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Hoben OKs decision on fantasy game

The superintendent's decision to allow Dungeons and Dragons (D&D) to be played in West Middle School is expected to be appealed to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

"By the end of this week, we will return our appeal to the full board," says the Rev. Gregory Gentry, who filed the original D&D complaint.

Superintendent John Hoben's ruling follows an appeal of a review committee's decision to allow D&D.

D&D is an unending role-playing game in which players become imaginary characters and are led on adventures, which include battles, by a referee (called a "dungeon master"). The framework for the characters and make-believe voyages are set up in several D&D handbooks.

The game is part of a West Middle School elective course called "Games, Games, Games."

Gentry, pastor of Canton Calvary Assembly of God, claims D&D has negative spiritual effects on the student players. He filed a formal complaint with the schools on Feb. 16.

A committee was established to look into Gentry's complaint. The five-member committee decided there was no evidence the game promotes or advances any form of religion or religious belief.

HOBEN UPHeld the committee's decision, telling Gentry:

"It appears to me that the accusation that the game is spiritual in nature is a judgmental factor that seems to differ between those that have exposure to the activity and your concern at the other end of the continuum."

Hoben's investigation of the game included talking to Gentry, West principal Robert Smith and student players. He also reviewed materials accumulated by the review committee and talked with committee chairman Richard Egli.

"In light of the investigation and materials presented, the superintendent feels that the evidence does not support the issue that it is of a cult or spiritual nature," he said in the decision.

"The mitigating thing with me was the parental permission," Hoben said Tuesday. Students in the elective course must have signed permission slips.

Gentry said Hoben wasn't working with the standards he should have been in making such a decision.

In the appeal to the board, Gentry hopes to incorporate the consensus of area clergy men.

"The spiritual leaders of the community need to let their opinion be known," he said.

The board will have 30 days in which to render a decision on the D&D appeal.

"I've been talking with some clergy about taking it beyond the school board. However, I'm not certain about that at this point," Gentry said.

Parents angered in Tanger appeal

A group of parents are angry with the way school administrators handled the discipline of a principal who slapped a fifth-grade student three weeks ago.

Tanger Elementary School Principal Carol Nichols received verbal and written reprimands after slapping Swane Taddonio on March 11. Parents want the principal dismissed and may file suit against Plymouth-Canton Community Schools to accomplish that goal.

Maggie and Richard Taddonio, Swane's parents, met with school officials for more than one hour Monday — before a scheduled workshop — to try to resolve the problem.

The issue was not settled, according to Maggie Taddonio.

"It was really just a waste," she said about the meeting. "Basically, they told us this was an isolated incident. They felt that (the reprimands) was

Library information on cable causes confusion

Cable television viewers beware — Omni-29, the library channel, contains information about ALL three libraries served by Omnicom of Michigan.

Area librarians are upset with Omnicom, the company which has the cable franchise in Plymouth-Canton-Northville, because they do not want to share a channel. They say it has caused confusion with residents in each respective community.

Omnicom officials said they want to service the libraries the best way possible.

Originally, Channel 29 was supposed to be the library and public access station, although librarians say Omnicom gave verbal commitments three years ago that each library in Plymouth, Canton and Northville would have its own separate station.

"I don't know about any verbal commitment," said Peter Newell, president of Omnicom, "but we'll do it any way they want us to do it."

After meetings with Omnicom, public access was switched to Omni-8, Omnicom's channel for local programming. Librarians still are angry, however, because they share Channel 29, causing a lot of confusion.

"We're still worried about confusion — people calling us for someone else's program," said Deborah O'Connor, Canton's head librarian.

A lack of communication exists between Omnicom and the libraries, said Pat Thomas, head librarian at Dunning-Hough in Plymouth.

"We tried to impress upon him (Newell) that this was very confusing for people in our community," Thomas said about the combined station. "They (Omnicom) assumed some decisions

without asking us what we actually wanted.

"I was very disturbed with the lack of communication."

THE LIBRARIES have two different options, according to Newell. Channel 29 may be split so Plymouth residents see Plymouth library news and Canton residents see Canton library news, etc., but Omnicom only offers a limited-space character generator (for messages) for a split channel, Newell said.

The libraries decided, therefore, to share the channel on an experimental basis only — because Omnicom does offer a character generator large enough to get messages on the one channel.

Canton messages are coded in green, Plymouth in blue, and Northville in red.

Omnicom does not have to offer any equipment to the libraries, according to its contract.

"It's really choice," Newell said. "And we're trying to do it any way they want to. They didn't seem upset at the meeting. They seemed willing to test it."

O'CONNOR BELIEVES each library has its own clientele and doesn't think this arrangement is good in the long run.

"This is an experiment to see if it works out," O'Connor said. "We'll run this way until May 1. Still, down the road, we would all like our own station."

Thomas also thinks it will cause confusion, but is willing to try it out.

"If there is confusion, then we are going to have to do something different, because the summer programs are so important," Thomas said.

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Rico tries to sniff out bank robbers

The Federal Bureau of Investigation continues to look into a robbery of a credit union in Westland in which two armed men escaped with more than \$7,000 in cash.

"There are no arrests, no suspects," said Mark Codd, a spokesman for the FBI. "We have some concrete leads that have to be followed out."

Codd said the FBI is checking into the possibility that the two men who robbed the credit union locally were also involved in a bank robbery in Madison Heights. The FBI routinely investigates robberies of banks and credit unions which are federally chartered.

The suspects, two black males, were wearing ski masks. They burst through the main entrance of the Wayne County Employees Credit Union on Michigan

Avenue at 10:15 a.m. Monday and announced a holdup.

None of the witnesses could provide police with a complete description of the pair.

One bandit, described as being six feet tall and weighing about 180 pounds, was holding a revolver. The other, 5-10 to six feet, 160-180 pounds, carried a sawed-off shotgun.

While one man jumped over a teller's counter and held two tellers and two customers at bay, his accomplice reportedly walked through the lobby and checked into a rest room, apparently looking for other witnesses.

EACH THEN emptied cash from a teller's drawer.

Before fleeing, a shot was fired, which the FBI suspects was an accidental discharge.

"We figure they were scared out of their wits, also," Codd said.

One of the witnesses observed the pair flee in a black Ford Bronco.

Officer Russell Nowaczek of the Westland police heard about the robbery on his radio and started patrolling the area looking for the get-away vehicle.

He found it about 15 minutes later parked at a location on Carlyle Street in Inkster.

Nowaczek reported finding two ski masks, a glove and a black coat in the vehicle. The engine was still warm.

Nowaczek later found another pair

of work gloves when scouring the area.

A computer check revealed that the vehicle had been reported stolen to the Flat Rock Post of the Michigan State Police. The license plate on the Bronco was reported stolen to Dearborn Heights Police.

Officer Ernie Sayre of the Canton police and his tracking dog, Rico, were called to the scene of the van. But the dog was unable to pick up a scent.

The FBI checked the vehicle for fingerprints. Inkster police also assisted in the initial investigation.

Westland police report that neither of the two tellers working in the credit union at the time of the robbery had turned on the security cameras before opening for business.

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Faust, Brown differ on state tax proposals

Local officials are dubious about the outcome of the governor's recent plea for an income-tax increase combined with further budget cuts to offset a state deficit estimated at more than \$550 million.

Gov. Milliken had hoped that a 0.7-percent hike in the income tax would become effective April 1, but state Senator William Faust, D-Westland, said recently "that the dust hasn't settled" yet from the legislative reaction following the governor's televised talk.

Faust, whose district includes Canton, said that legislators would take a holiday recess April 8-19 to discuss the governor's proposals.

The governor also had proposed cuts of \$58 million in state revenue-sharing funds to cities and of \$35 million in state aid to school districts.

Wayne-Westland school officials are taking a wait-and-see attitude toward the plan.

FAUST, WHO is also Senate majority leader, said his personal position is that "something is needed."

The senator said the state is paying \$85 million a year on the debt's interest. Faust hopes the state can find a way to "take a short-term debt and pay it off over a long term."

The borrowing is necessary to meet the state's cash-flow requirements, he said.

"The mood in the Senate is that the budget can't be cut any more, particularly in public schools," he said.

Support for K-12 schools has gone from 30 percent to 12 percent of the state budget and is projected to reach zero in two years, Faust said.

Discussing welfare benefits, he said persons on general assistance receive only \$90 a month.

College money woes

Schoolcraft tuition may rise

Schoolcraft College trustees may increase student tuition and call for a small property tax increase unless the Michigan Legislature restores a \$1.3 million cut in state aid ordered by Gov. Milliken.

Final action awaits a board of trustees hearing sometime in June. The board last week gave 7-0 approval to a revenue projection required by state law.

Tuition for residents of the college district could rise from \$22 to \$25 per credit hour, according to comptroller A.H. Raby. In addition, the board would be asked to nullify a property tax rate rollback required under the state constitution's 1978 tax limitation amendment.

Under this plan, the 1981-82 college property tax rate for operations and for debt service — totaling 1.894 mills — would be raised to 1.96 mills. The resultant increase would be a new tax of 6.6 cents per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation.

ON MARCH 10, Gov. Milliken announced that the state faced a budget deficit of more than \$500 million for the current year. He ordered withholding one-quarter of the state's annual appropriations to two- and four-year colleges.

In Schoolcraft's case, the lost revenue will amount to \$1.3 million, Raby said.

To continue services at their present level will require \$15.4 million in revenue, he said. But with the state-aid cut, revenues will total only \$14.7 million. The "shortfall" more than \$700,000.

A tuition increase of \$3 per credit hour would narrow the gap by \$450,000, he estimated. Growth of the property tax base and the 6.6 cents per \$1,000 of SEV rate increase would largely close the gap.

ACTUALLY, the board would be levying only the full 1.77 mills authorized by voters over the years, Raby said. "This legislation requires the use of terms such as 'increasing property taxes' and 'proposed additional millage rate.' These terms are all misleading. New new millage is being levied," he said in a memo to the board.

"In essence, all that is accomplished is a recovery of prior levied millage because of a legislated reduction."

The projected budget of \$15.7 million (including debt services) would come from these revenue sources: property taxes, \$6.9 million or 44 percent; tuition and fees, \$4.4 million or 28 percent; state aid, \$3.8 million or 24 percent; and other sources, less than \$1 million or 4 percent.

In his original budget-cut message, Milliken talked of restoring the one-quarter state-aid cut Oct 1, the beginning of the next fiscal year. If this is done, the tuition hike could be avoided, Raby said.

IN OTHER business, the board of trustees last week:

• Scheduled a "planning workshop" for the board for the evening of April 16 and most of April 17 in the Holiday Inn and Holiday Livonia West, Six Mile at I-275. The

sessions are open to the public under the state's Open Meetings Act.

• Granted a one-semester sabbatical leave to physics instructor Bryce Lockwood to allow him time to write a laboratory manual for general physics classes. The leave is conditional on the college's ability to find part-time instructors to replace him.

• Granted a one-semester sabbatical leave to biology instructor Carolyn Steffen to complete research for her doctoral dissertation. She is working toward a doctorate in biology from Wayne State University. Both faculty members' leaves would be for the winter semester of 1983.

• Accepted a gift of \$1,300 worth of safety analyzer equipment to be used in the biomedical equipment technology program. Donor is faculty member Delavan Sipes.

• Accepted gifts of four condensing units (worth an estimated \$400) from Bill Knapp's of Michigan, Inc., for use in the climate systems technology program; 3,000 pounds of scrap steel (estimated at \$300) from Industrial Metal Fabricators Co. of Detroit for use in the welding department; and \$200 cash from Central Distributors of Beer, Inc., of Taylor, to be used by the athletic department.

• Approved change orders increasing the Culinary Arts Addition project by a net of \$1,029. Total cost now stands at \$1,359,512. General contractor is Cronk & Tocco, Inc. of Oak Park. The addition is being put up on the north side of the Waterman Campus Center and will enable the college to double its culinary arts enrollment.

3 officially in school board race

Three residents have returned nominating petitions and now are official candidates for the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

The latest to return nominating petitions and be certified a candidate is Rodney J. Hosman of 46184 Barrington, Plymouth. Hosman is a school administrator in a nearby school district.

Others who are certified candidates are Ernest Rumsby of 44551 Savery, Canton, and Janis S. Draper of 46744 Maidstone, Canton.

The latest to take out nominating petitions is Elaine Kirchgatter of 48377 Gide, Canton, the current vice president of the

board. She is seeking re-election to a second four-year term.

Also circulating petitions is Dr. E.J. McClendon of 40742 Crabtree, Plymouth. McClendon, a professor of public health at the University of Michigan, is a former school trustee who served as school board president. He has voted in 100 percent of the 26 school elections held since he registered to vote in May 1966.

Other residents who have taken out nominating petitions include:

sufficient and didn't think it would happen again." Mrs. Taddonio said she does not trust any school administration investigation into Nichols' behavior.

THE TADDONIOS, along with a group of Tanger, planned to speak about the issue at the citizen's forum section of the board workshop, following the original meeting with school officials.

Confusion arose, however, because the parents thought the citizens' forum came before the meeting. Citizens' forum does not occur, however, until after workshops. The forum does come

before a regularly scheduled Board of Education meetings.

The Taddonios, therefore, did not stay to address the board. Some Tanger parents, however, say they plan to speak to the board on the issue in the future.

"WE DON'T KNOW if we want to sue or not," Mrs. Taddonio added. "I'm definitely not satisfied with the way it was handled. We feel the administration is sweeping this matter under the rug."

"We believe there should be an outside investigation into Mr. Nichols' behavior."

The discipline handed to Nichols was appropriate, Hoben said.

"They (the Tanger parents) want him

fired on the spot," Hoben said. "I don't think the issue warranted it. I don't support the action and what he did. We cannot condone this type of behavior."

The incident occurred during a soccer game after Swane collided with another student, Mrs. Taddonio said.

"Swane ran into another child and got up saying, 'The next time a kid comes in front of me, I'm really going to plow him,'" she said.

Nichols then told Swane to get up against the wall. When Swane asked why, Nichols grabbed him with one hand and hit him across the face — from behind — with the other hand, she said.

Hoben's subsequent investigation resulted in both reprimands.

"Mental health and social services are depleted," the senator said in citing past budget cuts in those areas. "We can't cut any more."

Faust said Michigan is affected more than other states by the economic recession.

Michigan receives in federal funds only 50 cents for every \$1 it sends to Washington, compared to New Mexico, which gets \$1.32 for every \$1 sent to the federal government, he said.

