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## Apprehensive approval given to super sewer

After months of controversy, Canton officials have finally agreed to participate in the Wayne County Road Commission's plans to construct a huge regional sewage system, commonly known as super sewer.

Although township officials recently signed a form resolution in support of the plan, officials demanded local representation on the Wayne County Board of Public Works, an agency that will oversee construction and operation of the system, before committing Canton's funds to the project.

Township Supervisor Harold Stein recently presented a resolution containing the township's demands to the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

"The Charter Township of Canton hereby requests the Wayne County Board of Commissioners to restructure the Wayne County Board of Public Works to its full strength of seven members in such a manner that six of the seven members are from participating communities of the Huron Valley Wastewater Control System Facility Plan," the resolution states.

"Furthermore, this action shall occur prior to this community being requested to agree on apportionment of costs for said plan."

Stein believes out-county representation on the board of public works will alleviate fears that the powerful Wayne County Road Commission would control construction and operation of the sewage system.

According to township engineer Dale Townsend, only three persons currently sit on the board of public works. All are road commission members.

Clerk John Flodin said township board members have debated about participation in the super sewer plan for six months. Apprehension over the road commission's control was a major stumbling block holding up approval of the plan.

"This resolution is an effort to relieve those apprehensions," Flodin said. "We want some sort of control instead of delegating authority to the Wayne County Road Commission."

Super sewer plans call for construction of a huge sewage treatment plant at Point Mouille on Lake Erie and elimination of smaller plants in Wayne and Oakland counties. George R. Bingham, director of Wayne County's Department of Public Works, said an interceptor would be constructed through western Wayne and Oakland counties to serve 16 Wayne County communities and six in Oakland.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners needed Canton's and other municipalities' approval of the super sewer concept to secure federal and state grants for the project. Canton approved its resolution of support just days before the county's deadline.

BINGHAM ESTIMATES Canton's share of the total \$120 million construction cost "in the range of \$2 million." The township's share of the cost will depend on the sewage capacity or CFS (cubic feet per second) requested by Canton officials.

The township board, Bingham explained,

will use population projections in requesting sewage capacities.

County officials expect state and federal funds to cover 80 per cent of the sewage system's total construction costs. Bingham said Wayne County will float bonds to cover the remaining 20 per cent and bill local municipalities for their local shares over a 40-year period.

Besides financing a portion of construction costs, Canton will also pay a share of the sewage system's operational costs. Bingham estimates the township's annual operational bill at \$136,000 during the 1980s. Operational costs in future years will depend on the inflation rate.

In order to meet state and federal grant requirements, construction of the sewer must begin by next October. Bingham predicts a completion date of late 1980 or early 1981.

ACCORDING TO STEIN, the super sewer interceptor would parallel Hannan through Canton Township. The supervisor believes construction of the huge sewer project is a must for Canton's future development.

"The important thing is that we don't run out of sewage capacity for future commercial and industrial development," he said. "With the present system, we're going to run out of sewage capacity, and we're not far from it."

Trustee Robert Myers was the only Canton board member who voted against supporting the super sewer. Myers said he voted no because he feared the county would control the project.

Township board members unanimously approved the resolution requesting out-county representation on the board of public works.

## Town loses a friend

Michigan mourned when Sen. Philip Hart passed away Sunday, ending his brief bout with cancer. Canton Township's Charles Hewer also died on Sunday of the same disease, but his passing understandably received far less notice.

A resident of Canton for 56 years, Hewer, 87, operated a feed store on Canton Center Road, across from the Plymouth Centennial Education Park.

Hewer was well-liked by almost everyone he came in contact with and his contribution to Canton will be hard to measure. If encouraged, the store owner would reminisce of times when the Centennial Education Park was a field which he plowed. The stories were rich in history and full of interesting trivia.

Hewer was forced to close the feed and grain store in September because of poor health. He was stricken with carcinoma of the esophagus, which limited his mobility.

BORN IN GUELPH, Ontario, Hewer came to Canton from Detroit in 1920. His life revolved around the feed store from the moment he opened it in 1938. Family members said, come hell or high water, Hewer never missed a day on the job in 39 years at the feed store.

Hewer ran the little store by himself, selling poultry and dairy products, in addition to dog foods, worm pills, rat poison and remedies. Recent years saw a jump in lawn fertilizer sales; but commercial fertilizers were also offered along with seeds, insecticides, hay, straw and bird and rabbit feed. A block of salt sold for about \$2.

Hewer prided himself on maintaining friendly, neighbor-to-neighbor relationships with his customers, who were faithful enough to keep him in business. Before its closing, a walk through Hewer's Feed Supplies was like taking a hike in an early 20th century general store.

With its polished wood shelves stocked full of farm products, Hewer's store brought back memories of Canton's bygone agricultural days.

On the wall of the store hangs a folksy sign stating: "In case of atomic attack, keep calm, pay bills, run like hell." Pictures of horses and sad-faced dogs adorned the shelves.

TODAY the store stands vacant. A sign on the front door reads, "Closed, please call again." But the store will never open again, according to the family. The paint on the outside is peeling, but a peek inside reveals that many of the items remain inside. The store, though rich in heritage, is closed for good.

Hewer's relatives don't intend to take over the operation of the shop and no interested buyers have surfaced.

Hewer leaves his wife, Millie, who now resides in Hanlon Convalescent Home in Plymouth. The two were married April 17, 1911 and recently celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary. The Hewers raised two sons, Richard of Huntsville, Ala. and Robert of Northville.

Also surviving are three brothers and two sisters. Hewer had seven grandchildren and seven more great-grand-

children. He was a member of the First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth.

Rev. Philip Rodgers Magee officiated at the funeral service yesterday and Mr. Hewer was buried in Riverside Cemetery.

## Dog food company hit by thieves

The Red Meat Dog and Cat Food Co. was broken into sometime before 10:40 a.m. Dec. 24.

Charles Szalacetka discovered the break-in Friday morning when he came to the slaughterhouse at 46800 Geddes. Szalacetka contracts business with Red Meat's owner, Dale Reisinger.

Wayne County Sheriff Deputy Joseph Pudlo reported that it appeared the thieves entered through a rear window since the window and frame were broken.

According to the sheriff's report, a 22 caliber rifle used for killing horses was stolen, along with an adding machine, tool boxes, a welder, table saw, three dozen butcher knives and four tires and wheels.

Detectives in the sheriff's department are investigating two suspects in connection with the case.

## Police suggest a cut in pay

The vice-president of Canton's new police officer association said Tuesday that Canton cops may be willing to take a pay cut to allow more reserves to go to the Criminal Justice Institute (CJI) and join the ranks of certified police officers.

Canton's certified police officers are presently paid \$3.82 an hour. Reserves are paid minimum wage—\$2.30 an hour.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein met with Robert Van Lith and other representatives of the Canton Police Officers Association (CPOA) on Dec. 24 to discuss the idea and establish "lines of communication" between the board and the police department.

## Federal grant headline wrong

The headline on the lead story of the Monday, Dec. 27 edition of the Canton Observer was incorrect. The headline should have read: "Feds fund \$2.7 million township hall," instead of the erroneous \$1.7 million figure which appeared.

Only one digit was misprinted, but it made the headline one million dollars off the mark. The precise amount of the grant is \$2,715,300, courtesy of the Economic Development Administration.

Canton has yet to hear final, official confirmation of the "tentative" grant approval, but Supervisor Harold Stein said approval should come through by Jan. 5. Once approved, construction must begin in 90 days. At last Tuesday's meeting, board members voted to notify the architectural firm of Ralls, Hammill, Becker and Carne to begin work as soon as final approval is secured.

## Missing girl arrives home for Christmas

The day after her mother pleaded for her daughter to return home for Christmas, Lori Ann Mahaffey showed up at the front door.

Missing since Dec. 5, following a family argument, Lori, 14, returned home late Friday afternoon.

"She didn't say where she was," said her mother, Mrs. Ariantha Mahaffey, who is Lori's only parent. "She said, 'Mom, I decided it was time I got home.' That's about all I can tell. She'll probably tell me where she was when the proper time comes."

"I never was so glad as I was when I saw her walk through that door," Mrs. Mahaffey said. "And, after reading about that 12-year-old girl who ran away after having a fight with her mother, it kind of teaches you a lesson. You start thinking about what kind of mother you are; do you demand too much from your kids; and you realize the problems kids go through."

## Bundarin Code allows recount:

Peter Bundarin, a lawyer who is one of three men who demanded a recount of the Nov. 1 election returns, says that the county board of canvassers is legally wrong in refusing to recount the absentee ballot precinct.

"They're basing their decision on a section of the administrative code which deals with the problem of protecting the integrity of the ballots," Bundarin said. "The integrity of the ballots has never been questioned in this instance."

The state administrative code lists three safeguards that should be examined before a decision to recount a precinct is made.

Number one, the ballot box should be locked and sealed in such a manner as to render it impossible to open it without breaking the seals. Ballot bags inside the box should also be tied and sealed. And, thirdly, the number of paper absentee ballots must correspond with the number of ballots listed on the pollbook.

CANTON ONLY met one of the three stipulations election night. To qualify for a recount, two of the three stipulations must be met, according to Denzil Hammond, chairman of the county board of canvassers.

Because 15 pollworkers at the absentee precinct voted directly on the same machines used to tabulate absentee ballots, the number on the pollbooks is 15 less than the number of paper ballots in the precinct.

And, because nearly 10 per cent of Canton's voters voted absentee, Clerk John Flodin says he had more ballots than the ballot boxes could accommodate if tied bags were used. So, Flodin said, on election night he decided not to tie the ballot bags, but made sure the paper ballots were secured inside the locked, sealed canisters. The ballot bags were crammed inside the canisters on top of all the paper ballots.

"We realize that right now we're about \$600 over budget," Van Lith said. "But I think we can show you a plan where we would stay within our budget even after we send the people to CJI and they are earning higher pay than they did as a reserve."

Van Lith said the police officers hours would remain the same but service would increase.

Van Lith said he did not have the total cost breakdown figured out yet, but promised to have one ready for the Jan. 3 police study session. The item will also be discussed Jan. 10 at the township board's first public study meeting.

The next seven-week class for police officer certification begins Jan. 31.

"We'd like to give the police candidates time to prepare and work out an arrangement with their employer if they're going to attend CJI," Van Lith announced.

"We'll give you a rough breakdown of the size of the pay cut we'd be willing to go for."

Stein said he agreed with Van Lith's suggestion "in principle" and would not hesitate to send six or seven more reserves to CJI "if we can do this and still meet the budget."

Thom Carman, a member of the audience, asked Stein why a CPOA newsletter was addressed to Police Chief Harold Stein. Stein said he automatically supervises township law enforcement as supervisor of a charter township and under terms of a Canton board resolution.

Stein said Carl Silvers, interim police chief, handles the regular police affairs, "but on the day-to-day things, I do call the shots."

There was never any suggestion by the county or by any local canvassers that the absentee ballots were tampered with or unsecured.

So, Bundarin argues that the county board of canvassers is trying to get out of the ordeal of counting absentee ballots by quoting a section of the law which does not apply.

"We know why there are 15 more votes on the voting machines than the pollbooks," Bundarin said. "And we can subpoena the pollworkers if necessary to back up that fact."

