It's back to feet for Sunflower's students

About three dozen high school students in Sunflower subdivision in Canton will be walking to school when the second semester begins Jan. 3.

And that makes about six dozen parents quite unhappy. They want busing to continue until the subdivision is completed.

Sunflower subdivision is located on the north side of Warren between Beck and Canton Center Road.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, however, relied on state law and district policy when voting 7-0 Monday night to discontinue busing for some 36 students when school opens again after the holiday recess.

About 12 students, at the far end of the subdivision, will continue to be

bused until that section of Sunflower is nearer completion.

The school board had authorized busing the high school students in Sunflower for about 2½ years for safety reasons. The administration recommended stopping the busing once a fenced walkway to the high school site was completed, and when development reached a stage where about 70 per cent of the construction is completed.

The administration was going to discontinue busing on Oct. 23, but delayed action to investigate concerns raised by parents at a meeting with administrators and the school board president.

When the administration decided it was time to halt busing, the parents organized and showed up in large numbers at Monday night's meeting.

The school board followed administrative advice, after hearing from the parents group. The board's major problem was that there are a number of high school students from other areas of the district who walk the same distance to school under similar or worse conditions.

WHEN COMPLETED, the subdivision will have almost as many homes as now are located in the entire City of Plymouth. There will be 693 homes north of Warren and another 990 homes on the south side of Warren.

Sunflower presently has about 70 high school students — 48 who are now being bused, 19 who are walking, and three who attend Our Lady of Good Counsel.

Attending earlier meetings with par-

ents were Thomas Yack, school board president, Walt Bartnick, director of safety, and Ray Hoedel, assistant supt. for business.

One of the major items of dispute at those meetings was whether the distance was more than 1½ miles from the Canton High School site to the far end of the subdivision.

State law provides school districts are not required to and will not be reimbursed for transporting students who live within 1½ miles of school.

The difference of opinion was over whether the distance should be measured from the beginning of a special walkway the school district constructed for Sunflower students.

The administration invited an official from the state department of education to visit the location and make a

determination of how the distance should be measured.

Based on that visit, the state transportation official determined Sunflower students were ineligible for busing under state law. That opinion was issued by Philip J. O'Leary, supervisor of safety and traffic programs for the Michigan Dept. of Education.

DURING INTRODUCTORY remarks Hoedel commented it was the position of the school district to develop neighborhood schools so that as many students as possible can walk to school.

"We have provided entrance to the school site with a walkway. Our first plans was for a walkway by the wooded area near the high school. We then arranged a transfer of properties

with Sunflower developer Dick Lewiston and were able to build a path in the open. We since have put in asphalt and a fence on each side of the walk," reported Hoedel.

Hoedel added that the staff at the high school will make sure the gate is unlocked each morning and that the football field lights will be used to illuminate the walkway during morning hours.

Jim Cook, a spokesperson for Sunflower parents, maintained the distance was more than 1½ miles if the length of the half-mile walkway was computed instead of measuring from the beginning of the walk.

Cook claimed the subdivision is about 66 per cent completed so that there aren't sidewalks yet in parts of

Board passes trustees' raise

Pay for Canton's four trustees has been increased from \$40 to \$75 for each township board meeting they attend.

The pay scale was established by the board at 1 a.m. Wednesday morning after the board and members of the audience debated another proposal to increase the trustees' pay by 233 per cent.

Under the original proposal submitted by Treasurer Jim Donahue, trustees would have received a salary of \$75 per week plus per diem pay of \$25 for each regular and special board meeting.

The pay rate finally approved by the board marks an 88 per cent increase over trustees' current rate of pay. Trustee Eugene Daley was the only

salary could discourage some trustees from attending township board meetings.

"I wouldn't feel good about a trustee missing three or four meetings in a row and still getting paid," he said.

Trustees have received \$40 a meeting since their last pay adjustment in 1976. The township compensation board, which normally sets the pay rate of elected officials, handed the question of trustee salaries to the board in 1977.

Supervisor Noel Culbert, who maintained that the trustees "are grossly underpaid," suggested the pay rate of \$75 per meeting.

He maintained that trustees devote about 12 hours to each meeting between preparation time and actual hours spent at the meeting hall.

"That amounts to about \$6 an hour," he said. "That's less than an average guy in the factory makes."

Board members agreed that an 88 per cent pay hike is adequate for trustees. They said candidates should seek the job because of dedication, not for the pay.

The \$75-a-meeting pay rate would mean an annual salary of \$3,900 a year for trustees if four township board meetings are held each month.

According to Donahue, the \$3,900-a-year wage falls within the range of salaries paid to township trustees and city council members in surrounding communities. Council members in Belleville receive \$2 a meeting, while council members in Garden City receive \$9,000 a year.

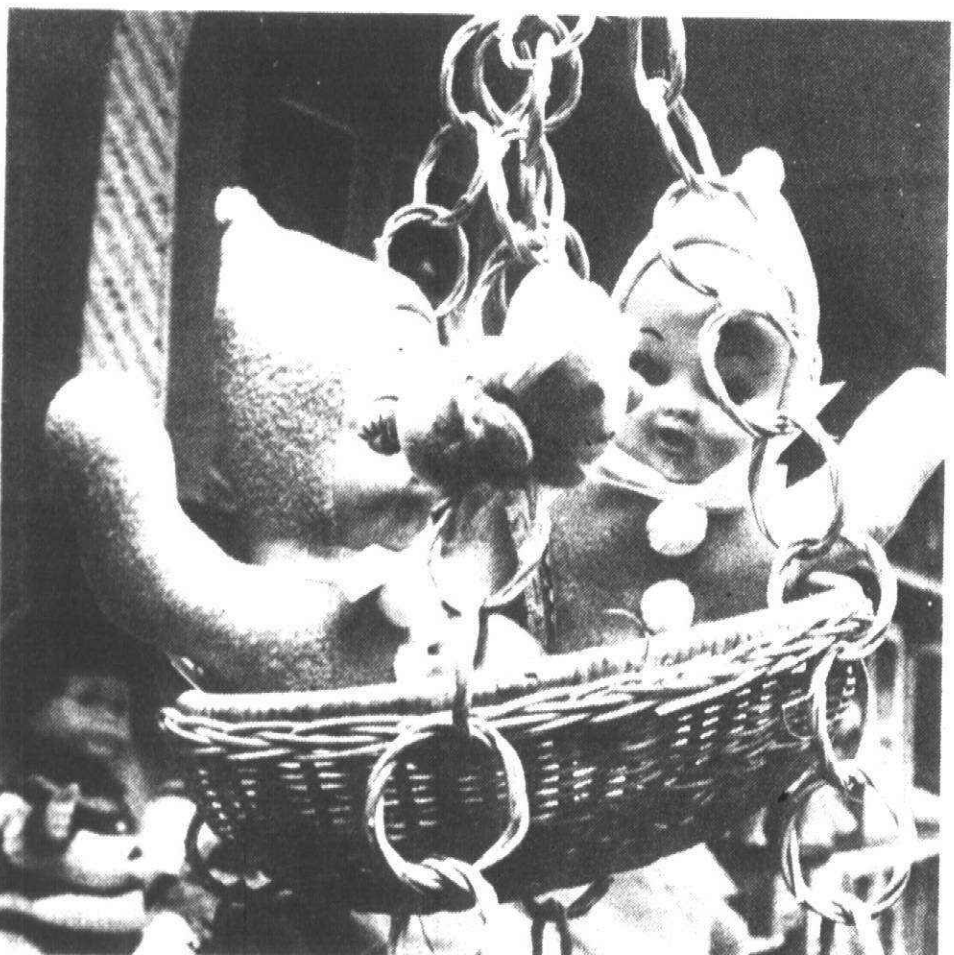

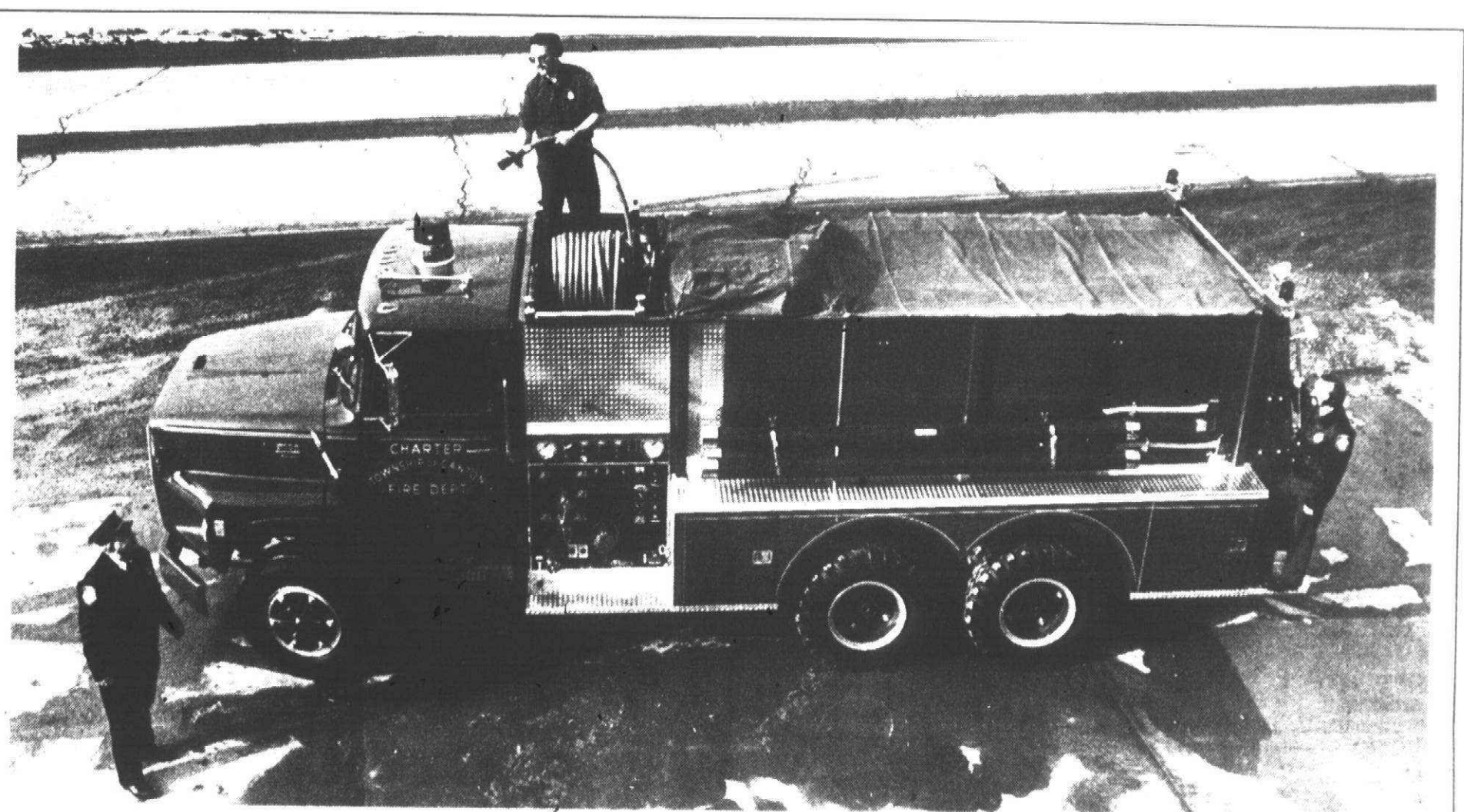
The party, planned by the Canton Township Parks and Recreation

Businesspeople demand action

Hearing draws signs of discontent

Business owners in Canton say they are so fed up with failure to get a new sign ordinance enacted that they may attempt to circumvent the law or ignore it entirely.

That was the sentiment expressed by members of the business community who came to a public hearing on a proposed new sign ordinance being considered by the planning commission.

The planning commission had approved this more liberal set of regulations once before, but were required to hold public hearings again because of an error in publication of hearing notification.

The commission can only recommend or disapprove of the proposed ordinance, then pass it on to the Wayne County Planning Commission for recommendation. The ultimate decision whether to institute the ordinance rests with the township board of trustees.

Canton's Chamber of Commerce, which had input on the drafting of the proposed sign ordinance, has remained the most vocal organization promoting quick passage of the regulations. The chamber had even consulted the law firm of Lippitt, Harrison, Perlove, Friedman and Zack to see if the present sign ordinance could be challenged. Attorney Bernard Friedman of the firm, however, issued a legal opinion saying the "Chamber of Commerce's interests would best be served by not instituting an action to challenge this ordinance."

"The most expedient tactic now available to the chamber is via the political pressure means."

Pressure is exactly what chamber members tried to place upon the planning commission when business people crowded the meeting hall and told of their problems, which they say are caused by inadequate signs.

Chamber president Mary Perna told the commission the organization's two main concerns are that "those businesses established since 1975 are not permitted free-standing signs," and that members who do have the signs

are not allowed to replace them if they are damaged or worn out.

Gary Roberts, an unsuccessful candidate for township trustee during the last election, was also on hand at the meeting and took a strong stand in behalf of the business community.

Roberts accused Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert, Treasurer James Donahue and Trustee Robert Greenstein of "trying to throw away all our (the business community's) hard work."

The three township officials have all expressed opposition to a more lenient

sign ordinance. Greenstein, in fact, was Canton supervisor when the strict ordinance now in effect was first instituted.

Roberts called for the business people to "put their property taxes in escrow until something is done."

One of the few residents at the meeting objecting to the new ordinance, Dee Basher, commented, "business people knew what they were doing when they entered Canton. They knew what the ordinance was. Why are they complaining now?"

A business owner responded, "When

many of us came in, we could have signs.

"I'm about ready to get around it (the current ordinance) by getting a junk trailer, painting it up gaudy, putting it in front of my place and moving it every 24 hours."

John Warchock of Century 21 told the planning commission he would put up another sign if something happened to the one he already has, then go to court to keep it. "I don't like being intimidated by political blackmail," he said.

Builder charged with felony

The president of a firm which had contracted to build houses in Franklin Palmer Estates has been arrested and charged with violating a builder's trust fund.

Stanley Wolak, 39, of Chelsea, has been charged with two counts of violating the builder's trust fund act, which is a felony carrying a three year prison term.

Wolak, president of Pebble Building, Inc., stood mute on the charges during his recent arraignment in 35th District Court.

He has been released on \$5,000 personal bond per charge. A preliminary examination is scheduled for Dec. 21 in district court.

Wolak turned himself in to Michigan State Police after the department obtained a warrant for his arrest last Thursday.

The charges stem from a law which requires builders to put all payments toward a house under construction into a trust fund. The money is only supposed to be used to pay expenses for that particular house.

Police allege that Wolak did not have any money deposited in trust funds although he had received payments. Wolak closed his business last August, leaving would-be homeowners without houses and sub-contractors with unpaid bills.

Sgt. Larry Stewart of the Canton Police Department said Wolak owes various individuals "at least \$150,000, probably double that." He estimated some 25 people have given Wolak money, but have not yet gotten their houses.

Most of the work on the case was done by detectives from the Michigan State Police Northville post because the Canton police department didn't have the staff to handle the investigation, according to state police Lt. Joe Koening.

State is auditing home energy use

Some 400,000 questionnaires will be mailed at random to single-family households during the next several months as the Michigan Department of Commerce kicks off a computerized home energy "audit."

Householders which return the questionnaire will receive a computerized analysis of the house's energy-conserving potential and a chart of the cost and energy savings which could result if suggested steps were taken, says State Commerce Director Keith Molin.

Another 100,000 questionnaires will be distributed through community organizations. Anyone who does not receive the audit form by mail can obtain one by calling 1-800-292-1556 toll-free.

The effort, called Project Conserve, is being conducted in cooperation with the Institute for Family and Child Study at Michigan State University and Michigan Technological University.

The initial mailing of questionnaires will be directed to residents of a seven-county area in the eastern Upper Peninsula and will continue throughout most of the state until February.

Project Conserve will enable residents to analyze the individual characteristics of their home. After the questionnaire is filled out and returned in a postage-paid envelope, a computer will analyze the data using local fuel, labor and material costs, and weather conditions.

The participant then receives a "homeowner report" which lists energy-saving steps he or she may wish to consider — such as caulking, weatherstripping, storm windows, insulation — and includes estimates of savings in both energy and dollars which would result if these steps were taken.

In addition, the "homeowner report" will list other individualized energy-saving steps. It gives information, for example, on how ventilation and humidity affect fuel costs; how fireplaces and decorative outdoor gas lamps increase costs; and how proper landscaping can save energy.

Santa discovers electronics

In the annual toy showdown, as manufacturers and retailers joust for consumer dollars, new electronic wizardry is running away with the contest.

If you haven't started your toy shopping yet, you're liable to be a loser in the best Santa department, as holiday eager beavers weeks ago scooped up the limited number of Simons, Merlins, and other electronic games introduced this year.

Although dolls are back in vogue and science fiction gimmickry maintains its hold on the market, some experts believe electronics will dominate the toy arena in years ahead.

The market's so tight this year that Family Emporium on Ann Arbor Trail in downtown Plymouth is selling gift certificates available for redemption in early January, when the next shipment of computerized gadgetry arrives.

"We're getting 20 calls a day for electronic games," explains owner Ken Bjornbak, while he predicts that the items will outdo the fad performance of past showstoppers. Electronics are here to stay, retailers repeat.

THE ELECTRONIC baseball game is the only remaining computerized stock in the Family Emporium. With a \$39.95 price tag, it's a smaller-than-a-briefcase sized unit that pitches balls or allows remote pitching. The introduction of a cheaper logic chip and reduction of size is propelling electronics to the top of the field, national news tells us.

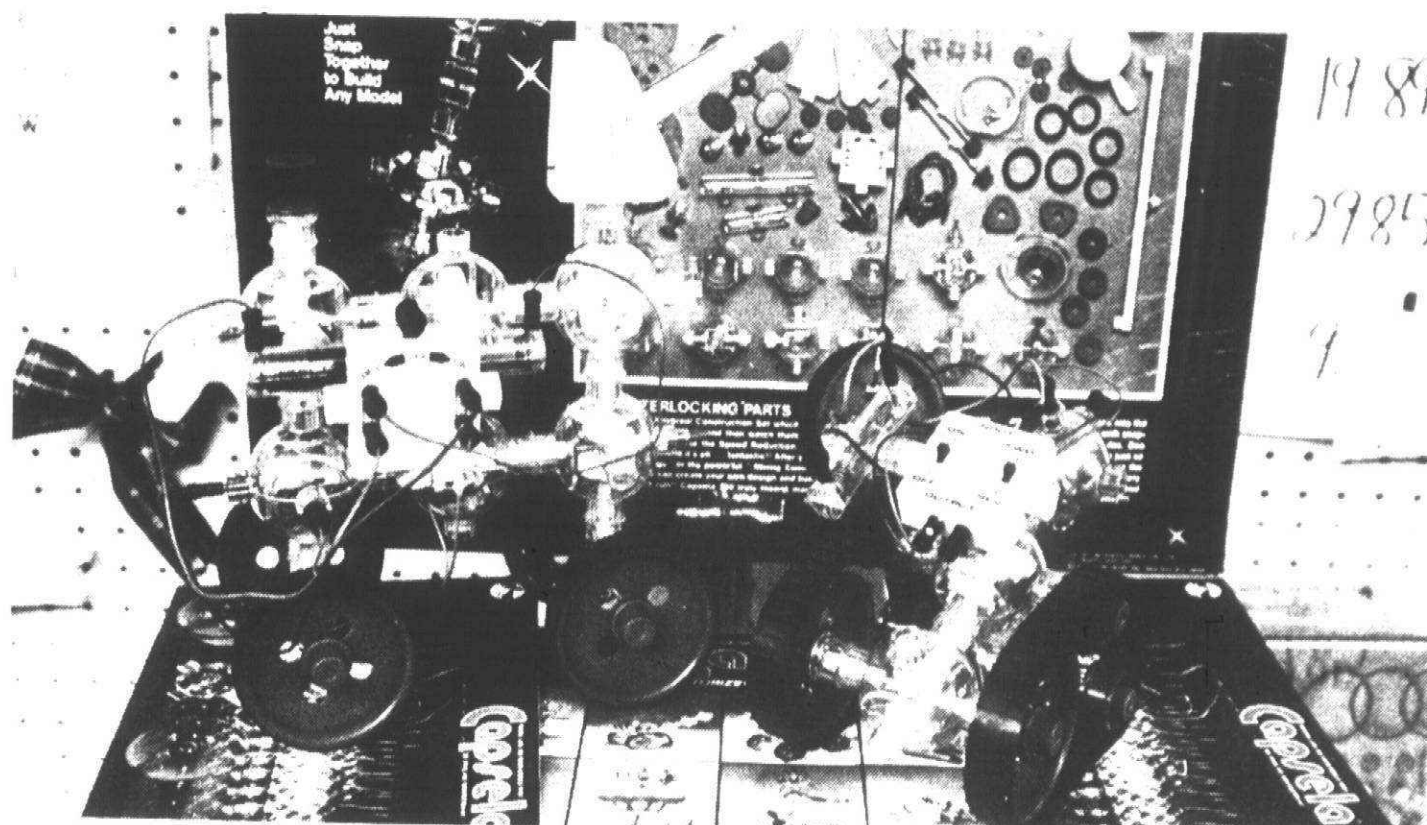
But electronics aren't the only items scarce this year. Livonia resident Linda Strubbe, shopping in Plymouth this week, couldn't locate Simon, a saucer-shaped game that combines sound, sight, and motor identification, a simple magnifying glass, or a three-in-one pram suit.

And, as Bjornbak predicts, those waiting for last-minute bargains will uncover slim pickings.

At Lorraine's Doll House in the Old Village, Paddington Bear, the Suzanne Gibson baby doll, and the classic Madame Alexander dolls are runaway hits.

"I've sold more dolls this year than ever," says owner Lorraine Waun, who gets 15 calls a day for the storybook dolls created under the Madame Alexander tag.

AT MEIJER'S Thrifty Acres in Canton Township, the Baby Wet 'n Care, which contracts a diaper rash, is the hot seller, claimed one clerk, while

parents searching for The Great Mazinga, a "Star Wars" offshoot, or the Tyco Silver Streak model railroad, also are finding the hunting scarce.

Retailers searching for a way to satisfy holiday wishes are suggesting some alternatives. Ms. Waun has a German import doll which cries or laughs with the recorded sound of a live baby. "The House You Have Been Waiting For," constructed of wood, has add-on possibilities with dormers and other rooms available to accommodate a growing doll family.

Bjornbak is fascinated with an add-on concept in the construction field. A Japanese import, the Capsela system, includes different sets for motorized building constructed of one of the most dense plastics available.

"It's one of the highest quality toys I've seen in a long time," says Bjornbak, who played with the set for two days.

