## Blackout knocks out sewer line

Residents of Royal Holiday Mobile Home Park had to put up with a blackout and a sewer backup in addition to the blizzard last week.

When lights at the park went out, so did the electrical motors which pump sewage from Canton's north-east side under the I-275 expressway to the township's main branch.


Damage to sewage pumping equipment was estimated at \$7,000 by Jake Dingeldey, DPW superintendent.

Dingeldey said if his crew hadn't worked quickly Friday morning and afternoon, the sewage that was backing up out of the park's manholes could have posed a serious health threat. The park's clubhouse had a flooded basement, but Dingeldey said none of the trailers appeared to be contaminated by waste water.

A wet well pumping station at Lotz and Warren roads was flooded by storm and wastewater which flows by gravity from Royal Holiday to the site. Water rose nearly to the top of the 37-foot well because the electric pumps couldn't pump the water east.

A BULKHEAD, or plug, in the sewer was knocked out Friday, routing sewage from the trailer park into Westland's sewer system. On Tuesday, the out-of-commission pumping station was totally drained of sewage by Canton DRW workers using a truck with a suction tube.

CANTON WILL be billed for the flow that Westland handles. Stein praised his neighboring administrators for the cooperation they showed during the hectic weekend.

Dingeldey said he expects Westland will be receiving Royal Holiday's waste water for at least two months while Canton's equipment is repaired or replaced.

The 10-year-old pumping equipment will be examined by General

Electric for possible repair. A wrecker with a winch will be brought in to haul the machinery 37 feet up through the well.

Royal Holiday is located immediately west on the Westland boundary on Warren Road, east of Lotz.

## Roads cleared by contractors with federal aid

Three private companies were enlisted in the snow removal corps of Canton Township this week to clear clogged roads.

By telegram Friday, Canton received news from the federal government that the township was entitled to 75 per cent reimbursement for hiring private contractors to remove snow from the streets.

President Jimmy Carter's disaster aid directive stipulates that the federal government will only pay for plowing done by private contractors from Saturday, Jan. 28 to Wednesday, Feb. 1.

Canton Township will have to pick up the remaining 25 per cent cost of the plowing.

By Monday, Supervisor Harold Stein and the township board had authorized three contractors to handle the snow removal effort—A&P Construction Co., Storey Bros., and James Fulkerson of Canton.

SOME RESIDENTS pooled funds to hire a private contractor to plow the streets Friday and Saturday. People in Forestbrook subdivision at Palmer and Sheldon contracted with Mel's Auto Clinic of Canton at \$6 per household. The contractor worked 32 hours in two days at a price of \$25 an hour.

"It wasn't 10 minutes after he left before the rescue van had to come in because a boy stopped breathing," said Jim Donahue, head of the homeowner association.

Stein said Monday he'd try to get the federal government to reimburse the homeowners who hired a contractor to clear the streets.

The federal assistance grant is administered locally through Leland H. Onkka, an official with the Wayne

County Office of Emergency Preparedness.

In a special meeting Monday night, board members discussed the possibility of purchasing an emergency vehicle equipped with a snow plow and four-wheel-drive to use in the future.

Throughout the weekend, members of the Canton Police Department used borrowed snowmobiles and four-wheel-drive trucks to bring food and medical supplies to stranded residents.

"MY MAIN CONCERN right now," Stein said Monday, "is clearing out the subdivision streets. We've got about four heavy machines out there right now and by Wednesday the whole township should be taken care of."

County workers plowed major roads, but Stein said in some cases the private contractors hired by the township had to go over the roads the county plowed.

Police officers and other municipal employees worked double and even triple shifts the past weekend, answering phone calls from irate residents and responding to rescue runs.

"It's unbelievable how belligerent some of the people get," said Clerk John Flodin. "The road in front of their house is their only concern. They want it paved right then and there and don't even think that their street is just one street in the township."

Roads judged "critical" in Canton by Stein were Lotz, between Ford and Michigan; Ridge Road, between Cherry Hill and Warren; and Beck, between Cherry Hill and Geddes. These roads are all located in the southwest corner of Canton and the blowing snow drifted as high as eight feet in the farming area. Often it was impossible to tell where the road was supposed to be.

WHILE THE STORM brought out the best in most residents who pushed out stuck cars and took in neighbors who were without heat, Supervisor Stein said some tried to capitalize on the blizzard.

A Plymouth excavating contractor was contacted by Canton to clear the roads for an hourly fee. But his bid was rejected, according to Stein, when the contractor demanded a 48-hour payment guarantee.

"If he doesn't want to work, tell him to go to hell," Stein said to a DPW administrator. "How could I justify that kind of a contract with the federal government? You've really got to back up your records for federal reimbursement."

"God, that made me mad," Stein continued. "If it took 48 hours, he'd have been paid for 48 hours. But if it was all through in 24 hours that's what he'd get."

## 'Broken bricks' bug a builder

A builder who has charged Canton's Department of Public Works with smashing \$3,100 worth of bricks while moving two brick piles from the street to a construction site is threatening to sue the township to recoup his losses.

But Walter Guth, a township attorney, says Canton will not pay builder John Koss for the damaged bricks that were earmarked for two homes in Mayfair Village subdivision because Koss failed to heed a township directive to move the bricks himself.

Instead, Guth says the township will bill Koss for use of the backhoe that DPW workers used to move the bricks from a street in the subdivision near Morton, Taylor and Joy.

ACCORDING TO KOSS, DPW workers damaged 75 per cent of the bricks they moved because "improper" equipment was used. Because of the high cost of sorting out the undamaged bricks, Koss said he will pay his grading contractor a still undetermined fee to haul all the bricks away.

Koss's attorney, Peter Rogissart of Livonia, has met with Guth in an effort to recoup the bricks' estimated \$3,100 value for the contractor.

Rogissart doubts that an out-of-court settlement can be reached, and said he may file a lawsuit against the township to settle the dispute.

Guth maintains, however, that the township acted properly in moving the bricks after giving Koss a seven-day notice to move the bricks himself.

Kurt Johnston, the police officer who cited Koss for obstructing traffic on two Mayfair Village streets with the brick piles, said he told Koss on Jan. 6 to move the bricks by 4 p.m. Jan. 13.

Johnston said he telephoned Koss on Jan. 12 to tell the builder that township DPW workers would move the bricks themselves if Koss did not move them out of the street by the Jan. 13 deadline.

"We gave him warning out of court,"

Johnston, who also serves on the township's part-time police force. "He didn't even ask for extra time to move them."

"I didn't see any broken bricks," the officer said in disagreement to the builder's assessment of the damage. "The only bricks that were broken were the ones on the bottom that were frozen onto the road."

BUT KOSS, who claims that 75 per cent of the bricks were damaged, called the DPW's work "an unjust destruction of property."

## Local politicians line up for Royce Smith's job

Trustee Robert Myers may vacate his seat on the Canton Township board before his term expires next November if he hopes to fill a vacant seat on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

Myers, a rank-and-file member of the United Auto Workers (UAW), believes his chance for the seat recently vacated by Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith (D-Belleville) is good following an announcement that UAW Region 1A has endorsed his campaign.

The Wayne County board is considering Myers and six other 27th District residents—including Plymouth Trustee Maurice Breen, former Canton Trustee Jim Poole and Canton attorney Walter Hink—to take over the \$16,000-a-year post.

THE PERSON appointed to the county board will take over the

remainder of Smith's term which expires Dec. 31.

Smith resigned from his 27th District seat Jan. 23 to take over a newly-created position with the Wayne County Department of Public Works as chief administrator of the "Super Sewer."

The 27th District includes Canton, Plymouth Township, the City of Plymouth, a portion of Westland, a portion of Northville, Belleville and Van Buren Township.

Larry Gareau, public information coordinator for the county board, said county commissioners are expected to appoint one of the seven candidates to fill Smith's seat at their Feb. 16 meeting.

Candidates will vie for the Republican and Democratic nominations for a new two-year term on the county board at the regularly-scheduled Aug. 8 primary.

Three local residents in the running for Smith's vacant seat—Myers, Poole and Hink—said they will definitely run for the two-year county post whether they're appointed to fill Smith's term or not.

Breen, a Republican, said he would "consider" running for the slot.

Other candidates being considered by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners to fill Smith's seat are R. William Joyner, former administrative assistant to the Livonia mayor; Eugene O'Grady of Wayne, a retired deputy with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department; and Fred Montgomery.

ALTHOUGH MYERS believes his endorsement from UAW Region 1A will help his campaign for Smith's seat, the Canton trustee admits that endorsements from other unions will help other candidates.

UAW Region 1E endorses Joyner for the job, and the metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO endorses Montgomery. Hink, a Canton attorney who lives in Van Buren Township, has been endorsed by the Canton United Democratic Club and the Van Buren Democratic Club.

Myers said he will take a political leave of absence from his assembly line job at General Motors and resign from the Canton Township board if he is appointed to Smith's seat.

"I just think sitting on the township and county boards would be a conflict of interest," he said. "It just wouldn't be right to vote on county projects and then come back to the township and vote the other way."

Myers, 33, has served on the Canton board since 1974. He is president of the Michigan Mobile Home Owners Association, an executive committee member on the National Mobile Home Council and a member of the Michigan Mobile Home Commission.

Breen, a 45-year-old Plymouth attorney, said he will "consider" resigning from his trustee position on the Plymouth Township board if he receives the county board appointment.

Breen has served on the Plymouth Township board from 1976 to the pre-

# Random workshop's moved


Because public interest is expected to draw a large audience, the workshop on random selection has been moved to the Plymouth Canton High Little Theater.

