\$21.9 million bond issue OK'd

On March 27, Plymouth-Canton voters will be asked to approve a one-half mill operating increase and 2.6 mills in debt retirement millage to allow the school district to borrow \$21.9 million for construction and renovations.

Three proposals will be on the March 27 ballot — one for \$14,623,000 for districtwide renovations and energy management projects; and a second at \$7,277,000 to construct a 40-classroom building at the Centennial Educational Park and to convert Central Middle School into use as a high school.

A third request for one-half mill operating levy is earmarked for maintenance. The half-mill (50 cents per

\$1,000 state equalized valuation) would cost the owner of a \$70,000 home, assessed at \$35,000, an additional \$17.50 per year.

If voters approve both halves of the \$21.9 million bond issue, about 2.6 mills (2.60 per \$1,000 SEV) would be needed the first year to make payments on the \$21.9 million loan. (Millage rates would drop in succeeding years as current debt is paid off.)

The 2.6 mills the first year would cost the owner of a \$70,000 home an additional \$91 per year.

THE \$21.9 MILLION bond issue request was approved Monday night by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education after three hours of debate on how

to package the offer being made to voters.

The final decisions made will allow voters to decide whether they want the present middle-school grade alignment to remain or to be re-aligned into grades 7-8-9.

The grade-alignment issue will be decided by the fate of the \$7.3 million proposal. Residents who want the 6-7-8 grade alignment should vote "yes" on this proposal. Those who will accept a 7-8-9 alignment should vote "no," ex-

plained Tom Yack, board president.

All seven trustees agree that the \$14.6 million bond will be needed regardless of grade alignment or educational programs.

The \$7.2 million includes \$5,177,000 to build a 40-classroom industrial-type building at the CE and \$2 million to convert Central into a magnet or intermediate type high school. (As a magnet high school, Central could be used as an alternative school, as a prep school for college-bound students, or some type of career center.)

THE ONE-HALF mill earmarked for maintenance is sought so that "catch-up" repairs of existing buildings won't have to be financed in the future with bond issues, Yack said.

About \$10 million of the proposed \$21.9 million bond issue is earmarked for renovations and repairs which should have been done over the past 10 years but weren't because operating funds were unavailable, officials said.

Included in the \$14.6 million issue are purchases to handle student growth at the elementary and middle-school levels.

About \$570,000 will be spent on air conditioning and other equipment that would be needed if five elementary buildings were placed on the Extended School Year (ESY) schedule. (ESY or year-round school increases a building's student-holding capacity by about one-third.)

About \$500,000 would be spent to purchase portable buildings to add classroom space as needed at middle school and elementary sites.

The \$14.6 million proposal also includes funds to equip Lowell Junior High, being rented from Livonia, for use as a middle school.

Some \$6 million, or almost half of the \$14.6 million, will be used to renovate and repair Central Middle School. The \$6 million will be used to bring Central up to code, to meet barrier-free and safety requirements, to make the building energy-efficient, and to

Police commander raise quashed by terminology

Canton Board members may need a dictionary next week to define just why six police commanders were excluded from a 12-18 percent pay package increase for department supervisors.

The board is expected to discuss the pay situation at its next regular meeting Feb. 5. Police commanders' raises were omitted from the salary hikes approved last week.

Confusion about who was responsible for recommending pay hikes rests among administrators, the Merit Commission, the Township Board and the police commanders.

The misunderstanding began last fall when the police commanders and township department heads proposed non-union "associations" for the purpose of economic discussions.

Although department heads dropped their "association plan," the police commanders understood they were to "negotiate" with township administrators.

The Merit Commission, which recommends salaries for all non-union employees, withdrew its recommendation for a police wage hike after the

commanders said they were "negotiating a contract" with the township, according to Larry Bowerman of the commission.

However several Canton officials objected to the word "negotiate."

THE MISUNDERSTANDING is largely a matter of semantics, according to Finance Director Mike Gorman, one of the township "negotiators." The township board directed the administrators last November to reach an agreement with police on wage matters.

Gorman said he thought that meant "to negotiate."

The township's 12 department heads and six police commanders asked the Canton Board last fall for recognition of the two associations they were proposing for purposes of reaching an agreement on salaries and fringe benefits.

The department heads and police commanders are the only non-unionized workers in the township. During discussions last fall, they claimed that some of their unionized subordinates

receive better pay and fringe benefits than the exempt supervisors.

The proposed associations would have negotiated pay structures, although no outside union would have been involved, they said. The supervisors insisted that they did not wish to join a union, although they recognized their legal right to unionize.

The Township Board objected to the quasi-union nature of the proposed associations, however, and declined to recognize the groups.

Instead, the board directed Clerk John Flodin, Treasurer Jim Donahue, personnel director Dan Durack and Gorman to attempt a compromise on salaries and fringe benefits with the employees.

IN THE MEANTIME, the Merit Commission formed a pay recommendation for the two employee groups.

Their recommendation for police commanders was withdrawn last week, and the Township Board approved a 12 to 18 percent increase for department heads by a 5-2 vote. Trustees Robert Greenstein and Steve Larson dissented.

Pay TV vies for would-be cable customers

A Troy corporation is vying for the dollars of television viewers in Plymouth and Canton before Omnicom of Michigan — the area's contracted cable TV firm — has installed a single cable.

National Subscription Television,

which airs broadcasts over Channel 20 during mostly evening hours, began a mail advertising campaign last week to attract subscribers in this area.

Company president Patrick Kerich admits that his firm offers less programming for a higher monthly fee than cable television companies. But Kerich insists pay TV will maintain a

competitive stance with Omnicom and other cable firms in the metropolitan area.

He bases his stand on the belief that local sports fans want local sports coverage. National Subscription Television has signed contracts with a number of Michigan universities and Detroit ath-

letic teams for the broadcast rights to games.

The company also broadcasts first-run movies and concerts uninterrupted by commercials.

UNLIKE CABLE TV, pay television deals strictly in the transmission of local television signals.

National Subscription Television uses broadcast facilities of Channel 20 in Southfield after 8 p.m., according to Kerich. The transmissions are scrambled to prevent non-subscribers from using the service.

Decoders unscramble the signals for subscribers who pay a monthly fee of \$22.50. The company charges an installation fee of \$50 in addition to a refundable \$50 security deposit.

The charges are appreciably higher than Omnicom's, the firm which has won cable television franchises in Canton Township, Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

Omnicom will charge subscribers \$15 a month for a complete cable package which includes 35 channels plus Home Box Office, a first-run movie service. There is no security deposit, and Omnicom will waive the normal installation fee of \$25 for those who sign subscriptions during the construction period.

According to Kerich, 23,000 families now subscribe to his company's pay-TV service. National Subscription Television began broadcasting to Oakland County communities last July after receiving an FCC license more than a year ago.

Kerich said the company is now expanding its broadcasts to homes as far west as Ann Arbor, as far north as Flint and as far south as Toledo.

KERICH MAINTAINS that pay TV offers many of the services of cable television such as movies without commercials. In January, the company broadcast several movies, such as "Midnight Express" and "Saturday Night Fever." The company also airs concerts in conjunction with the broadcasts of FM radio stations.

But Kerich says his company holds an edge over cable TV in the area of sports events.

National Subscription Television has signed contracts with the University of Michigan for the broadcast rights to numerous home football, basketball and hockey games. Kerich said Michigan State University and the University of Detroit have also signed contracts for the airing of some athletic events.

Contracts with professional teams call for pay TV broadcasts of several Detroit Tiger, Red Wing, Detroit Express and Detroit Lightning games.

John Raines, president of Omnicom, admits that much of the sports programming his firm will offer is regional and national. The cable TV company offers two sports channels — a 24-hour station and a sports service from Madison Square Gardens in New York.

BUT RAINES insists that Omnicom will obtain broadcast rights to local sporting events if viewers desire that service.

Principals pan book

Student 'Who's Who' hokey?

"Who's Who Among American High School Students" won't get any help from Plymouth high school principals in compiling their listings.

Kent Buikema, Plymouth Canton principal, and Bill Brown, Plymouth Salem principal, both say the publication's annual listing of thousands of purported scholars is questionable. But more than that, they say, the for-profit publication is motivated by rather non-academic reasons.

Neither principal will submit a list of outstanding students to that type of publication. The school district does not allow the use of students' names for

non-school purposes, said Buikema.

"They're trying to sell a book more than anything else," Buikema said. "I think it's hokey. I don't think there's much value in it."

"I concur with Mr. Buikema," Brown said. "What it is is a method by which addresses of students become available to various vendors. Obviously I'd like students to be recognized. But this is an exploitation of families to buy pins and publications."

IN A RECENT Centennial Educational Park in-house newsletter, Buikema warns that the publication will soon be seeking the names of students for its next issue.

The report includes excerpts from a recent New York Times article that explores the value of this publication.

It reports that 500,000 of the nation's 6.2 million juniors and seniors may be contacted by the publishing house.

Education Communications Inc. of Northbrook, Ill., also publishes "Who's Who Among American Blacks," and several other publishers put out similar books. They include "Who's Who in the High School Honor Society" and "Who's Who in National High School Football."

The publishers make their money by selling the books to proud parents and grandparents. While these volumes may cost up to \$35 each, the listings themselves usually are free. "Who's Who in American High Schools" sells for \$19.95.

Along with requests to buy these publications come requests to buy special pins, at \$7.95, to ceramic steins at \$8.95.

The 1979 "Who's Who in American High Schools" is a six-volume set. Each includes 1,000 pages.

A third of each is devoted to postage-size pictures of the students. The rest of the book deals with brief listings, usually no longer than five lines, of the student's accomplishments. The accomplishments, such as clubs and associations, are all coded.

No grades are mentioned. The listing ends with the student's college aspirations, listing an intended field of study.

"Specially, it looks like a want ad," said a librarian in the education division of the Detroit Public Libraries.

"It lists no home address but does mention the high school's name."

ALAN ZACHARY, who works for the "Who's Who in American High Schools" publication, says the criteria for mention is either an A or B grade point average or demonstrated "good citizenship."

Names are submitted through contacts with high school principals, counselors and other people familiar with those students, he said.

CEP's policy of not submitting names to this publication is upheld by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

That national association lists six reasons why it does not go along with "who's who" publications of any kind.

"The recognition itself is inherently of question value and is unlikely to serve any ultimate educational benefit."

"The methods used for gathering names for recognition have question-

able validity in terms of whether students selected actually deserve recognition. There is ample evidence that students are usually listed or recognized only if they furnish biographical information to the sponsor."

"Most organizations are profit motivated and have no association with educational, philanthropic or professional associations."

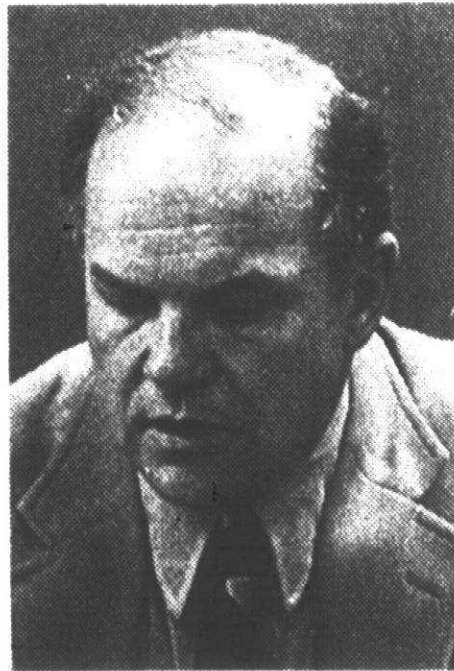
"The programs often solicit students and their families to purchase the publication, certificate and pin."

"The publication provides convenient lists of students' names and addresses that can be used for noneducational purposes."

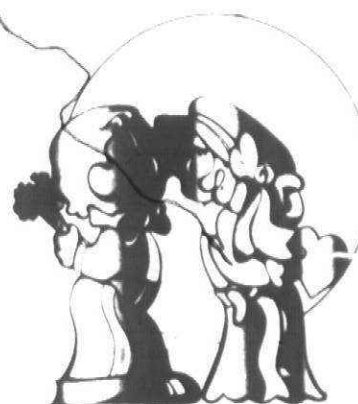

Motorist fined in road mishap

A Highland Township man was found guilty of reckless driving and leaving the scene of property damage, both misdemeanors, in 35th District Court Thursday.

Thomas Gheen, 23, was originally charged with striking three cars in Plymouth Township and Livonia last summer during a high-speed chase. He was fined \$155 or 16 days in the Detroit House of Corrections by Judge Dunbar Davis of the Plymouth Court.

According to Wayne County sheriffs,

the Aug. 4 incident involved one of the most elaborate street chases, including sheriffs and township residents, in recent "Plymouth Township history."

Police say that Gheen, employed by a Milford glass company, was driving a glass-paneled truck when he struck the first car at Ann Arbor Trail near Newburgh. The driver of that car then chased him for some seven minutes before stopping at Spies Court in the township.

School fund equity dropping

A mid-year budget review of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools shows expenses exceeding revenue by some \$434,500.

The loss in the current operating fund thus far will result in projected fund balance being reduced to about \$1.56 million by June 30, instead of \$1.6 million as earlier projected.

Dan White, director of finance, said some weak spots in the budget include the fact that the prices of gasoline and costs of utilities are unknown for the balance of the year.

White told the school board Monday night that other soft spots were labor contracts yet to be negotiated and the apparent high use to date of substitute teachers.

The school district is getting a good return on its investment of idle cash, White noted, with one reason being that the district has had to borrow twice — instead of once, which is normal — this year because of the Headlee Tax Limitation Amendment and has had more money on hand to invest.

Thus far the district has invested \$3.9 million in certificates of deposit for an average of 30 days at an average yield of 9.87 percent, or \$32,062. Some \$1.2 million has been invested in commercial paper for an average of 41.2 days with a yield of 12.7 percent producing \$18,210.

White also reported that tax collections are coming in faster, primarily because of a new system of transfers established by Canton Township.

Canton now is making its transfers by wire from its account with NBD to the school's account with the same bank. White said he planned to ask the city of Plymouth and Plymouth Township to follow the same procedure.

As of Jan. 18, Canton had turned over to the schools \$6.5 million or 55 percent of the \$11.7 million Canton residents will be paying in school taxes. Last year, at this point, Canton had turned over 36

percent of its tax collections.

The city of Plymouth has turned over almost \$1.9 million or 47 percent of the almost \$4 million due. At this point last year the city also had turned over 47 percent.

Plymouth Township to date has turned over \$3 million in school taxes, which is 31 percent of the almost \$9.5 million due. Last year at this point the township had turned over 36 percent.

Of the \$26.2 million due, almost \$11.9 million has been turned to date by the city of Plymouth, Plymouth and Canton townships, Northville, Salem and Superior townships.

The school district had borrowed \$9.6 million in tax anticipation notes which had to be repaid as tax collections come in. Based on current collections, then, the district has about \$2.2 million it can spend

for operation, according to Superintendent John M. Hoben.

To make ends meet until the \$9.6 million was turned in for local tax payments, the district a couple of months ago borrowed a second time with state aid payments as collateral.


