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## Bush gets the nod

### Michigan delegation gets its wish for VP

It paid off. Michigan delegates to the Republican National Convention early Thursday saw George Bush, their overwhelming choice, picked by presidential nominee Ronald Reagan to be his No. 2 man on the GOP ticket.

They greeted Reagan's 12:15 a.m. announcement with tears of joy, hugs and cheers.

"I'm delighted, excited, thrilled," said Deloris Newell, Westland homemaker and 15th Congressional District delegate. "Bush was my first choice all along."

"TERRIFIC," shouted U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth. Pursell noted he was "one of the first and earliest congressmen to declare for Bush for president." But when Bush abandoned his presidential campaign, Pursell and about 15 other congressmen began campaigning openly for Bush for the No. 2 spot.

Sunday afternoon, Pursell hosted a Greenfield Village reception for fellow congressmen. George Bush was at Pursell's side, shaking every hand he could find, for almost the entire three hours.

Pursell said he was bothered by the story — circulated for two hours late Wednesday — that Reagan had cut a deal which made former President Gerald Ford his running mate.

AN ANNOUNCEMENT from Reagan headquarters that Bush was selected ended a wild two hours on the convention floor of Detroit's Joe Louis Arena in which stories circulated that Reagan had picked Ford.

Apparently, the deal fell through. Michigan Gov. William Milliken said, "Probably Reagan and Ford couldn't reach an agreement . . . on the shared responsibilities."



Stories circulated that Ford had wanted a cabinet seat in addition to the vice presidency and that he wanted to share the responsibilities of the presidency.

"A crazy night — one of the strangest I've ever seen," said Milliken.

MICHIGAN VOTERS had supported Bush by a 2-1 margin over Reagan in the May 20 presidential preference primary, and the Michigan delegation reflected that makeup.

"I'm not considering anybody but George Bush," said Rhys Lewis of Redford Township, a 17th District Bush delegate. "It's going to be tough for me to say 'Reagan' unless I can say 'George Bush' with it."

Wednesday morning, Bush visited the Michigan delegation and formally released those pledged to him. Nevertheless, on the first — and final — ballot, Michiganders cast 67 votes for

Reagan, 13 for Bush, one for former Ambassador Anne Armstrong and one uncommitted.

Reagan made it official by announcing that Ford "came to the conclusion he can be of more value as a former president campaigning his heart out."


The former California governor said he picked Bush, a former United Nations ambassador, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, envoy to China, Republican National Committee chairman and U.S. representative from Texas, as "a candidate with great experience in government who can enthusiastically support" the entire platform.

THE SCENE was reminiscent of 1960 when Democratic presidential nominee John Kennedy picked his closest rival, Senate majority leader Lyndon Johnson, for vice president.


Larry Littman, a Bush delegate and 18th Congressional District chairman from Troy, favored Bush because "I really believe he (Reagan) wants to try to put together a ticket that would attract the most voters possible."

"I think he's the only logical choice," said Bush delegate Karen Czernal of Troy. "I think Reagan will want to reach out to all the moderates in the nation."

"I think the Bush delegation from this state — which is the largest Bush delegation at the convention — feels that way to a person," said Lewis.

## Mechanic job hangs as board, union disagree

Differences between the Township Board and Canton's firefighter union has snagged a 2-month-old pledge for the "immediate" hiring of a diesel mechanic to solve maintenance problems in the fire department.

Township negotiators were scheduled to bargain Wednesday with Local 2289 of the International Association of Firefighters in an attempt to iron out their differences.

The two sides have not met since June, according to finance director Mike Gorman, a negotiator for the township.

At issue is the mechanic's member-

ship in one of two unions, according to spokesmen for both sides.

The Township Board indicated in May that the diesel mechanic would be hired "immediately." The decision was made after a board member received an anonymous letter containing allegations of poor vehicle maintenance. The author charged that oil in one ambulance had not been changed in two years.

A township investigation substantiated many of the charges.

The fire department's first full-time mechanic position was created by the Township Board in October. But the position was not filled by the merit commission until April. The mechanic was

fired for incompetence two weeks later.

DESPITE THE POSITION'S continued vacancy, Supervisor Noel Culbert said all fire vehicles are now "in A-number-one shape."

The township has contracted with

Griffin Co. of Highland Park for basic maintenance and repairs pending the hiring of a full-time mechanic.

Gorman said the township has spent about \$5,000 so far on the contract, which calls for pay of \$35 an hour. The Township Board plans to pay a mechanic about \$20,000 a year.

The township expected to test 25 applicants for the job this week.

Clerk John Flodin, a negotiator for the township, admitted that the mechanic "could possibly have been hired by now" if differences with the firefighters union had been resolved.

The Township Board wants to place

the mechanic in the DPW, where Canton's only full-time mechanic and assistant currently work. The new employee would belong to AFSCME (American Federation of State County and Municipal Employees).

But David Champagne, president of

## Fences stir debate, trustees weigh law

Proposed revisions to the township fence ordinance is creating a subdivision debate on property rights.

About 20 corner lot owners filed into the Township Board's meeting hall last week to hurl their objections at a proposed ban on fences in their sideyards.

Two weeks earlier, the Township Board had agreed informally to strike a provision in the current law which allows sideyard fences with permission of the next-door neighbor.

The restriction applies only to corner lots with side and backyards abutting front yards of homes next door. In those cases, the two houses face an adjacent street.

The board told ordinance director Bruce Phillips in June to ban side yard fences on such lots.

Their decision was based on the number of complaints Phillips has received from homeowners who live next to corner lots.

According to Phillips, the residents have vehemently protested the placement of fences between their front yard and their neighbor's rear and side lot.

In some cases, neighborhood feuds have resulted, Phillips said. In other cases, residents have reluctantly given their permission for fences in the name

## Candidates square off

Anna Bradley says "many people can't possibly care about Canton as much as I do."

A resident of Canton for the past 25 years, Mrs. Bradley served as township treasurer from 1976 to 1978. She lost her bid for re-election two years ago.

Mrs. Bradley, 55, now is attempting to win back the treasurer's job. The position, now part-time, will be a full-time slot beginning in November.

"I was full time anyway. I just got part-time pay," said Mrs. Bradley. "I put in a lot of hours on my own and watched every penny that was being spent."

Mrs. Bradley, a Democrat, is one of five candidates seeking the treasurer's position.

SHE "MOST DEFINITELY" opposes the township's farmland preservation program.

Gerald Brown rates himself as an independent, willing to listen and to compromise. And he believes goal-setting is the way to get things done.

Brown, 49, is a Democratic candidate for township treasurer. The four-year term will combine a full-time administrative slot and membership on the township board.

As an eight-year Canton resident, Brown is making his first stab at public office. He said he would tap managerial experience gained as an Air Force administrative officer and as a supervisor for an automotive company.

Currently, Brown is an independent safety and loss control consultant and a part-time management instructor at a local college.

"Canton is in a formative period," said Brown. "This four-year period will be very important in Canton's history."

## Retailers consider making up

Some Canton business people — at odds over how retail can snag shoppers' interest — may be ready to kiss and make up.

A group of shop owners is considering the possibility of calling off its plans to form a retail merchants association. The association, which would be separate from the Canton Township Chamber of Commerce, would concentrate on special events, sidewalk sales and blockbuster promotions.

Gary Roberts, who has been spearheading that move, now says he "hopes" the group can remain within the chamber. Roberts owns a vacuum cleaner and sewing machine shop.

Also leading the drive have been owners of a beauty salon, a restaurant, a delicatessen and a handful of others. Roberts said there also are about 23 other "enthusiastic" supporters.

"We aren't getting our fair share of business," said Roberts. "Most chambers have a merchants committee, and they run their own show. I tried to do this a year-and-a-half ago, and nobody showed any enthusiastic moves."

"I AM HOPING we see it's feasible (to stay with the chamber)," he continued. "That was my original attitude, to be separate. Hey, it depends on what the chamber has to offer."

Frank McMurray, president of the chamber of commerce, agrees that small shops need more business.

He believes that township officials should work through the chamber of commerce. He also says the community needs the support of residents.

McMurray has operated a State Farm Insurance agency in Canton Township for 11 years and has lived in the community for 17 years.

Last month, Gov. Milliken named

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
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

## Settling in new home Retarded adults bid institution farewell

Once Bonnie finishes setting the table for dinner and cleaning up after a meal, she may decide to watch TV or talk to her new roommate. Evelyn and Betty are excited about the prospects of backyard cookouts, new clothing and more flattering hairstyles. Bonnie, Evelyn and Betty recently moved into a sunny, ranch-style home with yard and garden located on Haggerty Road near Palmer in Canton Township. Retarded, ranging in age from 20's to 40's, they are learning a more independent lifestyle.

A total of six retarded women live in the home, attending school or working in a sheltered workshop during the day. Employees of Alternative Services, a non-profit corporation, supervise the women 24 hours a day.

Alternative Services also has another group home in Canton on Roundtable, south of Palmer and east of Morton Taylor. That home, for six retarded men, is a colonial-style home with country kitchen, formal dining room and backyard.

Alternative, based in Royal Oak, is expected to open another home on Warren Road near Haggerty in September, said Rich Bennett, a regional supervisor for all three homes.

Under state law, mentally retarded persons may be placed in community group homes if they would benefit from a non-institutional lifestyle. Homes cannot be located within 1,500 feet of an existing facility.

"SOME OF the clients have lived in the community, some had lived with their families," explained Bennett. "We look at this as a step in a continuum from very restrictive to less (restrictive)."

The two Canton homes, which opened a couple of weeks ago, have aroused mixed feelings among neighbors. Staff members have held meetings and receptions with area residents.

At the Roundtable site, some neighbors had been upset when the group home was proposed several months ago. During recent weeks, Bennett

said things have been "pretty quiet."

One neighbor continued to be opposed. But another served iced tea to the group as they were moving in, and a third has offered to make repairs around the house, said Bennett.

In the meantime, Alternative plans to hold shared social events with clients from both homes. Women will receive new hairstyles, and new clothes will be purchased.

"Institutional life has a way of aging a person more quickly," explained Bennett. "It's easier to cut their hair very short and dress them in the same style of clothes."

**OTHER SKILLS** to be learned will be shopping, banking and household chores.

"Social skills are very important," said Beth Smith, house supervisor of the Haggerty site. "(The clients) recognize each other from the institution. It's enjoyable to watch. It's probably the most important thing now because it was lacking (before). They have come a long way in this time."

"It isn't an across-the-board assumption that these people are going to be able to handle (only) the smaller things," said Bennett. "There may be other areas we will need to substitute."

Smith is a Canton Township resident who has worked as an attendant at the Plymouth Center for Human Development. She also has worked as an instructor at Northville State Hospital, a psychiatric facility.

Bennett, regional supervisor for Alternative Services, has worked with mentally retarded at several facilities since he graduated from Alma College in 1973.

The only way to normalize (mentally impaired) is in a community," said James Hunt, director of the Northville Residential Training Center. "Some of them don't speak well, but you can see their enjoyment in their eyes."

"It's their (home) and it isn't a drab institution," he added.

of good neighbor relations.

Some claim that the fences destroy the front-yard appearance of the entire street.

Last week, however, the Township Board received a different view of the issue.

Sharleen Immonen presented the board with a petition signed by 49 residents in support of side yard fences. A letter from Mrs. Immonen called for a four-foot height restriction on fences which would border the front yard of neighboring property. "It deprives me of use of my yard," one resident said of the proposed ban. "All I'm asking for is my property rights without inhibiting my neighbor's visibility."

