

Schools take serious look at budget trimming

Plymouth Canton schools are facing a \$1.26 million cut in the upcoming budget as the traditional 1979-80 school year comes to a close.

That's the amount the administration is now recommending be trimmed from a near \$40 million spending plan for 1980-81.

At a study session before the school board Monday, trustees gave the administration the green light to proceed with cuts that would reduce operating expenses at each school building, maintain existing school programs, and cut some administrative expenses.

While school money jugglers fear the state's climate is filled with "uncer-

tainties" that will effect revenues, they were satisfied with results of a recent school election that will partially ease their budget next year.

A potential loss of \$1.4 million was averted last week when district voters narrowly approved the tax continuation proposal.

Despite that good news, however, trustees learned that the state's school aide package is in limbo until sometime after the Nov. 4 general election.

It's expected, said school superintendent John Hoben, that a recent governor's executive cut of \$338,000 (in this district) will be followed by a possible \$52 million cut state-wide. (As

yet, there's no local estimate on the effect amount to Plymouth Canton schools).

"TO AVOID a second executive cut, the state is delaying the passage of the state aide bill at this time," said Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent of business.

"It's due to the large numbers of layoffs in Michigan and the uncertainty of state revenues which will be effected by a reduction in income and sales taxes."

Locally, the school's administration has recommended several areas for cutbacks. Among them are:

- A proposed cut in funds for instructional supplies in each school building by 10 percent. So far, a \$45,000 reduction has been tagged. These individual building allocations, termed "block grants," are generally used for such expenses as school supplies, text books, or any purchases related to student instruction.
- In an attempt to trim some \$100,000 in the new budget, it's proposed that some administrative positions be consolidated and others (now unfilled) be delayed in filling. This effort is still a work in progress, says Hoedel.
- So far, \$50,000 has been trimmed by eliminating two coordinator positions in the central maintenance department, effective this July. Also, it's planned to delay the replacement of the executive director of elementary instruction as well as the TAG (Talented and Gifted) coordinator. A replacement for the community relations director also has been delayed.
- Under study are two other administrative positions that may be consolidated with other jobs. Among these are the director of the ISEP (Infant Special Education Program) program and an elementary curriculum intern spot.

"It's a general tightening up to warm up for the 1981-82 school year," said Hoedel

ALREADY, there are some upcoming major expenses in that school year that will have a major impact on school finances.

At that time, the school district will be back into contract negotiations with unions; major boundary shifts will take place; grades will be realigned; Livonia's Lowell Junior High will be converted for use by this school district; and air conditioners will be a major expense to accommodate the Extended School Year in additional elementary schools.

What hasn't been effected by this

Backed-up sewers still pour woe on residents

David and Marleen Schiavolin are sick of the stench of sewer water.

They're tired of disinfecting their basement and discarding many of their belongings.

But the Schiavolins, who live in Canton's Brookside Village subdivision near I-275 and Cherry Hill, don't know where to turn.

Their basement flooded with sewer water for the third time in 14 months last Sunday.

Schiavolin figures his family lost \$7,000 worth of belongings in the infamous Good Friday flood of 1979 and another flood last Easter.

"Most of the things haven't been replaced," said Schiavolin after his basement flooded again on Sunday.

"I can't chance putting anything down there anymore. We'll have to clear everything out of the basement."

THE SCHIAVOLINS are among a handful of township residents who still are plagued by flooding problems.

Canton engineer Robert Wade said a half-dozen or so flooding complaints came from homeowners in Schiavolin's neighborhood during last Sunday's downpour and at Easter.

The reported problems are minimal compared to the hundreds of complaints that flooded township hall on April 13 and July 11 of last year, however. In the April flood, the basements

of 350 to 400 homes were filled with up to three feet of sewer water. Widespread basement flooding reoccurred in July. With the exception of Brookside Village, most of the complaints came from northern Canton.

Wade is hopeful that the flooding problem has been resolved for homeowners north of Ford Road.

The township spent \$126,000 last summer and fall for the repair of 144 manholes in in the northern half of Canton.

Wade believes that rain water entered the sanitary sewer system through defective manholes. The over-taxed system backed up into the basements of homes.

The engineer says the localized flooding in Schiavolin's neighborhood may be caused by a similar manhole problem.

But Wade believes that only one manhole south of Ford Road has been repaired to date.

EXTENSIVE REPAIRS won't be made for at least another few months.

The township must wait for federal approval of a Sewer System Evaluation Survey (SSES) for the area south of Ford Road, Wade said.

He expects the Environmental Protection Agency will approve Canton's grant application next month.

The survey, financed by \$160,000 in federal funds and \$40,000 in local mon-

ies, will pinpoint problems in the sewer system through smoke tests and other types of inspections.

A similar survey already has been conducted for the area north of Ford Road.

Wade said generalized tests conducted by Wayne County showed a need for detailed inspection work in only the area north of Ford. Canton made its application for the original SSES because of those findings.

"We did just enough work (south of Ford Road) to prove that the problems there are just as bad as in other areas," Wade said.

The engineer plans to ask township DPW workers to check the manholes in Brookside Village.

But the township cannot make extensive repairs without endangering federal funding of the SSES. The EPA will not approve grants for projects which have already been completed.

FOR THE SCHIAVOLINS, the flooding has created a different kind of financial problem.

The couple claimed a \$5,000 deduction on their 1979 federal income tax form because of losses in that year. But Schiavolin says he recouped only \$300 to \$400 from the claim.

He had partially finished his basement when three feet of sewer water filled the room in 1979. The washing machine and dryer broke down, and

many items stored in the basement were discarded.

"We heard people in the township say that that one was a rarity, so we moved things back in," Schiavolin said.

Three feet of sewer water again filled the basement last Easter. Last Sunday's flood was less severe — with only a few inches of water.

Items lost in the three floods include furniture, tools, personal mementos, electrical equipment and clothing.

The couple's two children — Danielle, 8, and David, 5 — have lost 85 percent of their toys because of the flooding problem, Mrs. Schiavolin figures. With the exception of games, all the toys were stored in the basement.

Mrs. Schiavolin saved many toys which were soaked in previous floods by washing and disinfecting every piece.

"But after the third time, I'm going to throw the toys and the other things out," she said. "I don't trust them anymore. I'm afraid the sewer water got into the crevices."

The toys won't be totally replaced for awhile — a decision which has made the kids "very unhappy, of course," said Mrs. Schiavolin.

But the couple is upset by more than material losses.

"You have to scrub everything by hand and sanitize it," said her husband. "It's about a three-week job cleaning the whole mess up."

Diagnosed for leukemia

Bobby, 4, warms heart of banker

On May 27, 4-year-old Bobby Bridges of Canton was diagnosed for leukemia.

Despite the heart-breaking news for his family, a gesture of friendship and help has arrived from an unexpected quarter.

"He's the cutest little stinker you ever saw. I just felt I had to do something," said Trudy Anderson, manager of the Livonia Manufacturers Bank office where Bobby's mother does business.

"I just found out about the leukemia. He's such a little guy. It just hurts to think about it."

MS. ANDERSON has opened a savings account for Bobby in the name of his parents — Katherine and Robert Bridges.

She established the trust fund to help defray the family's cost of driving to Children's Hospital in Detroit three times a week.

Bobby's mother said her son is receiving blood transfusions and chemotherapy treatments at the hospital. Although the family's insurance covers medical fees, Ms. Bridges said the cost of gasoline and parking

fees is creating difficulties for the family.

Ms. Bridges said she has been banking at the Livonia Manufacturers office for the past two years. During that time, she has chatted with Ms. Anderson on several occasions.

According to the bank manager, four employees of the Manufacturers office at 38047 Ann Arbor Road have contributed "a whole \$25" to Bobby's trust fund at this point.

But Ms. Anderson hopes to raise substantially more by extending a

plea to the community and workers at other branch offices of the bank.

"I plan to hit (bank employees) on payday," she said.

Ms. Bridges said her son has already received three chemotherapy treatments.

The leukemia diagnosis came as a complete surprise.

"He just came down with a fever for a couple of days," said Ms. Bridges. "We thought it was just a virus."

"The whole thing is still a nightmare."

Report indicates rise in crime

Crime is on the increase in Canton, according to the latest police statistics available.

However the overall picture may not be as bad as figures indicate.

Statistics for the first three months of 1980 show a 132-percent increase in

reported breakings and enterings over the same period in 1979.

The report cites a 14-percent increase in aggravated assaults and an 8-percent increase in larcenies.

The document provides the first evidence supporting the belief that those types of crimes are becoming more

common, according to Lt. Larry Stewart.

But he attributes part of this trend to Canton's increasing population and the fact that more citizens are calling township police for assistance.

More reliable data on the incidence of crime in Canton should be available by the end of the year.

accurately assess criminal activity, however.

For example, the report shows a 300-percent increase in kidnapping and sexual assaults for the first three months of 1980. Two reported cases in February and one in March accounted for the dramatic increase.

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TOWNSHIP POLICE are aware that crime has increased dramatically since the department was established on a part-time basis in 1976.

But until now, comparing crime statistics for previous years has been just about impossible.

Canton police did not begin full-time operations until May 1978.

Many residents and business persons continued to call the Wayne County Sheriff's Department and the Michigan State Police, even after full-time operations began.

Sheriff Department records fail to list crimes according to community. Canton police could not use those records to assess the local crime level.

Stewart said the quarter-year comparison recently compiled by Chief Jerry Cox is the first report that compares apples to apples. The vast majority of citizens now call Canton police for assistance.

Quarter-year samplings of many types of crime prove too restrictive to

City OKs hefty rink expense

Equipment is being upgraded in the Plymouth Community Cultural Center in an attempt to put the facility on a paying basis.

Monday night the Plymouth City Commission approved the expenditure of \$60,740 for a second water tower and a third air compressor and another \$3,354 for a portable dance floor.

When the Cultural Center was originally built, explained City Manager Henry Graper, the ice rink was operated only during the winter months.

Now the ice season extends from early September to late May or early June, said Graper, a third compressor and a second water tower is needed to keep the air cool enough for the ice rink.

Without the second water tower the pressure on the air circulating systems would keep blowing out compressors, said Graper, and so it is more economical to invest in the water tower.

Earlier the city had carpeted the larger multi-purpose room in the Cultural Center to improve the acoustics for musical presentations. That step was taken, said Graper, with full

knowledge that a portable dance floor would have to be purchased later for wedding receptions.

Right now the city is paying about \$50 per night to rent a portable dance floor for the times it rents the Cultural Center for a wedding reception.

Without a portable dance floor, Graper estimated the city would lose half of its rental income from the Cultural Center.

The money for the water tower and compressor will come from the 1981-82 Community Development Act funds.

Initially, added Graper, the city will borrow the \$60,000 from the municipal building authority which is selling bonds to renovate city hall.

The city won't have to pay the building authority back until later next year when the money will be needed to finance the city hall renovation. At that point the city will have its Community Development Act funds from the federal government.

The city originally received the CDA funds to finance an expansion to the Cultural Center for a senior citizen drop-in center.

After Graper decided to move the drop-in center to Tonquish Creek Manor, the county gave the city permission to spend the CDA funds on other renovations of the Cultural Center. The final improvement for the center, in the current plan, is to spend \$36,000 for a dehumidification system.

These changes, when completed, will put the facility into proper condition so it will pay for itself from an operational standpoint, said Graper.

"We must sell ice time until the debt for the center is paid for — that decision was made the year the facility was built. After we pay off the debt, we then can look at other possible uses."

"But if we don't buy this equipment now we won't be able to operate the ice rink in the future. With these changes I think we will be able to cover the operating expenses, although payments for the debt always will come from the general fund."

Graper added that today it would cost \$6 million to build the Cultural Center. "So we have a large investment and should plan to spend so much each year to maintain it."

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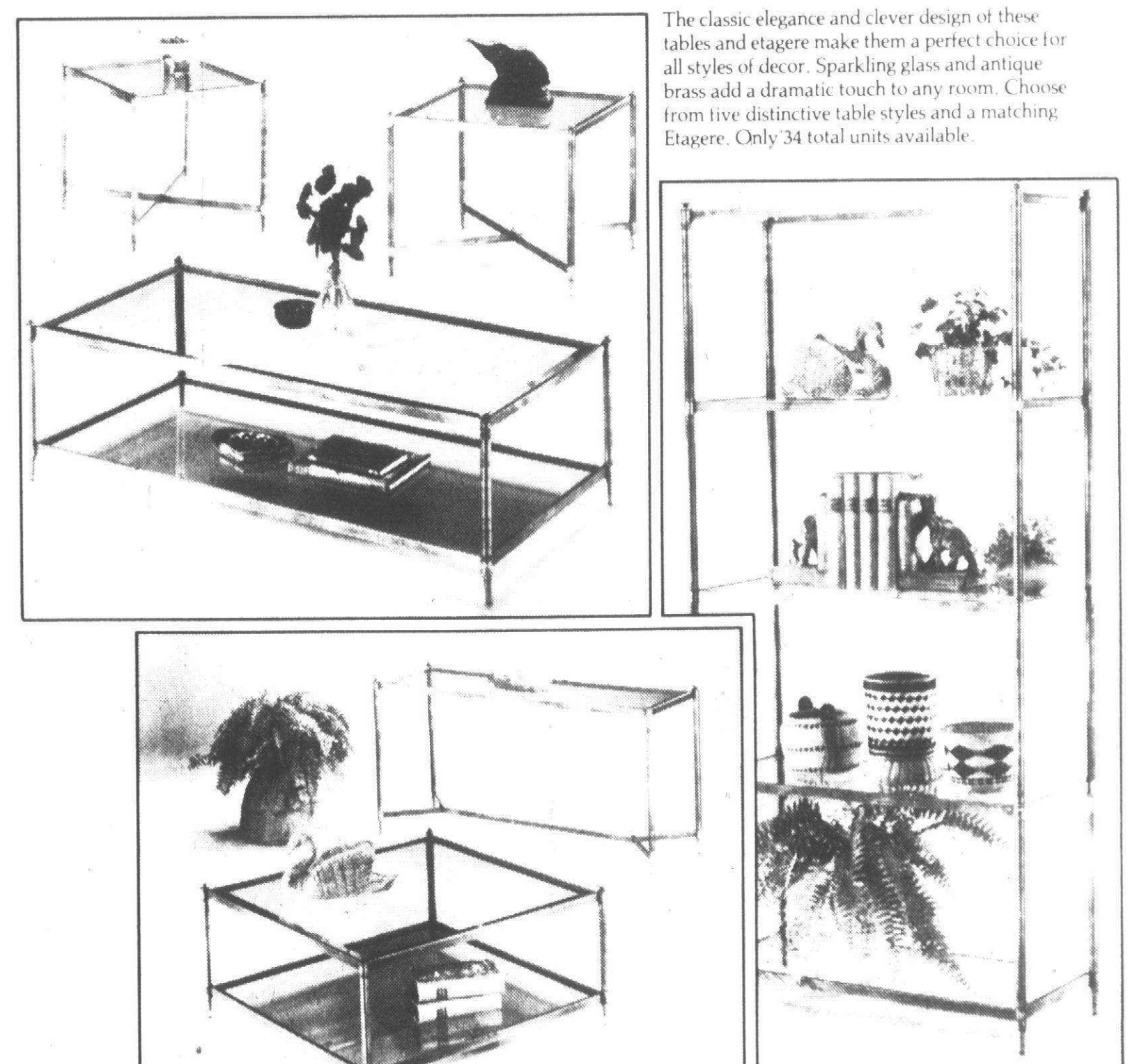

Gettin' ready for party

The world is coming to Detroit.

Preparations for the Republican National Convention are well under way and Michigan Bell Telephone is undertaking the single largest assignment in its history — providing all of the communication needs and services of convention participants.