Of the total \$26.2 million to be collected, about \$23.7 million will be spent for operating and about \$2.5 million for debt retirement.



THE BOARD also was told that another bright spot was savings realized by energy conservation measures taken by the individual schools.

For electrical usage, the schools used a total of 464,377 fewer kilowatts during the first six months of this year than for the same period in 1978-79.

Jobless lines keeps MESC busy

The lines of residents seeking jobs or filing unemployment claims keeps getting longer at the local office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) on Joy Road near General Drive in Plymouth Township. The increased business reflects layoffs at local plants as well as residents who have been laid off at out of town auto plants.

According to S. Martin Taylor, state director of the MESC, the state's unemployment rate rose to 8.5 percent in December from 7.9 percent in November, with the number of unemployed increasing by 24,000 to 369,000.

Taylor reported the total drop in employment resulted from substantial indefinite and temporary layoffs in the auto industry. A year ago December the jobless rate in the state was 6.7 percent with 289,000 unemployed.

Taylor said that business at local MESC claims offices, such as the Joy Road branch, has increased by 123 percent from December 1978 to last month. The initial claims of 89,000 for the week of Dec. 11, 1979 was the highest ever recorded in a single week in Michigan. Unemployment benefit payments by MESC are averaging \$4.4 million a day.

Ed Dowling, manager of the Plymouth MESC branch, said his office recently paid out the highest check to one individual when a check for \$5,000 was presented to a laid-off Chrysler employee. The check was a federal government payment under the Trade Re-adjustment Allowance which is paid to Chrysler workers unemployed because of imports. Here's where trustees stand on bond issue

Over the next two months, terms like grade re-alignment, middle school, and overcrowding will become familiar to Plymouth-Canton voters.

Those phrases cropped up continually during about three hours of discussion on the \$21.9 million bond issue to be placed before voters Thursday, March 27 as board members debated the merits of future alternatives, particularly for secondary students.

During those three hours every member of the board had the chance to clarify their personal positions on the bond issue. In fact, four of the seven members came with prepared statements to read.

Tom Yack, board president, decided against making a statement of personal opinion but did present a synopsis of the decision-making process that culminated in seeking a millage once again.

THE BOND ISSUE decision process began three years ago when voters rejected a \$29 million bond issue with a clear "no" vote of about 70 percent, Yack said.

In response to that vote, he said, the school board began to use the Extended School Year (ESY) to house additional students in lieu of new construction.

"The board continued to rely on ESY as an option to construction but that has placed a burden on our operational budgets and we now have reached a point where operational funds do not allow us to extend ESY any further."

Tackling another bond issue was compelled by two reasons, Yack said: 1. The general fund no longer can sustain continued ESY expansion; and, 2. The high schools now are at the breaking point with enrollment having climbed to some 700 students beyond capacity.

Another consideration, said Yack, is that repairs have been ignored for 10 years and a bond issue is needed to finance a number of renovations at existing buildings.

That led the board to call for a bond proposal from the administration, Yack explained, and then later to form a citizens committee for the same purpose.

"The citizens committee basically looked at the economics of housing students while the administration also considered the programmatic implications. The board then formed another committee of administrators, staff and citizens to look at the programmatic implications and bring them into line with what the community can afford."

Yack stressed that: "Our objective has been to blend the programmatic considerations with the community's economic resources — not to form the ideal school district with an ideal bond issue."

ABOUT TWO months ago the process of considering bond proposal options narrowed the choices down to two, Yack added. Those two choices were to re-align the grades to K-6, 7-9, and 10-12 or to keep the status quo of grade configuration at K-5, 6-8, 9-12.

"It may be that some trustees have changed their minds on this issue. But I would hope that no one on this board would be so narrow in their thinking that early on in the discussion of an issue they would close their minds. I would hope they'd be large enough to change position in light of new information."

Speaking historically, Yack said: "A long time ago growth was handled by simply building a building. Today, we have gone far beyond that with the advent of ESY and the availability of vacant school buildings in nearby districts."

"Today the variables for handling student growth are staggering. And

there is not a 1-1 relationship between the variables — the relationship is geometric."

Yack cautioned that none of the plans before the board were ideal and long-lasting. "We'd like to think we have a long-range plan but no one really knows what's ahead. We are working on the best information available. We are attempting to do the best we can."

CAROL DAVIS agreed the \$21.9 million may not be a final solution and the board might have to return to voters in the future with another bond issue.

Mrs. Davis said she didn't believe grade configuration mattered when it came to quality education. What does matter, she added, is the material used for teaching, the sequence followed in using that material, and the individual teachers and their philosophy towards education and students.

Davis said her philosophy of education was to provide options and alternatives to students to try and match individual learning styles.

"At the CEP we removed a lot of options when modular scheduling was dropped because of over-crowding and when we limited course offerings to ninth-graders. The more students we put out in the Park, the options available to them will be fewer."

"Right now a student at the CEP isn't an individual but is one of 4,700 kids. Students will adopt an 'I don't care' attitude because they aren't treated as an individual but as one member of a very large class. I am opposed to putting any more students out at the Park."

Mrs. Davis said that ESY also eliminated options at the middle-school level and, for that reason, should be avoided. ESY can be eliminated at the middle-school level, she added, by grade re-alignment.

"Re-alignment would relieve the CEP load and allow all middle schools to go on a traditional school year. I'd rather opt for a solution that involves re-alignment to give us some breathing room, and then see what happens."

"I can't support a proposal to build at the CEP because we'd end up with 6,000 students out there. It's too large now."

FLOSSIE TONDA argued that the \$21.9 million proposal with status quo on grade configuration would result in ESY being used at the middle-school level.

"I'm against that," she said.

Mrs. Tonda pointed to earlier reports of poor student attitudes and high absenteeism at Pioneer Middle because of ESY. Higher administrative costs have resulted to try and patch up the program at Pioneer, she added.

"If we add East and West to ESY we only will be increasing our problems."

"I'm also against putting a building out at the CEP. There are 4,700 students out there now and it's not in anyone's best interest to add another 1,200 at the same site."

"The building at the Park wouldn't be needed if we moved the ninth grade back to the middle-school level. And, remember, that in October this board agreed that our greatest problem with rising enrollment is at the high school level."

"The administration recommended grade re-alignment to solve the growth problem at the high schools. We took a community survey with 766 people participating. Of those 766 people 71.3 percent supported moving the ninth grade and 73.1 percent supported moving the sixth grade."

"We are in a recession now. A lot of people in our community have lost jobs and are really struggling. We must consider the financial support our community can afford to give, and we must

remember that 70 percent of our budget comes from local funds."

STEVE HARPER said he felt the middle school 6-7-8 alignment did a better job accommodating to the child's development stage than a junior high 7-8-9.

"We should offer that option to the community and let voters decide if a middle school is the best educational alternative."

Harper argued that the 40 new classrooms at the CEP would allow the administration to provide more options to students and that an intermediate high school at Central could result in a unique program advantage for students.

He further argued that more space

would be needed at the high school level with or without re-alignment. "I'd rather build now for less money than it will cost to build later."

Harper added that he felt the CEP could adequately handle 6,000 students.

DICK ARLEN said he felt the issue of grade configuration should be placed before voters to decide.

"I am not convinced re-alignment would damage a lot of people but I would like the citizens in the district to make that decision."

Although 700 people participated in the community opinion poll, Arlen said, a lot more than that will be going to the polls and the larger number should decide.

SYLVIA STETZ said she supported the \$21.9 million proposal in its entirety.

"I believe in the middle-school concept because it's a better way to group ages. Ninth-graders are better off with 10th-graders than they are with eighth-graders."

"There will be major boundary changes if we shift the sixth-graders back to elementary, and we'd need more portables."

"We need a third facility now at the CEP because the conditions out there will be with us for while. Our main role is to educate children and to house them the best we can."

ELAINE KIRCHGATTER said she

felt a responsibility to provide the best possible educational program.

The 9-12 configuration offered ninth-graders the greatest variety of courses at the high school level, she said, adding that she also supported the middle-school concept.

"When we discontinued modular scheduling we were told the best aspects of the high school program would be retained, but I see no evidence that has been done. Neither do I believe the ninth-grade program features will be retained if the grades are re-aligned. There would be no foreign language, no advance math. And vocational education offering would suffer if we re-aligned."

Gorman, a member of the would-be department head association, said supervisors are happy with the pay increases they have received.

But he admitted that unionization is "one alternative" of police commanders if their concerns for pay and fringe benefits are not satisfied.

Lt. Larry Stewart of the police department downplayed that possibility, however.

"I don't think we're looking for that—at least not at this point," Stewart said of the department's five sergeants and himself. "We consider ourselves part of management. We don't want a union concept. That's a labor versus management situation."

The Merit Commission recommends pay for non-union employees. But, according to Stewart, police commanders understood that the township board's directive for talks on pay and fringe benefits exempted them from that process.

Stewart said the Merit Commission does not understand the needs of the police.

The commission recommended identical fringe benefits for department heads and police commanders, even though police officers work a longer week and sometimes encounter life-threatening situations, he said.

Stewart hopes the misunderstanding on pay and fringes can be resolved satisfactorily.

"I'm almost embarrassed that it's gone to the point it has," he said.

THE MERIT Commission based its recommendations for department head salaries on the job responsibilities for each supervisor, according to Gorman.

In the highest pay classification are the police and fire chiefs who will receive salaries of approximately \$28,000 this year.

In the next highest classification are the finance director and DPW supervisor who will receive approximately \$27,000. Annual salaries for the parks and recreation superintendent, the personnel director, the ordinance director, and the chief building official will be nearly \$26,000.

The plan examiner, DPW foreman and deputy building official will receive about \$22,500, and the recreation supervisor will earn about \$18,000.

According to Gorman, the department heads received their last pay increase about a year ago.

Planner Jim Kosteva and grant coordinator Terry Carroll work for the township on a contractual basis and did not receive a salary increase as a result of last week's board action.

Zachary, in an attempt to separate criticism directed at publications not his own said, "Under no circumstances do we give out names to anyone."

However, he refused to answer other questions directed at his publication's operation, saying he preferred a reporter read about it first in a prepared press release.

"We've been at great pains to distinguish our books from others because of this criticism."

MEANWHILE, ADMISSION counselors at area universities say that a listing in "Who's Who" does nothing for a student's chances of entering that institution.

"I don't think it has any great bearing on our business," said Fred McDaniel at Eastern Michigan University.

"My own daughters were listed in it about nine years ago, and we haven't looked at it since. The book is at home someplace, but I couldn't tell you where."

"It doesn't specifically detail accomplishments, so we don't pay much attention to it," said Charles Seeley, admissions director at Michigan State University.

"There are a number of these programs, and some are designed to get a student attention and sell a book."

"But a student wouldn't get any particular advantage in terms of our admissions procedure."

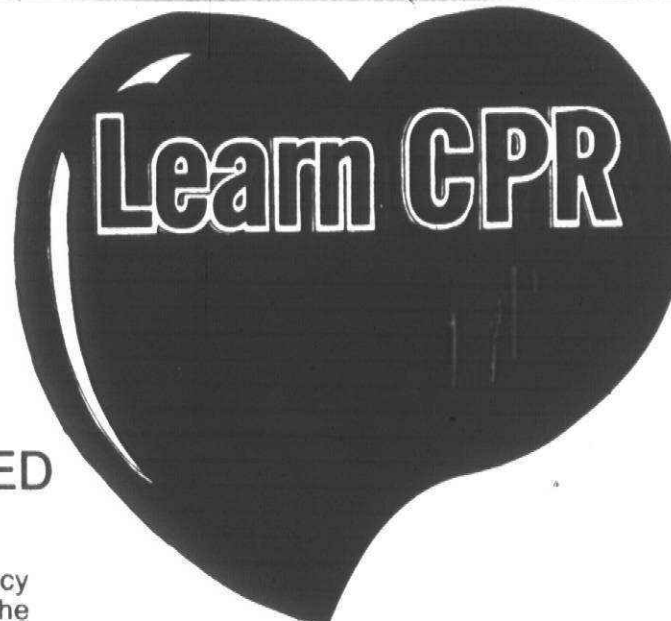

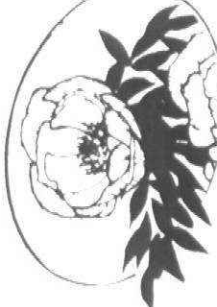

School board approves \$21.9 million bond issue

fix-up damaged walls, floors, and replace the roof.

Other elements of the \$14.6 million include \$500,000 for bus purchases and about \$670,000 for a bus garage.

THE BOARD WAS unanimous in approving the bond proposals except for the \$7.3 million. That proposal drew a 4-3 vote because of differences of opinion about grade alignment.

Voting against the \$7.3 million package because they favored re-aligning grades were Yack, Carol Davis and Flossie Tonda.

Voting in favor of the \$7.3 million package because they wanted to retain the current middle-school grade alignment were Steve Harper, Elaine Kirchgatter and Sylvia Stetz.

Richard Arlen said he voted for the \$7.3 million package so voters would have a chance to decide the issue.

If the \$7.3 million is approved and grade structure remains unchanged, Pioneer Middle will remain on ESY and East Middle and West Middle schools eventually would go on the ESY schedule.

If the \$7.3 million is defeated, Cen-

tral would be used as a middle school and Pioneer would change to the traditional school year with ESY being used only at the elementary level.

Yack, Davis, and Tonda argued that the best way to relieve over-crowdedness at the CEP is to move ninth-graders back to the middle-school level, with sixth-graders being moved back to elementary.

These three believe re-aligning grades would make it unnecessary to build the 40 classrooms at the CEP and would nullify the need to spend \$2 million on Central Middle School.

The majority of Harper, Arlen, Kirchgatter and Stetz believe the cost of re-alignment is only \$2 million because the 40 classrooms at the CEP would have to be built by 1984 when high school enrollment will exceed the combined capacities of Central High and the Park.

The majority view on the board, based on the meeting's discussion, would argue for a "yes" vote on the \$7.3 million to retain the 6-7-8 grade alignment. The majority would further argue that the 40 classrooms will be needed for high schoolers in the near future and rising construction costs

will hike the price tag to at least \$7 million anyhow.

THE MINORITY view on the board is that voters could save \$7 million on the bond issue now by voting "no" with the knowledge that vote would result in a 7-8-9 middle school alignment.

The minority view is willing to gamble the 40 classrooms won't be needed in the future and, even if it is, the higher price will be paid during a time when the economy likely will be more healthy.

Current projections suggest that high school enrollment will peak at 8,100 students in 1987-88 or 3,000 over the current CEP capacity. If the high school contained grades 10-11-12, then enrollment would peak at 6,200 in '87-88 or about 1,500 over present capacity.

Middle-school enrollment is expected to peak at 5,300 in 1983-84 or about 1,600 students more than the present. If middle-school grades were changed to 7-8-9, the enrollment would peak a year later in '84-85 at 5,600 students.

Elementary enrollment is expected to peak next year ('80-81) at about 8,200 students. If elementary configu-

ration were changed to K-6, enrollment would peak at 9,600 a year later.

