list of applicants. That motion was tabled until Nov. 15.

MONDAY NIGHT some commissioners argued that the applications were confidential and shouldn't be disclosed to the public or to any individual commissioner.

After much debate, the commission voted 7-0 to have Mayor Joe Bida appoint the city clerk and one other city official to inspect the applications—if Forest City Dillon agrees—and report back by Dec. 6 on the actual number of city residents applying and whether they qualified.

Moehle's Nov. 1 resolution, which was supported by Commissioner Beverly McAninch, stated that the list of applicants would "be useful to the city in identifying those of the applicants who may need additional city assistance."

The resolution also argued for release of the names because "the subject of the list has been a major justification advanced for the project's need to the public and, therefore, by its reference is a quasi-public document."

The formal request in the Nov. 1 motion was for the city commission to ask Forest City Dillon for a copy of all applicants' names and their addresses and telephone numbers.

In asking for the motion to be removed from the table Monday night, Mrs. McAninch said access to the list of names was needed to determine what was the number of residents in need of housing assistance.

When Commissioner Thomas Turner asked if Forest City Dillon could legally release the names without violating the applicants' rights to privacy, Mrs. McAninch answered: "It's unlikely there is any real legal problems or other cities wouldn't get the list of names, as did happen in Ypsilanti where some commissioners were shown the names."

Mayor Bida said Forest City has the responsibility of protecting applicants from being harassed. "Some senior citizens in town were harassed when their names appeared in newspaper advertising supporting the project. And there were some who didn't sign affidavits that their names could be released because they didn't want their landlords to know they were contemplating moving."

McAninch agreed the names shouldn't be made public, but said it was a different matter for the city commission to be shown the list of names.

Moehle then accused City Manager Yockey of unprofessional conduct prior to the election. "The list was used by the city manager and others to justify need for the senior citizen housing, and it's unprofessional to quote such data if you don't have the data at hand—if you haven't seen the actual list."

"If you want the list, write Forest City and ask for it," snapped Bida. "I have no need for the list because I am under the assumption commissioners Moehle and McAninch and their group are going to come up with alternatives for senior citizen housing."

"We are talking about my concern of persons making quotes justifying the need for housing when they don't have the data at hand," Moehle snapped back.

COMMISSIONER Norb Battermann then pressed Moehle to explain the need for the list and what use he planned to make of it.

Moehle answered that the list would be useful in identifying those senior citizens who may be in need of additional services from the city, in addition to just housing. "We really haven't taken a survey of senior citizens and their needs—that's one good reason."

"Also, don't say we have a list of 400 applicants—I haven't seen it and you haven't seen it, and people who speak of numbers should know something about it."

Battermann asked if he understood Moehle's reasons as being that he wanted to help senior citizens, and that he doubted the validity of the need. Moehle reacted: "If you believe in the numbers, why are you so concerned about asking for the list? We should know the number of residents and whether they qualify." Battermann answered that someone would have to inspect the financial data on the applications before it could be decided if applicants qualified.

"There are 138 names on the waiting list to get into Tonquish Creek Manor and there's never been any talk about helping these people," added Battermann. "Commissioner Moehle, you have not asked about the names on the Tonquish Creek list and so I cannot believe your real concern is the needs of senior citizens or you'd be asking about these needs. Since helping senior citizens doesn't appear to be the reason for the request, I can only assume the names are wanted for purposes of harassment."

"If we have a need to inspect the Forest City applications, then the audit should be done by a limited number of city officials. The names should never be released to the city commission or to the public."

Moehle added: "There is no real value served by us continuing on in an advisory role on this issue, but I trust that the data used by the city to endorse the housing will be carefully checked out before we use the data again in the future. You have five votes on this commission to defeat my motion, but remember that two-thirds of the voters in the city had concerns about the validity of the data."

Commissioner Mary Childs said that

claim was unfair because there was no way Moehle could determine the reason why residents voted "no" on the referendum.

Moehle's tabled motion was then voted upon and defeated 5-2 with only Moehle and Mrs. McAninch voting in favor.

A motion was then made by Battermann, supported by Scott Dodge, that the city clerk and one other city official review the applications to verify the numbers and check the validity of the applicants from city residents. That motion passed 7-0.

Battermann told Moehle that this method should provide answers on the validity of the numbers. "I think what it is, Jack, is that you don't want to believe the numbers are true."

Turner added: "The developer never would have been willing to go ahead with this project if he didn't have valid applications. It is incredible to believe otherwise."

Moehle suggested that city commissioners should have the choice of whether they wanted to inspect the applications. Turner quickly objected: "Why do we have city administrators if we can't trust them?"

21 at SC getting pay hike

A group of 21 non-instructional personnel at Schoolcraft College are getting a six per cent pay hike retroactive to July 1. They employees are maintenance persons, custo-

dians, programmers, security officers and others.

The raise affects 24 positions and 21 workers. Two of the positions are to be

reclassified, and one of the positions will not be refilled following a retirement. The college board, at a Nov. 10 special meeting, passed the raise at a cost of up to \$23,217 annually. The board had held up action until a contract with the faculty union was ratified.

Trustee Leroy Bennett argued that the increase would affect part-time security officers who already receive retirement benefits that account for an additional 50 per cent of their income.

"There are some people who are either on soft money or special assignments—not full-time—that don't fit anywhere in what we do," said Bennett, who nevertheless voted for the raise.

Board Vice Chairperson Rosina Raymond replied that if the worker does his job, retirement benefits are none of our business.

Schoolcraft President C. Nelson Grote disagreed with Bennett. "This is an attempt to treat our workers equally even though their assignments are different. We must stay clear of an issue for discrimination—they cannot be treated differently."

Highway bids taken

Roads in both Wayne and Oakland Counties are slated for facelifting following the latest series of bids opened by the State Highway Commission.

Largest single project, estimated at \$5 million, is for construction of 1.7 miles of the M-14 Freeway in western Wayne County. Included in the project is construction of five bridges and a parallel paved path for bicyclists.

The freeway is east and west of Northville Road and east and west of the C & O Railway in Plymouth Township. It is expected to be completed in July 1978.

Other Wayne County projects include:

- Modernization and safety improvements on I-75 between Sibley and M-39 in Taylor, Southgate, Allen Park and Lincoln Park including median barriers, erection of lighting, and pavement repair. The 2.8 million project is scheduled to be completed November 1977.

- Resurfacing the deck of the bridge carrying northbound I-75 over the Rouge River in Detroit and installation of a glare screen on the bridge. The \$2.4 million project is to be finished in Sept. 1977.

- Upgrading of signs of 36.5 miles of roads and streets in Grosse Pointe Farms, a \$20,000 project.

- Construction of a bridge to carry the bicycle path paralleling I-275 over Fellows Creek in Canton Township. The work is expected to be finished in April at a cost of under \$30,000.

Oakland County project is a \$200,000 addition of a center lane for left turns on a half-mile section of M-24 between Paint Creek and Church Street in Lake Orion and Orion Township. It is to be completed by June.

Notebaert, Fidge, Breen

When the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees meets on Nov. 23, there will be three new name plates on the table, those of Trustees Weyona Lee Fidge and Maurice Breen and Supervisor Tom Notebaert.

They are replacing departing board members Russell Ash and Gerald Burke and retiring supervisor J.D. McLaren, who will complete their tenure as public servants officially on Nov. 20 at noon.

Both Notebaert and Mrs. Fidge will be holding public office for the first time, while Breen has a long and varied history in township politics.

NOTEBAERT has lived in Plymouth Township for 30 years and has worked in automobile and real estate sales.

According to Notebaert, his interest in local government started as a result of appraisal and rezoning work that he did for the township.

"As a real estate agent, I have worked with the board for a number of years, and I had hoped I would one day find the time to become more actively and directly involved," he said. "And it looks like that time is here."

Although Notebaert said he felt the board was doing a reasonably good job, he was concerned about the course of development in the township.

"I want our growth and development to take place in an orderly fashion," Notebaert stated. "Now that we are going to have a new network of expressways, developers will come to us, and we won't turn them away."

"We must not destroy the atmosphere we have here, which I see as pleasant and rural. It will be a big job, but I hope we can get landowners and developers to see things our way."

Notebaert said that with increased growth, police protection would be an issue. "I don't know how soon, but the time is not too far off when we will have

to look to more comprehensive police protection," he said.

"I was very disappointed when the voters turned it down the last time, because it is my feeling that there is a real need, and it won't go away."

He said he was looking forward to the job of supervisor. "I see it as a fulltime job," Notebaert said. "And I will devote full time to it with complete devotion."

"I see no great adjustment difficulties, and I anticipate a close and agreeable working relationship with the other members of the board."

MRS. FIDGE, a township resident of 12 years and mother of three, has been interested in township politics since she came to the area.

"I am a registered nurse by profession," Mrs. Fidge said, "and when we first were moving to the area, the northeast corner of N. Territorial and Ridge was being zoned for a nursing home."

"I went to all the board meetings, and since that time I have maintained my interest in what is happening in the township."

Like other board members, Mrs. Fidge sees growth and development as a major issue that will be confronting the board for the next several years.

"I am particularly concerned about the western section of the township," she said. "I am talking about the whole area from Beck to Napier. We can either have boom development or controlled development, but we can't have both."

"If we don't watch this area closely, it could develop so fast that the township would be unable to provide services such as road clearance and police protection."

