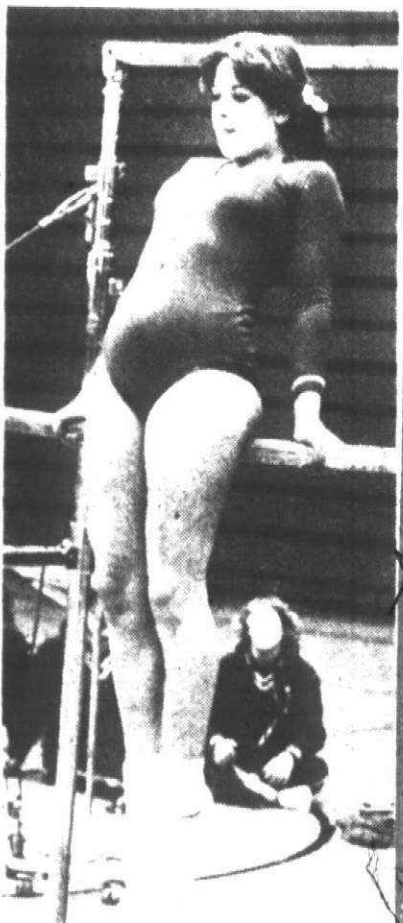

Extra cash may prompt tax cut

Canton Township residents could get a tax break of about \$31 because of an unexpected \$267,000 that poured into township coffers last year.

The extra money, from increased state aid, building permits and interest income, hiked the township's cash reserve to \$836,000.

Finance Director Michael Gorman says \$500,000 is enough to hold in reserve and has recommended township trustees use the surplus \$336,000 to either expand the Canton Police Department, construct and furnish a library in the new administration building, or build a senior citizens facility among other items.

If those recommendations are unacceptable, Gorman suggests trustees take the more popular route by adding the surplus money to the general fund, police or fire department account which would lower the tax rate by about 1 1/2 mills (\$1.25 per \$1,000 state equalized value).

The lower millage rate would mean a tax reduction of about \$31 for the owner of a \$50,000 home.

SUPERVISOR HAROLD STEIN said he will submit one of Gorman's recommendations to the township board next month.

"But right now, I haven't any pet project in mind that I can commit myself to," Stein said.

Gorman does not believe a tax reduction is the best move the township can make.

"Reductions (in the tax rate) may be the most favorable with residents,

but perhaps not the best possible alternative," he said in a memo to Stein. "Other items will be needed in the near future, and the cost will not become less expensive than they may be at this time."

Gorman is surveying nearby communities to determine how much money Canton should stash away for an emergency.

"I personally feel we should maintain about \$500,000 cash reserve until our community stabilizes."

Last year, township board members allocated \$569,000 to the reserve account. Another \$267,000 was added to the account, however, when the township received unexpected state aid and issued more building permits than planned.

According to Gorman, the state used 1975 census figures for the first time last year and as a result, Canton received about \$700,000 in state revenues instead of the \$288,000 expected.

Fees from building permits exceeded expectations by \$60,000, and interest income jumped when the interest rates were hiked from five to seven per cent.

A portion of the unexpected income was stashed away in the reserve account. According to Gorman, the remaining revenue was spread over the entire 1977 budget.

Other uses for the surplus money Gorman recommends include construction of fire station number three and land purchases for an additional fire station, industrial park site or other governmental building.

Township reneges; will seek 2 contracts

A closer look at two golf course management proposals Tuesday prompted Canton officials to renege on an earlier decision to negotiate a contract for the recently purchased Fellows Creek Golf Course just with golf pro John Jawor.

Instead, the township administration will negotiate two contracts—one with Jawor and another with Daniel Ross of

Plymouth Township's Hilltop Glen Golf Course.

The Canton board will then select the contract that suits the township's interests best.

"The board's decision to award the contract to Jawor was based on economics," noted Frank McMurray, a member of the recreation committee

that reviewed the golf management proposals.

"But there were some things that were unanswered, and our committee took a closer look. As we looked at it, we saw the dollar amounts submitted by Ross and Jawor come closer and closer together. All of a sudden, we didn't know which was the best deal."

UNDER THE CONTRACT, the

township will lease the 18-hole course to one of the two golf managers for a percentage of the profits.

Two weeks ago, township board members thought Jawor's proposal was the best deal. It would pay the township \$110,000 a year or 52 per cent of the total green fees if that would be more than \$110,000.

But township officials now believe

that Canton could receive an equal or greater sum of money from Ross. The current president of Hilltop Glen Golf Course has proposed paying Canton \$100,000 a year for the lease of Fellows Creek or 50 per cent of the green and cart rental fees.

The 53-year-old Ross took over general management duties at Hilltop Glen Golf Course in 1975. Jawor, 41, currently manages Brae-Burn Golf Course in Salem Township.

"It's nothing personal against either of you," Supervisor Harold Stein said of the board's decision to negotiate contracts with both golf managers.

"It's just that I have to take a position to make the best possible judgment for the township. We want to make sure that the course is run properly and that the township won't be left holding the bag if something should go wrong."

Although the name of the golf manager will appear on Fellows Creek's Class C liquor license, a proposed clause in the lease will stipulate that the license will remain with the course when the lease expires. The contract will probably extend over a four- or five-year period.

Stranded dog saved; still needs a master

A strange thing happened to Michael Haley on his way home from work last Friday.

Just as he was getting on I-275 at the Ecorse Road entrance the car in front of him slowed down, and the driver tossed something out the door.

Out of curiosity, Haley, of Plymouth Township, stopped to see what it was. He discovered a small, shivering puppy in the snow.

He wrapped the little dog up and took it home.

"It's the cutest little thing you could imagine," said Haley's wife, Terry. "I can't for the life of me understand why somebody threw the puppy out in the freezing cold."

And, Mrs. Haley said, the dog has come through its ordeal pretty well. A weekend of warmth, food and play did wonders.

But there's a small problem. The Haleys already have a large, English sheepdog and aren't equipped for another canine addition to the family.

However, they haven't found anybody who is willing to give the dog a permanent home.

"We haven't lived in Plymouth very long, and we don't know that many people," said Mrs. Haley. "We've checked with some of our neighbors but haven't had any luck."

"Our kids just love him and they can't understand why we can't keep him. I'd like to find a good home for him before they get too attached."

Although Mrs. Haley said she isn't sure what kind of dog he is, she thinks

he's a mixture of cocker and German shepherd.

"I hate to think of giving him to the dog pound," she said. "I'm going to try everything possible before I do that. I just want to find someone who will take good care of him."

Canton cracks down on 'pinball wizards'

An ordinance that would regulate the use of pinball machines and other mechanical amusement devices in Canton stores and restaurants is being considered by the township board to prevent the formation of "teen hang-out" spots.

Although township officials know of only one business establishment that currently operates pinball machines, Supervisor Harold Stein says the township wants no part of the problems that nearby communities have had with teenage loitering in establishments with the mechanical amusement devices.

The ordinance introduced to the Canton board Tuesday night would require businessmen to obtain an annual

license to erect and operate pinball machines and other mechanical amusement devices.

The proposed ordinance prohibits children under 12 from operating the machines without the supervision of a parent or guardian. No prizes other than a free game could be awarded for a high score on the machine.

Violation of the ordinance would be punishable by a \$100 fine or 90 days in jail.

Township board members unanimously agreed to table the ordinance Tuesday night to enable township attorney Walter Guth to add a section that would require pinball machine owners to be fingerprinted for investigative purposes.

Medical malpractice lawsuits continue to soar

Medical malpractice lawsuits continued to soar in the tri-county area in 1977, according to the Physicians' Crisis Committee (PCC).

Last year, 837 cases were filed in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Circuit Courts, a 6.6 per cent increase over the prior year's 785.

The number of suits has jumped 61 per cent since 1973, the PCC said.

The PCC was organized in 1974 in response to cost increases in professional liability insurance.

W. PETER McCABE, MD, co-chairman of PCC, said, "The 6.6 per cent increase in lawsuits is a new upward trend. We're concerned about the cost implications of cases where there are no grounds for arguing that medical malpractice was responsible for unhappy or unexpected medical results."

In 1976 malpractice suits appeared to be tapering off, he said, as they increased just 3.9 per cent over 1975, "the second-lowest rate of increase in

the past eight years."

Before the "crisis" hit, the rate of increase was only 1.8 per cent from 1972 to 1973—388 cases to 396.

"FILING LAWSUITS against physicians was a booming enterprise," said McCabe. "And it had very little to do

with actual medical malpractice."

Physicians found their insurance costs increasing. In defense, they ordered extensive tests, which also raised medical costs. Sometimes they refused to treat conditions which involved high risk and prospects for unhappy medical outcomes.

As a last resort, many moved from the state or just quit practicing medicine.

"We're still concerned with the threat of a crisis—particularly in terms of flagrant disregard of medical facts when a lawsuit is filed."

"When baseless suits are filed—and

there's no repudiation or retribution in response to them—our legal system loses credibility and our medical delivery system is damaged," McCabe said.

He said his committee will look into the issue further and advocate solutions.

Prepared for a freeze-out

National Boy Scout Week is being observed this week to convey to young people the many activities of and the advantages of being involved in Scouting.

A local example of Scouting activity is the "freeze-out" conducted recently by P-1 Boy Scout Troop of Plymouth at its campsite on the University of Michigan property near Pinckney.

Participating Scouts were required to build their own shelters—no tents allowed. Shelters were constructed by lashing dead wood found on the site to form a structure and by covering the wood structure with plastic.

Each patrol cooked three meals on the site.

And "freeze-out" was an apt description for the two-day activity as

the temperature on Sunday morning, Jan. 15, was eight degrees below zero.

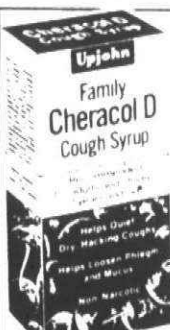

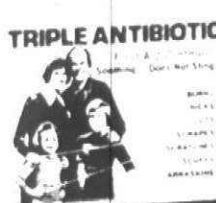

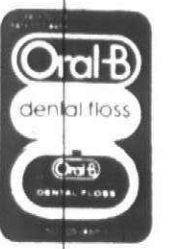

Writer who led private life will be missed

"Living without Russ will be much like going on a salt-free diet," said Helen Wallace while recalling the life of her husband, who died last week.

Actor George C. Scott said of Wallace: "Russ Wallace is the only man who ever scared me half to death."

And Jack Wilcox of Plymouth said: "Russ Wallace was an individualist who could have been a rich man in a number of fields. But he had a very high personal standard of conduct and wouldn't consider doing anything that would depreciate his attitude towards himself."

Wallace was involved in many things during his life of 65 years but mostly he was a man who loved words and the use of words, and he was an excellent actor. The Plymouth Township resident had written articles in national publications, written numer-

ous technical articles on automobiles, and played leading roles in several plays.

WALLACE CAME to Plymouth from Milford when he was a sophomore in high school, and graduated from Plymouth High in 1930.

He was president of his graduating class and a member of the school's football team, playing football in those years with Ralph Lorenz, among others.

Mrs. Wallace recalls those days: "Russ and Gabby Lorenz—they nicknamed Ralph 'Gabby'—would get out of football practice and rush downtown to get into their monkey suits to usher in the old P&A Theater on Penniman Avenue."

He also was in a number of high school plays and would appear in plays which then were put on in town by the Kiwanians and Masons.

From 1932 to '36, Wallace served in the U.S. Air Force with the 27th Pursuit Squadron at Selfridge Air Force Base. When World War II broke out, he quit his work as an insurance adjuster and went to Willow Run Airport to teach pilots about the B-24 bomber engine.

FOR YEARS Wallace was employed in one capacity or another in the automotive field.

He had worked as service manager for the Paul Wiedman dealership, then located at the site of what now is the Wiedman parking lot. Later he worked as service manager for Jack Selle Buick, and Ernie Allison Chevrolet.

For years he worked in the publishing section of Ford Motor Co., writing car and shop manuals. When Ford contracted their technical writing to Brash Brothers in Detroit, that firm contracted with Wallace to write for them. So after his "early retirement" in 1973, Wallace continued technical writing and got back to some of his personal writing projects.

In the 1930s he had an article published in Esquire, and in 1967 had another piece published by Playboy—both on automobiles. "Russ was

always writing articles and sending them in for publication," says Mrs. Wallace. "Of course the articles kept getting rejected—except for those two—but Russ kept sending them in anyway because he loved to write. He wrote constantly, whether or not he sold anything."

"He had a burning desire to write well, and never was completely satisfied with anything he wrote. Russ especially liked satire, and wrote a play which he never got published. It's still sitting on his desk, awaiting another revision."

WILCOX TELLS that Wallace also was known for being an excellent actor.

Among his many roles, Wallace played the role of the captain in "Mr. Roberts" with George C. Scott at Will-o-Way and at Sunflower Playhouse in Leamington, Ont. It was in that play that Scott declared that Wallace was "the only man that ever scared me half to death"—based on the intense anger he showed in one of the scenes.

Other roles included a part in "Dial M for Murder," Uncle Willy in "Death of a Salesman" and a part in "The Rainmaker."

WALLACE'S LOVE for the language is typified by a family anecdote involving a Christmas reading.

Wallace was raised with a Methodist background—his grandfather and two uncles were Methodist ministers—and had a deep knowledge and appreciation for the Bible. One of his favorite passages (which was read at the funeral) was the 23rd Psalm.

"Every Christmas, Russ would call the sons together to read the 23rd Psalm," recalls Wilcox, "but he'd never finish. He'd break into tears before he could finish—that's how much meaning the 23rd Psalm had to him personally."

"That's quite true," adds Mrs. Wallace. "In fact, after awhile the boys would hide the family Bible on Christmas Day to spare their father the anguish of trying to read it again."

"Family meant more to Russ than anything else. But his family was large. With Russ, all friends were relatives and all relatives were his friends. He had become a father to many young men."

"Besides writing constantly, Russ read all the time too. Whenever I had a question about something, I'd just go ask Russ about it. It'll be different now. Living without Russ will be much like going on a salt-free diet."