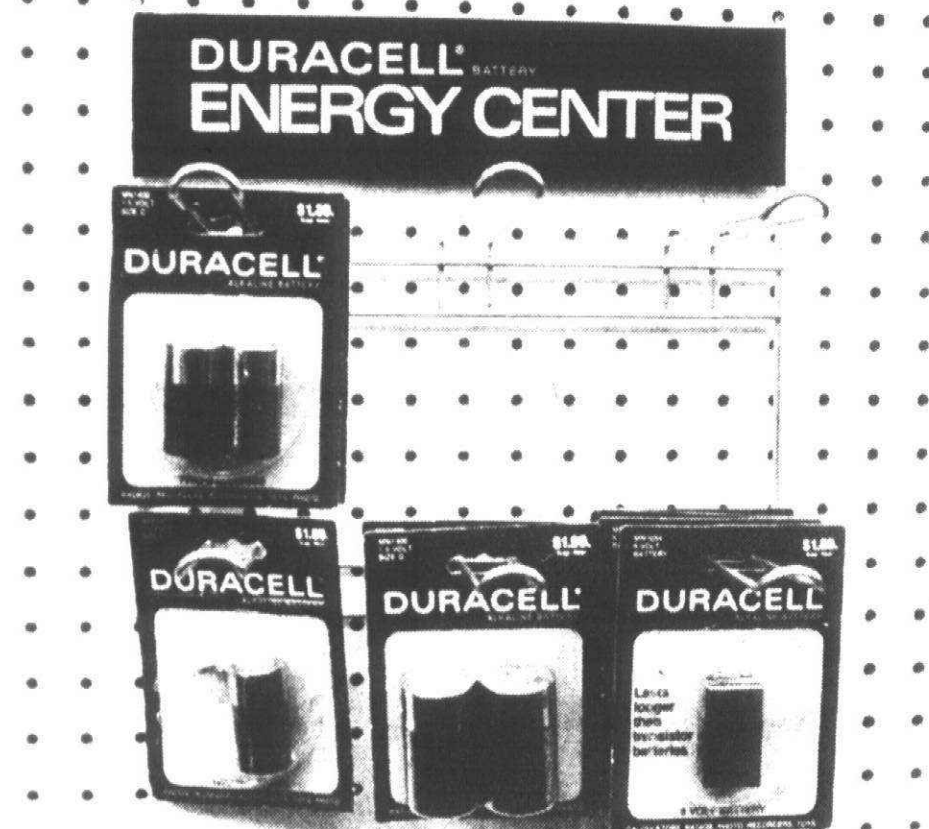

Sunflower students will walk to school

the subdivision and is still a lot of construction workers and equipment present.
He also noted that the interior subdivision streets have not yet been dedicated to the county and, therefore, are not yet public streets. State law provided that the measurement be made across public streets, he added.
"It is unfair to stop busing until the sidewalks are in and the construction ended."
Richard Arlen, board vice-president, commented that the subdivision environment is no different when children are at home than when are walking to and from school. "When school is out, I assume you don't lock the children up in your homes. I'm sure they are outside by construction equipment and in areas where there are no sidewalks."
Yack commented: "What we are faced with tonight is a group of older students who are being asked to com-

ply with the same rules and regulations which apply to all students in the school district."
Yack suggested the school board might have made a mistake in agreeing to provide busing since school year 1976-77. "You have been lucky to have the buses because I've been told in similar situations in the past, elsewhere in the district, students have walked to school from day one of construction."
Steve Harper, board treasurer, noted his elementary youngster walked a mile through heavy construction equipment to get to school when he moved into a Plymouth Township new subdivision. "And they played at the construction sites every afternoon after school let out."
Trustee Joe Gray said, in his opinion, busing should have been halted as soon as the walkway was available for use.
A senior at Plymouth Salem said it takes her 25 minutes to walk to school

in dry weather and will take an hour when there's snow and below-zero temperature.
The student and some parents told stories of construction workers making lewd comments at young ladies walking to school, and told of one incident of a young girl being hauled into a vehicle by a worker.
In response to a question from Yack, Cook conceded that subdivision residents have not yet petitioned for street lights. Yack suggested interior street lights were a safety factor and could be obtained if residents would petition and agree to be assessed.
Harper added that the police had a responsibility for safety of township residents.
Flossie Tonda noted that many other high school students walk to school under the same or worse circumstances. "Take the students in Greenmeadows on the north side of Sheldon. There are no sidewalks and they walk on dirt roads with ditches to Joy, and

then walk down Joy to the high school. And the kids living on McClumpha walk the same distance along the side of the road, and have been for two to three years."
Mrs. Tonda said if the Sunflower busing were granted, the board would get a number of requests from other areas where the same justification existed. "We would have to approve busing for these other areas too. That would require us to purchase two or three new buses, and you are talking about additional mileage."
The school district now is busing about 12,000 students a day with almost all the buses filled to capacity.
One parent noted that at 2:10 p.m. some 27 equipment vehicles were counted within a half-mile radius. She added that construction workers begin before 6:30 a.m.
Harper noted the Isbister Elementary walkway is just as long as the Sunflower walkway, is not lighted, is under water 10 per cent of the time,

and ends at a playground field which students must walk across to get to school. At Miller Elementary and West Middle students also walk across a field at the end of the path.
"I think what we get down to is that many people just don't want their kids to walk 1½ commented miles," commented Yack. "We can expect a higher level of responsibility from a 14-year-old than from a nine-year-old. There is such a thing as a responsibility to follow the rules which apply to everyone."
Noel Culbert, Canton supervisor,

said it was a judgement call and urged the school board to use its discretion and approve busing while construction was in progress. Culbert said he was not interested in past issues or other problems of the district, but was concerned for the safety of students in Sunflower while construction was in progress. He asked that busing be continued for another six months.
"Sunflower is not an island in the district," answered Yack. "What is done there must be repeated elsewhere."

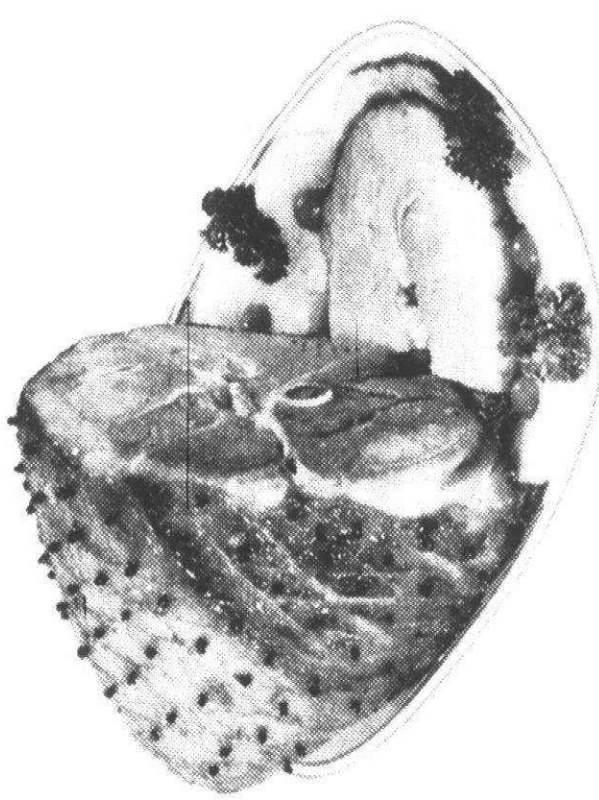

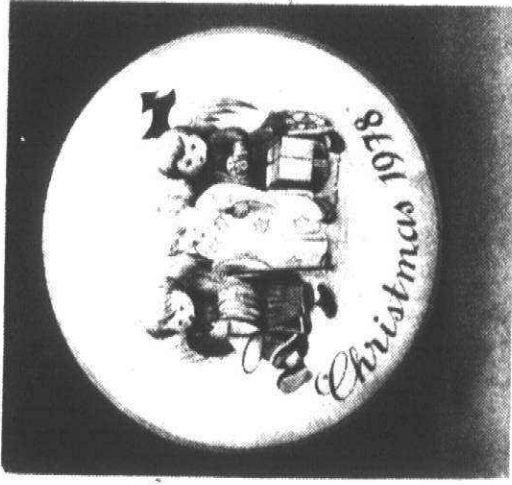

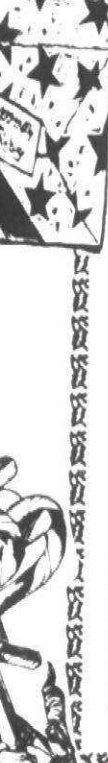

Libya lures health advocate

E. J. McClendon's plans for Christmas may disappoint his family, but he's fulfilling a dream he once thought impossible.

The Plymouth Township resident and former Plymouth-Canton School Board president (1973-75) will spend 20 days in Libya as a health care consultant, on the invitation of the Libyan secretary of health.

In the first step of a possible five-year program, Dr. McClendon will observe health care training in the north African country in hopes of setting up a model program of health care training to break down traditional competition within the medical profession.

"It's quite possible we're entering into a thicket of thorns that I will never get out of without a whole bunch of scratches," explains the health educator who holds a joint appointment at the University of Michigan in the Schools of Education and Public Health.

"HEALTH administrators have too skinny a background in medical knowledge," he maintains, and physicians often administer poorly. The nursing profession is stymied in its attempts to take on greater responsi-

bility in the field, all of which leads to competition in the medical arena where the patient comes out the loser.

McClendon's hopes encompass an elimination of the competitive aspects of health care from the outset by training all branches of the field together for the goal of integration within the system.

Better communication and a breakdown of the medical hierarchy are the goals of the model, which McClendon will outline in his first report to Libyan health officials.

And perhaps, he admits, published articles in the U.S. concerning the project will propel spinoffs in the rigid medical system at home.

FOR EXAMPLE, McClendon points out, this week's walk-out of Wayne County nurses centers more on treatment by superiors than wages.

One of McClendon's graduate students is designing a research project to determine what kind of commitment nurses have to their professional judgement.

"There's no adequate avenue for a nurse that knows a physician's professional judgement is faulty, unless he or she has a good personal rapport.

"To what degree are they willing to fight in order to establish a new kind of role responsibility," is what the grad student will attempt to discover.

And it's those kinds of questions that intrigue McClendon, who believes his own background in a primitive culture as a Choctaw Indian from Oklahoma was considered by Libyan health officials as they attempt to decode American medical training for an industrial society for the third-world culture of a developing nation.

One significant problem for the Libyans and other similar countries is the reluctance of U.S.-trained medical students to return to their home countries. Hoping to train some of the teachers for the program on the Ann Arbor campus, McClendon hopes to target some of the problems associated with "training foreign students at the highest level in the American system and sending them back with the idea that they can implement this in a primitive community."

With 30,000 Nigerian students being trained in the U.S., the Nigerian government also has expressed an interest in the project.

McClendon's involvement in the project stemmed from letters written home by grad student Ramadan Tayab, an assistant minister of health in Libya who's studying under McClendon for his doctorate.

After three years in Michigan, both Tayab and his wife are aware of the difficulties in returning to a male-dominated Moslem culture.

"She thinks women's liberation is a great thing," McClendon comments. Occupied by Italy from the turn of the century to World War II, even the cuisine of Libya is more Italian than Arabic, McClendon's been told.

It's the kind of country where although tomatoes are a major food item, canned tomatoes are imported. McClendon's wife Ruby is teaching the Tayabs how to do just that in one of

the lighter exchanges of cross-Atlantic information.

With the knowledge that he'll be bombarded with cultural shock, McClendon hopes to understand how the Libyans straddle the modern and primitive dichotomy within the early stages of development, much like his grandfather "stood with one foot in each culture," as he turned to McClendon's uncle for some medical problems and the Choctaw tribal healer for others.

And McClendon himself feels a strong pull to his Oklahoma birthplace. Still without an understanding of why he accepted a job for the state of Michigan 25 years ago when he started out in tuberculosis control, he hopes to retire to Oklahoma to set up a clinical service program for the remote Choctaw areas.

Township cool to bike paths

A preliminary bike path plan for Plymouth Township met with little enthusiasm from township board members last week.

The relatively high cost of a Class III plan, at least \$120,000 for major road designations for signs and spot improvements for bicyclists, threw a pall on the discussion at the special study session.

But Supervisor Thomas Notebaert hopes to muster enough support to get the plan adopted in January nonetheless.

Once the plan is adopted by the board, Notebaert says, he will have the authority to seek state and federal grants to fund portions of the project. He emphasized that adoption of the preliminary plan would not force township expenditures for bike paths.

"If they don't set some priorities, however, I guess we can't go anywhere with it," Notebaert commented Friday. And he's convinced some areas of the township may qualify for block grant funding to designate bike paths from middle-income residential areas to the new recreational site.

Township board members, on the other hand, expressed little interest for the bike plan study, authorized in July of 1977 at a cost of \$2,800. Jim Anulewicz of Norman Dietrich & Associates, township planners, presented the preliminary plan to the board last Tuesday.

THE OBJECTIVE of the study was to review existing conditions of the township and propose a preliminary plan, Anulewicz explained.

Three alternatives for bike paths were considered, while the planner's assessment recommends the Class III plan—sharing of the road surface

between autos and bicycles consisting of designated bike path signs and some improvements to existing roads to accommodate bicycles such as curb alterations.

"The intent is to create an awareness of bicycle traffic," Anulewicz said. As the least expensive plan, the bike route designation would cost about \$3 a linear foot, while a Class I plan, which would construct five-foot wide paths of concrete or asphalt, is estimated between \$7 and \$10.50 per linear foot or between \$10,000-14,000 for 1/4 mile.

Purchase of additional right-of-way and grading, both of which are excluded from the Class I estimates, he added, would boost the cost of such routes.

However, the Class I route allows the best safety factor for bicyclists, Anulewicz added.

A Class II system, allowing a separate road lane for bicyclists, carries warnings from experts, he said. Moving out into traffic, particularly for left-turn lanes, creates hazards.

Destruction or theft of designation signs is the major problem associated with the Class II system, but it also is the most feasible for the township, he recommended.

However, he strongly urged the board to prohibit the system along Ann Arbor Road. Too much traffic and the high volume of speed creates hazards for bicyclists, he said.

An important element of the system, he added, would be linkage with the City of Plymouth's bike path route and connection with bike paths constructed in Hines Park and along I-275.

Notebaert hopes to place the item on the agenda for the first meeting in January, when township officials will have the opportunity to set priorities for a bike path system or reject the proposal at this time.

The Stroller Baseball's odd contracts

Sitting at the breakfast table reading the big headlines stating that Pete Rose had just sold his services to a major league baseball club for \$800,000 a year in one of the most unusual contracts known, The Stroller couldn't resist the temptation to take a jaunt down memory lane.

He fully realized that a contract calling for a salary four times as great as the president of the United States was unusual. But baseball has had some of its most unusual moments in the signing of player contracts.

Take the case of Harry Heilmann, the great Tiger outfielder of the 1920s. He never thought of selling his services for the highest dollar. Instead he took what he was offered, and the tales of his signing are some of the bright spots of the Tigers when the late Frank J. Navin was owner.

Heilmann lived in California in the off-season and came to Detroit each year for the holiday season. One of his first visits was to see Navin and ask if the new contracts were ready. When told that they were, Navin would take one from his drawer and hand it to the star outfielder who had won the batting title three times.

Without reading the pact, Heilmann would sign it and say, "When you get time, Mr. Navin, put in the figures and send it to me." He never failed to get a raise.

ONE OF THE favorite Tiger contract tales concerned Davey Jones and Sam Crawford, outfielders on the team that won the pennant back in 1909.

One year they decided to gang up on the Tigers owner. Meeting in front of the stadium, they tossed a coin to see who would go in first. Crawford won.

He pointed out to Navin that he had batted in more runs than anyone on the team and deserved a raise. Navin listened, then remarked, "If you didn't have a fast runner on the bases like Davey Jones, you would not have batted in so many."

Crawford agreed and signed for his old salary.

Coming out of the office, he looked at Jones and said, "I didn't do so good, but you are going to come out be all right."

Buoyed by that, Jones stepped in. As the meeting began, he said to Navin, "You know, I scored more runs than anyone on the team, and runs win games and pennants."

Navin listened, then reached for the record book and said, "Davey, you're right. You did score more runs. But would you have done it if you didn't have a good hitter like Sam Crawford batting behind you?"

You guessed what happened. Davey Jones admitted the Tiger owner was right and signed for his old salary.

When the story appeared in print years later, Navin called The Stroller and smilingly remarked, "I see you've run into Davey Jones again. That is one of Davey's best stories. But I had no alternative. We didn't have the seating capacity to warrant higher salaries so I had to talk them out of raises."

ONE OF THE best contract signing stories The Stroller ever heard was told to him one morning while having breakfast with the late Connie Mack, the legendary owner of the Philadelphia Athletics who dominated baseball for years.

Connie and his team were in Detroit for a series with the Tigers, and the venerable old gent was in a talkative mood, especially when

it came to recalling the antics of his famous battery of Rube Waddell, one of the most eccentric pitchers of all time, and the catcher, Ossie Schreck.

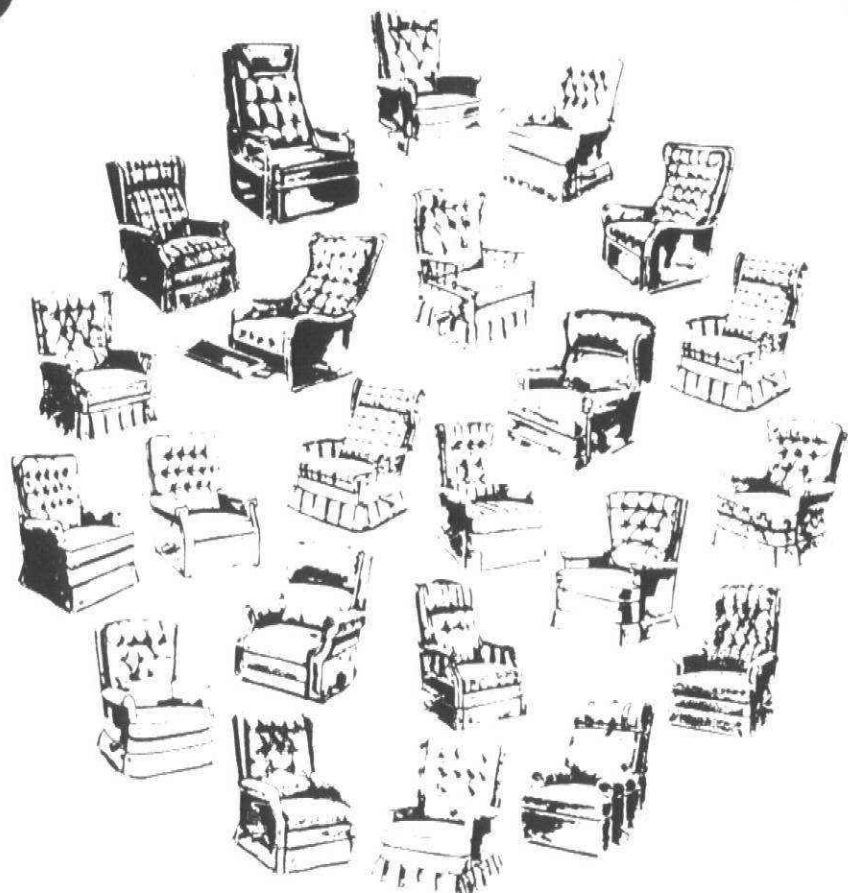
"I knew I had to do something to calm Waddell down," Mack said, "so I assigned Schreck to room with him. All went well for an entire season. They were a good

combination.

"But when it came time to sign their contracts the following season, Schreck balked. He wouldn't sign. He didn't complain about the money. He just insisted that a special clause be written into the contract. I couldn't imagine what it was—what kind of a clause he wanted.

"Finally, I agreed to write in whatever he wanted," and here old Connie Mack laughed. "He demanded that I write in a clause in Waddell's contract and his own that prohibited the Rube from eating crackers in bed. It was the most unusual contract I ever wrote."

Now players are getting \$800,000 a year.

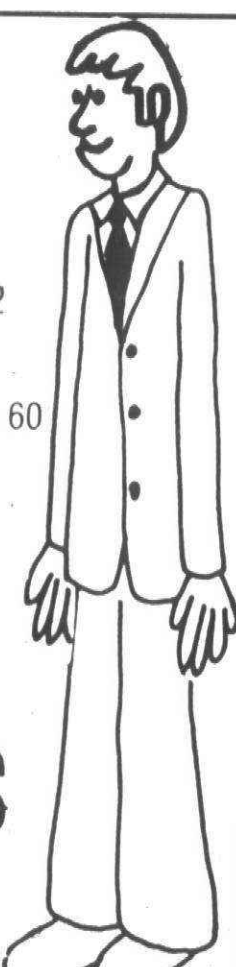

Check toys for safety, Better Business Bureau warns

Whoever said "Christmas is for kids" had a good point. Every year at this time, loving parents, grandparents and friends buy toys for children, from toddlers to teenagers.

It is easy to be dazzled by the array of toys available; however, the Better Business Bureau advises shoppers to make sure the toy purchased is safe as well as suitable for the child's use.

As with any purchase, it is a good

idea to read the label for information on construction and usage. Parents interested in buying painted toys for young children should look for those labeled "non-toxic." Similarly, some toys made out of fabric products might catch fire accidentally; be sure to look for the words "flame-resistant" on the label.

Check, too, to see if an age recommendation is provided on the label.

Toys intended for older children may be too complex and potentially dangerous for younger children.

Along with reading the label, be sure to watch for:

- Sharp edges: Tiny toys or toys with small removable parts can be swallowed or become lodged in a child's windpipe, ears, or nose. Remember, too, that a cute squeaky toy may prove dangerous if the squeak mechanism can be removed and swallowed by a young child.

- Sharp points: Toys which have pins or staples can easily puncture an unsuspecting child. Even that cuddly stuffed animal may have barbed eyes or wired limbs which have a potential to cut, scratch or stab.

- Loud noises: Toy caps and some noise-making guns or other toys can produce sounds at noise levels that may damage a child's hearing. Be sure to look for the label required by law on boxes of caps producing noises above a certain level: "Warning — Do not fire closer than one foot to the ear. Do not use indoors."

- Propelled objects: Missiles and similar flying toys are potentially dangerous as they could injure a child's eyes. Arrows or darts used by children should have soft cork tips, rubber suction cups or other protective tips in order to prevent injury.

Those buying electric toys for children this year should take special precautions, keeping in mind that even the safest electrical toy can cause an injury. Be sure that the electrical toy is intended for a child old enough to play with it safely.

Electrical toys are required by law to come with instruction booklets. The booklet tells how to operate the toy and points out clearly the dangers

involved. Be sure to read it carefully, and then read it with the child. Point out any warning labels on the toy, explain why they are there and how the toy should be used. It is a good

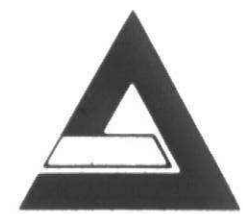

Detroit mayor still expecting underground railroad in city

Chances that Detroit will get an underground light rail rapid transit line are dying.

But because Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young is adamant that it must be built, no one is ready to announce the funeral service.

For one thing, any rail transit plan in the price range of \$750 million or more will require 20 per cent local funding in addition to the \$600 million promised by the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The region has no chance of raising that kind of local money, according to officials of the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority.

For another thing, the Michigan Legislature has stipulated, in the existing funding act, that it must have the final say over whether such a transit line will be built underground.

The legislative mood is strongly anti-"subway."

"VOTERS ARE NOT willing to provide the new tax funds," said SEMTA General Manager Larry E. Salci.

He was quizzed Tuesday after U.S. Transportation Secretary Brock Adams told the Detroit Economic Club the region would have quit arguing and agree on what kind of system it wants in the Woodward corridor.

To Salci, that isn't the issue. "The issue is whether we can go 20 cents on the dollar," he said.

He recalled that when the legislature voted early in the fall to raise the fuel and weight taxes to provide both road and public bus money, the bill passed by a single vote in the House of Representatives, and Lt. Gov. James Damman had to cast a tie-breaking vote in the State Senate.

And that will provide only bus money.

"A subway (decision by SEMTA) will kill the whole program. That's the way I see it," Salci said.

A SEMTA board member who asked not to be identified said the board couldn't put together the required 10 votes (two-thirds majority) to approve any plan.

That is because five of the 15 SEMTA members are hand-picked by Young and two or three others are strongly influenced by the Detroit mayor.

And even if the board could get 10

votes for an underground line, the SEMTA member said, the idea couldn't be sold to the legislature.

SEMTA has no independent taxing authority of its own, unlike a home-rule city or a county. A creature of the state, SEMTA is dependent on Lansing for the legislature for its local share of transit funds.

JOSEPH P. BIANCO Jr., SEMTA board member from Oakland County, said it's unlikely the region can finance its 20 per cent share of a rapid transit system for three to five years.

"The public is not willing to vote it, and then we have the Headlee amendment," Bianco said, referring to the tax limitation proposal approved Nov. 7 by voters.

Theoretically, the state could find money for rapid transit from existing revenues. As a practical matter, there is no way legislators will acquiesce to cuts in education, social services, natural resources or courts in order to finance public transportation.

Thus, the only hope for such funding is new taxes. As of Dec. 22, when the Headlee amendment takes effect, the legislature will be unable to levy those new taxes. The only option is a public vote, which SEMTA people fear won't happen.