Because the gathering is one of the most intensive media events in the world, Bell started its plans shortly after site selection in January 1979.

Bell expects to have all personnel associated with the convention assembled in Detroit by the end of this week. By now more than 75 percent of the work has been completed.

"The organization is functioning," is the status description given by Burke Campbell of Birmingham, coordinator of sales and service for Michigan Bell.

Bell's task has been to design, engi-

neer, and build a phone company within a phone company — large enough to serve a population of 25,000.

Television demands alone require Bell to do in four days the volume of business normally done in one year.

After the Winter Olympics, Bell bought its television equipment and shipped it to a site adjacent to Cobo Hall. A trailer known as a Television Operations Center now houses the sophisticated machinery.

ALL TELEVISION signals from the Joe Louis Arena will be received, monitored and transmitted from the Television Operations Center.

The three major networks are expected to spend between \$6 million to \$8 million for their convention coverage. The Joe Louis Arena television booths now being assembled will cost

about \$300,000 each and will be torn down immediately after the last gavel sounds.

With a task force of almost 500 people, Michigan Bell will install, maintain and then remove some 10,000 telephones and 6,000 lines for candidates, state delegations, and media.

About 25,000 miles of telephone cable and wires have been installed to serve the convention — enough, if stretched end to end, to encircle the earth.

Michigan Bell predicts it will spend \$1.2 million on the convention and will not make a profit.

Rates approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission were designed to recover the costs of specialized services and facilities to be provided. Much of what Bell installs will be re-used, however, after the convention.

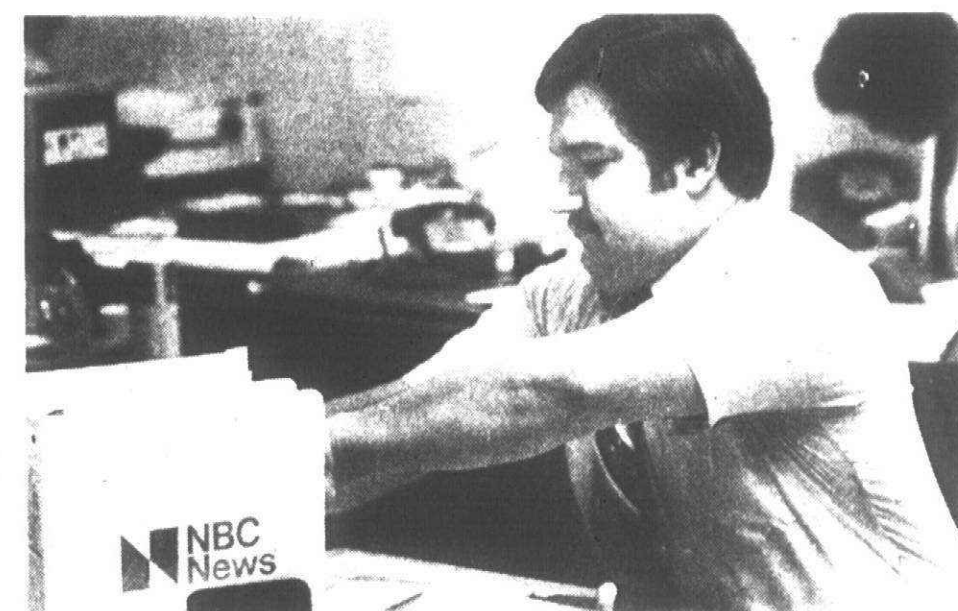

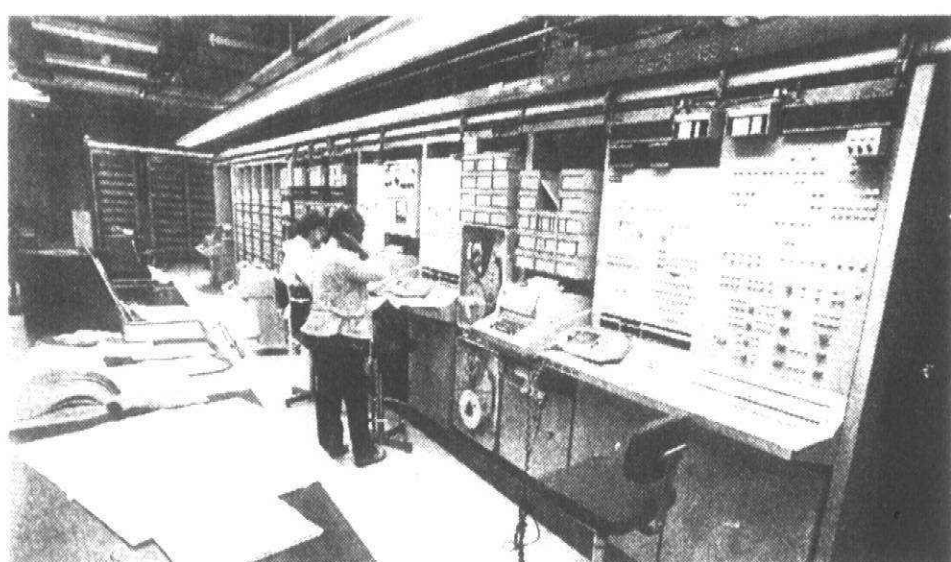

Visiting the operation are Burke Campbell, Michigan Bell sales and service coordinator, and Raymond Norton, Bell's TV operation's manager.



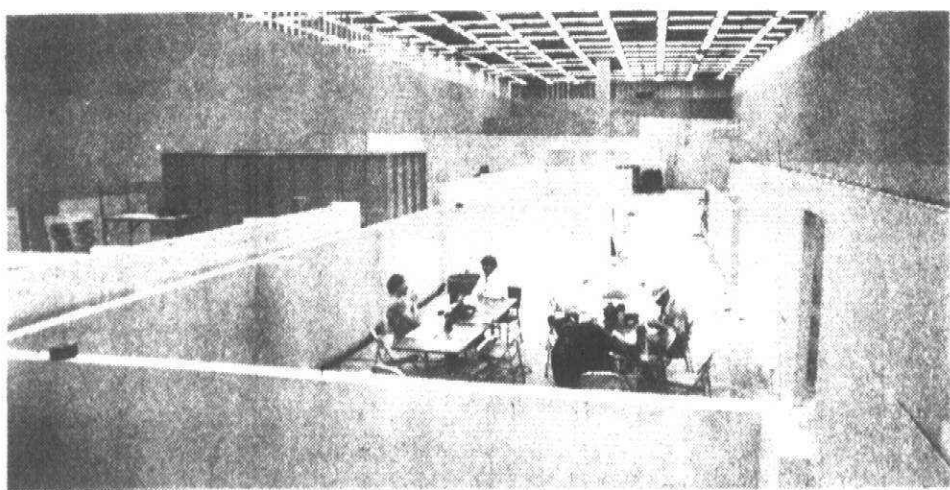

Workers break for lunch in a section of Cobo Hall which will be used later by CBS crews.

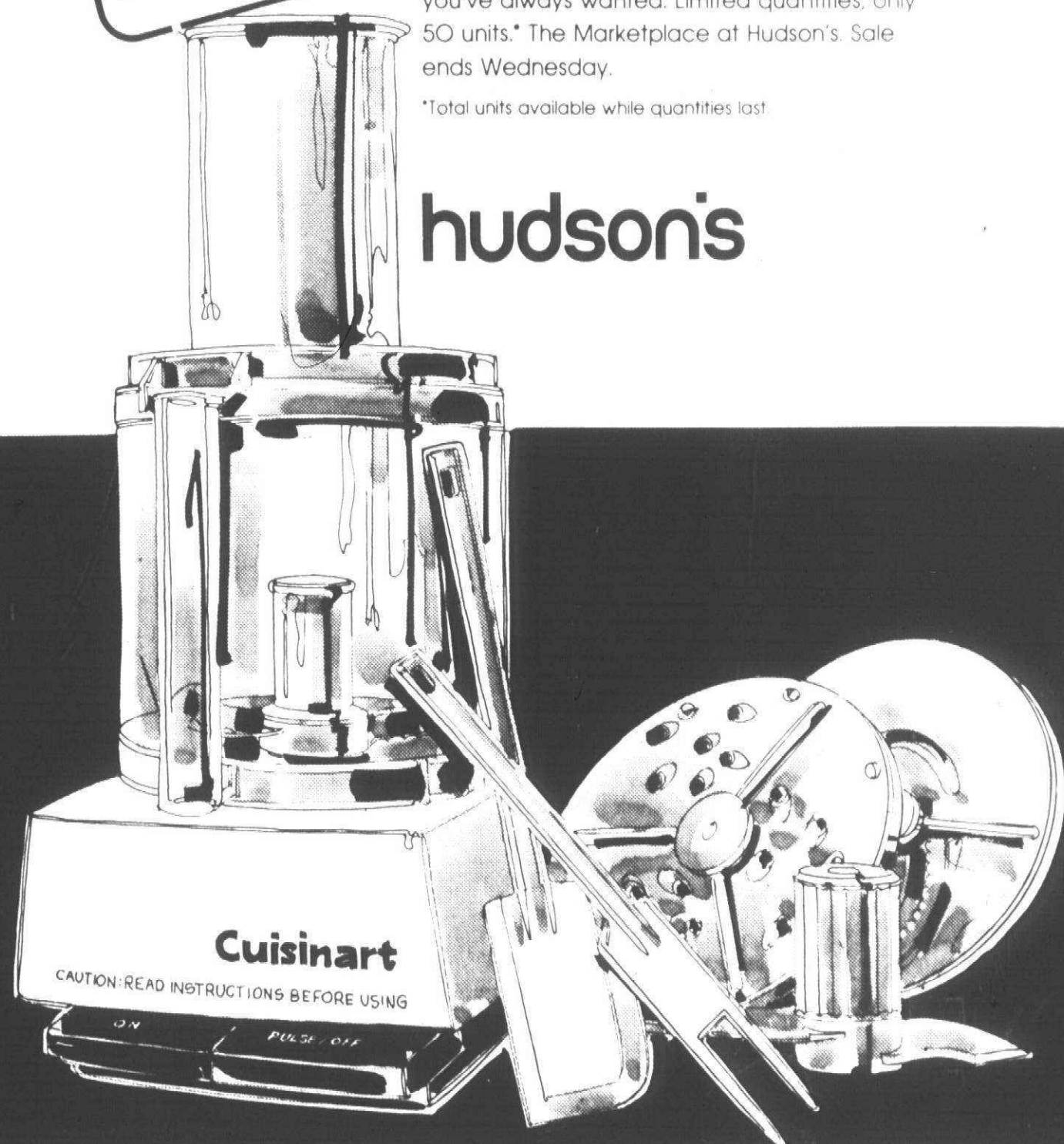

phase of the budget cuts are the teacher-student ratios at all levels. There are no plans to reduce the teaching staff. The ratio, so far, is expected to remain at 23 to 1 at the elementary level, 22.5 to 1 at the middle school level, and 22 to 1 at the high school level.

Among other proposed "tightening the belt" moves was a plan to elimi-

nate a school employee fitness program that was introduced last year. At a \$50 per employee fee, Hoben said he "didn't anticipate" justifying this cost.

REMAINING in next year's plans are some general upkeep measures such as roof repairs to West Middle School and a furnace reconversion at Allen Elementary.

Plans to replace Starweather Ele-

mentary School's boiler have been shelved, however.

It was also agreed that the district will retain a standard fund balance to help ease the uncertainty of the 1981-82 budget year.

Taking the lead in supporting this administrative recommendations was board treasurer Steve Harper.

"We're in good shape if we stay within 3-5 percent of our revenues," he said.

(The fund balance at the close of the 1979-80 school year is projected at \$2,124,000).

Monday's meeting was the second budget review before the board. Another is planned in August following the release of the annual budget audit.

Although the school's fiscal year begins again this July 1, the finalized 1980-81 budget is not subject for adoption until Oct. 13.

4 Wheelers come to aid of widow

In the midst of an all-day rain storm recently local members of the Wolverine-4-Wheelers spent Father's Day helping a Jackson area property owner.

The club members spent the day on the property of Chica McCabe cleaning up and closing the land to off-roaders and bikers.

"As four-wheelers we know of the damage which can be caused by unchecked, heavy off-roading," explains Jill Lockhart of Plymouth, secretary of the organization.

"When we saw what people had been doing to the land owned by Chica McCabe, we felt it was our duty to try and rectify the damage."

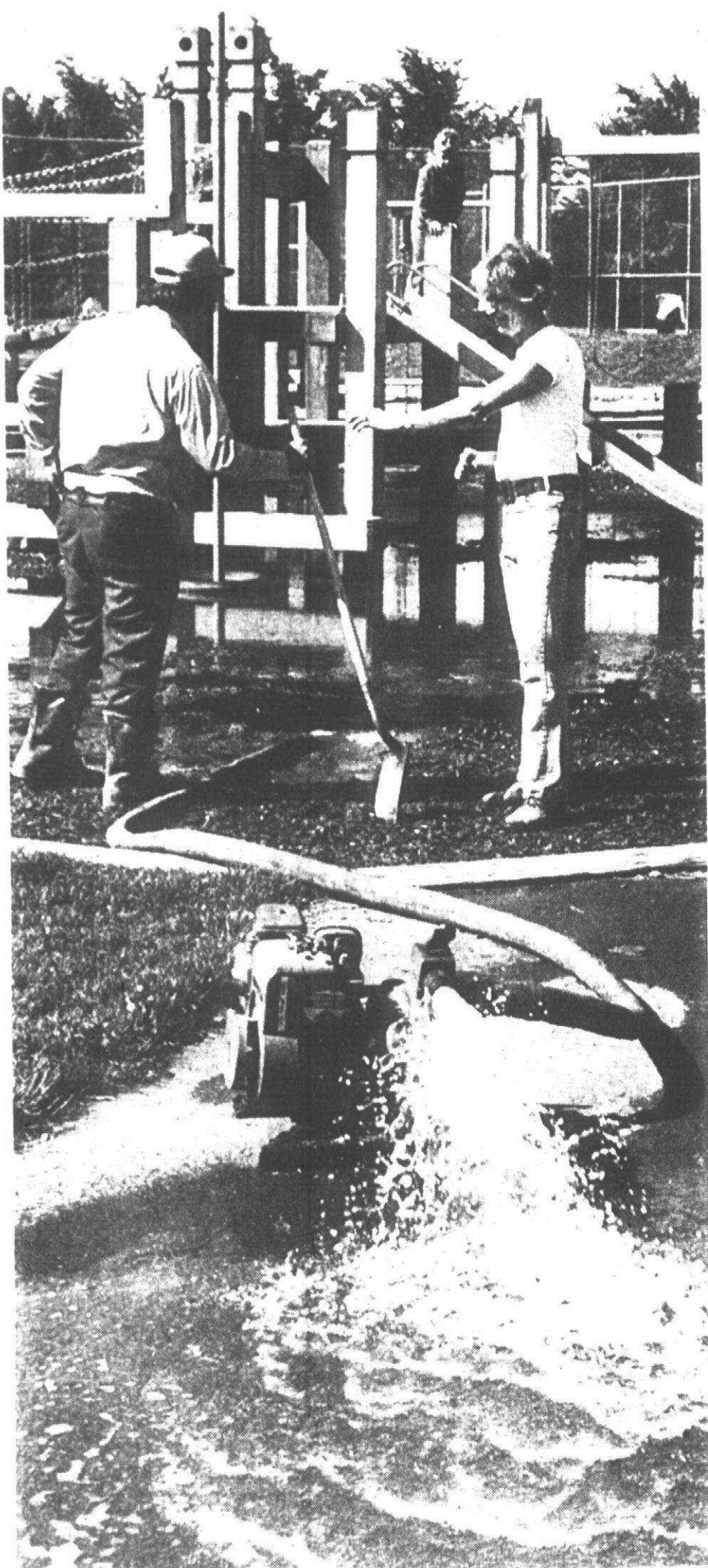
"The property, known as Warrior Hill, was originally homesteaded by her family and has, in the last 10 years, been destroyed by illegal and renegade off-roaders and bikers because there is a lack of state land open to off-the-road vehicles (ORVs). This property also was used as a dumping site."

