

State cuts slice deeper than schools planned

For the past few months Plymouth-Canton schools have been waiting for the ax to fall.

The ax fell last week. Now the central administration is waiting to see how deep the blade has cut into the 1980-81 operating budget.

Gov. William Milliken last week announced cuts totalling \$288.5 million to balance the state budget without having to increase taxes.

Among the latest cuts was \$65 million to local school districts. The state already had proposed reducing educational payments by \$160 million.

If the governor's latest cut is approved by the Legislature, educational funding from the state for the coming year would be about \$223 million less than a year ago.

The governor's latest cut also included reductions of \$20 million in revenue-sharing to local cities and townships, \$60 million to colleges and universities, \$4 million from the state police, \$23 million in general assistance welfare, \$11 million from mental health, \$12.4 million from the Department of Natural Resources, \$500,000 from public

health, and some \$77 million from 19 other state departments.

Dr. John M. Hoben, superintendent of schools, believed a deep cut would be made in the local budget but was unsure as of Friday what the exact figures would be.

THE SCHOOLS months ago anticipated the governor's cutback and budgeted for it, Hoben added, but the final cuts are expected to be deeper than first thought.

"We're not sure whether the latest \$65 million reduction will come totally

in state aid or whether categorical aid also will be cut," Hoben said Friday.

"Our information, though — and it's strictly guesswork — is that about \$36 million will come from state aid and \$29 million from categorical."

Earlier cuts proposed by the governor in categorical include reductions in funding for transportation and special education. For Plymouth-Canton, the previous categorical cuts represented a \$500,000 loss for transportation alone.

About four months ago the school's financial department estimated local

state aid payments would be about \$2.2 million less than during the previous year.

The budget also included a contingency fund of \$185,000 to protect the schools against an anticipated executive order cutback.

The schools in the present budget, then, anticipated losses in state funding of almost \$2.3 million.

Although Hoben was unsure what the final loss figure will be, he is fairly certain the state income loss will exceed the \$2.3 million.

Earlier in the week, the administration was looking at the possibility of having a budget imbalance of \$4 million.

The cut of \$4 million from the state police budget will result in some 125 troopers and civilians being laid off, bringing the total of layoffs for the year to 205.

The state police layoffs come at the same time that Wayne County commissioners are proposing elimination of the road patrol in western Wayne County in an attempt to balance their budget.

Officials leave with thanks

No one erupted into an emotional rendition of Auld Lang Syne last week as the Township Board opened its last session as Canton's current governing body.

But members of the board — as well as incoming officials and residents in the audience — had plenty to say to one another.

There were no terse words or political accusations. Just thank you's, congratulations on a fine term in office, and emotional exchanges on the pleasantries of working with one another.

Even Jim Poole, who will take over the supervisor's position later this week, had some fine words to say about the outgoing board.

"I'd like to express my appreciation and gratitude to this board, particularly to Noel Culbert, the outgoing supervisor," said Poole. "I want to thank you for the courtesy in allowing me to speak during the public forum during the campaign."

OFFICIALLY, current Township Board members will hold office until noon this Thursday. At 7 p.m. that night, candidates who won office in the Nov. 4 election will be sworn in at public ceremonies in township hall.

Four of the six board members who officiated at last week's meeting will step down Nov. 20. Clerk John Flodin,

who sought re-election unopposed, did not attend last week's meeting because he was ill with mononucleosis.

The four officials who no longer will take their seats on the board are Supervisor Noel Culbert, who narrowly lost to Poole Nov. 4; trustee Robert Greenstein, who lost a bid for the supervisor's position in the Democratic primary; trustee Eugene Daley, who also lost in the Democratic primary; and Treasurer James Donahue, who did not seek re-election.

They will be replaced with Poole as supervisor, Maria Falkiewicz as treasurer, and Robert Padgett and Loren Bennett as trustees.

The only current officials who will remain in office after Thursday are Clerk Flodin, trustee Carol Bodenmiller and trustee Stephen Larson.

THE CURRENT board met for the final time last Wednesday night to take up a short agenda of minor items.

Officials spent the public forum portion of the meeting complementing one another.

Mrs. Bodenmiller thanked Culbert. Culbert and Donahue thanked the township's staff. And resident Bob Miller thanked the entire board.

"A lot of citizens really appreciate your efforts," said Miller.

"The meeting ended in record time — at 8:45 p.m."

When it was over, Daley said he planned to enjoy his retirement as a Wayne County Sheriff lieutenant.

"But I'm also going to sit in that audience and hassle the new board," joked Daley.

Culbert shook Poole's hands and advised the new supervisor to visit his doctor regularly for physicals.

What's wrong?

Merchants air gripes at hearing

Do some Canton Township officials need a crash course in getting along with people?

Are regulations too stiff? Or are business persons trying to blame someone else for their own shortcomings?

The answer may be a little bit of each, judging by the reactions at a recent public hearing of a small business task force.

The task force, which was formed last summer, is working with the chamber of commerce to bridge a long-standing rift between the business community and officials over ordinances.

The hearing last Thursday in Township Hall was intended to collect the gripes of small business people. But only about 20 persons, mostly business people, showed up.

Task force chairman Robert Czerniak, of Country Deli, had hoped for a large turnout and had sent notices of the meeting to more than 200 businesses of all types.

Czerniak said he was "encouraged" by the interest of supervisor-elect James Poole. He urged merchants to speak out.

"We're here to gather facts," said Czerniak. "Unless you people tell us, it's going to be hard to correct it."

MOST OF the complaints were centered on two issues: Township regulations, especially the sign ordinance, and a "poor attitude" on the part of some township officials.

Coming under a lot of fire was the township's controversial ordinance which specifies the type and size of signs which may be used by businesses.

"I feel the signs are too small — they're hazardous," commented a Canton psychiatrist whose practice is in Livonia. "Sometimes I have been looking for a place (and had difficulty seeing).

"I have seen Livonia flourish, flourish, flourish," he added. "We (should) go to Livonia and ask them what they did right."

Virginia Attwood and her sister, Yvonne Roehling, are co-owners of Woodling Gallery, a gift and crafts shop on Michigan Avenue. The shop is located on a curve in the road and sometimes cannot readily be seen, said Mrs. Attwood.

"We have had people slam on their brakes in front of our place," said Mrs. Attwood.

The Woodling Gallery women also have had problems with the township over a roof sign for the previous business, a restaurant. They weren't permitted to place the word "gifts" on the roof.

"The roof sign was there 50 years," said Mrs. Attwood. "It used to say diner, but we aren't a diner any more. We're unable to use it."

"We don't get any response from the township except citations," added Mrs. Attwood.

"We want to have a decent township, just like the (officials)," said Art Eder-

er of Lippitt Jewelry. "But we have to have leeway for signs for special promotions."

"Ordinances are stopping a lot of things," added Gary Roberts, who has a vacuum cleaner business.

Business persons also complained about a breakdown in communications between departments within the township.

For example, Canton engineer N. Bali noted that he still has a temporary occupancy permit after opening an office in the former Sheldon School on Geddes more than a year ago.

"The building department is by itself," he said. "The police department is by itself. We are still temporary there — one year and two month (later)."

Others said staff persons at Township Hall are rude.

"(Building inspector) Aaron (Machnik) is courteous," said Rene Hetu of the Cracker Barrel. "But the people between me and him are a whole other ballgame."

Mike Neubauer, of Canton Car Wash, said he believes township officials are "insensitive" to the costs involved when they require changes in site plans, etc.

"The greatest difficulty this township has with the business community is attitude," added attorney Mitch Howard. "We don't have an ombudsman."

Fulfilling promise

Donahue returns salary

Current Township Treasurer James Donahue is making good on his pledge to return some \$900 to the township.

Donahue is donating his bi-weekly treasurer's salary of \$212 to the Canton Township library. So far, the library has received a total of about \$850 of the amount due.

The part-time treasurer had promised in April to repay the township a portion of his \$7,500 salary after turning over administrative duties to Deputy Treasurer Maria Falkiewicz.

Donahue earlier had estimated that he owed the township about \$900. He retained his seat on the township board as an alternative to resigning completely because of poor health.

HEAD LIBRARIAN Deborah O'Connor confirmed last week that Donahue had submitted four checks between August-October. Donahue said he has forwarded another check within the past few days.

"I think that's pretty close," said

Donahue. "I plan to sit down and figure it all out this weekend."

Donahue said his pledge to repay the township is voluntary. No one on the township board could force him to return the money, he said.

Donahue added that state law forbids an official to cut his own salary. He said the township's attorney advised him, for tax purposes, to make a donation to a specific township fund.

Currently, the only fund is for the library.

"I've always supported the library," said Donahue.

"We have the authority to accept these donations," said Douglas Ritter, chairman of the library commission. "We accept them gratefully."

The present arrangement of a part-time township treasurer will end this week. Starting Nov. 20, the position will be a four-year, full-time post.

Donahue didn't run for re-election. Elected to succeed him was Ms. Falkiewicz.

Library needs help

A "swamped" library staff is calling for help.

Volunteers are needed at the Canton library, which opened four weeks ago on the third floor of Township Hall.

Head librarian Deborah O'Connor said the library needs persons of high school age or older to help out in four-hour time blocks, once a week.

