Millage query goes to board

A proposal to increase Canton's tax rate four mills (\$4 per \$1,000 assessed valuation) to finance the purchase of farmers' development rights will be considered by the Canton board Tuesday night for a slot on the November ballot.

The proposal asks voters to approve the four-mill levy for a 20-year period.

The lengthy ballot question was worded by township attorney Bert Burgoyne and presented to board members last week by Robert Padgett, chairman of the farmland preservation education committee.

The board has until Sept. 21 to ask the Wayne County clerk's office to place the proposal on the fall ballot.

IF THE PROPOSAL is presented to voters and approved, the owner of a \$60,000 home assessed at \$30,000 will pay \$120 more in taxes a year.

The money will be used to buy development rights from the owners of 5,100 acres of agricultural land in the township's western portion.

Once a farmer sells his development rights, the land can never be used for anything except open space and agricultural-related purposes.

The one-and-a-half page ballot proposal submitted by Burgoyne states that "voter approval may be sought

for the issuance of general obligation bonds" to finance the development rights purchase at a later date.

According to Burgoyne, state law does not permit townships to sell bonds for preserving farmland.

If the development rights issue is approved in November, Burgoyne says he will draft legislation that would permit Canton to sell the bonds. In the meantime, Burgoyne says that Canton will be forced to buy development rights on a piecemeal basis with the money raised by four mills.

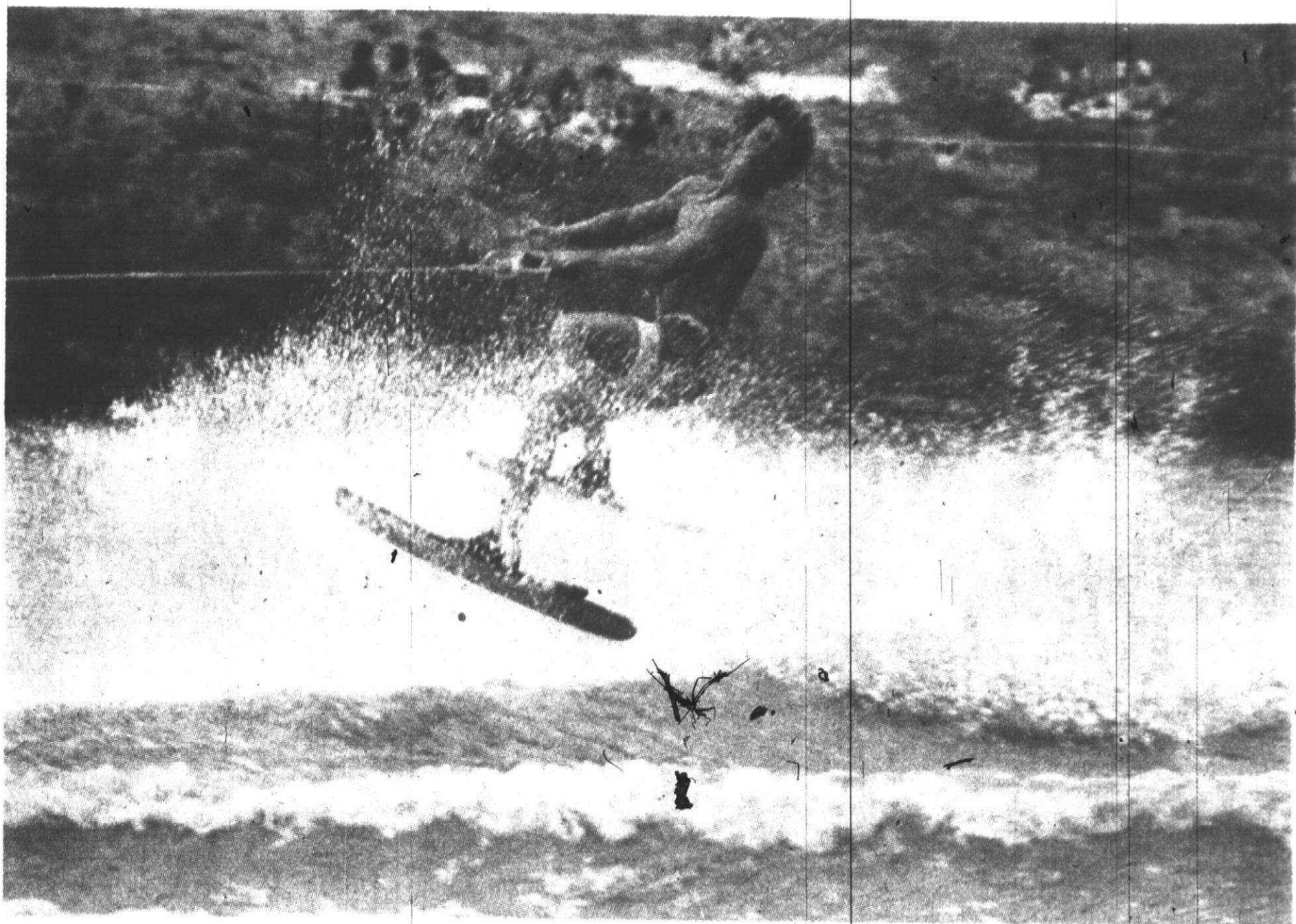
No local government in the state has ever purchased farmers' development rights.

"We're dealing in an area that's on the frontier of the law right now," said Burgoyne. The township attorney recently wrote an opinion stating that charter townships can legally purchase farmers' development rights.

"But it would be nice to have a piece of legislation that makes it crystal clear," he said. "I want to draft legislation to clear up the loose ends and enable the sale of bonds."

Burgoyne included a preface to the ballot proposal's request for four mills to explain the development rights program.

"Who in the hell knows what the acquisition of development rights means?" he said.

Tricky treat

Basement traps boy as bus goes on

School officials are calling it a mistake. An angry parent is calling it neglect.

The boy who spent 20-30 minutes trapped in the basement of a house under construction probably doesn't know what to call it.

"There's just no excuse in the world for this kind of a thing happening,"

said Sunflower subdivision resident Jerry Gibbons, the man who pulled the boy out of the basement. "That kid could have been seriously hurt down there."

According to Gibbons, the incident began at about 8 a.m. Wednesday when a group of elementary school children were waiting for their bus at

the corner of Chichester and Maidstone.

Some of the youngsters went across the street to play around the foundation of new home. One of them, "either jumped or fell into the basement and couldn't get back out."

When the bus arrived, Gibbons said, the other kids told the driver that a boy was in the basement. She drove off to school.

"Luckily, he wasn't hurt," Gibbons said. "But he sure was scared. He could have been in there all day if my wife hadn't heard him crying."

Gibbons charged that the bus driver was negligent because she didn't use her radio to call into the central office for help.

ROBERT HOUGHTON, director of bus transportation for the school district, said the driver didn't call in on

her radio because she didn't understand the seriousness of the situation.

"She wasn't told he was trapped in the basement," Houghton said. "She just assumed he was in the basement and not going to come out."

"We run into this kind of thing all the time. Kids just decide they are not going to get on the bus. We can't chase them down."

He did acknowledge, however, "that there was a lesson to be learned, and that is get on the horn and call in whenever there is a problem."

"The thing that perturbs me," he said, "is where are the parents? They know they have little kids out there. They should be watched."

"These kids weren't even at the bus stop. They were across the street playing. They shouldn't have even been there."

Local boy wins national award

Fast as a speeding rollerskate

Eight-year-old Scott Hall of Canton is a speed demon.

He has already sped his way into second place in the United States Amateur Roller Skating Championship's primary boys' division at the competition held in Lincoln, Nebraska last month.

Now he's thinking of moving into something a little speedier—motocross racing perhaps?

If his mother, Pam Hall, has anything to say about it, he'll stick to the skates for a while.

Scott has only been skating for a year, but it's a sport that seems to run in the family. His mother was also a skater, although her forte was artistic skating.

The wiry blond boy is a member of the Riverside Speed Skating Club of Livonia. "He first got involved in the club through Dan Haynes, a friend of ours," Ms. Hall says.

Although Scott likes winning the awards, he finds that becoming a champion involves a lot of hard, grueling practice.

He's spent many an hour whipping around the floor at Riverside Rink. He and his mother have spent many a night away from home as he's worked his way up to the national competition.

First there was the state competition, in which he took a first in his division. Then came the Great Lakes Regional, in which he took a second and qualified for the national.

THE NEXT stop was Lincoln.

Scott had to compete against 15 other boys between the ages of six and eight. The Nebraska arena was filled to capacity with skaters and their families from all over the country.

It was a tense situation, but it didn't seem to bother Scott. "Naw, I wasn't scared," he says.

His skates were rigged with special plastic wheels like the ones used on skateboards to give him more traction.

One opponent literally fell by the wayside when he slipped in the rink and broke his arm.

But Scott made it through, with no bruises and a second place plaque to boot.

Scott takes his success in stride. Like most third graders, he says he "hates school," but grudgingly admits that attending Starkweather school really isn't that bad.

He likes to shoot (at cans, please) and he likes to ride his small motorcycle.

He makes engine noises as he contemplates the motocross bike he'd like to have, but his mother looks dubious about the entire thing.

Skating can be rough and tumble, but it's safer than motocross. Scott says the skaters may be required to wear helmets and protective padding in future competitions, which he's all for. He remembers, with a grimace, a few spills of his own.

Is it worth it? Ms. Hall says "It's good for Scott."

But expenses are high and rewards few for amateur roller skaters.

Scott is on his second pair of roller skates, which cost about \$250 a shot. Ms. Hall is responsible for the cost of travel to various competitions.

Amateur skaters do not get cash prizes to help offset the costs.

Although he'd like to take a break, keep a lookout for a blur of motion wearing the number 4972.

It's Scott Hall's competition number. But look quickly. He's getting faster all the time.

Committee is defended

Editor:

As chairperson of the Farmland Preservation Education Committee, I feel that I must respond to Suzanne M. Barrie's letter which appeared in your Aug. 31 edition. Ms. Barrie states the committee is a biased, anti-retention group not capable of presenting an impartial educational program. This is the third occasion I have defended the committee's position and make-up. Oddly enough, the other two occasions involved accusations of being pro-retention and incapable of being impartial because of pro-biases.

The committee is not made up of only people directly involved or living on the land proposed for farmland preservation. Two live within the proposed district, one of which is located on a parcel too small to be included (2 acres). One is located in what would become part of the buffer or fringe lands and another lives in a commercial and residential area. One member is a subdivision dweller far removed from the proposed district.

Two additional quasi-members are representatives of the news media and serve as "watch dogs" to insure full presentation of both proponent and opposition views.

If Ms. Barrie would review her tapes more carefully, and take the time to call and discuss the issue with the various committee members, she would also find that two of the members are very strong advocates of the preservation position. Two others are just as strongly opposed. The fifth member, myself, may well be the skeptic to which Ms. Barrie made reference. Since he letter lacks specificity, I am not sure. However, it is obvious Ms. Barrie interprets a willingness to listen to both sides, and the ability to empathize with opposing views as being skeptical. I personally have not taken a position and refuse to do so.

Also, there is no need to disband the committee in November because the committee exists only to educate the public regarding the November ballot question. The committee will automatically be discontinued at the conclusion of its charge.

If Ms. Barrie wishes to form a group to campaign for the issue, or if someone wishes to form an opposition group, our materials, which are for public distribution, would be made readily available to them. They would be welcome to extract the information which supports their views and use it to aid in their campaign efforts.

We sincerely hope Ms. Barrie and others will become actively involved in pursuing what they believe to be the best answer for Canton Township.

Recreation director is costly for Canton

A recreation superintendent hired by the Canton board last week will be among six township employees who earn higher salaries than the elected supervisor and clerk when he starts his new job later this month.

Mike Gouin, 31, of Wayne, was hired to head the township's expanding recreation department at an annual starting salary of \$21,110 a year.

