Officials attempt to extinguish the fire

Sterlini won't supervise, while staff needs are studied

Township officials are moving to extinguish the explosive conflict between Treasurer Maria Sterlini and her staff.

In a "compromise" solution, the Township Board Tuesday approved a resolution which will physically separate Sterlini from her clerical workers while personnel needs are being studied. Also, Sterlini will have an assistant as "buffer" between herself and the staff. Employees have described Sterlini as demanding, "paranoid" and impossible to work for.

"In essence, what we are saying is that Maria (Sterlini) is a bad manager, and that's nothing to be ashamed of," said trustee Robert Padgett, who made the motion for the resolution.

"Everyone has different talents in different areas," Padgett added.

THE BOARD adopted the resolution about 3:15 a.m. Tuesday, following more than eight hours of comments from employees, union officials and lengthy "rebuttals" from Sterlini about grievances

and discord within her department.

Padgett said he views his motion, approved unanimously, as a "compromise" with Sterlini, who has long felt her department's operation has been hampered by insufficient staffing.

At issue is Sterlini's relationship with three of her staff members. Employees have filed grievances charging that Sterlini causes anxiety by constantly changing work rules and administering the department in an inconsistent manner.

The three, who have been on medication for anxiety, took their case to the Township Board in late August. The matter has been discussed in several lengthy meetings, most of which have been closed.

TUESDAY'S MEETING, which attracted more than 100 observers, finally resulted in a resolution aimed at settling this issue, which included four closed meetings and two open sessions during the past three weeks.

The state Open Meetings Act allows closed meetings when discussing personnel issues and charges against a public officer. Sterlini, who previously requested closed meetings, decided to make her rebuttal public.

Her testimony focused on issues which previously were brought up by employees during closed sessions. Staff members said Sterlini pitted workers against each other by encouraging them to report infractions and mistakes.

In addition, said the employees, Sterlini had told them to refuse to release certain information to other employees or officials without first consulting Sterlini.

Other employees told the board Sterlini ran her department like the "gestapo," checking wastebaskets and looking for electronic "bugs."

STERLINI MAINTAINED she instituted badly-needed changes, and checks and balances in her department. Clerk John Flodin agreed that Sterlini did straighten out long-standing financial problems.

"The complaints I heard from day one, when I first walked in, no one wanted to work in the treasurer's department," Sterlini said. "Everything was negative, negative, negative."

Sterlini said she had been trying to resolve differences with employees, and that they shouldn't have gone to the board.

"I have spoken to Maria on many occasions about problems in her department," said Personnel Director Dan Durack. "While I believe she tried to make a sincere effort, obviously the things she did or did not do didn't solve the problems — because she didn't realize or recognize there was a problem with her style of management."

Plan prompts mixed reactions

Canton Treasurer Maria Sterlini and her three full-time employees expressed mixed feelings about Tuesday night's proposal to help remedy personality and staffing concerns in the treasurer's department.

However, both parties seemed pleased that these woes finally will be addressed.

All three employees contend there has been an on-going problem with Sterlini's management style. Sterlini believes the problems stem from inadequate resources to perform her department's functions.

"I feel — finally — relieved for the first time," Sterlini said. "I was pleased with the board's reaction. This has been hovering over my department for the past four years."

The board unanimously decided to temporarily shift Sterlini's direct supervisory duties to Finance Director Mike Gorman, while staffing needs in the treasurer's department are examined through a study.

Sterlini also will be physically separated from her staff.

The board now recognizes her staffing problem and is willing to work on it, Sterlini said.

"We have to find ways to work together," she said. "I think from everything that's happened... there is a better understanding of the problems that exist."

LORENE HAACK, one of Sterlini's employees, isn't happy with the solution, however. She doesn't think it will work because Sterlini fails to recognize the management problem.

"She had an answer for everything (allegations)," Haack said. "She has the capability to turn things around. It's strange that she is so right and seven people are so wrong."

Leaves Isbister

Principal to lead training

Dr. Beverly Marshall, 14-year principal at Isbister Elementary School, was hired as the "trainer of all trainers" for the schools' Instructional Skills Program (ISP) at Monday night's board meeting.

