## Board intends to eliminate safety busing

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education declared its intent last week to ultimately eliminate all safety busing in the school district.

Safety busing will be continued during the coming school year (1982-83) as decided earlier in July, but the board voted 6-1 to eliminate safety busing eventually. The board did not set a specific date for discontinuing the safety busing.

Treasurer Glenn Schroeder said the action was needed to put the public on notice so parents will have enough time to take whatever action is needed to see their children get to school safely.

"If we continue to bus, parents won't do anything," Schroeder said. "We must make people aware that we will discontinue safety busing — that getting to school safely is the parents' responsibility. We are not responsible under state law."

"Parents must do what's needed to make it safe by whatever means they choose," Schroeder continued.

Trustee E.J. McClendon stressed the statement adopted by the board was a philosophical position which provides the basis for future decisions. "It is just not our business to provide for safety on the streets and sidewalks. We are announcing our intent that it's up to the citizens to decide how to provide for safety — it's up to the citizens to exercise their responsibility."

Board President Tom Yack said the

district now is spending about \$50,000 a year for safety busing.

Trustee Roland Thomas suggested the board might want to delay adoption of the statement and meet with local units of government to discuss the need for sidewalks.

"It is up to the citizens to go to the governments, not ours," argued Schroeder. "The citizens must find the means to assure children get to school safely. That might include sidewalks, car pooling, or cooperation amongst neighbors."

McClendon said that what the district does by providing safety busing is equivalent of the school board hiring a police officer for a community which is not providing for the public safety.

Flossie Tonda rhetorically asked how many parents will support millage requests if all safety busing is eliminated. "People think they are entitled to busing because they are paying property taxes to the schools," Tonda said. "Suppose the parents don't take the responsibility? The board's not going to take responsibility for the safety of the child. Who will?"

Superintendent John M. Hoben said the actual timetable on eliminating safety busing will be set when the administration comes to the board with proposed bus routes, starting for the fall of 1983.

## Resale shops grow despite poor economy

For most businesses, a slow economy translates into reduced sales, but for a growing number of shops in the Plym-

outh-Canton area, it means more store traffic and increased profits.

Resale shops, selling used goods, are growing in popularity. Store owners say these types of shops are the things of the future and not just a passing fad.

"Resale shops have been around for years and people are becoming more and more conscious that their goods can be reused by someone else," said Maureen Osiecki, co-owner of Plymouth's OK Village Store, which special-

izes in most new sporting goods.

"I think that most people, whether the economy is good or bad, look for bargains. We've always been known as a throw-away society, and I think that's changing. I think that this (resale

shops) is something of the future, not just a fad."

Betty Nelson, owner of Hidden Treasures, a used household goods store in

If resale shops are a trend in business, then specialization is a trend for resale shops.

All resale shops in the Plymouth-Canton community specialize in either one item or another. And this area is the perfect place to specialize, according to Donna Gilpatrick, owner of LaDonna's a women's used clothing store in Old Village.

"We have to have specialty shops," Gilpatrick said. "People are tired of going to the mall. It is unique shopping in places like Old Village. That's why people come here in the first place."

Kathy Rase, co-owner of Kid's Stuff in Canton with Susan Mann, said specializing is a must in keeping up a good quality image for the store.

"For the people who have a resale shop, you're limited to a certain amount of space," Rase said. "When you try to carry everything, you get

that garage sale look."

OK Village Store, an "almost-new" sporting goods store in Plymouth, is enjoying a busy first year in business because, according to co-owner Maureen Osiecki, used sporting goods is an unusual concept.

Some stores have switched their marketing strategy, but continue to stay specialized.

"We started with clothing and gradually turned to furniture," said Betty Nelson, owner of Hidden Treasures in Plymouth. "No one in Plymouth was doing household goods, and we didn't have room for both."

Arlene Stewart, co-owner of the Rainbow Connection, which specializes in children's goods, is thinking of expanding but she intends on staying within the children's market.

"We wanted to get the feel for what the market was," said Stewart on the store's initial specialization. "We will stay strictly a children's shop because children will always outgrow their clothes."

## Plymouth bank robbed

Three armed robbers escaped with \$7,300 Thursday morning from the Detroit Bank and Trust branch in Plymouth Township.

No one was hurt during the robbery, which happened shortly after the bank opened at 9:30 a.m.

Plymouth police and the FBI are investigating the robbery. As of Friday afternoon, they had made no arrests.

A reward of \$1,000 is offered for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the suspects. Persons with information can call the Plymouth police, 453-8600, or the FBI, 965-2323.

LEAVING ONE MAN outside, the

other two robbers entered the bank at 42345 Ann Arbor Road west of Lilley. One was armed with a revolver, believed to be a .38 caliber snubnose.

"They came in with nylon over their heads, but not over their faces. They told everyone to get down on the floor," Police Chief Carl Berry said.

"One bank employee triggered the alarm during the robbery."

The alarm company notified police and officers were at the scene within a minute, said Berry. However the robbers had left by the time police arrived.

They escaped in a blue Chevrolet Nova, driving east to the Plaza Bowling Lanes parking lot, 42001 E. Ann Arbor Road.

At the lot they jumped into a black car, leaving the Nova and \$1,000 behind. The robbers then headed east on Ann Arbor Road in the black car, last being seen just east of Haggerty near I-275.

WHEN THE TWO men entered the bank, there was a "handfull of customers" in the building, according to police and FBI reports.

"With guns out, the one man vaulted right over the front counter," according to a bank employee.

A Detroit Bank and Trust spokesman declined comment on the robbery.

The robbers gained the attention of a Plaza Bowling Lanes employee while

## Retired building chief dead at 69

Plymouth and Canton officials are mourning the unexpected death of a retired fellow worker and friend.

Charles H. Thompson, former chief building inspector in both Canton Township and the city of Plymouth, died in his sleep Tuesday afternoon at his retirement home on Stylus League in Hale. Mr. Thompson, 69, had suffered from angina and emphysema, although his death was sudden.

Funeral services took place Saturday at Riverside Cemetery, Plymouth. The Rev. John N. Grenfell officiated. Arrangements were by Lambert Funeral Home, Plymouth.

Thompson, who retired about three years ago from the top spot in the Canton building department, always had a knack for fixing things, according to Canton Clerk John Flodin. In fact, even after retirement, Thompson always returned to Canton's Township Hall around election time to help Flodin fix any broken voting machines.

"Even after he quit, we had him

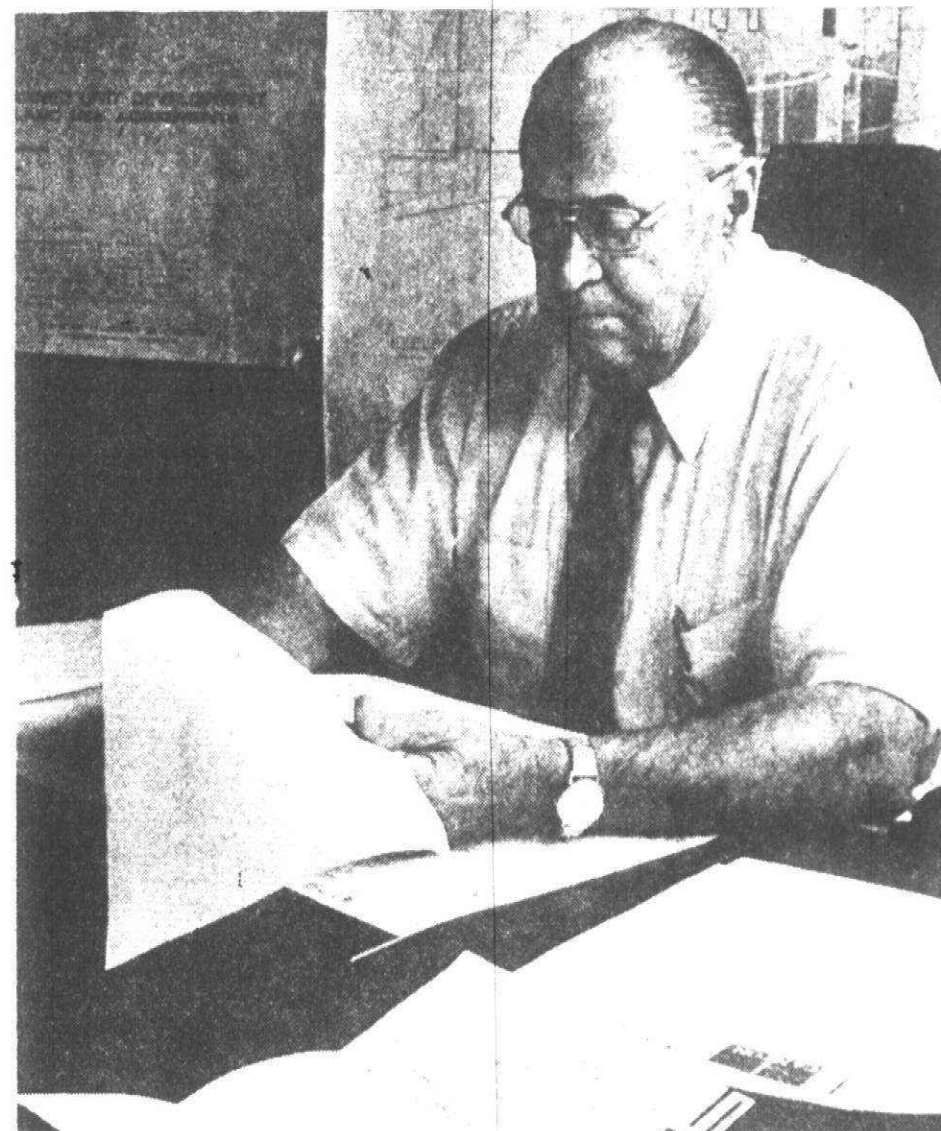
around for a few elections after that," Flodin said. "We always paid him, of course, but I'm sure he would have done it for free. He always liked to come in and talk to us."

"He was really a nice, easy-going kind of gentleman."

THOMPSON came to Canton in 1972 as the township's only building inspector, before the growth period in the mid-1970's. The department grew to 10 building inspectors and six clerical employees under his tenure. He retired in early 1979.

Thompson, known as "Chuck" to his friends and co-workers, also was a member of the city of Plymouth building department, before coming to Canton. He served as the chief building inspector for five years, following a one-year term as Plymouth's deputy clerk and assessor, in the late 1960's and early 1970's. He also served as a Plymouth police officer from 1945 to 1951.

Thompson, who was born in Plymouth Township, is survived by his Ann; sons David of Plymouth and Allan of Chelsea; brother John of Mayfield Village, Ohio; and two grandchildren.

## Hiroshima, nuclear-bomb use recalled

Plans have been made for a Hiroshima/Nagasaki Remembrance Day observance on Sunday, Aug. 8.

The observance will begin at 2 p.m. Sunday at Swapa Park on McKinley in Dearborn Heights.

The observance has been planned by the supporters of the nuclear weapons freeze from northwest and downriver

communities in Wayne County.

The event was discussed at the group's last meeting held July 28 in St. Mary Catholic Church in the city of Wayne.

A meeting for all interested persons has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 24, in St. Edith Catholic Church, 15089 Newburgh in Livonia.

The group, which met at St. Mary's, also decided to split along geographic lines for future meetings. The northwest area will be served by the existing Northwest Suburban Committee for the Nuclear Weapons Freeze, which was formed in March 1982.

