## Board strips guns from ordinance officers

Canton Township ordinance officers have been stripped of the right to carry guns despite their claim that firearms are needed for self-defense and to avert potentially dangerous situations.

The new Township Board, which held its first regular meeting last Tuesday, wasted little time in revoking the year-old policy of arming the officers. Several members of the new board campaigned against the gun policy prior to the Nov. 4 election.

The four officials who voted to stop the practice based their decision on a

belief that guns invite violence and increase the potential for a liability suit against the township.

Ordinance officers, who have received the same firearm training as police, enforce non-criminal laws of the township, such as building codes, the sign ordinance and a prohibition against the storage of junk cars.

They claim that persons with access to guns and other weapons have threatened them on several occasions.

THE OLD Township Board authorized the officers to carry guns a year ago as a means for self-protection.

Officer Bruce Phillips insists that he and the other members of his department never have used weapons as an enforcement tool. Ordinance officers are told to call police for back-up when trouble is expected. But Phillips says that it often is difficult to call police after officers have entered a home or business.

"We never know what situation we're walking into," Phillips told the board. "We've put illegal operations and businesses out of operation. We've been involved in situations where there have been threats."

According to Phillips, an attorney's opinion issued a year ago equated the township's liability for an accidental shooting by an armed officer to its liability for an on-the-job injury of an unarmed officer.

Two of Canton's three officers — Fred Baker and Lloyd Young — carried guns while working in the ordinance division of the Garden City Police Department.

According to Phillips, all three are certified by the Wayne County Police Academy, the Michigan Law Enforcement Training Course and the National

Rifle Association of America. They have received similar training as police officers with the exception of some types of courses, such as riot control.

"I DON'T PRETEND for a moment that these officers aren't well-trained," said Trustee Robert Padgett, who placed the gun issue on the agenda. "But I don't think what we're creating out here is the Old West."

"It's my belief that guns to some extent create life-threatening situations. Without a gun, I become a coward and try to change the situation. With a gun,

I might be a little braver and add to the severity of the situation."

In the end, the board voted 4-3 to disarm the officers with dissenting votes from Treasurer Maria Falkiewicz, Trustee Carol Bodenmiller and Trustee Stephen Larson.

The decision followed an emotional debate and an attempt by Larson to table the matter until January. The three dissenters objected to the hastiness of the decision. Mrs. Bodenmiller accused the board of deciding the matter on "emotion."

## Officials eye other park buys

Local opposition to a 40-acre park near Ann Arbor and Napier roads has Canton officials looking for another possible park site.

The township had submitted application to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for matching grant funds to purchase the park site. Officials had planned to utilize the park for summer picnicking and winter sports.

DNR tentatively approved the application but opposition from residents of Pilgrim Hills — a subdivisions of one-acre lots near the proposed park site — has caused the township to take another look.

Residents first expressed opposition to the township board in early November. With most of that board replaced, the residents appeared before a new township board last week.

They claimed that location of a park near their homes will destroy the peace and quiet of their neighborhood in rural northwest Canton.

SUPERVISOR JAMES POOLE announced at the meeting that the grant possibly could be used for the purchase of park land in another area.

"There's no commitment by the

board. It's simply a matter of keeping our options open," said Trustee Robert Padgett of the township's submission of the final grant application.

The board must vote to accept the grant, which will finance half of the land's purchase price. The township must fund the other half.

According to grant coordinator Terry Carroll, the township submitted a final grant application to the DNR in or-

der to meet a Dec. 1 deadline of the state.

Carroll said the Township Board will hold a public hearing on the park proposal on either Dec. 16 or Jan. 6. The transcript of the hearing will be forwarded to the DNR. The state agency must forward the grant application to the federal Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service sometime in February or March.

The proposal for a park near Pilgrim Hills is in line with recommendations of the township's master recreation plan.

"Even under the best conditions, we feel this park would have a negative impact on our subdivision," resident Bob Miller told the Township Board last week.

## Poole ponders means to slash supervisor pay

Supervisor James Poole is looking for ways to deflate his own salary and fulfill a campaign promise he made last August.

Poole, who called the supervisor's salary too high during the campaign, wants to slash his salary from \$32,500 to \$26,000 a year.

A retired Air Force major, Poole collects a pension of \$15,000 a year in addition to his pay as Canton's chief elected official. He said during the campaign that he can afford to serve at a lower salary.

A state law which prohibits the lowering of an elected official's pay has placed some kinks in Poole's campaign pledge.

He has asked finance director Mike Gorman to request opinions from the Michigan Attorney General's Office and the Michigan Township Association (MTA) on possible loopholes in the law.

Trustee Robert Padgett has requested additional opinions on the \$75-per-meeting pay now earned by Canton's four trustees. Padgett would like to re-

place the per diem pay with a monthly salary in order to hold study sessions on Saturdays without burdening the township's budget.

Salaries for trustees and administrators were set by the old Township Board about a year ago. Administrators are scheduled to receive a pay hike Monday (today) that boosts the salary of the treasurer and clerk from \$27,500 to \$30,000 and the supervisor's pay from \$30,000 to \$32,500.

POOLE SAID he may donate \$6,500 of his salary to the township library and various church organizations if his plan for cutting his pay is ruled illegal.

At the first regular meeting of the new Township Board last Tuesday, Poole asked officials to waive his Dec. 1 pay hike.

"The law implies that you can eliminate a pay increase before it goes into effect," said Poole.

He also asked the board to authorize a slash in the supervisor's pay, subject to favorable opinions from the MTA and Attorney General's Office.

## Police cry fraud in reported B&E

Two Canton residents have been charged with attempted fraud after reporting the robbery of furnishings and clothing from their home on Oct. 17.

The goods, valued at \$22,700, later were found by police in the home of the suspects' friends, according to Lt. Larry Stewart.

Lafayette Vinson, owner of a home at 44170 Fair Oaks, filed a claim with Allstate Insurance Co. for that amount after reporting an Oct. 16 breaking and entering, Stewart said. According to the lieutenant, Allstate has not paid the claim to date.

Arraigned Tuesday on charges of conspiracy to obtain money under false pretenses were Vinson, 33, and Janice Cristobal, 29, also of 44170 Fair Oaks.

Judge James Garber of the 35th District Court entered pleas of not guilty on their behalf and scheduled preliminary examination for today. Vinson and Ms. Cristobal were released last week after posting personal bonds of \$10,000 each.

An attempted fraud conviction is a

felony which carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in jail and a \$15,000 fine.

ACCORDING TO STEWART, Vinson and Ms. Cristobal told Canton police on Oct. 17 that a burglar had stripped their home of practically all furnishings while they were away the previous night.

Among the items reported stolen were furniture, clothing, record albums, Christmas gifts, dishes, a microwave oven, window fans, tools and a 300-pound bag of detergent.

Stewart said police became suspicious because burglars "usually don't stop" to take wall decorations and all the clothes.

He said a neighbor told police that a rental truck had been parked in Vinson's driveway prior to the time of the alleged robbery.

According to Stewart, police are not seeking a warrant against the owners of the Canton home where the goods allegedly were found.

# Livonia is awarded bid for senior meal program

The city of Livonia has won the right to administer the senior citizen nutrition program for western Wayne County and downriver suburbs.

Among the nutrition sites affected are those at Tonquish Creek Manor in the city of Plymouth and Canton Recreation Hall in Canton Township.

The board of directors of the Out-County Area Agency on Aging met last week in a special session and voted to transfer control of the entire program from the county to Livonia.

The out-county group also passed a resolution asking the Wayne County Board of Commissioners to approve the continued use of kitchen facilities in Building J at Wayne County General Hospital, Merriman Road and Michigan Avenue in Westland.

**CONTROL OF** the program and the more than \$700,000 grant used to carry it out triggered a battle which has gone on for months between the Wayne County Office on Aging, headed by Dante DiVitto, and the out-county group — a cluster of 34 suburban communities, including Canton and Plymouth.

The board of directors meeting was a result of a directive issued by the State Commission on Services to the

Aging which found the county's application for funding invalid.

The state commission stated that the out-county group was correct in denying the Wayne County Office on Aging grant application on Sept. 11.

The state panel said the grant applications were invalid because the county group had not received prior approval from the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The state group also said the out-county board of directors erred when it reconsidered the application from DiVitto's office on Oct. 2.

**THE TRANSITION** of the nutrition program is expected to be completed by this coming Monday. The nutrition program serves more than half-million meals a year to senior citizens.

Joan Duggan, director of the program, pledged that the meal service to seniors won't be disrupted. She called last week's decision "the end of a five-year battle."

"There won't be any problem. There has never been an interruption of service nor will there be. There will be improvements."

"We were all set to go Oct. 1. We are ready to go now. I hope the county board will give us Building J. If the

board does, 't, we'll move the location (of the kitchen) but I don't think that will be necessary."

The meal program transfer is the latest in a struggle which started in September when the out-county group awarded the grant to Livonia. The city bid for the program because of what it charged, was "mismanagement" and "poor administration" by DiVitto.

DiVitto took his case to Wayne County Circuit Court and won a temporary reprieve pending further investigation. The case since has been transferred to federal court.

In the meantime, a compromise divided the money between Livonia and the county. Livonia received \$60,000 to provide home-delivered meals and another \$106,338 for lunches at 30 sites.

The county was awarded \$69,500 to serve meals at 15 sites. Livonia, however, administered all 45 sites.

That 90-day compromise plan was to have expired Dec. 31.

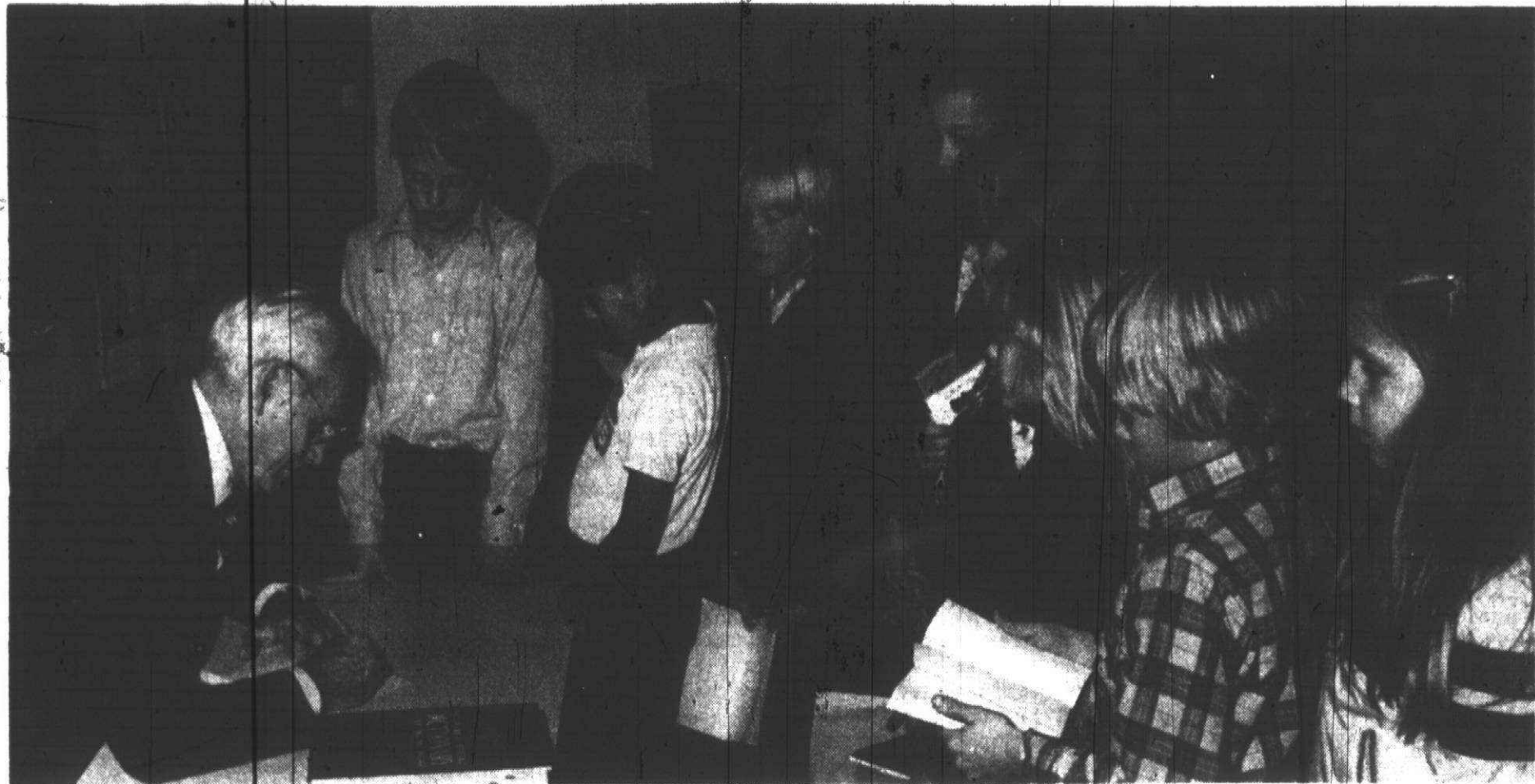

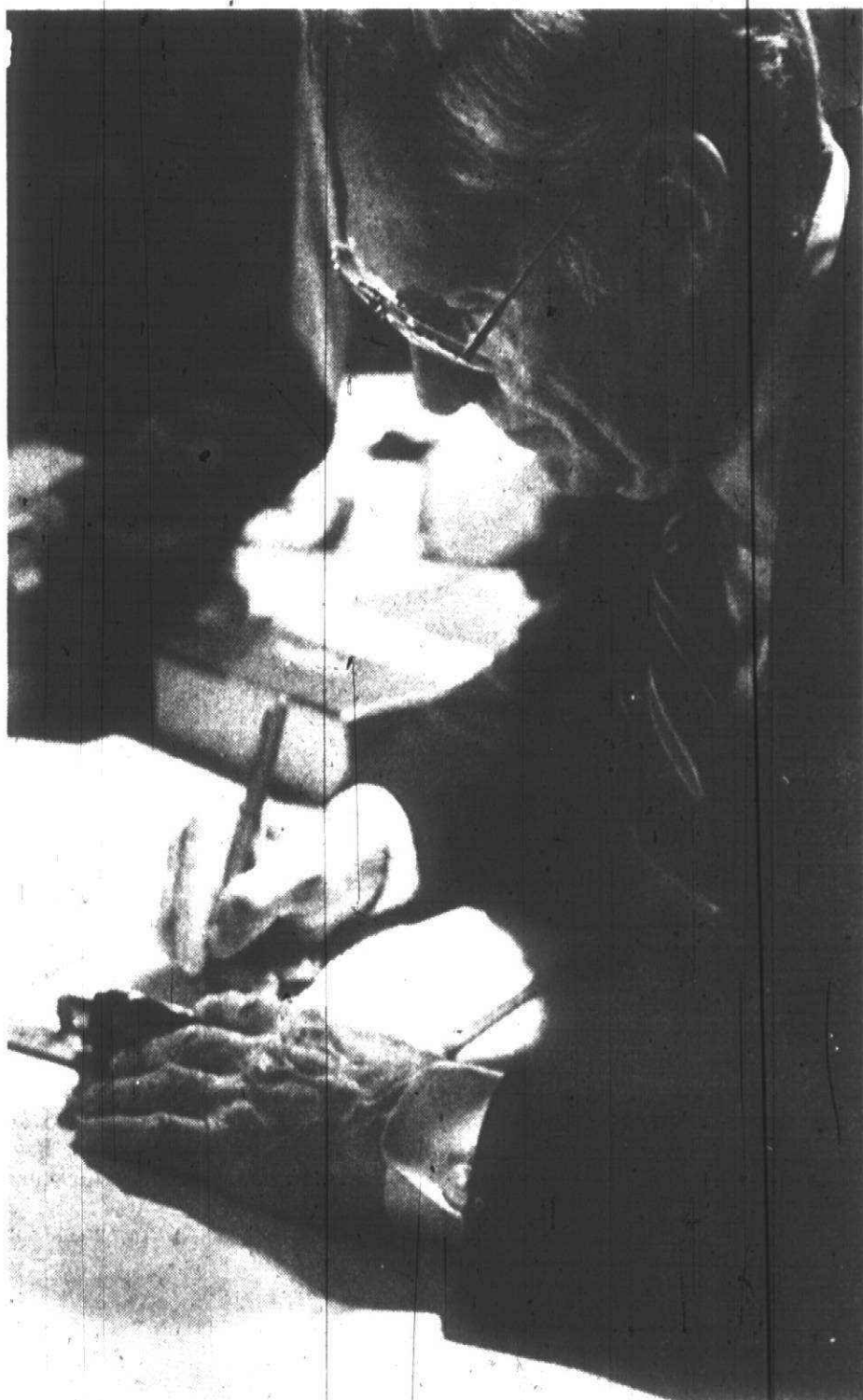

Mrs. Hulsing is the township clerk in Plymouth Township, and she served for 18 years on the Plymouth-Canton School Board.

