Jimmy the Greek gives residents a tip

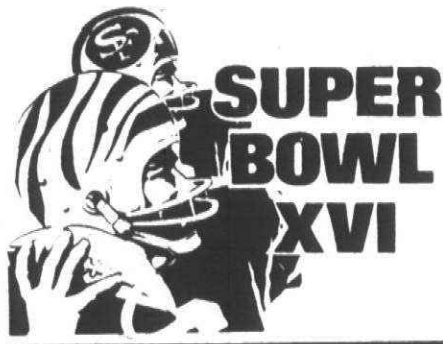

San Francisco will win the Super Bowl in a high-scoring battle with Cincinnati, according to Jimmy the Greek, who paid a short visit to the Plymouth-Canton area Tuesday.

The Greek, a prominent oddsmaker and member of the CBS sports team, gave his prediction while stopping at Don Massey Cadillac dealership on Ann Arbor Road. Massey loaned him a car for his Super Bowl stay.

Nattily dressed in a sweater, sports coat and traditional gold chain, Jimmy appeared to love being in the spotlight. He signed autographs, smiled for the cameras and commented on nearby women.

Posing with the woman who ar-



ranged for his car, the Greek told photographers to take their time.

JIMMY SAID he invented odds-making. "I discovered odds. I invented them, nobody had them before me," he said, glaring. The Greek wasn't joking.

"I'll set odds on everything but life.

Only the good Lord knows those odds," says the heavyset oddmaker who claims he's getting old.

"I got started in odds-making by studying and researching. How do you get started in anything?"

Jimmy started televising his football predictions on CBS several seasons ago.

"I turned down about 20 offers before CBS. I was waiting for CBS. I worked hard for that.

"My contract's up soon, but I will be staying with CBS. Why leave something you've made a winner? Working in television isn't as exciting as it was at the beginning. But my head's on the chopping block every week still."

"I'LL NEVER BE replaced by

computers," he said of his usual career of odds-making. "You can put me against the computer anytime. I'm a 5-to-4 favorite."

Jimmy has a staff which does his research and then he sets the odds based on their information.

Regardless of his information, the Greek wouldn't set the odds on whether the auto companies will make a comeback.

"We're all rooting for them. They buy 25 percent of our advertising."

The Greek says he likes Detroit, but he doesn't think the Super Bowl will be back at the Silverdome until at least 1985. Others are predicting and hoping for 1984.

Parents give concerns at school forum

A variety of issues were discussed, for almost 2.5 hours Monday night, by residents and members of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

About 50 residents attended the "open forum" held Monday night in Lowell Middle School to speak directly to the school board about matters of concerns.

Some parents from the Miller Elementary attendance area expressed a desire for Miller to go off the Extended School Year (ESY) schedule while at least one parent felt ESY was good and should be continued.

Other parents from Canton expressed concern about the paths student walk to get to Eriksson and Field elementary schools and about dangers walking involved.

ONE RESIDENT suggested that Plymouth-Canton should look at Livonia schools and the problems it has gone through because of declining enrollment and learn lessons from Livonia as enrollment continues to drop here.

Another shared with the board some concerns she had about the math sequence in the school's curriculum.

There were a number of parents who talked about what they felt were safety problems because of their children having to cross Lilley Road to walk to school.

Some residents also asked financial questions — how were layoffs handled

this year and how will future staff reductions be done, and how are decisions made regarding budget cuts.

These questions resulted in a short discussion by administrators on the district's zero base budgeting process which has been set in place.

ONE PARENT praised her child's kindergarten teacher who was dedicated enough to visit her home to discuss the child's progress at school.

Comments about elimination of safety busing also was made by David Artley, a representative for PASS, which is a citizens' group formed to monitor the need for busing throughout the school district.

The open forum opened with Dr. John M. Hoben, superintendent, making remarks lasting some 5 to 10 minutes. Other administrators present included Mike Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction, Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for personnel, and Ray Hoedel, assistant superintendent for business.

A school spokesman said the district had considered televising the open forum on local cable television but as of the end of December there were only about 6,100 homes in Canton and Plymouth hooked up to cable.

As more homes become hooked up to cable, and the 8,000 to 10,000 mark is reached, the administrator said, the district will seriously consider televising an open forum on local cable.

Traffic accident claims woman's life

A traffic accident on slippery, snowy Joy Road early Saturday claimed the life of a 32-year-old Canton woman.

Lynn Love of Stonetree died at 1:48 a.m. at Oakwood Hospital Canton Center. Mrs. Love, a secretary for a day-care center, was riding in a car driven by her husband, Howard.

ACCORDING TO Canton Police Lt. Dennis Joker, the Love vehicle went out of control on snow-covered, icy Joy near Ronda about 1 a.m. Saturday.

The car slid across the center lane and was struck by an eastbound vehicle driven by Gregory Barnes, 23, of Greenbriar, Plymouth Township, said the report.

Barnes was uninjured. His passenger, Kathleen Pertee, 26, of Cleveland in Livonia, was treated and released at St. Mary Hospital, Livonia.

Love was listed in stable condition Tuesday at the same hospital.

Arrangements for Mrs. Love were handled by Santei Funeral Home, Garden City. Services were Wednesday at the Church of the Divine Child in Dearborn.

Burial was in Parkview Memorial Cemetery, Livonia.

In addition to her husband, Howard, Mrs. Love is survived by her parents James and Eleanor Fearn, two brothers and three sisters.

'Don't push panic button'—Schwartz

John Schwartz told Canton businesspersons "don't push the panic button, yet" at the annual Chamber of Commerce dinner Monday night at the Roman Forum.

Schwartz was inducted as the chamber's president for the second straight year at this meeting.

Four other chamber officers also were inducted for one-year terms. They were: Jack Koers, first vice president; Bill Tesen, second vice president; Catherine Foege, secretary; and Russ Johnson, treasurer.

Schwartz, who was honored as Canton's distinguished citizen for 1981 by Canton's Business and Professional Women's organization last October, is the owner of Schwartz's Greenhouse on Joy, south of Lilley. He was born and raised in Canton.

SCHWARTZ THANKED the chamber for having confidence in him to serve another term as the club's president. He felt the chamber accomplished many things in 1981, but looked for bigger goals in 1982.

"The economy being quite bad, it's even more important that the chamber takes an active role in helping mer-

chants in Canton," Schwartz said in his acceptance speech.

"In spite of the poor economy, we have a much more attractive chamber to attract more members.

"Things are moving really good. Just don't push the panic button, yet."

SCHWARTZ REPORTED that Canton's chamber membership increased by 39 last year, bringing the total to 159.

Other chamber accomplishments in 1981, outlined by Schwartz, included purchasing a computer service to aid the chamber treasurer with financial matters, appointing members to a parade committee — which helped plan Canton's first parade in the history of the township, offering health and hospitalization insurance to Canton businesses, working on the sign ordinance committee to help rewrite some of its restrictions, working on the beer concession and chicken barbecue at the Canton Country Festival and starting and mailing a directory of Canton merchants to 12,000 homes in Canton.

THE CHAMBER'S BOARD of directors for 1982 are Bob Card, Jackie Czerniak, Jack Falvo, Robin Koelbel, Gary McCombs, Andy Panda, Ms. Foege, Johnson and Koers.



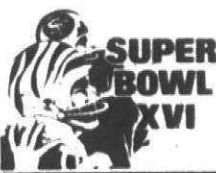

Planners pass sign changes

The proposed revamping of Canton's controversial sign ordinance has passed its first test with flying colors.

The township's five-member Planning Commission gave its unanimous approval Monday to sweeping changes in the ordinance. The proposed changes now will go to the Wayne County Planning Commission, then back before the Township Board by early February.

If the board approves the changes, Canton merchants will be able to use free-standing signs, double the size of some signs and, in certain cases, erect tower signs and billboards along the I-275 freeway.

"THERE ISN'T another ordinance around that will be exactly like ours," explained Dave Nicholson, assistant planner for the township. "It isn't going to be easy to say we're going to be more lenient or restrictive."

Canton's planning department has done much of the legwork for the commission, which has researched changes in the ordinance for several months.

Members of the Canton Chamber of Commerce interrupted their annual meeting Monday evening to cheer the news of the planning commission's vote. Many merchants complain that the current guidelines, adopted in 1975, are restrictive and "anti-business."

Grad hits the big time

His once-boyish face has changed. He now sports a full beard. He's even changed his name — for radio purposes only.

But he's the same ol' Rob Milford — energetic, aggressive, flamboyant and full of confidence.

And it was that confidence — along with a lot of hard work — which gave Milford the break of his radio career.

Milford, 26, a 1973 graduate of Plymouth Salem High School, was hired last October as the first news correspondent and anchorman for the newly-formed nationwide ABC rock radio network.

He flew here from New York Friday to attend a friend's wedding and to visit WRIF-FM radio, an ABC affiliate.

And in the middle of his personal — and promotional — stops, he took time out to speak to this year's WSDP-FM radio staff at Plymouth Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

MILFORD, WHO now goes by the radio name of "Rob Williams," was one of the original student-staff members of the school-owned station.

He did a little bit of everything to help the radio station get started. He broadcasted sports, news, and worked on local public relations, striving for community awareness.

He was extremely happy to see the station in operation, although WSDP now is experiencing financial woes as it approaches its 10th anniversary next month.

"It's nice to see WSDP after 10 years," said Milford, who lived in Lake Pointe Village in Plymouth Township before moving south with his family after graduation. "It's incredible (to see WSDP around after 10 years). That's really a milestone."

"The fact that it's still here shows that it has progressed. There's a commitment here for the education to the student interested in radio."

MILFORD HOLDS the distinction of being the youngest on-air newsmen ever hired at a major radio station, joining the staff of WHBQ in Memphis just out of high school. He is an award-winning news professional with major-market experience at KTXQ in Dallas, where he was news director and morning anchor before moving to New York to work for ABC.

After some college experience, and bouncing around different station down south, Milford struck it rich with the ABC rock radio network.

"We are targeted for people between 12 and 34 listen to rock music," said Milford, who landed the prestigious position simply by sending a tape of his work to New York. "It's like a regular newscast. The manner of presenting it is more casual — more relaxed."

MILFORD SAID plans for the network include covering the Grammy Awards in February and a space shuttle in April with on-the-air newscasts from those sights.

But what about that beard?

SEMTA money woes continue, may seek new tax

SEMTA may ask voters in November to approve an income or property tax hike so that new revenue can be pumped into the transportation authority.

Public Affairs Director Marvin Meltzer explained that SEMTA (the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority) may have to cut its services by up to 80 percent in March if new funding resources are not developed.

"The board will consider a method of handling the financial crisis and it may be in the form of a referendum," Meltzer told a meeting of local government officials in Oakland County Tuesday.

SEMTA'S ACTING General Manager Gary W. Krause said in a letter, "Now we are being forced to cut 20 percent additional route miles. Virtually every route will be affected. There will be longer waiting times between buses, in some case no service weekends or mid-day, in other cases, routes shortened and eliminated."

Meltzer said it is the first time since SEMTA was organized in 1967 that it is curtailing services.

The disclosure wasn't new because for several years SEMTA General Manager Larry Salci, who resigned last August, had warned new revenue would be needed to implement its 1990 plan.

"During the entire period (since '67), we were able to work toward expansion. But we're faced with a different financial situation where substantial cuts are necessary," Meltzer said.

FROM NOW until February, SEMTA is holding public hearings around the tri-county area to explain its financial situation, discuss proposed cut-backs and ask for voter input.

The schedule for public hearings in Oakland County is:

• Jan. 25 — 7:30 p.m. in the Royal Oak Kimball High School cafeteria, 1500 Lexington, Royal Oak.

• Jan. 26 — 1 p.m. in the lower level of the Southfield Parks and Recreation building, 26000 Evergreen, Southfield. Another hearing will be at 7:30 p.m. on Jan. 28.

• Jan. 26 — 7:30 p.m. in the commissioners' auditorium of the Oakland County Service Center, 1200 N. Telegraph, Pontiac.

• Jan. 27 — 7:30 p.m. in the West Bloomfield Fire Station No. 1, 4601 Orchard Lake, West Bloomfield.

• Feb. 2 — 7:30 p.m. in the Troy Community Center, 520 W. Big Beaver.

In Wayne County, hearings are set for 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Thursday (today) in Henry Ford Centennial Library, 1603 Michigan, Dearborn.

SEMTA'S MONEY woes began last August, Meltzer said.

"We had to cut one million miles of service out. Then in January of this year we had to take \$2.3 million from our budget savings account and use it to pay administrative costs. We have until the end of the budget year — June 30 — to come up with more money," he added.

SEMTA previously built its surplus fund from \$2 license-plate taxes and \$6 license-transfer fees collected from residents of Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties. But the Oakland County Road Commission and the state attorney general took the transportation authority to court, claiming the tax collection method was unconstitutional, Meltzer said.

