## Medical center site rezoned

Plans for a \$30 million medical complex on Canton Center Road, south of Ford, have been revived with Monday night's unanimous ruling by the Canton Planning Commission which rezoned a 10-acre parcel from residential to restricted office use.

Mel Stein of the Great American Building Corp. last year announced plans for a three-stage medical complex on the site but failed in an attempt to rezone the property from residential to commercial. At the time, Stein said the first stage of the project would be construction of three professional office buildings, the second stage would be a 200-bed nursing home and finally, if given state certification, a 200-bed general surgical hospital.

The planning commission also unanimously voted in a "text amendment" which permits the construction of hospitals, medical centers, dental centers, or extended care medical facilities (nursing homes) in the RO-1 office zone.

**OTHER PERMITTED** uses in the RO-1 zone are business schools, private schools, banks, and professional buildings.

Now that Stein and the Great American Building Corp. have received a favorable vote from the Canton planning body, the corporation must have the rezoning approved by the Wayne County Planning Commission and then the Canton Township Board of Trustees.

Before he can build a hospital, Stein must receive a certificate of need from the State of Michigan to avoid building surplus beds. Stein said the hospital will be a private, not public, venture.

Spokesmen for two area hospital planning agencies—the Greater Detroit Area Hospital Council and the Comprehensive Health Planning Council—said last fall that a certificate of need would be difficult to obtain in Canton because St. Mary, St. Joseph, Wayne County General and Annapolis hospitals are all located within 15 miles of the township's borders.

John and Helen Sniders own the 10-acre parcel that Stein wants to build on. The lot is 330 feet wide and 1,317 feet deep.

**ALL BUT ONE** planning commissioner, Bart Berg, voted Oct. 24 to deny Stein's request to rezone the property to commercial use.

Canton's planning consultant, George Peek, argued that while the property which abuts the Meijer's Thrifty Acres parking lot is not suited for residential use, he feared a "domino effect" along Canton Center, south of Ford, if the piece was to be zoned commercial.

Right now no land on Canton Center, south of Ford, is zoned commercial. But Peek, wholeheartedly recommended the expanded office zoning Monday and it was approved unanimously by planning commissioners.

## Suspect in jail on pigeon drop; police seek con 'mastermind'

"I thought I was only trying to help two stranded people. You see, I'm from the old school there you help people who are in need."

The 77-year-old Canton Township woman who uttered these words lost \$12,613 in a "pigeon drop" con game that ended last Thursday. Angela Livingston, a woman whom she considered a new-found friend and seemed "very nice, saccharine sweet," has been charged with two counts of felony fraud for allegedly defrauding the widow with one of the world's oldest cons.

The defendant, and another woman police are still seeking, reportedly lived with the widow for almost a

week before any money exchanged hands.

This incident and at least four similar pigeon drops reported in the Detroit area the past two months cause Wayne County Sheriff's detectives to suspect that women are being schooled by a mastermind who participates in the con by posing as an attorney on the phone and ends up taking in a good portion of the life savings that his accomplices collect from unwitting victims.

The same scheme was used in an attempt to defraud an elderly woman in Redford the same day.

All of the recently reported pigeon drop cons operate on an almost identical premise. The con artist meets the

"pigeon" or victim at a public place such as a shopping center or bus stop and shows the person a mysterious package she just found.

Usually, another person in on the con arrives on the scene and the package is eventually opened to reveal a note which leads the victim to believe that the loot inside is illegal gambling money.

**GAINING THE CONFIDENCE** of the victim is a process which can take as long as a week. The con artists persuade the people to "invest" up to \$20,000 of their own money with the phony attorney as a sign of "good faith" while they are given sealed bags of what they believe to be their share of the "found" money.

When those bags are eventually opened, only play money is found inside and, in most cases, the victim's "friends" are long gone.

The latest victim, the Canton widow, has not recovered the \$12,613 she reportedly gave to the phony attorney to invest. It was not recovered by deputies when they arrested Ms. Livingston, who gave the court an address of 934 Penrod, Detroit, when she was arraigned. Sheriff deputies say that address is non-existent.

Ms. Livingston was charged Monday with two felonies—larceny by trick and conspiracy to commit larceny by trick. Eighteenth District Court Judge Thomas Smith set two \$15,000 cash bonds on the defendant who is being held in Wayne County Jail. She faces preliminary examination in 18th District Court Jan. 23.

**THE TWO WOMEN** arrested Jan. 5 in Redford Township on charges of

attempting to defraud an 83-year-old woman are Marsha Davis, 26, of 12707 Cherry Lawn, Detroit, and Patricia Mihalik, 21, of 19225 Binder, Detroit.

In both cases, and in most recently reported pigeon drop schemes, the mark for the con has been an elderly widow, advice was sought from a phony attorney and the drop was supposed to contain about \$60,000 in gambling money.

In the Redford case, police were alerted to the con by a bank manager who alerted police when he became suspicious about the widow's uncharacteristic withdrawal of \$8,000 from her bank.

In the con of the Canton woman, Det. Ray Allen of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department said the crooks were tripped up by hiring a security guard to accompany them when they tried unsuccessfully to cash a \$40,000 cashier's check. The security guard, according to police, was suggested by the con artists to add an air of respectability to the transaction.

But the security guard they hired was actually the chief investigator of his company, Pat Hudgins, from the Merchant Detective Agency of Lincoln Park, immediately called police because a similar play was used recently in the Dearborn Heights pigeon drop scheme.

Hudgins says he played "the classic dumb security guard" while he drove the old woman and the accused to two suburban banks, the 1st Precinct of the Detroit Police Department, the Goldfarb Bonding Agency and the Westland Mall, where the con artists allegedly met their mark.

The trio went to the bonding agency because one of the con artists claimed she was going to bail her boyfriend out of jail. Police believe this was another line used to gain the widow's sympathy.

Tailing the two women and the security guard were officers from Wayne County, Westland and Detroit. Hudgins thinks the accused knew she was being followed because "she kept looking through the back window in her makeup mirror." Hudgins said the defendant got out of the car twice during the trip—once saying she had to go to the bathroom and next saying she had to make a phone call.

When the three travelers returned to the widow's Canton home, sheriff's detectives arrested Ms. Livingston. She was released on a writ of habeas corpus Friday because she had been held 24 hours without a warrant. But on Monday the warrant was signed by the prosecutor and Ms. Livingston was arraigned on two counts. Her attorney is Lester Hudson.

## Schools tighten up busing schedule

Central administration of Plymouth-Canton schools will proceed with its efforts to come up with a new student busing system which would eliminate double-tripping at the elementary and middle schools.

Double-tripping occurs when a bus transports one group of students to a school, and then departs to pick up another group. For example, Gallimore Elementary uses four buses for eight trips.

The approach being considered by administration is to add ten buses to the current fleet by repairing old buses which were to be sold. Other details of the new transportation program will be worked out after discussions with the bus drivers' union

and ECOTRAN, the computer service processing bus routes for the school district.

The final recommendation will come back to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education for approval within a month or two.

**SINCE THE** start of the school year residents have expressed concern about busing, said Supt. John M. Hoben. Particularly concerned were residents of the Sunflower subdivision in Canton and of the Field and Eriksen elementary attendance areas.

The district now operates 53 buses to transport students. But the volume of students requires 63 trips to the high schools, 41 trips to the middle schools,

and 79 trips to elementary schools.

"We are one of the last districts in this area to be using double-tripping," Hoben told the board at its Monday meeting. "Traffic patterns have compounded our problem in the last four to five years, and projections indicate there will be 27 per cent more vehicles on the roads in the district within the next five years."

"This will be a cost item, but our client satisfaction is deteriorating rapidly," Hoben said it will be an expense to repair the older buses but the cost will be partially offset by less overtime to drivers and possibly by getting a longer life for the newer buses now being used.

"At the current rate of growth, and

increased traffic congestion, we must make a change before this June. I'd like authorization from the board to allow administration to proceed to investigate changing our transportation process, possibly for implementation during the current school year."

"We are doing something which is antiquated and traffic patterns dictate we try a different approach," said Hoben. The superintendent estimated that the additional expense for the first year of the new busing program will be between \$12,000 to \$18,000.

The board voted 6-0 to authorize administration to proceed with its study. Administration hopes to come back with a recommendation at the Jan. 23 meeting of the school board.

## Want to be a rock star? Ask your dad

You could say that 57-year-old Bruce Young and his wife Elsie have tuned their life to the pounding beat of rock 'n' roll.

The owners of a used car lot on Michigan Avenue hadn't planned it that way. They even express a distaste for the "loud and vulgar" variety of rock 'n' roll music.

But when the Youngs' son, Rick, dropped out of Eastern Michigan University two years ago and began an unsuccessful year-long campaign to build his rock band into a money-making proposition, Young decided it was time to apply his musical and business knowledge to the rock 'n' roll scene.

The result was the founding of Muzacan Associates, Inc., a management-type firm that has pumped new life and direction into Rick's band and make it a success on the bar and night spot circuit.

**THE CORPORATION** now has about 25 stockholders and offers advisory services to two bands other than Rick's "Teezer." The Youngs deal with booking agents to set up gigs for the bands and handle the promotions.

A sister corporation, Muzacan Publishing Co., headed by Canton attorney Noel Culbert, who made an unsuccessful bid for Canton trustee last election, publishes the material of the group's songwriters.

But Young, who once aspired toward a song-writing career when he was a music major at Texas A&M University, says the best thing about Muzacan is the way it pumps a businessman's knowledge of the rock industry into young, aspiring rock bands.

Young asks the musicians to set a goal for themselves. Then he devises a program through which the goal can be achieved.

In the case of Teezer, a band that

wants to record songs and take concert tours, Young advised the group to turn down an offer from a Windsor booking agent that would have given the band a steady string of gigs in Canadian bars and lounges.

"We want to avoid the 'burnout route,'" Young explained. "If you stay booked regularly, there's no energy left for anything else. There's no time to prepare for the future and to prepare new material."

**YOUNG, HOWEVER,** does not like to be called "manager" of Teezer and other bands. That term would just build a feeling of distrust, he says, and

create a psychological barrier between himself and the rock groups.

Young prefers to call Muzacan a "family group," even though the corporation has now outgrown his family circle. All decisions for the corporation and member bands are made democratically, and members bands share ideas on how to achieve success.

The corporation owns a PA system, a light system and a school bus. Bands who are members of Muzacan share and share alike.

Although Young says he has not derived any income from Muzacan, the Canton resident insists that the corporation's one-year history is a

rock 'n' roll success story.

He points to Teezer as evidence of that success. The band is composed of his son, Rick, 23, lead guitarist; drummer Keith Johnstone, former member of Ted Nugent and the Amboy Dukes; lead singer Mark Torok; and bass guitarist Dave Hilton.

**ACCORDING TO MRS. YOUNG,** Teezer never "evolved to anything but practice sessions and a hall gig here and there" before Muzacan was formed.

Young says the band is now considered the most popular group on Windsor's night spot circuit.

"Without Muzacan, I'd probably still

be part of the vicious circle trying to get a band together," agreed Rick. "Without Muzacan, the band probably would have disintegrated."

Recuperating from a cold in his Canton Township living room, Young grew philosophical about his involvement in his son's career. The Canton resident said he encouraged his son to quit college because Rick's dream lay in the musical field.

"So many parents build a barrier between themselves and their children because they try to change them and make them conform to their point of view. It seems to be an inherent part of parenthood, but you just can't do it."

"My involvement with Tuzacan sort of goes along with the old saying, 'If you can't beat 'em, join 'em,'" Young said.

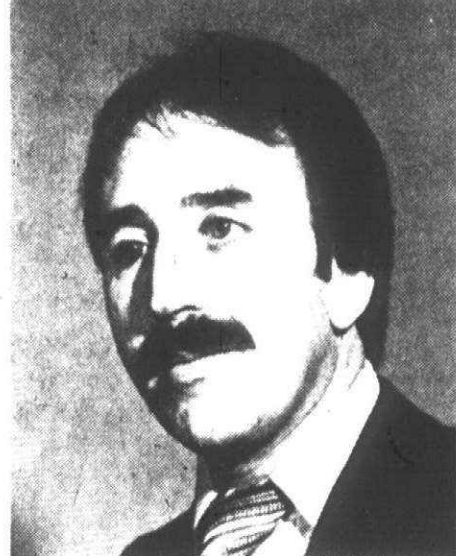
## Hagan appointed advertising director

## McClendon's text approved

# Royal Holiday tenants say upkeep going down

In most ways Royal Holiday Mobile Home Park is a great place to live, said about 60 irate tenants of the park who turned out for an "action meeting" last week.

But, lately, they say, just getting around Royal Holiday Park is a royal pain.

The main boulevard and the street around the park's clubhouse have been clogged with glacier-like ice flows most of the winter, making driving and walking a treacherous proposition, according to many residents.

The park has an age restriction limiting new rentals to people 40 years and older and the clubhouse in the middle of the park is used as a social center and meeting place for senior citizens.

Last Thursday about 60 people living in the park showed up for an informal rally at the clubhouse, where all who spoke said they expect more maintenance on roads, shrubbery and the clubhouse than they're presently receiving for the \$100 a month average rent they pay to their lot landlord, Sheldon Futernick of Nationwide Mobile Home Parks, Inc. of Westland.

**THE MAIN COMPLAINT** from residents concerns the condition of the streets.

"Underneath all that ice is mud and broken up blacktop," Ray Gerlach of Lot 167 maintains.

But other people had other concerns. One woman was concerned that people might not be able to sell their trailers on the lot to a new buyer if the trailer is judged to be below the standard price. Futernick acknowledges that he suggested setting a minimum price range for trailers to stay in the park—and mentioned a possible \$8,000 limit—but says that nothing definite has been decided.

Other people, such as Irene Murphy, wanted to know why carpeting in the clubhouse foyer hadn't been replaced even though bids were taken on new carpeting by the park's resident manager, Doris Ramage.

Mrs. Ramage agreed that she sought bids for new carpeting but said she doubts whether new carpeting would hold up because the clubhouse is used as an election precinct and the voting machines that are brought in would damage the rug.

A badly buckled sidewalk which allegedly caused Mrs. Fay Leese, Lot 110, to fall and break her wrist and blacken her eye was the subject of much consternation at the meeting.

Mrs. Leese, 88, believes she wouldn't have fallen if the management had acted this summer when the problem was brought to their attention. Mrs. Mary Woods, president of the Royal Holiday In-Park Association, said the resident manager was told to fix the sidewalk last August.

Futernick, one of the partners who owns the park, said this is the first he's heard of the buckled sidewalk. But, he continued, something like that would probably be handled by the park manager, Mrs. Ramage.

Mrs. Ramage explains that a cement contractor, Jim Dingeldey, came out this fall to see about replacing the piece of buckled concrete.

"But the man couldn't lift it," Mrs. Ramage said. "It was too cold and too late in the year to pour new cement. Of course, it's a worse problem in the winter when the ground heaves."

**THE SIDEWALK** around the mobile homes are to be maintained by the residents, according to the lease, but the sidewalk around the clubhouse is supposed to be maintained by the management.

Futernick called the action committee's complaints the work of "a couple of elderly people who have a lot of time on their hands. They spread rumors which have no basis in fact to stir people up and then enjoy the limelight they get from the news media."

Futernick singled out resident Ray Gerlach as an instigator "with time on his hands." Gerlach replies that the park owner is refusing to deal with the issues raised by criticizing the more vocal tenants.

"Royal Holiday is probably the finest mobile home park in the state," Futernick said. "You can't have a good park without good management. Have they compared the park to others in the area? We must be doing something right if all 436 lots are rented."