"As it stands right now," she continued, "people moving into the township are surprised that there are no garbage pick-up or snow removal services. We are going to have to take this into consideration."

Mrs. Fidge said more cooperation among neighboring units of government was high on her list of priorities.

"We need to have more consideration of neighboring communities working together, particularly on their zoning ordinances," she commented.

"In the case of Canton for example, our boundaries touch in many places. If we zone one side of the street residential, and they zone the other side commercial, it just won't work."

"We can't operate alone. There is a definite need for the left hand to know what the right hand is doing."

She also pledged full dedication to the office of trustee. "I am not going to miss a single meeting," she stated, "and with my other responsibilities, I've figured out that I'll have every other Monday and a Friday free."

BREEN, a local attorney, has been politically inactive for the last four years, but he is a familiar name in township government.

In the mid 60's, he was chairman of the planning commission, from 1968 to 1970, he served as a trustee, in 1970 he was elected supervisor. In 1972 he again ran for supervisor but was defeated by J.D. McLaren. Since then he has not held public office.

He said he decided to run again because the "political bug" got him again. He also cited lack of progress in some key areas.

"Issues that were in front of the board in 1968 are still around," Breen said. "As far as I can see, a lot of things have been put on the back burner."

"There has been a failure by the township as a whole to confront problems. I don't know what the solutions are. I just feel that whatever we do should be done for the benefit of the whole township."

Breen said one major responsibility the board had to face was setting policy. "In my opinion, there has been too much reliance on professional consultants for guidelines. Now a consultant can give you a method for doing something, but the board should set the over-all goals and policies."

He also expressed concern about cooperation with other nearbymunicipalities and providing adequate services for township residents. He added he was specifically worried about future development.

"I am not anti-growth," remarked Breen, "but I do want thoughtful growth. We have a lot of land that is now zoned agricultural, and if we don't make a large decision about what we want to do with it, we'll wind up with piecemeal zoning, which is not good."

"I see the major problem facing the board as proper zoning foresight. We have to decide now what we want to be in the future."

SC trustees debate raising class size

As a cost-saving device, Schoolcraft College trustees are contemplating raising the minimum sizes on classes to 12 or even 15 students. Current minimum size is 10.

Some trustees have mixed emotions about the idea, which is due to be acted on before the end of the year.

"Everyone has the idea we're running 31 or 32 to a class," said Trustee Leroy C. Bennett, who is strongly in favor of raising minimum sizes. "Small classes are not very cost-effective."

THE COMMUNITY college offers 833 sections of courses this fall.

President C. Nelson Grote said 38 of those sections had less than 12 students, but only six would have been canceled had a new rule been in effect.

"The remaining 32 would have been permitted to continue because of a the necessity for students to complete programs and needing specific courses, b) only section of a particular course, c) course offered only one time a year and d) no seats available in other sections or the class was a sophomore course."

Dropping those six sections would have saved the college \$7,300, and only part-

time faculty members would have been affected.

If the class size minimum had been 15, Grote said, 94 sections would have been looked at and 32 actually canceled. The basic teaching loads of three-regular faculty members in two departments would have been affected, and layoffs may have resulted.

If class size minimum had been 15, the college would have saved \$23,215.

"IF YOU DON'T want to raise tuition," said Bennett, "you have to do some belt tightening."

Board Vice Chairperson Rosina Raymond favored a minimum of 12 but not 15.

Trustee Mark McQuesten, the only former student on the Schoolcraft board, expressed fear that certain liberal arts courses—specifically ethics and some speech classes—would be lost. He urged the board to "proceed cautiously" before raising class sizes.

Asked by board Treasurer Nancie Blatt what happens when a course size is consistently small, Fred Stefanski, dean of arts and sciences, said it would be offered only once a year.

National press honors earned

First place for the best editorial of the year has been awarded to Tim Richard of Observer & Eccentric Newspapers in the annual journalistic competition sponsored by Suburban Newspapers of America, with the O&E also being presented certificates of excellence in two other categories.

Sharing honors with Richard, who is editorial page director for the 12 O&E papers, were Shirlee Iden, suburban life editor of the Southfield Eccentric whose award came in the best news story category, and photographer Craig Newman for his photo-journalism-spot news entry.

Newman, now a sophomore at the University of Arizona, was working for O&E Southfield and Farmington editions when the devastating tornado struck the West Bloomfield area last spring.

His prize-winning photo, which appeared in several of the six O&E Oakland County papers, showed a woman praying in the wreckage left by the storm.

Ms. Iden's winning story was headlined "Prison doctor is found slain in Southfield" and was published July 22, 1976. It was the first in a series of stories about Dr. Cynthia Miller, Detroit House of Correction physician who was shot to death in Southfield.

Ordinarily not a hard news writer, Ms. Iden used for the core of her article comments from co-workers and members of the family and the statement from Dr. Miller's grandfather that he was too broken-hearted to attend the funeral "to write about her as a person."

"WHO WANTS super sewer?" was the heading over the May editorial which brought Richard the foremost honor among the editorial writers of the more than 700 newspapers which are published by members of the national trade association known as Suburban Newspapers of America.

After listening to many hours of testimony at public hearings on the issue of building one gigantic sewer line and Lake Erie treatment plant for southeastern Michigan, and reading numerous engineering reports, Richard concluded that the only real advocate of the project was the Wayne County Road Commission.

In a finely tuned editorial in which the theme was restated "rondo" style, Richard emphasized that the non-elected road commission, unaccountable to the voters, had proposed a sewerage plan "with incredible land use planning implications." Challenging the economic and social questions of the need for a super sewer in western Wayne County, he labeled the super sewer as a "super wasteful idea."

Ultimately the Michigan Water Resources Commission agreed and rejected the basic notion of the super sewer idea.

THE SNA AWARDS were presented at a banquet Nov. 11 at Pittsburgh, highlighting a three-day national editorial seminar. Foremost examples of suburban journalism were judged in nine categories by a panel of deans and professors representing leading university schools of journalism across the country.

Co-publisher Philip Power and Executive Editor John Reddy represented Observer & Eccentric newspapers at the seminar and banquet.

Richard, Ms. Iden and Newman have been frequent winners of journalistic awards in the past for the excellence of their work, and the latest honors only keep alive a long chain of tributes that have come to many members of the merged Observer and Eccentric staffs over the years.

Another certificate of excellence recipient this year was William C. Sliger of the Northville Record in the best column category. Also a frequent awards winner in professional circles, Sliger recently sold his group of four weekly publications in Northville, Novi, South Lyon and Brighton to Suburban Communications Corp. which, under Power's ownership, is the parent entity of Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

Globe charges misuse of fund

A disagreement has emerged at Schoolcraft College over a student fee charge of 50 cents per semester hour that is required of all students.

The Campus Globe, the college's student weekly newspaper charged in an editorial that the student activities budget has been improperly used to fund programs not in the students interest.

The more than 7,800 students of the college pay for programs under the heading of student services at a cost of nearly \$143,000 annually.

The Globe's two biggest complaints are the Cultural and Public Affairs series, which they feel is not of interest to Schoolcraft students, and an annual spaghetti dinner, which the Globe feels should be funded by the college relations office.

THE CULTURAL AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS committee promotes and presents to the Schoolcraft community speakers, bands, concerts and other events. Speakers scheduled for this academic year include author Judson Jerome on "Communes and the new anarchism" as well as author Caroline Bird on her new book, "The Two Pay-check Marriage." Admission to these lectures is \$2 for the general public, and free for Schoolcraft students. The bands of Count Basie and Tommy Dorsey are also scheduled, at a price of \$6 for the general public and \$5 for Schoolcraft students.

The Campus Globe said in a recent editorial, "The Cultural and Public Affairs Com-

mittee appeals primarily to the adult community of the Schoolcraft College area. Unfortunately, there is little appeal for the average college student."

VICE PRESIDENT for Student Affairs Edward McNally with Patrick Newman, counselor in charge of student activities, structures the student activities budget. McNally disagrees with the Globe.

"The Cultural and Public Affairs series has been presented with great success for many years. Schoolcraft has many adult students, and I feel the series is of great interest to them."

The spaghetti dinners are presented annually for graduating high school students who are considering enrolling at the college. The dinners are free to prospective students, but cost present students \$3,000 annually.

The Campus Globe said the dinner should be funded by the school's college relations office.

"We believe that it's time for the college relations office to take the ball and if not sponsor the dinners itself, to budget funds for the student activities office to run the show for them."

COLLEGE RELATIONS Director David Heinzman agrees with the Globe and sees many holes in the student activities budget.

McNally defends the spaghetti dinner. "Many area high school counselors feel that the dinner is a great program for this college," and he told of a student telling him that the dinner was a big reason he chose Schoolcraft.

The Schoolcraft Student Activities budget breaks down into eight separate programs.

1) The All Campus Student Programming Board takes 21 per cent of the budget and provides movies and lectures.
2) The Cultural and Public Affairs Committee receives 18 per cent, or \$14,000.

3) The Student Activities Office takes 14 per cent, or \$12,000, and pays the salary of the Globe's advisor.




4) The Child Care Center receives 13 per cent or \$10,500, as does the 5) Student Senate. The Child Care center provides care and education for children between the ages of three and five years. The center charges \$5 for registration and 60 cents per hour. The Student Senate is the student government.