The northern portion of that group

will be dividing, and Lee Riebling of Northville will be coordinating efforts to build support beyond Northville and Novi into the areas of Walled Lake and Farmington Hills, said Johanne Fechter of Plymouth.

The Northwest Committee will extend its coverage to include communities such as Westland and Garden City.

3. What changes, if any, would you propose in Michigan's taxation system? Why?

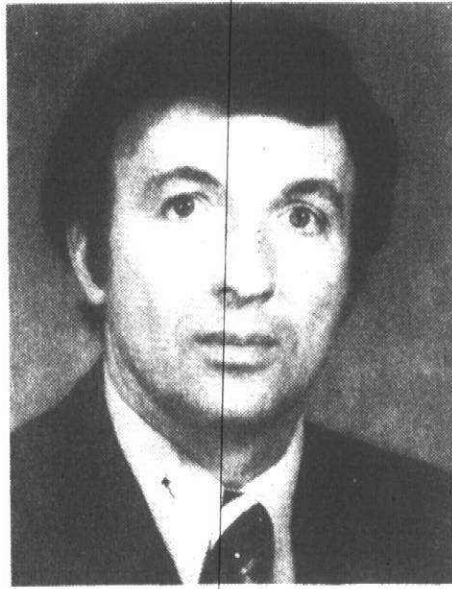
I would reform the property tax system since it is inequitable to the homeowner and to the suburban school systems.

4. What are the greatest threats to the natural resources of Michigan and how would you deal with them?

The greatest threat is industry and uncontrolled development of environmentally fragile areas. DNR must be more diligent in finding offenders and the State must be willing to prosecute violators.

5. What are your personal priorities in the next legislative session?

My main priority is to hold public hearings and development of legislation which will help the business climate of Michigan as well as attract new industry to the state.



R. Robert Geake (R)

State Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, is a candidate for re-election in the new 6th senatorial district. The district includes the cities of Livonia, Plymouth and Northville and the townships of Plymouth, Canton, Redford and Northville. Geake, a 10-year veteran of the Michigan Legislature, was elected to the House in 1972 and served there for five years.

1. Describe two of the major problems facing the state and your proposals for solutions.

Improving the state's economy and reducing unemployment through promoting new industries such as high technology and robotics while continuing to encourage Michigan's automobile, agriculture, and tourism industries. Secondly, providing needed

state services in a time of limited revenues through elimination of waste and reordering spending priorities.

2. List any incentives you feel government should offer to private industry to encourage location in Michigan.

We must reform workers compensation and unemployment compensation laws to eliminate abuses and bring us into line with competition states. The Single Business Tax must be reformed to tax profits rather than the gross. Property tax incentive abatements should also be promoted.

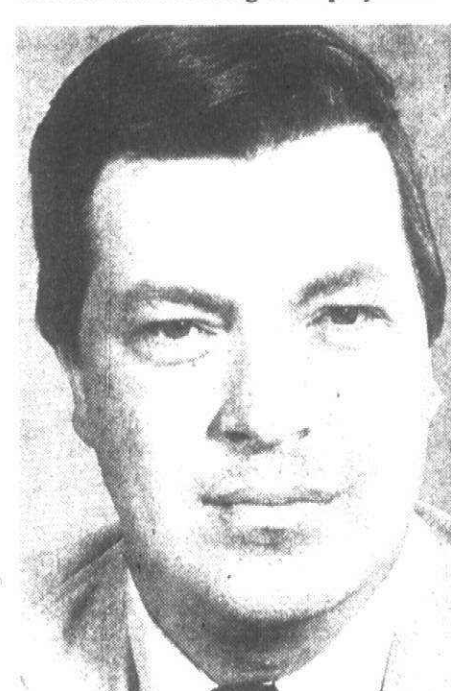
4. What are the greatest threats to the natural resources of Michigan and how would you deal with them?

Three Republicans and one Democrat will be on the ballot Aug. 10 in the 36th Michigan House district, which includes Canton and Plymouth.

In that race a voters' guide was prepared by the League of Women Voters of Plymouth, Norville, Canton, Novi in cooperation with the Observer Newspapers of Canton and Plymouth.

Questionnaires were sent to all candidates, and each could respond with up to 40 words of biographical information and up to 50 words per question with five questions being asked.

The League is a nonpartisan organization dedicated to informing voters and to encouraging residents to participate in the electoral process. Although the League at times does support ballot issues it does not support or oppose candidates.

The candidates for the 36th District include: R. William Joyner, 32, 45941 Amesbury, Plymouth, Democrat; Gerald H. Law, 38, 45209 Woodleigh Way, Plymouth, Republican; Roanld L. Fisher, 39, 15651 Maxwell, Plymouth, Republican; and, Dr. Gary L. Wolfram, 31, 6809 Willow Creek Dr., Canton, Republican.

BIOGRAPHICAL information on the candidates follows:

Joyner: Wayne County Commissioner; B.S. secondary education CMU; administrative assistant mayor of Livonia 1973-74, twice elected commissioner.

Law: Married, two children; Ford Motor Co. employee; Plymouth-Canton resident 12 years. Master's Degree Business Administration, U-D; law degree, W.S.U. Member of Kiwanis, Jaycees, YMCA, Chamber of Commerce, Hines Park Task Force, Township Trustee since 1978, Republican precinct delegate.

Fisher: Certified tool engineer, gauge maker, para-legal and clergyman. Graduated from Livonia Bentley High (1962), continued education at Henry Ford Community, Central Bible College, and Madonna College. Lay minister with Open Door Church, and director of the National Parents Coalition.

Wolfram: Economics professor University of Michigan Dearborn; B.A. summa cum laude, economics, University of California, Berkeley, 1976; economics professor Mount Holyoke College 1976-77; economics professor UM-D 1977-present; author of chapter in U-M's "Michigan's Fiscal and Economic Structure," 1982.

THE QUESTIONS asked by the League and the answers given by each responding candidate follows:

1. Describe two of the major problems facing the state and your proposals for solution.

Joyner The economy and business climate, 1. spending and taxes; 2. So close also has to be decline in educational quality. Solutions: financial audit management audit; bringing together leaders to design a long-range plan. Unemployment compensation changes, Single Business Tax reform and tax credits for research development that creates jobs.

Law The single most important need of Michigan today is economic development. We must make Michigan more attractive for existing and new businesses to encourage diversification, expansion and jobs. Secondly, legislation is needed to control government spending. State programs should die when they are no longer needed.

Fisher High unemployment is Michigan's major problem, for it drives up welfare costs while reducing tax revenues. That remedy is to create incentives for private industry to locate in Michigan. Our second problem is government growth and its insatiable appetite for new revenues. Solution? Cut taxes, the means of government growth.

Wolfram Unemployment and the breakdown of the state's infrastructure. The state must take immediate measures to encourage small business, as outlined in No. 2. Eighty percent of all jobs are created by small business. The Motor Vehicle Tax must be tied to miles traveled rather than miles per gallon.

2. List any incentives you feel state government should offer to private industry to encourage location in Michigan.

Law Reduce and simplify government laws and regulations which inhibit economic development; enact changes in unemployment insurance system; provide Single Business Tax relief and promote Single Business Tax credits for research and development; establish an economic development fund to assist business expansion and attract new industry; continue reform in workers' compensation costs.

Wolfram Single Business Tax rates must be cut in half, the base broadened and made more closely related to profitability. The state's unemployment compensation benefits must be reduced for new beneficiaries and workers' compensation eligibility tightened. Small business and non-cyclical industry should pay unemployment taxes according to labor force experience.

Joyner Further improvements in workers' compensation. Changing our Single Business Tax, looking at unemployment compensation, and adopting a different regulatory attitude. Also pushing for creation of enterprise zones. By offering quality education you also encourage business to move here.

Fisher Repeal the Single Business Tax, provide meaningful reform or workers' compensation, and reduce property taxes. Anything short of this is no incentive at all.

3. What changes, if any, would you propose in Michigan's taxation system? Why?

Joyner Our current system relies too heavily on property taxes to fund K-12 education. We need to shift away from the property tax into a system that does not include housing. I support a proposal that earmarks a guaranteed percentage of revenues for education and would move away from property tax.

Fisher A constitutional amendment requiring a two-thirds vote of the Legislature, rather than a simple majority, to raise or create new taxes is the only effective way to break the growing tax burden. Michigan lawmakers have refused to apply self-restraint, leaving the constitutional mandate our only remedy.

Wolfram Lower the Single Business Tax rate and broaden the base. Workers' compensation and unemployment compensation reform will encourage

small business and non-cyclical industry. Motor Vehicle Tax must be raised 4 to 5 cents per gallon, 2-percent increase in the weight tax is necessary to maintain the state's infrastructure.

Law Property tax reform is needed. The continuing inflationary rise in property values and assessments have resulted in spiraling tax bills. Sources other than property taxes for funding public education must be found. Changes in the single business tax are needed to encourage business growth and job creation.

4. What are the greatest threats to the natural resources of Michigan and how would you deal with them?

Fisher Our greatest threat is the ever-present danger of a nuclear accident. Construction of nuclear power plants and transportation of their wastes must be closely monitored, and aggressively regulate. The next greatest threat is pollution to Michigan's waterways, and, again, tough laws and aggressive enforcement are the safeguards.

Law During economic recession, there is a tendency to misuse or deplete natural resources to meet the demands of today. We must conserve resources for tomorrow's generations. Initiatives should be undertaken to protect the Great Lakes. We need regulations insuring protection of land resources while enabling coal-mining operations to proceed.

Wolfram The greatest threat is pollution of the state's greatest natural resource — fresh water. Fines covering the cost of purifying the water must be placed on all polluters, whether on or off-site. Hazardous waste producers must be held responsible for damage caused by disposal and should contribute to a state "super fund."

Joyner The state's lack of clear-cut planning for the disposal of toxic waste, and the threat to our Great Lakes both in terms of transporting elsewhere and contamination.

5. What are your personal priorities in the next legislative session?

Wolfram My priority will be to drastically improve the climate for small business in Michigan. This will reduce unemployment, and thus reduce the need for transfer payments, and increase the tax base. My other priority is to protect the state's natural resources.

Joyner Providing an improvement in the business climate and the expansion of jobs. Providing stable adequate financing for education. A complete management and financial audit of Michigan programs. Continue to be visible and easily reached just as I have after Plymouth, Canton and Northville elected me before.

Law Restore respect and credibility to state government; improve the state's financial condition and its Wall Street bond rating; find ways to diversify and expand Michigan's economy; promote high technology, economic development and jobs; improve method of funding Michigan's education system, while maintaining quality.

Fisher My first priority would be the restoration of Michigan's economical base, followed by comprehensive tax reform for homeowners, business, and wage earners alike. On social issues, I have targeted the cut-off of abortion funds and the reform of Michigan's child custody laws as my personal goals.

McClendon said that because safety busing will be provided this coming school year the board has a year's lead time to decide the next step toward the ultimate elimination of safety busing.

Tonda was the lone vote against the statement of intent. She said the board was talking only about safety busing and not policy busing (busing of K-2 pu-

pils living within 1.5 miles of school) and that many K-2 students ride the bus even though a safe route to school is available.

The statement noted that because of the probability of continuing loss of funding the board intended to "ultimately eliminate all temporary busing, that is, busing that is less distant from the school than the limits mandated by the state."

switching cars.

"I was driving out of the parking lot to go to Kmart when they pulled into the parking lot," the employee said.