Mrs. Woods admits that in the past some of the tenants have made complaints about things that the management has no control over.

"But we're not raising complaints this time about things like someone keeping three cats on their porch," Mrs. Woods said. "We're trying to make the management stick to the terms of the lease."

Producing the lease agreement she signed with Royal Holiday's owners, Mrs. Woods reads that it's the lessor's responsibility "to maintain roads, sidewalks, the clubhouse and the pool; to maintain landscaping and lawns around the clubhouse, islands and park entrance; and to check out complaints on diseased lawns with residents."

Mrs. Woods emphasizes that residents of Royal Holiday aren't blaming Mrs. Ramage for what they believe to be declining upkeep. "We just think there should be a maintenance person assigned to the park like there was until 1976."

The previous maintenance person was Mrs. Ramage's husband, Herb, who said Monday that he quit because

of "constant complaints" from the residents.

"Mrs. Ramage is a responsible person but she can't do everything," Mrs. Woods continued. "He (Futernick) gives her the responsibility of keeping the park maintained but delegates no authority for her to act to correct the things that need to be done."

The management underestimates the ire of its residents and the seriousness of their complaints, Mrs. Woods said. For that reason, she said, she would like Futernick to attend a meeting of the tenants association.

A meeting was held, Futernick notes, in his office last month with Mrs. Woods. Mrs. Woods said the park manager refused to allow anyone else to attend the meeting and asked her to turn the tape recorder off.

The park owner suggested that the Royal Holiday In-Park Association compile a list of complaints and send him a copy and Mrs. Ramage one. Valid sidewalk and street complaints, he said, will be acted upon, "weather permitting."

## ZBA returning

A circuit court injunction prohibiting Canton's Zoning Board of Appeals from meeting was lifted Jan. 1, and township officials have scheduled a meeting of the board on Jan. 19.

The township clerk's secretary, Doris Kelley, said only 14 people are requesting a hearing on zoning variances at the meeting.

Former members of the ZBA appointed by the township's previous supervisor, Robert Greenstein, are appealing a circuit court ruling by Judge Neal Fitzgerald that said those appointments were illegal because a local statute pertaining to the number of members that should be appointed to the ZBA had not been changed to comply with state law.

The ousted board's attorney, Daniel Burress, is attempting to get the Michigan Appeals Court to reinstate an injunction prohibiting the present ZBA from meeting until the appeal is decided.

## JCs vs. DJs

Tickets are still available for next Wednesday night's library benefit basketball game between the Canton Jaycees and radio station WDRQ.

A \$1 donation is requested and tickets may be obtained at the door or in advance at any of the Plymouth-Canton Schools' four middle school offices, Rick's TV and Canton Sports.

A game which will pit the faculty of two middle schools against the faculty of the other two will follow the JC-DJ contest.

Proceeds from the game will go to the new library fund established by Canton Supervisor Harold Stein.

# Copyright law often ignored

A new copyright law that went into effect Jan. 1 makes illegal many every-day activities. But it appears little can be done to enforce the new code.

The regulation makes it illegal to record albums, photocopy magazine articles or for nightclub entertainers to sing musical hits, unless royalties are exchanged.

The legislation was designed to give authors and writers their share of the profit. The easy reproduction of copyrighted works cuts down the authors portion of the profit on the purchase price.

Spokesmen for recording companies say the copyright revision will be nearly impossible to enforce. It will, however, be effective in curbing gross abuses by commercial pirates.

Jim Griffith, Centennial Educational Park music director, said the new copyright law is more practical than its predecessor. "If we're short one or two pieces of music, the revised law allows us to copy those parts. There are other lenient areas like these that make copyright laws more realistic."

**THE LENIENCY** extends into the classroom, where an instructor can make copies of poems up to 250 words for distribution, Griffith said.

"Actually, they've opened up more avenues for copying than ever before. I think all they're after is flagrant violations. Composers will probably get more money, but that's the way it should be—it's how they make their

living."

The new law will have minimal effect on the high school marching bands, but could hamper the selection of music at the college band level.

College marching bands matter-of-factly received permission for the arrangements for halftime shows. Now publishers may demand a cut of gate receipts for each tune played, Griffith said.

The only change at the Dunning-Hough Library on Main in Plymouth since the new law took effect has been a sign on the photocopying machine informing persons whether they can legally copy a published work.

The library never made a practice of copying periodicals for reserve purposes, said Debra O'Connor, adding that employees have been aware of the new law change for some time and have been following it since last year.

**THE COPYRIGHT** law change may have considerable effect on the legality of videotape recorders. Still pending is a lawsuit filed by Universal and Disney studios against Sony Corp. regarding its Betamax videotape machine.

The Betamax records television programs in the same manner as a cassette recorder. The lawsuit claims that home videotaping poses a threat to the rerun market for films and TV shows.

Scott Clemons, a Sony salesman, said the lawsuit was supposed to go to trial this week, but was postponed until May 1.

# Tent family raises a new flap

Following a neighborhood dispute and eviction from their home, a Westland couple pleaded innocent Wednesday to charges of contributing to the delinquency of their own children and another youth.

In addition to the counts against her and his wife, Elsie, Joseph Pierce pleaded innocent to assault and battery and to fighting and quarreling.

All charges are misdemeanors, carrying a maximum penalty of \$500 fine and/or 90 days in jail.

They were arrested last Friday and posted \$100 bond each. No trial date has been set.

Westland police officer Frank Vis-

coni said the warrant cited the Pierces for the conduct of their five children, including alleged assault and battery, felonious assault, fighting, obscene language and verbal harassment. The children are aged 11 to 19.

The charges include the allegation that Mr. and Mrs. Pierce allowed a neighbor boy to stay in their home when he was truant from school.

The Pierce family was evicted Monday from their Emerson Street home, where they have lived since early October. They had been living in a tent after their rented Canton Township home burned.

**THE PIERCES' LANDLORD,** Archie Woods of Pinckney, said the family was evicted for "disruption to the neighborhood" and destruction of property. He has been trying to evict them since Thanksgiving, he added.

A Wayne Baptist church had helped the Pierces find the three-bedroom duplex at 2126 Emerson after the family refused to move into an inner-city Detroit motel, where the Wayne County Department of Social Services attempted to place them.

A reporter could not locate where the Pierces are presently living.

In an interview last week, Mrs. Pierce said she doesn't think the problems are all their fault.

"We've never had trouble with our neighbors before," she said. Her children "aren't angels," she added, and described many of her sons' fights as "self-defense."

"It takes two to make a fight."

Last week the Westland police investigated at least 10 incidents and

fielded dozens of complaints involving the Pierces and several of their neighbors.

One of the Pierce children was briefly placed in the Wayne County Youth Home.

"It has been like cowboys and indians down here," said Pierce. "The police are down here all the time, and they're trying to put the blame on my kids."

Officer Visconi, who is assigned to the Youth Energy Services office in Norway, said he has been spending considerable time "trying to restore peace to the neighborhood."

Several Emerson street residents said neighbors are "nervous and upset."

"The neighborhood is up in arms," said Terry Woolford, 20, of 2121 Emerson.

Another neighbor was arrested last week and charged with disorderly conduct.

## Police board is reorganized

The heads of Canton's police and fire departments will join three members of the township board on a reorganized public safety commission to recommend policy changes for the two departments.

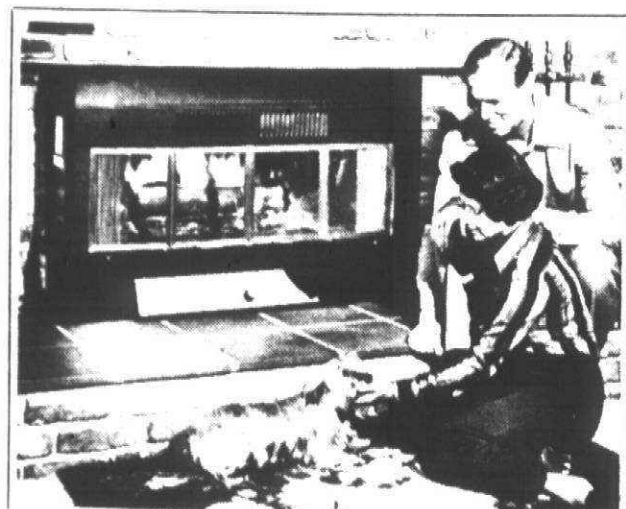

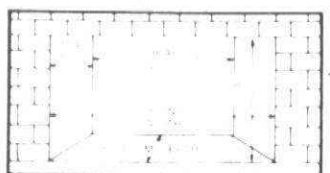

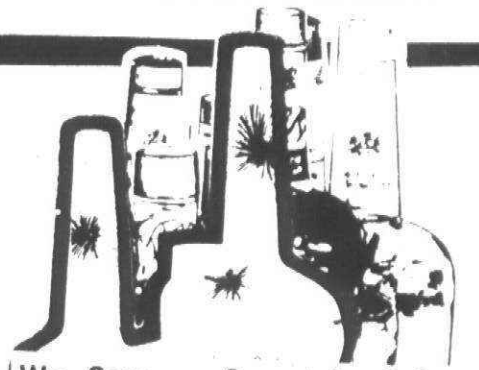

## Surveyors to meet here

More than 700 land surveyors, exhibitors and guests are expected to converge on the Plymouth Hilton next month for the 37th annual Conference of the Michigan Society of Registered Land Surveyors.

The conference will begin Wednesday morning, Feb. 1, and run through Feb. 3. The theme will be the "2nd Ten Years of the Subdivision Control Act of 1967" on Wednesday, "Title Searching" on Thursday, and "Remuneration and General Topics" on Friday.

## 4 projects reluctantly OK'd

Plymouth-Canton Board of Education voted down, and then voted up, four construction projects designed to close out the 1974 bond issue approved by voters.

The four projects were storage buildings for Smith and Starkweather elementary, storage building and toilet facilities for the athletic field at the Centennial Educational Park, four metered lighted tennis courts and a lighted parking lot at the courts at Plymouth Canton High.

All four were included in the 1974 school construction bond issue, among some 93 other projects including three elementary schools and Phase III of Plymouth Canton High.

The projects had not been started and the balance of the '74 bond issue has grown from interest earned. There are other projects the board would like to spend the balance on but by law

cannot until completing projects approved by voters in 1974.

Among the major new projects the board wants to undertake with the '74 bond issue balance are roof replacement at East Middle school and air conditioning for two schools on year-round schedules.

**BIDS HAD BEEN** received for the above four projects, and the school board Monday night was asked to approve the low bids.

Voting on all four projects in a package, the bids were denied 3-2-1. Four votes were needed for a majority but Joe Gray and Richard Arlen voted no and Stephen Harper abstained. After the problems of rebidding the projects were explained, a roll call vote was taken and the vote was Carol Davis, Gray and Arlen no, Harper, Tom Yack and Flossie Tonda voting yes.

Harper then divided the projects and made individual motions to accept each set of bids. Each motion passed 5-1 with Arlen dissenting. Gray made the motion to reconsider the bid on the lighted tennis courts-parking lot, and that passed 4-2 with Arlen and Harper dissenting.

**THE FOUR PROJECTS** total about \$227,900. Once completed, a balance of almost \$250,000 will be left in the 1974 bond issue account to be used for the East roof and the air conditioning equipment.

The original plans called for metered lights on 14 courts and three storage buildings for the CEP athletic field. The project bids approved Monday night were scaled down to four lighted courts, and one larger athletic storage building.

Gray commented he felt the board's instructions at a workshop were to delete the parking lot by the tennis courts. "Right now tennis players are parking illegally on Canton Center Road to get to the courts. If they play tennis for exercise, they should park in the Canton High lot and walk to the courts—it's not that far. I can't see spending money for a parking lot by the tennis courts when there's space available in the Canton lot. It would also help if the Canton police would start enforcing no parking on Canton Center Road."

The storage buildings at Smith and Starkweather are to be used for lawnmowers, plowing equipment, gasoline, duplicator fluid and other flammable fluids. State fire codes now demand that flammable liquids cannot be stored inside school buildings.

Arlen asked how much the equipment being stored was worth and was told by Gerald Vollrath, supervisor of new construction that the equipment is worth about \$4,000 to \$5,000.

"Why are we spending \$32,000 on a storage building to protect equipment worth only \$4,000. That seems to me like a very poor investment and not very cost effective," argued Arlen.

John Culotta, architect, commented equipment will last longer if stored properly and the replacement cost will be cheaper over time.

Supt. John M. Hoben said the district has been cited for violations a number of times by the state fire marshal. At Pioneer Middle School, he added, tractors are being stored in a private barn a distance from the school and similar steps have been

taken at other schools where violations have been found.

Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent of business, commented a lot of wasted labor hours result when employees have to drive to an off-school site to pick up equipment, and that it wasn't good procedure to follow.

**IN RESPONSE** to a question on the tennis court parking lot, Culotta commented that the 60-car lot also would be used as an overflow lot for football games.

Arlen jumped in again to argue against the storage buildings. "For the amount of money we're spending on storage buildings we could buy a new tractor every year and still be ahead."

"These are the kinds of state regulations which waste taxpayers' money on facilities which aren't cost effective. We've had no great incidence of school fires in recent years, or for the last 50 years. I say we should run our schools the way we see fit because I don't think the fire marshal is going to shut us down."

Hoedel commented the district is trying to satisfy all of the projects listed in the 1974 bond issue so the balance can be spent on other projects.

Yack explained that if the board didn't authorize spending the money on the remaining four projects of the '74 bond issue the balance would remain in the account forever. The options were to return the money to the voters—about three cents per taxpayer—or ask voters to proclaim the four projects are no longer desired and then get permission from the state to spend the money on other projects.

"The people voted for these projects in 1974 and we should do what the people want," proclaimed Mrs. Tonda.

**AFTER THE LONG DEBATE** on approving the bids, the board did so and then approved priorities for spending the balance of the '74 issue on new projects.

After the four projects are finished, the administration expects the balance will be about \$241,000.

The board voted 6-0 to spend the balance as follows: \$200,000 for a new roof for East Middle; \$130,000 to air condition Gallimore and Isbister elementary schools and Pioneer Middle School.

The other parking and bus maintenance garage equipment—were approved but there won't be sufficient funds in the '74 bond account to fund these projects.

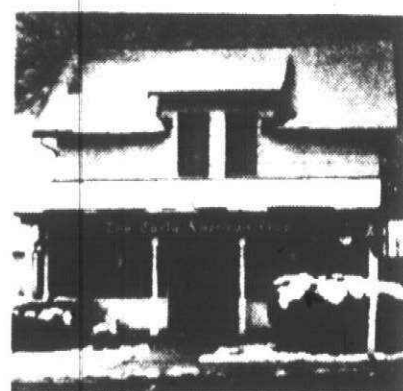

## Unusual mix works

# A rare cheese-wine combo

The path of life takes some rather peculiar turns at times.

The latest example of odd things that happen is the case of the Jallads—Ahmad and Shirley—who recently opened the Cheese and Wine Barn on Forest Avenue in Plymouth.

Ahmad, a Palestinian who came to this country in 1968, is a 1962 graduate of Hillsdale College with a degree in history and political science. His wife, a Canadian, graduated from Hillsdale two years later with a degree in sociology and education.

**THIS IS A RARE** combination and a far cry from a shop that specializes in cheese and wine, but the Jallads are making a success of it.

"Ahmad always liked cooking," said Mrs. Jallad, "and made all the salads for his mother when he was home. With that start he was able to get interested in special foods.

"At school I had living quarters where I could prepare food and did a lot of preparing meals. This way I also got the experience of special foods.

"Before we could get together my husband, who is an account manager for General Mills, and I decided we'd try it. And here we are."

