## Back in June?

# Bond proposals fail

The school board would have to be hard of hearing to miss the message given by voters at the polls Thursday.

Although all three ballot propositions were defeated, the proposal to fund new classrooms went down by an overwhelming 6-1 margin.

Proposition I was defeated by a narrow difference of 555 votes and the third proposal asking for an earmarked half-mill lost by only 706 votes.

The vote on Proposal II, which would have financed a 40-classroom addition at the high school site and renovated Central Middle for use as a high school, received 5,953 "no" votes and only 1,129 "yes" votes.

Although the voter turnout was low at about 16.7 percent of the district's total 44,170 registered voters, the turnout still was 25 percent higher than the number voting in the last school election in June 1979 election.

WHILE THE school board and administration hasn't had a chance since Thursday's election to decide what the next step will be, it appears some kind of ballot proposal will be prepared for the June election when residents will

vote on two trustee positions.

John M. Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, said he probably will recommend a bond proposal similar to Proposition I — likely with some requests trimmed to lower the amount to be borrowed.

"I think there is a very significant indication in the Proposition II vote that the tenor of the community is against us becoming involved with new buildings. I think the community wants us to pursue other alternatives such as increasing the use of Extended School Year, renting buildings from other school districts, or shifting the grades," said Dr. Hoben.

Given present overcrowding at the high school site one of the alternatives first chosen by the school board is likely to be grade re-alignment — moving ninth grade back to the middle school and sixth grade back to the elementary level.

Proposition II was packaged for those residents who believed the six through eighth grade alignment was essential to maintain the quality of the middle school programs. The fact the proposal was defeated in every single precinct suggests the grade six through

eighth proponents were a minority.

West Middle School staff was among those leading the fight to retain the six through eighth grade structure; yet, in the West voting precinct Proposition II went down 642-123 — the same as the districtwide margin of defeat. At Central Middle, Proposition II by a 7-1 margin and Central would have benefited with an added \$2 million in renovations.

A look at the returns show that strong "no" votes and large turnouts came from those precincts with older neighborhoods less likely to have children in school. Areas with school-age children, and areas in Canton experiencing growth, had almost normal voter turnouts.

The turnout, for instance, at Farrand for LakePointe residents in Plymouth Township was 32 percent higher than in June 1979. Other Plymouth/Plymouth Township precincts experienced turnouts from 25-40 percent higher than last June.

The Canton precincts, however, experienced voter turnouts of only nine to 20 percent higher than June 1979.

## Firefighters' union seeks 3rd station for township

The Canton Firefighters Union is eyeing DPW facilities on Geddes Road as part of its lobbying effort for a third fire station in the southern part of the township.

The DPW is expected to move from its current location adjacent to the police station next summer when a new building on Sheldon south of Michigan is completed.

Members of the firefighters union have asked the township board to consider renovating the building for fire department purposes after the DPW leaves.

David Hamilton, president of the union, last week presented the board with a resolution unanimously approved by union members at a March 12 meeting.

Fire Chief Mel Paulun said he supports the union's campaign for a third station in order to improve response time to southern Canton.

The department's present stations are located at Canton Center and Cherry Hill and at Warren and Haggerty.

BUT SUPERVISOR Noel Culbert doubts that the township board will approve the proposal.

He estimates the cost of converting the building at \$50,000 to \$100,000. Paulun said an additional nine to 12 firefighters would have to be hired to staff the new station. The new hires would increase the department's operating budget by \$160,000 to \$220,000.

"We're got to figure out what we're going to do with that building," Culbert said. "But I don't think there's any way we could spend that amount of money."

The township board has adopted a no-frills spending policy which will remain in effect until the state of the economy improves.

Culbert said Police Chief Jerry Cox is formulating his own proposal for use of the DPW building. Cox proposes using the facility for a dog pound and storage area for vehicles disabled in traffic accidents.

Culbert said Cox's proposal will be cheaper undoubtedly than the fire-

fighters'. Although firefighters have had no problems reaching southern Canton, Paulun said a third station could improve response time to that area. He would not hazard a guess on the length of time it takes firefighters to reach the southern end of the township.

"I'm looking at it from the point of view that if money is there, I'd like it," Paulun said of a third station. "But if it isn't there, we certainly can handle it."

HAMILTON SAID his union endorses funding the building's conversion with federal revenue-sharing monies. Approximately \$287,000 in federal funds have not been allocated for any purpose by the township board.

"The only thing we were trying to relate was, 'Look, there's an opportunity coming up,'" Hamilton said.

"I think you'll find more and more unions proposing things like this," Paulun said. "They just want to let the board know that they support it."

## Wrong address on census forms worries officials

Murphy's Law took effect Friday in Canton with the arrival of the 1980 census questionnaires.

As township residents soon discovered, a majority of the forms arriving at their Canton homes had Plymouth printed on the address label instead of Canton.

It is the kind of mistake guaranteed to cause extreme anguish to Canton officials, who are shooting for an accurate count of the township's growing population.

The larger a community's population, the more federal revenue sharing

money and other benefits it is eligible to receive.

Supervisor Noel Culbert said he had spoken to census bureau officials when the mistake was discovered. "They said they would keep an eye out for the Canton forms and would possibly be able to catch them," he said.

Just in case, however, Canton residents who have received questionnaires listing the wrong community are asked to cross out Plymouth and write Canton above the line on the address label. The forms are supposed to be mailed April 1.

## Short Takes

### Pinching pennies

Homeowners are not the only ones counting pennies these days. Canton planner Jim Kosteva had to cancel his \$106 reservation at a management seminar in Southfield last week, because township board members said the expense was too high. The board ruled against spending any money "unless it's absolutely necessary." Kosteva had already mailed a check to the Fred Pryor Institute, sponsor of the April 4 seminar. But Kosteva had to call the institute and ask for a refund. "Every dime is important," Trustee Robert Greenstein said of these tight economic times.

### Church finds home

Construction of a building for the Faith Community Moravian Church should start on a three-acre parcel south of Warren and west of Canton Center in May. The Rev. Darryl Bell hopes to hold services in the building by Christmas. "It's like we're coming of age," Bell said of the construction plans. His congregation has been meeting in Pioneer Middle School in Plymouth Township for the last two years. Bell said most church members live in either Canton or Plymouth.

### Funds for history

The Canton Historical Society has received a \$10,000 grant from Canton Township to renovate the last building in Wayne County which was used as a one-room schoolhouse. The society plans to convert the building at Canton Center and Proctor into a museum. Township board members approved the grant despite their no-frills spending policy on the grounds that the building will continue deteriorating unless repairs are made immediately. Society member Bart Berg said the grant will fund about half the repairs needed at the building, which includes a new roof, foundation repairs and interior remodeling. The society is planning fund-raisers, including a May 17 flower sale. Persons may order flowers in advance by calling Berg, 495-0811; Mary Dingeldey, 495-0509; or Melissa Hauk, 495-0304.

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# April 14 deadline for immunizations to stay in school

Only 88 children have turned in immunization records to Plymouth-Canton Community Schools since March 17 — leaving some 2,562 elementary and middle school students with deficient records.

Immunization records must be turned in to school nurses on or before April 14 for a student to remain in school.

Every student must file a form showing immunization against diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, polio, measles, and rubella, according to state law.

Elementary and middle school students must have records signed by a

physician, public health nurse, or other health provider.

All high school students at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park have now completed their immunization records.

No immunization clinic will be held in the district, but students who are unable to get the shots in time from a family physician may receive free immunizations from the Wayne County Health Department on Merriman Road, north of Michigan Avenue in Westland.

The center is open from 8:30-11:30 a.m. and 12:30-3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 4-8 p.m. on

Wednesdays. No appointment is necessary.

Parents may submit an immunization waiver which will allow the student to remain in school. This is a

statement signed by a parent or guardian that the child has not been immunized because of religious conviction or other objections.

Questions on the immunization pro-

gram should be directed to Patrick McLogan, director of the immunization program through Wayne County Health Department at 729-0210. Questions about student records on immuniza-

tions should be directed to pupil personnel services at 455-0470.

School nurses emphasize that parents should not wait until the last minute to bring in their student's records.

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## Brown bill asks warranty on new homes

Legislation requiring a warranty on the sale of all new dwellings has been introduced by State Rep. Thomas H. Brown, D-Westland.

House Bill 4921, now before the House Urban Affairs Committee, also would establish a cause of action if the specified warranty is breached. Brown's district includes part of Westland, all of Canton, and part of Plymouth Township.

If HB 4921 becomes law, the seller of a new home would have to warrant certain things to the buyer, including:

- During the first year after the date of warranty, the dwelling would be free of defects caused by faulty work and defective materials due to non-compliance with building standards.

- During the first two years the dwelling would be guaranteed to be free from defects caused by faulty installation of plumbing, electrical, heating and cooling systems.

- During the 10-year period after the warranty date, the dwelling would be free of major structural defects.

The proposed bill also specifies circumstances for which the seller would not be held liable.

The measure also provides a mechanism for appointing an arbitrator who would determine damages due to the home owner when a warranty was breached.

Brown noted that complaints against builders and contractors of new homes are near the top of the list of consumer complaints. Although voluntary efforts have been undertaken by the housing industry to provide new home warranties, Brown said, not all builders have joined the warranty programs.

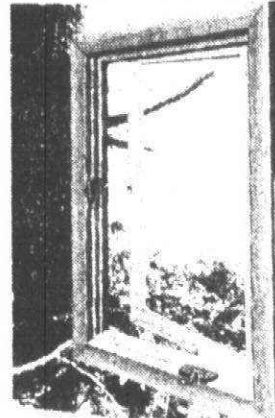
As an example he cited the Home Owner's Warranty (HOW) program adopted in 1974 by the National Association of Home Builders.

Because some builders have failed to voluntarily join private warranty programs, Brown said, the Legislature should enact a law providing that protection to all buyers of new homes.

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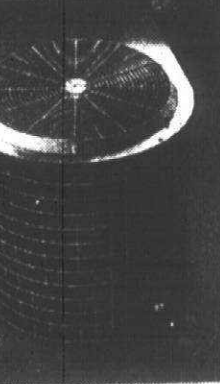
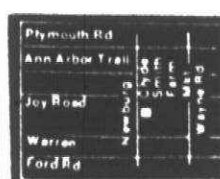
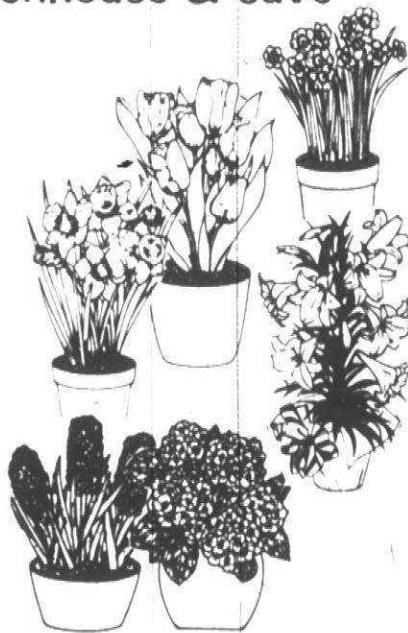

## 'Confucius say' a lot worth hearing

Is there anyone alive today who has not heard a dozen or more "Confucius say" jokes?

But do you know who Confucius was, and what he really said?

This celebrated Chinese philosopher lived in the fifth century before Christ. He traveled extensively, and wrote many books and maxims.

His is the most revered name in Chinese history. He and his followers traveled far and wide, trying to persuade the feudal lords to carry out social reform.

His ethical teachings spread their influence over Japan and Korea, as well as China.

His teachings are best summarized in his own words. Here are some of the things Confucius did say:

"The rule of life is to be found within yourself. Ask yourself constantly, 'What is the right thing to do?' Beware of doing that which you are likely, sooner or later, to repent for having done."

"It is better to believe in your neighbors, than to mistrust them."

"The superior man does not wrangle. He is firm, but not quarrelsome. He is sociable, but not clannish. He sets a good example for his fellow beings. He is considerate of their feelings, and their property."

"Consideration for others is the basis for a good life and a good society."

"Feel kindly toward everyone. Be friendly and pleasant. Be generous, be honest, and be fair."

"Sincerity and truth are the basis of every virtue."

These words are as fresh and meaningful today, as they were when Confucius spoke them, more than 2,000 years ago.

# New representative misses chance to change bill result

Sylvia Skrel may have missed a chance to defeat the SEMTA subway bill in the state House of Representatives.

The Livonia Republican will become state Rep. Sylvia Skrel at 2 p.m. Tuesday. If she had been in office last Thursday, she might have cast a deciding vote against the \$950,000 engineering funds.

The situation was this: When subway opponent Robert Law resigned from the 36th House District seat in January, the House was left with 109 members. With 109 members, passage of a bill requires 55 votes — 56 votes when there are a full 110 members.

Ms. Skrel won a special election March 25 to replace Law. But because she wasn't certified and sworn in, she couldn't vote March 27 when the House passed the subway engineering funds 55-39.

"MY CONSTITUENTS don't want it. That's a very strong consideration. I'd have to go with my constituency," representative-elect Skrel said the day after the House vote.

She cited Law's polls which showed overwhelming opposition to placing the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority's light rail line in the Woodward corridor underground from downtown to Six Mile Road.

Her campaign position paper called the SEMTA transit plan — of which the rail line was more than half — "an in-

adequate compromise (which) absolutely ignores other population areas of high density such as Livonia and Westland." Portions of those cities make up her district.

She quoted subway opponent Rep. Jack Kirksey, R-Livonia, as telling her after the vote, "You're lucky you weren't here. The pressure was unbelievable."

BUT HOUSE majority floor leader Joe Forbes, D-Oak Park, said the Skrel "no" vote didn't enter his plans.

"I could have had 60 votes," said the veteran lawmaker, who manages the traffic flow of bills in the House.