Bundarin was asked how he proposed to recount the election even though 15 votes in the absentee ballot precinct will never be able to be traced.

Bundarin said the canvassers could use the same procedure outlined in the administrative code for instances where there are more ballots in the canister or ballot box than the number of ballots issued on election day.

"The ballots shall be turned face up and so many blank ballots or ballots upon which there is no attempted vote for the office... being recounted shall first be withdrawn as shall be equal to the excess," Bundarin said, quoting the administrative code.

If there aren't sufficient blank ballots, then Bundarin suggests that the remaining ballots be picked at random from the absentee vote canisters. Once picked, those 15 ballots would be destroyed and the recount could begin, Bundarin argues.

"That procedure is outlined in the administrative code for instances where the numbers on the pollbooks don't correspond with the actual number of ballots," Bundarin said. "That right there throws their argument about not wanting to disenfranchise voters right out the window."

## Parsell's recount cost Canton \$593

Canton Township has been billed \$593.13 by the Wayne County Board of County Canvassers for the expenses incurred in the Sept. 7 recount requested by defeated treasurer Carl Parsell.

The Sept. 7 recount was conducted after the primary election and did not change one vote in Parsell's totals.

The county's bill to Canton itemized the recount into nine different categories.

They charged Canton \$25 for a preliminary meeting to examine four recount petitions. Two petitions were filed by local units and two were filed by the county. Each of the four units paid \$25 for the cost of that meeting.

Three of the four people on the Wayne County Board of Canvassers received \$50 when they met Sept. 7 at Canton's recreation building, adding \$150 to the bill. Joe Martina, director of elections for the

county, was paid \$105.14 for the day. The deputy circuit clerk received \$84.55 for one day's pay.

A clerk in the pay scale Clerk II was paid \$50.77, while a Clerk I received \$43.10. Nine hours work by a stenographer was billed to Canton at \$63.32.

Mileage for the county personnel came to \$61.65 and there was a \$9.60 cost for the printing of recount forms.

CANTON HAS NOT yet received a bill for the cost of the recount conducted Dec. 13, 14 and 15 in precincts one through nine. Wayne County Deputy Clerk Orville Tungate has stated previously that a high estimate of the December recount cost would be \$3,243.

The county predicted that the bill for Parsell's recount would be in the neighborhood of \$600.

# Solution found for cabbie dilemma

Although insurance was cancelled on  
1,500 Detroit metropolitan taxi cabs effective  
Jan. 1, you'll still be able to get a cab  
New Year's Eve.

"We've received assurances that we'll  
be able to roll," said Vern Foster, owner  
of Northwest Transport, which operates 42  
cabs in Livonia, Redford, Garden City,  
Westland, Plymouth and the Farmington  
area.

Meeting Tuesday Dec. 28, State Insurance  
Commissioner Thomas Jones and the  
insurance board assigned all taxis to the  
risk category pool, usually reserved for  
high-risk drivers, for a six-month period as  
a temporary solution to the insurance dilemma.

Stonewall Insurance Co. of Birmingham,  
Ala. gave notice of cancellation to the  
southeastern Michigan cabs because of  
Michigan's unlimited medical coverage

under no-fault insurance, according to Foster.

"Our insurance through the pool will be  
33 to 59 per cent higher, but at least we'll  
be able to stay in business," said Foster.  
Northwest Transport operates Suburban  
Taxi, Checker Cab, and the Garden City-  
Westland cabs of Yellow and Red. Foster  
has chalked up 192,000 hours of continuous  
operation, serving this area for 19 years.

BECAUSE STONEWALL CO. has re-  
fused to release loss-ratio figures to the  
Michigan Taxicab Association, cab owners  
cannot receive insurance through another  
underwriter, said Foster.

"Without those loss-ratio figures, we're  
helpless to go anywhere except the pool,"  
said Foster.

An injunction against the insurance com-  
pany, asking for the loss-ratio figures as

well as a 60-day extension of insurance,  
has been requested, and a hearing is sched-  
uled for Thursday, Dec. 30.

"We'll be going to the courts and the leg-  
islature for some relief," said Foster.

Taxicab owners want cabs to be included  
in House Bill No. 6448 recently passed by  
the legislature, which allows SEMTA,  
Greyhound, and airport limousines some  
relief on secondary coverage. Under this  
bill, persons must go to their own insur-  
ance company first if involved in an acci-  
dent with a public carrier.

Insurance companies want a limit on  
medical coverage in both Michigan and  
New Jersey, the only states with some  
form of no-fault automobile insurance that  
have unlimited medical coverage.

The temporary solution allows cabs to

stay on the road, but Foster hopes a more  
permanent solution can be worked out.

"WE'LL BE PAYING up to \$1,601 for  
one car for a year under this type of insur-  
ance," he noted. "That covers liability,  
property damage, and passenger pro-  
tection, but doesn't cover fire and theft or  
any kind of collision."

"As of now, when a car hits one of mine,  
it comes out of my pocket to fix it, no mat-  
ter who's fault it is."

## Is sweater too tight? Better return it fast

The big day has come and gone. The packages are all unwrapped, and brightly colored paper remnants are scattered from one end of the house to the other. Now, the question is, what do you do with the iridescent shark-skin leisure suit your mother-in-law gave you?

You take it back, of course. And quickly. And on Monday—the first day the stores were open after Christmas—a number of people in the Plymouth community were engaged in doing exactly that: the time-honored post-holiday tradition of returning or exchanging gifts.

To find out what kind of things people were taking back and why, the Observer spent a portion of the day in various local stores talking to less-than-satisfied gift receivers.

**THE KMART STORE** on Ford Road in Canton had anticipated the exchange rush and provided special clerks to handle adjustments. They were kept busy listening to stories and filling out forms.

One of the people waiting in line was Canton resident Kay Baldrice who was returning a pair of blue jeans she had bought for her sister.

"I thought I knew her size," said Kay, "but I was wrong. Her hips weren't as big as the jeans were."

Roger Horner, also of Canton, had a different complaint. He was returning a pair of shoes his wife had given him, but size was only partly the reason.

"They are a little too big," he com-

## Hoben: Canton's growth is an immediate problem

Rising student enrollment will be an immediate challenge in 1977 for the Plymouth Community School District.

That was apparent from projections made for the coming year by Supt. John M. Hoben, who points to a growth of 1,200 students from Canton alone for the school year 1977-78.

Hoben stressed that some of the information is new and will be studied by the school board at upcoming workshops. On Jan. 3 the board will look at the 1974 bond issue project and equipment replacement budget for 1976, and consider the physical status of the school district—issues which might produce information relative to needs for a bond issue in 1977.

On Jan. 11 at 7:30 p.m., the board will have a general discussion on enrollment projections, site development and projected needs, attendance areas, bond issue and election.

**HOBEN RECENTLY** met with a representative from Wade, Trim & Associates, Canton's planning consultants, to discuss growth in the Canton Township area of the school district.

"Although we experienced a growth of 1,040 students this year, we are projecting a growth in Canton alone of 1,200 students for the school year 1977-78. On a long range projection, with no major changes in currently approved platting, we expect 1,200 the following year and 1,000 additional students the third year out," Hoben said.

"There is some talk about the inclusion of a super sewer which may once again alter the projected growth in that area. Some of the limiting features of growth are the lack of sewer and water on the west side of Sheldon and the sewer capacity in the quadrant located south of Joy, east of Sheldon and north of Michigan Avenue."

"There also is growth going on currently in Plymouth Township—particularly in Mayflower, Trialwood II and III and Quail Hollow, which also will compound that projection of 1,200 for 1977-78."

"We currently exist with capacities in the elementary (if every seat were taken) of about 675 additional seats or the equivalent of one elementary school. At the middle school we have capacity for about

700 still existing and at the high school, about 200.

"This, in effect, would allow us additional capacity of just short of 1,600 if every available seat in the school district were able to be realized. But children don't come in neat and orderly packages of lots of 30. In the parlance of good administration, if you can get 85 per cent density you are operating close to 100 per cent efficiency—which means we would actually have about 1,350 seats available."

**MAJOR AREAS OF CONCERN**, added Hoben, are south of Ford Road where two new schools opened this year are functioning at capacity, and Eriksson Elementary is exceeding capacity.

"In the corridor from the I-275 expressway to Beck Road, between Joy and Warren, we are just beginning to reflect a rather massive growth of what is expected in the next two years."

"On the western end, Sunflower has opened up a plotted area for 300 additional homes on the north side of Warren. It also is my understanding that construction will start in the spring with close to 900 units on the south side of Warren."

"Moving further to the east, the area around Gallimore Elementary has approval for about 200 homes; and to the south of Gallimore there's a project of about 170 homes. On the east side of Sheldon there is an approval of the Mocer project for about 220 homes and a request for an additional 200 is now in effect."

"An additional 78 units have been programmed in the area of Windsor Park on the southeast corner of the quadrant bounded by Joy, Warren, Sheldon and Lilley roads. In addition, much growth is expected east of the expressway between Cherry Hill and Palmer roads."

"These are the pressure points and the ones which will provide us with a great deal of problems in the school year 1977-78 and 1978-79."

**FIELD, ERIKSSON**, Miller and Gallimore elementaries in Canton are functioning at capacity now, says Hoben.

Available space in the school district can be found in the northeast section at the Tanger and Starkweather schools with about 100 student capacities available at

Allen, Fiegel, Smith and Isbister. "Another pressure point is Bird Elementary where growth in Plymouth Township will have to be absorbed."

The school district is functioning at capacity at Pioneer Middle School with room available at West, Central and East middle schools. The high schools' designed capacities are 2,100 with completion of Phase III—making a total capacity of about 4,200. There are about 4,000 students at the Centennial Educational Park.

"It is obvious to us that we cannot exist during the next three to four years with existing facilities without additional buildings and alternatives and busing solutions available to accommodate the growth which is coming in geometric ratios."

"There are many combinations of alternatives being considered, such as: year-round school, additional use of portables, different types of configurations which might include K-eight buildings, eventually large elementaries which in the future could convert to middle schools, to the even less desirable alternative of split sessions."