Starting salary for the superintendent job was advertised at \$14,000 to \$18,000 a year.

Township Supervisor Harold Stein and the recreation advisory committee recommended an increase in the superintendent's salary, however, so Gouin would accept the job.

Gouin currently works as recreation coordinator in the City of Wayne where he makes \$22,000 a year.

Stein and Frank McMurray of the recreation commission called Gouin the "outstanding superintendent" candidate. The director of the Michigan Parks and Recreation Association—one of Gouin's references on his employment application—called the Wayne resident "the most outstanding young person in recreation in Michigan."

EVERY MEMBER of the township board except Treasurer Anne Bradley favored upping the recreation superintendent's salary so Gouin would accept the job.

"You pay for what you get," said Trustee Brian Schwall. "We have the option of hiring someone else for a smaller salary. But Gouin seems to be the best candidate by far."

Gouin's \$21,110 salary tops the supervisor's by \$110. The city clerk's salary is \$19,700.

Only the police chief and fire chief, at \$22,470, make more than the recreation head. The finance director and chief building inspector make the same \$21,110 salary as Gouin, and the DPW superintendent makes \$21,097 plus overtime.

Gouin was Wayne's recreation coordinator since 1969. From 1966 to 1969, he was a physical education teacher in Taylor.

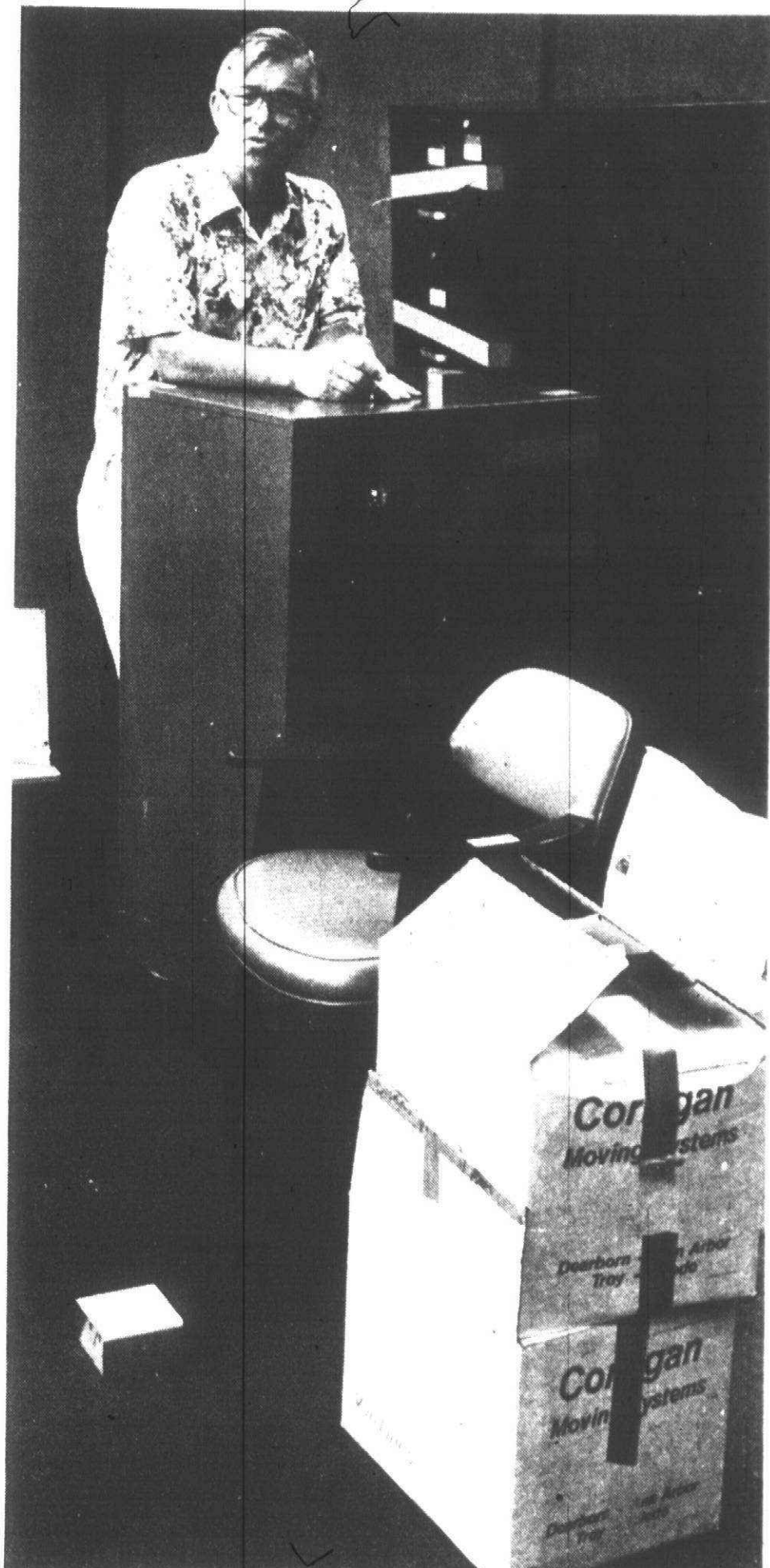

A DAR gift

Like many of the senior citizens in the Plymouth community who have left their homes on the outskirts to move closer to town the old gray stone that has stood at the intersection of Main and Mill streets is being given a new home closer to the scene of action.

The old stone, that has stood at the Mill street intersection since April 29, 1941 as a gift from the Sarah Ann Cochrane Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, is being moved to a bit of ground close to the old city hall bell that has been standing on the lawn of the Plymouth Historical Museum since the building was opened several years ago.

There is a bit of interesting history involved in the old stone. It was presented as a marker for the start of the old plank Road and was listed as Toll Gate No. 4.

Now, after all of these years, the Wayne County Road Commission has decided to widen the intersection. This means that the stone is forced to find another "home"—this time one that really should be permanent.

Each day thousands of persons pass the old stone. Few of them know its background. Fewer still take time to read the fine inscription telling what it is and why it is there.

When the road commission decided on the improvement of the intersection the question arose as to what to do with the stone.

Many old timers—especially those who like to dote on history—figured the old stone might be destroyed or lost.

IN TO THIS breach stepped Harold Guenther, one of the city's busiest businessmen, to save the day and find a home for the stone.

For years Guenther has urged the establishment of a cemetery for old stones and old monuments. It is his belief that these symbols of the past should be preserved and made part of Plymouth's rich history.

Taking the initiative he approached the Plymouth Historical Society and asked for permission to have the told stone placed on on the lawn as a symbol of history. His request was denied. That didn't stop him. Instead it caused

him to try all the harder to find a new home for the stone.

He finally succeeded when the City Commission, with the approval of the members of the Sarah Ann Cochrane Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, granted him the right to have the stone placed on a small strip of city property on the curree of the road across from city hall.

Before it is placed in its new home the old stone will be taken to the Mike

Allen monument works on Northville Road and given a good cleaning. It also will be given a new bronze plate to place along the original to tell of its moving. This will be done with appropriate ceremonies in the near future.

When it finally is settled in its new home the old stone that has been almost totally ignored for more than three decades will have some outstanding neighbors—right in the center of the city.

Only a few feet away will be the old city hall bell that is throwback to the days of the old plank road. Then on the other side of city hall is the famous "bit of rock" that was taken from the dock in Plymouth, England, from where the Mayflower sailed and presented to the city during the centennial in 1967. All of these things help to make Plymouth an interesting city and the old stone will be a welcome addition.

Congressional hopeful files suit to gain spot

Earl Greene, Ann Arbor City Councilman, has initiated a civil suit to get a spot as the Democratic nominee for the 2d Congressional district election Nov. 7.

A spokeswoman for Greene, who is also a Willow Run High School music teacher, said that for the candidate are asking the Michigan Court of Appeals to direct the state Board of Canvassers to certify Greene's write-in votes cast in the Aug. 8 primary and allow his name to be printed on the fall ballot.

If he is successful, Greene will oppose Rep. Carl Pursell, a Plymouth Republican who won his first two-year

term in late 1976 by only 350 votes over Democrat Dr. Edward Pierce, also of Ann Arbor.

Representing Greene are attorneys Tim Downs, who also represented Pierce in 1976 during the recount campaign, and Gene Farber, both of Detroit.

Jan Cooke, Greene's press secretary, said that the candidate's attorneys are asking for a pre-emptory order to the state canvassing board to avoid a lengthy delay in a decision.

She said Greene is basing his case on two 1909 laws. One says whoever receives the most

votes in an election is the nominee in a primary.

The other has to do with the process of certifying write-in votes. That law states that a write-in candidate must get at least 15 per cent of the highest vote for a candidate in the same party during a primary to gain a spot on the fall ballot.

Greene is contending that the law applies only to state offices and not to congressional or federal offices.

Greene also cited the recent opinion from Michigan Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley who said that a write-in candidate need only receive a majority of write-in votes to get on the general election ballot.

Since the Democrat had an organized campaign in the primary to have supporters cast write-in votes for him, he would have easily been nominated under Kelley's opinion.

Ms. Cooke said attorney Downs commented that he is "surprised that the lawsuit had to be brought and that "I am fully confident that the court will act promptly and that the voters in the 2d District will not be disenfranchised."

She spokes also said that the candidate is still continuing his campaign which included a stop last week at the Livonia Democratic Club meeting.

Rocks pound Pats in opener, 28-19

Plymouth Salem's complete domination of the middle rounds carried the Rocks to a 28-19 home field, non-league football victory over Livonia Franklin Friday night in the '78 opener for both schools.

All-state quarterback Rich Hewlett's mastery of the option out of the wishbone, his sense of last instant timing on pitchouts, and impressive over-all team execution gave Salem's ground game momentum which Franklin's Patriots contained all too rarely.

It was a dog-eat-dog battle, knotted at 17, only into the early stages of the second quarter. During the span extending from that point until four minutes were gone in the final period, Franklin made only two first downs and never crossed the 50-yard stripe.

Meanwhile, the Rocks were scoring three more times to mount a 28-7 lead. Two Franklin tallies in the waning minutes only made the game look closer than it was.

FRANKLIN'S DEFENDING Northwest Suburban League co-champs now await their home opener, another non-league match, Saturday afternoon with Livonia Stevenson as the foe. Saturday night, Salem will be host to Dearborn High as the Rocks begin defense of their Suburban Eight crown.

The fact that Dearborn will be invading Plymouth as scheduled represented victory of another kind

Friday when Dearborn voters approved a millage issue which will permit restoration of the prep athletic program.

Dearborn High and Dearborn Edsel Ford also are in the Sub 8, as are Livonia Bentley and Redford Union, and athletic directors at all these schools breathed more easily after the votes were counted. No longer do they have to consider substitute games.

Franklin coach Armand Vigna conceded that "Salem was the better team tonight" after the Patriot loss at Plymouth, calling Hewlett "just super."

"We'll have to claw and scratch to win; we just don't have enough good kids," said Vigna. "Stevenson (a 34-8 winner over RU Friday) looks just as tough as Plymouth, maybe even bigger and stronger. It's not going to be easy."

COACH TOM MOSHIMER of Salem, for whom this was the 10th regular season win in a row, had praise for all his squad, singling Hewlett out as "the best back in the state of Michigan."

Hewlett himself, a 6-1, 195-pound senior who has college coaches drooling, said, "Franklin never stopped coming at me. Our line did a great job in holding them off, but I had to pitch more than I expected. And my passing wasn't very good (he completed only two for 26 yards)."

"Our passing game needs work," agreed Moshimer, "and so does our pass defense. We've a long way to go, but it was a damned good opener for a club that has only two offensive and defensive starters returning from last year."