### Despite mounted patrol cut

## Firefighters continue funding drive

The Canton firefighters' union is raising money for the Wayne County Sheriff's Department mounted division, despite threats that the unit will be dropped for lack of funds.

Firefighters are asking residents to bring returnable bottles and cans to boxes which have been set up at fire stations located at Cherry Hill and Canton Center roads, and at Warren and Haggerty roads.

Money raised will help offset expenses for food and veterinary bills for 10 horses which are used mostly to patrol county parks, including Hines. The horses are kept in a barn behind the sheriff's department facility off Henry Buff and Michigan Avenue in Westland.

"WE'RE TAKING whatever we can get," explained Jim Davison, president of the firefighters' union. "We're going to continue until we find out for sure (about cutbacks or) until (the fundraiser) runs itself out."

"They (the mounted unit) still need the money," he added.

Davison said the Apple Run Garden Club in Canton already has kicked in a \$100 donation for the fund-raising effort.

The mounted division is part of the sheriff's patrol unit, which is targeted for elimination in early 1981. Also set to be cut is the investigative division.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners on Nov. 18 adopted a \$300.3 million 1981 budget, which will take effect Dec. 1.

The board — facing chronic budget problems — funded the patrol and investigation division only through Jan. 31 to comply with the 60-day notice

required by the unions.

THE UNITS include the road patrol, which polices Hines Park, and contracted police services with Plymouth Township, Brownstown Township, Romulus and Metropolitan Airport. More than 240 positions would be eliminated.

But Wayne County Sheriff William Lucas has said he would file a lawsuit to block the cutbacks. Unions representing sergeants, deputies and lieutenants have expressed similar intentions.

In the meantime, a spokesman for the mounted division says his unit is "no-frills outfit," which always has been supported by "citizen donations."

Mike Harpster, the senior officer in the group, said the mounted unit was set up in August 1979 with donations of 10 horses and equipment. No new positions were created, because deputies were transferred from other patrol slots.

He added that only officers' salaries are paid through the county budget, and that the sheriff's department took out a \$5,000 loan to construct a shelter, pay veterinary fees and buy grain and medical supplies.

Harpster said that loan has been paid off. "We're a no-frills outfit," said Harpster. "The only way we have really made it is through citizen donations. It takes quite a bit (of money), but not as much as you would think."

He estimates the total cost of feeding and maintaining the 10 horses at about \$7,000 a year.

"It has been really effective in Hines," said Harpster. Besides patrolling parks, deputies give safety lectures to school children and take part in parades.

"I can't see how they (county) are going to save money (by eliminating the patrol)," said Harpster. "Layoffs. That's what it boils down to."

### Chamber sets hours

### Clerk Flodin is back at work

Clerk John Flodin was back on the job last week after a bout with mononucleosis and a one month's absence from Township Hall.

Flodin, 59, at first was diagnosed for hepatitis, a liver ailment. But the clerk said later tests revealed that mononucleosis had affected his liver

and spleen.

"I'm delighted not to have hepatitis," said Flodin, Canton's clerk since 1956. "I'm back to work. I missed it. It's terrible being home sick."

Flodin said he decided to return to work as soon as doctors told him that the disease no longer was infectious.

But a procedural mistake on the part of the new supervisor stymied his request for board action. Poole attempted to add the pay issue to the meeting's agenda after all other issues had been discussed or decided. A board rule requires officials to add items at the beginning of the meeting.

Despite the board's refusal to act on Poole's request, some officials indicated their opposition to the supervisor's pay-slashing idea.

"I hate to see the supervisor's pay reduced to a point unbecoming to the position," said Trustee Stephen Larson.

"If you reduce it by 20 percent (as requested by Poole), we'll find ourselves four years from now with a salary that only someone retired or independently wealthy can take."

POOLE'S PROPOSED \$26,000 supervisor's salary would place the

pay of Canton's chief administrator below the scale of all department heads. The elected clerk and treasurer also would earn \$4,000 a year more than Poole.

Poole should donate a portion of his salary, some board members have suggested, in order to keep the supervisor's pay at a level which will attract qualified candidates. But Gorman said a donation plan would force Poole to pay income tax on his entire pay.

Canton's new treasurer — Maria Falkiewicz — said implementation of Poole's plan could place her in an uncomfortable position.

"I'd feel very uncomfortable making more than the chief administrator," admitted Ms. Falkiewicz.

"I gave up an excellent opportunity for a lot more money in order to run for this job. The money isn't incentive. But right now, I'm working like 60 hours a week and it's total dedication to the job."

"It's hard for me to speak about his salary," she said of Poole. "If he can afford it, that's terrific. But I feel it could hurt others four years from now. How could the next supervisor justify bringing the salary up out of need?"

Clerk John Flodin, who earns the same wage as the treasurer, said he has not considered the impact of Poole's proposal on his position.

"It's his own business. He can do whatever he wants with his salary," said Flodin. "I might feel the same way. It just depends on your personal finances."

DURING THE ELECTION campaign, Poole also endorsed an investigation to the hiring of a township administrator to handle day-to-day tasks at Township Hall. He proposed a \$15,000 annual salary for the elected supervisor in the event that the administrator is hired.

In another pay issue, Padgett is endorsing a monthly salary for trustees

instead of the current pay of \$75 per meeting.

A pay deduction would be made if a trustee missed a meeting.

Padgett suggested the two-day orientation meeting held by the new board after the Nov. 20 swearing-in ceremonies. He has suggested a series of Saturday meetings to study specific issues, such as farmland preservation. "What I thought was lacking in the past was study sessions," said Padgett. "You don't resolve some of these things in a 30-minute period as part of the regular agenda."

"But I certainly would be more thrifty with special meetings and study sessions if there were reimbursement for trustees."

Flodin does not consider the two-day orientation meeting held by the board on Nov. 21 and 22 as a meeting, since no action or minutes were taken. Trustees will not be paid for those sessions.

## Faust backs proposal for property tax freeze

Sporting buttons with the slogan, "We got the message," State Senators Doug Ross (D-Southfield) and Bill Huffman (D-Madison Heights) and Senate Majority Leader William Faust (D-Westland) announced a plan to freeze all property taxes at their current level.

"Some of us in Lansing are getting the message," Ross said in a press conference at the Detroit Press Club Mon-

day. "Under our proposal, your 1981 tax bill would not be one penny more, unless a local millage is passed."

Ross indicated that, depending on the inflation rate, homeowners would receive a 10-to-15-percent cut in real cost of property taxes. Ross, who proposed the freeze and got the backing of Huffman and Faust, added that local governments and schools would bear the brunt of the \$400 million lost because of the freeze.

Property taxes support schools and

local governments, Ross said. Each would lose approximately \$200 million, but the state would help make up some of the losses to the schools with other program cuts.

"When 44 percent of the people vote for Tisch it has to tell you something," said Faust in reference to the Tisch tax proposal, a radical plan, according to most state and local politicians, that was defeated in the November election.

"With this proposal, we're saying to the taxpayers, 'Yes, we're going to do

something about this and within the next year.'"

THE FREEZE will last only one year, Faust said, adding that state legislators will have to do something about the property-tax situation within that time or the property-tax assessment will rise 20 to 30 percent for 1982 because of the inflation rate.

"Property taxes are grossly unfair," Faust said. "They're not assigned to wealth."

"There's no question about it — (property taxes) will be the main issue (in the Legislature) in the next year. I expect to see a special election for a constitutional change on property taxes."

If approved by the Legislature, the freeze will save residential and agricultural property owners approximately \$280 million, based on an estimated rise in property assessments of 10 percent. Businesses will save \$120 million based on a 7-percent increase in property assessment.

The three senators hoped the Legislature would pass the proposal by Christmas. Ross said the freeze would have to be signed into law by mid-Feb-

ruary before property assessments go out.

"I think, with the senate majority leader (Faust) and the vice-chairman of the appropriations committee (Huffman), we've got a good chance," Ross said of the proposal's odds for success. "I would hope this would get bipartisan backing since it is a bipartisan issue."

PART OF the reason for the proposal, Faust said, was to let people know that state government officials were aware of the property-tax problem and intended to do something about it.

"All the money goes to schools and local governments, none to the state but the people perceive it as if only the state can do something about it," Faust said.

"It would be nice if police officers, the military and ordinance officers didn't have to carry guns," said Larson. "But that's not the kind of society we live in."

"I think the worse thing I could face as a board member would be voting to remove their self-protection and then facing their widows if they were killed in the line of duty."

Mrs. Falkiewicz said after the meeting that she favors disarming the officers, but objected to making a decision before extensive study.

PHILLIPS, YOUNG and Baker

appeared dejected as they sipped pop in the employees' lounge after the vote and faced the prospect of reporting to work the following day without a gun.

"But there's no hard feelings about it," said Phillips. "It's definitely a hard decision for the board to make."

Phillips said policies on arming ordinance officers differs from community to community throughout the state. In some communities, ordinance officers carry guns, wear uniforms and work under the supervision of the police department.

In Canton, the officers staff a separate ordinance department and report to work in plain clothes.

## Construction of courthouse begins

Ground was broken Monday for a new 35th District courthouse.

The million-dollar court structure will be built at Haggerty and Plymouth Road in the city of Plymouth near Riverside Cemetery and Massey Field.

The courthouse, designed by architect Erick Carne of Plymouth, will serve the city of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville and Northville Township. It will replace the courthouses now operating out of city halls in Plymouth and Northville.

The move to build a new courthouse was promoted by crowded conditions at Plymouth City Hall and plans by city administrators to expand, a project now underway.

The city decided it could spend less on its city hall expansion if the court operation were moved to a separate building.

The judges already had put the city on notice that the court was outgrowing the space in city hall and needed more room.

Earlier, an attempt was made to have Canton join in an effort to build a unified courthouse for five communities, but Canton withdrew and is operating its courtroom in its new township administration building on South Canton Center Road.

James Poole, newly elected supervisor of Canton, reportedly has said he would reconsider the question of whether Canton should be involved with the new courthouse.

The city recently sold the bonds to

finance the new courthouse for \$1,385,000 to the First National Bank of Plymouth, the only bank to bid on the municipal bonds.

City Manager Henry Graper said he was pleased First National bid on the bonds because otherwise it would not be possible to begin construction now.

Graper said he was considering transferring city funds from National Bank of Detroit to First National Bank of Plymouth as a return favor for the bond offer.

# District studies sex ed proposal

Teaching family planning will be one of the topics under review soon by a new Wayne-Westland school district committee.

The committee, recently approved by the Board of Education, is required under Michigan's Public Act 226 of 1977, which permits the teaching of sex education in the schools. Committee members will spend at least the next year reviewing health-education materials used in the district, establishing a program of sex education for special-education students and studying the implementation of family-planning topics in the school program.

Those three goals are among the recommendations of an ad hoc committee which met last year to discuss the state law and its accompanying guidelines.

The new committee tentatively is expected to discuss what department and grade level sex education should be taught in for all students, the birth-control component and how sex education will fit into the general health course.

District administrators say that the goals, objectives and materials used in health and sex-education classes would largely be left up to the new advisory committee. That committee's report

will be made to the board within the next year-and-a-half, they add. It took six to seven years to devise the health program now used in the district.

Whatever sex-education program is developed, it will "always be made optional," said Dr. Clarice Stafford, who is assistant superintendent for curriculum in Wayne-Westland.

"Parents might feel uncomfortable if sex education was mandatory," she added. "But there is enough evidence to indicate that it is a need."

Jim Edwards, a curriculum director in the district, said that the new committee is still being formed. He said that members will include local clergymen, community health professionals, eight students, a teachers' union representative, junior and senior high teachers and administrators, and administrators from the curriculum and special-education departments.

Currently Wayne-Westland schools teach health education in fifth, sixth, eighth and ninth grades. In the fifth grade that program is limited to human growth and development. The focus changes somewhat in the sixth grade, where the male and female reproductive systems are discussed

with parental permission.

"We take a biological approach. A lot of time is spent on emotions, on things like girls developing more rapidly than boys and how that's reflected in everything from perspiration to acne," Edwards said. "We also have a brief shot on terminology of the body organs."

"But we don't moralize. Make sure parents know we don't moralize," added Edwards.

"If a student asks us about what it feels like, or about abortion, we tell them to talk with their moms and dads," he said.

"THOSE VALUES are taught at home and in church," added Dr. Stafford. "We teach knowledge and behavior and how to clarify those values, but we don't teach those values."

Abortion cannot be taught under current state guidelines, Edwards said.

"It's not a form of birth control. We cannot give any information on it," he said.

The health unit taught in the eighth and ninth grades is "more encompassing," Edwards said. It includes topics such as nutrition as well as reproductive health.

While birth control is not now being taught, it would become an option during the last three weeks of a proposed 10-week program. Parents could opt to keep their son or daughter out of that portion of the class. Administrators say that could be done without the students feeling as though they had been singled out from their classmates.

If Wayne-Westland approves a program for teaching sex education to special-education students, it will be the first district in the state to do so, Edwards said.

Those who teach the sex-education course must first comply with state requirements, including six hours of study in the biological and behavioral sciences and 20 hours of in-service, a letter of recommendation placed on file with the state Department of Education and proper supervision.

"This biological approach gives kids terms to talk about," said Edwards. "It helps relax parents and children. It's difficult for children to talk knowing only playground language."

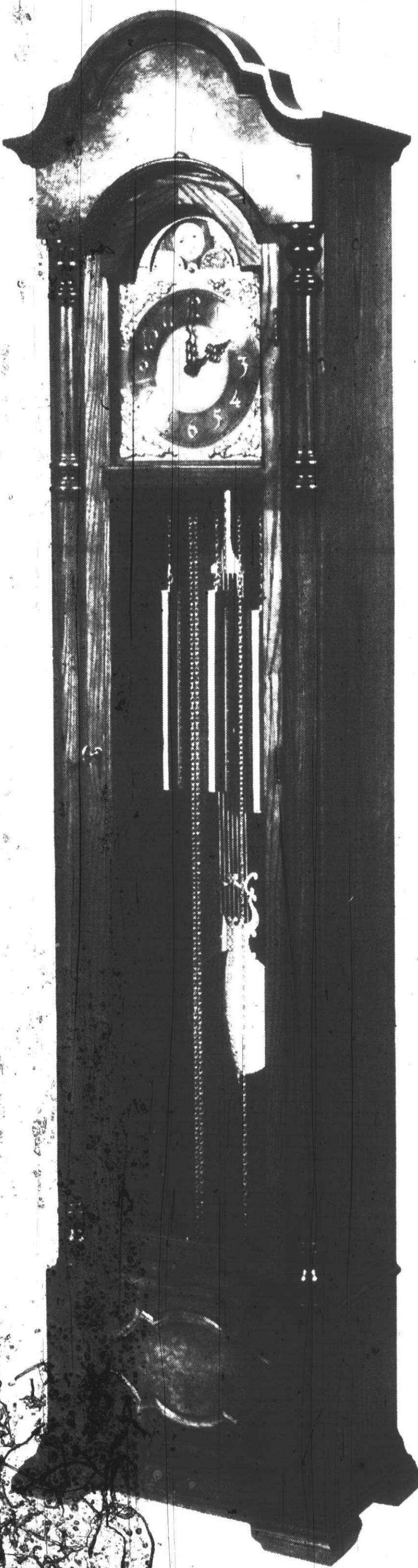
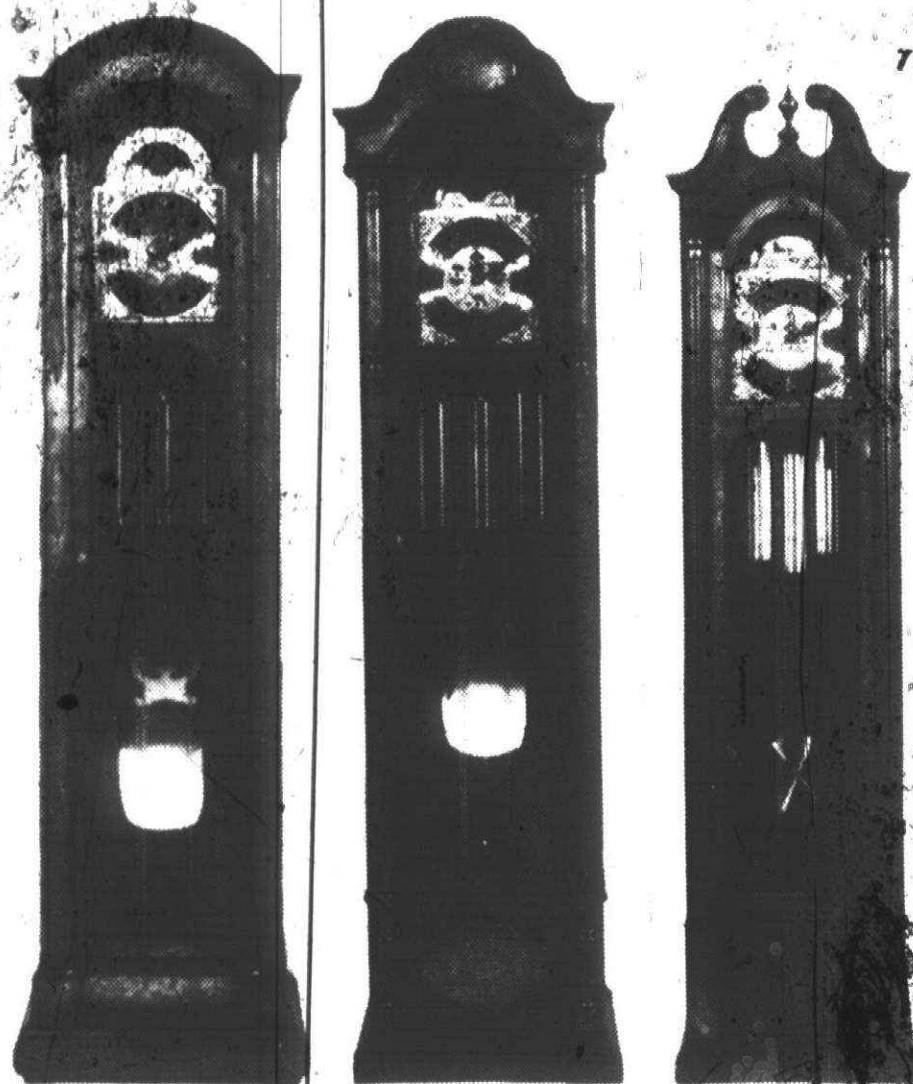

