Police eye grant to fill gap in traffic patrol

If you see a cop parked along the side of a road in Canton, chances are he's filling out a report on a criminal complaint or another matter.

He'll write a ticket if a flagrant speeder whisks by his car in violation of traffic laws or he's called to the scene of an accident.

But Canton police officers rarely receive assignments of routine traffic patrol, admits Chief Jerry Cox.

The department simply lacks the manpower.

"We don't give traffic the attention it needs," the chief admits. He points out that traffic accidents increased 85 percent from 1975 to 1979 — from 640 five years ago to 1,186 last year.

Cox attributes the rapid increase to Canton's escalating population and more vehicles on the road.

But he also voices a need for better enforcement of traffic laws and increased visibility on the streets.

COX'S DEPARTMENT is preparing an application for a three-year, \$2.5-million grant from the Michigan Office of Highway Traffic Safety to beef up local enforcement.

The grant would provide partial funding of a new 12-officer traffic bureau and the purchase of cars, radar devices and other equipment.

If the grant is approved by the state, the Canton Township board would have

to authorize acceptance. Under stipulations of the grant, Canton would be obligated to match state funding with a 10 percent allocation the first year, 30 percent the second and 70 percent the third.

Cox calls his hopes for state approval "realistic."

But he acknowledges a past reluctance of the Township Board to earmark revenue-sharing monies or other short-term funding for salaries. Once funding runs out, the township must either pick up the costs or pink-slip employees.

Supervisor Noel Culbert expresses hope that Canton could cover costs of the traffic bureau in three years due to the increased value of property assessments.

"If not, we'll just have to pink-slip," Culbert said.

Cox says Canton would benefit from the bureau in either case.

"The community would have seen a reduction in accidents and an identification of places where signs belong and roads should be widened," he said.

COX SAYS traffic enforcement currently is too much for the Canton Police Department to handle.

He maintains that the department now is 75 percent understaffed. Cox believes a community of Canton's size requires a police force of 72 to 96 patrol

officers. The township currently employs 25 full-time officers in addition to 33 part-timers and volunteers.

The chief has asked the Township Board to increase funding of his department in 1981 from 3.25 to four mills (\$4 per \$1,000 assessed property valuation.) The additional \$310,000 would fund the salaries of 10 more patrol officers.

Cox said the additional three-quarter mill he has requested could be returned or placed in a surplus fund if the department's grant application is approved.

According to Cox, three or four patrol cars normally are on Canton's street at any one time. But he maintains little time for traffic enforcement between the 32 to 35 criminal complaints which the department usually receives on each shift.

Cox said patrol officers are told to fill out criminal reports near major roads, when possible. Their presence acts as a deterrent to speeders. Officers also are sent to roadway sites where residents have requested traffic signs or complained of constant speeding.

Some traffic enforcement is provided by the Wayne County Sheriff Department's Secondary Road Patrol.

Board fills disputed 'fire' slot

A final chapter in last spring's controversy over the poor condition of fire department vehicles may have been written Tuesday night. The Township Board hired a mechanic requested by the department at least a year ago.

However, mechanic Melvin Olson technically will be assigned to the DPW and assigned to the fire department for specific jobs. His \$9-an-hour pay will come from the DPW budget.

Work on fire department vehicles has been sent to Griffin Co. of Highland Park since the controversy surfaced last spring. Trustee Robert Greenstein received an anonymous letter containing charges of poor vehicle maintenance. One of the charges said oil in an

ambulance had not been changed in two years.

At the time, fire officials and one member of a task force charged with studying the problem said the department crucially needed a mechanic.

The fire department's first full-time mechanic position was created by the Township Board last October. The position was not filled until April, but the mechanic was fired for incompetence two weeks later.

A subsequent dispute with Local 2289 of the International Association of Firefighters snarled the board's promise to hire the mechanic even more.

At issue was the mechanic's mem-

bership in either the firefighters' union or AFSCME (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees) — the bargaining unit of the DPW.

At the time, firefighters' President Dave Champagne voiced the belief that problems would arise if the mechanic belonged to another union. Clerk John Flodin, a negotiator for the township, said board trustees wanted a mechanic for work on all township vehicles — not just fire equipment.

"But we couldn't work it out between us," Champagne said Tuesday night. "So, we just let it go. It's going to have to be acceptable."

Champagne called hiring of the

mechanic "long overdue."

According to Flodin, the township has met with the firefighters' union on several occasions to discuss the mechanic issue.

He said the township will continue to contract with Griffin Co. for work on fire vehicles which the new mechanic cannot perform.

Supervisor Noel Culbert has said problems with the fire vehicles have been corrected.

The new mechanic will join the township's only other full-time mechanic and mechanic's helper.

Resident gets medical post

Her challenge is restoring speech

The high school football player — or perhaps it's a university student — wakes up in a hospital bed.

His head is shrouded in bandages. He's unable to speak or even to remember his name.

Forgotten is that ride in a car and the high-speed crash against a tree.

That plot line of countless TV shows is reality for Mildred Matlock, a three-year resident of Canton. Ms. Matlock, 33, is the new director of the speech and language pathology department at the Rehabilitation Institute located in the Detroit Medical Center.

MS. MATLOCK is the first woman to hold that directorship, to which she was appointed June 30. Her challenge: To restore communication to speechless adults.

Most of her patients are adults who have been hospitalized for strokes or closed-head injuries, usually as a result of automobile accidents. Now they face a variety of impairments, ranging from memory loss to an inability to form words or sentences.

Different areas of the brain control certain processes such as memory, interpreting ideas and forming words or sentences, explains Ms. Matlock. When damage results in a loss of skills, therapists must use repetition or innovation to restore use or create new ways of communicating.

"It's very frustrating," says Ms. Matlock. "It's a skill that they once took for granted."

Previously, Ms. Matlock worked with veterans as a speech pathologist at Veterans Administration hospitals in Allen Park and Chicago. She has been employed by the Detroit Hearing and Speech Center and the Detroit public school system.

"SPEECH is a very rapid, highly coordinated act," says Ms. Matlock, who has earned bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees from Wayne State University.

"Closed-head injury patients are mostly auto accident cases and are usually teens or in their early 20s," explained Ms. Matlock. "The brain has survived a severe shock. What happens is that the skull doesn't give — the brain literally rattles."

Those patients may have severe orientation, have difficulty organizing

their thoughts and words. Some don't know who they are and why they're in therapy, she added.

On the other hand, stroke patients suffer "relatively clear-cut" brain damage, which shows up in their behavior.

"They usually understand what is said, recognize people and usually get around," notes Ms. Matlock.

Treatment tends to be long-term — from several months up to a year or more — and tailor-made to the patient's needs.

For example, therapists try to present the same exercises or training in a variety of ways to maintain interest and repetition.

Some patients have no potential to speak or write, so therapists may fashion communication boards which use pictures.

"For some patients, this may be the only means of communication," says Ms. Matlock. In other cases, the patient can press coded keys on a small computer to produce a printout or electronic sounds that can be understood.

IN ADDITION to the therapy, there

Death of boy, 11, stirs fund-raiser

It is especially fitting that memorial donations for Brian Reel of Canton Township — "a natural with animals" — be sent to the Michigan Humane Society.

Brian, 11, who recently had finished fifth grade at Hulsing Elementary School, died Aug. 30 of an undisclosed blood disease.

A private service was held Tuesday evening, and the family has asked that memorial contributions be sent to the Humane Society, said a Schrader Funeral Home spokeswoman.

Brian is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Reel of Lombardy in Canton. He also is survived by grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. Wiley Reel of Belleville, and Mr. and Mrs. John B. Moore of Listowel, Ontario.

"HE WAS a natural with animals," recalled Edna Terry, who became friendly with Brian through the Paw Prints 4-H obedience club. "He was a fantastic boy — courageous. I guess he was the youngest member of our club."

According to Mrs. Terry's recollection, Brian had been a member of the Paw Prints for about three years. He had trained his two Shetland sheepdogs for shows and had won many prizes.

Brian's illness meant frequent trips to a hospital. He collected donations from doctors and nurses for the Humane Society, which was in danger of closing because of a lack of money, said Mrs. Terry.

(The Humane Society, a non-profit agency, operates pet shelters in Westland, Detroit and Pontiac. The shelters place dogs and cats for adoption.)

Animals for whom homes cannot be found are destroyed with an injection of a barbiturate.

The boy also had interviewed an animal control officer for a 4-H project.

"THOSE DOGS were so much a part of his life," said Mrs. Terry, of Napier Road in Canton. "It would be hard to tell you all the firsts (prizes)."

"He also had a pony which he kept at our place," she said. "My life has

Proposal aims rewards at best township citizens

But board members wanted to know who, specifically, would nominate candidates. Who would make the final decision?

"There would be nothing worse than being slapped down as citizen of the month," said Trustee Steve Larson. "At

Believed in unity

Vallier, civic servant, dies at 66

Archibald E. Vallier, 66, of Colony Farms in Plymouth Township, died Sept. 2 in his summer home near Caseville, Mich.

Funeral services will be at 11 a.m. Friday in First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth with the Rev. Philip Rodger Magee officiating. Burial will be at Caseville.

Vallier was born March 8, 1914, in Columbus, Neb. The youngest member of his high school graduating class, his family decided to send their 16-year-old son to Doan College for two years. From there, he went on to earn his bachelor of science degree in engineering at Iowa State University.

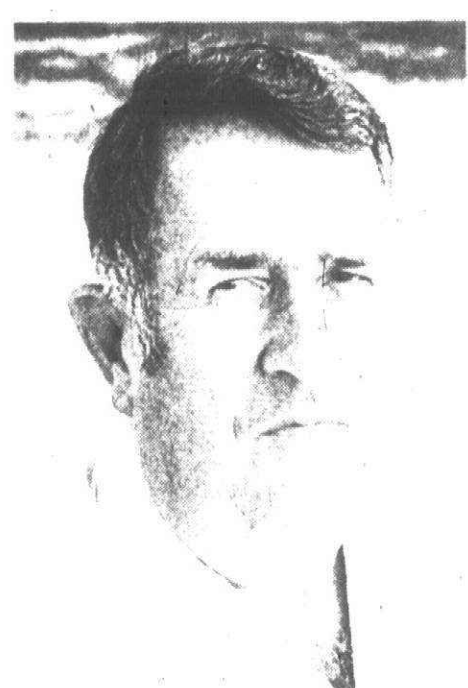
In May 1941, he married Johanna Sandham in the Methodist Church in Cass City. Also in May 1941, he was called into active service in the U.S. Army. He was a second lieutenant in the Army Reserves and during his five years of active duty was in charge of all war production ordinance in the Lansing and Jackson area. He held the rank of major when he was discharged in 1946.

THE VALLIERs lived in Lansing during the war years. It was there that a lifetime interest was nurtured.

He was a member of the Box 23 Club, a group of men who assisted the firefighters at the old Porter Hotel fire.

Vallier was one of the men — judges, attorneys, businessmen — who went to all the fires. They assisted the firefighters in any way they were asked. They provided coffee and doughnuts for the regulars and always were on hand to give them a hand.

During his years as a Plymouth resi-

dent, Vallier seldom missed a fire. If he was in town, he was there. His presence made it official. And as a member of the Plymouth City Commission, one of the joys of his life was helping buy new fire engines.

He had gone to work for Ford Motor Co. in 1946 as an experimental engineer. He and his family moved from Dearborn to Plymouth in 1951. When he spoke of the move, he said "it was just like a country boy coming home."

Vallier served on the Plymouth City Commission for eight years. Ten years ago, on the eve of his retirement from the commission and from Ford's, he was the subject of a column in this newspaper. It was written by Fred Delano, at that time editor of the Plymouth Mail & Observer.

"Arch makes a lot of noise in the deliberations of our City Commission, to which he was first elected in 1963, and because of this he stirs emotional retorts as no other colleague. The point many observers miss, however, is that no matter what the issue, Vallier takes a stand."

"Another side of Arch's nature, which often is not seen in city hall, will be verified by two other commissioners, who just happen to be his residential neighbors."

"There's an expanse behind Arch's house which the kids call Vallier Field. The neighborhood mop-pets have had free reign there for years, whether it be to play ball, climb the trees or seek out the bats in the dark of a summer night."

"Then, just to prove he isn't the fierce curmudgeon some think, Commissioner Vallier showed a new turn of neighborliness this winter as he turned his tractor into a snow plow. It is now a familiar sight to see this mountain of a man, late at night or early in the morning, whenever the snowfall warrants, riding the plow as he cleans the neighbors' walks."

Vallier was a member of Phi Delta Theta, the Dearborn Rotary Club, the Plymouth Kiwanis Club, the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the Society of Automotive Engineers, the board of trustees of First United Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, the board of directors of Colony Farms Condominiums, the Indies West board of directors, and Scenic Golf Club in Caseville.