Scatback Craig Stack, a 5-9 scooter who is only a junior, also got a big pat on the back from Moshimer for the speed and quickness he showed in running the flanks on pitches from Hewlett. Stack scored Plymouth's first two touchdowns on dashes of 17 and 12 yards, and was a general pest to Franklin all night.

On the ground, Salem powered its way to 290 yards and the 26 in the air gave the Rocks a game total of 316. Franklin was 304 with 130 yards via the air and 174 overland.

SALEM TOOK AN early 7-0 lead on a five-play, 69-yard drive, highlighted by Hewlett's 23 yards on a keeper the first time he carried and then a 26-yard sprint by Stack prior to his score. The conversion by Rich Hanschu was his first of four without a miss.

It didn't take Franklin long to accept the challenge. Don Boka piloted the Patriots 56 yards in four plays. Jerry Cifor, most impressive of Franklin's runners despite playing with a broken hand, got 12 and a Boka to Tim Przysiecki pass later was good for 47 yards to the Salem 12. The score came on an eight-yard trap play by Cifor, Boka converting.

Canton blanks Bentley to end losing streak

Plymouth Canton's long-awaited yearning for that sweet smell of victory finally came to an end Friday night when the Chiefs shut out an injury-riddled Livonia Bentley squad, 12-0, in muggy weather at the Bulldog gridiron.

The Canton victory marked the first time the Chiefs have won an opening-season game in the school's six-year history. It also marked the first time Canton has won a football game since it beat Garden City East on the second-to-last week of the 1976 season.

For Bentley, it was a sad ending to a disastrous week which saw nine regular players, including starting quarterback Dan Crowder and star halfback Matt Munn, sidelined because of injuries.

But this still couldn't take away from the Chief celebration which resulted from two touchdowns in the first half.

"We're small but we're mighty," said a smiling Canton coach Dave

Schuele, who won only his second game since becoming the Chiefs' head coach two years ago. "If we keep stepping on people's toes the way we did tonight and keep a good attitude, we'll have a great season."

Canton scored its first touchdown in the waning moments of the first quarter when quarterback Scott Dawson snuck over the goal line from two yards out.

Rusty Mandle, the game's leading rusher with 103 yards in 20 carries, reached paydirt from three yards out in the second stanza to cap the scoring. Both Chief extra-point attempts failed.

"We gave them (Canton) a battle," said second-year Bentley coach Pat O'Donnell. "I don't like losing a game but I was very pleased with the way the kids hit them in the second half and kept the ball away from them."

Canton continued to move the ball in the second half but two fumbles stymied one Canton scoring drive and also set up a possible Bentley score.

"We fumbled too much," Schuele said. "We should have scored another one (touchdown) but we fumbled it away."

"We had a chance to score in the second half but we broke down on our pass blocking," O'Donnell said. "But I was pleased with the kids considering we literally put together our offense and defense this week."

Many of the Bentley scoring opportunities were stifled by the alert defensive play of sophomore tackle Craig Gearn and senior tackle Alan Olszewski of Canton, who put a lot of pressure on Bentley's reserve quarterback Dave Cabrera all night.

CANTON'S FIRST score was a 13-

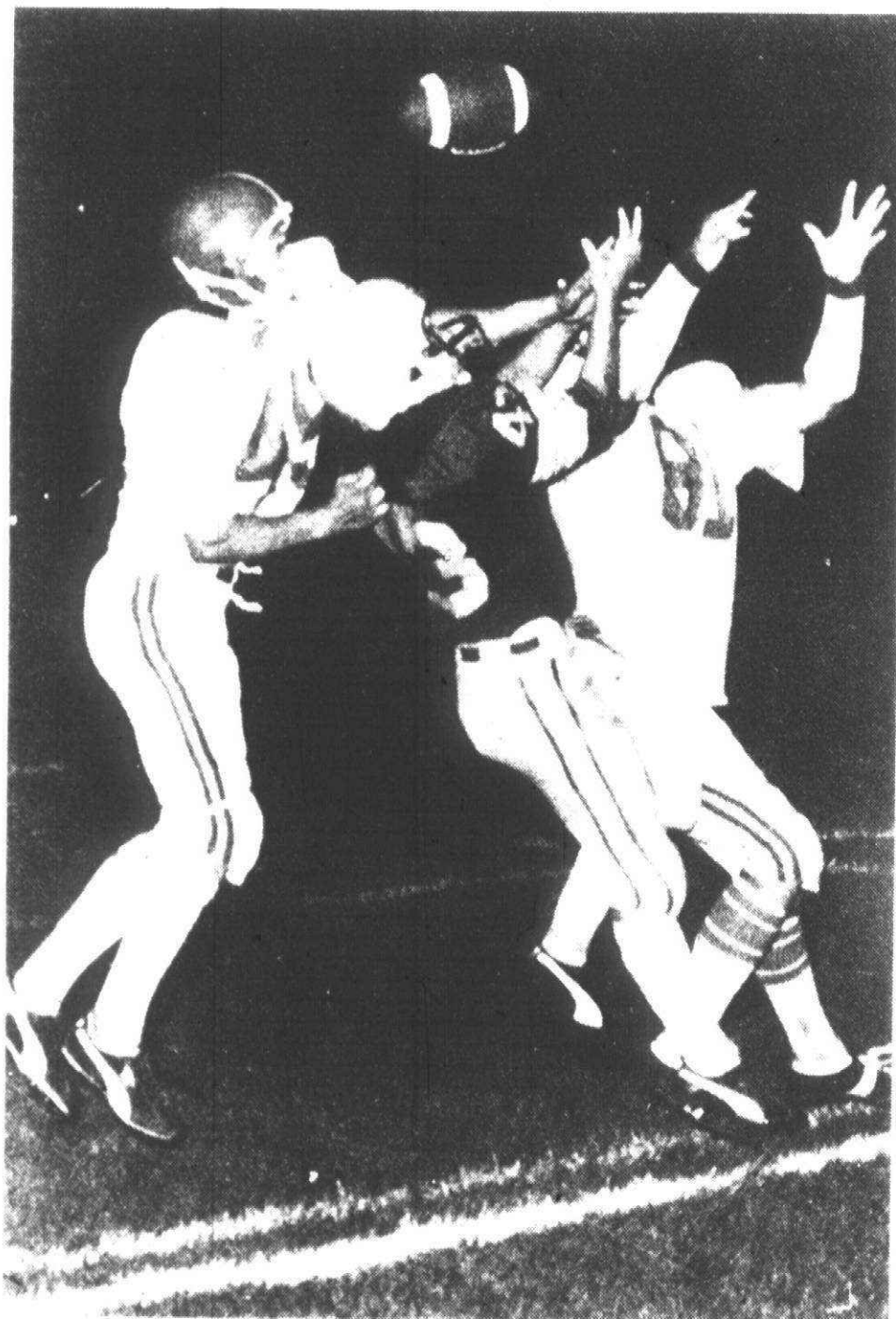
play, 75-yard drive as Dawson scored with only two seconds left in the first quarter. Canton held the ball for over six minutes on the drive.

Mandle danced to the endzone for the second and final score, capping an 11-play, 63-yard drive at with 5:24 left in the first half.

Dawson completed seven of eight passes for 91 yards. Canton totaled 55 plays on offense, gaining a massive 266 yards and 16 first downs.

Bentley mounted only five first downs, totaling 130 yards in offense on 37 plays. Cabrera completed only five of 14 passes for 50 yards. Senior tailback Dave Cox, replacing the injured Munn, led Bentley's rushing attack with 71 yards in 16 carries.

Bentley opens its Suburban Eight League schedule at Redford Union Friday, while Canton hosts Dearborn Heights Annapolis in another non-league affair.

Harriers eye league

The Plymouth Salem cross country team made great advancements last season when the Rocks finished in third place at the Suburban Eight League meet. It was the highest finish for the Salem harriers this decade.

This fall, first-year coach Scott Dunson hopes to continue the steady improvement of the program. He also wants to give Dearborn and Dearborn Edsel Ford, the league's top two cross country squads, a serious challenge for the conference crown.

The biggest loss to graduation on the Salem squad is Tom Rubadue, the Rocks' top runner in 1977. He was the backbone of Salem's third-place finish under departed coach Fred Thomann.

Dunson cites Paul Hess, a returning junior, to take Rubadue's place as the top runner on the team. Hess, a co-captain, had a poor spring season as a distance runner for the track team but hopes to rebound this fall, aiming for the 15-minute mark on the three-mile cross country course at Cass Benton.

The Rocks' other co-captain, Kevin Waara, is a returning senior who has made great improvements on his time.

A surprise addition, Dave Rubadue, Tom's younger brother, had the second fastest time at a recent time trial. Rubadue is a senior joining the squad for the first time.

Senior Dave Truesdell and junior Todd Curtis are also returning letter-winners who hope to have strong seasons. Junior Jeff Hartell is a first year runner who will probably make the varsity squad, along with sophomore Chris Whittaker.

"I think, with the people we have, we can take first, second and fourth and many more," Dunson said. "They have all been working very hard."

Dunson is also very encouraged with the large turnout of 15 runners this season. He expects close to 20 athletes to join the squad, which is impressive considering only four runners participated at old Plymouth High School in the early 1970s, when Dunson was a student. The Salem mentor said no girls have joined the team at time. A 1972 graduate of Plymouth High School, Dunson is presently attending Eastern Michigan University, working on a physical education and health degree. He was the Plymouth Canton assistant girls' track coach last spring.

Dunson, a former member of the Plymouth boys track team, still holds the school record for the half-mile event.

The Rocks open their season tomorrow afternoon against Livonia Stevenson beginning at 4 p.m. at Cass Benton.

The Chiefs compete at the tough Cass Benton course where most Observer-area teams host their meets. Livonia Churchill, a perennial champion of the Western Six League cross country crown, is once again considered the toughest team in the league.

How not to stifle a reporter

Guess who received a free lunch from Les Tinson, head of Plymouth-Canton school's central maintenance department, and his buddy Jim Symonds, the former maintenance supervisor?

That's right. I think this was part of the fringe benefits I got for the recent column I wrote about the poor condition of the athletic facilities at the Centennial Educational Park.

Oh, I received other goodies as well. Like a phone call from Ray Hoedel, administrative assistant for business, explaining how he thought progress was had been made by the maintenance department this past summer.

It's really amazing to me how the line of communication flows at the school administrative office—and how each educator or administrator is quick to "pass the buck" to another person.

No one ever wants to take the blame for a deficiency within the system.

Take, for example, this recent problem with central maintenance. In my opinion, I don't think the central maintenance system works. I say it hasn't worked since Tinson first implemented it a couple years ago.

Central maintenance, for those who don't know, includes 10 workers, a plumber, electrician, etc. who help fix building and ground problems that can't be corrected by the maintenance staffs at each school. By hiring these workers, the schools, in theory, save on the cost of hiring outside contractors to do these big jobs.

While the outside contract costs have been reduced, there are still many jobs done by outside contractors

that, in my opinion, should be done by the schools.

This is, of course, a waste of taxpayers money—one of the main reasons I originally wrote a column about the poor condition of the Park's outdoor facilities.

The latest column, two weeks ago, included pictures of the disaster area and it's apparent that the bad publicity hit a nerve within the school system.

I CAN JUST imagine what the reaction was over on Harvey Street, where the school administration building is located. One administrator after another wanted to put an end to such publicity, so the call from Hoedel tried to tone the situation down.

This didn't work so the next day I received a call from Symonds, who isn't even connected with the schools anymore. He sets up the luncheon meeting with Tinson and myself. (Symonds obviously was doing a favor for Tinson by arranging this meeting).

As expected, I received excuse after excuse on how it would take time and how there wasn't enough money or men to do the job correctly.

I also listened to all the stories on what a great job the central maintenance department has done keeping all the schools open with its dedication.

I also heard, as expected, all the mechanical explanations behind each job and how each worker was qualified to do the job.