But if there is any support for raising the state income-tax rate, there must be backing from Republicans in the governor's party, he said.

TOTALLY OPPOSED to any tax increase is state Rep. Thomas Brown, D-Westland. Brown, whose district in-

cludes Canton, is continuing his call for a tax cut. In fact, Brown has three bills under consideration in the state Legislature that would do just that.

Brown recently introduced House Bills 5486 and 5487 which would grant credits on residents' personal-income-

tax or single-business-tax bills. Brown said the bills are based on proposals by a group called Taxpayers United. He said the group failed to gain the necessary signatures on petitions to place the proposals onto November's ballot.

The bills would grant a 15-percent credit against all 1982 property taxes and a 25-percent credit against all 1983 property taxes. Any credit that exceeds the income-tax bill may be carried over for three years, according to the proposal.

Brown added that businesses may be able to completely wipe out any small-business tax by applying a property-tax credit to it.

The legislator admits the proposals

will be very expensive to the state but adds they're one way to "address the majority who are very definitely opposed to property taxes."

INSTEAD OF those proposals, Brown said he favors HB 5070, which would reduce the state equalized valuation (SEV) of all classes of property in the state.

The SEV represents one-half the market value of property. It is that amount on which millage rates are levied.

Brown says that SEV-reduction proposal would cost the state about \$500 million over three years.

While property now is assessed at 50 percent of the SEV, that figure would be lowered to 44 percent this year, 39 percent in 1983 and 35 percent in 1984.

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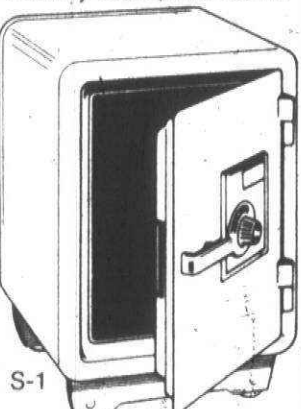
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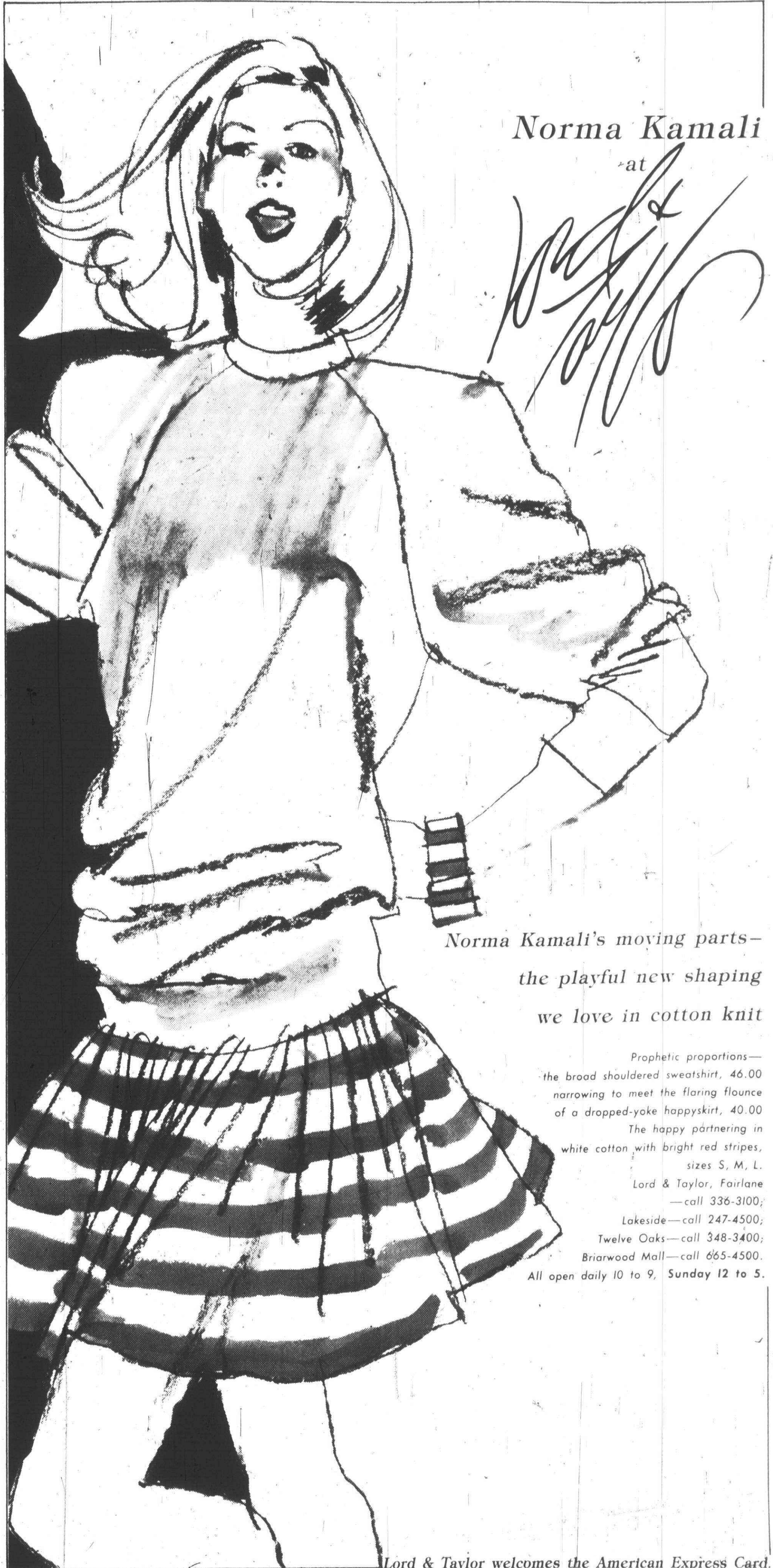
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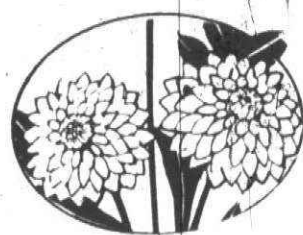

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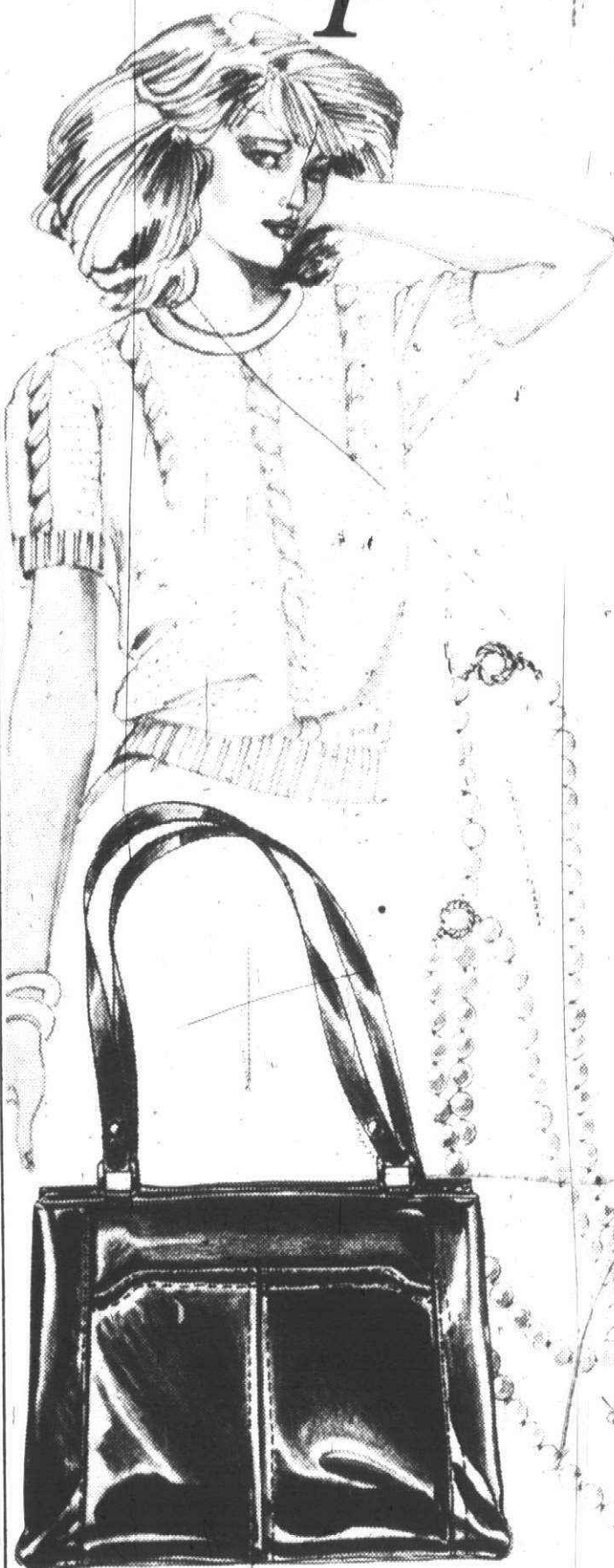


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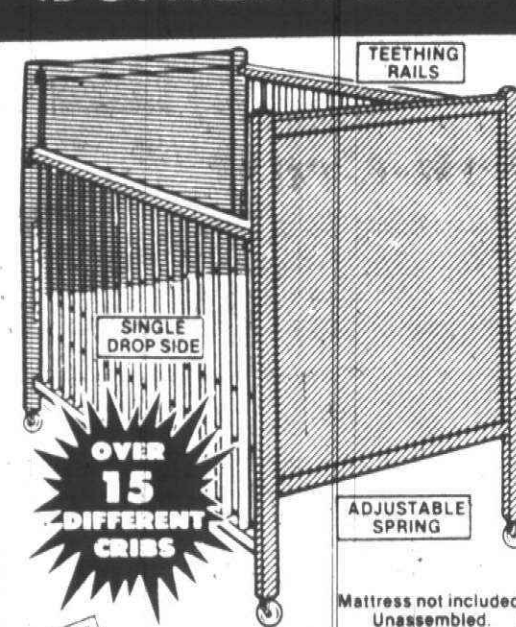
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Rep. Roy Smith unveils tax shift to aid school districts

The Michigan Education Association has been over it and likes it. The Farm Bureau has written some of the language and likes it. The Michigan Township Association, (MTA) will actively push it. And this time state Rep. Roy Smith, R-Saline, thinks he finally has a winner — a ballot proposal to cut school operating property taxes that can't be evaded by the Legislature and can win at the polls.

"If legislators are boxed in, they'll perform," Smith said last week as he unveiled the proposal to the Michigan

Municipal League. "I have them so boxed in they'll have to perform." He added: "We would make education the state's No. 1 priority."

SMITH BOASTS the support of 30 cosponsors of his House Resolution S but admits aloud, "It probably won't go anywhere in the Legislature."

So with the help of Rep. Claude Trim, D-Davisburg, and the 6,500 officials from 1,225 townships, he is seeking some 450,000 petition signatures to put his lengthy constitutional amendment on the state ballot.

Main provisions:

- The first 75 percent of school property taxes would be removed from

homesteads and resident farms. Limits: \$1,800 for houses, \$2,500 for farms.

- Persons age 62 and older would pay zero school operating taxes on homesteads.
- Farms would have to be assessed for farm use, even if in the path of a development. "The Farm Bureau attorneys wrote the language," Smith said.
- The state would have to reimburse each school district 100 percent for lost property taxes. Legislators could not take the money from other public education — universities, four-year colleges and community colleges. Total cost: \$1.5 billion.
- The sales tax would be raised to 5 percent from 4 percent, and "circuit

breaker" rebates would be eliminated. Total revenue and savings: about \$1 billion.

- The remaining \$520 million would have to be raised by the Legislature, either by cutting other non-school state spending or by increasing the personal income tax as much as 0.8 percent. (Currently, the income tax rate is 4.6 percent; the Legislature is considering Gov. Milliken's proposal to raise it by 0.4 percent.)
- Election of local school boards, now provided by state law, would be guaranteed in the constitution. Local control of schools would also be constitutionally guaranteed.

"I KNOW of no organization which opposes it," Smith said.

Renters and businesses would be unaffected by the proposals he said, although renters would still be eligible to declare a portion of their rents as a state income tax deduction.

Some of the nearly 800 municipal league members — officials of cities and townships — voiced disapproval. Said one: "The schools want the best of two worlds. Cities, villages and counties are going through strains. The schools are losing population and need to be more efficient. If we give them a 'hold harmless' (guaranteed 100-percent reimbursement from the state for lost property taxes), we're not doing them any favor."

Robert Robinson, MTA executive director, said in a separate announcement, "Never before have the state coffers or the school funding system been in this kind of shape. Though we would have preferred to support a cut rather than a shift, we realize that this

state is in deep trouble and can't afford it right now.

"We feel it's time to base school funding more on ability to pay."

PROPERTY TAXES have been almost a 27-year concern of Smith, whose 52nd House District spreads across rural Washtenaw County and into Plymouth Township.

He was co-author of the Smith-Bulard proposal, a 1980 ballot plan that would have shifted school funding to the state income tax. Though supported actively by the MEA, the proposal received only about 20-percent support at the polls.

Smith is also known as author of PA 114, which requires equalization of local property assessments by class of property. The law was aimed at such industrial communities as Dearborn and Redford Township, where it caused major increases in residential assessments. Smith argued residential assessments were far too low.

He started his political career on the board of review of Ypsilanti Township

in 1955 and later became township supervisor. In 1966 he was elected to the first of nine terms in the House. After a 1970 defeat, he was briefly city administrator of Saline until he won re-election in 1974. The 58-year-old lawmaker has announced he will not seek re-election.

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Heartworm cases increase; dogs can take 'liver pill'

There's good news and bad news for dog owners in the Plymouth-Canton community.

The bad news is that veterinarians have noted a 30 to 40 percent increase in heartworm in dogs tested late last year into the spring season (compared to figures of two years ago).

The good news is development of a preventive medication which the makers claim dogs love — a chewable, liver-flavored tablet which is a delicacy to the more than 90 percent of the dogs who have sampled it.

Dogs in western metropolitan area show larger incidence of heartworm than on the east side, according to Dr. Mary Beth Leininger, DVM, of Plymouth.

She attributes this to the waters of the Rouge flood plains which are a hatching place for mosquitoes.

"It's a rule of thumb that any dog which spends more than one hour a day outdoors is in great risk," she says.