A newcomer to Canton said he "felt embarrassed to knock on this fellow's door and ask permission to construct a

fence on my own property."


After a 1½-hour discussion, trustees indicated they may reconsider the issue. They voted to table the matter and seek an attorney's advice after Trustee Carol Bodenmiller expressed concern about changing the zoning ordinance.

The four-month-old ordinance prohibits any permanent structures in setback areas.

The board also directed Supervisor Noel Culbert to schedule a study session and informal hearing on the fence issue.

Culbert said the meeting may be scheduled for the fifth Tuesday in July. But he expressed distaste at holding the meeting before the Aug. 5 primary.

"I'm not holding that thing before the election," he said. "The board directed me to hold a study session on fences. They didn't say when."

## Brown faces issues of treasurer's race

Brown said he would spend the first few months becoming familiar with the township's finances and then map out a plan to invest surplus. He noted that residents recently have approved tax increases for police, fire and library services.

"I have no ties to anyone," said Brown. "I would hope I don't have any allies at the moment. And I would hope I don't have any adversaries."

"WHEN PEOPLE see their new tax bills this fall, it will be very difficult to get anybody to vote for tax increases," said Brown. "I have been unable to find out" the financial condition of the township.

Brown also supports farmland preservation and better relations with the business community.

"The advantage for developers isn't there, the way it was four or five years ago," said Brown. "That property is zoned agricultural. It would be very difficult to legally retain agricultural use unless farmers get some form of tax relief within 24-36 months."

"I don't think as elected officials, we can play around with their estate forever," added Brown.

Brown said he is glad to see that the Chamber of Commerce and the current Township Board are moving toward more cooperation. The board recently approved the formation of a task force to investigate problems of business people over zoning ordinances and signs.

"The problems of the small businesses are colossal," said Brown. "Many people have a lifetime dream to own a business, and sometimes it seems Canton tries to make it into a nightmare."

Brown also said he would like to get out into the community and talk to residents about their hopes for the township. For example, do residents want more recreational facilities? Would they prefer more "passive" areas, such as picnic grounds, or more active recreation such as tennis courts or team facilities?

Brown said his five-year goal is to have Canton Township residents satisfied with their community and "feel about it the way Dearborn residents feel, especially cleanliness and beauty."

"Canton is a pretty good place to live," said Brown. "I have no particular quarrel."

## Shops may return to fold

Last month, Gov. Milliken named McMurray to an 11-member statewide small business council. The group will work with the state Department of Commerce in sponsoring a small business conference early next year.

"PEOPLE ARE beating their heads against the wall to stay in business," said McMurray. "Businesses are going down the tubes, but who cares?"

"We need the support of the residents," he continued. "Why not shop in Canton?"

According to McMurray, there are about 150 members of the Canton chamber. He said about half are retail merchants, with the rest a variety of business and professional persons such as physicians, attorneys, etc.

"The chamber feels that as (the retail merchants) organize, it should come under the chamber," added McMurray.

Both Roberts and McMurray say business people have been hampered by some of the township's strict regulations on signs and zoning. They say it makes it difficult for business people to promote special sales and events.

McMurray said the township board's approval last week of a task force to study business problems is a sign that the board "recognizes there is a need." The committee, which is being developed, was suggested by the chamber of commerce.

"We have to create an environment that businesses can be welcomed into our community," said McMurray. "I guess our concept is that we (business people) would like the township to seek our advice when they are passing ordinances."

"We feel we have some issues which can be dealt with immediately," he added.

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# Bradley tries to get back treasurer position

Her views are tempered by her parents' experience in Communist Romania, where the government confiscated the family's land. "I don't think it should ever have been started," she said of the farmland preservation program. "As far as I'm concerned, it should be dropped. People should be allowed to develop their land. "Anyone who says they don't like open space is not telling the truth. But

we can't infringe on another person's rights to get it. "We put this on the ballot once," she added. "It was voted down." Mrs. Bradley believes local taxpayers will have to pay for a development rights program, if ever implemented. "The people don't want to pay for someone else's land they can't utilize. I'd rather pay for a park I could have a picnic in." Mrs. Bradley envisions eventual de-

velopment in western Canton in "the same way as in the eastern side." She favors revision of the township's zoning ordinance to allow high-rise developments. Current regulations prohibit buildings higher than two stories without special approval. "They want to preserve open space, fine. Then why don't they have high-rises. It isn't like we're on the Gulf of Mexico where we'll be hiding someone's view."

Mrs. Bradley says Canton should build a high-rise housing complex for senior citizens near a shopping center.

**SHE CONSIDERS** industrial development a number-one priority and blames current township attitudes for a shortage of industry. "Developers come here and get degraded by the board. You wonder why they don't turn around and walk out," Kinks in site plans should be worked

out by the time they reach the Township Board, she maintained. "The board makes everything such a major project. We've got to be firm, but we've got to quit being so picky. There's a thing called compromise. We've got to work with these developers."

Mrs. Bradley is all for recreation, "even though I'm not athletic." She suggests construction of a community swimming pool and ice rink with profits from the township-owned Fellows Creek Golf Course. Those monies were earmarked for recreation when the golf course was purchased, she said.

"We've got to keep the youth off the street." In regard to legal fees, she "firmly believes that our tax dollars are going down the drain."

"It seems strange that everything has to go to legal firms," she said. "We have two attorneys on the current board. Can't they give their expertise?"

MRS. BRADLEY believes "some-

thing must be worked out" to pave Warren Road. She opposed construction of the fire station at Warren and Haggerty because of the poor condition. She says ordinance officers should be prohibited from carrying guns. Ordinance officers should fall under the jurisdiction of the police department.

She endorses township steps to establish a farmers market. But Mrs. Bradley opposes operating the market in the New Towne Plaza at Ford and Sheldon. The facility will compete with nearby supermarkets, she said.

"After all, the supermarkets are paying high taxes." Mrs. Bradley campaigned as a running mate of former Supervisor Harold Stein during the last two elections. This time, she is campaigning independently. Mrs. Bradley owns B&K Lawn and Garden Sales on Canton Center with husband George. She worked in the credit and cashier's department of the Ann Arbor Gas Co. prior to 1971. She is a member of the Wayne County Democratic Party, the Plymouth Elks and the Canton Chamber of Commerce.

# Knasiak pushes internal goals

**KNASIAK SAYS** additional policies and procedures are needed to govern day-to-day operations inside township hall.

Better procedures and improved utilization of employees would make Canton's government more cost-efficient, he says.

He says the treasurer should help formulate policies and work "hand in hand" with the finance director on budgetary and other fiscal matters.

"The township has grown from a mom and pop community to a metropolitan of 48,000," said Knasiak. "We have a million dollar budget. Assets should

be protected with procedures on how to handle them.

"I've asked for (current) procedures, and I haven't seen them," he said.

Knasiak criticizes a current practice at township hall to keep a postage meter device unlocked. The machine is located in a room near the back entrance of township hall.

He endorses more accurate record-keeping of business and travel expenses.

"It's just a way of checking to see (if expense policies) are abused," he said.

Knasiak also favors establishment of a "reward" policy for department heads who stay within their yearly

budgets. Increased interest allocations from invested tax money could be awarded to those department heads when budgets are drawn for the following year.

By Township Board action, the treasurer's job will become a full-time position following the November election. Knasiak endorses that decision.

**ALTHOUGH KNASIAK** cites "internal control" as his top priority, he voices concern on other issues — especially "the image of the community."

The Township Board should adopt a program "to clean up the community," he says. Trees and grass should be planted along streets.

"You have to give the homeowners something to see where their tax dollars go. The people are always talking about the image of the community."

"Everywhere you go in Canton is really an ugly sight."

He endorses more funding for recreation and views farmland preservation as an important issue.

In general, however, Knasiak has decided to "shy away from the issues."

"Before you can make a statement, you have to know issues inside and out," he says.

"There's been a lot of talk pro and con (about farmland preservation.) But I can't honestly say I'm for or against it."

"Recreation is a priority item, but not number one," he says. "You can't really prioritize any specific department without making analytical reviews and forecasts."

Knasiak, a Canton resident since 1976, is current president of the Cavalier Village Homeowners Association. He served as a delegate to the Republican Party's state convention last June, at which delegates to the GOP national convention were selected.

the firefighters union, said members of his department want the mechanic in their labor organization.

The Township Board has promised to allocate most of the mechanic's time to the fire department, according to Flodin. But officials want the mechanic available for other township departments.

"We're willing to allow him to work on other vehicles," said Champagne of the union's position. "But we feel that if he's not in the fire union, problems would arise."

The union wants fire department supervision of the mechanic Champagne said.

**NEGOTIATIONS** between the township and firefighters was highlighted publicly last week when two former union officials accused the Township Board of "bad faith bargaining."

Dave Hamilton, former president, and Don Adams, former secretary-treasurer, said township negotiators had not met with them in three weeks.

"If this is good faith bargaining, I don't want to see bad faith bargaining,"

said Adams during the public forum section of a board meeting.

Both union officials lost their office in a union election the following day.

Gorman attributed the lack of bargaining to an impasse on the union membership issue.

"They gave us a proposal we couldn't live with. The board's direction hadn't changed," he said.

According to Gorman, township negotiators met with the union on three separate occasions in May and June. The firefighters contract does not require negotiations regarding newly-created positions, although salary must be negotiated by both sides.

"They asked us to sit down with them, so we did," Gorman said.

Flodin declined comment on the timetable of hiring the mechanic if an agreement between the township and union cannot be reached.

But Champagne expressed an optimistic view on the outcome of bargaining.

"The township seems willing to work with us. There was a stalemate for awhile," he said. "But, hopefully, we can resolve this — rapidly."

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
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
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# Makeup!

## Republicans put their best face forward

Can a pat on the cheek help someone become president? On the chance that it might, the Republicans in town are making use of the services of Carolyn Kerner Stein of West Bloomfield.

With powder puffs loaded and ready to billow, she's stationed near the podium in Joe Louis Arena. Her job is to make sure Ronald Reagan and other notable Republicans put their best faces forward.

Mrs. Stein is a makeup artist. She was recommended to the GOP by a New York television producer.

Her assignment, she explains, is not to create deceptions about anyone's appearance, but to help people defend themselves against the harshness of the lights, the questionable sensitivity of the cameras and the visible strain of the event.

"CORRECTING THINGS the camera would pick up," Mrs. Stein calls her job. But if you happen to be a Republican with a double chin, she has kits filled with topical potions that are faster than plastic surgery.

Considering the popular theory that Richard Nixon's appearance during the Nixon-Kennedy debates was a factor in his losing that election, Mrs. Stein hopes people "pay more attention to fundamentals" and vote for more than looks.

But the lesson politicians learned from those telecasts was to not wear clothing that blends into the background and to do something about a heavy-looking beard.

"Nixon looked pale and drawn and needed some makeup to help him look tanned and robust," she says. "It was near the end of the campaign and I'm sure he was very tired."

POLITICAL POWDERING is simple for Mrs. Stein compared with some work she's done. She recently was hired to give an actor a Karl Malden nose, a challenge possibly met successfully before only by Malden's parents.

She also is prepared to give any actor whatever

bruises or disfigurements a script might call for, and wounds to match any weapon.