The Jallads put their idea to work in the Northville Square where they held forth for three years. And even though the Square was not too much of a success they built up a clientele.

"We need more room and a better location," Mrs. Jallad said. "So, when this store became available we took it."

Business has been good since they moved to Plymouth, she said.

And so it is that a Palestinian and a Canadian, both college graduates with degrees in history, political science,

and sociology have become the owners of a wine and cheese store—further proof that life can take some odd twists.

"Of course, we were here for the holidays, and that helped. But we have many new faces come in and I am certain we'll be here for quite a while."

"These are not just 'front' groups aimed at getting a millage passed," she said. "They were formed to take a hard look at problems in the school district."


PACTS membership is on a voluntary basis, and all residents of the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are eligible to participate.

# Cantonite is directing loan group

 "Hi, I represent the Western Wayne County Commercial Loan Group. Are you interested in a commercial loan?" Those actually representing the Western Wayne County Commercial Loan Group, a regional division of Detroit Bank & Trust (DB&T), may not be that blunt, but they are aggressively pursuing area businesses in hopes of drumming up some business.

To do a more efficient job, the three-man operation recently moved from its downtown Detroit headquarters to an addition to the bank's Schoolcraft-Inkster Road branch.  
 Ronald Oppat, 32, a Canton resident and assistant vice president heading the group; Stephen Waldrop, 27; and James Milfer, 30, anticipate make more than 500 customer contacts in 1978.

"We're going to make an attempt to

call on those businesses that we've had no contact with before. Face it, we're 'new business' oriented. Our objective is to add new business. That ties in with why we're here," Oppat said.  
 Last year, working from Detroit, the group built up a \$30 million loan portfolio in western Wayne County. This year, after relocating, hopes are high for more business.

"I'd be very disappointed," Oppat said, "if we only do \$30 million (worth of business) this year."

He said he expected that the group would do at least 15 per cent more business this year—\$34.5 million. He estimated that in addition to regular DB&T commercial borrowers, the group would have to attract 15 to 20 new loans to reach that objective.  
 That number may seem small in

comparison to the 900 western Wayne commercial establishments with annual sales of more than \$1 million.

Most, however, are already served by other banks. Detroit Bank and Trust, according to Oppat, serves no more than 180 of those businesses.

It means that the Wayne County operation is in direct competition with every other bank in the area. "Every bank you can think of does the same thing we're doing," Oppat said.

"We feel we're more imaginative and able to look at a company's borrowing needs and provide a loan package to help it meet those needs."

Oppat may feel that DB&T is "more imaginative" but he also adds there really is little which separates his bank's services from those of any other bank.

"Eight of every 10 businesses have very fine relationships with their banks. Most banks are doing a pretty good job," Oppat said.

It is in the case of the remaining 20 per cent that the loan group hopes to make its gains.

"I might be able to see something which could be done better. Instead of short-term loans, maybe it would be better if they went to long-term loans. Or maybe the relationship has been going along smoothly for years, but the bank is taking the customer for granted."

Oppat acknowledged that DB&T's only competitive edge is an intangible one, one that any other bank in the area can claim—attitude.

"Our dollars are as green as any bank's," Oppat said. "And there are few variances in interest rates from one bank to another," he added.

"We make a real effort to assist the people. We become part of their corporate plan. We're included in discussions with management."

## Plymouth Township OKs refunds of drain tax

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees is planning to return some \$12,000 to residents who trustees believe were improperly billed by the Wayne County Drain Commission.

By a vote of 5-2 Tuesday, the board agreed to refund 8 1/2 per cent of \$15,000 billed to individual township residents early last fall. Deputy Clerk Mary Ellen Kenyon and Treasurer Joseph West voted against the refund.

When the bills were first sent out to Plymouth and Plymouth Township residents, officials of the two municipalities were not sure what they were for.

The best guess was that they were to pay for preliminary design expenses for engineering improvements to the Tonquish Creek drain. The township board had petitioned the county to correct flooding along that drain in 1971.

For the first month after the billings, attempts by township officials to get definite answers from Drain Commissioner Charles Youngblood were unsuccessful.

"I'M STILL NOT sure what these bills are all about," said Supervisor Thomas Notebaert late in November. "You know how vague the county can be on some of these issues."

Since then, however, several meetings between county and township have yielded some more concrete

information. In discussion at Tuesday's board meeting, it came out that the county had done no engineering plans but was billing taxpayers for "phone calls and meetings."

Trustee Richard Gornick argued that it was unfair to expect the residents to absorb the cost of the county bureaucracy, maintaining that because the board requested the drain improvements, the money to pay the costs should come from township funds.

West, however, felt that the mechanics of making individual payments to an unknown number of people would be to cumbersome for his office to manage.

"We can't stop everything and issue checks," he told the board members. "There might be as many as 11,000 of them."

Mrs. Kenyon wanted to know where the money for the refunds would come from because the residents were sending their payments directly to the county.

"It's a legitimate expense of the township," answered Gornick. "The money can come from the general fund."

Board sentiment favored Gornick's position, and after more discussion the vote went in favor of making the refunds. No date for sending out the checks was set.

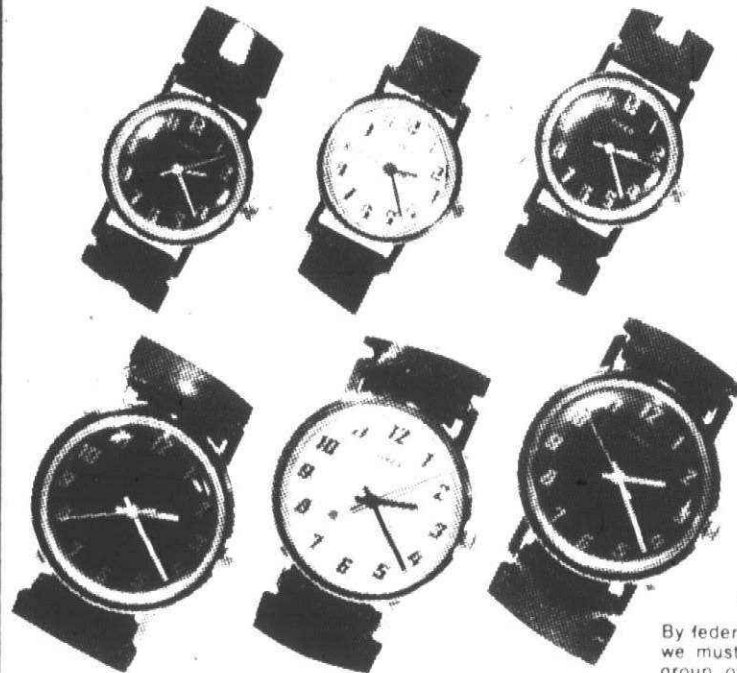

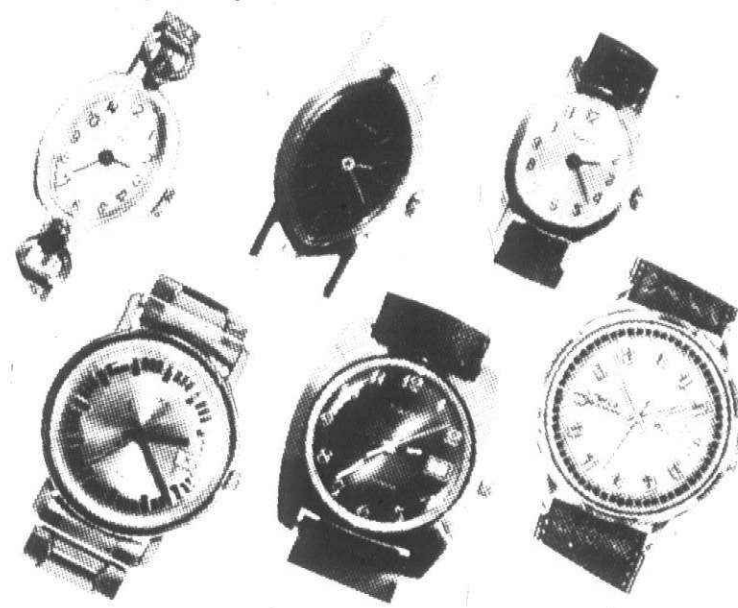

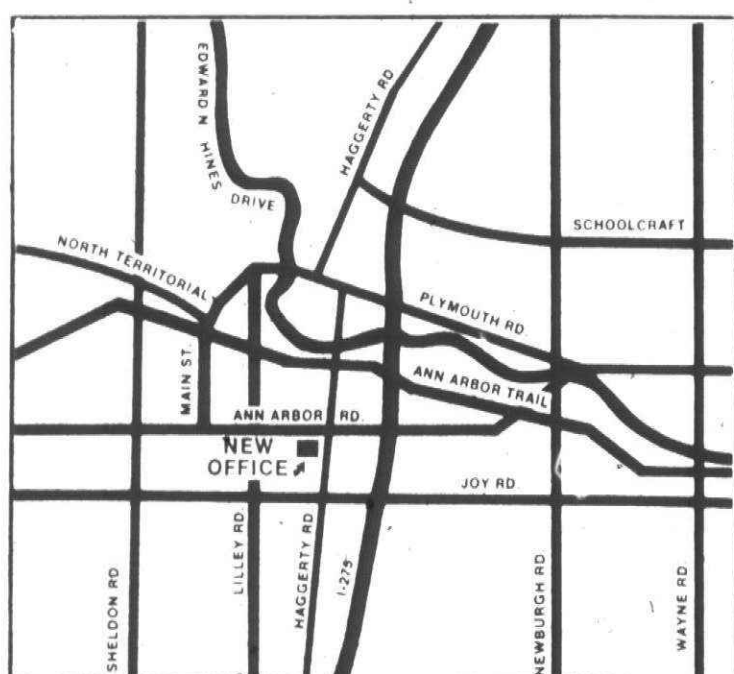

# Local road projects approved by the county

Several road improvements for the Plymouth-Canton area are among those included in a proposed \$27.6 million road construction and resurfacing program recently approved for 1978-79 by the Wayne County Road Commission.

Approved were improvements of Edward Hines Drive, widening of Haggerty Road, and widening of the intersection of Main and Mill.

JOSEPH M. HERRON, acting chairman of the road commission, said a proposed \$6 million bond issue coupled with federal funds and limited local participation will permit completion of an estimated 55 road projects on a countywide basis.

All but 16 of the projects are proposed for the out-county areas, particularly in the rapidly developing western portions of Wayne County.

While a program totaling more than \$27 million is certainly a major effort, said Road Commission Chairman Michael Berry, of Plymouth, "the Wayne County Road Commission, as are all other county road commissions, is vitally concerned that additional revenues are found and forthcoming—the sooner the better if we are to continue doing our job."

The \$6 million bond issue, once approved by the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission, will generate almost \$22 million in federal aid and includes limited cost participation by some local communities. City of Plymouth, for instance, is participating in the cost for widening Main-Mill intersection.

Federal aid generally is on a 70-30 basis, with the road commission's and local shares derived from gas and weight taxes, bonds or local funds.

AMONG THE PROJECTS proposed for Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton and nearby communities are:

- A major improvement of Hines Drive which winds nearly 19 miles through eight communities from Dearborn to Northville. The road commission plans to widen the existing pavement by four feet and pave eight-foot asphalt shoulders along the drive. The project will cost slightly more than \$1 million.

- In Canton, plans include the construction of five lanes of pavement on Haggerty between Ford and Cherry Hill, costing \$1 million. That stretch of road is now gravel. The county also plans to replace the Ridge Road bridge at Fellows Creek at a cost of about \$75,400.

- Other Canton projects include widening the bridge on Lotz at Fellows Creek for \$86,000; replacement of larger culvert and widening of shoulders on Lotz at the Barker drain, \$23,000; paving of Haggerty Road at Ford Road, enclosure drainage, \$676,000, and widening of Ridge Road at Lower Rouge bridge, cost of \$92,500.

- In Plymouth, Lilley Road at two primary intersections—Ann Arbor Trail and Main—will be reconstructed and widened with both projects costing about \$807,600.

Sheldon Road from Joy to Ann Arbor Trail, a project shared with Plymouth Township, will have five lanes reconstructed at an estimated cost of \$1.9 million.

Also in Plymouth Township, Beck Road (now gravel) would be paved and widened, including a five-lane turning intersection and reconstruction of a railroad crossing between Five Mile and North Territorial Road at estimated cost of \$1.1 million.

Nearby proposed projects in Livonia include reconstruction and widening of Six Mile, 1-96 to Levan, \$1.6 million; paving and widening of Haggerty from Five to Six Mile, \$1.3 million; paving and widening Haggerty, from Seven Mile to one-half mile north, project shared by Northville Township, \$662,800.

## Mideast crisis is class topic

The Arab-Israeli conflict, why it is so intractable, and why so difficult to resolve, forms the focus of "Problems in International Politics," a University of Michigan graduate credit course beginning Jan. 19 in Detroit.

The two-credit course is the first political science course to be scheduled in over five years at the U-M Detroit Center, located at Woodward and Warren.

## Wire jocks for science, says auto crash expert

Athletes may provide a handy means of testing some effects of automobile crashes, says a University of Michigan scientist.

According to John W. Melvin of the U-M Highway Safety Research Institute (HSRI), it may soon be feasible to rig football players, boxers, and other athletes with instruments to measure the head impacts and injuries that they sustain in their sports.

"Since head injuries are the leading cause of death in auto accidents, we want to know as much as we can about how they occur—what type of impact causes what type of injury—and how to prevent them," Melvin says.

"Ideally, we'd like to test injuries in

a laboratory situation. But right now, there is no totally adequate surrogate for the real thing—the human in serious and severe crashes."

He adds that, although HSRI has developed a dummy that is more life-like than the present standard model, dummies are still not good enough substitutes for humans in many injury studies. And as for using human volunteers, the limitations are obvious.

### Jaycees can be progressive force

Next week (Jan. 15-21) marks the first annual official commemoration of Jaycee Week in the State of Michigan. As proclamations go, it takes its place along with Michigan Potato Week.

But beyond the administrative hoopla, locally we have a lot to be proud of in the Canton Jaycees chapter. Outside of the local Lions chapter, the Canton Jaycees are probably the longest established service group operating in the township.

But more significantly, its leadership has demonstrated a progressive direction by supporting and initiating programs such as the library fund and the nature center that benefit all the people of the community. This club is not just a meeting place for an elite coterie.

Although we find fault with the Jaycees international policy of subjecting women to an auxiliary role and wince at its choice of Johannesburg, South Africa as the site for its annual international convention, the local Jaycees chapter has done much to recognize all the community's residents. That means the men on the assembly line, women, and blacks, as well as successful young businessmen on the move.

Everyone will be able to use the library and the nature center. And a young woman was the first recipient of the Jaycees scholarship program which started last year.

Most recently the Jaycees have come to the forefront of the township's drive to drum up donations for a local library. They responded to a request from former Jaycee Canton Supervisor Harold Stein.

And, next Wednesday at 7:30 p.m., Jaycees will show off their hairy legs on the basketball court in a benefit game against radio station WDRQ to raise money for the library fund.

The benefit game will be at Plymouth's Central Middle School. Tickets are \$1 each and may be obtained at the offices of the four Plymouth-Canton middle schools, Rick's TV or Canton Sports.

Past achievements of the Jaycees are the club's annual fair which brings a sense of community to a township that many people feel lacks an identity.

The Jaycees have won deserving praise for the nature trail they built at Gallimore Elementary which is maintained with the cooperation of the school district.

Another nature trail at Hulsing Elementary will be designed this spring; planned after the Jaycees noted the excellent response and use of the first nature spot.