Watching from his rearview mirror, the employee saw two men jump into the black car, which had a for sale sign in it. While heading east on Ann Arbor Road, the black car passed the employee.

"They made it look like there was only one man in the car. The last I saw them was by Kmart," he said.

**WHEN THE** employee returned from Kmart 10 minutes later, the Nova was left behind with the doors open and the engine running. He told another

employee to call the police.

"We called the police cause we thought it was a stolen car," the other employee said.

The black car had been parked in the lot earlier in the morning, said to a third Plaza employee.

"It was a big black car — it wasn't new. It was there when I came into work this morning," she said.

The Nova had been stolen in Detroit on Wednesday, said FBI spokesman Mark Codd.

"We have some good physical evidence that will produce some good fingerprints," Codd said.

THE FBI also has pictures of the men taken by the security cameras in the bank, he said.

"The method of operation is being

compared with other bank robberies in the metro area," Codd said.

A city of Detroit bank robbery resembled the Plymouth Township robbery, FBI agent John Anthony said.

"We had a robbery in Detroit about a month ago — a National Bank of Detroit — done by three men where they vaulted the front counter," Anthony said.

The Plymouth Township robbers were described as:

- Suspect one — black, in his 20s, 5-foot-9-inches to 5-10 and slender build.
- Suspect two — black, around 25, 5-6 with a stocky build.
- Suspect three — black, 18, 6-1 and very thin.

The last bank robbery in the Plymouth area was the Burroughs Suburban Credit Union robbery in the summer of 1980.

The last commercial bank robbery was the National Bank of Detroit robbery in 1968.

Plymouth, thinks the economy is helping their store enjoy the busiest spring in four years.

"More people are shopping resale stores than ever before," Nelson said. "More people are interested in finding good used things."

Owners of the various resale shops agree that many people, despite the tough economy, are not easily convinced to buy used goods. That is, until shoppers have seen the resale shops.

"There are still a lot of ladies who don't want to wear used clothes," said Donna Gilpatrick, owner of LaDonna's, a women's clothing resale shop that has been open for five years. "Once they see the high quality stuff we sell, many will change their mind."

Kathy Rase, co-owner of Kids Stuff in Canton, a recently opened children's resale boutique, said the resale shop's low prices bring people in but the clean atmosphere and high quality items bring them back.

"People just don't have the money to shop at retail shops for their kids," Rase said. "And people who wouldn't even consider coming into a shop like this are forced to. They come back, too. We have so many people amazed at how nice the stores are."

All the area resale shops run on consignment except LaDonna's, which buys goods from the people outright. More people are bringing their used goods to the resale shops to sell rather than having a garage sale, according to Nelson.

**BLEEDING GUMS CAN BE SERIOUS**

Bleeding gums are unhealthy gums. The state of the gums reflects the health of the underlying tissues that can't be seen — and bleeding should alert you that more serious problems lie ahead if the condition is left untreated.

Fortunately, gingivitis is a reversible condition. With proper treatment it can be cured and the gums restored to normal health. If you can maintain healthy gums, you can avoid periodontal disease — the major cause of adult tooth loss.

The villain in the case of gingivitis (and periodontal disease) is plaque. It accumulates rapidly and develops under the gums as well as between the teeth. Plaque can harden and build up if not removed regularly. This hardened plaque is called tartar or calculus. At this juncture, only a professional scaling will remove the accumulation under the gum line, which is where these deposits can quickly build and cause tissue damage and probable loss of teeth.

If you observe bleeding from your gums, don't assume that it isn't serious. See your dentist.

# Tomorrow's arrival expected ahead of schedule

1984 is only two years away. The vibrations of *Future Shock* already can be felt. The technology revolution has started and before we know it will be over. The suddenness of change, and the need to adapt our institutions to change at a faster pace, was underlying the discussion last week between the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education and its study committee on instructional computer technology. While the presentation was very interesting, I was more intrigued by the committee's report. The outstanding thing about the report was that it actually was readable — a tip right away that this committee had citizen-members on it as opposed to educators who cannot write readable reports. I also was fascinated by the contents of the report because I was unaware of some of the current information about the impact computers have on young people and their future. That impact is greater and more current than we might think.

FOR EXAMPLE, within three years three-fourths of all jobs in the U.S. will involve computers

in some way and by 1990 upwards of 95 percent of all jobs will involve computers.

We all have read about how wide open the computer field is for job-seekers. The door is wider open than I realized. *Business Week*, for example, reports that demand for skilled persons to write computer software is 40 percent greater than the supply.

The advent of computers into the work arena has drastically changed the types of jobs available. File clerks are now unemployed. Typists no longer need to type accurately as word processors quickly and easily correct mistakes. Different jobs and different skills are evolving.

The implications for the job markets are so obvi-

ous that it's clear students need to become familiar with computer terminals if they are to stand a chance of getting a job in the future. As the report notes, "Every career will be some day linked up to a computer. A computer will touch everyone's life. A lack of knowledge in computer literacy or operation will severely handicap an individual."

We have known that for some time but have not really reacted yet to changes in technology to make sure our educational program includes a sound training in technology. This kind of educational lag always has existed, though, from the introduction of the first printing press and telephone to the first electric typewriter.

I continue to be amazed that some elementary teachers still put great emphasis on a child learning handwriting (cursive) when the child's future survival depends on his ability to handle a keyboard. I also am surprised that we have not started instruction in typing at the elementary level. But there always will be a gap between technology and our institutions, and our schools are no different.

Two years ago, for instance, the school district spent some \$100,000 on IBM electric typewriters

for the high schools. At that time the direction technology was taking was quite clear and \$100 grand would have purchased a good number of word processors. But the business department, board and administration still were thinking about typewriters, not processors and terminals.

Plymouth-Canton Schools do have computer terminals at many elementary schools where they are used for instructional purposes, and a good computer program has been implemented at the high schools.

But we are not yet at the point where we understand, let alone make use of, how computers will become part of our daily lives in the very near future.

Last Monday night the school board spent some \$80,000 for textbooks for the middle schools. I may be wrong, but my guess is that by the time those texts wear out textbooks no longer will be used in the schools but learning information will be retrieved from large data banks with individual terminals located at student "desks."

The future is sooner than we think. 1984 is two years away.

# Cash flow an early problem for Schoolcraft

(Part XIII)

In the fall of 1962, the board of trustees at Schoolcraft College had a problem.

District tax revenues were not due to come in until January 1963. Meantime, the board of trustees had to find a way to cover operating costs for 1962.

For the preceding four years, the college movement had existed on grants given from time to time by the school districts within its boundaries.

Now, in addition to meeting existing operating costs, the board had to hire additional staff members if the target date for the opening of the college was to be met (September 1964). But there was no money until the tax income arrived.

To cover its expenses for the first six months of 1962, the board had asked the school districts for a returnable grant totalling \$33,447. Based on their percentage of the total assessed valuation of property in the college district, Livonia was asked to supply \$21,660; Plymouth \$6,996; Garden City \$4,085; and Clarenceville \$1,706.

Late in September, the board got some relief from its financial problems when the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission gave the trustees permission to sell \$125,000 in tax-anticipation notes to be used for operations.

ON SEPT. 26, 1962, Dr. Eric Bradner, the college president, was able to announce that the board had approved two more administrative appointments.

James Dotseth of Lansing, who had been serving as consultant to trade and industrial education for the state Department of Public Instruction, was named director of technical education. Edmund Snyder of Oak Park, who had been librarian for Cranbrook Library, was named assistant librarian at the college.

The sale of \$2,435,000 building and site bonds for the community college was approved by the Michigan Finance Commission in mid-October 1962. The college board lost no time in giving Eberle M. Smith Associates the green light on architectural plans for the first four buildings in the college's master plan.

The general contractor for the first four buildings was Schurrer Construction Co. of Pontiac. A student service building (later called Administration Building) was to house administration offices, counseling service and the business area. The library, then planned as a two-story structure, was to seat 350 and have space for 40,000 volumes.

A third building, to contain academic and technical classrooms, was to be known as the Forum (because the architect planned to put an auditorium in the center of it). The last was a service building to house the electrical service panel, receiving facilities, and shop areas for maintenance and custodial use.

AN ADMISSIONS policy was established in November.

Non-residents of the college district were to be considered on the same basis as residents if openings were still left after residents enrolled. Transfer students were to have at least a C average.

During the same month, the board received petitions to join the college district from residents of Northville, Novi and South Redford. South Redford had turned down the opportunity in 1961, but educators and others in the district were making another attempt to convince the residents of the advantages of being part of Schoolcraft.

All of the petitions were forwarded by the college trustees to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for approval before the matter could be put to local vote. Novi and South Redford never did become part of the college, but Northville voted to become a member in June 1963.

It also was in November 1962 that Dotseth, the college's new director of technical education, began a series of meetings with area industrial and business leaders to discuss types of technical programs that would best prepare students for employment.

In January 1963, Paul Chandler, in the Livonia Observer, reported on his efforts to get the Army to locate a proposed training armory near the community college.

Chandler, who apparently originated the idea, said, "It would be a good placing of a facility which will contain rooms for public meetings and dances, and it could even be adaptable to use by the college students for their physical training. At present," Chandler said, "the college does not have funds to build a gymnasium."

A meeting took place between Bradner and Lt. Col. Floyd Plowman at which the matter was discussed, but nothing came of Chandler's suggestion.

On Feb. 6, 1963, the Guardian-Review of Garden City reported that Norman E. Dunn would join the college as registrar on July 1. Dunn, who was then director of pupil personnel service for the school system of Bay City, received his master's degree from Michigan State University and was principal

of Okemos High School before moving to Bay City in 1950.

At the same board meeting, the trustees set tuition rates for students. Those who lived in the college district were to be charged \$105 per semester, and \$8 per credit hour was set for those who enrolled with fewer than 13 hours. Rates for non-resident students were not yet determined.

IN A LWV questionnaire, Lucas gave his address as 525 Clinton, Detroit, which is the address of the Wayne County jail.

How, actually, was the League supposed to know his campaign address? Moreover, Lucas has not one campaign office but two — on W. Congress in Detroit and a "suburban" one on Schoolcraft Road in Detroit.

By the time the League could hand-deliver an invitation, Lucas already had a "prior commitment." Sure, sure.

THERE WERE some \$60,000 questions wafting for Lucas had he shown up — \$60,038 to be exact.

Someone on the Board of Auditors has let out fiscal information about Lucas that looks pretty factual. Livonia Mayor Ed McNamara and his people have been studying it. So has Bob Fitzpatrick, the county economic development director. They are the kinds of candidates who do bother to attend League forums.

The data shows that Lucas 1) has use of a county-owned, chauffeur-driven vehicle for all his office calls and 2) collects mileage for a personal car. Other information indicates he also has an officeholder expense account which leases a car and pays for the gasoline.

"No other elected county officials receive flat rate mileage reimbursement and have the use of a county-owned or county-leased car," says the auditor report.

THE NUMBERS look like this:

- Lucas collects mileage from the county at the rate of \$2,724 a year to use his personal car.
- The county provides a car and pays 23 cents a mile for Lucas to use. At 20,000 miles a year, the cost is \$4,600.

• The sergeant who supposedly acts as Lucas' chauffeur costs the county \$42,523 in salary and fringes.

• Lucas' officeholder expense account shows him leasing a car for \$8,063 a year and paying \$2,128 for fuel to operate it.

That adds up to \$60,038 for Lucas' transportation for the year.