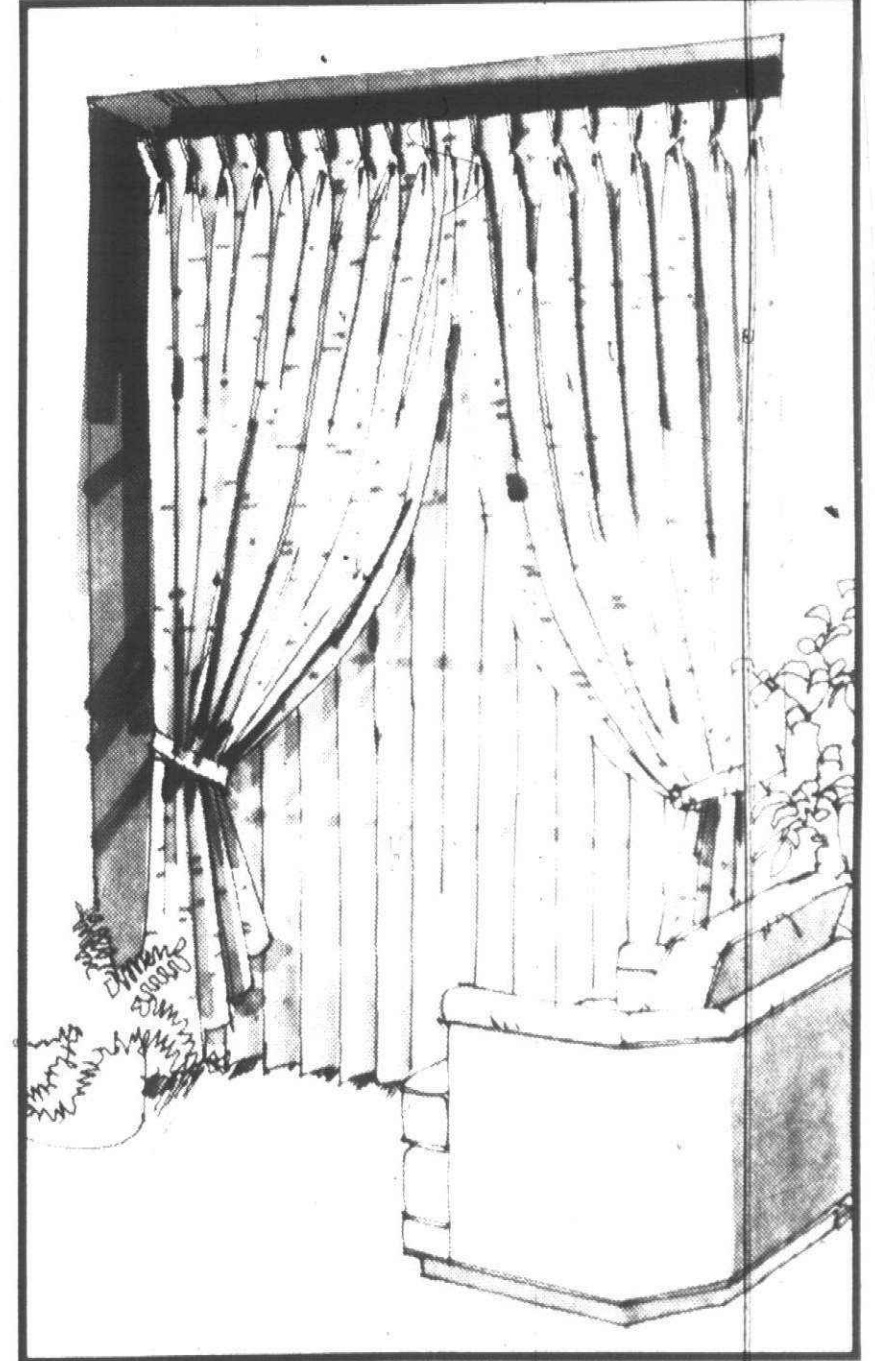
"The court ruled that receiving the money is constitutional but that the legislature should establish a collection method," he added.

"The money is in escrow, and until there is a legislative outcome, we can't touch it. If the money comes to us in a few months, then the board will reverse its cuts."

Aside from worrying about that money, SEMTA officials see their operating expenses increasing at the same rate their funding decreases.

"Everything we do is in jeopardy," Meltzer said.

"The important thing is to get a well-rounded education and be exposed to everything — and learn the English language well."

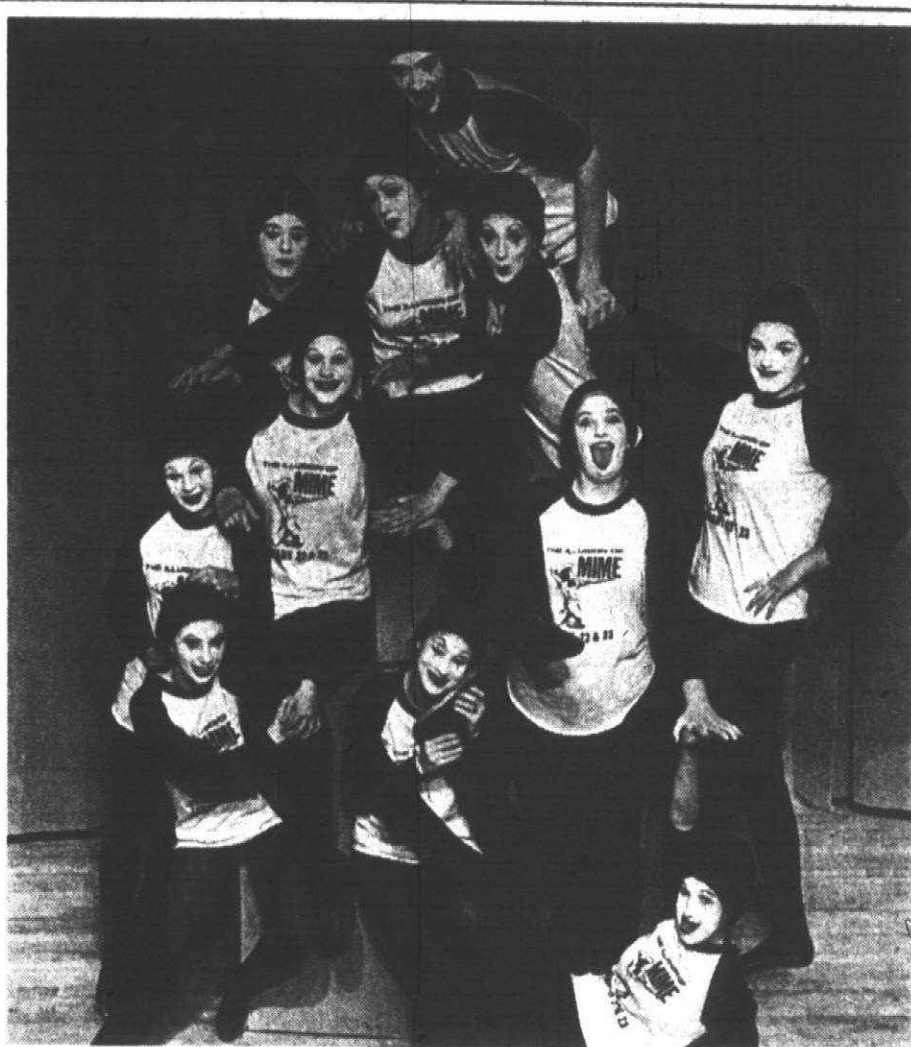

setting odds, he appears to have lost on a big bet.

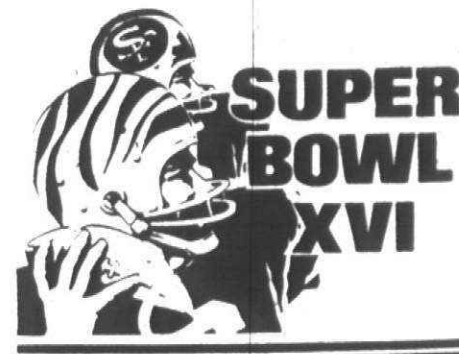
"The hardest odds I've ever had to set were for getting married. I've been trying to find a way out of it for 30 years."

Schools consolidate vocational education

A vocational education consortium between the Wayne-Westland and Cherry Hill school districts will begin operating next fall if final approval is granted by the state board of education.

Both boards of education approved the 15-year consortium last week, and administrators were expected to meet with state school officials last Friday to prepare for state approval expected in March.

Dennis O'Neill, deputy superintendent for instruction in the Wayne-Westland district, said the chief advantage to his district for the program was state funding for replacement of vocational education equipment for a consortium, or cooperative venture. That funding is provided for under a statute sponsored by State Rep. Gary Owens.

O'NEILL ADDED that there are "loopholes" in the agreement, allowing for its dissolution if it becomes

financially unfeasible.

Both districts are experiencing declining enrollments. The Cherry Hill district currently has about 2,500 students, compared with Wayne-Westland's 17,521 in kindergarten through 12th grade.

The districts will consolidate existing vocational education programs in both. Costs will be shared. Cherry Hill students will use some of the facilities available at Wayne-Westland's new vocational education center.

Firefighters punished for dry tank

Should two firefighters lose \$1,000 pay for failing to carry water to the scene of a fire?

Should firefighters be held responsible for faulty equipment?

A hearing on those issues took place Jan. 5 before an arbitrator, who is expected to make a ruling in the next couple of months.

Two Canton firefighters were suspended for six days last June, after it was discovered that a 500-gallon tank of water tank was empty on a fire run. The tank is used as back-up.

EACH OF the firefighters lost about \$1,000 in the suspension. The firefighters union filed a grievance because the penalty was "too severe," said Harry Harrison, a union spokesman.

The alleged violation of work rules took place May 29 and 30, said personnel director Dan Durack. It was discovered May 31 at the scene of a minor fire in an unoccupied condominium unit.

The two suspended firefighters had checked a water-pressure gauge and a logbook, said Harrison. Both indicated there was water in the tank.

Those procedures were among several guidelines "prescribed by the township," said Harrison. "There was nothing intentional (wrong)."

Fire Chief Mel Paulun said "it was known" that the gauge on the truck "had to be repaired."

"It was a known fact, and that they (firefighters) had to physically check the water (tank)," added Paulun.

ACCORDING TO the fire chief, the truck in question had been away at the department of public works (DPW) for unrelated repair to an alternator.

It was returned to the fire department.

"The next two days, people on duty failed to check the water," said Paulun.

Harrison said firefighters had checked the water before the trip to the DPW. He surmised water had been drained during the repair job, but the fire department hadn't been informed.

"It was a mistake, a lack of communication," said Harrison. The two firefighters had used other means to check the water, but they hadn't looked directly into the tank.

The lack of water was discovered when the fire department had a run to a vacant unit at Cherry Hill Condominiums. A truck with a 500-gallon wa-

ter tank is used as back-up to the unit which pumps water from hydrants.

BOTH PAULUN and Harrison say no damage was done. The fire was minor, and hydrants were available. A more serious blaze broke out at the same condo unit the next day, but there was no problem with water.

Paulun said he sought the advice of Durack and township clerk John Flodin. The suspension letter was signed by all three.

Firefighters work in 24-hour shifts. At the time of the dispute, the hourly wage was about \$7 per hour, said Paulun.

THE FIREFIGHTERS were suspended for six days and forbidden to accept overtime fill-in work for other firefighters during that period.

"Losing six days is like losing \$1,000," noted Paulun. "It's a serious offense — serious enough to give six days off."

"This is the first time this happened, and I doubt it will happen again," added Paulun. "We could have had something drastic (happen)."

On the other hand, critics of relaxing current guidelines say they don't want Canton to resemble a "Las Vegas-like clutter."

ACCORDING TO Nicholson, the new guidelines are a "mixed bag," based on sizes and styles contained in the ordinances of "two dozen" communities.

For example, Nicholson said guidelines were studied in Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Farmington and

Southfield, to name a few nearby municipalities. Also studied were ordinances in more distant communities, such as Grand Blanc, near Flint.

"For the most part, (signs) are still somewhat smaller than those other communities — but only somewhat," said Nicholson. "Certainly, before, we had a marked difference."

Guidelines in some municipalities "don't address" certain types of signs, such as tower signs or billboards, Nicholson.

"Each community is unique," added Nicholson.