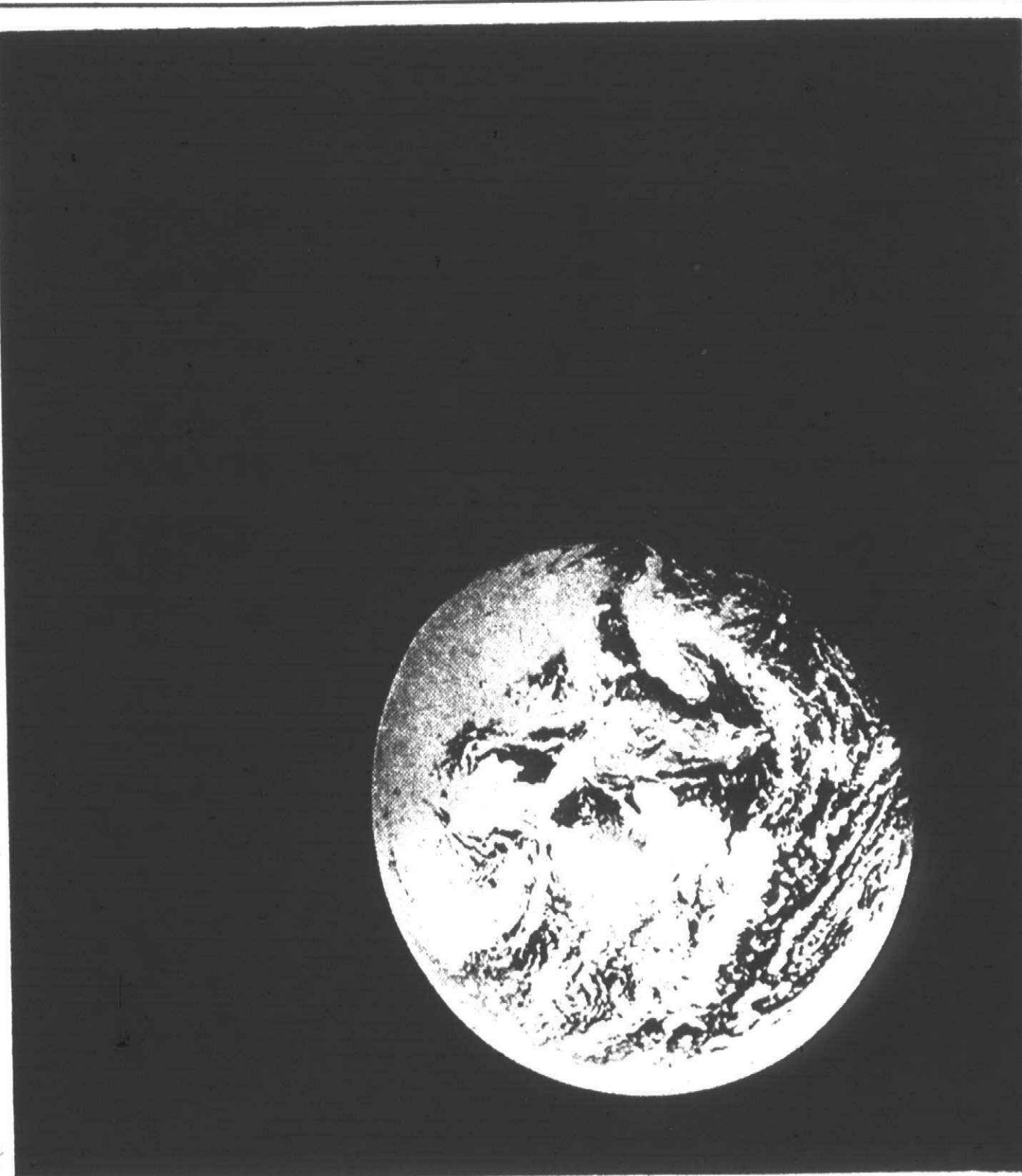
"A sensitivity exists to the problems of surrounding communities in declining enrollments and the problems of over building. However, at this point in time, Plymouth is a long ways from reaching that plateau and we are experiencing the reverse effect of a rather expansive growth which will continue during the next five years."

"Growth will provide the school district with challenges but we hope that, working together with citizens and governmental leaders, that these challenges will be met with minimum harm to our children's education."

## Stein considers canning federal grant specialist

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein is considering dropping the services of Ron Linton, who was hired by the previous board as a Washington-based federal grant consultant.

Stein wrote a letter to the board stating, "we now believe Mr. Linton's services are no longer needed" three days before Canton received a whopping \$2.7 million grant from the federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) to build a new township hall.

Linton started working for Canton Township in September earning \$250 a month for his work. Linton also works as a grant consultant for by a number of downriver communities as well as several Wayne county commissions.

What is disturbing, said Stein, is that he found that the previous Canton administration had never signed a contract with Linton for his services.

Flodin said it is true that Canton board members did not contract with Linton for any longer period than a month at a time.

"After evaluating his work, there was

supposed to be a contract signed," Flodin said. "But the point in fact is that a contract has not been signed with Linton."

Stein said Tuesday night that in doing a little investigation, he discovered that there is "little doubt that Mr. Linton has the expertise." But before Canton agrees to pay Linton any more money, Stein said he wants Linton's obligations and goals spelled out.

"Find out which direction we want to go in regards to federal funding," said Stein. "That's our first job. Do we want it in the area of recreation, or do we want sewers?"

Some of the members of the audience wanted to know how much help Linton was in landing the \$2.7 million federal grant.

"I'd say we got a lot of help from (Congressman) Bill Ford's office," Stein said.

The board authorized a payment to Linton for at least three months work. Work done by Linton in December may be free, said Stein, because Linton offered not to submit a bill for the work done in December when he learned Stein was upset about the lack of a contract.

## Juveniles arrested with small arsenal

Two 16-year-old Plymouth youths were arrested late Sunday night in a storeroom of Meijer's Thrifty Acres after allegedly trying to steal \$1,116 worth of firearms, citizens' band radios and camping equipment.

According to Michigan State Police Trooper D.K. Taylor, officers from the Northville State Police post responded to a call from a security guard at 11:30 p.m. The guard told police that there was an armed man inside the store.

When officers arrived at Meijer's, Taylor said, they found the two youths hiding in a darkened storeroom. After the officers talked to the youths, they gave themselves up without a struggle, Taylor said.

BUNDARIN is waiting for word from trustee candidate James Poole before he makes a decision on whether he'll go to circuit court to appeal the county board of canvassers decision not to recount Precinct 10, the absentee ballot precinct.

Bundarin said he doubts that his argument would sway either the circuit court or the appeals court.

"People arguing against Poole, myself or Greenstein (defeated supervisor candidate) would say that we are asking the court to interpret the legislature's intent. They would say that since two of the three criteria were not met then the precinct cannot be recounted. But I would argue, and I believe it's sound, that the laws used to deny the recount are there to protect the integrity of those ballots. That is not our problem."

## Music and rhythm reveal new world to handicapped

The soft, Southern voice was full of enthusiasm as Kentucky's only registered music therapist described her work with the handicapped in the Owensboro school.

Caroline Folger spent Christmas vacation with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Folger of Astoria, Oregon.

One of her students, with a mallet strapped to her wrist, had played "Away in a Manger" on a xylophone at a recent performance.

"Something like that builds their self-esteem," said Miss Folger. The warmth of her tone revealed both teacher and child had shared the victory.

Her students vary in age from six to 21, and she sees them every day in her classes. The school is a residential facility which accepts some day students who are at different levels and who have different handicaps. Most of them are victims of cerebral palsy—a few are spinal bifida children.

SHE EXPLAINED that most of them have normal intelligence but are frustra-

ted because they cannot communicate. This results in emotional problems.

"They have been in wheelchairs all their lives, they have no depth perception. Rhythm provides perceptual feedback. It is a natural energizer."

"The thing I like best about music therapy is that it's very non-threatening. It is a group activity, and they are not singled out."

In the beginning, her students have very narrow vocal ranges. At first she transposes the music to their vocal range. Gradually, the fine motor communication skills are awakened. Both range and inflection increase.

"Many have a malfunction of their diaphragms. This can be developed but it takes time to overcome," said the 23-year-old therapist.

"They have been culturally deprived," she added. "But they enjoy working together."

ACTIVITIES with her students are more oriented. And as the communication

grows they are stimulated socially.

"Some have even learned to read music," said Ms. Folger.

"Success is structured. No one fails."

Each instrument also must be structured to the individual. The mallet strapped to the wrist and a xylophone with extra wide keys accommodated the child's ability. The result was the joy of making music.

Ms. Folger earned her bachelor's degree in music from the University of Georgia in Athens.

She then took six months' training in the Georgia Retardation Center where her studies included geriatrics and work with disturbed boys and the mentally retarded.

Although she majored in piano, she also plays autoharp, guitar and dulcimer.

Her work with the handicapped in the Kentucky school is made possible by special (Title 8) federal funding.

"I wish there were more of us in more schools," said the young therapist whose music is opening a new world of rhythm and song to her 35 students.