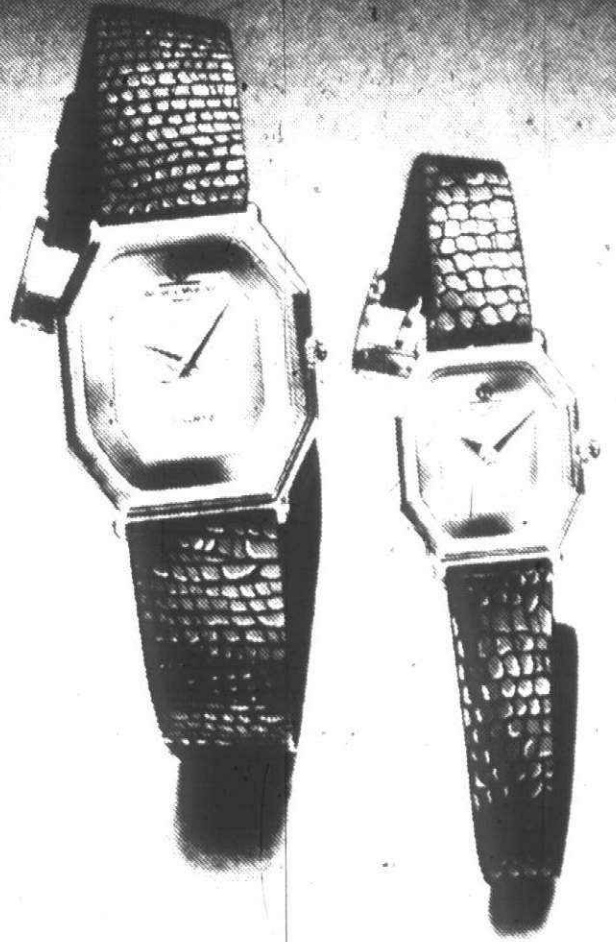

The Senate Majority Leader said he hopes the freeze would provide immediate help for the taxpayer without the drastic measures of proposals like Tisch, which called for a rollback in property assessments to the 1978 level and then halving that number.

Ross reasoned that it was unfair for the property taxpayer to pay while the state government came up with a fair

property-tax plan. He added that the freeze would affect the 1981-82 fiscal year.

"We'll have to work with Democrats and Republicans alike if we're going to pass it," Ross said. "I'm not worried about (another Tisch proposal) — he's failed twice already. I'm worried about my constituency."

Although Gov. William Milliken has announced other budget cuts in the past three months, Ross said the state may have to "squeeze programs even more."

"I think the people have spoken," Ross said. "What we have done in the short run is make inflation work for the property owners."

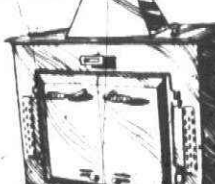

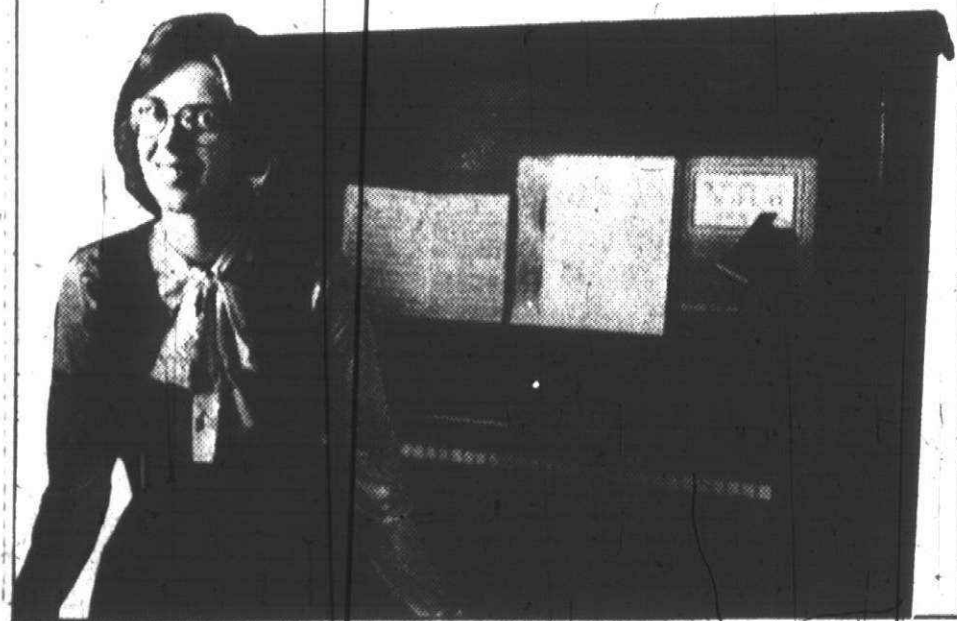

# Mentally retarded are made pawns

Editor:  
Regarding a recent editorial, the individuals who burned down the pro-

posed adult foster care home in Farmington are extremists. They do, however, share one thing in common with the

majority of neighborhood residents — a fear of that which they do not know or understand.

I would argue that the various agencies involved in this project have done nothing to dispel this fear but instead have fueled it. As a resident of Round Table Drive, I believe I can make this statement.

I first learned of our proposed adult foster care home along with the rest of the neighborhood through the Canton Observer — not from Alternative Services, not from the Northville institution, not through the state of Michigan. The Observer presented the facts as they knew them, but a lot of questions were left unanswered. Some time later, an official notice from the township with virtually no information arrived in the mail regarding the home.

Apparently, there was an uproar in the neighborhood, because the three agencies agreed to meet with the neighborhood residents. This did more harm than good.

For the most part, they did not answer questions directly; on more than one occasion they contradicted one another. They essentially appealed to our emotions, consciences and Christianity; they gave us the unmistakable impression that with three bureaucracies involved, no one is fundamentally accountable. And worst of all, they left us

no doubt that we were going to get an adult foster care home whether we liked it or not.

While I do not share the editorialist's messianic zeal, I have never been against the basic premise of getting the mentally retarded out of institutions and into a more meaningful place in society. There are certainly better ways to get this accomplished.

One solution is for willing couples to take in such individuals as dependents and household members with adequate stipends. If housing six or more individuals together is more cost-effective, then a more rural setting seems sensible. (Why are such densely populated areas selected?)

Perhaps better support services can be provided to parents of the mentally retarded so that fewer turn to institutions. At the very least, an effort must be made to pre-sell this idea and educate the population, and not unilaterally impose it.

The longer government and private agencies go about this business like thieves in the night, the longer the problems and resentment will exist.

And the pawns will continue to be those that are supposedly being helped — the mentally retarded.

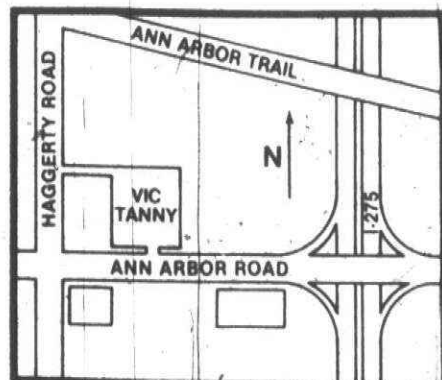

## 'Weekend' super hype falls flat

"Put a Little Weekend in your Week" is the new theme of the advertising campaign of Michelob, America's leading super premium beer.

Hot news, right? Well, Michelob decided to retire its "Weekends Are Made for Michelob" campaign after a successful run that "more than doubled" Michelob sales over the past four years.

"We're not walking away from the 'Weekends' idea, but rather we are broadening it," read the press release announcing this "unveiling" of the "evolutionary change" in the ad campaign.

The advertising hotshots behind this campaign decided it was time to link Michelob with "that weekend feeling" any day of the week. New music, celebrities and geographic "weekend" locations will accompany this theme we may expect to get as familiar with as Christmas at Halloween.

OBVIOUSLY, it wasn't enough for Michelob brainstrainers to begin airing these new commercials. They had to tell the media about it in a two-page press release.

Talk about your junk mail.

The amount of paper that gets dumped into an editor's wastebasket in one week could easily supply a school district with enough paper to avoid a millage campaign.

This particular announcement, with its emphasis on Michelob's "super premium" status was the straw that broke this editor's typewriter.

It isn't enough that we have to be inundated with ridiculous advertising radiating from television and radio, we have to be inundated with ridiculous puffery championing the puffery.

It isn't enough that these advertising wizards tried to persuade the nation that this particular brew marks the imbibor with an elite status; now they're going to try to persuade the imbibers that the brew will lift their social status any day of the week.

At the same time a few Americans are fighting a losing war against alcoholism, they have to contend with advertising that sends a message of "New York-style" or "California-style" guzzling of that truly elite brew.

So how come I'm picking on Michelob when there are so many other ridiculous ad campaigns to take on?

THIS ONE not only had the nerve to cross my desk at a bad time, it also had the effrontery to include such phrases as "consumer awareness" and

such sentences as: "The new campaign brings an energy and expansiveness to Michelob that is more in keeping with America in the 1980s."

New energy for the 1980s might be nice, but how can a depressant, such as beer, instill energy? The statement is the kind of paradox that gets you wondering about who wrote it.

Michelob's advertisers — D'Arcy, MacManus & Masius — credit their "weekend" campaign for making Michelob the seventh largest-selling beer in the U.S. and the country's dominant "super premium" beer.

Not discounting the fact that other "super premium" beers haven't challenged that claim, why spend the money for a new campaign?

Were the advertisers convinced that the "new energy" of the '80s might elicit a change in the habit of beer drinkers? Instead of struggling through a week at work to get to that wonderful weekend with Michelob, beer lovers might simply decide that they enjoyed working (that good ol' Protestant ethic rearing its nose-to-the-grindstone head).

If they decided they enjoyed weekdays at work as much as they enjoyed weekends with Michelob, they might get the crazy notion that the "super premium" beer had little to do with their happiness.

Or maybe the creative genius behind this campaign had a premonition that four years of weekend Michelob might get the same treatment that four years of Jimmy Carter incited.

IN A NEW age of promised prosperity, "Super premium beer goes weekdays" probably sounded like a surefire gimmick. But the advertising geniuses might have gone astray here.

A few studies have shown that three-day and four-day weekends aren't exactly doing too well at the polls. They're too expensive.

Maybe that's the fault of that "super premium" beer on the weekends.

## Farm work pays more than wages for state youth

They just don't understand. I'm talking about the city slickers in the Michigan Department of Labor (MDL).

Apparently the MDL thinks that all farmers are just a bunch of country bumpkins who can't manage their own affairs. Horsefeathers!

You see, the MDL is recommending that its own farm youth safety standards be adopted instead of the federal guidelines. That, says a Michigan State University safety specialist, would practically prevent 16- and 17-year-olds from doing productive farm work.

That proposal follows five hearings last spring on the subject.

"Those five hearings resulted in 498 pages of testimony and 233 items of correspondence that were 100 percent against the MDL proposal," said MSU's Richard G. Kistner.

Opposition to the proposal came not only from farmers, parents and youths, but also from agricultural safety experts, including the labor department's agricultural labor commission, according to an MSU news release.

Pfister believes those state standards would keep Michigan among the states with the highest youth unemployment rates in the nation.

UNDOUBTEDLY, the labor dudes have some real concerns about safety. But farm folks aren't yokels who disregard the safety of their young.

Farmers have feelings, too. They do love their kids. Parents also need help with the farmwork. And kids need to earn a little dough.

Work teaches kids things about responsibility, proper job attitudes and handling money. Earnings also help keep kids out of their parents' pocket-books.

Maybe if more city kids got off their duffs to do a little more work, they'd get into a little less trouble.

Right now I live in a real city of about 80,000 people. I used to live in a rural township where garbage was picked up once every two weeks and where the school system should have been placed out at the curb, if there had been any.

There are reasons for living in the city, like good schools, libraries, opportunities, challenges, neighborhood stores, roads and services.

But there are things about working on a farm that city life can never teach you.

WE SHARED a three-acre farm, if you can call three acres a farm, with a couple dozen chickens and two cows. The cows were only temporary, since they ended up in the freezer.

My son earned 25 cents a week at the age of 3 for collecting the eggs each day. Now, I'm not looking to be turned in for violating child labor laws.

I just want you to know about some of the things we both learned from the experience. Things like where not to step. And how you never turn your back on a cow and then bend over.

But we also learned about caring for other living things — things that sometimes are so fragile they get sick and die for no apparent reason.

And sometimes farm work includes doing things so special that no safety standard should prevent a youngster from experiencing what earnings from any other job could never compensate for missing.

Things like the feeling you get reaching for a warm egg from a nest for Sunday breakfast.

The MDL is scheduling another hearing on farm youth employment at 10 a.m. Dec. 4 in the Olin Baker West Building, rooms 1 B&C, Michigan Department of Health complex, 35000 N. Logan Street, Lansing. ## Marching to the Pentagon's tune

If the Pentagon wants our sons or daughters, it should be prepared to handle them with care and loyalty.

Exposing soldiers to radiation and toxic herbicides isn't the way to attract new members to the modern Army.

Soldiers were purposefully exposed to the radiation of exploding atomic bombs in the 1950s. American GIs in Vietnam were forced to live with the herbicide Agent Orange through the 1960s and '70s.

In both cases, those involved claimed that the government failed to pay sufficient attention to the health damage caused by the exposure to radiation or the herbicide.

It was not that the Pentagon was unaware of the dangers of radiation when it marched thousands of soldiers close to the Nevada atomic bomb tests. The radiation threat demonstrated by the Hiroshima bomb horrified people.

American medical personnel arrived in that Japanese city about a month after the bomb was dropped in the summer of 1945.

By then the population already was showing the effects of toxic radiation. They were bleeding from the mouth and rectum and dying suddenly with strange spots on their bodies. The expression "bomb disease" entered the Japanese vocabulary.

BUT EVIDENTLY the government wanted more information on radiation. That's why some of the soldiers who were marched close to the Nevada atomic explosions now refer to themselves as guinea pigs.

In 1979, Time magazine looked back at the situation: "Almost every time the old Atomic Energy Commission was asked by the military to permit troops closer to ground zero or increase their radiation exposure, the AEC ignored its own safety standards and acquiesced."

In March 1952, the Pentagon asked that its men be able to move closer to the test than the AEC wanted, placing them within four miles of the blast. In October 1952, Time said the Pentagon was asking the AEC to raise the level of ionizing radiation the soldiers could receive.

That scarcely sounds like an army that believes in protecting its men.

IN 1970, THE PENTAGON announced it was banning use of Agent Orange in Vietnam because it posed "imminent danger" to women in childbearing years. That's particularly interesting considering the U.S. government did not ban use of Agent Orange in this country until last year. Even then the ban was termed a temporary one and excluded rice fields and grazing lands.

As those millions of tons of defoliants drifted down on Vietnam, U.S. troops were underneath. Today those troops claim this contact is causing everything from blackouts and psychological disorders to cancer and birth defects in their children.