Forbes said Reps. Dominic Jacobetti, D-Negaunee, Lynn Jondahl, D-East Lansing, Raymond Kehres, D-Monroe, Larry Burkhalter, D-Lapeer, William Jowett, R-Port Huron, and Quincy Hoffman, R-Applegate, could have been called on if needed.

The tactic is that legislators from "anti" districts take a walk when a sensitive bill is being voted on, delivering their votes only if it's absolutely necessary for passage.

Forbes said he had worked on several local legislators but couldn't switch their votes.

"I couldn't get (Rep. William) Keith (D-Garden City). You can tell after the first five minutes whether someone's with you or not," said Forbes.

"I worked on Sal (Rocca, a Democrat whose district covers part of Troy). He's got a tough district. I used the argument it would be terrible if a no vote cost us \$1 billion in federal aid, but I

couldn't sell it."

"I COULDN'T believe (Ruth) McNamee (R-Birmingham). She and I had started together in regionalism (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, which outlined the rapid transit plan that SEMTA is seeking to implement)."

Among other area lawmakers, the vote broke down almost along party lines.

Voting yes were four Democrats: John Bennett of Redford; Tom Brown of Westland; Forbes, whose district includes eastern Southfield; and Alice Tomboulion of Oakland Township.

Voting no were two Democrats — Keith and Rocca; and Republicans W. B. "Sandy" Brotherton of Farmington, James Defebaugh of Bloomfield Township, Richard Fessler of West Bloomfield, Kirksey, McNamee, and Roy Smith of Saline (whose district includes part of Plymouth).

KIRKSEY DENOUNCED the bargaining tactics of the leadership. Without naming names, either of Democrats or Republicans, Kirksey said he heard leaders promise legislators:

• "How would you like to have no primary opposition and no Democratic opposition in November?"

• "How would you like us to give \$25,000 to your opposition if you vote no?"

• "You're planning to retire from the legislature next year. How would you like a judgeship?"

• "You've wanted X Highway wid-

ened since 1968. You got it."

Said Kirksey: "It was disgusting. I never came so close to just quitting."

Asked if he were offered anything, Kirksey replied, "They don't come to me any more. I don't deal like that."

ONE SORE POINT in the weeks-long debate was over state leaders' appointment of an "ad hoc" committee to seek a compromise. The committee, chaired by Brown, first met behind closed doors. But under pressure from the Lansing press corps, the meetings were eventually opened to other legislators and the public.

Speaker Bobby Crim, D-Davison, said the ad hoc committee was unofficial and did not have to comply with the state Open Meetings Act.

Fessler, whose west Oakland constituents are more interested in building an M-275 freeway than a Woodward rapid transit line, called the ad hoc committee "a subterfuge to exclude not only the press but the people — the very ones that are going to pick up the deficit spending bill."

Fessler complained that although the committee had been labelled unofficial, it was using a House sergeant-at-arms to clear the room of non-members. "I would like to know how a non-official group can exclude others from public meeting rooms and committee rooms, within the Capitol Building of this state, which are paid for by the taxpayers if there's really not a meeting going on that's covered by the Open Meetings Act."

## Panel of experts say

# Energy — more precious than ever

A panel of energy experts speaking at Oakland Community College agreed on one point: In order to "cope," Americans must conserve.

Conservation was advocated repeatedly during a national issues forum Friday at OCC's Highland Lakes campus in Union Lake.

They predicted individuals and industries will use energy more efficiently, but only if they can make free economic choices.

They saw economic incentives and a strong desire to be efficient as the best methods.

While a utility spokesman called for continued nuclear power and an auto official favored oil shale development, all agreed that changes in lifestyle face the average American.

The forum was the second in a series sponsored by OCC. Faculty member Dennis Fiems was moderator.

PETER WALTERS of the Michigan Energy Administration called President Jimmy Carter's estimates of a 10-20 percent solar capacity by the year-2000 too optimistic.

He said Americans must use systems which realize a net energy gain such as

low-head hydro, adding, "We have exhausted 'easy energy' sources."

The Great Lakes Basin Commission shows Michigan's only large-scale hydropower on the St. Lawrence River. But there are 640 dams on inland rivers which could generate electricity on a small scale, Walters said.

Walters said Michigan's growing population will demand 4.5 million quads (quadrillion BTUs) of energy by the end of the century. Only 4.1 million can be supplied, and "tough trade-offs" must fill the gap.

He prefers mandatory restraint measures such as speed limits and travel restrictions to gasoline rationing.

Rationing could be equitable, Walters commented, but would encourage black marketing and be very hard to administer. "Michigan will not enforce gas rationing with uniformed men," he said.

Walters also predicted a "conservation ethic" that will reduce our dependence on imported oil. Since petroleum now supplies 36 percent of Michigan's energy needs, he called conservation a "good investment."

DETROIT EDISON Co. spokesman Clayborne Mitchell cited a major ex-

ample of improved energy use: the cogeneration project in Monroe which is 60-70 percent efficient. It makes steam and electricity and recovers heat that is normally lost.

A General Motors Corp. energy recovery project in Maryland solves two problems at once: It burns trash and reduces landfill volume. According to GM representative Russell Stebar, it also creates energy and saves GM money.

Recovering energy from garbage incineration is also being considered by Oakland County, Mitchell said.

Downsizing cars and reducing weight with plastic and aluminum parts has helped GM meet miles per gallon standards, Stebar continued. Diesel engines allow full-size cars to meet mileage standards.

However, diesels are noisy and need more maintenance than standard gasoline engines. Air pollution from diesels is low in hydrocarbons and carbon dioxide, but higher in oxides nitrogen and soot.

RUSSEL GOSSMAN gave the United Auto Workers energy position — alternative sources and conservation have top priority.

The union supports solar develop-

ment because it promises more jobs.

One form of solar, biomass, which Gossman defined as "an organic material that contains energy," can be burned for heat or processed into methane gas or ethanol to make gasoline.

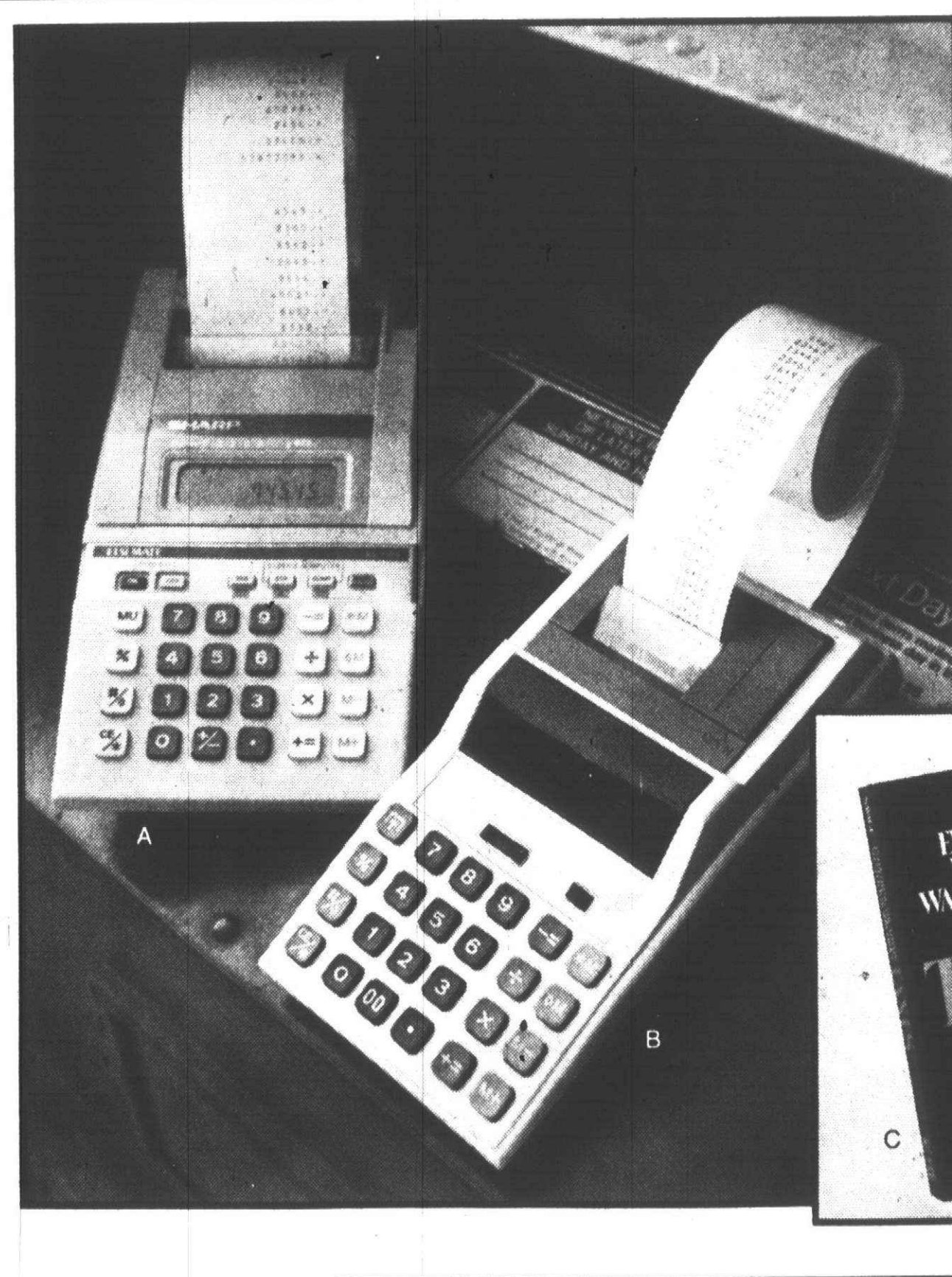
The audience challenged the panel with many questions including the cost-effectiveness of gasoline and oil from shale.

The oil shale process uses tremendous amounts of water causing a severe problem for the arid West, Edison's Mitchell replied. He discussed the difficulty of disposing of large amounts of residue from "the flaky stuff... that fluffs up" during shale oil production.

Though more expensive to make than petroleum, oil shale or coal, gasoline can be economical if usable byproducts are made, the UAW's Gossman said.

It is practical in a mild climate, but causes starting problems at temperatures below freezing. Product quality varies, he added, noting that fuel-grade ethanol must be 200 proof for top efficiency.

The panel answered queries on photovoltaic cells which make electricity directly from the sun (still too expensive), and nuclear wastes (Europe recycles them in breeder reactors.)



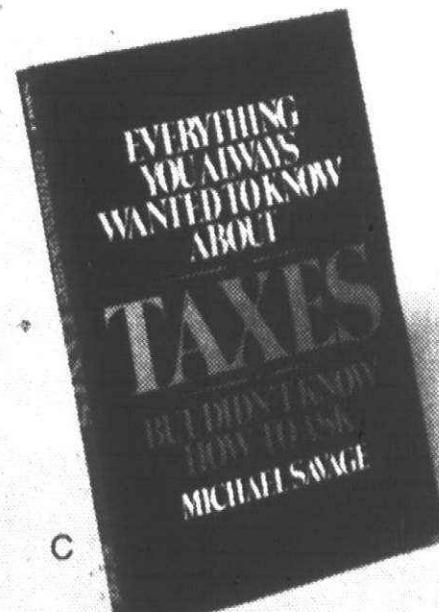

## Hospital board formed

Nine residents of the Canton-Plymouth area have been appointed to an advisory committee to provide communication between Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn and the hospital's proposed ambulatory care center in Canton Township.

Members of the committee include the Rev. Edward Baldu, pastor of St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Canton; John Flodin, Canton Township clerk; Gary Jagoda, president of the Canton Jaycees and a member of the citizen's advisory committee to the Economic Development Commission; and Lynn Labell, a former member of the Canton land use committee, who was active in the township's anti-sludge petition campaign.

Also named were Frank McMurray, president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce and a member of the township planning commission; Larry R. Oldford, a Plymouth insurance agent; Catherine Prince, a member of the Southeastern Michigan Committee on Government and the League of Women Voters.

Other members are John Schwartz, of the Canton Public Library Board; and Flossie Tonda, a mem-

ber of the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools board, League of Women Voters and the Chamber of Commerce.

Construction is expected to start this fall on a \$1.5 million medical care facility at the intersection of Canton Center and Warren roads.

In making the announcement of the appointments, hospital President Gerald Fitzgerald said, "It will help communicate information in respect to the center's planned role, objectives, programs, services and facilities to the community and aid in interpreting the community's reaction to the operation of the center."

"In addition, the committee will be asked to discuss with the hospital matters of mutual concern and interest to the community and the center."

Services at the center will include primary family medical care; maternal and child health services; emergency care; and functions such as pharmacy, radiology and laboratory.

Oakwood has offered outpatient services at the hospital since 1961. It has operated a family medical center in Sumpter Township since 1972.

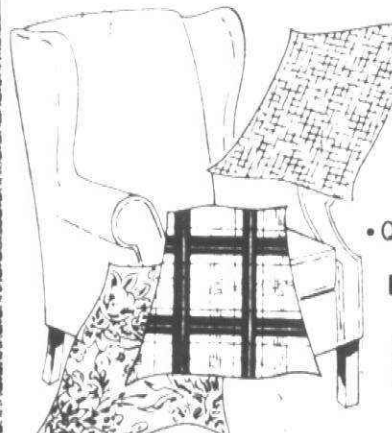
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# School district bond proposals defeated

Of the five precincts which carried Proposal I, three are in Canton and two in Plymouth. The two precincts voting in favor of Proposal III both are in Plymouth.

HOBEN TOLD the Observer Friday that if the district does not get some kind of bond money the result will be pressure to force an increase in operating millage.

"This was the third time now we have tried to earmark millage, as we asked in Proposal III, and it appears the people don't want earmarked money. I guess we might as well forget about that avenue.

