## Tax plan defeat spurs cautious look at rate cut

Supervisor James Poole is considering a half-mill tax cut in the wake of last week's defeat of Proposition A.

His considerations, however, will contain a strong dose of caution. Poole fears that another statewide ballot proposition for Michigan tax reform could penalize local units of government for lowering their millage rates.

Proposition A, for example, would have frozen Canton's operating millage at less than half the rate currently allowed by law.

One provision of the May 19 ballot proposal limited a municipality's millage rate to no higher than that of the previous year.

Last fall, the former Township Board tightened its fiscal belt to give property owners a net half-mill decrease (50 cents per \$1,000 assessed property valuation.) That cut, coupled with a juggling of millage rates for op-

eration, police and fire, sliced the tax rate for operations from Canton's 5-mill charter limit to only 2.39 mills.

If Proposition A had been approved May 19, the Township Board could have levied only 2.39 mills next year without a vote of the people.

**I AM CONSIDERING it,** Poole said of a 1982 millage cut. "But I don't have any plans until I know what's happening (with another tax proposal from the Michigan Legislature or Robert Tisch.)"

Poole had announced plans for recommending a half-mill tax cut prior to placement of Proposal A on the May 19 ballot.

He shelved those plans after finance director Mike Gorman estimated the impact of the proposal on Canton

## Faust favors vote on 'Tisch 3' plan

Voters may get another chance to decide whether they want a property tax cut.

State Senate Majority Leader William Faust, D-Westland, thinks the Legislature should consider placing Robert Tisch's third tax cut proposal on the ballot since Proposal A was rejected by voters last Tuesday.

Tisch is the Shiawassee drain commissioner whose attempts to have his proposal placed on the ballot with Proposal A were rebuffed by legislators.

"One viable alternative is to put Tisch 3 on the ballot by itself in a special election this year and let voters decide if they want the consequences of a radical tax cut that would cut \$2.7 billion out of a \$4.8 billion (state) budget," said Faust, whose district also includes Garden City and Canton Township. "It would literally stop state services."

THE STATE is supposed to reimburse local governments for the special election for Proposal A at a cost of about \$1.5 million. Faust said he thought that placing Tisch's plan on the

ballot in October, although a regular election is held in November, would be worth the added cost.

"It has to be done in the next budget year, which begins in October," he explained. "If Tisch 3 passed, it goes into effect in October 1982, and that would give us an 11-month lead-in to write a new budget."

An election at a later date would mean the Legislature would only have from April until October to write a new budget, Faust said.

"Any proposal stands naked to the world on the ballot and will produce coalitions against it," Faust continued. "My feelings have changed. I don't think that Tisch-3, alone on the ballot, will pass."

FAUST SAID he based that opinion on voters' record of having rejected tax cutting proposals four times. He admitted that one Tisch proposal got more votes than any of the others, but pointed out that none received 50 percent of the vote.

The Legislature will take up discus-

## Get your garden plot now

Gardeners should set their alarm clocks for early Thursday morning if they're hoping to plant tomatoes and squash on township plots this year.

Registration for the plots at the corner of Lilley and Warren is scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, May 28, in recreation offices. The department is located in Township Hall on Canton Center at Proctor.

Mike Gouin, superintendent of the Canton Parks and Recreation Department, advises residents to arrive early at the registration site.

Up for grabs are approximately 200 garden plots, measuring about 25 by 50 feet. According to Gouin, about 200 residents already have called about the annual garden plot program.

To register for a plot, gardeners

must bring proof of Canton residency. The fee for each plot is \$2.

Gouin said the garden plot area has been staked and partially disked. Residents may request a particular garden plot at the time of registration.

Developer Richard Lewiston, who owns the garden plot area, has allowed Canton Township to use the parcel for the last several years.

## School candidates eye district financing

Predictably, candidates for the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education have different ideas about financing education in the school district.

The divergence of viewpoints especially can be seen when candidates discuss the need for additional property-tax millage for operation and/or maintenance.

On June 8 residents of the district will be asked to approve two ballot issues dealing with school finances.

One proposal is a request to increase the operating levy by one mill or \$1 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation (SEV) for a period of eight years.

The second proposal is a request to levy the "authorized rate," which is commonly referred to as the Headlee rollback proposal.

The request for permission to levy the authorized rate in effect would allow the district to levy nine-tenths of a mill (90 cents per \$1,000 SEV) which otherwise would have been reduced from the operating levy because property valuations in Plymouth-Canton have increased greater than the cost-of-living.

Although the June 8 ballot will not include such a request there has been, and still is, some sentiment among school administrators and trustees to seek voter approval of millage which would be earmarked for maintenance

of buildings and school property.

During the recent public hearings held on redistricting and expansion of Extended School Year (ESY), some residents expressed a desire to vote for added millage for debt retirement to provide classroom space without expanding ESY or without disrupting neighborhood school boundaries.

Because of the alternative ideas about millage proposals held by parents, administrators and school trustees, each candidate was asked:

**Q. Which of the following ballot proposals would you support, and why?**

• Headlee Rollback of nine-tenths of one mill.

• One-third or one-half a mill earmarked for maintenance.

• An additional one mill for operation.

• An additional one mill for bonded indebtedness to meet student growth in whatever way seems most appropriate.

The response of each candidate follows:

**DAVID BONE** of Canton:

"Being a professional educator, I know schools are in a very difficult financial situation today. As a taxpayer, I know how tough it is to make ends meet.

"If chosen as a member of the Board

of Education, I would strive to weigh the benefits of all school programs against the burden they place upon the taxpayer.

"At this time there are no clear answers on what will be done about school financing statewide or in our local district, but it appears that all districts will have to undergo further belt-tightening."

**WILLIAM DECKER** of Plymouth Township:

"Since the school board members, on behalf of the administration, must be held accountable to their constituents

## Festival monarch to reign over cowchip invitational

The Canton Country Festival board is scouring the township for a queen.

Entries should be submitted to Art Winkle at the Canton Fire Department, 128 N. Canton Center 48187. The deadline is July 7.

**FESTIVAL BOARD** members also are seeking participants for Canton Township's first parade.

The parade is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m., Aug. 8, on Saltz near Sheldon. The parade will progress west to Canton Center, north to Ford, east to Sheldon and then south to Saltz.

The theme of the parade is "A li'l bit country — a lotta fun."

Entry applications for the parade should be submitted by July 1 to Canton Country Festival headquarters, 44520 Michigan Avenue, Canton 48188. Festival headquarters are located inside the Wayne Bank.

Parade application forms are available at two branches of the Wayne Bank — 44520 Michigan and 41652 Ford; Schwartz Greenhouse Shop, 8201 Lilley; the Canton Public Library, 1150 S. Canton Center; and the Canton Chamber of Commerce, 5773 Canton Center.

Also needed for the three-day festival in Griffin Park are additional concession stands. Interested clubs and homeowner associations are

urged to call festival headquarters at 397-1604.

**MANY OF THE** festival's dinners and special events already have been scheduled.

Meals include a dinner of the Canton Jaycees on Friday, a pancake breakfast of the Canton Rotary Club on Saturday, a spaghetti dinner of the Canton firefighters on Saturday and a chicken barbecue of the Chamber of Commerce on Sunday.

A logo designed by Canton resident Conrad Voshen has been selected for this year's event by the festival board. The logo features a red balloon, "because a balloon represents fun for all ages," said Dr. Jim Gillig, chairman of the parade committee.

## Planners study tall signs near freeway

There's no rest for the weary. Weary travelers who drive past the Knight's Inn because they can't see the motel from the freeway, that is.

Officials of the Knight's Inn on Ford Road and I-275 say business is suffering because Canton's restrictive sign ordinance forbids large or free-standing signs.

Upon request of the Township Board, Canton's planning commission will hear a presentation by Knight's Inn at a meeting on June 8, then begin reviewing the ordinance as it pertains to businesses located along the freeway.

The board recently heard comments from Arthur Stiles, an official from Knight's Inn headquarters in Columbus, Ohio. Stiles said more than 70 percent of travelers decide where to stay "at least partially" because of signs and appearance.

"SIGNS ARE extraordinarily important in the motel industry," Stiles said. "Seventy-five percent of people travel without advance reservation."