# Worn-out bus woes worry Nankin Transit

A bus, is a bus, is a bus—until it breaks down.

Which is what buses across the state—including Nankin Transit Commission (NTC) buses—have been doing more and more of lately, 14 months after a state-ordered moratorium on new bus purchases took effect.

Lansing politicians have spent more than a year wrangling over whether new buses bought by Michigan transportation systems should be required to be equipped so people in wheelchairs can get on board.

"What they were trying to do was make the world stop until they made up their minds. It's been impossible for us or any other transportation authority in the state to buy buses," said Michael Dewey, small bus systems manager for Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA).

Garden City Council recently passed a resolution introduced by council member Ronald Tyszkiewicz asking

legislators and the governor to arrive at a "total transportation package" for Michigan as soon as possible.

The effect of the state moratorium has been particularly hard on the NTC, which serves Garden City, Westland, Canton Township, Inkster and Wayne.

"Most of the small bus systems use vans, and they aren't designed to run 10 years, like the line-haul buses are," said Dewey.

In fact, NTC Chairman Glenn Shaw says he would replace half the buses tomorrow, if the moratorium was lifted and funds were available. Shaw said there is enough demand and enough funds to buy an additional two buses, if the moratorium were lifted.

Dewey estimated as many as 40 per cent of the 111 buses used by 18 small systems throughout southeastern Michigan have more than 60,000 miles on the odometer "and most of those have more than 80,000 miles on them."

"We have quite a few with more than 100,000 miles," said Dewey, who added that while buses with that much mileage would normally be used, they

would be held in reserve in case others broke down.

And that reserve is one the big problems of the moratorium, too.

NTC, which Shaw said already turns down some customers because there aren't enough buses to carry them, turns down 35 to 40 more every time a bus breaks down.

Neither the NTC nor SEMTA has much in reserve anymore.

"We're under such tremendous pressure to get as much service as we can, we're sort of holding our hearts in our hands and putting them all on the road," explained Dewey.

"We don't have the back-up vehicles, basically. We don't have the reserve," he added.

Last July, Gov. William Milliken vetoed a bill that would have allowed local transportation authorities to make up their own minds on whether to buy wheelchair-accessible buses or not.

Two compromise bills are now awaiting action in the senate highways and transportation committee which William Long, an administrative aide

to Milliken, said would be acceptable to Milliken if passed in their present form.

David Haynes, administrator for the highways and transportation committee, said the bills are tentatively set for discussion a week from today.

Even if the bills are immediately passed and approved by the governor, however, it would still be five to six months before the first new buses arrive, said Long.

All of this may soon become academic, even if the compromise legis-

lation—which would require local transportation authorities to buy big buses accessible to people in wheelchairs, but would not require them to buy small buses for the wheelchair-bound—is eventually passed.

Federal regulations which take effect Oct. 1 will require all buses purchased with even some federal money—which is virtually all buses—to be wheelchair accessible.

Depending on what means of getting people in wheelchairs on board is

used, the cost of making the buses accessible varies. But the most practical system now would add about \$10,000 to the price of a large bus, now \$80-\$100,000.

However, state and local aid would pay for all but \$1,500-\$2,000 of that total. The remainder would have to be paid for by local systems.

Supporters of wheelchair-accessible buses say that amount is minor, even paid for over the typical 10-year lifespan of a line haul bus.

## Almanac blew blizzard, but forecasts still go on

If you want the sordid details of the last pregnant woman to be hanged in Massachusetts, or if you want to know the secret of how to vanquish varmints from a vegetable patch without violence, probably the best place to turn—and maybe the only place—is The Old Farmer's Almanac.

But if you're after a fore-cast, try Sonny Eliot.

With the track record The Almanac's famous predictions have had so far this year, even a glance out your window might do you more good.

**THE BLIZZARD** that temporarily laid waste to most of the midwest last week started on a day The Almanac predicted would feature "snows on and off, fairly heavy east." The storm brought more precipitation in two days than The Almanac said would fall here for the whole month of January.

"We're not that accurate as yet, but I think we are a hell of a lot better than guessing. I think we've got an inside track," said The Almanac's editor, who's blessed with a name—Judson Hale—as fitting to The Almanac's hometown of Dublin, New Hampshire, as a rocky New England meadow.

"I do feel that eventually, because weather is not haphazard any more than anything else in the universe is haphazard, I do feel we'll be able to predict the weather day-to-day a year in advance."

Hale said the cheers—but that's 100 years off," said Hale.

Hale is understandably coy about revealing The Almanac's secret recipe for present-day long-range forecasts, but he did say much of the predictions are based on "varying forces from the sun."

**THOSE FORCES**, said Hale, include sunspots, solar winds and magnetic fields. Every year, starting right about now, The Almanac's full-time solar scientist, Dr. Richard Head, makes observations of those forces that eventually will help comprise the predictions for 1979, which Hale said will be finished in May, 1978.

Hale said Dr. Head performed similar observations for NASA, helping with plans for the early Mercury series launches.

Much of the way The Almanac predicts weather has been altered in "the last dozen years," said Hale, who has been editor 10 years and on the staff 20 years.

Hale said another change, this time in some of the boundaries for the 15 areas The Almanac uses in making its weather predictions, are coming for the 1979 edition, but he refused to be more specific.

But Hale said the original methods, used as early as 1793 by founder Robert Thomas, are still fairly valid.

Using those and the new-fangled ways, The Almanac predicted the recent end of the two-year western drought. And even with the so-far chancy predictions for the Detroit area, Hale's still standing behind his product.

"When we look back on your winter in April, I'll decide on the accuracy of the prediction," said Hale.

In fact, Hale's reluctant to admit defeat even in light of last week's blizzard, saying, "at least we called for snow."

**SNOW IN JULY**, 1816, was predicted by SNOW IN JULY. When the prediction miraculously came true, it achieved for The Almanac what has so far proven to be a very long-lived fame.

"He was ill, he had a fever, and the printer came in and told him the predictions for July were due. 'Tell 'em snow,' he said, and then it snowed," recounted Hale.

There were dozens of Almanacs published in those days when there were still plenty of farmers to read them, and it was that fluke forecast that's probably at the root of the Almanac's celebration this year of its 187th anniversary.

Incidentally, today is Ground-Hog Day, when the little rodent is supposed to pop out of his burrow, wipe the sleep from its eyes, and pronounce the remaining length of the winter.

And what will that pronouncement be? Hale doesn't know. But he adds this:

"Groundhog day is Candlemas Day, half way through the winter, and everybody better have half their wood and half their hay still left."

The consequences of not having those halves, Hale left unsaid.

## Will ESY tracks rotate?

If inequities must exist with year-round school scheduling, why not share the disadvantages with all involved students?

Mrs. Carol Rodwell posed that question to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

Mrs. Rodwell's children are assigned to Track D, one of four student group schedules used for year-round school. Track D schedules students longer during the summer months than any other track.

Mrs. Rodwell asked the board to adopt a policy of track rotation so one group of students won't be stuck with a single schedule for their elementary and middle school careers.

Thomas Yack, board president, said the issue would be discussed at the Feb. 20 board workshop and a decision

could be made sometime thereafter.

Supt. John M. Hoben said track rotation was one alternative to alleviating problems in Track D's schedule. Trustee Joe Gray, however, said a commitment to rotate tracks had been made when year-round school was extended.

**UNDER THE YEAR-ROUND** school concept, students are divided into four groups. At any one time, three groups are in school and the fourth is on vacation.

The Extended School Year (ESY) plan used in Plymouth-Canton schedules students to attend school for nine weeks (45 class days) and then be off for three weeks (15 days).

Students in Track D have more class days during July and August than stu-

dents in Tracks A, B, and C. In addition, their instructional period in December is disrupted by the holiday break.

"I consider track rotation to be a matter of sound management," said Mrs. Rodwell. "Last year when 45-15 was expanded to other schools it was said the tracks would be rotated. Their last summer when the block star approach was adopted, it again was said tracks would be rotated. Then in the fall a couple of schools complained because there were too many students in certain tracks and additional teachers were denied because it was said track rotation would solve the problem."

"Now, in the winter, there seems to be a question of whether we will rotate tracks. My children have been on Track D since 1976 and will be until 1989, unless track rotation is adopted," said Mrs. Rodwell.

She noted in a survey taken of ESY parents that some opposed rotation because they already made vacation plans for this summer. "If track rotation were adopted now it would have no effect on the summer of 1978 but on the summer of 1979."

Mrs. Rodwell added that teachers are allowed to select the track they will teach on based on seniority. "Because Track D is seen as the least desirable, we end up with teachers with the least experience. In one way this is good because young teachers often are the best. But as teachers gain seniority they will move to other tracks. And so Track D will have a constant changeover of teachers and this disruption isn't good."

"Discrimination is defined as an unjust distinction for one group over another. With that in mind, I would ask the board to fairly represent students on all tracks—including those on Track D."

**HOBEN SAID** a decision has not been made yet on track rotation.

Gray commented: "Speaking for just one trustee, my own understanding was that we did make a commitment to rotate tracks. Why are we now asking parents if they'd be in favor of rotation if that decision already has been made?"

## Schools to teach birth control info

Birth control information probably will be added to the curriculum of a health education course at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP) next September.

Under guidelines of a state law permitting the teaching of birth control, however, parents may pull their children from the birth control segment of the course and ask teachers to assign their children other work.

Michael Homes, the Plymouth-Canton Schools' assistant superintendent for instruction, said the new state law will have the most impact on the one-semester course geared toward ninth graders but open to upper classmen as well.

The course covers sex education, prenatal development, alcohol and tobacco abuse and other topics.

**UNTIL NOW**, teachers of sex and health education courses throughout Michigan were legally restrained from teaching birth control techniques in the classroom.