"Because owners tend to leave long-haired dogs outdoors more than the short-haired breeds, more long-haired dogs develop heartworm."

Local veterinarians discover about 200 cases of heartworm in Plymouth-Canton dogs each year.

"A wet summer increases the danger," said Leininger who added that preventive medication should start May 1 and be continued on a daily basis until Dec. 1.

Immature heartworms travel through the bloodstream to the heart where they grow into adult heartworms up to 12 inches in length.

Early symptoms of the disease are decreased stamina and tolerance for exercise, shortness of breath, and coughing.

It takes up to six months from the time a dog is bitten by an infected mosquito until a veterinarian can detect the disease with a blood test.

Spring is the ideal testing time for Michigan dogs, says Leininger who added that the test can be performed in the veterinarian's office with just a small blood sample from the pet.

If the test is negative (no heartworms present), preventive medication may be used during the mosquito season.

Dog owners having preventive medication left over from last year should not use it until the dog has a negative blood test this year, she adds, as infected dogs may have a fatal shock reaction if they ingest the medication.

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3rd Pit Stop shop opens here

The Pit Stop Quick Oil Change shop has opened for business at 903 Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth.

The Pit Stop, a new concept in car care, is owned by Jane and Derrick Oxender. The Plymouth shop is the third Pit Stop opened by the Oxenders in the past 18 months.

The first shop opened in Ann Arbor in September 1980, and the second opened in Brighton in July.

The new Ann Arbor Road location is the former Plymouth Auto Wash and still offers two coin-operated car washes as well as two bays for the oil changes.

The Pit Stop is geared to fill the gap created by the increase in self-service gasoline stations by offering a 10-minute oil change, lube, and the checking and filling of all fluids.

"You very rarely hear 'May I change your oil?' anymore," Oxender said. "This quick oil change idea began in California, where a lot of new ideas start."

"In as little as 10 minutes the customer can pull in," he added, "stay in their car, and get their oil changed, oil filter changed, all fluid levels checked and filled if needed (transmission, brake, power steering, brake, differential fluid, and washer solvent), and get the tires checked."

"These fluids often are neglected, and some never are checked."

Each "pit" in the shop is a seven-foot deep hole the motorist drives over. Technicians work in the pit and on top so work on the top and bottom of the vehicle is done at the same time to get the job done faster. Hoists are not used.

The pit is stocked with filters, tools, grease and a drain. The old oil is stored and then sold to refineries. The new oil is in bulk, which is a lot faster method than opening cans of oil.

"With people concerned about keeping older cars on the road and their new ones in top condition, the Pit Stop has proved to be a great idea," Oxender said.

"A lot of people can't afford to be without their car most of the day while it's at the station or the dealership for an oil change," he said. "But they can come in to our shop on their lunch hour and eat in their car, or stop in before or after work."

The Pit Stop is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday. An appointment is not needed.

PRESENTS PAPER

Dr. Donald W. Weaver, M.D., of Plymouth and David Bouwman, M.D., of East Detroit recently presented a paper on their findings concerning pancreatitis at the Central Surgical Association meeting in Chicago.

"Our research paper developed out of a screening procedure of patients seen in the ambulatory reception center at the Harper Hospital Division," said Weaver, a surgeon from Harper-Grace Hospital. "We noted that many patients thought to have acute pancreatitis had elevation of an enzyme (protein) known as amylase."

"To evaluate this, we began to study the isoenzyme pattern of patients admitted with a diagnosis of pancreatitis. These were patients who had entered the hospital complaining of upper abdominal pain, nausea and vomiting and this elevation of amylase."

Weaver and Bouwman found that a number of patients admitted for acute pancreatitis were found not to have it when the source of the amylase in their blood was checked.

"Most people think amylase is made primarily by the pancreas," said Bouwman, "but a number of patients presented with symptoms very much like pancreatitis had their amylase from nonpancreatic sources (lungs, fallopian tubes, prostate, salivary glands, and the breast)."

The physicians believe a clearer understanding of the significance of an elevated amylase in the blood will prevent patients from needless hospitalization and expensive testing to exclude significant pancreatic disease when in fact the amylase source was not the pancreas.

The Plymouth Hilton Inn has been awarded the Four-Diamond rating for 1981 by the Automobile Club of Michigan.

According to AAA, a Four-Diamond rating is awarded only to those motels and hotels which "significantly exceed" Motor Club requirements in most physical and operational requirements.

Nationally, only 8 percent of all accommodations rated by AAA received this rating for 1982.

Builders ready for turnaround

Getting the construction industry off the ground during 1982 isn't going to be easy, area builders contend, but they're using the power of positive thinking to help their cause.

"We've had two years of extreme recession in Michigan's building business and we're responding to that by thinking positively and talking up Michigan," said Robert E. Johnson, new president of the Builders Exchange of Detroit and Michigan.

Johnson, of Bloomfield Hills, is president of the firm of Etkin, Johnson & Korb, Inc., Oak Park. He spoke confidently Tuesday about how the industry will pull out of the worst slump since the Depression.

ABOUT 1,000 trades workers, builders and suppliers gathered in the Westin Hotel to hear about the new "Build up, Michigan" campaign.

Sporting a lapel button with the slogan, Johnson explained the group's five-point program to help the industry build up:

• In Michigan there is a huge amount of industrial expertise which has to be promoted.

• The metropolitan Detroit area and the state should be built up as good places to stay. Businesses existing in Michigan will be encouraged to remain and tough it out until the economy turns around.

• 1982 is a good time for owners and users to build or expand in Michigan because there are good construction values right now and contractors need the work.

• Public officials ought to reform the state's single business tax and tighten Michigan's unemployment insurance system.

• Exchange members need to utilize all services provided by the association, including the teaching of more cost-efficient methods of performing construction services.

"We're taking an aggressive stance because we believe in Michigan," Johnson said.

PRESENTLY, the "Build up" campaign is limited to word-of-mouth,

bumper sticker and pin advertising. But Johnson said once the new budget is approved next month, it may expand to radio, television and print advertisements.

Critics of the "positive approach" said it sounded as if the builders were merely talking their way out of the recession, just like the auto workers.

"If we take the position that things will never get better, then they won't," Johnson retorted. "But we're ready for the turnaround. We have 2,500 members who are anxious."

Adding to the industry's woes are labor negotiations this spring with hundreds of skilled trades workers. Johnson said that while builders would like to see tradesmen accept wage rate reductions, the subject of labor negotiations is out of the Exchange's control.

Nearing the end of his positive approach talk, Johnson conceded that the true hope for an upsurge in building is lower interest rates.

"We've got to see lower interest rates, and when the magical date for the economic upturn occurs, it will take us six months to catch up," he added.

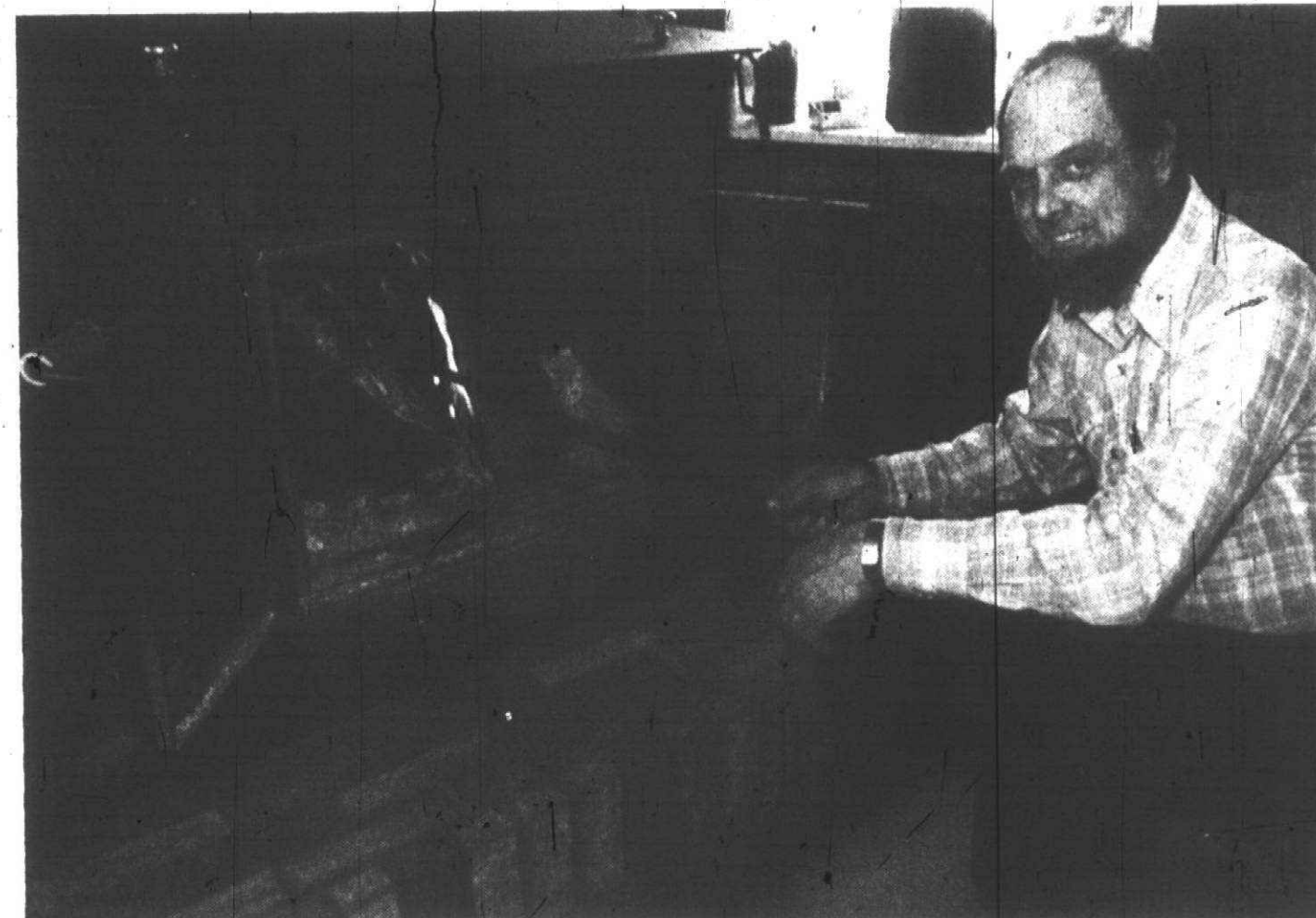

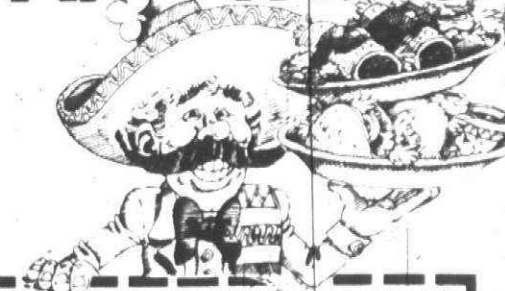

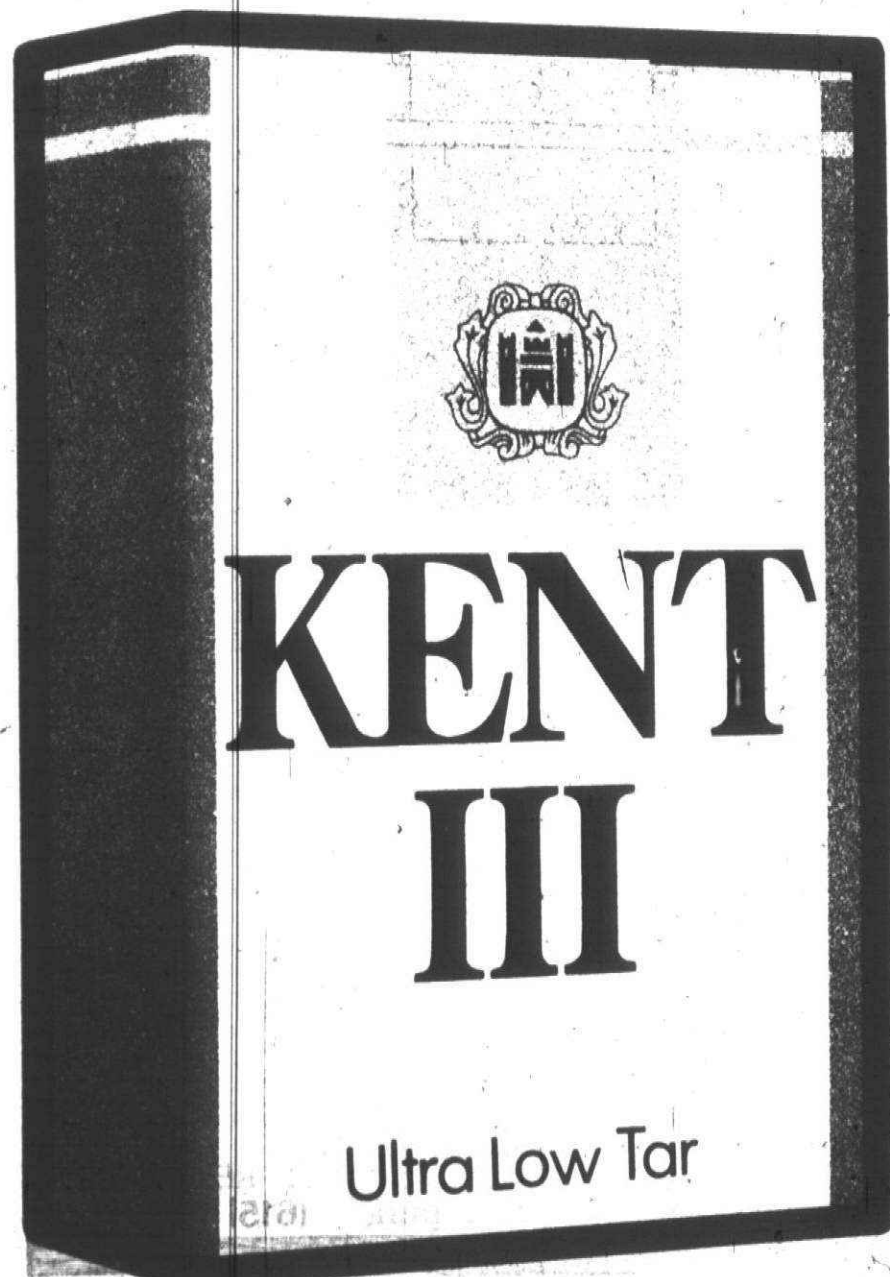

Mt. Everest, anyone? Here's your chance

Travelers start getting restless at the first sign of spring. The snow melts, and we immediately begin to think about climbing unclimbable mountains, rafting wild and scenic rivers and flying away to exotic places.