In somewhat less extreme categories, she makes people up for television commercials, talk shows and movies. She's done Detroit's top auto people, athletes, entertainers and a number of Miss Americas.

Her list includes Muhammad Ali, Billie Jean King, Van Johnson, Hugh Downs, Ricardo Montalban, Victor Borge, Jane Wyatt and E.G. Marshall.

She made up the stars of three made-in-Detroit feature films: Sterling Hayden in the never-released "Michael"; Richard Pryor in "Blue Collar," and Laurence Olivier in "The Betsy."

OLIVIER, HERE PRIOR to being named Lord Olivier, was very cordial, she remembers. "When you finally meet him, you don't know if you're going to bow or faint. I finally said, 'Hello, Sir Laurence,' and he smiled and said, 'Call me Larry.'"

In addition to GOP duties, Mrs. Stein has been hired by the Foreign Broadcasting Service for special assignments. CBS - Walter Cronkite & Co. - also has hired her to aid their own makeup staff.

Security clearance by the Secret Service was a prerequisite to getting the job. She wears on a neck chain the scarce pass that gets her to the podium area.

That's where she was scheduled to face the faces of such unordinary folk as Pat Boone, Glen Campbell, Mayor Young, Billy Graham, Gov. Milliken, President Ford, Susan Anton, Vicki Carr, Buddy Ebsen, Chad Everett, Wayne Newton, Ginger Rogers, Jimmy Stewart, Barry Goldwater Sr. and Jr., John Connolly, Henry Kissinger, George Bush and Howard Baker, among others.

It's also likely that she will see the vice presidential candidate, whoever he is going to be, before the rest of the world does.

As with the presidential candidate, the plan is that before anyone else sees him, Mrs. Stein will tuck paper towels into his collar and ask him to close his eyes.



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
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# Downtown's working stiffs join the party

Downtown Detroit during the Republican Convention is turning out to be a party for both conventioners and those who normally work downtown.

"I think we have the best of both worlds," says Rick Kaye, a West Bloomfield resident, whose 29th floor office in the Renaissance Center overlooks Detroit.

"There've been none of the inconveniences everyone expected, but all of the excitement."

Kaye, a partner in the international accounting firm of Coopers and Lybrand, confirms reports of little traffic and half empty restaurants.

"Traffic is better than usual. I went to get gas in Windsor. No one was there. Everything's been empty."

He acknowledged that many of the people he works with were concerned that the convention would complicate their work routine.

"One guy in our office deliberately took this week off," Kaye said. "He didn't want the hassle."

DURING THE first two days of the convention, Kaye shook hands with Ronald Reagan, walked alongside former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and spied U.S. Senators Howard Baker and Robert Dole. Kissinger, he said, was surrounded by "seven or eight Secret Service men."

He enjoys the knowledge that NBC's Today show is being filmed below him and watched from his high perch the white-robed procession of ERA marchers head down the riverfront to the Joe Louis Arena.

As partner in charge of the actuarial, benefits and compensation consulting services, he talks to people from other areas of the country. "They're all asking how it is here," he said.

He tells them, "It's exciting. Delegates are all over. I'm going out of my way, as others do, to be helpful."

Renaissance Center-based firms, such as Coopers and Lybrand, asked for company volunteers to give special help to delegates and other out-of-towners. They wear red badges asking "Can I help you?"

THE FRIENDLINESS of Detroiters such as those who work in the Renaissance Center and the overall organization of the convention has left conventioners such as Debbie Goodell and Chris Hutchens, from Colorado, thoroughly impressed with Detroit and its suburbs.

Ms. Goodell, 19, paid her own way to be a page at the convention. Ms. Hutchens, 20, is an official convention visitor. Both are staying at the Holiday Inn in Southfield.

"I was expecting something totally different," Ms. Goodell said. "I was expecting to see a lot more chaos. People are so friendly."

"It seems like the whole state has gone out of their way to help with the GOP convention."

Both women say transportation between Southfield and the convention area has been no problem, with buses leaving the motel every half hour.

A party for the Colorado delegation at the Bloomfield Township home of Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Hilda Gage and her attorney husband, Noel, got their four-day visit off to a good start.

And although Michiganders travel to Colorado by the droves for scenery, Ms. Hutchens said, "Everything's so green here. We're not used to so many trees."

# GOP delegates snap to attention

One man single-handedly brought the entire Republican National Convention to a dead halt Tuesday night.

Doug Ashley of Bloomfield Township got on top of the ABC Television anchor booth, leaned over and shot the official GOP convention photograph.

Interviewed while he was still testing and preparing to take the historic picture, Ashley said he didn't intend to be nervous, even at the crucial moment.

"We've been making test photos all week from a number of positions," said Ashley. "We're ready."

Working with him are his wife, Janet Ashley, also a free lance photographer, and Robert Moore Jr., a colleague from Warren.

Ashley said about the plum assignment: "I'm absolutely ecstatic."

How does a free lance photographer become the official GOP convention photographer?

"I WAS originally retained by the people in charge of building all of the convention facilities (Greyhound Exposition Services)," said Ashley. "They asked me on behalf of the GOP National Committee to come up with a photo history of the convention."

Ashley began shooting during the first week in June and has followed it through.

"The national committee asked me to take the official photo two weeks ago," he said. "While I've done many major events and many political conventions, this is the first one I've been through from the ground up."

"And it's the first time I've had a whole convention grind to a halt for me."

Ashley is using about \$7,000 worth of equipment, he said. Test shots for the official photograph were taken from several spots in the Joe Louis Arena and submitted to the committee for selection.

Ashley's being on the spot has led to many other assignments connected with the convention, including a photograph for a national NBC-TV advertisement and photo coverage of private and public receptions and parties.

He's also shooting the convention for American Youth Magazine and newspapers in the Flint area.

ON MONDAY NIGHT he took what he calls a "fish-eye" photo, a panoramic view of the entire arena, from the catwalk in the ceiling at the request of Michigan Lt. Gov. William Brickley.

Ashley, a professional photographer since 1959, works out of his home in the township. He has covered every Republican national convention since 1960 and most Democratic national conventions.

He is director of photography for the Silverdome in Pontiac and director of public relations for the National Press Photographers Association.

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## Conservatives love it

# Kissinger talks tough about Reds

Political observers betting on an anti-Henry Kissinger rally during the former secretary of state's address to the GOP convention ended up in the red.

After having met earlier this week with Republican presidential nominee Ronald Reagan, Kissinger sauntered to the podium and delivered a hard-line professorial lecture on foreign policy.

Instead of being harassed by delegate jeers, the Nobel Peace Prize winner was greeted with a standing ovation.

Before the GOP gathering in Detroit, many conservatives had objected to Kissinger addressing the convention.

Kissinger has been considered by many Republican conservatives as being "too soft" on Communist nations with his policy of detente and endorsement of the Panama Canal and Salt II treaties.

Most feared a repeat of the 1964 GOP convention when Barry Goldwater supporters refused to allow New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller to finish his speech.

At one time Kissinger served as Rockefeller's foreign affairs advisor and is considered to be a member of the moderate Republican faction.

But Reagan, who throughout the campaign has insisted on a

show of unity before national network cameras, got just what he wanted.

THE GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY professor was anything but too soft when it came to criticizing the Carter foreign affairs policies.

"After nearly four years of confusion we have become impotent bystanders as the world lurches from crisis to crisis," he told the late-night gathering.

"The Carter administration has managed the extraordinary feat of having at one and the same time the worst relations with our allies, the worst relations with our adversaries and the most serious upheavals in the developing world since the second World War."

Kissinger labeled Carter foreign policy as naive and as a philosophy of "abdication."

He swept through the litany of what he considered to be Carter transgressions: vacillation on the neutron bomb; a barometric defense budget; acceptance of Soviet troops in Cuba; the Afghanistan invasion; and, of course the Iranian hostages.

"The neglect of our defenses has tempted mounting threats to our national security," he warned.

Carter policy endorses the use of "cynical expedients to get

through the election."

"We are told endless alibis for doing nothing; that not every upheaval affects our interests, that the disasters have complex socio-economic causes, that Communist gains will prove temporary," he said.

KISSINGER who would very much like to rejoin a national administration offered his own solutions.

- Rebuild military defenses.
- End Soviet expansionism.
- Mend alliances.
- Work with persons of "good will" around the world to fulfill mankind's positive aspirations.

"Sooner or later our weakness will produce a catastrophe. The time is too serious to play a numbers game with our defense budget," he said, insisting that the gap in military spending between the Soviet Union and the United States be closed.

In traditional Kissinger philosophy, he called for a restoration of the political balance of power.



## SNAP SHOTS

It's hard to describe the reception U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell and former Sen. Robert Griffin threw Sunday at Greenfield Village for Republican congressmen attending the GOP National Convention.

Working the group for all three hours was a hand-shaking George Bush, whom Pursell, R-Plymouth, had supported for the presidential nomination.

Since Bush quit the race May 26, Pursell had openly pushed the former ambassador as Ronald Reagan's running mate.

Bush was in more snapshots than anyone. Stars of the show, based on applause, were Gerald and Betty Ford. The former president and first lady made a 10-minute appearance and then were whisked off by helicopter from the brunch hall.

Two famous names from the 1972 primaries were at the Pursell-Griffin bash.

Rep. Pete McCloskey, the ex-Marine from California who had challenged Richard Nixon for the presidential nomination on an anti-war platform, was there from the liberal side of the spectrum.

Rep. John Ashbrook, the conservative Ohioan, was there to present the now-dominant right wing which also challenged Nixon.

Chuckled Pursell: "We try to keep the party broad-based."

"Sonofagun!" said Rep. Don Clausen of California after the party. "We forgot to get the best photo of the day. We could have had four first basemen."

Clausen, once a semi-pro ballplayer, explained that Ford, who had served in the House from 1949-73, had been first basemen on the House Republican softball team.

Bush, who served from 1969-72, also had been first basemen Pursell, elected in 1976, is the current first basemen.

Clausen himself had played first sack between the times Ford, Bush and Pursell had performed, saying he voluntarily surrendered the post when a better player came along.

"We won all but four of the last 17 games," Clausen said. "It proves a point. If Republicans can have the same number of players in a game, we can do extraordinarily well."

Currently Democrats outnumber Republicans about 2-1 in Congress.

Clausen added that Pursell "has immense respect on both sides of the aisle" and that the second-term Michigan congressman is on his way to becoming a national figure.

"I could be with my delegation (at the Detroit Plaza) Hotel," said Clausen. "I'm senior member of the (California) Republican congressional delegation. But I chose to be here at Carl's affair."

Alice Haidostian of Birmingham was at the brunch for several reasons.

She performed at the piano - works ranging from "Sunny Side of the Street" to "The Victors," when her fellow U-M grad Ford entered.

Another reason was that Pursell's staff did most of the work for the party, and her daughter, Cynthia Hudgins, works in Pursell's Ann Arbor district office.

Jack McDonald was there. The congressman from the old 19th District from 1967-72, he now heads Jack McDonald Associates, a lobbying firm in Washington, D.C.

The former Redford Township supervisor and Farmington Hills resident went into lobbying after losing the congressional nomination to veteran Rep. William Broomfield of Birmingham following the 1970 census. Broomfield also attended.

Among McDonald's clients are American Express, Burroughs Corp., Dow Chemical, Northrup Aviation, Mutual Benefit Insurance Co., the National Association of Life Underwriters - and Japan.

"I've been doing some economic counseling on trade matters," McDonald said.

