

# Officials hope Cantonites borrow books here

In 1979, Canton Township paid \$46,000 to the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth.  
James Gillig, treasurer of the Canton Library Board, expects the contribution will rise to \$54,000 by the end of this year.  
With the opening of Canton's own public library next Monday, Gillig is hoping that fewer residents will travel to Plymouth to borrow a book.  
He hopes the contribution, which is based on user statistics, will drop to nothing by 1983.  
Current statistics show that 40 percent of the patrons who use Dunning-Hough live in Canton. Another 40 per-

cent live in Plymouth Township, while only 20 percent reside in the city of Plymouth — the municipality where Dunning-Hough is located.  
According to Gillig, Canton's contribution to Dunning-Hough represents 40 percent of the library's operating budget. Municipalities typically contribute to a library's operation if 10 percent of the facility's customers reside in that community.  
Gillig said a recent attorney general's opinion appears to legally exempt communities from the obligation to contribute.  
"But as far as we're concerned, we will continue to compensate them,"

said Gillig. "It's a very strong moral obligation."  
**THE NEW CANTON** Public Library will officially open to the public next Monday with a "starter" collection of 20,000 books.  
Library officials hope to lure Canton residents from Dunning-Hough to the new, 11,000 square-foot facility on the third floor of the Canton administration building.  
Pat Thomas, head librarian at Dunning-Hough, said staffers there will encourage Canton residents to use the new facility despite the financial impact on the Plymouth library.  
She agrees with Gillig's projection

that Canton's use of Dunning-Hough will taper below 10 percent by 1983. She estimates that Plymouth Township will pay 66 percent of the library's operating cost and Plymouth 33 percent when Canton drops out of the financial picture.  
Ms. Thomas said officials in Plymouth and Plymouth Township are aware of the financial consequences of the Canton library start-up.  
"All the communities have been aware for at least the last five years that Canton would eventually establish its own library," said Ms. Thomas. "As a result, we put a lid on library operations. We're not anticipating any cut-

backs (as a result of the Canton library.)  
Ms. Thomas said Dunning-Hough has one of the highest usage rates in the Wayne-Oakland Federated Library System. But the staff is one of the smallest.  
**SHE CITED** "pressure" on the Dunning-Hough Library as a result of the population boom in Canton. The township's population has grown from 11,000 to 48,000 in the last decade.  
The library owns a children's picture book collection of 4,000 to 5,000 books, she cited as an example. But at times,

there are only 150 to 200 books on the shelves.  
"The early reading selection (for children) is sometimes even worse. In that area, it's mainly Canton pressure. There aren't that many young families in Plymouth and Plymouth Township."  
Deborah O'Connor, head librarian of the new Canton library, said the collection there includes a wide selection of children's books.  
Gillig expects residents from other communities will use the Canton facility. But he doubts that non-resident usage ever will total 10 percent — the figure at which communities kick in financial support.

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### Health staffers plan on 2nd test of well water

A Wayne County Health Department supervisor is miffed over the township's handling of recent lab tests of some homeowners' tap water.  
The official also believes those earlier tests — which showed that two homeowners on Washborn have "unsafe" drinking water — are inconclusive. Residents on that street have wells.  
Furthermore, the county health department — not the township — has authority to test water and to determine if it is safe.  
That's the contention of Michael Prybyla, a public health district supervisor for the Wayne County Health Department. His jurisdiction includes Canton Township.  
Prybyla said the health department, which was bypassed by the township on the first batch of tests, will do its own lab analysis this week.

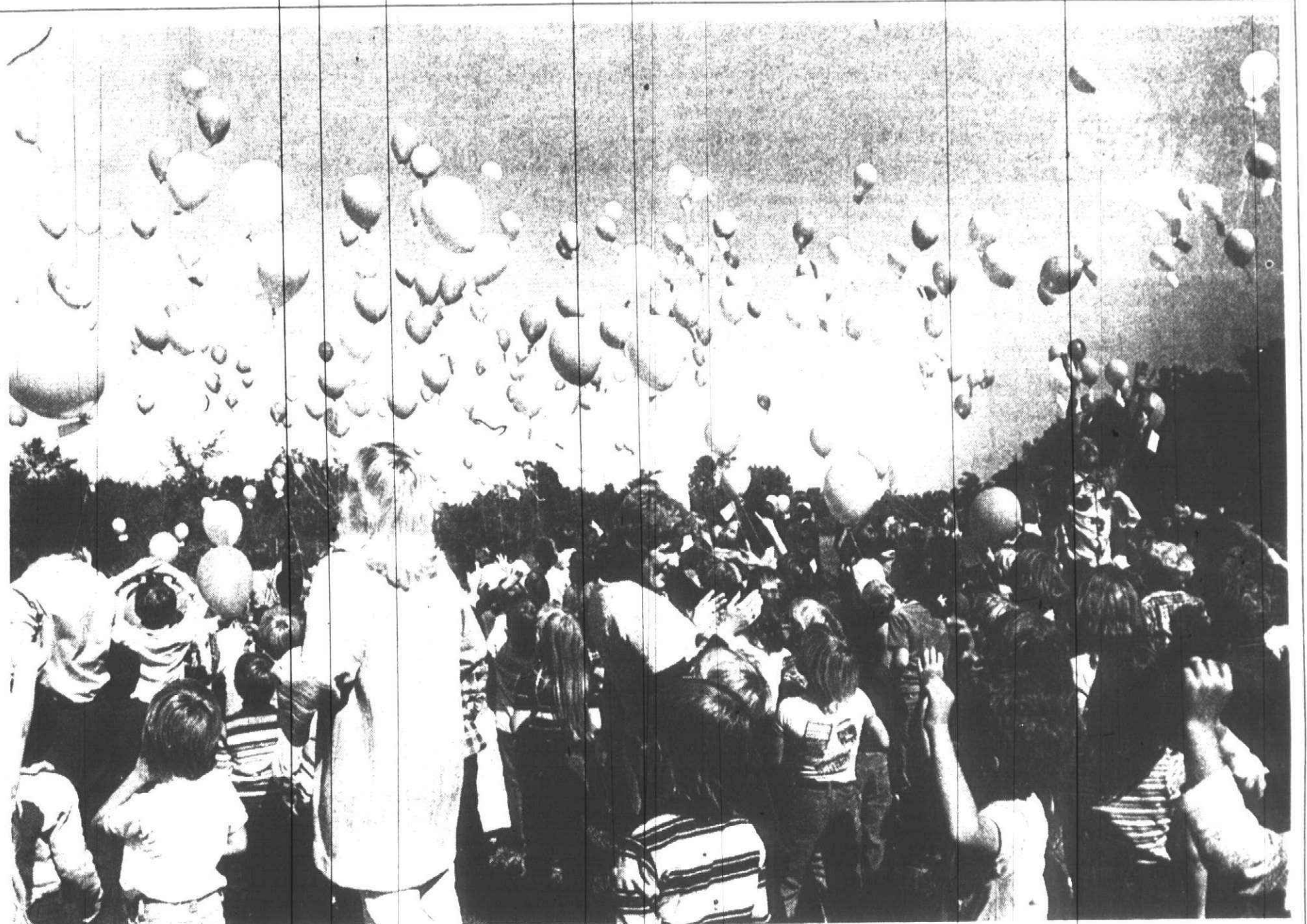
"IF THERE is any contamination, we will ask (the homeowners) to chlorinate their pump and well," said Prybyla.  
"We will send instructions on how to do it," he added. "I think we can consider it safe until proven otherwise."  
Washborn is in a sparsely-populated, 40-acre subdivision south of Michigan and east of Sheldon. The township plans, over the next three-four years, to use federal funds to buy the land parcels in the sub.  
Some 18 homeowners would be relocated, and the area turned into an industrial park. Some water and sewer lines would have to be installed.  
About two weeks ago, reports surfaced that about four homeowners on Washborn were carting water from a public tap on Geddes. They said their tap water was dark, cloudy and unpleasant.

### Schools adopt operating budget

An operating budget approaching \$40 million was approved Monday night by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.  
The budget is for the current fiscal year which ends June 30, 1981. By state law, the budget must be adopted by Nov. 1, 1980.  
With adoption out of the way, the central administration now is beginning work on the 1981-82 operating budget with a goal of final approval before July 1, 1981.  
The '80-'81 operating budget totals \$38.6 million in expenses and \$37.8 million in revenues for a deficit of \$830,000 which will be made up by reducing the fund equity of \$2.2 million

down to \$1.3 million by the end of the fiscal year.  
Ray Hoedel, administrative assistant for business, said the budget still is not a final document as the Michigan Legislature still hasn't passed the state aid bill which probably won't be approved until December or January.  
Carol Davis, board president, noted that \$2 million already has been cut from the first budget drawn up last spring and very likely the budget will have to be cut again before next June.  
"Everybody's dreams are not in here," she said, "but this is a guidepost by which we will operate during this year."

### Graduation will stay at CEP

The Class of '81 will, after all, have its graduation ceremonies held at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP).  
The graduation site was confirmed Monday night when the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education voted 7-0 to continue holding commencement at the CEP.  
The board had been asked by administrators to move graduation to an out-of-town location such as Crisler Arena in Ann Arbor, Bowen Field

House in Ypsilanti or in the Ford Auditorium, Detroit.  
The central administration had asked the CEP administrators for a recommendation after a number of parents complained last June about the cold, rainy weather accompanying Plymouth Salem High's graduation.  
**KELLY HUBERT**, speaking on behalf of the Student Council and National Honor Society at Plymouth Salem

High, urged trustees to keep ceremonies in the community.  
"Graduation is an important event that we'll remember all of our life. We hope you will decide to leave it at the Park where it belongs."  
"If we attend school here for four years, why go to another city to graduate?"  
"I feel sorry about the complaints the principals had to hear last year, but I feel people will complain no matter what is done. They'll complain if it's held outdoors and the weather's bad; they'll complain if it's held indoors and attendance is limited, and they'll complain if you move graduation out-of-town."

**KENT BUIKEMA**, principal of Plymouth Canton High, told the board that after the problem at Salem last June, Salem Principal Bill Brown and he were directed by central administration to look for an alternative to the CEP site.  
The principals merely looked at the options and made a recommendation as asked, added Buikema, who objected to being placed in a position of having the principals look like "the bad guys."  
In response to a question, Brown noted that about 4,000 persons attend graduation when its held on the football field and only 2,000 can attend if it must be held in the Salem gym.

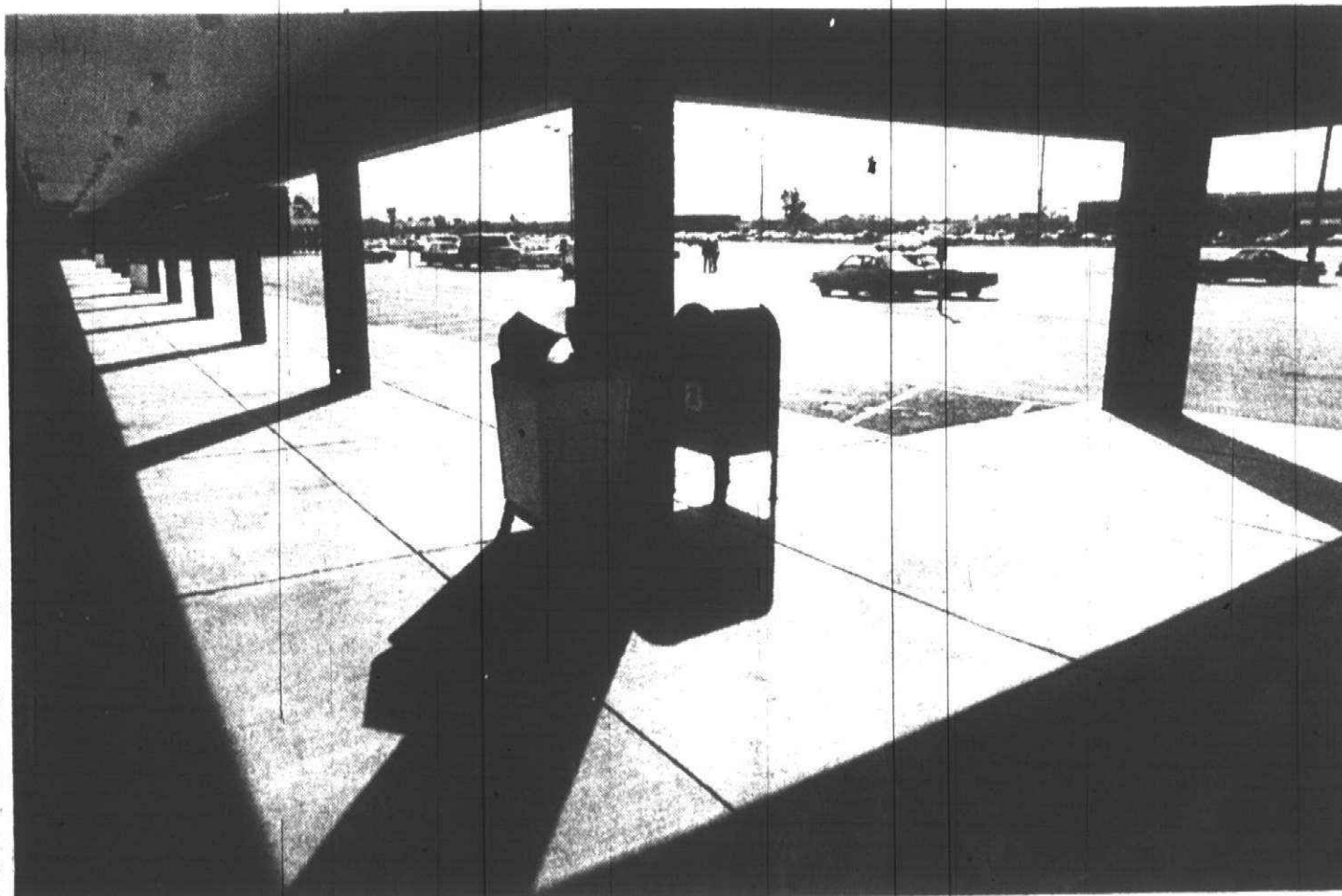
"The problem is when grandma comes up from Naples, Fla., for graduation," said Buikema. "If weather's bad and graduation is moved inside, and only two can attend, the family will have a lot of hassle deciding if the parents or grandma attend."  
During recent years, Brown added, ceremonies were held indoors only once.

### Gripes plague center

## Shop owners hope for better days

Will discontent continue to rumble among business owners at Harvard Square shopping center at Ford and Sheldon?  
Or does an aggressive new spruce-up and promotion mean brighter days are around the corner?  
Some merchants at the shopping center are complaining about a "ghost town" atmosphere as several stores stand empty.  
Others say there aren't enough retail shops to attract large numbers of buyers. A restaurant owner believes there is some unfair competition from another eatery.  
**HARVARD SQUARE** was developed around 1975 and currently is owned by Equitable Life Assurance Society of America, headquartered in New York.  
Equitable — which owns shopping centers around the country — a few months ago appointed Hayman Management Company of Southfield to oversee Harvard Square.  
The center contains suites for about 36 shops and business offices running south from Ford along Sheldon Road. The anchor store is Kroger.

# Are you in 'Red Squad' file? Watch the mail

Thousands of metropolitan area residents who believe they were the targets of illegal Michigan State Police spying during the past 30 years will soon be able to obtain their police files.

A six-year-old continuing law suit, filed on behalf of about a dozen Detroit-area consumer, civil rights, anti-Vietnam war and welfare rights activists, could lead to the release of an estimated 38,000 individual files and 400 organization files kept by a state police special investigation unit since the ear-

ly 1950s.

The unit, commonly referred to as the "Red Squad," was found unconstitutional in separate circuit court opinions in Ingham County in 1976 and Wayne County in 1977.

ATTORNEYS who won the class action lawsuit have negotiated for a year and a half with the state attorney general's office over a file release procedure, which was announced last week.

"Sometime in October," according to Pat Murphy, a spokesman for the attorney general's office, letters will be sent to those individuals whom files were kept on.

The letters will tell the person how he or she can obtain the file from the state police. In order to get the file, a request must be made. Murphy said ads will be placed in the two major Detroit daily newspapers notifying the

public of the release of the files and public service announcement time will be requested from television stations.

"The state won't charge for the files," Murphy said.

RICHARD SOBLE, co-counsel for the plaintiffs, said the state will check addresses with the latest Secretary of State's office driver's license records.

Names of informers and police offi-

cers will be deleted from the files, Soble said, as well as "any information of a highly personal nature regarding third parties."

Murphy said "information pertinent to an on-going criminal investigation" would also be deleted.

The lawsuit is continuing, Soble said, to force a similar release of the Detroit police department's political files.

Soble said the state's surveillance of political activists dates back to the 1950s while the city's dates back to "the early 1900s." He estimates the city has between 50,000 and 100,000 politi-

cal surveillance files.

Laws passed in the 1950s which created the state police red squad were repealed by the Michigan Legislature after the laws were found unconstitutional.

Soble, president of the Detroit Chapter of the National Lawyers Guild, said the Guild will assist area residents in obtaining their files. Past and present United Auto Workers members will be assisted by the union, he said.

The state's letters will include instructions on how to contact the Guild and UAW for assistance.

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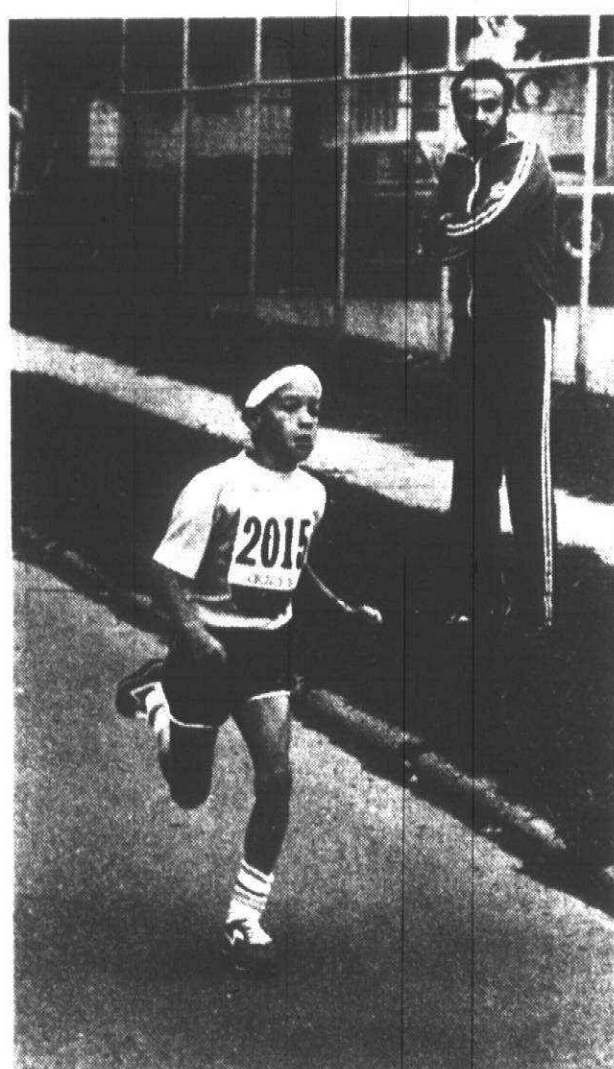

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# Managers plan to perk up shopping center

Currently, there are at least five vacant suites, including a recently-evicted massage parlor.