Journeys for 2 trustees

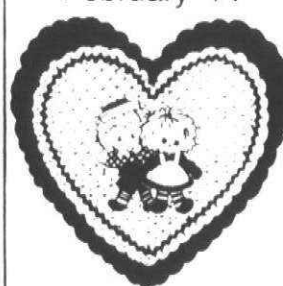

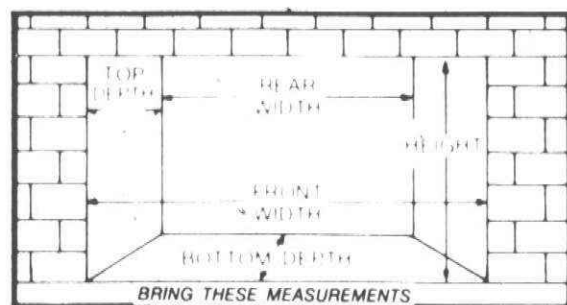

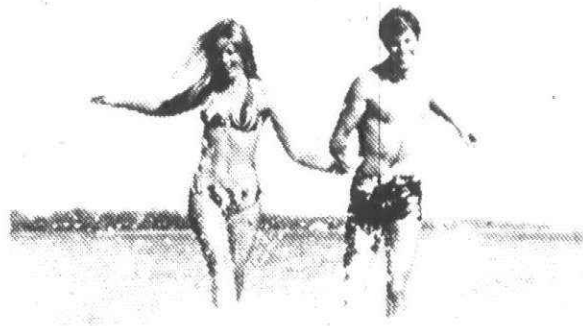

Plymouth-Canton JA team begins fundraising

The area fundraising campaign for Junior Achievement started this week with a luncheon in Hillside Inn.

Fundraising chairmen and JA officials discussed assignments and mapped out strategy to raise \$5,300 this month for the Plymouth Junior Achievement Center, 585 W. Ann Arbor Trail, which serves young people from high schools in Plymouth, Livonia, Redford and Westland.

April 11 is the deadline for the JA fundraising drive, but those involved in the campaign hope the local drive can be near completion by Feb. 28.

KEN WEST, general chairman for the local drive, says it costs about \$12,000 a year to operate the Plymouth center.

"We set \$5,300 as a goal because the area served by the Plymouth Center is

basically composed of bedroom communities and we don't want to put a lot of pressure on individuals. The difference between the \$5,300 and \$12,000 is made up by Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan, Inc.

"And so although our goal is \$5,300, we'd like to exceed that amount to lessen the amount which must be exceeded by other JA chapters."

Eight companies comprising about 160 students work out of the Plymouth Center. High schools which send 10 or more students to the center include Livonia Franklin, Plymouth Canton, Plymouth Salem, Northville, Livonia Churchill and Ladywood. Other schools which have students at the center include Livonia Stevenson, Westland John Glenn, Catholic Central, Divine Child and Redford's Bishop Borgess.

First which sponsor Plymouth Center JA companies include Ford Automotive Assembly, Ford Climate Control Division, Ford Transmission and Chassis Division, General Motors Parts Division, Chevrolet Division and Burroughs Corp.

West, division manager for Associated Spring in Plymouth Township, is a former advisor to a JA company.

BILL RAYMOND, director of administration and finance for Junior Achievement, reported that the fundraising goal for southeastern Michigan is \$700,000. Last year \$620,000 was raised.

"The Plymouth Center is a very active one," said Raymond. "Each company there averages \$1,000 a year in sales which compares to the national average of \$500."

Julie Bourlier, a student at Churchill, gave a report to the fundraising team of her company at the JA Center—Independent Youth Productions (IYP), which this year is manufacturing note pads and letter holders. As part of her JA experience, she has taken Dale Carnegie training under a scholarship granted by that organization. Dale Czabaj, representing Dale Carnegie in this area, says a similar scholarship will be given to a Junior Achiever this year.

The basic purpose of JA is to acquaint high school students with how business is conducted and how corporations are organized. The program stresses first-hand experience in business operation, development of skills, abilities, confidence and leadership, and career-direction.

A new program added this past year is Project Business, which involves

businessmen and leaders in industry appearing at high schools for career discussions.

In reporting on the success of JA, Raymond noted that a survey taken recently showed that:

•Some 60 per cent of Junior Achievers knew that an average corporate profit was three to six per cent while most college students thought it was 45 per cent.

•About 70 per cent of achievers defined profit as the difference between sales income and operating costs while only 28 per cent of the adults did so.

•Almost 93 per cent of JA members have a "good to very good impression of the American business system."

Raymond also reported that some 70 Project Business classes opened Jan. 30 in southeastern Michigan, including at schools in Clarenceville, Livonia, Redford Union and Wayne-Westland school districts.

In 1977-78, there were 249 JA companies in southeastern Michigan involving some 5,320 students and 1,000 adult advisors from business. About 180 schools are represented in JA at 26 centers throughout the region.

Hearing on 'quits'

A legislative committee studying the impact of "voluntary quits" on Michigan's unemployment compensation system will hold a public hearing in western Wayne County Monday.

The house committee will open the hearing at 10 a.m. in Westland City Hall, 36601 Ford Road, according to State Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), a member.

The committee is headed by Rep. Claude Trim (D-Davison) with Brown as vice-chairman. Another area lawmaker among the 13 members is Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti), whose district extends into Plymouth.

THE PANEL is reviewing the employment security law to determine if workers who voluntarily quit their jobs should, under certain conditions, be entitled to unemployment compensation.

Present law disqualifies persons from jobless benefits for 13 weeks if they quit their jobs without cause attributable to their employers.

"There are two sides to the issue of voluntary quits," said Brown.

"One the one side, there are those who feel it is unfair to pay unemployment compensation to those who quit their jobs because the system is designed to provide income replacement for those who are out of work through no fault of their own. They want the law tougher.

"HOWEVER, there are those who feel the law is too punitive, since people can be disqualified from benefits after being placed in a position where they have to quit. They feel these people are not protected because of the way the system is run."

What does that gesture mean?

Ever get the feeling people are trying to tell you something even when they're not saying anything?

They probably are—in body language.

The trick is knowing what kind of messages you are getting.

"People pick up and give out thousands of units of information everyday through body language," said Sandra Prochazka. "But most of us don't know how to sort them out and make sense out of them."

Ms. Prochazka, a counselor with Associated Counseling Services in Plymouth, has a special interest in body language.

On Saturday she will offer an all-day class entitled "Communicating Through Body Language." The class starts at 8:45 a.m. and will be held at Schoolcraft College on Haggerty Road.

Why lawmakers cut SC board to 7

Schoolcraft College trustees failed to impress a legislative conference committee that the two-year college should be the only one in Michigan with a nine-member board, says State Sen. R. Robert Geake (R-Northville).

Besides, Geake added, "It is an historical accident that the Schoolcraft board now has eight members."

Geake was a senate member of a joint conference committee which recently recommended that Schoolcraft's board be cut from the current eight members to seven, the same as the state's other 28 community colleges. House action is pending.

The Schoolcraft board has gone on record 6-2 as favoring increasing its members to nine in order to break deadlocks. Some Democratic-leaning trustees had criticized Geake in scathing terms for his vote for a seven-member board.

college the standard seven-member board, the legislature provided that one board member be elected from each community, leaving three to be elected at large. When Northville joined the college district later, the board was bumped up to eight members.

"The eight-member board never worked well. It set the stage for a number of tie votes and required that five members agree to every board motion in order to make a majority."

"ARGUMENTS that Schoolcraft College is larger and serves more students and faculty than most community colleges did not impress the conference committee," Geake said.

"The legislators all knew that Wayne State University, Michigan State University and the University of Michigan

all get along with eight members on their governing boards.

"It was hard to see why Schoolcraft College should have nine."

"The main argument in favor of seven was uniformity with the other community colleges. I just couldn't see saddling taxpayers with two extra public officials."

Geake rejected arguments that a nine-member board would make it easier for candidates from the four small districts to get elected. (Livonia, with about 50 per cent of the college district population, has 75 per cent of the board seats.)

In 1977, the three front runners were all Livonians, he said. In 1975, all six candidates were Livonians.

"Clearly, expanding the board to nine, or even 11, members would not have helped balance the board," Geake said.

In only 3 years

First National becomes fastest growing bank

In the little more than three years of its existence, the First National Bank of Plymouth has become the fastest growing banking institution in its federal reserve district. The Seventh Federal Reserve District includes the lower peninsula of Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa and part of Wisconsin.

Opening its doors for the first time at the south end of the Meeting House building in October of 1974, it now is housed in the colonial-type structure on S. Main Street.

SITTING IN HIS office, Charles Heidt, the president, recalled some of the steps in the fantastic growth.

"We seemed to be a success right from the start, as we opened 1,400

accounts in the first four days. And now we have more than 15,000 accounts. This shows the phenomenal growth we have experienced."

Battling for the honor of being the fastest growing bank in the district, the Plymouth bank is just a bit ahead of Grand Blanc bank. But Heidt smiles off the challenge and produces the tell-tale figures that put First

National in the lead.

"It is a neck and neck race," Heidt said, "but these figures on our bank are hard to beat."

He then pointed out that the total assets of the bank in December 1975 were \$10 million. By December 1976 assets jumped to \$15.7 million and in December 1977 reached \$22 million.

"When you increase your assets

more than 100 per cent in the short space of three years is going to be difficult for anyone to pass you."

Heidt also pointed out the significant fact that the bank now is in the position where it is attempting to control its growth. He confided that every attempt is being made to limit the service area within an eight-mile radius of the home bank.

absorbing the cost of opening the branch.

"During the coming year we will have no expansions of this main office or no new branches and the profit factor could more than double."

Heidt and his officers are proud of the competition in which they engaged in the seventh Federal Reserve District and point out that it is good, healthy strong competition.

The real story behind the growth of First National, according to Heidt is that all business is built on the thought of being a community bank and thus take part in all sorts of community activities.

"We're a 'home bank' and strive to be part of the community. We don't use the type of advertising that is an attempt to lure depositors and investors. We don't use any 'gimmicks'."

"We like to know our depositors and greet them when they enter the bank and this 'home' feeling has figured in our growth as much as anything."

Local reps back legislation against mandatory retirement

Forced retirement.

The words raise an icy chill in many who are approaching life's golden age, which is traditionally marked by the 65th birthday.

An amendment to the Michigan Civil Rights Act, which was recently approved by a 97-2 vote in the Michigan House of Representatives, would put an end to mandatory retirement in both the public and private sector. It is currently being considered by the state senate.

The bill gained the support of every representative in the Observer & Eccentric circulation area, including: John Bennett (D-Redford), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), William Keith (D-Garden City), Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia), Robert Law (R-Livonia) and Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti), whose district includes most of Plymouth.

In Oakland County, Reps Wilbur Brotherton (R-Farmington), James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham), Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Richard Fessler (R-Union Lake), Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham) and Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights) supported the bill.

The only two dissenting votes came from Reps. Joseph Young (D-Detroit) and Mary Brown (D-Kalamazoo).

"This legislation," said Rep. Perry Bullard (D-Ann Arbor), the bill's sponsor, "guarantees the right of every Michigan citizen to work and contribute to the economy without regard to age."

"Freedom of choice" seems to have been the bill's major selling point.

"Those individuals who retire on Social Security and a small pension often discover that they have too little money to live even modestly," Bullard said. "Such people often desire the option to continue working, but are forced to retire instead. They often become impoverished."

"There are still going to be a number of people who are going to retire, but this gives them the option to continue working," he said.

Opponents of the ban on forced retirement argued in House Civil Rights Committee hearings that the bill would rob younger people of job opportunities. Bullard, however, estimated that only about seven percent of retirement-age workers would want to continue working.

AREA REPRESENTATIVES voiced more concern about the effects of forced retirement on those being forced to retire.

"It doesn't make sense for those who

are still going full tilt both physically and mentally. It practically ended the lives of some of those people who had worked all of their lives," said Forbes, Democratic floor leader.

"I know of a couple of instances where mandatory retirement has been like cutting the cord to life for them. Working gives them the will to go on," Forbes said. "Some just retire into oblivion."

Even though the bill makes an option available, there could apparently be some problems.

"It's designed to eliminate traumatic experiences. I think it'll have the opposite effect in some instances," Brotherton said.

He said that before the bill, companies would "carry" some of their older employees until they retired. He said, "Companies used to say 'Let's not demand as much of them. Let's put them in an advisory capacity.'"

"Now," Brotherton said, "if a person doesn't have to retire, the company might be forced into making cruel decisions. They'll have to say 'You can't do it.'"

"It's all up on the table then," he said.

How to handle complaints on health care

What can people do when they have a complaint about the care a family member has received while in a hospital or while under a doctor's care?

St. Mary Hospital recently received a letter from a woman whose daughter was taken to that hospital suffering from a broken arm.

She sent a copy of her letter to the Observer. It contained complaints about the care her daughter received while in the St. Mary emergency room and while being treated by a St. Mary doctor.

Who can a patient go to when he or she has a complaint?

First, the patient must decide if the complaint is with the hospital or the doctor, a hospital official said.

If the complaint is with the hospital, the patient should contact the hospital administrator in writing.

Rita Radzialowski, acting chief administrator at St. Mary Hospital, said any calls or complaints are taken seriously by the hospital's staff.

"WE MAKE SURE the three heads

of staff in the hospital know about any complaint we have received," she said.

But the acting administrator did stress that the hospital gets very few complaints.

"I would say this is probably the only complaint we have received all year," she added, referring to the woman's letter.

Anne Gusfa, director of nursing services at the hospital, supported the administrator's statement.

"We get very few, if any, complaints and review them very seriously," she said.

At St. Mary, three top administrators study any complaint, according to Miss Radzialowski.

The chief of staff receives a copy of any letter complaining about a doctor, and Miss Radzialowski, as chief administrator, also sees any and all complaints.

Mrs. Gusfa, coordinator of services that involve nursing, is also contacted when a patient registers a complaint.

When all the administrators see the complaint, the patient receives a letter

assuring him the matter is under study by an inquiry board.

MISS RADZIALOWSKI explained why patients may be upset with the care they received in a hospital emergency room.

"Most complaints are about the time it takes us to take care of an emergency room patient," she said.

There are a few causes for delay, she explained.

St. Mary's emergency room is leased out to a corporation of doctors who are not allowed to admit any patients to the hospital.

They are allowed to do only emergency work. After an emergency room doctor's work is completed, the patient's family doctor or a hospital doctor will admit a patient.

Finding the family doctor, or another doctor with the authority to admit a patient may take some time, said Miss Radzialowski.

She also said that highway accidents, drug overdoses and persons who are not breathing are higher priority cases than person with colds or broken arms.