Jim Dries, a former resident of Redford Township who once was a carrier for this paper, was one of those servicemen in Vietnam who looked up and saw the spraying. However, he has felt no ill effects. "To find out now it was heavily contaminated with long-term poisons is upsetting," says Dries, who is head of the Washtenaw Committee of Vietnam Era Veterans.

Agent Orange contains dioxin, which is regarded as one of the most deadly of substances. Back in 1962, Rachel Carson warned in "Silent Spring" that one of its components could damage chromosomes.

"Nobody argues about the toxicity of this poison," says Harvard professor Dr. Matthew Messelson. He added that it is beginning to be regarded as the most powerful carcinogen known.

Soldiers involved with Agent Orange found it difficult at first to get the attention of the Veterans Administration. (Those exposed to the atomic blasts have been having similar troubles.) Local vets held a rally in Hines Park to complain about lack of information about the herbicide and the slow re-

ceipt of benefits.

Michigan vets rallied in August at the VA hospital in Ann Arbor for longer testing hours. As a result, the hospital held a series of Saturday clinics for these men.

"For more than a year we have been offering a physical to all Vietnam veterans who feel they have some exposure to Agent Orange," said hospital spokeswoman June Weltman. Results will be sent to the VA data base in Washington to be used as part of an epidemiological study of Agent Orange, she added.

DREIS SAYS he's satisfied with the Ann Arbor VA hospital's handling of people requesting appointments. However, Tom Hoiles, president of Michigan Association of Concerned Vets, had a complaint about the VA hospital in Battle Creek.

They told a vet, "You don't have it," he said. Yet the test involved "only a urinalysis and blood test."

As a counselor at Battle Creek Community College, Hoiles has counseled some of these Agent Orange vets.

"I've never seen anything more debilitating to a man than the possibility that he has been exposed to Agent Orange," he said. "No one can tell him anything. Do the blackouts he's been having mean a brain tumor? Will his children be born deformed? Is his deformed child his fault?"

What the Agent Orange vets are asking is that adequate testing and medical service be provided for those with known symptoms, he explained.

"Some vets have been unable to work because of their exposure," he noted. "They need some way to maintain their families. They want the same things given to the wounded in the war."

Arguments will continue about who is to blame. Chemical companies like Dow of Midland, which made the components of the herbicide, says the Pentagon is to blame. The Pentagon claims more tests are needed to establish why the men are sick.

Meanwhile, if the Pentagon wants to have any kind of a decent image with men and women it hopes to recruit, it should look after those men who would probably not be sick today had they not been in the service.

## An 'inside' view of the Blundix brouhaha

In recent weeks the reading and viewing public has been inundated with stories about a Southfield-based corporation, its 42-year-old president and a 29-year-old female executive. Although the story has been told, and told, we offer a new perspective, from an inside source who was on hand for the crucial decisions in this saga. Following is an interview with Fred Flack, former director of corporate public relations for Blundix Corp.

Q. Mr. Flack, it appears that the publicity over Blundix, its president and his relationship with a woman executive has abated. Do you think the publicity has helped or hurt the corporation's image?

A. In keeping with the forthright, open, candid style of our dynamic young president, Mr. William Hazee, I would have to say that the whole experience was the worst public relations disaster since Dita Beard, ITT and Howard Hunt met in a hospital room.

Q. Very candid, but are there no benefits to the company?

A. Well, most people still think we make washing machines. The business world corporate leaders are laughing their ledgers off. Mr. Hazee will now have to work harder than ever and the entire organization is wondering whether we are going to be on "Soap."

Q. How did this come about?

A. It goes back to our corporate quest for dynamic young executives who have the energy, vision, daring and intelligence to take Blundix from being a narrowly specialized company into a technocratic giant. As a consequence, we hired a young woman who had all these qualities. Unfortunately, she happened to be a knockout, if you know what I mean.

Q. So what?

A. Well, when it became necessary for this president and this, er, woman executive to spend days and evenings and conventions together, other executives felt jealous and wrote poison pen letters to local newspapers. But Mr. Hazee had a solution.

Q. Which was?

A. Forthright, candid openness with our employees and the newspapers. This was against the advice of the Old Guard which advocated the old way of doing things — clandestine, corporate silence about everything except the profit and loss statement.

Q. What did you advise?

A. What I usually advise: "The best comment is to answer a different question than the one being asked." Frankly, however, I thought a speculative, rumor-filled story about a company president and a woman vice president was too sensational to attract much attention from the traditional news media and at best the story would last no longer than a day or two.

Q. What happened?

A. The story dragged on for weeks. All the local newspapers and local television stations carried it, as did the New York Times, Washington Post,

Newsweek, Time and the National Lampoon.

Q. Why do you think that was?

A. Well, everyone claimed that they were writing about the problems of women executives in general and how this case constituted the tip of the iceberg in the unending quest for women executives to make headway in the chauvinistic corporate world.

Q. What do you think?

A. We were the only company in the U.S. with a candid, open policy and a 29-year-old executive who is also a blond knockout.

Q. What happened after the publicity?

A. The woman executive decided that rumor, speculation and innuendo, as well as the attitude of the board of directors, made her ineffective and she resigned. The Old Guard is mollified. Mr. Hazee is distraught and I am out of a job.

Q. Why are you out of a job?

A. For not advising everyone of the true nature of corporate publicity and for not muzzling the forthright, candid, open style of presidency when you have a 29-year-old blond knockout vice president.

Q. You don't seem upset.

A. No. The new corporate policy, which is the old corporate policy — "Never complain, never explain, never get on the front page, never let the troops know what is really going on and no more knockouts in the executive suite" — is not to my liking. Besides, I have a \$200,000 contract to write a television pilot. It's patterned after "Dallas" and concerns this conglomerate and its dynamic 42-year-old president who has a young woman executive. ### PLAQUE POINTERS

Plaque is probably the biggest cause of tooth decay and eventual loss. What is it - how do we acquire it - and how do we control it?

Plaque is the sticky, practically colorless film that builds continuously on the teeth. The main inhabitants of plaque are bacteria - one milligram of plaque can contain a half-billion bacteria. Bacteria ferment sugars in the mouth (why not to eat sweets), changing them to acids which then eat away at tooth enamel. "Look, Ma - cavities!"

As the plaque creeps below the gum line, it mineralizes and becomes razor-sharp deposits of tartar which is the catalyst of periodontal (or gum) disease - by far, the major cause of tooth loss in adults.

Plaque must be removed daily by "proper" brushing and the use of dental floss. Have your dentist or hygienist show you how to do it properly.

The best way, if not the only way, to remove tartar and long-established plaque is to have a professional cleaning. But, remember, it will start to reform the very next day. The only one who can remove plaque regularly is you.

- 6 eggs, separated
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatine
- 1 can (16 oz.) whole berry cranberry sauce
- 1/4 cup orange liqueur
- 1 tablespoon grated orange peel
- 1 or 2 drops red food coloring, optional
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup whipping or heavy cream, whipped

Make 6-inch band of triple-thickness aluminum foil long enough to go around a 1-quart souffle dish and overlap 2 inches. Wrap band around outside of dish. Fasten with tape, paper clip or string. Collar should extend 4 inches above rim of dish. Set aside.

In medium saucepan, beat egg yolks with milk. Sprinkle unflavored gelatine over yolk mixture and let stand 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatine is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Blend in cranberry sauce, liqueur, orange peel and food coloring, if desired. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds lightly when dropped from spoon.

In large bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Beat in sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until sugar is dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Fold in gelatine mixture and whipped cream. Pile into prepared souffle dish. Chill until firm, several hours or overnight. To serve, remove collar.

## APPLE CINNAMON CHIFFON PIE

6 to 8 servings

The rosy color and spicy-sweet flavor of this chiffon pie makes it a unique light treat to serve at the end of your holiday feast.

- 4 eggs, separated
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
- 2 tablespoons red cinnamon candies
- 1-1/2 cups applesauce
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 (9-inch) pie shell, baked and cooled

In medium saucepan beat egg yolks with water. Sprinkle unflavored gelatine over yolk mixture and let stand 1 minute. Add candies and applesauce. Stir over low heat until gelatine is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon.

In large bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Beat in sugar until dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Fold in gelatine mixture. Pile into pie shell and chill until firm, at least 3 hours. Garnish with whipped cream and additional cinnamon candies, if desired.

## EGGNOG WREATH

8 servings

Creamy eggnog is a favorite holiday beverage, but when you serve it as a decorative dessert mold, it's bound to win applause.

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatine
- 1/2 cup sugar, divided
- 1-1/4 cups milk
- 4 eggs, separated
- 2 tablespoons rum\*
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 cup (1/2 pt.) whipping or heavy cream, whipped

In medium saucepan, mix unflavored gelatine with 1/4 cup sugar. Blend in milk and egg yolks. Let stand 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatine is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Add rum and nutmeg. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon.

In large bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Beat in remaining sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until sugar is dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Fold in gelatine mixture and whipped cream. Pour or spoon into 6-cup ring mold. Chill until firm, several hours or overnight. Unmold onto plate and garnish with candied fruits, if desired.

\*Substitution: Use 2 teaspoons rum extract.

## ZABAGLIONE SNOW

6 to 8 servings

This dessert is reminiscent of the Italian Zabaglione, a foamy egg custard traditionally flavored with Marsala.

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
- 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar, divided
- 1-1/2 cups water
- 6 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup Marsala, sherry or dry white wine
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

In medium saucepan, mix unflavored gelatine with 1/2 cup sugar. Blend in water and egg yolks. Let stand 1 minute. Cook over low heat, beating constantly with whisk until gelatine is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Stir in wine. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon.

In large bowl, beat egg whites with cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Beat in remaining sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until sugar is dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Fold in gelatine mixture. Pour into parfait glasses or dessert dishes and chill until set.

## CHOCOLATE MINT PARFAITS

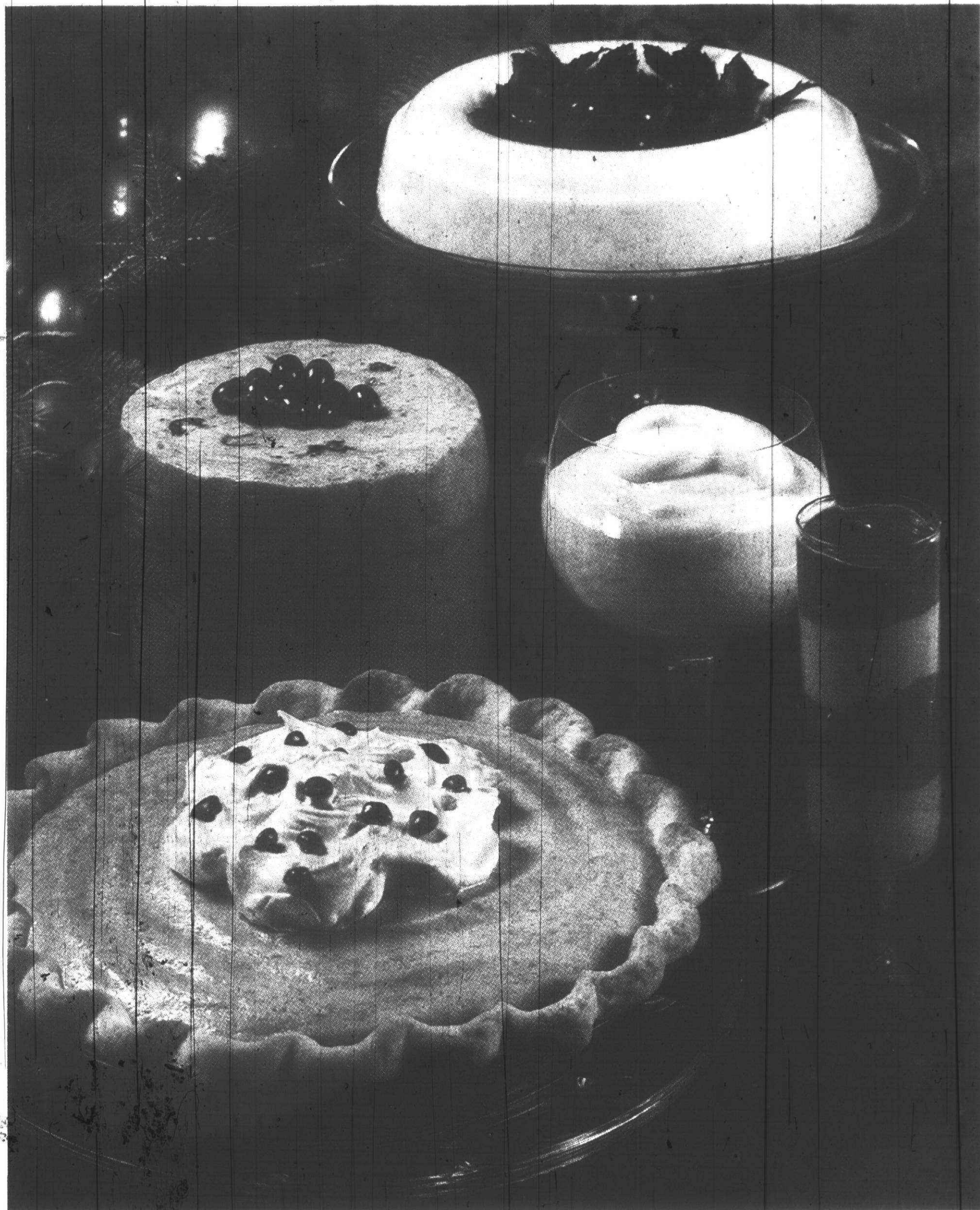
6 servings

A blender does all the hard work when you make these delightful layered desserts flavored with refreshing mint and rich chocolate.

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatine
- 1 cup cold milk, divided
- 1 cup (1/2 pt.) half and half or light cream, heated to boiling
- 1 cup (1/2 pt.) cold half and half or light cream
- 4 eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoons creme de menthe
- 2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate, melted

In 5-cup blender container, sprinkle unflavored gelatine over 1/2 cup cold milk. Let stand 3 to 4 minutes. Add hot half and half and process at low speed until gelatine is completely dissolved, about 2 minutes. Add remaining milk, half and half, eggs, sugar and vanilla. Process at high speed until blended. Pour 2 cups gelatine mixture into medium bowl and add creme de menthe.

Add melted chocolate to mixture remaining in blender container and process at low speed until blended, about 1 minute. Pour mixture into another medium bowl. Chill both mixtures, stirring occasionally, until both mound slightly when dropped from spoon. (Note: Mint mixture may gel before chocolate. Remove from refrigerator and let stand at room temperature, stirring occasionally.) In parfait glasses or dessert dishes, alternately layer chocolate and mint mixtures. Chill until set.

# A Question of Taste

## Thoughtful gifts that pamper have special meaning

Token gifts — you remember them. They used to run about \$3 or \$4 — scarves, padded hangers, cologne, candy — gifts for teachers, co-workers, distant relatives.

These same gifts are still being exchanged but now they run more in the \$10 range. Whatever the price, "token" gifts are a perennial problem — too often frustrating the giver and disappointing the recipient.

I once read a good piece of advice about gift buying: buy the best. This is the exact opposite of the approach most people take, buying the least expensive version of an item in the vain hope that it will be mistaken for a more expensive counterpart.

The result is a vast reserve of gifts consigned to oblivion in dresser drawers: jewelry, cologne, scarves, ties, leather-look wallets.

Rather than buying the bottom of the line, why not switch lines and pamper someone with the Cadillac of that line. Foods and cooking-related items are perfect for this.

It is possible to go top of the line here without spending large amounts. In this week's column, I will suggest foods which are especially appropriate for gift-giving. Next week I will concentrate on kitchen utensils.

A simple, thoughtful gift could, for example, be made by filling a pretty jar or glass mug (try Wells Cargo) with whole spices and accompany it with a recipe for hot mulled cider or its spirited counterpart, Wassail — perfect for even confirmed non-cooks.

A more elaborate variation, suitable for the gourmet baker was suggested by Yvonne Gill: wrap a stick of angelica, two vanilla beans, and an antique canning jar filled with meringue mushrooms (the perfect finishing touch for a rich torte, \$5 for 4 oz.) in a napkin.

All these items are available at Tweeny's Cafe in Birmingham.

Yvonne Gill has, in fact, assembled a wide assortment of special spices, fruit and herb vinegars, breads, chutneys, jellies, puddings, and gift baskets for holiday gift-giving. A pot of jam or jelly — your own or the

Cafe's — could be accompanied by a basket of home-baked English muffins for a lovely gift set.

If you had about \$200 to spend, you could delight some fortunate gourmet cook with an electric pasta machine.

On the other hand, for a paltry \$4 or \$5, you could delight anyone — gourmet cook or not — with a pound of home-made pasta.

