

Officials slate forum for police, fire, tax rates

Are the police and fire departments doing a good job? Is the township government running smoothly? Public hearings on proposed tax rates for police, fire and general fund budgets will take place at 7 p.m. Tuesday in Township Hall. Residents are encouraged to express their views.

The Township Board will set millage rates in those categories, prior to adopting next year's budget.

The budget must be adopted by Oct. 31. It goes into effect Jan. 1.

"It's the tightest (budget) we have ever had," said finance

director Mike Gorman, who works with Supervisor James Poole in preparing the budget.

"The service level will be the same," added Gorman. "This budget doesn't anticipate any reduction in services. No raises have been budgeted."

THE POLICE and fire department operating expenses are paid from separate taxing funds. Currently budgeted are \$1.5 million for fire services and \$1.6 million for police protection.

The general fund budget, which covers most of the township's operating expenses, is budgeted at \$3.4 million.

Last year, the Township Board voted to trim the fire and general fund operating millages slightly, while leaving the

police tax intact. Residents had expressed satisfaction with current fire protection, but feared cuts in police funding.

According to the budget, the following millage rates are proposed:

- 3.06 mills (\$3.06 for every \$1,000 of assessed property valuation) for the fire fund. Last year's levy was 3.15 mills.
- 2.24 mills for general fund, a reduction from last year's rate of 2.32 mills.
- 3.25 mills for police fund, the same as last year. Increased operating costs make it necessary to maintain the same police millage, said Gorman.

Overall, taxes for police, fire and township operating funds will increase 0.6 percent, because of increases in the State Equalized Valuation, said Gorman.

IT STILL has not been determined whether employees' salaries will be increased.

Most union contracts have expired, including pacts for police, firefighters, police lieutenants and sergeants, and the department of public works.

Employees are working without contracts. "Negotiations are slow," Gorman said.

The Township Board could opt to make budget adjustments, allowing for raises, said Gorman. In addition, state law permits police officers and firefighters to take salary issues to binding arbitration.

"In previous years, money has been set aside (for raises)," said Gorman. "If (the board) is going to give raises, they are going to have to cut (expenses) elsewhere."

Board OKs 'cease fire' in staffing flap

A cease-fire has been declared in a running battle over personality clashes in the township treasurer's office.

In what has been described as a "temporary solution," finance director Mike Gorman will assist treasurer Maria Sterlini as an unofficial deputy treasurer — a buffer between Sterlini and her staff.

The Township Board had been discussing the possibility of removing some of Sterlini's duties.

The "temporary solution" resulted from a four-hour, closed session of the Township Board Tuesday evening. There had been two other closed sessions over the past two weeks, discussing undisclosed employee grievances and personnel discord in the treasurer's department.

Still another meeting has been scheduled for 7 p.m. next Wednesday to map out a long-term solution.

Sterlini said she will continue to administer the duties of the treasurer's office, with Gorman supervising the employees' work within the department.

"Nothing (duties) has been taken away from me," said Sterlini. "The only thing is Mike (Gorman) is going to assist me. He will report to me. This is only temporary."

THREE FULL-TIME employees from the treasurer's department are to

return to work today, said Sterlini. The clerks, said to be tense and upset, had been off work two weeks with pay while the board wrangled with the personnel issues.

The time off had been authorized by the Township Board. The grievances have been put "on hold," while discussion for a "long-term" solution takes place, said personnel director Dan Durack.

"No timetable has been set by the board," said Durack. "Their main concern was to get the people back to work. They want to get it resolved as quickly as possible."

Sterlini told the Observer she is satisfied with the temporary solution "as long as nothing (duties) is taken away." The Township Board doesn't have power to remove Sterlini's state-mandated tax-collecting and financial duties, but staffing and other duties could be changed.

Sterlini said the long-term staffing needs of the treasurer's department need to be addressed. She said the work load demands more staffing.

Two weeks ago, the three employees from the treasurer's office had requested a meeting with the Township Board to discuss working conditions in the treasurer's department. Sterlini, who said she had been trying to work out a solution with the clerical workers' union, asked that the meetings be closed.

Negotiations lag, but teachers work

Plymouth-Canton teachers are back in class — without a contract.

Officials from the Plymouth-Canton Education Association (PCEA), the teachers' union, met with its membership Monday morning and decided to work without a contract, according to Candi Reece, chief negotiator.

The decision came four days after union negotiators rejected the latest proposal from the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education. The teachers' con-

tract expired three days ago.

Reece and Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for personnel, admit contract talks are at a standstill.

Reece hopes school officials will contact the PCEA with another proposal in the near future.

Another general membership meeting of the teachers is planned in early October to discuss negotiations, Reece added.

KEE SAYS he plans to contact the union after meeting with the school board.

"It's just kind of at a standstill right now," Kee says. "We're going to have to report back to the board and see what it would like to do before we get back to them."

Kee plans to see the board at the next regular meeting Sept. 13, he said.

Members of six other labor unions in the district also have worked without an agreement since June 30. They include administrators, clerical, custodians, transportation, aids and cafeteria workers.

THE SCHOOLS are in a financial state of flux because of numerous un-

certainities over state-aid support this year.

School officials cut approximately \$1.6 million from Plymouth-Canton's \$41-million school budget in June. Total deficit actually amounted to approximately \$2.7 million, based on school projections. About \$1.1 million came from the schools' fund balance to cover the deficit.

No student programs were totally eliminated. Some services were reduced.

The fund balance was reduced to \$286,000, however, and it costs about

\$234,000 per class day to run the school district.

Superintendent John Hoben estimates that a one-percent increase in salaries for district employees represents approximately \$300,000.

Budget figures were based on wage freezes for all school employees. Incremental increases remain intact, specified by prior contracts.

Hoben announced he would take a wage freeze on his \$58,000 annual salary last March.

Budget reductions in 1982-83 included the elimination of 59 positions, districtwide. Cutbacks totaled \$1,592,380.

Residents form group

Parents upset with school's discipline

Improved discipline of school-aged youth is the focus of a concerned group of Plymouth-Canton residents called "Parents Who Care."

Barbara Timmerman, a Canton resident, is the founder of Parents Who Care. It was Timmerman's letter to the Observer March 25 that started the organization.

Timmerman is upset with the discipline in middle and high schools and says she is tired of seeing kids "ruling the society."

Teachers don't have enough authority over the students anymore, Timmerman said. Instead of building a "pal-type rapport" with the students, the teachers should have a greater power to enforce rules without fear of a lawsuit, she feels.

"I'm not advocating corporal punishment, but I think they (the teachers) should be able to push them down in their seats if need be," said Timmerman, who has three children of her own. "They (teachers and students) need to have a learning relationship between them, but there should be a cer-

tain amount of fear to get respect and love."

AUDREY ETIENNE, U. S. Government teacher at Plymouth Canton High School, does not see a discipline problem within the classroom but has experienced problems in the halls.

"There is no lack of respect or discipline within the classroom," Etienne said. "There has been trouble in the halls like insubordination, but I think that comes from the students feeling of anonymity. This happens when the school setting is so large."

Dan Chrenko, another Canton teach-

er and varsity wrestling coach, said discipline is a good thing, but the problems at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP) are no different than anywhere else when 3,500 students are assembled in one area.

"Out here (at CEP), just by volume of kids, you've got to expect to have kids who don't fit the norms," Chrenko said. "A parent has to be careful because that (parent's) perception of school is when they went to school, not now. Things are different. Teachers' styles are different."

"When it comes right down to it, if I ask a kid to stop, he will. I've never had to use violence."

"Because where will it all end? First, you push them down, then you slap them, then you punch them. Finally, you're defending yourself against them. When does it all stop?"

TO IMPROVE the discipline in the schools, Timmerman suggests there should be a truant officer to cut down on absenteeism and a code of conduct for the students to follow as well as a dress code.

"Why can't you put rules on the wall? You will act this way, you will follow these rules or else," Timmerman said. "You have to start from the elementary level. Let's not let niceness get in the way of education."

Both Etienne and Chrenko agree, however, that more rules are not the solution to the problem.

"We need to learn to get along," Chrenko said. "You can't have a set of non-pliable rules and have everyone fit into a certain mold. If we have the rules, follow them. But we shouldn't have more than we need."

There is a code of conduct that the students are expected to follow, according to Canton principal Kent Buikema.

Another concern of Parents Who Care is that teachers are not notifying

parents as soon as a problem arises with their child.

"If a kid gets into trouble at school, the teachers aren't notifying the parents," Canton resident Mary Gumber said. "The teachers need to tell the parents sooner. They (the teachers) let too much get away at school. The parents want to know when their kid is in trouble."

CANTON AREA coordinator Ken Jacobs disagrees. He thinks parents are contacted on time.

"When the student is identified, the parent is notified," Jacobs said. "We don't call parents on suspicions, and different situations warrant different responses."

At the high school level, teachers first talk with the student and if the problems aren't corrected, the parent is contacted, Jacobs said.

John Hoben, superintendent of schools, said he was supportive of group interested in bettering the schools. Other teachers and area coordinators are also in favor of getting parent the schools.

"There is always a discipline problem," Hoben said. "Even one incident is a problem. This is nothing new, just a matter of degree."

The schools had a fine year discipline-wise in 1981-82, Hoben said. An despite the better discipline, a recent survey of area residents showed that most parents were concerned about discipline problems in the schools.

'Issue too complicated,' say officials

Trustees nix manager idea for ballot

The Township Board last week nixed 6-1 a proposal to ask voters whether the township should switch to a professional-manager form of government.

Under a professional-manager government the duties of the supervisor would be trimmed.

Although some trustees voiced support for the concept, most believed the issue was too complex to place an advisory question on the November ballot.

Deadline for any November ballot proposal is this week, and officials believed it was too early — and too quick — to place this question before voters.

"There are many pros and cons to this issue," said Trustee Steve Larson. "It's a complex, complicated issue that should receive lengthy discussion."

"What we will get back (from voters) is a gut reaction without knowing all the issues behind it. I don't think it will be worth much."

There wasn't enough time to educate voters about the issue, other trustees said.

Trustee Robert Padgett, who proposed putting the question on the ballot, argued it would only take three to six weeks to produce a brochure explaining the issue.

Although township boards may switch to this form of government, the proposed ballot question was "advisory in nature," Padgett said.

He also believed this was the best time for a ballot question to help get public opinion during a non-election year in the township.

CANTON CURRENTLY has a full-time elected supervisor who chairs board meetings and oversees operations in Township Hall. The supervisor's salary is \$32,500 annually.

Padgett's proposal trims the supervisor's duties to chairing board meetings — a part-time job. A full-time superintendent or manager would be hired to administer policies set by the Township Board.

Supervisor James Poole, who was out of town on personal matters when Padgett introduced the proposal in early August, said last week he does not believe anyone intended to oust him from his duties or position.

In fact, Poole said he favored such a ballot question in August 1980, prior to his election office.

Poole did not support Padgett's proposal, however, because of limited time to properly educate voters. Township officials are sending out letters to various communities that have part-time supervisors for their suggestions and comments, Poole said.

Officials will follow up with phone calls and ask for an opinion from the Michigan Township Association on the issue.

"In some communities, elected officials are prohibited from giving any direction whatsoever to the governmental employees," Poole said in a prepared statement to the board. "This particular board should give this a great deal of thought because this board gives a great deal of direction to the number of department heads, and this will not work under any circumstances if you have hired someone on a contractual basis to supervise the department heads."

The state Open Meetings Act permits closed sessions when discussing certain personnel issues, including complaints against a public officer.

OFFICIALS HAVE said the long meetings are becoming exhausting.

Supervisor James Poole declined to comment on the specifics of the closed meeting. Future meetings to resolve the issue were delayed until next Wednesday because of various Labor Day weekend commitments, Poole added.

Both he and trustee Carol Bodenmiller have expressed a desire to open the meetings to the public.

Closed meetings create an atmosphere for rumors to flourish, said Bodenmiller. Despite coolness between Poole and Sterlini, the issue is efficiency, not politics, Bodenmiller added.

"There seems to be a stalemate," said Bodenmiller. "For that reason, I think it (meeting) should be opened. I don't think it's going to be resolved, otherwise."

"If the efficiency is threatened, then the problem has to be resolved," Bodenmiller added.

Mail fraud crackdown target of House Bill

Legislation designed to help the Postal Service crack down on mail fraud schemes that prey upon the elderly and the ill was outlined by U.S. Rep. William D. Ford, (D-Taylor).

Ford's district includes Garden City, Westland and part of Livonia.

The announcement followed agreement between Ford and Reps. Mickey Leland (D-Texas) and Claude Pepper (D-Florida), Chairman of the House Select Committee on Aging.

Ford, chairman of the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service, said:

"I am convinced that something must be done to stop the U.S. mail from being used by opportunists to bilk many of our senior citizens of their life savings."

Leland, chairman of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee's Subcommittee on Postal Personnel and Modernization, said: "Our recent hearings examining this disturbing problem confirmed the findings made by Chairman Pepper in his committee's extensive study."

The joint bill (H.R. 7044) is revised version of legislation which had been proposed earlier in this Congress.

It would give the Postal Service the necessary enforcement powers it now lacks, such as the right to make immediate test purchases of products offered for sale through the mail.

Civil liberties concerns raised during recent Post Office Committee hearings also have been dealt with in the new bill, according to Ford.

"Our bill strikes the delicate balance between the need to crack down on these mail order scams and the need to protect individual rights and liberties. We are giving the Postal Service significant new powers, but we are also building into the law extensive safeguards against any misuse of those powers," said Ford.

The three Congressmen said that they anticipate Committee action on the legislation shortly after the Labor Day recess and House passage before the end of September.

Housing woes

Realtors speak mind on state of industry

Some Realtors claim it's a buyer's market. Others say real estate interest rates are on the way down. And there are those who maintain the housing industry can't get any worse. To find out what's happening locally, a team of Observer & Eccentric editors — Ron Garbinski, Kathy Moran and Dennis O'Connor — recently hosted a joint interview with four leading real estate brokers. Mel Durbin of the Durbin Co., Bob Gavey of the Chamberlain Companies, Steve Pew of Max Brook Inc. and Dick Weir of Weir, Manuel, Snyder and Ranke offer their views on the industry and the economy in this three-part series.

MANY REALTORS are saying it's a buyer's market. Everybody says it's a good time to buy. Is that just industry hype or some way to make a buck or is there any truth to it?

WEIR: Of course it's a buyer's market. There are a lot of houses for sale and it's difficult to sell them because of interest rates. There are more houses for sale than there are buyers. In Detroit, the number of houses for sale are growing week by week, month by month and whenever you have an imbalance in a supply and demand you get a buyer's market. And that's what we've got.

But who can afford to buy anyway?

PEW: People who have the money. I think it is definitely a buyer's market. I don't think there's any question about it. You can relate it to the analogy that they have about the stock market. People who are shrewdly making money in the stock market don't buy when the market is up, they buy when the market is down. And I think that the people who have any kind of money or any kind of leverage for transactions should be looking seriously at real estate because the prices are not what they were in 1976, '77 and '78. They're down, and if they are looking at a house, or thinking about purchasing a house, now is the time they ought to be doing it. This market is going to turn around. It always has in the past and it's going to again. And they'll be looking back saying 'why didn't I buy in 1981, '82.' So yes, it is a buyer's market. They ought to take advantage of it.

