Building creates floods?

Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert says he believes one of the major reasons residents were plagued by flooded basements during two heavy rains may be traced to new homes under construction.

According to Culbert, information gathered by an engineer, master plumber and other experts he had asked to investigate the problem, points to drains left open in basements of houses under construction as at least one of the contributors to the flooding.

The supervisor said at least 77 violations of a Canton ordinance that requires the drains to be kept closed during construction have been issued by the building department.

Crescendo builders received \$1 of the violations, with the remainder going to other home builders throughout the township.

Culbert said open drains in the partly-built homes aggravate the flooding problem because rainwater runs off the ungraded lots into the basements, where water can reach a height of several feet.

Culbert says inspections of drains and sewers done during the last few weeks by township employees have led to the discovery of drains clogged with such debris as discarded Christmas trees and sanitary sewers with as much as five inches of sand inside.

Some of the recent findings will be discussed in a report presented to the Canton Township Board of Trustees at the Aug. 7 regular board meeting, scheduled for 7 p.m. in the township administration building.

Teacher negotiations proceed at snail's pace

There's an eerie quiet at the bargaining table as negotiators approach an Aug. 31 contract expiration between Plymouth-Canton schools and their teachers.

Proposals and counter-proposals are made, but the talks are not yet near the stage where there is a rush toward a settlement. In fact the bargaining pace is not that much different from when the teachers union and administrators met for the first time last May.

That bothers Derald McKinley,

spokesman for the Plymouth-Canton Education Association (PCEA) — sole bargaining agent for teachers in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

McKinley complains of a lack of any real progress in bargaining and feels part of the reason involves the school board relying on an outside legal firm to do its bargaining.

Norman Kee, chief spokesman for the school board's team, believes bargaining not only is proceeding well but may actually be ahead of the pace of the last bargaining session three years ago.

BOTH SIDES got together for an informal session on April 1 and met at the table for the first time on May 15.

Since then both sides have met at the table some 14 times for sessions of 4-7 hours each.

McKinley reported that earlier a lot of time had been wasted on trying to reach agreement on the procedural rules for bargaining.

"At past sessions both sides would initiate tentative agreements as they were reached. This time, with the outside attorneys bargaining, the board team said they didn't want to initial anything until agreement was reached on an entire article.

"The board team wanted to have that big hammer to hold against us at the end, but we aren't going to bargain that way. Finally they agreed to initial individual paragraphs as agreement is reached. But a lot of time was wasted before that was ironed out."

McKinley also is upset because he feels the board negotiators lack authority to make decisions and must clear everything with the central administration before signing tentative agreements.

Kee disagrees. "Our side has just as much authority to bargain as the PCEA has to bargain for teachers. We cannot guarantee anything until final approval, just as the PCEA cannot until teachers ratify. It's always been that way.

"I don't understand the complaint about the pace of bargaining," added Kee. "We have been meeting twice a week, on Monday and Wednesday afternoons, and right now we are at about the same place we were the last time we bargained. We've made as much

progress, if not more, than we had this time three years ago."

MCKINLEY BELIEVES some of the problems he perceives at the table are related to the fact that the board's team is headed up by a team of attorneys.

The board's negotiations this year are being handled by the law firm of Clark, Hardy, Lewis, Fine and Asher. The two attorneys who serve as spokesmen at the table are William Albertson and Stuart Slatkin.

Other members of the board's team are: Walt Bartnick, Kee's assistant in personnel; Dan White, director of finance; John Telford, secondary education director; and Barbara Bowman, elementary education director.

Members of the PCEA's team are McKinley, John Ryder, Candi Reece, Bill Bartlett, and Tim Cotner. All have served on the bargaining team before except for Cotner, who is chairman of the grievance committee for the PCEA.

McKinley is concerned about the money the board is spending for the law firm's services. He claims some \$10,000 was budgeted for labor relations and that the firm is being paid \$60 an hour for work at the table. If both attorneys are paid the hourly rate, McKinley adds, that's \$120 an hour.

KEE DENIES \$120 an hour is being paid for both attorneys. "We worked out an arrangement with the law firm. It's a package arrangement and is based on the team concept. They are being paid about \$60 per hour — not \$120. But who bargains for us is our

concern, not the union's."

McKinley said he's concerned because a lot of time is wasted because of the arrangement.

"Almost every time we meet, the board team calls for a caucus right off

the bat before we can get to the table. They need that caucus to consult with their attorneys who are out of town. We caucus before bargaining so we are ready when we get together."

2 vandalize station while police work

Two 18-year-olds are facing felony charges for wreaking havoc in the Canton police station early Wednesday morning after the desk officer left his station.

Donald Boyd of Koppernick Road and Fred Bolton of the Honey Tree apartment complex are charged with malicious destruction of police property — a felony that carries a maximum five-year jail sentence.

According to police, the pair came to the station at 2:30 a.m. Wednesday to post bond for a friend, who had been arrested for a moving traffic violation.

When the desk officer left his station in order to get the prisoner, Bolton entered a bathroom and allegedly stuffed

a stack of crime prevention literature down a toilet bowl. Police said the man also put a hole in the bathroom wall.

Boyd allegedly grabbed jars of typing correction fluid from a nearby desk and spread the fluid around the police clerk's office.

According to police, Boyd then went outside where he sprayed the fluid on three police cars.

Police said the cars will have to be repainted for a total estimated cost of \$550.

Boyd and Bolton pled innocent to the felony charge at an arraignment before 35th District Judge James Garber on Wednesday. They were released on \$5,000 bond.

Low-income denial prompts legal threat

The owner of land previously proposed as the site of a low-income apartment complex is considering litigation against Canton Township because of a sudden change in the parcel's zoning.

The Canton board denied site plans for the low-income complex proposed near the Pickwick subdivision on July 10 on the grounds that the land's zoning had reverted from multiple-family to single-family residential.

The action was based on the premise that the Pickwick Planned Unit Development (PUD) agreement had been broken, because a required sequence of construction had not been followed.

Ronald Ratner, vice president of Forest City Inc., said his company "cannot live" with the decision and the zoning change.

Forest City currently owns the 18-acre parcel south of Warren and east of Lilley. But Amurcon Corp. has signed an agreement to purchase the land with the stipulation that its zoning remain multiple.

Amurcon had planned to build a 168-

unit apartment complex on the site. Canton board members had promised irate Pickwick residents that they would do everything possible to stop construction of the complex, even if it meant going to court.

"The overwhelming concern to our company is the change in use," Ratner said. "If the township board's decision is the final word, then it's a situation where our land value has probably been slashed by 25 percent."

Ratner said the land was zoned for multiple-family use when his firm purchased the parcel in 1972.

He said company attorneys are currently researching "what our options are."

Kim Wilkins, vice president of Amurcon Corp., said his firm would not enter the lawsuit if it is filed. He would not say whether Amurcon has abandoned its plan to construct the apartments near Pickwick.

"I don't know if we've given it up or not," he said. "But we certainly can't pursue it without a site plan."

Self-serve gas?

Because of the skyrocketing price of gasoline, Canton Township board members are reconsidering the township's ban on self-service gasoline stations. An ordinance prohibiting self-serve pumps was passed under the administration of former Supervisor Robert Greenstein out of fear that people did not know how to handle the flammable fuel. But current Supervisor Noel Culbert says many residents have complained about the ordinance.

Supervisor Noel Culbert wants to replace the signs which welcome motorists to Canton. The supervisor thinks the current signs which welcome drivers to the "charter township of Canton — a planned community" are just a little wordy. He has proposed green signs that feature the township's tree symbol and the wording, "Canton welcomes you." A dozen of the new signs would cost the township about \$500.

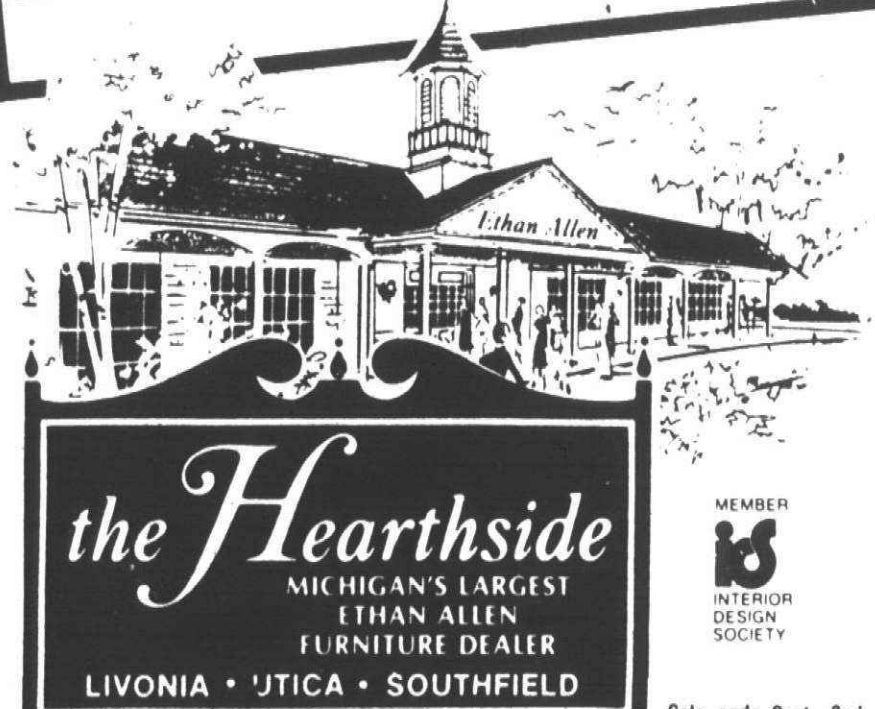

'Aren't they cute?' proud caiman owner asks

George and Chubbs are not what you'd call your ordinary cuddly household pets.

But their owners — Bill and Sharon Kane of Canton Township — are willing to go to court to keep the four-foot caiman in their townhouse basement where the alligator-type reptiles have lived for the past eight years.

The board of directors of the Canterbury Mews apartment complex has threatened to file eviction proceedings against the Kanes unless George and Chubbs take up residence somewhere else.

Board attorney Frederick Bluford claims in a letter to the couple that the reptiles "pose a severe threat to the safety of cooperative members."

But Kane insists that George and

Chubbs are less dangerous than a dog.

The reptiles, which look like alligators to those not versed on crocodilian forms, spend their days basking under heat lamps in a fenced-in basement pool.

"How many alligators do you know that can open a padlock, climb a flight of stairs and open French doors," asked Kane, referring to the board's fears that George and Chubbs will take a

walk through the apartment grounds.

KANE, A DETROIT schoolteacher, purchased the caiman on an impulsive shopping spree at Montgomery Ward eight years ago.

"I just thought they were cute," said Kane, as he proudly showed off photographs of the baby caiman, which were then a few inches long.

Over the next four years, however,

the reptiles grew and grew and grew. Kane was forced to replace his pets' first home — an aquarium — with a small swimming pool. Two years ago, he enlisted the help of builder Frank Shephard to install miniature models of above-ground swimming pools in his basement.

The pet owner claims that the fenced-in, filtered pools meet all township building ordinances and can easily be removed — a requirement of the apartment by-laws.

The Canterbury Mews occupancy agreement prohibits tenants from harboring fur-bearing animals, but does not mention reptiles, Kane said.

The caiman owner claims that he told the former apartment pet director about George and Chubbs when they were first purchased eight years ago. He said his neighbors who live in the immediate vicinity of his home have never objected to the pets.

According to Canton ordinance officer Lloyd Young, no township ordinance or state law prohibits the keeping of caiman as pets.

KATHERINE LATINEN, assistant curator of the Detroit Zoo reptile house, backed up Kane's statement that caiman are relatively harmless.

"People just don't understand them because they're so different from themselves," she said. "But they're not aggressive animals. If they did get out, they'd probably just hide."

She heaped praise on Kane for keeping the reptiles alive and healthy.

Most people who purchased caiman when they were common occupants of department stores some years ago could not keep the reptiles alive for more than a year, Ms. Latinen said.

Baby caiman, which eat insects and later fish in the wild, need specific nutritional requirements. Inadequate lighting often results in severe physical deformities.

According to Ms. Latinen, caiman can no longer be sold or transported

from their native habitat in South America under international or U.S. law. Although caiman are not endangered, they are listed as an endangered species because they resemble other reptiles that are threatened with extinction.

"You're talking about someone who's a very good caretaker," Ms. Latinen said of Kane. "He obviously knew what he was doing."

NONETHELESS, MEMBERS of the Canterbury Mews board of directors aren't exactly thrilled with George and Chubbs.

A letter written by board attorney Bluford to the Kanes in May asked the pet owners to remove the caiman from the apartment complex or face eviction proceedings.

Board member Susan Hitchcock said eviction plans have been temporarily shelved pending research into insurance matters.

Bluford said he personally believes that the apartments' occupancy agreements prohibits the keeping of caiman as pet, although the agreement only specifically mentions fur-bearing animals.

"I don't think it would be hard to tell a jury that the keeping of these animals is a dangerous hazard," he said.

Kane has retained attorney James P. Ryan to fight the eviction case, if it is filed.

"There's no way they can touch me," Kane insisted. "I'm not in violation of anything."

"We're going to stay here, and we're going to keep the animals. If these people want a fight, we've got one for them."

When it comes to George and Chubbs, Kane's wife, Sharon, stands staunchly behind her husband.