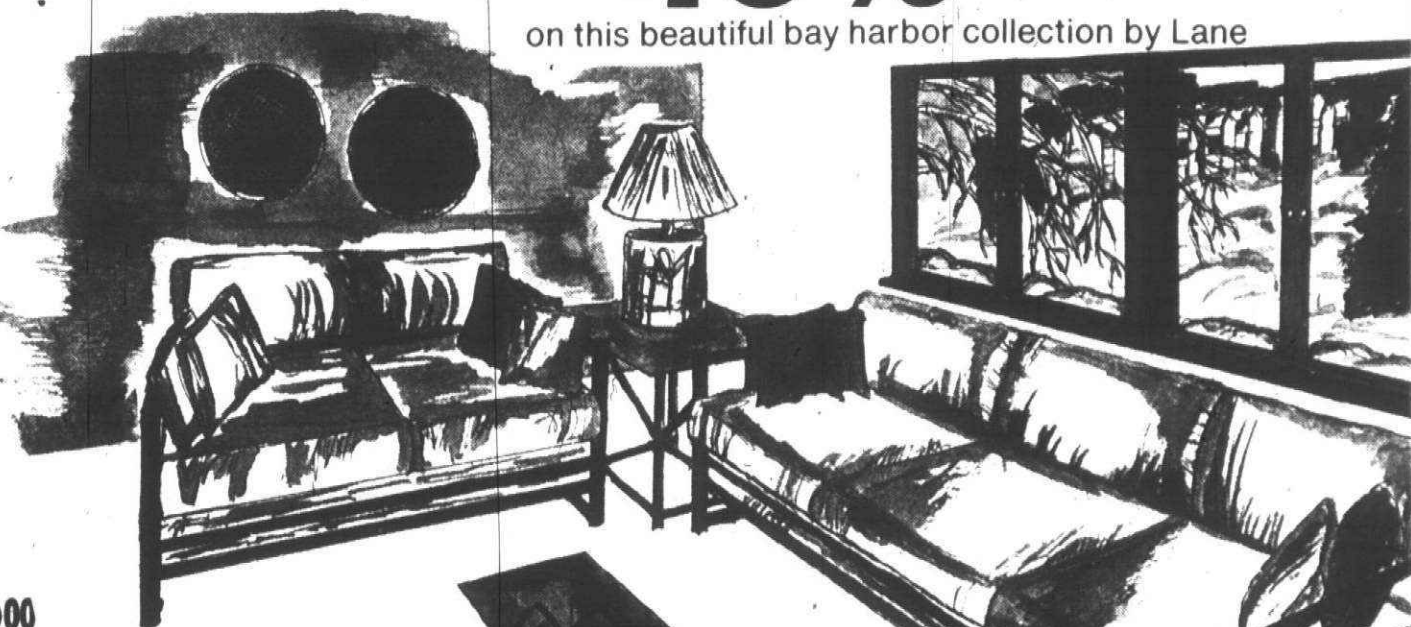

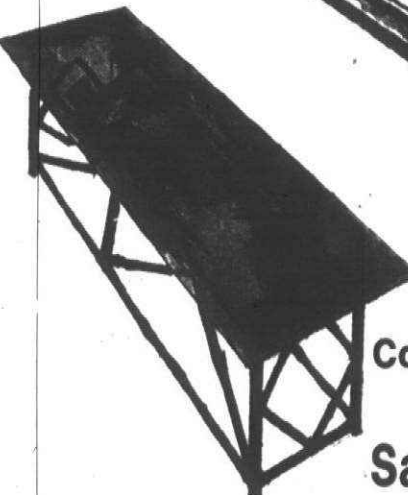

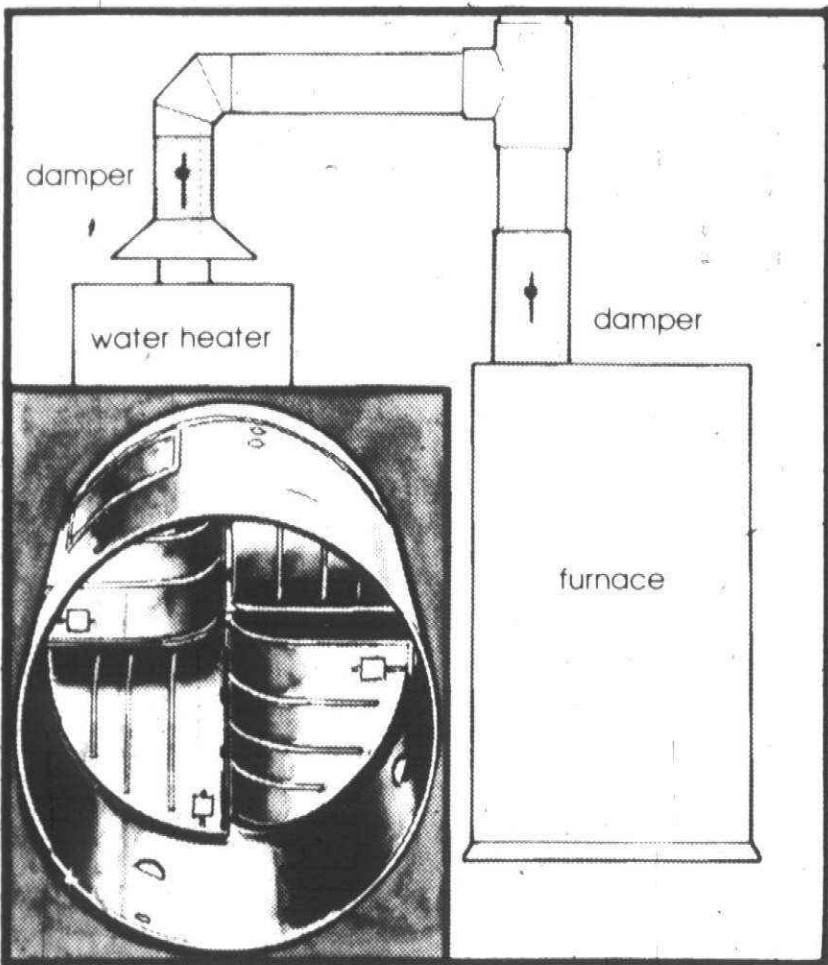

The purpose of the federal law is to see that no person is denied benefits or subjected to discrimination under any educational program on the basis of sex.

The committee, appointed by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, has been given the charge of understanding the Title IX law and interpreting it to the school district.

The committee was asked to develop

an information plan and convey the intent of the law to employees of the district and to the community.

The committee also is responsible for developing a resource center of materials and speakers dealing with the ramification of the law, and reviewing the district's procedures under the law.

Persons serving on the committee are: Mary Fritz, director of Title I, Head Start, and Title IX; Norman Kee, assistant superintendent for employee relations; Nic Cooper, counselor at Plymouth Canton High School; Barb Church, teacher, Central Middle School; Joyce Reefer, principal, Gallimore Elementary; Evelyn Courson, parent; and Janet Campbell, parent.

The committee now is working on developing resource material and bibliographies.

Exec, board clash over lawyer's appointment

Oakland County's legislative body, the Board of Commissioners, may find itself in a classic legal battle with County Executive Daniel T. Murphy over the appointment of a new county civil counsel.

Both commissioners and Murphy claim the right to make the appointment.

"Nothing gives you the right to hire civil counsel," Murphy told Republican commissioners in a Monday caucus.

"If you persist on this, I will be in court within two days asking for a declaratory judgment. Public Act 139 says I shall have that appointment, and I'm going to do it. Civil counsel defends everyone in the county. Therefore, the person should come under me."

THE ARGUMENT arose after current civil counsel Robert Allen submitted his resignation earlier this month.

Allen will leave Feb. 16 to enter private legal practice.

He was appointed by the county board years before Oakland voters in 1974 adopted the unified executive form of government.

Now, operating under the Act 139, Murphy said, it is the right of the executive to do hire the civil lawyer.

"If the commissioners want to hire their own counselor or parliamentarian, then that's fine. But civil counsel is mine," Murphy said.

Murphy was responding to a request from board Chairman Richard Wilcox, R-Ortonville, to set up a search committee to locate a new civil counsel.

"MAYBE THE best thing to do is go to court and have a declaratory judgment issued," said Commissioner John J. McDonald, R-Farmington Hills, a lawyer who usually supports the executive in political battles.

"I agree that the civil counsel should be in the executive's department, but it seems that we're in limbo about what to do," said McDonald.

Commissioner Anne Hobart, R-Waterford, cautioned her colleagues to work together, suggesting that who should do the hiring should be addressed by the commission's general government committee.

Murphy agreed to wait until he receives a report from the general government committee regarding the jurisdiction of the appointment before going to court.

The board is expected to set a date for the first general government meeting at its regular meeting today (Thursday).

Jobless rate at 14.4 percent

Michigan's December jobless rate rose to a high of 14.4 percent, up from the November rate of 11.8 percent, according to estimates by the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

MESC Director S. Martin Taylor said the number of unemployed workers across the state rose by 106,000

during December, to 627,000.

Taylor attributed the rise in unemployment to increased auto industry layoffs and low construction and retail employment. While retail sales were up during the holiday season, employment in the retail sector did not meet expected levels.

Total employment during the

month dropped by 159,000 to 3.7 million, and the state's labor force fell by 53,000 to 4.3 million.

The year-ago level was 12.4 percent, with 533,000 out of work.

The last time unemployment reached the current high was in July 1980, when the jobless rate was also 14.4 percent, Taylor said.

The area served includes all communities north of Van Born and south of Eight Mile roads, according to Pat Clark (522-2710).

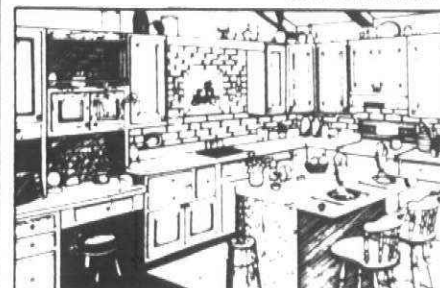

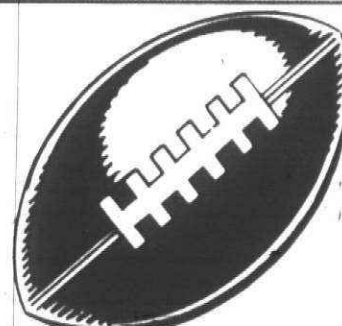

Ratings show Pursell is a Reagan supporter

Republican Congressmen Carl Pursell and William Broomfield supported President Ronald Reagan's economic recommendations two-thirds of the time in the first session of the 97th Congress. Suburban Democrats, however, voted for Reaganomics only once or twice, on the average, in nine key votes. None of five area representatives gave Reagan 100-percent support or opposition.

The compilation was made by Roll Call Report, an independent news agency in Washington, D.C.

PURSELL, R-Plymouth, supported Reagan on six of the nine key votes, a stronger showing than even Rep. Guy VanderJagt, R-Cadillac, a GOP leader in the House.

Broomfield, R-Bloomfield Township, supported the administration six times out of eight, missing one roll call.

Democrats William Ford of Taylor, William Brodhead of northwest Detroit and James Blanchard of Pleasant Ridge supported the president on one issue.

Reagan won the support of David Bonior, D-12th District, on two of nine issues — tourism and tax-subsidized business loans.

IN A SERIES of key votes, Congress slashed \$35.2 billion from the federal spending budget for 1982. About half the amount cut from domestic programs was added to the defense budget.

At the heart of Reagan's economic plan were reductions in personal and business taxes totalling \$749 billion over the next five years. It passed 238-195.

The so-called "budget blueprint" passed by a 253-176 House vote last May and was the president's first major victory on economic legislation. This resolution set spending limits for

House committees to reduce programs under their jurisdictions by a total of \$36.6 billion.

PURSELL, whose district includes Livonia, and Broomfield, whose district covers Birmingham, West Bloomfield and part of greater Rochester, were the only congressmen in the Observer & Eccentric area who favored the administration's "budget blueprint."

In addition, Republicans Pursell and Broomfield were the only area congressmen who supported the president on his spending plans and tax-cut recommendations. These were passed by votes of 217-211 and 238-195, respectively.

But Reagan lost Pursell on three subsequent votes: 1) cutting dairy price supports, 2) reducing Export-Import Bank tax-subsidized loans to foreign purchasers of U.S. products like airliners and nuclear generators, and 3) eliminating a southern waterway project (Tennessee-Tombigbee) favored by Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker.

Broomfield supported Reagan on everything but the Export-Import Bank

issue and "Tenn-Tom" water project. The senior congressman from Oakland County was absent on a roll call to eliminate funding for the Legal Services Corp.

BONIOR, WHOSE district includes the east side of greater Rochester, supported Reagan on two issues — cutting Ex-Im Bank credit and promoting U.S. tourism.

Brodhead, whose district includes

Farmington, Southfield and Redford Township, supported slashing Ex-Im Bank credit. In May, the House rejected the \$826-million cutback by a 237-162 vote.

Ford, whose district includes Garden City, Westland and Canton Township, backed Reagan only on the lost effort to reduce funds for the "Tenn-Tom" waterway and was absent on the legal services vote. Ford was the only suburban congressman to oppose dropping "Tenn-Tom."

The 232-mile canal is to connect the Tennessee and Tombigbee rivers to provide a new barge route to the Gulf of Mexico. About \$1.5 billion already has been appropriated. But the spend-

ing was approved by a House vote of 208-198.

Blanchard, whose 18th District includes Troy, supported Reagan once — on the program to promote tourism.

WHERE REAGAN gained the most bipartisan support was on his recommendation to establish a \$6.5-million-per-year agency within the Commerce Department to promote U.S. tourism. The House passed it 321-98 in July.

Pursell has been criticized in conservative Republican circles for his generally liberal voting record. But on the issue of cutting Legal Services Corp. funding, Pursell was the only suburbanite to support Reagan.

Big football fans come in small packages

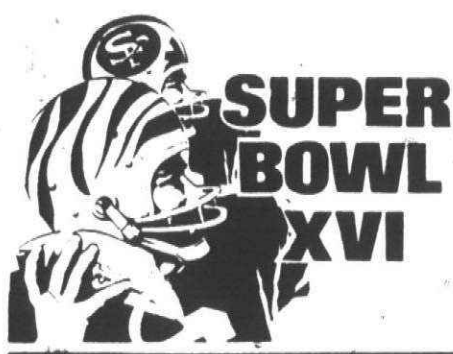

Commissioner Murphy resigns

Oakland County Commissioner Dennis Murphy, R-Now, will resign effective Jan. 31.

At the Republican caucus Monday, Murphy asked that John Calandro of Northville be appointed to fill his vacancy.

Murphy, who has been on the board three terms, said a business promotion has made it difficult for him to devote enough time on the county commission.

"Fourteen months ago, I received a major promotion where I work, and it involves more time. I see I can't do both jobs and do them well," said Murphy, a senior vice president at Bank of the Commonwealth.

CALANDRO, 35, is a division manager for industrial relations for the No Sag Spring Division of Lear, Seigler Inc.

He has been active in the Republican party since the early 1960s. He was a member of the Young Republicans Club, and is a current member of the

Northville and Novi Republicans clubs. His appointment will give him the advantage of running as the incumbent in both August primary and November general elections.

Calandro would represent the 24th District, which includes northwestern Farmington Hills, part of Northville, Novi, Wixom, South Lyon and Lyon Township, until reapportionment. The new district is expected to look much the same.

IN THE LAST year, Murphy chaired the board's finance committee, through which all appropriations pass.

He said he wanted to remain on the board until the 1982 budget was adopted and the reapportionment project was completed.

"Since both of those have been done, I'm ready to step down," he said.

Murphy's term expires Dec. 31, 1982, when the entire board must run for reelection.

I-275 sound barriers a goof

To the editor:

There is no ivy clinging to the ugly concrete "sound barrier" hopefully planted to lessen the visual impact of this monstrosity which stretches for nearly four miles along I-275 from Joy Road to 5 Mile.

Why? What happened to this supposedly face-saving gesture? Oh, the ivy was planted all right. I watched the nurserymen in 1979 digging the holes at the base of the wall, filling the holes with compost and wood chips, and carefully tucking in the precious ivy plants along the 900 feet of wall which barricades our Honeysuckle Farm where Ann Arbor Trail crosses the I-275 overpass.

Two out of maybe 200 plantings between the Trail and Hines Drive emerged and courageously tried to climb the barrier, survived one season, and then gave up the struggle.

It would be interesting to know what this ivy project cost the taxpayers. Whatever the price it was as ill-spent as the \$3.5 million which went into the barrier in the first place.

No one in the state government will admit, at least publicly, that the wall was a monumental "goof" but the 922 other sites along interstate highways which were selected for sound barriers have been spared their uselessness because the whole program was quietly abandoned.

AAUW against tuition credits

To the editor:

Our freedom of public education is

being threatened from many elements. Tuition tax credits violate the Constitutional principles of separation of church and state.

In Michigan, as well as throughout the United States, federal state and local monies for schools have been reduced. Tuition tax credits would represent a massive tax expenditure of at least \$4.7 billion that our nation cannot afford. This constitutes approximately one-third of the federal education budget.

It is our national commitment in the United States that every child have an access to an education. Tuition tax credits give private schools an unfair competitive advantage over public schools since private schools can refuse to offer services that public schools must provide and because private schools can be more selective with regard to whom they admit.