Tasks would include stamping and tagging books and placing them in alphabetical order, said Ms. O'Connor.

PEOPLE have been flocking to the library since it opened Oct. 20. Books have been circulating at a record pace and mothers have been signing up their children for reading programs.

Ms. O'Connor estimated that 17,250 books had been checked out as of Friday. The total collection is about 20,000-25,000 volumes, she added.

"We're spending all our time waiting on people and don't have time to put books on the shelves," explained Ms. O'Connor. "We're so swamped, we're really falling behind."

"It's vitamin time around here," she added, with a laugh. "We're hoping it will calm down."

Brisk business forced Ms. O'Connor to move up the hiring of a part-time clerk to augment the staff. That hiring had been scheduled to take place in January, she said.

And a reception held Nov. 9 to highlight the opening of the library drew about 300 persons, said Ms. O'Connor.

"We're just flabbergasted and delighted," added Douglas Ritter, chairman of the Canton Library Commission.

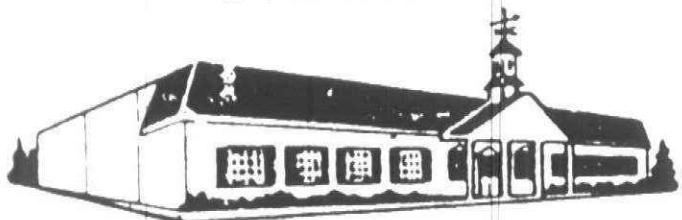

Lucas vows lawsuit to rescue road patrol

Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas announced Friday his intent to sue the Wayne County Board of Commissioners over their upcoming plans to cut the sheriff's department by more than one-fourth strength.

The proposed cutback of 255 officers and clerical workers would virtually eliminate the patrol of secondary roads in out-county communities as well as the department's investigation department.

Lucas said he would file the lawsuit "in the next few days" — before the adoption of the county budget. Action on the budget is expected tomorrow.

Announcing that he would use his personal finances to fight the county, Lucas said he has secured a legal counsel a Southfield attorney who previously represented the sheriff's deputies union, Local 502.

"I cannot as a man of good conscious and as a good police officer accept the decision of the board of commissioners," he said. "That action would leave a great proportion of the county virtually without police protection and I have the constitutional responsibility to provide public safety."

Lucas also directed his plans toward those communities which have ongoing private contracts with the sheriff's patrol, particularly Plymouth and Brownstown townships as well as the city of Romulus. The board of commissioners action would phase out those contracts within 60 days.

"I plan to live up to those contractual agreements," he said. "And this legal action will give me the ability to go to court and ask for its support to fulfill the obligation."

Lucas also chastised the commissioners action by calling it "a callous way of doing things," as the sheriff's

department had no input in decision-making, and had rejected his suggestion to reconsider its cutback, Lucas said.

"We've been understaffed for many years and now we have nothing left to cut. Anymore would cripple us."

The department's strength peaked at almost 1,200 officers five years ago. It now has a staff of about 850. In eliminating 255 persons, the department would maintain only the staff needed to man both of its jails (in Westland and Detroit) as well as supply courtroom guards.

"This action would remove every officer from the street. What will happen to those people who call for help and there's no one there?"

Also critical to communities in western Wayne County would be the elimination of the department's motorized and mounted patrols of Hines Park. In the past year, increased incidents of rowdiness in the park brought much public outcry from bordering communities.

According to Lucas and sheriff's deputies, the recent addition of a mounted police force was supplemented by contributions as well as Lucas' own finances.

The department presently logs about 50,000 complaints annually.

Aside from the county's present plans to reduce its deficit, previous legal battles have colored the waters of police protection in Wayne County.

Major reason given by commissioners for the cutback is a 1974 court decision that restricts the county from dropping its manpower below a "minimum-manning" level.

In addition, Wayne County townships four years ago took the county to court over the funding of secondary road patrols. In this case, the townships attempted to secure patrols without direct payment for the service.

County faces decision on road patrol fate

The fate of most sheriff's department services in western Wayne County will be at stake Tuesday when county commissioners vote on a proposed \$300 million budget.

The Board of Commissioners, sitting as the Ways and Means Committee, voted early last week to eliminate the sheriff's Patrol and Investigation Division, with headquarters on Henry Ruff Road in Westland, effective Feb. 1.

More than 240 sheriff's deputies could be laid off if the division is

eliminated. The division contracts with three western Wayne communities, including Plymouth Township, for police services, and patrols Hines Park.

THE SHERIFF'S cut is expected to be the most controversial issue before the county board Tuesday. Citing what it deems to be a no-cut contract, except for the county jail annex staffing, the Wayne County Sheriff's Deputies Association could take the county to court if patrol and investigation is cut.

John Baier, president of the deputies union, called the county's planned cut "a very unrealistic approach to correcting the (county's) budget ills."

Eliminating the patrol and investigation division would save the county an estimated \$5 million annually. The proposed cut is part of an overall \$40 million budget trimming, including an estimated \$50 jobs.

Even with the cuts, the proposed budget is 4.5 percent larger than the current \$286.8 million budget. The

county is expected to end the budget year Nov. 30 with a \$19 million deficit.

CUTTING THE patrol and investigation division appears to be the only major cut proposed by the county Board of Auditors that the county commissioners agreed with.

The three-man board of auditors proposes the budget for the county board's action.

The commissioners restored their public relations department, the coop-

erative extension service, the county planning department and parks maintenance, all of which the auditors recommended be dropped.

County parks maintenance was given a recommended \$1.35 million budget for 1981, \$150,000 more than this year. The county road commission owns and operates the parks, but relies on the county general fund for the maintenance budget.

The cooperative extension division has a recommended \$309,000 recom-

mended budget. Commissioners also want their office of public information retained at a \$103,000 spending level.

The county law office budget was given a proposed \$398,000 increase over the auditor's recommendation. The extra appropriation would provide for hiring nine additional attorneys to handle increasing liability claims against the county hospital and sheriff's department.

History buffs eye land as possible site for park

Canton's history buffs are looking for a low-cost way to set up a historical park.

The Canton Historical Commission may ask the township to designate about four acres of land on Canton Center Road as a historical area, or to agree to a long-term lease at \$1 a year.

The land in question is south of Cherry Hill and belongs to the township. It surrounds the one-room Canton Center School, which already has been earmarked for use as a museum.

Researching the options is the Canton Historical Commission. The seven-member commission was organized last year to implement historical preservation, according to Lillian Hauk.

Mrs. Hauk is president of the historical commission and outgoing president of the historical society. She said the two groups try to "work hand in hand."

"THAT'S WHAT we're hoping for — to use the property for a historical (site)," said Mrs. Hauk. "This would have to go through the commission."

"We're biding our time, more or less," she added. "We just may go back to the board."

Mrs. Hauk said the acreage surrounding the school would be desirable "in case we get any historical homes. (But) I don't know the legal aspects about our taking the land at this time."

Mrs. Hauk said the historical society has been told it could have a small-sized "salt-box" style wooden structure, provided there is a place to put it. The society also would have to make arrangements to move it, said Mrs. Hauk.

She added that she was unsure of the present location of the structure, which was offered through a commission board member.

A salt box house is a square, plain building which was very popular in New England.

"I would surmise (the building) is in Canton," said Mrs. Hauk. "It was an early American design."

THE HISTORICAL Society last month drafted a letter asking the township board to "present" the schoolhouse and land surrounding it to the society.

However, that item was deleted from the board's agenda at the request of the historical society. Mrs. Hauk said more information needed to be gathered.

Attorney Eldon Johnson later said that as own-

ers, the society probably would be liable for property taxes. Johnson, a Canton resident, is working with the historical groups.

"The way I interpret the (state) statute is that the historical society isn't included in (non-profit) groups which are exempt from paying real estate taxes," said Johnson. "A historical society really can't afford to pay property taxes."

Johnson said the law specifically spells out which groups qualify for property property tax exemption. Groups which would qualify are Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, YMCA and colleges.

The attorney added that one option would be a 99-year lease at \$1 a year, "which I think would be beneficial to the township and to the citizens as a whole." He said he is looking into other possibilities.

TOWNSHIP PLANNER James Kosteva said another option would be for the township to designate a parcel of land for historical purposes.

Such is the case with the 103-acre Greenmead historical cluster located at Eight Mile and Newburgh roads in Livonia.

Greenmead is owned by the city of Livonia and operated by a historical commission. It contains houses, churches and other buildings reflecting earlier periods of Livonia's history.

"Certainly the land (on Canton Center Road) could remain in township ownership and simply (be) a township decision that the land would be used for those purposes," said Kosteva.

"It would still tax-exempt property," added Kosteva. "I don't see why the historical society would have to own it at all."

WHILE THOSE plans still are being discussed, work is continuing to restore the red brick Canton Center School for use as a museum.

Mrs. Hauk said the plumbing and furnace have been repaired, and she praised the assistance of township building inspectors.

The society has held some fund-raising events to help pay for costs, and clubs such as Rotary have also pledged to help.

"The Rotary has promised \$4,000 over a four-year period," said Mrs. Hauk.

"We're learning to be self-sufficient," she added. "We've come a long way, and I don't like to back-track."

BUT CZERNIAK said all the problems can't be the officials.

