Is EDC too easy?

The City of Plymouth, seeking to entice more business and industry, may follow Canton Township's lead and form an economic development corporation (EDC).

EDCs, which have the ability to issue tax-exempt revenue bonds to finance development and construction costs for private commercial and industrial ventures, are becoming increasingly popular with communities across the state.

Canton formed an EDC about four months ago, and the City of Plymouth is currently investigating procedures to start its own.

Projects financed under an EDC can receive up to \$5 million in tax-free revenue bonds, issued by the EDC. Interest on the revenue bonds are exempt from all federal, state and local income taxes.

According to Charles Burleigh, a Detroit-based attorney and author of an article on EDCs for the "Michigan Real Property Review," the interest-free nature of the bonds can save a business 2-2½ per cent of the cost of a conventional bank mortgage.

"AND WHEN YOU'RE talking several million dollars that percentage can amount to quite a bit of money," he said.

Burleigh appeared before the Plymouth City Commission to discuss EDCs at the request of City Manager Fred Yockey. Burleigh explained the workings and benefits of EDCs.

Municipalities with EDCs have a competitive edge in luring commercial and industrial developers inside their borders, Burleigh said.

Canton Township's EDC recently received an application from Grosse Pointe Quality Food Company and another from Westside Auto Parts. The firms indicated they were interested in taking advantage of the savings afforded by the tax-exempt bonds.

The food company firm plans to build a distribution center at Haggerty and Michigan Avenue.

Frederick Hite, president of the company, said, there were factors other than Canton's EDC considered in the company's decision to locate in the township.

"We investigated numerous sites in the metropolitan area," Hite said. "But we decided on Canton because we wanted that particular piece of property and that location. The fact that they had an EDC to work with was just a nice extra."

Yockey said he was in favor of the city forming an EDC to increase the industrial and commercial tax base in the city. Canton Supervisor Harold

Stein also strongly supported an EDC for the township.

DESPITE THE enthusiasm of municipal officials and politicians toward EDCs, there are some who warn of pitfalls.

Bernard Klein, professor of public administration at the University of Michigan, Dearborn and one-time comptroller for the City of Detroit, argues that small municipalities "give away their birth-right" by forming EDCs.

He contends that communities can get themselves in a position of being held hostage by potential industrial developments.

"Look, I understand why communities want to make themselves attractive to business," he commented, "but you can go overboard with it."

"In some cases you get the small governments doing everything to get commercial development. Each community starts fighting a battle for survival. Then you get the business saying, 'If you don't do what we want, we'll go somewhere else. It's not the healthiest situation I can think of.'"

In addition to the philosophical objections, Klein took issue with some of the practical consequences of economic development corporations.

He said because the revenue bonds sold by an EDC are tax exempt, the burden of the lost taxes is made up by the rest of the tax-paying public.

He also said in the event a company-financed under an EDC goes bankrupt, there is a question of liability for the municipality.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS were given the power to establish economic development corporations in 1974 by an act of the state legislature. It was the intention of the act to provide a more favorable business climate in Michigan.

To establish an EDC, a government must first have a group of three or more persons submit a written application, including the proposed articles

Kelley will rule on refusal to bus option students

The state attorney general has been asked to issue an opinion whether Plymouth-Canton Community Schools must provide transportation for all students who live more than 1½ miles from the school they attend.

The request for the opinion was made by Dr. John W. Porter, state superintendent of public instruction.

At stake is whether the school district is obligated to bus students who originally were assigned to a year-round school but were re-assigned, at the request of parents, to a school with a nine-month schedule.

THE CONTROVERSY began last year when the school district expanded year-round scheduling to five additional schools.

For the previous two years, parents not wanting their children on the year-round schedule at Miller Elementary were given an option of attending Galimore.

When year-round scheduling was expanded last year, the school board also decided to offer the same option (to opt for a nine-month school) but added the requirement that parents "opting out" must provide their own transportation.

A parents group organized at that time and petitioned the school board to provide transportation to the option school. The board maintained it could not afford it and wasn't required by law.

At that time the board and the parents group asked the transportation division of the Michigan Department of Education for an opinion on the dispute. The transportation division issued two conflicting opinions—one saying the district didn't have an obligation to bus. The other said the district was obligated.

Porter, faced with conflicting opinions from within his own department, turned last week to Attorney General Frank Kelley for a legal interpretation.

As background information for Kelley, Porter noted that some of the Plymouth-Canton schools operating on a 12-month calendar with 45 days of instruction followed by 15 days of vacation, while others follow the more traditional September through June school calendar.

"Parents may send their child either to the neighborhood school closest to their home, or an optional school which follows a different schedule."

"Plymouth school officials have required parents of students enrolled in optional schools to provide their own transportation to school, even if it is more than 1½ miles from the student's home. Some of the parents have requested that transportation be furnished for their children as it is for

those attending neighborhood schools who must travel an equal distance."

In a letter to Kelley, Porter said the School Code of 1976 requires school districts which provide transportation to make it available to all students who live more than 1½ miles from the school in which they are enrolled.

Porter also asked Kelley to determine if the State Board of Education has the authority to direct Plymouth-Canton Community Schools to provide transportation to students enrolled in the optional program.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN said he was not surprised by Porter's request for an attorney general's opinion.

"My only surprise is that the request wasn't made four months ago."

Hoben said he wasn't sure, but he assumed the school board would vote to eliminate the option if Kelley said busing would be required.

"We offered the option to accommodate people who couldn't tolerate year-round school. The law states the board can establish attendance areas and boundaries, but providing options is not a legal requirement."

"We said we'd provide option schools if parents provided transportation. If the attorney general says we must provide transportation then the board will have to decide whether to provide the option."

"The administration pushed for an opinion from the department of education, and got two conflicting opinions. Our attorney states our position is ok."

About 40 parents organized last year to ask the board to provide busing to optional schools. The largest group were parents of students originally assigned to Miller who opted for Allen Elementary.

THE OPTIONAL SCHOOL busing dispute is similar, in principle, to the district's practice of providing busing transportation to students attending private or parochial schools.

Barn burns

William Bryant's barn, at 50400 Geddes, Canton Township, burned Wednesday morning, causing an estimated \$12,500 loss, fire officials reported.

No one was injured in the blaze. Fire Chief Mel Paulun says investigators believe the fire could have been started by a portable heater inside the barn.

Canton Fire Department had three trucks and a squad car on the scene at 9:56 a.m. Superior Township sent one truck to the farm located near Barr Road. The blaze was extinguished by 11:55 a.m.

Ice is still a problem for tenants

Despite the recent warming trend, the streets of Royal Holiday Mobile Home Park are still icy.

Sheldon Futernick of Westland, part-owner of Royal Holiday and a string of other parks, is now hearing complaints about upkeep of his establishment from the park residents and political "higher-ups."

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein engaged in a battle royale recently with Futernick when he asked the mobile park owner to clear thick ice off the streets in the park and respond to other maintenance complaints.

Mary Woods, president of the Royal Holiday In-Park Association, presented Stein with a petition late last month signed by more than 300 residents of the park, all of them irate about upkeep. Mrs. Woods said that people who live in the park won't allow Futernick to let warm weather solve the ice complaints. Besides, she said, problems of drainage in the park, and building and sidewalk maintenance, are a problem all year long.

Copies of the petitions, an Observer news article and the police report on road conditions have been sent by Stein to State Sen. William Faust (D-Taylor) and State Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland). Faust heard many Royal Holiday residents complain about lack of action in the park at last Friday's senior citizen conference in Wayne.

The majority of residents of Royal Holiday are senior citizens; the park has instituted a ban on any new tenants less than 40 years of age.

Stein said he is concerned that the park, which is built on marshy land, will flood drastically in the spring if Futernick does not clear the ice that covers manholes. Conditions at the park make walking a treacherous proposition for seniors who meet regularly in the clubhouse, Stein said.

Futernick has agreed to tour the park with Stein but no date has been set. Repeated attempts by the Observer to interview Futernick were fruitless.

Last Monday Futernick sent Stein a telegram from Westland which states, "I have not heard from you, so please contact me as soon as possible so that we can make an immediate tour

Can growth be curbed?

A discussion on growth management between Canton officials and school trustees will be held at tonight's (Monday) meeting of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein, or a representative, will discuss with the

school board land use and growth management studies now in progress in Canton.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Little Theatre of Plymouth-Canton High School, 8415 Canton Center Road just south of Joy.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN said Stein has requested the school district's involvement in some of the issues being discussed at the township level regarding land use and future development.

Canton's land use committee and growth management committee have completed their studies and have reported to the Canton Board of Trustees.

Following submission of the citizen studies, Stein asked for two professional studies to be conducted—acquisition of development rights, and a growth management study. Both are now near completion.

In a letter to Hoben, Stein said he wants to broaden and stabilize Canton's taxbase by promoting commercial and industrial development.

"The advantage of such a broadened taxbase could be of inherent benefit to the schools," wrote Stein. "Therefore, I believe that the innovative implementation of any policy in this area must include the recommendations and cooperation of our school district representatives."

Key to success

The secrets of \$4 million in sales

There is an adage which says "the more we put into the lives of others, the more comes back into our own."

No finer example of its truth can be found than in the life of Mrs. Janice Foster, who recently was honored for being the second most successful saleswoman in Wayne-Oakland counties by topping \$4 million in real estate sales and listings.

"I didn't set a goal," she explained the other morning over a cup of coffee. "I was just doing what I have been doing all my life—helping people with problems and becoming involved in the community."

FROM HER CHILDHOOD Mrs. Foster of Plymouth has followed the creed of helping others and it made little difference where she happened to live.