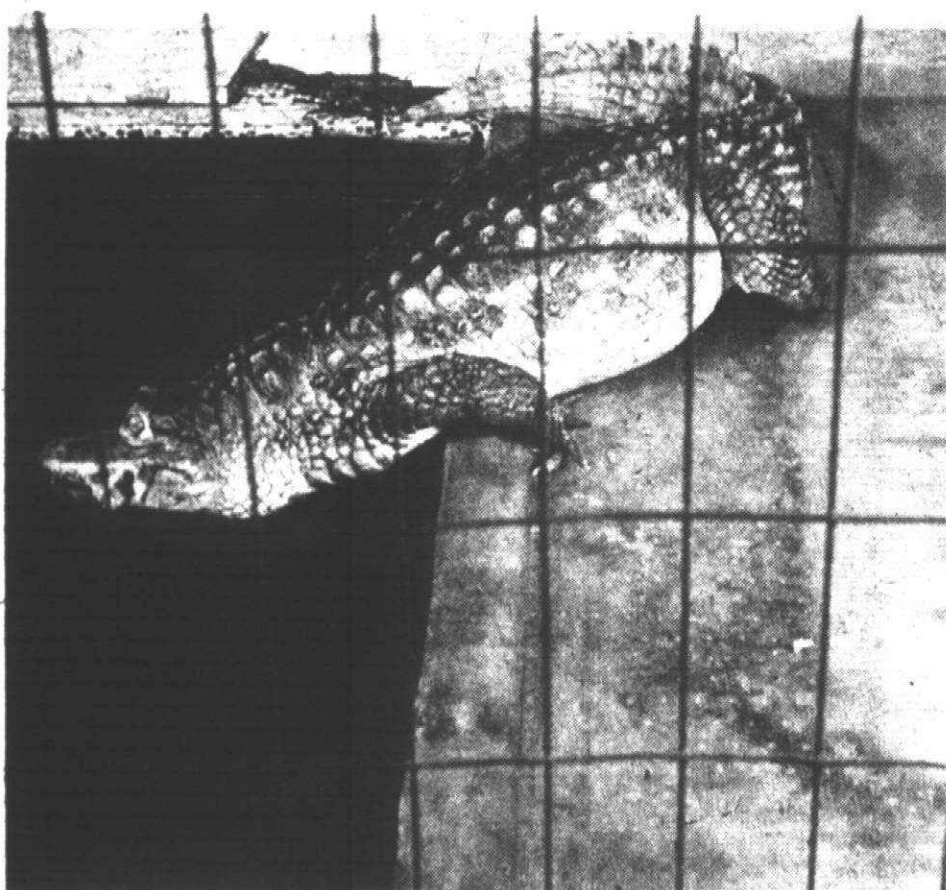
"People find it hard to believe that you could get attached to them," she said. "But we've babied them for eight years."



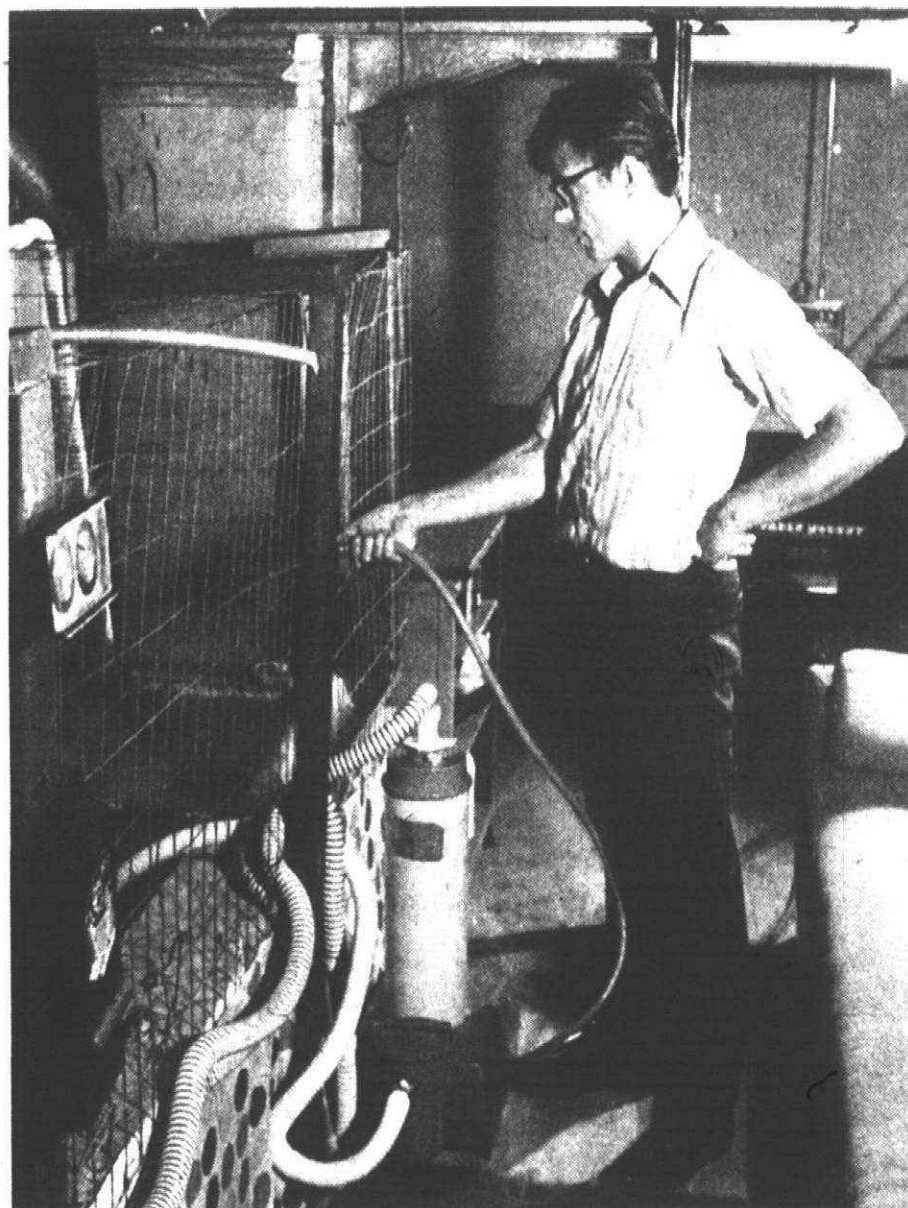
Chubbs' favorite dinner is rainbow trout, but she only eats three or four of the fish four times a week. The caiman obediently stopped

Proud caiman owner Bill Kane hoses down his pet's cage in the basement of his townhouse.

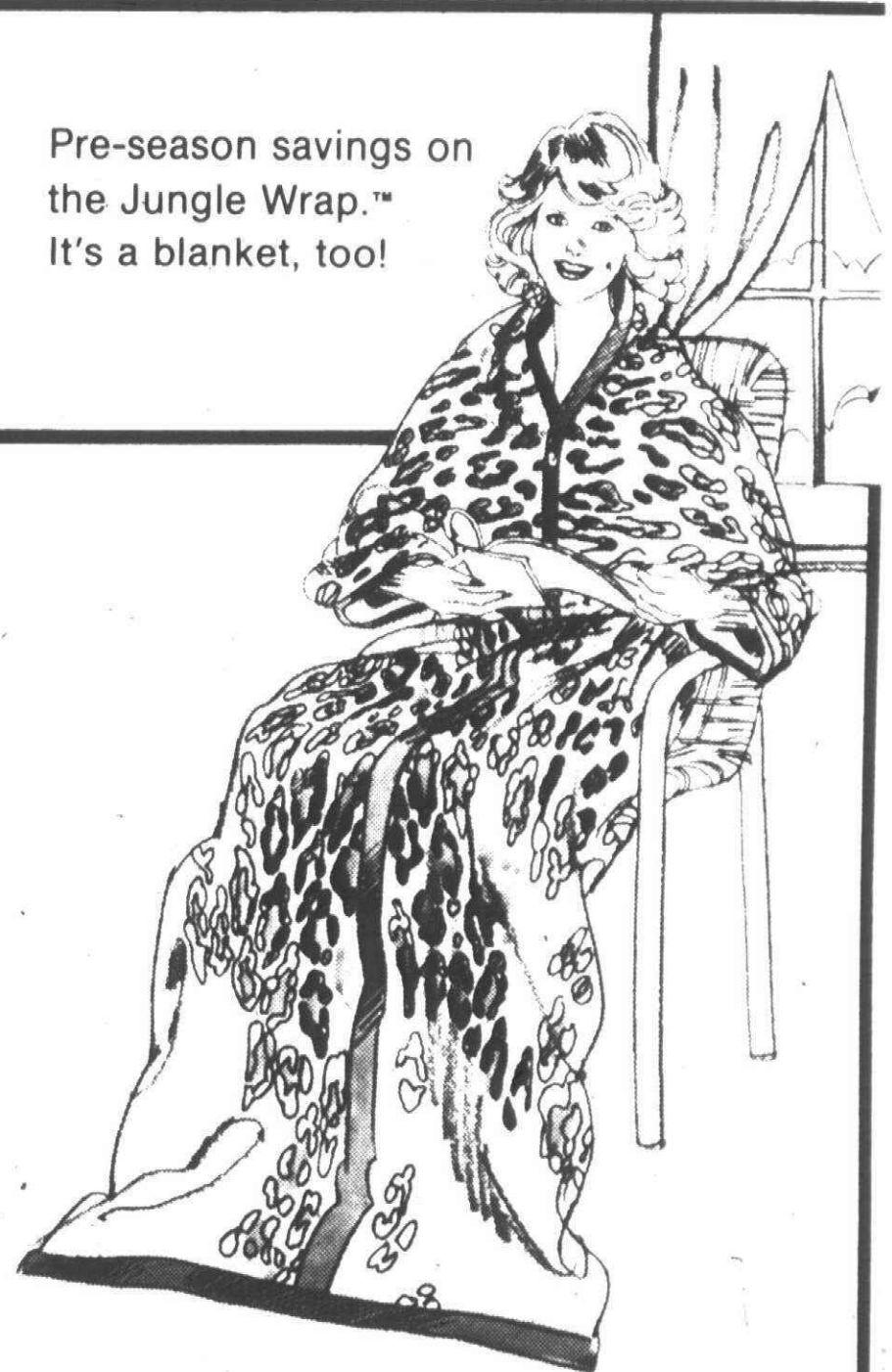


This is the pen where George and Chubbs live.

Ulsaker leaves schools for business venture

An administrator in the Plymouth-Canton School System is leaving his schoolbooks behind and going into business for himself after years of teaching children.

His business is called "People Time Inc." In many cases his private contracts will involve teaching the teachers.

Sam Ulsaker recently resigned as director of federal programming and planning after four years with the district. He resigned when the position was altered, calling for a person with sophisticated computer skills.

In his early education days, Ulsaker worked as a school principal and as a teacher in various subjects including history, English and physical education.

His new position takes him around the country as a management consultant for institutions with management and personnel problems.

Basically, his work entails setting up programs for institutions that need to motivate their workers and create an atmosphere of productivity.

One of his first assignments will take him to Texas, where he says he will find a receptive atmosphere for the types of management programs he's selling.

"Texas is just getting into collective bargaining with education and it does not have a set consulting firm," he says.

HE ALSO HAS immediate plans to develop a management system for a Florida school system and help revamp the administration of a hospital in Tennessee.

Based on his experience in education, Ulsaker says school principals are the "number one" group of people that need management training.

"They're wiped out in day-to-day functioning," he says. "Their training has been neglected as much or more than any other group because of the pressures they're under."

He says school districts are faced with many negative occurrences that effect children's learning, such as teacher contract negotiations and staff layoffs.

"There seems to be a lot of adult happenings and they really don't have the time to concentrate on teaching kids."

Much of Ulsaker's management training has been based on skills — prompted by Success Motivation Institute Inc. which is one of many self-help programs today. SMI's programming is designed to promote personal success through goal direction and a positive attitude.

His first exposure to this training came at a time when he discovered a flaw in a management program he designed for a school district.

"IT INCLUDED the budget, communications and personnel but it lacked the individual needs of employees," he says.

Ulsaker is now a distributor for SMI, which allows his use of SMI materials in his own business practice.

Ulsaker has gained national recognition through his projects involving management. His reputation has grown through workshops he has sponsored in the state. He is also listed among technical assistants at the U.S. Office of Education.

Presently, he is producing a slide presentation directed at teachers. It focuses on developing good teacher attitudes as well as a student motivation.

Ulsaker points to several reasons why teachers need to learn to motivate children. His personal push is to change attitudes rather than using "fear" and "incentive" to motivate children toward learning.

Motivating children by changing their attitudes implies: "You do it because it's good for you as a person," rather than "If you do this I'll give you an M&M or I'll beat you if you don't."

Motivating children has become a task teachers should be conscious of in a world where youngsters spend hours before a television set daily, he says.

McKinley said the PCEA has been asking for additional bargaining sessions but the board team has refused, claiming they can't schedule any more time during the week. "Right now we are scheduled through Aug. 15. Time is running short."

"Evidently the administration is not concerned about having a contract. Money is last on the administration's agenda because they want to settle on contract language first."

Kee commented: "The fact McKinley doesn't like the attorneys and feels bargaining is moving too slow because of them is just a smokescreen. We met more in July than we ever have in the past."

"And it's important to remember that it's not the number of times you meet that yields results — it's just not true that the more we meet the more progress we'll make."