Some of the business people are "their own worst enemies," said Czerniak. "They'll sit in their stores all night griping about how bad business is, but they don't come to the meetings."

Czerniak pointed out that many small merchants hold down full-time jobs in addition to operating their businesses. He believes many don't know how to properly merchandise their products.

"I think there's more problems than what we've heard," said Czerniak.

Reaction to the public hearing was mixed. Neubauer noted the poor turnout and said he wasn't "necessarily discouraged."

"I think a lot of people have given up," said Neubauer.

Mrs. Attwood said she feels encouraged by the task force. Also positive were Jack Schoenborn and Detroit Tigers pitcher Milt Wilcox, who plan to open an athletic shoe store in Canton next year.

The Livonia couple, who have two grown sons, neither of whom has had

any problem with MD, had been invited to Las Vegas specifically to meet Lewis as part of Southland's "Oh, Thank Heavens" star awards. The event recognized the efforts of 7-Eleven managers nationwide for their role in raising more than \$4 million for "Jerry's kids."

INCLUDED IN the group was Alice Stothers, manager of a 7-Eleven store on Ann Arbor Road. It was through Mrs. Stothers' efforts that the Cencers received the invitation to attend the presentations and meet Lewis.

SC must cut \$300,000 more

Cutting a college budget 2.8 percent is tough enough. Making the cuts when more than half your money is spent is even tougher.

"We've got our work cut out for us," said C. Nelson Grote, president of Schoolcraft College, in the wake of Gov. William G. Milliken's budget cuts last week.

It was the second time this fiscal year the governor was forced by the state constitution to make cuts due to poor tax collections in a recession. The college's fiscal year began July 1.

"THEY HAVE reduced the state appropriation of all community colleges to \$122.4 million," Grote said.

"If we assume we'll get the same share of that as last year, we should receive \$4.7 million.

"We had estimated (in drawing up this fiscal year's budget) we would receive \$5.1 million. That's the figure after you take our 1979-80 appropriation and reduce it by 1.5 percent which would be a continuation budget.

"So now we are down \$393,000 less than we would have gotten with a continuation budget."

Culbert said he has received several job offers from law firms. He also was offered a job for some position in non-local government. He declined to specify the nature of that offer.

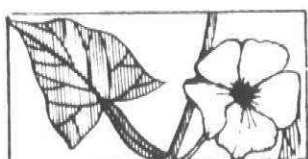

Taxi cab competition increases

Competition is healthy for some businesses. But to a lot of Southfield cab owners it's an occupational hazard.

Sure competition is the American way. Yet cabbies say they're finding it tougher and tougher to get along on their own four wheels in a limping economy and flooded taxi market.

Despite the jungle out there, some cab owners share a unique camaraderie — almost like a fraternal brotherhood. Then there are the "cutthroats" who'd stop at almost nothing in order to grab a fare.

Most Southfield taxi cab owners are still stinging from the added competition spurred by the Southfield City Council last summer. Council voted to raise the number of bond plates in the community from 30 to 40.

That's when 21 taxicab license holders took the city to court but lost their battle to stop the allocation of 10 more bond plates.

Disgruntled Southfield cab owners complain they're already saddled with a sluggish market and threatened by the growth of a "highly subsidized" mass transit system that's luring away riders with cheaper fares.

SOUTHFIELD Cab Co. has for many years been an association of independent owners of 24 taxis in the city. But the umbrella started to leak. Six owners of 18 cabs recently broke away and are starting their own company — Southfield Royal.

One of the principles is Bernard Wyler who owned nine taxis under the name of Southfield Cab Co. He's been in the business eight years and is one of the bond plate holders who filed the lawsuit against the city.

I was at the Southfield City Council meeting the night the cab owners protested against the 10 extra licenses. When the session was over, I got into my car and found it had died during the meeting.

Wyler and a couple of his cabbie buddies jumped the battery and even followed me home to be sure my car and I were O.K.

Wyler seems tough, rough and outspoken. But he's fiercely loyal to fellow cabbies, shares their problems and revels in their successes. He doesn't bad mouth Southfield Cab Co. but hints at "inner strife."

"**SOUTHFIELD CAB** is run by a lot of members of a family," he noted. "And it takes a lot of money to feed a family these days. We all understand that."

Russell Carr, who's been in the cab business 18 years, joined Southfield Royal. City Council at first refused to issue him a bondplate because he was a complainant in the lawsuit. He said he didn't see a need for more cab licenses but as long as they were being given out, he'd like to get one. He finally did.

Other members of the new company are Ben Kline, Larry Eddens, Doris Vestich and Vince Azzoli. Azzoli is a rotund, good natured guy who loves to play Santa Claus even when it isn't Christmas.

"There's nobody like Azzoli," Wyler said fondly. "He's always giving us bags of pistachio nuts and candy. We even help him deliver them to his pals and folks who are in bad economic straits. He doesn't have to dress like Santa. He is one."

Southfield Royal cabbies figure they're taking a risk. There are 38 taxis in the city owned by Southfield Yellow, Oak Park, Northwest, Diogenes, Southfield Red and White, West Oakland, Southfield and Southfield Royal cab companies.

"The city fathers wanted competition and they got it," Wyler said. "It would be a lot better if all cabs were under one central dispatch system to save costs. But since they aren't, we have to serve ourselves."

"One of the companies is going to fall by the wayside. It could be ours, so it's do or die. We wish there was enough business for all of us. But things are going to get worse before they get better."

Cabbies are a tough breed. They're knocking themselves out to hang in there — together.

County government 1980



There ain't nobody in charge

For the average voter, it's easy to figure out whom to vote for in the federal government. You vote for the president and vice president as a team, a couple of U.S. senators and your friendly local congressman — four altogether.

In county government, however, you have a nightmare wading through the list of persons to be elected.

The poor Wayne County voter puts up with a prosecutor, clerk, treasurer, sheriff, register of deeds, three members of the Board of Auditors and your friendly local commissioner. And even then, the voter doesn't know who's in charge.

It's somewhat better in Oakland County. A single county executive replaces the three-member Board of Auditors, and the executive is in charge of all departments that aren't under an elected chief. And the budget gets balanced.

A **WAYNE** County commissioner once explained why that government is in such a mess, runs eight-digit deficits year after year and has no accountability.

"A department head has no single boss to report to. He finds and cultivates 14 friendly commissioners out of the 27 and gets his budget passed."

"There's no one with overall authority to come up with a unified, balanced budget. A board of 27 can't administer county government."

Those may not have been Bill Joyner's exact words, but I have been faithful to his meaning.

HERE ARE SOME examples — half horrible, half comic — of how Wayne County government operates:

- Did you think the elected prosecutor is the chief lawyer for the county, the way the attorney general is for the U.S. government? Not so. Back in 1971, the Board of Commissioners set up an office of Corporation Counsel to handle civil matters. The

elected prosecutor, as I get the picture, handles mainly criminal matters.

- The Road Commission runs county parks, but the Sheriff's Department polices them.

- The County Planning Department plans use of county properties except for parks and roads. Those are planned by the staff of the Road Commission.

- Review and approval of new subdivisions is not a function of the county Planning Commission or Planning Department. It's a function of the Plat Board, which consists of the register of deeds (as chairman), the county clerk, the treasurer and the three members of the Board of Auditors.

- The drain commissioner administers the drain laws and gets into the business of storm and sanitary drains. Somewhere along the line, however, the Board of Commissioners gave the Road Commission authority over flood control of the Rouge River.

- The county clerk keeps birth and death records for all communities outside the city of Detroit. Just why Detroit, which has all its urban problems to deal with, handles its own birth and death records I cannot explain. They just do it that way.

- The Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service is the joint venture of the county government, Michigan State University and the federal government.

- The most important function of government — drafting the budget proposal — is handled by a three-member Board of Auditors. If you want to win some tavern bets, ask a political loudmouth to name all three. (How's this for balance: their names are Proctor, Kelly and Mrozowski. One is black, and you can guess the ancestry of the other two.)

- There is an office of the County Medical Examiner. Remember them? They lost track of the body of that Birmingham lawyer who died in a health club. Anyway, this function is under neither the sheriff nor the Health Department, but the 27-member Board of Commissioners. How's that for accountability?

- The Civil Defense office, which you would think would be under the sheriff, isn't. It's under the Board of Commissioners.

- You would guess the Bureau of Taxation would be under the treasurer, wouldn't you? Dummy. It, too, is under the Board of Commissioners.

- The Office of Program Development — now there's a logical function to be under the budget-making Board of Auditors, or possibly the Planning Department, right? Dummy, again. It's under the Board of Commissioners.

COUNTY GOVERNMENT is a jungle of tangled lines of authority, of little territorial claims of predators.

Perhaps the Wayne County Charter Commission can clean up some of the tangle, and maybe voters will adopt a county charter with a tough executive in it.

Meanwhile, the situation is like the cartoon in which a young draftee was about to become a civilian after two years of military service. His DI, a Sgt. Snorkel type, pleaded with the soldier to enlist, using as his clinching argument:

"You don't really want to be a civilian, do you? There ain't nobody in charge out there!"

Struggle for equality binds them

If you're a woman, the fight is the same.

That's what Mavis Arnold told a group of women political leaders last Sunday. They came to the home of Maryann Mahaffey, Detroit Councilperson, because the fight for equal rights is their fight.