"THE REASON you move into a shopping center is traffic (shoppers)," said Bob Lancaster, of the Peacock Room hair styling salon.

"That's something we don't have," added Lancaster. "People come in and are so disappointed with the shopping center."

Hazen Duclo of Harvard Books noted that there used to be a merchants' association at the center, but it folded.

"Everybody has left," said Duclo. "The auto parts store wanted more space. The camera store turned over a couple of times."

Duclo and Lancaster said merchants often had to wait long periods of time for building or parking lot repairs.

Roy Brock, manager of Flowers by Margie Rae, said his business has remained about the same since he moved in a little more than a year ago. He said most of his business comes from telephone inquiries, rather than from the shopping center.

"HALF OF the store fronts are empty," added Brock. "It looks like a ghost town."

Employees of two stores — a sporting goods business and a gift shop — expressed optimism that business will

pick up as the Christmas season approaches.

Merchants praised the efforts of Hayman Management, which has spearheaded improvements including a new shopping center sign (one had been missing for months), lighting and landscaping and daily cleanup of the parking lot.

Rayman also is promoting the center by splitting advertising costs with the merchants. Next Tuesday, Detroit Lions punter Ed Murray will visit Harvard Square from 6-8 p.m.

"We're attempting to rent the vacant space," added Alan Hayman of the management company. "We (want) a desirable tenant mix so that people will come to the center and will be able to spend hours and visit a variety of stores."

Herman Ahrens, co-owner with his wife Dorothy of Cambridge Furniture, said the advertising campaign already is starting to pay off.

Ahrens said he achieved an advertising cost of three percent of sales on a recent ad. A general rule of thumb is five percent, said Ahrens.

"UNFORTUNATELY, we have had some people who couldn't weather the economy," said Ahrens. "Really, I hope you don't put anything in that's negative about the center."

While those improvements are continuing, still unresolved is the unhappi-

ness of Steve Stylianou, owner of the Cyprus Gardens restaurant at Harvard Square.

Stylianou says he has been hurt by competition from a cafeteria located in the adjacent Kroger store. The Kroger restaurant opened about a year ago.

Stylianou, who opened Cyprus Gardens in 1976, said his lease stipulates that there be no other "family-type" restaurants in the shopping center.

Since then, the Kroger cafeteria and a separate, restaurant-ple shop on the southern end of the shopping center were built.

Stylianou said he has been most hurt by the Kroger cafeteria. He said his full-service restaurant can't compete with the Kroger prices on carryouts and certain meals.

"WE MADE a special agreement — no other family restaurant in the shop-

ping center," said Stylianou. "There was a clause in the lease. I was getting most of my business from the cashiers."

"They would come in for breakfast or lunch or carry-outs," he added. "We don't have anything against Kroger."

Stylianou said his business has suffered, in spite of special prices, buffet dinners and giveaways. He also said civic groups and clubs — which use his banquet room — have been supportive.

The restaurateur and his attorney, Joseph Dillon of Plymouth, have been negotiating for about a year with Equitable. Stylianou said a solution might be to force-Kroger to dismantle its restaurant.

Other options include a lower rent for Cyprus Gardens or monetary "damages."

Two spokesmen for Kroger said they were unaware of any possible legal problem involving the restaurant.

## Health officials to test water

CANTON'S ordinance officers subsequently took samples from the faucets of two homeowners to the Canton Analytical Laboratory, located in Pittsfield Township near Ypsilanti.

The lab test showed an excessive amount of chloride and organic carbons. There also was a trace of nitrate and coliform bacteria.

Chloride often is associated with road salts, while organic carbons could include a variety of substances, including dissolved gases. Nitrate is found in

fertilizers, while coliform bacteria is associated with well-water contamination. Prybyla explained that accuracy depends on following specific procedures and storing the water sample in a sterile container. Otherwise, "there could be variables," according to Prybyla.

The health department official also said he was "disturbed" because township officials selected an independent laboratory to do the test. The department regularly uses a lab in Garden City which has been checked and approved by the state.

"I don't know what their motive is — I'm baffled," said Prybyla. "They didn't want us to get involved in the first place. We could have had (the test) it taken for free."

Supervisor Noel Culbert said he didn't call the department of health for the test because it takes "weeks and weeks" to obtain the results.

"At least we have an indication," said Culbert. "It was in response to concerns from residents."

Culbert pointed out that there are several landfills in that vicinity. He said he was concerned about possible

leakage of toxic material from those dumps into the groundwater.

BUT PRYBYLA said he could have test results on the bacteria in 24 hours and on chemicals in a week.

Prybyla said he doesn't think the adjacent landfills are a factor in this case.

He said studies indicate that water flows in a southeasterly direction in that vicinity. That means the water would pass through the Washborn area before it hits the landfill, said Prybyla.

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# Woman reunited with natural mom after long search

It was a long and frustrating 33 years for Beverly Acosta, but her determination has paid off.

Mrs. Acosta, 51, has been looking for her natural mother since she was 18. Her dream has now come true.

Mrs. Acosta recently flew to Orlando, Fla., to meet her natural mother, Mary McEachern, Saturday. It was the first time the two have seen each other since Mrs. McEachern gave her daughter up for adoption 51 years ago.

"I didn't learn I was adopted until after my adopted mother died in 1947," said Mrs. Acosta, of Garden City. "Since then I haven't given up in my search."

Her adopted father died in 1955.

"I can't believe it's true," Mrs. Acosta said. "It all came about in such a strange way."

"I LEARNED my mother has been looking for me too. She was forced to give me up for adoption since she was only 16 and unwed," Mrs. Acosta said.

Mrs. Acosta said she had made hundreds of telephone calls, written numerous letters, talked to dozens of people in her search.

One problem was that she was given an inaccurate spelling of her original family name.

She had been told her family name was Olson when it was really was Holson.

"This threw me off for some time. But then one day I went to the family minister who told me I had been adopted from the Luthern Children's Home in Bay City."

This led her to Standish, Mich., where she looked through family records, telephone books, utility company records and the church directory in an unsuccessful attempt to find the Holson name.

"I gave up for a while."

SEVERAL YEARS later, "I was watching a television show about adoption and children trying to find their parents. This inspired me to resume my search," she said.

"I decided to call the information operator in Sterling, near Standish to see if I could learn anything there. The op-

erator checked the phone books for that area. She told me there had been a Holson listed there but the phone was no longer in use. I learned it had been my grandmother."

"The operator called the volunteer fire department in Sterling. This was my first break."

The lady at the fire department Mrs. Acosta there was a Holson who had moved to Florida. The lady then contacted Mrs. Acosta's stepfather in Florida. He called a relative in Detroit — Mrs. Donald Champagne who was Mrs. McEachern's sister, thus Mrs. Acosta's aunt.

"My aunt called me wanting to know what I wanted. Of course, she didn't know for certain who I was. She asked me several questions about the family and I had all the answers. She told me how to contact my mother in Orlando."

BECAUSE OF the nature of the calls all the parties moved cautiously and it was six months between the time Mrs. Acosta called Sterling and the time that the aunt called her back.

Finally, the aunt gave her the telephone of her natural mother.

"When my mother answered the phone in Orlando and I told her who I was, there was dead silence. My stepfather came on the phone and asked me to wait a minute to allow my mother to recover from the shock. It was wonderful. Before long we were talking as though we had been together all our lives."

She said her mother had never seen her and was originally told her baby had been stillborn.

"Later, when she learned I was alive, she wanted to keep me but my grandfather decided I should be adopted."

"My mother said she had been attempting to locate me since she was 18 years old."

MRS. ACOSTA said she invited her aunt and uncle to her house where she, her husband, Fernando, their six children and five grandchildren, had a Thanksgiving dinner "with a turkey and all the trimmings."

"My family is thrilled that I've found my mother. They all knew I had been adopted and that I had spent so much time looking for her."

# New radio network hikes cops' efficiency

Five communities, including Canton, are joining together in a central police dispatch system.

Police officers are being trained on new radio equipment which is expected to free up manpower and speed service, according to Canton Police Chief Jerry Cox.

Participating in the system are Van Buren, Sumpter, Huron and Canton townships, and the city of Belleville.

Of those five, only Canton has a full-time, 24-hour-a-day police department. The other communities are assisted by the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

"THE ADVANTAGE is saving of manpower," explained Cox. "Each community saves manpower."

"Each community will continue to use its own local police department number and will be dispatched from that center," added Cox. "All (five communities) will be on the same radio

frequency and we can provide more efficient service."

Cox said there are no plans for cross-community police patrols.

The main dispatching area will be located in Belleville. A similar backup system will be in the Canton police station, according to Cox.

According to Cox, equipment for the system was purchased with a \$108,000 grant through a state-administered criminal justice program.

The funds come from the federal and state governments, said Cox. The five communities filed a joint application in 1977, one year before Canton formed a full-time police department.

"The advantages (of the plan) were much greater than they are today," conceded Cox. "(But) we stand to gain 80 percent of one person's time (for other duties)."

# Board approves budget

Flossie Tonda, trustee, commented that although the total taxbase is increasing in the school district the schools are not receiving that much more income because as state equalized valuation (SEV) rises there is a corresponding decrease in state aid payments.

The current budget shows an actual decline from '79-'80 in state aid per pupil, Hoedel said.

The result is that while local revenues are increasing by \$5 million or 20.6 percent payments from the state is dropping by 30 percent.

Of the \$4 million increase in expenses over '79-'80, Hoedel said, about 69 percent, or \$2.8 million, is for negotiated wage increases and 10 percent, or \$411,000, is for increases in employee fringe benefits.

Major capital items budgeted for include \$328,500 for replacement of buses, \$114,000 for replacing typewriters at the high schools, \$300,000 for roof repair and replacement.

The district's taxbase (SEV) totals some \$835 million with about 46 percent generated by Canton, 35 percent by Plymouth Township, and 14 percent by the city of Plymouth.

For '80-'81 the district will levy a total of 38.38 mills compared to 38.9 mills levied in '79-'80. The difference is a reduction of six-tenths of a mill for debt retirement.

Of the districts total funds, some 81 percent comes from local sources and 16 percent from the state. Last year the district almost 26 percent of its income from the state and 71 percent from local sources.

mendation came to the board to move graduation. "I'm delighted it's been done because it flushes out what is involved in moving graduation elsewhere."

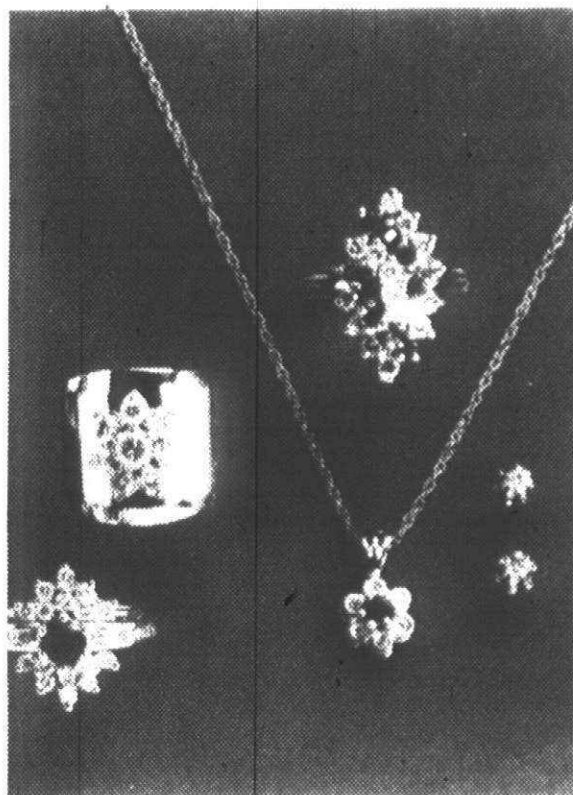

# Officials hope residents will sample new library

Canton residents are paying one mill (\$1 per \$1,000 assessed property valuation) in support of the library. Voters approved a levy of up to one mill in May 1979.

Gillig suspects that the rate will be cut below one mill in 1984 — as long as the Tisch Amendment is not passed.

"Obviously, the first two or three years we'll need the full millage," said Gillig in reference to the library's start-up costs.

THE LIBRARY BOARD already has spent about \$300,000 for equipment, books and the remodeling of Township Hall's third floor.

Gillig said that amount covers almost all the capital expenditures needed by the new library. He

plans to allocate about \$25,000 to \$30,000 in the library's 1981 budget for the purchase of additional audio-visual equipment.

The library board also hopes to expand the book collection to 55,000 during the next few years.

This year, the library board borrowed about \$155,000 in tax anticipation notes to supplement the \$322,000 raised by one mill. The loan, which carries an 8 percent interest rate, must be repaid in one year.

Gillig anticipates borrowing another \$121,000 next year and investing money not immediately needed in high-interest-bearing time certificates.

"We felt we'd rather borrow early and get everything in the library in order to make it a tip-top institution," he said.

## Task force sets hearing

A new Canton task force on business-related problems has scheduled its first public hearing Nov. 13 in an effort to gather information about the troubled economy.

Mary Perna, a member of the seven-person agency, said comments from the business community and residents will be welcomed at the hearing to be held in Township Hall.

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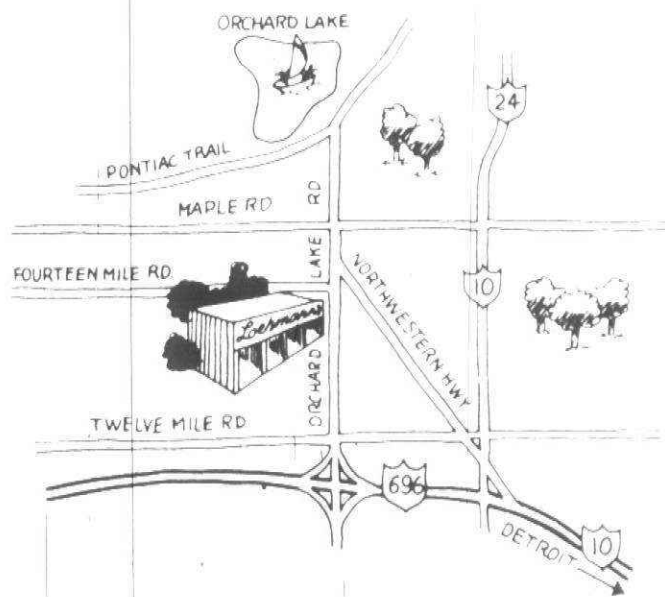
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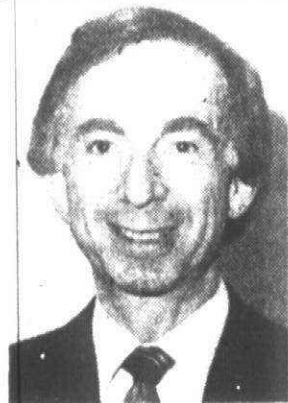

**WHY A "TEMPORARY" FILLING?**

Have you ever had your dentist tell you he was using a "temporary filling" and wondered why? No, my friend, it is not a ploy so he can get a second crack at you. This is a perfectly proper dental procedure.

It is referred to as "indirect capping", and is used in cases where the nerve (or pulp) would be exposed if all the decay were removed from the cavity. Regarded as a conservative treatment, the application of medicated cement in the temporary filling helps the pulp of the tooth to repair itself by containing the decay and allowing the buildup of a wall of tooth structure between the pulp and the decayed material.

This is a "holding action". When your dentist removes the temporary filling, he may take an X-ray to determine if the pulp has healed. If so, the balance of the decay is removed, and a permanent restoration, or filling, can be placed in the tooth.

In summary, your dentist is trying to keep your tooth alive, avoiding the need for a root-canal filling, pulp capping, or extraction of the tooth.

# SEMTA mechanics ratify wage pact

SEMTA buses were expected back on the streets today as 160 maintenance workers agreed Wednesday to a three-year contract.

Details of the settlement were not available at press time late Wednesday afternoon.

The mechanics represented by UAW Local 417 voted 110-21 to accept the contract. They had previously rejected two offers by the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority.

Before the new contract, the average maintenance worker earned \$9.17 per hour, according to a SEMTA representative.

The strike idled 320 major line buses in the metropolitan area and forced about 45,000 daily riders to find other transportation.

MEANWHILE, SOME SEMTA small bus service in Wayne and Oakland counties remained idled by a strike by more than 100 drivers and reservation

clerks, represented by Teamsters Local 247.

The strike, which began Oct. 3, has halted service for an estimated 1,200 daily users of the Wayne and Oakland

County Advance Reservation Transit System.

Dial-A-Ride service has not been effected by the strike. The Nankin Transportation Commission which serves several western Wayne County com-

munities is also not effected by the strike.

A meeting today was scheduled with a federal mediator in the strike by drivers and clerks. The strike is against Transit Management Inc., a private firm which operates the small bus service under a SEMTA contract.

IN THE SMALL bus strike, both Teamsters and Transit Management representatives agreed Tuesday they were far apart on wages.

The drivers are now paid \$4.05 an hour and work a 47-hour week, according to Ron Barnes, general manager of Transit Management of Wayne and Oakland County.

The company — which also operates small bus systems in Minnesota, Pennsylvania and Arizona — took over the small bus operation July 1.

Thursday's meeting was the first between both sides since the strike began two weeks ago.

## Cops probe break-in of Canton pharmacy

Canton Township police are investigating a break-in and robbery early Tuesday at the King's Row Pharmacy at Lilley and Warren.

Police Lt. Larry Stewart said the theft, which occurred about 4:55 a.m. Tuesday, netted several bottles of sedatives and pain-killers, 10 watches, a set of stereo speakers

and a large supply of condoms.

Stewart estimated the loss at \$500-\$600. He said investigation showed the thieves had entered the store through a heat vent in the roof.

The alarm was triggered when they escaped through a back door, said Stewart.

