Officials modify agriculture zone in land proposal

Parcels in the proposed agricultural-residential zoning district (AGR) have been changed back to the original size of five acres.

The change in the proposed zoning ordinance was made at a joint meeting of the Canton board and planning commission Monday night. Township board members are expected to consider the ordinance for adoption at their next regular meeting on Tuesday, March 25.

The new zoning document classifies most of the land west of Canton Center for either AGR or agricultural-industrial (AGI). Land in the AGI district cannot be split into parcels smaller than 40 acres.

The original zoning proposal called for five-acre lots in the AGR district. The planning commission voted to reduce the minimum lot size to 2½ acres last month because of the number of existing parcels which are smaller than five acres, according to Canton planner Jim Kosteva.

On Monday night, however, the township board asked the planning commission to reinstate the original five-acre lot size. The planning commission voted to accept that recommendation by a 4-3 vote with Commissioners Robert Shefferly, Robert Padgett and Frank McMurray dissenting.

A last-minute change was also made in the zoning of land on the south side of Ford between Morton Taylor and Lilley. The original zoning proposal designated the land for multiple residential use. But on Monday night, the zoning was changed to R-6, townhouses with minimum square footage of 800 feet.

Kosteva said township board adoption of the ordinance on March 25 will give the Canton Tax Board of Review an opportunity to lower property assessments in the agricultural districts. The tax board must submit its recommendations to Wayne County by April 1.

Cops fly to Florida for assault suspect

A 45-year-old man who allegedly fired shots at his stepdaughter and her boyfriend Dec. 15 was arraigned Wednesday in Canton on charges of assault with intent to commit murder.

Lawrence Arnold Leake, also charged with possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony, was turned over to Canton patrol officers by police in Dade City, Fla.

Garber set a \$25,000 cash bond and a pretrial exam was scheduled for March 31.

Patrol officers Robert Van Lith and Kenneth Winkler brought Leake up from Florida in time for a Wednesday morning arraignment in 35th District Court before Judge James Garber.

Leake was arrested March 15 in Florida. Winkler said conviction on the assault charge carries a maximum life sentence.

Police said Leake fired at Pamela Bussott, 19, and Edward Goralski, 21, while they were in a car outside the Village Squire Apartments on Ford Road. Neither Goralski nor Ms. Bussott were injured.

Cox said Florida police held Leake in a Dade City jail after learning of the arrest warrant issued Dec. 18 by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office.

Cox suspects that Leake was stopped by Florida officials for a traffic violation. Winkler said Leake was in Florida looking for work. Leake has relatives in Florida.

According to Cox, Leake waived extradition hearings in Florida.

Cops deny part in fund-raiser

Persons reportedly collecting funds for the benefit of the Canton Police Department are doing so without the knowledge or sanction of the department, according to Police Chief Jerry Cox.

He has warned the township's business community against making donations to the fictitious fund-raiser.

Cox said police began an investigation into possible fraud following reports from several businesspersons of a group asking for contributions to benefit police. Cox said he does not know of anyone who has given the group money.

The police department is conducting no fund-raising campaign, Cox said.

Supplies kink library opening

The new Canton Township library will kick off limited services to senior citizens next month despite another setback in the hopes of library board members to open the facility soon.

A bookmobile program — the first service of the new library — will start April 16 for seniors who require large-print books, according to head librarian Deborah O'Connor. The books will be loaded on carts and delivered to the Canton Recreation Hall on Michigan Avenue and the Dion Nursing Home.

But other township residents may have to wait until next August to borrow books from their local library.

Ms. O'Connor said hopes to open the facility this spring have been crushed by an expected delay in the delivery of shelving and other equipment.

SUPPORTERS OF THE LIBRARY originally planned on a January opening date during last spring's campaign for voter approval of a one-mill tax (\$1 per \$1,000 assessed property valuation).

The target opening date was pushed back to June when library board members realized that they would not receive revenue from the millage until the December tax collection period.

Ms. O'Connor said a delay in approving the library's lease for the third floor of the township administration building has pushed back the target opening date even further.

Library board members expected to sign the lease agreement last fall, according to board treasurer James Gillig. But the document, which requires the library board to pay \$400 a month in rent and 25 per cent of township hall utility costs, was not signed until last month because of disagreements between the township and library board over some provisions of the contract.

Ms. O'Connor said this is the busiest time of year for library suppliers, who are now filling orders for schools.

Ms. O'Connor, whose salary has been set at \$22,000 a year, began working for the Canton library last August. She joined was this week by a new employee — children's librarian Clara Bohrer, who will earn \$17,000 a year.

ACCORDING TO GILLIG, the library board spent approximately \$33,000 by the end of February.

About \$12,000 of that amount went to Ms. O'Connor in salaries. Since August, she has ordered and catalogued books, developed policies for the library and formulated a library program.

Other expenditures went for book purchases, rental of office equipment, attorney fees and rent.

Gillig said the library board has borrowed \$155,000 in tax anticipation notes from the Municipal Finance Commission for 1980 to supplement the \$339,000 that it has received from the library's one-mill tax.

Robbery suspect convicted

A Westland man has pleaded guilty to the Sept. 26 armed robbery of a Star Shop Party Store in Canton.

Raymond Joseph Battles, 41, will face sentencing for armed robbery and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony before Wayne County Circuit Judge Roland Olzark on April 2.

Roland pleaded guilty to both charges in Olzark's courtroom on Monday, according to a court clerk.

Canton Police Chief Jerry Cox said \$2,500 was taken from the party store at 42444 Ford Road in the September robbery. Cox said Battles was armed with a gun when he ordered store employees to lie on the floor. No injuries were reported.

According to Cox, an armed robbery conviction carries a seven- to 15-year jail sentence. Possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony carries a mandatory sentence of two years in prison.

2 suspects charged in center's burglary

Plymouth police have arrested two young men who allegedly burglarized the Growth Works Center on Main Street in Plymouth early Tuesday morning.

A radio, calculator and a cash box containing an undetermined amount of money were reported missing from the center. According to the center's director, about six amusement machines also were broken into. They are housed in the center's activity room at the rear of the building.

Arraigned before Judge Dunbar Davis of the 35th District Court Tuesday was Gary Fanning, 19, of Plymouth. He was charged with breaking and entering and faces a March 27 examination before Davis.

Also arrested on the same charge was a 16-year-old youth whose name was withheld by police. As of early this week, he was sent to the Wayne County Youth Home.

The two young men were apprehended by police near the M-14 freeway in Plymouth Township about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday after police followed their car from a parking lot to the rear of the center.

According to Plymouth Police Chief Tim Ford, Officer Joe Kahanec was pulling out of the Plymouth station, three doors away from the center, when he noticed a lone 1972 Plymouth driving away.

He followed the car on neighborhood streets and then onto the M-14. The car was finally stopped near the Gotfredson exit off the freeway. By that time, he was joined by another local patrol car, the Michigan State Police, the Washtenaw County Sheriff and a Livonia patrol car.

In the process, Kahanec's car was damaged as well as another local patrol car driven by Officer Tom Zedan. Zedan's car was struck head on and Kahanec's car was damaged on one side.

Also in the car at the time of the arrest was a small puppy, which was taken to the Parkway Veterinarian Clinic in Plymouth Tuesday afternoon.

Police say the 16-year-old has relinquished his ownership of the dog and it will be destroyed by the end of the week unless a new owner is found.

The Growth Works center houses a variety of activities including three employment services for those unemployed between the ages of 16-19 as well as 18-24.

Joint effort proposed on job pool

A group of local communities may join together in an effort to get Wayne County government out of a federal grant allocation business.

And Wayne County, at this point in time, is willing to turn much of its direct control over Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) funding to local governments.

In fact, it was the Wayne County Office of Manpower which is encouraging a CETA Consortium to be formed from the cities of Northville and Plymouth and townships of Canton, Northville and Plymouth.

Monday night the Plymouth City Commission expressed an interest in

forming a consortium and asked that an agreement be drafted to aid in making a final decision in the future.

Last week the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees voted against joining the consortium but city officials are hopeful the township board might be persuaded to change its mind.

Administrators from Canton and Northville have expressed an interest in the consortium but their legislative bodies have not yet voted on the concept.

JOHN BEHMAN, federal program coordinator for the city, told commissioners Monday night that a final deci-

sion won't have to be made until a formal agreement is written up and submitted for approval.

"A major advantage of the consortium is that it will give us more local control over our own programs and we will be able to hire CETA employees from within the consortium boundaries.

"Right now we are restricted to hiring employees from within the city limits," Behman added, "and sometimes we can't find anyone with the skills needed. This will give us more flexibility in hiring."

Behman said another advantage is that the consortium will be able to hire a CETA administrator, on a part-time

basis, with expertise in applying for the federal funds.

"We also would get money for training CETA employees hired by the consortium. Right now all training is handled by Wayne County. If we got the training funds, the training then could be localized to our needs."

THE CITY presently applies for CETA funds through the Wayne County Office of Manpower which files one application for CETA funds with the federal government and then allocates the money back to participating governments.

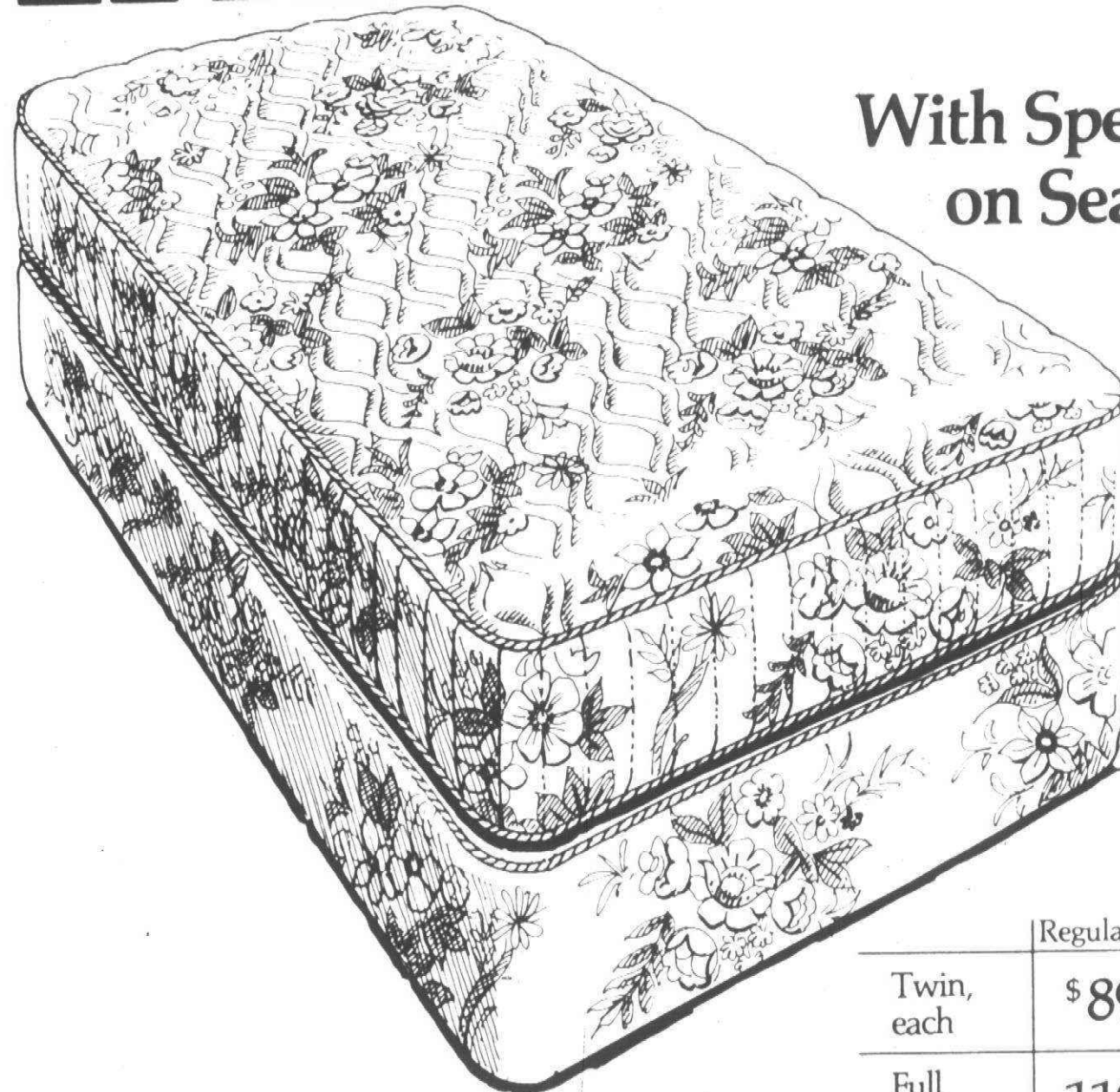

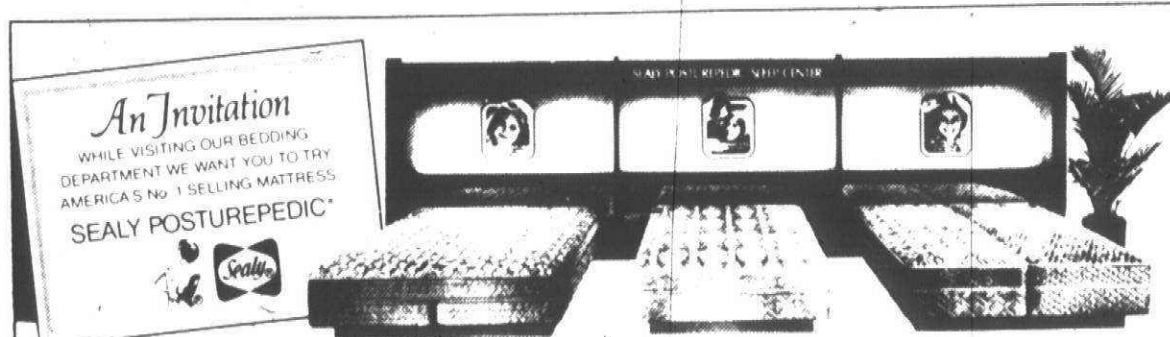

Wool, wool everywhere

It's sheep-shearing time again for Moore

Clarence Moore is a man with many hobbies. Unlike most men who are satisfied with one main interest in their retirement years, this venerable octogenarian, who admits he won't see 84 again, has at least six hobbies. The most interesting of these is supervising a sheep farm virtually in the center of the city.

His sheep are housed in a barn at the rear of his residence on Burroughs.

Aside from raising sheep on his seven-acre plot, he is the champion salesmen for the Plymouth Kiwanis at the holiday sale of fruit cakes. In the past 20 years, he has sold 19,999 cakes.

Along with the sheep, he has a 20-tree fruit orchard and a one-acre plot for gardening. And, aside from this, he likes to delve in to carpentry. Almost single-handedly, he built the store fronts on Main Street in the Plymouth Historical Museum and he enjoys helping others in need of a helping hand. It's all part of his good neighbor policy.

With all of this activity, he smiles when speaking of the sheep and how he got to be a sheep farmer almost in the heart of the city.

He arrived in Plymouth from the east in 1932 and worked at the Plymouth Stamping Plant which was then in the Markham Building.

When he decided to retire in October of 1963, he kept looking about for something to keep him active. He finally found what he wanted. It was land owned by William Bake (grandfather of Realtor Bob Bake).

At the time, the seven-acre plot was just a large field. But on a trip to city hall, he was advised by the city manager that the land was zoned agricultural and that it would be agreeable if he

wanted to raise animals.

That was the beginning of his farm in the center of the city and one of the few such activities in any city. Over the years, his farm has been a pleasant site as the sheep graze over the spacious greensward.

Last Sunday, Ron Kuhl of Manchester saw to it that the sheep were sheared of more than 100 pounds of wool, much to the delight of Moore. Moore immediately had it baled and sent to the Studio of Ellice on Ann Arbor Road for conditioning and working on.

IT HAS BEEN said by his neighbors that Moore rises early each morning to do his farming in suitable weather. He did his farm work before going to the stamping plant. Now he has the luxury of doing it a bit later.

"I spray the trees each week in the spring," he said, as the sheep were shorn of their fleece. "And I spend a great deal of time in the garden, working with the various vegetables."

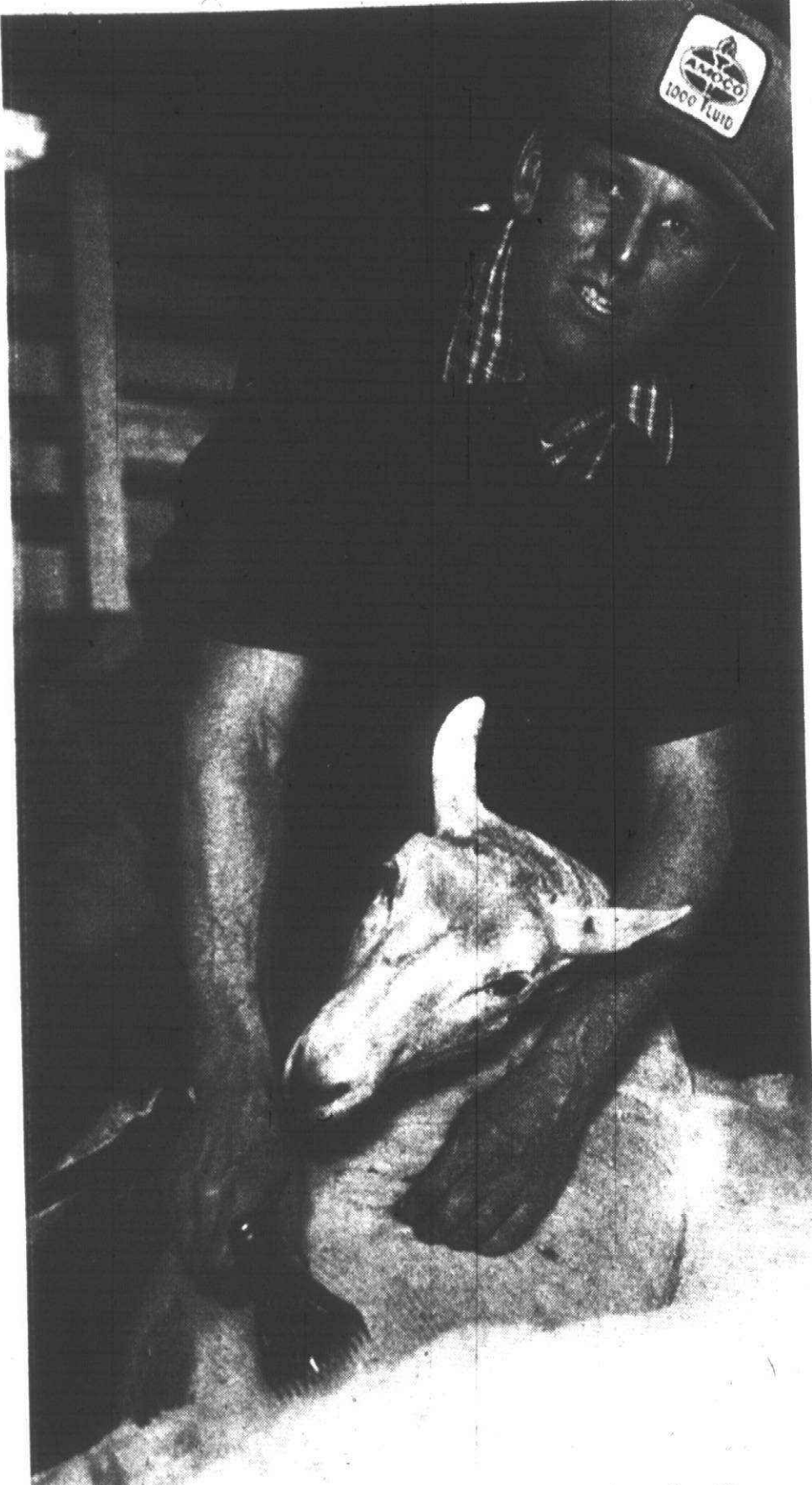
"Then comes the fall and the holiday season is here and I go on the job selling cakes for the Kiwanis."

When Moore realized he had sold 19,999 cakes, he asked, "Do you know how many tons that is?"

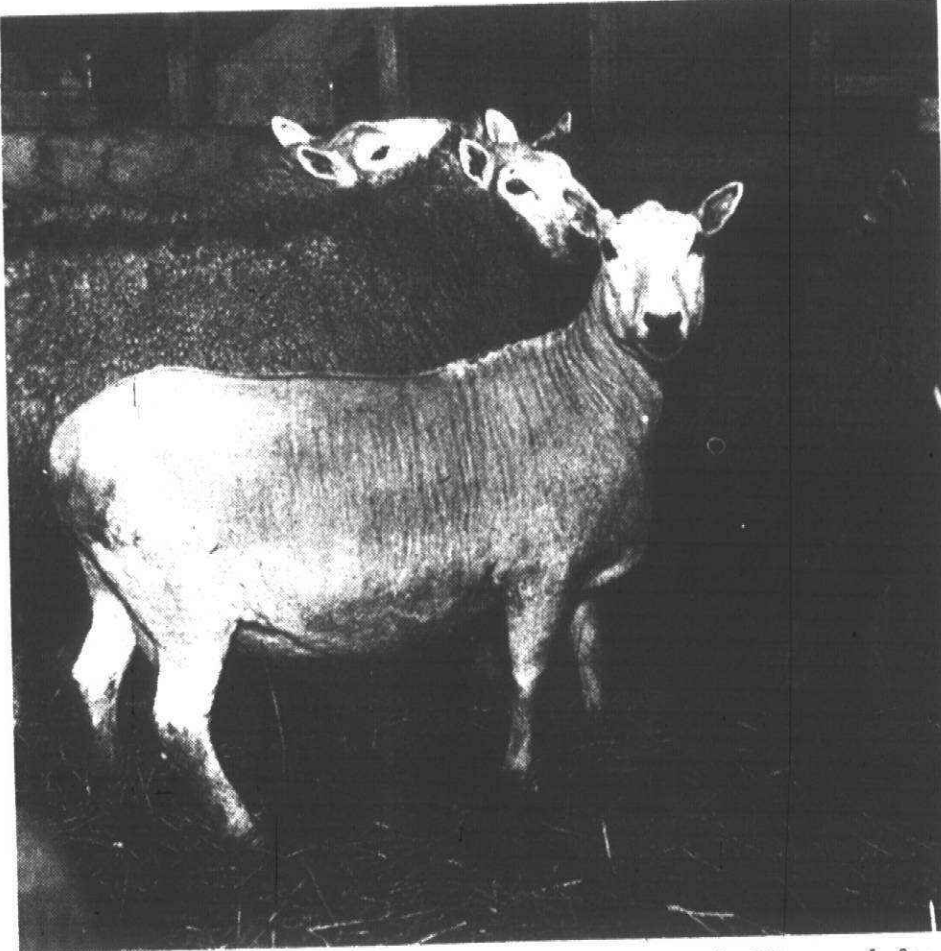
Without waiting for an answer, he said that each cake weighed three pounds and the cakes he has sold amounted to about 60,000 pounds or 30 tons.

"And that's a lot of cake."

As the sheep shearing ended and the wool was baled and on its way, there came across his face a satisfied look. Another mission was accomplished for the man who likes his retirement years active and busy.

She spins it just like the Pilgrims did

If you ever wondered what life was like when the Pilgrims settled in America and lived off the land, take a visit to the Ellice Studio at 49770 Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth.

There, behind a few tall trees in a centennial home, can be found Ellice Kulick sitting at a spinning wheel more than 150 years old. She will be spinning wool, preparing it for the loom in an adjoining room.