"Right now we stand to lose \$2.5 million in operating funds next year because of the Headlee rollback and a loss in state aid revenue.

"It's becoming increasingly difficult to absorb growth, the effects of inflation, and the increases in negotiated

contracts and still come out at the other end with a balanced budget.

"As things stand now, we are about 2½ mills short in operational funds for next year. Maybe we can strike a bargain with the community by asking for one additional mill for operations and really tighten up to make up the balance."

The superintendent did feel current economic conditions were related to the election results. "Things are tough. We have a lot of blue collar workers in our district who have been laid off. And the economy is going crazy.

"When a single transaction by one man causes the stock market to drop by 30 points, as it did the other day, you can see we've got a pretty shaky economy.

"This was not the most opportune time for a bond election, coming right after people learned of their increased assessments and with the layoffs occurring now. I think the results are very much reflective of the times."

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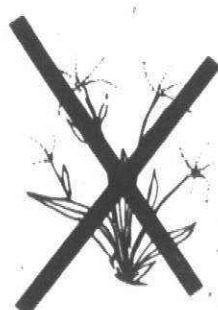

## Health care cost is behind 'debedding' fight

How much is your health worth to you?

That's a question health care consumers and providers must grapple with as the Comprehensive Health Planning Council (CHPC) of Southeast Michigan prepares a plan to reduce costs by eliminating hospital beds. CHPC must submit to the state a revised version of the original plan by March 31.

The plan was mandated by the state. Called the "debedding" plan, it was developed because of concern over rising health care costs.

Consider these facts compiled by CHPC: In the three years from 1975-78, in-patient hospital costs in southeastern Michigan rose 43 percent to \$1.4 billion. During that same time period, the number of hospital beds in the area rose by .3 percent to 21,631. The total number of patient days, however, declined by 2.6 percent to 6.2 million.

CHPC ESTIMATES that nearly \$739 million could be saved if the number of hospital beds in the area were reduced by its recommendations. Sources used by CHPC in compiling these figures were the Michigan departments of public and mental health and Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

While the figures may be accurate, they fail to take into account the feverish inflation that's forcing the cost of everything upward.

Dr. Martin Rosenfeld, chairman of the Michigan Community Hospital Association, argues that demand for more health care has caused the rising costs.

"Let's put the responsibility on you and me, the users," he told the commission. "If you cut demand, you cut costs."

Understanding health care needs and costs is crucial to any health plan for southeastern Michigan. Community groups should be telling the CHPC, and state legislators who drew up the mandate for cutting beds, what community needs are. Balancing those needs is the ability of the community to pay for health care.

That should have been done before the plan was developed, but it's still not too late.

THE CURRENT debedding plan has created an uproar.

Hospital and community groups argue the plan fails to meet its cost-savings goal, that it's inequitable and that it would lower the current level of health care.

"It's a mess" was the succinct way Dr. James Fryfogle used to describe the plan. Dr. Fryfogle is a former member of the debedding commission and chairman of the seven-county Health Planning Commission which advises the CHPC.

Other speakers at plan hearings hosted by CHPC have acknowledged the need for health planning and cost containment, but they insist that the current plan misses its mark. Here are some of their questions:

- Why force hospitals like Providence and Beaumont to reduce beds when they're at the population center of the metropolitan area?

- Why close beds at hospitals such as St. Mary in Livonia or Cottage in Grosse Pointe, where occupancy rates run from 90 to 100 percent? CHPC argues that not all hospitals are necessary. But why didn't the plan close down hospitals which run at much lower occupancy rates?

- How effective is the plan in really gauging the service hospitals provide? Did it consider past cost containment efforts and merger plans of multi-institutional arrangements?

- And what will happen to emergency medical service that has developed over the past 30 years?

These questions demand answers.

CHPC officials are quick to point out that the debedding plan is only one part of an overall health delivery plan. But announcing the debedding plan without first developing an alternate health delivery system is like amputating a limb to stop a cut from bleeding. It causes more trouble than the original problem did.

The state Legislature and CHPC must develop such a plan before slicing off hospital beds.

FOUR STEPS are needed to insure a balance of health care at the lowest possible cost in this area:

A moratorium must be called to halt implementation of the current plan. The state act mandating the plan, therefore, must be changed.

A comprehensive plan that projects Michigan's future health care needs should be developed. This plan should protect consumers' rights to choose types of health care and delivery plans, such as health maintenance versus traditional plans, and osteopathic versus allopathic care.

Southeastern Michigan needs a three-tiered, comprehensive plan with primary, intermediate and specialized care. One was proposed by Della Goodwin, president of CHPC. Primary care would be given in a doctor's own offices, intermediate care would be given at community hospitals, and specialized care would be administered at larger, university-type hospitals.

The plan also will have to consider what to do with buildings in the downtown medical center, which some are now calling a "white elephant," in the Wayne County General complex and as planned by the University of Michigan. For instance, U-M may not need to build a large, new facility if it shifted some of its work to the 40 percent vacant Wayne County General, with which it already is affiliated.

A systems approach to health care, as suggested by Frank Brock, director of planning at Providence, should be implemented.

"There needs to be an increase in other programs such as long-term, ambulatory and home care," Brock told the commission. Reducing bed levels, and therefore service, without providing alternate means of care is a "potential threat" to health care consumers, he added.

While such services are being developed, insurers ought to plan reimbursement schedules that motivate doctors and hospitals to hold down costs.



The Blues have such a plan that has worked effectively for more than a year now.

Finally, all groups involved in the delivery of health care should listen to a call from New Detroit vice-president Paul Hubbard for a "genuine com-

mittment . . . to make the process of change work for the good of the people."

How much is good health worth? There are no easy ways to calculate that — especially by March 31.

## Ezra fondly recalls days riding the ole street car

Many a time during the years that he has been traveling along the journalistic trail in Plymouth, The Stroller has been given a helping hand by some of the old timers.

First there was Karl Starkweather, then Harold Hamill and later Frank Henderson and Ezra Rot-nour. They have all gone to their reward but Ezra, who holds the distinction of being the city's first mail carrier.

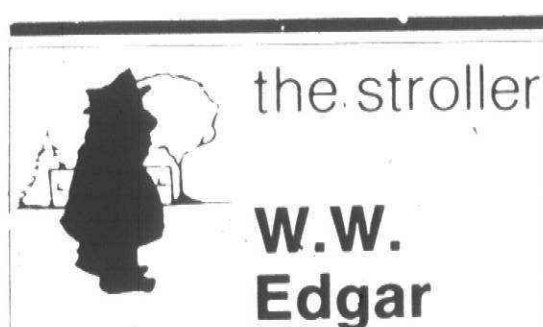
So it wasn't surprising the other day when the phone rang and it was Ezra on the other end of the line. The Stroller hadn't heard from him in some time, so the minute he heard Ezra's voice over the phone The Stroller knew that he was about to hear of some twist in the news.

"I was delighted to read the piece in the Observer," he said, "about the old street car line. But I was surprised that neither Don Sutherland nor Earl West was certain (of) the route taken to go from Main Street to Northville Road."

Ezra, who served for years on various commissions in the city and is one of the best known of the old timers in the area, explained that the left turn from Main Street was onto Mill Street and then up toward Northville Road.

NEVER AT a loss for words when speaking of the old days in Plymouth, Ezra then let his memory come tumbling through the years as he recounted some of the days when the street car was the best mode of transportation.

"They talk about giving us mass transportation these days," he said, "and few of the folks handling



the plan realize that we once had the best transportation not only in Michigan but in the entire country.

"Would you believe it," he said "that you could travel from Plymouth to Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Detroit; Northville and over to Farmington, Orchard Lake and Pontiac, to say nothing of traveling up state to Mt. Clemens, and Port Huron. And it all started in Detroit. Now, you can't reach any of these places unless you have a car."

As he described the route from Detroit, Ezra repeated that the trolleys came out Michigan Avenue to Wayne, then made a right turn on Newburgh Road and traveled north to Ann Arbor Trail. Once on Ann Arbor Trail the trolleys followed the east side of Kellogg Park, made a right turn at Main Street and made a stop for a switch at a spot close to what is now the Schrader Funeral Home.

"Do you know how the trolleys crossed the railroad tracks?" he asked. Then without waiting for answer, he explained that on reaching the edge of the railroad track the motorman and the conductor made use of three levers — one on each side of the railroad track and the other in the center. They maneuvered the trolley across and then did the same thing when they reached the railroad tracks on Main Street, at what now is the Plymouth Land-ing restaurant.

"It is an odd thing," Ezra explained, "but the trolley didn't cross the tracks on Northville Road. They went around them. And even went under them at one point."

As he continued to enlighten The Stroller on the travel in the old days, Ezra insisted that the present plans for mass transit in the area will have a difficult time beating what Plymouth had in the days of the trolleys.

"Just thought you'd like to know these things," Ezra said to The Stroller over the phone.

Now you know why The Stroller always has been pleased to meet these Plymouth pioneers. They've helped to steer him along the right turns on the journalistic trail for years.

To this day, I will not visit a fast-food chicken establishment. I still have visions of sitting in the back room taking clammy chicken parts and swishing them around in a bowl of breading. There's an art to this, according to Ted. You have to be sure the leg or whatever is evenly coated, then whack the part against the side of the bowl to remove the extra breading. There was a little trick of breaking a bone in the thigh, which Ted said made the chicken cook better in the pressure cooker.

After an hour of chicken-breading,

our hands, hair, faces and clothes would be covered with the mixture, but we would have a tidy pile of chicken ready to go to the pot.

We had a machine that would cut the potatoes to go along with the chicken, but the coleslaw was strictly a grate-it-yourself job. It is impossible to grate coleslaw without grating one's knuckles at least part of the time.

Ted had a rousing business, so in addition to actually preparing the food, we had to answer the phone orders, serve walk-in customers, make change and fold boxes for the meals.

I don't remember what we did with the money we earned from this venture. I suppose we bought clothes, makeup and other assorted garbage.

We did learn that trite little lesson about how hard it is to earn money and that work is seldom a bunch of laughs.

If we hadn't learned it then, we would have learned it later.

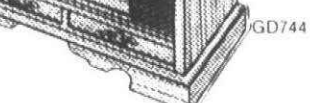
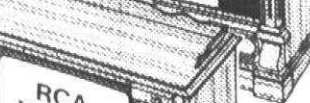
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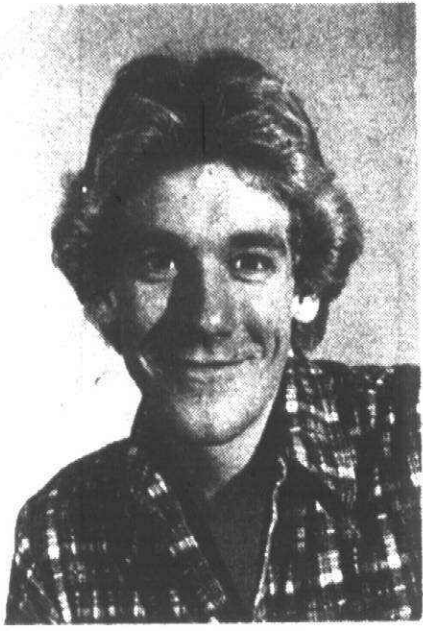
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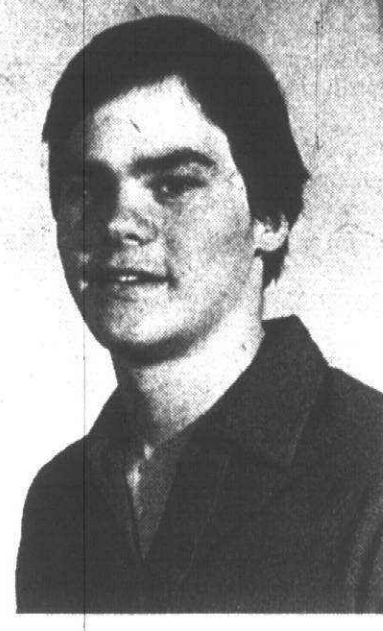
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# Petersen, Albert pace All-Area tank squad

Hein holds school records in the 50-yard freestyle and 100-yard backstroke.

"Larry can swim any stroke very well and didn't get beaten very many times in his three-year career," said his coach, Lois McDonald. "He co-captained the team this year and showed good leadership ability."

**Paul Petersen, Plymouth Canton, 100-yard butterfly.** The Chief senior finished an outstanding career with a fifth-place finish in the 100-yard breaststroke (Class A) and seventh-place in the 100-yard butterfly.

Petersen was Canton's top performer all season long. He holds several Chief records.

**Tim Weber, Livonia Franklin, 50-yard freestyle.** The Patriot senior co-captain was a standout sprinter all year as he placed fourth in the state final 50-yard freestyle with a time of 22.18. He also took 12th in the 100-yard freestyle (Class A) with a clocking of 48.90.

Weber won the Northwest Suburban League 50-yard freestyle and captured second in the 100-yard freestyle. He was second in both the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events at the Western Wayne Swim Invitational.

He holds two varsity records (100- and 200-yard freestyle) and was a member of the school's record-setting, 400-yard freestyle relay squad.

**John Schoenle, Livonia Stevenson, 100-yard breaststroke.** Known as a dedicated and hard worker, Schoenle placed 12th in the state (Class A) and holds the school record in the 100-yard breaststroke.

Schoenle also was effective stroking in the 200-yard individual medley and freestyle events.

"John is serious about swimming in college and would like to attend Central Michigan University," said McDonald of the three-year regular.

**Matt Cashin, Redford Catholic Central, 200-yard IM.** One of the major reasons for CC's success this year, Cashin took 12th in the state meet in the 200-IM with a time of 2:03.1. He also swam the 200-yard medley relay, posting an outstanding time of 1:42.7.

Cashin won the Catholic League's 100-yard breaststroke with a clocking of 1:03.8.

"ALL OF OUR EVENTS are about even," said Kurtz, "but we should do better in the relays."