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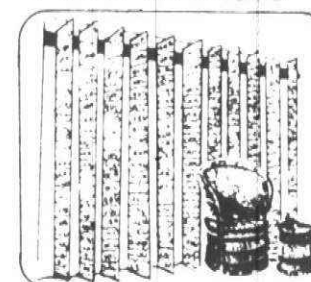
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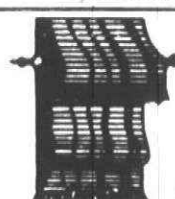
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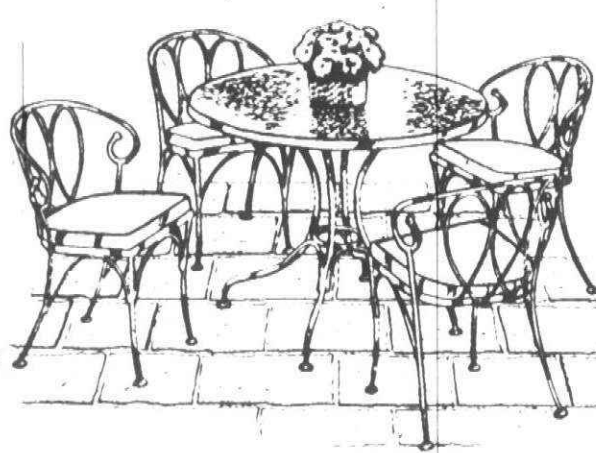
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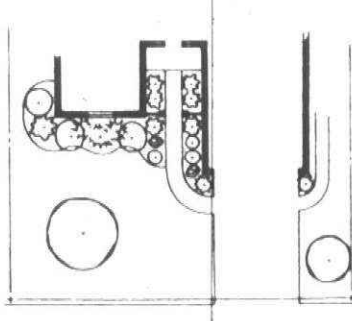
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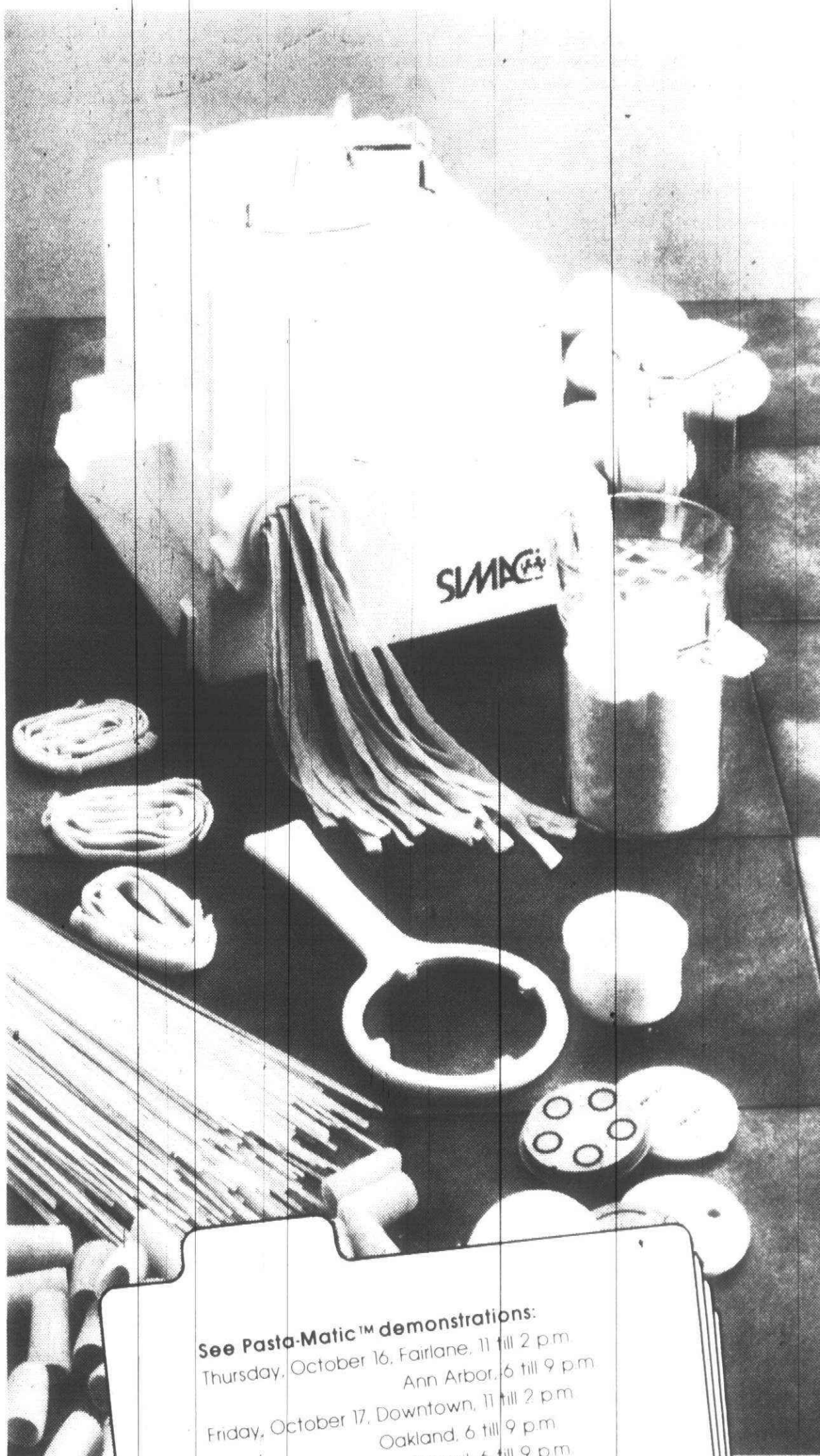
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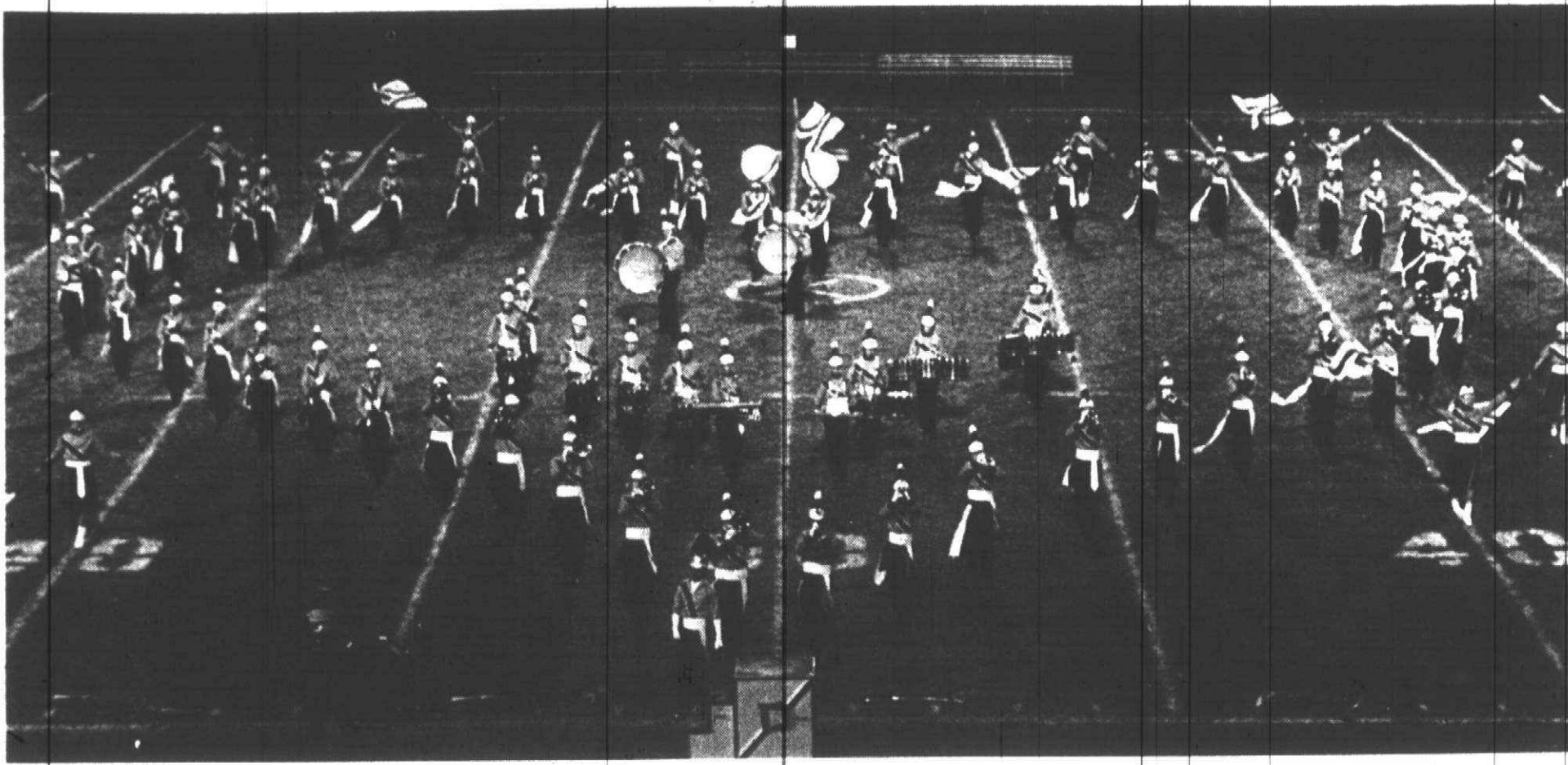

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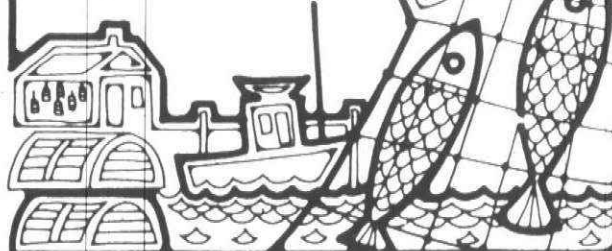
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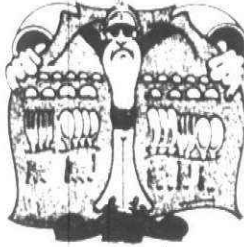
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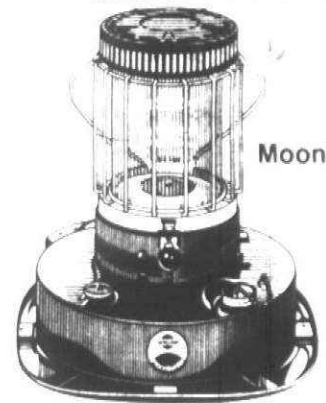
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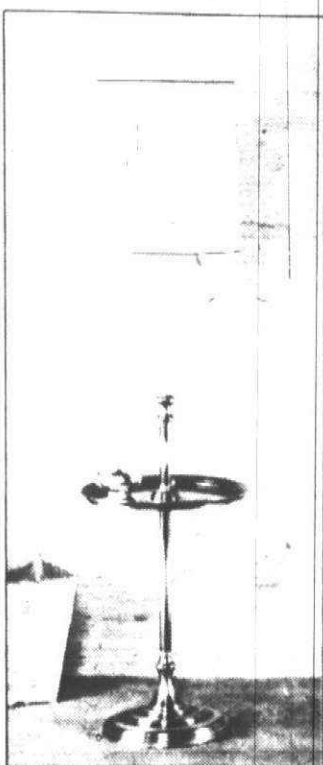
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# Official explains Smith-Bullard tax shift plan

Michigan voters will go to the polls in November to decide on three new tax proposals or to retain the present tax system.

Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service staff members have been studying the proposals. Lynn R. Harvey, district Extension agent in public policy, explains Proposal A, the Smith-Bullard School Financing Tax Shift.

PROPOSAL A is designed to change the current method of financing public elementary and secondary education. The proposal's intent is to transfer a greater share of the financing of local K-12 education to the state by placing new limits on the use of ad valorem (property) taxation for operating purposes and by moving to an equal per-student method of support.

To accomplish these goals, the amendment proposes to:

- Eliminate the current 15/50-mill limitation in the Michigan Constitution, eliminate county tax-allocation boards, and establish a new 24.5-mill limit (13 allocated plus 11.5 extra voted) on millage levied by local units of government for operational purposes.
- Establish a new fixed millage allocation for operational purposes of these various units of government.

The county would receive 7 allocated mills, 1 extra voted; townships, 2 allocated, 2 extra voted; and community colleges, 1 allocated, 1.5 extra voted. Public schools would get no allocated mills, vocational education 1 allocated, special education 1.5 allocated and intermediate school district .5 allocated. These four groups combined could receive a total of 7 extra voted mills. The current 15 allocated mills are distributed among the county, townships, intermediate school district and local K-12 district.

• Provide for a voter-approved local income tax option of up to 1 percent in lieu of all or part of the 7 mills extra voted for education (see above point).

• Permit the legislature to levy up to 30.5 mills on all taxable property, except homesteads and family-owned-and-operated farms, for the support of public elementary and secondary schools.

• Require the legislature to establish a program of general state taxation and a method of distributing funds to ensure equal per-pupil financial support for school districts' general operating purposes.

• Provide for a five-year phase-in period for a school-financing program which would ensure that, in the first year of operation, each district receives an amount from the state which, when combined with a local tax levy of 7 mills, will not be less than the amount received by the district on the effective date of the amendment. After the five-year phase-in period, no district would receive less than the amount received by the higher districts during the phase-in period.

• Provide up to a \$25,000 state-equalized value (SEV) exemption on homesteads of retired persons 65 years of age and older (indexed).

• Allow a \$140 renter's state income tax credit (indexed). The credit is provided by law.

• Exclude funds distributed to local units for 65-and-over exemption from calculation in the state spending requirement under Section 30, Article 9, of the Constitution (Headlee).

• Apply millage rollbacks required under Section 31, Article 9, to each class of property separately.

HARVEY SAYS the proposal would provide some property-tax relief for residential and agricultural property owners but would also mean an increase in some of the state taxes.

The most likely increase would occur in the personal income tax rate. He estimates the increase would range from the current 4.6-percent rate to possible 6-10 percent, depending on legislative action.

That decision would be influenced by

the possibility of the legislature's levying part or all of the 30.5-mill state levy on property other than homesteads and farms and increasing other state taxes, and by the local school district's levying the 7-mill extra voted tax or a 1 percent income tax.

"It costs about \$4 billion to finance K-12 education in the state," Harvey said. "Currently about 47 percent comes from local property taxes, another 47 percent from state aid and the balance from federal grants."

If Proposal A passes, the state would have to pick up a portion of the local share, which would amount to an additional \$1.6 billion to \$2 billion, and funnel it into the state school-aid fund."

THE EXTENSION agent predicts many K-12 schools which now have low

per-pupil support would initially receive increases in support with passage of Proposal A.

Districts with high per-pupil support could lose revenue in real income and purchasing power because of inflation and the requirement that the legislature fund minimum support levels.

Harvey says senior citizens would get a break, with the \$25,000 SEV credit. Renters would generally pay more net taxes because the increase in state taxes would probably more than offset the \$140 credit renters would receive.

The proposal's effect on business and commercial firms and industries would depend on the legislature's structuring of the 30.5-mill levy on all taxable property, excluding residential property and family-owned farms.

## EMU enrollment drops slightly

Eastern Michigan University undergraduate enrollment is up 4 percent this fall while graduate enrollment is down 12 percent.

The university's total enrollment as

of mid-September is 18,489, down about 100 students from a year ago.

The Ypsilanti-based college's final fall enrollment will be reported in early October.

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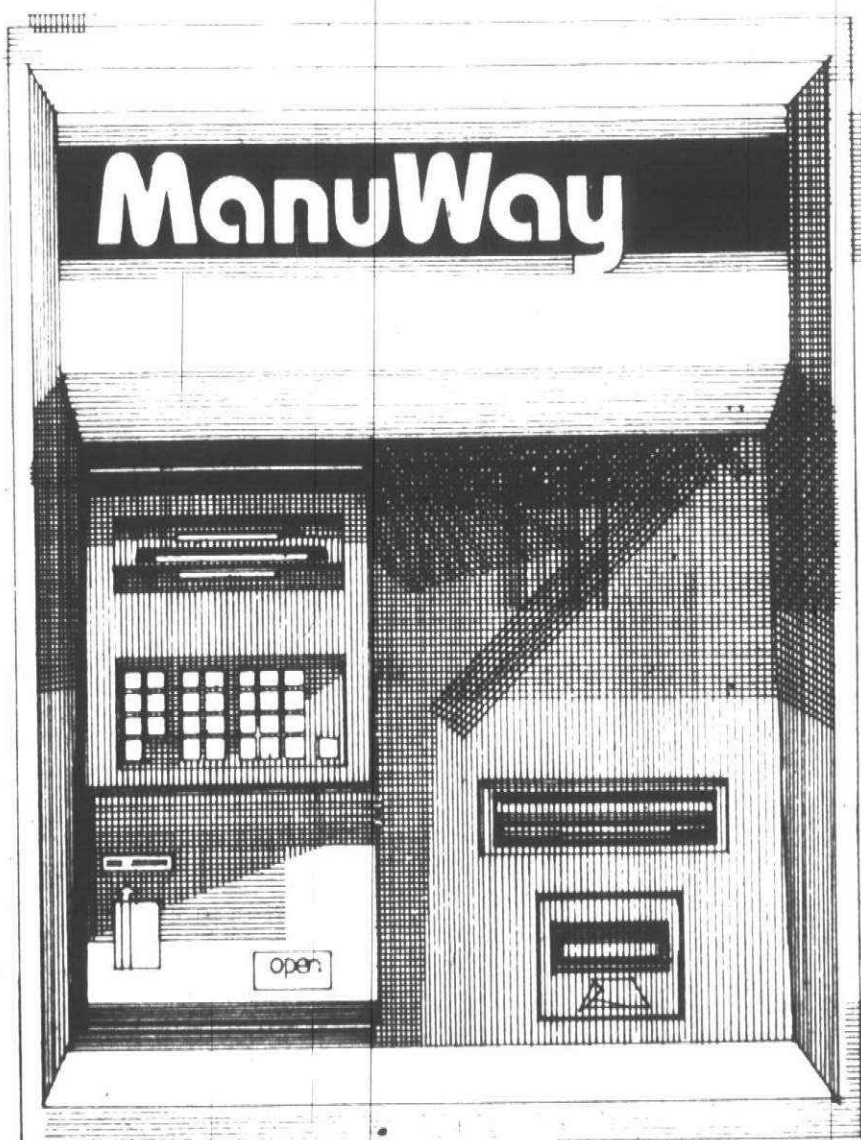

WHAT MAKES fall color? Greg Patchen of the Oakland County cooperative extension service explains:

"Cool weather slows the flow of nutrients from tree to leaf. The manufacture of green chlorophyll ceases, and other chemicals surface.