Until recently, you could not have given such a gift unless you were willing to: a) make the pasta yourself (guaranteed to convince you that the aforementioned machine is worth every penny), or, b) travel to New York to pick up a batch. This year it is available for take-out from Tweeny's. Simply tuck in a recipe for a lightly-sauced pasta dish and you have a delicious, tempting gift in the awkward \$5 price range. If your budget allows, you could accompany the pasta with a pint of home-made sauce from the Cafe, priced at \$5 or \$6 — a gourmet dinner for four for about \$10.

Gifts of food (gourmet or otherwise) are welcome at any time of the year. I have a very dear and thoughtful friend, George Thomas, who regularly surprises me with gifts of food — fresh bread from Greentown, canned fava beans, fresh pomegranates and persimmons, individual spinach pies from a favorite restaurant — always accompanied by cooking suggestions and the history and cultural significance of each food.

An assortment of similar, interesting foods would make the kind of gift that is not only fun to open but which continues to give pleasure as each food is "played with" and enjoyed.

Some suggestions are: canned lychees, a fresh kiwi fruit, a jar of sour salt (available in Greek Town — sometimes), a bottle of tamari (natural soy sauce) together with a package of rice noodles (both available at Oriental markets or health food stores), a can of good olive oil, or a jar of imported Dijon mustard.

George's son, Tom Thomas, share his father's fascination with foods and has turned this interest into a thriving

part-time business selling custom fruit baskets. In our health- and weight-conscious culture, the traditional gifts of candy and cookies are increasingly less welcome — too often consumed with guilt or passed along, unopened to someone else.

Fresh fruit is the perfect alternative. Either visit Detroit's Eastern Market yourself to pick out the best fruit in the city or arrange for Tom to do it for you by calling him at 647-0821.

Either way, your gift will reflect all the wishes for good health which we exchange during the holidays.

Special gifts of food — in which the giver shares a personal passion and a fund of knowledge — as George Thomas does — are beyond a price and are what giving — in any price range — is all about.

### HOT MULLED CIDER

1 tsp. whole allspice  
1 tsp. whole cloves  
Dash ground nutmeg  
3 inches stick cinnamon  
2 quarts apple cider  
Orange wedges

Combine allspice, cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon, and cider in large saucepan. Slowly bring to boiling; cover and simmer 20 minutes. Remove spices. Serve in warmed mugs with a clove-studded orange wedge in each. Serves 8.

### WASSAIL

Follow the directions for Hot Mulled Cider, adding ¼ cup lemon juice. After removing the cider from the heat, stir in 1 cup vodka and ¼ cup brandy. About 18 four-ounce servings.

### WHOLE WHEAT ENGLISH MUFFINS

2 pkg. active, dry yeast  
2 ½ to 3 cups unbleached flour  
1 ½ cups whole wheat flour  
½ cup cracked wheat  
½ cup wheat germ  
2 cups milk  
¼ cup shortening  
2 tsp. salt  
Cornmeal

In a large mixer bowl, combine the yeast, ¾ cup of the unbleached flour, the whole wheat flour, the cracked wheat, and the wheat germ. Heat the milk, shortening, and salt

just until warm. Add to the dry mixture. Beat at low speed for ½ minute, scraping sides of the bowl constantly. Beat three minutes at high speed. By hand, stir in enough of the unbleached flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn out onto a floured surface; knead eight to 10 minutes or until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the surface. Cover; let rise 1 ½ hours or until doubled. Punch the dough down; cover and let rest 10 minutes. On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough to slightly less than ½-inch thick. Cut with a 4-inch round cutter, rerolling scraps. Dip both sides of the muffins in cornmeal. Cover; let rise 30 minutes or until very light. Bake over low heat on an ungreased griddle or in ungreased skillets about 25 to 28 minutes or until the muffins are done, turning frequently. Cool thoroughly on a wire rack. Makes 12 muffins.

## Milk harvest sets new record in state

Although you can't see butter, milk and cheese growing in the fields and being harvested, these products are also among the good things growing in Michigan.

About 400,000 dairy cows on 8,000 Michigan dairy farms supplied consumers with almost five billion pounds of milk in 1979 (about 563 million gallons), according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Output per cow was a record 12,166 pounds last year. That's enough milk to furnish eight families with a half gallon of milk each day for a year.

About one-third of the milk production was used in making 32 million pounds of butter, 46 million gallons of ice cream, ice milk and sherbet, and 80 million pounds of cheese.

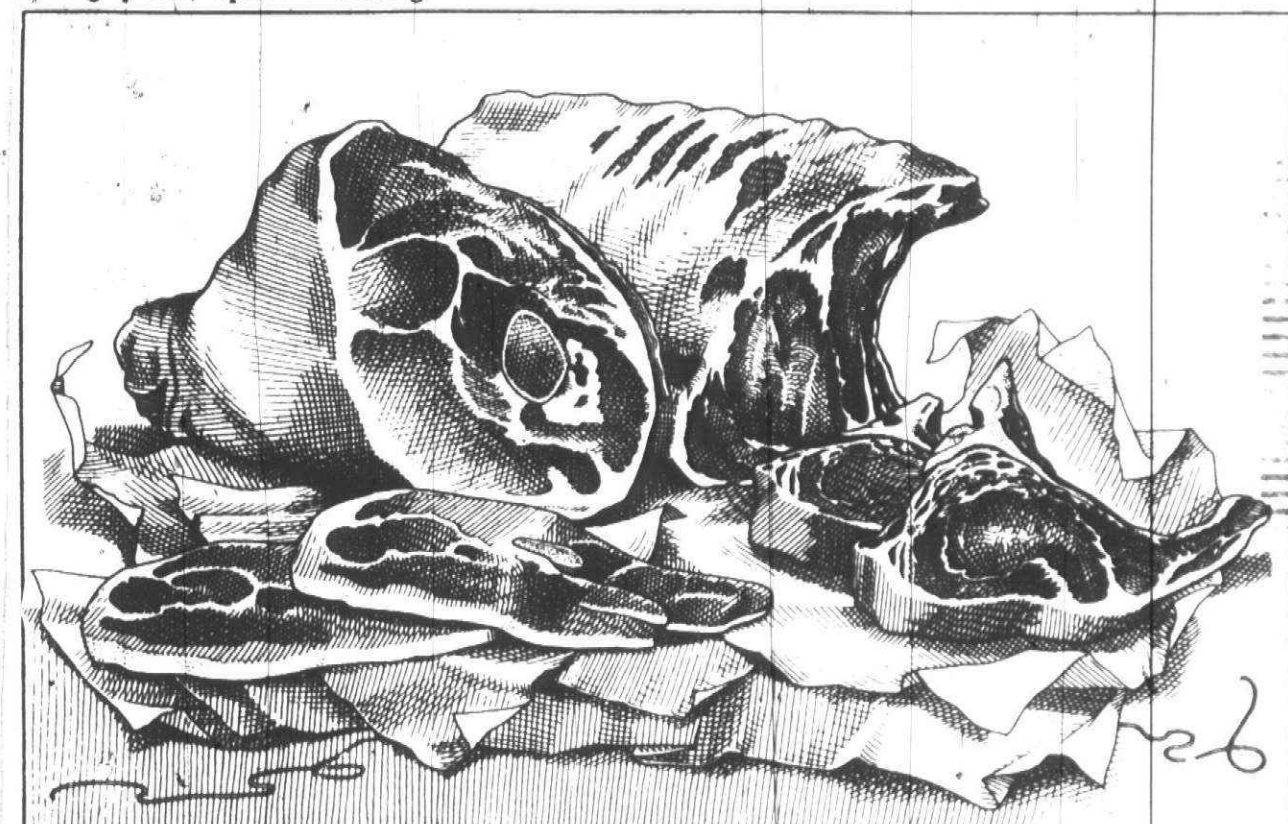

# Symphony presents sing-along 'Messiah'

The Plymouth Symphony Orchestra will present the most popular choral work of them all, Handel's "Messiah," at 4 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 7 in Plymouth Salem High School auditorium, Jay Road west of Canton Center.

The Christmas section of the "Messiah" will be performed as a sing-along. The entire audience will be divided into sections to form a chorus while specially auditioned soloists will be on stage to fill in solo roles.

Persons attend just to listen will be as welcome as the singers, said Oliver Wagner, a member of the Plymouth Symphony Society's board of directors.

Selecting the soloists for the performance became an exciting project in itself. Twenty-seven soloists from a wide area responded to newspaper and church announcements in July. Conductor Johan van der Merwe, who had been assigned the sole responsibility for selection of the soloists, said he was delighted with the interest and with the talent available.

The maestro insists that it is just coincidence that all four of the soloists happen to live in the immediate area.

Though all professionals, the soloists are volunteering their services to contribute to the celebration.

DIANE ARON CALHOUN (soprano) is a Plymouth voice and piano teacher.

Betty Madis (alto), who lives in Plymouth, has sung with the Robert Shaw Chorale for two years and teaches music in the Livonia Schools.

William Somers (tenor) of Plymouth has been a paid church soloist for many years in the Fort Wayne area. Russell Beck (bass) of Canton Township has sung major roles in shows and oratorios and was associated briefly with the Michigan Opera Theater.

Tickets for the concert already are in short supply and only a limited number of scores for "The Messiah" will be for sale at the door for \$4.25. Concertgoers who wish to join the sing-along are urged to search their attics for a copy of the score or borrow a copy from their church choir director.

FOR 200 YEARS, musicians have marveled over the fact that Handel wrote his "Messiah" in just a little more than two weeks. Anyone looking at the manuscript can see how fast and impatiently the ideas were put on paper. Handel did not erase; he scratched or blotted out.

Rapidly making gouges in the paper, he sometimes neglected to put stems on notes. The manuscript reveals a composer who wrote an enormous work just as it came from his brain, as fast as he could write it down. Even though it soon became a very popular

work, Handel could not have predicted its present popularity.

It was assailed by the clergy, many of whom thought it sacrilegious.

Other clerics and pious listeners thought that sacred oratorios should not be performed in such sinful surroundings as theaters.

Nor would Handel have been accustomed to the size of such musical

forces. In his time, a typical performance would have included a very small orchestra with a chorus seldom numbering more than a dozen. It seems Handel would have approved. He did like big sound and would enthusiastically gather as many musicians as he could.

IN SPITE OF intense local interest in performing "Messiah" as a sing-

along, the work apparently is not performed widely in this manner throughout the country. Ann Arbor and Detroit have been having such performances for years, as has San Francisco. It is believed that the first such performance occurred under Robert Shaw's direction in 1975 as part of the Cincinnati May Festival.

Times have changed the clerical re-

action to the work. Two area churches already have declared this the opening of their Christmas season and have purchased blocks of tickets in advance.

It may be wise for others to buy advance tickets as it is not certain any will be available at the door. # Taste and style-not together

Taste and style aren't a bit like love and marriage, says Robert L. Green, expert in all manner of both.

What he told the Livonia Town Hall was that you can't have one *with* the other.

"Taste is the best use of whatever has worked for society and is followed by society," he said. "Style is trying something new, something different. If you pull it off, it's great; if not, it's a bomb."

Style he defined as "the charm of the unexpected."

"Taste has to be fed by new ideas and change," he went on. "Change has to be tried out by someone who makes it work."

"And then, when something moves from the world of style to the world of taste, the people in the world of style don't want it any more."

Green illustrated these remarks, made in the Mai Kai Theater lecture, with a personal comment during his informal session with those who attended a celebrity luncheon in the Mayflower Meeting House in Plymouth.

One of the homes he owns, he mentioned, used to have several Barcelona chairs because he considers them most comfortable.

"But now they are in every hotel lobby; I don't have them any more," he said.

GREEN IS a former actor who has been fashion editor of Playboy magazine and is known for expertise in gourmet cooking, entertaining, interior decorating and gardening.

For all those areas of living he had comments on how to do it with style.

"People are looking desperately for a way to declare their individuality, differences that are not necessarily extreme. Yours may be very private."

He noted, for an example, how he might use style in thanking the Town Hall board for inviting him to speak.

"Instead of using neat, embossed stationery, which would be very tasteful, I might send a post card showing a group of natives dancing around a totem pole," he said. "Then I could write 'If you think these people are having fun, it's nothing compared to my enjoyment of your hospitality,' or something like that."

Among those showing style in fashion he mentioned Joan Crawford, "who created a woman who did not exist at all and lived the role," and the late Babe Haley, who one day was noted tying a flowing scarf onto her purse handles because the weather was too hot to wear it.

"In a matter of days all the good stores were selling purses with scarves tied to the handles," Green said.

For holiday entertaining, he said, his preference is a table of cold poultry, with turkey, goose, pheasant and duck and different glazes on each. To cook the latter, he said, "I use a vertical roaster and you can't believe the beauty of that duck."

ENTERTAINING WITH style is no problem, Green told the women. "Don't say you can't afford to give a party," he added. "People of style will create an experience, and that can be done with very little expense."

"Maybe give a winter picnic — take the pillows off the beds and put them around the floor and serve picnic fare." He threw in one note of caution,

though. "I had one guest who just stayed, and I thought she was really thrilled with the party," he said. "Turned out, though, that she got down on the floor and couldn't get up."

Other entertainment ideas he suggested included sending invitations on large, fresh leaves. "But the leaves have to be real," he insisted. "Crepe paper ones aren't the same."

When giving a party, the host should "make the occasion available and let people proceed at their own pace."

"Don't expect guests to perform and turn on the wit," he said, "but if things get really dull you might inject something general into the conversation like 'What would you do if you suddenly had a million dollars?'"

"Seating is important and I break a lot of rules. For one thing, I never separate newlyweds."

Asked about home furnishings, Green said his four homes have one thing in common, "a collector's eclecticism."

"My homes are my diary," he noted. "I do tend toward 18th century pieces because that was the period of my family home in Boston. I like Queen Ann furniture. But I also have a great interest in contemporary design."

"I do believe in changing things from time to time, and for me the operative word is comfort. I'm a great believer in lighting."

GREEN TALKED about gardening as a fairly recent interest.

It was actress Vivien Leigh who talked him into planting a garden when he took over an old but somewhat rundown estate in Pennsylvania, he said.

"How do you garden with style?" he asked. "I did it with mass plantings."

He said he now stages a once-a-year fundraiser for Goodwill Industries at the estate, putting on a mammoth buffet at that time.

"That's a great time, and people come from all over, but once a year is enough," he said.

"I need a new project, so I'm working now on turning about six acres of the estate into a park. Friends are sending me trees for the park." Two days after Steve McQueen died, two trees arrived that he had ordered a week or two earlier. It was a strange

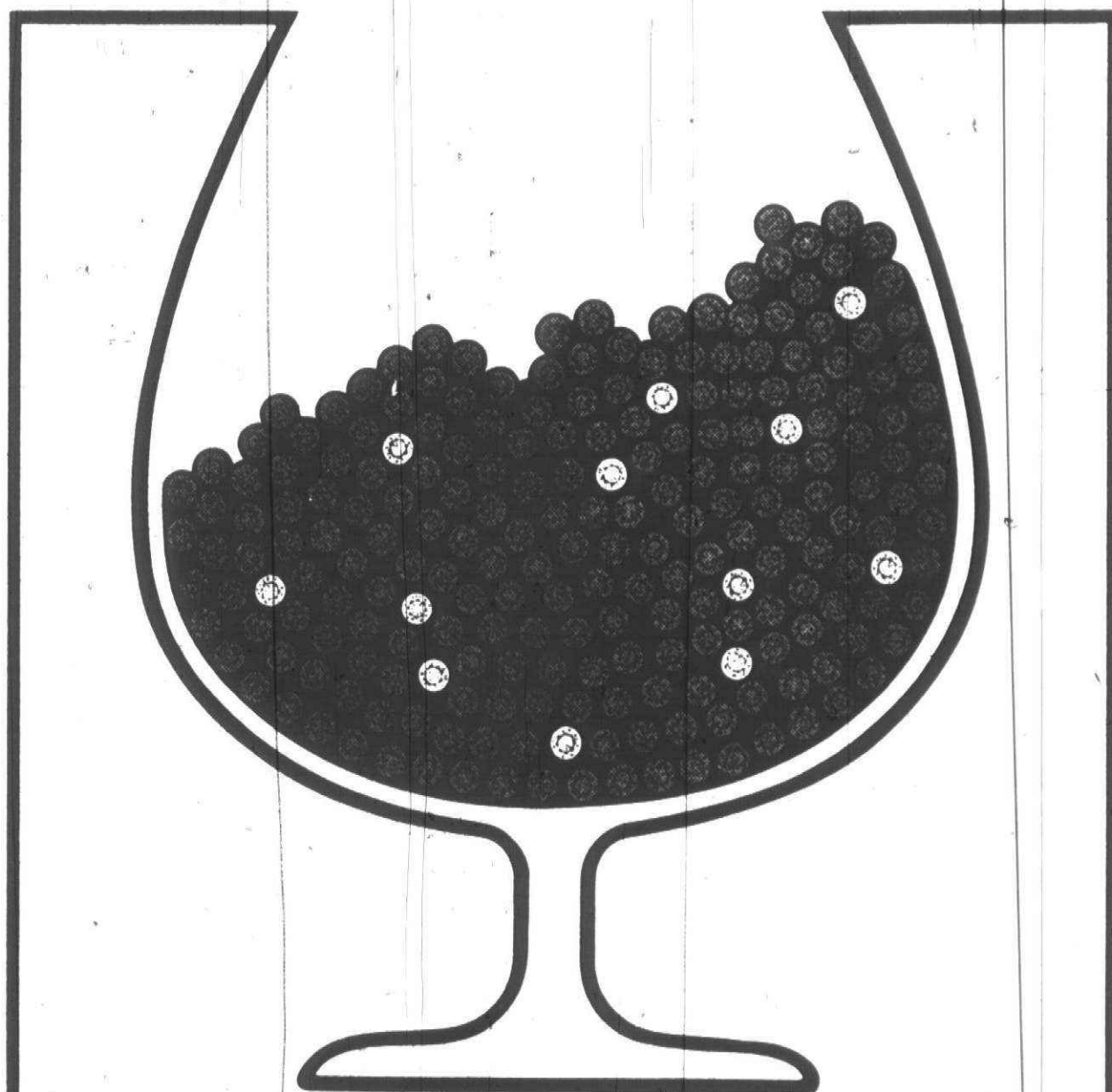
feeling, but they are very special trees and will have a special spot in the park."