He is survived by: wife, Johanna; daughters, Jane Fey of Birmingham and Mary Kaplan of Hollis, N.H.; and granddaughters, Molly Fey and Elizabeth Fey.

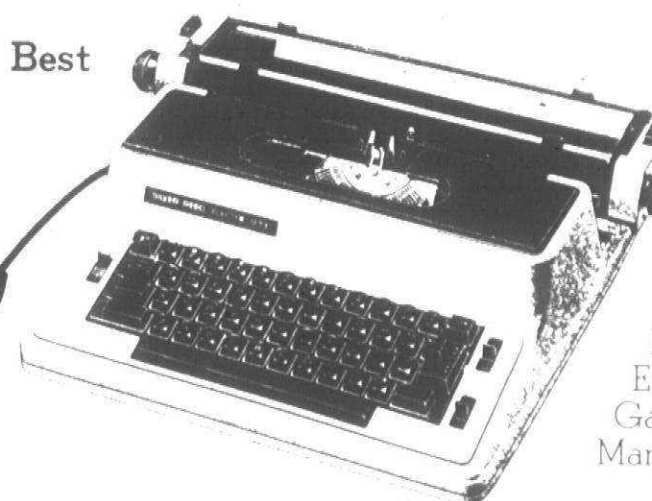

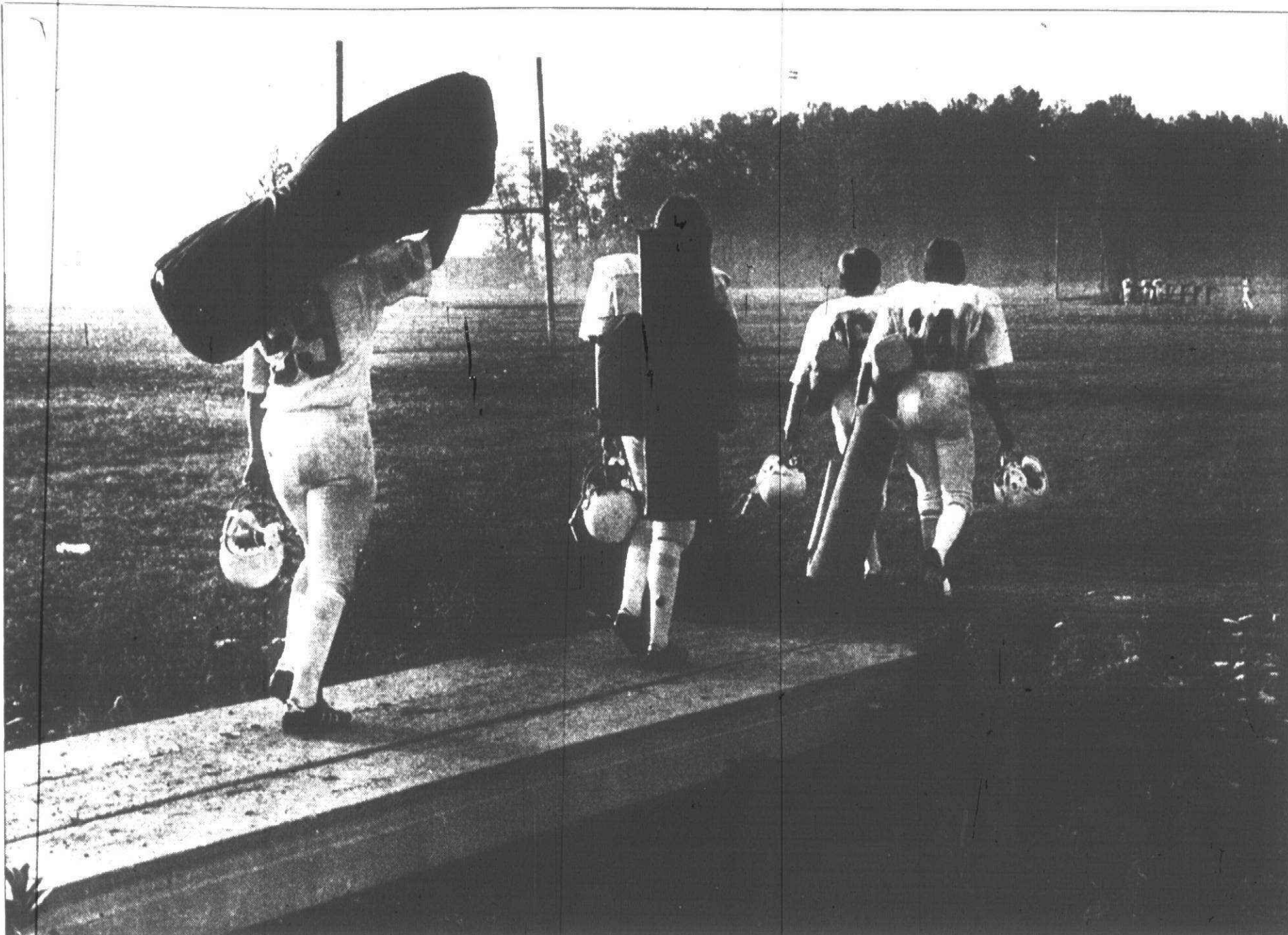

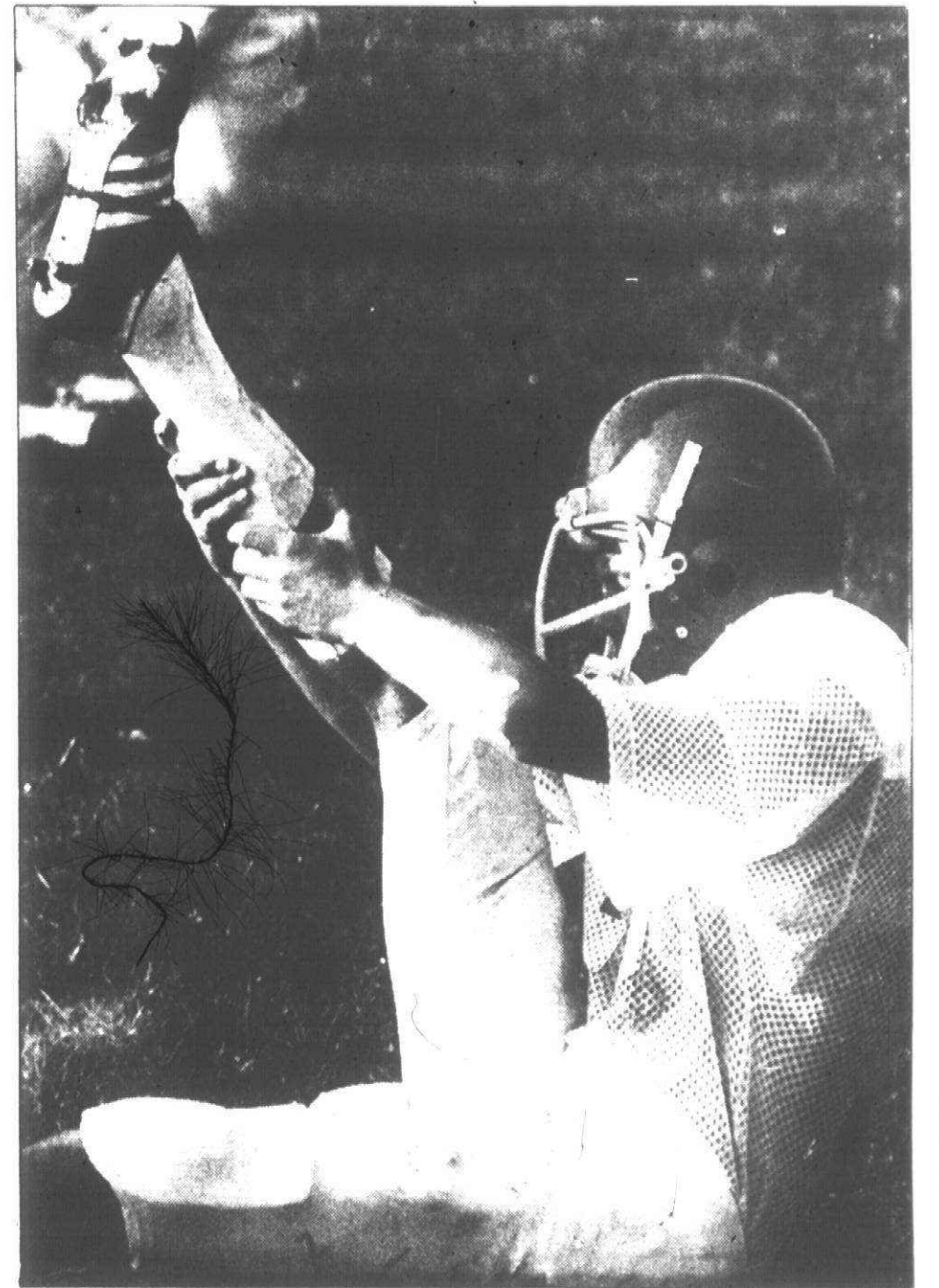

From no-pad workouts, a football camp, to all-out scrimmages — August has come and gone. Now only execution and consistency remain to perfect before players become a team.

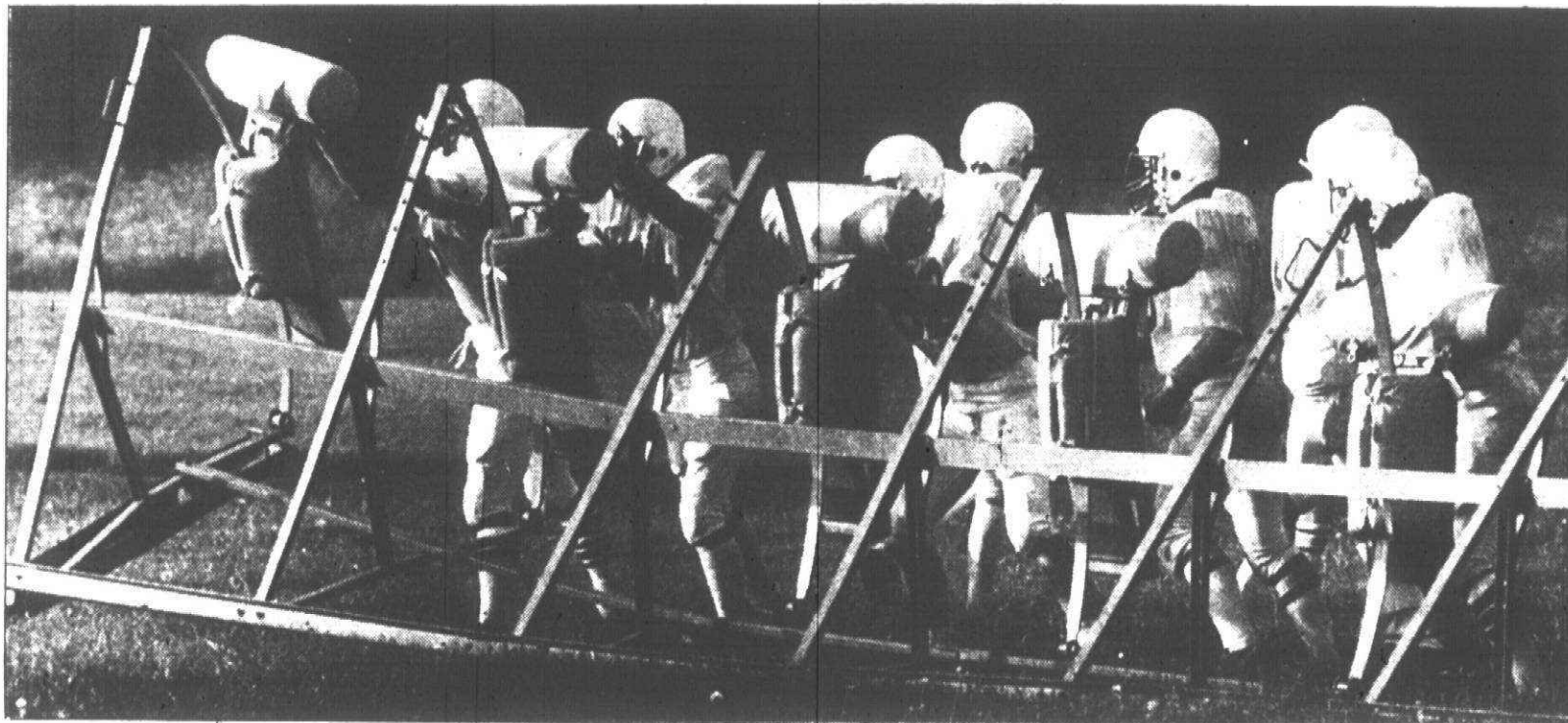
A sigh of relief now escapes as the teams go into game-week routines. Game uniforms have been handed out, picture day is over, and the stage is set for opening night.