All that changed last month, however, when Gov. William Milliken

signed a bill lifting the ban on birth control instruction.

Although the new law does not require school districts to teach birth control information, Homes said he expects the school board will add birth control to the health education curriculum.

The school board voted to support the state birth control bill even before it was signed into law, Homes noted.


"But right now, we're still in the preliminary stage of forming a birth control program," he added. "As far as implementing this, we're looking at next fall."

According to Homes, the Michigan Board of Education must establish guidelines for birth control instruction before birth control programs can be established in the state's schools.

Local school districts must then establish advisory committees to oversee their sex education programs. The committees must include parents, students, faculty members, parent clergy and community health professionals. Teachers who offer birth control instruction must be supervised by public health officials.



## Bill collector put on students' tracks

Schoolcraft College will turn to a collection agency in an attempt to collect \$2,180 short term loans that students have failed to repay.

Altogether, 29 loans to 26 students are considered delinquent. The balances due range from \$20 to \$100.

Meanwhile, said Edward McNally, vice-president for student affairs, those students can receive no grades, no transcripts and no diplomas.

JOHN TOMEY, director of financial aids, told trustees last week that the delinquency rate has ranged from three to seven per cent, depending on economic conditions. The current number of defaults represents nearly seven per cent of the short term loans out.

"The administration realizes that while the percentage of delinquent short-term loans has remained rela-

tively constant, the dollar value to be written off has increased," McNally said in a memo to the board.

For accounting purposes, the board transferred \$2,180 from the general fund contingency account into the loan account.

But McNally said an effort would be made to collect the debts. A collection agency's fee would run from one-third to one-half debt, with one-third being typical.

"IN OUR literature, there is a national concern over loan defaults," said President C. Nelson Grote.

Trustee Gerald Cox agreed, noting that banks are requiring parents to co-sign when making loans to students.


Of the 26 students who are delinquent in paying off their loans, 23 are males.

# Schoolcraft may lose a seat on trustees' board

At least one Schoolcraft College trustee may be out of a job after the election of June 1979.

A conference committee of the Michigan Legislature has agreed on a sen-

ate version of a bill to reduce Schoolcraft's board from eight trustees to seven.

The house version, favored by a 6-2 majority of the board, would have increased the number of Schoolcraft

trustees to nine. Some trustees are bitter.

"THE LEGISLATURE decided again that local autonomy was not of great value," said trustee Gerald Cox. "I will look forward to what the legislature does with Detroit (school) decentralization," added Dr. Cox, an employee of that district.

President C. Nelson Grote reported the conference committee was persuaded by senators that it was more important to bring Schoolcraft's board size in line with other community colleges in the state than to let Schoolcraft have what it wanted.

"I'm very disappointed," said trustee Rosina Raymond. "This decreases the chances of getting representation from some parts of the district."

When Schoolcraft was organized, it had three trustees elected at large and one from each of the five K-12 districts which make up the college district. Because the K-12 districts were of widely different sizes, a Wayne County Circuit judge in 1971 held that it violated the "one person, one vote" rule of the U.S. Constitution.

Since then, trustees have all been elected at large. The result: Livonia, with about half the population of the Schoolcraft district, has a better chance of electing its residents. Cur-

rently six Livonia residents are on the board; Garden City has one; Plymouth-Canton, one (a transplanted Livonian); Northville and Clarenceville, none.

BOARD MEMBERS themselves are a little embarrassed that so many are Livonians. They see a larger board as enabling candidates from the smaller communities to slip in to victory in third place.

The legislative bill—if the house concurs in the conference report and the governor signs it—will take effect with the 1979 biennial election.

The terms of board President Paul Y. Kadish of Livonia, Secretary Nanice Blatt of Livonia and Dr. Cox of Garden City are due to expire. With

only two trustees to be elected, one of the three is bound to lose.

Political odds would favor Kadish and Mrs. Blatt, both of whom have had additional public exposure by their 1977 runs for the legislature, assuming name recognition is a factor.

"THEY PAID absolutely no attention to what three-fourths of the board thought was right," Kadish said of the conference committee.

"We're a charter institution. We were organized under a different law. We're unique."

Kadish said legislators were inconsistent because, while requiring uniform board sizes for community colleges, they talk of diversity of programs.

Kadish and trustee Mark McQuesten blistered the vote of State Sen. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), a former Schoolcraft board chairman.

"He opposed the wishes of three-quarters of the board," said Kadish. "He has done himself and the college a disservice," added McQuesten.

Mrs. Blatt praised the efforts of State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia), who "stuck his neck out" in urging both houses to give Schoolcraft a nine-member board.

The legislative decision might have been anticipated, however. The senate generally calls the shots on bills and appropriations affecting higher education, while the house originates most legislation affecting K-12 districts.

## Elementaries earn design honors

Larry Morris of TMP noted that the M Award was given in recognition of the "design's execution of a comprehensive program that was prepared in collaboration with the school district's administration and staff."




The income received from the 1977 Fall Festival allowed the board to pay a past due expense owed the City of Plymouth from 1976 as well as pay its 1977 bill from the city.

# 'Tramp's Hollow' to be lost by M-14 construction

Little has been said about it. There have been no protests over its passing. But the Plymouth community is losing another of its famous landmarks in the cause of progress.

The latest landmark to go is the segment of ground along Edward Hines Parkway, long known by the old-time residents as "Tramp's Hollow," and a one-time rendezvous by the lovers of the open air who travelled by fast freight instead of the sleek passenger coaches of the C&O and B&O railroads.

THE PICTURESQUE plot of ground was the deep ravine between Sheldon Road, north of the railroad tracks and Five Mile Road. At its bottom the Rouge River flowed and the area was

heavily wooded. It was an ideal park site.

"When I was a young lad I used to hunt squirrels there," recalls Herald Hamill, the veteran engineer from Plymouth, "and I sort of feel sorry that the new highway (M-14) is cutting away most of it."

When the state highway department released its plans for the new M-14, which breaks off Schoolcraft and crosses Northville Road just below Five Mile, Little thought was given to the fact that "Tramp Hollow" would be a victim of the progress.

Only now are the Plymouth residents beginning to realize that one of its colorful areas is being lost.

"MY DAD WAS station master in

Plymouth for 40 years," Hamill recalled, "and I had plenty of time to see the lovers of the open road gather. I used to visit with them and many a fine hour I had listening to their tales."

Hamill pointed out that the hollow was an ideal place for hobos to gather. Plymouth had a huge railroad yard and a roundhouse. It was here that the trains were made up to deliver goods to all corners of the land. So the tramps could take their pick, depending on which direction they wished to travel.





## Inclement humdinger

Many nouns, pronouns and adjectives were used to describe last week's storm.

In preparing local news stories, we used the noun "blizzard" which seemed appropriate given the strong winds and heavy snowfall.

But, to my surprise, what actually occurred was "inclement" weather. That news came to me in the mail in a notice from a recreation department that an event had been cancelled and rescheduled due to "inclement" weather. Here I thought it had been a blizzard.

"Inclement" weather is a popular adjective. But in my opinion it's overused. Schools are closed because of inclement weather, outdoor concerts are cancelled because of inclement weather, and Rotary chicken dinner sales drop when the weather is inclement. Ballgames aren't rained out but cancelled by inclement weather.

AS A JOURNALIST, I'm going to stick by my guns and refer to the storm as a blizzard.

Although "inclement weather" seems too mild a description, I can't fault the one who used it too much. I find that journalists in my own organization also had difficulty deciding what to call the storm.

A review of headlines in the Monday, Jan. 30 editions of the 12 Observer and Eccentric editions reveals some of the following labels used in headlines: "Storm: it could have been worse"; "Winter lands knockout punch"; "City bucks paralyzing snowstorm"; "Blizzard belts state, county,

city"; "Residents improvise to weather blizzard"; "B'ham area recovers from humdinger"; "Blizzard puts Redford on ice"; and "City blitzes through blizzard."

My favorite headline, though, was "Old man winter bites: Farmington growls." Wish I had thought of that.

I was interested that my fellow journalists described the event as a storm, a knockout punch, blizzard, paralyzing snowstorm, and a humdinger.

Looking at subheads, I also was interested that some residents coped with the storm, others improvised, some blitzed through, some recovered, some won battles, and—best of all—Farmingtonians growled.

THE REASON I enjoy reading headlines is because I appreciate the problem of having to pack a limited number of verbs, nouns, adjectives and adverbs into a very limited space.

Headline writing is an art and uses a language of its own—bites, lands, belts, bucks, blitzes. My own headline, "City sets up blizzard emergency center for trapped motorists, heatless residents," leaves the reader wondering what "heatless residents" are. You have to read the story to find out they are persons in homes without heat.

But that's true of any story—you can't read just the headline to find out what the story is about.

But, in any event, I'm proud that none of our editions carried the headline: "Residents recover from inclement weather."


in city hall coffers or in Boss's personal accounts.



# 'Loving Church' is theme of Ward team's new book

A book that started out as a treatise on church growth turned into a story of church love and is proving to be a second popular addition to parish libraries from Bartlett and Margaret Hess.

Dr. Hess, senior minister at Ward United Presbyterian Church of Livonia, and his wife, Margaret, teamed up last year to write "The Power of a Loving Church."

The volume followed an earlier team effort, "How to Have a Giving Church," in which Dr. and Mrs. Hess told how churches they had headed met budgets without pledges by helping people understand the importance of giving in their own lives.

Their second book originally was to tell about the pattern of high growth rate experienced by Ward.

"We started to write about what makes a growing church," the clergyman said, "but when the manuscript went to the publisher, his comment was that it was too long and that what seemed to stand out was the relationships between pastor and people."