GAVEY: I don't believe it's a real estate hype at all. It's true it's a buyer's market and that's not necessarily negative. You know, four or five years ago we had a seller's market. The reason that now is a good time to buy is because of the tremendous selection of homes and the sellers financing at 11 percent. I agree with Steve and Dick — it is going to come around. The automobile companies aren't going to go away. It's only a time principle we are looking at.

DURBIN: In the market that we represent, we have a unique situation here. We have very, very desirable real estate properties — the greatest selection ever in history. Financing, which is the headline of scaring away people, which is the actual analysis of what's happening, 80 percent of the sales that have gone through the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board in the last four months have been less than the quoted price. And we're using 17½ percent as the average mortgage price or 17 percent — whatever the figure might be. Chances are that most of those sales are accomplished at 11

percent. If that's the case, and people want to go to that maximum of 15 percent, then the 11 percent may become obsolete unless it's kept down by competitive factors — which we hope it will be.

Why do you think it's going to turn around next year?

DURBIN: I made that statement in opposition to the thought that it's going to turn around immediately. In my bones I don't feel that way anymore. But if a person needs a house and wants a house, now is absolutely the best time to buy. As Steve pointed out, you don't buy at the stock market when it's at its top. A profit in real estate is made when you buy, not when you sell. Based on that, now is the perfect time to buy if you're treating real estate as investment. Now is the perfect time to buy for treating real estate as a shelter because you have the greatest amount of selection right now. So it's the combination of the two along with possible 11 percent financing or a fraction thereof which makes this an ideal time to buy. Don't wait for the market to change, don't play expert. Do what satisfies your family and yourself and go from there.

Is this a good time to sell?

DURBIN: Most of the people that are selling have a need to sell. They are being transferred or there have been sociological changes in their family and a lot of them are blinking. They got a low ball offer and they counter for such and such. However, in defense of that, the first four months in the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors' sales statistics, the average price against 1981 has only gone down about \$2,500 — not a very appreciable amount because the basic value in the real estate is constant. It is a good investment.

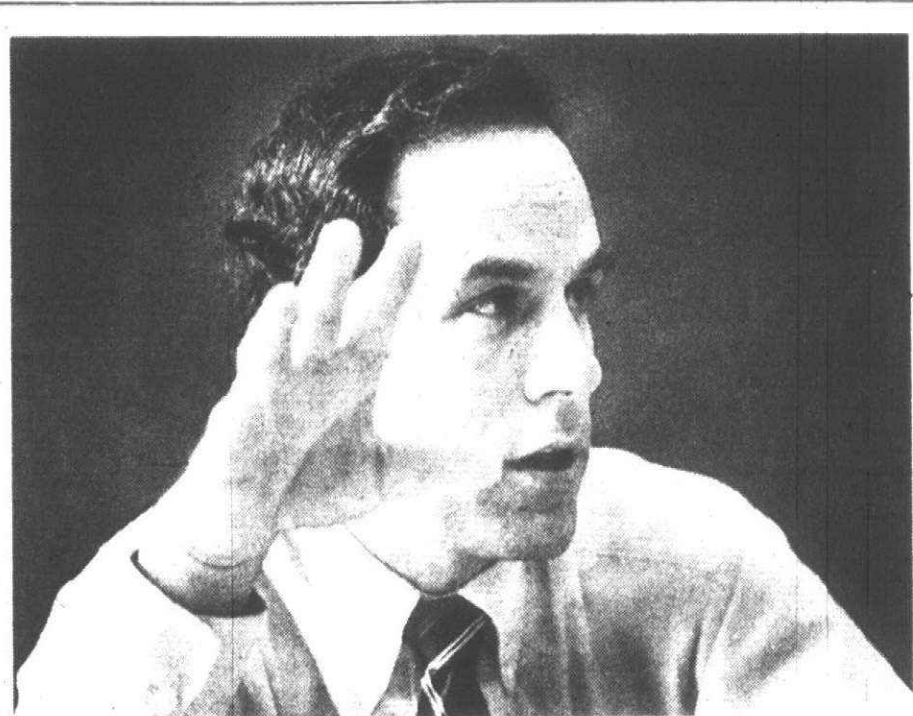
PEW: You asked whether it's a good time to sell — it's a great time to sell if you are in a position as a seller to offer terms that are competitive and maybe even better than competitive because you will have people pounding at your front door wanting to get in it. And it's another answer to 'Is it a good time to buy?' There's a tremendous pent-up demand for buying right now. There are buyers out there. All four of us talk to them all the time. We want them to buy. We're concerned. There's a psychological concern about their job, there's a psychological concern about what's going to happen to the whole state economy and all that kind of thing. But for the seller who can offer great terms, there are a lot of buyers out there who will say 'I don't care about the psychological things that are going on in the state, I am going to buy anyway.' I know that all four of us, in the last 30 days, have had houses where there have been two buyers bidding on that house. The house that's got the great terms. So is it a good time to sell? Yes it is, if the seller can offer great terms. No it's not, if he cannot. If he's only in a position to take cash, he's going to be out in the cold.

WEIR: You ask when is the market going to change? The market will change when government gets its house in order and stops spending us into the poorhouse and gets out of the credit market, sopping up available credit. You know they talk in Washington, and Reagan talked about it in a recent press conference, how Congress could find a way to cooperate and get the projected deficit for next year down in the neighborhood of \$100 billion and then the year after that to \$75 billion and then the third year down to maybe \$50 billion. And this would be a psychological lift that should tend to give people some kind of confidence which would bring interest rates down. Well, I wish I could believe that, but the fact of the matter is that the trillion dollar national debt is still there. Federal government is still going into credit markets and sopping up approximately half of it. But whether they get the budget balanced currently or not, the trillion dollar debt is not reduced. And so that large encroachment by the federal government into the credit market will continue.

Are you in favor or against federal subsidies in the mortgage market?

WEIR: No, I'm not because I think as soon you do that there are a dozen others that want to get the same kind of thing. I don't think you can do it. I think you have to get the whole thing in order. In other words, the federal and state governments also have got to get their budgets under control and their spending inside their income. Stop spending us into the poorhouse which is what this nation has been doing for 40 years. You aren't going to get interest rates down while that situation continues.

PEW: I want to piggyback a little bit. Our national association, as goes the old saying in the movie "Network," 'We're mad as hell and we're not going to take it anymore.' We are at the point now of trying to mobilize our own forces. There are 650,000 Realtors-Realtor associates in the country and we are trying to mobilize our own forces and get the sellers that we're dealing with to go along with us to send a very simple card to our congressmen and representatives throughout the country saying quit playing politics with our future, which is what they're doing right now. The Democrats aren't going to pass the budget because the longer the recession goes on the more likely it is that the Democrats are going to be elected this fall. The Republicans are saying we're not going to compromise. By that I mean we're going to stand over here and put in the corner and you're going to do your thing. So what we (Realtors) want to do is not blame anybody except all of them. We're going to say get off your butts and get this matter resolved so we can have a budget. So the financial people in 'New York and the Federal Reserve Board can say, "Okay, now we know what the deficit is going to be." Now we can start reacting to that because the interest rates are going to be coming down, which are going to effect not only our business, but this town. Like it or not, this is only a one-industry town and if the cars aren't selling, then neither are houses because the people who buy the houses are the people working in the automotive or they are allied suppliers. If they're not making any money, they're not going to buy any houses. It doesn't make any difference what's going to happen then. The interest rates simply have to come down so the basic industries of this town — And it's steel, autos, rubber, housing and all the affiliated industries that circle around those basic ones — can get going again.

GAVEY: It has never worked yet. We haven't seen it work for 40-50 years. I'm afraid that the American public isn't willing to pay the price for that to happen. And the politicians are not willing to pay the price either. What kind of inflation rate did we have four-five years ago — 15 percent, 16 percent in the city of Detroit? I guess the question I'm asking is the compromise 16 or 17 percent interest rates as opposed to 15 or 14 percent inflation? I guess those are the tradeoffs we're talking about.

Isn't it true that, psychologically, people will buy when mortgage rates are around 13-14 percent?

WEIR: That's the growing intelligence, but there's no proof of it. That keeps changing.

PEW: The reality is mortgage rates are at 11-12 percent and houses still aren't selling.

School voters face election homework

Garden City voters will probably have a general city charter revision campaign on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Petitions filed Aug. 3 with about 1,200 signatures of registered voters apparently have sufficient names to qualify for the fall election.

The city clerk has until mid-September to verify that the signatures are those of registered voters and notify the county clerk's office.

City Clerk/Treasurer Ronald Showalter said his office has checked about half of the signatures on the petitions and there appears "to be no problem."

At the same time, candidates for a charter revision commission will plan to mount campaigns for the Nov. 2 ballot.

Unlike other city elections, there will be no primary for the commission.

In a similar election nine years ago, voters picked nine commissioners from a field of 22 candidates without a primary being held to narrow the field.

If the voters reject a charter revision, then the commission election results become academic.

COMMISSION CANDIDATES have

until 4 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14, to file petitions, now available at the clerk's office.

Showalter said petitions must have from 75 to 125 signatures of registered voters to qualify for the ballot.

The charter revision petitions were filed Aug. 3 by people seeking to abolish the current city manager form of government and hopefully change the charter to have a full-time elected mayor instead.

The petitions called for an advisory, non-binding question on the Nov. 2 ballot calling for the abolition of the city manager form of local government in Garden City.

But the county clerk's office said nearly a month ago that local advisory questions aren't allowed on elections handled by the county.

The Nov. 2 ballot will be a statewide election with voters picking a governor, U.S. senator, and representatives in the U.S. House of Representatives,

state Legislature and county board of commissioners.

CITY COUNCILMAN Gene Salvatore, a leader of the petition campaign, said earlier this spring he wants to change the form of government to have a full-time elected mayor.

Salvatore was named to fill a county vacancy May 3, succeeding Richard Fernandez, who resigned April 19, five months after elected to a two-year term.

The charter revision proposal is expected to attract commission candidates who favor retaining the city manager form and those who support the fulltime mayor concept.

The current charter was approved by a 66-vote margin in 1974.

The manager form of government surfaced last summer and fall during the mayoral and council election campaign.

In most cases, council candidates who supported the city manager form did better than those who opposed it.

Westworld owner will sue

One of the owners of Westworld in Westland said he will sue the city in an effort to overturn City Council's 7-0 decision to deny a proposed site plan for the recreational complex.

"We're going to sue everybody now — the city, City Council, everybody I can sue," said Matt Locricchio, one of several owners of the 60-acre property at the former Hawthorne Valley Country Club.

He also said the developers would seek punitive damages, probably in the millions of dollars.

Council members cited concerns of neighboring homeowners, potential traffic and noise problems, and possible future development in turning down the site plan Monday.

All but a few of the 60 acres at the site near Merriman and Warren roads is zoned for public land use.

SITE PLAN approval would have allowed installation of a go-cart track, bumper boat pond and batting cages.

Westworld presently consists of a nine-hole golf course and a clubhouse which contains a restaurant, video game room, snack bar and bowling alley.

Alex Bardy, Westworld general manager, said he wasn't surprised by the council vote.

"What bothers me the most is a homeowners' group coerced city council and the administration to vote no on the site plan when a majority, everyone

who sees the site plan, says it's a good plan and should be passed," Bardy said.

"The party's over as far as any communication with this council," he added.

Jeffrey Jahr, attorney for Westland, said he believes the council's position will be upheld in court.

THE HAWTHORNE Valley Citizens Committee has been challenging the development since February.

The association initiated a petition drive, hired an attorney, filed a lawsuit, regularly monitored council meetings and suggested a possible recall during its campaign against the development.

Westworld developers later also worked at marshalling community support by hosting parties and forwarding letters of support for their project to Mayor Charles Pickering, the council and local newspapers.

The city's planning commission had recommended that the plan be approved while city planning director Dale Farland had recommended denial.

COUNCILWOMAN Justine Barns said she didn't believe the concerns and fears of homeowners in the area had been satisfied by the site plan.

Councilman Ben DeHart cited noise and traffic problems while Councilmen Robert Wagner and Thomas Artley said they objected to the go-cart track.

DeHart and Artley also wondered aloud whether Westworld developers would one day phase out the golf course on the site and bring in new amusements.

Prior to denying the site plan, Council voted 4-3 to deny a request from the developers to rezone 2.3 acres of the property from single family residential to public lands.

Teens face charges in church break-in

Three 17-year-old Livonia men are charged with breaking into the Canton Calvary Baptist Church on Joy Road last month.

Michael Richard Carr, Brian Keith Wallace and Thomas David Niemenski were arraigned Monday before 35th District Court Judge Dunbar Davis. They were charged with breaking-and-entering in an unoccupied building.

Carr lives on Nola, while Wallace and Niemenski live on Blueskies in Livonia.

The court entered innocent pleas in their behalf. The three were released on personal bond. Preliminary examination will be Sept. 9.

ACCORDING TO police, the father of one of the teens is one of the church's directors. A key to open the church was taken without the father's knowledge, according to reports.

A piece of concrete was thrown into a church window to make it appear as if entry was forcible, said police. A witness reported hearing a crashing sound moments after seeing someone get out of a car and walk to the church.

Two of the suspects were arrested after trying to buy a power cord for the sound mixer, said police. Reportedly, there are only a few such sound mixers in the state.

The third suspect was arrested later. The sound system has been recovered.

The breaking-and-entering charge carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison upon conviction.

Council drops Helping Hand

The Plymouth-Canton Community School Council is in the process of dropping its sponsorship of the Helping Hand program.

The council, composed of a volunteer representative from each building in the district, is concerned about its legal liability should a lawsuit be filed against someone involved in the Helping Hand program.

The council has received a legal opinion from the school district's attorneys (Draugelis, Ashton, Scully and Haynes) stating that the council could be made a party to a lawsuit and be liable under certain circumstances.

The attorney, John T. MacLean, also stressed in his opinion that not all homeowners' insurance policies will include coverage to protect Helping Hand participants from a lawsuit.

Lynn Hoehn, council chairman, urges all Helping Hand participants to contact their insurance agents to see if they are insured against possible liability.

"Coverage differs from homeowner to homeowner," says Hoehn. "Some policies will cover the Helping Hand participant,

while others don't. That's why it's important that each person check his or her policies to make sure."

Helping Hand is a program in which the participant places a bright red drawing of an extended hand in a front window to be seen clearly from the street. The idea is that a child in trouble on the street (lost, injured or otherwise in need of help) can look for a home with a Helping Hand and go to that door for assistance.

Initially, in Plymouth-Canton, the Helping Hand program was started by the Plymouth Jaycettes and by Sylvia Stetz before she was elected to the school board. After the Jaycettes dropped the program, the school council took over sponsorship.

Now the council is divesting itself from the program and is asking the school district, possibly the board's safety committee, to sponsor Helping Hand.

"The Helping Hand is a very fine and worthwhile program," stresses Hoehn, who said the council is withdrawing its sponsorship only because "of the many questions of liability to individuals."

The district now is in touch with its insurance agent, Fairlane Associates Inc., to see what the district's liability and coverage implications are in case it agrees to accept sponsorship of the program.

MacLain stresses that the liability of a Helping Hand participant is only potential because the issue would have to be decided by a jury.

"While the law generally does not impose a duty on a person or association of persons to act to protect the interest of others," wrote MacLain in his opinion, "an exception arises when the person or association takes affirmative action to assist others in trouble or danger."