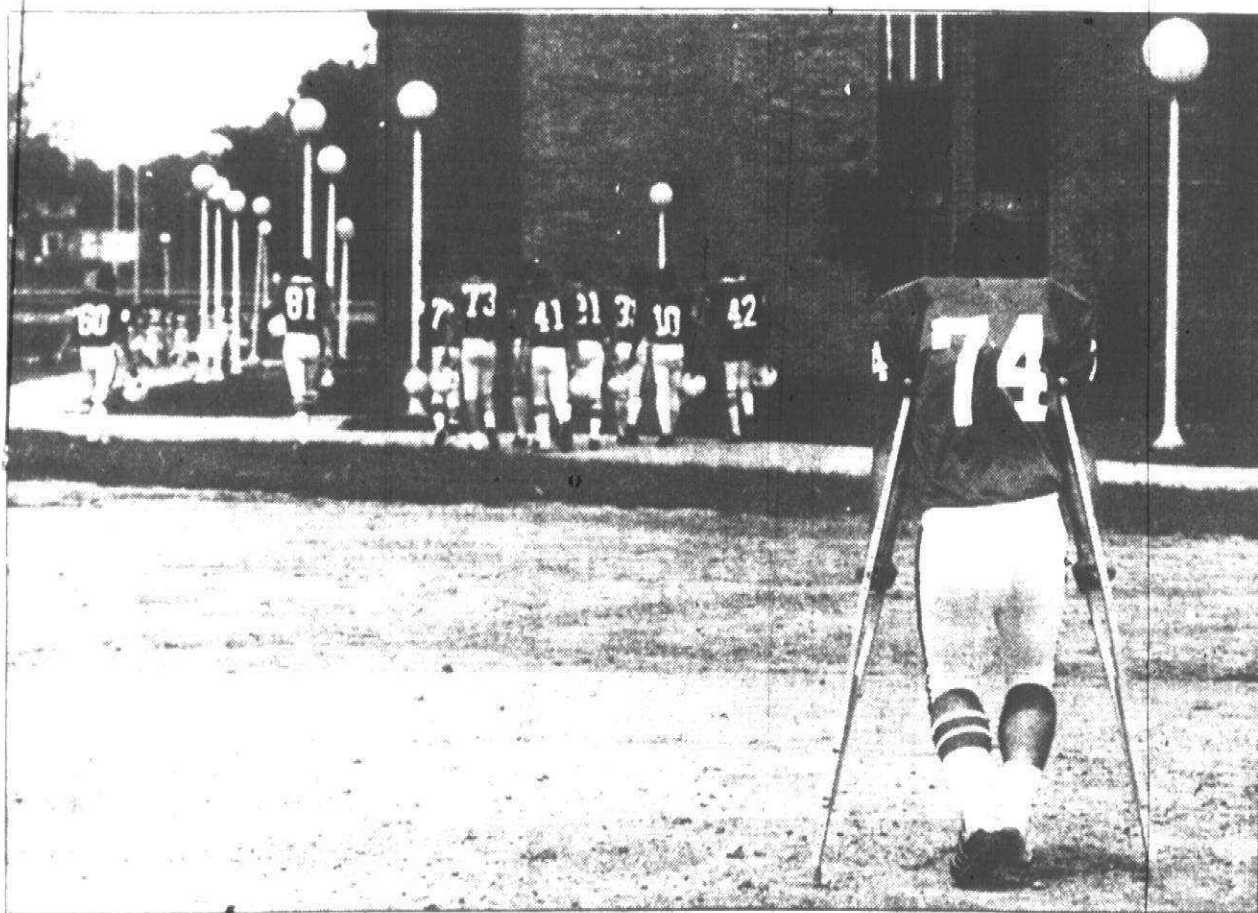


Pre-season practice requires physical conditioning as demonstrated by this Canton Chief player.

Karras set to film in area

The cast and crew of "Word of Honor," a made-for television production, will be rolling their equipment into Plymouth later this month to begin filming work that originally was planned for Birmingham.

That announcement was made by the film's location manager, Evelyn Orbach, Wednesday, after almost one month of negotiations that fell apart in Birmingham last week.

The film is being produced by Georgian Bay Productions, owned by former Detroit Lion Alex Karras and co-producer Susan Clark.

Orbach said that several "key" scenes, originally planned in Birmingham, will now be staged here instead.

Among them will be a festival scene at Kellogg Park that will employ "hundreds and hundreds" of local Plymouth residents and their families.

Filmmakers say they're also planning to request the Centennial Educational Park band be included in that film scene.

"The scene will be very much like your Fall Festival," she said. "We'll be making those arrangements in advance."

When contacted by the Observer, producer Karras said while a park in Birmingham had been planned for this extravaganza, "I, in fact, like the park in Plymouth better."

"BACK AND FORTH from Ann Arbor, I used to drive through Plymouth," said Karras. "I liked that park in the first place."

He said they planned to shoot that scene Sept. 19 and 20.

"We would love to have as many extras as possible and since we're doing it on Saturday, it shouldn't be too much inconvenience," he added. "Hopefully, people will stay the day, we'll furnish them with hot dogs and raffle off a couple of television sets."

Another key scene in the film, a bank setting, will be shot at the First Federal Savings of Detroit on Main Street.

Orbach added some "exterior building" scenes, including City Hall, will be used as well. Additional filming will be done in West Bloomfield, Royal Oak, Pontiac as well as "some facilities in Oakland County."

The planned film will star Karl Malden as an investigative reporter for a community newspaper who has given his word not to reveal something he learned from an informant while tracking down a story.

Reportedly, Birmingham's rejection of the project there was based on some reservations about a subplot in the movie — involving the murder of a teenager. Some city officials there felt it might stir up wounds of past tragic events.

S'craft trustees may force striking teachers back to work

BY TOM LONERGAN

Pending the outcome of meetings with a state mediator today, the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees may seek an injunction to force striking teachers back to work.

The board voted 5-1 Wednesday to seek the injunction in Wayne County Circuit Court, following a 2½-hour closed session with college administrators and attorneys. Trustee Leonard Wozniak voted "no." Trustee Rosina Raymond was absent.

Wozniak said, "I'm not in favor of going to court. We should try to resolve our differences here."

A meeting with a mediator appointed by the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, requested by the

teachers' union, was scheduled for 9:30 a.m. today in Detroit.

The strike entered its third day Thursday. Classes are not being held, but college buildings have remained open. The college estimated its fall enrollment at 10,000, including 2,000 adult education students.

The Faculty Forum, which represents 160 full-time and 189 part-time instructors, has not requested other unions at the college to honor its picket lines. The Forum is a Michigan Education Association (MEA) affiliate.

UNRESOLVED ISSUES are wages and retention of fully paid fringe benefits.

Delavan W. Sipes, teacher's union president told the board Wednesday

that the teachers want "a 9 to 10 percent (salary) increase per year without rollbacks."

"There is no acceptable reason why you cannot produce a settlement in line with others (school districts) in this area," he said. A two-year contract is being considered.

Sipes confirmed that the faculty sought an 8 percent raise per year during meetings with the mediator last Friday.

"We won't go back to those kinds of percentages," he said. "That was made to avoid a strike."

THE COLLEGE last Friday offered

the full-time instructors 8 percent the first year and 7.25 percent the second.

Sipes said the two sides were "quite, quite close" to a settlement last Friday during an all-day meeting with the mediator.

But any possible agreement was off Sunday, according to Sipes, when the union discovered that the college was proposing to take money for the full-time instructors' second year increase from the part-timers package.

SCHOOLCRAFT PRESIDENT C. Nelson Grote said in a written statement Tuesday that the college could

only provide an 8 percent increase for full-time faculty during 1981/82 "by

shifting money away from proposed part-time faculty raises."

traffic bureau would improve the sporadic enforcement now provided and free up other officers for the investigation of criminal complaints.

He envisions routine patrols of subdivision streets if the bureau is established. Patrol of Interstate 275 would not be a major goal.

"There's a lot of money lost in minor accidents in subdivisions," he said. "That's where our bikers and kids are."

The presence of more officers in subdivisions also would discourage such crimes as home breaking and enter-

ings, said Cox.

Officers could spend more time taking traffic counts and other surveys to determine where signs are needed or roads should be widened.

Cox said a quota system for writing tickets would not be used by any traffic bureau under his jurisdiction.

Cox expects to send preliminary work on the grant application to Township Hall this week. Grant coordinator Terry Carroll will work out fine details of the application before sending the document to the state.

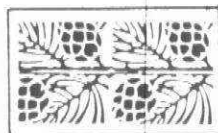

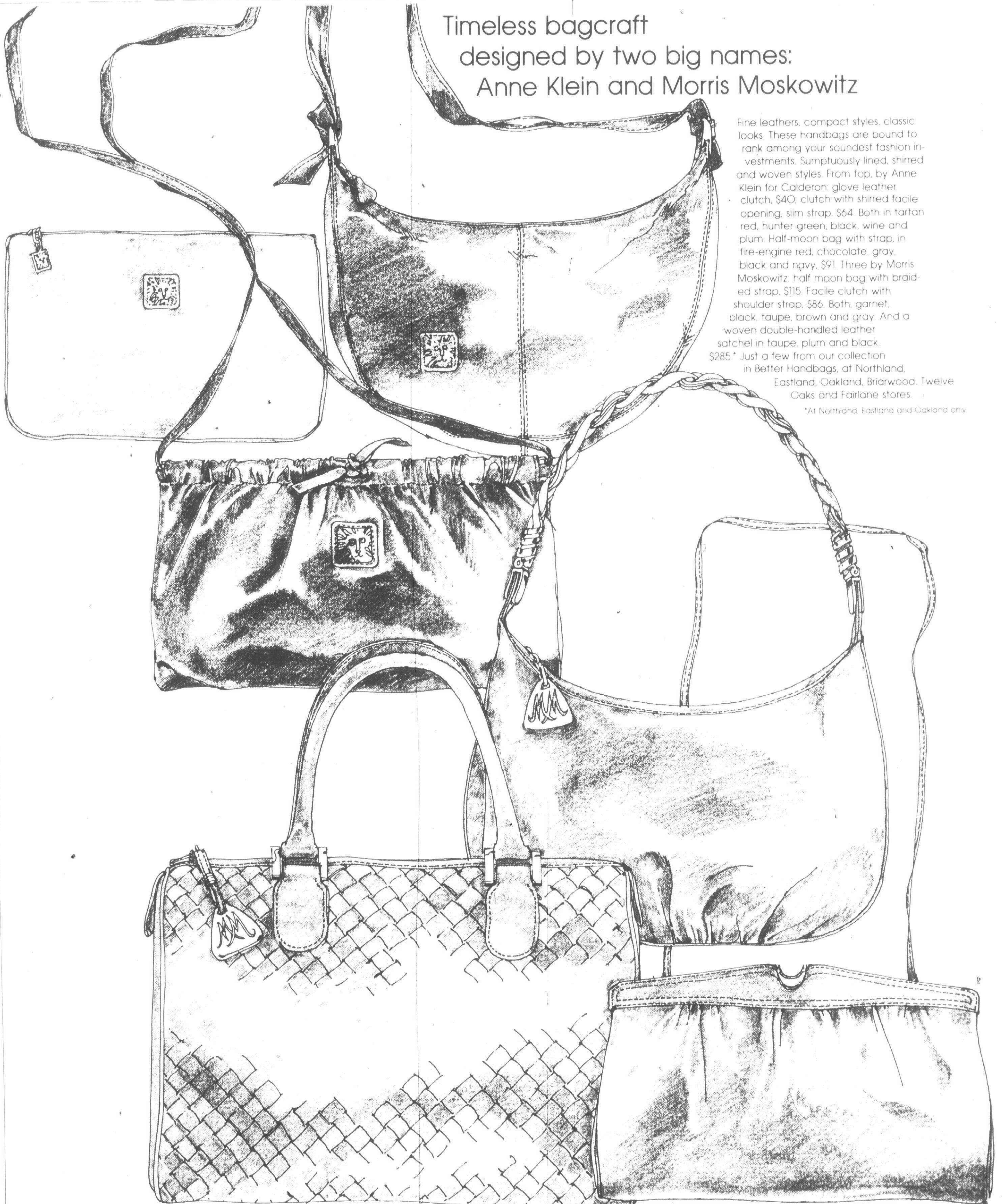

It was reported in the Ann Arbor News recently that Pursell "threw away" an unanswered questionnaire from the nation's largest consumer or-

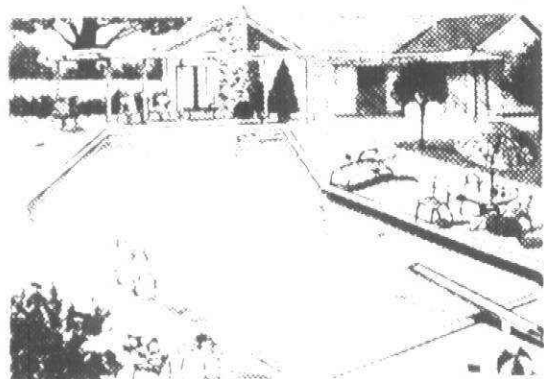
ganization.