Is it tough to represent Japan at a time when Japanese auto imports are under political attack? "No, it's easy because the administration's policy and Japan's are the same."

McDonald added he does some national party work and "handle some things for members of Congress."

There's a new public policy firm in Washington called Esch Associates.

At the Pursell brunch was its principal, former U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch. Pursell won the 2nd District seat when Esch vacated it in 1976 to run unsuccessfully for the U.S. Senate.

After that election, Esch was a vice-president of U.S. Steel but since the first of the year has been in his own firm.

"We analyze public policy issues for associations or large corporations, seeing what issues will impact on them in the next five to 10 years."

Clients include U.S. Steel, a metals company and associations in the communications field, the one-time U-M speech professor said.

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

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

## Officials give advice in wake of bad storm

Canton Township officials are reporting the following list of instructions in the wake of the storm Tuesday morning which uprooted trees, smashed windows and garages and blanked electrical and telephone service.

- **Fallen wires:** Don't touch any wires. Call Detroit Edison for repair service.
- **Power off:** Shut off main breaker until power is restored.
- **Water:** Drinking water is available at pumps in front of the DPW building on Geddes west of Sheldon, and on Canton Center Road south of Warren.
- **Emergency service:** Use the emergency fire number (981-1111) only for true emergencies. For other questions or service, call the township hall at 397-1000.

• **Fallen trees or branches:** Place all tree limbs in a location that is accessible to trucks.

• **Dump:** The dump on Lilley south of Michigan is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, and from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday.

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# 51 years separated youngest from oldest delegates

## Favors moderation

It didn't bother Saul Anuzis — at 21 the youngest Michigan delegate — that his first Republican National Convention was held in his own backyard.

"It's probably the only way I could make it," said the University of Michigan-Dearborn student government president. "I probably couldn't afford it any other way."

A westside Detroit, Anuzis opted for his own bed at home rather than joining his fellow delegates in headquarters at the Holiday Inn, Metro Airport.

He still had to trek out to the Hilton Inn at Metro Airport where the 82-member Michigan delegation held its caucuses.

ANUZIS, A senior economics major at UM-D, estimated that most delegates spent anywhere from \$100 to \$150 a day during the convention, which ends this evening.

His budget didn't allow for that. Anuzis said he wasn't planning to go to "a single event that I have to pay for, which probably limits me to three."

Many cocktail parties held between and after convention sessions doubled as fundraisers. Minimum entry prices were \$25 and \$35, he said.

Anuzis, Michigan youth chairman for the George Bush campaign, was one of 15 at-large delegates chosen by the state Republican convention last month.

His "contemporaries" included Gov. William Milliken, former Gov. George Romney, state party chairman Mel Larsen and U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, pledged until Wednesday's nomination vote to George Bush.

On the Reagan side, Anuzis' fellow at-large delegates included multi-millionaire financier Max Fisher, former

U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin and Reagan State Chairman John Gnuo of Bloomfield Hills.

REGARDING THE convention's most publicized controversy over support of the Equal Rights Amendment, Anuzis said, "It's going to be an issue played up in November, and I think it will hurt Reagan."

He said the issue will put Reagan "on the defensive," a position the former California governor wants President Jimmy Carter in.

The GOP platform, which supports use of the death penalty in some cases and advocates a constitutional amendment to ban federally funded abortions, "veers

little to the right," Anuzis said, but he added:

"I agree with a lot of the things they (the mostly conservative GOP platform writers) say."

Anuzis supports Reagan moving towards the moderates to prevent "making the mistake that Goldwater did."

"The country has not yet gone that conservative," he added. "We need moderation a little."

## Stresses involvement

Senior citizens should "get off their duffs and out of their rocking chairs and get involved."

Those are the words of Marie Wentela of Dearborn, who, at 72, is the oldest Michigan delegate to the Republican National Convention.

Miss Wentela, a retired executive secretary, also believes young people would understand the problems of the elderly if they had more contact with them.

In stumping for senior citizen rights, she serves as the Michigan Republican Party's vice chairwoman for senior citizen issues. She has testified before congress and served on state and local task forces.

"THERE ARE three million senior citizens in Michigan," she said. "We have gone through a terrific youth complex. You cannot blame the young. It's a two-way street."

She admits to feeling "bugged" when people try to treat aging as a separate entity, rather than as a part of life.

Miss Wentela also comments on local and national trends.

"We went to Washington to fight for funds to keep elderly persons at home," she said. "In 1979, it cost \$13.75 a day to maintain a person in a day care center versus \$27-plus on Medicare in a nursing home."

LOCALLY, SHE praises a program in the Wayne-West-

land School District that uses senior citizens to teach or lecture to youth.

However, she criticized Detroit's splitting away from the Area Agency on Aging to form its own agency. Miss Wentela said the break "adds to the bureaucracy."

The agency on aging gives out federal money for senior citizen programs. As a result of the split, several out-Wayne County communities got together to form a new consortium. That consortium begins operation Oct. 1.

She also said she was unhappy about the national platform stand on the equal rights (for women) amendment.

"I'm very unhappy, and am sorry I was unable to march (Monday in support of the ERA)."

# Officials have to act—even in election year

It's political shenanigan time again. The Township Board is playing a stalling game with the citizens of Canton Township in an effort to alienate no one before the primary election. The board's tactics became painfully clear recently when several residents stormed a board meeting with complaints about a proposed fence regulation.

The Township Board has addressed more earth-shattering issues than fences in the past. But few matters incite property owners more than a government edict on what they can and cannot do with their land.

Board members expected fury from hundreds of residents no matter which way they decided to act. So in their political wisdom, members decided to take no action at all.

The issue extends far beyond fences. The issue

involves politicians and their unwillingness to risk disfavor in an election year.

**THE BOARD'S** inaction at its last regular meeting July 8 would make a good script for a political comedy—or tragedy.

Only two weeks earlier, the board informally agreed to ban fences in the sideyards of some corner lots.

Ordinance director Bruce Phillips, who is rewriting the fence ordinance, said numerous homeowners have complained vehemently about the current law.

Current regulations require some corner-lot owners to seek permission from their next-door neighbor before erecting fences along their side lot lines. The restriction applies only to corner lots with side and backyards abutting front yards of an adjacent house. In those cases, the two houses face adjacent streets.

Neighbors of corner-lot owners say the current policy detracts from the aesthetics of their houses by planting fences in their front yards. They shun risky bad relations with their neighbors by saying no.

The board had those residents in mind when it informally agreed in June to ban side yard fences.

**BUT ON JULY 8**, corner lot owners stormed into the meeting hall.

They cited the right to fences as an inalienable property right.

The board hemmed and hawed in a 1½-hour discussion of the issue. With the exception of Treasurer Jim Donahue, who is not seeking re-election, and Trustee Carol Bodenmiller, who is, board members indicated that they may change their mind on the issue.

The result was a tabling resolution. The board directed Supervisor Noel Culbert to schedule a study session on the matter.


Culbert later admitted no plans to "hold that thing before the election." Such attitudes underscore a basic fault with our democratic election process.

But it's a fault which voters should not excuse or brush under the rug.

Members of the Township Board were elected to do a job, whether or not a primary is scheduled for the month ahead.

Trying to please everyone all the time never works. As politicians, members of the Township Board should know that.

Inaction on a fence ordinance probably won't cost a life. But inaction on another controversial issue could.



## One day's work, 3 days of showtime

One year ago almost to the week, I sat in a noisy pub in Brighton, England, with a lunchtime half-pint of stout. In English pubs, if there's an empty chair at a table, you just sit down, even if others at the table are total strangers.

We shared the table with a man who I judged to be in his early 30s. From his clothes and conversation, he appeared to be an independent tradesman—plumber or repairman, perhaps.

Far from being stuffy and reserved, the English are the most cordial, warm people in the world. In no time, we were chatting about the newspaper he was reading.

His opinion was that most British newspapers were junky—full of soccer, sports, scandal, crime, sex. His theory as to why this was so was interesting: Newspaper owners wanted to divert the general populace's attention from the serious issues of the day and simply keep them entertained.

I couldn't agree with his analysis because there are many serious and well-written British newspapers—the London Telegraph, the Manchester Guardian, many local papers. Yet there was no denying his observation that the vast majority of people read newspapers that were mainly entertainment sheets.

**I WAS REMINDED** of our conversation this week as the Republican National Television Show hit the airways.

I hesitate to call it a "convention." The major sessions are geared to prime TV time. TV reporters get big advantages in floor time over newspaper reporters. Serious floor debate has been eliminated, for all practical purposes, because it looks bad on TV.

Most incredible of all was the lineup of movie and TV stars who got on the air one evening. In terms of fostering understanding of national issues and alternative solutions, Wayne Newton and Susan Anton couldn't have helped a single voter.

You may have heard there are 2,000 delegates and 8,000 media people at the convention. From this, you could draw the erroneous conclusion that there are four reporters for every delegate.

Not so. I would estimate half or more of those media people are producers, camera men, electricians, go-fers, receptionists, switch-pullers and other technical types. There really aren't so many reporters.

**AMERICA HAS** a presidential election campaign that lasts 14 months. A major industrial state like Michigan is visited several times by every candidate.

And yet it is not incredible that Ronald Reagan has only one address, known as The Speech? Is it not incredible that in 1976 Jimmy Carter had only one address, known as The Speech? Is it not puzzling that George Wallace had only one address, known as The Speech?

Like the English newspaper favored by the populace, American television is giving us vast amounts of entertainment, star personalities, appearances and hoop la, but relatively little solid information, given the millions that are spent on it.

One thing is clear after this week's gaudy spectacle in southeast Michigan: It took four solid days to broadcast, but all the major activities required only a day and a half.

Reagan has had a majority of the GOP delegates for six weeks, right? The roll call of the states and his acceptance speech could have been handled in 90 minutes, right? He could have announced his choice of a running mate, had it ratified and introduced the No. 2 man in another 30 minutes, right?

As I said, it's all a television show, and it's mainly entertainment.

## ERA ardor dampened by deadline

The ERA litmus test will come long before its 1982 deadline.

And from the lackluster turnout at recent Detroit Equal Rights Amendment rallies, that should be anything but a surprise.

The voting public's commitment to the long-standing proposal has been severely challenged by the National Republican Party's ERA platform betrayal.

While this country's female population should be outraged by this action, it is questionable whether it will unite to defeat Ronald Reagan in November.

Republicans are ecstatic about their election chances in November, not only for the White House but for attaining a majority in the U.S. House of Representatives.

If their July optimism turns to a November reality, it would be the ERA death knell.

For if the GOP can wrest a majority in the U.S. House, it can do so in a number of key state legislatures where the ERA fate rests.

Political demonstrations have become something of a cliché and just as meaningless. Americans have become indifferent to thousands of marching militants, no matter the cause.

**THE CHICAGO** rally proved that. Even though hundreds of thousands gathered to support the ERA, reinforced by a bevy of celebrities, that failed to win over three-fifths of the Illinois legislature.



A dismal rally was attempted at the Kern Block Sunday that clearly demonstrated a lack of commitment by ERA supporters.

Touted as a major rally, it featured the governor's wife, Helen Milliken; Detroit City Councilwoman Erma Henderson; excommunicated Mormon Sonia Johnson; and Eleanora Anderson, daughter of independent presidential candidate John Anderson.

But even those heavyweight public figures couldn't bring out what one would call a respectable crowd. It is doubtful whether most Republican delegates were even aware of it.