Almost as if she were talking from a painting of Pilgrim wives at their spinning wheels, Mrs. Kulick tells how she made her own coat last year from sheep's wool.

And she will show you the lower band of her sweater she made from dog's hair.

AT THE MOMENT, Mrs. Kulick, who conducts a class for up to a dozen students on the art of spinning wool, is working on the wool taken from the backs of the sheep on Clarence Moore's farm only a couple weeks ago.

And she is quick to tell you that there is nothing she enjoys more than sitting at the old spinning wheel, just as the Pilgrim wives had done years before.

"I enjoy it so much that I not only have a class here at home but also teach at Greenfield Village. And it sure is a lot of fun."

Aside from the fun she is having, Mrs. Kulick, whose husband is a retired engineer from the Ford Motor Co., is proud that her daughter, Terese, taught the spinning wheel and did enough spinning to earn her way through Western Michigan University at Kalamazoo.

Mrs. Kulick and her family moved to Plymouth from Dearborn more than two decades ago and settled on the plot that now houses the studio.

"We have enjoyed it here and have been able to make good use of the land."

ONE OF THE tasks she performs that may be surprising is to dye the wool. She obtains the dye from the plants and flowers selected from the ground right behind her home.

As she speaks, Mrs. Kulick proudly displays a dozen skeins of varied colored wool and explains where and how she obtained the dye.

First, she placed a reddish colored skein on the table and revealed that the dye came from what she called poke berries picked from the vines right behind the studio.

Next came a skein of a nice yellow, which came from golden rod. She displayed another yellow and explained it came from Queen Anne's lace.

The she asked how many people would look to swamp grass for help and said the rich green skein came from the dye made from swamp grass.

And, lastly, she laid a skein of beautiful blue on the table and said the dye came from elderberry plants.

HER LOVE AFFAIR with spinning wheels, looms and making dye from plants in her garden started inauspiciously.

"When we came to Plymouth, this was all open country. In fact, it was farm land."

"So it was only natural that my two children, Mark and Terese, enrolled in the 4-H Club and became involved in the program sponsored by the Plymouth Kiwanis Club. The Kiwanis Club provided the animals."

"With the interest of a mother in her children, I became involved, and I put to use the spinning wheels I had been collecting for years."

Several of the spinning wheels came from estates in Ann Arbor, and another was made by her husband. But they are a throwback to the days when people lived off the land and the homemaker spent many hours at the spinning wheel.

So anyone wanting to learn first-hand how the Pilgrims lived when they came to America will enjoy visiting with Mrs. Kulick who will be happy to turn back the pages of history.

Student urges bond support

Editor:

The upcoming bond issue in the school district has myself as well as other students and teachers concerned over the future of our school. Three proposals have been made in which the voter has his choice to vote on.

Proposition I calls for renovation of schools, energy conservation projects, air conditioning, new buses, and major renovation of Central Middle School.

Proposition II calls for a \$7,277,000 addition to C.E.P., and major renovation of Central Middle School.

Proposition III is a 1/2 mill increase for 10 years of maintenance on the schools.

Proposition II has me very con-

cerned. It calls for a \$5,277,000, 40-room expansion on to the park (plus \$2 million to renovate Central). A 40-room expansion will not help the overcrowding problem at all. It will just cause more problems. At the present, we have an eight minute passing period to move from class to class. Obviously, there has been no observation of the hallways between classes, which are nothing but chaos. It won't make our halls any bigger, our library any bigger, our cafeterias and larger, our athletic teams any larger, or help our student parking problem at all.

By adding 1,200 new students to the park, we will have a school designed

for 3,600 students re-designed for 4,800 students and have an expected student population of 5,000 for the 1980-81 school year. We will still be overcrowded. After the defeat of the modular scheduling concept, we all but lost our student-teacher relationships. The quality of our education will only go down if more students are allowed in.

A teacher that has 20 students per class has at least some time to help the students that need help, but what about the teacher with 30 to 40 students per class? With the rise in student population at the park, our vandalism problem will only be worse. Proposition II does not even include the money we need to pay for more security, teach-

ers, administrators, or increase the student lunch budget.

Proposition I makes much more sense to me. I have lived in many school districts across the country, and I see no difference in the middle school and the junior high school except for the age of the students. I am 100 percent for the K-6, 7-9, 10-12 grade placement program. It works in other schools, and it can work here too.

I ask all voters in the Plymouth-Canton School District, please, for the benefit of our education, vote no on Proposition II.

health department to find out what was being done about the problem. We were appalled to learn they weren't even aware there was a problem. Even after the health department was informed, it was another week and a half before any information was sent home to parents.

By this time, scarlet fever had been in the school at least a month. Absenteeism was reported as being close to 20 percent with a great deal of it due to scarlet fever. Had information gone home sooner, we feel that the incidence

of scarlet fever would never have gone as high as it did.

People would have been more likely to seek treatment rather than waiting too long. By the time information was sent home it was much too late. The school and health department were so negligent in acting, a few of the students even contracted scarlet fever twice.

As a concerned parent, I feel this incident was absolutely inexcusable, especially where the health of hundred of children is involved. Many people are

totally unaware of the complications which can occur from scarlet fever if it is not properly treated. I still find it difficult to believe that the school failed to report the illnesses to the proper authorities, but this is exactly what happened, and I do not feel it should be left unnoticed.

The whole thing was inexcusable, and should never be allowed to happen again.

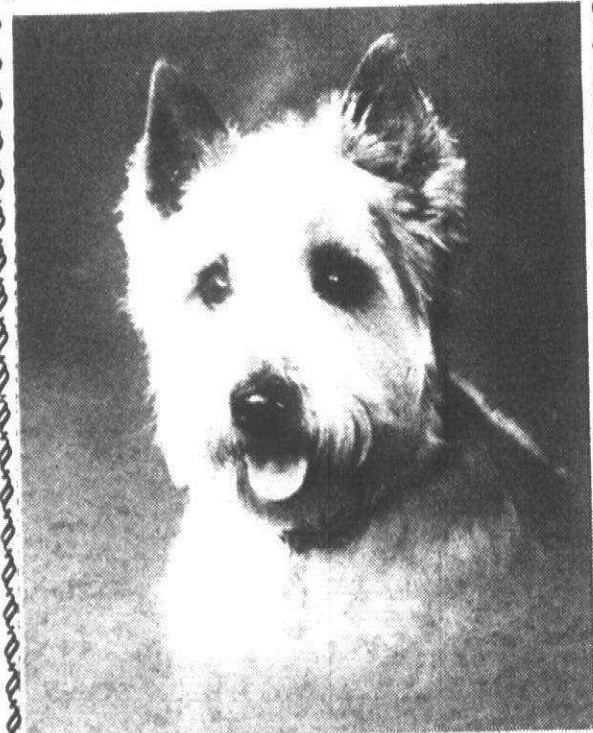

White collar crime is topic for CPAs

A Plymouth businessman will speak on "The Thief in the White Collar" at this month's meeting of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

Jack Bologna, president of George Odiorne Associates, Inc. of Plymouth, will be addressing CPAs in industry, government and education at the Southfield Michigan Inn on Wednesday, March 26.

The breakfast meeting is part of a continuing professional education program for members of the association.

While skiing at Alpine Valley Friday afternoon, Richard injured his neck when he attempted to jump over a mogul. No bones were broken, according to his sister.

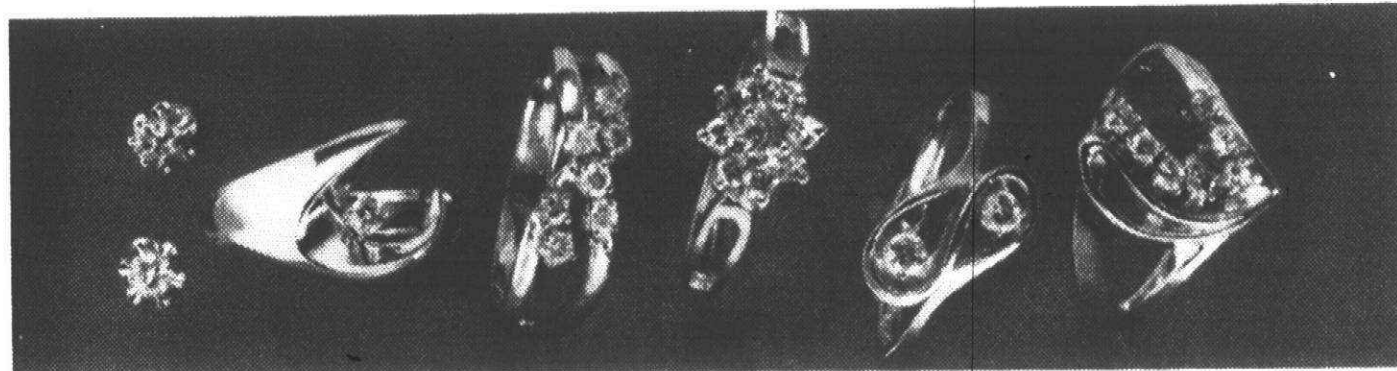
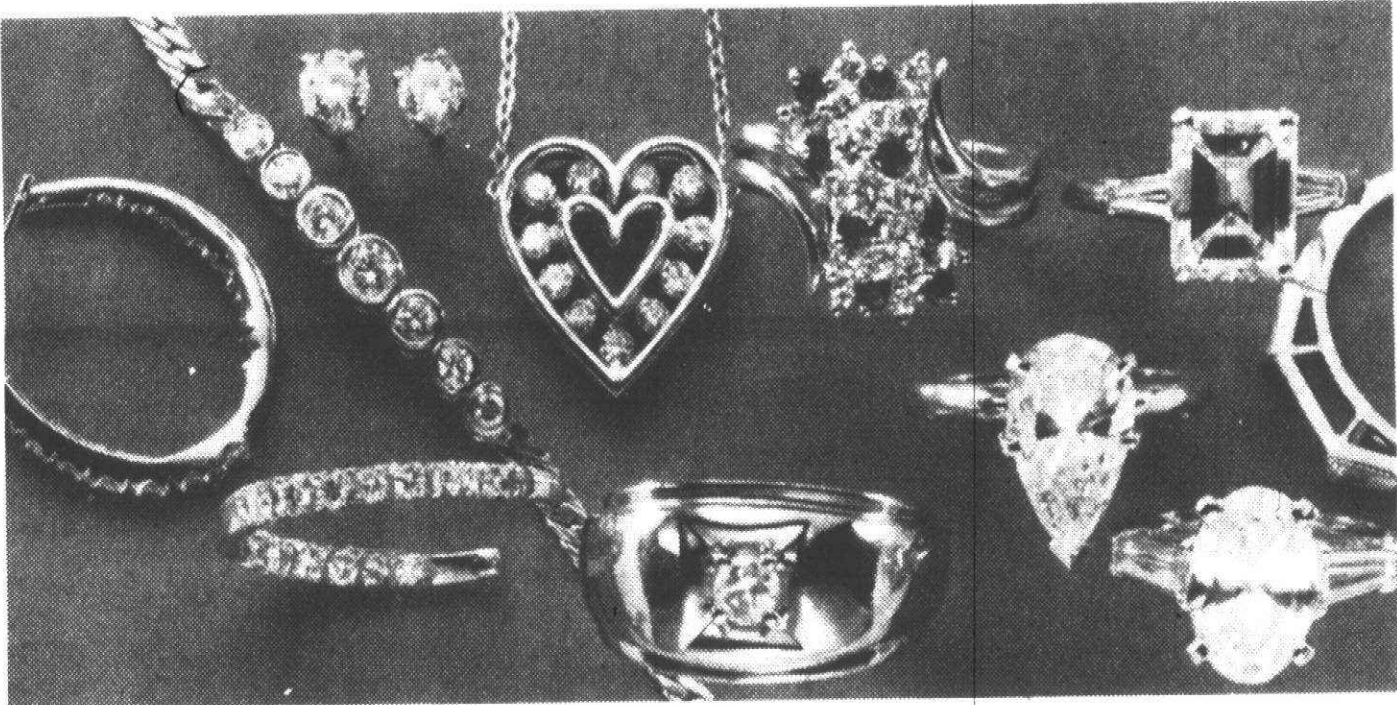
By Monday, Richard was expected to be fitted with a neck brace and sent home.

Committee recommends further closure to hunting

In an obvious concession to area farmers, a committee examining hunting laws altered its original recommendation to ban hunting throughout Plymouth township for nine months of the year.

The change was made Monday when the committee was called by the township board to reconsider its recommendation — which extended the hunting ban west to Ridge Road.

The revised recommendation states that any discharge of firearms (for any reason including hunting) will not be allowed anywhere in the township from March 1 to Oct. 20, according to Township Supervisor Thomas Notebaert.

The thrust of this new statement is to insure farmers that they will be "safe in their fields" during planting and harvesting of crops which is mostly done during that period.

"I think we accomplished something today," said Notebaert. "It achieves what people in the area asked for and pleases them."

Bob Blessed, a strawberry farmer in western Plymouth Township, called the new decision "a step in the right direction."

"It means we won't have to be subjected to the harassment we have been. It'll stop bullets from shooting on our land nine months out of the year."

Blessed, one of two landowners present at the public hearing Monday, is viewed as one of the most outspoken residents against any form of hunting in the township. In recent weeks he launched a personal letter-writing campaign to area legislators promoting his position for a township-wide ban.

BRUCE ANDREWS, chairman of the committee and a member of the law enforcement division of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), said Blessed's contacts did not result in pressure from state officials to change his committee's recommendation, however.

Andrews maintains that he believes most of the

farmers' complaints do not result from "legitimate hunters."

"They're probably not caused by legitimate hunters but by people stopping for target shooting or whatever. But if the farmers are happy then I'm happy (with the revised recommendation)."

According to Andrews, the new recommendation will not seriously infringe on legitimate hunters who are allowed to hunt on private property. To do so, a hunter must have approval from the property owner.

Also, hunters must still follow state time restrictions on hunting.

The new recommendation's greatest effect may be on the discharge of firearms which could be for reasons other than hunting.

"IT REALLY doesn't affect hunters but unless the discharge of firearms was included in the recommendation it would have had no meaning," he added.

Under legal hunting limits set by the state, only squirrel and raccoon hunters will be affected. Squirrel hunters in Plymouth Township will have their hunting season delayed by about 19 days.

Not affected are: small game hunters, deer hunters, cottontail rabbit hunters, pheasant and woodchuck hunters.

The revised recommendation still includes a plan to ban hunting in land east of Ridge Road and south of the M-14 Freeway.

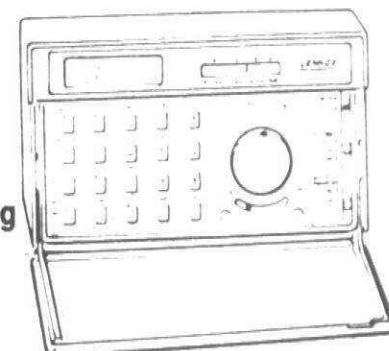
The township board is expected to act on the entire package at its next meeting. After that, approval must be gained from the attorney general, the governor as well as a joint House-Senate committee. Andrews said this process could take as long as a year before the rule is enacted into local law.

Members who served on the special hunting ban committee are: Notebaert, Andrews, and two representatives from the Michigan State Police and the Wayne County Sheriff's department.

Trade secrets pirated, charges local firm

A Plymouth business has accused a New York firm of misusing federal legislation to get hold of its trade secrets.

Jack Bologna, president of George Odiorne Associates, Inc. of Plymouth, said an industrial psychology consulting firm is attempting to ferret out proprietary information (trade secrets) by taking advantage of the U.S. Freedom of Information Act (FOI).

Bologna told the Observer that the firm of Drake-Beam Associates, Inc. filed under the FOI Act to acquire a copy of a training program put together for the U.S. government by his firm.

Odiorne Associates is a small (four-person) management consulting firm which specializes in custom-designed training programs for managers.

William Swan, Ph.D., a vice president of Drake-Beam, informed the Observer that his firm did acquire a copy of the proposal using the FOI Act but said it is common practice and was not an abuse of the legislation.

BOLOGNA'S FIRM was low bidder on a contract to provide training in career planning and career counseling for 16 personnel specialists in the International Communication Agency (ICA) and in the U.S. State Department.

Drake-Beam, which didn't bid on the project, obtained a copy of the Odiorne proposal by filing a FOI demand with the contracting office of ICA in Washington, D.C. The request for disclosure was granted by Beverly Parks, an ICA contracting officer, who notified Bologna of the filing.

"Congress never intended the Freedom of Information Act to provide a vehicle for the rich and the powerful to profit from the labors of the small and insignificant," said Bologna.

"But, unfortunately, a lot of very good liberal legislation, originally opposed by the rich and powerful elements in our society, gets used by the

powerful more often than by those of us who were its intended beneficiaries.

"We are intentionally a small custom-design house which produces training programs for managers for use in in-house workshops.

"We don't sell in the mass market and can't even compete in that market. I don't mind a good competitive scrap — that's what capitalism is all about. It keeps us alert and lively.

"Frankly, had they called me personally, I would have gladly and freely given them a copy of our design. We've always been very open about our creations. Maybe that's why we are small and they are so big. They have always made us pay the full price when we ordered their materials."

SWAN SAID he would have asked Bologna for a copy of the proposal but didn't know who made the submission until filing with the ICA.

"We really are a small firm ourselves," Swan said. "We are not a multi-million dollar corporation but another small fry trying to grow up in the field. We have a staff of 30 people, of which only two submit proposals to the government.

"And the field we are involved in is totally different than the activities of Odiorne Associates."

The FOI Act was designed to allow people access to public information, Swan added, because previously too much information was being stamped top secret.

"Once the proposal was filed, it became public information. We are one of the citizens for whom the act was designed."

THE LAW DOES exclude proprietary information such as the cost break-

down of the project and staff persons to be involved, Swan added.

"And we weren't interested in that information. As for the proposal itself, it contained generic knowledge which is common to everyone in the consulting business."

Swan said Drake-Beam wasn't interested in the proposal itself but in the presentation. "We are still learning how to submit proposals to the government, and one of the best ways to learn is to study success — to look at a winning proposal.

"The key element we were interested in was how the presentation was made, not the knowledge itself."

WHEN BOLOGNA learned of Drake-Beam's filing, he retained the legal services of Washington, D.C. attorney Charles Bangert, an expert on predatory competitive practices, to protect his firm's rights.

"We invested more than 400 hours of research, design and development time

on this contract. Our total bid was only \$4,200.

"You know there is no way for us to recoup our 'front end' costs on this one contract. We had hoped to use the program for other clients in government and industry to recover our costs and make a reasonable profit.

"When my attorney called Drake-Beam to advise them of our concern, they said they would continue to pursue their rights under the FOI Act."

Bologna had informed Ms. Parks that he had no objection to Drake-Beam obtaining information on its total bid price, corporate history, client references, staff's credentials, analysis of the educational problem which needed solution, and certain other aspects of government bidding which are considered as "boiler plate."

He told the ICA, though, that he considered all other information in the proposal to be "proprietary information" because it resulted from his firm's creativity, research, design and

development and therefore not subject to disclosure under the FOI Act.

"He has a legitimate right to object," commented Swan, "but he's objecting on grounds that are not valid. We merely utilized the act as any citizen has the right to do and did not obtain any of the proprietary information specifically excluded by the act."

AS ADVICE FOR other small businesses who bid on government contracts, Bologna made the following suggestion:

"If you are a small custom or design house like we are, you'd better bid it for all it's worth the first time around."

Bologna said he had discussed the matter with a member of U.S. Sen. David Pryor's staff, which is investigating abuses by Washington consultants, and was advised that it was a common practice of large consulting firms to demand copies of winning bids under the FOIA.

"They do it as a matter of business intelligence or to save themselves the effort and cost of writing their own

proposals should a contract like the one awarded ever be offered again.

"They put all the winning bids into their data banks and grind out proposals like sausage."

Bologna added that he was particularly disturbed because he had helped draft the FOIA when he was a bureaucrat in Washington and because he had always respected Drake-Beam as the "Cadillac" in their field.

Swan said he understood some firms may be filing in a computer proposals gained under the FOIA. "But we aren't. We don't even have a computer. As I say, we are a pretty small operation ourselves."

Swan stressed, though, that he did not see any ethical dilemma being posed by filing for the Bologna proposal.

"Our feeling based upon our use of the FOIA is that we followed not only the letter of the law but its spirit as the act's purpose is to increase availability of public documents to individuals and corporations."

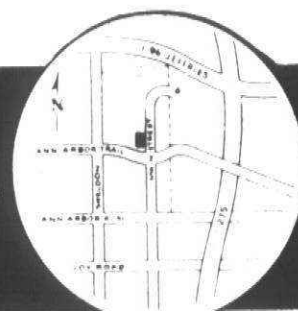

Protection is in full hunting ban

Editor: Although I represent Canton Township as opposed to Plymouth Township, I believe our interests lie in the same area.

From 1970-78 I lived in a home on Gyde Road, which is just south of Joy Road and west of Beck. At that time, there were fewer homes and people in the area than presently. However, for those eight years, my family and I put up with continual harassment from hunters.

One of our neighbors had the front of their home riddled with bullets. Despite their efforts to have anything done about the situation, no hunting ban or stricter laws were ever enforced. Had these people been on their porch at the time, they probably would not be here to tell of it.

Time after time I had hunters climb over our electric fence to hunt among my horses in our backyard, and to shoot and kill our pet ducks, not 50 feet from our house. Maybe if hunting was altogether banned that additional threat of prosecution for both trespassing and hunting in a restricted area might be enough to put a stop to this sort of thing. It is at least worth a try.

The no trespassing law is obviously not enough. There are far too many people, and especially children, to allow this to go on. I believe the question should be: Why not a hunting ban? There is no overpopulation of wildlife in the township to merit hunting, — quite the contrary. The beautiful animals that once complimented the township are all but extinct. This area is no longer rural — that is not my opinion, it is a fact.

There is no state-owned land, it is all the private property of taxpaying owners. Hunters have no permission from these owners to hunt upon their property, yet they continue to do so. I agree that all hunters are not "trash hunters," but far too many of them allow this dangerous sport to continue. Even the "good hunters" have no place in a populated area firing their weapons.

Often times I have had guns pointed my way while riding my horse down the road. These hunters "saw some movement," I suppose, and aimed my way. Had I not yelled, my horse and/or I may well have been the victim of a bullet.

Must we let something disastrous occur to prove that hunting and homes do not mix? I would think the incident on Gyde Road should be enough. There are no vast amounts of open land left in the township to warrant allowing this to continue. Carol Levitt states: "If they (hunters) have no regard for the laws now, they won't tomorrow." Does this mean we are to sit back and do nothing? According to Ms. Levitt, maybe we should let these people do exactly as they please, because they disregard the law anyway. I believe we need stronger laws and have them enforced. Obviously the current ones are not doing the job. Since they cannot seem to contain themselves to safe, unpopulated areas, then hunting privileges in the township should be denied altogether.

Why not have the residents of the area in question vote on the subject? This was done in my neighborhood, and although it came out an overwhelming majority, Canton Township failed to act. Let us learn from the mistakes of others.

This feeling of anti-hunting has been created through years of bad experiences and suffering by these people and many others. It is time to come out of the past and into today's world. There is no place for hunting in an urban community. It has no advantages whatsoever for the residents.

Anyone who feels hunting should be allowed must be doing so for selfish reasons only. Hunters can live without continuing to hunt in the township — possibly people and children cannot.