"In such cases, the person or association assumes voluntarily the duty of using reasonable care for the protection of others' interest and most certainly has the duty to avoid any affirmative act that makes the other person's situation worse."

The key is that the participant must not expose a child responding to the sign for help to greater danger than he or she already was exposed to, said MacLain.

Youths to get tips on being home alone

The Huron Valley Girl Scout Council is offering a program for boys and girls between 6 and 12 years old designed to help them feel more secure about staying home alone.

The program is designed for youngsters who come home to an empty house because both parents are working.

It is being offered in conjunction with the

local chapter of the American Red Cross, local law enforcement personnel and the Home Economics Department at Eastern Michigan University in three hour-long sessions. The sessions will cover emergency procedures, emergency phone calls, basic first aid, accident prevention, nutritious snacks, starting dinner, activities and games that can be done alone.

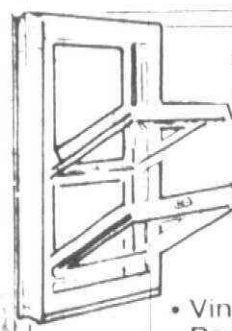

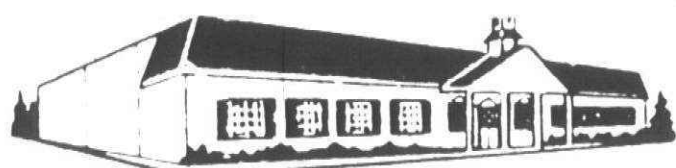

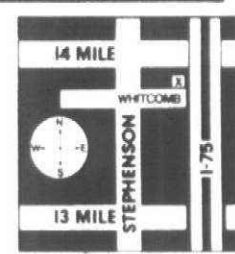

Dem education candidates see grim years ahead

Jubilant — that's what Michigan Democrats felt when they looked at their victory prospects at last week-end's state convention in Flint.

"Painful" — that's how most Democrats nominated for the governing boards of state universities see the years ahead.

"I'm going to support an extension of the 1-percent increase in the state income tax," said Detroit Mildred Jeffrey. She was nominated for a second term on the Wayne State University Board of Governors.

"I'm not saying the increase should be permanent — one or two years," added Jeffrey, 71, a former UAW official and veteran of women's and liberal political wars.

Other nominees weren't ready to join her in advocating extension of the income tax, but all saw higher education as being in grave danger from recession-caused cuts in the state budget. Presidents of two universities last week said their state appropriations have been cut 22-25 percent in a single year.

"SHE'S CORRECT, but it's politically suicidal," said another prominent state Democrat, who asked to remain unidentified. "If the leadership made that kind of decision, I'd campaign for it."

After almost two months of late-hour sessions, the Michigan Legislature in May voted to raise the personal income tax to 5.5 percent from 4.6 percent, limiting the increase to six months — from April 1 to Sept. 30.

This week, the Legislature's Joint

Appropriations Committee is due to take up Gov. Milliken's proposed \$150 million in state budget cuts. Higher education expects to lose \$35 million in those cuts. Jeffrey, for one, hopes the legislators will reject Milliken's cuts.

Meanwhile, in Flint, Democrats Sunday nominated the rest of their state ticket by acclamation.

Martha Griffiths was cheered as she accepted the nomination for lieutenant governor, after being asked by gubernatorial nominee James Blanchard. So were Secretary of State Richard Austin, who will be seeking his fourth term, and Attorney General Frank Kelley, seeking his seventh elected term. So were Supreme Court Justice Blair Moody Jr. and court nominee Michael Cavanaugh.

THEN THE convention took a 10-minute recess, the TV cameras disap-

peared, and even many of the 3,000 delegates departed. Those who were left nominated two persons for each four education boards.

"Higher education in this state is in crisis," said Thomas Roach, 53, University of Michigan regent from Ann Arbor. Roach was nominated for a second term. "Public appropriations have declined by one-third as a percentage of support. Tuitions are rising 40 percent, more than double what it was 20 years ago."

"Reagan is dismantling (federal) educational aid to our young people by 62 percent in one year, if he gets his way."

Added Sarah Goddard Power, 47, also of Ann Arbor and also nominated for a second term on the U-M Board of Regents: "The tuition tax credit (advocated by Reagan) will only help a few, not the ones who need it."

Power wouldn't join Jeffrey in advocating extension of the income-tax increase unless gubernatorial nominee Blanchard supports it. But she conceded it's a "high possibility."

Of U-M's situation, Power said, "We'd only have to lose six or eight or 10 key people in research to suffer real deterioration."

"PUBLIC EDUCATION is starving for funds," said Carroll Hutton, 61, of Highland, the party's nominee for a first term on the State Board of Education.

Asked about Jeffrey's proposed extension of the income-tax increase, Hutton replied, "I don't rule out any options. I'm not prepared to say what I'd do at this time." Hutton is assistant dean of continuing education at Oakland University, Rochester, and a former director of the UAW's education department.

"Taxpayers have to decide whether they want excellent higher education," said Michael Einheuser, 31. Einheuser was nominated as Jeffrey's running mate for a second term on the Wayne State board.

"Michigan used to be in the top five of state budgets for higher education.

Now we're in the bottom five. We may have to support it (extension of the income tax)."

While the WSU governing board job is politically thankless — compared to his former jobs as executive assistant to Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and member of the Wayne County Charter Commission — Einheuser said that in his youthful first term, "I probably took more than I gave. Now I have a chance to give more than I take."

"We have an outstanding new president (David Adamant), and I owe it to him to stay on. It ain't gonna be easy. I can help him take some heat for tough decisions he has to make."

"IT'S HARD to believe the next several years can be worse than the last eight," said John Bruff, Macomb County attorney, who was nominated for a second term on the Michigan State University board.

Bruff's running mate will be House Speaker Bobby Crim, 51, of Davison, who is retiring from the Legislature.

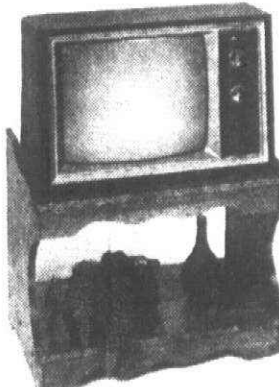

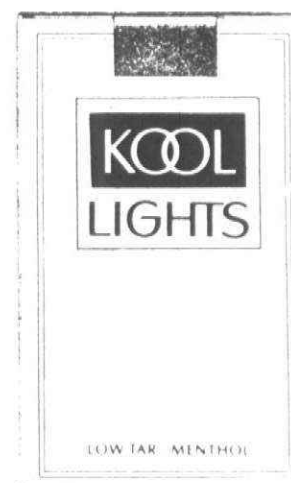
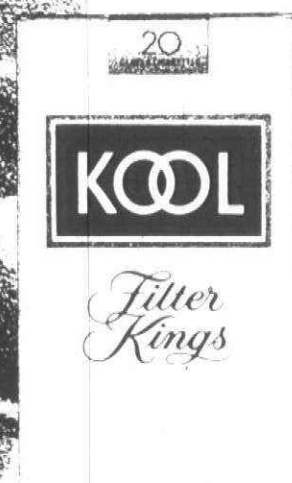

Deadlock broken — Sarris named to S'craft board

Sharon Sarris of Livonia will fill a vacancy on the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees. Her selection by the remainder of the community college board took six ballots.

She replaces Nancie Blatt, who resigned July 31 to move to Chicago. A nine-year veteran of the board, Blatt had three years left in her term.

Sarris will serve until next June. Then voters will decide who fills the

remaining two years of the term. Sarris told the board she plans to run. "I feel very good about the vote," Sarris, 37, said. "I know it was a tough decision and I am challenged by it," she added.

SARRIS WAS selected by a 4-2 vote, after the board took five ballots that ended in a 3-3 split between Sarris and Armen Barsamian of Garden City.

Sarris and Barsamian, a Garden City Board of Education member, were among five finalists from the original 16 applicants.

Through the fifth ballot, Sarris was supported by Rosina Raymond, Laura Toy and Paul Kadish, all Democrats in their non-college politics. Barsamian was supported by Harry Greenleaf, Leonard Wozniak and Michael Burley, all Republicans in their non-college politics.

To end the deadlock, Burley switched to Sarris. Following the tie breaker, the board agreed to make the appointment unanimous.

Burley originally favored Barsamian because he is a resident of Garden City, which has no resident on the seven-member board.

"There are more votes in Livonia, and when a person has to run for office

it's a lot easier if the person from another community is already on the board to get that Livonia vote," Burley said.

Six of the seven board members are from Livonia, which has about half the college district's population. Burley lives in the Plymouth-Canton school district.

Clarenceville, Garden City and Northville are also part of the college district.

KADISH SAID Sarris brings a point of view to the college that is much needed.

"She is a graduate of a community

college from the northern part of the state. She's an educator, she's worked with the administration and board members and will bring that expertise to the college," he said.

Sarris said the most immediate challenge and task will be working with the college's finances and trying to maintain programs at the same time.

"We have a slight increase in enrollment, and I don't want to see too many cutbacks come at a time when more people are looking toward community colleges," she added.

Sarris holds an associate degree in English and history from Lake Michigan Community College, a bachelor's degree in English and education from

Michigan State University and a master's degree in remedial reading from the University of Michigan.

She is employed by Harron Cable TV in Southfield.

She is a member of numerous political groups, including the 2nd District Women's Political Caucus. She has also been active on school millage campaigns and with many professional associations.

She has taken courses at Schoolcraft, as well.

Other finalists included Paul Dawson of Northville, Carol Juarez-Beach of Garden City and John Leinonen of Northville.

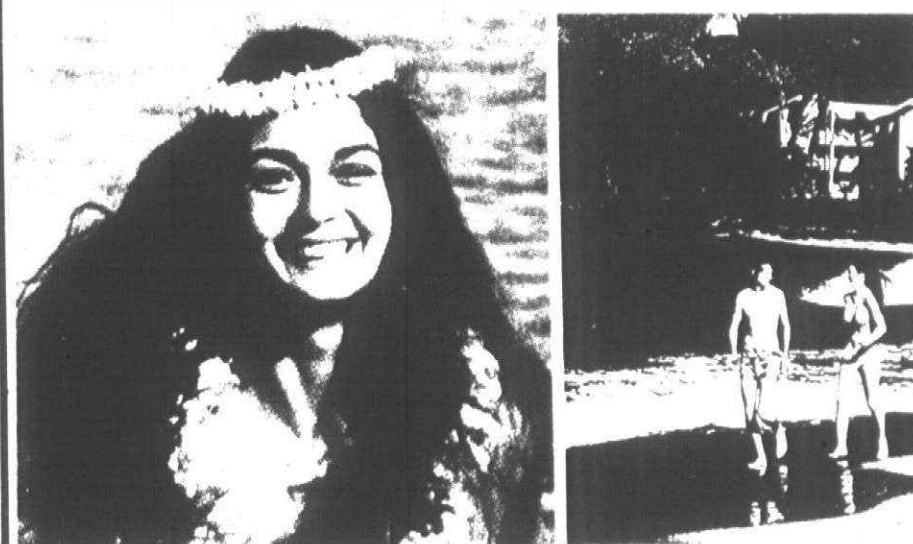

Schoolcraft faculty hits board on facilities

The Schoolcraft College Faculty Forum has criticized the college board for "discretionary spending of large sums of money for facilities improvement" while taking a tough stand on a new contract.

The Forum agreed last week to a one-semester extension of the present two-year contract to Dec. 31 (not Dec. 23 as reported in Monday's edition).

Delavan Sipes, Forum president, said the agreement "demonstrates the commitment of college faculty to the continuity of the educational

process while it searches for effective ways to contain costs."

Sipes said the Forum proposed a change in insurance carriers which could save the college \$61,000 to \$97,000. But Sipes said the board is unwilling to consider the change.

Sipes further noted that employees, other than faculty members, have been threatened with possible layoffs.

The board of trustees was scheduled to meet Wednesday evening in a closed-door strategy session.

'Survival without stagnation' College goes into marketing

Schoolcraft College is developing a marketing plan to serve business and industry, President Richard McDowell told trustees.

McDowell last presented his strategy for the '80s, calling it "Survival without Stagnation."

"Schoolcraft College must continue to strengthen its place in the education environment by developing new programs, revitalizing older programs and maintaining its fiscal integrity in the context of shrinking resources," McDowell said.

During the upcoming year — money permitting — the college will establish two new allied health programs and a robotics program.

"The college will develop not less than five separate and distinct programs with business and industry for the purpose of improving employee satisfaction," he said.

TO ATTRACT business and industry, a college committee will develop a marketing image in its publications

and advertising throughout 1982-83.

The college relations department has produced a slide show about the two-year community college, which is available to community groups.

Besides adding new classes and securing "first-time" grants to keep income at the same level as last year from existing grant sources, Schoolcraft is developing a master maintenance plan for its physical plant.

"This plan will include scheduled repairs, life expectancies and projected costs, and will cover a period of 1983 through 1988," McDowell said.

An endowment fund will be established, which McDowell hopes will increase significantly the number of annual contributors.

TO BE SURE the college is meeting community needs, opinion surveys will be conducted on all major college publications.

The college will also publish an Economic Impact Study. Its target audience will be legislators, taxpayers and

local business persons.

Schoolcraft will develop an alumni association and maintain contact with former students through publications, McDowell said.

To further assist students, the college will expand its Learning Assistance Center to offer placement exams, early detection of academic problems

and tutorial assistance in a wider variety of areas.

"We will increase the number of students utilizing the services by not less than 20 percent," he said.

FINALLY, McDowell said, he will work with key administrators and heads of employee groups to develop concerted and consistent postures on legislative issues.

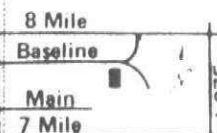

For Manager Glass Festival work has been a 'lifetime' occupation

It only seems fitting that the manager of the Fall Festival should be born and raised in Plymouth.

Carl Glass, a 36-year-old district sales manager for Frito Lay, grew up in Old Village but, oddly enough, doesn't ever remember attending the festival when he was a youngster because he was too busy helping with his father's business.

"I didn't become involved in the Fall Festival until I joined the Jaycees in 1969," Glass said. "I didn't have a chance because I'd helped out my father with his work since I was 7 years old."

According to Glass, he became assistant-manager for the festival in 1974 and became manager in 1976. Prior to his involvement with the managing of the festival, Glass was the president of the Plymouth Jaycees for two years (1972-73) and served on the board of directors for five years.

THE JOB IS a lot of work for Glass, who receives \$2,100 for his trouble from January through September. But it isn't the money that has kept him coming back for nine years.

"If you took my hourly wage, it would probably work out to 32 cents an hour," Glass said. "I haven't actually figured it out but I'm definitely not

here for the money."

The manager's duties include mailing out the applications for all the activities and the booths. Glass works with both the city and the publicity departments to keep things running smoothly. He also is in charge of purchasing any equipment needed for the festival.

To see all the pieces fall into place and to have the festival run as planned makes all the work worthwhile for Glass.

"IT IS a lot of work and pre-planning to pull the thing off," Glass said. "But I get a big kick out of it. It is the one

thing I really do for this community and I enjoy it."

And, of course, behind every great man there is a woman. The same holds true for Glass.

"My wife (Diane) plays a big role in all this," he said. "She makes sure all the bills are paid and does so many other things to take the load off me."

Experience has made the job easier for Glass as the years roll on. He has tried to keep the festival about the same size throughout the years, although it has grown some, Glass said.