"We can't fix all the property in the state that is damaged by off-roaders, but we can try."

"What we are trying to do," added Ms. Lockhart, "is show that organized off-roaders are trying to help the communities, not only in cleaning up private properties but also in pulling out log jams in the Rouge River for the Detroit Chamber of Commerce and helping the Civil Defense in transporting doctors and others in snow emergencies."

The Wolverine-4-Wheelers is Michigan's largest four-wheel drive club and is affiliated with the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, the Great Lakes Four-Wheel Drive Association, the United Four-Wheel Drive Association, and the National Wildlife Federation.

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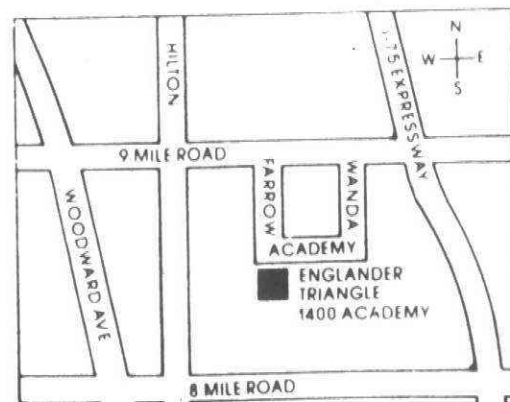

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What's at stake in fight over county reform

Two western Wayne County state senators have joined a group that will be urging a yes vote on the Aug. 5 county charter commission referendum.

Ironically, many of the suburban communities that state Sens. William Faust, D-Westland, and R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, represent are part of a lawsuit that might knock the charter commission issue off the primary election ballot.

AT ISSUE is how the charter districts will be drawn. The suburban cities are fighting a 1972 apportionment plan that would give the city of Detroit the same 16-11 charter commission majority it now has on the county Board of Commissioners.

The suburban communities, which have organized a group called Wayne County Communities for Equal Representation, want the 1980 census used to draw the charter districts. They say the '80 population figures will show a 50-50 split between Detroit and the largely suburban out-county.

That population split, say some suburban officials, could mean two more suburban representatives on the county board, a bonus they want on the charter commission should it be approved by voters Aug. 5.

The charter commission would propose county government reorganization, primarily a restructuring of Wayne's multi-layered government under an elected county executive or county board appointed manager.

SEN. FAUST, who could not be reached for comment earlier this week, is co-chairman of "Citizens to Reform Wayne County," a group endorsed by New Detroit Inc., the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce and other organizations which will be urging a yes vote on creation of the charter commission based on the '72 apportionment.

Sen. Geake, who had a hand in writing the state legislation giving the charter group its power, has also joined the group.

Geake said the effect of a population shift to the suburbs has been "greatly exaggerated."

He said suburban communities would gain "one or possibly two seats" on a charter commission if 1980 census data were used.

Geake said a population shift since 1970 "has been fairly substantial" but said its effect on the 27-district county may be minimal.

Geake said the legislature approved using "1970 census lines in order to save time because Wayne County government is in such chaos, in such poor shape fiscally that we should not wait for 1980."

The county faces a deficit estimated to be between \$19 million and \$22 million at the end of its current fiscal year.

The county's recurring deficit has led to Gov. William Milliken vetoes of state aid for the county court system and state refusal to allow the county to borrow money. Milliken has insisted on county government reorganization before any new state commitments are made for financial help.

A REPRESENTATIVE from New Detroit Inc., a coalition of business, government and labor formed after the 1967 Detroit riots, met with several western Wayne County local officials last week to present the same argument — that the suburbs would only gain one seat at the county level based on the 1980 census.

"That's nonsense," said city of Wayne councilman Milton Mack Jr., vice-chairman of communities for equal representation.

"We see a shift of at least two seats, which puts us right in the balance of who's in control (of the county board)."

"With 1980 figures we may find . . . a lot more influence (at the county level) going to the suburbs," Mack said.

Mack sees a possible suburban-Detroit split of 13-13 on the 27-member county board, with one "swing district" as a result of the 1980 census.

But Larry Horwitz, New Detroit vice president who met with suburban officials at Livonia City Hall last week, said that prediction doesn't coincide with what a University of Michigan population expert hired by the suburbs has shown.

An apportionment plan based on 1978 population estimates, drafted by Professor David Goldberg, shows 14 seats for Detroit, including Highland Park and Hamtramck, 12 for the suburbs and one swing district.

Goldberg's population estimates are being used in the suburban group's lawsuit.

LIVONIA MAYOR Edward McNamara, who organized last week's meeting between Horwitz and suburban officials, sees the population dispute as one of "different emphasis on the same figures."

"One side (New Detroit) plays it down," said McNamara, "while to the other it makes all the difference in the world."

McNamara, who said he will support the charter commission proposal in August, sees a shift of one county seat or a change of two votes — one less for the Detroit bloc, one additional for the out-county.

Regarding the Horwitz presentation, McNamara said, "I don't know if it changed any minds. The point of no return has been passed. There's still an issue. Maybe it's not as strong as it used to be."

The Livonia City Council voted last month to contribute to the suburban group's lawsuit based on a 5 cents per capita formula. That decision won't be reconsidered, McNamara said.

ALTHOUGH THE communities suing for equal representation are not campaigning for a no vote against the charter commission Aug. 5, they have asked the courts to delay the election until 1980 census figures are available to draw charter districts.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Susan Borman lifted a temporary restraining order preventing ballot preparation for the charter referendum. The suburban group is now asking the Court of Appeals to halt the election.

"We all want reorganization," said Mack. "We question the process."

Geake said one of the legislative compromises negotiated to pass the county reorganization act was to allow voters to choose between county government led by an elected executive — favored by the suburbs — and one led by a board-appointed manager — favored by Detroit.

He said the state law requires the charter commission to submit identical charters to voters except for the differences in how a top administrator would be selected.

McNamara and Horwitz both cite statistics that a "majority of potential voters" live in the suburbs. Suburban residents have shown more of a tendency to vote, said McNamara, than younger, central city residents.

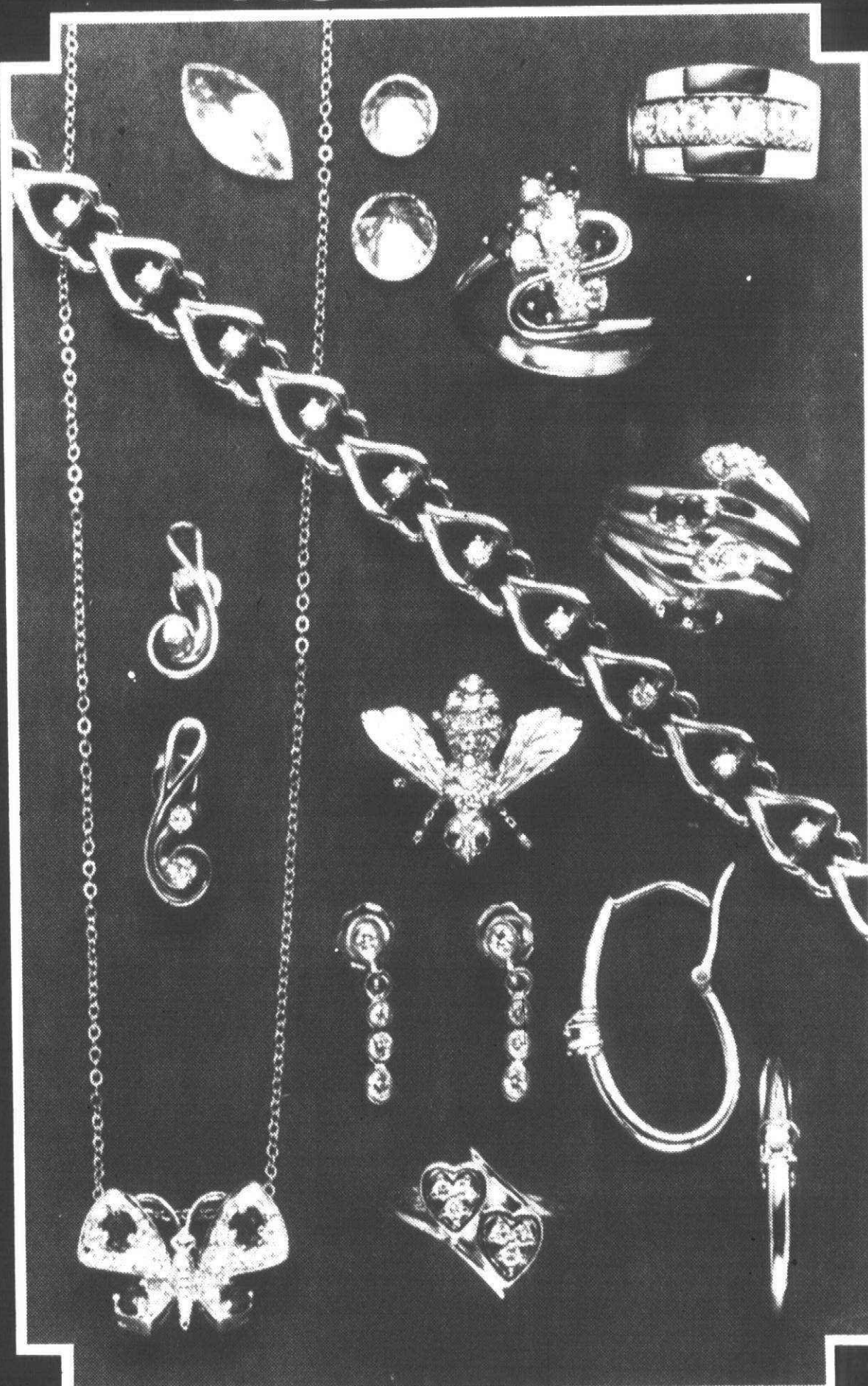

Convention planning

Western 'reaches out' to the GOPs

When conventioners and national media folk begin descending on Cobo Hall and Joe Louis Arena this July, you can bet that Western Electric in Plymouth Township will be right in touch.

The company, with a local assembly plant on Sheldon Road, has a professional interest at stake in the day-to-day operations of the week-long GOP Presidential Convention.

It was in Plymouth Township that technicians and engineers set up the ground-work communications system for the media reps and convention-goers.

Beginning July 14, the convention site will be strung up with more than 1,500 phones at a cost of \$2.5 million.

According to one Western Electric foreman, there'll be enough communications power at the convention site in Detroit to equip a community the size of Birmingham, "with a lot extra."

While all the phones have yet to be installed, the central receiving offices for those calls were built in April.

And unlike any other system, built for temporary use, these offices were built in advance — and on wheels.

The mobile units, valued at \$40,000 each, were built in standard size travel trailers. It's the work of these units to connect all calls within the convention sites as well as transfer those to areas outside of Detroit.

The design of a mobile unit is the first to be tried at any major happening.

AMONG THE architects of this system are Henry Grytza, a foreman at Western Electric, and

Michigan Bell engineer Emil Bohn.

Grytza hopes this design will become the prototype for other conventions and gatherings that need audio communications.

Each national network will be wired into one of the six units and it's planned that radio broadcasts will also be tied into the system. Just by picking up a phone, a radio announcer could be "on the air" for any audience around the country.

Grytza and Bohn believe that a key feature in such a system is that it reduces the last-minute hookup on the scene that generally occurs at conventions. It also keeps the expensive technology out from under the feet of the crowds.

"This is unique because it's prepackaged," says Grytza. "Everything's complete and done in advance."

"It also saves time and money in the field," adds Bohn.

GRYSTZA SAYS Michigan Bell and Western Electric employees toured the sites of previous national conventions, in New York and Kansas City, to get some ideas on how to rig up such a system in Detroit.

"Out of those visits, we dreamt up what you see here."

"This was just pure guess work, based on what we saw at the other conventions," says Bohn.

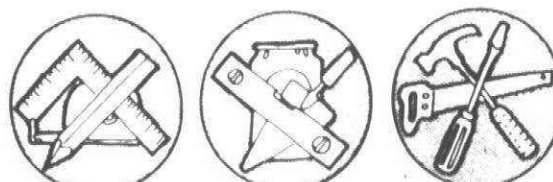
Bohn adds that once the convention is underway, some 200 technicians will be on hand to insure the phone lines are working. Almost three-quarters of those technicians will be shipped in from out-of-town.

"They're coming in from all over the country — California, Boston, Nevada."

And if you think the novelty of this invention hasn't intimidated the pair, as yet, you only have to see the beads of sweat forming on their foreheads.

"If this doesn't work — you see that post over there," Grytza says as he points, somewhat animated. "Emil will be strung up on one side and I'll be on the other."

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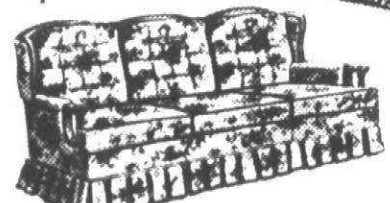

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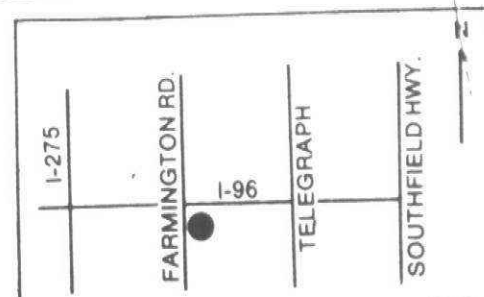

Yusef Lateef

His music is 'auto-physio-psyhic'

Yusef Lateef describes his music as auto-physio-psyhic. When you label him a jazz musician, you are likely to be reproved.

"I don't use the term 'jazz musician,'" he said during an interview before a recent engagement at Baker's Keyboard Lounge in Detroit. "That's an ambiguous term."

The articulate Lateef holds a Ph.D. in education from the University of Massachusetts. He would prefer to talk about the evolution of his concept of composition and improvisation and the spiritual stimulation for his music.

"Basically, what stimulates me is the love of God and his creation," said the former Detroit, who came to embrace the religion of Islam more than 30 years ago. "The purpose of life is to do good while I live, to my family and to mankind in whatever way I can. This realization of this purpose stimulates my music."

Lateef was one of the first "jazz" musicians to incorporate Middle Eastern and Asian influences into his work. He had a less exotic but substantial grounding in music by playing with, and being associated with, some of the best Detroit jazz players in the '30s, '40s and '50s.

ALTHOUGH HE once played in Detroit with a band called the Spirits of Swing, he also had opportunities to work with the likes of Kenny Burrell, Paul Chambers, Barry Harris, Terry Pollard, Louis Hayes, Doug Watkins, Donald Byrd, Thad Jones and "even Miles Davis who played around here for a couple of years."

Lateef began his recording career in the '50s and has recorded many albums in which he plays not only the various woodwinds, like his original instrument, the tenor sax, but also diverse and strange musical instruments as sealhorns, oboe, African thumb piano, shannai, argol and rebab.

Yusef Lateef will appear at 5 p.m. July 22 at Renaissance Live on the Ontario Level Deck of the Detroit Plaza Hotel in Renaissance Center. Tickets are \$7, available in advance at the hotel's front desk. For more information, call 568-8317.

His early flute work helped to pioneer that instrument's jazz development. His willingness to widen the boundaries of jazz — including unorthodox melodies as well as exotic instruments — has set him apart from his contemporaries. Nonetheless, he has never lost his ability to play straight-ahead jazz with undiminished improvisational skill.