BOTH SALCI and SEMTA Chairman Edward H. McNamara, mayor of Livonia, were critical of the federal government's delays in approving or rejecting SEMTA's specific plans.

"Adams chides us," said McNamara, referring to the transportation secretary's speech, "but the federal government gives us no leadership."

Salci said the Transportation Department has required more studies and paperwork from SEMTA than from any other region in the country.

The problem, said the general manager, is that the Transportation Department writes guidelines while SEMTA's plans are being studied in Washington. Then the federal government decides it needs more work.

Currently, Washington is reviewing SEMTA's "draft environmental impact statement"—referred to as DEIS in transit jargon.

If that review is completed by mid-December, as SEMTA hopes, then it

can conduct public hearings in January or early February. "The board can make its decision 10 days after a hearing," Salci said.

The DEIS analyzes several different options for rapid transit and bus systems, including four options with different amounts of the Woodward corridor light rail line underground.

The federal government pledged \$600 million for SEMTA's capital outlay late in 1976. But the Ford Administration attached the unusual condition that the region would have to show that such a federal outlay would stimulate another \$600 million in private investment in Detroit.

Chances of recession projected to be 50-50

University of Michigan economists predict nearly a 50-50 chance of a recession in 1979.

They predict a sharp decline in the economy's growth rate, a substantial increase in unemployment and a slow winding down of inflation.

This assessment was made by Profs. Saul H. Hymans and Harold T. Shapiro, who recently prepared a national economic forecast for the University's 26th annual Conference on the Economic Outlook. Hymans is chairman of the university's economics department. Shapiro is vice-president for academic affairs.

The control forecast for 1979 incorporates the restrictive monetary policy recently announced by President Jimmy Carter and tax cut effects, and assumes controlled Federal expenditures, a crude oil price rise, increased exports and farm price increases below those of last year.

"Compared with the 3.8 per cent rate of growth of real gross national product (GNP) now being estimated for 1978, we are forecasting a sharp decline to a 2 per cent growth rate for the year 1979—surely a growth recession at the very least," Hymans and Shapiro said.

They also predicted "a substantial increase in the unemployment rate to an average of 6.7 per cent for the year and 7.2 per cent for the fourth quarter of 1979. The aggregate price level is expected to be up by 7.7 per cent next year, compared with a 7.4 per cent increase for 1978."

The U-M economists noted that comparison of year-to-year economic

changes may fail to reveal the "true nature of the underlying dynamic path of the economy," and offered a quarterly analysis of economic activity projected in the control forecast.

"Characterizing 1979 as a 2 per cent growth year is hiding a good deal of important detail," they explained. "Our forecast implies virtually no growth at all in the second and third quarters of 1979."

"But we are forecasting annual growth rates of 0.5 and 0.4 per cent in the two mid-year quarters, and that has to mean that the chances of a true recession developing after the early months of 1979 should be regarded as almost '50-50.'"

"In other words, the chances of avoiding a recession in 1979 seem to be only slightly better than the chances of experiencing a recession."

Any moderation of inflation in the first half of next year is apt to be distinctly modest, according to Hymans and Shapiro, who note that "the OPEC price increase, the short-term outlook for fairly large growth in import prices excluding oil, and the substantial hike in payroll taxes, pile a good deal of upward price pressure into the first half of 1979."

The U-M economists explained that the monetary restraint now in place can be expected to produce a substantial decline in residential building activity, with housing starts to "bottom out at about 1.6 million starts in the latter months of next year."

2 pacts ratified at Schoolcraft

Two unions at Schoolcraft College have new two-year contracts following ratification Wednesday by the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees.

By a 2.5-1 margin, the Faculty Forum voted for contract ratification. The contract is retroactive to Aug. 24, and covers 160 full-time and about 190 part-time instructors.

The Schoolcraft College Association of Office Personnel (SCAOP) also ratified a new contract by a 43-1 vote. Retroactive to July 1, 1977, the contract covers 62 clerks and secretaries.

FACULTY MEMBERS teaching full time will get pay increases of seven per cent the first year and 5.5 per cent the second.

A court-appointed fact-finder had recommended raises of seven and six per cent, respectively, for full-timers and 4.5 per and zero per cent, respectively, for part-timers.

Faculty members, however, twice rejected those terms because of the lack of a second year raise for part-timers. The faculty bargaining team agreed to trim one-half per cent from the full-timers' second year increase and distribute it to part-timers.

Of the 160 full-timers, about 90 per cent have a master's degree and three-fourths have maximum seniority. Such an instructor would have earned \$21,577 in 1977-78.

He or she would go to \$23,087 in the current school year and to \$24,357 next year.

Last year, part-timers earned \$209 per credit hour. This year, the part-

timers will go to \$218 per credit hour. In fall of 1979, the second year of the contract, a new formula will go into effect.

Under the new formula, beginning part-timers will earn \$200 per credit hour, persons with 12-25 "preference points" will get \$218 and persons with 26 or more points will receive \$224.

"Preference points" are awarded for the numbers of credit hours taught and the number of years a person has been on the faculty. They are roughly the same as seniority.

The contract will cost the college \$377,000 more the first year and \$293,000 more the second.

OFFICE PERSONNEL will get pay increases of six per cent retroactive to mid-1977 and 5.25 per cent retroactive to mid-1978. There are 62 persons in six levels of jobs, with seven steps in each level.

A clerk in the lowest level in 1976-77 hired on at \$136 a week. A person hiring on under the new contract in 1977 would have earned \$144 a week, and a newcomer in 1978 would have been paid \$152.

A secretary in the highest job level and at the maximum step would have been paid \$251 under the last year of the old contract, \$266 in 1977-78 and \$280 for 1978-79.

For the second year of the contract, the annual salary range for SCAOP would be \$7,900 to \$14,500.

Over the two year life of the contract, the college will need \$160,000 in new money.

The contract expires in mid-1979. Thus, negotiations will begin again about April.

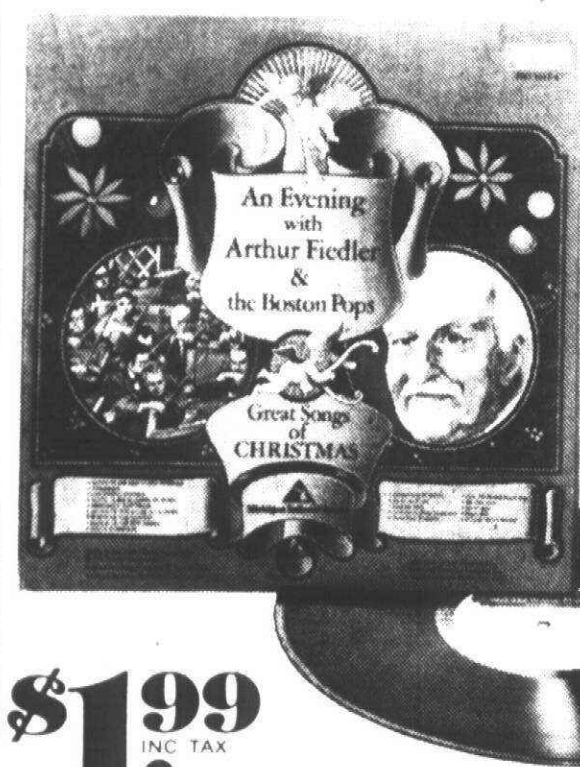

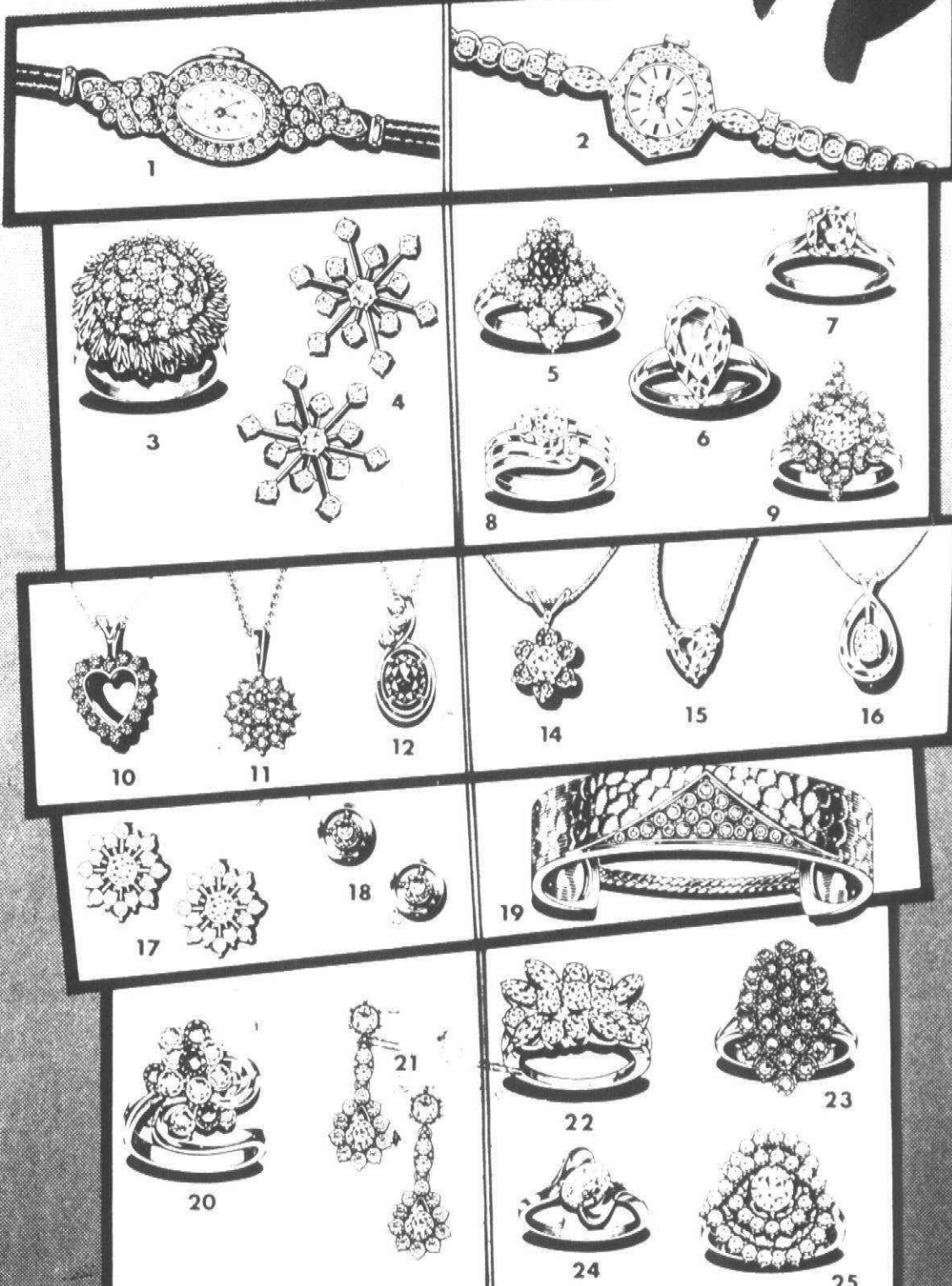

Predictions for new year's economy:

Inflationary stagnation

America's inflationary excesses of 1978 leave the nation vulnerable recession in 1979.

But David Littmann, vice-president of economics for Manufacturers National Bank, said there could be some good economic news next year if inflation is reduced by less federal borrowing and less expansion of the money supply.

In either event, "inflationary stagnation" and little real growth in productivity are in store, Littmann told the Detroit Economic Club Monday.

Littmann gave the overview speech for the club's annual economic forecasting luncheon. Whatever else happens, he foresees a flattening of the boom which in January will enter a record 46th month.

IF FEDERAL monetary and fiscal policies are brought under control, Lit-

tmann said, four good things could happen next year:

- "After a period of accelerating prices in the first half of 1979, the U.S. economy could turn the corner on inflation before next year end.

- "Interest rates, after reaching a peak early next year, could descend progressively during the year and into 1980.

- "Capital spending should remain strong; savings and investment, expressed in real terms, could improve.

- "The U.S. net export position could show a dramatic turnaround, ending the year 1979 as a positive figure."

He predicted a one per cent real growth in the gross national product barring major strikes and no mandatory controls or credit allocations by the federal government.

LITTMANN, who has degrees from

Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Antioch and the University of Michigan with advanced study at the London School of Economics and Political Science, has developed a monthly index of business activity for the metropolitan area and the state.

He recalled that his forecast for 1978 had been on target:

"If policy-makers continue to stimulate the economy by adopting wider deficits and faster growth rates for money, then 1978 will show dramatic acceleration in prices and interest rates," he predicted a year ago.

"Unfortunately, this is exactly what happened," he told the Economic Club. "Despite the fact that the U.S. economy this year will show a real output gain of at least 3.8 per cent—which exceeds the average 3.5 per cent expansion rate for our economy since World War II—there has been no let-up in policy stimulation.

"Largely as a result of these inflationary excesses, the economy now enters 1979 with considerable vulnerability to recession and great uncertainty regarding even more government-imposed controls," he warned.

REAL GROWTH in 1979 will be lower than in 1978, it is generally agreed, he said.

"In contrast to the outlook presented a year ago, there are now several areas of excesses that will weaken major sectors of the economy," Littman said, listing two sectors:

"The growth rate of mortgage and consumer installment credit cannot be maintained.

"Incomes will be pinched by inflation, and spending for autos and residential housing will undergo some retrenchment."

Littman said financial markets, both in the U.S. and the rest of the world, are watching American policy "with extreme anxiety."

He continued: "Less deficit spending is interpreted favorably. Less money and credit expansion now translates into positive responses."

"It is recognized that control programs merely distort the economy and create shortages. Moreover, controls attack consequences, rather than causes, of inflation. Therefore, movement toward such programs would appear as desperate actions."

Nowhere have economic forecasters been predicting more gloom in 1979 than in the construction industry.

This week, though, that industry got large dose of encouragement from Robert F. Johnson, executive vice president of Elkin, Johnson & Korb, a subsidiary of Elkin Corp. and one of Michigan's largest builders.

"When I look at the work in progress, I see pleasant prospects for 1979, he told persons attending the Economic Club of Detroit's economic forecast luncheon.

Those pleasant prospects are riding on continued industrial and commercial expansion and rehabilitation and continued federal spending on public works projects.

The construction industry's other sectors—residential and institutional building—are expected to find the going slowed in 1979, Johnson said.

The reason for continued industrial expansion is Michigan's tax inducements for expanding in the state. "Michigan has taken the lead in creative tax planning through such laws as Public Act 198, the plant rehabilitation act." That act gives business tax breaks for expanding or rehabilitating their Michigan plants.

"That act alone has resulted in \$2.9 million in capital investment," he said.

Because more businesses and industries will be taking advantage of that law and other laws providing incentives, Johnson said he sees no decline in plant construction and rehabilitation.

WHERE THERE will be a decline is in housing starts.

Quoting U.S. Department of Commerce statistics, Johnson said housing starts across the country will drop 17 per cent in the coming year.

Detroit may not be as hard hit as the rest of the country, he added.

In 1977, he said, there were 24,780 housing starts in the Detroit area, a 36 per cent increase over 1976. In 1979, because of inflation and sharply increased mortgage interest rates, housing starts will top out at the 22,000 mark.

Based on Johnson's figures, the Detroit area will see an 11 per cent decrease in 1979 compared to an expected 17 per cent decrease nationally.

WHILE INDUSTRIAL construction is to be strong and residential construction weak, public works projects are in a clouded state, Johnson said.

Institutional development—the construction of hospitals and schools—Johnson said, has been depressed for five years.

State employment rate expected to stay weak

Michigan's developing weakness in employment will continue next year, accompanied by a second consecutive year of steadily moderating growth of state personal income, a slight increase in the inflation rate, and some decline in the rate of growth of available state tax revenues, University of Michigan economists predict.

Prof. Saul H. Hymans and Harold T. Shapiro explained the details of their state economic forecast recently at the University's 26th annual Conference on the Economic Outlook.

Their control forecast, reflecting a state economy highly dependent on the level and distribution of national economic activity, assumes a declining rate of growth in gross national product (GNP), with a sharp rebound by mid-1980, declining expenditures on autos and parts through much of 1979; static real expenditures on other consumer durables; little rise in business fixed investment; inflation consumer durables; little rise in business fixed investment; inflation rates at 7 to 8 per cent throughout 1979; and rising national unemployment.

In addition, it is assumed that the restrictive monetary policy announced in Washington last month will be moderated after mid 1979, that there will be no changes in state tax rates nor major work stoppages during 1979 contract negotiations between the UAW and the automotive industry.

As compiled by the U-M Research Seminar in Quantitative Economics for the seventh consecutive year, the Michigan forecast predicts the following:

EMPLOYMENT: "The current developing weakness in employment will continue through 1979. The hardest hit sectors are manufacturing and construction. Manufacturing employment—which has never regained its 1973 peak levels is forecast to decline 4.6 per cent. This represents a loss of 40,000 jobs. Employment in construction is forecast to fall by 2.6 per cent next year.

"Although some substantial gains in employment are forecast in the services sector (27,000 jobs), other areas are characterized by very slow growth in new employment opportunities, especially when compared to recent years. For 1979 as a whole, total employment declines slightly (by 0.2 per cent, or 9,000 jobs) to a level of 3.88 million."

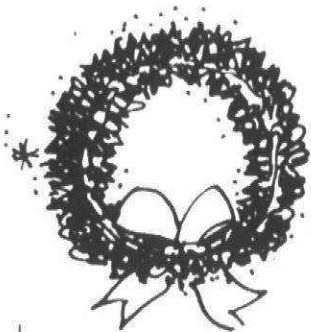
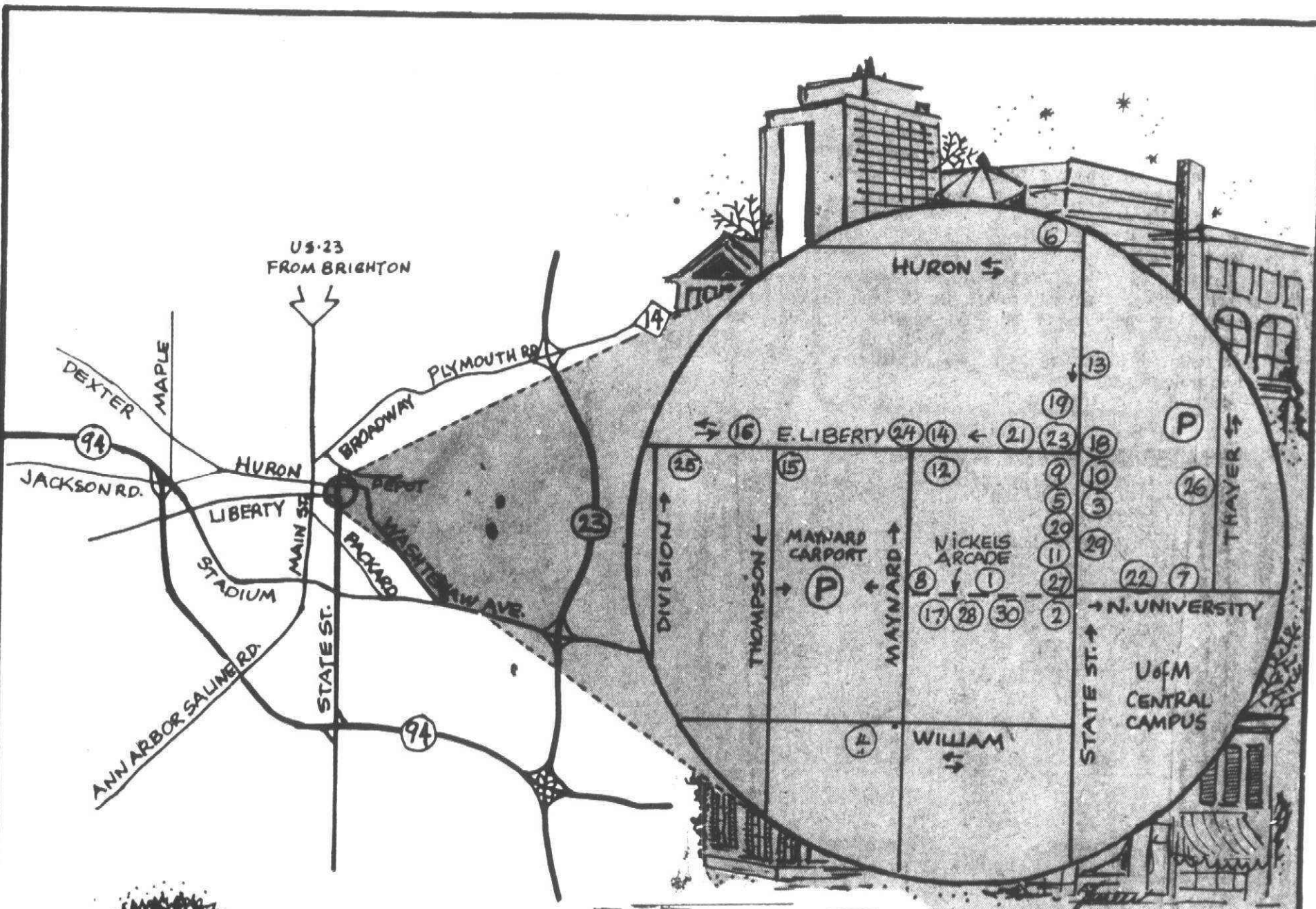
UNEMPLOYMENT: The forecast is for an increase in the state's labor force of almost 40,000. This represents an increase of 0.9 of one per cent over the calendar 1978 labor force, and when combined with the expected small decline in total employment, results in a forecast of sharp increase in the state unemployment rate. Projected for 1979: an unemployment rate of 8 per cent, an increase of over 1 percentage point.

PERSONAL INCOME in Michigan is projected at \$82.7 billion for 1979, implying a second consecutive year of steadily moderating growth of state personal income. "In comparison with the 9.8 per cent increase now estimated for 1978, our forecast for 1979 involves an increase of only 8.3 per cent for state personal income."

INFLATION "The local inflation rate (as measured by Detroit CPI) is forecast to rise 8.2 per cent from the 7.4 per cent increase now estimated for 1978. Inflation rates are, however, expected to moderate somewhat throughout 1979, reaching a level of close to 7 per cent by year end. These forecast rates, along with the relatively modest growth expected in personal income produce a forecast increase of only 1.5 per cent in real disposable income in Michigan for calendar 1979."

TAX REVENUES "For fiscal 1979 we are forecasting personal income tax revenues—gross of distribution to local units of government—of \$1.877 billion. This represents an increase of \$163 million, or 9.5 per cent. This compares to an increase of \$241 million or 16.3 per cent that is now estimated for

fiscal 1978. For fiscal 1980 we forecast a further increase in these revenues of \$192 million, or 10.2 per cent.

Gloom, doom and optimism expressed

Moderately bullish

Not many people care to tangle with General Motors' Chairman Thomas A. Murphy or his economic forecasts.

But earlier this week, Thomas F. Russell, chairman of the board of Federal-Mogul Corp., disagreed with Murphy's rosy 1979 predictions and forecast declining auto sales.

Whereas sales for 1978 are projected at 11.2 million cars, Russell, whose corporation services the auto industry, told a Detroit Economic Club audience that only 10.9 million cars—both domestic and foreign—would be sold in the coming year.

GM Chief Murphy, who has a proven record of accurate forecasting, several weeks ago went out on a limb saying 11.5 million cars would be sold in 1979. Chrysler expects sales of 11.4 million. Ford is the most conservative of the Big Three automakers predicting sales of 11.3 million cars.

"TOM MURPHY last year made a prediction that made everyone laugh," Russell told an audience of more than 1,000 gathered at the Detroit Plaza Hotel. "This year he's the one laughing all the way to the bank."

"This year he made a prediction more than 600,000 more than mine. I seriously hope he's right," he said.

DESPITE HIS predictions of a downturn in the auto industry, Russell calls his expectations "moderately bullish."

The 2.5 per cent decline in auto sales that Russell predicts is nowhere near the recession low of 1974 when auto demand dropped 22 per cent. In 1975 demand dropped another six per cent.

