Highway billboards called aid to tourist

Federal and state efforts to clear roadsides of billboards may be cheered by environmentalists, but they're a grave worry to small businesses.

The Holiday Inns won't be hurt, but the mom-and-pop motels and independent restaurants will, they told the Michigan Tourist Commission last week. The tourism group held a public hearing in Southfield.

Rick Collamer, manager of the Win Schuler restaurant on W. Maple Road, summed it up: "Our West Bloomfield place isn't on a major artery. It's on rolling countryside. Definitely, signs are a major plus for us."

BOB HACKER, general manager of Weber's Inn, Ann Arbor, said his firm had lost eight billboards because of highway beautification laws.

Meanwhile, it added three others, but found land prices have tripled. "Many independents (restaurants) can't afford national advertising. This is making larger billboard companies richer and the small guy poorer."

Bruce Firestone, general manager of Mt. Holly Ski Area, said, "I don't believe in large signs to block the trees. But we do believe we need some sign to say we are there, we are available."

Firestone noted one proposal would allow some signs for businesses that operate for six months. The ski industry's season is only three months long and would be ineligible. "But our numbers justify signing. We draw 150,000 visitors in three months... and we hope to go to 250,000 or 300,000."

Fred Bahlau, who owns Stagecoach Stop and heads the Irish Hills Tourist Association in Jackson County, said, "We seek recognition for our area as a whole, not for individual businesses. We have a lot of visitors from Ohio and Indiana."

LEN BARNES, editor of AAA Motor News and chairman of the tourist commission, summed up the dilemma:

"The billboard industry thinks they are great, and there are 67 companies in Michigan which own 10 or more billboards, and 13,620 owners of 10 or fewer sign facilities."

"Environmentalists think there should not be a single billboard in the state along any highway."

"In the middle are millions of Michiganders and visitors to Michigan who come here to enjoy the tourist attractions of our great state."

"They need information to tell them where to turn off a freeway when they are about to run out of gasoline, where

to find their favorite restaurant or motel chain, where they turn off to see Tahquamenon Falls or Paw Paw's wine-growing region or Greenfield Village."

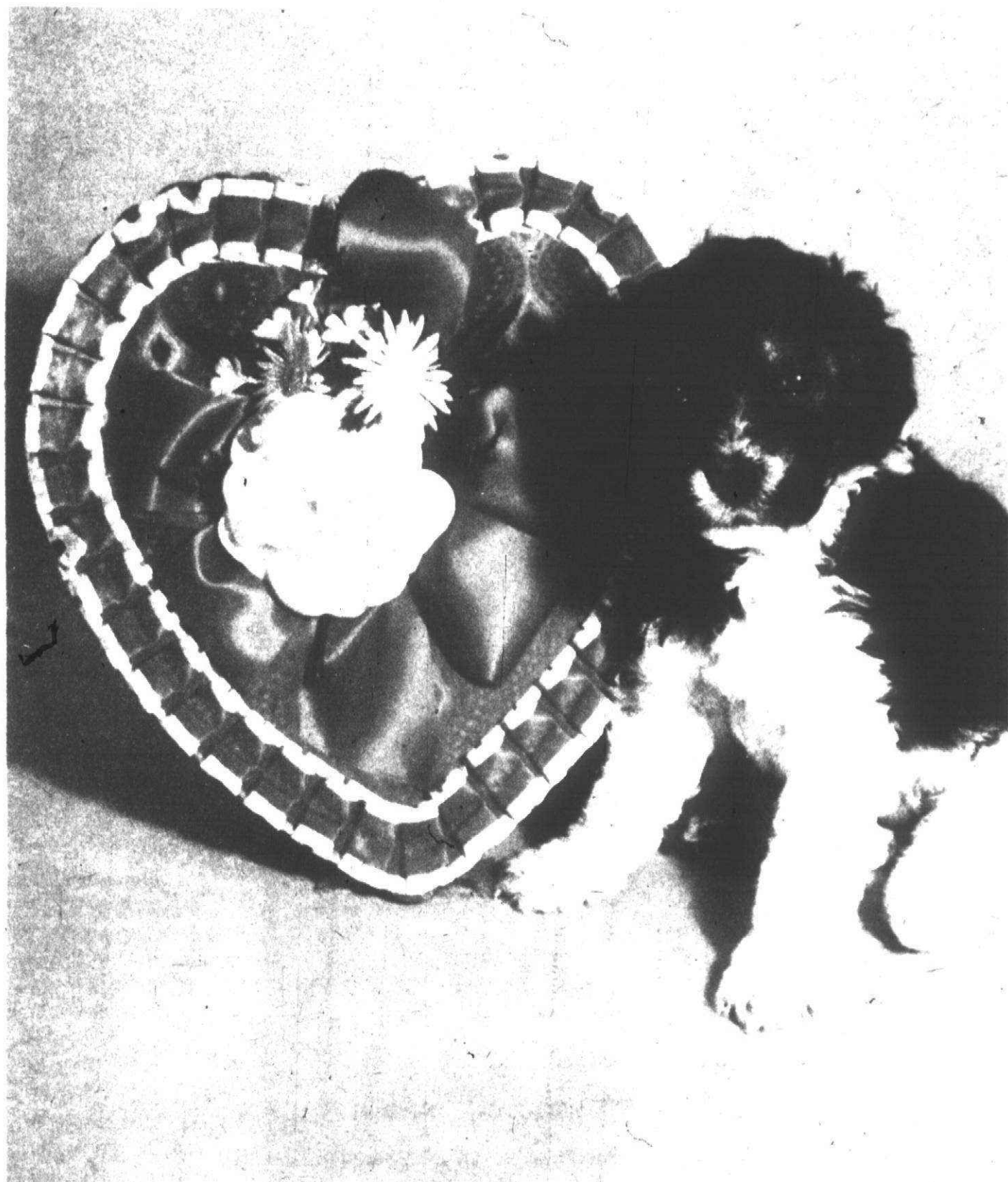
"But they don't appreciate seeing the scenery along the highway being marred by product ads—'Buy X brand bread,' 'Smoke Y brand cigarettes.'"

THE MICHIGAN Department of State Highways and Transportation is working to set up 56 "informational plazas" by the end of 1979. These are to be at freeway rest stops.

Individual businesses can be listed in these plazas if they meet certain standards—remain open at least six months of the year for tourist attractions, have eight units and telephones for motels, have 50 sites and modern facilities for campgrounds.

They would be listed on one-by-six inch nameplates with the business name, address, telephone number and hours.

AAA's Barnes pointed, however, to systems of bare-bones informational signs on highways. Vermont, for example, has 1,000 signs on state highways. They are 16 feet high, five to six feet wide, and give the business names and directions. To be eligible, businesses would have to be approved by the Tourist Information Council.

New home woes, like leaky roof can be fixed

Darlene Wasczenski of Canton Township almost wishes she and her husband never bought their \$60,000 home in Parkwood Estates.

Unfinished bathroom tile, cracked formica, broken bricks, no electricity—you name a housing failure and Mrs. Wasczenski says her family has probably experienced it since moving in six months ago.

The Wasczenski's latest headache is a ceiling leak in the family room. For the past few weeks, water has dripped through her family room ceiling like a leaky faucet.