DURING ITS deliberation Monday night the board had considered delaying a decision until a more detailed cost breakdown could be obtained on Central Middle renovations.

The board decided against delay, though, because they said a bond issue would be delayed until the annual school election in June.

Detailed cost analysis, estimated to cost between \$50-\$75,000, was another factor in the decision.

Earlier the board had given tentative approval to an \$8 million renovation of Central, believing that money would pay only for repairs needed despite how the building was used.

This past week trustees discovered the \$8 million figure did include some of the costs of converting Central to a

high school.

Monday night the board estimated that \$2 million was for program costs at Central and \$6 million for essential repairs.

After arriving at that estimation, the board segregated the \$2 million and placed it in the same proposal as the \$5.3 million for the CEP classrooms to give voters a clear choice on the grade-alignment issue.

Property tax breaks available

Wayne County Treasurer Raymond J. Wojtowicz is trying to alert all county residents — especially senior citizens — of the availability of property tax refunds and a method of escaping tax penalties.

"Although many others can claim all or part of these advantages, I am particularly concerned with seniors because we know from experience that many of them are not informed or simply don't understand," said Wojtowicz. "In these instances, neither do they usually have a knowledgeable younger per-

son to help."

In the past several weeks, Wojtowicz has mailed more than 350,000 cards hoping to correct this situation. He pointed out that the State of Michigan this year has set aside over \$340 million for this purpose — enough tax relief for 1.2 million eligible people if they apply.

THE TAX REFUND is granted in each case where 1979 property taxes exceed 3.5 percent of the owner's income.

"This is exactly what a number of

seniors and other low-income persons are not aware of," Wojtowicz added.

In addition, he said that totally disabled persons and certain veterans are eligible for assistance even if their property taxes are less than 3.5 percent of their income. Also, Wojtowicz said that many who rent are eligible, particularly senior renters.

The refunds may be claimed on the 1979 Michigan income tax return. Eligible are even those who would not otherwise have to file or who owe no income tax whatsoever.

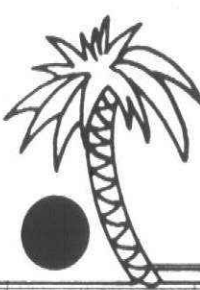

Ms. Green and Rose both expect the system will pay for itself in less than two years by reducing the loss of stolen books.

During the 1978-79 school year more than \$17,000 in books were stolen from the two high school libraries. The average losses since 1975-76 has been \$19,900 per year.

The real problem, said Ms. Green, is that the libraries' book allocation budgets are being spent almost 100 percent to replace stolen books rather than purchasing additional books.

"Our ratio of total library books to total students has been maintained recently only because of generous private

donations from the community," she said. "Our \$300,000 investment in library books warrants the best protection we can give it."

If the security system results in an 80 percent reduction in stolen books, Ms. Green added, it should pay for itself within 20 months.

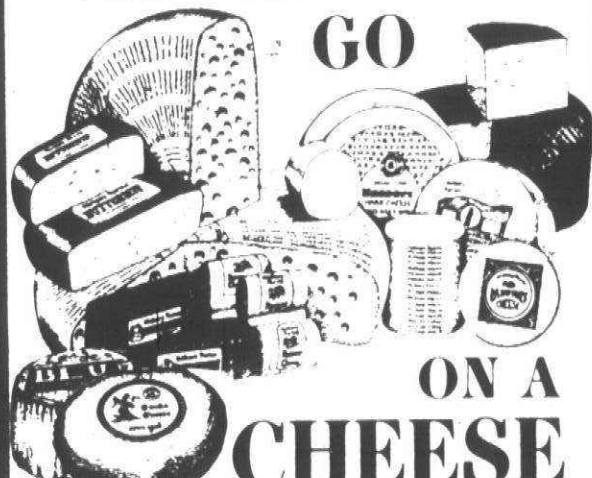
The system involves "targets" being placed in each of the 30,000 library books at the high schools. The targets are sensitized and will set off an alarm if a student attempts to leave the library with a book containing one.

The targets will be removed when the books are checked out.

Cost of the anti-theft equipment will be charged to the 1980 bond issue if approved by voters on March 27. If the bond issue fails, the purchased will be charged to the 1979-80 operating budget.

The cost of the equipment is significantly lower now than it was when the board considered buying it two and four years ago, according to Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent of business. Superintendent John M. Hoben added that the item has been in the budget for the past two years.

"Grade re-alignment will bring more disruption to families and to the community than boundary changes or greater use of ESY. I don't believe taxpayers want to give up stability."

"Re-alignment would not make an appreciable difference to the bond issue because eventually we will have to build high school class space. Even with a 10-12 high school by 1984 we would be above capacity at the CEP."

By using industrialized construction for the 40 classrooms, she added, the district would have a 55,000-square-foot building which could be sold later for office space when not needed for educational use.

The community could benefit from an innovative program for high schoolers at Central, she added. "I believe the \$21.9 million offers the best educational package given today's economic climate. Programs won't suffer and we'll have some stability."

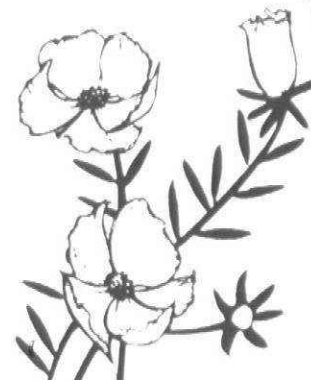

Death bell rings for county executive

Suburban polls say reform package is weak

A petition drive to set up a Wayne County executive has collapsed on the eve of legislative passage of a new law that contains too little county reform, in the view of suburban political leaders.

County Commissioner R. William Joyner, D-Plymouth, pronounced the death of a drive to collect 75,000 signatures on petitions asking for a popular vote to create a county executive, much like a strong mayor or governor.

"It was very difficult to collect 75,000 signatures," Joyner told a chamber of commerce audience in Livonia Monday. "We reached the 50 percent mark and couldn't go any further."

The reason: It was too tough to get people excited about repairing county government despite years of publicity about deficits and widely held suburban views that an executive is needed.

COMMISSIONER Mary Dumas, R-Livonia, was in bipartisan agreement with Joyner that a proposed reform, Senate Bill 652, "is very weak, and we'd be as well off with a county executive."

The petition drive supported by Joyner and Mrs. Dumas sought to use a 1974 law sponsored by then state Sen. (now U.S. Rep.) Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, that would allow voters to create the office of county executive or county manager — analogous to a mayor or a manager in a city, respectively.

An executive would head all departments outside of those which are headed by such elected administrators as the sheriff and treasurer. These so-called "headless" departments report to the 27-member board of commissioners. Advocates of an executive say department heads manipulate enough favorable commissioners to get their

way, and that no one is really in charge.

Joyner said using the 1974 county executive act would bypass the use of a charter commission, contemplated in the new SB 652. What makes SB 652 objectionable, he said, is that it would use 1970 census figures — unfavorable to growing suburbs — to apportion charter commission seats.

"The bill says, 'Let's use the 1970 census to draw up a charter for the 1980s and 1990s,'" he declared.

SB 652, due to be voted on in Lansing this week, has these provisions:

- Voters would elect a charter commission, which would have 180 days to propose changes in county government. The charter group could propose either an executive or a manager elected by voters or a manager appointed by the board of commissioners.
- Voters would choose between two

different versions of the charter — or could reject both.

SB 652 found Mrs. Dumas and Joyner on different sides of the fence from state Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, who was on the six-member conference committee which drafted the final compromise version.

Mrs. Dumas, a county board member for eight years, said SB 652 exempts the county road commission and other boards from being abolished. She said the road commission operates almost as an autonomous branch of government, thumbing its nose at regular civil service procedures, dispensing generous amounts of political patronage and setting a high wage pattern in collective bargaining that county general government can't afford.

GEAKE CALLED SB 652 "an honorable compromise."

In answer to a question, the seven-

year veteran of the legislature said, "The road commission will continue to exist, but it will be appointed by the county executive with the advice and consent of the board of commissioners. The executive would be able to remove a member of the road commission at any time."

"I would have preferred to elect charter commissioners on the basis of the 1980 census, but something had to give," he said.

Geake added, however, that the disadvantage of using the 1970 census was exaggerated. The charter commission would have to report out both an executive and manager plans, and it wouldn't be able to load the manager plan with advantages the executive might lack.


Detroit politicians, especially blacks, prefer a manager or no change at all, fearing an executive would have political clout rivaling Mayor Coleman A. Young's.

MEANWHILE, Samuel A. Turner, a Detroit black who deposed Richard Manning, a white from Redford Township, earlier this month as board chairman, met with Acting Gov. James Brickley for an hour last week to discuss county affairs.

Brickley and the administration of Gov. William G. Milliken are insisting on reform of the county structure before releasing any state aid. Twice Milliken has withheld funds for probation services which Brickley said will be released the minute the Wayne County Board of Commissioners puts a charter commission proposal on the ballot.

Once SB 652 is passed, said Brickley, "Probation funding ought to be the first order of business."

County officials insist the state should fund probation services because state law mandated such services.

An abbey provides serene retreat for Hudsons

(Sam Hudson of Plymouth, local historian and author of "Plymouth Past & Present," is wintering in southern France. The column below is another in a series of how senior citizens, or others, can travel around Europe on a limited budget.)

There was no specified charge for the meal we had at the abbey on Saint Honorat's Island. In leaving there, however, we were handed an envelope and asked to donate whatever we could afford.

Just off the cloisters, not far from the dining room, was a stairway with a sign that read "hotellerie." In conversation with an English girl quartered there for a week, we learned that it is a retreat for anyone who wants a respite from the pressures of modern life, not the least of which is the alarming increase in noise pollution. The girl had heard of the retreat from religious friends in London.

The monks of the Abbey of Lerins operate a small shop near the monastery in which they sell postcards, art objects, and a liqueur they make on the island. We bought some cards and a small bottle of the green liqueur. Made from alcohol, sugar, colorant and "substances vegetable," it is labelled "di-

gestive." It probably is, but I do not plan to make a special trip for the purpose of buying another bottle.

The monastery also has a small museum containing stone fragments of the Roman and Christian eras in the island's history.

We walked completely around the island's rocky coast. I was surprised to learn that the monastery on this tiny island was once one of the most famous and profitable in all of Christendom. Pilgrims walked around the island barefoot, and it was usually crowded because a visit resulted in the same indulgences as a visit to the Holy Land.

The day was cool, the sun bright. The air coming down from the Alps and across the water was invigorating. The sight and sound of the whitecaps dashing against the impressive rock formations reminded me of a day spent at Bar Harbor, Maine, many years ago.

At the western end of the island, we came across an old stone structure that appeared to be some form of oven. I thought it was an incinerator. Jessie, with an artist's eye, said it looked like an abandoned potter's kiln. My guide book says it is one of two ovens Napoleon ordered built on Saint Honorat in 1794. They were used to make cannon balls red hot.

It occurred to me, as I read that passage, that the temperature of a cannon ball would make little difference to a

person on the receiving end; but I defer to Monsieur Bonaparte, whose knowledge of such things certainly exceeded mine.

It was after 4 p.m. when we got back to the larger island, Sainte Marguerite. The wind was getting colder. We settled for a quick visit to the fort, intending to spend more time on that island on a future visit.

First, however, we ducked into a restaurant on the way to the fort. A small cup of hot chocolate cost us \$1.25 each, half as much as we paid for our one-half-hour round-trip boat ride. Food and beverages are expensive in France, especially on the Cote D'Azur.

Sainte Marguerite Island was named after Saint Honorat's sister. She headed a community of nuns here in the 5th century. The island is twice as big as the one that has the monastery.

Sainte Marguerite's chief claim to fame is the fortress dominating its north coast, which faces the mainland. A state prison, it is where the "man in the iron mask" was kept prisoner for 11 years by Louis IV. Actually, says the *Guide Michelin*, he wore only a simple velvet mask. His identity has been the subject of much speculation but has never been firmly established.

Three years ago we visited a similar prison on an island off the port of Marseilles. Called Chateau d'If, it was used

to hold a number of political prisoners. Dumas made Chateau d'If famous in literature when he put one of his heroes, the Count of Monte Cristo, in a cell there.

The fort at Sainte Marguerite is not abandoned. The barracks there accommodate French boys who participate in a training program in which they learn how to handle sail boats. Robert Bryan, a young Canadian just turned 14, who is here for six months with his parents, managed to get into the program. It is only open to residents, but Robert qualified because, as renters of an apartment, the Bryan's are considered to be taxpayers. Their permanent residence is in Victoria on Vancouver Island in British Columbia.

From the balcony of their apartment, which faces the Mediterranean, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan can see the dock from which their son sails, and the fort on Sainte Marguerite where he sometimes puts up for the weekend.

In my next column, I plan to relate what was told to me recently about Iran and Khomeini by an official of the Iranian government who held office when the shah was in power. He is now a classmate of mine in a language class at the International College of Cannes. (To be continued)

Confidentiality lid is clamped on talks

Future plans to study joint police services in the Plymouth area, as outlined in a confidential letter to township trustees, is an attempt to circumvent the Open Meetings Act, according to a Township Trustee.

Lee Fidge this week ignored Supervisor Thomas Notebaert's order to keep a lid on those negotiations by sending a press release to local newspapers outlining her objections to planned closed-door meetings between the two municipalities.

However she lost her bid for public discussion on the subject in a 4-3 vote Tuesday night when the majority of township board members rejected her request to place the item on the agenda.

Officials of both municipalities seem to disagree as to how negotiations of joint services would take place.

WHEN OFFICIALS from both sides met publicly last week, they announced they were directing the township supervisor and city manager to begin discussions for combined service. However a confidential letter to trustees written by Notebaert refers to a small "study group" and agreement to release all information through attorneys.

Plymouth Mayor Mary Childs said all discussions would occur at a public study session.

In the letter to trustees, Notebaert said the guidelines for the study of joint services were made on the recommendation of Township Attorney Donald Morgan.

"This would be a small group situation and not subject to the Open Meetings Act anyway," Notebaert wrote.

Fidge responded to the letter with a written explanation of her opinion to the board.

"AS LONG AS a quorum of either the township board and the city commission is not present, the meeting does not violate the Open Meetings Act — but what of the spirit of the act?" she asked.

"Your concerns of a public reaction that could result from a premature release of information before discussed publicly and directions are given from both involved governmental bodies are understandable; but that does not give a valid reason to condone a secretive pact between elected officials.

"I have no problem with what we adopted in a resolution in which the board has given the supervisor direction to negotiate," she said. "But I am very uncomfortable with Notebaert's procedure as (stated) in the letter."

She contends that if a study group will be meeting and reaching tentative agreements, she would like prior notice of it so she as well as the public may

attend and give opinions.

"I do not believe the end result can justify the means of this type of closed door session even though it does not violate the act. I think you're really circumventing the public.

"And by golly, the public will be paying for any of these unified services."

NOTEBAERT'S LETTER indicated that any announcement of agreements would be released only by either Morgan or Plymouth City Attorney Chuck Lowe.

"Be assured there would be full and open debate available before any final action was taken," Notebaert wrote.