Russell said he is counting on the income tax cut, which President Jimmy Carter approved several months ago, to ease the pressure on consumers to put off buying a car. "The tax cut," he said, "will tend to preserve disposable income, making it available for potential car purchases."

He also gave American car producers and the tumbling value of the dollar abroad credit for "erasing" the inducements for buying foreign rather than Ford.

Russell predicted import car sales would drop a full 15 per cent in 1979.

"The decline of the dollar on the

international money markets has erased the price advantages once enjoyed by our overseas competitors.

"And American producers now have accepted models which compete with the foreign ones on a head-to-head basis," he said.

WHILE AUTO SALES may be down next year, Russell expressed hope for the 1980s. No longer, he said, will American producers be solely dependent on the domestic market.

"The 'world car' is a concept whose time has come for U.S. manufacturers. It now seems apparent that Detroit products will once again appear in substantial numbers around the globe," he said.

Russell, however, could not ignore the other voices making more dire predictions for 1979.

Calling Carter's economic policies a

"major area of uncertainty," he said, "the results of the president's program could produce a slowdown in economic growth and increased unemployment, which could possibly have an effect on automotive sales."

He quickly added the probable results of Carter's policies are "anything but clear."

"It's still too early to know whether the voluntary cost-price control program will work or, for that matter, whether Congress will resist mounting pressure from some quarters for mandatory controls."

"It's also premature for an assessment of Carter's strategy to support the dollar on international money markets. And this could have important bearing on the domestic inflation rates and, ultimately, on discretionary incomes."

Next Christmas

St. Nick hasn't even squeezed through his first chimney and some people are already looking forward to next Christmas.

Larry L. Trettenero, Detroit group manager for Sears, Roebuck and Co., said next Christmas will make 1979 much more palatable for area retailers.

"A good Christmas could do much to make 1979 profitable in spite of slower sales throughout the year," Trettenero told more than 1,000 persons attending the Economic Club of Detroit's annual economic forecast luncheon.

"A pick up in housing starts, auto sales and general merchandise sales will be evident by the Christmas season of 1979," he said.

TRETTENERO SHUNTED aside

economists who predict the country will be mired in a recession by next year's end.

"Overall, the year of 1979 looks to be a relatively slower year when compared to 1977 and 1978," he said, "but not nearly as bad as the last cyclical downturn."

"It is questionable if the slowdown can be ranked as a recession. If it rates that label," he said, "then it must be termed a mild one at that and perhaps one of the shortest on record."

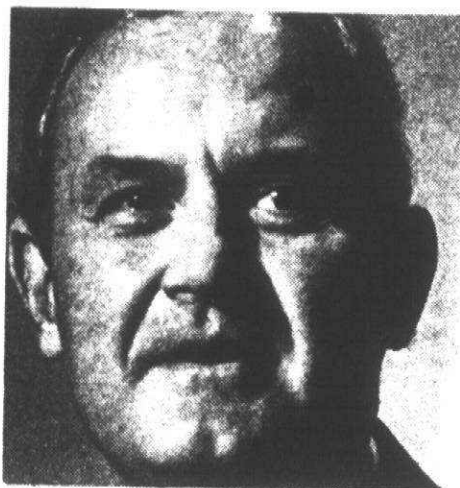
EXCEPT FOR holding out 1979's fourth quarter as a ray of hope, Trettenero predicted slower retail growth across the country and especially in Detroit.

Nationally, he said, the buying public will make an effort to reduce the consumer debt, which now stands at \$1.1 trillion.

Inflation, he said, would continue at the nine per cent annual average until late next year when it should level off to about seven per cent.

"Despite federal income tax cuts in January," Trettenero said, "rising costs are likely to cause people to put off some purchases that are not urgent."

The effort to cut the consumer debt, inflation, reduced government spending and sharply higher interest rates, he said, will combine to cut the sales growth rate from 1978's 10.5 per cent to 6.5 per cent in the coming year.

Higher interest rates will hurt small to medium-sized firms which must borrow to make capital improvements, carry receivables and maintain inventory, he said.

STODDARD blamed inflation on "governmental spending at all levels beyond reasonable taxation revenues" and on "wages rising at a faster rate

than real productivity."

And he said price inflation would continue at—or above—the nine per cent level for the next nine months.

Resident pans I-275 sound barrier

Editor:
The Michigan State Highway Department has created a monster.

Work was completed this week on the concrete "sound barrier" along I-275 in Plymouth Township, and its effectiveness in reducing the noise pollution from the expressway traffic must rate an absolute zero.

The Detroit Free Press, editorializing on the project last July 7, termed it "exceedingly ugly" and "unaesthetic."

In a letter to WJBK-TV2 in May, I wrote that the wall was "as monstrous and as ugly as the one which divides Berlin." I appeared on two newscasts on TV2 in mid-May to express my opposition to the construction of the barrier which borders 690 feet of our

property on Ann Arbor Trail in Plymouth Township.

Today the barrier is a "fait accompli" and the net gain from the 10-foot wall is a pronounced heightening of the noise level from the expressway rather than a lessening. Our residence is immediately to the west of I-275 which is depressed 18 feet at this point. Before the wall went up, we were not bothered in the slightest by the highway traffic. Now we can hear every truck that roars by, and in peak traffic periods the noise is simply overwhelming.

Several questions are suggested: Has the highway department made any "before" and "after" sound tests to evaluate the effectiveness of the barrier?

Would the highway department make such a test on both sides of the

barrier at this particular point to prove or disprove its effectiveness?

Why did the highway department spend \$50,000 for the 600 feet of barrier on our property line without giving us a voice in the matter?

Why is there no barrier on the west side of the half-mile stretch of I-275 between Ann Arbor Road and Ann Arbor Trail? This opening, across the street from our residence, completely negates any possible effectiveness the barrier might have.

After passing Gilbert Street just to the north of our property, the barrier proceeds another 600 feet down the slope of the Rouge Valley to a point near Edward N. Hines Drive. This is a sloping wooded area and will never be a residential area. Imagine, 600 feet of sound barrier, another \$50,000, and the

only possible beneficiaries are a squirrel or two! Why a barrier here?

What convinced the highway department that a 6 1/2-inch thick concrete wall varying in height from 10 to 16 feet could prevent noise pollution from the expressway? It might deflect noise; it could not possibly absorb it. The noise still would be there—and it is, actually accentuated by the "barrier."

Wouldn't it have been better, certainly more aesthetic, and quite possibly less costly, to utilize nature's own provenly-effective sound barrier, an eye-pleasing greenbelt of trees and shrubs, to achieve the highway department's purpose?

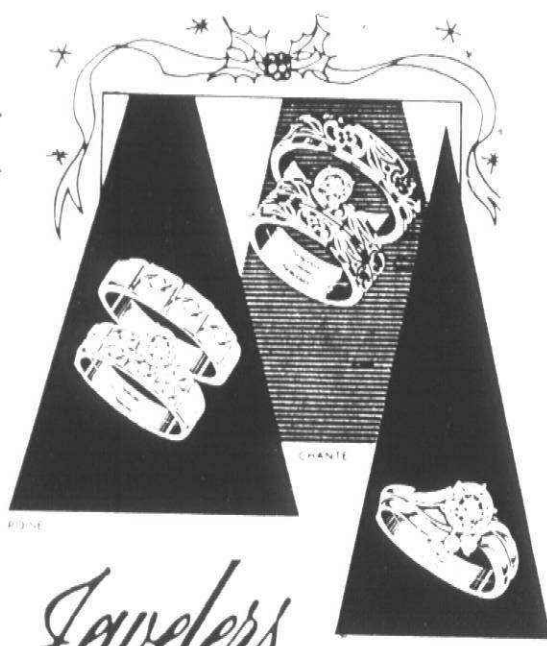

Salaries need revamping

An 88 per cent pay hike awarded to Canton's four trustees early Wednesday morning underscores a need to raise the pay of the township's elected administrators.

Trustees deserve the pay hike which increases their per-meeting pay from \$40 to \$75. To do their job well, they must devote an untold number of hours to prepare for meetings and to propose legislation.

But unlike the full-time clerk and supervisor, trustees can easily hold a full-time job which puts bread and milk on the supper table.

Canton has a 1979 budget of \$3.3 million, but its top elected administrators gross less than many department heads.

The full-time supervisor now makes \$21,000 a year, the full-time clerk makes \$19,700, and the part-time treasurer \$7,500.

The administrators are charged with running the township by issuing responsibilities to non-elected township employees.

But many of those employees make more than their bosses.

The police and fire chief currently earn \$22,470 a year, while the pay scale for their job classification goes up to \$24,700. The finance director, chief building inspector and recreation department supervisor make \$100 more a year than the township's elected supervisor and \$1,400 more than the elected clerk.

PAY SHOULD NOT be an incentive to run for public office. But it should not discourage candidates from running for office either.

The township's last three supervisors—Noel Culbert, Harold Stein and Robert Greenstein—all had opportunities to supplement their supervisor salaries with outside income.

Present Supervisor Culbert runs a part-time law practice as did former Supervisor Greenstein. Stein owns a car wash in Westland. Few candidates who would be forced to take a leave of absence from their regular jobs have run for supervisor in recent years.

The same holds true for Canton's full-time clerk position. Unlike the clerk and supervisor, the part-time treasurer can easily hold outside employment.

The pay for the township's three administrators is set by the Canton compensation commission, which is scheduled to meet sometime next year.

The commission should raise the administrators' salaries at least to the level of the department heads.

THE QUESTION of trustee salary adjustments was handed to the township board under a 1977 directive of the compensation commission.

Board members handled the issue wisely at this week's township board meeting.

They turned down a proposal to increase trustees' rate of pay by 233 per cent by establishing a weekly salary of \$75 plus per-meeting pay of \$25.

The weekly salary could have discouraged less-than-dedicated trustees from attending township board meetings. And the 233 per hike could have attracted trustee candidates who desire the pay more than the job.

Trustees have not received a pay increase since 1976. The rate of pay approved by the township board falls within the salary range which township board and city council members in surrounding communities receive.

In a time of spiraling inflation, an increase of \$35 in trustees' per-meeting pay is not an unreasonable wage hike.

Throwaway notes

Despite many costly warnings from container manufacturers, Michigan voters learned that the liquid inside beer and soft drink containers can cost less when the containers are returnable and recyclable.

Now the manufacturers are attempting to assure us via advertising that we made a good choice and that their packaging can be a great convenience in returning bottles and cans.

More than one beer company is displaying a little Yankee ingenuity and a lot of capitalist competitiveness by promoting a five-cent returnable bottle.

A friend has mixed feelings about refundable bottles and cans. She had finally trained her teenagers to throw bottles and cans into the trash compactor. Now she has to train them all over again.

One thing the manufacturers proved is that the law of supply and demand can be disregarded. With the drinking age being lifted to 21, you would think it would reduce demand—right? And reduced demand should mean lower prices—right? But prices are going up. Textbook economics just doesn't work.

Delays, delays

Judges win and you lose

A judge—now there's a fellow who has it made. They used to say a judge is a law student who corrects his own examination papers, but that's only part of the story.

Judges stick together like an ethnic group. If you catch a judge misbehaving, the other judges stick with him and burn the accuser.

And even if you win against a judge, you lose. Three cases come to mind.

IN THE MICHIGAN Supreme Court last week, Detroit Free Press attorney Brownson Murray argued eloquently and forcefully that a defendant has no inherent right to a private trial.

It seems that a year ago, Detroit Recorder's Judge George W. Crockett Jr. closed the doors on the trial of a Cody High English male teacher accused of criminal sexual conduct with a male student.

While the Free Press raced its engine on an appeal Judge Crockett went ahead with the trial. The defendant was acquitted. The trial was over many months before Crockett's decision for a secret trial could be argued.

And so if Crockett turns out to be 10,000 per cent wrong, the public still loses the right to monitor a trial and the right to make its own decision on whether the teacher is fit to be in a classroom.

Judges stick together, and delay is their glue. One's only comfort is that the supreme court decision—whenever the court gets around to deciding it—will set a precedent. But it cannot correct a past injustice.

ON LABOR DAY weekend of 1977, I was sweating it out with Farmington Observer Editor Steve Barnaby about whether to publish the name of a local priest accused in a morals case.

District Judge Michael Hand relied on a law which allowed him to issue a gag order. We were pretty sure the law would be declared unconstitutional—some day. And we were dead certain Hand had exceeded the authority granted by even that law.

WXYZ-TV challenged Hand's gag order in U.S. District Court. Judge James Churchill tossed us a crumb: Hand's gag order could apply to the court personnel, the attorneys and cops but not to the media.

Big deal. We could print the stuff, but the principals of the case couldn't tell us anything.

Now watch the timing: The case broke Labor Day 1977; six months later, almost to the day, the priest pleaded guilty and avoided a trial. He got six months in the county jail. He would have been out by Labor Day of 1978 or earlier, with good behavior.

And WXYZ-TV's case still hasn't come to trial in federal court. So even if the station wins, it has lost.

THE LATEST gag order comes from Livonia District Court.

A fellow in a wheelchair was arrested on an old warrant. The police say he resisted arrest, got abusive and had to be subdued, or something like that. The guy says the police beat the daylight out of him, and so on. There's an investigation going on.

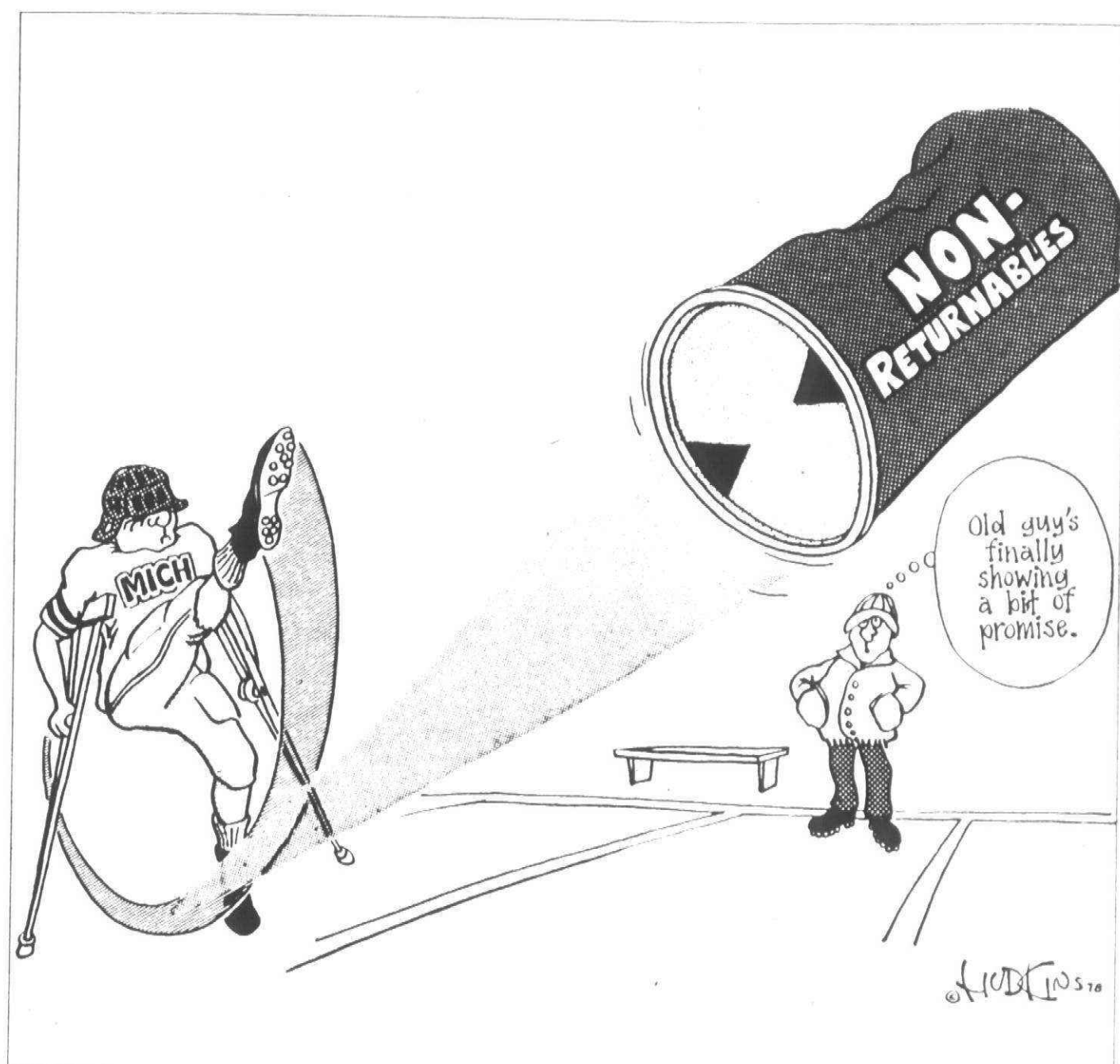
This is not the first story of that kind to be published about Livonia police. Over the years, we've heard a lot of other stories circulated by word of mouth, too.

But Judge James Mies played into the police's hands by issuing a gag order until the case comes to trial.

Now, a conventional lawyer will tell you that all you have to do is wait for the trial for the testimony to become public. If you're dumb, you'll believe that. The statistical truth is that 90 or 95 per cent of all cases are settled by attorneys' negotiations, not by a trial.

Mies' order could be challenged, but what's the use? By the time a brother judge rules, the whole affair will have been settled and buried.

\$570,000 tax investment helps 3 persons per day

This fall, the Michigan Legislature passed a transportation package which, among other things, increased the gasoline tax by two cents a gallon.

The purpose of the "transportation package" was to generate more money for practically everyone in the transportation industry, from cities for their local roads to the State Highway Department for major arteries and public transportation, such as the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) which serves the metropolitan Detroit suburbs.

Most experts agreed the taxes were necessary to take care of everything from potholes in your street, maintaining expressways and replacing aging buses.

AT ABOUT the same time the legislature enacted the trans-pack, it also mandated that all new buses be lift-equipped to take care of the handicapped.

This was unrelated to the new taxes and transportation program, but it has had its effect on both.

The normal, new SEMTA bus you see on the street should cost around \$92,000. With the mandated lifts, the cost is increased to \$102,000 or \$10,000 a bus. A bus with a lift also has only 41 seats compared to the usual 44.

SEMTA has purchased 57 new buses with lifts at an additional cost of about \$570,000.

The Detroit Department of Transportation got 43 of these buses, and 14 were put on SEMTA suburban routes.

As an experiment, all of the lift-equipped buses were put on the Gratiot route so statistics could be developed as to use and need.

Money says 'good-bye'

Now that you've received your Christmas bonus, watch out for the con artists.

Unlike the Grinch who stole Christmas, their aim is not only to remove the joy from your heart, but also the cash from your pocket.

Supposedly, 'tis better to give than receive. But the flim flam artists consider this one of their best seasons for taking. Fat purses and wallets, bulging from the year's results of your own personal achievements, blare the holiday message: "Money talks; it says goodbye."

Two Detroitbank Corp. executives, David J. Westhoff of Livonia and William J. Kalmar of Grosse Pointe, recently drew up a list of schemes and con games to be aware of as you fight the crowds to buy gifts in what is the most joyous of all seasons.

I now borrow liberally from their flim flam specialist's guide for swindling the naive.

BEWARE OF THE unsolicited C.O.D. package that is addressed to a neighbor who isn't home. If you don't accept the package and pay for it, that neighbor—so you're told—will have to endure long lines of people at a pickup point. So you shell out the cash to the official-looking delivery man.

Later you tell the neighbor of the favor you performed, but hear in reply that no package was expected. You rip open whatever box it was that the delivery man left, and maybe all you find are the remains of a cooked goose.

With typical bankers' wit, our friends Westhoff and Kalmar add: "It is obvious whose goose was cooked on this caper. Don't receipt for any packages, either yours or your neighbor's, unless you know the contents in advance."

"WHEN YOU PLACE Christmas purchases in your car, lock them in your trunk. In a station wagon, conceal gifts with a car robe or blanket. In any event, keep those gifts out of sight," is their understandable advice.

What they call a "jewel of an experience" involves the unwary shopper who listens to the spiel of a con artist trying to make that person believe he has a "hot" diamond ring or other jewelry for sale at bargain basement prices.

With the consummate skill of a veteran stage

the first statistics are in:

There are no handicapped persons using the 43 D-DOT buses because it requires the driver to leave his seat and operate the lift at the rear door.

Under union rules, the bus drivers have asserted that they cannot be assigned a task requiring them to leave their drivers' seats.

Until this is worked out, the lifts will not be used. This sounds ridiculous, but the state law only required that buses be equipped with lifts—not that they have to be operated.

Of the remaining 14 SEMTA buses, there are now an average of three persons using the lifts each day.

To this point, the taxpayers of Michigan have paid \$570,000 so that three persons can use the buses each day.

SEMTA is now taking bids for 167 new buses. By law, the buses must be lift-equipped. The state will pay an additional \$1.67 million for these buses.

The question is: How many people will actually use these lifts to make this investment worthwhile?

The last act takes place when the pigeon discovers (after the pay-off) that the "hot" buy actually is a "cool" piece of worthless glass.

ANOTHER HAIR-RAISING experience for the gullible is to be suckered into the glamorous sounding holiday project of raising chinchillas at home, do-it-yourself style.

The Federal Trade Commission estimates that more than \$50 million is swindled out of the hides of Americans every year by investing in fake fur farms.

Of the host of things that could go wrong, perhaps the worst would be that you couldn't distinguish the male of the species from the female. Reproduction can be extremely difficult when you find a fast talker has sold you two of the same sex.

Can you imagine a con man dressing up like Santa Claus, standing on a street corner, ringing a bell and soliciting money from passing persons? Yes, it has happened.

Westhoff and Kalmar recite many more schemes and emphasize: "Of prime importance to millions of Americans at this time of year is the need to get 'what you paid for.' Investigate before you invest."

"Remember, the bitterness of poor quality lingers long after the sweetness of low price is forgotten. Above all, be careful, use common sense, and you won't get your goose cooked."

Ask the Educator

Problem teacher



JOSEPH HADDAD

QUESTION: We have a person teaching at our local elementary school who is a very poor teacher. She really turns kids off to learning. She is mean and abusive to many students.

All the parents I know consider her incompetent and have lodged complaints with the principal. She is middle-aged and has taught in almost every elementary school in our district.

I spoke to our principal about this situation. He is a very fine man whose hands are tied by the teacher tenure law and the teachers' union. Isn't there anything we parents can do to protect our children from a wasted year?

ANSWER: The tenure law is not the problem.

Gathering proof of an educator's incompetence is tedious, time consuming, thankless work. One does not make friends documenting the poor work produced by a colleague. Such documentation must be done according to rules of due process.

Information must be collected without deceit or trickery and with the full knowledge of the person in question.

The individual may not cooperate in this process. Further, she may take the case to the school lounge in an effort to build support or pressure the administrator. Likewise, she may seek the defense of sympathetic parents or a school board member.

No, your principal's hands are not tied, but he may feel overwhelmed by a task which is difficult and which may result in damage to his reputation or in lowered morale among his staff. It is not unusual for the administrator who deals with controversy to be seen by his own superiors as a source of trouble.

DESPITE MY observations, don't be discouraged.

Incompetence certainly can be documented. It happens quietly every year in most school districts. It is difficult, and the union does fight hard for teacher rights, but that's only fair isn't it?

You should insist on action from your principal. Go up the chain of command if you must, one step at a time. The district director of instruction or assistant superintendent is generally next in line.

Be fair and decent in your approach. Stay away from unsubstantiated rumor or unprovable allegations.

Have dates, events, facts and what you did about it written out. Keep copies of all communications and take notes. One or two complaints will not be enough. You will need proof of several acts of incompetence over a period of time.

Finally, don't be disillusioned if your activity results in retraining or in-service for the teacher instead of dismissal.

You know we must always walk the line and find a balance between compassion and fair play for the teacher and concern for the educational welfare of the students.

Common decency dictates that we pay attention to both sides of this issue. No one starts out planning to be mediocre at his work.