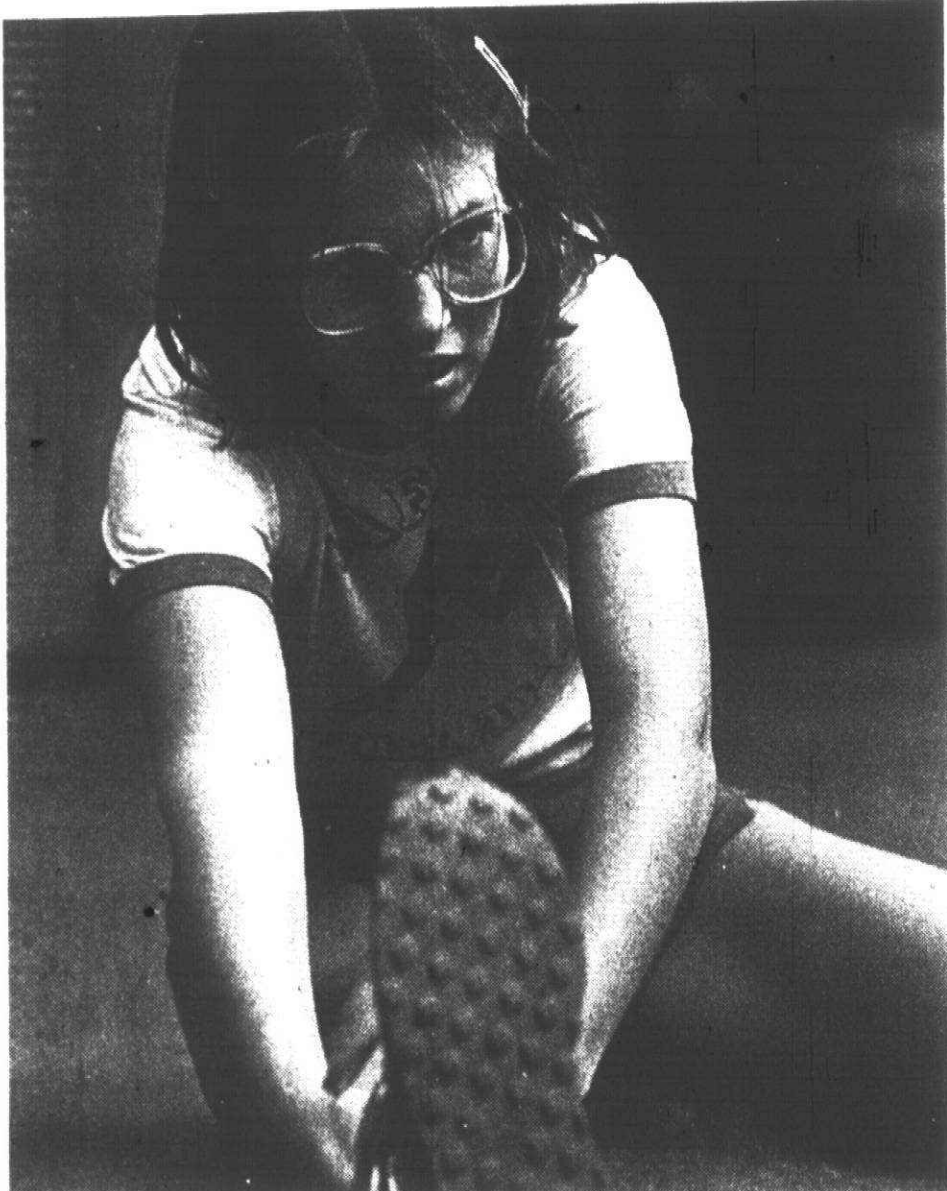
Trenton is the defending Suburban Eight League champ. The Trojan girls appear to be strong again this season.

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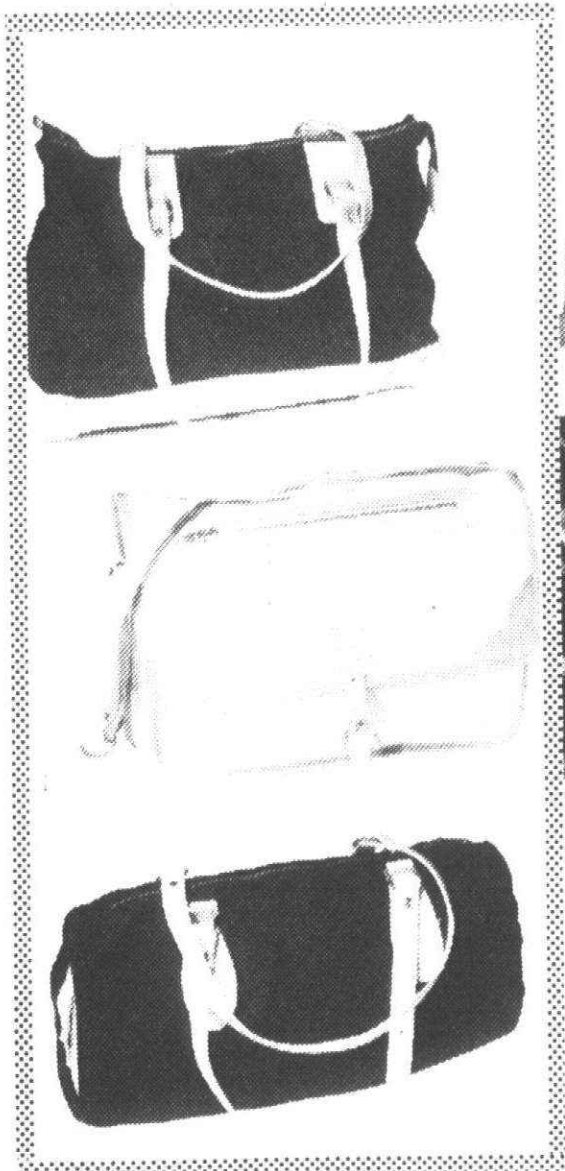

## 'Black Stallion' appeals despite unmelded styles

Many years ago Hollywood director Charles Brackett is reputed to have summed up the difference between European and American films with this example:

"In Europe, you can open a picture with clouds, dissolve slowly to clouds, and dissolve again to more clouds. In America, you open with clouds, dissolve to an airplane, and in the next shot the airplane's gotta explode."

Judged by this example, "The Black Stallion" (G) seems to reflect both stylistic approaches, though it never melds them. The first half of the film, with a boy and a horse shipwrecked on a deserted island, has qualities, positive qualities, which relate to the European cinema.

Not because the film is slow; it isn't. But because the director is confident enough in the material he is working with to allow a patient unfolding. There is almost no dialogue; the magical quality of the images and the rhapsodic rhythm of the island sequences make words superfluous.

THESE BREATHTAKING scenes show off to advantage the striking features of the location, Sardinia, and the stunning camera work of Caleb Deschanel. Deschanel (who should have received an Oscar nomination for his work) often illuminates scenes in a dramatic, baroque way with dark backgrounds and raking light.

Further adding to the visual excitement are the nervous overtures of friendship between the boy, played by 11-year-old Kelly Reno, and the wild Black Stallion, played by an Arabian show horse, Cass-ole.

Reno looks and sounds like a young boy, not a young actor. Consequently, we never tire of him or, for that matter, of the horse, a superbly trained and handsome animal.

ACTUALLY SEVERAL horses were used because of the rigorous demands of the story. It begins with the boy and his father aboard a steamship somewhere off the coast of North Africa. A fire breaks out during a terrible storm. The boy is tossed into the rolling ocean and is miraculously carried to shore by the wild horse which he befriended aboard ship.

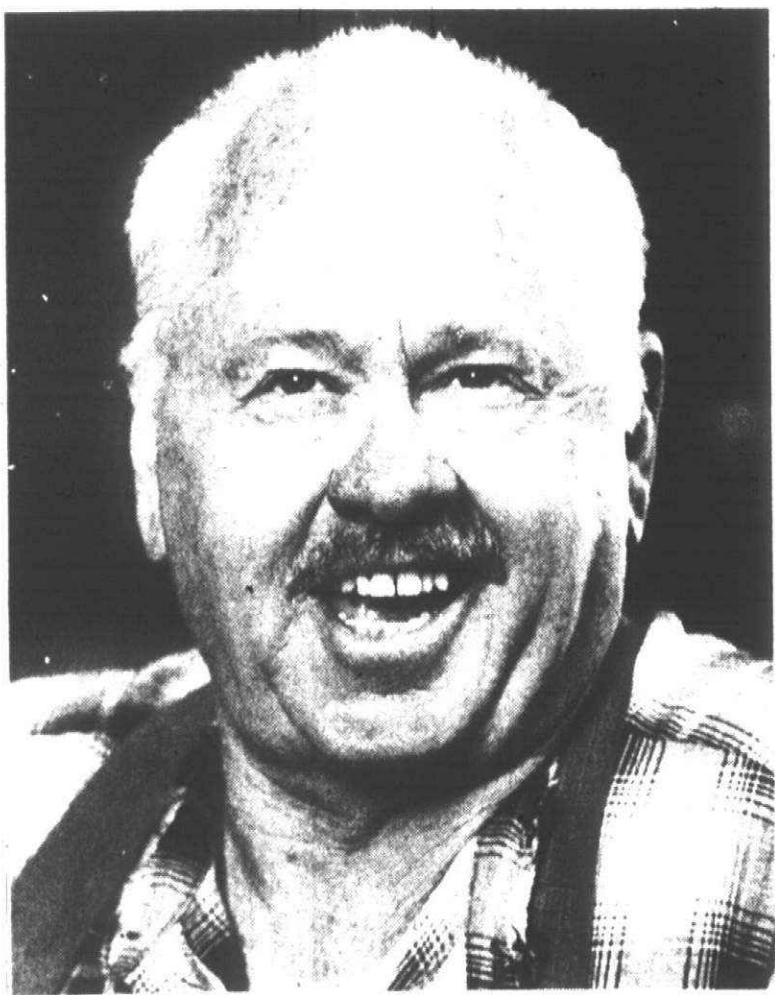
Daybreak finds the two of them, the lone survivors, on a rocky, deserted island. Ballard lets the camera tell the story — of how the boy despairs, of how his spirits are lifted when he sees the horse, of how the two of them gingerly approach each other; and, finally, of how they become horse and rider as the two race flat out along the rugged coast.

WHAT HAPPENS next is an abrupt shifting of gears with a rescue and return home leading to the second half of the film. Reno, the Black Stallion and Deschanel's photography provide slim threads of continuity, but in an entirely new design.

Now we have an apple-pie-American story and the addition of another important character, a grizzled ex-jockey played by Mickey Rooney. The boy and the old jockey plot to train the stallion and enter him as a mystery horse in a prestigious race.

There is no discounting the excellence of the acting or the high production values, but the changes in atmosphere and tempo make this half seem like a different movie. It builds to a crescendo and the director then attempts to join motifs through concluding flashbacks.

The plan doesn't work, but it does give us another chance to look at some singular images of beauty and courage.

Lake fishing has ground to a virtual halt, but stream fishermen are getting busy.

On the Huron River south of here, panfish are being taken. The bluegills and sunfish are on the small size — four to six inches — upstream from the Flat Rock dam, but crappies are in the six-to-eight-inch class.

Spring steelhead season opens Tuesday on several streams. Regular trout season doesn't start until the end of April.

Spearing and archery season for carp and suckers also opens Tuesday on non-trout streams in the southern lower peninsula.

THE METRO-WEST chapter of the Michigan Steelhead and Salmon Fishermen's Association has changed its meeting site. The group will gather at Warren Valley Golf Course, 26116 W. Warren, Dearborn Heights.

Next meeting is 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 1, and the election meeting is May 6.

BEST ROAD map of southeast Michigan you can find is the Huron-Clinton Metropark Map. The 1980-81 map is now ready for free distribution.

"Grass fire season begins with just a few days of warm temperatures and a little wind after the snow disappears," says Richard Bradley, fire supervisor for the state Department of Natural Resources.

"Ground moisture does not have too much effect on the standing grass," he explains. "Fire will travel fast even when the ground appears to be wet. These conditions exist until the grass acquires living moisture and begins to green up."

The moral: Even if the ground is damp, be super-careful with fire at this time of the year.

