County maps local flood control work

Everyone agrees flooding is bad in Plymouth, Canton and Northville, but local officials aren't sure they can afford the remedy.

The Wayne County Drain Board is

proposing a \$7.3 million project to improve drainage of the Tonquish Creek, which periodically overflows and floods Plymouth, Canton and Northville.

If the project is approved, most of the costs would be split among the city of Plymouth, and the townships of Canton, Plymouth and Northville. Ply-

mouth and Plymouth Township would carry the lion's share.

The drain board will hold an apportionment hearing at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in Plymouth City Hall on Main Street. Reaction among local officials ranges from support from the city of Plymouth, to strong objections to the cost by Plymouth Township.

"Obviously, there is a serious (flooding) problem," said Glenn Roberts, an engineer with Wade, Trim and Associates, a consulting firm to Canton. "Everyone recognizes that."

THE PROJECT dates back to the late 1960s, when these communities requested help from the county to ease flooding. Several studies were made, and the drain board determined in 1972 that the work was necessary. But construction never began.

According to Roberts, the project would ease flooding in residential areas of Plymouth Township, business areas in the city of Plymouth and commercial strips along Lilley Road in Canton.

Questions among local officials focus on costs, the method of funding (each community would finance its own portion), and how binding the commitment is. Could a municipality legally withdraw from the project?

Since the late 1970s, the Headlee tax limitation amendment to the state constitution has hampered the ability of local governments to raise taxes for public works projects.

"It makes a lot of sense to do it together (as a joint project)," said Canton Supervisor James Poole. "On the other hand, it makes sense to know if you want to spend the money."

The project is needed, says Ken West, engineer for the city of Plym-

outh. "In the five years that I have been here, our citizens have suffered a quarter-million dollars in damages from two floods," he said.

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP cannot afford the project, says Supervisor Maurice Breen. Officials also don't like the county's control over the project.

The Plymouth Township Board recently voted to oppose the construction plan, as set forth in the latest reports. Officials also are considering withdrawing from the project — a move which is disputed by the attorney for the drain board.

"The plan is way beyond the township's capability to finance at this point," said Breen. "They (drain board) waited 10 years to get going on the project, and they gave us 10 days to make decisions. We need time to go back and review all the material."

Although the drain board "isn't interested in ramming (the project) down anybody's throats," individual communities don't have the power to withdraw from the project, said Jeff Suprowit, attorney for the drain board.

Communities which benefit from the project must pay their share, he said.

"As a matter of law, it's the board's authority," Suprowit added. "As a matter of practicality, we would exercise discretion in the matter. As a legal technicality, the township doesn't have the power to opt out."

Hearing slated on drainage costs

The Wayne County Drain Board will hold a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in Plymouth City Hall, to discuss how costs will be divided for a proposed drain improvement.

The plan in question is a \$7.3 million construction project to improve drainage of the Tonquish Creek, a tributary of the Middle Rouge waterway. The creek causes flooding in Plymouth, Canton and Northville.

The greatest share of costs for the project would be split among the city of Plymouth, and the townships of Canton and Plymouth. Northville Township, Wayne County and the state government will pay small portions.

ACCORDING TO engineering studies, the Tonquish Creek channel will be

cleaned. Retention ponds will be built north of Ann Arbor Road.

South of Ann Arbor Road, there will be enlargement of the creek channel, along with construction of larger culverts. Some bridges will be rebuilt to allow storm water to flow more freely.

If the drain board approves the project, work would begin in early 1983. It would take nine months to a year to complete, say engineers.

TENTATIVE APPORTIONMENT of costs for engineering reports is based on the percentage of land in the drain basin for each community, say officials.

Construction costs would be based on benefits derived from the project, considering land in the basin, amount of construction in the community, expect-

ed amount of storm flow and past flooding.

In both categories, Plymouth Township carries the largest share — 53 percent of costs for reports and studies, and 43.2 percent of construction expenses.

The city of Plymouth's share is projected at 12.3 percent for studies and 35.8 percent for construction.

Canton's share will be 22.7 percent of the cost for studies and 12.10 percent of the construction expenses. Northville Township's share is less than 3 percent in each category. Wayne County and the state make up the remaining portions.

If the plan is approved, each community would determine its own method of funding the project — through bond issues, millage or special assessments.

Schools to buy new computers

Apple II computer terminals and related equipment will be purchased for use in Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools at a cost of \$37,000.

Four of the new computers will be located alongside two existing terminals in the Learning Resource Center in Salem with the other 16 new computers going to Canton High.

The purchase of 20 terminals will help accommodate the increasing number of seniors signing up for computer math instruction at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

This coming semester, for instance, the computer math class sizes will be 37, 36, 36, 35, 42 and 38.

The added machines will give students more time on the terminals, Principal Bill Brown said during a recent appearance before the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education to answer questions.

In the second semester of the coming school year, Brown added, there might be a possibility of adding an advanced computer course. If not in the second semester, said Brown, than at least by fall, 1983.

The problem with adding an advanced course or any additional classes in computer science, Brown said, is that additional staff will be needed.

Locating four new units in Salem

will allow high school staff members there time to become more familiar with computers and to build programs for instructional uses in their classes.

Putting four terminals in Salem also will make it easier for Salem computer students to get terminal time for classwork.

The computer classes still will be offered at Canton High under Ron Carlson with assistance from Tom Cotner.

While discussing the purchase of terminals at the CEP, a longer range view of the use of computers for learning was given by Dr. Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction.

Homes said that in early summer, a K-9 committee on computer curriculum was organized and that the group will be working with the board's computer technology committee with the idea of coming up with a K-12 computer curriculum which might be ready for implementation by the fall of 1983.

After the purchase of the 20 units, the CEP will then have 33 computer terminals. Brown noted that all terminals were purchased with the high schools' block grant monies and did not require any additional funds in the budget.

The board voted to approve the purchase 6-0. Trustee E.J. McClendon was absent.

Seniors develop appetite for hot lunches

Time is no longer running out on the

daily hot lunch program for senior citizens at the Canton recreation center on Michigan Avenue and Sheldon.

The nutrition program, which serves

lunches to senior citizens in the area, was in danger of being closed for lack of participation. Last spring, the center was serving only about 15 lunches a

day. When new attendance guidelines were passed, the center needed at least 25 participants a day or it would be shut down in October, when the guidelines go into effect.

But thanks to some hard selling by Madeline Carpenter, coordinator for the Canton site, the center is now averaging about 25 lunches per day and will not be closed in October.

But should the attendance level fall, however, the program again would be in danger of closing.

"We picked up a little bit, but it will be an on-going push to keep the center open," Carpenter said. "We're just keeping our heads above water."

THE BIG ADVERTISING push came last spring when Carpenter put up posters, sent out newsletters and talked to senior citizen groups in the area.

THE FOOD at the center is cooked at the J Building on Wayne County property and brought to the site, where it is kept warm in steam trays.

She works at the Health Screening Program at the Canton Recreation Hall and in the office at the Recreation Hall. She plays the banjo-uke in the Canton Senior Citizen's Kitchen Band. The band plays at nursing homes and churches in the area.

Roettger also works on the community council of the Dion Nursing Home to help plan activities and better conditions for the 95 residents. She is involved in the social service women's group of Bethesda Lutheran Church and the Luther-Haven Retirement Home for the Aged.

Roettger pays monthly visits and does programs for the Cambridge Nursing Home in Redford. She worked on the Canton Festival Services, she was on the senior citizen's float in the Canton Parade and worked at a booth during the festival for the Dion Nursing Home.

She has been married for 50 years to her husband, Milton, and has two daughters and five grandchildren. She enjoys helping others and isn't sure when she will retire from volunteering.

"Not for a long, long time," she said. "I'm only 75."

Aimed at imports

Proposed auto legislation will raise new car prices

Domestic content requirements for automobiles sold in the U.S., as proposed in current legislation, would add a surcharge of \$3,200 for every American consumer buying a Japanese automobile and raise domestic small car prices as well.

That conclusion was made last week by Tom Bohlander, owner-operator of Sunshine Honda on Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth.

In making the statement, Bohlander referred to a just-completed study by the Boston-based research firm of Harbridge House.

The study, commissioned by the American International Automobile Dealers Association, found that the quotas put in place by the Japanese government in April 1981 already have added \$1,900 to the cost of Japanese cars in the U.S. and that the domestic content law would bring that surcharge to \$3,200.

Voluntary restrictions by the Japanese government the past two years have proven that quotas just don't work, says Bohlander, because domestic sales have slipped even lower during this period.

Without competition, he added, the domestic industry would have no incentive to hold the price line or build quality fuel-efficient cars.

By acting as a quota on imported automobiles, the domestic content legislation (HB 5133 and SB 2300) would reduce imports by as much as 40 percent, the study found.

Using the existing "voluntary" quota as a yardstick, researchers then arrived at the \$3,200 surcharge.

DOMESTIC CAR PRICES also can go up, according to the study, because

American manufacturers concede they lose money on U.S.-made subcompact cars.

If prices of imports increase sharply, researchers claimed, domestic manufacturers have shown in the past that they are ready to follow suit.

Harbridge House based its conclusion on "the demonstrated readiness of domestic manufacturers to raise their own prices sharply under the umbrella of price increases by their Japanese competitors, seeking to improve the

profitability of these vehicles rather than attempting to capture a larger market share by underpricing their competitors."

Harbridge House researchers calculated that the \$1,900 surcharge on Japanese cars as a consequence of the present quota was based on a combination of scarcity-based pricing and the absence of any need to pass along to the American consumer the benefits of a strengthened dollar.

The researchers also found that the Japanese response to the quotas was to

upgrade the model mix of cars shipped to the U.S., increasing the numbers of higher-priced cars and reducing the volume of low-priced economy cars available to the consumer.