AFTER THE FOUR-HOUR lunch, I still had trouble understanding why all these maintenance problems occurred

under central maintenance. The job was getting done better under the old system, but all I heard were stories about how dedicated Tinson's staff was.

When we departed, I'm sure Tinson thought the bad publicity would now cease. Especially when he asked that I call him everytime I see a maintenance problem.

What Tinson doesn't realize is that he made himself and his department look bad by taking me out to a four-hour lunch. If his staff was doing the job they should be doing, Tinson or Hoedel would have never reacted to the column the way they did.

Why should they bother calling a reporter or buying a reporter lunch if they felt secure in their job?

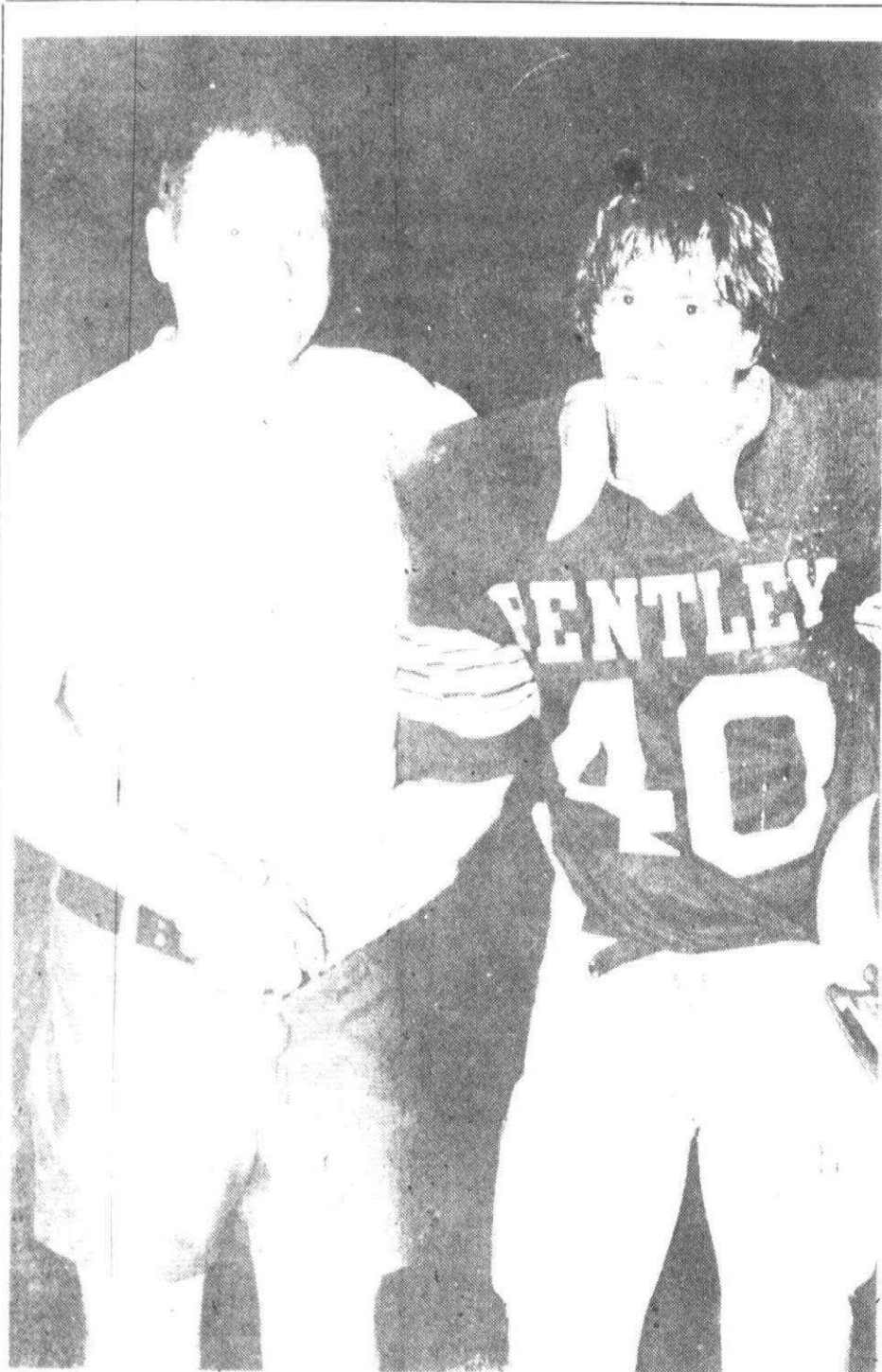
What Tinson doesn't realize is that I'm a reporter, not a mechanic. I'm not interested in listening to excuses about why the job can't be done correctly.

I'm also not a policeman—and I refuse to spend my time as a detective looking for every mistake the maintenance department makes and then reporting back to Tinson so the job gets done correctly.

I am a reporter. And it's my job to see that substantial progress is being made to improve the maintenance situation at the schools. As a voice of the people in this community, it is my duty to look for positive progress in this area.

Forget the mechanic explanations or excuses—I want to see results.

That's the only way the bad publicity will ever stop.

McCauley offers cage sophistication

The sophistication of the girls' basketball programs in the Observerland area continues to improve with each fall season.

And Plymouth-Canton coach Mike McCauley heads the pack, as his way of teaching fundamentals and discipline to his Western Six League championship team becomes more creative with the passing years.

As a means of self-conditioning and self-discipline, McCauley sent packs of instruction to each prospective varsity member over the summer, asking them to keep in good physical shape and learn the basic rules of his offensive and defensive philosophies.

So when practice started in mid-August, the girls were not surprised when they were asked to pass both a physical and mental test to make the varsity squad.

The physical test was part of "aerobics" training where McCauley asked the girls to run 1 1/2 miles in less than 12 minutes. (The girls were given as many times as they wanted to accomplish this or they wouldn't make the squad.)

The aerobic test determines the condition of the lungs," McCauley explained. "If the girls pass this test, they are in good condition and then

deserve to play varsity basketball."

The mental test was a classroom exercise where the girls were asked to memorize the 10 defensive rules and 13 offensive rules, and pass a test before joining the team.

In terms of fundamentals, McCauley has been a staunch user of the videotape machine in recent years. He tapes one-on-one games between players and then sits the girls down, lets them see themselves on the screen, and then shows them where improvements should be made.

"It's good that the girls see themselves and learn what they are doing wrong," McCauley said. "It makes it easier for me to instruct them."

The Canton mentor, who led his squad to a perfect regular season record last fall and earned All-Observerland coach-of-the-year honors, has also used the videotape machine as a mental lifter to his girls before some games.

He has been known to tape-record pep talks on the screen which his team listens to before an important game. He uses this as a psychological boost for the players and himself.

When will the sophistication ever end?

Lions, Steelers leave Lombardi loop

Jr. gridders enter new league

The Plymouth-Canton Junior Football League opened another season yesterday afternoon, as the Steelers and the Lions began play as members of the 11-team Western Suburban Junior Football League.

In the past, both Plymouth-Canton units, which includes the freshman, junior varsity and varsity team levels for boys ages 8-13, participated in the Vince Lombardi Junior Football League. In the off season, the board of directors of the Plymouth-Canton units decided to switch leagues for a number of reasons.

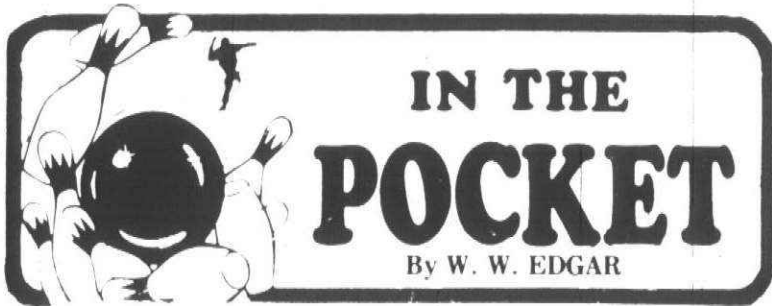
"One of the primary and obvious, but not the best reason for leaving (the Vince Lombardi league) was because the kids developed this 'I don't want to

play Ann Arbor syndrome' like most teams," said Lions varsity coach and board member Ted Lazarcheff.

The three Ann Arbor teams, Wolverines, Packers and Rams, have dominated the league for a number of years.

"But the key reason, in my opinion," Lazarcheff said, "is that we've been weak on the varsity units and the new league provides 13-year-olds a chance to play." The Vince Lombardi league only included 8-12-year olds.

Other reasons for the switch included less emphasis on winning. There will be no championship games this year and standings will not be published—only individual team records.



Now that the Detroit areas army of bowlers—more than a quarter of a million strong—has swung into action for the season, it is interesting to note the records on which they will be setting their sights.

The current yearbook, sponsored by both the men's and women's organizations, lists the all-time records. The Stroth team holds the top four places in the high-scoring category.

The current team records of 3691 was established last season. The previous year the team rolled a 3671. Last year, the team also scored a 3589 and in 1967 it posted a 3586.

The Stroth team also holds the high game record of 1326 rolled in 1976.

On the individual side, Gaston Marois rolled an 876 in the Bel-Aire Classic and that has stood off all challenges since 1971.

While Sandy was showing the way in the series battle, Toni Smith took high game honors with a 231 in 574. Sandy Marsh was next with a 564, one pin more than Mary Curtis.

In the men's league, Rich Fleming was tops with a 224 in 612 until Lee Gossman came along to tie him. Red Bennett was third with 594 and Frank Essa had a 574.

THE LADIES BOWLERETTES League, rated one of the best in the country, opens next week at Luxury Lanes and the switch in some of the teams is expected to cause even a tighter race than last year when the battle went down almost to the final ball.

Correction

Thompson is No. 1 area gridder authority

He attends more than 50 games each high school football season.

Many perceptive suburban gridiron fans see this man roaming the sidelines at countless games. He is usually found carrying a stack of large manila envelopes, which become faded as the season wears on. The man with the large black-rimmed glasses and wavy-black hair always follows the chain gang up and down the field.

He is simply known as the "stat man" or as others call him, the "stat nut." Coaches and sports writers know him by his real name—Jim Thompson.

He is without a doubt the No. 1 authority, statistically, on high school football in the Detroit area.

This fall, Thompson will keep tabs on 208-214 high school football squads in the Detroit area, depending upon how many schools cut football because of millage defeats.

Each week Thompson compiles the

results and standings of every team in the area. He also keeps league standings, points scored and points yielded, and average scoring spread. When the season concludes, Thompson rates the strength of all leagues based on inter-division play.

During the season, coaches will call him frequently and by the fifth week of the season, Thompson knows which teams still have a chance for the playoffs.

THOMPSON KNOWS the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) point playoff system well. In the four state regions divided into four classes, Thompson rates each team according to the amount of points they have accumulated.

"By the fifth game I have this payoff thing down to a science," says Thompson modestly.

The Redford Township resident compiles statistics for the Detroit News and keeps writers abreast of how all teams are fairing.

Thompson became interested in compiling football stats in 1974.

"I used to read the Observerland ratings compiled by the former Livonia Observer sports editor Tom Donoghue," said Thompson.

"I got interested because there is more than just wins and losses," said Thompson.

While not compiling statistics, Thompson doubles as a math tutor. He attended the University of Michigan and Tulane University (La.).

"In 1974 I kept all the team stats for the 41 west area suburban schools, he said.

In 1976 Thompson went to work for the News and expanded his coverage to just over 200 schools.

"I still go to as many west area games as possible," said Thompson. "I'm biased toward that area and I usually follow the best teams each week."

Thompson plans out his schedule of games each week in advance and

might attend games Friday afternoon, Friday night, Saturday afternoon and Saturday night.

Thompson admits his favorite team is Westland John Glenn because "they were down for so many years and now they have compiled one of the best records in the last three years."

"One of the most exciting games I ever covered was the John Glenn-Livonia Franklin contest in 1976."