Freedom of education does not signify that there are no costs in relation to education. Every taxpayer shares the costs, so that all children, rich or poor, handicapped or gifted, may have an education.

Currently, less than \$145 of the money spent per pupil to provide public school education comes from the federal government. Some \$500 — more than three times the public school pupil receives — would be given to the proprietors of private and parochial schools. The Packwood-Moynihan Senate Bill (number 550) would allow \$1,000 per student for all levels in July 1983.

Tuition tax credits are inflationary. Private schools would be likely to raise tuitions if more money were available through tuition tax credit private school subsidies.

The American Association of University Women opposes tuition tax credits at the K-12 and post secondary levels because AAUW supports measures that provide protection of the basic principles of public funds for public schools.

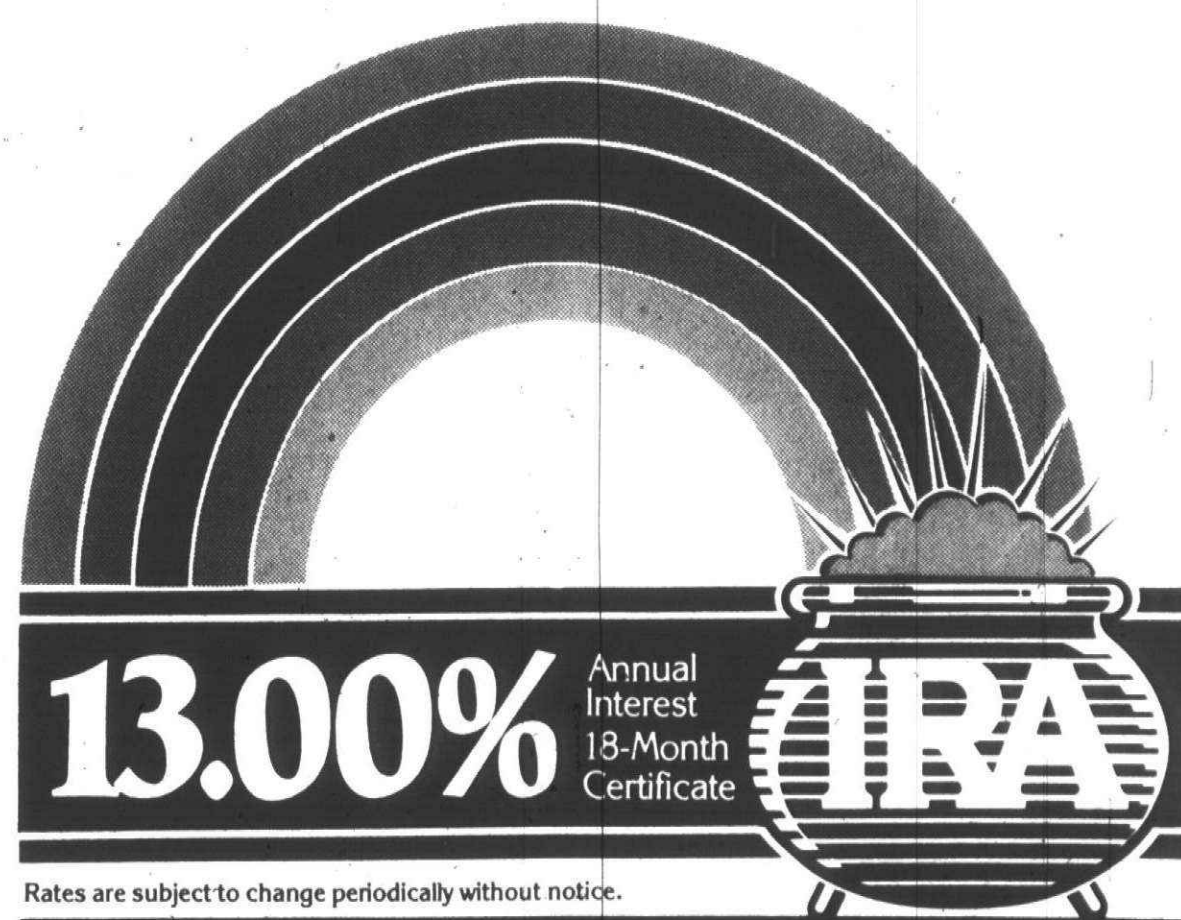

Republicans throw a big bash for George Bush

With a menu of caviar, smoked whitefish in lettuce leaves, mushrooms stuffed with crab meat, quiche lorraine and roast tenderloin served in a country club setting, you might think Sunday's pre-Super Bowl bash in honor of George Bush was planned for months by the Oakland County Republican Committee.

"We put it together in days," said Marian Dalton. "They called us and asked us if we could put it together in 10 days. We jumped at the chance of a lifetime."

"We had Glen-Oaks 24 hours later. Normally you'd agonize for six months."

MRS. DALTON, of Bloomfield Township, is vice chairperson of the Birmingham Republican Women's Club. Husband Bob is finance director of the county GOP.

Not only the vice president of the United States but several top Reagan administration officials will be attending the fund-raiser from 12:30-3 p.m. Sunday at Glen-Oaks, the once-private golf club now owned by the county.

Edwin Meese III, counsel to the president; James A. Baker III, White House chief of staff; Michael K. Deaver, deputy chief of staff and presidential assistant; Drew Lewis, secretary of transportation; Richard Richards, chairman of the Republican National Committee; U.S. Rep. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, and their wives will be in the entourage.

Arrangements were made by the Daltons, county chairman Joseph K.

Knollenberg of Birmingham, vice chairman Joan Lindner and executive director Robert Anderson.

TICKETS are available on a first-come, first-served basis from the Oakland County Republican Committee at 646-8414.

"It's just not true that this is 'private,'" said Mrs. Dalton, although the ticket price is \$125.

The Capitol press corps will not be around, by its own consent. Glen-Oaks' capacity is about 500, and the press corps declines to attend a function unless all reporters and photographers can get in, she said.

Before you multiply \$125 times 500 to find out how much the party will take in, there are some deductions to be made.

One is the cost of food, handled by the Oaks Management Corp. Then the cost of Secret Service protection for the time Bush is at Glen-Oaks must be subtracted.

"They figure that very carefully. They'll send us the bill," said Mrs. Dalton. "I don't know how much, but probably several thousand dollars."

What's left will go into the 1982 campaign chest of the Oakland Republican Committee.

HERE'S HOW the big party developed, as an excited Mrs. Dalton recalls it:

Congressman Broomfield and the Oakland GOP both had requests in to the Republican National Committee for an administration speaker. Broomfield's number came up first.

"Bush could have come to the Super Bowl and just had a good time," she said. Instead he and the RNC chose to honor Broomfield's request.

The congressman, however, was unable to put together a fund-raiser without a large staff in the district, so he contacted the county GOP to see if they could handle it.

Bob Dalton, who heads an office equipment sales firm, turned the business over to his sons and went to work on a party for Bush.

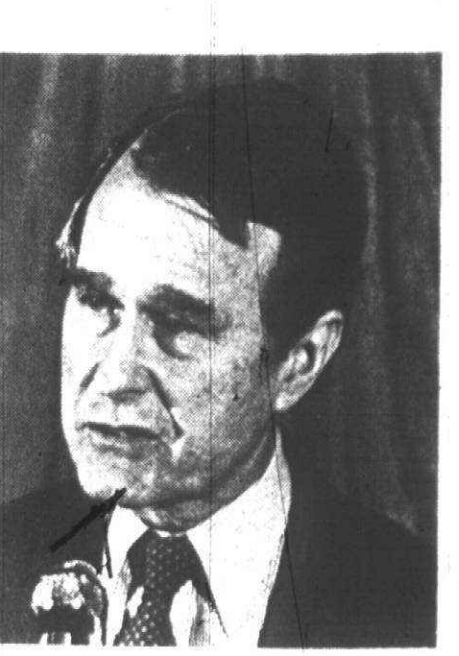
The only place available during Super Bowl Sunday was Glen-Oaks, on 13 Mile between Middlebelt and Orchard Lake roads in Farmington Hills. Actually, it suited them fine because Glen-Oaks is a county facility. Republicans, who control county government, tend to speak proudly of the parks and recreation commission's operations.

BUSH IS popular in local circles. Michigan voters supported him in the May 1980 presidential primary, even though the Ronald Reagan bandwagon was almost assured of success.

Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis is also considered a good catch in an automobile-manufacturing area which is struggling to finance a public transportation system.

The rumor mill has it that Bush may talk to retiring Gov. William G. Milliken about the No. 2 spot on a 1984 national ticket if Reagan declines to seek a second term. That kind of politics, however, is unlikely to be discussed in the Glen-Oaks atmosphere.

Actually, the GOP is working on a good VIP pre-party — valet parking, cocktails, rumaki, imported cheese trays, a fresh-fruit-and-sweets table and all the trimmings.

U-M prof scoffs at earthquake theory

The notion that a peculiar 1982 lineup of the planets will cause earthquakes and bad weather on Planet Earth is scoffed at by University of Michigan astronomy Prof. Richard G. Teske.

"In fact, the other planets have only a very weak gravitational effect on us," said Teske.

"It can be shown by simple calculation that, if all the planets were perfectly lined up, their combined tidal influence would be less than a 10,000th of the moon's tidal effect, which our Earth endures all the time."

ALL NINE of the sun's planets will come to the same side of the sun this year, but they will hardly lie in a straight line, said the U-M astronomer. The big day is calculated to be March 10.

"Mars, Jupiter and Saturn already are gathering close together. Skywatchers can see them shining brightly high in the south and southeast of the pre-dawn January sky," he said.

"The three outer planets — Uranus, Neptune and Pluto — are approximately in the same part of the sky... too faint to be seen." Mercury will join Venus in the morning sky in late February.

Actually, the planets will be far from perfectly lined up on March 10. "If we could stand on the sun and look out at them, the planets would be seen to span an arc of 97 degrees in space," Teske said. Such a formation will not be repeated until the 24th century.

In a 1974 book called "The Jupiter Effect," two British physicists predicted the 1982 planetary lineup would occur when sunspots were prevalent and would heighten sunspot activity. They predicted a chain of events including a catastrophic earthquake, said Teske. In 1980 one author retracted the prediction.

Other speculators have predicted tidal forces. But Teske said the gravitational effect of the other planets is too weak to make such a catastrophic difference.

It's time to watch Hilltop's management closely

IT LOOKS AS IF that infamous "rubber stamp" of Plymouth Township's Board of Trustees has pounded its way through another issue.

And Hilltop Golf Course Manager John Jawor is laughing all the way to the bank.

Last month Plymouth Township hammered out — or is that "stamped" out? — the addendum to the contract of its newly constructed 18-hole golf course at Ann Arbor Trail and Powell.

The management terms of the new contract are ludicrous, and Plymouth Township is stuck with it for 12 more years. The board approved the agreement six-one. Trustee Lee Fidge dissented.

Part of the terms are the result of an out-of-court settlement from a lawsuit that Jawor pinned on Plymouth Township more than two years ago.

THE BOARD HAD its chance to renegotiate an important part of the agreement, however — the part which called for raising Plymouth Township's portion of the annual, minimum golf-course revenues.

In fact, during one of Jawor's frequent fits of anger, the

board had that minimum raised from \$35,000 to \$75,000 annually, or 50 percent of the green fees — whichever is greater.

But Ronald Burke, Jawor's attorney, backed away from that offer one week later. And the "rubber stamp" was right there to support Jawor.

Now another chapter of the golf-course contract is history. And Jawor must guarantee a minimum of only \$35,000 or 50 percent of the green-fee revenues.

Plymouth Township board members, meanwhile, budgeted \$100,000 in revenue for the 1982 golf season.

Let's hope they get it. Hilltop is a public golf course, owned by Plymouth Township. Plymouth Township has spent \$1.2 million of taxpayers' money on the course — with little return on the investment.

IT SHOULD NOT be difficult for Plymouth Township to get its \$100,000. Fellows Creek Golf Course, the neighboring municipal golf course in Canton Township, brought the local government more than \$150,000 with its 18-hole layout in 1981.

With only a \$35,000 minimum requirement at Hilltop,

it would be wise for Plymouth Township to hold Jawor accountable with detailed financial statements for the next 12 years.

As all business owners know, a manager is only as good as his/her quality in reporting financial statements to the boss.

Plymouth Township (the owner) has the right to demand sound financial statements from the manager (Jawor).

Maybe it's a positive sign that Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen and other township officials re-

cently visited Canton Township Hall to seek advice on how Fellows Creek is operated.

WHILE PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP hopefully holds Jawor's management accountable, we recommend another business tip.

Perhaps it would be a wise investment if Plymouth Township paid for — and enrolled — Jawor in a Dale Carnegie course.

It may help business at the course if Jawor was less abrasive to the public.

Jawor's personality is one major reason Canton Township refused his application to manage Fellows Creek back in 1978 — just before he came to Hilltop. Persons tell us he has been rude to them.

Plymouth Township is stuck with Jawor — and a contract — for 12 more years. Residents can thank Plymouth Township's board for that.

Let's hope Plymouth Township officials begin closely watching the management at Hilltop.

If not, the next chapter to this story could be very, very grim.

The two participating teams — the San Francisco 49ers and Cincinnati Bengals — are staying in nearby hotels. The San Francisco team is at the Southfield Sheraton, while Cincinnati is at the Troy Hilton.

Local hotels such as Plymouth's Mayflower have been designated as official Super Bowl hotels.

THE SUPERBOWL will give us all another chance to show off this area.

It's a time for all of us to go out of our way to make our visitors feel welcome. Extend yourself if a stranger asks for directions.

Jimmy's ghost floats over Silverdome

The ghost of Jimmy Conzelman will float over the Silverdome Sunday afternoon when 80,000 persons watch the San Francisco 49ers meet the Cincinnati Bengals for the championship of the National Football League.

And who, you might ask, is Jimmy Conzelman?

Well, Jimmy was the star quarterback from St. Louis University who attempted to make Detroit one of the solid pegs in the pro league 'way back in the 1920s and gave up in disgust.

In fact, he was so disgusted with the attitude of the Detroit fans whom he had tried to convert to pro football that he sold the franchise back to the league for a mere \$50. And this is the same franchise for which William Clay Ford paid \$6 million several years ago.