A diverse group, they included a member of the governor's commission on aging, members of higher education boards, a Recorder's Court Judge, members of peace organizations, educators, a former Women's Democratic caucus chair, a member of the governor's council on medical issues and an executive assistant to Detroit Mayor Coleman Young.

From Detroit, the suburbs and outstate they came to hear how their Irish sisters are faring politically.

Mavis Arnold is the chairperson of the Women's Political Association in Ireland and a founding member of that group. Affiliated with the Irish National Union of journalists, she has written and recorded scripts for radio, magazines and has been a columnist and interviewer for a number of publications.

She came here to learn about how American women achieve their aims in the political arena and to compare their state with that of their Irish sisters.

"**THE WOMEN** listened and learned from her. 'Irish men are educated, but not their sisters,' she says. 'Girls are not taught math, physics, or chemistry and this is improving only slowly.'

"Before 1976, a husband could put his wife and children out on the streets at will."

"And we're trying to remove the title 'illegitimate' since women are increasingly keeping their babies born out of wedlock."

Ms. Arnold says there is some progress. "Now Irish women are beginning to get protection. There have been a number of Supreme Court decisions that have helped them."

"But women are still referred to as chattels under Irish law."

In a quiet voice accented with the brogue of the Dublin area, she described the growth of the female role in her country's politics.

"Women were part of the political scene, but just to make tea and lick the stamps," she said. "When the Women's Political Association formed in 1970, it had the name but just did polite things. We learned we had to politicize."

Irish women have a long way to go, just like their American sisters. In the Irish Senate today, there are 60 men and just seven women.

"And those seven are not feminists," Ms. Arnold

said. "Five are definitely not; two we're working on."

REGARDING national elections, she was appalled that our recent presidential campaign was such a marathon endeavor. "In our country, a government can stay five years, but you can call a snap election anytime."

"The election campaign would last three weeks, so you see the difference."

Another difference is that campaign funds are supposed to be supplied by the parties in Ireland. And "I'm appalled at what I've seen on your TV. It's wrong to slam your opponent in front of millions."

Ms. Arnold said she's been impressed by every woman she's met in her American travels. "American women have great confidence and are very articulate," she said. "So many of you have possession of power and political clout."

Southern Ireland is a very Catholic country where divorce is non-existent, but annulments can be arranged.

"The Pope said we shouldn't have a vocation outside of motherhood and I was angry," she says.

Ms. Arnold says we've won many of the battles already that Irish women are just now beginning to address.

We may be ahead in the battle for equality, but the fight ahead may be just as difficult as the way we've come before. It may be more difficult.

The christening of 'W.W.'

The question most asked of The Stroller as he moves along life's highway is:

Why not give the old colonel priority? And that's how the new babe came to be called Wilson William Edgar.

From the day his mother told him that story The Stroller took a dislike to the first name "Wilson." He used it as little as possible. But he couldn't avoid it — that is until he came to Detroit to take his first steps in metropolitan

journalism as a member of the sports staff at the Detroit Free Press.

You can imagine The Stroller's feelings as his baptized name was being tossed aside — even though he disliked it — and there was no telling what name he was going to be given.

Around the room there was all sorts of mumbling as the other staff members sought a name "with a ring to it."

Finally, a chap named Lloyd Northard, who hailed from Jackson, Michigan, spoke up with "Eddie" and explained that he thought the name Eddie Edgar had a nice sound to it.

The sports editor smiled and said, "That's it. From now on you'll be Eddie Edgar around here."

The Stroller had no choice in the matter.

So he became Eddie Edgar and the name has stuck — even to the point where an ice arena in Livonia is named for him.

The W.W. was tossed aside and The Stroller was happy to lose it.

Views on Dental Health

THUMB-SUCKING SYNDROME
Does thumb-sucking lead to crooked teeth? Most experts don't think occasional thumb-sucking in infancy causes any problems with teeth. But there is a general agreement among dentists that prolonged and intensive thumb-sucking past the time the first permanent teeth erupt — at 5 to 6 years of age — can lead to misshapen mouths and displaced teeth.
Actually, the position of individual teeth displaced by thumb-sucking is of less concern to orthodontists than the effect of the bony support of the teeth — and the development of abnormal, deforming muscle activity. If, for example, the habit persists past two years, it could alter the child's swallowing pattern. Once this happens, the youngster may develop a protrusion of the upper front teeth; a narrowness of the upper dental arch; and an obvious malocclusion (improper bite) problem.
As long as there are infants, there will be thumbsuckers. However, if the habit continues longer than usual, it's best to have the child checked by a dentist before it causes any problems.

Thanksgiving Blends Past and Present Traditions



Americans cherish memories of the family Thanksgiving table filled with wonderful food lovingly and painstakingly prepared over days and days. But times change, and with them, traditions. Today relatives may be 2000 miles away, and Mom's schedule may be as busy as Dad's, yet everyone still looks forward to the traditional feast of turkey, gravy, stuffing, vegetables and pie. Nowadays when daily schedules are so busy, the key to putting together a "best-ever" holiday feast is to have everyone help by making some dishes ahead.

Allow 1 to 1½ pounds of turkey for each person. Store the turkey in the freezer and then transfer it to a tray in the refrigerator before the feast for easy defrosting.

Gravy, an essential part of the holiday feast, can be started in advance, as can Cranberry-Pear Sauce. Since it's traditional to prepare enough turkey for leftovers, make extra gravy and double the recipe for Cranberry-Pear Sauce too. The stock for the gravy can be prepared the day before the feast. To make the stock, cover the turkey giblets and neck with plenty of water, then add onion, celery, other seasonings and a small bay leaf. Simmer until the giblets are tender, then strain and refrigerate the stock and chop and refrigerate the giblets.

On Thanksgiving, move the roast turkey from the pan to platter. For easier carving let it stand 15 to 20 minutes. During this time begin making the gravy by spooning excess fat from the juices in the roasting pan; then pour the turkey stock into the roasting pan. Stir the liquid over medium heat, taking care to loosen brown bits from the pan. Stir corn starch together with a little cold liquid, add to the hot stock and stir until the gravy has thickened. The rule of thumb is to use a tablespoonful of starch for every cup of liquid. If the gravy recipe in your family calls for flour, use half as much corn starch in its place. The corn starch lets the flavor of the pan juices and giblets come through without any pasty aftertaste, and the gravy has an attractive translucent appearance.

TURKEY THAWING TIPS

The preferred way to thaw a turkey is in its original wrapper on a tray in the refrigerator. Another acceptable quick method is to place the bird in the unopened wrapper in cool water. Change the water frequently. Do not thaw a turkey at room temperature.

In large saucepot place turkey giblets and neck, water, onion, celery, carrots, salt, bouillon cubes and bay leaves. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer 1-1/2 hours or until liquid is reduced by 1/2. Strain broth; reserve broth and giblets. Pour roasting pan drippings into large measuring cup. Let stand several minutes until fat drippings separate from turkey juices. Return 1/3 cup fat drippings to pan; discard remaining fat drippings. Add reserved broth to turkey juices to equal 5 cups. Sprinkle corn starch into drippings. Stir and cook over medium heat just until smooth; remove from heat. Gradually stir in broth until smooth. Return to heat. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat, stirring up brown bits from bottom of roasting pan and boil 1 minute. If desired, chop giblets and add to gravy. Makes 5 cups.

Alternate Method: Follow recipe for Turkey Gravy. Return 1/3 cup fat drippings and 4-1/2 cups turkey juices and broth to roasting pan. Stir together corn starch and remaining 1/2 cup turkey broth until smooth; add to roasting pan. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat, stirring up brown bits from bottom of pan and boil 1 minute. If desired, chop giblets and add to gravy. Makes 5 cups.



Vegetable Casserole

- 1/4 cup corn oil margarine
- 1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced (2 cups)
- 1 cup coarsely chopped onion
- 1/4 cup corn starch
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 3 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 pound Cheddar cheese, shredded

In 5-quart dutch oven or saucepot melt 1/4 cup margarine over medium heat. Add mushrooms and onion; cook, stirring occasionally, 5 minutes or until tender. In medium bowl stir together corn starch, salt and pepper. Gradually stir in milk until smooth. Stir into mushroom mixture. Add Worcestershire sauce. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in cheese until melted. Add potatoes, carrots and green beans; toss to coat well. Pour into 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish, or in 3-quart casserole. In small bowl stir together bread crumbs, margarine and parsley. Sprinkle over vegetable mixture. Bake in 325°F oven about 40 minutes or until heated through. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

Cranberry-Pear Sauce

- 2 cups cranberries
- 2 cups diced peeled pears
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts (optional)

In 3-quart saucepan stir together cranberries, pears, sugar, orange juice, cinnamon and ginger. Bring to boil over medium heat; reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes or until cranberry skins pop. Stir together corn starch and water until smooth. Stir into cranberry mixture. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Cover; refrigerate. If desired, just before serving, stir in walnuts. Makes 3 to 4 cups.

Note: Recipe may be doubled, and a portion used to make Cranberry Crunch Dessert.

A Question of Taste

Delectable fish dishes but no detectable odor

By the end of the two-hour class noses were quizzically sniffing the air and an audible murmur was passing through the capacity crowd. Finally, someone voiced the puzzlement of a good portion of the students: "Where is the fishy smell?" The corner in which we sat on the third floor of Hudson's Oakland was, indeed, remarkably free of even the hint of a fish odor — and that was after the preparation of five fish dishes and a fish glaze.