Brochures from Mountain Travel are just what we need to launch us into adventure travel. They have announced the first Mountain Medicine Trek for May 18 to June 10. It will be led by Dr. Richard Wohms, a Yale medical school graduate and currently a resident in neurosurgery at the University of Washington.

The trek is for people interested in wilderness medicine and high-altitude physiology. The group will fly from Kathmandu, the capital of Nepal, to a 9,000-foot-high mountain airstrip and then trek for 18 days to the Everest Base Camp.

On the way, they will visit Sherpa villages, Buddhist monasteries and a small field hospital established by Sir Edmund Hillary.

The second Mountain Medicine Trek will be led Oct. 10 to Nov. 6 by Peter Hackett, who has spent many years studying high-altitude physiology in Nepal and has authored a book called "Mountain Sickness: Prevention, Recognition and Treatment."

This year, they will explore the northern side of K2, which, at 28,740 feet, is the second highest mountain in the world. It is part of the Himalayas of the Chinese Karakorum. No American has ever been there.

THIS IS an account of a brief and hastily planned trip to California, and the wonderful variety we encountered — in scenery and places to stay — without really trying.

Our first stop was Los Angeles, where we stayed at the Century Plaza Hotel, one of the Westin chain; it's big, standard, full of conventions, comfortable and pleasant. Outside, there's a small plaza with flowers, a fountain and flags, and, across the street, a mall with theaters, shops and restaurants.

We liked Harry's Bar, a replica of the famous place with the same name in Florence, Italy, and recommend the Beefsteak Harry's, or Breast of Chicken "Take It Off." One block north, there's another shopping center, with stores like Bullock's and I. Magnin's.

THE STREET itself is wide, lined with palms and eucalyptus trees, and named The Avenue of the Stars.

Walk south, past Galaxy Way to Pico Boulevard, turn right and you will soon see a gate marked Twentieth Century Fox and, beyond the fence, outlines of movie sets; the rooftops of Paris, New York tenements, a New England chapel, a western stagecoach stop.

Turn left on Motor Avenue, and there's a public golf course and a one-mile jogging track with 18 exercise stops. Something for everybody, as the saying goes.

The next day, we left for Santa Barbara, about a two-hour drive north. Holiday House (it's said that the song "Ebbtide" was written here) and the Chart House, both in Malibu, are good places for lunch, with splendid views; they've been used as background in so many movies and TV shows that, if you go to one and feel you've seen the place before, you're probably right.

In Santa Barbara, we stayed at the Bath Street Inn, an 1873 Victorian House that's been completely redone to offer bed and breakfast accommodations. It's on a quiet residential street, not far from downtown Santa Barbara, and bicycles are available without charge. Depending on the weather, guests can have their breakfast by the parlor fireplace, in the cozy kitchen, or outside in the garden.

SANTA BARBARA is lush and lovely, the site of great estates and gardens, much Spanish-style architecture and the world's longest traffic light (a full four minutes) at the intersection of State Street and Highway 101.

The two best restaurants, we were told, are Norbert's and Penelope's. The University of California's Santa Barbara campus is actually in Goleta, which also has beautiful beaches, gorgeous young people who spend a lot of their time wind surfing, and a hillside avocado ranch that looks like the Garden of Eden.

One restaurant is called the Elegant Farmer, and another, Hobey Baker's, is reputed to have the best salad bar in town. (The real Hobey Baker was a famous hockey and football star of Princeton, class of 1914, who was killed

in a plane crash at the end of World War I.)

The third day, we drove north toward Big Sur, stopping in San Luis Obispo for lunch at the Cafe Roma. It's a cheerful crowded and appealing place with an Italian menu — the most popular place in town, a young couple at the next table told us. (They were celebrating the birth of their second child and had the three-day-old baby with them.)

Soon afterwards, the road turned mountainous, with some stomach-tightening turns, and the scenery spectacular. Dark clouds lifted, and the weather was suddenly sunny and warm when we arrived at Ventana, a great get-away-from-it-all place about 30 miles from Carmel.

IT'S HARD to imagine a more beautiful location, in the foothills of the Santa Lucia mountains, with the jagged rocks and pounding surf of the Big Sur coastline not far away.

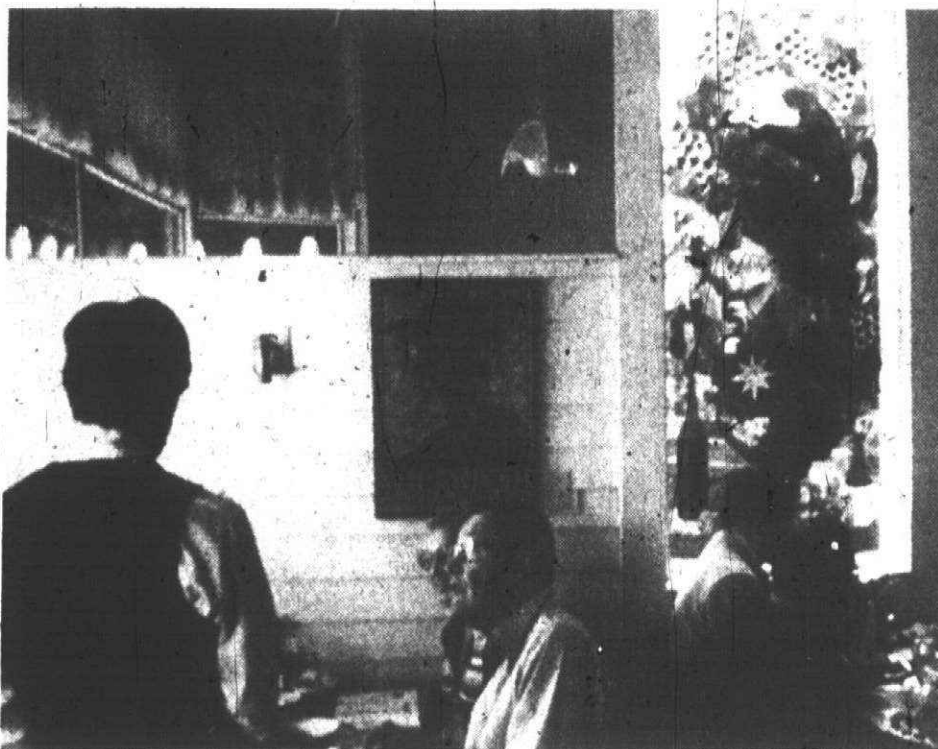
There's a cluster of redwood buildings which contains the reception room — dominated by a huge stone fireplace — and 40 guest bedrooms done in cool, clear colors, with contemporary furniture, Franklin stoves, framed art posters and big, glossy plants. The restaurant is a short walk away, along a winding private road; nearby, there's a heated swimming pool and Japanese hot tubs where, as the desk clerk explained, "dress is optional."

It's a hard place to leave. A long walk along the beach the next morning, and then it was time for lunch at Nepenthe, a restaurant perched on a cliff overlooking the ocean.

The view from the terrace, where you sit at long communal tables, is irresistible, and the people-watching possibilities aren't bad, either.

WE HAD THE cheese and fruit plate with a carafe of wine, and the temptation was just to stay there forever, basking in the sun.

So we were late and arrived in San

Francisco during the worst of the rush hour traffic, but it was worth it — especially the last stop at Point Lobos to see the sea lions. (No whales in sight that day, though.)

We stayed in a small hotel in a good location, the Beresford, which has small but comfortable rooms at bargain rates.

Friends who live in town took us to dinner at Adolph's on Vallejo Street, where we had a delicious dinner. A creation of chicken and veal, with cheese,

artichokes, mushrooms and a herb-flavored sauce is one of the specialties here. (There are enough small, excellent, not-well-known restaurants in San Francisco to drive visitors crazy, and Adolph's is one of them.)

WE SPENT our last two days in Berkeley and stayed at Grandma's, a bed and breakfast inn we'd visited before. It's as charming as ever, and often filled to capacity, so we were glad to know that the owners have recently opened a new place, near the U-C campus; it's handsomely done in the modern European style, and called the French Hotel.

One restaurant in Berkeley, the Fourth Street Grill, deserves special mention; it's a bright, unpretentious place, very popular locally, and with good reason.

There's a Creole flavor in some of the selections; a good gumbo z'herbes, and a muffaletta sandwich.

Jagged rocks and pounding surf make up the Big Sur coastline.

Cable TV offers little in local programming

ISN'T IT ANNOYING to watch local programming on your cable television? Don't you find it irritating when the camera continually moves as it tries to focus on the set?

And isn't it frustrating when you tune in your audio, but that nagging, rasping sound stays with the person speaking on the program?

This is typical of the local programming offered by Omnicom of Michigan, the low-budget company which charges high subscription rates to residents in Plymouth, Canton and Northville.

But before you start feeling sorry for yourself — because you live in a community which must cope with Omnicom — think about those poor souls in your local governmental municipalities.

Officials were so anxious to get into the cable TV business three years ago, they forgot to do their research.

And now everyone will suffer in the long run. It is now clear no one in these communities knew a thing about cable television when Omnicom made its pitch to offer programming to this area.

WHEN OMNICOM was busy luring government officials to buy its package, there were verbal promises galore.

Unfortunately, someone — in all three communities — forgot to put it in writing.

Take, for example, the latest flap between Omnicom and the libraries.

Everyone in the Plymouth and Canton libraries was convinced each place would get its own library station for local messages and programming.

But wait! That's right — nobody put it in writing.

Omnicom officials now don't know about any oral agreement. Originally, Omnicom asked not one, but

all three, libraries to share only one channel with public access programming which features residents coming to the Omnicom studio to voice opinions.

The librarians balked at this arrangement, and — after a lot of pressure — public access was switched to Omni-8, the channel which features programs with moving cameras, raspy voices and other low-budget goodies.

Now the librarians still are upset. They got public access off their channel, but all the programming remains on Channel 29 — confusing many residents in the area.

Of course, the librarians can split the channel into thirds — Plymouth receiving Plymouth library news, Canton receiving Canton library news, etc. But then there's the problem of limited space on each split.

So why doesn't Omnicom offer a channel with enough space to split each community?

Simple. Omnicom doesn't offer the high-budget equipment to split the channel.

And the sad fact remains that Omnicom by contract doesn't have to provide any equipment or other natural cable services which surrounding communities may receive from competing companies.

SO, THE NEXT time you sit down for an evening of cable television, enjoy the movie station or the 24-hour sports and music channels.

But don't turn on the local programming, unless you want to get dizzy from the camera movement or get a headache from the rasp in your ears.

And certainly don't turn on the government channels, unless you like messages which only give viewers partial information.

Cable television was supposed to provide fantastic local visual and audio aids for residents when it came to this area, wasn't it?

So why is it Omnicom of Michigan is doing all the smiling?

If Reagan slashes aid to students...

College students are sweating. Lower-middle-income, low-income, female and minority students know that President Reagan is proposing 25 percent of federal funds to aid collegians be cut.

But the scare literature emanating from my beloved alma mater and other colleges addresses the problem as if federal aid were the only solution. It isn't.

EVEN BEFORE the Headlee amendment to the Michigan Constitution was adopted in 1978, state government was practicing tax limitation. (Those whopping tax increases were local property taxes, not state taxes.)

As a nervous legislature held tax rates down during the '70s, college boards turned to another source of revenue: tuition and fees.

Tuitions were raised faster than the general price level. Since the day I attended my first class in Ann Arbor, the price level has risen about 400 to 500 percent. Meanwhile, undergraduate tuition has risen nearly 1,100 percent.

Reagan owes us a sound national defense, regulation of interstate commerce and judicial appointments. Those are in the U.S. Constitution. He does not owe us college education money.

State government owes us a college system. Willis F. Dunbar, in his landmark history of Michigan, wrote: "A system of public education beyond the common school and reaching to the college level was clearly envisioned in the act of 1817 establishing the Catholopistemiad or University of Michigan."

As college tuitions outstripped our earning power, the federal government stepped in with a myriad of programs: Pell grants, supplemental education opportunity grants, college work study, national direct student loans, student incentive grants.

Much of the money does not, of course, aid students. The students turn around and pay it to the colleges.

THERE ARE two other alternatives to making college education more affordable, if Reagan and Congress choose not to help.