And what about this year's festival? "You bet it'll be a great one," he said. "Absolutely."

Family Services joins the Festival

Plymouth Family Services is entering the Plymouth Fall Festival festivities this year with a Middle East food booth.

The agency will be selling kesta with a tabouleh garnish during the festival. Kesta is seasoned ground beef served in a pita bread (pocket) on a stick. The cost of a kesta will be \$1.25.

"Our kesta will give the shish-ka-bob some competition," said Jim Jabara, a Family Services board member.

The kesta will be prepared off-sight and taken to the Fall Festival booth, according to Jabara. They will be barbecued on special grills donated by Evelyn and Bob Erdelyi for the Family Services booth.

The decision to serve this Mid-Eastern dish was made by the Family Services board after Jean Jabara served the board a Mid-Eastern cuisine in her home.

Plymouth Family Services entered a booth in the Fall Festival because it wanted more exposure and needed to raise funds, said Diane Farber, branch supervisor.

"We've been a part of the community since 1964," said Farber. "However, a lot of people are not aware of our counseling services."

Plymouth Family Service is located at 880 Wing and provides counseling for individuals, couples, families and groups who live in the city of Plymouth or Plymouth Township.

Although this is the first time Family Services has entered a booth in the festival, it has participated in other facets. In 1979, the first year Family Services entered the window judging contest of the Fall Festival, the agency

She said many people think counseling is only for people with horrible problems. However, she said, counseling can be very beneficial to people under stress or to those who are in a transition period because of the economic times.

Family Services hopes to make the public more aware of who it is and what it can do, said Farber, and hopefully a booth will help give that kind of exposure.

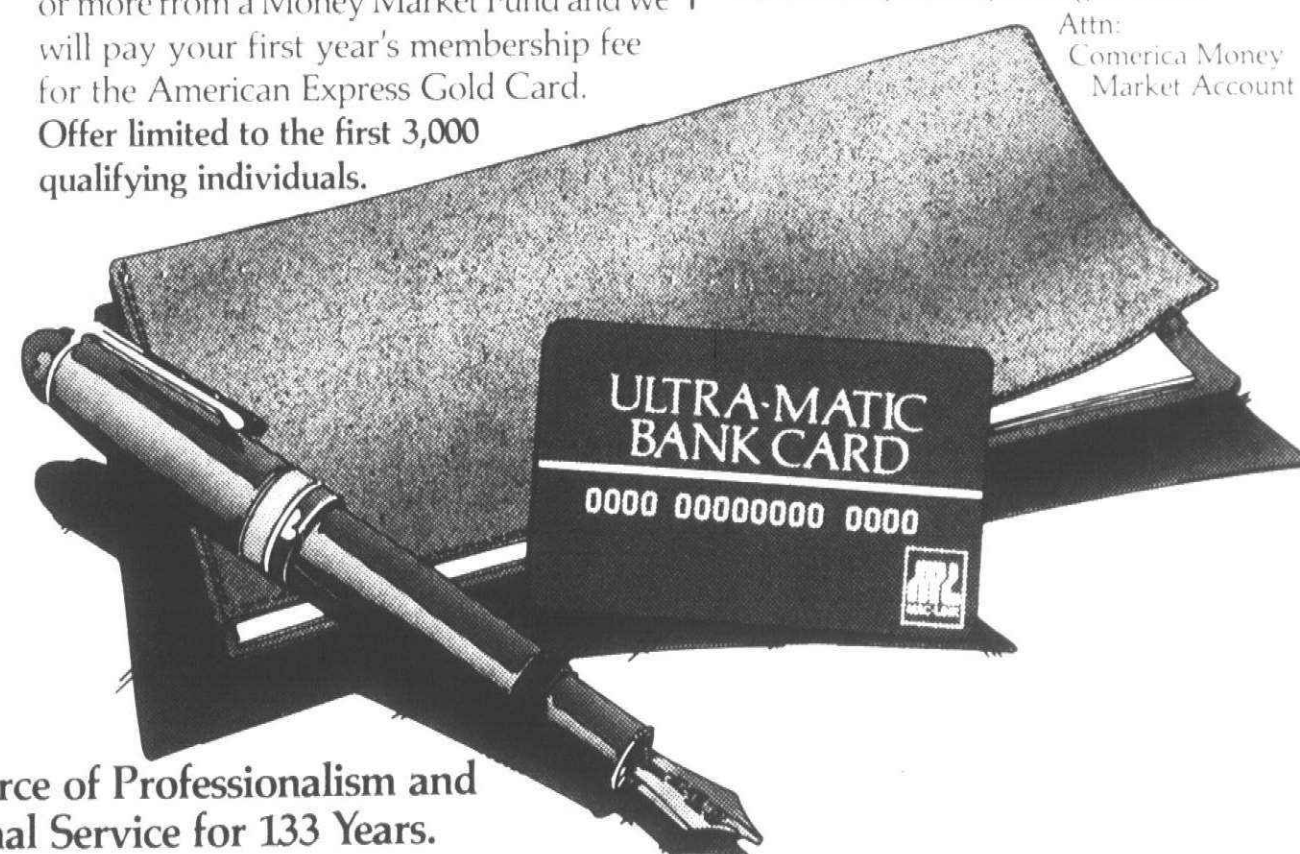

Schools should accept radio challenge

SCHOOL OFFICIALS have a unique opportunity to keep the Plymouth Canton Community Schools' financially troubled student radio station on the air.

But it will take the right person — and a considerable change in philosophy — to accomplish this goal.

In fact, if the correct changes are implemented at the student-operated FM station, it is believed WSDP eventually could pay for at least one-half — and maybe all — of its \$36,000 annual budget.

Jeff Cardinal, the original coordinator of the 10-year-old station, resigned three weeks ago for another position in Lansing. Cardinal is credited with beginning and expanding WSDP's coverage. The station has built a solid reputation as a good learning experience with a record of providing many graduates with careers in broadcasting.

Operating a high-school radio station is expensive, however. The Plymouth-Canton community is lucky to have a school station, but clearly it is a "frill" during these hard economic times.

But WSDP should get one more chance to stay on the air. But the station must begin to attract more listeners.

FRANKLY, NOT many people listen to WSDP. The station, under its current format, has nothing to offer listeners except for its live sports broadcasts and school board meetings.

Cardinal's position was defined as "coordinator" or "administrator" in the district. WSDP does not need an administrator. It needs a technician or a station manager to run the operation.

The schools easily could hire a qualified person at \$20,000 annually for this position, initially saving about \$3,000 in the radio budget.

The station manager then should change the present radio format. Any marketing analyst will tell you that people never listen to a multi-music station with an hour-long news format.

WSDP should change to a single-music format, easy-listening that will appeal to everyone.

News broadcasts should be limited to five-minute segments — like a real radio station.

And the news should be local. The station should scrap its United Press International (UPI) machine (saving another \$2,400 of the budget) and concentrate on producing its own local news stories, similar to CEP Perspectives, the student newspaper.

There's no way WSDP can compete for listeners by broadcasting national news. But the station has the resources to offer a quality, local news program that can attract listeners.

EDUCATIONALLY, WSDP offers the same — if not better — learning experience under this changed format.

Students still learn the basic broadcasting techniques with a local newscast. But they also learn to write and edit their own news stories, rather than relying on an expensive UPI machine to do it.

Students can be exposed to English, journalism, history, government, and writing, as well as radio.

More listeners eventually will attract more sponsors. Local merchants can consider giving funds to WSDP as more than just a charitable donation. Merchants can get something back for their money — exposure.

Currently, WSDP doesn't offer exposure for anyone.

AS A VOCATIONAL CLASS and instructional tool in a public-school setting, it is a shame to think a student-operated station must rely on outside funding for its survival. But that's the trend of the 1980s.

WSDP deserves a chance to prove it can generate more outside funds from its operation. School officials should make the commitment now.

Schoolcraft: a Livonia institution

SCHOOLCRAFT College trustees last week muffed a chance to build bridges to areas where college strength is soft.

After deadlocking on five ballots, six trustees appointed a Livonian, Sharon Sarris, to a vacancy created by the resignation of another Livonian, Nancie Blatt.

Schoolcraft College District was formed from five K-12 school districts in northwestern Wayne County. Of those five, Livonia has about half the population. Plymouth-Canton and Garden City about 40 percent, and Clarenceville and Northville the remaining 10 percent.

Until Blatt's resignation, the Schoolcraft board was dominated 6-1 by Livonians. With Sarris's appointment, it will stay that way.

SCHOOLCRAFT trustees know the two-year college increasingly is being perceived as a "Livonia" institution. The idea is not something this writer invented.

Indeed, at least two trustees, Rosina Raymond and Paul Kadish, unsuccessfully advocated that college trustees be selected from sub-districts so that all geographical corners of the community would be represented.

My sibling journalists at the Northville Record have been whooping it up in their community to get out candidates. One can imagine their disappointment at the board's decision.

There is another factor which is disappointing. Sarris comes out of the same 2nd District Women's Political Caucus and Democratic Party which produced trustees Raymond and Laura Toy. On paper, she looks like a clone of Raymond and Toy.

Well, the Schoolcraft board is certainly enriched by a liberal feminist Livonian point of view — but all three women with the same credentials? I'm not certain I will care for that, any more than I would want (say) three Elaine Donnelly's there. A board needs diversity.

I hasten to add, however, that Kadish assures me Sarris won't be a Raymond-Toy clone and will have the kind of independent streak Blatt often displayed. Kadish is a trustworthy chap, but even he must admit the whole thing looks bad on paper.

THE BOARD deadlocked 3-3 between Sarris and Armen Barsamian, a member of the Garden City Board of Education.

Barsamian might have been a 4-2 shoo-in on the first or second ballot but for one thing — he didn't want to give up his seat on the Garden City board.

That turned off Kadish, who wanted to vote for Barsamian. Granted the attorney general says a person can serve on both a K-12 and community college board, nevertheless it just doesn't look good.

So trustee Michael Burley, who had supported Barsamian on the early ballots, switched his vote on the sixth ballot, and that put Sarris in.

MY PURPOSE is not to knock Sharon Sarris, who has good credentials and intelligence. What happened reflects on the board, not her.

In fact, one can make a good case for Sarris. The voters elected Blatt, who was a former teacher working in private business and a Livonian. It may be only fair that the board replace her with a former teacher working in private business (cable TV) and a Livonian.

But the bottom line is this: There is no one from Clarenceville, Garden City or Northville on the Schoolcraft College board. Of the three women on the board, there is none who espouses more traditional political views.

Thus, the half-dozen Livonians who rule the roost must work harder than ever to represent the views of all elements of the college community.

Actually, one can make a case that the Schoolcraft board for years has been extremely sensitive to the needs of all corners of the district and has bent over backwards to make the smaller districts feel a part of the community college community.

But some days it just doesn't look like it.



Suburbs key to gubernatorial race

THIS YEAR'S state gubernatorial race is being battled to a large extent on suburban Detroit turf.

The clearest indication is that both candidates are from Detroit suburbs — Democratic candidate James Blanchard from Pleasant Ridge and Republican candidate Richard Headlee from Farmington Hills.

Besides that, consider the following:

- Both candidates announced their choices for lieutenant governor at press conferences in Southfield's Michigan Inn. Headlee tapped former Supreme Court Justice Thomas Brennan while Blanchard surprised many last week by naming former Congresswoman Martha Griffiths.

- The headquarters for the Headlee for Governor campaign is at Northland Towers in Southfield.
- Martha Griffiths' old U.S. House of Representatives district (the 17th) includes Southfield, Farmington and Redford Township.

- Headlee asked Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson to run on his ticket as the candidate for attorney general. Patterson accepted.

SUBURBAN DETROIT is playing an increasingly important role in state politics.

Three of the last four Democratic nominees for governor have come from southern Oakland County. Southfield has become the most popular site for offices for politicians seeking statewide positions.

In addition, perhaps the most influential political public relations firms have strong suburban ties.

McMaster and Associates of Troy has worked on several important campaigns including part of Headlee's this year and U.S. Rep. William Broomfield's (R-Birmingham). Farmington Hills' Jack Casey is a top political consultant and worked recently on Livonia's Ed McNamara's unsuccessful campaign for Wayne County executive.

Democrats tapped a pair of suburbanites for educational posts: Carroll Hutton of Highland Township, an Oakland University administrator, for the State Board of Education, and John Bruff of Fraser for the Michigan State University Board. Republicans are putting up Bloomfield Township residents Ellen Templin and Rockwell Gust for the University of Michigan board.

The importance of the votes in suburban Detroit was demonstrated in last month's Republican governor primary election. Going into the election, James Brickley was the overwhelming favorite to defeat opponents Patterson and Headlee. With his background in Detroit politics, Brickley was expected to run well in the Detroit suburbs. He failed.

In Oakland County, he ran a poor third behind Patterson and Headlee (in that order). In the Wayne County suburbs, Brickley ran second, despite heavy endorsements from local GOP legislators.

Brickley's poor showing in the Detroit suburbs, combined with Headlee's expected strength out-state, added up to a Headlee upset.

ONE KEY ISSUE in the governor's race will have a strong suburban appeal. Martha Griffiths admitted last week that she had "at least one more (political) fight" because of her opposition to Headlee's positions. Specifically, she mentioned Headlee's criticisms of the Equal Rights Amendment and of Detroit.

Unfortunately, Headlee's "hate Detroit" stance may be attractive to some suburbanites. Some myopic suburbanites believe that divorcing the state from the problems of Detroit will solve the state's difficulties. Griffiths will attempt to convince suburbanites that is not so. How that argument is resolved may play a key role in determining the gubernatorial election.

So, in the next few weeks, important statewide candidates will be trying to woo your vote. You may bump into candidates for governor at your town hall, recreation center or even at the neighborhood shopping mall.

Don't be surprised. Candidates prospecting for votes have found out that there's gold in them thar suburbs.

Buckle-up makes good sense for family

When it comes to a family's safety, the conservative rallying cry of "less government is better" rings a very flat note.

Just ask the survivors of the 17 persons killed on Michigan highways this past July 4th holiday weekend. Plan on asking the survivors of those who will be killed this coming Labor Day weekend.

And while you're at it, keep in mind that all 17 of those killed during the Fourth of July holiday weren't wearing a safety belt.

The grim truth is that the overwhelming majority of mothers and fathers in this state lack the common sense to put on a seatbelt — either on themselves or their children. Only about ten percent of passengers or drivers in this state take advantage of their safety belt protection.

It's stupid, just plain stupid. It also should be a crime. Yet, as of today, a bill which would make safety belt use mandatory languishes in the state Legislature.

NOW DON'T just sit back and blame the politicians. Why should they go against the grain of 90 percent of the state's citizenry?

But the present legislation — House Bill 5567 — could stand a little public support. It's a simple bill, really. If it's enacted, people not wearing safety belts will be fined \$25. No points tagged onto a driving record — just a \$25 fine.

That's pretty cheap life insurance when you examine the statistics of the countries which have mandatory safety belt laws. At present, 25 countries have such laws, so it's not like we'd be the Lone Ranger.

Ontario has had a law since 1976. Seat belt use has risen from 10 to 50 percent and highway deaths have decreased 17 percent.

An even more interesting set of statistics crops up in Sweden.

OF 28,000 traffic accidents studied in 1979, no fatalities were recorded among those using safety belts in cars going less than 60 miles an hour. When seat belts weren't used, fatalities occurred at speeds as low as 12 miles an hour.