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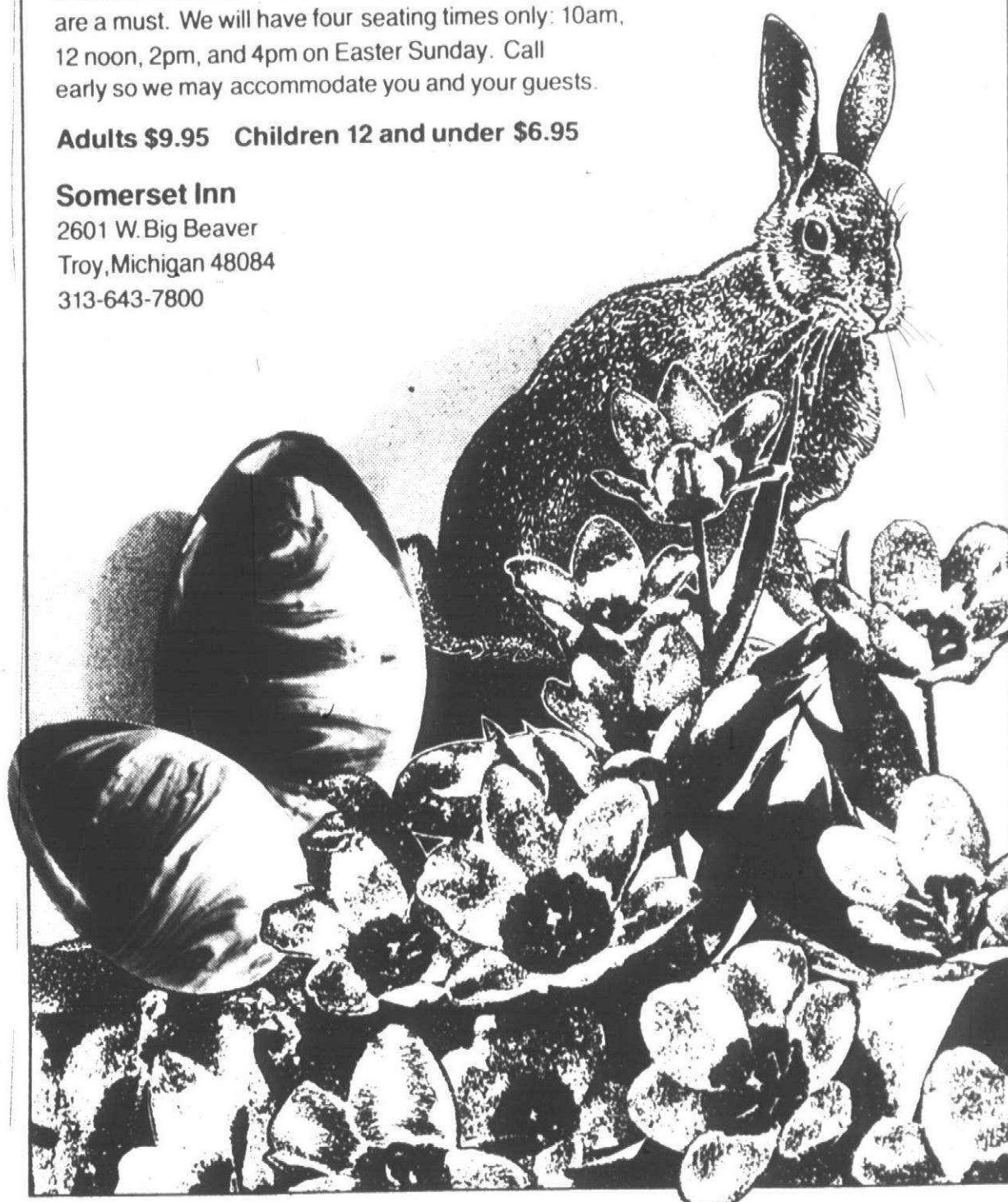
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# Smaller hospitals continue 'debedding' fight

Community hospitals are organizing to fight plans calling for a decrease in hospital beds to lower health care costs. The Michigan Association of Community Hospitals and Physicians is planning meetings throughout the metropolitan area as part of that fight. One such meeting last week at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia gathered hospital administrators and staff, state legislators and community leaders to

share information about the so-called debedding plan and opposition to it. "We were shocked when we learned of the problems coming out of the Comprehensive Health Planning Council," State Rep. Wilbur Brotherton, R-Farmington, told the group. "In the legislation we passed, we included language to make sure that smaller hospitals and people who work there would be protected." Concern over CHPC plans prompted a joint administrative rules committee

of the state Legislature to call for a moratorium on implementing debedding, to form a committee to study the CHPC and to reject 1980 guidelines and rules. Using federal funding, the CHPC is a non-profit group formed to plan health care for southeastern Michigan. The private group approved a debedding plan last Wednesday in order to meet a March 31 deadline set by the state for coming up with the plan. "The thing that shocked us most was

what we thought we were up to was a plan that said let's identify hospitals with unused beds, taking them out of service and bringing down costs," said Brotherton. "Some said the only solution is to close small hospitals. The point is that's the kind of psychology we're struggling with." "The problem is mainly in southeast Michigan, but it is evident that there is concern elsewhere," he added. The hospital group asked concerned residents to write to Brotherton at

220 1/2 Capitol Building, Lansing 48909, or to State Sen. Robert Geake at 222 1/2 Capitol Building, Lansing 48909. Geake, R-Northville, said that debedding was one of three areas identified for cost savings programs in health care. Others are limiting the number of licensed specialties in the field and limiting third party payers, such as insurance groups. Geake, whose district includes Livonia, Plymouth and Redford Township, said the legislature hoped to limit the increasing number of health care subspecialties and to force consumers to make sure costs are reasonable by limiting third parties paying for health care.

Debedding has presented a dilemma for hospitals, according to Geake. "We told hospitals to look at the beds in use. If beds weren't fully utilized, then they didn't need them. If beds were full on weekends when only minimal care is given, then we told hospitals they were wasting money," explained Geake. "This led to disappointment and bitterness."

Lack of beds is actually a problem at St. Mary Hospital and Garden City Osteopathic, according to Dr. Richard Horsch, vice president of the community hospital group and chief anesthesiologist at St. Mary. He said those hospitals have a three-week waiting list for surgical-medical beds. "We're not here to preserve any system of hospitals. We're here to preserve the right to patients of choice, to preserve high quality hospitals and to provide a reasonable number of physicians in reasonable areas," said Dr. Horsch.

He added that if hospitals in western Wayne County were forced to close beds, patients would be required to go to the more expensive Wayne County General, University of Michigan or Detroit Medical Center hospitals.

"We need a balanced system of community and referral hospitals," Dr. Horsch continued. "We don't quarrel with the intent of the plan. If beds are empty, let's get rid of them." Expressing frustration with the debedding plan was Richard Sobota, president of the hospital association and associate administrator of Saratoga Hospital. Sobota said that some empty beds must be kept available in case of emergencies and that the CHPC "presumes" that there are people who don't belong in hospitals.

"It's dangerous to say that people don't have legitimate diseases, that we're manufacturing sick people," said Sobota. "They've told us that we use too many services, but what they haven't told us is how to eliminate illness."

"Community hospitals aren't recognized for their value, service and economics," Sobota added. Using statistics from the American Hospital Association, Sobota said that large referral hospitals have grown while the number of community hospitals has actually declined. He said that it costs more to treat routine illnesses in referral-type institutions.

According to Allan Breakie, administrator of Garden City Osteopathic Hospital, that facility as well as Annapolis and St. Mary hospitals all meet or exceed the 85 percent occupancy rate demanded by the CHPC.

"These hospitals were built in the last 25 years to meet needs and demands in this area. They weren't overbuilt. Take a look at them — they're extremely competitive in their costs per day for patients," he said.

Breakie added that Garden City Osteopathic has had to restrict its emergency room care during 24 of the last 85 days because of lack of beds.

"A bed reduction of 17.8 percent would be disastrous," he continued.

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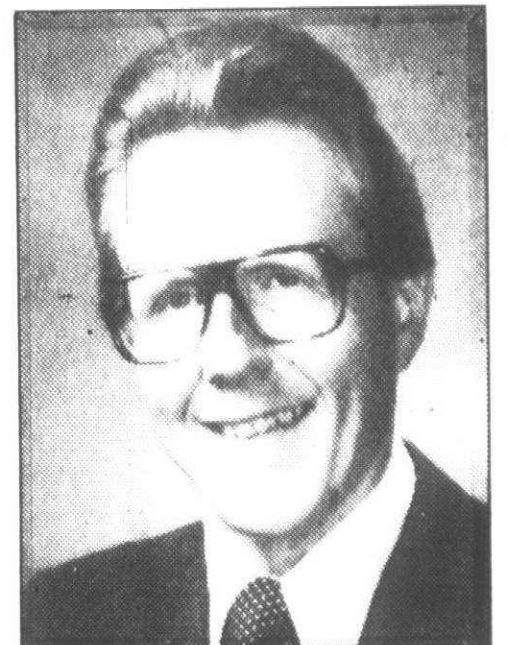

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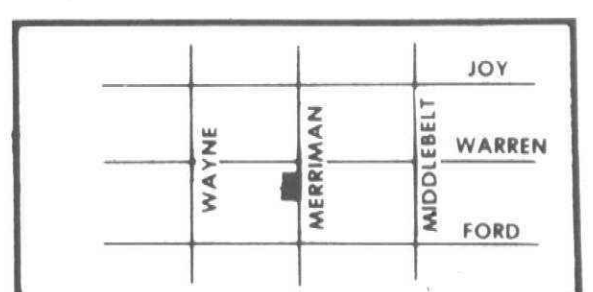
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# UPDATED CLASSICS FOR EASTER

Today's recipes add a new twist to the traditional. There is sparkle in the orange juice and the double chocolate ice cream dessert will bring a sparkle to every eye at your Easter dinner table.

And when it's all over, there probably will be some leftover ham — a wonderful thing to possess. It may have taken a big bite out of your meat budget, but the leftover is just like money in the bank.

A kettle of hearty pea soup, ham and eggs for breakfast and the availability of that end of the roast for ham sandwiches are expected fringe benefits.

Ham goes well with so many things. It is the perfect mate for fresh asparagus. Combined with cooked rice, it's great for stuffing peppers.

It makes a one-dish meal when add-

ed to scalloped potatoes. Added to kidney beans with some chopped onion, green pepper and mayonnaise, it becomes a salad.

The list goes on and on.

For four western sandwiches, saute a small chopped onion in three teaspoons of butter in a large frying pan. Add one third cup green pepper and one cup chopped ham. Slightly beat six eggs with one-half cup milk and add to the ham mixture. Cook, stirring gently for two or three minutes. Season to taste. Serve with toasted or plain bread.

In patty shells or on toast, you will need two cans of cream of mushroom soup mixed with three-quarters cup milk. Add 1½ cups diced ham, one half pound lightly browned mushrooms and heat, stirring gently. Add six quartered hard-boiled eggs. When just bubbly hot, serve in six patty shells or on toast.

## SPARKLING ORANGE JUICE

Orange juice, chilled  
sparkling water, club soda, tonic water or Champagne, chilled  
Aromatic bitters, if desired

Combine equal parts orange juice and sparkling water. Add a few drops of bitters. Stir; pour into glasses.

## ORANGE GLAZED PICNIC SHOULDER

5 to 7 lb. smoked pork picnic shoulder  
Whole cloves  
½ cup 1 firmly packed light brown sugar  
¼ cup frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed  
1 tbsp. prepared mustard

Place meat, fat side up, on rack in roaster (12¼x8½x2¼-inch). Insert meat thermometer into center of thickest part of meat, being sure that point doesn't touch bone. Bake at 350 degrees for 1½ to 2 hours or until internal temperature reaches 130 to 140 degrees. Approximately 40 minutes before cooking time is completed, remove meat from oven. With a sharp knife, remove skin from meat, leaving a collar of skin at bone. Score fat into diamond pattern; insert cloves. For glaze, spoon combined sugar, juice concentrate and prepared mustard over ham several times during the last 35 to 40 minutes of cooking. To serve, transfer to platter, garnish with curly endive or chicory and orange slices. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

## CHEESE AND SPINACH STRATA

1 pkg. (10 oz.) sharp Cheddar cheese, shredded  
2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) frozen chopped spinach, thawed  
¾ cup chopped onion  
18 thin sliced firm-type bread slices (about one 1-lb. loaf)  
½ cup butter or margarine, softened  
4 eggs  
4 cups milk  
1 tbsp. prepared mustard  
2 tsp. salt  
¼ tsp. pepper

Toss together 2 cups cheese, spinach and onion. Spread bread slices lightly on both sides with butter; place 6 bread slices onto bottom of greased oblong baking dish (13x9x1¼-inch). Top bread slices evenly with ½ cheese mixture, 6 bread slices and remaining ½ cheese mixture. Cut remaining 6 bread slices diagonally into quarters; top casserole with overlapping bread triangles and remaining shredded cheese. Beat together eggs, milk, mustard and seasonings; pour carefully over casserole. Cover; refrigerate at least 1 hour or overnight. Bake at 350 degrees about 60 to 65 minutes, or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let stand 15 minutes. Place in server and cut into squares. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

## EASTER BREAD

1 pkg. (13¾ oz.) hot roll mix  
½ cup warm water  
½ cup sugar  
¼ cup butter or margarine, melted  
4 eggs, slightly beaten

Dissolve yeast (included in mix) in water; stir in sugar, butter and eggs. Add mix, mixing until well blended. Spoon batter into greased 1½-quart round casserole or 2-quart souffle dish. Let rise, uncovered, in warm place about 1 hour and 10 minutes or until double in size. Bake at 325 degrees about 35 to 40 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 5 minutes; loosen edge with knife and turn out of casserole. Serve warm. Spread with butter or margarine, if desired. Makes 1 loaf.

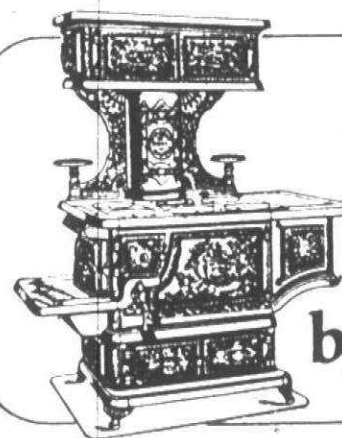
## DOUBLE CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM TORTE

1 pkg. (15 oz.) Plain Chocolate Candies  
¼ cup vegetable shortening  
3 pints chocolate ice cream, or chocolate frozen yogurt, softened  
Toasted coconut, if desired  
Peanut Chocolate Candies, if desired

Line bottom and sides (2 inches high) of 1½-quart round cake dish or 9-inch springform pan with heavy aluminum foil. Melt together plain candies and shortening in 2- or 3-quart casserole or heavy saucepan over very low heat, stirring constantly with wooden spoon and pressing candies with back of spoon to break up. (Chocolate will be melted and small pieces of color coating will remain in mixture). Spoon onto bottom of pan, spreading thick ridge of chocolate mixture around edge of pan with back of spoon. Chill in refrigerator 15 minutes. Remove from refrigerator; spread the slightly chilled and thickened ridge of chocolate up onto sides of pan about 1½ inches high with metal spatula, creating chocolate shell. Freeze at least 20 minutes or until firm. To serve, remove from freezer. Remove torte from pan using foil rim to lift out. Peel off foil; place on 12-inch tray or other flat serving dish. Garnish with t toasted coconut and peanut chocolate candies, as desired. Makes one 8- to 9-inch torte.

