ESY may face budget ax tonight

The first in a series of budget cuts for the 1982-83 school year will be discussed tonight when the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education decides on reduction of the extended school year (ESY) program.

The meeting takes place at 7:30 p.m. at the board office, 454 S. Harvey in Plymouth.

School administrators will recommend to the board that four of six elementary schools return to the traditional nine-month school year.

The four schools are Isbister in Plymouth Township, and Miller, Hulsing and Gallimore in Canton.

Field and Erickson, also in Canton, are expected

to stay on ESY in 1982-83. These two buildings are close to capacity on ESY.

IF THE BOARD approves the ESY reduction plan, it will save the district an estimated \$300,000. Plymouth-Canton schools face an estimated \$2.22 million deficit for the 1982-83 school year. Anticipated expenditures are 5.4 percent more than anticipated revenues. The schools are working on a \$41.4 million budget.

Reducing ESY schools is one of 21 items facing proposed cuts this year.

Many residents believe ESY saves money for the schools, allowing a building to hold one-third more students than a nine-month schedule. But operation of a building year-round is more expensive.

Rapid increases in student enrollments in the

mid-1970s — especially in Canton — forced initiation of the ESY program. Elementary school enrollments in Plymouth-Canton schools now are declining, however.

The proposed cut in ESY would save the district \$30,000 for each school — a total of \$120,000. There also is a \$140,000 administration savings, with each building losing an assistant principal. There also is a \$40,000 clerical savings, with each building losing a secretarial position.

BOARD MEMBERS seemed concerned at last weekend's budget workshop about giving the four elementary schools a "long-term guarantee" that they would not return to ESY. It was noted, however, that it's difficult to project future population growth.

Tom Yack, a Canton resident, attended all four meetings in early February with parents living in ESY attendance areas. All four schools want to come off ESY, he said.

Yack said Miller parents wanted that long-term guarantee "etched in concrete," Yack said. They believe they have the right to come off ESY because they were the first school put on the program, Yack said.

Hulsing and Gallimore both expressed an interest in keeping sixth grade at their respective schools, Yack added. Currently, some middle schools house sixth graders.

Isbister also seemed the easiest school to switch back to traditional because of its enrollment decline, Yack said.

Moods change on strict sign laws

In the late 1970s, many officials fought for and won tight restrictions on business and roadway signs in Canton.

The mood is different now. Merchants are lobbying successfully for a more liberal sign ordinance, which they believe will help business.

The local chapter of the League of Women Voters has taken an official stand against the proposed changes. But few residents have protested the new guidelines.

"I expected a tremendous number of people (protesting) and severe opposition," said trustee Loren Bennett. "I have seen no tremendous outcry that people are upset."

Bennett also sits on the Canton Planning Commission, which gave unanimous approval in January to sweeping changes, including larger signs and some tower signs and billboards along freeways.

THE ISSUE is on Tuesday's agenda of the Township Board. The board may approve, reject or amend the newly drafted sign provisions.

If major changes occur, the ordinance will have to go back to the planning commission. Most board members

have expressed willingness to relax the guidelines.

Bennett believes business persons will benefit most from a "psychological" change. He doesn't see a big rush to go off and buy new and expensive larger signs.

"People complain about (customers) not being able to find businesses," said Bennett. "What's critical is as long as the business community believes the (current) sign ordinance is hindering their business, there are going to be problems."

THE CURRENT guidelines were adopted in 1975. Last fall, the township's planning commission began studying ordinances from other communities.

The planning department contributed some research, and the chamber of commerce also made suggestions. Public hearings by the planning commission and the Township Board attracted mostly business persons.

However, the Northville-Plymouth-Canton-Novi branch of the League of Women Voters, which has done several research projects on sign ordinances, spoke out against the proposed changes.

A few months ago, the League sent a letter to state legislators, asking them

to arrange a meeting with the state Department of Highways and Transportation. The goal was to discuss the possibility of erecting a prototype sign along I-275 to use business logos to advertise services in Canton.

Nothing came of the effort. League spokeswoman Bonnie Bowerman of Canton expressed disappointment about changes eliminating incentives for signs of natural materials.

However, the Wayne County Planning Commission has recommended that the natural-materials incentive be put back into the ordinance.

"SIGNS OFTEN last longer than the businesses," said Mrs. Bowerman. "We do care about our business community, and we do want them to succeed. We don't feel this is going to help them."

Other portions of the new ordinance have elicited mixed reactions, especially new guidelines which would allow some billboards and tower signs.

Treasurer Maria Falkiewicz specu-

lates that the ordinance will be adopted "piecemeal." Businesses which rely heavily on freeway traffic should be allowed larger signs, said Ms. Falkiewicz.

Trustee Carol Bodemiller believes the larger signs are too drastic and will lead to a cluttered look. She intends to vote no, "unless there are radical changes."

"If I thought the signs would do it, I would vote for it," added Mrs. Bodemiller. A few years ago, "the halls were packed," she said.

"They (people) didn't want large signs, but now people don't have time to get involved," she added. "They are all wrapped up in trying to make ends meet."

Clerk John Flodin, who supports relaxing the guidelines, notes the current ordinance forbidding off-site signs along Michigan Avenue hampers the ability to promote the Canton-owned Fellows Creek Golf Course on Lotz.

SUPERVISOR James Poole isn't "too crazy" about tower signs and billboards, and he thinks the ordinance should encourage the use of natural-material signs.

Trustee Robert Padgett said he intends to propose an alternative to tower signs and billboards. He favors a billboard which contains four panels, each advertising a different Canton business on a rotating basis.

He hasn't worked out costs and a plan for who would own and maintain the billboards.

"There are some alternatives that are worth exploring," said Padgett. "If it can happen, we could repeal the billboard portion (later)."

Quik Pik hit

Cops nab pair in robbery

Police arrested two Canton men and are seeking a third man in connection with the armed robbery Thursday of a Quik Pik party store in Canton.

Police Chief Jerry Cox said two men walked into the store about 11:50 p.m. and demanded money from the 20-year-old woman store clerk.

The bandits took about \$320 in cash, lottery tickets and the clerk's rings and jewelry.

According to police, the men left the store and went to a car driven by a third man.

Officers Lou Stevens, Richard Pomeroy and Ernest Sayre used a police tracking dog to follow the suspect's footprints to the car. Tire tracks were followed to the Canton Gardens apartment complex.

Cox said the officers found the car and it contained a brown paper bag with money and lottery tickets in it.