"So we started again in the direction of the love atmosphere a church can foster. We also reduced the manuscript and love became the theme."

THE PREMISE of the new book, Dr. Hess said, is that "as soon as people enter a church they feel its atmosphere, friendly or unfriendly, warm or cold, a welcome or a lack of welcome."

"It's not the size of a church, but the attitude of its people that tells a visitor or prospective member whether he will feel at home," he added.

"In the book we deal with how people are welcomed, made to feel at

home, and challenged to love God and serve the church using their own gifts."

He said the book also considers "how love can cross all kinds of barriers, financial, denominational and personal."

Dr. Hess said that in thinking about church leadership he often remembers the words of a football coach friend who was commenting on what makes a winning team.

"He told me often teams are not all that different in potential, but it's the mistakes that kill you," the minister said. "Churches can be like that."

HE THEN LISTED some bad blunders which can be committed by clergymen, mistakes guaranteed to send members away in droves.

"There's the minister who betrays confidences, talks about one parishioner to another," he suggested. "Or the one who blows up and gets angry, or cultivates some members of his congregation but tends to ignore others."

Other bad moves he mentioned would be to choose the wrong assistant, springing new ideas for courses of action without preparation, being unable to accept criticism and regard-

ing people who oppose his policies as enemies.

"We should be able to disagree without being disagreeable," he commented.

On the positive side, Dr. Hess said ministers can promote an atmosphere of love through genuine appreciation of each person in his congregation.

"People come in so many varieties," he said, "and we enjoy at Ward the fact that our congregation has come from all over the United States, Europe and even the Orient."

"We also have people who represent the whole religious spectrum in former affiliation, from Catholic and Episcopalian to the pentecostal denominations. Each adds his own flavor and personality to the whole."

MOST IMPORTANT to bringing an atmosphere of love to a church, said Dr. Hess, is to "emphasize constantly that God loves each person, so all can love others and certainly love themselves."

"That's what Jesus said is the summation of the law," he added. "And we have learned that people love each other and themselves when their needs are being met."

He coordinated a parish youth program in St. Louis for a year before taking the final two years of theology at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. He will be ordained in June 1978.





Random selection  
does a fair job,  
until there's better

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education is considering whether to abolish or modify the random selection process of assigning eighth graders to high school.

A computer is used to randomly assign eighth graders to either Plymouth or Plymouth Canton for the ninth grade.

The aim is to balance enrollments between the two high schools at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park. Random assignment is used to prevent human bias—thus preventing charges of athletic recruitment and de facto segregation.

A MAJOR CRITICISM of the process, made at the time of its adoption and repeated last month, is that it breaks up neighborhoods.

Students living on the same street likely will be assigned to different schools because the computer isn't geared to assigning neighborhood friends to the same school. The only exception made in the random process is for siblings, to avoid splitting up families. Under this exception, a sibling with an older brother or sister in high school may choose to attend that school or elect to be chosen randomly.

The argument has been made that the sibling exception amounts to special treatment and is, therefore, discriminatory. A few parents upset with random selection who attended the assignment their eighth grade students received, have asked for elimination of the sibling exception. Some also asked for elimination of random selection.

At the last public discussion of the issue the school board was deeply split on what action to take. Some favored abandonment, others favored eliminating the sibling exception, and others favored holding tight and giving the system a chance to work.

And that's where the matter rests. The school board will discuss the issue again, and hasn't yet agreed on whether to scrap random selection nor on a replacement alternative.

THE ISSUE BECOMES clouded because students at the CEP now attend classes at both schools, regardless of which school they have been assigned to.

Young people from a neighborhood ride the same bus to the CEP site in the morning and afternoon, and may still take some classes together even if they are assigned to separate schools. Because both schools are relatively large, the chances of neighbors spending much time together isn't great anyhow—even if they are assigned to the same building.

One problem, though, is school activities during the evening and on weekends. Salem students will support Salem activities, and Canton students support Canton activities. In this way, students on the same street will be split up.

But it must be remembered that a major effect of high school has, regardless of the assignment process, is a change in socializing habits of students. Young people meet new friends, broaden their ring of acquaintances, and gradually break away from the close knot of buddies on the block. Even without random selection, the mere socializing impact of attending high school tends to break up neighborhood allegiances. That's the way it always has been. And it is healthy for young people.

For families, however, the splitting causes very practical problems of requiring mom and dad to make transportation arrangements for two children to attend activities at two different schools. Even for two-car families this would be an economic hardship. Thus, the sibling exception policy has merit.

Another factor to remember is that under the feeder system used prior to random selection, attendance boundaries were adjusted every year, and the splitting up of neighborhoods became an annual occurrence.

THE PROBLEM OF assigning middle school students to high school may always be thorny, given the fact that both schools are on the same site. And so a perfect system likely will never be found.

But there is enough recent history to establish that the feeder system generated horrendous problems every year—for students, families, bus routes, and individual schools. So many complaints were heard each year that it became apparent there must be a better way.

And random selection was put together as the better way to go. It may not be, but the Observer believes it is far too early to abandon the process. The best approach is to give random selection a fair chance; modify the process to make improvements, but give the system enough time to succeed or fail on its own merits.

The Observer urges the school board to retain random selection—especially since there is no clearly better alternative—and concentrate on eliminating the kinks. Next year will be a better time to rationally consider alternatives; now it's too early.

## Political harm in small SC board

One had to think some Schoolcraft College trustees were kidding when they expressed surprise at the Michigan Legislature's decision to cut the board size from eight to seven.

The board majority had wanted it raised to nine. The State House of Representatives went along with that request, passing a bill to create a nine-member board.

But there's an unwritten rule in Lansing that the house calls the shots on K-12 education bills, and the senate has its way on college matters. So when the senate bill was passed to cut the board to seven, the betting odds had to be that seven would prevail.

That is precisely what happened. The joint house-senate conference committee said seven. All community college boards will be the same.

SO WHAT'S the difference to the man on the street?

More than meets the eye. The Livonia School District, with about half the total college district population, has six of the eight seats on the board. Anyone well known in Livonia has an immediate advantage in a Schoolcraft election.

Not that the Livonians have misused their power—far from it. They have shown painstaking sensitivity to services for the Plymouth-Canton and Garden City districts, in particular.

Yet the political fact of life is that Schoolcraft College will have difficulty passing a millage increase, getting donations or attracting the public's attention unless it has more trustees from the smaller K-12 districts.

In an election where only one or two persons can win, the non-Livonian has a tough row to hoe. Consider 1977 when Livonians Rosina Raymond (an incumbent), Harry Greenleaf and Leonard Wozniak won. Greenleaf, in Republican politics, and Wozniak, in Jaycees, had strong connections across the district. Finishing fourth—and losing—was Plymouthite G.J. (Jack) Bologna.

BOLOGNA WAS the top-dressed favorite in the Plymouth-Canton district. He ran a provincial campaign, however, and wasn't known outside his community.

Newsman who saw any or all of the campaign, myself included, thought Bologna was far and away the best candidate in the field. A self-made man who heads a classy management consultant firm, Bologna offered the college a tremendous bargain, not to mention his enthusiasm for the community college.

In June of 1979, three Schoolcraft incumbents will be up for reelection—Livonians Paul Kadish

and Nancie Blatt and Garden City's Gerald Cox. But the law cutting the board to seven will be in effect.

On name recognition alone, Kadish and Mrs. Blatt have the advantage; add in their district of residence and they seem unbeatable.

What will happen to Garden City's representation if Dr. Cox goes down the tube? What will happen to Plymouth-Canton's interest if a championship caliber candidate like Bologna runs again and loses? What if lethargic Clarenceville and Northville get into the act and get crushed?

I REPEAT, the Livonians running the board have been sensitive to the needs of the outlying districts. Operationally, the outer four aren't being hurt.

The harm is political. In 1971, when the Schoolcraft reapportionment case was before Wayne County Circuit Court, I thought persons like trustee Rosina Raymond who advocated electing trustees from equal-sized sub-districts were a wee daft. I no longer think so.

Splitting the college district into sub-districts may be an administrative impossibility, however, despite its political desirability. School districts meander along old 19th century farm lines and drift into three different counties. Getting census figures to draw up sub-districts is virtually impossible.

The alternative is for the small K-12 districts to recruit Bologna-quality candidates and rev up a super campaign. It can be done.

## Neighborliness

If there was a good side to the Great Blizzard of '78, it was more than the parties folks had because they couldn't get to work... more than the good books youngsters read because they couldn't get to school or go out to play... more than the dedication to serving the public shown by some employees who got to work.

The good side was the neighborly feeling, the old-fashioned pioneer spirit that supposedly died with the end of barn-raising and the advent of social legislation.

The spirit of neighborliness was still alive in the suburbs. The notion that life is impersonal was buried in two feet of snow. The good showed through. (Staff photo)



## Tax 'reforms' sock the middle class

Get set, folks, we are about to be "reformed" again.

Every time a governmental official uses that word, it means people with the greatest voting power are about to get a break at the expense of those who either have less voting power or belong to the long-suffering silent majority.

The proposed income tax "reform" merely pushes the burden from the low-income families to the middle-income families.

The highest income families get hurt, but there are so few of them that the real burden is carried by the middle.

This middle-income group, which is the backbone of America, is also the group most affected by the eroding dollar and the increased Social Security tax.

The rates will be lower, but so will deductions if all the "reforms" pass. The tax credit for dependents, compared to the present tax deduction of \$750



Every time The Stroller picks up one of the public prints and reads where some individual or group has stormed the citadel of local government to complain about conditions in their neighborhood or to protest against some applicant for a business establishment, he can't help wondering how these people would feel if they were sitting on the other side of the council table.

