## Save Canton farms?

### Interest spans state

Farmers and environmentalists across the state will be watching Canton next Tuesday, Nov. 7 for the results of a ballot proposal that would protect agricultural land from development.

The proposal asks voters to increase the township tax rate by up to four mills (\$4 per \$1,000 assessed valuation) to finance the public purchase of farmers' development rights.

If the proposal passes, Canton will launch a farmland preservation program that has never been tried anywhere in the state. Similar programs have been implemented in New Jersey and Suffolk County, New York.

ROBERT PADGET, chairman of the township's farmland education committee, said officials across the state have contacted his group about the program.

The education committee has sponsored presentations before Gov. William Milliken's staff, the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG), Michigan State University's Institute for Community Development, the Washtenaw County Planning Commission and other agencies.

The committee was formed to educate Canton residents on the ramifications of the proposed program.

"There is a great deal of concern on the local and state level regarding the preservation of agricultural land," Padget said. "We're in the forefront of this thing, and it's creating a whale of an interest."

Under the proposal, the owners of some 5,000 acres of agricultural land west of Canton Center Road will be asked to sell their development rights to the township.

Landowners who enroll in the program will retain all property rights except the right to develop their land for commercial, industrial or heavy residential use.

Two teams of surveyors will determine the price farmers will receive for their development rights. One team will determine the agricultural value of the land; the other will determine the potential, developed value. The difference between the two appraisals will represent the development rights price tag.

Farmers will pay less taxes on their land if the development rights program is approved. Farmland in Canton is currently taxed for its potential, developed value. Under the program, the land will be taxed for its agricultural value.

A \$40,000 study conducted by the Seidman & Seidman accounting firm

and Wade, Trim planning consultants has concluded that township taxpayers will pay less money over the long run if the development rights program is adopted.

The study compared the estimated \$16 million cost of purchasing farmers' development rights to the cost of providing municipal services to the land if it is developed.

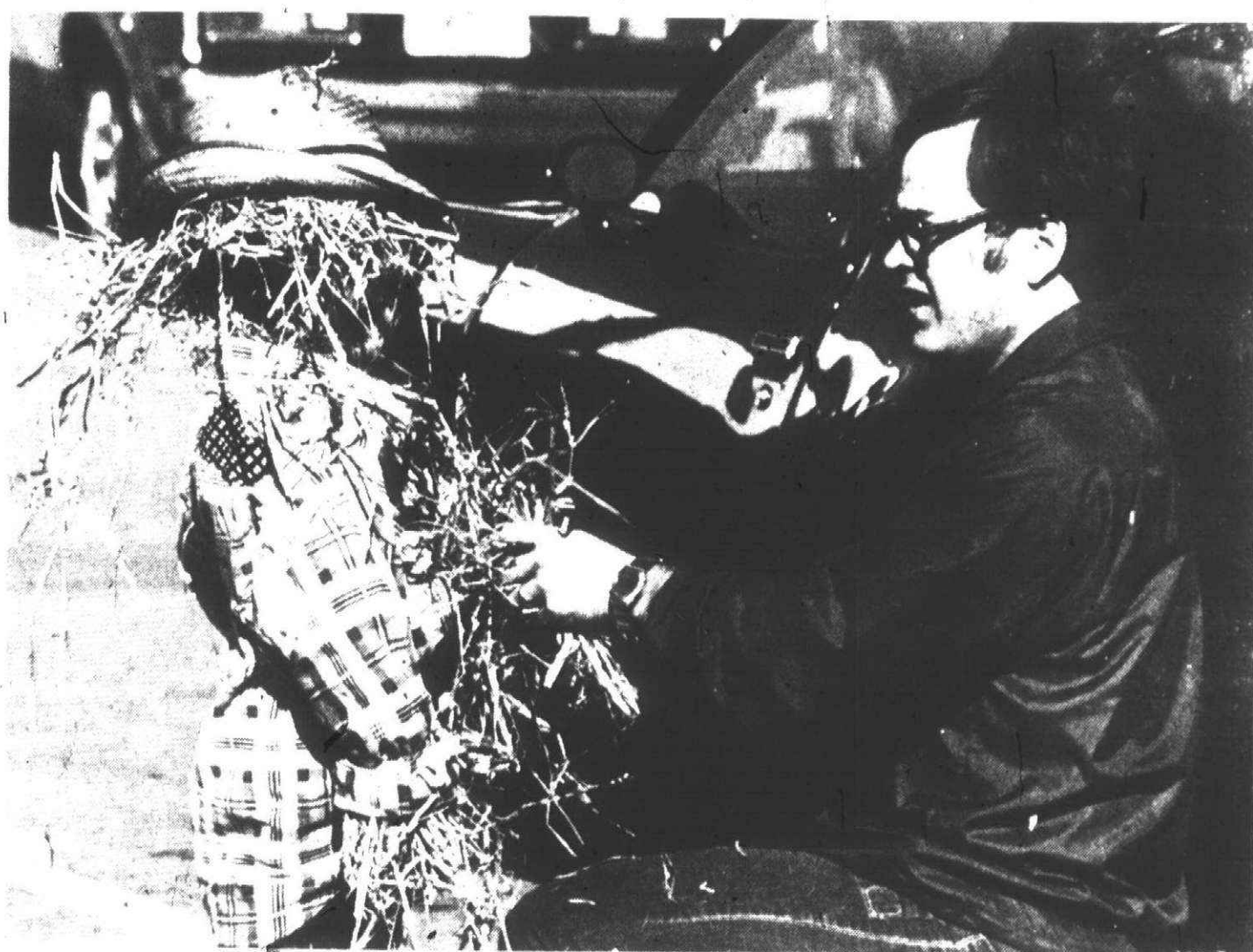
If the program is approved by Canton voters next week, an additional four mills will be levied from 1979-1989. Finance director Mike Gorman figures the development rights tax rate could be reduced to three mills from 1990 to 1992, two mills from 1993 to 1996, one mill in 1997 and a half mill in 1998. No taxes would be levied for the development rights program after 1998.

The owner of a \$60,000 home assessed at \$30,000 would pay \$120 in additional taxes next year if the program is approved.

THE TAX RATES Gorman has projected over the next 20 years are based on paying 6 1/2 per cent interest on general obligation bonds.

Gorman said Robert Mitchell, director of the Michigan Farmers Home Administration, told township officials

## Club flyer stirs election stew

The Canton Township campaign heated to boiling with a new flyer from the United Democratic Club (UDC) of Canton and a lawsuit against the UDC from the persons it attacked.

Three candidates for the township board Wednesday filed a libel suit against Supervisor Harold Stein and other officers of the UDC.

The plaintiffs alleged they were damaged by the two political flyers circulated by the club.

Plaintiffs are Democratic supervisor candidate Noel Culbert, Republican treasurer candidate James

Donahue, and Democratic trustee candidate Robert Greenstein.

Their attorney, Dan Felean, filed the suit in Wayne Circuit Court one day after the latest UDC flyer hit the streets. The suit asks damages of \$1 million.

BESIDES STEIN, defendants are: Norma Stein, his wife; township treasurer Anne Bradley; and George Bradley, her husband, all officers of the UDC. Stein and Mrs. Bradley are running as write-in candidates after their defeats in the Aug. 8 Democratic primary.

One flyer named in the suit was distributed the week of Oct. 16. With a cartoon of a skunk and the caption, "Ohhh, you little stinker," it attacked Culbert, claiming he falsified campaign records. It alleged Canton Eagle reporter Carrie Young was serving as Culbert's campaign manager.

The flyer charged treasurer candidate Maria Falkiewicz, who was not a co-plaintiff as of Wednesday morning, with "voting only once during the five years she has lived in Canton."

The flyer was signed by "Concerned Citizens of Canton" and not the UDC.

Culbert told the Observer he discovered the flyer's printing was paid for by Lori Roberts, wife of Republican trustee candidate Gary Roberts. Roberts has been endorsed by the UDC.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts deny involvement with the flyer.

THE SECOND flyer, which spurred the suit, was mailed to Canton homes this week.

It featured caricatures of Robert Greenstein and all other candidates for Canton offices except Stein, Mrs. Bradley and Roberts.

Greenstein is depicted holding a puppeteer's strings controlling Republican and Democratic candidates alike. Each candidate has a list of charges printed beneath the cartoons.

Under Greenstein's picture, the flyer states: "Insinuated threat to opposition's children if he continues to campaign against him."

The flyer said Greenstein "stated mobile homeowners are trailer trash and senior citizens are ghetto dwellers."

The "trailer trash" statement stems from a letter distributed to mobile homeowners during the 1976 election. It was attributed to former planning commissioner Thomas Timbario, but police found later the signature was forged. Trustee Robert Myers told the Observer he had been involved in distribution of the 1976 letter, but said Stein is responsible for redistributing that letter to mobile home parks during the current campaign.

GREENSTEIN SAID the comment

## Roberts gets nod

### Dems favor GOP's man

It's not often that a Republican candidate wins an endorsement from an arm of the Democratic Party.

But Gary Roberts, Republican candidate for township trustee, won the rare honor two weeks ago when the United Democratic Club of Canton unanimously voted to endorse his campaign.

The club is officially recognized by the 15th Congressional District Democratic Party.

The Republican endorsement promises to place the club in hot water with Democratic Party officials.

GEORGE BRADLEY, president of

the club and husband of Treasurer Anne Bradley, said the organization voted to endorse Roberts "because his philosophy and programs are what the Democratic Club wanted."

The club has also endorsed the write-in campaigns of Democratic Supervisor Harold Stein and Democratic Treasurer Bradley.

Roberts, a vocal critic of the Stein administration before the August primary, has now sided with Stein and Mrs. Bradley for the general election.

The Republican candidate is only one contender in the three-way race for two trustee positions. The other two candidates — Robert Greenstein

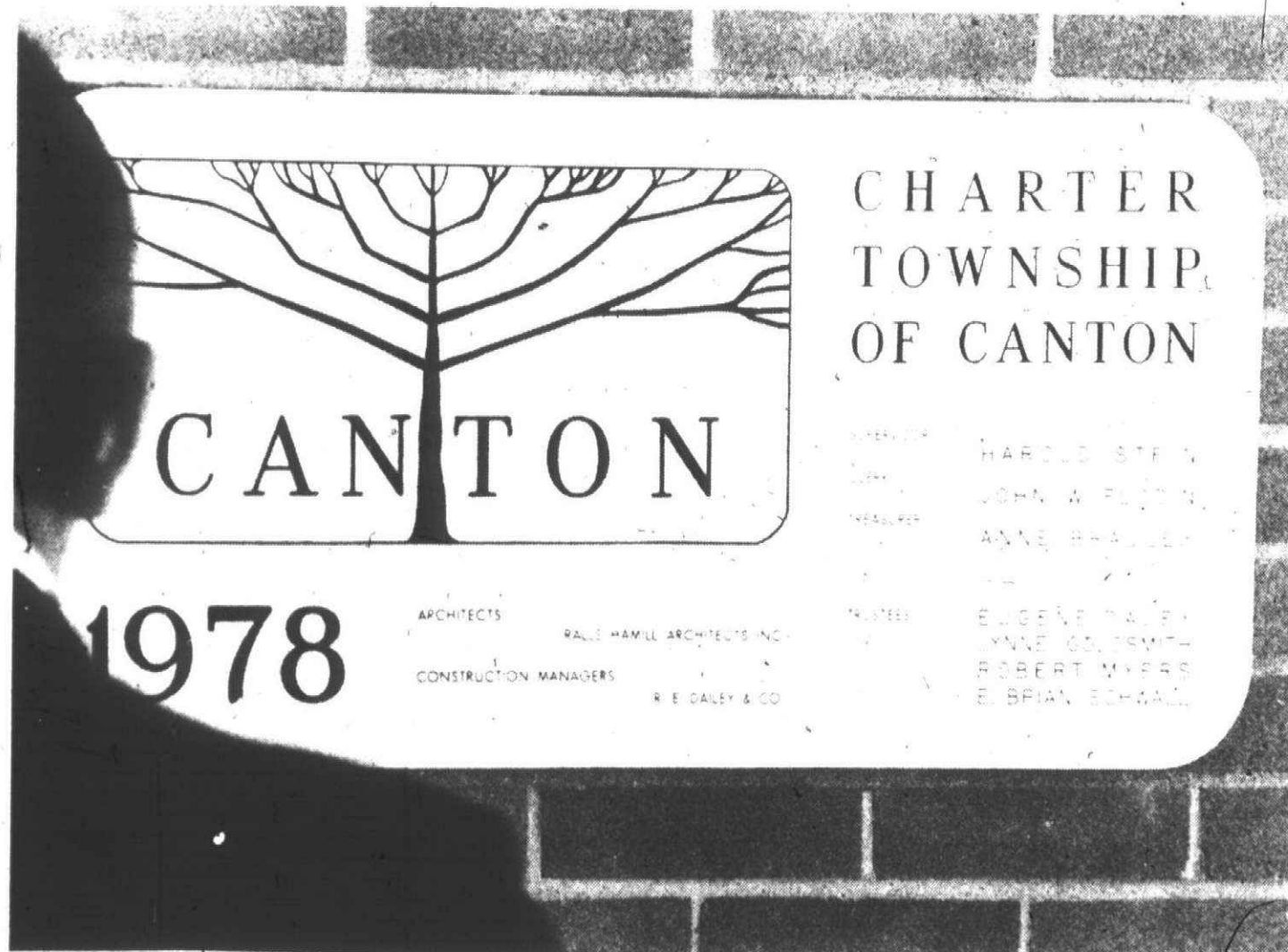
and Carol Bodenmiller — are both Democrats.

Vincent Pettipren, chairman of the 15th Congressional District Democratic Party, expressed shock over the club's endorsement.

He said the party would probably revoke its recognition of the Canton club.

"This is an unprecedented thing," Pettipren said of the Republican endorsement. "I think this is very serious. A Democratic organization is recognized provided it supports the philosophies of the Democratic Party and promotes its goals."

## School bus drivers outraged over physical threat of student

A female student who physically threatened a bus driver prompted an angry letter district officials from the majority of Plymouth-Canton bus drivers this week.

More than half of the district's nearly 100 drivers signed the letter, announcing that students who threaten bus drivers with physical abuse no longer will be allowed on their buses.

School district officials, however, believe the drivers are attempting to take on responsibility that belongs with building principals.

Maureen Vitoratos, spokeswoman for the Transportation Employees Association, admits that the letter itself is insubordination. But she feels the letter is the drivers' only recourse. She has been a bus driver here for two years.

"It's unbelievable what you have to go through and drive at the same time," she maintains. The letter was prompted by an incident involving a Plymouth Salem High student who threatened a bus driver. The female student was suspended from school for a week; however the drivers feel further disciplinary action is required.

"WE DON'T have any say in it," Ms. Vitoratos says. A bus driver

makes a referral to the building principal when a student's actions require it. The responsibility for any discipline then rests with the principal. But the drivers want that changed. "We are paid for the responsibility that we partake, but we are not paid to

have our lives and physical well-being threatened," the letter states.

"Whenever any student feels that he or she can threaten us with a minimal amount of punishment, then we are no

# Grates leaves recreation job

Why does a public employee leave municipal work for the private sector? A greater chance for advancement and more money, in the case of Hank Grates, Plymouth's recreation supervisor for the past two years.

But while the city will have to go through replacement procedures, Grates' departure is a good example of how federal job training is supposed to work, says Parks and Recreation Director Chuck Skene.

An employee paid under Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) funds, Grates has added on-the-job training to his educational background in recreation. Now, he's moving into a job with Sports Illustrated Racquet Clubs as an assistant manager at the Belleville club.

"We got a tremendous employee and he got the experience," is how Skene sums up Grates' CETA-funded job. "I don't really expect to keep anyone around for more than two years."

Grates, however, has mixed feelings about the move. With the city he was paid about \$10,300 annually—and the move means a better salary.

But most importantly, he'll have a chance to advance, he explains.

"Sports Illustrated is a young, progressive company, and I feel I will be recognized for my achievements," Grates says.

At 29, with a bachelor's degree in recreation from Eastern Michigan University and a recently earned MA in recreation administration from Central Michigan University, he's ready to make the plunge.

"I've paid my dues and doubt that it would lead to something better in the city—that's why I have to make a change."

"CETA is designed to give you a start, give you marketable skills," he adds—and working with the city he has made many contacts, handled publicity and set up programs—the kind of work he always wanted.

With a strong interest in competitive athletics, particularly hockey, he considered a sports related career after graduation from Bentley High in Livonia.

"How can I turn this around to make money for me?" he asked himself. Recreation studies were the answer. With leisure time awareness and an interest in participatory athletics "growing by leaps and bounds," he thinks he made a good decision.

Now at Sports Illustrated, he'll be paying dues again, working afternoons and weekends as an assistant man-

ager, hopefully to become a club manager in the near future.

"It's similar to the city job—you work until you accomplish the task."

Public recreation, however, may have a difficult road ahead, he predicts. He sees more self-supporting programs with higher fees that cover costs, particularly if voters approve tax-cutting proposals.

Recreation is an easy way to slice the pie thinner, he agrees.

"But what do we get for nothing?" he asks. Only those who can afford it will be able to take advantage of what's offered, if government programs must be self-supporting, he says.

In the Plymouth-Canton area, recreational employees have worked hard to avoid duplication of services, he says.

"Everybody's program suffers if we don't," he explains.

Now in the private sector, the state of the economy directly affects the financial health of recreational clubs. Leisure time and more money to spend promotes a boom time.

But as a bachelor with mobility, he's willing to go where his skills are required—with a definite eye on the southern California area.

In public recreation, "you're a social worker, a glorified babysitter—you do everything."

Now he's prepared to put his management skills to work.

# Research group rates lawmakers

Five lawmakers representing Plymouth and Canton residents have received relatively high ratings from the Public Interest Research Group in Michigan (PIRGIM).

Scoring high were U.S. Reps. William D. Ford (D-Taylor), whose district includes Canton, Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), State Sen. William Faust (D-Westland), who represents Canton, State Sen. Robert Geake (R-Northville), whose district includes Plymouth, and State Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ann Arbor) whose district includes Plymouth.

The third bi-annual legislative scorecard of Michigan's political representative analyzed a number of key votes on consumer, good government, environmental and human rights issues.

IN THE PIRGIM rating of the Michigan congressional delegation, Pursell received a 67 per cent score—the highest rating for a Republican congressman from Michigan.

The 67 per cent surpassed or equal-

led ratings received by five Michigan Democrats. U.S. Rep. John Conyers (D-Detroit) received the highest score with 92 per cent.

Legislation Pursell supported which led to the 67 per cent rating included the Consumer Protection Agency; co-sponsorship of the National Bottle Bill; a strong Alaskan Lands Protection bill; withdrawal of a congressional pay raise; and legislation to establish a program to help curb domestic violence. Pursell was the only Michigan Republican to support the Consumer Protection Agency.

Rep. Ford of the 15th District received a rating of 62 per cent. Ford supported legislation for the Consumer Protection Agency, for improving environmental controls on offshore oil development, voted in favor of Alaska lands conservation, and voted for spouse abuse legislation to help curb domestic violence.

The low scorers among Michigan congressmen were Broomfield and

Cederberg—each with a rating of 15 per cent.

ON STATE ISSUES, PIRGIM analyzed 13 key votes in the Michigan Senate. The highest score granted was 85 per cent.

Geake, with a 46 per cent score, received the highest score of any senate Republican. Notable legislation Geake supported included the toxic emergencies bill; a discharge motion on the land use bill and a ban on the dumping of nuclear waste in the state.

Faust scored a relatively high 69 per cent for backing legislation such as the auto lemon bill, a bill to lower the allowable level of PBB, the toxic emergencies bill, nuclear waste disposal ban, lobby reform bill and the campaign financing bill.

Senators scoring highest with 85 per cent were Hertel and Corbin.

IN THE MICHIGAN House, 16 issues were included in the scorecard and James Barcia of Bay City scored

highest at 93 per cent.

Smith scored 36 per cent and Brown scored 40 per cent. Both received low scores on good government and human rights legislative votes.

Issues state representatives were rated on included lowering the allowable level of PBB in Michigan meat, closing the "revolving door" between the utilities and their regulators, and the auto lemon bill which strengthens customer rights in dealing with a bad product.

PIRGIM does not support or oppose candidates for elective office but attempts to facilitate citizen awareness of the performance of their lawmakers.

PIRGIM is a group of university students and social-action professionals who finance and direct a eight-member staff of full-time researchers, lobbyists, organizers and a lawyer to work on investigative reports, public education, legislative lobbying and lawsuits.

# They want to be township board trustees

## Carol Bodenmiller

Carol Bodenmiller, Democratic candidate for trustee, thinks Canton's administration is "playing a game without any rules" because no master plan for land use has been instituted.

She hopes to change all that if she is elected.

Mrs. Bodenmiller's solution involves hiring a growth control expert to work on actually carrying out master plan objectives.

She says an expert of this kind could also help Canton find different approaches to the farmland preservation issue, if voters choose not to pass a request for up to four mills on the November ballot that would pay for such a program.

Carol Bodenmiller has come a long way from the days of sitting in the audience at township board meetings.

"When I decided to run, I didn't care for what was happening (on the board)."

"But I wouldn't have run if I hadn't had the complete support of my husband. You have to have a home base."

Mrs. Bodenmiller's personal campaign has been remarkably free of the kind of mudslinging other candidates are either throwing or receiving.

Nonetheless, she is running under a cloud. Critics say Mrs. Bodenmiller is actually running on a slate with trustee candidate Robert Greenstein and treasurer candidate James Donahue.

Her ability to make independent judgments without being dominated by Greenstein is also being questioned.

She calls the accusations "nonsense." "Many people (including Greenstein and Donahue) have offered me help in dealing with the technicalities of running for office. But this isn't a coalition."

She does seem to have some definite ideas on Canton issues. Although she supports the farmland preservation millage question, she believes the entire four mills won't be necessary because federal and state aid could be solicited. She believes in master plans.

Her concerns about the land use question tend to parallel those of Greenstein. She agrees with the former supervisor that Canton is purchasing too much property.