JIMMY CAME to Detroit with high hopes. He had what he thought was a good football team, even though the players were all strangers to the Detroit public.

He had recruited, then coached them. To add to his dream, he also became business manager and director of public relations. He was bound and determined to put Detroit on the pro football map.

As a starter, he rented what was then Navin Field (now Tiger Stadium) and started a ballyhoo campaign. But when the season opened, the fans stayed

away in droves. The few fans who came walked up and down the sidelines and barked at the players when a play went wrong.

In those days, the gathering place for sports followers was the sports department of the Detroit Free Press in the evening. And there Jimmy came to discuss his woes.

Week after week, he tried his best to lure a gathering to the ball park. But there were no additions, and Jimmy became more and more discouraged.

WHAT YOU NEED, Jimmy was told, is a local player on the team. After all, they are not coming out to watch strangers, even though you rate them as a good team.

Jimmy nodded. Then he smiled. "I've got it!" he said. "Tom Edwards, the great tackle from Michigan, just finished his career for the Wolverines. I'll try to get him."

He succeeded. Edwards turned pro and joined the team. Now there was something to interest the home town fans. Jimmy had high hopes. He felt his luck was about to change.

But at the close of the season, when he checked the gate and the business end of the team, he found it had not improved.

When discussing the failure of Tom Edwards to perform the miracle at the gate, Conzelman woe-fully said, "I checked. Our attendance increased by one admission. It was Tom Edwards' father — and he got in on a pass."

SO JIMMY gave up. He sold the franchise and went into the advertising business, where he was an outstanding success.

Prior to Conzelman, a fellow named Gus Nichols tried to promote pro football in Detroit. He failed. Even the great Jim Thorpe, the Carlisle Indian who is regarded as the greatest player who ever lived, couldn't make a go of it.

But none suffered the agony of Jimmy Conzelman when he looked at the "crowd" from his quarter-back position and sold for \$50 a franchise that later brought \$6 million and today is worth several times that.

No wonder Jimmy's ghost will be floating over the Silverdome.

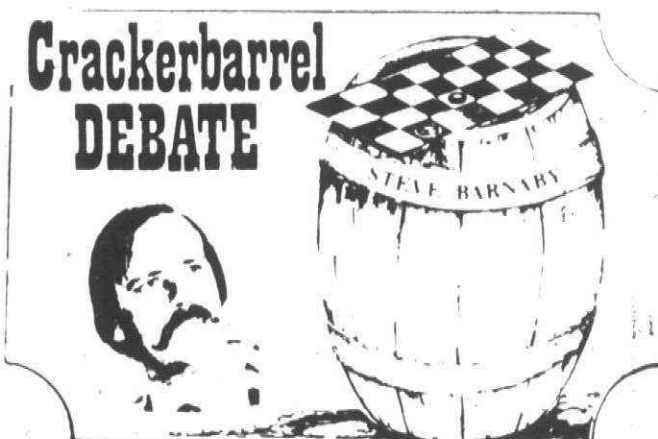
Now I realize why the majestic mountains are purple — they're too cold to be anything else.

breed, had to cave in to such trite demands of nature.

BUT LET'S FACE it: who gives a damn about zoning changes, road construction, workers' compensation or the MX missile system? What all America wants to know is how in the world is anyone going to pay his heating bill?

NOT EVEN Ronald Reagan could pull off that kind of anti-government coup.

Sure, the spring will come. Believe me, before you can find those old gloves with holes in them, that Michigan sun will be beaming down.

By that time, we'll all know who is running for governor and we'll be warm enough to care.

Comfort in winter depends on clothing

The chart shows how much a woman or a man can lower the thermostat in cold weather by dressing differently. The thermostat can be raised the same number of degrees in hot weather by reversing the manner of dress.

In addition to saving energy by what we wear indoors during the winter, we need to choose outdoor clothing that will offer the best possible protection against severe weather.

Clothing must provide enough insulation for warmth in the temperature (with existent wind chill) encountered. It must breath well so that water vapor from perspiration can escape into outside air.

It should be non-binding and allow blood to circulate freely. Layers of clothing will permit you to make adjustments for changes in temperature and activities. The outer layer should be windproof and water-repellent.

Keeping your head covered is important because as heat escapes the body it takes the path of least resistance and leaves through any uncovered area. Hats are in order for all bald men.

A HIGH percentage of heat is lost through an uncovered head.

Choose head coverings that are tightly woven or knitted from wool or cotton fibers. Hoods are warmer than hats, particularly if a scarf is added inside to cover the neck, lower part of

face and nose.

Keep hands well covered, also. Mittens are warmer than gloves because they aren't tight and the fingers are held together for greater warmth produced by the body.

Again, wool is a good fabric choice. Leather or other materials are satisfactory if lined with wool, synthetic pile or fur.

As already mentioned, leotards, pantyhose, opaque hose and thick socks help to protect the feet and legs. Shoes and boots with linings, thick soles and heels keep the feet from close contact with snow, ice and the cold ground.

MOISTURE HAS a great effect on our comfort when we are outdoors. The insulating value of clothing may be reduced by as much as 90 percent if it gets wet. For this reason, it is important to remove some layers of clothing, if necessary, so that you will not perspire excessively.

If perspiration can not evaporate from the body, it condenses on clothing.

The wet clothing sticks to the skin and eliminates much of the insulating air layer.

Wind also greatly affects our comfort and well-being. The "wind chill temperature," which is based on both air temperature and wind speed, is thus

a much better indicator of outdoor conditions than air temperature alone.

WHEN TEMPERATURES are very low, thermal balance becomes crucial. Hypothermia, a severe lowering of body temperature, may result if heat loss exceeds heat production.

Often this condition and frostbite can be prevented by dressing warmly and keeping clothing dry. Even when one is properly clothed, exposed flesh can freeze if the wind chill temperature drops below -25°F. You should then cover as much of your skin as possible.

Workers warned to avoid asbestos

People who work in industries where they are exposed to asbestos should take care to protect their lungs, according to the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan.

Asbestos, the general term given to a group of fluffy, fibrous minerals that break easily into a dust of tiny particles, can increase risk of serious diseases in inhaled or swallowed.

"Exposure to asbestos on the job may increase the risk of asbestosis, a chronic lung ailment which can produce shortness of breath and lung damage, mesothelioma, a cancer that involves the thin membrane lining the chest and abdomen, lung cancer and other cancers," according to Carol Vick, director of program services for the Lung Association.

Asbestos has been widely used in

many industries during the past four decades as insulation and fireproofing, and in textiles and construction.

Today, 800,000 tons of asbestos are mined or processed yearly to make more than 3,000 products in the United States, according to the Department of Health and Human Service.

Among the past the current uses of asbestos are: covering for pipes and surfaces, insulation in construction, powerhouses and chemical plants, coatings for cables and electric wires, floor and ceiling tiles, and filtration materials.

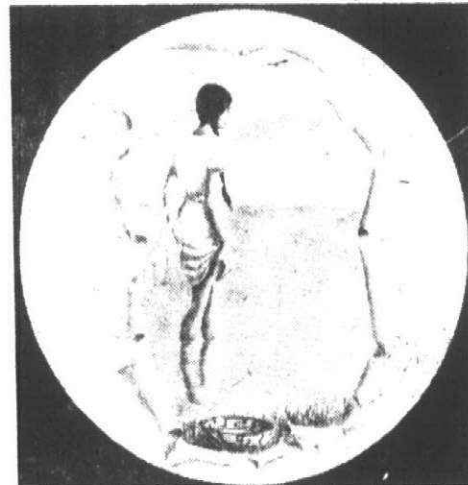

San Francisco

There are many ways to look at that city by the bay

Take a poll at the next Super Bowl party, or even in the next crowded elevator, on the subject of favorite cities. Note that San Francisco is not only the most-mentioned, there is a dreamy glaze over the eyes of those who speak its name.

With good reason. Sophisticated, scenic, traditional, futuristic, and unmatched San Francisco puts all comers into an enormous theater where hills and a shimmering bay share leading roles with Victorian houses, grand towers and tilting streets.

Tall glass monoliths speak of the Wall Street of the West; ships heading through the Golden Gate hint of the Orient. It is a city of all worlds, shrouded in frequent mists but untroubled by soot so that old buildings have a freshly restored look while new ones (such as the pyramidal Transamerica Building) soar upward in shapes tried nowhere else.

Those improbable cable cars and travel poster vistas also add to the feeling of being part of a romantic drama where all backgrounds are not quite real.

San Francisco is an El Dorado of things to see, and no metropolis in the land offers as many ways to get from A to B or makes looking around so much fun. Best of all, the traveler on a budget need not worry. Although it is no secret that this is an expensive place to live, sightseeing can be a genuine bargain. Here's what to do.

HIKE ACROSS the Golden Gate Bridge. It's hard to believe that there was ever any opposition to building this bridge, one of the most popular, most photographed constructions of man.

Two-hundred-thousand people walked across on opening day in 1937, and the 1.7-mile stroll hasn't lost its drawing power, not even when the rusted towers are hidden in swirling fog.

At clear moments the view from the bridge is one of hills, bay, ships coming and going and cityscapes melting into far horizons.

Watch the weather for chances to go in the morning when skyscrapers are silhouetted against a rising sun and a golden path stretches toward you from the east. Or go late in the day when the setting sun turns upper stories into burning beacons.

Dress warmly. San Francisco is known for a mild climate, but up on the bridge the word is COLD.

FOR 50 CENTS, ride the cable car. Probably the most unnecessary suggestion ever. Nobody sees San Francisco without boarding one of those swaying, rattling transports, the nation's only mobile historic monuments, and the city's best sightseeing buy.

There are 10 1/2 miles of cable route involved in three separate lines, but they intersect, and transfers are free.



The famed gateway to Chinatown on Grant Street in San Francisco will take you into a world of oriental wonders.

Fifty cents takes you at an exciting slant through the financial district, past Union Square to Nob Hill, Chinatown and Fisherman's Wharf; a tour spiced with glorious, world-famous glimpses of the bay.

In summer (especially) one look at the lineup to get a ride may be enough to start you walking. Keep cool. Enterprising music students, unemployed clowns and the unusual sight of conductors turning streetcars around with early-American muscle power makes the waiting go quickly.

More than sentiment keeps cable cars going. Visit the Car Barn and Museum (on the line), see how they work and why they are a practical answer to steep hills.

FOR \$1, take BART. Mild pangs of civic envy may grip you on the Bay Area Rapid Transit, a smooth, comfortable quiet, swift way to get from downtown to suburbia, Oakland, Fremont, Daly City and the rest. You can buy a \$1 excursion ticket for a three-county tour of the 71-mile system.

When the end of the line is reached you merely cross the platform and head back to the heart of town, then go off in another direction.

In less than three hours you will have been everywhere and not all underground, either. BART emerges to let you see ships and skylines.

Sightseeing during rush hours defeats the purpose and can be hazardous to your nerves. Watch the clock or go on weekends.

For \$2, board the ferry. All week, all-year service to Sausalito and Larkspur leaves from the foot of Market Street, takes 30 to 40 minutes and only costs about \$2 for one way. Besides being a good vantage point for photo-

graphers, passengers get a close look at Alcatraz Island, which can be toured these days without federal aid.

FOR \$4-6, JOIN a cruise. There are at least three companies eager to take you on a general swish around the bay, all lasting about 1 1/4 hours. This is one way to go under the Golden Gate and Bay bridges, munching snacks and listening to commentaries on the passing landmarks.

Land cruises via such veterans as Grey Line Tours have a variety of bargain packages that include trips through old houses and new hotels or even up to the Redwoods.

Walk, as you have never walked before. In San Francisco walking three blocks can be something of an athletic event. Ignoring dome-like hills, city planners laid out streets as though the land was as flat as a Kansas prairie.

Chinatown, the Embarcadero Center, Ghirardelli Square, the Cannery, the Wharf, and other marvels need your step-by-step attention.

Walk around Aquatic Park, through the Marine Museum, and sit on the cement steps to watch swimmers and scuba divers, then walk to the plainly visible collection of historic ships on the Hyde Street Pier.

Walk around the Civic Center where the Museum of Modern Art, the Public Library, the Opera House and such diversions are located. Explore the Japanese Gardens, Aquarium and DeYoung Museum in Golden Gate Park.

Walk also to the Visitor's Center (1390 Market Street) and find out where not to walk. As in any other city, you could easily walk into big trouble. While you're at it, check out the guided walking tours, building tours, area hiking paths. The Chinese Heritage Walk, City Hall Tours, San Francisco Discovery Tours are starters.

DRIVE. WATCH for the signs with the sea gulls and follow a 49-mile scenic drive that meanders in and around downtown, through Golden Gate Park, past the zoo, the seal rocks, the bridge and nearly everything you planned to take a picture of while you were here. Avoid rush hour.

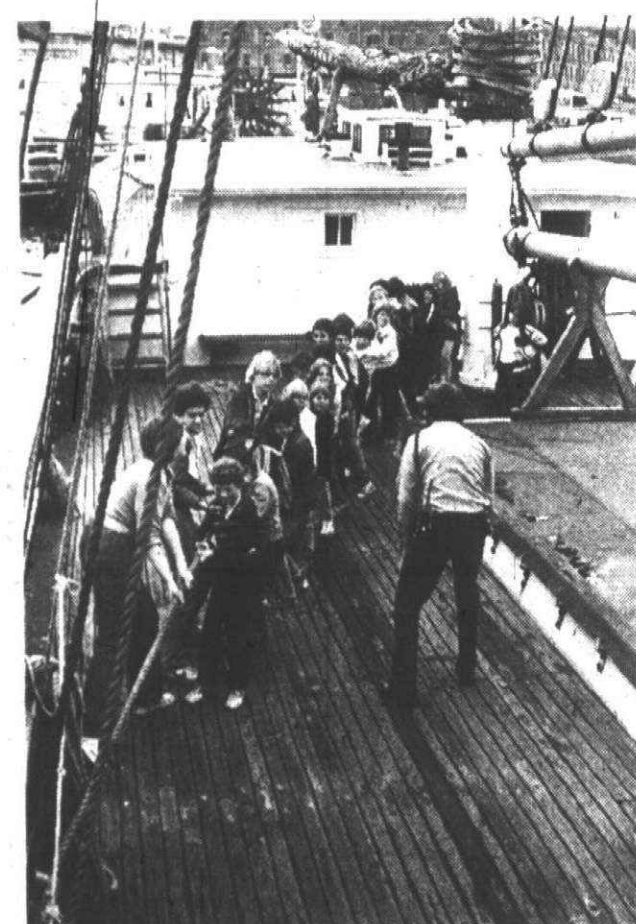
Another fun drive is only a block long: the hairpin turns of Lombard Street between Hyde and Leavenworth, winner of the "world's crookedest street" title.