He can't help feeling that they might sing an entirely different tune if they had to cast a vote that would be for the benefit of the small neighborhood instead of just a entire community.

They'd soon find out that their willingness to serve the public as a lawmaker would lead into some trying and even maddening circumstances. The Stroller knows. Some 30 years ago, he was filled with vim and vigor and eager to be of service to the taxpayer public.

IT WAS BACK in the days when the transition of Livonia Township into the City of Livonia was taking place, and he gladly accepted a position on the charter commission and later served as vice-president of the first city council.

In this so-called vaulted position, The Stroller was really enjoying himself. He was proud of the fact that a tax limitation of five mills was frozen into the charter. He was still prouder of the fact that the city council decided it could run the city on one mill—\$1

per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Inasmuch as the top valuation of residential property in the early '50s was \$5,000, it meant no one would be asked to pay more than \$5 a year in city tax.

Things were going along smoothly until spring came, with its muddy roads and caved-in streets due to heavy rains.

Then one night, along about 11 p.m., his home phone rang. It was an irate taxpayer—and an elderly one at that.

"I WANT YOU" to send a load of gravel over here right away," she almost screamed over the wire. "There's a big hole at the entrance to my driveway, and I want it taken care of NOW!"

Pleading with her that no load of gravel could be sent over at that time of night was fruitless. She screamed even louder: "What kind of councilman are you? I thought you promised to take care of our problems!"

The Stroller pointed out that, as a taxpayer, she was paying only \$5 a year in city taxes and that such demands were out of order.

When she continued her demand, The Stroller tried to be diplomatic and asked how much of her \$5 should go toward police protection and how much should go for fire protection and the other services in the city.

When she finished stating her portions of the \$5 that should go for the various city services, there was only 75 cents left of her \$5 tax payment.

How much gravel do you think the city can purchase for 75 cents? The Stroller asked, and pointed out that if more than that were spent, it would have to come from another taxpayer's share of the taxes and maybe his road would crack up, too, in the spring thaw.

She hung up. The Stroller has not heard from her since.

THEN THERE WAS the night a newcomer to the city, who had moved into a neighborhood where street lighting was being installed, stood before the council. He claimed he was the father of four children and needed his sleep to be ready for his job the next day, and that the new lights were shining in his window and keeping him awake.

He was really pouring it on until the late Jack Whitehead, a member of the council, called out: "Young fellow, you don't have a problem? Just lay your head at the foot of the bed and the lights won't bother you."

Yes, there is a laugh now and then on city councils in the various communities. But mostly these highly enthusiastic public servants find they are targets for abuse—oftentimes by their best friends.

The other side of the table isn't so rosy.

## SC enrollment is near record

The 7,708 students who enrolled in Schoolcraft College classes in January were just three shy of an all-time winter semester record. The high point was hit in January of 1976.

Edward McNally, vice-president for student affairs, told the board last week that the average course load was 7.55 credit hours, the lowest ever at Schoolcraft. Fifteen credits is considered a full load.

The decline in the number of credit hours continues a trend. The average age of Schoolcraft students has been gradually rising—it's nearly 30 now—and the credit loads dropping as students seek training in fields of immediate interest or job value.

The figures do not include non-credit community service courses. Enrollment in those fields comes later in January.

# Boulevard is best for Ford Road

Editor:

At an open meeting held Jan. 11, at the Canton Township Hall, opinions were taken from interested parties on how Ford Road should be widened between Canton Center Road and I-275.

As could be expected, the commercial interests—mostly in favor of seven lanes—were well represented; with homeowner representation, unfortunately, less than overwhelming.

Equally disturbing was the fact that only five or seven-lane proposals were presented by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation. When questioned why a boulevard proposal was not available, the primary reason (given) was lack of expressed interest. A boulevard could easily be implemented within the confines of the proposed seven-lane right-of-way.

A boulevard would provide the best solution to the left turn onto, or crossing, of Ford Road problem. It would create a protected zone while allowing crossing of traffic one direction at a time. This is especially important for pedestrian or bicycle traffic crossing Ford Road.

HOWEVER, I believe the strongest argument for a boulevard is the question of aesthetics—it just looks better. We all landscape our homes, and berm ordinances require our businessmen to landscape their property. Is seven lanes, 84-feet of solid asphalt consistent with how we want our township to look?

Ford Road, between Inkster and Telegraph is seven lanes. Take a ride and take a good, long look. The five-lane proposal is the one favored by the state—better than seven but still a wide (60 feet) unbroken expanse of asphalt. And, if commercial development continues along Ford Road, we could end up with unbroken rows of storefronts staring at each other separated only by five or seven lanes of traffic. Much of Ford Road through Westland and Garden City is like this.

The intent here is not to ridicule these sections along Ford Road—but we now have the opportunity to do something different. So, the decision is yours, neighbors. Ford Road is going to be widened. If five or seven lanes is what you want, you need know nothing. But, if you believe Ford Road should be eye-pleasing as well as functional, make your preference for a boulevard known.

## SC center charts new courses for women

When Pat Mason learned that her husband wanted a divorce, she felt scared. When Millie Davis decided to get a job after being home 20 years, she felt unsure of herself. When Marge Wilson's husband passed away and her friends stopped calling, she felt despair.

While the names of these women are fictitious, their circumstances are real. Fortunately, each had heard of the cozy brick house just south of Schoolcraft College's south parking lot. Each visited the house, better known as the Women's Resource Center, and, on entering its door, each changed the course of her life.

Records kept by the center, sponsored by Schoolcraft College, indicate that in the past year, 782 women have walked through its doors and over 1,500 women have called asking for information, referrals, counseling or help in discovering ways to enrich their lives.

Help usually comes as a result of the trained listening ears of the volunteer peer counselors staffing the center. Georgene Sloan, peer counselor trainer, said the peer counselors embrace the philosophy of the center,

which is to be supportive, accepting, and non-judgmental.

"There are a lot of people who need to talk to somebody, and we do a lot of listening," she explained. "Many of the women coming to the center are at a stage in life when they're ready for a change, and often they feel a need to sort out their feelings. What the peer counselors do is help them clarify their feelings, their values, their attitudes, and their goals."

**UNDER THE GUIDANCE** of volunteer supervisor Joanne Hurley, volunteers not only counsel, but also research, man the telephone and type.

"The volunteers here are a special kind of people," Ms. Hurley said. "They're willing to get involved, and this creates a positive atmosphere which is contagious." Her job is to recruit volunteers and schedule their hours so that two peer counselors are available between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. daily.

A profile of a typical visitor is that of a woman about 35 whose children are now in school. She has time to devote to herself now and wants to do volunteer work, return to school, or find a job. Often she can't decide what she would like to do.

"Women experiencing lifestyle changes often visit the WRC requesting information on types of jobs available to them and help in making the transition from homemaking to one of these jobs," said Ms. Sloan.

"We usually encourage women who aren't sure of the type of work they would like to take part in our self-directed career planning seminar, especially designed for persons seriously planning to enter the work world."

**ACCORDING** to Jean Christensen, director of the Women's Resource Center, the seminar has been a hit with women in the community since it began. But it's only a small part of the wealth of resources available at the center.

Endless shelves and files of reference material there can be used by visitors seeking information on career alternatives for women, volunteer opportunities, the ERA, child care, credit discrimination, divorce and even interesting health food recipes.

"There's also a wealth of vocational information here," said Darlene Angeloni, peer counselor. "I could

spend a week just looking through the files." Agreeing with her, Luann Shirley, a member of the center's library team, suggested that "if there's anything a woman needs to find out about women, she can find it here."

Since the center opened its doors in its homey surroundings in 1974—after bursting the seams of its first home, the Lradner Library at Schoolcraft—its list of services has grown consistently longer.

It now offers structured group discussions and workshops on a variety of topics; free open forum sessions, facilitated by persons knowledgeable and experienced in specific fields; the services of a professional Schoolcraft College counselor who sees clients by appointment only one day a week; and a speakers bureau, offering to community groups a slide presentation with narration by a WRC volunteer.

**ADDING** to the bustle, Kay Hocket of WISER (Widowed in Service), a mutual-help program for widowed persons, arrived on the scene in July. Ms. Hocket says the success of both groups working together lies in their eagerness to help women and has been a

cooperative effort. "It has to be," she says. "We have the same goal."

Last month, in striving to reach that goal, Jan Burke, Mary Jo Keller, and Pat Tiesworth also added their services to those at the center. Ms. Tiesworth is at the center 3-4:30 p.m. Tuesdays to provide "anonymous and confidential listening and referrals to persons living with an alcoholic."

Ms. Burke and Ms. Keller are there 1-3 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, representing the Livonia Council of Early Childhood, which provides a child-care referral service to persons seeking information on locations, fees and services available to parents needing child care.

With the addition of these new services at the center, the WRC is once again bursting at its seams, and once again it is overjoyed. Coming with its growth is the knowledge that it is reaching women who need it, its services.

"I think we all feel that this is an important place and that we're doing an important job," says Ms. Sloan. "We believe in the center and what it stands for. We care."

The Mayflower Ladies Auxiliary 6695 serves a pancake breakfast the first Sunday of each month. Those who don't enjoy a stack of flapjacks with butter and syrup may choose an alternate menu. Juice, toast, sausage, eggs, coffee and milk will be served.

The pancake breakfasts and two rummage sales each year are the auxiliary's only fundraisers. Proceeds benefit several VFW auxiliary projects.

Members donate their time as well as money to the local cancer program. They have a coffee party once a month for the patients in the VA hospital in Ann Arbor. Several times a year the auxiliary sponsors an evening of entertainment.