Man who would be dentist
ends up long-standing tailor

If ever there was any doubt that life can play strange tricks on a person, you should meet and talk with Bernie Morrison, owner of Famous Men's Wear, now one of the oldest business enterprises in Plymouth.

Leaning back in his chair in a tiny office close by the heavy stock of men's wearing apparel, Bernie broke in to laughter and confided, "If it wasn't for the hard times in the early '30s I'd possibly be a dentist today."

This admission sounded intriguing and he was quick to point out that he was born and raised in a family where the head of the house was in a clothing store. But Bernie had other ideas.

Born in Detroit 63 years ago in the area of Fort Street and Clark Avenue, Bernie went to Western High School and graduated in 1933.

EAGER TO GET along in the world, he confided that he needed more education so he entered Wayne University. That was long before it became a state university. He went to night school.

Then the urge got him. He decided that he wanted to be a dentist and enrolled at the University of Detroit Dental School with visions of becoming an outstanding man in his field.

It was here that life played its main trick on him. At the time he was selling newspapers to earn extra money.

It was at the depth of the depression and grown men who had held executive positions in many major plants were standing on the street corners selling apples. Money was difficult to come by and young Bernie soon realized he wouldn't get very far selling papers.

There was no alternative but to go to work for his father who had a small wearing apparel store on Detroit's west side.

Here he got the training to fit him for life. It wasn't long until he went to work for Sam's, one of the big stores in downtown Detroit. That was in 1951 and Bernie smiles a bit now when he recalls

that it was at Sam's that he became acquainted with a union and soon was named shop steward.

"That gave me a bit of experience in management and working with people. It was a great education — better than I could get in school."

By this time the "bug" had bit him and he yearned to start in business for himself.

"I wanted to get away from downtown Detroit," he said, "and one Sunday afternoon while driving around the suburbs I landed in Northville. There seemed to be a lot of street traffic and that impressed me."

"A bit later I went back and saw even more people on the street. That settled it. So I started my own business in Northville and remained there four years."

ALONG ABOUT this time the city of Plymouth began to look attractive and he moved his wearing apparel shop to Plymouth and set up business on Ann Arbor Trail right behind the Mayflower Hotel in what is now the water bed shop.

After five years at that location he moved across the street to his present site and now is rated one of the oldest clothing firms in the western suburbs.

It was here that life played another trick on him. He entered military service and served 4½ years in the Pacific, with most of the time in New Caledonia.

On his return, he decided to expand and opened two other stores — one in the Eastgate Shopping Center and the other in Grosse Pointe. He since has sold them.

"You know," he chuckled, "things have a way of evening up. I had an accident one day that damaged my right hand and because of that I never could have continued as a dentist even if I had taken the course and opened my own office."

Married and the father of three girls, Bernie lives with his family in Southfield — but his heart is in Plymouth where he has succeeded in part because life played a little trick on him when he was a newsboy on Detroit's west side.

Dziennik Polski: 'Nowe zadania robotnikoww Polsce'

Like most daily newspaper editors of late, Stanley Krajewski was scurrying to get breaking news about the shipyard strikes in Gdansk, Poland, into the paper before deadline.

A story was written, finished three hours before the paper hit the streets, and Krajewski had to write a headline.

He wrote: "Nowe zadania robotnikoww Polsce." Translated, that's "New demand by workers in Poland."

Krajewski, 65, is editor-in-chief and treasurer of the Dziennik Polski, or the Polish Daily News, a paper written in Polish that has served Detroit area's Polish community for 76 years.

He's been with the paper for 32 years. Krajewski has watched the paper's circulation peak at 40,000 daily circulation in the mid-1950s and dwindle to its present readership of 13,000 Monday through Thursday and 19,000 on Friday.

Presently, the paper averages about six pages every day but Friday when there are usually eight to 10 pages. A recent edition carried only one display ad in the whole newspaper — an ad for a Polish radio program on WCAR — and only nine classified ads.

The paper that once employed 130 persons with a printing press now has a staff of 21 people and is printed by a commercial publisher.

Even though the circulation is low, Krajewski, a Southland resident, contends that the readership is larger than its circulation because the paper is kept around and passed around "until its read out completely."

But Krajewski is frank enough to admit the market for a daily Polish newspaper in Detroit is declining as more Polish immigrants become mainstream Americans and more move to the outlying suburbs.

"YES, IT'S DYING," Krajewski said. "But at the same time people are

spread out so much we have circulation problems. Many like the paper the same day it comes out and with the postal service we have we can't rely on it. Actually, the complaint is that they aren't receiving the paper or they receive a bunch to one subscriber under one label."

If it weren't for revenue that comes from a couple other publications his newspaper prints for Polish organizations in Chicago, Krajewski admits the Polish Daily News would be out of business.

If the paper does fold, Krajewski says, the Detroit area will be losing a little bit more of its rich, ethnic heritage.

"I think the loss would be indescribable," Krajewski said. "I think Polonia (Polish Americans) would lose its identity in Detroit."

"It's like a last hurrah. Let's hold onto it because you want that contact between people who live around here. And many wouldn't know what's going on in the world and among themselves."

YOU'LL FIND no comics in the Dziennik Polski, but a regular feature of the paper is a serialized novel. Novels by Joseph Conrad have been serialized in the past.

A recent edition featured an installment of a novel called "Lacy Nas Morze," or "The Sea Unites Us." It's a story by Mieczyslaw Szwej, a priest, about the ties between American Poles and their compatriots in the homeland.

Sharing front page with the story on the strikes is a story about sky marshalls riding in planes to prevent hijackings and a story about obstacles to peace in Israel. Krajewski says he tries to get at least one story about Jewish issues or Israel because Polish Jews comprise a chunk of the paper's readership.

He tries to keep the front page news international or national but boasts

that he broke the news of John Cardinal Dearden's retirement as archbishop on his front page before the Detroit News or Free Press.

Krajewski got the scoop "from connections," he says.

"I was called for a press conference and the person that called me said it will be about the resignation of Cardinal Dearden," Krajewski explained. "She stopped herself and said she shouldn't have told me. And then I said, 'Aw, come on, you can tell me,' and she did."

"I went to the morgue to get background information to write the story.

Then I went to the conference and there it was, just as I wrote about it."

MONDAY'S editorial in Dziennik Polski was about the lack of leadership in the Carter administration. Krajewski says "right now we're for Reagan, no question about it" but hedges when asked which candidate the paper will endorse.

The paper's editorial stance is generally conservative, says Krajewski, but unpredictable. It favored the return of the Panama Canal to the Panamanians "because we never had any sovereign right to Panama." It supported deseg-

regation efforts in the schools despite opposition to the plan in the Polish community.

But the paper also supported Nixon's candidacy in 1968, believing that Nixon deserved a chance to exercise his secret plan to end the Vietnam War.

And while the paper doesn't editorially support the communist regime in Poland, Krajewski said he doesn't believe the people of Poland are ready to embrace capitalism.

"WE WOULDN'T mind even if Poland were purely communistic, as long as it's not under Moscow's, under Russia's, yoke," he said. "Let the people decide their future. We are anti-communist because of the oppression."

About the recent strikes by workers in Poland, Krajewski says workers' demands for meat and free trade unions "are only the surface."

"They had to have something to start with," Krajewski said. "The real issue is lack of justice. They call it the Peo-

ple's Republic of Poland, but the people don't have anything to say."

Krajewski commended the strikers for demonstrating peacefully but says, "I am worried when police say they may 'spdbue' the strikers. I don't like the sound of that word."

During his years at the paper Krajewski has interviewed luminaries such as Henry Kissinger, secretary of state under Richard Nixon, and Pope John Paul II before he became pope.

Before interviewing Kissinger, Krajewski lobbied for an American consulate office in Windsor, which would make it easier to get a visa than traveling to Toronto. Ford didn't win, despite Krajewski's editorial backing, and Windsor didn't get the consulate.

The Polish pope is described by Krajewski as "a very warm person, very understandable and very understanding. He is very simple, there is no aura around him. The guy next door, that's what he's like."

House rejects Sun Belt aid to poor; no relief from heat

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes Aug. 21 through Aug. 27.

SUN BELT vs FROST BELT: The House rejected 199-215 an amendment to provide Sun Belt states with a larger slice of federal aid to help the poor pay their energy bills. The increased Sun Belt share would have come at the expense of the Frost Belt. The aid in question is \$1.8 billion to be distributed to the poor in fiscal 1981, primarily to help them pay home heating costs. The vote came during debate on an appropriations bill later passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. Bill Alexander, D-Ark., a supporter, said the federal aid should go as much for air-conditioning costs as for heating bills. "I am advised that more people died in this nation during the June-July heat wave than died from cold in the past half century," he said.

Rep. Edward Beard, D-R.I., an opponent, told Sun Belt members: "I understand your air conditioning and the need for it. But understand what it is to be old and poor in a northern climate trying to survive."

Members voting "nay" wanted to preserve a formula giving Frost Belt states priority over Sun Belt states in the distribution of energy money to the poor.

Reps. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, David Bonior, William Ford, D-Taylor, William Brodhead, D-Detroit, James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge, and William Broomfield R-Birmingham, voted "nay."

BI-LINGUAL EDUCATION: The House voted, 213-194, against to prevent the Department of Education from requiring schools to teach in two languages to many students whose main language is not English. The department has proposed regulations which would require many schools to greatly expand bi-lingual education, so as to comply with the 1974 U.S. Supreme Court decision in Lau vs. Nichols. The amendment adopted by this vote prohibits the Education Department from spending any of its fiscal 1981 budget to implement the regulations. The vote came during debate on an appropriations bill later passed and sent to the Senate.

Rep. John Ashbrook, R-Ohio, the sponsor, said: "If we believe in local control of education... and if we oppose the deliberate distortion of the requirements of Supreme Court decisions, we shall adopt this amendment."

Opponent Baltasar Corrada, Puerto Rico's representative in Congress, said: "This is not really an amendment against bi-lingual education programs. It is even worse. It is an amendment against equal educational opportunity and civil rights."

Members voting "yea" were expressing animosity toward proposed federal regulations to greatly expand bi-lingual education in the nation's schools.

Pursell, Sawyer, Broomfield, Vander Jagt, Albosta and Davis voted "yea." Bonior, Ford, Brodhead and Blanchard voted "nay."

SENATE

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE: The senate rejected 36-46 an amendment to fund a new domestic violence program by means of block grants to states rather than by categorical grants to state and local governments and community groups. Fewer federal strings are attached to block grants than to categorical grants. Had the amendment prevailed, domestic violence money would have been sent to states through an existing channel in the Social Security Act, Section XX. Defeat of the amendment leaves intact a plan to set up a new federal mechanism for administering programs to combat domestic violence. A final vote on the bill was delayed until after the Labor Day recess.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., the sponsor, said the question before the Senate was whether "there should be yet another categorical grant program, yet another bureaucracy, yet more restraints and restrictions and red tape on local government, or do we believe in the block grant concept?"

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., said that by making the domestic violence program a part of the Social Security bureaucracy, the amendment "would place these victims at the bottom of the long list of groups seeking funding from the already hard-pressed, reduced Title XX program."

Senators voting "nay" wanted a new federal mechanism to administer the domestic violence program.

roll call report

Democratic Sens. Donald Riegle and Carl Levin voted "nay."

STRIP MINING: By a vote of 54-31, the Senate approved language that weakens federal regulation of strip mining in the states. The legislation makes it easier for a state to get Department of Interior approval of its plan for reclaiming scarred land. The measure was passed as part of a ship-tonnage bill that was sent back to the House.

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., the sponsor, said the

law needs to be softened because of the "unfair, unreasonable, and unworkable mining and reclamation policies" of the Interior Department.

Opponent Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, said the law was being changed "for the benefit of a limited few... the coal mine operators and, indirectly, the oil companies, many of which own those very coal mines."

Senators voting "yea" wanted to weaken the 1977 Surface Mining Act.

Riegle and Levin voted "nay."

Getting high

And managing gridiron stress

"We can win. We can win. We can win. We can win. We're a unit. We're a unit. We're a unit. We're a unit."

Members of a high school football team chanted those words last week. It's part of their program for getting high on unity and confidence after each practice session.

The high is strictly legal and very inexpensive. It's a stress management technique that allows them to achieve a mental or natural high.

The system, instilled in the Southfield-Lathrup players during summer practice by assistant line coach Eric Kopsch, is not a concept for winning. Instead, he sees it as a way to build character and promote self-improvement. The overall objective, he said, is to teach the players how to achieve a positive mental attitude.