A telephone call to the builder, Huntley Homes, hasn't stopped bubbles from forming on her ceiling or the cracked wood beams.

"The builder told me to contact my insurance company because the leaking is caused by ice piling in the eavesdrop. I don't feel it's the insurance company's responsibility."

"They've come out and fixed the leaks twice before and now the builder says it's not his fault. I think they're giving me a line."

THE WATER IS still leaking into the Wasczenski family room, however, and several other items have yet to be fixed.

A spokesperson for Huntley Homes said that contractors have been out twice to work on the Wasczenski house but both adults are employed and no one was there to let them in.

Mrs. Wasczenski said the builder's claim is misleading. "I called the contractors and told them we both work and they said they would call us before they come out. There have been times when they showed up without calling us or they make an appointment and then fail to show."

Norm Graff, superintendent of Huntley Homes, is on vacation. With a roof leak, Charles Thompson, Canton building superintendent, said the township would send a man out on a complaint to see if it's a defect in construction or a home maintenance problem caused by an ice build-up.

Mrs. Wasczenski admits that she has not taken advantage of a building complaint procedure offered by the Canton building department.

Canton instituted the plan last fall to assist homeowners in resolving building complaints on their one year builder's warranty.

Mrs. Wasczenski said she did not fill out the necessary forms with the township because the builder assured her

Nursing home owner responds

People count, not buildings

Critics of nursing home care might demonstrate more tolerance if they better understood the economics of the business, says Carl Lampton, owner of West Trail Convalescent Center on Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth.

Lampton responded this week to criticisms of nursing home care made recently by Citizens for Better Care—a metropolitan Detroit group formed to investigate nursing home practices.

The CBC had reported that West Trail and Dion of Canton were among 38 nursing homes listed on the "intent to deny license" list compiled by the Michigan Department of Public Health. Lampton stressed his difficulties with the state are related to structural problems with the building and not quality of patient care.

"I am for giving these patients the best care possible, but it all goes back to money and this is what the 'do-gooders' are short on and the nursing home even shorter," Lampton added that if the critics worked in a nursing

home for a few weeks they might gain insight into what patients want and need.

"To start with, they want to be treated like an adult human being. They want to mix with people of their choice and to live a life as close to normal as possible."

"So when they come into a nursing home they expect and deserve to be helped with their problems—yet left to live in a home-like atmosphere having as many of their personal belongings with them as possible. As a person becomes older and more feeble, the world around him becomes smaller until finally his world consists of his room and the people who help him, so why make it more complicated by forcing a hospital setting on him."

"I believe a person is entitled to have their personal belongings, but the fire marshal and sanitation people call this 'junk' and say it must go or be stored in a fire-resistant room. Well, why have it if they can't keep it in their room?"

LAMPTON ADMITS West Trail has had violations for the past three years but stresses they are physical plant violations, not nursing violations.

"For all the inspectors and plant violations, I have yet to see one inspector look at a patient—to see if they are clean, well-nourished and content."

The West Trail building "is something less than a mansion," adds Lampton, and the floors aren't carpeted. "But we have no bedsores and no odor of urine—just good nursing care. The state, however, prefers extensive and

time-consuming documentation."

So many different forms are required now, Lampton said, that it almost appears to him that making out reports is more important than caring for the patient. "We used to admit a patient and get all the necessary information on a single page. Now we need at least seven forms, including social history, activities and a discharge plan."

"The latest wrinkle is that when a person dies and has been pronounced dead by his doctor, we still cannot send the body to the morgue without an order from the doctor."

WEST TRAIL IS supposed to earn a daily profit of \$1.25 per patient, Lampton noted when turning to economics of the business.

"This looks good on paper, but when we get down to facts it's a different story. About two weeks ago, the state audited my 1976 costs and found I was underpaid 11 cents per patient per day (Medicaid patients only). Yet to arrive at this cost, the state included the higher rate of income from private patients, who pay more than the Medicaid patients."

"This is wrong. One person should not pay more than another. At my home, patients get the same care regardless of their financial status, so why penalize a person because he has money?"

On Dec. 1, Medicaid gave Lampton a \$1 a day increase, which amounted to \$900 per month. But on Jan. 1, Lampton pointed out, the minimum wage went up to \$2.65 per hour, increasing his payroll by \$1,500 a month.

"I think it's a crime to pay \$2.65 per hour for this kind of work. No one can

4 companies split \$20,000 in snow

Nearly \$20,000 will be paid to four local contractors for snowplowing work performed in the wake of the Jan. 26 blizzard, according to Harold Stein, Canton Township supervisor.

All of the contractors have not yet submitted a bill for their services, Stein said, so a specific figure is impossible to determine. But, judging from the amount of time the contractors spent working, Stein said he expects the total bill will reach almost \$20,000.

The federal government will pick up 75 per cent of that figure, with the township paying the other quarter. So, if the contractors bill Canton \$20,000, the township will have to pay \$5,000 from the general fund.

The four companies Canton contracted with to plow its streets are Storey Bros., A&P Construction,

Kirby, and Fulkerson Landscaping. End loader operators demanded a \$60 an hour fee.

Stein also hopes to get back 75 per cent for homeowner groups who hired contractors to pave subdivision streets before learning of the federal assistance program.

One homeowner group in Canton's Forestbrook subdivision contacted Mel's Auto Clinic on Friday, the day after the storm, and paid him \$800 for 32 hours of work performed Friday night and Saturday.

The federal order states that only plowing performed from Jan. 28 to Feb. 1 is eligible for reimbursement. Only work performed by private contractors is eligible for assistance.

Stein estimates that the township paid its employees 1,200 hours in overtime during the storm.

Cherry Hill speed limit may be cut

You won't be able to whisk your way home on Cherry Hill at 55 miles per hour if Canton Township police have their way. But any change will have to come from the Wayne County Road Commission.

Currently, there is no posted speed limit on Cherry Hill between Canton Center and the Westland-Canton border of Hannan Road. Police officers are out to change that.

Ptl. Dan Antieau started the ball rolling after observing cars driving 55 m.p.h. on the road where school buses make eight stops.

"It's an unposted strip so we can't write tickets if people drive 55 or under," Antieau said. "School buses make eight stops on that section of road and are letting kids off. People doing 55 can't stop."

Antieau took the matter to the police chief. He concurred with Antieau's suggestion that the speed limit be lowered to 45 m.p.h. on the three-mile strip. The request is being evaluated by the road commission; but no date has been set to act on the matter.

NEWEST CONTROVERSY

The latest controversy in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools centers on alternative school plans. The excitement, in part, has been flamed by misinformation given out that troubling students from the high schools will be sent to Central Middle School. Actually, all students with academic problems may benefit from an alternative school, according to a school administrator who explains what kind of students would attend such a school in a report on Page 2A.

What's an alternative school?

(The Our Schools Today column is written by Florence Beier, administrative assistant for community relations for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.)

An alternative school—who needs it? Here are four students who would be likely candidates for an alternative school (fictitious names used):

LINDA is uncertain about her plans for after high school, but wants to explore. She is weak in writing, but enjoys and is interested in working with people. Linda's parents say she is naive about the real world.