Stiles showed a film indicating that the motel's current sign is difficult to see by travelers driving 55 miles per hour along the freeway. Also making it harder to see are the motel's low-lying construction, shrubs along the roadway and the fact that it is situated behind the Bob Evans restaurant.

The 107-unit motel was constructed in 1980. Why was Canton selected, in view of its tight sign stipulations?

Stiles said a site-selection committee had been told in 1979 that the sign ordinance was being revised. But those changes didn't help.

Many customers now are coming as referrals from other fully booked motels.

"A SURVEY of guests indicated many didn't notice (Knight's Inn) until they passed it," Stiles said. "We're suffering, and we have to depend on our competitors to fill our motel."

Stiles said highway billboards are very difficult to obtain. He said he would like a variance to allow a free-standing sign about 50 feet high which would be more easily seen from the freeway.

Bob Card of McDonald's restaurant at Michigan and I-275 said he has a similar problem with poor visibility due to small signs.

"We have a real need for a sign," Card said. "I don't know how long we can exist if we can't attract customers from I-275."

## ESY reversed for Bird, Fiegel

Friday afternoon, in a special meeting, the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education voted to allow Bird and Fiegel schools to remain on a traditional, nine-month calendar for the coming year.

The schools had been slated for ESY (Extended School Year) next fall. The change was based on more recent head counts, which indicate declining enrollments at both schools.

As part of that action, the board voted to have students from Honeytree and Stoneybrook apartments remain at Tanger, have students from Waverly subdivision remain at Starkweather, and have students from Old Orchard and Timberlea Farms subdivisions remain at Allen.

Sixth-graders from Honeytree still will attend Lowell Middle School next year. Three sixth-grade classes from Bird will attend West Middle next fall, with the balance of the Bird sixth-graders remaining at Bird.

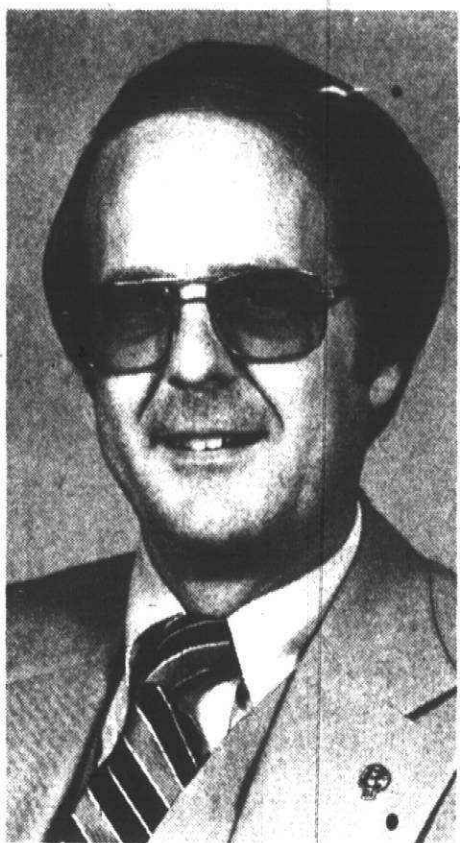

## Board candidates' views split on school financing

as to their recommendations pertaining to any ballot proposals regarding millage requests, I do not feel adequately informed or prepared to answer your questions regarding sample ballot proposals without first knowing the reasoning and logic used in developing such example issues.

"I would have to know and under-

stand the total budget needs for each specific area before I could justify my reasons for such recommendation and support."

**STEPHEN HARPER** of Plymouth Township:

"Each one is valid proposal under right circumstances. To continue present programs and services next year, schools will need Headlee Rollback and

one additional mill for operation together.

"To house additional students, most economical financing method is bonded indebtedness. To insure maintenance, an earmarked levy guarantees funds will be spent for that purpose.

"I support presenting voters with all information and asking them to decide level of programs and services desired. We need more direct citizen participation in decision-making on these critical financing issues."

**MARILYN RICKARD** of Canton:

"One look at the ceilings and walls of Central Middle ought to convince the public of the necessity for a portion of

a mill to be earmarked for maintenance.

"With all the massive budget cuts at the federal and state level, it has become necessary to seek an additional mill primarily to keep the deficit we already face at a manageable latitude.

"Since we are now in a position of declining enrollment, a proposal for bonded indebtedness to meet student growth in 'whatever way seems most appropriate' is a moot point. The public will no longer tolerate requests for 'blank check' bond proposals."

ate in the past have voiced their approval to levy the authorized millage rate and, in my belief, will continue to do so. Again, the mill for operation would help diminish the amount of cut-backs."

**CHARLES WASHBURN** of Plymouth Township:

"I could not in good conscience ask the voters for more money after put-

ting the district through such an upheaval with redistricting and program changes which, as the facts unfold, may have been unnecessary.

"Proposing and approving a budget which provides cuts closest to student contact with no central administration cuts is not exactly my idea of the way to educate our children.

"When and if this credibility gap is corrected, I could support tax increases if they prove necessary."

finances. Gorman figured that Canton would lose \$250,000 to \$300,000 — about the same as a half-mill cut — through the implementation of Proposal A.

Poole said the Township Board will determine the 1982 millage rate by August or September. Under Canton's charter, a budget based on that millage rate must be adopted by Oct. 31.

## Student paper honored by SC

The student newspaper at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP) won a total of nine awards in the seventh annual high school journalism contest conducted by Schoolcraft College.

Only one other newspaper, the Rush of Redford Union High School won more (10 awards) while the Insight of Thurston High and the Jay of Southfield High also won nine awards.

First place winners for the CEP Perspective were Jay Keenan, photography; Marilyn Morrison and Susie Pierce, editorial.

Second place awards were earned by Jay Keenan in sports and by Tom Conwell for photography.

Laurie Golden won an honorable mention for news writing, Steve McFarland for cartoon illustration, and the CEP Perspective staff earned honorable mention for typography and advertising.

**THE FIRST PLACE** editorial written by Morrison and Pierce was entitled "Mentally Handicapped Need Understanding," which was published April 16 this year.

The editorial was written in response to concerns expressed about the location of a foster home for mentally retarded adults on Beech Court in the city of Plymouth. The editorial began:

"What would life be like in a world of beautiful, strong seagulls? Strong, powerful wings soar to any height. Freedom to decide, freedom to choose, freedom to move and set goals, freedom for togetherness or solitude, freedom to plan for the future, freedom to belong."

"What if your wings were short and weak and you could not keep up with the strong? What would it feel like to be left behind or alone?"

"In today's world where physical and mental excellence have become so admired, so sought after, many persons' values have been distorted by the mirage," commented Steve Barnaby, editor of the Farmington Observer. They judged the editorial category. "They would be forever an ordinary person, anyone less biologically fortunate."

"But Marilyn Morrison and Susie Pierce in their editorial go a long way toward bringing society back to reality."

"Indeed there does exist in our society persons with wings too short and

weak to keep up with the strong. But the two CEP students graphically demonstrate that the retarded, with help, understanding and love from the rest of us can develop into contributing members of society."

"The group home issue is one of the most controversial of our times. Not since the civil rights movement of the early '60s has more fear been displayed by those who feel threatened by what they perceive as intruders into their suburban dream."

Golden's dramatic mention for news writing was an article entitled "Students, Faculty Critical of Reading Test."

Keenan won a second place for sports writing for a report entitled "1980 Golden Glove Winner," a personality profile of a boxer.

Keenan's first-place award for photography was for a picture taken at an anti-draft rally in Kellogg Park. Conwell won a second place for a picture taken of Nazis in Kellogg Park. The judging was done by Bob Woodring, a free-lance photographer from Canton.

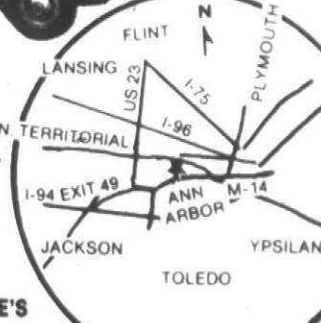

# Senior day care centers — an alternative to institutions

Mrs. McDermott is a Southfield resident, a gerontology major at Madonna College and a member of the Michigan Association of Senior Day Care Centers. For more than five years, she has been a patient advocate for Citizens for Better Care. Guest columns by other readers are welcome.