Footprints led to a home on Alton where one man was arrested.

The second suspect was arrested the next morning in a Detroit apartment. Cox said the men, both in their early 20s, had shared an apartment in Canton.

Cox said the department will seek armed robbery charges against the men for robbing the store and the clerk.

Schools to review 'Games' elective

A school curriculum committee has been established to review the role-playing game Dungeons and Dragons, which is part of a West Middle School elective course.

The action was taken after the Rev. Gregory Gentry of Canton Assembly of God filed a formal complaint about the game. Gentry claims the game has a

negative spiritual influence on the student players.

Dungeons and Dragons is one of several games played in the elective class Games, Games, Games. It is an unending game in which players "become" imaginary characters and are led on adventures by a referee (dungeon master).

The written complaint was filed Feb. 16 with Michael Homes, assistant superintendent of instruction. Following

school policy, Homes appointed a committee to review the complaint and make a recommendation by March 1.

Chairing the committee is Dick Egli, community relations director. The other members are: Judy Stone, a Pioneer Middle School teacher; Adina Rice, East Middle School librarian; Deanna Hough of Plymouth and Marilyn Rickard of Canton, as the parent representatives.

The decision to retain or dismiss

course materials can be made by the school board. The committee can only advise.

AMONG THOSE the committee will be asking to speak on the issue will be Gentry and Robert Smith, West Middle School principal. The committee is gathering reference materials on the game.

Mr. Walch, who died Feb. 13 in Plymouth Township, was born in Rochester, N.Y., and had served as an ordained Presbyterian minister for 51 years. He was a graduate of Elmhurst Academy in 1924, of McCormick Seminary in Chicago in 1927, with a B.A. and M.A. from the University of Ro-

mond, Ind., and Beth Walch of Plymouth, Ind.; brothers, Albert, Raymond, and Louis, all of Rochester, N.Y.; sisters, Carolyn Sabin and Mary Fran Frank, both of Rochester, N.Y.; and by six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.



Winter in the 1800s

Greenfield Village shows life before furnaces

But the wind is howling and the temperature is dipping.

Let's just turn up the thermostat a notch or two. Maybe take a long, hot shower, then curl up in front of the TV.

Sure, that's easy nowadays. But what if you lived in the 1800s?

A new program at Greenfield Village in Dearborn aims to give a sampling of how people coped with winter before gas furnaces, electricity and modern gadgets that made life more comfortable.

The program, which runs through March 12, is a 2½-hour tour of five buildings in the village emphasizing changes that took place in the 1800s.


"They (exhibits) focus on the change from a rural to an industrialized society," said Candace Matelic, manager of interpretive programs. "It's a story that we find exciting."

In the past, during the slower winter season, several buildings at the village were open for guided tours at random. This year, the exhibit has a focus.

INTERPRETERS (guides) conducting the tour spend 15 or 20 minutes at each building on the tour, explaining technical points and answering questions.

The tour includes a ride in a sleigh or carriage, and free refreshments at the Clinton Inn on the village grounds.

The five stopping points are the homes of Henry Ford and Orville and Wilbur Wright, the Sarah Jordan boarding house, the Menlo Park compound

where Thomas Edison perfected his inventions, and the Cohen Millinery and Dry Goods Shop.

THE FORD BIRTHPLACE was a rural farmhouse of late 1870s vintage — a simple house that used a wood-burning stove, candles and kerosene lights. A portable tin bathtub was used for washing.

In contrast, the Wright brothers' home, from Dayton, Ohio, was a middle-class house circa 1900. It had gas heat radiators, a gas stove, porcelain sink and icebox.

The Jordan boarding house of 1879 used electric power.

"Visitors can see the changes and how they changed our lives," said Ms. Matelic. "They made tasks easier and allowed for more leisure time."

The Menlo Park exhibit illustrates the abundance of inventions that ushered in the modern era of machinery and electrical power systems.

"There was quite a bit of interaction between inventors," said Ms. Matelic. "These changes didn't happen in a vacuum."

THE COHEN Millinery and Dry Goods Shop, which operated in Detroit in the late 1890s, highlights the beginning of mass production, retailing and advertising.

Buying a new hat was one way the 19th century woman perked her spirits. The hat bodies and trims both were mass produced, then mixed and matched in the store to the customer's taste.

The interpreter assumes the role of the shop clerk, urging "customers" to try on an assortment of styles.

"We are working toward putting the dry goods aspect into the building," said Ms. Matelic.

GREENFIELD VILLAGE, operated by the non-profit Edison Institute, is on Oakwood south of Michigan Avenue in Dearborn.


Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week (closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year).

The first tour leaves at 10 a.m., and the last at 2:30 p.m. Admission is \$7 for adults, \$3.50 for children aged six to 12, and \$5.50 for senior citizens 62 and older.

Admissions to the Henry Ford Museum, also at the village complex, are separate.

Resident author opens the lid to the world of computer crimes

Jack Bologna of Plymouth has authored a book soon to be released on preventing computer crime and fraud. The book is titled "Computer Crime: Wave of the Future."

The book is being published by Assets Protection of San Francisco.

It will be introduced soon in this area when Bologna has an autograph signing promotion at Plymouth Book World.

Bologna is president of George Odiorne Associates, a Plymouth-based management consulting firm which also involves itself in computer security.

Bologna has spent 30 years in accounting, investigative auditing and management consulting work. He holds degrees in law and accounting and spent 14 years in federal investigative agencies, including the IRS intelligence division and the Drug Enforcement Administration of the U.S. Justice Department.

In 1972 as vice president of Intertel, Bologna designed the security system which now is in use at Metropolitan Airport in Romulus.

Before beginning his career in gov-

ernment Bologna worked for the accounting firm of Arthur Young and Co.

Earlier this year Bologna had written an article for a computer trade magazine which uncovered the scheme used to defraud the Wells Fargo Bank of millions of dollars. A couple of weeks after the article was published a bank officer admitted that the scheme described was most probably the one used to bilk the bank and that it likely was an inside job involving one of the bank's employees.

In the book Bologna discusses white collar crime in general as well as discussing computer crime and techniques which can be used to prevent it.

BOLOGNA WRITES about how the work environment can become a breeding ground for computer crime, and looks at computer crime in the future and talks about the checkless and cashless society which will arrive with electronic fund transfer systems.

He suggests the best defense is the ethics, motivations and values of the processing professionals, and discusses whether it is best for employers to punish for dishonesty or react positively to honesty.