No cash for food stamps starting Jan. 1

Michigan food stamp recipients will no longer be required to pay part of the face value of stamps they receive after Jan. 1.

The total value of the food stamps received always exceeds the purchase price under the present program. Excess food stamps are the bonus stamps the household receives by participating in the program.

For example, a household may pay \$50 to receive \$150 worth of food stamps each month. The extra \$100 worth of stamps is the amount of bonus stamps the household gains.

Under the new system (assuming that eligibility circumstances, such as net income and family size, remain the same), the household will simply receive \$100 worth of food stamps beginning in January without having to pay any money.

Should the household's circumstances change, the number of bonus stamps issued will either increase or decrease, as the situation warrants.

MDSS officials pointed out that elimination of the money payment will result in a decrease in the amount recipients will actually receive.

The amount of food stamps to be issued in January may not meet all of a household's monthly food costs, officials said. Therefore, money no longer required to buy food stamps may be necessary to buy what extra food they may need.

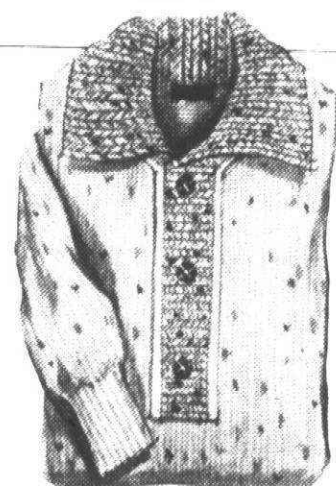

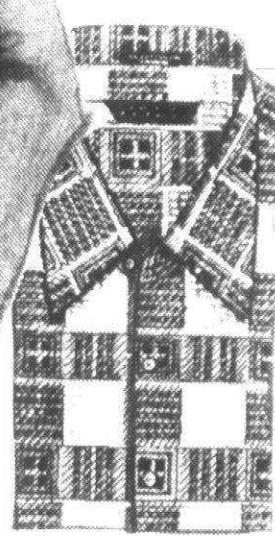

Christmas greenery was displayed longer

Certain plants are traditionally associated with the observance of Christmas. Evergreen trees, mistletoe, holly and ivy are all symbols of the holiday season.

In more recent times, the poinsettia and the Christmas cactus have joined the list of living decorations most popular at this time of year.

Hardly a home exists today without some form of holiday greenery adorning it in late December. Nowadays, most people take their decorations down as soon as Christmas is over, and few leave them up after New Year's Day.

SUCH WAS NOT the case in years gone by.

It was considered unlucky to remove the decorations before Feb. 2, the pagan day for calling back the sun and the witch's sabbath recognizing the coming of spring and the rebirth of the earth.

Later, Jan. 5, the "12th night," became an acceptable time to take down the Christmas finery and end the festivities.

The praise of holly and ivy are sung in many Christmas carols. But long before the celebration of this Christian holiday, these plants were brought into the house every winter, for it was believed they held magical powers and could protect a home from evil.

In some places, it is considered bad luck to burn Christmas greenery. In others, it is acceptable, but only if the plants are no longer living. In any case, it is thought to be very unlucky to burn any evergreen (especially holly) if there is any life in it.

Many people preserve a sprig of holly to keep year around for good fortune. And it is considered a very bad omen to crush a holly berry under foot.



MISTLETOE is an object of veneration all over the world. In ancient times, it was cut for rituals with only a knife or sickle of sacred gold.

Our present custom of kissing under the mistletoe comes from the ancient belief in the plant's magical association with fertility. This probably came about from the way the plant carries its berries. For a woman to be kissed under the mistletoe was a magical way to ensure that she would bear children.

The freedom now granted a man to kiss any woman (or vice-versa) under the mistletoe comes from the "universal liberty and general amnesty" allowed in England as long as the plant decorated the local church altar — a practice recorded in York as recently as the 18th century.

OUR MISTLETOE legends are nearly all English, while the holly and ivy traditions seem to have originated in Rome.

The German people were first to combine the pagan decorated evergreen tree with the celebration of Christmas, and the poinsettia and Christmas cactus were both added to the observance of this day after Christianity was established in the western hemisphere.

Thus, we see the combination of pagan and Christian, joined together in this joyous season.

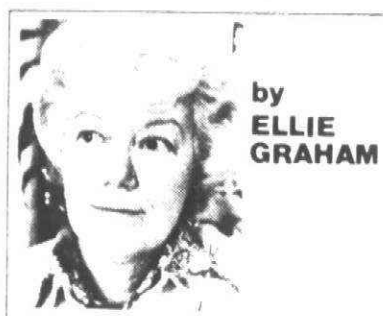
IT WAS A FULL house Sunday afternoon when the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra and the New York Savoyards presented "H.M.S. Pinafore."

It's a 'a tale of 3 school districts'

The program at the annual Christmas tea of the Plymouth, Northville, Canton, Novi League of Women Voters last Wednesday could have been titled "A Tale of Three School Districts."

Gerald Kratz, superintendent of the Novi schools, Lawrence Nichols, superintendent of the Northville Public Schools, and John M. Hoben, superintendent of the Plymouth Canton Community schools, outlined present conditions of their districts and looked ahead at future problems.

What was striking was the fact that three adjacent districts are facing very different situations in respect to growth, financing and building.

Northville's problem, as Nichols stated candidly, is that "we don't have any money." He explained that the district is being punished severely by the state aid formula in a declining growth situation.

Hoben is faced with the opposite situation in Plymouth and Canton. He has more students than schools to accommodate them — but his district has a bit of money problem, too.

Of the three superintendents, Kratz obviously was the one in what approached an ideal situation.

"Novi used to be the place you stumbled upon on your way to Northville or Plymouth. But not now," he said with satisfaction.

"THE AVERAGE HOME being built costs \$76,000. There's lots of growth in the 17.4 square miles with 19 new subdivisions on the board," the Novi superintendent reported, anticipating that the 3,100 school population will "double and redouble."

He pointed out that the community "has the population and the industrial and commercial base to support it. Twelve Oaks Mall—that some other places didn't want and with which we are very happy—has given Novi a downtown."

"With this tax base, we no longer depend on state aid; 98 per cent of our taxes come from the local community. The number of students does not dictate our income although it does dictate the number of classrooms and teachers."

"Yesterday's fields are tomorrow's subdivisions," he said, mentioning that changes coming to Novi include two automobile dealerships, a major department store and, possibly, a large hotel.

"I'm not naive enough to think that growth won't bring the problems of other districts," he said, adding that the "criterion for any action is how it will affect the youngsters."

AMONG THE PLUSES for his situation, Kratz listed the people moving into the community who are interested in education and expect a quality system.

"We are moving in new directions," he continued, pointing to a new agricultural program with a farm to implement it, as Plymouth has.

"I feel good about the direction in which we are moving," he concluded.

Nichols, who is in his first year as superintendent of the Northville system, wistfully wished he, too, "had a farm." He said he has found, however, that Northville has an asset of a high caliber staff developed over the years.

He is finding "extremely dedicated teachers," he said, but is aware that money, or lack of it, is his chief problem.

"We're going to make it through this year all right," he declared, "because Northville is one of the very few communities in which an additional millage was passed this year."

"It is important that the people of the district have confidence in the system."

Nichols said his problem lies in the fact that "the state aid formula punishes severely any district that has the audacity to lose children. I would

welcome any assistance in getting a change in formula—the key element is an allowance of \$300 for every student, but you lose \$1,464 for every child lost from last year. Losing children doesn't mean fixed costs drop and the formula is not taking this into consideration."

NICHOLS reported that the district will be coming up for millage renewal in the next year.

The million-dollar bond issue voted in June was approved by the state in late October with bonds being sold in mid-November. Nichols told the LWV members as he cited maintenance problems. He said he feels that, in the past, not enough funds have been earmarked to maintain buildings and sites properly. Now the district "is rapidly approaching the day when we have to pay the piper."

An official architectural survey of the high school indicated that it would take more than \$2 million to bring it up to the condition it should be in, he pointed out.

Saying "I love my job," Nichols anticipated that his "honeymoon will end in the spring as two contracts will be up for renegotiation."

"I feel Northville will be particularly difficult as teachers will take the position that cost of living has outstripped learning power and the district will take the position that it can't afford larger settlements."

He concluded that he hopes the talks, although difficult, will not be acrimonious.

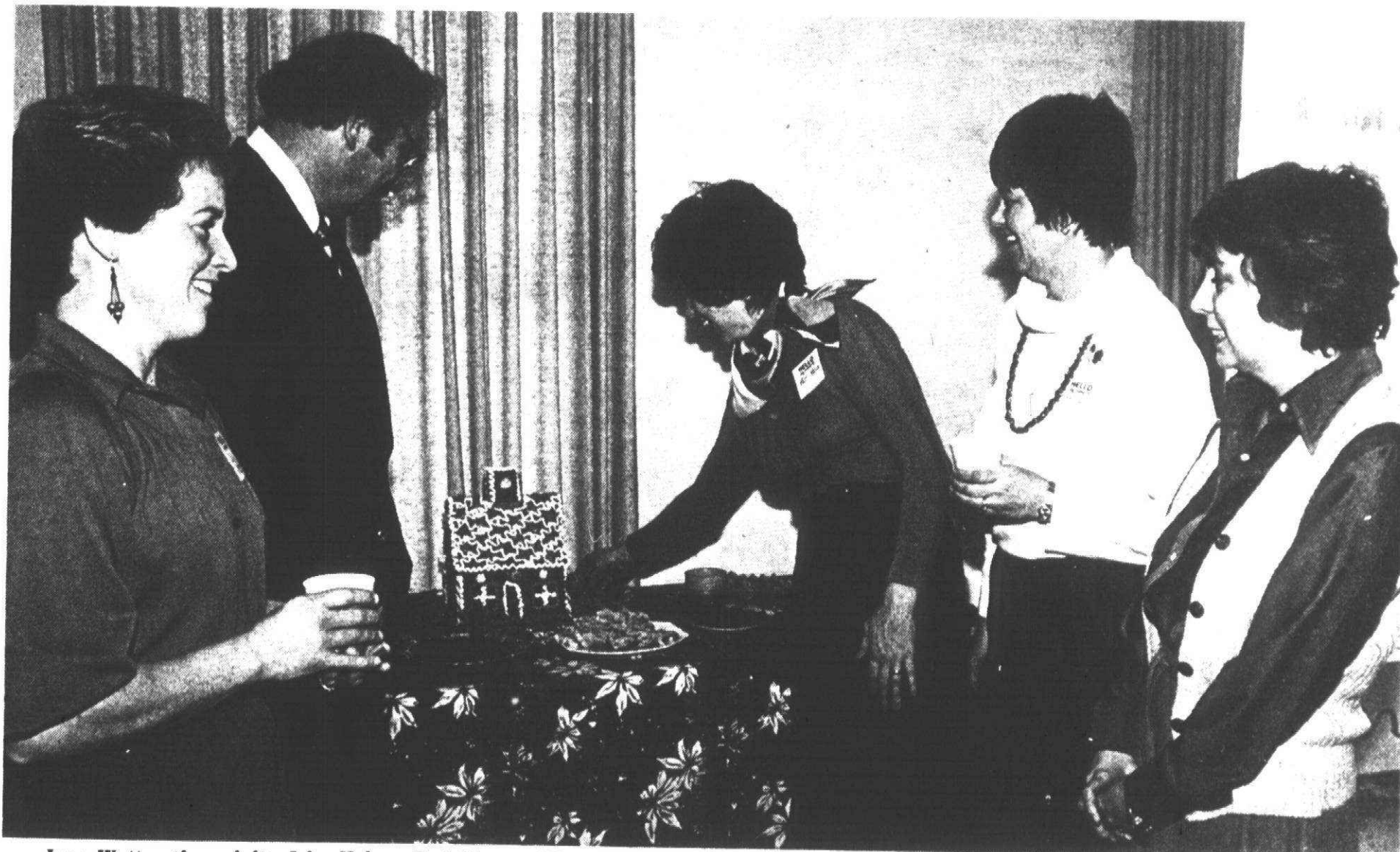
HOBEN REPORTED that his Plymouth Canton district now is the 14th largest in the state and "still moving up." He anticipated that the enroll-

ment of 16,125 would grow to 19,000 by 1982.

He termed this growth situation the district's more serious problem as capacity of its elementaries right now is exceeded even with six operating on an extended school year (ESY) program.

Two other elementaries have closed off enrollment, he continued, saying the district is "trying to find the point of growth to build for without being stuck with a white elephant in the future."

Possibility of a two-building school in which part can become a middle school "growing up with the community" and a cluster approach of portables around a core building as well as a high school annex in an industrial park which later might be sold for other purposes are among the explorations Hoben outlined.

For battered wives

Naming First Step director a big step

She seems too slight and soft-spoken to be shouldering such a large burden.

But as the newly-named director of First Step, Debbie Benjamin is highly committed to her work as the main public advocate of battered women in western Wayne County.

In her office at 32715 Dorsey, provided by the city of Westland, she is raring to go.

"My first step is to get money," she said. "My approach is a systems approach. I want to get as much of the community as possible involved in the development of First Step."

Right now she is tapping out a proposal asking for state funds, which

were recently made available, for services to domestic violence victims.

Look for her to show up in area city halls asking for a financial boost. She will also be making requests to business and labor groups for spare cash, as well as private foundations.

Make no mistake out it. First Step needs the money. Not one of your well-heeled clubs, it has made it through its first steps by the skin of its teeth and the energy and tenacity of a small band of dedicated volunteers.

It was they who appealed to the city of Westland for the money that would allow the organization to take its second step. When it received \$25,000 from Westland's community federal block grant funds, the first thing it did

was hire a director and apply for a phone.

WESTLAND HAS BEEN extremely supportive," said the new director, who comes to her new job with a master's degree in social work from the University of Michigan.

In the course of earning a degree she worked as an emergency health worker in Washtenaw County. It was a job that brought to her attention, in the most emotional ways, the problem of violence in the home.

"I talked to women on an emergency crisis line," she said. "I was overwhelmed by the number of domestic violence calls. When they phoned they were in a desperate situation.

They had just been beaten and wanted to know what to do."

"Most of them didn't have any resources. They had children and this complicated the situation. A single woman may be able to leave home and impose herself on a relative. But it is very difficult to bring her whole family. Most people can't feed and clothe another family."

In voices that sounded scared and lonely, the women seemed confused to the young woman on the receiving end of their calls.

"They were trapped in a situation where they were financially dependent on their spouse," she said.

"Some were women who had been brought up to believe deeply in the

marriage vows. To them this meant they would stay through thick and thin, even through severe beatings."

"THEIR SELF-ESTEEM was low because they had been beaten for years. To walk about after being beaten, a woman has to have money, job skills and self confidence. These women had come to think that the violence was their fault."

"Their assailant usually reinforces this by blaming her and telling her she got beaten for not making the dinner hot enough. Often it is for very trivial reasons."

"Hearing these stories got me inter-

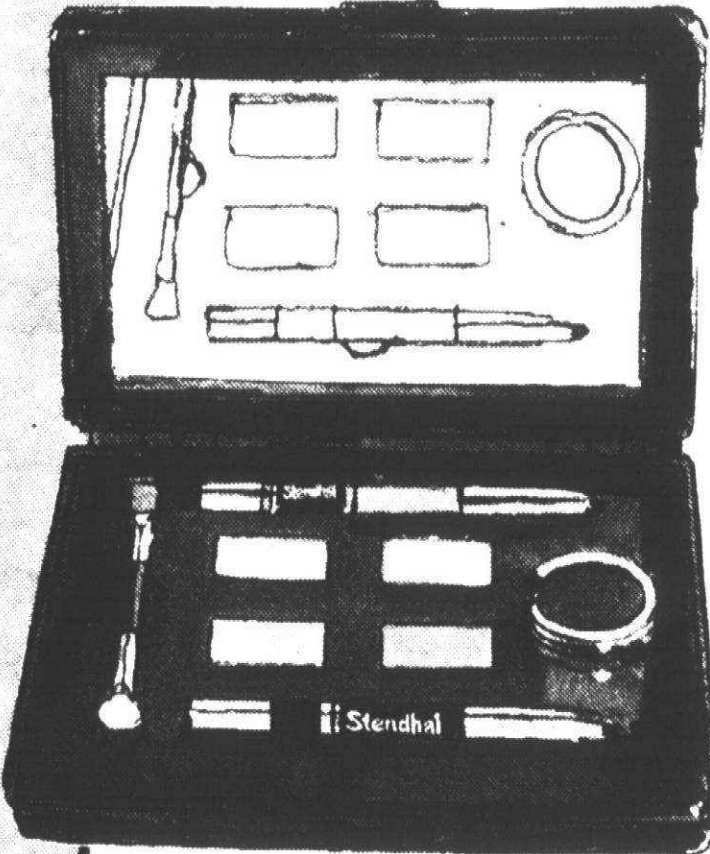



with handwork supplied by the teachers and teaching aides.

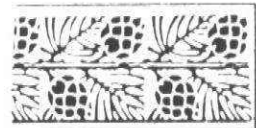
Articles in the antiques case range in age from 50 to more than 100 years.

Center staff to study deaf communication at Madonna

An agreement between Plymouth Center for Human Development and Madonna College in Livonia is making better communication possible between deaf residents and Center staff.

Thirty professional and non-professional staff are enrolled in a basic sign language course taught by Debbie Olsen, a center audiologist. Students who register for the course and successfully complete the 11 weeks are granted one semester hour of credit from Madonna College.

The course is built around a sign language manual entitled "Talk With Me." Its selection was based on several factors. Foremost was the fact that it is used by the Northville Public Schools institution special education program staff in their education programs with Plymouth Center deaf residents.

The manual, developed in 1973 by a group of teachers and personnel from California State institutions for developmentally disabled persons, was designed especially for multi-handicapped persons in state institutions.

The course is designed to establish a system of communication for the professional and direct care staff in dealing with the daily demands, desires and emotions of the multi-handicapped, hearing impaired, deaf individuals.

Content of the course seeks to establish a basic understanding of the development of language and forms of communication. A system of total communication, use of sign language, speech, lip reading, gestures, facial expression and body movements, is integral in the course design.

Progressive study of the "Talk With Me" manual is an essential component of the course. Those enrolled are required to master approximately 40 signs per week. Ms. Olsen gives a quiz each week, both verbally and in sign language.

Although those enrolled receive college credit the persons really benefiting are Plymouth Center residents.

Pastor's wife begins study for ordination

Mary Mowery Taylor has begun her journey toward ordination as a minister of the Church of the Brethren, and, in so doing, she is fulfilling a dream.

But she can't say for sure whether the dream began way back in her girlhood or came into being with the changes that the women's liberation movement brought.

Probably it's a little of both, thinks this daughter of a minister, wife of a minister and mother of three young children.

"I've trained for church work all my life," said Mrs. Taylor, who in a special service Nov. 19 in Trinity Church of the Brethren, Redford Township, was licensed to the ministry in that denomination.

"Because my father was a minister, I was always involved in church projects and teaching Sunday school. But until about five years ago I thought of church work in terms of being a minister's wife, or perhaps sometime a missionary. My 'enlightenment' in terms of thinking I might consider ordination came about five years ago as I saw women's roles changing."

MRS. TAYLOR'S husband, the Rev. Glen F. Taylor, is pastor of Trinity Church and has encouraged her move toward the sharing of his profession.

He was on hand when Lowell Cook of Middleton, Ohio, representing the Michigan District Commission on Ministry for the Church of the Brethren, did the official licensing.

Also present was Mrs. Taylor's father, the Rev. John Mowery of Newville, Pa., who isn't entirely sure that his daughter or any woman has a place in the pulpit.

In that position the older man, a retired pastor, represents the thinking of many people in the denomination, especially in the Pennsylvania area, according to Rev. Taylor. "But he came to the service," the couple was glad to report.

They also emphasized that members of the Redford Township church are most supportive of Mrs. Taylor's plans.

"At the tea they held for me afterwards, one woman was wondering why we had to say so much in the service about the role of women in the church," the new licensee said.

"She said it was obvious women

should enter the ministry and why talk about it," Mrs. Taylor added.

Rev. Taylor, however, thought the emphasis was needed, so he planned a service around a recounting of women's historical role in the church and his feeling that now is the time that role is becoming bigger.

"Just a century ago," he commented, "our denomination had before it a proposal for licensing women to preach and turned it down, giving as justification that it would cause them to leave their families."

THE LICENSE in the ministry is the first official step toward ordination for Mrs. Taylor, but in practice she has already begun the needed study.

A graduate of Elmhurst College in Illinois, where she majored in English and prepared to teach high school, she took several courses at Lancaster Theological Seminary while the Taylors were living in Pennsylvania. Her husband served an earlier pastorate there.

"At that time I was interested in seeing how I would like the study," she said. "I did, and since then I've been coming closer and closer to a decision to go toward ordination."

Currently she is enrolled in a study series offered by her denomination as an alternative to attending seminary. Called a reading course, it is a three-year program divided into 12 units, and completing it qualifies the candidate for full ordination.

Mrs. Taylor also is taking a course in homiletics at St. John Provincial Seminary in Plymouth. She is one of several Protestants enrolled in the studies not too long ago open only to Catholics.

THE TAYLORS are not quite sure what they hope to find at the end of her road to ordination.

"A team ministry is certainly a possibility sometime," said Rev. Taylor. "We know of one couple who share responsibilities of a church quite completely."

His wife sees other possibilities too.

"I would be interested in working as a chaplain in an institution, or in counseling," she said. "Perhaps counseling for women—I see that as a growing need in the church. Housewives home all day with their children need a spiritual dimension to their lives. Women

who see their lives changing often need help in adjusting."

There also is a frequent need for supply ministers on a fill-in basis, and now that she is licensed Mrs. Taylor is qualified to do that.

She has had some practice in preaching. "As part of my homiletics

course, I had to do a series of short sermons," she said, "so we tried something rather interesting."

"For six weeks, Glen picked the scripture each week, and we both preached on that passage, without comparing notes. It was interesting to see the different perspectives we gave to the same biblical passage."

Mormon Choir sings in area

Its spring concert this year was held at Orchestra Hall in Detroit, and the \$7,500 proceeds were donated to the committee working on restoration of the famous hall.

field Hills Stake Center, 425 N. Woodward.

Its program includes "Unto Us a Child Is Born" and the "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's "Messiah," many familiar Christmas carols and three new works by Latter-day Saint composers.

The latter numbers are "Soft, Soft," by A. Lawrence Lyons; "Christmas Jubilation," by John T. Longhurst, and "Christmas Bells Are Ringing" by Robert P. Mannookin.

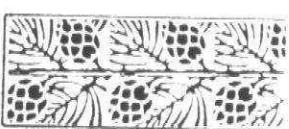
Girl Scouts sell calendars

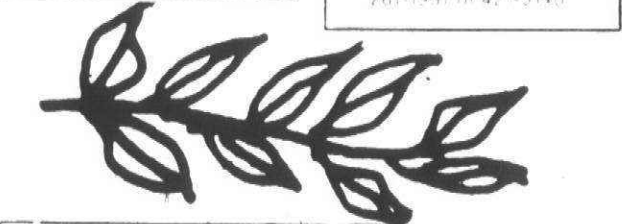

 ested in this issue."

In her new position, Ms. Benjamin hopes to work some counseling into her First Step, doubtless making use of the skills she used as a crisis line worker.

"I was trained to help them start to think about making some decisions," she explained. "I didn't see my role as telling them what to do. We were supposed to help them explore the situation and figure out what their resources are."

"I believe victims often feel anger, but they can't accept their anger because of what it means to accept it. What it means is that they will have to do something about their situation. That's threatening to their whole life style."

MS. BENJAMIN, who resides in Dearborn, sees consciousness raising as another vital activity for First Step. Planning to assume the role of an educator on the subject of domestic violence, she hopes to be invited to speak to area students and organizations, both male and female.

"I see education as a critical part of our program," she said. "We should have a component geared to changing the attitude of the community on spouse abuse."

She also hopes to establish a working relationship with area police forces.