"Glenn had never beaten Franklin and won that game in overtime, 13-7. That was the year after Franklin had won the state championship. Glenn went on to be undefeated in 1976."

Other memorable games for Thompson included the 1974 Plymouth Salem-Farmington Harrison regular season finale in which both teams were undefeated. Another classic was the 1975 Dearborn-Trenton game according to Thompson. Trenton and Salem were both victors.

Last year, Thompson remembers the Redford Bishop Borgess-Lake

Shore battle in the final regular season game.

"THAT GAME really didn't mean much because Lake Shore already had a playoff berth locked up," recalls Thompson.

"It was so intense because Lake Shore hadn't given up a point all year long and wanted to go through the season unscathed upon."

"It would have been a record for Lake Shore, but Borgess scored twice," he said. "But they lost the game."

The busiest time of the year for Thompson is the last few games where playoff spots are decided.

"I can't add up all the hours I've spent talking to people those last few weeks," he said.

"During the last week of the season you can trust me," said Thompson referring to his playoff projections.

In Class A, Thompson says North Farmington and Birmingham Brother Rice look very strong in their respec-

tive regions this fall.

"It's hard to pre-speculate on teams because there are always a few sleepers in each class," he said.

Thompson said he is looking forward to the first weekend which is highlighted by a doubleheader, Saturday, Sept. 9, at the Pontiac Silverdome.

At 5:30 p.m., Pontiac Northern will face North Farmington and at 8 p.m. Flint Southwestern will take on Pontiac Central.

"That should really be something," said Thompson.

In the winter, Thompson records basketball results but does not spend nearly as much time because every team qualifies for the state tournament and no point system is required.

Thompson claims his method of recording is foolproof. He says the official recorder of results at the MHSAA office in Lansing, a computer, makes at least three mistakes a week.

Just call him the "bible" of Detroit area high school football.



Marching Band opens season smaller but with new routines

The scene was quite a bit different this year for any parents who made the trip to Charlevoix two weeks ago for the annual marching demonstration by the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (PCEP) Marching Band.

The demonstration, as always, is primarily given to let the parents, and friends, see how much work they've done in one week preparing the music and a drill that will be performed in competition during the marching season.

Several things were different this year.

First of all, and most obvious, was the surroundings. For the past 13 years, 1964 to 1977, the PCEP marching band had always spent "Band Camp" at Camp Innisfree in Maple City along the Lake Michigan shoreline. Due to a conflict in dates, the band was forced to find other accommodations for the week prior to the start of the school year.

Camp Seagull, along the shores of Lake Charlevoix, was the home this year for the Plymouth musicians. Whether the band returns to Seagull next year or goes back to Innisfree will be determined by the result of a vote taken by the band.

A few strong points for Camp Seagull, said members of the band, were that the food was good, and there was plenty of it.

The showers and facilities were in the cabins as opposed to one building at Innisfree, the football field was free of obstacles such as holes and branches that hadn't been filled or cut down, and the entire camp was generally very clean.

Obviously smaller was the number of heads on the field during the demonstration this year. Thirty members of the color guard and 85 musicians for a total of 115 make up the band, the smallest marching band in Plymouth since 1973.

Although the size of the band is down this year, Ralph Johnson (the band's musical arranger and drill coordinator) has composed a rather complex drill for the band to perform.

The "competition show," as it is called, made its debut in last Friday night's halftime show for Plymouth Salem High's home opener against Livonia Franklin.

The band also will be performing at the western show in the Silverdome and for Canton's homecoming on Oct. 6 and Salem's homecoming on Oct. 27.

The other thing missing at Camp Seagull that the band had at Innisfree (besides the Lake Michigan view) was the famous hill running alongside the football field. Spectators of the demonstration were forced to watch the show from ground level, but the performance made up for it and will make the stars and pinwheels more obvious on Friday night.

DURING THE WEEK at band camp, members of the band spent time in sectionals, full band rehearsals (where the music is worked out as an entire group) and finally on the marching field where the whole concept of a marching band comes out.

Assisting director James R. Griffith this year is his new associate, Carl Battishill. Battishill will direct the variety and concert bands at the park and leave Griffith with the cadet and symphony bands.

Both will work with the stage band. Battishill is a graduate of the University of Michigan and has been working the past four years for the Frankfort public schools.

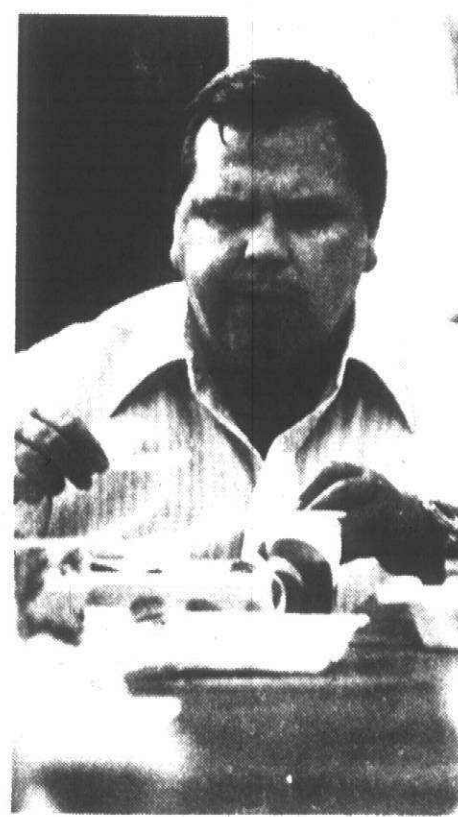

Sentimentality detracts from lively storyline

Any movie that begins with a man ritually wrapping himself with Ace bandages to the strains of bullfight music has got to have some funny moments in it. "Hooper" (PG) does.

Burt Reynolds continues to charm with that blue-jeaned, amiable macho image he developed so successfully in "Smokey and the Bandit."

Like that earlier film, "Hooper" is an action picture with thrills and laughs. Unlike "Smokey," however, "Hooper" is marred by a strong dose of sentimentality. This is unfortunate because the subject matter has so much potential and is so lively and interesting in itself.

Reynolds plays Sonny Hooper, a Hollywood stuntman who's the best in the business. He's a jock with busted bones that can't take any more punishment and a hungry ego that needs to be fueled with daredevil stunts.

NIPPING AT his heels is a younger stuntman, played by Jan-Michael Vincent, who wants to become the new Hooper. The nervy kid has studied Hooper's moves, analyzed the action and used a computer to figure things out scientifically. It's a new age.

Meanwhile, Hooper's live-in girlfriend (Sally Field) wants him to roll up his bandages and play house. She's supported by her father (Brian Keith), a retired stuntman and Hooper's drinking buddy. He wants them to get married.

On the other hand, Roger (Robert Klein), the director of the flick Hooper is working on, wants Hooper to hang in there and perform a death-defying stunt for the movie's sensational ending. The movie is a James Bond-type thriller called "The Spy Who Laughed at Death."

In the hands of Roger, a puffed-up, arty sort, who wants to make "a statement," it takes on the "grayness of 'La Strada.'" Roger is just begging for someone to send his teeth down his throat, an event gleefully anticipated by everyone but Roger.

Hal Needham, who directed "Hooper," is a former stuntman and stunt coordinator. He's captured all the abrasiveness of the infighting and all the thrills of the stuntmaking. What he's missed is any suggestion of why. Why do these men risk their lives so readily?

HE'S ENOBLED the stuntmen; he hasn't given any clues about why they fence with death. I'm not suggesting a deep psychological probe, but only a more penetrating presentation of the material.

For example, "Slapshot," the hockey film with Paul Newman, was a movie that dealt with jocks who regularly got bruised and battered. Yet, within the comedy and action, there was sufficient development of character to reveal (in that case) the shallowness and insecurity that were masked by the bravado.

Perhaps Needham, the ex-stuntman and Reynolds' pal, is simply too close to the scene. He's part of a movie-making team Reynolds put together that includes Bobby Byrne, the director of photography; James Best, an actor who plays Hooper's sidekick, and others who have worked with Reynolds on several films.

They're a winning team. I just hope such enviable status doesn't prevent them from accepting the challenge of trying something different. The good ol' boy image and check-shirt humor can become tiresome.

They're carving out a fortune—in ducks

While carving the duck may be the prelude to a big dinner for most of us, some people are apt to just whittle away at it in the basement.

Call them quacks if you like. But many carvers say Michigan is the decoy carving capital of the world. And just to prove it, they've assembled more than 100 decoys—all made by Michigan carvers—into an exhibit, open in downtown Detroit through Sept. 29.

The display includes contemporary and antique decoys, some more than a century old. It's open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday in the main office of Detroit Bank & Trust at Fort and Washington.

The concept behind the display is to show the transitions in carving techniques as well as illustrate how decoy carving slowly evolved over more than 1,000 years. Four phases are covered—creating decoys for hunting, as a hobby, for decorative purposes and for use in national and international competitions.

The display was developed by the Michigan Waterfowl Decoy Associ-

ation to coincide with its 31st annual Mid-West Decoy Contest, being held Saturday, Sept. 16, at Pointe Mouillee State Game area.

More than 5,000 people are expected to attend this special event featuring the best carvers from throughout the world, a number of whom will be displaying top-prize-winning decoys at Detroit Bank & Trust.

According to Len Carnaghi, president of the Michigan Waterfowl Decoy Association: "During the past 20 years, Michigan carvers have dominated international competitions for decoy carving, a feat recognized throughout the world in this highly competitive art form."

Carnaghi is recognized as a master

carver and has earned numerous awards and first place honors in international and world competitions.

Jim Foote, another master carver, whose decoys have been photographed and cited in numerous textbooks on the subject, said: "There are more than 20 carvers in the metropolitan Detroit area alone who are world class competitors. This is the largest concentration of carvers of this ability in the entire United States."

Interestingly, decoy carving is a true North American art form originated by Indians more than 1,000 years ago as a tool to assist them in capturing game for food. When someone mentions decoy, most people think of a duck decoy, but in actuality, man has

been creating all types of decoys to lure wildlife close enough to him to capture it for food and to obtain skins, fur and feathers for clothing and as adornment.

In addition to the decoys, a workshop will be set up in the exhibit area displaying decoys in various stages of completion as well as presenting photographs of tools used during the 1800s by hunters and sportsmen to carve decoys.

"Creating decoys is not only an art form, it is also a science. Carvers are attempting to simulate, through man-made objects, aspects of nature to allay the fears of birds and animals that danger lurks nearby. In times past, the more closely the person could imitate nature, the better were his chances that he would fool the animal, deceive its instincts for survival and thereby lull it into a false sense of security," said Foote.

Included in the bank display will be a wide variety of waterfowl and other bird decoys as well as a selection of fish decoys.

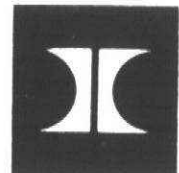

New dental complex to open here next month

The next time your teeth act up you won't have to worry about walking the Yellow Pages for the closest dentist. There's a mouthful of help right around the corner.

Packed with tooth specialists, the Plymouth Professional Building will open at 9416 Main St. south of Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth Township on Oct. 1.

The building will house two orthodontists, an oral surgeon, an endodontist (root canal specialist), and a general dentist.

But if it's the gums that are the problem, you could be in trouble. The owners of the two-story building haven't had any luck finding a periodontist to fill the vacant basement suite. Dr. Philip S. Warren, an orthodontist who has been practicing in Plymouth

for 10 years, is one of four owners of the new dentist building.

The others are Dr. Roger L. Bookwater, Dr. Nils J. Korsnes, and Dr. Robert Millard Korsnes, a general dentist, has been practicing in Plymouth for 11 years.

All of the owners will be occupying the new building in addition to Dr. Dennis R. Gut, an endodontist who recently graduated from the University of Michigan.

DR. WARREN SAID the site of the 1,200 square foot building was the only practical location for the new owners.