"These chemicals, carotin and xanthophyll, contain the yellow pigment.

"The more flamboyant red leaves appear only in trees containing sugar. A combination of warm days and nights cooling to below 45 is necessary to produce the red coloring. Sugar forms in the leaf during the warm day. The rapidly cooling evening temperature traps it there. It combines with other chemicals to produce the red pigment."

Now you know.

A WORKSHOP on archaeology will start at 10 a.m. Saturday at the nature center of Oakwoods Metropark near Flat Rock.

You'll learn about the history of the area in an actual dig. Site selection and proper digging techniques will be shown.

It is hoped that the referral program will help senior citizens take advantage of the various programs offered throughout the county. In addition, staff personnel will be able to direct elderly persons with problems to the agency best equipped to handle the problem.

"In the past, DCO, Redford and Romulus have concentrated on health and welfare programs such as nutrition, minor home repair and services and tax assistance for seniors," said Ms. Ross.

"Under this expansion of services, we will also be able to refer seniors to hobby and craft groups, travel opportunities, community garden plot programs and social groups, for example."

The funding also will allow all three agencies to provide more printed materials for the elderly and to do more "out-reach" work by sending staffers to senior citizen functions to answer questions and help with problems, she said.

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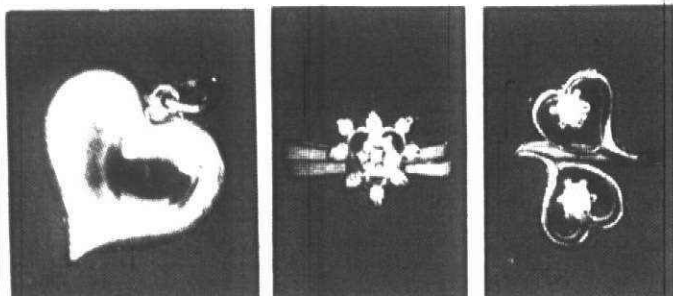

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# No hazardous waste policy until after polls close

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the days before the current recess.

## HOUSE

**HAZARDOUS WASTES** — The House rejected, 162-247, a bill to set a federal policy governing the transportation of hazardous wastes over the nation's highways. The bill has been passed by the Senate. The most disputed provision would delay for six months — until mid-1981 — Department of Transportation rules setting forth specific routes over which radioactive wastes from nuclear power plants can be transported. Most members voting against the bill wanted those rules to go into effect next January.

Rep. Geraldine Ferraro, D-N.Y., a supporter, said the DOT rules should be delayed so that the new Congress can consider the issue. She feared that without the delay her New York City constituency might be jeopardized by waste shipments.

Rep. James Broyhill, R-N.C., said "it would not be in the public interest to delay . . . these regulations which, of course, do have the purpose of increasing the safety in transporting these hazardous waste materials."

Members voting yea favored passage of the bill coupled with a six-months delay in implementing the DOT rules.

Reps. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, David Bonior, D-Mt. Clemens, James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge, voted yea.

Rep. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, voted nay.

Reps. William Ford, D-Taylor, and William Brodhead, D-Detroit, did not vote.

**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE** — By a vote of 276-117, the House adopted and sent to the Senate the conference report on a bill to help victims of domestic violence. The bill would cost \$65 million over three years. In part, it would fund shelters for battered spouses and children and underwrite counseling to curb violence in the home. Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., a supporter, said the bill "will not set up a huge federal bureaucracy" because it would funnel money through state governments and help to sustain programs already in existence.

Rep. Ken Kramer, R-Colo., an opponent, said the bill represents "a dangerous trend" of "federal involvement in areas traditionally reserved as family matters to state and local jurisdictions."

Members voting yea favored enactment of a new domestic violence program at the federal level.

Pursell, Bonior, Ford, Brodhead, Blanchard and Broomfield voted yea.

**A CONGRESSMAN EXPELLED** — The House voted, 376-30, to oust Rep. Michael Myers, D-Pa., from the Congress. Myers was convicted in August

on charges stemming from his acceptance of a \$50,000 bribe from an FBI agent posing as an Arab sheik. He became the first House member ever expelled as a result of corrupt acts.

Rep. Charles Bennett, D-Fla., a supporter of expulsion, said "the integrity of the House of Representatives is at stake, an institution which is not only important for our country but for mankind."

Myers, in his own defense, said that when a colleague votes to expel "it will have the same effect as hitting the button if I were strapped in an electric chair in this well."

Members voting yea wanted Myers thrown out of Congress.

Pursell, Sawyer, Bonior, Brodhead, Blanchard, and Broomfield voted yea.

Ford voted nay.

## SENATE

**CETA MONEY** — The Senate failed 38-42, to prevent a \$900 million cut in the fiscal 1981 Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) appropriation. The cut was coupled with increased

spending for youth employment and training. Later, on a non-record vote, the Senate softened the cut to \$550 million. The votes came during debate on HJ Res 610, an appropriations bill that later became law.

Sen. Harrison Williams, D-N.J., who voted to prevent the cut, said "this is no time to be cutting into the bone of a jobs program that is specifically intended for use as an anti-recession tool."

Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., sponsor of the cut, said the country needs "emphasis on training and upgrading of lower skilled workers, particularly the disadvantaged youth . . . We do not need more local government employees, which is what (CETA) is now providing."

Senators voting nay wanted to cut CETA outlays. Sen. Donald Riegle and Carl Levin, both Democrats, voted yea.

## What winter brings most often unwanted

The coming of cool fall weather sends many animals scurrying to find a cozy place to spend the winter. For some homeowners, this scramble for winter shelter means a host of unwelcome houseguests.

Glenn Dudderar, extension wildlife specialist at Michigan State University, says the most common animals to enter homes looking for winter shelter are squirrels, bats, rats and mice.

**AN OPENING** doesn't have to be very large for a mouse to squeeze through, he points out. Even a rat needs only a half-inch opening, and a bat can squirm through a 1 1/2-inch hole.

An opening that's letting animals into the house is also letting heated or cooled air out, he noted. To keep the animals out and to save energy, seal up those openings.

But first, he advised getting rid of those that have already entered to avoid sealing the critters inside.

Bats are probably the least critical problem but the one that most people are least likely to tolerate, simply because they tend to be afraid of bats. Bats wintering in an attic or the top of a garage won't do much damage. Their droppings and urine can make a smelly mess, however, and bats sometimes carry disease organisms.

**CONTROLLING RODENTS** in the home is a three-step process.

First, eliminate all possible food sources. This means cleaning up food spills in storage areas, placing all foods in cans or glass jars, putting pet food away as soon as the pet has eaten, cleaning plates and washing dishes immediately after meals, removing all garbage from the kitchen, and so on.

Strict sanitation is necessary for the second step to succeed, Dudderar said.

"No rat can eat people food out of the wastebasket is going to go for rat bait," he said. "But if there's nothing else for him to eat, he'll have to either leave or go after the bait."

**TWO GENERAL CLASSES** of poison baits are available — single-dose, highly toxic materials that kill the animal at once, and multiple-dose anticoagulants.

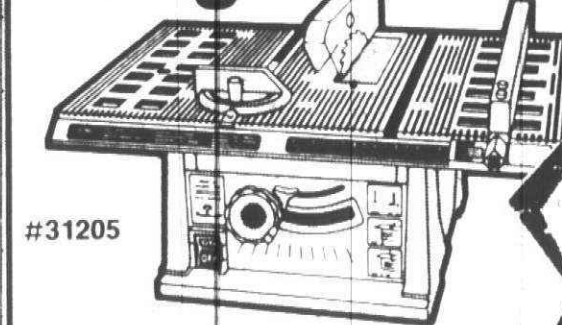
In the home, the multiple-dose poisons are the safer choice, because one accidental consumption by a human or a pet is not likely to be lethal. The single-dose poisons can kill any warm-blooded animal, including a human being, that consumes them.

The relative safety of the anticoagulant baits doesn't mean you should use them carelessly, Dudderar said. Place the baits where only the rodents can get to them — behind appliances, in the back corners of cupboards, inside cold air ducts, wherever you have reason to believe the rodents lurk or run.

Bear in mind that most dogs and cats are great scavengers. Even if well fed, they'll eat anything they come upon that strikes them as edible. Likewise, small children put anything into their mouths that will fit. So place your baits where curious explorers can't get to them.

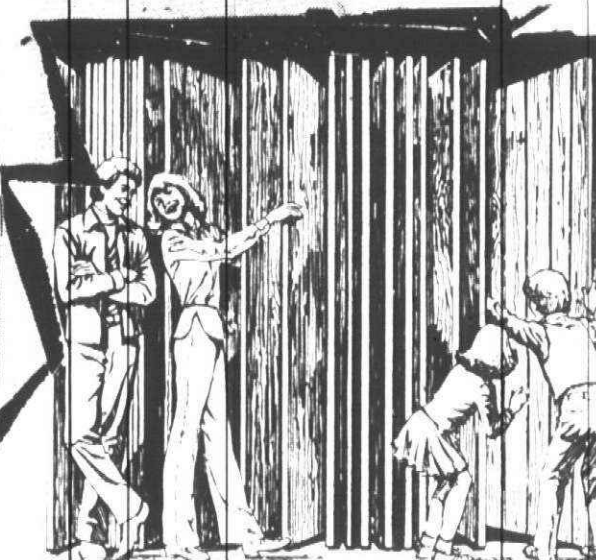
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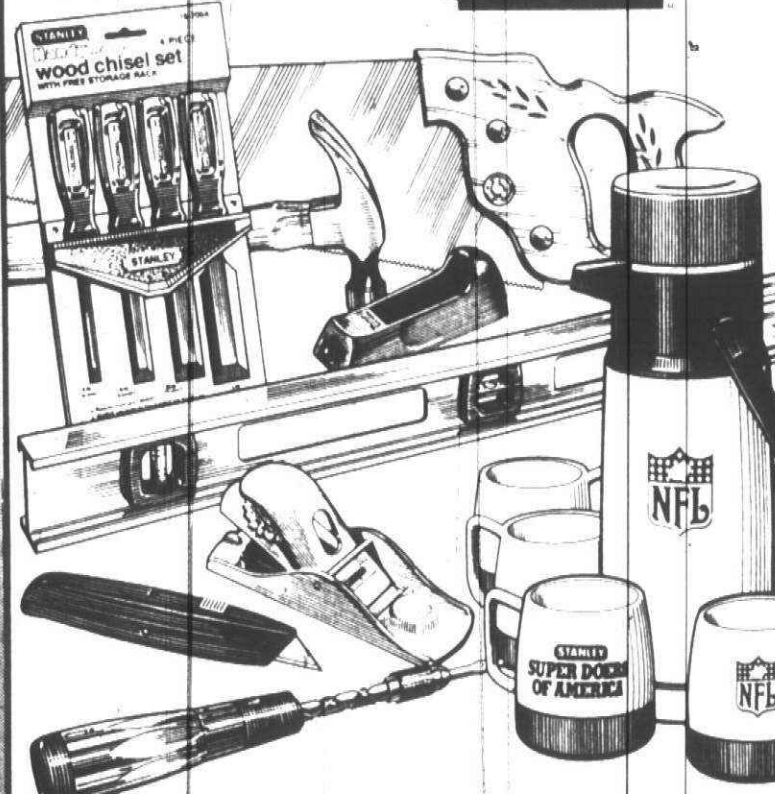
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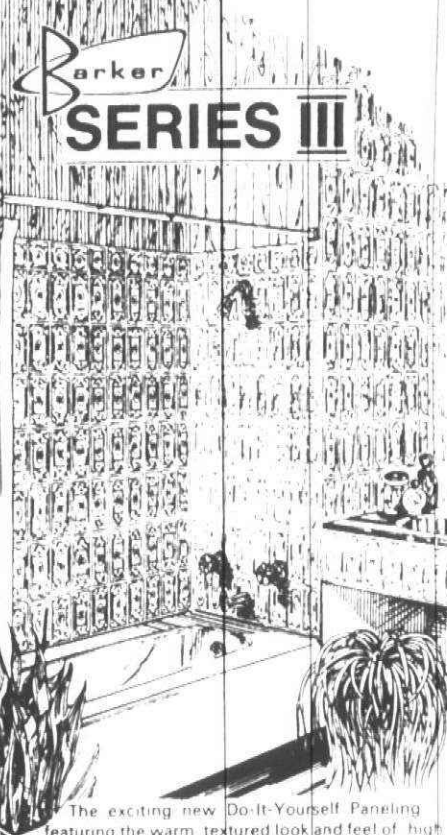
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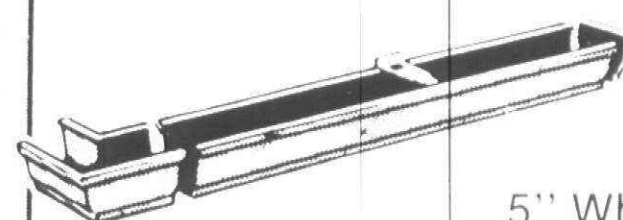
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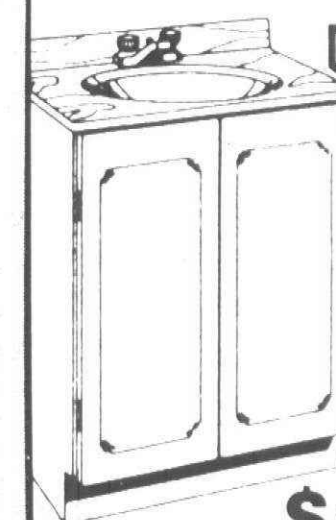

# Tisch plan would force state budget cuts

Now that the Tisch tax cut amendment to the Michigan Constitution is securely on the November ballot, state voters will be in a position to vote themselves about a 60 percent cut in property taxes.

The resulting loss in revenue to state and local governments, however, would require them to do some drastic cutting back of programs.

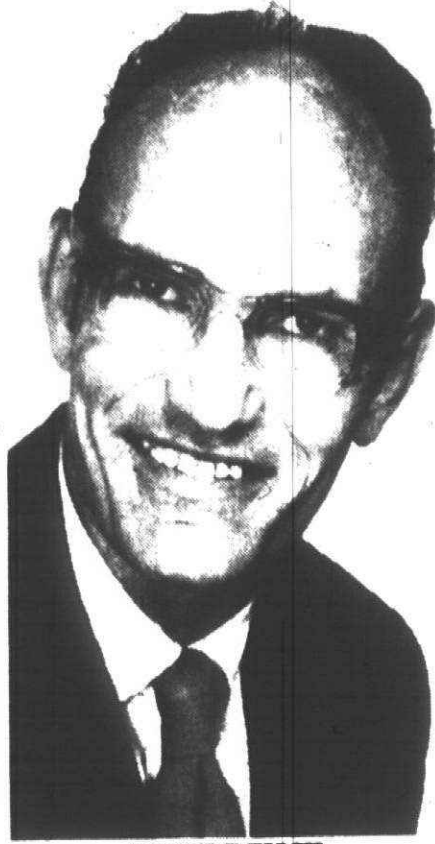
State-supported higher education would become much more expensive as colleges and universities would be forced to charge higher fees. Some public services would have to be eliminated, most human services would be cut by 50 percent.

And because of reduced deductions for state property taxes, most property owners would have to pay more federal income taxes.

ACCORDING TO Al House, Extension specialist in agricultural economics at Michigan State University, the aspect of the Tisch amendment that has caught the voter's interest is the rollback in property valuation and the resulting slashing of property taxes.

The proposed amendment would assess property taxes on 25 percent of true cash value (rather than the current 50 percent), based on 1978 valuations. On the average, this would cut property taxes by about 60 percent.

The amendment would further reduce by half the property tax liability of householders with annual taxable incomes less than \$10,500 but more than \$5,000. Householders with annual taxable income below \$5,000 would pay no property tax. And householders 62 years of age or older would be exempt

from paying the portion of property taxes that goes for school operations.

Renters would not be directly benefited by the general cut in the valuation, but he proposed amendment would require the Michigan Legislature to provide "comparable relief" to renters with incomes less than \$10,500, and to renters age 62 or older.

TO EASE the burden on schools and local governmental units, the state would be required by the Tisch amendment to appropriate amounts equal to the tax revenue lost because of tax re-

lief for low-income and elderly householders. The reduced yields of the property tax after all cuts would be matched by the state.

The state would also be required to assist local school districts through the state aid formula in effect for fiscal year 1980-81. Schools would not lose much the first year, but under the limitations of the Tisch proposal, they could not expect revenue increases to match cost increase in subsequent years.

House predicts that state appropriations to institutions of higher education and funding for social services — including welfare, income programs, mental and public health and Medicaid — would be cut deeply to make up these

payouts to school districts and local governments.

BECAUSE OF the rollback in property tax assessments to 1978 levels, however, local governments would still end up with a net loss in revenues, House points out.

Combined property tax revenues and state replacement revenues would be about 10 percent lower than the property tax without Tisch cuts.

Constraining local governments from inventing new taxes or increasing existing ones to make up for these losses is the Headlee amendment. Passed in 1978, it requires local governments to get the approval of a majority of voters on new taxes or increases in existing ones.

This, combined with the broad definition of "tax" under the Tisch proposal, would require votes on fees and assessments, which might be used to replace the property tax.

Like local governments, the state legislature would be prohibited from imposing any new tax or increasing the rate of any tax in effect in 1978 without getting the approval of voters, in this case, a 60 percent majority.

THE TIME-HONORED tactic of increasing property tax revenues by raising the assessed value of property would be halted by a Tisch provision that limits to 2 percent the annual increase in assessed value of residential and agricultural property.

House explains that the 2 percent increase would be figured on the basis of classes of property and state average valuations. Some areas of the state, such as Detroit would actually lose tax base.

"After a few years under the provisions of the Tisch amendment, property taxes on homes and farms in real dollars would be essentially repealed, presuming inflation continues," House says.

"Personal income tax and a business taxes would have to carry the whole load. This wouldn't make the state very attractive to new business and industry, and it would put an unproportionately heavy burden on certain economic sectors.