For much of the day, persons from the news me-

dia stood around looking at one another waiting for something to happen. Nothing much did.

**THE ACTION** was across the street at Detroit's Kennedy Square where a much larger demonstration was being put on for the captive nations. At times, the din of that rally could be heard over the ERA speakers.

While the National Organization for Women (NOW) rally on Monday was larger, it got little attention and was just another demonstration during convention week.

Stop ERA conservatives have learned a valuable lesson, one which ERA supporters would be wise to heed.

The real work in winning a cause rests with grass roots efforts over the telephone, through the mail and from door to door.

Conservatives have done just that, electing candidates who oppose ERA and defeating others who don't. ERA supporters have neglected that type of political action.

**IF THE ERA** is to be part of the U.S. Constitution, supporters must regroup and be willing to tackle grass roots efforts.

But ERA defeat is in the air. And like any dying political movement, it suffers from supporters who have given up the fight.

## Blame officials if the fights are brutal


In recent days, the public prints have been the sounding board for the hues and cries of the dogooders who abhor the so-called brutality in what they call the "fight game" and in many cases are asking for its banishment from the sporting scene.

This is nothing new. Every now and then during the past century, the same hues and cries have been heard, and at one time they were heeded. In fact, the bouts were held on rafts in the lower Mississippi River as a means of getting around the ban.

What these critics overlook is that the so-called brutality is the fault of the officials and the various athletic commissions who allow one-sided matches to continue when it is obvious that there is no question regarding the ultimate winner.

A **GOOD** case in point happened just the other evening in Minneapolis when heavyweight champion Larry Holmes made a punching bag of his opponent and even asked the referee to stop the slaughter. His plea went unheeded for several rounds, and the critics had a field day calling attention to the brutality.

After a round or two of this mismatch, it was evident Holmes' opponent should not have been in the same ring. And whoever sanctioned the match must never have seen either fighter in action. So the fault lies in the lap of the athletic commission that sanctioned the match and foisted it on the public.



It long has been forgotten that what is now called the fight game started as the manly art of self defense. It was inaugurated as a means of showing the public how the humans could protect themselves with their hands. It never was meant to be brutal.

Delving in to the records, you'll find that when James J. Corbett defeated the legendary John L. Sullivan for the heavyweight title, he was referred to as "Gentleman Jim." He gained the title by out-boxing Sullivan.

Years later, Jack Johnson, who many claim was the best boxer ever to hold the heavyweight title, outpointed Jim Jeffries to gain the crown.

**NOT UNTIL** Jack Dempsey came along WAS scientific boxing was cast aside, and he quickly earned the title of "The Manassa Mauler." Dempsey couldn't box, but he gained his victories by in-

flicting brutal beatings on his rivals. That is until Gene Tunney, a boxer, took the title from him.

One reason for the so-called brutality in the prize ring today is the fact that the contestants haven't learned their trade. If you watch closely, not one is a body puncher. They all go for beating their rival with blows to the head.

It is common knowledge that Joe Louis, during his climb to the heavyweight throne and his long reign, never was called upon to meet a body puncher. No one knows how he would have fared had he met one.

Old Sam Langford, one of the greatest of the fighters who never gained the title, always preached, "Kill the body and the head will die." But few of the latter-day fighters have heeded his advice.

From the opening bell these days, the fighter has only one goal—to knock the other fellow's head off. As a result, we have old timers going around now in a condition commonly known as "punch drunk."

In most cases, they were allowed to continue taking a beating about the head when they no longer had a chance to win.

So, the manly art of self defense should not be banned. But the blame for the present brutality is at the feet of the athletic commissions who condone mismatches and one-sided bouts.

The, coming around the park to the Washington Boulevard trolley, a hint of the frivolity soon to hit along the riverfront began.

The yellow canopies at Kennedy Square had plenty of people beneath them as early afternoon temperatures approached 90.

A good-natured police woman directed traffic across Jefferson to the riverfront attractions — Renaissance Center, Hart Plaza, Ford Auditorium, Cobo and if you were lucky enough to beg, borrow, steal or come legitimately by the proper pass — Joe Louis Arena.

People dripping credentials were the rule. Most wore them on a chain around the neck.

I sneaked sidelong glances to see just who had limited access, full access or mere Secret Service clearance.

BUTTON, T-SHIRT and souvenir vendors were out in full force. So were ice cream, flower and fruit sellers shouting their wares.

Organ music from the vintage Mariner's Church played out Anchors Away. The University of Michigan band reportedly had entertained lunch-time guests earlier in Hart Plaza.

Western hats, hats with elephant trunks and floppy ears and cameras — TV, movie and little Brownies — were everywhere.

The mood was airy and carefree. Balloons were all about. Yes, Detroit loves a good party — part of Detroit.


Louisiana, Tennessee and California," he added.





They got back to the Plymouth Hilton about 12:30 a.m. They were going to leave earlier but couldn't get all their people collected.





# Original works of art on PCAC post cards

The works of nine local artists have been reproduced on heavy cream paper and the results are 10 new post-cards and a new fund-raiser for the Plymouth-Canton Community Arts Council.

The post card art series stemmed from an idea brought from Kansas to Michigan by the Traverse City Arts Council. The arts council board made the decision in late January to try the fund-raiser using the Carol Decker Memorial Fund as a starter. They hoped that enough money would be earned that the fund could in time support full-color reproductions of art works.

For the present, they would go with black ink. The women approached professional artists who live or work in the community. Each artist was given a commission to do something that typified the community to them. The media were pencil, pen and ink, photographs and watercolor washes.

The PCAC avoided artists who benefit from other arts council projects such as the Fall Festival Artist and Craftsman show.

**THE ARTISTS** are well known to the community and their drawings and photographs are of familiar landmarks.

Pam Wehmeyer contributed a photograph of the pink Victorian house on Main Street, next door to the library. Miss Wehmeyer is a Plymouth High School graduate and the daughter of Mark and Joan Wehmeyer. She works with William R. Biggs Associates, Inc.

F. Eric Carne, Plymouth architect and owner of the Old Village Gallery on Mill Street, did a pen and ink drawing of the gazebo on Farmer Street.

John Graham, Plymouth architect, did a pencil drawing of Kellogg Park.

Barbara Bray, commercial art teacher and Plymouth resident, sketched the Tonguish Creek walk and foot-bridge, adding a water color wash.

Thomas Gotts, Plymouth resident who teaches art in the Taylor School District, made a pencil drawing of the Main Street railroad crossing showing Bode's restaurant. He also contributed a drawing of an old coal and lumber company business by the tracks.

**GARY CASKEY**, news photographer for the Plymouth and Canton Observer newspapers, is a Canton Township resident. He came up with a photograph of a bank of hepaticas taken in Miller Woods in the spring. Miller Woods is owned by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. Damaris, commercial artist and teacher, used a grease pencil for her drawing representing the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra.


The artists turned in 5 1/2 x 3 1/4-inch originals. The printing was done by Graphic Communications on Junction Street in Plymouth.

The post cards are sold in packages of 10 for \$3 or separately for 30 cents each. The packages contain one of each design.







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# ERA down, not forgotten

Monday's pro-ERA march and rally in downtown Detroit managed to light a fire under an otherwise lackluster, routine and admittedly choreographed political event.

Republicans gathering in Detroit to anoint their standard bearers this week were thrown off guard when an estimated 10,000 people marched to Cobo Hall to protest the GOP's recent dumping from its platform support for the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution.

ERA backers, singing "Are you sleeping, Are you sleeping, G-O-P, G-O-P n." and shouting "Ratify the ERA, Ronald Reagan go away," marched from the Kern Block to Cobo Hall to a rally in Kennedy Square, where their displeasure with the GOP's move overflowed onto Woodward and Lafayette avenues.

In the front line of the orderly demonstration was Michigan First Lady Helen Milliken, a strong ERA proponent who has vowed to continue to fight for women's rights despite the GOP rebuff.

The majority of the marchers wore white with purple or yellow sashes, symbolic of the suffragettes, and green and white "ERA Yes" buttons or patches.

To augment the reciting of the memories by those at each table, Bruce Richard showed slides of the many places they had visited 10 years ago.

The program and the party were put together by a committee headed by Doris Richard. The Plymouth-to-Plymouth travelers agreed that they shouldn't wait another 10 years for a get-together.

"I thought it (the turnout) was fantastic," said Mrs. Uhl, who added that she was unable to attend a May rally in Chicago and this gave her a chance to show her support locally for the ERA.

She said more than 200 AAUW members were on hand for Monday's march, including Dr. Nancy Joyner, AAUW national officer who is heading the group's national task force for the ERA.

Mrs. Uhl, who lives in Plymouth Township, expressed disappointment that former First Lady Betty Ford and Maureen Reagan, daughter of Presidential hopeful Ronald Reagan, did not attend. The two women have been strong ERA boosters.

"It's a sad thing as an observer looking in at how they all start playing politics and softening their stands," Mrs. Uhl said. "If people believe in something strong enough I've always felt they should stand up for it."

Janet Evans, a Farmington Hills resident and president of the Northwest Wayne County chapter of NOW, helped in organizing the coalition of groups that marched.

She said the national NOW organization originally hoped to attract 3,000-5,000 marchers. Like Mrs. Uhl, Mrs. Evans was pleased with the turnout.

Mrs. Evans said she doesn't see the GOP's move as a setback, however, she is concerned that gains like Title IX and changes in credit laws could possibly be rolled back.

Her impression from discussions with other members is that NOW is no where close to endorsing a candidate and the group is taking a wait-and-see attitude.


"I think they (the GOP) feel a little threatened," she said. "Depending on what poll you read . . . I don't think you can just ignore that many people (who favor ERA ratification)."

She said NOW is going to work at the "grass roots level" to help elect people who favor ratification. "It's an idea whose time has come, and it will eventually."

OTHER GROUPS represented were the North Oakland County chapter of the National Organization for Women, the American Association of University Women, the Association of Suburban People, the Business and Professional Women, Mormons for ERA, local, state, and national teacher organizations, several UAW groups, a YWCA contingent, a gay political group, and anti-nuclear energy forces.

Rally organizers also announced that Republican delegates made a strong showing.

Placards carried included one bearing a portrait of a saddened Abraham Lincoln. It asked, "Will the party that freed the slaves be the party to enslave women?" Others: "ERA is AmERiCaN" and "Reagan for Shah."

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
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



# Sonia Johnson calls for equality

Blue jean clad, Sonia Johnson strode into Metropolitan Airport after an all night flight from Seattle to Chicago to Detroit.

Wouldn't it have been easier to fly directly from Seattle to Copenhagen for the UN International Women's Decade meeting she was headed for?

Sure, but the Republican Platform Committee last week knocked the Equal Rights Amendment out of their 1980 platform, and when you take a swipe at the ERA, you hurt Sonia Johnson where she lives.

She came to the area to participate in a demonstration for ERA by Women in Communications, YWCA, Business and Professional Women's Association, and a number of other concerned women's groups.

"It's my main thing now," she says. "Speaking for ERA wherever it's taking me is my full time work." Six months ago, Sonia Johnson told Newsweek magazine that's she is Mormon down to her toes. She says she still is.

But on Dec. 5, 1979, the Church of the Latter Day Saints, in which her family has held membership for five generations, excommunicated her for her outspoken stand on ERA.