Marshall, who opened Isbister in 1968, takes a newly-created, one-year position as a "coach" and "trainer" of Plymouth-Canton administrators. She will help area principals improve their evaluative skills using ISP concepts.

"She has as much experience and

knowledge about this program than anyone in the district," said Dr. Mike Homes, assistant superintendent of instruction.

ISP is a new instructional method which is designed to increase learning in the classroom. Teachers, principals and administrators received six full days of in-service training in the program last year. Marshall's objective is to lead and direct evaluation workshops and then observe principals' evaluative skills in the classroom.

"WE EXPECT our administrators to shore up their evaluative skills and

to be on top of the program (ISP)," Marshall explained.

Mickey Edell, president of the Plymouth-Canton Education Association (PCEA), the teachers' union, sent a formal letter of complaint to the administration about the Marshall appointment. The union will not take formal action on the ISP issue, but teachers have expressed concern about using instructional funds to continue this program and create this position, Edell said. Limited supplies and class sizes

2 women assaulted

A 34-year-old Canton woman was sexually assaulted Tuesday evening as she jogged along Saltz Road.

The victim was grabbed about 8:45 p.m. near Longfellow, between Sheldon and Canton Center, said police Lt. Dennis Joker.

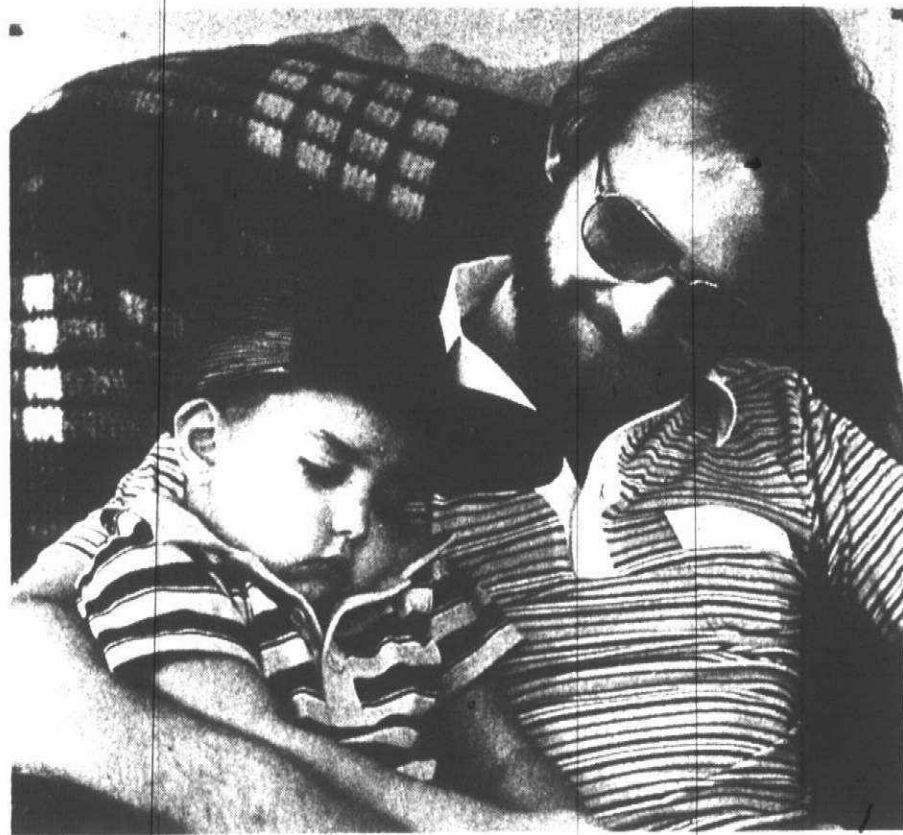
She broke away, but the assailant caught her and put a rope around her neck, said Joker. He forced the woman into a field and forced her to perform a sexual act upon him, according to police reports.

The man escaped when a car approached, said Joker.

Canton's police tracking dog followed a scent to a location where the assailant's car apparently had been parked, said Joker. There was no description of the vehicle.

The man is described as about 26 years old. He is 5-feet-10, and weighs about 160 pounds.

Family takes 'miracle' trip

Faith and friendship sent the Kevin Powell family to Disney World in Florida.