The question was a good one. Too many people never get beyond the smell of less-than-fresh fish, refusing to even taste it. Still others refuse to cook it in their homes for fear of the pervasive fishy odor which can linger after its preparation. These people reserve fish for an occasional restaurant treat.

Yvonne Gill's answer to the missing fish-smell riddle might be of interest to this latter group. In addition to the obvious element of freshness, she pointed out that method of preparation is the culprit: frying or broiling fish produces the strongest odors.

THE ENTIRE thrust of the Hudson's Fish Course was, in fact, a demonstration of alternative methods of preparation. Although the recipes used were creative and appetizing, Yvonne Gill constantly stressed that specific ingredients were interchangeable.

Different herbs could be used, different garnishes and even different fish. The recipes were simply representative of various approaches to cooking fish. Flexibility was the key word of the evening.

In one recipe, for example, Yvonne elected to use a red wine to dispel the notion that only white wine can be used with fish. If, on the other hand, someone cannot tolerate wine at all, she sug-

gested that they substitute fish stock made with water replacing the wine. While sauteeing some escalopes of striped bass in olive oil, she recommended replacing the olive with sesame oil and combining the fish with stir-fried vegetables for a marvelous Chinese dish. The point was to feel free to experiment, taste and then decide rather than being bound by recipes or rules.

Before the actual fish dishes, a Fish Glaze (a quick fish stock) and three "mother sauces" (Buerre Blanc, Vermouth and Vouvray) were prepared. About 30 different dishes could be prepared using just these three sauces.

THIS WAS FOLLOWED by a skillful demonstration of fish-filleting by Chef Dennis of Tweeny's. Although this was essentially visual, two points to keep in mind are: Keep the knife blade angled toward the bones, being careful not to slit the skin, and use a good fish-boning knife, which is more flexible than that used for meat and so is less likely to tear the delicate flesh of the fish.

Although fish fillets are readily available, three reasons were given for buying a whole fish and filleting it yourself: 1. You pay a better price per pound. 2. You get a better, fresher fish. 3. You can utilize the trimmings to make fish stock.

Having covered these basics, Yvonne Gill began to prepare the fish dishes themselves, dividing the methods of preparation into two categories. The first, called "New Ways with Fish," uses methods similar to that of the "nouvelle cuisine." These dishes consisted of lightly sauteed fish or shellfish napped with rich sauces containing no

flour, little butter, and a great deal of heavy cream. No salt is used, the flavor coming instead from acid, butter and shallots.

The second category was "Traditional Ways with Fish" and included baking in parchment, sauteeing and oven poaching.

The recipe given below for Escalope of Red Snapper or Striped Bass is taken from the first group, the Sauteed Swordfish Fillets a la Moutarde is from the second.

Since fall and spring are the best season for fish, this is a perfect time to experiment, and these recipes are mouth-watering enough to tempt even a restaurant-bound fish-lover to attempt them at home. For anyone who still prefers to leave the creativity and cooking to experts, Yvonne Gill did mention some other unusual, intriguing combinations she has created and serves at Tweeny's Cafe in Birmingham.

Swordfish served with fresh pineapple and tarragon sounded especially fascinating to me. Perhaps as a reward for learning to fillet a fish or as a source of inspiration — but, for those who want to get right down to business, here are the recipes Yvonne Gill shared with her students:

ESCALOPE OF RED SNAPPER OR STRIPED BASS WITH CHIVE SAUCE

2 lbs. skinned filleted fish
1 tbsp. olive oil
1 tsp. salt
2 tbsp. white wine

Slice fillet on an angle into ¼ inch

thick escalopes. Brush each side with oil and salt lightly. Preheat flat griddle to medium heat. Cook fish on one side until white and sprinkle with wine. Turn and cook on the other side and again sprinkle with wine. Cover fish with a lid or a plate and place griddle in a 500 degree oven for 4 to 6 minutes. The steam so created will continue the cooking process. Remove from oven and place fillets on a warm serving platter. Add any residue cooking juices to the chive sauce and pour it over the fish fillets. 4 servings.

CHIVE SAUCE

½ cup fish glaze
½ cup heavy cream
1-2 tbsp. Buerre Blanc
Juices from the fish
2 tbsp. minced chives

Combine fish glaze and cream and bring to a boil. Lower heat and whisk in beuree blanc liaison. Remove from heat and add chives. Pour sauce over snapper fillets.

GLAZE DE POISSON (Fish Glaze)

1 lb. fish trimmings
1 tbsp. sweet butter
2 tbsp. minced carrot
2 tbsp. minced leek
2 tbsp. minced onion
½ cup dry white wine
Water

Melt butter in a saute pan over medium heat. Add fish trimmings and saute until white. Move fish pieces to one side. Add vegetables to the pan and continue to cook until they are soft. Do not brown. Add white wine and reduce to half volume. Add enough water to cover fish trimmings and vegetables. Cover the pan and simmer for 15 min-

utes. Remove from heat and strain through a fine sieve.

BEURRE BLANC SAUCE

8 oz. finely minced shallots
(The shallots are essential — don't substitute onions!)
2½ cups dry white wine
1 tbsp. red wine vinegar
1 tbsp. heavy cream
16 oz. softened sweet butter

Combine shallots, wine and wine/vinegar in a heavy saucepan. Reduce to a glaze over medium heat. (About 2 tbsp. will remain. This will take about 40 minutes) Remove from heat and cook to tepid. Stir in heavy cream. Return to a very low heat and using a whip, whisk in the softened butter a knob at a time. Store in a clean container at room temperature. The sauce will thicken after about 2 to 3 hours.

SAUTEED SWORDFISH FILLETS a la Moutarde

4 8 oz. centre cut swordfish steaks (or lake trout, white fish, pickerel, or snapper)

3 tbsp. flour
Salt and pepper
1 tbsp. butter
1 tbsp. olive oil
½ cup white wine
¼ cup fish glaze (fumet)
1-2 tbsp. dijon mustard
1 tbsp. sweet butter
1 Northern Spy apple
2 tbsp. dried currants

Soak currants in warm white wine for 30 minutes. Drain and reserve currants and wine separately. Heat butter and oil in saute pan. Dip fish in flour seasoned with salt and pepper and add to the pan. Cook on each side 2-3 minutes depending on thickness of the fish. Remove fish and hold in a warm oven. Peel, core and thinly slice the apples. Add the apples to the pan and sautee over medium heat until cooked but still crisp. Remove apples and hold them with the fish. Deglaze pan with white wine and fumet. Reduce to ½ volume. Lower heat and whisk in mustard then butter. Add the soaked currants to the sauce. Pour sauce over the swordfish. 4 servings.

Keltic Lodge Dining Room Has Wraparound North Atlantic View

If fish is your fancy three times a day, you can have it at Keltic Lodge — a grand and sprawling resort set high on a promontory overlooking the North Atlantic on Nova Scotia's Cape Breton Island. There's Kipper Herring, smoked Cod or Cod Cakes for breakfast, perhaps cold lobster for lunch, and for dinner — from a menu which also features Ocean Perch, Cod and Haddock — you might select Sole & Scallops au gratin. The delicate flavored seafood is poached quickly, then combined with a wine-tarragon sauce, topped with Parmesan and bread crumbs and broiled until the topping is just golden brown.

Keltic Inn Sole Au Gratin 6 servings

2 lbs. frozen North Atlantic Sole Fillets
1 pkg. (12 oz.) frozen scallops
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs
*Tarragon Sauce

Allow fish to stand at room temperature 20 minutes unwrapped. Cut each semi-frozen block into 3 portions. In large skillet, poach fish in simmering salted water or court bouillon, 20 to 25 minutes or until fish is opaque and flakes easily with a fork. Remove fish and keep warm in an au gratin dish. Add scallops to poaching liquid and cook 5 to 8 minutes. Drain and place scallops around fish portions. Pour Tarragon Sauce over fish and scallops. Combine bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese. Sprinkle over top. Broil 3 inches from heat until lightly toasted.

*Tarragon Sauce

4 shallots, minced
1 cup white wine
1/2 cup tarragon vinegar
2 teaspoons tarragon
6 egg yolks
2 tablespoons water
1/2 pound butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash cayenne pepper

Cook shallots, wine, vinegar and tarragon until liquid is reduced to 1/4 cup. Strain and set aside. In double boiler, beat egg yolks and water until yolks are well mixed and slightly thickened. Gradually beat in butter, adding in thirds. Continue whisking until butter is absorbed and is thick. Remove from heat. Add strained tarragon mixture, salt and pepper.

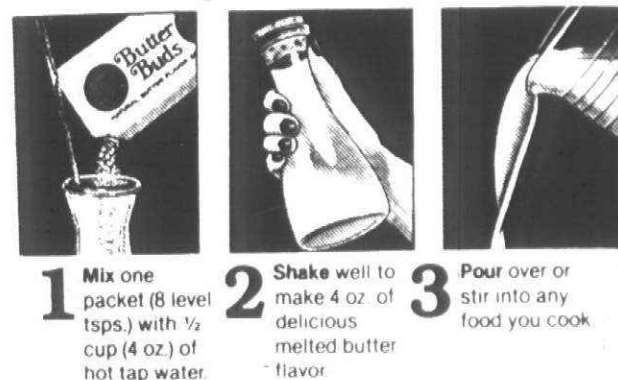

Free diabetes tests offered

Free blood tests to detect diabetes will be offered by 165 Michigan hospitals and health centers during Diabetes Detection Week, Nov. 16-22.