The Mormon hierarchy said a church member individually could support ERA but to mount a drive such as "Mormons for ERA" which Sonia Johnson did, could not be tolerated.

SONIA JOHNSON has lost more than her church standing recently. Her husband, father of their four children, 17, 15, 12, and 6 is now somewhere in Oregon.

"He recently divorced me," she says quietly. "He was quite supportive of the ERA and disenchanted with the church, but he had his own problems."

"He wasn't granted tenure at his university and had a mid-life kind of crisis. He found a younger, more beautiful woman."

Regrets? She answers straightforwardly: "I'm not a good regretter." Of the children she says, two are battling adolescence, the 6-year-old is "thinking it over" and the 17-year-old eldest son is trying hard to figure out who he is.

Mrs. Johnson knows who she is. And she doesn't hesitate to say it.

"I'm a radical. I'm angry and I'm determined. We are what we are, and you do what your integrity demands."

Mrs. Johnson lives with her four children in Sterling, Va., southwest of Washington, D.C. For 20 years she taught university English on a

part-time basis. She only has time for her children and the ERA now.

IN COPENHAGEN she will be part of the Forum, the non-governmental adjunct meetings taking place concurrently with those sponsored by the United Nations.

She will be part of a panel on equality and religion and will lead a workshop on equality. Fellow panelists will be concerned women from France, Hungary and India.

Institutions in general are on Mrs. Johnson's bad list right now.

It doesn't make any difference whether it's government, religion or the Republican Party she tells you "they're all patriarchal."

"There's no real equality. Women are on the fringes in religion and in all areas. Our society thinks of men as more God-like and as meant to rule."

If you're Sonia Johnson in July 1980, the world couldn't be in worst shape.

"Half the world's population are the life-givers and nurturers and have so much to give and are not allowed to," she says, frustrated. "Women care more about human life than men. They've been involved in life in perpetuating it. The men need to listen to us and to deal with hunger and human needs."

"I'M SO ANGRY with the Republican Party," she says. "I was brought up to believe it was the only party, that Democrats were evil. You couldn't catch me voting Republican now. There's an anti-life, hate humans stance."

And of Ronald Reagan their standard bearer, the former English teacher adds: "I wouldn't even trust Reagan to be head of the English Department."

Mrs. Johnson says she was always a "really good Mormon woman."

"I truly believed that someone needed to be home with those children all the time and that someone had to be me. Now I see that they need someone, but it doesn't have to be me all the time."

Part of her current despair is that her own children feel so dispirited about the future. "They feel like grownups are going to blow us all up," she says. "And they wonder if there will be jobs."

When she's tired, and she often is, she says all that's happened "just doesn't sink in."

"I just feel as Mormon as I ever was and like what I am, a Virginia housewife."

UNTIL about three years ago, Sonia Johnson knew almost nothing about the ERA. She and her family

lived overseas in Nigeria where her husband had a government contract.

"Becoming a feminist is a whole reorganization of the pattern," she says. "It's like an individual revolution and it was sudden for me, though I must have been gathering data all my life subconsciously."

"Mormonism is so profoundly patriarchal, I was always putting pieces of data into my mental file. Finally, when the church started on the ERA, it all burst out."

Mrs. Johnson recounts that at a

church meeting one night, someone spoke against ERA as she sat and listened.

"Suddenly it all came together. I had like a minor nervous breakdown right in the meeting. I was overwhelmed, actually physically pained," she recalls. "My friends told me later I was shaking my head back and forth and loudly saying 'No, no, no.'"

Up to that time, Sonia Johnson thought all the male supremacy and patriarchy was God's will.

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# Free Press strikes out

Perhaps the most disconsolate group at the convention is the 21-member reporting team from the Detroit Free Press.

Some of the staff, mostly Washington Bureau members, had prepared for the event for a full year. The entire group, along with the rest of the paper's reporters, is now idle amid a flurry of history-making convention activity.

On Saturday members of Teamsters Union Local 372 representing Free Press drivers voted to reject a three-year pact offered them. They also went on strike.

"Most of the editorial staff had no inkling, no indication it would happen," said Free Press reporter Patricia Montemurri. "We thought, like, you're joking. We really couldn't believe it. We thought that they'd be able to work it out."

That was not the case, as the Free Press did not publish a Sunday edition. On Monday, however, a joint edition of the Detroit News and Free Press was

printed by the News, which has agreed to print an abridged edition of the Free Press for the duration of the strike.

Teamsters at the Detroit News were continuing to work under a contract similar to that rejected by the local at the Free Press.

**THE NEWSPAPER** Guild — representing reporters, photographers, copy editors and advertising sales and computer services personnel at the Free Press — is honoring the Teamsters picket line, putting its members out of work.

The skeleton edition of the Free Press being put out in conjunction with the News contains work done by staff reporters prior to the walkout. Much of the material is also produced by reporters employed by the Knight-Ridder chain which owns the Free Press.

Seeing the paper come out without their work makes the situation even more agonizing for the reporters.

"Later on, it sunk in more and more," said Ms. Montemurri. "You could see the despair, the agony going

on. The color was just drained from people's faces."

Still in possession of their media credentials, several reporters and photographers sat gloomily around a table in the Civic Host Committee's media room Monday.

Montemurri said she believed the sudden elimination of the prized convention coverage could constitute an unhealable wound in the minds of many reporters.

"For Free Press reporters, this is one of the biggest stories of the decade. To be deprived of that at the last moment..."

"If they were going to strike the Free Press if the contract wasn't ratified, they could have said that a week ago," she said.

"I never dreamed this could happen," Ms. Montemurri said, shaking her head. "The possibility never occurred to me."

She quoted a saying being circulated by Free Press reporters this way: "Take a Teamster to lunch at the Machus Red Fox."



You can't believe everything you read. A strike by the Teamsters at the Detroit Free Press closed down that paper for a day, making this coin box poster's claim an unlikely possibility.

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
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# British also tell ghost stories

A friend of mine recently returned from the British Isles. I asked him if he encountered any of Britain's ghosts while he was visiting there.

He told me that, while he had not seen any evidence of ghosts himself, he had certainly met several people who claimed to have.

He then proceeded to tell me the following tale. In North Yorksire, there is a 15th century inn in Sandhutton, about eight miles south of Northallerton on A-61.

In this inn, there is a seat next to the piano which is reserved for the ghost of a murderer hanged there in 1702. It is believed that anyone who sits in that seat will be cursed to die within a few short weeks.

The story goes that a man named Thomas Busby married the daughter of Daniel Auty, a counterfeiter. After the marriage, Busby joined Auty in his illegal enterprise, and together they made a great profit.

Eventually, an argument ensued about the sharing of their ill-gotten gains, and, in a fit of temper, Busby killed Auty. Then he spent the rest of the night at the inn, getting drunk, before his arrest.

In the 18th century, it was customary to hang a convicted criminal on the spot where the crime was committed, and then allow the body to stay there and rot as a reminder to others who might be tempted to stray from the path of righteousness.

Busby was hanged, and his body was left to rot on the gallows, right outside the inn.

The legend goes that his ghost wanders about at night, with the hangman's noose still attached to its neck and its head lolling to one side, eyes protruding, and tongue hanging out.

When he is not walking about, he comes and sits on that stool in the pub.

Tom Collins and his wife became the new owners of "Busby Stoop Inn" in 1951. Collins says that since that time, only one man has dared to challenge the curse, and he is no longer living.

It seems that he was a sargeant major in the British army, a hulking big fellow in perfect health.

He entered the inn with a group of friends one night, and refused to believe it when Collins warned him about the ghost and stool. Urged on by his buddies, he sat on the seat — against the protests of the innkeeper and the regular patrons of the inn.

Two weeks later, his friends returned in a very different mood and reported to the barkeep that the sargeant major was dead. He had apparently died of natural causes, although — up until the night he had entered the pub — he had seemed completely healthy.

After telling me this story, my friend confided that he, himself, had chosen a seat on the far side of the room, away from the one by the piano.

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

# Denominations should cooperate

I have always felt that the competition and division among churches is a scandal. The early commentary upon Christianity was "see how they love one another." This can hardly be said in the contemporary religious scene.

Churches and denominations ignore each other. They compete and fight. We find few reasons to cooperate, to dialogue and to love one another.

For eight years I was a part of a group of clergy from several denominations who loved, shared and supported each other. We had our misunderstandings and problems, but it was like a family. I no longer have this unique opportunity since I have moved.

Also during part of this same period, the United Methodist congregation, of which I was a part, shared a building, resources and even worship together with a mission Catholic parish. It was a time in which many barriers and prejudices were broken down.

Yet there was also continual opposition to this sharing. We came to know something more of a phrase "see how they love one another," even through the pain and the controversy that accom-

panied some of this involvement. I was enriched by this experience together.

Such dialogue and involvement at a deep level between different religious bodies is unusual today. However, it is possible for local congregations to take the lead in such a process. St. Aidan's Roman Catholic parish in Livonia is carrying out such a dialogue with Lutheran churches throughout this year. Two churches of different denominations have made a covenant together to deepen understanding and ministry in our Detroit area. Yet this is more the exception than the rule.

Recently, I asked a rabbi if he knew of any local congregations who were sharing in an ongoing religious dialogue. He knew of nothing like this happening in the metropolitan area.

The world is getting smaller. We must not wait upon the councils, the conferences, the Vatican or the diocese to discover paths that will lead to understanding, appreciation and mutual love. Every religious body has this goal and this obligation to love one another. For most, it is still expedient to ignore it.

It is my conviction that effective community ac-

tion necessitates religious cooperation and involvement. We cannot speak of love and compassion and service and ignore each other's contribution.

The conference at St. Aidan's church was called "A Time for Healing." There is a feeling that if we cannot heal ourselves we will not be able to heal the world.

The world is inexorably moving closer together. Soon we will encounter the world religions in our own communities. The world will watch to see what we will do: dialogue, appreciate and love, or ignore and confront.

There are those prophets who say that this is the new missionary task, to share and to cooperate in a common religious journey.

A challenge was recently expressed to a struggling group of ecumenically oriented clergy, "If you cannot make it among your own colleagues, how can you make it with others out in the world?" There might be an analogy here for every religious body.

As unpopular and as unproductive, seemingly, as it currently is, our time and our very reason for being, demand religious dialogue and cooperation.

"Extending Workplace Democracy" is the theme of a one-week summer school for union leaders, members and educators to be held Aug. 3-8 at the University of Michigan. Registration deadline is July 25.

The school will bring together unionists and labor educators from all parts of the country to discuss ways to im-

prove employee participation in decision-making at work, according to the U-M-Wayne State University Institute Relations (ILIR), sponsor of the event.

The school will feature general sessions on such issues as participation in the control of new plant and office technology; plant closings and their implications for participation, and com-

parative view of various forms of participation in the U.S. and overseas.

In addition, the school will include four concurrent in-depth workshops on "skills for participatory democracy at work," "teaching about extending workplace democracy," "analysis of current participative scheme," and "implementing 'Quality of Worklife' programs."

## Enlarge child' world

Ideas. Concepts. Thoughts.

The only way we know what our children are thinking is through their tendency to think out loud. Called liberated convictions, this thinking out loud gives us clues to their reasoning processes.

A child carefully constructs ideas in an effort to order and organize the surrounding events, sights and sounds. Most of the world seems quite mysterious to a child's unpracticed eyes.

How can a light bulb turn into a daffodil in springtime? Is thunder God moaning from a stubbed thumb? Why is fire always angry? When will that tree answer me?