Powell, 26, of Canton, recently took his son Robbie, 4, and daughter Rachel, 6 to the Disney park — a vacation from hospitals and worry.

Robbie has been undergoing treatment at Children's Hospital in Detroit for a malignant brain tumor. Powell's co-workers at PSI Hydraulics in Livonia raised \$1,700 to help pay the costs of the Florida trip.

The family are expected to return early this week vis.

AS FAR AS Powell is concerned, it is nothing short of a miracle that Robbie was feeling strong enough to take the week-long trip.

Robbie's medical condition was poor in February and March, after the tumor was diagnosed, said Powell. The outlook was bleak.

But in March, a faith healer visited Robbie. The boy began to feel better. Recent medical treatment also has helped, and the tumor currently isn't visible on brain X-rays.

"It has been pretty fantastic," said Powell. "They (doctors) aren't calling it remission (absence of symptoms). There are people who argue, but I'm calling it a miracle."

THE LAST FEW months have been filled with stress, turmoil, faith and hope.

In July, Powell and his wife were divorced, with Powell retaining custody of the two children. In August, he was laid off from his job as a valve technician.

But uppermost in Powell's mind are Robbie's improvement, and the warmth and support of people who have offered encouragement and prayers.

The ordeal began in February, when tests indicated Robbie had a tumor in the brain area which controls the heart and respiratory system.

Doctors considered surgery too dangerous, said Powell. Robbie was treated with radiation and drugs.

The boy became very ill. He had difficulty breathing. The swelling tumor impaired Robbie's ability to use his hands and legs, said Powell.

"It was looking critical," said Powell. "The radiation would prolong his life — buy a little time."

WORD SPREAD about Robbie's illness. In March, a man described as a born-again Christian came to the Powell home and asked permission to lay his hands on Robbie. Some people believe faith can impart a healing power through laying on of hands.

Robbie soon began showing signs of improvement, said Powell. The boy began having greater use of his arms and legs.

Westland voters give 4 trustees 'pink slips'

Wayne-Westland schools will soon lose top administrators and programs in the wake of four school board members recalled Tuesday in a special election.

There will be a "domino" effect on educational programs with those services dropped and the administrators who ran them possibly leaving the district, said Donald Rusnock, one of four

board members recalled. Rusnock and colleagues Mildred Batterson and Kenneth Marshall discussed the election and its impact shortly Tuesday night shortly after the precinct returns made it clear that they would be recalled.

THE FOURTH board member, Mary Arbour, declined to be interviewed Tuesday. She was red-eyed from crying and was frequently drying her tears while watching the election returns being posted. Statistically, it was a large turnout

Wayne-Westland School District

The district serves southeast Canton

for the special election with 15.7 percent of the 50,000 registered voters casting ballots.

Voters supported the recall by a 58-42 margin with the votes of the four

board officers being within 40 of each other.

In the 30 precincts, the board members trailed in all by two. They led in the absentee ballots.

While the four were unhappy with the results, Marshall, Batterson and Rusnock said they were not surprised at the outcome, only by the large margin of defeat.

ON THE other side of the campaign, the Taxpayers United Together, the group which initiated the recall and worked to oust the four board officers, held a victory party in the Wayne Oddfellows Hall, Glenwood near Venoy, to celebrate their efforts.

Wine bottles were popped open, an appreciation plaque was presented to Rose Mary Miller, TUT's leader, and about 150 persons were happy. At the party were remaining board members Fred Warmbier, David Morant, and Dewey Combs and former board member Vincent Petitpre who resigned several years to become the Taylor schools' superintendent, a post he left in an ongoing legal dispute on how the board fired his predecessor.

Miller said at her victory party that the recall was a "victory for everyone — it's a win for TUT."

LATER SHE told the Observer that the election "wasn't just a campaign — it was the public against four board members.

"We had to fight the (employees') unions, the administration, the school district, public officials, and the newspapers."

The recall was a "win for the people."

She added that the removal from the four from office "is a cleansing" and that the public should get a "school district we can afford."

In the closing days of the campaign, the four board members and their support committee printed a flyer with statements opposing the recall from U.S. Rep. William Ford, state Sen. William Faust, Mayor Patrick Norton of Wayne, and several Westland City Council members.