"Both sides call for caucuses — that's part of bargaining — and both sides meet before and after negotiations to review."

"We have a new team, which may have slowed things at the very beginning," said Kee. "Not one member of our team bargained for us three years ago. We've had problems in the past with the PCEA coming up with a new team. But things are moving forward well now."

"It's true that some things are not happening now in the same way as they did in the past. Our attorneys may do some things differently but it's not for them to say how we should do things."

Sweet teeth sour, candy sales dip

Candy is dandy, but maybe not as dandy as it used to be. Americans aren't eating as much of it any more.

Last year, says the U.S. Department of Commerce, we each consumed only 14.9 pounds of chocolate and other candies. That's down from 15.4 pounds per American in 1977.

Nobody yet knows why we are consuming less, but the National Geographic News Service wonders whether:

- We think we are eating as much candy as ever, but are fooled by the ever-shrinking American candy bar.
- The American sweet tooth is going sour, victim of celery sticks and other health foods.
- Dieting fans and nutritionists are making their weight felt.
- Dentists are gradually getting their way, just as the nation's kids have always feared.

CANDY MAKERS, far from being tongue-in-cheek about any of this, don't sound worried. The country's 15,000 chocolate candy stores report their best-ever sales for Christmas, St. Valentine's Day, Easter and Mother's Day.

Beyond that, candy makers hope they may soon be able to announce that "Chocolate is good for your teeth."

Volunteers in Boston are munching away in the interest of science, checking out test-tube research suggesting there is something in chocolate — a heat-resistant, water-soluble protein which in the language of toothpaste, "fights dental decay."

If it's true, candy makers speculate, perhaps this wonder substance could be added to non-chocolate candy to help protect against cavities. Candy makers, incidentally, spend each working day alternately tasting batches of their production and brushing or rinsing their teeth.

MEANWHILE, candy lovers everywhere keep demonstrating "how sweet is it." World's champion candy eaters are the British, who are fond of gobbling toffees, licorice bootlaces, bulls' eyes, sherbet dabs, and jelly babies.

"Behind their mythologically stiff upper lips," a dentist wrote the London Times about his fellow Englishmen, "hang some of the sweetest, rottenest teeth in the world."

The Bottom Line Deductions lost

The Internal Revenue Service recently has ruled that two types of medical expenses are not deductible, and that a third group of expenses may be considered medical in nature and, therefore, deductible.

The two areas which the IRS said deductions may not be claimed by a taxpayer concern the cost of programs to help individuals stop smoking or lose weight.

In both cases the programs were used by the taxpayer on the recommendation or suggestion of his physician.

While no specific ailment or disease was cited as the reason for the weight loss or the cessation of smoking, such action would improve the individual's general health and sense of well-being.

IRS ruled that because weight loss and the cessation of smoking only lead to general good health, neither program would be deductible.

BECAUSE THE IRS's decision, in both cases, argues the fine point that the program was used for general health, we would recommend that if you planned to participate in this type of program, your physician should recommend it for specific health ailments.

Your physician should be able to point to specific medical

reasons why you should lose weight or stop smoking. Under these circumstances, we feel that the deduction would be legitimate.

Be aware, however, that the IRS may challenge such a deduction if they audit your return. Though you are likely to prevail, such a course is not without some risk.

If an employer tells an employee to shape up or ship out, it is likely that the deduction for the weight reducing program can be taken as a business expense.

THE FINAL medical condition which IRS recently has expounded upon concerns lead paint poisoning.

With the increased migration of people back to older buildings in cities, this ruling could prove a boon to those persons rehabilitating older structures.

In essence what IRS said is that the cost of scraping lead paint areas accessible to children would be deductible as a medical expense. The repair of surfaces not readily accessible to a child would not be deductible.

If you suspect that areas of your home have, in the past, been painted with a lead base paint, you should confirm this suspicion with the assistance of your local health department.

With confirmation in hand you can proceed to scrape and remove the old lead paint and refinish. Because this hazard exists only in older housing which is likely to need repainting anyway, keep this situation in mind as a future deductible expense.

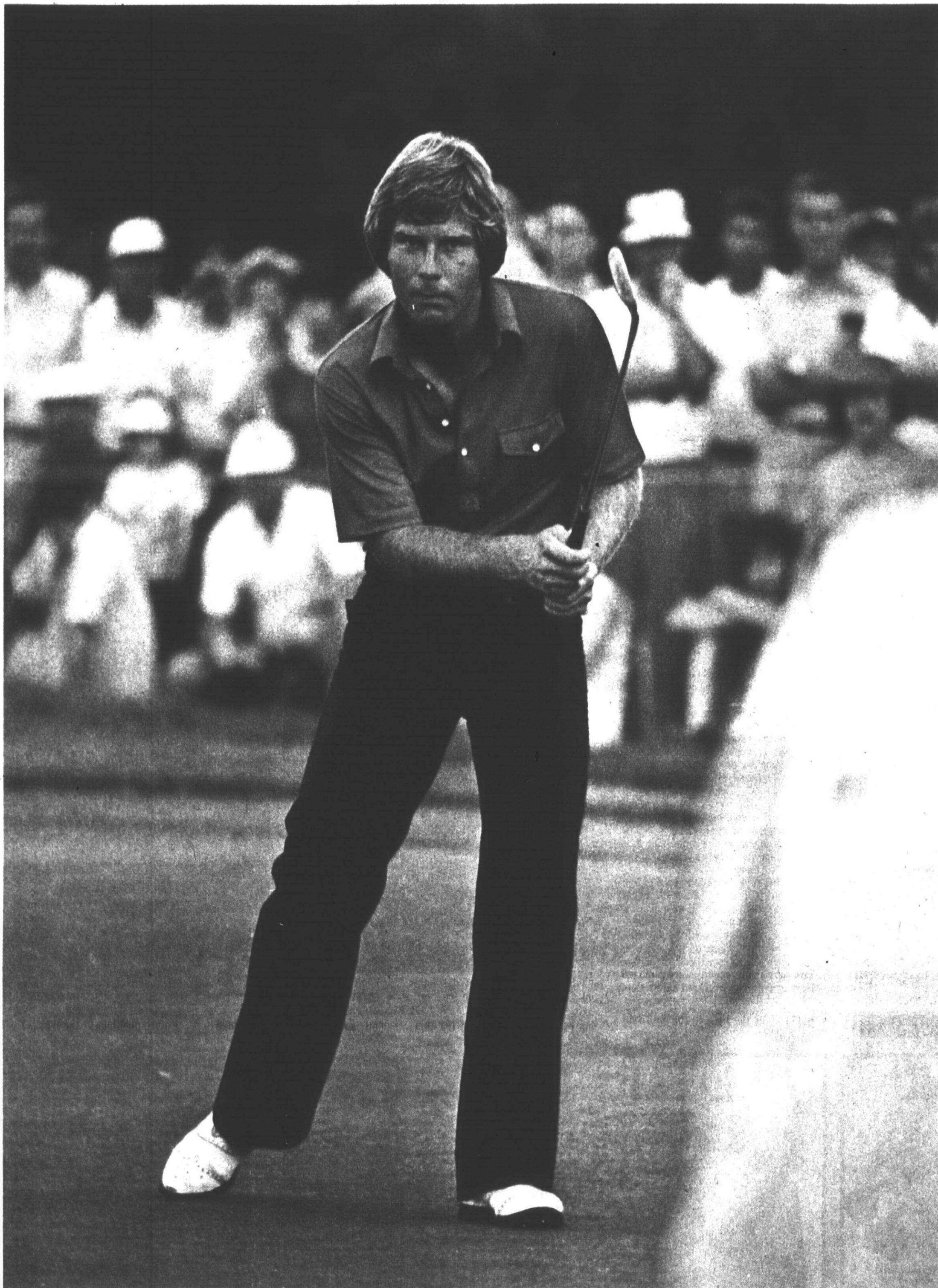

145,102 see PGA

The "Monster" may have been tamed during PGA week, but that didn't hurt the attendance or revenue for Oakland Hills.

PGA officials yesterday afternoon said Oakland Hills attendance set a tournament record — despite inclement weather — for a golf event. Reports released Sunday indicated that 145,102 persons came to Oakland Hills during the week. The previous record was 114,252 for the 1972 PGA on the same course.

Spectators by day were: 3,572 Monday; 7,061 Tuesday; 18,742 Wednesday; 20,264 Thursday; 25,526 Friday; 34,368 Saturday, and 35,569 Sunday.

And those figures translate to added income via programs, hot dogs and beer sold during the week. Don Graham, director of Oakland Hills' Finance Committee, said, "This PGA will be more profitable than the 1972."

Proceeds from the 1972 PGA were used to build an addition to the club house.

Graham estimated that Oakland Hills would gross \$2.25 million from the event. This amount comes from tickets, advertising in the program and parking.

Major expenses because of the tournament will come from making repairs to the north course, where cars were parked, according to Graham. Graham also said that extensive maintenance work must be done to the south course, where the championship was held.

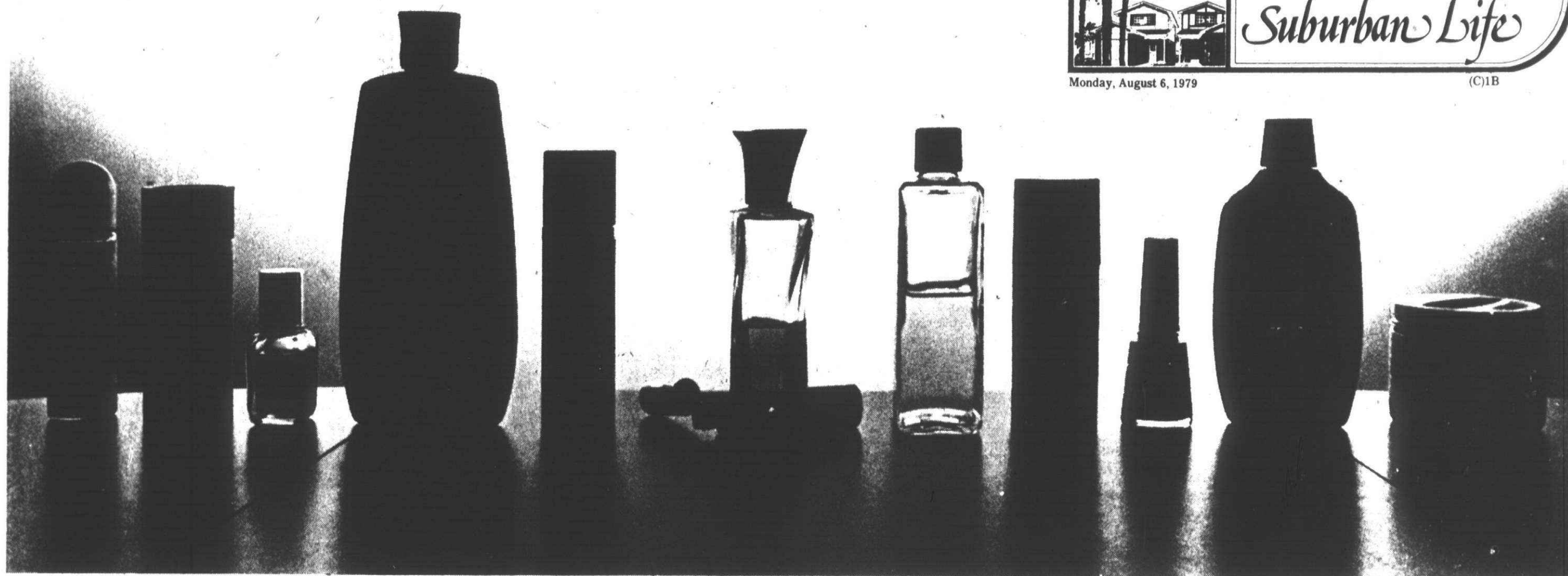
Graham said it was too early to estimate how much money Oakland Hills would gain from the championship.

Baby soft not enough, FDA says

You may be content if your cosmetics "make you feel baby soft all over." But that doesn't satisfy the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Its staff must make sure they are also safe, said Diane Place of the consumer affairs department of the Detroit FDA office.

"Cosmetics should be prepared from appropriate ingredients," she said. "If we investigate a cosmetic plant and find that lye is being put in the products, we would consider it an inappropriate ingredient."

Finding such an ingredient would galvanize FDA into a number of

actions, from asking for a recall to going so far as to prosecute the manufacturer in federal court.

Her speech on cosmetics was addressed to members of the Wayne County Association of Extension Homemakers in the First United Methodist Church of Garden City. It covered both cosmetics and over-the-counter drugs, both of which are more connected than most people suppose, she said.

"Cosmetics must be safe and made of appropriate ingredients. Drugs sold without prescription must be safe and effective for their intended use. If they say it cures a headache, it must fulfill this therapeutic claim," she said.

If it changes a body function, it is also a drug. An anti-perspirant which stops perspiration is a drug. A deodorant which prevents odor is a cosmetic. The cosmetic industry can thereby promise you anything in the way of sexiness, skin as soft as a baby's bottom or shining hair. But if a product claims to grow eyelashes, the product becomes a drug and must be able to back up its promises.

THE FDA WORRIES about two aspects of cosmetic safety, the ingredients and how clean they can be kept.

"Some hair dyes contain coal tar," said Ms. Place. "FDA has no jurisdiction over coal tar. It doesn't have to be safe, and it is not safe. It has been regarded as a possible cancer cause if absorbed by the skin. But all the products have to have a special warning."