"We're all Plymouth people and we wanted to be centrally located near the Plymouth business district," he said. "We didn't want to build our

place in Canton although it would have been a lot easier to move there.

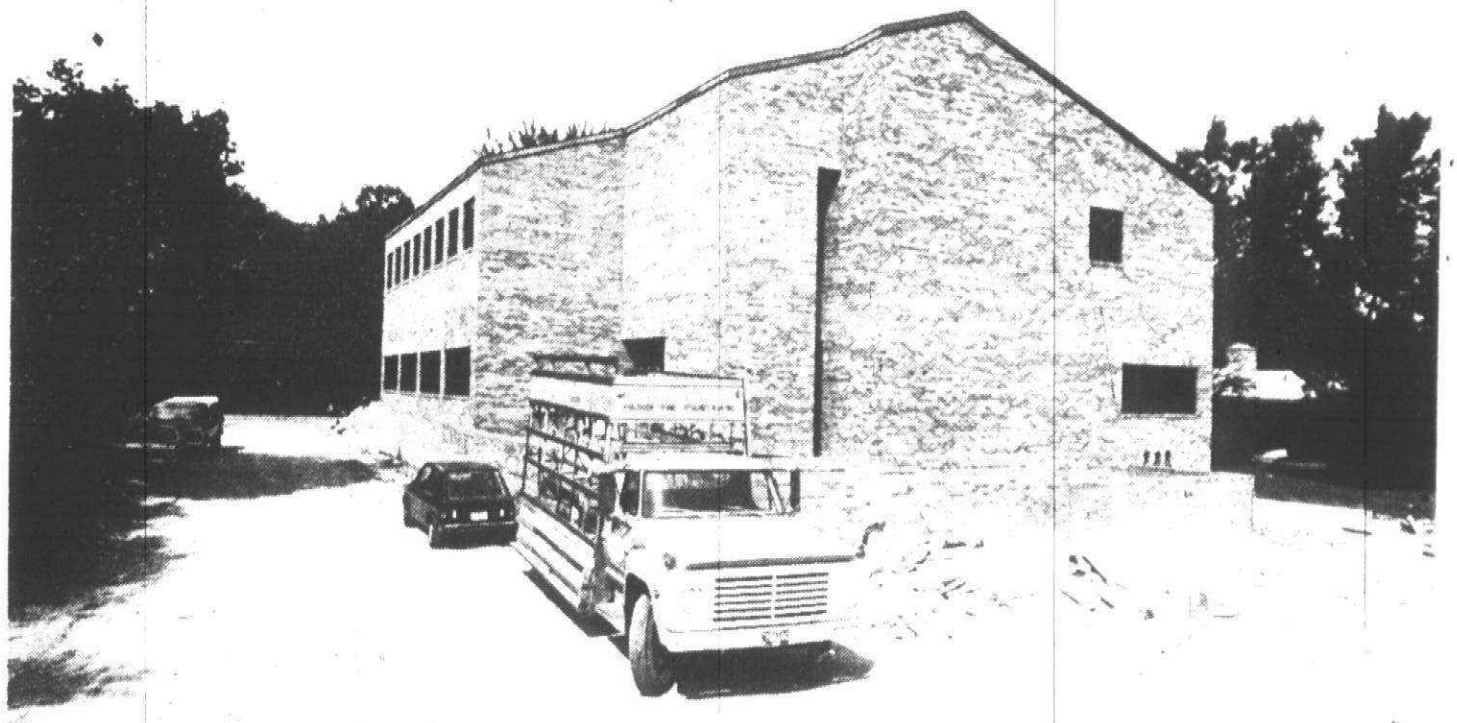
"We spent a full year rezoning the property. It's tough to get a permit to build when you don't want to get that far away from Plymouth."

Although the new dentist building will be ready for business by Oct. 1, Warren said not all of the dentists will be moved in by that date.

Only Dr. Gut, who presently does not have an office, will be settled in the new building. The rest of the dentists will occupy their new settings within the first couple of weeks of October, Warren said.

Worldwide service offered

Export firm aims for \$12 million sales mark

Among the many industries and businesses headquartered in Livonia is a rapidly growing firm that is known throughout the world.

Mec-Rep-Co International Inc. at 13211 Merriman Road, has, in six years, grown from a small business originally in Plymouth, to a 32-employee firm now expanding out of Livonia with offices in such countries as France, Saudi Arabia and West and Central Africa.

Mec-Rep-Co is a leader in international heavy construction equipment sales and product support, and maintains operations in key cities throughout the world.

From its U.S. headquarters in Livonia, housed in a 36,000 square foot office and warehouse, the firm not only ships such equipment as tractors, trucks, boilers and bulldozers around the world, but also supplying parts, components and assemblies worldwide.

Under the direction of its president, E.H. Leonhardt, the firm is expected to do an estimated minimum business of \$12 million this year.

In addition to the export operation, Mec-Rep-Co provides export management, engineering maintenance and training services to its customers around the world.

Robert Adams, vice president of finance, said his company represents some 50 different manufacturers including J. I. Case, Cummins Engine and Dart.

"Our sales and technical personnel travel extensively in the countries we supply. We service what we sell. Professional mechanics maintain and overhaul heavy equipment, assuring the customer of maximum operating usefulness and life of the equipment," Adams said.

"Engineering and management consulting in the heavy machinery applications are available from MRC. This service assists our customers in procuring the right machinery for the job."

As part of its equipment sales, MRC

provides the instructors for training when required by the customer.

"We recognize the need for qualified operators, technicians and mechanics. Heavy machinery is more complex today than ever before and requires trained personnel to operate and maintain."

"The latest techniques in training are being developed by MRC such as automated teaching systems with self-paced instruction and student response. Basic skills training in third world countries are available to meet the demand for qualified personnel," he said.

Airport development is another field MRC is involved in.

The firm has built some 14 control towers in Saudi Arabia and the Mid East. The company has constructed

more than 65 control towers in the United States, including Ann Arbor and Benton Harbor.

MRC has installed sophisticated solid state air traffic control displays in Mid East and West Africa. This new system, developed by Texas Instruments, provides an improvement in stability and reliability with increased performance, Adams said. The firm is working on the installation of a technical training center and engine repair center in Saudi Arabia.

Customers from all over the world travel to the Livonia headquarters to discuss orders.

Recently Rene Ligue, Ivory Coast buyer for Sodepalm, West Africa, paid his second visit here. He is in the palm oil business. MRC is now planning an office on the Ivory Coast, a section of French Africa that stretches 300 miles east to west along the Atlantic Ocean.

Adams said what the company offers is consolidation rather than a firm having to make several shipments.

"Everything comes to our warehouse in Livonia and is shipped in one lot either by air or ship to the customer. This way we are able to give our customers a complete shipment of parts and equipment rather than they having to get it in sections."

Instructorship of business course burgeons into a business of its own

Why do many small businesses fail to survive their first year?

"Lack of planning," says Livonia attorney Robert R. Thompson, who has been keeping a close eye on the small business world for more than five years.

"Statistics are difficult to come by," says Thompson, "but there are 750,000 new businesses opened every year, and there are 500,000 discontinuances. Not all of these are failures, but many are."

Since 1973, Thompson has conducted yearly workshops for aspiring businessmen at Schoolcraft College, under the title "How to Start Your Own Business."

This year's workshop will begin Friday evening, Sept. 22, from 6:30 to 10, and will continue Saturday, Sept. 23, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Cost is \$96, and registrations are now being taken at the college.

The workshop is part of the Community Services schedule. One of Thompson's law partners, Leonard Mier, assists him in the presentations.

BESIDES THE WORKSHOPS, Thompson has come up with a new way to help people get started in their own businesses, and has found still another career for himself—author and, later this year, TV personality.

His book is, "How to Start Your Own Business... and Make Money." It is published by Merchants Publishing Company of Kalamazoo and sells for \$7.95.

The publishers have just made arrangements to distribute the book through Kmart and several other retail outlets. According to Thompson, the publishers "perceive continued use, like J. K. Lasser's Tax Guide, for the next 10 years. They are looking for sales of 100,000 in the first 12 months."

The book also will be distributed by Hawthorne Books, which predicts 20,000 copies in catalog sales.

"And I am now embarking on a national TV talk show schedule, which I didn't have any idea of anticipating," Thompson said.

The publisher is now making arrangements with Merv Griffin and

some of the other big talk shows, and I will be getting a firm schedule shortly."

He has already taped TV and radio shows for airing in Kalamazoo and will visit 11 cities in the U.S. for radio and TV appearances. He is also planning to arrange workshops in each of those cities.

"IT'S SOMETHING that has simply dropped out of the blue," said Thompson, "and what I really think has happened here is that in teaching a course in how to start your own business, that course in itself, the very act of teaching, has turned into a small business. Isn't that ironic?"

"I am really indebted to Schoolcraft," he continued.

Panelists include Barbara Crawford, of the Livonia Mall Merchants Association; Howard Disbrow, Awrey Bakeries; Dave Griffin, Michigan National Bank—West Metro; Russ Lum, Lum & Ferrell, CPA, and Robert Thompson, Krandle, Thompson & Mier.

The seminar will be held in the chamber office, 15401 Farmington Road. Any businessperson is welcome to attend without charge, but reservations should be made in advance by calling 427-2122.

The series of seminars on business problems is being sponsored by the chamber's business and economic development council. Richard Dickshott, vice-president of the council, commented:

"I believe that the insight and technical advice given by panel members has been of value to those participating in the sessions. We hope to be of continued assistance to the small businessperson who is interested in the success of his business and the welfare of the business community."

Thompson recalled that he first offered to present the course for the Livonia Public Schools and for Schoolcraft College as a result of "seeing a lot of people have serious problems in starting a business."

Schoolcraft accepted his idea and his services, and classes which began with an attendance of about 30 students now number 70 to 80. His students have included many educators, teachers, engineers, couples, recent college graduates and housewives.

Some of these, as he mentions in his book, have gone on to establish highly successful businesses.

THOMPSON'S BACKGROUND includes setting up his own business, his law firm, which since 1967 has grown from one attorney to five. One of the latest employees is his son.

Thompson began his studies in chemical engineering at the University of Toledo, but after two years of college he was married and joined the army.

Returning to civilian life, he completed his undergraduate work in mathematics at Toledo, and received his graduate degree in physics from the University of Detroit. He worked as a physicist until 1966.

"I was doing a lot of contract work for Bendix," he said, "and I thought it would be nice to take a course in contracts at the Detroit College of Law. So I did, and I got hooked on law."

Except for the first two years, Thompson, 48, did all of his college work at night school and held down a fulltime job.

So hard work is nothing new to him. And the first thing his book indicates is that a lot of hard work goes into planning a business.

But the language of the book is clear, work sheets are included to make it easier to take the necessary steps in logical order, and there is even humor to lighten the load.

One of his sample company presidents graduated from "Hadaball University," and the treasurer is named "Betty Balance."

IS OPENING your own business worth the effort? Thompson firmly believes the answer is yes.

"Between 70 and 75 per cent of

everyone in this country who is in the 50 per cent tax bracket or greater is in his own business," he points out. The 50 per cent bracket begins at an annual income of around \$47,000.

Thompson admits that a lot of paperwork is involved when running a business. State legislatures, he said, do not recognize the difference between a large business, which can handle the government regulations paperwork, and a small business, which is deluged.

"It is a big problem," he said, "but I don't think it's a problem that's going to interfere with a person's ability to make a sizable income in his own business, because I'm aware of the statistics that show the people in their own businesses are earning the big money. They do surmount this problem."

"If you've done any traveling at all, if you've gone around the world, you come back to the U.S., and if you're like me, you find you are full of admiration for the climate, or whatever it is in this country, that produces people who will go into business."

"They'll do things for themselves," Thompson said. "They'll overcome impediments. We don't lay down on our backs and give up easily in this country."