Coming up on Feb. 17, the Jaycettes (a distasteful name) will sponsor an art fair at the Canton Recreation Center. Half of the proceeds of the event are earmarked for the scholarship fund. Jaycee Fred Berger says the club plans to offer two college scholarships, instead of one, this year.

So, if you get an invitation from the Jaycees this week inviting you to a cocktail party tomorrow at 6:30 p.m. in the recreation center, don't chuck it into the can with a laugh. Give it a bit of reflection and then decide. If you're interested and involved, (and a man), you could make the club a positive force in the community.

### Milestone for Edison

A modest announcement from Detroit Edison Co. informs us that on Jan. 17 the electric utility will observe its 75th anniversary of corporate life by serving light refreshments to customers in its 35 local offices in southeast Michigan.

Commercial electric service in these parts began in 1878 by a tiny firm that used the steam boilers in the Detroit Free Press basement. For decades there was stiff competition between coal oil, gas, arc lights and Edison-style 110-volt illumination. Competition was nasty; there were political games with the public lighting contract, there were lawsuits over rights-of-way and towers.

Gradually, Alex Dow and the Edison Illuminating Co.—founded in 1886 by a dry goods merchant, a brewer, a lumberman and the Evening News publisher—absorbed the others, and in 1903 Detroit Edison Co. was born.

Detroit Edison became a multi-city, multi-county, regional utility long before politicians ever dreamed of delivering public services on a regional basis. One wonders what kind of industrial development southeast Michigan might have had without the visionary planning of the chaps who provide electric power.

That Detroit Edison brought integrity to its industry was due in large part to Alex Dow, a man who found "creative satisfaction" in business. His philosophy: "The company was not a soulless business corporation, dedicated to efficient operation of which might also become a thing of beauty."

Detroit Edison's history has not been without controversy, but one reading the history gets the impression that the firm was run by a high-class group.

So the company is 75, eh? Well, congratulations!

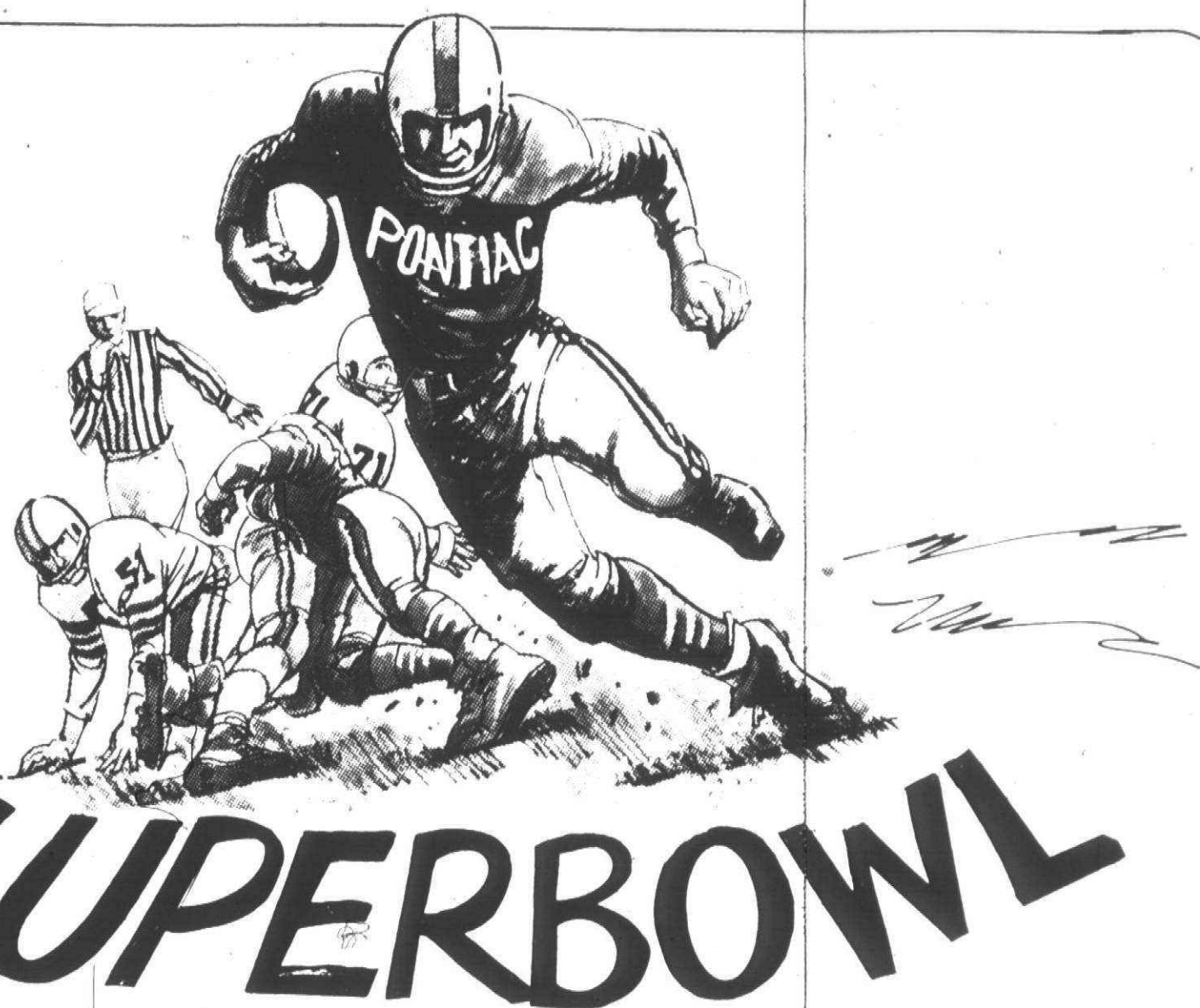

### Play Super Bowl where the fans are

Many millions of persons will gather around their television sets next Sunday to see Super Bowl XII, the world series of professional football.

Only a small percentage of fans who have supported the National Football League this year by buying season tickets to their favorite team's games will be in attendance in New Orleans; yet they will probably boost the economy of that city by \$80-\$100 million.

Last year, when it was held in Pasadena, it boosted Los Angeles' economy by more than \$125 million in the five days of Super Bowl activities.

Most of this money is brought in from other areas because the home teams usually gets only 20,000 of the 75,000 tickets sold.

Each participating team gets 15,000 tickets, and each team in the league gets about 1,000 tickets.

There were extra tickets last year because the Rose Bowl holds more than 100,000 persons.

IN THE LAST four years during which Super Bowl was held in Miami twice, New Orleans once

and Pasadena once, the weather was nice only in Pasadena last year. In the other three years, the weather was either wet or freezing.

In the 11 years that Super Bowl has been played, it has never been played in a northern city, yet the vast majority of season ticketholders (that is, the regular supporters of pro football) lives in northern cities.

It has been played mostly in Miami, but has also visited Houston as well as New Orleans and southern California.

### Why the builder must hike his prices

They don't gripe as much as farmers—no one moans as much as farmers—but the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan can paint a pretty bleak picture of why the price you pay for a new house must go up, up, up in perpetuity.

No matter what factor in the thousands of things that make up the single-family detached dwelling units is under discussion, the price is going up, and the cost will be passed onto the buyer.

Yet there is an air of almost boyish optimism among the builders. Looking at metropolitan Detroit's building history since World War II, they find folks continue to shop for new housing even when the average price drifts from \$7,000 to \$10,000 to \$20,000 to \$50,000.

The topic came up when the builders association leaders popped for lunch the other day.

"LABOR CONTRACTS come up in June," said Donald Van Every, of Val Allen Builders of Southfield, current association president. "That will add \$3,500 to a \$50,000 house."

There was some disagreement among the group whether a seven per cent pay hike would mean a seven per cent hike in the price of a house for the simple reason that direct labor costs are only 20 per cent of the total cost.

But other costs will rise the same amount, Van Every said, citing insulation, which rose three times in a recent month.

Last year the weather was a factor. Despite the severe cold, people put in purchase orders in January through March, but the builders couldn't get a shovel into the frozen ground until April.

"The communities' bureaucracy retards construction 45 days," said Frank Winton, vice-president of the association. He cited requirements that new streets "cure" for a month before models can be shown. The consensus was that, whereas you used to be able to put up a house in 90 days, today it takes closer to six or seven months because of all the local building codes.

Norman Long, who has his own Southfield-based firm, put a zinger into "slow-moving building inspectors" afraid for their jobs.

"One of the stinkiest as far as politics is concerned is Canton Township," he said. Others nodded agreement, but wouldn't say it aloud. I thought the people in Canton will be happy to hear that. For decades I have heard complaints that suburban townships were builder-oriented, and here's Canton with a consumer orientation. Maybe there is such a thing as progress.

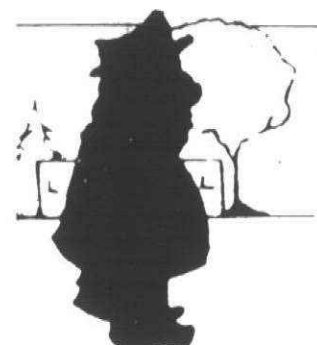

As guests began arriving, one of them spotted The Stroller and said, "I want to talk with you after a bit." Little did he know what the guest had on his mind. But after the wedding when we gathered for the reception, he spotted The Stroller, and nothing would do but that he sit at our table to talk about sports, present day and past.

That was nothing unusual for most folks who know The Stroller spent almost a half-century following the athletes. So we talked about Ty Cobb, Harry Heilmann, Danny McLain, Al Kaline and many other stars.

Then out of a clear sky he asked, "If you had your life to live over again, what kind of career would you plan for yourself?"

THAT WAS A MOST unusual question when he knew that The Stroller had spent more than 50 years pecking and punching a typewriter, to bring some enjoyment to the readers of the daily and semi-weekly prints. Surely if he didn't like it, he would have left the river of printer's ink long ago.

My friend had a sparkle in his eye as he awaited an answer. He was even more surprised when The Stroller replied: "If you had asked that question years ago, I would have told you that I would have liked to become an

attorney. But once I got a bit of printer's ink in my veins, I wouldn't have chosen any other career."

The desire to become an attorney came about under the oddest of circumstances. The Stroller's dad, who died before his son advanced very far in school, always dreamed that some day The Stroller would attend Penn State and become a restaurateur and serve only the finest of seafoods. But the untimely death ruled that out, and The Stroller went to work in the factories.

LATE ONE afternoon when leaving the Mack Motor Co. in Allentown, Pa. at the close of the shift, The Stroller climbed aboard an open trolley car. It was much like the cable cars in San Francisco or the ones that Detroit now runs on Washington Blvd.

As he was about ready to take a seat, the conductor, mistaking him for someone else, pushed The Stroller, who fell backward onto the brick paved street. Blood squirted from his elbow and his clothes were a bit torn, but he got aboard again and finished the ride home.

In the evening his arm stiffened, and his Uncle George urged him to see a lawyer and sue the company. The Stroller was reluctant until Uncle George said, "If you don't sue, you ought to have a stiff arm."

That did it. Downtown we went, and there was a light in lawyer Bill Schneller's office.

When we entered and told him our mission, he sort of smacked his lips and said, "There is nothing I would enjoy more than suing that company."

Isn't it time we all got together and helped the committee trying to bring Super Bowl to Pontiac in 1981?

Isn't it time we bring this great activity back to the fans at least once every 10 years?

factory jobs over bricklaying outdoors for eight months a year.

Manny Dembs, of Dembs Building Co., said homebuyers are oversold on brick because of its insulating qualities. A buyer willing to forego brick could knock down the price of his house and reduce construction time from six or seven months to four.

Frank Winton got onto lot sizes and costs, saying the 60-foot lot has practically disappeared in places like Troy. Suburbs are zoning for big lots, which raises land costs, which means you have to put up a bigger, costlier house to preserve the land-building cost ratio of one to four.

One could have walked away depressed at the thought that last year's \$46,000 house is this year's \$50,000 and next year's \$53,500 job. But the builders were treating for a fine roast beef lunch at Stouffer's, so things couldn't be all that bad.

# School board approves fee to use 6th grade instruments

Sixth graders wanting to sign up for band next fall must pay a \$20 non-returnable users fee to make use of a school instrument.

That's the result of action taken Monday night by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education which voted 5-1 to

establish the fee. Dissenting was Joe Gray.

The board action will result in the income generated by the \$20 fee being placed in a special account to be used to repair and maintain existing instruments, and to purchase replace-

ment instruments if there is enough money in the fund.

**TRUSTEE STEPHEN HARPER** had tried to amend the resolution which was approved by asking that the \$42,870 needed to replace worn instruments be made part of the forthcoming bond issue.

Trustee Flossie Tonda opposed that suggestion because she felt it tied the continuation of the sixth grade band program to the bond issue. The amendment died for lack of support.

Mrs. Tonda argued instead that worn instruments could be repaired or replaced as money became available in the users fee account. "I don't want instrument replacement money to come from the operation fund or be tied to the bond issue."

Trustee Joe Gray argued the school district doesn't belong in the business of supplying free instruments. "A few years ago when the courts ruled we had to provide free supplies and texts, we jumped the gun and decided we had to provide free band instruments also. So we purchased instruments for sixth grade, and then found out we weren't required to. The sixth grade program has continued since then."

"I'd like to see us get out of the business entirely of providing free band instruments. The cost of renting instruments isn't that great for parents. There are very few school districts providing free instruments."

**SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN** said his main concern was the \$42,000 initial outlay required if worn-out instruments are replaced. "I don't know where we'd come up with that kind of money."

Trustee Stephen Harper argued that the purpose of charging fees was to generate income to subsidize the program, so the school district wouldn't have to support it from operating funds.

Mrs. Tonda asked: "How much does it cost the district to provide uniforms and equipment for all our athletic teams? And they don't even pay a user fee. I don't think we are doing too much by providing sixth grade band instruments by charging a \$20 fee."

"I'm not going to argue one program against another," answered Gray. "I just think we have no business providing free instruments. We got into it by mistake and should get out."

## 'Little people' are real, make literary comeback

"To my amazement, I have heard that there are people who have never seen a gnome. I can't help pitying these people. I am certain there must be something wrong with their eyesight." —Axel Munthe

One of my earliest childhood memories is being wrapped in a blanket and carried to a "special place" on Midsummer's Eve to watch the fairies dance at midnight.

One of my most treasured possessions was a book called "The Water Babies," and was filled with the most delightful illustrations of the "wee folk" you can imagine.

Early in my life, my mother and my Scotch-English grandmother instilled in me a love of fantasy. For this I'll be eternally grateful.

My lifelong romance with Shakespeare is due, in part, to the way he revered fairies, elves and the like.

Anthropologists declare that our myths and legends about such little people are most likely based on the fact that a race of extremely small people, as well as one of virtual giants, did exist in early times.

This certainly could account for all the folk tales handed down to us in which mortals married fairy folk.

I used to think about this when I looked at my grandmother—a petite woman who never stood more than four feet 11 inches high, and wore a size three shoe—standing beside my grandfather, who measured six feet three inches in his stocking feet.

As I grew up, I never lost my love for these stories, and for a long time I toured schools and libraries as a teller of such tales.

In recent years, I have discovered whole schools full of children who have heard only the familiar fairy tales and have, instead, been raised on science fiction. I am not opposed to science fiction, but there is room for both.

Speak the word "fairy" in an adult gathering, and you will be met with snickers, snide remarks, and cheap jokes about homosexuals.

Imagine, then, my great joy in the discovery of the three following recent publications.