Two chapters are on testing — a self-test on a person's own integrity in business ("would you steal if . . .") and one on psychological testing.

The appendices include: a white collar crime motivation case study; a theft motivation orientation tool; computer physical security survey; accounting procedural security survey; a motivational climate survey; and a computer crime report form.

"This book is intended to demonstrate that the current state of computer technology exceeds our ability to secure these new instruments of commerce and communication," explains Bologna.

The threats which that gap represents societally, he adds, include:

- A substantial increase in the incidence and amounts illegally diverted through computer related theft, fraud and embezzlement;

- Illegal use and disclosure of personal, private and proprietary information;


- Placing in jeopardy our whole financial telecommunications system (electronic fund transfer between banks);

- An increase in both internal and external sabotage directed at computer centers and telecommunications networks.

The solution will not be in improving the technological state of the art, Bologna stresses in his book. "We are now approaching the limits of technology in those fields. The real problem in computer security is a people problem and is far more often an internal security problem than it is a problem of externally directed sabotage on the part of terrorists or predatory competitors.

"The next wave of technology in security will have to come not from the physical sciences but from the behavioral sciences, e.g., what personal qualities and personality factors lead employees to commit computer-related crimes and other computer abuses? What factors in the work environment will cause or breed conditions which foster computer crime and computer abuse?"

Bologna added that his purpose in writing the book is to stimulate an interest in work-related environmental factors and conditions which promote sickness (crime) in the computer field.

James C. Siegel of Plymouth will be one of the key speakers for the 1982 Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) International Congress and Exposition which opens Friday at Cobo Hall.

Siegel, supervisor of the quality/reliability planning and analysis section of Ford Motor Co.'s manufacturing staff, will talk on "Managing with Statistical Techniques" for the Statistical Process Control Seminar.

Other panel members will be Bill Hoglund of general manager of the Pontiac Motor Division, General Motors speaking on the Dr. Deming Management Philosophy, D.J. Chambers, an industrial controls consultant, Tom Goebel of Pontiac Motor Division, and seminar chairman Cady Davis, general director of corporation quality and reliability for General Motors.

The one-day seminar is being held because of increased emphasis on quality in the automotive industry, says Siegel who adds that the vast improvement in the quality of Japanese products is largely due to statistical analysis methods developed and taught by Dr. Deming.

Siegel has worked with Deming in applying that management philosophy at Ford's.

Siegel, a graduate of Purdue who earned an M.B.A. from University of Michigan, started with Ford as a co-op with the transmission and chassis division in Indianapolis and with the metal stamping division in Chicago.

After graduating from Purdue with a master's in engineering degree, he joined Ford's design center and then had positions in automotive assembly division, product planning, and Ford parts and service division and joined the manufacturing staff in about 1976.







School buses pass test with flying colors

Keeping a fleet of 107 school buses running isn't an easy task.

Getting perfect grades in a state police inspection is even harder, but that's what Plymouth's Calvin Heard has done for the ninth year in a row.

"I don't know how the devil we passed. They inspected us during the worst month of the year. We had three major snowstorms and we were short-handed," says Heard, the Plymouth-Canton schools' fleet service manager.

While he wonders about passing this year's inspection, Heard has doubts about future inspections.

The state police inspection lasted for three weeks last month and included mechanical, safety and procedure reviews.

All of the Plymouth-Canton buses and drivers came through the inspection with flying colors, but the aging fleet might have troubled roads ahead.

"It's getting harder each year, since we aren't replacing buses. As our fleet gets older and older, it's going to be harder and harder to get that 100 percent inspection," says Dale Goby, director of transportation. Heard agrees.

"Will we continue to get 100 percent?" he asks. "I don't know. Last year they didn't buy any new buses. We may get away with it for a couple of years, but it will catch up with you."

BECAUSE OF recent budget cuts, the buses aren't being replaced regularly, which means Heard's staff of eight mechanics are having to keep the current fleet in safe operating status. This leaves Heard with serious questions about the future.

"If I can't give a kid a safe bus ride in the morning, I would rather not pick him up. I don't want to live with a bus accident on my mind. If I can't provide a safe bus, I won't do it," he says.

"We have to put up with a lot of things in school transportation. The buses sit outside in all types of weather. We don't even have engine heaters wired in the yard."

"Most people have trouble starting their own car in the winter. On Monday mornings, I have to start 100 buses that have sat out in minus 20 degree or wet weather."

"Then they have to go out on roads which aren't properly maintained. We had to go into subdivisions which weren't even plowed out."

Dial-a-ride staff seeks space

A local dial-a-ride organization is looking for a new and larger "home."

One possibility is to rent space in a Westland school formerly used as a center for handicapped students. Another option is the former sheriff's department road patrol office in the Michigan Avenue-Henry Ruff area of Westland.

Trying to get out of its cramped quarters of about 400 square feet in the Westland public services department building is the Nankin Transit Commission which provides van transportation primarily for elderly and handicapped persons in Garden City, Westland, Canton Township, Wayne, and Inkster.

The staff and drivers have a need for about 2,000 square feet, Shaw said.

NTC provides the service through a contract with the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority which buys its 17 vans and provides about 80 percent of its \$1 million budget.

Balance of expenses is made up through fares.

Conducting the search is Glenn Shaw Jr., chairman of NTC since its formation eight years ago, until he left several months ago. He was retained by the board as a \$1,000 per month consultant to "oversee general operations," find new a new office for staff, drivers, and storage space for vans, and work toward maintaining the commission's autonomy.

If the last task can't be completed, then Shaw will work toward a smooth transition with SEMTA.

NTC fought off a reported "takeover" by the regional

agency last summer, ultimately signing a new service agreement which runs out June 30.

SHAW SAID the commission is limited by its agreement with SEMTA to have its office in a governmental agencies' building, not a private facility.

Shaw said last year's NTC budget was approved by SEMTA with the inclusion of money for renting space in a privately owned industrial building.

He is in contact with the Wayne-Westland Community Schools about using the former Norris School, a former special education center, on Palmer just west of Merriman.

The commission would only use several rooms if the school administration and board work out a rental schedule.

Another possibility for NTC is the former sheriff's road patrol office on Henry Ruff, between Middlebelt and Merriman, just north of Michigan Avenue.

Shaw said he has contacted county Commissioner Thomas Presnell about that facility.

The commission's staff of 10 persons is jammed in a 400-square foot office in the Westland DPS building on Marquette east of Newburgh.

Drivers are forced to meet in the DPS coffee shop.