"New beginnings" is a term being used nationally to help ease the financial situation in our country.

New beginnings aptly describes the alternative offered to senior citizens living in a community where senior day care is available. Unfortunately, most individuals don't understand what senior day care means.

Senior day care is a generic term that applies to a variety of services from active rehabilitation to social and health-related care.

Based on services performed, various terms include day care, day treatment, partial hospitalization and day hospital care.

Nationally, more than 600 senior day care programs exist and the number is rapidly growing. In Michigan, however, to my knowledge, there are only 11 such programs in Ann Arbor, Dearborn, Flint, Grand Rapids, Hamtramck, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Manistee, Marquette and Detroit.

IN OAKLAND County, no comparable services are offered to our elderly. Yet living in our community today are countless elderly persons who are at high risk. They are unable to adequately meet the needs of daily living without some third party assistance.

One option being investigated by a number of communities as a viable alternative to institutionalization is senior day care.

In some cases, social models are used to care for seniors living in extended family homes with loved ones. Respite care, in addition to offering a congenial, pleasant atmosphere, also relieves close family members of constant 24-hour care.

When these centers are close to senior centers where many activities are offered for recreational diversity, it provides a previously homebound person the opportunity to mingle and share friendships with well peers. This can be therapeutic.

BY USING the services of local hospitals and medical personnel, the medical model helps to closely monitor at-risk elderly whose health is deteriorating. Preventive care then can alert the elderly and their families to impending physical ailments or disabilities.

Possible services for senior day care programs might be reality orientation and retraining in activities of daily living for stroke victims, recreational activities for mental stimulation, intellectual stimulation through educational experience, physical exercise and a better-rounded nutritional foundation.

The ultimate achievement would be maintenance of living standards by allowing people to live out their waning years with dignity and pride. Quality of life is a well-cherished American tradition and should continue to be high on our list of priorities.

From a cost containment perspective, day care is extremely useful in holding the line when compared to institutionalization, foster home care and chore services in the home.

The average cost of nursing home care in our state is \$11,000. Foster care placements cost approximately \$6,000 and in-home chore service averages \$3,600 annually. Day care can be offered for \$3,013 a year based on present available data.

Existing national programs have been grassroots oriented, because influential people have seen a need and acted to respond in a positive way.

We cannot avoid addressing the problems faced by our mushrooming elderly population. The time is now for us to be making this concept a reality.

## Town names commercial and oriental

A city in Pennsylvania was named after a candy bar. It is called Hershey.

A town in Iowa shares its name with a refrigerator. It is called Amana.

Tarzana, Calif., is named for the fictitious ape man.

Michigan could easily have the only town in the United States named for a shopping center. That's Westland.

The J.L. Hudson Co. chose this western Detroit suburb as its site for a second major shopping center to follow the pattern of the first of its kind in the southeast corner of Southfield, Northland Center.

Hudson's development prompted Nankin Township leaders to call for a vote of cityhood to protect the property tax benefits. This isn't so unusual when you consider that other cities exist as by-products of race tracks or industrial expansion.

BEFORE IT was named for a mall, Westland had other origins shared with a couple of other Detroit suburbs.

Communities such as Pekin (now Dearborn), Canton, and Nankin (Westland) were all named for a Chinese counterpart, probably a result of British trade during the early 1800s. During that time, China was opened to trade with the West, prior to the Opium Wars.

Despite the Revolutionary War, the Michigan Territory was staunchly British until the War of 1812. When we celebrate the Fourth of July, it might mean a free holiday today, but Michiganders were loyal British subjects when Easterners signed the declaration of freedom.

During the 1825 expansion, encouraged by the opening of the Erie Canal and the auctioning of land, Detroiters better communicated with British relatives and benefited from the Chinese trade.

CANTON WAS settled in 1825 by Perry Sheldon, David Cady and Childs Downer, becoming Sheldon's Corners.

Dearborn had been called Ten Eyck, Bucklin and Pekin before being called Dearborn after the 1812 commander, Gen. Henry Dearborn.

Since most histories are seemingly recorded only after white settlers open a territory, the only major reference to the earliest inhabitants is the city of Pontiac (Chief Pontiac) and an automobile namesake.

Redford wasn't official until Azarias Bell arrived



in 1818. The Shiawassee, Ann Arbor and Grand River trails passed through or near this fording of the Rouge River, thus the evolution of the name Red (rouge) and Ford (fording of the river).

A post office was assigned to this area and was first called North Pekin in January 1833. Five months later, the name became Redford.

RESIDENTS OF particular areas bring with them heritages of towns.

Wars create generals suggesting village names. Politicians seeking governmental favors might suggest names for political leaders.

Towns being named for world trade centers are not unusual when you notice that there are towns called Peru and Brazil in Indiana, and Cairo, Cuba and Havana in Illinois.

Since the Chippewa and Potawatomi nations have been blown away by civilization like the once-mountainous dunes of Lake Michigan, all we have left are sprawling suburbs named for the distant Chinese dynasties.

## Property taxes not fair for some cities

Homeowners like to complain about the heavy burden of property taxes.

The grumbling increased as the debate heated up over Proposal A, the property tax relief plan voters rejected by a 3-to-1 margin last Tuesday.

But a review of the property tax burden isn't complete unless there is serious study about the inequities of property taxation — both as it applies to those who pay and those in local government who collect.

The U.S. Constitution guarantees that no one shall be denied equal protection of the law. But it is clear among neighboring suburbs that some cities with a wealthy industrial and commercial tax base have more protection than other communities.

To get into a comparison, let's take a look at how the current property tax system affects homeowners and how much public services they received through property taxes.

For purposes of example, let's assume that identical houses in different communities have the same local assessment and state equalized valuation.

That would mean two homeowners with the same size home and amenities and the same millage rate would pay identical property tax bills.

But what do they get for their taxes?

THE DIFFERENCES come about through the development of business and industry — or lack of it — at a certain point in time.

A good example is the Westland-Livonia growth pattern.

At one point in the 1950s, Westland (then known as Nankin Township) had a larger population than Livonia. But the housing boom after the Korean War helped Livonia's population grow a little more than Westland's.

The main difference between them was that Livonia also received industrial growth — four major General Motors plants, two large Ford Motor facilities, several supermarket warehouses and hundreds of smaller plants along the railroad.

Westland's major taxpayer is Westland Shopping Center.

A few miles away, Garden City notes it is the home of the first Kmart in the country. It also has a modest industrial park — and that's about it for a property tax base.

In dollars and cents, Livonia's property tax revenue is more than double Westland's, and about five times greater than Garden City's.

From the homeowner's point of view, it means that one mill (\$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) generates \$1.2 million in Livonia, about \$500,000 in Westland and \$250,000 in Garden City.

So Garden City residents, with little industrial property to tax, pay a relatively high millage rate for city services but get a lot less for their money.

AS FOR city administration: Livonia has a planning department of 11 persons, including seven professionals. Westland has only two professionals on staff.

Garden City didn't have a full-time planner until 15 months ago. He has no assistant, does his own drafting work, and shares a secretary.

PROPOSAL A would have represented a move in the right direction, sharing the cost of the cities among all of Michigan's taxpayers.

But city and school officials were upset because such equity would mean a big drop in revenues for their institutions.

Local leaders prefer to control the destinies of their own communities, even if it means struggling along with unequal sources of money.

## A heart filled with poetry

Ron Brasch said that. I'm not sure he said it first. But Brasch, who writes advertising copy and poetry, means it's harder to dance well than to walk well. And for sure it's tough to write well.

Brasch's goal is to use words in conjunction which each other as they've never before been seen. To make commonplace language unique is the very core of communication, he believes.

My secret ambition is to publish a novel, a short story or a poem for posterity. I love the newspaper business. But agonizing over a 20-inch story and visualizing it wrapped around yesterday's garbage can be discouraging. Ah, the woes of fleeting fame.

It must be sheer euphoria to have reached the pinnacle in life where an adoring public clamors for your every thought, fantasy and conviction. Of course, nobody gives a damn about your opinions unless you're published or have otherwise distinguished yourself.

