Some new car owners burn lead to cut costs

As many as 10 per cent of motorists operating cars designed to use unleaded fuel are reportedly filling their tanks with regular, leaded gasoline.

A survey by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency disclosed the high rate of flagrant, despite the potential danger to engine performance.

Service stations can be fined up to \$10,000 for pumping regular fuel into unleaded cars or tampering with auto emission systems.

Most violations occur at self-service gas stations and are prompted by the less expensive price of leaded fuel, which represents a savings of four to eight cents per gallon compared to the cost of unleaded gas.

In Canton Township, self-service stations are banned for safety considerations.

Beginning with the 1976 model year, automobiles came equipped with catalytic converters, which were designed to reduce the amount of pollutants emitted into the air. These cars require the use of unleaded fuel.

THE CIRCUMFERENCE of the gas tank funnels of unleaded cars were diametrically reduced to prohibit motorists from using cheaper regular fuel. Unless adjustments are made, gas pump nozzles for regular fuel cannot be fed into the tanks of cars designed for unleaded use.

But car owners are finding ways to break the law and save a few extra dollars.

Rick Evenson, of Evenson Shell in Plymouth, says he has noticed several customers "using funnels or other contraptions" to pump regular gas into unleaded cars.

"We tell them it is illegal and to shut off the pump. We're not required to police violators, but sometimes it's rather obvious. In some cases, people file down their tanks so a regular nozzle will fit."

It is questionable, however, if the savings realized by using regular gasoline exceeds the potential damage leaded fuel can cause to an unleaded car.

A Chrysler Corp. spokesman for engineering public relations said the use of regular fuel in an unleaded car will void the five-year warranty on the emission system, shorten the life of sparkplugs and cause the engine to pollute the air.

Said Evenson: "With leaded gasoline, I don't think the customer is saving that much. At Shell, the unleaded fuel is higher in octane than the regular. This means the prolonged use of regular gas in an unleaded car will result in poorer engine performance."

"In the end, the customer will be paying more in repairs."

ALL NEW CAR models, however, do not require unleaded fuel. Any vehicle exceeding 6,050 pounds in weight will run on any type gasoline. The same is true of cars with four-wheel drive.

"People sort of shrug their shoulders when they see a new car needs unleaded fuel," said L. John Miller, car salesman at Lou LaRiche Chevrolet in Plymouth Township.

"I think that's one reason for the sales spurt in the area of pick-ups and four-wheel drives—the customer can still use regular gas."

Mid-year grads get pick of jobs

After 16 years of staring at classroom walls, college students who graduated in December shouldn't have to return to school for a lack of anything better to do.

That's because the job market is booming with prospective openings. Spokesmen for university placement services say employment opportunities haven't been better since the 1960s.

"We've found that the economy has picked up tremendously in our area," said Richard Nesbit, director of career planning at Eastern Michigan University. "There are a lot of organizations, which in past years have been light in recruiting students, that are getting back in the employment market."

"The students we're working with now are doing very well. We are booking a good number of on-campus interviews and our weekly job lists are fairly hefty."

Graduates in engineering, business and technical related fields are not surprisingly highest in demand, with many having several offers to choose from.

BUT LIBERAL ARTS students, who traditionally have trouble finding jobs, are having a little more luck.

"Government organizations usually hire the most liberal arts students," Nesbit said. "Things are still a little weak, but projections for government positions look good."

Stuart Defaney, a University of Michigan graduate from Canton Township who earned a BA in English, hasn't come across many job offers in his field.

"I'm looking for a job in advertising or possibly journalism. English is not

one of the better areas to graduate in. I have enough background in engineering where I might land a job with some company."

Anna Fowler of Plymouth, a U-M graduate with a BS in education, hopes to get on the substitute's list in Plymouth or Northville. She says possible openings will surface in the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools because of growing enrollment, and that Title IX could result in more coaching opportunities for women.

JULIE LUTTERMOSER of Plymouth, is currently in Lansing looking for a job. She graduated from Michigan State University with a BA in office administration.

"I'm relatively confident. There appears to be a shortage of qualified people in my field. I'm sure I can find a job—I'm just being kind of choosy right now," she said.

Margaret Mundy of Canton, graduated from EMU with a BS in microbiology. She doesn't expect to have too much trouble finding work.

"I think my chances are pretty good. I'm looking in hospital lab work where there are a lot of things you can do."

Unlike those graduates who are jobless and confident, James Leitch of Plymouth started working for Chrysler Corp. on Jan. 3. He graduated from MSU with a BS in electrical engineering and was offered jobs from companies in Texas and Ohio.

For those job-seekers not as fortunate as Leitch, the fact that they are mid-year graduates doesn't really help them. Although competition is less fierce, most jobs open up in June when the bulk of college seniors graduate, Nesbit said.

'One bad apple' blamed in anti-rape solicitation

A spokesman for a telephone solicitation sales firm said Tuesday his company will locate "the one bad apple" who angered area women with a "hard sell" approach to selling anti-rape equipment and literature.

All phone solicitation was stopped Tuesday while the executive board investigates the complaints, said Cynthia Kleiner, president of Citizens Against Rape, Inc. (CAR).

Women in Oakland and Wayne counties complained to the Observer & Eccentric about calls they received at home from phone solicitors representing CAR. The non-profit corporation is trying to raise money for "rape prevention education" by selling alarms, lights and literature, according to Ms. Kleiner.

The group hired the Dale Corp. of Warren to publish a 56-page booklet "What You Had Better Know About Rape," and to direct CAR's "public relations." Presently, CAR has no office and its address and phone number are the same as the Dale Corp. of 30100 Van Dyke, Warren.

A woman who lives on Guy street in Southfield said Tuesday that when she refused to buy the \$10 booklet and "associate membership" the phone solicitor told her "maybe when one of your daughters gets raped, you'll wish they had the equipment."

RICHARD COLE, spokesman for the telephone sales firm, D&D Advertising, 17421 Telegraph, Detroit, said he should know before the end of the week "which employee" made the objectionable calls.

"If we do have a problem, we can track down who the person is," Cole

said. "We use Bresser's (cross-index directory) and knowing the relative area the complaints are coming from and the time of the call, we can always track it down. We will be dismissing the person."

Cole said most of the calls were made by "high school girls" who work nights and weekends for D&D as phone solicitors.

But the complaints being lodged are not just about the phone manner of the solicitors. Barbara Wolf, official of the Southeastern Michigan Anti-Rape Network, said her organization refused to endorse CAR because information contained in the \$10 booklet is free at any rape counseling center. Equipment like the shriek alarm, doorstop alarm and car-top flasher, are of questionable value, and overpriced, she said.


FOR \$35, CAR "associate members" received, battery-powered shriek alarm, a battery-powered blinking light to attach to the car roof in an emergency; a pressure-sensitive doorstop alarm to warn of intruders; and the pamphlet, "What You Had Better Know About Rape." For \$20, women will receive the blinking light and the door wedge alarm. For \$15, new members get the shriek alarm and the booklet. Ten dollars buys an associate membership in CAR and the booklet.

Ms. Kleiner said the funds CAR receives will help set up a "tele-educational" phone line and possibly finance a rape prevention film, as well as schedule speakers.

Dale Jablonski, president of Dale Corp., was "out-of-town" early this week. An employee of the publishing firm, Katie Redford, said she was

shocked at the statements attributed to the phone solicitors.

In addition to printing the anti-rape booklet for CAR, the Dale Corp. also prints a crime prevention publication for the Michigan Fraternal Order of Police and publications for other non-profit police associations.

Revved up in a rumbleseat

So what if the Cassady family's car has no heater?

It spends most of the winter in the garage anyway.

And besides, shrugs Dennis Cassady of Canton's Brookside Village Subdivision, who gives a hoot about a heater when you can recline in a rumble seat, snuggle in tan mohair upholstery, and roll out the rear and front windows with a crank?

The gleaming 1936 Ford coupe is Cassady's pride and joy, and he thinks there's good reason for that. He's spent the last six years sweating over paint and body parts, rebuilding the fuel pump, distributor and starter, and restoring the interior to its original condition.

And it's all been worth it, Cassady said.

"It's just a great hobby," said the 27-year-old design engineer for Ford Motor Co. "I've had this thing about cars since I was 13, and I really had a bug to get an old car."

"Now that the car's restored, it's a very family-oriented hobby. You put the whole family in and go for a ride."

THE VENTURE has been a profitable one from an economic point of view too.

In 1972 when the car was spotted

with dents and rust, Cassady purchased the coupe for \$475. Six years of work and a \$3,000 investment later, the car is now worth about \$10,000, according to Cassady's estimates.

The coupe is now in such good shape that Cassady decided to show off the antique at Cobo Hall's Autorama show earlier this month. He plans a trip to Toledo in February to enter that city's custom and antique car show.