Shaw said he received several letters recently from the new Westland DPS director, Henry Lundquist, about vans' parking problems.

But Shaw stressed there is no suggestion that the NTC staff relocate.


The game's negative spiritual influence is due to the emphasis on magic, crimes, sorcery, witchcraft and the occult, Gentry said.



Interviewed for yearbook

The journey along life's highway can have many unusual twists and turns.

This came to The Stroller's attention again and this time in a most surprising manner.

He had been invited to give an interview to an alumnus of Garden City West High School, the school that honored him with an official diploma back in 1973. He readily accepted.

The interview was to appear in the last yearbook published by the school, as it will be closed next fall.

It was an odd position for The Stroller as he usually is on the asking end of an interview, but the change proved most interesting.

THE FIRST odd twist came when he was asked if he had aspired to be a journalist when he was a young fellow just starting to think of a career.

No, he answered, "You wouldn't believe it, but my father had planned to send me to college to learn the restaurant business and be the Chuck Muer of those days."

At the time The Stroller's father operated a lunch counter in our little town, and he started teaching his family to become short-order cooks. The Stroller advanced to the point where he could make a good oyster stew, flip fried eggs and do up a big hamburger in real style.

Then misfortune struck. The Stroller's father was a victim of what was termed "hasty consumption," and his mother was left a widow with five children.

All thoughts of going to college vanished. Then mother said, "You will have to leave school. But you can learn a trade and what you have in your head no one can steal from you."

So the next step was to learn the machinist trade. After four years of apprenticeship, The Stroller was qualified journeyman mechanic and rose to the rank of shop superintendent of the Bethlehem Steel Works back home during World War I.

SICK OF the muck and grease, he yearned to leave the shops and one day, almost by accident, he wandered into the office of the little town newspaper. It was publishing day and they gave

him a few small jobs to do. That was it. It was then that the newspaper bug bit him.

On invitation of the old editor he joined the staff of a newly organized paper in the city, four miles away. And, strangely, he started as a sports editor.

For several years he labored to teach himself the intricacies of the journalistic world. Then one night he was introduced to Edgar A. Guest, the Free Press poet, who invited him to come to Detroit. He came and remained in the sports department for a quarter of a century.

Then came another twist. He resigned to take an executive position for a sports organization — the Bowling Proprietors Association — and remained there until he thought it was time to retire.

His plan was changed in a few months when Myra Chandler, then the owner of the Observer, invited him to join her staff. He did and he was made editor of the Plymouth paper when Phil Power purchased it.

AND NOW here The Stroller is still putting one word after another — far cry from the role of a restaurateur he was expected to be in his younger days.

Talk about unusual twists. The Stroller has experienced them.

Union editor objects to opinion

To the editor:

In Tim Richard's column of Feb. 11, 1982 appearing on your opinion page, he belittles the Independent Skilled Trades Council (ISTC) and "... news handouts, reprints and cartoons which a friend who works at the GM Livonia plant gave him."

As a former member of the ISTC, a member of the United Front Caucus (UFC) of UAW Local 600, and an editor and cartoonist for the 600 Organizer, I take exception to this company-oriented column.

He belittles the ISTC for advising workers, when asked, what their rights are if they choose not to accept company literature or attend their films ... and if they insist, call for your committeeman to protest their actions."

Workers have a responsibility not to become a captive audience for company brain-washing propaganda aimed at destroying our standard of living.

Our wages and benefits have not caused the crisis. If the autoworkers at GM worked for nothing (no wages or benefits) GM would still be selling cars at an average of \$8,400 per car. This figure was obtained using corporate auto industry analysts' figures, who have a history of inflating labor cost.

I work at the Ford Rouge that used to employ 99,000 workers and presently employs about 19,000. In March 1981 Ford threatened to lay off about 2,000 workers from the Rouge Steel Division if they didn't give concessions.

The UFC and the ISTC both put out leaflets saying concessions don't save jobs. The workers, however, voted for concessions and by the end of the year 2,000 jobs had been lost and Ford had its concession money.

Will GM or Ford be any different than Chrysler? Chrysler has laid off half its workers and closed seven plants since receiving concessions and used the concession money to buy robots to throw more Chrysler workers out of work.

The column then jumps into the racist "Japanese firms have a cost advantage of \$1,300 to \$1,700 per car" and quotes some other figures that supposedly show U.S. workers are only 30 percent to 42 percent as productive as Japanese workers, which is contradictory of the findings of the Joint Economic Committee of the U.S. Congress which found that the Japanese were only 62 percent as productive as U.S. workers.

At Harvard University, Professors Jose Gomez-Ibanez and David Harrison dispute the cost advantage figures. In their study of the Japanese and U.S. auto industries, they state there is only a \$800 cost difference and half of that is lost in transportation cost.

This \$400 advantage cannot be blamed on workers when you further compare the firms. The U.S. firms pay their executives from four to 10 times as much as their Japanese counterparts. The U.S. firms work on a profit margin four times greater than the Japanese firms.

The column goes on to extol how the U.S. auto

industry has cut back on its salaried staff cost. Last week a GM salaried person told me that none of the supposed cuts had in fact been implemented. The vacation time wasn't cut, COLA on non-worked time wasn't cut, insurance costs have not been increased, and overtime still is paid at the same rate.

The column concludes by saying: "Management and labor are in the same boat. It would be suicidal to blow the other guy out of the water."

Doug Fraser sits at the helm with Lee Iacocca, Roger Smith and William Caldwell on a boat built with our blood and sweat and the tears of our loved ones. We are being thrown off into the shark infested water with only Reagan's basketball hoop safety net to protect us.

With or without concessions we can expect harassment, layoffs, and plant closings. We must be willing to follow the example of our brothers and sisters of UAW Local 195, Windsor Bumper Co., a Gulf and Western subsidiary in Windsor.

Faced with the demand of giving up COLA or facing the closing of the plant, they responded with an eight-day sitdown strike. The strike was won with the help of other plants, locals and unions, with 24-hour picket lines and plans for several other UAW locals to walk off their jobs to join the line in times of emergency.

If our standard of living is to be protected, we as individuals must be willing to take the action and give support to others. This is how the Windsor workers won their sitdown.

We along with our parents and grandparents built the plants and wealth of this nation and we must see that it is run in our interest so that our children and grandchildren will have jobs other than minimum wages at McDonald's.