6) The Student Activities Office Programming receives 10 per cent, or \$9,800, and this is where the spaghetti dinners are funded. The office also sponsors a journalism contest for high school papers.

7) The Campus Globe takes nine per cent, or \$9,350.

8) Student Affairs takes two per cent and uses the money for club advisors, travel and public relations.







Book Fairs end Friday

The annual Book Fairs will end tomorrow (Friday) at six elementary schools in the Plymouth Community School District.

Among the themes being used this year are Fonzie, football teams, and world records.

The Book Fairs offer fun, excitement, a chance to choose from a variety of books, games, puzzles, posters and other enrichment materials, explains Bea Green, director of libraries for the school district.

"This is a good chance for students to acquire their own books," she adds, "or for parents to buy books for gift-giving." The price range and format offer choice to any prospective buyer. The students are the ultimate beneficiaries—both in what they buy for themselves, and what is purchased with the profits.

All the book fairs, which started earlier this week, will continue today and end Friday. The event at Gallimore is being sponsored by the library and PTO with some 15 parents helping. Profits are shared for the school and library needs.

Special this year at Gallimore are "Fonzie coloring books" and a life-size Fonzie poster. At the school and library needs.

The Book Fair at Isbister is co-sponsored by the library and PTO with more than 30 parents helping. There will be book awards and five prizes for students.

At Smith, the affair also is sponsored by the library and PTO with 30 parents helping. At the Smith Fair pupils will have private viewing and selection opportunities.

The Farrand Book Fair, sponsored by the library, will invest its profits for library needs. One activity is a contest among third graders for the best poster promoting the event.

Hulsing, sponsored by library and PTO with some 25 parents helping, also has a contest with students guessing the number of books in the library. The prize will be a 1977 edition of the Guinness Book of Records.

Bird's Fair, sponsored by library and PTO with about 35 parents helping, will invest its profits in audiovisual equipment. Prices of items will range from 19 cents to \$6.

Accountability at SC for administrators

Schoolcraft College administrators get report cards, too! And if they get good marks, they get paid more.

In the first year of a "performance appraisal system" (PAS), 27 middle-level managers got these marks from top administrators.

Three were rated outstanding and will receive awards of \$1,800 each; 16 were ranked excellent and will receive \$1,500 each; three were ranked satisfactory-plus and will receive \$900; and five were ranked satisfactory and will receive \$750.

The middle-level administrators are members of Schoolcraft College Association of Administrators and Professionals (SCAAP). These are members of the administration below deans, such as the director of college relations and the director of admissions.

THE BOARD of trustees must decide by the end of the year whether to continue the PAS, which cost \$36,000 in the first year.

Trustees, who received a preliminary report Nov. 10 from Vice President Kenneth Lindner had mixed reactions about PAS.

"There should be other methods than monetary awards," remarked Trustee Mark McQuesten.

Board Vice-Chairwoman Rosina Raymond was more adamant: "The more I hear about it (evaluations), the less I like it. I can see the maverick getting slashed down money-wise. It is very bad for morale."

Dr. Gerald Cox agreed. "Internally measuring performances by dollar amount should be confidential. If they want to share it, it's their business. I hope we never stifle the maverick administrator."

In response to complaints by these board members that some evaluations were inconsistent, Lindner said, "Consistency only applies with procedures. Improving skills and two-way communication are expected. The system is to be based on trust. Confidence can be built; it has to make the system work."

The board heard a similar report on evaluations of top executive administrators not represented by SCAAP, such as the president of the college.

Please add the time we put in (one-two weeks) preparing our classroom for the opening of school. Please reimburse us the money we put back into our classrooms for rugs, learning materials, center items, classroom learning games and incentives for the children.

Many of us gladly put in the time and money but it should be recognized and appreciated.

In your comparison you did mention we receive a COLA, two-thirds COLA compared to your full COLA. We also have paid all of our retirement. You have received a good and full retirement for years. We also have paid one-half of our dental compared to your fully paid plan.

When you compare, carry it through. Our job is not an 8:15 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. job. It involves many extra hours, days and weeks.

It is time for our time to be recognized instead of taken for granted.

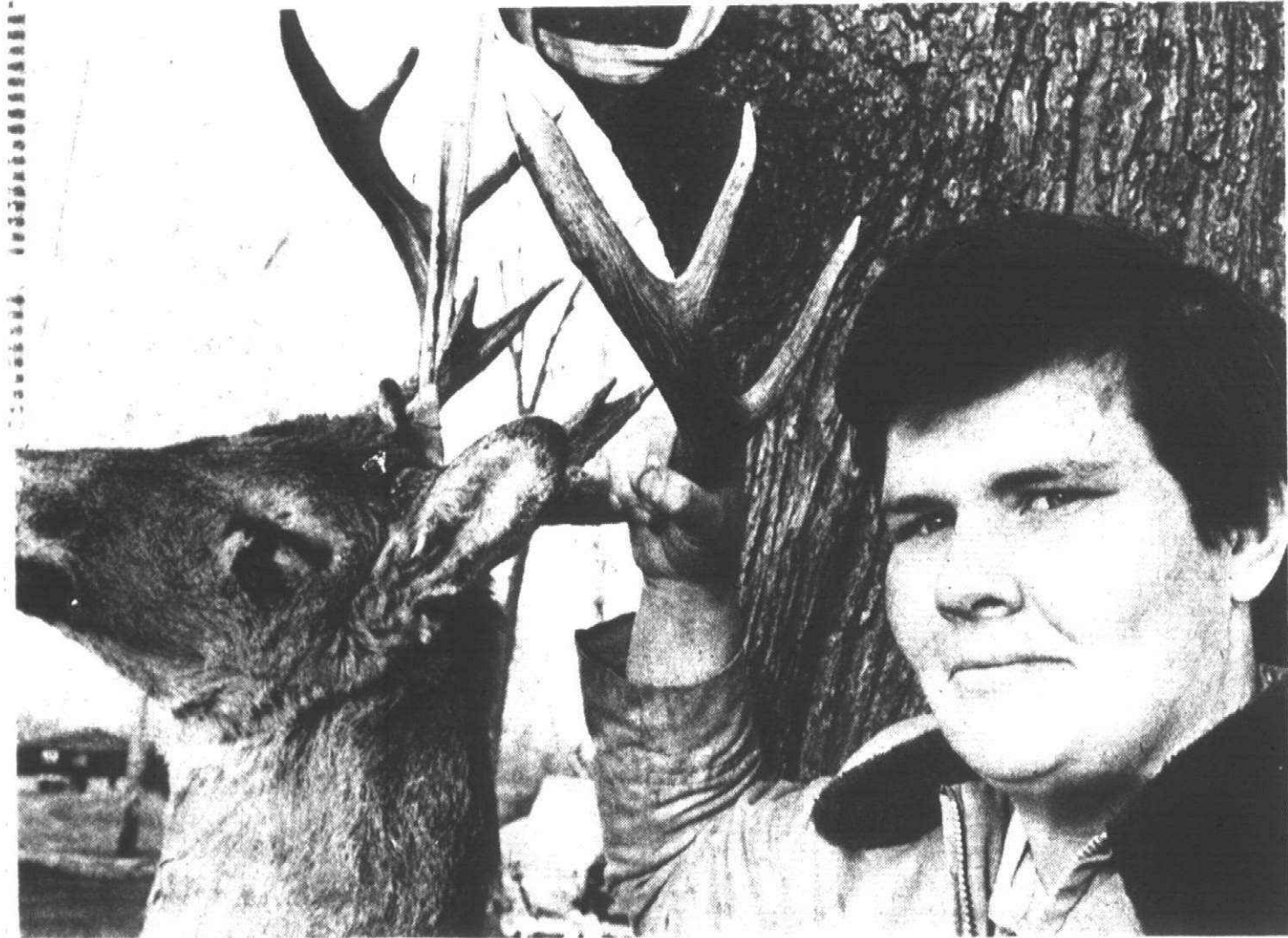

Bell and Howell exec to speak

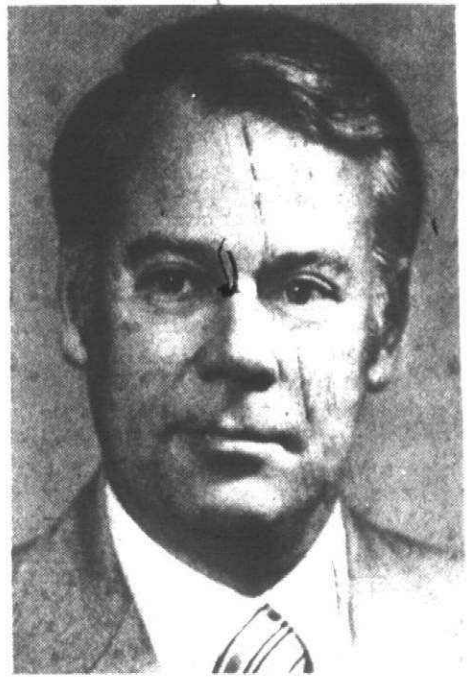

Scouts help handicapped at institutions in Plymouth

"If they are handicapped in one way, they are gifted in many others."

That is the way Barbara Jean Eckles and William Baumgartner appraise a very special group of Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts they work with at two local facilities for the mentally handicapped.

"Scouting offers something for all youngsters," explains Mrs. Eckles, who is also a speech therapist at Our Lady of Providence School. "It presents new experiences and helps them fulfill all of their potential."