This latter tactic, says the firm, was responsible for \$734 of the \$1,900 consumer penalty.

Domestic content legislation is under consideration in both the U.S. House and Senate. Supported by the United Auto Workers (UAW), the legislation would require any firm selling more than 100,000 automobiles annually in

the U.S. to include certain percentages of U.S.-made content. Requirements would range from 25 to 90 percent domestic content by 1985.

Critics charge that no foreign manufacturer can meet the requirements of the bill, pointing out that Volkswagen has been manufacturing in the U.S. for four years but has yet to achieve a fleet average domestic content as high as 50 percent.

The bill, critics argue, would act as a simple quota — reducing imports by more than one million units a year.

At Joy and Haggerty Man charged in traffic death

A 20-year-old Livonia man has been charged with manslaughter in connection with the Aug. 8 traffic death at Joy and Haggerty roads in Plymouth Township.

Kyle C. Gniewek, of Auburndale, stood mute to the charge in 35th District Court Friday morning. An innocent plea was entered for him and

Judge Dunbar Davis set personal bond at \$5,000.

He was released pending a Sept. 9 preliminary examination to determine if there is sufficient evidence to bind him over to Wayne County Circuit Court. Manslaughter is a felony which carries a maximum sentence of 15 years.

Daniel P. Tordup, 21, of Canton, died as a result of the accident. Tordup's car was heading westbound on Joy when it collided with a car heading southbound on Haggerty, according to Lt. Ralph White of Plymouth.

The driver of the southbound car had left the scene by the time police arrived, leaving the empty vehicle be-

hind, according to White. Gniewek has been identified as the owner of the car left at the scene.

Through investigation, Gniewek was determined to be the driver of the car, White said.

Traffic officer Robert Henry investigated the accident, the second of four traffic-related deaths in Plymouth during August.

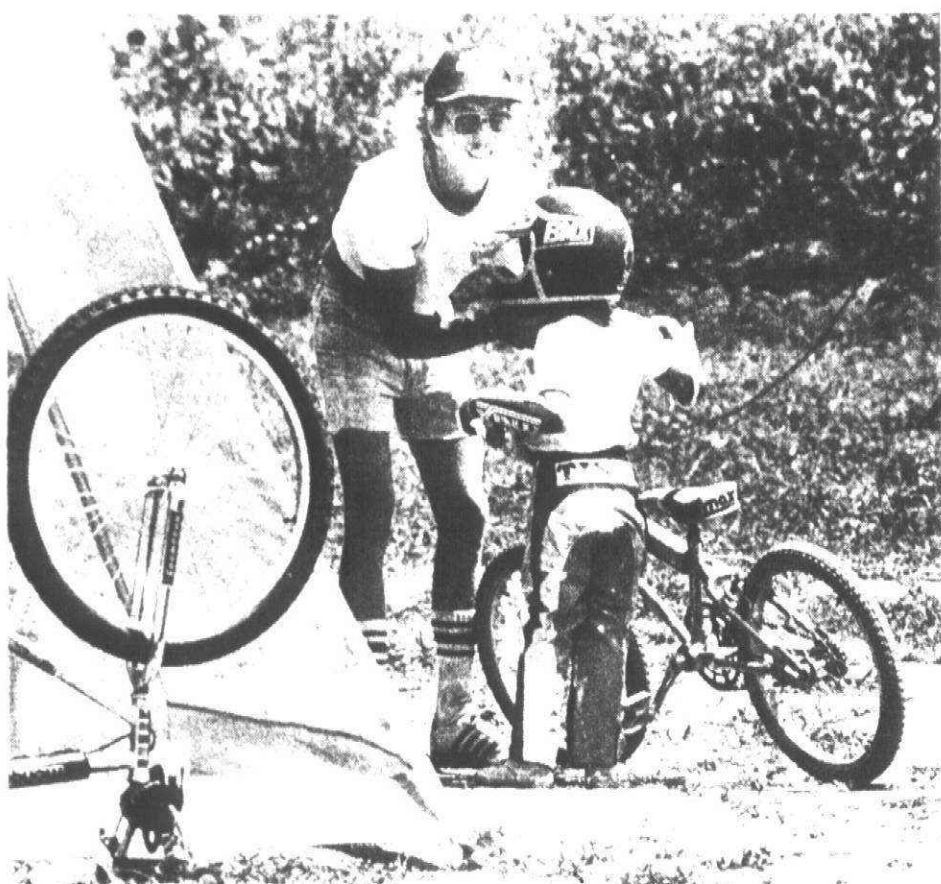

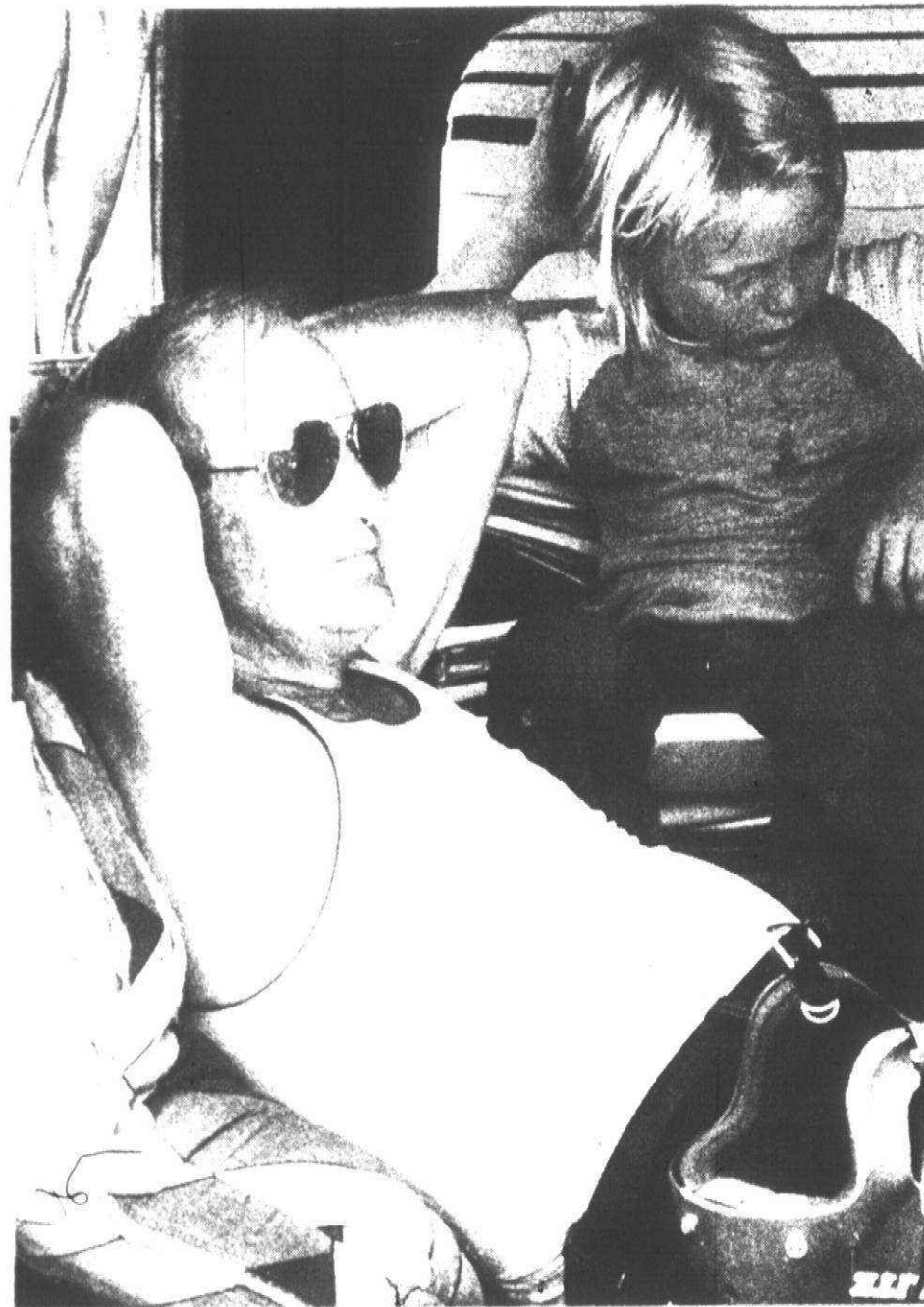

BMX

A dirt-digging, sweat-raising bike sport

Riding a bike takes on a different aspect when you're riding in a grueling bicycle moto cross (BMX) competition. BMX riders race every other Sunday at the BMX track in Canton Township, at the Woodland Meadows Landfill off Michigan Avenue in the southeast corner of the township.

The races are part of the American Bicycle Association BMX circuit. The Canton track is one of two BMX tracks in Michigan's first BMX district.

"A lot of the kids don't know there's a track so close to them in the district," says Sue Wrenbeck of Easy Rider Bike Shop in Canton, which co-sponsors the races with the township parks and recreation department.

Wrenbeck's husband, Gordon, is the director of racing at the track.

Each competitor races in three races, called " motos," hoping to go on to the main elimination races.

The motos consist of a race down the 900-foot track, which lasts less than one minute. The track was designed by Easy Rider.

"They start on a 30-foot hill and attack the track," says Wrenbeck.

There also are extra events like the wheely riding competition.

A rider must be a member of the American Bicycle Association. There is

no limit on age and both males and females are welcome to compete.

On July 25 the track sponsored a race which brought participants from as far as Arizona and Washington, and as close as Canton, Plymouth, Westland and Romulus.

On an average day at the track there are about 165 riders, with about 350 people watching.

The races go on rain or shine, says Wrenbeck.

There are a few accidents, but the Canton track has one of the safest records for a BMX track, she says.