**FOR CHRISTMAS** this year, I was given a wall calendar published by



Current, Inc., Colorado Springs, Colo. This calendar is printed in beautiful muted colors, with drawings reminiscent of the delightful illustrations in books of fairy tales printed 50 years ago.

Each month's calendar is printed on a separate page and is accompanied by an illustrated myth or folktale about the origin of different flowers.

I shall jealously guard this calendar as a prized possession long after this year is past and forgotten.

Recently, I also received two books as gifts which seem to indicate a renewed interest (at least among publishers), in fairy lore.

The first, "An Encyclopedia of Fairies" by Katherine Briggs, published by Pantheon Books of New York, is as thick as a dictionary.

It tells not only about fairies, elves, brownies and leprechauns, but it also deals with mermaids, dragons, changelings, hobgoblins, bogies and other such interesting creatures.

It is, as the title implies, an encyclopedia in which you can look up (and find) every sort of fantasy creature that has ever existed in literature and lore. I count it as a really wonderful addition to my reference library.

**OTHER BOOKS** by the same author include: "The Personnel of Fairyland," "The Anatomy of Puck," "Folktales of England" and "The Fairies in Tradition and Literature."

The second book I mentioned was given me by my oldest son. It is entitled simply "Gnomes" and is published by Harry N. Abrams, Inc., N.Y.

Written by Dr. Wil Huygen and illustrated by Rien Poortvliet, it is a tongue-in-cheek study of the wee folk which reports the habits of their daily lives.

Roll Call Report

Social Security payroll tax is increased

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes held Dec. 15, the last day of the first session of the 95th congress.

HOUSE

**SOCIAL SECURITY:** Adopted, 189 for and 163 against, the conference report on HR 9346, the bill to shore up the financially-sagging Social Security trust fund by means of greatly increased payroll taxes on employees and employers. The measure, approved the same day by the Senate (see vote below), was sent to President Carter for his signature.

Beginning in 1979, the legislation hikes both the payroll tax rate and the wage base subject to Social Security taxation, with middle- and high-

income wage earners hardest hit. By 1986, the tax rate on both employees and employers will have risen to 7.15 per cent of the first \$40,200 in wages. Now the rate is 5.85 per cent on the first \$16,500.

Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.), a supporter, said: "If we vote against this bill and it fails, we cannot go home and say to either the people who are working or to the people who are on retirement... that we acted responsibly."

Rep. Barber Conable (R-N.Y.), an opponent, said the bill "will increase payroll levies over the next 10 years by an estimated \$227 billion, thus giving it the notoriety, if not the distinction, of constituting the biggest peacetime tax increase in our history."

Members voting "yea" favored passage of the Social Security bill.

Reps. David Bonior (D-Mt. Clemens), William Ford (D-Taylor), William Brodhead (D-Detroit) and James Blanchard (D-Pleasant Ridge) voted "yea."

Rep. William Broomfield (R-Birm.) voted "nay."

Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) did not vote.

**SOCIAL SECURITY:** Agreed, 178 for and 175 against, to the rule that permitted final consideration of the Social Security bill. Had this move failed, the measure to bolster the Social Security trust fund by increasing payroll taxes probably would have been shelved until the 1978 session of Congress.

Rep. John Seiberling (D-Ohio), a supporter, reflected the lukewarm popularity of the measure by saying he would vote for the rule reluctantly. "It is a poor way to make tax policy... for the Congress to increase this regressive tax before having any clear idea what kinds of cuts it is going to make in the personal income tax to offset the economic drag of the Social Security tax increase."

Rep. John Anderson (R-Ill.), an opponent, called it a "fraud" that taxpayers "are being asked to take the bitter now and wait for the vague promises of tax relief to be realized later."

Members voting "yea" favored bringing the Social Security bill up for final consideration this year.

Bonior, Ford, Brodhead and Blanchard voted "yea."

Broomfield voted "nay." Pursell did not vote.

SENATE

**SOCIAL SECURITY:** Adopted, 56 for and 21 against, the conference report on HR 9346, the Social Security Financing Amendments of 1977 (see above votes). Among its many provisions, the legislation eased the "earnings test" that limits the outside income a pensioner can receive without having his Social Security check penalized. Currently the cutoff is \$3,000; under this legislation it will rise gradually to \$6,000 in 1982 and be eliminated after that year.

Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.), a

supporter, said: "If the Senate rejects this reform proposal in order to retain the status quo, it will indicate to all Americans that, while we recognize the urgency of the Social Security problem, we are not willing to take the necessary steps" to solve it.

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.), an opponent, said "Social Security has failed, and we would be better off in this country if we pledged to every person who has ever paid a dime into the Social Security fund that that money would be returned, and then forget about the whole thing."

Senators voting "nay" opposed passage of the Social Security bill.

Sen. Donald Riegle (D) voted "nay" and Sen. Robert Griffin (R) did not vote.

# Garden clubbers get tips on cutlery care

All those chopping boards and blocks which were scoured with salt, then treated with lemon juice and oil Monday afternoon belonged to members of the Plymouth branch Woman's National Farm and Garden Association.

Larry Janes of the Gourmet Gallerie was the inspiration for the bacteria-chasing foray. Janes was a last-minute replacement as guest speaker at the club's annual luncheon in the Round Table Club. The women expected to hear about table arrangements made with fruits and vegetables. When the scheduled speaker had to be excused because of a problem furnace in his home, Janes took over.

Janes was alone in his shop and rather than just lock the door, club members Diane Mallow and Marge Grybas held the fort until a regular salesperson arrived. When they

returned to the meeting, they admitted they had been their own best customers.

**JANES GAVE** an impromptu talk on knives—their uses and their care.

He compared stainless steel and carbon blades. Carbon blades keep an edge longer and are more easily sharpened, but without proper care they do discolor, rust and pit. They should be washed, thoroughly dried and oiled to maintain their original finish.

Stainless steel keeps its shining finish but doesn't stay sharp as long as the carbon, said Janes. It also takes longer to sharpen.

When buying a knife, make sure the metal part extends the full length of the handle, he advised.

"A good paring knife should do just about everything," he said. He displayed French knives, bread knives and cleavers, and described the proper use of each. He recommended slicing and chopping vegetables from the

inside (meat side) toward the skin. The old wood chopping block is illegal in most restaurants, said Janes. Those who have blocks or boards in their kitchens should clean them regularly.

**HE SUGGESTED** a good rubbing with household bleach followed by a scraping. The board should be rubbed with baking soda or lemon juice to sweeten the odor. When dry, it should be rubbed with a cooking oil to seal the surface.

A brisk rubbing with kosher salt will clean the surface and can be substituted for the bleach treatment.

Janes said the newest thing in chopping blocks is the white plexiglass or marble-like polyethylene square. These materials have a resilience which does not dull knives or cleavers. "Do not use the clear Lucite," he said. "It has no give and will take the edge off your knife."

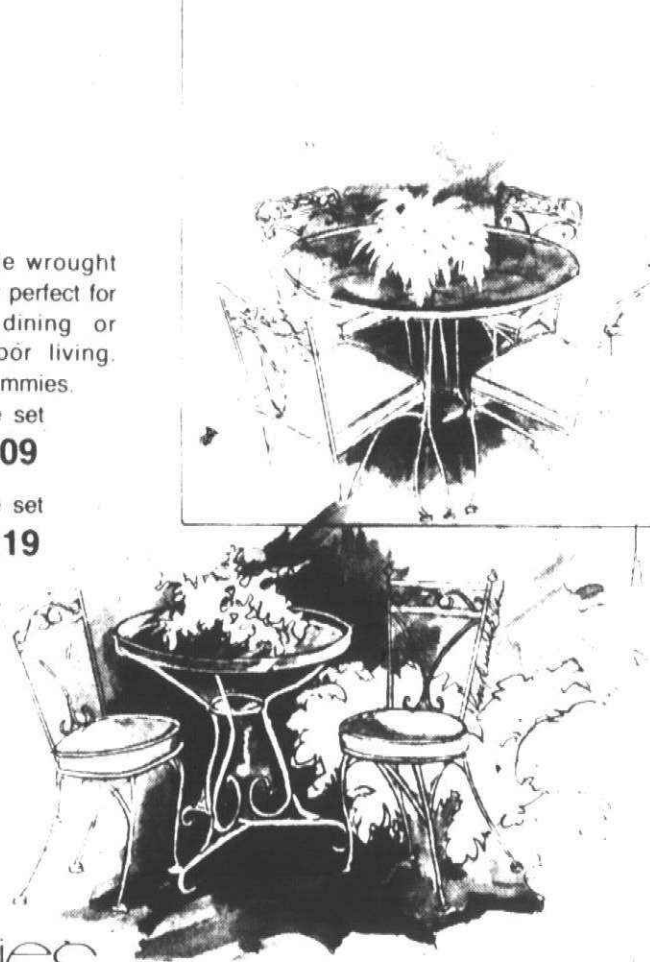

Making the federal government more responsive to peoples' needs has been a campaign theme of every president and presidential candidate in my lifetime, and that goes back to Herbert Hoover.

Every four years the theme is picked up and re-orchestrated. The New Deal, Fair Deal, New Frontier, Great Society were variations on the theme as was "a chicken in every pot—a car in every garage." As you can see, the Democrats seems to be more idealistic in their phraseology but no more successful in achieving the goal of making government more responsive to peoples' needs.

I have lived through two Hoover Commission reports, both intended to streamline the government, eliminate waste and improve efficiency. At least a dozen major studies have been made during the past 40 years which were intended to reduce paper work, simplify government forms or improve the delivery of government services.

GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION plans have been submitted to the Congress by every President since Herbert Hoover. Some were of major magnitude.

But reorganization, which is as predictable as night following day in the federal government, has been sing-

ularly unsuccessful at making the federal bureaucracy more responsive. So I am willing to predict that President Carter's reorganization effort will meet the same end. Even if his reorganization plan finally takes shape, I predict it won't be fully implemented because there is no way to fill and eight pound sack with 12 pounds of potatoes. (I learned that early in life while working in my father's fruit market.) And in the federal system it's always a question of fitting 12 pounds of government programming into eight pounds of delivery competence.

If local units of government had a better record of responsiveness, I would support a return to local programming. But alas their record is as bad as the federal bureaucracy. I can understand the complexity of communicating with an organization of 60,000 employees. But why should it be just as difficult to deal with one that has only six, eight or 60?

THE ANSWER to that lies in the organizational dynamics of bureaucracies are not all governmental. There are many in the private sector as well.

Have you ever tried to square away the difference between the monthly bill from your favorite department store and your own records? Then you know what I mean.

The fundamental problem with bureaucracies is that they thrive on complexity. Every new situation or deviation from established procedure becomes one of major magnitude and thus requires "input" from a host of people. Input means consultation, advice, counsel, data collection, analysis, evaluation, re-evaluation, meetings, conferences, etc. before anything gets done. A bureaucracy is a virtual paradise for a fly-specker or bean-counter. They self-actualize in that kind of an environment.

The primary objective in a bureaucracy is never to resolve any issue, make any decision or complete any

project until there is absolute certainty about the "facts." But since life is filled with few absolutes other than death and taxation, nothing is likely to change or improve in a bureaucracy, certainly not its is always more work to do than workers to do it.

The ideal bureaucracy starts out with a backlog and works hard to build it up from there on because there is employment security in a backlog. "Never Catch Up" would be a reasonable slogan for a bureaucracy. Catching up could destroy the illusion of over-work.

In fact the interesting thing about building a backlog is that over time the people who face it daily become fatigued at its mere sight and are then

in no condition to do anything about it except complain about all the work they have yet to do. It's as though they are saying, "Since we can't do it all, we won't do any."

So you see the true bureaucrat becomes a victim of his own system of management. His last utterance before retirement is, "If only they had given me enough manpower, money and machinery, I could have done the job."

PLEASE FORGIVE ME if I seem pessimistic about the likelihood of

My bias is a reflection of my own experience as a federal executive and later as a consultant to several governmental organizations. I'm not suggesting the situation is hopeless.

What I am suggesting however is that another reorganization plan, management study or efficiency commission will accomplish very little. What we really need is not a new organization chart, cost reduction program or time and motion study. What we really need is a change in organizational philosophy.

The bureaucratic system of management with its well defined hierarchies, divisions of labor, specialization and centralized planning can no longer work and in fact hasn't worked for many years now. We keep treating its symptoms—waste, red-tape and delays—then wonder why there is no improvement.

## Beware of optimism that VD battle's being won

A recent article datelined Atlanta and distributed nationally by United Press International cited statistics and opinions of federal health experts that would lead the reader to believe a turning point has been reached in the struggle to overcome the problem of venereal disease.

I must take issue with these claims, for several reasons.

First, the federal war against venereal disease is actually a war against only two of the more than 15 serious infections which are sexually transmissible. These two infections are syphilis and gonorrhea.

But what of the others, such as genital herpes, nongonococcal urethritis, group B streptococcal disease and trichomoniasis?

In fact, no hard data exists to support a contention that the incidence of these diseases is subsiding. On the contrary, indications are that these infections still prevail at epidemic levels.

SECOND, THE STATISTICS cited of syphilis and gonorrhea represent only the reported incidence of these diseases.

The statistics only include cases that are reported to public health departments. A decrease in reported incidence could result from increased resistance on the part of private medical care providers to notify public health authorities of the cases they see. Reported cases may indicate nothing about the number of infected persons who escape detection.

Third, and most importantly, data is influenced by the extent of the case-finding and screening efforts. If gonorrhea screening is reduced due to cutbacks in funding, fewer diagnoses will be made and the number of reported cases will decrease.

The national gonorrhea screening

program during the period cited in the UPI news story was cut back by more than 550,000 tests in non-VD clinics. Historically, these sites found 2.7 per cent of their screening tests to be positive for gonorrhea. Had this program been maintained, it is possible an additional 15,000 cases would be detected.

FINALLY, the gonorrhea statistics cited refer mainly to early and generally uncomplicated stages of the infection.

The greatest cause for concern is the serious, complicated and sometimes fatal pathology which results from gonorrhea infection.

Disregarding the complications factor, the claim that the war against gonorrhea is being won fosters a false sense of security. The venereal disease epidemic is a problem too far-reaching and dangerous to be toyed with in a numbers game.

### New tax act helps elderly

Home owners 65 and older who sold their principal residence in 1977 stand to gain added relief at income tax time, according to the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (WWOCBR).

Until this year, home sellers in this age group paid a capital gains tax on any adjusted sales price over \$20,000. The tax bill enacted by congress last year raised this tax-free amount to \$35,000.

The adjusted sales price is arrived at by deducting any costs involved in fixing the home up for sale and the actual selling expenses, such as the agent's commission.

The move is especially important, says WWOCBR, because inflation over the past few years has created substantial appreciation of values for even modest dwellings. Older owners, who had their homes for several years, found that the difference between their initial cost and the inflated selling price often meant a large share of the profit going for taxes, unless the money was reinvested in another home.

To avoid misuse of the exemption, certain requirements must be met by sellers. First, the taxpayer must have attained the age of 65 before the date of the sale. The property also must have been owned and used by the taxpayer at least five of the last eight years prior to the sale.

A joint return must be filed if the property is owned jointly by husband and wife for the full amount to qualify. However, in the case of a joint return only one spouse must meet the age 65 requirement.

If the requirements are met and the adjusted sales price is over \$35,000, the taxpayer obtains a proportionate tax advantage. For example, if the adjusted sales price was \$40,000, the taxpayer is entitled to a 35,000/40,000, or 87½ per cent reduction in capital gains realized from the residence sale.

WWOCBR cautions that the rule is available only once in a lifetime. If one of the partners was not 65 but filed on the joint tax return, he or she cannot claim another exemption at a future date.