All other hair dyes are regulated. Two substances recently were removed from them to make them safer. Congress is now considering laws that would allow the FDA to regulate coal tar in dyes.

The most dangerous cosmetic in terms of contaminants is mascara, opined the speaker.

"When you take it from a tube with a brush, the brush touches the eyelashes, which are full of bacteria," she said. That's why the eyelashes are there, to keep bacteria out of the eyes.

"The bacteria on the brush is immediately transmitted from the brush back to the mascara. You should throw your mascara out after six months."

She said that one can get a disease from contaminated mascara that can cause almost total blindness. However, that is rare, she said.

"Cosmetics should be kept clean," she said with emphasis. "Every time your hand goes into your cream, unless the hand is scrubbed, you are introducing bacteria to the cream."

"Keep your hands clean and keep the cream out of the light and heat."

Tubes, she thinks, are the ideal containers. She also likes a spout.

Ms. Place also warned her listeners about carrying mascara eye pencils in their handbags. The tips come off, making them more dangerous. She added that eye doctors regard as unsafe a new fad of penciling in a line above the lower lashes.

MAKE YOUR OWN cosmetics, she suggested. "You can find a cheap face cream in Crisco or Spry," she said, adding, "I wouldn't prefer it."

"You can use vegetable oil, mineral oil or olive oil. The moisturizer is water. The cream is used to hold the water in. The heavier the cream, the better it holds it in."

"Vaseline is a fine cream. It's the cheapest, a great lubricant and a great sun cream."

A member of the audience shared her interest in "making" cosmetics at home. She said: "My face looked like a steamroller in the morning until I started giving it a good rub with Lava soap."

Ms. Place decided that particular method was based on the principle of abrasion. "If it works, fine," she said. She was also questioned about the use of paraffin in removing wrinkles. "It won't do a thing," she answered. "Some wrinkles a plastic surgeon couldn't remove."

She recommended keeping the skin lubricated, in the fight against wrinkles. Also keep out of the sun. "It is hard on the skin and will age you faster than anything," she added.

She told her audience that buying mouthwash was a big waste of money, that toothpaste is less abrasive on the teeth than tooth powder, and "there is no such thing as a hypo-allergenic cosmetic." Formulas to define the latter have been thrown out of court.

At one time, a manufacturer had to prove that his hypo-allergenic product triggered significantly fewer reactions than another product "which did not claim to be hypo-allergenic, and had at least 10 percent of market sales." A judge rejected this confusing formula saying it was hard to comply with and hard for the FDA to enforce.

SHE REGARDS the listing of ingredients on cosmetics as helpful in several ways.

"It helps a person who is allergic avoid a product containing a substance which troubles them. It also allows consumers to compare contents of similar products, and pick the one that is least expensive, providing they like the perfume equally."

She warned against the use of

cosmetics with aerosol sprays. "Remember it is putting particles in the air which you are breathing," she said. "You are also paying extra for the spraying when you might be able to dispense the cosmetic in a more economical way."

Permanent waves can be dangerous, she said, because of a possible reaction from the chemicals used.

"You can use a brand for years but because of some change in your body, you have a reaction," she stated. Occasionally a manufacturer may change to a different formula, which may give a person a rash.

THE OVERSIGHT of thousands of over-the-counter drugs has been so formidable that FDA recently established 17 committees to write an official recipe for various drug categories. Thus, to be acceptable, an ingredient must be safe and effective as an antacid, pain killer or antiseptic. "Any other ingredients are out," she said.

She pointed out that all the panels have turned in their report except for the one dealing with miscellaneous external and internal non-prescription drugs. She hopes this will be completed soon because it deals with the more "far out" kinds of products, such as weight pills, thumb sucking remedies, wrinkle removers and hair straighteners.

"These are the categories where you are most likely to find ineffective or quack products," she said.

Future meetings of the Wayne County Association of Extension Homemakers will involve updating wardrobes, and furniture refinishing and antiquing. Wardrobe updating will be from 9:30-11:30 a.m. Saturday, April 28, with June Grossbart of Wayne State University.

Here's how to use cosmetics safely

Women have been patting on makeup and coloring their hair ever since they discovered the juice of the berry could be used for purposes other than food. Today cosmetics is a \$5.4 billion business in this country. It is regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, which has some practical suggestions about cosmetic safety.

•Read the label carefully and follow directions exactly. This is especially important when using antiperspirants, hair-removing preparations, hair dyes and color, home permanents and skin packs.

•To determine if you are allergic to a cosmetic, apply a small amount to the inside of your forearm. Leave it for 24 hours. If you see any adverse effect such as redness or blisters, don't use it. For hair preparations, do a patch test, using as directed, on one small area of the hair and scalp to check for adverse reactions.

•Wash your hands before applying a cosmetic. This prevents contamination from your hands spreading to the cosmetic, and possibly to a sensitive part of your body. Close containers after each use. Many bacteria grow more rapidly when exposed. Never borrow anyone's cosmetics. They may be contaminated, and there is no way to tell if this is the case just by looking.

•Don't spit into your cosmetics. Germs in saliva grow rapidly in new environments outside the mouth.

•Don't expect a product to do the impossible. For instance, a sunscreen preparation cannot protect you indefinitely from harmful effects of the sun. Even if you don't burn, you can become quite sick from overexposure to the sun.

•Remember no product is foolproof against allergies. Hypoallergenic means there is less likelihood of allergic reaction. But there is no way to formulate a product to which someone somewhere may not be allergic.

•Aerosol products should be used as directed on the label in well-ventilated rooms to avoid inhalation.

•Don't allow children to play for unusually long periods in bubble baths. Although bubble baths have been reformulated to be less irritating, some ingredients used to form voluminous bubbles are more irritating than soap. Follow directions exactly on amounts to be used. It may be wise to rinse children off after they have bathed in bubblebath.

•Keep cosmetics away from children. Unsteady hands, sensitive skin and creative minds can cause injury.

•When you plan to be out in direct summer sunlight, don't use colognes, perfumes or aftershaves. They can make your skin particularly light-sensitive in the applied areas and lead to blotching and irritation.

•Be extremely cautious when using cosmetics around the eyes. Use only those labeled for eye areas and be sure the products are kept clean and covered. If irritation develops, see a doctor immediately. Make sure any instrument you place in the eye area is clean. Don't allow eye makeup to become covered with dust or contaminated with dirt or soil. Wipe off the container with a damp cloth if dust or dirt is present.

•Don't use old containers of eye cosmetics. If you haven't used the product for several months, it's better to discard it and buy a new one. Avoid using eye cosmetics if you have an eye infection or the skin around the eye is inflamed. Wait until the area is healed.

•Take particular care in using eye cosmetics if you have any allergies. When removing eye cosmetics, be careful not to scratch the eyeball or some other sensitive area.

•Report any adverse effects of cosmetics to the manufacturer and to the FDA. You will be doing a public service.

'We're professionals'

Cosmetologist blasts merger

Strong opposition to a proposal that would merge licensing boards of barbers and cosmetologists is being voiced by a Livonian who has served as vice president of the Michigan Cosmetology Association.

Marcus Bass, a hairdresser who has worked in area salons since coming to this country from England in 1932, is lobbying against the move recommended by William Ballinger, licensing and regulation director, in the interest of saving money and eliminating government activity.

Such action, said Bass, would be unfair to some 69,000 cosmetologists and a disservice to the public that uses their services.

"The board of licensing for our profession was second only to the real estate board in the number of licenses issued," said Bass. "It brought three quarters of a million into the state general fund. When I speak to legislators and quote those figures, they are amazed."

Bass said he can understand the wish

on the part of state officials to institute some "sunset legislation" measures and move toward more economical practices.

"I know there are some boards that do not pay their own way from the standpoint of bringing in fees that cover the cost of board operation," he added.

"But this certainly is not true in the case of the cosmetologist."

HE ALSO MAINTAINS "it is wrong to merge two different professions under the same board of licensing."

"We are professional people," he stated, "and through the training we keep giving our members and the constant upgrading of our requirements, we feel we have a better knowledge of many facets of our business."

While both barbers and hairdressers deal with hair, he pointed out, there are differences in emphasis that need to be considered in the state boards of licensing.

"We pay more attention to chemistry, biology, scalp and hair diseases," he went on. "We also deal primarily

with female customers and have developed techniques that are better understood by examining boards with a cosmetology background."

"There are differences in the way we and the barbers conduct ourselves professionally, and we would like to keep it that way."

SOME DIFFERENCES have developed between the two groups in recent years, Bass noted. One was the matter of cosmetologists' cutting men's hair. That was settled when the state legislature passed in July 1978 a provision that a cosmetologist can cut the hair of persons of either sex.

Another difference has been affiliation in this area with Local 552 of the AFL-CIO Barber and Beauticians Union.

Most Detroit-area barbers are affiliated but very few cosmetologists are, said Bass.

But both are agreed, he said, in wanting to be considered professionals.

"We are classified in the state licensing listings as commercial services,"

Bass went on. "So are accountants, and they are mad as hell. They want to be professionals and we do too."

Bass said he had written to Licensing and Regulation Director Ballinger protesting his proposal after it was publicized.

"I received a letter from him stating there was no intention to deregulate in any way," he added. "He said he just proposed to combine the boards. But we intend to fight that all the way."

BASS WAS INVOLVED as vice president of the cosmetology association in working on its special legislative committee and helping to upgrade the licensing laws.

Illness forced him to give up some of his duties as vice president, but he has continued his legislative committee work and activity pushing the cause of the cosmetologist in Lansing.

"We feel," he insisted, "it's essential to keep our own board to maintain our professional integrity. We want to keep on friendly terms but keep our own identity."

House of horror scares up yawns instead of frights

This is supposed to be the summer for scary movies — "Alien," "Dracula," "Prophecy," "Nightwing" and the like. Perhaps such a generous supply of suspense, sci-fi and the supernatural is just too much of a good thing. Perhaps it just conditions one to shocks. Or, maybe, "The Amityville Horror" (R) simply doesn't have any. I've faced greater terror at the checkout stand at the supermarket.

People who dote on spooky events may be satisfied best with Jay Anson's fast-selling book, a fictional-factual concoction about demonic forces lurking inside a house where a family was murdered.

The factual part is that George and Kathleen Lutz moved into a house on Long Island in which Ronald De Feo, one year earlier, murdered his parents, brothers and sisters. ("You won't find another house like this on the market," the real estate saleswoman says.)

The Lutzes say they spent 28 days in the house before making a hasty exit and telling their story to Ahson who wrote the book on which the movie is based. William Weber, De Feo's attorney, claims the Lutzes' stories were developed "over many bottles of wine."

BELIEVE WHAT YOU WILL. What you see are two hours of predictable hocus-pocus as the strange events of each day unfold: Mysterious noises and shadows, a vibrating chandelier, doors that open and close by themselves, swarms of flies, slime or blood oozing down a stairway, a well with black gunk, and so on. (Thank goodness they didn't stay in the house a year; the two-hour film is more than enough.)

As Kathleen Lutz, Margot Kidder — Lois Lane of the "Superman" movie — seems to be looking for some super-help which never comes. Husband George, as played by James Brolin, has three moods — morose, morose, and mad.

Kathleen seems to spend a lot of time in the kitchen without ever cooking anything, and George seems to spend a lot of time chopping wood and sharpening his axe. For those who don't catch on quickly, numerous close-ups emphasize the ominous nature of this activity.

Although they have just moved in, no one ever runs a vacuum or moves a dustcloth around. You would think after visitors enter the house, sniff and run out to throw up, someone might get the idea to clean the place up a bit. Instead, Kathleen looks up old newspaper accounts of the murders, and George goes to the library where he steals a book about the house.

Information about the evil nature of the place leads to the smashing climax, which occurs at night during a raging thunderstorm. Would you expect anything else?

To add authenticity, an ending note informs the audience that the Lutzes really burnt rubber getting out and left all their personal possessions behind.

What I would like to know is, did anyone ever return the library book?

5th season

Art hits the road in state exhibits

More than 100 Michigan towns and cities are preparing to host the fifth season of the "Show on the Road" art exhibitions of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Seven exhibitions will travel throughout the state during 1979-1980 as part of the museum statewide services funded by the Michigan Legislature.

"This fifth season has more variety than ever," according to Frederick J. Cummings. "The shows have high educational and artistic value," he says, "and a local entertainment quotient that keeps the arts lively in Michigan."

"Show on the Road" opens Aug. 18 at the Kresge Art Center in East Lansing with "German Expressionist Art" organized by the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts. This is the first show put together by another state museum and then traveled throughout the state under art institute auspices. All the Expressionist art in the exhibition has been loaned by museums and private collectors in western Michigan.

The six other traveling exhibitions during this coming season are "Oriental Ceramics," "Art/Book/Art," "Early Modern Art," "The Parthenon: 2500 Years of Change," "Ancient Arena: The Roman Colosseum," "Changing Face of the Sphinx," and "John Brown, Abolitionist."

Christine Ruby, art institute coordinator of statewide services, says "the exhibitions in our fifth season are sophisticated enough for art enthusiasts but also quite suitable for young people."

In addition to the seven traveling exhibitions, the art institute's statewide services provide a popular art lecturer, conservation programs, professional advice and jurying, school visitation and teacher packets for Michigan school systems, and the live stage productions of the museum's Youtheater.

The 1979-1980 schedule of the Youtheater will see 19 productions performed 350 times in 230 Michigan communities.