"Someone who comes in with a broken arm may have to wait because we have an industrial accident that requires immediate attention," Miss Radzialowski explained.

"Those people in the waiting room can't see that," she continued. "All they know is that someone in their family is hurting and they are not being taken care of right away. This kind of thing is what makes them mad."

IF PATIENTS FEELS their quarrel

is with the doctor that treated him, they can follow another procedure.

Roger Meekum, executive director of the Wayne County Medical Society, outlined what a disgruntled patient should do about a doctor's services.

Again, a complaint must be in writing. The society will not register any complaint by phone.

After the patient sends the complaint to the society, Meekum explained, the report is referred to one of three committees.

It goes to either the claims review committee, the ethics committee or the mediation committee.

Most patients would not have any dealings with the claims review committee, Meekum said. This committee deals only with insurance claims and other third party fee disputes.

A patient complaint would be sent to the mediation committee or the ethics committee.

MEEKUM SAID THE physician involved must also be a member of the society.

"We only have jurisdiction over our own," he explained. "If the physician is not a member of our society, we are obligated to lodge the complaint with the medical practices board in Lansing."

Once a complaint is registered, the 2,600 active-member society sends a letter of acknowledgement to the patient.

"We also send a release form to the patient. He has to sign the release so a

third party—the society—can enter a confidential situation."

If the patient complains about a doctor's high fees, the mediation committee will study the problem. If the complaint deals with a doctor's ethics, the problem is considered more serious, Meekum said, and will be referred to the ethics committee.

"Most of our disputes are settled by mail," Meekum explained. "Only on a rare occasion is it necessary to call in

the doctor and the patient for an interview with the committee."

"Many others are resolved by the patient and the doctor," he continued. "And the committee doesn't have to make a decision."

He did say that two or three disputes are settled per month by the mediation or ethics committees.

The Wayne County Medical Society is at 1010 Antietam, Detroit.

Local highways to be landscaped

Landscaping highways in western Wayne County is high on the list of priorities of the Michigan Department of Highways and Transportation.

The highway department is seeking bids on five landscaping projects in or leading to western Wayne. All are expected to be completed by July. Total cost is estimated at more than \$400,000.

Among the projects are:

- More than 9½ miles of I-275 between I-94 and the Monroe County line. It is expected to cost \$150,000.
- More than 2½ miles of I-96 between Evergreen and Schaefer Roads. The project is expected to cost \$80,000.
- More than 3½ miles of I-275 between I-94 and Michigan Avenue in Romulus and Canton and Van Buren Townships.

It is expected to cost \$70,000.

• More than five miles of Eight Mile Road between Grand River Avenue and the Lodge Freeway. It will cost an estimated \$80,000.

• A small portion of Eight Mile Road between Oak Park and Coolidge Road in Oak Park. It will cost \$30,000.

The highway department will also be taking bids on a modernization of a 2.8-mile section of Michigan Avenue between Henry Ruff Road and Gully Road. The project will cost an estimated \$4.1 million and is expected to be completed in December 1979.

Bids will also be taken for a signing project involving a 12-mile section of M-14, which is now under construction. The project will cost approximately \$300,000 and is expected to be completed in November.

Contract talks should be held in fishbowl

By a single vote out of more than 300 cast, the Michigan Association of School Boards last year rejected the concept of opening collective bargaining sessions to the public.

There's a likelihood that next fall the MASB will adopt a compromise resolution which would open of one party—either the school board or the teacher-employee union—requested it. In that case the state legislature would be asked to enact it into law.

IN MY OPINION the pressure for open school negotiations should come from the public, the taxpayers who foot the bill for decisions reached in secret negotiations.

Currently there is a law that leaves the option for open sessions up to local school boards and unions. If both agree, open negotiation sessions are permitted.

Obviously, the question of open negotiations meetings is a controversial one. It would appear that both sides hold some fear of public exposure.

Speaking for the record

But it's difficult to understand why they should ever be closed when you consider the fact that it is public dollars which are being spent. And the dollars involved constitute about three-fourths of most school systems' operating budgets.

It isn't enough to point to such huge sums of money as built-in operating costs without accountability.

The public, I believe, is mature enough to recognize the gamesmanship that takes place in negotiations. But it also exercises enough influence to reduce the nonsense and keep both sides closer to the track of serious negotiations.

There's an annoying suggestion that school boards and unions don't trust the public's ability to comprehend the sophistication of bargaining.

In reality, it should be the public that is screaming about where the power of final judgement should rest.

PUBLIC NEGOTIATIONS have been conducted successfully by law in Florida since 1974. Known as "Goldfish Bowl Negotiations," they have prompted many officials of the Florida School Board Association, who previously had opposed open negotiations, to admit that the public interest is best served by the new procedure.

Many, however, still dislike operating in a goldfish bowl. They contend (both board and union) that it is more difficult to bargain for a better deal with the public looking over their shoulders.

Yet one must wonder whether it's a "better deal" for the taxpayer.

In my opinion, the public's right to know is paramount in almost every instance involving tax-supported agencies. There are exceptions, and these are enumerated in the state's open meetings legislation.

But negotiations conducted to determine how the giant share of the school district's money is to be spent should not qualify as one of those exceptions.

Musically ours

Metropolitan Detroit has a reputation as a sports town. So who do you think has the best season ticket sales—the Pistons, the Tigers, the Red Wings or the symphony?

Some 17,338 season tickets to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra have been sold this year, making it the leading box office attraction in that department. The increase was 13 per cent in a single year.

We had hoped people in the metropolitan area would respond to the fund appeal of Michigan's premier orchestra. We anticipated a good gifts list. What we didn't expect was that folks would exceed the \$1.5 million goal by 40 per cent and give more than \$2.1 million—a record.

Antal Dorati, the new musical director, is receiving the lion's share of the credit because he is considered an international "name." DSO will again make recordings and make its first foreign tour. But it couldn't have happened unless a lot of people, wealthy and otherwise, and a lot of organizations, big and small, chipped in.

Two new uses for the freeway money

More than a quarter of a century ago, beginning in the 1950s, the Eisenhower Administration launched the interstate freeway construction program.

It was one of the most massive public works undertakings in the history of the western world since the Pyramids.

Today, the interstate construction program is almost over. Michigan's construction neared an end with the finishing locally last year of the north-south I-275 and of the east-west Jeffries.

The single remaining major project is M-14 to Ann Arbor, scheduled to be finished this fall or early spring of 1979. The remaining links in the system, such as M-275 through Oakland County

and the I-696 link past the Detroit Zoo, may never be completed.

UNDER THE INTERSTATE freeway program, the federal government put up 90 per cent of the money for construction, with states picking up the balance.

During the past 26 years, billions of federal dollars have been invested in freeway construction. With that system near completion, now is a good time for our U.S. representatives to consider how those dollars should be re-allocated.

Two alternatives make immediate sense. One is to allocate federal funds for road maintenance. The other to allocate an increased amount of fed-

eral bucks for public transportation to relieve the burden on the freeway systems of urban areas.

Both alternatives probably can be financed, given the billions which have been invested in the interstate system. Without taking away from the need to invest in public transportation, Congress should consider a major investment in road maintenance.

Many of the freeway systems built 20 years ago or more—e.g., the Edsel Ford and the John Lodge—are already beginning to wear down and need major reconstruction. The same is true of state highways such as Michigan Avenue, stretches of Ford Road and Ann Arbor Road.

In fact, once a motorist gets off the infants I-275 or Jeffries, he doesn't have to drive very far before bumping along on an older interstate or state highway badly in need of reconstruction or resurfacing.

And the same motorists doesn't have to drive far before encountering bumper-to-bumper traffic, caused partly by new volumes of autos emptying from new freeways onto feeder roads which haven't been widened.

If the federal government was inclined to allocate \$10 billion for the metropolitan Detroit area, the money could be well spent for projects such as:

Resurfacing the Edsel Ford and John Lodge inside Detroit corporate limits.

Resurfacing I-96 from Novi to Brighton.

Resurfacing Ford Road from Canton Center Road west, and widening of Ford from Canton Center to Newburgh Road.

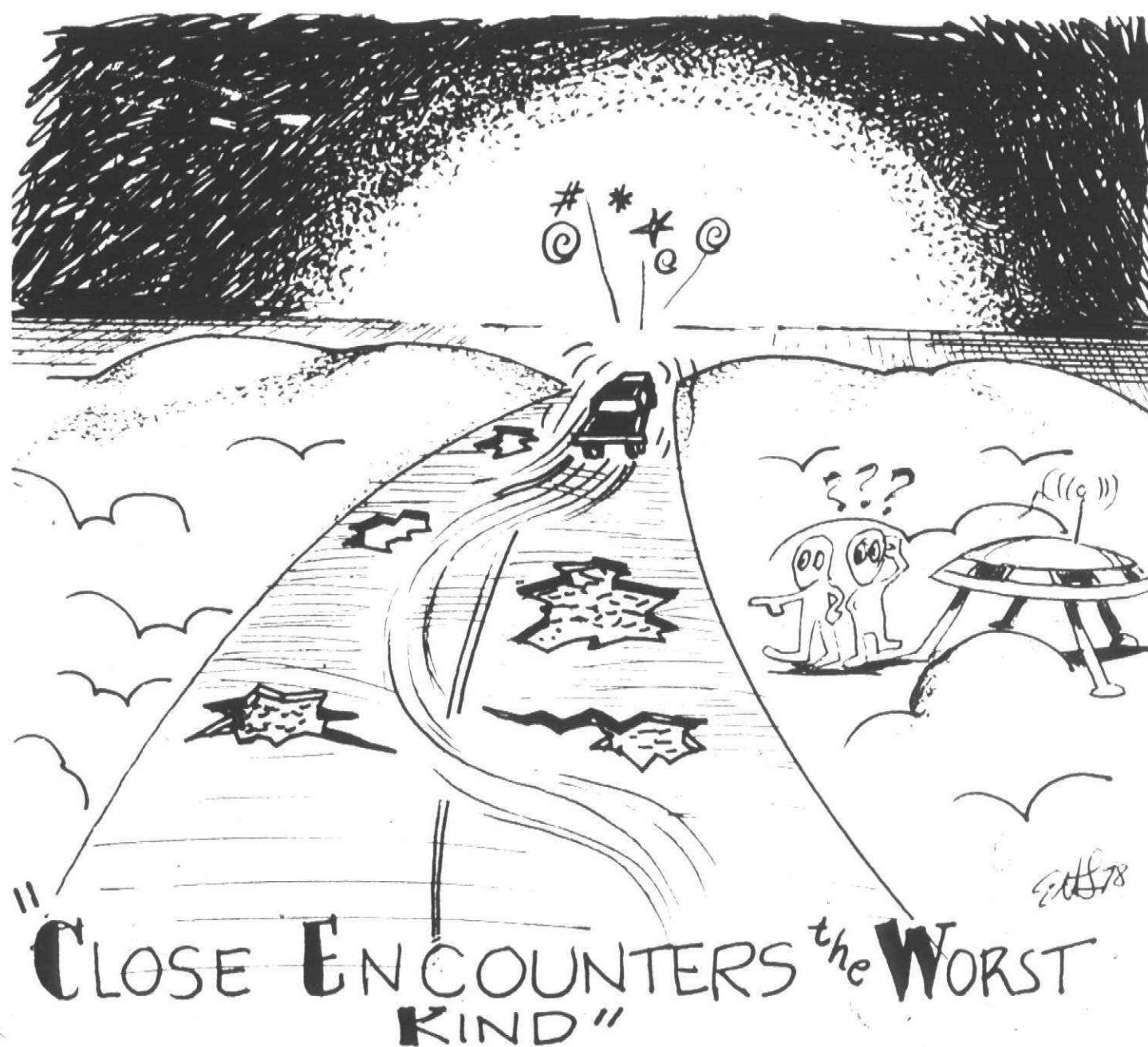
Resurfacing Michigan Avenue from Newburgh west to I-94.

Widening Ann Arbor Road from Sheldon Road to the hook-up with M-14.

Widening Eight Mile from Farmington Road west to I-275.

TO THIS partial list could be added other major roads to resurface and widen that likely would add up to another \$10 billion. And when that was done, there's the question of routine maintenance of major roads through unincorporated areas (townships, villages) where county road commissions haven't been able to keep pace with demand.

The point is that taxpayers have invested billions of bucks to build a fine transportation network, and that investment should be protected by using federal funds for reconstruction and maintenance. Let's not lose returns on a good investment by letting our older freeways and highways deteriorate.



Oneword trend is upcoming, ongoing

Memo from the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers' copy desk: Henceforth the road that crosses two counties will be called "Middlebelt," one word, and not "Middle Belt."

The memo made some sense—everyone, especially the highway department, calls it Middlebelt, so why should we be different?

But the old-timers in the organization (anyone who has been around more than three years) shed a tear. A decade ago, the late Martha Mahan, one of the most diligent newsmen anyone ever saw, did some painstaking research into the records of Wayne and Oakland counties and found that it was supposed to be Middle Belt, legally.

It seems the authorities had designed three belt-lines around the metropolis—an inner belt, a middle belt and an outer belt. Only one was ever built.

Martha's research has been thrown out. We are conforming to popular culture. Middlebelt it is.

THE MORAL of the story is that the English language is maturing, like the German, and getting longer and longer words. Eight-syllable monster: "Kolonialwarenladen." It means grocery store.

We're getting like that in the good ol' U.S. of A. We used to call them markets. Then they were super markets. Today they are supermarkets.

One that grates me is Kmart. That's the correct version of that trade name. Not K Mart, K-Mart, K mart or K-mart. It looks all right on the signs because the K is in a funny red and the mart in a funny blue. But in black and white, Kmart looks funny. Well, it's their name, but it would be satisfying if literate people stopped pronouncing it "kay-mart" and began calling it "kmart."

THE HYPHEN, so useful in combining two or more words, is being systematically eliminated. I sincerely regret that because you can make such nice combination words with hyphens. Consider the historic steamboat "Walk-in-the-Water." Today we would call it "Walkinthewater." Silly.

The new grammatical rule is that when the combination is used as a noun it's one word, and when it's a verb you make it two words. Thus: The ice breakup will come in April. The ice breaks up in

You never would believe that the common cold which has made so many of us so miserable this winter has anything in common with the chuckholes that have made driving on our streets so hazardous.

That is, you wouldn't believe it unless you happened to be sitting with The Stroller at the Rotary luncheon the other day when colds and chuckholes dominated the conversation.