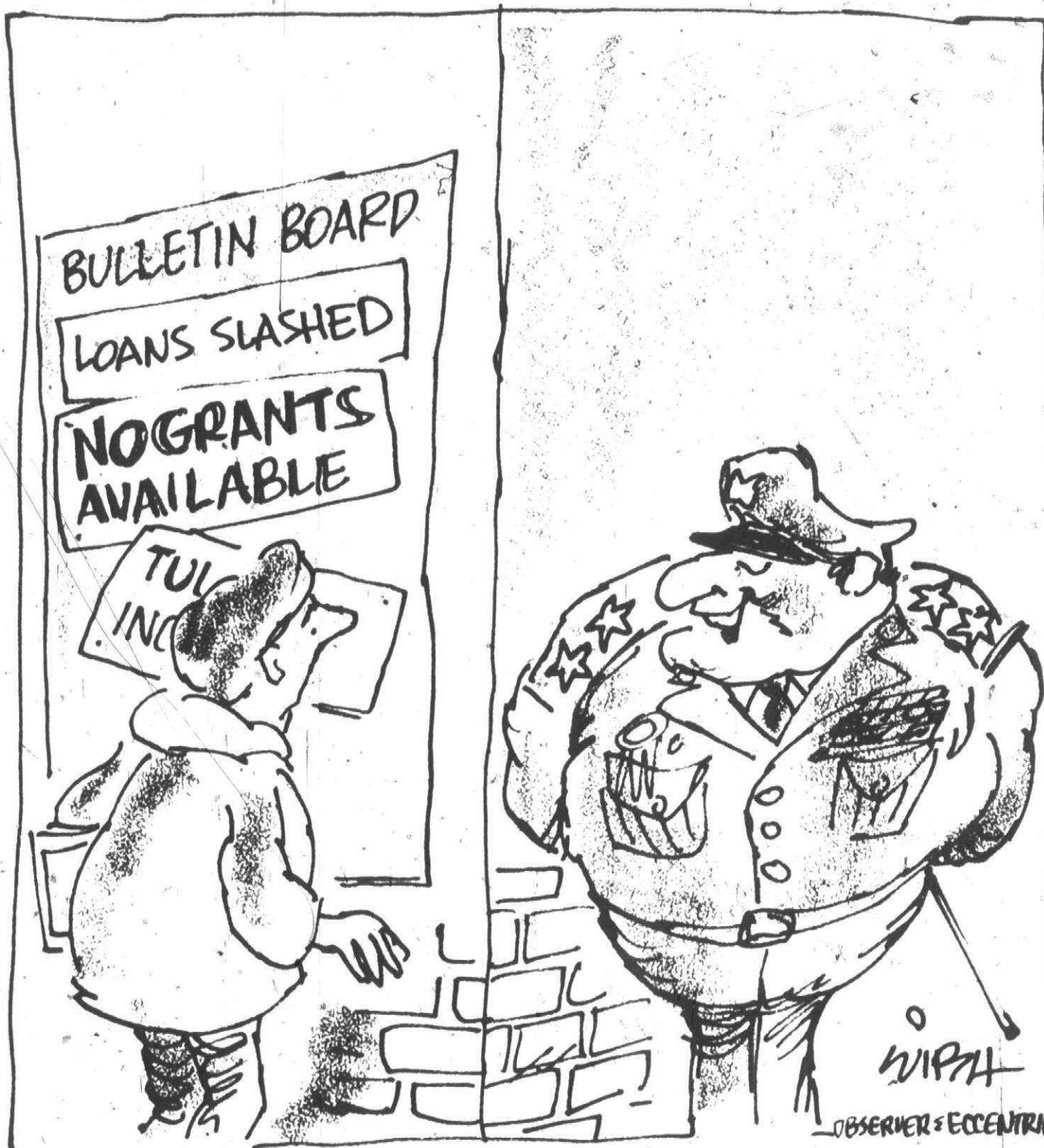
First, we could consider whether colleges in Michigan have priced themselves out of the market by paying the help too much. As long as the Michigan Legislature is talking about holding welfare payments down to the levels of Ohio and Indiana, it may as well look at faculty salaries.

Frankly, I doubt much will come of that alternative.

Second, we could raise the state income tax about one-quarter of one percent and use the \$125 million in new revenue to replace the federal programs aiding college students. Such an increase would cost a family with a taxable income of \$25,000 some \$62.50 a year or \$1.20 a week.

Considering that the Reagan federal income tax cut will start yielding Michiganians \$2 billion a year beginning July 1, we can certainly afford to plow \$125 million of that back into aiding needy college students.

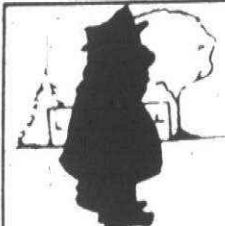

Pressure to win hits preps, too

The national college basketball tournament ended Monday night. North Carolina defeated Georgetown to become college champion of 1982.

Attention was diverted from the tournament last week when one prominent coach, Digger Phelps of Notre Dame, charged that the standard rate for paying top college players is \$10,000 per year.

This bombshell alarmed college coaches and administrators. They had maintained for years the myth of the "amateur" student-athlete. They'd like people to believe that students attend classes, go to basketball practice and then rush home to prepare for the next day's classes. According to this myth, sports is just one of many extracurricular activities available to any student.

REALITY is different. Athletics at many universities is big business.

For example, the teams in Monday's national basketball finals took home more than \$300,000 each. Outstanding basketball and football teams net millions of dollars in sales of tickets, concessions, parking and souvenirs for their schools. Alumni are happier about contributing money when their school has a winning program.

This emphasis on winning puts overwhelming pressure on coaches to attract top athletes. If that sometimes means athletes have to be "helped" in passing classes or paying bills, well...

IT'S EASY to criticize a distant university. But it's comfortable thinking that nothing like that is going on in our home towns. Or is it?

Two weeks ago, Bill Croteau, the coach at Bishop Borgess High in Redford, was fired. His boss, Athletic Director Ralph Owen, said at the time, "Bill Croteau is a fine man, but we wanted to give someone else a chance. It's not that we were dissatisfied. It's just that we want to see if someone else can't get the program turned around."

Translated, that means Croteau did not win enough. Doesn't that sound like the description of big-time college athletics?

From all reports, Croteau is a fine man. He loves kids and has outstanding personal qualities. He's the kind of guy any parent would want to coach his child.

Yet he was fired at Bishop Borgess. Croteau's record last season was 8-13. As he says, "I just don't believe it's all winning and losing." Bishop Borgess' officials apparently think differently.

In a series of articles currently running in our sports section, writer C.J. Risak describes the life of a high school coach in this area's Catholic League.

That includes watching many elementary school basketball games and trying to persuade the parents of 12- and 13-year-old boys to send their children to the coach's school. This is permitted by the Michigan High School Athletic Association. No inducements such as scholarships may be offered to elementary school students.

Public school coaches charge this often happens with Catholic League coaches. Catholic school coaches counter that public school coaches do the same thing.

It sounds sick to me. Something's wrong when high school coaches spend their time trying to recruit eighth graders.

But that's what happens when the "win at all cost" philosophy works its way down from the professionals, to college, to high school and now to grade school.

Don't delude yourself into believing the evil of big-time athletics is not close to home.

roll call report

Here's how area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes March 18-24.

HOUSE

FDR MEMORIAL — By a vote of 288-107, the House passed and sent to the Senate a bill that is the first step toward creating a "living memorial" to President Franklin D. Roosevelt at Warm Springs, Ga. The federal unit would include a rehabilitative center utilizing the healing spring water that drew Roosevelt, a polio victim, to Warm Springs. The bill authorizes a study of the FDR memorial expected to cost \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Supporter Bo Ginn, D-Ga., said that as a former polio victim who also received treatment at Warm Springs, he "can visualize no more fitting memorial to the late president."

Opponent Larry McDonald, D-Ga., criticized the bill as "another in a growing number of bills . . . to commemorate the myth that FDR saved our free enterprise system from going socialist and saved the world from a totalitarian dictatorship. Nothing could be further from the truth."

Members voting "yea" favored creating the FDR memorial at Warm Springs.

Reps David Bonior, D-Mount Clemens; William Ford, D-Taylor; William Brodhead, D-Detroit; James Blanchard, D-Pleasant Ridge; and William Broomfield, R-Birmingham voted "yea."

Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, did not vote.

MONEY — The House passed, 299-103, a "continuing resolution" appropriating money to fund the government for the remainder of the fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30. The stopgap funding is needed because the House and Senate have failed to enact

most of the regular appropriations bills for fiscal 1982. Debate centered on claims that continuing resolutions abuse the budget process. Critics said stopgap funding permits committees to shirk their fiscal responsibilities and to avoid confronting tough issues like busing, abortion and budget-cutting. The bill was sent to the Senate.

Supporter Silvio Conte, R-Mass., said it was necessary for Congress to set definite spending levels for the next six months. "If we cannot continue in an orderly procedure, at least let us let the rest of the country go on in an orderly procedure," he said.

Opponent J.J. Pickle, D-Tex., said "we are here to continue continuing our (previous) continuing resolution. At what point do we say 'stop the merry-go-round'?"

Members voting yes favored stopgap funding through Sept. 30.

Bonior, Ford and Blanchard voted "yea."

Pursell and Broomfield voted "nay."

SENATE

CONGRESSIONAL VETO — By a vote of 69-25, the Senate adopted an amendment empowering Congress to void an executive branch regulation if simple majorities in the House and Senate vote to kill the regulation. The legislative veto could be used against virtually all federal agencies except the Defense Department and the Internal Revenue Service. It was attached to a regulatory reform bill that was headed for final passage and the House.

Supporter Carl Levin, D-Mich., said the measure was needed to reign in the "faceless (executive branch) decision-makers . . . who owe no allegiance to the constituents" and who are concerned with "rules rather than results."

Opponent Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., said the Senate should not now move into this delicate Constitutional area because "it is clear that the Supreme Court will pass on some or all of the intricate arguments over legislative veto in the near future."

Senators voting "yea" favored the amendment strengthening Congress' power to counter executive branch regulations it doesn't like.

Levin, D., voted "yea."

Democratic Sen. Don Riegle did not vote.

ALLOCATING OIL — By a vote of 58-36, the Senate failed to override President Reagan's veto of a bill giving him standby powers to allocate oil supplies and set prices in the event the nation again runs perilously low on oil supplies. To override the veto, two-thirds of those senators voting (63) had to vote "yea." The veto stands; a House vote is not required.

Sen. Bennett Johnston, D-La., a supporter of the standby authority and foe of the veto, said that if a shortage recurs, senators siding with the president "will have a very big questions to answer with the American people. . . . Why didn't you put a plan, an emergency plan, on the shelf when you had a right and opportunity to do so?"

Opponent Don Nickles, R-Okla., said the veto should be upheld because it fits with the president's "reliance on the marketplace, not on more government allocations and government controls to be able to solve the problems."

SEMCOC promotes Amberger to chief

John Amberger will move next door in the Book Building April 12 when he becomes executive director of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

SEMCOC's executive committee last week unanimously picked Amberger to succeed Michael Glusac as top staff man in the seven-county voluntary planning organization.

Amberger, 51, of Detroit, has been deputy to Glusac since 1974, occupying an office next to Glusac on the eighth floor of the downtown Detroit office building. Amberger had previously been an aide to Detroit Mayor Roman Gribbs and director of the Detroit House of Correction. Terms of his salary were left up to SEMCOC's finance committee.

NO OTHER candidates were considered, which bothered one SEMCOC delegate, Wayne County Commissioner William Sullivan of Ecorse. "A lot of people have made application," said Sullivan.

Other executive committee members, however, convinced Sullivan they should hire a known, qualified person

like Amberger rather than conduct a long search for a new person.

"I have seen SEMTA (transportation authority) go through a year of agony," said Saline Mayor Donald Shelton, referring to the SEMTA board's deadlock over four applicants. The SEMTA board last week finally voted to give its acting general manager, Gary Krause, a one-year contract as general manager, even though Krause had not sought the post.

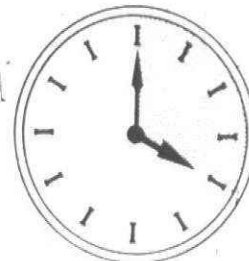
THE MEETING was called to consider Amberger for appointment as acting executive director and to issue a call for applicants for a permanent appointment.

But Shelton argued, "People are hesitant to deal with an acting director who may not be there tomorrow. An acting director doesn't speak with a whole lot of authority."

Glusac will leave to become Chrysler Corp.'s director of intergovernmental and civic affairs, a job he said he hadn't sought but was asked to consider.

That led Shelton to quip: "Mike's going from one public agency to another."

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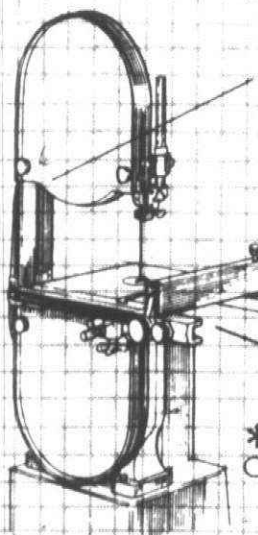

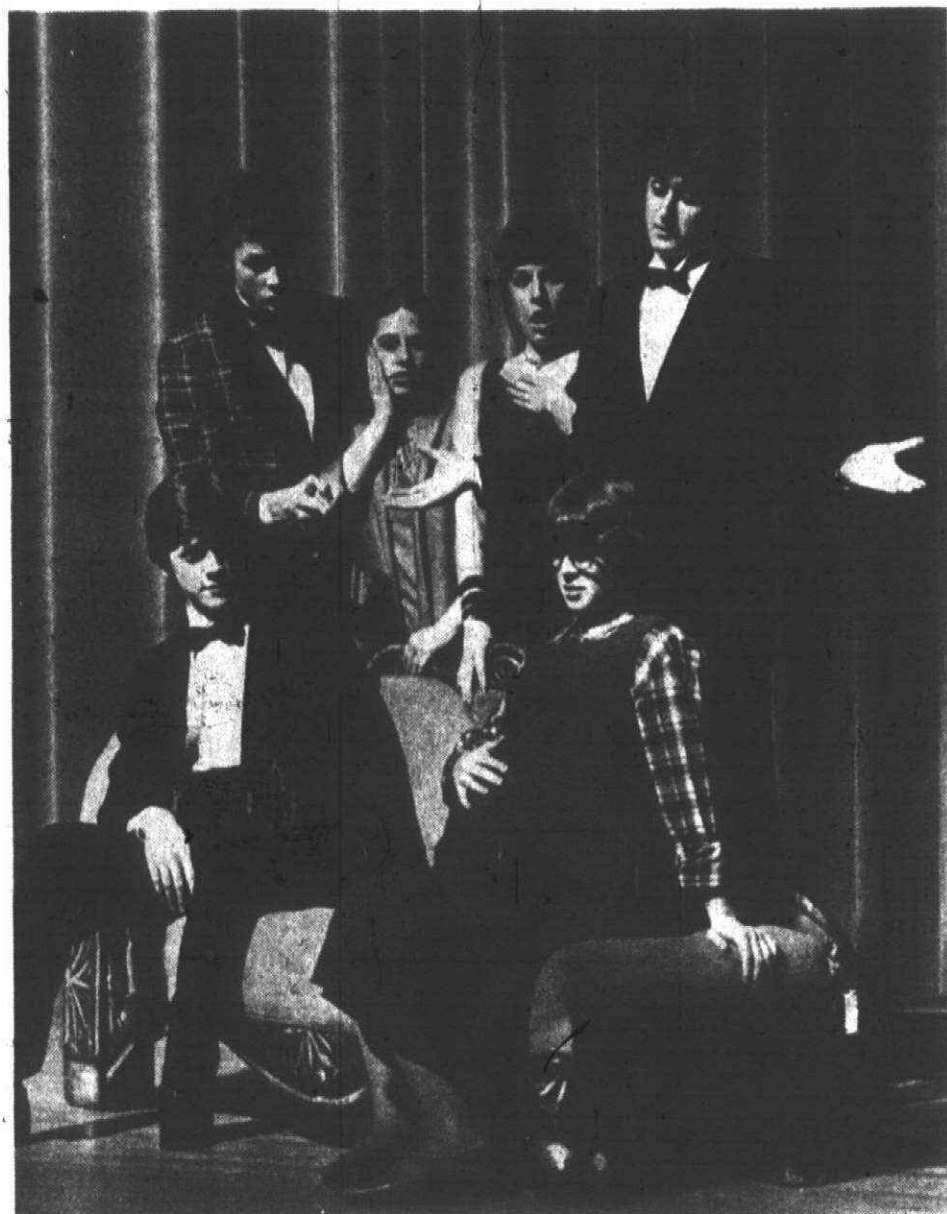

Connoisseur has mystical inborn talent

The subject was passion, the passion of the art collector.