"If it takes three people to do the paperwork," he continued, "I am convinced that the business person in this country will find a way to get those three people, pay them the wages they require, and still make a profit."

THROUGH HIS WORK with businessmen and with the Small Business Investment Companies, Thompson picks up indications of what should be lucrative businesses in the future.

"A lot of people believe the day is coming when you are going to find telephones in cars very popular," he said. "Now that's a new industry being sensed in the CB field. Others are CB outlets themselves, computer sources, software (program material) as well as hardware, waste disposal, anything having to do with energy, janitorial services and food services."

Although these fields are fairly new and generally not yet overcrowded, competition should not scare the small businessman, said Thompson.

He believes that another area for growth is that of weight reduction. Although there are "some big people, like TOPS, in this field," there is also a great demand.

Bad businesses to be in? Thompson could not think of any, except possibly construction, which had a slump in 1975-76. "The situation is constantly changing," he said. "I guess I see opportunities everywhere."

One factor which can affect the success or failure of a business is timing, according to Thompson. Late summer, early fall, is a good time to open a business, since many merchants do a large percentage of their total business in the last months of the year.

It is at 36111 Michigan Ave. in the Wayne Commons Shopping Center.

Calling it a "superstore," Kroger vice-president David A. Burt said it is "much larger than a regular store." It will operate on a 24-hour basis Monday through Saturday and from 9 to 9 on Sundays. There will be approximately 75 employees.

The store features four departments: Grocery, meat, produce and delicatessen. A grand opening celebration is planned for Sunday.

Drug chain reports new earnings peak; stock issue planned

On the heels of its revelation of record earnings, Perry Drug Stores, Inc., last week announced it has filed a registration statement with the Securities and Exchange Commission in connection with a proposed public offering of 300,000 shares of its common stock.

Jack A. Robinson, board chairman and president of the chain which operates 55 stores in 40 Michigan communities, said proceeds will be used to reduce short term borrowings which have been utilized to finance the company's expansion program.

When completed, the offering will boost the company's total common shares outstanding to 1,512,943 shares. The offering will be made by The Ohio Company.

The third quarter, ended July 31, was Perry's 13th consecutive quarter of record operating results. Nine-month earnings were higher than for any previous entire fiscal year.

Third quarter profit climbed 24 per cent to \$553,825, or 45 cents a share, from \$446,764, or 37 cents a share, in the same period a year ago, Robinson said.

Sales rose 28 per cent to \$23,246,750 from \$18,145,527.

For the nine-month period, profit was up 23 per cent to \$1,710,588, or \$1.41 a share, from \$1,391,326, or \$1.16 a share, the year before.

Perry, in all of fiscal 1977, earned \$1,708,358.

The chain's 55 stores represents an increase of five over the number of stores Perry was operating at the end of its fiscal 1977 year.

The company also has added six auto-home centers inside its larger stores, the total now standing at 16, and has boosted the number of optical centers from nine to 14.

Perry will open its first stores in Bay City and Saginaw before the end of fiscal 1978.

Market Watch

Recent hectic trading activity in the casino stocks has forced the New York Stock Exchange to impose higher margin requirements in this group. By increasing the initial margin deposit, it is hoped that this will settle the market in these stocks.

What is a margin account? It is an account in which an individual may purchase stock and not pay for it in full. The broker arranges a loan against the stock which is held in the account as collateral.

There are three separate agencies that have the power to regulate margin conditions: the Federal Reserve, the New York Stock Exchange, and each individual brokerage firm.

The Fed establishes the initial margin requirement.

It will increase or decrease the requirement based on the over-all condition of the stock market. As the market declines and speculative activity diminishes, the required initial deposit will be reduced.

As the market rises and trading activity increases, the Fed will raise the requirement. In recent years, the rate has ranged between 50 per cent and 90 per cent. The present requirement is 50 per cent.

Through this power the Fed has the means to either encourage or discourage stock market enthusiasm.

WHILE THE FED is basically con-

cerned with the initial margin requirement, it is the responsibility of the NYSE and the individual brokerage firm to see that adequate equity is maintained.

If, for example, a trader purchases \$10,000 worth of stock on margin, the Federal requirement calls for a deposit of 50 per cent of that amount, or \$5,000.

There are three factors that now exist, once the account is opened: The total value is represented by the market value, the debit balance which is the amount borrowed, and the difference between those two which represents the stock holder's equity.

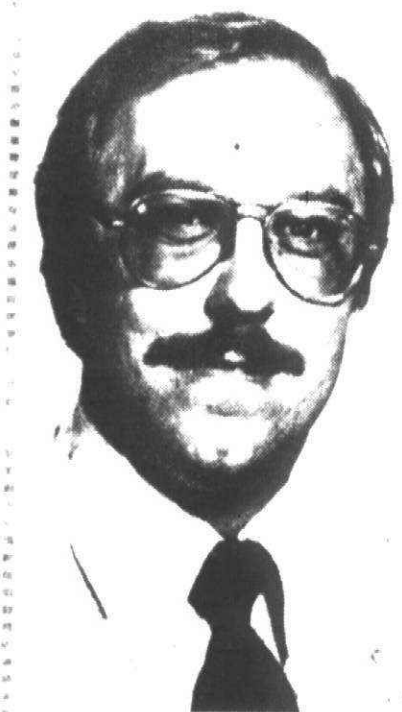
Since the debit balance is a constant, the investor's equity will rise and fall as the market value changes.

If the total value of the stock increases, for example, to \$20,000, then the equity has now increased to \$15,000. On the other hand, if the market value decreases to \$5,000, then there would be zero equity.

OBVIOUSLY, CERTAIN minimum equity requirements must be established to protect the lender.

The NYSE has for many years required a minimum equity of 25 per cent.

In the above example the investor would be required to deposit additional collateral if the market value dropped below \$6,666.

Back in those days we didn't have buses to take us to the old school buildings. We had to walk—come winter's heavy snows or the wild spring rain storms. And even then we had fun tossing snowballs. The only time it wasn't funny when we had the misfortune to get stuck in the snow.

It was inside the classroom where he had the most fun. It was there that he mingled with the Dutch kids who had a great time mangling the King's English. If we were to hear it today there would be the suspicion that the youngsters were dealing in a foreign language.

As The Stroller watched the youngsters climb aboard the bus the other morning he wondered if the modern teachers still use copy books to teach both spelling and writing. It was through these books that The Stroller learned much of his spelling.

THERE WAS ONE morning he still remembers with a laugh.

It was during a penmanship class in which we were to write series of sentences of our own choosing. As the teachers walked up and down the aisles she came to a little Dutch boy from the farm area who seemed to be in trouble.

He was sitting at his desk with his head resting on the palm of his left hand.

"Are you having any trouble?" the teacher asked as she looked over his shoulder and saw the letters "b-e-f-o-r-

The little Dutch lad looked up at her and asked in return, "Belongs it an e behind before."

He asked it loud enough that not only the teacher but the entire class laughed. And it has been remembered down through the years as one of the most laughable of all the moments The Stroller enjoyed during his school days.

Another great moment comes to mind when he sees the young folks start off to school. It was the practice then to have recitation each Friday afternoon. It was our way of closing the week.

One by one we would be called upon to walk up front and then recite a verse or two, even though, at times, they didn't rhyme.

On this particular Friday little Johnny, the lad who had been stuck in the penmanship class, had just returned from a long vacation trip with his parents.

Stepping to the front of the room, he took his stance and then offered these never to be forgotten lines:

"The more you travel this world about
The more you find be Jesus out."

THE STROLLER HAS good cause to remember the afternoon because he was responsible for ending the recitation program.

When it came his turn he quickly stepped to the front and with all the air of an accomplished speaker offered these lines:

"Holy Moses, jumping Josephs,
Don't the sheeneys have big noses."
The teacher was aghast for his lines didn't rhyme and the word "sheeney" was the slang referral to the members of the Jewish faith. She didn't hesitate when The Stroller had finished. She