The track caters to beginners, and interested people can call Easy Rider at 455-5730. Entry fee is \$6 per rider and registration time is 9-11 a.m.

Recall election still set to go

Wayne-Westland School District

The district serves southeast Canton

The Sept. 14 Wayne-Westland school board recall election will go on as scheduled following action by a Wayne County circuit judge.

Judge John Kirwan Thursday afternoon ruled against four board members, targets of the recall campaign, who sued to stop the election.

The four, Mary Arbour, Mildred Batterson, Kenneth Marshall and Donald Rusnock, filed a civil suit several weeks ago.

Judge Kirwan's ruling was issued after about 40 minutes of discussion by attorneys for the four board members and Taxpayers United Together (TUT), which initiated the recall election with the May 6 filing of petitions with just over 5,300 signatures for each of the four officials.

The four had sued the clerks from Wayne County and the cities of West-

land and Wayne and the county election in an effort to block the election.

TUT formally joined the case Wednesday as a co-defendant.

The hearing Thursday followed one on Monday at which Kirwan ruled against the board members on a claim they were denied due process because the clerks refused to allow them to review petitions and check signatures.

The judge's ruling Thursday was hailed by TUT leader Rosemary Miller in a court hallway interview immediately after the hearing ended.

"IT'S ANOTHER victory for TUT and for the people," she said. "In so many things people lose."

On the other side of the conflict, Arbour said she wasn't surprised while Marshall commented he was disappointed.

But through their attorney, E. Peter Drolet, they will continue the suit against Kirwan said that if the board members could get 400 people (which represents the number of petition signers over the 4,900 signatures required) to say they were misled he would continue the case.

If that happens, it would result in fewer than the minimum number of required signatures and possibly force the cancellation of the election.

WHY REPLACE MISSING TEETH?

Why is it so essential that missing teeth be replaced, even if they are in a part of the mouth that doesn't show?

For starters, the teeth on either side of the space may drift into the space and close it. This is unhealthy, since the roots of our teeth are designed to absorb stress in a vertical direction. When a tooth tilts, it is no longer taking the stress the way nature intended. The result may be periodontal pockets (separation between gum and teeth) causing food traps, gum disease and decay. This will require further dental treatment and, possibly, premature loss of these additional teeth.

Also there is the problem of the tooth directly above or below the space. Without the bite pressure on it, it may move upward or downward into the open space, causing a problem of tripping the teeth as you move the jaw from side to side. This will tend to loosen the adjoining teeth and lead to further lost teeth. In a nutshell, if you have missing teeth, they should be replaced as soon as possible to prevent the "Domino Effect" of further tooth loss.

The year Salem forgot to levy college millage

Part XVI

Clara Rousseau was among the first hired by Dr. Eric Bradner in 1962, the year Pat Butler, Ken Lindner, Lois Waterman, James Dotseth and Edmund Snyder joined Schoolcraft College.

Rousseau, Bradner's secretary during the early years, later became administrative assistant to the president, and associate secretary to the board of trustees.

By the time she retired, after taking board minutes for two-score years, she probably knew as much about the college, and the various trustees who had served on its board, as anyone else on the campus.

Hired in 1963, the year Norman Dunn, Ed McNally and Harriett Sattig came aboard, were Robert Stover and Ken Burton. Stover, who became the college custodian at the old Newburgh School in March 1963, is now Schoolcraft's supervisor of plant

operations. Burton, who was hired in September, was supervisor of buildings and maintenance at the college until he retired in April 1972.

SCHOOLCRAFT RECEIVED good news in February 1964. It came from the University of Michigan, Michigan State, Wayne State and Eastern Michigan. All wrote to assure the college that its students would find their credits transferrable to the four-year institutions.

During the same month, the Michigan State Board of Nursing, after reviewing the planning of

Sattig, approved the practical nursing program at Schoolcraft. This approval guaranteed that students graduating from the program would be eligible to write the state board examinations for license as practical nurse.

On May 21, the Northville Record reported an extraordinary lapse on the part of the Salem Township treasurer. He had forgotten to levy the one mill college tax on the 1963 bills of Salem Township residents who lived in the Northville part of the college district.

The college was due \$1,007, but the state auditor general's office ruled that the tax could not be double-levied the following year. One the recommendation of business manager Ken Lindner, the college trustees voted to recover the money from the bonding company.

It also was in May that Bradner informed the board that, until the college got a physical education building, arrangements had been made to hold the men's physical education program at facilities of the Northville State Hospital, and the women's at Ladywood High School.

By mid-1964, three months before the college was scheduled to open, it was clear to the board and administration that the institution would need more facilities than had been expected. The four buildings then under construction had been designed for 900 students, but Schoolcraft already had 1,303 qualified applicants.

"Enrollment demands are more than two years ahead of schedule," Bradner told a Detroit News reporter on June 7, "and we expect 4,500 students by 1966 or '67, instead of 1971."

TO MEET THE influx, the board asked voters to approve a \$1,250,000 bond issue to provide for additional buildings.

This issue would not require a tax increase, and, matched with \$1,550,000 available from state and federal governments, would give the college a fund of \$2.8 million with which to construct four more buildings — a student center, a technical educational facility, a classroom building and a physical education plant.

The vote was held June 8. The bond issue carried in all districts by a total of 5,597 to 1,527. The board announced that it was commissioning Eberle M. Smith Associates of Detroit to design the campus center and the physical education building. The Livonia firm of Ralls-Hamill-Becker was commissioned to design the classroom building and the technical center.

Several appointments to the college staff were made during the first half of 1964. In March, G. Ann Moore, now director of purchasing at Schoolcraft, was hired.

At about the same time, Wayne Dunlap, well-known director of music in the Plymouth-Canton school system, was appointed to head the college's music department. A graduate of Texas Christian University, and holder of a master's degree from the Eastman School of Music, Dunlap then was conductor of the Plymouth Symphony orchestra, and

had served as conductor of the Grosse Pointe Symphony, the West Shore Symphony and the South Oakland Symphony orchestras.

It also was in March that John H. Brinn came down from Delta College, where had been dean of the community service school. Brinn became Schoolcraft's second dean of instruction, replacing Jerry B. Mitchell, who held the position for a short time before Brinn arrived. A dedicated educator, Brinn served at Schoolcraft for four years. He left to go back to teach mathematics because he did not like administrative work.

In July, L. Dell Reed, Fernon Feenstra and Barbara A. Geil were added to the staff. Reed, dean of Chautau, Kan., Junior College, came here to direct Schoolcraft's evening division. Feenstra, who was hired to teach electricity-electronics, is now assistant dean of technology at the college. Geil is director of admissions.

Marvin Gans, now assistant dean of health, physical education and recreation, and director of athletics, and Louise Huston, now director of accounting and payroll, were hired late in August.

IN JUNE, a delegation of college board members and administrators traveled to California to look at community colleges in that state.

The appearance of several of Schoolcraft's buildings is a direct result of that and earlier visits to the Golden State, where community colleges had proliferated.

A reporter from the Detroit Free Press termed the design of Schoolcraft's first buildings, "West Coast Oriental," declaring that they appeared to be suspended from their wing-shaped roofs.

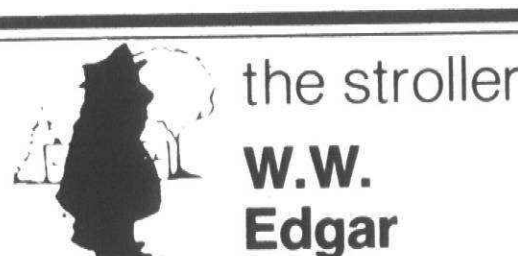

Then came the peas. Instead of heaping them alongside his potatoes, "Cowboy" spread them over his flattened out potatoes. It was a sight we never had seen. But he didn't lose a pea. In fact, just to show us, he once used a knife to get a helping.

It was a real lesson in eating peas. The Stroller never forgot it. To this day when peas are served along with the mashed potatoes, he follows Cowboy's advice and spreads them on top.

Wayne County studies options without tax hike

Another Wayne County cash crisis is on hand.

Officials say that while employees won't be laid off, they may not get paid.

The county board of commissioners defeated a plan of the county auditors

calling for a layoff of 462 employees, 22 percent of the workforce.

The board of auditors and county fiscal adviser proposed the layoffs to eliminate a projected \$17.6 million deficit from the 1981-82 budget by Nov. 30.

"The Detroit commissioners voted against it. I'm very disappointed and very disgusted," said Commissioner Mary Dumas, R-Redford.

"They're scared to death to lay off people. I'm just in a state of shock that the resolution passed in the Ways and Means Committee and not before the total board," she added.

Commissioner Kay Beard, R-Livonia, voted in favor of the layoffs. Commissioner R. William Joyner, R-Plymouth, was absent during the final vote.

THE LAYOFF plan called for

layoffs of personnel from the county jail, the county court system, prosecutor's office, health and welfare department, auditors department, register of deeds office, taxation department, corporation counsel and the planning commission.

Voters recently defeated a one-mill tax increase Aug. 10.

The board is also hoping that the Michigan Municipal Finance Commis-

sion will advance the county loans to meet its payroll, but several commissioners say they doubt the loans will be approved.

According to Dumas, the county treasurer agreed to transfer reserve funds to the general fund to meet the payroll until Sept. 2, but after that it looks like payless paydays for county employees.

In June the board asked county em-

ployees for \$11 million in wage concessions.

County Labor Relations Board director James Bishop said the commissioners will have to prioritize their concerns and set guidelines for the employees on where they should make concessions.

"By Tuesday or Wednesday, we should get the guidelines from the commissioners," Bishop said.

Bus routes are ready

The bus routes have been completed for the coming school year by Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

A complete 1982-83 transportation schedule is being sent out by the school district in its next newsletter.

More than 13,000 students, or more than 80 percent of the students in Plymouth-Canton schools, are transported to school by a school bus.