Playhouse comedy stars Dick Shawn

For the fifth production of its 25th anniversary season, the Cherry County Playhouse will present Dick Shawn in his comedy spoof "The Second Greatest Entertainer in the Whole Wide World."

Shawn will appear at the Traverse City theater for two weeks, Tuesday, Aug. 7 through Sunday, Aug. 19.

The show probes the mind of a down-on-his-luck comic who still has, and always will have, hopes of making it big. The first act finds Shawn in the dressing room of a second-rate night club rehearsing one liners until interrupted by the stage manager with his five-minute curtain time.

The second act is a dream sequence in which Al Schenk (Shawn's character) has finally made it big in Las Vegas, until his fantasy is again interrupted by the stage manager.

Shawn carries the show almost alone accompanied only by the character of the stage manager and a myriad of special effects such as several large dummies which magically manage to make music.

The museum is open during the regular hours of historic Fort Wayne, which are 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday and 11:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Sunday.

No admission fees are charged over the regular fort admission (\$1) for adults, 50 cents for senior citizens and teenagers, and 25 cents for those under 12. Free parking is available.

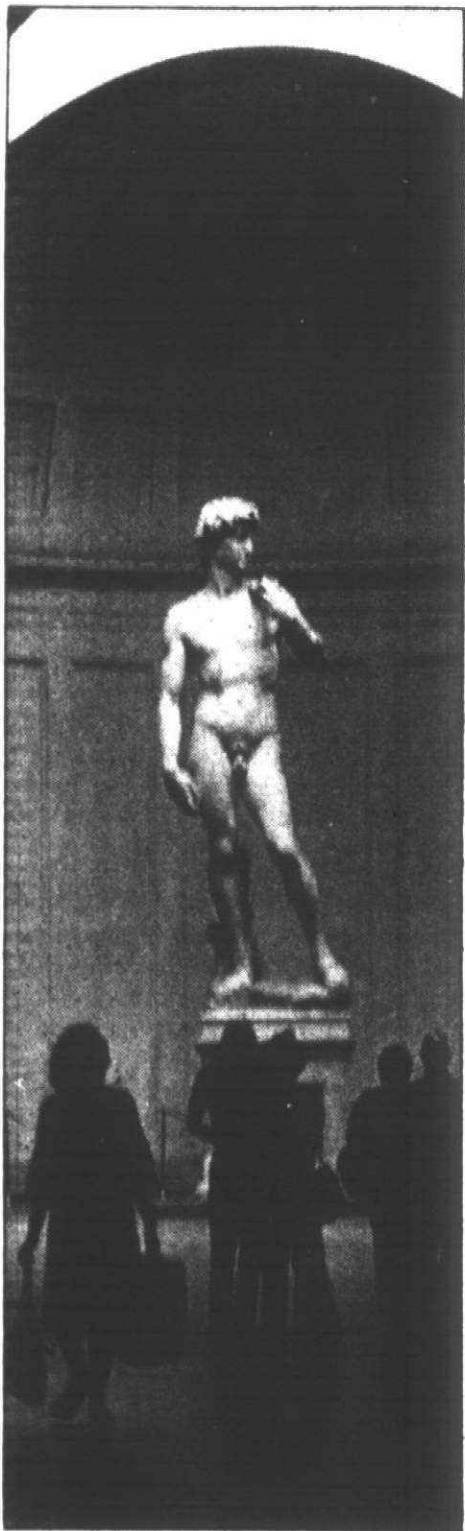
Michelangelo's city truly a cultural capital

FLORENCE, Italy — The small boy chases pigeons across the Piazza del Duomo. Tourists sit on the steps of the great cathedral facing the square while lovers embrace against the great bronze door on the baptistry. Four pigeons steal corn from the vendor's box placed in the plaza between the church and the baptistry.

The work of great artists is all around us, and we will savor it as the day warms, but the lifebeat of this plaza is people and pigeons, people and pigeons.

THE CITY HAS been here since 100 years before Christ, and the



Statue of David stands in the Galleria dell'Accademia, a testimony to Michelangelo's genius.

Cathedral of Santa Maria del Fiore was built in the 13th century, but some things cross the boundaries of time and space. People and pigeons are two of them.

Travelers who rush in and out of this experience in the cathedral square will certainly miss it. They may see the great bell tower and Michelangelo's Pietà but they will miss everything else. To enjoy this great city, you must sit for a while on the cathedral steps and let the pigeons do the flying.

Florence, or Firenze as the Italians call it, straddles the Arno, a middle-sized river that empties into the sea near Pisa. As you approach Firenze by train, cream stucco buildings with red tile roofs crowd the landscape all the way into the tracked wilderness of the main railroad station.

There is a 20th century pandemonium on the streets as the morning crowds rush towards lunch. Cars and motorbikes race between crowds jamming the sidewalks near small beautiful shops, and outdoor cafes where Florentines linger over their morning coffee.

As you approach the Piazza del Duomo, you see a corner of Giotto's bell tower first as it rises in a square white shape above the city buildings. Soon a slice of the Duomo, literally the dome, fills the end of the street, growing larger as it fills the whole world of your vision with its splendor.

Camera bugs press back against doorways, trying to get far enough away to capture it all: the carved front of the church, the huge dome behind, the high tower beside and the octagonal shape of the baptistry, which faces the cathedral door across the plaza.

People squat on the cathedral steps, crowd the great bronze baptistry doors and the horse-carriages, and delight themselves anew every day with the pigeons. The pigeon man, bored over his box of corn amid a sea of birds, pours corn into a woman's hand and raises it high. The pigeons flutter around her while her husband takes a picture.

IN THE GREAT, cool stillness of the cathedral, a service goes on between the arched pillars and crowds gather around the Pietà, an incomplete marble carving that Michelangelo intended for his own tomb.

Against the wall, video screens tell the story of the cathedral in four languages. Here you can plan your tour through the splendors of these buildings: a climb up the high dome so that you can overlook the city; another climb up Giotto's bell

tower; a visit into as many nooks and crannies as you can see in one visit.

Here you will see the works of great artists who had until now only been names to you: Donatello, Brunelleschi, Botticelli. Florence is the very heartbeat of great European art.

Pigeon lovers enjoy the art, as the artists themselves probably did, among the bustle of the city itself. Have cannelloni or crepes with a little white Chianti in a restaurant near the square. Note the plaque, shoulder high, where the disastrous floods of 1966 rose above the priceless artifacts.

When you have chased the pigeons, and ridden around town in a carriage, walk three blocks up the Via Ricasoli to the Galleria dell'Accademia where Michelangelo's statue of David is waiting to take your breath away.

There are many concrete reproductions of the David around the city, but nothing prepares you for the first sight of the real thing as it becomes visible down a long gallery of unfinished work by the old master.

Warning! Check the opening and closing times carefully and go at least one hour before the Academy closes. They stop selling tickets an hour before closing time, leaving many frustrated tourists fuming angrily at the door.

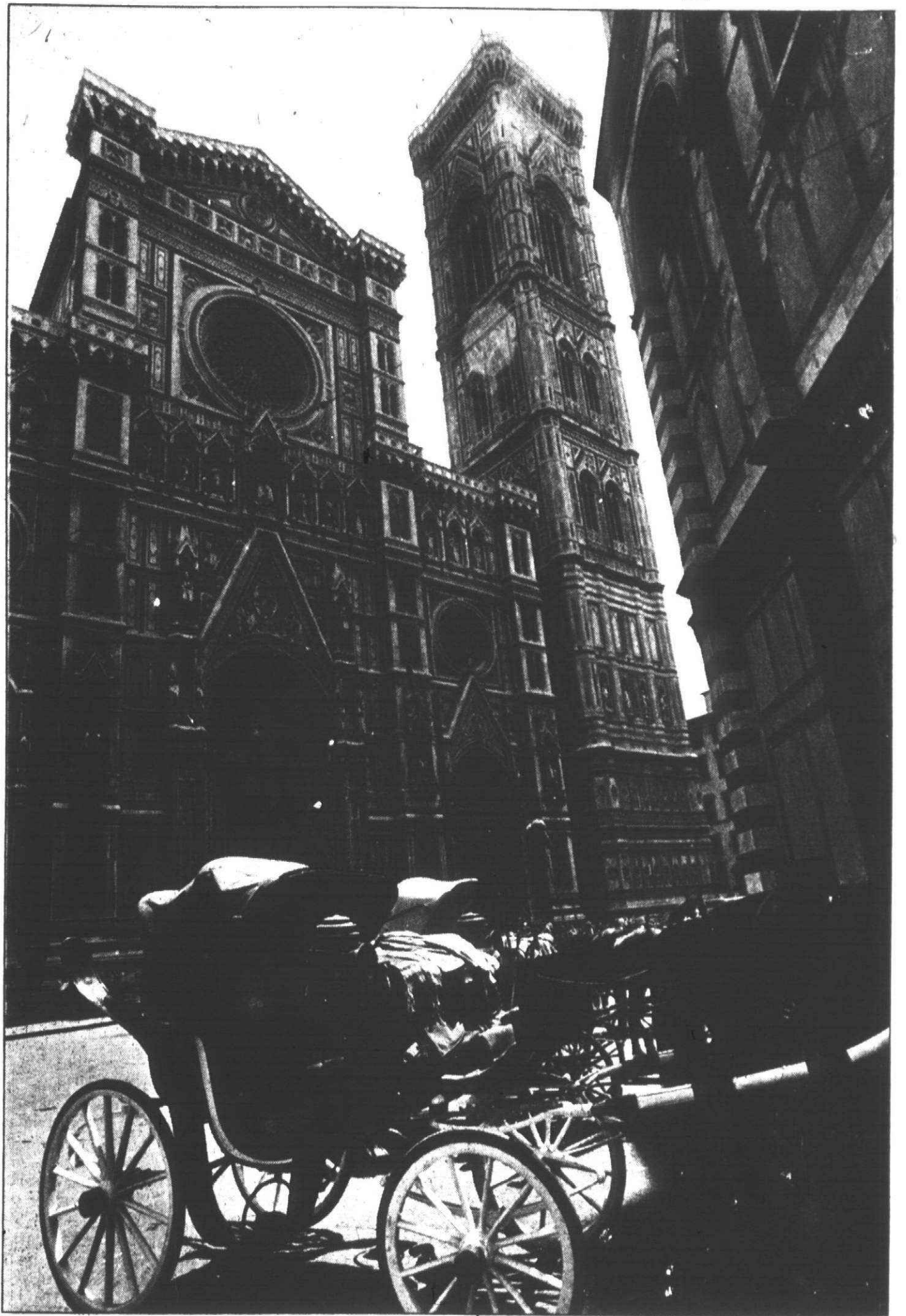
A few blocks on the other side of the Duomo is another pigeoned people place, the Piazza della Signoria. This is the site of the Palazzo Vecchio and the Uffizi gallery, a great sunlit open place surrounded by sidewalk cafes.

A couple of blocks away is the city market and the marvelous bronze boar with its nose rubbed shiny gold by passing children.

There are many things to do in Florence. Any guide book will tell you about the great churches, palaces and museums. If you like a touch of all that in a grand array of people experiences, walk through the sidewalk stalls from the Piazza della Signoria to the bank of the Arno and across the famous Ponte Vecchio, the bridge of jewelers.

A short taxi ride away, high up on a hill above the city, eat ice cream and watch the sun go down on the red, red roofs of Florence. The roof of the cathedral dominates it all, sitting there in sunset splendor with pigeons flying around its edges.

This high plaza is called the Piazzale Michelangelo. It's full of yellow balloons, people and pigeons.



Santa Maria del Fiore, St. Mary of the Flowers, defies even the widest of photographers' lenses. When you've seen the Duomo's pink and green marble exterior and stunning mosaics, you've visited the third

largest cathedral in Europe. And if you've also seen the two largest, your trio consists of Peter (in Rome) Paul (London) and Mary (Florence).

A crafty place indeed

The famous Ann Arbor Art Fair is over. So is the almost-as-famous medieval festival that followed it a week later. But Michigan still has dozens of art shows and festivals scheduled between now and Labor Day.

The fuel shortage is keeping travelers closer to home this year, so in-state festivals are a good way to spend a fuel-conscious summer weekend.

A booklet called "Michigan '79 Arts and Crafts Fairs and Festivals" is published every year by the Michigan Council for the Arts and can be obtained from their offices at 1200 Sixth Street in Detroit.

It's published early enough to satisfy crafts people who want to enter their creative work in these shows, and it covers enough ground to be useful to travelers right through the end of the year.

The Bay County Fair and Youth Exposition started today, in Bay City and will run through Aug. 11. Right on its heels is the Decatur Day and Ethnic Festival in downtown Decatur, Aug. 10 and 11.

The Holland Friends of Art and the Holland Recreation Department are sponsoring Art in the Park in Centennial Park, Holland, Aug. 11. Closer to home, the Keatington Art Festival will be held in Keatington Antique Village in Lake Orion Aug. 11 and 12.

If you are going into the Upper Peninsula, the Sault Area Arts Council will hold the Sault Summer Arts Festival in Sault Ste. Marie Aug. 14 and 15.

Some of the arts and craft displays are shown at county fairs such as the one held at Mt. Morris in Genesee County, Aug. 14-19. Others are as ethnic as the Danish Festival Arts and Crafts show on Main Street in Greenville Aug. 17-18.