With glowing pride she'll tell you about how she helped organize a library and a church choir in the Tidewater area of Virginia.

And there's a sparkle in her eye when she tells how much she enjoyed being involved with garden and home clubs in the eastern seaboard from Virginia to Connecticut.

In her telling there is a bright smile as she discloses her love of antiques—especially when she was a volunteer in the Philadelphia area.

IT WAS THIS volunteer involvement when she and her family came to Plymouth 12 years ago which gave her what she calls an "accidental start" in the real estate business.

Not wanting to enter into organized groups immediately after her arrival,

she struck out on her own and volunteered her services at the Plymouth Center for Human Development. And what happened there is one of the joys of her life.

The involvement has carried her into church work, won her a spot on the city's planning commission, and has given her an opportunity to accompany Mrs. Carrie Wright to the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth for services every Sunday morning.

"I find it such a joy to take this 80-year-old lady to church and it sort of gives me a great start each week."

But it was the visit to the Plymouth Center for Human Development which

brought the real joy in her life. It was there she noticed a severely retarded little girl and took a liking to her immediately.

She tells, with a mother's pride, how she lifted the child to her arms and caressed her. So great did the love for the child become that, even against the institution's policy, she was granted permission to take the child home. For close to five years the child was cared for. Her mental capacities began to grow.

"We didn't realize she was almost totally blind until Dr. L.J. Salan, the recently retired eye specialist, told us."

Then came an almost regrettable day. Mrs. Foster was informed by the center that because of the shortage of beds at the Center, the child would have to be returned or withdrawn from the institution.

She was taken back. While Mrs. Foster visited her every week, the child was gaining knowledge and strength. Now, after eight years, she is a student in the Northville School District and attends special education classes in Dearborn.

IT WAS WHILE working with the youngster and other volunteer activi-

ties that Mrs. Foster ventured into real estate.

She said she chose the profession by "accident" because the hours of a real estate salesperson were flexible enough to give her the hours needed to take care of the retarded child and give her the benefit of a home in which three daughters were raised.

She further explained the "accident" by saying that many of the friends she had made had trouble, from time to time, in either buying or selling their homes.

So she tried to help them out and eventually took a real estate course for a year and then joined the staff of Robert Bake Realtors on Ann Arbor Trail.

ADMITTING THAT she never sets goals, Mrs. Foster says she is always in competition with herself—always trying to help more and more people with their problems.

The desire to help enabled her to reach the \$2 million mark in sales and listings, and then to the \$4 million achievement last year.

With all of this activity she and her husband, who is in the tool business in Warren, also have taken the time to raise three daughters.

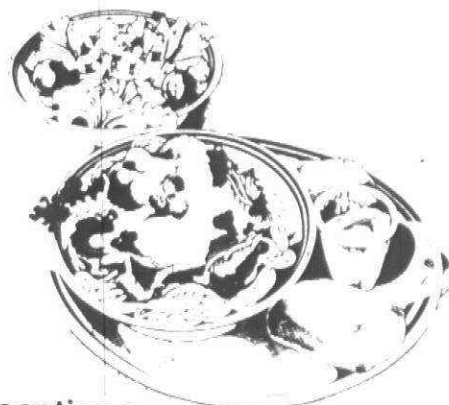

Transfer fund to banish cash

How does the idea of computerized money grab you?

Nobody thinks twice anymore about playing games with computers, and some people have used them for years to line up dates.

But how about letting them balance the checkbook? How about letting them replace the checkbook?

The day of computerized money in Michigan may dawn sooner than you think, if a bill State Rep. William Keith (D-Garden City) has spent the last several months shepherding past wary bankers and consumer groups becomes law.

Now awaiting action on the house floor, the bill sets guidelines for the use of Electronic Fund Transfer Systems (EFTS).

EFTS is basically plastic money—but plastic money like you've never seen it before.

EFTS have the potential to virtually eliminate cash from your life.

"If people are afraid of it, they won't use it," said Keith. "They won't have to. But it's convenient for the consumer and it's money-saving to the financial institutions."

EFTS involve the use of computer terminals to transfer money from one account to another. That could be, say, from your account to a department store's.

The primary difference between EFTS and existing forms of "plastic money," like credit cards or Automated Teller cards is that the transaction involves two accounts and it is immediate.

By pushing a few buttons, a store clerk can determine if there really is the \$90 in your account you'll need to that vacuum cleaner.

But, the clerk can't find out if there's any more than that.

If you get the vacuum cleaner home only to find out it doesn't work, you've got up to four days to stop payment on the fund transfer.

Within four days of buying the vacuum cleaner, you'll get a paper state-

ment about the purchase, in addition to monthly paper statements on all activity within your account.

If your card for performing EFTS transactions is lost or stolen, or if you're forced to use it against your will to withdraw funds, you won't be liable for any loss. By contrast, existing plastic money laws leave the account holder liable for the first \$50 charged to lost or stolen credit cards.

Financial institutions favor the bill for a number of reasons. Keith estimates it will reduce costly paperwork for cashing checks by 85 to 90 per cent.

It may also offer large banks an "out" to Michigan's often complicated banking laws. Broadly stated, the laws now prevent large banks from expanding as much as some of them would like.

However, a large bank could establish an EFTS computerized terminal anywhere in the state. You'd think that would upset small bankers—and at least one small bankers' group, the Michigan Association of Community Bankers, does oppose the bill.

But EFTS terminals anywhere except at an already-chartered bank would have to be available to anyone, even customers of competing banks.

The same "extras" now offered for checking accounts would probably be options for EFTS accounts. At least, services like guaranteed check writing—actually an open-end loan account—would not be prohibited under Keith's EFTS bill.

You'll also be free to establish any restrictions on use of the account that you like. You can set a limit for the number of allowable transactions in any one day, for instance, or set a maximum amount that can be charged using an EFTS card.

And EFTS lays open, at least technologically speaking, the possibility that some day you can sit at home in your easy chair and pay all your bills and do your shopping simply by watching television display the wares. Your telephone could be used to transfer funds.

Iran doesn't know beans, but Korte will change that

Iranians, Egyptians and Belgians will get an earful on soybeans from Don Korte of Canton this month.

Korte, a member of the American Soybean Association (ASA) market development foundation, is one of 35 farmers who comprise a delegation aimed at increasing world awareness of American soybeans.

The mission is sponsored by Elanco Products Co., the maker of a weed-killing herbicide. The mission will return March 21 after the two-week tour is completed.

First stop for the farmers is Brussels, Belgium. There they meet with officials of the European Economic Community (EEC). The EEC is the

biggest customer for American soybeans in the world, importing nearly 20 per cent of the U.S. crop, according to an ASA spokesman.

The delegation will also travel to Iran to meet with officials of the oil-producing monarchy of Iran. Petrodollars have given Iran the opportunity to explore new avenues of agriculture. The ASA contingent reportedly plans to show Iranians how to raise more poultry and beef using a soybean meal.

Several Iranian officials who will greet the ASA delegation are familiar faces because they came to this country last year for a soybean study mission, said Nick Rose, president of the

ASA. Rose is heading up the delegation and is a soybean farmer in Roseville, Ark.

The last stop on the junket is Egypt. There, the ASA members will try to convince Egyptians to raise more poultry.

The demand for fowl is good in Egypt, unlike many mideast countries, according to Rose. But at present, the availability of poultry is low—consumption of poultry in Egypt is estimated to be one per capita by the ASA.

Elanco Co. has sponsored seven previous agricultural missions for the American Soybean Association.

Cigar-shaped UFOs reported

Paul Comi, 65, and Jerry Kaliszewski, 10, have never met each other, but they shared a similar experience at about the same time Monday night. Both saw something strange pass through the skies over Redford.

It didn't last more than a few seconds—a flash through the night—but nonetheless, it left an impression on their minds.

Jerry was in the backyard of his home on W. Chicago and Tecumseh, when he saw a red elongated oval disk fly through the sky. It had bright flashing lights and a flaming triangular tail. At about 8:30 p.m., he rushed into the house to tell his mother, Helen Kaliszewski.

He told his mother, "It's like nothing you'd ever seen before."

Jerry told her it swooped through the sky once and then went on, heading east.

The next morning he told his teachers and friends at his school, Dearborn's Gibson School for the Gifted what he had seen. However, no one would listen to him so he went home and drew a picture of the sighting.

PAUL COMI was pulling into his

driveway at about 8 p.m. that night when he observed something through his car's window. Comi lives on Lenore near West Chicago and Telegraph.

He described it as a red flame through the sky, an image that lasted only 10-12 seconds before it was gone. He says it was flying about 200 feet above the Korvette building off W. Chicago.

He says it was a pretty sight. Comi describes it as a cigar-shaped object that appeared blue at the tip but turned green and then yellow as it progressed to the tail. The tail, he says, looked like a red flame.

There were other sightings in the area that closely matched the descriptions of the two Redford residents. Two Garden City boys say it looked like a greenish cigar with a trail of

light. They say it was exactly 8 p.m. when it passed through the sky heading east.

At the same time, at the other side of the metropolitan area, two Metropolitan Beach Park rangers say they also saw a cigar-shaped object in the

sky, and this one was also heading east.

A similar sighting was also reported in Farmington Monday night at 7:30. The UFO was described as having two red spotlights, and heading in a south-west direction.

2 guilty in pizza stick-up

Two men were convicted Thursday on armed robbery charges stemming from the Dec. 11 knife-point robbery of employees at Little Caesar pizzeria.