It all started when one fellow, who had driven quite a way to get there, complained about conditions he conquered en route.

"A fellow takes his life in his own hands," he said as he recalled the many obstacle courses he faced along the way. "Down in Lincoln Park was the worst stretch I came across. There is a stretch of Southfield Road that is not fit to travel, and I very nearly became an accident victim. It wasn't so bad after that—nothing would be worse—but I can't understand why somebody, somewhere, hasn't come up with a solution to eliminate those potholes in the road."

JUST AT THAT moment, another fellow coughed and sneezed. "I've got a dandy," he said as he reached for a handkerchief.

It just so happened that The Stroller's good friend, Dr. "Charlie" Westover, was seated at our table. It was only natural, then, to ask: "Do you think they ever will come up with a cure for the common cold?"

"Not in my lifetime," he answered, "and not in yours either."

With that he smiled just a bit as if his prophecy were taken as a joke. But

the doctor, one of the old-fashioned medics who still makes house calls, wasn't joking.

"I've been around medicine for a long time," Charlie said, "and we have come up with a lot of great things to help eliminate disease. But a cure for the common cold is not one of them."

His remark got The Stroller to thinking.

WHEN HE WAS a young lad, Mother had her own Pennsylvania Dutch remedy that brought him relief. If it was a chest cold, she'd apply an old-fashioned mustard plaster on his chest and rub him with camphorated oil.

If the cold produced a lot of coughing and a sore throat, she'd wrap a piece of flannel around his neck along with a rub of camphorated oil. And she was always quick to use sulphur and molasses if the cold persisted.

Through the years, The Stroller has taken a lot of "cough medicine," but none of the modern medicines seemed to work as quickly and effectively as the mustard plaster and camphorated oil.

It is a strange coincidence, that through all the years that the country's scientists and research men have been searching for a cure for the common cold, the best students of road construction have been working on what they hoped would bring an end to the annual curse of street chuckholes.

The lone method of eliminating them thus far is to lay concrete roads. This is a costly method and far out of the financial reach of most cities, villages and townships. From time to time,

someone has claimed a victory over these street cavities. But thus far, they have met with little success.

SEVERAL YEARS AGO, a plan was offered that was claimed would do the trick. This plan called for digging up the present street to a depth of about 18 inches. Then the plan called for mixing the earth with the blacktop asphalt. Thus far, it is only an experiment. At least the streets are still filled with cavities that make them look like scarred battlefields—and almost as dangerous.

As he sat listening to these various comments on colds and chuckholes, The Stroller recalled a sunny afternoon in the grill room of a golf course in Ohio listening to the late "Boss Kettering," the great research giant of General Motors.

"Boss" used to hold court in the grill room of his favorite course in Dayton on Saturday afternoons. On this particular afternoon, The Stroller was among his ardent listeners when a young engineer who had just been graduated from one of our leading universities spoke up.

"I don't know what we can accomplish that has not already been done by men like you."

Boss looked up with that quaint smile of his and asked:

"Son, do you know what makes grass green? Why isn't it yellow or pink? If you can get the answer to that, you'll never have to worry about making a living."

If he were living today, Boss Kettering no doubt would add the common cold and chuckholes to his list of things that would make men wealthy—if they could find remedies.

Bridgette cried when we told her Grandma might die.

Bridgette is 9 years old. Grandma is 90.

For Bridgette, this will be the first time a close loved one has died. Of course, Grandma has seen many loved ones die during her lifetime—including Grandpa, who died almost 15 years ago.

Grandma is not crying because she's ready to die, but that's something which cannot be comprehended by someone with only nine years' experience with life and just a few minutes to think about death.

It is also the difference between four generations. My daughter Bridgette, one of the great-grandchildren, knows only of a few years of Grandma's life. And to her, death seems most unfair. For the other generations, mine included, death has much more meaning as we know the full life Grandma has lived and how little is left for her to do.

OVER THE WEEKEND I had driven up to Saginaw to see Grandma in the hospital, knowing that she was failing fast.

After spending some time with her, I left knowing she wouldn't live too many days beyond her 90th birthday on Feb. 7. I began to think about how to break the news to Bridgette: Should she know in advance or should we wait until Grandma died?

As things turned out, she overheard us talking about Grandma's condition

and surmised for herself that it was serious.

"Is Grandma going to die?" she blurted out. "Yes, there's a good chance Grandma will die soon," I answered bluntly.

She burst into tears. For a few minutes, I let her get the tears out because tears have a way of flushing out ugly feelings from our bodies.

But the minutes passed like seconds, and far too soon I approached the coach to talk with Bridgette about death in general and in particular about Grandma dying. In spite of my thinking in advance about how to handle this moment, I still was unprepared.

I TALKED ABOUT the normal advantages of death—it ends pain and suffering, it adds an exclamation point to a life story, it ends the physical struggle of a body too old to fight any more, and so on.

We talked about death being a part of life, and how Grandma was fortunate to die old instead of having her life cut short. I counseled her to think of the good things about dying, as well as the bad thoughts she had.

She asked why Grandma had to die now, when she was just getting to know her so well. I answered that it was a good thing Grandma had lived long enough to get to know her at all—that all of my great-grandparents had died before my birth.

And then I talked about Grandma for awhile: How she was in a bad acci-

dent 20 years ago and had been crippled since; how she had lived without her husband for almost 15 years; how she had the chance to knit baby booties for all her great-grandchildren, and crochet pillow-covers as wedding presents for all the grandchildren. We talked about how Grandma had done everything in life she wanted to do—the great accomplishments and the simple accomplishments—and didn't really have any unfinished business on her personal agenda.

We talked about a lot of things I hadn't thought about in advance—when I was thinking about how to approach her about the subject of death. And she seemed to understand, and accept, most of what we said.

But when it was all over, the initial pain had not been lessened. Bridgette was 9 and grandma was 90, and too little of their lives had crossed each other's paths before one path was being erased. Grandma and I had walked the same path for 35 years and we shared many memories. Bridgette's path with Grandma was much shorter, and for her there was mostly an anticipation of experiences to be shared in the future. That's a pain of generations that only the two can share—if only there were more time to love, to share, to enjoy each other.

That's the pain a father's counseling cannot ease. One must live longer to understand life and death, and it is living—not talking—which eases the pain of death.

It wasn't easy to find a vacancy, but thanks to the Yellow Pages (my fingers did the walking) I finally did, and then began to pack. My husband stood there watching me and supervising the entire ordeal. Men are so good at that.

He allowed me two suitcases and one brown paper bag full of toys. He vetoed the balloon, one of the boxes of diapers, and two extra pairs of shoes for me ("Where are you going to walk to in a motel room?")

We felt like pioneers as we headed off into the storm in search of heat, lights, and a color television set. The motel, which shall remain nameless, had a definite lack of charm. Not

exactly one of those places you'd call a "home away from home." There was a leak in the sink (which for some mysterious reason was in the closet) that sounded like someone was taking a shower. The decor was early cheap with highlights of much use and abuse. It also had a very distinctive smell—not unlike the ladies room in a bus station.

BUT THE CROWNING touch to our place of refuge was that there was blood all over the mouthpiece of the phone.

I realize that it may be a little tacky to talk about it, but imagine how I felt when I had to call my mother and talk into the scene of somebody else's nosebleed. A bummer, to say the least.

But we were very thankful for the heat, the TV which enabled my husband to watch "Andy Griffith," and the lights which enabled me to finish reading the morning paper and catch up on my back issues of Rona Barrett.

We had just spent \$22 to spend two hours in a motel. If you're a swinger, it's probably not a bad investment. But when you've had to go into a blizzard to get there, and you've brought a 3-year-old and a 1-year-old with you, it becomes just another in a series of misadventures in the life and times of Nancy Walls Smith.

If delegation makes sense, why is it resisted so much?

If management means getting results through people, then delegation may be the art of piecing and parcelling out the tasks to create a result.

Of course delegation should be done in an organized, coherent and integrated way so that those accountable for the result have a clear understanding of their contribution to that end, and can feel a sense of pride in its accomplishment.

A simple definition of delegation might then read, "the clarification of roles, relationships and responsibilities for the purpose of directing resources to the accomplishment of a pre-determined and worthwhile end."

Even more simply, delegation is giving a subordinate a task to do, the responsibility and accountability for doing it and the required authority and resources to complete it.

TEACHING MANAGERS the art of delegation is very simple. The principles are few and easy to learn. But doing it at all and doing it properly is not quite so simple or easy.

What stands in the way of delegation? Why don't managers do more of it and save themselves time, work and headaches? Well here are a few reasons given to me by managers:

1. The only way to get a job done right and done on time is to do it yourself.

2. Fear of failure and fear of risk involved in delegating.

3. Never ask a subordinate to do something you can do better.

4. Occupational hobby—manager prefers his technical functions to his managerial functions. "If there's research to do here, I'll do it myself."

5. Fear that subordinates will show him up.

6. Crises—no time to delegate.

7. No time to explain what I want done.

AS YOU CAN SEE, most of the managers' responses fall into two major categories: lack of trust in subordinates and false sense of pride. Perhaps both explanations stem from these weaknesses: a lack of security in management role and a lack of faith in people.

For the manager who has no faith in people, the solution may lie in frontal lobotomy, long-term therapy or religious conversion. The odds are if he or she continues on for any extended period of time doing everything, there is a likelihood of physical or emotional breakdown.

But feeling insecure in a management role is something every new manager experiences. And, unfortunately, it may recur from time to time even for seasoned managers. The remedy here is self-awareness and re-learning to trust others.

When you begin to feel you are doing more and your subordinates are doing less and less or just watching you work, it's time to take stock and resolve to change. Try to remember how rejected you felt as a little boy or girl when dad took the hammer away and said, "I'll make your darn scooter, dollhouse, etc. You're doing it all wrong anyway."

You may be surprised to know your subordinates also feel that way when you do their work for them. Better that you allow them to make a few mistakes. You can learn from mistakes, but you can't learn by never doing.

Waisting Aweigh

A guide to calorie counting

Almost everyone knows what calories are.

But those of us plagued by weight problems tend to think of them negatively; those unseen little critters oozing out of all the fattening foods. Sometimes we think we gain weight just by looking at them. We can do without them. Right? Wrong.

We need them for such basics as breathing, sleeping and walking. We need them to survive ordinary activity. The clue to proper usage is knowing what they are, how many are contained in various foods, and the way our bodies metabolize them.

QUITE SIMPLY, a calorie is a unit of measure used to denote the amount of energy produced by a particular food.

About 3,500 calories are needed to gain just one pound. Subsequently, to lose one pound, one must consume 3,500 calories less. The amount of weight we gain or lose is in direct proportion to the calories consumed. Need to gain weight (don't we wish), eat more. Need to lose? Eat less.

How much less? Learn to count calories. You need just two items—a calorie counter, and a sheet of paper.

Calorie counters are available at the checkout stands of local markets and at bookstores. They need not be expensive. Don't forget to look in the cookbook. Often these books have a calorie table.

Dell Purse Books offer at least two calorie counters. One is a small book containing the basic food, listed alphabetically and a special table listing

alcoholic beverages. The other is the Brand-Name Calorie Counter. This lists foods according to groupings such as breadstuffs and crackers in one group; frozen dinners, pot pies, and other entrees in another. It also includes a list of "goodies". Being realistic, you may need that from time to time.

Other books on a larger scale at a larger price are available. Some even list the calorie counts contained in a meal at a fast-food restaurant. Suit yourself. Just be sure you have a calo-

rie counter. And don't overlook the labels on food packages and cans. Many now include the calorie count per portion of the product.

NEXT, DEVISE A method for writing down what you eat and the calories you have consumed.

Simply use a sheet of paper and write down each food eaten, meal by meal. You may wish to devise a chart showing a week at a time, meal by meal.

I, myself, find the seven-day chart quite efficient. It enables me to see at a glance exactly what I have eaten all week and how many calories per day I have consumed.

The most important thing about counting calories is honesty in writing them down. If you had an eight ounce steak, count it as eight ounces and not as six ounces. If you tasted the ice-cream, write that down too, that taste had calories in it.

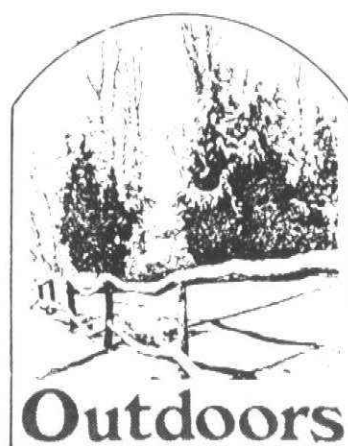
At the end of seven days add up the calories you consumed and average them for each day. Then, step on the scales. If you lost even a pound you have eliminated at least 3,500 calories from your weekly intake.

If you gained—and it can happen—you must learn to cut down even more. This is a learning process. Don't be discouraged. You'll learn by trial and error.

Make counting calories a new habit. I'm sure you'll find it a positive aid to weight control.

TIP OF THE WEEK: When you count calories count all of them. If you don't you are only fooling yourself.

Meeting to rescue the lakes

The state Natural Resources Commission is making a rare visit to southeast Michigan today and Friday and will be lobbied heavily on behalf of local projects.

Getting most attention will be Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young. He is expected to talk about the city's riverfront.

Waiting in the wings will be suburban sportsmen, especially those interested in Newburgh Lake in western Wayne County.

State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia) and representatives of the Wayne County parks department will seek the state's attention for Newburgh and the Middle Rouge River chain of lakes.

They have talked to the state in the past about dredging Newburgh Lake, where pollution has fertilized a buildup of algae and weeds, causing the lake to die at a faster and faster rate. So far, the Department of Natural Resources staff has shaken their heads.

The Natural Resources Commission, governing body of the department, will meet beginning at 9 a.m. both days in the Belle Isle Nature Center at the north end of the park on the Detroit River.

SEVERAL NEARBY lakes are better prospects in 1978 after work by the DNR last year.

In Oakland County, Maceday, Deer and Union lakes should be excellent rainbow trout prospects. They had "rest and restocking" periods of two or more years.

In Wayne County, Belleville Lake has continued to develop as an excellent fishery for crappies, walleyes, bass and catfish, although the walleye reports were on the small side last year. That lake continues to suffer, however, from an almost continuous wake created by speedboats.

IF YOU DON'T know your way to the Huron-Clinton Metroparks, get yourself a free map which also happens to be the finest roadmap of southeast Michigan you can find.