Apparently, Swedes take a little more stock in

saving their own necks. At least 85 percent of the population uses safety belts.

Death, while certainly final, isn't necessarily the worst thing that can happen. Think of those who are maimed for life, prisoners of wheelchairs and beds because they didn't want to mess up their clothes or coiffures.

Better yet, think of the children in that condition whose parents allowed them to go unprotected.

AT LEAST we do have Public Act 117, which requires that infants be placed in infant seats while riding in automobiles. A lot of folks are more than a little miffed because those seats cost \$45. But recently one of the irritated wrote a letter to an up-state newspaper illustrating how his attitude had changed.

"I Would like to tell your readers how mad I was when I was forced to go out and pay \$45 for an infant seat," he said. But then his wife and child were in an accident.

"The back of the child car seat was facing the windshield. That seat broke off the ash tray, cracked the dashboard and chipped the windshield. Our baby didn't have a scratch on her. I would like to thank God and whoever else is responsible for passing that stupid law."

Now, if we only can get HB 5567 passed into law, maybe we can hear a few more good news stories.

Child care center gets new life

A \$70 million Senior Community Village construction project, designed to create more than 1,300 housing units in a campus-like setting for the elderly, received the go-ahead signal in Northville Township.

Signing of a 99-year lease with Wayne County gives the county's Economic Development Corp. (EDC) control of the project's development.

"The site is an abandoned county facility which has been a drain on the county's financial resources for over a decade," said Robert E. FitzPatrick, executive director of the Wayne County EDC. The site at Five Mile and Sheldon used to be the Child Development Center until it was closed in the early 1970s.

Developer will be Northville Senior Citizens' Development Corp., an enterprise of Saperstein Associates. It was so designated by the EDC's board of directors.

"THIS PROJECT converts the property into a tax-producing site which will generate more than \$1.4 million each year for Northville Township, the Northville School District, and the county of Wayne," he said.

"It generates jobs, one of the major factors of any project of this size — 765 construction jobs are involved, and an additional 550 permanent jobs are represented by this project."

It will be a self-contained community, offering a variety of housing, recreational facilities, shopping and commu-

nity center featuring a grocery, pharmacy, meeting rooms, and workshops.

"The community center will contain an auditorium for shows, concerts and plays, plus recreational facilities including a swimming pool.

"Construction of the first phase will probably begin next spring, with completion time estimated at two years. The entire project, including the various housing phases and development of the stores, shops and wide range of medical and convalescent facilities, is expected to be finished in five years," FitzPatrick said.

SAPERSTEIN Associates Corp. is in the process of arranging \$10 to \$20 million in federal Urban Development Action Grant financing.

Additionally, Saperstein Associates is working with the League of Catholic Women in Detroit in the league's application for more money for the project.

Lee Saperstein, president of Saperstein Associates, is also exploring the possibility of working with co-venturers and will incorporate health-care expertise in the development team.

An on-site review of other projects across the country will enable the firm to incorporate the most advanced facilities and programs to meet the needs of seniors, said Russell Barnett, Saperstein executive vice president.

"These programs will range from recreational facilities to total health care," Barnett said.

"It's an unusual blend of business

and government effort to create tax-producing land from government property. And this particular piece of county property has been costing Wayne County taxpayers \$130,000 a year for maintenance," Saperstein said.

"AFTER 3 1/2 YEARS of planning and negotiating, all of the paperwork for this unique project is signed, sealed and delivered," said FitzPatrick, who has been promoting the senior citizens' village project.

"This project is unique throughout the Midwest in that it offers a campus-like village for seniors and provides residential, medical care, shopping and recreational services."

Sixty of the site's 101 acres will be used for building construction, leaving 40 acres of open space that uses the present woods, ground cover and terrain to maintain the natural topography of the site.

THE VILLAGE will include several varieties of housing.

One- and two-story attached condominium units will be constructed in the north sector and will be available for sale.

Medium-density, garden-style apartments available for rental will be in the central sector.

The southern sector of the development will contain higher density mid-rise, five-story condominium units.

Another feature will be the inclusion of both congregate-care and convales-

cent-care facilities in the village.

Congregate care is designed for residents who need some assistance but can generally take care of themselves. Their units will have modified kitchens, but most of their meals and recreational activities will be at the village activity center.

Convalescent care will offer a full-time medical staff.

The project will serve all sectors of the county's senior population — those with limited incomes, as well as those with substantial incomes.

SEVERAL EXISTING buildings, solidly constructed during the 1920s, will be renovated and converted to village use. These include:

- Old fire station — to be renovated and maintained as a fire safety facility;
- Administration buildings — to be renovated for use as a non-denominational chapel, library, auditorium, central cafeteria and kitchen, medical offices and clinic, pharmacy and other convenience retail and multi-purpose activities;
- Existing structures — to be renovated as part of the low-density housing and for village maintenance and service needs.

A pedestrian arcade and village green will be positioned near the center of the complex to link the developments.

Landscape architects will use existing greenery, shrubs and trees in blending the new construction into the greenery of the site.

County lays off 258 after tax reject

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners Thursday finally approved a plan to lay off 258 employees for 20 months in hopes of eliminating the county's \$17.6 million budget deficit.

The plan calls for slashing 421 budgeted positions, 163 of them already vacant.

"All of us regret the decision on the layoffs, but I think it simply reflects the board's realization that there is no easy way out," said board chairman Samuel Turner.

IT WAS the second time in recent months that commissioners ordered layoffs. The first order was cancelled as commissioners decided to ask for voter approval of a one-mill property tax increase.

Voters, however, rejected the tax hike in the Aug. 10 primary.

After defeating the layoff plan last week, county budget officials drafted the new plan. State officials said they must receive a realistic plan for cutting spending before they will consider a county request to borrow money.

Charlene Lamphere, who arranged clown school for the center's merchant's association said:

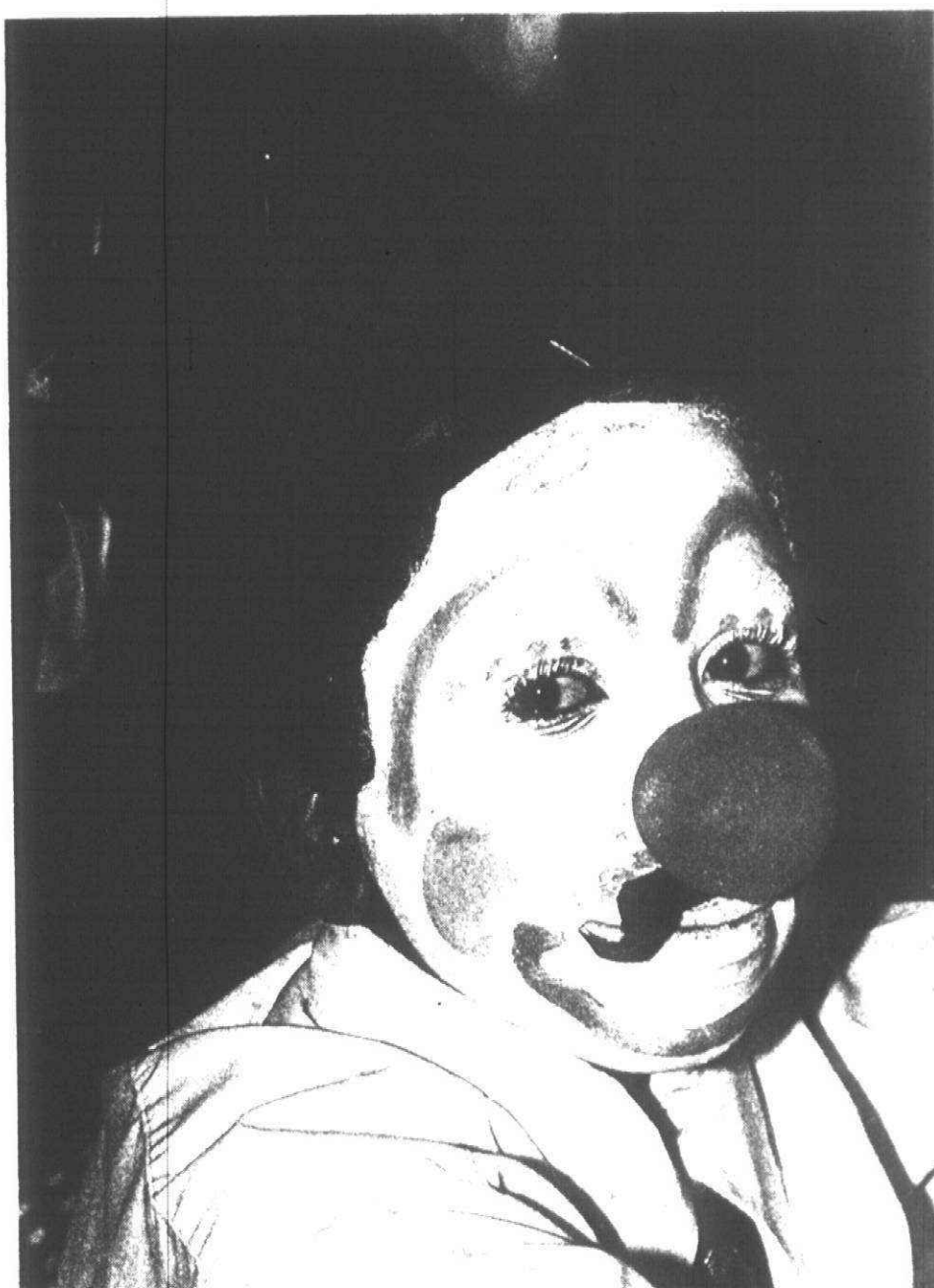
"We see it as a good project for the kids at this time of year when they're bored with summer vacation."

State voters back millage renewals

Despite the worst economic conditions in half a century, the approval rate for school property tax proposals in Michigan was up slightly last year, according to the State Board of Education.

The approval rate for renewal millages and millage increases rose, but the approval rate for a combination renewal-increase declined slightly.

PHILLIP E. RUNKEL, state superintendent of public instruction, said Michigan voters approved 448 out of a total of 863 operating millage proposals on the ballot during the 1981-82 school year.

The approval rate was 52 percent

compared to 49 percent the previous year (1980-81), when 425 out of 870 millage proposals were approved.

"We believe this speaks well for the voters of Michigan and their support of public education," Runkel said. "Even though many citizens are personally facing hardships in their personal lives, they are still, in many, many cases, supporting their schools."

Runkel said Michigan voters continue their "strong support" for school millage renewal proposals by approving nearly nine out of 10 renewals.

Last year, Runkel said, 287 out of 326 renewals were approved. That represents an approval rate of 88 percent, down slightly compared with the previ-

ous year, when 92 percent of all renewals were approved.

SLIGHTLY LESS than half of all combined millage proposals — renewal millage plus additional millage — were approved. Forty-one out of 88 combined proposals, or 47 percent, received voter approval, up from a 46 percent approval rate the previous year.

Slightly more than one out of four

proposals calling for additional millage was approved — 120 out of 449, or 27 percent, compared to 22 percent during 1980-81.

Runkel said the number of millage proposals on the ballot topped the 850 mark for the second consecutive year because many school districts held repeat elections on millage proposals that were defeated the first time they were on the ballot.

KAY AND DON Wood of Roosevelt Street, Plymouth spent a day aboard the Nimitz, the largest nuclear-powered aircraft carrier in the world.

The Woods were the guests of David Parshall for the USS Nimitz Dependents' Day Cruise out of Norfolk, Va. David is the son of former Plymouth residents Jim and Jo Parshall who now live in Traverse City.

"To be assured departure at high tide, we boarded at 6 a.m. and were served coffee and doughnuts in the hangar bay," said Kay. "We were underway at 8 a.m., moving through Chesapeake Bay and out into the Atlantic."

During the morning, they were treated to a demonstration of aircraft catapulted from the flight deck at a speed of 170 miles an hour. Everyone made use of the earplugs handed out as they boarded the ship. After circling three or four times, the aircraft were landed on the flight deck.

"There was a helicopter hovering nearby nearly all day," said Kay.

They were served a cafeteria-style lunch. "It took quite a long time considering the number aboard. And if you didn't mind another line, lemonade and brownies were served during the afternoon."

The Woods said the Nimitz is "truly awesome."

It can travel at a speed of more than 30 knots. The flight deck is 1,092 feet in length and covers an area of more than 4.5 acres. It can accommodate 6,100 persons.

"With the help of five naval tugs, we were docked at the naval base about 6 p.m., the whole process taking well over an hour."

"We were tired but feel we spent a day we'll never forget."

WHILE THE WOODS

were on the east coast, Richard and Mary Lou Alwood were on the west coast. It was a combined anniversary and birthday celebration for Mary Lou.

Those who have not met the Alwoods may be familiar with their house on Harvey Street in Plymouth. It is the one that is decorated for holidays and special occasions. During the Grand Prix in Detroit, checkered racing flags were strung across the lawn. Christmas, Easter, Halloween and other days are reflected by decorations at the Alwoods.

Until Mary Lou's accident four years ago, she was right out there helping set them up. Since then, she has been the designer with Richard doing most of the legwork.

The Alwoods trip to Laguna Beach was their first vacation in four years. Mary Lou had some doubts about how she would manage getting around with wheelchair or walker. But she said the airline and everybody else make it very easy for the handicapped to travel.

They flew to Los Angeles and stayed overnight at the Cockatoo Inn adjacent to the airport. Mary Lou said she loved the old English atmosphere of the inn.

The next morning they drove down to Laguna Beach. Richard had been trying for years to get Mary Lou to Laguna Beach, a spot he considers one of the most pleasant in these United States.

THE FESTIVAL of the Arts

was in progress. This is a juried show where the top artists set up their works. The Pageant of the Masters is part of the festival which is a recreation of the great art works of the masters using live models. As each tableau is under the spotlight, the models must remain still for 90 seconds. They sell out 2,600 seats for performance. A couple of summers ago, Russia sent a delegation just to see the pageant.

Across the road, the Sawdust Festival had paintings, all kinds of crafts, and music. Richard said the artisans construct buildings to house their exhibits and a prize is given for the most outstanding. Down the road, was another show, Art-A-Fair.

Mary Lou was convinced — Laguna Beach is special. In her words: "When we left Laguna Beach we felt we could take a piece of the spirit home and will always have something rare and beautiful to enjoy."

State Doll Lovers Guild aids Michigan's museums

Pam Flick is unfazed by her current undertaking — the restoration of 300 old dolls for the Petoskey Museum.

The dolls are delivered, three at a time, to her Plymouth Township home — mere wrecks of their former selves. Time and children have not dealt kindly with the dolls. They have lost their hair, eyes, legs or arms.

The dollmaker restores their bodies and limbs, adds a blush of color to their cheeks, and dresses them in new clothes. Fabrics and styles are authentic to each doll's era.

The good-as-new set of three is returned to the museum, and three more are delivered for renovation.

Because museums cannot afford to have their old dolls repaired, Flick and her dollmaker friends organized the Michigan Doll Lovers Guild.

The guild's purpose is to assist museums in the renovation of valuable dolls.

MEMBERS OF the guild help museums raise money for their doll-repair budgets. The guild members will make and dress an authentic replica of an old doll and present it to a museum, which uses it as a fund-raiser. Raffle tickets are sold, with the doll offered as a

prize. Recently, one of their dolls added \$500 to a museum's doll-repair budget.