"On the other hand, premature release of information or release of information by just the city or just the township (or members of either legislative body) could jeopardize what appears to be the advent of an era of good feeling between the city and the township.

"In other words, a time for developing mutual understanding and trust must be allowed before the windows are thrown open to constructive as well as disruptive public comment," Notebaert concluded.

When questioned this week about the arrangement, Morgan refused comment on anything associated with those negotiations.

Notebaert said there was no plans for a "full-fledged" study committee.

He said that a previously formed study group, comprised of Trustee Maurice Breen, Clerk Esther Hulsing and himself, would provide the background of information for informal discussions between himself and Henry Graper, city manager.

The trio had previously worked on information to present to the Wayne County Sheriff's Department with which the township is presently negotiating a contract for police protection.

"At this time, that arrangement is in limbo before the county board of auditors," Notebaert said.

Notebaert added that he sent his confidential letter to board members this week so as not to "offend them" or city commissioners while negotiations progressed.

About Fidge's charge, he said: "I think she's trying to gain publicity out of nothing. It's not in keeping with the intent to keep good relations between the city and the township."

PLYMOUTH MAYOR Mary Childs, on the other hand, had different thoughts on how the negotiations would progress.

"All discussions will occur at a public study session," she said. "But until we have a definite thing on where we're going or what we're going to do, we'll let the attorneys give out any type of thing we may be deciding on.

"They (the attorneys) decided that

would be the best way to go. We're the policy makers, but they're the ones that have to see that it works."

Breen, a member of the earlier group exploring a pact with Wayne County, said there is no study group at this time looking into unified police services with the city.

Breen said that he and Hulsing met with Notebaert once recently to talk about the county pact in terms of what could be asked of the city.

"The directive is that the administrations of both sides will sit down and explore this. There's nothing abnormal about it. It's just standard procedure. But none of the administrators have legal power to bind them to anything.

"I don't imagine we'll be going back to our committee unless there's some direction or until one of them comes back with some proposal."

About Fidge's concerns, he said he "didn't want to get into that."

Voting against Fidge's request to discuss the matter were Notebaert, Hulsing, Township Treasurer Joe West and Trustee Barbara Lynch.

Fidge then asked to schedule the matter for next week's board session.

"They neither surprised nor disappointed me. They just didn't want to bring this to the public," Fidge said.

Groth ends firefighting Friday after 3 decades

Acting Fire Chief Charles Groth, who is retiring Friday from the Plymouth Department, will take a lot of fond memories with him when he takes up residence in Daytona Beach, Fla.

"I bought the home down there 15 years ago," he said as he was checking out his desk for the last time, "and now Carol (his wife) and I will find out whether we like the warmer climate. If we don't, there'll be no hesitation in coming back up here."

The retiring chief has served with the department since 1950 and, as he leaned forward in his chair to check a few papers, he confided that he will have many memories of his long career as a firefighter.

"It's a funny thing, but one of the things I will think about a lot is the fact that there were so few fires in Plymouth all the while I was here.

"Looking at the record, there were only two major fires in the past year. But when it comes to memories of fires, I never will forget the GM Transmission plant fire in Livonia. That was back in 1953 and it was the worst fire I ever have seen or even heard about."

What made it such a bad fire?

The acting chief rubbed his chin a moment and then explained it was bad because the firemen couldn't get at it.

Reluctantly he recalled that there was a flaw in the total construction and when the roof started to

go, the firemen couldn't get into the building. Because of that the plant was burned out and the firemen were almost helpless except for pouring water on the fallen pieces.

Another unforgettable blaze was during the 1967 riots in Detroit.

He recalled how helpless the firemen were. Only this time it was for lack of equipment.

"All we could do there, too, was to pour water on the fallen pieces and when the out-of-town departments were called in to help, it was just a matter of exercise. Nothing had a real chance of being saved."

The chief missed the P&A Theater fire on Penniman Avenue some years ago but only because he was confined to a hospital for surgery.

The two major fires in the past year were at the body shop next to the Packaging Corp. just off Sheldon Road and at the Wilde home on Sheldon Road. The body shop damage was rated at \$60,000 and smoke damage at the Wilde home at \$47,000.

As he sat at his desk recalling the highlights of a long career, he couldn't help picturing in his mind how he started at South Lyon in 1938.

"In those days the townships didn't have fire departments and we covered distances as far away as Novi."

There were only three men in the Plymouth Department when he left South Lyon to come here as a volunteer. Later he was given a full-time job. He has been active ever since.

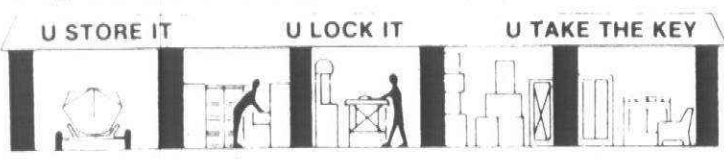

Accept homes for retarded with an open mind

Perhaps this time it will be different.

Maybe Canton residents, when made aware of plans to build three homes for mentally retarded youths and adults in the township, will react differently than their neighbors in other suburban communities.

In such communities as Troy and Redford Township, citizens have gone to court to stop homes for retarded adults or shot through the windows in protest under the cowardly cloak of night.

Fear does it: Fear that these homes will lower property values; fear of those who are "different."

Now it's Canton's turn. Will those same people who watched appalled at the television reports of

vandalism of a Troy home for retarded adults suddenly rise up against a home in their own neighborhood?

Will they cite fear of falling property values, concern that the homes won't "fit in the neighborhood" — every argument that has ever been used against special homes?

Will we hear, ad infinitum, "I have nothing against retarded people, but ..."

Let's be optimistic.

Canton is a community comprising a large share of people of childbearing age. Some residents have already started families; some plan to do so in the near future.

At last check, life wasn't handing out any guarantees that every child born is this world will be mentally, physically and emotionally perfect.

Some people are born with a handicap; inevitably, their parents suffer some measure of guilt about that fact, although it is usually unwarranted guilt.

Handicaps, however, won't go away no matter how much they are ignored, refuted or vilified.

Handicapped people can't go away just because luckier people choose to pretend they do not exist. They can only be put out of sight and out of mind.

Perhaps the mentally retarded are at times unpleasant or depressing to deal with. But mental retardation does not mean its victim is incapable of

feeling.

We all know this, deep down. We know that our children blessed with healthy minds and bodies are merely lucky, not entitled to these gifts.

And we know, although we do not like to face it, that our own families are no more immune to tragedy than anyone else's.

There is no cure for mental retardation. The affliction can be minimized with training and understanding and a decent environment.

Providing these things is the goal of such homes as the three proposed for Canton Township.

It is a goal to be aided and encouraged, not hindered.

Big tax cut brought jobs

In June 1978, California voters approved Proposition 13, which reduced their property taxes by a stunning 13 percent.

We were told at the time that this would lead to the demise of the state because it would drastically reduce public services and force new kinds of taxes on business to replace lost revenue.

We were told it would slow economic growth because business would have less money to invest in plant and equipment, which in turn would create new jobs.

More than a year has passed, and the first signs are coming in loud and clear.

SINCE THE ADOPTION of Proposition 13, some 100,000 workers have left local government employment, reducing the rolls by 8 percent. Actually, only 17,000 were laid off. The rest quit or retired and were never replaced.

Yet school systems, police departments and other public agencies are still functioning, although on moderately tighter budgets.

On the other hand, California has added 552,000 new jobs in the private sector — enough to absorb laid-off government workers plus an immigration of job seekers from other states — and still reduce unemployment faster than the national average.

California's unemployment rate has historically been running two points higher than the national average, but today it is running a half-point lower than the national average.

The \$6.4 billion tax cut from Proposition 13, followed by a \$1 billion cut in the state income tax which was pushed through the legislature, added a healthy stimulus to California's economy.

DURING THE FIRST year after Proposition 13 was passed, personal incomes rose 14 percent. Few states did better. The U.S. Commerce Department attributes a full 2 percent to the effects of the tax cuts.

The property tax helped break a downward trend in housing, and the increased personal income helped to increase consumer spending.

The state's inhabitants have unquestionably been inconvenienced by a variety of modest cutbacks in local services. But their increased income has also increased revenue from the state income tax, which has been used to lessen the blow on municipalities.

The state treasury surplus today is higher than it was at the time Proposition 13 was passed.

SHORTLY AFTER California passed this controversial amendment, Michigan passed the Headlee tax limitation amendment. It didn't reduce taxes but put a lid on increased taxes in the future.

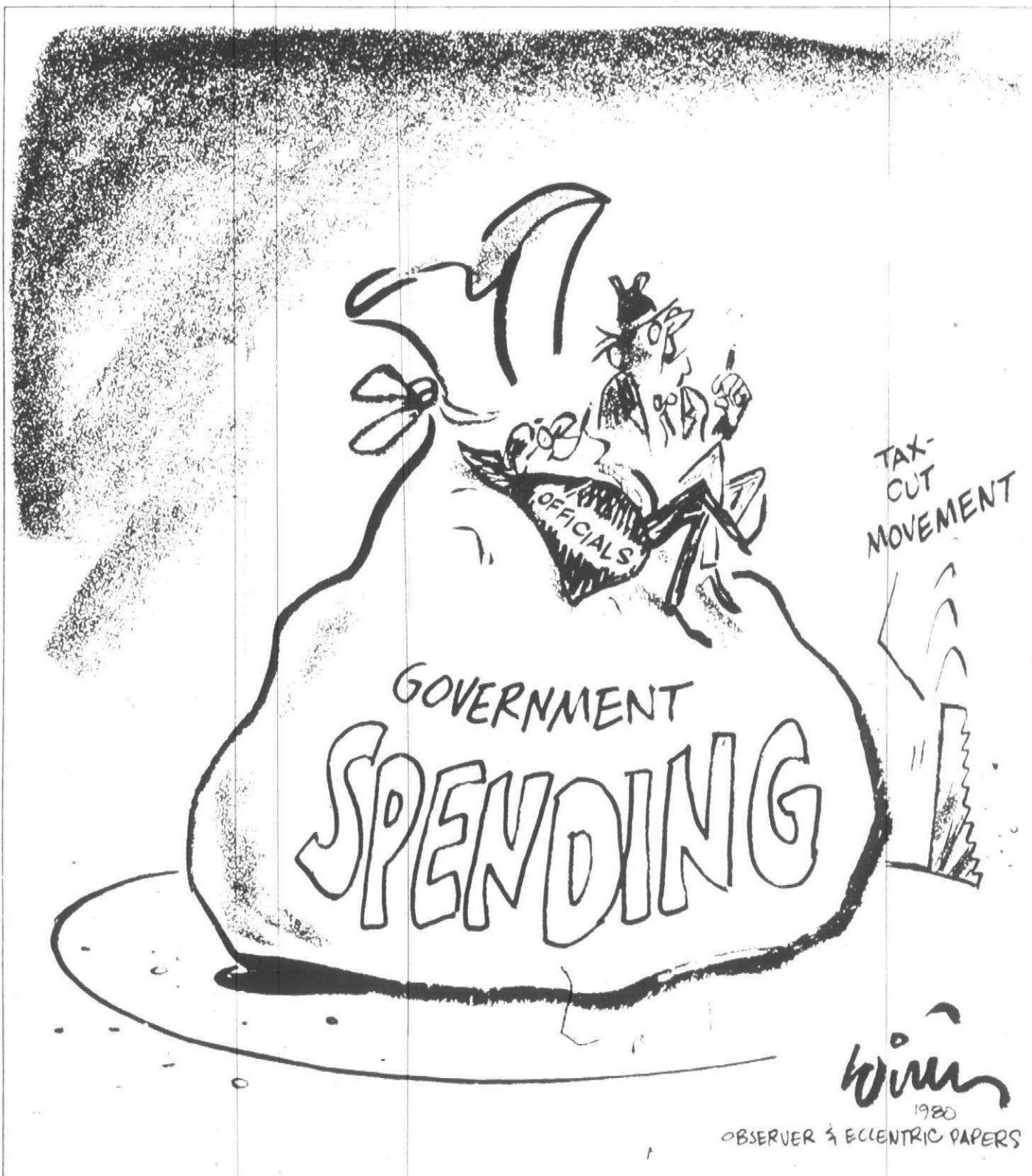
Today Michigan has seen little benefit from the Headlee amendment.

Michigan voters rejected an amendment similar to Proposition 13 because they were convinced it was too drastic a cure for burgeoning governmental costs.

History is now proving that it takes something dramatic like Proposition 13 to bring to public officials' attention the idea that higher taxes and the higher government spending which follows are not the way to improve the economic well-being of the nation.

Maybe Michigan will be smarter next time around.

When the prematurely white-haired manager of the Tigers took to the podium, he broke every rule and precedent of the association of managers when he dropped this bomb:

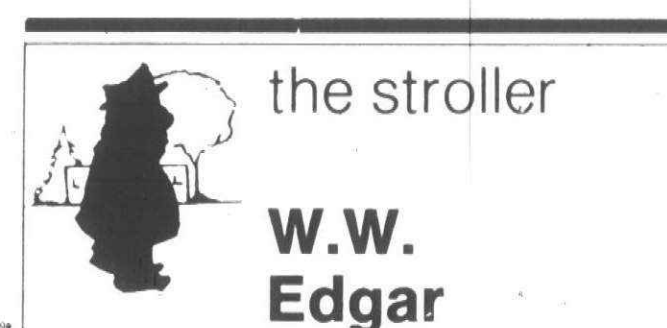
"I am an egotist. And I want to see my name in the paper."

Then, with a broad smile on his tanned face, he told the writers that his door was always open, that they were welcome to drop in any time.

There was nothing new in this remark, as all managers tell you that at the beginning of their term on a new job. But Sparky stunned even the oldtimers when he added:

"I don't want you fellows criticizing my players. Instead blame me, for whatever they do on the playing field I have told them to do. It's my fault when things go wrong. So don't hesitate to blame me."

WELL, THE STROLLER has been around for quite a while. He has listened to managers from the days of Ty Cobb, and they all have their own way of doing things. But never before had he heard a manager ask for criticism.

Questions about Super Sewer

What legal right did the Canton Township Board of Trustees have to vote ("gamble" — Treasurer Jim Donahue's word) \$307,000 of our money on building Super Sewer?

The Headlee Amendment requires a vote of the people on sewers before bonds can be sold to construct sewers, so I don't see how the Board can commit \$307,000 to be spent on design since that is part of construction costs. The township already has existing a \$7.3 million water and sewer debt.

How much will Super Sewer cost residents and taxpayers? The total cost is at least \$71 million. A federal grant (taxes) will pay \$54 million; state grants (taxes) will pay 5 percent (\$3.5 million).

That leaves a \$13.5 million local tax share. It is actually all our money — only out of a different pocket. What about maintenance costs?

Why is the Township Board giving total control of operation and water and sewer rate setting to the Wayne County Board of Commissioners?

It has been front-page news for years that Wayne County is operating in the red and asking the state for financial assistance (our money) due to mismanagement.

Over a hundred Canton residents recently appealed to the Board the fact that they cannot afford their water bills increasing at astronomical rates. An 80 percent increase was scheduled for this January. Sewer rates have increased more than 1,000 percent since 1969 and 430 percent since 1975 and are still going up.