They said recalls should be used only for extreme purposes and not just over disagreement on one issue.

DURING THE campaign, TUT workers stressed they were upset only with the board's approval of an extended teachers' union contract last fall and salary raises.

Miller said she wasn't surprised by the election's outcome or the margin.

"Since 9 a.m. (election day) I was

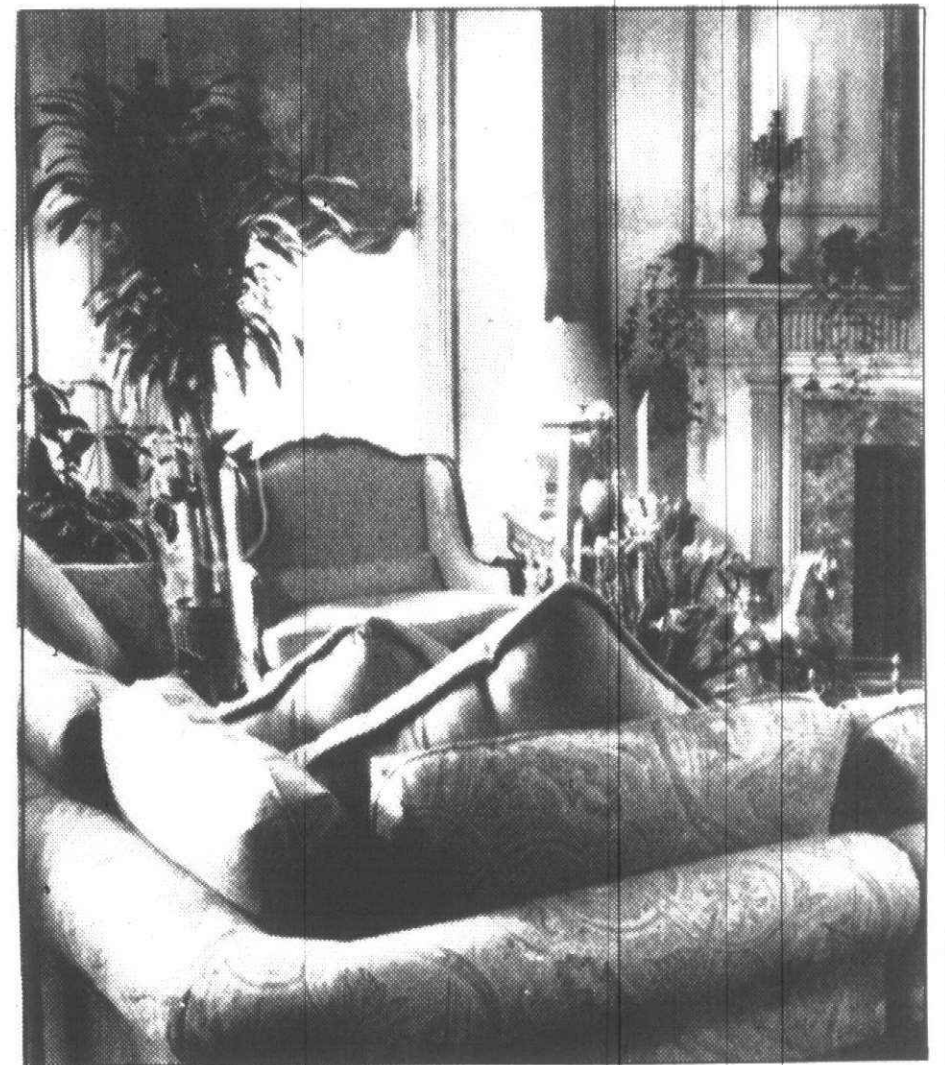

told we would win by a big margin," she said.

Saying she will not be a candidate for one of the vacancies or the special election to be scheduled later this fall (see related story below) Miller said the first thing she will do after the election is to take a vacation.

The three board members interviewed admitted they were surprised by the margin of defeat.

THEY ALSO believed there were numerous issues — such as the economic recession — that were bothering voters besides the teachers' union contract and salary raises.

"In tough economic times, people believe the worst," said Batterson.

She said she will remain active in the community.