The girls in Mrs. Eckles troop have been involved in a variety of craft and service projects. They have made dried flower arrangements for shut-ins and apple turkey centerpieces for the Hendry Convalescent Home. They sewed banners for troop celebrations and built birdfeeders to be used by themselves and their friends.

The yarn dolls which they made as part of their toymaker badge were presented to children at the Plymouth Center for Human Development.

"We've done many things with the Plymouth scouts," Mrs. Eckles notes. "We joined them at the Christmas Sing and in the Scouts' Bicentennial Celebration in the spring."

"At one of our joint activities, the Plymouth scouts presented our troop with a flowering crabapple tree."

BAUMGARTNER'S BOY SCOUT Troop at the Plymouth Center for Human Development has emphasized hiking and other outdoor activities. It includes about 15 young men, mostly from 16 to 23 years of age, and is sponsored by the Plymouth Optimist Club.

Back in the early '60s, the Optimist Club was looking for a service project that would benefit one of the institutions for the mentally retarded," Baumgartner recalls. "We thought we might paint a building or something."

"Instead, one of the staff at the center suggested we organize a Boy Scout Troop."

Baumgartner began as head of the troop committee and assumed leadership of the

troop 11 years ago. "Mostly we take the boys out on nature hikes on the weekend," he says. "We point out animal tracks, rescue snakes from cisterns or go tobogganing."

"I consider it a privilege to spend time with them," says the scoutmaster, an electronics teacher at Schoolcraft College. "They are very affectionate and unhibited—very rewarding to work with."

The Detroit Area Council of Boy Scouts and the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council are both agencies of the Plymouth Community Fund, which now is winding up its fall

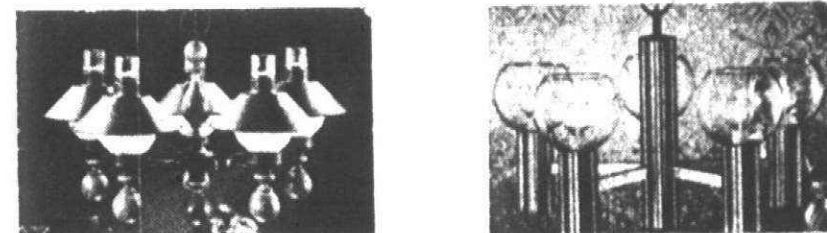
campaign for donations. Contributions are welcomed at Box 356, Plymouth.

Scouting in Plymouth involves hundreds of adult volunteers—171 in Girl Scouts and about 350 in Boy Scouts. About 1,050 girls and 1,275 boys are troop members in Plymouth.

At the Plymouth Center for Human Development and at Our Lady of Providence School there are waiting lists of youngsters who want to be involved in scouting. All that is needed are a few more adults like Bill Baumgartner and Barbara Jean Eckles to lead them.

SC retiree service ends

If you are retired and looking for part-time or temporary work, there will be no more help from Schoolcraft College. Just one month before funding for the Retiree Placement program was to expire, coordinator Yvonne Cassidy has resigned and the program has been terminated.

The Retiree Placement Service, funded through the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA), had been created to assist retired persons over the age of 50 obtain meaningful part-time employment.

The service successfully referred mature, dependable, experienced people to employers with hard-to-fill jobs. People who were unaware that they had marketable skills found jobs as management professionals, clerical workers, salespeople, service workers and skilled tradespeople.

"It was gratifying that people were able to work in capacities related to previous life work as well as those related to hobbies or recreational interests," said Ms. Cassidy.

With the closing of the service, Ms. Cassidy suggests that retirees and employers should now contact the Michigan Employment Security Commission or local employment agencies.

JA to open new office

Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan will open a new area office at 21720 Grand River, Detroit, with a dedication ceremony open to the public at 9 a.m. Nov. 24.

The S.S. Kresge Co. will be honored with a plaque for donating the building to Junior Achievement. The building was formerly a Kresge office. The new building became necessary due to crowded conditions at JA's present site at 14812 Grand River.

The dedication ceremony will give the public a chance to tour the building and meet some of the young people involved in JA. Currently over 6,000 students and 1,000 adults participate in Junior Achievement in southeastern Michigan.

GI Bill pays for tutoring

The Veterans Administration today reminded veterans and servicemen enrolled in college under the GI Bill that if they need tutoring help, VA pays for it.

Uncle Sam didn't pay for tutorial assistance for World War II and Korean conflict veterans but under present law, VA will pay as much as \$65 a month for tutoring up to a maximum of \$780.

The tutorial help is not charged against the veteran's basic educational entitlement.

In addition to veterans and active duty servicemen, tutorial benefits are available to widows, widowers, spouses and children studying under the VA's Dependents' Educational Assistance Program.

Application should be made within a year of the tutoring. It should be submitted to the VA regional office which maintains the veteran's claim folder and it should be certified by the school, VA said.

Bundarin's recount try shows crybaby politics

It was no surprise when second place finisher Robert Greenstein submitted his request for a recount this week in the Canton Township supervisor's race, as his ardent followers had hoped. But out of left field came third-place finisher Peter Bundarin, a man who managed to sidestep the mudslinging and avoid campaign hysteria, asking for recount and sliding head first into the mire.

Bundarin stated earlier this week he hopes enough votes will change in a recount so that Greenstein will find a majority with his write-in stickers.

If you still follow the logic, Bundarin says he will challenge every write-in vote that does not have an 'X' or cross next to the name of Robert Greenstein. That takes in about 99 per cent of the write-in vote. If his challenge is upheld, Bundarin said Canton will then be forced to schedule another election where he would have a second chance.

A CLEARER EXAMPLE of crybaby politics would be hard to find.

Bundarin is sore that he lost votes to Greenstein in subdivision-heavy precincts because both he and Greenstein called for "growth control."

Bundarin suggests that if the recount does nothing else, it might discourage future "divisive write-in attempts."

None of these is a good reason for requesting a recount. And who is Bundarin to criticize "divisive" actions of the write-in group when he is a part of move to continue to divide the township after the voters have spoken and chosen?

We're not enthralled at the prospect of Harold Stein as supervisor. But these last-ditch, desperate attempts to avoid reality won't help Canton proceed in a progressive manner.

THE DAY AFTER the election, Bundarin begrudgingly said he'd accept his defeat and keep an eye on the board and a hand in an advisory capacity. That attitude was to be applauded.

So what happened to change his mind?

It could have something to do with the fact that

Bureaucracy can bear down

There was a great big Congress bear with a great big voice, a middle-sized conservative Court bear with a middle-sized voice, and a wee little administrative bureaucracy bear with a wee little voice.

the 15th Congressional District Republican Party is providing legal assistance to Bundarin while they search law books for technicalities to overturn the write-in votes.

Bundarin could be letting his arm be twisted by party hard-liners who fear the two-party system is suffering from damaging cracks. We heard similar complaints from people in the Democratic party who wanted to crush the perfectly legal, but "inefficient and bothersome," write-in campaigns.

We didn't approve with the write-in effort, but we'll fight for their right to conduct a write-in campaign. And Bundarin has no business attempting to dissuade anyone from exercising that right.

The most transparent argument offered by Bundarin is that the will of the majority was not met in the last election since Harold Stein only received 37 per cent of the electorate. Granted, that's not a heavy vote of confidence but it does represent a plurality—pending the recount.

CERTAINLY IF Peter Bundarin had managed to round up 37 per cent of the vote to win, he would not be complaining that he did not represent the community's will.

Some 3,808 voters in Canton Township chose Harold Stein to be their new supervisor. If Bundarin is concerned that Stein doesn't reflect the mainstream, he should become a township watchdog.

Another 3,354 voters took the time and trouble to write in Robert Greenstein's name for supervisor. Bundarin should drop any move that attempts to disenfranchise these voters who knew what they were doing when they placed their sticker votes on the machine for Greenstein.

Shock waves set off by the horrible murder of Farmington Hills business executive David Jones are still rattling around the entire metropolitan area nearly two weeks after he was shot in an unlighted parking lot at Olympia Stadium in Detroit.

A great deal of finger-pointing is going on in Detroit, which is struggling to make the suburbanites on whom the city depends for its economic survival feel it is safe to come downtown. The attendants at the parking lot who evidently went home early are being reviewed and probably will be disciplined, perhaps fired. The Detroit parking lot authority is looking into overall questions of lighting, guarding and safety at lots throughout the city.

Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and the Common Council continue to make positive-sounding statements about the improvement in safety in the big city, while simultaneously squabbling over procedure and recommendations forthcoming from a business-labor anti-crime task force.

Here in the suburbs, people hunker down just a little more (if that's possible), turn on the TV, and scan the entertainment pages of their local newspapers to find something to do in the suburbs at night.

MEANWHILE, work continues slowly but with creepy inevitability on the Jeffries Freeway (I-96), which will directly connect the suburbs of

western Wayne County with Detroit in the same way that I-75 links Oakland County communities with the core city.

The Good Lord only knows just when they'll finally get the big ditch done, but it will come some day not too far in the future. And merely the sight of bulldozers and earth movers steadily grinding away at the site proves that the core city and the suburbs are necessarily connected in a life and death grip.

Those of us living in the suburbs, frankly, are pretty worried about going downtown these days. This is nothing new, nor will nice words from Detroit officials convince us it's safe to go to a concert or a hockey game in the near future.