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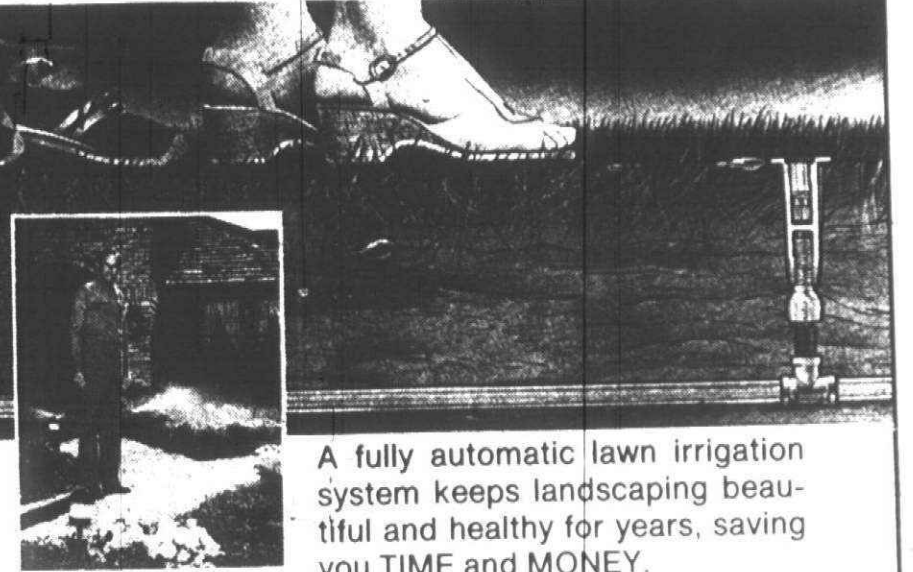
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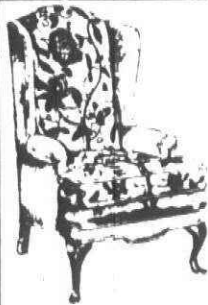
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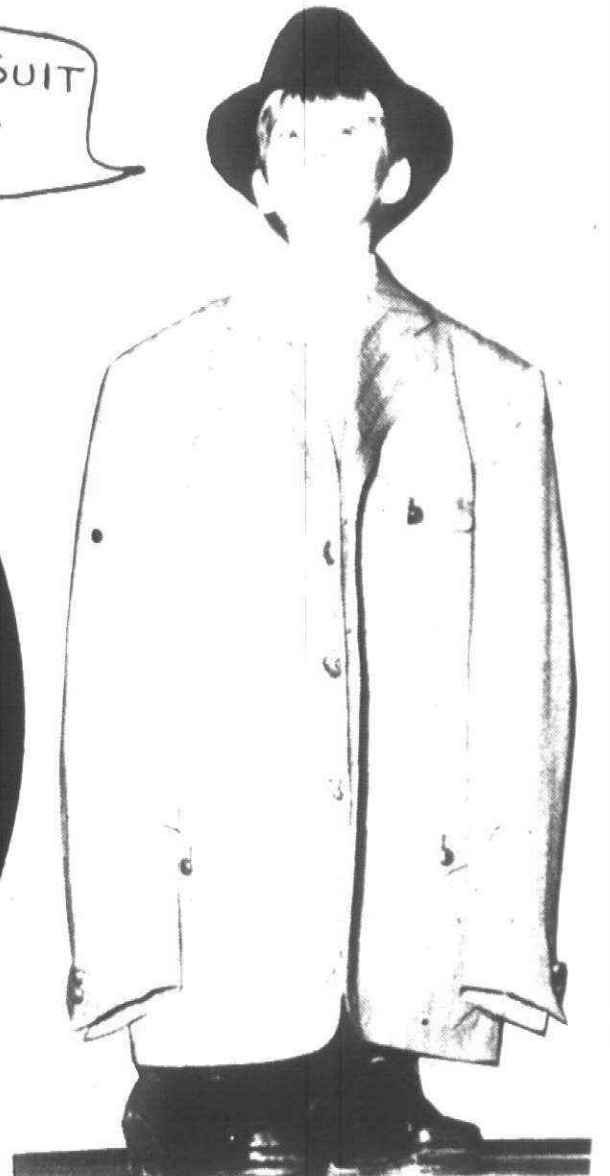

# Quarrel over lunch grant leaves a bad taste

The hot lunch program for out-Wayne County senior citizens has bureaucrats lining up allies in a skirmish which has all the makings of a political fiasco.

At stake are more than \$1 million, jobs, more than 500,000 hot meals annually for elderly residents — and public trust.

Two county groups are vying for the funds to provide meals for senior citizens downriver and in western Wayne County.

One is the Out-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging, which Canton and Plymouth joined last spring under the leadership of Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara. The other is the Wayne County Area Agency on Aging, headed by Dante DiVitto.

The out-county group includes 34 suburbs. The communities formed the group because of long-simmering dissatisfaction with DiVitto's group and its delivery of services to seniors.

McNamara saw a chance to straighten out and improve some programs which he said were being mismanaged. Although his motives were sincere, in the zeal to take over the programs the out-county agency might have been too exuberant and made a mistake in judgement.

## HERE IS the background.

The out-county group was formed last spring when Detroit split from the Wayne County Area Agency on Aging.

Detroit got the go-ahead to form its own agency and took with it Hamtramck, Harper Woods, Highland Park and the Grosse Pointes.

The out-county and downriver suburbs then decided to pick up the rest of the county. After much political pressure, the out-county agency got the right to allocate state and federal funds to whichever agencies it chose to deliver senior services.

## ROUND TWO came in early September.

The out-county group awarded grants for senior services totaling more than \$1 million to member communities and agencies.

The program included the 500,000 meals per year nutrition program as well as home repair, adult day care and information and referral programs.

That move, in effect, dissolved the agency which DiVitto had been in charge of for the past seven years.

DiVitto's office had applied for the five grants awarded to these same communities. The out-county agency's board of directors summarily rejected DiVitto's grant requests stating they were invalid because they had been improperly signed and not authorized. The grant applications were signed by DiVitto who, on one or more applications, signed himself as "chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners."

The out-county group maintained that a full vote of the county commissioners (DiVitto's boss) is needed to approve the applications. The out-county group used a legal opinion from George Cross, attorney for the county board of commissioners, to justify its action.

The move, however, backfired. Cross recanted his opinion and said DiVitto did not need prior approval of the full board to apply for a grant. Cross also said a committee of the commissioners had approved the grant application and this was sufficient. He also said the full board had given DiVitto's office such prerogatives seven years ago.

**DIVITTO PROTESTED** the out-county group's decision all the way to court and won. The judge ordered the out-county group to give DiVitto's office funds to operate a portion of the program.

The judge also allowed DiVitto to appeal his requests to the out-county agency and the state office on aging in order to have his office considered for full funding of all the programs. After that, the out-county grants committee recommended that funds for the nutrition program be divided between the two groups. The court will review any decision.

In the meantime, seniors in Plymouth, Canton and surrounding communities are getting their meals.

- However:
- The program is fragmented.
  - That fragmentation could hamper any expansion or improvements in service.
  - Program employees are placed in a tenuous and stressful position, not knowing what to expect.
  - And any decisions face court review.

WHILE DIVITTO may have mismanaged the nu-

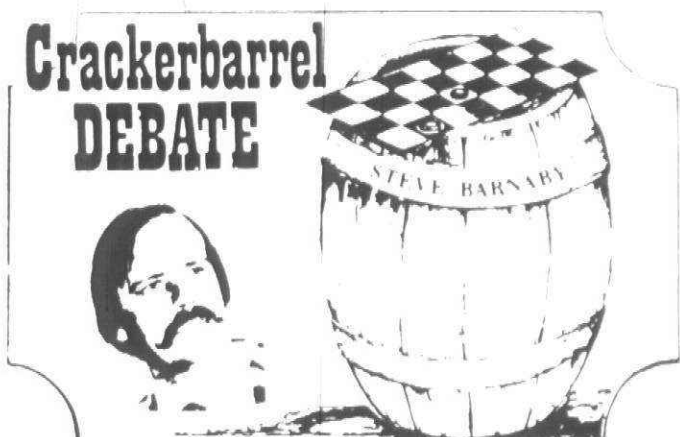
trition program, we believe the out-county agency should have proceeded with less haste in rejecting DiVitto's application.

If the applications were to be rejected, they should have been on the basis of proof of inferior and incompetent previous administration. This charge has been made by Commissioner R. William Joyner, D-Plymouth, whose district includes Canton, and who just this past weekend called for DiVitto's resignation.

Thus there may be reasons of substance for rejecting the DiVitto application. The contention, however, that the signatures were wrong was too convenient and flimsy.

The whole mess eventually will be resolved but not easily forgotten. It will tarnish the out-county's image and hamper its authority and effectiveness in the next round of grant awards.

We hope and trust that whatever steps are taken in the future will be well considered and prudent.



## Tisch plan would wreck majority rule

Much has been written charging that Proposal D — the so-called Tisch amendment — would wreck state government.

That's not the worst thing about the Tisch amendment.

The worst thing is that Tisch would give us minority rule on taxes. Throughout history, tax increases, tax cuts and bond issues have been voted by a majority — 50 percent plus one.

Even the Tisch amendment itself could be passed Nov. 4 by 50 percent plus one.

But the Tisch amendment would require future tax measures to receive a 60 percent vote for passage. And any legislative attempt to touch an existing tax credit or rebate would require an 80 percent majority.

It's grimly ironic. Tisch would get what he wants with 50 percent plus one, but he would require the other guy to get 60 to 80 percent.

That's terrible constitutional law. It would be tyranny by the minority. It's blatantly unfair.

That provision alone is enough to prompt our editorial board to urge an emphatic "no" vote on Proposal D.

PROPOSAL D is being billed as a tax slash. But when you turn over the rock, creepy things crawl out.

It would require that governmental fees, as well as taxes, be subject to voter referendums. If that sounds pretty, think again.

We'd have to vote on tuition increases at colleges. We'd have to vote on hunting licenses . . . fishing licenses . . . driver's licenses . . . building permits . . . incorporation fees . . . marriage licenses . . . and even dog licenses.

Some communities are pondering cat licenses. We'd have to vote on that, too.

So besides being unfair, the Tisch amendment deserves ridicule for its pettiness.

PROPOSAL D is aimed at cutting property assessments by about 60 percent. It would require the state government to make up that lost revenue — about \$2 billion — to local units without raising taxes.

The voter could get confused listening to Gov. William G. Milliken say it would rip 55 percent of the state budget and Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch say it would cut only 14 percent.

Who's telling the truth? Here are the plain facts: The state takes in \$14 billion, and \$2 billion is 14 percent of that. But that's not the whole story.

Some \$2.5 billion of that is "pass-through" money which the federal government grants for sewer construction, law enforcement assistance and welfare. It can't be touched.

Another \$3 billion-plus is guaranteed to local government under the 1978 Headlee tax limitation amendment. Untouchable.

Nearly \$1 billion must go to retire bonds and into retirement funds. Also untouchable.

The highway fund is supposed to be untouchable, but the pressure to raid it would be immense.

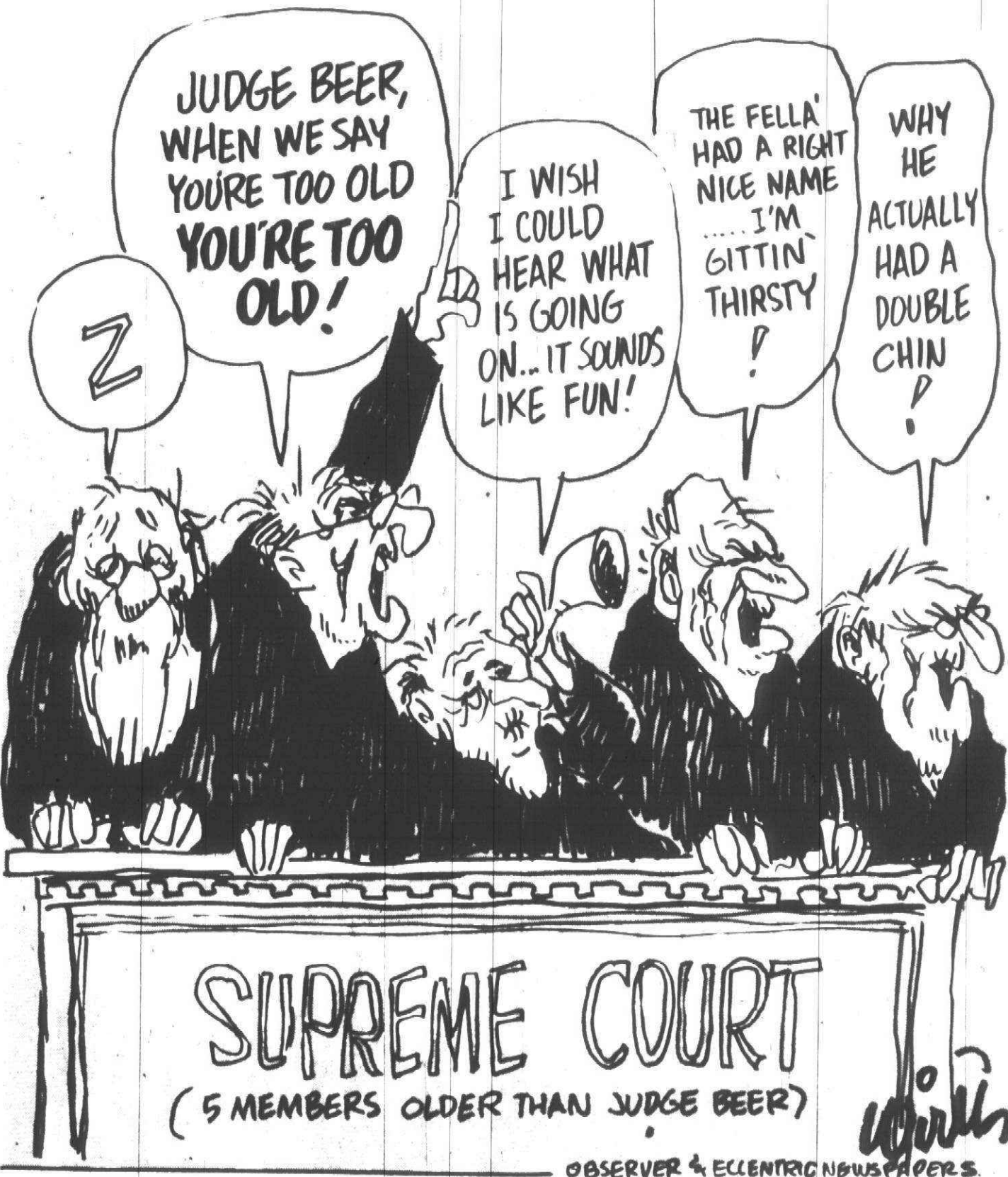
When the earmarked funds are all pared away, the state's general fund is only \$3.7 billion. The Tisch amendment would cut that by \$2 billion, nearly 55 percent.

Who's telling the truth? Milliken, not Tisch.

PROPOSAL D really would cripple state government — colleges, mental health facilities, the school for the blind, the school for the deaf, most of our state police, nearly all of our state parks, meat inspection, the national guard . . . and so on.

In the name of a tax cut, it would destroy state services and reduce our future ballots to the level of pettiness.

But worst of all, it would give us minority rule on taxes.



## Great careers, pitiful ends

It was with mixed emotions that The Stroller sat in his big easy chair looking at the pitiful picture of the once-proud Muhammad Ali, now beaten and battered, sitting in his corner unable to resume his quest of the heavyweight championship.

The Stroller's feelings were mixed. He was rather pleased that the most egotistical champion who ever held the title at last was silenced. And yet, as he looked at the broken idol of thousands sitting there conquered, he had to feel sorry that the end had come in such a brutal manner.

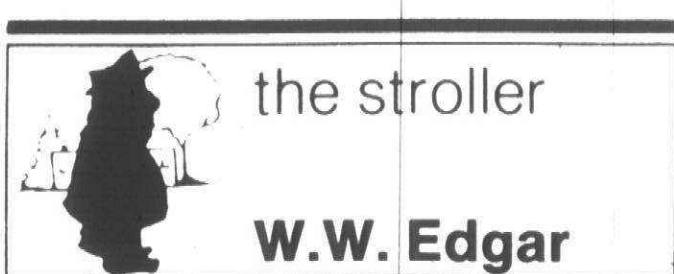
As a follower of the fight game for years, The Stroller has witnessed the rise and fall of many champions in what the sports world calls the squared circle. But none went out the way Ali did. He was forced to quit while sitting in a chair.

Gone was the pompous, boasting, shouting individual who never stopped trying to convince the world that he was the greatest. Now he was a beaten hulk, and the picture of his last hurrah will live long in the minds of those who saw it.

AS HE SAT THERE, The Stroller couldn't help recalling the sight of Joe Louis, curled up on the ring floor in Madison Square Garden, being counted out after taking a solid blow on the jaw from Rocky Marciano. That was a finish that was not at all necessary. It, too, was the result of a former champion's ego.

What happened to these two great champions in their challenge to Father Time?

As The Stroller asked himself this question, down



through the mist of years came the picture of Jack Dempsey, sounding the end of his career that took him from the ranks of the hoboes to the acclaim of thousands as the champion of the world.

It was a rather gloomy afternoon when Dempsey entered old Harry Tuthill's gymnasium on Monroe Street in downtown Detroit. The previous evening, he had engaged in an exhibition match in Flint and was the target of several good punches.

Opening his gym bag, Dempsey took out his boxing gloves and handed them to The Stroller.

"Here they are," he said. "Hang them up. I am finished, all through." And he never had them on his fists after that.

"I can hit just as hard as I ever could," he said. "But my legs are gone. I can see openings, but can't get inside quick enough to land a punch. And I can see punches coming, but can't move out of the way fast enough to avoid them. So it is time to quit."

This was the lesson neither Joe Louis nor Muhammad Ali learned.

## Our topcourt puts down the elderly

So you're 70 years old, feel great and wonder where the years have gone.

Don't get too uppity — at least if you're standing around talking with a U.S. Supreme Court justice. Those guys don't take kindly to old folks. Just ask Oakland County Circuit Judge William Beer.

This country's chief magistrates recently refused to hear a plea by Beer to allow him to run for reelection. Beer was protesting a clause in the Michigan Constitution which prohibits anyone 70 years or older from running for election as a judge.

Beer is 71.

THE ENTIRE MATTER is ludicrous, really. Five of the high court justices are 70 or older. But they're protected. The U.S. Constitution mandates that a U.S. Supreme Court justice can serve for eternity if he so chooses.

The logic escapes me.

What is perfectly evident is that once again America's elderly have been told they are something less than full citizens.

No matter how you paint it, the prejudices which this country has fostered, indeed treasured, still exist when it comes to the elderly.

If you doubt it, just listen to the words of Michigan's 55-year-old Attorney General Frank Kelley, who argued the state's case.

"THE PEOPLE OF the state of Michigan have a legitimate state interest in requiring the highest possible standards for members of the judiciary by minimizing, as far as possible, the threat of an obviously disabled judge continuing to preside."

In short, if you're 70 you're a candidate to become "disabled." The sorry aspect is that now the U.S. Supreme Court has given its stamp of approval to such age discrimination.