Approximately \$90 was stolen by Michael Ray Spears, 24, of Detroit, and Henry J. Mates, 39, of Plymouth at the pizzeria at Ford and Lilley. More would have been taken, according to police, but the manager took most of the money into the backroom because he was suspicious of one of

the suspects.

Spears demanded a jury trial and pleaded that he was intoxicated at the time of the crime and not responsible for his actions. The jury didn't agree and convicted him of armed robbery.

Mates plead guilty last Monday to armed robbery in a session before Circuit Judge Joseph B. Sullivan. Sentencing is set for March 31 for both men.

"I thought about it, sure," Wilson said, "but I figured it might be someone's paycheck and I figured if it were mine, I'd want someone to turn it in."

"I looked at it, I got in the car and counted it, and couldn't believe there would be that much lying on the parking lot."

War waged with Scotch tape

One of the unheralded battles being fought in the business world is the effort of firms to defend their trade names.

The war is constantly being waged because the law states businesses must protect use of trade names to keep them. It is interesting to note which products have lost their trade name status and now are legally generic terms.

The battle strategy is centered on keeping trade names in upper-case and generic names in lower-case. Which is how I get involved, as a middleman, in this unheralded war.

If I print Mace with a lower-case "m," I'm sure to get a letter from a corporate lawyer pointing out Mace is a trade name for a liquid tear gas formula and must be capitalized. If my newspaper, and other publications, continued to use a lower-case "m" and weren't notified by mail of our misuse, Mace would soon lose its trade-mark status.

BECAUSE OF THIS feature of trade mark law, writers have to be very careful to capitalize names of products which are trade names.

The tricky thing is that some trade names are used so much in day-to-day conversation that it becomes easy to conclude the name for the product is a generic word.

Examples of trade names which can be mistaken for generic words include: Bake-Off, a contest held by Pillsbury; Band-Aid (generic is bandage); Chap Stick, a lip balm; Crescent, an adjustable open-end wrench; Dictaphone; Fiberglass, the generic name is spelled with two S's; Formica; Jeep; Jockey shorts; Kleenex; Kool-Aid; Levi's; Man-Made, when referring to industrial diamonds made by GE; Nature's Remedy, when referring to Lewis-Howe's laxatives; Oreo

cookies; Plexiglas; Potscrubber, when describing GE's dishwasher; Q-Tips; Realtor; Sanka; Shake 'N Bake; Styrofoam; Tabasco; Telecopier; Transcendental Meditation; and Vaseline.

Other trade names which will trip you up if you don't watch it are: Cyclone chain link fence; Hydra-Matic transmissions; Instamatic cameras; Masonite hardboard; Ping-Pong; Scotch tape; Tinkertoy; Ace bandages; Novocain; Bisquick; TV Dinner; Plabum; and Popsicle.

WHAT'S INTERESTING in this war is the casualties—former trade names which have lost their legal status.

The cereal industry, for instance, has lost trade name status for such products as corn flakes, raisin bran and shredded wheat.

Other words which once were trade names, but no longer are, include cellophane, cube steak, escalator, kerosene, lanolin, linoleum, milk of magnesia, mimeograph, and yo yo.

Other words losing their trade name status are dry ice, nylon, trampoline and kiddicar.

The biggest loser is aspirin. Dristan, Bufferin and Excedrin still are trade-names and are popularly known as particular types of aspirin. But aspirin, itself, once was a trade name with the same status as Dristan or Darvon.

Consider the loss in trade mark status to aspirin and corn flakes and you can appreciate why protecting the status is so important.

That's why lawyers are hired by corporations to send out letters to newspaper editors who don't use capital letters for trade names. Such slips, if repeated enough, can cost a company millions of dollars in future revenues. That's how important a capital letter can be.

through Royal Holiday Park before the spring thaw.

"I would like to personally show you that the conditions described to you by others do not exist."

In late January, senior citizen residents of the park contacted the Canton Observer and a picture page and story followed, with Futernick saying that the protesters were retired people "with time on their hands."

Supervisor Stein said he has been after Futernick to act on the resident's concerns since the article appeared Jan. 20. Last month, after a police report came in citing dangerous road conditions inside the park, Stein personally inspected the site. He told the

board Tuesday that ice ruts in the road caused by a broken sewer line and poor drainage in the park have made roads almost impassable.

Ptl. Dan Antieau of the Canton Police Department says roads in Royal Holiday are "extremely slippery, with ice as deep as 6-8 inches." Deep ruts in the road "make two-way traffic impossible," Antieau reports.

Mrs. Woods, who represents the residents of the park, said young persons have been hired recently to break up the ice around manholes but despite those efforts, she said, ice and standing water is still a major problem.

In his telegram to Stein, Futernick says he toured Canton's residential

subdivisions and can "unequivocally state that Royal Holiday Park is and was maintained far better than any of these other subdivisions."

After receiving the bulk of petitions, Stein said he placed numerous phone calls to Futernick demanding immediate action on the situation.

School lunch price hike considered

A proposal to increase school lunch prices by five cents for students and 10 cents for adults will be submitted tonight (Monday) to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

The board will be asked to increase the price of elementary lunches from 55 to 60 cents, middle school lunches from 60 to 65 cents, high school lunches from 70 to 75 cents, and adult lunches from \$1 to \$1.10.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Little Theatre of Plymouth-Canton High, Canton Center Road just south of Joy Road.

THE PRICE HIKE recommendation results from a financial analysis of the school food program.

Last winter a five-cent price increase was approved, but that hasn't been enough to head off a rising deficit in the school lunch budget.

In June 1970 the cafeteria fund had an operating deficit of \$1,029. The deficit increased to a loss of \$15,916 by Jan. 31. Without the requested price increase, the deficit is expected to exceed \$17,500 by June. With the price increase, the deficit is expected to drop to about \$3,590 by June 30.

The proposed price increase is the same one adopted by the school board and made effective Jan. 31, 1977—five cents for students, 10 cents for adults.

At that time, some trustees argued the better approach would be to improve the quality of school lunches, thereby raising cafeteria revenues by attracting more students. They argued that without increasing quality of lunches a price increase would be counter-productive and would result in fewer persons using the cafeteria.

IN SEPARATE action, the board will be asked to approve bids for air-conditioning units for three schools—Isbister and Gallimore elementaries, Pioneer Middle School—which went on the year-round schedule last fall.

The units are supposed to be installed and operational by June 1 so the classroom climate won't be unbearably hot in July and August.

The board also is being asked to approve the purchase of educational developmental reading and math laboratories for Central, East, Pioneer and West middle schools. The costs are being covered 100 per cent by state and federal grants.

State spending curb is goal of new campaign

Michigan voters may get the chance to put a lid on state spending with a constitutional amendment.

Dick Headlee, head of Taxpayers United, Inc., a group which has organized a petition drive to limit state spending, wants a proposed amendment to the state constitution placed on the November 1978 ballot.

Headlee, a vice-president of the Michigan Chamber of Commerce, believes the increasing gap between state spending and personal income in Michigan is overtaxing residents. The spending has been increasing at a greater rate than income has.

His proposal is similar to Proposal C, which was defeated in the November 1976 election.

The issue, like Proposal C, would limit state spending to a certain per-

centage of personal income of Michigan residents.

Headlee maintains that this proposed amendment is more comprehensive and flexible than the defeated Proposal C.

The Farmington Hills man talked about the proposal and presented a short filmstrip about the petition drive at a recent Livonia Republicans meeting in the Hines Park Inn, Plymouth Road near Newburgh.

HE AND HIS CO-WORKERS must get 266,000 signatures of registered voters by May 1 to get the proposal on the November ballot.

"Restraints must be placed on the state's spending," Headlee said.

"There is excessive taxation of those persons on fixed incomes, and the discretionary income of others is being eaten up with taxes," he continued.

"Let's look at what has happened in Michigan in the last 10 years."

Headlee showed several graphs relating to personal income and state spending.

"The personal income of the state is up 145 per cent since 1968," he said. "While state spending is up 235 per cent."

"Michigan's population is up a only 6.75 per cent while the number of state employees is up 50 per cent."

Headlee discussed what he called the most "revealing figures."

Personal income is up 145 per cent, far less than the state income tax in the last 10 years, he said. "If we, as taxpayers, don't stop the legislators from over spending, we'll be taxed to death."

HEADLEE EXPLAINED how his proposal would limit state taxes.

"The proposal, if passed," he explained, "will put all state taxation

under voter control and will not allow legislators to exceed a specified level of spending unless they go to the voters.

"I'll tell you right now that the bureaucrats in Lansing aren't going to like this proposal. They don't want the voters to get involved in making decisions."

The president and chief executive of Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. explained that the proposal would not allow legislators to increase spending unless the personal income of Michigan were increased.

"Unless the legislators do something to increase the state income level, they won't get any more money," he said. "They'll learn that they have to encourage new businesses and new money for Michigan. If they realize that, we won't lose another auto plant like we recently lost the Ford transmission plant to Ohio."

"There's nothing wrong with making it healthy in Michigan for business," he said to the group of 25 Republicans.

"When businesses settle in Michigan, that means jobs. And jobs mean more personal income for the state."

THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL amendment contains eight regulations.

The amendment would:

- Limit state tax rate to a specific percentage of Michigan personal income.

- Provide for tax refunds to residents if there is excess of the state limit collected of more than one per cent. Otherwise, the surplus will be transferred to the state budget stabilization fund.

- Provide for an extra tax levy for one year, without voter approval, if state legislators and governor agree there is an emergency.
- Forbid state mandated programs

to local governments without providing funds.

- Provide that state support to local governments will not be reduced below present levels.

- Require voter approval to exceed established tax limit except in emergencies.


- Forbid present shifting of state tax to local property tax without voter approval.