But as any local police officer knows, even if suburbanites are not going to downtown Detroit, criminals from the core city are quite capable of using those nice, expensive, efficient freeways to

drive out to the suburbs. The recent shooting spree in the middle of a holdup at Eight Mile and Lahser Road offers easy example of the point.

WHAT OUGHT to be clear to everybody is that as long as we have expressways and cars and people with criminally aggressive instincts with access to guns, there will be murders and robberies and rapes, regardless of whether they take place in downtown Detroit or in peaceful suburbs.

Crime is our common enemy, whether we are city dwellers or suburbanites. And the sooner we recognize this simple fact, the better off we all will be.

The divisions between Detroit and the suburbs are harsh and deep, almost certainly, they will not be healed easily or quickly. But equally certainly, the obvious binding link available to knit the suburbs together with the core city is their common abhorrence of criminals and fear of crime.

Some day, soon I hope, some regional statesman is going to propose a grand alliance between the City of Detroit and the suburbs to begin a collective fight against crime. And when that happens, it might be come to be known as a monument to the life of a gentle, thoughtful suburbanite whose life was snuffed out for a few bucks in his wallet.

A major power

Teachers aim to collect

The big city mayors got all the attention with their national meeting and how they expect all kinds of money to flow from the friendly Carter administration after Jan. 20.

But there's another group standing in line to collect on the debts they think are owed them by President-elect Carter and the new Congress. To hear the National Education Association tell it, "Teacher Power" won it for the Carter-Mondale ticket and a host of congressmen, mostly Democrats.

NEA has as many statistics as the University of Michigan football publicists, and they all show teachers have made it as a major political power.

THERE IS NO FALSE modesty in the NEA. "Energy, dedication, money, time, creative minds"—that's the opening line of NEA's post-election handout describing how and why teachers were so effective.

NEA's political action committee endorsed 349 candidates—323 for the house and 26 for the senate, in addition to the Carter-Mondale ticket. It spent \$597,000, or about \$2,100 per race where it plunked down money, and claims a record success rate of 84 per cent.

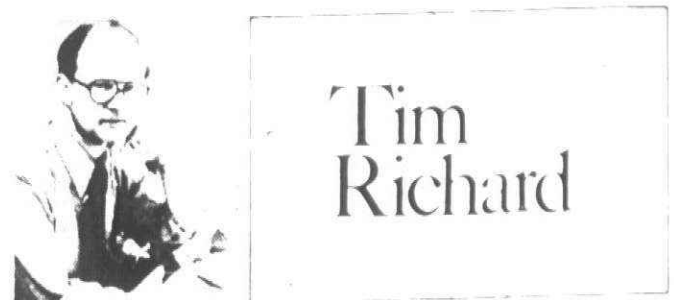
NEA collected all sorts of quotes from candidates about how helpful teachers were. Virginia Democrat Herbert Harris gave them one of the best: "It struck me so many times during this campaign that teachers have a natural ability to mobilize people and a tremendous ability to get others to work in a campaign."

Indeed, there are so many quotes from successful candidates that it's quite apparent NEA intends to remind them of all they owe organized teachers.

Some NEA affiliate unions had negotiated contracts which allow teachers one day of "civil leave" a year. Many teachers took election day.

WHAT PRICE do the teachers intend to extract from Carter and the new Congress?

General federal aid to education seems to be top priority. The Michigan Democratic Party plat-

form, written with great teacher input, sets 33 per cent of local school districts' budgets as the goal for federal aid. At present, schools around here are getting around two per cent of the budgets from the federal government and rarely more than five per cent, mostly for specialized programs such as remedial reading and vocational courses.

Hmmmm, 33 per cent federal funding. That will pay for a lot of yummy salary increases!

While general social problems of the cities such as crime and housing get the most public attention, the Carter administration and Congress will almost certainly be reminded that the Detroit school district, among others, is in extremely rough shape after losing two straight requests for a property tax increase.

ALMOST THE ONLY thing that can hurt teachers is that NEA leaders backed the wrong candidate in the primaries.

The teachers found U.S. Rep. Morris Udall (D-Arizona) more to their liking, and Michigan sent a giant wad of teachers to the national convention as Udall delegates. Whether Carter will hold that against them remains to be seen. If Carter can pardon draft resisters, he can probably forgive the organized teachers for backing Udall in the primaries.

To be sure, not all teachers are militantly political and in favor of federal funding of education. But the leadership thinks that way, and the leadership calls the shots. And the leadership is after more.

What a night to remember. Getting tossed out of a Chinese restaurant and getting hit on the mouth with a dice box thrown by your new boss in a blind pig.

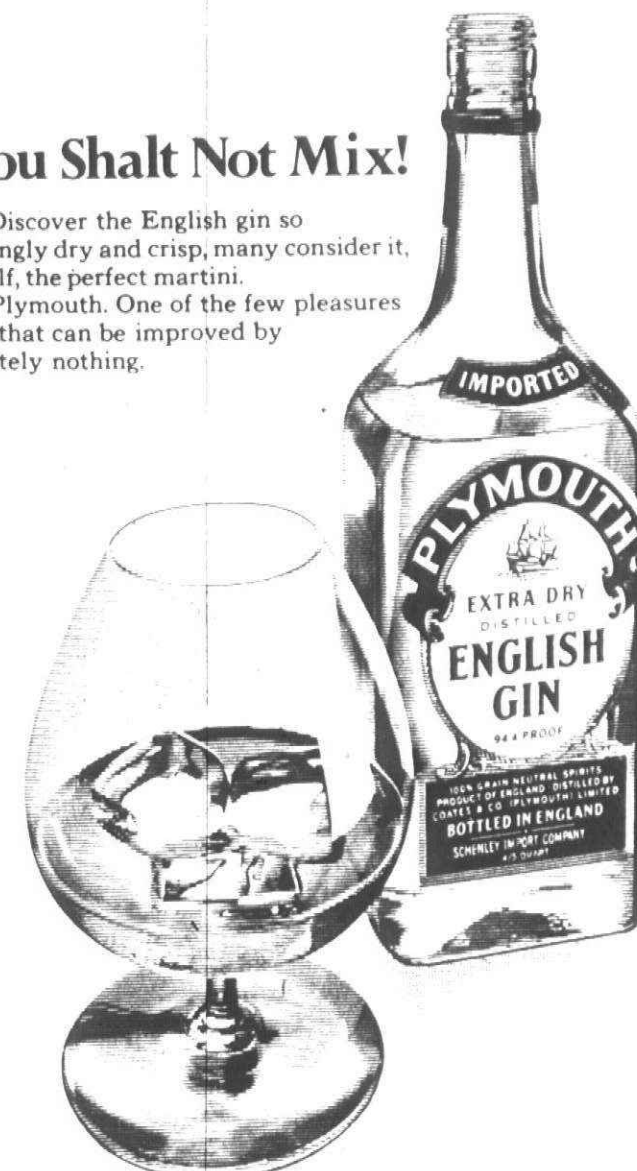
The old gent with the hourglass just chuckled as he reached for the calendar to circle Nov. 19.

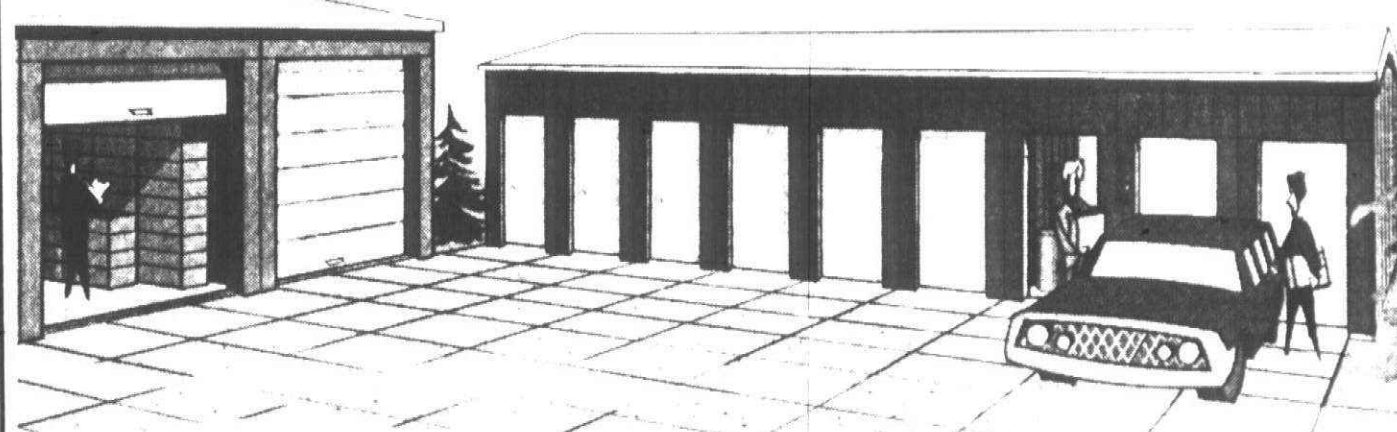

Pursell win margin's solidified

State Sen. Carl Pursell is moving closer to becoming the official winner in the 2d Congressional district race by a 337-vote margin.

The Plymouth Republican, whose senate district includes Livonia and Redford Township, had Wayne and Monroe counties canvassing boards formally certify the Nov. 2 election results.