STEVE bases his values and activities on what his friends like. He has no idea of what he wants out of life except a job, "to be on my own," an apartment, and a car. Steve enjoys rock music and drinking beer. He gets along well with his peers but has problems with adults.

BOB hates school. He just wants to get out and get a good job. He has poor reading and math skills, but he can fix anything. Bob is rigid and unfriendly. "I don't like to mix with people who aren't my kind," he says.

JANET is college bound and gets good grades. She is shy but the other students think she seems arrogant. Her parents have handled most of the decisions in her life. Janet feels panicky about growing up.

AT THE PLYMOUTH Centennial Educational Park (CEP), with more than 4,000 other students, Linda, Steve, Bob and Janet may be headed for academic failure, dropping out, unemployment or emotional problems.

In the student-centered environment of a small alternative school, however, their chances for school success may be greatly improved. In fact, the likeli-

hood of their becoming contributing members of society is much greater.

Plans presented to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education last Monday by the alternative education committee gave sample programs for Linda, Janet, Bob and Steve which could get each of them back on the track.

Transfer to the alternative school would be voluntary. Every student there would work with the teaching staff to develop a carefully structured instructional program.

Linda's basic skills work might focus on writing, with assignments based frequently on her supervised community service with a local agency. Her responsibility to the alternative school would be to organize cleaning tasks. She then could study psychology, sociology and child development at the CEP.

Steve's time would be fully occupied. Reading, writing and mathematics classes and tutoring would be scheduled daily with help from students as well as teachers. Fellow students also would support Steve in learning to be on time and follow rules. A music workshop would appeal to Steve's leisure interest, while a vocational exploration program and placement in a youth conservation project job would prepare him to make a living.

Bob would concentrate on basic math with tutoring in reading. Experiences in group dynamics would aim to help him get along with other people. Bob would have a co-op job and also assist in a middle school shop class.

For Janet, basic skills would involve a special math group and advanced study at Schoolcraft College. She would have record-keeping responsibilities for the alternative school. She could take a film class at college and organize a film festival for the CEP and creative arts workshop for the alternative school. Janet's classes at the CEP might be philosophy and advanced placement in foreign language.

ALTERNATIVE SCHOOLS aren't new or unique.

By 1975 there were about 1,000 alternative schools in the U.S.

Plans for the alternative school in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools meet every requirement of the state of Michigan and have the same standards for attendance, credits and graduation as Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools.

The alternative education committee, composed of 14 residents and staff, has held more than 30 weekly meetings. It has recommended an alternative education program for identified CEP students in grades 9-12

to begin in the 1978-79 school year.

Student-centered education, the goal of the alternative school here, focuses on the inherent worth of each individual. Learning must be a meaningful experience which provides the opportunity for personal growth and mastery of basic competencies.

Although this goal is no different from that of the school district for all of its students, individualization can be more intensive in an alternative school setting.

COSTS FOR THE alternative school as proposed will be similar to the expense of educating the same number of students—about 100—at the CEP.

Start-up costs for inservice, supplies and support staff are projected to be about \$10,000 for the first year only. The only significant on-going added cost would be a shuttle bus between the CEP and the alternative school for students to take some classes at the regular high schools.

The timetable for implementation is a key to being able to serve students in an alternative school next fall. With presentation and discussion at three school board workshops completed, the committee hopes for approval by the end of February. Staff selection is scheduled for March, with April and May taken up by student selection, staff planning and program design.

What four-year-old kids have never drawn a reasonable facsimile of a postage stamp on a valentine envelope, addressed it with an unreadable scrawl and dropped that heartfelt message into the hands of the United States Postal Service?

A group of four-year-olds at Willow Creek Co-op Nursery, that's who.

Instead of the dead letter office, the valentines are arriving at their intended destination; warming hearts and avoiding tears from the sender.

Their hand-made valentine pictures are legally winging their way to grandma or another intended recipient of puppy love thanks to the advice of local mailman Floyd Minier.

Minier was invited to the nursery at

Geneva Presbyterian Church in Canton by teachers Susan Knapp and Marie Mack. The two neatly combined a lesson on people in the community who can help youngsters with a timely valentine project.

Minier told the pre-schoolers how 13-cent stamps had to be on the envelopes, where they should be placed and that only the stamps sold by the post office are allowable. That rules out Easter Seals and green stamps.

THE PRE-SCHOOLERS all got a chance to heft the mailbag or try on the mailman's cap. He drove up in the truck and showed youngsters the eagle symbol that is on all mail trucks and boxes, to prevent them from dropping the envelope off in the Goodwill drop box.

And the mailman even delivered the class a cancelled valentine that he addressed to them.

One of the youngsters asked Minier if he had to go down to Florida to pick up letters mailed on the youngster's vacation. Minier explained that the Florida postal workers put the mail in an airplane to deliver it up here by a local carrier.

Recognizing the inherent sexism of the old term "mailman," Minier and the class used the more acceptable terms "mail carrier" or "postal worker."

Girls in the class knew they could deliver mail too. But being a mailman or mailwoman wasn't the job pick of

too many career-minded pre-schoolers these days. Surprisingly, the boys didn't want to be professional ballplayers and not all the girls wanted to be nurses.

"Everyone in the class wants to be a policeman," laughed Mrs. Mack.

Dad charged in youth hockey fracas

Who says kid's sports aren't violent? A warrant is expected to be issued this week against a Pleasant Ridge man, charging him with assault and battery on a 14-year-old player in the Plymouth-Canton Hockey Association.

The charge stems from a Jan. 28 incident at the Plymouth Cultural Center after a game between the Royal Oak hockey team and the Plymouth team.

According to police reports, the 45-year-old Pleasant Ridge man, the father of one of the Royal Oak players, punched the Plymouth youth in the

face, splitting his lip and bruising his cheek and jaw.

The fight began, police said, when the Plymouth boy pushed the man's son while he was on his way into the locker room.

The father told police he thought it was an older man "manhandling his son," so he punched him.

According to Thomas Norton, assistant coach of the Plymouth team, the two boys were involved in a fight on the ice earlier, and both of them were sent to the penalty box.

Norton said the Plymouth player

injured his knee during the altercation on the ice and was sent to the dressing room early.

Police said the boy had changed into street clothes and was on his way out of the dressing room when the game ended and the Royal Oak team was en route to its locker room.

As the two boys who were involved in the scuffle on the ice passed each other, police said, the Plymouth youth gave the Royal Oak player a shove.

It was then, according to police, that the Royal Oak player's father punched the Plymouth youth "full in the face."

Water is being served in most area eateries

If you don't get a glass of water with you feel cheated?

Although conservationists are pushing restaurateurs to quit serving water automatically, a survey of restaurants in Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton indicates that very few have abandoned the practice.

Of 10 restaurants polled, only two do not automatically place water glasses on the table. Two serve water but have plans to quit soon, and six have no plans to eliminate the glass of ice water.

Several restaurant owners or managers said they would like to abandon the practice to save water and energy but were afraid of what their customers would say.

"I don't want to get put on the spot," explained Richard Meacham, manager of Bode's Coffee House in Plymouth. "I wouldn't mind not serving water, but I'm going to wait and see what happens with the rest of the industry."