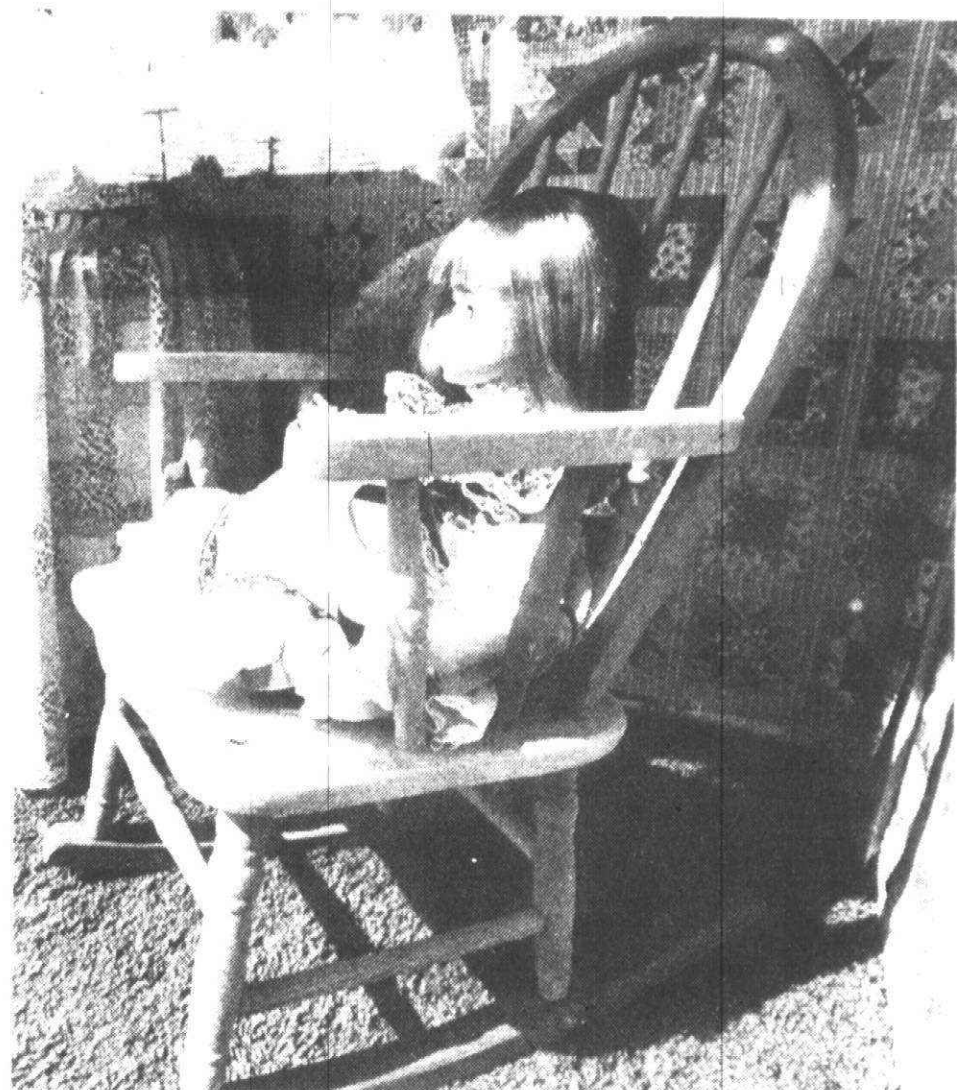

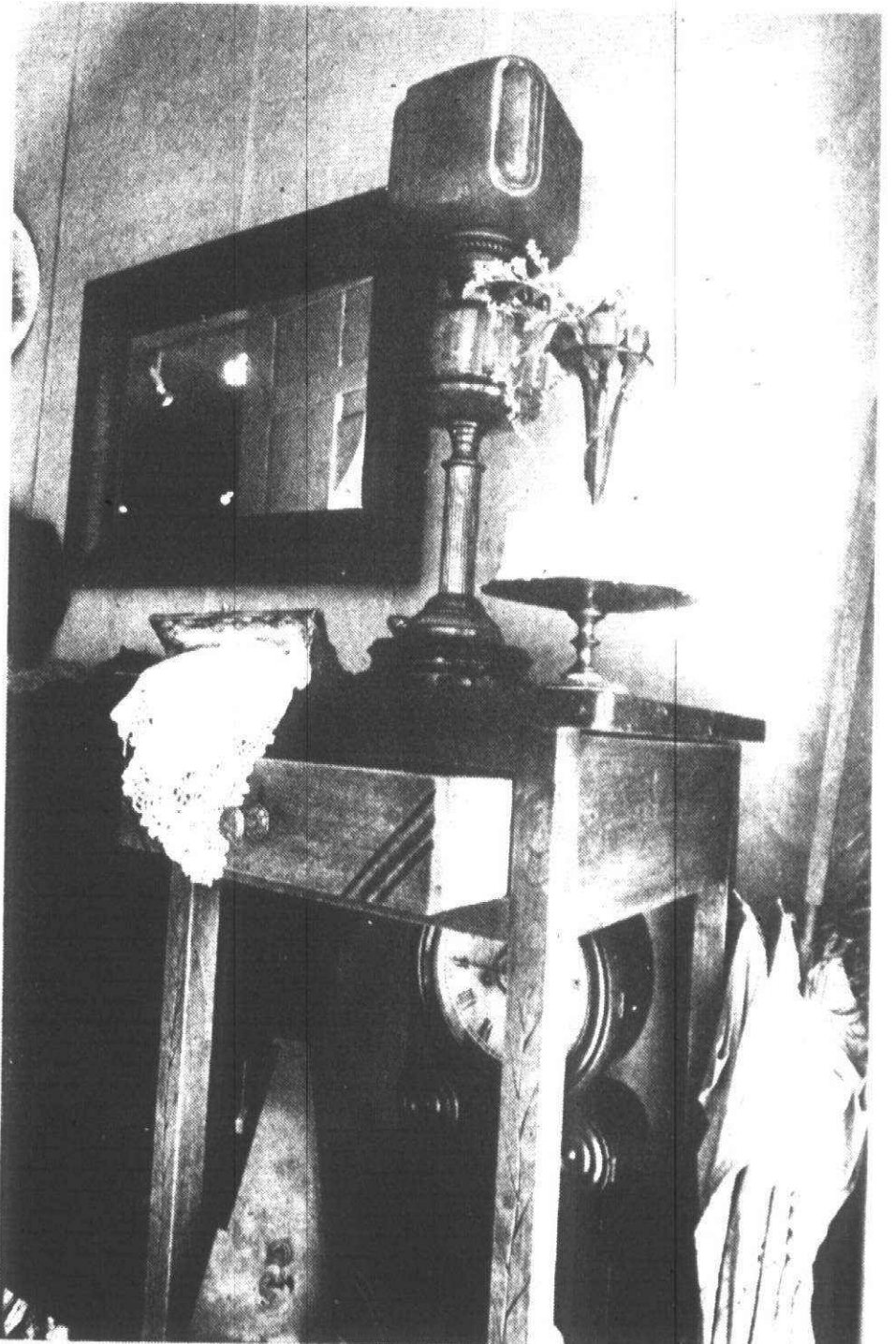

90th birthday marked by longtime resident

Anna Krumm canned her tomatoes last Tuesday. Wednesday, Sept. 6 was her 90th birthday. She got the tomatoes out of the way so she could spend the next day greeting a steady stream of visiting relatives and friends who came to wish her many happy returns.

The neighbors came for birthday cake and ice cream on Sunday.

Mrs. Krumm was born in Germany in 1888. The family moved to Detroit when she was a child. Her dad farmed near Bell Branch, which was located in what is now Redford Township.

"There was a store, a church and a school," she recalls. She was just 12 years old when she first saw the man who was to be her husband for 59 years.

"Bert was husking corn in a field beside the road. We were walking home from school and he whistled. I waved back."

Anna Dumka and Bert Krumm were married in 1908 in the Lutheran Church at Five Mile and Farmington

for the party. At that time, Mrs. Krumm credited hard work for their good health and and youthful attitude.

Bert Krumm died nine years later. During her years at 593 Ann Street, Anna Krumm's large white sugar cookies (made with sour cream) have been popular with generations of neighborhood children. She loved them all and was their comforter when they were sad. Those sugar cookies, a hug, and conversation with Mrs. Krumm were real tear-stoppers.

She is a long-time member of St. Peter Lutheran Church. It was her molasses cookies that were responsible for her reputation as a fine cook at church bazaars.

"I haven't made them for about three years," she said. "They are a lot more work than the sour cream cookies."

The cookies are also favorites of her eight grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. Anna Krumm fulfills everyone's image of what a great-grandmother should be—and it all comes as naturally as the lady herself.

Road in Livonia. They called it Livonia Center then and it was pronounced Lye-vonia, with the emphasis on the first syllable, the way the old-timers say it still.

The 20-year-old bride and her husband moved to the Krumm farm on Wayne Road near Plymouth Road. She has memories of "mud that deep (holding her hand about two feet from the floor) on Plymouth Road. We had to start out at midnight to take our produce to market in Detroit. We had to get there in time to get our regular stall." They went to the old Western Market that no longer exists.

THEY LATER moved to another farm on Farmington Road and returned to Plymouth in 1932. They had five children, one of whom died as a baby. The other four, Mrs. Ione Gow, Mrs. Gladys McBride, Mrs. Marion Robertson, and son, Bud Krumm, planned the 50th wedding anniversary celebration for their parents in 1958. Friends, neighbors and family gathered at the VFW Hall on Mill Street

Or maybe you have to work late—too late to cook when you get home. A fast hamburger will solve the problem. First of thinking up a different meal

for your family every night of the week? A barrel of crispy chicken will probably be met with enthusiastic oooohs and aaaahs. Or maybe you are craving for a burrito, or a taco overtakes your willpower when the Taco Bell rings. Can you stay on your diet?

Of course you can. It would be foolish and unrealistic to tell you to avoid these places. The golden arches are firmly planted in the American scene and have, indeed, become a way of life.

What you should know is how to cut down on calories whenever you can.

Just don't be fooled into thinking that fish is a safe choice for a dieter. Nothing can be further from the truth. For example, did you know that a standard order of fish and chips plus coleslaw from Arthur Treacher's adds up to 740 calories? If you are on a 1,000 calorie diet you only have about 250 calories for your other two meals. However, Arthur Treacher has fewer calories than Long John Silver, whose same dinner (two pieces of fish) is 955 calories.

If the midnight snackies hit you between your pizza pie eyes and you eat half of a Pizza Hut, 13-inch cheese pizza, you put away 900 calories. And since it is late at night, you aren't going to burn off those 900 calories

unless you are very active while you are asleep. Aren't you glad you didn't eat the whole thing?

MAYBE HAMBURGERS or fish and chips aren't your style or mood. Maybe you'd rather have steak or prime rib. It is Saturday night and you're celebrating whatever. A strip steak from the Rustler is 1,086 calories all by itself. Now add their baked

potato (231 calories), a salad with blue cheese dressing (164) and a cup of coffee. Total—1,511 calories. No dessert, please!

How about Sunday morning breakfast at McDonalds? A serving of Egg McMuffin and sausage is 547 calories. And if eggs aren't your style, maybe a dozen Dunkin Donuts would suit you. But before you go mixing and matching, realize that the average yeast-raised, fruit-filled delight checks in at 200 calories, and the dozen adds up to 2,400 calories.

Even if calorie consciousness is all you care about, there is no need to completely avoid the chains. Just take a little willpower with you to the order counter. There are alternatives and ways of cutting down.

For example, Burger Chef can be a real bonanza for the dieter. Instead of ordering a Big Chef, fries and shake at 1,065 calories, order a hamburger, pile it high with lettuce, pickles and tomatoes from the "works bar," order a sugarfree drink, and you've saved yourself 825 calories.

Right now, Burger Chef is the only hamburger franchise offering a complete salad bar. If you have the willpower, order a salad and coffee and leave the burgers to the kids. But be careful. The dressing demands dis-

cretion. If you're on a diet, use the dressing sparingly.

(A side note. Burger Chef is revamping both food and service. A public relations official told me plans currently do not include a diet dressing. But if the demand were great enough, of course, it would be implemented. Maybe Burger Chef is missing the boat by not being the first to offer one. For a company saying they want to start writing some of the rules, here's their chance.)

WHAT IF YOU just have to have an ice cream cone at day's end?

If the local Dairy Queen suits you, a small cone is 110 calories, while the large at 340. But if you've saved those 825 calories, you can afford a small cone.

A Baskin-Robbins one-scoop is between 133 and 148 calories. Don't be misled by the popular myth that a sherbet or ice has fewer calories. One scoop is 139.

Taco Bell for ethnic appetites presents a bill of fare including their taco at only 146 calories. That's great if just one taco satisfies you. Heartier appetites commonly require two or three at a time.

Still have a hankerin' for donuts Sunday morning? Consider Dunkin Donuts

Munchkins. They will probably satisfy your sweet tooth just as easily as a full-sized donut. And at 26 calories per Munchkin, they are sure to satisfy your waistline.

And what about Wendy's? What will they offer Plymouth residents when they welcome your hopefully open mouths with open arms? Can they meet a dieter's challenge? That remains to be seen. The Wendy's spokesman could not be reached for comment as he wasn't interested in talking about diet on their menu at this time. Does this tell you that their extra juicy burger is more calories than they care to talk about?

A final note. If you are a fast food addict, you can be assured that an enterprising nutritionist has devised a fast food diet just for you. He is Dr. Howard Appleford, a nutritionist and biochemist at the University of Florida in Gainesville. His special diet (he's an admitted junk-food junkie) is designed for men to will lose about three pounds a week, women about a pound and a half.

The clue to success is, in Dr. Appleford's words, "The important thing is that if the caloric level is low enough, you can lose weight."

And then there's Big Boy, Arby's, H-Salt, Friendly's and...

MONEY SAVING TIPS FROM STORE TO STORAGE

PROPER FOOD STORAGE in the home is an important factor in preserving food quality and controlling food costs.

FOOD CAN BE stored at room, refrigerator or freezer temperature, depending on the requirements of the particular food. Below are some tips for all three types of storage.

SHELF-STABLE PRODUCTS:

SHELF-STABLE FOODS such as boxed cereals, canned goods, candy and snacks require the least attention. They should, however, be stored in a cool, dry area. Packages should be carefully resealed after opening. Canned goods should be rotated often so the oldest items are used first. Check labels for special storage instructions.

REFRIGERATOR STORAGE:

REFRIGERATOR TEMPERATURES should be maintained at 34° to 40° F.

ALL MEIJER MEAT can be stored in the original wrapper.

DAIRY PRODUCTS (such as milk, cheese, eggs, yogurt and butter) should be refrigerated in their original wrapper or carton. After using, they should be tightly covered or placed in vapor-proof wrap.

AFTER OPENING, shelf-stable products such as mayonnaise, salad dressing, jellies, meats and process cheese products in loaves and jars should be refrigerated in tightly covered containers or vapor proof wrap.

DAMAGED or spotted leaves should be removed from salad greens before they are placed in the refrigerator.

FREEZER STORAGE:

FREEZER TEMPERATURES should be maintained at 0° F or lower.

ALL FROZEN FOODS should be labeled and dated. Packages should then be rotated so the newest is always at the back of the freezer; oldest should be used first.

MEAT, POULTRY AND FISH should be wrapped and sealed in vapor-proof wrap if they will be stored in the freezer for more than 2-3 weeks.

ALL FREEZER WRAPS and containers should be vapor proof, odorless, tasteless and greaseproof. They should be able to withstand tears and punctures.

FOODS such as mayonnaise and salad dressing or mixtures made with these products should not be frozen.