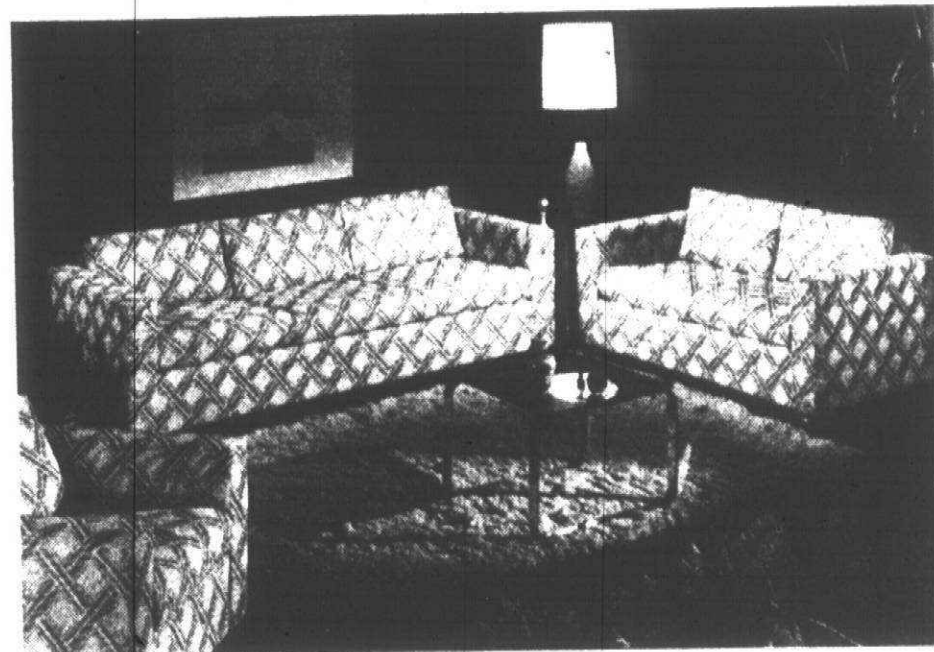

'Yes' to Proposition I will ease overcrowding

Nobody wants to own a white elephant. Canton and Plymouth residents especially want nothing to do with white elephants. They have made that perfectly clear in recent years to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education. Residents have told the board they don't want to be stuck with empty school buildings once student enrollment begins to decline. And so the school district has used a number of options to absorb additional students without building new classrooms.

Building equals bad investment

The Observer urges a "yes" vote on Proposition I because it does what residents have said they want done — it absorbs student growth without risking the white elephant of building new schools.

Because Proposition II fails to meet that test, the Observer urges a NO vote on the request for \$7,277,000.

The "no" vote is advised because residents might get stuck with a white elephant once population begins to decline. And the Observer believes there is a better solution available than risking the white elephant.

For \$7 million, Proposition II will buy two items: a 40-classroom addition at Centennial Educational Park (CEP) and a \$2 million expansion of Central Middle School so it can be used as a high school facility.

No matter what you call it, the 40-classroom facility would be a third high school minus separate athletic, music and cafeteria facilities.

And when high school enrollment begins to decline, there will be a large building left standing at the CEP site with a lot of empty classrooms — 40 to be exact.

The use of Central as a type of high school is an attractive idea. The building could be used as an alternative high school, or as a center for business-oriented career students. But that use of Central is directly tied to the 40-room building at the CEP, and we cannot vote on one without the other.

THE REAL ISSUE with Proposition II, however, is that taxpayers don't have to spend the \$7 million if the board would vote to realign the grades.

By moving the ninth grade back to the middle school, the high schools can survive the population crunch without additional classrooms. Portables may have to be used, but not a new structure.

Some trustees argue that more classrooms will be needed in the future even with grade alignment. If that proves true, the problem can be handled with split sessions for only one or two years.

The backers of Proposition II argue it is better to spend the \$7 million than to realign the grades because that would destroy the programs in middle schools. But the Observer fails to understand why a program cannot be operated with grades seven through nine — if the commitment to do so is made.

While the present grade alignment may have a lot of merit, the Observer doesn't believe it's worth \$7 million to preserve. We urge a "no" vote, with full knowledge that grade realignment will follow.

ANOTHER ISSUE related to Proposition II is expanded use of the Extended School Year (ESY) in the middle schools.

If Central is used as a high school, it won't be available for middle-school students. Even with the addition of Lowell Junior High, the district must keep Pioneer on ESY and put a couple more middle schools on year-round schedules to absorb student growth in grades six through eight.

Ironically, some of the same people who argue in favor of the six-eight alignment in the past also argued that ESY hurt the program in middle school because it interfered with athletics, bands, and elective courses.

What is the use of keeping the six-eight grade structure at a price tag of \$7 million if the program is going to be hurt by expanding ESY in the middle schools?

If Proposition II is defeated, Central will remain a middle school and Pioneer will be placed on a nine-month schedule. That will leave ESY only at the elementary level, and it can be dropped there as elementary enrollments begin to decline.

The use of ESY does place a burden on the operating budget besides threatening programs in middle schools. It seems unwise, therefore, to spend \$7 million to keep the grade structure intact while, at the same time, placing a greater load on the operating budget and hurting those programs.

THE OBSERVER understands many residents believe strongly in the middle-school concept and are convinced that the six-eight alignment is the best way to structure grades.

We salute people who are willing to spend money for something they believe in strongly. But the Observer has been listening closely to its readers and we believe the requested borrowing of \$7 million is unwarranted.

The Observer, therefore, urges a NO vote on Proposition II as a message to the school board to realign the grades and to eliminate ESY in the middle schools.

THIS TRICK HAS been accomplished primarily by using the Extended School Year (ESY) at the elementary level.

Putting a school on the ESY year-round calendar increases that building's capacity by one-third. It means you can absorb 33 percent more students by using ESY without building a single classroom.

That kind of thinking is the key to Proposition I on the March 27 ballot.

Proposition I is a request to borrow \$14,623,000 for 29 years. That \$14.6 million will buy a lot of things, but there's one thing it won't buy: It won't buy a white elephant. By design, Proposition I will not buy a single new school building or a single new classroom.

Proposition I is overwhelmingly loyal to the past dictates of residents and voters to avoid building a white elephant. The proposal represents the price-tag for this approach.

Among items the \$14.6 million will buy are air conditioning units to place more elementary schools on ESY. Students cannot attend class in the hot months of July and August without air conditioning. That's one cost of avoiding white elephants.

The \$14.6 million also will purchase portable classrooms which can be placed at individual schools experiencing a population surge. Initially they may be located at elementary sites, and then

moved to a middle school or a high school site as the student population matures.

Once the population begins to decline, the portable buildings can be sold or used for other purposes. Economically, portables are a better option than a permanent structure — they are not white elephants.

The \$14.6 million also will buy equipment for Lowell Junior High, which is being rented from Livonia. Once population here begins to decline, Lowell can be returned to Livonia. But while the school is needed it will have to have desks, chairs, laboratory equipment, etc. But Lowell will not be a white elephant.

ANOTHER USE OF Proposition I is the financing of a major renovation of Central Middle School so it may continue to be used as a school building.

Without major renovations, the school will be unsafe for student occupancy in the near future. Whether Central is used as a middle school or high school, it must be repaired. And the cost of repairing Central is more economical than building a new middle school or high school. Central will be a white elephant unless it is repaired.

Proposition I also will purchase new buses, for about \$500,000, to transport the additional students on their way. This purchase can be made with oper-

ating funds, but that would hurt taxpayers more because the buses would have to be paid for in one year. Better to spend operating funds on learning by purchasing buses with bonded money.

THERE ARE OTHER things Proposition I will buy unrelated to student growth but, which, nevertheless, are wise purchases.

There is the installation, for example, of an energy conservation system in each building in the district. This system will reduce utility expenses to such an extent that it will pay for itself within five years. Money not spent on utilities also can be spent on learning. For that reason, it makes sense to buy the system with bonded monies.

Proposition I also will pay for a number of new roofs, parking lot resurfacing, and other repairs at a number of schools. These represent needs long neglected.

But the Observer believes the real merit of the proposal is that it clearly meets the desires of taxpayers to absorb student growth without building white elephants.

For that reason, the Observer urges a YES vote March 27 on Proposition I. This is what voters in the past have asked for and is what voters of today should support.



Donahue bows out with grace

It takes guts to admit that you can't do a job.

With eight months left of his term, Treasurer Jim Donahue has admitted that he cannot handle the administrative duties of the elected position because of poor health. He will resign from office as soon as the fate of Canton's proposed zoning ordinance is decided.

A resignation from the treasurer may have been in order earlier.

Sources inside township hall say Donahue has neglected the administrative duties of the part-time treasurer's job in the past few months. His visits to township hall have been rare. He has missed several meetings of the Canton Township board.

But better late than never is Donahue's admission that he cannot perform the job with the dedication it deserves.

The 32-year-old treasurer, who has been diagnosed for an ulcer and mononucleosis, could have pushed his health problems under a rug. He could have continued to draw on the treasurer's salary of \$7,500 a year on the rationale that he was elected to complete a two-year term.

That thinking would have left taxpayers and other township employees holding the bag. Donahue's deputy, Maria Falkiewicz, has absorbed much of the slack in the treasurer's department while her boss has been ill.

ON THE WHOLE, Donahue has been a good public official. As a voting member of the township board, he has approached issues with rational and independent thinking.

He has proven that he is not the rubber stamp for Trustee Robert Greenstein which many thought he would be. Donahue, who helped supervise Greenstein's write-in campaign for supervisor in the 1976 election, has voted with the former supervisor only when he agrees with Greenstein's point of view.

Perhaps most refreshing of all is Donahue's openness with the public and willingness to admit that he has been wrong.

In January 1979, for example, Donahue took the brunt of the blame for a mix-up which violated township board policy. An estimated \$7,000 was spent on the construction of a 35th District Court

facility without authorization from the township board.

It's human to err, but many public officials hate to admit the fact to their constituency.

THE TASK of finding a replacement for Donahue until next November's election now looms before the township board.

Maria Falkiewicz, who has served as deputy treasurer since January 1979, is clearly the best choice for the job.

She is familiar with the workings of the treasurer's department and the issues that face the town-

ship board. She has pushed for staffing improvements in the department to upgrade the quality of services.

She has often poured 40 to 50 hours a week into her job despite the pitiful pay of \$135 a week. Hopes of monetary gain clearly play little role in her willingness to serve the public.

Appointing a new face to the treasurer position would be a mistake with only eight months remaining of Donahue's term.

Mrs. Falkiewicz can fill Donahue's shoes with no transitional problems. Her shoe size already was taken during Donahue's months of illness.

Visit to an Irish wake

At lunch the other day, our discussion turned to the lack of the customary enthusiasm in the celebration of St. Patrick's Day.

It isn't like it used to be, one of the diners said, when our grandparents sang the old Irish ballads all day and danced the Irish reel far into the night.

Another spoke up and asked about the old clay pipes, claiming he read a lot about them but never had seen any except in pictures the old-timers brought with them from the Emerald Isle.

And whatever happened to the old Irish wakes we used to have?

TO THE UNINITIATED, an Irish wake was a gathering of mourners at the home of a deceased friend.

The casket of the departed was on view in the parlor (another term now in the limbo of forgotten things). A black crepe on the front door let passers-by know that a member of the family had departed.

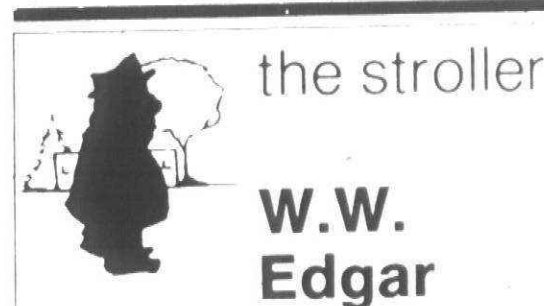
The mourning period started when the casket was placed on view. Neighbors and friends gathered to pay respects, and then moved into the kitchen or living rooms to eat and drink and relate stories dealing with the life of the departed.

Many times these visits lasted far into the night. They were broken up only long enough to visit the casket room from time to time to say the rosary.

THE IRISH WAKE ended with the advent of the funeral home. Now there is just a few moments of neighborly visits when a friend has departed. The custom of sitting around telling stories and imbibing a bit of Irish coffee and amber brew has passed on, as well.

Bud Schrader, retired funeral home director in Plymouth, has only a faint memory of the old-fashioned wakes.

"In all my time here," he said, "I can remember only one or two of the old-time wakes. They just don't have them any more — that is, the kind when friends gathered at the home of the deceased to drown their sorrow."



These old Irish customs are well remembered by The Stroller — and for a strange reason.

It was the custom when a person died at home that the neighbors would hasten to the home to wash the corpse. The Stroller's mother nominated herself as the official washer. So, The Stroller was on hand at many of these moments of sorrow.

AS THESE MEMORIES come floating back through the years, he well remembers the week that Kate Smith, one of our town's characters, passed away. Mother was on hand, as usual, and The Stroller sat in on the wake.

Kate was a stout woman who had a fiendish thirst for beer. Most every night she could be seen strolling down the alley to the corner saloon for a can of beer. She'd be laughing all the way.

Kate was a great entertainer. She'd invite friends in most every night for a round of pinochle — and to partake of the bucket of beer.

So, it was only natural that many of these friends turned out for the wake on the night before her funeral. As the midnight hour approached and the last farewells were being said, one of the mourners came back into the living room with a smile of satisfaction on his face.

"Poor Kate," he said. "I figure she's going to be thirsty, so I just slipped a bottle of beer into her casket. I know she'd appreciate it."

No wonder those old-time wakes left fond memories.

'Never neglect the cry of a child' for anything

A cry. Sharp. Piercing. Terrifying. This is the distinct cry of a child with meningitis.

The slightest movement brings excruciating pain, mostly a severe headache, enough to make a small body convulse with terror.

I know. I've cradled a 10-day old infant in my arms, his small body rigid, no longer crying but screaming. Finding no fever, the doctor dismissed my concern as that of an overtired mother.

I knew. As I drove home from the pediatrician's office, tears obstructed my vision. My child was in imminent danger.

The car radio provided musical accompaniment for the baby's screams. Driving can certainly frustrate maternal instinct when two hands are needed on the steering wheel and two hands want to reach for a crying child.

REACHING HOME, I began taking his temperature every hour. Four hours later — 104 degrees.

Now confronted with a fever, the doctor insisted that was the cause of discomfort. Cool baths would lower the temperature and end the crying.

Naturally, it didn't work. Hours later in Children's Hospital I passed two doctors engrossed in discussion, studying a chart like a road map.

"Krieger," one doctor said to the other. Eyes still fixed on the chart, he shook his head like someone regretfully denying a fact. "Not much of a chance."

Doug got that chance. While the doctors might have prematurely signed my baby's death warrant, it was canceled by the heavens. Eighteen years later, Doug saw his 6-year-old brother, Avram, writhing in pain. His head. Pain. Crying. Then — he screamed.

IT WASN'T a quiet trip to Children's Hospital. Fortunately I didn't have to drive so I could cradle my screaming son. Only the screams grew weaker, and the little boy in my arms became limp.

I stood before the emergency room nurse holding Avram as if I were making a sacrificial offering.

Intercepting the child, the nurse literally ran with him into an examining room where within a half hour the verdict was entered: meningitis.

During the week stay at Children's, 3-year-old Yaakov joined his brother, sharing the room and the disease. However, it was ultimately found to be viral meningitis and not the life-threatening bacterial form.

This led to a discussion about the disease with a friend who also had spent an agonizing wait while it was determined if her child had bacterial or viral meningitis.

"I'll never forget the way the baby cried," she told me. "It was kind of like a piercing wail I had never heard before and I never want to hear again."

THE WORDS of Rabbi Schneur Zalman, who lived in the 1700s, came to mind.

"Never neglect the cry of a child," he admonished his son who remained engrossed in prayer after his child had fallen from his cradle. Picking up the crying infant, the rabbi continued, "Nothing in this world is more important than a cry of a child."

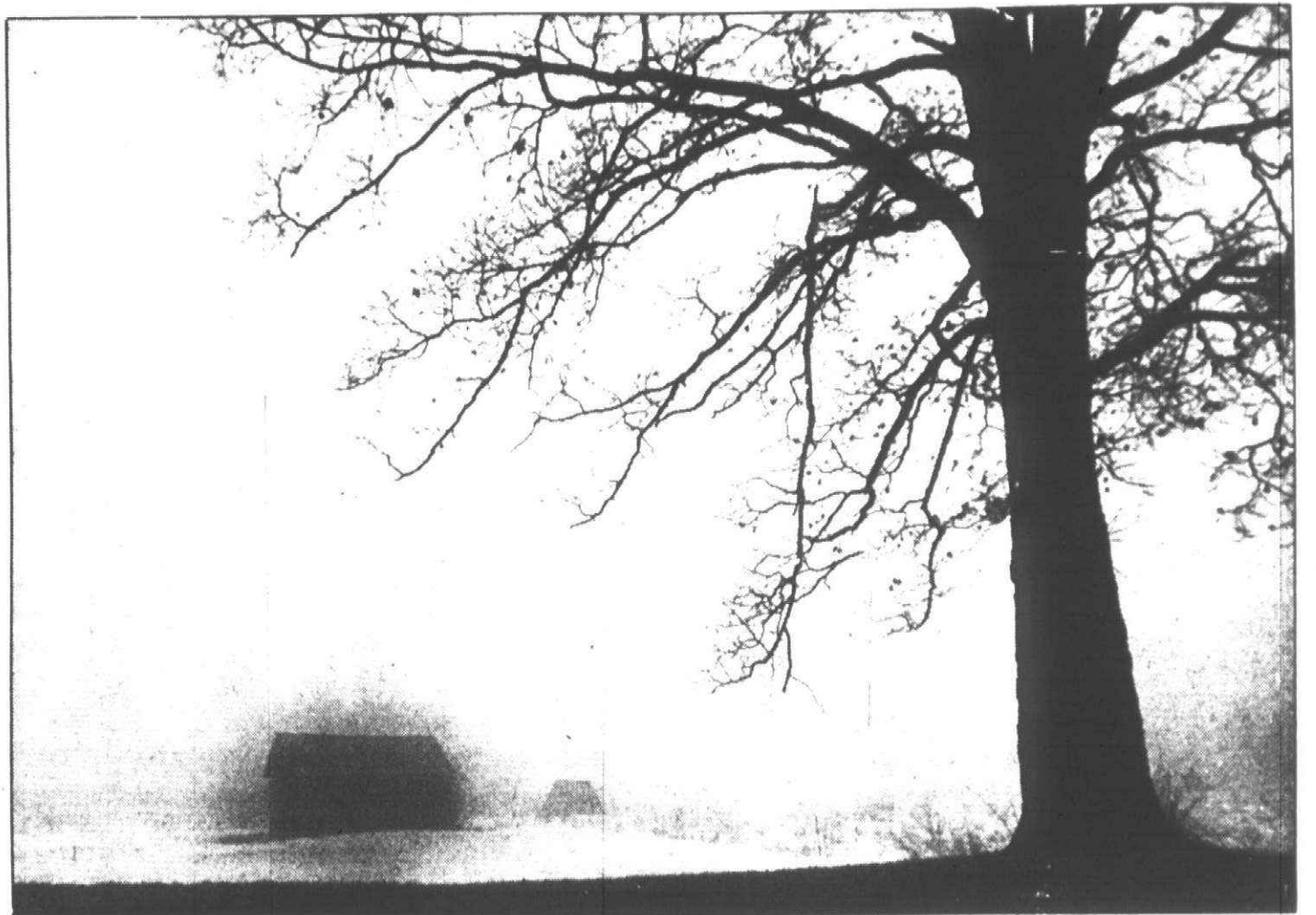
Recently, a couple filed suit in Wayne Circuit Court against their church, which, they alleged, had warned them not to seek medical help for their desperately ill child. The parents had kept a diary of the progressive suffering of their beautiful 17-month-old son.

I'll spare you the details. The reading would make you as sick as it would me to write this chronological tale of agony.

The boy died in January 1977 after his parents finally took him to an east side hospital. Diagnosis: meningitis.

The court suit, asking \$10,000 damages, is really meaningless to the couple. Nothing will erase the cry they hear. Piercing. Terrifying. But there is no child to cradle in their arms.

Rock wrestlers dominate All-Area squad

The big story of the 1979-80 wrestling season in the area was the emergence of Plymouth Salem as one of the most powerful teams in the state.

Several other area teams enjoyed success this winter.

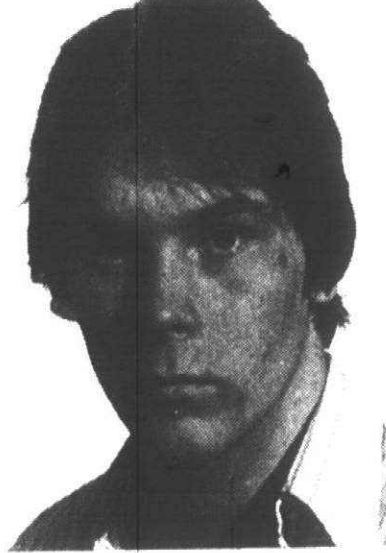
Detroit Catholic Central, which was jolted when several team members were dismissed for violating school rules, made a creditable recovery and had a champion at the state meet.

Brian Cole's opponents are finding out just how serious he is about boxing.

A junior at Plymouth Salem High School, Cole won the Golden Gloves title Saturday in the novice 156-pound weight class with a third round technical knockout over Detroit's Danny Lucio at St. Clair Shores South Lake High School.

Cole, who competed against boxers ages 16-20, represented the Ann Arbor Boxing Club in the tournament.

The win at South Lake marks a rapid improvement over the past year, according to Cole's coach, Stacy McKinley.

Bologna led the Rockets in pins and points. He finished second in the Schoolcraft Invitational.

Bologna is a former national AAU Junior Olympics champ.

Jim Schultz, 105 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Schultz, a captain this season, won 48 of 52 matches and finished fourth in the Class A state finals.

The senior, who totalled 315 points this year alone, is a two-time Suburban Eight League champ and a two-time regional titlist.

Schultz won eight tournaments (including state district and regional) this season and 16 during his career.

He holds nine school records and pinned 55 opponents during his three years with the varsity.

Jeff Brown, 112 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Brown forged a 40-11 record this season and placed sixth in the state meet.

The senior, a captain this year, won four tournaments. He has qualified for the state finals each of his three varsity seasons.

Brown holds three varsity records at Salem including most wins in a career (128).

Jeff Dunson, 119 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Dunson pinned 13 opponents while compiling a 30-15 record this year.

He finished second in the Suburban Eight League Meet, second at the Bedford Invitational and second at the Monroe Invitational.

Dunson placed fourth in his regional and holds the school record for the quickest pin — nine seconds.

Brian Galdes, 119 pounds, Redford Thurston. Area coaches determined that Galdes and Dunson deserved to share first-team laurels on the all-Observer squad.

The senior, 34-4 this year, capped a solid three-year varsity career by winning an individual title at the Northwest Suburban League Meet. Galdes also placed first at the Catholic Central, Schoolcraft and Thurston Invitations.

Mark Ross, 126 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Ross, another captain, placed second in the Class A finals this year. His season record was 45-7-1.

Ross, a two-time state qualifier, won seven tournaments this year, 13 during his career. He has won titles at tournaments 13 times while wrestling with the varsity.

Kurt McPherson, 132 pounds, Detroit Catholic Central. McPherson was the only area wrestler able to win a state championship this season. His record was 37-1 and he avenged his only loss in the state meet.