But there is a delay in the Washtenaw County election workers and canvassing board finalizing their tallies for the congressional race.

The Washtenaw clerk's office said Wednesday morning it is still working on election totals.

If there is no change in election results, Pursell, 43, will succeed Rep. Marvin

Esch, who represented the district for 10 years before running and losing a U.S. Senate campaign.

Lawyers for Democrat Ed Pierce, Ann Arbor physician, refused to comment whether they will seek a recount of the Nov. 2 vote.

Orville Tungate, Wayne County deputy clerk, told The Observer that the law or House rules allows for a recount in a congressional general election and he concluded that Pierce was a narrow loser in the race.

IN THE MEANTIME, Pursell is preparing to assume the congressional seat although he was careful to say, "I can't officially claim victory until the results are certified."

But Pursell said, "I believe I will be the next congressman for the 2d District. I intend to pursue all appropriate preparations toward assuming office, such as policy and operational briefings for new members of Congress."

The senator said that he feels there will be no changes in the election outcome when the tallies are completed.

"All indications are that our margin is solid," Pursell said.

"Everything reported to me suggests this was one of the most technically sound and procedurally clean elections we've ever had. I have seen nothing that could give anyone legitimate cause to challenge the outcome."

Pierce had filed a civil suit after the election to force the Wayne County clerk to allow him to see the unofficial tallies before they are formally certified by the board of canvassers. He was granted that right but there were no change in the election figures.

Pursell said he has no objection to "the parties involved observing the canvass procedures, as long as everyone has equal standing and no undue effort is made to interfere with or influence the canvassing process."

Pursell expressed confidence that the election figures in the three counties will "stand up to any objective analysis."

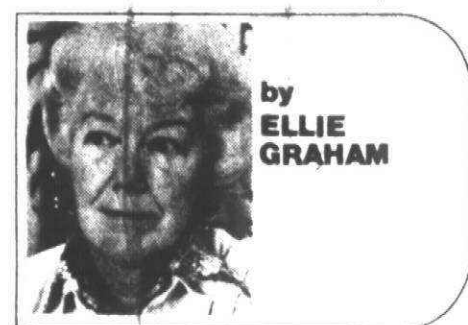
The speaker was Fred DeLano.

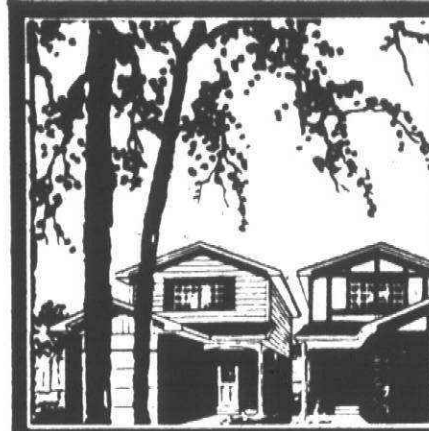
Prizes will be presented to the ACBL continent-wide winners as well as the victors in each of the 25 districts within ACBL.

Domestic violence aired at Schoolcraft forum

"From January through May 1974 in Washtenaw County wives were attacked with an electric sander, a shotgun, a leather belt with a brass buckle, a hunting knife, a hand axe, a car and a telephone," announced Bonnie Jordan, a member of the NOW Domestic Violence Project of Washtenaw County.

She presented this grizzly piece of news at a forum sponsored by the women's resource center at Schoolcraft College.

It was hard for the women in the audience to believe that almost 10 years after the beginning of the well publicized fight for women rights, women are still having their eyes blackened and their bodies broken by their loved ones.

But the records of the Washtenaw County Sheriff indicate that the situation is even worse than they had believed. Then the speaker gave them further food for thought.

"WIFE BEATING is considered the most under reported crime," declared Mrs. Jordan, who is a social worker. "What is reported to the police is only the tip of the iceberg."

Fortunately, more of the iceberg is slowing coming to the surface. Just as child abusers are coming out of the nursery into the light in order to be able to solve their problems, abused wives are deciding to admit their problem in the hope of receiving aid.

At least in Ann Arbor. In that city there is a sanctuary for them at 1917 Washtenaw, where a helping hand awaits them.

The NOW Domestic Violence Committee, an outgrowth of a task force of the National Organization of Women but no longer affiliated with it, can be reached 24 hours a day.

Since July 1975 it has offered battered women counseling to help and them make up their minds about what they want to do.

If necessary, they can be referred to a lawyer if they want to get a divorce or to legal officials if they wish to prosecute the man who knocked them around.

Even more importantly, the domestic violence committee has established a number of emergency homes offered by volunteers in which the injured wife and her children can find temporary refuge.

Because the shadow of violence could fall over this home, the women must sign a contract promising not to reveal her whereabouts.

Aware that the Ann Arbor group is breaking new ground, the federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration has bankrolled the project to the tune of \$130,000.

The Comprehensive Employment Training Act is paying for two fulltime employees, including an emergency housing coordinator and a supervisor of peer counselors.

What turned on the Feds is the project's goal "to deliver crisis intervention for rape victims and battered women."

The organization also has 37 volunteers.

TRYING TO DRAW a composite picture of the battered wife is difficult. Victims are rich and poor and come from every race, religion, ethnic background and educational level.

"Typically these women have little self confidence," observed Mrs. Jordan. "Their self esteem is low. They are usually alienated, isolated individuals. Often they have had their problem so long their friends and relatives are tired of them."

In many cases they married young, before developing the skills to make an independent income. According to Mrs. Jordan many of them need assertiveness training to protect their right not to be injured.

"Not all of these women think assertively," she said. "Unless they are brought up in a certain way, they might assume they do not have the right to freedom from assault."

She disagreed with the assumption made by some that battered wives are masochistic and get their jollies by being slammed into the floor. None of the women she has worked fit this stereotype.

"People wonder why these women stay with their men," Mrs. Jordan said. "Society often blames the victim. It happens in rape cases. The idea is that she must have deserved it or like it."

The frequency and severity of the beating is also generally involved in her decision to stay or go.

"If not too frequent or too severe, she will stay," indicated the speaker. "She balances two black eyes with an ADC check and decides to stay home where she will have an income."

Women tend to believe their men again and again when they come on strong with apologies and promises.

"But if violence occurs in the first year of the marriage, it is likely to occur again and will get worse and increase in frequency," said Mrs. Jordan. "Yet, until they are beaten for years, they delude themselves into thinking it will stop."

mented Mrs. Jordan. "They saw it happen to their mom and they think it's their lot in life. If you think that is what you must expect, then you don't think much of yourself as a person."

Alcohol is involved in about 60 per cent of assault cases, but Mrs. Jordan discounted drink as a cause of wife-beating.

"It is a disinhibitor," she claimed. "Women say that if only he wouldn't drink, he wouldn't abuse them. But I am not convinced it would stop. He uses drink as an excuse. He pretends to lose control."

"Even under the influence of alcohol he seems to be able to define boundaries. He might beat her but not stab her with a knife. But some place he draws a line as to what is acceptable behavior."

'No place is safe,' warns fraud expert

Getting a "bug" is as simple as sending \$14.95 to an ad in Playboy magazine. That's what fraud expert Robert Farr told a packed Northville Town Hall audience, adding that it's equally easy to "take a paper trip" to get new identities.

Stating that there are hundreds of thousands of people who have a second, or false identity today, the former Scripps Howard science writer said that for \$7.04 each he obtained one true and two completely false identification cards at a photo office in Grand Central Station in New York.

Such identification cards also can be obtained in downtown Detroit. With only this official-looking card with his picture on it, he said, he was able to cash a check in a supermarket.

With such identification, the speaker continued, it is possible to use the name, gleaned from old newspaper files, of someone who was born and died shortly thereafter, to get a copy of that person's birth certificate.

With the birth certificate, a passport, bank account or driver's license can be obtained.

All this is possible, he pointed out, because there is no cross check of birth and death records in the United States.

THE BIG BUSINESS today, however, is in electronic devices which have come into use within the past 10 years and have a volume of business in the two billion dollar category in the United States yearly. Farr told the women gathered in the Plymouth-Hilton.

"No place is safe from eavesdroppers' ears," he emphasized, "with technology going forward at a very rapid pace."

With the proper equipment, it's possible for an eavesdropper on any direct-dial telephone anywhere to hear what is being said on that phone, or within 18 feet of it, without the receiver of that telephone being lifted, Farr went on.

Admitting that this is unethical if not illegal, as protecting laws have been slow in coming, the expert revealed he—as anyone could with the equipment—had "dialed Queen Elizabeth's boudoir in England."

In Detroit such devices are in use, he continued, during labor negotiations.

After revealing to two startled members of the audience that they had indeed been "bugged" with small devices attached to the bottom of their chairs, Farr said such cigarette-lighter size items could be hidden in a wastebasket or under Kleenex in its box.

The stirrer in the drink on his podium, he showed, was a "bug" with its antenna in the straw. This, he declared, could operate with a receiver as much as three miles distant.

"DON'T SPEND money on alarm systems or locks—and that also goes for cheap fire alarm systems," he told his luncheon audience afterward.

"A cockroach or an ant can set off an alarm system," Farr declared. He showed his audience a \$26 pick gun with which any 10-cylinder lock, he said, could be opened as fast as with its key.