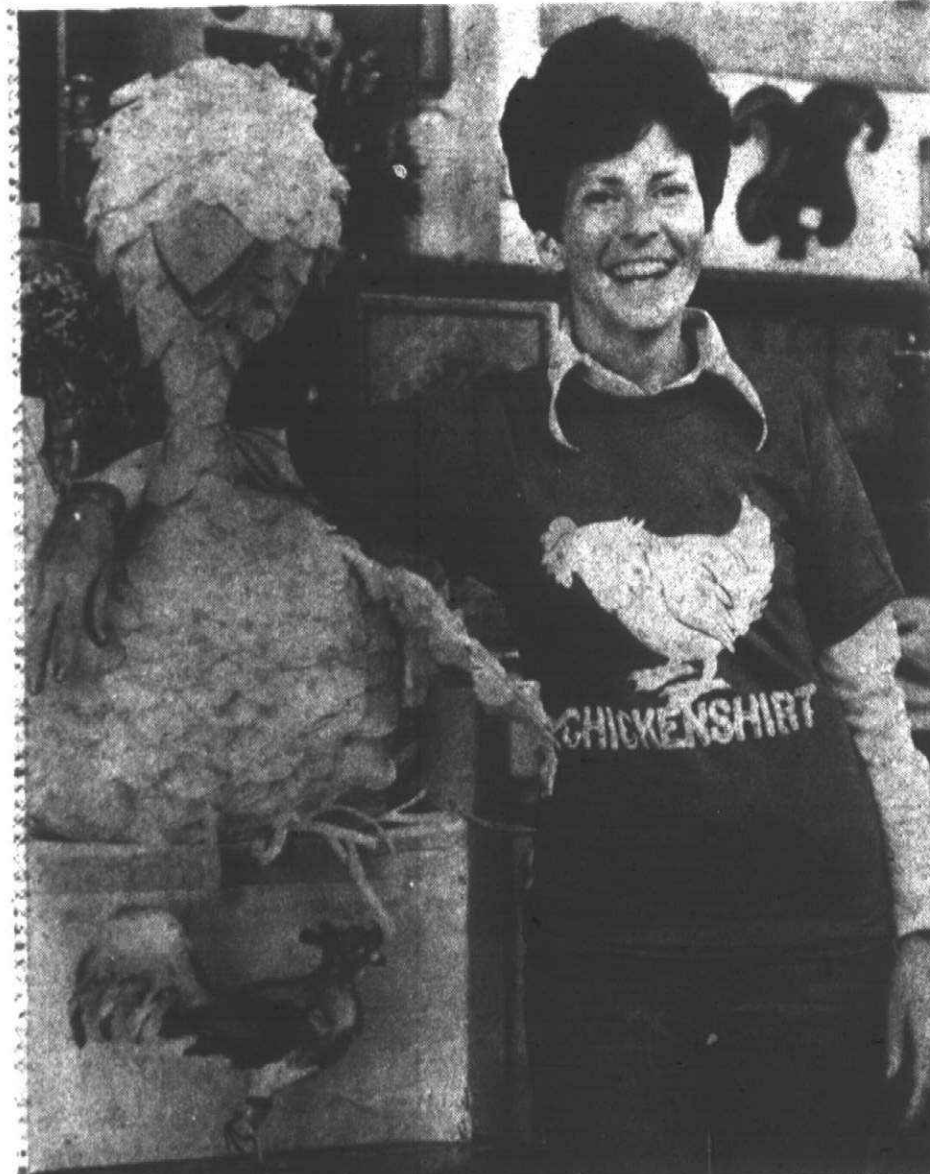

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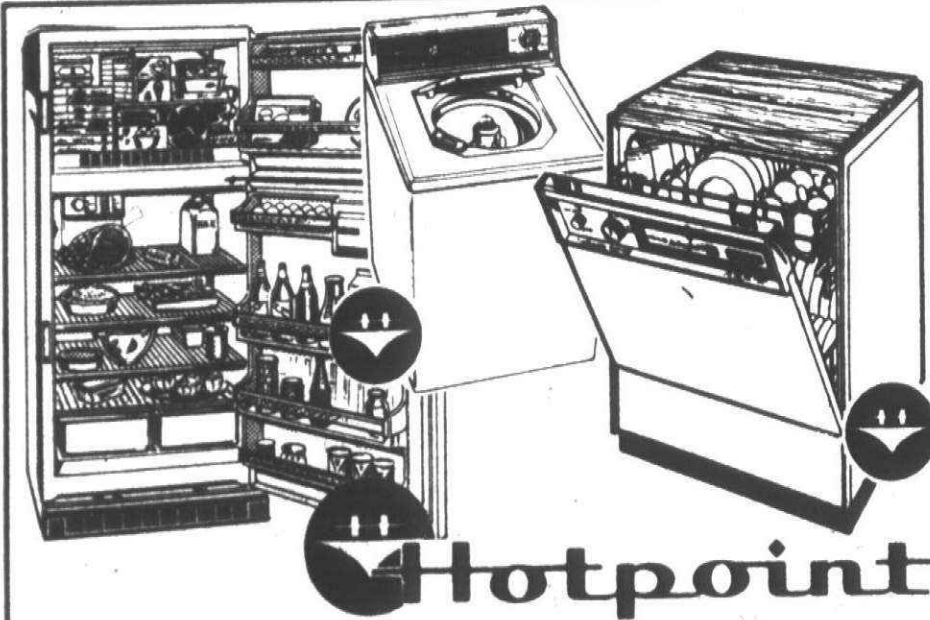

### CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MICHIGAN

ORDINANCE NO. 76-8

### AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5.194(6), ARTICLE XV, OF CHAPTER 52, ZONING, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 5.194(6), Article XV, of Chapter 52, Zoning, of the Code of the City of Plymouth is hereby amended to read as follows:

5.194 Accessory Buildings. Accessory buildings, except as otherwise permitted in this Chapter, shall be subject to the following regulations:

(1) Where the accessory building is structurally attached to a main building, it shall be subject to, and must conform to, all yard regulations of this Chapter applicable to main buildings.

(2) Accessory buildings shall not be erected in any required yard except a rear yard.

(3) An accessory building may occupy not more than twenty-five (25) percent of a required yard, plus twenty percent (20%) of any non-required rear yard, provided that in no instance shall the accessory building exceed one-half (1/2) the ground floor area of the main building, except an accessory building can be constructed which exceeds these standards where it is intended to serve as a two car garage or carport. However, where the area of such a structure would exceed the above standards, its floor area shall not exceed 528 square feet and, provided further, that it shall not occupy more than forty (40) percent of the combined required and non-required rear yard of the residential lot.

(4) No detached accessory building shall be located closer than three (3) feet to any side or rear lot line. In those instances where the rear lot line is coterminous with an alley right-of-way, the accessory building shall be no closer than one (1) foot to such rear lot line. In no instance shall an accessory structure be located within a dedicated easement right-of-way.

(5) No detached accessory building in a R-1, RT-1, RM-1, RM-2, O-1, O-2, or P-1 District shall exceed one (1) story of fifteen (15) feet in height. Accessory buildings in all other districts may be constructed to equal the permitted maximum height of structures in said districts, subject to Board of Appeals review and approval.

(6) When an accessory building is located on a corner lot, the side lot line of which is substantially a continuation of the front lot line of the lot to its rear, said building shall not project beyond the front yard line required on the lot in rear of such corner lot. When an accessory building is located on a corner lot, the side lot line of which is substantially a continuation of the side lot line of the lot to its rear, said building shall not project beyond the side yard line required on the lot in the rear of such corner lot.

(7) When an accessory building, in any Residence, Business, or office District, is intended for other than the storage of private motor vehicles, the accessory use shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Appeals.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 10th day of January A.D. 1977.

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# Volunteers may help elderly and earn credit

Volunteers are being recruited for a program at Madonna College, Livonia, to assist elderly persons in nursing homes while earning college credit.



Kathy Helgeson of Livonia, enrolled in a program at Madonna College that trains volunteers to assist nursing home residents, helps a resident of Marycrest with a glass of water. The Madonna program is enrolling volunteers for seven Saturday seminars on aging which will begin Jan. 15.

The program is partially funded through the Administration on Aging, Title III, Older Americans Act, Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The 100 volunteers will attend seven Saturday seminars beginning Jan. 15 and earn four semester hours of credit upon completion of the program. Each volunteer will devote six hours per week to assist elderly residents of nursing homes as a field experience.

Madonna, which has a degree program in gerontology, will contribute tuition assistance to those who enroll. Previous volunteer programs at Madonna have identified and aided elderly persons in their own homes.

Volunteers may be men or women over 18 years of age, according to Sister Colleen Morris, director of the Madonna gerontology programs. Successful completion of high school is not a requirement. If they do not already have a contact with a nursing home, a placement for their field experience will be arranged for them, she said.

## Slight gains

Minority enrollment at the University of Michigan's Ann Arbor campus this fall was 3,425—or more than 10 per cent of the total enrollment.

The campus has 165 more minority students than it did a year ago. The percentage of minority students has increased from 9.64 last year to 10.11 this year.

The enrollment report was presented Dec. 16 to the regents by Richard A. English, U-M associate vice-president for academic affairs.

Of the minority students this year, 2,456 are black students, an increase of 13; 415 are Asian Americans, an increase of 27; 89 are native Americans, an increase of 20; and 465 are Spanish-surnamed Americans, an increase of 105.

# 'Follow conscience,' priest tells Catholics

Catholics today must learn to follow their own consciences and rely less on the authority of the church, says the Rev. Anthony Kosnik of St. Mary seminary, Orchard Lake Schools.

He expressed his views at St. Edith Catholic Church of Livonia in what he called "a speech that probably could not have been given a few years ago."

"Particularly in the implementation of values," Fr. Kosnik said, "the church simply can't lead people by the hand and make decisions for them."

"That would be a betrayal of the kind of freedom the church calls us to."

One of the guest speakers in St. Edith's Help Everyone Love People (HELP) series, Fr. Kosnik insisted that people who operate simply on the authority of others are refusing to accept responsibility for their own actions.

"Be aware where the church is at," he advised. "Know and respect its teaching."

"Let it be a guide. But if you find that the teaching is inadequate, your fundamental responsibility is to be true to your own conscience."

Follow your own conscience even if it is in error, the priest said, but try to eliminate that error as much as possible. That is the ultimate moral responsibility, he said.

remarking on the complexity of society today, he noted, "It makes it difficult for the church to come out with positions that are universal and absolute."

He said: "Life is not so simple any more. We should not be surprised when honestly searching for answers, that such answers are not available."

ADDRESSING HIMSELF to the controversial question of contraception, he gave an indication about how one could arrive at a decision.

"If as the result of the use of contraceptive you are more responsible as parents, growing closer together as man and wife and becoming more affectionate in your church and with your neighbors," and if by not using them there is more tension between husband and wife making

them grow further apart, or if the children and you become a burden to society because of illness, to refuse to use them in that context is immoral."

Yet he also indicated that he believes strongly in rules.

"I think to talk about personal responsibility, individual freedom without rules would be unfair," he stated. "You would not have the guidelines under which you could make decisions."

"Unless guidelines are given to children to force them to confront and internalize values, we end up with a permissive society that does not allow for the formation of character."

He claimed that to say something is wrong is not much help in the forming of a conscience.

"If we don't give the children a deeper insight and understanding of the rules, we will build a prison around them, and they will never become morally responsible people."

"The church challenges people and makes them grow by giving reasons and reinforcing motivation. They should learn to act, not because someone says so but because their internal conviction says so."

This aspect of Father Kosnik's talk appealed to Gail Lepping of Livonia. A Schoolcraft College student, she teaches fifth grade at St. Edith.

"It's a good time to belong to the church," she said in regard to the priest's ideas. "There are so many social controversies for which you need guidance from your faith and your church."

"Ultimately the individual is the decider. The church teaching in catechism focuses more on individual decisions than on

individual rules that used to be set down. They are still set down, but the controls are breaking up."

"But I still like the guidance and rules because it helps in the formation of the individual, but I enjoy the individual decision making process involved."

KEN CRESPI, also a Livonian, said he agreed that "the conscience must develop from within, using input from the church and Bible to help you make decisions."

He claimed the thinking of Father Kosnik would be appealing to the young, "and is a healthy development."

He added: "The older ones are still looking for rules from Rome and from the archdiocese of Detroit."

In his speech the priest linked conscience with morality, pointing out that the new understanding of sin "focuses directly on the injustice to man."

He explained: "Individual freedom and individual conscience are not at odds with social morality. They are the only way social morality can be achieved."

"Every sin, no matter how short and unnoticed, is very much a sin against my fellow man."

Love thy neighbor," he reminded his listeners.

"That is the part we usually forget," he commented. "Christ made it clear that love must reach out and embrace every living human being who ever existed."

"We really need to form a people who are really open to recognizing the injustice in the world—people willing to take responsibility in changing this injustice—beginning with their own lives and reaching out.

of his great-aunt, Betsy Trotwood, who had denounced him at birth for not being born a girl. After meeting David's unsavory stepfather, Miss Betsy has a change of heart. She adopts him and sends him to school in Canterbury where he lives with her lawyer, Mr. Wickfield and his daughter, Agnes.

Copperfield plans to marry his employer's daughter, Dora Spewlow, but his small salary from the law firm is not enough to support a family. Then disaster sets in. An evil scoundrel, Uriah Heep, has managed to bring Mr. Wickfield and David's Aunt Betsy to financial ruin. 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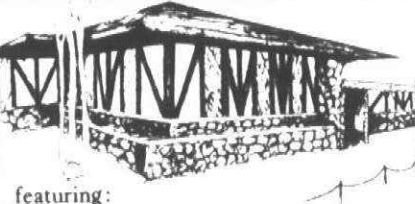

## Schools' economic future left dangling in Lansing

The financial picture for the Plymouth Community School District in 1977 isn't too bright, according to an evaluation of what to expect during the coming year made by Supt. John M. Hoben.

"State aid currently is an equal yield formula," explains Hoben, "but it is generally conceded that the third year of the Burlesy proposal isn't within the sights of the

state to fund and same major alterations will have to take place.

"There is an in-house fight going on in Lansing between the Republicans and Democrats. With the Democratic control of the house and senate, it appears that the next state aid act will be fashioned by speaker of the house Robert Crim.

"We worked for the past year with a coalition of superintendents, 31 including myself, which represent 540,000 students and the majority representation of the congressional districts both in the senate and house side.

"After a year of work we've attempted to come to some type of realization of a property tax rollback which would be in effect in the school year 1978-79. The speaker of the house has insisted this be a portion of it, particularly to those districts which levy in excess of 30 mills of which Plymouth is one.