The school district operates a fleet of 86 buses which will drive nearly one million miles in the 1982-83 school year to transport students.

Kindergarten students attending morning classes will be transported at

regular stop times. Kindergarteners attending afternoon classes will be notified of their pick-up time by telephone.

Non-public school children in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools also are provided transportation service. Non-public students will be transported on the middle school bus routes and then shuttled to their school of attendance.

Seventh and eighth grade students attending Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic School are transported on high school bus routes and then shuttled from the high school to Counsel.

School safety drive is launched

Preventing "dart-outs," the major factor in more than half of all school-related traffic deaths in 1981, is the aim of this year's "School's Open — Drive Carefully" campaign by the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Announcement of the theme was made this week by Heinz Topol, manager of the Plymouth office of the Automobile Club.

Some 15 students, aged 5-17, died in accidents before or after school last year in Michigan.

The Auto Club's studies show that 8 of the 15 victims were "dart-outs" who crossed the street from between parked cars or at mid-block.

"With Plymouth-Canton school opening Aug. 30, this is the time to begin reminding parents and motorists of their shared responsibility for children's safety," said Topol.

"Children must be reminded to cross at intersections while motorists must be prepared to stop for forgetful youngsters who cross at unexpected places."

Some 862,500 youngsters will cross streets or wait for buses as they attend

elementary school statewide this year. More than 116,000 pupils will be going to school for the first time.

The Auto Club's study of the 1981 school-related accidents shows 60 percent of the victims were aged 9-13, and nine of the fatal accidents occurred before school began.

Throughout the school year, the Auto Club will remind parents, teachers and children of traffic safety rules through the "School's Open" and Safety Patrol programs.

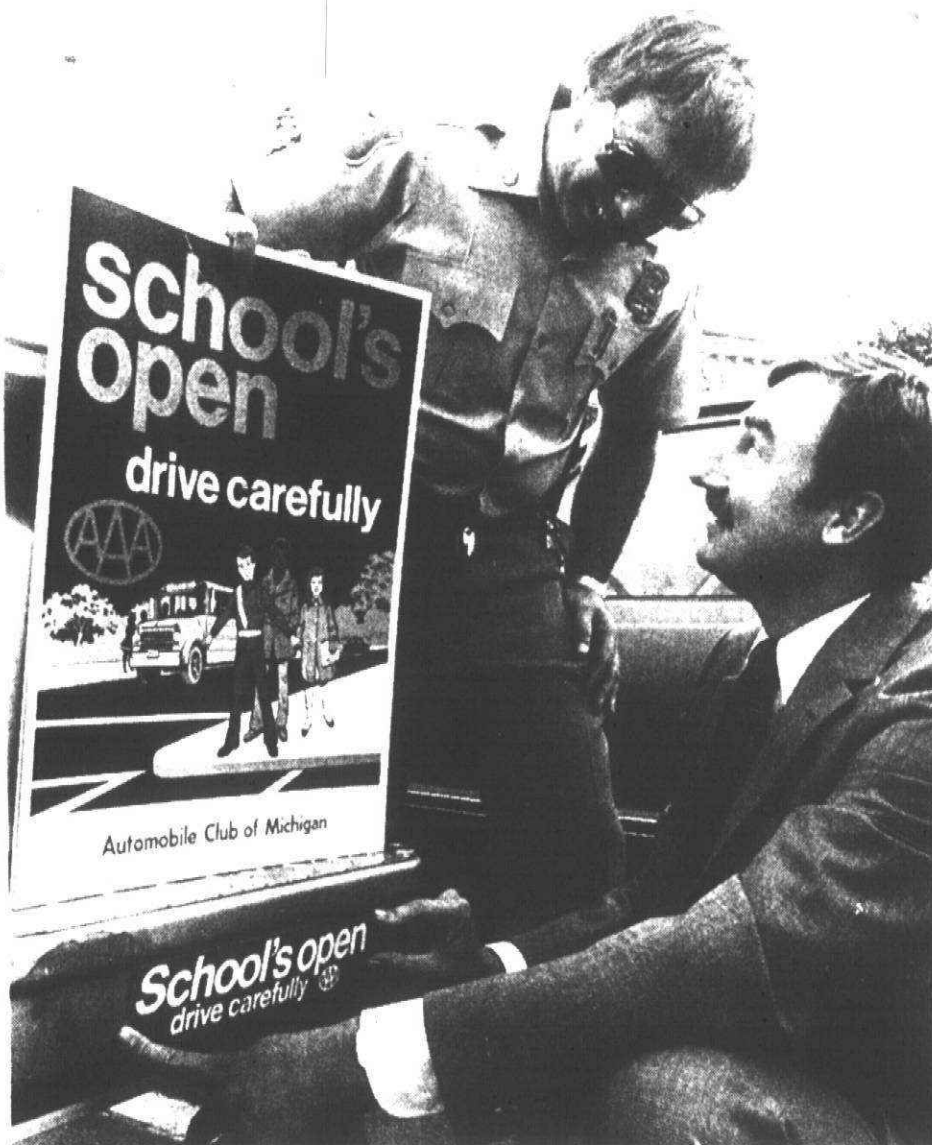
The Auto Club now is distributing 10,200 ponchos, 6,000 badges and 11,000 belts for patrollers, and 65,000 training booklets and other traffic safety supplies to 4,200 Michigan schools.

"School's Open — Drive Carefully" bumper stickers and placemats are available free to the public at the Auto Club's 56 offices statewide.

The Auto Club recommends these pedestrian safety habits for children:

- Look in all directions before walking across intersections and watch for turning cars even on a green light.
- Obey safety patrollers and crossing guards.
- Always use the sidewalk. If there isn't one, walk facing traffic.
- Dress in light-colored clothing for maximum visibility.
- Follow the safest route to school, which should be planned on streets with low traffic volume and controlled intersections.

Motorists also are reminded that state law requires them to stop at least 10 feet behind a school bus when it is loading or unloading, and stay stopped until the red lights stop flashing.

Northville bank robbed

Two men wearing masks held up a branch of the Michigan National Bank at Haggerty and Six Mile roads about 11:30 a.m. last Friday and escaped with an undetermined amount of money.

State Police recovered the white Dodge van the bandits used an hour later at Six Mile and I-275 Freeway.

Bank officials were conducting an audit to determine how much money was taken, said FBI special agent John Anthony.

Anthony described the men as being white, in their early 20s and of medium height and build. One carried a shotgun. No shots were fired during the robbery.

One of the suspects stood in the lobby, while the other jumped over the tellers' counter and collected money, witnesses said. The men did not go into the bank vault, Anthony said.

Bicyclists who choose to ride less than the 32-kilometer (20-mile) course will receive credit for miles completed at checkpoints along the route.

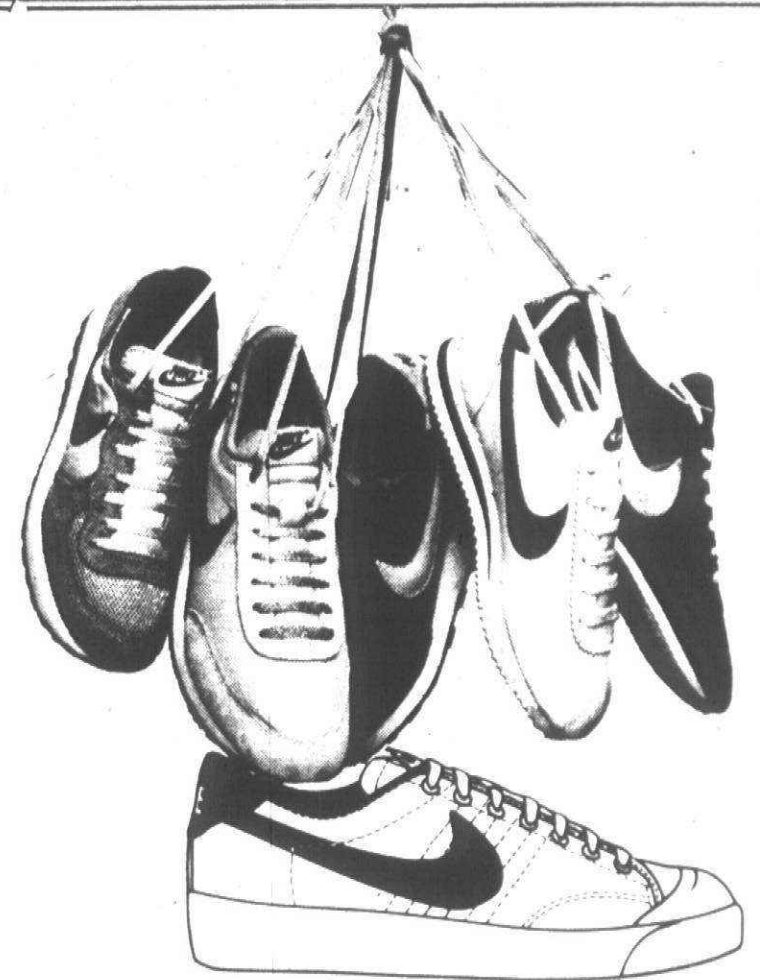
The top pledge collectors will win beverage prizes from 7-Eleven and a chance to appear on the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon to benefit the Mus-

Michigan's peachy

State's crop soars while national production drops

A good peach crop is being harvested in Michigan. The state crop is estimated at 45 million pounds, up 29 percent from that of a year ago. Elsewhere in the country, peaches didn't fare so well this year.

Production in the nine southern peach states is forecast at 360 million pounds — 50 percent of last year's crop. North Carolina was especially hard hit by cold weather this spring — the peach crop there is a mere 2 million pounds, compared with 40 million pounds in 1981. Nationally, the fresh peach crops forecast at 2.20 billion pounds — 21 percent below last year's harvest.