ACCORDING TO FIGURES supplied by the Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC), America's 70 million restaurants use an estimated 2.5 billion gallons of water each year.

But the thought of saving water resources is not a persuasive argument compared to the profit and loss motive under which most eateries operate.

"Personally, I would like to see more restaurants stop serving ice water," said Bill Knapp's manager James Roe. "But I also know what an angry customer is."

The matter of whether to serve water has been under discussion at Knapp's for several weeks, he said, and the policy will probably become "water on

request only" within the near future.

"You have to understand that people have a few standard ideas on how to judge a restaurant," said Creon Smith, manager of the Mayflower Hotel's restaurants. "And water is one of them. If they don't have a glass of it in front of them as soon as they sit down, they think they're getting bad service."

Smith said that the hotel restaurants stopped serving water five years ago "as an experiment," but gave it up after a number of complaints.

"Back then, people thought we were absolutely crazy not to serve ice water. But it's going to be the trend for the future."

Despite the bad experience, Smith said the hotel was going to stop serving water again in about two weeks. "I know some of our customers won't like it. But you have to put your foot down and run your own business."

TO MAKE THE transition a little smoother, the hotel is planning to put little cards on each table explaining how much

energy is used in serving one glass of water.

The Plymouth Hilton is one of the two eating establishments which have discontinued serving ice water as a matter of course.

Richard Cook, food and beverage manager, said he started the water-on-request policy just two weeks ago and is fairly satisfied with customer response.

"So far, it hasn't been a major issue. Sure, some people have complained, but that's always bound to happen when you try something (Continued on page 4A)

live on wages like that. The employee turnover in a nursing home is something else and I am the first to admit patients cannot get the best of care with a constant change of employees.

"Our largest concern in a nursing home is labor," Lampton continued. "I feel the aides are most important in the successful operation of a nursing home and until the state pays enough to keep good aides, nursing homes are going to have problems.

"We can't pay them a living wage at the present rate. More than half our

income went for wages last year and, according to state requirements, we are understaffed. If the pay was better, we could retain employees longer and train them better; therefore, making patient care better.

Right now, if you get a good responsible person and get them trained, they go to a hospital where the wages are much better. Who can blame them?"

CITIZENS FOR BETTER CARE has good intentions, said Lampton, "but so do we. If a better building means better care, that's fine. Let us

give a better building, but remember the money has to come from someplace.

"I really enjoyed the nursing home the first 15 years and really felt I was doing a good community service, but the last three years have been a nightmare and after reading some of these newspaper articles I feel like hiding.

"Just last week I had a phone call from a concerned citizen, criticizing because I let a patient go to town in foul weather. I tried to point out that a nursing home wasn't a prison and we could not use physical restraints to keep a man from going to town. We

can advise him, but that is all. "Washing feces and urine from a person is not the most fascinating job in the world. It takes a special type of person to do this day in and day out. It is one of the many jobs necessary to keep these people up and about, yet I have never seen or heard of Citizens for Better Care make any comment on this little problem."

"We would be glad to give our patients unopened mail each day if Citizens for Better Care would take time to write to them. We have patients who haven't received a letter since they have been here. I can assure you that the ones who get mail get it unopened. We do have to read it to them in most cases, or leave it with them until their families come for a visit.

"We have open visiting seven days a week. But, except for a very few families, I don't see this place being overrun with visitors."

all the problems would be taken care of by contractors.

"PEOPLE MUST fill out three forms; send us two and keep one for their records," Thompson said. "The next thing the homeowner has to do is notify the builder by letter. We give the builder 30 days to respond, but if it's an emergency situation, we'll put the fire under them right away."

If no response is received from the builder within 30 days, a township inspector is sent to investigate the complaint. The builders, however, generally have been meeting the 30-day limit, Thompson said.

"I don't think we have 10 outstanding complaints remaining out of all the initial forms that were filed."

Thompson would not venture to guess the number of cases the town-

ship has handled since last fall, but said there have been "less than 100".

If the builder does not respond to the letter or fix a valid complaint, Thompson said the township will assist the homeowner in filing a complaint with the state.

Examples of complaints have ranged from a garage door that would not shut properly to a large wall crack in a basement. Builders are not required to repair items like repainting a drywall that had nail pops.

Canton Township issued 1,466 single-family building permits last year. A total of 1,162 families moved into new homes last year.

Seven two-family dwellings and 145 multiple family units received permits, as did 222 mobile homes and 20 commercial buildings.

new. I'm going to try it for about a month as an experiment. And if I continue to be impressed, I'll make it permanent."

Betty Stremich of the Hillside Inn has met the problem of what to do about serving water by coming down squarely in the middle.

She said ice water is served only when a customer asks for it in the Bottom of the Hill section. But the familiar glass of tinkling ice is still automatically provided in the main dining room upstairs.

"Before we decided to stop providing water in the Bottom of the Hill, we did a little test," Mrs. Stremich explained. "And it got a few people upset. In fact, some of them even bothered to come upstairs and complain about it.

"BUT IT MAKES energy sense to stop putting water around when people don't ask for it. I just haven't decided in the main dining room where people are eating a complete meal."

George Petrakos, owner of the Canton House, however, has no such difficulty in choosing his stance on the issue. Water is served, and will continue to be served in his restaurant.

When he purchased the eatery a short time ago, the previous owner had a water-on-request policy. But after Petrakos assumed the reins, he changed that.

"Water is a part of the meal," he explains. "Customers want it and expect it."

Canton's Roman Forum and Plymouth's Daly Drive-In also

spread ice water around liberally, although Mario Bossio, owner of the Forum admits he could save some money if he discontinued the practice.

"Ice is particularly expensive," he observed. "By the time you pay for the machine and the electricity to run it, you've spent some money." But he added he had no plans to change the automatic water policy in his establishment.

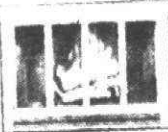
"At Daly's the glass of water in front of the customer is a signal to other waitresses that the person has been taken care of. 'I do know that in most instances it is a waste of water, though,' commented manager Ruth Yonkin. "But there has been no talk about eliminating it."

Rocks put heat on Bentley, 74-62

The Rocks are back in the Suburban Eight League race.

Rich Hewlett scored 10 of his team-high 21 points in the final quarter to spark Plymouth Salem to an important 74-62 road victory over Livonia Bentley Friday night.

The Salem triumph not only avenges an earlier loss to the Bulldogs at Plymouth last month but also tightens the conference race.

The Rocks, in a quest for an unprecedented fifth straight league title, moved to within a half-game of the Bulldogs, raising their record to 9-2 in the Sub-8 and 14-2 overall. Bentley was undefeated in league competition prior to Friday's game and now stands on top with a 9-1 record and 11-4 overall.

Bentley's final three league games all are on the road against Edsel Ford, Belleville and Redford Union, while Salem hosts both Edsel Ford and Belleville in its two final contests.

The Bulldogs had a chance to tie for the league title with a victory over Salem, but it just wasn't to be.

Salem jumped into a quick 19-10 first quarter lead but the Bulldogs cut the

margin to one, 32-31, at halftime on the strength of Eric Thorderson's 10-point period.