When the park is finished, he said, he'll add another charity event, and proceeds probably will go to help young people in the theater.

"I like the way you do things," he told the Town Hall women who earmark earnings from the lectures for American Field Service student exchanges. "I think the government should handle disease research," and organizations should put their efforts into helping the young."

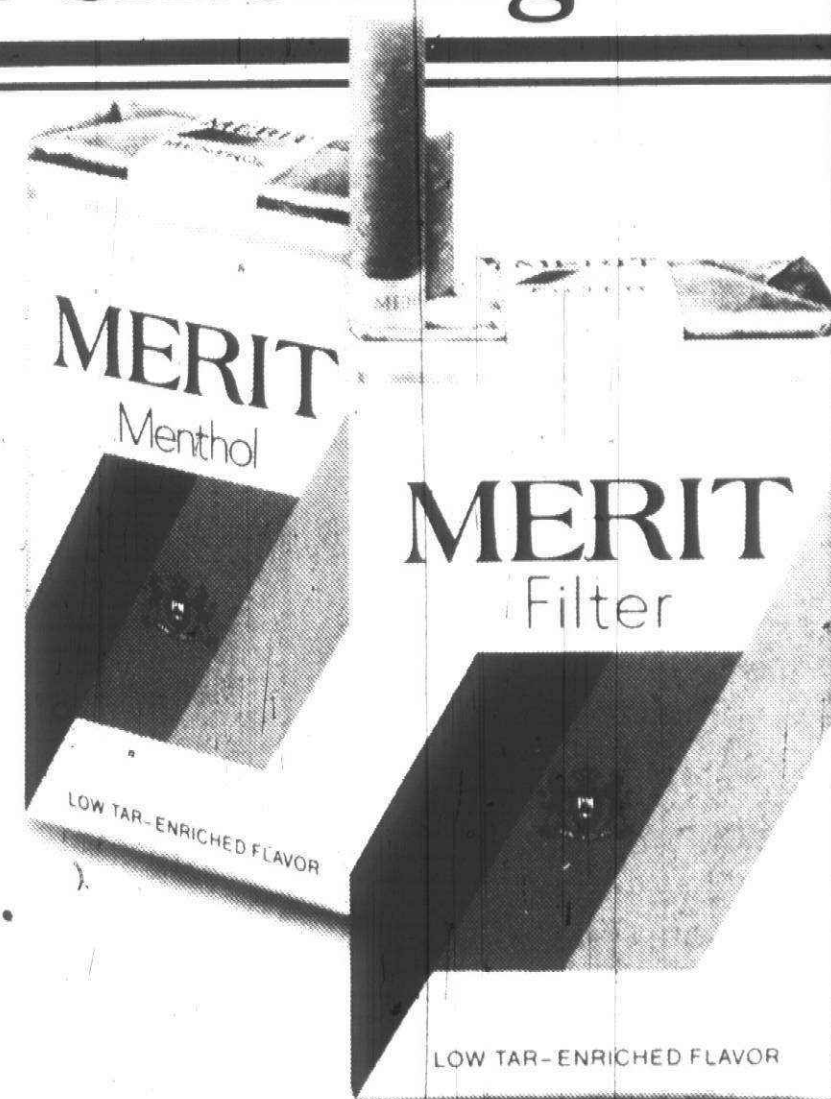

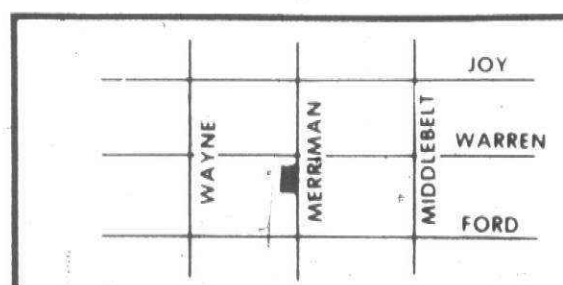

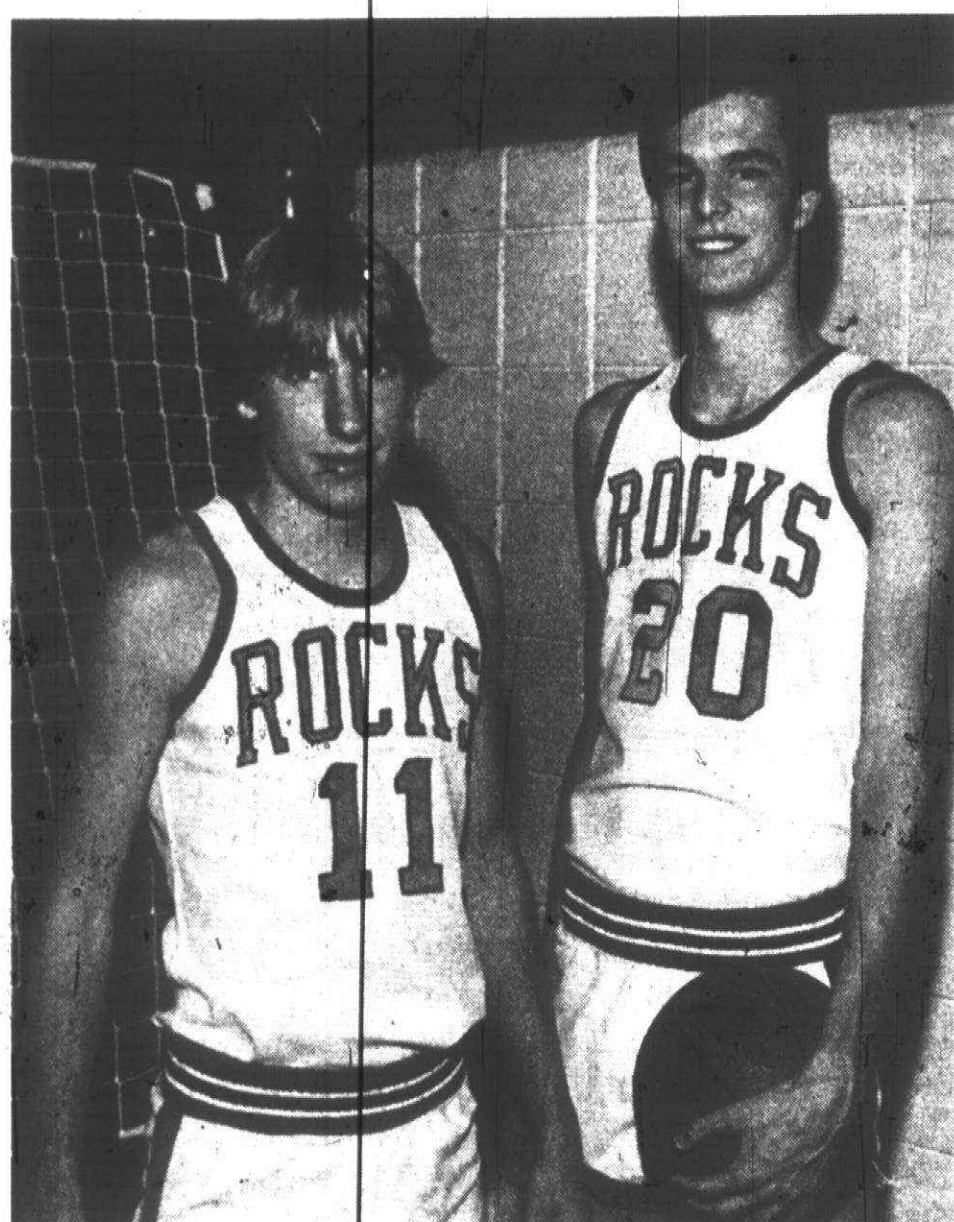

## Tall order! Salem cagers use height advantage

When Fred Thomann makes a point, his players most of the time look up to him.

The Plymouth Salem boys' basketball coach, who stands 6 feet 8 inches tall, usually towers over his team.

Although his authority is rarely questioned, Thomann's height is ready to be challenged.

This is one of Salem's tallest teams. Two players can look the bearded coach straight in the eye.

And for that reason, the 1980-81 Salem cage squad has a slightly different look.

"This team is obviously different," said Thomann. "We have good-size with fair quickness."

"If we get the team going defensive, we'll be competitive to play."

Salem lost three starters from a year ago — Howard Monk, Jim Anderson and Rob Neu.

Monk made first team all-Observer and was the Rocks' center at 6-6. He is now performing at Wayne State.

"We lost good quickness and savvy," Thomann said, "but the beautiful thing

is we have another group ready to go."

Monk replacements are 6-9 Paul Horton and 6-7 Norm Haygood.

"Paul is playing pretty good," said Thomann of the senior. "He weighs 180 pounds now."

Horton, a co-captain, will share time with Haygood, who adds muscle at 225.

"We think we're going to have a decent post game," said the Salem coach.

Leigh Langkabel (6-1) and Scott Bublin (6-2) will man the forward spots to start the season. Both players jump ex-

tremely well and can score points, according to Thomann.

They will be backed up by a pair of sophomores, John Cohen (6-3) and David Houle (6-3). That duo will fill the roles of Mike McBride and Bublin, who saw extensive duty as sophomores a year ago.

McBride, a 6-3 junior, moves into the starting guard spot along with senior captain Mike Sharp (6-3), giving the Rocks a tall backcourt.

Sharp started all 21 games last year as Salem posted a 17-4 record.

JOHN McDOWELL is the third guard at 6-0. He saw some action near the end of last season on the varsity as a sophomore. Juniors Geoff Baker and John Kelliher are the No. 4 and 5 guards.

Frontline reserves include Dave Miller, a 6-2 junior transfer from Redford Bishop Borgess and senior Bill Newland (6-4).

"My team defense is what I'm really concerned with," said Thomann. "We've put a major emphasis on that."

"We're going to try to make up for our lack of quickness with good position defense. We're going to play man-to-man."

If the defense comes, Thomann's team should again be a contender in the Suburban Eight League.

"Dearborn has some good athletes and Bentley is small for once," said the Salem coach, who won a state Class B

title in 1969 at Willow Run. "Belleville I'm told is small, quick and young."

Thomann has enjoyed working with his young team so far.

"They're really playing hard," he said. "It's a real good atmosphere and a good group of guys. I think they'll get better as the season goes along."

Salem will open up the season against Walled Lake Central Friday at home.

## John Glenn coach wins case

Dan Henry will coach the varsity basketball team at Westland John Glenn this winter after all.

Henry, who was fired as coach by Glenn Principal Thomas Svitekovich in September, has won an arbitration case which was initiated on his behalf by the Wayne-Westland Education Association.

Henry takes over from Gerald Szukaitas, who has been working with the team in preseason. Szukaitas had signed a coaching contract with the understanding that Henry would return if he won his arbitration case.

Glenn opens its season Friday at Taylor Center.

Henry, who coached the varsity last season and the JV team before that, said he felt his name had been cleared by the arbitrator's decision.

"If I felt the firing was justified, I wouldn't have fought it," Henry said. "I felt I would win all along. I'm just happy to be back with the kids."

Svitekovich said he was surprised with the arbitrator's decision, but would not comment.

on the matter other than to say he and the school administration will abide by the ruling.

Svitekovich refused to go into specifics when he dismissed Henry from his coaching position. Henry maintained it was a personality conflict between Svitekovich and himself.

Bill Reese, president of the Wayne-Westland Education Association, said that arbitrator Nathan Lipson ruled there was no just cause for the firing.

"There was a meeting (between Henry and Svitekovich) in which there was a heated discussion," Reese said. "Based on comments made by Henry, they fired him. Basically, that's what it comes down to."

Bill Taylor, assistant superintendent for employee relations for the Wayne-Westland Community Schools, said the issue was "insubordination and acting in an unprofessional and uncooperative manner."

Two different issues were cited in the arbitrator's decision, Taylor said.

"One, did the district have a right to discipline (Henry), and two, did he (Henry) have the right for union representation and was it provided?" Taylor said.

"The arbitrator ruled that we did have the

right to discipline him, but, in essence — and these are my words — he (Lipson) said that the discipline was too excessive or too harsh," Taylor continued.

"He ruled that the firing be reduced to a written reprimand," Taylor said. "He (Lipson) also ruled that we (administration) did provide union representation."

The arbitration decision called for the following three things:

- A written reprimand for Henry.
- A commitment from Henry, which was received, according to Taylor, that Henry "would work in a cooperative manner with the high school administration," Taylor said.
- Henry be reinstated as coach on a 30-day trial basis.

"Very frankly, I think Henry will coach for the rest of the year," Taylor said. "The main thing is that the issue has been resolved."

Henry said that he does not feel any added pressure now that he is back as coach.

"I just want to go in there and do the job," he said. "I just hope we can work out our differences."

"The kids are really excited I'm back," Henry added. "The parents have been fighting hard for me. We think we're a pretty good team. We had a good summer (practicing)."

And now the Rocks, 19-4 overall, may get another crack at Bentley in the regional final.

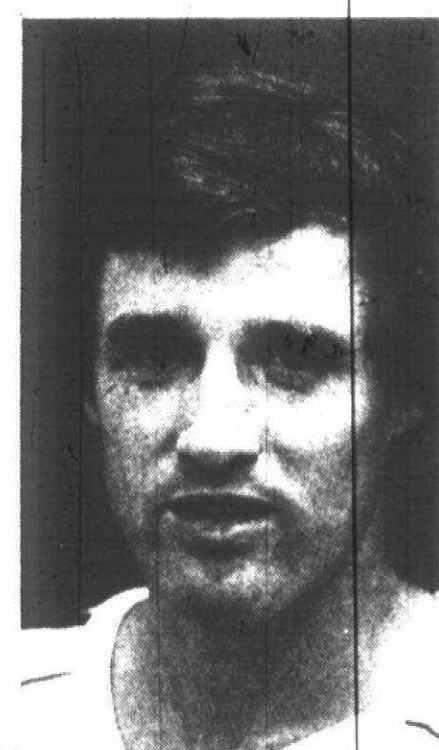

Fisher will be flanked at one forward spot by senior Mick Brodie. Brodie is the best scorer of the returning Tigers, having averaged six points a game last season.

Joining Brodie at the other forward

position will be senior Russ Miller.

Team captain Norm Boston will lead from his guard position and will most likely have Ron Tummlin alongside at the other backcourt spot.

Tom Adams, a junior center, will probably also see action.

"We want to use a set play offense and shoot often," said Dropp. "To do that we'll have to be able to control the boards for the most part and we don't yet know if we'll be able to do that. We'll have to wait and see."

# Rice tops Fordson for title

Who would have thought the "5-2 Rock-In" would be the key to Birmingham Brother Rice's state championship quest?

It was this special defense which led the Warriors to football supremacy Saturday afternoon.

Brother Rice thwarted Dearborn Fordson's potent running attack at every turn en route to a 6-0 victory and the Class A title before 25,921 fans at the Pontiac Silverdome.

Senior tri-captain Tim MacLean, who calls the defensive signals for the Warriors, credited assistant coach and defensive coordinator Ron Kalcynski with the defensive adjustment.

"All year long coach Kalcynski has put in new defenses against a team's specialty," MacLean explained. "Fordson's specialty was the power-I, so the coach took out a defensive back and put another player on the line — Pat Panelli."

"We call him (Panelli) 'Rocky' so it was the '5-2 Rock-In' defense."

ADDING THAT sixth defensive lineman was just the ingredient Rice (12-0) needed to stop a spirited Tractor attack for its second state crown in four years.