"Currently the state is reflecting a deficit somewhere around \$171 million. In essence, this is made up by the \$81 million short on the single business tax, \$33 million short on state aid for school aid, \$8.5 million short in mental health budget, \$5.8 million short as a result of the DeMascio court order in Detroit, and \$43 million short in terms of Medicaid payments and an indeterminate amount which hasn't been assessed for state police on freeways.

"This short falls about \$90 million plus the \$81 million on the single business tax and produces \$171 million short. Currently, there are a number of things which have been brought forth to alleviate this particular shortage. One is House Bill 6480 to amend about \$40 million in the single business tax. This is on the governor's desk awaiting signature, having passed both houses.

"There currently is a supreme court decision regarding the state's bonding capacity which could restore \$38 million into the general fund.

"A third issue is a request of the legislature for a restructuring of the budget for Medicaid to have them live within the \$810 million which has been appropriated, which would in effect cover the \$43 million Medicaid payment shortage. Is it my understanding that this has been accepted and is currently being done by the Bureau of Social Welfare and that the \$43 million will be realized.

"Adding these up, then, if the supreme court decision does come through, about \$120 million of the \$171 million would be made up in this fashion."

ON THE PLUS side of the ledger, says Hoben, is a Senate Bill 122 which effects retirement which would add \$7 million to this deficit and would show about \$60 million in arrears.

"It is apparent then that some form of executive order cutbacks or increase in the income tax would be imminent. How-

ever, the financial picture in the state is much brighter than what was there two months ago.

"We are hopeful that we will not experience another executive order cutback. However, we do have a four-year history of this procedure which is mandated by law for the governor to exercise when deficit does occur in the general operating fund."

IN CENTRAL MAINTENANCE, Hoben reports, good strides have been made this past school year toward converting from a program of individual building maintenance to a central maintenance crew.

"It is hoped that the overall efficiency will increase and will produce a rather large and substantial dollar savings to the district in the long haul. Our maintenance director is to be commended for the efforts which have been put forth in this direction. We are hopeful that continued progress in this area will reward the district substantially in many dollars in savings.

"The central warehouse," Hoben adds, "now in its third year also is producing dollar savings not only for the school district but for all other governmental units within our area of jurisdiction.

"We are extremely hopeful that the addition of an assistant superintendent for instruction and curriculum coordinators will lead to the curriculum and instructional wing of the schools being evaluated with a sensitive ear toward accountability in this area, which will produce an even better program than has existed.

"The 1977 year is a year of challenges to the school district. It is our intent to produce a better delivery system in the most efficient manner possible. It is our desire to continue Plymouth in a position of excellence and leadership as an educational institution in the State of Michigan."

### Grant provides art classes for seniors

Free art classes for senior citizens will be offered at Madonna College beginning Jan. 20 through a grant funded by the Michigan Council for the Arts.

Persons over 65 years of age may enroll for oil painting, to be taught each Thursday morning, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or for arts and crafts, to be taught each Thursday afternoon, noon-3 p.m. They will meet for ten weeks.

Registration for these classes will be held in the art department of Madonna College, 36600 Schoolcraft, on Tuesday, Jan. 11, 1-3 p.m. and 7-8 p.m.

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# And Plymouth hosts Swedish icers arrive

The Swedes have arrived! The Bantam (13-14 year olds) and Midget (15-16 year olds) hockey teams from Vasterhamige, Sweden have come to Plymouth and will spend the new year with American friends.

More than 30 children and 25 adults arrived late Monday night at the Windsor Airport where they were picked up and brought to the homes of Plymouth-Canton area residents. They will stay in Plymouth until January 7.

Most of the children are staying at the homes of their hockey counterparts who participate on Bantam and Midget teams in the Plymouth Hockey Association (PHA). The majority of the adults that made the trip are staying at the Mayflower Hotel.

The appearance of the Sweden team is a return visit of a year ago when the Plymouth contingents traveled to the European country.

The Vasterhamige teams are two of seven Sweden hockey squads that are here to visit the metropolitan Detroit area. During their stay, the Swedes will see the sights and play hockey games against area pucksters.

This kind of exchange program has been going on with different countries for a number of years. Plymouth teams became involved two years ago when they visited Sweden over the holidays.

Hockey coach Al Campbell stimulated the idea with the cooperation of Carl Swartz, who was a representative of the Michigan Amateur Hockey Association last year. Fellow coach Mike Michalek became involved in the idea with Campbell and other friends. Michalek has acted as the Plymouth representative throughout the planning period that has brought the Swedes to Michigan.

"This idea was planned by the individual teams," Michalek said. "The PHA had given us help. It cost us \$20,000 to go to Sweden last year and no hockey program can pay for this."

The Plymouth teams raised money through fund-raising projects to help with the costs.

**THE SAME INDEPENDANCE** was demonstrated by Vasterhamige which has also traveled to Finland (twice), Moscow and Russia. Money-raising projects were conducted in Sweden to help bring the team to America for the first time.

"Meeting the athletes and playing in different countries is just as important as the hockey games," said Sweden parent Birger (Bill) Astrom, who is staying with the Michalek family along with his son Ulf.

One of the Michalek boys stayed with the Astrom family last year in Sweden.

**THE SWEDES WILL** play games in Ann Arbor, Trenton, Livonia, Bowling Green, Ohio and finally against Plymouth on the last day of the trip. The Plymouth battle will be held at the Cultural Center on Friday, Jan. 7 beginning at 7:30 p.m. with the Bantam game. A banquet will follow the contests. Mayor Joe Bida, Plymouth Township supervisor Tom Notebaert and Canton supervisor Harold Stein all plan to attend this banquet that marks the end of the Swedes visit.

The activities planned for the European visitors include a trip to Greenfield Village and the Ford Motor Company in Dearborn. The adults will also tour the Stroh's Brewery.

The Detroit Red Wing hockey team will also host the Swedes for a lunch and practice at Olympia which includes free tickets to a game against the Minnesota North Stars.

And there always is the sight of American college football that can be viewed on television on New Year's Day.

**THE COMMUNICATION PROBLEM** isn't as severe as people would think.

"We start reading English in the third year of school," Bill Astrom said. "Sweden is a small country and it's difficult to travel abroad without knowing English. It is a universal language and you have to know it at least to answer a question."

The differences that both Michalek and Astrom find in the country's styles of hockey are the Swedes' ability to skate and pass more effectively while the Americans play a closer checking game.

"It's a difference in the meaning and thinking of the people," Astrom said. "We have tried to learn more checking techniques, but just the opposite we have better puck control."

Michalek added that this was always the joke when the Americans visited Europe.

"We would always tell them (the Swedes) too much pass, pass, pass and they would tell us too much shoot, shoot, shoot," Michalek said.

One of the reasons for this different type of play could be due to the size of the arenas. The American ice rinks are smaller and have less space around the net areas which leads to a closer, checking game.

Along with the five games in five different cities, the Swedes will also enjoy the practice ice time at the Plymouth Cultural Center on selected days.

"When we went to Sweden they gave us some of the top teams and we wouldn't want them to play any weaklings," Michalek said.

"I think the schedule we gave them has good solid hockey teams on it."

Last year, the Plymouth Midgets beat selected Sweden teams in three of the five games. The Bantam squad battled to an even 2-2-1 record.

Surprisingly, the Plymouth-Vasterhamige battles last year were the closest as the Sweden team and their house guests skated to a Bantam tie and a one-goal decision in the Midget contest.

# Rock tankers place 5 girls on Observerland team

In the not-too-distant past, a girl who wanted to swim competitively in high

school had to join the boys' team because there was not enough interest to warrant a separate girls' swimming program.

That is not the case today, in most area schools. Interest has picked up and the state high school athletic association recognizes that interest by sponsoring a state girls' swimming meet.

Area coaches met recently to select the best of the local swimming crop for the all-Observer team. As expected, state Class A runner-up Livonia Stevenson and Suburban Eight League champion Plymouth Salem placed the most representatives on the all-area squad.

Three sister combinations, the Stanwoods from Plymouth Salem, the Coxes from Livonia Churchill, and the Browns from Livonia Bentley, are prominent members of the all-area team.

In addition to selecting the best performers in the 11 events, the coaches also named six girls to at-large positions on the squad in recognition of the wealth of girls' swimming talent in the area.

**Carol Eggers, senior, Livonia Stevenson, 50-yard freestyle and 200-yard medley relay.** One of the most competitive tankers in the state, Eggers won both the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard backstroke at the state finals all three years of her varsity career.

She set new state records in both events this year — 24.79 seconds in the former and 59.81 seconds in the latter. Her backstroke time automatically qualified her for all-America honors.

The senior also had a hand in another record-shattering performance — the medley relay.

"Eggers had a fantastic career," said Stevenson coach Lois McDonald of the backbone of the Spartans this season.

**Jan Chase, senior, Livonia Franklin, diving.** Captain of the Patriots the last two seasons, and most valuable swimmer this year, Chase averaged 169.25 points for her five best meets of the campaign.

Chase, a three-year performer, was named to the all-Northwest Suburban League team this year. "She's a hard worker and an enjoyable student," said Franklin coach Nancy Wares.

**Marion Stanwood, junior, Plymouth Salem, 200-yard freestyle and 400-yard freestyle relay.** Stanwood, Salem's Most Valuable Swimmer, placed third in the state in the 200-yard freestyle with a clocking of 1:58.2.

She also won the 100- and 200-yard freestyles in the Suburban Eight League Conference Meet with respective times of 55.7 seconds and 1:58.2. Stanwood also swam a

leg on the Rocks' league championship freestyle relay team.

"She qualified for all freestyle events in the state meet and was undefeated in dual meet competition," said Salem coach Chuck Olson.

**Sue Stanwood, junior, Plymouth Salem, 100-yard freestyle and 400-yard freestyle relay.** Stanwood finished first in the Suburban Eight League Conference Meet in the distance 500-yard freestyle relay with a time of 5:52, but her consistency in the 100-yard freestyle netted her all-area recognition in that event.

Also a member of Salem's league championship freestyle-relay quartet, Stanwood was described by her coach as "an excellent, all-around swimmer."

**Linda Hein, junior, Livonia Stevenson, 100-yard butterfly and 200-yard medley relay.** Hein also placed first in the state finals in two events this year, successfully defending her butterfly title with a time of 58.72 seconds and winning the 200-yard individual medley with an effort of 2:14.50.

Both efforts are new state records.

The junior also swam a leg on Stevenson's record-breaking medley relay quartet at the state meet. "I don't think anyone will touch... Hein's fly time for a long time to come," McDonald said.

**Vicki Brown, senior, Livonia Bentley, 100-yard breaststroke.** Brown placed second in the state in the breaststroke with a time of 1:11.0 and seventh in the state in the 200-yard individual medley.

To illustrate her versatility, Brown finished first in the Suburban Eight League Conference Meet in the 100-yard backstroke and the individual medley. "She's all all-around swimmer," said Bentley coach Jane Lozon.

**Rena Cox, senior, Livonia Churchill, 100-yard backstroke.** Possessor of the third fastest time in the state meet in the backstroke, 1:02.18, Cox placed 14 in the 200-yard individual medley in Mount Pleasant with a time of 2:20.24.

A co-captain of the Chargers, Cox won the backstroke and was part of the Churchill crew that placed first in the freestyle relay at the Western Six League Conference Meet.

"She was an outstanding swimmer, a state meet swimmer all three high school years," said Churchill coach Carolyn Benninger.