Those who do not belong to our union must remember that our standard of living sets the standard in this area and if ours falls, so will yours. It will matter little if you are a foreman in a plant, a store owner, or a non-union worker.

The proposed doing away with our Paid Personal Holiday (PPH) days will only create more unemployment. About 3 percent of those presently working will be laid off due to the loss of PPHs. The loss of 3 percent productivity increase and COLA, which will total about \$1 over the next nine months, will not be felt immediately but as prices increase and our wages are frozen, we all will feel it.

Retirees' pensions will be frozen for more than two years.

The only thing we will receive is \$70 million for the sub fund that will only last four or five weeks. But even this is not new money — it is part of the \$76 million owed to the fund by the company.

Every other supposed gain for the workers isn't worth the ink because it is prefaced with "The company agrees to study" which means nothing will be done.

Additives in our food: What should we do about them?

This is the sixth in a series of 15 articles exploring "Food and People." In this article, Jere E. FOOD ADDITIVES date back at least to the ancient Egyptians and Hebrews, who used salt to enhance the flavor and preserve their food. Yet in the last 20 years or so, food additives have become the subject of bitter controversy.

Food additives have been accused of leading to a range of evils from behavioral problems to cancer, and the increasing popularity of "organic" and "natural" foods attests to our growing concern.

On the other hand, some additives are essential to our modern food system, which requires preservation of food during transportation and storage. Other additives improve taste and appearance and make possible a variety of convenience foods.

At the center of the controversy are the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the government gatekeeper responsible for protecting us from harmful substances and the 1958 food additive amendments to the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

THIS LEGISLATION defined food additives as substances reasonably expected to be a component of food.

This definition has two legal exceptions: those substances "Generally Recognized As Safe" (GRAS), and those that had received prior sanction by the FDA or the Department of Agriculture.

These categories were established so that hundreds of additives already commonly found in the food supply in 1958 — including those most frequently used, sugar and salt — would not require new approval.

An additional section of the 1958 legislation has been responsible for much of the subsequent controversy surrounding food additives. Known as the Delaney Clause, after the congressman

who introduced it, it specifies that no food additive be allowed which has been demonstrated "to induce cancer in man or animal."

FALSE ASSUMPTIONS

The 1958 legislation assumed that food additives that had been used were safe and that probably only a few substances could cause cancer in humans.

Subsequent laboratory experiments suggested otherwise: Some common substances proved to be carcinogenic (cancer-causing) when given in massive doses.

In 1969, questions were raised about the possible carcinogenicity of one of the 514 substances originally on the GRAS list: cyclamate, an artificial sweetener.

Cyclamate was therefore removed from the list and banned from use in foods.

President Richard Nixon then ordered a re-evaluation of the safety of all GRAS list substances. That study, recently completed, raised concerns about 24 of the additives on the list.

Included were the possibility that excessive intake of caffeine causes birth defects and that the amount of salt in our food should be decreased because of its possible contribution to high blood pressure.

IN ANOTHER case, in 1978, sodium nitrite, a previously sanctioned substance used to prevent botulism in meats, was reported to induce cancer in laboratory animals.

The FDA was thus faced with a law that required the removal of nitrite from foods although the substances served a public health purpose.

Re-evaluation of the study showed that nitrite itself is probably not a carcinogen, although nitrosamines formed from nitrites in the presence of protein are.

Thus, it has been possible to keep nitrite in the food supply while attempting to identify other preservatives to replace it.

These examples, along with the brouhaha over the proposed removal of saccharin from the market, made it clear that the assumptions of 1958 were flawed. Prior use is no guarantee of safety, and many chemicals are at least weakly carcinogenic.

"ACCIDENTAL" ADDITIVES

In addition to regulating deliberate additives, the FDA also attempts to protect us against substances accidentally added to or present in the food supply.

For example, aflatoxin, which is produced by a fungus growing on many grains, is a common contaminant known to cause cancer in laboratory animals.

The FDA has established an aflatoxin tolerance limit in grains that can be marketed.

The reasoning is that such accidental contaminants should be allowed, if present, in small amounts that do not present an appreciable health risk. Otherwise, large quantities of nutritious food might have to be destroyed.

Pesticides also appear accidentally in final food products. The food crops on which specific pesticides may be used and the amount that will be tolerated in the final product are tightly regulated.

A third example of accidental food additives are drugs used in animal feed that appear in the final food product. Again, the amounts allowed are regulated to keep them well within safe limits.

PROBLEMS OF REGULATION

Part of the problem in any proposed regulatory action regarding food addi-

tives involves the difficulty of demonstrating cause-and-effect relationships in low-acid canned foods, since almost everyone has been sick shortly after eating some "tainted" food.

However, in dealing with a substance that is a weak carcinogen, such as saccharin, there is only a small chance that any given individual will be affected.

Furthermore, it may be many years before the effect (cancer) occurs, and it will not be possible to link definitively any one case of cancer to the additive, only an increase in rate.

Many people therefore believe they should have "freedom of choice" regarding whether they should eat a potential carcinogen. The difficulty is that few Americans are able to judge arguments based on probability.

Some have suggested modifying the Delaney Clause, rather than removing it entirely. A modified Delaney Clause could "approve" a substance that would not increase the risk of cancer to

anyone by more than one in a million.

Such a provision would result in some substances that would have to be removed under the present Delaney Clause remaining on the market. But that change still would not allow approval of saccharin.

APPROVING NEW ADDITIVES

There is also the problem of approving new additives. In order to obtain such approval, the sponsor must determine that the substance works for the purpose intended and that the concentration in the final food product can be measured.

The substance must be tested in at least two species of animals in large doses over an extended period of time to determine whether it can cause birth defects, cancer or other adverse effects.

The sponsor submits the test results to the FDA, which establishes regulations for safe use. The basic rule is to establish a hundred-fold safety margin.

Thus the manufacturer may incorporate only 1 percent of the maximum amount found not to produce any harmful effect in animals. However, the current Delaney Clause prohibits the use of any carcinogen.

This premarket approval system has been an effective way of assuring that new food additives do not cause illness.

SINCE THE 1958 legislation, it has been possible to identify problems in previously used food additives and to prevent the introduction of potentially harmful new ones.

It is reassuring that of the more than 2,500 food additives presently used, only a few have been seriously questioned.

Nevertheless, many people maintain that no "foreign" chemical should be added to the food supply (ignoring that natural foods also contain toxic substances and are chemicals).

Others, however, maintain that the benefits in terms of preserving freshness, making food more appetizing and improving processing outweigh any small "potential" toxicity.