Junior quarterback Dave Yarema hit junior 6-foot-7 split end Paul Jokisch with a 17-yard screen pass for the only score of the game.

The touchdown pass came two plays into the fourth quarter. Jokisch dodged two players after the catch and streaked untouched into the end zone for the six points.

Jim Ostrowski's extra-point kick was wide to the right, but it really didn't matter to the Rice defense.

FORDSON (11-1) NEVER came close to scoring. The Tractors' deepest penetration in the first half came on their second possession. Fordson drove to the Warrior 35-yard line, but Rice nose-guard Fred Konkel jumped on a fumbled snap to end that threat.

Fordson reached midfield only once in the second half.

The Tractors, who averaged 260 rushing yards per game this year, finished with only 84 yards in 32 plays. They completed only five of 13 passes for 72 yards. They committed four turnovers — two interceptions and two lost fumbles.

"We didn't seem to handle the ball as well as we usually do," said Fordson coach Charles Jestice. "But, again, that's because of the great Rice defense."

"FROM A LINEBACKER'S standpoint," said MacLean, "we just flow with the play. But our defensive line played a great game — that's where we won the game."

"I felt our defense was going to do the job," MacLean added. "We knew Fordson was tough and it would be like World War III out there. But we were ready, both mentally and physically."

MacLean and fellow linebacker John Maher registered the interceptions. Maher's came with 2:49 left in the game, ending Fordson's last scoring attack.

Lineman Bob Sweeney recovered Fordson's other lost fumble.

Offensively, Rice didn't look like a team which scored 349 points in its first 11 games.

But when it counted, the Warriors' executed its short passing game to perfection.

"They (Fordson) were watching for the long pass, so our short passing game worked well for us," said Rice head coach Al Fracassa. "Our kids made some good catches down there."

The only scoring drive went for 60 yards in eight plays. Besides the touchdown toss to Jokisch, Yarema hit the tri-captain with three passes of seven, six and four yards.

BROTHER RICE dominated the action in both halves. The team had two excellent scoring opportunities in the second quarter but failed to score.

Early in the period, Rice drove the ball from its own 36-yard line to the Fordson eight-yard line before a fourth down, fake field-goal attempt failed to

produce a first down inside the Tractor five-yard line.

With only 47 seconds left until halftime, Yarema lateraled on one hop to Jokisch on the right sideline. Jokisch, in turn, threw a 42-yard strike to Allen, who was all alone in the Fordson end zone for an apparent Warrior touchdown.

But the tricky play was called back and ruled an incomplete pass by the officials — an obvious mistake.

"That play could have helped us a lot at the time," said Fracassa, who wasn't pleased with the call. "We call it the 'bounce pass' and it worked."

"They (the officials) just said I'm sorry. We knew they blew the call. I just tried to keep my composure — the Italian in me didn't come out."

"But I don't blame the officials," Fracassa said, after admitting he didn't inform them of the play before the game. "Next time I'll tell the officials — I'll diagram it for them."

MIKE NEFF, the Warriors' leading rusher, gained 109 yards in 20 carries for the winners. Yarema finished nine-of-18 for 70 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. In his last four games, Yarema, a 6-3, 185-pounder, threw 10 touchdown passes. He established a new Rice record with 23 touchdown passes this season. Jokisch caught 11 of them.

Fordson's one-two rushing attack of Mike McGowan and Tom Matellic was ineffective. McGowan finished with 45 yards in 10 carries, while Matellic, playing both quarterback and halfback, rushed seven times for minus one yard.

It was Fracassa's 96th victory in his 12 years at Rice. He has coached five undefeated teams at Rice, earned five Catholic League titles, eight Central Division crowns and two state titles. He has lost only 15 games and tied two at Rice.

The other state crown came in 1977 — a 17-7 decision over Portage Central at the Silverdome. Rice lost in the semifinals of the 1978 to North Farmington, 27-6. That was Fracassa's only setback in eight post-season games.

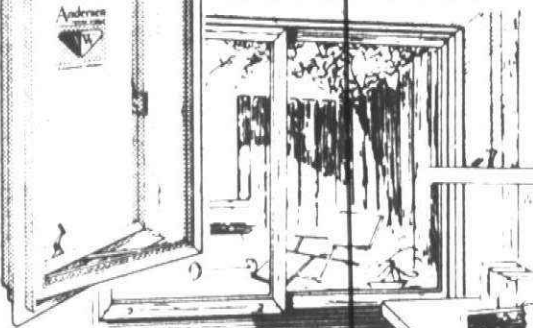

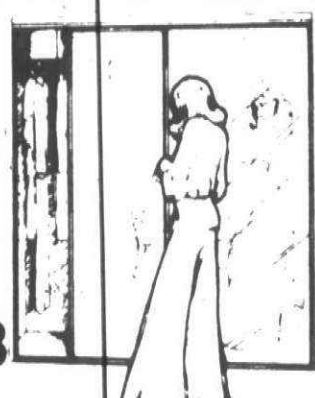

# Traub comes away with Club Pro title

John Traub is king of the club pros, and he's learning what life is like on the throne.

The 29-year-old head golf professional at Rochester's Great Oaks Country Club gained that regal honor by winning the 13th annual PGA Club Professional Championship last month at Florida's Palm Beach Gardens.

Traub won the four-day, \$130,000 national tournament in stunning style.

He rallied from eight strokes back on the final day taking the title by two strokes, 283-285, over New York pro Jim Albus. He won the \$20,000 first-place jackpot, plus countless other honors in the form of endorsements and publicity.

Now, Traub is learning to cope with the overnight recognition.

"It's definitely a lot of fun to win. I wish everybody could experience something like this in their profession," said Traub, whose been the head pro at Great Oaks for the past three years.

"It's just overwhelming to win. You have to keep everything in perspective. You have people coming out of the woodwork offering you things."

"There is a lot of recognition that comes your way when you win — more than I ever realized," he said. "Winning the Club Pro Championship is THE tournament for club pros, who are the backbone of the PGA."

TRAUB'S MAIN pre-tournament goal was to finish among the top 40 in the 360-player field. That would have automatically qualified him for next year's PGA championship.

It appeared he would have to settle for that when he found himself in seventh place after third-round action with a score of 214. New York's Gene Borek was the leader at that point with a 206.

However, Traub, relying mainly on his one-iron throughout the tournament, picked up six strokes on the first nine holes of the final round as Borek's game collapsed. Albus also overtook Borek.

Traub took the lead for the first time in the tournament when he birdied the 17th hole with an eight-foot putt. Albus, playing behind Traub, was only one stroke back.

But, Traub, realizing what was happening, survived a couple shaky shots on the 18th hole to register a par. Albus bogeyed the 18th, and the drama was over.

"I didn't lose my concentration in the tournament until the second shot on the 18th green," said Traub. "Even though it went off the green, I still hit an adequate enough shot to par the hole."

"I learned in this game that if you keep your mind on each individual shot throughout a tournament you will keep your concentration," he said. "The better players concentrate on each shot."

THE VICTORY automatically qualified Traub for the 1981 World Series of Golf, the 1981 national PGA championship tournament in Atlanta, Ga.; and the PGA Cup Team for Club Pros that will compete against the best club pros from England next September.

Traub also earns automatic berths into a minimum of three national PGA tournaments next year.

Ironically, Traub said he hasn't even practiced as much this year as in the past because of his involvement with the Michigan Section PGA.

Traub, who grew up in Lexington and attended Port Huron High School, is tournament chairman for the PGA in Michigan. His boss and one of his biggest boosters at Great Oaks — Jim Dewling — is the Michigan Section PGA president.

# Oakland girls prime for U-D

Now that OU women's basketball coach Dwayne Jones has tasted his first collegiate victory, he would like nothing better than to upset the state's No.1-ranked University of Detroit Titans.

The Pioneers will play the Titans 7 p.m. Wednesday at Calihan Hall on U-D's campus. Oakland has not beaten the Titans in three previous meetings.

Last year, the Titans defeated Oakland 86-68 during regular-season action, then again in the state finals, 82-72. Oakland lost 85-61 the previous season.

Jones' squad is coming off a 76-56 triumph over the University of Toledo. Ann Kish is OU's leading scorer after

her 10-point performance against the Rockets. Kish, one of the nation's leading free-throw shooters last year, hit 11 of 15 in the season opener.

Sophomore Kelly Kenny dished out 10 assists, while forward Linda Krawford added 11 points. Sophomore Lynd Axsom had 10.

Sophomore center Teresa Vondrasek had 13 rebounds in addition to her seven points.

## MEN'S BASKETBALL

The Oakland University men's basketball team opened the 1980-81 season on a successful note by defeating the University of Western Ontario, 99-67.

Senior forward Rich Brauer hit nine of 12 shots from the field and eight of

10 from the free-throw line for a game-high 26 points. He also shared game-high rebounding honors with teammate Bill Peterson (13 each).

Brauer moved into 10th spot on the all-time Oakland scoring and rebounding charts.

The 6-5, 190-pound forward has scored 656 points during his 49-game career, moving ahead of 1970 graduate Tom Allard. Brauer jumped ahead of 1971 graduate Gordon Tebo with 318 rebounds. Tebo had 308 rebounds in his 66-game stay at Oakland.

Freshman Mike Mohn chipped in

with 14 points, while freshman Rob Manilla (Birmingham Brother Rice) hit his first five shots of the game and finished with 11 points.

Dennis Hammond, Anthony Bernard and Tom Blythe added good bench support, scoring eight points each.

The Pioneers shot 53.1 percent from the field (43-81), and outrebounded the Canadian-based team, 54-30.

Oakland played Northern Michigan University over the weekend. Coach Lee Frederick's team defeated Northern by two points last year at Oakland.

## Cartoon heroes fill the screen during holidays

This has not been a banner year for films. I suspect the best, or most of the best, products are already in the theaters. Among these are "Ordinary People," "The Stunt Man," "The Great Santini" and, with qualifications, "The Elephant Man."

Meanwhile, the summer's hit "Airplane" is still flying circles around competitors at the box office and "The Empire" continues to strike back.

By Dec. 19, however, we will be inundated with a large crop of new films — the studios' showiest, costliest and, who knows, maybe even best.

We can look forward to a continuing fascination with cartoon and comic strip characters, namely "Popeye," "The Legend of the Lone Ranger" and the space fantasy, "Flash Gordon."

"POPEYE" STARS Robin Williams as the sailor man and Shelley Duvall as Olive Oyl. With Robert Altman directing, it should appeal to a large — and odd — combination of cinema buffs and bubble gum chewers.

There will be an abundance of comedies. In "Stir Crazy," Sidney Poitier directs Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor as a couple of looney tunes who try to rob a bank. They "dress up as woodpeckers and wind up as jailbirds."

Another comedian-bank robber who will be part of the Christmas scene is Chevy Chase. He plays Goldie Hawn's ex-husband in a Neil Simon romantic comedy, "Seems Like Old Times."

Clint Eastwood will try to repeat his commercial success of 1979, "Every Which Way But Loose," with a sequel, "Any Which Way You Can." Of course, the sequel not only includes his original co-star Sondra Locke but his favorite orangutan, Clyde.

For an adult comedy, referred to as "sophisticated," which usually is a euphemism for adultery, we have "Change of Seasons," with Shirley MacLaine, Anthony Hopkins and Bo Derek.

A TIMELY offering, as we are transitioning from one administration to another, is "First Family." The satire spoof features Bob Newhart as President Manfred Link, Gilda Radner as his lanky daughter and Madeleine Kahn as "the woman behind the man."

Another comedy with definite social overtones is "Nine to Five." Jane Fonda, Lily Tomlin and Dolly Parton join their talents as a trio of secretaries who devise an outrageous scheme to squash their boss.

For a classy mystery, we have Agatha Christie's "The Mirror Crack'd." A large and distinctive cast that includes Elizabeth Taylor, Angela Lansbury, Kim Novak, Tony Curtis and Rock Hudson assure an aura of mature glamor.

About the only contender in the serious drama category is "Raging Bull." Martin Scorsese directed Robert De Niro in this biography of boxing champion Jake La Motta who went from rags to riches to prison.

Finally, there is the ubiquitous remake. This season it's Neil Diamond in "The Jazz Singer." The original, made in 1927, was the first talking feature film, so I guess we've come full circle.

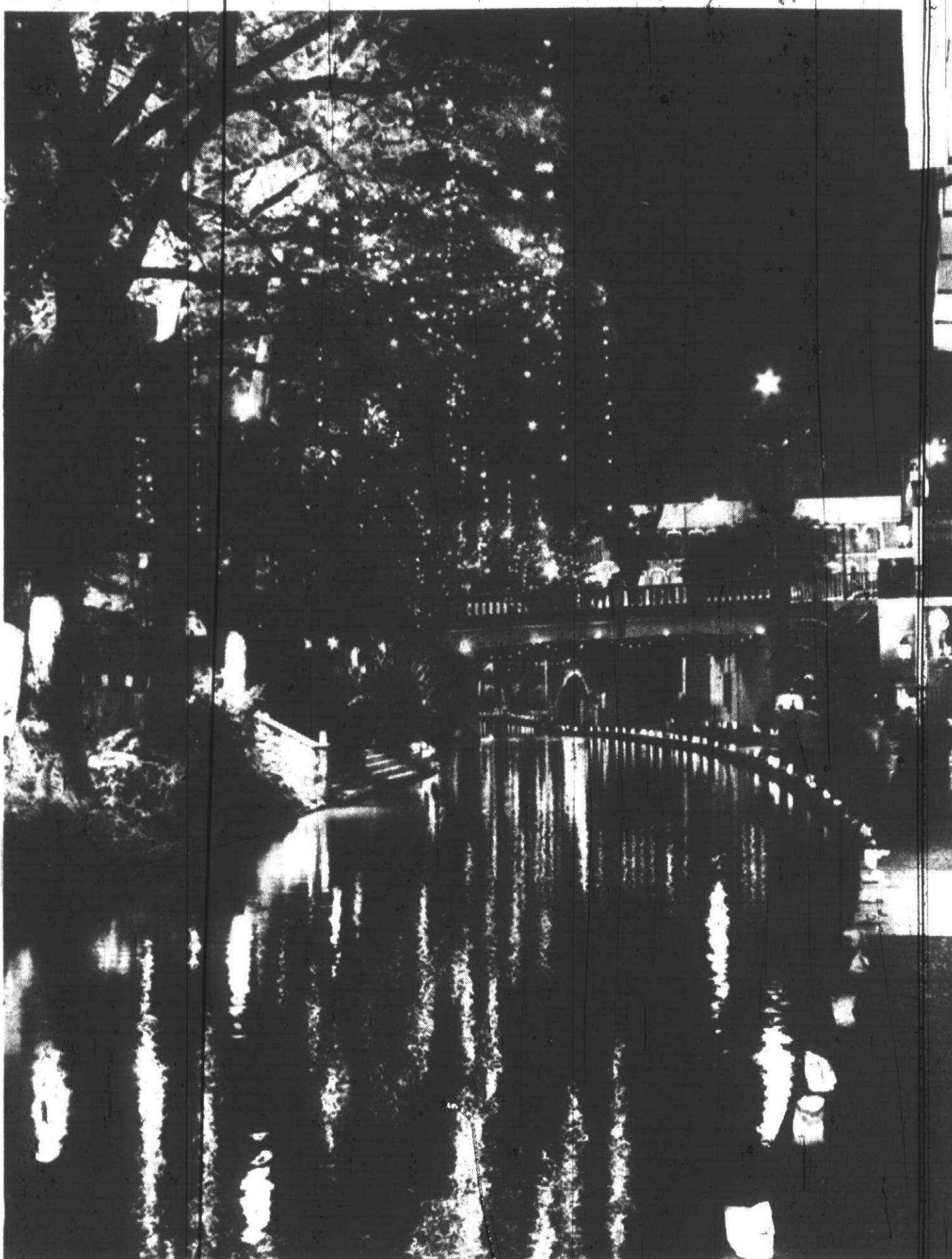

## Asides to partake of before Florida line

Travelers often miss Christmas events along the highway when they are traveling away from home during the holidays, because they don't know about those events in advance.

There are Christmas festivals in Texas, Christmas boat parades in Florida, holiday events along the Lincoln Heritage Trail, and lots of tree-lighting, carol-singing events in between.

**GOING SOUTH** on Interstate 75, you will find Cincinnati all lit up for Christmas, from the yuletide trees in Fountain Square to the live animal creche at the Krohn Conservatory in Eden Park.

The planetarium at the Museum of Natural History, also in Eden Park, includes the Christmas Star in its holiday program. The Cincinnati Zoo, three miles north of downtown, holds its annual Christmas at the Zoo evening program Dec. 12-21.