In my dreams, I see rapt audiences held spellbound while I dissertate on such subjects as why I hate rutabagas and adore Robert Redford. If I could only write my memoirs before I become famous.

AMONG MY memoirs are a bunch of poems I wrote about such commonplace subjects as bringing up kids, taking in a stray dog and fighting with a bridge partner.

When I read the literary gems to my friends, they shook their heads in commiseration and agreed, "How true, how true." These well-meaners urged me to mail my rhymes to women's magazines to make the world a better, wiser place.

So like a mother hen, I sent my tender little fledglings out into the cold, cruel world of publishers where I feared my babies would be booted to the bottom of wastebaskets buried under cigar butts. But they weren't. They came home to roost along with rejection slips.

How sad it is that women everywhere are deprived of sharing my universal thoughts, nodding their heads and saying "How true, how true." But I guess I didn't achieve the uniqueness to which Brasch aspires.

The 34-year-old poet from Farmington Hills, for instance, got one inspiration when he was traveling on an island along the coast of France. How can I be inspired when I'm driving from Southfield to Birmingham in my daily travels?

ANYWAY, BRASCH saw an old church and had an image of a deserted church in northern Michigan. He wrote the poem, "Christen," which starts, "We find this place in late summer when crops go fallow —"

And on one New Year's Eve, Brasch wrote a poem about grandmothers shopping in a supermarket. They were fondling the lettuce and talking about their grandchildren as though that's all they had. That is all they have, these women who were once young and desirable, Brasch said.

That's depressing but it's sure making the commonplace unique. It's like Brasch's poem about a photograph which captures a happy moment, never to be recaptured except in memory.

If fate decrees that I will never be a rich and famous writer, I take heart in a poem by Peter Altenberg:

"I never dreamed of being Shakespeare or Goethe. And I never expected to hold the great mirror of truth up before the world. I dreamed only of being a little pocket mirror, the sort that a woman can carry in her purse. One that reflects small blemishes and some great beauties when held close enough to the heart."

## CITY OF PLYMOUTH MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 81-5

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER, WHICH NEW CHAPTER SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS CHAPTER 7, ENTITLED "ESTABLISHMENT AND ORGANIZATION OF THE PLYMOUTH PUBLIC LIBRARY" OF SAID CODE

### THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

**Section 1. Establishment** A public library and reading room is hereby established under authority of Act 164, Public Acts of 1877, as amended, to be known as the Plymouth Public Library.

**Section 2. Board of Directors** The Mayor, with approval of the City Council, shall appoint five (5) members to a Board of Directors for the Plymouth Public Library, not more than one (1) of which may be a member of the City Council. One Director shall be appointed for a term of five (5) years; one for a term of four (4) years; one for a term of three (3) years; one for a term of two (2) years; and one for a term of one (1) year. Annually thereafter, the Mayor shall appoint one (1) Director for a term of five (5) years. The Mayor may, with the consent of the City Council, remove any Director for misconduct or neglect of duty.

Vacancies in the Board of Directors occasioned by removal, resignation, or otherwise, shall be filled in like manner as the original appointments.

No Director shall receive compensation as such.

**Section 3. Power and Duties** Immediately upon appointment, the Board of Directors shall meet and organize by election of a President, and such other officers as the Board may deem necessary.

**Section 4. Library Fund** A Library Fund is hereby established pursuant to Act 164, Public Acts of 1877, as amended. All monies received for the Public Library shall be deposited to the credit of the Library Fund, kept separate and apart from other monies of the City, and drawn upon by the proper officers of the City, upon properly authenticated vouchers of the Library Fund.

**Section 5. Annual Report** The Board of Directors shall make an annual report under the guidelines established under Michigan Statutes Annotated, Section 15.1667; MCLA 397.207.

**Section 6.** This emergency ordinance, for the health and welfare of the entire community, shall become operative and effective on May 26, 1981.

# Life-saving kits are now available

The kit has been designed to assist rescue efforts during an emergency situation by supplying vital medical information on the spot.

Called "Save-A-Life," the kit is sponsored by Woodland Medical Center. The center says the kit has been endorsed by police, fire and emergency medical personnel in a number of Wayne and Oakland county communities.

"Anyone that has a chronic health problem with the potential of rendering him or her unconscious lives with the fear of being unable to communicate during a medical crisis," said Dr. John Mucasey, president of Woodland Medical Group P.C., Novi.

"These individuals can have a hand in saving their own lives by having the right kind of information available for rescue personnel, and that's the purpose of a 'Save-A-Life' kit."

More than 11,000 kits have been handed out during the first few weeks of distribution.

## STRAWBERRY-PEACH SHORTCAKE RING

- 2 pints (4 cups) fresh strawberries
- 3 peaches or nectarines, sliced
- 1/4 cup Cointreau liqueur or 1/4 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 cans (10-oz. each) Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon grated orange peel
- 1/3 cup margarine or butter, melted
- Whipped cream

Heat oven to 375°F. Grease a 6 1/2-cup ring mold or 12-cup fluted tube pan. In large bowl, combine strawberries and peaches. Add liqueur and 2 tablespoons sugar. Gently stir to coat all of the fruit. Set aside.

Separate dough into 20 biscuits. Pour 1/4 cup margarine in bottom of prepared pan. Combine remaining sugar and orange peel. Dip each biscuit in remaining 1/3 cup margarine; then in sugar mixture. Place on edge in prepared pan, overlapping edges slightly.

Bake at 375°F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pan immediately. Cool 10 minutes before serving. Fill center of ring with fruit; spoon remaining liqueur over ring. To serve: Slice ring; serve each slice topped with fruit and whipped cream. 10 servings.

## VERY BERRY SHORTCAKE TORTE

- 2 pints (4 cups) fresh strawberries
- 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons margarine or butter
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 10-oz. can Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits
- 1 cup whipping cream, whipped and sweetened

Heat oven to 375°F. Reserve 6 to 8 whole strawberries for garnish. Lightly crush remaining strawberries. Add sugar to taste; mix well. Set aside.

In oven, melt 1 tablespoon margarine in each of 2 ungreased 8-inch round cake pans. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon sugar over margarine in each pan. Separate dough into 10 biscuits. Separate each biscuit into 2 layers. Arrange 10 layers in each prepared pan. Press over bottom, sealing edges. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon sugar over dough in each prepared pan. Bake at 375°F. for 12 to 16 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pan immediately. Cool.

Spoon strawberries over 1 biscuit layer; top with whipped cream. Add second layer; top with remaining berries and whipped cream. Garnish with whole strawberries. 8 servings.

## LEMON FLUFF SHORTCAKE

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 egg, separated
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 10-oz. can Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted
- 1 cup cantaloupe melon balls, sliced in half
- 1 cup honeydew melon balls, sliced in half

Heat oven to 400°F. Grease a cookie sheet. In medium saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch; stir in water. Cook over medium heat until mixture boils and thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. In small bowl, combine egg yolk, 1/2 teaspoon lemon peel and lemon juice; add a small amount of hot cornstarch mixture and blend well. Return egg mixture to saucepan; blend well. Cook just until mixture starts to bubble; stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in cream cheese. Beat until smooth. Cool. Beat remaining egg white until frothy; gradually add 2 tablespoons sugar, beating continuously until stiff peaks form. Fold into cooled lemon mixture. Chill.

Separate dough into 10 biscuits. Combine remaining sugar and lemon peel. Gently press 2 biscuits together for each shortcake. Dip top and sides of each in margarine; then in sugar mixture. Place on prepared cookie sheet. Bake at 400°F. for 12 to 16 minutes or until golden brown. Cool. Just before serving, fold melon slices into chilled lemon mixture. Split shortcakes; fill with lemon mixture. Top with additional lemon mixture. 5 servings.

## TOWERING STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

- 10-oz. can Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits
- 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, melted
- 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar
- 1 pint (2 cups) fresh strawberries, sliced and sweetened
- Whipped cream

Heat oven to 400°F. Grease a cookie sheet. Separate dough into 10 biscuits. Gently press 2 biscuits together for each shortcake. Dip top and sides of each in margarine, then in sugar. Place on prepared cookie sheet.

Bake at 400°F. for 12 to 16 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly; split and fill with strawberries and whipped cream. Top with additional strawberries and whipped cream. 5 servings.