California's peach production is significantly lower in both freestone and clingstone peaches. The clingstone crop, which goes primarily into cans, is off 10 percent. California is the major producer of clingstone peaches, so this very likely will mean higher prices for canned peaches.

As a result of the good peach crop in Michigan and a short crop elsewhere, buyers from other states are looking to Michigan for fresh peaches. Consumers, therefore, can expect to pay top prices for fresh peaches.

No doubt the most economical time to purchase peaches will be during the third week in August. That's when the Red Haven variety — No. 1 in volume and a favorite of Michigan shoppers — will be in peak supply.

Several factors have endeared Red Haven peaches to shoppers. Besides having an extremely good flavor, Red Havens (and all other Haven varieties except Hale Haven) are resistant to browning. This makes them ideal for freezing as well as canning. Red Havens are freestone (the flesh comes off the pit easily) when the fruit is fully ripe.

Red Haven peaches will likely be available through the second week in September. Other varieties have a season 10 to 14 days long. Red Havens are around so much longer because they have been planted in the northern as well as the southern regions of the state.

During the Red Haven season, the following varieties come to market in this order: Glohaven, Canadian Harmony, Cresthaven and Kalhaven. Redskins follow to end of the Red Havens. Other varieties that are not produced in sufficient quantities to be commercially important across the state are available in various local areas. Always inquire if peaches are freestone if you are purchasing a quantity for canning or freezing.

Michigan peaches have yellow skins and flesh and should be firm, mature, well formed and free from decay. Look for a creamy yellow to gold skin under the outer red blush. Red blush alone is not a sign of ripeness — the amount of red blush varies with the variety. Do

not purchase hard peaches with a ground color that is more green than yellow. They're immature, they lack flavor, and they'll never ripen properly.

Peaches picked at the firm ripe stage will become fully ripe and ready to eat in three or four days at room temperature. Ripen out of the sun or — to speed up ripening — place the peaches in a brown paper bag. Keep fully ripe peaches refrigerated and use

within two or three days.

For a break from peaches, consumers can enjoy Paulareds, a late summer apple with the flavor and texture characteristics of a fall apple. This all-purpose apple comes to market at the same time as peaches with the qualities shoppers want.

Michigan growers now have a significant number of Paulared trees bearing fruit. Size is good, and quality is reported good to excellent this year.

Pick your field and you're off in independent studies

Schoolcraft College's independent human studies — an adults' educational option unparalleled in this area — is signing up lovers of learning for its eight year this week.

The course offers the opportunity to study just about anything, for anywhere from six to 12 credit hours, using just about any plan and resources deemed appropriate.

The only requirement is to be on hand eight Saturdays during the seminars and workshops with the other participants and Suzanne Kaplan, the teacher who helped originate the course back in 1975 and continues to lead it today.

In fact, if there are prospective students who can't make it on Saturdays, Kaplan is quite willing to set up an evening section for independent studies.

"I can handle a class of up to 15, and there are about six or eight places left in the Saturday class," she said. "No one yet has asked for an evening class, but if seven or eight students are interested, we will start one."

LOVE IN western civilization, Jesus of Nazareth as myth or messiah, Mesopotamian art, Michigan's single business tax, blue collar job satisfaction, no-fault divorce, repair of stringed instruments and auras of the human body are just a few of the topics that have been studied in the program during recent years.

"The interest may start with a career interest," said Kaplan, "and sometimes employers pay the tuition for a project that is a job-upgrading. Or some do the studies in order to start a business."

"Sometimes it's a burning desire to study something, develop a hobby, pursue a dream."

Occasionally a student is interested in the idea of the program but has nothing specific in mind. "I have them come to see me, and we throw a few ideas around," said Kaplan.

A few students earn degrees in the independent studies programs, said Kaplan, but more often the study is combined with regular classroom work.

"Some who start this way go on to higher degrees," she added. "Our students have won awards and scholarships. And I have drawers and drawers full of excellent informational work."

FOR EACH student, the class begins with an interview with Kaplan to determine the subject matter for the study, the way it will be pursued and the number of credit hours.

"The tuition is the same as for any Schoolcraft class," she said. "Often it turns out the study will be in more depth, so credit hours are added."

"The idea is to finish a study in one term, but 16 weeks can be an unbelievably short time, so there are frequent time extensions."

All students join in the 9 a.m. to noon and 12:45-3 p.m. Saturday sessions.

"In the mornings, the students serve as an audience for the development of each other's projects. Afternoons are devoted to workshops on research skills all need. I try to vary the workshops, because students keep repeating the course."

The program offers a "non-threatening, informal atmosphere," said Kaplan. "It's the kind of thing where once you get hooked you just keep going," she added. "Interest doesn't end with the

final exam."

For that matter, she noted, there is no final other than a completed study project.

KAPLAN SAID she and another faculty member, Gordon Wilson, began the independent studies program in 1975 after two years' study.

It was geared to younger students at first, she said.

"But after several years we realized our student body had changed considerably and the interest in this kind of study was changing too," she said.

Using a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the American Association of Colleges, leaders of the program attended a seminar in Kansas City and eventually made use of services of an expert consultant.

"We decided it was a program for adults, and at that point started having the seminars and workshops on Satur-

Open registration day at New Morning School

The finalists participated in a cookoff at Plymouth Salem High School's home economics room.

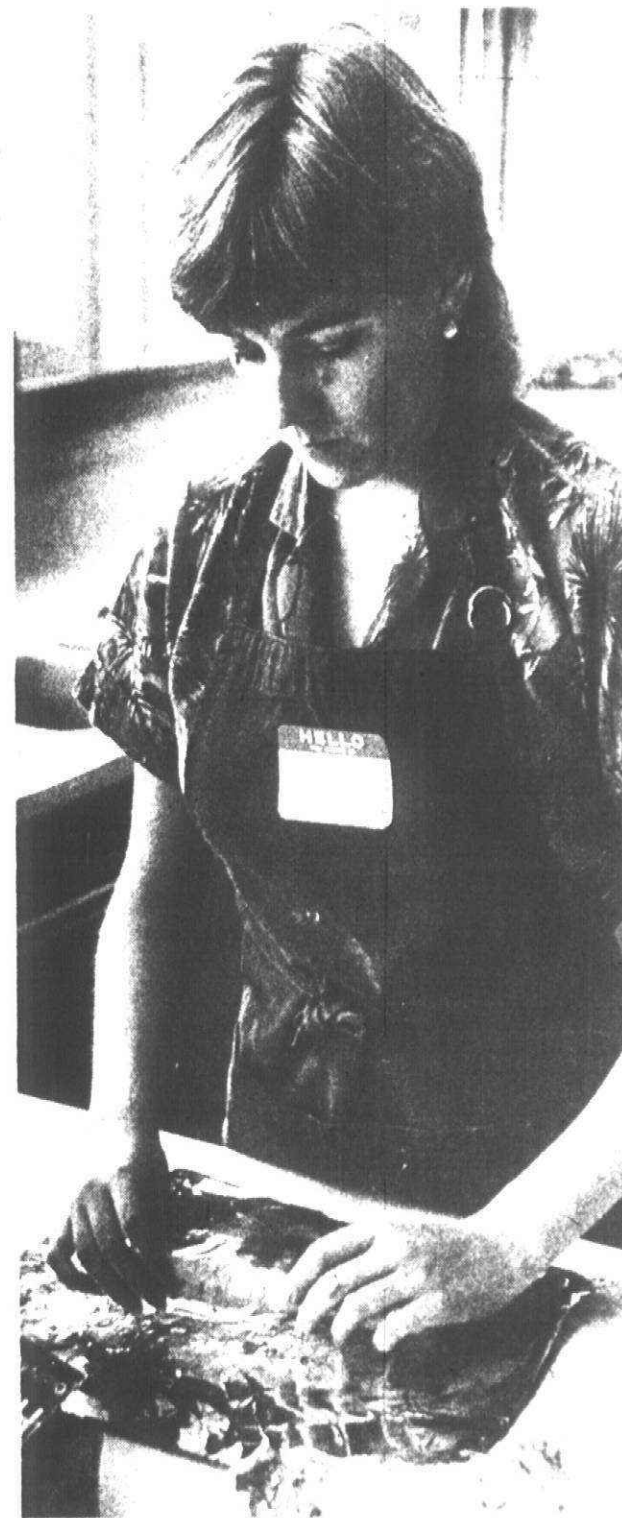
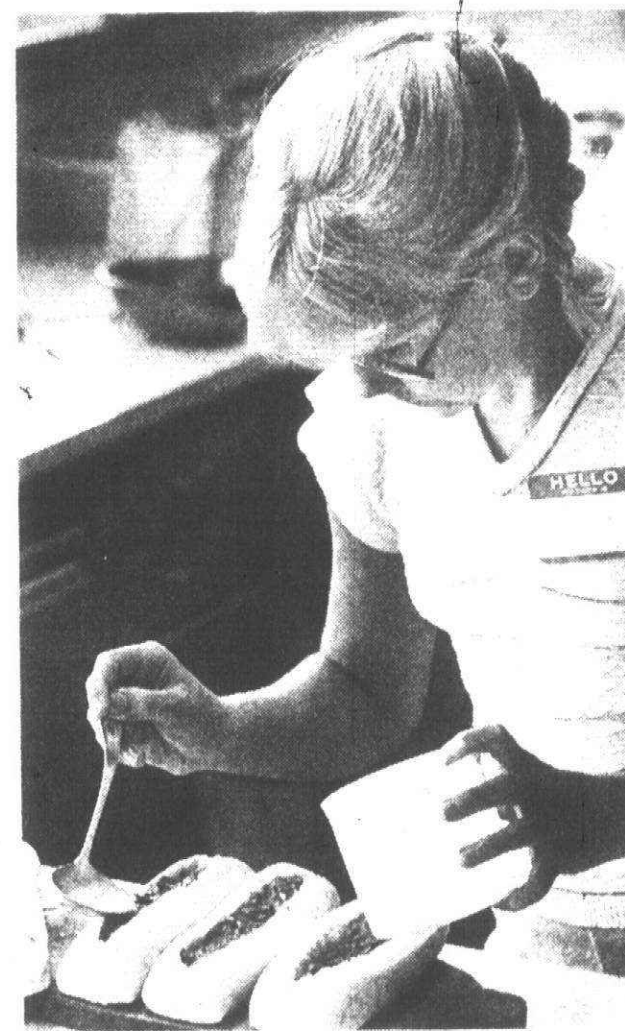

days because that seemed most convenient," she said.