Still others honor a single bit of Michigan produce like the Montrose Blueberry Festival Arts and Crafts Fair in the Village Park at Montrose Aug. 18 and 19. You may not know that Michigan is known nationwide for its blueberries.

The Dowagiac Chamber of Commerce and the Dowagiac Artist Guild are the contacts for the Dowagiac Artist Guild Arts and Crafts Show in the city park in Dowagiac Aug. 18. The Kalamazoo Valley Art Association sponsors the Milham Park Art Show on the same date in Kalamazoo, with Aug. 25 listed as a rain date just in case.

The biggest fair of them all is just down the road from us Aug. 24 to Sept. 3 when the Michigan State Fair comes to town.

You'll find these arts and crafts shows going on all over the state through the fall. August candidates include the Arts Fete at Dodge Park in Lansing Aug. 25-26; Art at the Center in Fenton Community Center Sept. 1 and 2; the Algonac Art Fair in the city park on the river in Algonac, Sept. 1 and 2; and Big Rapids Labor Day Arts Festival in Hemlock Park Sept. 3.

And the Lafayette Park Art Fair grandly takes over the shopping mall at the corner of Lafayette and Orleans in Detroit Sept. 8-9.

And that's just the arts and crafts fairs, not to mention the other kinds of festivals that can brighten up your life as you travel through Michigan this year.

Mandate on thermostats adds degree of comfort

In the good old days, summer was hot and winter was cold.

Then, along came efficient furnaces and air conditioning and people developed a whole new way of thinking.

It became a welcome relief from a blazing summer day to walk into a shopping mall and be confronted by the icy breath of an air conditioner.

And winter's chill faded quickly when one ducked into a toasty, warm restaurant.

Somewhere along the line, a cold building that would have become unacceptable in the winter seemed refreshing in the summer.

And overheated buildings which would be called sweltering in the summer are cozy in the winter.

Now the federal government has spoiled all that by requiring that all public buildings set thermostats at no less than 78 degrees in the summer and no more than 65 in the winter.

Once again summer is hot and winter is cold. This is a natural state, at least in this meridian.

Nevertheless, people are complaining that they can't work in such heat or that they can't bend their fingers around a pencil in 65 degree temperatures.

We have never understood the paradox of having to take a sweater along when the temperature is 90 degrees in order to combat the overzealous air conditioner; or why a warm building in winter is more comfortable than a warm building in summer.

Possibly the population at large has become conditioned to radical temperature changes whenever they enter a building.

Frankly, we have grown tired of shivering in restaurants and government buildings; of having to shed bulky winter coats while shopping; and of alternately freezing and sweating when traveling from one environment to another.

We welcome a return to normalcy. Contrary to popular belief, you won't be able to fry an egg on your desk if the office is kept at 78 degrees. You may not be able to wear as many layers of clothings to work as you used to, which should be duly noted by the powers who institute dress codes.

Now we can save the jackets and sweaters for the winter, where such garments rightly belong.

Should these words serve as no comfort for those who liked things the way they were before, we offer this suggestion. Tape pictures of winter scenes over the windows this summer and everyone will welcome the building's warmth.

You can change the pictures to beach scenes in the winter, at which point everyone will comment on how refreshing it is to have air conditioning.

I left Saturday morning for my annual voyage to the U.P. in quest of the walleye and expect to have much better luck this year, even though the "keeper" size was raised to 15 inches last year.

I'm optimistic for two reasons: First, the gasoline scare is keeping tourists out of northern Michigan and the U.P. The fewer boats on the lake, the better my chances of getting a good catch.

Another reason is a discussion I had last week with Joe Ratke from the Motor Club. Joe also goes up to the U.P. each summer after the walleye. In fact, his hunting grounds are just a few miles to the east of Indian Lake—Manistique Lake up near Newberry.

Joe, like a lot of other fishermen, believes the middle of July is the best time for walleye because the water is well warmed by then and they go down into the deep holes for feeding.

I opt for the first part of August, partly because I think the seasonal changes in Michigan are such that we can count on a late spring, late summer each year and are more likely to find mid-July conditions in early August.

But Joe seems to have more luck than I, so he may be right. This year, though, the walleye fishing was a bit slow in July. He had just returned from a couple weeks' fishing when I was talking to him and said most of his catches were the 12-13 inch variety. (Wonder if they'll grow two inches in a month?)

So Joe was going to try his luck on the St. Clair River, also an excellent spot for walleye. But I'll be thinking of Joe today while waiting for some action.

AND PATIENCE is the key to waiting for some action!

The best way to fish for walleyes is to drift over a deep hole with a night crawler harness. The shiny little spoons on the harness attracts their attention, but it doesn't guarantee success.

Just because you pass over a deep spot without a hit, it doesn't mean there's no fish there. It may take several passes to lure a walleye into action. Walleye are a smart fish, unlike their cousin — the pike.

A pike will strike fast if hungry, as soon as anything dangles by his long nose. But a walleye, even if hungry, will play around with your bait. You have to "feel" his presence near your line.

One trouble with walleye fishing, in fact, is that you always run across pike instead. I've caught many northern pike, and thrown 'em all back, while walleye fishing.

Pike are a very bony fish, hard to fillet, and rather flat in taste. But it's easy to come up with a boneless fillet from a walleye, which also is one of the tastiest fish you can catch in Michigan waters.

Actually, yesterday was my first day of fishing up here but today should be The Day. The first day is a time to explore the lake, dabbling here and there to check out the holes, because in a year's time it's easy to forget where they are.

Indian Lake is a big lake, almost like a small bay. Probably 80 percent of the lake is shallow, sandy bottom. But there are some deep holes to drift over and the fishing is good with a southwest wind — if it doesn't rain. A rainstorm will stir up the lake bottom and you might as well write off fishing for two days.

That gives me two days to drive around the U.P., taking in all the scenic beauty which still is in an unspoiled, natural condition.

So today I'm riding the waves in a small boat hoping it doesn't rain until Thursday — the day of our big fish fry.

Fuming about gas crisis

At cocktail parties lately, Larry Troy has been badgered worse than funeral directors about his chosen line of work.

Troy, of Troy, owns one of the highest volume gas stations in the state. It's in Southfield, on the corner of Eight Mile and the Southfield expressway.

Bucking the current trend, Troy's Shell station is usually open 24 hours a day and even has a service bay. Remember those? Last year Troy sold 2.5 million gallons of gas from the station and took in more than \$2 million in cash.

Over the years he's been shot at and robbed. He's got a '78 Bronco pockmarked with buckshot to prove it. He figures the only thing that saved him was that he happened to drop a bank satchel on the ground and was stooping to pick it up when the shot was fired.

It wasn't the first time. An employee of his was gunned down on the driveway in 1975 during a robbery attempt. A tow truck driver was bearded with a chain by a man who was mad because his car wouldn't start.

HE HAS TO put up with people "who all claim to be loyal customers" bringing in "a kid's rotten old bicycle tire."

"I end up putting six patches on it and then I hear 'Are you going to charge me for this Larry? I buy all my gas from you.' Oh, boy, that's terrific. A million people drive on Eight Mile each way every day. I gotta lotta loyal customers. More than I can service."

Troy's used to being reamed out by customers who blame him for the failure of a headlamp. After all, they brought the car in for a tune-up the day before.

But lately Troy's been on the receiving end of a heavy verbal barrage. It comes from customers who aren't happy about filling up their tank and getting a five back in change from a twenty.

No aggravation holds a candle to the heat Troy receives about the high price of gas.

It's not that he doesn't appreciate the business. It's just that he's a little touchy about being blamed for the oil price crisis and the scanty allocations. He's just as mad, maybe more, at the oil companies and federal government over the allocation set-up. After all, it's affecting his livelihood.

emergencies.

The suit was dropped last week when the feds released 3 percent of the 1974 statewide allocation and ordered equal distribution to the state's service station owners. For Troy, 3 percent equals 8,000 more gallons monthly. "It means I'm open Sundays."

Until the threat of a lawsuit, 5 percent was being set aside for emergencies and dealers had to fill out federal forms to get more than their allocation. Now 2 percent of the 1974 state allocation is being held in reserve for emergency sale to police and fire departments in the state.

Before that action, Troy made a good case for fraud on the part of jobbers. Dealers in the metropolitan Detroit area got suspicious about areas where gas was plentiful, Troy said, and demanded access to public records of gas transactions.

Troy said they discovered one small independent gas station chain in Detroit bought a large purchase from a Flint jobber earlier this year.

Troy says much of the 5 percent that was being set aside for emergencies was ending up in the possession of independent gas suppliers or "jobbers" who made a quick profit on the gas.

By claiming their area dealers were experiencing a hardship supplying public service agencies, Troy says jobbers would receive an increased allocation and end up with more gas than they could sell at the upstate stations.

The jobber makes 4.5 cents per gallon of gas sold to dealers, Troy said. With an excess 100,000 gallons, they've made a quick \$4,500 bucks in the name of energy conservation.

Because there are only two officials in the Lansing office of the Department of Energy, Troy said the phone number is always busy. Besides, he figures the feds were probably swamped with work and too busy to check out the legitimacy of hardship claims.

He feels the new set-up is fair and "is working a lot better." But Troy is still trying to convince the Department of Energy to establish a system that guarantees at least one dealer in a large city is open on weekends "so the consumer knows somebody'll be out there."

So far he's gotten nowhere on that suggestion. Government officials tell him the mechanics of such a plan would be too unwieldy. Troy laughs and holds up reams of required paperwork and asks how a grocer would like posting a sign on his shelf stating how much he could charge for a can of peas.

Most parents have their favorite stories about their children's escapades through the years and maybe most kids have stories about their folks. I know mine do.

Recently, Bruce, Lauren and Elaine, my three offspring, tease me by saying: "Careful or she'll quote you."

And let's face it, I'm guilty occasionally of using their words to make a point.

But through the years, their favorite thing to tease me about was that old family anecdote of "mom and the flag."

It's almost 20 years since I was a wet-behind-the-ears president of a Jewish War Veteran Auxiliary. We had about 50 members and I was their "Once and fearless leader."

RUNNING around the area on the dozens of chores my presidency and my children generated, I noticed several times that there was no flag flying on the large pole at the Huntington Woods City Offices.

For weeks I watched and became more irritated. A large flagpole at the seat of government in my city — and no flag.

One morning I phoned the city and asked if they had a flag. They did. Then I said: "Then I want to be put on the agenda of tomorrow's council meeting."

That was all right with the secretary. But after making the arrangements, I got a quick call back from the city manager.

He wanted to know what it was I wanted to speak about. And I told him about my distress that the city flew no flag.

City officials explained that they simply had no one person to stick with the job of raising the flag each morning. But I told them they had better find someone — and soon.

They did. And ever since, the American flag flies proudly every day in Huntington Woods. And they

have a standing offer that my auxiliary will replace the flag when it wears out.

For the first few weeks after my encounter with city officials, every time we got in the car, Bruce, Lauren and Elaine, then 6, 7, and 8, would insist we go by the city offices.

"THERE IT IS," they would exult, when they spotted the flag. "Mom's flag. There it is."

And if we had any else in the car with us, the children would explain my patriotic campaign to have that flag flown.

And when I went to the city offices for anything for months afterward, I'd hear the whispers about myself and the knowing grins, too.

Recently, I was reminded of my previous championing of Old Glory. And I realized my love affair with the stars and stripes is far from over.

The paper sent me to Grand Rapids to accept the Golden Press Award from the American Legion Auxiliary of Michigan. I felt very much at home back in the company of stalwarts of the veteran's movement.

Grace Ventland, the awards chairman took me into the large room where more than 400 auxiliary members and guests were assembled.

And there on the dais was a huge mass of American flags, more than 50 flags across a long expanse in back of the stage.

It was a scene of pure Americana, one seldom seen today except in the halls of patriotic organizations like the Legion. The moment was emotional for me. Surely, red, white and blue are the brightest and best of colors?

Being a part of that gathering gave me a warm feeling and a more complete understanding that mainstream America loves the flag as I do.

After we got home, I found myself glancing up to make sure "Mom's flag" was flying when we went by the city offices.

It was.

Tim Racer started off with a single and Meador followed with a walk. Both runners moved up to second and third base on a fielders choice. Racer then came home on a wild pitch.