The flip side of the road map contains detailed maps of the 10 metroparks in Oakland, Wayne, Livingston, Macomb and Washtenaw counties.

To obtain your map, send your name, address and 14 cents postage to: Metropark Map Dept. O&E, 3050 Penobscot Building, Detroit 48226.

You can also obtain one by dropping into the Huron-Clinton Metropark Authority office at that address or when you visit one of the parks.

THINGS ARE hopping in the way of organized activities at two of the metroparks. This weekend's schedule:

•A nature cross country ski tour will start from the Kensington Metropark nature center at 9 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 12. There's no charge for the event, but you should register in advance by calling the park office at 685-1561. You'll also need to pay \$1 daily admission or buy a \$5 season pass.

•"Planting for Birds" is a program that will help you attract birds to your yard. It starts at 10 a.m. Feb. 12 in the Kensington nature center. Naturalist Bob Hotaling will talk about planting trees, shrubs and other greenery which will give birds food and shelter. Again, call ahead for registration.

•Nature photography will be the

topic of an indoor slide talk by Stan Osolinski at 2 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 12 in the Oakwoods Metropark nature center, near Flat Rock. Osolinski took the stunning color photo of the Lake Superior shoreline that appeared in some editions of our newspapers. He is author of "Michigan," a book of wild-life and scenic photographs.

Twin tales of mystery, telepathy, superstition

A woman living in California experienced a severe pain in her left wrist. This pain, which began suddenly one Saturday afternoon, was great enough to bring tears to her eyes. Yet, X-rays and medical examination could reveal no cause for it.

It vanished completely, however, when the woman phoned her twin brother, who was living in Michigan. Only then did she learn that her brother had broken his wrist in an accident which took place at the exact moment at which she felt her first discomfort.

Such telepathic communication sometimes exists between ordinary brother and sister, parent and child, husband and wife, or even friend and friend. However, it seems to be especially prevalent between fraternal twins—such as those described above—and even more so between identical twins.

IDENTICAL TWINS are always of the same sex and develop from one fertilized egg. Fraternal twins, who may or may not be of the same sex, have developed from two separate, independently fertilized eggs.

Twinship often seems to show a relationship consisting not only of similarity in appearance, but also of some fascinating, mysterious, intangible quality which binds twins together even when they are physically separated by thousands of miles.

In primitive cultures, twins were often either feared or revered.

In some cultures, the weakest of the two was put to death, so as not to drain strength from the stronger. In such cases, the surviving child was given a carved piece of wood representing the deceased twin. This was to give the ghost of the dead child something to return to, so that it would not attempt to invade and possess the body of its living twin.

In some ancient societies, brother and sister twins were said to be "betrothed in the womb."

An Indian myth tells of twins named Yama and Yami, who were, according to legend, the first human couple.

THE OLD TESTAMENT mentions two pairs of twins: Esau and Jacob (Genesis 25); and Perez and Zerah



(Genesis 38). In the case of the second pair, who were the twin sons of Tamar, the mother is said to have conceived the pair as a result of harlotry.

In later times, uneducated people often continued to believe that the birth of twins indicated the mother's infidelity.

One of the most famous pairs of legendary twins is that of Romulus and Remus. According to legend, they were raised by a she-wolf, and later founded the city of Rome.

In today's astrology-conscious world, twins immediately bring to mind the zodiac sign of Gemini, and represent the dual personality of people born under that sign.

Today, much of the superstition surrounding the birth of twins has been done away with by a better understanding of the genetics of twinship, but there still remain many inexplicable events concerning the bond between twins.

I RECENTLY MET a woman who told me that she always believed herself a twin. She frequently dreamed of a twin sister. As a child, she fantasized such a sister for an imaginary playmate.

As an adult, she found herself frequently looking over one crowd of people she happened upon, for a face similar to her own.

Then, after years of denying the girl was a twin, her mother confessed on her deathbed that she had, indeed, given birth to twin girls. On the day of their birth, however, she had given one up to a woman whose child had been stillborn the same day.

No one but herself and the doctor attending her had ever known this. But the twin she had kept with her spent the rest of her life searching for her lost sister, whom she seems to have remembered from the womb.

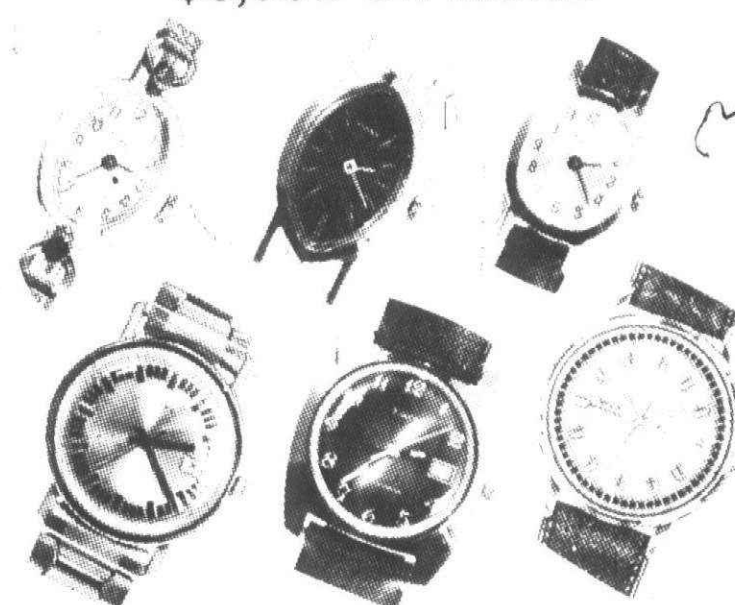

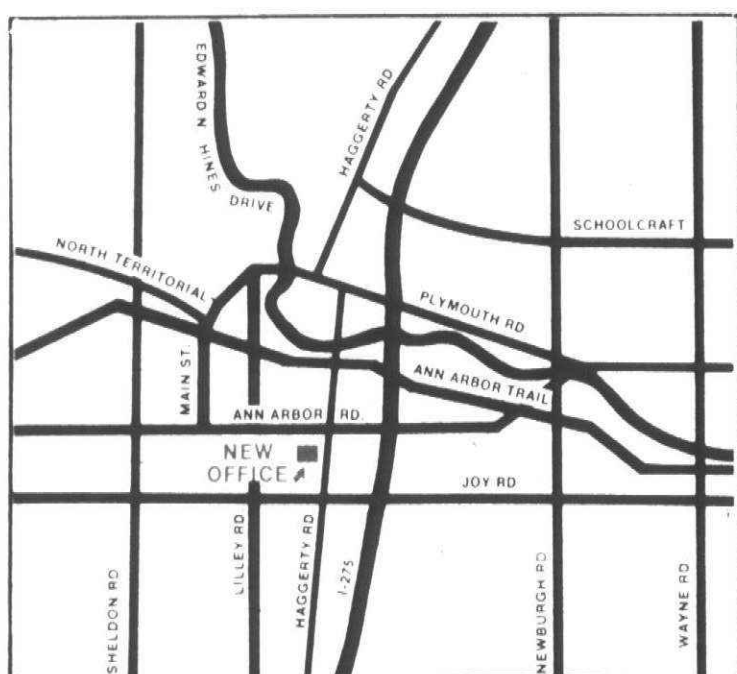

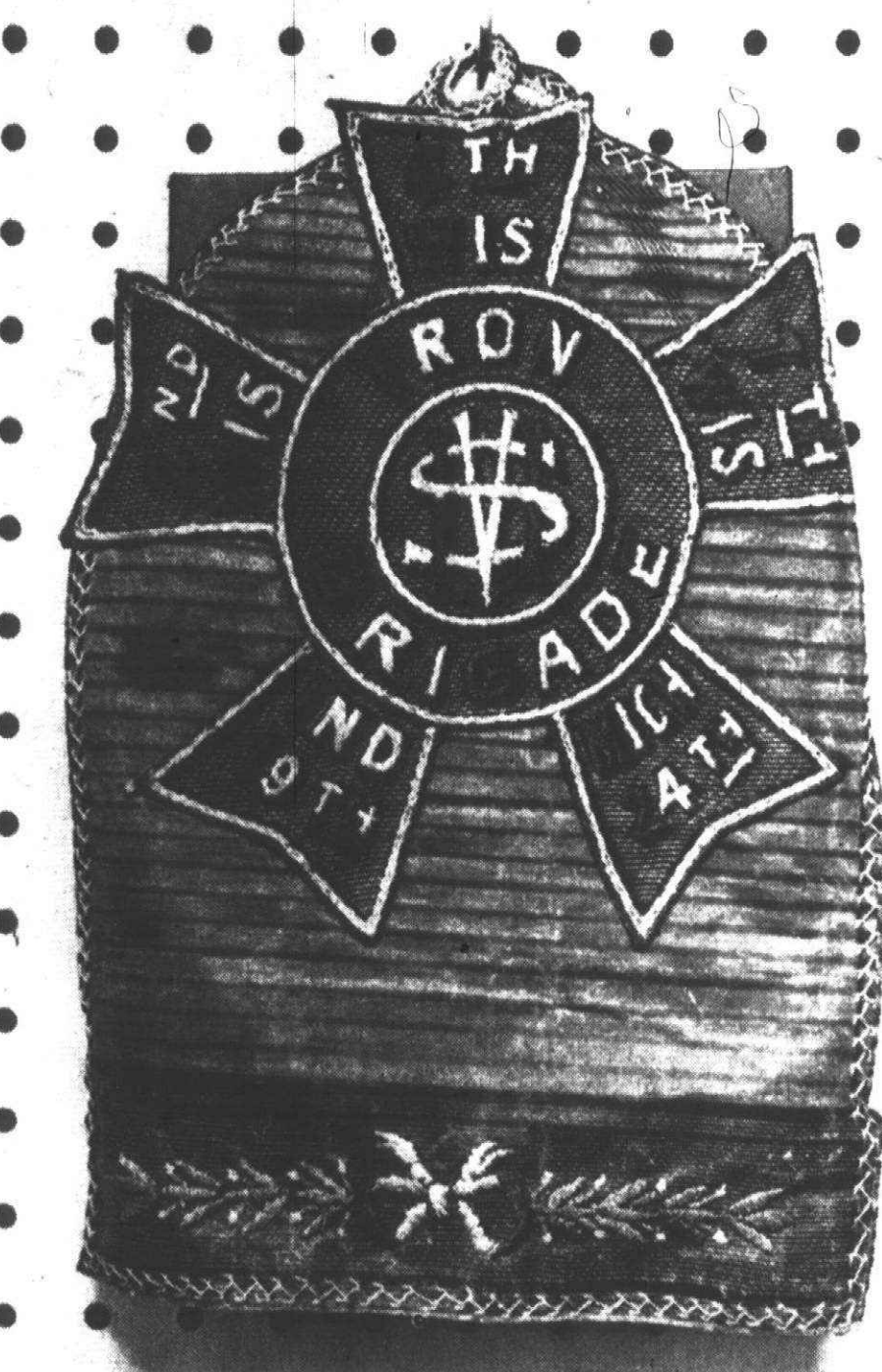

Special exhibit

Lincoln memorabilia at museum

By ELINOR GRAHAM

It will be cherry pie for George Washington's birthday Feb. 20. But what about Feb. 12? What is the traditional dish for Abraham Lincoln's birthday?

The question arose at the Plymouth Historical Museum where the mood has been Lincolnian. What does one serve at a Lincoln luncheon? What were his favorite foods?

Barbara Saunders, museum director, went to her source, Weldon Petz, Lincoln expert.

Petz said Lincoln had no favorites. In fact, he wasn't much interested in food. He often didn't realize he had missed a meal and had to be reminded to eat. With his thoughts on other matters, he paid little attention to what he was served.

Mrs. Saunders and her committee did resurrect a recipe for a "Mary Todd Lincoln cake." They ad libbed the rest of the menu.

LINCOLN WAS a coffee drinker.

said Petz. Among the more than 1,000 artifacts from Petz's collection now on loan to the museum, is a replica of the 18th president's coffee mug.

The Lincoln exhibit will be in the museum throughout the month of February. The main lobby, the Victorian rooms and the Street of Shops have been transformed to a visual history of Lincoln and his times.

One section is dedicated to his early life—the log cabin where he was born, the earliest photographs of a "gawky youth who also felt gawky."

There are campaign materials—envelopes, song books and post cards. His slogan was "Rail splitter in 1830, Giant killer in 1860."

The gazebo in the main lobby has several busts of Lincoln and the Council of War, a statue of the president with William Stanton and General Ulysses Grant. Robert Lincoln said this was the best likeness of his father.

The Lincoln memorabilia continues in the museum's street of shops.

The hotel window displays articles

relating to the president's last night in the Ford Theatre. The harness shop window is devoted to Carl Sandburg items. The law office has an original letter, written in longhand, that goes back to Lincoln's circuit riding days as a young lawyer.

The apothecary shop has a pressed and dried poison snake root. Thomas Lincoln's cows ate snake root and one of them got the "trembles." Two weeks later, Oct. 5, 1818, Nancy Hanks Lincoln died of "the milk sickness." It wasn't until 1929 that chemists discovered the flowers of the weed were poisonous.

THE EXHIBIT includes Lincoln bottles, banks, cigars, plates, spoons, busts, daguerreotypes, wood carvings, and calling cards.

There are pipes with heads of Lincoln on the bowls, pictures of a Lincoln totem pole in Alaska, wood engravings and steel engravings.

The dressmakers shop is devoted to Mary Todd Lincoln. She is depicted at

an inaugural ball, and again in mourning.

There is a photograph of Lincoln's dog, Fido, who was killed in an accident the day of his master's assassination. There is a copy of his day of humiliation, fasting and prayer proclamation.

Weldon Petz, a resident of West Bloomfield and principal of Flanders Elementary School in Farmington, is a

nationally recognized authority on Lincoln. The artifacts on loan to the museum are rarely available for public viewing.

The Plymouth Historical Museum, 155 S. Main Street, Plymouth, is open Thursday, Saturday and Sunday from 1-4 p.m.

A companion exhibit of Civil War items is on the lower level of the museum.