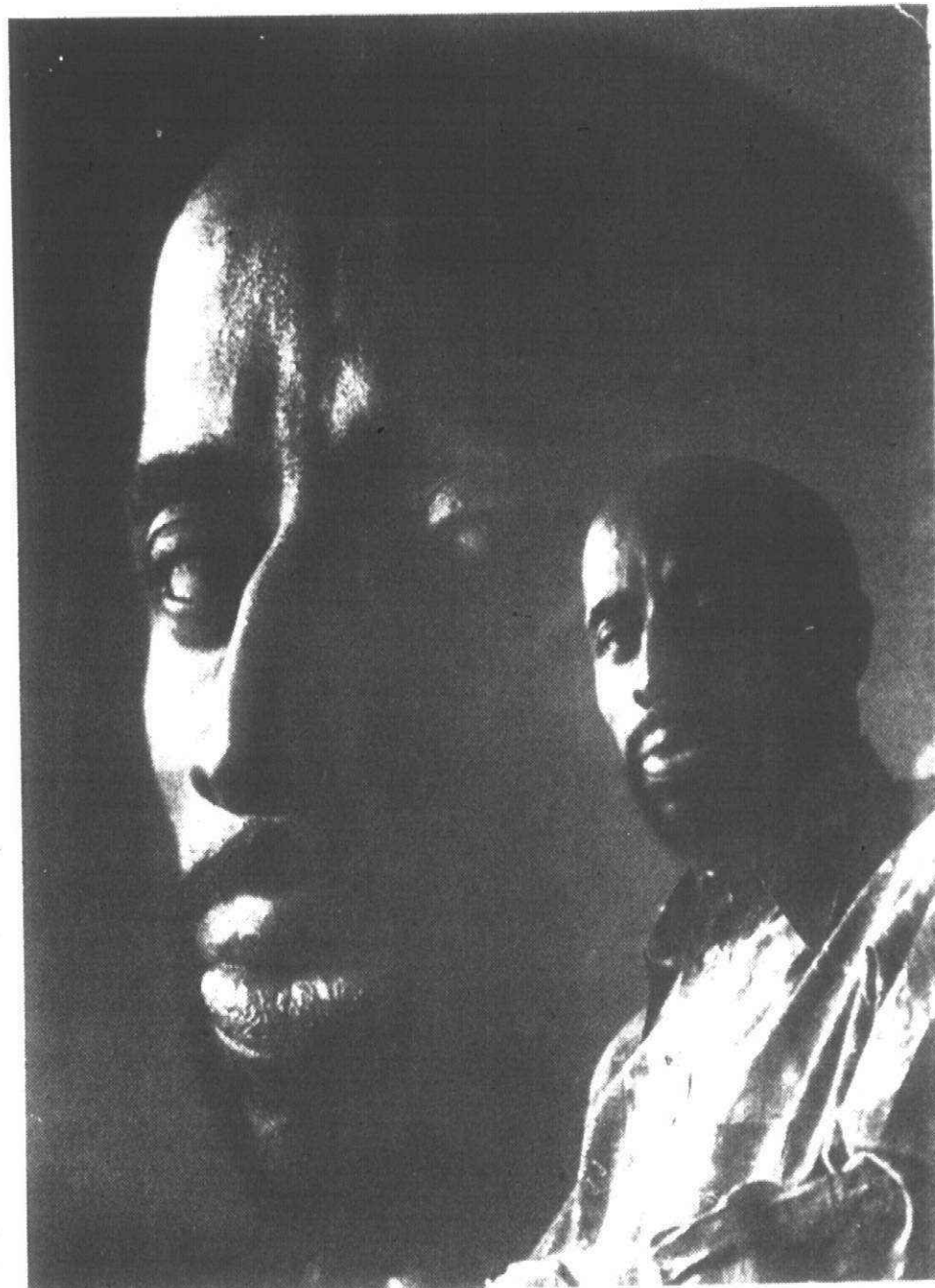
He continues to record frequent albums, and his latest is called "In a Temple Garden." The same boundless energy and search for new personal modes of expression has led him to write plays, music and short stories.

"I'm working on a thesaurus of music which I want to finish this year. After that, I want to go back to a two-act play I started, and then I want to write some large musical works like symphonies. I've done some suites and tone poems before, but not a symphony yet," he said.

LATEEF HAS published two plays and a book of short stories entitled "Spheres." He has finished several more short stories that are "laying in a file" and he has also started a novel that he wants to get back to soon.

Lateef said he has no new musical directions this year "unless you call constant evolution new." Defining what he means by auto-physio-psyhic, which he has often used to describe his music, he said it means turning inward to find his music.

"I turn inward for inspiration and information. My music is a reaction to accumulated information which is coupled to inspiration at the moment."

Many of the film societies have adjourned for the summer, which means that our main source of cinema for a while will be television. The Redford Theatre, Bloomfield Township Public Library and some shows at Detroit's Institute of Art and Public Library will dot this column in future weeks, but for today, we're switching on the tube.

"Destry Rides Again," 1 p.m. today on Channel 50. Made in 1939, running time 94 minutes.

Notable for a few things: A very young Jimmy Stewart, Marlene Dietrich singing "See what the boys in the back room will have" and some Western satire that finds pacifist Stewart taming a wild, wild town. Directed by George Marshall.

"Murder, He Says," 1 p.m. Friday on Channel 50. Made in 1945, running time 91 minutes.

Another George Marshall film, this one finding Fred MacMurray — minus his three sons — as a poor man's version of the insurance agent he played in "Double Indemnity" the year before, wrapped up with murderous hillbilly family led by Marjorie "Tugboat Annie" Main. Romance, slapstick and black humor easily interwoven.

"Monkey Business," 12:30 a.m. Friday night on Channel 50. Made in 1931, running time 77 minutes.

The third Marx Brothers film, featuring Thelma Todd and Tom Kennedy. Here we have the brothers as stowaways aboard a ship to America. Upon arrival, in order to pass through customs, each one poses as heartthrob Maurice Chevalier singing "If a nightingale could sing like you." Harpo tops them all by miming the real Chevalier and pulling a phonograph that is playing the record out from under his coat. Written by the incomparable S.J. Perelman.

"Tarzan's Secret Treasure," 11:30 a.m. Saturday on Channel 50. Made in 1941, running time 81 minutes.

Noteworthy because WKBD is finally getting back to the Johnny Weissmuller-Maureen O'Sullivan Tarzan films. Johnny's worth a dozen Lex Barkers, Denny Millers, Ron Elys and Mike Henrys put together, and Maureen (currently on Broadway in the Toni award-winning "Mornings at Seven") remains unsurpassed.

"Titanic," 1 p.m. Saturday on Channel 50. Made in 1953, running time 98 minutes.

Who'd have thought that Clifton Webb, Barbara Stanwyck, Robert Wagner, Brian Aherne and Thelma Ritter would even begin to go down with the ship. An early "Airport" for all its Hollywoodisms, not as good as the 1958 British version, "A Night to Remember."

"The Curse of the Cat People," midnight Saturday on Channel 50. Made in 1944, running time 70 minutes.

Val Lewton was in his heyday as a director of B horror films. He'd already made the acclaimed "Cat People" in '42, again with import Simone Simon who appears in this sequel. Much better than you might think because "Curse" is more psychological chiller than monster film. Lewton was the best of his genre.

"Romeo and Juliet," 9 p.m. Sunday on Channel 7. Made in 1966, running time 138 minutes.

OK, so you know how it's going to end, but Franco Zeffirelli's version of the Shakespeare tale is better than most and beautifully filmed. Olivia Hussey and Leonard Whiting are fine as the star-crossed lovers; the music of Fellini protégé Nino Rote is perfect.

"Anna Karenina," 1:35 a.m. Monday night on Channel 7. Made in 1935, running time 95 minutes.

Not many Garbo films cross the screen these days, so you'd better tune in on "Anna." Fredric March and Basil Rathbone play opposite in Tolstoy's story of tragic love. Lots of pregnant closeups, that sort of thing. Enjoy yourself.

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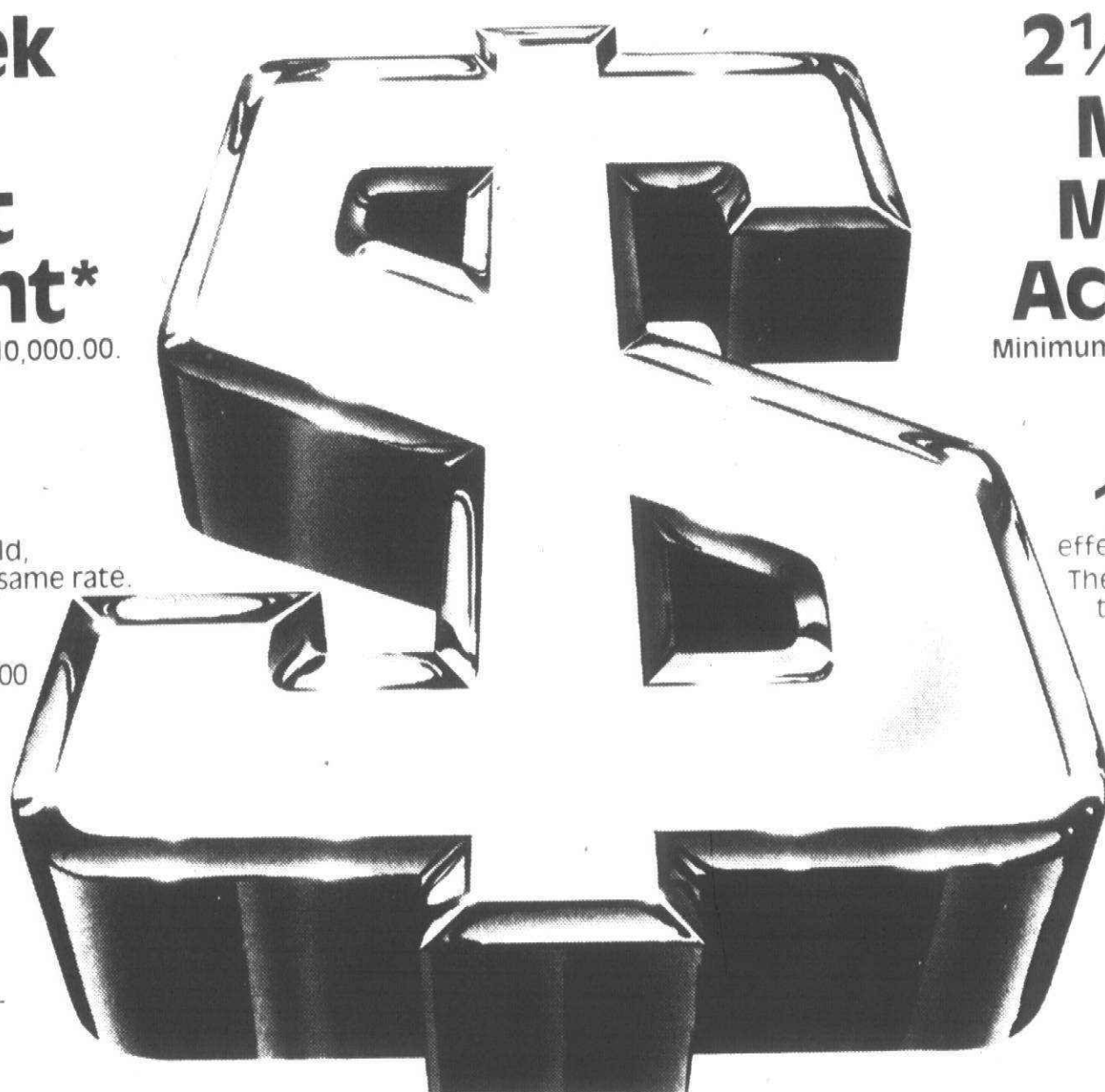
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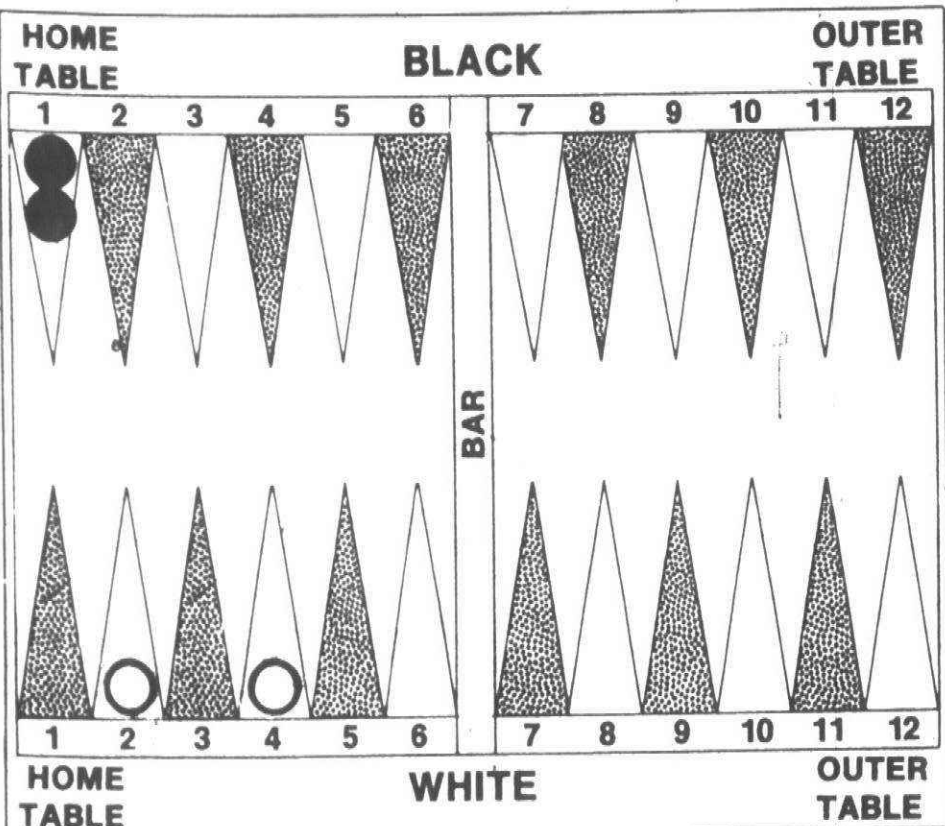

CUBE TIME

The end of a backgammon game usually comes when the use of the doubling cube becomes most evident — when the outcome of a game will be determined in a few rolls and various consequences can be more precisely calculated.

In this position, white is on roll. Should white double? If white doubles, should black accept?

The answer to both questions is yes.

White has 23 out of 36 possible rolls that will bear off both checkers on the next roll, winning the game. There are 13 out of 36 possible rolls that will lose the game for white — all the ones, plus two-three and three-two. White has a strong advantage to win and must double in order to not allow black a free ride to see if he will hit one of those 13 unlucky rolls. This is called making black "pay to play."

Black should "pay to play" in this case and accept the double. Those 13

unlucky rolls for white work out to about a 36 percent chance of black winning.

The rule of thumb on accepting a double (called a take) is that you should have at least a 25 percent chance (3-to-1 odds) of winning the game. Using this rule, you should win slightly more points in the long run than if you were to play safe and decline the cube in these cases.

The biggest problem with the 25 percent take rule is that except for well-defined end game situations like this one, it is very difficult — and sometimes impossible — to calculate a win percentage in the mid-game or early game.

Proper take situations are often very opinionated, just like the game of backgammon itself.