But Cassady does not expect to win any prizes in the Ohio city. Judges failed to award the Canton resident a trophy at Cobo Hall this month.

because a 1946 engine powers the 1936 coupe.

Cassady, however, does not plan on losing competition points forever just because his car does not contain an original '36 engine.

Days after the Detroit Autorama ended, Cassady began scouring newspaper ads and antique car flea markets for a 1936 Ford V-8 engine. He found one and expects to rebuild and install the engine next summer.

Among these are helping to assure the company a regular flow of qualified candidates, providing them with the opportunity to observe students in action before investing in training, and reducing turnover rates.

Mrs. Moehle calls the cooperative education program a new venture for Eastern, adding that she is now in the process of identifying new companies and organizations interested in participating. 





Elvis (Wade) fans can't be wrong

A woman from a nearby Detroit suburb calls frantically requesting a better seat. The third row is just not close.

A Kalamazoo woman decided to curtail her hospital stay and travel the 150 miles to the Redford Theatre to see and hear him perform.

Elvis Wade Cummins is comin' to the Redford Theatre at 17360 Lahser this Friday night, and his fans couldn't be more ecstatic.

For those who can't even wait that long, the singer, who has adopted the Elvis name professionally, will appear at 10 a.m. Friday at the Sound Station record store in Canton.

"People are dying to see anyone who just looks like Elvis," Pat Hatala says. "But when they come back, it's to see Wade because he's like himself and not Elvis."

Mrs. Hatala, of Farmington, is one of Wade's most adamant promoters. She's the secretary of his national fan club and both she and her husband are responsible for his professional photography, out of their Livonia photo shop. The fan club has members from throughout the area, including Redford Township.

They say Wade has a magnetism that only the best entertainers project. They say his style is unique, all his own; although they admit his national popularity originated from his impressions of the late legendary Presley.

It may seem somewhat of a para-

dox, but his local fans still say there's only one Elvis Wade.

THE FAN CLUB'S treasurer, Fay Stein of Dearborn Heights, once stitched yards of silk scarves so the performer could toss them to his adoring fans during a performance.

It's been happening all over the country and now it'll happen at the Redford Theatre at 7:30 Friday night when Wade returns to the area that spawned his success.

Nita Hanchett of Canton first encountered Wade in 1974 at the Poisson Apple Lounge in Westland, where he had been a regular attraction generating a strong local following. Her mother introduced her to the performer and described him as a "down-to-earth, loving person, and a real charmer."

That evening, Mrs. Hanchett became the founder and president of the national Elvis Wade fan club. Upon the lounge owner's suggestion, she decided to take over the club's mailing list. Since then she's received thousands of fan letters addressed to Wade and answers between 15 and 20 calls daily.

"I never thought I'd get this involved," she says. "But it's been worth every single second I spend on him. When he gets up there and entertains, that's all the gratification I need."

Officers of Wade's national fan club, based in the Detroit area, have gone all out to promote his upcoming per-

formance. In addition to calling area record shops to check on the sales of his latest album, "Introducing Elvis Wade," they've sent out 1,000 flyers.

posters, and made personal phone calls to other club members.

ONE MIGHT WONDER why these people have become so dedicated to the success of Elvis Wade. The officers say his sincerity, personal magnetism and his love for people have set him off from other performers. They add that all they want in return for their dedication is to see him make it big.

"We don't receive any compensation from him or from the fan club," Mrs. Hatala stresses. "It's strictly because we see him as a great performer and want to see him go to the top."

Mrs. Hatala says that she and Mrs. Hanchett work well together in their work for Elvis Wade. She says while Mrs. Hanchett is excited by exciting things, she can remain calm and evaluate how to best help Wade. Mrs. Hatala manages much of the business side of promotions and the fan club's work.

"I do what I do best because I've been in the business world for so long," she says.

"This is really one person I need to be associated with. My husband and I both feel this way."

She describes Wade's following as people who would go out of their way to reach one of his shows.

"They're so dedicated, they'd drive 100 miles, 1,000 miles to see him. If people could afford it, they'd drive to every show."

BUT CASSADY regards his car as more than a showpiece. During summer months, Cassidy, his wife, Cheryl, and their two kids pile in for a Sunday drive in the country or a motorcade with one of two antique car clubs they have joined.

Cassidy figures he puts 1,000 miles on the coupe each year.

"Back in 1936, it was considered the fastest car on the road," Cassidy said of the coupe that was built 15 years before he was born. "With the V-8 that's in it now, you can probably go 100 miles an hour. You can go 55 miles an hour all day long. But when I drive, I try to take it slow."

Although the car is equipped with an electronic ignition, Cassidy says there's a hole in the rear of the coupe's body for a crank that starts the car by hand when the electronic ignition system fails.

Cassidy has never had to use the crank.

"And I hope I never have to," he said. "I understand you can break an arm if the car backfires."

According to Cassidy, the car sold for \$570 when it rolled off the assembly line in 1936. Although the original buyers opted to add the cost of an AM radio to the car's base price, they apparently considered the heater option a frivolous thing to buy.

Cassidy has never cursed the original owners for that economy-minded decision.

"Sure, it was little cold driving down to Cobo Hall," Cassidy admitted. "But it really wasn't all that bad."





Charged with assaulting police

Plymouthite subdued in backyard

A six-foot, 225 pound, 64-year-old Plymouth man decided to take on two of the city's finest when they ran through his backyard late Monday night.

Police say James E. McKenna, of 233 W. Ann Arbor Trail, punched and knocked to the ground patrol officers Edward Ochal and Anne Herndon when they came onto his property while chasing a fleeing suspect.

Ochal was taken to St. Mary Hospital for chest X-rays and released, according to Plymouth Police Sgt. Daniel Carpenter. Ms. Herndon was "shaken up" but not hospitalized.

McKenna was arraigned Tuesday in 35th District Court on charges of obstructing, resisting and hindering justice, and assault and battery. He stood mute and a not guilty plea was entered for him by the court. He was released on \$1,000 personal bond. His trial date was set for Feb. 15.

The police version of the incident differs from McKenna's on several points.

Police give the following account of the events:

OCHAL AND Herndon were sent to the vicinity of the railroad crossing and Ann Arbor Trail at 11 p.m. to investigate reports of a gun being fired.

When they got there, they found two vehicles parked in the middle of the Trail. As they approached the cars, one of the passengers jumped out and ran in back of the houses on the south side of the street.

Ochal took off after the man on foot.

As the officer ran through McKenna's yard, McKenna came out and asked him what he was doing there.

Ochal identified himself as a police officer and said he was chasing a suspect. McKenna said, "Not in my yard you're not," and grabbed Ochal by the lapels, according to police.

Ochal twisted free and told McKenna that if he didn't get out of the way he would be arrested. McKenna reportedly grabbed Ochal again, and the officer told him he was under arrest.

Ochal then spun McKenna around to frisk him. While he was frisking him, the police report that McKenna slammed Ochal in the chest with his elbow, knocking the officer to the ground.

At that time officer Herndon came running around the corner of the house. Police said McKenna punched her in the stomach and she fell to the ground.

By that time, one more squad car arrived at the house, and the two other officers arrested McKenna and took him to jail.

MCKENNA, HOWEVER, tells a somewhat different story about what went on in his backyard.

He said he was at his neighbor's house about 11 p.m. His neighbor looked out the window and told McKenna there was somebody prowling around his backyard and cars.

McKenna said when he went out to see what was going on, somebody came up to him, shined a flashlight in

his eyes and told him he was under arrest.

"I didn't know what to think," McKenna said. "I'm in my own backyard and some guy's telling me I'm arrested. With the light in my face I couldn't even see the guy."

McKenna said he struggled with the

man in an effort to "defend myself and find out what it was all about."

He said that two other men and a woman came into his yard, wrestled him to the ground and handcuffed his arms behind his back.

Police said the man they were originally chasing got away.

City develops capital plans

Within the next two weeks the Plymouth City Commission hopes to come closer to deciding how to spend an expected \$100,000 in federal funds for capital improvements.

At a Feb. 6 public hearing the commission will announce proposed projects for 1978 and the next two years. The city administration has submitted its recommendations but the commission has yet to prioritize the suggested programs.

The commission discussed the matter at a Monday night study session. After the session Mayor Tom Turner asked commissioners to submit personal priorities to the administration so a decision could be reached before the public hearing.

THE CITY IS expecting \$100,000 in 1978 for Community Development Act programs.

City administration recommendations for the first year are: Continuation of Old Village redevelopment, \$15,000; Mill and Main intersection widening, \$40,000; a fair housing seminar, \$1,000; a study on establishing a comprehensive neighborhood redevelopment area, \$1,000; a sire communication system, \$10,000; and an installment towards purchase of an aerial ladder truck.

The truck, needed to replace a truck built in the 1940s, would cost about \$240. The administration proposes that money be allocated in each of the three CDA program years until enough is collected to purchase the truck.