Now the course is geared to students 25 and up, and they range up to the 70s, she noted. However, younger students are accepted on an individual basis.

"There were a lot of programs like this at the university level during the early 1970s, said Kaplan.

"Schoolcraft is one of very few left. Most have fallen to the budget crunch, but we've managed to hang in there."

Tuition at Schoolcraft is \$25.50 per credit hour for students in the district, \$34.50 for non-resident students and \$51.50 for out of state and foreign students. Tuition is free to those over 60. Kaplan said the independent studies course has a scholarship available for the winter term; the fall term scholarship already has been awarded.

Registrations are being accepted at Schoolcraft noon to 8 p.m. today and Tuesday. Those interested in enrolling in the coming term or later are invited to call Kaplan, 591-6400, Ext. 442.

Counseling for problems gains acceptance

Americans today are much more likely to seek professional help for their personal problems than they were a generation ago, according to a University of Michigan survey.

"The stigma has decreased. Even people who do not personally expect to consult a mental health professional themselves see that as a reasonable alternative for persons facing an unmanageable crisis," said Joseph Veroff, Richard A. Kulka and Elizabeth Douvan of the U-M Institute for Social Research.

"They are more likely to select a specialized resource such as a psychol-

ogist, psychiatrist or marriage counselor than a general help source like a doctor or clergyman. But they turned to all resources much more often than persons surveyed 20 years earlier.

"Only 3 percent relied exclusively on professionals," the U-M researchers add. "Most turned also to family and friends for advice and support."

THE TRENDS are examined in "Mental Health in America: Patterns of Help-Seeking from 1957 to 1976," just published by Basic Books.

Veroff, Kulka and Douvan compared the findings of a 1976 ISR national survey of some 2,400 adults to a similar

1957 survey, "Americans View Their Mental Health." By addressing the same questions to two carefully matched populations, 20 years apart, they were able to identify important changes in the ways Americans cope with personal problems.

"In 1976, people were much more likely to mention spontaneously a professional help source as a way to cope with a hypothetical personal problem. More important, in 1957 some 14 percent of the population said they had sought professional help at some point in their lives. By 1976, that proportion had nearly doubled to 26 percent," the

researchers said.

"Professional help is broadly defined in our studies. It includes any help source having expertise rather than a personal relationship to the help-seeker — for example, medical doctors, lawyers and clergy as well as social workers, counselors and psychiatrists."

DECIDING TO seek help from an outside expert requires a certain psychological readiness, a willingness to admit vulnerability in the self, the authors explain. You must admit that a problem might arise that outstrips your own capacity for managing and resolving distress.

Catholic Central grad now pitching for the Texas Rangers. Bill Fahey, a catcher from Bedford Union currently with the Detroit Tigers, and Bernie Carbo, who roamed the outfield of several teams (most notably the Boston Red Sox) but now manages a Mexican League team.

OTHERS HAVE tried and failed. Others are still trying, hoping for their chance, spurred by a belief in themselves that they indeed possess that remarkable talent to play major-league baseball.

As best as this sport staff can tell, there are eight former Observerland stars currently laboring somewhere in professional baseball's minor-league system. They all have one dream to fulfill.

To get to where Tanana and Fahey are now.

Here is the list of our players in the minors, with all-too-brief looks at how they're doing and what their prospects are.

Brian Stemberger, Knoxville Blue Jays — This pitcher is on the road. The object is not to make any unexpected detours.

A Plymouth Canton grad, Stemberger is piling up some impressive credentials for the Knoxville Blue Jays in the West Division of the Class AA Southern League. The sinker-ball relief pitcher has a sparkling 7-3 record with five saves in 37 mound appearances. His earned-run average is 3.41.

"I don't know if he'll be in triple-A next year," said Ray Frenchie, the To-

ronto Blue Jays' director of Canadian scouting. "That decision won't be made until this fall or winter. It's very competitive at that level."

But he's earned a shot. He's had a good year.

One problem: Stemberger hurt his elbow a week ago. The injury is not expected to be serious, but it's that kind of detour that can lead a hopeful prospect to an unhappy dead end.

The rest of Stemberger's statistics through Aug. 8: 68 innings pitched, 49 hits allowed, 43 runs (15 earned), 39 walks, 28 strikeouts, one start. His team is fourth in the league after winning the season's first half.

Mike Robbins, Glen Falls White Sox — Robbins might not be designated as ahead of schedule, but his progress has been a pleasant surprise at Glen Falls.

A Livonia Bentley alumnus, Robbins was headed for Saratoga in Class A. But injuries in higher classes caused some juggling, and Robbins was boosted to the AA team at Glen Falls in the Eastern League's North Division before the season started.

The outfielder has responded well, filling in as the fourth outfielder. In 144 at bats, he has 28 hits for a .258 average, including seven doubles, two home runs and 22 runs batted in. He has walked 30 times, giving him a .429 on-base average. And he has committed just one error.

Glen Falls won its season's first half, assuring it a spot in the playoffs, and the team is in second place in the second half.

Robbie Langer, Still, somewhat cloudy, although impressive at the AA level, he isn't an everyday starter. He probably will start at that level next season, although Chicago White Sox of-

split the mound duties in the win Wednesday over Buffalo. Stothers hurled the first five innings and got the win, with Warren earning the save.

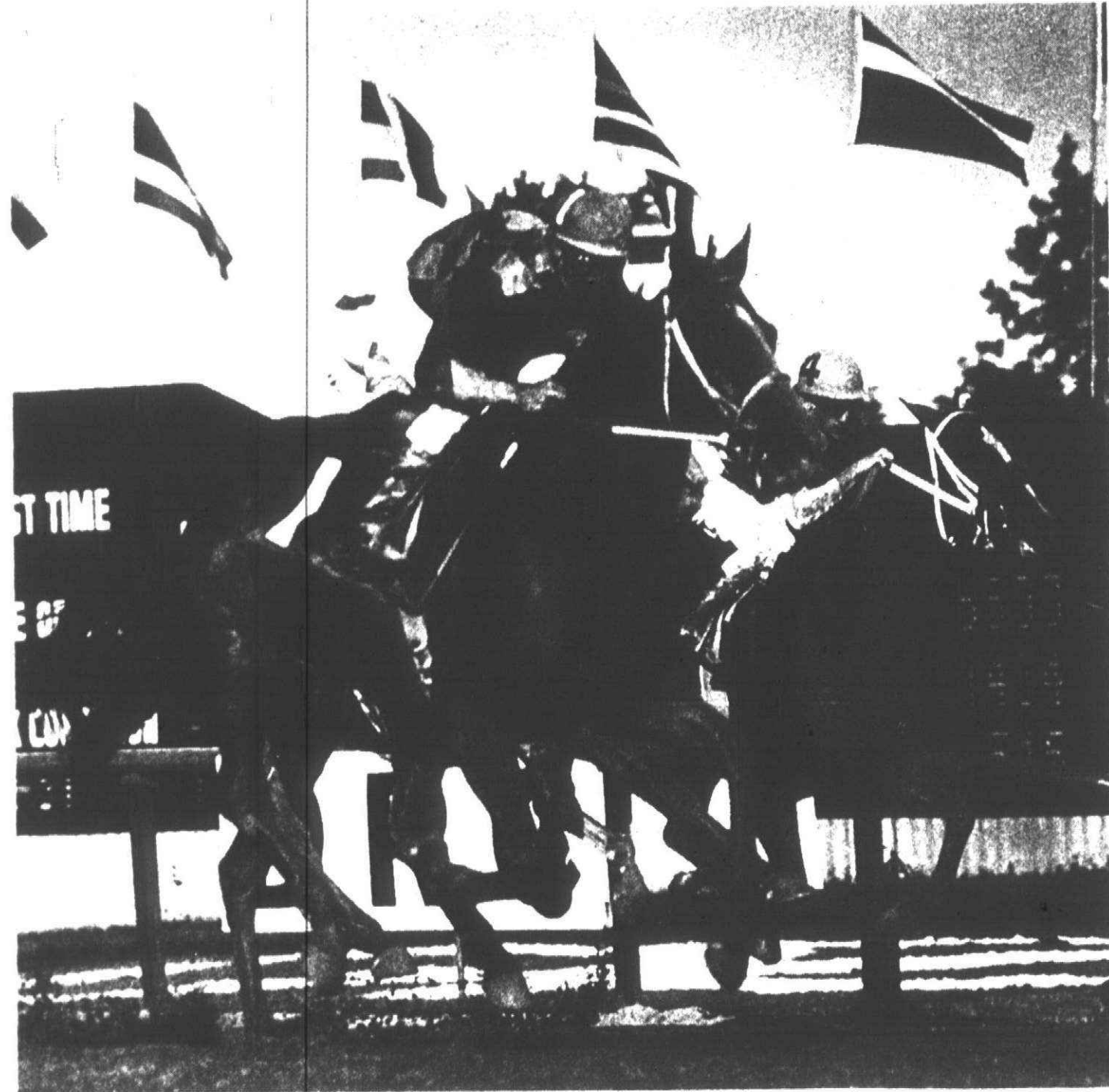

Vodika Collins reigns in 34th Michigan Mile

The Shoe couldn't beat the Smile in the Mile.