Thorderson added eight more of his game-high 24 points in the third quarter as Salem increased its margin to three points, 48-45.

The Rocks gained control of the game for good in the first minute of the final period, scoring the first four points to increase their lead to seven points. Bentley never got within six points after this early spurt as the Rocks' stiff man-to-man defense resulted in many Bulldog turnovers.

Hewlett played an excellent transition game in the final period, accounting for many fast-break baskets.

Broderick finished with 17 points and Tom Ellinghausen added 14. Dave Stone followed Thorderson in scoring for Bentley, clicking for 16 points. Chris Bollin chipped in with 11 points.

"We played extremely hard and with great intensity when we had to," said a pleased Salem coach Fred Thorman.

"Now it's just a question of whether someone else can knock off Bentley. Our job tonight was to set the tone that they (Bentley) could be beat. Now it's someone else's turn to do it."

Bentley's first-year mentor Jim Komula felt Hewlett made the difference in the final quarter, setting the running tempo with his fast-break talents.

"I felt we played well for the first three quarters but Hewlett controlled things in the end," the Bentley mentor said.

"I don't feel bad about losing to Salem because they are a good club. But I think we are as good as they are. We are still one game up and our kids know that."

The victory raised the Rocks' record to 5-3-1 overall and 2-1-1 in Sub-8 competition.

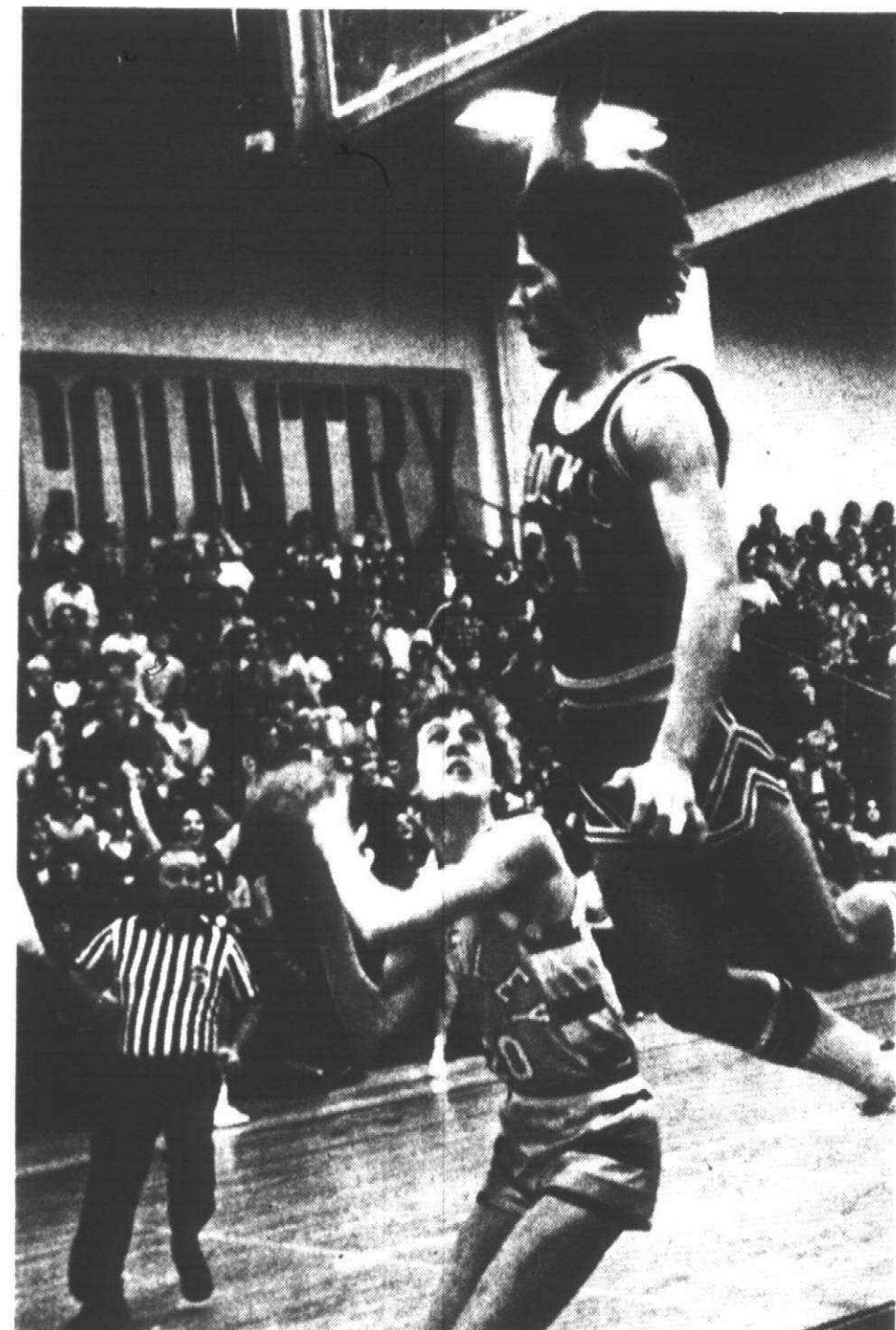
"It was our last easy meet before some tough finishing meets," commented Salem coach Chuck Olson.

Ex-Rock Ellinghausen placed in unfamiliar role

Jim Ellinghausen returned home for the second time in his collegiate basketball career Thursday night—but it wasn't the same as a year ago.

The former Plymouth Salem star, who started last season in the pivot for the Ohio State Buckeyes, found himself in the unfamiliar position of sitting on the bench during most of OSU's 85-74 loss to the University of Michigan at Crisler Arena.

The reason for the switch?

A group of highly-talented freshmen who could make the Buckeyes one of the Big Ten powers in years to come.

Ellinghausen, a 6-7 forward, is a 1976 graduate of Salem who broke all the scoring and rebounding records, both for a season and career, in his three-year high school varsity career.

Ellinghausen received All-State honors in his senior season with the Rocks and was heavily recruited by dozens of major colleges around the country.

The Peoria, Ill. product finally decided on Ohio State becoming the first major recruit for coach Eldon Miller, who moved into the Buckeye program after a successful coaching stint with Western Michigan University.

ELLINGHAUSEN became an imme-

diated starter for the Buckeyes in his freshman season as part of Miller's extensive rebuilding program. The former Salem star continued to play the pivot in his first collegiate season since the Buckeyes lacked a big man.

He guarded such stars as Indiana's Kent Benson and Michigan's Phil Hubbard last year.

This year's Ann Arbor appearance was a different story, however.

The game opened with Ellinghausen occupying the last seat on the bench as a different starting five was announced.

Among the host of talented freshmen Miller recruited for this season, was 6-11 center Herb Williams who has taken over the pivot for the Buckeyes.

Ellinghausen immediately moved to forward, a position which benefits his game, and started the first 14 games of the season.

He hasn't been in the starting five for the last five games, however, and was the first reserve forward to enter Thursday night's game for the Buckeyes—with 6:23 left in the first half.

Ellinghausen promptly blocked a shot and retained the rebound but didn't get his hands on the ball offensively as he played until intermission.