In addition, there are some nice questions about whether Lucas uses the county car on campaign trips.

NOW, THAT'S only one side of it. I can think of logical explanations which might show the \$60,038 figure to be exaggerated, but that would be only guesswork. And maybe Lucas has some numbers of his own that he'd like to sling at other candidates.

The point is that Wayne County has been in a fiscal mess for years, the county staff has shrunk considerably faster than the population, the Sheriff's Department has lost a lot of deputies, and Lucas has some funny things in his fiscal record.

How, then, can this kind of record qualify William Lucas for the even bigger job of county executive?

It's the kind of an issue that needs the cross-fire of discussion. There are certain to be replies, and replies to replies. One speech won't settle the matter.

McNAMARA IS prepared to discuss it. So is Fitz. But Lucas won't show.

We need to hear from the candidates in a public forum. Not a Lucas PR statement. Not a deputies union president replying. Not a phone call to one of our offices from a sergeant.

Not letters to the editor from deputies' wives. Not a reply from a supervisor of a township which was reluctant to start its own police department because it would like the rest of us to pay the sheriff's road patrol to provide for the township with police protection.

And if you don't like getting only one side of the story, don't blame the auditors, or Ed McNamara, or me. Blame William Lucas.

By mere happenstance, The Stroller was seated in one of the latest model automobiles in his dealer friend's showroom looking over all the latest gadgets.

There was a digital clock, all sorts of air-conditioning knobs, a radio and a cassette playing the latest music, along with the usual gasoline gauge, and the mileage recorder and the speedometer.

These were just a few. There also were electrically controlled windows, a windshield wiper, for the front of the car and a red-lined installation in the rear window to keep it clean and clear on a rainy or wintry day.

"Wouldn't it be a thrill to own and drive one of these?" the dealer-friend asked, without revealing that the price of the modern marvel was well above \$13,000 for what was supposedly an intermediate size car.

It sure would," The Stroller agreed — with some reservations, however. It never would top the thrill he got when he was financially able to buy his first car.

Back in the little town he came from in Pennsylvania, only the rich people owned cars for pleasure. There were other cars around, but they were used mostly for business. And when The Stroller was growing up, he never dreamed the day would come when he

Then came the day when he met Edgar Guest, the famed Detroit Free Press poet, who invited him to join the Free Press sports staff.

The invitation was accepted and The Stroller's life was changed thereafter.

After establishing himself on the sports staff, The Stroller was assigned to cover the Red Wing hockey games. That got him acquainted with the legendary Jack Adams. This was a real friendship for Adams taught him the plays and the description of them. Finally, he invited The Stroller to be the official scorer with the promise of paying \$125 per game.

"Do you want the money after each game or at the close of the season?" Adams asked.

"At the end of the season," The Stroller replied.

When he was paid for the regular season and two playoff games, he was given a check for \$750.

The mere thought of owning an automobile was proof to The Stroller that he had made good on his journey away from his home town.

And when his mother learned of the purchase, she was said to have walked downtown to tell all her friends that her boy out in Detroit now owns an automobile. "He sure is making good," the proud mother probably told everyone.

All these thoughts came back to The Stroller the other day when he sat looking at all the new frills on the latest model. But even owning one of them wouldn't equal the thrill of owning one of the first Model A's put out by Henry Ford in the late '20s.

It was a thrill that will live forever.



# Board zaps Canton wizard; must build sidewalks

The battle between Canton's first video arcade and the Township Board rages on.

Trustees denied a request last week to release the owners of the Canton Wizard arcade from a previous commitment to install sidewalks from its

business to the southeast corner of Ford and Lilley roads. The arcade is on Lilley, just south of Ford.

Clerk John Flodin and trustees Robert Padgett and Loren Bennett voted to release the owners from the sidewalk

responsibility, which was part of conditional approval to open the arcade last January. Treasurer Maria Sterlini and trustees Steve Larson and Carol Bodenmiller dissented. Supervisor James Poole was not present at the meeting.

A 3-3 tie in voting defeats all motions. The board then unanimously agreed to extend the deadline for sidewalk construction to June 1, 1983. The arcade owners, Jamil Akhtar of Plymouth and Barbara Baldwin of Livonia, were supposed to have sidewalks installed by July 1 of this year, and, originally received an extension to Aug. 1, said acting planning director Dave Nicholson.

**PADGET BELIEVED** it was unreasonable for the board to request sidewalks for this property. He said he checked with Police Chief Jerry Cox, who reported no traffic problems existed with bikes in the area. Aaron Machnik, of the building department, confirmed that no formal complaints were registered through his office.

Larson and Sterlini both expressed concern over the safety of the area. Larson called it a moral dilemma.

"I'm going to feel really miserable if someone gets hurt," Larson said. The owners should follow through with their original commitment to build sidewalks in the area, he said.

Padgett argued that Marathon Oil has

a building permit and plans to construct a gasoline station, with sidewalks, on the southeast corner of Ford and Lilley, next to the arcade. It is foolish to make the arcade owners build sidewalks that may be torn down when Marathon begins building, he said.

Township officials do not know when Marathon plans to construct its station, however.

**IN OTHER BOARD** action, trustees passed the revised arcade ordinance with a unanimous vote. Arcade guidelines allow video arcades (four or more video machines) to remain open from 10 a.m. to 1 a.m. Originally, arcades closed at midnight. Youth under 17 must be accompanied by a parent after 10 p.m. in an arcade, according to the ordinance.

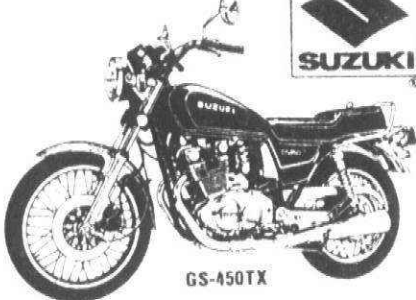

## Campaign in 6th District

# Senate hopefuls meet at forum

Republican and Democratic contenders in the 6th senatorial district agreed on one thing at last week's election forum sponsored by the Livonia League of Women Voters — they oppose state funding for abortions.

The candidate also tackled questions on taxes, roads, prisons and an equal rights amendment. They also offered their ideas on rejuvenating Michigan's depressed economy.

The Aug. 10 primary, pits incumbent State Sen. Robert Geake against challenger Norman Kinzel, a Northville Township businessman. Democrat Noel Culbert, a former Canton Township supervisor, is unopposed in the primary.

On the topic of an equal rights amendment both Culbert and Kinzel said they would support a state amendment. Geake said he would oppose such an amendment.

ON THE THREE most important measures the Michigan Legislature could enact to diversify the state economy, Geake recommended amending the unemployment compensation law to reinstate the one-week waiting period and to make people work 18 instead of 20 weeks in order to qualify for benefits.

"The state could save millions," said Geake, who also suggested the state use more money to promote tourism.

Geake reminded the audience that he opposed the temporary income tax hike.

"I favored cutting the budget \$300 million. I favored reducing grants to welfare recipients," said Geake, who is an educational psychologist and former administrator at the Plymouth Center for Human Development.

Geake said he advocates spending "less on welfare and more on education."

Tax credits are high on Culbert's list to help diversify the state's economy. He suggested offering tax credits for non-automotive related industries, tax credits for businesses which offer retraining programs for unemployed workers and tax credits in enterprise zones.

WHEN QUESTIONED whether taxes were the only thing that was discouraging business from locating in Michigan, Culbert replied, "It's about 10 of 15 other things including health insurance which is about 20 percent higher in Michigan, the single business

tax and worker's compensation."

Kinzel, a self-employed business consultant, said his priorities for diversifying the state's economy would be "totally reforming the tax structure", retraining workers and reforming unemployment insurance.

Kinzel charged that members of the Legislature have had plenty of time to make reforms.

"I don't see any political courage or leadership in Lansing, for this state to survive we need leadership," said Kinzel.

Geake told the audience that there "is a good chance the Republicans will take control of the senate this election and Mr. Kinzel will see the leadership he talks about."

When asked how they would deal with overcrowding in state prisons, Culbert and Kinzel said they favor more prison and more mandatory sentences.

"BECAUSE OF overcrowding, prisoners are being let out early to commit more crimes. It's not going to be easy but we must set our priorities. We must build more prisons," said Kinzel.

Culbert, an attorney, said he advo-

cates "setting aside more funds to build new prisons."

"Everyone wants more prisons but nobody wants them in their community," said Geake.

"We need to look at alternatives — more community rehabilitation programs such as early intervention programs for dealing with delinquent youths," added Geake.

When asked if they would support an increase in the state gasoline tax, Geake and Culbert, voiced their opposition.

"I'm against any tax increase. The (gas tax) doesn't do townships any good because it goes to Wayne County and the road commission spends about 60 percent of its budget for administrative costs," said Culbert, who promised to be "a hard fighter" for the 6th District.

Geake doesn't support increasing the gas tax. He said the money should come from general fund revenues.

"Earmarked monies have a tendency to dry up general fund revenues," said Geake.

Kinzel would support a "slight increase in the gas tax — one or two cents — if I could be sure it would be used for roads."

## Commission foes square off

Mary Dumas, a 10-year county commissioner representing Livonia and the Northville and Plymouth areas, says she wants to be a part of reforming Wayne County government next year when the new county charter, which she stumped for, takes effect.

Barry Sherman, her challenger, says his dissatisfaction with county government propelled him into seeking an active role to make sure that county reform actually takes place.

Dumas, 60, and Sherman, 30, — Republican contenders in the race for the county commission seat in the new 10th district — met and discussed the issues last week at the Livonia League of Women Voters election forum in Civic Center Park.

The questions centered on the county's fiscal condition, the creation of a new labor union for road commission supervisors, civil service exam cheating and the future of the D.J. Healy Youth Home.

WHILE DEMOCRATIC candidate Walter H. Roesler, 54, also participated, the absence of his primary challenger, William R. Ryan, 51, left the night open to a Dumas-Sherman face-off. Ryan was absent because of illness,

said Geraldine Joyner, program moderator.

Of the four questions taken from the audience, all were directed at Dumas. Sherman also responded. Roesler chose not to comment on any of the questions. He offered only opening and closing statements.

Both candidates said they opposed the formation of the controversial supervisors' union. The union has been challenged in court by several Wayne County Charter Commissioners. Dumas said "if it was possible" she would vote to overturn the contract. Sherman said he was "disappointed" that all county commissioners did not join in the court suit filed against the union.

As a member of an investigative team looking into the alleged abuses of the civil service testing procedures, Dumas was asked what work the group had done, to date. She said it currently is looking into whether the abuses were of a "criminal" nature. She added that the committee will "take it to court" if it is determined there were violations of the law.

SHERMAN CHALLENGED Dumas by saying the committee "had done nothing in taking testimony."

Dumas also said her action on cutting funding to the D.J. Healy youth home was a "painful decision and one I don't like to make. Unfortunately, the budget must be balanced." She also cited her past work in supporting juvenile programs. She also dispelled rumors that the center would close.

Sherman said: "As one (a police officer) who has taken children there (the youth home), there's no way I'd vote to close it."

Asked about the county's more than \$7-million deficit, and the commissioners' vote to place a one-mill tax increase on the August ballot, Dumas said she voted against placing the issue

on the ballot because "people are taxed up to their ears."