Old Village redevelopment includes: Installation of overhead lighting, a sewer connecting the new gazebo and Cannon Park, and two identification signs at the entrances to Old Village.

The fair housing seminar would be conducted by the Fair Housing Center of Detroit for members of the Chamber of Commerce and real estate agents. Mark Wollenweber, assistant

city manager, said the seminar would be an affirmative action credit for the city.

IN THE SECOND YEAR, the administration recommends: A study of the sanitary sewer to identify infiltration from the storm sewers, \$33,000; a \$10,000 fund to subsidize interest on loans for renovation of the rear of Old Village stores; free exterior paint to low and moderate income residents, \$5,000; an elevator at city hall to improve handicapped access, \$40,000; and replacement of the band shell, purchased in 1963, \$20,000.

The administration's recommendations for the third year are: An area for senior citizens in the Cultural Center, \$155,000; construction of three magic squares at city playgrounds, \$23,000 each; and an addition of a second floor to the fire station to relieve space shortage, \$90,000.

Commissioners made the following suggestions: Required code inspections of residences being sold, Commissioner Beverly McAninch; a smoke detector program, Commissioner David Pugh; assistance to the YMCA for its home support services, particularly snow removal from driveways, Commissioner Mark Wehmeyer. A day care center in Old Village was suggested by resident Marda Benson.

City Mgr. Fred Yockey said he believes the smoke detector program could receive supplemental funding this year under the innovative program section of the CDA. Pugh suggested the city purchase smoke detectors for low and moderate income persons and sell them at \$30 per unit. An estimated \$5,000 could buy two detectors for more than 80 homes.

The administration is investigating the feasibility of the suggestions on code enforcement, snow removal for the elderly, and a day care center.



The point entrance to be beautiful

That triangle-shaped plot of ground where Ann Arbor Road meets Ann Arbor Trail no longer will be an eyesore to the Plymouth community. Come spring, it will be converted into a thing of beauty and will have the name of West Point Park, with suitable identification to make it the gateway into Plymouth. For years, community officials have

talked about beautifying the triangle, but nothing official was ever done. The plot of ground once was the property of attorney Perry Richwine, and he, feeling that it should become a park of some sort, deeded it to the City of Plymouth on Dec. 21 1959. It was to be a sort of Christmas gift to the residents. The gift was well-intentioned, but the ground lay idle and the dream of a park vanished until just a few weeks ago.

Unearthing the deed to the property, the city turned it over to Plymouth Township and things started to happen. With Frank Millington, township trustee, as the spearhead, he enlisted the services of Harold Guenther and James McKeon, both former mayors, and plans are now being completed for a spring dedication of the park. The transformation of the eyesore into a community park is being done by leaders of both the city and the township and the actual work of planting trees, bushes and other bits of landscaping will be done by the members of Growth Works, the youth organization that has its headquarters in the old Plymouth Mail building. The planning is being done by Norm Dietrich, the township planner. To add a

touch of a rural community, a log fence will surround the park. In establishing the park as an official entrance to the Plymouth community, the group working on the project feels that it will serve as an example, so that suitable markers can be placed at the other entrances from the east, north and south. It has been figured that close to \$5,000 will be needed to complete the task, and service clubs will provide the necessary funds. The Growth Works members are donating their time. One of those most interested in the transformation of the triangle is Township Supervisor Tom Notebaert. When completed, the new West Point Park and the recreation facilities on Ann Arbor Road will be a big boost to the entire community.

Hearings slated on bus charges

As many as 10 per cent of motorists operating cars designed to use unleaded fuel are reportedly filling their tanks with regular, leaded gasoline. A survey by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency disclosed the high rate of flagrancy, despite the potential danger to engine performance. Service stations can be fined up to \$10,000 for pumping regular fuel into unleaded cars or tampering with auto emission systems. Most violations occur at self-service gas stations and are prompted by the less expensive price of leaded fuel, which represents a savings of four to eight cents per gallon compared to the cost of unleaded gas. In Canton Township, self-service stations are banned for safety considerations. Beginning with the 1975 model year, automobiles came equipped with catalytic converters, which were designed to reduce the amount of pollutants emitted into the air. These cars require the use of unleaded fuel. THE CIRCUMFERENCE of the gas tank funnels of unleaded cars were dramatically reduced to prohibit motorists from using cheaper regular fuel. Unless adjustments are made, gas pump nozzles for regular fuel cannot be fed into the tanks of cars

designed for unleaded use. But car owners are finding ways to break the law and save a few extra dollars. Rick Evenson, of Evenson Shell in Plymouth, says he has noticed several customers "using funnels or other contraptions" to pump regular gas into unleaded cars. "We tell them it is illegal and to shut off the pump. We're not required to police violators, but sometimes it's rather obvious. In some cases, people file down their tanks so a regular nozzle will fit." It is questionable, however, if the savings realized by using regular gasoline exceeds the potential damage leaded fuel can cause to an unleaded car. A Chrysler Corp. spokesman for engineering public relations said the use of regular fuel in an unleaded car will void the five-year warranty on the emission system, shorten the life of sparkplugs and cause the engine to pollute the air. Said Evenson: "With leaded gasoline, I don't think the customer is saving that much. At Shell, the unleaded fuel is higher in octane than the regular. This means the prolonged use of regular gas in an unleaded car will result in poorer engine performance. In the end, the customer will be paying more in repairs."

Negotiations progress at college

"Definite progress" was reported by the Schoolcraft College board in one set of negotiations at the same time it prepared for another round.

The progress was reported in talks with the Association of Office Personnel, which represents secretaries and clerical staff members at the two-year college. That group has been working without a contract since summer.

Salaries, length of contract and fringe benefits remain to be resolved.

The college's position has been that employees should pick up some of the increase in rising health insurance premiums. Lower-paid groups have resisted, contending that the dollar costs would take a bigger proportion of their incomes.

THE BOARD named two persons to the negotiations council which will bargain with the 160-plus member Faculty Forum, largest union on campus.

Chairman Paul Kadish and Treasurer Harry Greenleaf were named to serve on a group which will prepare the college's initial offer to the faculty.

The actual negotiating team will be appointed at the Jan. 25 board meeting.

The current contract is due to expire before classes resume in late August for the fall semester.

TRUSTEE Mark McQuesten had two suggestions to make about dealing with the faculty:

"Let's review the contract piece by

piece (during negotiations). If you (the bargaining team) bring it in one large package, we're overwhelmed. It's too much to swallow.

And: "I would like to discuss education issues with faculty members as faculty members, not as a faculty union, and board members as trustees, not as a (governing) board. I would like to discuss things in a non-confrontational setting."

Replied trustee Rosina Raymond, who in past years had served on the negotiations council: "A worthy ideal, but 'tisn't real. . . It is not the position of the trustees to negotiate. Our negotiators and the Faculty Forum negotiators are very sophisticated. Let's leave that to them. I don't want to stick my nose into it."

The matter was left at that.



Is SC faculty being evaluated?

Schoolcraft College's contract with the faculty calls for full-time instructors to have students fill out a form evaluating the instructor at the end of the semester.

The instructor is free to withhold replies from anyone else, such as his department head.

The instructor is also free to pitch all the forms in the circular file and ignore them.

"The students I've talked to," says Trustee Mark McQuesten, "say that as many as 50 per cent of the faculty fail to make this instrument available."

An administrator at the Jan. 11 meeting disputed the 50 per cent figure as low.

"WE COULD ask the administration to find out who did and who didn't (distribute evaluation forms to students)," McQuesten went on.

"We could ask the students. But I want an explanation. What went wrong?"

Fred Stefanski, dean of arts and sciences, replied: "The faculty have indicated to me they're using it. I can't say 100 per cent are using it, but it's greater than the 50 per cent you indicate."

There are problems enforcing usage of the evaluation form, even though it's in the faculty contract, Stefanski went on.

"We could find out who isn't using it and write a reprimand. But that's not the way to go."

"The way is to discuss with the individual why it should be used. You can force them to do it, but when they get the forms back, they will say, 'Shove it in your ear.' I'd rather get 90 per cent usage than 100 per cent participation and 60 per cent ignoring it."

ANN VINNES, president of the Student Senate, agreed with McQuesten that "the faculty's attitude toward it is bad. Not all use it. At national confer-

ences, we've found there is a movement toward using a standard, national form."

Trustee Gerald Cox, himself a teacher, said too free criticism by students would hurt faculty morale.

Trustee Rosina Raymond, a teacher at the college level, added there is "a lot of inductive teaching going on" where students learn without realizing it at the end of the semester.

"Everybody's an authority here on what goes on in the classroom," she said with undisguised irony.

Treasurer Harry Greenleaf said faculty should be encouraged to use it. "If you don't use it, what motivation is there to improve?"

Faculty Forum President Richard Arlen, in an interview following the board meeting, said he personally uses and reads the forms, with the understanding that a few students who had a bad semester will be vindictive in their criticisms.