That sums up what happened Saturday in the 34th running of the Michigan Mile at Detroit Race Course in Livonia.

A crowd of 14,859, the largest since the 1977 Michigan Mile, gathered not just to witness the state's biggest thoroughbred race of the year but to see the best jockey to ever mount a horse — Bill Shoemaker.

Those that jammed into the park in hopes of seeing "the Shoe" add to his career victory total (which stood at 8,173 before Saturday) weren't disappointed. The Shoe did win. But his victory didn't come in the feature event.

INSTEAD LOCAL jockey Joe Judice drove Vodika Collins inside of Shoemaker's mount, Recusant, down the stretch to win the \$166,400 race.

The triumph was the biggest in the 21-year-old's racing career, and he showed it. The wide smile never left his face, from the time he jockeyed Vodika Collins into the winner's circle until the party in the clubhouse an hour later.

"It's just a great feeling," Judice said, still beaming. His account of the race: "I saw the one horse (Bay Diplomat) in trouble on the inside, so I went to the outside. (Down the stretch) I saw an opening and went for it."

JUDICE'S OPENING came with just

over one-eighth of a mile to go. Seven of the 13 horses were lined across the track, including Recusant. But as the hole opened on the outside, Judice beat Shoemaker to it, forcing the Shoe out even further.

Vodika Collins crossed the line in 1:50.2, a length ahead of Recusant. Lord Gallant was third and Withholding fourth.

"I thought I could catch him," Shoemaker, who turned 51 Thursday, said afterward. "I just didn't have enough speed."

STILL, IT WASN'T a wasted trip for Shoemaker. He rode his first mount, Pensar, to victory in the Dowling Prep Stakes in the fifth race. In the sixth

race, Shoemaker finished out of the money aboard Amanda Boranda, and in the ninth his horse, Tinsley's Hope, was edged by Dave's Friend.

The career leader in wins was gracious in defeat, greeting Judice in the clubhouse. "Here's the winning jockey — congratulations," Shoemaker said.

Judice was also gracious, sharing the laurels that were being heaped upon him.

"You know, I don't care what anybody says," the young jockey said. "The horse does all the work. He makes us all look good — the jockey, the trainer and the owner."

Judice, of course, grinned broadly as he said it.

officials refuse to estimate, saying only that trades could cause some shake-ups.

The rest of Robbins' stats include 21 runs scored, two game-winning hits, a .380 slugging percentage, 31 strikeouts and four stolen bases. He has appeared in 39 of the team's 122 games.

Ken Scarpace, Waterbury Reds — Scarpace got off to a slow start and seems destined for a second year at AA in the Cincinnati Reds organization.

The Livonia Franklin grad has overcome his sluggish early season to bring his batting average up to .258. He has just one homer, but has clubbed 15 doubles and five triples, driving in 37 runs. "Kenny needs another year at double A," said Waterbury general manager Mike Divito. "Early in the year he was playing only one of every three games, and I think that hurt him. Since he's been a starter, he's been playing a lot better."

"But he needs to develop consistency. He wants to come back and prove himself at this level."

Scarpace's other stats: 368 at bats in 110 games, 95 hits, 37 runs scored, four stolen bases and four errors. The team is in the cellar of the Eastern League's South Division.

Jim Ross, Lakeland Tigers — Who says the Detroit Tigers don't develop local talent? Ross is one of four players

from the Observer coverage area in the Tigers' farm system.

A right-handed short-relief pitcher, the Bentley grad has had a mediocre season at the Class A level, but, according to Dave Miller, the Tiger's administrator of player development, Ross has "probably been their most reliable reliever."

Ross has a 4-3 record in 73½ innings pitched, with eight saves and a 3.55 ERA. Lakeland is 28-26 in the Florida State League's Northern Division for the season's second half, two games out of first.

"This is only his second year (of pro ball)," Miller said. "He still has a bright future."

The Tiger's current bullpen problems may improve Ross' chance for a shot in the majors. Miller admitted there is "lots of opportunity," but added that next year Ross "will be in double-A more likely."

The rest of Ross' stats: 41 games, 73 hits, 33 runs (26 earned), 31 walks and 40 strikeouts.

Chris Baker, Macon Tigers — It's been a struggle for Baker, a Livonia Franklin alum, since he was drafted and signed by the Tigers.

"Chris has been battling injuries for so long, ever since we signed him," Miller said. Among his problems was a broken ankle suffered in his first season which hampered his progress considerably.

Baker has been a regular at Macon, a

Class A team in the South Division of the South Atlantic League. But even though the team is battling for first place (1½ games out of first), it has not been a good year for Baker.

He has increased his power, slugging seven homers in 90 games this season and driving in 37 runs. But he is batting just .228.

There are other problems facing him. As any Detroit fan knows, outfielders are far from rare throughout the Tiger system. That could cost Baker in terms of advancement.

The combination of an off-year at the plate (Baker batted .293 last season at Macon) and an abundance of outfielders may keep Baker at Macon another year.

His stats: 285 at bats, 65 hits, 39 runs scored, 12 doubles, five game-winning RBI, 39 walks and 42 strikeouts. He has committed just one error.

Doug Smith, Elizabethton Twins — Smith is one of those pitchers whose stats can be deceiving. Very deceiving.

His won-lost record is as bad as can be — winless in six decisions. But it should be noted that he is a short reliever, a position that lends itself to quick defeat. One hit or one error can tag a short reliever with the loss.

What should be taken into account is the Plymouth Canton grad's 1.88 ERA and three saves. That has a lot of people in the Minnesota Twins' organization taking notice.

"Doug's having a tough go," said Jim

Rantz, assistant director of the Twins' farm system. "Although he's pitched well, his record doesn't reflect it."

What the Twins like about Smith, according to Rantz, is that "he throws strikes." And in the current baseball world, a short reliever who throws strikes can be a very valuable commodity.

Elizabethton, a member of the Appalachian League's Southern Division in the Rookies' League, is currently in second place. Smith, whose brother Dan was an All-State hurler at Canton this past season, is likely to move up to Class A, probably at Wisconsin Rapids, next year.

Smith's stats: 28 innings pitched, 27 hits, 14 walks, 19 strikeouts.

Jim Irwin, Bristol Tigers — Irwin is also playing in the South Division of the Rookies' Appalachian League. It hasn't been easy, but, according to the Tigers' Miller, it appears Irwin is starting to come around.

After going without a home run for the first 25 games of the season, Irwin, a Westland John Glenn grad, hit two in four days, one a grand slam. That helped improve his batting average to .253 and upped his RBI count to 15.

While Irwin is shaking off his poor start, Bristol continues to struggle with a 19-28 record, in sixth place. His next assignment will probably be at Lakeland or Macon, in Class A.

Irwin's stats: 27 games, 87 at bats, 22 hits, 12 runs scored and two doubles.



S'craft star a key in OU soccer bid

After nearly earning a National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II tournament playoff bid the past two years, the Oakland University men's soccer team hopes to make the grade this season.

The 1981 team finished the season with four straight wins to boost its overall record to 14-4-1, but could not secure a playoff spot. The 1982 cast includes the nucleus from last year's team, plus a promising list of high-school recruits and junior-college transfers.

Tuesday, the Pioneers will tune up for their 1982 season when they host the Detroit Express in an exhibition game at 6:30 p.m. All donations gathered from spectators will aid the soccer scholarship fund at Oakland University.

The entire Express team is scheduled to be on hand. The game will take place on the Pioneers' field.

The Pioneers open the regular season Sept. 8 against Cleveland State University in a home game at 3 p.m.

Oakland University's 1982 roster will be led by five seniors — Dave Daiek, Kevin Kelly, Dave Morgan and co-captains Dandy Oskey and Lou Vulovich.

VULOVICH is a 6-foot-3, 185-pounder from Farmington Harrison. He missed the first half of the 1981 season due to a knee injury but came back in the second half as the starting sweeper. Vulovich will be counted on again this year to lead the defense from his sweeper position.

Daiek, a 5-10, 160-pounder from Bloomfield Hills Lahser, played the entire 1981 season as the starting center midfielder. He scored two goals and added six assists last year, which put him fifth on the Pioneers' scoring list with 10 points.

Other key returnees include Lindsay Hamilton and Mehdi Eskandari. Hamilton is a 5-8, 145-pound junior from Rochester. Hamilton saw action in 13 games as a sophomore and had one goal and one assist. He has shown much improvement during the off season and

could challenge for a starting position this year.

Eskandari, a 5-9 140-pound sophomore forward/midfielder from Bloomfield Hills Roeper, played two games as a freshman. He has potential and has the ball-handling skills to become a factor on the Pioneers' team.

Oakland University coach Gary Parsons also is excited about the new crop of talent coming in this year, including Troy Athens graduate Marty Hagen, Bloomfield Hills Lahser graduate Paul Silvi, and Schoolcraft College transfer Nick O'Shea.

Hagen, who led Athens to the Michigan A-B state soccer title last fall, was chosen as the top high-school soccer player in 1981 by the Michigan Soccer Coaches Association. He also was named All-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

HAGEN SCORED 38 goals and added 20 assists to lead the Red Hawks — a first-year varsity team last season — in both categories. Silvi, according to

Parsons, was one of the best forwards in the state and should challenge for a spot on the OU team.

O'Shea, a 5-9 150-pounder from Livonia, is a former junior college all-American while playing at Schoolcraft College. He currently is playing in the Michigan Soccer League for the Detroit Sport Club and should provide the Pioneers with some immediate help at midfield.