Dumas also disputed Sherman's figures for county commissioners' salaries. Sherman said commissioners were paid a salary of \$26,000 a year. Dumas pointed out that that salary was paid to the board chairman, not to its members. She said commissioners earn \$22,000 annually. However, on top of that salary, is a \$100 monthly allowance for travel expenses, plus \$65 per month for downtown parking fees, she explained.

The 10th District includes the cities of Livonia, Plymouth and Northville and the townships of Plymouth and Northville.

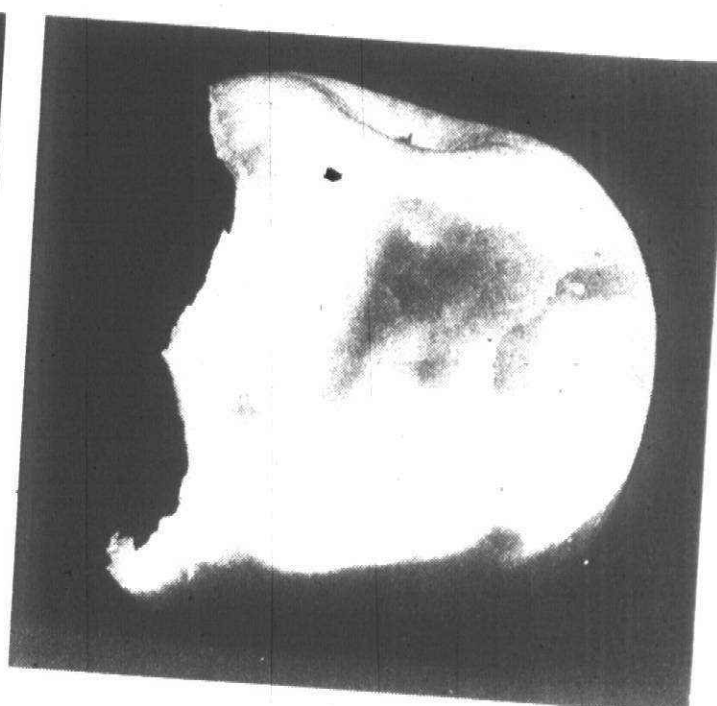
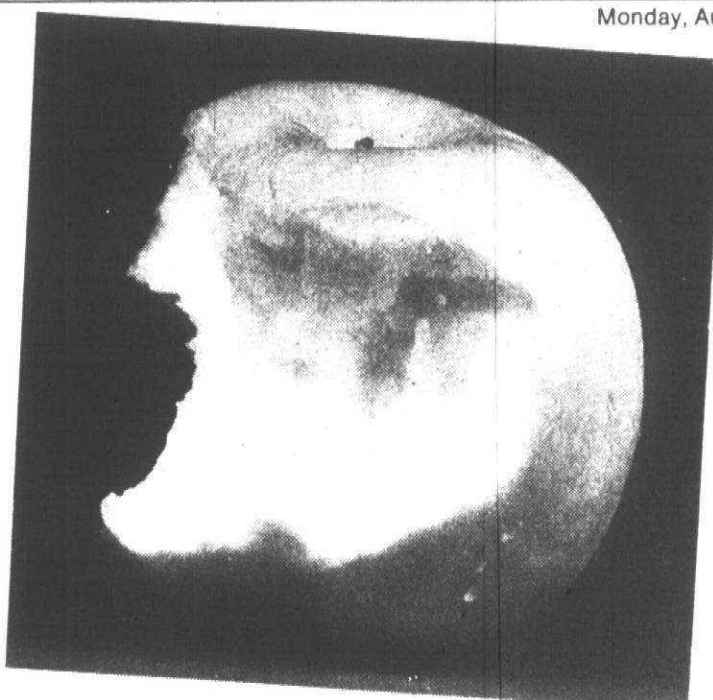

# Apples

Why wait  
till fall when  
you can eat 'em  
today?

No, it is not fall.  
No, the cider is not yet flowing.  
But the day is long gone when apples were a seasonal fruit; if you like them — and who doesn't? — why wait?

Plenty of fruit — both foreign and domestic, is available in stores this time of year. The domestic apples are put in "controlled atmosphere" storage in the fall. The foreigners are shipped over, and often are available on store shelves just three weeks after being picked.

Aficionados may complain that some apples from storage lose their fresh "crunch" but, according to Mark Arney, director of the Michigan Apple Committee, "If the conditions are correct, an apple should be just about as good as when it went in."

Arney is predicting a great year for Michigan apples, with a fall harvest of 21 million bushels — up considerably from last year's 16 million bushels.

"There should be some gems in the store because of almost ideal spring conditions," he says.

"I think you'll see one of the best crops."

One of the changes in the apple market, both here and abroad, has been an increase in the production of certain apples varieties that never turn red.

And the folks who import Granny Smith apples, the green ones available now in stores, have been doing their best to combat what they call "green apple syndrome," a deep-seated

belief that green apples are those sour things you got sick on as a kid.

Granny Smith apples are always green. And they're not sour. But most of us think of apples as being red when they're ripe.

Even the domestic apples growers have faced the problem, with such varieties as golden delicious. "An apple doesn't have to be all red to be good," says Arney.

Of such concern was this to the Granny Smith folks that a couple years back they hired a psychologist to figure out what type of person would be most likely to eat a glossy green Granny. They ended up with a personality profile of people who like various fruits.

Grape lovers, it seems, are often lazy, showy, a bit insecure, and like to strut around in designer clothes and be the center of the party.

Banana eaters are just the opposite — they don't like parties and they eat junk food. Besides being sex symbols, bananas are a throwback to soft, mushy baby food.

Oranges, which are messy and hard to peel, are for the meticulous and patient and people who like to work with their hands. Engineers and accountants often enjoy oranges.

And apples, as you might expect, turn out to be full of all sorts of good connotations, with traditionalists sticking to the reds and more flexible, open-minded types willing to eat greens.

This all comes up because this is the season for imported Granny Smith apples, what they say are the only "fresh" apples — meaning those not placed in storage — now available. They're shipped from the southern hemisphere, mainly Africa, where the growing season is in our winter.

The apples make it from tree to store in close to three weeks and are sold until September, when the domestic apple harvest is in full swing. About a million cases are expected to be imported this year.

"The beauty about them is that they're the only fresh apple you can eat in the summer," says Barbara Burman, a traveling publicist for Granny Smiths.

Granny Smiths are now being grown in Washington and California, but these still won't make it off the trees until fall with the reds.

The Granny Smith name comes from an English woman who emigrated to Australia in 1838. To help support the family, she operated a small orchard and sold the fruit in Sydney.

One day, a seller gave Mrs. Smith six Tasmanian French crab apples to cook. She tossed the seeds out her kitchen window, as the story goes, and one of the trees that grew from the seeds produced a large, green-skinned apple.

Cuttings from the original tree produced others and today the Granny Smith Memorial Park stands near her former home.

The nice thing about having fresh fruit in the summer, Burman notes, is that it's the time of year for informality, for snacking, for being outdoors.

"When we're eating fruit, we have no table manners. There's no right way to eat fruit."

## CRAN-APPLE CRUNCH

1 cup cranberry juice  
1 cup apple juice  
1 large apple

Wash, core and cut apple into small pieces. Put into blender with remaining ingredients. Blend until apple pieces are small but still crunchy. Makes two servings.

## YAM AND APPLE BAKE

2 16-oz. cans yams in syrup  
2 apples, cored, peeled and sliced  
½ cup chopped walnuts, divided  
4 Tbsp. light brown sugar

3 Tbsp. cornstarch  
1½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Drain yams, reserving ½ cup of syrup. Slice yams and arrange half in a greased 2-quart casserole. Place apples over yams. Sprinkle with ¼ cup of the walnuts and 2 tablespoons of the sugar. Top with remaining yams.

Sprinkle with remaining ¼ cup walnuts and 2 tablespoons sugar. Dot with butter. Combine reserved syrup, cornstarch and Worcestershire sauce. Pour evenly over all. Bake, covered, until apples are tender, about 45 minutes. Makes six portions.

## APPLE WINECREAM

1½ cups diced, pared apples  
2 Tbsp. sugar  
3 Tbsp. water  
½ cup sugar  
5 Tbsp. corn starch  
1½ cups white wine  
½ cup water  
2 eggs, separated

Stir together apples, 2 tablespoons sugar and water in medium saucepan.

Cover and simmer 2 minutes or until apples are tender. Drain. Mix together ½ cup sugar and corn starch in medium saucepan. Gradually add wine and water, stirring until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil and boils 1 minute. Beat egg yolks. Blend a little hot mixture into egg yolks, then stir all into remaining hot mixture in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, for 1 minute. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form when beater is raised. Fold apples and hot mixture into beaten egg whites. Pour into serving dishes. Chill. Makes seven ½-cup servings.

Salt

Shred the carrots and apples, using the shredding disk of a food processor, and put them into a salad bowl. Toss immediately with dressing so the apples do not discolor. Season with more salt and pepper if necessary. Serves six.

# Barbecue sauces

## Be creative on the grill for relaxing summer meals

It's hardly likely that, in the height of summer's swelter, you'll feel much like sitting down to a heavy meal of roast beef and Yorkshire pudding. In fact, it's hardly likely that you'll feel like turning on the oven at all.

But eat we must and, while a healthy individual's appetite normally diminishes during the warm weather months, his/her interest in food and its preparation does not necessarily diminish. It simply changes seasons.

Summer's bounty of fruits and vegetables opens endless menu possibilities for breakfast, lunch or dinner — nutritious possibilities that are as easy to digest as they are to prepare.

Typical winter breakfasts of hot cereal and griddle cakes evolve into light and fruity affairs during the summer.

Easy summer salads can be given a nutritional boost with the addition of tuna, eggs, leftover meat strips or shreds of cheese.

Lunch, too, takes on a seasonal appearance. Figure-conscious individuals lunch on cottage cheese mixed with any number of summer's offerings: fresh-off-the-vine cucumbers in a light vinaigrette dressing; plump home-grown tomatoes with oregano; fresh salad greens with chunks of cheese and fresh scallions.

### SWEET 'N HOT BARBECUE SAUCE

- 2 Tbsp. light brown sugar
- ¼ tsp. powdered mustard
- ¼ tsp. garlic powder
- ½ cup catsup
- ¼ cup chili sauce
- 3 Tbsp. tomato juice or water
- 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 cups cooked chicken, diced
- ½ cup celery, sliced
- ¼ cup raisins
- ¼ cup chopped walnuts, if desired
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3-4 Tbsp. French dressing

Mix diced apple and lemon juice. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Chill before serving. To serve, spoon mixture into pita bread. Makes 4-5 servings.

## TUNA PITTA MOMBO

- 6½ oz. tuna, drained and flaked
- ½ cup grated Swiss cheese
- ½ cup alfalfa sprouts
- 1 green onion, chopped
- 1 tsp. parsley flakes
- Black pepper to taste
- Creamy Italian dressing to taste



Combine all ingredients except salad dressing. Toss lightly. Add the dressing and mix well. Makes 4-5 servings.

## VEGETABLE MEDLEY

- 9 oz. cut green beans
- 10 oz. mixed vegetables
- Salad dressing to taste

Cook vegetables until crisp-tender. Season with favorite sweet-sour Italian dressing. Mix thoroughly. Marinate several hours before serving. Serves 4-6.

## RAZZ-A-MA-JAZZ

- 3-oz. pkg. raspberry gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- ¼ cup cold water
- 1 cup applesauce
- ¼ tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 cup non-dairy whipped topping

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; add cold water. In small bowl, mix applesauce and cinnamon, add 1 cup gelatin; blend well. Pour into desired container and chill. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened; fold in whipped topping. Spoon onto applesauce mixture. Chill thoroughly. Makes about four servings.