"It's not my style to work hard for programs and then go into hiding,"

Batterson added that an election fly-

er claiming the four board officers "raised taxes" in setting a slightly lower millage rate the night before might have an impact on undecided voters.

But she felt the millage rollback (see related story this page) showed the four board members voted "to maintain the educational quality and integrity of the school district."

"That's more important than any one of us."

RUSNOCK commented in the interview that he will "have to learn to live with a progressive minority."

Commenting on the millage action, Rusnock said the community "will have a decent school system for at least 12 more months."

Rusnock said the spinoff of the recall will be seen in the "chaos" in the school district with the potential loss of Supt. Timothy Dyer and other administrators.

Sterlini contends the problems go beyond personality clashes. She believes her department needs more staff to perform township duties.

"It wasn't a question of not recognizing the problem," Sterlini explained. "But the problem was more serious and deeper than just a question of mismanagement."

Sterlini is satisfied with the resolution.

"I will make every effort to work with (employees) and try to resolve past problems and find working solutions for all of this, so we can go forward and put whatever has happened somewhat behind us," Sterlini said.

Under the plan, Sterlini will work with Supervisor James Poole, Flodin and Durack to find a suitable location for Sterlini separate from her workers — either by building a partition or by her moving to a new office.

Sterlini has suggested a partition. Poole commended the board for its action, and said he believes the issue can be resolved.

"No magic wand was waved last night (Tuesday)," Poole said. "I think it's going to take a lot of work, but I think we can reach a solution."

Finance Director Mike Gorman will supervise the employees in the treasurer's department, funneling Sterlini's directives. He has been performing that duty for about a week.

Sterlini will maintain all her responsibilities as treasurer, as defined by law. She is in the second year of a four-year term.

In addition, an "unbiased" report will be made of the staffing needs in the treasurer's department.

The solution won't cost the township any additional funds, said Padgett. Trustee Steve Larson said it is important that Sterlini eventually "blend" her duties with those of her staff members.

"It's a matter of time before we are back to where we were before," Haack said.

Marcia Safran, another employee, is anxious for the resolution to take effect.

"I feel good that everybody recognizes there is a problem, even her (Sterlini's supporters). I want this to work out."

Fellow employee Darlene Owens agreed.

"I think this is a step in the right direction," Owens said.

THE ON-GOING PROBLEMS in the

treasurer's department started four years ago. Many employees have left the department during that time.

Concerns formally surfaced during the last three weeks. All three employees filed a grievance against Sterlini, and the matter reached the board level.

Sterlini and other officials voiced concerns about the board setting a precedent by hearing this grievance, rather than following the standard arbitration process.

Other board members believed this was a special case because the issue affected duties of the treasurer's department and other operations in Township Hall.

which seem larger this fall added to teachers' frustrations, she added.

"There were many, many people that were not pleased with the information received and the presentation at the in-service (last year)," Edell said.

Marshall's new position represents the cost of approximately \$20,000 (or a teaching position), according to Homes.

An administrative shuffle finds Judy Ireson becoming the new Isbister principal for one year. Marshall says she expects to return to elementary principal position at a different school after this one-year stint.

Cheryl Clason, who returned to the classroom as a special education instructor when her assistant principal position at Hulsing Elementary School was eliminated, returns to administration as Eriksson's new assistant principal, replacing Ireson.

School officials will hire a new special education teacher to fill Clason's position because none of the 67 teachers laid off the past two years are certified in this area.

Superintendent John Hoben justified the expenditure to create Marshall's position based on the board's previous commitment to ISP and other instructional aids.

Hoben said an additional \$80,000 was allocated from the district's general fund for instruction, representing about another \$5 per student. He added that \$144,000 of \$179,000 in discretionary instructional monies were used for textbooks.

The ISP expenditure will come from those discretionary funds.

Hoben also said approximately \$350,000 in expenditures were allocated to restore teaching positions this year to keep last year's certified teacher/pupil ratios.

Omnicom may extend cable

After putting Plymouth's cable television concerns to rest, Omnicom officials are turning their attention to Plymouth Township.

Township officials believe Omnicom isn't living up to promises made when the cable franchise was awarded.