And the speaker was Thomas Hoving, who wound up the Livonia Town Hall's 1981-82 lecture series with a recent visit to the Mai Kai theater and Plymouth's Mayflower Meetinghouse.

Hoving, former director of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City, has been involved in international intrigue, cliff-hanging negotiations and crucial "sweatshops" art auctions, all in the name of high-level art collecting.

He spoke of the smuggling of ancient art items, the embarrassment of buying fakes and the joy of finding in a little antique store in New York "the only surviving reliquary of St. Thomas a Becket," a treasure he was obliged to offer to the Met as part of his contract.

Hoving, serious and intense about collecting, also noted its hilarious side and was frank with his audience when discussing the problems with fakes and fakers.

His talk ranged from analysis of the portraits of the Spanish painter Velasquez to a realistic imitation of an upper-class British mumbler, complete with translation of the mumbles.

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF of the maga-

zine "Connoisseur," Hoving distinguished between being a connoisseur and having taste.

"A connoisseur is someone who recognizes quality in all its subtle manifestations, quality that lasts," he said. "Taste is now, fresh, ephemeral. It may not have a universal sense of quality. Taste sparkles for that brief moment."

He believes that connoisseurs have a mystical inborn talent in addition to their training.

Both are needed, he said, to spot the art fakes which plague his business but also keep it on its toes. He admitted to having been fooled at least twice during his career.

In considering a Monet painting, he noted, you have to "look at every painting Monet did as well as those he didn't."

"Saturation" is the term he used to describe the process a true art collector must go through when confronting an object he is thinking of buying. He said he would use a "raking light" to examine a painting and run his finger over it, maybe scrape a tiny spot with a Swiss army knife. A Greek vase he would lift and scrutinize from every angle.

He added, though, that he would not be likely to go to the lengths of a friend who is an expert on early Christian churches. That man tasted the lime

mix in the mortar he found in an underground passageway.

HOVING SAID he advises the sophisticated collector to carry with him "a field kit consisting of a small flashlight, an organic solvent called xylene, cotton swabs, a magnifying glass with several lens adjustments and a Swiss army knife with blade, pick, file and scissors."

Sometimes it takes intrigue to be able to use the articles of this kit. One of Hoving's stories concerned the interest of the Metropolitan Museum in a portrait by Diego Velasquez, 17th-century Spanish artist. It was to be auctioned in London. The saturation syndrome started when Hoving and other Met staff members went to Italy to check on a portrait the same painter had done of Pope Innocent X.

They needed to learn everything about that painting so they could judge the authenticity and value of the London Velasquez they hoped to obtain.

Using signals and codes and some skulking around, the Met group managed to slip around the barrier when no one was looking and check the painting with the tool kit they had ready.

"We found the condition incredible," Hoving said. "It had never been

touched by restorers."

Then it was back around the barrier and off to London for more maneuvers. The Met representatives allowed themselves no liquids for many hours before going to the place where a guard was watching the Velasquez.

They studied it from the prescribed distance, but their purpose was to wait out the guard. The strategy worked. Finally he left for the men's room and out came the tools.

The group determined workmanship on the painting in London was identical to that of the Innocent X portrait. But the intrigue wasn't over.

Hoving left the building spouting negative comments, and word went out that the Metropolitan wasn't interested.

But at auction time the firm doing the museum's bidding captured the masterpiece at a cost of \$5,438,000.

"Your typical standard day collecting art," Hoving understated.

HOVING LEFT the museum after 10 years as director and after being the main administration man for the tour of the King Tut exhibit.

"I became bored with administrative stuff," he said in an interview.

But despite his tenure at the Met, his books are no longer sold in the museum bookstore.

The reason, he thinks, is not the fact that he hinted in "Tutankhamun: The Untold Story," that the Met gained from the tomb of King Tut art work the Egyptian government did not intend it to have.

"It is because of 'King of the Confessors,'" he said. "In it I revealed that a marble relief of the annunciation had been smuggled out by an art dealer the museum used to have it smuggled."

He added that he showed the galleries of the book to members of Met staff and even changed some galleries to oblige them.

"They said OK," he reported. "But a month later they issued a denunciation."

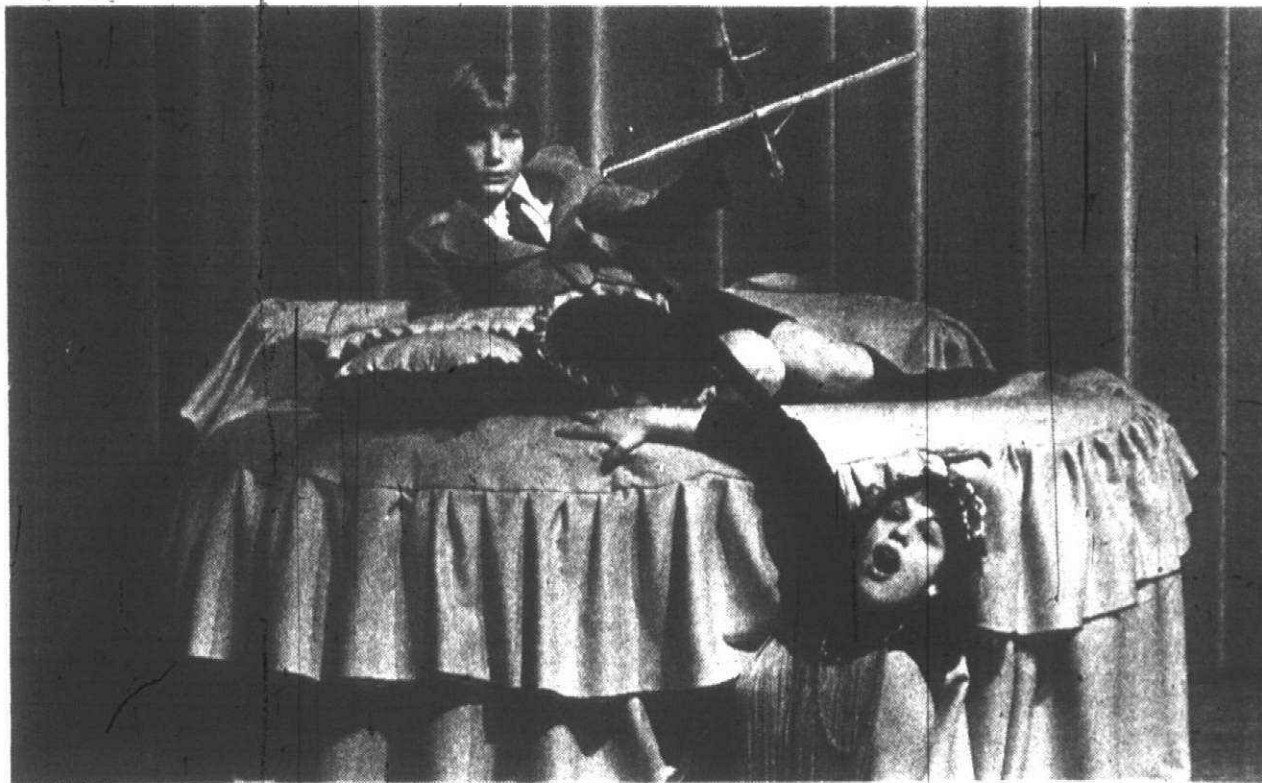
That book was on sale for Hoving's visit, and the Livonia Town Hall still has some copies available. Those interested in purchasing one should call DeeDee Dittmar, 474-7213.

The author pointed out that much art smuggling was curtailed after 1970 when the great museums of the U.S. signed an agreement with the United Nations Education Science and Cultural Commission (UNESCO) forbidding the illicit export or import of art.

"I helped formulate it," said Hoving.

John Belushi ran from life. So do we

The death of John Belushi has evoked a number of reactions over the past couple of weeks. There have been those who have suggested that a memorial be erected along the lines of the Presley fiasco. Others have said he was the funniest man who ever graced the screen.

In my estimation, one shrine to a drug overdose is enough for a society which worships escapism. And as for Belushi being the funniest man who ever graced the screen, that may have been debatable while he was alive but the movie is over and even Oscars awarded posthumously will not succeed in turning a tragic character into a funny man.

One columnist who wrote before the autopsy was performed suggested that so many people are affected by the death of an actor because so many people knew him and by the same token the death is quickly forgotten because no one really knew him at all.

Perhaps many people thought they knew the Blues Brothers, but apparently no one knew John Belushi at all, at least not to his satisfaction. The man left life behind, and people do not do that by choice when they feel known and loved.

THE DEATH of Belushi speaks of the tragedy of his life, but the tragedy of his death would be increased if we were to miss the message to speak to those who attempt to run away from life or who only think they know the people they don't know at all.

Running from life seems to be a program we are conditioned in from our youngest years. We may not be into doing cocaine or heroine. We may not even choose to blow away every weekend with pot or down it in booze, and then again maybe we do. But every branch of society seems to have its endorsed mode of escapism.

The message of Madison Avenue seems quite clear, "We have a pill for every problem." We listen, and we buy, and we swallow and swallow some more. It isn't any wonder that the pain killer producers increase the potency of their product. We are so saturated with the stuff that we require 800 milligrams to do what 200 used to do.

WHETHER IT IS a cough at 6 years of age or a headache at 36, the message is the same. "Don't face it; run from it and you may forget what caused it in the first place," it tells us. "If you are high, we can bring you down, and if you are low, we can

boost you up. Why face life when you can run from it?"

Perhaps there will be many runners because there are many strangers — those people whom no one really knows at all. They are lonely and we insist that we know them even when we don't because that is easier than taking the time for real thing. Thus we prefer to act for one another because that gets more play and certainly more laughs.

APPARENTLY for Belushi, being a Blues Brother was more acceptable than being John, but even that grew sour after a while. How many people we meet taste such sourness every day? And we ignore them and say, "How are you?" without giving a damn.

We may even laugh at the jokes they use to cover who they are, and only discover too late that we never knew them at all — maybe even those who lived at our house.

A sad man who happened to say some funny things has died. His death screams a message, but only to those who can hear. The rest will simply mourn the Blues Brothers and sit around waiting for another funny man to appear on Saturday Night Live.

● Labor and material worth \$1,950 from Edgewood Electric Co. of Madison Heights — for a distribution box at the soccer field.

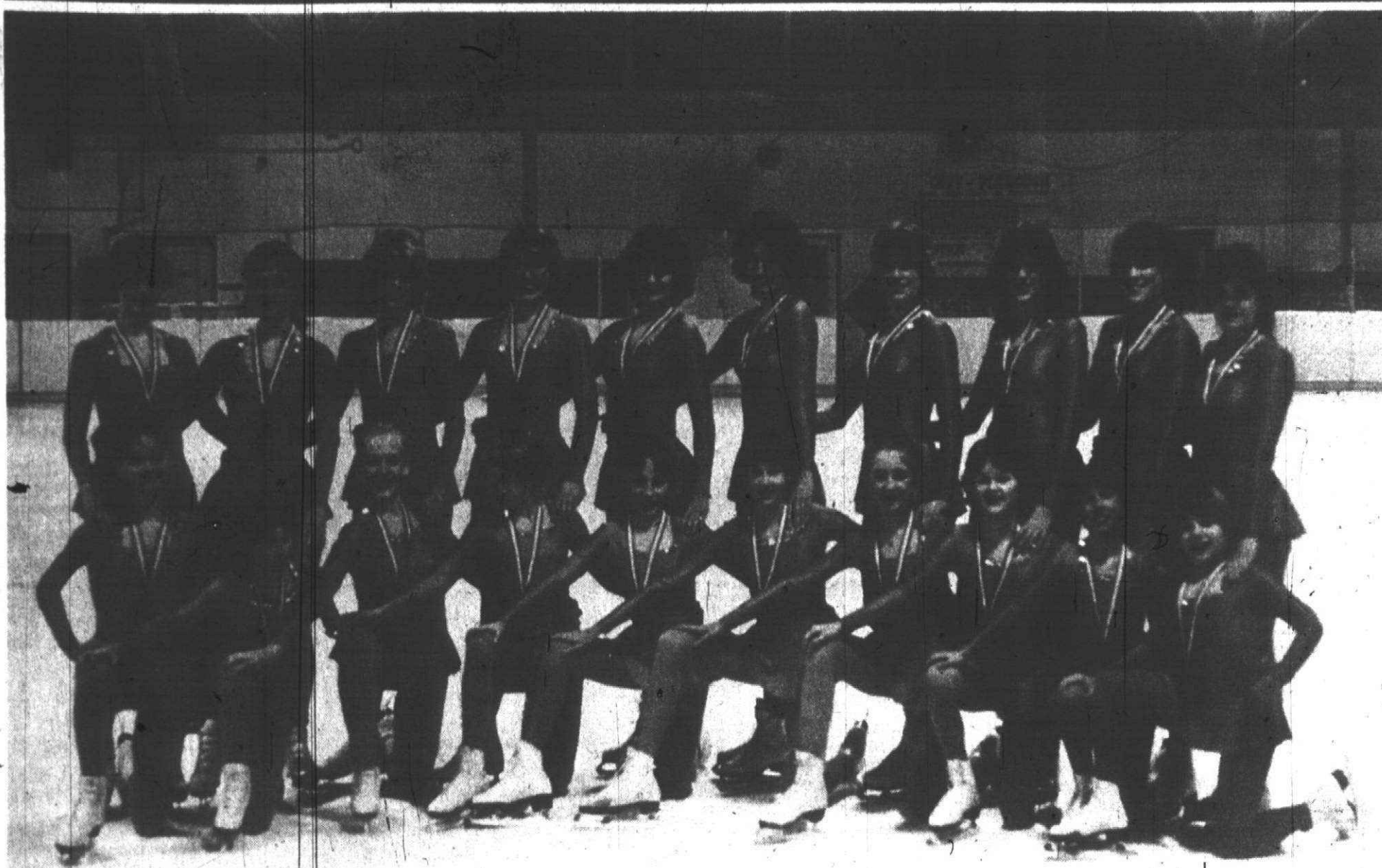
● \$400 from the Bonanza Express Soccer League of Warren in appreciation for use of the physical education facilities — to be used to promote soccer.