TIP: One cup fresh blueberries may be substituted for 1 cup strawberries.

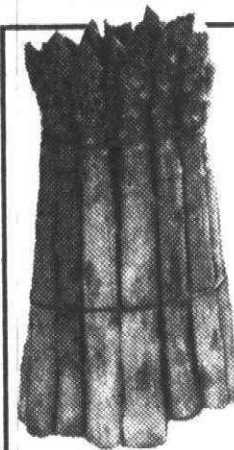

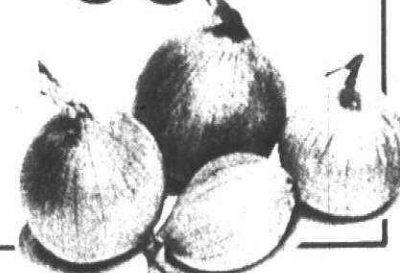

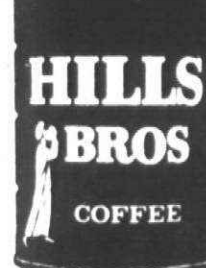

# A Question of Taste

## Gather your own grape leaves

A few weeks ago, avocados were selling at four for \$1 at a local market — an incredible bargain!

Since I had been saving an avocado salad recipe for just such an occasion, I bought four. Reviewing the recipe at home I discovered I lacked one ingredient — a special French mustard.

At least five stores later, I finally found the missing ingredient — at \$6 a jar. So much for my bargain.

I often run into this kind of a situation — especially with ethnic recipes. Peasant dishes, casseroles "in the manner of the thrifty housewife" — this type of fare frequently becomes expensive gourmet food in the process of crossing the ocean.

A mushroom that grows wild in France, a fish found abundantly off the coast of Ireland, a variety of hot pepper heaped high in open-air Mexican markets — all become elusive and exorbitant imported luxuries outside of their native habitats.

There are times when this perverse price escalation can be thwarted, however. An example is Greek stuffed grape leaves. Imported grape leaves are available in jars — in small quantities for inflated prices.

Fresh grape leaves are also available locally for the picking in late spring and summer. You may have grape vines in your own back yard. If not, check with your neighbors, along roadsides or in parks.

The vines you are looking for are wild. Domestic vines (those which actually bear grapes) produce leaves that are tough and inedible.

THE ONE TIME I had ever picked grape leaves was from an accommodating neighbor's fruit-bearing vines. Billy Bassaras, an excellent cook — particularly skilled in his native Greek cuisine — was kind enough to explain the distinction between wild and domestic grape leaves and to share his recipe for stuffed grape leaves.

Luckily, the domestic leaves I had picked were only to tuck in a jar of pickles. If the leaves had been stuffed instead, the result would have been a waste of ingredients — not too bad since the leaves were free and the rice inexpensive — and hours of work.

That's the catch. The stuffed grape leaves are delicious and inexpensive but very time-consuming. Your best bet would be to recruit

eager (or even reluctant) family and friends for an afternoon of leaf-picking and stuffing.

This social approach must surely be the one taken in Greek villages or their women would never be willing to endure the tedium of producing the involved foods that make up the complex, wonderful Greek cuisine.

Whether alone or in good company, once you have found a source of wild grape leaves, Billy Bassaras recommends that you pick "a ton." Any surplus can be wrapped, unwashed, in foil packets and frozen. When ready to serve, simply thaw the leaves, rinse well and cook.

The stuffed grape leaves can be served cold as an appetizer preceding an authentic Greek meal. You might want to finish such a meal with the marvelous Greek pastry, baklava. The best baklava is, of course, produced in the home.

Billy Bassaras makes his own — far superior to anything found in the stores and restaurants of Greentown.

PART OF HIS secret lies in the use of clarified butter. He recommends Land O'Lakes as having a better flavor, higher butterfat content and less water than other brands. (This is an observation I have heard from other discriminating cooks.)

In order to keep the pastry from crushing as you attempt to slice it, he suggests placing the pan of unbaked baklava in the freezer just long enough to freeze the layers of butter. At this point, the pastry can be neatly sliced into squares and then baked as usual.

Another traditional Greek dessert commonly available for sale in Greentown is Greek wedding cookies. Again, however, Billy Bassaras claims that these cookies do not begin to compare with those made in a Greek home.

As with the baklava, part of the secret lies in clarifying the butter. The dough must also be handled very lightly in order to prevent toughening the cookies. When they are properly prepared, Billy promises that these will melt in your mouth.

### STUFFED GRAPE LEAVES

1 jar vine leaves or 40-50 fresh wild grape leaves  
¾ cup raw rice  
2 onions, finely chopped  
1 tbsp. finely chopped parsley  
1 tbsp. chopped fresh dill

Juice from 2 lemons  
1 lemon, thinly sliced  
1 cup water  
¾ cup olive oil  
Salt and pepper

If using leaves from a jar, scald the leaves with hot water and drain. If using fresh leaves, rinse well and drop into a pot of boiling water. Remove the pan from the heat and allow to stand for 5 minutes. Drain. Cut off stems carefully from the leaves and drape over the edge of the colander to further drain.

In a skillet, saute the onions and parsley in 2 tablespoons hot olive oil; add rice, dill, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes. Set aside and cool. When cool stir in juice from the two lemons.

### To wrap:

Take a small, flat plate and brush with oil. Place leaf, shiny side down, with point of leaf facing away from you. Place 1 tablespoon of rice mixture in center of leaf. Fold each side of leaf in and roll up from the bottom as if rolling a cigar. Do not roll too tightly as rice expands during cooking and may split your leaves open.

Spread 2 tablespoons of olive oil in the bottom of a 5-quart pan and layer bottom with any leaves that may be torn or too small to use. Begin wrapping and layering stuffed grape leaves in pot. Lay lemon slices over each layer and sprinkle with a little olive oil. Pour water and any remaining oil over all the leaves. Place a plate on top (inverted) to weight them down and cover. Simmer over very low heat for 40-50 minutes. Remove, drain and cool before serving. To serve, arrange stuffed leaves on a large plate garnished with lemon slices and accompanied with a dish of yogurt seasoned with fresh dill.

### GREEK WEDDING COOKIES (Kourambietes)

1 lb. clarified butter  
1 egg yolk  
2 tbsp. confectioners' sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla or whiskey  
1 tsp. baking powder  
5 cups sifted flour (approx.)

Refrigerate clarified butter until slightly hardened. Remove from refrigerator and, using electric mixer, beat butter until it is very white and resembles whipping cream. Stir in egg yolk and 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar, vanilla and baking powder. Add flour and mix thoroughly, but be careful that you do not "manhandle" the dough or over-work it. Do not refrigerate unless you plan on using later. If refrigerated, allow the dough to return to room temperature before continuing. Shape the dough into little balls about ¾ of an inch in diameter and slightly flatten on cookie sheets and bake at 350° for 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove carefully from sheets and place on waxed paper to cool.

Sprinkle a very little ground cinnamon or cloves over tops of cookies. Sift a small amount of confectioners' sugar over tops, when thoroughly cooled, cover with sifted confectioners' sugar. Place 2 or 3 cookies in colored paper cups (muffin type) and arrange on large serving plate. May be stored in airtight container for several weeks.

### CHEESY CHICKEN 'N RICE

¾ cup water  
1 tsp. butter or margarine  
¼ tsp. salt  
2 slices (¾ oz. or 1 oz. each) process American cheese

¾ cup pre-cooked rice  
1 cup cooked mixed vegetables  
1 cup diced cooked chicken

Bring water, butter and salt to a boil in saucepan. Add cheese and stir until melted. Add rice, vegetables and chicken. Cover, remove from heat and let stand 10 minutes. Stir before serving. Makes 3 cups or 2 servings.

## Summer fun set in schools

A series of youth enrichment activities for this summer is being offered by the Community Education Department of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The activities include clowning, cartooning, drama, rocketry, photography, radio/electronics, T'ai Chi Ch'uan, typing, biology, arts and crafts.

Also included in the summer program are CPR workshops, Jim Glasgow's perceptual motor gym program, Kiddie Kamps, Safety Town, high school completion classes, swim instruction, a competitive swim club, and classes in basketball, dance, golf, gymnastics, racquetball, tennis and volleyball.