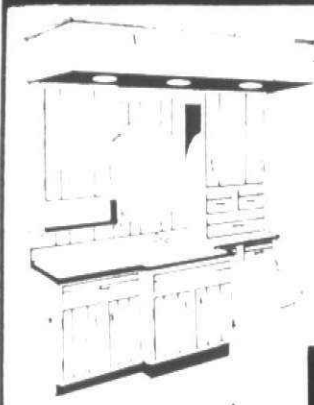

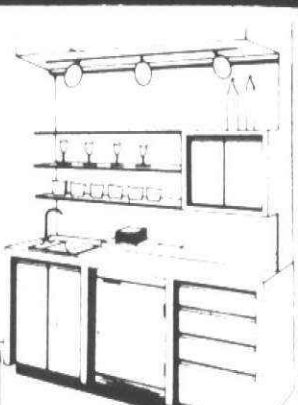

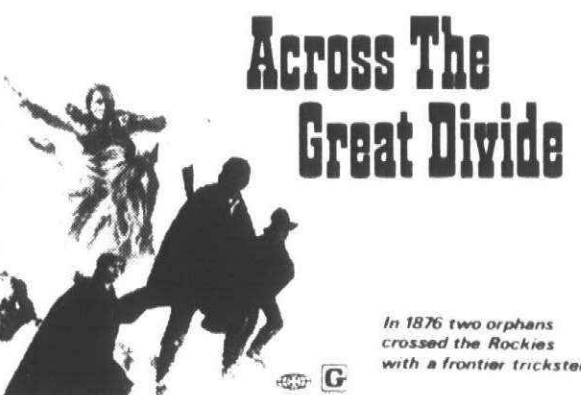

Hello, Mars

Space films Friday in A2

The University of Michigan Astronomical Film Festival's sixth program, highlighting the Viking exploration of Mars, will be presented Friday in Ann Arbor.

The free program will begin at 8 p.m. in auditorium 3 of the Modern Languages Building on the university's main campus.

It will begin with two short films on last summer's approach and landing tests on the Orbiter portion of the space shuttle.

They will be followed by "Mars Minus Myth" which, according to festival director Jim Loudon, is "the newly revised version of one of the finest planet films ever made."

"We showed the original version several times in previous years' festi-

vals, but this is our first screening of the revised one," says Loudon, staff astronomer at the U-M Exhibit Museum planetarium.

"Most of our knowledge of the second-nearest planet to Earth, and the one that is most like us, has been acquired only in this decade, largely from the four Vikings and their predecessor, Mariner 9."

Also on the Friday program is a lecture titled "Viking Report 4" by Loudon, who spent the summer of 1976 at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory reporting on Viking or National Public Radio.

He says it is primarily an update on the geology of Mars and of its two tiny but fascinating moons, Phobos and Deimos. "This lecture, like Reports 5 and 6 in the next two festival programs, is understandable independently of the rest but there will be no duplication," he says.

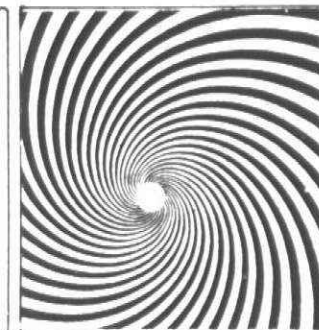
Leona Mitchell, who will sing Marguerite on Feb. 10, 12 and 17, returns

Review

'Vivat': Good on history

Many novels have been made into movies. Many plays have been made into movies. But Robert Bolt's "Vivat! Vivat Regina!" on stage at Wayne State University's Hilberry Theater, makes one feel he is watching a movie brought to the stage.

"Vivat," in repertory at the Hilberry until at least April 21, is part of the last decade's growing interest in two 16th century queens—Mary of Scotland and Elizabeth of England.

It began with Antonia Fraser's 1969 tome "Mary Queen of Scots" and was followed by Bolt's play in 1970 and a movie called "Mary Queen of Scots" in the early '70s.

BOLT HAS feet in two camps—the stage and Hollywood. He wrote

the stage and screen versions of "A Man for All Seasons" the screenplay for "Lawrence of Arabia," "Dr. Zhivago" and "Ryan's Daughter."

"Vivat" is satisfying as history, following the Fraser biography. As a stageplay, it doesn't work as well.

Unlike two movies of the queens' lives, Bolt's script doesn't have Mary and Elizabeth meeting face-to-face, because they never met.

Instead, in pageant style, they stand at different parts of the stage and recite portions of their letters. The scene shifts are accomplished by spotlight shifts. I've seen the technique employed masterfully in Robert Wall's "The Trial of Mary Todd Lincoln" in Dearborn, where 90 per cent of the script is based on letters and testimony at her insanity trial. The Hilberry doesn't

pull it off nearly so well.

Except for the beautiful knifing of Mary's pipsqueak lover Riccio by the Scottish lairds, there's little stage action in "Vivat." What you see is a lot of history, a few famous and many near-famous names and some dazzling costuming by Ellen Ryba and crew.

BOLT SOUGHT "not to give a history lesson but to create an effective, entertaining, possibly disturbing—and truthful—evening in the theater," to use his own words.

Barbara Acker as French-educated, Catholic Mary is out of place among the roughneck, ungovernable Scots, but I don't find myself pitying her.

Dianne Winslow is in a dreaded position playing Elizabeth because Glenda Jackson owns that role.

PDQ Bach Saturday at Institute

Professor Peter Schickels and the Semi-Pro Musica Antiqua, presented by the Founders Society Concert Series, will perform "The Intimate PDQ Bach," on Saturday, Feb. 11, at 8:30 p.m. in the Detroit Institute of Arts auditorium.

"The Intimate PDQ Bach" is designed to bring the music of Bach's oddest of his 20-odd children and the musicological madness of Professor Schickele (University of Southern North Dakota at Hoople) to audiences who have not had the opportunity of avoiding these presentations.

Included 80 the ro'ram for the evening will be Schickele's own Sonata in F Major ("Abassoonata") No. 888 for bassoon and piano; "Shepherd On The Rocks, With A Twist," No. 12 to 1, "Goldbrick Variations," No. 14, "PDQ Bach: His Life and Times" (an illustrated slide

lecture) and "Hansel and Gretel and Ted and Alice," an opera in one unnatural act, No. 2n1-1.

Among the instruments Schickele will demonstrate and play will be the Foghorn, the Lasso d'Amore, the Windbreaker, and the Baroque Caliope. In the style of lecture-demonstrations, Schickele will talk about the cultural climate which contributed to the evolution of PDQ Bach and explain his own theory, "Originality Through Incompetence."

Theater organist weekends in Redford

Bob Ralston, featured pianist and organist on the Lawrence Welk Show, will appear in concert this weekend under sponsorship of the Motor City Theatre Organ Society.

Performances will be given Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m. at the Redford Theater, Lahser and Grand River in Detroit. All seats are reserved.

Ralston has been featured with Welk for the past 15 years. His musical career began at an early age. When only 7, he was an adept classical pianist.

He holds a degree in music from the University of Southern California and traveled extensively in Europe while on scholarship.

Ralston's musical career actually started after he joined the Freddy Martin orchestra at the Coconut Grove. At the same time, he was recording with other musical groups. Welk was so impressed with Ralston's talent that he invited him for a series of appearances which culminated in his becoming a regular on the popular television show.

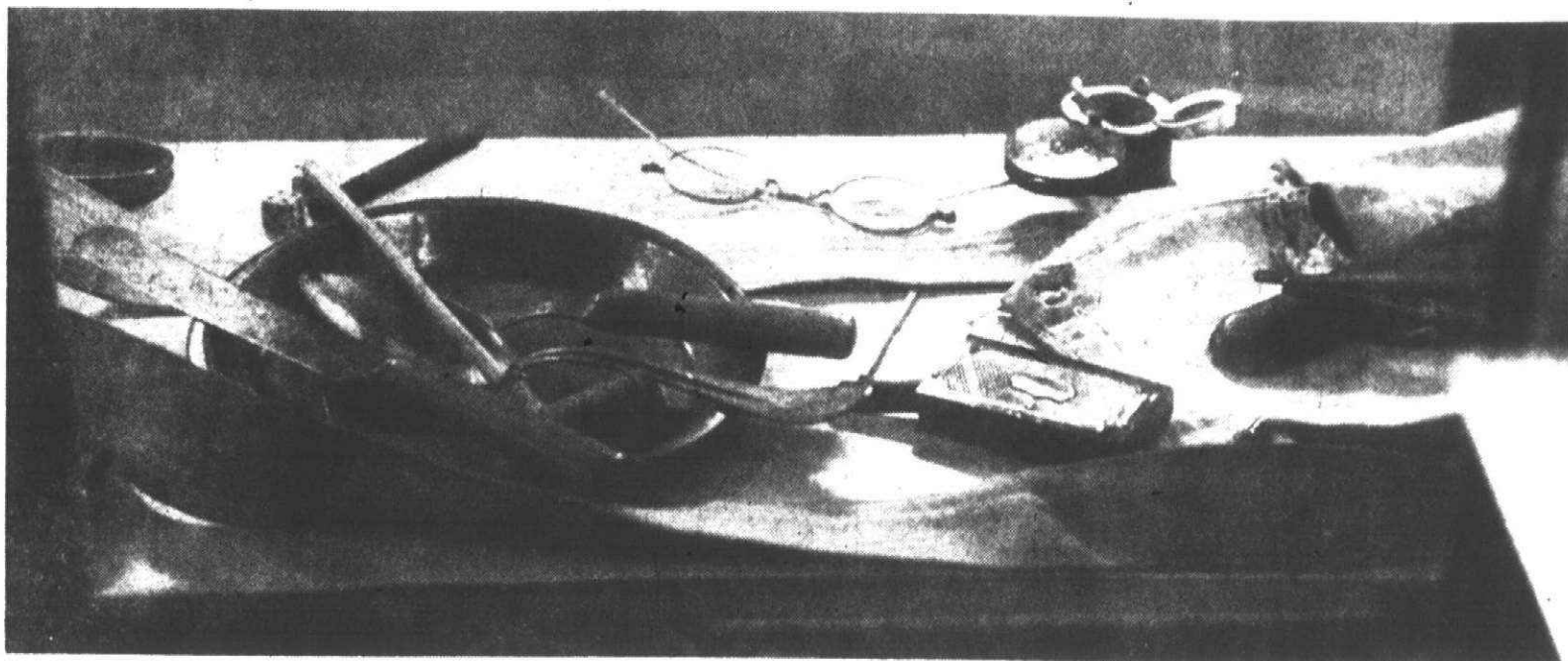

Philosophical conflict splits jr. soccer league

Strong disagreement over how teams are formed has led to a split in the Western Suburban Soccer League. Chuck Skene, Plymouth Parks and Recreation Director, told his coaches last Wednesday that the department joined similar soccer groups from Livonia, Farmington and Northville in a new Western Suburban Soccer League (WSSL).

This new league excludes members of the Livonia Young Soccer Club (LYSC) and smaller groups from Redford, Garden City, Lake Shore, and Ann Arbor.

When the split was announced last Saturday, the excluded groups got

together and formed the Great Lakes Soccer League which will include a Canton affiliate.

The move towards separation came two weeks ago after a heated meeting of coaches of the old WSSL. A new league constitution failed to pass by a two-thirds majority of the membership. Most of the coaches voted in favor of the constitution but the needed two-thirds fell short by one vote (61-32).

THE MAJOR issue of dissension was franchising. Under this arrangement, the four major groups, Farmington Soccer Club, Livonia Family YMCA, Northville Soccer Association and Plymouth Parks and Recreation, have

exclusive rights to set up their own teams with coaches rather than individual coaches and squads forming teams independently.

The new franchising amendment was passed by the coaches, 68-30, but when the constitution failed, the amendment went down with it.

Members of the LYSC, who oppose franchising, have been at odds with the Livonia Family 'Y' for two years over the issue.

After the constitution failed to pass, Livonia 'Y' officials met with Farmington, Northville and Plymouth to form a new league. Since the name WSSL was never legally registered by the old group, the new group took it.

Although the Plymouth coaches split

on the franchising issue, most people agreed with Skene's decision.

"I don't feel I had any choice in the matter except to go with the new league," Skene said. "If we didn't go with this league, we wouldn't have games for the girls and some of the older boys. And I'm not going to exclude girls because of a difference in philosophy of the two groups."

Skene explained that most of the teams in the older boys division and girls division were from Livonia and Farmington, forming the bulk of Plymouth's competition.

One of the reasons Skene joined the new WSSL was because he favors franchising.

"I've probably stepped on some

people's toes by doing this but I felt I had no choice," Skene said.

The parks and recreation director said he strongly believed in franchising and structuring of teams through the individual departments. He said no franchising rule would cause "recruiting away teams and buying kids."

DAVE MONK, former member of the executive board of the old WSSL, was one of the Plymouth coaches who opposes franchising but agreed with Skene's decision.

Monk was upset, however, with the way the split was handled. He said members from the four groups should have come before the executive board to officially leave the old WSSL rather

than meet separately two days after the heated meeting.

"The whole thing was done out of order," Monk said. "There was a lot of swift talking behind closed doors. I think it stinks."

"This could have been one of the best leagues in the state if we all worked together but they wanted franchising. Now they're back where they started three years ago."

Skene said it was wise for him to meet with Livonia, Northville, and Farmington about the new league before leaving the old WSSL or the Plymouth players may not have had a league to play in this spring.