Softball enforcer

Rock coach makes demands on hurlers

Rob Willette wants his pitching staff under control.

The Plymouth Salem girls' softball coach doesn't want to be pulling his hair out again this season watching his hurlers throwing change-ups, curve balls or sliders — at least at the start of the season.

Willette's first priority is "to get the ball over the plate."

Salem, victimized last season by walks and wild pitches, is coming off a 9-13 ledger. The Rocks were not a factor in the Suburban Eight League race, although they had their moments.

"I think we'll play a lot better than last year," Willette said. "Last year was my first season, and I learned a few things. I think it will go a lot smoother this year."

"I'm pretty sure we'll be one of the better teams in the Suburban Eight. Our pitching has improved."

Willette, a 1973 Salem grad, is well aware that the team's success depends on pitching even if the hitters produce a bundle of runs.

The Salem coach, however, sees potential in his top three prospects.

SENIOR fireballer Laurie Jarski, who in the past has had trouble throwing strikes, likely will get the nod to start on opening day (Wednesday, April 7) at Trenton.

"Laurie has the speed," said Willette. "If she has the accuracy, then we could have a good year."

Juniors Diane Murphy and Leslie Etienne both have good control and may see a lot of action on the hill, according to the coach.

"Diane pitched well after getting called up to the varsity squad late in the season," Willette said, "and Leslie has improved a lot from what I've seen in our practices."

Jarski is expected to anchor most of the mound duties, but as Willette cautions: "Whoever throws the most strikes will pitch the most."

The Salem offense has plenty of snap.

"I think we're a good hitting team," Willette said. "We have a lot of potential."

JARSKI, who batted almost 400 last year, is one player who could give the Rocks a lift with the long ball.

Batterymate Mary Pryslak, a junior catcher, was a terror at the plate during the final stages of 1981 and flirted with the 400 mark.

The centerfield position appears to be set with senior co-captain Bonnie Southerland, a high .300 hitter from a year ago. She has the ability to spark the Salem offense to go along with her proven defensive capabilities.

The other two sides of the outfield, however, are up for grabs.

Juniors Lisa Granger and Lynne Gamache are competing for the two vacant slots along with sophomores Amy Sidorsky and Cheryl Viele. All four are up from the jayvee ranks.

Jenny Papa, who possesses an Aurelio Rodriguez-type arm, returns after a full year at shortstop and serves as the team's other captain.

"She has an arm that Brian Gilles (the Salem baseball coach) would like to have," said Willette. "She has a heck of an arm."

Willette said Papa can also hit for distance.

Senior Kelly Strautz batted above .300 a season ago and will occupy third base.

THE RIGHT side of the infield is still a question mark with Viele and Sarah McKenna, a junior, vying at first base. The second base opening is being contested by Mary Kay Munding, junior Dawn Henning and Etienne.

Eileen Moore, an All-State basketball performer this past winter for the Rocks, could have started in the outfield, but the senior standout decided not to compete.

She still has a chance to win a basketball scholarship and did not want to risk an injury, Willette said.

The Rocks hope to reclaim the crown they shared two years ago.

"Some of the teams we will be playing probably won't be expecting much," added the Salem coach. "But we might surprise a lot of people."

Recruiting: Coaches scour area grade schools

This is the second in a series on the recruiting of high school athletes.

It exists.

That's the first thing one must realize and accept. Eighth-graders are recruited by high school coaches. And by Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) standards, there is nothing wrong with it.

Strangely enough, it is a violation for a coach to talk to an athlete attending another high school. Eighth-graders or younger are fair game, but once an athlete reaches the ninth-grade level, it's hands-off.

Detroit DeLaSalle coach Gary Buslepp's remarks on television after his team lost the Class B state basketball championship game said a lot about what high school coaches are faced with.

"We're trying to build our program," Buslepp told WDIV-TV reporter Don Shane.

Build a program? At the high-school level?

To build a successful program, a coach has to have the talent. And if a coach needs talent, he has to go looking for it. He has to recruit it.

CATHOLIC COACHES have been doing that for years. They sit through endless Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) contests looking for promising basketball players.

They coach AAU swim programs. They sponsor summer football camps for youths. Both not only help the athlete, but they serve as a tool. They familiarize the athlete with the coach.

When it comes time to attend high school, the "prospect" goes with the coach he knows.

Remember, this type of recruiting is not a violation unless a coach talks to an athlete in high school elsewhere. That, according to an MHSAA official, "is awfully hard to prove because you have to have a witness there."

But public school coaches still cry "Foul!" when one of their players switches schools. There usually isn't any violation involved.

They remain angry, however, because a player they were counting on, a player who learned his skills at a public school, decided to take his talents elsewhere.

This has forced a change in policy among public school coaches. Conducting varsity practices and roaming the sidelines during games is no longer enough. Public school coaches have to protect their interests.

They, too, must fight the recruiting war.

JOHN MCINTYRE was a recruited player — by both Catholic and public school coaches.

John is now a freshman at Detroit Catholic Central. There was nothing abnormal about his choice, according

to John's father, Jim McIntyre. The elder McIntyre should know — he's a coach himself, at Livonia Franklin.

"I've been around coaches who are definite opportunists," McIntyre said. "They entice kids to come over for a couple of years for their own benefit."

"John has a great fondness for the man," the elder McIntyre said, referring to CC coach Bernie Holowicki. "If Bernie wasn't there, John would probably be at Pierce (Junior High) right now. It's a nice, honest relationship."

HOLOWICKI WON this recruiting war because he teaches at the grade school John attended and has known him for years. But he wasn't the only coach to show an interest.

"I talked to him on the phone about our school," said Redford Thurston coach Gary Fralick. Two of Thurston's top players, Tim Fredericks and Rich Biskner, called John McIntyre to try and convince him to attend Thurston.

John was a CYO player. Former Redford Bishop Borgess coach Bill Croteau, as well as representatives from St. Mary of Redford and Detroit Benedictine, saw John at the CYO games and also expressed an interest in him.

But, as Fralick admitted, "He always wanted to go to CC."

But the Thurston coach tried to change his mind. Fralick also runs a summer camp for youths and attends a few junior high school games. He visits the junior high schools to tell them about the Thurston basketball program.

"It's the only way I can combat it," Fralick said, referring to the recruiting battles he wages with two Class A Catholic schools in his city.

FRANKLIN COACH McIntyre does much the same. He visits junior high

schools to "let the kids know we're interested in them."

That's what it's come to — recruit to survive. Most coaches restrict their efforts to their own school district. But there are exceptions.

When the Pontiac schools cancelled their sports programs, there was a wild scramble for the district's top athletes. Were they recruited? There's no proof of it. But more than Catholic schools benefited.

Avondale landed several top-notch athletes, including Derek Woodmore (bound for University of Michigan). When the Pontiac schools cancelled football two years ago, Milt Carthens and Alex Clark both switched to Bloomfield Hills Lahser amid much controversy. Both have athletic scholarships, Carthens at Michigan and Clark at Michigan State.

Public schools are recruiting. Like the Catholic schools, they, too, must face the accusations, whether they are true or not.

The 6-foot Swanson is a two-time All-Suburban Eight and All-Observer performer. She was also selected to the all-tourney teams this year at Plymouth and Schoolcraft.

Swanson is one of three players from this state to receive a volleyball scholarship to Central Michigan University.

Dawn Boyd, senior, Westland John Glenn — The 5-10 co-captain is "one of the finest young lady athletes I have ever coached," said Glenn's Sharon Terflinger.

A three-year varsity performer, Boyd won All-Northwest Suburban and All-Observer second team honors last year.

Boyd, a strong middle hitter, was an all-league repeat this season and was named to the Plymouth all-tourney squad.

Anna Collins, senior, Livonia Franklin — The 6-0 captain was an aggressive middle-hitter and middle-blocker for the Patriots.

She had over 100 "kills" and 20 aces this year.

Named to the NSL's first team, Collins could also fill the role of passer and digger.

Headed for one of the service academies or Harvard, Collins also excels in basketball (All-Observer) and softball. She will be going after her ninth varsity letter this spring.

Julie Burton, junior, Bishop Borgess — At 5-11, Burton patrolled the front line for Borgess. Coach Jerry Abraham describes her as "a very intense player who can control the net with great authority."

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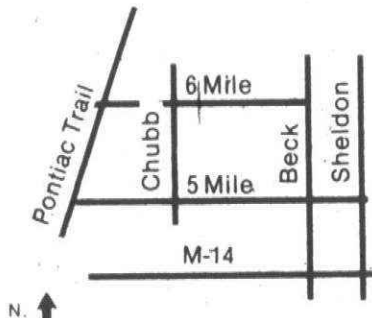
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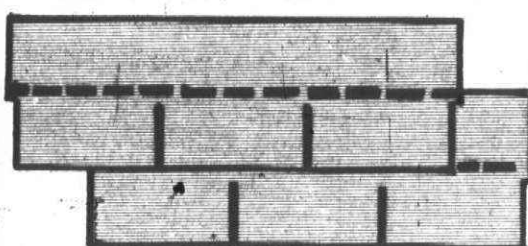
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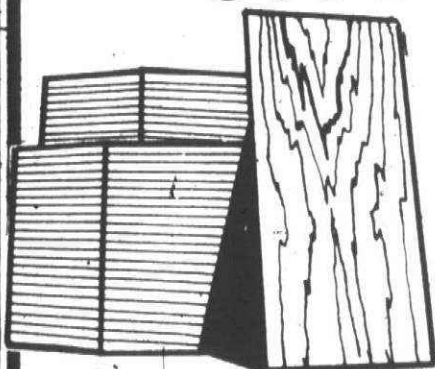
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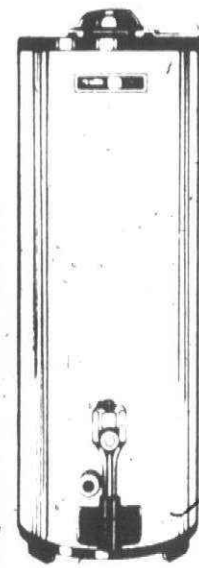


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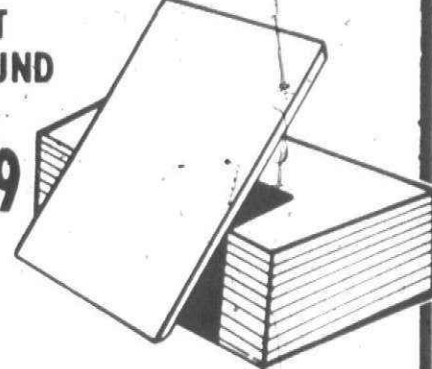


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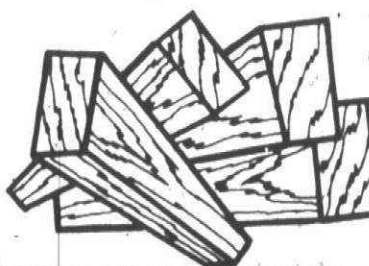


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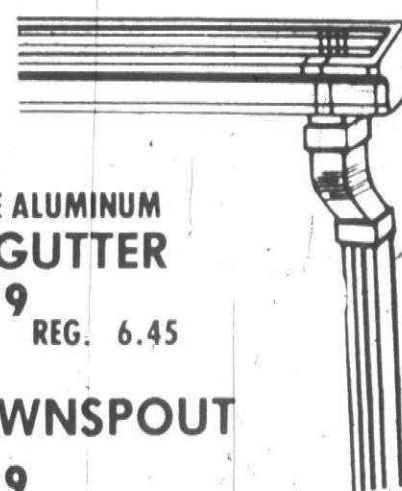
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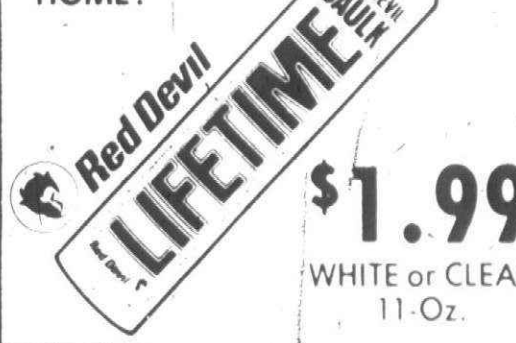
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Oasis joins new fast-pitch league

The team will play its home games at Massey Field in Plymouth. Five league home dates have been scheduled.

"We thought it was time for Class A and open teams to form another league," said Jim McDowell, an assistant coach for Oasis. "We had good cooperation. Everybody knew what they wanted."

Oasis, which finished second in last year's Class A Nationals at Fargo, N.D., was seeking better competition but will continue to compete in the Livonia Women's Fast-Pitch League.

"Even though we were playing strong clubs in the Livonia league, we had to change our style playing some of the high-school clubs," explained McDowell. "Playing strong teams builds strong clubs."

It took only five years for Boyd to transform a group of high-school sophomores into a national power.

Oasis captured the Michigan Class B state title in 1980. Last year, the team came of age as it won the Great Lakes Regional "A" crown and took second in the national tournament. Five players were named to the United State Amateur Softball Association all-tournament team. Balls and Strikes magazine, a national publication, rated Oasis the second-best women's fast-pitch team in the country.

Several former area high-school standouts compose the squad. Among those playing in the collegiate ranks are Vicky Cavallaro and Sherry Kiselica, University of Detroit; Jan Boyd and Jody Humphries, University of Michigan; and Sue McDowell, Indiana State.

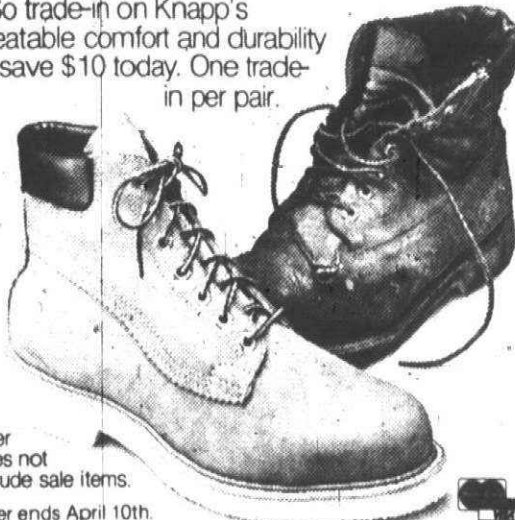

Relieve stress by trying other ways

Although this column pertains specifically to the sport of jogging, it should be emphasized that there are other available alternatives to the activity which are excellent for body conditioning and rehabilitation.