Omnicom Vice-President and General Manager Betsy Seeley met with Township Supervisor Maurice Breen Monday afternoon to address some of the concerns.

Seeley discussed the five-point understanding reached with Plymouth, answered some of Breen's questions and agreed to meet with the township board later this month.

"At the meeting we will address any issues we feel are current and things we are doing in other communities that would be of interest to Plymouth Township," Seeley said.

A specific date for the meeting hasn't been set.

A TOPIC OF discussion at Monday's

meeting was the possibility of providing cable service in areas which fall below the 70 homes per cable mile requirement in the township cable contract.

Omnicom is required to provide cable service to all township areas which have potential of 70 home hookups for every mile of cable installed.

The company has agreed to investigate areas which fall below the 70-home quota. However, they haven't promised those areas will receive cable.

"It's not abolishing the 70-home-per-mile requirement. We only agreed that we would evaluate these areas on a project-by-project basis," says Seeley.

Cable television service will be provided to the lower home density areas only if there is sufficient subscriber interest.

Omnicom must have "upfront commitments" from potential low density subscribers before the cable is installed, Seeley said.

If there isn't sufficient interest to insure a return on the company's investment, the cable service won't be offered, she said.

Seeley wasn't certain how many subscribers would be required before the service is offered in a low density area.

"We haven't worked out the logistics yet. I couldn't comment on that at this point."

What it boils down to is how many people would commit to taking cable in that area," she said.

Who has new ideas for county executive position?

William Lucas says that if he is elected Wayne County executive, the \$17 million deficit will be eliminated with "innovative ideas presented at the proper time."

Robert FitzPatrick says his rival, says he left county government in 1974 with a surplus and already has been producing innovations to make county government more efficient.

Lucas and FitzPatrick last week had their first face-to-face confrontation in a meeting of the Suburban Bar Association in Canton.

The soft-voiced Lucas, sheriff since

1969 and the Democratic nominee, assured the group of 40 he would implement "general reorganization" and "efficiencies."

The fired-up FitzPatrick, 48, director of economic development, said he had been championing innovations and reforms for more than a decade, later charging Lucas had not. FitzPatrick, a Democrat who ran as a Republican in order to "get into the finals, continued to advocate that county government be nonpartisan.

FITZ PATRICK hammered at Lucas' record as sheriff, saying the Sheriff's Department had grown in a decade from "400 and some odd employees to around 800."

The four-time chairman of the County Board of Commissioners said the new jail, when completed, will require new staffing. "We can save 30 to 40 percent of the cost by using correctional guards rather than deputy sheriffs," FitzPatrick said.

FitzPatrick said that when he became chairman in 1971, the county had a \$1.8 million deficit; when he left county government in 1974, it had a \$12.4 million surplus ("Its last surplus"), and today it's \$17 million in the red.

"Believe me, we're in such serious trouble. There are no funds. Anybody in county government who doesn't believe he's going to

have to sacrifice is in for one big, rude awakening."

LUCAS DIDN'T discuss the new jail or respond to FitzPatrick's charges until asked about the proposal to use correctional guards rather than deputies.

Lucas said that six years ago he submitted a proposal to the Wayne County Efficiency Task Force that "a separate classification of deputy," at a "significantly lower" salary scale, be implemented.

The sheriff said the plan is "in limbo" and "gathering dust" before the Board of Commissioners.

After the session, FitzPatrick said Lucas didn't advocate the plan to the

Charter Commission in 1981 and hasn't advocated it on the campaign stump this year.

LUCAS SAID he ran for the newly created county executive post because "I'm in an admirable position to lend my credentials (to) a job that needs doing."

To the published charge that he is part of Wayne County's problem rather than a solution, Lucas said, "I don't agree with that."

FitzPatrick said he had better credentials because he served four one-year terms as chairman of the county board, had been on the board of the National Association of Counties, had

been first vice-chairman of the Michigan Association of Counties, had been chairperson of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, had made 300 to 400 speeches in the early 1970s in favor of county reorganization, had helped produce 13,000 new jobs in his 3 3/4 years as executive director of the Economic Development Corporation and had testified before legislative committees on the bill which created the county executive post.

"My background has been one of reform, and new and innovative changes," he said.