There are a number reasons why George Lawton will be missed on the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

One of the most obvious is experience. With 7½ years experience on the board, Lawton had become the senior trustee. And that experience is a factor behind most of the other reasons.

As an example, Lawton had a good grasp of parliamentary procedure and knew how to use it—to his advantage, at times, and at other times to the advantage of the board. This kind of knowledge comes only with experience.

Another reason, also cited by board president Tom Yack, is Lawton's almost uncanny ability to effect a compromise. Many times I've watched trustees become embroiled in a hot debate over a specific issue, George, unless he was personally concerned about the issue at hand, would quietly sit back in his chair and absorb the arguments. When all seemed hopelessly lost, George would lean toward the microphone and offer a substitute motion or amendment which would be satisfactory to the majority.

This ability to generate a compromise also came from experience.

ANY ATTEMPT to assess Lawton as a trustee must be done carefully, though, because you cannot easily affix a label on him.

It would especially be hard to label George if you only attended school board meetings occasionally. If you were at a budget meeting, for instance, you'd leave with the conclusion Lawton was a conservative. If you were at another board meeting,

and heard Lawton debate curriculum, you'd leave convinced he was a liberal.

And that's basically what Lawton was—conservative on financial matters and liberal on curriculum. Add to that another label—moderate on labor matters.

This description doesn't mean that Lawton balked at spending money on programs which educationally benefited students. A couple of decades ago America had a president who was fiscally conservative but "liberal" on "people programs"—which meant he'd approve a program but not the money to implement it. George wasn't that way at all. If a program was sound, Lawton would insist it be properly funded and would fight to find the money.

WHEN YOU GET AWAY from the temptation of trying to label Lawton, there is one trait which stands out.

George Lawton is a man who is very sensitive toward people and a great believer in human rights. To George, people have value because they are human, not because they possess material wealth or are endowed with social power.

Lawton philosophically believes humanity is the greatest resource our nation has. He believes that every person has a worth which cannot be measured by dollars, or any other constant standard of measure. And the most important challenge in life for Lawton is to make sure each individual reaches his maximum self-worth. That's why education is so important to Lawton—because it's the best method we have to help young people discover their self worth as individuals.

Yes, Lawton will be missed on the school board. But he'll still be in town, so we needn't say goodbye. Good luck, is enough.

My friend had a sparkle in his eye as he awaited an answer. He was even more surprised when The Stroller replied: "If you had asked that question years ago, I would have told you that I would have liked to become an

attorney. But once I got a bit of printer's ink in my veins, I wouldn't have chosen any other career."

The desire to become an attorney came about under the oddest of circumstances. # Mischa plays Sergei

"This one is brighter and has a better bass. If I were playing Tchaikovsky, I would use this one," said pianist Mischa Kottler as he examined Steinways in the back room of the Hammell Music store in Livonia.

"But this one has the quality," said Kottler as he ran out the eight opening chords of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2 on a second instrument, and then shifted to the theme in the first movement that used to be a radio program signature.

Kottler should know how the composer (1873-1943) would want it. As a youth, Kottler received some career inspiration and tips on playing the second concerto from Sergei Rachmaninoff himself.

How well Kottler learned the lessons will become apparent to Oakway Symphony Orchestra fans at 8 p.m. Saturday in the auditorium of Harrison High School, Twelve Mile east of Middle Belt in Farmington Hills. With Francesco DiBlasi conducting, they will perform the Russian's most famous work as the feature of the fourth concert of the season.

"I MET Rachmaninoff when I was about 14," said Kottler, who had come to the United States from his native Kiev, Russia. "I was accompanist for Leopold Auer (the violinist who was later the mentor of Jascha Heifetz). Auer said I shouldn't be an accompanist, and he made an appointment for me to meet Rachmaninoff."

"I said, 'Oh, my God!'"

"Rachmaninoff said he wouldn't teach me, but he advised me to go back to Europe and study."

Kottler turned to the piano and ran through an ascending portion of the first movement. "You know this part?" He said, "Not so loud." I said, "But it's marked fortissimo."

He said, "I know, but you're not going to be heard because the orchestra is too loud and too important at this point. Save your energy for when you really need it."

"From that," said Kottler, "I learned a great deal."

HE PICKED UP the score. "Rachmaninoff had been depressed at the failure of his second symphony. He went to a psychiatrist, and the psychiatrist cured him. He would repeat, 'You will write a great concerto.'"

"See here. Rachmaninoff dedicated it to the doctor—Nikolai Dahl. Dahl—that's not a Russian name. Well, he (Rachmaninoff) was at Leipzig for a time."

"The one who made it (the second

concerto) popular was Vladimir Horowitz. He played it continuously. Do you know Horowitz would play only five concertos in his American concerts—Rachmaninoff, Tchaikovsky, two of Brahms and the (Beethoven) 'Emperor'?"

One famous story about Rachmaninoff is in all the books. Audiences always demanded to hear an encore his famous prelude in C sharp minor, with the gloomy descending chords. In time the composer came to despise it.

Kottler told what isn't in the books. When called back to play it, Rachmaninoff would mutter at the cheering audience the Russian equivalent of "you sons-of-bitches."

KOTTLER LEFT as Auer's accompanist and went to Paris to study with Alfred Cortat. (He didn't know it at the time, but Rachmaninoff despised

Cortat, although the Frenchman was a great pianist nonetheless.)

Later Kottler would study in Vienna with Emil von Sauer, a major pupil of the legendary Franz Liszt.

Before one can become too impressed by those credentials, Kottler hastens to add, "Say what you want, the pianists of today are far superior. Liszt played his own works. He never had to play Bartok and Prokofiev."

Kottler had his own concert career and finally settled in Detroit, where he was the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's pianist and frequent soloist for more than 20 years.

He was director of music at WWJ for 33 years, although today that radio station's offering of the classics is nil. Kottler is still a professor and chairman of the piano department at Wayne State University.

PRIOR TO the intermission Sunday, Oakway will perform Frescobaldi's Toccata, Handel's "Water Music" suite, and three excerpts from Berlioz's "Damnation of Faust."

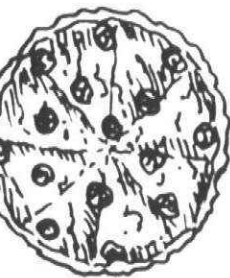
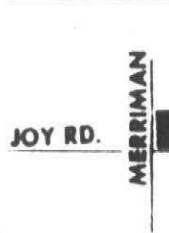

## 16th century music Monday at UM-D

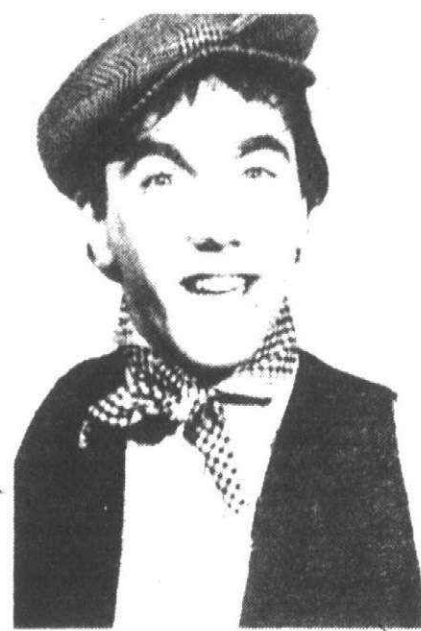

## Lutherans buy land for new high school

The Huron Valley Lutheran Funding Association has announced the purchase of a 25-acre site, on Prospect Road, just in Superior Township, for the Huron Valley Lutheran High School which will serve students from throughout southeastern Michigan.

"We can now begin serious consideration of the steps which must be taken to provide on-site facilities for our program," said the association's president Robert Zeinstra announcing acquisition of the site just south of Ann Arbor Road. "This is a giant step forward for our school."

A long-range plan developed for the school has Huron Valley's own facility to be ready for the 1982-1983 school year.

"However," asserted Principal and Pastor Karl S. Peterson, "if our growth continues and the support of our constituency enlarges, that timetable could well be accelerated."

Huron Valley Lutheran currently leases classroom facilities from St. Mary's Catholic School of Wayne. Now in its third year, it has 76 students in grades nine through 12. There are six full-time faculty members who teach pre-college and general education courses.

Huron Valley Lutheran is affiliated with the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod which has congregations and grade schools throughout the area. Sister high schools are located in Saginaw and St. Joseph.

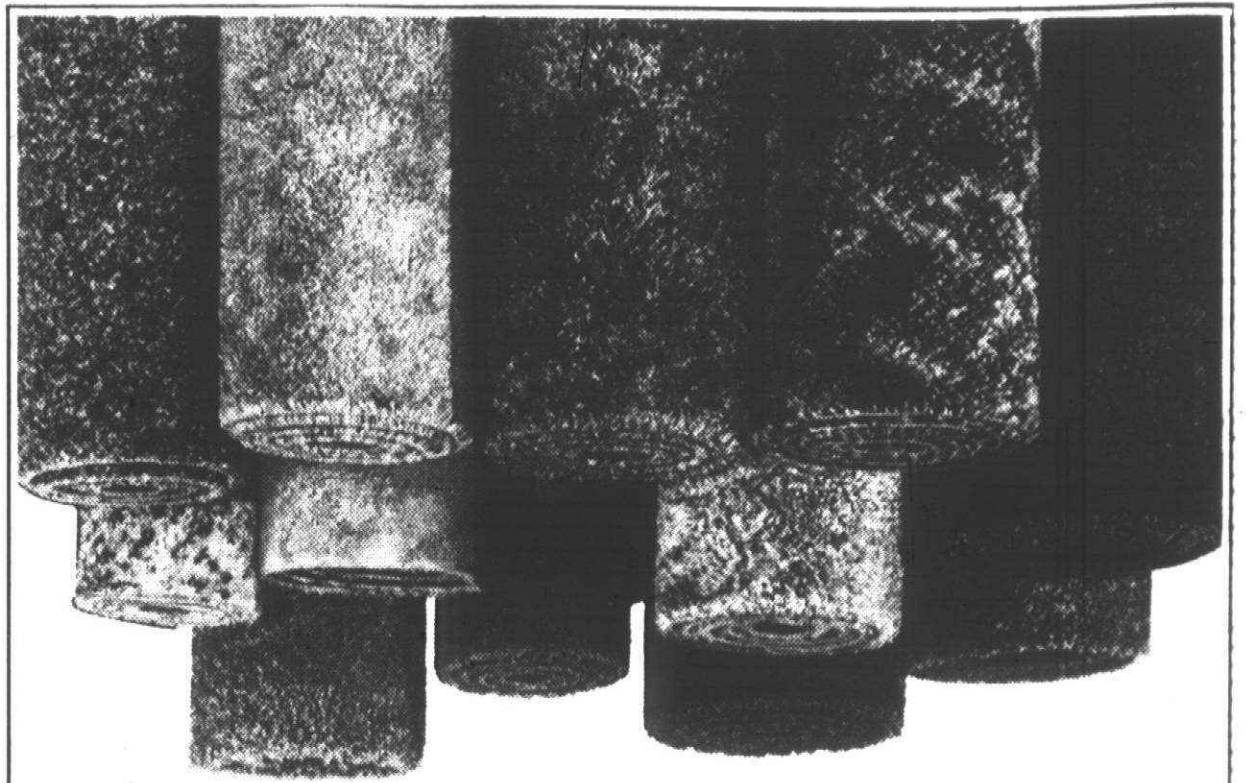

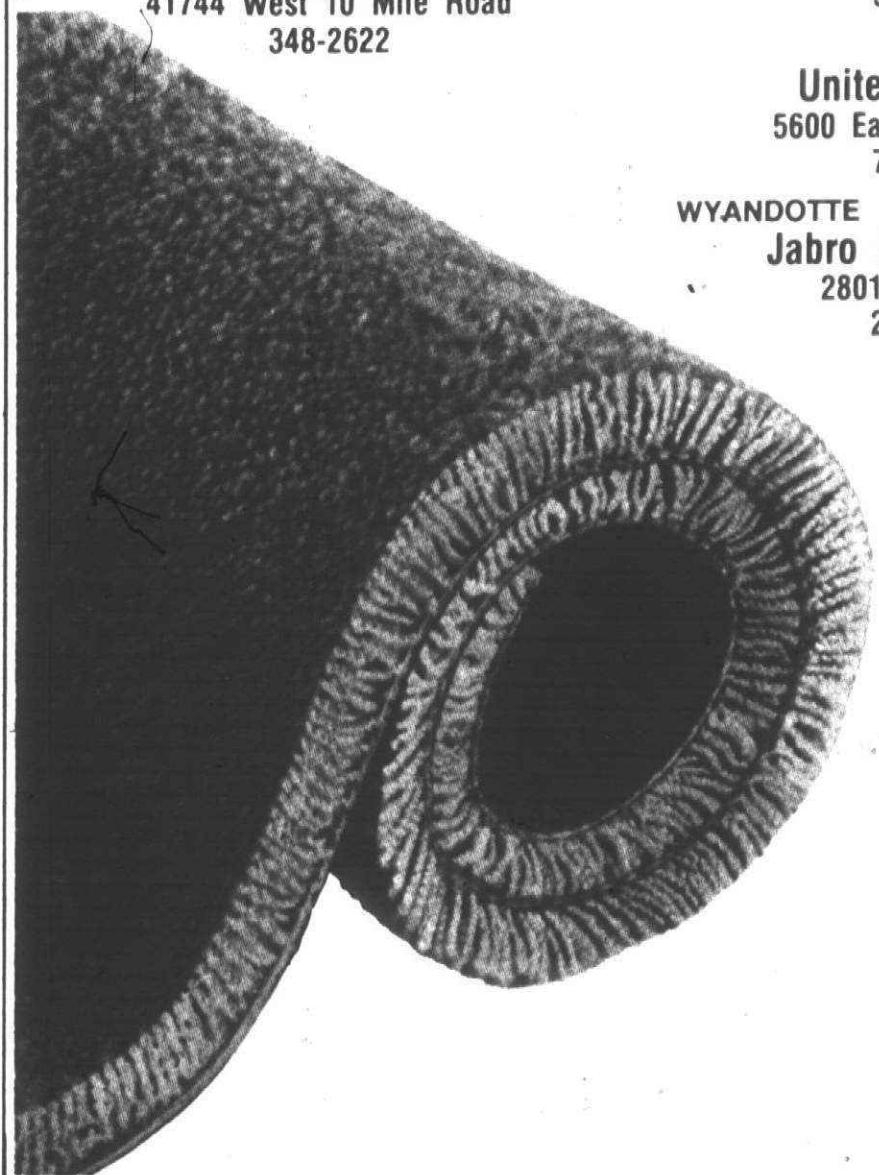

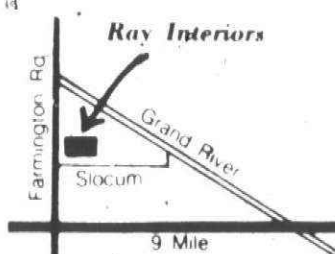

## Classic battle of rivals

## Bentley nips Rocks, 49-46

Livonia Bentley moved into undisputed possession of first place in the Suburban Eight boys' basketball chase Tuesday night with a pulsating 49-46 victory over Plymouth Salem on the Rocks' home court.

Although partisan fans who thundered their cheers and chants throughout the tense contest may remember only the final score, the truth is that this was a textbook game of which films are made and on which clinics are based.

It was Bentley's newly formed zone-minded floating, interchangeable defense anchored on a 6-6 baseline trio which finally prevailed over the penetrating quickness of the Plymouth team, previously unbeaten.