Unlike Greenstein, she seems more interested in trying to achieve her goals without angering people. She says she understands the different groups in Canton, because she grew up dealing with all kinds of people.

"I grew up in a rural community, but my family was also in business. I've worked at many, many kinds of jobs in my life, which brought me in contact with many, many people."

"I hope to see both sides of an issue, then reach a compromise."

She believes a trustee should be a liaison.

She does not believe a trustee should try to be an expert on every subject.

"You have to go to people who are experts, then draw conclusions. You have to be able to look at the total picture."

She says she believes the things she stands for represent the feelings of the majority of the people in Canton. "The problems might be in the way of implementing programs," Mrs. Bodenmiller says.

Although she won't call herself a member of any slate, she says "an intelligent group of people is running for office."

"They are people who are successful on their own, so I believe they can be successful representing the people."

Mrs. Bodenmiller considers her self a success as well, because "I feel I've always done the best I can do."

And, in her view, doing the best she can do involves letting her conscience be her guide.

"I couldn't only listen to what people who come to township board meetings want. I have to think what is in my own conscience."

"If I can go to bed at night and sleep—if I haven't hurt someone or belittled someone—I'll know I've made the right decision."

## Gary Roberts

The most startling aspect of Gary Roberts' campaign for township trustee is his sudden admiration for Supervisor Harold Stein.

Before the primary, the Republican candidate loudly criticized Stein and the present administration for taking a soft stand with builders and a do-nothing stance on growth control.

At the time, Roberts supported Democrat Noel Culbert's bid for the supervisor's chair. Now, Roberts has sided with Stein and Treasurer Anne Bradley in the political arena.

Roberts is the only Republican candidate in the three-way race for two trustee positions. Stein and Mrs. Bradley both lost the Democratic primary and are now seeking re-election through a write-in campaign.

"I CAME TO FIND out that Harold (Stein) didn't have all the power I thought he had," Roberts said of his opposition to Stein on the building issue.

"I still have my differences with Harold Stein. But I'm supporting him."

Roberts said he decided to withdraw his support from Culbert because he disapproved of the supervisor candidate's campaign tactics.

Before the primary, Roberts blasted Stein at numerous township board meetings for failing to help homeowners with their building complaints. The homeowners complained of building defects never repaired by builders and the excessive amount of time some builders were taking to complete new homes.

Roberts is now praising Stein for the way he handled homeowners' complaints. He notes that Stein established the first mandatory home warranty plan in Michigan and forced builders to clean up streets dirtied by construction work.

"I blamed Harold Stein for the non-action in the building department," Roberts said in a recent campaign flyer. "After further investigation, I have since found that Harold Stein has done more for the homeowner of Canton than any other supervisor in the history of Canton."

Roberts still sees the building problem as the most important issue in Canton.

If elected trustee, Roberts said he would put pressure on builders by informing the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulations of every building complaint submitted by homeowners.

He would research the legality of legislation that would require builders to put occupancy dates in writing.

"Let the builders know we really need business," Roberts said.

THE 33-YEAR-OLD candidate insists, however, that the building problem is not the only issue he wants to tackle as trustee.

He believes the township's rapid rate of growth is a major problem and favors a moratorium on new subdivision plat approvals.

He believes the township board should work more closely with the boards of Canton's three school districts and schedule regular meetings to discuss joint problems.

Roberts said he will vote against the farmland preservation proposal that will appear on next week's ballot. He believes the program will end up costing more than the four mills (\$4 per \$1,000 assessed valuation) that are being requested.

He favors public purchase of some farmland for recreational use as a way to preserve open spaces.

Roberts' wife is the owner of Canton Vacuum and Sew on Ford Road. The trustee candidate businesses need the sign ordinance proposed by the Canton Planning Commission.

Unlike the current ordinance that prohibits all freestanding signs, the proposed law would allow businesses to erect signs that are not attached to buildings.

Roberts moved to Canton's Sunflower Village Subdivision three years ago after living in California for 13 years. In California, Roberts owned five vacuum cleaner stores.

Roberts recently quit his job as personnel director at Concor Management Co. to work at the store his wife owns in Canton Township.

## Robert Greenstein

There are two phrases almost anyone who has ever met Democratic trustee candidate Robert Greenstein can agree to.

You are either one of his biggest fans or worst enemies.

No matter how you feel about him, you have to admit the man is intelligent.

Greenstein is not the type of person who inspires lukewarm sentiments, probably because he seems to do everything with a single-minded intensity that leaves little room for compromise.

That trait was probably one of the deciding factors to bring about his defeat to Harold Stein in the 1976 supervisor's race.

Now, in spite of his claim that he is a "lousy politician," Greenstein is back to make a bid for the job of trustee.

He says he is running for office again because he feels Canton is going in the wrong direction.

In his view the two most important issues in Canton are "farmland preservation and the township's over-buying of property."

It comes as no surprise that Greenstein feels strongly about farmland preservation. He developed the original idea.

In fact, he calls the proposal to purchase development rights in order to maintain farmlands "my baby."

He doesn't like the way the proposal has gone on the Nov. 7 ballot asking for four mills, saying the wording was an effort by the present administration to insure the proposal doesn't get passed.

GREENSTEIN SAYS he prefers to see more emphasis on getting state and federal aid to institute the program.

The candidate says when he was primarily responsible for creating the development rights purchase concept during his years as supervisor, considerable interest had been expressed by state and federal legislators.

The whole thing was dropped, though," he says.

Greenstein's second charge is that he believes the township is getting into the real estate market.

He is especially vehement about the recent purchase of the Fellows Creek Golf course, which cost the township more than 2 million dollars.

The golf course supposedly turned a profit of \$35,000 the first year it was run by the township.

Stein doesn't mention that department of public works employees were over there doing a lot of the maintenance, and that the place needs a

whole new sprinklers system," Greenstein charges.

"That land should be sold, but I bet we can't even get what we pay for it," Greenstein says the extensive land purchases made by the township during the last year could cause serious problems if the Tisch amendment is passed.

"If Tisch passes," he says emphatically, "Canton will be bankrupt."

The trustee candidate has also taken strong stands on what he calls a "lax attitude by the current administration toward homeowner complaints."

Greenstein thinks some kind of tax cut measures are necessary, but isn't convinced either the Headlee or Tisch proposals would be "the right way to do it."

The candidate has been accused of controlling the township board during his years as supervisor. Indeed, many of the programs begun during his administration were developed by him and got the township board's majority vote.

He maintains that it wasn't because he controlled anyone, and says he couldn't control any of the potential board members now running for office.

Greenstein has been closely associated with treasurer candidate James Donahue, and skeptics claim the two, along with trustee candidate Carol Bodenmiller, are running on a disguised slate.

"It's ridiculous," he insists. "I don't control anybody running for office."

He admits that he seldom makes any attempt to soothe ruffled feathers of people he might offend.

"I don't see any reason to be the greatest-loved man in the world. There's no advantage to it."

## The Flip Side by craig piechura



A woman who calls people up on the phone all day and asks them survey questions called me the other night.

She was doing a survey for a sports equipment company and wanted to know if I owned a racquetball warm-up outfit or a pair of specially-made racquetball shoes. What brand sportswear did I sport on the court and did I read Racquetball World?

Boy, did she get a wrong number.

I participated in the survey because I often call people on the phone in this business and ask them questions they don't care to answer. I told her my racquetball attire is simple, but oh, so smart.

My sports ensemble usually consists of an old sweatband, a T-shirt promoting some bar and a pair of cut-offs shorts. The look is topped off, or bottomed off, with a dirty pair of Jack Purcell sneakers.

Next, she wanted to know whether I had a steel or an aluminum racquet, how many years ago I bought it and how much it cost. I told the survey lady it was a wooden racquet that I bought for \$8 five years ago during the brief period I was a member of the Jewish Community Center. The club used to be on Myers in Detroit but has since relocated in West Bloomfield.

WHILE THE LOCATION of the Jewish Community Center has changed, its exclusionary membership practices haven't.

Ironically, non-Jews are not permitted to join the club. While the reverse is sometimes true, at this club you're barred if you've never had a Bar-Mitzvah.

Shirley Baruch, membership director at the West Bloomfield headquarters of the Jewish Community Center, told me Friday that I would not be sent a membership application because I am "not of the Jewish faith." The best they could offer me was to visit the club a maximum of four times in one year as the guest of a Jewish member.

The same thing happened five years ago at the Detroit center. When they found out I was a non-Jew, they threw me out by the skin of my teeth. Well, not exactly my teeth. They let me keep the racquet, though, which has served me well.

If I had had the foresight of an Allen Baake I could've been at the forefront of a classic reverse discrimination suit. But I didn't make a stink about it because I couldn't keep from laughing about the absurdity of the whole affair. Jews have fought for years to gain entrance to WASP-y country clubs and here I am trying to pass myself off as a Jew and am discovered.

I GOT A CALL at work from a woman who identified herself as a member of the board of directors of the Jewish Community Center. I'd joined the club two months before with some of my friends who used to work at the Community News, an east side weekly. I was not the only non-Jew who signed up, but for some reason my name didn't look kosher on the membership roster.

She called me up at the Community News to investigate my membership.

"Mr. Piechura, this is the Jewish Community Center calling," said the no-nonsense voice on the other end of the line.

"In checking our new members, we came upon your name and we were wondering if you are Jewish. This is a private club for Jewish people. Are you aware of that?"

I tried to lie and did a bad job of it. Being a Jew, of course I knew it was an exclusive club and I swore I was telling the truth.

"Well, Piechura doesn't sound like a Jewish name," she probed.

I told her that was because my father isn't Jewish but my mother and all the children are.

"And what congregation does your mother belong to, Mr. Piechura?"

"Well, she's not what I'd call a practicing Jew," I said lamely. Fair enough, said my interrogator, then what synagogue did I regularly attend?

I told her that I wasn't actually a practicing Jew either.

"SO WHAT MAKES you Jewish, Mr. Piechura?"

I went off on an intellectual tangent about how that question has plagued people over the ages. You know, the old argument about whether Judaism is a nationality, a religion or a race or none of the above.

She wasn't buying. I lost control at this point, and started laughing at what I was telling this lady.

"Why are you laughing Mr. Piechura?" she said. "Is it because you are not Jewish?"

That's correct, I said, and then regained my composure to change my tone to one of righteous indignation. I told the woman she could expect to hear from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). She said she wasn't worried. I never called the ACLU.

But the exodus is over. I'm going back to the site of the old Jewish Community Center. It's now called the Cosmopolitan Club at the Northwest Activities Center. It costs \$75 a year to join and the only requirement is you be a resident of Detroit.

You don't need a Jewish name to play there. In fact, you don't even need a special warm-up outfit or a pair of specially-made racquetball shoes.

last week, however, that his agency may offer a lower interest rate of five per cent on the bond purchase.

"That would probably save us a couple million dollars," Gorman said.

Also on next Tuesday's ballot is the Tisch tax cut amendment which proposes to tax property at 25 per cent of market value rather than 50 per cent.

If both Tisch and the agricultural land proposals are approved, township officials may be forced to ask voters for additional millage to support the latter.

"Tisch would reduce assessed valuations by one-half, so revenues to the program would be cut in half," said Padgett. "That would leave an inadequate level of funding for the program."

## Headlee Proposal Supported

Back in 1974 State Senator Bob Geake was one of the founding members of Taxpayers United, a group of citizens from throughout the state determined to work together to bring the state's mushrooming bureaucracy under control by limiting the spending and the taxes which feed it. In 1977 Senator Geake became one of the charter members of the organization's Legislator's Advisory Committee to

support the Tax Limitation petition drive. The drive made history this summer by collecting enough signatures to place Michigan's first comprehensive tax limitation proposal on the ballot. The sudden popularity of tax limitation among the citizens has caused many politicians and government officials to join this cause for which Senator Geake has provided leadership from the very beginning.

## KADISH SAYS "YES" TO GAS TAX HIKE

Paul Kadish, Democratic candidate for state senator, announced that he favors the 2 cent increase in the state gasoline tax, and would have voted "Yes" had he been in the senate last month. Speaking at a candidate's debate before the Livonia Chamber of Commerce, Kadish cited the need for improved mass transit programs in the area.

The remark came in response to a question from the audience aimed at Kadish and his Republican opponent, Senator Robert Geake. Geake voted against the gas tax increase, as well as the thirty-three percent increase in license plate fees. Despite Senator Geake's "No" vote, however, the bills managed to clear the State Senate by a narrow margin.

"It is incomprehensible to me that, in light of the tax limitation movement in our state and nation, my opponent could be in favor of increasing fuel taxes and license plate fees at this time," Senator Geake asserted. "This just indicates to me that some candidates for public office are simply not in tune with what the people of Michigan really want."

Senator Geake has been a leading advocate of tax limitation since 1974 when he helped found Taxpayers United for Tax Limitation, the organization which circulated the petitions placing the Headlee Tax Limitation Proposal on the November ballot in Michigan. He presently serves on the organization's legislative advisory committee.

Senator Geake acknowledged that road improvements are needed on Michigan roads, but said that he could not, in good conscience, vote for new taxes to fund these improvements when his constituents clearly want tax decreases, not increases.

"My people come first," Senator Geake declared. "And, what they have been telling me all along is that they do not want any more taxes."

The bills which Senator Geake opposed and Mr. Kadish favored raise from 9 to 11 cents per gallon the state's gasoline tax and from 7 to 9 cents per gallon the diesel fuel tax, effective January 1st, and increase vehicle weight taxes by 30 to 35 percent, effective with purchase of 1979 license plates.

## Eleven Proposals Face Voters Tuesday

When voters go to the polls November 7th, they will be asked not only to select those candidates they want to represent them, but also to decide the fate of 11 ballot proposals.

Since these proposals are of important consequence to public policy in our state, it is crucial that the voters decide to vote "yes" or "no" on each of them be based upon a thorough knowledge of their content and purpose. The eleven proposals are as follows:

**A: CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION**  
At Issue: Whether a constitutional convention should be called to draft a new State Constitution.

**Explanation:** Article XII, Section 2, of our current State Constitution, which was adopted by the electorate in 1963, requires this issue to be put to a vote of the people on the 1978 general election ballot and every 16 years thereafter. Thus, Proposal A was automatically guaranteed a spot on this November's ballot.

**Impact:** If Proposal A is approved by the voters, a special election must be held within six months to choose 148 delegates. The convention would begin in Lansing no later than October, 1979. When completed, the new Constitution would be submitted to the voters at least 90 days following adjournment of the convention.

**B: RESTRICTED PAROLE**  
At Issue: Whether felons convicted of violent crimes should be forced to serve minimum sentences by the courts.

**Explanation:** Proposal B would amend state law to require felons convicted of crimes of violence in Michigan to serve at least their minimum

sentences before they could become eligible for parole. Crimes of violence would include murder, armed robbery, rape, kidnapping, or any other serious felony where a citizen is injured or the potential for injury existed.

Under current state law, persons convicted of violent criminal activity are given both a minimum and maximum sentence. Minimum sentences may be reduced at the discretion of the parole board, however, based on a formula which allows "time off for good behavior."

**Impact:** Voter approval of Proposal B would result in the elimination of early parole for those convicted of violent criminal activities. An affirmative vote on this parole proposition would also likely result in the need for additional prison space to house those felons convicted of serious crimes. This law would take effect 10 days after the date of the official declaration of the vote.

**C: INVESTMENT OF PUBLIC FUNDS**

At Issue: Whether the state should be allowed to invest and deposit public funds in any type of state or federally chartered financial institution.

**Explanation:** Proposal C would amend the State Constitution to permit the investment and deposit of public funds, other than retirement or endowment monies, in state or federally chartered banks, savings and loan institutions, or credit unions. The Constitution currently limits such investments and deposits solely to banks.

**Impact:** If approved, Proposal C would allow, but not mandate, the

## Crackdown on Crime Demanded

Recognizing that crime has become one of our state's most crucial problems, State Senator Bob Geake has called upon fellow legislators to enact stiff crime control measures.

"In conversations with citizens throughout the communities in my district, crime was repeatedly brought up as a severe problem which demands the prompt attention of the Legislature," Geake noted.

Geake is a six year veteran of the State Legislature and a resident of Northville.

"The people of our state, the people who live in suburban and rural areas as well as the inner-cities, have been forced to cope with crime on nearly a daily basis," Geake pointed out. "It has come to where those who willingly obey the law must adjust their lifestyles to avoid contact with those who just as willingly disregard the law."

Geake said he favors stricter sentencing procedures designed to assure would-be criminals that their illegal actions will not go unpunished.

"We need to enact laws which let criminals know that if they break the law, they are going to spend time behind bars where they belong and not be allowed to prey upon our law-abiding citizens any longer," Geake said. "The chances are simply too great now that criminals can get by with just a reprimand and they know it."

"The mandatory sentencing laws we passed last year which guarantee a two-year prison term for any felony involving the use of a gun was a step in the right direction," he said. "It was just one of the many steps, however, that need to be taken."

"The citizens of our state have a right to safety and a right to expect their elected representatives to take the needed steps to assure their safety," Geake added.

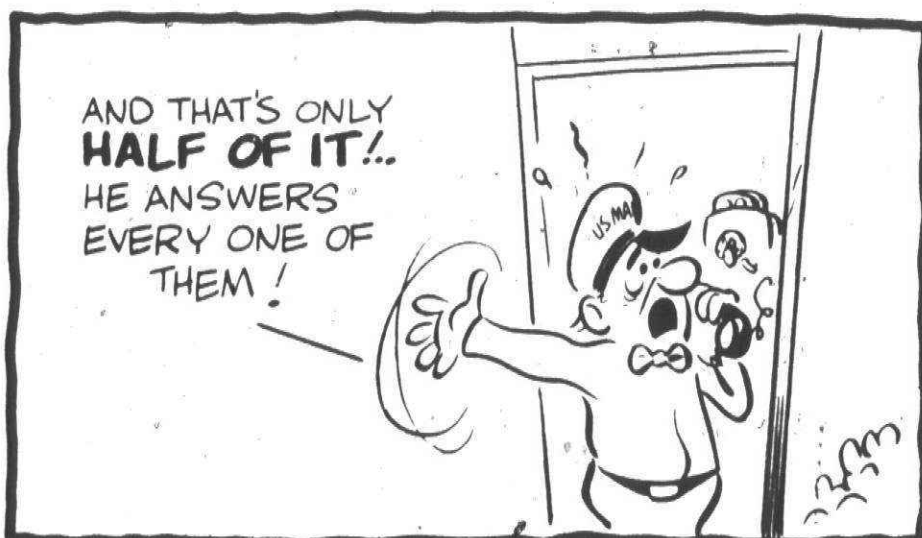
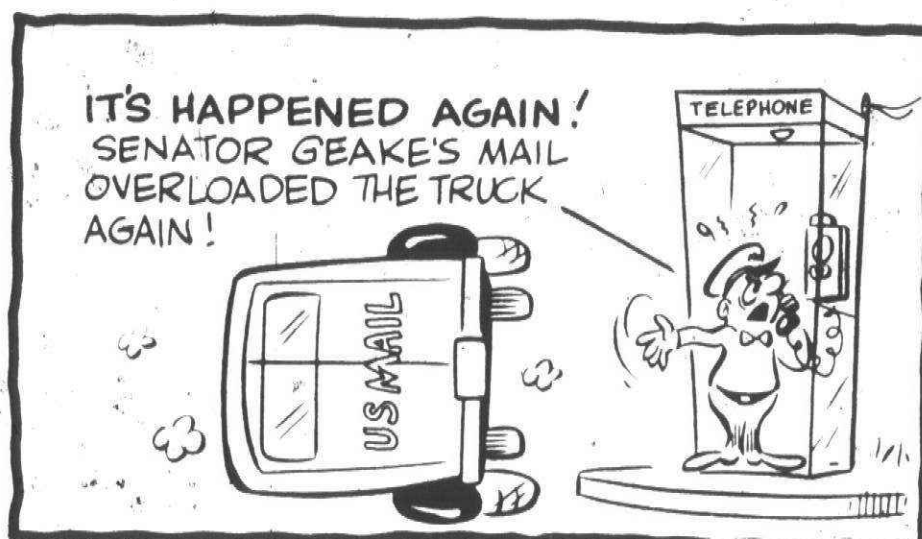

## Service Major Issue in Campaign

State Senator Bob Geake views serving those he represents as the major focus of his job and intends to continue working diligently at fulfilling that role when re-elected to the State Senate.

Geake is a six year veteran of the State Legislature and candidate for reelection to the 14th Senatorial District.

"Since first elected to the Legislature in 1973, I have responded promptly to requests from my constituents for assistance in cutting bureaucratic red tape," he said. "I see this as one of my primary functions and hope to be able to expand my services even further in the coming term."

Among the services Geake has provided are assistance in filling out complicated tax forms and obtaining tax rebates, particularly for senior citizens, and intervening with state departments on behalf of constituents.

"State government is viewed by most people, and rightly so, as a maze of departments, bureaus and divisions," he noted. "Quite often, our citi-

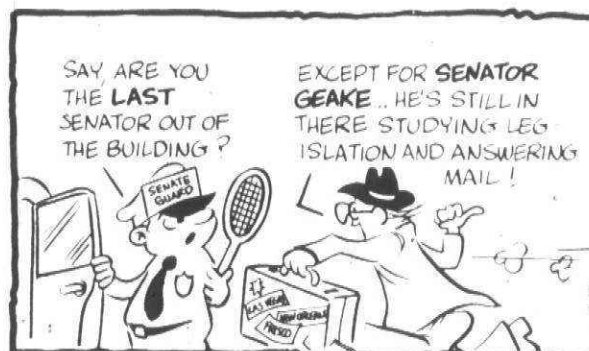
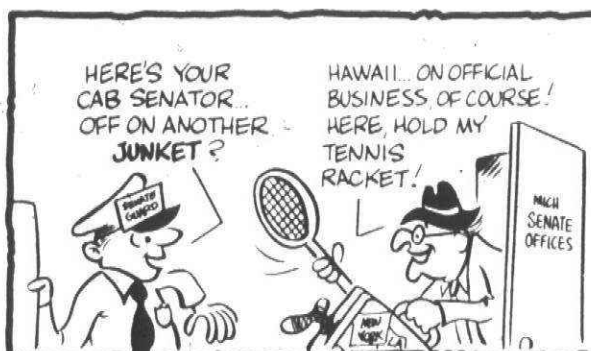
zens just don't know where to turn for help. That is where I believe I should come in and clear the way to a solution."