The statewide testing program is co-sponsored by the American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate (ADA-M) and is open to people older than 18.

Diabetes can produce severe complications if left untreated, yet may be present without symptoms. An estimated 200,000 persons in Michigan are diabetic and don't know it, according to statistics gathered by ADA-M.

Persons who run a high risk of devel-

oping diabetes are over 40 years of age, overweight and related to diabetics.

"They should be checked once a year," advises Dr. Nancy Caputo, the ADA-M detection chairwoman for the year.

OAKLAND County residents may attend one of five participating hospitals for their free test.

Botsford Hospital in Farmington Hills gives the tests from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, Nov. 17-21.

Crittendon Hospital in Rochester will

give the tests from 10 a.m.-noon and from 6-8 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 18-19, and from 10 a.m.-noon and 1-3 p.m. Friday, Nov. 21.

Henry Ford Hospital in West Bloomfield will give the tests anytime, 24 hours a day, Sunday through Saturday, Nov. 16-22.

Providence Hospital in Southfield offers the tests from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 19, only.

William Beaumont Hospital in Troy gives the tests from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, Nov. 17-21.

IN WAYNE COUNTY, the hospitals are:

Garden City Osteopathic Hospital hours are from 1:30-3:30 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, Nov. 17-21.

St. Mary Hospital in Livonia gives the tests from noon-8 p.m. Monday, Nov. 17 and Wednesday, Nov. 19; and from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 22.

Wayne County General Hospital in Westland offers the tests from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, Nov. 17-21.

DIABETES is a major cause of heart attacks, kidney failure, blindness and death.

The symptoms, when present, may include frequent urination, abnormal thirst, unusual hunger, rapid weight loss, itching, fatigue, blurred vision and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

Since diabetes is best detected after a meal high in sugars and starches, one of the following suggested meals should be eaten two hours before taking the test to ensure an accurate reading:

The suggested breakfast is fruit or juice, cereal with milk and sugar, buttered toast with jam, coffee or tea.

The suggested lunch is a bowl of soup, a sandwich, cake or pie and a glass of milk.

Nothing else should be eaten before the test, except for water.

The diabetes association asks that persons being tested bring along the name and address of their physician in the event that follow-up is needed.

All persons who test positively will be notified from the association, as well as their physician, within eight weeks.



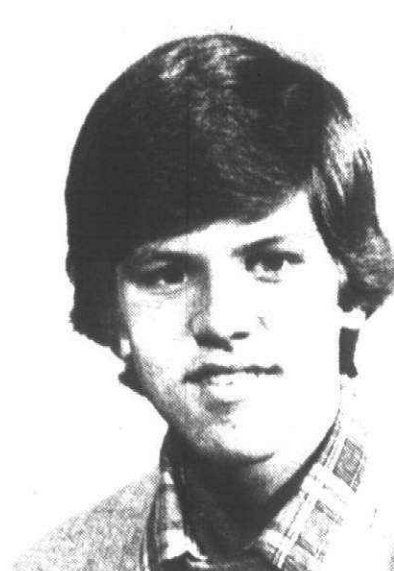

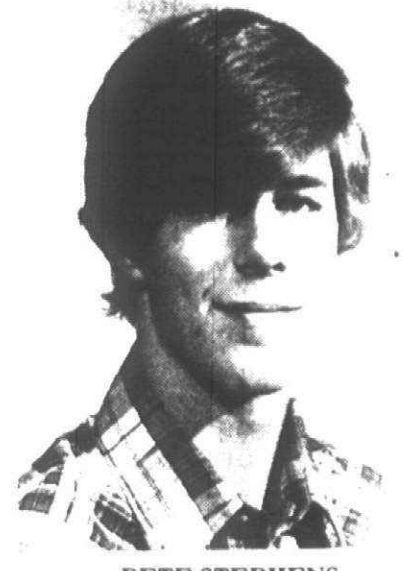

Four honorees are repeaters. Livonia Franklin's Paul Coburn made it for the third straight year.

Area teams also enjoyed banner seasons.

Plymouth Canton went to the state meet after finishing third in the regional as a team. Franklin won the Northwest Suburban League crown with John Glenn a close second.

FIRST TEAM

Mike Nugent, Catholic Central. A four-year varsity runner, Nugent enjoyed an outstanding year.

The Shamrock senior won the Class A regional race at Schoolcraft College with a time of 16:20.7. He was also first in the Lancer Invitational and placed fifth in the Catholic League.

The CC co-captain gained fifth in the Catholic-PSL meet and finished eighth in the prestigious West Bloomfield Invitational.

He was named All-Catholic and All-City for his efforts.

Paul Coburn, Livonia Franklin. The workhorse senior helped the Patriots to a league title by finishing fourth.

He grabbed third in the regional at Schoolcraft with a clocking of 16:26.2 and placed 14th in the Class A state finals at IMA Brookwood Golf Course near Flint two weeks ago.

The Patriot standout finished ninth in the Schoolcraft Invitational despite falling and won the Wayne Invitational. He is the Franklin home course record holder.

Coburn was also the team's co-captain.

Mike Stapleton, Garden City East. The Panther senior was the Northwest Suburban League champ and finished fifth in the Class A regional (16:30.5).

Stapleton set course marks this season at Redford Union and John Glenn. He finished 47th in the state meet.

A senior class president and member of the band, Stapleton is one of the top distance runners ever to perform at East.

Always near the front, Stapleton fin-

ished second at Schoolcraft, third at RU and fifth at Wayne — all invitationals.

Jeff Bristow, Livonia Franklin. The senior co-captain was one of the area's most consistent runners.

Named to the first team for the second straight year, Bristow's top performance came in the Schoolcraft meet when he finished third. He also gained third in the Northwest Suburban League meet just ahead of Coburn.

He placed ninth in the regional (16:50.4) and placed 41st in the Class A individual race.

Thomas Gavin, Redford Bishop Borgess. Only a junior, Gavin helped Borgess to a 5-2 dual-meet mark while winning three times and placing second three times.

He finished right behind Bristow in the Schoolcraft Invitational and took eighth in the Catholic-PSL meet.

Other high finishes included West Bloomfield (14th), Catholic League (11th) and Ferris State (4th).

Gavin is an All-League, All-City and All-Catholic choice.

Pete Stephens, Westland John Glenn. Another junior, Stephens was Glenn's top runner all season long and culminated a stellar regular season by finishing second in the Northwest Suburban League meet.

The Rocket all-leaguer placed 5th at the RU Invitational and gained seventh in the regional (16:44.8), as Glenn just missed qualifying its team for the finals.

Tom Gibson, Westland John Glenn. One of the youngest members of the squad (sophomore), Gibson just missed qualifying for the state meet with a 16th place finish in the regional.

He helped Glenn to a second place team finish in the Northwest Suburban League by placing fifth.

The young Rocket harrier was sixth in the RU Invitational.

Larry Gjernes, Livonia Stevenson. A senior, Gjernes was Stevenson's most valuable runner.

His best time on the hilly Cass Benton course was 15:57.

He placed third in the Livonia City Meet, fifth in the Inter-Lakes Conference meet and 14th at the West Bloomfield Invitational.

Gjernes posted a time of 16:43.1 to finish sixth in the regionals.

Steve West, Plymouth Canton. One of major reasons for Canton's best season ever in the school's short eight-year history.

He helped the Chiefs to a 10-1 dual-meet mark and a second place finish behind Northville in the Western Six League meet.

West finished third individually in the Western Six League meet and took 18th in both the regional and Schoolcraft events.

A senior, West garnered 22nd spot at RU as Canton finished fifth overall.

Scott Hand, Plymouth Canton. Another senior Chief standout, Hand was a steady team influence all fall.

He placed 10th in the Western Six League meet, 14th at RU and 21st in the regional (17:08.6).

Coach Jim Hayes described Hand as "one of our hardest workers."

A stiff Trenton zone defense gave the Rocks fits in the second half.

The Trojans built an eight-point lead early in the fourth quarter. Salem regained the lead when reserve Jeanine Papa stole the ball and passed to teammate Carol Ross, who converted a three-point play.

That gave Salem a 35-33 advantage with 3:41 to go.

SALEM, however, could score thereafter in regulation time.

Both teams traded turnovers until Mattice hit a short jumper with 27 seconds left to send it into overtime.

Salem center Cheryl Sobkow stole the ball with 11 seconds left and then lost it. Trenton pushed the ball down the floor to Nash, who just missed winning the game when her short banker rolled off the rim.

In the overtime, Salem jumped out to a 37-35 advantage when Sobkow hit a short jumper. Mattice's free throw cut the lead to one. Nash followed with a three-point play to give her team a 39-37 advantage with 1:25 to go.

Forty-three seconds later, Jacque Merrifield shot just off the free throw line to force another deadlock.

With 20 seconds left, Nash slipped inside and was fouled. She hit the first of two free throws, which later proved to be the winning margin.