- Require voter approval of all new bond issues.

"The proposed amendment simply requires that we have a progressive, responsive, accountable government," Headlee concluded.

"THIS IS A reasonable proposal that doesn't allow flexibility," said Wayne County Commissioner Mary Dumas. "I'm pleased to see it concerns itself with the state mandate of programs without allowing the dollars needed for those programs."



Rocks couldn't cope with Glenn's percentages

What can a basketball team do when its opponent shoots 60 per cent from the floor and 87 per cent from the foul line?

I don't care how good a squad you have—no team can beat those percentages.

And yet, Plymouth Salem played this kind of shooting team and was not blown out of the court. The Rocks kept fighting to the bitter end.

Westland John Glenn, a squad which lost to Salem just one month earlier on its own court, avenged its setback to the Rocks with a four-point victory, 67-73, in regional semifinal action last Wednesday night.

The loss ended the Rocks' tourney

drive with a 20-3 record, preventing them from playing third-ranked Detroit Mackenzie for the regional championship at Livonia Franklin.

Instead, John Glenn received the pleasure of trying to knock off the regional favorite—the pleasure which Salem hoped for after defeating Southfield for the district title.

"Everyone talked about Mackenzie but we didn't get past Glenn," said Salem coach Fred Thomann after the loss. "I would have liked the opportunity to play Mackenzie, but we played a good basketball."

The most discouraging aspect of Salem's final loss was knowing the Rocks beat this same team handily

during the regular season.

But John Glenn did not shoot with the same accuracy the first time as it did Wednesday night.

So what went wrong with the Rocks?

Well, I don't think it's a matter of looking at what the Rocks did wrong. I think it's a matter of seeing what John

Glenn did right.

True, Salem's stingy pressure, man-to-man defense—the defense which has been the mark of its success this season—was below average.

The Glenn perimeter shooters did not receive the same pressure which Salem put on Plymouth Canton and Southfield in the district contests.

But I didn't expect Glenn to continue to shoot at the same pace it demonstrated in the first half.

The Rockets hit their first eight of 10 shots from the floor and 15 of their first 20 shots. In all, Glenn finished with 27 field goals in 45 shots for the 60 per cent clip and 13 of 15 from the charity line.

Salem held a three-point lead at halftime but an early cold spell in the third quarter, which included four missed shots and five turnovers, was something the Rocks couldn't afford.

Salem lost control of the game midway in the third quarter, and Glenn continued to pop from the outside at a torrid pace.

No team can come back against that kind of shooting.

So, another basketball season ends for the Salem Rocks. And, although it was a sad ending, you can't overlook the 20-3 overall record and a fifth-straight Suburban Eight League title—this season's crown shared with Livonia Bentley.

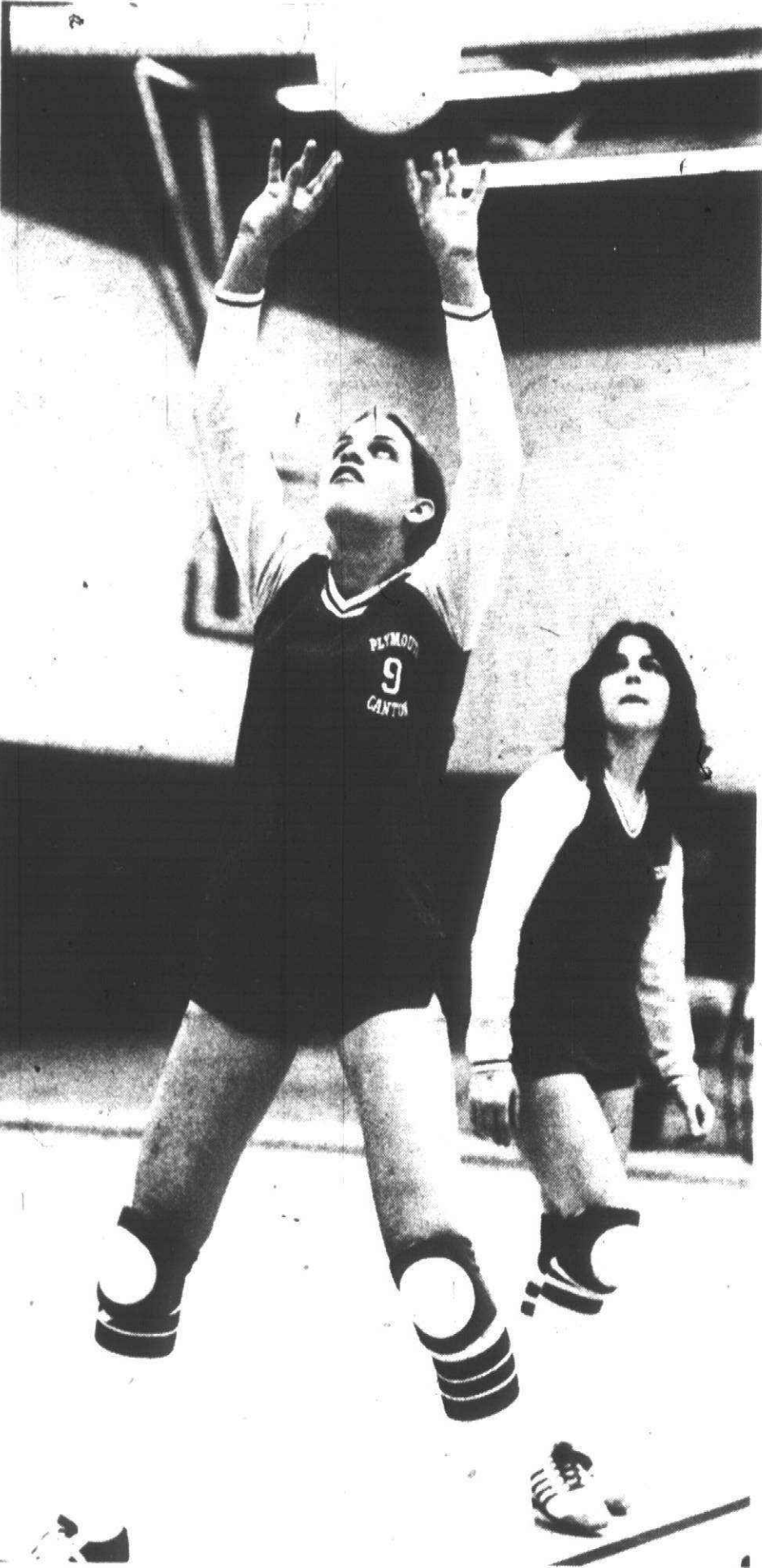

Plymouth's Decoster twins boost Borgess cagers

Dave and Dan Decoster are twins. Dave is 6-7, Dan is 6-5. Both have similar facial expressions, but they really don't look like twins. Both are 17 years old. And both play basketball for Bishop Borgess.

The pair, Plymouth residents, are not just average basketball players. They are closer to excellent ones. Both have started for the Borgess' varsity since their first year out for the team. Each has been chosen to the all-Catholic League squad once and the all-Central Division squad twice.

Under the coaching of Ron Gutkowski, Dave and Dan, have been key to Spartan basketball plans for the past two seasons. Gutkowski said the distinctive styles of the two really add punch to the team.

The Decoster dynasty started when the twins found basketball to be their game back in the fifth grade.

"Basketball was something to do. Our older brothers, Chuck and Mark, taught us and were very influential," Dave said.

"We really got into the game in

sixth grade even though we started playing the year before. Our interest was boosted that year mostly because one of our brothers was playing for the University of Detroit and we'd go down and watch him," Dan added.

That first year didn't prove to be promising as the brothers were cut from the St. Robert Bellarmine Elementary School squad. However, the next year Dave and Dan made the team which went on to win a league championship with a 21-3 overall record.

"After that first year, we weren't sure if we wanted to go out again but we did," said Dan.

At Borgess, the twosome has racked up some impressive statistics in the last year. Dave, a center, is averaging 22 points a game, 13 rebounds, and three to four blocked shots per game. Dan, a guard, is averaging 17 points, 13 rebounds, and five assists per contest.

"Both boys have great abilities—Dave is a fine scorer, rebounder, and defensive player, while Dan has great ball-handling skill, good rebounding and good defensive work," Gutkowski

said. "Their two styles of play complement each other on the court."

Considering the fact that the two have played together for so long, it's no wonder that they know each other's play inside out.

"I know exactly what he (Dave) is going to do, while with the other players I have to react. But I think we pick up the rest of the team's style," Dan said.

"I would say that they are probably the two smartest basketball players to come through the school," said Gutkowski.

In the off season, the two continue to work year round on their skills, going to camps, playing in tournaments and summer leagues. However, they also like to take a break from the world of sports to, as Dave said, "relax for a little while."

Basketball is, as would seem natural, the main topic of conversation at the DB ecoster house.

"We have two younger sisters and they are into basketball also. Our brothers influenced us and we are influencing the girls," Dave said.

But why so much basketball?

"We found out early that basketball would be the only way to go to college and it helps tremendously in that way," said Dave. "Also, of course, we enjoy the game very much."

Both Dave and Dan are B students at Borgess which should help when it comes to getting a basketball scholarship.

The pair have been getting offers from around the country and most of the offers are for both the brothers. "We plan to go together no matter what," said Dave. "But we're waiting until the season ends before we look any closer," said Dan.

Coach Gutkowski has high regard for the Decoster talents and thinks them to be fine college choices.

"Overall, they have three assets that make them good basketball players. They are disciplined in what they do, they are very dedicated to what they do, and they are very unselfish. Put those three things together along with their fine talents and you have two excellent college prospects," said Gutkowski.