Bill lets voters wipe out road board in '83

Wayne County voters may find themselves voting on a charter amendment next spring to abolish the three-member Road Commission.

"I'm partially pleased," said Sheriff William Lucas, Democratic nominee for county executive who helped push for the legislative change. "I would have liked the entire bundle, but I'm confident that when I present it to the people, they will adopt it."

By the "entire bundle," Lucas meant a state law mandating the abolition of road commission in home rule counties with more than 1.5 million population. The measure would have applied only to Wayne County and left the other 82 counties intact. State Rep. Jeffrey Padden, D-Wyandotte, presented a two-bill package Tuesday which would have done that.

BUT REP. Tom Brown, D-Westland, chairman of the House Towns and Counties Committee, put his foot down at the state's ordering such a change. He charged that a state law automatically abolishing the Wayne County Road Commission would amount to "amending the charter on the people."

So Brown had the bill amended to allow voters to decide whether they want 1) the present appointive Road Commission, 2) an elective Road Commission or 3) no Road Commission at all, with the county executive being handed those powers and duties.

That plan passed the Towns and Counties Committee on a 9-0 vote and goes to the House floor, where it could run into a fight.

After the committee hearing, Lucas said that, if elected, his first reorganization plan submitted to the Board of Commissioners would ask them to put on the ballot his proposal to abolish the Road Commission and hand its duties and powers to the executive.

AS THINGS STAND, Wayne County's home-rule charter, first in the state, retained the Road Commission, as required by existing law.

But it gave the executive power to appoint and remove the three-member governing board of the Road Commission. The charter also requires that body to submit its work plans to the executive twice yearly so they can be coordinated with the work plans of the Drain Commission and Public Works Department.

Neither Padden nor Lucas is satisfied with that.

Said Padden: "The power to hire and fire the Road commission did not change the structure." Eliminating the Road Commission's autonomy, he said, will "make sure more money is spent fixing those damn potholes and less on administration, payroll and accounting."

Lucas added that he would like to reorganize county government "without any false barriers."

THE BROWN changes in Padden's bills assure at least a few months more life to a controversial 73-member management union which signed a six-year contract with the Road Commission protecting its jobs.

"If the Road Commission did not exist, there would be no contract. It's Lucas' position as well: If there's no Road Commission, no contract."

Lucas agreed. The front-runner in the county-executive race said he declined to participate in a lawsuit challenging the validity of the pact because it would take many months with no assurance that the foes of the Road Commission union would win.

Lucas' opponent, Robert FitzPatrick, had agreed to join a suit by the Midwestern Legal Foundation seeking to invalidate the contract. The foundation, however, wouldn't file the suit unless both Lucas and FitzPatrick, the Democratic and Republican nominees, respectively, would be co-plaintiffs. So there will be no suit.

Bill lets voters wipe out road board in '83

Wayne County voters may find themselves voting on a charter amendment next spring to abolish the three-member Road Commission.

"I'm partially pleased," said Sheriff William Lucas, Democratic nominee for county executive who helped push for the legislative change. "I would have liked the entire bundle, but I'm confident that when I present it to the people, they will adopt it."

By the "entire bundle," Lucas meant a state law mandating the abolition of road commission in home rule counties with more than 1.5 million population. The measure would have applied only to Wayne County and left the other 82 counties intact. State Rep. Jeffrey Padden, D-Wyandotte, presented a two-bill package Tuesday which would have done that.

BUT REP. Tom Brown, D-Westland, chairman of the House Towns and Counties Committee, put his foot down at the state's ordering such a change. He charged that a state law automatically abolishing the Wayne County Road Commission would amount to "amending the charter on the people."

So Brown had the bill amended to allow voters to decide whether they want 1) the present appointive Road Commission, 2) an elective Road Commission or 3) no Road Commission at all, with the county executive being handed those powers and duties.

That plan passed the Towns and Counties Committee on a 9-0 vote and goes to the House floor, where it could run into a fight.

After the committee hearing, Lucas said that, if elected, his first reorganization plan submitted to the Board of Commissioners would ask them to put on the ballot his proposal to abolish the Road Commission and hand its duties and powers to the executive.

AS THINGS STAND, Wayne County's home-rule charter, first in the state, retained the Road Commission, as required by existing law.