"It is often much simpler for me to make a phone call to the appropriate department, which I am always willing to do, than it is for the citizen to attempt to find the right person to talk to," he pointed out.

"I have also responded promptly to request for copies of bills under consideration by the legislature and notified constituents of important meetings where I know their input would be valuable," he said.

"The door to my office always has been open and I intend to continue my efforts to help those I serve cope with state governmental problems," he said.



## Geake Supports Senior Citizens

State Senator Bob Geake today called upon the Michigan Legislature to take an active role in assuring senior citizen's independence, dignity and the opportunity for continued useful participation in society.

"I believe state government has a responsibility to ease the adjustment of retirement and encourage maintenance of a productive life for senior citizens in Michigan," Geake said.

"Specifically, I favor measures which would provide greater property tax relief and improved health and recreation facilities for senior citizens," he said.

"I also believe we should put an end to age discrimination in employment and to compulsory retirement based on age," he said. "People over 65 still have a great deal to contribute to society and should not be prohibited from this opportunity."

Geake also noted the need for more

adequate state contributions to the cost of nursing home care to ensure that the level of care provided is of the highest quality.

"The Legislature must take steps to guarantee senior citizens who live in nursing homes, and those who live at home, adequate health care services and safe living conditions," he said.

"I also support legislation to reduce the impact of increasing utility rates on senior citizens, most of whom must live on very limited and fixed incomes," Geake stated. "We are dangerously close to the point where many senior citizens will be unable to afford the basic services of heat, light, and telephones."

"Senior citizens comprise more than 12 percent of our state's population," he noted. "Their needs and problems are unique and demand prompt legislative attention."

## Chamber Endorses 3 Incumbents

The Livonia Chamber Political Action Committee has endorsed three incumbents running for the state senate and House of Representatives seats in the Nov. 7 election.

Getting the endorsements are State Sen. Robert Geake (R-Northville), State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia) and State Rep. Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia).

The PAC interviewed Paul Kadish, Livonia Democrat opposing Geake, and Joseph Horvath Jr., Livonia Democrat running against Kirksey. Absent from the interviews was Roger Gwizdala, Law's Democratic foe.

The committee said it endorsed Geake, seeking his first full four-year term, because it felt he had a better understanding of the problems facing businesses and his voting record

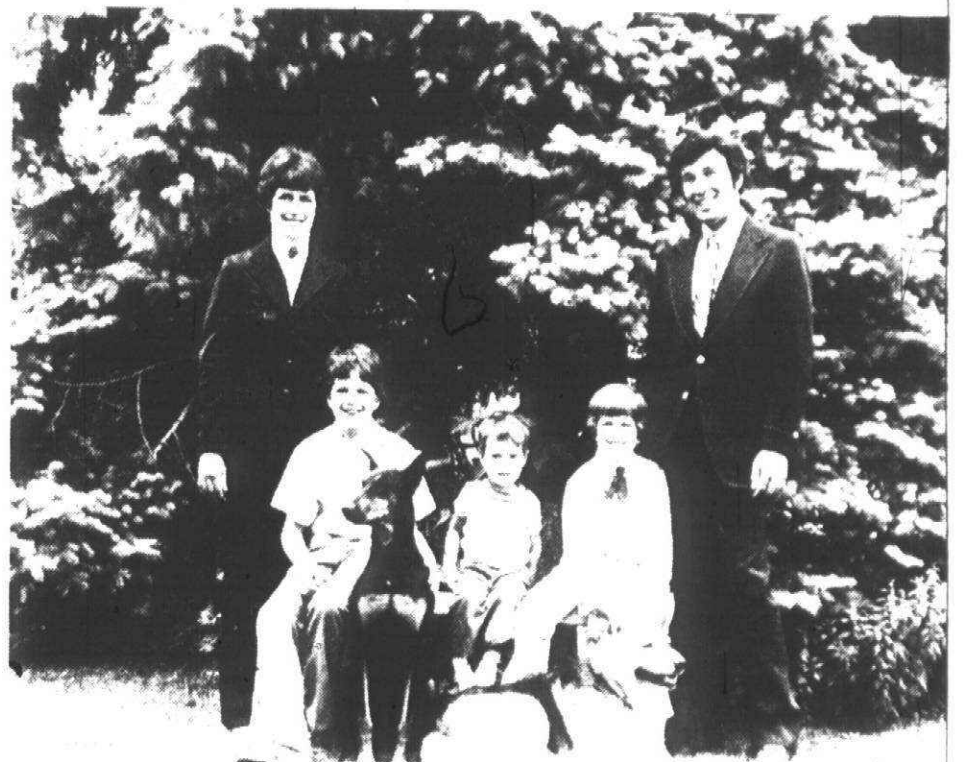
reflecting that position.

The PAC also said it expects Geake to be "a more effective leader" in his second term, if re-elected.

The committee said Kadish is a "sound candidate and has good credentials but it was felt that Geake's voting record on behalf of the community, especially the business community, was favorable."

On the house races, the committee said Kirksey, seeking his first full two-year term, has experience to make him a more effective representative of his district and that he "has a better feel for the tax problems and related economic problems of businessmen and women."

Law was endorsed by the chamber group and said he has had "an outstanding" first term.

investment and deposit of public funds in any type of state or federally chartered financial institution, effective 45 days after the election.

### D: THE LEGAL DRINKING AGE

**At Issue:** Whether the minimum legal age to consume alcoholic beverages in Michigan should be raised from 18 to 21.

**Explanation:** Proposal D would amend the State Constitution to prohibit anyone below the age of 21 from purchasing, possessing, or consuming alcoholic beverages. It would further make it illegal for anyone to sell or give alcoholic beverages to any person who has not yet turned 21.

Michigan's legal drinking age has been 18 since 1972, the year the Legislature approved the comprehensive Age of Majority Law which granted 18-year-olds the full rights and responsibilities of adults. The legal drinking age is scheduled to go up to 19, however, effective December 3rd, as a result of legislative passage of a two-bill package earlier this year.

**Impact:** One way or the other, Michigan's legal drinking will go up by the end of this year. If Proposal D is approved, the move to 21 would supercede the law raising the drinking age to 19. Thus, effective 45 days after the election, no one under the age of 21 would be able to buy, possess or consume alcoholic beverages in Michigan.

### E: THE HEADLEE PROPOSAL

**At Issue:** Whether state revenues and expenditures should be limited.

**Explanation:** Proposal E would limit state taxes (and thus, spending), excluding federal aid, to the current ratio of total state personal income (approximately 9.4 percent). It would further limit the taxing powers of local units of government by requiring that all new requests for taxes be submitted to the voters for approval. In addition, it would require the state to

back up with financial support any state-mandated programs.

Currently, our State Constitution prohibits deficit spending, thus limiting expenditures to the total amount of revenue generated by various state taxes. It contains no link, however, between the personal income of Michigan residents and the state's capability for generating revenue.

**Pros and Cons:** Those advocating passage of Proposal E believe it represents a sound and logical approach to halting the rapid growth in state expenditures which has far outpaced national income. It is further pointed out that the proposal would allow the overall state budget to grow in line with available revenues, safeguard the right of local communities to determine their own spending priorities, and give the voters control over new taxes.

Foes of Proposal E, on the other hand, argue that its passage would restrict the state from providing adequate levels of service and hinder the state's ability to deal with crises. Moreover, some feel the proposal could handicap downtown business development and restrict the ability of local governments to undertake capital construction projects.

**Impact:** If approved by the voters, this fall, Proposal E would establish a constitutional ratio between personal income and taxes in Michigan. The Legislature would be required to allocate expenditures within a limited income and, therefore, determine priority needs and fund them accordingly. The proposal would take effect in the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1979.

### G: STATE POLICE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

**At Issue:** Whether State Police troopers should be granted the right to bargain collectively.

**Explanation:** This proposal would

amend the State Constitution by giving troopers and sergeants collective bargaining rights on compensation, hours, working conditions, retirement, pension, and all other aspects of employment, except promotions and performance. It would further require compulsory arbitration of any disputes not resolved within 30 days after collective bargaining begins. The State Constitution currently prohibits collective bargaining for all state employees and gives the State Civil Service Commission the authority to set conditions of employment.

**Impact:** Passage of Proposal G would result in troopers and sergeants being allowed to bargain collectively and resort to compulsory arbitration, if necessary.

### H: THE VOUCHER PLAN

**At Issue:** Whether public education funds should go directly to parents for the purpose of enrolling their children in the public, private or parochial school of their choice.

**Explanation:** Proposal H, known as the Voucher Plan, would dramatically change the present system of funding education in Michigan via an amendment to our State Constitution. This plan would give parents a voucher which could be used to pay for their children's enrollment at either a public, private or parochial school anywhere in the state. Property taxes as a means of financing schools would be eliminated. It is not specified in the Proposal exactly how this lost revenue would be replaced, but it is likely that the Legislature would act to raise the state personal income tax, perhaps by about 2.5 percent, and increase the Single Business Tax as well.

**Pros and Cons:** Backer of Proposal H view the voucher plans as a preferable means of funding education because they believe it would create competition among schools. They also advocate shifting away from the prop-

erty tax to support schools.

Those in opposition to this proposal, on the other hand, argue that it poses a serious threat to the structure of public education as we know it in our state today. They believe it would undermine both public and nonpublic education. Local control over education would be eliminated with the advent of total state funding of schools, it is alleged, and the traditional independence of nonpublic education would be lost.

**Impact:** Implementation of the voucher plan would guarantee parents a minimum amount of educational funding in the form of vouchers which could be "cashed in" at the public or nonpublic school of their choice. In addition, the Legislature would likely be required to increase both the personal state income tax and business taxes to compensate for the loss of revenue resulting from elimination of the school-funding portion of property taxes.

### J: THE TISCH PROPOSAL

**At Issue:** Whether the ceiling on the state equalized value of property, which is the base of the property tax, should be reduced from 50 to 25 percent.

**Explanation:** The Tisch Proposal would amend the State Constitution by reducing the present constitutional ceiling on property tax assessments from 50 to 25 percent of true cash value. It would further limit annual property tax increases to 2.5 percent, impose a 5.6 percent ceiling on the state income tax rate, and permit the Legislature to authorize school districts to impose up to a one percent income tax with approval of the voters. It would also require the state to back up with financial support all state-mandated new or expanded activities or expenditures.

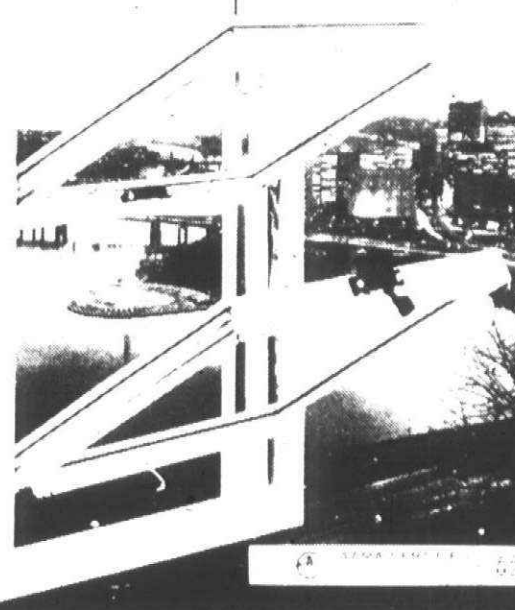

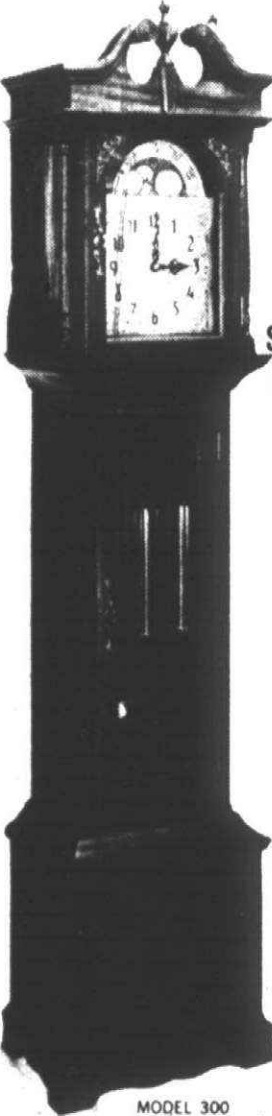

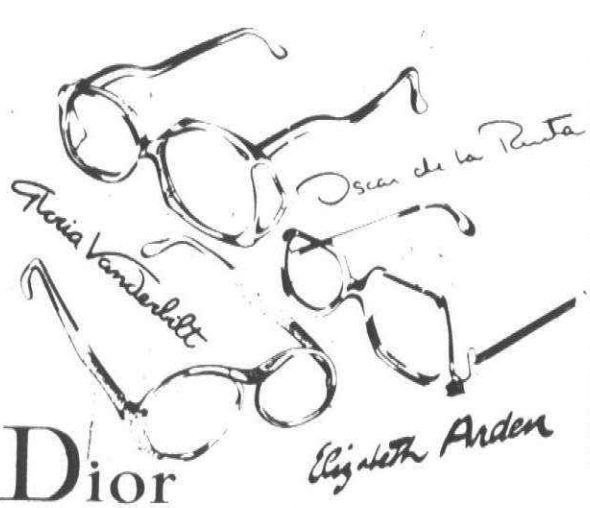

# Long lines expected at polling places on Nov. 7

Take your cot to the polls if you plan to vote during rush hour next Tuesday—or hope your fellow voters are prepared for a bedsheet ballot.

High interest in the 11 proposals facing voters Nov. 7 is expected to bring out 60 plus per cent of those eligible to vote, according to Plymouth-Canton officials.

And because the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township all register about 90 per cent of the eligible voters, the 1978 election could produce record voters—and record lines.

City and township clerks are pouring over twice the usual number of absentee ballots, they report—about 700 in Plymouth Township, 500 in the City of Plymouth, and “not quite that many” in Canton, according to Clerk John Flodin.

But the absentee pace is increasing.

Flodin adds, and voters have until 2 p.m. Saturday to turn in absentee ballot applications to clerks' offices. Any over the age of 60 and other registered voters who will be out of town next Tuesday are eligible for absentee ballots.

The best way to avoid a long line at the voting booth is to avoid early morning and after 5 p.m. voting, says Plymouth Township Clerk Helen Richardson.

“VOTE IN mid-morning and mid-afternoon,” advises Mrs. Richardson, who is retiring from an 18-year post with the township. “And know what you're going to do before you get behind the curtain,” she stresses.

That bit of advice is echoed by Plymouth Clerk Paul Brumfield and Flodin. Taking a crib sheet to the polls or at least being familiar with the ballots will help cut down waiting time, the clerks say.

Knowing the propositions is particularly important, Flodin says.

“The propositions won't say Tisch, Headlee, and Voucher,” he warns voters. “The election workers will be prepared to inform them if they ask about the propositions, but it's going to take some time if voters have to read each proposition carefully.”

Under Michigan law, a voter only has two minutes in which to make his or her selections; however, most clerks extend that time limit if the voter requires additional time.

“We've never lived with it,” Mrs. Richardson declares. “If someone is having a problem, we give them help, which is a way to nicely urge them to finish.”

FOUR YEARS ago, about 59 per cent of the registered voters went to the polls in Plymouth.

With the added interest in the election, Brumfield is predicting a 65 per cent turnout this year. Out of a population of 12,000, 6,628 voters are registered for the election this year.

In both Plymouth and Canton townships, registration ranges between 95-99 per cent, with 18,641 out of a population of about 38,000 registered in Canton and 12,477 out of about 24,000 registered in Plymouth Township. Both clerks expect a high voter turnout, although the local elections are markedly different in character.

A voter turnout of about 30 per cent in the August primary elected the new officials in Plymouth Township. All the candidates, including clerk hopeful Esther Hulsing, are running unopposed on the Republican ticket.

In Canton, a hotly contested election includes candidates of both major parties and two strong write-in campaigns by incumbents defeated in the primary.

While voters never waited more than 45 minutes in Plymouth Township, according to Mrs. Richardson, voters

who lined up before 8 p.m. were still voting at 11 p.m. in Canton's 1976 election.

Facing a lengthy ballot, clerks are

hoping voters take advantage of unpopular voting times this year, while election workers are preparing for a long siege.

BRADLEY EXPRESSED disappointment over Pettipren's reaction to his club's decision. But he pledged to stick to the endorsement of Roberts' campaign.

“What can I say?” Bradley said of Pettipren's comments. “Some people are very staunch Democrats. It just depends where you are on the battlefield.”

Bradley said his club compared the platforms of Roberts to the campaign of Greenstein and Mrs. Bodenmiller when they made the Republican endorsement. The club's membership

agreed that Roberts was the most promising candidate for Canton.

The club has viewed former Supervisor Greenstein as one of Stein's most powerful political foes since the 1976 election, when Stein and Greenstein battled it out for the supervisor's chair.

The club has actively campaigned against the election bids of both Greenstein and Mrs. Bodenmiller.

The 15th Congressional District Democratic Party endorsed Stein and Mrs. Bradley in last August's primary. Because both incumbents lost that election, however, the party has not endorsed any township candidate for the November election.

about senior citizen ghettos was misinterpreted. (A “ghetto” is a section of a community in which members of a minority group live because of social, legal or economic pressures.)

Greenstein said he doesn't think senior citizens should be forced to live in one place simply because they are senior citizens.

Donahue, a Republican, is shown in the flyer saying: “Yes, Bob, yes Bob, yes Bob. Anything, Anything, I'll lie, I'll cheat, I'll use deceit.”

The flyer charges Culbert “lies and uses trickery in his campaign and is proud of it.” It said he “uses lawyer scare tactics to threaten the Senior

Citizen of the Year (Irene Murphy) if he should lose the election.”

Culbert wrote a letter to Mrs. Murphy saying she was spreading lies about him and that he would sue her if she didn't stop.

The Observer has a copy of that letter. The flyer said of Culbert: “Why is a local reporter slanting election coverage to his (Culbert's) advantage? Is she his campaign manager? Or?”

The second flyer does not mention reporter Young by name although the first flyer cited her in the same context.

THE FLYER included information on how to make a write-in vote. It

urges votes for Stein, Mrs. Bradley and Roberts.

George Bradley, president of the UDC, admitted his organization produced the flyer. He said he “didn't

know” if Stein, Mrs. Bradley or Roberts had anything to do with putting it together.

longer in charge. Beginning with the most recent incident that precipitates this decision, we, the bus drivers of Plymouth-Canton, will not allow any student to threaten us. We will not allow that student on our buses and he/she will have to find other means of transportation.”

Supt. John Hoben disagrees with the stand taken in the letter.

“I don't want the responsibility with 59-60 bus drivers,” he said Tuesday. “If they don't get support from administration, they have an avenue to go,” he added, referring to the grievance procedure negotiated with the drivers' union.

Students are expected to follow the code of conduct, but the ultimate responsibility for discipline rests with

the principals, he affirmed.

“There's a disagreement as to what is fit punishment,” he says.

THE DRIVERS, however, believe they should have a say in what happens to a student who threatens a driver. And they hope to negotiate some contract language to that effect when their current contract expires next June.

Until then, the drivers are taking their stand in the letter.

Ms. Vitoratos explains that a small minority of students, fewer than five per cent, cause the discipline problems. But the problems are major ones.

“I've been hit with a snowball inside the bus,” she says. “We're bus drivers, not baby sitters.”

# Headlee distorted figures, instructor charges

The Headlee theme that "the growth of government is out of control" is being branded a distortion and lie by a Saginaw Valley State College instructor.

Sociology instructor Robert J. Thaler cites six points in Headlee's standard presentation in support of Proposal E on tax limitation.

The gist of his argument is that taxes haven't increased by the percentages Farmington Hills insurance executive Richard Headlee says they have increased.

"Headlee and his supporters are shouting this slogan long and loud from one end of the state to the other, hoping that most people will start to believe it because they have heard it so much," said Thaler in a paper circulated statewide.

He gave these examples:

1. "IN JUST 10 years," claims Headlee, "state and local taxes have increased twice as fast as the people's ability to pay (their personal income)."

Said Thaler: "What they label as 'state and local taxes' is actually the line for 'total state spending.' But only about 50 per cent of state revenues spent come from state and local taxes.

"The rest comes from increased federal programs and revenue sharing, permits, licenses, college tuition, park fees, hospitals state liquor stores, etc., for which who choose to pay receive specific services they want."

2. HEADLEE compares "personal income" based on individuals with "total state and local taxes" paid by both individuals and corporations.

Said Thaler: "These are familiar deceptions. Change the subject and hope that most people won't notice, like in the old shell game."

3. HEADLEE CLAIMS the state's personal income tax has gone up 740 per cent in 10 years.

Thaler calls this "preposterous," adding, "Every citizen knows better. Headlee is looking at figures for the first year the state income tax was in effect, when it was collected for only a fraction of a year—October-December 1967!"

"No wonder the increase looks so huge. That fact alone wipes out most of his 740 per cent claim."

"Inflation and some moderate increases in the overall tax rate, from 2.6 per cent to 4.6 per cent, account for the rest. Headlee's ideology has made him—and others—blind to the facts. Their minds were made up even before they looked at the data."

"In truth, total state and local taxes have gone up at just about the same rate as personal income."

4. STATE EMPLOYEES are compared, in Headlee's charts, with total state population. Thaler calls it "misleading and irrelevant."

He explained: "Population has increased about 500,000 persons; state employees, about 20,000 persons."

Thaler said the diversity and changing composition of the state's population are more important. For example, the number of working adults has increased 30 per cent. "And as a percentage of all employees, the number of state employees has only increased from 1.25 per cent to 1.51 per cent of the total."