Bentley is now 7-1 overall and 4-0 in the Sub 8, while Plymouth's record is 8-1 overall and 4-1 in the loop. The Rocks have won four straight league crowns.

**BIG GUYS** like 6-6 Chris Bollin, 6-5 Dave Stone and 6-5 Eric Thorderson, who bait the inner trap at the defensive basket for the Bulldogs, proved their point when they stopped Plymouth without a single basket in the final period.

Salem went into that quarter with a 38-34 lead, but could add only eight free throws in one of the most intriguing prep matchups witnessed in a decade.

Tom Ellinghausen led Plymouth's attack with 17 points, but the fact that the full Rock team shot only 26 percent from the field against the Bentley zone (11 of 42 shots) shows a shocking deficiency for a team that was rated co-holder on No. 10 spot in a state poll only last Friday.

It was 9-8 for Plymouth after one quarter and 26-26 at the half. Salem's control game brought the Rocks to the fore, 38-34, at the end of three periods—but after that the Rocks never again put a ball through the hoop except from the free throw line.

**EVEN FRED THOMANN**, Salem coach, in praising his personnel conceded that a bounce here or there might have changed the outcome. Coach Jim Komula of Bentley agreed. But in this case Bentley got the last bounce, the last basket, and a co-role with Thomann's club of having put on the finest system demonstration of basketball high school followers of the sport have seen in years.

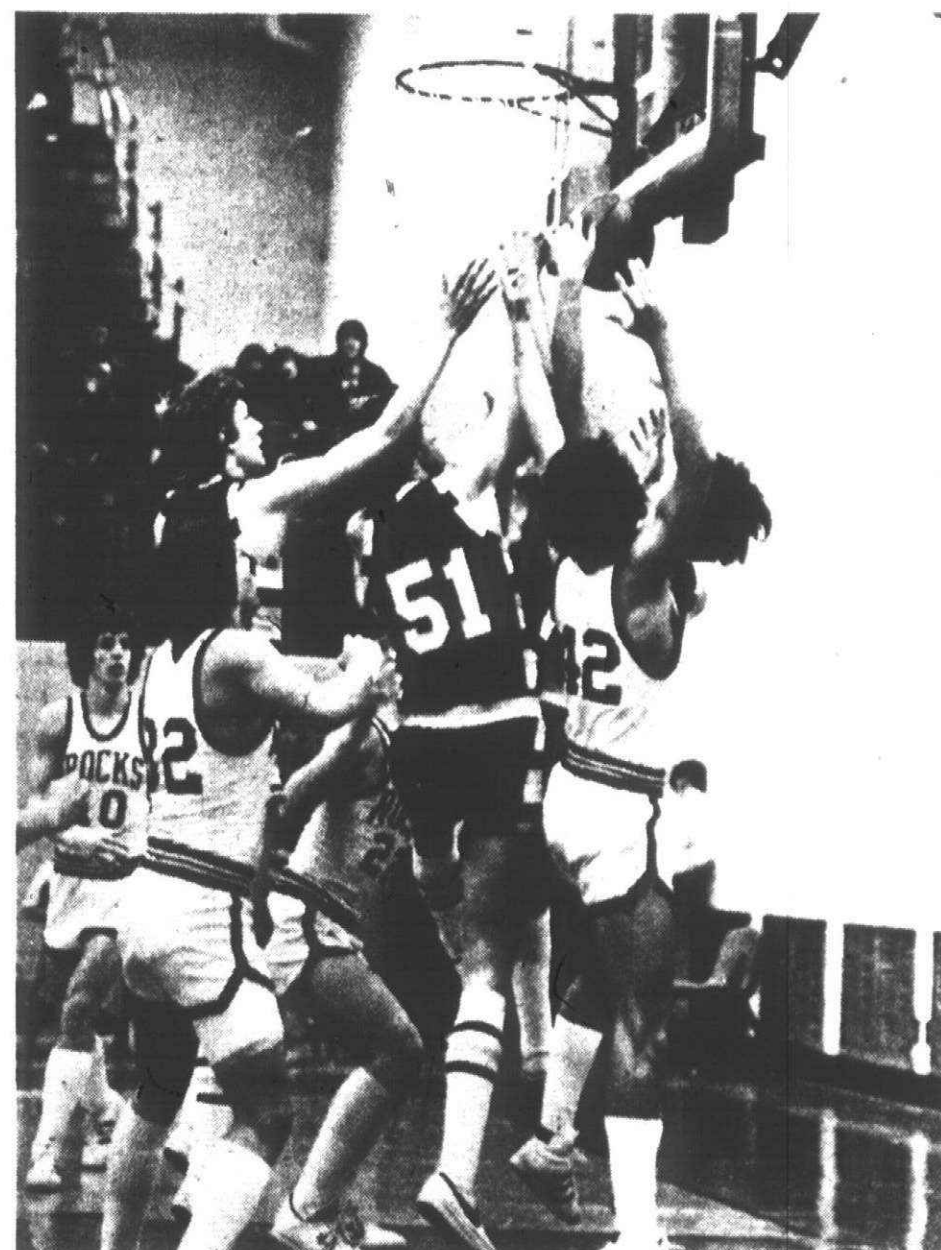

Horton and Stevens lasted through the quar-

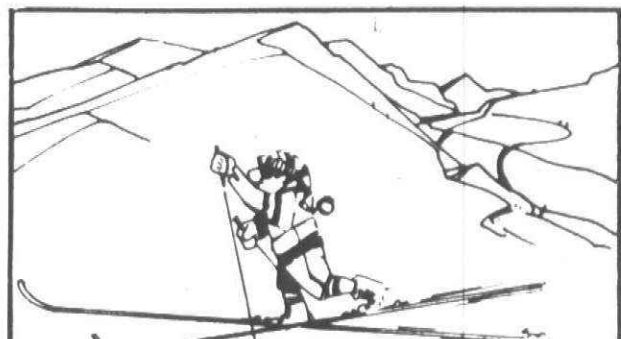
terfinals before falling 6-3, 6-2.

# Shoes important to joggers

It's called "sneaker chic"—only the sneakers are no longer sneakers and they are no longer seen just on the feet of frolicking 10- and 12-year-olds or backlot basketball players.

Runner's World, the specialized Bible of the serious runner, each year analyzes and rates the top running shoes. Ten years ago, the magazine critiqued 16 models; this year their specialists analyzed more than 160 models.

In the past five years, more than 24 million American feet have taken to the streets, tracks and trails. It is the phenomenon known as the "jogging boom."

With 15 million Americans running—most of whom disdain the term "jogging"—the established athletic shoe manufacturers and a host of new specialists have saturated a market once reserved for track and cross country teams and a small band of conscientious marathoners.

With an explosion of colors, stripes and new materials, the athletic shoe industry has boomed into a \$500 mil-

lion-a-year business. And they have spawned an even larger shoe market for those people who don't run but want to look as if they do. "Sneaker chic."

In 1977, according to the New York Times, 15 million shoes that looked like running shoes were sold in comparison to the six million high-quality, top-of-the-line running shoes sold.

First there were those shoes made by the specialists—Brooks, Nike and New Balance as well as the Japanese imports, Tiger and Pony.

The respected, established athletic shoe manufacturers—Adidas, Puma and Converse—though they have watched the specialists infringe on their once-privately-held market, still do a booming business.

According to figures released earlier this year, Adidas, U.S.A., the American subsidiary of the German company, with annual sales of \$100 million, still commands 30 per cent of the athletic shoe market.

The large chain department stores round out the production picture with their shoes which look like running

shoes, but which are not designed for the sport.

Design, according to running purists, is the key, not cosmetics. Walk into any athletic supply store and it is relatively easy to get lost in a burst of bright stripes, stars, flares, collar nylon mesh and white leather.

•Ideally, the running shoe's sole, according to Runners' World specialists, should combine "traction, protection, cushioning and flexibility."

•The shoe's heel should be elevated to ease the strain on the leg. The heel should be reasonably wide so that it gives the foot stability, but not so wide that it inhibits natural running movement.

•An arch support, which throws body weight over the outside edge of the foot, should be built in.

•A sole should be cushioned to reduce road shock by as much as 50 per cent. Dr. George Sheehan, a medical columnist for Runner's World, said that the worst thing ever to happen to feet was concrete and that the next worst was shoes to protect against it and other hard surfaces.

•There should be enough room at the front of the shoe, the toe box, to allow toes to move freely.

•There should also be a "heel counter," a tab at the back of the shoe to reduce pull and strain on the Achilles tendon.

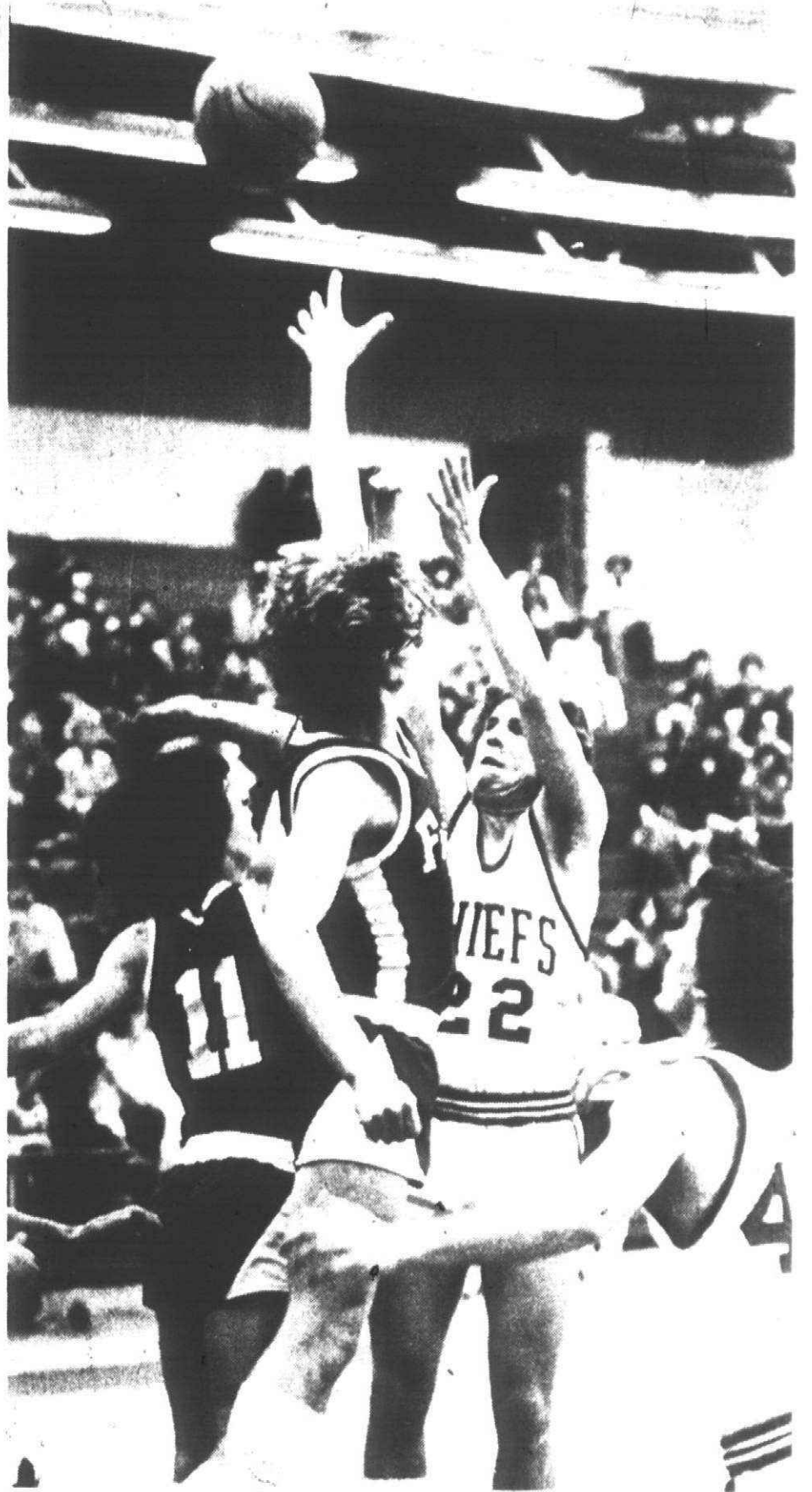
## Rock matmen belt Bulldogs

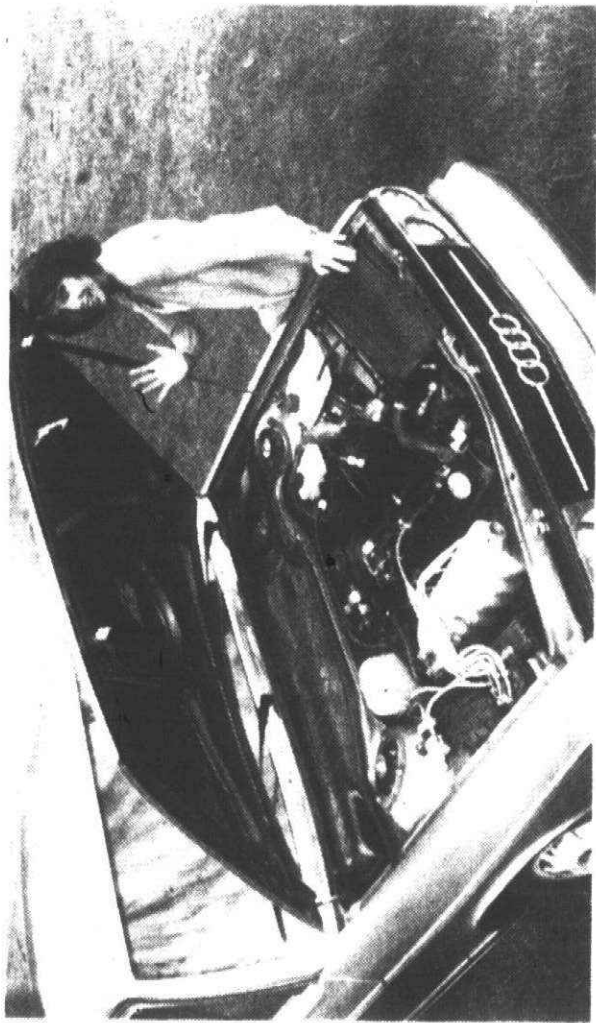
## Import auto industry has economic impact

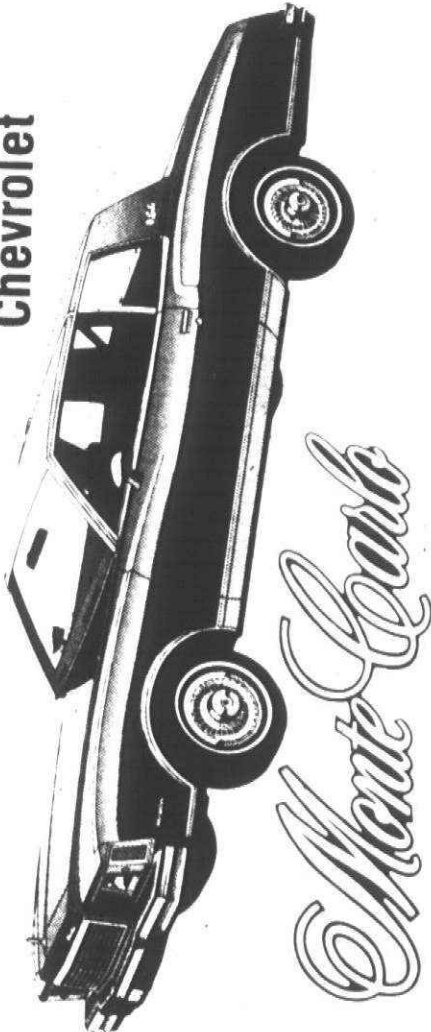

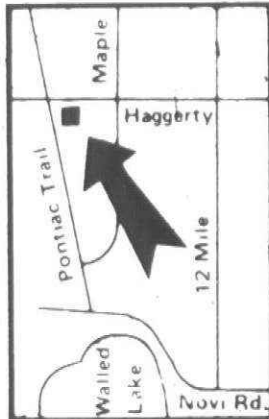

# Ford exhibit mixes old with the new

Ford Division's 1978 Detroit Auto Show display will feature more than 40 new-model cars and trucks and a wide variety of special attractions, including two futuristic show cars, hourly prize drawings and historical exhibits highlighting Ford Motor Company's 75th anniversary.