# Unusual filling makes chicken something big

Most every cook has a repertoire of chicken recipes to suit the most casual or formal occasion. No wonder. Most people like chicken.

When combined with vegetables, herbs and other ingredients, ordinary chicken becomes extraordinary. The gravy, which is already seasoned, acts as another flavor ingredient and gives a rich taste to such chicken dishes.

Here, boned chicken breasts are rolled around an unusual filling of carrots, raisin bread cubes, pecans, lemon juice and canned chicken gravy. Fried to a golden brown, the crispy chicken breasts are served with a cream style gravy that owes its ease of preparation and smooth consistency to canned chicken gravy.

- 3 whole chicken breasts, split, skinned and boned
- 3 Tbsp. flour
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- ½ cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsp. finely chopped onion
- ¼ cup light cream
- Parsley

In saucepan, cook carrots in 4 Tbsp. butter until tender. Toss lightly with 2 Tbsp. gravy, bread cubes, pecans and 1 Tbsp. lemon juice.

Flatten chicken breasts with flat side of knife to ¼-inch thickness. Spoon ¼ cup stuffing in center of each breast. Tuck in ends; roll tightly. Secure with toothpicks or skewers.

Dip in flour, then egg, then bread crumbs. Fry three rolls at a time in deep fat at 350 degrees for 8 minutes or until golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper.

Meanwhile, in saucepan, cook onion in 2 Tbsp. butter until tender. Stir in remaining gravy and lemon juice; add cream. Heat; stir occasionally. Serve with chicken. Garnish with parsley if desired. Makes six servings.

## CHICKEN BREASTS CRECY

- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 6 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1 can (10½ oz.) chicken gravy
- 1 cup raisin bread cubes
- ¼ cup chopped pecans
- 2 Tbsp. lemon juice

# Macadamia nuts liven up veggies in stir-fry

Stir-fry dishes made with beautifully colored vegetables cooked only until the texture is crisp-tender are both wonderful to look at and taste. A carrot and broccoli mixture with a tang of orange gets its special crunch and exquisite flavor from the addition of coarsely chopped macadamia nuts. The ingredients are assembled ahead of time, then stir-fried a few minutes before serving.

## MACADAMIA-BROCCOLI STIR-FRY

- 1 bunch fresh broccoli (1 lb.)
- 1 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- ½ cup orange juice
- ½ cup water, divided
- 1 tsp. sugar
- ½ tsp. ground ginger
- ½ tsp. salt

- 1 cup carrots, sliced diagonally
- 2 tsp. cornstarch
- ½ cup chopped macadamia nuts

Cut broccoli tops into florets and stems into 2-inch strips ¼-inch wide. In a large skillet, heat oil until hot. Add broccoli florets and stems; stir-fry until lightly cooked, about 1 minute. Combine orange juice, ¼ cup of the water, sugar, ginger and salt. Add to skillet. Cook and stir until broccoli is almost tender, about 1 minute. Add carrots; cook and stir until tender, about 1 minute.

Mix cornstarch and remaining ¼ cup water. Stir into skillet. Cook and stir until sauce thickens, about 30 seconds. Stir in macadamia nuts. Yields about 5½ cups.

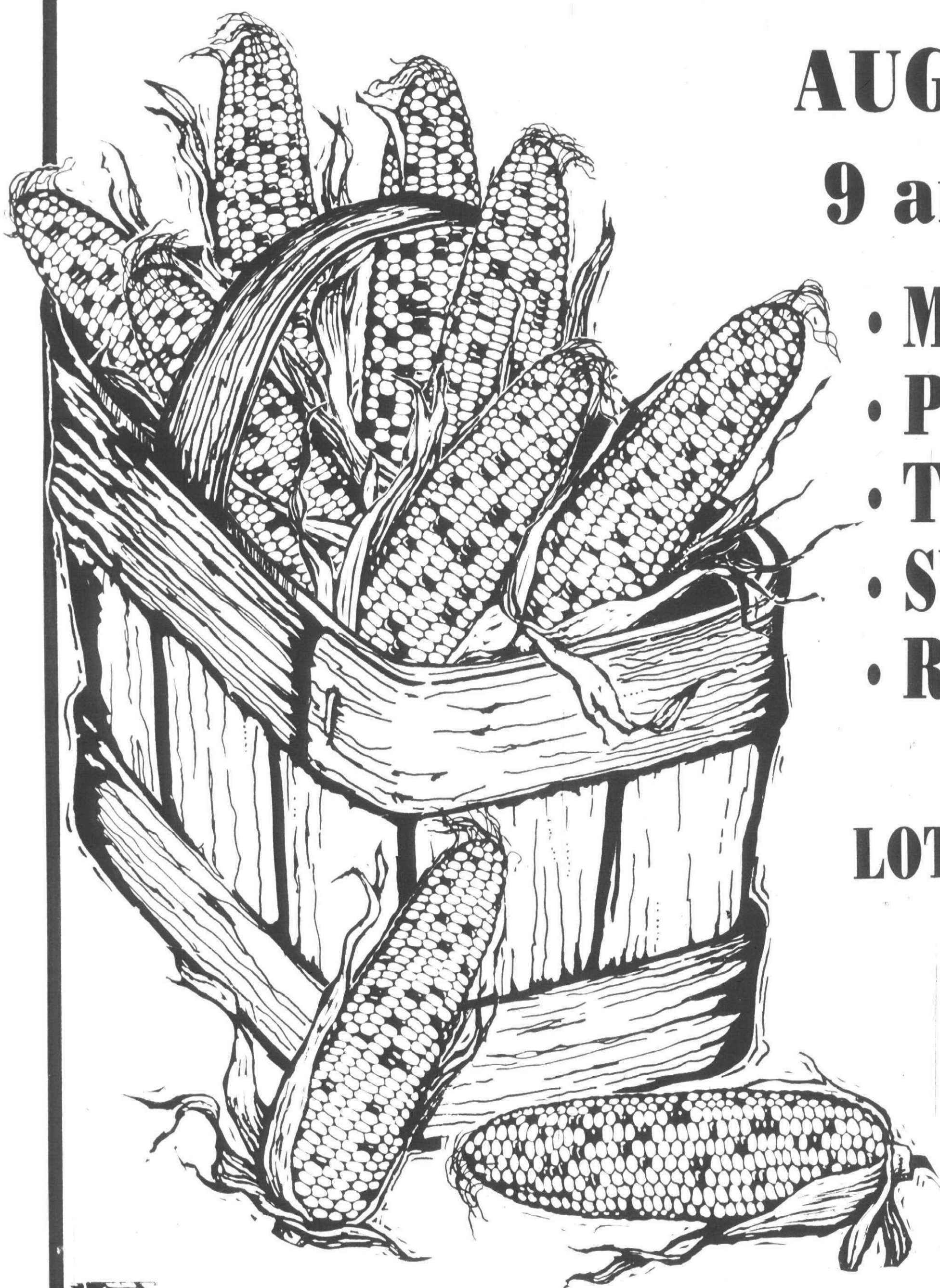

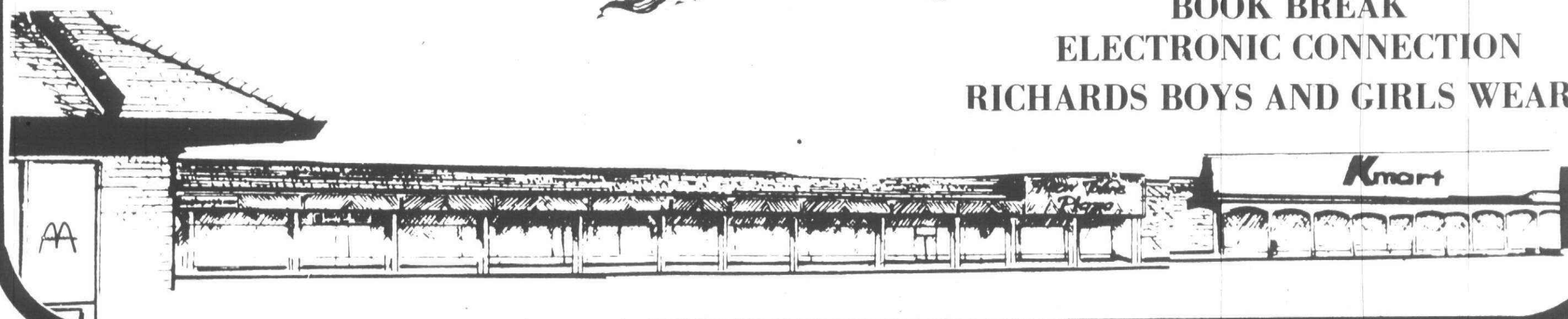

**Speakers advise the unemployed**By Judy Colmer

"A job interview that doesn't result in a job is only one person's opinion of you," said employment counselor Joan Greenfield to a crowd of 600 at Schoolcraft College's free career opportunities fair.

Greenfield joined author Jackie Lichty, Co-Operative Extension representative Judy Lazzaro, psychologists Dr. Allene Doctoroff and Dr. Roger Wittup, Schoolcraft College counselors and scores of other professionals in discussing unemployment, dealing with mid-life career changes, and how and where to seek help.

"We are each exquisite, complex individuals," Greenfield declared in a session called "Repackaging Yourself."

Greenfield said flexibility is the key to opening doors for jobs. Another speaker, Dr. Sonya Friedman, on whose TV show Greenfield has appeared, also

spoke in favor of being flexible.

"I like the idea of having many baskets, with eggs in each one," Greenfield said. "If you set up two interviews every day for a week and if one falls through, you still have others to fall back on."

"As a psychologist, I've found out that we have an inborn impression that what we do, and do well, anyone can do. Wrong! We each have our own unique talents."

"YOU ARE all valuable people," continued Greefield who is the Detroit News employment columnist and mother of three children under age 12.

"It is very important to realize who you are. In terms of repackaging yourself, we do not have to be overcome with distress to make a change."

Above all, stressed Greefield, a sense of humor is important, even for those faced with unemployment.

Jackie Lichty, author of "The Edu-

cator's Job Change Manual," said a divorce forced her into the working world nine years ago. She quickly added that was "the best thing that could have happened to me."

Lichty explained how the success formula ("knowing what you want") and the contact network ("the process of using a name to get to meet the person you want to meet") work to produce a job.

"GETTING TO Meet The People I Need To Know To Get The Job I Want," was the name of her workshop, and the game was clearly one anyone could learn to play.

"If you announce to the universe your goal, you will be surprised at how many people are willing to help you," she said.

She led the class into role playing to demonstrate the effectiveness of meeting people. She told the class members

to think of a person they wanted to meet.

The group then created what the speaker called "a huge cocktail party." The class was told to mingle, and try to develop contacts to meet the specific person each had selected.

Success! When the mingling was over, two people had met others in the class who provided a direct link to the person they wanted to meet.

"Getting to know the people you need to know is not easy," Lichty said. "It's something you can learn. It's a technique."

She called it the confidence factor. "It's fear that keeps us from doing the things we need to do to meet the people we need to know," Lichty said.

"MOST OF us feel about 12 years old about 30 percent of the time." But in the world of sales, or interviews, or any situation where courage is needed, "the only way to get over it is just to do it," Dr. Doctoroff and Dr. Wittup, Oak-

land County psychologist, dealt with the problem of stress, which can be rampant in periods of unemployment.