Registrations will be taken for Kiddie Kampus and Safety Town at 9 a.m. today in the community education office of Plymouth Canton High School.

Registration for all other classes will be from 4-8:30 p.m. Wednesday, 4-8:30 p.m. Thursday in the cafeteria of Canton High and then 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily in the community education offices of Canton High.

**KIDDIE KAMPUS** is a program for 4- and 5-year-olds held at the Child Care Center of Canton High and in Room 3739 of Plymouth Salem High.

A variety of times and days are available for the summer and fall terms. Instructors are Sue Visser and Nancy McDowell. The program includes large and small muscle activities, art, science adventures, music, story time and free play.

**Safety Town** is a two-week program for 4- and 5-year-olds with instruction on crossing with and without signals at intersections, bus safety, warnings about strangers, bicycle, home safety, medicine, fire prevention, railroad crossing dangers, and information about emergency vehicles, safety belts, playground equipment, toys and parked cars.

The sessions, all at Central Middle School, are from June 22 to July 2, July 6-16, July 20-30, and Aug. 3-13.

### THE YOUTH enrichment activities are:

- Arts and crafts for four weeks starting June 30.
- Be A Clown, four weeks starting June 30, a 16-hour workshop designed to explore clowning techniques. Includes make-up, props, wardrobe, mime, juggling, skits.
- Biology for four weeks starting June 30, ages 10-14.
- Cartooning for four weeks starting June 30, a simplified step-by-step procedure in sketching cartoon figures, perspective, composition; for ages 10-14.

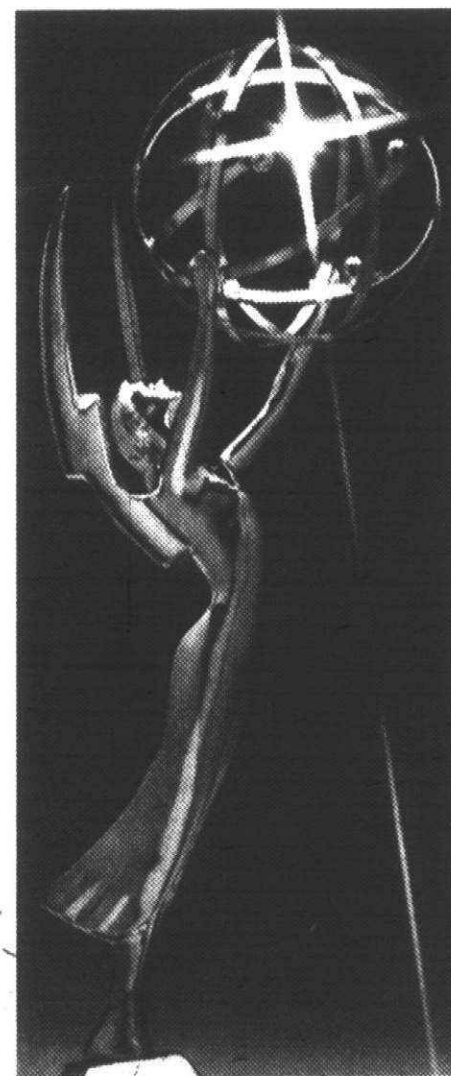

all, with the steak and crabmeat dinner complete with salad bar at the new Steak and Ale restaurant, the evening was well worth his \$65 bid, he said.

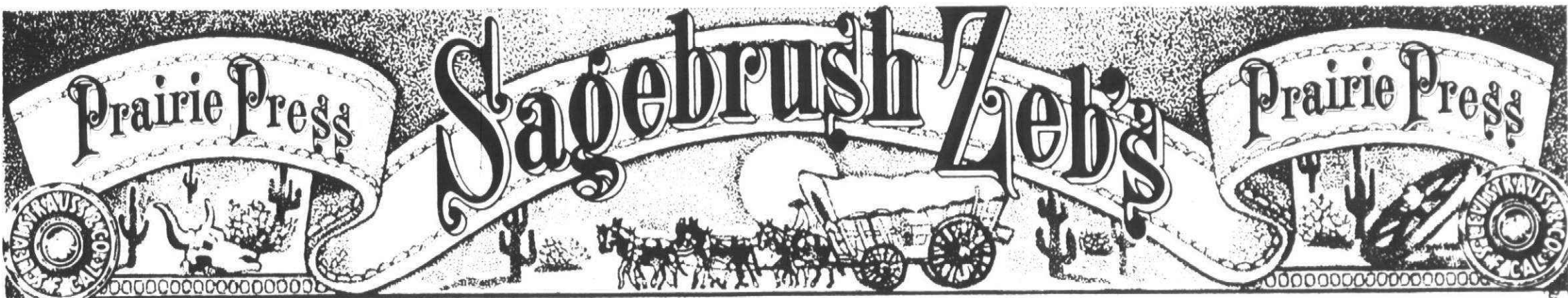

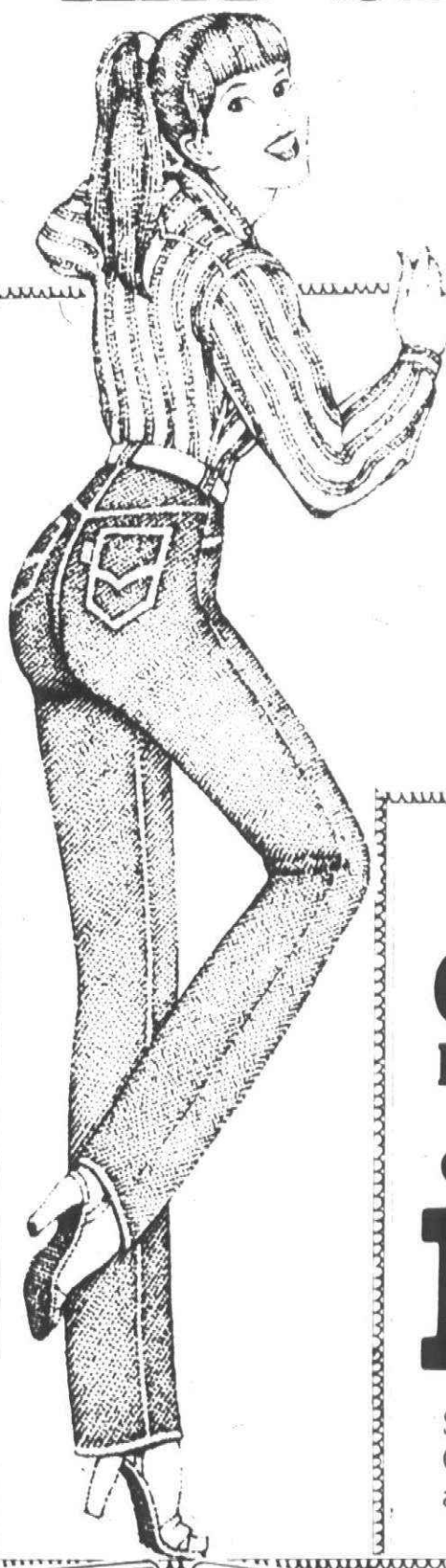

Usually, when the curtain goes down on the final number, members of the chorus stand quietly in place — no noise as they quietly leave the stage. After Sunday's concert, there was a general cheer and with no hats to throw in air, they threw their music.

The singers adjourned to the Plymouth Cultural Center for their afterglow. There were impromptu performances.

**IT WAS HELEN** Goebel Day Sunday at St. Peter Lutheran Church.

Members of the church and the school honored Mrs. Goebel, who is retiring in June after teaching kindergarten for 23 years at St. Peter School.

There was a coffee between morning services and a gift from the congregation — to help finance a retirement trip. Her family joined her for the second service in which prayers were offered for her and her children.

Seated with their mother were Philip and Ellie Goebel and children Carol and Joel of Plymouth Township; Elaine and Thomas Goebel and children Matthew and Scott of Auburn Heights; and Ellen and William D. Goebel and children David and Nathan of Plymouth Township.

Helen Ribar Goebel has lived in Plymouth all her life. She did not start teaching until her children were in school. She said teaching kindergarten has been rewarding. Particular joys have been earning the trust of the children.