"There isn't much protection anywhere for us these days," Farr continued. He has written four books on his specialty, including "The Electronic Criminals."

"The most important thing you can do to protect your home," he stressed, "is to make friends with your neighbors so that they will watch your house while you watch theirs."

He added that anyone who is to be away from home should do all possible to see that it still looks "lived in."

"Cancel the papers and be sure someone cuts the lawn," he urged.

A telephone answering device sometimes helps, the expert felt, as would-be intruders often telephone first to see if anyone answers.

FARR DEMONSTRATED how a "bug" could be inserted in a telephone in seconds.

"If you hear noises on your telephone, you're not being bugged," he declared, "for you never hear one—one tiny screw is the only identification there is."

"Sometimes your local police will investigate, if the telephone company confirms the bugging, but you don't have much protection against it."

Novi Police Chief Lee BeGole, who introduced the speaker, affirmed that he would—and has—investigated such situations and would call upon technical help available through the state police.

Farr debunked the image of women as espionage agents, saying, "sex has been

used on a very, very limited scale through the years.

"Mata Hari was a prostitute, a simple Dutch girl from north Holland who really didn't do a good job. She is famous because the French government in World War I decided to put her in front of the firing squad as an example."

Writer lists strategies to keep Jewish identity

The age-old problem of Jewish identity was taken up by author Irving Howe in a speech during the 25th annual Jewish book fair in the Jewish Community Center of Metropolitan Detroit in West Bloomfield.

Howe is writer of "World of Our Fathers," the story of the Jewish immigrants who came to the U.S. The book was on the New York Times list of best sellers for 33 weeks.

Also professor of English at the graduate center of City University of New York and at Hunter College, Howe is the author of many books and book reviews.

"A Jew is he who is called a Jew by non-Jews," began Howe quoting Jean Paul Sartre. But, he felt, this was only a partial definition.

Jews can now choose whether or not they wish to be Jews, he noted, "so the mere fact of having been born Jewish does not settle the question of their Jewishness."

With religious Jews there has never been a problem of identity, he said, but "with flights into alien culture" the problem has arisen among secular Jews.

The majority of Jews reject assimilation as morally sterile and culturally uninteresting," Howe pointed out, yet it has been a threat to Jewish life.

He indicated that assimilation may ac-

count for the current popularity of his book as "the last hurrah of nostalgia and a salute to the past."

He listed four strategies by which the non-religious or intermittently religious Jews keep alive their Jewishness. The immigration experience described in "World of Our Fathers" is one of them.

"But this is receding into history," he claimed. "The memory of it cannot much longer nurture Jewish life. But the past can yield elements of value which we cherish."

He then wondered how the Yiddish folk culture could be maintained when the Yiddish language dies out.

ETHICAL VALUES are means by which Jews keep alive their Jewishness.

"For many American Jews, these values have been fulfilled by their work for social progress, he said, adding that this is "one of the strengths and glories of Jewish life."

They have by and large retained their liberal outlook, the speaker believed, adding that "conservatism would be a great shame for American Jews, who have maintained their liberal sympathies even though rising on the economic scale."

He attributed these ideals about man and his relation to his community to the romanticism of the 19th century when new ideas slowly penetrated the minds of younger Jews on nationhood, relations be-

tween the sexes and the expectation of what might come on this earth.

Zionism is permeated with assumptions of romanticisms that still color Jewish life, Howe maintained.

Yet he felt that "being Jewish should not be reduced to social ideals, and I'm not saying Jews should be devoted to liberalism just to solve the problem of Jewish identity."

"Whatever commitments we make in politics or faith must be made for their own sake."

THE THIRD strategy used by the less religious for maintaining a Jewish identity is the memory of what happened during World War II.

"We need to keep alive the memory of the holocaust," Howe said.

As the fourth strategy, he listed the rise of Israel, the new focus of Jewish sentiments.

Even Jews who haven't any residual Jewish feeling have a strong feeling about Israel," Howe said. "It will remain as a center of obligation of Jewish life."

Concluding his lecture, Howe claimed that being Jewish remains "an experience of weight, significance and value."

Noting that 50 years from now American Jews would still be discussing the problem of identity, he asked, "Is not that very discussion a mark of identity?"

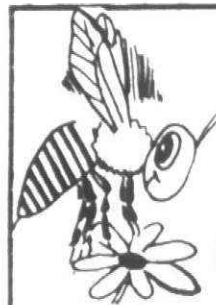

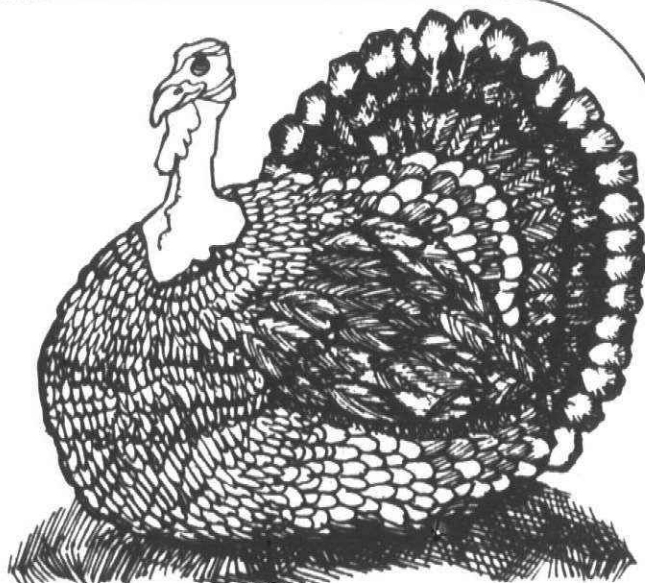

Director strikes adventurous note

Wayne Dunlap's hallmark as musical director of the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra is that at least half the works in any season have never been performed previously for local audiences.

The job becomes harder when an orchestra hits the 30-year mark, but Dunlap has still managed to program 80 per cent "new" material for the concert this Sunday at 4 p.m. in Plymouth Salem High School, Joy west of Canton Center roads.

The musical director has often said it would be easy to select crowd pleasers like the "1812 Overture," but the performers would tire of it and audiences would learn nothing.

On the other hand, new music must be familiar enough in style so that listeners will comprehend and not so unfamiliar that it's beyond the average listener.

HEADLINE ATTRACTION will be Keum Ja Kim, the diminutive coloratura soprano from Korea and the University of Michigan.

Miss Kim's big voice will get a stiff test

in Mozart's Scena for Soprano, an aria or scene intended to be performed on the concert stage rather than as part of an opera.

It is a miniature concerto for voice rather than for a solo interest. This particular Scena was written about the time of Mozart's opera "Don Giovanni," when he was at the peak of his powers.

In the second half of the program, Miss Kim will be heard in another work new to Plymouth audiences—four songs by Richard Strauss, composed in the last year of that broad-gauged (1948) master's life. The orchestration is particularly vivid.

ERIC COATES' "London Suite" will open the program. A new work to Plymouth, it was composed in 1933.

Despite its unfamiliarity, Dunlap believes the local audience will find this light, effectively orchestrated work easily understandable.

Sir Edward Elgar, best known to casual listeners for "Pomp and Circumstance" at graduations and his cello concerto, will be represented on the program with "Variations on an Original Theme (Enigma)."

It is a set of 14 variations on an original theme, each dedicated with initials to a friend.

The program will close with a work loved by nearly everyone—the waltzes from "Der Rosenkavalier" by Richard Strauss. The original opera is light in mood, set in 18th century Austria, and an old-fashioned crowd pleaser.

The concert is funded in part by a grant from the Michigan State Council for the

Arts, a donation from Ford Motor Co.'s Sheldon Road plant and the Plymouth Symphony League. The impact is to hold ticket prices to a modest \$3.50 (half price for senior citizens, free for K-12 students).

Dunlap's adventurous programming may not quite fit Plymouth's image as a staid, puritanical community of burghers, but it makes for mind-expanding listening.

Wietecha finished first in five dual meets and ran the three-mile course at Cass Benton Park in under 16 minutes in all but one race. He holds the Churchill record at Cass Benton (16:29) and the West-

ern Six record (15:39) at another course.

The senior also finished second in the Livonia City Meet, third at the Wayne Invitational and sixth at the Schoolcraft Invitational.

TOBIN JONES, junior, Livonia Churchill. Jones frequently was a shadow of Wietecha this season, staying with his teammate stride for stride in several meets. His ability to keep pace enabled him to record many good finishes and earn a position on the all-O & E team.

Jones placed second in the Western Six League Meet, third at the Livonia City Meet, ninth in the regionals and sixth at the Class A state finals.

The junior finished fifth at the Wayne Invitational, sixth at the Redford Union Invitational and 14th at the Schoolcraft Invitational.

JIM DYDO, senior, Garden City East. East coach Ron Clifton said that the leadership and performance of Dydo were keys to the Panthers' best season in more than a decade.

The senior placed first in seven dual

meets and second in the Northwest Suburban League Meet. A co-captain of the team, Dydo finished third at the Western Wayne and the Crestwood Invitionals, 11th at the RU Invitational, 12th at the regionals, 16th at the Schoolcraft Invitational and 32d at the Class A finals.

Dydo has compiled a 4.0 grade point average and plans to attend the University of Michigan next year.

MARK BOYD, senior, Garden City West. Boyd, who placed first in seven of nine dual meets this season, holds the West home course record (Hines Park) with a clocking of 16:03.