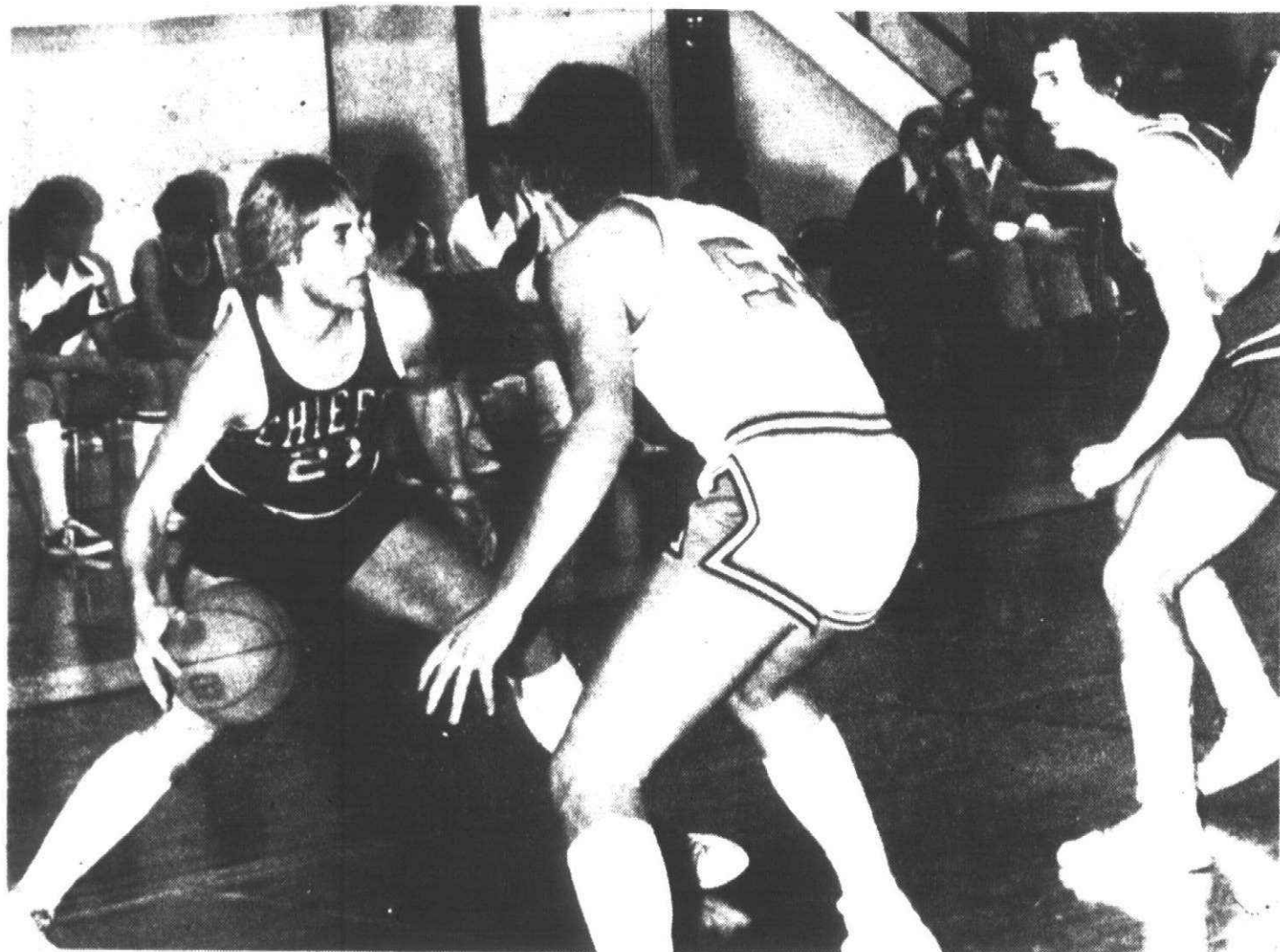

Livonia Stevenson put together four solid quarters of basketball which featured potent offensive shooting enroute to an easy 87-64 non-league victory over Plymouth Canton Tuesday night at the Spartans' gym.

Stevenson, 11-4 overall, came through with four 20-point plus quarters to end the Chiefs' modest four-game winning streak. Canton, leaders of the Western Six League, dropped to 9-6 overall.

The Spartans awesome shooting

started with the opening jump ball as all five starters scored at least four points in a 26-point first quarter. Guard Jeff Hall hit four of five field goal attempts for eight points while teammates Dave Hall, Craig Beyrand, Jack Lang and Art Wendt added four each.

Canton's free-shooting guard Butch King was the only bright spot in the Chiefs' 15-point first period as he scored eight points to keep the margin close.

Stevenson continued to score on the flat-footed Chiefs' defense, mounting a 41-21 advantage with 3:16 left in the half.

Canton managed to close the margin to 14 points, 46-32, at halftime but that was as close as it got.

Stevenson's star sophomore Dave Hall, who suffered a sprained ankle last Friday night, didn't seem to let the injury bother him as he opened the third period with the Spartans' first six points of the second half.

Hall was all over the court in that period, scoring 10 of his game-high 28 points. He also grabbed 12 rebounds.

The 80-point plus score was the first of the season for the Chiefs. Three more over 80 scores will qualify the squad for regional competition.

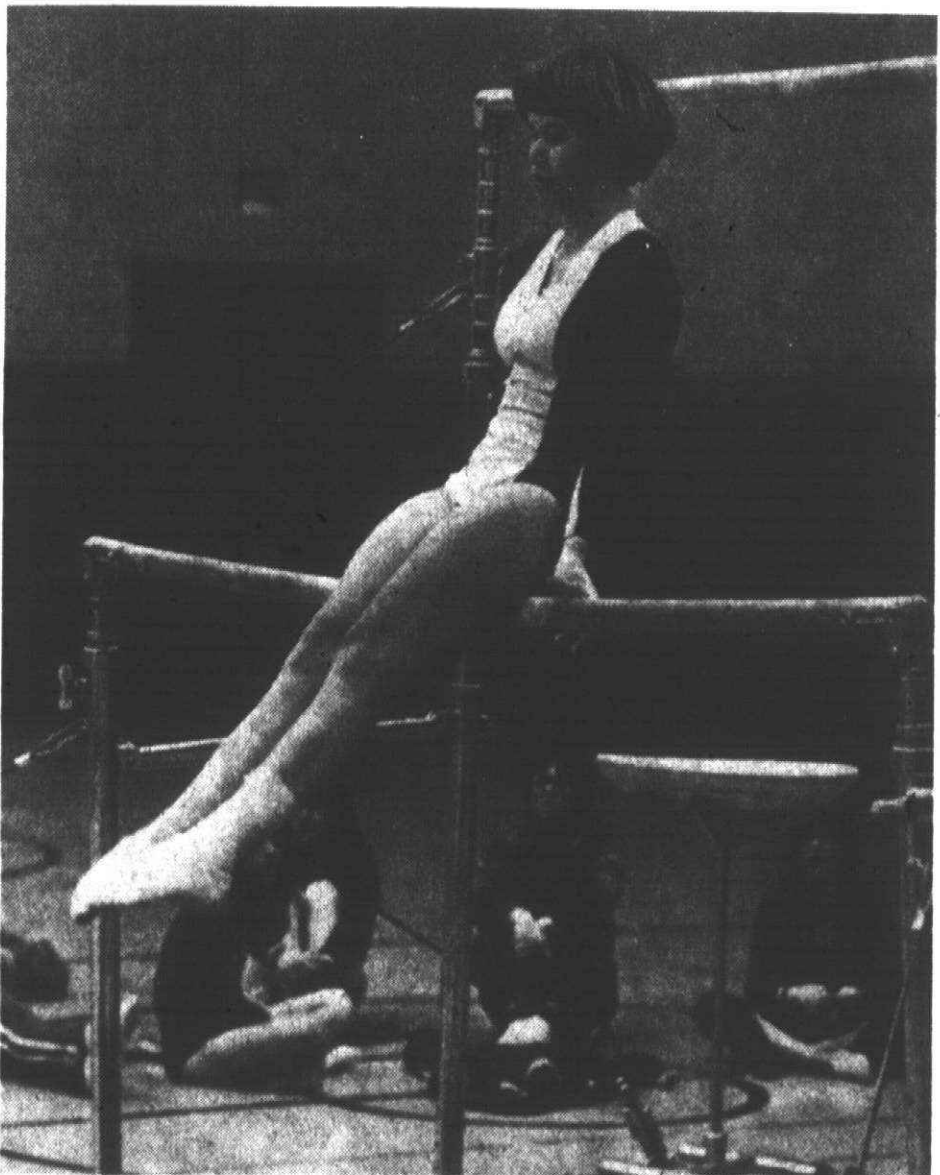
The Chiefs opened the season with a 75.90-63.20 victory over Walled Lake Central before losing to North Farmington, 80.3-76.5.

Chiefs 9th at districts

Rock matmen place 2d

Plymouth Salem placed nine of its 13 wrestlers in regional competition and grabbed second-place at the Ann Arbor Huron Districts last Saturday.

The nine Rocks will battle at Ypsilanti this weekend with high hopes of advancing to the state meet.

Westland John Glenn nipped the Suburban Eight League champion Rocks by only nine-and-one-half points, 156½-147, to win the district title. Wayne Memorial finished third at 137½, Ypsilanti was fourth at 119, and Dearborn Hts. Annapolis placed fifth with 87½.

Plymouth Canton advanced three wrestlers to the regionals, placing ninth in the 16-team event with 43 points.

Under the state tournament format, the top four wrestlers in each weight class advance to the regionals. The Huron winners will battle the victors from the Temperance-Bedford District at the regionals in an eight-man double-elimination event.

Salem coach Ron Krueger had mixed emotions about the outcome

since he felt Salem should have won the title.

The Rocks title chances were severely hurt when 107-pound Randy Vipperman, a league champion and probable district first-seed, failed to make weight for the competition.

"I'm really pleased we finished as high as we did but I knew we could win," Krueger said. "It would have been a cakewalk (with a full line up)."

Heavyweight Bob Dasher was the lone Rock district champion, avenging an earlier loss to Ypsilanti's Mike Williams with a 3:39 pin for the crown.

121-pound Rene Leist lost a heart-breaker to district champ Bo Wansan from Wayne Memorial. Leist lost the match in the last four seconds when a two-point reversal gave Wansan the decision, 6-5.

The Brown brothers, Wally and Jeff, both finished second at 157-pounds and 100-pounds respectively. Steve Ernst (114-pounds), Jim Ross (128-pounds), Roger Penix (140 pounds) and Bruce Piper (180 pounds) all finished third.

while 193-pound Bob Doherty placed fourth.

CANTON PLACED three wrestlers in the regionals.

147-pound Scott Collins, coming off a bout with mononucleosis, wrestled for the first time since Dec. 10 and placed second to John Glenn's Bill Meyer. Collins won the district title last year.

Senior Kyle Heaton placed third in the tough 157-pound competition, while 121-pound Craig Lee was fourth in his class.

100-pound Tommy Herrald lost an excellent bid as the fourth Chief to reach the regionals when he suffered a shoulder separation in the first round. He did not compete in the Western Six League meet Tuesday afternoon for coach Dan Chrenko's squad. Herrald was favored to win the league title in his weight class.

Wrestlers appeal to my emotions

I know everyone has heard of the old sports cliché—"The thrill of victory and the agony of defeat."

Those who attended Saturday's wrestling district competition at Ann Arbor Huron saw this famous saying come true in a sport which has so much to offer for people both young and old.

If you are an avid fan and follower of Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton grapplers, then you should have been emotionally touched by a contrast of fortune and disappointment which struck these teams.

First, there was the emergence of Salem's heavyweight Bob Dasher who was the only Rock to win a district title enroute to the team's second-place finish.

Dasher was second-seeded in his weight class after winning the Suburban Eight League title just three days earlier. He fought a determined Mike Broome from Lavonia Franklin in the semifinals and won 5-4. He then matched up with the top-seed, Mike Williams from Ypsilanti, one of only two wrestlers to defeat Dasher this season.

Dasher showed everyone around the

state that he was for real in this championship clash by pinning his opponent in the second period. Dasher will now be a strong favorite to win at the Ypsilanti regionals next week.

It was an emotional, thrilling victory for Dasher who proved to himself, and his followers, that he could excel on the mat. Although he has had much success as a football player, Dasher was plagued last season with nagging injuries during the wrestling season. He also missed many meets and tournaments this year because of frequent weekend stays at universities which have offered him football scholarships.

So this number-two seeding was very unfamiliar to Dasher. But he showed the wrestling world that he could handle himself on the mat as well as on the gridiron.

THE UNFORTUNATE occurrence of the districts came to little Tommy Herrald of Plymouth Canton.

The young Chief had a very good chance to finish as one of the top four in the districts and advance to the regionals, but he suffered a slightly separated shoulder in the midst of conquering his goal.

Herrald had already won one match

but a mix-up at the 100-pound draw forced the tiny grapplers to re-wrestle for the district crown.

With one victory down the drain, Herrald once again began to seek a spot in the regionals. He stopped short, however, when Ann Arbor Huron's Brian Crawford slammed Herrald down on his tender left shoulder in the first period, ending his season prematurely.

Herrald is only a sophomore who will have two more years to compete in the districts. But the disappointment occurred when he was forced to miss the Western Six League meet two days later.

The loop title was a realistic goal for Herrald since he had defeated all his opponents in dual meet league competition earlier this season. He could have been the first sophomore in Canton history to win a league title.

As the tears rolled down his eyes when he was led off the mat—his shoulder in a sling—one could feel the heartbreak the youngster was going through.

Thank heaven Tommy has two more years to reach his goals—even though his first varsity season ended abruptly.