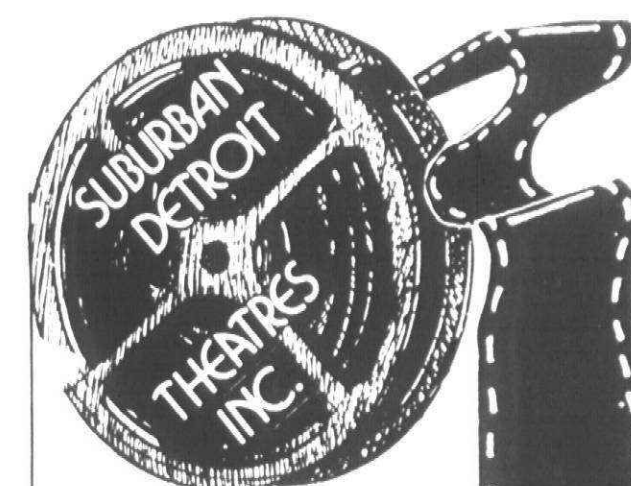

Explaining Burgundy is not that easy

What's in a name? A great deal indeed if the name is "Burgundy." For there are, in the broad world of wines, two Burgundies, and they have little or no commonality between them.

When the word is applied to French Burgundy, it takes in some of the truly great wines of this world, both red and white. While the Burgundy region of France includes Chablis, Macon, Chalon and Beaujolois, the non-modified use of the term usually refers to the great wines of the Cote d'Or. This is the area between Dijon and Clagny, less than 40 miles in length.

With the Cote d'Or (Slopes of Gold) are the great Cotes de Nuits and Cotes de Beaune. Both produce their red and white wines from, respectively, single grapes, the Pinot Noir and the Chardonnay.

The latter is used down as far as the Maconnais while the Pinot Noir is useable only in the cooler north. A different clone is used down in Beaujolois, related but distinctly different.

THE WORD Burgundy, in most people's minds, however, conjures up images of red wine exclusively. Certainly, the great red wines of Burgundy have, for centuries, represented the ultimate in wine consumption and to many they continue to do so today.

So it was perhaps only natural that recently (from the time perspective of wine) when prohibition ended in this country the fledgling winemakers in California would seek out a name for their red product.

Some initially used Claret (the British term for Bordeaux wines), some Chianti and others a variety of European place names of established quality to call their wines. But Burgundy has been the name that has survived and is most common.

The Californians could do this name-stealing with impunity. The same holds for Champagne, Chablis, Rhine and Sauterne. No law restricts that kind of practice. The French and Germans do not like it, but can't stop it, though they continue to try.

But wait, the plot thickens. Not only does the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, which governs such things, not care about the name put on a bottle of wine (if it is a generic one, as opposed to a varietal, when they get very fussy), they don't restrict in any way what goes into that bottle.

A California, New York or Michigan Burgundy may contain juice from any red or white grape and frequently does. It will always be a blend of the juice of lesser grapes in some combination that is commercially feasible and, at least, to the winemaker, somewhat palatable.

Some California Burgundies are quiet decent, but they do not contain much, if any, Pinot Noir, as they must in France. The exception is Beaulieu vintage dated. I suspect Inglenook does at times. They may contain whatever it is impossible to generalize about whether one likes American-style Burgundy making.

The cost difference is telling. French red Burgundies run generally between \$15 and \$35 a bottle. American is anywhere from \$1.50 to \$5 a bottle.

So what is Burgundy?

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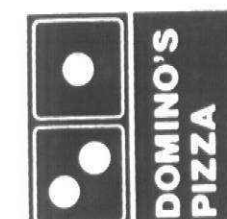
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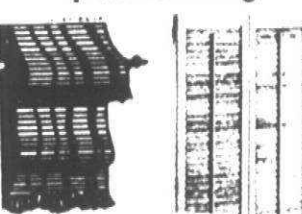
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Often we get disturbed over the wrong things

The fate of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools in the near future has been decided by about 7 percent of its residents.

The school district had wanted to borrow \$11 million to house incoming students. A request to borrow that \$11 million was rejected by voters in last week's annual school election.

Unfortunately only 6,289 residents from Plymouth-Canton went to the polls Monday to decide the fate of the \$11 million bond issue and tax continuation proposal.

That means almost 38,000 registered voters didn't bother investing five-10 minutes to vote on the ballot proposals and school board candidates.

It's almost a tragedy that the fate of the bond issue was decided with 86 percent of the community not participating in the decision. A 14 percent voter turnout is sad commentary on a community.

The millage continuation proposal meant about \$1.1 million in income to the school district for the coming year. That proposal was approved — but, again, only by 7 percent of the registered voters.

With 16,000 students in the district there must be about 24,000 parents eligible to vote with a direct concern in the outcome of any election.

That seems to suggest one out of four parents care so little about their children's education that they cannot be bothered to vote in a school election.

And we are not even counting parents of young children who are not yet enrolled in school but will be affected by last Monday's election within the very near future.

This kind of apathy ought to be very disturbing to the community. And the problem is that it is not just a single occurrence from last Monday. In

March 1980 and in June 1979 the voter turnout was 16 percent.

What we have is a definite pattern over time of 80 percent or more of the residents in the school district dropping out of the decision-making process. And a voter turnout of less than 20 percent means all important decisions involving education are being made by less than 10 percent of the community.

Something is very wrong when one person decides the future of nine others.

Yet we are not disturbed.

The same kind of pattern exists in city of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships' municipal elections.

A primary election has almost become a kind of social event — a who's who in local political life, but not much more.

But we are not disturbed.

Our tax assessments rise year after year, though, and we are disturbed.

Our tax bills each year ask for more and more of our funds, and we are disturbed.

Our water bills rise, and we are disturbed.

Teachers go on strike, and we get disturbed.

When the buses run late, we get disturbed.

And if 40 kids were loaded into a classroom we might get disturbed.

But we don't get disturbed by a 14 percent voter turnout. We allow 7 percent of the community to make decisions for the rest of us.

Yes, we do get disturbed quite often but we never do when it really counts. Once again, when it really counted on June 9, we were not in line with our neighbors.

Does that disturb you?

Lowly garage now up front

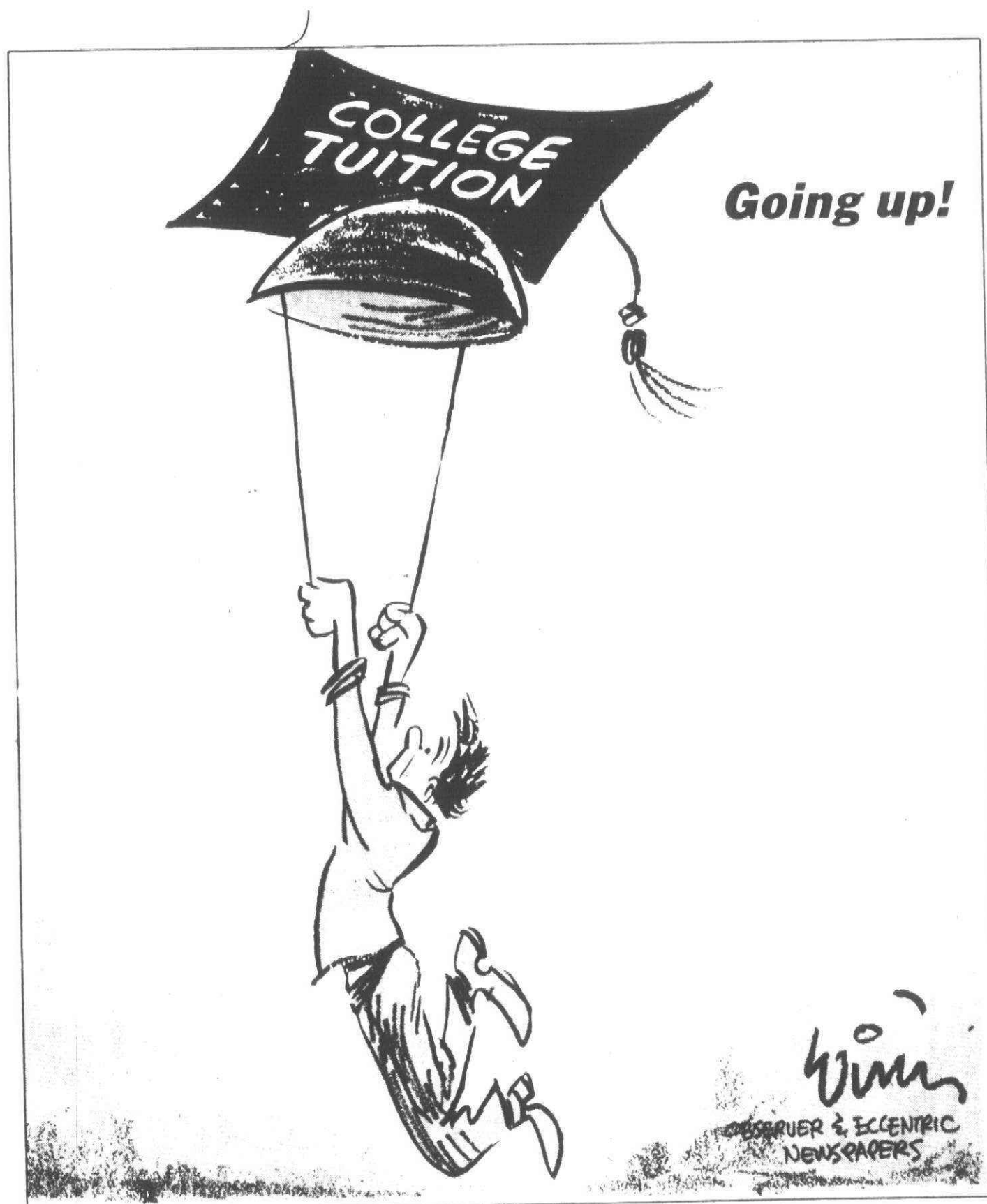
As an integral part of the home, the garage now ranks high on the list when plans are made for a new residence. Sometimes living quarters are built above them.

"You've got to buy an American car, Barnaby. Thousands of Americans are being put out of work because of clods like you who buy foreign cars."

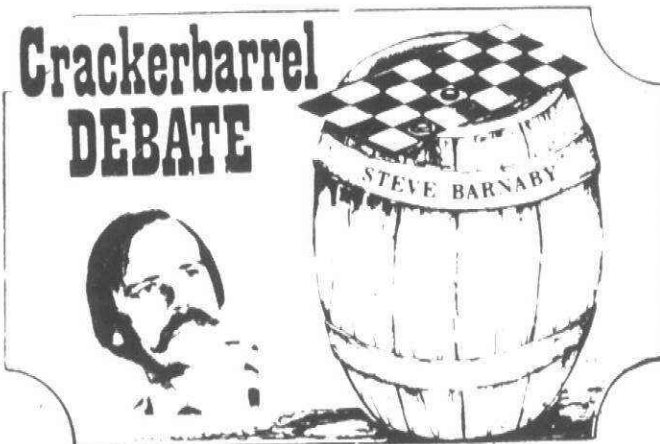
I was less than enthused to inform this faction that the only two cars I ever owned were a Toyota and a Volkswagen.

An amazing mental tool

Here in suburbia, the land that Henry Ford made possible with the first practical automobile, we are acutely conscious of technological invention.

We know about internal combustion engines, air conditioning, computers, plastics and the rest.

Now think about the great intellectual inventions — just plain ideas which changed the course of civilization.

The 26-letter alphabet will be one of the first nominees. It's based on picture writing, of course, but is so far advanced from picture writing that the alphabet ranks as an immense intellectual tool. The inventor's name is lost in history's mists.

THE INVENTOR of the decimal system of counting is some kind of intellectual champion. Imagine what it would be like to write out the stresses on the Mackinac Straits Bridge or the Detroit Plaza in Roman numerals, where it might take three or four characters to form a single digit.

In the same league are some great intellectual discoveries.

Only in the last few centuries, for example, have we known that blood is pumped by the heart, circulates throughout the body and comes back.

The law of gravity. The notion that the earth revolves around the sun and is not the center of the universe. The atomic system of chemistry. These discoveries are of such recent vintage that we know the men responsible — Isaac Newton, Nicholas Copernicus, John Dalton.

They have revolutionized the way we look at the universe and expanded our understanding of it many times.

FOR MY OWN candidate for a great intellectual invention, you need look no further than the "help wanted" section of the classified ads.

But you'll never guess, so I'll tell you. It's the double-entry system of bookkeeping — the basis of modern accounting.

Accounting is so boring and such an everyday thing that you may not think of it as a stunning intellectual invention. I have checked encyclopedia entries on the subject and found no name of an inventor. Somewhere I heard that it was concocted by Italian merchants during the Renaissance, but that tale is unverified. Accounting texts never get into history, but treat the subject like Topsy — fully grown and never born.

Without double entry bookkeeping, a business would be reduced to looking at the cash drawer at the end of the day and counting to see if there is more or less than at dawn.

ACCOUNTING gives us two kinds of charts — income (profit-loss) statements and position (assets-equities) statements.

Every transaction is entered twice. A sale is chalked up as "revenue" and as an addition to "cash" or whatever the merchant accepts in trade.

There is a method of adjusting income downward as equipment wears out. It's known as "depreciation." It's not just a tax deduction but a useful tool for telling a business that its equipment is wearing out and the cost must be recovered.

Modern business, modern government, modern foundations, modern unions — even many modern households — use the double-entry system of bookkeeping.

A reactionary who really wanted to cripple government would ask not just for tax slashes but for abolition of double-entry accounting. Civilization would collapse without it.

A philosopher once said we are all pygmies standing on the shoulders of giants. I wonder if accountants themselves, as they prepare long gray charts on cash flows and receivables, ever stop to think about what an incredible intellectual tool they are using.

roll call report

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on recent major roll call votes.

HOUSE

FAIR HOUSING: The House voted 205-204 to put additional enforcement teeth into the 1968 civil rights act that bans discrimination in housing sales and rentals. The vote endorsed the establishment of Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) administration law courts to speedily judge complaints of housing discrimination and, where warranted, levy fines.

Presently, persons alleging discrimination have to seek redress in the federal courts, a route that critics say is too lengthy and costly. The overall bill

(HR 5200) later was passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla., a supporter, said, "I need not remind the members of this House of how cumbersome and burdensome the federal court system is at the present time."

Rep. Clarence Miller, R-Ohio, an opponent, said the HUD courts could produce "bureaucratic zealotry," and urged the House to "stick to constitutionally prescribed avenues of redress through the federal court system."

Members voting "yea" wanted housing discrimination complaints to be handled by special HUD judges rather than by the federal courts.

Reps. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, Da-

vid Bonior, D-Mt. Clemens, William Ford, D-Taylor, William Brodhead, D-Detroit, and James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge voted "yea."

Rep. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham voted "nay."

HOUSING APPRAISALS: The House adopted, 257-156, an amendment to keep real estate appraisers from listing information on race, sex, national origin, schools, churches and synagogues in their property reports. The amendment was attached to HR 5200 (see preceding vote).

Rep. Hamilton Fish, R-N.Y., a supporter, said that "to permit appraisers to mention racial and ethnic factors automatically inserts race into deliberations of the lender as to the amount or the actual granting of a loan."

Rep. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, an opponent, said appraisers need freedom to list all information about a neighborhood in order to "do their important work honestly, thus benefiting all

members of our society."

Members voting "yea" wanted to exclude racial, ethnic, religious and certain other information from real estate appraisals.

Pursell, Bonior, Ford, Brodhead and Blanchard voted "yea."

Broomfield voted "nay."

CENSURE: The House refused, 97-308, to soften from censure to reprimand the penalty imposed on Rep. Charles Wilson, D-Calif., for alleged violations of House rules. The House by non-record vote then censured Wilson for converting campaign funds to personal use and accepting money from a man with a direct interest in pending legislation. Expulsion is the severest penalty a congressman can receive from his colleagues. Censure and reprimand are the other penalties.

Defending himself against the House ethics committee charges, Wilson said: "I have never acted in a criminal manner. I have not violated the rules of the

House. . . No one can buy a piece of me. The facts do not support these allegations."

Rep. Wyche Fowler, D-Ga., a member of the ethics committee and an opponent of softening the penalty, said that "after hearing the evidence" the committee "regretfully" recommends censure of Wilson.