AUXILIARY members visit all nursing homes in the area with gifts for the patients.

They present American flags to classrooms and organizations.

The VFW and its auxiliary cooperate in two programs for area students. The Voice of Democracy program is a scriptwriting contest for all 10th, 11th and 12th grade students.

Winners of this year's contest were Janet Mills, first; Doug Smith, second; and Sandra Gillen, third. A tape of the winners' speech was entered in competition with 25 other first place winners from other high schools in the metropolitan Detroit area.

Response to the Voice of Democracy contest was reassuring to the VFW and its auxiliary. Lane Sabourin, English-speech teacher at Plymouth Canton High School, and Patrick Barry, speech communication teacher at Plymouth Salem High School, cooperated in the venture, encouraging their students to enter the contest.

RESPONSE TO another contest has been nil.

"We also have a poster contest for children in grades four through nine. If only we could get a school or teacher that would be interested in making this part of a class activity," said one auxiliary member.

The auxiliary also gets funds for district, department and national chapters. It supports the VFW National Home in Eaton Rapids, which houses children who cannot be taken care of by their veteran parent. The home is financed solely by the VFW and its auxiliaries.

The VFW also supports a summer camp in northern Michigan.

# Idle!

## Our intrepid reviewer is stuck with the downtown parking lot blues

Detroit! The old town is making a comeback, and it was past time to make a trip from the boondocks to see the Detroit Symphony Orchestra again.

Questions raced through our minds: Was it really good enough to be ranked in the top half-dozen American orchestras? Was it good enough to start cutting records, something it hasn't done since the days of Paul Paray in the '50s? The soloist, flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal—was he really one of the best on the globe?

We couldn't wait to find out.

TO AVOID the Cobo Hall traffic, we went crosstown on the Ford Freeway and got downtown on I-75. We hit Jefferson Avenue at 8:17 p.m. You could tell precisely by the lighted savings and loan sign. The temperature was 23 degrees.

At the Ford Auditorium underground garage, traffic was backed up one block and part of the next. Oh, well, this shouldn't take long, five minutes maybe.

The light changed, and we didn't move. The light changed again, and we moved one car length forward.

What could be the problem? I wondered aloud. Were they picking up the cars and carrying them in by hand?

Two more light changes and one more car length forward. It was 8:22.

I asked my wife if she would like to take her ticket and walk in from there. But she took one look at the traffic signs flapping in the gale off the Detroit River and said no, she'd wait.

THERE ARE two entrances to the underground garage. For some reason, only one was in use. Thus, cars coming from the west on Jefferson had to alternate with the eastbound cars. That would explain some of the holdup, but surely it had to go faster than this.

The savings and loan sign flashed: 8:23, 23 degrees. 8:24, 23 degrees. 8:25, 23 degrees. . . 8:30, starting time. . . 8:31. . . The fuel gauge dropped perceptibly.

I recalled something my memory had blocked out mercifully for several years: The Ford Auditorium underground garage was a most unpleasant place to deal with the other times I had been there. Rude personnel. An extremely inefficient system for moving folks in, resulting in surface traffic tieups. The Ann Arbor parking ramp near Hill Auditorium moved things 10 times as fast, and the halls are of comparable size.

The savings and loan sign flashed: 8:23, 23degrees, 8:24, 23 degrees, 8:25, 23 degrees. . . 8:30, starting time. . . 8:31. . . The fuel gauge dropped perceptibly.

WE WOULD surely miss the opening work. That was too bad because I have a fondness for Beethoven's "Egmont" overture. It was one of the first works I had ever heard the Detroit Symphony play when I began going to adult concerts in my teens. Dum, da; da dum da; zum, zum, zum, zum, zum. A great old piece.

The savings and loan light flashed: 8:35, 23 degrees. No longer were we moving one car length for every two changes of the traffic light. We weren't moving at all.

We were about eight cars from the entrance to the garage. A woman in a tan and maroon Caddy was first in line. A police officer walked by and said something to her, but there was no movement. A couple minutes later, the officer walked by again, and I rolled down my window in the gale to find out what was going on.

They had closed the garage. An attendant had placed one of those orange cones in the middle of the lane and just walked off. The sonofagun didn't bother to wave people away or walk down the line 50 feet to tell people there was no more room. He just walked off, and that woman in the tan and maroon Caddy just sat there.

THE SAVINGS and loan sign flashed: 8:41, 23 degrees. I did some calculating.

The symphony would be into the Khachaturian flute concerto any minute. By the time we found another place to park and bucked the gale off the Detroit River, they would be through the first movement and into the second, at least.

"Want to just forget it and go home?" my wife said. I replied affirmatively, in vigorous, newsroom slang.

At home there would be a gentle, little black poodle who loves the cool woodwind and horn concertos of Mozart. We would spread peanut butter on some Milk Bone biscuits and pour a beer into a big schooner, share and share alike.

If I got into a Beethoven-y mood, I could put on the 20-year-old Mercury record cut by Paul Paray and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Wonder how the Detroit Symphony sounds now. Good enough to make records again? It's hard to find out. Detroit!

## Piano, song at DSO

Two internationally known artists, Eugene Istomin, pianist, and musical comedy star Ethel Merman will be appearing with the Detroit Symphony this coming weekend.

Istomin will give concerts with the symphony on Thursday and Saturday evenings at 8:30 p.m., and Miss Merman will star in two "Weekender Pops" concerts, Friday at 8:30 p.m. and Sunday at 3:30 p.m.

Klaus Tennstedt will be on the podium as Istomin performs in the program which will include the Brahms Academic Festival Overture, the Beethoven Piano Concerto No. 5 and Prokofiev's Symphony No. 5.



# Rocks grind Glenn, 68-60

outstanding game—seven assists, 19 points and five steals," said Thomann.

"We played a very good defense, a straight man-to-man, and pressured their great shooters," continued the Rocks' coach. "We took away their break situation."

Salem hosts Redford Union Friday in a key Suburban Eight League battle, while Glenn travels to Redford Thurston for a Northwest Suburban League match-up.


Thomann summed up both his and Davis' prospective fortunes with the comment, "It's momentum time."

Glenn dumped Salem in the JV preliminary, 58-48.



## Alumni roomies face friendly coaching rivalry

The best way to describe the educational advantages of the Plymouth Centennial Park in terms of athletics is to follow the actions of two former Plymouth High School graduates who attended school long before anyone thought of moving to the corner of Joy and Canton Center roads.

Pat Cunningham, a 1970 graduate, and Dave VanWagoner, a 1972 graduate, were athletic standouts for the Rocks back when old Plymouth High School was at what is presently called Central Middle School.

Both athletes left their hometown for a college education and have now come back to a new atmosphere, teaching and coaching at the Centennial Park.

While much of the Centennial Park attention is geared to the close proximity of Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton High Schools, Cunningham and VanWagoner play the middle-of-the-road act in their positions as freshmen and junior varsity coaches.

Cunningham, for example, teaches social studies at Canton and coaches

the Chief junior varsity girls basketball team in the fall. He then switches to the Salem freshmen basketball and baseball positions in the winter and spring.

VanWagoner, who teaches physical education at Isbister Elementary School in Canton, coaches the Salem freshmen girls basketball team in the fall, but shifts his gears to the Canton boys freshman team in the winter.

To intensify this unusual double-school coaching philosophy, both graduates not only match coaching wits against each other at the boys freshmen cage level, but also live together in the basement of a rented house on Farmer Street in Plymouth.

Typical Centennial Park concept—share and share alike, right? Well—the arrangement of the "opposing" coaching living together has worked out most of the time.

Cunningham and VanWagoner both admit things get a little tense during the week of the Salem—Canton frosh game, but aside from that, the biggest problem is Cunningham's snoring.

"It's a one-bedroom setup, and I have the bedroom because Pat snores," VanWagoner said. "He sleeps

in the living room.

"Game week is kind of funny. We try to play psych games on each other but there are good feelings all the way. We kid each other about who is a better coach but it's a friendly rivalry."

Cunningham echoed his roommate's feelings.

"The only difficult time is during that week (of the frosh game). We just don't talk to each other," Cunningham said with a smile.

"I teach some of the kids I coach against at the high school, and they call me a traitor—but it's all in fun."

"It's really nice to have Dave around to talk about teaching and coaching problems when you come home each day."

VanWagoner defeated Cunningham twice last season but Pat has made up for one of those setbacks with an early season victory this past December. Both coaches meet for the fourth time this month.

Cunningham was captain of both the basketball and baseball teams during his senior year at old Plymouth High School. He held many of the basketball







# Salem spikers fall

## Canton suffers 1st loss

Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton girls' varsity volleyball teams fell to league competitors Monday night.

In the third quarter, Fordson led by as many as 11 points and East could pull no closer than seven points with a fourth quarter rally.


"We just couldn't do enough to overcome their size and outside shooting," Young said.

# RU's Howard Kraft retires after 38 years

The work of Howard Kraft, athletic director at Redford Union for the past 38 years, is almost completed.

After helping build a high school athletic program from five sports in 1938 to 14 this season, helping guide RU from the Suburban Eight League to the Northwest Suburban and earning numerous honors, Kraft will retire at the end of the current school year.

The genial Kraft has spent his entire professional career—teaching, coaching and directing athletics—in the Redford Union school system.

"It's a lot of work and a lot of satisfaction," said Kraft, who modestly added, "I'm fortunate I have a lot of people helping do those things."

Kraft has seen quite a few changes in athletics during the past four decades, some for the better, some for the worse.

"I think it's directly related to the social change," he said. "I don't think the school is the center of community activities as it once was."