McPherson, a senior, was a stabilizing force when the Shamrocks experienced internal team problems earlier in the season.

He was also a Catholic League champ.

Jerry Valchine, 138 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Valchine, who finished second in the Suburban Eight League Meet and second in his regional, won two matches at the state finals before he was eliminated from the Class A meet.

His record this year was 46-6, 82-17 the past two seasons.

Valchine placed first in six invitations during the last two years when he regularly competed.

Duane Gibbs, 145 pounds, Westland John Glenn. A three-year letterman, Gibbs was first in the Northwest Suburban League Meet, third at the Plymouth and Schoolcraft Invitionals and fourth at the Glenn and Catholic Central Invitionals.

The senior posted a 30-5 record this season.

Gibbs was injured while competing in the state regionals and was forced to withdraw.

Ken Hodges, 155 pounds, Westland John Glenn. Also a three-year letterwinner, Hodges compiled a 25-7 ledger during the 1979-80 campaign.

This year, he was first at the Glenn

Invitational, second at the Northwest Suburban League Meet and Plymouth Invitational and the Schoolcraft Invitational.

Hodges sustained a concussion while competing in the districts of the state tournament and could not continue.

Keith Zimmerman, 165 pounds, Westland John Glenn. A Northwest Suburban League champion, Zimmerman went 25-5 against all opponents this season.

He placed first at the Glenn Invitational, third in the districts and fourth at the Salem Tournament.

Zimmerman, a junior, has earned two varsity letters for wrestling.

Jeff Powers, 185 pounds, Plymouth Salem. Powers, a team captain, had a 40-6 record this year on the way to a fourth-place finish at the Class A state meet.

He was the Suburban Eight and regional champion.

Powers finished first in four tournaments and pinned 29 opponents this winter.

Those pins gave him the Salem record for most falls in a season.

Teams must be self-insured to play in county parks

There's good news and bad news for baseball teams which want to play in Wayne County parks this spring.

The good news is that they will be able to get permits to use the county's 13 baseball and 44 softball diamonds.

The bad news is that they will have to buy their own bodily injury and property damage insurance. That could cost a league of 20 teams at least \$2,000 a season — \$100 per team — for a required \$200,000 policy.

THE NEWS emerged out of a series of meetings last week between the Wayne County Road Commission, which runs the parks with county general fund money, and the public works committee of the County Board of Commissioners.

The red ink-stained county cut the parks budget from last year's \$2.7 million to \$1.2 million for 1980.

Athletic associations were reported in near panic as the result of the road commission's parks division's refusal to issue them permits in such parks as Bell Creek, Lola Valley, Middle Rouge and Elizabeth.

The decision to issue permits to leagues with insurance came after members of the commissioners' public works committee grilled two road commission staff members, Joseph N. Hartmann, assistant managing director, and David L. Jackson, assistant director of administration.

Hartmann told commissioners the county currently carries a \$200,000 self-insured retention policy that

leaves the county liable for the first \$200,000 in case of injury.

"The high cost of insurance today," he said, "prohibits us from buying 100 percent coverage. The fact that we can no longer maintain the parks as we have in the past drives the costs even higher."

"We're not about to issue permits under these conditions," he said. "We could lose a bundle of money."

When asked by a commissioner if they had contacted their insurance

company to see if they could obtain additional coverage, Jackson admitted they hadn't. "Our attorneys are very cautious people," he added, "and the cost is prohibitive."

Both Jackson and Hartmann agreed, however, to take up the problem with their own board in an effort to reconcile the issue. The result was their tentative agreement to issue permits with the insurance proof.

AN INSURANCE carrier, contacted

by Commissioner Thomas Presnell, D-Westland, indicated a \$200,000 bodily injury and property damage policy will probably cost a league composed of 20 teams "at least \$2,000 per season."

Presnell said, "It's a damned shame these kids have to pay for insurance out of their own pockets. We're lucky to have youngsters that are interested in playing ball in the park instead of selling dope in the park."

Committee members also urged Hartmann to conduct a series of public hearings to obtain input from civic and athletic groups on ways they might contribute to park services.

But Thursday Jackson said the road commission board did not feel such ac-

tion was pertinent to the problem. "Since we're now requiring insurance along with permits, there is no need to hold hearings," he said. "It's as simple as that."

EDWIN MIKA, superintendent of parks, said, "We closed the parks Nov. 5 and hope to reopen early next month," he explained, "as soon as we can bring in a few extra men."

When asked if "scratch" teams picnicking in the park will require permits to play ball, Mika said, "No."

"However," he added, "if they are playing on one of the diamonds and an organized team with a permit comes along, they'll have to move."

Special Olympics fund-raiser beginning

A major fund-raiser is being launched for the Wayne County Special Olympics.

Delcie Green, volunteer area director of the county Special Olympics, announced that the fund-raiser is being run in cooperation with the Detroit Coca-Cola Bottling Co.

The fund-raiser, which features Detroit Tiger second baseman Lou Whitaker, will be known as "Coke Cans to Support Special Olympics."

Area students and residents are being invited to collect 12-ounce Coca-Cola cans and donate them to Special Olympics. The campaign will kick-off on Monday and end April 26.

The individual school within the tri-county area donating the most Coke cans during this period will earn up to \$1,000 in prize money.

The public also is invited to donate their cans at their local participating

store, displaying the Special Olympics Can Catcher.

According to Green, area schools already have been contacted and assigned a Special Olympics contact person who will arrange for the counting and collection of the cans.

"We are encouraged that area party stores and shopping malls already have agreed to provide space for the Special Olympics Can Catcher," said Green.

Persons wanting additional information on the fund-raiser may contact Joann Doyle of Plymouth at 459-0022.

This year the Special Olympics will be held in the Plymouth community with track and field and other events being staged at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park.

The Special Olympics is backed locally by the Plymouth-Canton Community Civitans.

Hot pursuit ends in cop car wreck

A 10-minute chase on the streets of Plymouth resulted in the arrest of a local man and damage to two Plymouth police cars.

At about 5:30 a.m. Sunday, police were called to the home of Karen Sue Trent of Plymouth who reported that someone was attempting to break into her apartment.

Upon arrival at the Mill Street address, two officers found the woman's husband, Terry Lee Trent, 24, allegedly attempting to break in the apartment door.

While police investigated, the man drove off in his car toward Ann Arbor Road.

The two patrol cars followed until the motorist was forced off the side of the road on Ann Arbor just east of Haggerty Road.

In the process, two of the police cars were damaged as Trent attempted to flee, Plymouth Police Chief Tim Ford said.

At one point, Ford said, Trent's car accelerated to about 90 miles per hour.

In the two damaged police cars were officers Tom Zedan and Joe Kahanec. Both men were taken to St. Joseph Hospital where they were treated and released with minor injuries that day. Ford says the injuries amounted to sprains and bruises. Trent was not injured.

About \$1,000 worth of damage was done to the patrol car driven by Zedan. Approximately \$100 in damages was done to the car driven by Kahanec. This car was on loan to the Plymouth force as a "test car" from a local Buick dealer.

Trent was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol as well as fleeing and eluding police officers. He pleaded guilty to those charges Monday before Judge Dunbar Davis of the 35th District Court in Plymouth.

On Tuesday, he was fined \$100 or 11 days in prison and his driver's license was suspended for one year on the DUIL charge. He was also placed on two years probation and was ordered to pay the Plymouth Police Department \$875 for restitution of the damaged vehicles.

Under the fleeing charge, he was fined 30 days in jail plus fined \$105 which was suspended.

Immunization campaign gears up once again

After an intensive campaign to collect all immunization records of high schoolers in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools proved successful, the spotlight has turned to students in the elementary and middle schools.

Similar records for these youngsters must be delivered to school nurses by April 14. As of March 17, about 2,640 elementary and middle-school students still had deficient records in the schools.

According to state law, schools must have proof that youngsters received shots for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella.

On Feb. 21, parents received notices that 4,400 of their children in these lower grades still needed to upgrade their medical files.

Procedures in elementary and middle schools are somewhat different than those used in the high schools. Like secondary students, however, these children could face exclusion from school if they do not meet state requirements by the deadline.

Parents of students in elementary and middle school must have records signed by a physician, public health nurse or other health provider stating these shots have been taken. School officials warn that parents should not attempt to reconstruct these records themselves or get records from a school nurse.

THE WAYNE County Health Center, on Merriman Road just north of Michigan, is holding a free immunization clinic for those students who are unable to reach their own family doctors in time to meet the deadline.

The center is open 8:30-11:30 a.m. and 12:30-3:30 p.m. from Monday through Friday. It also is open Wednesdays from 4-8 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

The school district will not hold a separate clinic.

Parents may submit an immunization waiver which will allow the student to remain in school. This is a statement, signed by a parent or guardian, that refuses immunization because of religious conviction or other objections to immunization.

Questions should be directed to Patrick McLogan, director of the immunization program at the Wayne County Health Department. The number is 729-0210. Questions on student records should be directed to pupil personnel services at 455-0470.

Seven Plymouth-Canton school nurses have spent most of their time this year helping students meet the state requirement.

"We hope that parents will cooperate so that the nurses can get back to our regular preventive health program," said Pat O'Donnell, health services school administrator.

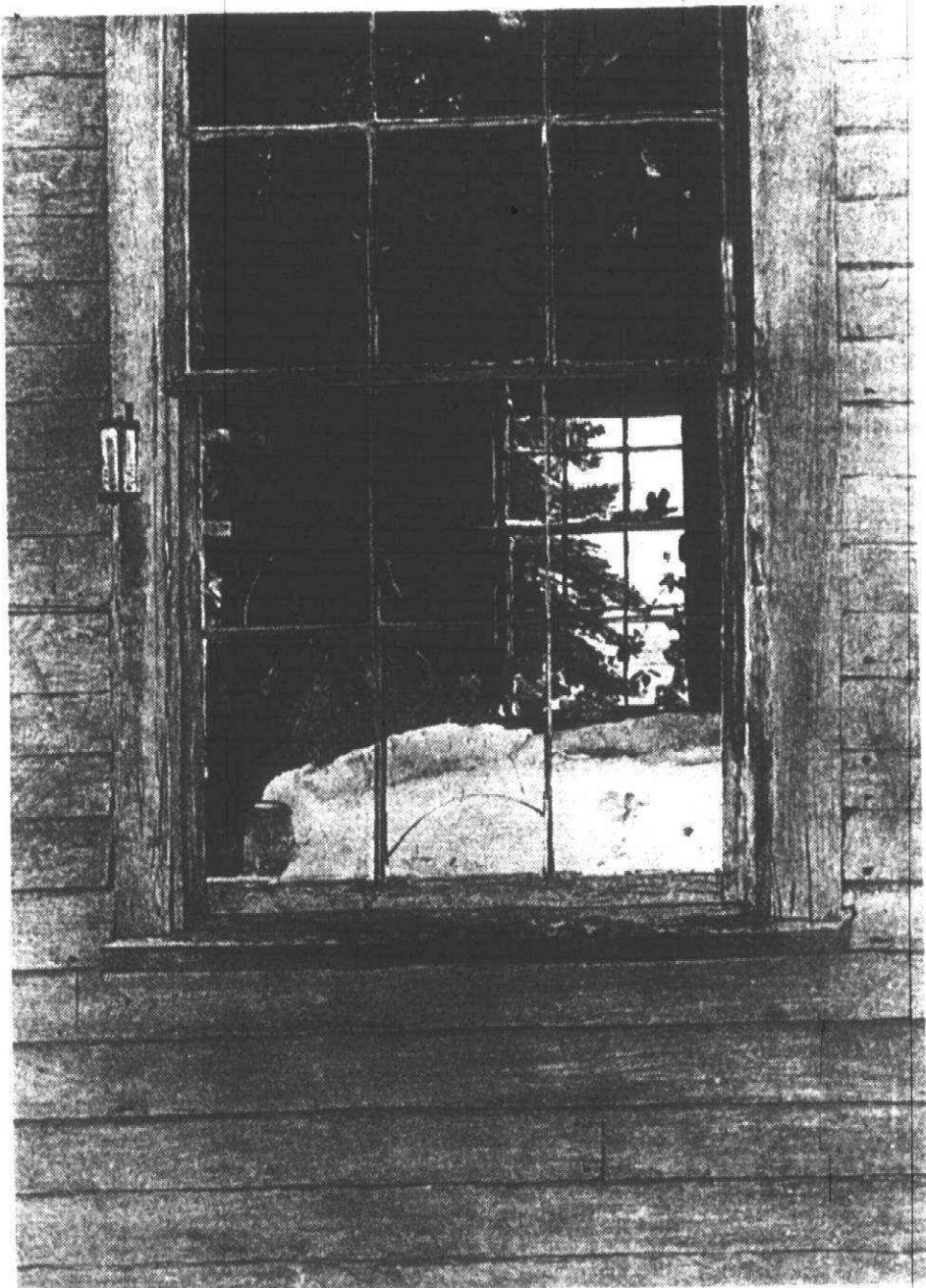
Proceeds will be sent to the MS society for patient services and multiple sclerosis research.

will be: "Bouquet of Cosmos," by Cathelin, "Lilies," by E.B. Snoe, and "Leopard," by Patricia Due.

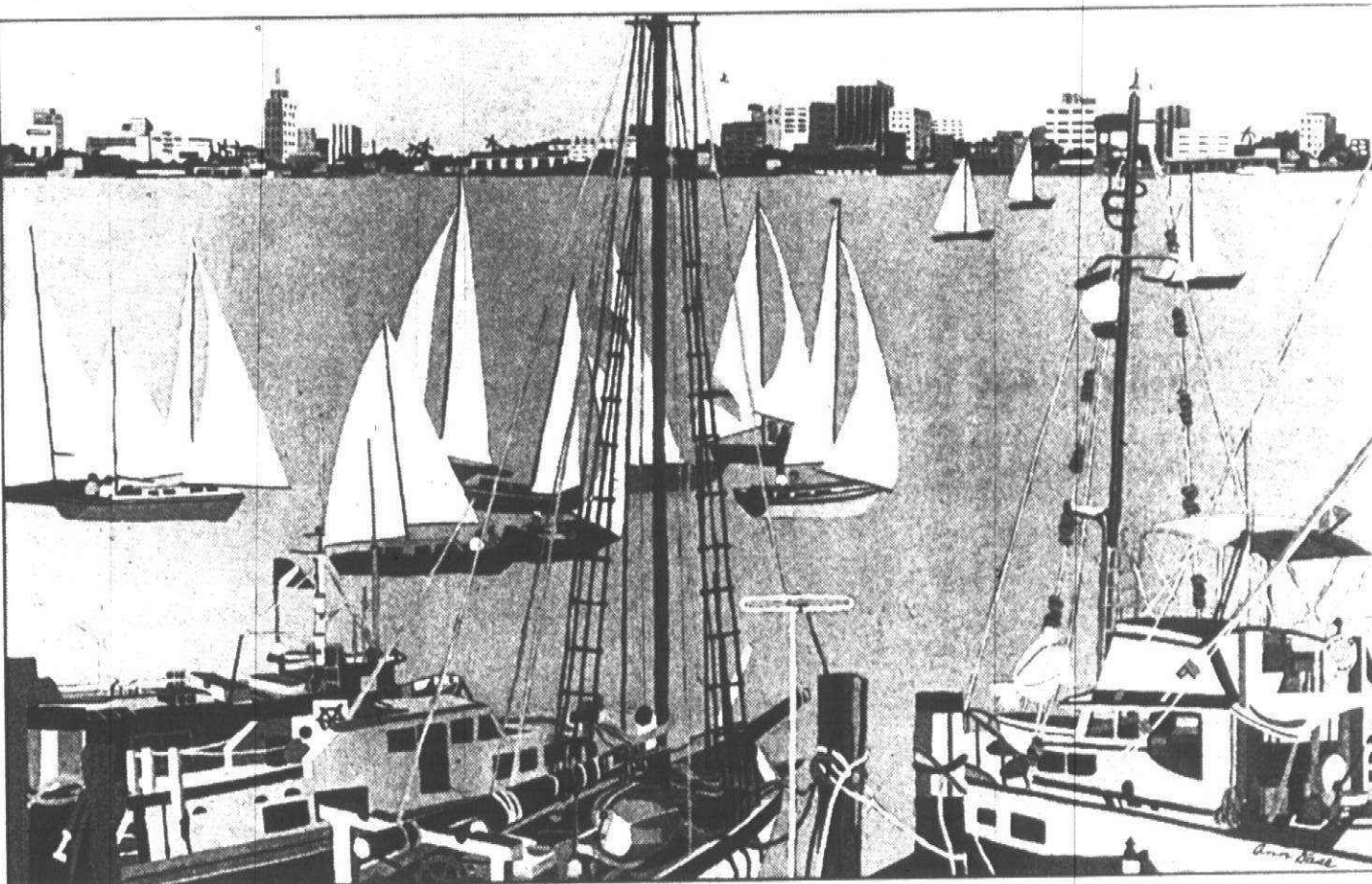

Dean of antiquers describes treasures

Most successful emporiums are imprinted indelibly with the personality of their owners. The Treasure Mart in Ann Arbor is such an institution.

For 20 years come April owner Demaris Cash has made the resale shop on Broadway — located "a lunch stop away" from the Gandy Dancer restaurant in Ann Arbor's landmark train station — a reflection of her beliefs.

The store containing two floors of "junk that someone else will love" has

a reputation in Michigan that links the Treasure Mart to Mrs. Cash as Neiman Marcus is tied to Stanley Marcus.

Word has gotten out that "any time you're in Ann Arbor it's the place to stop."

Who knows, you might find a pair of gold bracelets from Tiffany or a quilt stitched by the mother of the first governor of Minnesota.

Both items found their way to the resale store and now are the possessions of Mrs. Cash.

But because the store has gained the reputation for having "finds" of this

caliber, it has been sought out by customers who may be housewives, University of Michigan staffers or celebrities.

"Every time Helen Hayes plays in the area," Mrs. Cash confides, "she comes in the shop but she puts her finger on her mouth to indicate we're not to welcome her — she doesn't want to be identified. She wants to shop."

A recent shopper was Mrs. Johnny Cash. Her husband was performing in the area and they were staying at the Marriott in Ann Arbor.

"The taxi driver told her, 'It's the

most interesting shop in town' and apparently she thought so because she stayed two-and-a-half hours with the taxi meter running and bought \$8,000 worth," Mrs. Cash relates.

When Mrs. Cash last week told a joint meeting of four area Quilter societies chapters, "It's a pure joy to handle things for people," there was no doubt she meant it.

She enthusiastically displayed a tableful of items that had found their way to her store. A metal sewing bird whose beak years ago held folds of cloth for the home sewer was recognized as "very collectible."

So was the Faberge spoon with glasswork bowl resembling a cathedral window.

"Greenfield Village would like this," she observed, holding it up for light to flow through the fine piece of jewelry.

Members of the host Station VI chapter, Base Line, Silver Springs and Plymouth's new Antiquarian chapter gathered in Northville's Mill Race Historical Village for the program.

They admired beaded purses, chatelaines worn about the housewife's waist, a skating lantern — and tried to identify a corn husker, a brass earphone and brass holders that years ago were attached to a woman's belt to hold up her skirts.

But 20 years ago such a variety was not finding its way to the shop just opened in the building it still occupies.

Mrs. Cash recalled for the Quilters how she, the mother of two young daughters, one discovered to have muscular dystrophy, also had a dependent mother and was facing the possibility that her husband Travis might be unable to work.

"I asked the Lord what I could do to earn a living," she said.

The answer came as a result of one of her frequent trips to a surplus store that had three lighted display cases, "a tremendous bargain."

As she kept telling friends about them, one suggested she open a resale shop and offered to bring her accumulations from out of travel with her hus-

band, an Army colonel.

With Grace Bigley, a partner for many years, the store was painted and readied for opening. (It now is owned by Mrs. Cash, her husband and daughters after Mrs. Bigley, who was bookkeeper, wished to retire, Mrs. Cash explains.)

One of the first requests was for a crystal chandelier.

"Now that is not an item that usually finds its way to a resale shop," Mrs. Cash related, "and I had to have it in a specified time."

"I said, 'Lord, do you know if there's a chandelier anywhere?' and the next day a man from Detroit came in wondering if we could sell his chandelier."

"It was just what Lou McKush of Northville was seeking and he later bought a mirror from me, too."

As the Treasure Mart became a mecca for antiquers and browsers Mrs. Cash saw a need for a resale clothing store and opened The Tree a block away with Loretta Brown.

"All my clothes come from there," she announced, patting the beaver collar of her suit.

Noting that her grandfather operated a country store in Rebersville, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Cash remembered, "He greeted everybody by name and we try to do the same."

Today, Mrs. Cash remarks, the Treasure Mart is asked to empty about three houses a week. People still also bring in individual items to be sold on consignment.

"Young people just love oak because it's so practical," she told the Quilters.

She suggests saving anything hand blown or hand painted and anything with the maker's mark or label.

Choicest items, of course, are more rare. But a Gobelin tapestry came into the store from Hungarian refugees.

The quilt with fruit and floral design was part of a household shipment.

"When we saw the workmanship, I called the owners to say they must have

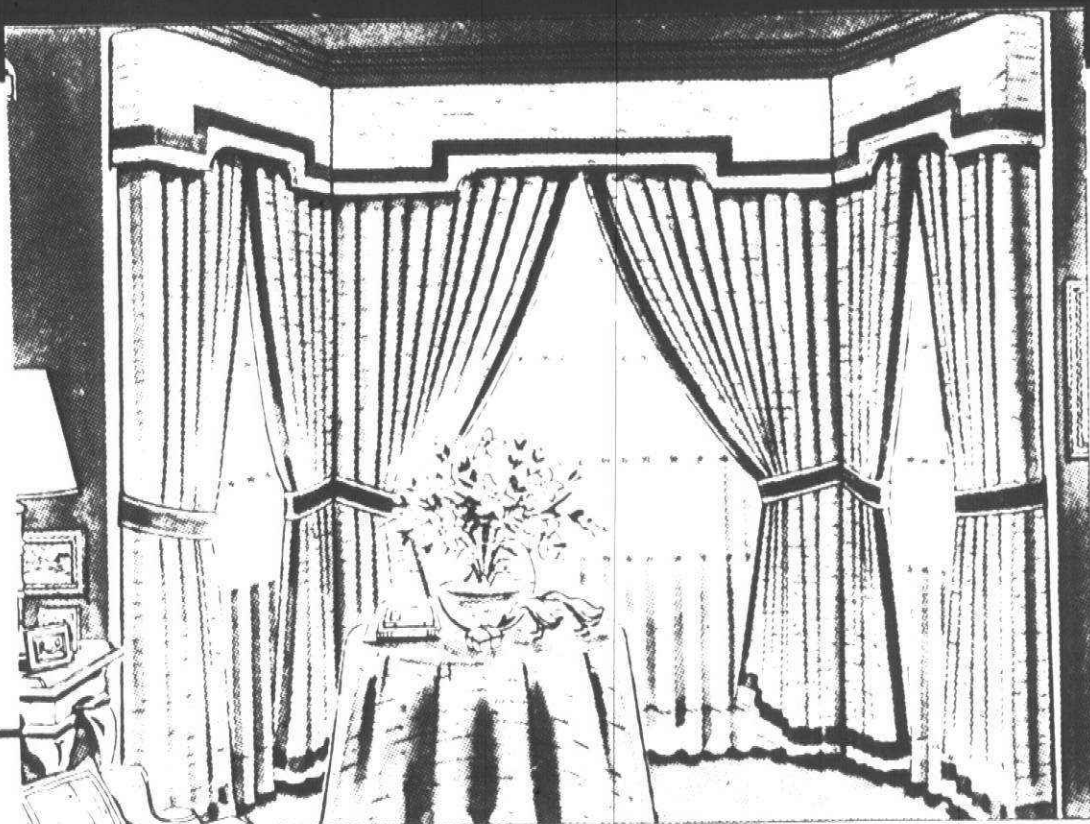

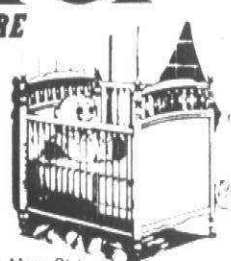

Gwen Frostic to visit garden club

Michigan artist Gwen Frostic, who attracts thousands of visitors to her Benzonia studios each year, will come to the next meeting of the Plymouth branch, Woman's National Farm and Garden Association.