KOPSCH, who last spring took a psychology of coaching class at Michigan State University, calls the after-practice session exercise "climbing into our mental rooms." The techniques used, he said, go beyond the gridiron in helping players deal with stressful situations in school or at home. A Scandinavian concept, the Americans have applied some physical techniques as well.

The football players form three circles around Kopsch, who soothingly talks to them in their "mental rooms." He is followed by another coach, who

gives them a kind of pep talk and then puts their minds in a stressful game situation.

The coach upsets the players with the possible negative game outcomes for a brief time, and then assures them with positive, confidence-building statements. The object, the coaches said, is to get players accustomed to stressful situations so that after practice they will be able to successfully control their emotions.

Toward the end of the session, Kopsch re-enters the circle and leads the team in relaxation training — complete muscle tension followed by total relaxation.

THE TRAINING has helped his concentration, said Joe Pecheniuk, senior tri-captain. As a result, he is making fewer mistakes — such as offsides penalties — on the playing field. He also says he's able to hit harder in his position as a tackle.

"I don't feel pain anymore," he said. "I feel great. I feel tougher, like I can push myself beyond my limit."

The team has had a division between the classes in the past, Kopsch said. The seniors didn't get along with the freshman or junior varsity players, and the team lacked what they now have: unity. Kopsch said he hopes the "family spirit" generated on the playing field by the stress management training will spill over into other sports and the student body.

Bad roads — unglamorous, but still an issue

It's easy to write about such personalities as Reagan and Carter, Billy and The Bird. It's tougher to write about an issue — tougher but more important.

Many American roads are in bad shape. Maybe you thought it was confined to Oakland County or Wayne County. It's nationwide.

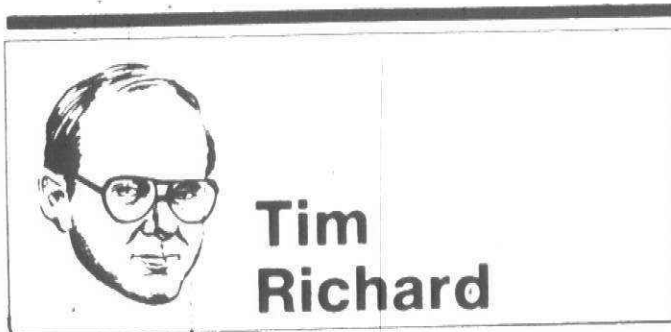
Kennedy, Mondale and Carter gave some whinging political speeches for the TV audience recently.

Two chaps who didn't get televised are Gov. William G. Milliken, a Republican, and U.S. Transportation Secretary Neil Goldschmidt, a Democrat. They had more to say.

MILLIKEN TOLD a convention of road builders on Mackinac Island:

"The problem is two-fold. On the one hand, drivers nationally are driving less and are purchasing more fuel-efficient vehicles as this nation recognizes the need to curtail our energy usage . . . a very desirable occurrence from an energy viewpoint."

But since road taxes are based on per-gallon

consumption and not a percentage of gasoline prices, our road revenues are declining, the governor said.

The second side of the problem is that "transportation construction costs continue to sharply escalate as this nation experiences unheard-of levels of double-digit inflation. One recent estimate said that the combination of forces is reducing our purchasing power for roads and highways some 33 percent per year."

Milliken had no miracle solution. It's not done

that way in Michigan. A coalition of forces in Lansing will have to come up with compromise answers.

GOLDSCHMIDT RECALLED the original interstate highway plan was that the federal government would provide 90 percent of construction funding, then turn the highways over to the states for maintenance.

Often, however, the states used their road funds not to maintain what had been built but to build new roads.

"We must have a conservation ethic for our roads," Goldschmidt said in an interview. "In the same way you decide every 20 years you need a new roof for the house, you'll have to depreciate the value of the roads and replace them."

Part of the Carter Administration's energy plan, he said, was a 10 cent per gallon gasoline tax, part of which would have gone for road maintenance and not just construction.

Congress shot down that plan. But Goldschmidt said the administration may ask Congress to vote a two-cent increase in the fuel tax for maintenance.

That rate would yield \$2 billion a year.

CASTING A shadow over Michigan's problems, the governor said, is the spectre of the Tisch tax cut plan on the Nov. 4 ballot.

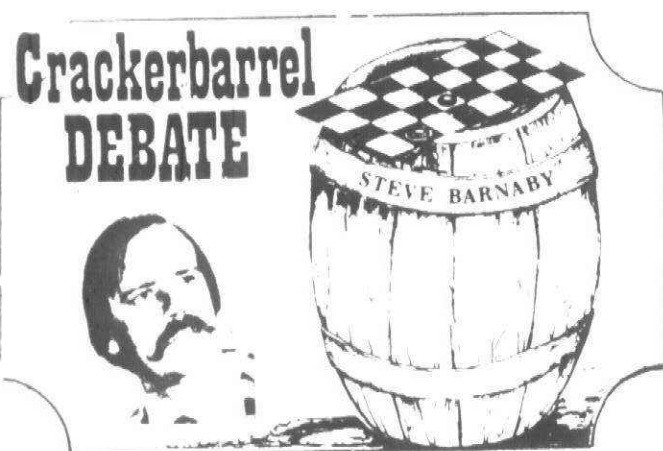
Milliken said the Tisch plan "would slash property taxes in half and force the state to make up all lost revenues out of existing funds."

"The result would be a crippling of our ability to provide such basic state services as state police enforcement, mental health care, education and an adequate prison system."

But road builders shouldn't think their funds are safe just because they are earmarked by the State Constitution.

"If we were forced to turn people away from mental health treatment because there was no money to pay for it," Milliken warned, "you can be sure there would be extremely heavy pressure to remove the restrictions on transportation revenues to allow their use for other purposes."

Not glamorous stuff, but Milliken and Goldschmidt got to the point.

What's under all the gloss?

My thoughts for the day focused on the cover of Time magazine, the picture in my bedroom and the presidential candidates.

The Time magazine cover for Aug. 25 has a determined looking President Carter underneath the headline, "Running Tough." I'm not really a Carter fan but never has he appeared more presidential — resolute, determined, even capable.

I wondered as I looked at the cover if the real Carter is tough, resourceful, resolute and determined enough that his sense of discretion, his sense of purpose and his sense of the U.S.' role in the world will come through in his job. I wondered if it would come through to the voters. I had my doubts.

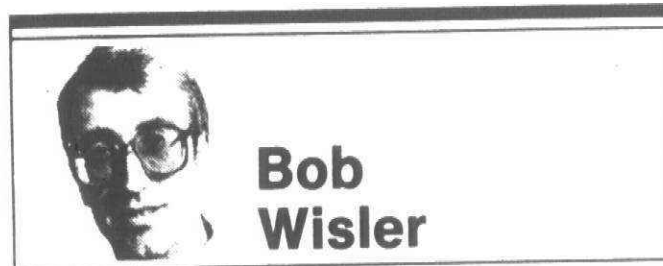
Political campaigns remind me of the picture in my bedroom, hanging behind a door. It is a photograph taken a few days after I was married a few years ago. My friend, a talented photographer, took it as Sue and I stopped for a moment in a candlelit room. He presented an 8x10-inch color photograph a few weeks later. The glossy finish, I thought, gave us a regal aura.

I showed the photo to friends and relatives. They were impressed. I took the photo to a person who frames such things. He picked out an antique wood frame and suggested dulling the photo to keep it in character with the wood frame. He told me it would look better. I bow to experts. I ordered it his way.

I have never liked the photograph since I had it framed. The glossy finish make us look romantic, alluring, interesting. With the gloss gone I could see that my eyelids drooped and my fingers were limp. I knew that I had been drinking too much. My wife's eyes were unfocused, as if she could not fathom what was going on. Her mouth was open but she was saying nothing.

The finish on that photograph was on my mind when I looked at the photograph of Carter and when I looked at Reagan on television that same day. After years of what seems to us like tired leadership, we tend to look for an image of a leader as we would like him to be, not as he is. After years of economic uncertainty and political black-mail we look for the picture-perfect president who will lead us through our troubles and make us feel good about the journey.

And so, Ronald Reagan is nominated and leads in the polls. Underneath the TV charisma, the Republican brand

of howdy, and the John Wayne answers there may be a man who has the resolve, resourcefulness, discretion and courage to lead us through our time of despair. But I have my doubts. The things that Reagan is starting to say and the things that people are saying about him bother me.

Garry Wills is an astute political columnist of national syndication. It surprised me that on Aug. 27 he used terms of such extreme derision in attacking recent Reagan statements on U.S. involvement in Vietnam. Wills concluded his column with this rhetorical question: "What must the world think when we openly consider putting this clown in charge of the most dangerous weapons in the world?"

It is early for this kind of statement. It is the kind of charge which dogged Barry Goldwater throughout his 1964 campaign for the presidency. The pressure of a presidential campaign, in which every statement has the potential of undermining the whole campaign, is enormous. The pressure killed George Romney before he even started. To some extent it knocked off Humphrey and it put the finish to McGovern's feeble hopes.

I suspect that he pressure will get to Reagan — because he really doesn't understand the U.S.' role in the world the way most of the citizens do. I am beginning to hear people who expect to vote for Reagan in November say they feel uncomfortable with his pronouncements. I think that between now and November we will have had the opportunity to examine beneath the veneer and that we will discover that Ronald Reagan isn't the leader we are really looking for.

Jimmy Carter may not be either, but I think we will find that he comes closer. I think that, underneath it all, Carter's view of the United States and what we should stand for is closer to what we want in the dangerous years that are ahead.

Supreme Court race, great day for Irish

"It would be inappropriate for me to comment on that because that question could come before the State Supreme Court for review at a future date."

It's that season again. Four or more persons are campaigning around the state for two seats on the Michigan Supreme Court.

It is a court of appellate jurisdiction — that is, it hears appeals of cases decided in lower courts.

Two of the candidates are incumbents — Mary S. Coleman and Charles L. Levin. It seems fair to ask the challengers what cases they would have decided differently had they been on the high court.

The answer will be the one quoted above — it is "inappropriate" to comment.

The second answer one commonly gets when quizzing supreme court candidates is this profundity: "I will interpret the law as I find it, without fear or favor."

That is very little help to a serious voter.

TIME WAS when Michigan Supreme Court justices were appointed. That occurred under the Constitution of 1835 and the Constitution of 1850, until 1857.

Then the state legislature, in the Jacksonian spirit of the times, made the supreme court elective. The Constitution of 1908 required they be nominated at partisan conventions and elected at partisan elections.

The Constitution of 1963 made only a slight improvement. It called for nominating justices at partisan conventions but made the election nonpartisan.

On paper, then, our justices are elective. But of the seven current members of the court, three were originally appointed by Gov. William G. Milliken to fill vacancies.

And in some areas of the state, most of the circuit judges were placed there originally by gubernatorial appointment.

VOTERS LIKE Irish names in Michigan, out of all proportion to the number of persons of Irish descent.

Three of the seven current justices have identifiable Irish names — John Fitzgerald, Thomas Giles Kavanagh and James L. Ryan.

Two of the current crop of supreme court candidates have identifiable Irish names — Michael Heagarty and Joseph B. Sullivan. The politicians who nominated them think they know something about us voters.

This year's Michigan Supreme Court election is important in a political way. The 1980 census has been completed, and our legislature is due to be redistricted by the State Apportionment Commission.

The apportionment commission always deadlocks 2-2 over Republican vs. Democratic apportionment plans. The plans then go to the Michigan Supreme Court for a decision. At this point, it becomes important for a political party to have a majority of the court on its side.

And so, whether we like it or not, the supreme court is a partisan political instrument of government.

WE ARE REMINDED, at this juncture, of Archie Bunker's analysis of the judicial system. Archie's idea was have professional juries because:

"You got a judge who spends half his life in school — after which he spends years as a lawyer, then a lower judge, then an upper judge, until he finally works his way up to a Superior Court."

"But does he get to decide who's innocent or guilty? No — that decision's made by four salesmen, three bank tellers, two plumbers, a seamstress and a dingbat!"

SUDDENLY, THE vacuum cleaner began devouring my scarf.