Flick is president of the guild, and the meetings are in her home. As membership has grown, the club is seeking a larger meeting place.

"We're looking for a new location and are looking forward to being accepted into the federation. We're on our way," said Flick.

Barbara Tucker, Judy Meier and Flick conceived the idea for the guild two years ago. Tucker comes from Grayling for the meetings. Meier, a former Garden City resident, became an honorary member when she moved to Texas.

Flick said guild members help one another, sharing their skills.

"When one is lacking, the other helps," she added.

Flick has the kilns in her basement workshop where the doll heads are fired. The women make dolls from scratch. They are reproductions of antique dolls dating back to the late-18th and early-19th centuries, complete with costumes of the period.

They have been asked to dress an heirloom doll in clothes made from a great-grandmother's wedding gown. Another request was to use material from lace curtains that had been in the family for seven generations.

FLICK'S HOBBY of dollmaking began when she took a continuing-education class taught by Ann Featherston at the local high school. Three weeks later

the instructor called her and asked if she would like to work with her.

"It has mushroomed in the past seven years," Flick said. She has taught dollmaking at Greenfield Village and has 57 students in her basement classroom.

Members of the guild and her students have won prizes for their dolls at fairs and contests throughout the state.

They have broadened their knowledge of the ages and values of old dolls.

Faye Kirk of Westland is their expert on doll research. She worked with the late Ruth Holly, collector and dealer, for 15 years. Kirk can tell the maker and the year a doll was made by looking at the letters and numbers on the back of its neck.

"You look for the artist's mold number," she said, pointing out an AM which designated the artist as Armand Marseille, designer of a doll made in Germany.

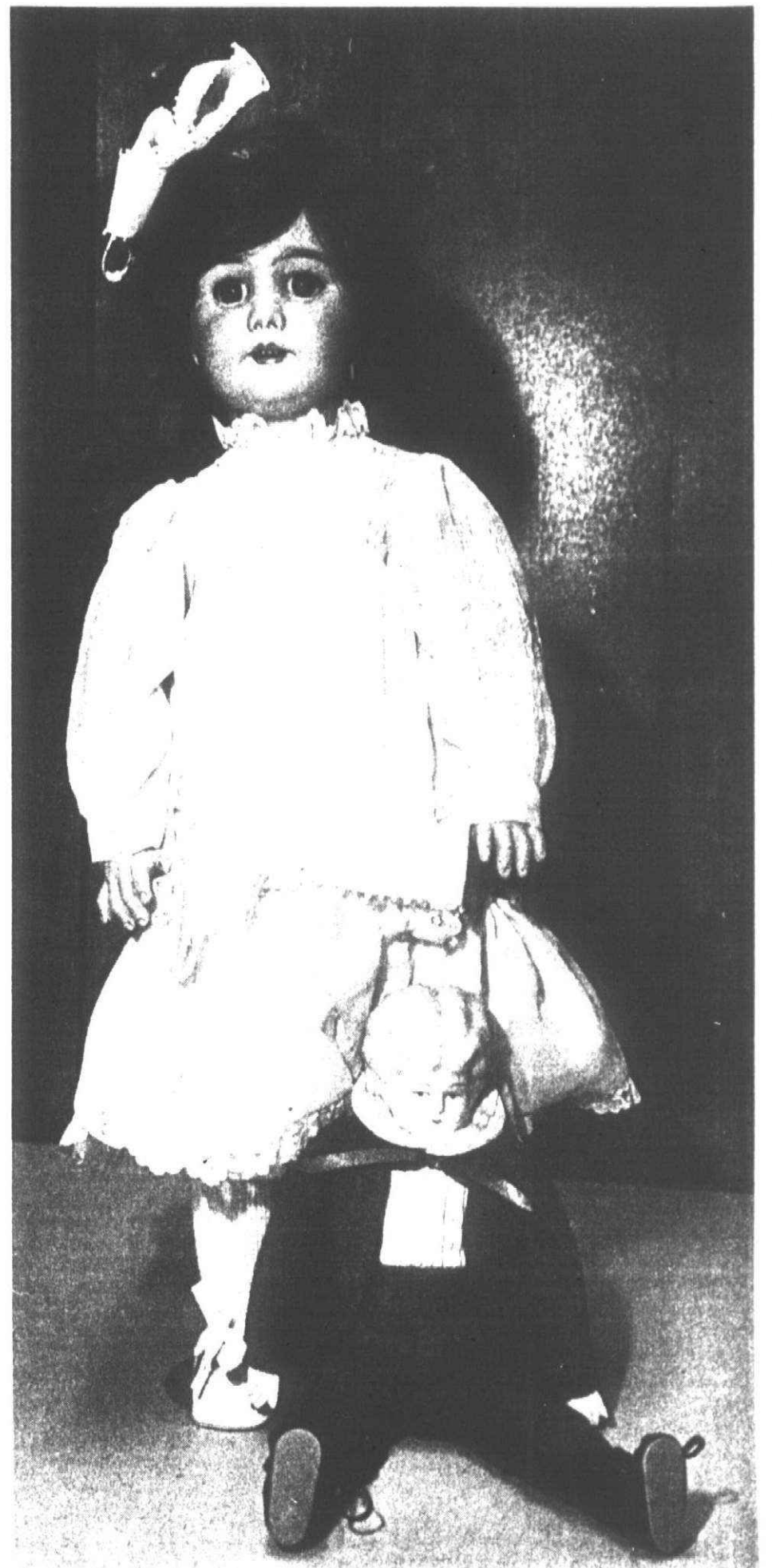
Pam Flick talked about a boy doll she had restored for the Petoskey Museum.

"This was an inexpensive doll with a china head and a cloth body stuffed with sawdust. Restored, with his new suit, he should be worth \$65 to \$100."

As she looks back, she credits her grandmother with first getting her interested in dressing dolls.

"I remember her showing me how to dress dolls when I was 5 years old."

Now she's repairing and dressing priceless dolls for museums.

"It's always a lot of fun and you can't beat the thrill when you hear that applause."

Joe Hoppersberger was voicing the feelings of the true entertainer. As a tenor in the popular Plymouth Community Chorus, applause is the icing on the cake. Members of the chorus also enjoy the weeks of rehearsals that precede each public performance.

They'll be singing at the Plymouth Fall Festival — from 7:15 to 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 10 and from 1:55 to 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 12.

They are hoping to recruit some members of the festival audience to join the chorus. Singers can talk it over, during the four-day festival at the Community Chorus taco booth on Main Street. Or they may call Jeannine Hayden, 455-4873.

REHEARSALS for the new season begin at 8 p.m. Tuesday Sept. 14 in East Middle School.

"We encourage new members to join in the fall," says music director Michael Gross. "That gives the singer time before our Christmas concert to become familiar with some of our techniques and ideals."

The chorus was founded in 1973 by William Grimmer, then music director at East Middle School. Gross took over in 1978.

"I feel we've been fortunate in attracting some of the finest singers in the area. People join the chorus because we offer a wide range of music from the classics to pop, and because of the standards we have maintained over the years," said Gross.

The chorus now has more than 100 members, drawn largely from the

Plymouth-Canton community. However, some members drive from all over southeastern Michigan for the Tuesday night rehearsals. The chorus performs two main concerts each year — one in December and one in May. Each concert is presented two consecutive nights.

"OUR AUDIENCES have been wonderful," said Gross. "They have made us what we are. After we sold out our first concert in 1979, I knew had found what the people wanted. We program our concerts for the audience and we hope they continue to they continue their support."

The group's standard of excellence has been responsible the recognition it has received. They were invited to sing for the Massachusetts delegation when it stayed in Plymouth during the 1980 Republican convention. They were invited guests for the opening of the Dunbar Davis Hall of Justice.

Hoppersberger believes, "Our best advertising has been by word of mouth. Once someone comes to one of our concerts, they want to ow when we're giving another."

Audience enthusiasm was a response for the moving the the Christmas concert from a church to a larger auditorium.

A WINTER ice storm also was a convincing factor.

"We had a terrible ice storm the day of our 1979 Christmas concert and I was sure there would be a poor audience turnout. How wrong I was. My mother arrived 10 minutes before the concert and sat with an extra 100 or so people in the narthex," Gross recalls.

They moved to the Plymouth Salem High School auditorium and have performed every concert there since then.

commitments. So every fall I audition altos and sopranos interested in joining. I try to make everyone feel comfortable so that I can hear the best they have to offer."

Prospective members are asked to come to the rehearsal at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 14. East Middle School is at 1042 S. Mill Street, behind the school bus garages.

"We are looking for a few good men," said Hoppersberger. He and his wife, Karen, live in Livonia and are long-time chorus members.

"We hope people will give us a try. It is a lot of fun and, after all, making people smile is what the Plymouth Community Chorus is all about."

Bentley grad adjusts to mission life

At different times of the day or night, Haywood and Sandra Burton might get a call from a ham radio operator in Grand Rapids or some other point. He tells them their daughter Chris Brown is calling from Costa Rica.

Then Chris comes on to comment on her new life as the wife of the missionary evangelist Tab Brown in the city of San Jose in the central American country of Costa Rica.

The Burton's daughter, a 1973 Bentley graduate, also communicates with them through letters and by telephone. So they and fellow members of the Livonia Church of Christ gradually are getting a picture of the faraway Browns.

Chris and Tab Brown and their three children have been in Costa Rica since Jan. 15.

Chris is a member of the Livonia church. Her husband is being supported in his missionary work by the Holmes Road Church of Christ in Lansing.

wrote the evangelist in a recent letter to church members. "The weather is just beautiful. We have managed to visit with the three local congregations here in the city. We have been well received by all. Three different missionary families from the U.S. work in the three area congregations, and have all asked us to join in the work which they are engaged in."

The Browns' main work at the moment is attending language school in order to be able to communicate with local residents. Tab will be serving soon on the planning committee for a new youth camp that will provide church-oriented activities.

THE EVANGELIST is not starting from scratch in his language studies.

He was already familiar with Spanish, having lived in Costa Rica as a teenager while his father was a missionary there. Ray Bynum, a Church of Christ missionary in Costa Rica for 15 years, has reported Brown's pronunciation is already good, and he is brushing up on grammar.

Chris Brown also is immersing herself in the language. But their youngest child, 2-year-old Crystal, is speaking Spanish already. Her mother found a local babysitter to take care of the children while she went to Spanish class. The little girl quickly absorbed Spanish from her sitter, her mother reported, and now talks nothing else.

In his letter, Brown reported that Crystal, Joshua, 4, and Rachel, 6, play with two Costa Rican children in the neighborhood.

"They don't communicate with words, but rather they use signs and sounds and a lot of pointing," he wrote. "On the other hand it has been frustrating for us all not to be able to communicate. Joshua woke up crying one night saying, 'nobody understands me.'"

JOSHUA'S MOTHER also had an occasion for tears due to lack of communication skills. She took the wrong bus, and was ordered off it at the end of the line.

She could not make the driver understand where she wanted to go. Tears of frustration were beginning to fall when a college student told the driver to find the way home and carried her bags.

The Browns are pleased with their house and its accessibility to all parts of the city. Food is reasonable, with rice, beans, chicken and beef the most popular items. However, sheets proved to be \$40-\$50 apiece and a pillow case was \$18.

"I ALWAYS HOPED my daughter would find a Christian husband," said Sandra Burton, who has seen four of her children attend Christian colleges. Chris and Janice were students at Michigan Christian College in Rochester. David and Jennifer went to Harding University in Searcy, Ark. The youngest Burton, Curtis, attends Bentley High School.

Chris met her husband at Michigan Christian. He later studied at Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock, Tex. Upon graduation he asked for a missionary assignment.

"Chris hopes to work with her husband in communicating the message of the Bible to Spanish women," said Mrs. Burton. "She's had some culture shock, but she's adjusting nicely."

Burton, who is an elder at Church of Christ, Livonia, had mixed feelings about the departure of his daughter and her family.

"I'm concerned about unrest in central America," he said. "The Canal Zone is on one side of them and Nicaragua on the other. But I've received reassurance from Chris that there is no problem."

Burton also mentioned the added difficulty of trying to evangelize in a country where the primary religion is Catholic. "It is hard to get people to break from the Catholic tradition," he said.

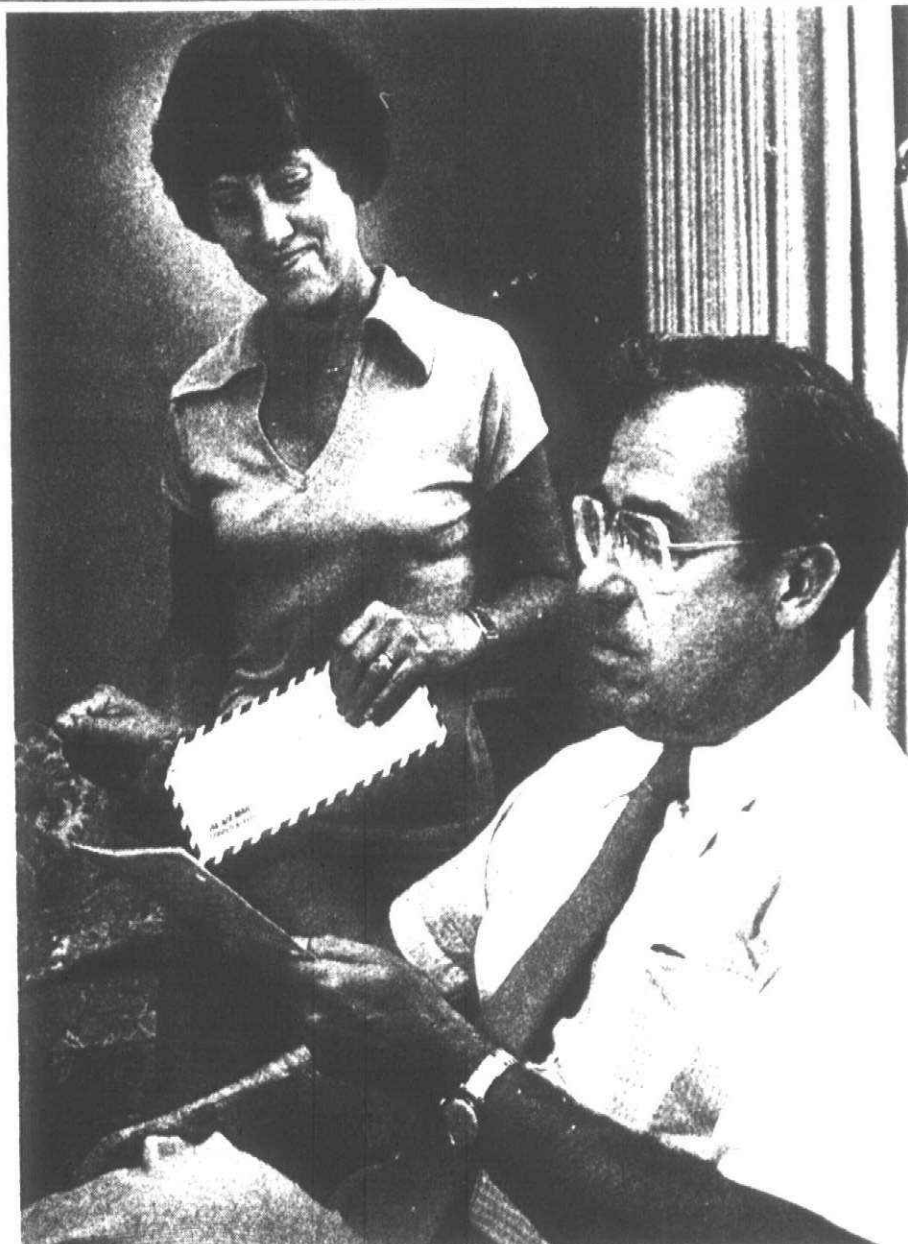
BURTON GREW UP as a member of the Church of Christ, so despite his worries, he was in favor of the missionary adventure.