Doctoroff focused on the physical responses of stress: shallow breathing, tense muscles, slowed or stopped digestion, faster heart rate. Wittup focused on developing habits to combat stress.

"Try to develop at least four hobbies, two outdoor, two indoor," he advised. "With sleep habits, try to get a regular pattern, seven days a week, if you can," he said.

Common sense advice such as regular exercise at least four times a week and a diet void of foods high in carbohydrates, sugar and fats was recommended.

Setting priorities, Wittup said, should be arranged so you can feel accomplished at the end of the day.

"In terms of accomplishing something, think of your energy in terms of a laser: if you disperse the light, it won't do anything, but if you focus it, it can burn through metal."

# She'll aid survey studying why people get cancer

Leone (Stevie) Keenan knows a lot about cancer. She had a mastectomy. So when the Michigan division of the American Cancer Society asked for help on a survey to identify risk factors involved in cancer, the Westland resi-

dent volunteered. Her title is now unit chairwoman for Cancer Prevention Study II for western Wayne County. Starting Sept. 1, she and volunteers throughout the country will get busy on a survey that aims to discover what aspects of people's lifestyles might cause them to get cancer.

A million people will be surveyed across the country, 40,000 of them in Michigan and 19,000 in the Detroit area. The ACS is looking for general trends in the population in this epidemiological study, explained Susan Lewis-Phillips, director of public information. The society hopes it will bring in data that will suggest future scientific research projects.

IN THE SURVEY questionnaire will be queries about family history in relation to cancer and the cancer history of the individual surveyed.

Also to be considered are physical condition, smoking habits, diet, and vitamins and medications taken. Current and past occupations will be examined along with whether these jobs led to exposure to such materials as asbestos, formaldehyde, pesticides and herbicides, and radioactive materials or X-rays.

Participants will also be asked such miscellaneous questions and how long they have lived in the same neighborhood and whether they were in service.

"My job is to find group chairpersons, who will then find the researchers," said Keenan, who has made her

home in Westland for 21 years. "The researchers will take the questions to at least 10 families. The questions cover lifestyle and environmental factors that might relate to cancer. The society hopes to find things that cause cancer and things to do to prevent it. We hope to reach 3,000 people in western Wayne County."

She added that questionnaires can be sealed in an envelope so the answers remain confidential. Volunteers must know the families they survey. Settled families are preferred so they can be located for follow-ups. After the initial survey, a researcher's only follow-up job is to inform the Cancer Society if there is a death in the family or it moves. In that case, the researcher is asked to find the new address.

"YOU DO HAVE to answer all the questions," Keenan warned. "Volunteers have to explain this before a person agrees to be part of the survey. All questionnaires collected will be put in the ACS computer in Washington, D.C."

This volunteer grew up in Centralia, Ill. She and her husband, Fritz Keenan, lived in Chicago and then moved to Westland. There are two daughters, Ly-

dia Hammach of Dearborn Heights and Lorna, who lives at home.

Keenan worked 15 years for the J.L. Hudson Co., retiring 1½ years ago. She is now a distributor of Shaklee Corp. products. After her breast surgery, she worked as a volunteer for seven years for Reach to Recovery, the ACS group that counsels mastectomees.

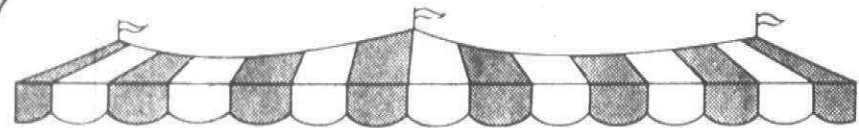
She thinks that volunteers who involve themselves in a project like the upcoming survey are "people who like to be helpful."

IN A PAMPHLET about Cancer Prevention Study II, the ACS points out that knowledge gained from this sur-

vey offers the possibility of preventing many cases of the illness, and thus reducing its toll of 420,000 Americans killed each year and 815,000 made ill.

The first Cancer Prevention Study from 1959-79 produced half a billion vital facts, according to the American Cancer Society and surveyed 1,078,894 Americans. In the six years that followed the survey, those questioned were followed up year by year.

Only 25,000 blacks were enrolled in the first study. In order to broaden its information base, CPS-II aims at enrolling a minimum of 100,000 black men and women.

# Canton gymnast keeps cool under pressure

Gymnastics is a test of physical prowess, to be sure. But a certain psychological ability is also necessary if the gymnast is to be successful.

The sport is one of precision. One erroneous move can cost the competitor a bundle of points.

Realizing this made Canton's Todd Olson a trifle uneasy as he prepared for the U.S. Gymnastics Federation (USGF) Boy's State Championships. But the 14-year-old knew how to handle the situation.

"I just pretended it (the state meet) was just like practice, and I went out there and did it," deadpanned Olson, who trains four days a week at Go-Fer Gymnastics in Canton under the coaching of Ron and Cindy Westerman.

**OLSON'S FORMULA** paid off. He won the all-around competition, taking first in the rings, pommel horse and parallel bars, second in the high bar and floor exercise and a third in the vault. Olson placed in all seven events in the 13-15 boys' age group.

"It felt great to do well," Olson said. "I was surprised."

Olson's performance was not as big a surprise to Westerman. "We're maybe a touch surprised," Westerman said.

"But we look back at it and say, 'He put a lot of work into it. He hit on his

routines here (in practice), so why can't he do it in the meets?'"

Olson's composure and ability to overcome nervousness in a meet of this stature earned Westerman's praise.

**"WE'RE EXTREMELY** pleased that he overcame his fears," the coach said. "Once you're physically able to do gymnastics, the only thing that can hold you back is your mental capability."

Olson, who will be a ninth grader at Pioneer Middle School this fall, got his start in gymnastics when he was 11.

His family lived in Novi at the time and Olson played baseball and hockey. But his parents, Doug and Evelyn Olson, noticed that their son enjoyed gymnastics. He often did handstands around the house, his mother said.

Encouraged by his parents, Todd joined a beginner's class at Novi Middle School, a program run through the school system.

"I heard about the practices at the school," Todd explained. "So I went there and I liked it."

**HE ABANDONED** his other sports interests in favor of gymnastics.

"We noticed that he liked it," his mother remarked. "So we figured, 'Why not have him put all of his energy in the same sport?' Obviously he liked it more than the others. And he seemed to have that natural ability."

But after three months in the class, the Olsons moved to Canton and Todd was forced to give up his sport for 1½ years. His parents debated whether he should commute back to his old class in Novi or search for something closer to home when they discovered Go-Fer Gymnastics, which opened in March, 1981.

The aspiring young gymnast tried

out for the Go-Fer team last June and made it.

**THE GO-FER** Gymnastics club, in its first year of USGF competition, has nine male and more than 70 female members. The boys' team is divided into three age groups, ranging from six to 15 years. The girls' divisions are separated by skill instead of age.

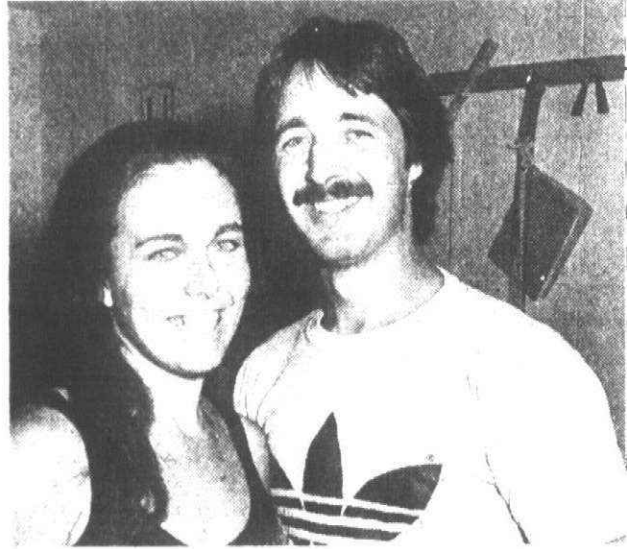
The Go-Fer girls competed as a team in the state meet, but there were not enough boys to be a factor in the team standings.

"But as individuals, we came out very good," Westerman said. "We did super as a team (with what we had)."

Despite its first-year status, the Go-Fer club left its mark at the state meet. Olson's firsts were a big lift for

the boys' team, and Dawn Cooper won the uneven parallel bars with a 9.15 point score in an earlier competition for the girls' squad. Cooper finished seventh in the all-around.

So, as Olson and Cooper develop their talent, the Go-Fer team should also improve. That makes the outlook for Olson, Cooper, the Westernmans and the Go-Fer teams a bright one indeed.



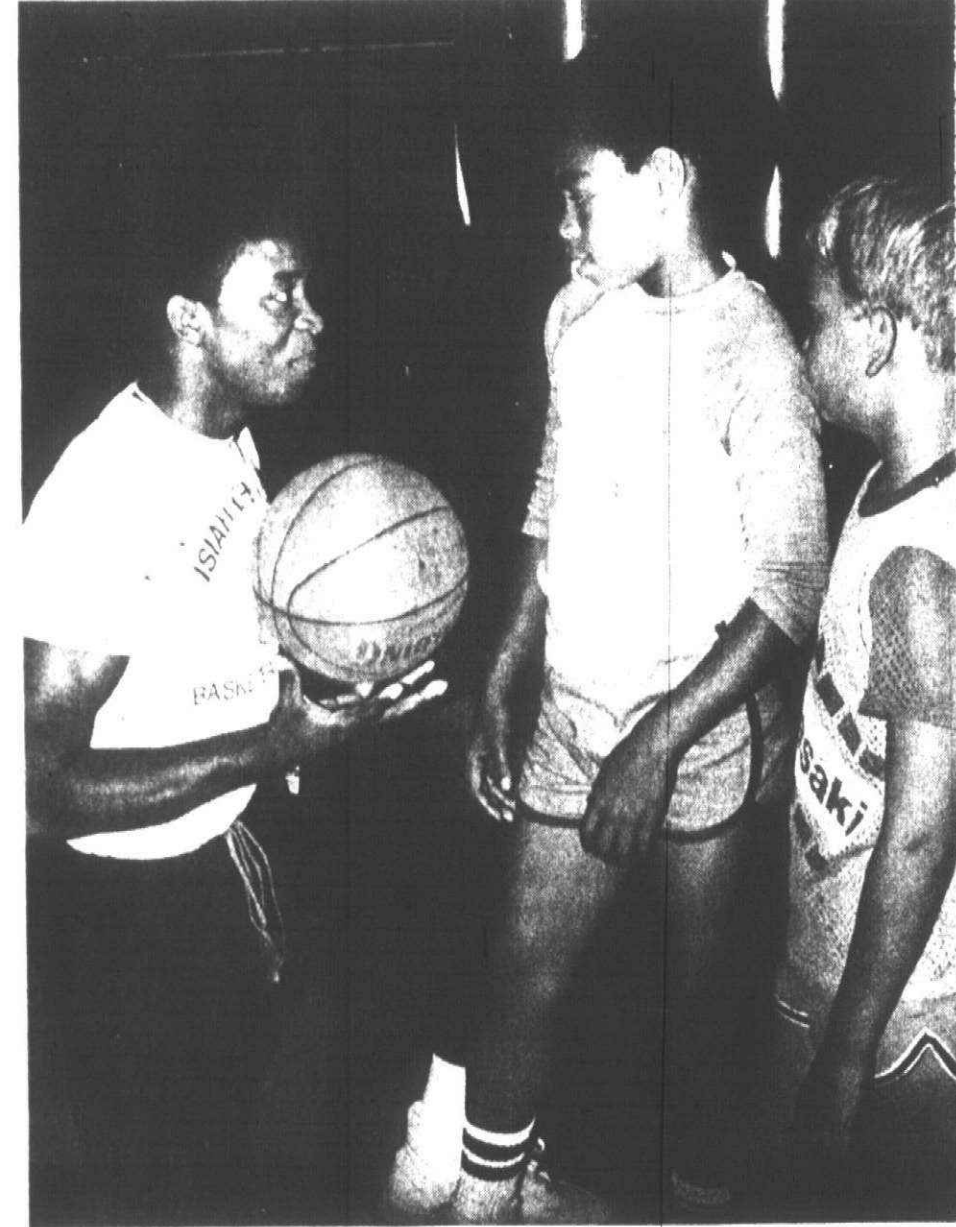
The Go-Fer coaches, Cindy and Ron Westerman