WHY ARE THE township and county still forging ahead with Super Sewer plans when state law set up SEMCOG as the regional planning authority for Wayne County and "urging" officials to slow down sewer construction because existing sewers are more than adequate?

Why did the Township Board suddenly feel intimidated when Wayne County said the "system will not include any communities not signing the agreement by Tuesday"?

Canton has been getting these ultimatums regularly since about 1973. Super Sewer was first proposed 14 years ago.

If medium-sized sewage plants are more efficient and cost effective, as stated by Wayne County representative (Duane) Egeland in the Detroit News (Jan. 1), why is he pressuring Canton to build Super Sewer?

The gigantic Macomb sewer collapse of 1977 cost people \$15 million on water bills just for repair. Determination of negligence and who should pay (designer or contractor) is still in court.

These residents must have suffered immensely from 8 million gallons of raw sewage dumped daily for two weeks into the Clinton River and Lake St. Clair.

Why couldn't Canton do what some other communities such as Ann Arbor have done and pull out of Super Sewer because of exorbitant costs, environmental fears and loss of local control?

They got a federal grant and now operate their own treatment plant. Why did the board vote for Super Sewer in order "to grow industrially and any other way"?

CITIZEN'S ADVISORY groups have repeatedly begged for growth control in order to stabilize taxes, schools, services and environment. Lack of sewer capacity has been Canton's only legal defense for growth control.

For years developers have consistently been getting plat approvals for subdivisions with the stipulation that building is dependant on sewer capacity.

How can Canton's plans for voter-approved concept of farmland preservation proceed? Citizens' study groups and surveys have shown that it is desired and necessary. Agricultural products have become an international tool for world peace. Agricultural land tends to be usurped as soon as sewers become available.

Are broken promises all Canton voters can expect from board officials they elected?

"What do you intend to catch with a pickle?" the man asked incredulously.

"Haven't you ever heard of pickled herring?" came Daddy's flippant reply.

ONE OF MY favorite memories was the night the wall came down.

My mother has always been a frustrated interior decorator. She would envision where any professional decorator would fear to tread.

The wall between the kitchen and dining room didn't belong in her scheme, and one night, during dinner, Mom decided the wall had to go.

Less than an hour later, Mom put down her hammer. We sat in a sea of plasterboard, like the ancient ruins of Rome, but the wall no longer existed.

WHEN DADDY RETIRED, they sold their home in Bad Axe and moved to Inisfree. Mom rebuilt the entire house with loving touches only a wife and grandmother could plan.

apartments below. The bottom half of the door would keep little ones safe near the stairs.

They replaced the walls facing the lake with one expanse of picture windows. I guess the beach had become too far away on moonlit nights. Now they could sit snugly, side by side, and watch the passing boats.

Even the winter with the icy lakeshore was beautiful in their eyes. Perhaps, when you've reached the autumn of life, even winter holds enchantment.

NOW IT'S REALITY. Daddy is gone.

Mom couldn't live at Inisfree without her Irishman because she would only wake up every morning expecting him to be there. My brother's invitation to live near him in Virginia was far enough away to leave a dream behind.

Even my teenagers' eyes grow moist when I say we must sell Inisfree. I don't see Inisfree any more, only ghosts of tiny cowboys and Indians running happily about, followed by my favorite "leprechaun" who, when he left, took the rainbow from the sky.

If anyone passes a house at Port Sanilac with a sign that should read "Dreams for Sale," then you've found Inisfree. You can buy the dreams.

The memories? Sorry — those are mine to keep forever.

Win 7th straight at Monroe

Rock grapplers set torrid pace

The Plymouth Salem wrestling team continues to cause tremors around the state of Michigan.

The latest earthquake came last Saturday at Monroe when the Rocks captured their seventh straight tournament, outpointing seven other teams.

Ranked No. 4 in Class A, Salem took the team title with 181 points. Saline was second with 149 followed by Suburban Eight League rival Belleville with 139½. Other teams which competed included Adrian, fourth, 90; Monroe, fifth, 89; Monroe Catholic Central, 45½; Tecumseh, 44½; and Dearborn, eighth, 27.

"It was a good journey and the competition was strong — teams like Belleville and Saline," said Salem coach Ron Krueger, whose team is also 8-0 in dual meets.

"It was well run and we enjoyed it," he said.

The Rocks had four individual champions and three runners-up.

At 107 pounds, Salem's Jim Schultz raised his record to 33-2 overall and won the Hustler Award by defeating Rob Yates of Monroe in the finals, 14-3.

Teammate Jeff Brown (121) also came through with a first place finish. He raised his personal record to 27-7 with 13-0 decision over Belleville's Fred Vera in the finals.

MARK ROSS, a senior, also took an individual title when he defeated Saline's Kevin McCollough in the finals at 128 pounds, 5-0. Ross is now 33-4-1 overall.

Salem's fourth crown came when Jerry Valchine (0) defeated Saline's Steve Hatfield in the finals, 16-9. The

Rock grappler upped his record to 36-2. Second place finishers for the Rocks included Jeff Powers (187), Jeff Dunson (114) and junior Steve Szilagyi (167).

Powers lost a close match to Saline's Jerry Hanson in the finals, 8-5, while Szilagyi was upended by tourney MVP John Shafer, also of Saline, on a pin at 3:40.

Dunson reached the finals, but was unable to compete because an injury to his mouth which required seven stitches after he beat Belleville's Dave Cook in the semifinals, 4-1.

Third place finishers for Salem included Scott Piper (157), Stan Snider (200) and Greg Gattoni (heavyweight).

Piper took the consolation final by decisioning Tecumseh's Chris Silberhorn, 15-0. It was the second straight decision for Piper over Sil-

berhorn. Snider took care of Bill Klumpp of Monroe in the consolation finals, 15-2, while Gattoni downed Ralph Mahlak for the second time, 2-1. Gattoni won the first time on a pin.

Freshman Jeff Vojcek also added to the victory for Salem with a fourth place finish at 100 pounds. He lost to Walter Young of Belleville in the consolation finals, 14-6.

SALEM WILL host Livonia Bentley Thursday at 6:30 p.m. and then travels to Walled Lake Western Friday at 5:15 p.m. to meet the host team, North Farmington and Howell.

Salem's biggest test will come a week from Thursday at No. 5 rated Trenton. The match will determine the leader in the regular season standings of the Suburban Eight League.

Salem cagers rally at Belleville

Plymouth Salem rallied in the final quarter and withstood a Belleville onslaught in the final minute to post a 49-46 Suburban Eight League cage victory Tuesday night.

It was a close struggle all the way. Salem capitalized on free throws down the stretch to thwart the Belleville upset bid.

The game was dominated by fouls and turnovers (37 total).

Salem built a 20-11 lead midway through the second quarter but found itself down by three at halftime, 26-23.

The Tigers managed to hold that lead until 6:02 left in the game when Salem center Howard Monk, who led all scorers with 17 points, hit a layup. He gave Salem the lead for good with 2:53 left on a rebound basket off a missed free throw by teammate Jim Anderson.

With 59 seconds remaining, Belleville guard Glenn Johnson scored to cut the Rocks' advantage to 47-46.

The Tigers then fouled Anderson with 46 seconds left. He missed the front end of a one-and-one situation. Guard Charles Blackmon then followed suit 16 seconds later, missing a free

throw in another one-and-one attempt.

Rob Neu then stepped up to the line for Salem with just 22 seconds left and failed to convert the first of bonus penalty.

HE THEN fouled Belleville's Mike Sampson on the ensuing play two seconds later. And you guessed it, Sampson failed to hit his single attempt as the ball banged off a Rock player under the Tiger basket.

Belleville then inbounded the ball and threw up two medium range jumpers in the final 10 seconds. Scott Bublin, who scored 10 points and grabbed nine rebounds, iced it when he snared an important rebound with only three seconds to go.

He was fouled on the play and converted both free throws to give Salem three-point win.

"It was a free throw game with the clock stopping a lot," sighed Salem Coach Fred Thomann, whose team upped its overall mark to 11-1 and 6-0 in the league.

"It's our turn to go on the road and we have to deal with it," he said. "Tonight we had a rough time on the line."

Salem hit 17 of 30 foul shots for 56 percent. Belleville, with numerous

chances to win it, hit only 10 of 22 for 45 percent.

"We could have won it," said a disappointed Belleville Coach Tom Niemi. "We had the last four shots. I'm proud of our effort, but we always seem to come up short. We're a little shy at the critical times."

The Tigers, despite a 2-10 mark, gave the No. 9 ranked Rocks all they could handle.

"We played a ranked team and they knew they were in the game," reminded Niemi. "We have great respect for Plymouth Salem and I think they feel the same about us. We've been down to the wire before."

Salem started the game out with a surprise zone defense to contain the quick Belleville quintet.

The Rocks, normally a man-to-man team, reverted to its standard defense in the final quarter, holding Belleville to 10 points.

"We got a little spurt from our zone and it gave us a change of pace," explained Thomann. "I stayed with it though a little too long."

"We got to a point where we stopped playing ball and dealt with the surroundings. We got dynamite games, I thought, from (Mike) McBride and

(Leigh) Langkabel off the bench."

The game was dominated by fouls as both teams were whistled for a total of 52 infractions. Three Belleville players fouled out. Neu, who had seven assists, exited with his fifth with 20 seconds left.

Monk, who grabbed 12 rebounds, scored eight of his 17 points in the final period.

Belleville had three players in double figures — Blackmon (13), Johnson (10) and reserve forward Charles Gardner (10).

Belleville had visions of upset on its home court, gaining a 33-25 lead with 6:08 left in the third quarter. But shortly after, Thomann's squad began its rally.

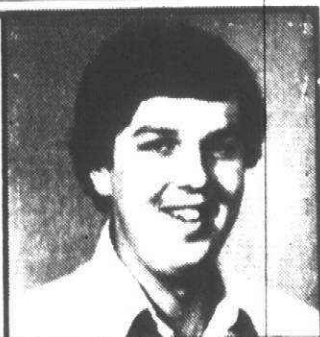

The Plymouth Canton wrestling team tied for eighth in the largest one-day wrestling tournament in Michigan, the Rochester Adams Invitational, Saturday. They scored 86 points among 25 teams.

Host team Rochester Adams finished in first place with 180½ points followed by Montrose (168½), Oscoda (129½), Grand Rapids Creston (121), Howell (99½), Clio (89), Northville (87½), Bloomfield Hills Lasher (87½) and Warren Fitzgerald (86).

The Chiefs wrestled well, according to coach Dan Chrenko, who was displeased with the way the tournament was set up.

"We had three wrestlers win three matches and still not get medals because of the seeding," said Chrenko.

The state rule says that only four matches can be wrestled by any individual in one day.

"The way it was set up was to protect the best wrestlers and since our kids aren't known out in Oakland County very much, we weren't seeded very high, if at all," explained Chrenko. "So when our kids come in and beat the seeded kids, it ended up they can't wrestle any more because they have already wrestled four matches. In fact, in one weight class, there wasn't even a championship match wrestled because both the kids in the finals had already

wrestled four times that day."

The Chiefs fared well with eight wrestlers winning three of their four matches.

"We scored in every weight class but two," said Chrenko. "I'm very pleased with the way the kids wrestled. They did a good job."

Dave Vaughn (169) won three matches on the day, increasing his record to 24-7 and placed fifth. Paul Mooney (187) also placed fifth and raised his win total to 21.

Tom Harrell (114), another fifth-place finisher, became the winning wrestler on the team with 25 victories.

Sophomore Steve Hamblin (147) rounded out the fifth place finishers for Canton. Hamblin has tied the school record for most wins by a sophomore with 22.

Bob Mullen placed sixth at 157 pounds.

"Steve (Hamblin) has been wrestling very well," said Chrenko. "(Kevin) Santilli (128) had a great day in beating a state qualifier, and Bob (Mullen) also had a great day for us."

Tim Racer (134) joined the 20-win club for the Chiefs, capturing three matches and losing only one despite not placing in the top six. Tom Holloway (107) also won three for Canton.

Freshman Todd Bartlett continues to rack up the victories for the Chiefs as

he raised his win total to 19 with three wins.

"We had a long hard week," said Chrenko. "We're looking forward to a rest."

BELL MAINTAINED that his squad must keep up the momentum going into Friday's Western Six League game at Northville.

"We have to play with consistency," he said. "We've won big like this before and then come out flat for the next game."

"We can't afford to do that against Northville."

They're a good team and we have a lot of respect for them. If we lose one more league game we're out of the race. Every game from now on is very important."

Waterford Mott leads the league with a 5-0 mark followed by Canton and Livonia Churchill at 3-2.

Three other Canton players hit for double figures against Thurston — Brad Westin (17), Sean Houle (12) and Dave Malek (10). Mark Maddock and Andy Amos each had nine for the Eagles.

Canton went also without leading scorer Dave Visser, who was home in bed with the flu. It is unknown if he'll be ready for Northville.

THE CANTON freshmen team got 14 points from Don Dombey and 12 from Mike Von Behren and went on to defeat Farmington Power Tuesday afternoon, 68-48.

The Chiefs, who led at halftime, 27-20, also got eight each from Mike Scarpello and Jim Freeman.

Canton is now 3-2 overall and will meet Walled Lake Western Tuesday at 3:45 p.m. in a home game.

"I hope no such thing happens," he said, "as I'm counting on him to take a regular turn on the mound along with Jack Morris, Milt Wilcox and Dave Rozema."

"But don't forget, he hasn't pitched in two years."