In the second half, Ellinghausen played nine more minutes and hit two jumpers from the left baseline, quiet-

ing an enthusiastic Wolverine crowd for a while.

He finished the game with five points and two rebounds but was once again on the bench as the final buzzer sounded.

"It's been an adjustment for Jim to

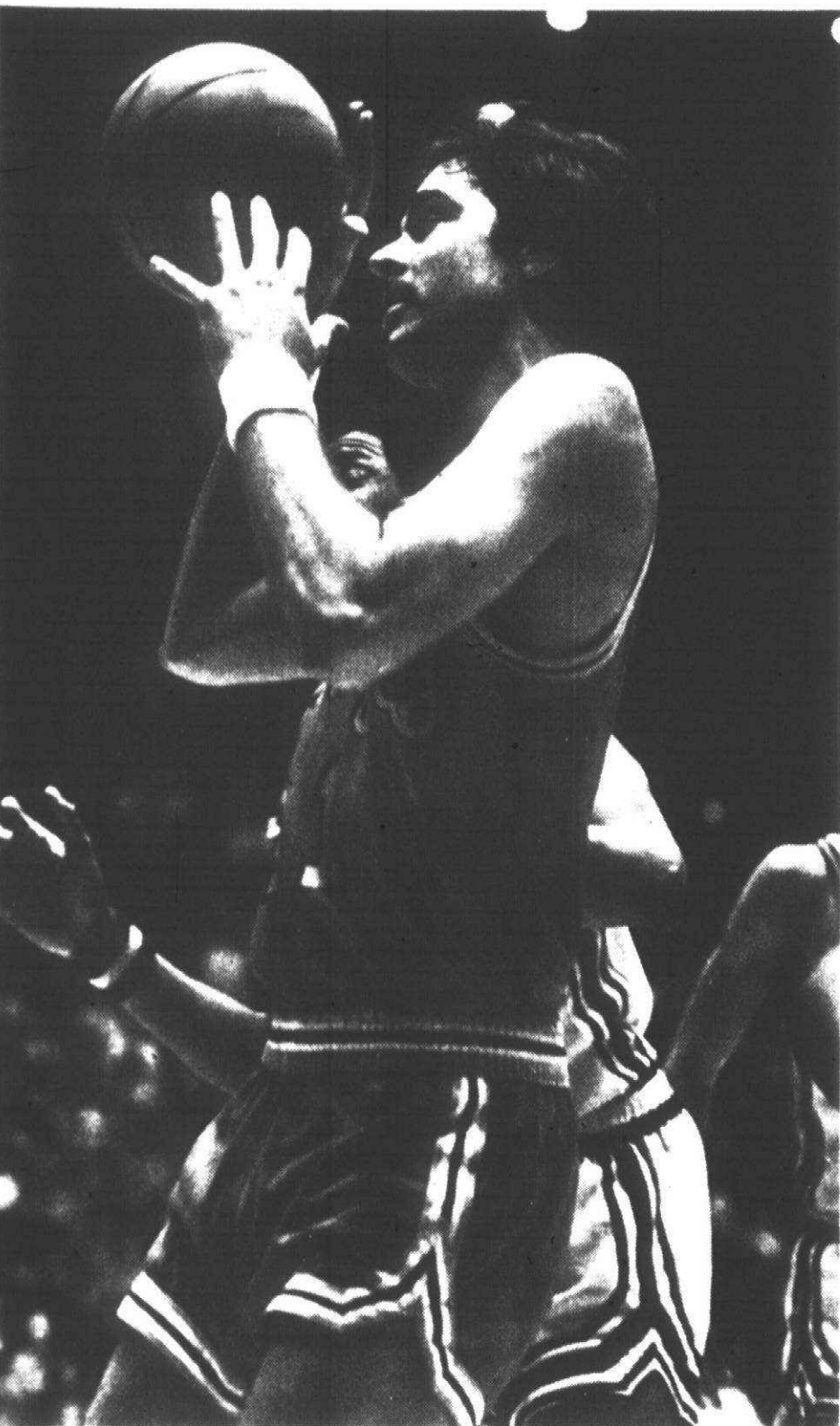

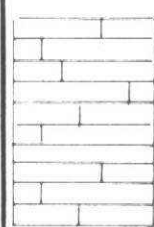

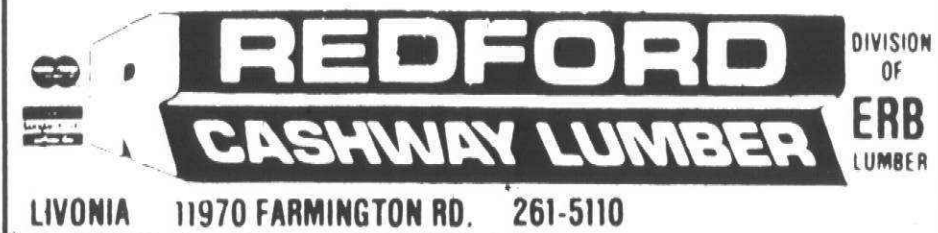

She found the range and posted games of 178, 200 and 233 for 611.

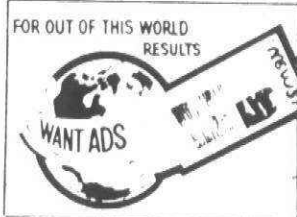
MONICA DLUGOS took the center spotlight in the Ladies Classic at Westland when she linked games of 226, 188 and 197 for a 611.

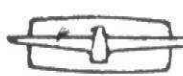

THE EDNA M. ALLEN School was built in 1953 in the middle of a cornfield.

A one-story, E-shaped building, it was built with the same floor plan as Bird and Smith elementaries. Additions were made in 1964 and 1967.

Miss Lucile Finkbeiner served on the dedication planning committee and continues on the faculty.

The school was named in honor of Edna Allen, who was a principal and teacher in Plymouth schools for 32 years. A graduate of Alma College and the University of Michigan, Miss Allen began teaching in a country school near Douglas Lake.

She came to Plymouth in 1918 and served as high school principal for 10 years. She became an English instructor in 1928 and held that position until retiring in 1950.

During its history, Allen has had only two principals—Don Rank, from

1953 to 1967, and Tom Workman from 1967 until the present.

Allen is known for its playground facilities. A Ground's Day project on May, 1970, involved some 400-500 children, parents and teachers who set up the culverts, poles, tires, ropes, and boulders donated by residents.

The areas surrounding the school are no longer cornfields. Allen now

serves more than 420 families and 590 students. It has two kindergarten rooms, 20 classrooms, a speech room, library, multi-purpose room, general offices and maintenance and teacher work areas.

The school symbol, a dragon, recently was named Alexander by the students. The official 25th anniversary date for Allen is Feb. 7.