THE EVALUATION form was written into the current master contract and used for the first time in April, 1977. Stefanski told the board. The design was made by the Faculty Forum, the administration with input from the student government.

"I cannot guarantee that all faculty use it to the same extent. Further, I cannot guarantee that all students avail themselves of the opportunity to evaluate their instructors," the dean said.

The form allows students to evaluate the instructor's manner of classroom presentation, classroom management, preparation, professional skills and relationship with students.

It also asks: "What do you especially like about this instructor as a teacher?"

"How could this instructor improve?"

"What weaknesses do you find in the course? What suggestions do you have for improving the course?"

"Would you take another class from this instructor? Why?"





Area hospitals struggle with governmental codes

Area hospitals, like 2,900 other across the country, are having trouble meeting national quality and safety standards.

Spokesmen for the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH), the nationwide accrediting body, acknowledge that their standards are tough and that few hospitals make it through the inspection with an unblemished record.

St. Mary Hospital in Livonia and Wayne County General Hospital in Westland received two-year accreditations. But JCAH spokesmen warned that even though a hospital received the full two-year accreditation, it did not mean the hospital had met all of the board's standards.

Redford Community Hospital, meanwhile received a limited, one-year accreditation.

Garden City Osteopathic Hospital, which is reviewed by the American Osteopathic Hospital Association, was granted a full, one-year accreditation a year ago. It has recently been inspected by the association and is awaiting the results.

According to Bob Laible, a spokesman for Redford Community Hospital, the only area institution to receive the limited accreditation, the JCAH's tough building and safety codes prevented the hospital from being fully accredited.

"What meets the state (building) code doesn't necessarily meet the joint commission's codes," Laible said. "Sometimes I think they just raise their standards so they'll have something to say," he added.

SINCE RECEIVING the limited accreditation, the Redford hospital

began an extensive \$1.5 million construction and remodeling program to try to meet the tough JCAH standards. Since Redford Community was last inspected, it has built two new operating rooms, a new intensive care ward, a new emergency room and a new holding area.

The hospital is currently remodeling the existing building to bring it into line with the joint commission's structure and safety codes.

Redford Community is awaiting another inspection by the JCAH, but Laible said he is not certain when the

association will conduct the review. BOTH ST. MARY Hospital and Wayne County General, even though they received full, two-year accreditations, were cited for procedural and record keeping deficiencies.

Rita Radzialowski, administrator at St. Mary, preferred to use the word "recommendations" instead of "deficiencies." At first she refused to specify what changes the JCAH had recommended, but later said that better record keeping was involved.

Mary Landstrom, speaking for

Wayne County General Hospital, said the joint commission had cited the hospital for "minor deficiencies."

She said the JCAH had recommended modifications in certain policies and procedures.

In earlier inspections, Mrs. Landstrom said, the hospital's psychiatric care facilities had been cited for not meeting updated fire, sanitation and safety codes. "Now, that's the state's problem," she said. The state recently took over control of the psychiatric care facility.



the needed facilities for 10 years and can wait no longer," said Ray Cupples, chairman of the building committee.

Placing an estimated price tag of \$350,000 to \$400,000 on the proposed

wing, Cupples said that figure probably would increase 25 per cent if the building program were to be delayed for three years.

Plans drawn up by G. E. Associates of Flint also include enlargement of the entrance area to the main sanctuary, a lounge and expanded kitchen facilities.

"That area has been a favorite gathering place for members and friends both before and after

services," Cupples said, "and opportunities for Christian dialogue will be enhanced through the enlargement of the area and the addition of a lounge."

The multi-purpose room is expected to see heavy use for athletic activities and fellowship events, he added, and a larger kitchen adjacent to the new room will allow greater attendance at dinners sponsored by the church.





DNR reveals budget plans to improve area recreation


Several popular spots in Oakland, Wayne and Livingston counties will be improved if the state Department of Natural Resources' capital improvement program for southern Michigan is approved by the governor and legislature.

The State Fairgrounds and Detroit River access sites will get the most attention, but there are several other noteworthy items in the \$10.1 million plan.

•Teepie Lake in the Highland Recreation Area—\$475,000 for a new beach on the west side of the lake, along with roads and support facilities. (Teepie already has a popular beach on the east side of the lake.)

•Maybury Urban State Park, Northville Township—\$316,000 for a day camp, horse stables (for a concession), picnic area additions and field sports. (Maybury is one of the best horse trail and bicycling spots on public land that you can find within many hours of here.)

•Proud Lake Recreation Area—\$21,000 for an improved entrance road to the canoe division (Jack Butterfield in DNR's parks division tells us he's aware of the poor shape of the



road to the public access boat landing, but that's the province of the waterways division, which already has many demands on its limited funds.)

•Island Lake—\$146,000 for a new entrance road, picnic area and frontier cabins. The entrance from Grand River Avenue will be closed. The new road will come westward from Kensington Road and along Sutherland Road to the south end of the lake. The practice, said Butterfield, is to gravel it for the first year, then pave it when it has been packed down.

•Holly Recreation Area—\$240,000 to complete campground and day use

development and construct a storage building.

PTE. MOUILLEE, the wildfowl marsh at the mouth of the Huron River on Lake Erie, would get a wetlands interpretive center for \$500,000 under the same program.

Some are billing it as the "first in the state," but that's not quite so. There is an excellent wetlands nature center and trail operated by the federal government in the upper peninsula—the Seney Wildlife Refuge. But that's 400 miles away. Pte. Mouillee is much closer.

The interpretive center will include ecological and wetlands exhibits as well as laboratories for student groups and an auditorium.

Tours—guided and unguided—will be offered.

FUNDING for all of this will come from many sources.

Purchasers of duck stamps will contribute \$300,000.

The friendly federal government is expected to be good for \$4.5 million.

State revenue bond funds could contribute \$400,000. Other state funds, including the general fund, will add about \$3 million.


esting to all three of us, and he asks ME what's new. What could possibly be new?

Why 7 is better than 6

The sooner the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education appoints a new member the better. Maybe, just maybe, the board can function better with a full complement of seven trustees than it does with six.

The board is temporarily short one member as a result of the resignation of George Lawton. And the first meeting conducted with six trustees was a total disaster. It must be that seven is a lucky number for the school board.

THE FIRST THING noticeable about Monday's school board meeting was its length—more than four hours.

The board had been pretty good about keeping meetings to three hours, wrapping up by 10:30 p.m. But Monday, the regular meeting ended close to midnight, and trustees still had an executive (secret) meeting to conduct afterwards.

The midnight ending hour wasn't the main problem, however. Time is only a symptom of the real problem. Based on the size of the agenda, and items of business to be conducted, the meeting could have been accomplished in two hours or three at a maximum.

But trustees wandered all over the place discussing issues, got lost in parliamentary procedure, and devoted far too much time debating issues which should have been settled months ago.

TAKE THE DEBATE on sixth grade instruments as an example.

The school board has known about this issue for months, and has known it was nearing a decision stage for 90 days, if not longer. I think it was two months ago when James Griffith, director of music at the CEP, first presented trustees a written report and recommendation.

The item appeared on a subsequent agenda and was tabled because it was decided a legal opinion should be obtained. But Monday night the legal opinion wasn't being debated. Trustees were debating whether to provide free instruments to sixth graders and, if they are provided, how to pay for replacing worn instruments. All the basic information on these two issues were contained in Griffith's report. There was plenty of time to discuss differences of opinion on both points—either at the regular board meeting when the item was first introduced and tabled, or at board workshops.

After all, one of the purposes of workshop meetings is to allow trustees to have a full airing of differences of opinion, and obtain all the facts, so they are prepared to make a decision at regular meetings.

THE REAL ZINGER, though, was a lengthy debate on whether to accept bids for four construction projects to be financed by the 1974 bond issue.

For some reason which only trustees know (and that's doubtful), board members decided to debate the merits of individual projects. There was some discussion on the actual bids, but most of the debate was devoted to the wisdom of proceeding with the four projects.

Five trustees have known for a year—some longer—that the projects must be completed or the district would have a balance in the 1974 bond issue account of almost \$469,000 which could not be spent.

Yet they wasted a great deal of time debating the merits of the projects, voted down the bids, and then had to untangle the motion and approve the bids project by project. Approval was

finally given when it was hammered home that the board could not spend money on other projects (roof, air conditioning for year-round schools) until these four projects were completed. The fact is that before the very first vote was cast, at least five trustees knew this was the case. I suspect all six did.

What some trustees were doing was attempting to second-guess the mandate of voters given in 1974. Time has passed, but state law requires "completion" of projects approved in a bond issue. The board did have some leeway, which it exercised, as the law allows projects to be scaled down. Thus, only four tennis courts will have metered lighting at Plymouth Canton High instead of 14 courts. But the projects must be done before any balance can be released for other work.