The FDA appears to have steered a reasonable course between these contending forces to the benefit of the American public.







Celery 'pasta' is low in calories

This "pasta" has never seen Italy. But it's low in calories, has no starch whatsoever and contains fiber and nutrients in addition to having its own beautiful green color. What is it? Celery.

When celery is thinly sliced lengthwise and cooked till tender for a few minutes in water or broth, it gives the effect of spaghetti or macaroni. And served with a meat or clam sauce it makes an intriguing, low-calorie main dish.

An Italian-style meat and tomato sauce seasoned with onion, garlic powder and Italian seasoning is delicious and looks pretty atop the bright green "pasta." And the calories? Only 265 per portion.

Celery "macaroni" with clam sauce is another tasty and slimming dish that weighs in at only 90 calories a portion. Canned minced clams are added to sauteed onion, garlic, oregano and white pepper and tossed gently with the "macaroni."

Or if you prefer your pasta simple, add a lot of butter or margarine and a sprinkling of Parmesan to the celery "noodles."

CELERY "SPAGHETTI" WITH MEAT SAUCE

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 1 can (28 oz.) whole tomatoes, broken up
- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1¼ tsp. Italian seasoning
- ¼ tsp. garlic powder
- 2 medium stalks celery
- 2 cups water
- 2 beef bouillon cubes



In a medium saucepan brown beef; drain off drippings. Add tomatoes, onion, salt, Italian seasoning and garlic powder. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, five minutes. Remove celery leaves from stalks. Trim and thinly slice each rib lengthwise. In a large sauce pot, bring water to a boil; add bouillon cubes and stir until dissolved. Add celery and simmer, covered, until tender, about 10 minutes; drain. To serve, place celery on a platter; top with meat sauce. Yield: six portions. About 265 calories per portion.

CELERY "MACARONI" WITH CLAM SAUCE

- 4 cups sliced celery
- 1 can (10½ oz.) minced clams
- 1 Tbsp. salad oil
- 2 Tbsp. finely chopped onion
- 1 garlic clove, crushed

- 2 Tbsp. water
- ¼ tsp. oregano leaves, crushed
- ¼ tsp. salt
- Dash ground white pepper

In boiling salted water, cook celery until tender, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile drain clams, reserving liquid; set aside. In a medium saucepan, heat oil until hot. Add onion and garlic; saute until tender, about 2 minutes. Add water, oregano, salt, pepper and reserved clam liquid. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 3 minutes. Add reserved clams and simmer, covered, for 1 minute. To serve, place drained celery in a bowl; top with clam sauce; toss gently. Yield: four portions. About 90 calories per portion.

Molasses rollups are perfect fo parties

Early Moravian settlers celebrated the winter season in very special ways, such as by making multipointed Moravian stars, beeswax candles and, of course, tasty goodies using one of their favorite staples, molasses.

Recipes such as these Molasses Lace Roll-Ups are nutritious, tasty and pretty enough for the fanciest of parties, yet easy enough for the busiest of cooks.

MOLASSES LACE ROLL-UPS


- Preheat oven to 300 degrees
- Grease cookie sheet
- ¾ cup butter or margarine
- ¾ cup sugar
- ½ cup molasses
- 2 tsp. ground ginger
- 1½ tsp. brandy
- 1½ cup sifted all-purpose flour

In a saucepan, combine butter, sugar, molasses and ginger. Heat until butter melts, stirring to blend. Remove from heat; gradually stir in brandy and flour. Drop a heaping teaspoonful of dough onto cookie sheet for each of four cookies, allowing for spreading, since the baked cookies measure 3 or more inches. Bake for 8-10 minutes or until done. Cookies are done when they stop spreading and bubbling and appear lacy in texture.

Remove from oven and let stand on cookie sheet for about two minutes. Remove carefully and roll each around the handle of a wooden spoon quickly as they become crisp rapidly. Cool on rack. Store in airtight container.

Makes about four dozen.

Note: If cookie becomes cool and hardens on cookie sheet, return to oven for a minute or two to soften.



Lamb stew makes good use of herbs

Countries have stews, regions have stews and certain cultures have their own lamb stews. Whether a stew is called "Hutspot" and is a tradition with the Dutch, or it is called "Goulash" and is a Hungarian national favorite, it reflects cooking ingenuity and imagination passed down through the centuries.

These hearty, nutritious concoctions have one thing in common no matter what corner of the globe — rarely does one stew taste exactly like another.

Stews offer each cook creative latitude that many other kinds of cooking do not. They are the perfect foil for herb lovers. The ratio of lamb to vegetables can be regulated as easily as the heat can be turned up and down on the stove. Spices are a nice, too.

A few cloves, coriander or a dash of cinnamon adds a secret zest because often they meld into the delightful melange of stew flavors and cannot be identified — just thoroughly enjoyed.

In Boston, a Sunday meal reflects a simple Yankee heritage, a simple lamb stew of potatoes and onions — probably with Irish or English beginnings.

While in the Cajun country of Louisiana, a hotter version is brought to the table teaming with vibrant spiciness and colorful with tomatoes and green pepper. In San Francisco a very lovely lamb ragout allows the


hungry diner a whiff of burgundy mixed with freshly cut rosemary.

OLD-FASHIONED HERBED LAMB STEW

- Six servings
- 2 Tbsp. butter or cooking oil
- 2 lbs. lean boneless lamb, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 2 cups water
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 cup. lemon juice
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 tsp. salt
- ¾ tsp. dried oregano leaves
- ¼ tsp. ground black pepper
- 1 cup peeled, diced potato
- 1 cup peas
- 1 cup sliced carrots
- 1 cup sliced zucchini or squash
- 2 Tbsp. fresh chopped or 1 Tbsp. dried parsley

In a Dutch oven or heavy saucepan, melt butter. Add lamb and brown well on all sides (about 15 minutes). Stir in flour and cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add water, tomato sauce, lemon juice, onion and garlic, salt, oregano and black pepper.

Cover and cook over low heat for 1 hour, or until meat is tender. Add vegetables and parsley. Cook 30 minutes longer, or until vegetables are tender.

Rare artifacts in Indian exhibit

The exhibit of Indian artifacts at the Plymouth Historical Museum gives visitors a rare opportunity to see items from several private collections.

Tribes represented in the special display are Chippewa, Sioux, Apache, as well as those from the Great Lakes and northwest areas.