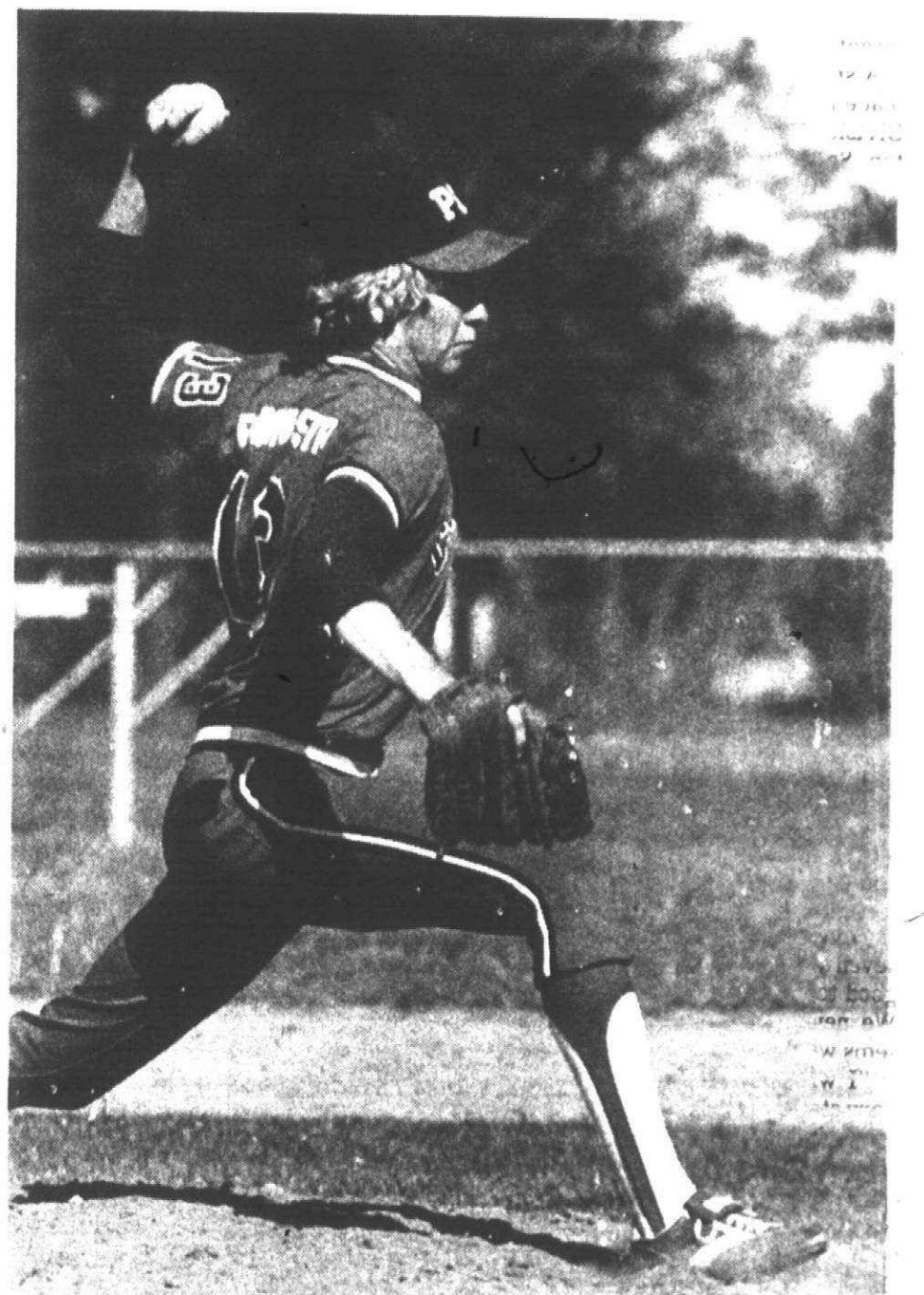
Glenwood, a 2-1 loser to Grove City, Ohio on Thursday night, regained the lead, 2-1, with a single run in the third.

"I HAVEN'T had problems with any PAL teams in four years. I know the one coach and I can't believe his behavior at the Salem field."

It doesn't quite have the appearance of a bargain-basement sale, but there is a great rush on at the area bowling establishments. It is a rush for early evening times by the league secretaries.

Spectators who saw the spectacle of the two PAL teams should not stereotype against the rest of the organization. The PAL group stresses sportsmanship. It was not evident last weekend. It's a problem that could be settled quickly by a man like Dick "Night Train" Lane, director of PAL and a member of the Professional Football Hall of Fame.

It definitely appears that two teams have momentarily spoiled something for the rest of the league. And that is respect.

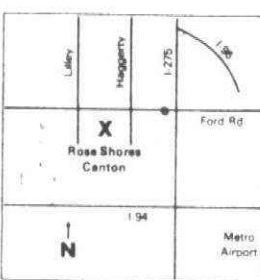

Skims Amtrak

House kills anti-busing bill

Here's how area Members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes July 19-25.

HOUSE

AMTRAK - The House rejected, 197 for and 214 against, an amendment to continue the full 27,500-mile Amtrak passenger train network for another year. The amendment was proposed to HR 3996, a bill authorizing Amtrak operations in fiscal 1980 and beyond. As later passed and sent to the Senate, the bill cuts Amtrak to 22,000 miles of rail in order to stem its massive financial losses.

Rep. Albert Gore, Jr., D-Tenn., the sponsor, said that due to shortages of gasoline, passenger train service should be kept intact for at least another year.

Rep. James Florio, D-N.J., an opponent, said that in preserving Amtrak's least-productive routes the House invites the failure of the entire system.

Members voting "yea" wanted to keep Amtrak at its present size during the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

Reps. David Bonior, D-Mount Clemens, William Ford, D-Taylor, William Brodhead, D-Detroit and James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge voted "yea."

Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth voted "nay." Rep. William Broomfield, R-Bloomfield Twp. did not vote.

STAFF INCREASE - The House voted, 214 for and 120 against, to allow

House members to enlarge their staffs by up to four part-time or temporary positions. This raises the present ceiling of 18 aides that a member can have on his personal (as opposed to committee) staff. It leaves unchanged the \$288,000 limit on salaries for a member's personal staff. The measure (H Res 359) does not require Senate concurrence and takes effect Aug. 1.

Rep. Carroll Campbell, R-S.C., a supporter, said the staff enlargement will give members "some flexibility for dealing with situations in their offices, such as a maternity leave, such as the need for a temporary employee to bring special expertise."

Rep. Lucien Nedzi, D-Mich., an opponent, said the hike "will guarantee more staff proliferation and, in its train, a requirement for more space, more furniture, more parking, and more telephones."

Members voting "yea" wanted larger personal staffs.

Pursell, Bonior, Ford, Brodhead and Blanchard voted "yea."

Broomfield voted "nay."

Roll Call Report



SCHOOL BUSING

By a vote of 209 for and 216 against, the House failed to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to approve a proposed "neighborhood schools" constitutional amendment. The measure was designed primarily to outlaw court-ordered busing to integrate schools.

Rep. Ronald Mottl, D-Ohio, the sponsor, said court-ordered busing "is a social policy imposed by an activist judiciary, and it is a mistaken social policy that is leading to the virtual destruction of public education at neighborhood schools in cities where it is used."

Rep. John Buchanan, R-Ala., an opponent, said: "The Constitution should never be amended in such a light and cavalier fashion. Would we rewrite the Bill of Rights on the floor of the House on the basis

of one or two hours of debate?"

Bonior and Brodhead voted "nay."

Members voting "nay" either favored busing or felt that amending the Constitution was an inappropriate response to the problems of busing.

Pursell, Ford, Blanchard and Bloomfield voted "yea."

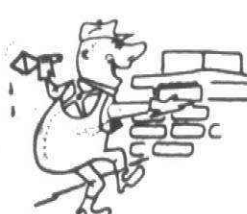

Graham tames 'Monster' for PGA crown

The "Monster" has finally been conquered, but not before giving PGA champion David Graham one last licking.

Graham won the 61st annual PGA championship at Bloomfield Township's Oakland Hills Country Club yesterday by sinking a nine-foot birdie putt to defeat a frustrated Ben Crenshaw on the third hole of a sudden-death playoff.

Graham earned \$60,000 for his first-place finish. Crenshaw took home \$40,000.

The 33-year-old Australian made a mockery of the mushy, wet greens and short rough at Oakland Hills until the final hole. He breezed along in course-record fashion with seven birdies on his final round before double-bogeying the par-4, 459-yard 18th to force the playoffs.

Graham and Crenshaw finished regulation play with identical eight-under-par scores of 272. This was the third straight year the PGA Championship has been decided by a playoff. It marked the first time in Oakland Hills' history, though, that the winning score of the four-round tournament was under par.

Graham sunk pressure-packed putts of 17 and eight feet on the first two playoff holes to stay alive in the championship. He then saw Crenshaw bogey the par-3, 202-yard third hole before calmly sinking his birdie putt for his first major title and only his fourth victory since joining the PGA tour in 1971.

"I felt like I played the first 16 holes of the golf course as well as I've played," Graham said. "I knew at the beginning it was going to be a long day. I knew I had to make a lot of birdies, and I knew it would be tough when Ben birdied the first three holes."

"I thought I was in the tournament when I started. I knew when I birdied the first two holes that I was in the thick of it."

Crenshaw, a 27-year-old Texan, seems to be making a habit of finishing second in recent action. He has finished runner-up in his last four of six tournaments.

I was fortunate to get in the playoff in the first place," Crenshaw said. "Hats off to David — when you double-bogey at 18 and still end up with a 65 in a major championship, that's one great round."

"I don't like second place worth a damn."

Graham started the final round at three under par, four strokes behind the third-round leader and eventual third-place finisher, Rex Caldwell. In addition to his first two birdies, Graham birdied the seventh, eighth, 10th, 11th and 15th holes. He missed

another birdie by two inches on the ninth hole.

Crenshaw, the second-round leader, entered the final round in second place only, two strokes behind Caldwell. Crenshaw was erratic all day, finishing with six birdies and three bogeys for a 67.

Caldwell, the Cinderella golfer of the tournament, played steady golf all day but never threatened Graham and Crenshaw after the two playoff participants passed him on the leader board. Caldwell finished the final round with a one-over-par 71 for a four-round total of 273 — seven under par and one stroke off the lead. Caldwell's third-place finish earned the Texan \$25,000.

The Oakland Hills course — nicknamed the "Monster" by tour great Ben Hogan after his three-under-par 67

which lead to his victory in the 1951 U.S. Open — wasn't the challenge to the professionals as many thought it would be.

Nine players finished with sub-par rounds. No player has ever finished with sub-par rounds in the five previous major championships at Oakland

Hills.

In fact, many PGA officials were very upset over the numerous sub-par round turned in — an uncharacteristic feature of Oakland Hills or any PGA championship course. The wet greens, plagued by constant rain all week long, played much slower than usual. The

rough was also very short for a major championship.

Tournament officials were not upset with the local turnout, however, as a new, all-time PGA attendance record of 145,102 fans — including 35,569 yesterday and 34,368 Saturday — was set, surpassing the old mark set in 1972 at Oakland Hills.

Local favorites Al Mergert and D.A. Weibring both failed to make the cut after the first two rounds were completed on Friday.

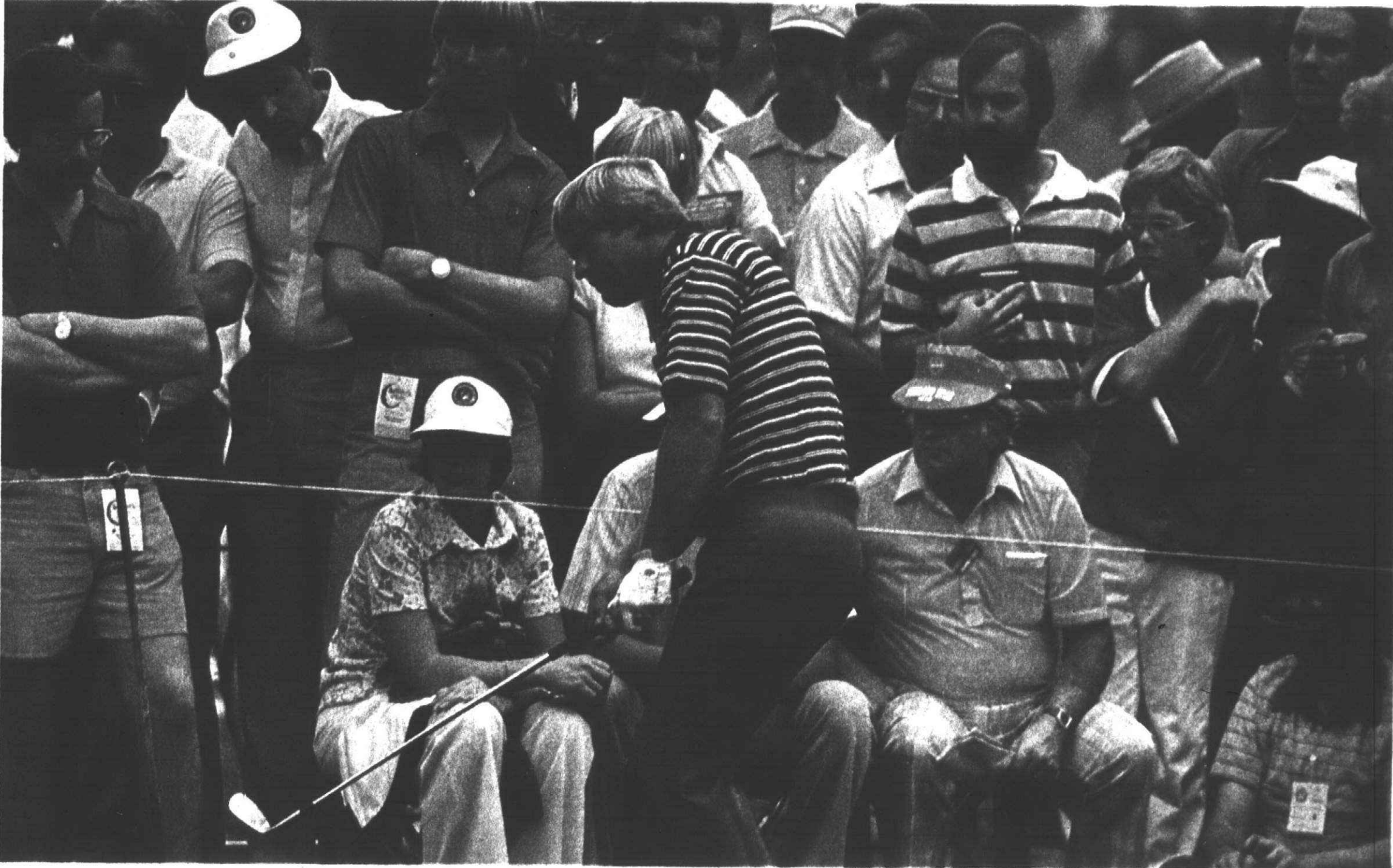
Birmingham's Mergert, the host pro at Oakland Hills, shot a 76 on Thursday but came back with a one-over-par 71 on Friday, missing the cut of 146 by only one stroke. Weibring, a former assistant at the Red Run Golf Club and winner of the Quad Cities Open two weeks ago, carded a 76-73 — 149, three

strokes from the cut.