The board had held at least one workshop and I think two were held during the past year discussing legal requirements and how the projects could be scaled down to leave more money for new projects which are more necessary in 1978.

That requirement was fully aired at workshop sessions, and regular meetings also. Yet some trustees stumbled around debating the wisdom of the projects and suggesting they be dumped.

I was amazed the board got so hopelessly lost on the '74 bond issue construction project bids. Trustees should have been prepared to do what needed to be done, and were in leftfield trying to undo what '74 voters asked to be done.

I don't know if the seventh member will help much. But after Monday night anything is worth trying.

How the YMCA is trying to address elderly needs

The winter program for the Canton, Northville, Plymouth YMCA runs the gamut with everything from "Kreatives" for kiddies to wine-cheese tasting parties for adults.

But this year director Janet Luce has added a new touch, which may need support from residents.

The CNP-Y has always reserved a portion of its time for needs of senior citizens. Transportation, telephone calls, letter writing and reading have all been provided.

Now, thanks to a CETA grant from the federal government, the CNP-Y wants to get in the general maintenance business.

But it has specific projects in mind, and for special cases.

For example, home maintenance would be offered to senior citizens who are unable to pay for needed repairs and general maintenance service.

Services might include small electrical repairs, such as doorbells, fuses, or re-wiring lamps; or fixing broken windows, leaky faucets or toilets, eaves trough cleaning, snow removal, house-painting, lawn care, and others.

The CNP-Y board of directors said the service is not intended to compete with private contractors performing such chores. It is, instead, designed to


assist people who can't perform the jobs themselves because of their age, or can't afford to hire them done.

CNP-Y is hoping that someone in the maintenance business in the Canton-Plymouth area might help locate a person, perhaps retired or presently unemployed, who would be interested in serving the CNP-Y as its maintenance aide.

While the CNP-Y has its grant—enough to pay a fix-it man \$166.73 weekly until SEPT. '82—it cannot find a person to do the fixing.

So the CNP-Y could use some help, first to locate a reliable maintenance man who would enjoy working from now until next fall, and then to inform senior citizens who may need help with their chores that it's available at CNP-Y.

AND, AS HE LOOKS back The Stroller recalls that it wasn't only the after-hours places that served free food. They did it in the legitimate hotels.

Well, he recalls when he started dating down in the Dutch Country it was the policy to take the girl friend to Orpheum Theater, the best vaudeville house in the area. Following the show it was a leisurely walk up the main street in Allentown, Pa. to do a bit of window shopping on the way to the Hotel Allen.

There, in the Rathskeller, the chef appeared every Saturday night at 10 p.m. with a roast pig on a steam table. He carved it as you wished and it was free. It mattered not that we were not old enough to drink liquor. So we had Coke and pig.

At another place, not far away, on Saturday nights, they served roast beef, mashed potatoes and gravy and charged only a nickel.

The Stroller never thought he would see the like of that again. But when he arrived in Detroit, during the blind pig days, free food was used as even more of an attraction.

In the more uppity blind pigs, then

fashionably known as clubs, the food was priced cheap—and what food it was!

It was in the Ash Trumbull Club that The Stroller met Carl Rosenfield, now the owner of the nationally-known Carl's Chop House, and even then there he served some of the best steaks in town. They were priced at only \$1.25 with all the trimmings.

There were places like Allen's on Michigan Avenue where you were handed the knife and told to cut your own slice of roast beef right off the big round.

At Arthur Clamage's place in the alley behind the old Avenue Theater on Woodward Avenue, you were served a bowl of the best soup in town. The Stroller's mouth waters now for some of the meals at Monty's on Linwood, and Al Werbe's in the Wolverine Hotel. And the old Chesterfield Club at Gratiot and Eight-Mile Road.

The food always was the best—and the price was right. So, is it any wonder when The Stroller looked at the menus for the New Year's Eve parties the other night that he longed for the good old days? They were something out of this world for a fellow with an appetite. We may never see the time again when food will be given away in the hope that you will buy a drink or two.

Regulate business signs for a community balance

Editor:

The Canton Committee of the Northville, Plymouth, Canton and Novi League of Women Voters (LWV), as a part of their continuing land use study, has examined the need for revisions to the ordinance in Canton relating to signs and has reached the following consensus:

A unit of government needs a sign ordinance. Attractive signs can be an asset to a community. With a well-planned and enforceable ordinance, signs can provide business identification; aid the growth and prosperity of the business community; enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors and provide aesthetically pleasing visual communication.

However, uncontrolled sign usage can have a detrimental effect on a community. The absence of restrictions on size, height, placement and construction of signs can create hazardous traffic conditions; endanger the health, safety and welfare of the people; decrease the effectiveness of the signs and contribute to the deterioration of the business community and adjacent areas.

In order to insure the highest quality visual environment for a community,

rules and regulations should be formulated with all facets of the community considered. This is a function of the local government.

A sign ordinance should include a glossary which clearly defines the terms found within the ordinance, a workable system for enforcement, and a suggested timetable for periodic review of the ordinance.

Study has shown that the most effective and clearly defined sign ordinances use a format related to zoning districts and include regulations about the height of the sign (grade level should be used as a basis for determining height), total face area of the sign, placement, and construction specifications.

A useful tool to increase the effectiveness of each individual sign is limited the number of message units used per sign. A message unit is defined as one word, one abbreviation, one logo, one symbol, one number containing up to seven digits and one set of initials containing up to seven letters.

GENERALLY, the size of a sign should be proportionate with the land use. For example, smaller signs would be located in agricultural and residential districts—and large signs would be placed in industrial districts.

Restrictions on size, height, lighting and placement, while being proportionately related to the size of the building, may have to be modified so as not to infringe on the rights of adjacent zoning districts.

To minimize visual pollution, the use of off-premise roof and right angle signs should be discouraged. Billboard use should be restricted to local businesses and products manufactured within the community.

A bonus system should be considered whereby certain restrictions could be waived or relaxed to encourage aesthetically pleasing signs. For example, a sign constructed of natural

materials and incorporating landscaping into its design would be eligible for certain concessions.

Sign design and landscaping plans should be considered at the time of site plan approval for the most effective use of a sign ordinance.

Tactics used by anti-rape group damage cause

Lately we've seen the subject of rape come into the open.

Women are confronting the issue by demanding stricter laws governing convicted rapists and help for the physically and emotionally damaged victims. Women are learning rape prevention and self-defense instead of hearing the old, crude joke about lying back and enjoying it.

With this new-found rape awareness, however, come groups which appear to be out to make money by exploiting women's fears. This was done in a 56-page booklet, "What You Had Better Know about Rape," which is being sold for \$10 by telephone solicitors, and by offering marked-up products such as "shriek alarms," doorstop alarms and flashing lights.

TELEPHONE SOLICITORS, employed by D&D Advertising, are calling women in Wayne and Oakland counties and reportedly hawking these products with a hard-sell approach.

If they refuse to buy, women are asked "why" they don't want the anti-rape equipment and, in at least one instance, warned of the alternative.

D&D solicitors are selling the products for a non-

profit corporation called Citizens Against Rape, Inc. (CAR) and its non-profit affiliate, Dale Corp. of Warren. Along with the \$10 pamphlet and expensive equipment, buyers also receive "associate membership" in CAR.

The booklet is worth \$3, at most. The information contained in the booklet is fairly solid but overpriced.

DALE JABLONSKI, president of Dale Corp., said his firm and the telephone solicitor firm are being paid "a standard retainer fee" by CAR. He refused to say what that fee is.

Proceeds for the non-profit CAR, said Jablonski, who doubles as CAR's public relations man, will be used by CAR to hire speakers, such as Oakland County psychologist Bruce Danto.

Dr. Danto said Monday he will give a CAR-sponsored speech without fee on Feb. 16 on "Psycho Prints."

So where will the money go? Some to Dale Corp., some to D&D Advertising; and some to CAR, where the money will be used to promote "rape awareness and rape education," according to CAR President Cynthia Kleiner.

MS. KLEINER is listed on corporation papers filed with the state as resident agent of CAR.

But there is no office for CAR's staff, and its telephone number and address are the same as Dale Corp.

Dale Corp. also publishes booklets on crime prevention for various police non-profit organizations such as the Michigan Fraternal Order of Police and the Detroit Lieutenants and Sergeants Association. Phone solicitations also are done for these organizations, and any complaints about the conduct of solicitors or the promotion ring at the Dale Corp. headquarters, not at the non-profit agency—just as is the case with Citizens Against Rape, Inc.

AND AFTER LAST week's phone blitz for anti-rape equipment and the \$10 booklet, there were complaints from people contacted by the solicitors.

A Southfield woman on Guy Street said "I couldn't believe my ears" when the solicitor put the hard-sell approach on after she said she wasn't interested in buying an alarm, light or booklet.

"I had spoken to them about my three daughters, aged 14, 11 and 7," said the woman, who asked not to be identified.