I have given the matter a good deal of thought and I cannot think of any sport which, when done along with jogging, is either detrimental or harmful.

In short, jogging is only a supportive aid to other sports, and, vice versa.

There are, however, certain activities which are excellent alternatives to jogging which we should examine a bit closer.

Bicycle riding of either the outdoor variety or the indoor stationery unit can be quite helpful as a conditioning or rehabilitative mechanism. Obviously, certain speeds must be attained and maintained for maximal conditioning purposes, but the activity of cycling can be extremely beneficial, particularly to the lower extremity musculature.

FROM A rehabilitation standpoint, cycling can be an excellent modality since the primary influence of weight bearing is essentially removed, and, therefore, the presence of excessive stress and strain on the lower extremity is essentially gone. The activity, when performed correctly, is by no means easy and can cause rapid fatigue in the novice enthusiast.

Swimming has always been one of my favorite suggested substitute activities for jogging. Perhaps no other activity, when performed correctly and diligently, can be more ideally beneficial to the body as a sport. The basic problem with utilizing swimming as a prime activity involvement are twofold:

First, one must have access to a swimming facility practically on a daily basis. For many, this may involve membership in a somewhat expensive club, but, at least, it does require travel usually from apart from one's own home.

The second problem is the skill level that should be possessed prior to gaining particular benefits from the activity. In other words, one must be able to swim at a certain level before the actual conditioning capacities can be reached.

However, after all is said and done, if these two basic criteria are met, one

can certainly look upon swimming as an excellent body conditioning and rehabilitative activity. What's more, basic overall body benefits derived from jogging can be reached through swimming.

Aquatic running is actually more of a rehabilitative program used by those individuals who have sustained injury. The patient is advised to actually run or jog in the water with the water providing a natural resistance to lower extremity motion.

THIS PROVIDES an excellent method of treating patients who have been in casts or bandaged for several weeks who are unable to (as of yet) return to the actual sport. Water running can certainly be a monotonous and extremely fatiguing activity, but it is usually considered as a rather short-term type of treatment and strengthening program.

Race walking is an interesting activity and one which, in the past few years, has grown in popularity. Race walkers are those individuals seen on high school running tracks — usually on weekends — with an awkward and "funny" type of gait.

In actuality, race walking is a fascinating, invigorating, and highly skilled activity requiring total coordination of upper and lower body movements. This sport is particularly good for those individuals having knee problems, since the incidence of knee complaints in race walking is practically negligible due to the hyperextended position of the knee upon foot contact with the ground.

Race walking is becoming a much more popular sport. In the near future, I believe that local races and special events for race walkers will become more frequent.

The last activity that I make reference to is distance walking. In this case, I am not referring to mountainous hiking, nor am I referring to after dinner strolls. I am talking about a well-planned and executed walk of moderate distance, and at such a pace, that some stress is exerted on the cardio vascular and respiratory systems.

Distance walking and its merits from a medical standpoint, I believe, have been well-documented and walking programs are presently being recommended by many cardiologists and hospital rehabilitative programs in general.

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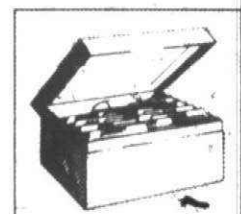

The world's list of great white wines will predictably include Chardonnay, Riesling, Sauvignon Blanc, Trebbiano, Semillon and a few others.

It is about equally predictable that, in any great wine grouping, it will not include French Colombar. But, because it is not considered among the best, there is no reason to think condescendingly of it. Indeed, in the hands of a competent winemaker, some lovely things can be done with it. And are.

A prolific producer wherever it is grown, French Colombar tends to develop a wine of high acidity and slight fruit. It is, accordingly, an excellent extender to white wines grown in warm climates that are fat and sweet and lack the backbone that the addition of Colombar can provide.

And it is used in this way in many of the jug and generic issues from California. Its addition provides character to otherwise sweet, dull wine.

HOWEVER, several winemakers now bottle it under its own name and issue it as a moderately priced varietal. Some do an extremely nice job of it, resulting in a very drinkable wine priced, usually, well below \$6 a bottle.

At any rate, it is a respectable thing to serve and will always be priced dollars below a Chardonnay or Sauvignon Blanc.

Chalone Vineyards, one of the most

esteemed vineyards in all of California, amazingly makes a small quantity of Colombar each year with purchased grapes, and their efforts have gone far in making the grape respectable, even esteemed when they make it.

Sadly, very little of it gets into Michigan. Stonegate makes the best French Colombar on local shelves, if a bit expensive. It is, however, a worthy wine for a fine occasion.

Fetzer has just begun to issue it with the 1980 vintage, a clean and gentle wine of modest price, while Souverain (using the name Colombar Blanc) has long been a personal favorite, when it can be found. Parducci and Pedroncelli both offer inexpensive but inconsistent alternatives, neither as predictably enjoyable as Souverain.

THE NEWEST entry, and a truly excellent wine, is from McDonald Valley Vineyards just south of Ukiah. McDonald Valley has done more to develop fruit in the wine than has any vineyard whose wine I've tasted. This will take some finding, but it is certainly worth it.

Among the jug wines, Giumarra seems to offer the best value. The premium Gallo issue is light and off-dry, tasting nothing like a Colombar but fairly decent for the money. The Almaden and now vintage-dated Mason issues both have above-average fruit in them and are decent values.

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This may be the year for rockin' Missiles

FUELED BY the creative energies of singer/songwriter Joey Pullin of Livonia, the Missiles is a rock band where the sky's the limit as far as its future goes.

"I really believe the band will get off the ground this year," said 28-year-old Pullin. "It's a matter of the business end being taken care of. I made a lot of wrong turns in the past. I wasted time and made mistakes."

"But experience is the best way of learning. Now I'm in the pilot seat and I have control of the future of the band."

When Pullin speaks of experience he means being practically everywhere but the moon. As early as 1969 he played bass guitar for a band called the Flaming Embers, who had recorded a 45 that was on the market.

HE DID NOT start doing serious songwriting until 1971 with a new band called Elephant. Playing at such landmarks as the Grande Ballroom and the Eastown Theatre in Detroit, Elephant opened up for many famous musicians — Rod Stewart, Eric Burden & WAR, Badfinger, Mott the Hoople, and YES, among them.

Then it was the Stretch Thomas

Band in 1975, under the management of Bob Seger's present business manager, Punch Andrews. REO Speedwagon, Bob Seger and Mitch Ryder were just a few of the biggies that used Stretch Thomas as an opening act.

While in Florida at the end of the rockin' '70s, Pullin joined up with the disco-funk group Great Dane. That turned out to be a real dog, so it was on to Cathouse, another band, but after two years in the Cathouse, Pullin was just about ready to quite the music business.

"I had a lot of bad breaks with people who weren't serious," he said. "For instance, the president of one music company in New York heard a demo tape of Elephant and came to Detroit to see us play, but this guy from our band decided to skip out to Florida for no reason at all, and when the president of the New York company saw we

weren't together it left a bad taste in his mouth, so he left."

"To make it in music you have to be dead serious. None of this diddling around. Most people think it's nothing but glamour. Underneath all that glamour, though, is strictly business. Like the Ford Motor Company."

BY 1980, Pullin was in the business of advertising in the Southfield area. He did copywriting, wrote and produced radio and TV commercials, and even made a personal appearance on a W4 television promotion.

This type of experience paralleled the music business, for he learned how to better market a product.

With the encouragement of his friends and family, he decided to cast his depression like salt over the shoulder and (knock on wood) give music one more shot. Considering the eventual outcome, Pullin definitely hit it with his best shot.

"I played bass and was co-writer for the previous bands, but I never had the chance to be in control and give it every ounce of blood I had. This time I wanted it all to be done right."

Don Davis, a top producer in Detroit, gave Pullin an offer he couldn't resist. Free studio time to cut demo tapes for publication rights on the music. It was

the give-and-take type of deal that can produce excellent results.

SINCE PULLIN didn't have a band at the time, he gathered various artists from the Detroit area to back him up. Chris Campbell, bass player for Bob Seger, was a member of that crew.

Well, Pullin saw that the spark was there in the studio, so out of the record-

ing session arose the idea for the Missiles, his own vehicle for musical expression.

Pullin first of all switched from bass to rhythm guitar in accordance with his new-found pilot position, and he wrote all the songs. He then acquired a more permanent band than the one used for

Two tea-tipping old ladies dodder about doing good and, oh, yes, commit-

ting murders in Joseph Kesselring's "Arsenic and Old Lace." The Garden City Civic Theatre's production goes for laughs and gets them, from chuckles to great guffaws.

Lynn Walker is marvelous as Teddy, the lunatic nephew who thinks he's Teddy Roosevelt. When he catapults about the stage with ebullient inanity and chortles his Woody Woodpecker laugh, the audience howls. With rosy knees when he's wearing his Panama Canal shorts, or in red drop-seat long johns, he's irrepressible.

In this masterful comedy, we laugh when he knows what's going to happen. Every time Teddy goes upstairs he bellows, "Charge!" because he thinks the stairs are San Juan Hill, and even though we know exactly what's going to happen, we laugh anyway.

Other times we anticipate disaster when a character reaches for a glass of arsenic-laced elderberry wine. After all, there are already 12 stiffies buried in the basement. But ingenious plotting diverts catastrophe, so we laugh because we've been cleverly fooled.

WHEN AUNT Abby protests, "I wouldn't tell a fib," and we know she routinely kills lonely old gentlemen and calls murder one of her charities, we laugh at her cockeyed craziness.

Juanita Suchy as Abby and Diane Kremser as Martha dodder about with palsied energy just like little old ladies. Their portrayals of the benevolent murders are delightful, and if the timing of their lines occasionally lags, we forgive them because they're such dear crazies.

Jonathan Brewster, played by Joseph Guest, is hardly dear, but his hulking sinister personae is good contrast and good comedy.

Director Howard Palmer and Assistant Director Nicky Walker use slapstick style with Jonathan's sidekick, Doctor Herman Einstein, played by Glen Blankenship. Dr. Einstein acts like Jerry Lewis and talks like Cheech and Chong, but the slapstick works, and so does the "Mehico" accent, even

NEITHER MORTIMER nor Elaine seem as urbane and sophisticated as the parts demand.

A competent bevy of Brooklyn cops march in and out of the Brewster house

talking with fake Irish accents and showing flat-footed stupidity. Even the stiff in the play deserve mention. They say not a word but somehow make even rigor mortis seem funny.

"Arsenic and Old Lace," that old chestnut of a comedy, is in good hands with the Garden City Civic Theatre. The set is an admirable old Victorian relic. Lighting is used adeptly. Costumes are cleverly correct from prissy lace collars for the maiden aunts to stockings with seams for Elaine.

No detail is slighted. There's even a discreet hand-lettered sign beside the punch bowl — Elderberry Wine. With or without, I wonder.

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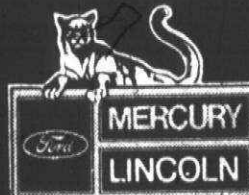
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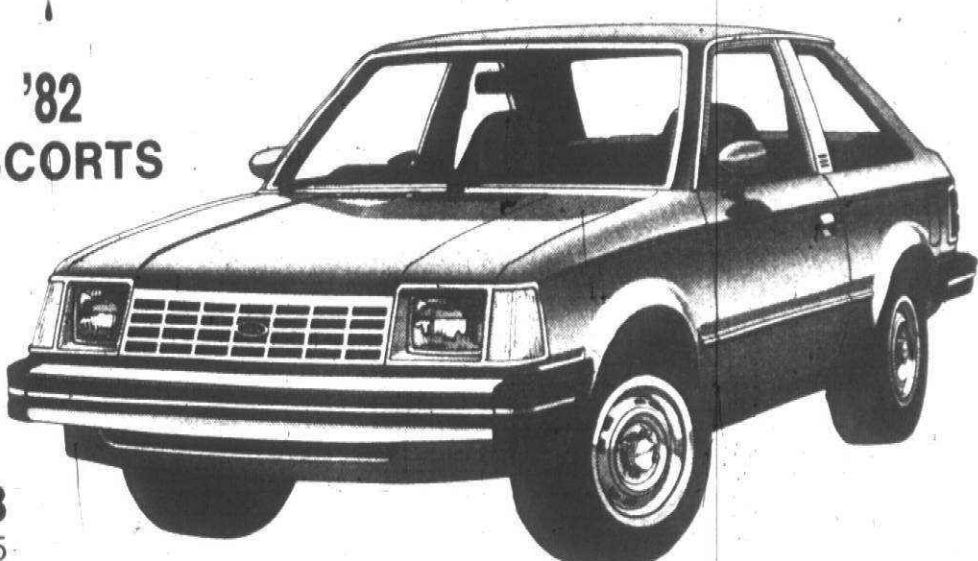

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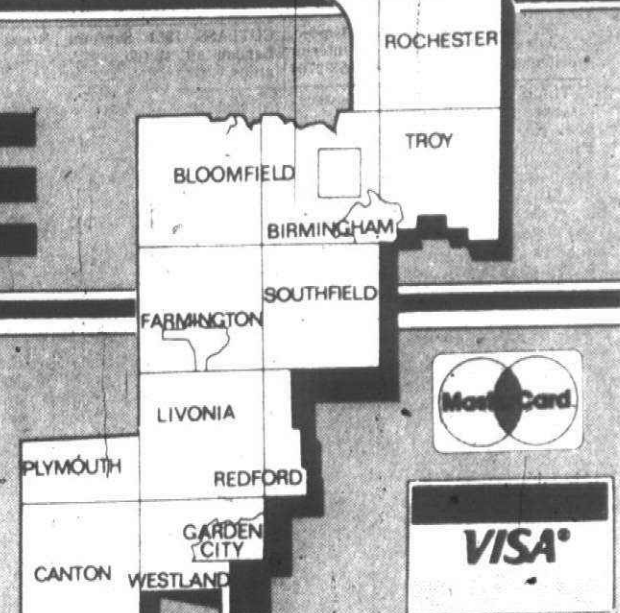