These ideas of a child's world can be at once funny, profound, and wise, but most often they are confused. Try as we might, we usually cannot dissuade a child from these faulty notions.

Children hold stubbornly to their ideas. They resist suggestion. They rebuff correction.

The only way to effectively alter these fanciful concepts is to enlarge the child's scope of the world. This would provide enough experiences so the experiences themselves begin to challenge the ideas, rather than the

challenge coming from the parents.

ONE OF THE real confusions in the young child's world is figuring out where things come from.

Fruits and vegetables would appear to spring full-grown from the grocer's shelves. Potatoes come from boxes. So many things that a child encounters come boxed, completed, already finished.

A simple walk in the neighborhood may be one way of gently helping our little ones shape their ideas in a more realistic fashion. A friend's garden can reveal much about the nature of nature.

The variety of greenery, birds, and insects will broaden the child's information background. Trees do not start out full-grown or from a landscaper's truck.

Perhaps you'll be lucky enough to come across a maple tree laden with seeds. Allow your child to collect a handful and take them home.

In a pot of dirt, have your child gingerly "plant" the seeds. Talk about how nature does the planting, by showing your child how the seeds float to the ground. As the seed swirls to the ground, the heaviest part gets stuck in the dirt.

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
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

# Chamberlain putts way into national finals

The Southeastern Michigan Regional portion of the National Open Putting Championships had a decidedly Plymouth bent last weekend at Whispering Willows Golf Course.

Jerry Thomas, 21, currently a Livonia resident but a graduate of Plymouth Salem High School, placed second overall in the 62-man field.

William Chamberlain, who resides in Plymouth, won a separate playoff to qualify as the second non-amateur for the national finals from the Livonia site.

Thomas' score of 33 putts over the 18-hole layout on the practice green was matched by Craig McClellan, a Woodhaven resident, who was low-scoring non-amateur.

McClellan won the first-place trophy on the second extra hole and earned an expense-paid trip to the national tournament Dec. 5-6 at the Tropicana in Las Vegas.

Thomas indicated that he will probably make the trip to Vegas at his own expense to maintain his amateur standing.

Chamberlain was involved in a six-man playoff and came away the second non-amateur finalist after four extra holes. He posted a score of 35 during the regulation 18 holes.

Thomas, who, coincidentally, won the Championship Flight of the Observer & Eccentric Golf Tournament last year at Whispering Willows, does not

consider himself to be an especially outstanding putter.

"Believe me, I'm not a putter. I proved it the next day when I played out at Salem Hills, hit 14 greens and got only one birdie," said Thomas, who works at Salem Hills.

Consistency rather than flashes of brilliance paid off for Thomas. During 36 holes of qualifying rounds at Salem Hills, the 18 holes at the regional final and two playoff holes, Thomas one-putted only seven times and never three-putted.

"The only reason I got into the tournament is that any time you can get in and play under some pressure, it's going to help out in the long run," said Thomas.

CHAMBERLAIN, who works in the quality control division at Ford Motor Co., also said that he was stunned to win a trip to the finals.

"I didn't really have any expectations because all these guys were tops in their field. I was surprised and pleased because so many were darned good," said Chamberlain.

"I'm going to put in a great deal of time from now on practicing for Las Vegas. I've never been out there," he said.

Thomas and Chamberlain completed their regular rounds Saturday morning before the rains fell. Both playoffs were held later in the afternoon.

Chamberlain said that he did better on the softer, slower putting surface after the rain. Thomas said that he noticed the greens weren't as quick later in the day, but he didn't think it affected his game one way or another.


Only nine of the 62 regional finalists broke par — which was 36 — for the 18 holes. Holes ranged in length from 10 to 50 feet.

Shortstop Al Lipinski walked and went to second on Frank McMurray's single. Don Dreher and Hanis followed with walks, forcing home Canton's fourth run.



In the Boys 10 Division, first place was grabbed by Jeff Beard with a 255 total. Bob Files was second with 249.




Alumnus' most-productive inning was the fifth when it exploded for six runs. Ten men went to the plate. John Umlauf unloaded the big hit — a three-run triple.

# House rejects \$100 million funding

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the days leading up to the congressional recess that began July 3.

## HOUSE

**LEAA:** The House rejected 182-221 an amendment to spend \$100 million in fiscal 1981 on Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) grants to states and localities. Critics say that historically LEAA grants have wasted taxpayers' money on police gadgetry while doing little to cut the crime rate. The vote came during debate on an appropriations bill later passed and sent to the White House.

Supporter Robert McClory, R-Ill., said "it is time to stop the slow but increasingly successful attempt to murder the LEAA."

Opponent Robert Giaino, D-Conn., said "LEAA is a program that ought to be chopped, terminated, killed."

Members voting "nay" were opposed to any money in the bill going for LEAA grants to states and localities.

Reps. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth; David Bonior, D-Mt. Clemens; William Brodhead, D-Detroit; James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge; and William Broomfield, R-Birmingham voted "yea." Rep. William Ford, D-Taylor, voted "nay."

## SENATE

**COST-OF-LIVING HIKES:** By a vote of 30-59, the Senate killed an amendment requiring that civil service retirees get only one cost-of-living increase each year. This means there will be a continuation of the present system of two annual hikes in civil service pensions to keep pace with inflation. In fiscal 1981, there will be just one increase. The vote came during debate on a budget bill passed and sent to conference with the House.

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., a supporter of a single hike, said "at a time when the average American family is hard put to make ends meet... there is simply no justice in singling out the civilian federal retiree for a special and unmatched privilege."

Sen. David Pryor, D-Ark., an opponent, said: "We are talking about 1.6 million retired federal employees... and survivors of those employees who are actually going to get cut on the average of \$300 to \$400 a year" if the amendment becomes law.

Senators voting "yea" wanted civil service retirees to get one rather than two annual cost-of-living hikes. Democratic Sens. Donald Riegle and Carl Levin voted "nay."

**JOBLESS PAY:** The Senate rejected 27-60 an amendment that sought to make it easier for an individual to get extended unemployment benefits. Extended benefits are those paid for 13 weeks in high unemployment areas after the 26 weeks of regular jobless benefits run out.

The amendment sought to block legislation to deny extended benefits if the recipient has refused to accept a menial job. The vote came during debate on S 2885 (see preceding vote) which will impose the tougher eligibility requirement if it becomes law.

Supporter Riegle said, "The jobless workers in

Michigan and other states... need our help to tide them through this recession. This is no time to cut benefits."

Opponents of the amendment argued that a jobless person who has refused minimum wage work as "unsuitable" is undeserving of an additional 13 weeks of unemployment benefits.

Senators voting "nay" wanted to toughen eligibility requirements for extended unemployment compensation.

Levin voted "yea."  
Riegle did not vote.

**TAX INDEXING:** By a vote of 54-39, the Senate tabled and thus killed a proposal to adjust income tax rates, deductions and credits to account for inflation. Advocated say the plan would curb the "taxflation" that results when inflation eats away at real income gains by pushing salaries and wages into higher tax brackets. The vote came during de-

bate on a debt ceiling measure later given final congressional approval.

Sen. Daniel Moynihan, D-N.Y., a supporter of killing the plan, said tax-indexing has met with "near disastrous" results in Brazil, and "would be a declaration by this body that we do not expect ever to bring the rate of inflation down and take it out of our system."

Sen. William Armstrong, R-Colo., sponsor of the tax-indexing proposal, said: "The effect of taxation is to transfer wealth from the productive private sector to the government, which produces only rhetoric, red tape and oceans of red ink."

Senators voting "nay" favored the tax-indexing amendment.



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
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**MORE FROM THE PLIMPTON CUP COMPETITION IN LAS VEGAS**

During the finals match between Wayne Drogseth and Russell Sands, this position occurred. The score at this point is 8-2 in a 19-point final with Sands in the lead and Drogseth desperately fighting back.

Having a substantial lead in this game, Drogseth (black) doubled the cube to 2 shortly before he began bearing off. Sands (white) accepted and now owns the cube.

It is Sands' turn. Before rolling the dice, he redoubled the cube to 4, passing it to Drogseth. Should Drogseth accept?

White needs three rolls (excepting doubles) to complete the bear-off, and having all his checkers near the 1 point means he can't miss. It was a timely redouble.

Black would need two perfect rolls (barring double 6s, 5s, 4s and 3s — four chances out of 36) to beat white. Also,

the chances of his missing one checker bearing off are too great. So he will also need three rolls, minimum, and he is not on roll. He is certainly not the favorite.

Black is forced to pass the redouble and take a two-point loss.

During the time of bear-off, the use of the doubling cube is predominate. Often times, in tournament play, where each point brings you closer or further from victory, the cube is frequently used.

However, a player may take a risky double as they begin to bear off, knowing that if one nice set of doubles are rolled he could steal the lead and redouble his opponent out of the game.

Before you ever consider accepting the doubling cube, you must always consider the position of the checkers.



## GOP convention music meant 'to wake them up'

Only 35 persons received the special credential "entertainer" at this week's Republican National Convention in Joe Louis Arena. Yet most got the worst seats in the house.

"I can't see the rostrum," convention band conductor Manny Harmon said after Monday's opening convention session.

"They put the damn cameras so high, I can't see a thing."

Harmon, from Los Angeles, and the 30-piece band were directly behind the giant scaffolding supporting the all-important television cameras.

**BUT HARMON** is used to such placement. The Detroit convention was his sixth for the Republicans. And except at Kansas City in 1976, the band was put behind some large obstruction.

Prior to and between speeches, delegates' ears were kept occupied by the band, most of whose members were from the Detroit area and recruited by John Trudell.

One band member described the selections as "occasional greeting cards."



The selections included rock, big band medleys and selections from Glen Miller.

"Peppy music to wake them up," was the way Harmon described it. "I've got close to two tons of music here," he said.

During the 20 years he has been filling in the spaces of the convention shows, Harmon said the Republicans' choice for convention music has changed little.

"They like the peppy stuff... like to keep it alive," he said.

At the conclusion of Monday's first session, one of the numbers was "Glory, Glory Hallelujah" (refrain line of "Battle Hymn of the Republic").

Many Detroiters, however, probably recognized it as the same music for the union anthem, "Solidarity Forever."

"That's just a song we picked," said Harmon. "We didn't pick it on the basis that it happened to be a union song."

**A MUST** for the band members is mastering the state songs played to introduce each of the speakers.

"It's all written out for you. All you have to do is play it," said one band member.

"It's kind of strange," said saxophone player Ernie Rodgers of De-

troit. "We're playing it as we go."

This evening, the introduction number for Ronald Reagan's address to the convention will be, "I Love You, California," the "official" state song, Harmon said.

"Everyone thinks (the state's song)

is 'California, Here I Come,' " Harmon added. "But we're already there, you see."

Harmon's last visit to Detroit was in the late 1950s, "to open Cobo Hall with the Mills Brothers."



### Jazz stars group in free concerts

Twenty local jazz performers have been brought together by Channel 4 to form the Detroit All Stars, which will give four free outdoor concerts throughout the metro area in July and August. The first of the four will be 5-6:45 p.m. Tuesday in the amphitheater of Hart Plaza in downtown Detroit; also performing will be a jazz quintet, Ursula Walker and the Wayne State University Jazz Lab Band. The final All Stars performance will be Aug. 12 in Livonia's Civic Center Park.