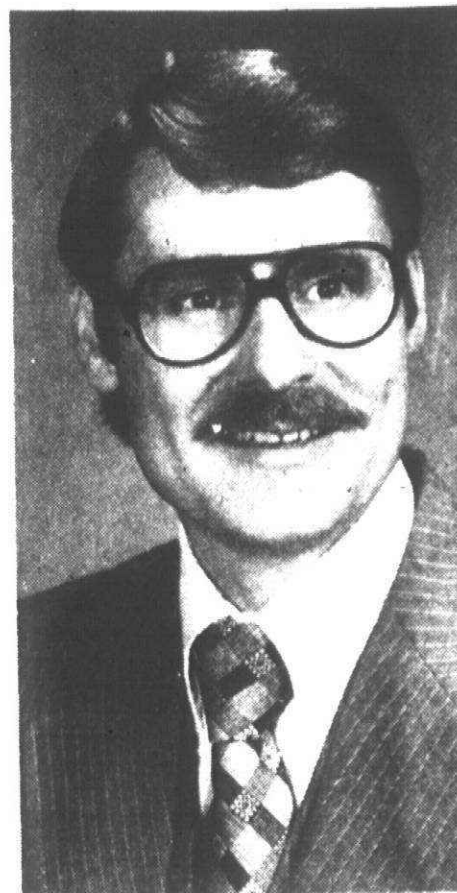

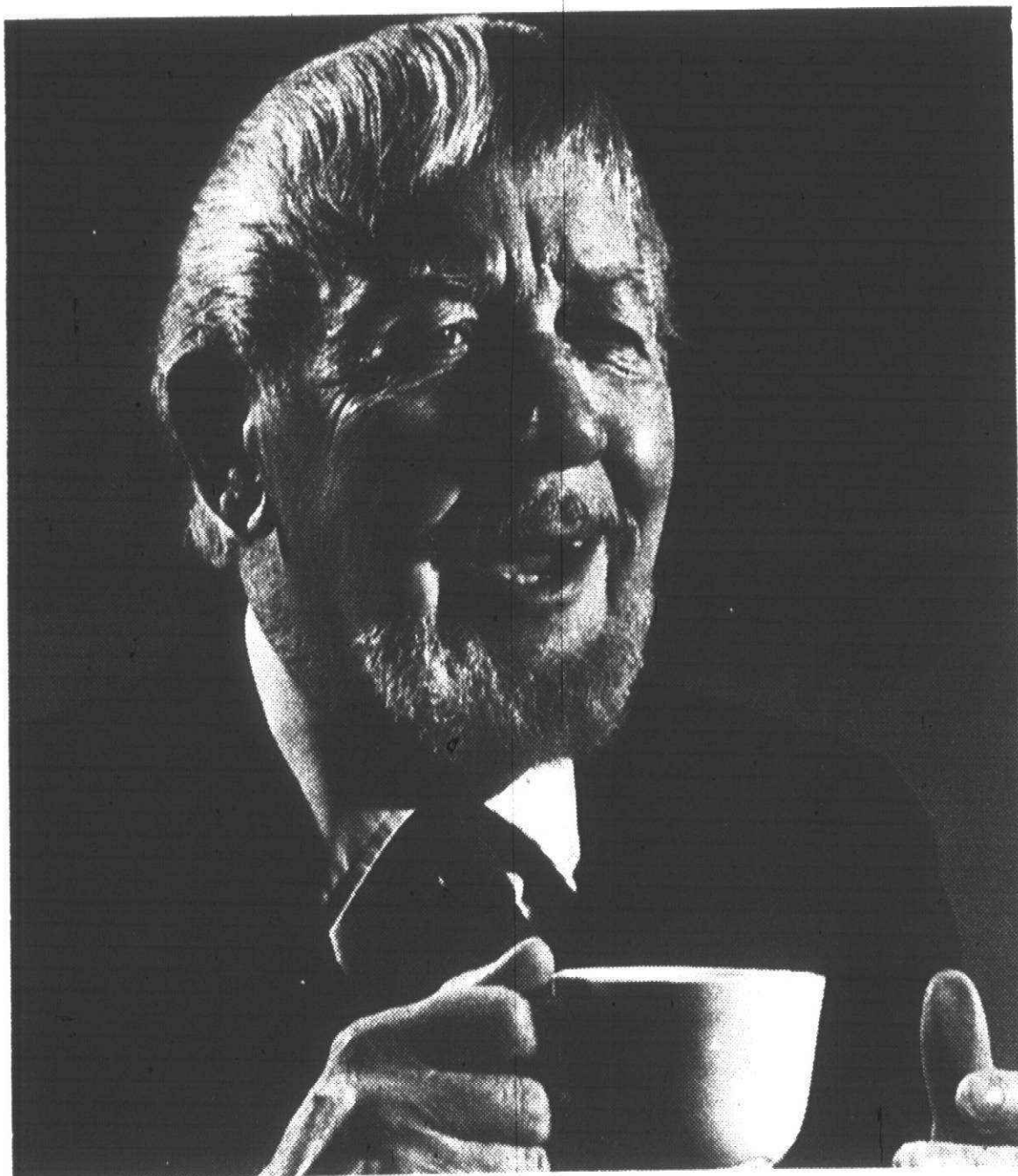
"We feel certain that German from Russia families live in this area and may be unaware that this southeast Michigan chapter exists and can help them in compiling their family histories," said Henry.

Germans from Russia trace their ancestry to the 1700s when the German princess, Catherine the Great, invited Germans, especially farmers, to settle in the Volga River area of Russia. With the Communist revolution of 1917, the German population was cut in half by famine and persecution. Eventually, they were forced from their homes and sent to remote sections of Russia, including Siberia. Thousands fled to North America, especially United States, Canada and Mexico.

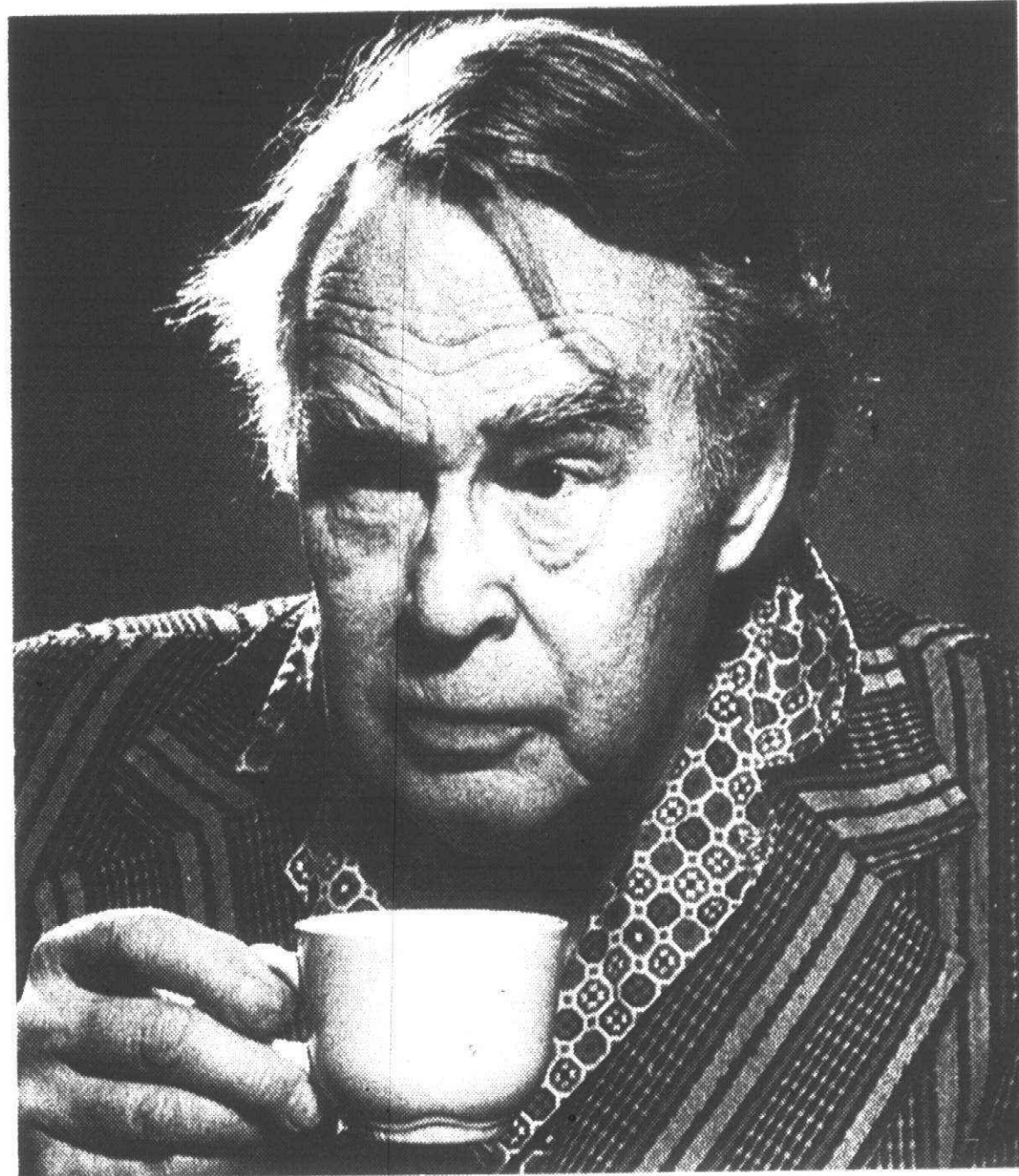

Old manse readied for 'boat people'

Getting a five-bedroom house ready for a family that has nothing, possible not even shoes, is a big job in anyone's language.

Yet that's exactly the job that members of First United Presbyterian Church in Plymouth have taken on.

Fortunately, they already have the house. For the rest, they're going to need help from their friends.

A specially formed Boat People Committee of the church has sent in an application to sponsor a 10-member Vietnamese family.

They're expected to arrive any time within the next two to six weeks from a Cambodian refugee camp.

THE NEWCOMERS will be housed in the Presbyterian manse beside the church on Church Street. The manse has not been used as such for seven years, and recently an effort was made to find a buyer who would move the building so the land could be turned into a parking lot.

There were no takers, and so the empty building was a good starting point when members of the church and the society committee began to investigate the possibilities of sponsoring a family. These committee members are

Judy Phelps, Marge Ackerman, Liz Cardinal, Jim Sockolowski, Helen Van Dyke, George Tully and Jean Ryder. It was this group which was expanded to form the Boat People Committee.

Other groups in the church are helping out in the project.

Tuesday evening the deacons are sponsoring a potluck dinner, beginning at 6:30 in the church. A freewill offering will be taken, and a representative of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, one of the first church in the Detroit area to sponsor a boat family, will give a slide presentation.

On Feb. 9 and 10, senior high school students from the church will paint the manse and clean the carpets.

Members of the Mission Society

group are standing by, ready to refit and refurbish curtains which may be donated to the house.

"We need everything, but with 10 people we really need mattresses," commented Mrs. Phelps. Also needed are kitchen utensils, silver, dishes, cups, glasses, linens, towels, sheets, blankets, furniture and so on.

PERSONS INTERESTED in making donations should call Mrs. Phelps at 455-2076, or Doris Stortors, chairman of the furnishing committee, at 455-1685. The Rev. Tom Cook, new assistant minister, is the committee advisor. Arrangements will be made to pick up large donations. Small items may be

left at the church office.

Mrs. Phelps says that it is possible that their family will arrive with nothing. Even if these people manage to escape from Vietnam with a few possessions, they are frequently stolen, she said. Previous boat people have arrived here with either no shoes or only open thongs.

But the committee cannot prepare clothing for their arrival until they know the people's ages and sizes.

The church specified a Vietnamese family in its application to Church World Service in New York City because there are other Vietnamese families in the area. Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church sponsored a family two years ago. They are now

living in Canton, and there are other Vietnamese families in this area, Mrs. Phelps has learned.

The church members will get help in communicating with the new arrivals who will likely not speak English from various agencies, including the Catholic Services Agencies.

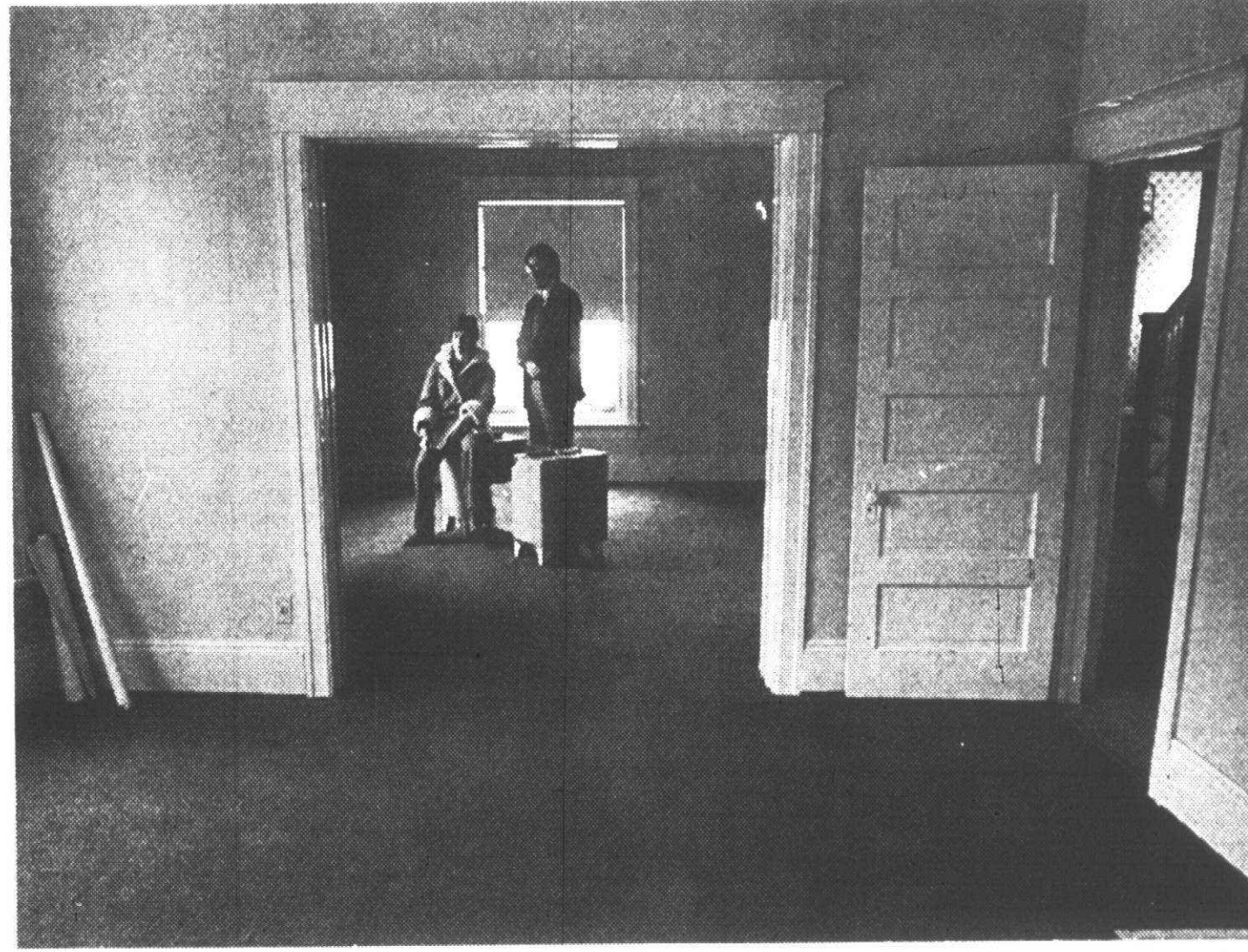
"Many churches and agencies outside our group are willing to give help," said Mrs. Phelps.

BUT THE CHURCH does recognize that it is making a large commitment. It will be totally responsible for supporting the 10 persons for a year or more depending on how long it takes for the family breadwinners to get employment which will pay enough to cover their needs. However, medical and dental care is taken care of under a Medicaid Refugee Act passed by Congress last year.

"It's a big responsibility, but it's exciting, too," said Mrs. Phelps. "We feel like we are doing something. At the time we made our application, there were 400,000 people in refugee camps. There are probably more now."

Basketweaving, from 7-9 p.m. on Feb. 6 and 13 (Wednesdays) and during the same hours on Feb. 22 and 29 and March 7 (Fridays).

Theresa Ohno will be the teacher. Students will need the same supplies as listed above.

INTRODUCTION TO the camera, from 7-9 p.m., five Wednesdays, beginning Feb. 20. Gary Caskey will be the instructor. Students should take a 35mm camera, and will be expected to shoot three to four rolls of color transparencies.