**Jody Garbus, senior, Westland John Glenn, at-large.** The holder of school records in the 50- and 100-yard freestyles, the 100-yard breaststroke and both relays

Garbus, captain of the Rockets, was selected Outstanding Senior on the team.

She finished first in the breaststroke at the Northwest Suburban League Conference Meet and swam a leg of the Rockets' league-championship medley relay team.

"She was a good worker," said Glenn coach Jean Garbus. "You could always count on her for a couple of first places."

**Jane Anderson, senior, Plymouth Canton, at-large.** Most valuable swimmer this season and a two-year captain, Anderson, an excellent freestyle swimmer, recorded best times this year of 27.7 seconds in the 50-yard freestyle and 1:02.0 in the 100-yard freestyle.

"She's an outstanding young lady," said Canton coach Ann Massey. "She was the strength of the team and extremely versatile."

**Ilona Schmidt, senior, Plymouth Salem, 400-yard freestyle relay.** In addition to swimming a leg of the Rocks' Suburban Eight League freestyle relay championship, Schmidt also placed fifth in the 100-yard butterfly at the conference meet.

"She's a versatile swimmer for all strokes and at varying distances," stated Salem coach Chuck Olson.

**Amy McClumpha, junior, Plymouth Salem, at-large.** Salem's premier diver and a second-place finisher in her specialty at the Suburban Eight Conference Meet, McClumpha was described by her coach as "very competitive in every meet."

**Mary Kay Convery, junior, Redford Bishop Borgess, 500-yard freestyle.** Convery placed fourth in both the distance freestyle (4:59.0) and in the 100-yard butterfly (1:07.0) at the Catholic League Finals.

A two-year member of the National Honor Society, Convery was voted Most Valuable Swimmer of 1975 by her teammates.

"She's a very versatile and strong girl and is very active in girls' sports," said Borgess coach Pattie Reschke.

**Cindy Brown, junior, Livonia Bentley, 200-yard individual medley.** Brown placed third in the state finals in both the individual medley (2:16.18) and the 100-yard butterfly (1:00.5).

Brown also was a member of the Bulldogs' league-championship medley relay foursome.

**Jill McCann, sophomore, Plymouth Salem, 400-yard freestyle relay.** An integral part of the Rocks' Sub Eight freestyle relay championship crew, McCann also powered to a second-place finish in the 100-yard backstroke at the league meet.

"She's a good, all-around swimmer ex-

celling in the backstroke," said Salem coach Chuck Olson.

**Laurie Sibert, senior, Livonia Bentley, at-large.** An individual Suburban Eight League champion in both the 50- and 100-yard freestyles, Sibert also swam a quarter of the Bulldogs' conference medley relay championship race.

**Becky Stanley, junior, Livonia Stevenson, 200-yard medley relay.** In addition to finishing third and fifth, respectively, in the 50- and 100-yard freestyles at the state meet, Stanley swam the breaststroke on the Spartans' record-breaking medley-relay crew.

Stevenson's time of 1:53.51 in the medley relay automatically qualified as an all-America standard.

**Pixie Smith, senior, Livonia Stevenson, at-large.** Perhaps the most versatile swimmer on the team this year, Smith placed sixth in the 100-yard backstroke and ninth in the 200-yard individual medley at the state meet. Smith also swam in the 400-yard freestyle relay this year at the state finals.

"She's a very fine swimmer who can swim anything," said Stevenson coach Lois McDonald.

**Kim Cox, junior, Livonia Churchill, at-large.** Cox won the 100-yard breaststroke at the Western Six League Conference Meet and also swam a leg of the Chargers' championship freestyle relay at the league get-together.

**Lori Tobis, senior, Livonia Stevenson, 200-yard medley relay.** Primarily a freestyler, Tobis swam the anchor leg of the Spartans' state championship medley-relay performance. Tobis also competed in the freestyle relay at the state finals.

"She was so consistent," McDonald stated, "that I could count on her to hold up the freestyle (on the medley relay team)."

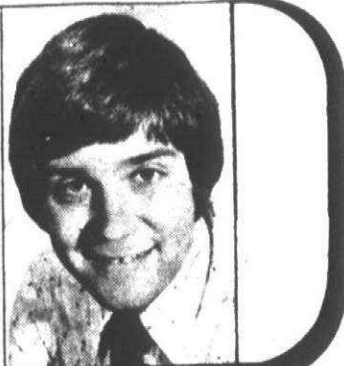

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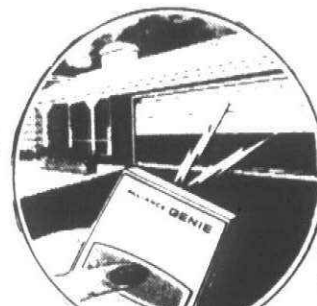
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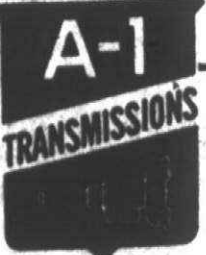
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## Upcoming sports

# Letter to Washington reports on life in 1976

Dear George:

It's been nearly 200 years since Valley Forge so maybe you've rested up enough to catch up on some of your correspondence. Things have changed a bit since you crossed the Delaware, and you might be intrigued by some of the happenings in the Plymouth-Canton community during 1976—what we've come to call our bicentennial year.

Remember how you listened in on all those debates in your presidential cabinet between Tom Jefferson and Alec Hamilton, about whether the common man was prepared to handle the rigors of democracy? I suppose Alec would say the verdict is still out, but you're likely to agree we've come a long way.

AMERICANS ARE pretty adept at making choices at the ballot box, but we sometimes need reminders about how important voting is. Last June, for instance, our schools had an election because more tax money was needed to educate our youngsters. A lot of people forgot to vote, almost proving the royalists right. The tax hike failed by one vote, mostly because of the low turnout. But another election was held in the fall, and the tax was approved. Jefferson would have been proud—not so much because the millage passed but because citizens rose to the occasion and turned out en masse to express their opinions at the polls.

There were many other elections during 1976, including a hotly-contested battle for supervisor in Canton. In your farewell address, you expressed fears about partisan politics and decried partisan factionalism. Well, Canton had a three-way race between a Democrat, a Republican and another Democrat who staged a write-in campaign.

Political alliances still seem to be the byword, though, as Cantonites defeated one slate of officers and replaced it with another slate.

The City of Plymouth also had an important election on whether to provide senior citizen housing (about three times as high as Mount Vernon). The particular housing idea was defeated, but there was a large turnout of residents voting as citizens once again showed a willingness to participate in democracy on issues which affect them.

AS A GENERAL, you had a major problem moving troops from one location to another to keep the Redcoats guessing what you were up to. Military logistics would have been a lot easier for you in 1976 with such things as automobiles, jeeps, trucks, trains, vans, mobile homes, dune buggies, snowmobiles and airplanes.

So many Americans today own vehicles of these sorts, though, that we've had some problems moving them from one place to another. You probably can't envision what an expressway is—it's a long stretch of concrete to move many autos long distances quickly—but we opened up a new one (I-275) this year and are still talking about opening another (M-14). To help move cars quickly once they get off the expressways, we build major roads and end up having to widen them every time another freeway is finished. This year, for instance, we widened Ann Arbor Road which gets people into the City of Plymouth a lot quicker. But that's about as far as our "progress" goes.

Some people drive their cars home and get by, but others come into town for shopping or business and have trouble finding a place to park. Those who find a place pay money for "the privilege of stopping." Others have trouble finding a spot to stop and just drive through town and spend their money elsewhere.

Maybe the next time you see Ben Franklin, tell him about our parking problems. He's a practical man and might invent something to solve all our transit woes.

## Who's Santa for suburbs?

For Troy, a new \$22 million community services building. For Livonia, the biggest plum—a new \$4.8 million city hall. For Canton Township, a new \$2.4 million township hall. For Westland, a \$2.4 million community building and \$1.2 million to help with an industrial park. For Redford Township, \$1.6 million to help renovate township hall and the district court building.

Who was playing Santa Claus last week? The federal government, specifically the Economic Development Administration in the Department of Commerce. EDA is administering the \$2 billion Congress appropriated last summer for public works.

The political behavior in Washington was extremely strange. News of the forthcoming grants came from routine publication in the Federal Register.

If Gerald R. Ford were the kind of political animal Lyndon B. Johnson was, the president would have announced the grants himself prior to the election. And if that couldn't have been done in time, he would have allowed a congressman of his own party—say Rep. Bill Broomfield or Sen. Robert Griffin, who faces a reelection battle in '78—to make the announcements.

WHILE YOU'RE talking with Ben, tell him we share his sense of humor and appreciate the value of a good chuckle.

Ben would have loved our first annual chicken race last fall in downtown Plymouth. He could have thought up some good chicken capers, like the time someone chicken-napped the racer belonging to our local bank.

After watching the aborted flights the day of the race, Ben likely would have quipped: "God intended chickens to fly; that's why He gave them wings; but if thou expectest them to fly far, redirect their flight path toward the Box Bar."

IN ONE OF YOUR letters, you mentioned the problems of raising men for a militia, dressing them, and getting Congress to Pay the troops.

Things haven't changed much. Canton tried to get a militia started to protect its neighborhoods. It was called a police reserve unit. But Gen. Greenstein had problems getting the board to decide whether, and how much, the militia should be paid. He had to make decisions on uniforms, guns, training, scout cars, radios, etc. But the militia was finally organized and equipped, and a beginning has been made.

In your retirement address to the nation, you also alluded to the rigors of public service and how you yearned to return to Martha and the green fields of Virginia. We have a few public servants who also retired from office and searched for green fields of their own.

But some, unlike yourself, were defeated at the polls instead of voluntarily stepping down. The squabble over the militia was probably Bob Greenstein's undoing, and now he's searching for other avenues of service.

Marda Benson took some strong stands on education issues, some positions which other voters took exception to, and was given time to devote to educational research for one of our universities. They both served well and while in office worked hard for what they thought was best for the community.

WELL, 1977 IS ALMOST here, but let us mention a few more things which happened this year in Plymouth-Canton.

Our schools, faced with rising student population, opened three new elementary buildings in Canton.

The Plymouth Historical Museum opened its doors to the public in March with some tremendous displays.

Canton received a welcome hunk of money from Washington, D.C., the capital we named after you, George, to build a new township hall. The city received some money from the same place to fix up some of the older homes of residents, but few people seem interested.

Delivering the mail still is a problem. Canton got its own zip code this year, but the mail is slow moving from town to town, and the cost is up to 13 cents a letter.

Industry isn't doing well here—Evans Products has closed its doors in Plymouth Township as have some smaller plants. Canton's business and industry are lagging behind home-building.