5. HEADLEE DOESN'T consider the areas where state employment has risen, and why, Thaler charged.

"It is hardly the state's fault. State park and campground use is up 50 per cent since 1968. Vocational rehabilita-

tion cases are up over 100 per cent. "Adult basic education, for illiterate adults, is up 600 per cent. State college enrollments are up 60 per cent."

"Prison inmates increased 100 per cent. The numbers of food stamp recipients and families on ADC have increased over 400 per cent."

"Numbers of court cases have increased 100 per cent in every court."

"Total population hasn't increased much, but the types of people who make up our population have changed. Today we have a much greater crime problem, especially drugs and organized crime. Only the state can ade-

quately deal with problems of this magnitude."

"There are tens of thousands more elevators in Michigan now than in 1968, and we are critically short of elevator inspectors."

6. "TAX LIMITATION" is what Headlee calls his group's proposal. Thaler called it revenue limitation, "which is more serious and dangerous."

"Only about half of revenues come from taxes; the rest is from fees, licenses, permits, college tuitions, and the like. The Headlee limitation could some day force Michigan to limit col-

lege enrollments, limit state park entries and limit hunting licenses—all just so as to be able to meet more essential human needs."

"To limit total state revenues to growth in only one component of those revenues—namely, to personal income—is a poor method. Business income and other revenue sources contribute greatly to state revenues."

"Headlee would have us tying Junior's allowance to increases in Mom's salary, when in fact both Mom and Dad are working."

"If Junior is alert, he will have nothing to do with this plan."

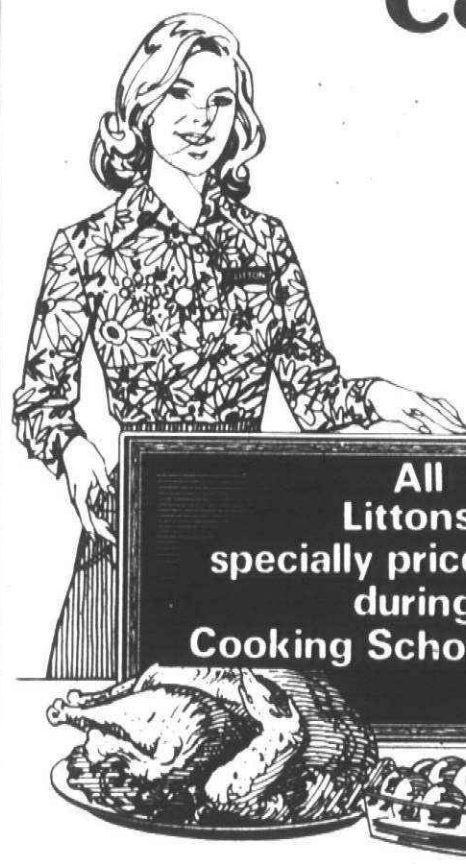

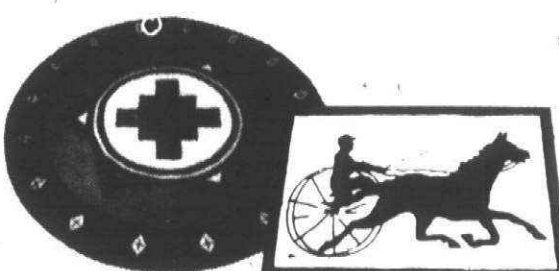

McCarthy believes his extensive legal background has kept him attuned to the will of the people and that his methods engineering background will permit him to cut through the red tape presently hampering the court system and to be able to devise new methods to help speed up justice.

Additionally, McCarthy believes that his two years as a justice of the peace in Plymouth Township served as a proving ground for some of his methods of rehabilitating people.

"Young people should devise their own method of showing that they don't want a criminal record by various work programs and/or making restitution. By that I mean—mama and papa

doesn't make the restitution, the young person would."

McCarthy says he is the only candidate in this race deemed worthy to have the endorsement of the Michigan Trial Law-

yers Association and to receive a well-qualified rating from the Civic Searchlight as well as the endorsements of the Northwest Bar Association and the Suburban Bar Association.

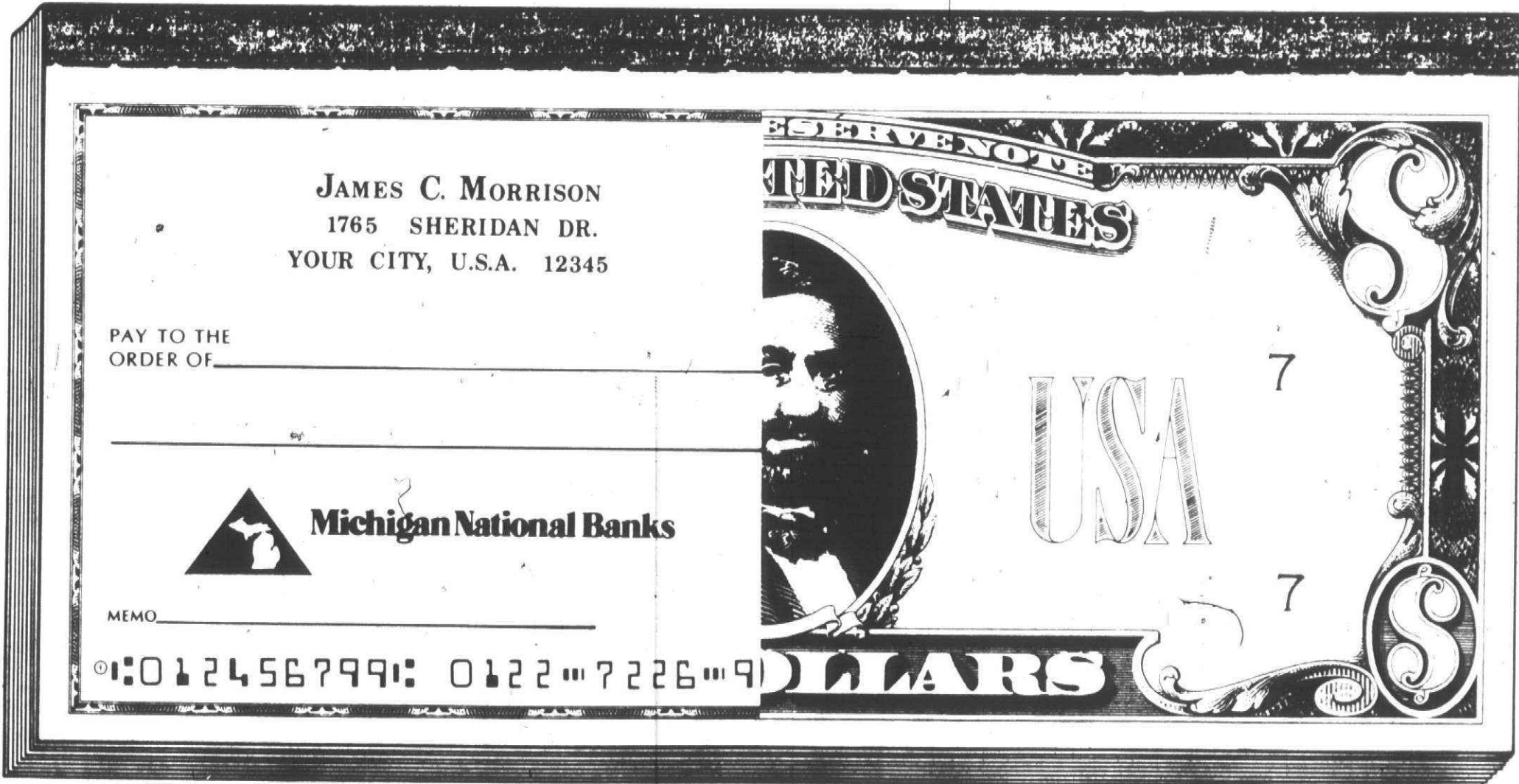

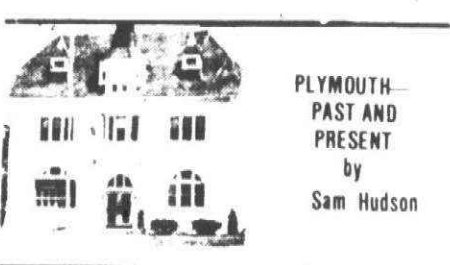
Township leaders reflect changing attitudes

The man who led the losing battle in 1898 to keep Northville from seceding from Plymouth Township thought the defection was a calamity. The man who heads Plymouth Township today believes the split actually helped the Plymouth area—and explains why. The Plymouthite of the past, George Anson Starkweather, was elected township supervisor four times (1855, 1858, 1859 and 1862) after being justice of the peace at age 27, and a member

of the Michigan State Legislature, at age 28. The Plymouth official of the present, Thomas G. Notebaert, was elected township supervisor in 1976 and again in 1978. A COMPARISON OF the backgrounds and careers of these township leaders—one in the pre-Civil War days, the other as this is being written—shows more contrasts than similarities, and highlights the changes that have occurred in the area in recent times. In 1855, when Starkweather was in office, the assessed valuation of the

township and village combined was less than \$500,000; the population of both was hardly more than 2,500; and the problem was how to attract more residents. Today, as Notebaert is in his second term as supervisor, the assessed valuation of the township alone is over \$213 million; the township population exceeds 20,000; and the problem is not how to attract people to the area, but how to control the recent rapid growth. The origins of Starkweather and Notebaert were strikingly dissimilar. George Starkweather was a local celebrity from the day he was born, Feb. 20, 1826. His pioneer parents had built the first home in the Village; his mother was the first white woman to set foot in the area; his father owned 240 acres of land centered where the Masonic Temple now stands; and George, himself, was the first white child born in what is now Plymouth Township. All but a few, and they would have been late arrivals in Plymouth, must have known him, or of him, when he was elected to his first public office, justice of the peace, in 1853. They returned him to the same office in 1857, 1861 and 1865. Tom Notebaert, on the other hand, arrived in Plymouth unheralded at age 23, possessing none of the advantages which Starkweather's origin must have given him. Born in Detroit in 1922, Notebaert did not become a resident of the City of Plymouth until 1945. Later, he moved to the township. He was 54 when first elected supervisor.



THE STARKWEATHERS, an old New England family, were of British origin. William Starkweather, George's father, was a native of Prescott, Conn. He was the son of John Starkweather, who fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The Notebaerts came from another part of Europe. Tom is of French-Belgian descent. His mother is a descendant of Louis Joliet, the French-Canadian explorer. His father was born in Belgium. George Starkweather attended the University of Michigan one year, leaving in 1844 when his father died of measles at age 48. He went to New York city to study law. In those days, legal education was of the apprenticeship type in the office of an established lawyer. When Starkweather finished his apprenticeship, he returned to Plymouth to become the village lawyer, and to farm part of the 80 acres

left by his parents in the northern part of the village. (William Starkweather had sold most of his original tract in the center of town to John Kellogg in 1835. Tom Notebaert graduated from Holy Redeemer High School in Detroit. During World War II he furthered his education at the University of Illinois, where he studied engineering for two years as part of a U.S. Army program when he was in the service.

Starkweather, at age 39, married Amelia Heywood, a Plymouth girl who was 18 years his junior. They had two children, both girls. One of them, Mary Keziah Starkweather, was the mother of the late Karl Starkweather, Plymouth historian, and of Davis B. Hillmer, a well-known commercial photographer in Detroit for many years. Notebaert was 27 in 1949 when he married Rita Bruckner of Detroit. The Notebaerts live on Woodgate Drive in the township. They have two grown children, Craig and Michelle. The year Starkweather married, he purchased Joshua Scattergood's general store on Main Street facing the Village Green (now called Kellogg Park). A bit later, he joined with R.G. Hall to form the general store of Hall and Starkweather. When the partnership was dissolved in the fall of 1870 Starkw (Part II will cover the Northville secession and explain why Notebaert believes it hindered Northville but helped Plymouth).

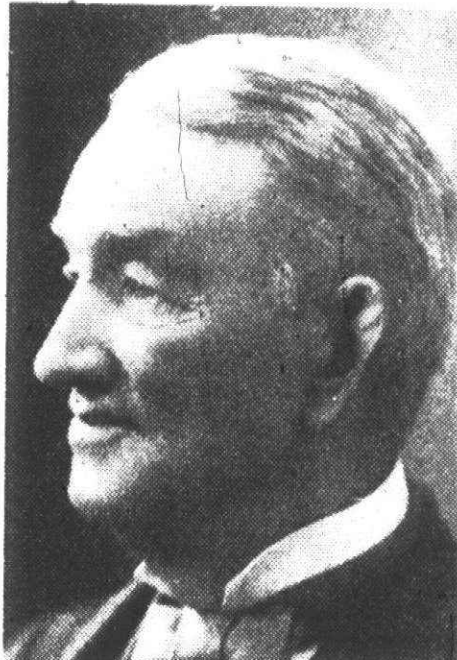
Madonna College sets information day Nov. 5

# Vote for farmland mill, then argue about cost

Steps must be taken now if some 5,000 acres of prime agricultural land west of Canton Center Road are to be spared from the bulldozers of developers.

The development rights proposal that will appear on the Nov. 7 ballot would initiate the action that is needed to save Canton's farmland from encroaching urban sprawl.

The proposal asks voters to approve a tax hike of four mills (\$4 per \$1,000 assessed valuation) to finance the public purchase of farmers' development rights.

To the average taxpayer who owns a \$60,000 home assessed at \$30,000, the development rights program would mean an immediate tax hike of about \$120 a year.

That seems like a lot of money during a time of tax revolt. But delaying approval of the development rights issue until state or federal funds are made available could mean the death knell for the township's agricultural land.

THE FARMLAND preservation issues goes far beyond the esthetics of maintaining a green belt along Canton's western boundary. Or allowing farmers to continue working the land they have owned for years.

Farmland preservation is shaping up as a national issue. Agricultural land across Michigan

and the country is disappearing at an alarming rate.

Logically, the federal and state government should offset part of the costs of Canton's farmland retention program. No federal or state funds are currently available, however.

Perhaps the current township board and administration should be criticized for failing to follow up efforts of former Supervisor Robert Greenstein to lobby for federal funds.

But it is too late to throw out the proposal that will appear on next week's ballot. At least three years of hard work went into the development rights concept, and time is running out for Canton's agricultural land. Once it is developed, it will be gone for good.

Voters should approve the development rights proposal next Tuesday and put pressure on their elected officials to begin lobbying for state and federal funds.

A \$40,000 study on the issue concluded that Canton's taxes will be lower over the long run if development rights are purchased now. The study compared the cost of preserving the farmland to the cost of providing municipal services to a fully developed township.

The development rights proposal on next week's ballot deserves a chance. Vote yes on the four-mill request.

# It's Culbert—by a nose

Some endorsements for political candidates are easy to write.

We did not see that clear-cut choice in the Canton supervisor's race.

Although we endorse Democrat Noel Culbert for township supervisor, we must add a few words of caution.

We believe he has the best qualifications of the three candidates for supervisor, but are cool to his campaign tactics.

Campaigns can be run without turning into a game of who has the most mud to sling.

Admittedly, the information Culbert has released about opponents was generally well substantiated and sometimes interesting. And he is certainly no more guilty of the practice than write-in supervisor candidate Harold Stein, whose campaign has been marked with desperate flinging of mire that seems more fantasy than fact.

We do not endorse write-in candidates because we feel the results of the August primary should be respected.

Culbert, once the hue and cry of election politics dies down, has the potential to be an adequate supervisor.

He seems to have the interests of Canton at

heart, and he makes a point of trying to understand the needs of all, rather than a few pressure groups.

We anticipate the township board will end up a composite of strong-willed individuals when this election is over. Canton will need a supervisor who won't be run over by sheer force of will.

But even as we give our support to Culbert, we ask him to take a few pointers about running a campaign from one of his opponents.

Republican candidate John Longridge, in the midst of the nastiest campaign Canton has ever seen, has managed to retain his integrity and run a clean race.

Longridge has some good ideas and goals, but his platform has been too narrow in scope, and he doesn't appear to be quite prepared to assume the duties of supervisor.

Culbert has some good, solid goals, among them to establish homeowner protection and growth control. He appears intelligent enough to deal with the complexities of land use questions. Only time will tell if he has the motivation to match.

But, as Culbert knows, the supervisor's job is always under scrutiny. We hope he can take it as well as he dishes it out.

# Donahue gets our support

Canton has reached a point where its future can turn in one of several directions. It is a young, vigorous community, whose growing pangs are almost refreshing compared to the problems of other municipalities that struggle to keep vital.

The seeds that result in the eventual success or deterioration of a community are planted now.

That's why we feel the people who will hold Canton's future in their hands, our elected officials, need the ability to visualize what tomorrow will bring.

We believe James Donahue, the Republican candidate for Canton treasurer, has that ability.

Donahue, once he stops worrying what everyone else is doing wrong and starts thinking about what he can do right, displays admirable concern about the impact of today's issues on Canton in years to come.

He is a strong supporter of keeping Canton an aesthetically pleasing community, and he seems willing to fight a battle to realize his hopes.

If it means fighting businesses to prevent turning main roads into neon strips, he has vowed to do it.

We don't think that position is anti-business. By keeping Canton a desirable place to live—and visit—merchants can continue to attract the kind of customer who comes back, rather than a one-time visitor who is drawn in by a large sign.

Donahue believes—or says he does—in master plans, something Canton badly needs.

We think a vote for Donahue is a vote for Canton's future.

Although we endorse Donahue, it seems appropriate to take time for a few words of praise for his opponent, Maria Falkiewicz.

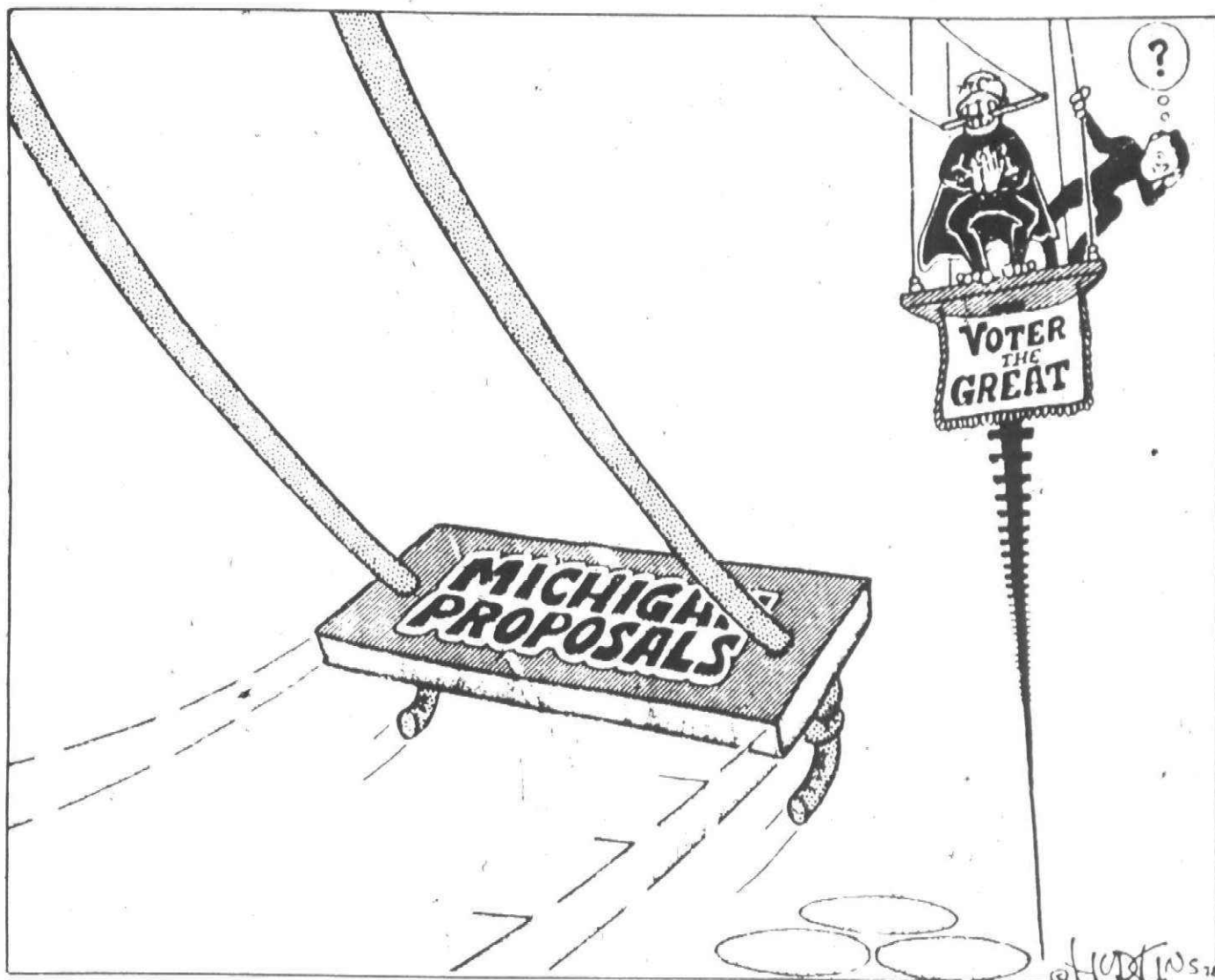
She has managed to run a clean, thoughtful campaign, and we hope that she decides to stay involved in Canton's political arena should she lose this race.

But this time, let's give Donahue a chance to prove he means what he says.

years. But we disagree on his method for attaining it. Although Brown supports the tax limitation Proposal E on the ballot, we urge him and the voters to carefully consider the effects of limiting taxation in Michigan when spending is unlimited in federal circles.

But Brown's efforts to assure an equitable transportation plan for western Wayne County residents and his drive to reform educational funding deserve applause.

After four terms—that's eight years—of experience as a state rep in a district that has grown to about 120,000 people, Brown is well aware of the problems and plans of those he represents.



## 'Yes' twice for transportation

**M** PROPOSAL TO allocate at least 90 per cent of gas tax revenues for general road purposes and the remainder for other transportation purposes and to replace State Highway Commission with a Transportation Commission.

This constitutional amendment, which merits voter support, is part of the total transportation package of bills passed earlier this year by the Michigan Legislature.