Salem had trouble getting a shot off after Nash's free throw. Jan MacKenzie's attempt with two seconds left was batted out of bounds by the Trenton standout.

Blohm immediately call timeout to set up a play. Biedenbach followed with another timeout to check Salem's alignment.

When play resumed, MacKenzie inbounded the ball to Eileen Moore, whose desperation attempt from 20-feet fell short.

"I thought we made a good comeback," said Blohm. "We had our chances to win, but couldn't put it away."

"I'm not concerned about the shots we're getting. It's the shots we're not getting after we put it up."

"At times we forced the ball inside and passed up some good outside opportunities."

Sobkow and Moore led Salem in scoring with 10 points apiece.

Blohm must now be concerned with his last regular season game, Monday at Redford Union.

The Rocks will host the Class A district tournament beginning Wednesday.

Salem is now 15-4 overall and has three of its last four games. The victory lifts Trenton's mark also to 15-4.

Cultural Center set for skaters

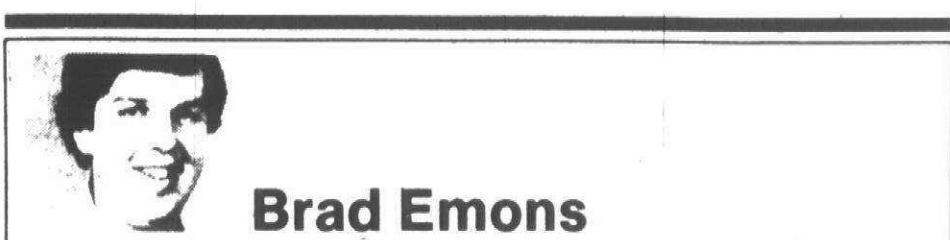
Supervisors of the Plymouth Cultural Center, host of the Great Lakes Eastern Figure Skating Championships, have been forced to revise their original plans.

Because of a flood of entries, 320 single skaters to be exact, city of Plymouth Recreation director Chuck Skene and assistant Paul Sincok must now find ways to expand their accommodations.

The job of hosting the championships is not an easy one. Skene and Sincok, however, are up to the challenge.

The city of Plymouth must also provide transportation to and from Detroit Metro Airport for incoming judges, whom will be stationed at the Mayflower Hotel.

Additional bleacher seating will be provided. The task must be completed in one day.

Another responsibility heaped on the city maintenance staff is the building and installing of a judges platform.

Sincok said ceremonial flags, insignia painting and rearranging of rooms are other duties required upon the staff.

"We'll have a ticket booth set up along with an expanded concession schedule," Sincok added. "Our multipurpose room will be turned into a

computer room for judges' scoring."

A LOCAL cable television company will supply video equipment, to make judging a little easier, according to Sincok.

"Myself, I estimate spending two to three hours a day just on this event," said Sincok. "Our job is to set up the building."

The Plymouth Recreation Department has a good track record. They've been outstanding in hosting softball tournaments and other various sporting events.

The Plymouth Skating Club, the official club hosts, must have taken Plymouth's past performances into consideration before bidding on the event.

That's a credit to the city and the Cultural Center. Since I arrived in Plymouth, I've always appreciated their help. They are well organized and will certainly be up to this task.

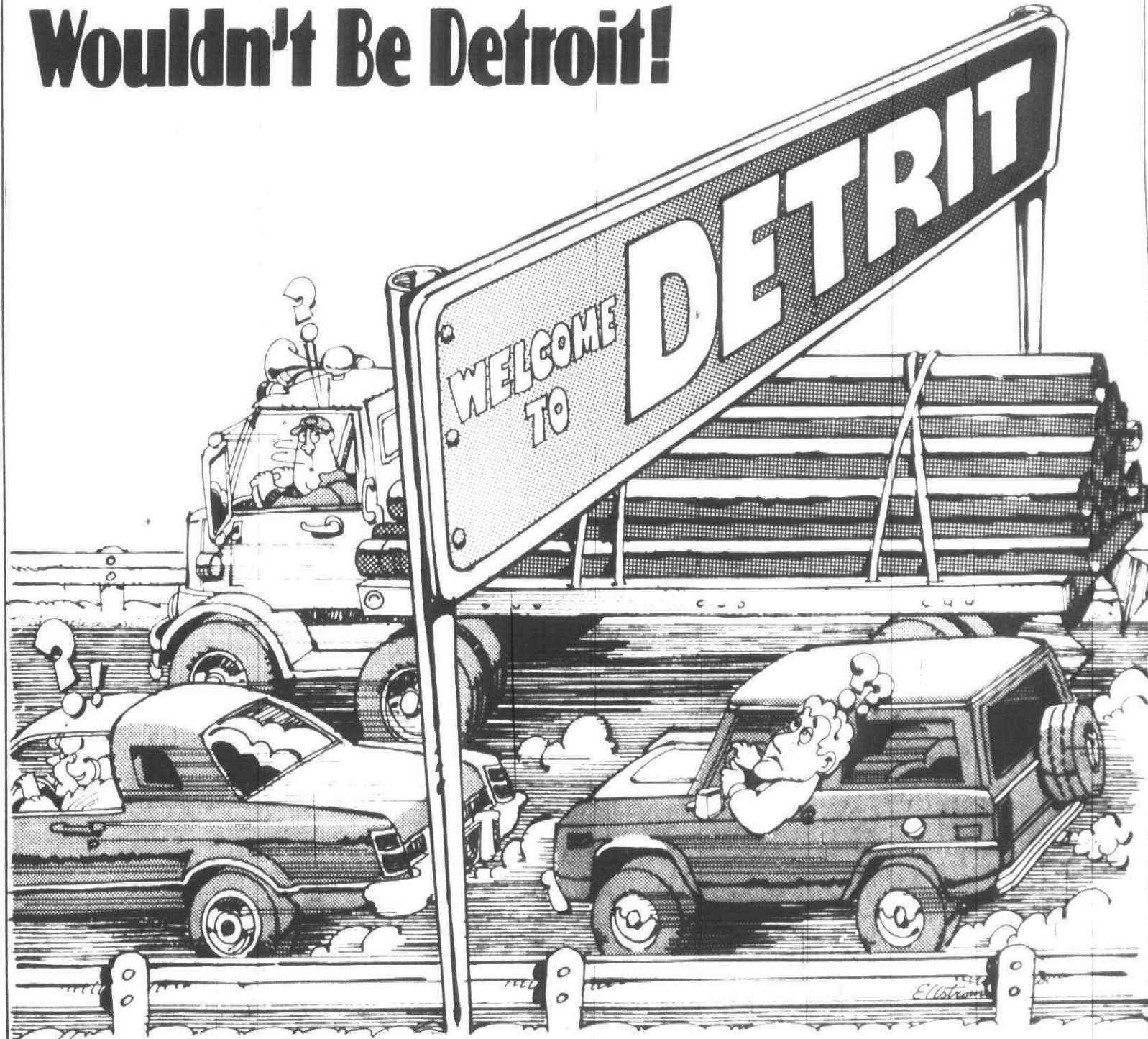

Bruce Dern is up to his neck in trouble in "Middle Age Crazy."

This film needs more craziness, or maybe less

From the song came the movie, "Middle Age Crazy" (R), a middle-aged film that's not crazy enough.

Director John Trent and writer Carl Kleinschmitt seem to lack the courage of any convictions. They couldn't decide whether to go for laughs or be serious, so they tried both and achieved neither.

"Middle Age Crazy" isn't funny enough to succeed as a comedy. Bruce Dern, the male lead, isn't a comic in the mold of Dudley Moore and "Middle Age Crazy" isn't a "10." Nor is the film substantial enough to succeed as a drama.

There is the occasional chuckle and thought-provoking moment, but they don't mesh in a meaningful way. They're separate incidents in a random film.

DERN IS the anxiety-ridden male who has just turned 40 and is caught up in a mid-life crisis. It is a relief to see him in something other than the psychotic-type roles which have frequently come his way, although the potential for the extreme still seems to lurk beneath the surface.

Actually, the one serio-comic episode that holds together occurs when Dern falls apart and runs about yelling, "I don't want to be the daddy anymore." He doesn't want responsibilities; he doesn't want to deal with his family's problems.

Then, as usually happens in this film, the material things get in the way. How much compassion can you muster for a man who has a loving family, a beautiful and sexy wife, a luxurious home with a patio, pool and hot tub and, to support all this, a successful contracting business?

O.K., so he builds taco stands for a living; still, he must be the most successful taco-stand builder north of the equator.

The argument is not that wealth precludes sensitivity, but that Dern's anxiety seems to center about brand names and fashions. Consequently, he hangs up his polyester suits for jeans and boots; he trades in his Olds for a \$40,000 Porsche; and he leaves his wife for a Dallas Cowgirl.

This last action is indeed puzzling. He shoves aside the pulchritudinous Ann-Margret when it seems her sole ambition as his wife is to give him sexual satisfaction. What does he expect from the Dallas Cowgirl, a discussion on nuclear non-proliferation?

After stepping out and acquiring new threads, new wheels and a new lady, is he happy? Of course not. Having acted out his fantasies, he returns to the verities — home, family, business.