Forget all the lip service about the rights of the elderly. This youth-fixated society still associates aging with drooling, stroke-ridden senility.

It's a cruel hoax which has caused us to waste a valuable resource in our society — experience.

Beer, for instance, is being forced to shelve 21 years of judicial experience.

PLENTY OF examples prove this age prejudice incorrect. Colleague Tim Richard and I sat down for about three minutes the other day and came up with more than a dozen names of those who have served society after age 70 while resisting the urge to spit up on the tablecloth.

Take actor George Burns, for instance. A man in his 80s, he has entertained generations, from my great-grandmother to my 5-year-old daughter. What a shame if he would have been forced to retire at 70.

Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1953 for his six-volume study on World War II. He was 74 when he began the project, 80 when it was completed.

There are plenty more to remember: pianist Artur Schnabel, 91, still living; American jurist Oliver Wendell Holmes, 94; Michigan statesman Lewis Cass, 84; Prime Minister Clement Attlee, 84; and operatic composer Giuseppe Verdi, who wrote "Falstaff" at 80 and died at 88.

Last, but not least, is our own Eddie Edgar (The Stroller), who at 83 is still going strong.



# Michigan taxes: A fair system has evolved

Michigan voters will have three state tax proposals on the Nov. 4 general election ballot: the Smith-Bullard School Financing Tax Shift (Proposal A); the Executive-Legislative Tax Shift Plan (Proposal C) and the Tisch Tax Cut (Proposal D).

In this interview, Garland Wood, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service state and local government specialist, talks about the main policy points of the current and proposed tax system.

**Q. What is wrong with the tax system as it now exists?**

WOOD: The current system is an evolving one, which in my opinion, is a constructive way of making changes. The system we had in the 1960s was quite unwieldy and, in some areas, unjust. For instance, it had eight business taxes that overlapped and were oppressive to Michigan firms.

Then came the Single Business Tax (SBT) which consolidated these and made the system more equitable and fair. There have been many other changes in the current tax system as it is amended so as to tax people according to their ability to pay.

The income tax was enacted in 1967 to make our system more equitable; i.e. taxed according to ability to pay. Food and drugs were exempted from the sales and use tax.

Changes were made in the property tax, which had tended to be quite burdensome to low-income persons. These types of burdens were all alleviated through a variety of "circuit breakers" that now exist in the current system. In addition to the circuit breakers that now exist in the current system there are nearly 100 exemptions that apply to agriculture, business, senior citizens, renters, and the economically disadvantaged.

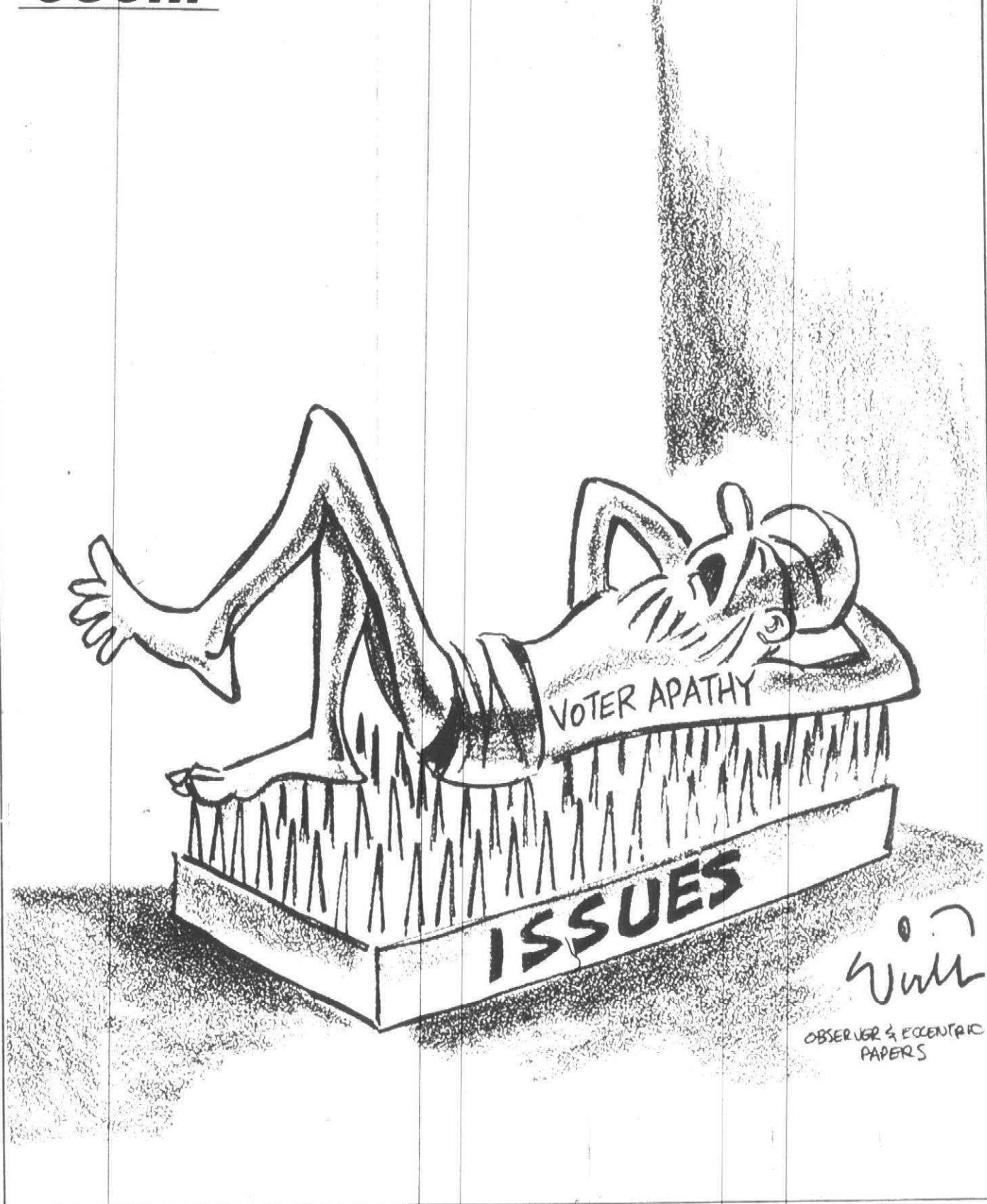
**Q. The system must have stagnated — why else the ballot proposals?**

WOOD: Quite the contrary, the present system is a dynamic one, constantly subject to improvement. For instance, this year the legislature drafted measures that would provide further breaks for those who find their taxation unreasonable, but they have been shelved since the present tax proposals have come on the ballot. I think they'll be reviewed again when the election is over.

**Q. How Does Michigan's taxation system compare with that of other states?**

WOOD: A 1978 national study rated Michigan's system as being the second-best in the nation in terms of fairness and equitability. Another study

conducted since the last election shows that the Michigan taxation system does not become regressive until an income level of \$25,000 is reached.

**Q. Do you, from a professional standpoint, feel the present system should be retained?**

WOOD: I think it should be seriously considered in

the light of whether or not the ballot proposals will improve the current tax system.

**Q. What is the main policy point of Proposal A?**

WOOD: It would give equal financial support to every student in the state's K-12 system. It would do away with the local tax allocation board. It would reduce property taxes but likely would increase personal income taxes.

When you limit the amount the local school district can collect and place that obligation in the hands of the state, it means the state will have to find an additional \$1.6 billion to funnel into the school aid system. Actually, the proposal doesn't specify where the legislature will get the additional funds.

If the proposal passes, it would be a shift in policy that would transfer more control from the local school district to the state because the entity that controls the pursestrings can and in large measure will determine how the money is spent for local programming.

**Q. What about Proposal C?**

WOOD: The Executive-Legislative coalition proposal is essentially a further modification of our present tax system. It contains additional tax breaks for property owners. But it would shift that break to other areas — sales taxes would rise from 4 to 5.5 percent, for instance. The middle-income citizen would pay in extra sales tax an amount roughly equivalent to the property tax benefit. Low-income persons would gain some net benefits.

**Q. What is the primary policy change under Proposal D?**

WOOD: This represents a major shift in tax policy. The Tisch Tax cut would minimize property tax as a major source of local government revenues. It would also limit the increase in assessed property valuations to a maximum of 2 percent per year. If economic and inflationary pressures continue, the property tax would be a minor local tax in the near future.

This shift in revenue sources would mean the state would have the responsibility of trying to make up the loss of revenue. It therefore transfers more power to the state over how the monies will be spent. Furthermore, the limitations set by the Headlee Amendment limit the amount the state can collect. There would be a drastic change in service provided by the state and local government, because the money would not be available.

**Q. How would a voter express preference for retaining the present tax system over any changes?**

WOOD: By voting "no" on the three state proposals, A, C and D.

# Tax plan benefits seniors the most

Homeowners, particularly low-income seniors who own property, would benefit the most from Proposal C, a tax cutting proposal on the Nov. 4 ballot, says a Michigan State University tax expert.

Renters would probably benefit the least, says Collette Moser, Cooperative Extension Service specialist and a member of a special team at MSU which has researched the upcoming tax proposals on the ballot.

Proposal C is supported by a coalition group, including the governor and members of the House and Senate, which voted to place the proposal on the November ballot in response to Shiawassee Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch's more severe tax cutting proposal.

THESE ARE the main points of Proposal C:

- It would cut the assessments on residences by \$7,100. If the market value of a home is \$40,000 and its assessment is \$20,000, or half that amount, the new assessment for taxing purposes would be \$20,000, minus \$7,100 or \$12,900.

- To make up for that loss in revenue, the sales tax would be raised from 4 percent to 5.5 percent, starting in 1981.

- In addition to the \$7,100 reduction in property assessment, senior citizens over 65 and earning less than \$10,000 would be exempt from \$1,200 in property taxation. This exemption would be a credit on the individual's state income tax.

- The current property tax credit programs would continue to apply to

everyone except those low-income seniors receiving the \$1,200 credit.

- Renters would be entitled to a \$140 credit on their state income tax.

- The dollar amount as well as the \$1,500 per person state income tax exemption, would in this proposal, be adjusted for inflation.

ACCORDING to Moser, the combination of the assessment reduction and the \$1,200 property tax exemption would mean that many low-income senior citizens would receive a credit for their entire tax bill.

Other homeowners would also see large decreases in their total tax bills under this proposal, because it calls for using the original property tax bill — before the \$7,100 is subtracted — to figure the individual's homestead tax credit. The Tisch and Smith-Bullard proposals use the reduced tax assessment to figure homestead tax credit.

Homestead credits are given on state income tax, she explains. An individual is refunded 60 percent of the amount

that the property tax bill exceeds 3.5 percent of household income.

Renters whose incomes are \$20,000 or above could end up paying more in sales tax increases than the \$140 credit they would receive, Moser says.

ABOUT 25 percent of a person's income goes to pay for taxable goods, she says. A person with a \$20,000 income spends about \$5,000 on taxable goods. At 4 percent the tax is \$200; 5.5 percent, \$275. For those with a \$15,000 income, the sales tax would jump from about \$150 to \$200.

The funds generated by the increase in sales tax would be placed in a special fund and used to reimburse local units of government. If there was not enough money, the funds would be distributed on a proportional basis based on the prior year.

There is one small hitch in the lowering of the property tax assessment by \$7,100, Moser explains. It applies only to taxes for operating funds, not debt retirement funds used to pay off indebtedness on buildings like schools.

## Drinking age proposition a deja vu experience?

Currently, the Michigan Constitution says individuals must be 21 years old to consume or buy alcoholic beverages. Proposal B on the Nov. 4 ballot would change that to 19.

"This question has been considered before, the first time in 1972 when Michigan's Comprehensive Age of Majority Law went into effect," says Garland Wood, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service state and local government specialist.

That provision granted 18-year-olds the right to possess and consume alcoholic beverages. They were also granted the right to vote, the right to enter into contracts and other rights

previously restricted to persons 21 years of age or older.

In April 1978, the Michigan Legislature passed a law that raised the drinking age to 19. Meanwhile, a citizen's group had placed an initiative proposal on the ballot in the November 1978 election, which would amend the state constitution to raise the drinking age to 21.

The proposal passed by a large margin and became effective in late December 1978. In September 1979, a different citizen's group initiated a petition drive to change the law from 21 back to 19. In July 1980, the Michigan Legislature assured the presence of this question on the November ballot by a two-thirds majority in both houses.

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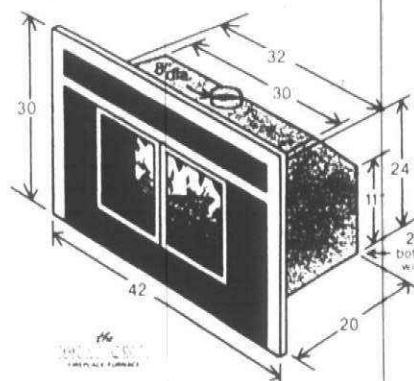
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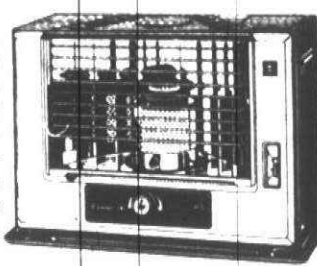
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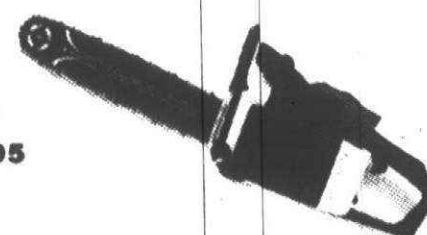

THE THEATRE Guild is in need of backers. For \$50 the donor can achieve "Angel" status and receive four season tickets to Plymouth Theatre Guild productions.

The guild is one of the oldest community theaters in the state. It has gained a reputation of being one of the finest with actors of professional stature.

The theater guild is about the same age as the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra but it has never seemed to receive the same support from the community. The orchestra is in its 35th season and the guild in its 34th. I called Effie Kuisel, charter member of the guild, for the date.

She told of a group which preceded the guild. She recalled their production of "Wuthering Heights," an outdoor performance on the lawn of a house at Church and Adams streets. Effie, in the role of Isobel, was screaming, "He's going to kill him."

Her realistic performance caused a Mrs. Partridge, who lived on the corner of Church and Adams, to call the Plymouth Police station to report a murder in progress. Miss Oceola Pooler, a drama teacher from Detroit was their first coach. Later, a drama student from Marygrove College helped them out.

Effie says it was Ralph Johnson, head of adult education for the local schools, who suggested the formation of the Theatre Guild.

They had many meetings — some people said that was all they did — before they finally became organized. They decided they needed a sponsor and the Plymouth Kiwanis Club agreed to serve in that capacity. The club was involved in building a cabin for the local Girl Scouts off Plymouth Road above the banks of the Rouge River.

The Kiwanians paid expenses, took care of advertising and ticket sales. I don't know whether or not the club received proceeds from the admissions to the plays for their efforts.

The first play was "John Love Mary" and it was in the old high school auditorium, now Central Middle School. Effie, Mabel Dicks, Lillian Birchall and other members of the original group became charter members of the new guild. They did two plays a year and later three. The Kiwanis Club continued its support through the 1956-57 season. During those early years, Bill and Martha Merrill of Willoway Playhouse, directed the guild's plays.

First performance of the current season will be the musical comedy "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown," Nov. 7, 8, 14 and 15. Most of the guild members are Canton and Plymouth residents and it would be encouraging to see the community back their thespians. Names of angel, patron and sustaining backers will be listed on play programs, unless a backer requests otherwise.

The Plymouth Symphony Orchestra has had good seasons, and it has had mediocre seasons. This season's start Sunday was spectacular.

Johan van der Merwe's debut as permanent conductor caused some consternation in the orchestra ranks, we heard, when he revealed he would audition all players from scratch.

The fact that so many old faces are back in familiar spots attests to a) the selections made by Wayne Dunlap, conductor until 1979; b) van der Merwe's own taste, and c) the quality of the players.

IN THE OPENING work, Beethoven's familiar Leonore Overture No. 3, I watched the violins like a hawk. If

there were to be any problems, that is where they would show up.

The violins' posture was excellent — the best I've seen in Plymouth. You must have good posture to get good tone. There can be no slouching and twisting. Concertmaster Kathryn Stepulla and van der Merwe had rehearsed the strings well. The bowing was even in unison.

The solo performance was an unusual choice — a trumpet concerto of Johann Hummel, a pupil of Mozart and pal of Haydn, Beethoven and Goethe. It is a lightweight work, compared to the Beethoven and the Brahms' symphony. For some reason, composers quit writing concertos for the trumpet during the romantic era.

Soloist Armando Ghitalla treated us to a virtuoso display of trills and dexterity. The classical trumpet is a dif-

ferent kind of trumpet compared to what you hear from Al Hirt or the Michigan Marching Band, a delightful change of pace.

Ghitalla, an old pro from the Boston Pops and the major leagues, had the orchestra take two bows with him, a gentlemanly touch. I would like to have seen oboist Kristy Meretta accorded a bow of her own for the duet she played with Ghitalla in the slow movement — a treasure.

TO CLOSE, van der Merwe chose the Brahms Symphony No. 2. Not many community orchestras tackle a Brahms symphony, and this selection was a measure of the respect the new conductor has for his orchestra.

I don't know this symphony well enough to comment on his interpretation. So I used the 40 minutes to contin-

ue an inventory of the orchestra. The Plymouth-Salem auditorium is far and away the best high school auditorium I have ever been in, and we need to remind ourselves of that every so often. What is especially nice is that one can pick out a group of instruments, or even a single instrument, and hear it with great clarity.

Sonority — that's the word for the viola and cello sections, particularly in the first movement. It was like buckwheat honey, as robust as it was sweet.

The seven-member cello section could use two or three more instruments, mostly for the sake of safety, though the quality is certainly all there. I was disappointed Doug McNames, one of the best performers in a hundred miles, couldn't return to the cello section.

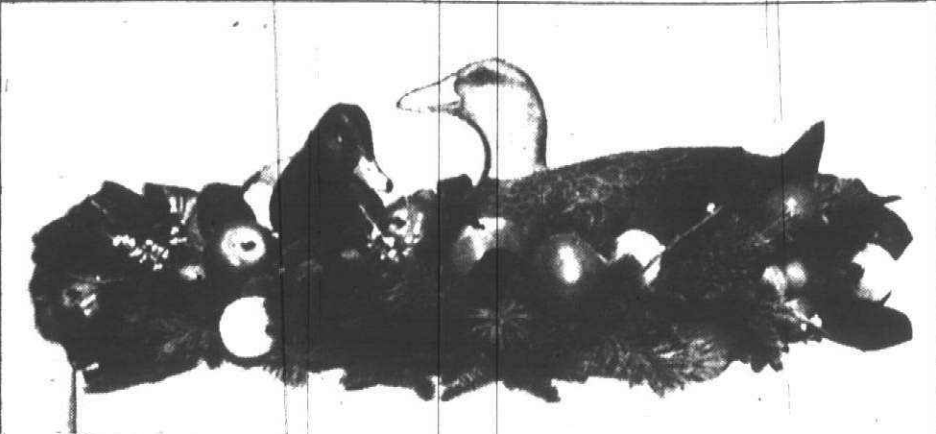

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# Parents of asthmatic/allergic children join forces

"I dreamed of being the all-American mommy," mused Annette Miller. "The cookie jar would always be full. But we've never been able to even take the kids to the Dairy Queen."