Members voting "nay" wanted Wilson to be censured rather than merely reprimanded.

Ford voted "yea."

Pursell, Sawyer, Bonior, Brodhead, Blanchard and Broomfield voted "nay."

SENATE

DRAFTING WOMEN: By a vote of 40-51, the Senate refused to require that women as well as men be registered for the military draft. The vote came during debate on a measure appropriating the money necessary to begin registration for the draft. President

Carter asked for the money in the wake of Afghanistan.

Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, R-Kan., the sponsor, said: "Given the growing role of women in the military, I do not feel we can continue to deny the contributions of women by excluding them from registration."

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., an opponent, said: "As to women serving in the services, I have no argument. I do not think they should be drafted; it should be a voluntary thing."

Senators voting "yea" wanted women to be registered for the draft.

Sens. Donald Riegle and Carl Levin both Democrats voted "yea."

DRAFT REGISTRATION: The Senate passed, 58-34, and sent back to the House a bill clearing the way for President Carter to register young men for possible draft into the military. The measure appropriates \$13.3 million for registering the nation's four million 19- and 20-year-olds.

Suburbs take charter fight to appeals court

Rebuffed this week by the Wayne County Circuit Court, a suburban group challenging a proposed county charter commission has taken its case to the Michigan Court of Appeals.

"While at this point we can't stop the preparation of the ballots (asking voters on Aug. 5 to form a charter commission to propose county government reform), we are going to ask that the election be held up," said Patrick McCauley, attorney for Wayne County Communities for Equal Representation.

THE GROUP, composed of 39 suburban local governments, opposes creation of charter districts similar to the existing 27 county commissioner districts.

The group contends the 1980 census should be used to draw charter districts

because it will reflect population shifts to the suburbs.

Both the Michigan Legislature and Wayne County Board of Commissioners have approved use of the 1970 census for the charter districts, which would give the city of Detroit a 16-11 charter commission majority, the same edge it has now over the suburbs on the county board.

Wayne Circuit Judge Susan D. Borman Monday dismissed the suburban group's lawsuit which asked that the Aug. 5 charter commission referendum be postponed until the 1980 census was available to draw charter districts from.

She also dissolved a temporary restraining order issued by Circuit Judge William J. Giovan earlier this month which had prevented the county clerk's office from preparing ballots for the

charter referendum.

Judge Borman said the suburban cities' contention that use of the 1970 census to draw charter districts violates the constitutional principle of "one man, one vote," was a question for the court of appeals to decide.

"I DO NOT believe this case is properly before this court," she said.

"While I have grave doubts about one man, one vote applying in this case, certainly it's not clear and the courts could go either way."

Judge Borman also ordered the county apportionment commission to formally file a 1972 county apportionment plan that will be used to draw charter districts.

The communities for equal representation filing with the county clerk Tuesday preceeded the group's same-day appeal of Judge Borman's decision to a higher court.

The apportionment commission has followed an opinion issued by Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley last month that a 1972 county apportionment must stand for charter commission districts.

McCauley said he hopes the court of appeals may hear the case by the end of next week at the latest.

Students raise \$14,000 with read-a-thons

Some 886 students in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools raised more than \$14,000 for multiple sclerosis by reading more than 9,400 books.

More specifically, the 886 students raised \$14,293.75 by reading 9,424 books.

The local students, along with 18,000 other students in Michigan, raised \$247,000 for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

The MS Read-a-thon was originated and developed by the National MS Society in 1974 and has just completed its second year in Michigan.

Participating students have friends and relatives pledge a certain amount of money for each book read during a six-week period. Prizes are offered to students as incentives.

Multiple sclerosis is a neurological disease which strikes young adults between the ages of 18 and 45 and is most common in cold northern climates, which accounts for the high incident rate in Michigan.

The VIEW from CANTON CENTER

THE PRE-WORLD WAR II Greenfield Village guides were back at their old stand last Thursday. They came from all over the country — California, Florida, Arizona — for their reunion.

Plans for the get-together were in the making for a year as Jack Wilcox hosted a series of meetings at his home on corner of Union Street and Penniman Avenue, Plymouth. Jim Barry, Dave Black, Frank Cady, Jack Campbell, Charlie Madigan, Hank Panter, Bob Russell, Larry Sollinger and Bob Zahnow served on the planning committee. Frank Cady, president of the Edison Institute, is retiring this year after more than 40 years with the village and museum. He, too, started out as a guide, singing in the chapel choir and explaining to visitors the history and the workings of the Plymouth Carding Mill.

Most of the guides were students. They earned less than 50 cents an hour and bought their own uniforms, a Palm Beach suit. Competition for the guide positions was keen and selection was a symbol of status. They were members of an elite group. There were no women guides in those days.

A GOOD SINGING voice was an asset in being hired as a guide. Beside their regular duties, the guides formed the choir at the Martha Mary Chapel. They were also worked on the Ford farms.

They were in good voice for their reunion as 24 of the old-timers returned to the choir loft for the W.A. Simonds Memorial Service. The reunion was dedicated to William Adam Simonds who died in 1962. Simonds was their "boss," the first director of visits of the public to the Ford Collections at Dearborn. He also was the author of five books, "Henry Ford and Greenfield Village," "Henry Ford, Motor Genius," "From the Ground Up" (with F.L. Black), "A Boy with Edison," and "Edison, His Life, His Work, His Genius, Genius."

Following the service, a linden tree was planted in front of the chapel. It was dedicated to Simonds and the plaque bears the words, "Our Boss, Pre-war guide staff, June 12, 1980."

THE PRE-WAR guides did a lot of reminiscing. They agreed that the taped, push-button descriptions at the village were not as good as their live dissertations.

Part of their job was answering questions and they feel students and other visitors are left high and dry with with the tapes.

Henry Ford was a frequent visitor to the village. In fact, they saw him about every day.

Conversation got around to Mr. Ford's never-ending promotion of soy beans.

"Remember the soy bean ice cream? We'd have to say we liked it. But the school kids were uninhibited in their reactions. They'd say 'ugh' and the whole place was littered with sticks from those soy bean ice cream sticks."

Lifetime friendships were formed among the village guides and their respect for their mentor, W.A. Simonds was reaffirmed at the reunion.

Another former Plymouth guide, Russell Kirk, made reservations for the day-long party but was unable to attend.

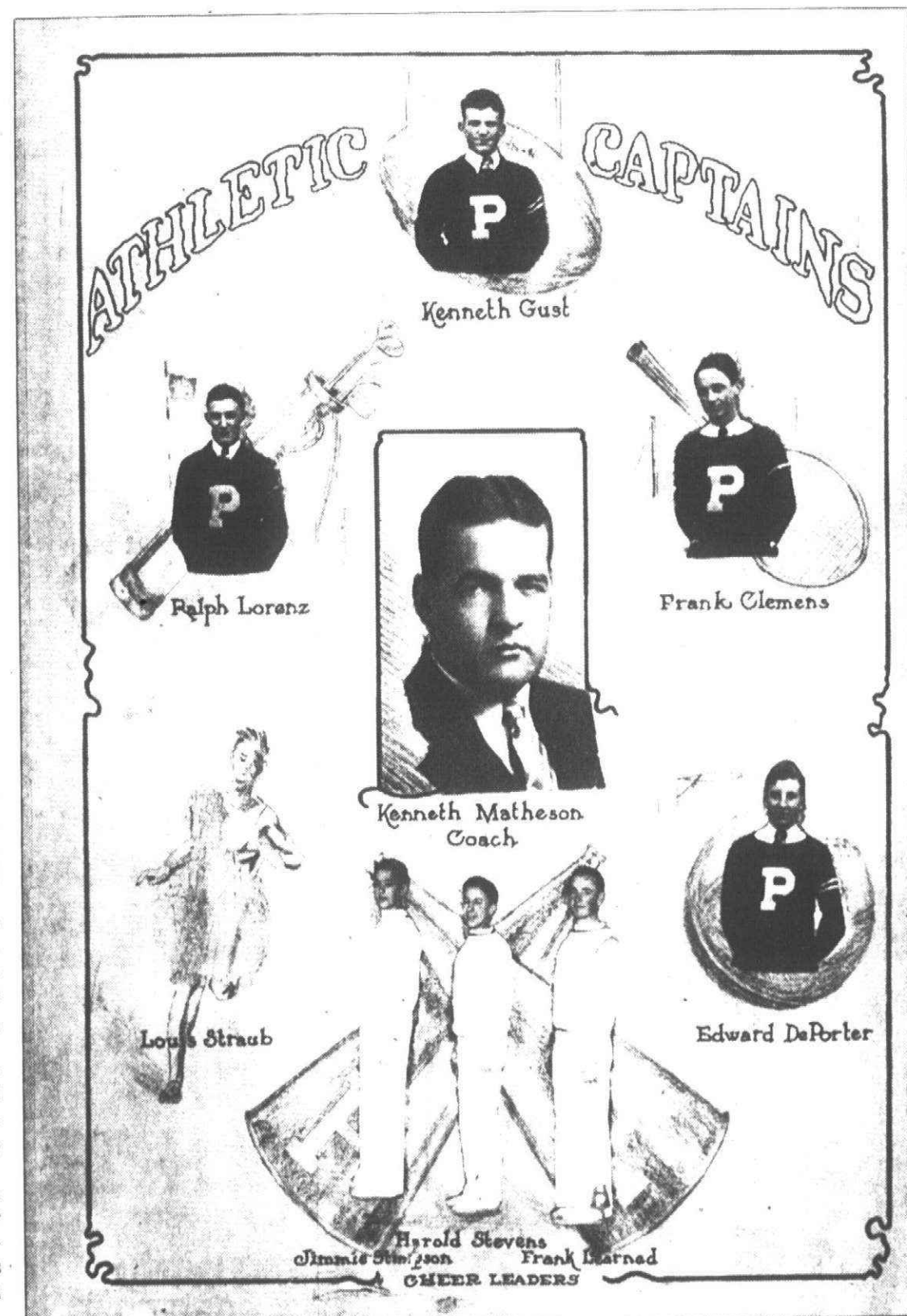
They voted to decide who had changed least and Lois Caldwell Dicks and Ken Gust (captain of their football team) were the winners.

The only disappointment in Yellowstone was not seeing a single bear. I told the boys they were on strike for more picnic baskets.

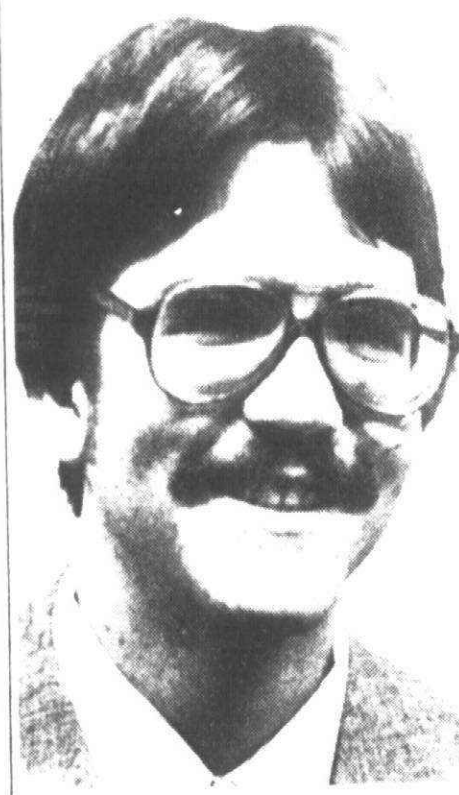

Bishop Ammons has appointed Rev. England to attend Methodist Theological School for the coming year.



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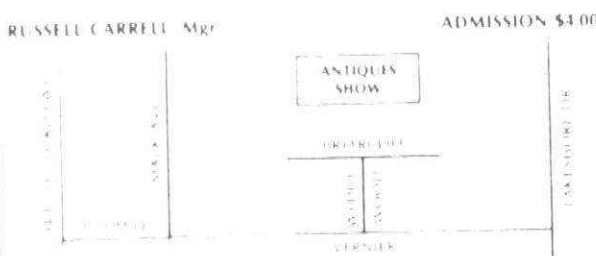
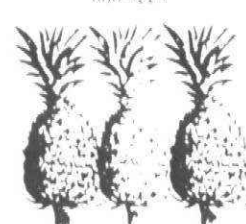
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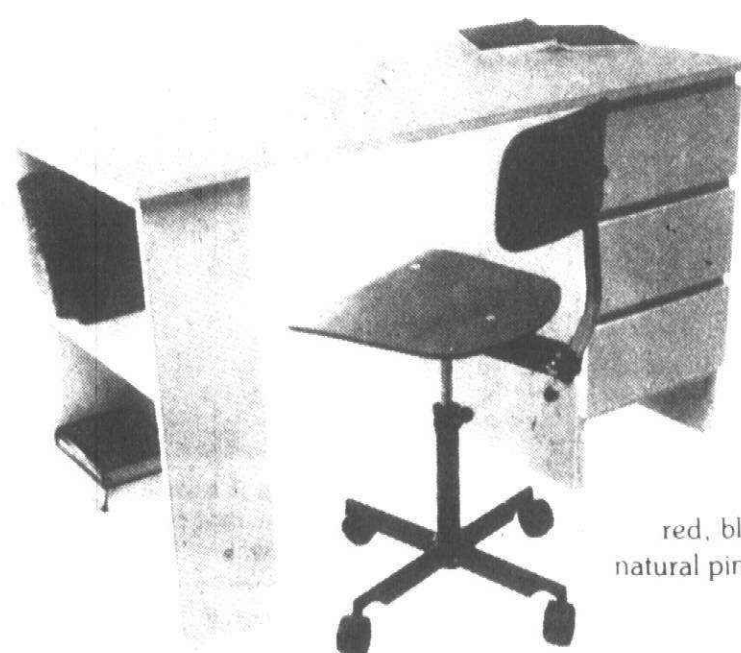


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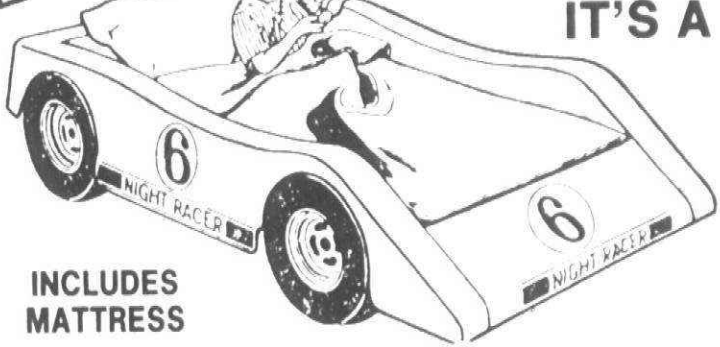

Losing a job is a severe jolt

By MAGARET MILLER

Society's cushions may keep hunger pangs from the suddenly unemployed, but they can't keep the psychological wolf away from the door.

Losing a job is a severe jolt to the person programmed for work, says Michael Bogolea of Family Human Potential Services center, and the trauma shows in increased traffic to counseling even as it shows in the lines that form for unemployment benefits.

"It's the whole issue of what do you do with yourself when your life is structured for work and suddenly you have no work," said Bogolea.

People are affected deeply by the changes in the economy, he added.

"They have fears about where they are in the economy," he went on. "It's the indecision, the anxiety, the feeling that the only thing certain is that nothing will be the same again."

Besides, he added, "people are realistic; they know the supplemental pay will run out."

BOGOLEA SAID difficult times hit the various work groups in different ways and that's particularly apparent when husband and wife both work and the husband is laid off.

"The woman, who has been a second-

ary breadwinner, working for fulfillment, is suddenly a primary breadwinner," he said.

"That puts a whole new stress on the marriage. There is a role reversal, with the woman feeling trapped in her job and trapped by housework."