One portion updates the constitution by renaming the highway commission as the "Transportation Commission." That is altogether fitting because that department oversees money for public transportation, shipping ports and airports, too.

The department director would be appointed by the governor rather than by the six-member commission, thus providing for clearer accountability to the public.

We are less enthusiastic about freezing the portion of the transportation fund at 90 per cent for roads. We would prefer to give the legislature responsibility for allocating money among various kinds of transportation.

That provision, however, was necessary to win the support of highway people, who have legitimate interests.

The people of Michigan can join the legislature in making balanced transportation progress by voting YES on proposal M.

**R** PROPOSAL TO authorize creation of a Railroad Redevelopment Authority to make loans to railroads with track in Michigan and to authorize authority to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$175 million.

Michigan railroads need a lot of modernizing—new road beds, loading facilities, yard facilities, truck-train facilities, data processing.

But the rail companies are earning only five per cent on invested capital while it costs 10 per cent to float bonds on the market. A Railroad Redevelopment Authority could use proceeds from a state bond issue (at lower, tax-free interest rates) to make loans to the rail companies for modernization.

That would help a form of transportation that will grow in importance to Michigan as truck fuel prices soar and small cities struggle to hold industry.

Michigan, unfortunately, handles no "bridge" traffic between the East Coast and the Midwest. Thus, Michigan doesn't get the same priority in the rail companies' investment plans as do more heavily traveled states such as Ohio and Indiana.

If we want railroad improvements here, we'll have to offer some inducements.

Proposal R can provide such inducements. It deserves a YES vote.

## Turn down parole, bail plans

**K** PROPOSAL TO grant authority to courts to deny bail under certain circumstances involving violent crimes.

Here is another hard-nosed proposal to chip away at constitutional rights—the right of an accused person to be free on bail bond while awaiting trial.

It disturbs us.

The Michigan Constitution now says all persons are entitled to bail unless accused of murder or treason. Proposal K, by State Rep. Paul Rosenbaum of Battle Creek, would expand that non-bail list.

We're old-fashioned enough to believe a person isn't guilty until he has been proven guilty in court.

Proposal K isn't really necessary. If a judge, with access to modern records, sees it would be risky to let a person with a history of violence out on bond, the judge can set bail high enough to protect society.

Accusing someone of crime isn't the same as convicting him. Many a man who will later be found innocent could lose his job or suffer a broken home if denied bail.

We like our constitutional rights the way they are.

We recommend a NO vote on Proposal K.

**B** PROPOSAL TO prohibit the granting of a parole to a prisoner convicted of certain crimes involving violence or injury to persons or property until at least after the minimum sentence has been served.

From the pen of Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson, this proposal won't do what Patterson says it should do.

It should be defeated.

It's aimed at "good time" laws. A judge today sentences a criminal to (say) 5-10 years in prison. If the convict behaves himself in prison, he can earn time off for good behavior and get out in about 3½ years. The prison warden has a carrot to dangle in front of him.

Proposal B would eliminate that carrot. The convict would have to serve the five-year minimum sentence, at least.

But wait! The judge already knows the convict can get out in 3½ years, so he takes that into consideration when handing out the sentence. In other words, the judge really intends to hand out a 3½-year sentence—if the convict behaves himself.

If "good time" were eliminated, judges would adjust by meting out shorter sentences, where possible.

Even if Proposal B did result in longer sentences, our prisons are already badly, dangerously overcrowded. Eliminating "good time" would make the situation worse.

Proposal B should be DEFEATED.

## Greenstein, Bodenmiller best

Robert Greenstein and Carol Bodenmiller would be excellent additions to the Canton Board of Trustees, and we give them our wholehearted endorsement.

The choice might have been more difficult had not the only Republican candidate, Gary Roberts, chosen to change his stripes. Roberts, who claims to be the savior of the suburban homeowner, ran a primary campaign that was staunchly anti-Harold Stein (the present supervisor).

He unleashed every slur and barb he could think of against the supervisor. All that has changed. Roberts is not only one of Stein's strongest supporters in the general election, but he has received the endorsement of the Canton United Democratic Club. This organization is composed primarily of Stein, Treasurer Anne Bradley and their supporters.

There appears to be a little confusion about party identity here, because Roberts is running on the Republican ticket. We also find it amusing to think that anyone could believe Robert's charges against the people he once supported, because he now claims all those nasty things he said about Stein were misguided.

Roberts has apparently fallen into the trap of politics. He has become so confused and unsure of what he stands for that he has created his own credibility gap.

Our endorsement of Greenstein and Bodenmiller does not come because they are the only other trustee candidates.

Greenstein, who may have been too forceful and hotheaded as Canton supervisor before Stein defeated him, still has the kind of expertise and intelligence that would be a shame to waste.

He has the ability to come up with innovative programs, as he did with the farmland preservation proposal.

Carol Bodenmiller is also capable of looking ahead, but with enough caution to avoid the mistake of jumping into a project without knowing all the pros and cons.

She has taken the time to study issues and offer well-thought-out statements on them.

Mrs. Bodenmiller appears stong-minded enough to stand up for what she believes in, and she believes in making decisions only if she can do so with a clear conscience.

We wish we could say the same for every candidate.

Our only misgivings regard the close political association of Greenstein, Mrs. Bodenmiller and Republican treasurer candidate Jim Donahue in the past.

We hope Mrs. Bodenmiller and Donahue will not represent two automatic votes behind Greenstein if all three are elected to the board.

# How your vote Nov. 7 can 'save Parliament'

Somehow it seems an interesting coincidence that this country's major election date falls in the same week in which the English observe Guy Fawkes Day.

In a way it is symbolic of your most precious possession as an American citizen, your right to vote.

There is little doubt that no matter which way you turn this weekend, you are going to be bombarded with last minute campaign propaganda. It will be the last big chance for individual candidates, and for those advocating or opposing given issues, to reach your eyes and ears.

Be thankful that you live in a country where they have that chance.

The electioneering probably will be at its retching worst Sunday. On that very day, back home in the mother country, the normally undemonstrative English will be hanging poor ol' Guy in effigy again. If you don't know why, read on.

YOU SEE, back in 1605 — 15 years before that boatload of transients sailed from England on the Mayflower — some of the dissidents who dwelled around and about pastoral England vowed they'd had enough of King James I and his government. They went about solving their differences the hard way.

Knowing the king was scheduled to be present Nov. 5, the day Parliament was to convene, their solution was to sneak some kegs of gunpowder to the cellar of the House of Lords with the intention of blowing most of royalty into kingdom come.

As often happens to such sinister plots, both in real life and on television, somebody let the cat out of the bag! Fancy their surprise when Guy and his buddies were greeted at the cellar door by a committee of the king's royal fuzz.

Historians have called this aborted uprising the "Gunpowder Plot," which demonstrates a shocking lack of imagination, and its annual perpetuation long ago became known simply as Guy Fawkes Day.

AS IN MANY losing situations, there had to be a fall guy, and maybe that's how Fawkes went into the books as the chief conspirator.

Actually he was only one of a number who were dispatched to their graves for their dastardly conspiring, but whether he was king-pin of the conspirators or not seems to have been lost in the retelling.

One suspects that down to the tasteless end he never knew who spilled the beans. Later on, it turned out that one of the mob had a relative who was a member of Parliament.

This led to a personal warning to his lordship not to risk his life and limb on the day in question because things were going to go boom. That's when the law moved in.

THE REASON that in England they still pop cannons and corks and hang Fawkes in effigy every Nov. 5 is to celebrate that as the date Parliament was saved.

Traditionalists that they are, members of the government also have seen to it that a formal search of the vaults beneath the houses of Parliament has been conducted before each new session ever since. In a span of 373 years not a single cask of gunpowder has been found.

## Garber deserves nod in judge race

After the last vote is counted Tuesday, residents from Plymouth-Canton will have a second judge on the district bench—either Phil Ogilvie or Jim Garber.

Voters are fortunate, in one respect, because both Garber and Ogilvie have rich legal backgrounds, know the area well, and would make good judges if elected. The tough part for voters, though, is that a choice must be made between the two well-qualified persons.

OGILVIE HAS AN impressive background which includes more than two decades as Northville municipal attorney, a stint as municipal judge, and an enviable record of involvement in civic affairs.

Involvement, experience and knowledge are the major assets Ogilvie possesses — which will certainly be useful in carrying out the duties of district judge if he's elected.

But Garber also possesses involvement and experience in and knowledge of the criminal justice system. And Garber also knows the area well, having been born and raised here.

What voters are faced with, in brief, are two favorite sons, both of whom have the qualifications to serve as the second judge in the 35th District.

## YOUR 'CLOUT' IS YOUR VOTE



BECAUSE ONLY ONE can be elected, the Observer suggests to our readers that serious consideration be given to Garber.

A lot of you know Jim Garber because his father, Ralph, was one of the early families in the community and toiled for years on the Garber farm out in Plymouth Township. Some of you probably went to Plymouth High School with Garber, and have watched his career since then.

## Joyner has done well

On Nov. 7 William Joyner (D-Plymouth) will be seeking election for the first time since being appointed to the Wayne County Commission seat in the 27th District, which includes the City of Plymouth, Canton, Plymouth Township and part of Westland.

The Observer, in the past, has expressed its displeasure with the way the vacancy was created and with the manner by which it was filled. We had no particular problem with the selection of Joyner, but were chagrined that the selection process boiled down to a fight between two regions of the UAW.

But Joyner cannot and should not be held personally responsible for Wayne County's political jungle. In fact, Joyner personally supports the one action which would go a long way towards cleaning up county politics — appointment of a county executive.

The Observer finds no fault with the job Joyner has done to date and believes he deserves re-election, especially since Republican Frank Yonish has not shown any serious desire for the job. The Observer urges a vote Tuesday for **R. William Joyner** as county commissioner in the 27th District.

## Resentment overcome

# Family shares home with mentally retarded

Can the mentally retarded and "normal" persons share a neighborhood?

That question sparked controversies this year in Southfield and St. Clair Shores, but things seem to be working in one Livonia neighborhood.

There's a normal looking home in the 9000 block of Melrose in the Rose-dale Gardens section of Livonia. But by normal standards, it's abnormal. In addition to the five-person family, four elderly retarded men and one 19-year-old boy, who is recovering from a nervous breakdown, call the residence home.

There was resentment, recalls Lorraine Bartel, who operates the foster group home along with her husband, Lawrence. Her neighbors, several years ago, filed suit in Livonia district

court to stop the Bartels from operating the home or force them to move.

"Livonia wanted us to relocate to a commercial area. They said we were operating a business," Mrs. Bartel said. "I grew up in a normal residential area. They should have a chance to live in a residential area just like you and me."

A new state law allowing group homes to be placed in residential neighborhoods, however, was passed and signed during the trial.

Mrs. Bartel and her neighbors said the initial lawsuit was filed to prevent elderly men from being placed in the neighborhood. Prior to the Bartels' purchasing the home, it had been operated as a foster home for elderly retarded women.

"Before we moved in," Mrs. Bartel said, "I thought the people here had

accepted the foster care concept. Women were living here before.

"One neighbor even suggested that I take in women instead of men. Well, I'm not a flowery, frilly kind of person."

AS NEIGHBORS explain it, they were afraid of what the retarded men might do to their children. As the fears subsided, the neighbors began to accept the foster home.

"We've pretty much adjusted to the home," said one neighbor. "Nothing bizarre has happened in the neighborhood."

"We used to tell our children not to play with their children or go over to their house, but you can't keep an eye on them every minute of the day," she said.

Not everyone, however, has

accepted the Bartels and their five tenants.

"If you took a vote in the neighborhood," one neighbor predicted, "most people would probably say they don't want them here."

She said most neighbors were concerned about the effect the foster home may have on their property values. "Most of us have all our equity tied up in our homes," said one neighbor who has lived on Melrose Street for 13 years. "We don't want to lose it."

Others resent the fact that the Bartels receive money from the state for taking care of the mentally retarded in an area zoned for residential use.

"My husband is a hard-working man," said one neighbor. "He's a service department manager, but he couldn't repair cars here in his garage

in his spare time."

Mrs. Bartel receives more than \$340 a month for each of the mentally retarded men for whom she cares.

Financially, it takes everything we've got," Mrs. Bartel said. "We feed them well. We pay for all their recreation."

SHE DENIES that she's into the foster group home operation for financial reward.

She said she is there to help the mentally retarded. "I'm a teacher, a full-time teacher," Mrs. Bartel said. She said she tries to teach them basic skills and sometimes more complicated matters like cooking and gardening.

"Here they feel good about themselves. They have some self-esteem.

## Letter offers parents a sport's lesson

Two Canton residents were very busy over the summer months preparing for this year's hockey season. Walt Cole and Bob Goleniak are the manager and head coach of the Plymouth-Canton-Squirt Travel A team this year. During the summer they jointly wrote and compiled a

player-parent hockey reference manual.

Each boy on the team received a copy of the 90-page manual with instructions to read it. It's almost a "everything you've ever wanted know about hockey but were to uninformed to ask" type guide.

One page in the manual is a letter to mom and dad from their son. It is printed in a child's handwriting and taken from the Can-Am Hockey group. It is about a hockey parent, but can certainly be applied to any sport. It goes like this:

Dear Mom and Dad:

I hope you won't get mad at me for writing this letter, but you always told me never to keep back anything that ought to be brought out in the open. So, here goes. Remember the other day when my team was playing and both of you were sitting and watching.

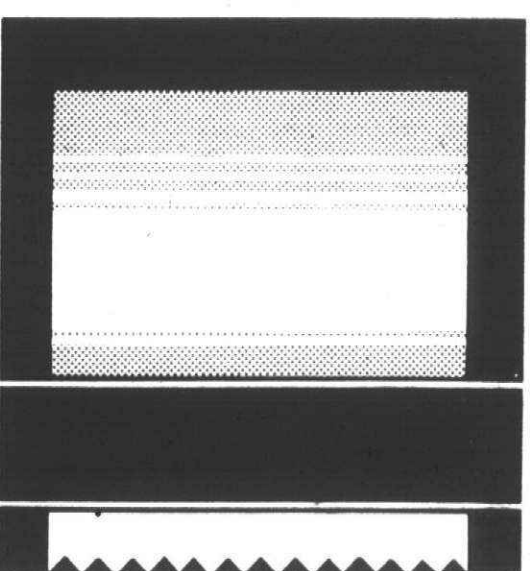
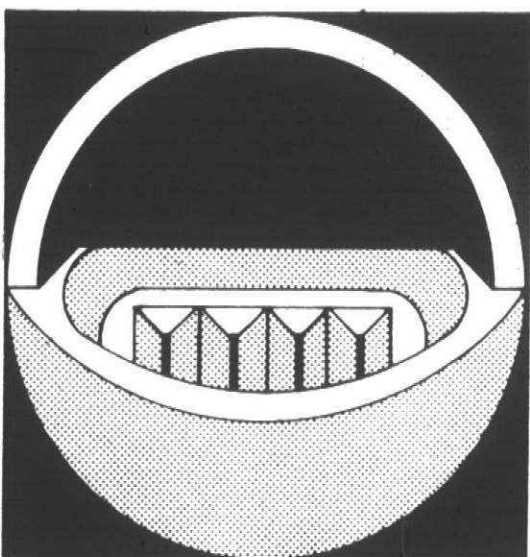
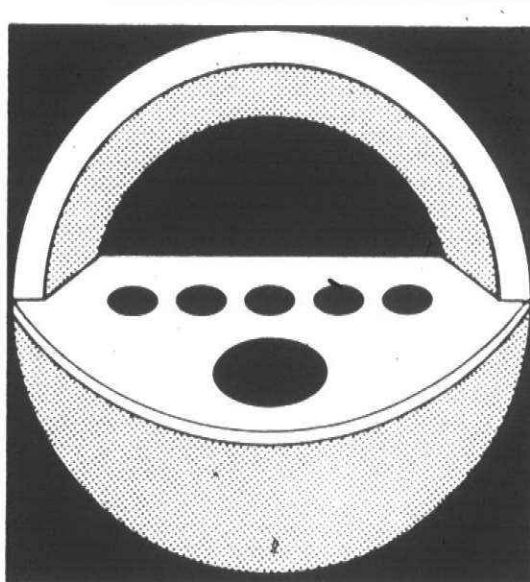

## MACLD chapter's workshop focuses on behavior in kids

A workshop on behavior modification will be held Nov. 15, beginning at 7:30 p.m., in the cafeteria of Pioneer Middle School in Plymouth.

Harold E. Weiner, Ph.D., and Judith B. Weiner, MA, will conduct the workshop being sponsored by the Plymouth, Canton, Northville chapter of the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities (MACLD).

Weiner, who earned his BA, MA and Ph.D. from Michigan State University, has been an assistant professor in special education at Oakland University from 1975 to the present.

During this working experience,

Weiner has dealt extensively with parents of exceptional children. He has both counseled and developed programs for parents.

Ms. Weiner has had a background of 11 years in education, ranging from a teacher in junior high math in Detroit to her current position as regional learning specialist for western Wayne County.

THE WEINER'S presentation will focus on the development of a behavior management system which parents can use immediately with their children.

Development of appropriate rules and procedures at home along with

concomitant reinforcement procedures will be discussed.

The MACLD meeting is free and open to the public. The local chapter is dedicated to finding and helping children with hidden handicaps—the child whose learning performance does not measure up to his or her's learning capabilities.

Chapter meetings are held on the third Wednesday of each month, from September through May but excluding December and April, in the cafeteria of Pioneer Middle School at 46081 Ann Arbor Road, Plymouth.

Parent advisors are at the meetings to aid new members.

## Red Cross and Salvation Army benefit from fund

Bad news and human tragedy.

That's what people usually associate with the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army because when tragedy strikes, these two agencies tend to be first on the scene with massive relief efforts to supply victims with food, clothing and shelter.

The Salvation Army rendered emergency aid to 437 individuals in 1977 in the form of fuel, rent and transportation plus counseling, referral, and home visits.

At Christmas, some 48 Salvation Army volunteers visited more than 2,000 persons and delivered more than 100 food baskets and 59 orders of toys and clothing.

The League of Mercy, a group of 29 volunteers who visit and work with shut-ins, made monthly visits to 1,237 persons in six local institutions and distributed gifts at Christmas.

BUT THE ORGANIZATION does not limit its programs to people with hardships.

Some examples are Sunbeams, a scouting-type program for girls aged 6-12, a recreation and craft kids club, and a social and service club for teenagers.

A free drop-in nursery school at the Army's headquarters, 290 Fairground, Plymouth, continues to thrive. An average of 20 preschoolers attend the two-hour morning sessions, while mothers take turns lending assistance. The program affords some free mornings to the mothers while boosting the children's learning and social skills before they start kindergarten.

The Plymouth Corps also is able to refer people to areawide services of the metropolitan Salvation Army. The newly opened Evangeline Family Shelter is such a service offered to residents of the tri-county area.

WHILE THE Salvation Army collects food and clothing for the needy, the Red Cross solicits another impor-

tant human resource—blood.

Blood drives are one of the Red Cross's largest ongoing effort, with collection sites scheduled periodically at local schools, businesses, churches and commercial establishments throughout the year. The agency has been appointed the sole supplier of blood and blood products in south-eastern Michigan.

The Red Cross also offers one of the county's most active and comprehensive water safety instruction programs, certifying nearly 100,000 adults and children in swimming, small craft handling, and first aid in this part of the state each year.

Both of these agencies benefit from the single annual fundraising drive now being conducted by the Plymouth Community Fund.

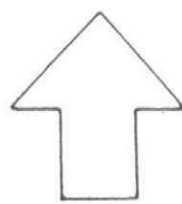

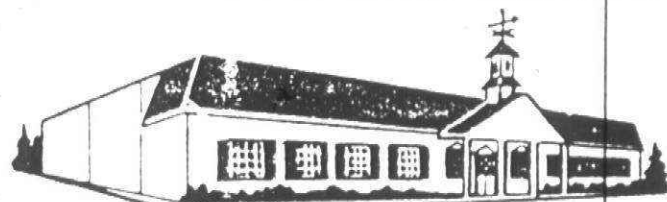

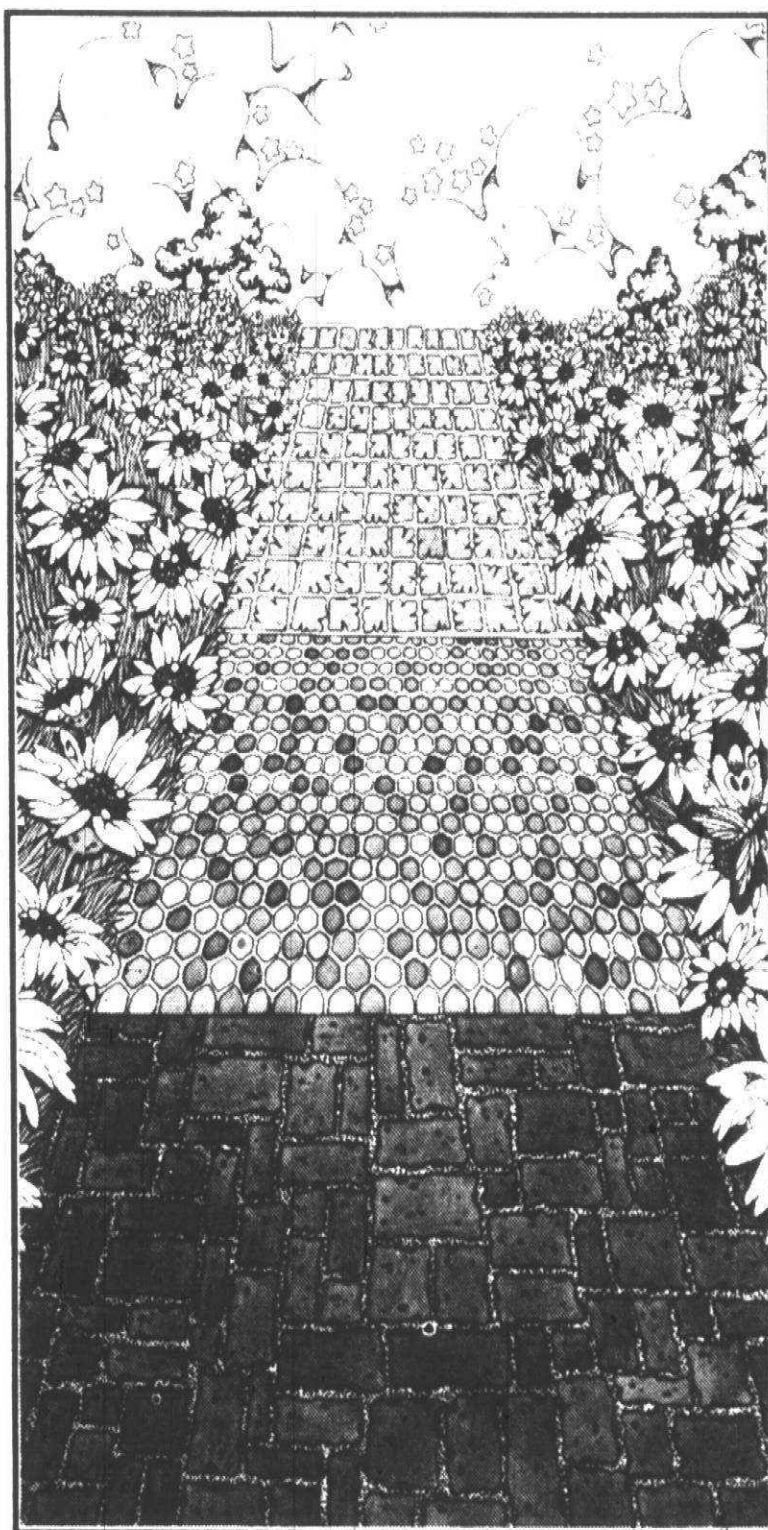

# The Stroller

## The humor in news

If a fellow took the time to save all the orders he received from his managing editor and then had the patience to record how they were carried out, he would have the ingredients for a novel that would reveal the oftentimes humorous side of the journalism profession.