Mrs. Burton backs it "100 percent." But she pointed out that she regards it as more of a commitment than an adventure.

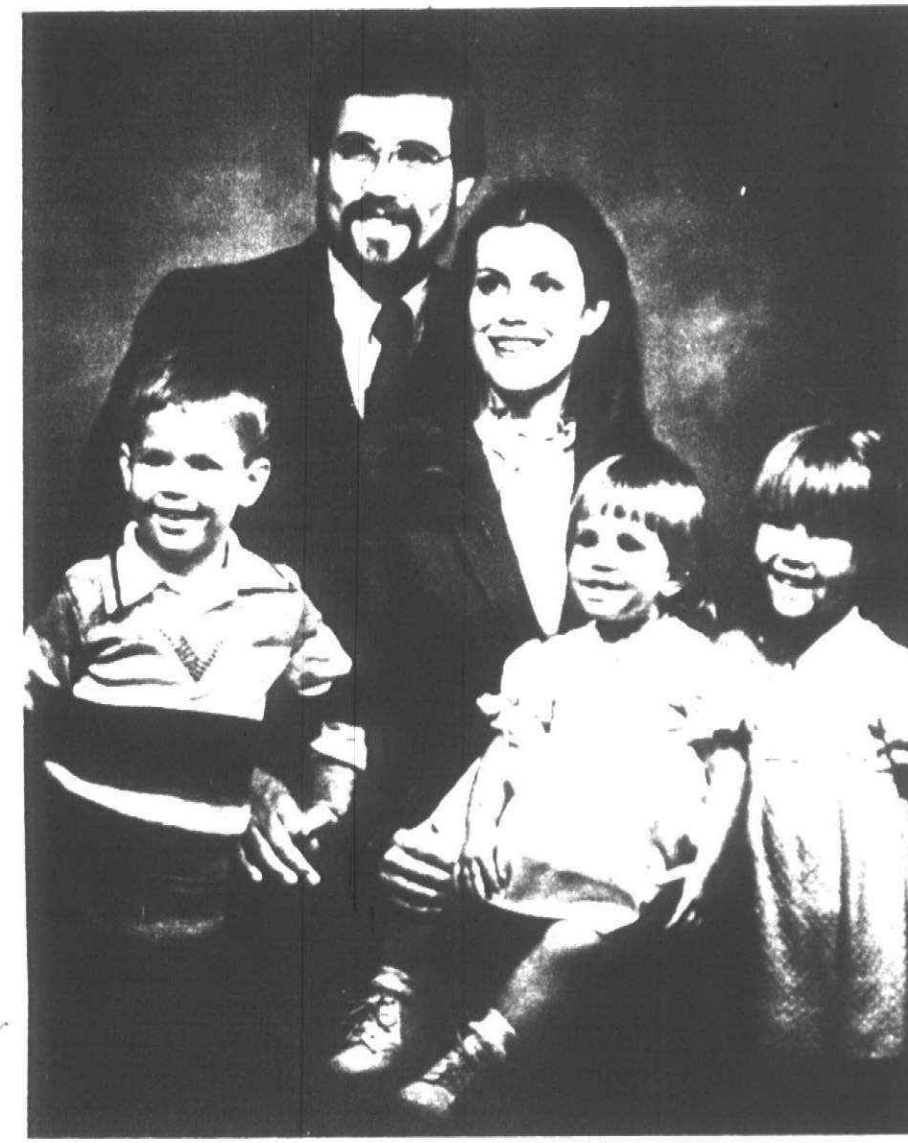
"They're willing to serve the Lord," she said. "That's what we raised them to do."

Two other Burton children have gone far afield for religious work. David worked in Scotland. Janice went to Switzerland as a member of a quartet. Her group recorded songs in Russian to be played on the Church of Christ radio station that broadcasts into the Soviet Union.

The Burtons are hoping to visit their daughter and her family while they are in Costa Rica. The Browns made a pledge to stay there four years.

United Auto Workers President Douglas Fraser called these remarks "cynical and cruel."

Unfortunately, the words "cynical and cruel" will not penetrate as deeply into the mind-set of the American people as the figures so callously used by Briggs. We want to believe Briggs. We don't like the way Fraser interprets our care for one another.

EVER SINCE 1776 when Adam Smith wrote his "Wealth of Nations," we have believed and composed our nation on the concept that social benefit is based on individual need that the public good will be accomplished through the pursuit of one's self-interest.

We have harnessed this drive into an industrial structure that pursues profits and believes poverty is caused by laziness and sloth. Moral responsibility for participation in this economy is on the individual, and not the "system."

Michael Driggs is a good illustration of how costly this structure can become — costly in the loss of humanity and costly in the loss of community. In his simplistic averaging of benefits, he denied the experience of individuals and violated the care we need to address to one another.

A person with his head in the refrigerator and his feet in the fireplace may have an acceptable aver-

age body temperature, but only a person who rejects human plight and cares nothing for others would suggest it is all right to leave him alone.

HUMAN GREED, Adam Smith's power for social benefit, has never been trustworthy in any extended pursuit for the public good.

A driving force to climb on another person's back to improve one's vantage point is hardly the bond that holds a people together.

Even the promise of someday being able to climb on another's back will not relieve the weight the oppressed person is bearing.

We need to re-examine the premises we accept in our pursuit of public good. We need to weed out those destructive of individual care and community life.

We need to weld together the life each individual aspires with the power we can compose through the sharing of deliberate intentions and efforts for justice, mercy and love. We need to share the care we have for ourselves and should have for each other.

New look

Salem, Canton prospects bright in 1st league season

In five days, Plymouth Canton's girl cagers will start their season against the team that beat them in last year's final contest.

That team is Plymouth Salem.

New years bring new players, new goals and new aspirations. This year also brings a new league: the Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA).

Both Salem and Canton are members, Salem in the Lakes Division with Livonia Bentley, Farmington, Livonia Stevenson and Walled Lake Central, and Canton in the Western Division, together with Livonia Churchill, Farmington Harrison, Northville and Walled Lake Western.

THERE'S A NEW wrinkle in the new league — playoffs. The top four teams in each division qualify for the WLAA tournament. The first-place Lakes team plays the fourth-place Western team, with the second-place team in one division meeting the third-place team in the other, in the opening round.

It will be difficult to win a basketball championship in the 10-team WLAA. But Salem is notoriously good at tournament time, peaking late in the season. The Rocks lost the Suburban Eight League title to Bentley last year but beat the Bulldogs in the regional finals.

Canton has a solid shot at the Western Division crown. The Chiefs had won 52 straight league games when the Western Six League folded. The teams in the Western Division are all former WSL squads. There's no doubt who they'll be gunning for.

Canton and Salem never faced each other in the regular season before, only in the state district tourney. With the WLAA, the two schools are bound to collide more often — it's possible they could meet four times this season.

Here's a look at each team's prospects for the coming season.

SALEM

Last season, the Rocks didn't win the Sub 8 title, but for the second straight year, they beat the league champs in the state regional tournament — Bentley.

Once again, those two teams are expected to battle for a championship, although it will be in a different league.

Three players who contributed heavily to Salem's 21-4 season return: Jacquie Merrifield and Ann Glomski, both seniors, and Pam McBride, a junior.

Merrifield and McBride started a year ago, and Glomski was the "sixth starter" — coming off the bench and putting in as much time as the first five.

Those three, together with 5-7 junior Dawn Johnson, look like probable starters to coach Bob Blohm. At least for now they do.

Blohm is certain of one thing, and that is that few things are certain concerning this year's Salem squad. To begin with, no one has a set position.

"They're all going to have to play different positions," the coach said. The reason is a big one, or lack thereof: Salem, once again, has no one who can play the pivot. The team's best rebounder could very well be Glomski, who stands 5-4 but jumps like a 6-footer.

Another rebounder Blohm will be counting on is 5-10 Cathy Schinker, a junior who played on the junior varsity last season.

"OUR DEFENSE this year is going to have to be as good as its ever been," Blohm said. "And, we're not only going to have to be able to shoot the ball, but

contest. Canton and Salem will cross paths a lot more in the upcoming sports seasons. The girls' basketball teams could conceivably meet four times this year, with playoffs and state tournament included.

There might be a cross-city rivalry brewing, although it's still in its early stages. This is football only, and its between Harrison and Avondale.

Avondale has always been a Class B football power. But last year, with a state playoff berth on the line, Avondale was embarrassed by Harrison in the regular season finale, 37-0.

Avondale coach Rick Brewer, known as the "Rhino," isn't likely to forget the thumping. It was his team's first loss after 20 straight wins. Harrison, now a Class A school, went on to win the Class B state crown.

The two teams meet again Nov. 5 at Avondale, so look out.

While new rivalries blossom, old ones vanish. Never again will Garden City's East and West high schools line up on opposite sides of the scrimmage line. The two schools merged this year to form the Garden City High Cougars (a compromise between East's Tigers and West's Panthers).

Another intense football rivalry is also gone, at least for this season. Because of the new WLA, Harrison won't meet North Farmington in football this year. Scheduling won't allow it. In three of the last four years, the winner of this game qualified for the state grid playoffs.

NEW RULES — The Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) has bowed to heavy criticism from

public-school officials and done something about alleged recruiting of prep athletes. A new rule bans a transfer student from participating in sports for one semester.

New rules, but same old problems. A lawsuit, filed by Peter Taucher of Troy, claims the MHSAA-imposed controls are unconstitutional. Taucher is particularly interested in overturning the transfer rule, a sanction limiting the number of hockey games a team can play, and a restriction banning travel of more than 300 miles to games.

A typical dilemma for Vern Norris, executive director of the MHSAA. There was another lawsuit filed against the association last spring by a group of Ann Arbor-based women who charged that the MHSAA had sex bias.

Understandably, the MHSAA was slow to impose the transfer rule. And, as Norris must have expected, the rule would lead to litigation. All for the fun of the game.

The MHSAA should improve on such a sham. "Should" is the key word. The MHSAA has not always ruled wisely, heartlessly sticking to the rules that hurt both those involved and itself.

Just last year, the MHSAA tried to ban Willow Run from the football playoffs. The association said the school didn't call in the results from its final football game for the computer rankings. The MHSAA relented when the cause of the delay was discovered in miscommunication in its own offices.

Then there was Marty Piper, a Salem wrestler who missed his wrestling match in the state regional finals because of a car accident. The top two in each weight class qualify for the state finals, so Piper should qualify, right?

Wrong. Piper, who had a realistic shot at the heavyweight title, was ruled out of the state tourney by the MHSAA because he didn't wrestle in the regionals.

The moral: Just because the MHSAA is involved, doesn't mean things will be any better.

NEW PLAYOFFS — Speaking of the MHSAA, it now has a new sport under its auspices — soccer. It's about time. There certainly is need for control here.

One example of how fair a "state playoff" system can be without a governing body is enough. Last year, Troy Athens beat Livonia Stevenson for the supposed boys' state soccer title.

Only one problem. Utica Eisenhower beat Athens during the regular season, and, despite a fine record, Eisenhower never even got an invite to the playoffs.

For Eisenhower, it was obviously a case of who you know, rather than how good you are. Eisenhower didn't have enough pull among the coaches making

Nails: Care helps prevent injury

An often ignored yet common problem area for joggers are the toenails.

Whether talking about a short-distance sprinter or a marathon runner, the nails are frequently the first area hit by discolorations, opacity, infection, or merely alterations in shape, thickness, or curvature.

It is essential to recognize the more common problems as well as the most probable causes. While some require no care or merely home attention, others should receive prompt professional treatment.

Just as periodic oral hygiene is essential for proper care of the teeth, the feet require good hygienic habits.

The nails should be properly trimmed, roughened edges reduced, and excess debris beneath the nail cleared. A thickened nail should be properly reduced to eliminate excessive pressure from the shoe. During running clinics, group lectures and discussions with patients, I suggest the following:

• **NAIL HYGIENE**, when performed at the home, should be done following bathing or soak-cleansing of the feet. In addition to cleansing the skin and nails, this makes those spots much softer, making them much easier to work with.

• **USING THE PROPER INSTRUMENTS** is important. Only clean, commercially purchased nail clippers are suggested. No sharp instrument should ever be inserted in the nail. A proper filing device should be used to smooth and round the edges according to the fleshy end, or contour, of the toe itself.

• **PROFESSIONAL PODIATRIC** care should be sought for decreased circulation, poor eyesight, diabetes or other metabolic diseases, and excessively deformed or complicated nail structures. This point is an absolute must and is essential in reducing subsequent complications. How often nails should be trimmed is, of course, an individual consideration. But long or thick nails are a definite invitation to a wide assortment of problems.

PERHAPS ONE of the most frequent nail problems among runners is the opaque or discolored toenail.

Usually, in the earlier stages, the nail turns bluish black, either in spots or totally. This is due to bleeding or hemorrhaging beneath the nail plate from excessive pressure from the top of the shoe.

Properly fitted shoes with ample toe room and protective tape or padding for the toes are the basic home-care measures. As the condition develops and the jogging continues, the nail takes on a white or grayish opaque appearance. Eventually, if the cause of the problem is not remedied, the nail often is lost.

IN SOME CASES, when exposed to repeated shoe pressure, as with an ill-fitted

shoe, the nail will become infected.

Pain, redness, and discharge from the toenail area frequently accompany this condition. Without a doubt, this type of nail should receive prompt, professional attention.

A final nail type to be considered is the ingrown or curved-in border, commonly regarded in our office as the "pits" in jogging.

Such a problem can sideline the most avid of runners and occasionally lead to rather involved complications.

The problem usually starts with improper trimming or injury to the nail itself.

In some cases, the runner has a variation in the curvature of the nail plate which has been present from birth. This type of nail often can become quickly ingrown from just the slightest injury.

It appears that for most of the commonly encountered nail conditions in runners, the nail itself is the vehicle while shoe pressure, inadequate or improper hygiene and pure and simple wounds are the causes.

By finding these particular problems and their possible origins quickly, the jogger in a much better position to prevent their development and subsequent complications.

Catholic League cagers look ready

Prospects appear to be bright for three area Catholic League girls' basketball teams. Redford St. Agatha, Livonia Ladywood and Redford Bishop Borgess should all challenge for their respective league crowns. Here is the 1982 pre-season outlook.

Joining Willis will be 5-9 point-guard Emily Wagner, who started all 21 games last year for the Blazers as a freshman. She will be teamed with 5-7 senior Ann Lukens. Janine Ceroni is the third guard.

The forwards are 5-10 sophomore Char Govan and 5-10 junior Jan Randall.

Maria Conti, a senior, expected to start at one of the forward positions this fall, was lost for the season recently with torn knee ligaments. The injury required surgery.

REDFORD ST. AGATHA

There's good news and bad news surrounding St. Agatha's girls' basketball team this season.

The good news is that the nucleus of last year's squad, which captured the Catholic C-D League title and won 24 straight games before losing to eventual state champion Saginaw Carrollton in the quarterfinals, is back virtually intact.