A new T-roof Thunderbird "convertible" and an Econoline Super Wagon — a new longer model in Ford's popular Econoline van and Club Wagon lineup — will be shown for the first time at the Detroit show. Public introduction for both vehicles takes place later this winter.

Many area residents also will be seeing Ford's new Futura and Mustang II King Cobra, both introduced in December, for the first time during the show.

**THE FOCAL** point of Ford's nearly 26,000-square-foot exhibit is a spectacular 50-ft. circular display area featuring four turntables with three cars and a miniature spaceship.

The front-wheel-drive Fiesta, compact Fairmont sedans and station wagons, the four-wheel-drive Bronco and a CL-9000 linehaul diesel tractor — all new-for-1978 model vehicles — also will be attention-getters.

In addition, Ford Division will exhibit two futuristic vehicles — the Megastar (see photo on page 3) and the Ghia Prima — at the show. A design concept for possible family cars of the future, Megastar features five-passenger seating, an aluminum body and extensive use of glass for improved driver and passenger visibility.

The versatile Ghia Prima is actually four vehicles in one, and with removable tops can be changed from a pickup truck into a station wagon, two-seat sports coupe or 2 + 2 fastback.

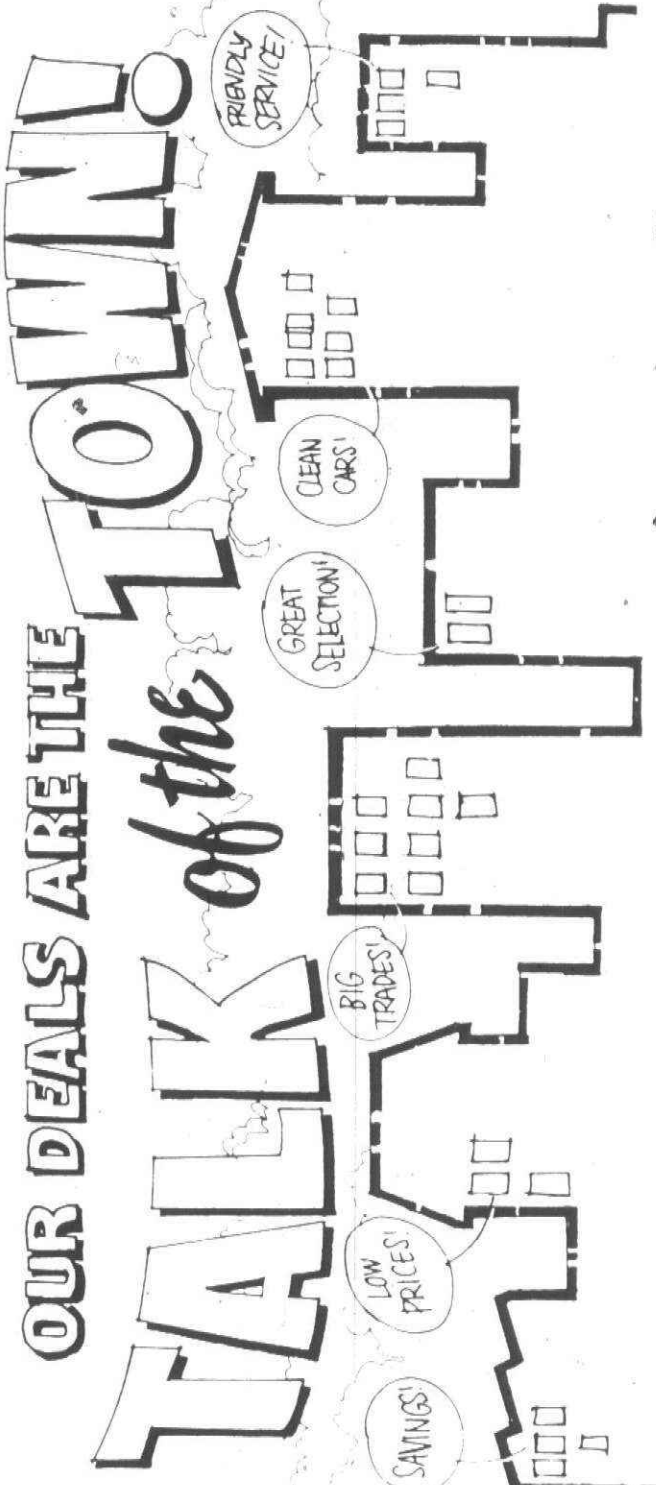

A quarter-size replica of the company's 1903 Mack Ave. assembly plant, which

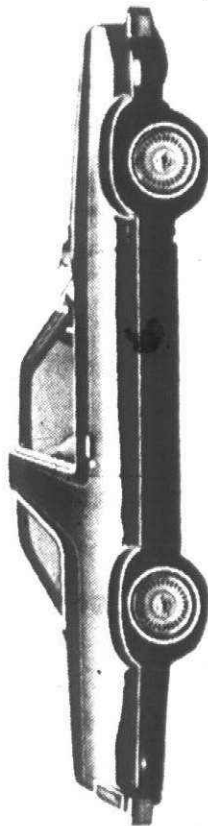

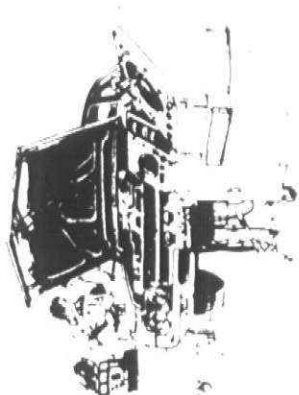

My pride and joy beamed in the afternoon sun. I ran to the store and bought new seat covers, floor mats and several quarts of oil.

By that evening, we were ready to do the town in style. First, I phoned the girls and warned them I was on my way. I grinned all the way down Plymouth Road. This was the life! I had the radio

on as loud as it would go without blaring me right out of the car. My foot was right to the floor—we were going a swift 40 m.p.h.

I felt as though I were flying until I heard some peculiar noises coming from under the hood.

I turned down the radio, told the girls it was nothing to worry about, and in a panic pulled into the nearest gas station.

The car sputtered, clunked and hissed. As the engine cranked and cranked and finally died, I calmly got out and lifted the hood. Billows of smoke poured out and practically choked us all. As soon as it cleared, I, having taken a course in powder-puff mechanics, loosened the radiator cap. Unfortunately, I had loosened it too much, and antifreeze was spewn all over me, the fresh wax job on the car and the gas station attendant.

My first instinct was to reach in my pocket for a dime. "Hello, Dad? Can you come and get us?"

I had my nose under the hood every day seeing what had gone wrong or if there could possibly be anything left. By that time, every part had been replaced, and we were starting on the second time around.

Needless to say, I was voted class mechanic during my senior year in high school, and comments such as "Did she make it today?" were not uncommon.

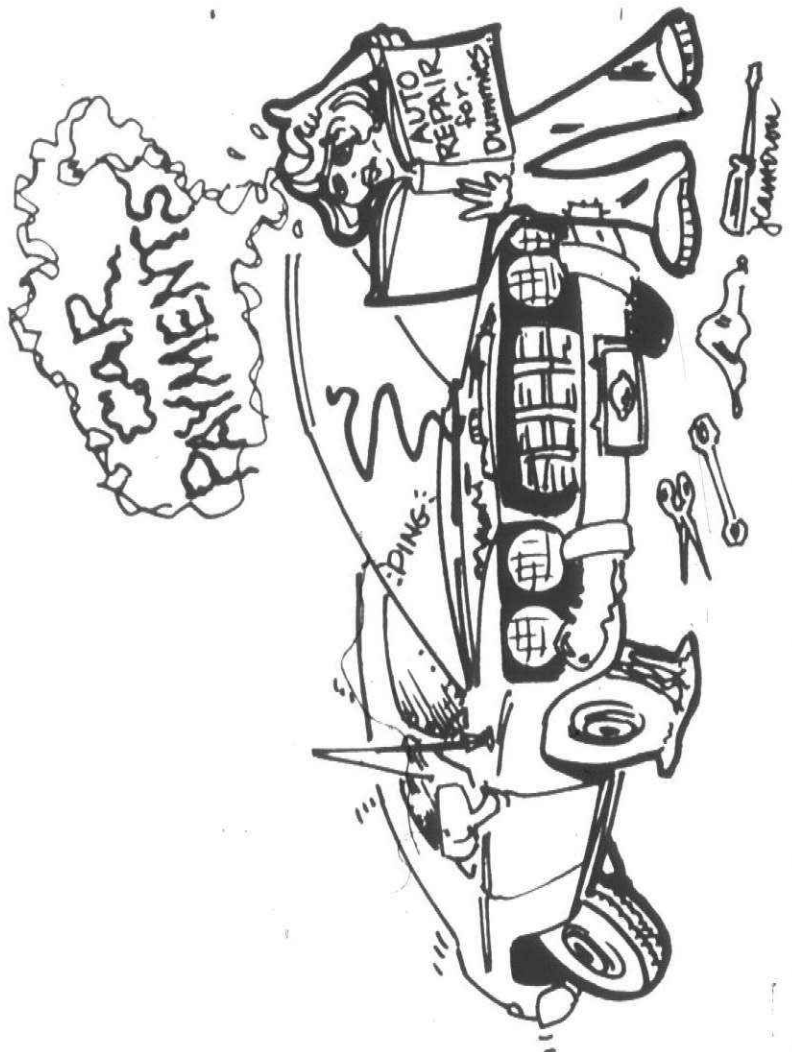
After a tune-up in August, I thought I was set for the winter. However, I had

Dad, you were right.

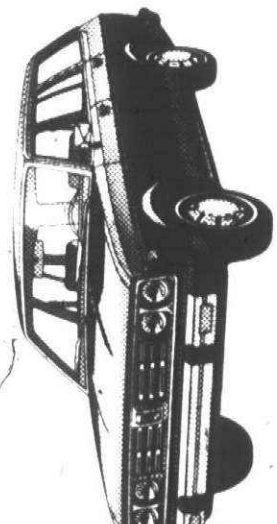

## Electric car awaits battery development

Electric cars have a definite place in the future of transportation, but just how far away that is depends upon a big breakthrough in battery development.

Some automotive executives feel the breakthrough is imminent, that battery-powered vehicles will be on the market in less than 10 years. Battery technicians for instance are going all out both at GM's Research Laboratories in suburban Detroit and its Delco-Remy Division at Anderson, Ind.

Significant progress is being made towards the elimination of such current problems as limited performance, weight, frequency of recharges and high cost of the lead-acid maintenance-free traction batteries now considered the best at hand.

Zinc-nickel oxide batteries are just around the corner. In fact, GM has set up a pilot line to continue their development and testing while experimenting with production facilities.

Still further around the corner, maybe 10-15 years away unless technology breaks through sooner, are lithium-iron sulfide batteries which are considerably smaller and lighter yet more powerful than either of their predecessors.

GM's current battery-powered vehicle, designated the XP512E-XP for experimental. It is operable, carries 12 lead-acid batteries. It is comfortable and has space behind the single seat for small packages such as groceries, tote bags and shoe boxes.

The XP512E has a range of about 50 miles between recharges at 30 miles an hour, has reached a top speed of over 40 miles an hour under controlled conditions on a test track, and can accelerate from a stop to 30 miles an hour in 12 seconds. It is purely experimental and carries to price tag.

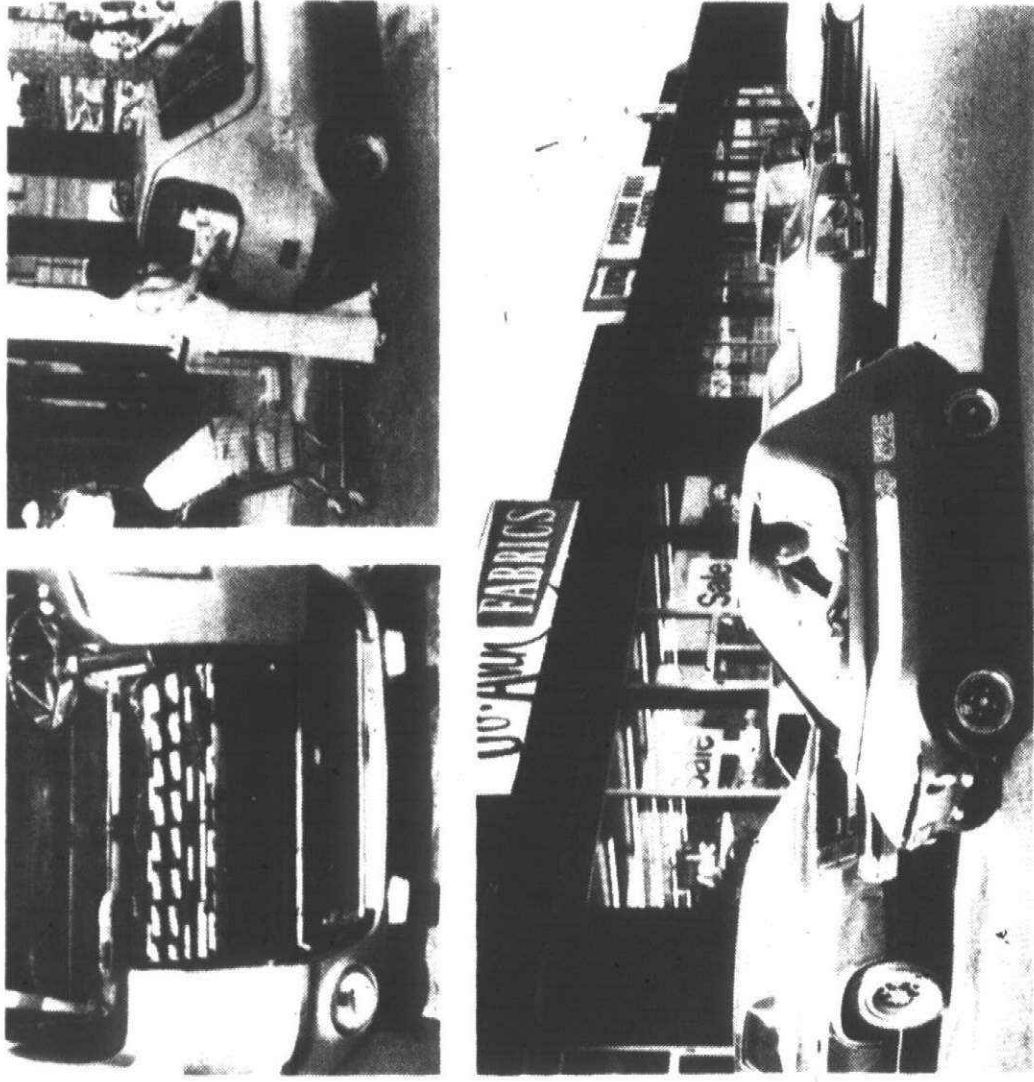