Other returning players include senior Dave Morgan from St. Louis; senior Kevin Kelly from St. Louis; juniors Dan Fitzgerald from Granite City, Ill.; Steve Mastrogiannis from Toronto; Morris Lupenec from Ontario, and Barry Vince from East Lansing.

Lupenec was the Pioneers' leading scorer last year as he scored 43 points on 20 goals and three assists.

Returning sophomores are Chris Hauer from Fairfield, Ohio; Dave Marttila from Okemos; and John Mehl from Ontario.

Other transfers are junior Scott Kinley from Delta College and Mike Lupenec from Oakland Community Col-

lege. Joe Allen (Oak Park), Donn Hilker (Pennsylvania) and Paul Larkin (Ontario) round out the list of freshman recruits.

This high school is where students learn to spell s-e-x

Of course, "Fast Times at Ridgemont High" (R). Would anyone go to see "Slow Times"?

And when a movie has a title like this one does, could we expect anything but a trashy sex-ploitation film aimed at the teen market? We could hope for something better, but we wouldn't expect it. In that sense, "Fast Times at Ridgemont High" is not a disappointment.

It isn't going to win any awards for acting, originality or artistic merit. However, that's not going to bother anyone associated with this movie since such niceties aren't going to harm the box-office receipts. On the contrary, their absence probably contributes to the movie's high potential for financial success.

The movie depends upon sex, sex, sex — in action, conversation and graffiti. When sex isn't the immediate subject of a scene, the movie relies on buzz words and stereotypes for laughs.

ALL SOMEONE HAS to do is talk about getting high or act as if he's high and, for some reason, the theater audience always responds with laughter.

Finding this movie offensive when so many people around me in the theater find it funny makes me wonder if I'm just getting to be an old curmudgeon. But curmudgeon or not, I have to use my values as a guideline.

I'm bothered by the "typical" teen-agers of this movie who don't possess a thimbleful of intelligence or self-respect. I'm more bothered by the way the movie sanctions casual sex among teen-agers, implies that anyone who hasn't engaged in oral sex is backward and makes light of a 15-year-old girl's abortion.

When it is over, it's as if nothing happened. There are no repercussions. She doesn't even miss a day of school.

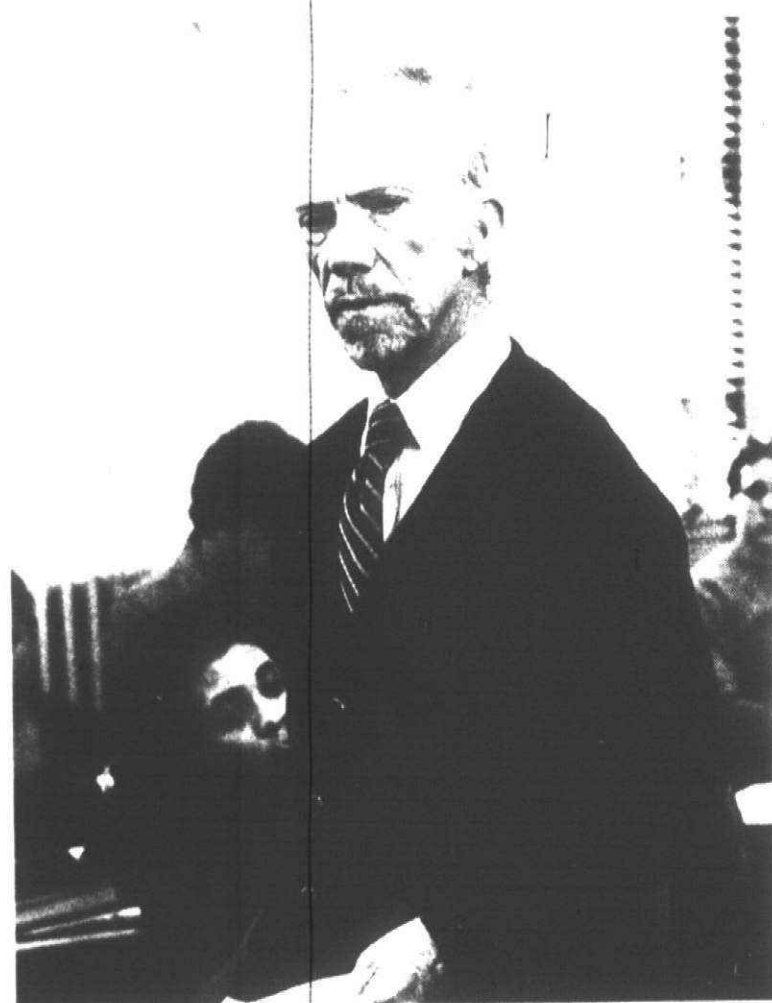
All of this is presented in a loose collection of anecdotal situations as attention shifts from one character to another. The central figure of this not-so-merry-go-round is Stacy (Jennifer Jason Leigh), who goes to Ridgemont High and works at a shopping-center pizza parlor.

STACY HAS ALL the reserve of a rabbit in heat. Her first move in meeting any male is to shed her clothes. As you might suspect, this habit gets her into trouble. Advising her in these matters is her best friend, Linda (Phoebe Cates). With a best friend like Linda, who needs enemies?

Parents aren't of much help, and they're conspicuously absent from this movie. Teachers are represented by Ray Walston as a sarcastic disciplinarian and Vincent Schiavelli as a ghoulish biology teacher.

Among the glandularly active males are Robert Romanus as a ticket scalper and D.W. Brown as a stereo salesman. Sean Penn is Spicoli, a spaced-out surfer, and Brian Backr is unique as Ratner, the one young man in the whole school who is shy.

Another character who arouses interest is Stacy's brother, Brad (Judge Reinhold). Brad is shown working at a succession of fast-food places. The indignity of some of these jobs is the only original observation "Fast Times" makes. It's not enough.

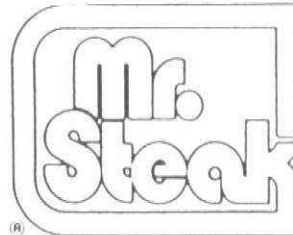

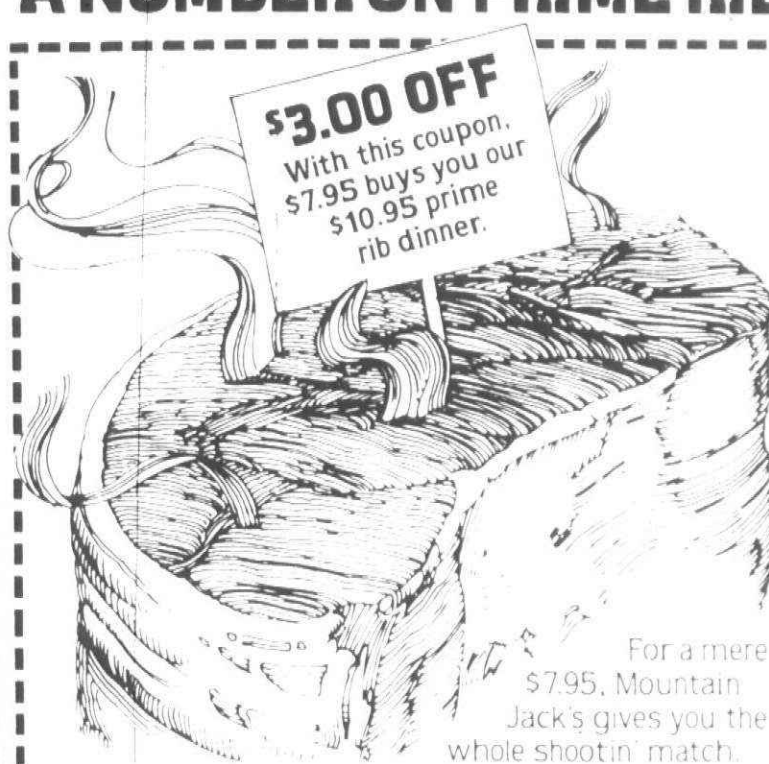

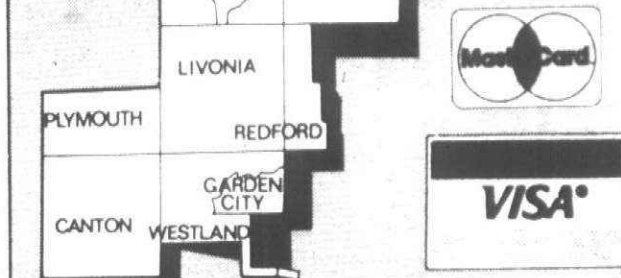

Driving in darkness has additional rules

Night driving can be stressful, but that condition can be eased with some care. The Automotive Information Council (AIC) has compiled some tips pertaining to the car and to the driver.

It suggests that a driver sit in the car for a minute or two before starting to permit the eyes to adjust to the darkness.

Don't look at the lights of on-coming cars, a practice that will change the focus of the eyes. Instead, look to the right of the lane marker or at the shoulder markings.

Don't wear colored glasses to avoid headlight glare. They reduce needed detail in night vision.

ON A LONG trip, keep alert by moving the eyes, arms and legs and take occasional rest stops to reduce eye and body fatigue.

Watch your speed. Don't "over-drive" the

distance you can see.

Regarding the car, make sure the headlights and tail lights are clean. Under adverse weather conditions, stop frequently to clean dirt, ice or snow from the lights.

The inside surface of the windshield should be clean to avoid distortion from on-coming headlights. This is especially important in summer if you have a plastic dashboard. Deposits from smoke attract moisture and increase distortion and glare.

WINDSHIELD WIPERS should be able to clean the windshield without leaving streaks or smears, which can hamper vision. Have the blades replaced if the wipers don't clean the windshield.

Check the windshield washer fluid level weekly so you don't get caught with an empty reservoir.