The Eskimo collection includes a carved whalebone mask, a pair of muk-

luks and carvings, such as a very fine necklace of ivory with tiny sled dogs and polar bears.


There are many prehistoric objects — arrowhead-making tools, needles, copperwork from Upper Peninsula Indians, a harpoon used for fish spearing and fish hooks.

A SIOUX GHOST dance shirt dates from the late 1800s. A heavy breastplate made up of dozens of small cylindrical bones and a carved haidia rattle also is on display. There is an Apache bow faced with buffalo sinew for strength and resilience.

Weapons include war clubs, skull crushers and tomahawks. Tools and implements used by Indian women are in the exhibit along with a full ceremonial dress worn by Sioux medicine man, an Iroquois mask, and other items of dress.

A portion of the Schroeter collection, which has been donated to the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, is on loan to the museum. Among these relics are wood carvings, pottery, paintings, dolls and baskets.

The Indian exhibit will be at the museum, Main Street at Church, until Sunday, April 25. Hours are 1-4 p.m. Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. Admission is \$1 for adults, 50 cents for children

Qualified Michigan teen-agers may become ambassadors to France.

French style while becoming part of the host family," said Mrs. Prince. "At the same time, a student should be willing to put his best foot forward to give a favorable impression of America and Americans to the French."

Dates for the trip this summer are July 3-31. The exchange league also will be placing 125 French teen-agers in Michigan homes this July. Applications for the programs are being accepted.



Seedy characters spread good cheer in 'Cannery Row'

If "Cannery Row" (PG) is any indication of the quality of movies for 1982, this should be a good year. The film is a charmer. It has an infectious quality that wells up from vivid characterizations and boisterous humor.

The man most responsible for this achievement is David S. Ward, who directed the movie and wrote the screenplay. His script integrates two of John Steinbeck's novels, "Cannery Row" and "Sweet Thursday."

The merger is very successful. Steinbeck's "Cannery Row" is a loose series of sketches about the colorful characters on the Monterey, Calif., waterfront. Its sequel, "Sweet Thursday," is about the romance of Doc, a marine biologist, and Suzy, a hooker. By integrating the two novels, Ward was able to use the romance as a thematic center that helps shape and unify the film.

The time is the 1940s. Cannery Row, once the site of a thriving industry, has become a street of boarded-up stores and abandoned sardine factories, all of which closed down when the waters of Monterey Bay were fished out.

THE PEOPLE left are an odd assortment of derelicts, dreamers and nonconformists. Among them is Doc (Nick Nolte), who lives and works in his cluttered lab among his specimens. He also acts as the adviser and occasional employer of the bums who live in the drains and sluices along the row. In other words, he's a soft touch.

Across the street from him in an elaborate Victorian house is the Bear Flag, the local bordello, still an on-going business.

Into this decaying town strolls feisty Suzy DeSoto (Debra Winger). She has been working her way out to the West Coast since she was 10. When she can't find any other job, she goes to work at the Bear Flag for Fauna (Audra Lindley), a red-haired, tough-talking madam with the proverbial heart of gold.

Doc and Suzy immediately notice each other. Even though they can hardly exchange "hellos" without arguing, we know that beneath the bristling surface are two people in love.

The folks on Cannery Row know it, too, and are determined in their own misguided way to do something about it. This leads to a series of comic consequences, among them, the great frog hunt. It's an event "that will live forever in frog history," the narrator intones.

JOHN HUSTON voices the narration in a hammy, tongue-in-cheek style ideally suited to the colorful events and characters. This is one of the few instances where a narrator actually augments a movie, rather than detracts from it.

"Cannery Row," however, is full of surprises. Another one is a terrific comic sequence that develops out of an episode with Doc and Suzy jitterbugging, as Doc tries to prove to Suzy that he is no dull clod.

Nick Nolte shows a new aspect of his acting ability as Doc, a role which requires a talent for playing humorous situations without looking like a ninny.

Debra Winger, who was such a sensation in "Urban Cowboy," is equally effective here. Her Suzy is just the right mix of fiery spirit and vulnerability.

The movie is further enhanced by a swinging bluesy-jazz score and the breathtaking cinematography of Sven Nykvist.

Perhaps what is most appealing about "Cannery Row" is its optimistic outlook. A hard-luck town, a shabby street, a bunch of seedy characters, yet the tone is positive.

Is this just a case of Steinbeck romanticizing life, or does this tell us something about the change in our attitudes from the '40s to the '80s?

Salem reclaims Sub 8 cage crown

When the going got tough in the fourth quarter, it was Miller time. Plymouth Salem captured its eighth Suburban Eight League basketball title in 10 years Thursday with a hard-fought 45-42 overtime win over defending champion Dearborn.

Orchestrating the victory was 6-foot-3 senior guard Dave Miller, who led all scorers with 20 points, 14 of which came in a pressure-packed fourth quarter.

Salem, which won the title outright, is now 10-0 overall and 14-3 overall. The Rocks, who committed a total of 23 turnovers, overcame a six-point deficit in the final period as Miller accounted for all of Salem's scoring to send the game into overtime.

His long shot from the corner with 1:23 left in regulation time tied the score at 39-all. Each team missed opportunities to win it in the final 23 seconds.

In the overtime, center Norm Haygood scored inside on a pass from Greg Trim to give Salem a 43-41 lead with only 11 seconds left.

After the basket, Dearborn's Dave Mifsud drove the length of the floor and was fouled as he threw up an off-balance, 17-foot shot that rattled in-and-out.

Salem coach Fred Thomann called timeout after Mifsud made his first

free throw. The Dearborn guard then missed the second as Miller grabbed the loose ball.

HE WAS FOULED with four seconds showing on the clock and calmly went the line, sinking both shots to put it away.

"This group stepped out and had some games where they really had to dig," said Thomann, who has coached all eight championship teams. "We were down six (points) late in the game and got going."

"They were able to come back after losing the championship and win it. A lot of these people were a part of what happened last year."

In a gesture of sportsmanship, Dear-

born coach Gene Snell handed the league trophy over to Thomann after the game.

"Miller did a nice job," said Snell. "We tried to hold down McBride (Mike) and shut off their inside game. I thought we did a pretty good job of that. The kids did everything we asked them to do. It was a fine defensive game."

"The thing about this team is that so many can contribute," added Thomann. "Trim did a tremendous job handling their quickness at the point. Cohen (John), Bublin (Scott) and Houle (Dave) all gave us help off the bench."

THOMANN, however, singled out Miller as the man of the hour.