The bad news concerns the Aggies' opponents, because this season's St. Agatha squad is even better than last year's.

Top Gaelic football, hurling clubs at Whitman Center

The popular Irish sports of Gaelic football and hurling will be played this weekend at Whitman Center in Livonia as the North American minor, junior and senior championships take place.

More than 300 players representing 16 teams from Boston, Chicago, Cleveland-Pittsburgh, Detroit, Houston, Toronto, Philadelphia, San Francisco-Los Angeles, and Seattle-West Canada will participate.

Action begins at 10 a.m. Saturday and runs until 6 p.m. The finals begin at noon Sunday at the center, located on 32235 W. Chicago, just west of Meridian Road.

Admission each day is \$5 for adults. Children will be admitted free.

"This is tremendous action," said Dan O'Kennedy, one of the tournament's organizers. "It's different."

"Hurling is one of the fastest and most skillful sports. It's faster than ice hockey."

The sports are played primarily in the British Commonwealth countries and the United States.

The Michigan Gaels, Great Lakes champions, are a Gaelic football side comprised of players from the Detroit area. The Gaels, defending North American champs, will be one of four teams competing in the junior division (18 years and up).

DETROIT'S senior division (18 years and up) Gaelic football side, which consisted of the top players from three area clubs (Detroit Padraig Pearse, Detroit Wolfe Tones and Gaels), failed to qualify after being eliminated in a

tournament earlier this month in Chicago.

Gaelic football usually is played with 13 players on each side on a field 140 yards long by 75 yards wide.

The game somewhat resembles soccer. The ball is almost identical.

Goalposts, with nets under the crossbars, are situated on each end of the field. Three points are awarded for shots which pass the goal line under the crossbar. One point is awarded for shots splitting the uprights and clearing the crossbar.

"The average score for one side is about 12 points," said O'Kennedy. "Actual playing time is one hour."

Players are allowed to carry the ball with their hands no more than three steps before making a flick pass.

"THERE IS no tripping, holding or pushing allowed," Kennedy said. "No tackling, but you can take a man down with a clean shoulder."

"You can kick the ball to yourself, but you can't hop the ball twice in succession without making a play (flick pass or shot)."

Hurling is much like Gaelic football, but is played with a smaller ball and flat hockey-type sticks. The scoring system is virtually the same. The all-Ireland final in Dublin, coincidentally being played on Sunday in Dublin, will draw 120,000 spectators.

The Great Lakes Gaelic Football Division, which is sponsoring the event, will also host a reception for the players and fans, 6 p.m. to 2 p.m., on Friday, Saturday and Sunday at St. Robert Bellarmine Hall, 27201 W. Chicago in Redford.

Entertainment will be provided by Noel Henry and the Celtic Blues.

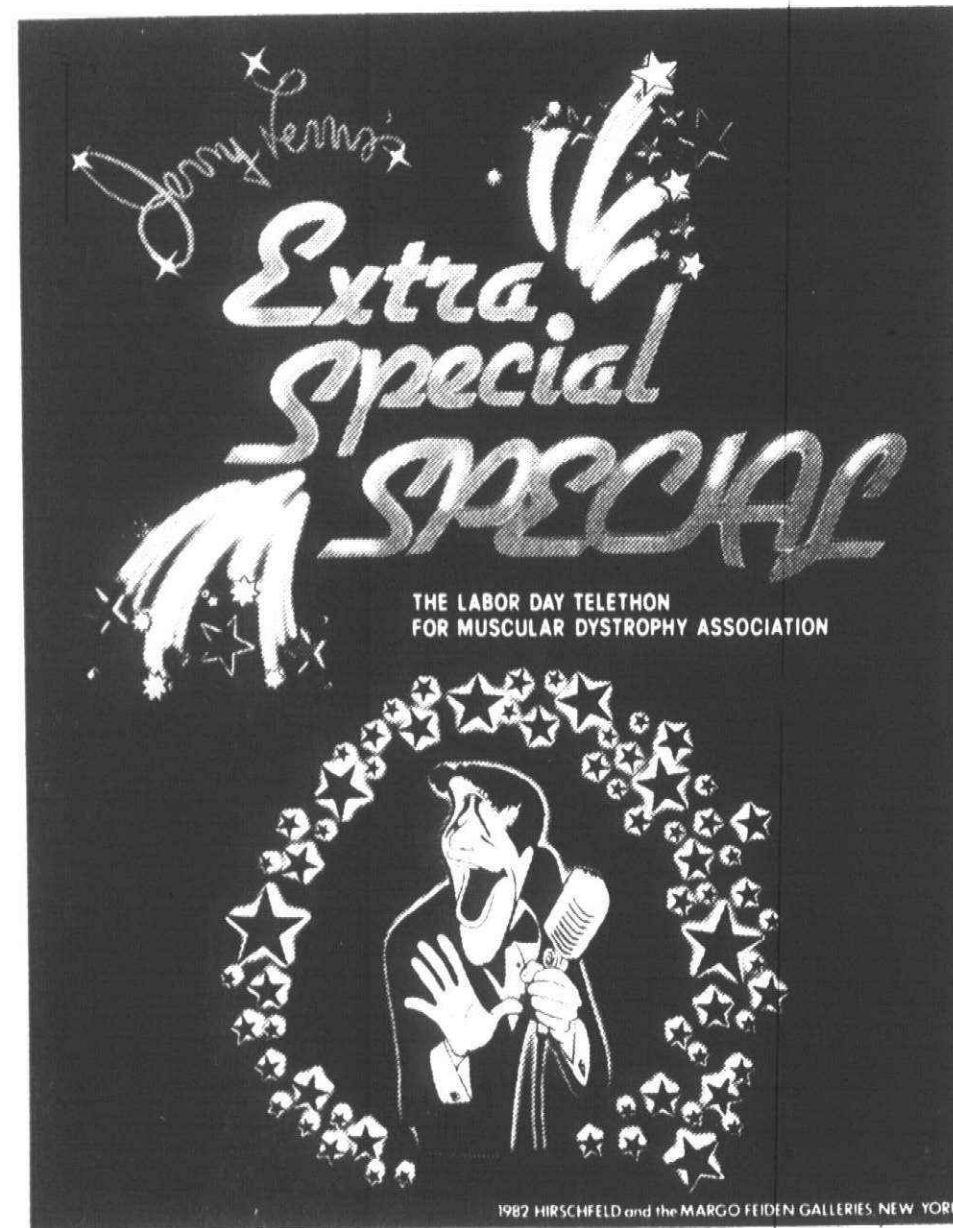

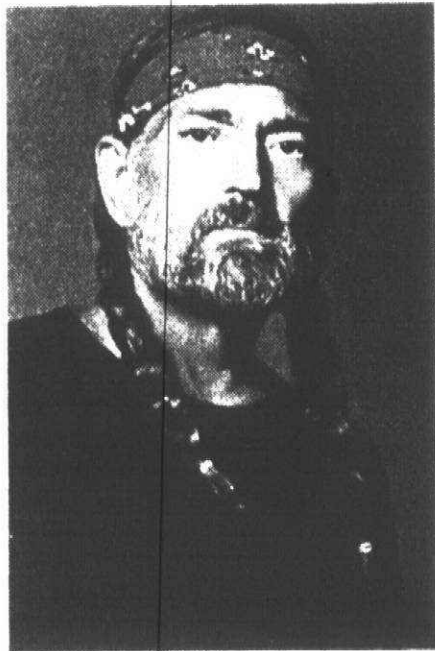

he woos, and then sacrifices, Ingrid Bergman (who, like Bogie, is now no longer with us) for the noble cause. Many of us have emerged from the theater afterwards and found ourselves coat collar raised, hands in pockets — lipping over and over again, "Here's looking at you, kid." That's Allen's starting point in "Play It Again, Sam," which takes its name from one of the most misquoted lines in film history.

But there's nothing mistaken about Allen's adoring adaptation. Woody's the perfect, contemporary Everyman, as

bumbling as Peter Seller's Inspector Clouseau, perhaps, but a lot more lovable because he's more like everyone of us. Clouseau may stumble over his own fears and dreams. If your dream is to be as cool and fearless as Humphrey Bogart in "Casablanca," be sure to see "Play It Again, Sam." Better yet: See "Sam" right after "Casablanca," then find yourself placed squarely in Woody Allen's shoes. It could be the beginning of a beautiful friendship.

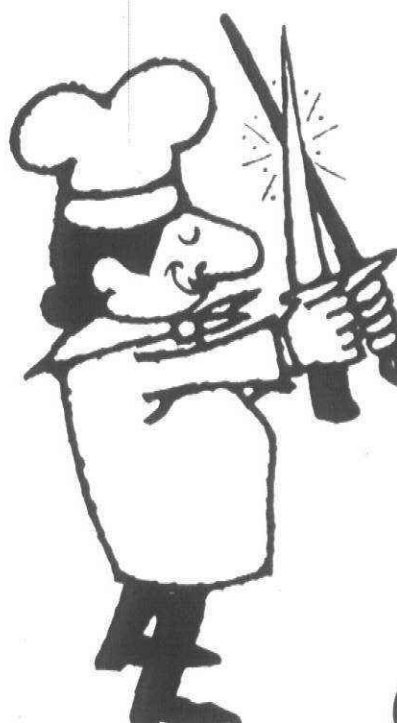

● TWO IN THE GLUE

In this position, white has rolled a 5-2. Since he has a man on the bar, white's first obligation is to enter in black's home table. The 5 seems custom-fitted to this purpose, as it not only comes in but also hits the loose black man.

By hitting the black 5 point, white benefits in a number of ways. He gains in the race by sending another black man back; he prevents black from making his 5 point, thereby reducing the chances of becoming blocked in; he threatens to hit black's other loose man on the black 9 point; and he keeps open the possibility of establishing the advanced anchor on the black 5 point. In

other words, white will have no trouble playing his 5.

Many players, while congratulating themselves on their good fortune in rolling a timely 5, would play their 2 from their 11 point to their 9 point, thus tidying up their outer table and creating a strong blocking position. This would be a grave error. Instead, white should play his 2 from his 6 point to his 4 point, hitting the second man.

By putting two men on the bar ("two in the glue"), white threatens to build points in his home table while his opponent is on the bar. If black is unable to come in and secure a point within his next couple rolls, he will be facing a very strong gammon threat. On the other hand, let's see what white is risking by this play.

The main risk is that black will hit back on the 4 point with any number that includes a 4 as well as double 2s and double 3s. First of all, we should notice that if we hit only one black man and then black rolls one of the aforementioned numbers, he would make the white 4 point. Anchored on the white 4 point, black will then threaten to hit shots as white is bringing his men around or trying to clear his last few men into his home table.

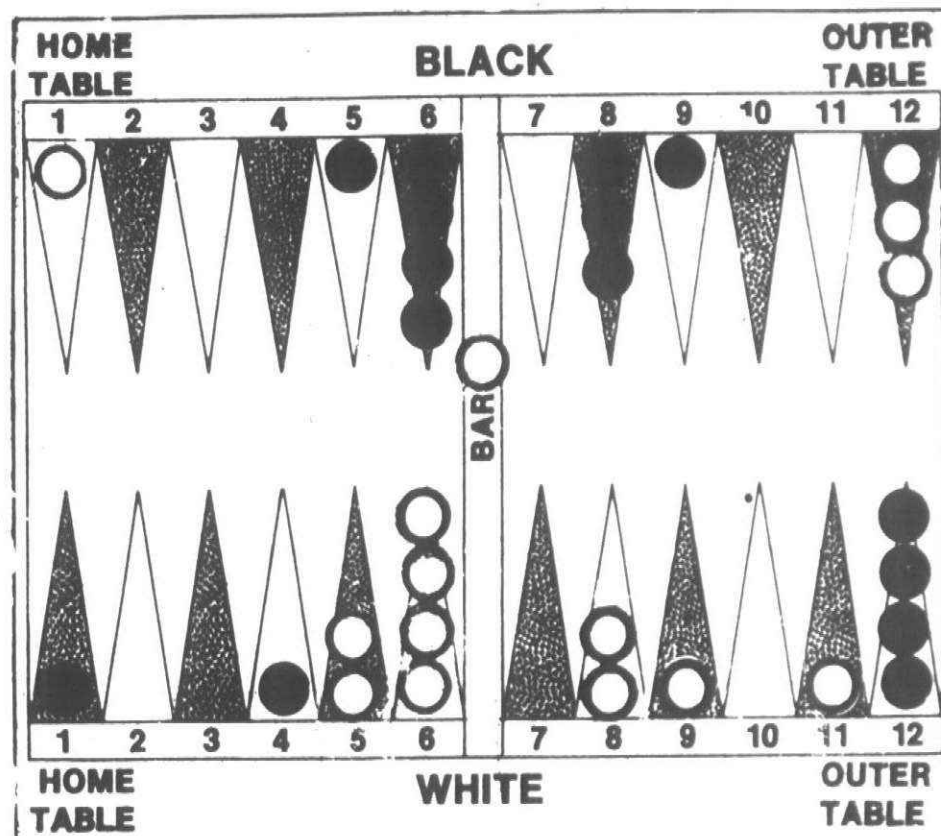
With three men back already, black should not fear being hit again, as the fourth man back may enable him to build a second point in white's home table and eventually end up with some kind of a back game.

From all this, we can see that black's best hope in this position revolves around his ability to build a point in white's home table. By hitting twice, white takes away the numbers 3-1 and

3-2 that otherwise would have enabled his opponent to establish his 4 point. In addition, numbers like 6-4 and 5-4 for black will hit on the white 4 point but still leave one black man on the bar. White might then come in on his next roll and rehit on his 4 point, creating the same problem for black on his subsequent roll.

White's vision of a gammon, while optimistic, is not at all farfetched. Even though white only has two points built on his home table, by putting "two in the glue" he leaves black in a position where he will be unable to re-enter both men on his next roll approximately 55 percent of the time.

Hence, most of the time, black will still have a man on the bar after his next roll. And if he doesn't roll one of those numbers which would have been good for him in any event, he will be subject to a blitzkrieg attack which might well result in a gammon.

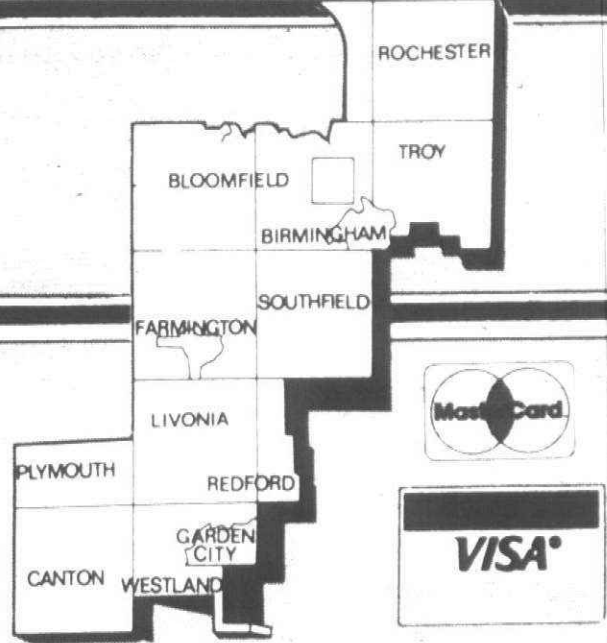