Old fashioned Christmas decorations can be seen at the Cincinnati Art Museum, the Taft Museum, the John Hauck House Museum and in the 19th century homes in Sharon Woods Village in suburban Sharonville, where caroling and other special events will be held Dec. 10-14.

Especially for the children: the new Cincinnati Fire Museum opens downtown this month and the Cincinnati Gas and Electric Holiday Model Train Exhibit runs for the 35th year through December.

**A COUNTRY CHRISTMAS** at Callo-way Gardens, Ga., is highlighted by a Christmas flower show throughout December. Every day from Friday, Dec. 19, to Thursday, Jan. 1, includes a long list of Christmas activities ranging from a golf tournament and craft classes Dec. 19 and 20 to the traditional New Year's Day luncheon Jan. 1.

The Madrigal Dinner Concert is at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Dec. 22, and medieval food and music feast that costs \$15 for adults and \$8 for children younger than 10. There are also greenhouse tours, craft and music classes, tree trimming events, a Christmas Day feast, and all kinds of other attractions at this unusual non-profit garden in Pine Mountain, Ga.

**CONTINUE I-75** to Florida, and you will find the world's largest decorated Christmas tree in Lantana, a festival parade Dec. 13, at Ocala; a grand Christmas illumination ceremony at St. Augustine Dec. 15; an 800-voice candlelight procession at Lake Buena Vista mid-December; and Christmas boat parades Dec. 20 or 21 in Deland, Fort Lauderdale, Madeira Beach and Pompano.

**IF YOU ARE** going south to Texas, you will find two unusual events: the Christmas Tree Forest in Corpus Christi and the Fiesta Navidena in San Antonio.

The Christmas Tree Forest, in the Art Museum of South Texas, this year carries the theme, "A Victorian Yuletide." A 20-foot, two-story Victorian housefront with stained glass windows is a backdrop for 40 decorated trees and a Santa's workshop. That's Dec. 10-24.

**Fiesta Navidena** is a three-day festival Dec. 12-14 in San Antonio's Market Square. There are mariachi bands, Mexican folk dances and lots of food and gifts at both El Mercado, the Mexican market, and at Farmer's Market, which sells fresh fruits and vegetables as well as gifts.

The Blessing of the Animals occurs when festival-goers bring their pets to Market Square on Saturday afternoon.

Las Posadas, a procession symbolizing the Holy Family's search for an inn, closes the festivities at 6 p.m. Dec. 14. It is staged along with the Fiesta de las Luminarias, a fiesta of lights along the beautiful River Walk beside the San Antonio River.

**CLOSER TO HOME**, on the Lincoln Heritage Trail, Christmas attractions mark the highway route that follows Abraham Lincoln's life through Kentucky, Indiana, and Illinois. A Christmas village opens the festivities this weekend, Dec. 6-7, at Henderson County High School in Henderson, Ky.

There is a Christmas candlelight tour Dec. 7 at the Benjamin Harrison home in Indianapolis. Christmas at the Zoo Dec. 12-21 at the Indianapolis Zoo and an Ethnic Christmas all month at the Indianapolis Children's Museum.

Fort Wayne, Ind., also has a Christmas time at the Zoo Dec. 12-23.

In Illinois, you will find a Statehood Day celebration with candlelight tours and entertainment in Springfield and an exhibit of American crafts all month at the Springfield Art Association.

There is a new Salem Christmas at Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site from noon to 4 p.m. Dec. 6 and 7 in New Salem; a Christmas tree decorating party at the Vandalia Statehouse Historic Site Dec. 13 and 14 in Lerna; Christmas at the Clayville Rural Life Center and Museum in Pleasant Plains, Dec. 14; and Christmas at the Statehouse in Vandalia Dec. 15-19.

## Good seats, a kosher flight and some holiday travel hints

As I approach the deadline for this column, I am flying home from Israel aboard El Al Flight 009. As usual, when I fly a Boeing 747, I ask for a bulkhead seat because it gives me extra leg room.

The three seats on either side of the emergency doors adjacent to the kitchen, or the toilets, are the best seats in the plane if you can't fly first class.

By choice, I would always take the ones next to the kitchen, even if the attendants run over my feet with the food trolleys, but this time I got the aisle seat next to the toilets, which means enduring the periodic line-ups for the washrooms. C'est la vie.

A national airline is often reflective of the nation itself, and El Al is no exception. From my seat, I can see men walking up and down the aisles with yarmulkes on their heads and even a few of the very orthodox Hasidic Jewish men with their long ear curls, black suits and hats.

**THE WOMAN** sitting next to me, like so many of the people I met in Israel, is an American who emigrated to the Holy Land. She came originally from Los Angeles, but now she lives in the ancient city of Jerusalem.

Crouched next to her is another passenger who stopped on his way down the aisle for a brief chat; he is a young man who lives on a kibbutz in the Golan Heights within two miles of the Syrian border.

A kibbutz is a communal village in which families share work and all public buildings, usually as either a farm community or for small industry.

This flight starts at 8 a.m. from Ben Gurion International Airport near Tel Aviv, flies 11 hours to Montreal and another hour to New York. On the way, we have two movies and three meals to break the monotony, but we are all still exhausted long before the wheels touch down in North America.

The meals are kosher, which means that no meat or dairy product is served at the same meal. If you did not know this ancient religious law, you would not be aware of anything unusual, but look again and you will see that the breakfast tray contains eggs and cheese but no meat, and the dinner tray includes margarine and dried vegetable-based coffee creamers, but no milk foods.

**MORE ABOUT** that next week when I tell you about Israel. Right now, I'd like to share some air travel tips collected from another airline, United.

In order to avoid the hassles that sometimes accompany over-crowded holiday travel conditions, United suggests the following:

Book a specific return flight to be sure you get home on time. Obtain tickets by mail or from your agent before you go to the airport.

Ask somebody to drive you to the airport so you don't have to park. Get there at least an hour before flight time.

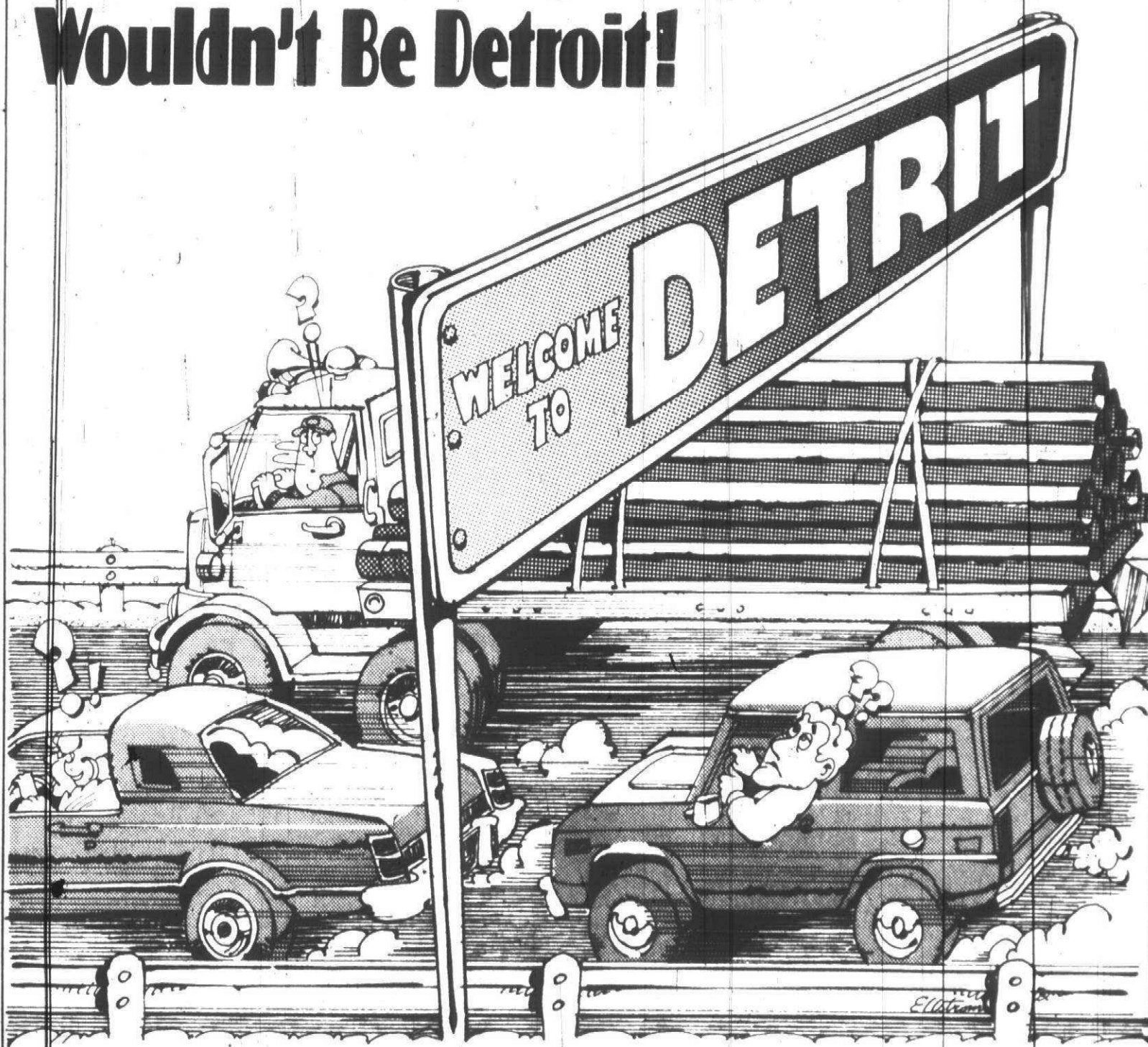
Mark luggage clearly on the outside, and be sure to pack identification and an itinerary on the inside of your bag in case it gets lost. Be prepared to have carry-on luggage inspected, which takes time.

Be prepared for the possible unwrapping of your Christmas gifts during this inspection. To avoid that, either wrap your gifts after you get to your destination or pack them in your luggage.

You can send packages weighing less than 50 pounds by United's package dispatch for arrival the same day they are sent or you can send larger packages by air freight, both of which cost money.

If you have wrapped gifts in your hand when you arrive at the airport for check-in, you can ask any airline for a free carton, which will then be closed and checked as regular flight baggage.

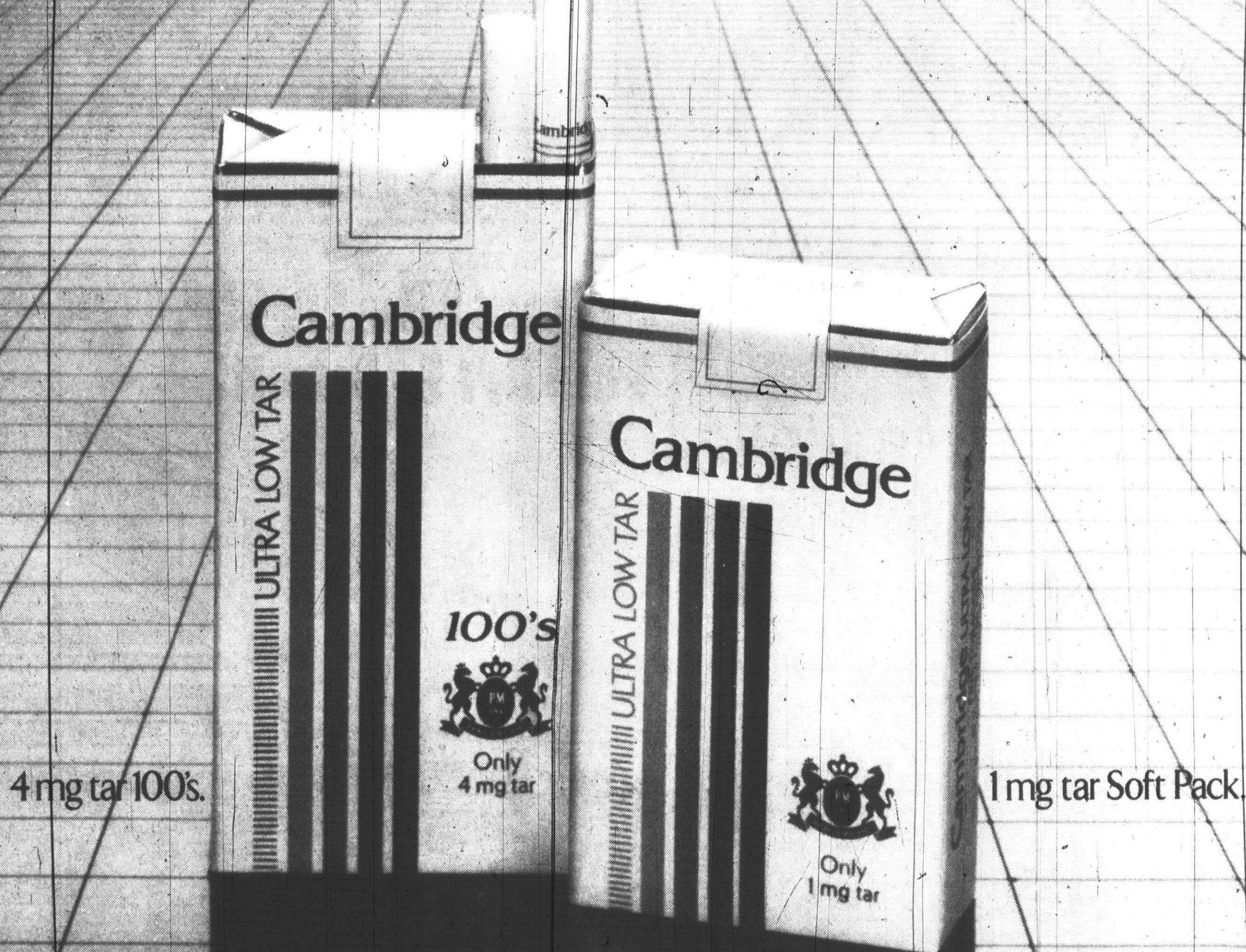

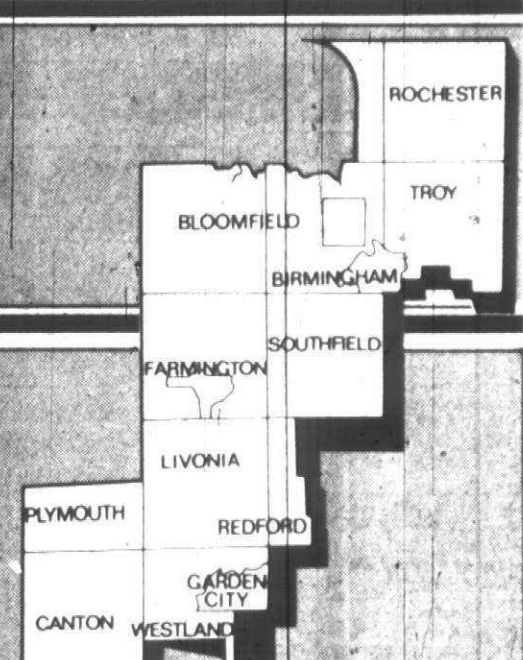

# Need a stocking stuffer?

It's time to start thinking about Christmas presents, and the Automotive Information Council again has issued its annual suggestions of gifts to car owners.

With more and more drivers getting involved in their own service work, the AIC suggests a trouble light with a long cord for use under the car and under the hood.

A good companion for the light is a creeper, which permits easy scooting under the car, or a pair of portable ramps, which bring the car up for easier underneath access.

A small set of socket wrenches and one for spark plugs also will be popular with the do-it-yourselfer, along with a slip-proof fender cover.

For the average car owner, the AIC suggests putting together an emergency kit for the trunk. It should include battery jumper cables, a flashlight, safety flares or reflectors, a fire extinguisher and a first aid kit.

A roll of electrical tape and a spool of wire should be included for temporary repairs. The tape can stop leaks on almost any kind of hose, and the wire can be used to make a hose clamp.

The kit also should include an inexpensive plastic raincoat in case of a rainy emergency.

A couple of white cloths can be used as distress flags and for post-repair clean-up.

Tools that should be included: pliers, adjustable wrench, blade screwdriver, Phillips screwdriver and a tire-pressure gauge.

All of these items, readily available from any store that sells auto equipment, can be stored in a large fishing-tackle box or a sturdy cardboard box.

Strips of carpet or specially made metal grating may be used on ice to get a stopped car moving. The old standby snow shovel is always a good idea during the snow season.

A pair of waterproof mittens can keep cold hands dry in wet weather. A spare ice scraper will be a real convenience if (and when) the car owner's regular ice scraper breaks on a cold morning.

Several hard-chocolate candy bars or granola bars and some hard candies can offer a pick-me-up or even keep someone comfortable if stranded. A CB radio also can be a big help to a stranded driver. A couple of reflective "space" blankets can provide warmth while taking up little storage space.

While these gift suggestions are not glamour items, they will be well appreciated by any driver because of their thoughtfulness.