The event, which is open to the public, will be at noon Monday, April 14, in the Plymouth Cultural Center, 525 Farmer. There is no charge, but reservations must be made with Doris Rich-

ard, 453-4425, or Beverly Booker, 453-8923.

The artist draws her creations from nature, working almost entirely in linoleum blocks. She is well known for her distinctive stationery, placemats and books of poetry. She also creates T-shirts and tote-bags, under her Presscraft Papers label.

She is an astute businesswoman, as well as a distinctive artist.

Frostic, who is 74, grew up in Wyandotte and graduated from Michigan State Normal School (now Eastern Michigan University), in 1926. She did graduate work at Western State Normal School (now Western Michigan University) and returned home to give private art lessons.

She worked with copper and brass, turning out such things as candelabras for churches.

During World War II, she worked as tool designer in the Ford Motor Co. bomber plant at Willow Run. It was from this that she got production line experience, which she uses in her printing plant in Benzonia.

After the war, she began her own printing shop, turning out notepapers. She wrote her first book, "My Michigan," to give to national officers of the

National Federation of Business and Professional Women in 1956.

The book was an instant success, with many people wanting to buy copies for themselves and to give to others. Since then, Frostic has written 10 more books of poetry and prints.

In 1955, she moved to Frankfort and was there for nine years. Her Benzonia property is 285 acres, and includes a wildlife sanctuary, as well as the printing plant, offices and sales rooms. More than 30 people are employed there. She does a large mail order business, and has a retail outlet in Tubac, Ariz.

In her career, she has created more than 3,700 designs. All the materials are assembled by hand, and all inks are custom made at the plant.

Ms. Thomas takes seriously her role as spokesperson for the women's movement. She is honorary chairman of the Educational Foundation of American Women in Radio and Television's project, "Children's Television."

"I look forward to the 80's," she says, "I look forward to the time when men and women can be friends and lovers, equal partners, lovingly sharing burdens. Women will like themselves more, and liking yourself is the first step to having the generosity to love someone else. And that includes friends, too."

TERRY HEKKER

Terry Hekker, a champion of the profession of housewifery, has written a hilarious book about the joy of being a woman, wife and mother. She is all for equality but feels there are a lot of people "giving a good cause a bad name." As spokesperson for an endangered species, she tells women they have a choice — it is all right to be a homemaker, and motherhood hasn't gone out of style yet.

This mother of five is the author of the book, "Ever Since Adam and Eve," called a common sense view of feminism, the sexual revolution and women's changing roles. Critics hail her as a new Erma Bombeck.

FRANK CAPPIELLO

As an economist and investment counselor, Frank Cappiello has been a panel member and sometimes host on the popular television series, Wall Street Week.

La CONDESA de ROMANONES

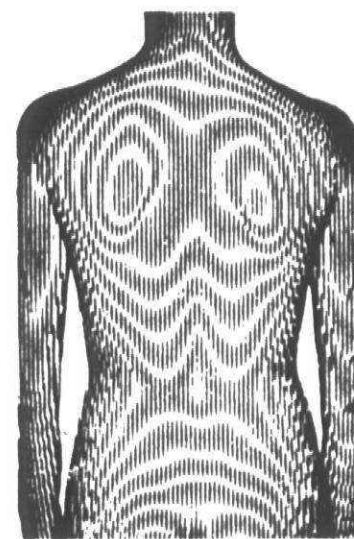
The American-born Condesa de Romanones is one of the most active and influential women in Europe. Born Aline Griffith in upstate New York, she

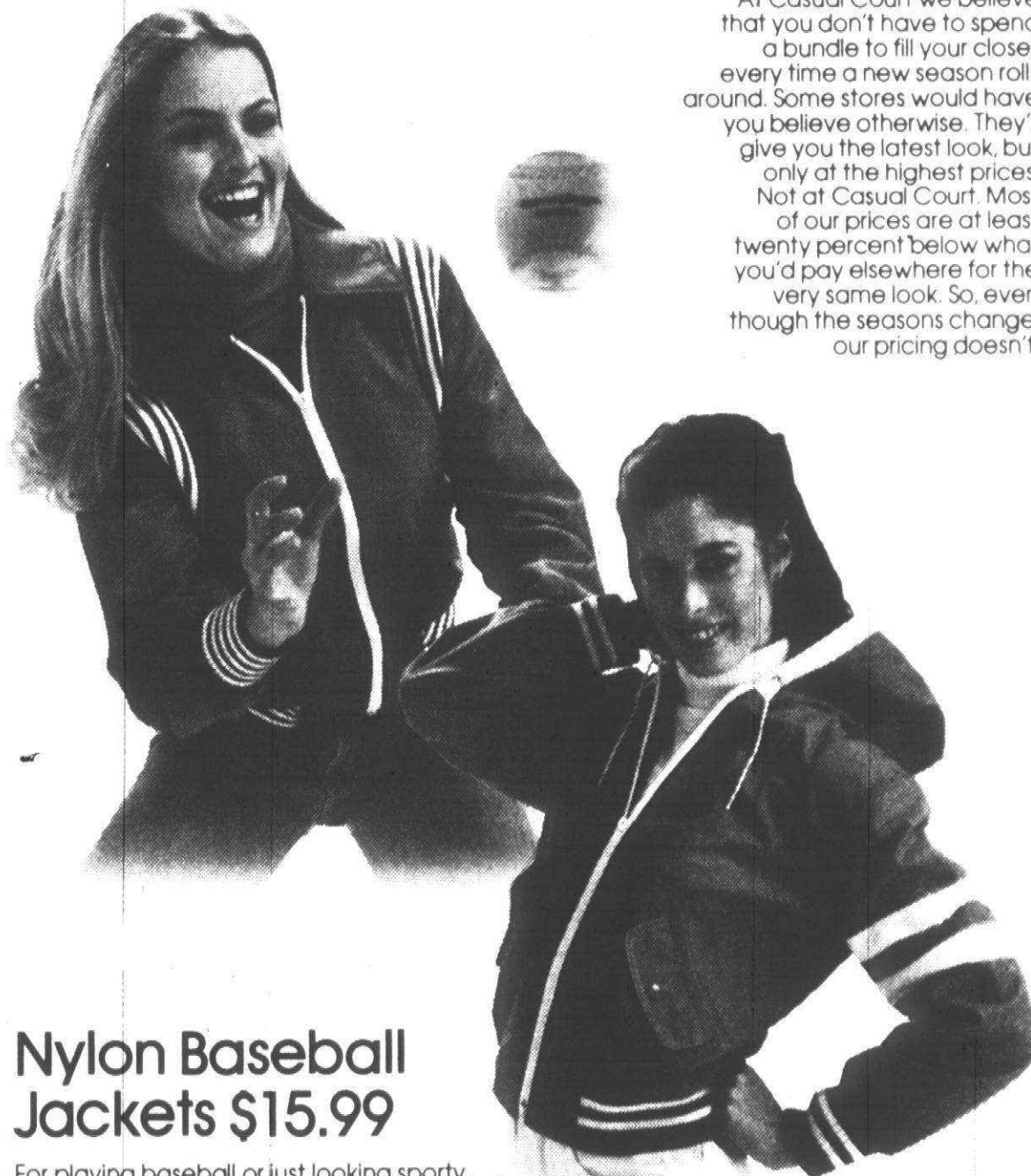

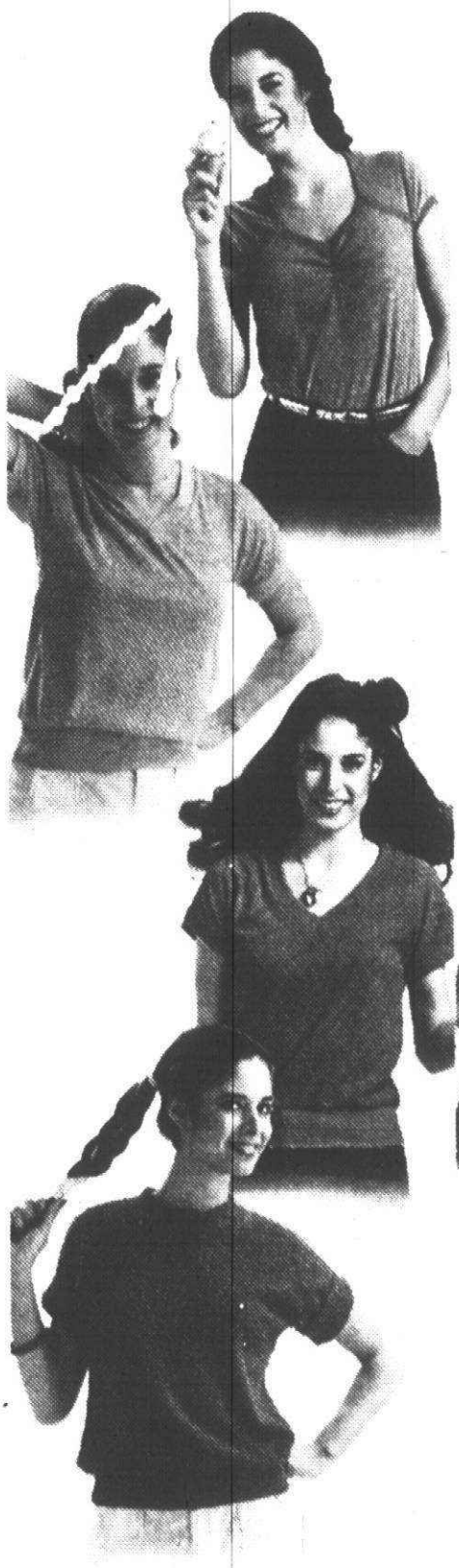

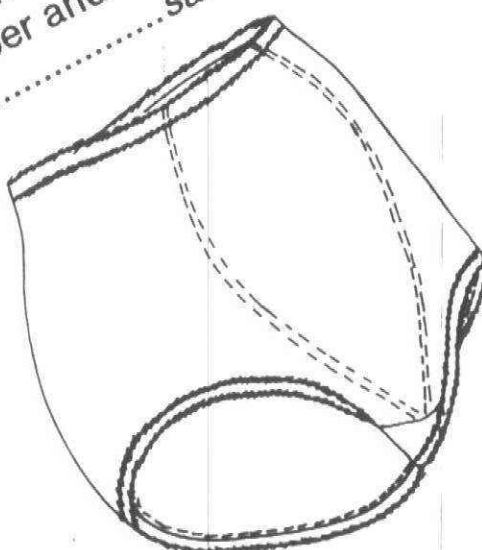

Malnutrition replaces starvation

Visiting priest tells of aid to Cambodians

When the Rev. George Torok speaks about the refugees in Cambodia, he speaks from experience.

Father Torok spent five weeks in Cambodian refugee camps recently. Earlier, he experienced how being a refugee can ravage mind and body.

"I have never seen anything like this since the time of the Nazis," said Fr. Torok. "He was a refugee from the Communist regime in his native Czechoslovakia. He was imprisoned after World War II and escaped to the West by swimming the Moravia River."

Last week he visited St. Regis Catholic Church in Birmingham, Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in Plymouth and St. John Seminary in Plymouth on behalf of Catholic Relief Services.

"Four million people have died," he said, speaking of Cambodia. "This is apocalyptic tragedy."

The priest appealed to Americans to support the relief efforts of the Catholic Relief Services to avert further disaster in that country where 1.5 million people fled their homeland to seek help across the border in Thailand.

A FILMMAKER as well as priest, Fr. Torok was asked by his agency to make a documentary about the starving and impoverished people of Cambodia. He described his arrival at the closed border.

"It was a ghastly vision," he said. "As they approached the border, we saw destitute beggars. Walking cadavers come out from bushes and approached our trucks to receive food."

"They are not aggressive. They are most gentle you can find. It's like watching slow motion."

"Then they would return to the woods."

The military, he said, was lined up behind the truck convoy with machine guns. That convoy consisted of 15

trucks, which transported 36 metric tons (a metric ton equals 2,205 lbs.) of food, medicine and clothing.

When the borders opened as a result of an agreement between the government of Thailand and the United Nations high commission on refugees, Fr. Torok said, there was an incredible flow of refugees, 200 every 15 minutes. In less than one month, holding camps were established by international relief agencies to accommodate 2.5 million starving people.

THE CAMPS were nothing more than open fields, encompassing one square mile, surrounded by barbed wire fences and soldiers with machine guns, Fr. Torok said. The refugees could not leave the compound under any circumstances.

The relief agencies then began providing food, medicine, clothing and shelter. The largest camp held 200,000 people. Plastic canvases draped over bamboo sticks became shelters.

Mosquito netting was important in preventing malaria. Water was trucked in from a nearby river. A kitchen was established to feed some of the people. Others would take the food back to their shelters and cook for themselves.

Sanitation consisted of a trench dug on the perimeter of the camp, then sprayed daily with disinfectant. The people and their shelters were also sprayed daily to ward off further disease.

The health of the people was deplorable, said the Rev. Torok. Starvation and malnutrition were the worst problems, followed by malaria, tuberculosis (85 percent of the people were infected with TB), bronchial diseases, pneumonia, diarrhea and a lack of vitamin A, which leads to eye infections and blindness.

"It's desperate to observe this before your very eyes," Fr. Torok said. "And there was something I was totally unprepared for."

"The real medical problems were the terminal cases under bushes, trees, and in tents. They were so bad, they didn't have the strength to walk to clinics. The team of nurses had to look in these places to find these people."

Fr. Torok said priorities were assigned to save those closest to death.

"Those under five and over 45 don't have the resources to resist starvation and disease," he said. But when the team arrived, he said, "It wasn't a moral dilemma to decide who to save. It was how much life you could save."

Two doctors, 40 nurses, six paramedics and two public health nurses made up the medical team, he said. Even with other agencies helping, that amounted to one doctor for every 30,000 people.

"We had a death tent in the camp," he said. "It had a sign above it which read, 'Death tent. Bring all dead bodies here. In the evening (the) military will take bodies out.'"

"One morning when I went to the tent, there were 17 bodies. By evening there were 36. Death is so normal — the people develop an attitude that (death) is just one more thing that you do."

SURVIVAL was each day's great accomplishment, and sometimes it was accomplished through the refugees' "good neighbor" policy.

"In the next tent," he said, "there could be a neighbor who had enough strength to drag you (in a makeshift stretcher) to the clinic."

"And children developed a responsibility to each other. A five-year-old would feed a three-year-old."

"Many children did not have an adult responsible for them. They had been

caught up in the flow of refugees and got separated from their parents."

Fr. Torok said he hopes people will be able to return to their homes to begin their lives again. Delicate negotiations would allow the people to return and live under Communist influence and domination, he said.

Catholic Relief Services, he said, is seeking to set up an office in Phnom Penh, from which further relief for Cambodians can be directed.

"Today," said Fr. Torok, "there is no starvation in Cambodia. There is malnutrition and hunger, but no starvation."

"But the situation is in a delicate balance. The Cambodian had only 35 percent of the normal yield during the last harvest, and that will get them through to the end of April."

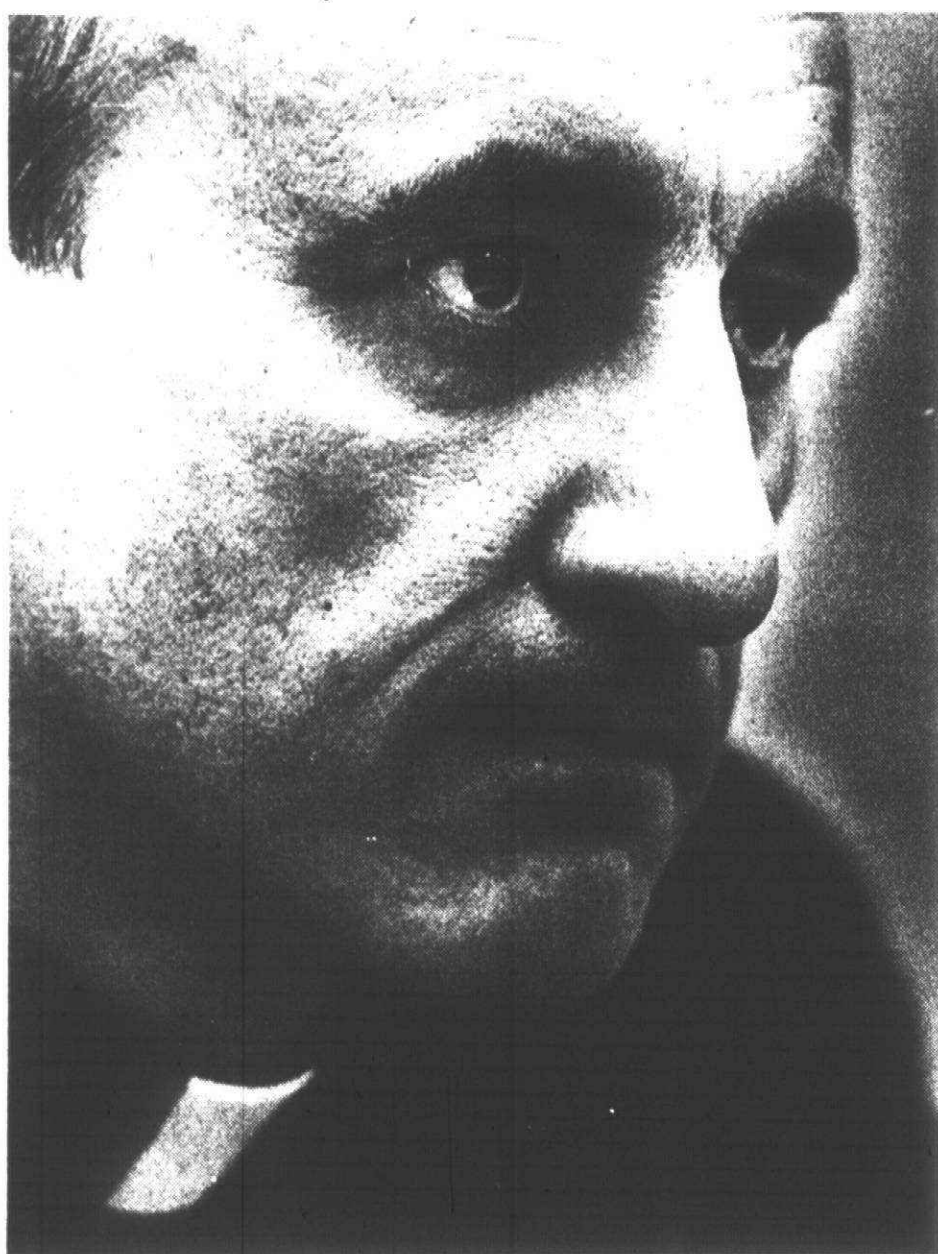
"The situation is very critical. We now have to provide them with their first decent harvest, which will take six months to mature. So we need a reserve to bridge them until the next harvest."

TO HAVE a normal harvest, the Cambodians will need 40,000 metric tons of rice seed, which has to be in the ground by April, he said. They also need 200,000 metric tons of food stuffs just to keep the people alive until the next harvest.

"We still have very critical times ahead of us," Fr. Torok said. "The best that we can hope for is for the people to be able to return home and that we can provide what the people need."

"We must assure the Heng Samrin government that we are there to do no more than help feed the people."

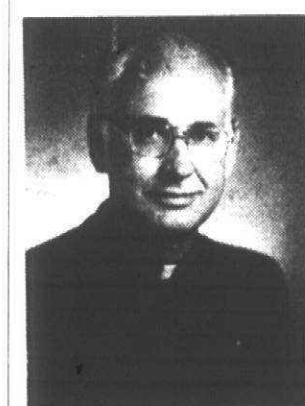
"The opportunity for dialogue between the participants will provide a grass roots experience and exchange of ideas that will challenge each community," he added.

Music for the service will be provided by a choir representing both faiths. The day will conclude by a reception and refreshments furnished by Catholic and Lutheran church representatives.



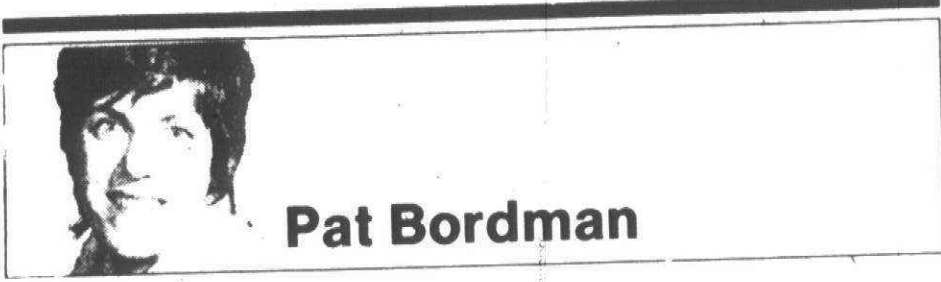

Eraser provides instant fun

Ever get stuck waiting in the doctor's office with two children in tow? Or, how about that long grocery store checkout line with youngsters along for company? What about that meeting with your attorney or accountant, but the kids have to stay in the outer office? Or, a visit to a friend or relative at the hospital, where those under 14 aren't allowed past the lobby?

These situations might rub you the wrong way, but they do occur. They call for ways to keep the children busy, happy and quiet, with virtually no toys. What to do? Don't despair. Use the available materials.

In almost every situation there is a magazine either out for the use of the patrons, or one that can be purchased close by. Simply add a pencil with an eraser and you're in business.

ON ALL MAGAZINE pages with a shiny surface, it is possible to erase any part of the surface with a soft pencil eraser. A white space is left after erasing. Designs can be imposed on the magazine page by selectively erasing parts of the page. Children

find it especially funny to erase the features of a face from a large picture. Or eyeglasses, mustaches, hairstyles can be created on faces that lack these elements.

Some eerie effects can be produced by filling in the erased portions with the pencil lead.

If you don't own the magazine, it would be prudent to ask the owner's permission before giving your child the eraser go-ahead. Then, tell the kids to give 'em the rub-off!