## The Warming Oven by Emily Watson

When the last snowdrift melts away and there's frost at night but it's warm by day, suddenly you know — somewhere they're sugaring off.

They tell me it's all plastic hoses and automatic evaporators now. In memory, it's a sugar shanty set deep in woods, weathered to a soft silver gray. And there's the smell of wood smoke and sweet steaming sap.

And there was that wonderful Sunday at the end of the season when everyone came to grandmother's - aunts, uncles, cousins, friends and neighbors. Turkey platters filled with clear amber "taffy" were set outdoors to speed their cooling. There were maple sugar cakes in fancy iron molds.

The old-fashioned glamour of the syrup season may have gone, but if you are lucky enough to have some pure maple syrup, there are many ways to use it other than on pancakes or waffles.

### MAPLE SYRUP PIE

1 cup maple syrup  
½ cup water  
3 tbsp. cornstarch  
2 tbsp. cold water  
2 tbsp. butter

¼ cup chopped nuts  
Pastry for 2-crust pie.

Boil the maple syrup with the ½-cup water for five minutes. Blend the cornstarch with the 2 tablespoons of water and add to the syrup. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture is smooth and transparent. Add butter and chopped nuts and let cool. Bake between two crusts in a 400-degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes.

### SUGAR SHANTY COOKIES

½ cup shortening  
1 cup maple syrup  
1 egg  
1½ cups flour  
1 tsp. salt 2 tsp. baking powder  
½ cup raisins  
1½ cups oatmeal  
1 tsp. nutmeg  
¼ c. milk  
½ cup chopped nuts

Toasting the oatmeal in the oven adds to the flavor of these cookies. Place the shortening, maple

syrup and egg in a bowl and beat until creamy. Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Add oatmeal, raisins and nutmeg. Add the milk and the nuts. Blend this mixture thoroughly with the creamed mixture. Drop by teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet and bake in 375-degree oven for 15 minutes. Makes four to five dozen cookies.

### MAPLE FUDGE

1 cup maple syrup  
3 cups light brown sugar  
1 cup white sugar  
2 tsp. baking powder  
2 cups half and half  
Pinch of salt  
1 tbsp. butter  
2 tsp. vanilla  
Chopped nuts (optional)

Place all ingredients except the last three in a large saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly. The syrup will swell at the beginning but will go down.

Cook until soft ball stage or until candy thermometer reaches 240 degrees. Let the fudge cool, then add the butter, vanilla and the nuts. Spread into a buttered pan. This will make two pounds.



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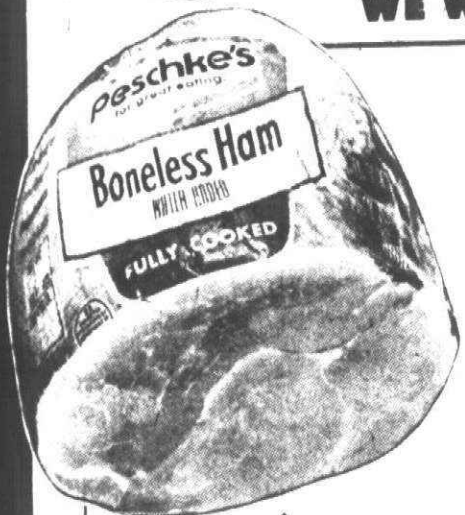
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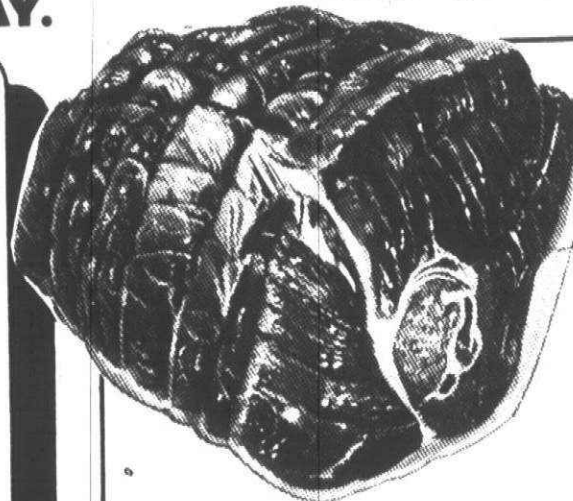

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# Symbolism of the egg goes back to mythology

At sunset there is a blazing fire and the Phoenix, in a nest of spices, is consumed by the flames, a victim of self-immolation. It leaves behind, however, a single egg from which it is reborn.

This dramatic, mythological representation of death and rebirth is one source of the Christian identification of the egg with resurrection.

The Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring had as her emblems both the egg and the hare. It is possible that the very word "Easter" was derived from the name of this goddess, Eostre. Again, the egg was a pagan symbol of fertility and new life and again the symbol was co-opted by the Christians and identified with their own spring celebration, Easter.

Even the hare remains associated with the feast, albeit in a secular fashion, as the Easter Bunny.

THE EGG became even more closely associated with Easter when its consumption during Lent was forbidden by strict fasting laws of the early Church. This prohibition, along with the natural scarcity of food in winter, made the Easter egg a special treat.

Lenten fasting regulations have relaxed considerably and the egg is no longer forbidden in this period of preparation for Easter.

By the same token, people are no longer familiar with the mythology which invests the egg with such rich symbolism.

Despite the loss of these connections with the past, the egg continues to be a central part of our Easter celebration. Decorated eggs nestle in grass-filled baskets, surrounded by the candies left by the Easter Bunny.

Eggs also appear as part of festive Easter brunches. The following menu features the egg in its most impressive form, the soufflé. In an inversion of the Easter basket, this unusual dish features spring greens (lettuce here rather than grass) nestled inside the eggs.

The only trick is to have everyone seated and ready when the soufflé emerges from the oven. High, puffy and golden, it is a visual treat not to be missed.

Your best home-made biscuits would make an appropriate accompaniment as would a chilled citrus salad, assembled the night before.

If you would like something sweet to finish the meal, Italian Easter Bread would be perfect. This fanciful coffee cake should be baked a day ahead and refrigerated, in deference to the eggs tucked into the braid.

## ROMAINE SOUFFLE

1 head romaine lettuce  
4 tbsp. butter, divided  
3 chopped green onions  
3 tbsp. flour  
1 cup extra-rich milk, heated  
4 eggs, separated  
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 tsp. salt



## A Question of Taste

½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
2 or 3 dashes Tabasco  
Grated Parmesan cheese

Cut off the bottom of the lettuce. Wash thoroughly and chop coarsely. Put into a heavy saucepan with a little water and cook until wilted. Drain well and chop finely. Melt 1 tbsp. butter in a skillet and cook the green onions until soft but not brown. Add romaine and cook, stirring, until moisture has evaporated.

In a saucepan, melt the remaining 3 tbsp. butter; mix in 3 tbsp. flour and cook for 2 to 3 minutes, stirring. Add the milk and cook until thickened. Beat the egg yolks into the sauce, one at a time, then add the Cheddar cheese and cook until smooth. Stir in romaine mixture until well blended. Season with the salt, Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco.

Lavishly butter a 1½-quart soufflé dish; sprinkle with grated Parmesan

cheese, coating bottom and sides, and shake out excess. Beat the whites to soft peaks; stir about ½ of them into the Romaine mixture, blending thoroughly. Lightly fold in the remainder.

Pour into the soufflé dish and smooth the top. Sprinkle with a little Parmesan cheese and put into a preheated 400 degree oven. Immediately reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake for 25 to 35 minutes. Makes about 4 small servings.

## FRUIT CUP

1 pink grapefruit  
1 white grapefruit  
4 oranges  
1 can (1 lb., 4 oz.) pineapple chunks in unsweetened juice, undrained  
2 cups orange juice

Peel grapefruit and oranges. Segment and cut into chunks, removing membrane and seeds. Place in a large bowl. Add pineapple chunks with their juice and the orange juice. Mix gently. Cover and chill. Makes 6-8 servings.

## ITALIAN EASTER EGG BREAD

2½ to 3½ cups unbleached flour  
¼ cup sugar  
1 tsp. (1 package) yeast  
1 tsp. salt  
¾ cup milk  
2 tbsp. butter  
2 eggs, room temperature  
½ cup chopped mixed candied fruits or raisins  
½ cup coarsely chopped toasted almonds  
½ tsp. anise seeds (see note below)  
Melted butter  
5 colored raw eggs  
FROSTING:  
1 cup powdered sugar  
1 tsp. milk  
½ tsp. vanilla

In mixer bowl combine 1 cup flour, sugar, yeast and salt. Heat milk and butter until warm. Gradually add to dry ingredients. Beat 2 minutes at medium speed.

Add 2 eggs and ½ cup flour. Beat at high speed 2 minutes. Gradually stir in enough additional flour to make a soft dough.

Turn dough out onto lightly-floured surface, kneading until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place in oiled bowl, turning to coat top. Cover with plastic wrap and a towel wrung out in hot water and allow to rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Combine fruits, nuts and anise seed. Punch dough down and turn out onto lightly-floured surface. Knead in fruit mixture. Keep fruit mixture dusted with flour until pieces are worked into dough. Divide dough in half. Roll each piece into a 24-inch rope. Twist ropes together loosely and form into a ring on an oiled baking sheet, pinching the ends together. Brush with melted butter.

Carefully make a nesting place for each raw egg by spreading ropes apart and pushing eggs down into the dough as far as possible.

Cover dough with waxed paper. Allow to rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake about 30 to 35 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in bread comes out clean and dry. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire rack.

Combine frosting ingredients. Carefully drizzle over cooled bread and between the eggs. Makes one 12-inch circular loaf. NOTE: If the licorice-flavored anise seeds are not to your taste, you might substitute cinnamon or grated lemon peel.

# Homemade molded candies star in Easter baskets

You might like to try something different this year and make the candies for your Easter baskets.

Carol Rogers of Canton, who has taught cake decorating for about 10 years at Central Middle School (adult education program) in Plymouth, happened to see a demonstration of candy molding a few years ago and was intrigued.

Since then, she and some friends have accumulated several molds each, buying one or two additional molds each year. They trade off, which allows access to a variety of figures.

Bulk chocolate is available from kitchen supply stores such as Create-a-

Cake in Canton and Kitchen Glamor in Redford Township and Rochester, priced from \$1.80 a pound and up. Molds start at \$1.98 for a sheet containing an assortment of characters. Colors are available or you can color your own using an oil-base paste color.

Making your own means you know the ingredients, what your children and other family members are eating on Easter morning.

Mrs. Rogers sent along the following very helpful information and candy recipes:

## EQUIPMENT NEEDED:

Jars, baby food jars or any wide-mouth

jars  
Spoons, preferably long-handled  
Chocolate

Chocolate molds  
Bags, wrap, or boxes for packing  
If using sucker molds, sucker sticks  
Fillings, if desired

One of the following: sauce pan, crock pot, electric frying pan

TO MAKE your own candy, chop chocolate into small pieces. Put two inches of water in pan, crock pot or fry pan. Turn flame on low, low for crock pot, or 200 degrees for fry pan. Put chocolate in jars and place in water. Stir chocolate to hasten melting. Never

let water boil. If chocolate is over-heated it will get thick and lumpy. If this happens, cool and re-heat.

If you wish to add color, do so after the candy is melted. Stir in evenly, using paste color. If you are going to paint molds, do so now. When your painting is finished, put in freezer for 10 minutes before filling with other chocolate. Spoon chocolate into mold; do not overfill. Put into freezer for about 10 minutes or until hardened. Invert mold and gently remove candy.

Melted chocolate can be used to adhere royal icing decorations to chocolate pieces. Any unused chocolate can be covered and stored for use at a later

time. It is not necessary to wash molds after each use. If candy is taken out before it is completely set, wipe out mold before continuing.

## CARING FOR MOLDS:

Do not use detergent, put in dishwasher, wash in too hot water nor mold chocolate that is too hot.

Do: store flat.

## CHARACTERS

To create chocolate hollow bunnies, eggs, etc., you must have a mold with a front and a back. Fill half of mold with chocolate, put on other half and paper clip, clamp or put rubber bands on to secure pieces together. Then turn mold until everything is coated. Put in freezer for 5 minutes. Take out, turn again and return to freezer for another 10 or 15 minutes.

Finished chocolate can be given a more professional look by wrapping in foil, bagging or putting them in a candy box.

## SOME OLD FAVORITES

Chocolate-covered cherries: Spoon melted chocolate into bottom of mold. Place index finger in chocolate and coat sides of mold. Place in freezer for 10 minutes. Mix one part cherry juice to 10 parts fondant or ¼ cup to bag. Put cherry in mold and add fondant to ¾ full. Then seal with more chocolate. Return to freezer for 15 minutes.

Peanut butter cups: Spoon chocolate into bottom of candy mold. Insert finger and distribute chocolate around sides. Put in freezer for about 10 minutes. When chocolate is set up, spoon ½ tsp. peanut butter into center and cover with chocolate. Return to freezer for 10 minutes.

Peanut clusters: You will need one pound of chocolate to ¾ pound of raisins. Blend together and spoon into candy cups. Then put in freezer for 10 minutes.

Chocolate covered raisins: Mix chocolate and raisins together in equal amounts. Spoon into candy cups and put in freezer about 10 minutes.

Coconut haystacks: Mix chocolate with coconut and put into candy cups or on wax paper in triangle shapes, with wide part of triangle as base. Put in freezer for 10 minutes.

Chocolate crunch: Mix Rice Krispies to your taste with chocolate, put into candy cups and place in freezer for 10 minutes.