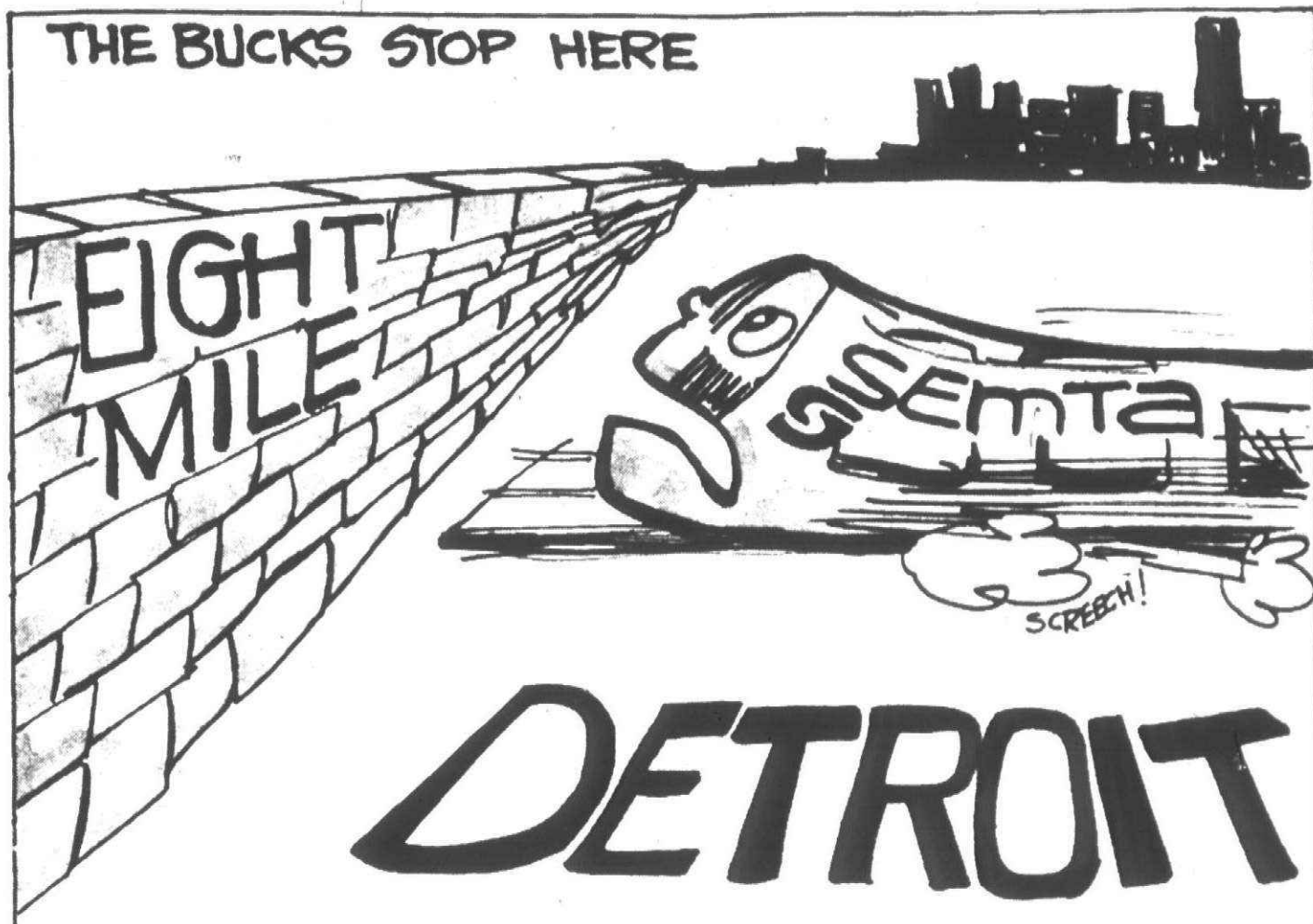
We started a hot-lunch program for our senior citizens in Plymouth and Canton, and Canton is starting up a dial-a-ride program to help transport our elderly to places they need to go.

Plymouth is starting a referral service for senior citizens, and is beginning a new study on what seniors need.

## Road commissions' transit plan is balanced, at least

Granted, the road commissions of Wayne and Oakland counties had a lot of gall proposing their "alternative" transit plan as a direct rival of one proposed by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA).

SEMTA, after all, is the agency that will be in the public transportation business in the seven counties of this region. SEMTA is the agency that has been working with origin and destination surveys, bus mergers, broad plans, detailed plans, federal grants, legislative funding—you name it.

What's more, the plan which the road commissions unveiled Dec. 21 was an extremely broad outline with little underlying data. Their origin and destination survey was done in so little time that SEMTA people shook their heads in quiet disbelief.

Finally, it's apparent the road folks have an ulterior motive. The trend in transportation funding is to lump road money and public transit money in the same pot. If SEMTA's \$1.12 billion plan is implemented, it will cost one-third more than the road folks' \$825 million plan, and the cause of road building would presumably lose the difference.

YET THE ROAD commissions have performed a useful service by challenging some of the thinking going on in SEMTA as well as in UMTA, the Urban Mass Transit Administration of the friendly federal government.

The "preliminary plan" which SEMTA submitted in October—and which one suspects is far from preliminary—would funnel 92 per cent or more of the billion-plus bucks into Detroit. Any improvements to public transportation in the suburbs are in low-cost programs.

Two powerful political forces were at work there.

President Gerald R. Ford, anxious to avoid a direct transfusion into Detroit's budget and a New York-style bailout, had his administration approve \$600 million in funding for SEMTA's Detroit-mostly plan, with the politically conservative proviso that private investment must accompany it.

Closer to home, Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young has grasped at anything that would pump

money into Detroit and only Detroit. The SEMTA plan suits his political purposes exactly.

THE ROAD COMMISSIONS, on the other hand, offered a light rail system in contrast to SEMTA's heavy rail.

Where SEMTA would build only 20 miles in two corridors, the road folks would set up 55 miles in three corridors.

Where 100 per cent of the rapid transit money would be spent inside Detroit's city limits under the SEMTA plan, the road folks' light rail system would put 46 per cent of the track mileage in Detroit, 16 per cent in suburban Wayne County, 28 per cent in Oakland County and eight per cent in Macomb.

In other words, what the road folks have designed is a multi-county transportation plan. What SEMTA is proposing is a Detroit economic redevelopment plan with money funneled in the name of transportation.

A LOT OF US in the suburbs have been preaching the need for a regional transportation system.

We kept saying that Detroit and the suburbs are in this together; that we are an economic whole; that a transportation system serving just one city—whether it be Detroit or Farmington or Westland—wasn't going to work.

What we got from SEMTA was a "preliminary proposal" whereby one city with one-fourth of the region's population gets 19-20ths of the new money.

The road commissions, however low their motives may be, were quite correct in pointing this out.

## Certain punishment can slow crime

I'm tired of hearing about Gary Gilmore's daily exploits in the death chambers in Utah.

This man murdered two people during robberies, and yet some people in the world feel sorry for him because he has been sentenced to be shot to death by a firing squad. Others feel sorry for him because he keeps trying to kill himself.

His antics have brought the question of capital punishment before the American people for all the wrong reasons. The man seems mentally off, and this raises serious questions of whether he should be sentenced to die.

In Michigan we have not had capital punishment for a long, long time.

The justification is that taking a life because the murderer took a life is uncivilized, cruel and inhumane treatment.

Sociologists feel it is better to rehabilitate than destroy.

It is pagan to call for an "eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth."

BUT MORE PEOPLE are being murdered today than ever before. How do we stop it?

The majority of homicides are committed by acquaintances or relatives of the victim, and it is

the first time these killers have been involved in a crime.

Capital punishment does nothing to dissuade this type of killing because the crime is committed during a period of passion or emotional instability, and there is no pre-thought; therefore, the seriousness of the crime or the consequence is not even taken into consideration before the act.

The only way to lessen this type of homicide is to remove dangerous weapons from the home.

You can outlaw guns, but there are still knives and other instruments capable of killing.

Capital punishment has little effect on these killings.

HOWEVER, THERE ARE still a substantial number of murders that are planned or result during the perpetration of another crime.

Capital punishment can be a deterrent when people know that if they are caught, they won't spend just a couple of years in jail and then be paroled.

There is another way, however, of accomplishing the same thing without capital punishment.

Today society is plagued by the habitual criminal. He commits a crime, spends a short time in jail and is out again to commit another crime.

We have a tendency to blame judges for not locking these people up and "throwing away the key."

THE JUDGES MUST take their share of the responsibility. Only 35 per cent of the persons convicted of felonies in state courts in Wayne County are ever incarcerated.

But to add to lenient judges, we have a sentencing procedure called "indeterminate sentencing" that allows parole boards to let criminals out after a minimum period in prison.

The system doesn't work. It's supposed to help rehabilitated criminals return to society, but there is little rehabilitation in prisons today.

Habitual criminals just behave themselves and get out early.

Parole Boards go along because it frees space in overcrowded jails.

One solution that has been proposed is that the Michigan Legislature set a specific sentence for a crime, such as life imprisonment for murder.

UNDER SUCH A law for mandatory sentencing, a judge would have to sentence a person according to law, unless aggravating or mitigating circumstances relating to the offender or the offense were established which would increase or decrease the set sentence.

The person sentenced could not be released early by the parole board unless new information were discovered that was unavailable to the sentencing judge.

This would keep criminals in jail longer. A survey in New York showed that if every person convicted of a serious felony were imprisoned for three years, the rate of crime would be only one-third of what it is presently.

And if persons involved in murder knew they were going to jail for a long time, it would be as much of a deterrent as capital punishment.

Let's remove the criminals from the streets with certainty of punishment. Then we won't have to worry about "an eye for an eye."

### Why winter's obnoxious

The best example of what I mean is Monday. I get out of bed, read the paper, have two cups of coffee, and hop into the Vega to get started to work. The engine kicked a couple times and then ground to a halt as the juice drained out of the battery like water pours through a funnel.

Now in this case, it wasn't really the Vega's fault because I drove home Thursday and left it parked on the street until Monday morning without starting it. But there's been plenty of times when the car should have started but didn't.

THAT'S WHY I have a pet peeve against the automotive manufacturers. The engineers and designers know it gets cold in the wintertime, but yet cannot come up with an engine which starts when the temperature dips below 15-above.

And I do everything that's supposed to be done to winterize my car—a tune-up, battery check, fresh anti-freeze, oil and lube, etc. So don't I, and you too for that matter, have the right to drive a car home at night and expect it to start the next morning?

The reason it's so aggravating when a car doesn't start, of course, is the time wasted trying to get road service. Some stations are honest enough and tell you to try someplace else. Others will promise to be out in 30 minutes or an hour, and don't arrive until three to four hours later.

Monday was one of those aggravating situations. When the Vega wouldn't start, I first tried some jumper cables I keep in the trunk. When that didn't work, I called a service station for help and specifically told them I needed a jump for my battery. Three hours later the truck finally arrived. But the driver wanted to tow my car into the station. "What? Tow it in just to juice up the battery? Just give me a jump, it'll start." He replied: "Sorry, I don't have any cables. My instructions were to tow it in." My reply is unprintable.

So I got to work Monday in a borrowed car and left an hour early to try another station. The guy answering the phone said

a truck could be out in 15 to 30 minutes. Two hours later the truck arrived—this time with cables—and my Vega was humming again after about three minutes of juice being poured back into the battery.

Now I can't really blame the service station operators. After all, everytime the temperature drops they get flooded with calls for service as cars all over suburbia won't start. That being the case, why can't the Big Three make cars that start in winter?

THE OTHER PROBLEM with winter is keeping sidewalks and driveways clear of snow.