## New galleries open at Institute of Arts

A new area of the Detroit Institute of Arts, constructed around the high spaces of the North Court as a showcase for African and Native American collections, is now open.

An exhibition concourse and three carpeted galleries surround the one-story rise of a walled sculpture garden under the skylight of the museum's North Wing. A new stairway gives direct access to these ground level galleries from the museum's main floor.

The new exhibition space which will soon add two more galleries for Oceanic and Pre-Columbian art, enables us for the first time to display our ranking traditional African art and our growing collection of native American art," said museum director Frederick J. Cummings.

Featured in the \$1.2 million wing are the recently dedicated J.L. Hudson Co. Gallery and the Webber Foundations Gallery, both devoted to African Art. Other funding sources were a City of Detroit bond issue, the National Endowment for the Arts, the State of Michigan and the Kool Jazz Festival.

A plaque honoring the Friends of African Art, a Founders Society group which has supported the museum's African program for more than 15 years, is also installed.

Native American art will be distinguished by a special loan of the work of Woodlands tribes from the collection of Richard A. Pohrt of Flint, Plains, Great Lakes and West Coast Indian blankets, basketry and pottery from the museum's collection will be displayed as well as fine Eskimo sculpture.

All galleries in the new area are under the direction of Michael Kan, deputy director and curator of African,



Oceanic and New World Cultures. Architect was John D. Hilberry and Associates of Detroit. Installation design was by Charles Froom of New York City.

The African collection numbers more than 800 objects, one of the largest assemblies of traditional African art in the U.S. Nucleus of the collection was established by important gifts received from the late Robert Tannahill of Grosse Pointe Farms and from Justice and Mrs. G. Mennen Williams of Grosse Pointe Farms.

Substantial purchases were made since 1965 by former museum director Willis F. Woods and by the Friends of African Art (formerly the African Art Gallery Committee).

Since 1976 Kan has strengthened the collection through a \$1.2 million gift from the late Eleanor Clay Ford, to be spent exclusively for acquisition of African art. The museum's first major purchase from this fund was the large Kongo nail figure from Zaire, \$275,000, the highest price ever paid in the United States for an African object.

# Gay voters to test Republican waters

Four years ago there were none. This year there are two.

There are two openly gay delegates to the Republican National Convention.

And Timothy E. Drake, a homosexual delegate from Illinois, Tuesday said Ronald Reagan's choice of a running mate will determine whether gays can support his candidacy.

At a sparsely attended press conference in Detroit's Cobo Hall, Drake said Reagan "has proven in the past he was willing to give us a fair break. But we have some concerns we want to express."

front of a microphone," he added, with a smile. "We are making a very profound statement in being here. We are activists but somewhat realistic. I want some assurance they aren't anti-gay."

Sen. Paul Laxalt of Nevada, among a number of candidates Reagan is reportedly considering for vice-president, was the only one named totally unacceptable by Drake.

In choosing Laxalt, "he would be writing off all the gay vote," Drake flatly said.

Drake said among the three potential presidential candidates — Reagan, President Carter and John Anderson — "Anderson has an impeccable gay rights stand. His position paper is as if we wrote it," he said.

"Is there any reason to stay within the Republican Party?" Drake was asked.

"THE REPUBLICAN PARTY isn't going to go away," he responded. "I have put in too many years in the Republican party. I support its stand on foreign and economic issues. I have a lot of trouble with social issues. The answer is not to walk out, but to hang in there."

Four years ago, the Democratic Convention registered "two or three" openly gay delegates, according to Drake. Next month they are expecting more than 75, he said.



Most of these are tied in with the Republican's conservative platform which works against minority rights.

"It's my belief that this platform doesn't represent the Republican party as a whole," Drake said. "The moderates have just been trampled at this convention."

"It's our fault," he continued. "We allowed the radical fringe to gain control."

"GOV. REAGAN is a strong advocate of individual rights," said Drake. "He has the potential to generate good will among gay Americans, of which there are an estimated eight million in the United States."

# Convention's telephone hookups simple as GOP

There are countless more people involved in the Republican convention than the 2,000 delegates, 2,000 alternates and 8,000 members of the working press assigned to cover them.

At Michigan Bell alone there are about 400 persons from various departments of the company who have been assigned to work solely on convention business. In addition, 100 technical specialists were brought in from the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. to assist in the communications set-up serving a temporary population the size of a city such as Marquette.

One year after joining Michigan Bell, Joseph Luginski, 20, of Southfield was pulled out of his job in the Redford business office to work at the Convention Control Center as a customer service representative.

It's Luginski's job to make sure that business customers, primarily the American Broadcasting System (ABC), have all the phones, phone lines, transmission cables and microwave equipment they need to cover the convention. The marketing department at Michigan Bell has set up what it calls a SWOT team, which stands for statewide order transmittal, at the convention site. Luginski makes sure that whatever SWOT orders, the client gets.

HE'S WORKED the last 17 days in a row and expects to be working another eight straight. Instead of griping about the long hours, Luginski says he volunteered for the assignment and explains that he's thrilled to be a part of the convention.

"It's a good experience for me," Luginski said. "The idea of working on one of the major events of the year, this is exciting to me."

According to a Bell spokesman, the phone company's convention task force has installed enough cable around Joe Louis Arena and Cobo Hall to ring the globe — some 25,000 miles of the stuff.

To serve the convention, the phone company established a special exchange — 467 — which corresponds to the letters "GOP." Consequently, the number for the Republican Arrangements Committee is GOP-1980.

SECURITY IS so tight that utility manholes were cemented shut downtown to foil sabotage of convention communication transmission.

Phones and phone lines are in every conceivable place and then some. For example, Luginski had to send a crew to Kennedy Square to install a bank of temporary phones outdoors for the press covering Monday's mass demonstration by persons supporting passage of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Those phones, the GOP exchange, the manholes and most of the miles of cables will be unneeded after Sunday. Michigan Bell purchased much of its equipment from New York Bell after the Winter Olympics in Lake Placid. The utility plans to re-sell much of the same equipment back to New York Bell for use in next month's Democratic convention.

The hoopla is exciting and the responsibility of running a convention smoothly is a challenge, Luginski says.

"I heard somebody down here say that seeing all this makes them proud to be an American," Luginski said. "It kinda does. You can see a major event and you're a part of it. Who knows, this might be a once-in-a-lifetime chance to see a political convention in Detroit. There's a certain pride to say 'I had a part in the 1980 Convention.'"

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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# Platform blues strike Michigan

An unenthusiastic Michigan delegation swallowed the Republican platform Tuesday night, although some disregarded its importance to the fall campaign.

A controversial plank requiring judicial candidates seeking GOP endorsement to go on record as opposing abortion was one of the few items deleted from the platform to ease the strain on moderate Republicans who unsuccessfully fought for inclusion of support of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Congressman Carl Pursell of the 2nd District was one of those in the state delegation who attempted to downplay the platform. Although he supports the plank affirming a two-China policy with strong support for Taiwan, Pursell predicted that the platform wouldn't be crucial to the fall cam-

paign. He said Reagan will have to reach out to the pro-ERA people and others to unite the party.

"He's got to keep reaching out. He was meeting with the pro-ERA people today (Tuesday) and he's got to keep those communications open."

A few of the state delegates were delighted with the anti-abortion/ERA position, but the subdued majority clearly knew it had been beaten on the ERA issue by early that afternoon.

And the Hawaiian delegation's defeat to get the rules suspended to allow floor debate on the platform that night clearly ended any hopes for more moderate positions in the 78-page document.

AS DELEGATES filed into their caucus room at the airport Hilton that afternoon, many wore "ERA Now" buttons. It soon became apparent that they were unwilling to

wage a floor fight over the GOP platform's opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment that night.

Nancy Chase, a member of the GOP platform committee, told the Michigan delegation it would be almost impossible to change the platform. She said any amendment required 27 signatures from platform committee members.

According to Miss Chase, a majority from six states could call for a roll call vote on any proposal coming before the convention. But even then, a change would require support of two-thirds of the delegates.

"It will not happen," she successfully predicted. Former Michigan Sen. Robert Griffin urged the delegates not to wage a floor battle Tuesday night.

"If you'll remember, in 1976 there were many fights on Tuesday evening. This delayed the keynote speech until 1 a.m. Wednesday so it was not seen on prime time television."

## Zany costumes match moods of delegates

Republicans shed a stuffy image at their premiere party Monday at the Joe Louis Arena.

The Hawaiian delegation came in matching muumus and flowery shirts. Californians wore white Stetsons and Maine gleaned across the convention hall in bright yellow fishermen's rain hats. Rhode Island wore sailors caps.

Much of the crowd went crazy with headgear. Elephant hats topped more than a few heads and one delegate wore a hat with an inflatable pink elephant beating a set of drums.

A 10-gallon cowboy hat on a bald-domed delegate was smothered in Reagan slogans blaring from buttons and pins. Fuzzy knit berets and floppy cloth hats were similarly covered. One hat was topped with fake fruit a la Carmen Miranda.

Even traditional delegate hats with red, white and blue ribbon bands were personalized. A man in the Michigan delegation was spotted with three bites out of his rim. A woman covered the flat top of her hat with at least 30 tiny paper American flags on toothpicks and carried it in front of her.

Martian antennae bobbed up and down on some heads. One Hawaiian delegate wore a wreath of greenery in her hair.

No doubt who the Guam delegates were. Their clothing was emblazoned with "Guam" in letters to rival designer signatures on blue jeans.

A LOUISIANA woman topped off her outfit with a "Cajuns Love Reagan" T-shirt. Detroit police in London bobby uniforms posed for visitors' cameras. And Californians weren't the only ones with cowboy hats; they were predominant everywhere on the convention floor.

One alternate delegate stuck in the last row of her state's section peered at most of the proceedings through opera glasses. Across the aisle, a North Dakota delegate clipped a schedule of convention week events from a newspaper he was reading during the speech-making.

Robin Riddle, 17, a Utah alternate delegate, paced the arena aisle while Young Republicans spoke from the platform below.

"I've been involved in the party many years," she said. "This is my first convention. Next time I hope to be a delegate."

A man who emigrated from Czechoslovakia 12 years before Ms. Riddle was born was also at his first Republican National Convention. The man, Vaclav Hynar of Cleveland, participated in Sunday's captive nations march downtown.

"I LIKE Reagan's conservative way of thinking and strong hand in foreign affairs," he said.

"All my family is still in Czechoslovakia so I feel in touch with the situation there. Reagan will do something — spend more money on defense."

Antoinette Cristina walked around the convention hall to find a place where she could hear the main floor proceedings despite a faint sound system. A guest pass hung around her neck. Her husband was on the floor, a delegate from California.

"I've been to five conventions. My husband has been to more," said Mrs. Cristina, who lives in Santa Clara County.

"We knew Reagan when he was helping in the Goldwater campaign in 1964. We're longtime supporters," she gushed.

BILL RUNCO, a Michigan delegate who worked for George Bush in his 16th Congressional District (Dearborn), is slowly switching to John Anderson.

"Party politics is a lot of bull—," said Runco, a first-time conventioneer.

Others, like Bill Cobey, were lapping it up. Though Cobey was a long way from his Chapel Hill home, he took the convention as an opportunity to stump for his own campaign for lieutenant governor of North Carolina.

Cobey, 41, left his job as athletic director of the University of North Carolina in April to campaign fulltime. He was handing out literature Monday.

"This is my first convention," he said. "I'm going to enjoy it — soak it all in."