"And there are the times they have said 'I can't do it.' After urging them to 'just try,' it has been a reward to see their eyes light up when they succeed. I have always treated them as people."

She said she doesn't plan to take her trip this year. "I have always wanted to go to Alaska. Or perhaps I will go to Scandinavia — maybe next year."

She doesn't intend to stagnate in her retirement. She will continue to give piano lessons.

"And I said I would substitute at the school. I'd like to take some classes myself, perhaps at Schoolcraft. And my 93-year-old mother is in the Martin Luther Home in South Lyon. I'm going to spend more time with her and the other residents of the home."

**ALL THOSE NEAT** egg cups, eggs and egg-related items in a Plymouth Furniture window display caught my eye last week. I stopped in to ask about them.

"It's publicity for the Art in the Park and Farmer's Market," was the response. Some women had been in arranging the display, and my informant didn't know who they were.

A call to Diane Quinn (who had suggested the art in the park) revealed that Diane and Betty and Jerry McCully had been the women in the window. The collection came from the McCully Egg Co. on Mill Street in Old Village, with some additional items from the William McCully and Adam McCully homes.

The collection is a family project. "Almost all of them are from the lobby of the store in Old Village," said Betty. "They are displayed in an antique storefront. We added some things from our homes. Through the years, we have collected the pictures and the egg cups."

## Kellogg Park is local landmark

The city of Plymouth's favorite landmark received official recognition on Heritage Day of Michigan Week. The Landmarks Committee of the American Association of University Women unveiled a bronze plaque designating Kellogg Park as important local landmark.

Prudi Westerhold, committee chairman, presented the award to Mayor Mary Childs in a brief afternoon ceremony.

Kellogg Park, hub of Plymouth's downtown business district, was recently rated as one of Michiganders' 81 favorite places. The triangular park serves as a focal point for many community activities from summer band concerts, to the annual fall festival, to carol singing and visits to Santa's headquarters at the end of the year.

While researching the history of the park, the Landmarks committee found that the park has served as a gathering place for more than 150 years.

**ORAL TRADITION** maintains the Potawatomi Indians were the first to use the park area as a place to tether their horses. At that time, the park was a scrub opening lacking trees in a forested area.

William Starkweather bought 240 acres of land from the U.S. government in 1825. He paid \$1.25 per acre for the holding which included the park site, present downtown Plymouth, and the surrounding residential land. Starkweather built a log cabin on the property.

The homestead was purchased in 1835 by John Kellogg. He and his wife, Eleanor, five sons and two daughters had made a long journey from Palmyra, New York to settle in Plymouth. Kellogg built an imposing brick home on the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Main Street, the site of William Starkweather's original log cabin and now the site of the Mayflower Hotel.

Across the street, the park had become a meeting place used by the villagers for picnics and for tethering their cows.

As Plymouth began to grow, the enterprising Kellogg built the Plymouth Hotel on the northwest corner of Main and Ann Arbor Trail, facing what now was referred to as the village green. The hotel prospered as a stopover for travelers using the new plank road which connected Ann Arbor and Detroit.

IN 1840, the village green was fenced and in 1858 trees were planted.

The site became less a pasture and more a park. Band concerts and circuses were performed there.

Research by the AAUW committee revealed two versions of the circumstances under which the park became community property.

One is that John Kellogg donated the land to the village of Plymouth. In an opinion written by Edward Draugelis, city attorney in 1962, it is stated that "the conclusion one draws — is that the land now known as Kellogg Park was purchased along with other acreage about 1843 by Mr. Kellogg, and at some time prior to 1867, by a conveyance not of record, Mr. Kellogg granted the triangular piece known as Kellogg Park to the city."

Another story has it that Kellogg and his heirs allowed residents the use of the triangular park for public gatherings over so long a period, without protest, that it became public property by common consent. Both versions are noted by Sam Hudson in his book, "History of Plymouth."

The AAUW Landmarks committee agreed that whichever version is true, Plymouth owes its gratitude to Kellogg and his heirs for one of the community's most popular assets.

**THE PLAQUE** presented by the committee will be mounted on granite and placed permanently in the southwest corner of the park.

Committee members include Prudi Westerhold, Luan Brownlee, Marilyn Carl, Mary Fritz, Joyce Foust, Bonnie Graham, Elizabeth Gribble, Jeannine Hayden, Nancy Mather, Veja Markovs, Elizabeth O'Mara, Mary Pearson, Carol Packard, Marci Theeke and Virginia Warden.

Landmark awards are traditionally presented during Michigan Week, usually on Heritage Day. The tradition is in its ninth year.

Buildings of historic value in the Plymouth-Canton Community have been selected since 1972 to receive the bronze awards. Early sites to be honored include the Shattuck-Garlett house, built in the early 1840s, and the Lyon-Moss house, built in 1829.

The buildings honored last year were the old Plymouth Hospital, founded in 1932 in a house built in 1890, and the Hamilton-Moon house, built in 1874 by Clarence Hamilton, inventor of the Daisy Air Rifle.

Photographs of each of the landmark homes are part of a permanent collection at the Plymouth Historical Museum.

# Pre-district baseball thriller

If there ever was a thing as a pre-district "classic," Friday's game between Plymouth Canton and North Farmington was it.

The No. 2 ranked Chiefs advanced to the next round in the Class A state tournament with a thrilling 3-1 victory over the heartbroken Raiders.

Pitcher Dan Smith won the game for himself and the rest of his teammates with a towering two-run homer in the top of the seventh inning as Canton raised its season record to 21-2.

"I don't want to make it an excuse," said Maxwell, "but our pitching is hurt and their all overworked."

"We beat Pontiac Catholic in the George Gary Tournament in 12 innings the night before. We didn't get back until midnight."

SMITH'S sixth homer of the year

broke the Canton school record held by Chris Martucci. He also increased his pitching record to 10-0.

"The reason we won was because we were better fundamentally," said Canton coach Fred Crissey. "We hit the ball good, but they played super defense. We had the hit when we had to have it."

"He (Shaw) threw real well. I knew a week before that they weren't going to pitch Ruud."

Canton got on the scoreboard first in the fourth inning when first baseman Jeff Stemberger doubled, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on Bill Hanis' single, which bounced into left field between third and short.

North got a run back in the bottom of the inning when Scott Williams walked and later scored and Greg Meggas' single.

## Comic approach looks at takeover of town's brewery

"Take This Job and Shove It" (PG) is an earthy movie about a top corporate executive whose company, a conglomerate, is taking over four breweries.

The young exec (Robert Hays, the pilot in "Airplane") is sent to one of the breweries to shape it up — to oversee the installation of automated equipment, speed up the line and increase production.

The rub is that this fast-moving young man is caught between his ambition and his conscience. The brewery, one where he worked while in school, is in his old home town: Dubuque, Iowa.

His old school chums work at the brewery, and his former girlfriend (Barbara Hershey) has returned to Dubuque, after college, marriage and divorce.

**HAYS STUNS** the locals (small town boy makes good) when he returns complete with three-piece suit, briefcase and sports car. His two rough-hewn friends of former days, Harry and Ray, work in the brewery and figure their old friend is going to treat them right.

Ray wants to be a delivery man and wear a leather bow tie. Harry, a married man with two children, just wants to be sure of a paycheck every week and decent working conditions.

You get the picture that folks in Dubuque aren't too sophisticated, at least not those who work in the brewery. Entertainment seems to consist of noisy bars, country music, mud fights and practical jokes.

The movie is more boisterous and bumpkinish than Frank Capra might have made it, but it has the same quality of the little guy against the system, David vs. Goliath. In this instance, Hays and the brewery workers vs. the conglomerate.

Hays waffles between being the hard-nosed executive who wants to speed up the line and lay off workers and the home-town boy who sticks by his friends and community. But we really don't doubt on which side of the blue-collar line he will declare himself.

**EDDIE ALBERT** is the man you love to hate as the cold, finger-snapping, order-issuing head of the conglomerate who shows up for management meetings in a yachtsman's jacket and cap.

Art Carney is the owner of the brewery, who is selling out and, he thinks, remaining on. Martin Mull is Hays' counterpart at corporate headquarters, who can't figure out what he's up to.