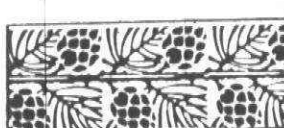

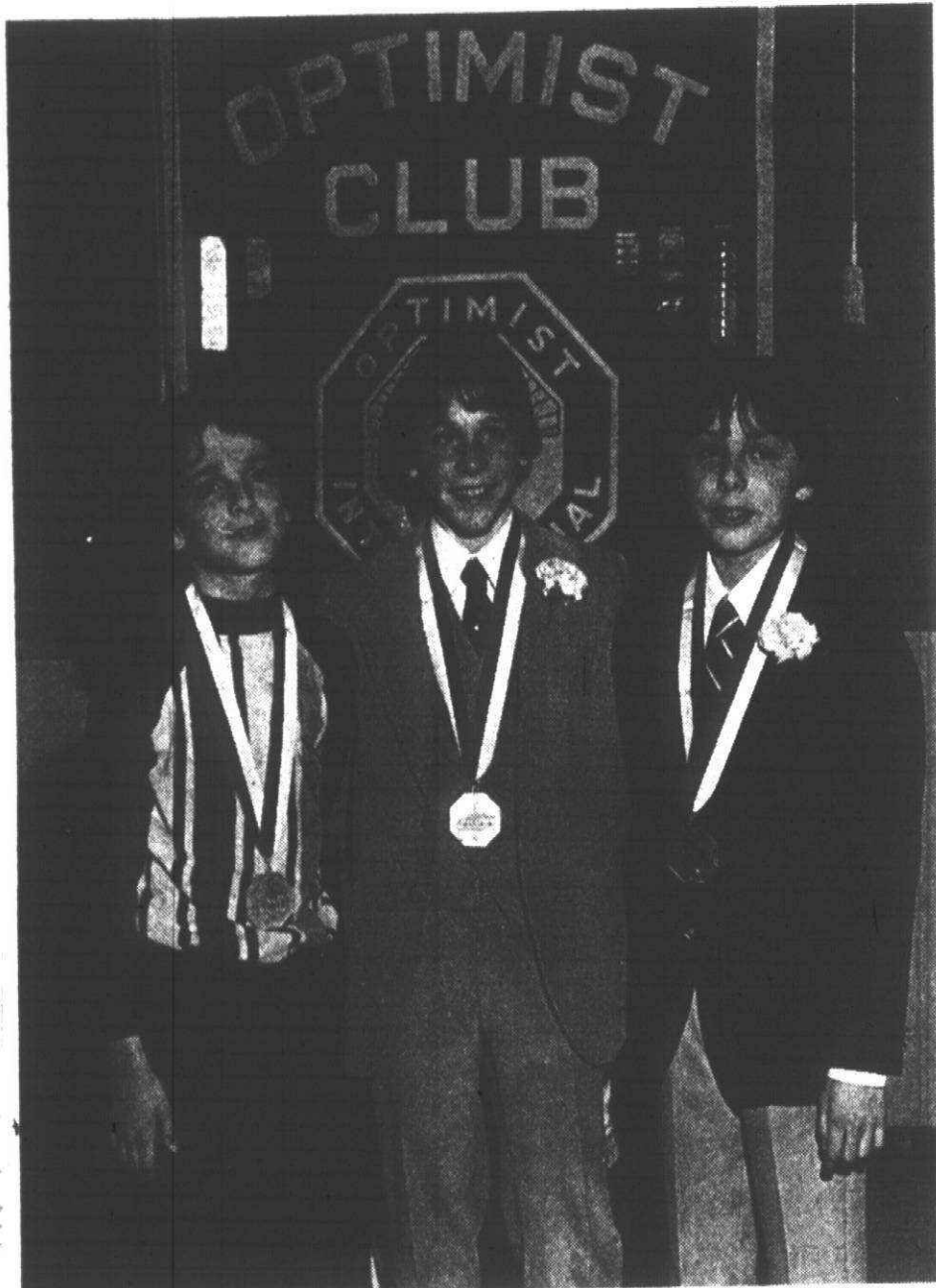

The Optimists awarded certificates to the girls who were not medal winners.

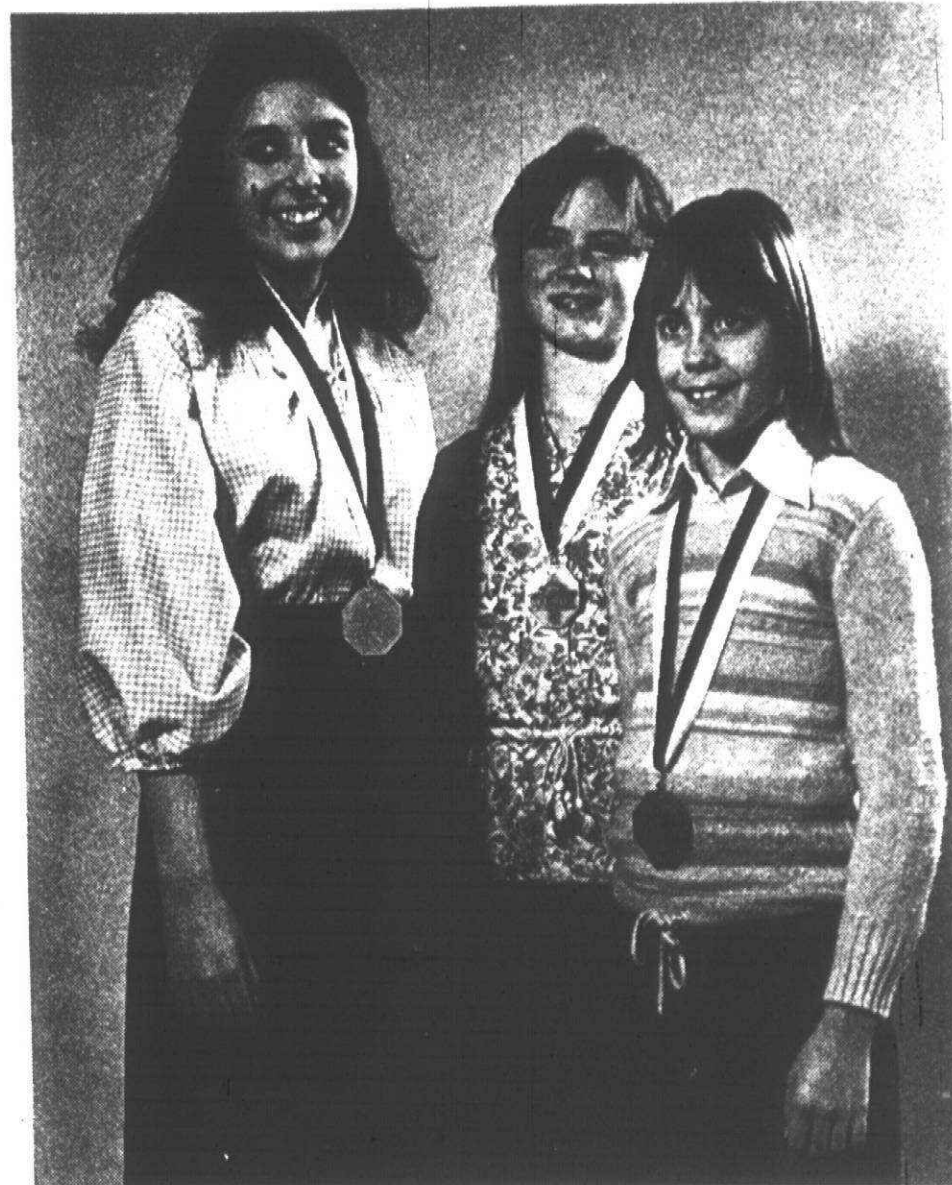

Dramatic rehearsals were held three days a week after school, and music rehearsals were during class chorus periods.

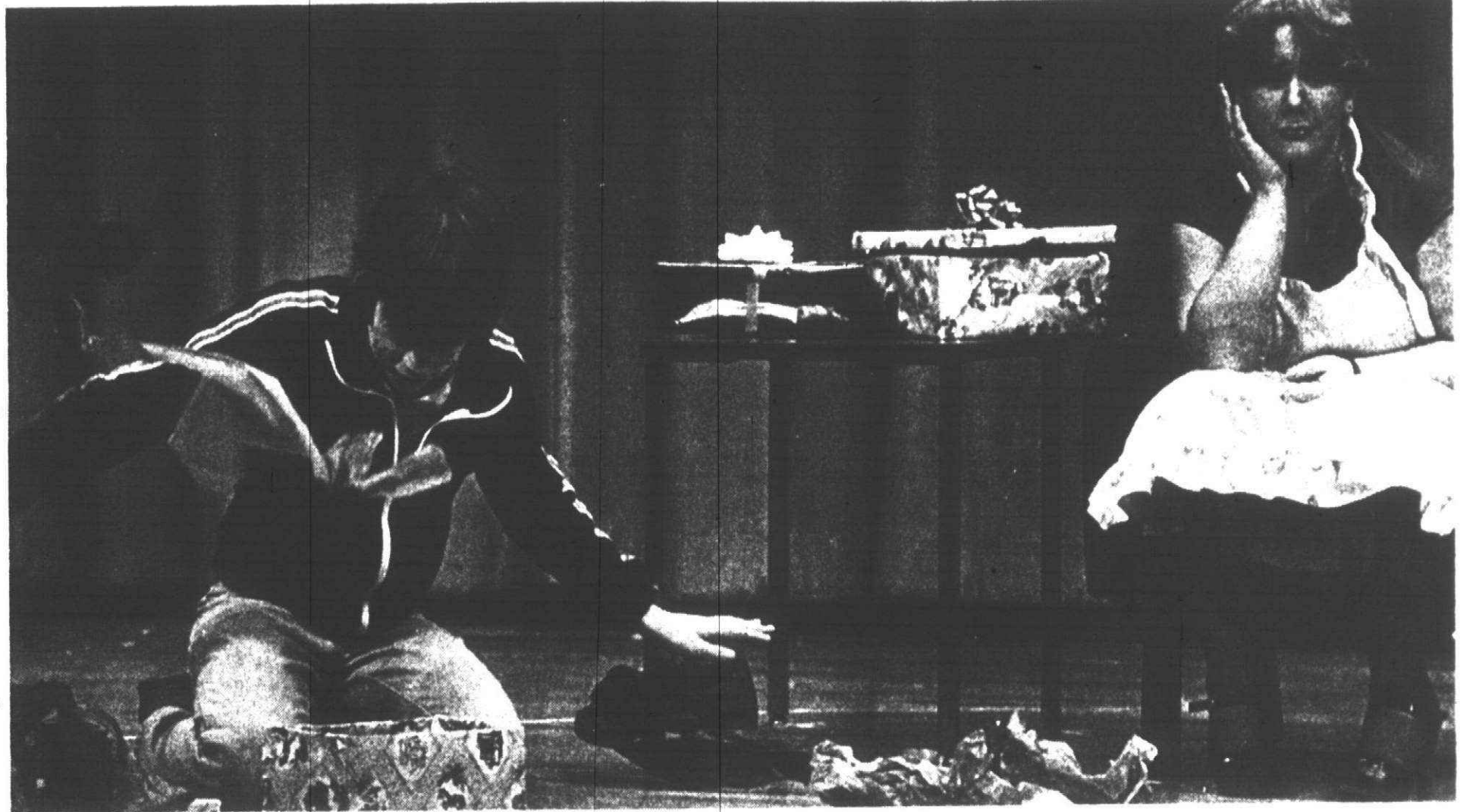

Aspiring comics face the ordeal each week

"My name is Joe Allison," the comic begins as he steps up to the microphone on the low stage of the Comedy Castle in West Bloomfield.

He looks around at the audience, gets his anxiety under control and starts throwing out jokes he has been continuously refining for almost a year.

Telling the audience of some 150 people that he works in a menial job cleaning toilets at a radio station by day, Allison quips, "Sort of commodium by day, comedian by night." He gets some chuckles.

Reaching in his duffle bag, he hauls out a set of Army fatigues. "My father said I should buy these; they're the latest things." He waits for a few seconds for that to sink in and says, "I paid a lot of money for them. But if I had waited, I might have been able to get them free — along with a free tour of Iran."

Now more noticeably relaxed, helped along by a receptive crowd, Allison moves into some newer material: "Imagine a comedy team of Cheech and Carter." He waits as the audience is anticipating a routine, and a heckler makes a remark.

"What's the matter," Allison snaps at the heckler, "You don't like Cheech? You don't like Carter? I see, you don't like me." That gets a bigger laugh than the impression he does of a Cheech and Carter comedy team.

This is the way it goes every Wednesday night. Wednesdays are Amateur and Regular Night at Comedy Castle in Friday's restaurant in the Pine Lake Mall on Orchard Lake Road. The Comedy Castle gives all comers, rank amateur or seasoned professional, 10 minutes on Wednesdays to try their hand at being a standup comic or to rehearse new material.

'I just like to hear a belly-splitting laugh. I guess in the back of my mind I just always wanted to be a comedian.'

Joe Allison has been enduring these 10-minute ordeals for months. "I've come here every Wednesday night for seven months," the personable Allison said after one of his routines. He thinks he's almost ready for a weekend spot. Already, he has been emcee on Wednesday.

Mark Ridley runs the Comedy Castle, a concession within Friday's. "The whole idea," Ridley said cheerfully, "is to promote comedy and allow comics an opportunity to perfect their craft while learning from established comedians."

Ridley first began toying with the idea in late 1978, thinking about a comedy workshop modeled on the idea of the Comedy Store in Los Angeles. He started one such workshop in another area restaurant and moved into Friday's in mid-1979.

"The people have taken to this idea like flies to honey," Ridley said. There are capacity crowds most nights, and generally around 20 comics who want to do their 10 minute act between 9 p.m. and midnight on Amateur Night.

"IT CAN BE A VERY sweaty 10 minutes," Ridley said, based on his own experience. He also remembers Joe Allison's first night on stage.

"At first, Joe turned beet red and only managed about two minutes up there," he smiled at the memory. "He's progressed since then into quite a good comedian." Ridley is readying Allison for a 20-minute warm-up spot on the weekends. That's when the nationally known comics come in and local talent gets a crack at putting some life in the audience.



Comedians who have made a beginning at the Comedy Castle are now making names for themselves in other parts of the country. "Sheila Kay, a female comic, is now working out of the Comedy Store in L.A.," Ridley said.

Agents come in to the Comedy Castle looking for up and coming talent. "At first," Ridley is now able to say, "no one took us seriously." He added proudly, "We have not had a bad night since we opened up here."

Grapes galore

California wines get respectable

When Don Vargo is "California dreaming," visions appear in shapely forms.

These forms may differ slightly from California fantasies other people have.

Vargo is into wines. Wine, wines and more wines.

And more than ever, California means wines.

"In 10 years, California will be the wine capital of the world," proclaims Vargo.

As the owner of Vargo's Restaurant in Livonia who claims one of the most renowned wine collections in southeastern Michigan, this is no idle proclamation.

Taking the prediction seriously, Vargo updated his wine list to 60 California varieties from 20. Thirteen of the wines were officially unveiled last week at a tasting in his restaurant's wine cellar.

TECHNOLOGY, CLIMATE and money are the three ingredients which will put California at the head of the world's wine list, Vargo said.

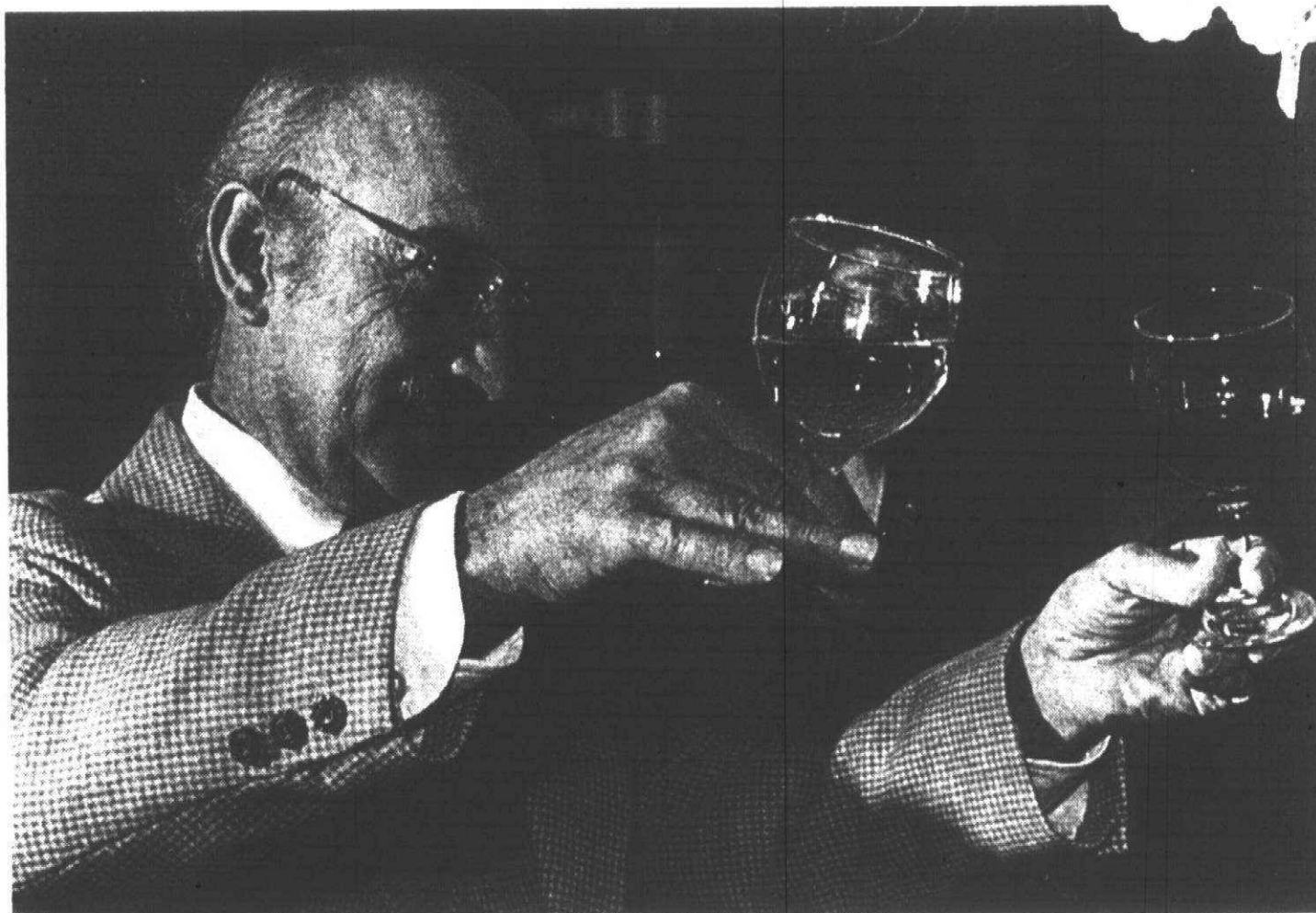
"There are people going to California who say they don't care how much it costs. They're going to grow the best Chardonnay," Vargo said.

Paul Mann, president of Vintage Wine Co., agreed that California wines are rising in quality.

"Before, they just planted grapes all over," Mann said. "Now they are taking the right grape and planting it in the right land, trying to find the right combination."

"Plus the technology of wine-making is changing. Stainless steel jackets allow control over cooling so the fermentation process may be controlled. And Californian wineries are the most technologically advanced in the world."

California wineries are also begin-

ning to specialize in one wine, Mann said.

"The best wineries in the world make only one wine. You can't make over 20 varieties and make them well."

DEVELOPMENT OF California wines has led to the production of a truly American variety — Zinfandel.

"Zinfandel is the best California has

to offer," Mann said. "It's not grown anywhere else. The taste of Zinfandel is real exciting."

Two Zinfandels — regular vintage Monterey Peninsula variety and late harvest Ridge — were offered at last week's tasting.

Monterey's offering was a hearty wine, of which Vargo even remarked, "That's a wine and a half!"

Some other varieties tasted were Ca-

barnet Sauvignon; Muscat Blanc; Petite Sirah; Charbona; Chenin Blanc; Johannisberg Riesling; Korbelt Brut and Domain Chandon Blanc De Noirs.

When John Babsone Lane Soule said "Go west young man," he probably wasn't thinking of California wines.

One thing for certain, after a taste testing, the pioneers would never have found the right direction.

Pass the Alka Seltzer.

Some tips . . .

Frank Ciaravino took the novice wine connoisseur under his wing.

A sales manager for Viviano Wine Importers, Inc., Ciaravino had his work cut out for him. The novice's eyes were already blurred and knees weak from the first five wines.

"I'll explain the proper way to taste a wine," Ciaravino said. The novice numbly nodded.

As any golfer knows, the first important thing is the grip. Grasp the wine glass with thumb and two forefingers at the base of the stem. The other two fingers should be under the stem.

This grip allows better control of the glass. Also, holding the wine by the goblet would alter the wine's temperature.

Now, swirl wine and sample the bouquet. (Meaning: Swish the wine around and smell.)

"If there is a good bouquet, we have the beginning of a good wine," Ciaravino said.

Repeat swirling and smelling. In a good wine, the bouquet will reappear.

Next begins a series of four tastings. First, a small quick sip.

Second, another small sip, but this time put your nose into the glass and smell while taking the sip.

Third, is a test for tannin. Slip your tongue into the wine while taking a mouthful. Tingling on the edge of the tongue means the wine has tannin. Tannin indicates the wine will have a long life.

Fourth, is an acidity test. Take a mouthful quickly, without slipping your tongue inside. A tingling from the back to front of your mouth shows acidity.

Rinse out glass, eat a slice of cheese, bread or apple to clear palate, and repeat process with next wine.

He's learned to keep working at making people laugh. His persistence has paid off, but he's not ready to commit himself to comedy as a full-time career.

"IT'S NOT A JOB, at least, not yet. It depends on how good you are and if you get any breaks," the 20-year-old Plymouth resident said. Right now he is a communications student at Henry Ford Community College and a student intern at radio station WWWW. His real name is Joe Bielaska.

He tried to explain how he got started coming to the Comedy Castle. "I guess what happened is that I went to California last summer and saw comics perform there. Then, when I came back home, I

found this place. It's just somehow in me to be in front of people."

The kind of interest he has in comedy must have started before then. "It really comes from being a fat child all during school, I didn't know anyone," Allison said.

He now wants to know people and have people know him. "Seriously," he said, sounding like a comedian setting up a punch line, "I just like to hear a belly-splitting laugh. I guess, in the back of my mind I just always wanted to be a comedian."

"THANKS TO the Comedy Castle, Allison and other young comics like him have a chance to try out a secret desire to make people laugh. "I'm really glad there is this unique situation close to home" is he way Allison puts it.

Like most beginning comedians, Allison has one problem yet to overcome. "I still haven't found my exact style," he said candidly.



Pine Knob won't be Oakland park

BIRD FANS who want to see the famed Kirtland's warbler during the 1980 nesting season will have to do it on a guided tour.

The northern lower peninsula sites will be closed and posted against public entry, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The only bird which nests exclusively in Michigan is an endangered species.

Free guided tours will depart from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources field office in Grayling and from the U.S. Forest Service district office in Mio.

Tours from Grayling will begin May 15 and end July 5. They will depart at 7 and 11 every morning.

Tours from Mio will begin May 15 and end July 19, two weeks later. They too will begin at 7 and 11 each morning except Wednesday.

Bring binoculars or spotting scopes, but don't bother with tape recorders. No special efforts will be made for photographers.

HURON-CLINTON Metroparks have two weekend programs coming up.

"Conservation Wise" will begin at 10 a.m. Sunday, March 23 in the nature center of Kensington Metropark near Milford. Naturalist Dave Moilanen will cover pollution, toxic wastes and alternative energy sources. Make a reservation by calling the nature center at 685-1561.

"Wood Carving" will be presented from 1-4 p.m. Sunday, March 23 at Oakwoods Metropark nature center near Flat Rock. Livonia Wood Carvers members will demonstrate relief, decoy, round and other carving styles.

Programs are free, but there is a vehicle entry charge at the parks gates.

Shows in Wayne, Pontiac

Big weekend for country music

Country music fanatics will be having a time of it this weekend.