Kit-Kat: If you like Kit-Kat candy bars, try this simple and easy way to make them. Take the peanut butter sugar wafer cookies you buy in the store; dip each cookie in chocolate and lay on wax paper. You might also try a package of the vanilla-chocolate-strawberry sugar wafer cookies and dip them in white, pink or chocolate. These will make colorful treats for any child's Easter basket.

## ON YOUR OWN

All of the above is designed to help you get started. Use your imagination and your knowledge of your family's favorites to create your own special candies.

Kitchen supply stores are very helpful and will answer many of your questions. They also sometimes offer demonstrations of "how-to." Take advantage of them and you could be off on a new and delicious hobby.

# That Easter ham is low in calories

Easter can present special problems to the diet-conscious. Many holiday traditions are centered around eating, and often the foods prepared are high in calories.

Ham, always an Easter favorite, contains only 180 calories per three-ounce serving. And for a festive glaze that won't add calories, try canned apricot halves packed in unsweetened juice.

There are many ham varieties to choose from, with bone-in smoked half ham being one of the most impressive, and often one of the least costly. Shank and rump portions and semi-boneless hams are also available as are boneless hams.

When selecting the size ham to meet your needs, allow about ¾ servings per pound for bone-in hams. A canned

ham or other boneless ham will provide up to five servings per pound.

## APRICOT-GLAZED BAKED HAM

5- to 7-pound smoked half ham  
1 can (16 oz.) apricot halves in juice  
1 tsp. honey  
½ tsp. allspice  
2 tsp. cornstarch  
2 tbsp. water

Place ham, fat side up, on rack in open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in thickest part. Be careful that bulb does not rest in fat or on bone. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325 degrees) until the meat thermometer registers 130 degrees to 140 degrees for a fully-cooked half ham (18 to 24 minutes per pound); 160 degrees for a "cook-before-eating" half ham (22 to 25 minutes per pound).

Drain apricots; reserve 8 halves. Blend or process remaining apricots and juice until smooth. Place apricot puree, honey and allspice in small saucepan. Combine cornstarch and water, stir into apricot mixture; bring to a boil and cook one minute, stirring constantly. Brush ham with apricot glaze and place reserved apricot halves over surface of ham 20 minutes before end of cooking time. Serve remaining sauce with ham.

SELECT OTHER menu items with an eye on calories. To start the meal in slimming fashion, serve spiced tomato juice with celery stalk stirrers. Rice with mushrooms is an Easter special and within most dieters' limits when serving sizes are controlled.

Broccoli spears and a green salad with low-calorie dressings are always popular diet choices and go nicely with the ham-centered menu. Calorie counters should bypass rolls and butter.

An array of crisp, colorful fresh vegetable relishes are a good addition to the menu for all.

For a dessert that's high on everyone's list yet low in calories, top wedges of honeydew melon with fresh strawberries.

## This system saves

If you find it difficult to put aside money from the family budget, you're not alone.

However, try this: every time you shop, save 10 percent of the bill. In other words, save a dime for every dollar you spend. Do this at the end of each day simply by estimating money spent during the day. You'll be surprised at how fast your savings grow.

## Try these tarts for tea

Spring conjures up visions of a freshly-cleaned house and a gracious tea party. Here are two recipes that go well with this vision.

## DREAMY FRUIT TARTS

1 8-oz. package cream cheese  
1 cup flour  
¼ tsp. salt  
½ cup margarine  
½ cup sugar  
2 tbsp. cornstarch  
Dash of salt  
1 cup milk  
½ tsp. vanilla  
Strawberry halves  
Banana slices

Divide cream cheese in half; reserve 4 oz. for filling. Combine flour and salt; cut in 4 oz. cream cheese and margarine until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Divide dough into 12 balls; chill. On a lightly-floured surface, roll each ball to 4½-inch circle; place in 3-inch tart pans. Prick with fork. Bake at 375 degrees, 15 to 20 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool.

Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; gradually add milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly,

until clear and thickened. Add vanilla and remaining cream cheese, cubed; stir until smooth. Fill tart shells. Chill. Before serving, garnish with strawberries and bananas. Makes 12 tarts.

## HERITAGE SHORTCAKE

2½ cups all purpose biscuit mix  
1 cup m. marshmallow cream  
1 cup heavy cream  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1½ cups peach slices  
1½ cups strawberry slices  
1 cup miniature marshmallows  
½ cup blueberries

Prepare biscuit mix according to package directions for 8-inch round shortcake.

Combine marshmallow cream and 2 tbsp. heavy cream; mix until well blended. Whip remaining heavy cream and vanilla until stiff. Fold in marshmallow cream mixture.

Combine remaining ingredients. Split shortcake; fill with half of fruit mixture plus miniature marshmallows and marshmallow cream mixture. Top with remaining fruit mixture and marshmallow cream mixture. Garnish with mint, if desired.

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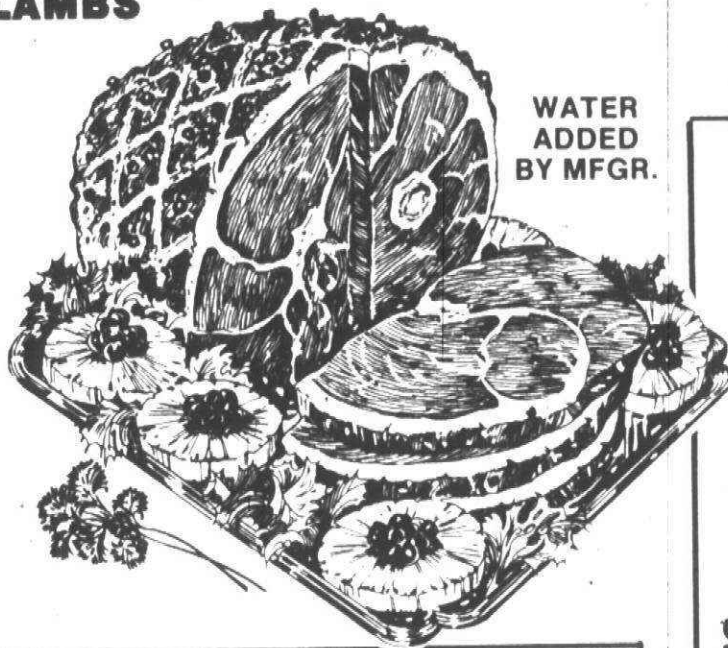
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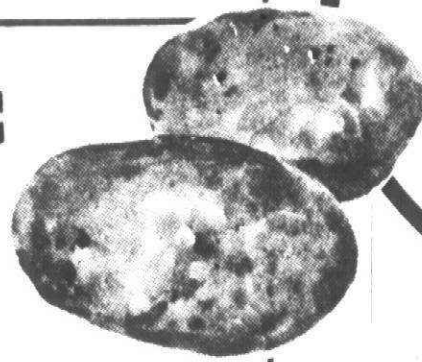
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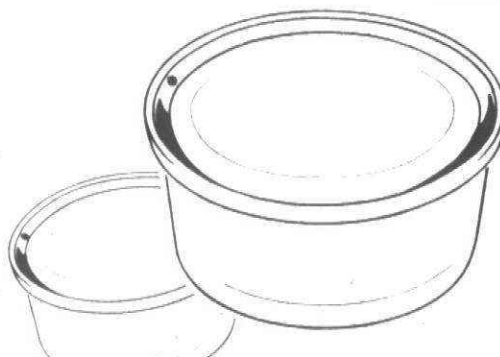
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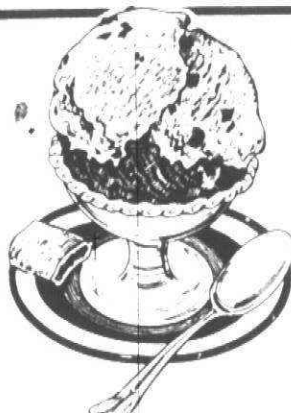
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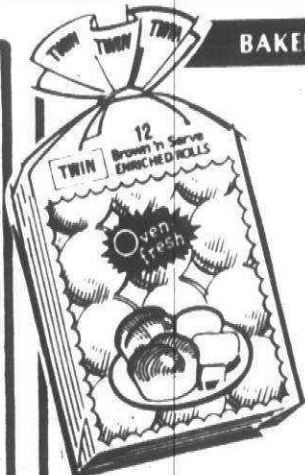

# Parents advised on the art of coping

"What can I do today to mess up Mommy's mind?"

Although one mother was convinced that question was her child's daily goal, 4-year-olds aren't really trying to create instant insanity, according to one expert.

"Ignore the behavior, but not the child," advises Angela Laycock, contemporary parenting instructor.

Mrs. Laycock headed a recent child management discussion in Field School in Canton Township. She is an instructor in the contemporary parenting program at Eastern Michigan University, now in its second year. The talk was sponsored by the Plymouth-Canton PLUS Program, Title I-Head Start.

Mrs. Laycock began her talk by acknowledging, "It is much easier to talk about parenting than it is to do it."

"Acting up by other kids doesn't bother you, because you don't feel the same sense of responsibility. Sometimes your own children are not easy to deal with, even in very simple kinds of situations," said Mrs. Laycock, who has been married 25 years and is the mother of two sons.

She believes there are factors in contemporary life that make parenting more difficult.

"We didn't get into trouble when we were young, because everyone in the neighborhood knew us, and would tell our parents. But today, we don't have a lot of contact with our neighbors."

Television and increased mobility also make life more difficult for parents today, she said.

THE PROBLEMS, however, sounded familiar.

Temper tantrums, whining and 4-year-olds seemed most threatening to a mother's emotional balance from the comments and questions from the audience.

One mother confessed she hid herself in the bathroom to try to recover from the strain of dealing with an overly-dependent, whining child. But it was hard to find serenity through transcendental meditation, with three children battering on the door.

Mrs. Laycock suggested that the child could be under a great deal of stress.

"Children have little antennas you can't see, and they sense what is going on in a family. These go away at adolescence."

In tantrums, as in most problem areas, Mrs. Laycock advised looking for the cause. It could be fatigue, a reaction to a new environment or boredom, especially in a shopping center where the most interesting thing a small child can see usually is the floor.

Mrs. Laycock is an advocate of rewarding children for good behavior. Rewards might consist of time, love, affection and attention.

"Children honestly love people more than things; the time you spend with children is very important," she said. She also stressed patience.

"It may not work the first time you change from a yelling mom to a patient one. It will take time."

She counseled staying close to a child who is having a temper tantrum.

"Being out of control is scary, and physical closeness is very important."

Above all, the mother shouldn't get out of control, too.

Some of the mothers told Mrs. Laycock that they had success in controlling whining and tantrums by awarding

their child a colorful seal for a certain number of hours without incidents.

Breast-feeding might also create a calmer child, said Mrs. Laycock.

"There is a lot of evidence that chil-

dren who are breastfed are more tranquil and better behaved. Researchers believe that this is because hearing the mother's heartbeat is reassuring to the baby.

A FATHER in the audience called for reasonableness.

If parents reward themselves at the supermarket with wine and cigarettes, he said, it's reasonable for a child to expect something too.

"Our expectations with children are

# The Joneses produce new work

Christ's passion and death as seen from the point of view of the women around him is the basis of new musical work to be presented April 20 by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra and the Schoolcraft Community Choir.

A lot of Joneses will be involved. Robert W. Jones of Schoolcraft College is the composer. Dr. Marilyn Jones will guest conduct the symphony, and is regular conductor of the choir.

Bob's wife, Anne, wrote 10 poems for the work based on the Gospel of St. Matthew from the Last Supper through the burial of Christ in the tomb of Joseph of Aramathia.

Dave, Marilyn's husband, did the copying, and Christopher, Bob and Anne's 17-year-old son, will be playing string bass with the orchestra.

JONES' WORK, entitled "Passion," was conceived more than a year ago as a piece for a community chorus.

"Putting it all together has taken a tremendously coordinated effort, said Jones.

"I discussed it with Marilyn Jones, and with Wayne Dunlap, then conductor of the Plymouth Symphony.

"Next came funding which we secured through a grant through Dean Ron Griffith of the college's community services.

"Finally, the writing, with the heavy composing compacted into last August, sandwiched between the close of summer music school and the start of the fall semester.

"It's not something you can set aside once you're into it," Jones said. "Concentration is a key factor in composing and you've got to gear your thinking to be able to do it well."

"I've learned my lesson with 'Passion,' no more biggies while school is in session."

JONES JOINED Schoolcraft as a resident composer in 1969. He has produced 30 pieces since then including "Mass in Motion" in 1974; "Pilgrimage," a Bicentennial opera in 1976; and a ballet, "Burning Tree," written with Schoolcraft English instructor Ralph

Kelley in 1976 for the Plymouth Symphony.

A faculty recital this summer will consist solely of Jones compositions, including a new violin sonata he is writing.

A native of Chicago, Jones earned bachelor's and master's degrees in music at California's University of the Redlands. He also took post-graduate courses at the University of Minnesota where he was a teaching fellow.

But according to him, Schoolcraft really has been his only teaching post, and generally he likes the combination of teaching and composing.

With roots from a larger city, Bob and Anne enjoy living in Detroit's Rosedale Park. Their daughter, Gwyneth, 15, like her older brother, attends Waldorf High in Indian Village.

"We weren't sure either of the children would be attracted to music, but they've both gotten interested within the past two years," Jones said. "Gwyn is a violinist, and Christopher, of course, plays string bass."

WIFE ANNE is also a musician and joined her husband in a recent performance to benefit the college's new grand piano fund. She prefers prose writing, according to Jones, and currently is a features editor of a weekly suburban newspaper.

Jones himself has little time for anything other than music. Even his hobby as a model railroader has had to be shunted aside.

Besides composing, teaching and performing, he is organist at First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth.

Jones is hoping for a sabbatical leave for the winter semester in 1981.

"I plan to use the time to clean up some shorter musical works and to complete a music appreciation textbook for community colleges," he said.