It's a sequence of events which was clearly indicated from the beginning of the film. The comforting moral for would-be sinners: You can have your fling and then return to everything you left behind. Who said, "You can't go home again?"

Homes mirror lifestyle changes

In 80 years, the home, as an entity, has undergone some astounding changes.

Many of us are aware of these changes, but to have them put into an organized perspective — to be able to look at the home from both ends of the telescope — is a special treat.

That's what the new book, published by Holt, Rinehart and Winston, is all about — change, growth and development of the American home.

Mary Jane Pool, editor in chief of the magazine, was at Hudson's Northland store last week to show slides from the book, autograph copies and answer questions about interior design.

In order to have a fresh approach to the volume, which was two years in the planning, Miss Pool hired a young artist to pick out (in her judgement) the best, most interesting articles and photos from the magazine's 80-year history.

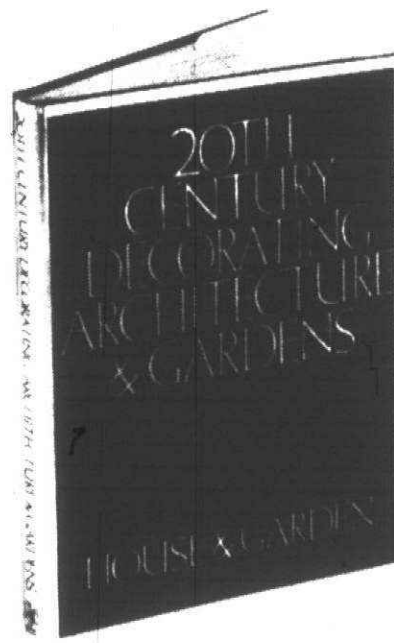
"I wanted her point of view — a young eye," said Miss Pool, "and her taste was failing."

These initial choices were refined and then Miss Pool went through the entire 80 years of issues herself.

The result of these combined efforts is "20th Century Decorating Architecture & Gardens," subtitled "80 Years of Ideas & Pleasure from House & Garden."

FROM A BROAD viewpoint, the changes in interior and exterior design reflect the changes in the general way of life. In the book, each decade is given a catch phrase. The 1900s is "Living with Tradition." In this decade, change was yet to come.

"Rustic furniture was the rage, and in 1906, wicker work was very stylish,"



Miss Pool told her audience.

A pleasant, attractive bungalow (called a box house then) could be built for \$1,000.

In the second decade of the century, titled "Living with Personality," the individual began to influence the environment, at least the few with money could influence their surroundings. The great art collections were established by the likes of the Mellon family. Enclosed porches became the rage and one of the burning decorating questions, Miss Pool said, was how to cover and disguise radiators.

Central heating had become a way of life, but the unsightly radiators that came with it presented challenges to test the ingenuity of the homemaker, or in this decade, the woman who presided over the home and saw that the servants did their assigned jobs.

Modernism and the influence of the Bauhaus movement with its philosophy

'Still, decorating today is more exciting and inventive than ever. More ideas are tried, more are accepted. Rather than reach a conditioned hand for French or Italian chair, young decorators are designing a great deal of their own furniture.'

— From a chapter in the book written by Billy Baldwin, interior decorator

of less is more had a decided impact on the 1920s.

"Elsie de Wolfe had turned decorating into a profession. Sleek design entered the picture and the radio and telephone became an important part of the background of the home.

While the 1920s are characterized as "Living with Technology," the '30s were designated as "Living with Modernism."

Glamor productions from Hollywood and three world's fairs greatly influenced design in the '30s, as did some of the great architects and designers such as Frank Lloyd Wright and Le Corbusier.

The circle, both literally and figuratively, was widely used and the clean, uncluttered look was coming into its own.

UTILITY AND international design characterized the decade of the '40s and in the book, homes of world famous personalities such as Ayn Rand, Paul McCobb, Walter Gropius, Dorothy Parker and Daphne du Maurier are featured.

"Living in a Glass House" is the chapter title for the 1950s. The home began to open up to include the out-

doors as exemplified by one designed by Saarinen, whose design established a relationship between the inside and outside.

The 1960s, "Living with Art," signaled the beginning of a trend that has taken hold today.

"Art was embraced by millions," Miss Pool said, "and the space rocket influenced everything."

Homes of collectors were decorated to be a simple backdrop for paintings and sculpture.

"In the '70s," Miss Pool said, "people were living with nature. Folk art was popular, handicrafts were popular. The garden came indoors and the sitting room went out into the garden."

NATURAL MATERIALS enjoyed renewed popularity and industrial materials provided a whole new resource for designers. Barn woods and barn spaces were popular.

Miss Pool told her audience, "Everytime we show a barn in the magazine, reader interest zooms up."

The quest for large, unusual space was strong in the '70s. Old warehouses, lofts and barns became important as dwelling places.

This first year of the '80s has seen energy move to the foreground.

Soft-studded snow tires are legal in Michigan

Regular studded tires are banned in Michigan. Only tires equipped with soft studs — those made of a soft metal — are permitted on Michigan roads during winter.

Tires with hard studs were banned in Michigan in 1975 because highway studies showed they cut deep ruts into the surface. Such grooves increase the chance of water building up, which can lead to dangerous "hydroplaning" of tires.

The soft-studded radial ply tires commercially known as "Perma-T-Grippers" are the only ones known by state engineers to meet state road standards.

SOFT-STUDDED TIRES may be used on Michigan roads north of a line from Mason to Arenac counties from Oct. 1 to May 1. Below that line, they are permitted from Nov. 15 to April 1.

Michigan drivers who violate the law could face up to a \$100 fine and/or up to 90 days in jail. State Police extend to out-of-state drivers traveling Michigan roads the same privileges for studded tires permitted in their home states.

However, Michigan drivers traveling on soft-studded tires in states where they are prohibited can be ticketed. The Auto Mobile Club of Michigan advises drivers to avoid use of studded tires in any state banning them. Studded tires are illegal at any time in neighboring Wisconsin and Ontario, Canada.

Seven other states in which studded tires are totally banned are: Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi and Texas.

THIRTY ONE STATES allow studded tires, with varying time restrictions. The District of Columbia permits studded tire use from Oct. 15 to April 15.

New Mexico permits studded tires, with no specific time limit, but law states they are permitted "only when required for safety because of . . . conditions causing a vehicle to skid," and the law is "subject to local interpretation." Utah allows tires with soft studs only, from Oct. 15 to March 31.

Eleven states have no restrictions. They are Alabama, Colorado, Georgia, Kentucky, New Hampshire, North Carolina, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont and Wyoming.

States in addition to Michigan allowing studded tires, with time restrictions are: Alaska, Sept. 15 to May 1 in the northern regions and Sept. 30 to April 15 south of the latitude 60 degrees north; Arizona, Oct. 1 to May 1; Arkansas, Nov. 15 to April 15; California, Oct. 1 to May 1.

Connecticut, Nov. 15 to April 1; Delaware, Oct. 15 to April 15; Idaho, Oct. 1 to April 15; Indiana, Oct. 1 to May 1; Iowa, Nov. 1 to April 1; Kansas, Nov. 1 to April 15; Maine, Oct. 2 to April 30; Maryland, Oct. 15 to April 15; Massachusetts, Nov. 2 to April 30; Missouri, Nov. 1 to March 31; Montana, Oct. 1 to May 31; Nebraska, Oct. 1 to April 15; Nevada, Oct. 1 to April 30; New Jersey, Nov. 15 to April 1; New York, Oct. 16 to April 30; North Dakota, Oct. 15 to April 15; Ohio, Nov. 1 to April 15.

Oklahoma, Nov. 1 to April 1; Oregon, Nov. 1 to April 30; Pennsylvania, Nov. 1 to April 1; Rhode Island, Nov. 15 to April 1; Virginia, Oct. 15 to April 15; Washington, Nov. 1 to April 1, and West Virginia, Nov. 1 to April 15.

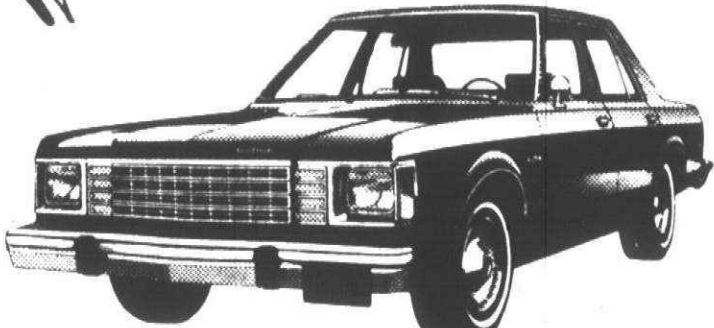

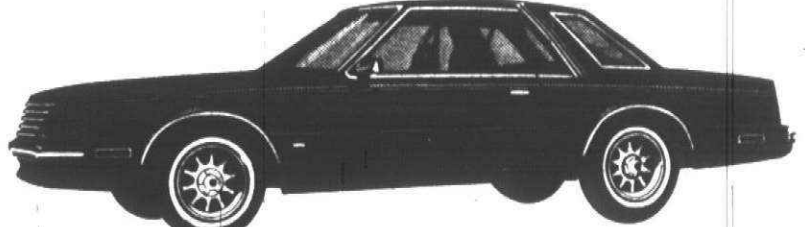