The senior bested the field at the West Invitational, placed third in the Tri-River League Meet, fourth at the Wayne Invitational, fifth at the RU Invitational, seventh at the West Bloomfield Invitational and 12th at the Schoolcraft Invitational.

Boyd finished 17th at the regionals, running the final two miles with only one shoe after being spiked. Ironically, he missed qualifying for the state finals by one place.

SCOTT KLEAM, junior, Plymouth

Salem. Kleam, who finished first in every Suburban Eight League dual or tri meet in which he competed this season, also won the league meet with a time of 15:52.

He placed second in the Wayne County Meet at Rouge Park with a clocking of 14:51, 15th at the regionals and eighth at the state meet.

Kleam, a three-year runner, has qualified for the Class A finals all three years and was the best freshman finisher in the 1974 meet.

TED UNOLD, senior, Westland John Glenn. Also a three-year competitor, Unold galloped to an impressive trio of championships this fall.

The senior placed first in the Northwest Suburban League Meet, the Schoolcraft Invitational and the Wayne Invitational. Unold finished 19th at the regionals, just missing the cut-off point for the state finals.

BILL WILKIN, senior, Livonia Steven-

son. The Spartans' top finisher all season, Wilkin placed first in five of six dual meets and first in the Livonia City Meet and the Milford Lakeland Invitational.

Wilkin placed second in the Inter-Lakes League Meet, second at the regionals, a half-second behind Wietecha, and led the Spartans to a fifth-place team standing in the state meet.

The two-year letterman holds the Stevenson record at Cass Benton Park with the time of 15:35.

BRIAN MURPHY, senior, Plymouth Canton. "He (Murphy) started out slowly, but gained momentum with the season," said Canton coach Dick Goepf, who termed Murphy "an excellent team leader."

Murphy owns the Canton school record of 16:11 at Cass Benton Park. He placed eighth at the Western Six League Meet and 18th at the regionals this season.

JEFF PERRINE, junior, Garden City East. Perrine, like Murphy, improved tre-

mendously during the course of the season. Perrine placed sixth at the Northwest Suburban League Meet, fourth at the Western Wayne and the Crestwood Invitionals, 14th at the regionals, 18th at the Schoolcraft Invitational and 22d at the RU Invitational.

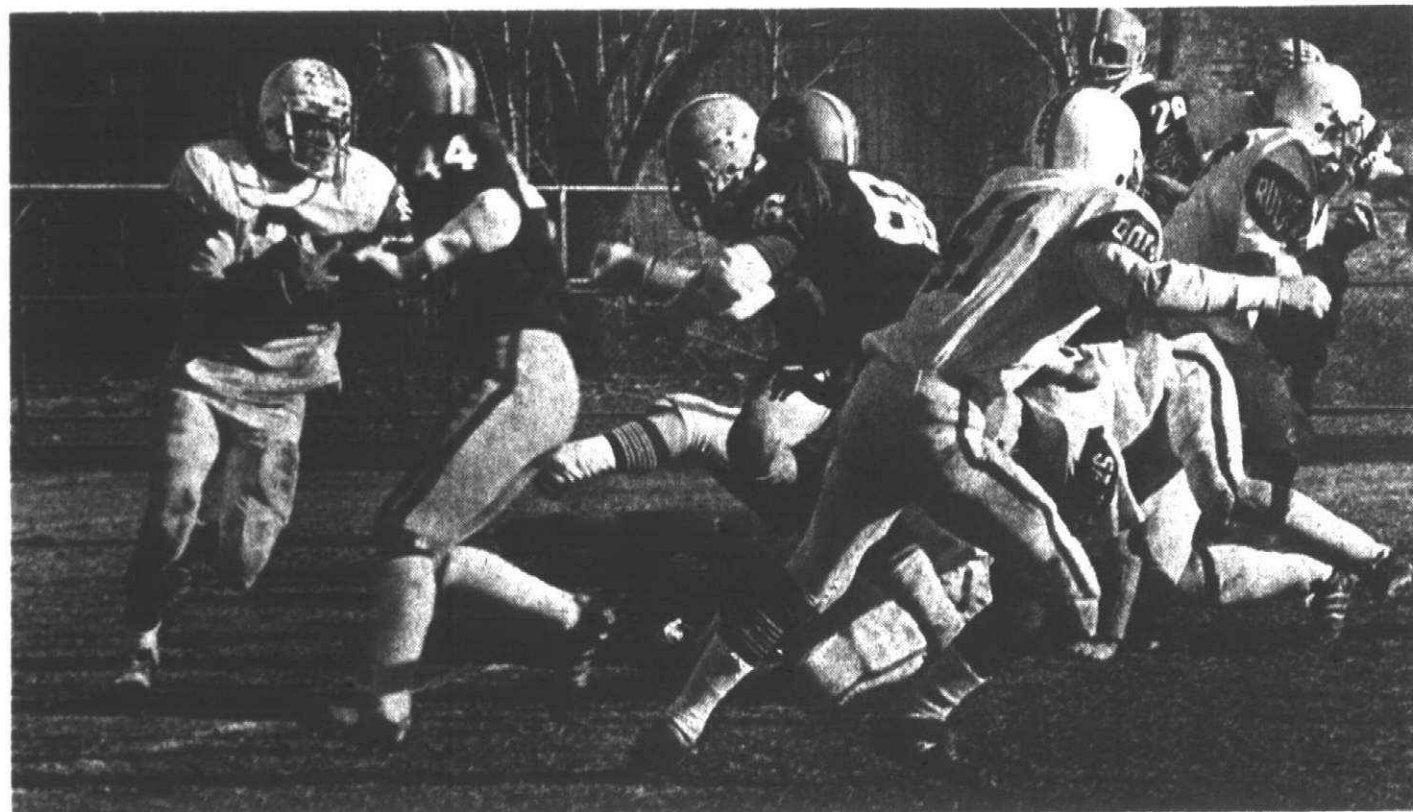
The number two harrier on the team, Perrine is a B-plus student at East.

Plymouth action begins Saturday

Cagers vie for district title

For the boys, it's called March Madness, but for the girls you can call it Thanksgiving Madness.

But whatever you call it, state tournament basketball proves to be the most exciting part of any cage season.

And in the Walled Lake Western district, where both Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton participate this Saturday, many questions that are now formulating in the minds of fans, players and coaches will be answered Tuesday night.

The biggest question is whether Plymouth Salem, the favored team with a 17-0 record, can maintain that perfect

mark and move to regional competition in Farmington.

TOURNAMENT ACTION BEGINS tonight when Walled Lake Central and Detroit Kettering tangle at 7 p.m. with the winner playing Salem on Saturday also at 7 p.m.

Central is the likely winner since it's only the first year for girls basketball at Kettering. But Central's squad is too young to compete with the Rocks' experience.

In the other bracket, the surest bet tonight is Western beating the worst Western-Six team, Northville, in an 8:30 p.m. game. The winner plays Canton at the

same time on Saturday.

McCauley has the simple solution for his squad—overtake Western and reach the finals.

"We've lost two close games to them and we should have won the first time at our court," McCauley said. "We are going to have to get our offense going and we are going to have to be fired up."

"If we aren't fired up we won't win, it's as simple as that."

As far as the possibility of playing sister-school Salem in the championship game on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m., McCauley said, "They must have an awfully good team because they are undefeated."



Action continues at DRC

Joining the apprentice jockey ranks this week was 19-year-old Earl (Tommy) Knapp, son of the late E.J. Knapp, a perennial winner at Livonia's Detroit Race Course during the 1950s and 60s.

E.J. won the Michigan Mile aboard My Night Out in 1957, the year Tommy was born. The veteran jockey also repeated in Michigan's richest race in 1961 on American Comet.

Knapp Sr. continued his distinguished career, becoming almost a permanent resident of Livonia, until a tragic accident on the racetrack at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Ark., ended his life in 1973.

Knapp was exercising a fractious horse which flipped him to the track giving Knapp a severe concussion despite his wearing the Caliente safety helmet. The winner of more than 1,200 races died in a Hot Springs hospital a few hours after the accident.

Young Tommy got a leg up last Monday at the DRC aboard a 6-year-old gelding named Lay It On. Tommy rode a perfect race, squeezing between horses for running room and beat everybody in the 11-horse race except the heavy favorite Cal Lottie.

The 104-pound apprentice was just asappy with a second, though, as Lay It On hadn't won a race in two years and was sent to the post at 22-1 and would have been a greater price if Tommy's many supporters hadn't bet the traditional \$2 because of his maiden voyage.

"Do you think my father would be proud of me," young ommy asked rhetorically. "You know he always wanted me to be a jockey and it's finally happened."

The fledgling rider showed no concern over the fact that his father had lost his life in the same profession and said after dismounting Lay It On, "Boy, it was a lot easier than I thought it was going to be out there."

The exalted "bug boy" sat out the second race then took Pasamonte Princess, a 91-1 longshot, to the post in the third race. He got some early speed out of the filly, but she tired and finished eighth beating just three horses.

"I plan on going down to do some riding in Florida after the DRC meet ends," he said. "I need to get a lot more experience before Hazel Park opens in February. There's little doubt that somewhere

along the way, young Knapp will be tutored by his uncle Kenard Knapp, younger brother of his father. Kenard is riding regularly at the current Churchill Downs meet in Louisville.