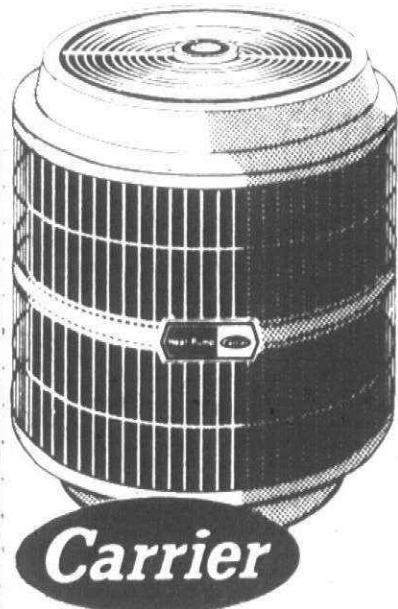
"Most of the instructors say, 'If you learn one thing well, the camp will have been worth it,'" said Meehan.

# Bartkowiak named to all-star grid team

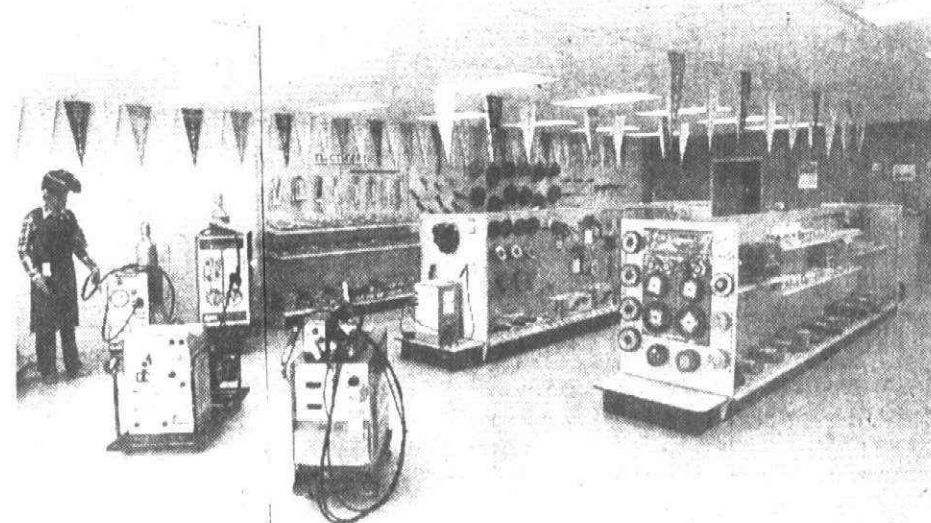

## Thoughtful drama approaches theme of officers' training

Before getting into the specifics of "An Officer and a Gentleman" (R), I'd like to ask you to recall all those movies you have seen about a recruit going through the rigors of basic training. They generally follow a similar pattern.

First we see the men losing their civilian identity and their individuality. They're issued the same clothing and given the same haircuts. Then we observe them going through the punishing physical demands of training.

Of course, all along they are being bullied, abused and whipped into shape by a super-mean, super-tough, but doing-it-all-for-their-own-good sergeant.

Finally, there comes the time when the hero rebels or cracks or otherwise is in danger of failure. This leads to the resolution. The crisis is overcome and the hero, along with most of his peers, successfully completes the training.

THESE MOVIES VARY just in details, according to which branch of the service is being featured. Often, they are just pieces of pufery for one of the services. Sometimes they are comedies, as in "Private Benjamin" or "Stripes."

Occasionally, they are even serious dramas. "An Officer and a Gentleman" is a serious drama.

It follows the plot principles outlined above, but it also differs in some important ways from other movies of its kind. It shows much greater interest in developing believable characters — people who have values, aspirations and pasts that influence their actions.

Also, it develops a credible love story that has a spontaneous and earthy quality to it.

Zack Mayo (Richard Gere) is the principal character. His experiences through 13 weeks of Naval Aviation Officer Candidate School provide the structural framework for the movie.

Debra Winger plays his girlfriend, Paula. It's another impressive performance for Winger, who previously was seen as the female lead in "Urban Cowboy" and "Cannery Row."

DAVID KEITH PLAYS Zack's friend Sid. Lisa Blount is Paula's friend, Lynette, and Louis Gossett Jr. is the tough sergeant, Foley.

There is a feeling of authenticity about "An Officer and a Gentleman" that undoubtedly stems from the writer's own experience in the military. Douglas Day Stewart, who wrote the script and served as associate producer, did graduate from Naval Officer Training.

He gives us an insider's view of the training program that is interesting in itself. It is the attention to the human relationships, however, that makes this movie above average for its kind.

ZACK DOES not appear to be officer material. He is a street-fighter type and a loner. He does not give of himself or show concern for others. There is no doubt about his physical prowess, but his mental attitude and his leadership qualities are in doubt.

Similarly, his girlfriend, who works in a paper factory, does not outwardly seem to fit the role of an officer's wife. Nevertheless, it is Paula's genuine interest in Zack as a person, along with the friendship he develops with another candidate, Sid, that awakens new feelings in Zack that affect his career and his life.

The director, Taylor Hackford, gets excellent performances from the entire cast and develops the story in a way that gives the movie an absorbing, realistic quality.

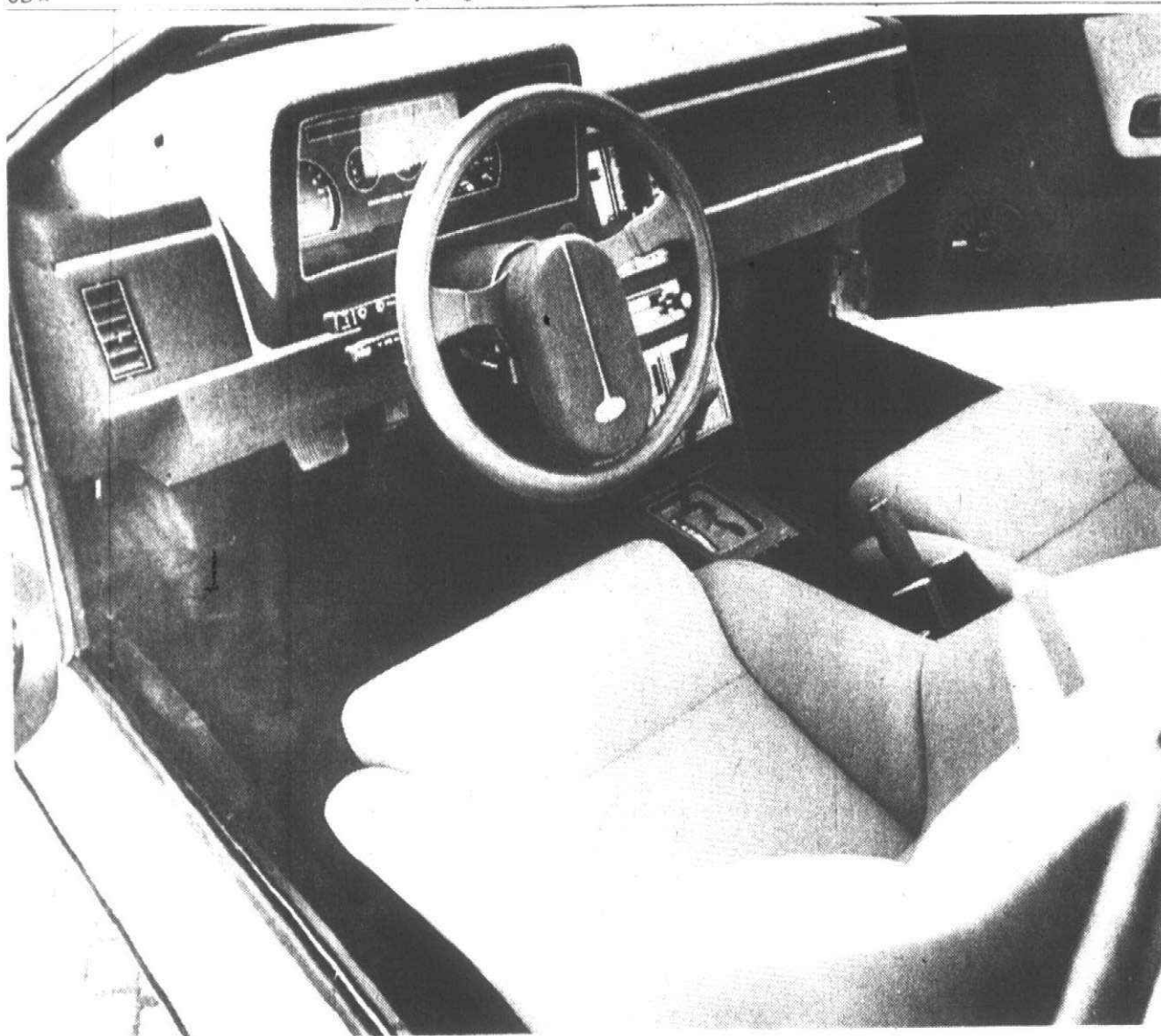

# Checking belts and hoses can prevent overheating

You're driving along and suddenly the red temperature-warning light goes on. This can happen on a long highway trip or while bogged down in a traffic jam.

In either case, it's an inconvenient experience. The Automotive Information Council offers suggestions on how to keep that warning light from coming on (other than by pulling out the light bulb).

**TO PREVENT** the failure, AIC urges motorists to check all hoses in the engine compartment at least twice a year. It's a simple matter.

Squeeze the hoses. If even one feels "mushy" or shows fine cracks, it's time to replace all of them. When one shows signs of weakness, the rest won't be far behind if they all are the same age.

The AIC also advises that all belts be checked at the same time. Look for cracks and frayed edges, and be sure they are not loose. Belt replacements

also are easily accomplished, but a belt that breaks while driving can pose a real problem and possibly a ruined engine.

**IF THE** temperature light goes on, pull off the road and look for a hose leak. If you are prepared, you'll have some tape in the glove box or trunk.

Wrap tape tightly around the hole, add water to the radiator if available (even soda pop has been used in an emergency), leave the radiator cap loose and drive slowly to the nearest service facility for a new hose.

If a belt breaks, call for the service truck. If not available, let the engine cool and limp along until the red engine temperature light goes on again. Then stop and wait.

Better yet, says the AIC, avoid the problem by doing a hose and belt check in your driveway at your convenience.