Tom Watson, the tour's leading money winner this year with \$387,386, established himself as one of the championship favorites after his opening-round 66. He entered yesterday's action four strokes off the pace. He shot himself out of the tournament, however, when he triple-bogeyed the par-4, 413-yard 11th hole.

Jack Nicklaus, a pre-tournament favorite, turned into the forgotten man of this major event. He made the cut by three strokes, but shot an eight-over-par 78 Saturday. He finished well back with a 14-over-par 294.

Arnold Palmer experienced a horrendous first round, shooting an 11-over-par 81, which all but knocked him out of the championship. He came back with a 74 on Friday for a 155 total.

Graham gets reprieve

Friends battle in playoff thriller

Ben Crenshaw is an ardent admirer of David Graham.

Crenshaw, who lost the PGA Championship to Graham in a sudden-death playoff yesterday afternoon at Oakland Hills, is used to playing with the 33-year-old Australian.

"We're very good friends. I've played a lot of practice rounds with David," said Crenshaw, who has now finished second in four of his last five outings. "We've helped each other out a lot. It really seemed strange that we were walking down the course together in the playoff."

Crenshaw was awarded the opportunity to play for the championship when Graham double-bogeyed the 18th green. Graham went on to the last hole

in regulation action with a two-stroke lead.

However, Graham's tee-shot went off the fairway, and his second shot landed in the gallery over the green. Graham missed his chip shot to the hole and eventually scored a double-bogey — his worst single-hole tally of the tournament.

In playoff action both players parred the first hole and birdied the second. It was Graham's consistent putter which kept the playoff alive when he canned two long, pressure putts.

The par 3, 202-yard third hole finally determined the champion.

Crenshaw's first shot landed in a bunker and the second stayed on the green, but slithered well beyond the hole. His first putt circled off the hole and Crenshaw finished with a bogey four.

Meanwhile, Graham's first shot landed on the green just a few feet from the hole. He easily sank his next shot for his first major professional golf championship victory in eight years on the tour.

"I THOUGHT I had him on the first hole and the second, but he (Graham) just made the putts," said Crenshaw. "Finally, I just hit a bad shot on the third hole and that was it."

"I felt like I had it, but he had a good feel for the putter all day," he said.

It was Graham's fourth PGA tour triumph. He had previously won the Cleveland Open (1972) in a playoff over Bruce Devlin, and the Westchester Classic and American Golf Classic in 1976.

With his \$60,000 victory in the PGA, his money total for 1979 now stands at \$133,209. He has won \$658,302 as a pro-

fessional.

"The turning point was when I birdied seven and eight, then again at number 10," said Graham, a Del Ray Beach, Fla., resident. "I was in control of everything I was doing. I don't think the whole situation really hit me until I walked onto the 18th tee."

"The tee shot from the 18th was absolutely the worst shot I had all week. I had no idea where the ball finished up. I had a good lie, but I didn't know exactly how far it was to the green. And there were so many people out there I couldn't get a good angle to the green."

"I used a 6-iron, but I should have used a 7. I tried to get too cute and carry the ball on to the green. I should have just hit it short of the green. When I hit it I thought the ball was going into the clubhouse."

As it turned out, Graham went into the clubhouse a winner.

Golf fans broil like lobsters

Golf fans are like lobsters — they tend to cluster at certain points, turn red when the heat hits them, then usually end up with their tails either broiled or steamed.

But unlike lobsters, golf fans have the collective temperament of Job — they put up with more inconveniences for viewing sake than any other group of sports fans.

Why did 145,102 persons attend the PGA last week and put up with so many inconveniences when they could have stayed home and watched the championship on television?

"It's the thrill of being there," said Walter Brooks of Lansing. "You know you can watch any sport better on the tube — it's just the thrill of being there."

"We got pretty close to Jack Nicklaus," he added, "and that's worth it."

Golf personalities are a big part of a tournament's lure. Sue Atwood of Franklin said, "If you play golf and enjoy the game, it's the experience of being here and seeing the people involved... being here and seeing them firsthand."

Atwood said her favorite players were Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player and Andy Bean.

Steve Thomas of Birmingham said, "I don't think the feel of a tournament is as vibrant when you're sitting there in the living room."

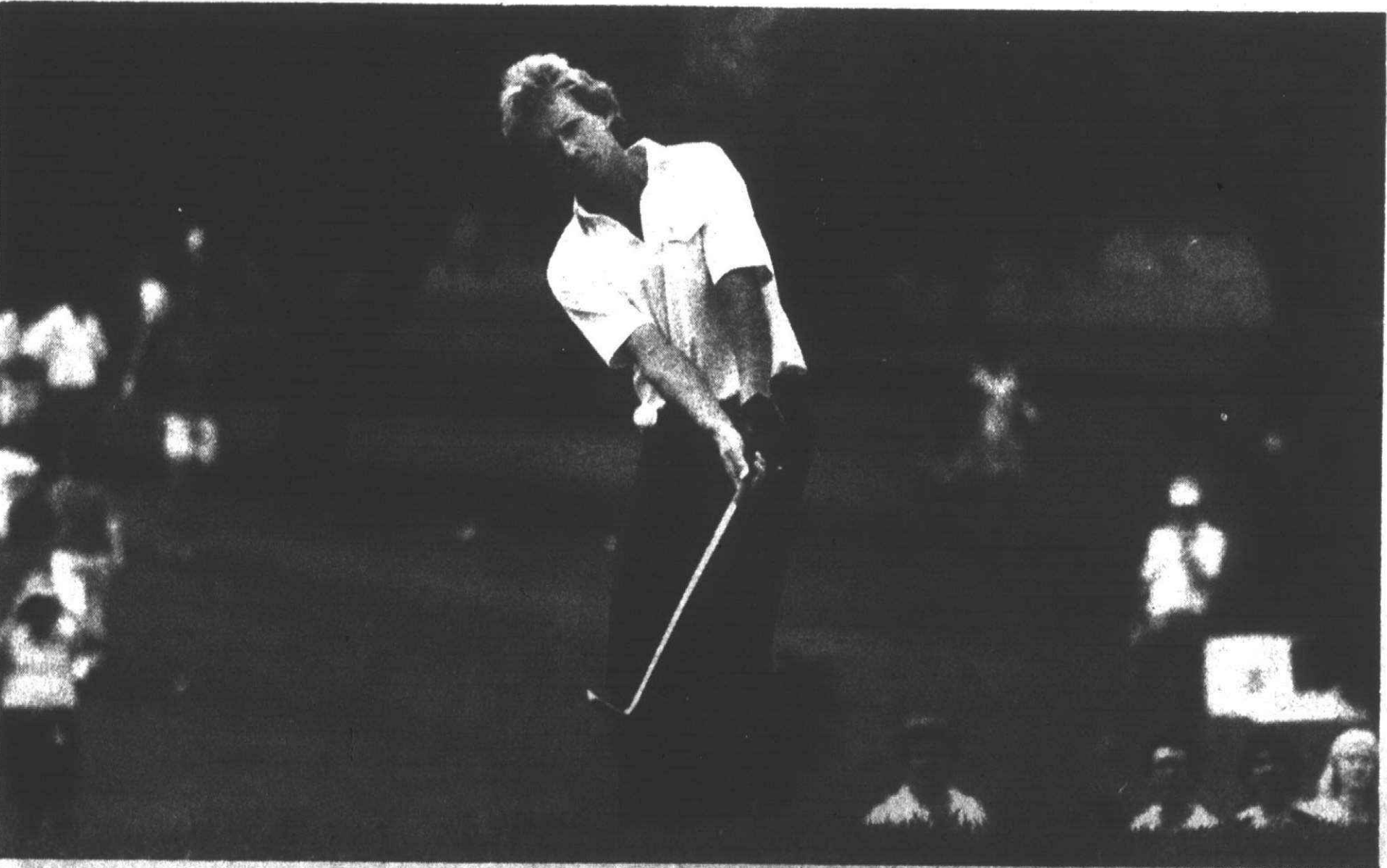
"This is the first time I've been to a golf tournament," he continued. "It's real exciting — I think I'm hooked."

While most fans put up with minor inconveniences, such as people standing in front of them, sunburn and rain, at least 60 encountered more serious problems.

Dr. Paul Trimmer of Bloomfield Hills, in charge of the first-aid trailer, said his crew treated 60 patients starting with Monday's practice round. Injuries included allergic reactions to insect bites, blisters and a fractured dislocation of an elbow.

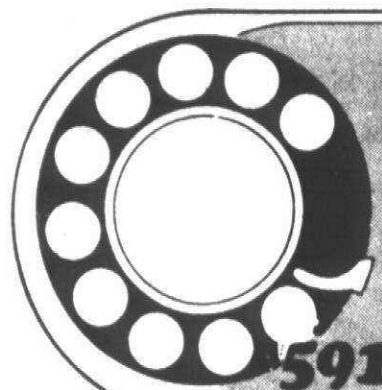
"We haven't had any real bad injuries," said Dr. Trimmer.

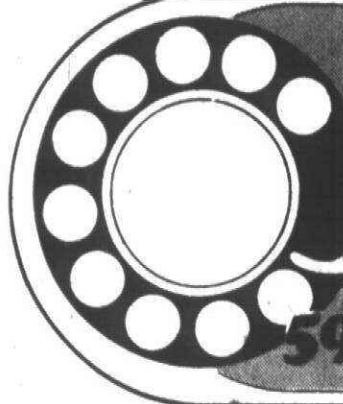

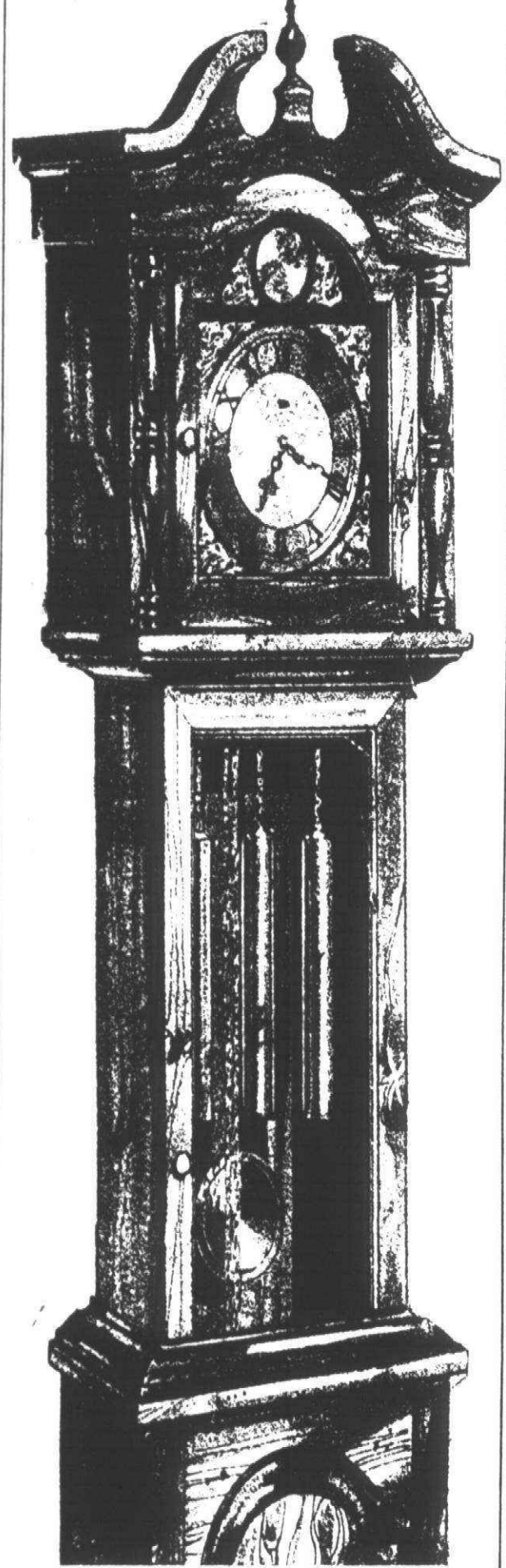

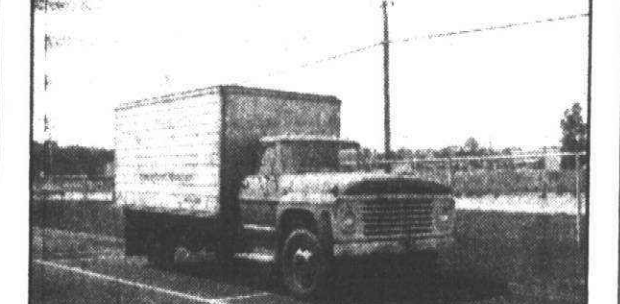