Many times, during his leisure hours, The Stroller chuckles as he travels down memory lane and recalls some of the odd experiences he has had along the way.

One that always comes to mind happened during the football season when the Detroit Lions were riding high and were the topic of conversation at all the popular luncheon places.

After one of these sessions at the Detroit Athletic Club, the late Malcolm Bingay, then the editorial director of the Detroit Free Press, returned

to the office and issued an order that left everyone stunned.

THE BULLETIN, placed on the board in the sports department, stated that there was to be no publicity on the Lions games during the week—even if they were in a train wreck.

Under no conditions shall stories of their games run more than half a column, the order stated, and there is to be no eight column line on the results of their games.

Fine. It was an order. And when Bingay gave an order it was a command that had to be carried out.

Everything went fine, that is, until Sunday's game. On that afternoon in the old University of Detroit Stadium, the Lions won the league title.

It was the biggest story of the day. Ordinarily, it would have been given

top place on the sports pages. But there was Bingay's order.

There was a quick meeting of the minds on how it could be handled. We came up with the idea that the Lion victory made Detroit the City of Champions. And that was the lead story in which the exploits of the Tigers, the Red Wings who won their league titles, Dick Degener, the diving champion and Eddie Tolan, the Olympic sprint champion, were listed. Little mention was made of the Lions' winning effort.

It was odd, but Bingay's orders were carried out.

ON ANOTHER occasion it so happened that the paper had a falling out with the Colonial Clothes Shop, one of the big men's wear establishments.

One-half of the requested increase is to make the necessary economic adjustments for compensation, inflation and utility rate increases, according to WSU officials. The other half represents proposed program improvements.



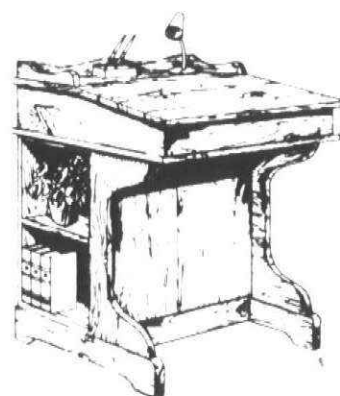

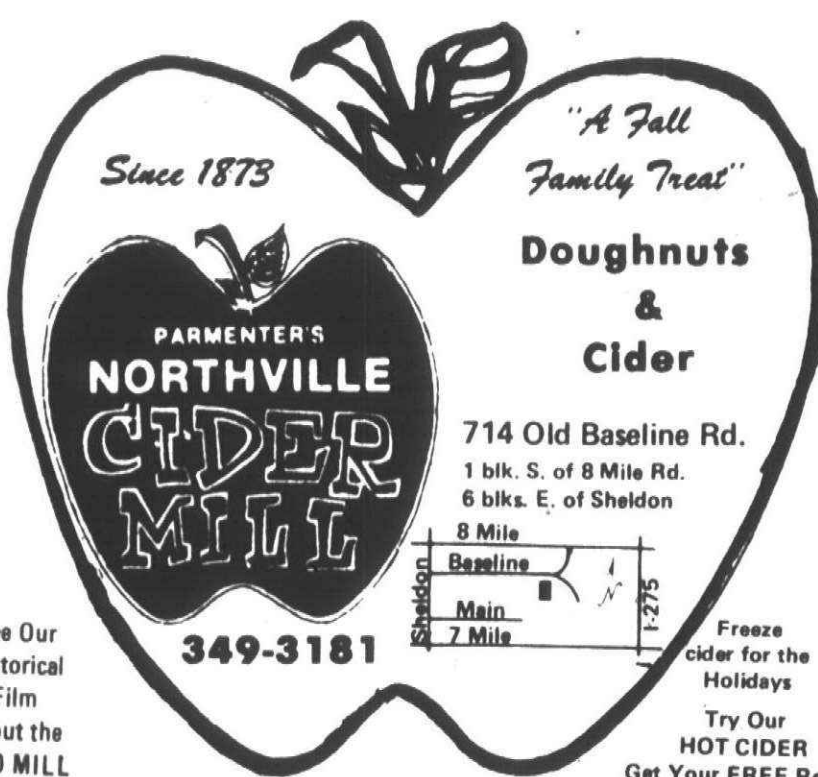

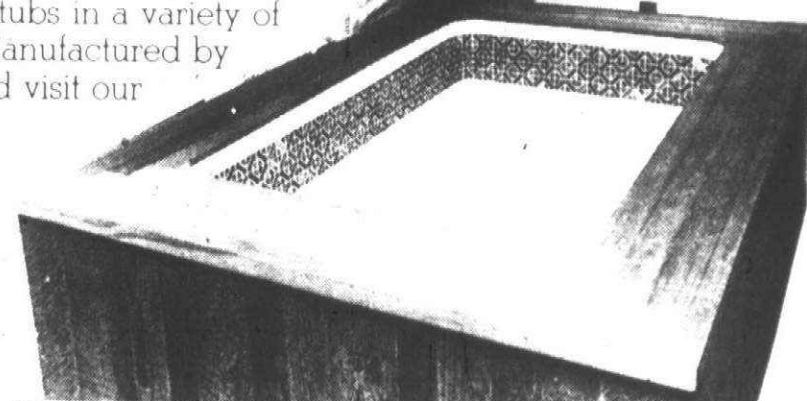

Ravitz advises

Political power propels help

Get political, was the advice Mel Ravitz handed to those attending a recent meeting of the Wayne County Association for the Retarded in John Glenn High School, Westland.

Director of the Detroit-Wayne County Community Mental Health Service, he stressed that political power is the best way to get for the retarded what they need.

"Politics is not a dirty game," said Ravitz, former president of the Detroit Common Council. "It is the means by which decisions are made on who gets what. If you're not organized you, you don't get what you want."

What particularly concerned Ravitz that night was the fact that Wayne County might lose as much as \$13 million from the state because it might not be able to come up with enough matching funds.

About \$25 million was due to go to the county service headed by Ravitz. It distributes the money under contracts to mental community community programs in mental health, and programs for the retarded and other groups. Ravitz claimed that a legal bookkeeping transaction could solve the problem, and enable the county to come up with the \$2.4 million it needed to qualify for the \$25 million.

He urged members of his audience who were parents of the retarded or professionals in the field to contact their county commissioners.

He suggested they tell them that \$1.4 million could be taken from the county's patient account and transferred to the community program, thus giving it the money it needed to qualify for the \$25 million.

A week later the county had taken the action necessary to bring the full state grant.

The problem was resolved by consolidating the community based program with the institutional care program," reported Edward Babowski, county fiscal advisor.

"We were pleased the commissioners decided to merge the funds to allow the county to keep the \$13 million it would have had to turn back, if the county could come up with only part of the matching funds," said Ravitz.

"I think a good number of people must have contacted their county commissioners urging them to take another look at the problem and not leave us short in capturing state money."

MOVING THE RETARDED from

large institutions into small community residences was the main topic discussed by other speakers at the meeting. Marjorie Green, manager of the special housing section of the Michigan State Housing Development Authority, and James Glick, director of Alternative Intermediate Services for the Mentally Retarded, each spoke of the progress their agency was making in constructing the smaller, more personal types of homes for the retarded.

The housing authority has 20 homes in operation with four under construction. In 1976 the authority committed itself to the building of another 40 homes in the state. Most of them will house about 12 residents with construction costs expected to be from \$350,000 to \$400,000 apiece.

"The entire thrust of our program is not just to provide safety and sanitation to our residents," said Ms. Green. "Our goal is to give a higher level of services to residents so they can become more independent, get training and participate in community day programs. They will have more independent lives."

We need groups to form nonprofit corporations that will take on a two-year developmental program for one of these homes with the housing authority, she stated. "The authority will provide a 100 per cent loan and start-up money so the corporation can purchase land and get going," she continued. "We require an \$8,000 funding commitment, so the corporation can demonstrate its fund raising ability."

SIX IS THE NUMBER of residents the AIS plans to place in the small residential units it is planning in the state. Three of these homes are "almost ready to go up" in Westland, Redford Township and Inkster.

In his speech Glick, who lives in Plymouth, pointed out why it was important for the mentally retarded to move into small residential units. He explained that when Scandinavian countries placed their developmentally disabled persons in small, living units, they did not "develop all the bizarre, inappropriate behaviors that typify many retarded citizens in our large institutions."

He added: "I think that the reason we have the best research or treatment of abnormal behavior is because we have possibly the worst living conditions for our developmentally disabled population."

The advantages of a normal environ-

ment are that it enhances a faster rate of learning, and involves the retarded person in the mainstream of the community.

It makes the most of their human and normal qualities and provides them with normal routines and normal developmental experiences.

When Glick worked as a psychologist in an institution in Fort Wayne, Ind., he saw such sights as 56 naked people lined up to take a shower, and 112 people standing in line for each and every meal.

"It was shocking to witness all the other neglectful, de-personalized institutional living conditions," he said.

THE HOMES DEVELOPED by AIS have three bedrooms for six persons. In addition to a barrier-free bathroom and kitchen, the homes will also have a dining room, living room, laundry

room, a half-bath and a small records room to document progress.

They will be funded by the state. However, if they meet federal standards for care, 50 per cent of the cost will be reimbursed by the federal government.

The residents must either be in school or in such day programs as work activity center or shelter workshops. They will be supervised by a staff of two.

Certain members of the community have objected to these residences and have used zoning laws to exclude them. However, recent zoning regulations voted by the state legislature prohibit discrimination against small residential homes serving mentally handicapped persons. At the same time regulations protect residential communities against excessive concentration of these homes.

## At the RenCen Holograms exhibited

The traveling exhibition of the Museum of Holography, which has been referred to as "Technological Tut," will be in Renaissance Center through Nov. 29.

Titled "Through the Looking Glass" after the museum's inaugural exhibition, it constitutes the first major display of holography available for wide circulation in North America.

Holography is a technique which uses lasers to create three-dimensional images that appear to be solid reproductions of the original object. Some holograms even seem to move as the viewer moves around them.

The "Looking Glass" exhibition contains more than 25 state-of-the-art examples, each by the museum for its artistic and technical merit, according to curator Paul Barefoot.

The show also contains two historic

holograms, including "Train and Bird," the first hologram ever made with a laser, produced in 1964 at the University of Michigan. The other is "Pum II," the first black and white hologram, made in 1976. It paved the way for color control of future holograms.

The "Technological Tut" nickname comes from the popularity which the exhibit has experienced in other cities. The exhibit presents a thorough and entertaining introduction to holography for the general public.

The exhibition is in the Renaissance Events Center on the second lobby level between Towers 200 and 300. It is open 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays. Admission is \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for senior citizens and children under 12.

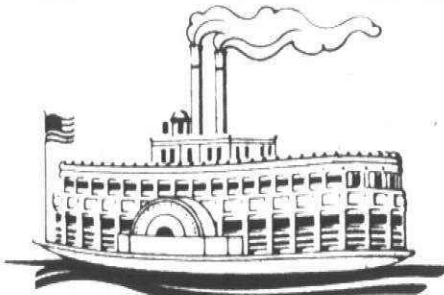

# Racial play makes uptight cast

Miscegenation and the misplaced suffering it caused in the deep south is a popular theme in novels romanticizing life on a southern plantation.

One of the most powerful American dramatic interpretations returns of this theme to the stage when the Eastern Michigan University Players present their version of Langston Hughes' "Mulatto" at 8 p.m. Nov. 2-4 in EMU's Quirk Auditorium.

The play, originally written as part of the Federal Theater Project during the Depression, had the longest run of any play by a black playwright on Broadway until "A Raisin in the Sun" in 1959.

IT IS SET in the 1930s in Georgia and explores the slave-master relationship of a white plantation owner, his black mistress and their four children.

An untimely homecoming brings chaos and bedlam to the plantation when the youngest son comes home from school.

Included in the production are students Helen Slaven of Garden City, who is the assistant director, and Kevin Springer of Westland, who plays the part of William Lewis.

"The play surrounds the colonel and his mistress, Cora, and one of their children—the youngest son, Robert," explained director Marvin Sims. "Bert" goes away to school and he gets an idea of what life is like outside of the plantation.

"He gets a taste of what it is like to have freedom and to have individual rights and privileges. When he comes home, he brings his outside influences

and we find they just don't work."

Though set in the 30s, Sims said that the old "plantation rules" of the 18th and 19th centuries still apply to the setting of the play. "You could easily imagine it is set in 1865," he said.

The colonel and Cora live together in the plantation house despite societal pressures. One of the problems in directing the play, with a cast of 11, brought some of those sensitivities to light.

"The whole idea of having an interracial cast for this play was a problem in itself. Normally we have all black productions and interracial productions, but in this instance we have interracial relationships as husband and wife, father and daughter and father and son," Sims explained.

Was the play difficult for a student cast? Sims says yes.

"It has been difficult to get into the whole racist mode. It is kind of tense, especially for Paul who has to play the colonel. He has to say all kinds of derogatory things about the 'darkies' who work on the plantation," Sims said.

"THE WHOLE IDEA of physically touching each other in the play is

sometimes tense for students, too. As a director I could sit in the audience and actually see the tenseness. They're getting over it but those things were very evident at the outset of the play. The whole idea of the acting process is taking over now."

When Sims noticed that the students were having problems relating to each other because of interracial hangups, he took action.

"We talked about it, discussed it and put it out into the open. I like directing that way and talking with my actors and questioning them about their characters and finding out about things they feel uncomfortable about. It's good to go back and forth on a few things," he said.

## George Crumb taps into life's essence

For Beethoven, it was the woods around Vienna. For George Crumb, Pulitzer Prize-winning contemporary composer, it is the sounds of the hum-backed whale, the signs of the zodiac, poetry of Federico Garcia Lorca, the "echoes of autumn," which stir him to write music.

Crumb was in Detroit last Friday, as special guest for the Detroit Pro Musica Society Concert. The society, with the help of the Michigan Council of the Arts brought the Aeolian Players to perform three Crumb compositions along with comment by Crumb himself.

THE WORKS WERE "Eleven Echoes of Autumn" (1965), "Dream Sequence" (1976) and "Voice of the Whale" (1971). The players, for whom Crumb wrote this music, were violinist Lewis Kaplan, cellist Ronald Thomas, clarinetist Thomas Hill and pianist Jacob Maxin. Detroit Symphony Orchestra principal flutist Ervin Monroe "assisted"—brilliantly.

The Detroit Art Institute's intimate lecture hall was filled with music lovers. These are no ordinary music lovers. Pro Musica, a legendary artist-discovering society in Detroit, is revitalizing in the composing area. Thank them for Detroit debuts of Maurice Ravel, Darius Milhaud, Richard Soltzman, the Guarneri String Quartet and, significantly, with Crumb. He's one of the best.

He's also one of the most interesting. "Music," he has said, "is the cell from which sprang science and language."

He's fascinated with the origins of things. "It is sometimes of interest to a composer to recall the original impulse—the 'creative germ'—of a composition."

That could be a line of a poem by Lorca, his favorite, or a chance hearing of a recording of whales singing.

HIS MUSIC TAKES YOU on a trip to the essence of things. "I am fascinated by sounds so incredibly fragile you almost doubt their existence as notes—whisperings on the flute, harmonics on the piano, barely bowing the violin—a kind of crumbling, as it were, of sound." (Pun intended, he lets you know with a grin.)

He describes a short motif of five notes, which appears throughout "Echoes of Autumn," as "a generative element or cell." Somehow you want to hear him and Edward O. Wilson, the infamous sociobiologist, talking. Of course science sings—or, the world sings, and scientists and musicians

both can hear. All of us can hear. All it takes is listening—Crumb-style.

The music is quiet, sensuous, strange. The pianist is inside the lid half the time, thwacking, stroking, plucking the strings, knocking against the metal, against the wood. This quiet stuff isn't as demanding for the pianist as Crumb's "Macrocosmos," a stunning work based on the signs of the zodiac, but no matter. There's enough to hold your interest.

Each player gets to vocalize, whistle, hum go "schewewewewew." In "Dream Sequence," Mr. and Mrs. Warren Schwyder (she's Joan Freeman of Cranbrook's American Artist Series) are backstage stroking the wet rims of wine glasses to make them tremble and ring.

Kaplan, playing percussion borrowed from the Detroit Symphony's Bob Panghorn and the "Timbuktu" band, uses his violin bow along the edge of the cymbals. Mrs. Schwyder's mother, next to me, listens, bird-like, attentive. "It's fun," she says.

"We're so immersed in traditional music today," says Crumb, "that we're not thinking how astonishing things were in previous centuries when instruments were changing to fit music's demands. Imagine a new piano designed to extend the possibilities that composers want."

For what he wants, I envision something out of a Dr. Seuss book.

THE SCORES AREN'T traditional looking, either. There are squares of notes, or circles, like islands in the sea. It's symbolic, poetic notation, says the composer.

"Showing shapes of music is an old Renaissance idea." A performer comments, "It's so pretty, you don't know whether to play it or frame it."

With all this, you would expect George Crumb to look like a wizard, a microbiologist, or a mad scientist. He's full of mischief, true, but more like Mark Twain. There's an almost Chaplinesque air about him. He's disarming, a comfortable man, and you can imagine a relaxed afternoon's talk in the backyard, wood waiting unsplit while you penetrate the mysteries of microtones, glissandi and the theatrical effect of motions that make sounds.

The sounds are new, but ancient, the man unassuming, friendly, full of fun—and both man and music are good for the spirit of curiosity in all of us.

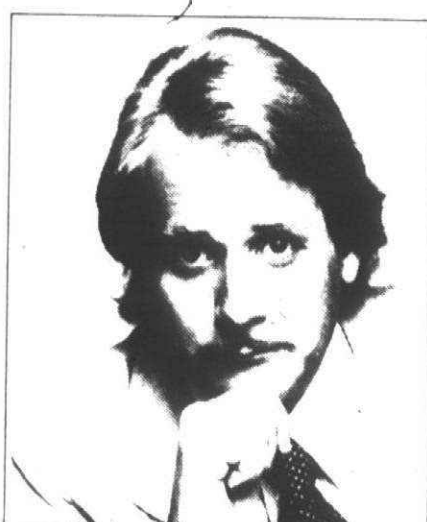

# An uphill struggle follows theater's smash opening

Running a legitimate theater can be exciting—with Broadway, Hollywood and television stars on stage. But Gary Deeb, a partner in the Birmingham Theatre, finds the business is tough going financially.

The old vaudeville theater was primarily a movie house until it became a legitimate theater last May under Deeb and his partners, Ernest and Ted Fuller.

The theater got its start in May when comedian David Brenner, the opening attraction, sold out the house for six shows.

"I was spoiled," said Deeb, recalling that first successful booking, because other shows since then—with the exception of Martin Mull in concert and the musical "Bubbling Brown Sugar"—have not been money-makers.

THE BIRMINGHAM Theatre has booked everything from internationally renowned jazz concert stars to name entertainers who headline shows in Las Vegas. Broadway plays, as well as musicals, also have been presented.

And although Celeste Holm, starring in a one-woman show, "Paris Was Yesterday," was a critical success, the play bombed at the box office. Another flop was country entertainer Emmet Till.

The Birmingham Theatre opened its first subscription season in September with the lavish Las Vegas revue, "Les Girls, Les Girls," starring singer Tony Martin and his wife, dancer Cyd Charisse.

Of "Les Girls," Deeb said, "It's been the biggest gross so far, but it cost so much we didn't make money on it."

Deeb said many shows at the Birmingham

Theatre have cost about \$50,000, and "Les Girls" obviously exceeded that figure.

Deeb said other theater owners told him the Birmingham Theatre will be lucky if it breaks even in three years.

"Our goal has been to operate in the black after 12 months," Deeb said.

THE FIRST subscription season continues with the John Houseman Acting Company presenting three plays in repertory.

Deeb said he is upset about what he believes is lack of support by the Birmingham City Commission and the public. But, he said, both have been concerned about whether the Birmingham Theatre will bring quality and family entertainment to Birmingham.

"We're having trouble selling tickets for the Houseman Company, which is the finest acting company in the country today," he said. "Where are the people who want quality? We're keeping our part of the bargain."