Bandbox classes will be given to in two different three-week sessions. The first will be from 10 a.m. to noon, on Wednesdays, beginning Feb. 20; the second will be from 7-9 p.m., Thursdays, beginning Feb. 21.

They are helped by grownups who have written the scripts, music and lyrics, and who provide backstage assistance.

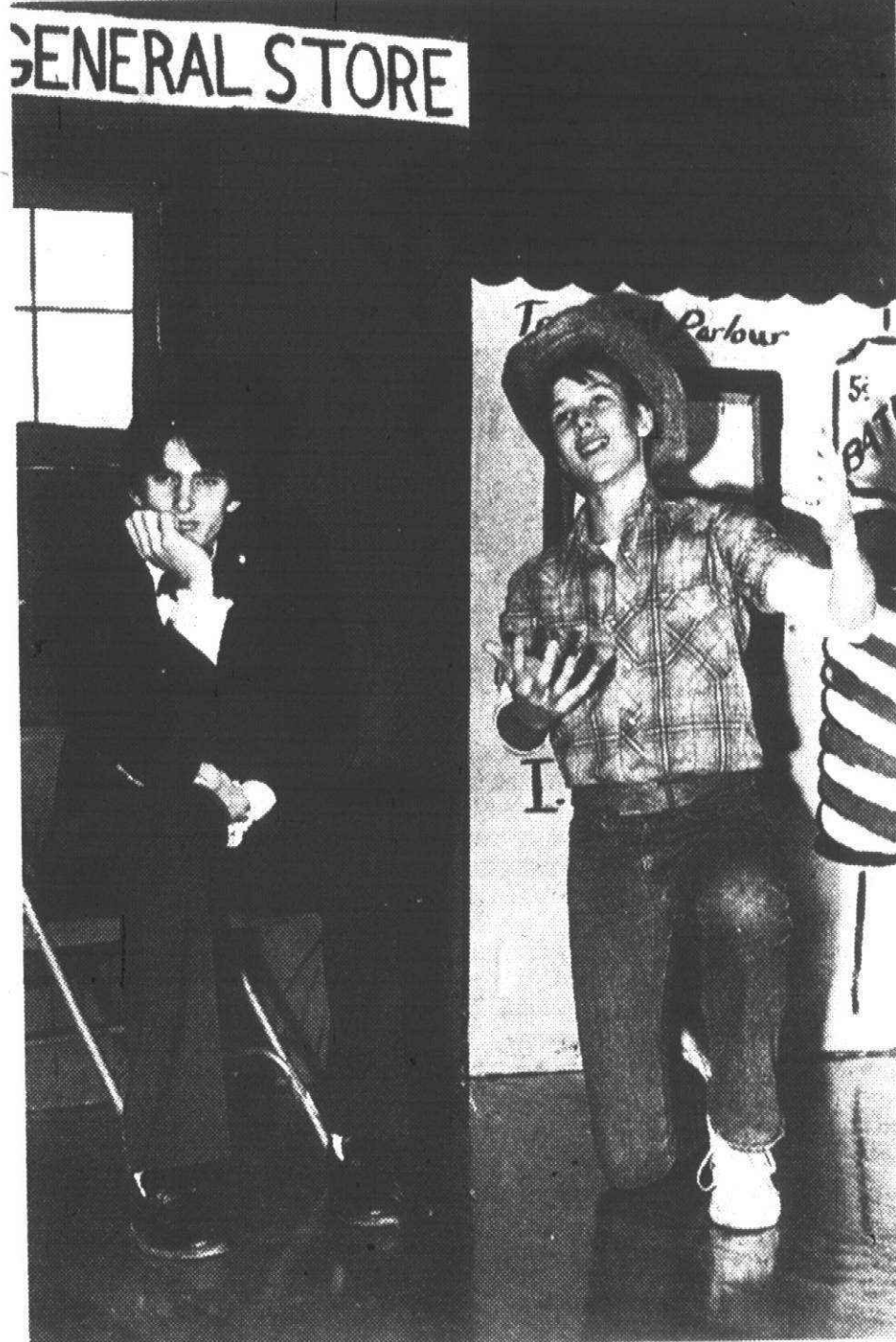

There's nothing like a secret message

The telling of secrets imparts an identity, a certain separateness, a role elevated over others. There is power in deciding who should know, who should hear, who should share the secret.

Somehow whispering gives greater meaning and a larger importance to what is being whispered. The whisperer also invariably garners the undivided attention to the listener.

Perhaps even more fun is the secret relayed without even a whisper.

Most public schools do not intentionally endorse commercial products. However schools do accept material from business that is supposed to be of an "educational nature." Much of this free information does double as advertising, according to Sheila Harty of Ralph Nader's Center for Study of Responsive Law. Ms. Harty said that studies show schools spend only 1 percent of their budgets on instructional materials and cannot afford to keep pace with ever-changing curriculum.

His tail may wag, but breath's a drag



Question: I have a 7-year-old poodle with a social problem. He is a great dog, but whenever he pants in your face, you nearly pass out. Is there anything to help for bad breath in dogs?

T.M., Livonia

Answer: The most cause of halitosis (bad breath) in dogs and cats is periodontal disease.

In the early stages, the soft plaque can be removed by feeding your dog hard biscuits and by brushing his teeth daily. A 50-50 mixture of salt and baking soda mixed with water to form a paste may be used.

Commercial dog toothpastes are also available from a veterinarian. Human toothpastes tend to cause stomach upset in dogs.

In later stages, the harder calculus is removed by a veterinarian with an ultrasonic dental scaler. This is usually done under anesthesia. If the gums are infected, antibiotics will be given.

In a healthy dog tooth, note the channel between the gum and tooth.

In diseased tooth, if unattended, plaque and calculus formations grow, pus builds up, and the gum is separated from the tooth. (Source: Nabisco, makers of Milk-Bone brand dog biscuits.)

International woes fire up the market

Stock market activity over the past few weeks has been spectacular, to say the least.

The market, has gained appreciably 6 percent since the beginning of the year, while many individual stocks have far surpassed that amount.

The volume of trading has leaped to average of more than 50 million shares, straining the mechanical facilities of the securities industry almost to its maximum.

The jolt of world events, particularly in Iran and Afghanistan, has caused investors to re-evaluate the entire investment arena.

For many years investors have been primarily interested in attaining the higher income that has been available through corporate and municipal bonds and high dividend paying stocks, as opposed to other types of investments.

SUDDENLY, the emphasis has changed. Motivated by the spectacular rise in the price of gold and silver, common stocks of literally any and all companies that own natural resources of any kind have enjoyed strong investor demand.

The logic follows the line of thinking that all

tangible assets — particularly those still in the ground — will increase in price commensurate to the increases in the prices of gold and silver.

As a result, the prices of the shares of practically all mining companies have increased appreciably.

The oils, which were already strong because of the increases in the price of oil, have added even more to their prices based upon the value of the oil reserves still in the ground.

ANOTHER AREA of the market that has benefited from recent events is the defense industry.

The Russian invasion of Afghanistan will almost certainly guarantee that the U. S. defense budget will be increased substantially.

The most obvious beneficiary to any increased defense expenditures would be the aerospace industry. Companies such as Boeing, Lockheed, General Dynamics, McDonnell Douglas, Martin Marietta, and Rockwell have already experienced sharp upward moves in their stocks.

There are many other areas of the market

that stand to benefit from the situation, such as electronics, steel, and aluminum.

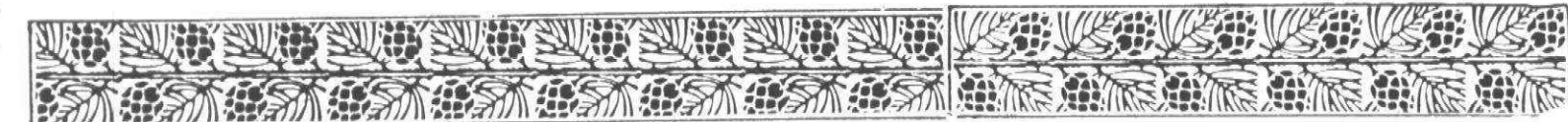
THE AILING auto industry also stands to gain from the increased tension between the U.S. and Russia provoked by their thrust into its neighbor's territory.

Chrysler, especially, has already received a multimillion dollar contract to build tanks. While this order was already on the books and would have probably come anyway without the Bolshevik aggression, it is probable that the order is more secure under present circumstances and there could be further orders forthcoming.

This could prove to be a very important crutch to the company during this difficult transition to the "new" Chrysler.

While the rattling of the swords is disturbing, it is reassuring to know that the government and American industry is ready to meet the challenge.

More will want houses in the '80s — Realtors

The housing market will face increased pressure in the 1980s to keep pace with a continuing high rate of new household formations, according to the Western Wayne Oakland Board of Realtors (WWOCBR).

"The Census Bureau reports that during the last decade the average household size dropped from 3.14 to 2.78 persons," said John J. Halser, WWOCBR president. "A major factor has been the growth in non-family households which consists of one resident or two or more unrelated persons."

The average annual increase in new households during the 1970s was 1.5 million, he said. Of the 77.3 million U.S. households last year, 19.8 million, or about one in four, were maintained as non-family units. A comparable figure in 1970 was one in five.

"WE EXPECT to see this same pattern continuing," Halser said, "with a growing number of singles, divorced people, widows and widowers maintaining their own residences. This will bring further changes not only in demand, but in the type of housing starts and an expected population growth of more than two million a year, it will become increasingly difficult to meet housing needs."

The WWOCBR president said that between two million and 2.4 million new residential units will be required each year to meet increased demand and replace units razed or otherwise destroyed.

"The threat of a housing shortage coupled with rising construction and land costs will continue to

increase the value of most existing homes kept in good repair," he said. "Many have more than doubled in value during the past 10 years. They may well sell for more than twice today's prices in 1990 dollars."

Halser said this would be especially true of single-family detached homes, but noted that, based on current trends, the value of townhouses and condominiums will follow the same path.

"WHILE THE 1970s saw the average new home increase in size and include more amenities, we believe there will be some reversal of this trend in the next few years," he said.

"Greater emphasis will be placed on supplying smaller, more efficient homes that make better use of space and use less energy."

"A growing shortage of land available for development and rising costs of improvement should mean more new homes being built on smaller lots and more cluster housing to hold down prices."

Halser noted that half of all wives are now working outside the home. By 1990, it is predicted that up to 70 percent of women in the 25 to 44 age group will hold such jobs.

"Dual incomes will continue to be an increasingly important factor in home purchases," he said. "But, with two or more members of the household holding jobs, there will be an added push for homes requiring less maintenance both inside and outside."

One-man band: People wonder where all the sound is coming from

Everyone knows what a one-man band is, right?

It's a fellow who plays several instruments at once and has cymbals strapped between his knees. A novelty. Can he really play all those instruments at one time?

If that's your impression of a one-man band, take a look at Dennis Vernier at the Spanish Colonial Room in Howard Johnson's on Ten Mile Road in Southfield.

Through 20th century technological advances Vernier has taken the old idea of a one-man band and considerably updated it.

"It's different and I like that part," the 28-year-old musician said. "There are thousands of musicians, but very few who would attempt what I'm trying to do."

"I WAS IN A FEW groups playing the guitar and musicians were always leaving. I was in a trio and the drummer left and the bass player and I worked together as a duo. When he left, I figured I could play the bass part with my foot pedal. So, I just sort of went on my own."

That was six years ago and during those years while playing a succession of clubs and private parties in the Detroit area, he has gradually added sophistication to his music.

He connected a phase shifter, a device that adds an organ sound, to his basic guitars. The six and twelve-string guitars are his main instruments.

"People wonder where all the sound is coming from," Vernier commented. "I've played to rooms that seat a couple of hundred people and they all react the same. They dance and applaud just as if I were a group playing for them."

VERNIER IS pleased with audience approval because he was worried about

how people would accept him as a one-man band. There was also the problem of being hired by club owners.

"Sometimes they hire on the basis of the number of people in a band rather than the quality of the music," Vernier says.

While his style is admittedly unique, his focus is always on the quality of the music. "I like to do a variety of things," he says, "and I'll play and sing songs that other musicians wouldn't try unless they have a band with them for support."

"I'll try anything. From 'Top 40' to disco, country, folk and light rock."

He proves this during one of his one-hour sets when he plays from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Tuesday-Friday, at the Spanish Colonial Room.

With his guitar strapped around his neck and his equipment plugged in, Vernier is as low key on stage as he is off.

HIS MUSIC ranges anywhere from Chuck Berry rock 'n' roll numbers alternated with Johnny Cash, to the Beatles and his own folk-like composition.

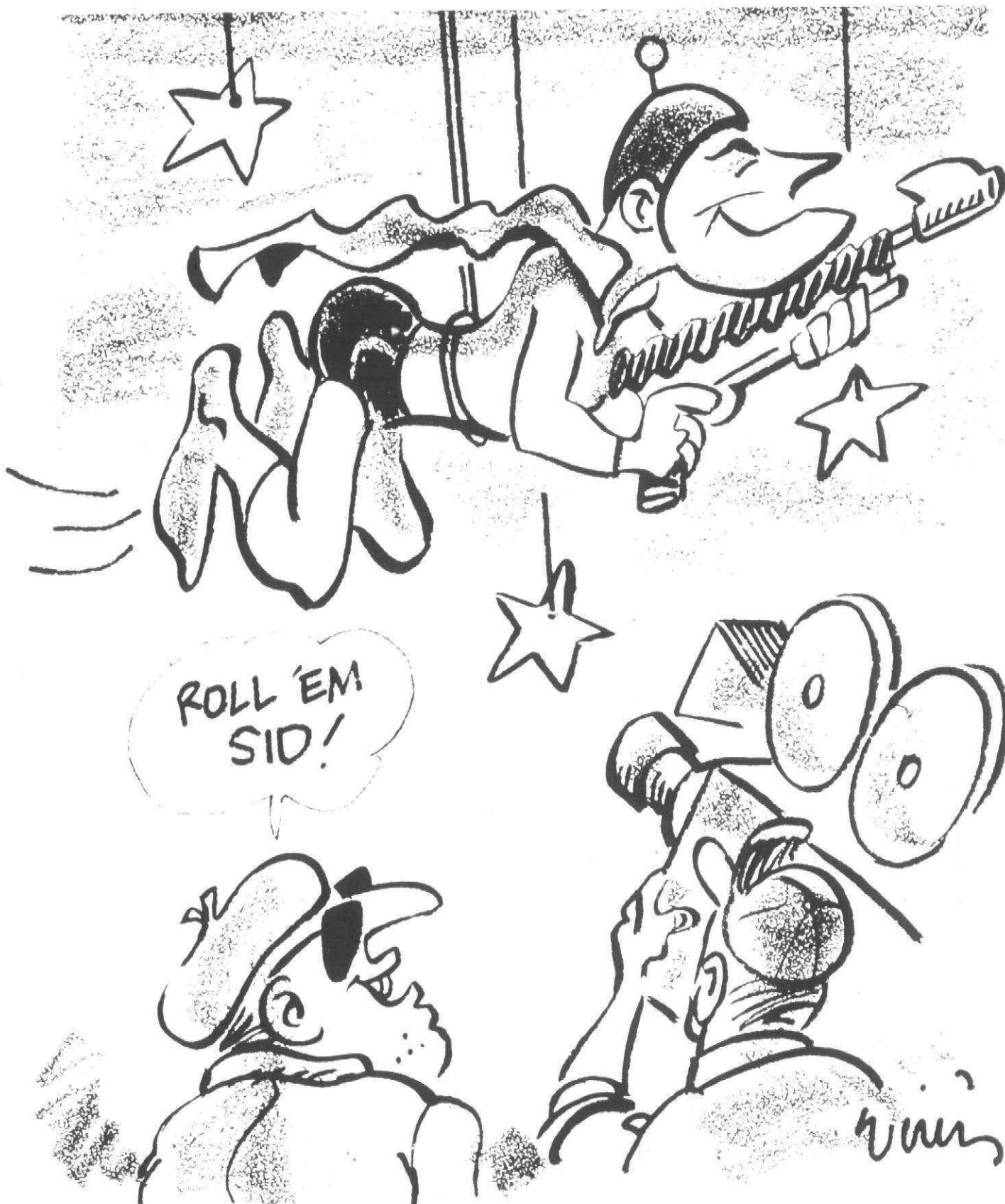
"I try to write tunes people can relate to," Vernier says. "I've always been impressed by writers who could write on any topic they desired."