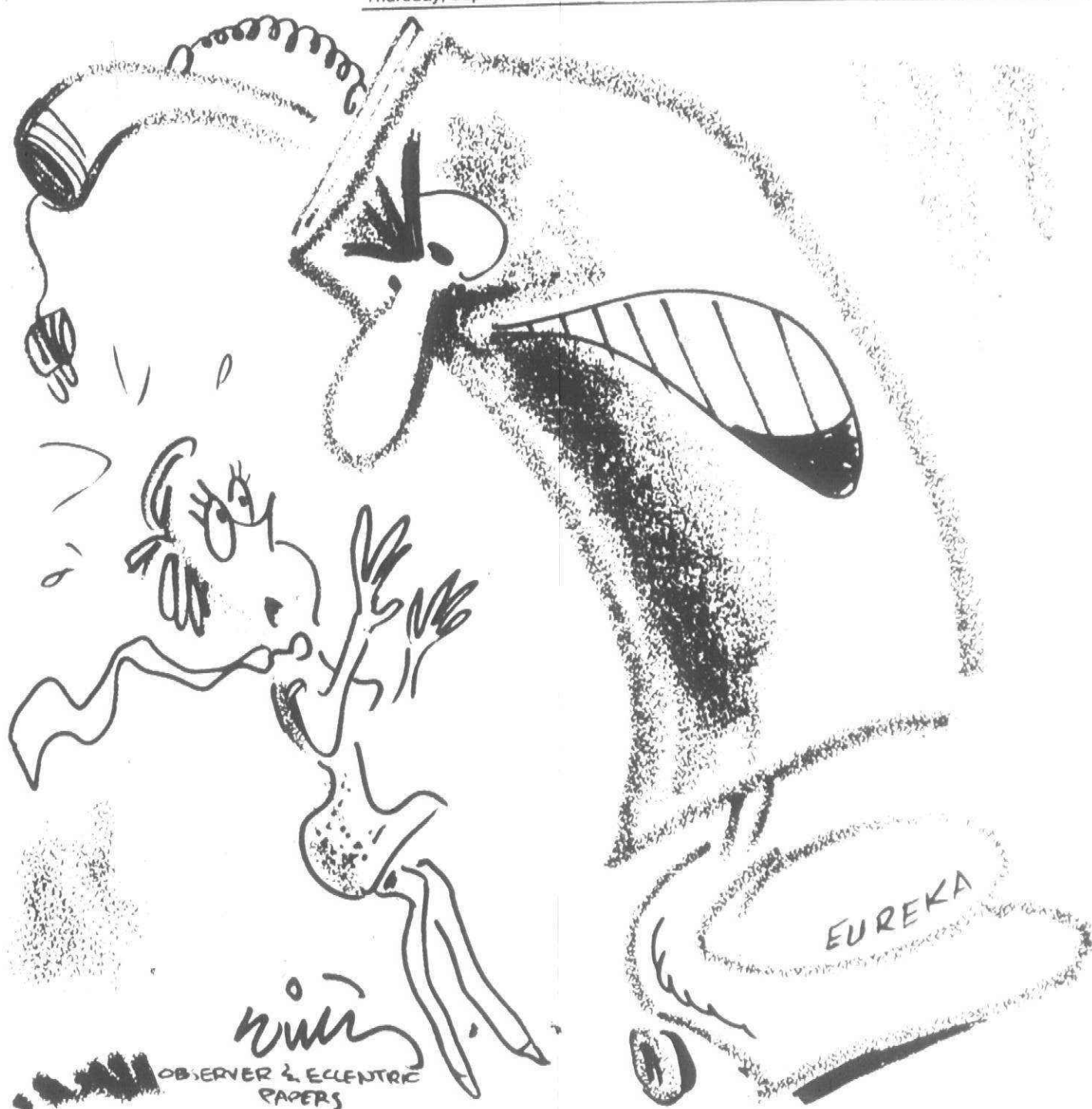
Tighter and tighter the scarf entwined itself around my throat.

Local government moves into recycling act

They're looking for gold in garbage, cash from your trash.

Ten years after the first Earth Day, recycling has come of age. Good managers will save and reuse the waste materials in residential garbage.

Changes in government planning and in the manufacturing, packaging and marketing of products have resulted.

Source reduction measures like the "Bottle Bill" can help even more than recycling. Returnables not only save energy and resources but make streets and highways cleaner.

AFTER A FINE job of teaching the public to "waste not, want not," some local volunteers have retired. Their example of how to do it has stimulated some of those responsible for proper solid waste disposal to begin their rightful task.

Some recyclers, however, find problems with a municipal take-over. Jonathan Dreyfuss directs Recycle Ann Arbor, a curbside operation so successful that the city council plans to assume its management in the near future.

Dreyfuss fears "they may skim off . . . recycle

only the money-maker (paper) and let the rest fall by the wayside."

So far, volunteers have been the key to recycling. Ray LaVoy of Birmingham's center points to high city wages and predicts that labor costs would end the program if their committee were to quit. Five students were hired recently at minimum wage to replace volunteer workers.

LaVoy expects their tonnage to grow more than 25 percent this year. Extensive publicity was a primary factor, he said. Members distributed 6,000 cleverly designed flyers and sold more than 200 "I recycle" decals at 50 cents each.

IN ADDITION to Dreyfuss' curbside operation,

the Ann Arbor Ecology Center collects 1,100 tons of materials annually, the largest volume in southeast Michigan.

Open since 1970, it also depends mainly on volunteers or CETA-financed workers. The latter were recently discontinued, so a staff of four — paid through the sale of recycled goods — will carry on.

More efficient shipping methods have reduced costs, director Karen Bottomley said. The University of Michigan had financed only its first year of operation, she said.

Ann Arbor has been a supportive community — a necessity for any recycling center. But Bottomley mentioned the need for a curbside system. "We are only a temporary solution," she added.

OF THE 19 RECYCLING locations in Oakland County during the early 1970s, only four remain open: Birmingham, Southfield, Oakland County and Farmington Hills.

The Southfield center, first to be completely city-run, was started in 1971 by Monica Goering. She added a glass crusher (built by a volunteer) and an electric conveyor (donated by Stroh's) before turning it over to the parks and recreation department in 1972.

Steven Marshall, Southfield's present manager, doesn't expect an increase in volume in 1980. But he says recycling "is here to stay."

The whole country is conserving. If prototype centers close, they will be replaced by another kind, perhaps at the county level, he added.

ABOUT SIX YEARS ago, Carolyn Place relegated the thriving recovery operation she started in Independence Township to Oakland County.

Located in Pontiac, the center now processes more than 400 tons a year. This is only half the volume before voters in 1976 passed the "Bottle Bill." All centers have reported similar reductions in volume.

The Farmington Hills operation is on city property and run by Earth Alive, Inc., an environmental group. The city council provided \$4,000 for paving and a storage shed.

The manager is a volunteer, but two paid workers help process nearly two tons every other week. A paper trailer has been added recently.

The writer's name is well known where recycling and the environmental movement are alive. Ms. Kourtjian is a Farmington Hills resident.

Aging causes farsighted problems of accommodation

Dear Jo: What are some of the more common eye problems in older people?

The major change in the eye with aging is that the lens begins to lose its ability to accommodate. This makes it difficult for a person to focus on things close at hand.

By the age of 45 almost everyone has lost this ability to a degree, making corrective lenses necessary for reading.

Loss of lens transparency is another age-related change. Although some loss occurs with all elderly, in certain people it progresses to the point of cloudiness

(opacity). This is called a cataract. When the cataract is significantly impairing the eyesight, vision can usually be restored through surgical removal of the opaque lens.

A serious eye disorder is glaucoma.

With glaucoma there is an increase in the pressure inside the eye. This pressure has its effect throughout the eye but is most damaging to the area where the optic nerve enters the eye. The clogging of the optic nerve results in loss of vision.

Anyone with signs or symptoms of eye

disorder such as frequent tearing, headaches or visual aberrations (changes from normal) should see an eye specialist (ophthalmologist). It is dangerous to assume that any sign or symptom is merely a result of aging and must, therefore, be endured.

County will wait for loan

The state Municipal Finance Commission will make Wayne County wait until next week before acting on the county's \$20 million borrowing request.

The county is depending on the approved loan to pay employees and suppliers through the current fiscal year, which ends Nov. 30.

According to Will Hardy, a county spokesman, the commission, which includes a representative from the offices of the state attorney general, treasurer and state superintendent of public instruction, requested the county provide more information about a plan to eliminate an estimated \$20 million county deficit this year.

The county board of commissioners has approved a plan to layoff 775 county employees, but it's doubtful whether the plan could be implemented because of union contracts and past court suits brought by separate county departments, such as the clerk and prosecutor.

According to state treasury department spokesman Donald Fichter, the Municipal Finance Commission wanted a "more definite" plan on the county's ability to eliminate not only this year's deficit but also 1979's.

The county has barely met its past two employee payrolls — for Aug. 29 and 22.

An expected \$3.4 million, state income tax revenue sharing check is expected to cover the county payroll due Friday.

The county last year was late on two payrolls in October. The state refused to allow the county to borrow \$18 million, the same amount included in this year's county budget as a deficit to cover.

Ice age returns in new exhibit

Across the street from the State Capitol, students can get a special taste of the state's history that takes them from the present back to the glacial ages.

Michigan history "comes alive" in a display at the Michigan Historical Museum's new location at 208 N. Capitol Ave. in Lansing. A chronological arrangement of photographs, artifacts and drawings takes visitors from the present back through the state's history.

The display covers the development of the automobile, the logging, pharmaceutical, furniture and breakfast food industries, the Civil War, the American Revolution, fur trappers, French voyageurs, the British, Indians and early settlers in Michigan. These are all represented by photographs and artifacts.

In a special display, students can test their ability on an early 1900s typewriter and other household items of the times.

The state has a bank of more than 30,000 artifacts; the exhibits are rotated periodically. In addition to the historical display, every half hour a slide-tape show entitled "The Promise That is Michigan" is shown in the museum's 60-seat theater.

The museum is operated by the History Division of the Department of State and is open from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from noon to 4:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Admission is free.

U-M fellowship winners

Two University of Michigan faculty members Hugh Deery, M.D., and Jesus Garcia-Sevilla, M.D., have been named the first recipients of the John C. Searle Fellowship in clinical pharmacology for their work with antibiotics and infectious disease and with mental depression.

The Searle Fellowship was established by the will of John Gideon Searle, who received a U-M degree in 1923 in pharmaceutical chemistry, and an honorary degree in 1967. The fellowship is administered by a private trust fund.

Dr. Deery will begin clinical testing of new antibiotic that he hopes will effectively treat multiple diseases caused by bacteria that have become highly resistant to commonly used antibiotics, as well as diseases caused by common bacteria.

A U-M house officer since 1979, Dr. Deery received his B.S. degree in 1971 from the University of Illinois, his M.S. in 1973 from Northern Illinois University, and his M.D. in 1977 from Rush Medical College in Chicago. Dr. Deery was a resident at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles in 1977-78.

Dr. Garcia-Sevilla, working with Dr. Charles Smith, U-M professor of pharmacology, will continue research on the effects of antidepressants, antipsychotics, and narcotic analgesics upon the central nervous system.

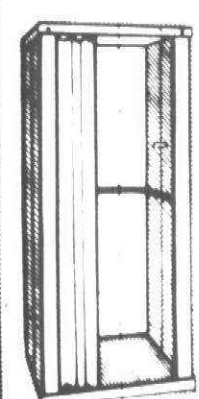
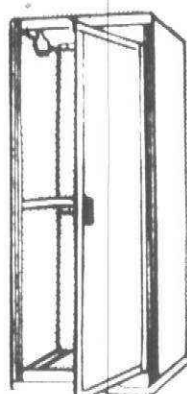
They have evidence that mental depression results from an abnormality of a receptor or sense organ in the brain which regulates other portions of the brain which mediate emotional behavior, Dr. Smith said.

Although scrimshaw artist Bill Nel-

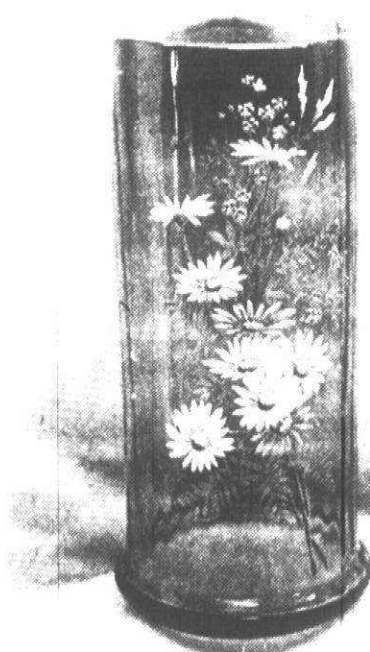
son of Dearborn will not be able to attend because of illness, he has promised to send along examples of his work.

Frances Worth will demonstrate calligraphy.