The theater originally tried to get approval from the city commission for a liquor license allowing alcoholic beverages to be sold to theatergoers during intermission.

That request was withdrawn after some controversy, and the partners instead announced they would open a French restaurant next door to the theater, if they could obtain a liquor license.

A play and dinner package would combine "a beautiful French dinner and an excellent play," Deeb said.

Disappointed about the city's seeming lack of enthusiasm, he declared that if the theater doesn't get the license, "We may just decide as business people, the hell with it."

That would be the end of the Birmingham Theatre as a legitimate theater, and the space would be converted to other businesses, Deeb said.

# For the folks backstage, it's never a dull moment

Ray Bolger, that grand old man of song and dance, speaks highly of the Birmingham Theatre, even though the theater cancelled one of his two shows last August.

Bolger had arrived at the Birmingham Theatre in August to appear on Friday and Saturday night. "They hadn't even sold 100 tickets," he said last week in a telephone interview.

"I walked all over downtown Detroit and had people stop me on the street and ask what I was doing in town."

A LACK OF pre-publicity was blamed for people not knowing that Bolger was coming. "When they (the public) heard I was there, they came bounding in," he declared.

Gary Deeb, one of the theater owners, said Bolger was Mr. Nice Guy, who tore up the original contract and said, "What can you afford?"

Asked about this incident, Bolger responded, "Nobody should lose any money. I didn't care about that. Mr. Deeb is trying very hard. I have a great deal of respect for him."

Turning the tables, Bolger continued, "He couldn't have been a nicer person or a more honest person. The main thing is for the theater to get started so people can see the shows."

Bolger said the Birmingham Theatre has a quality of intimacy. "It felt like it had been lived in. You felt the audience was with you."

In his show, 74-year-old Bolger danced for an ecstatic crowd that would hardly let him off the stage or past the stage door.

"It's almost a community theater and a wonderful one," Bolger said. "I'd love to come back."

The Birmingham Theatre attracts the true theater audience, Bolger said. Playing before larger crowds in bigger places can provide excitement, but "I'd rather do this for less money because there's a feeling of love and warmth."

Even the Birmingham Theatre's biggest success story had its rough moments. Gary Deeb, who personally booked David Brenner as the opening attraction, remembers this "most traumatic experience."

"I'll never forget it," Deeb said. "The day

before Brenner opened his manager called and said Brenner had hurt his back and couldn't come. We said okay, if the man's ill.

"Later they told us Brenner was so surprised by the way we reacted he decided to come anyhow."

Brenner performed, visibly with a bad back, to full houses.

THE BIRMINGHAM Theatre has taken its lumps, however. The theater's former managing director Pierre LaMarre, who booked attractions through the first season, brought in Ann Corio's revue "This Was Burlesque."

Deeb said, "I asked if children could see it. My idea of burlesque was slapstick comedy. The next thing I knew, a stripper was stripping on stage."

He added that it would have been a terrible business decision to put on that kind of show after the problems caused when Platt Theatres (the previous leasee) booked the nude Broadway revue "Oh, Calcutta!" That show resulted in a controversy which pitted Birmingham city officials against the theatre owners. After court proceedings, "Oh, Calcutta!" was performed in Birmingham.

LaMarre resigned his position at the Birmingham Theatre after the run of "This Was Burlesque."

LATER ON, many theatergoers were taken with surprise with "Les Girls, Les Girls," which featured bare-breasted showgirls in a Las Vegas revue starring Tony Martin and Cyd Charisse.

"After the first week we had few calls or complaints about partial nudity," Deeb said. "Some people skipped the first half of the show and came after intermission."

"Les Girls, Les Girls" drew the biggest crowds to the theater. "We had 6,000 people in the theater during one week," Deeb said.

The Birmingham Theatre also had problems with singer-dancer Joey Heatherton, who refused to perform on her opening night.

"I read in Variety that she walked off the stage of the Sahara in Vegas complaining about the sound system," Deeb said. "That's the same thing that happened here."

# Boutique helps Mormons care for their own

If you are one of those who believe that homemade is better, then the place for you on Nov. 4 is the Livonia Mormon Market, where a great proportion of the items on sale will have been made by members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

The church is strongly family-oriented, and each family in the Livonia Ward is expected to pick an item and produce it during the year. Then on Nov. 4 they will bring the resulting products to the chapel at Six Mile and Merriman for sale from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Having an important role in this fund raising event for the church will be the women of the church, who have been turning out quilts, knitted and crocheted items and Raggedy Ann and Raggedy Andy dolls about three feet tall.

Homemade sausage may also be purchased along with home-canned vegetables, jams, jellies and pickles.

Mormon women are big on turning out a healthy loaf of bread that is more than air, and the public will have a chance to test their skill in this art. But don't miss the other baked goods and candy.

Much of this work has been accomplished with the backing of the church's Relief Society, the organization works with church women to educate them, strengthen their faith and care for the poor, sick and unfortunate of the church.

"WE ADVOCATE THAT none of our members be on government relief," said Madelyn Bodily, president of the Relief Society. "There is no reason for them to be on welfare because the church has the social services to help them."

A custom of the church is to prepare for calamities by storing in the home a year's supply of food. "Last year we had no difficulties with food when the storm hit because we all had supplies on hand," noted Mrs. Bodily.

This helps too when someone loses a

job. But if food is needed eventually, a special truck with food comes twice each month from Indianapolis to a parking lot in Dearborn. While some of it is food that can be purchased in any grocery store, most of it is processed by Mormons in welfare canning centers. There is one in Indianapolis and one to be constructed soon in Wixom.

The main work of the Relief Society is planning programs for the women of the church. There are separate projects for women 18 and over, for young single adult women, for married women and for any women over 25 who is divorced, widowed or single.

Church women are generally referred to as sisters and there are 153 of them who come under Mrs. Bodily's jurisdiction.

Working with her on education is Mary Loosle, with Marie Chamberlain assigned to homemaking. Joyce Falkner is secretary-treasurer, taking the responsibility for society funds and keeping track of the women's attendance at church, Sunday school and relief society meetings.

MRS. LOOSLE AND MRS. CHAM-

BERLAIN HAVE the big job of preparing for the weekly Wednesday morning meeting of the society at the chapel. These which take place from 9:30-11 a.m. are open to the public. They are repeated on Sunday from 9-10:30 a.m. for those women who are employed.

Spiritual living is a topic explored by the women once a week through the works of the Book of Mormon, the King James Version of the Bible, the works of Mormon prophet Joseph Smith.

Homemaking is also taken up at one meeting each month. Budgeting decisions are examined along with nutrition, sewing and first aid. Mini lessons are designed to help women in their role of housewife and mother. They can learn to cook and make tasty selomi and quilts. Or they can take up oil painting or flower arrangements.

"It is amazing the talents the women in the ward are willing to share," observed Mrs. Loosle.

A nursery school program geared to

pre-schoolers of three different ages is held while the women meet.

Other topics examined in the weekly meetings is one called mother education which stresses family tradition, patriotism, preparing for a new baby and teenage problems, and social relations involving self-esteem, and leadership potential.

The fourth weekly meeting takes the women to far off countries through books and film strips. They learn cultural differences, art, music, history and language of a number of countries.

THE WOMEN HAVE a sense of solidarity with their Mormon sisters in other lands. "We can go to a ward anywhere in the world," said Mrs. Loosle, "and our sisters there would be studying the same lesson we are."

"When I was in Argentina, the women were going over the same lesson in Spanish, and adapting it to their culture," added Mrs. Bodily.

Members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints divide themselves into geographical wards and stakes. Belonging to the Westland

Hunters spot few pheasants

One of the poorest pheasant seasons in years is being reported in Oakland, Macomb and Wayne counties this year.

And duck hunting isn't a whole lot better, according to the district Department of Natural Resources office.

Hunting pressure was down drastically. Few hunters report even seeing pheasants, let alone taking any.

Opening day is supposed to be the best because the young cock pheasants haven't "wised up" yet. Well, in one Wayne County survey, 248 hunters were checked and found to have taken only 14 pheasants.

Dry weather was partly responsible. Dogs have trouble picking up a scent when it's dry.

The big factor, as we reported weeks ago, was the decrease in the pheasant crop because of the last two severe winters.

How can game biologists make such predictions? Each spring DNR recruits its own people and fellows like rural mail carriers to make spot checks at specified times of day. They listen for the cackle of male pheasants who crow about their success with the ladies. From those cackles they can predict how many baby pheasants there will be.

This year the predictions were all too correct.

DUCK HUNTING pressure and success have fallen off, too.

Some ducks are still being taken on larger marshes. Duck hunting is picking up on Lake St. Clair where layout shooters reported some success on scaup.

At Pte. Mouillee marshes, down Monroe County way, duck and goose hunting have been slow with occasional success on mallards and pintails.

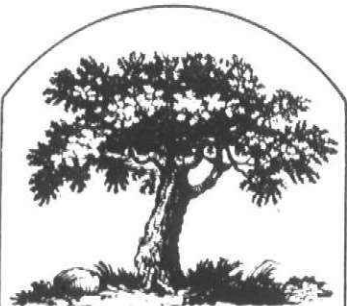
No explanation for the shortage of ducks.

PERCH FISHING has been excellent in Lake St. Clair. Walleyes are showing up in the channels near Har- sen's Island.

Lots of perch are being caught off Huron Point and near the shipping channel on the St. Clair River. Some coho salmon—up to 15 pounds—are being taken in the river, too.

Anglers are few and far between on the inland lakes, but the fish are available. It's cold, though, when the wind kicks up. Only the tough guys can take it.

KENSINGTON Metropark near Mil- ford has three special nature center programs lined up for the week ahead.



Outdoors

The nature center is on the west side of the lake; take the Kensington Road exit from I-96.

On tap are:

• "Woodland Walk" at 9 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 5. Naturalist Bob Hotaling will lead a 90-minute hike along wooded trails to observe mammals gathering food to stock their pantries.

• "Nature's Night Life" at 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 9. Naturalist Dave Moilanen will show slides and lead a walk, so bring a flashlight. Many animals such as deer, raccoons and owls are most active only after sunset.

• "Lake Life" at 9 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 12. Moilanen will investigate life within a lake community, including plants, animals and waterfowl.

You'll need \$1 a car or an annual \$5 sticker to get into the park. The programs are free, but you should call the park office at 686-1561 to register. Dress warmly and bring binoculars.

WHAT WOULD life in Michigan be like without mice?

Foxes and coyotes feed on them. Owls and birds of prey relish them. Snakes enjoy them if they (the snakes) are big enough.

Michigan has 10 species of mice. The mouse's bad reputation comes from two non-native species—the house mouse and the big, grey Norway rat.

Native mice are mostly cute fellows. My hunting partner, C.O. Jones, used to keep a field mouse as a pet. The mouse's home was a tall, old-fashioned bird cage; his bedding and climbing rope was an ancient sweatshirt; food was Indian corn, nuts, seeds, berries and fruit.

In the woods, mice are believed to be responsible for the disappearance of shed deer antlers and the small bones of mammal and bird skeletons.

So important is the mouse as a food supply that he has to be a prolific creature. Gestation period is 21 days, and they have several litters a year.

Michigan is home to two species of jumping mice—the meadow jumping mouse and the woodland jumping mouse.

## 'It would take a miracle'

Let the truth be known.

While it is nearly impossible for Plymouth Salem's football team to qualify for the state playoffs, head coach Tom Moshimer thinks his team belongs with the other elite squads in the state.

"It would take a miracle to get in but I think we're good enough to be there," said Moshimer after Friday night's 43-point victory over Livonia Bentley. "I'd never have believed it but we are (good enough)."

"We're good enough to compete with the people there because we've improved each week."

If Salem defeats Farmington Harrison in the season finale, and it is favored to do so, it will finish with an 8-1 overall record and a second-place finish in the Suburban Eight League. The only scar on this record is a five-point setback to undefeated and state-playoff-bound Trenton.

Actually, there are only eight undefeated teams in the state going into this final week of the season. This puts Salem with a host of 8-1 teams which probably won't go to post-season competition, either. Some once-beaten teams will compete, however.

Because of the regional set-up for the state playoffs, Salem might have qualified for the playoffs as one of the top two teams in another region.

Region One, for example, has no undefeated teams, as two once-beaten Class A squads will be in the playoffs. Trenton is the lone undefeated club in Region Two which means another once-beaten squad will be assured of a playoff position.

The Rocks, however, find themselves in Region Three where there are four undefeated squads ahead

of them in the points game. Salem is the top once-beaten squad in the region, but no other division sports so many undefeated teams.

The miracle Moshimer was speaking of means three of these four undefeated squads—Livonia Churchill, North Farmington, Lake Shore and Detroit Northwestern—would have to lose on this final week for Salem to be considered for the playoffs.

And the prospects of this happening are slim to none.

The question which still remains is how good does Salem compare to the rest of the once-beaten squads which will make the playoffs.

Unfortunately, there is no way to answer this question.

### THIS WEEK'S GAMES

Canton closes the season with a different opponent this season—Dearborn Edsel Ford. It's a home game for the Chiefs, starting at the new time of 7:30 p.m. In the past, Canton ended the season with Dearborn High. Edsel Ford or Dearborn—the final result shouldn't change. The Chiefs are definitely better than in years past. Their 4-4 overall record, the best mark by any Canton football squad, would indicate this.

But Edsel Ford, like Dearborn, just has too much physical strength against the smaller Chiefs. Edsel Ford by 29.

Salem finishes its season one day later in a Saturday afternoon game at Farmington Harrison starting at 2 p.m. The past Salem-Harrison games have been interesting because both programs field strong squads year after year.

That Salem wishbone offense will outduel Harrison's star fullback Dave Turnquist. Salem by 14.

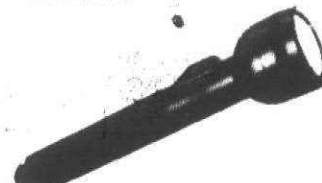

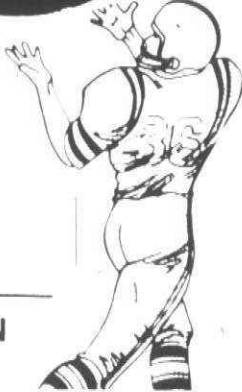

# Churchill rolls past Franklin

Livonia Churchill demolished intra-city rival Livonia Franklin last weekend, 20-0, in a non-league football contest. The victory gave the Chargers a perfect 8-0 season and prepared them for Friday's contest with Livonia Stevenson.

Still in the same quarter, Jon Burke forced a Franklin fumble and Rick Groak scooped the ball in for the Chargers.

The turnover started a 60-yard Churchill drive. During the march down the field, Coppola and Lieholdt connected on two key passes. Mason finally iced the drive with a one-yard touchdown run. The extra-point kick missed and Churchill led 13-0.

Lieholdt scored the final Churchill touchdown with eight minutes left in the fourth period when he caught a screen pass from Coppola and scampered 30 yards into the endzone. Again, Coppola kicked the point-after.

"The key to our success in the first half was our defense. Burke and Dave Krivk were outstanding for us," Kaestner said.

Jerry Cifor led the Patriots' offensive attack with 120 yards in 13 carries. Other than that, Franklin was pretty well contained.

"On offense, Coppola and Lieholdt

did a super job," said Kaestner.

Churchill faces Stevenson at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Churchill.

Detroit Catholic Central had a few worries before it was able to defeat Southgate Aquinas, 31-14, last weekend in a non-league football contest.

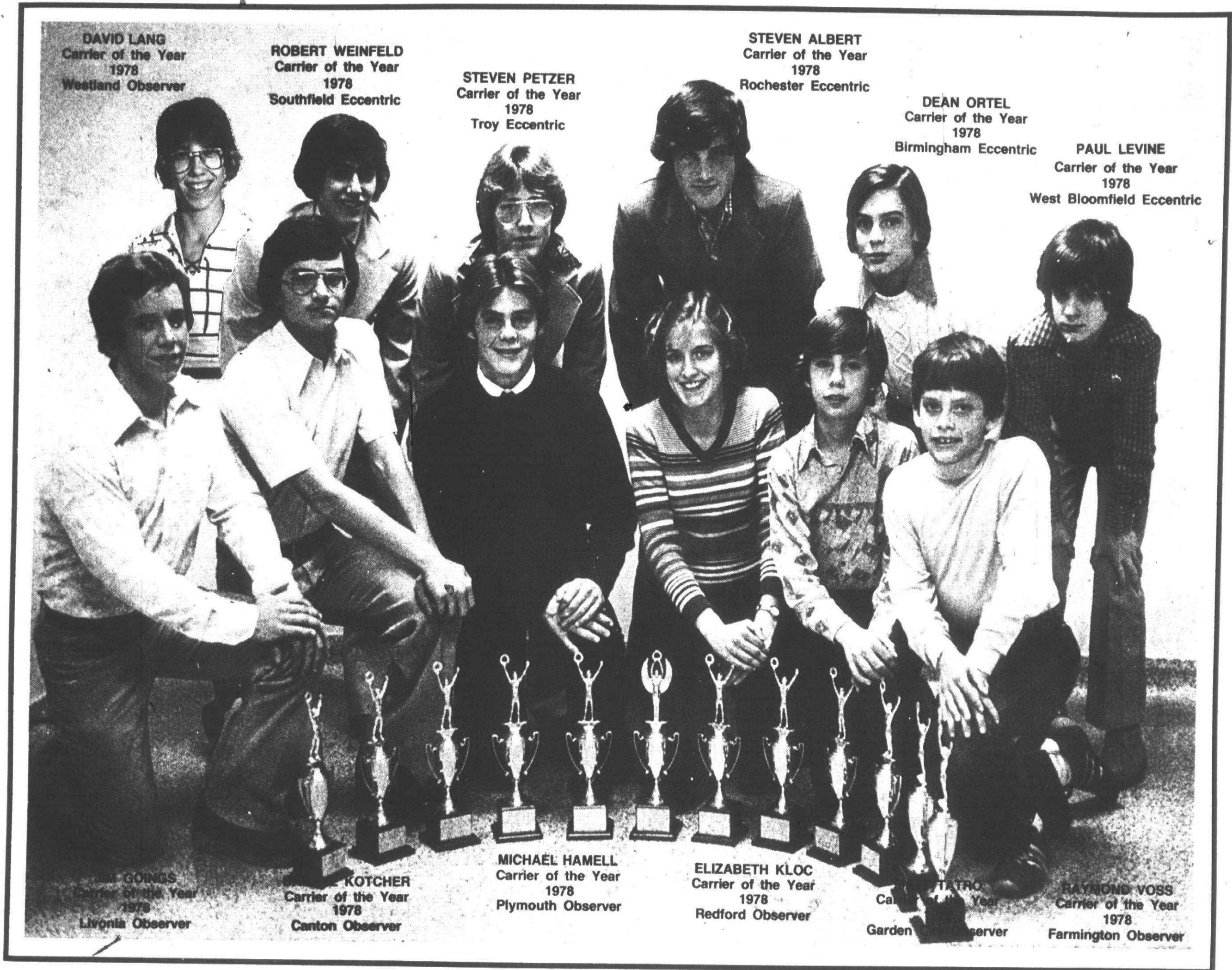

# Raiders eye perfect record

North Farmington's post-season football fate may be sealed about two hours before it takes the field for its regular-season finale next Saturday afternoon.

North Farmington, unbeaten through eight games this season, is contending for a place in the state Class A playoffs as a member of Region 3. Livonia Churchill and Detroit Northwestern are also contenders in Region 3. The top two teams in each of the state's four Class A regions will advance to the playoffs.

Unbeaten Churchill can grab a playoff spot if it can defeat once-beaten Livonia Stevenson next Friday night. Of much more importance to North Farmington will be the Northwestern-

"For the past couple of weeks, Fredericks has been working awfully hard to regain his starting position," Holland said. "He's been throwing real well in practice. We've been spending a lot of time with all our quarterbacks on the running and the passing games."

North's passing game was impressive—10 completions in 17 attempts with one harmless interception.

Harrison's passing game provided not one yard—0 for 10 with three key interceptions. Interceptions by Nutter and Jim Minihmett set up North touchdowns. Coach Ralph Temby's alert Raider defense was led by junior tackle George Houttekier, who was awarded the game helmet for his outstanding play.

Mike Miller, another North tailback, led all rushers with 104 yards in 19 carries. Harrison's Dave Turnquist, who had been averaging more than 80 yards a game at tailback, gained only 29 yards in seven tries against North.

Harrison ends its season next Saturday at home against once-beaten Plymouth Salem. Game time is 2 p.m.

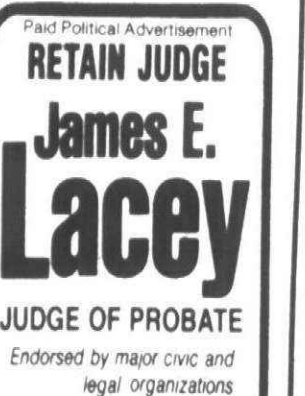

## Interest/Checking Plans. What they are. What they aren't. Are they right for you?

### What they are.

You've been hearing a lot lately about the new Interest/Checking Plans that are available to bank customers. These new plans have come about because of revisions in Federal banking regulations that permit banks to automatically transfer funds from a savings account to a checking account with the customer's prior approval. With this change two new benefits are available to bank customers. They are:

- The Interest/Checking Plan combines the features of a \$0 balance checking account with those of a regular savings account. With it 5% annual interest can be earned on the money you would normally keep in your checking account. As checks are written, funds are automatically transferred from savings to checking.
- The other new plan assures protection against the occasional checking account overdraft by drawing on funds in an especially designated savings account.

These advantages may sound good to you and they can be. But before you decide to sign up for either account, read a little further.

### What they aren't.

First of all, the Interest/Checking Plan is definitely not for everybody. Accounts offered by most banks will carry a different level of service charges than in the past.

To understand the reason for this, it will be helpful to know the two basic ways in which a bank compensates its customers for the use of their funds. Up to now the majority of bank customers have received "indirect interest" on their checking account; that is, the amount paid in service charges was probably less than it cost the bank to service the account, especially if the customer kept a relatively small balance and wrote a great many checks. In absorbing this cost, the bank has really been paying "indirect interest."