"It's hell living with an asthmatic child," Annette and David Miller of Canton Township have two asthmatic sons — Bryan 7, and Michael, 4. One of their allergies is dairy products.

"I think I am over the hump of being panicky. I used to panic when kids invited Bryan over to play, over for dinner, or when his class went on a field trip. There was a time when I used to go on all the field trips."

The Millers have been through a lot and they've learned a lot. That is why they have been instrumental in forming PAACT (Parents of Asthmatic and Allergic Children Talking) which attracted 30 area parents to its first meeting in June.

A second meeting is planned for 7:30 p.m. Oct. 28 in the media center of Field Elementary School on Haggerty Road south of Cherry Hill.

SHE SAID THE newly formed group will deal with "tricks of the trade to deal with food allergies." They will discuss everyday things — gluten-free products, mattress covers, the possibility of a food co-op so they can buy in bulk lots.

"The soy bean base baby formula used for a milk mix was 52 cents a can.

Now it's 88 cents," said Mrs. Miller. Guilt feelings, expense, recipe exchange, siblings, anger, frustrations, exercise, a child-sitting co-op, education of parents, field trips, birthday parties and teaching children to learn what medication does what are on the list for discussion.

"Michael learned at 3 which medication he needed at a particular time. It will be a self-help group. Hopefully we'll have a hotline so persons can talk when they're feeling very low. Just being able to call someone and have them understand and reassure them with a 'Hey, hang in there.'"

"Sometimes it's good to compare horror stories." She added, "We're doing this on a shoestring." She and her husband are financing the organization.

THEIR FIRST step was asking permission to display a poster in the office waiting room of their doctors, David Seaman and Martin Hurtwitz, in the Professional Building on Canton Center Road.

The poster had sign-up space for interested parents and it attracted 30 signatures. This was the beginning. The June meeting was well-attended and Dr. Hurtwitz organized a summer camp for asthmatic children. One mother who attended that first meeting had a daughter who could eat only 12 foods.

The Miller boys are allergic to eggs.

They affect them both internally and externally — hives on their skin, swelling of eyelids, choking for want of breath, and vomiting.

Sunday morning breakfast in a restaurant held promise of a happy family outing. By taking along the children's breakfasts with their own cereal and milk (they could order orange juice) it seemed a safe change of pace.

It didn't work out that way. The boys' eyes began to puff and swell. The air in the restaurant was polluted with

the cooking of eggs in the kitchen. It just didn't pan out.

Once when Bryan was in the hospital, a few bites of a normally permissible hamburger made him violently ill. A check with the kitchen dietitian explained the attack. Eggs had been added to extend the meat.

THE MILLERS have had the experience, time after time, that people who are supposed to be knowledgeable make mistakes, foolish errors that

have resulted in three days in an oxygen tent with intravenous feedings.

"You have to learn to fight for your kids," said Annette Miller.

When the Millers leave on a vacation trip, an observer could get the impression that they are moving out of town. Besides their clothing, they have to take along a supply of milk, cereals and other foods for the boys. It is not unusual for Michael to have to be hospitalized twice on a single vacation. "When you're awake all night and have

no sleep for four days, your whole world falls apart."

She explained another pitfall to be avoided. "Don't make them into hot-house tomatoes." Constant concern can make this the easy answer. She said you have to try to make life as normal as possible.

The new organization is an opportunity for parents with asthmatic and/or allergic children to help each other. Persons wishing more information can call Mrs. Miller at 397-0343.

# Hosanna-Tabor 25 years old

Looking forward to the 1980s and back to historic beginnings, Hosanna-Tabor Lutheran Church of Redford Township will mark its 25th anniversary Sunday.

The church represents a merger of two congregations.

One began in Redford in 1948 when a young pastor, the Rev. Roy G. Pranschke, canvassed door to door to see if there was interest among Lutherans for formation of a mission church. There was, and under his leadership, Hosanna Church came into being.

Later, it joined the 40-year-old inner city Tabor Church.

The flourishing congregation is celebrating a quarter-century of ministry with the Rev. Pranschke still leading the flock.

Special worship services are planned at 9 and 11 a.m., with the Rev. Bernard Kube, former pastor, as speaker and Harlan Heideman, former teacher, as guest organist.

Choir renditions and instrumentalists

will be featured at both services under the leadership of music director Leon Beckendorf.

The altar guild will decorate the church with red roses, white mums and palms, said Madelyn Ott, head of the anniversary committee.

A banner will be hung as a flag of joy. Designed by Tracey Nikolas, the banner was inspired by the leaded glass windows of the Hosanna-Tabor sanctuary. It depicts rays for the jubilation felt by the congregation, a Kyro for the church and small figures representing the membership.

A HISTORICAL synopsis booklet, compiled by Ralph Berlin, will be distributed. After the services, there will be a 1:30 p.m. congregational banquet of celebration at Lutheran High West. The event of fellowship and entertainment is being planned by Doris Rosenau.

William Miller, president of the congregation, has invited former church members and students to join the present congregation in the celebration. In-

itations had been sent to many formerly associated with the church, said Marge Emminger, head of publicity.

To mark the anniversary, the congregation is buying commemorative chimes that can be used automatically or played manually on the organ keyboard. The new system may be amplified on an audio loudspeaker to call to worship or chime on the quarter hour.

A special education celebration service was held Sept. 21 to honor the Hosanna-Tabor Christian School.

The Rev. John Herzob was guest speaker, and Robert Schultz, school principal, was in charge of the program. A highlight was installation of new teacher Gregg Pinick.

THE REV. PRANSCHKE began Hosanna Church's history the same summer he was ordained. His survey located 17 people interested in forming a mission church. They began meeting in the basement of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Tworck.

In March 1949, the group moved into

its first church home, on Plymouth Road and Sioux. The dedication of that building was held in May of that year with 37 charter members present.

Tabor Lutheran Church organized in 1916 at Beechwood and Milfred, Detroit with the Rev. G.E. Nelson as pastor. In 1917, the Rev. H.A. Quimby was installed, and he was succeeded in 1934 by the Rev. George P. Hildner. Under Hildner's leadership, a church building at Tireman and Burnette was completed.

The two congregations merged July 17, 1955, and began worship with Pastors Pranschke and Hildner.

About a year later, new facilities for church and school were dedicated at the present location, 9600 Levene. The three-acre plot had been bought earlier by the Hosanna congregation.

The two pastors served together until Hildner's retirement in 1961. He was succeeded by the Rev. E.M. Hadwiger and then by Kube. Recently, the Rev. Glenn Kopper assumed the associate post.

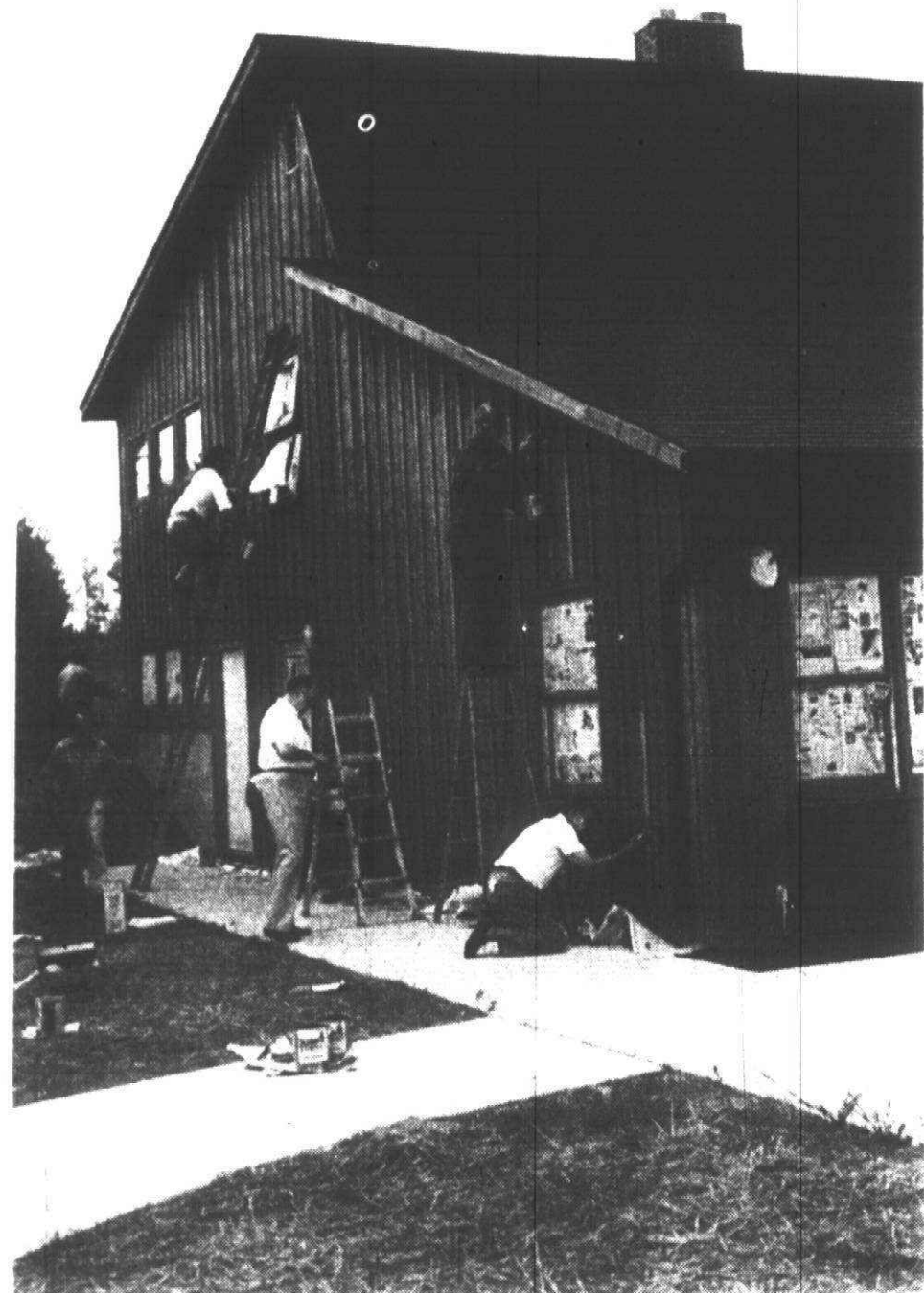

# Back in town

## Saxophonist keeps ties with home

Pepper Adams is from Detroit, a city that has provided many of the bop stalwarts of jazz. People like Kenny Burrell, Donald Byrd, Milt Jackson, Elvin Jones and Thad Jones were Detroit contemporaries of baritone saxophonist Pepper Adams.

Adams, who has returned for an engagement through Sunday at Baker's Keyboard Lounge in Detroit, is now a busy freelance musician in New York.

"I was born in Detroit, but I traveled a lot during the late '30s and '40s," he said from his home. "My family was extremely poor and we went pretty

much where we could get something to eat. I consequently spent time in some strange places.

"After my father's death, my mother moved back to Detroit where she had friends. I was about 16 then and I enrolled in Wayne College. I only had about two years of high school, but I took the entrance exam and was accepted."

In the late 1940s and into the 1950s, Pepper Adams began to meet some of the movers in the burgeoning Detroit jazz scene.

"Yusef Lateef and I worked together with Little John and his Merry Men. (Continued on Page 10B)

Kiolan competed in the recent 1980 Black & White Chicago Classic tournament. For the next few weeks, he will review moves which arose in tournament play.

● DOUBLING IN MATCH PLAY

Winning a backgammon match depends largely on the use of the doubling cube.

Choosing a precise time to double the cube should force your opponent out of the game and give you a one-point win. Knowing when to "pass" a double, or back out, can save you a lot of points and sometimes the match.

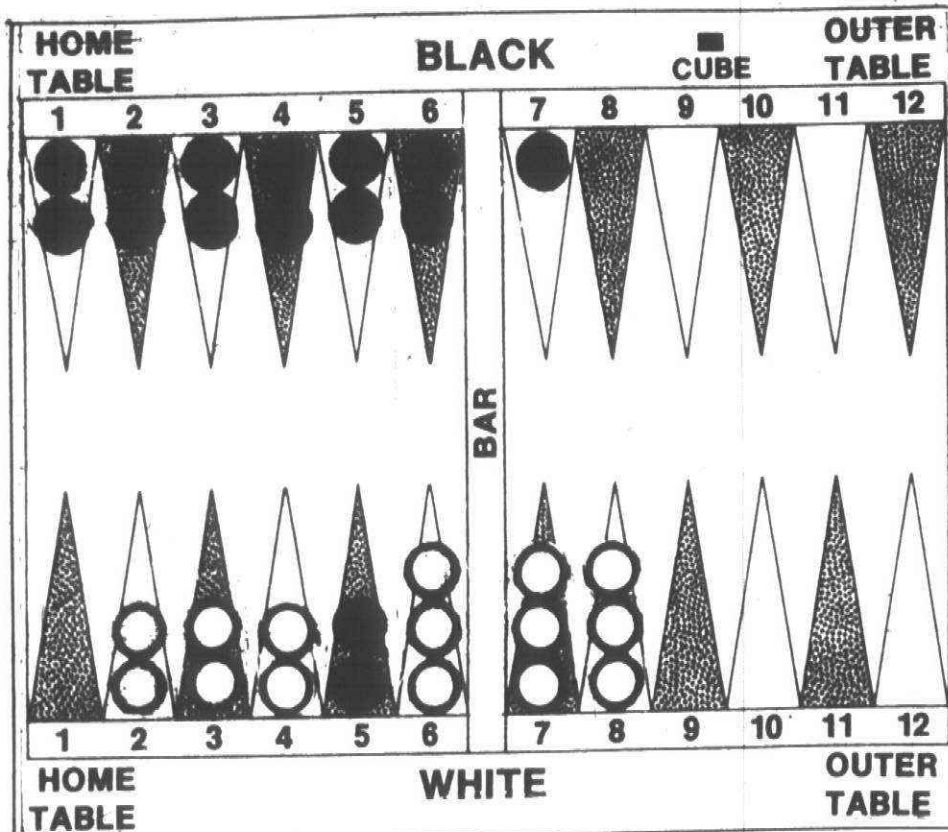
This position arrived during the finals in the last chance tournament. The score is 5-5 in a seven-point match.

White doubles the cube to 2. Should black accept or pass the double? Should white have doubled?

If one was counting pips (the number of spaces all remaining checkers must move in order to catch up with your opponent), it would be a good take. Black is behind only 11 pips, but white is on roll and could be further ahead in the race, depending on the roll.

Although many professional players contend this position is a "fair take," one must consider the score in match play.

If I were black, I don't think I would play for the match in this position because the score is tied. Either player needs two points to win the tournament. Black is forced to roll a large double to save the game. In tournament match play, to hope for or rely on a double 6 or double 5 to steal the lead is a long shot.



The pressure is not on white but on black to perform. Was white correct to double? Absolutely. Black should have refused the double, take the one-point loss and play another game.

IN THE TOURNAMENT

White doubled. Black accepted. White then rolled a 6-1. Black rolled double 6.

White was worried, but soon rolled a double 6 in the bear-off to win the game and match.

If the score had been different and black was behind 5-3 or 5-4 after rolling the 6-6, he could have redoubled the cube to 4 and it probably would not have been taken.

But that didn't happen and I won. That's backgammon.

John Wilson, a trumpet player who had worked with Jimmy Lunceford, was the leader. Wilson had a lot of good musicians in the band. Lateef was on tenor and then Frank Foster played tenor for a while. Barry Harris was the piano player for quite some time.

"It was a real good band and we played at a little club on Adams Street in Detroit. I can't remember the name of the club now. I do remember it didn't serve alcohol so young people could come in."

A CLUB HE WELL remembers is the Bluebird Inn. "I played in the Blue

Bird for quite some time with Thaddeus (Thad Jones). Then, I went to Korea, and before I came back Thad had left to play trumpet with Basie."

In addition to Thad Jones, Adams had played around Detroit with drummer Elvin Jones, guitarist Kenny Burrell ("We had been friends since we were kids. We once worked together in Lucky Thompson's band. I was 16, Kenny was 17, and our piano player, Tommy Flanagan, was 17 too.") and several other jazz musicians who have since made names for themselves in the jazz field. He and Thad Jones were to meet up again in the most important and influential band of the '60s and '70s, the Thad Jones-Mel Lewis Orchestra.

There were a few trips back to Detroit as a member of the Jones-Lewis Orchestra until Adams left the band in 1977, a few months before the orchestra itself was disbanded when Jones left to take up residence in Denmark. In the last three years, Adams has been busy, but each year has spent a week at Baker's back in Detroit.

Closing an engagement at the New York club Fat Tuesdays on Sunday night, Adams arrived in Detroit Monday to open at Baker's.

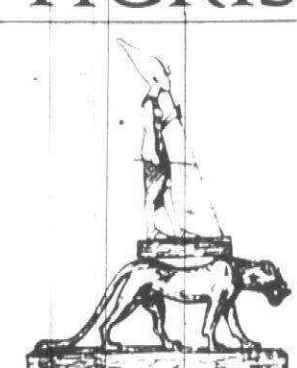
"I have been able to sustain myself and my family nicely by going out and doing what I love doing: going out and playing with different rhythm sections. Mostly what I'm doing is just playing."

Nicholas Roeg was one of the first directors to blend eroticism with fright, and nobody has ever done it quite so well — Brian De Palma included.

"Don't Look Now" is set in Venice and it stars Julie Christie and Donald Sutherland as husband and wife. Christie's pursuit of the couple's dead daughter, whom she thinks may be contacted in the afterlife, leads her through the decaying waterways and lifeless back alleys of Venice.

An aura of death — perhaps deathlessness is a better description — hangs heavy in this timeless setting and the viewer begins to feel that if the child could be brought back to life, this is the place where it would happen.

Roeg, who was a cinematographer ("Petulia," "Far from the Madding Crowd") before making his directing debut, is expert at capturing moods of decadence and deterioration on film. He also uses color to highlight such moods; in "Don't Look Now" a blood-red raincoat believed worn by the deceased daughter contrasts strikingly with the grim surroundings of backwater Venice.