"She begins to complain about all the things men used to complain about. But, strangely enough, he doesn't empathize. It's a basis for sharing of feelings, but often it doesn't take place."

For men, the worst of the problem seems to be that they have, up to now, felt they were in control, Bogolea said.

"Now the man is in a position in which he did not make the decision but suddenly his whole life is changed," he explained.

He said he is seeing more men seeking therapy, many of them referred by physicians because of physical symptoms like inability to sleep and colitis.

"They are coming in with raw feelings on the surface," Bogolea added. "Stress is literally wiping them out, and they need more than medication."

THIS PSYCHOLOGIST noted that people in this area now seeking counseling are mainly those in their 30s and 40s.

"They have been working a while and have achieved the American dream," he added. "Suddenly it's not working out. The familiar lifestyle is corroding."

Another factor contributing to stress is the removal of the extended family that in times past would cushion the psychological blow, said Bogolea.

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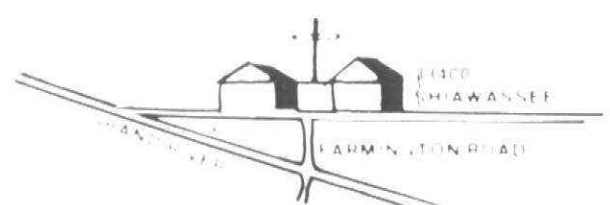

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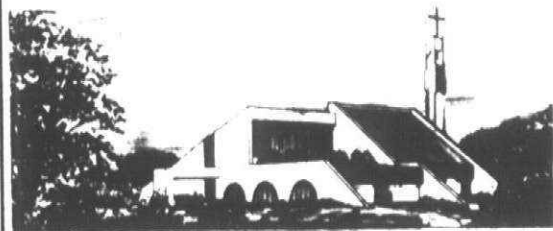

Here's a new book of Esther

Before Margaret Hess is through, she may turn liberator of women for the entire Bible. Liberating Biblical women in the sense of bringing them to life for modern readers, this Livonia Bible studies teacher has written books on Ruth and Naomi, more recently Esther, a Jewish queen of Persia, and now is compiling notes for a work on Deborah, a judge of Israel.

"Esther, Courage in Crisis" is the title of the current work by Mrs. Hess, whose husband, Dr. Bartlett Hess, is senior minister of Ward United Presbyterian Church of Livonia.

The writer has been teaching Bible classes for more than a decade to large groups representing many denominations at Ward and in the First United Presbyterian Church of Birmingham.

Her book on Esther and its predecessor, "Love Knows No Boundaries," grew out of her class purpose to relate the people and times of the Bible to modern living and its problems.

"TELLING THE story of Esther gives us a chance to look at a microcosm of Jewish life in ancient times and to see persecution of a people and how they react," Mrs. Hess said.

Essentially, her book tells the story of the harem of King Ahasuerus in ancient Persia, which is now Iran.

"It is strange that in the Bible we learn more about life in an ancient harem than from any other source," Mrs. Hess said. "But it makes the setting for a story of courage at the time 70,000 Jewish people had been killed in Persia and they were threatened with extinction."

"It was the king's habit to set aside one queen when he was ready to favor another. Esther became a queen in his harem and hid the fact that she was Jewish. Thus she was in a position to save her people."

The story of Esther and a Jew named Mordecai form the basis for the Jewish Purim holiday.

Mrs. Hess said she had her chapters checked by Rabbi Martin Gordon of the Livonia Jewish Con-

gregation for accuracy of the Jewish details.

"He had just a couple of points to make," she said.

IN AN INTRODUCTION to the paper-back book that is on sale for \$2.50 in are Christian book stores, Mrs. Hess noted that Christian writers who have looked at the story of Esther tend to worry about the conduct of Mordacai and Esther and interpret by means of allegory.

"But it seems to me," she said in talking about the book, "is that the Jewish account should be taken at face value, and that what it should mean to the Christian is the opportunity to take a close look at God's working in history."

"The biblical book of Esther does not talk of God or mention morals or instructions for living, but it is a picture of how God works through everyday occurrences, using bad people and good to accomplish his purposes."

"It challenges us to see how we can make the most of our lives and have the courage of Esther when it comes to meeting crises."

PREPARING to write her story, Mrs. Hess said she read 45 books by Biblical scholars on the subject of Esther.

Victor Books, which published this book and the earlier "Love Knows No Boundaries," had asked to consider the subject right after she finished her work on Ruth and Naomi.

"The publishers felt that not much of a popular nature had been done on Esther and wanted me to write the story," Mrs. Hess said. "I found it to be an exciting one."

The project took "all my spare time" for eight months, she said. She added that she tries to use concrete details about the ancient times, "to make the Bible come to life and show how it applies to life."

Specific areas of morality are noted in some of the chapter headings — "Should a Wife Always Obey?" "Civic Duty and You," "Is Your Prejudice Showing?" "How to Cope with Enemies," and "How to Deal with Success."

Her own appreciation of the Jewish culture and people increased as she compiled information for the book, Mrs. Hess said, and she expects to add to this as she works on the story of Deborah, the judge.

She described Deborah as "a character who would upstage any women's libber of today."

"As one of the judges of Israel, she gained authority by the kind of person she was and became a leader of Israel," Mrs. Hess said.

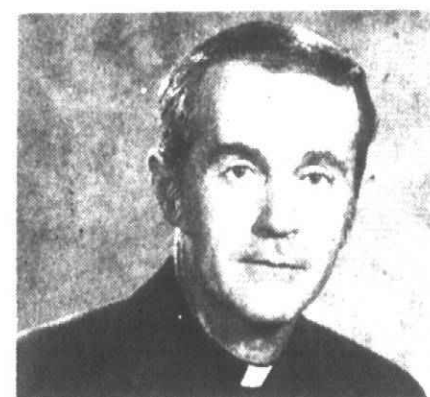

He said he saw the trend of the last quarter century as a continuing one.

"In the next 25 years," he said, "I think we will be seeing more and more diversified ministry. In that way, we reinforce and support each other in doing God's work."

Strawberries are June's love potion

June is the month for strawberries. The fact that strawberries seem to encourage romance has certainly been widely recognized. Strawberry flavored or scented lipsticks, colognes, douches, bubblebaths and incense are all popular at this time.

But for real romantic results, I suggest that you put the strawberry on the table, and serve it with cream and sugar.

Strawberry shortcake and strawberry recipes are grand, but I thought that today I would share with you a couple of my favorite strawberry recipes to encourage romance.

If your love must limit his sugar intake because of his weight, diabetes, or some other medical reason, you can still serve him homemade strawberry jam on his half-slice of toast or warm biscuit. Even half a biscuit with this jam, will make him look at you with a new glint in his eye.

SUGARLESS STRAWBERRY JAM

1 quart cleaned strawberries
¾ teaspoon liquid artificial sweetener
1 pkg. (¾ ounces) powdered fruit pectin
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Red food coloring as desired
Crush the strawberries in a one to one-and-a-half quart saucepan. Stir in artificial sweetener, food coloring, pectin, and lemon juice.

Bring to a boil, and boil one minute. Remove from heat. Continue to stir for two minutes. Pour into freezer containers, cover and freeze.

Thaw before serving, and store in refrigerator after opening.

Strawberry daiquiris are nice, but hard liquor is never as conducive to romance as wine is. So, why not try this mixture:

STRAWBERRY DAIQUIRIES

16 oz. can frozen pink lemonade
1½ cups rose wine
½ cup sliced, fresh strawberries
½ cup crushed ice
Combine ingredients in an electric blender to blend until smooth and foamy. Serve immediately.

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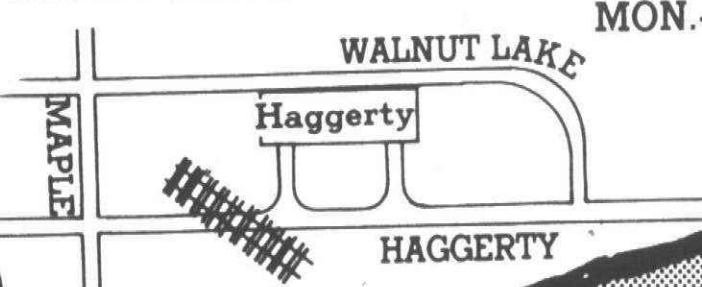
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Oscar, the strangest object of my affections

Sometimes very simple projects can symbolize these attitudes. One such project is an insect catcher. (We always release our subjects after study to symbolize individual freedom.)

An excellent holder that is portable and unbreakable can be made simply with a pint size milk carton and torn panty hose. It is small enough for little hands and little insects.

Begin by rinsing out the milk carton thoroughly.

Cut out a two-inch square hole in the spot directly under the pouring spout. Then, open the rest of the top completely. There should now be two openings in the milk carton - the top, and the square hole that was cut out.

Now, fit the milk carton into the toe portion of the panty hose so that the top of the carton is facing up to the opening of the panty hose. In this way, a specimen can be dropped into the carton and the hose quickly closed so the specimen cannot get back out again.

Now the specimen can be observed through the hole where the square hole was cut, like a window.

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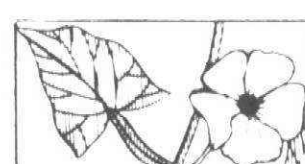

School officials hope for delay on strike bill

Western Wayne County school officials are hoping to delay action — scheduled this week in the state senate — on a liberalized teachers' strike bill scheduled this week in the state Senate.

The officials, meeting Thursday morning, were told that they should contact their local senators and urge a delay until this fall. The school leaders oppose the bill they believe gives too much power to the teachers' and other public employees' unions.

The bill in the senate allows for a maximum of a four-week strike without penalties. Currently, strikes by public employees are prohibited.

The officials are members of Metropolitan Association for Improved School Legislation, a group of public school board members and superintendents that lobbies in Lansing on bills that affect their budgets and operations.

In the group are the Livonia, Garden City, Wayne-Westland, Plymouth-Canton, Redford Union, Dearborn, Inkster, Taylor and Cherry Hill districts. Gerald Dunn, executive director of the group, told 25 officials at a breakfast session that there are already

enough votes in the Senate to approve the bill — vigorously opposed by the association.

But there is a chance that they can "delay the inevitable" until this fall.

Supporting the bill are Sens. William Faust, D-Westland, and Robert Geake, R-Northville, who represent most of western Wayne County.

THE BILL IS opposed by the school boards and superintendents for two reasons.

One is that it allows teachers and most other public employees a maximum of four weeks of strike time without a penalty. In addition, the bill provides for unresolved issues during negotiations to be settled by an arbitrator whose decision is binding on both the union and governmental unit.

The bill, in a slightly more limited form, was previously approved by the state House of Representatives.

Dunn said that several days ago that there were 17 senators willing to put off a final vote on the bill until this fall. A day later, the number dropped to 15.

Twenty votes are needed to adopt a bill in the Senate.

Dunn also distributed a letter from Gov. William Milliken to Sen. David Plawewski, chairman of the labor committee, outlining Milliken's objections to the bill.

But Dunn noted that the governor didn't threaten to veto the bill, if approved.

Milliken also has the choice to allow the bill to become law without his signature.

Flossie Tonda, Plymouth-Canton school board trustee, quoted a Milliken staffer as saying that the governor would veto the bill as it now stands.

THE SCHOOL association also received gloomy financial news from Dunn.

The state's money problems are getting worse because of an economic recession and less state revenue.

That means less money for public

schools, Dunn said.

The scope of the statewide problem was pointed by a report showing that the state's contributions to public schools — originally set at \$910 million — was reduced to \$875 million through a recent executive order signed by Milliken.

The senate's finance staff estimates the level will eventually drop to \$861 million.

Since the governor is still making new budget cuts, the figure may eventually drop to \$813-\$823 million, and maybe lower.

Dunn said the nine school districts in MAISL were reduced \$2.5 million in earlier cuts of state support.

He cited a financial study that shows that property taxes collect more money than any other tax in Michigan and are accounting for a larger and larger share of all taxes collected.

This led Superintendent Timothy Dyer of the Wayne-Westland schools to say that the state "can't have it both ways."

He was referring to cuts in state support of schools but no relaxation of specific laws relating to schools, such as the required 180 days of instruction. Dyer said the state is "passing its problem onto us."

DUNN SAID there are other financial problems facing them next year.

The reason is that other local units of government will be competing for school dollars because of state laws or bills under consideration.

Those include the reorganization of the Detroit and Wayne County court system, toxic wastes, and more aid to cities with money problems.

Public schools now get half of the state money allocated to local governmental units, but there will be a shift next year away from spending for education.

Since the state isn't requiring any fewer programs for schools, Dunn said, it is moving toward local governmental units financing their own programs.

But he made it clear that his report of state budget cuts is only a "preliminary report" and the situation could get worse.

He expects most school districts next year to be in a deficit budget situation by the end of the 1980-81 fiscal year.

IN RELATED action, the MAISL members adopted resolutions praising outgoing MAISL president Mary Jane

Schildberg of Garden City and local board members who are closing out their public careers this month.

Mrs. Schildberg is Garden City school board president.

Board members who are completing their terms this month and who received resolutions are Marvin Pridgen of Livonia, Malcolm Sielke of Garden City, and Mack Mayfield, Westland resident who is on the Inkster school board.

Students raise \$14,000

Some 886 students in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools raised more than \$14,000 for multiple sclerosis by reading more than 9,400 books.

More specifically, the 886 students raised \$14,293.75 by reading 9,424 books.

The local students, along with 18,000 other students in Michigan, raised \$247,000 for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

The MS Read-a-thon was originated and developed by the National MS Soci-

ety in 1974 and has just completed its second year in Michigan.

Participating students have friends and relatives pledge a certain amount of money for each book read during a six-week period. Prizes are offered to students as incentives.

Multiple sclerosis is a neurological disease which strikes young adults between the ages of 18 and 45 and is most common in cold northern climates, which accounts for the high incident rate in Michigan.

Bursting at seams, department gets OK for new expansion

A remedy to the cramped conditions of the present Sewer and Water Department in Plymouth Township has been proposed.

The township intends to build a new structure to house that office this summer.

Some \$270,000 has been set aside for this project to be built on property recently purchased near the present building site on Mill near Ann Arbor Road.

Project plans are in the hands of a subcommittee made up of Supervisor Thomas Notebaert, Trustee Maurice Breen and township engineer Michael Bailey.

The township board recently authorized the investigation of one method of constructing it. It has been proposed that the township contract a firm to build the shell of the building, leaving the inside refinishing for another time.

This "turn key" form of building, is

considered a novel approach in the township as it's the first building so proposed.

The committee recommended the "turn key" approach so as to get a handle of the ultimate cost of construction prior to its start.

Preliminary site sketches include a 80-by-40-foot building with a gable roof and brick veneer.

As of last week the committee compiled a list of bid specifications that will be presented to the township board for approval June 24.

Preliminary designs outline additional space for employees, such as a lunch room, shower and locker facilities, a conference room and additional storage space.

Such facilities are not available in the present department building.

It has been suggested that the present department office be converted into use for police services once the new water-sewer department is built.

All-Area baseball squad not short on talent

Lipinski, McNamara gain spots

The 1980 prep baseball season can be characterized as another outstanding campaign for area athletes.

Several teams enjoyed fine seasons. Livonia Franklin, co-champs of the Northwest Suburban League along with North Farmington, reached the quarterfinals before losing to eventual state titlist Grosse Pointe North. The Patriots finished the year at 17-8.

Garden City West, which suffered through a mediocre regular season, found itself and gained a quarterfinal berth before being eliminated by Wayne Memorial. The Tigers finished at 13-9.

Redford Bishop Borgess, ranked among the top 10 teams all year in Class A, picked up first place in the tough Central Division of the Catholic League. The Spartans finished at 20-5.