Teacher's sex bias settlement: \$22,500

The South Redford school district has agreed to pay \$22,500 to music teacher Janet Evans because in 1978 it chose to demote her from junior high to elementary level.

Wayne County Circuit Judge John O'Hair last week signed a consent judgment, to which both parties agreed, settling the case without going to trial.

Mrs. Evans' suit charged she was denied the position of orchestra director at Pierce Junior High School after she had gained experience as both band and orchestra director at Marshall Junior High, a school which the district closed.

FOR MRS. EVANS, a Farmington resident, it was the second discrimination suit she had filed against South Redford. An earlier action through the Michigan Department of Civil Rights led eventually to her becoming part of the Marshall Junior High faculty.

Now employed in another district, Mrs. Evans said of the recent settlement she is "relieved it is behind me" and "happy I filed the case and carried

it to a successful conclusion."

But Dr. Jan Jacobs, South Redford superintendent, said there is "no admission of guilt" on the part of the district.

"We have settled in a pretrial settlement," he stated. "She agreed to terminate employment and not reapply."

REGARDING the settlement, Mrs. Evans noted it included \$850 for back pay and the remainder for damages.

Dr. Jacobs said "the money was a compromise to settle the case and end our expenses."

"Our position," he added, "is that what she charged is not the case. We are not admitting the kind of guilt claimed in the suit. It is correct that we put a man in that position, but this is not an admission of guilt of the type we were charged with."

"Our position is that we haven't discriminated against Mrs. Evans."

In the suit, the music teacher had charged that the district ignored her written application for the Pierce position and offered it instead to a male teacher who had no junior high level experience and had not applied for it.

She said she was asked to return — at lower pay, to the elementary school level vocal and instrumental teaching she had done previously.

MRS. EVANS, now president of the Northwest Wayne chapter of the National Organization for Women, said she became part of NOW and the feminist movement because of her involvement in the employment struggle, rather than the other way around.

She joined NOW, she said, seeking support after she filed her first legal action and because she felt there had been discrimination in her earlier attempts to gain full-time employment in instrumental music teaching in the South Redford district.

"PEOPLE THINK women have equality and all these rights," she said. "But we do and we don't. Their continu-

ing choice of men for any openings in instrumental music would indicate their preference for male band and orchestra conductors."

She also said her experience underlines the importance of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

"Most executive orders can be amended or changed at whim," she said. "If it's in the Constitution, it's harder to discriminate."

JANET EVANS said she was hired by the South Redford district in 1959 as a vocal music teacher at the elementary school level.

When she had nine years' seniority, she said she learned on the first day of a fall term that a junior high instrumental position had opened up during the summer.

"It was filled by a male teacher with no prior experience in the district," she said.

That move on the board's part led her to file the discrimination action with the Michigan Civil Rights Department, she said, and two years later a favorable ruling led to her appointment to the Marshall job.

WHILE AT Marshall, Mrs. Evans related, she raised the number of string musicians in the orchestra from about 15 to 40. By that time, she noted, she had earned two degrees in instrumental music from the University of Michigan.

When Marshall was scheduled to close in 1978, she said she asked to be transferred to Pierce, where her music students were going. Pierce had no orchestra at the time.

"In a letter, I offered options for my working the other periods of the day," she said. "They completely ignored my request. They assigned a male elementary band and orchestra director who had not taught in junior high and never made a request for the job."

"THEY OFFERED me an elementary school music teaching position at Rogers School. It was a demotion."

It was the suit she filed then that led to the recent settlement. Her attorney in the action was Edward Youmans of Detroit.

"It was one of the hardest actions I've ever undertaken," she commented. "If consciousness was raised because of what I've done, then it was not in vain."

Gloria Logan, company manager, said, "This is a unique experience in group cooperation and creativity. There will be something

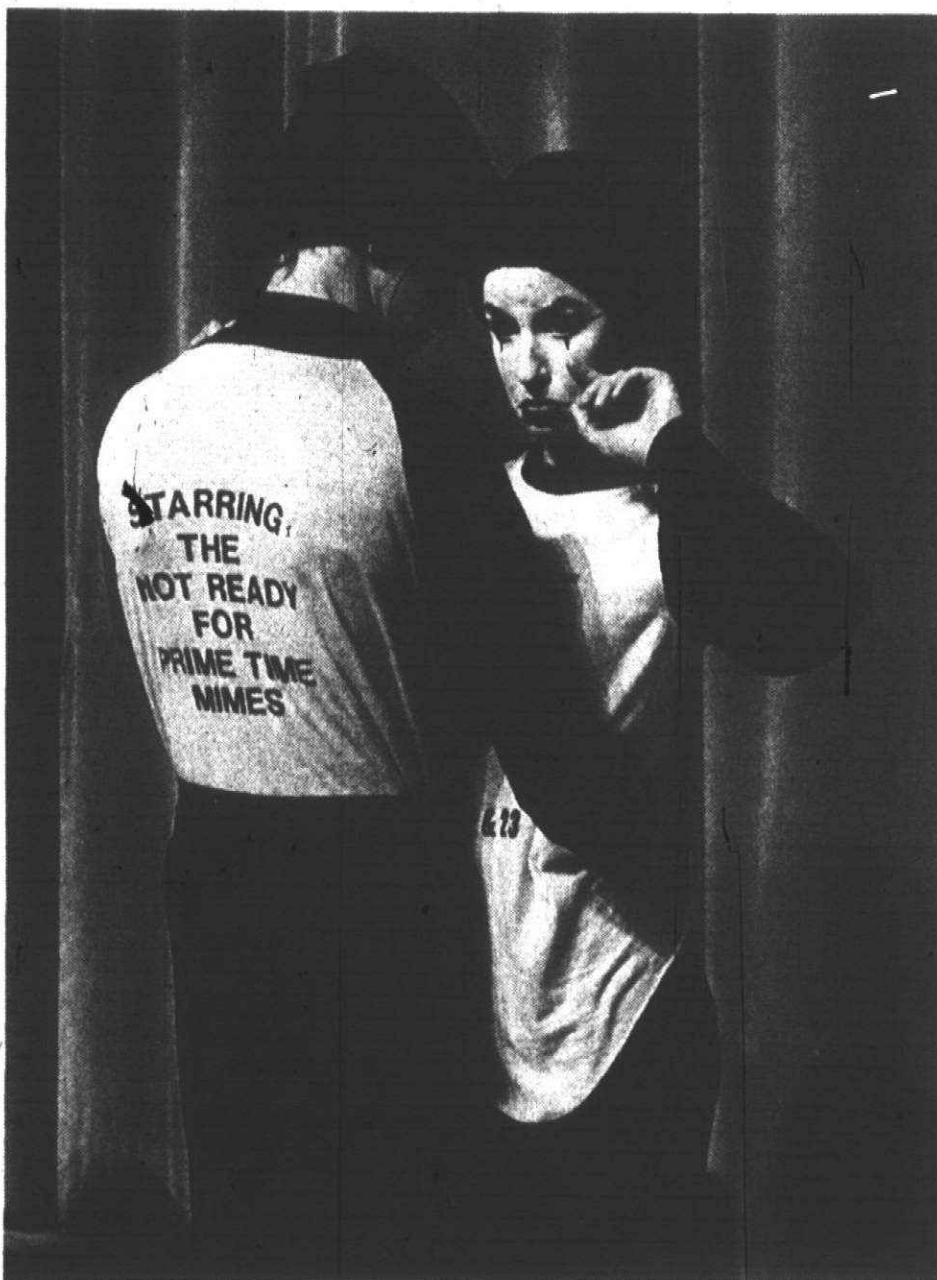
for everyone."

Encore, a post-mastectomy rehabilitation program, will meet from 7 to 9 p.m. Thursdays.

For more information about these programs, women may call 591-6400 ext. 430.

A SPECIAL program also is offered for displaced homemakers. The overall goal of the program is to make entry or re-entry into the work force not only possible but less traumatic for the mature woman.

The courses offered are geared toward career decisions and assertiveness training.

Project HERS (Homemaker Employment Re-Entry System) is available to women who now are their families' primary income source, who lack job skills to provide adequate financial support and who have no recent skilled, full-time work experience. Church offers Tender Loving Care by telephone

"People need to vent their feelings to someone they don't know," said Gerry Bustang of Livonia. "Loneliness is a big problem. People's situations change through divorce, death or moving, and they are not used to it. They need someone to listen and point them in the direction they might go."

Lately Mrs. Bustang has been bending her mind around thoughts of loneliness and communication because she is a volunteer at the newly organized Telephone Listening Center.

WARD PRESBYTERIAN Church of Livonia set up the 24-hour listening and referral service. It can be reached by dialing 422-4852. The last three numbers stand for TLC, or tender loving care.

While the volunteers will offer referrals to various social service agencies, their main thrust will be to pay attention to these in need of attention.

"We're the kaffeeklatch when you can't find a neighbor to talk to," added Mrs. Bustang.

ABOUT 120 persons took a 50-hour training course to equip them with empathy skills as well as referral information for filling the needs of callers, reported Janice Vanderbok of Northville, volunteer director for the center.

Most are Ward members, she added, but Methodists, Baptists and Catholics also work at the phones.

Mrs. Vanderbok, who once taught at

Marshall School in the South Redford district, said a number of people at Ward "decided there was a need for a listening ministry."

So the Rev. Edward Davis, executive pastor at Ward, took the next step and contacted a similar service in California for information on how to set up a listening post.

The Rev. Timm Jackson, director of Singlepoint Ministries, Ward's singles group, also believed people out there wanted a friendly ear. Singlepoint already had a phone line taking calls from troubled newly divorced persons.

"I FEEL EVERYONE is important, no matter who they are," emphasized Mrs. Vanderbok. "Everyone has difficulties at one time or other. The people on this end of the line are really caring. If there is a need for us, we have time to spend."

She pointed out that volunteers are expected to give at least four hours a week when they sign up. A new 13-week training session will be held from 7-8:30 p.m. starting Wednesday, Feb. 3

at Ward church, Six Mile and Farmington. Volunteers must be 18 or over. For more information on the class, call 422-4TLC.

Empathy and listening training are the basis of the course. But participants are also drilled on the names of local social agencies.

"IT'S IMPORTANT to match them with the proper people so they won't call the wrong place and get bad feedback," said Anne Buzzard.

A nurse, she volunteered because it was "an area of ministry to which I would be able to give something."

"I never realized before how many people are hurting," she added. "They can be right next to you and you never realize it."

For instance, she went on, she noticed during training that a woman nearby was staring into space. "I thought she was daydreaming," said Mrs. Buzzard. "But she was thinking about her son's death a year before, and having trouble handling it. I had no idea how this woman was hurting."

MRS. VANDERBOK indicated that volunteers are taught to put callers through a kind of conversation "that will help them come up with their own solutions."

"We want them to talk out their problems, and as they talk maybe work out the solution," she said.

Mrs. Bustany, who is a part-time typist for the center, regards her work as a phone volunteer as part of a puzzle.

"You do a small thing that helps someone solve a problem," she said. She thinks the center is a "tremendous idea" that it fills a special need.

"**LONELINESS IS** a major problem now," she continued. "When a person talks to someone else they gain a new perspective on how they should act, and what direction to go."

Plan the marriage before the wedding

Anyone interested in the health of marriage might learn something from people who fly.

Fliers are understandably more concerned with the stability of the plane than the color of the fuselage. A safe flight is more dependent on tuning the engines and dependent on the controls and the instruments than on painting the airplane.

If we could translate this wisdom of flight preparation into our approach to marriage preparation, we might avoid much of the pain of divorce and empty marriage.

AS IT IS, the preparation given to the lifetime relationship is superficial, more often than not. The "paint," or preparation for the wedding day, is many times the larger concern.

Hall rental, invitations, dresses, tuxedos, hiring the band and choosing a church get the major attention. For some couples, keeping the two families

happy with the details is no minor item.

In short, a major portion of an engaged couple's energy is directed toward the first few minutes and hours of their marriage. Very little time or energy is left to look seriously at the realities of their life together.

Few marriages fail to live up to expectations because something went wrong with the ceremony or the reception. Many do fail because of the many surprises which surface long after the band has gone home.

No one assumes that a wedding ceremony will fall together just because the bride and bridegroom want it that way. Yet more than a few seem to operate on the assumption the marriages fall into place just because the couple is in love.

MARRIAGE involves far more than setting up housekeeping, and it requires more than a bridal shower to put it together.

Only an open and honest exploration of the needs, expectations and personality traits of each partner can build the foundations of a life together. Those who wish to experience the fulfillment that marriage can offer would do well to risk answering some important questions.

The answers to such questions as "Why do you want to marry?" and "Why do you want to marry me?" are far too important to assume the answers are known.

"Because I am in love with you" is not an entirely adequate answer. Most people who are divorced made that statement or one like it before they married.

Questions such as these may be risky, but not nearly as risky as entering marriage without knowing the answers. The only alternative to knowing the truth is to marry an illusion or a myth. Love may be magnificent, but it does not prevent myths from exploding.