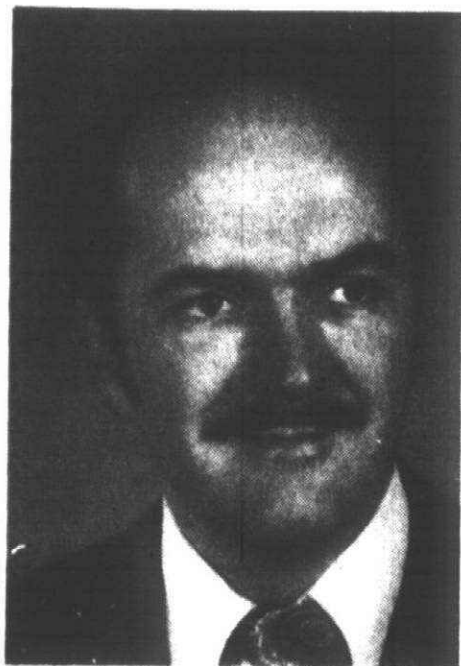

Schools lose sight of its service goal

Editor:
We hear that the schools soon will be asking for more money. Superintendent John M. Hoben's preliminary budget calls for 1.9 additional mills. For the first time in 16 years of voting I may be forced to vote no on school millage.

It's not that I don't believe the schools need the additional millage. As a teacher, and president of the Washenaw Community College Education Association, I'm fully aware of the pressing need for additional school monies. Further, we do live in an

expanding school district. New students cost money. The taxes on new homes do not pay the increased cost of educating the children of these homes.

However, it is my opinion that the school board and administration has lost sight of the fact that they serve to provide an educational system, according to the desires of the community—certainly within state guidelines and affirmative action procedures, and without undo meddling from the citizenry.

Two recent policy decisions demonstrate the board's and administration's

arrogant attitude. They have committed themselves to the "random selection" of high school students against the overwhelming wishes of the community.

Our neighborhood has a long history of involvement in Smith Elementary and East Middle School. My children both are in high school, so random selection will not affect our family. It will affect neighborhood involvement in the schools and my neighbors are upset.

We raise our children together. As an educator I know the importance of friendships as students make the big adjustment from junior high to high school.

Another very questionable policy decision concerns the parking policy at Centennial Educational Park. It's my opinion that students do not have the "right" to drive; rather, it is a privilege granted by the school district.

However, student drivers do save educational funds. The parking lots are cheaper to operate than the cost of increased bus service necessary for all students.

Secondly, once the decision has been made to allow student drivers, the administration should be willing to amend and compromise procedures to accommodate parking problems. It makes little sense to me that one lot should remain half-empty while students are turned away from another. This type of attitude represents the arrogance which will cause me to consider voting "no" on subsequent millage proposals.

The administration has proposed an "alternative school" for students who cannot adjust to the regular regiment. They should be listening to alternatives offered by the community.

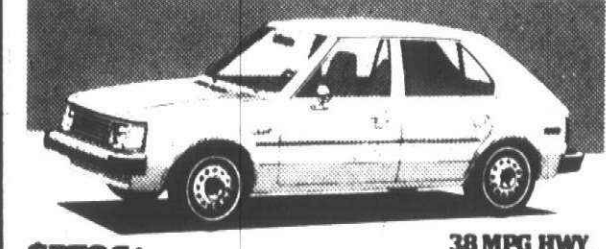

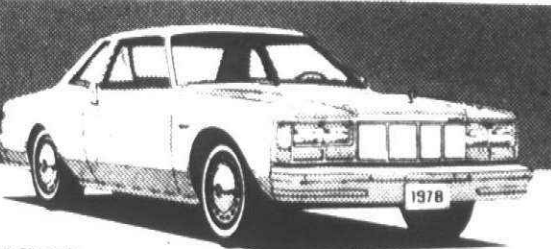

The occasion will be a dinner party that will mark the 30th anniversary of the founding of the club.

Guest speaker Graham Steenhoven conferred privately with Chinese Premier Chou En-lai months before Henry Kissinger's secret mission to China.

And it was Steenhoven who was summoned to the White House to brief Richard Nixon before his first trip to China.

Steenhoven's oriental adventure began in 1971. He was an employment manager at one of Chrysler's stamping plants. He also played "not very good" Ping-Pong. And he was president of the U.S. Table Tennis Association.

He was in Nagoya, Japan with the U.S. table tennis team that was playing in the world championships.

The Chinese called and asked Steenhoven to cancel a match and come to China the next day. He told them, "We keep our commitments."

Chicks miss opening 'by popular request'

The chickens seemed to take the gala world premiere of The Betsy all in stride.

They were escorted by Nick and Carl Schultz in Admiral Nelson uniforms and greeted by eight members of the Plymouth Fife and Drum Corps in their bicentennial uniforms. It made for a Hollywood first-nighter entrance.

"THE CHICKENS were excluded by popular request," said Lorenz.

This proved to be an understatement as he went on to describe the lady who spread her arms across the entry and barred their way to the Standard Club.

The evening began with a cocktail party in the Standard Club. The hors d'oeuvres table was centered with a four-foot chocolate model of the Betsy (the automobile). There also was a tall-carving of a rooster.

When the cocktail party ended at 7:30 p.m., the crowds headed for the three RenCen Theaters. It was also opening night for the theaters. "They finished laying the carpet at 5 in the afternoon," said Lorenz.

The movie was shown simultaneously in all three theaters.

Reaction to the R-rated film followed a pattern—"interesting," "entertaining," and "excitement every 20 minutes."

BILL AND CONNIE Bournias agreed it was beautiful party.

"I like Harold Robbins and read all his books," said Mrs. Bournias. "I just don't see the need for all that sex in a movie. It is embarrassing."

"My husband is in the machine tool business and he thought they should have shown more of the mechanics of building an automobile."

Bournias' company, F. Joseph

Lamb, was leading benefactor of the Project HOPE charity. Among the guests at the two tables reserved by the company, were top General Motors officials.

"It was interesting to watch the actors watching themselves in the movie—just like we did," said Mrs. Bournias. "The Manoogian Mansion was beautiful and it was fun to recognize people we knew in the film."

Each of the guests received a copy of the book, "The Betsy," specially inscribed commemorating the world premiere.

ALL THE PLYMOUTH guests were impressed with the decor, the food and the service at the banquet.

"They served about 930 people," said Lorenz. "Service was fast and smooth. They coordinate the whole thing with walkie-talkies. I'd like to go down again and see exactly how they do it."

When it was all over, the Mayflower group had to claim their chickens. Chicken Ship and Betsy were brought down from security on the 38th floor and returned to their owners. The egg, which had been kept warm during the premiere and attending festivities, now is incubating.

'Ping-Pong diplomat'

A few days later the U.S. team and Steenhoven were in China, ready for play. The U.S. team was ranked 28th; the Red China team was ranked No. 1. The American Table Tennis Association president found himself sipping tea with the Chinese president.

THIS WAS the first break in Sino-American relations.

The Chinese Ping-Pong team came to the United States. Kissinger went to Russia. This was followed by the Nixon's China visit.

Steenhoven did not take a camera to China to record his visit. The Chinese made up for it by giving him a going-away present—a 22-minute film of his visit. He will show the film to the Plymouth Lions and their ladies Thursday night.

Steenhoven's father was once the recipient of a Leader Dog for the blind. His only fee for speaking engagements to Lions Clubs is a donation to the Leader Dog School in Rochester.

THE PLYMOUTH Lions support the club's state projects—the leader dog program, the Michigan Eye Bank, and the Penrickton Home for the Blind.