"When I told them I wasn't interested, the girl (solicitor) said, 'Well, maybe when one of your daughters gets raped, you'll wish they had the equipment.'"

"I don't mind someone talking about rape, but don't wish it on my three daughters," she said.

The recent activities of Dale Corp. and D&D Advertising make one wonder about those who earn salaries and fees, if not profits, by exploiting fear.

Super Bowl can outdraw Mardi Gras

Super Bowl is over for the year, and New Orleans is slowly recovering from the invasion of Dallas and Denver fans.

Local people said that Super Bowl activities had more economic impact on the town than the Mardi Gras because so many out-of-staters came to town.

If you wanted a hotel room, you had to pay for five nights. Even then every hotel room in the city was taken. Local people even rented out their apartments to desperate fans who couldn't find a place to rest their weary heads. Many Denverites arrived in motor homes because they couldn't get hotel reservations.

All the good restaurants that took reservations were committed all week long. Most reservations were made months ago.

Every rented car from the national agencies was taken.

On Monday after the game, every flight out of New Orleans was booked solid.

SOMEWHERE BETWEEN 60,000 and 100,000 people from other areas spent time in New Orleans eating, sleeping, drinking and otherwise spending money.

New Orleans has a city tax, a state tax and an amusement tax amounting totally to eight per cent which is added to every drink served. Hotel rooms are taxed at six per cent. These taxes help pay for schools, welfare, police protection and so forth by people who will never use these services.

New Orleans has been selected for the game several times because it is considered part of the southern belt, yet the weather was freezing. In fact, it seemed colder than metropolitan Detroit

because it was a damp cold.

In the last four Super Bowls, only in Pasadena in 1977 was the weather sunny and warm. The other three years in New Orleans and Miami, it was either freezing or raining. Of course, New Orleans has now solved the problem of game conditions with its new superdome.

THE SUPERDOME in New Orleans is similar to Silverdome in Pontiac in that it is an enclosed stadium.

But it is not exactly alike. It cost more than \$170 million to build. Silverdome cost around \$57 million to build.

New Orleans' stadium can also handle baseball games, which Silverdome can't, but the layout means fans are not as close to the field as they are in Silverdome.

There were around 74,500 fans at Super Bowl XII, which was a sellout. Silverdome holds 80,300 persons.

If you spend the five days before the game in the city where the game is to be played, the game itself is almost an anti-climax. At least this was true Sunday because the Denver fans really took over New Orleans and got the whole town rooting

for them when the game started.

Unfortunately, Denver blew the game in the first half, and the town was fairly quiet afterwards. Had the Orange Crush won, the fans would have added a couple of days of celebrating to Super Bowl week.

THE ACTIVITIES organized for Super Bowl week are mostly for the team owners and staffs, the press, celebrities and local politicians.

Individual companies use the event for incentives for sales persons or promotion, so there are separate events such as golf tournaments or private parties and private entertaining.

The biggest event is Pete Rozelle's party, which the National Football League held Friday night for about 2,500 persons.

There is nothing scheduled for the average fan, so he must find his own entertainment.


There is no problem in New Orleans because people can congregate in the French Quarter where there are many bars with Dixieland bands and tipless go-go dancers. Also, most larger hotels are located in this area, which makes it convenient.

If metropolitan Detroit were to get Super Bowl in 1981, someone would have to figure out where the fans should go to exhaust their energies.

Super Bowl was busy, exciting and exhausting but a tremendous shot in the arm for the economy of New Orleans.

It would be a real feather in our economic cap if we can get it here in 1981.

How to eat those (yech!) vegetables

Item in the news: Restaurants, even classy ones, are gradually omitting the vegetable offerings on their menus. Patrons seem quite happy with meat, potatoes and salad, thank you.

Other items: Many school boards are content to let students make their noonday meals of "junk" foods—with all their sugar, salt and starch—because the kids won't eat "basic" foods.

These items lead the health food fans I chum around with to wonder aloud if America's low level of economic productivity and the kids' declining academic test scores might be due as much to malnutrition as to sociology.

YOU CAN LEARN a lot about nutrition in the books and magazine articles on today's market, but there's one lesson I haven't seen in print in years.

It's the lesson in how to eat vegetables which are good for you but which you don't like. I stumbled across the lesson in my youth, and the application of this knowledge at the dinner table preserved a good deal of domestic tranquility.

Hold your breath as you chew.

If you hold your breath when you eat vegetables, you can't taste them. Your taste buds can detect only sweet, sour, salt and bitter. Everything else you "taste" is really by smell.

Hold your breath when eating broccoli or brussels sprouts or spinnidge and you won't suffer a bit.

Holding my breath caused the lady of the house to frown, but she couldn't complain because the rule was I had to eat those vegetables—not enjoy them, not taste them.

IT'S AMAZING to think about the food of those World War II days, when I was in swaddling clothes.

Most folks had "victory gardens." Ours was on Fielding in Detroit, on lots that became GI housing after 1946.

It provided plenty of vegetables. You can't grow french fries, pretzels, tacos and pizza in a garden. Sugar was rationed, and consumption of candy was discouraged for reasons of patriotism.

Meat was rationed, too, but you could get tinned meats called Spam and Prem. Impossible as it may sound, they were worse than vegetables. Tastes change with age, and I now enjoy green beans, spinnidge, pears, scotch and all sorts of things I couldn't stand to smell as a kid, but I won't touch Spam, even if they buy an ad in this paper.

For years The Stroller has scanned the classified ad sections of every paper on which he could lay his hands, hoping against hope that some day, somewhere, he would come across a man or woman who would have an old-fashioned wooden Indian for sale.

This longing for a statue of an Indian has been with The Stroller for years, and especially after he moved to what was "the country" in 1938. As he walked about the garden, he could visualize what a fine garden decoration it would be.

In fact, he often had given thought to having the statue at the entrance to the driveway of his home—just to let folks know he was proud of the Indian strain in his background. You see, The Stroller's great-great-grandmother was a full-fledged Indian squaw named Kern.

But every time he thought he had a lead on the statue, he found himself walking up a blind alley, and the desire became a dream.

THEN THE OTHER morning as he peered out between the long icicles hanging from the roof, he saw the mailman plodding through the snow with a package in his hands.

What could it be? The Stroller couldn't recall anything he had ordered. Nor could it be, a belated Christmas gift.

When he mailman handed him a package, he said, "Here's something to take your mind off the ice and snow."

Sure enough, it was a volume—sent gratis—of the latest in garden books and lawn ornaments. The Stroller took one look and smilingly thanked the mailman and said, "I hope it contains what I have been looking for for years—a wooden Indian."

Hurriedly, The Stroller scanned the

pages. He was impressed with the garden arrangements of flowers, the floral trellises, the rose-covered fences, the little statues, the fountains, the vases.

But nowhere in the neatly produced volume was the least sign of a wooden Indian. There were Mexicans with their little donkeys and burros. There were small jockeys with an outstretched hand as in the old days when they were hitching posts for horses. There were all sorts of animals in the garden booklet—swans, hens and chickens and even a life-sized horse for folks who raise horses on their estates.

But nowhere was there a wooden Indian.

SOME YEARS AGO, The Stroller was told that a chap down in the suburbs of Terre Haute, Ind., had several wooden Indians and that, if contacted, he might sell them.

Eagerly, The Stroller contacted the gent. He was certain he was on the right track now. It took about a dozen phone calls to finally locate him. He admitted he had two fine statues that used to grace the entrances to the cigar stores of years ago.

How much would he want for one? The Stroller asked.

For a moment there was silence. Then came the answer: "I'll take \$750 for each of them. I know the price sounds high, but these are prize items now."

There was another moment of silence as The Stroller pondered the nerve of a man who would ask \$750 for a wooden Indian.

The Hoosier on the other end of the line said, "I can't sell you one. You have to take both. You see, I've got a chief and a squaw. I think they are man and wife. I have never attempted

to break up a family in my life. These two Indians have been with me a long time, and it would be a crime to separate them now."

Needless to say, The Stroller didn't make the purchase, but that is as close as he ever has come to the statue he would like to have as a garden ornament.

THE URGE to obtain one of these copper-colored men was given impetus one afternoon when his wife Leona, listening to the plea, remarked that The Stroller was not the only one in the family with a trace of Indian blood.

My great-great-grandparents lived on Harsen's Island just off the shores of Algonac, and I have been told that the great-great-grandmother was a Walpole Indian.

Now, The Stroller knows he must get the statue of his desire.

It is a funny thing. There used to be an Indian standing in front of almost every cigar store in the area—not only in metropolitan Detroit but across the country. Now there isn't a sight of one.

Full time auto and radio mechanics. A headquarters building equipped with a large garage, for vehicle maintenance, and adequate jail facilities for the detention of prisoners. Full services of the Detective bureau, Youth bureau, Metro Squad, Identification and Crime Lab, Women's division, Traffic division, and Helicopter division.