"When a domestic assault occurs, the police are often those called in first," she said. "We want to work with them, to be able to call on them for help. And we would like to be able to help them. From what I gather the Westland police department has been very supportive."

Like most directors of young, struggling groups, she has a dream. The Benjamin fantasy for the future of First Step includes a 24-hour crisis phone service, plus out-reach help in the form of trained volunteers who would go to the home of a beaten spouse.

"I'd also like First Step to provide non-crisis support such as counseling and relocation, plus advocacy before law enforcement officials and social service agencies," she said.

She added: "We're talking about dreams, right?"

Then she named the biggest dream of all for those who work with battered women.

"It would be wonderful to have a shelter," she said. "One that would provide a three or four-week refuge and supportive services for abused individuals. a place to be safe until

Lathrup puts 1st dent into Canton cage record

Southfield-Lathrup's aggressive man-to-man defense was the ingredient that finally stopped Plymouth Canton's scoring machine. The Chargers ended the Chiefs' modest three-game win streak with a hard-fought 60-54 boys basketball victory Tuesday night.

It was a rude greeting for Canton's rookie coach Craig Bell and his team, which scored at least 75 points in its first three games at home.

But things were different at Lathrup, as the Chiefs managed to hit on only 18 of 64 shots from the floor (29

per cent) for their first loss of the year.

Lathrup, coached by Jim Kourtakis, never allowed the taller Canton squad to penetrate on offense en route to its second victory in three games this season.

"I was pleased with our defense. Our kids did a nice job," said the Lathrup coach. "We knew Canton had a good shooting ball club, but we thought if we got our hands up we'd be okay."

"If we had made our free throws, we'd have won going away."

"I was extremely pleased. It was a good team effort. It was a good win for us."

Bell felt badly about his squad's first loss but stressed the importance of regrouping against Western Six League opponent Farmington Harrison Friday night.

"We just couldn't get into the flow of our offense," Bell said. "We played a team which was very aggressive."

"They played hard, and I think our kids played hard. We had some breakdowns and couldn't come back and establish tempo."

Karl Taylor led Lathrup's scoring with 21 points. He was followed by Karl Akerman with 13 and Ron Gold with 10. Phil Kontry added eight.

Center Jack Dakesian gave an all-

around effort with his eight points, 17 rebounds and seven blocked shots. The Chargers, who face Royal Oak Dondero Friday night at home, shot 23 of 51 from the floor for 45 per cent. They made only 14 of 27 free throws, however, for 48 per cent.

Canton was led by senior guard Butch King, who converted on eight free throws without a miss en route to 18 points. But he shot only five of 17 from the floor.

Mike Gollnick netted nine points, while Rusty Mandle and Mike Leary added eight each. Junior forward Dave Visser injured an ankle in the second quarter and sat out the rest of

the game. He did not score in the contest.

The Chargers took command from the start, demonstrating a lot of patience on offense. They rolled to a 15-12 first-quarter lead and raised this advantage to 10 points, 36-26, at halftime.

Lathrup had trouble adjusting to Canton's half-court trap defense in the third period, as the Chiefs closed to within three points, 41-38. Lathrup scored the last eight points of the quarter, though, to maintain the upper hand. Canton, once again, pulled to

within two points with 1:12 left in the game but couldn't overcome the Charger advantage.

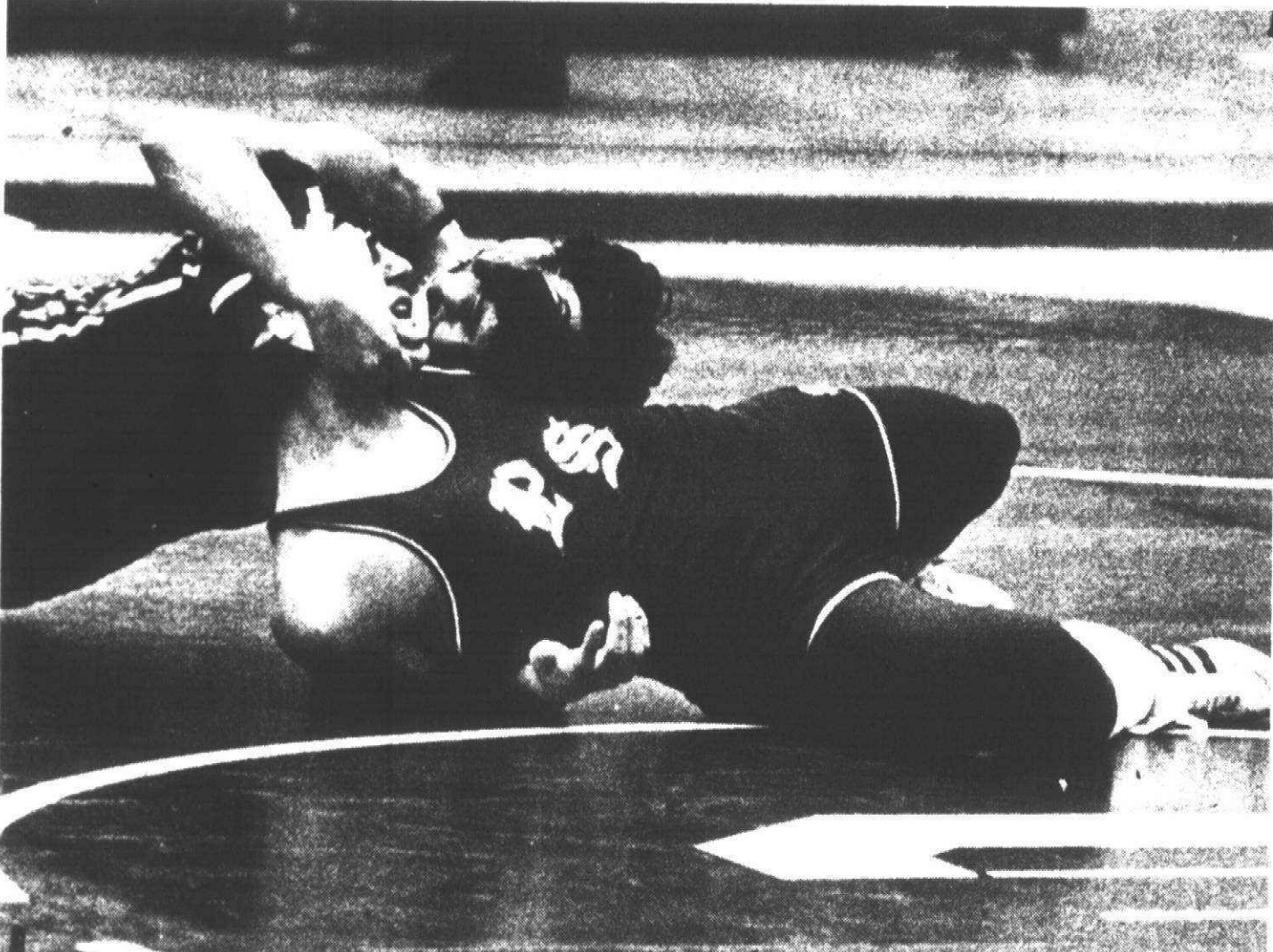

Canton tankers impressive against Ypsilanti, 111-61

It was only the second dual meet for Plymouth Canton's swim team, but one had to be impressed with the Chiefs' resounding 111-61 victory over Ypsilanti Tuesday night.

The Chiefs, coach by Bill Faunce, won eight of 11 events for the easy victory. It marked the ninth straight dual meet triumph for Canton, spanning the last two seasons.

The Chiefs, 2-0 this year, also finished third at the Redford Union Relays last Saturday, one point ahead of fourth-place Plymouth Salem.

"Ypsilanti is not a bad team but we were stronger," said Faunce. "We swam well throughout the lineup. This goes down as a satisfying win for us."

Faunce said he expected a slight let-down from his squad, especially after swimming three meets in the last five days. The Canton coach said his squad

The Chiefs featured a full lineup throughout the meet en route to the 50-point victory. They lost only the 200-yard freestyle, the 500-yard freestyle and 200-yard individual medley races.

Petersen, a junior, was a double winner in the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard butterfly. He set a school record in the 50-free, swimming the sprint in :23.2 to break the old record

held by his brother Glenn, a 1975 graduate. Petersen's qualified for the state meet in the fly with a :54.6 clocking.

Simrak set two new freshman records with a first-place time of 1:05.7 in the 100-yard backstroke and a second-place clocking in the 200-yard individual medley.

Dave Tanner won the 100-yard freestyle sprint in :51.0. Troy Harla placed second in the 500-yard freestyle distance race in 5:40.0.

"We didn't have one disqualification and I think that's important, too. We worked on the basics and that helped. If you go out and disqualify yourself, then you get yourself in trouble."

"Just about every boy we took over there except four brand new ones fig-

ured in the scoring," Wright continued. "That was nice."

Churchill surprised several observers at the meet by winning the 200-yard backstroke relay. The team of Mike Stetz, Steve Bramble, Jay McCarthy and Brett Comstock turned the trick with a time of 1:57.8.

Canton won two events.

Vince Tobin, Ron Hurley, Mike Gaab and Paul Petersen set the pace in the 200-yard butterfly relay with an effort of 1:44.9 and Dave Tanner, Bob Cline, Hurley and ?Petersen claimed victory in the 400-yard individual medley relay with a swim of 3:58.4.

Host Thurston edges Rocks to take tourney

A strong finish—victories in the last four weight classes—enabled Redford Thurston to win the championship of its own wrestling invitational last weekend for the third time in as many years.

Eagle matmen finished first in seven of the 13 weight divisions. Plymouth Salem, which battled Thurston right down to the wire only to place second overall, won four individual titles and finished second in four other classes.

Chuck Merrucci, 98 pounds, pinned Salem's Jim Schultz and Tom Arsenault decided Jeff Dunson, from Salem, at 105 pounds to get the Eagles off to a good start in the championship matches.

However, Salem grapplers took titles in the next four weight classes. Jeff Brown, 112 pounds, and Randy Viperman, 119, each decided their opponents, while Mark Ross, 126, and Jeff White, 132, pinned their foes.

Thurston's Jerry Valchine broke that string with a win by decision at 138 pounds and the Eagles scored a string of convincing victories, started by Darrel Dodier at 165 pounds, down the stretch to edge the Rocks for the team title.

Mark Erickson, 178 pounds, John Valchine, 191, Bob Cutsinger, heavy-weight, and Merrucci pinned all three

of their opponents during the competition.

Tim Detowski, from Clarkston, champion at 155 pounds, was voted the outstanding wrestler of the meet.

Livonia Churchill, which placed fifth in the eight-team field, was led by Brad Sharpe, who finished second at 132 pounds.

Redford Bishop Borgess, which landed sixth, had five wrestlers finish in fourth place. They were Dave Chiola, 98 pounds; Mike Butler, 105; Paul Van Zandt, 132; Paul Malinowski, 155; and Dan Van Sickle, 178.

Redford Union, which placed behind Borgess, was led by Tim Fiero, who finished third at 145 pounds.

Ron Rothley, who placed third at 105 pounds, was the best finisher for Bentley, which ended up eighth in the team standings.

"We're coming along good, but it's too early to tell yet," said first-year Thurston coach Sal Marsalese. "From 155 pounds and up, we came back strong."

"Merrucci had a nice fall (pin). He was down 5-2 in the third period (of the championship) then had a pin at 5:18."

"(John) Valchine is now 7-0 for the season. At the invitational, he had his sixth pin in seven matches," said Marsalese.

"We did fantastic but, once again, Thurston did it," said Plymouth Salem coach Ron Krueger. "But it was a lot closer this time."

The Rocks placed second to the Eagles last year, but it was a 30-point spread in 1977. This season, Salem made Thurston sweat a little harder before the outcome.

"We were ahead going into the last three matches, but lost it," the Salem mentor said. "We blew a couple matches and paid for it."

"We placed all our kids. We had five

champions, and usually in a tournament you can win with five. But there was no overall balance in the tournament."

"It wasn't really a strong tournament, but it was good experience. We did better than last year and we're still improving."

HIGHLIGHTS

The power quotients give Nebraska the number three position in the country over fourth-ranked Oklahoma, but our hunch is that the Sooners, bent on revenge for the 17-14 loss to the Cornhuskers in November, will beat Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. If six turnovers, Oklahoma's total against Nebraska in their earlier contest, occur again, forget it! If not, the Sooners will win by four points.

In the national championship Sugar Bowl clash between Penn State and Alabama, there's so little difference it's difficult to pick a winner. The Nittany Lions sailed through the first half of the season, the forecasting average came on strong the past few weeks and finished at a respectable 747. We picked the results of 2,253 football games...guessed right on 1,853, flopped on 560, and there were 40 ties.

The biggest surprise that resulted from calculating the final conference ratings for 1978 was the drop of the Southeast Conference from 2nd place to fourth. And the Atlantic Coast Conference climbed another notch this year, edging the Big Ten for fifth. Ratings for football conferences are based on each league's power quotient average determined from the ratings of all teams in every conference. Of more than 65 football conferences, here are the twenty strongest in the nation:

SEMCOG director Glusac is 'getting mad'

The boss says you have a job to do. The boss says you have 18 months to do it in. The boss says you will be fined if you don't get it done in 18 months because that's the law. The boss won't give you the tools to do the job. You get mad. The boss, in this case, is U.S. Department of Transportation. The worker is the Southeast Michigan

Council of Governments. The job is to draft an air quality plan for "mobile source pollution," i.e., car and truck exhaust. The tools are \$20,000 for work already done and another \$75,000 for the first six months of 1980. So far hasn't supplied the tools. "I'VE BEEN getting a sympathetic

ear from bureaucrats for months. I have a sore ear," SEMCOG Executive Director Michael Glusac told the general assembly last week. "I'm getting mad. We don't have taxing power. We don't seek it. We need some local officials to stand up and secure Sec. 175 planning funds," said Glusac, urging them to write to state and federal agencies and key

congressmen. Glusac's withering attack on the lack of federal funding, after commitments had been made, drew a warm ovation from SEMCOG delegates, officials of 134 member governments. **THE BACKGROUND** is this: Congress in 1977 amended the 1970 Clean Air Act to establish revised air

quality standards. The standards must be attained in 1982, in some cases, and 1987 in others. SEMCOG last February sought and received designation as the areawide air quality planning agency. Because SEMCOG has no local tax funds, it sought a waiver of a provision that it provide local matching funds for the study. Then, as Glusac described it:

"Our appeals for assistance to do air quality planning did result in an EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) commitment of \$20,000 to prepare our initial SIP (state implementation plan) submittal which was effectively a plan of 'attack' for pursuing air quality work. "The \$20,000 commitment, made this past July, has yet to be honored and apparently will not be for two to three months. As of the end of 1978 calendar year, the council (SEMCOG) will spend all of the committed funds and will have to find additional funds if air quality planning is to continue."

SEMCOG SOUGHT EPA funds recently appropriated by Congress. Meanwhile, administrative agencies must write rules on how the funds are to be distributed, according to SEMCOG Chairman David Shepherd, mayor of Oak Park.

"They're involved in a ponderous rule-making process. And Congress wants a veto power on rule-making," Shepherd said.

A memo from Valdas V. Adamkus, acting regional administrator of EPAK, SAID THERE ARE "automatic penalties if the required plan is not submitted or approved."

Will Hardy, Wayne County delegate to SEMCOG, said southeast Michigan isn't the only region with a problem. "All regional councils are in the same boat," Hardy said.

Congressional Record fascinated 14-year-old

(Part II—conclusion)

"I was only 14 at the time," says Carl Pursell, recalling the day his father took him to Washington to meet Rep. George Dondero, "but for some reason, Dondero put me on his mailing list to receive the Congressional Record."

"From that age on, I read every word in the Record. It was years later before I learned that everything put into the Record is not delivered as a speech."

Pursell began to attend meetings of the Plymouth City Commission in the 1940s, when he was in his teens. He recalls the most interesting sessions were those in 1949 when Commissioner Ruth Huston Whipple was at loggerheads with the four male commissioners, who were recalled in a special election held that year.

In 1952, Pursell organized a young Republican group at Eastern Michigan University. In 1962, he was active in the Romney for governor movement. In 1964, he became chairman of the Republican Party in Plymouth. In 1966 he ran for the state senate, losing by only 600 votes.

Pursell served on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, 1969-70. This gave him an opportunity to work with Detroit, county and state officials, and brought him to the attention of the Detroit press. He was a member of the Michigan Senate, 1971-76, where he served on the State Appropriations Committee. While a state senator, he was responsible for six reform bills, all of which were signed into law by the governor. In 1972, the Michigan press corps named Pursell the outstanding first term senator.

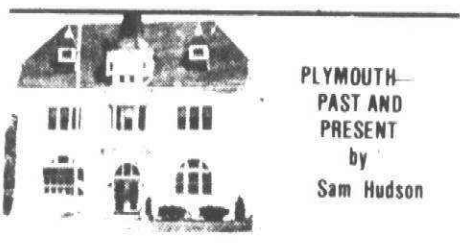
PURSELL'S PREDECESSOR, E.J. Penniman, put Plymouth on the national map in 1850 when he was elected to the U.S. Congress on the Whig ticket.

In those days, Plymouth was the only town in Wayne County in which a majority of the inhabitants were Whigs.

Penniman was 45 the year he was elected to serve in the 32d Congress, the first resident of Plymouth to achieve that office. He arrived in Washington at a time when the issue of slavery was dividing the nation, and the controversial fugitive slave law was causing much dissension. Before Penniman's term ended, Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" would help to arouse anti-slavery sentiment.

The Whig Party, prominent from 1824 to 1854, sought to overcome the disrupting influence of the slavery issue. Most Whigs did not approve of the propaganda of the abolitionists on the ground that it tended to endanger the Union.

But Penniman's personal views on the slavery issue were quite evident in 1854. In July of that year, after the Whig Party had begun to disintegrate, the first state-wide convention of the Republican Party was held "under the oaks" in Jackson, Mich. The newly-formed party had issued a welcome to

all those who favored repeal of the Fugitive Slave Law and who opposed the extension of slavery. E.J. Penniman was prominent among the participants.

In November 1976, 126 years after Penniman was elected to Congress, Carl Pursell became the second Plymouth resident to achieve that office when he was elected, on the Republican ticket, to the 95th Congress. On assuming his seat, he was assigned to two committees, one on education and labor and the other on science and technology.

IN 1850, when Penniman reached Congress, the population of the United States was less than 24 million.

A period of business expansion had begun. There was a large surplus in the national treasury. Aside from the specter of slavery, things looked good. By contrast, when Pursell reached Congress, the U.S. population was 200 million. There was a deficit of \$58 billion in the national budget. Slavery is a thing of the past, but blacks and whites alike are disturbed by the specter of inflation. And many economists are forecasting a business recession and further unemployment.

Pursell's goals as a congressman include the development of programs to help the academically talented, and the development of laser fusion for civilian uses. Laser fusion is now classified solely for military purposes. Pursell wants to see it put to use for such non-military purposes as the production of electricity.

He is pleased to be the first U.S. congressman ever to be invited to speak to the International World Forum on Scientific Development. He delivered a paper at the conference at Fort Lauderdale on Nov. 26. "Seven Nobel prize winners were present," he observed proudly.

PENNIMAN SERVED only one term in Congress.

He was not a candidate for renomination, returning to Plymouth where he resumed his retail business in partnership with Austin and Fralick. In 1871, he sold his interest to them. In that year, at age 67, he was instrumental in organizing the First National Bank in Plymouth. He was its president until his death 19 years later.

At one time, the bank's officers were in back of Roswell Root's Drug Store on Main Street; at another, in the rear of Goldstein's department store. On Christmas mornings, Penniman would sit in the bank and give a silver quarter to every child who came in to wish him a merry Christmas.

After living in Plymouth half a century, Penniman died April 12, 1890, at age 86. He is buried in Riverside Cemetery.

Pursell, who was pleased to follow his predecessor's footsteps to the nation's capital, has no intention of emulating Penniman in the matter of tenure. He does not plan to be a one-term congressman. In fact, he was elected to a second term in the November 1978 election.

Pursell has maintained his home in Plymouth, returning every weekend to be with his family and to keep in touch with his constituents. He notes that he is the only one of Michigan's 19 Congressmen who lives in his congressional district.

SEMCOG seeks middle of growth debate

Pretend the housing growth policy of southeast Michigan is like a superhighway.

The inside lane is for a freeze on growth. The outside lane is for unrestricted gobbling up of vacant land.

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments is planning to travel the second lane. That assessment comes from James McCartney, a Wayne County Community College trustee, former county commissioner and a resident of still-developing Westland.

In SEMCOG circles, McCartney is chairman of the Council on Regional Development (CORD). For several months, he has been chairing hot meetings as local officials debate which lane to travel to the year 2000.

LAST WEEK, SEMCOG's General Assembly picked a lane called "Local Plans, Modified by Adopted SEMCOG policies."

"We're in the middle, leaning toward preservation and conservation," said McCartney after the vote.

The modifications in favor of preservation on existing facilities and conservation of vacant land were necessary, he said in an interview, because "local plans look only at the community with no concern for the outside."

SEMOG, a six-county regional planning agency, is in the process of making what it calls "small area forecasts." These are attempts to figure out how many people, households and

jobs areas in the region will have in the future. SEMCOG's forecasts will influence the flow of federal aid for such facilities as sewers, water, transportation networks and parks.

THE DECISION to travel the "Local Plans, Modified" lane came on a voice vote with about a 3-1 margin in the general assembly.

Oakland County Commissioner Robert Page (R-Birmingham) noted that Troy, which is part of his district, objected to the plan because it assigned a capacity of eight dwelling units to an acre of vacant sewered land. Troy figures two units per acre, Page said.

But SEMCOG staffer William Duddleson, who handles data and analytical methods, replied that a "conservation" land policy should provide for eight units per acre.

Issues I like that occupied CORD in its 30 or more meetings this year, McCartney said. "No one is ever completely satisfied. We could probably work on this policy forever," he said.

The final policy won't be adopted until mid-1980. What SEMCOG's action last week does is to select one lane for SEMCOG to travel in making small area forecasts.

WHAT DOES the "Local Plans, Modified" lane mean to the growth of the region? Here is SEMCOG's own summary:

- Land use—"SEMOG encourages local governments to implement their current land use plans and policies within the proposed sewer service area adopted by the Council (SEMOG). The Council discourages all major commercial, institutional, and industrial development on unsewered areas within the region, and discourages development on agricultural and environmentally sensitive lands that will remain unsewered through the year 2000."

- Redevelopment—"SEMOG encourages local governments to implement their current plans for redevelopment."
- Sewer service—"SEMOG supports the provision of sewer service to areas designated to be served on the 1990 Sewer Service Area Plan Map adopted by the council, and the likely Water Quality Problems Map, whether or not this service conforms to local plans." The significance is that local plans often show more areas receiving sewers than SEMCOG shows.

- Protection of fragile land resources—"SEMOG supports the

prohibition of development on all flood plains and wetlands. The Council also supports the protection of as much unsewered agricultural and environmentally sensitive land as possible."

- Transportation—"The assumed

highway improvements in the I-696, M-53 and M-21 corridors as well as transit improvements in the Gratiot, Woodward and Michigan corridors and expanded background service would be considered in Transportation Plan updates."

Last year, the symphony hosted the Savoyards in "The Mikado." This year's presentation was made possible with the help of the Michigan Council of the Arts, the Plymouth Symphony League and the First National Bank of Plymouth.