Under the new Interest/Checking Plan customers will be earning "direct interest" paid at a fixed rate for the use of their money. Because of this, your bank will be more likely to charge for the expenses incurred in servicing checking accounts. Typically, this charge will be a fee for each check written plus a flat fixed monthly charge for the statement. The bank may also establish an average balance above which service charges are waived. This method of charging for the service is not too unlike some methods presently used. However, the level of charges and required balance can be expected to be somewhat higher than in the past.

With this explanation of the Interest/Checking Plan you may wish to evaluate its advantages from your own particular situation.

### Are they right for you?

Evaluation is largely a matter of comparing what the new service will cost you in charges and fees with the amount you will earn in interest on your deposits. Just follow these simple steps:

### INTEREST/CHECKING WORKSHEET

1. Determine the number of checks you typically write each month.
2. Figure the amount of checking service charges you would pay each month. (To compute this, determine how much your bank will charge for each check and the monthly statement charge, if any. Multiply the check charge by the average number of checks you write. Finally, add the statement charge to get your monthly service charge.)
3. Estimate your average checking account balance. (One easy way to approximate this in many cases is to add the beginning balance on your statement to the ending balance and divide by two.)
4. Estimate the interest you would earn in one month. (Multiply your average checking balance by 5% and divide by 12.)
5. Subtract your service charges from the amount of interest earned.

If the amount of interest earned is less than the service charge, you will not benefit. If the amount of interest is greater than the service charge, the plan may be to your advantage.

If the comparison above indicates that interest checking will not be beneficial, you can continue with your present checking account plan or you may want to make some adjustments in the way you manage your money by following these simple suggestions:

- Combine the balances from other checking and savings accounts. This may give you the necessary funds to cover your checking account charges. A larger average balance in your interest/checking account assures a greater return.
- Pay as many bills as possible through pre-authorized automatic payments, reducing the number of checks you write. Examples include payments on mortgage and installment loans, and insurance premiums.
- Arrange with your employer for direct deposit of your paycheck into your savings account. Since all the money is deposited and probably sooner, it will earn you more interest.
- Avoid writing numbers of small checks for minor purchases—miscellaneous groceries, hardware or drug store items. Instead, write a single check for the amount of cash you know you will need.

Even though you've analyzed interest/checking, and perhaps have not found it suited to your needs, there is still the *Overdraft Protection Plan* to consider.

This plan simply covers overdrafts in your checking account—up to the balance in your savings account—by automatically transferring funds from savings to checking as needed. A minimum balance is required by some banks and a fee is normally charged for each such transfer. This plan's principal advantage is to eliminate the embarrassment and inconvenience of returned checks.

# Top seeds dominate Leach racquetball tourney

There were surprises and upsets, but the two number one seeds managed to survive them and win their respective divisions in the Leach Motor City Racquetball Classic, held last weekend at the Southfield Racquet Center.

Marty Hogan from St. Louis, Mo., considered the top professional player on the tour, lived up to his rating by whipping number two seed Rich Wagner of Paterson, N.J., in the finals, 21-12, 21-19.

In the women's division, number one seed Shannon Wright of Las Vegas, Ne., topped unseeded Marci Greer of

San Diego, Ca., 21-12, 21-8, to win the women's title. Wright was the only one of the top eight seeds to survive the quarterfinals.

Hogan earned \$4,500 with his victory and Wagner received \$2,500 for finishing second. Wright's win was worth \$1,300 and Greer made \$800 for placing second.

It was the first victory of the season for the nation's two top players, Hogan and Wright. Both were upset in the first event on the tour, the Jack-In-The-Box Classic in St. Louis.

Ironically, the two players who were upset winners in St. Louis, Steve Strandemo of San Diego, Ca. and Jen-

nifer Harding of Portland, Ore., were themselves upset in the early rounds of the Southfield tournament.

Strandemo lost his opening match to Rick Dern, of Chicago, Ill., 14-21, 21-11, 11-5, while Harding, seeded number two in the tournament, lost to eventual finalist Greer in the second round, 21-15, 20-21, 11-5.

MIKE YELLEN of Southfield survived some early scares and advanced to the semi-finals before losing to Hogan, 21-9, 21-16. It was another impressive performance turned in by Yellen, seeded ninth in the tournament.

"I felt I played very well," Yellen

said afterwards. "I beat some of the top players. But Marty was very tough."

Yellen had some problems in the early rounds, and by his own admission, "I wasn't playing well and was fortunate to win."

Randy Stafford of Memphis, Tenn., took Yellen all the way to the final point of the match before surrendering, 21-9, 18-21, 11-10. Steve Mondry of San Diego, Ca., also extended his second round match with Yellen to three sets, but once again the Southfield resident emerged victorious, 20-21, 21-2, 11-6.

Yellen knocked off fourth seeded

Ben Koltun of St. Louis, Mo., in the quarterfinals, 21-16, 21-15, before losing to Hogan.

But the big surprises were in the women's division, as tenth seeded Sarah Green eliminated seventh seeded Kathy Williams of Denver, Colo., in the second round, then knocked off third seed Janell Marriot of Salt Lake City, in the quarterfinals, 21-10, 21-6.

NINTH SEEDED Janet Sausser of Chicago, Ill., defeated eighth seed Rita Hoff of St. Louis, Mo., in the second round, then topped fourth seeded Peggy Steding of Odessa, Texas, in the quarterfinals.

Sixth seeded Martha MacDonald of Gainesville, Fla., lost to Wright in the quarterfinals, 21-12, 21-10.

In the semis, Wright defeated Sausser and Greer eliminated Greep.

New York is the next stop on the NRC tour in three weeks. This weekend, many of the top pros will participate in the Grand Blanc tourney.

# LWV series ends 'R' to generate railroad money

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last in a series of articles on the Nov. 7 state ballot proposals. It was prepared by the League of Women Voters of Troy, a nonpartisan voter information group.)

## PROPOSAL M

The issue: Should the state provide funds for a comprehensive transportation program and replace the State Highway Commission with a Transportation Commission?

Currently, all specific taxes imposed on motor vehicle fuel and vehicle registration must be used exclusively for highway purposes, according to the Michigan Constitution. Also provided for is a State Highway Commission of four members (no more than two from one party) appointed by the governor, and a State Highway Department whose director, appointed by the commission, must be a competent highway engineer.

The legislature put this proposal on the ballot because of demands for a more diversified transportation system including public transit. Proponents cite various reasons, including energy conservation and the physical and economical barriers to car ownership for some people, for these demands.

The amendment would provide that at least 90 per cent of motor vehicle and fuel taxes be used exclusively for general road taxes. Under this amendment, 10 per cent of the revenue could be used for comprehensive transportation purposes. Up to 25 per cent of sales tax on cars and parts would be used for comprehensive transportation purposes.

The amendment would limit bonding for roads, streets, bridges and other transportation purposes to amounts to be derived from specific motor vehicle tax and sales tax revenues. It would also replace the State Highway Commission with a State Transportation Commission. The commission would be enlarged to six members appointed by the governor (no more than three from one party) for three-year terms. The State Highway Department would become the Transportation Department, and the department director would no longer have to be a highway engineer or appointed by the commission. The latter change would allow appointment by the governor. The State Transportation Commission would then establish a state transportation policy.

The accompanying legislative package that raised motor fuel and registration taxes already passed. The Comprehensive Transportation Fund is to be used for local bus systems, rail programs, inter-city buses, and bridge, port and airport improvements.

## PROPOSAL R

The issue: Should the constitution be amended to require the legislature to establish a Railroad Redevelopment Authority with power to issue general obligation bonds for making loans to railroads with tracks in Michigan for redevelopment projects?

Michigan law allows railroads to claim a credit against their property tax for 25 per cent of the yearly cost of maintaining and improving rights of way.

Recent federal regulations have removed the tax-exempt status from revenue bonds issued for maintenance and redevelopment purposes. The tax-exempt status is still accorded to general obligation bonds, but the state constitution must be amended in order for these bonds to benefit railroads.

Although railroads are generally acknowledged as energy-efficient transportation facilities, in recent years Michigan has been threatened with discontinuance of many miles of its rail lines. Upgrading of road beds and equipment is needed in many areas.

Proponents argue that the state must assist to keep rail lines operating or industrial and economic development will suffer. Opponents feel that the proposal shows favoritism to one industry when there are many other needy ones.

The joint resolution placed on the ballot by the legislature will require the legislature to provide by law for the creation of a railroad redevelopment authority and to prescribe its powers and duties.

The authority may issue general obligation bonds or notes not to exceed \$175 million at any period in redevelopment projects it considers to be in the national defense or to meet the present and future needs of state industries which use the railroads as the primary means of transporting their goods.

Unless a railroad defaulted on a loan made by the authority, there would be no cost to the state for these loans.

# Faust sets re-election goals

Education, reforming the senate and keeping government in operation are the way incumbent State Sen. William Faust characterizes his major goals to accomplish if he is re-elected to another term.

A Westland resident, Faust's 13th district also includes Garden City and Canton Township.

His opponent, Coleman Flaskamp, has said that he isn't campaigning.

Faust says he's been working "very hard internally" to revise the senate rules, a task that hasn't happened since 1903. He also plans to study "innovative procedures and programs" in education.

Perhaps the most crucial issue facing the senate in January will be just keeping things running, he says.

"If any of the three tax proposals (on the Nov. 7 ballot) pass, the amount of legislation it will take to adjust will be frankly overwhelming," he reports. "The senate fiscal agency staff said that if all three pass, it will take 116 separate bills. And that's not including adjustment to the financial impact."

"So one of my goals will be to provide for a smooth transition," he added.

Faust is opposed to all three proposals on tax issues.

"I can live with in the goals and objectives of Headlee (proposal E).

Indeed, the senate has been doing that since 1974, but I can't vote for it because of technical difficulties it has," he said.

Problems which Faust foresees with that proposal including bonding for the economic development corporation and the "rainy day fund."

"The bonding firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone has said that if Headlee passes, they will refuse to issue opinions on whether bonds can be sold. The consequences of that is that bond sales will be stopped and if we can't sell bonds, we can't have economic development," he explained.

Faust also doesn't like the Headlee prohibition of the "rainy day" or stab-

lization fund, which provides a cushion for bad economic times.

Michigan attracts more businesses and industries than it loses, according to Faust. If the state didn't, it would have a higher unemployment rate. But more could be done to encourage industry, he adds.

No one likes to pay more taxes, admits Faust, but he argues that sometimes higher taxes are "essential to the progress of the state."

One such case is the transportation package recently approved which would increase gasoline taxes and up license fees plate fees.

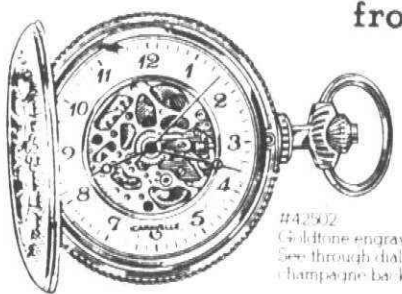

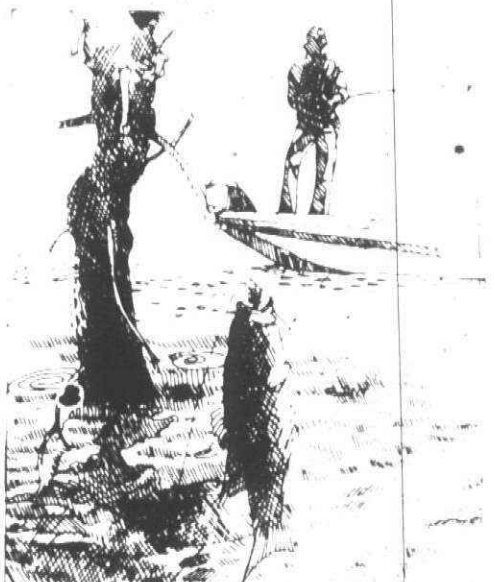

# Raps foes' initiative

## Kadish pledges Senate leadership

Paul Kadish, Democratic candidate for State Senate from the 14th District, said he is running for the office because he can do a better job than his opponent, incumbent Republican Robert Geake.

"Geake has shown absolutely no leadership on issues that have been critical to this district," Kadish charged. "He is a 'me-too' kind of legislator."

Kadish pointed to the Plymouth Center for Human Development as a "prime example of Geake's lack of initiative."

Kadish said that Geake had served on the State House mental health committee for four and one-half years and on the Senate's mental health committee for the same period of time but claimed he had no knowledge of reported patient abuses when the Detroit Free Press ran a series of articles on the center last winter.

"Here is a man with a Ph.D. in psychology who ran for office on his mental health background, and he didn't even know what was going on," Kadish said.

FOR THE 14th District—which includes Redford Township, Livonia, Plymouth city and township, Northville city and township and part of Westland—Kadish said the most pressing concern was financing for public schools.

"We have declining enrollment in Redford, Livonia and Northville and rapidly increasing enrollment in Plymouth and Canton," he observed. "It is creating enormous problems."

Kadish's solution is to make more money available from the state by revising the current funding formula.

"I don't want to see local school

boards lose control over what is done with the dollars," he said. "but a shift needs to be made to channel more funds through the state legislature."

"If things continue as they are, by 1981 Livonia will not be receiving any state aid, and we obviously can't let that happen."

However, Kadish said he was opposed to the voucher proposal, which would amend the constitution to eliminate property tax as the basis for funding public education.

"I think that plan was devised by people who are not very happy with education—but it's a wrecking ball approach. I feel there are better ways to solve the problem."

Kadish also cited a "poor business climate" throughout the state as a

problem that need immediate solutions.

HE CHARGED that the single business tax (SBT) along with laws on workman's compensation and unemployment compensation were the chief obstacles to attracting and keeping industry in Michigan.

And, although a strong Democrat, Kadish said that big labor demands were partially to blame for business's uneasiness about locating or staying in the state.

He said it was the responsibility of the state legislature to "re-examine some of the laws that have been passed to see if there is a better way to do things."

As a self-employed insurance agent, Kadish said he felt strongly about Michigan's no-fault automobile insurance. While he said it was one of the best programs in the country, he also feels it has draw-backs.

"There's no question in my mind that no-fault is partially to blame for red-lining in certain areas of the state—in fact, it's the major cause," he said.

Kadish characterized himself as an advocate of tax limitation, but said there were major flaws with the proposed constitutional amendments on the November ballot.

"The Tisch proposal is a fraud. Headlee's amendment has weaknesses but I support it in concept. I think it sends a message to the people in Lansing," he stated.

"Legislators have got to set priorities for spending public money. We

can't go on funding programs that are not working. Millions of dollars are wasted by doing that.

"My intention in going to Lansing is not just to make waves," he continued, "but when they are necessary, I'm not going to sit back."

Kadish has run for State Senate twice before—once in 1970 and again in 1976. He is chairman of the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees. He lives in Livonia and is president of his own insurance agency.

# Pursell-Greene answer LWV

U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) is running for a second term in the House of Representatives in the Nov. 7 election.

He is opposed by Democrat Earl Greene, an Ann Arbor City Councilman and Willow Run High School music teacher.

The 2d Congressional district covers Livonia and Plymouth in Wayne County, most of Monroe County and the eastern half of Washtenaw county.

The candidates supplied biographies and written answers to questions put to them by the Livonia Chapter of the League of Women Voters and the Observer Newspapers.

Following are their backgrounds and answers to federal policy questions.

Carl Pursell has both a bachelor's and master's degree from Eastern Michigan University. He has been on the the house committees on education and labor and on science and technology.

From 1971-76 Pursell was a member of the state senate and the senate's appropriation committee. He has been chairman of the senate appropriation subcommittee on community colleges. In 1969-70 he was a member of the Wayne County board of commissioners. He has also served as president of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce and is a past member of the Plymouth Jaycees.

Earl Greene did his undergraduate study at Shenandoah College in Virginia and later received his master's Degree in music from Northwestern University. He did additional graduate work at the University of Virginia and at the University of Michigan.

He is on the Michigan Education Association public affairs council and the MEA state screening and endorsement committee.

Greene was president of the Willow

Run Education Association, for two years. In that capacity, he helped establish a minority affairs division. He also assisted in the founding of the Willow Run Council for the Arts and helped lay the groundwork for a dental treatment plan for Willow Run Schools in conjunction with the University of Michigan Dental School.

As Ann Arbor councilman, he has worked for the establishment of day care centers, student housing, and services for the elderly.

**Do you support the Howard Jarvis proposal to reduce the federal tax rate? Explain why.**

**GREENE:** No, it is too radical. The question is what is a reasonable and balanced approach. My position is that we need to balance the budget, put a limit on spending which is tied to inflation and growth of the economy. We need to cut costs through the unglamorous task of probing into bureaucracy and reducing budgets. We have to eliminate duplications of services in government agencies.

**PURSELL:** I'm not familiar with the specifics of the proposal by Mr. Jarvis. I do, however, support a cut in the federal tax rate and have voted for a federal tax cut in the 96th Congress. A cut in the tax rate, in my opinion, is the most important type of cut to make, so we can put a stop to taxation by inflation. It does little good for our citizens to get a pay increase to meet rising costs, only to find themselves in a higher tax bracket which destroys that added purchasing power.

**Please suggest ways you feel would be effective in helping resolve the national energy problems.**

**GREENE:** We must design tax

breaks for energy-efficient small business. We must reduce our consumption of gas and cut imports to 6 million barrels of oil per day. We must explore alternate energy sources and apply the principle of depletion allowances to those businesses that are developing those energy sources. I categorically oppose the de-regulation of natural gas prices, a measure which my opponent approved. It amounts to a multi-million dollar "rip-off" of the American consumer and provides windfall profits to the gas producers. The government should control natural gas rates so that we are providing a reasonable service at a reasonable cost that at the same time does not encourage excessive consumption.

**PURSELL:** I have introduced a major bill to create a "space" program" type of long range energy research and development effort for alternative energy sources. I think this kind of all out, intensive program is essential to meet the coming energy crisis in this country and the entire world. We need to immediately launch an accelerated effort to bring a wide variety of alternative energy sources on line, such as fusion, solar, geothermal, biomass and others.

# Flock of hopefuls seek judicial seats

In addition to the usual partisan races and ballot proposals, Wayne County voters will be able to vote for a flock of less visible candidates running for non-partisan judicial offices.

Here's a list of those candidates and races. Running unopposed for the Michigan Court of Appeals is Dorothy Comstock Riley, 53, of Grosse Pointe Farms. She has served as an appellate court judge since April 1976 when she was appointed to the bench.

SIXTEEN PERSONS are running for seats on the Wayne County Circuit Court bench. On only two sections of the circuit court ballot, though, are there any races.

There are nine candidates running for full five-year terms. All are running unopposed for their own seats. They are:

- Thomas J. Brennan, 58, of Dearborn. Brennan is serving his first term on the bench.
- Irwin H. Burdick, 65, of Northville. Burdick was appointed to the bench in January 1975 and won election two years later.
- Harry J. Dingeman Jr., 62, of Grosse Pointe Park. He is serving his fifth term.
- Patrick J. Duggan of Livonia. He was appointed to the bench in January 1977 and is running for his first full term.
- Charles S. Farmer, 58, of Detroit. Farmer is serving his second term on the Wayne Circuit Court bench.
- Thomas J. Foley, 57, of Plymouth. Foley also is serving his second term.
- William J. Giovan, 42, of Detroit. Giovan was appointed to circuit court in January 1976 and won election to a full term 11 months later.
- Roland L. Olzak, 51, of Grosse Pointe. He is serving his second term.

• Maureen Reilly, 44, of Detroit. She was appointed to the court in April.

Running to fill a vacancy for the term ending Jan. 1, 1981 is Harold Hood, 47, of Detroit. Hood has been on the bench since his appointment in April.

THERE ARE four persons running for two new circuit seats. The terms of the new seats will also end Jan. 1, 1985. Running are:

• James A. Hathaway, 60, of Detroit. Hathaway has served on the Detroit Records Court bench since 1973.

• Richard R. Kubicki, 52, of Detroit.

• James E. McCarthy, 49, of Plymouth.

• Harold M. Ryan, 67, of Detroit. Ryan served seven terms as a state senator and two terms as a congressman.

## Animal control is good PR

Dogs, cats and people will benefit from community animal control.

That's the message from Phyllis Wright, director of animal sheltering and control at the Humane Society of the United States.

"It sounds like a very elementary thing to do," she said, "but it's difficult to get good public relations for animal control." Ms. Wright recently spoke to animal shelter directors and others in the animal business at the Humane Society annual conference at the Hyatt Regency in Dearborn.

"We've had the image of the dogcatcher for so many years, and that image isn't a good one," she said. "We must make the community aware of the positive side of our work."

Animal control, or the lack of it, is a major problem in many communities today, said Ms. Wright.

HAVING ANIMAL control ordinances will improve living in the community," she said. "People must

accept the ordinances so they can be passed."

She said a shelter can begin an information program with sensationalism, and related the recent story of an Ann Arbor paperboy who was attacked and almost killed by two large guard dogs on private property.

"I imagine many people in Ann Arbor will now demand an ordinance outlawing guard dogs on private property," she said. "It always happens after a tragedy."

She indicated sensible ordinances should be in effect before something like this happens.

Licensing is a major step in controlling the animal population, said Ms. Wright. She told the group to sell the license plan by pointing out that lost animals can be more easily returned to the owner with a license.

"With a license, an animal won't have to be kept at a shelter and the money from the licenses pays for more animal control programs."

Another important way to control animal population, she said, is a spray and neuter program to cut down the number of unwanted puppies and kittens. Although many humane societies will pay for all or part of the sterilization of any puppy or kitten adopted from the agency, not everyone takes advantage of the offer.

SHE INDICATED animal shelter pamphlets can explain the services available by the shelter and other animal welfare agencies.

"You can even give the names and addresses of other places someone could look if they lose their pet," she said.

Other animal agencies should join together to make the community aware that animal control is important, said Ms. Wright.

Kennel clubs, veterinarians, animal shelters and pet food companies should relay the same message to the community. They should all point out the key is pet responsibility."