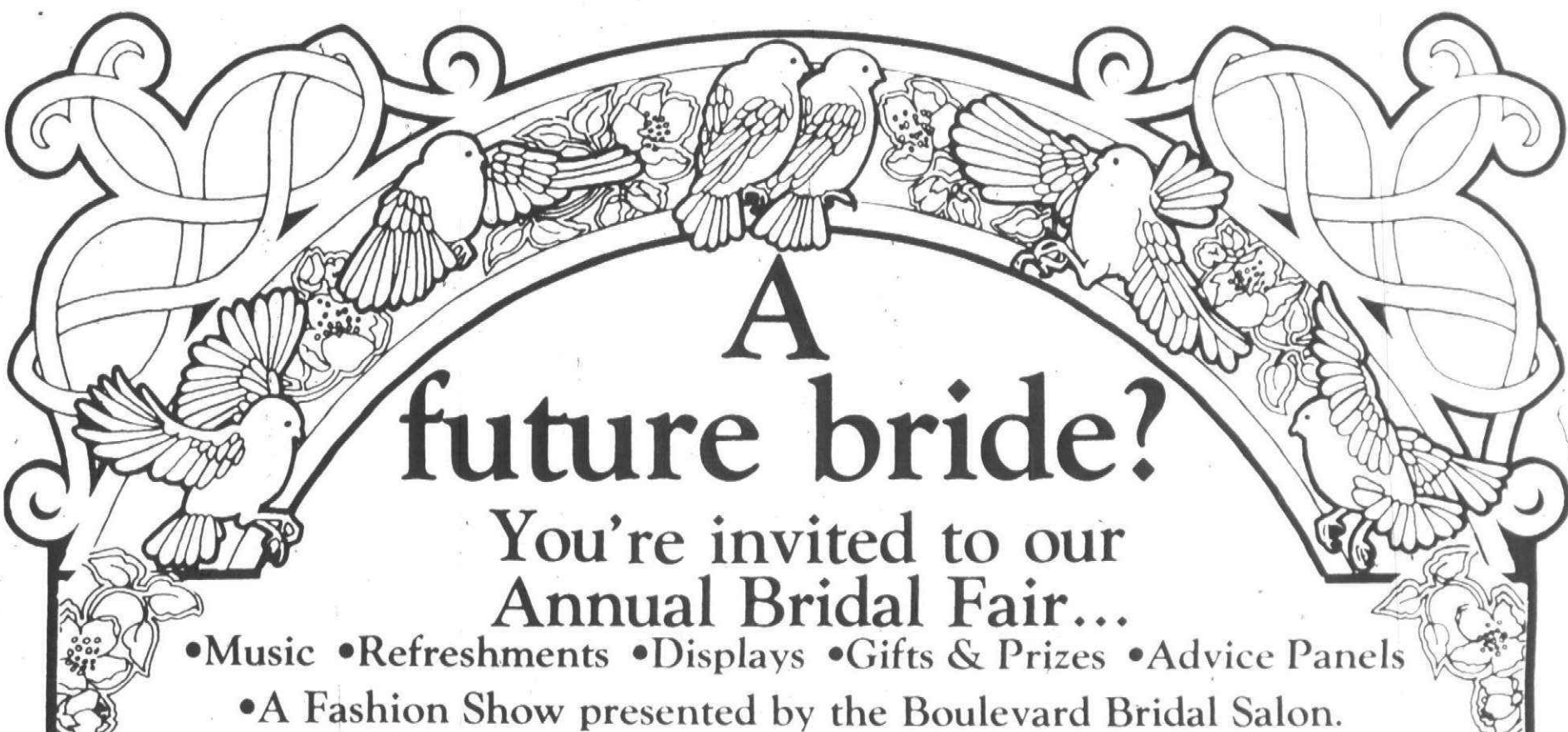

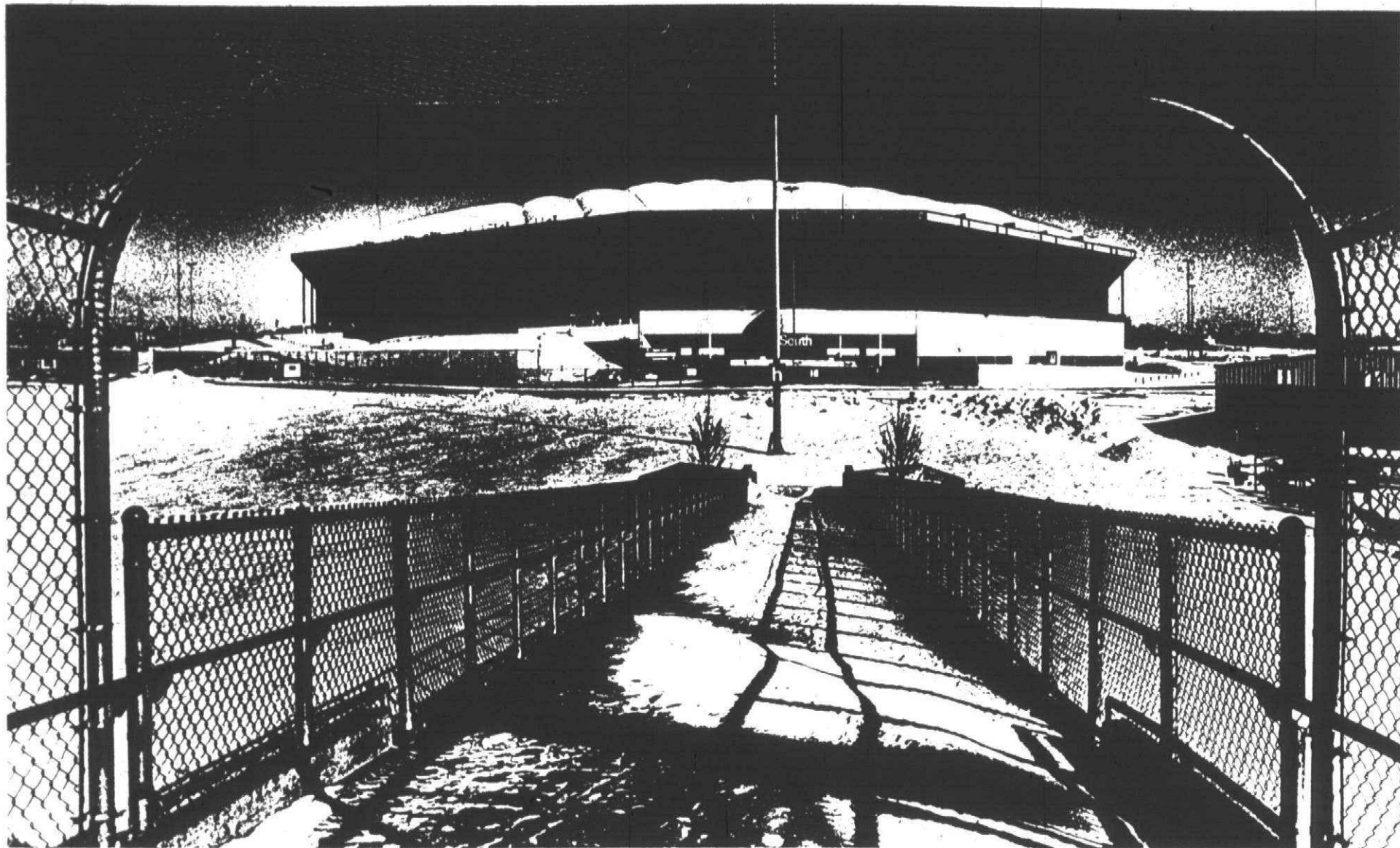

Who will win?

Former Lions choose favorites

Supermania. It's hit the Detroit area hard. One might think the Lions were finally in the biggest NFL game of the season.

That hasn't happened, of course. But if the local team can't be in it, the next best thing is having the game in your town.

That's why Detroit is going crazy. Some former Lions and Lion coaches spoke with members of the O&E sports staff and gave their views on who — the 49ers or Bengals — will win the big game Sunday and just what the Super Bowl means to Michigan. Here are their thoughts on the big game:

JOE SCHMIDT

Joe Schmidt is well versed in the ways of the National Football League. The former All-Pro middle linebacker

er played on the Lions' last championship team in 1957. He also coached the Lions to their only playoff appearance in the last 25 years — against the Dallas Cowboys in 1970.

Someone with those credentials should be able to provide a firm analysis of the 1982 Super Bowl.

"I really don't have a strong feeling, but I'll take the Cincinnati Bengals," the former Lions star said.

Why? Because they've played more on artificial turf? Or their quarterback Ken Anderson is more experienced?

Nope. "A good friend of mine coaches for the Bengals," Schmidt answered with a laugh. He was referring to Dick LeBeau, the former Detroit Lions cornerback who now coaches the Bengals' defensive secondary.

Schmidt, who operates his own business in Southfield, was more enthused when asked about the Super Bowl's meaning to the state of Michigan.

"I think it'll pump up the economy.

It'll give us a little shot in the arm, something this area needs."

MEL FARR

It's not that former Detroit Lion running back Mel Farr is partial to the National Football Conference. He just believes in the San Francisco 49ers.

"I think the 49ers have proven they have the best team in the National Football League," said Farr, a Birmingham resident who is proprietor of a Ford dealership in Oak Park.

"The 49ers had the best record in the NFL. They played a tough schedule. They beat the Bengals before. I just think the 49ers have a superior team."

"I think the 49ers have a defensive backfield that will make it difficult for Ken Anderson to drop back and pass on them — even though they're rookies," he said.

Farr believes having new teams playing for the world championship is good for football.

"They are both teams that are coming off of losing seasons last year," said Farr, who played college football at UCLA. "I think it's good for other teams in the NFL to see that teams that had losing seasons the year before can come back and make it to the Super Bowl."

"It's good for football because it breaks the monotony of seeing the Dallas Cowboys and the Pittsburgh Steelers in the Super Bowl every year," he said. "It's going to make the competition a hell of a lot tougher during the 1982 seasons because everybody realizes they have a chance to go to the Super Bowl."

Farr agreed that staging the Super Bowl here will provide a much-needed boost.

"The Super Bowl means winners, and that's good psychological therapy that we need right now," said Farr. "Detroit has had a tough time over the last three

"I refuse to call it the Super Bowl, for no other reason than that the word 'super' has been totally exhausted."

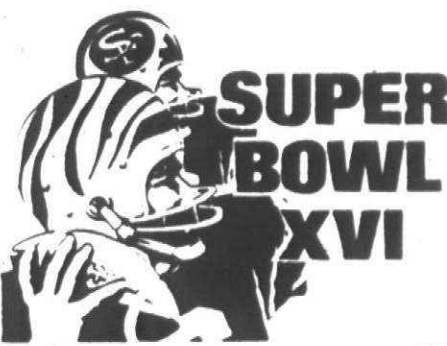

"Now, to the matter at hand. I believe San Francisco will win the Super, er, National Football League championship. I've watched Joe Montana pull out big games at Notre Dame. He's a money player who doesn't seem to know the meaning of pressure."

"Neither team has been there before, but Montana has played in comparable games. He led Notre Dame to a national championship, and he'll do the same for the 49'ers. He's a 'super' quarterback."

And that's a "Super" prediction. San Francisco 2, Cincinnati 0.

MARTY BUDNER — "Cincinnati



has all the intangible advantages."

Like what, Marty?

"For instance, as a Midwestern team, the Bengals are acclimated to the frigid northern winters. The sun-starved 49'ers are quartered for the week at the Southfield Sheraton. The 25-minute trip to the Pontiac Silverdome in biting arctic temperatures will be too much for the Californians to overcome."

"Cincinnati also has three former Ohio State players — Archie and Ray Griffin and Pete Johnson. You know how those Buckeyes hate to lose in Michigan."

"Don't forget, Cincinnati lost earlier this season to San Francisco. The Bengals haven't lost twice to anyone this season, so they're a cinch to win this time."

"And Cincinnati is designated as the home team under NFL guidelines. That gives the Bengals — who won all their playoff games at home — the super edge."

The weather for an indoor game, three former OSU players, a pounding the Bengals took from the 49'ers earlier this season and a mythical home advantage are reasons Cincinnati will win, huh Marty?

Dave Houle, a starting forward, missed the game because of a sore lower back. Two other reserves were also out because of the flu, according to Salem coach Fred Thomann.

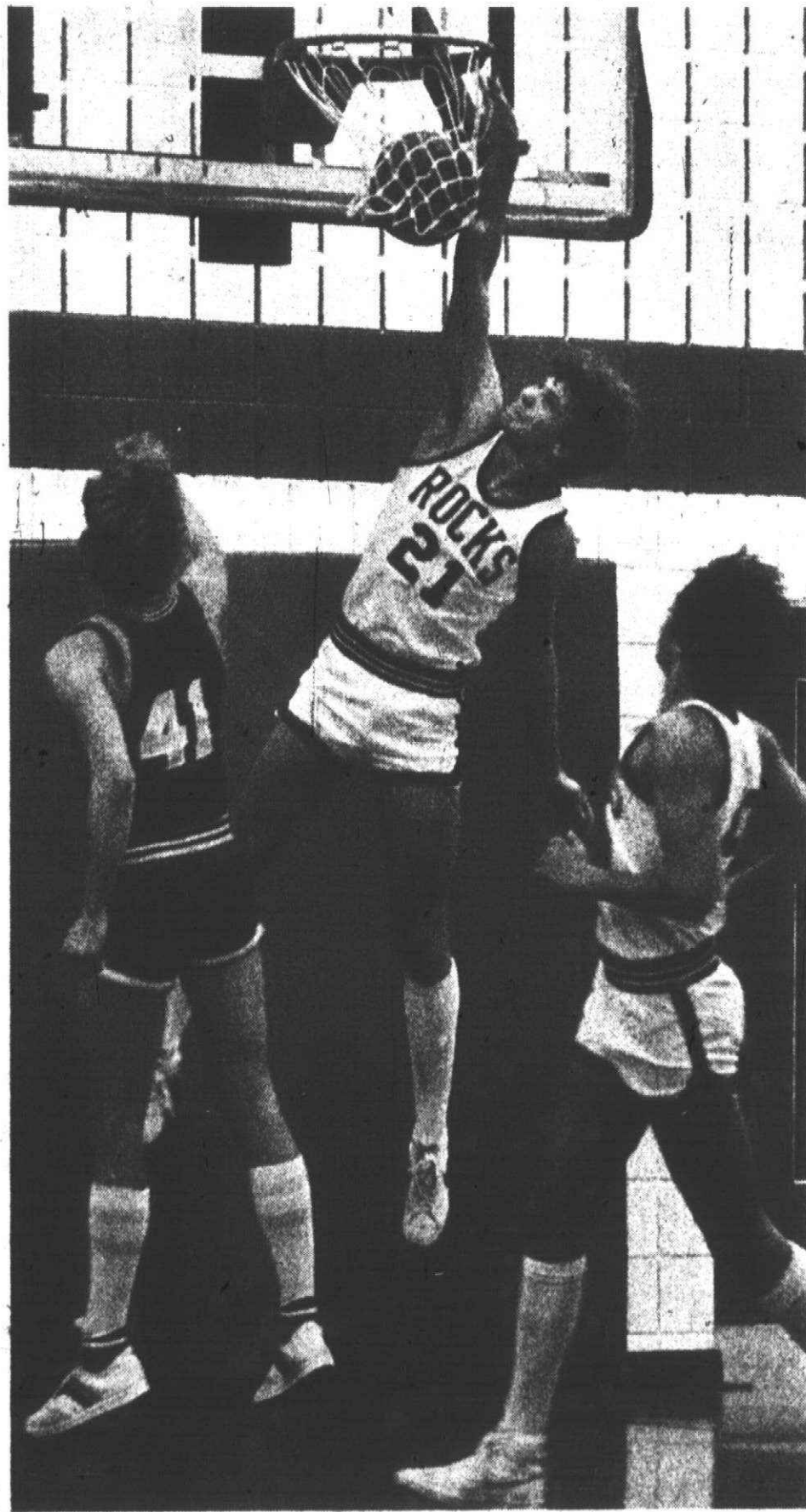

Figure skater sets new goals

Plymouth girl strives for perfection

Sunday is a day of rest for 11-year-old Gwen Cirbes.