Oppressive winter? As cold as last year's record-breaker—with about double the snowfall, school closings and road crew overtime—this winter has been a memorable one.

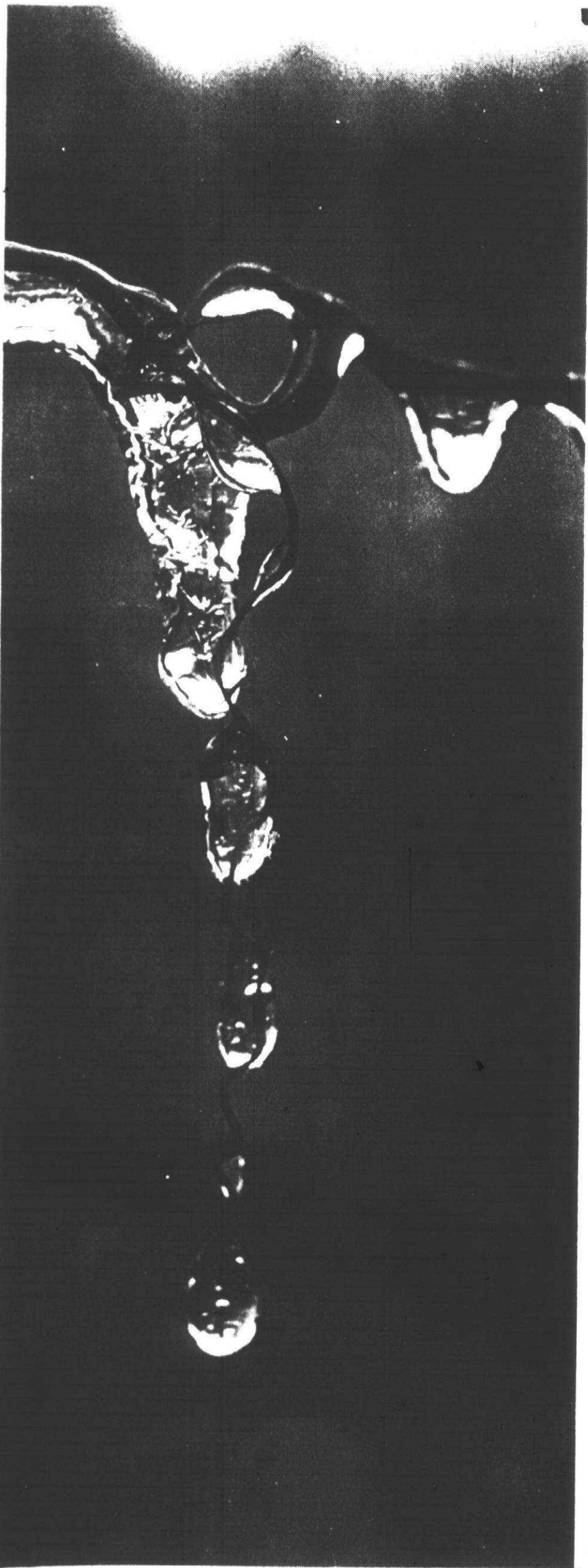

There are about 312 hours left until spring, 2,520 till summer—but who's counting?



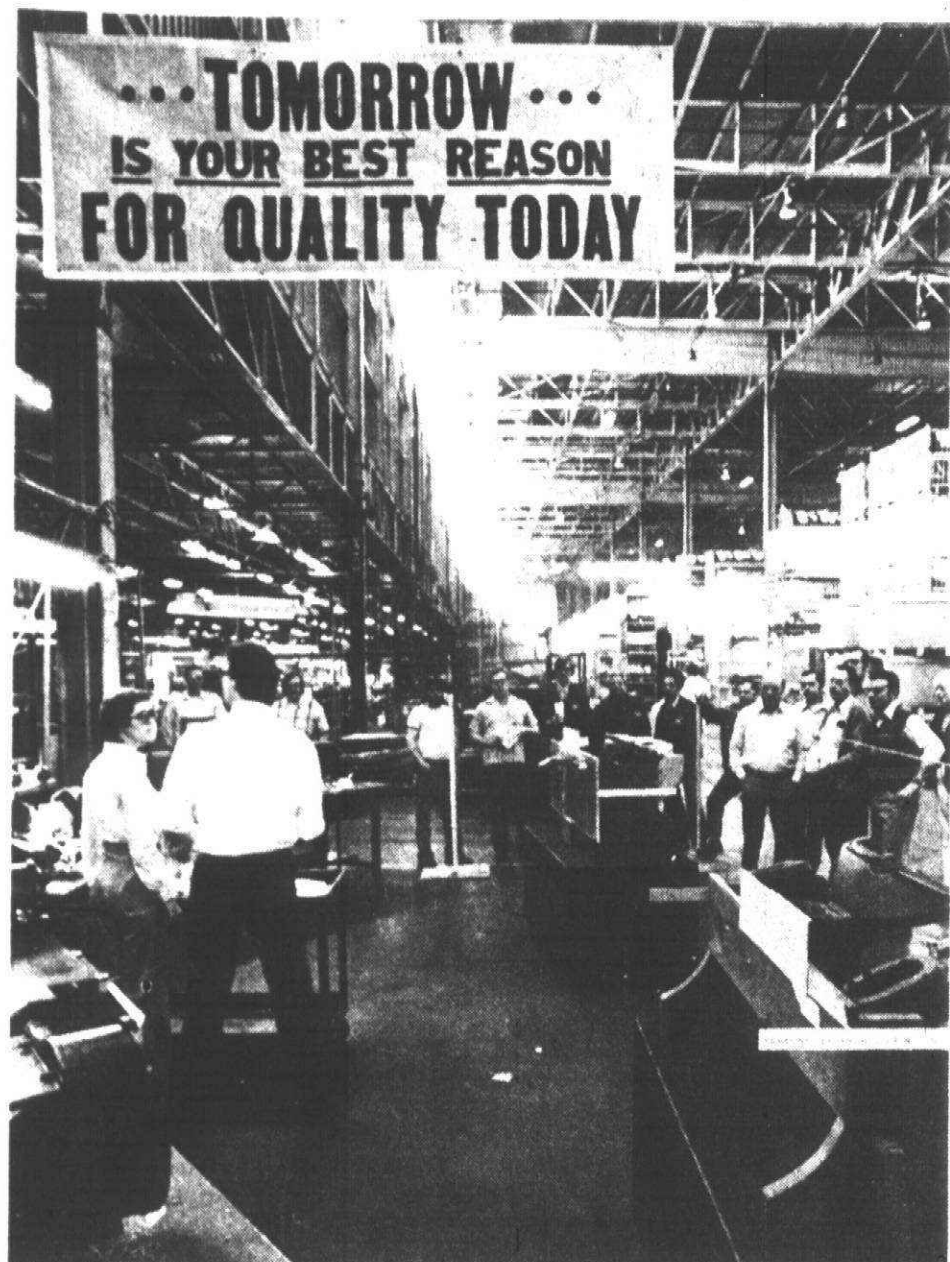
Even in winter, there is movement beneath the ice, a sun to rise and new buds to spawn.

Line workers enlisted to battle foreign competition

The Japanese auto makers are giving their American counterparts a run for their money.

It's a continuing source of concern for car makers, but the Ford Sheldon Road Plant in Plymouth Township is doing something about it.

The engineers and managers at the heating and air conditioning assembly plant are asking the line workers for their ideas on how to improve the product.

"The Japanese are giving us a lesson," commented Gil Forthover, the plant's quality control supervisor. "And that lesson is we have to reach our hourly work force and make them a part of the problem-solving process."

To do that, the company has provided the usual incentives which accompany any employee suggestion promotion, including \$25 savings bonds, pens, windbreakers and a bulletin board for displaying the pictures of weekly winners.

BUT IT HAS gone beyond that in trying to tap the creative potential of the people who put the heaters and air conditioners together.

Tops \$2 million

Kenneth Dividock and Virginia Garrison are two Canton Realtors who topped the \$2 million mark in sales and listings last year.

The two are associated with Century 21-Hartford 429 Inc., located at 44205 Ford Road, Canton.

A recent report had listed Dividock and Ms. Garrison as Realtors in Plymouth, but they are Canton Realtors.

For example, Forthover said, there is a special display area where defective equipment is exhibited. The employees also are told about the warranty problems that the individual dealership's have to repair.

"The hourly worker sees problems daily that cost us customer loyalty over the long term," Forthover continued. "Today's line worker is better educated and has better ideas about his job. We've just come to the conclusion that we can't ignore one of our more valuable resources."

Forthover, along with the rest of management, hopes the intense concentration of effort to solicit employee quality suggestions will open new channels of communications between management and labor.

"We don't want our people to feel they are not appreciated. Who would want to punch in, work for eight hours, and then punch out, day after day?"

"It happens and will probably continue to happen, but every once in a while, someone should get a pat on the back in appreciation for a good job."

The program in operation at the Sheldon Road plant is unique in the Ford empire, Forthover said. However, if it works well there is a possibility of other plants following suit.

"So far it has gone great. We've had more suggestions in the three days this has been going on than we've had for the last three months."

Mary Sykes of Plymouth, a line worker who won a blue Ford windbreaker for her suggestion, agreed with the intent of the program.

"It does give you some motivation," she said. "I had thought of my suggestions a couple months ago. But I didn't turn them in until this week."

Sardinian peasants' harsh life revealed in 'Padre Padrone'

"Padre Padrone" (my father, my master) is a film which soundly destroys bourgeois myths about the romance of peasant life, the attachment to the soil and the beauty of intimacy with nature.