"People take off Friday afternoons after school and head north. Professional sports are a big thing in high school because they take away spectators."

"I think a smaller amount of students are participating in sports," Kraft continued, "but those you get are probably more dedicated. I think we're getting more one-sport athletes. Kids back then were more content to be part of the team whether they played or not." he added. "Now, if they don't make the first team, they're difficult to keep interested."

Kraft allowed that coaching has improved tremendously over the years with money available for filming, conditioning equipment and clinics.

Kraft, who has seen his girls' sports program blossom this year with a league championship in basketball and a second-place finish in the state cross country meet, has strong feelings about the development of female athletics.

"The girls are so enthusiastic and

dedicated to doing a good job," he said. "We won't have half the people for a girls' meet as for a boys' meet."

"Basically, they're the same teams, but few parents (of the girls) come or are very dedicated. That's the big crime in girls' athletics."

The biggest problems which Kraft sees school systems facing in coming years centers around economics. "Not only athletics, but schools as a whole," he said.

In order to cut down costs and increase spectator interest, Kraft has engineered RU out of the Suburban Eight League with such distant travel destinations as Trenton, Belleville and Allen Park and into the more local Northwest Suburban League.

This is his final project, and it will be completed, except for the realignment of football, next season. RU will compete in football in the NSL in 1979.

Things were a little bit different and a little less complicated when Kraft first came to RU after graduating from Michigan State University in 1938.

While at State, Kraft played basketball three years and captained the 1937-38 squad.

Kraft started out at RU as a teacher, boys' and girls' basketball coach and assistant football coach. Baseball and golf were the only other sports offered at the time. In 1940, Kraft became athletic director.

Track and cross country were established by Kraft in the early 1940s, but girls' basketball was dropped due to a lack of interest.

Wrestling was added in the mid 50s, swimming a couple of years later with the completion of the school pool in 1957 and a host of girls' sports—basketball, volleyball, swimming, track, softball and cross country—during the late 1960s and early 70s.

Kraft had a nurturing hand in all of those developments, one of the few if only athletic director in the state whose career has spanned such a period of growth.

Kraft discontinued coaching except for basketball in 1945, but kept up the cage coaching until 1957, 19 seasons in all.

He became fulltime athletic director in 1950, responsible for scheduling all varsity and junior varsity events for the high school and later all athletic events at the systems two junior highs.

Nowadays, that totals upwards of 400 events in a nine-month period.

Specifically, Kraft's duties include lining up mutually acceptable dates with non-league opponents, officials, score and timekeepers, transportation and taking care of other behind-the-scenes considerations that must be tended to.

Kraft's interest in athletics involves more than his responsibilities at Redford Union and he has been honored in many ways.

Kraft has organized or managed the Redford Union Cross Country Invitational, the Redford Union Girls' Swimming Relays and the Observerland Track and Field Relays, all of which includes heavy participation by area teams.

He has had a Redford Township park named after him and a Howard Kraft Day in his honor was held by former and present staff members.

He has served on the Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association and has been active in the Michigan Association of Directors of Physical Education and Athletics.

Kraft has been inducted into the Michigan High School Coaches Hall of Fame, been selected Athletic Director of the Year by the MADPEA and Midwest Athletic Director of the Year by the National Council of Secondary School Athletic Directors.

Kraft is one of six finalists for the National Athletic Director of the Year Award which will be presented April 9 in Kansas City. That wouldn't be a bad way to cap a career, would it?

"I guess I can dream," said Kraft, "but even if I don't (win the national award), it's not bad now."

## Questions and Answers:

# How best to care for children's teeth

Third graders in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools will be receiving free toothbrushes and toothpaste the week of Feb. 5-11 as part of the observance of the 30th National Children's Dental Health Week.

The dental hygiene effort is being sponsored by the 40 dentists in the Plymouth-Canton area who belong to the Plymouth Dental Association.

Distribution of the toothbrushes and paste will be handled by members of the dental assistants' class at Plymouth Salem High School.

AS PART OF the observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, the Observer, in cooperation with the Plymouth Dental Association, presents the following series of questions and answers.

**Q.** The dentist has told us that our 9-year-old son has gum disease. How can this develop in someone so young?

**A.** Gum disease accounts for the greatest amount of tooth loss in adults, but it also affects children. According to recent statistics, about 68 per cent of the nation's youth have some form of periodontal or gum disease—generally of a mild type.

Unfortunately, unless preventive measures are taken, the disease progresses over a long period of time, with little or no pain, and destroys the gums, bone and other structures which support the teeth. Often a large percentage of periodontal problems in later life can be traced to neglect or improper care during childhood.

The problem begins with dental plaque which is the sticky, colorless substance which forms constantly on everyone's teeth. The bacteria in the plaque uses the sugars you eat to produce harmful acids which attack the teeth and cause cavities. But the same substance also irritates the tooth, making them tender and likely to bleed.

If plaque is not removed daily by careful brushing and flossing, it will harden into a deposit called calculus. As the calculus accumulates, the gums slowly detach from the teeth, leaving deep pockets where bacteria and debris collect. Eventually, if left untreated, the tissues and bone around the teeth are destroyed, and healthy teeth loosen and are lost.

The best method of prevention is regular and thorough brushing and flossing, regular visits to your family dentist and proper nutrition.

**Q.** Our student council has been asked to consider the removal of candy from vending machines in our school. What effects do such snacks have on teeth?

**A.** Snacking on candy or sugary soft drinks is probably the worst thing you can do to your teeth. Each time you eat foods containing sugars, certain bacteria in the mouth are stimulated to create acids which attack the tooth enamel. The greatest damage occurs within the first 20 minutes after eating sweet foods, so the more often you eat sugary foods the more opportunity the acids have to act on tooth enamel.

One answer to the problem is to limit the amount of sugary foods eaten each day. In other words, confine your

intake of these foods to regular meal-times and avoid those between-meal snacks. Instead of selecting sweets in the vending machine, look for sugar-free candy, gum or soft drinks, fresh fruits, milk, cheese, crackers, popcorn or peanuts.

**Q.** I was amazed to learn recently that it may be harmful to my baby's teeth to give him a bottle at bedtime. Can you explain why?

**A.** The content of the bedtime bottle may be harmful to your baby's teeth. An infant who is given a bottle at bedtime can be a prime candidate for rampant dental decay, a condition called "nursing bottle mouth."

Normal bottle feeding does not contribute to this condition because the baby who takes the bottle while awake swallows the fluids quickly. But if he is drowsy or asleep, his normal salivary flow and swallowing processes decrease. The tongue and nipple tend to pool the liquid around the top front teeth which are the ones most frequently affected.

If you feel your baby receives comfort and security from a bedtime bottle, fill it only with plain water. Fluids containing sugar, such as fruit juices or formula, can cause decay—particularly if they remain in the mouth for an extended period of time. In addition, check content labels on baby food jars. Look for foods that do not contain sugar.

**Q.** Should my child take fluoride supplements?

**A.** Supplementary fluoride is desirable for decay prevention in areas which don't have adequate fluoride concentrations in the community water supply.

If there is a question about the fluoride concentration of your water, your family dentist can have the water analyzed and prescribe fluoride tablets if necessary. The community water supply in the Observer reading area is fluoridated to the optimal level.

Also valuable in decay reduction is the topical application of fluoride to the teeth. This is done periodically, either at the dental office or through a program at school, such as the one the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools have instituted.

Fluoride-containing tooth pastes have been shown to provide an additional amount of decay protection above and beyond that provided from fluoridated water and topical fluoride.

**Q.** What is a good age for my daughter's first dental visit?

**A.** It is very important that a child's first visit to the dentist be a pleasant experience, free of any discomfort. Therefore, your daughter should probably be seen by a dentist around the age of 3, before any problems are likely to be present.

She can be introduced to the dental office and equipment in a relaxed and positive atmosphere, thus creating a good dental patient for the future. In areas without fluoridated water, one might expect to see cavities at an earlier age, so the first visit should take place at about the age of 2 or 2½.

You should explain the visit to your daughter in a casual and matter-of-

fact manner, answering questions truthfully, but emphasizing the positive rather than the negative. A special effort should be made to avoid transferring any fears that you may have about dental treatment. With modern methods and equipment, most dental work today can be done with very little, if any, discomfort.

**Q.** As the parent of a 3-year-old handicapped daughter, I would appreciate advice for setting up a special dental health care program for her.

**A.** The same basic rules of good dental health which apply to the average child are applicable to your youngster with a handicap. It is important to recognize early that a healthy mouth is an integral part of total health, helping the child to improve not only eating and speaking but also appearance and emotional well-being.

With the handicapped child there should be a greater sense of urgency for a preventative program. Dental defects, if untreated, may be more harmful to the welfare of the handicapped child and, in addition, may be more difficult for the dentist to manage.

Dental problems can be caused by the handicap or, in some cases, by its treatment. Missing or badly aligned teeth can be part of Down's syndrome (mongolism) or cleft palate. Underdeveloped, pitted or irregular tooth enamel is commonly seen in children with cerebral palsy and those born prematurely.

Diabetic children tend to develop periodontal (gum) disease at a young age, and because oral infections can make insulin regulation difficult, it is essential for a diabetic child to prevent periodontal disease.

Drug therapy also can affect a child's oral health. For instance, prolonged use of phenytoin (Dilantin), which is used to control seizures, may cause the gums to grow abnormally over the teeth and interfere with chewing. Prolonged use of certain drugs, such as tranquilizers and barbiturates, can cause the saliva to dry up, making the teeth more prone to decay. Also, if drugs with a syrup bases are given for an extended period of time, the sugar in them can cause extensive dental caries (cavities).