Plymouth Salem (14-7-2) and Livonia Bentley (11-7-1) were co-champs in the Suburban Eight League.

Other teams with fine season records included Detroit Catholic Central (17-11), Livonia Stevenson (16-6) and Plymouth Canton (15-10).

Area coaches gathered recently to select and honor individual players for their efforts. The following are the first and second All-Observer squads.

FIRST TEAM

Greg Brake, Redford Bishop Borgess, pitcher. One of the top pitchers in the state, Brake, a senior, posted an 8-1 record in 75 innings of work. He struck out 124 and walked only 33 as he posted a brilliant 0.56 ERA.

A second-team All-Observer pick last season, Brake could also swing a bat as evidenced by his .356 average. He committed no errors in the field and was selected first-team All-Catholic and second-team coaches' All-State.

Brake's best game of the year was against Birmingham Brother Rice when he struck out 20 batters.

Al Lipinski, Plymouth Canton, pitcher. The senior righthander quickly became the ace of the Chiefs' pitching staff.

In 55 innings of work he carved out an outstanding 7-1 record and an 0.96 ERA. He walked less than 20 batters and played shortstop when not on the mound.

He is a major reason why coach Fred Crissey's squad recorded a respectable 15-10 overall mark. He also was an All-Western League first-team member.

Brad George, Livonia Franklin, pitcher. The 6-foot-3-inch, 190-pound fireballing lefty recorded a 7-1 mark and had an ERA of 1.20 in 61 innings of work.

George allowed only 29 hits during the season and struck out 90. He allowed just 27 walks and 20 runs all season.

"Brad is an outstanding pitcher who I pitched in all the games I thought would be tough," said Franklin coach Gerald Cullin.

Rob Williamson, Detroit Catholic Central, catcher. The Shamrocks' junior rapped out 30 hits in 73 at-bats for a .411 average. He had four homers to lead the area and 24 RBIs.

The lefthand hitting slugger also smacked 13 doubles and four triples in 28 games. Twenty of his 30 hits went for extra bases.

An All-Region II pick, Williamson "is strong with tremendous power to all fields," said coach Frank Corej.

Tom Miner, Garden City West, first baseman. A first-team selection last year as a pitcher, Miner carried one of the heaviest bats in the area this season as he hit .459 with 28 hits in 61 at-bats.

Captain of this year's team, Miner was an All-Region II pick and was voted MVP of the year at West.

The 5-11, 165-pound lefty also threw well for West, sporting a 5-0 record after bouncing back from an early season injury.

"Tom has good bat control and is a contact hitter," said his coach, Bob Dropp.

In two seasons, he struck out only six times.

Chris Sabo, Detroit Catholic Central, infielder. The senior third baseman and three-year letterman was CC's top

hitter in 1980 with a .479 average.

In 28 games he rapped out 45 hits and 22 RBIs. Sabo, who will attend the University of Michigan this fall on a baseball scholarship, was named to the first-team coaches' All-State squad.

As a junior he helped CC to the state baseball title while batting .411. He compiled a .408 career mark.

Also a letter winner in golf, Sabo "is one of the most talented athletes to graduate from CC," said Corej.

Doug White, Livonia Bentley, infielder. Also a third baseman, the senior co-captain batted .411 going into the tough Hazel Park Class A regional.

The All-Region II pick had one homer and 25 RBIs and stole 17 bases.

The 5-11, 185-pounder is an excellent student who "is an outstanding ball player, exceptional leader and very coachable," according to coach Gerald Cullin.

Dave Cabrera, Livonia Bentley, infielder. A three-year regular for the Bulldogs, the senior shortstop batted .404 with 23 hits in 57 at-bats in 1980.

An All-Suburban Eight League first-team choice, Cabrera, a righthanded hitter and thrower, scored 16 runs and stole eight bases this season.

Known for his outstanding defensive ability, Cabrera helped spark Bentley to a share of the Suburban Eight League baseball title this spring.

In three years, the 5-11, 168-pounder compiled a .355 batting mark.

Herb McNamara, Livonia Franklin, outfielder. The senior slugger was selected to the first team for the second straight year.

This season he batted .355 with 25 hits in 69 at-bats. He scored 19 runs and drew 22 walks from opposing pitchers leary of his powerful swing.

An All-State and All-Northwest Suburban League last year as a junior, McNamara enjoyed an outstanding state tourney run.

McNamara was an All-Region II choice this year and is "the best hitter I've ever coached with great potential," said Cullin.

The 6-0, 190-pound co-captain had a triple and a homer in Franklin's 6-4 loss to eventual state champ Grosse Pointe North in the regional final.

Richard Parks, Livonia Stevenson, outfielder. The 5-9, 165-pound senior possesses great speed. He has been timed in 3.6 from home plate to first base.

Parks collected 30 hits in 75 at-bats for a .400 average. He stole 23 bases and drove home 16 runs.

Named to the All-Region II and All-Inter-Lakes League teams, Parks was Stevenson's leadoff hitter and was only caught stealing once his entire career.

Doug Lowe, Redford Bishop Borgess, outfielder. A 5-11, 160-pound senior, Lowe batted .416 while collecting 32 hits.

A first-team All-Catholic League choice and All-Region II member, Lowe set six offensive records at Borgess.

A four-year varsity standout, Lowe was termed the "best hitter" at Borgess, according to coach Jim Brisky.

He struck out only eight times and drove home 33 runs in 1980.

SECOND TEAM

Pat McNamara, Plymouth Salem, pitcher. The fireballing lefty compiled a 7-2 mark for the Rocks after transferring from Borgess.

McNamara posted a 3.03 ERA and set a school record when he fanned 17 in a district qualifying game against Western Six League champ Northville.

The senior also played outfield where he batted .286. He led Salem in homers with three.

Mike Price, Livonia Stevenson, catcher. The senior backstop was the captain, team leader and MVP for the Spartans this season as he hit a hefty .388.

He collected 26 hits and drove home 22 runs.

The 6-0, 180-pounder also was valuable defensively, according to coach Larry Ruzsas. He gunned down 18 runners trying to steal and allowed only 17 stolen bases in 23 games.

An All-Inter-Lakes League first teamer, Price is a 3.6 student who will attend Michigan State in the fall.

Mike Schneider, Livonia Bentley, first baseman. Only a junior, Schneider paced the Bulldogs' offense with a .400 average.

In 19 games he collected 24 hits while scoring 21 runs. He had one homer and 14 RBIs.

Batting in the third spot all year long, Schneider played in every inning for Bentley coach Marty Klozik.

The 6-3, 180-pound Schneider bats and throws from the left side.

Marty Kendall, Redford Union, infielder. The Panther senior was a first-team All-Northwest Suburban League pick and had an on-base percentage of .570 from the leadoff spot.

He led RU with 25 base hits and 21 runs scored. An adept base runner, Kendall stole 15 bases in 17 attempts. In the field, he handled 67 chances and made only three errors.

Greg Alcala, Redford Bishop Borgess, infielder. The glue of the Spartan defense, Alcala made only one error and fielded for a .985 percentage from the second base spot.

A first-team All-Catholic pick, Alcala batted .333 while collecting 25 hits. He walked 20 times and stole seven bases.

"Greg is the best defensive player I've coached," said Spartans' coach Jim Brisky.

Gary Shubitowski, Redford St. Agatha, infielder. The slick-fielding junior

was also the team's top pitcher as he recorded a 6-2 mark.

He paced St. Agatha in batting with 31 hits in 76 at-bats for a .407 average. Fifteen of his 31 hits went for extra bases.

Playing in 24 of the Aggies' 25 games, Shubitowski hit four homers and had 18 RBIs.

He had a 1.94 ERA and struck out 39.

Jerry Scanlon, Detroit Catholic Central, outfielder. The Shamrocks' junior hit .347 with 35 hits in 101 at-bats. He had two homers and 14 RBIs. The speedster also scored 23 runs.

"Jerry was our leadoff hitter and has good power," said Corej. "He is a strong defensive player with an excellent throwing arm."

Keith Stone, Plymouth Canton, outfielder. Known for his strong range and arm in the outfield, the Chiefs' junior hit .353 and was a second-team All-Western Six League choice.

Stone collected six RBIs in one game and was a mainstay offensively in the Canton lineup under coach Fred Crissey.

Gary Lewandowski, Redford Union, outfielder. The Panthers' senior made the All-Northwest Suburban League team this spring and was voted the team's MVP.

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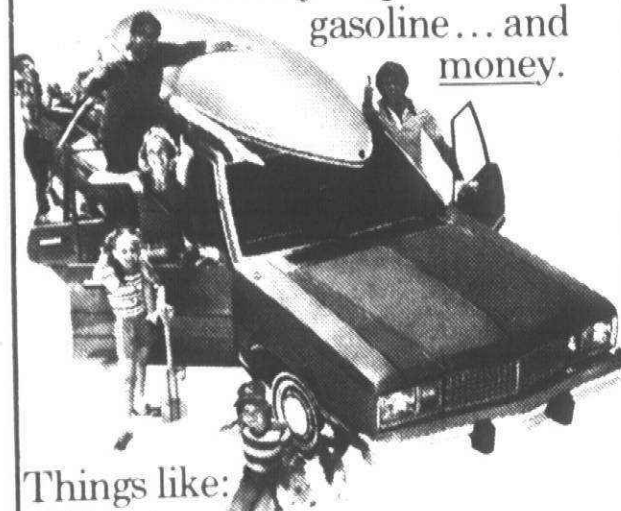
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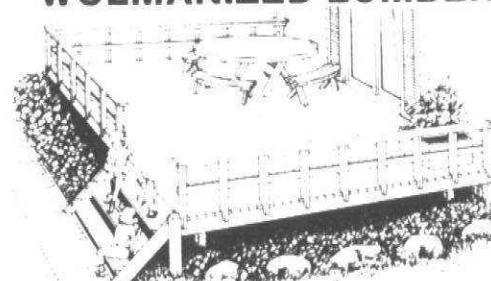
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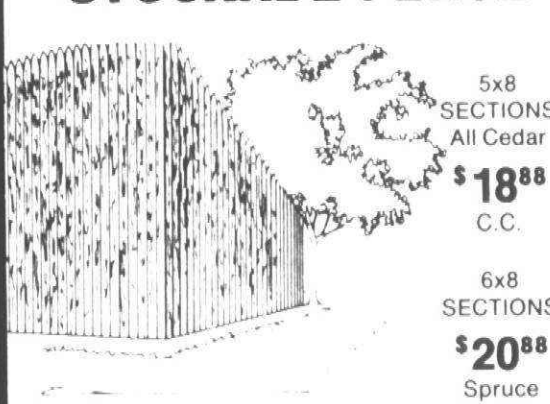
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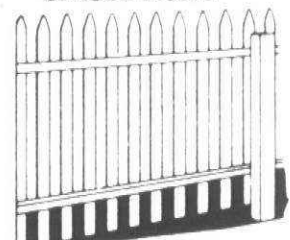
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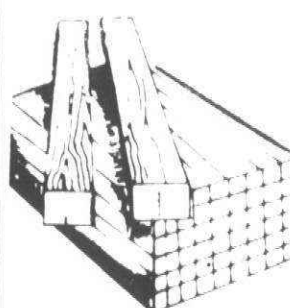
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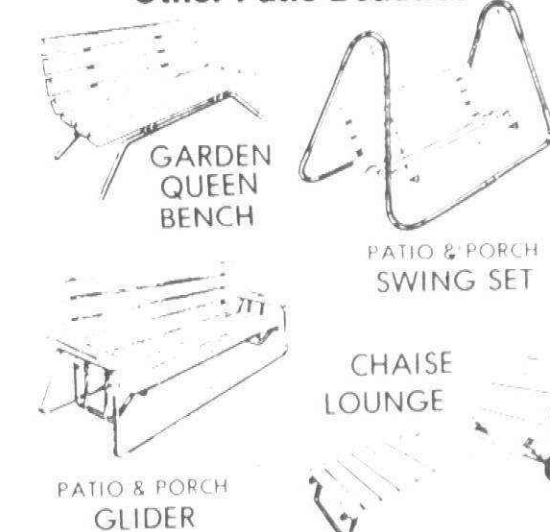
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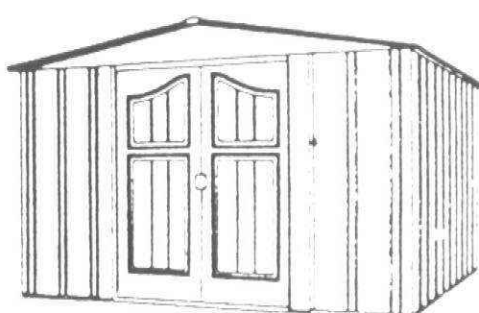
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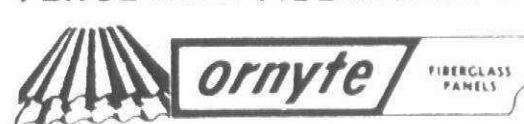
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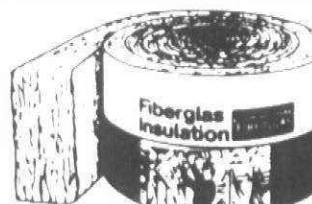
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Modified softball squad fights back

The longest standing record in the history of the American Bowling Congress tournament was broken during the recent meet in Louisville, but it passed without any fanfare.

It came when Mike Eaton, of Grand Rapids, put together games of 245, 258 and 279 for a 782 series. This shattered the mark set by the late Lee Jougard when he posted a 775 series as a member of the Detroit Stroh team in 1951. After setting the record, Lee went on to earn a place in the ABC Hall of Fame.

Thousands of bowlers have slid down the approaches since Jougard played the hero role in one of the most emotional dramas in ABC history. He knew he had to roll a 278 game to set the mark and did it under extreme pressure.

That it was on the books for 29 years is proof his performances that afternoon was a classic. However, it was not the highest series ever rolled in the ABC. It was until the Classic was introduced and the pros made eligible. When that happened Mickey Higbam, of Kansas City, registered an 801 in 1977.

IN A RECENT column, it was mentioned that Dick Beattie, the southpaw who dominated the Detroit bowling scene last season, had six different bowling balls with him when he won the Masters at Bowlero.

This prompted a reader to inquire if that was a record. There is nothing listed officially, but it is a record for a challenge match. That honor belongs to a fellow named Jake Bonzse, a portly window washer whose specialty was head to head battles.

On a cold winter day some years ago, he challenged Pete Carter, then an all-star bowler, to a marathon at the old Detroit Recreation. They started at noon and about every

hour or two, when his thumb started to swell, Jake ordered a new ball drilled.

When he finally admitted, after 84 games, that he couldn't go on, he had six new balls drilled — and he didn't keep any of them. As far as it's known, no one has beaten that mark.

BILL WINKEL, owner of Bel-Aire Lanes, has come up with something new in promotion of the tenpin game. He has organized what he calls the inflation fighters league. And thus far he has quite a few entered.

It is a mixed league where he is charging only \$1 entry fee plus the cost of bowling. But the real feature is that it is a pot luck affair and it is set up for Mondays.

"I hope to attract the bowlers who no longer can afford the high cost of the regular leagues," he explained. "And it is a chance to enjoy the game and have some fun."

He also reviving the ladies classic for next season and has 145 women already signed to battle for the \$1,000 first prize. He hopes to get 160 entries and divide them in to five-women teams, so each of the winners will receive \$200.

THE SWITCH to summer hasn't stopped the flow of 700 series' at Westland Bowl.

In the classic trio last week, Larry Walker found the range for games of 256, 236 and 216 for 708.

Meanwhile, Mike Lee missed breaking the 700 barrier by two pins. He opened with 240, followed with 257, then slumped to 201. And in third place Ray Kreuter slumped after a great start and had to settle for a 654.

He opened with 244, but slipped back to 206 and 205 in his last two games.