Canton Township will have none of these, and even though the cost of these services will no doubt increase in future years, they will never cost as much as it would to create and maintain them from scratch. Any police agency must eventually have these services to be effective.

I would like to make one final point. The sheriff is presently faced with the unpleasant task of laying off more than 70 officers who are presently full time employees of the department, forcing even more people into the ranks of the unemployed. Canton Township, on the other hand, is considering giving jobs, that could be filled by these qualified officers, to other

part-time officers who, for the most part, are holding some other full-time job. Even if they are not selected to a full-time position with Canton Township Police Department, these men will not have to worry about supporting their families. Is this fair?

I have nothing against the present Canton Township police officers, and I feel that they are no less qualified than anyone else, but in my opinion, plain common sense and good business tactics would tell me that the smartest move for us taxpayers in Canton Township is to contract with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.



Adult modelers create works of art

Model kits aren't just for kids.

A visit to the Blue Max hobby shop in Canton proves the point. There co-owners Bob Mills and Max Bell cringe everytime a customer refers to their "toy soldiers" and "toy airplanes."

After all, the men have spent 100 or more hours on a single model, and the result is not a toy.

Mills' specialty is models of human figures. Bell's expertise is centered on model aircraft.

And it was their hobby that brought them together in business.

"I guess you'd call us the walking wounded. Both of us had been injured on our jobs and had to find a new way to earn a living. We enjoyed modeling very much and agreed we like to help others enjoy the hobby," said Mills.

The Blue Max opened 3½ months ago.

ITS CABINETS are filled with the handwork of Mills and other modelers, both youths and adults.

The aircraft suspended from the ceiling were constructed by Bell.

He favors vac-u-form starter kits—made of plastic which is vacuum-drawn over a mold. All major components are in a sheet of white plastic which is cut with a hot knife or an Exacto.

The aircraft models are of hard-to-find planes "passed over by most companies," said Mills. "These cover the historical end of aviation. They give the modeler an opportunity to build what they want—the more unusual aircraft."

The results are picture-perfect miniatures. "There's a Fieseler Storch," said Mills. "Rommel used one of those for observation in North Africa. Most of our adult modelers are historians."

"People who are into it have extensive reference libraries and add to them continually. We stress research. They should find out everything about it before they build." He has about \$10,000 invested in his own reference library.

The shop stocks a variety of magazines containing historical backgrounds and color plates of the models.

"THERE IS no time limit on the figures. They go from Neanderthal man to the future.

"There also are characters from fiction and fantasy. Your imagination is the only limit," said Mills.

The showcase also holds a historical pageant, including Chesty Puller, Lt. General in U.S. Marine Corps. The model depicts Puller as a colonel in 1943. Wearing a simple drab uniform, Chesty was a prize winner.

"There were many brilliant, flamboyant uniforms in the contest," said Mills. "I was surprised when he won."

Also included are models of Stone-wall Jackson, a 7th cavalry officer; Erroll Flynn as Geoffrey Hawk; Loki, evil god of Norse mythology; a Mideast slave auction; a Viking killing

a monk; Anne Boleyn; a Saxon and a Norman from the 1060s; Seneca warrior; Wyatt Earp; Doc Holliday; a French Foreign Legionnaire, another prize winner; Robin Hood; Henry V in full uniform; Civil War and Revolutionary War generals; a Greek archer; and an Italian pilot with his dog.

THE FIGURES are available in many scales but the 54 mm is most popular.

Walter Plank, the pirate, is a larger figure. Mill says he already has spent 120 hours on the pirate and it is not finished. "I have to do the veining in the hands."

Pointing to a helicopter, he said, "the builder spent a year on this one and it has taken first place everywhere it was shown."

It started out as a \$1.75 kit but cost \$100 before it was finished.

Mills and Bell are members of the International Plastic Modeling Society. The local branch, which has more than 50 members, meets every two weeks in Livonia. The society has its own publications and annual conventions.

"We swap information and show each other what we are doing at the meetings," said Mills. "Our wives really enjoy the conventions. When they meet all the people involved in the hobby, they are more understanding about our involvement."

"YOU WILL FIND almost every occupation (interested in modeling). There are doctors—especially surgeons—lawyers, airline pilots and cargo people, just about everyone," said Mills. "My partner was formerly a truck driver."

Most of the models are made in England, France, Italy, Germany and Japan. "The Historex series from France has about 200 figures from the Napoleonic era—French troops and those from the armies which opposed him."

Mills has great admiration for the sculptors who create the original figures for the molds.

"Some of the artists free lance and the manufacturers have their own artists. I'd like to take a course in sculpture and try my hand at it some day."

"The British are way ahead of us. They have been using oils for years. I just started to use oils four years ago—the texture, the colors, the details are so much better with oils."

Bell talked as he opened a new shipment. "Here they are," he said, "just what we've been waiting for—R2-D2 and C-3PO."

He continued, "Techniques change. So many of the processes I went through can now be eliminated. We have Cub Scout troops come in and we display the kids' models in the shop. Everyone learns from one model to the next."







Jazz leader Phil Woods and his quintet will kick off the Winter Concert Series at the University of Michigan-Dearborn at 8 and 10:30 p.m., Jan. 20 in the campus' Recreation Organization Center.

U of M-D's Office of Student Life Program Board and Just Jazz are sponsoring the performance.

"This concert opens up a new dimension for the Just Jazz series," explains U of M-D student coordinator Fred Sattler. "In the past we have primarily focused on providing a forum for Detroit talent like Tribe, Ron English, and Mixed Bag. In the future we also hope to expose local audiences to artists who reflect musical development on the national scene."

Woods has been a major figure in jazz for 25 years. He has rarely performed in this area and has played in every style from swing, bop and cool to free, electric and funk.

WOODS HAS WORKED and recorded with a wide variety of performers ranging from Billy Joel, Steely Dan and Paul Simon to Quincy

Jones, Thelonious Monk, Dizzy Gillespie, Donald Byrd and Benny Goodman.

The 1977 Downbeat Readers' Poll listed him as the top alto sax player and as one of the top five soprano sax players. His quintet was listed as one of the 10 best jazz groups, and their recent album "Live from the Showboat" was praised as one of the 10 best albums of the year. He has also won previous Downbeat Critics' and Readers' polls.

Woods' performance on the Michael Legrand album "Images" earned two Grammy awards, while his own albums have won excellent reviews in Variety, Time, Billboard, Stereo Review, Record World and Cashbox.

The quintet also includes pianist Mike Mellilo, drummer Bill Goodwin, guitarist Harry Leahey, and bass player Steve Gilmore.

Goodwin has recorded with Keith Jarrett, Jefferson Airplane, Mose Allison and Gary Burton, while Gilmore has recorded with the Thad Jones-Mel Lewis Orchestra. Leahey has worked with Gerry Mulligan, while Mellilo, a classically trained composer and arranger, has played with Art Farmer, Sonny Rollins and Coleman Hawkins.

Review

Kottler awesome, Oakway mixed

Francesco Di Blasi led the Oakway Symphony in a program Saturday night that featured pianist Mischa Kottler in a performance of the Rachmaninoff second piano concerto, and opened with a selection of varied orchestral pieces.

Of the openers—Frescobaldi, Handel Water Music, Sibelius and Berlioz—the Sibelius "Swan of Tuonela" was the most beautiful, and three dances from Berlioz' "The Damnation of Faust" were the most challenging to the orchestra.

"The Swan of Tuonela" is a tone poem. It describes the swan who swims in the Finns' equivalent of Hades, as described in the epic poem "Kalevala."

The excellent, tonally rich playing captured the feeling of swanhood. The tempo, however, was just a little hurried, robbing the performance of more real beauty that might have been there. The spooky string accompaniment was properly kept down, and one passage, where cello, violin and English horn all play in succession a long phrase without a "breath," was particularly lovely.

THE BERLIOZ DANCES were more of a challenge for the orchestra. The sprites sounded more like housewives on the way to the supermarket than sprites, and the sylphs were tenuous and uncertain, because string players' attention to getting all the notes precluded much freedom for interpretation.

However, the Rakoczy March really moved and had tonal color and spirit, and it gave a rousing end to the first half of the concert.

Di Blasi's conducting asks more from the players than he gets. He is not a dramatic, flayboyant conductor but really knows what he wants. For instance, contrasts between loud and soft passages, full rich string sounds, broadness, playfulness—and it is rather disconcerting to see him ask for these interpretations, wait for the delivery, and have only intermittent success.

MISCHA KOTTLER, Russian-born Detroit pianist, who solos fairly regularly with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, used his scientific, incredible technique to interpret the warm, human Rachmaninoff C Minor Piano Concerto without any noticeable effort.