The club started out with 30 members. The charter party was in the old Crystal Room of the Mayflower Hotel under the sponsorship of the Northwest Club of Detroit.

The present membership of 55 persons includes five charter members. They are William Fehlig, Ward Jones, first charter president and an honorary life member of the club; Rolland Widmayer, Ken Faling and Bruce Richard.

The club size dwindled to eight or 10 members at one time. It now is the most active club in its district. Its yearly funding of \$11,000 is more than the total amount raised by all other clubs in the district.

At one time, back in 1965, the club members built a house with volunteer labor.

"It was a brick ranch with an

attached garage," recalled Bill Fehlig. "We hired some things to be done but the club members did most of it. We did all the carpentry and trim." The house on Ball Street was sold and has been resold several times.

The Lions have three major fundraisers—the Fall Festival fish dinner, a charity auction, and a white cane sale. The cane sale is scheduled for April 28 this year.

The club gave a few van to the Plymouth-Canton-Northville YMCA. Members recently completed building two bridges for the Plymouth Township Recreation Park. They donated a substantial amount of money toward the cost of the Plymouth Salvation Army bus.

They fund the eye-care program for local school children. This is done with the cooperation of the school nurses.

Lions club members, wives and guests will celebrate a successful year and a club milestone Thursday evening. They also will hear the inside story of Ping-Pong diplomacy.

Historians disagree as to the exact date and reason for establishing St. Valentine's Day. Some believe it was a Christian replacement for the Roman's pagan festival of Lupercus, a god who watched over shepherds and their flocks.

My favorite interpretation concerns a priest of the same era named Valentine who was jailed for assisting Christians. While there, he further enraged Emperor Claudius by curing the jailer's daughter of blindness and sending

her letters signed, "From your Valentine."

The priest was beheaded Feb. 14, 269 AD. Pope Gelasius set aside that day to honor him and Valentine eventually was canonized.

Commercial cards appeared on the European market about 1800, many of which were elaborately designed. Esther Howland became one of America's first career women when she introduced the Valentine card in 1830.

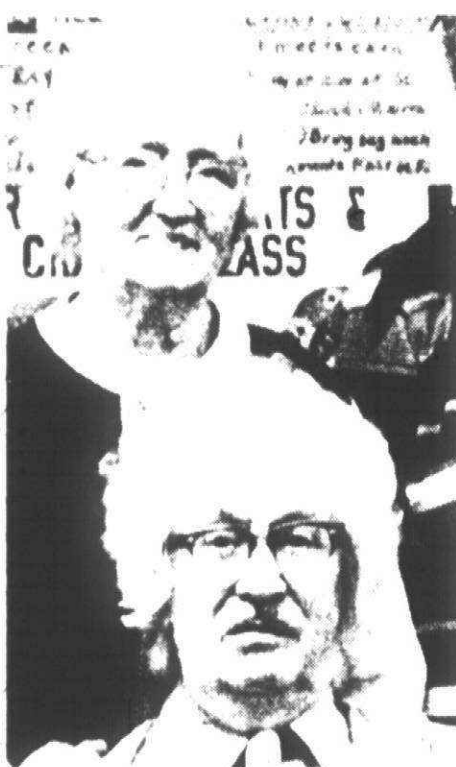

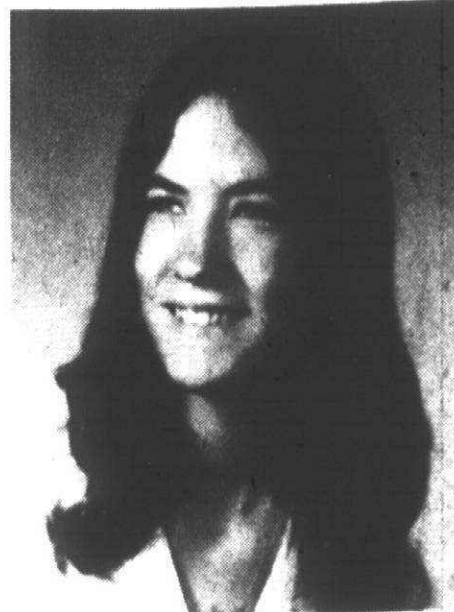

Get scared with 'Coma'

If you like being scared out of your socks, "Coma" (PG) can do it. However, the cost of the scary thrills is a great deal of unpleasantness. "Coma" is not a movie for the squeamish. Grisly and macabre scenes in operating rooms, pathology labs and hospital morgues assure the viewer of seeing all the things he never wanted to see, and then some.

Based on Dr. Robin Cook's gripping novel, the film, scripted and directed by Michael Crichton, captures some of the horror, but fizzles out at explanations and rationales. At movie's end, we're still left puzzled about how certain things were accomplished and who was involved.

Worse yet, one of the most interesting aspects of the movie in terms of social and economic implications is never pursued. A quick introduction to a computer link-up for worldwide bidding on body organs is all we ever get.

GENEVIEVE BUJOLD, as Dr. Susan Wheeler, is the heroine of the story. When she investigates the circumstances of an irreversible coma in her closest friend, she discovers a mysteriously large number of unexplained comas at the hospital.

Her investigation leads her to a forbidding concrete structure—the Jefferson Institute. There she discovers a frightening and profitable enterprise.

The suspense, with heavy-handed music to announce it, then hinges on whether Dr. Wheeler will survive to reveal the fiendish goings-on. The suspense is heightened by the ambiguous allegiance of her lover, Dr. Mark Bellows (Michael Douglas). He's an opportunist playing the game of hospital politics; thus, we are never certain where his loyalty lies.

Throughout the movie, there's not a shred of humor. And there are hardly any ordinary bits of normal business to relieve the grisly spell. From the very beginning, the characters seem edgy and uptight.

The press releases for "Coma" quote Bujold as saying she is pleased that an important screen role (Dr. Wheeler) is written for a woman, not a man. The role of Dr. Wheeler, however, is not a compliment to either sex. The character's professional competence as a doctor is offset by foolhardy courage, illogical actions and a babbling emotional floodtide.

If this were a Gothic horror story, Bujold would be the plucky heroine. In "Coma," she's the plucky, but ridiculously rash, doctor. That's equality, I guess. No sex has a monopoly on stupidity.

Here are a few suggestions on how to save money on your auto insurance policy:

Consider buying collision coverage with higher deductibles. Collision coverage can be reduced about 17 per cent when the deductible is changed from \$100 to \$200, and going from \$50 to \$100 deductible for comprehensive could work out to a 20 per cent savings.

Drop collision insurance entirely on an older car, because regardless of how much coverage you carry, the insurance company will pay only up to the car's "book value."

Investigate special discounts offered by some companies in some states. They are available for young drivers who have completed driver educa-

tion courses and for those who do well in school.

If you have a good driving record or attend college more than 100 miles from home or are a woman over 30 or a family with two or more cars, check the special discounts.

The lowest premium should not be your only goal. You should consider that you want to get the satisfaction you're entitled to when you make a claim and that your claim will neither increase your premium on the future nor be grounds for cancelling your policy.

If you stay with your present insurance company and have an accident, your company will take your previous record into consideration. If you are getting good service from your present company, making a switch may not be to your advantage in the long run.