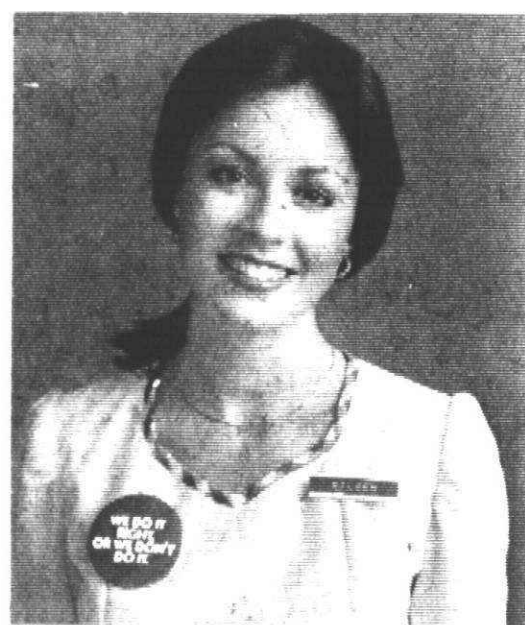

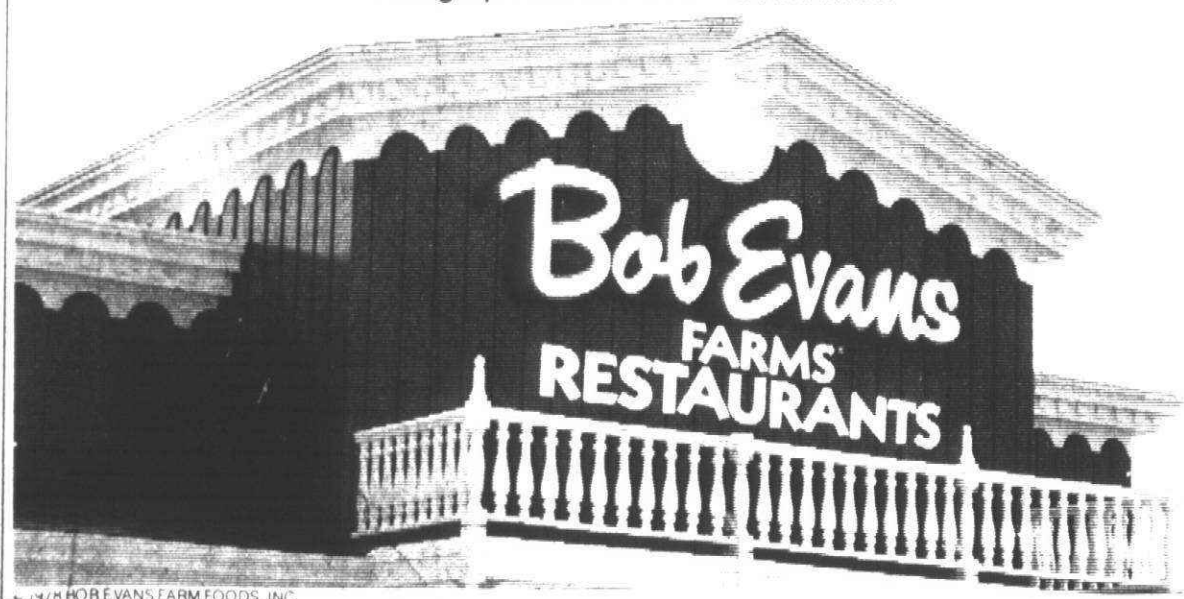

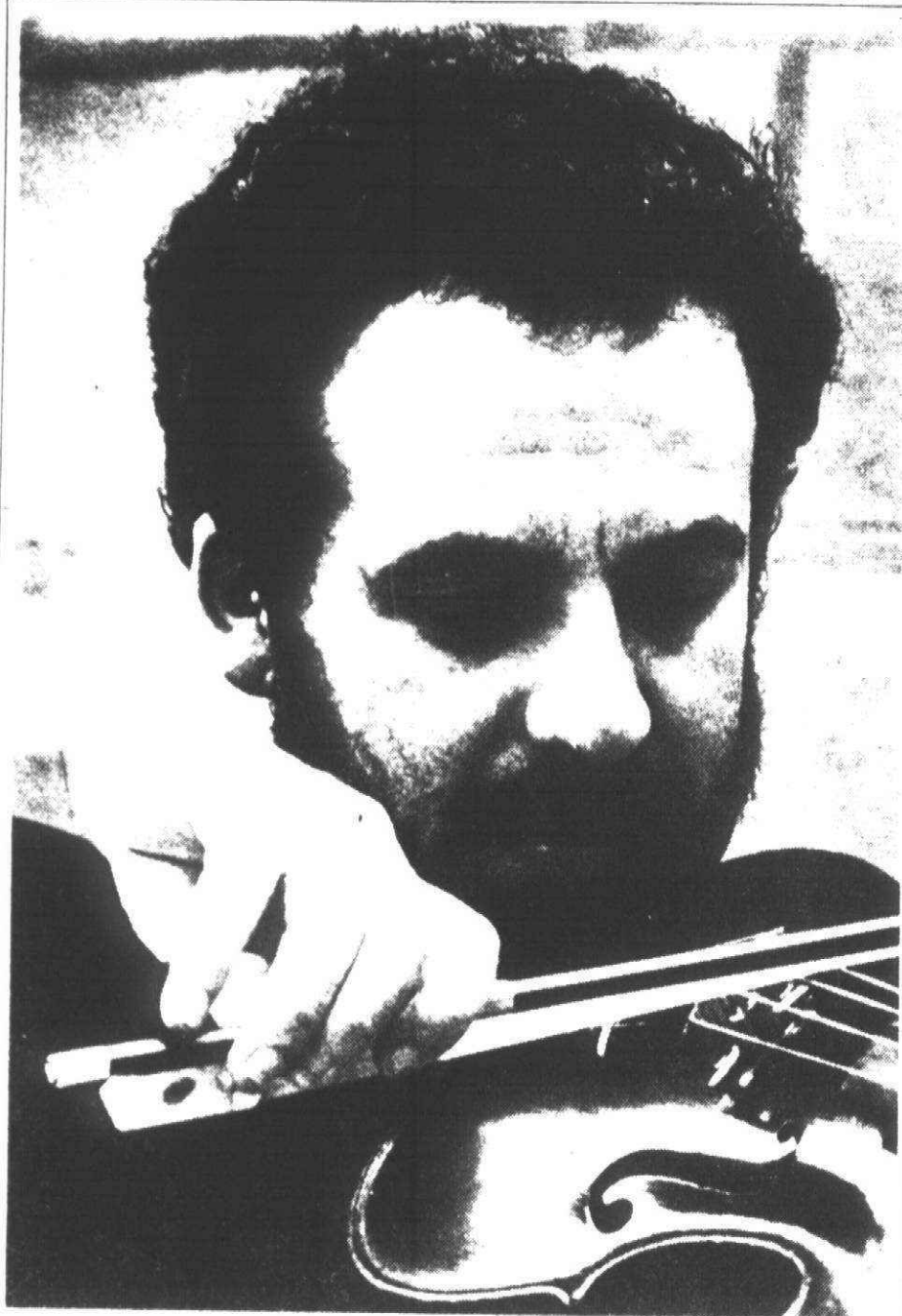

Detroit Science Center displays laser system

With the high cost of lumber even the most basic household job can seem an expensive undertaking.

So how can the consumer, builder and handyman be assured of quality? Bendix Research Laboratories, in collaboration with American Forest Products Corp., has developed a computerized, laser inspection system, aimed at obtaining the maximum useful wood products from harvested timber.

A model of the system is on the Exhibit Floor at the Detroit Science Center, 5020 John R, Detroit.

The new display shows how a low intensity laser beam, in conjunction with precision optical components, scans each piece of wood for defects.

A computer interprets the scanner data and performs high speed calculations and decisions to select the best positions for removing board defects. A completely automatic saw makes cross cuts based on the computer's directions.

The system on display has been field-tested and demonstrated the potential savings it could provide. It is being installed at Martel, Calif., where it will be used in the manufacturing of moulding.

You can also find out more about laser beams in conjunction with holograms at the Detroit Science Center. For further information call 833-1892. Open seven days a week.

Campers in winter like private parks

Winter campers are expected to give state-run campgrounds the cold shoulder and use private parks in record numbers again this season, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Luxuries such as heated shower and toilet buildings, plus open park stores and game rooms were the attractions that lured winter campers away from state parks and to private campgrounds," said Joseph Ratke, auto club touring manager.

"Most private parks responding to an auto club survey reported an average 16 per cent more business last winter compared to the previous season," Ratke said, "while state park campgrounds open last winter registered a 24 per cent drop in campers over the same period."

This season, winter campers can select from 109 private and 56 state parks.

State park campgrounds offer only at-site electricity and water from central wells. Only a limited number of campsites and park roads are kept plowed.

"Most of the new business at private campgrounds last winter was cross-country skiers and snowmobilers," Ratke said. "This fall, many private park owners are making an effort to coax those customers back."

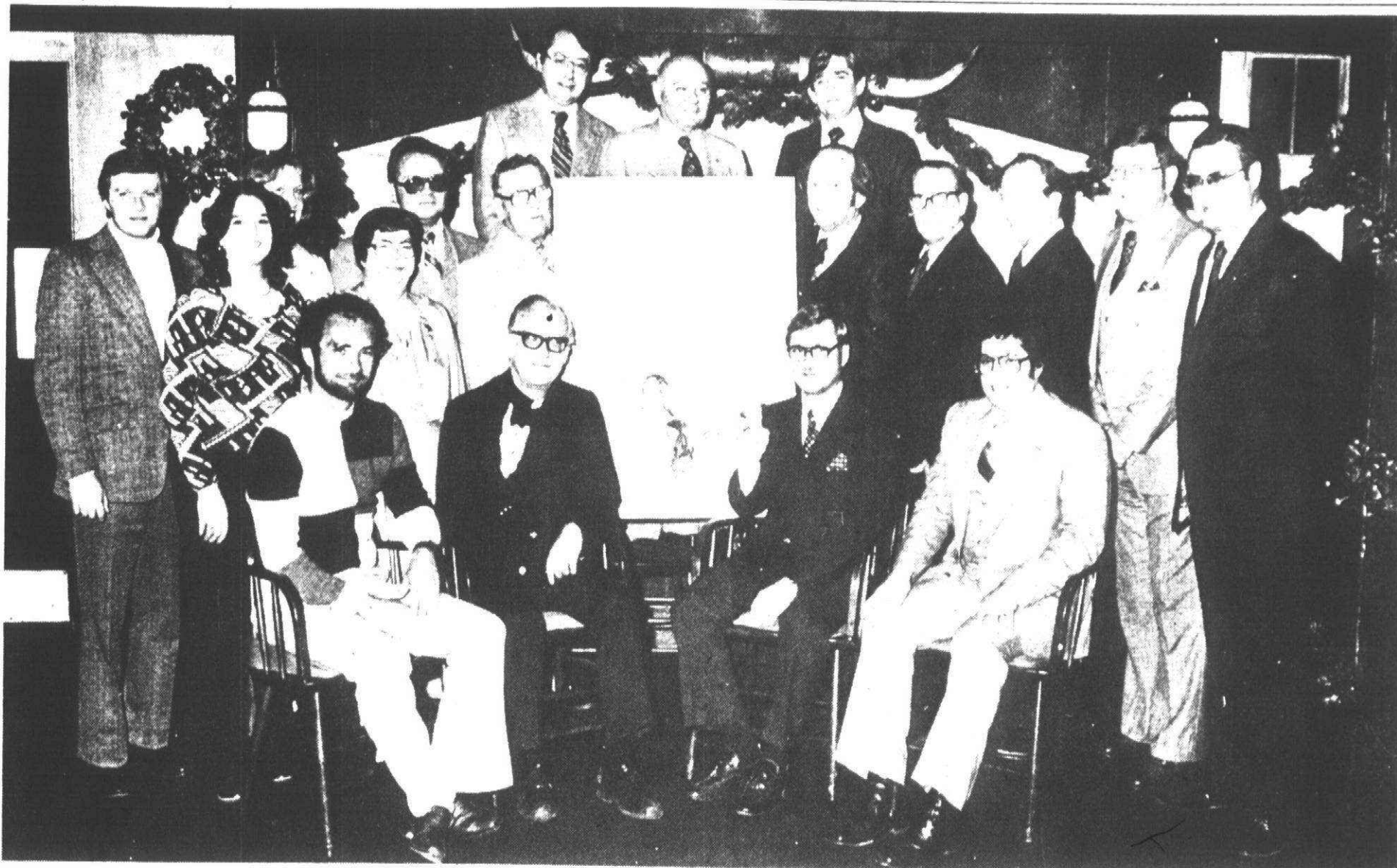
Thirty-three of the winterized private facilities on the auto club's 1978-79 guide list are adjacent to groomed snowmobile or cross-country ski trails in state and national forests and two sell and service snowmobiles.

"Six parks have instituted guided snowmobile safaris on weekends and one near Copper Harbor in the Upper Peninsula sponsors snowmobile obstacle course races with cash prizes for best times," Ratke noted.

Cross-country skiers can rent equipment at five parks and enter an 11-mile-long race or participate in family oriented courses and programs at two others. Skiers at a private park near Gaylord can choose between in-park downhill or cross-country programs.

Private parks on auto club's guide charge an average \$5.40 nightly for sites with electricity, which are available at 103 campgrounds listed. Prices range from \$1 to \$10. State parks listed charge \$4 per night for a site with electricity and \$2 for a primitive site. In addition, campers must purchase a \$5 annual or \$1 daily use permit.

While shower buildings at state parks are closed, heated shower buildings are open at 81 private parks and game rooms are available at 41. There are 26 parks with at-site sewage and 66 with disposal stations. Forty-nine parks keep stores open all year.

Shop around for processors

When shopping for a food processor, consumers should look for one that is easy to assemble, says Janet Noorheis, Oakland County extension home economist.

Assembly involves locking a bowl to a base, inserting a blade, then placing a lid on the bowl. In most cases, twisting the lid in one direction activates the blades; twisting it the other way stops the blade action.

Ideally, a food processor should be able to mix, slice, chop, grind, pulverize, shred and knead both hard and soft foods.

The food processor bowl should be transparent for you to see what is happening, she added. For easy cleaning, the bowl should be dishwasherproof.

Handle the appliance's blades with care and keep the machine out of reach of children. As a safety precaution, most models have a locking lid that keeps fingers out while the machine is operating.

Another safety feature found on most food processors is an automatic overload device that stops the motor if it overheats, preventing damage to the equipment.

Renew your medical skills

Emergency medical technicians can renew their skills in a basic refresher course at Madonna College in Livonia. Two sections will aim to provide a better understanding of the continuing role of emergency medical technology. They will take place Mondays and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Section one will meet Jan. 8, 12, 22 and 26 and section two, Jan. 15, 19, 29 and Feb. 2.

The course follows the Michigan Department of Public Health guidelines and may be taken for \$60.

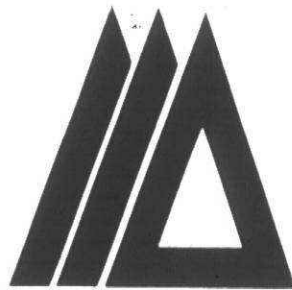

Paradise...

5,000 miles and 60 degrees away

The setting sun at dusk and a gentle island breeze outline the horizon of waving sugarcane that quickly dispels winter tourist cares as the 80-degree temperatures of Hawaii breathe a welcome.



When 101 travelers headed for Hawaii on the recent Observer & Eccentric tour, reporter-photographer Lynn Orr went along. She made the side trips, tried the beaches, ate native dishes and studied historic landmarks, taking notes and pictures as she went. Here is her first report on the adventure—a day-by-day journal.

THURSDAY, Nov. 16: The first "Aloha" to be repeated numerous in the next two weeks, greets our ears before we leave in the 747 bound for Honolulu.

"The Buddy Holly Story" on the mini movie screen helps to pass a tedious time for some, while a lot of action at the bar works its liquid charms. Travel anxieties apparent, though, witnessed by the long lines at the too few lavatories and the studious attention paid the flight attendants' survival routine.

Louise Leasure, a 70-year-old Plymouth Township resident, making her maiden voyage takes it all in stride, however. After a 7½ hour flight and applause for the pilot when we land smoothly, we're welcomed with slightly wilted leis and a glorious warm sun that's the best Aloha yet.

We meet Dennis, our protector and tour guide to the exotic, whose looks make many of Hawaii's other scenic sites anti-climatic. Then it's on to our first of many buses as we make our way through the industrial section of Honolulu to the Hilton Hawaiian Village. The palm trees appear strangely out of place next to warehouses, but Waikiki beckons with acres of bouganvillea.

Hurray! A sliver of ocean glints as we keep to tradition and check out the balcony where we're rewarded with our first waft of salty air.

FRIDAY, Nov. 17: At the 9:30 a.m. briefing, "Hawaii Five-O" drop-out Al Harrington cautions the Michigan arrivals to slow down. "Just hang loose" is the axiom here. A trip to the garment factory supplies the necessities. Within hours, suits, ties and girdles are abandoned for neon orange and purple matching muumuu and shirts. Are these the same people who scorned matching Madras on teenage lovebirds in the '60s?

"Smile, 'cause you're not going home till the plane leaves," Harrington had warned.

First disappointment. A two-hour afternoon bus ride around the city nets a mediocre guide for those on the second bus. "Here's your McDonald's, here's your Kentucky Fried Chicken," he tells the riders eager to hear about the exploits of King Kamehameha and his 23 wives.

We whisk by the only palace on American soil with barely enough time to snap a picture.

Those on the first bus had a great guide, we hear later. Punchbowl Crater, with its awesome vista of acres of graves and the lookout at the crater rim of Honolulu, is worth the trip. The first Polynesian dinner-dance show that night brings cheers.

SATURDAY, Nov. 18: First trip to the beach. Yes, hose are Mai-tais being sipped around the nearby pools. Mug faces receive the rumor that the first snow fell at home.

A trip to the International Market Place catches a woman in bikini and hair curlers crossing the main drag in Waikiki, while a walk down Kuhio verifies Hawaii's sewer problems. Shopping bags bulge as our people drift back to the hotel at dusk. It's still a surprise when the sun goes down in 80 degree weather.

At the Follies Polynesian show that evening, Kimberly Brewer of Plymouth Township, traveling with her grandmother, celebrates her 17th birthday and nearly gets carried away by two burly Islanders. Vacation settles in.

SUNDAY, Nov. 19: Up early for the Pearl Harbor cruise. The Royal Prince carries many of us and a lot of Japanese tourists, cameras on everyone, to the military port.

Narration is in both English and Japanese. An English-speaking tour guide confirms that the story is slightly different for the Japanese on board.

"Not quite so patriotic," she says. Beneath the white concrete memorial, the clear water barely covers the sunken USS Arizona, which sank in five minutes with more than 1,000 men, representing 49 states, on board. Pictures of the smoke-filled harbor 37 years ago and the narrator's quiet voice creates a hush as cameras click and a few eyes moisten.

Expecting a zealously patriotic trip, we are surprised by the quiet dignity of the day.

That evening a couple of us split for a cheap meal at Pancho Goldstein's "greatest Mexican restaurant in Hawaii." It's the only place that fails to serve a wedge of pineapple in the iced tea.

MONDAY, Nov. 20: As many opt for the day-long trip to the Polynesian Cultural Center, operated by the Mormon Church, we get a rental car for a see-Oahu-for-yourself notion. A bonanza when we stop for lunch at the Waoli Tea Room in the lush Manoa Valley.

At the nearby chapel, a 10-minute mist of rain holds Japanese newlyweds in the doorway. While marriage in Japan is a matter of signing papers, the ceremony is expensive. Thousands of couples a year, we're told, choose a wedding-honeymoon in Hawaii as an alternative. Hibiscus splashed vegetation and the quaint chapel are thrown into the bargain.

A trip to the outer suburbs locates government rehabilitation signs and crowded neighborhoods. Expensive, fertile land is reserved for pineapples and sugar cane, not people. A Honolulu traffic jam on return makes us feel right at home.

TUESDAY, Nov. 21: One last coffee on the balcony before a 10 a.m. departure to Kauai, the "Garden Isle" and the oldest in the chain. Jean Scarlett, a 31-year Livonia resident, celebrates her birthday on the Wailua river tour upon arrival after a 20-minute flight. The boat briefly stops for a visit to the enchanting Fern Grotto, where married couples are remarried Hawaiian-style to the graceful strains of the Hawaiian Wedding Song.

Any accommodation complainers are silenced by the arrival at the Coco Palms Resort. Early Zsa Zsa Gabor, the hotel was the setting for Rita Hayworth's "Sadie Thompson" and retains its movie star allure.

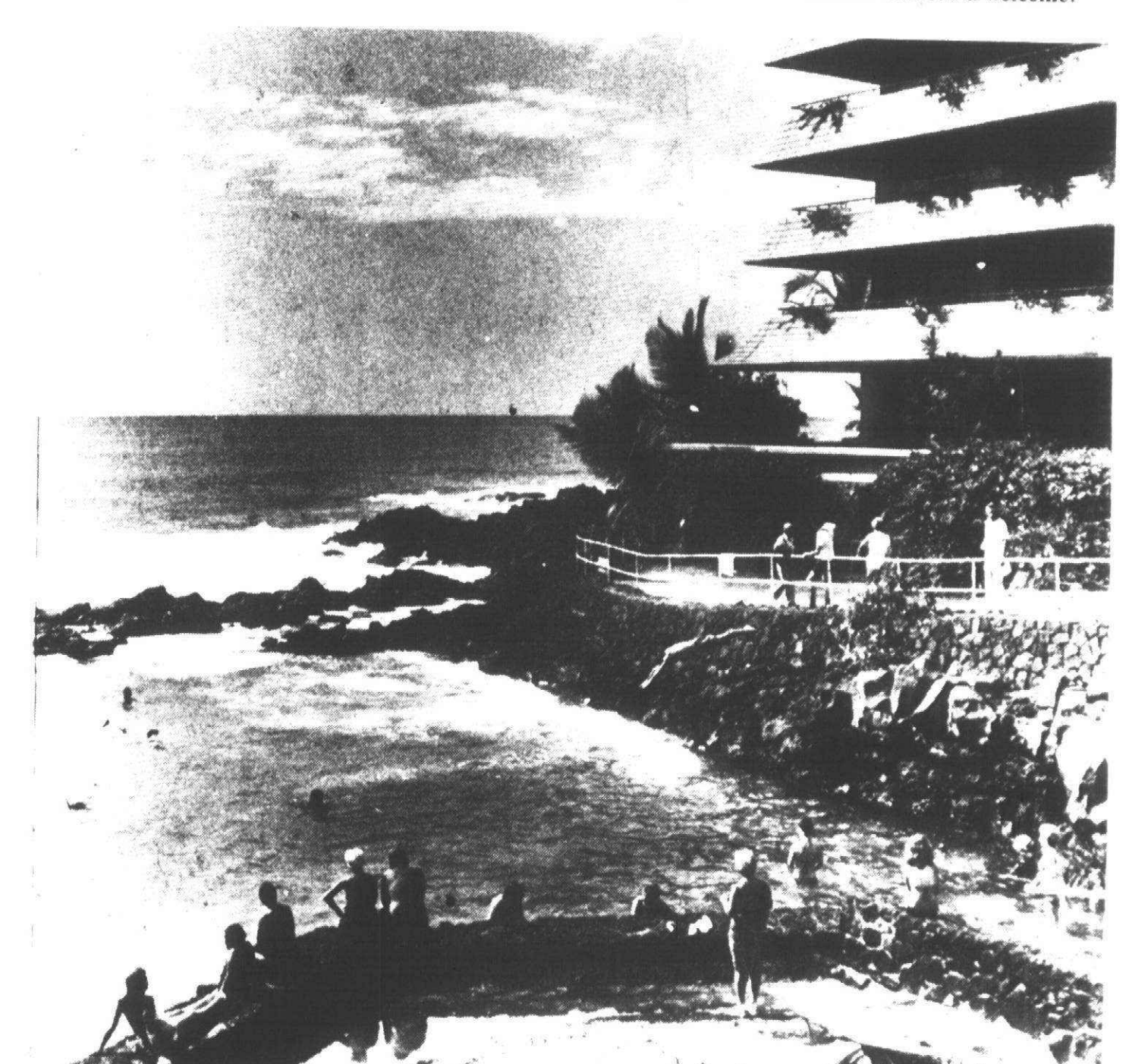
Tony and Pat Urbatz of Livonia end up in the honeymoon suite, which keeps Tony up all night wondering when they'll discover the error. No problem. The Urbatzes retain the 25X27 foot room with 17 windows overlooking two pools, an the lagoon, and the largest coconut grove on the islands. They never used the kitchenette or phone in the commode, but staved off a lot of teasing from friends about the gigantic bed flanked by gold-embossed smoked glass and overhanging green glass chandelier. The significance of the preserved lei in a glass curio cabinet remains a mystery.