It is a powerful story of the harsh life of the Sardinian peasants, the tyranny of their patriarchal society and the development of one human being who escapes its physical bondage.

Paolo and Vittorio Taviani directed this film (originally made for Italian television, which makes one realize what we're missing on American TV) based on the best-selling autobiography of Gavino Ledda.

Ledda is the battered boy of the movie. Yanked out of school at the age of six, he was put to work in his father's sheepfolds. He lived in the craggy pastureland as shut off from human companionship and communication as any convict in solitary confinement. Beatings from his father and occasional furtive meetings with boy-serfs like himself were his only human contacts.

THE TAVIANI brothers learned their lessons from the gritty realism of an earlier generation of Italian films. They honor their predecessors' commitment to social commentary, but their film technique is more imaginative, and includes fantasy, especially in their use of sound.

One memorable and moving episode occurs in the schoolhouse when young Gavino is pulled out by his father. The camera pans across the faces of the seated boys as we hear their inner thoughts.

Some assure themselves that this will never happen to them; others worry about when it will happen to them; and still others think about how they will kill their fathers rather than let it happen to them.

In another remarkable episode, animal lust swells to a choral crescendo in a strangely humorous sequence that cuts from copulating animals to masturbating boys to stimulated fathers who rush home to bed down their eager wives.

Although Ledda's autobiography presents a searing indictment, one that almost seems to call for a black and white film, flourishes such as the above reveal the directors' interpretations and license. The Tavianis literally take a more colorful view and a more objective one. They see the individual within the context of his society. Thus, even the brutish father is a victim of the harsh economic conditions of the Sardinian shepherd's life.

GAVINO LEDDA himself appears at the beginning of the film, handing a wooden switch to the actor who will play his father. At the end, Ledda appears again and comments on what has happened to him.

Illiterate until the age of 20, he struggled out of his desolate, fear-ridden world, learned to read and write and eventually became a linguist and author. But his "success" story is not that slick. The price he paid for freedom was to high. Ledda talks about that at the end.

"Padre Padrone" is the only film to ever win both major prizes at the Cannes Film Festival, the Grand Prize and the International Critics Prize.

In Italian with English subtitles, it will be premiered by the Detroit Film Theatre at 7 and 9:30 p.m. Friday at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

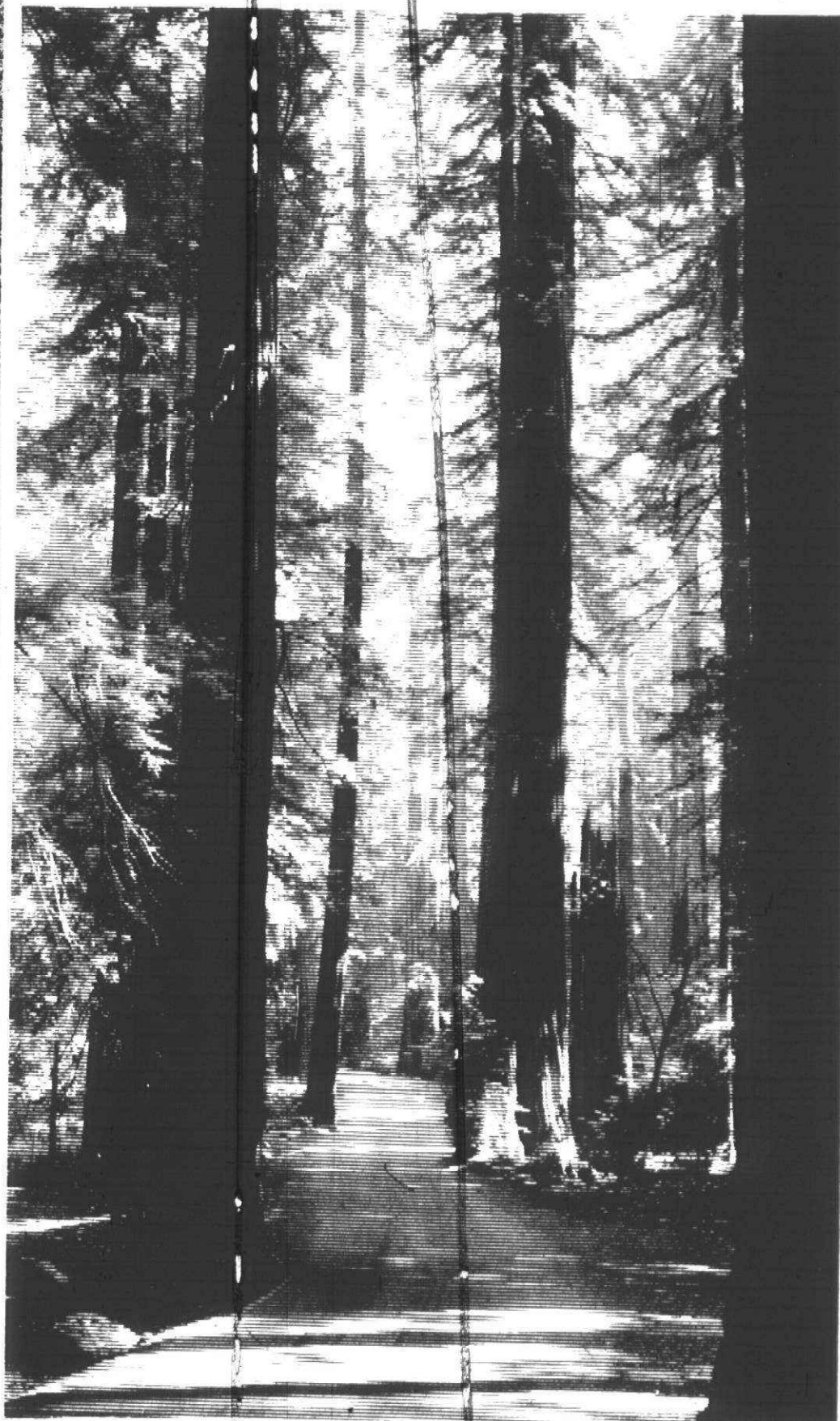

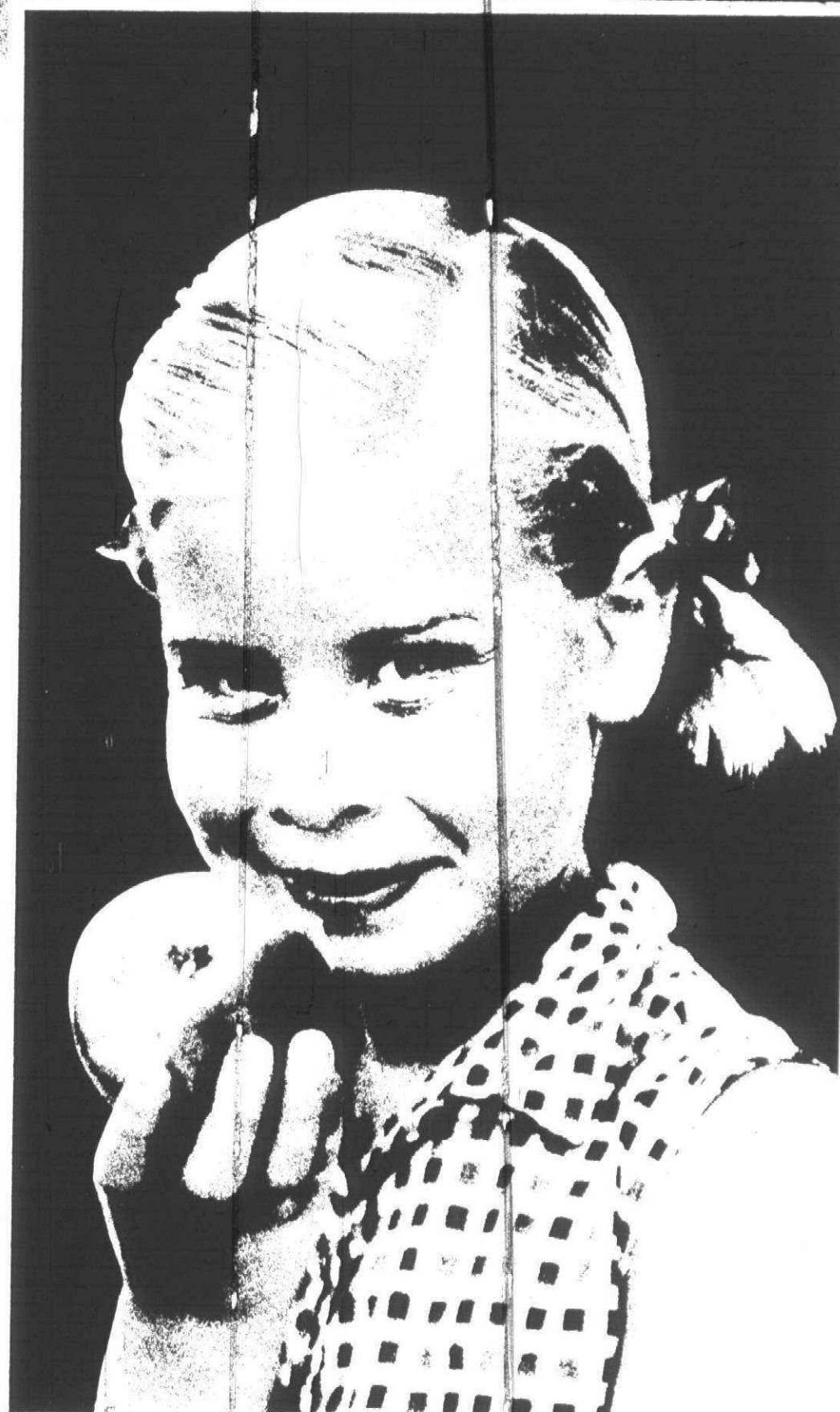

Arts 'fling' for kids gets \$1,500

More than 300 Wayne County elementary and middle-school students will find out first-hand what art is all about later this year.