Watching Kottler, whose manner is a curious mixture of humility and a subtle mischievousness, is a little like watching Horowitz—it's awesome. There's so much poet because the hands can do so much. Neither pianist makes any extraneous motions—no swaying, leaning or artful gestures to distract the audience.

There is a difference, however. Where Horowitz, intent on communicating, wins his audience through a supreme involvement in the music, there is a detachment about Kottler's playing.

THE PERFORMANCE WAS UNIFIED, balanced, full of rich beautiful sounds, even though several times Kottler's holding back for economy's sake caused a muddy, indistinct sound that couldn't be blamed on acoustics. Difficulties were minimal. One of them was the string pizzicato in the last movement which almost drowned out the piano with its awkward clucking. But overall, the performance satisfied the audience, which gave Kottler and Di Blasi a standing ovation.

The Oakway Symphony's next concert is March 19 at Seaholm High School in Birmingham.

Rampal with DSO this weekend

Werner Torkanowsky, guest conductor and associate to the music director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, DSO, will conduct as world-famous flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal appears in three concerts at Ford Auditorium Jan. 19, 20 and 21.

Thursday and Saturday concerts are at 8:30 p.m., and Friday's NBD coffee concert is at 10:45 a.m., preceded by a complimentary coffee hour at 9:30 a.m. There will be an on-stage pre-concert interview with Maestro Torkanowsky at 10:15.

The program will include Beethoven's overture to "Egmont," Khachaturian's Flute Concerto—in its first DSO performance, and Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 4.

Jean-Pierre Rampal has been called "one of the greatest flutists of history" by the New York Times. His world-wide popularity stems both from his global tours and a huge output of recordings of virtually the entire repertoire for the flute.

Werner Torkanowsky was born in Geramny and emigrated with his parents to Israel when he was six years old. He received his earliest training from his mother, a concert pianist. He became the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's guest conductor and associate to the music director in September of 1977.

Jean-Pierre Rampal was born in Marseilles, France, the son of a flutist who played with the Marseilles opera and taught at the local conservatory. Young Rampal received flute lessons from an early age, but his father intended Jean-Pierre for the medical profession.

In the third year of medical school he was called up for military service under the German occupation. He hid from the military authorities in Paris, where he attended flute classes at the Conservatoire, graduating in five months with the first prize in flute. After the liberation of Paris, Rampal became first flute with the Paris Opera, gave solo recitals on the radio, and joined forces with harpsichordist Robert Veyron-Lacroix, touring the musical capitals of Europe.





Grapplers take 3d tourney title

Glenn relishes Plymouth visit

Revenge is always sweet but for Westland John Glenn it was even more special as the Rockets turned the table on long-time rival Wayne Memorial by winning the third-annual Plymouth Salem Wrestling Invitational last Saturday.

Just one week earlier, Wayne defeated John Glenn in the 32-team Schoolcraft Invitational. When the Rockets visit the Salem gymnasium, however, it's always a different story.

The Westland grapplers have always been very successful in Plymouth and Saturday's tourney victory marked the third-straight time John Glenn has taken home Plymouth's first-place trophy.

The host team from Salem suffered from the absence of three starters in its lineup and finished a distant third. Redford Thurston, resting most of its top grapplers because of a heavy dual-meet schedule this week, placed fifth.

Livonia Stevenson placed eighth and Plymouth Canton finished 10th to round out the top 10 Observer & Eccentric squads participating in the 15-team event.

Highland Park, which replaced Novi as the 46th squad, failed to show for the tourney.

John Glenn went into the finals with a 21-point lead over Wayne, 184-163, and gained 10 more points on their rivals with four tournament champions. Glenn placed seven matmen in the finals while Wayne posted six representatives.

"I think overall we wrestled better this week," said a delighted Glenn coach Bob Lusk. "I felt, coming here, Wayne should be favored but I was pleased that we wrestled so well."

"Having more teams in the School-

craft Invitational spread the points and proved more of a factor in the results."

Plymouth Salem and Mount Clemens (the fourth-place finishers) each placed four grapplers in the final round. The Rocks held a 10-point lead on Mount Clemens going into the finals and maintained that margin at the end.

"Without having three kids, I was pleased with the way we finished," said Salem coach and tournament host Ron Krueger. "I felt we had a shot at 65 more points if we had our full lineup."

Mount Clemens' 147-pound grappler Fred Worthem, a state champion last year, increased his undefeated record to 30-0 with a 13-0 superior decision over Jim Fairchild of Wayne. Because of his dominance in this weight class, Worthem was chosen the tournament's Most Valuable Wrestler on a vote of the coaches. Worthem received eight of the 15 first-place votes.

All but one of the championship matches were won by decisions. Most of these matches featured many close, last-second victories—and a few upsets which saw two Schoolcraft champions fail to win.

The four Glenn victors included Paul Demers, Bill Meyer, Jeff Doyle, and Jeff Null. Randy Viperman and Rene Leist each won matches for Plymouth Salem.

Ypsilanti was the only disappointing team in the tourney, placing a surprisingly low sixth among their opponents. The Braves wrestled without a number of their top grapplers.

The only restless moment for Glenn's coach Lusk came at the 157-pound championship match when he found himself coaching against his son, Dave Lusk, from Wayne. Glenn's Bill Meyer defeated Lusk in the final seconds of the third period.

Running Cougars stop Canton's streak, 54-53

Larry Jackson is up to his old tricks again.

The former Livonia Bentley basketball coach, who was always known for his run-and-gun offensive philosophy, gave Plymouth Canton a little dose of the fastbreak—but this time it was from the bench of the Dearborn Heights Annapolis Cougars.

Annapolis, not one of the well-known basketball schools in the state, is quickly getting on the map under Jackson—just ask the Chiefs.

Suffering from a letdown of a three-game winning streak and an important Western Six League victory over Waterford Mott last Friday night, the Chiefs succumbed to the Cougars' fastbreak, losing a close 54-53 decision Tuesday night at the Canton gym.

Actually, the game wasn't as close as the score indicates until a late Chief rally in the final quarter almost pulled it out for the Plymouth squad.

Annapolis raced to a quick 18-11 lead and increased it to 37-25 at halftime enroute to the non-league victory—its eighth in 11 starts.

The Chiefs, currently 5-5 overall, played a poor transition game in that first half, failing on numerous occasions to get back on defense to prevent the fastbreak.

Only the sharp-eye shooting of junior guard sensation Butch King kept the Chiefs in the game—and kept the Plymouth fans from going to sleep.

King scored 16 points in the first half and added

18 the second half to lead the Canton rally which fell short. King's 34 points included 15 of 25 shots from the floor and four of six from the charity line.

Canton closed the Cougars' lead to 47-37 after three quarters, but made the final rush in the fourth period, holding Annapolis to only two field goals during the eight-minute span.

The Chiefs finally tied the score at 51-51 with 39 seconds left, but Annapolis' leading scorer Tom Marijanovich countered with a three-point play to ice the game.

Canton had one last chance in the waning seconds. King hit a 22-footer to cut the Cougar lead to 54-53 and the inbound pass resulted in an Annapolis turnover with only five seconds left.

Canton set up for the final shot which would have won the game, but Kurt Herbert's 12-footer missed the mark and Randy Rienas' follow-up shot failed as the clock ran out.

Rock cagers polish off frisky Edsel Ford, 64-59

The two-game losing streak of the Plymouth Salem basketball team came to an abrupt halt Tuesday night when the Rocks defeated Dearborn Edsel Ford, 64-59, in Suburban Eight League action at the T-Birds' gym.

The victory gave the Rocks a 9-2 overall record and a 5-2 mark in the conference. Bentley's 58-51 victory over Belleville the same night kept the Bulldogs in first place with a 6-0 record. Salem moved into second place one-a-half game behind the leaders. Belleville stands at 3-2 and Edsel Ford is 4-3.

Salem jumped out to a quick 19-14 lead after the first quarter of play and held a slim 31-29 advantage at halftime.

Salem hit on 26 of 65 shots from the floor for 41 per cent. Edsel Ford hit on 25 of 53 from the floor for 47 per cent.

Cage seasons offer interesting switch

When one examines the Plymouth

Canton and Plymouth/Salem roundballers, it seems there is an interesting reversal of positions compared to last season.

Salem coach Fred Thomann said for the first time in five years his squad faces "must" league games every time it steps out on the court. He added that he believed his team could still win the conference if they win the remaining eight games for a 12-2 record.

But one loss in the conference could result in the end of the Rocks' dynasty.

For basketball fans, it definitely will be an interesting second half of the season where Salem and Canton are concerned.

And many questions should be answered by the end of February.

Dave Visser broke out of a personal scoring slump to lead the Chiefs' offensive charges with 16 points. Brad Westin added 11.





The Chiefs lost the next two matches but six straight victories, five from seniors, turned the match into a rout.


Craig Lee, Jeff Rey and Wayne Memorial transfer Vince Novak pinned their opponents while Dave March and Kyle Heaton won by close