Hays is essentially a comical character because of his dilemma and the things that happen to him when he returns home, but we end up developing some real sympathy for his old drinking buddies because their plight is much more serious.

Harry (David Keith), for example, loves his family and wants a college education for his kids; however, he feels trapped because of his dependence on a weekly paycheck. He'd like to better himself, but he doesn't know how. He'd like to chuck the job, but he can't afford to.

His very real predicament gives this movie more substance than the slapstick antics suggest.

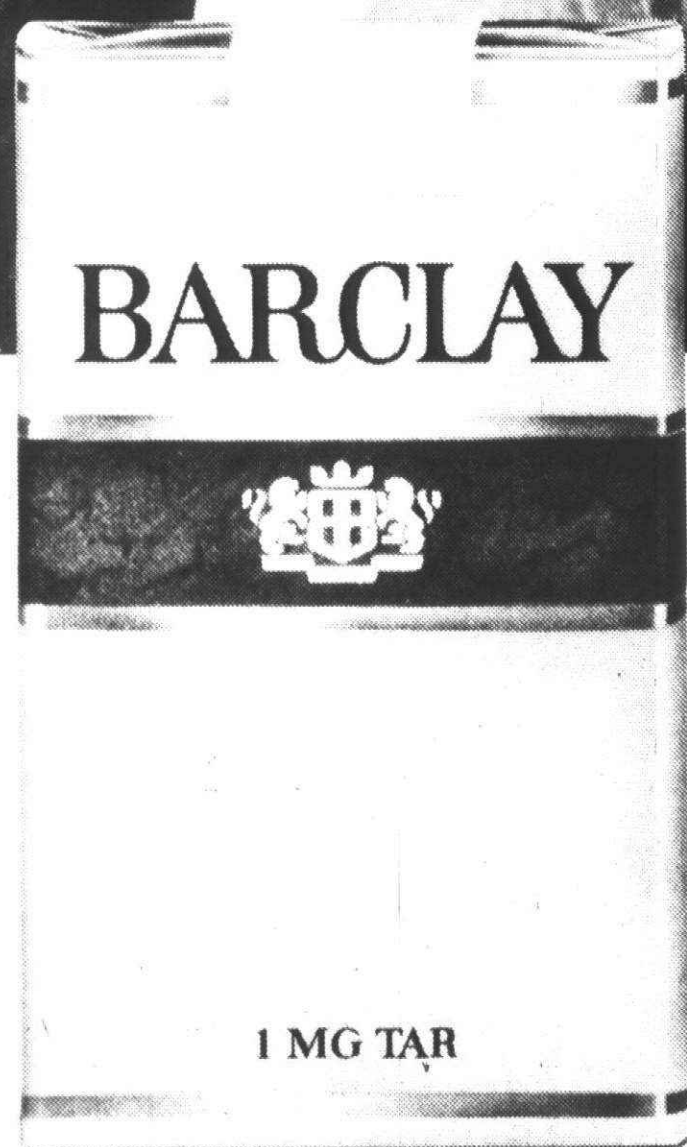
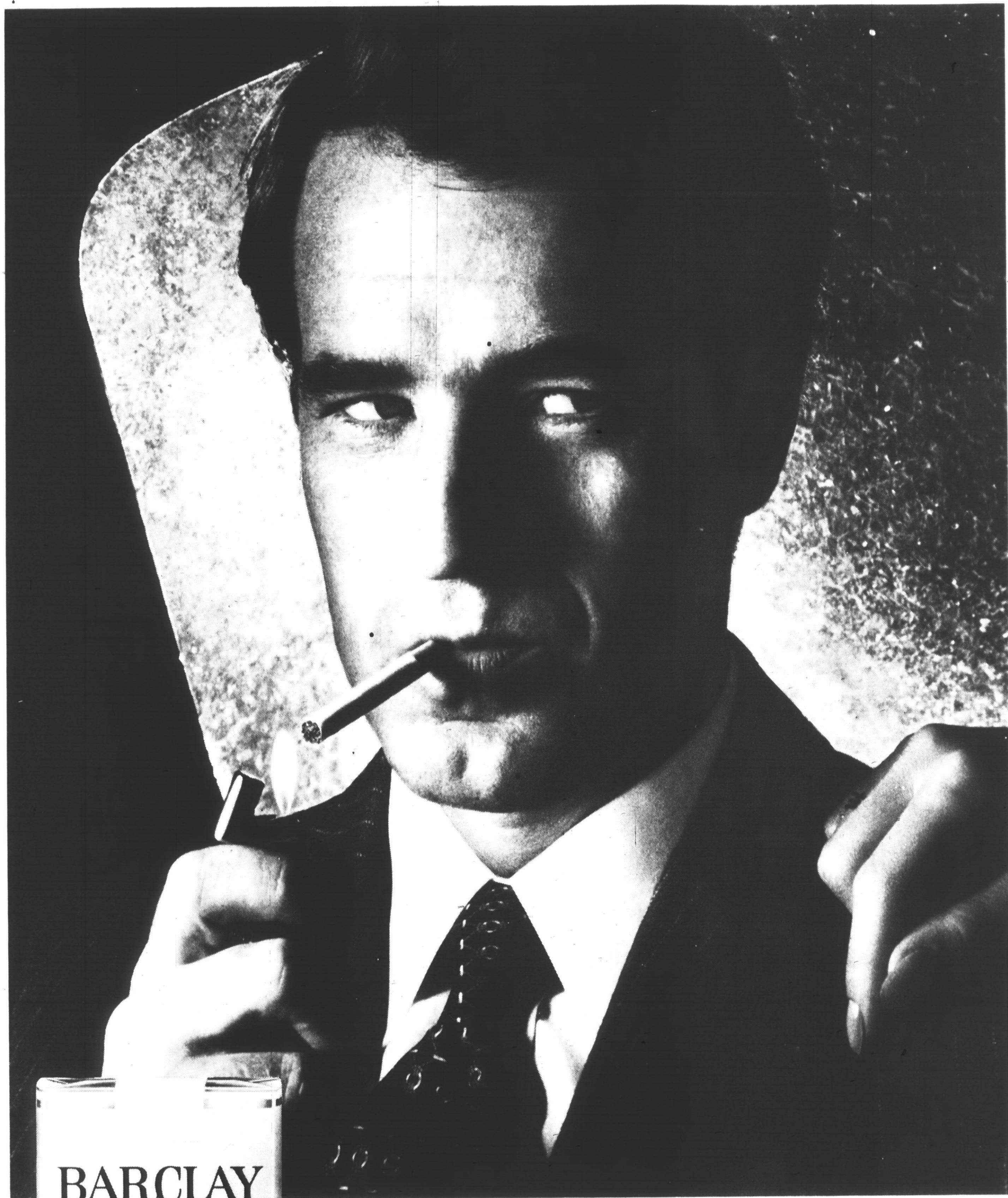

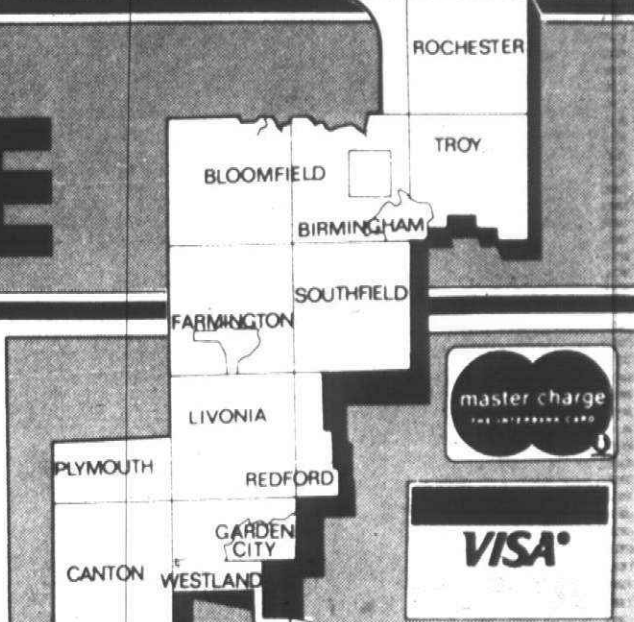