Friday night, Hank Williams Jr. is performing at the Michigan Opry series in Wayne. And on Saturday, no less than 17 country acts will give a 3½-hour show in the Pontiac Silverdome.

HANK WILLIAMS JR. is a man who at one point was convinced he was dead. Turns out he was wrong. But his music is consistently right, judging from his recent hits on country record charts.

Williams, the son of a country legend who died when he was 3, has equaled the fame of his father by mixing country music with pop and rock. In his new autobiography, Williams says that in the early 70s he found himself on the wrong side of the generation gap.

"If you listened to country music, you were a redneck, and if you listened to rock and roll, you were a hippie freak," he writes.

"So what happened to the Allman Brothers in Macon, Ga. was of no concern to the pickers in Nashville, Tenn., a couple of hundred miles up the road. But it was important to me, because those Georgia boys were trying to tell me something."

He began mixing country, rhythm and blues, rock and whatever else he

found to produce an album called "Hank Williams Jr. and Friends," with Charlie Daniels and people from the Marshall Tucker Band and the Allman Brothers.

And before hitting the road for a concert tour in the summer of 1975, he took off for a hike through the Rocky Mountains in Montana. While along the Continental Divide, a snowfield collapsed under him; he fell over 500 feet and landed on his face.

It took him two years to recover. Eight operations later, his face has a few scars but his music is as healthy as ever. One of his publicity people down in a place called Cullman, Ala., says Williams' songs have become more upbeat. There's no more "crying in your beer songs," says J.R. Smith. "They're not as slow as they used to be."

Williams has been touring heavily lately, and squeezing in work on an album scheduled for release in two months.

"I feel good, I feel positive and I've gotten a healthy outlook on life," he said recently. "The butterfly has sprung out of its cocoon."

The Friday shows, at 7 and 10 p.m. are at the State Wayne Theater, Michigan Avenue at Wayne Road. Reserved seat tickets are \$10 and \$12.50, avail-

able at the box office or by calling 721-2100.

Appearing with him will be Merle Kilgore, writer of such songs as "Ring of Fire" and "Johnny Reb." Also on stage will be Marsha Dee and Johnny Lee Adkins, two local country performers who are Michigan Opry regulars.

AND UP IN Pontiac on Saturday, the show being billed as the World's Largest Indoor Country Variety Show includes George Jones and Tammy Wynette, who were a team for years, split a few years back and got back together a couple months ago.

Some of the other notables in the Silverdome show are:

● Bobby Bare, who is expected to sing his old hit "Detroit City" and his recent theme song to the movie "10."

● Minnie Pearl, member of the Country Music Hall of Fame and a regular from the TV show "Hee Haw."

● Ernest Tubb, an Opry member for 40 years who has sold millions of records.

● Don Gibson, composer of "I Can't Stop Loving You."

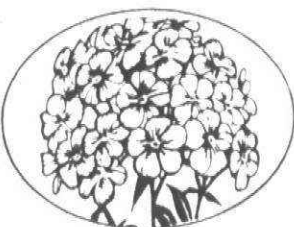

Radio dramas bring stage to the mind

Theater comes to life on radio as National Public Radio raises the curtain on the 1980 season of Earplay.

This year's schedule of 26 original American productions and 14 British radio dramas includes a wide variety of material, from the zaniness of the Firesign Theater's "Anythin' You Want to" to "Bloodjet: A Portrait of Sylvia Plath" to "Statements After An Arrest Under the Immorality Act," a play about apartheid by South Africa's leading playwright, Athol Fugard.

Earplay, now in its eighth season, is broadcast at 10:30 p.m. Thursdays on WDET-FM (101.9) in Detroit, and at 4 p.m. Sundays on WUOM-FM (91.7) in Ann Arbor.

"We're riding a wave of critical acclaim we couldn't have imagined eight years ago," says Earplay's director and founder Karl Schmidt. Earplay recently received the Prix Italia, the most prestigious international award for radio production.

Earplay tonight on WDET will have the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles performing "In Camera," the story of an old lady in a senior citizens' home who wants to make a movie of her life.

The award, the first ever for an American radio program in the 30-year history of the competition, was for Earplay's 1978 production of Arthur Kopit's "Wings." The drama went on to a stage production and rave reviews on Broadway and in London. Earplay has also received the Peabody award for excellence in broadcasting.

EARPLAY'S innovative style and reputation for high-quality productions have attracted a core of well-known actors from Broadway and Hollywood.

This season will include appearances by Meryl Streep, Vince Gardenia, Jean Marsh, Carole Shelly, Laurence Luckinbill, Brock Peters and Jack Gwilliam.

Of the 26 American productions, 10 are new works commissioned by Earplay and 16 were adapted from stage productions or other writings.

Among the season's offerings are plays by some of this country's top writers. For example, David Mamet, who wrote "The Water Engine" for the 1978 Earplay season, offers "Prairie du Chien" in 1980; Donald Barthelme, regularly featured in the New Yorker, has written three extraordinary dialogues entitled "Great Days," New York Playwright and actor James McLure, considered to be one of the country's hottest new talents, provides three plays in the new season, "Lone Star," "Pvt Wars," and "Laundry and Bourbon."

Founder Karl Schmidt says his de-

sire for Earplay was to reawaken interest in radio drama.

"Radio plays offer a new range of opportunities for playwrights. Radio doesn't limit writers to the number of 'scenes' or the extent to which costumes or backdrops might be needed to embellish a script," he says.

"Moreover, radio productions aren't limited by the number of actors — you can get two or more characters out of each actor. Most importantly, radio allows the writer to free up his imagination — as well as that of the listener."

Daniel Freudenberger, artistic director of New York's Phoenix Theater and director of many of this season's productions, says radio may be the most vivid of all theatrical formats.

"The magic of radio is that the ear, feeding the mind's eye can help us to imagine a play much better than we in the theater can ever produce it with scenery and costumes," he says.

Understanding fabrics — both new and old

There was a time when one could identify the fiber content of a fabric by feeling it. Not so anymore. Some man-made fibers have been developed to simulate the feel of natural fibers so that today one must rely upon government labels to determine content.

Fibers are classified according to natural and man-made. The following is a clarification and detection of various fibers on the market today.

WOOL — probably the most important natural fiber. You can almost recognize it by its price tag. Wool is resilient, a good insulator, and can be woven fine or coarse, loose or tight. It can be dyed from pale to deep colors. It cleans well, resists dirt, and can absorb up to 20 percent of its weight without feeling damp.

SILK — the most beautiful fiber. It is soft, luxurious yet strong. It takes and holds dyes well, but is sensitive to the sun's rays. The cost is high and the fiber is scarce.

LEATHER — not a fiber. It is an animal product that has long been used for household purposes both for utility and beauty. It is pliable, durable, and may be used in natural color or dyed. Very expensive.

COTTON — the most plentiful of the natural fibers, and the most inexpensive. It takes and holds colors well, washes and is extremely versatile.

LINEN — the most ancient of all fibers. Linen is strong and pliable. It washes, takes and holds colors, but beware of the wrinkles. If chemically treated, wear potential is reduced.

MINERAL — metallic fabric, used chiefly as accent in decorative fabrics. It glitters without tarnishing and is washable if used in washable fabrics.

There are literally hundreds of trade names for man-made fibers making it virtually impossible for the consumer to recognize them all. Always read the label to be sure what you are getting. There are 18 man-made fibers in use today.

ACETATE AND RAYON — oldest, foremost and most indispensable of the man-made fibers. Acetate is used in shower curtains, drapery, and upholstery fabrics. It is quick drying, drapes well, holds its shape well. Nonfading, but not washable.

RAYON — used in upholstery, curtain and drapery, rugs and in many blends for other purposes. It is soft, relatively inexpensive, has resistance to sun fading, and heat. Durability is excellent, wrinkle resistance and dimensional stability are fair. It is often washable.

NYLON — one of the first synthetic fibers to be widely accepted. It is used for floor coverings, drapery, upholstery and clothing. Nylon is tough, durable, washable, quick drying, resists abrasion, needs little ironing, holds shape and resists wrinkling and mildew. It is reasonable in price.

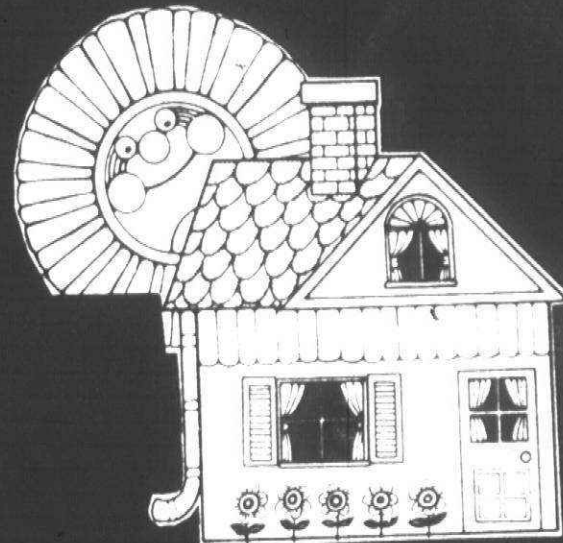
POLYIMIDE NYLON — a chemical fiber with a makeup similar to nylon but with more versatile properties. It is used for draperies and walls and is said to out-perform any existing synthetic in washability, wrinkle resistance, and ease of care. It doesn't shrink. It resembles silk in luster, weight, drapability, and color. It may be washed or dry cleaned and can be ironed on low heat. A trade name is Qiana.

ACRYLIC — used for rugs, carpets, curtains, upholstery. It has a luxurious and soft hand which is more like wool than any of the other man-made fibers. It is resilient, quick drying, long wearing, doesn't shrink, sag or stretch. Colors are exceptionally rich. Pilling depends on quality.

MODACRYLIC — used in furry type rugs, blends in carpets, and drapery fabrics. It is noted for built-in, permanent flame resistance. It resists breaking, cracking, or splintering in use. Color retention is good and ease of care is offered with good spot and stain resistance. It has excellent crease retention. Washing is recommended, it doesn't dry-clean as well.

POLYESTER — used in curtains, drapery, upholstery, rugs, carpets, clothing, and you name it. It is strong and has excellent drip-dry and quick dry qualities. It resists wrinkles, sunlight, and mildew. It is used as filling floss for comforter and pillows. It gives quick drying washability and is nonallergenic.

BE AGGRESSIVE!

At this stage in the game, white has rolled five-one. How would you play it?

Let's examine white's position. The first consideration is the fact that white has three checkers back in his opponent's court, whereas black has only one checker back in white's home court.

White needs to be aggressive in order to throw off black's running game. White has added assurance for a bold play in the fact that his inner board is stronger. White also holds an advanced anchor — black's 4 point.

The proper play is for white to move one checker from black's 12 point down to white's 7 point. This play is known as slotting — willingly placing a blot on a key point in order to make that point later if it is not hit by the opponent on the next roll.

Why is the 7 point (also known as the bar point) so important? Since it is six "pips" away from black's one man back, it is black's most likely point of escape. If black doesn't hit

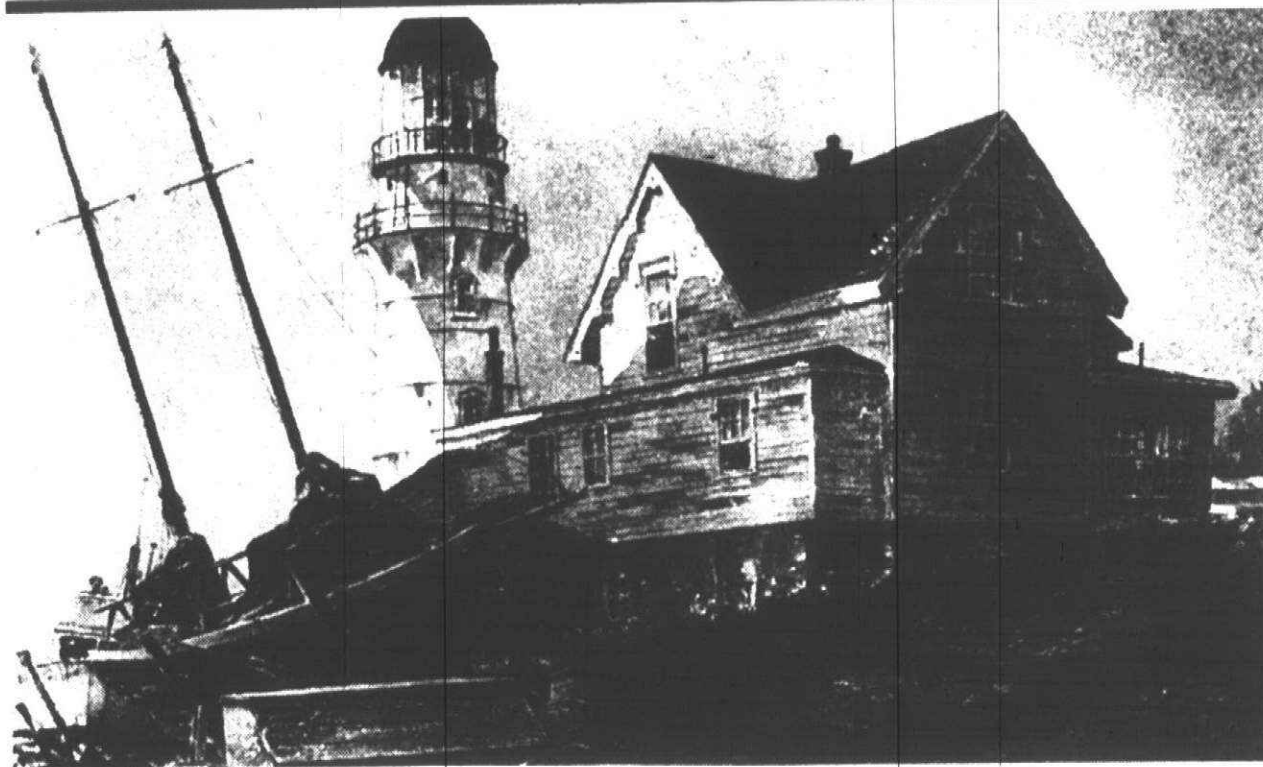
the 7 point and escape on the next roll, white has 23 out of 36 rolls to cover his blot (lone checker) and seal black's blot behind a 4-point prime.

But what if black hits on the next roll? Relax, this game is not over.

White now has an extra checker to be used with the one already on black's 2 point to secure another point in black's home board for a strong back game. Black's only clean hit and escape roll would be six-five, moving the back runner through white's 7 point onto the 12 point. Any other roll hitting white's blot would leave black's checker exposed to several possible return shots.

The moral of the story: Don't be afraid to play boldly when conditions warrant it — including leaving useful blots exposed.

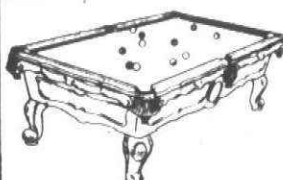

Color adds polish

Gentlemen of distinction

Men's fashion for warm weather reflect a silkier look on the business front and bright leisurewear for the off-duty hours.

Here's the way the forecast shapes up for the new season.

IN SUITS, silk, linen and summer tweeds lead the fashion parade. Sharing the spotlight with the new textured fabrics are cool looking flat weaves, many with randomly spaced flecks for surface interest.

The silk look is apparent in everything from pure silks in the upper price ranges through silk in a variety of blends, to some silk effects woven of all polyester yarns.

Linen looks in bright colors are next in importance, particularly in hot-weather suits and, iridescents will have style impact on the man of the '80s as he begins to wear either a shimmery two-tone suit or a multi-woven suit with a slight nap that tones down the glint.

Though air conditioning is supposed to be mandated at higher temperatures for energy conservation, fashion forecasters believe that the weight of the fabrics will be less important than their look. Thus, look for summer donegals and herringbones along with the many plain fabrics as well as self-patterns, stripes and some plaids.

Suit lapels are slimmer but there is interest in a shouldered model with a very low gorge, narrow lapels, a very low button stand and double-besom pockets. The Western style is not overlooked this season, either as nation-wide interest grows in suits with such touches as pointed yokes and curved pockets.

IN SPORTCOATS, the big news is pure silk or silk looks that have never been near a worm. Texture is the chief fashion appeal, but some soft checks and muted plaids score, too.

Solid colored blazers are everyone's favorite with navy blue leading a parade of Kelly greens and about 20 other hues. Body styling follows suit jackets plus a few double-breasted styles for men seeking something different.

IN SHIRTS, the major news is short-sleeves. Up to now, short sleeves in business shirts were relegated to the comfort factor rather than style. This season, short sleeves will be found in designer as well as traditional lines. Button-down oxfords are making a big comeback and shirts to keep cool feature sheer voiles, batistes and some featherweight crepes.

THE SPORT SHIRT story for spring is told in three distinct ways. The active sportswear shirt; the fantasy shirt aimed at the disco crowd; and the traditionalist's shirt with button-down collar and India Madras.

Not forgotten are sports shirts with a "pajama collar," expected to be popular with younger trendsetters and Western sport shirts which are more popular than ever before. Vivid hues are counterbalanced with natural and earth tones for leisure hours.

MEN'S SHOES reflect a sharper difference than ever between dress and casual footwear. Dress shoes in many cases lean towards laceless slip-ons or oxford ties in lightly constructed models. Most of the casual styles are bottomed with rubber or or crepe soles.

Active sportswear shoes are extremely colorful often with contrasting trims.

IN JEANS and activewear, fit will be the most important consideration. Jeans will be close-fitting or in the new modified baggie silhouette. Color is the key to the new jeans. Bright chrome yellows, scarlet reds, intense greens and tropical oranges will mingle with the indigo blues, wheat shades and off-whites.

Actionwear clothes have moved into bright, stimulating colors. Brilliant primary and secondary colors mark the new jogging outfits along with clothes for racquetball and swimming.

Sunday golfers will reflect the vivid color trend established by the pros.

Shoes blossom out in a variety of colors, styles

A variety of colors in deep shades are blooming in shoe departments across the land. That mix of color with a variety of silhouettes and fabrics will make the spring fashion scene this year, reports Joe Palermo, general merchandising manager for Hudson's women's shoes.

Red, blue and navy combinations as well as yellow and green brights make "color statements" this spring, according to Palermo. He adds that col-

ors this year includes black and white in forms like the Spectators, which are making news again this year. "We'll be featuring more than one color in a shoe to let a customer know what we think is important," Palermo said.

"Good fashion is an evolution as opposed to a revolution," said Palermo. As the head of a merchandising team, Palermo and his staff began projecting styles eight months to a year before they appeared in local

stores. The process began by discussing trends with fashion buyers from the "ready to wear" department so that shoes will complement fashions.

Besides talking with local salesmen, Palermo's team travels to national and regional shoe shows throughout the year. Although it's "impossible" to predict all big sellers, Palermo says that trends begin to emerge after awhile.

This spring those trends point to all

fabric shoes, woven leathers and stretch materials. Kidskin and patent leathers will be hot items.

Besides color, variety in shoe styles is becoming evident this spring. Whatever the style, heels are likely to be lower, corresponding to higher skirt and dress lengths, according to Palermo.

The traditional pump styles will be worn as dress shoes with closed heel and toe features.

Open options will take new direc-

tions for spring in sandal fashions, which will still be important. Palermo advises watching for vamps which are more closed in front, straps in quarter, three-quarter and sling back styles, and special details in stitching and cutouts.

For women who work, Palermo thinks tailored trends will continue into the spring with stacked heels.

Lifestyle shoes are what Palermo calls "good, basic fashion. We subscribe to the theory that the traditional customer will try to update herself

as well as the fashion customer."

Flat shoes such as oxfords and ballet shoes have developed into a big part of fashion, reports Palermo.

Other fashion customers will look for "preppy" styles, like slip-ons and "activist" footwear like tennis, jogging and boat shoes.

Shoppers will find some price increases this spring, but the "industry from a wholesale standpoint has stabilized itself. It has leveled off," said Palermo. "Increases won't be as big at the retail end as occurred last fall."

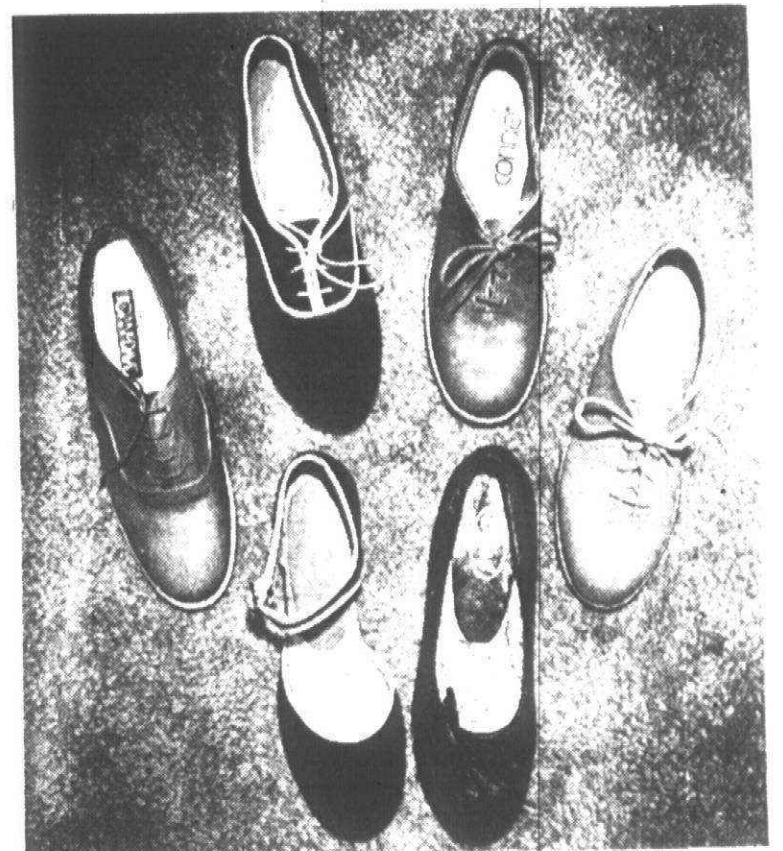



Spring hairstyles ease daily care routines

"Wash and go" hairstyles represent spring fashion trends, according to members of AMERICOFF, a midwestern professional organization of hairdressers which is centered in the metropolitan area.

"We'll be taking the softness of the '50s with the geometrics of the '60s to create styles for the '80s," said Peter Scaglione, AMERICOFF stylist director from the Phase One salon in Birmingham. "Women will have the freedom to come and go without having to come into the salon as often."

Hairdressers, like shoe buyers, work with clothes designers in creating styles to give an "eye of balance

all the way through," according to Scaglione.

Shape, texture and color will all be important in hairstyles for the spring, regardless of age. And it all starts with a good haircut, according to Marty Metzgian, who works with his parents in a family-run salon called Sadie's in Wayne.

New hairstyles are shaped asymmetrically and layered for towel drying to "get away from all that blow drying that fries hair," said Metzgian.

Mother Sadie, who is a color specialist for the salon, predicts that hairdressers will "do more consulting with customers in the future to teach them

how to take care of their hair."

Good hair care means shampooing and conditioning with something like an organic henna treatment. By all means, avoid chemical duplicates of natural hennas, caution the hairdressers.

"A conditioner adds moisture and that's really needed at this time of year," said Metzgian.

Women also must learn that a creme rinse isn't a conditioner, they say. Rinses coat the hair, eventually making it brittle. Conditioners, however, "reach inside, penetrating the hair to make it soft and supple," he added.

Good hair care is also important for youngsters, says Luz Anne Holtz, a Westland resident who works at Gerald's salon in Dearborn.