Regardless of these special problems, however, most of a handicapped child's oral problems are caused by the same diseases too early for your daughter to have her first examination by the dentist. He will want to see the child at an early age, then frequently thereafter to gain her confidence, discuss with you home care and diet, and perhaps repair any dental defects before they become complex.

An adequate home care program can help your child (and all children) prevent dental problems. You should be sure your child's teeth are brushed and flossed daily to remove the plaque that forms constantly on all teeth. Proper nutrition is another essential part of preventative dental care.

# Snowmobiling conditions good, but snow will slow hunters

Snowmobilers will have it made once they venture out into the post-storm weather. Rabbit hunters and ice fishermen will have it more difficult.

Snow conditions are good to excellent and there's lots of snowmobile activity in the Brighton and Island Lake state recreation areas of Livingston County.

In northern Oakland County, there are 3,700 acres of scenic woodlands for cross-country skiing, snowmobiling and winter sports in the Pontiac Lake State Recreation Area.

The Holly area has good snow for sledding and cross-country skiing.

Metroparks, such as Kensington, prohibit snowmobiles. They're good spots for cross-country skiing, however. So is Maybury State Park on Eight Mile Road in Northville Township.

**RABBIT POPULATIONS** are high, according to conservation officers in Oakland County. But the cold weather and deep snow are making it tough to get the bunnies.

If we get a warming trend toward the end of this week, the cottontails may be moving about. The afternoon of a warm, sunny day is ideal.

In Oakland County, best rabbit hunting is on private lands. Hunters need to remember that a new state law requires you to get written permission to hunt on farmlands or posted lands. With hunting pressure down, you should have an easier time getting permission.

**ICE FISHING** has been only fair at best on most of the popular local lakes. Here, courtesy of the conservation officers, is how some of the more popular spots are doing:

- Woodland Lake, Livingston County—perch are taking minnows; bluegills are aiming for mousies and wax worms.



- Lake St. Clair—pike fishing is slow most places; panfishing on Anchor Bay is slow to good; near Harsen's Inland, perch fishing is fair or better in deep water and weed beds.

- Union Lake, Oakland County—rainbow trout have been hitting wax worms at the northwest end of the lake; pike fishing is only fair at the east end; bluegills are reluctant.

- Cass, Oakland—a few crappies; gills have been hard to locate.

- Kent Lake, Oakland—best panfishing in the area, but lots of little ones.

- Commerce Lake, Oakland—bluegills hitting wax worms and wigglers.

- Pontiac, Oakland—pike fishing poor; panfish fair on wigglers.

- Walled Lake—the only pike stories are coming from here, with 22-29 inch specimens being speared in five feet of water.

**THE METROPARKS** are offering interesting nature center programs if you plan to take the youngsters out.

Here's the weekend schedule:

- Saturday, Feb. 4 at 9 a.m. at Kensington, "Tracks—Stories in the Snow," a 1½-hour program of identifying animal tracks with the help of naturalist Steve Horn.

- Sunday, Feb. 5 at 9 a.m. at Kensington, a nature cross-country, ski

# Love blossoms in garden

Nothing can be as lovely, or as romantic as an outdoor wedding reception in the summer or early fall.

But there are pitfalls. The two biggest pitfalls to be dealt with before deciding to have an outdoor reception are: How will I overcome any weather problems? Where will everyone park their car?

Another important consideration is that the yard be large enough for a reception. If it is, the savings can be tremendous. With the help of relatives, the clean up can be a snap when the party is over.

Weather—rain—is easily handled by renting a large tent. A canopy between the house and tent also can be rented. Prices vary, so get several bids. The tent firm workmen set-up the tent

necessities. Or perhaps these can be rented inexpensively from your church.

By setting up the punch bowls or champagne table outside, the most popular food and drinking areas are kept outside of the house.

The bride's cake table and food tables are better kept inside the house away from the weather and the bugs. Use a room that opens onto the yard area where the people are enjoying themselves.

The hectic day is easier if a caterer is hired to take care of the food—be prepared to be banned from the kitchen most of the day.

If an afternoon reception is planned, think ahead to plant pelumnas or asters or whatever in lots of large pots in the early spring. You can use these to decorate the entrance to your home and around the yard and tent. You'll find that close friends will even help you grow flowers, and you can choose the colors that match the color theme of the wedding.

To use the hanging plants, which have become so popular, plants can be moved into the tent to decorate it. Ivy plants can be put at the base of tent poles and the ivy wound around the poles.

Add a small combo for music and your reception will be one that the bride and bridegroom, the family and the guests will long remember.

then don't do anything after signing the license.

Don't change the name on your Social Security card, don't change your driver's license, and never sign anything using your husband's last name. But suppose you do take hubby's last name for a time, and then decide to go back to your maiden name?

You may have a fight ahead of you, but it can be done without informing your bank or creditors.

Charlene Snow, an attorney with Michigan Legal Services, says Michigan common law (in a section recently upheld by the state supreme court) permits a woman to change her name without going through the court system as long as the purpose is not an attempt to defraud or elude creditors.

That means you have to change back your social security card, your driver's license, and inform your bank or creditors.

# If marriage is out, better get a contract

If you're thinking of living with someone without the protection of a marriage license, stop and think again. Temper your romance with realism. A non-nuptial legal contract may be your safest and smartest course, according to one area attorney.

Non-marrieds suing for property settlements are on the rise. Since the case of actor Lee Marvin's live-in girl friend Michelle Triola surfaced in 1976, similar legal suits have been cropping up throughout the country.

In Wayne County, recently a man who lived with a woman for seven years was ordered to give her a fair share of their accumulated property—even though the pair were never married.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Myron Wahlis, who issued the ruling, said he believes his opinion marks the first time in Michigan that the court has recognized the jointly accumulated property rights of women in such relationships.

Dearborn Atty Michael Kalls, who represented the woman in

that case, calls the recent non-marriage settlements a "creature of the times—a by-product of our life styles."

The non-nuptial legal contract may be "the most prudent thing to do" for couples living together, said Kalls.

"If they really want to protect themselves—and are that much against marriage—then it may be the way to go."

Kalls said a legal contract may alleviate much of the legal hassle when, and if, the couple decide to part.

Kalls adds, however, he's not sure how realistic the non-nuptial contract is.

"I don't see many people doing it because it immediately introduces an element of doubt into the relationship."

Non-marriage settlements to date have been relatively few. Most have centered among a handful of wealthy entertainers.

Kalls said it's hard to generalize about non-marriage settlements.

"It's a case by case determination."

tion. The facts—length of the relationship, money and property contributed by each party—are the important consideration.

In the Wayne County case, which is pending, Kalls said the domestic relationship is based on a business theory which states both are equal partners and should split their assets accordingly.

In his opinion the judge stated legal theories and conclusions, but rather on equitable principles.

Several area lawyers said no one really knows what wives will do in such "non-marriage settlements." But one attorney offered this advice: "Whatever the terms of your live-together relationship, put it in writing."

"If you're worried about breaking up and are property conscious, you should draw up an agreement."

But as one attorney cautioned, "you may end up not living together." Another said, "I personally think it's a terrible way to start a relationship."



She may look lovely, but what's she got on, wonders a confused bridegroom. So wonders one Observer & Eccentric copy editor Dennis Rosenblum. Rosenblum tackles the task of trying to understand just what the bride is wearing.

And there was a gala reception for 2,537 close friends and relatives at Fritz's of Wyandotte, after which the couple will honeymoon in a remote chalet at the base of the Himalayas.

Then down at the bottom, morn

writes in small print. "Mr. and Mrs. Smith will make their home in Gary, Ind., where Mr. Smith is employed as a sanitary engineer. Mrs. Smith is with the White Castle organization."

You get the idea.

I'm supposed to check stores to be sure they make sense, among other things, but these always boggle me so much that I just believe everything they say. And I've always felt a bit guilty about that.

How do you spell peau de soie? And what is it, anyway? Isn't organza a little bean I used to eat in salads? Does "the bride wore baby's breath" mean she's expected to get pregnant soon? There must be millions out there just like me.

Heck, I didn't even know what a double-ring ceremony was until now, that is.

I've decided that I've had enough. That I'm going to play reporter and find out about these things.

First I ask around the office. Say Karen, I'm doing a story for the bridal section and... Karen laughs uncontrollably.

Do the colors of the bridal gown mean anything? Karen says she recently saw an old aunt get

all upset because the bride wore an ivory dress instead of pure white. But if you don't care about your old aunts, anything's okay.

Margaret says I should be careful of misspellings. There was the time the mother of the bride wore a gold dress at the wedding and the paper said she wore a golf dress.

And baby's breath—a type of tiny flower—is normally white, but sometimes is tinted. So if the bride had blue baby's breath, it doesn't mean she was gasping for air after being kissed by the groom.

A double-ring ceremony means both the bride and the groom get one. Sherry says this is a handy gimmick for keeping the groom from messing around, but Karen says she gets her kicks out of going to the bar and watching all the men with suntan marks on their ring fingers try to pick her up.

Christine suggests I look at some bridal magazines. But all they have is photos of gowns with very little information, and sex advice columns giving some creative ideas for that all-important first night.

Enough of this. I tried the public library.

Next to the books about weddings are works on cannibalism

and dueling. Honest. The librarian gave me a strange look, but I got a book on duels and another on weddings.

To my surprise, the wedding book was almost as interesting as the other one. It even has sections on such things as Broken Engagements ("We hope this will be information for which you will have no use, but it does happen in the best of families.")

Oh, here's a section on Bachelor's Dinner. Ropes, balls and chains, anchors and other obvious symbols of enslavement always amuse the guests," it says.

So what have I learned from all this?