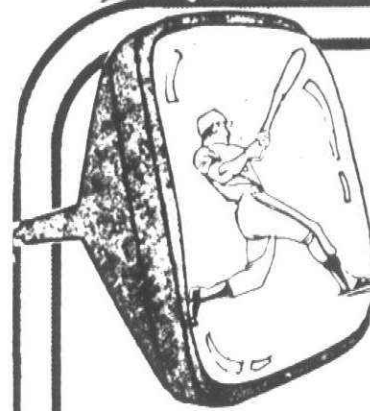
Monday is another good example. In the morning, while waiting for the service truck, I shoveled off the sidewalks, driveway, and the portion of the street at the curb by our mailbox. (Our carrier won't deliver unless she can drive her mini-bus right up to our box and insists that I keep that area shoveled if I am to get mail.)

But during the day it snowed, and by late afternoon my walks, drive and street were covered again. So while waiting for the second truck to arrive I shoveled off the walks, driveway, and portion of the street by the mailbox again.

I look out the window now, and it's snowing. Maybe it will stop soon. Otherwise back at it again tonight.

I understand that shoveling walks is one of the prices we pay for living in Winter Wonderland. But that's a small consolation because I don't ice skate, refuse to ice fish, and am too old to go sledding. But I would be consoled if the only aggravation was shoveling walks. But the Big Three still hasn't produced a car to start in the

winter, so my attitudes about this time of year remain unchanged.

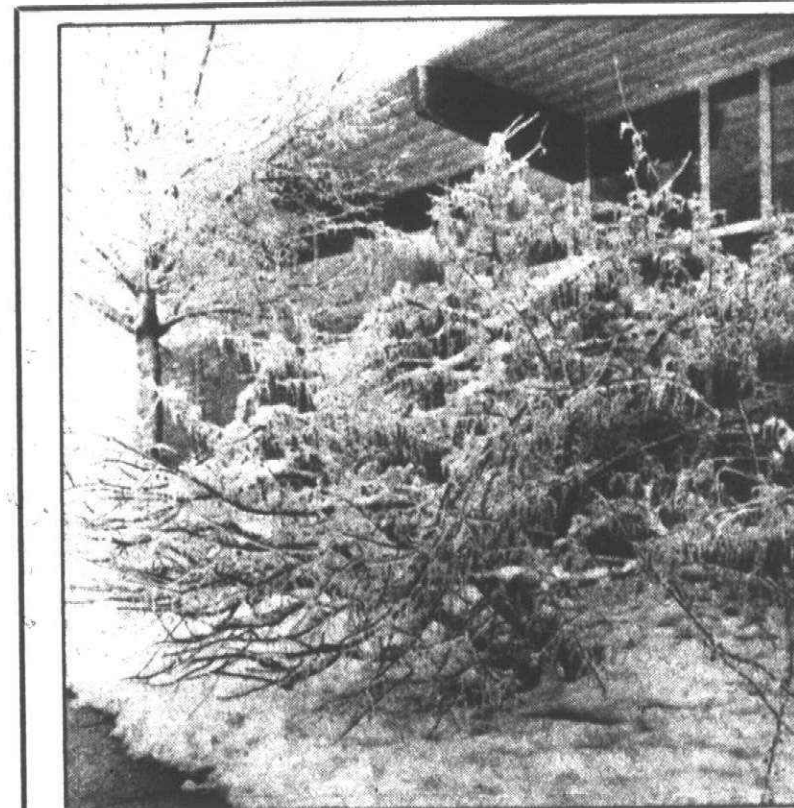
The new oil deal violates the Environmental Protection Act and was also made in violation of the Oil and Gas Act which requires advance notice and hearings be made before such decisions can be made.

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1976 in review

Canton reserves, plant closings, schools, museum highlight year

This is the third installment of a four-part look at the events occurring in the Plymouth-Canton area during 1976. Today's summary covers the months of July, August, and September.

**JULY 1**  
After a brief four-month stint as director of the Plymouth Historical Museum, Mark Hunt packs his belongings to assume a similar post in Kansas.  
School Trustee George Lawton urges that schools in the district be opened without budget cuts, and after the special millage election.

**JULY 5**  
Joe Gray elected as board of education president.  
The Plymouth Corps of the Salvation Army commences with a change in commanders. Lt. Dallas Raby heads for Chicago and is replaced by Lt. and Mrs. William Harfoot.

**JULY 8**  
Joe Gray's tenure as board president is voided as board attorney issues statement saying that election of Gray was performed improperly by the board.

**JULY 12**  
The Whitman Barnes plant announces its closing and ensuing departure for a new facility in Augusta, Ga.  
Seven freight cars derail just north of the Farmer Street crossing in Plymouth.

**JULY 15**  
Fire Chiefs in Plymouth, Plymouth Township, and Canton Township meet, and take their case to Chessie System Railroad officials. The chiefs claim long train delays pose hazardous consequences for residents of the area.  
School millage election is set for Sept. 2. The board of education re-elects Joe Gray as president.

**JULY 19**  
Archie Stoble named as new director of Plymouth Historical Society Museum.  
Plymouth and Plymouth Township lose \$90,000 in federal bloc grant programs.

**JULY 29**  
Plymouth Ptl. Roger Roy awarded a citation by Police Chief Tim Ford for his part in capturing wanted felon.  
Board of education sets the tax vote request at 4.74 mills for the Sept. 2 special election.

**AUGUST 2**  
Cadillac dealer Don Massey announces he'll develop his property in both Plymouth and Canton townships.

**August 5**  
Plymouth Township voters turn thumbs down on a request to establish a nine-member police department. The voters give the OK to pay an additional 1/2-mill to support the township's fire department.  
Tom Notebaert is elected as township's new supervisor. The two seats open on the township board are filled by Weyona Lee Fidge and Maurice Breen.  
The voters also voted overwhelmingly against becoming a city, and a subsequent charter for Plymouth Heights.

Promotion routine upset

The seemingly routine process of promoting a teacher who has passed all his probationary tests was upset at the last Schoolcraft College board of trustees meeting. The teacher passed all the exams, except those from the students.  
Board member Mark McQuesten, a current part-time Schoolcraft student, raised the issue concerning law enforcement instructor Christopher Kokolakis and his appointment as full time instructor. McQuesten indicated that he had nothing against Kokolakis, he was simply questioning the process.  
"The students never evaluated him," said McQuesten.  
Kokolakis was given the appointment despite McQuesten's dissenting vote. He had completed two years of probationary instruction and had been recommended by the coordinator for instructional affairs, his dean, his director, and his department representative.  
Board members seemed to agree in sentiment with McQuesten's view, but felt that Kokolakis should not be sacrificed for the principle.  
"We in the administration have been guilty in the past of not letting the students evaluate enough," said Schoolcraft President Dr. Nelson Grote.  
Board member Gerald Cox disagreed totally and warned the board, "Beware of evaluations!"  
Board member Nancie Blatt responded, "Student evaluations must at all times be asked for, but it is not fair to refuse this instructor."

Business is tops

Business and commerce is the major field of study among college-level students training under the GI Bill, according to the Veterans Administration.

**AUGUST 9**  
An industrial void is left in Plymouth as the Anchor Coupling Company becomes the third industry to vacate the Plymouth area.

**AUGUST 16**  
Workmen commence building bridges for the long-proposed M-14 expressway under Northville Road at Five Mile and then westerly to Ann Arbor.  
Petition drive in Plymouth Township nets the necessary 1,000 signatures needed to put the Plymouth Heights question on the ballot in the upcoming election.

**AUGUST 19**  
The Plymouth City Commission approves the site for the rezoning of 2.3 acres of land at Union and Penniman Streets to multiple-residential for a proposed 11-story senior citizen apartment project scheduled for the heart of downtown Plymouth.

**AUGUST 26**  
The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees retains an architectural firm and gives it approval to draw up preliminary plans for a combined township hall-fire station in the western portion of the township.  
Plymouth Salem principal Bill Brown promises that parents will be periodically getting a copy of a computer read-out which will tell them how many "mods" their children skipped in addition to telling them the students academic deficiencies.

**SEPTEMBER 2**  
A record turnout, 11,370 residents, provided the impetus to carry the 4.75 mill

school tax addition proposal in the Plymouth Community School District. Of the nine precincts in the district, five voted no, but the ninth precinct (Miller school) voted yes by a 2-1 margin as it turned out to be the deciding precinct in the election.

The school board stands by its decision to deny pay to crossing guards in Plymouth Township.

The Canton Board of Trustees voted to apply the regulations governing the reserves to the two "regularly-employed" police officers, Carl Silvers and Robert Greenstein.

Two Canton Township citizens have asked the state attorney general to remove Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein from office for accepting a second job as Police Chief of Canton Township.

**SEPTEMBER 9**  
Thousands of persons crowd into the city for its annual Fall Festival celebration. And while much of the attention and activity is centered in Kellogg Park, the Festival's events are being staged throughout the city. The Cultural Center and Central Middle School host some of the cultural attractions that attract many strollers.

Teachers of the school district meet and vote to return to work without a contract.  
Posing as representatives of Detroit area utility companies, con artists strike the area's senior citizens and make off with their cash reserves.

**SEPTEMBER 13**  
Wayne County Circuit Judge Roland Ol-

zark ordered the school district to provide crossing guards at any location where a hazard exists, until such time that a trial can be scheduled to deal with the legal issues of who should pay for the service.

**SEPTEMBER 16**  
Referendum on senior housing project is approved to be placed on the Nov. 2 ballot.

**SEPTEMBER 20**  
The Michigan State Police subpost and scientific laboratory leaves its station on Mill Street, and heads for its new office in Northville.

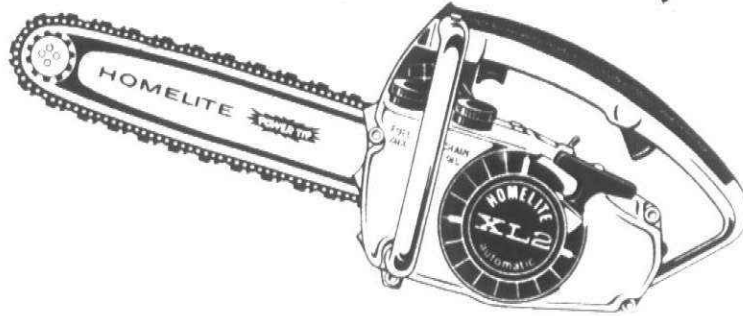
Workers at the Ford Motor Company's Sheldon Plant come out in full force to picket for higher wages and other benefits during the strike against Ford Motor Co.

**SEPTEMBER 23**  
A resolution granting tax abatement for the Forest City-Dillon senior citizen apartment housing project is approved by a 5-2 vote of the Plymouth City Commission.

**SEPTEMBER 27**  
Dr. E.J. McClendon is named as the recipient of the 1976 William A. Howe Award by the American School Association.

**SEPTEMBER 30**  
Residents of the Plymouth Community School District pay all of the additional mills, approved by voters earlier in the month, despite a recommendation from the schools administration to levy only 4.25 additional mills.

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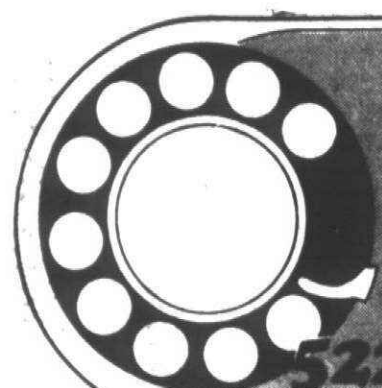