"A good haircut is shaped so it can be just towed dry and combed into place by any age woman," she said. "But it's important to use only small amounts of shampoo to cleanse the hair, rinsing it well."

"Shampoo and hair rinses can build up. Sometimes what people think is dandruff is just a build up that isn't good for the hair," Ms. Holtz added.

For mature women, a "smart and fashionable look is possible through

use of hair coloring and cutting techniques," according to Doug Weaver, vice president of AMERICOFF. Hair cuts should be tailored to fit face structure, not numerical age, he stresses.

Coloring will be softer and more natural this spring. Felicia Shaw, the first woman president of AMERICOFF, said that popular hair colors will range from strawberry blonde to auburn.

Mrs. Shaw said that she uses a foil technique of layering highlights with a zig-zag pattern from layer to layer at Nino's salon in Troy's Somerset Mall.

"I never highlight underneath top

layers. I try to keep it as natural as possible. If hair is worn up alot, then I highlight it (at the nape of the neck) just as the sun would do," she explained.

Permanent waving will offer less structure and less defined waves, adds Weaver.

Choosing good salons ought to be fairly easy in the Detroit area, according to the hairdressers.

"We have the best talent right here, and education is what AMERICOFF's all about," said Scaglione. "Vidal Sassoon used to say that Detroit is a hairdresser's town."

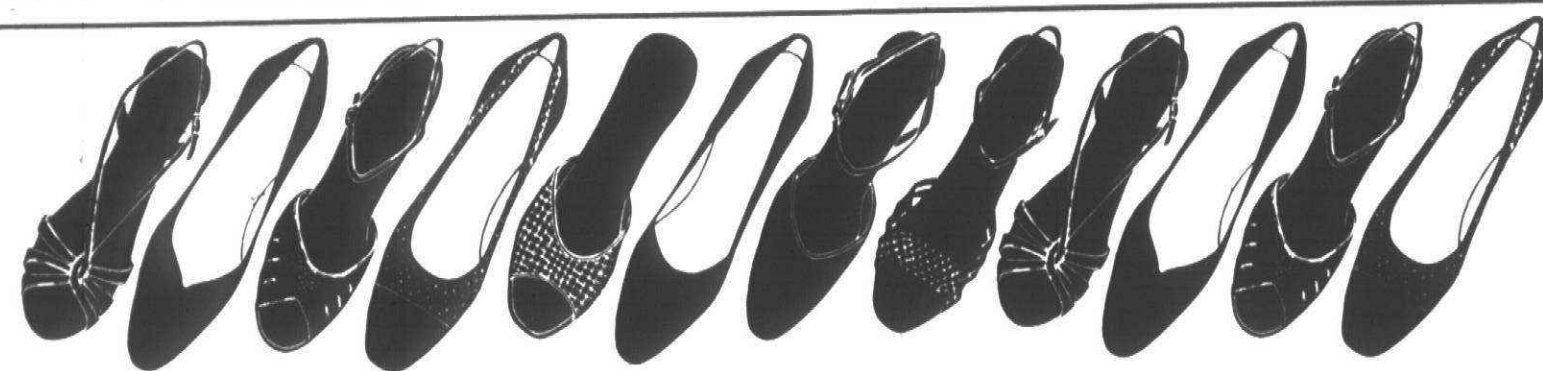

Good skin care completes new fashion trends

A fashion look is incomplete without good skin care and make up that fits current clothes and hair styles. That's the assessment of Sharon Weaver, a trained estheticienne who specializes in skin care while husband, Doug, a hairdresser who is vice president of AM-ERICOFF, creates hair styles in their salon.

Skin care varies according to skin type, says Mrs. Weaver. A visit to her salon begins with a skin cleansing and a skin analysis on the first trip, during which skin problems are diagnosed. Persons with acne are referred to their dermatologist for help.

Mrs. Weaver believes most skin problems "start from the outside" and are caused by artificial heating and air conditioning that remove moisture from the skin.

Usually treatments begin with a 30-minute facial massage of the bib, neck and facial areas.

"THE PURPOSE of the massage is relaxation," explained Mrs. Weaver. "If the body is relaxed, everything in the body is better. The massage also gives stimulation and color tone while it removes dead skin cells."

Because the massage uses a special oil-based creme, persons with oily skin skip this part of the regime.

Other equipment used includes a vaporizer which opens and cleanses pores.

A good skin-care program, according to Mrs. Weaver, uses products

from the same line, except for make-up. There are several good product lines on the market now, and Mrs. Weaver advises a visit to your local salon for recommendations on cleansers, toners, moisturizers and night creme.

"Be sure to go someplace where they know what they're talking about," she said.

A qualified person is essential, agrees Joyce O'Sada, who specializes in skin care and makeup at her Dearborn salon, Hair Designs Unlimited.

"Teens usually don't have anyone to help them with their skin care. All they know is to go to the dime store and pick up some product," she said. "If they learn how to take care of it in the beginning, they won't have as many problems later on."

"Teens should be sure to keep their skin clean, and they do need an inner moisturizer," Mrs. O'Sada added. She has taken a special interest in skin care for young women as her daughter, Kim, has grown into her teen years.

Part of a good program includes cleansing twice a day unless your face has dry skin. Mrs. Weaver also recommends the use of a "mask" once or twice a week. Types vary: A clay mask is used for oily skin and a creme mask for dry skin. A "pickup" mask does just that — improves skin tone and color to look like you've just had five to six hours of sleep.

Facials should be done once a month, advises Mrs. Weaver. Types of facials also differ according to skin condition. Part of the facial includes massaging hands and feet with creme, placing booties on feet and warming mittens on hands.

MAKEUP COLORS this spring will reflect the vibrant hues being found in this season's shoes. Gone are the browns that have been so evident in past years.

"Women get bored with the same colors," commented Mrs. O'Sada. "Colors this spring will be bright pinks, purple and blue."

Lips will have a shiny, wet look in pink and orange, according to Felicia Shaw, president of AMERICOFF, a hairdresser's association. Violets and blues will be deep, but with a toner to soften the look for shadows, she reports. Eyeliners should be used inside the upper and lower lids in deep blue or brown.

"The idea is to make the white part of the eye whiter," she said. "The heavy look for lashes is out."

Overall, makeup will have a more natural look with less definition of color areas, according to Mrs. O'Sada.

"Teenagers want to use makeup, but they have to be careful not to use too much," she continued.

"Dramatic hair styles require dramatic makeup with deep color," Mrs. O'Sada said.

She added that hair and makeup usually follow fashion designs, and that the three must be compatible.



Teenagers should avoid dimestore products and seek skin care advice from a professional, urges Joyce O'Sada, a makeup specialist from Hair Designs Unlimited in Dearborn. She applied all the makeup tools of an adult on her daughter Kim, 15, but in small amounts that still leave her with a natural look.

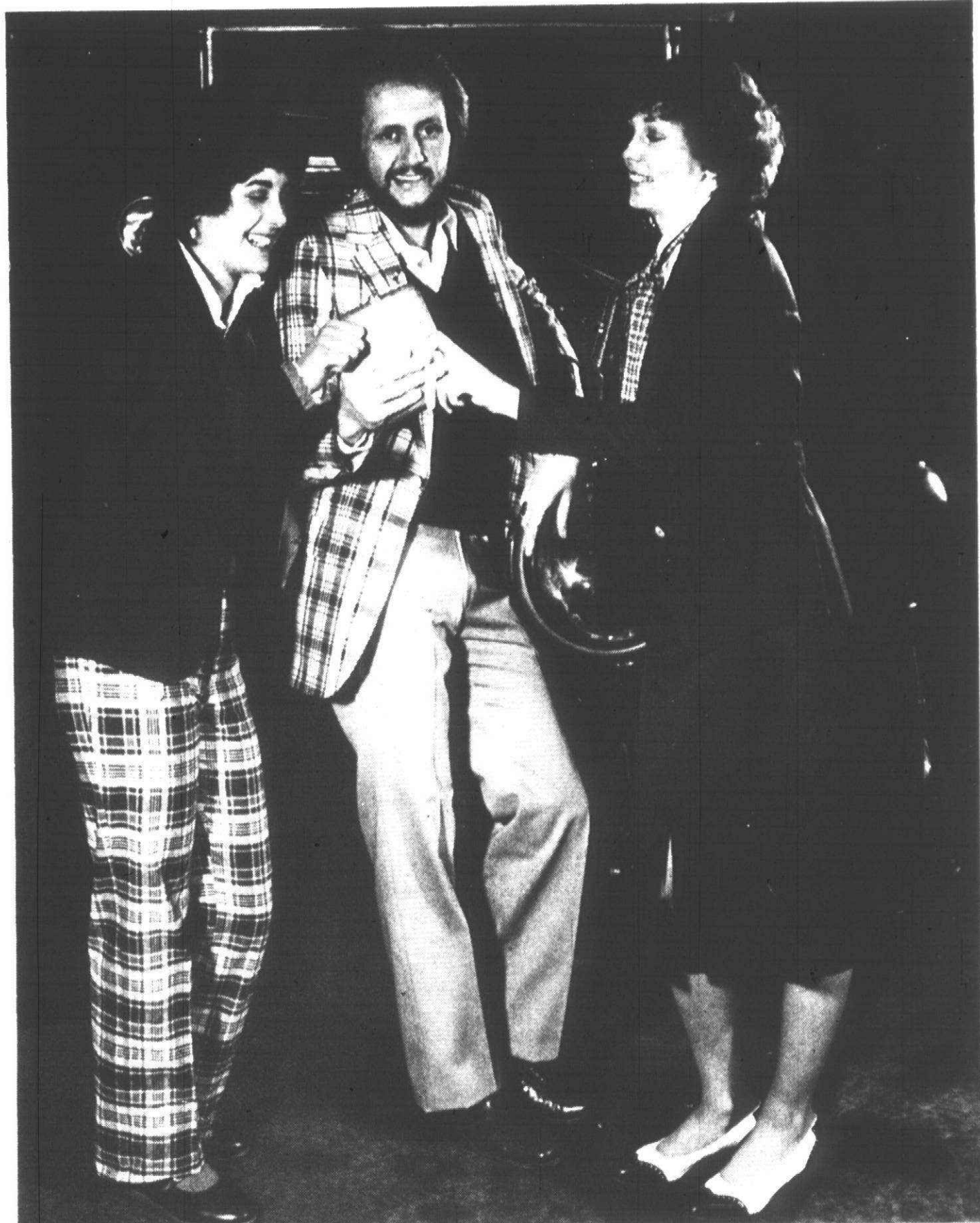

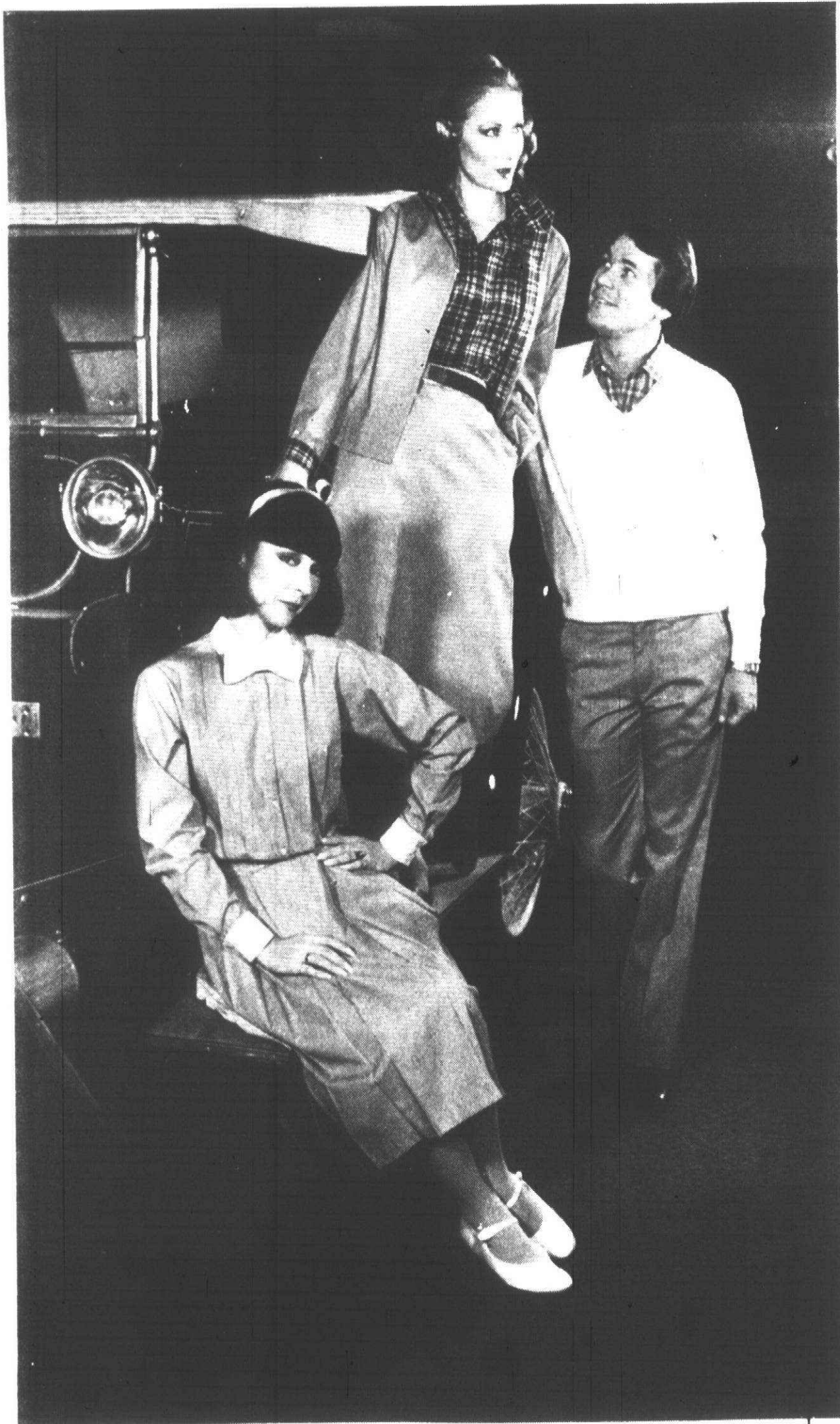

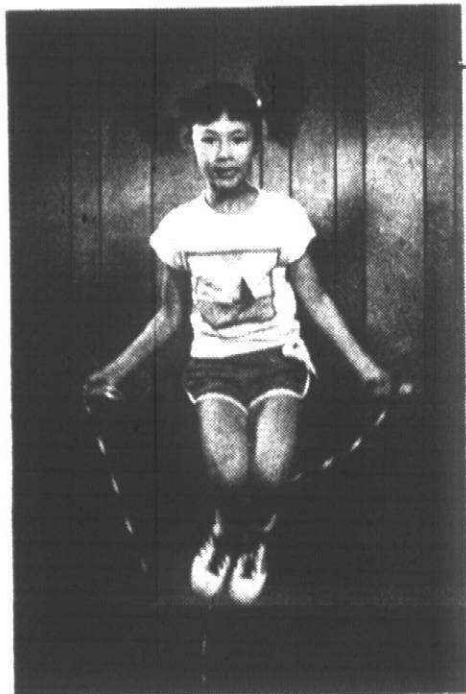

Shaping up— priority one

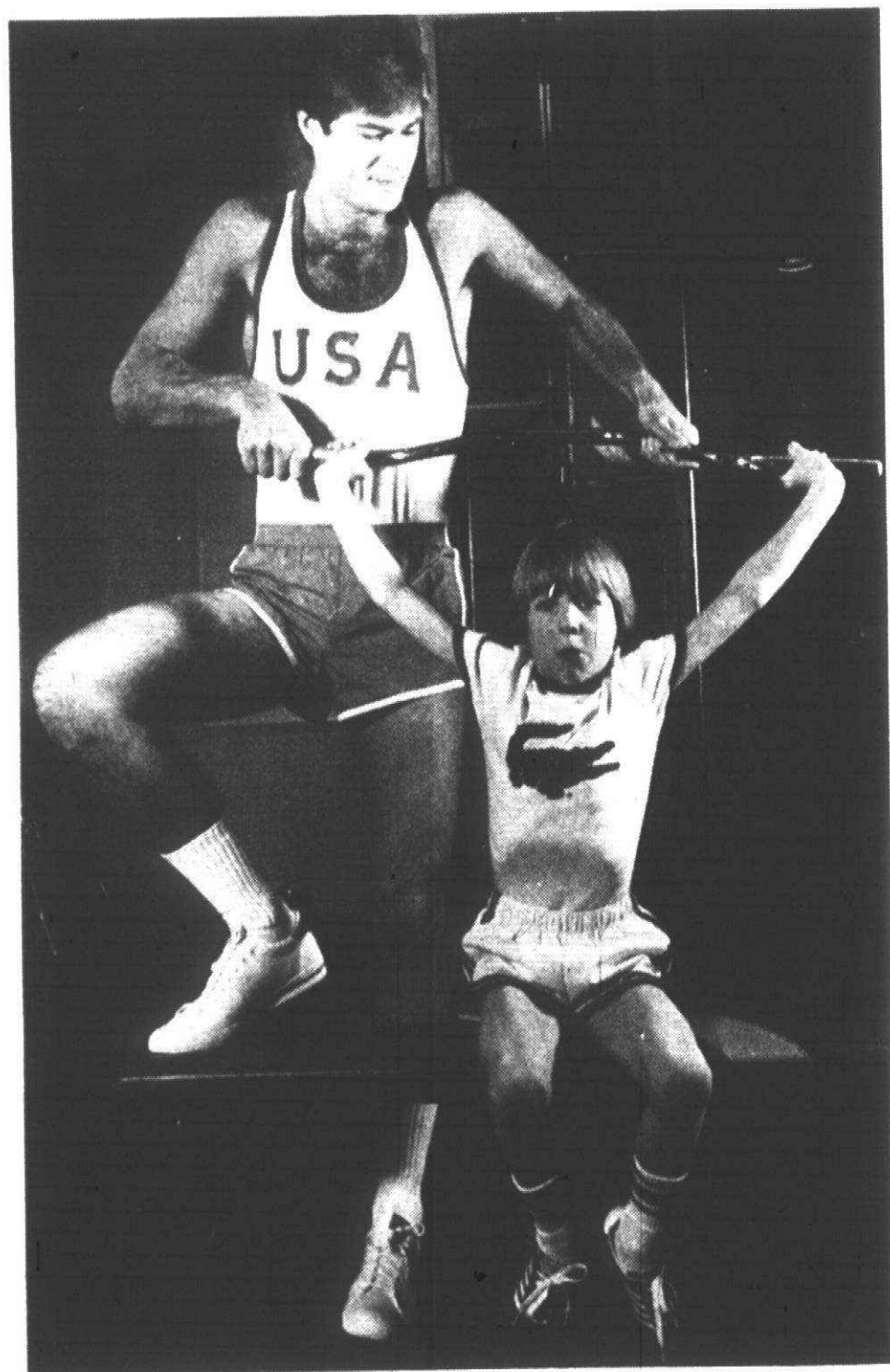

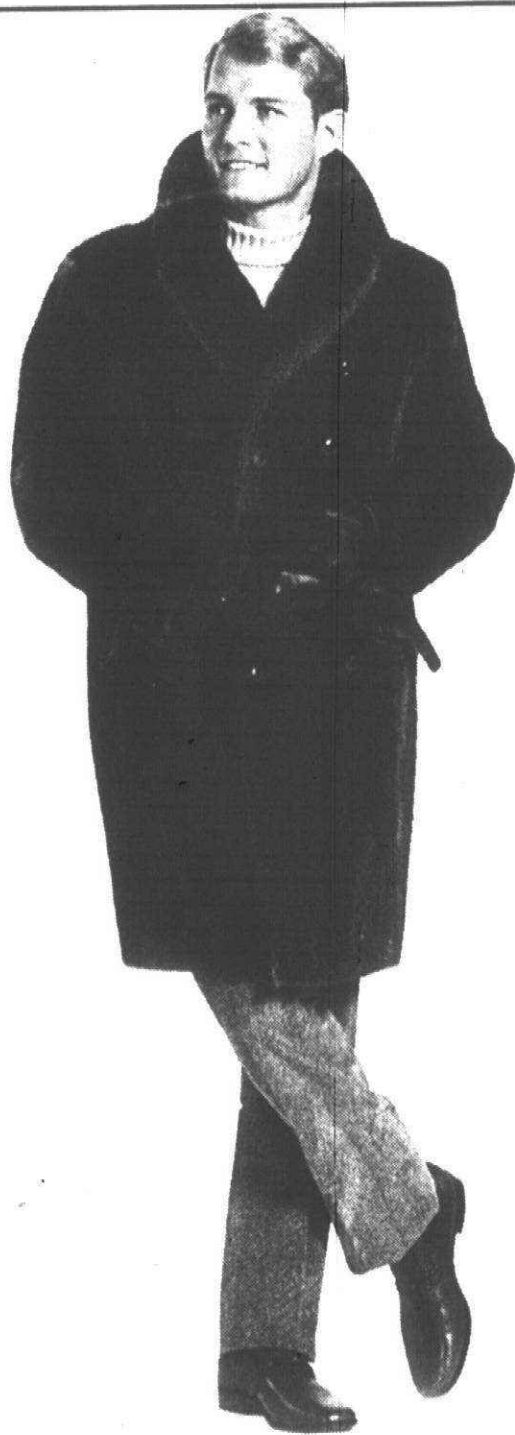

Fashion look for the '80s mirrors the buyer

Is dressing a frantic experience for you?
Do you have more than 10 mistakes in your closet?
Are you manipulated by relatives and sales clerks?
Have you ever apologized for the way you look?
Do you get frequent headaches when you shop?
Do waiters ignore you?
The quiz goes on, but the message is clear without adding up the score: The woman who is having trouble with her wardrobe is also having trouble in her life.

"Notice that I am not saying you are having trouble achieving 'The Look' because there is no look for the 80s," she says. "Fashion follows our politics and our lifestyles and the 80s will be no different."

"Reflect on hems that were up during World War II, then hems that were down in the post-war era."

From this point she rattles off the nation's mood and the fashions effected through the Feminine Mystique, togetherness, the youth culture, the non-conformist and the me generation.

"We went back to school and found our new directions in the 70s and now

we are on those individual courses, pursuing our individual goals," she said.

"So the look is your look. It is practical, conservative, economical. It is geared for you to be you. Geared to make you comfortable. Geared to make you look your best."

THROUGHOUT her talk, Ms. Solomon stresses quality over quantity in basic dressing. She suggests heavy investment in a basic all-weather coat; one jacket, preferably a blazer in a neutral (she suggests beige or cream); two solid skirts (one basic, one wrap); and three basic dresses.

Add one shawl, six blouses, two print skirts and one cocktail dress, all of moderate price.

Mix and match with inexpensive hats, scarfs, jewelry, belts, and bags in the color or the fad of the season, all of which can switch the basics to another look to fit the mood or the occasion.

Having an unusually round face, short legs, broad hips or any other figure problem is not a cop-out Ms. Solomon will accept.

"No home should be without a full-length mirror," she says, "and it should be used. Stand before it and keep standing there. Try on every-

thing you own and keep mixing and matching and switching until you get a reflection that you like.

"Then study what it is that you see that you like and go from there."

WE PASS ALONG some more of her suggestions:

- No matter what you pay for a piece of clothing, if it doesn't fit right, it is not going to look right.

- Color and weight of fabric should determine your hem length. General rule is the darker and heavier the fabric, the shorter the hem.

- All expensive clothes purchased for long-term wear should be in solid colors.