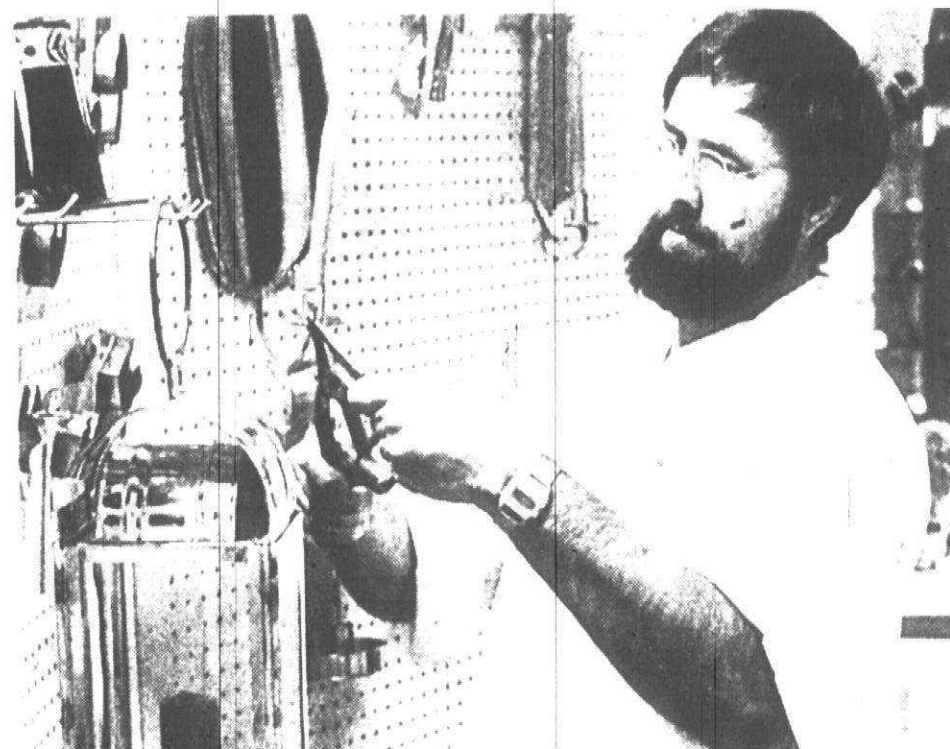

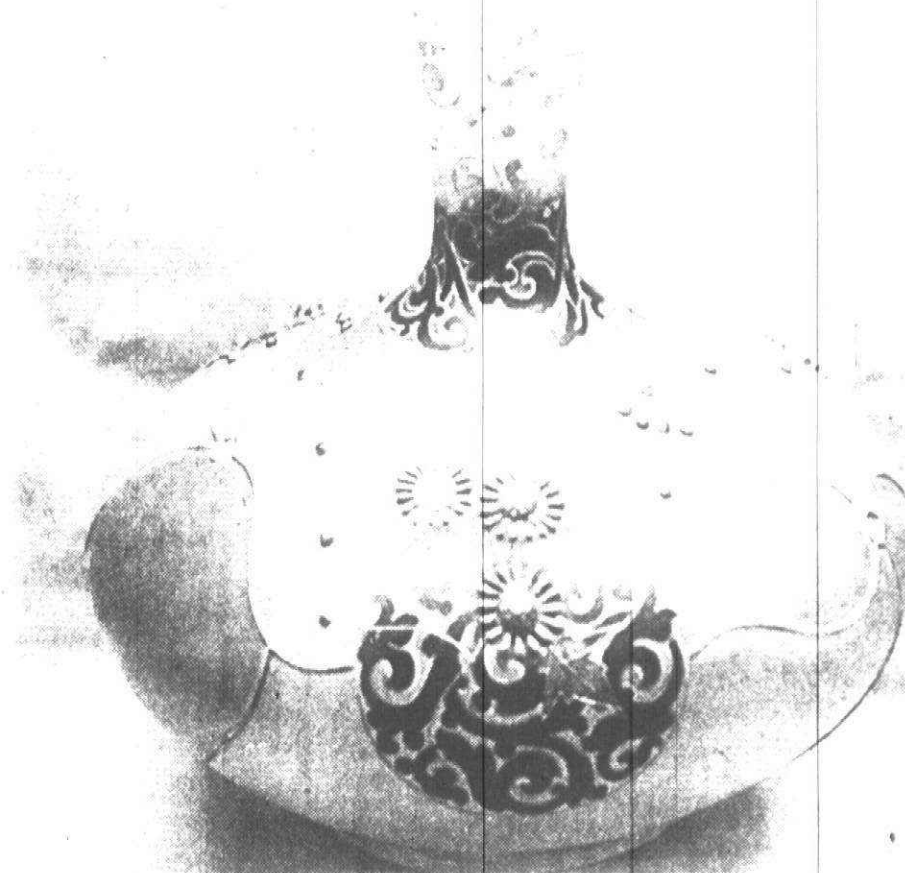

Lutherans send food to needy

Members are three Lutheran churches in this area have not forgotten the biblical words, "For I was hungry and you gave me food."

Together with other groups in the metropolitan area, they participate in a food bank program. It regularly sends non-perishable food to an inner city church, St. Andrew-Redeemer at 15th and Marquette.

This church in turn gives it to needy senior citizens and others in the area.

The three churches are Faith Lutheran, Holy Trinity Lutheran and All Saints Lutheran, all of Livonia.

"We encourage our members to keep the food bank in mind when they do their weekly shopping," said Hal Haarz. With his wife Martha, he directs the All Saints food bank.

"We advise them to make it a family thing," he noted. "Get the kids involved so they get into the habit of sharing their plenty with someone less fortunate."

Once every third month the Haarzes load up their car with 10 or 12 large bags of groceries to take to the Detroit church.

"It's a worthwhile thing," said Haarz. "We feel good about doing it."

IT IS A WAY for church members to reach out to those who need them, in the opinion of the Rev. Martin Seltz of Faith Lutheran.

"We have found there is not much contact with the needs of people in the inner city on the part of persons in Livonia and Redford Township, where most of our members live," he observed. "So we try in various ways to raise their consciousness about the needs of the city."

"One simple and visible way is to keep these needs in front of them each month."

Once a month a sign goes up to remind Faith members that the following Sunday is food bank Sunday. The food committee under the direction of Elizabeth Druckrey will have a list ready of foods most needed by St. Andrew-Redeemer. These include oatmeal or cold cereals, dry milk, soup, tuna, jello, canned juice, fruit, vegetables and meat, stews, spaghetti, spaghetti sauce, flour, rice, peanut butter and sugar.

IT WAS COOKIE Krug, who got the food bank rolling in Holy Trinity Church. The program is now run by Sandra Smith with the help of the Dorcas Circle and Harry Cebula, who makes the run to the Detroit church every third month. Mrs. Smith estimated

ed that about 110 items come to the church after each monthly request.

An appeal is made to children in the Sunday school so that they "can help children who can't afford to eat as well as they do."

"I feel this is a good program to be with," said Mrs. Smith. "We can provide assistance and see the results right away. It is mainly to help people through an emergency situation."

She has been assured that the food goes only to those who need it, that the

committee at St. Andrew-Redeemer weeds out those who may wish to take advantage of the program.

"Out in the suburbs we don't see what goes on in the inner city," she observed.

TABEA FUELLING of Dearborn Heights, a member of St. Andrew-Redeemer since 1928, is in charge of the food bank at the church. Her report to the Council of Lutheran Women indicates that 38 persons received food last

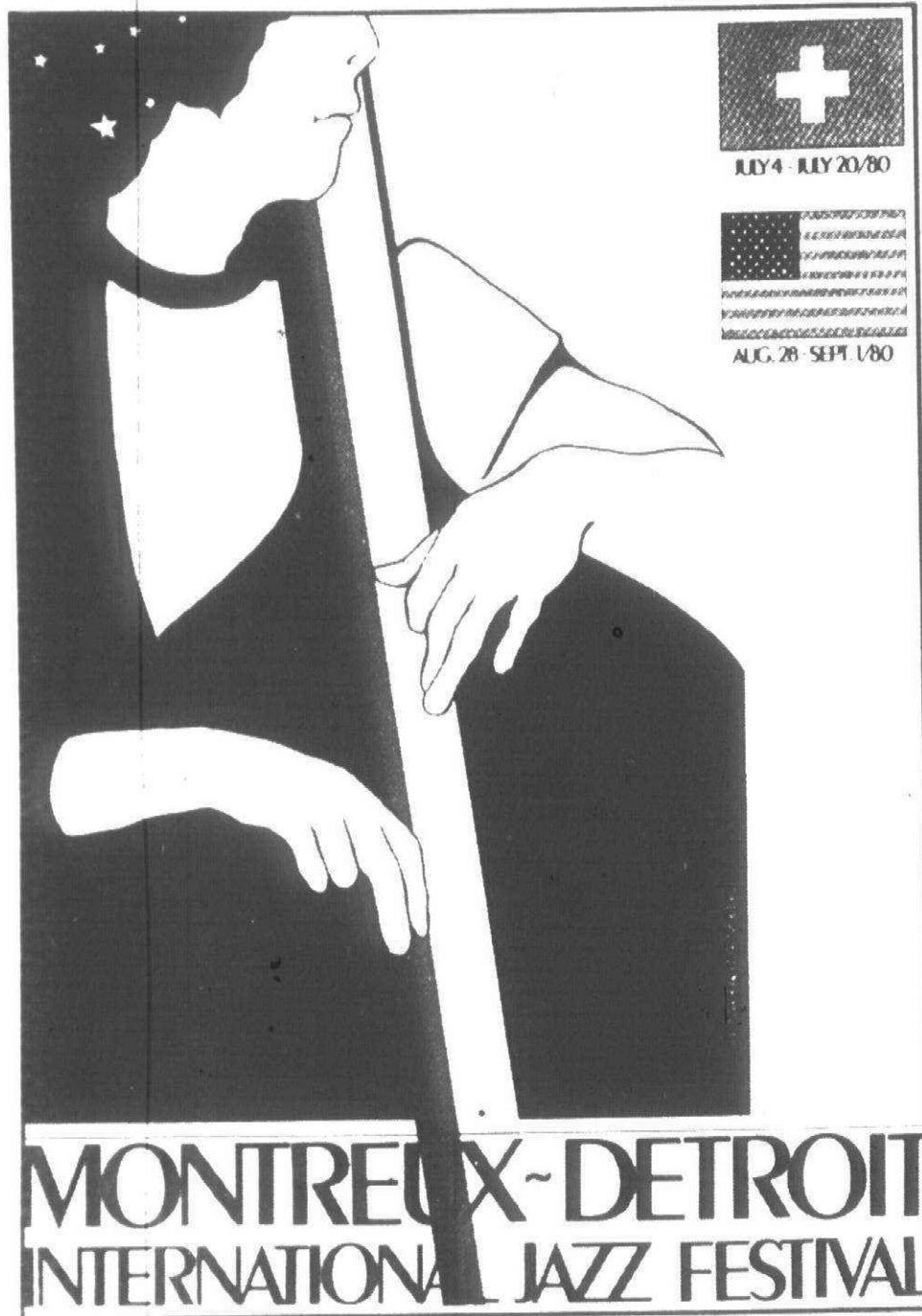

MONTREUX-DETROIT INTERNATIONAL JAZZ FESTIVAL

Detroit jazz — a star reborn

Anytime an event, cultural or otherwise, can draw several hundred thousand people to downtown Detroit, it is worthy of special note.

Despite the sub-tropical weather Michigan experienced over the Labor Day weekend, the four-day extravaganza that was Montreux-Detroit was an unqualified success.

It began in earnest Friday with what eventually totaled 40 free and eight paid-admission concerts.

One of the appealing things about the festival was the number of Detroit and Michigan musicians featured. Almost all the free concerts highlighted a Michigan band, and each paid-admission show included Detroiters playing alongside nationally and internationally recognized jazz musicians.

Jack Brokensha and a small ensemble were most impressive in a Friday afternoon set in an outdoor amphitheater concert. That night, a large band from an unexpected place (Washenaw Community College) was memorable because of unusual instrumentation and arrangements.

THE MICHIGAN STATE University band a couple of days later also appealed to a large, responsive crowd inside the Detroit Plaza Hotel.

This was a festival in which people got their money's worth. All the paid concerts ran well over three, and sometimes four, hours. At the Music Hall,

Friday-Monday nights, sets ran up to an hour and a half long.

And that leads to another plus, the variety and options presented. It was impossible, even with careful planning, to catch every concert. Fans could pick and choose, with amazingly good quality available.

The Detroit musicians looked good in their concerts. Lenore Paxton had the difficult task of opening a concert for the Heath Brothers and Ramsey Lewis on the Detroit Plaza Hotel terrace. In a quintet setting, featuring her on both electric and acoustic piano and David McMurphy on sax and lyricism, Ms. Paxton showed she is a pianist who can perform well in a jazz/rock setting. She didn't take any back seat to the popular Ramsey Lewis.

SUNDAY NIGHT at the Music Hall mixed styles with resounding success. Detroit drummer and percussionist Roy Brooks opened with his Aboriginal Percussion Choir. Brooks impressively led the 25-piece percussion choir through complex and layered rhythms based on African songs and instruments.

Classical and jazz guitarist Laurindo Almeida followed with a Brazilian-flavored 90 minutes of jazz that show-

cased both his beautifully polished style and the high-quality sound of the Music Hall.

The evening ended with Tito Puente and his band swinging their way through Latin American music. Puente's band came off like a combination of Willie Bobo and Santana, raised to about the fourth power.