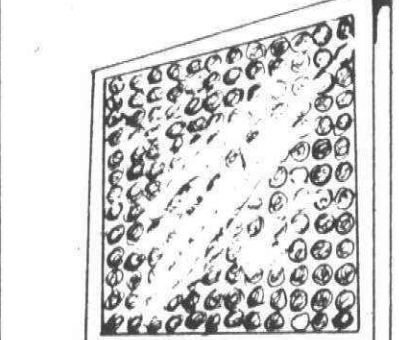

Bob Cline, Petersen, Mike Gaab and Doug Hetu started the meet was a first-place clocking in the 200-yard individual medley of 1:49.5. This time ranks among the highest in the state. 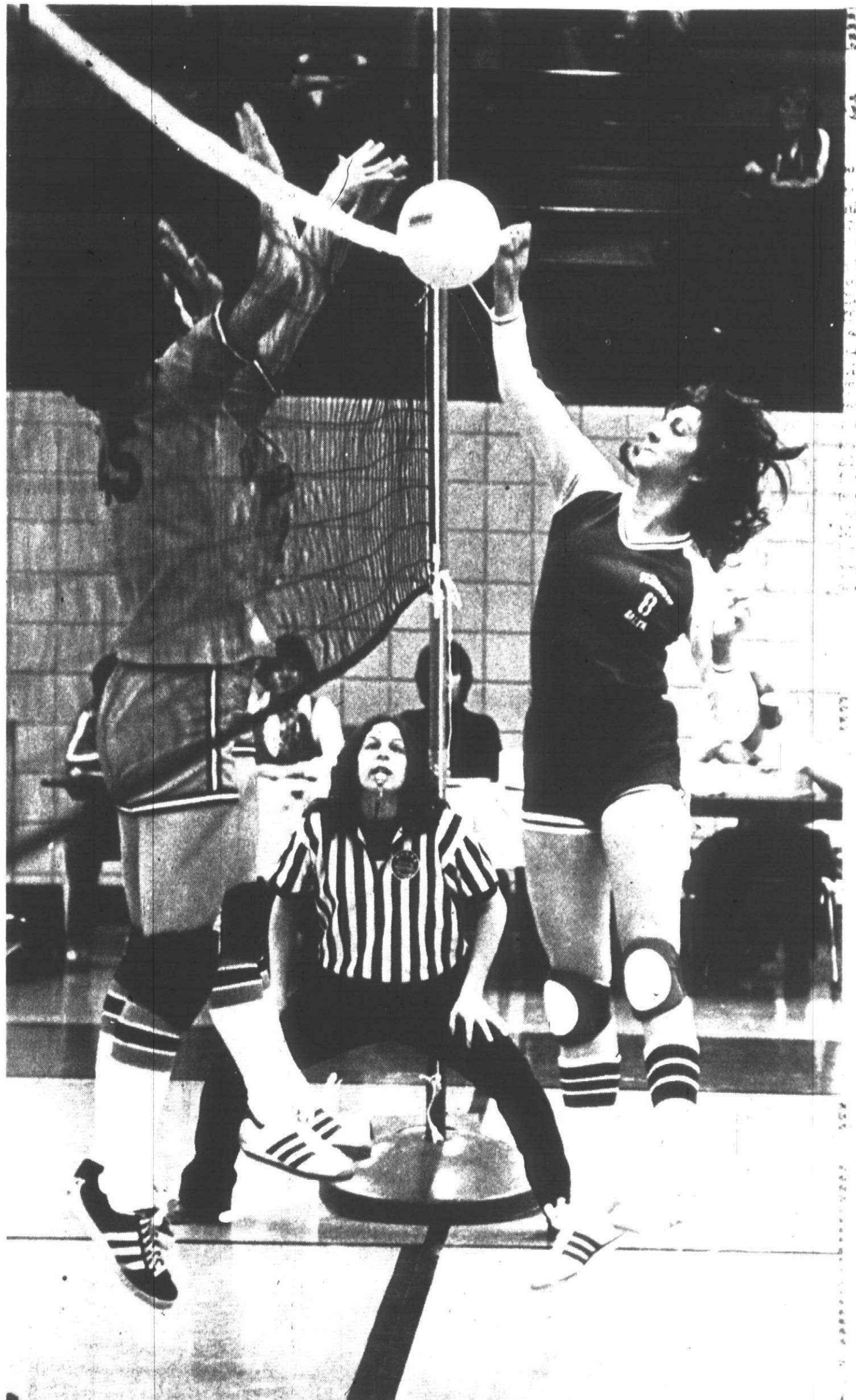



Nazi Resurgence?

Fourth Reich may find youth susceptible

Mention the word "Nazi." Some people will conjure up grisly images of the Third Reich's extermination camps. Others may think of legions of blond-haired, blue-eyed Aryans goosestepping past an approving Adolf Hitler.

Mention the word to a local high school student and it is likely to inspire only a glimmer of recognition, let alone revulsion.

According to a number of local school officials as well as some university professors, high school students know little more than that the Nazis led Germany in World War II.

The Nazis, or more properly the National Socialist German Workers Party, took control of Germany in 1933. They spouted a theory of racial purity, believing they belonged to a "master race" with the right to eliminate "inferior peoples." In the case of European Jews, the Nazis came close to genocide, killing by most accounts six million of them.

The apparent ignorance of Nazism among young people has become a concern in some educational circles. One school official warned that unless Nazism is portrayed as the horror which led to the organized murder of 11 million persons, mankind will be doomed to repeat history. A Southfield school board member favors establishing a specialized course dealing with the Nazis and their atrocities.

The resurgence of Nazi-type activities here and elsewhere in the United States has underscored the question. A swastika-adorned "bookstore" has opened in southwest Detroit, as they have in other cities across the country. Several homes were defaced by the twisted-cross symbol in Oakland County's lakes area. Crosses and

swastikas were burned on the lawns of other homes in the same area. A Westland man, recently arrested in Oakland County, was found to have hoarded World War II-vintage weapons and Nazi literature.

National magazines have reported that the neo-Nazi movement is recruiting heavily in high schools around the country. In southwest Detroit, high school students were said to have gone door-to-door distributing Nazi literature.

"If we don't remember the past we're doomed to repeat it," said Mrs. Zeldia Robinson, a member of the Southfield school board.

"I feel all students right now are not really cognizant of recent history in general, and the Nazi period in particular," she said.

Clifford May, assistant superintendent of Oak Park schools, warned, "The appearance of a storefront organization shows that the nucleus of a such a group is always there." "Mankind can't afford to let it happen again."

Some fear that high school students in the predominantly white suburbs are especially susceptible to Nazi racial propaganda.

John Bokina, who teaches comparative political philosophy at the University of Detroit, explained that the American Nazis push an extremist anti-black line, in a modification of the Nazism of their German predecessors. This ideology goes so far as to suggest deportation of blacks as a solution to the country's racial problems.

"The American Nazis, to the best of my understanding, still preach that there's an international Jewish con-

spiracy and that blacks are the tools of the Jews," he said.

A LIVONIA Bentley government and history teacher, who asked to remain unidentified, said most Bentley students have little understanding of Nazi ideas and "wouldn't quite know how to come back at it."

The recollections of a Stevenson High School graduate seems to bear this out.

He said he and his friends often talked about Hitler and Nazism—with not a little admiration.

"I wasn't a Nazi lover, but there was something cool about it," he said. He said he and his friends were attracted to the pomp, pride and militarism of Hitler's Brownshirts.

"We really got into Germany and World War II—we really got into how they wiped out cities, like in Czechoslovakia. We got into the gross side—the side that everybody knew about. You know, the murders, the party rallies at Nuremberg."

"Now it's disgusting," he added.

Trying to explain both his and his group's fascination with the Nazis, he said, "I think we were racists. We didn't like blacks; we didn't like Jews."

He said this was easy because it was the kind of thinking to which he and his friends had been exposed. "You'll find a lot of people like me still at Stevenson. It's in the heart of the suburbs."

SOME TEACHERS and school officials said that while they are appalled that such attitudes exist, they are obliged to offer only a historical presentation of the facts, without letting their own opinions or morality color their teaching.

Harriet Shogrum, director of social studies for Livonia schools, said an effort is made to point out the Nazis'

social policy and their "extreme discrimination" against minority groups.

She said she "would hope" that most of Livonia's high school students could confront and resist Nazism if it were presented to them on the street.

Elinore Holland is chairwoman of the social studies department for Clarenceville schools, in parts of Livonia, Redford Township and Farmington Hills. She said, "We don't try to influence beliefs. But we do provide lots of supplemental materials for those students who want to go more in depth."

She said Clarenceville's "comparative governments" course deals with the "isms"—including Nazism.

"Teachers do go into different philosophies and deal with them more in depth. They try to point out the good points and the bad and try to relate them to today's world," she said.

Mrs. Holland said Clarenceville's social studies teachers talk about Nazism but do not limit the study of racial persecution to the atrocities of the Holocaust—in which six million Jews and five million members of other ethnic minorities perished in the Nazi death camps.

"You can't say that one race or country was responsible for it all. Just look at what we did to the Negroes and the American Indians. We try to compare the Holocaust to what has happened to other ethnic groups," she said.

A NORTH FARMINGTON High School history teacher, Jerry Maxwell, approaches Nazism differently. Maxwell said, "I can't take my students to put themselves in a certain position."

"I try to handle it to show what the Nazi party truly was. I try to show them the total Nazi brutality—the Warsaw ghetto for example. I try to

explain Hitler's 'final solution' the extermination of the Jews. Students are always interested. Its gruesome and different."

Maxwell said his students may be fascinated at first, but their opinions change. "I show them slides of Dachau and Buchenwald (two of the most notorious concentration camps). They say, 'My God, that was terrible. They're sickened beyond belief.'"

Maxwell said he tries to balance his presentation by attempting to get his students to look the reasons why many Germans backed Hitler's rise to power.

"I just try to get them to understand Hitler; they don't have to like him," he said.

"I tell them that had I lived in Germany in the 1920s I might have supported Hitler. In the middle of probably the worst depression any country has ever faced, he offered the people something."

"He must have done somethings right. He was voted Time magazine's Man of the Year in 1936. He could be the only person ever to have single-handedly brought a country out of a depression," Maxwell said.

A BIRMINGHAM Seaholm High School history teacher said students interested in Nazism could learn about it in a number of that school's offerings.

He said the student would get a straightforward presentation in a course on modern European history and could pursue the subject further in an elective course dealing with the Middle East.

That course, he said, concentrates on Israel and anti-Semitism. "In order to do it justice, you have to go into the entire Jewish experience and the Holocaust," he said.

To some school officials, though, a change in curriculum, especially with the heightened general interest in the Nazis and the much-publicized activities of the American Nazis, is essential.

Southfield School Trustee Zeldia Robinson said she will meet with Southfield school administrators to strengthen curriculum dealing with Nazism.

"Facing the real life situation should be emphasized. The real situations are the ones that students should be prepared for," she said. High school students without advanced study in Nazism or the Holocaust could not successfully defend themselves against Nazi arguments, she feels.

Mrs. Robinson said she will recommend that Southfield's public high schools add a course dealing specifically with the Holocaust. Such a course is already offered by schools in Philadelphia and New York City.

ACCORDING TO a report in Psychology Today magazine, the basic attitudes necessary for a grass-roots Nazi movement in the United States are present, especially at the high school level.

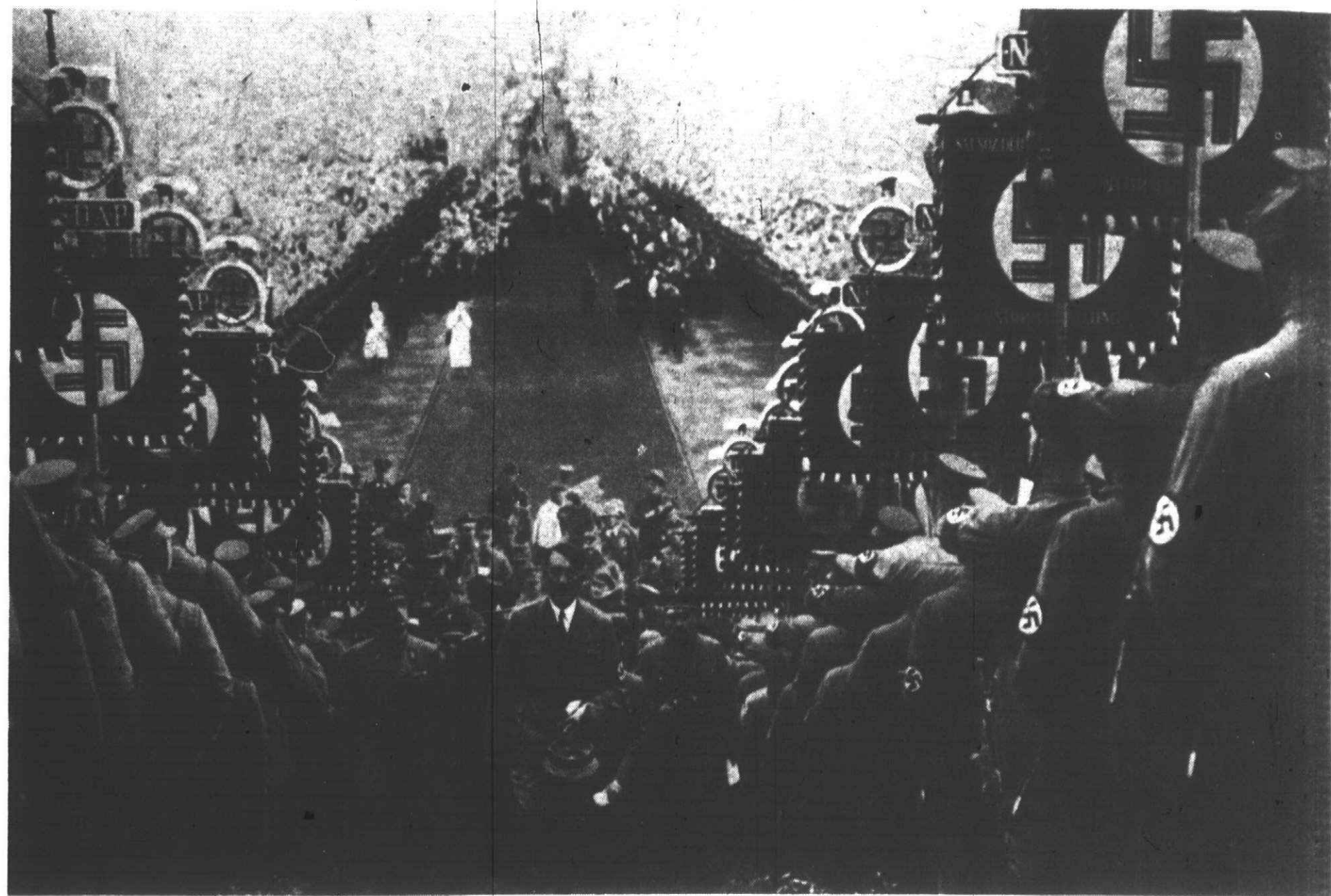
The magazine reported that a high school teacher, in showing how Hitler could win over a advanced country like Germany to his program, created a miniature Nazi-like movement in only five days.

The teacher told his students that they could be part of a special "national youth movement"—the "Third Wave." The movement was based on the principles of discipline and elitism, much like the original appeal of Hitler's Nazis.

In five days the group grew from the original class of 20 students to more than 200. Students snapped to attention in classrooms and flashed a special Nazi-like salute in the halls.

More than 200 students showed up in the school's gymnasium to hear what they expected would be a special televised speech by the national leader of the Third Wave.

According to Psychology Today, the teacher told the students, "You're no better or no worse than the German Nazis we've been studying. You thought you were the elite—better than those outside the room. You bargained your freedom for the comfort of discipline."



Flanked by legions of the elite SS and cheered by millions, Adolf Hitler strides to the platform from which he will address the 1935 Nuremberg party rally. The Nazi party, in only a decade, had grown

from a small band of street fighters to a highly organized party in control of one of the most awesome economic military machines ever seen.



Hitler may have led Germany out of the worldwide depression but he also led it into one of mankind's greatest tragedies—the Holocaust. Untold millions were imprisoned in Nazi concentration camps and an estimated 11 million people, including six million Jews, were exterminated. Some school officials fear students are not taught enough about the Nazis and would be susceptible to neo-Nazi propaganda.