Vernier's first instrument was a clarinet he had at age 11. That quickly gave way to an accordion and the accordion to a guitar.

Since he first played at the Steering Wheel in downtown Detroit eight years ago, Vernier has been composing more and more.

His guitar is central to his music, but his expertise at that instrument might be overlooked because of his restrained approach. In that regard, he resembles the man he has tried to emulate as a guitarist, Glen Campbell.

"I was always fascinated by Campbell's creativity," Vernier said. "People seem to underestimate his ability to play the guitar really well."



Star bores

Will we get blasted by film gimmicks?

In an effort to avoid a financial crash, film makers likely will run out space and special effects "right into the ground" during the early 1980s, predicts Frank Beaver, professor of communication at the University of Michigan.

"Hollywood is going to drive a good thing right into the ground by continuing to make films about space," says Beaver. "It may, in fact, already have begun to do so."

Space movies are one of the best mediums for special effects, which Beaver says film makers are using for their own sensation alistic appeal — much as cinema-scope, cinerama, three-dimension and sensurround were capitalized on during the 1950s and later — rather than to enhance the story.

But special effects have not confined themselves to the galaxies, Beaver points out.

The movie "1941" could have been "an interesting little comedy," he says, if the producers — who spent \$24 million on the film — had not been so sidetracked with special effects. "That's all it was — a special effects extravaganza."

THE INDUSTRY, he explains, seems destined to repeat itself, as it did during the 1930s when films about 18th-century heroes were in vogue.

The market became so saturated with that genre of film, he recalls, that one movie exhibitor finally proclaimed, "Don't send me any more movies where the hero writes with a feather." Now, Beaver imagines a movie-house manager making a parallel statement of "Don't send me any more movies where the hero flies through space."

With or without benefit of spaceship, sequels and comic book-like films, such as "Superman," also will flood the theaters, Beaver thinks.

"We're going to see the continuation of highly escapist films, the comic book approach to film. Producers are making a number of films based on comic books, films that look like comic books, as well as take their inspiration from them."

In general, Beaver concludes, moviegoers themselves can divine what films will be made during the 1980s by simply looking to the past. The films currently on the market can be traced back to about five strains of movies made during the 1970s. Beaver adds that more films will be made from readily available sources, such as novels

about popular characters and already existing subjects.

Making films dependent on the novelty of special effects or the familiarity of topics that have already proved their mass appeal reflects a strong bent toward conservatism among film makers, according to Beaver.

DURING THE 1970s, a practice called "blind booking" evolved wherein exhibitors compete to obtain a movie without ever having screened it, he notes.

Also, a profit system was established that provided movie houses with an increasing percentage of a movie's proceeds from week to week so that exhibitors were forced to keep movies for longer periods of time than previously.

As a repercussion of these extended runs, Beaver points out, movie houses have begun to show more than one film at a time, in hopes that the more successful movies will take up the financial slack caused by the less popular films.

Another aspect of commercial pressure on film is that the cost of publicity for films has skyrocketed, Beaver says. That phenomenon also will probably affect the availability of foreign films, which are even more difficult to promote than domestic products.

"Distributors just aren't picking them up," Beaver says, noting that the foreign films "Black and White" and "Madame Rosa," both Oscar winners, have not yet been shown in a commercial theater in Ann Arbor.

Beaver recently observed, after citing these new film marketing procedures, that "as the decade ends, we find the economics of an enormously expensive industry dictating the kind of...movies we're seeing with less artistic regard for discriminating filmgoers."

The only refuge for artistic experimentation in the near future, Beaver speculates, is in films that are the property of stars who are sufficiently wealthy and established to indulge in "personal expression."

Recent examples are Richard Dreyfuss's "The Big Fix"; Robert Redford's production of "All the President's Men"; Jack Nicholson's "Going South"; and Clint Eastwood's film "The Gauntlet."

Otherwise, Beaver concludes, "until blind booking disappears and profit-making on a graduated scale is reconsidered, we will continue to see more films that look as if they've been put together by a committee."

The proper use of the doubling cube can be used to apply pressure — forcing your opponent to concede the game or to take the double and continue playing.

Ownership of the cube is also very important. Should your opponent accept the cube, he now has the exclusive right to redouble at his own will. Once he gains an advantage, he may apply the same pressure by redoubling. Therefore, use the cube as a weapon and not as a gift. Your opponent is sure to take a gift but might refuse a bad take.

In the board example, the cube is neutral (in the middle). Black is on roll and decides to double the cube to two. Should white accept?

Examine the duplication of moves involved. Black's only good rolls are two, four and 10. A two or a four will cover the blot (single checker) on the 3 point and hit white's blot on the 9. Black also needs the same roll of two to move up to white's 3 point for a sure escape. Black also is stuck behind a five-point broken prime and may not escape at all.

Black has a slim chance of hitting white on the 9, covering his blot on the 3 and freeing the lone back runner (on white's 1). White has a 55 percent chance of re-entering from the bar and hitting the blot on 3. Therefore, white should accept the premature double.

In an actual game with this same position, white redoubled black after hitting the blot on 3 and went for a four-point victory with black narrowly escaping a gammon.

A winter walk in the woods

The sun was cheering as it peeped under the clouds at dawn on a recent weekend. There was no wind, so the air felt warmer than 30 degrees.

I parked my car along a dirt road just a half-hour's drive from home and headed into the woods with my old dog.

Silence. The ground was brown and frozen, and no sputtering rackets from snowmobiles filled the air.

Our approach scared up a cottontail rabbit, but the old dog was too deaf to hear it, so the bunny scampered off, unchased. Later there was a streak of red — a fox?

In a little valley, frost decorated every branch like a million pieces of white lace. As the sun hit it, the lace turned to diamonds.

In the frozen mud were deer tracks. On the same trail last year, there had been a snowmobile trail.

Along the bank of a stream, I picked up some dry oak branches snapped from the trees by an earlier wind. They ignited quickly, and soon we were warming ourselves at a fire.

Time for breakfast: Bacon, slices of onion, eggs; homemade raisin bread toasted directly over the corner of the fire; apple wrapped in aluminum foil and baked in the coals; a Thermos of hot coffee sweetened with cocoa mix; a pocketful of biscuits for my ravenous dog.

Down to the edge of the gurgling Huron River for cold water to douse the fire. A stroll through the wooded hills. The song of a chickadee to break the silence.

The old dog eagerly snuffs at a riverbank where a muskrat has burrowed and around a stump where field mice or chipmunks have scampered.

A little rest to light up a pipe. More walking.

Hours later we would return home to the headlines in the Sunday paper. No snow. Winter resorts losing tens of millions. Michigan an economic disaster area. Ski lodges crying. Snowmobilers moaning. Money, money, money. Gasoline, gasoline, gasoline.

Are these guys crazy? I wondered. This has been an utterly magnificent winter to enjoy the outdoors.

ICE IS STILL thin on many of the larger inland lakes. But the medium lakes and ponds have enough ice to hold fishermen.

Bluegills are hitting on most lakes. Pike are on-again, off-again, depending on which lake you hear about and when you go.

Early ice is the best time of the season for ice fishing. The fact that it's thin keeps the snowmobilers off, which makes for more peaceful conditions and better fishing.

Speaking of thin ice, the deaths last week of two snowmobilers at Houghton Lake should serve as a reminder of the sporting dangers from our so-far mild winter.

The annual Tip-Up Town festival there attracts thousands of fishermen and snowmoers to the frozen lake. Cars, people, snowmobiles and concessions all head out where only boats dare to tread in the summer. In a good year, the fishermen head through lanes of snowmos to find space to chop a hole.

Anglers — on foot — can at least watch ahead for signs of thin ice. The snowmobilers, however, can find themselves on the wet side of the ice before they ever see the danger.

We don't like to see people dying, of course, but maybe this incident will keep some snowmobilers away from the lake and return the festival to the ice fishermen it was intended for in the first place.

could you survive?

tips from the Air Force Survival School

The temperature is near zero degrees Fahrenheit. There is approximately 8 inches of snow on the ground.

You have been hiking cross-country and are approximately two hours from your camp when you encounter a small stream. In your attempts to cross this barrier, you fall in and become totally immersed.

WOULD YOU . . .

A. Get out of the water and hurry on to your camp.

B. Get out of the water, squeeze the moisture out of the clothing and then continue on to camp.

C. Get out of the water. Roll in the snow and then brush it off. Gather fire-starting materials and build a fire to warm yourself and dry out before continuing on to camp.

D. Get out of the water and immediately begin vigorous exercise to warm your body.

TO SURVIVE

C offers the best emergency action. By rolling in the snow, it acts as a blotter and absorbs some moisture and is removed when the snow is brushed off.

Considering the distance to camp and the weather, building a fire to warm yourself and to dry out is the best avenue to take if you want to survive.

None of the remaining alternatives offer a satisfactory solution to insure your survival in the face of prevailing conditions. Incapacitating symptoms of hypothermia are almost certain to occur if any of these actions are selected.

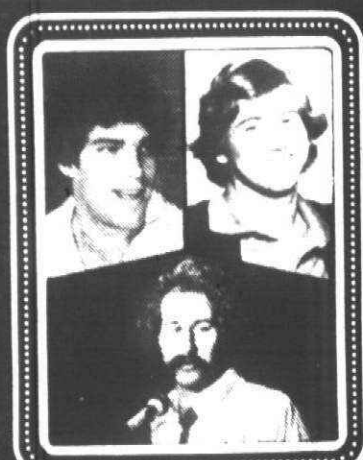

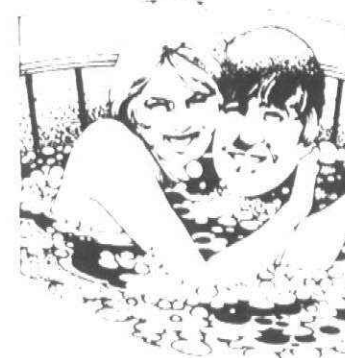

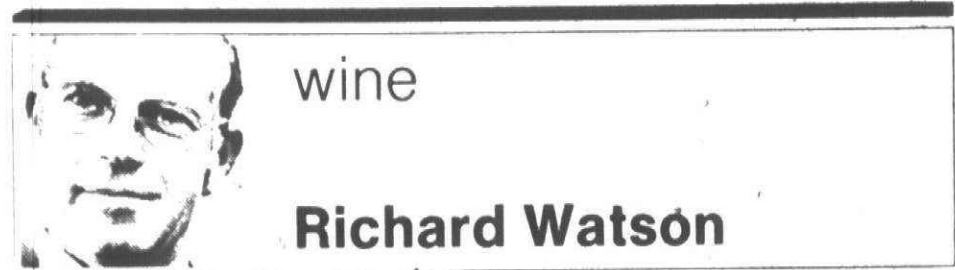

Lesser known wines merit your attention

It wasn't so long ago that Mendocino County, a beautiful area of craggy mountains and luxurious redwoods, produced only blending and jug wines. The name wasn't esteemed. Napa meant magic. Sonoma, to the south, was better than respectable.

And as recently as 20 years ago there were few wineries. The area was known as isolated, beautiful and devoid of vinicultural excellence.

Then, in mid 1960s and early 1970s, a series of events occurred to change this. In 1964 the Parnucci winery switched from being a roadside producer of bulk wines to a maker of fine varietals.

When, in 1968, the Bernard Fetzler family established a winery north of Ukiah and began promoting the Mendocino appellation, the trend had set in. Mendocino thereafter meant quality wine.

OTHER WINERIES followed. Wiebel and Cresta Blanca (Giulio owned) came up from Livermore and in the early 1970s both the Hush and Edmeades Vineyards opened in the Anderson Valley near Philo to the west of Ukiah. Since then, in the mid '70s, both Dashed Vineyards and Navarro Vineyards have been producing from An-

derson Valley grapes.

Fortunately, at least two of the wineries, and the best of the lot, are generously available in Michigan today. Parnucci offers a large selection of reasonable priced wines and Fetzler is widely esteemed for its reds, especially Zinfandel.

Try particularly the Ricetti Vineyard release to use as a benchmark of what a big yet elegant Zinfandel should taste like. Allow breathing time on these. They are bit full of thought juices. Other Fetzler Zinfandels are worth trying but less distinguished.

Also in Michigan, but less interesting, are the occasionally available Wiebel and rarely found Cresta Blanca Labels. The former is best known for the wide range of moderately priced sparkling wines it produces.

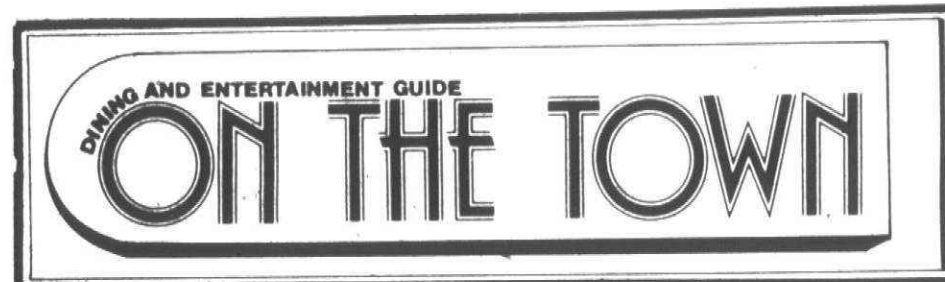
AT THIS WRITING, rumors are strong that both older Philo wineries, Hush and Edmeades, are due in the state soon. When they become available both will be worth trying.

The former is especially esteemed for its Pinot Noir, the latter for its Cabernet Sauvignon and White Riesling. The Philo area, it should be noted, is considerably cooler than the rest of Mendocino and does especially well with the "cooler" grapes.