To date, he has done practically every kind of composition work there is — jazz, motion picture score, symphonic ballet and opera.

"I guess the best I can see ahead is perhaps bigger and better versions of each," he concluded.

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## Service answers cancer questions

Mrs. M., a 65-year-old widow, was so upset when her physician told her she had a suspicious lump in her breast that by the time she got home, she had forgotten much of what the doctor had said.

She called the Public Response Program at the Michigan Cancer Foundation (MCF) and her questions were soon answered.

Jim S. had been given several of his uncle's suits after the uncle died of lung cancer. Jim needed the suits, but wondered whether he could contact cancer from them. He called the Torch Drive agency's Public Response Program and was assured that cancer is not contagious and cannot be "caught" by contact with another person, nor from a patient's clothing.

Linda C. was determined to give up cigarettes, but felt she needed help to quit. She called the program and was given the names and schedules of the nearest stop-smoking clinics.

**MORE THAN 6,470** Detroiters called the toll-free Public Response Program, at 1-800-462-9191, during 1979. And, in the first four weeks of 1980, 606 calls were answered, the bulk of which followed Channel 56's showing of the "Joan Robinson" documentary, which chronicled one woman's cancer fight.

The service was established in July 1978 as part of the Metropolitan Detroit Cancer Control Program (MDCCP), a \$10 million, federally co-sponsored program to coordinate local cancer control activities. Detroit's Public Response Program will become one of 31 Cancer Information Services, officially designated by the National Cancer Institute.

The telephone service then will be extended to cover all of Michigan, and will provide consultation service for health professionals as well as the general public.

Currently, the program provides information on the following issues: specific types of cancer, ways cancer is detected, methods of diagnosing cancer, local screening and detection centers, types of cancer treatments, finding a doctor, local treatments and rehabilitation programs, emotional counseling programs for patients and families, home care, local transportation, financial aid, cancer quackery and research and carcinogens.

Operators do not recommend treatments or give medical aid. They help the caller to translate a physician's technical explanation into everyday language, and help provide a link between the caller and the doctor or community resource.

The anonymity of callers is protected.

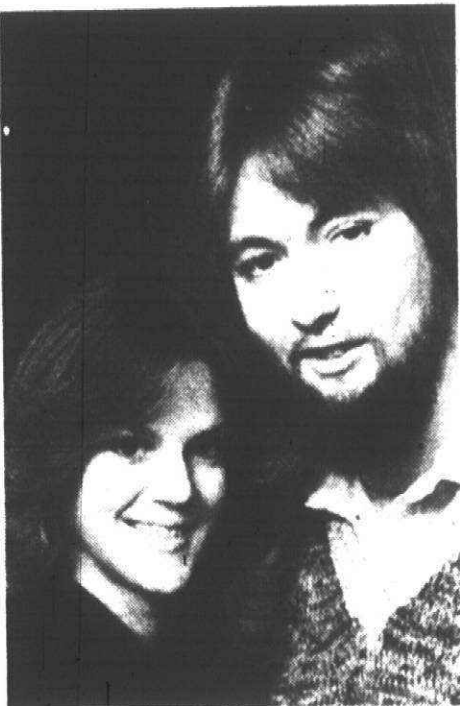
**AN MCF EVALUATION** Unit sample survey profiles the typical caller to be a married female homemaker between 29 and 49 years old.

However, nearly one-quarter of the callers are men; 20.9 percent of all callers are single; 14.1 percent are employed in service occupations; and 12.3 percent are physicians, lawyers, teachers and other professionals.

About half of the callers are between the ages of 20 and 39, and about 40 percent are between 40 and 69.

Almost 50 percent of the callers request general cancer information or information on a specific condition, and 17.5 percent ask for literature to be sent to them. Another 27.8 percent ask for referrals to service organizations or other medical agencies; 4.2 percent want referrals for specific medical conditions; and 4.7 percent of the callers seek emotional support.

Staff and volunteer operators answer calls from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays-Fridays. At other times, a tape-recorded message refers callers to a toll-free number operated by the National Cancer Institute.

often greater than with adults," agreed Mrs. Laycock.

Another parent suggested that listening to children is important. When her son arrived home from school in a temper, she learned that during the day the following events had taken place:

- His lunchbox was used as a football by the other kids.
- His banana was mashed.
- His cupcake frosting was stuck to the wrapper.
- He had a substitute teacher who hadn't been at all sympathetic.

**HELPING HIM** handle his feelings fell into one of Mrs. Laycock's three

goals of parenting: helping a child develop appropriate behaviors; keeping a child safe (without being overprotective); and helping a child learn to deal with his emotions.

Parents are advised to emphasize each child's uniqueness. Building a child's self-image is very important, although sometimes a parent has to be a real Sherlock Holmes to seek out an area in which the child can excel.

Letting a child help around the house also builds his self-esteem, she said. "The child, in helping, probably won't come up to your expectations of the way the job should be done."

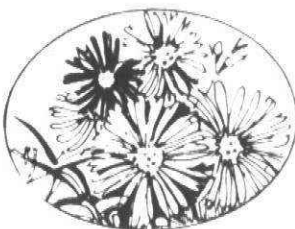

# Fort Jefferson

## Built for war, used as prison, now Gibraltar of the Gulf

Millions of Americans saw Fort Jefferson on television last week during the three-hour showing of "The Ordeal of Dr. Samuel Mudd" on CBS. Few viewers realize that Fort Jefferson is now a national monument and a possible travel destination. Here is a report from two journalists who recently flew there.

Our tiny Conch plane hangs suspended between a sky dotted with cotton clouds and a sea green with islands. Behind us are the Marquesas, coral reefs famous among rum runners and dope smugglers. Ahead is the great six-sided fortress known as Fort Jefferson, on a tiny coral atoll in the middle of an endless sea.

Fort Jefferson was the largest of the coastal forts built from Texas to Maine during the 19th century. It was never converted to a Union prison, and its most famous inmate was Dr. Samuel Mudd.

Mudd set the broken leg of John Wilkes Booth, assassin of Abraham Lincoln, and was sentenced to life imprisonment on this island for conspiracy. He was pardoned after four years because of his part in fighting a yellow fever epidemic.

WE ARE FLYING with Nick Dunn of Air Tortugas, who makes this flight daily from the Key West airport.

"There it is, dead ahead, Fort Jefferson," Dunn said. "It's miles from nowhere, taking up all but the tiniest bit of Garden Key."

We nose down towards the little cluster of atolls that make up the Dry Tortugas. They were named by Ponce de Leon, with the appendage dry added generations later to warn seamen of the lack of natural water on the islands.

Thousands of frigate birds, sooties, terns and gulls wheel below us, like thick clots of summer bugs around a lantern. We make half a dozen circles over Garden Key, where the great six-sided fort stretches to every edge.

Dunn aims for a series of markers forming a watery runway offshore, and then for the amphib ramp off to one side of the fort. We clamber out and stared at the most imposing fortress of its period that we have seen, from New England down past the Carolinas, beyond Alabama and Mississippi to Texas.

THE FORT WAS started in 1846 and was built over 31 years. Construction was halted by the Civil War. Federal troops occupied it in 1861 to keep it out of the hands of secessionists from Florida, but it saw no combat except for a few short-fall shots between the mortars and Confederate gunboats that came too close for comfort.

Only about 500 men ever occupied Fort Jefferson when it was in use as a fort. As a prison, it housed mostly those who were regarded as incorrigible or as threats to the newly won Federation.

Our pilot leads us around a corner of the massive old building. Each wall extends for the length of two football fields and rises to 50 feet above the surrounding moat.

The guard towers on each point rise 65 feet above the sandy little coral reef. The fort is made of a hard rust-red brick, and it is a remarkable, lonely old ruin.

Its very location, almost 70 miles beyond the nearest road, assures the uniqueness of this fort as a destination for visitors, whether they come by air or sea. That placement assures that it will never become a popular waystop on anybody's tour to anywhere.

A few charter craft make it out to

deserted gun rooms never used, crumbling stairways and locked doorways.

the fort, as do occasional private sailboats and power boats. Dunn comes every day in his little plane. Otherwise, the fort stands alone.

We wander in and out of the gun emplacements, the old kitchens, the officers' quarters (now occupied by the U.S. Park Service men who maintain the fort as a National Monument.) We visit the lonely cells of prisoners, now long gone.

A squat little outdoor structure that looks like it might have been a

solitary confinement hell hole, turns out to be a bread oven. Another strangely shaped outbuilding, with thick firebrick walls, was where lead bullets were made.

Here were the foundations of the barracks, long since torn down. Here the commandant's house, the armory and the enormous gap-roofed building where powder was stored.

We stroll for more than an hour down the long, arched corridors of the second level, through connecting

gun rooms that were never used in battle and through the main cell block where most of the prisoners were kept.

"AND THIS WAS Dr. Mudd's cell," Dunn says. It is a sad quiet moment. "He cut that trench all the way around the walls and across the parapet to drain the condensation from the walls. He cut that trench with a spoon handle to get rid of what he once described to his wife as this most unendurable humidity."

"Imagine."

We can only imagine. The gusty air of the Gulf is welcome as we go up a crumbling stairway through a partially bricked-up door. Here we can see it all, from the black iron light-house tower added as a precaution decades ago, across angled roofs to the sea. Weeds and small bushes grow out of little soil-filled pickets in the brick.

The only noise, other than our occasional murmured remarks, is the cry of frigate birds wheeling insistently overhead.

We sit atop the mortars, staring out to sea. We do a final silent turn around the quadrangle, exit through the tunnel into the sun and board the plane.

Nobody says a word. We are airborne and climbing through angels—three before Dunn begins to nod his head. "It got to you too, right?" he asks.

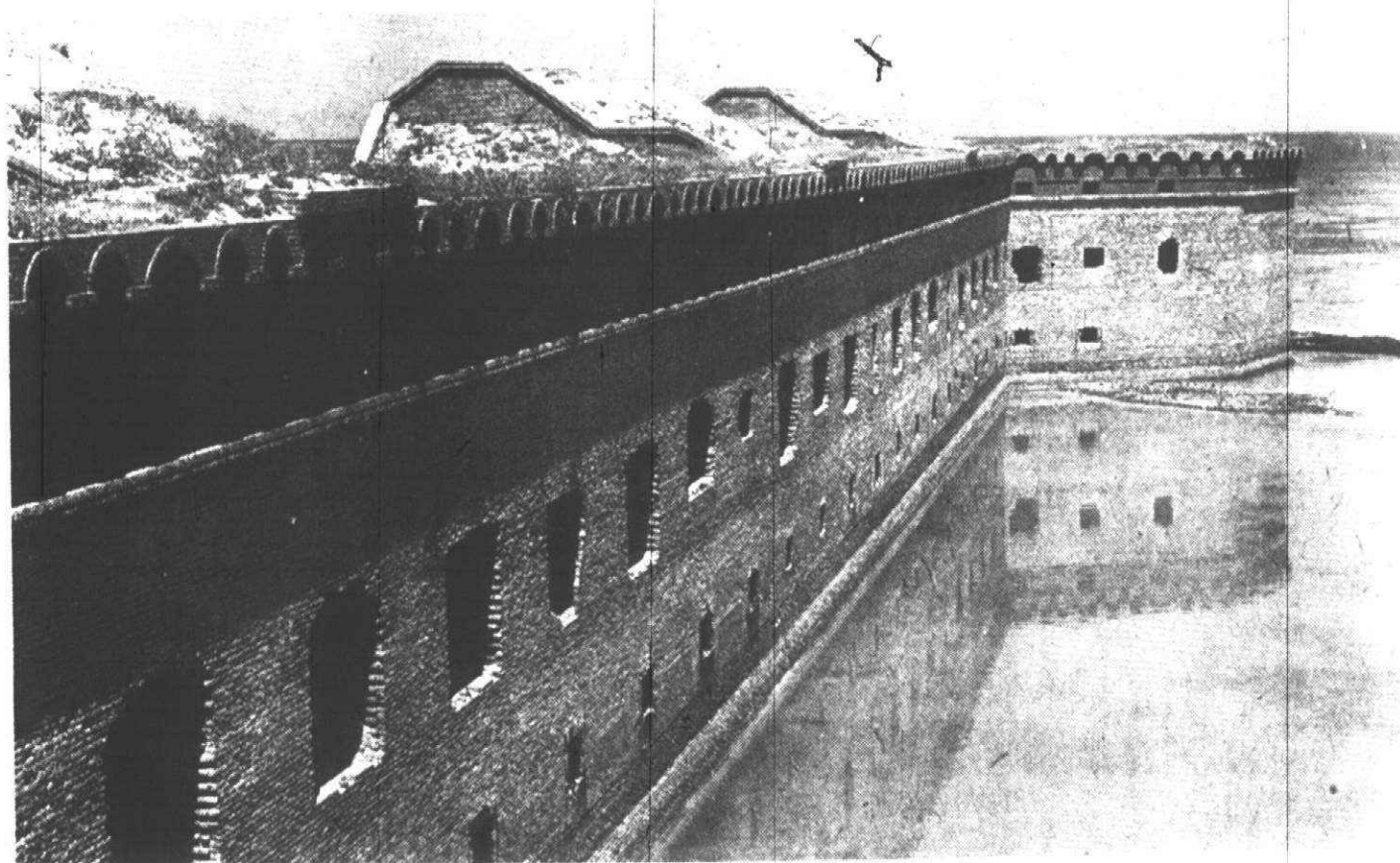
"Yes."

"It gets to everybody. It even gets to me, and I come here every day. There is something sad and special about that old place."

"It's been called the Gibraltar of the Gulf for a long time now. It stands out there on that little coral reef, beautiful, proud, lonely, sad and a little obscure. But it was well worth seeing, wouldn't you agree?"

Oh yes, we agree. It's an anachronism, but old Fort Jefferson is one of the most rewarding one-day excursions we've taken anywhere in the world.