Joyner rejects junket

Wayne County Commissioner William Joyner has decided he won't go to Washington, D.C. next week for the National Association of Counties (NAC) meeting.

"With the economic condition of the county in the shape it is in, I would be letting the people down if I spent their money traveling to Washington for the four-day meeting," said Joyner, Democrat from the 27th district which includes Plymouth-Canton and part of Westland. Joyner recently was appointed commissioner to replace Royce Smith who was named to an executive position in the county department of public works.

IF THERE IS information and knowledge to be gained, Joyner said, "then I will obtain it from those that do go when they brief me upon their return."

"As it stands now I will not travel out of state at taxpayer expense, as long as the county remains in the financially depressed condition we find it now."

Joyner said although there may be reasons for some of the commissioners to attend the meeting, he felt the time would be best spent working with com-

munities he represents.

"I have the largest district in all of Wayne County and it is important to me to be available when people need me. I cannot justify the expenditure of money at this time—especially when our district is trying to increase the

services being provided by the county."

The 27th District also includes the City of Wayne, part of Northville Township, Van Buren, Belleville and Sumpter.

IT WON'T SEEM right without a women's dress shop on the corner of Main and Pennington. Harvi's has been there since 1966 and we are sorry to see Naomi Frederick and her crew go. Before Harvi's, it was Cassidy's for 22 years.

No one will forget Norma Cassidy's end-of-the season sales. It was almost a social occasion. You met everyone you knew. On the first day of the sale, shoppers were lined up down the street and around the corner, waiting for the grand opening.

The store was closed the day before to prepare for the sale. But everyone had done their scouting earlier. They knew exactly what they wanted days before that marvelous shopping spree with its bargain prices.

Mrs. Cassidy opened her first dress shop in a little store on Pennington. It was 1933. The banks were closing and it was an inauspicious time to start a new business.

Before her marriage, Mrs. Cassidy had taught music and art in a Detroit college. "I had no idea of going into business," she said. Even the rent of \$20 a month was a little terrifying to the novice proprietor.

Five years later, she moved to larger quarters on Pennington. Her new shop, which rented for \$50 a month, was where the Statice Shop is now.

It was the second store in town to have fluorescent lighting and installation was completed at 3 a.m., six hours before the grand opening at 9 a.m.

Cassidy's was moved to the building on the corner six years later. In 1944, this was a comparative high rent district. Max Moon was so concerned about Mrs. Cassidy's reaction when he informed her of the rental fee, he seated her safely at her desk. Then he announced the rent was \$100 a month. During the next 22 years, it increased—but so did business. Women from the area continued to flock to Cassidy's for their dresses, hats, purses and jewelry.

Mrs. Cassidy once said that no matter how bad the times, she always had an ad in the Plymouth newspaper and her business survived, then flourished.

When she closed her shop in 1966, there was the reassurance another shop would open in its place. Jim Houk, owner of the building, says he can take time to be selective in finding a new tenant. "I don't want anything in there that will be detrimental to the downtown area."

His topic was American Indians, their history, their plight, and bills in Congress affecting their rights. College tuition cost is less, but...

It costs \$18,250 a year to maintain a resident at the controversial Plymouth Center for Human Development.

The center, which is now under attack for alleged abuse of its residents, offers room, board, medical services, some training, and special equipment such as wheelchairs and crutches. Certain residents who are unable to leave the building also are given schooling at the center.

The cost of educating a freshman or sophomore at the University of Michigan is almost \$7,000 a year, including room, board and tuition.

However, financial experts at both institutions cautioned about trying to compare the two costs. A.L. Fincher, assistant vice-president for state rela-

tions at U-M, questioned whether it is possible to make a valid comparison in costs.

"It's like comparing apples and oranges," he said. He added that the ratio of attendants to patients would be higher at a mental hospital than the ratio of teachers to students at a college.

Don Sanders, reimbursement officer at the Plymouth center, pointed out that medical facilities charge more than universities. But he also called attention to the fact that the Plymouth center daily rate of \$50 a day is much lower than that of Lafayette Clinic in Detroit, which charges more than \$100 a day.

AT BOTH U-M and the Plymouth center, the state pays only a portion of the full costs. University room and

board costs are paid by the student or his parents. They also pay tuition. The state then provides the remaining costs for maintaining the university.

At the center, the state comes up with about 55-60 per cent of the total cost of running the facility. The bulk of the remaining funds come from the federal government in Medicaid payments or through Social Security payments to residents, most of which are then passed on to the institution.

The residents also contribute if they have any insurance, veteran's benefits, or trust funds.

Parents also are expected to pay for their children who live at the center until they reach the age of 18. If they have more than one child in the facility they would only pay for a total of 18 years.

The amount parents pay is based on a scale set up by the state, reported Sanders. "But if parents feel the amount charged doesn't fit their financial situation, they can request what we call a full determination of their ability to pay," he said.

"In confidence they list for us all their assets and liabilities. If these figures indicate they cannot afford what the state determined, they will pay less."

If the parents are not satisfied with the decision made after the introduction of this evidence, they can

appeal within 30 days to a hearing officer of the Department of Mental Health.

"We have been reversed occasionally," noted Sanders.

He added the most a parent would be assessed is \$2,400 a year, and that very few pay that much. Parents with a net income of \$26,500 or more must

pay that amount according to the scale set up by the state. If their income is \$20,000 to \$20,999, they would be assessed \$1,620. If it were \$10,000 to \$10,499, they would have to pay \$420 a year.

If their net income is less than \$6,999, they are not liable for any costs.

For seven years Ms. Graham hosted a five-day-a-week nationally syndicated TV show called Girl Talk.

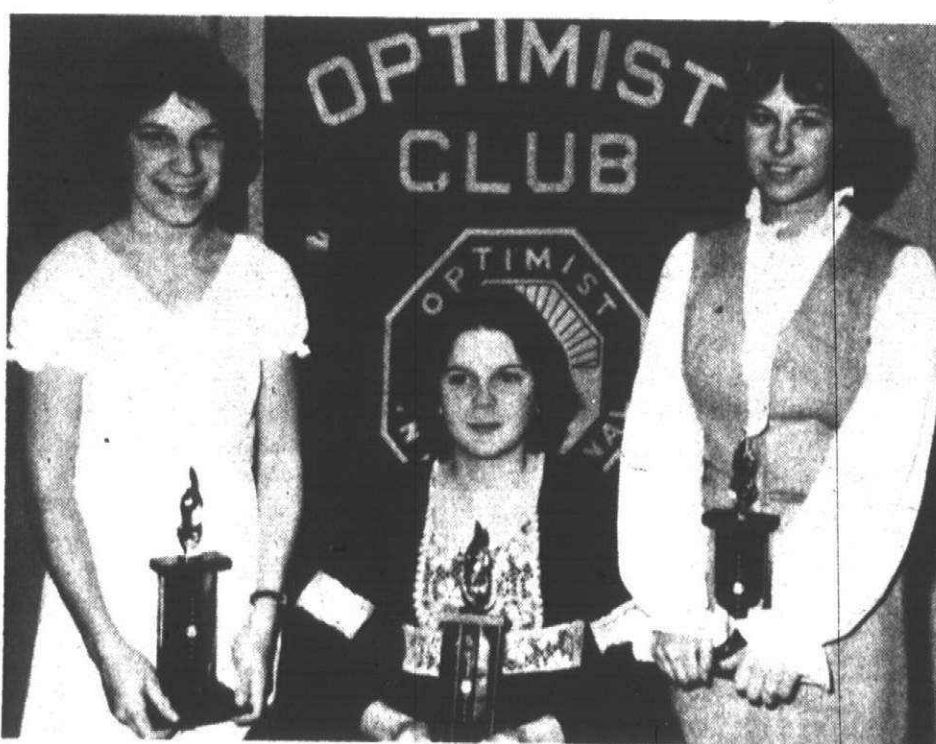
She has also appeared on talk shows hosted by Merv Griffin, David Frost, Mike Douglas and Dick Cavett.