Also a contrast to the overall sense of foreboding is a graphic sex scene between Christie and Sutherland.

land. The scene adds a dimension to Christie's character especially, demonstrating her openness, passion and love for life. She's not the type to sulk over tombstones, but in Nicholas Roeg's purgatorial Venice, she, too, begins to believe that anything can happen. Rating: \$3.55.

"Ben Hur" (1959), 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday at the Redford Theatre, 17360 Lahser at Grand River, phone 537-2560, \$2. Running time 212 minutes.

Charleton Heston, alias Andrew Jackson, alias Moses, was a natural for the role of Judah Ben Hur, author Lew Wallace's aristocratic Jew who is converted to Christianity at the time of Christ.

Ben Hur's struggle against the Roman governor of Palestine (Stephen Boyd) takes on epic proportions in this William Wyler film that won 11 Oscars. The chariot scene — staged by second unit director Andrew Marton — is one of the most amazing sequences ever filmed.

Director Wyler keeps tight rein on the actors and the action, though, making this a personable film despite its enormity.

Unlike the epics of Cecil B. De Mille ("The Ten Commandments," for instance), the spectacle of "Ben Hur" is nicely balanced with the performance-

es of a fine cast. Jack Hawkins, Hugh Griffith and Sam Jaffe also star.

Incidentally, the Wallace novel was written 100 years ago. Film will be shown in 70mm with six-channel stereo sound. Rating: \$3.60.

"Destination Tokyo" (1944), 12:30 p.m. Friday on Ch. 50. Originally 135 minutes.

Channel 50's own Bill Kennedy co-stars with Cary Grant in this propaganda film about Yanks who blow Japs out of the water while hardly getting wet themselves. A good cast — including John Garfield, Alan Hale and Dane Clark — provide more suspense than the plot is worth. The War Department could have made this film. Take it away. Rating: \$2.

"Sabrina" (1954), 1 p.m. Sunday on Ch. 50. Originally 113 minutes.

Heroes died hard in the '50s, which explains why Victor Mature played he-man roles well into his 40s and why Humphrey Bogart (at 55) and William Holden (age 36) could compete for the affections of a 24-year-old Audrey Hepburn in "Sabrina." An unlikely match, no matter how you look at it. Sometimes, though, pictures that are badly cast turn out OK, as is the case in this Billy Wilder-directed film.

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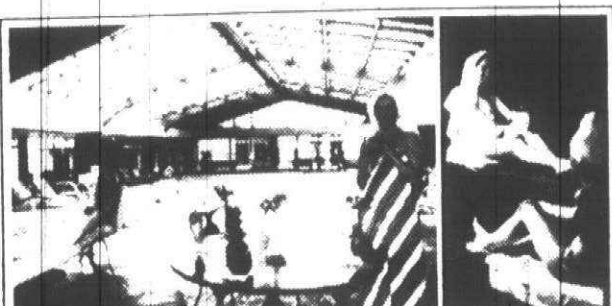

Salem's pressure man-to-man defense, however, began to wear down Franklin in the second half. Guards Carol Ross, Eileen Moore and Jacque Merrifield took charge as the Rocks closed the gap to 28-26 heading into the final quarter.

Ross, who finished with 12 points, hit three straight curbside jumpers in the third quarter. She was also a terror defensively.

Moore, who netted 11, showed her ball-handling skills in the final quarter and opened up the Patriots' zone.

Two layups in the fourth quarter by Ross gave Salem the lead for good. Salem forced Franklin into a catch-up situation with four minutes to go. The Rocks then spread out the Pats' defense and began stretch their lead.

**BLOHM'S TROOPS** outscored Franklin 18-7 in the decisive fourth period.

"To me," said Franklin coach Chuck Hebestreit, "we looked like we got tired."

"In the beginning our passes were sharp. We threw the ball away too

much and we weren't moving to the ball in the second half."

Salem's outside shooting kept Franklin honest. Junior forward Jan MacKenzie did the most damage. She finished with seven field goals and 15 points.

"Jan stroked those two baseline shots at the beginning of the fourth quarter," said Blohm, "and that helped her confidence."

Mary Kay McNall, Franklin's 6-foot-3 center, had 13 points but didn't see the ball much in the second half because her teammates had trouble getting past mid-court. Guard Julie Wilga notched 10 and 6-0 forward Anna Collins added eight. Dawn Bradley, a 5-11 junior forward, was the only other Patriot to score.

A long jumper by Wilga at the outset of the third quarter gave Franklin its biggest lead of the night, 23-16. It was all downhill after that.

Paulowit, Trim, John Vives and John Uekert will team up for the Class A state finals beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday at Merryfield Country Club near Battle Creek. The four Salem golfers qualified to compete in the state meet after finishing third in last week's regional.

"THIS IS a real competitive club," said the Salem coach, now in his eighth

Mitroff, Nunzio Marino, Rob Rowland, Bill Ickes, Rob Zigler and Mike Moore have also made valuable contributions to the Rocks' success.

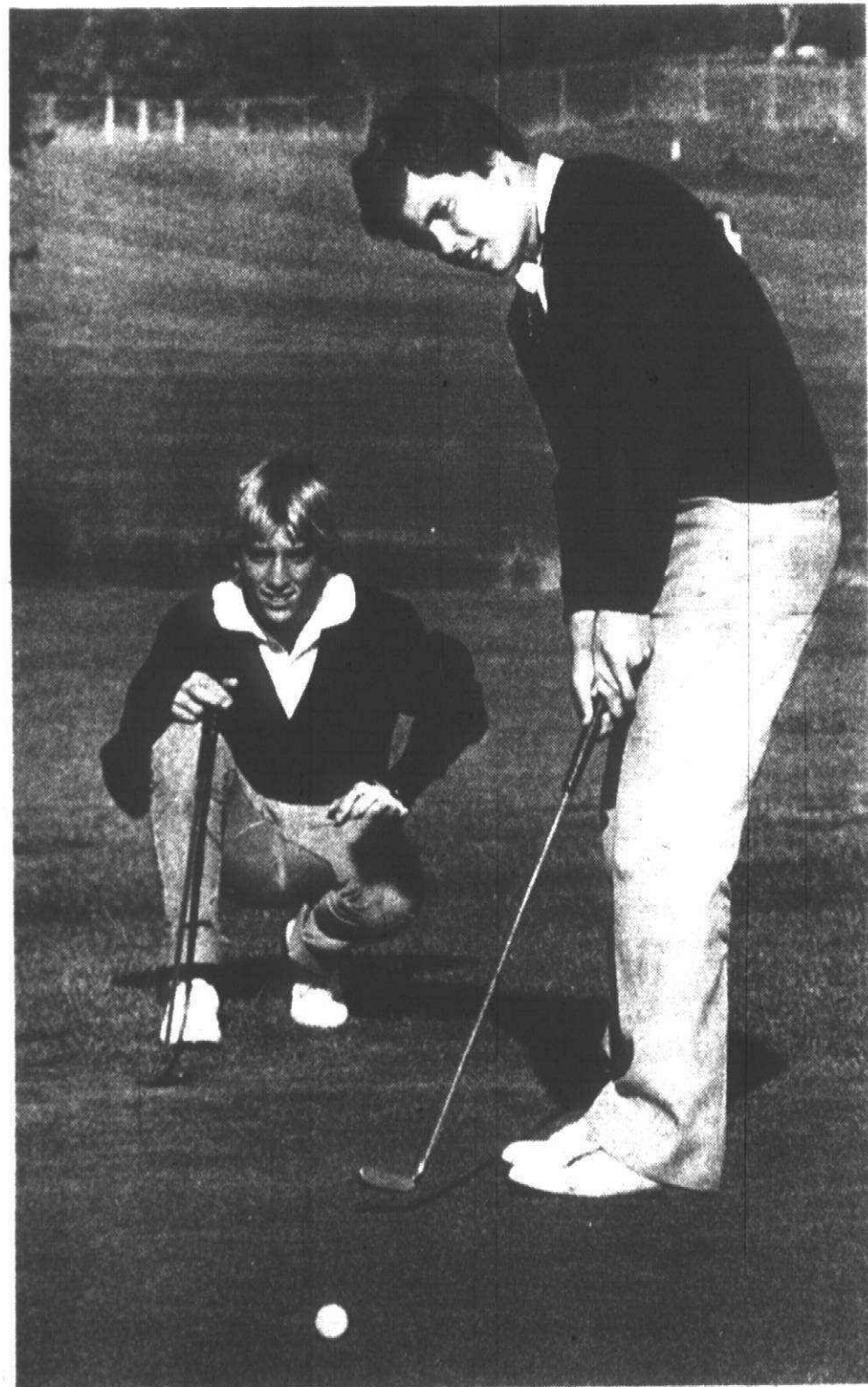
**TRIM HAS** been Salem's most consistent player this fall. His nine-hole average is 37.5.

# 'Characters' mold Tartar squad

The cast of characters is priceless — a cola fiend, a silent leader, an incurable cut-up and an irrepressible laughter.

These four characters comprise the foundation of Wayne State University's rapidly improving women's volleyball program. All have local ties, as does Tom Teeters, the second-year coach.

The indomitable cast consists of Tracy Dreyer, Lisa Redford, Kathy Higgins and Denise Breslin.

All but Higgins were part of last year's Great Lakes Conference co-championship team, which improved from a 2-19 record in 1978 to 36-18 during Teeters' first campaign as coach.

"Kathy's the practical joker of the team. You might say she's very high strung," Teeters quips.

Higgins, who has been bantering with one of the team trainers, has a quick response to that. "I like Teeters because he has nice legs. Why else would I be here?"

Higgins, 23, is a professed Teeters follower.

Although she started her college career on the JV team at Central Michigan and later played at Eastern Michigan, Higgins has spent three seasons under Teeters' tutelage — her junior and senior years at Clarenceville High School and one year at Schoolcraft College.

Higgins has also coached in recent years at Dearborn Heights Crestwood.

WHILE SUGAR Ray Leonard and other famous athletes may be "turning 7-Up," Dreyer prefers the darker drink.

"Tracy is always running around drinking Coca Cola or Pepsi," Teeters said. "She really loves the stuff."

"Yeah," Breslin added. "Whenever we go somewhere to eat, she always has to have a Pepsi and hamburger. She loves hamburgers. In fact, Tracy even orders a hamburger when she goes to a really nice restaurant."

Dreyer, a sophomore who graduated from Livonia Bentley, has found a niche as an outside setter. Teeters has other plans, though.

"I'd like to convert her to spiker because she has outstanding leaping ability. She's our best all-around player," he said.

Teeters also said that the 5-5 Dreyer is the most spirited player on the team.

"She screams like crazy when she spikes the ball," Teeters said. "She's a very hyperactive girl. We're trying to calm her down."

BRESLIN, also a sophomore and a Bentley grad, is one person who could keep anybody's spirits up.

"Sometimes we have to stop practice for a few minutes because Denise is laughing so hard at something," Teeters said of the center-blocker. "She's usually the first and the last to laugh at something funny."

Breslin, a co-captain of the team, exploded with an ear-to-ear smile. She seemed surprised at Teeters' words, which received approval from the other players.

"I'm sorry if I do that," Breslin said with a giggle.

Breslin, chosen last season as WSU's Most Valuable Athlete by the school's newspaper, is no dummy. She takes chemistry and calculus while majoring in liberal arts.

While she's getting smarter by the day in the classroom, Teeters sees a big improvement in her play on the court.

"Last season, she was a little intimidated by her opponents," Teeters said. "This year, I'm hoping she'll become much more aggressive and develop into a leader."

Teeters believes there is no limit for Breslin's talents. "Denise has an excellent chance to be an all-stater this year and an outside shot at being a Division I All-American," Teeters said. "She should have been all-conference last year."

REDFORD, a sophomore who played for Teeters three years at Clarenceville, is a veteran at receiving honors.

At Clarenceville, Redford was selected for the all-Observer team her sophomore, junior and senior years, all-Metro West Conference two years and

High School All-American her senior year.

"Lisa is definitely a leader and a winner," Teeters said. "Players like her lead by example. She has played more volleyball than anyone on the team."

"I think her potential is very high," Teeters continued. "I don't think she can work any harder. So far, Lisa has given the team her all. She can be great if things just click for her."

Things haven't been clicking of late, however. Redford injured an ankle last summer and it's still weak.

"Mentally, I'm at 100 percent and physically I'm at 95 percent," Redford said. "I have some mobility. I should be able to play right away."

WITH THREE of the four Livonians just sophomores, Teeters may have a dynasty on his hands. "Our team would fall apart without these girls," he said. "They are our nucleus."

Two other players with local ties are also members of the volleyball team.

Rita Serra, a 5-8½ junior spiker is co-captain along with Breslin. Serra is a Redford Union graduate.

Nancy Williams, a 5-9 freshman spiker, graduated from Birmingham Marian. She resides in Redford.

"We had good balance and got scoring from everyone on the floor when we needed it," Kavanaugh said. "Our point guard (White) played one of her best games of the year."

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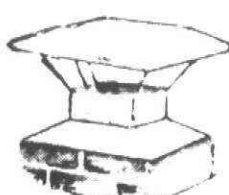
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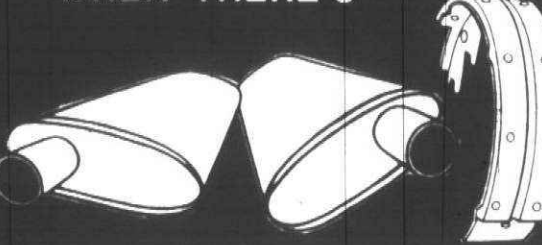
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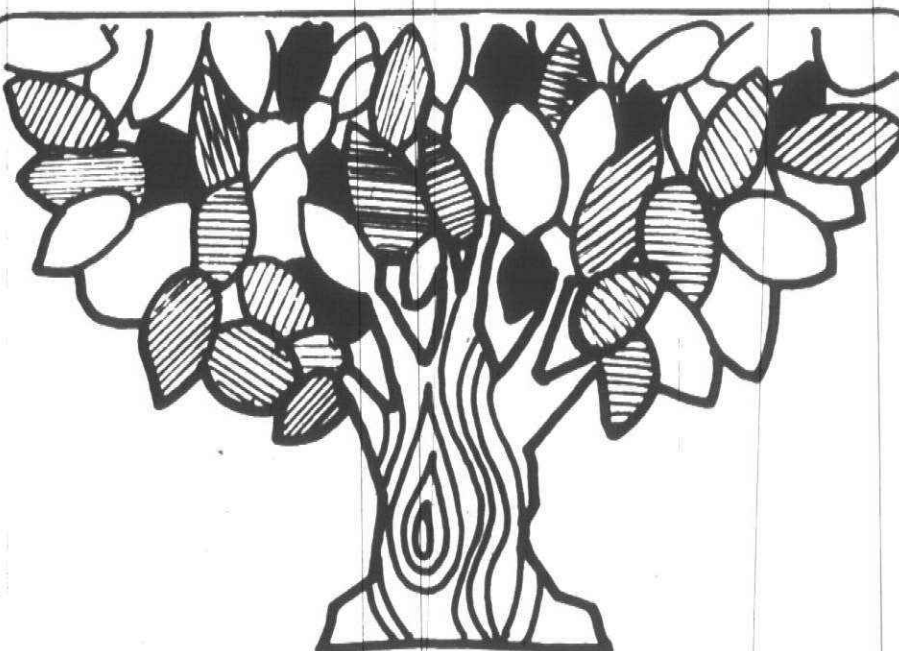
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# Arts planning underway today

A team representing the Plymouth-Canton community begins meeting today to discuss ways of integrating arts into the community.

The Institute for Comprehensive Arts Planning (ICAP), a project to improve arts education programs in Michigan schools, will be held today through Saturday in the Hoyt Conference Center at Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti.

The institute's purpose is to help school districts make the arts an integral part of general education in their elementary and secondary schools.

Some 20 teams of arts educators, community arts agency leaders, concerned citizens, community leaders, and public officials from communities around the state will participate in the institute.

The five-to-eight-member teams will learn how to examine the quality of arts education programs in their schools and how to analyze community arts resources which might supplement school programs.

The Plymouth-Canton team was organized by Cathy Sibert, teacher at Miller Elementary in Canton. Other team members include:

U.S. Congressman Carl Pursell of Plymouth; Mary B. Childs, mayor, city of Plymouth; Emory Daniels, community editor, Plymouth Observer; Dr. Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools; Elaine Kirchgatter of Canton, school board member; Shirley Spaniel, director of elementary education, Plymouth-Canton Schools; Claudia Tull of Ann Arbor, music specialist; and Mary DeGrazia of Dearborn, art specialist.

The institute is a joint program of the Michigan Alliance for Arts Education and the Michigan Association of Community Arts Agencies.

Aiding the effort are the Michigan Department of Education, the Michigan Council for the Arts, Eastern Michigan University, and the Charles Stepien Foundation which granted

\$15,000 to the MAAE for partial funding of the project.

Featured speakers for the program include Dr. Eugene T. Paslow, deputy superintendent of the Michigan Department of Education; Dr. Walter L. Marks, superintendent of schools in Montclair, N.J. where a successful comprehensive arts plan exists; and Mary Snow of New York, an author and educational consultant.

Following the conference, each community team will meet with one of two other teams to exchange experiences, discuss strategies, and strengthen their sense of purpose.

Institute leaders will attend the follow-up meetings to help advise and encourage the local efforts, as well as to assist with plan evaluations.

The ICAP is expected to operate over a three-year period. The teams from the 1980 institute will help the teams selected in 1981. In the third year the program will be open to persons from other states.

The local and intermediate school districts sending teams to the institute include Alpena, Ann Arbor, Bad Axe, Bay County, Benton Harbor, Chippewa Valley (Mount Clemens), Dearborn, Detroit, East Lansing, Flint, Gogebic-Ontonagon, Holland, Lansing, Lowell, Marquette, Plymouth-Canton, Port Huron, Southfield, Traverse City, and Utica.

## EMU project funding at all-time high

Sponsored funding for projects at Eastern Michigan University reached an all-time high of \$7 million during the 1980 fiscal year, the EMU Office of Research Development (ORD) reported at the September Board of Regents meeting.

The \$7 million in grants represents a threefold increase over last year's funding total of \$2.3 million. In contrast, the University received \$1.2 million in sponsored funding in 1977.

The fiscal year's total also represents 68 awarded grants, six less than last year. A total of 136 proposals for funding in 1980 were submitted to various sources, 13 less than the 1979 totals.

Some \$4.4 million of the \$7 million in funds supports two EMU projects in Swaziland and Yemen.