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 22: A trip across the road to the beach catches a wild surf today. Swimming is cautioned here—too many reptiles and undertows keep many of us near the pools, replete with mini waterfalls of their own.

Darrell and Carol Underwood of Southfield make a trip to the Slippery Slide, built for the movie "South Pacific," but forego the slide itself, surrounded by danger signs. The 40-foot waterfall drop at the end of the slide holds back all but intrepid trouper.

Although diving and jumping are taboo, one guest at the Kona Hilton on the "Big Island" of

Hawaii chose to break the rules in favor of a splash into the tidal pool.

After a miniature tree lizard drops from the light onto the phone in one room (thankfully the shrieks fail to draw attention), we rush to catch the torch-lighting ceremony on the grounds of the resort.

With a Missionary's Downfall (rum and creme de menthe guaranteed to dispel lizardy fears) on the table and the ceiling fans lazily spinning overhead in the open-air cocktail lounge, we watch and listen as the drum beats. Blowing of the conch shell hushes the audience.

THURSDAY, Nov. 23: After getting tossed in the salty surf all afternoon, we make our way over the river and through the woods to Paradise Pacifica. Poi (mashed taro root) and sushimi (raw fish) are ignored by many in favor of some rather dry turkey amid the buffet display. A mosquito bite on Thanksgiving Day is the result for many at the outdoor dance extravaganza following dinner. The Philippine fan dance and traditional stick dance sparkle in the jungle setting, while some of the routines recall studio recitals. After all, this isn't Broadway, we rationalize.

FRIDAY, Nov. 24: Going through security to leave for Maui, one member of our tour turns as red as the poinsettias gracing the highways when the guard discovers a fistful of Coco Palms sterling silver in her handbag. Since security, rather than theft, is the purpose, she gets through unscathed though mortified.

SATURDAY, Nov. 25: Shopping addicts add to their hoard at the old whaling port of Lahaina, now jammed with tourist traps.

The scenic lovers split for Haleakala Crater, large enough to hold the island of Manhattan, and a breath absorbing visit at 10,000 feet elevation. The "House of the Sun" fills yet more celluloid.

SUNDAY, Nov. 26: The all-day trip to the other side of the island and Hana, the village Charles Lindbergh called home at the end of his life, promises waterfalls and jungles, rather than the white sand beaches of Lahaina. The harrowing hairpin turns on the bumpy road are worth the trip. So says tour member Dick Pyle of Washington DC, and we follow for a glimpse of "the closest thing to Paradise I've ever seen." Dick is the son-in-law of Stanley and Helen Bankett of Redford Township, other members of the party.

MONDAY, Nov. 27: With four days left, vacationers pick up the pace at Kona, the resort area of Hawaii. "The Big Island." A bus trip from the airport through lava-encrusted terrain surprises the tour members who have come to expect flowering vegetation everywhere.

Built on the rocks next to the ocean, the Kona Hilton's flower-bedecked balconies are a welcome sight as we lunch while the waves crash on the rocks a few feet below.

A catamaran dinner cruise at dusk along the coast begins with another entertainment round of "Tiny Bubbles" as servers continuously fill glasses from the open bar. Crowded on the 65-foot vessel, we roll with the rock of the boat, as a few merry souls brave the pitching dance floor for an easier-said-than-done rhumba.

Navigating the narrow catwalk back onto shore, however, some found the rhumba followed without the music.

TUESDAY, Nov. 28: Another early rise for another Kona coast cruise to Kealahou Bay, where the boat anchors to allow swims in the waters where Captain James Cook first landed. Snorkeling equipment provides a first-hand view of sea life at the base of the bluffs which prevent land access to the historic bay.

Two young Islanders, Peter and Richard, demonstrate the ancient (and dying, they inform us) art of coconut palm weaving. We entertain the sneaking suspicion that the Farmington Community Center may latch on to this one.

Following an afternoon in the hotel's tidal pool, where high surf crashes over the black lava rocks, nearly everyone prepares for the Hilton luau and the splendid roast pig, cooked underground beneath coconut fronds in an imu (earth oven lined with hot rocks).

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 29: The last tour, circling the island, takes in Volcano National Park, the site of Hawaii's most recent eruptions (September, 1977), the black sand beaches where lava is pounded into fine grains by the surf, and a fabulous orchid nursery.

Newlyweds Carole and Mike Conklin of Garden City discover that the 420-foot drop of Akaka Falls one-ups Niagara in much the same way Hawaiian coconut cream pie does Big Boy's.

THURSDAY, Nov. 30: With more luggage and less cash, departure is imminent. One woman is hauling a bagful of Maui potato chips as the plane departs at 5:30 p.m. with a scheduled arrival in Detroit for 9:30 a.m. (A five-hour time difference and one-hour Chicago layover consume the night).

A dreary arrival in the Windy City prompts one woman to comment: "Well, gang, we've given up our color TV—it's back to black and white."

Helen Tabaka of Farmington Hills manages to load 11 cases of pineapples into her sons' vans (the record, we've heard, is 32 cases or 256 pineapples).

Snug in our beds that evening, we discover that a winter storm has closed O'Hare, missing us by about 12 hours. With film to the labs and souvenirs unpacked, we realize that Paradise is about 5,000 miles and 60 degrees away.

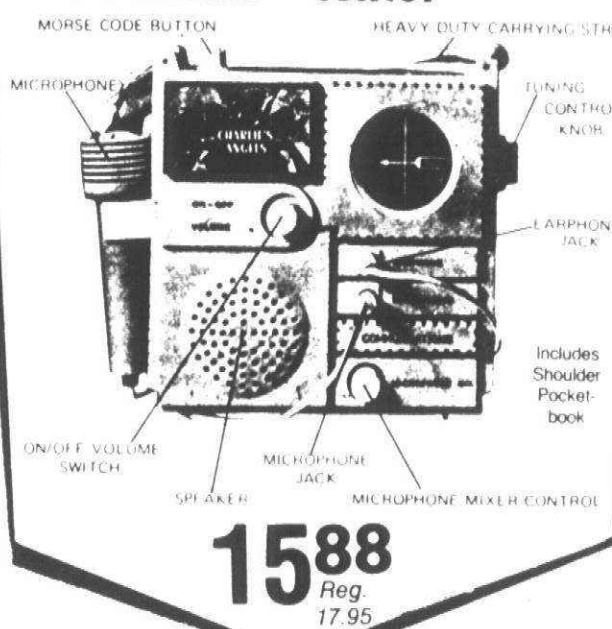

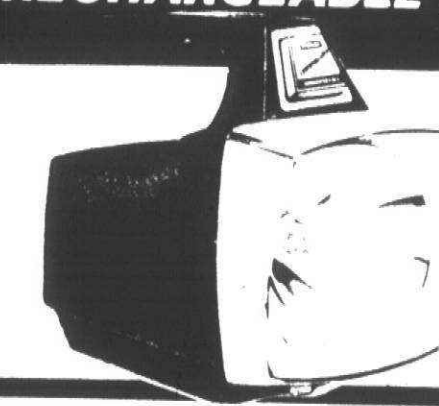

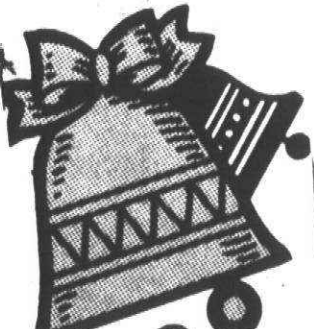

The rush to print

Reporters author 'instant' book on Guyana suicides

Marshall Kilduff's never had any job but that of reporter.

Like other media people, he thought of writing a book, but the urban affairs and school beats on the San Francisco Chronicle kept him pretty busy.

In a bizarre turn of events, Kilduff, with reporter Ron Javers, also of the Chronicle, has written the first book about the more than 900 murders and mass suicides in Jonestown, Guyana.

"The Suicide Cult" was published in paperback, 12 days after the murder of California Congressman Leo Ryan and the deaths of hundreds.

Last week, Javers lay in a Philadelphia hotel room, close to relatives, but also closely watched by a bodyguard. He is recovering from a bullet wound in the fleshy part of his shoulder and a subsequent infection.

Kilduff, in a Southfield interview, told the story of how they came to author the book published by Bantam as an "extra."

"Ron wasn't just a paperback writer waiting on the sidelines to pounce and write this. He was almost killed," Kilduff said. "He's lost 25 pounds and he's hurting."

"And this is a good solid story, not a scatter-brained rip-off."

KILDUFF said the trip to Guyana was Javers' initial involvement with the People's Temple and cult leader Jim Jones. For Kilduff himself, it was the culmination of more than two years of investigating and digging.

"I've been on the story all along," Kilduff said. "The reason the paper didn't send me to Guyana with Congressman Ryan was because I was well known to Jones and I would have been a provocation."

"It was a sensitive situation just getting Ryan and the press into Jonestown," he said. "But as for the book, if anyone was going to do a book, it had to be us."

Work on the project began at 2 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 19 shortly after the Guyana story began to break. Bantam editors agreed that Kilduff and other Chronicle reporters should be involved, and they were contacted.

"I wasn't really sure we could do it so quickly," Kilduff said. "We had to

change things as we went along. The death toll kept mounting and we had to re-write the Saturday night scene at the airport too."

While Kilduff used research materials gathered in the past two years, Javers could only dictate his part of the manuscript which wound up being 224 pages long, with a 32 page insert of photographs.

An August 1977 issue of "New West Magazine" contained a long article by Kilduff on the cult. His investigative reporting was probably what led Congressman Leo Ryan to look into the People's Temple and ultimately make the ill-fated trip to Guyana.

KILDUFF is convinced that little is left of the cult and that no danger of further "hits" of people on a hate list will occur.

Asked if he thought Jones had planned the massacre, he said: "I think it was a spur of the moment, desperate move, possibly incited by drug use," he said. "He was an emperor in the jungle who saw his people leaving him."

Kilduff's relationship with Jones

began when he covered the San Francisco Housing Authority, when Jones was an appointed member.

"He'd arrive with his huge entourage and take over the meetings," Kilduff recalled. "I'm a reporter, and he was just too screwy. All the bells went off and I believe they would have for any trained reporter. He was a hypochondriac himself, and the way he buttered you up and then would never answer questions."

The reporter added when he wanted to visit the People's Temple, Jones put every obstacle in his way. Finally, when he did get it, the cult leader was always surrounded by aides and was inaccessible.

"He was paranoid, always thinking people were out to get him," Kilduff said. "He was that way while he was growing up, I found."

One of Kilduff's sources, a woman who was an ex-finance officer for the cult, told the reporter that the cultists were rehearsing killing themselves, that Jones subjected them to searchlights and loudspeakers night after night.

"When Ryan and the media group went down, I thought Jones would behave and the group would be treated well—a staged thing," he said. "Instead it turned out to be just what that girl said, a nightmare."

Kilduff said joining the People's Temple meant going through a slow process of becoming "this programmed automaton."

"Slowly you were convinced to give up your family, sign over your second car or 10 per cent of your property," he said. "People would begin by going

to one meeting and then gradually go more and more. Jones was always up there onstage, in an overstuffed chair.

"In the end, it was difficult to leave. You had no identity. Jones became the source of everything in your life, your food, your shelter, everything."

He contends what Jones used was some pattern of brainwashing.

Jones claimed about 20,000 followers in a 1976 statement, but Kilduff said the count was probably more like 3,000 or 4,000.

"The real problem with Jones and people like him is that he was never really held accountable," Kilduff said. "And sadly, there are always creatures who will follow people like him."

Tips given for fireplace use

There are few experiences more enjoyable than sitting before a crackling fire on a bone-chilling winter's evening. The Better Business Bureau has a few tips that can help make this experience safe as well as pleasant.

Before lighting a match, make sure the fireplace was constructed to be used as such and not only for decoration. Have it inspected to determine whether it has all necessary linings.

Have the chimney cleaned if this has not been done recently. Be sure the flue is clear and that there are no loose bricks or mortar joints.

Check outside for trees or tall structures near the chimney opening which may send whirlpools of air down the chimney and cause smoking. Be sure to equip the fireplace with a well-fitting screen and the chimney with guards to prevent entrance of squirrels and birds.

Before shopping for firewood, become familiar with commonly used terms and dimensions. The most common measure of firewood volume is the cord.

This is a well-stacked pile of logs measuring four feet in width, four feet in height and eight feet in length. A "rick" or half cord is four feet high, eight feet long and only two feet wide. A "face cord" is again four feet high and eight feet long, but is cut into desired lengths. A "face cord" of 16 inch pieces is approximately one-third of a standard cord.

To determine volume, stack the wood properly, then measure the dimensions of the stack in feet. Multiply width by height by length to obtain the total cubic feet of the pile. Then divide this figure by 128 (the number of cubic feet in a standard cord) to get the cord-volume.

Each wood species can offer something different in use, aroma and heat value, since they differ in composition.

Hardwood, softwood, "seasoned" (dry) and green wood all have benefits and drawbacks. Unless you know about types of wood, one way to be sure of buying wood that will suit your purposes best is to deal with established firewood sales outlets.

When buying firewood, ask several dealers what the normal going price for wood is.

A practice of some firewood companies is to deliver and stack the wood, charging a fee to stack if the wood is to be carried more than twenty feet from the truck. It is important that wood be stacked correctly. A rick of wood can weigh between 900 and 1,800 pounds. If stacked improperly it can become a hazard to children.

It is a good practice to build a rack using the dimensions of a half or a full cord to insure safety and full measure of wood.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety commission estimates that each year

over 6,000 people receive hospital emergency room treatment for injuries associated with fireplaces, most of the serious victims being children.

To ensure safety, the Better Business Bureau recommends that consumers keep highly combustible materials like paper, fabrics and cardboard boxes away from the fireplace area. Warn children to stay away from the area.

Don't use or store gasoline or other flammable liquids in the same room, as flammable vapors can travel the length of a room and explode.

Roller newspapers can be used to start a fire, but avoid using the colored pages, for they can release dangerous amounts of lead from the ink.

Never use a fireplace to dispose of Christmas trees, wreaths or trash. Always keep the damper open while the fuel is burning to provide for efficient burning and to prevent the accumulation of explosive fumes.

Don't treat artificial logs as if they are real wood; burn them one at a time. If artificial logs are stacked on top of each other they can explode.

Always use a screen to keep sparks from flying out. Make sure the fire is completely out before retiring for the evening and dispose of ashes safely by using a metal container with a lid.

Home remedies can kill

Hogs hoofs, red clay, corn silk, turpentine, molasses, baking soda and red vinegar.

These common household ingredients make up a wide variety of "home remedies" which are still being used to relieve asthma, arthritis, high blood pressure, stomach aches and head colds.

While the concoctions themselves are generally considered harmless, they could cause adverse side effects when used in addition to traditional medications, say researchers at the University of Michigan.

Marvie L. Hackney, a program associate at the university's Institute of Gerontology, has just completed a 12-month study of home remedy use among 50 elderly black persons in southeastern Michigan.

The result of the effort is the country's first comprehensive list of home remedies, their ingredients and uses for distribution to doctors, pharmacists, and others in the health care community.

"Many practitioners seem unaware that a patient may be using his own mixture of herbs, chemicals, and over-the-counter preparations in addition or in lieu of a prescription drug," Hackney said.

"Adverse drug reactions caused an estimated 30,000 deaths each year and are among the top ten causes of hospitalization. The elderly are inordinately susceptible to this problem simply because they use more drugs, and because of the chronic diseases which often accompany old age."

The researchers interviewed 38 women and 12 men, mostly in their late 60's and 70's, who had been identified as knowledgeable in the area of home remedies. These were defined as "substances which can be purchased without a prescription; which have to be mixed, diluted, dried, and so forth, prior to use by a patient, or non-prescription substances which are used for purposes or in a manner not indicated on the label."

About 90 per cent of those interviewed were raised in the southern or border states, but moved north by adulthood. About half had nine years

or less of formal schooling, 20 completed high school, and three attended trade schools. All but nine were retired at the time of the study, although nearly half did volunteer work. Most named Social Security as their main source of income.

Nearly all said they had learned about home remedies from their mothers during early childhood. "Black families in the rural south rarely had access to a doctor," Hackney observes. "Many of the formulas and beliefs date back to slavery days, and are passed down from generation to generation."

"Although the participants in the study expressed few negative feelings about medical doctors, several felt that health care providers do not understand black people, or that they didn't want to take time to deal with them."

Fifty-eight per cent of those interviewed said they prefer home remedies to over-the-counter and prescription drugs. Why? Because the remedies were "cheaper," or "better," or simply "because they work." Twenty-eight persons said they used them preventively and nine reported using them in conjunction with medical drugs.

"When asked what they depended on most to heal them, 15 per cent said the 'doctor' and 76 per cent said 'home remedies,'" Hackney says. "When asked what they used in addition to the home remedies, only 16 per cent mentioned seeing a doctor; 52 per cent cited 'bed rest' and 28 per cent said 'prayer.'"

"Home remedy users tend to be very religious," Hackney notes. "They believe that God created every tree, leaf and living thing for man's benefit and gave them the wisdom to use them properly. Most of the common ingredients are readily available in and around the home."

Some of the favorite combinations the old people mentioned included "lemons and onions for chest colds;" "alcohol and vinegar for arthritis" and "kerosene on sugar to stop a cough."

Beware winter's deadly trickery

It's the extras that count when it comes to safe winter driving—extra time, extra space, extra precautions against winter's deadly tricks.

This is the contention of a man who should know, Raymond Prince, secretary of the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards.

Prince's job is coordinating the committee's yearly activities, including the council's annual winter driving test project at Stevens Point, Wis. The program provides a proving ground where equipment and vehicle control techniques are tested under uniform and carefully controlled ice and snow conditions.

Too many drivers misjudge the extra distances needed to stop, Prince contends, citing findings that braking distances on snow and ice may be from three to nine times the normal distance on dry pavement.

Prince cites this comparison: From a speed of only 20 miles an hour on glare ice at 25 degrees, the braking distance averages about 150 feet—close to nine car lengths. Compare

that to the fact that, under reasonably good conditions, a car can be braked to a stop in this same distance—150 feet—from a speed of 55 miles an hour on good dry pavement.

"In other words," Prince points out, "for equal stopping" ability, speeds on glare ice should be cut to about one-third of those that might be considered reasonable under ideal conditions."

Temperature also plays an important role in the slipperiness of ice and packed snow, according to skid-test findings. At temperatures near freezing (32 degrees) the braking distance on glare ice may be as much as 260 ft. (about 15 car lengths) from 20 mph, twice the stopping distance at zero degrees.

This factor, Prince said, traps many an unwary driver who starts out on an icy or snowy pavement in the morning when the temperature is cold. He feels he has reasonably good control.

Later, the temperature rises. He may suddenly discover that he is driving far too fast to stop or maneuver to avoid an accident. This is one reason for the skid-testers' admonition to "get

the feel of the road" continuously throughout the day.

In relation to stopping, committee findings emphasize:

- Tire chains are your best aid in stopping on ice, where they cut braking distance by 50 per cent as compared with regular highway tires.

- Where studded tires may be used legally, they help. Tires with new studs on the rear wheels reduce braking distances about 19 per cent on ice; about 13 per cent after 2,500 miles of wear.

When it comes to getting started and keeping going:

- On ice—conventional snow tires develop about 28 per cent more traction ability than regular tires; studded snow tires provide about three times and chains about seven times the traction of regular tires.

- On loosely packed snow—conventional snow tires develop about half again as much pulling ability as regular tires, while tire chains provide about four times the pull of regular tires.

Other findings of interest include:

- Small vs. large cars—In general a

sub-compact car will stop in a shorter distance in a panic stop on ice than a compact car, which in turn is likely to require a shorter distance than a standard car. Lighter cars, however, have notable difficulty getting started, particularly at warmer ice temperatures.

- Radial tires—contrary to the impression of many motorists, radial tires are not necessarily a substitute for snow tires for driving on snow and ice. The performance of radial tires varies widely and is dependent on tread configuration, i.e., a snow tread will perform as a snow tire, a regular tread will perform as a regular highway tire.

In spite of the help provided by these traction aids for both stopping and starting, Prince concluded, performance is nowhere equal that on normal dry pavement.

"Our best advice is to reduce speeds drastically, follow other vehicles at a far greater distance, and perform all maneuvers—slowing, steering or accelerating—with a gentle, delicate touch. Easy does it."

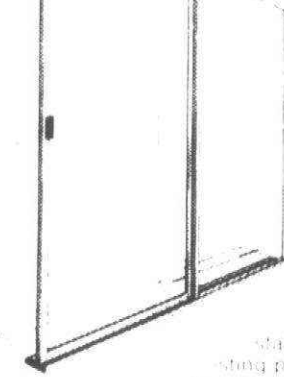

Young support sharing but not sex role reversal

Today's high school seniors feel it is acceptable, and often desirable, for both a husband and wife to be employed, a new nationwide survey indicates.

They also endorse a quite equal division of child care, according to the University of Michigan Institute for Social Research (ISR).

But the young people oppose a complete reversal of sex roles, the study shows. Eighty-five per cent rejected the idea of a wife working full-time while her husband was not working, and 64 per cent would not accept a situation in which the husband worked only half-time, even if the couple had no children.

"In contrast, only four per cent would not agree to a half-time job for the wife while her husband worked full-time," the study reports. "The seniors were far more restrictive in their view of the husband's work options."

A. Regula Herzog, Jerold G. Bachman and Lloyd D. Johnston examined the personal preferences of a 1977 nationwide sample of about 3,000 seniors. Five questions were asked about husband/wife division of employment, child care and housework.

"Our interest was prompted by the enormous influx of married women into the labor market during the last decades," the researchers said. "In this decade, even the mothers of pre-school children are returning to work. Yet several research studies indicate there is no concurrent trend for husbands to assume a much larger share of the child care and housework."

Will the next generation of new-laws be more egalitarian or traditional-minded? The ISR data provide some suggestions, however, preferences are not perfect predictors of actual behaviors, the authors said.

The data show that among the seniors the most widely preferred arrangement for a couple with no children is full-time work for the husband and full- or half-time work for the wife. The more traditional arrangement in which the husband has a full-time job and the wife is not employed outside the home was rated less preferable by the seniors surveyed.

The preferences shift dramatically when a pre-school child enters the picture. Then, 47 per cent of the males and 35 per cent of the females desire full-time work for the husband and no outside employment for the wife. And the proposition that "both work full-time" is soundly rejected by 70 per cent of both sexes.

"Most of the seniors believe child care should be shared equally by both parents, whether both or only the husband work full-time," the authors said. A separate item on the questionnaire revealed that 85 per cent of those surveyed think "most fathers should spend more time with their children than they do now." Paid work, apparently, does not excuse men for neglecting their children.

It can, on the other hand, exempt males from most of the housework. In the "traditional family," where the husband works full-time and the wife is unemployed, a considerable majority of the seniors desire the wife to carry all or most of the responsibility for housework.

The questionnaire also asked how housework should be shared by a couple who both work full-time. "In this situation, as with child care, equal division of labor is clearly the preferred option," the researchers said.

"Overall, and perhaps surprisingly, we found relatively few large sex differences in the survey. Female seniors

are somewhat less tradition-minded and tend toward more egalitarian arrangements. They are more likely than males to favor full-time employment for wives without children, half-time employment for mothers with young children and equal involvement of both partners in child care and

housework. "Males are more likely than females to prefer a wife to work half-time before the children are born, to be unemployed while they are pre-school age, and to give wives the sole responsibility for care of the house and children."

Seniors of either sex strongly reject the idea of males working less than full-time or taking on the major responsibility for child care or housework.

"The tendency for males to be somewhat more conservative than females in their attitudes toward family divi-

son of labor is consistent with other studies," the authors said. "But our findings point up more similarities than differences in the viewpoints of young males and females. They do not indicate any widespread or fundamental disagreement about evolving sex roles."