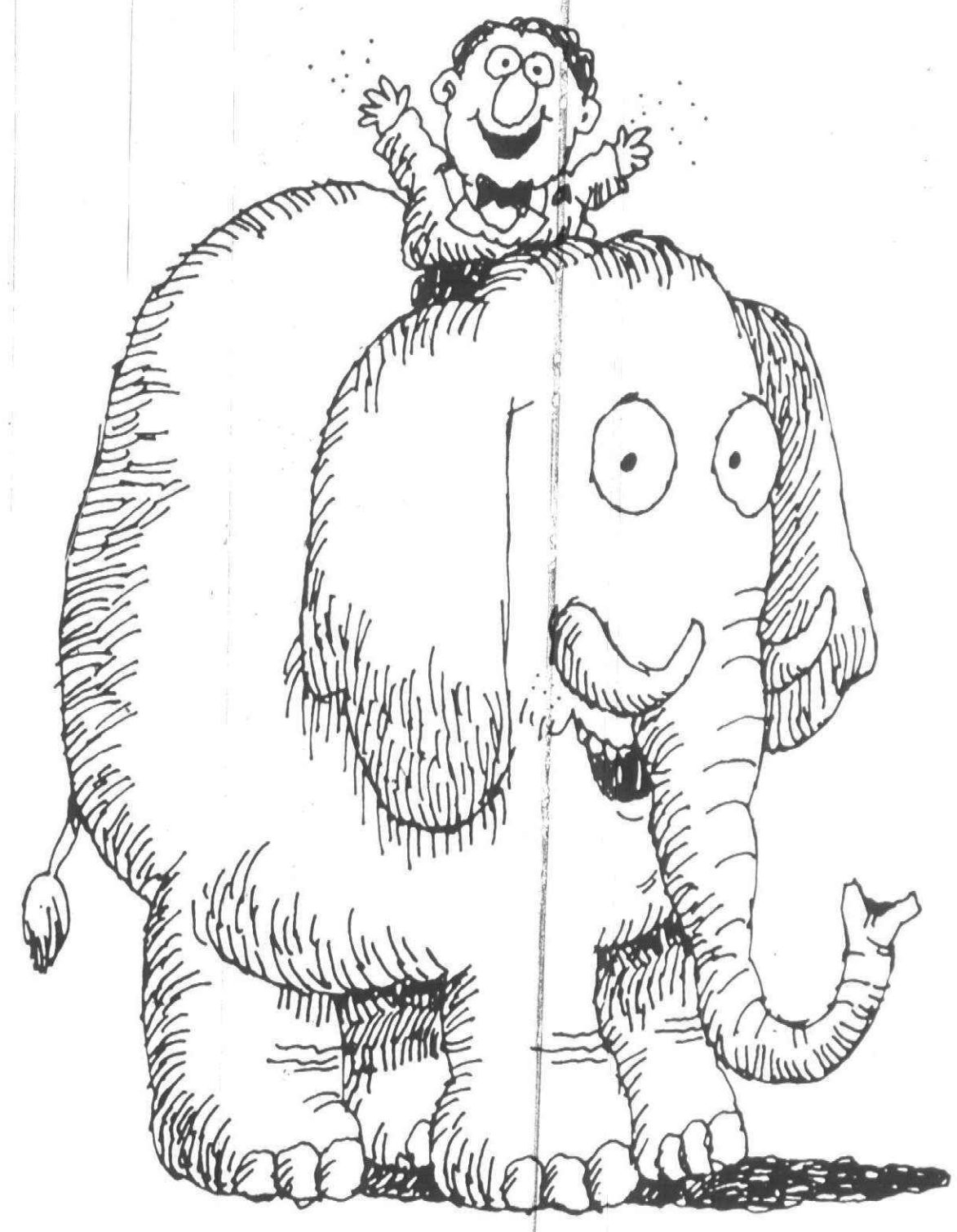

Ready for the electricies?

Electric cars are being hailed as having a place in the future of transportation. But how soon we will be driving them depends upon a breakthrough in battery development.

General Motors executives believe the breakthrough is imminent and that battery-powered cars will be on the market in less than 10 years.

According to GM, significant progress is being made toward the elimination of such current problems as limited performance, weight, frequency of recharges and the high cost of the lead-acid, maintenance-free traction batteries now considered the best at hand.

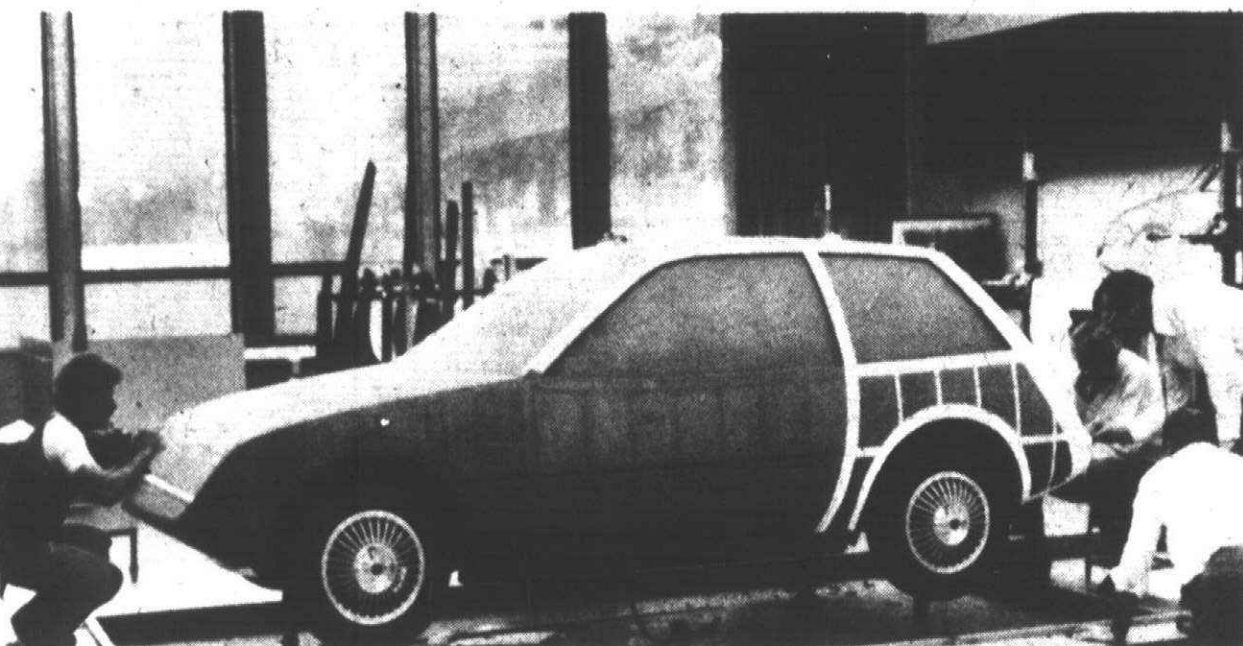
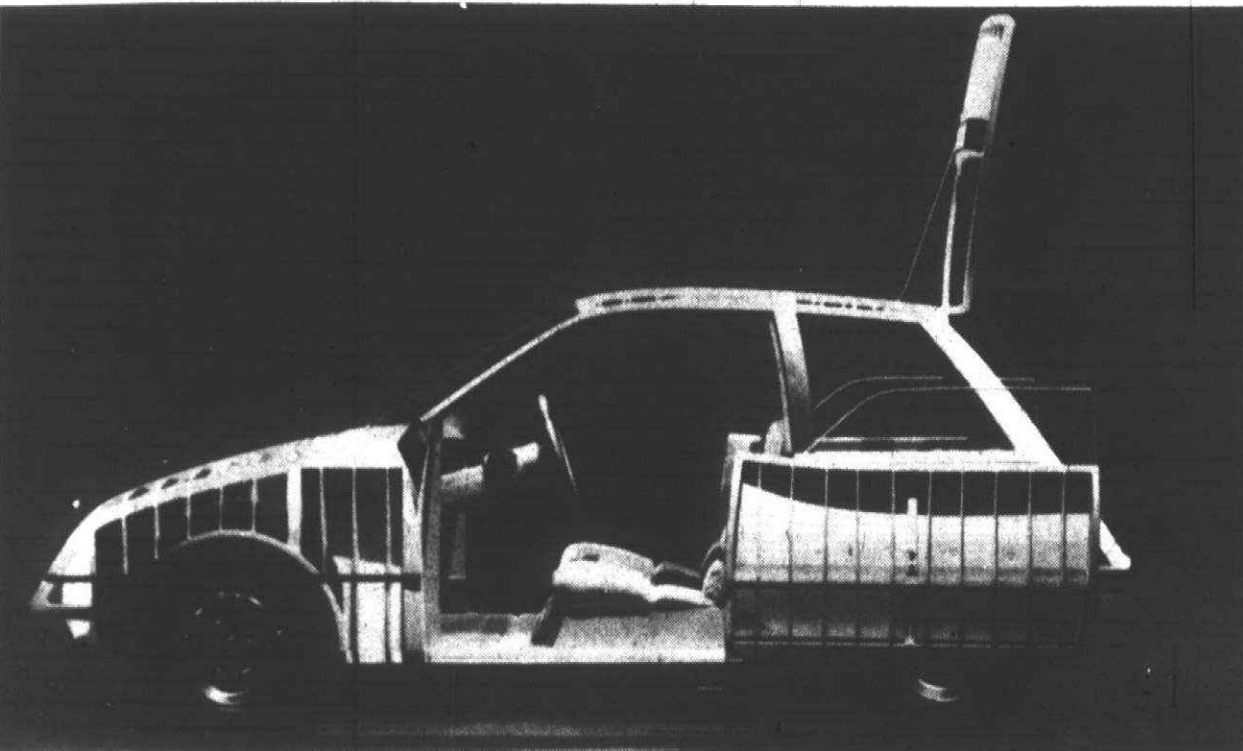
Zinc-nickel oxide batteries are just around the corner. GM has set up a pilot line to continue its development and testing while experimenting with

production facilities.

Lithium-sulfide batteries which are considerably smaller and lighter but more powerful than conventional batteries aren't expected to be mass produced for 10-15 years.

GM's current battery-powered vehicle, designated the XP512E-XP for experimental, E for electric—carries 12 lead-acid batteries. It carries two passengers and has space behind the single seat for small packages such as groceries.

The XP512E has a range of about 50 miles between recharges at 30 mph. It has reached a top speed of more than 40 mph under controlled conditions on a test track and can accelerate from a stop to 30 mph in 12 seconds. It is purely experimental; no price has been set.



Two concepts in electric car configuration, a styling seatback (upper) and a clay model are being studied by GM engineers. The seatback permits examination and experimentation with such items as interior dimensions

and suspension systems. The clay model is a further step along the design path as technicians move closer to what could be the shape of an electric car of the future.