During the other six days, the Plymouth Cultural Center Ice Arena is like her second home. She's usually checks in at 6 a.m. and comes back for more after school.

"I work with her a half-an-hour every day," said her coach, Theresa Romano. "She's on her own the rest of the time. That's the best quality about her. She works so hard and really pushes herself."

The hard work ethic was developed almost four years ago and the effort is starting to pay off.

"She (Theresa) picks out what fits you the best," said the Plymouth skater. "It was Italian music I skated to."

Cirbes now advances to the next level of competitive skating — Novice Ladies. She went right back to work practicing for her fourth test to get into the division.

"I have to work on combination jumps and trying to get an axle

(move)," she said. "Those are next."

A typical Cirbes day begins early before school in which she'll go through three, 45-minute workouts. After school, she returns to the rink for another 45-minute session. After dinner, she takes ballet which "helps stretch the muscles."

Her mother, Chris, a board member of the PFSC, drives the five-minute route from home to the rink.

And what does Cirbes' schoolmates think of her habits?

"THEY'RE KIND OF shocked," she said. "They can't understand when I get taken out of class."

The love for ice time developed when mother and daughter went to the Cultural Center for open skating. Lessons followed shortly after.

"Gwen has a lot of ability," said Romano, a competitive skater herself. "She's a perfectionist and has the ability to go far in skating."

At 2 p.m. Saturday, Romano and Cirbes will take part in the Super Bowl Pontiac Super Skate at the Phoenix Center Plaza in downtown Pontiac. Admission is free.

The program will feature touring pro Jo Jo Starbuck and Melissa Thomas, a U.S. International Team member.

Super Bowl fun is more than the game.

Metropolitan Detroit is going all out to provide big-name entertainment and super night-life continuing through the weekend. Daytime, too, can be filled with special Super Bowl events.

Detroit's Joe Louis Arena will have audiences starry-eyed during Super Bowl Week. Motown's own Diana Ross is set to dazzle arena crowds in two shows, 8 p.m. and midnight Friday. Tickets go for \$17.50, \$15 and \$10.50.

Sexy rocker Rod Stewart will shake the arena stage at 8 p.m. Sunday. Tickets are \$12.50, \$11.50 and \$10.50.

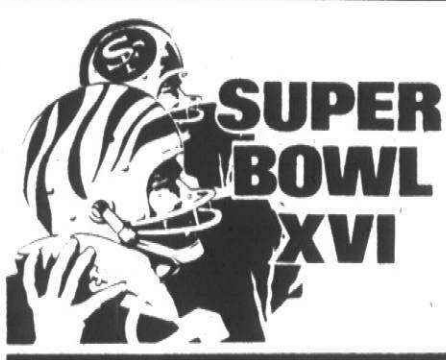
Ol' Blue Eyes himself, Frank Sinatra, was to perform at the arena Wednesday but he came down with the flu and the concert has been rescheduled for Feb. 3.

SUPER BOWL events sponsored by the Host Committee include a Super-crawl that will give visitors and metro Detroiters alike an opportunity to tour area restaurants and saloons tonight and into the a.m. Buses will travel a pre-arranged loop, from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m.

You can take your pick of crawls, traveling four different routes. One covers downtown Detroit and the city's center, another the Troy/Birmingham/Rochester area. Others are in Pontiac and in Lansing.

A \$5 admission button may be purchased at any area restaurant on the tour. The button allows crawlers to



board special buses for the ride to stops for eating and drinking. Live entertainment will be in full swing at every stop. Headquarters for the crawls are the Huddle at the Westin Hotel in Detroit, the Somerset Inn in Troy, Mill Street Inn in Pontiac and Long's in Lansing.

Friday night a Superball in the Renaissance Ballroom of the Westin Hotel in Detroit's Renaissance Center will have locals and visitors gathering to enjoy entertainment, special attractions and cheerleading teams. The "World's Largest" Super Bowl Party and pep rally features music, celebrities, clowns, mimes and prizes.

The blast goes from 5 p.m. to 2 a.m. and admission is free. A cash bar and food will be available.

A SUPER WEEK Winterfest will run all day long Saturday at Pine Knob Ski Resort in Waterford Township. Free activities for the family to share out-of-doors include skiing, dog sledding, skating, the NFL Alumni Winterfest Run and music.

Horse-drawn sleighs and SEMTA minibuses will help visitors get around throughout the day.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., with a torch light parade beginning at dusk.

Other communities with winter activities Saturday include "Super" Carnival Day, beginning at noon in Birmingham — the city's annual Winter Carnival is being held in Shain Park; "Super Bowl Saturday" from 9 a.m. to noon at the Southfield Civic Center; and "Super Saturday" from 10 a.m. to midnight in Pontiac — the Silver Bowl Classic Snowmobile Race, plus kite and figure skating exhibitions.

On Sunday, half-time entertainment at the big game itself will be provided by four international casts of the upbeat Up With People show. More

than 450 students from 24 nations will sing and dance during the nationally televised Super Bowl XVI halftime extravaganza in the Pontiac Silverdome.

THIS IS the third time Up With People has been invited to perform at the Super Bowl halftime show. The cast of young adults from ages 18-26 will present a 12-minute show before 80,000 Silverdome spectators and a TV audience of 125 million people around the world.

Everything from 3,000 yards of Chinese silk to 800 flash lights goes into props for the show, which also requires 2,456 articles of costume clothing.

Detroit-area TV viewers will be able to see the game beginning at 4 p.m. Sunday.

The city of Pontiac has designated the week Jan. 17-24 as Pontiac Super Blast. Highlighting the special activities is Bourbon Street North, a five-block plaza where no cars are permitted. Only strollers (who also may travel by horse and buggy and hayride wagons) can drop into numerous bars and restaurants that have been created within 31 buildings.

Can-Can Alley, Soul Emporium, the Rat's Hole and Top of the Marquee are just a few of the colorfully named places. Food is an abundance of ethnic and American choices, ranging from Greek cuisine to Bayou Ribs.

CAFE ANTON'S, with a New Orleans-style menu, is among the restaurants temporarily opened at Bourbon Street North. Hours are 11 a.m. to 2 a.m. at the cafe, operated by William C. Anton who owns the new Tony Roma's of West Bloomfield, as well as the Bullmarket in Detroit and Anton's of Grosse Pointe.

At Bourbon Street North, can-can music and dancers, Dixieland, rock, country, bluegrass, blues, jazz, Mexican mariachi, barbershop, red garter, banjos and big-band favorites are provided for entertainment.

Four buildings are devoted to other attractions: juried arts and crafts fill Jackson Square; carnival booths, the Bourbon Street Mardi Gras center, Bourbon Street Entertainment Center and South of the Border complete the buildings' offerings.

Parking for 7,200 cars is available in the downtown Pontiac area that encircles the strip imitating New Orleans' famous Bourbon Street.

Buses also travel the route, connecting with major hotels, motels and shopping centers in the Detroit-Pontiac and Oakland County areas.

HOTELS AND night spots throughout metro Detroit are hosting their own parties for visitors and the general public.

The Roostertail on downtown Detroit's riverfront will hold a celebration beginning at 2 p.m. Sunday. Patrons will view the Super Bowl game on wide-screen television while partaking of a gourmet brunch and an open bar. The \$25 tax-deductible contribution goes to the Harbinger Dance Company

in Detroit.

The Michigan Inn in Southfield will present a Sweet Sixteen Super Bowl Party from 6:30 p.m. to 1 a.m. Friday in the Michigan and Superior rooms. Detroit "oldie" bands (Moose and Da Sharks, the Laredos, the Falcons and the Latin Counts) will play for 1950s-style dancing.

Hot dogs and hamburgers will be a bargain at 16 cents. The party's climax is a Super Bowl cake for 600. To gain admission, partygoers must be hotel guests, or have obtained free tickets in advance from Honey Radio.

ALSO REMINISCENT of the 1950s is an appearance by recording star Guy Mitchell, who will give two concerts, at 7 and 10 tonight at Almost Heaven in Drayton Plains, slightly north of Pontiac. Tickets are available at the door, or call 674-4131 or 698-9231 for information.

Almost everything going on in the Detroit area this week is being geared to the Super Bowl. "Honoring the Super Bowl" the Mobius Theatre in Pontiac is presenting "The Sonheim Cabaret," with songs by Stephen Sonheim. Performances are at 8 tonight, 8 and 10 p.m. Friday and 2, 8 and 10 p.m. Saturday. For reservations (tickets are \$6) call 332-6764.

Also in Pontiac, Los Legumbres, Inc., is sponsoring the premiere of the Open Forum Improvisational Theatre Company in "Mardi Gras on Suburban Street." The show was presented Monday and will be offered again at 8 p.m. Friday at the Eagle Theatre in Pontiac. For more information call 335-5470.

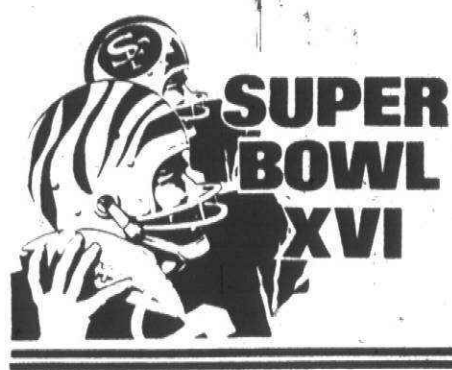
Restaurants ready for visitors, home-towners

Super Bowl Week is bringing an influx of visitors to metropolitan Detroit, creating a brisk business at many Detroit-area restaurants. But that's no reason for regular patrons to stay home.

Restaurateurs don't want to see a repeat of what happened when the Republican Convention came to Detroit last year. Then conventioners didn't do much dining out, while area residents anticipated big crowds and stayed home.

If you were planning to ring up the London Chop House, however, forget it. Detroit's most prestigious restaurant is completely booked through Saturday night (the restaurant is closed Sunday) of Super Bowl Week, daytime manager Angie Leone, said Tuesday afternoon. But other restaurants are encourag-



ing regular customers and Znyone else to call for reservations (or maybe even just drop in).

AT JACQUES Seafood in Bingham Farms, manager Mark Fraker said Tuesday, "We've started to see an increase in our lunch and dinner business. The level of excitement for the Super Bowl is high with staff and customers."

Fraker said his restaurant made arrangements to sell Super Bowl souvenirs and has a booth set up in the lobby.

To would-be stay-at-homes, Fraker said, "I would encourage people to go out and eat: People will dine out just to be a part of the party atmosphere."

He said Saturday night is already booked heavily, but expects that reservations may still be available at Jacques for this weekend.

Jacques ran an ad in the Cincinnati Inquirer, asking out-of-towners to call collect for reservations. Fraker anticipates, however, that many people coming from Ohio will be traveling by bus and just coming up on Sunday for the game. And from San Francisco, people will be coming in the last few days.

"We have extra people scheduled and on call," Fraker said, hoping for a good turnout from regular customers and visitors.

MITCH HOUSEY'S in Livonia is making no special plans for this Week. Beverly Feuer, manager, said the restaurant is far enough away so that it won't be affected much by Super Bowl festivities.

Housey's in Livonia and Dearborn Heights has been offering a dinner special that includes soup, salad and entree, all for \$8. The choice includes such favorites as lobster tail, seafood platter, and surf and turf.

"These dinners run \$24 everyplace else," she said. "We're leaving the price the same for Super Bowl Week. We're just happy to take all the business that

comes our way. We're trying very hard to survive."

Ms. Feuer added, "We've been very fortunate. We do a very nice lunch business and have the Middle Eastern Revue at night."

The restaurant has been at the Livonia location for 17 years, under single ownership (the Houseys).

CHARLEY'S CRAB in Troy has "started experiencing Super Bowl crowds as recent as last Friday," said Sandy Sandt, assistant manager.

He said the Cincinnati Bengals, who are staying at the Troy Hilton, just arrived Monday. But that the San Francisco 49ers, staying at the Sheraton Southfield, came last weekend.

On Monday night some 25 of the San

Francisco football players had dinner at Charley's Crab. Restaurant customers, as well as guests and hotel people from next door (the Northfield Hilton), were thrilled to see the players, especially Joe Montana, Sandt said. "The girls think he's a hunk."

He said bookings at Charley's Crab look a little heavier than usual and that reservations could become difficult by Friday or Saturday night. He doesn't want to discourage anyone, however.

"We are one of the most popular restaurants in Detroit. We realize what the Super Bowl means to the City of Detroit and have put aside a few reservations for the teams and the AFL," Sandt said.

Still, "We have plenty of places for people to eat."