"It's been he or McBride that have made the big shots in the big games," he said. "Tonight was Dave's. He happened to be the man open and our guys got him the ball."

Salem's overwhelming size and inside strength gave Dearborn fits in the first half. The Rocks led 8-4 after one quarter and 20-15 at halftime.

Dearborn turned things around in the third quarter as guard Mark Wolter, the smallest man on the floor, ignited the Pioneers with two quick steals, converting them into layups.

Wolter's third straight basket lifted Dearborn to a 21-20 advantage with 5:22 to play in the third quarter.



ally with the Caesars, who won two American Professional Slo-pitch League crowns.



The Wallpaper ball hangup

Mike Yellen, a Southfield native, is a member of the Ektelon-sponsored professional racquetball team. He is currently among the top-ranked players on the pro tour. His column on racquetball will appear periodically in the Observer & Eccentric sports pages.

The wallpaper ball — it's one of the most racquet-twisting, knuckle-scraping experiences in racquetball. When your opponent is on the receiving end, it's great. But when you are, it's pure frustration.

A wallpaper ball can be simply defined as a shot that travels very close to the side wall on the way to the back wall. There is nothing simple about this shot, however, regardless of which side of it you're on.

The wallpaper ball can travel toward the back wall at any height. Usually it comes off the front wall at a perfectly acceptable height and pace that, if placed a couple of inches closer to center court, would make it a plum. But a player has only about a one-in-five chance of making a decent return of a wallpaper ball.

IT MAY BE slow or it may be high, but the ball is so close to the side wall that it allows no room for error in a player's swing.

Often, a player faced with a wallpaper shot will try to hit it too hard, hoping to overcome the ball's contrariness by blasting it off the wall. Even if he hits the ball (which seldom happens), the player can't hope to control his shot under such difficult circumstances. The result is an easy return for his opponent.

Another aggravating characteristic of the wallpaper shot is its unpredictability. The ball may hug the wall all the way into the backcourt, then, just as you are about to hit it, knick the wall slightly and jump out.

This kind of behavior can send you up the wall, but you can improve your chances of a decent return if you keep your cool.

YOU DON'T HAVE to change shots for a wallpaper return, just attitude. When you see the ball sliding back along the wall, it should be a signal to switch into low gear.

Make up your mind that you are going to hit a ceiling ball, because any attempt at an offensive return will probably get you into trouble.

Also realize that you will not have a full swing because the wall is going to

be in the way. Position yourself far away enough from the wall so that if the ball does jump out you will be able to handle it.

Think of your racquet as a big spatula and try to scoop the ball off the wall and up to the ceiling instead of trying to hit it. Quadriform- or modified-quadriform-shaped racquets work best on this particular shot because their heads are flatter and, therefore, slide better along the side wall.

More important than the shape of the racquet is the emphasis on control in your stroke.

ALTHOUGH THE WALLPAPER ball is easy to describe, it is difficult to execute. It may be the hardest shot to make in racquetball, so you'll have to put in extra practice time.

That's the bad news about the wallpaper shot. The good news is that it can put your opponent in a very difficult position.

You can't hit wallpaper shots with the frequency of your other shots, but you can improve your chances for this point-winner with proper attention to your down-the-line drives.

You don't have to be right against the side wall to have your shot rebound close to it, although closer is better. Even a crosscourt pass can come off the front wall as wallpaper. It's a question of how it goes into the front wall.

Unfortunately, I can't tell you how to hit the ball so that it comes off the front wall as wallpaper every time. The angles will change, depending where you are on the court. The only way to become acquainted with them is through practice and play.

INCORPORATING MORE down-the-line drives into your game strategy will increase your chances of hitting a wallpaper ball, and a familiarity with this shot can't hurt your game, especially in service returns.

Just concentrate on putting the ball as low and close to the side wall as possible. If it comes off as a low pass, fine. If it comes off as wallpaper, so much the better.

Alternate your down-the-line drives with crosscourt drives just to keep your opponent off-balance. These shots will work either backhand or forehand and should be executed with the normal backhand or forehand stroke.

As with any passing shot, you want to be careful that you don't put so much angle on the ball that it comes off the side wall into center court, giving your opponent an easy return.

Jump start dead battery — but watch out for ice

The correct way to jump start a car is: Be certain the dead battery is not frozen. If you can, remove the vent plugs and see if the fluid is frozen.

Stop if there is any sign of ice crystals. Do not use the jumper cables.

You have to make an educated guess on maintenance-free batteries that don't have vent plugs. If there is the slightest possibility of frozen battery fluid, don't use jumper cables.

Instead, remove the battery and put in a warm place until it thaws.

A FROZEN battery may explode when jumper cables are connected. A battery charger also could cause a frozen battery to explode.

If you are certain the battery is not frozen, use the following procedure for a car with a negative-ground, 12-volt electrical system.


Shield your eyes and face from the batteries and wear eye protection. Then set the parking brakes and turn off all electrical accessories and ignition switches.

Place the gear shift selectors on both cars in park (neutral on manual transmission).

Be sure the cars do not touch each other, as this could establish a common ground connection and act as a conductor similar to one of the jumper cables.

MAKE SURE the vent caps are tight and level on both batteries. Place damp cloths over the vent caps of both batteries. Be sure all cloths are clear of fan blades, belts and other moving parts.

Do not allow the cable ends to touch each other.



Slippery Olds

Connect one cable at a time.

Attach one end of the first jumper cable to the terminal of the discharged battery that is wired to starter or solenoid.

The positive terminal usually is marked with a plus (+) or the letters (POS) are on the terminal, or on the battery near the terminal. If your jumper cables are red and black, use the red cable for the positive connections and the black for the negative.

Connect one end of the red cable to the positive post of the discharged battery. Connect the other of the same cable to the same marked terminal (POS) of the booster battery.

CONNECT ONE end of the other (black) cable to the negative terminal of the booster battery. Make the final connection on the engine block or frame of the stalled car away from the battery.

See that all cables are clear of fan blades, belts and other moving parts of both engines. Be sure everyone is standing away from the cars.

Then start the engine of the car with the booster battery.

Wait a few minutes before starting the engine of the car with the discharged battery. Then rev the engine of the car with the good battery.

If the engine of the stalled car does not start after cranking for 30 seconds, stop. More than 30 seconds seldom starts the engine unless some mechanical adjustment is needed.

After starting, allow the engine to return to idle speed. Then, in reverse order, remove the battery cables. Throw away the damp cloths that were over the vent caps.