The highlight of the festival, the Monday night Music Hall concert "Detroit Jams," put the whole Montreux-Detroit International Jazz Festival into perspective.

Detroit seldom got the recognition it deserved for producing extraordinary jazz musicians like Milt Jackson, Tommy Flanagan, Billy Mitchell, Barry Harris, Elvin Jones, Thad Jones, Hank Jones, Ron Carter, Kenny Burrell, Roy Brooks and dozens of others.

With a reunion concert, and with the eyes of the jazz world watching, the Detroit Jams concert was a musical way of reminding everyone that jazz and Detroit are practically synonymous.

The jam gathered together some expatriated Detroiters like tenor Billy Mitchell, guitarist Kenny Burrell and trombonist George Bohanon to swing with hometown stalwarts who came from the same era.

Expatriates and hometowners alike swung, bebop style, through some bop standards like "Now's the Time," "Night in Tunisia" and "Half Nelson." The Detroit jazz musicians perfected their craft through the jam session, and

this was an indication that the skill had been learned well.

THE HOMETOWNERS drew considerable praise from the audience. Alto sax men George Benson and Larry Nozaro and trumpeter Cass Harris seem to exemplify the best jazz being played in Detroit these days.

The problem with prayer in schools

Try to imagine a Hare Krishna devotee praying each morning before the third grade where your child attends public school.

Undoubtedly, in a few days, parents would be making a strong protest in the principal's office.

The central problem with prayer in schools is that everyone is subjected to the devotional style and theological view of one person. Basic American rights to freedom of religion fall away as one religious tradition holds forth with the blessing of government.

At the educational level, children learn to ignore religious thoughts because they have been bored by mindless prayers.

At the emotional level, many children will feel like excluded outsiders (and hence inferior) by words, phrases and styles differing from the devotional life in their family tradition.

At the sociological level, peer pressure, which is so effective with the young, will lead some children toward what they sense to be the majority, and away from their family tradition.

THE POINT of all these arguments is that in a pluralistic society, we have the right to dignity where no religious view is favored.

An even more serious issue is of concern to people considered to be the religious faithful. Prayer in school distorts the meaning of devotion. Prayer is an expression of faith and conviction, so to pretend to include greatly diverse traditions is a mockery.

Devotion is part of a specific view of the nature and relationship of the human and the divine, so to engage in generalizations cheapens it. Prayer includes commitment, so a group at prayer needs shared dedication.

Prayer is either private (so not a classroom endeavor) or the act of a faith community where language, conviction, aspirations and symbols have mutually accepted meaning.

THESE ARE ALL rather familiar, if not tired, arguments for most literate people. We have been going over these concerns almost annually since 1963 when the Supreme Court set aside the practice of prayer in school.

The fascinating question is why the subject doesn't seem settled. A discharge petition is being circulated in Congress to get the issue to the floor for vote. This time, the legislation is worded to forbid the Supreme Court to consider appeals from state courts on this issue.

The open houses are timed to coincide with the September HAP enrollment periods for General Motors, Wayne State University and state employees.

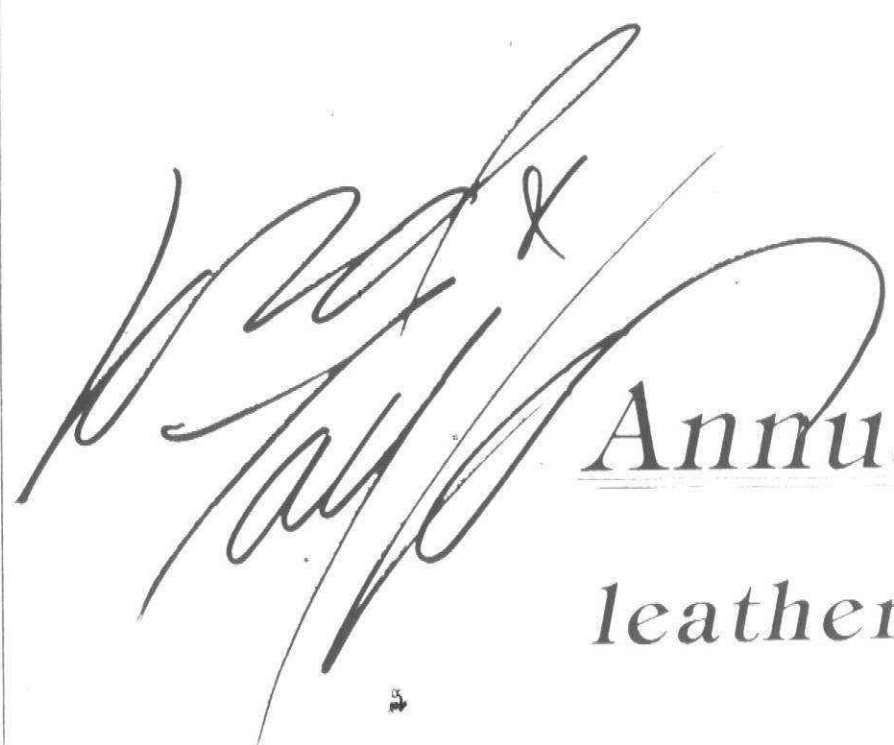
The HAP enrollment period at GM will run from Sept. 2-15. Enrollment

"I'm very optimistic about the league (championship)," said Waters. "It will be more difficult this year because Butch Recto (Waters' No. 2 man) moved away just yesterday."

This year's top returnee is senior captain Jeff Trim, who Waters thinks will be one of the finest golfers in southeastern Michigan.

"He looks tough," said Waters. "He has had an excellent summer."

Another senior returning from last year's league championship team is John Vives, who also had a fine summer, according to Waters.

All-leaguer John Paulowiet, also a senior, will play a big part in the Rocks' fight for a seventh championship in the last nine years.

Sophomore Nunzio Muarino looks good, Waters said.

Other players who could step in and contribute are junior Pete Mitroff and senior John Ukert. Waters also said that freshman Mike Moore looks "very encouraging."

"RIGHT NOW I can't project," said Waters. "But I am optimistic. I haven't seen everybody yet."

Waters foresees Trenton and Dearborn to give his Salem team it biggest battle for the championship.

The Rocks finished 11-21 last year and finished first in the regional and eighth in the state. For the last three years they have been rated in the top five by the Michigan High School Coaches Golf Association.

CANTON COACH Casey Cavell's team is so young this year.

How young is it?

The Chiefs have lost seven seniors from last year's fourth place team in the Western Six League and have but two seniors left this year.

"Could you emphasize young?" said Cavell when asked to describe his 1980 team. "Over half the people who have been trying out have been 9th- and 10th-graders. I really don't know what to say yet."

Only two spots on the team have been guaranteed, and those will be filled by the two returning seniors, Kevin Norton and Doug Moffatt.

Moffatt hasn't been playing very well, according to Cavell, but the coach says he's sure he'll come around.

Norton has been playing the way Cavell thought he should last year.

"Kevin is playing about up to his potential," Cavell said. "He is playing more with his head. He doesn't let his temper get the best of him the way it did last year."

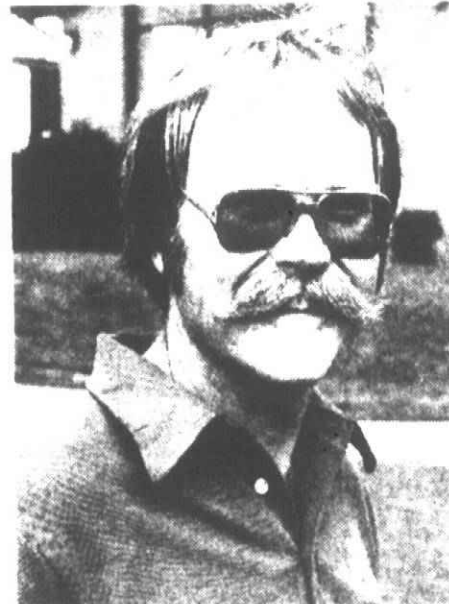
Other players who have shown potential so far have been sophomores Bill Thompson and Paul Norton, along with junior Sean McMann and freshman Dave Musch.

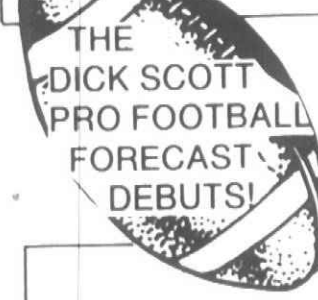

Salem netters showcase new, veteran talent

Girls' tennis is on the upswing these days at Centennial Educational Park. Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton are serious contenders once again for league titles.

Salem, coached by Judy Braun, appears to be stronger than last year's squad which won the Suburban Eight League crown and missed a regional Class A title by one point.

Canton, a second-place finisher in the Western Six League to Northville in 1979, returns a solid cast of veterans

and could challenge for its first crown under coach Cyndi Burnstein, now in her eighth season.

Braun welcomed the arrival of the nationally-ranked junior, who is in the top five in her age group for southeastern Michigan.

"The girls think it's all right," said Braun enthusiastically about Gilles. "They have no question she's No. 1. Most of the girls know Chris and have

played against her.

"It's not like having somebody new. She's new to the school, but not to the community."

Joining Gilles are three Suburban Eight League singles champions.

Carol Hathaway, a sophomore, won the league at No. 2 singles for Salem while teammate Betsy Moon, a senior, returns after placing first at No. 3 singles. Renee Braun, daughter of the coach and a senior, was the league champ at No. 4 singles.

Vickie Sterling, a senior, and Carol Gillespie, a sophomore, reached the finals for Salem at No. 1 doubles.

Hathaway, Moon, Braun, Sterling and Gillespie will jockey for the next five spots after Gilles, according to Braun.

"There's going to be a lot of switching around," Braun forecasted. "It's one big question. Carol (Gillespie) has really improved and will probably play singles."

FRESHMAN LISA MAGGIO could

also be a factor in the singles-doubles fray, said Braun.

Lynn Hathaway, a junior, and Beth Baker, a senior, who combined to win the No. 3 league doubles title in 1979, must also be considered.

Sophomore Michelle Howell, who played some at No. 3 doubles last season, will not be back because of a foot injury which may require surgery.

"We'll carry 12 on the varsity with two players for back-up," explained

JUDY GRIWICKI was the lone member of the ladies classic at Westland Bowl to better the 600 mark when she came through with games of 242 and 224 for a 620.

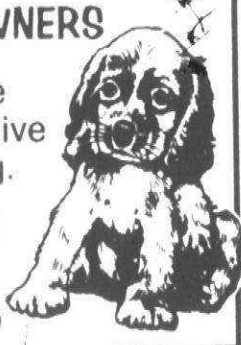

Gridders kick off season on Friday

It seemed like it only ended yesterday.

The high school football season will kick off again Friday night when the two locals — Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton — face their annual non-league tests.

Salem will host hard-hitting Livonia Franklin at 7:30 p.m. at Centennial Educational Park. The Rocks lead the series, 2-1.

Canton, meanwhile, will try to snap a 10-game losing streak at Livonia Bentley (7:30 p.m.).

Memories still linger from last year when Franklin pulled off a 12-9 upset with Salem standing on the goal line as time ran out. It turned out to be a nightmare for the Rocks, whose chances for a state Class A playoff berth were ruined.

The game will again be won in the trenches as Salem coach Tom Moshimer expects a "knockdown, drag-out affair." The two teams pride themselves on defense. Salem will go into the game with more size on the line with the likes of Marty Piper (6-foot-4, 215 pounds) and Greg Staron (6-1, 210).

Franklin, 3-6 the past two seasons, will again be stronger on the defensive side with senior linebacker Ron Lohman (6-1, 185) and junior tackle Kevin Dunbar (6-3, 215). The Patriots will line up in their familiar 4-3 defense.

Offensively, Salem returns a strong backfield with veterans Brian Lewandowski, Dave Skone, Bob Pittaway and Darrel Bartkowiak carrying the ball.

Salem runs the triple option wishbone while Franklin will counter with a veer offense out of the I-formation.

Both teams have a similar philosophy on offense. Salem and Franklin like to keep the ball on the ground as much as possible. Don't look for footballs to fill the air.

Salem's Joe Garcia, a senior, and Scott Lovich of Franklin, will probably line up against each other at the quarterback spot.

FIRST YEAR Canton coach Richard Barr has some idea about Bentley's style of play despite a tight-lipped Bulldog pre-season camp.

"Bentley is a decent team," said Barr last week. "I don't expect them to change much from last year."

"I expect a Power-I (formation) with a flanker offensively. They'll probably go with a 5-2 defensively."

Barr has changed his defense to a 4-3 (four lineman and three linebackers). The Canton coach will also use the familiar triple option wishbone.

Bentley, 3-6 last season after going 0-9 in 1978, welcomed 10 letterwinners back. Co-captain of the Bulldogs will be Mike Schneider (6-2, 185), who earned all-Observer recognition in 1979.