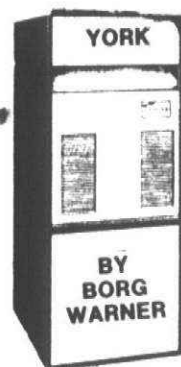

FITZPATRICK said that among his accomplishments are:

- Closing down the Child Development Center in Northville Township in the early 1970s when it appeared children were getting no treatment.
- Finding investors last week who will reopen it as a complete senior citizens village. Instead of costing the county \$130,000 a year to maintain, the complex at Five Mile and Sheldon will produce millions in new taxes for local and county government.
- Implementing a plan to allow private investors to renovate the old County Building as an historic building.
- Suggesting to Lucas, back in the early 1970s, that the sheriff contract to furnish services to cities and townships in the western suburbs. The city of Romulus made a contract for some years, but today the local units have set up their own police departments.

Bill lets voters wipe out road commission in 1983

DESPITE THE EASY victory in the Towns and Counties Committee, however, Padden and Lucas acknowledged they would have a tougher time on the floor of the Legislature. John Grubba, managing director of the Oakland County Road Commission, had two objections to the bills,

even after Brown's amendments were adopted:

1) "Wayne County will not receive gasoline and weight taxes" because the PA 51 of 1950, which splits those revenues, specifies they go to road commissions. But the act could be easily be amended, Grubba said in an interview outside the committee

room door.

2) "If all powers and duties go to the chief executive, those include the power to budget, set priorities for roads without input from the County Board of Commissioners," said Grubba. "That's far too much power without checks and balances. This (bill) doesn't bring the county commission-

ers into the process at all. "Their (Wayne County's) problems are people problems. You can't solve people problems with legislation."

OTHERS MAY also fight. Earl Rogers, representing the County Road Association, objected to Padden's bills, fearing "the integrity of the gasoline and weight tax mon-

ey" would be jeopardized if the funds were spent at the discretion of the county executive.

Dave Machtel, legislative director of the Michigan Townships Association, objected that there was no guarantee, if voters should opt for continuing a road commission, that townships be represented on the road board.

Challenged by a county employee on his charge that Wayne County has "the highest wages and best pensions in the United States," FitzPatrick replied:

"There are positions which shouldn't be there. I'm not suggesting every position is overpaid. . . But we can no longer have the union negotiate with the union" — a reference to charges that union officials control the civil service apparatus and, in effect, negotiate with themselves.

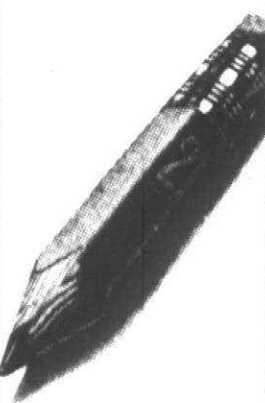

School officials should strive to communicate

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS and the Board of Education face two important workshops in the next nine days. These meetings will lay the foundation and direction in the next few years for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

No immediate "hot" issues face the board at these workshops. No angry residents plan to vent frustrations about high taxes and low services in the district. Talks will be philosophical in nature.

Because of this, public participation probably will be minimal.

And it is unfortunate because these sessions are critical.

The workshops truly will be an exercise in communication. The ultimate goal is clear lines of communication between the board, administration and the taxpayers so everyone understands the philosophy and direction our elected officials will choose on future school issues.

It hasn't always been that way.

THE FIRST WORKSHOP takes place at 7:30 p.m. Monday at the board office, 454 Harvey,

Plymouth. At that time, the board will discuss its goals and objectives for the upcoming school year.

Results from an attitudinal survey, recently conducted by school officials, also will be interpreted and reviewed.

Hopefully, officials will take the time to compare their results to the Observer's readership survey prepared last February.

Our survey attracted more than 1,600 responses. It expressed the service priorities of the community during these difficult economic times.

Our results should be an important element of future decisions in the next budget-cutting process.

THE SECOND MEETING is a two-day, weekend workshop 3-10 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24 and 7-11 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 25 in the board office.

Some of the topics to be discussed include: 1982-83 budget update and projected revenues and expenditures for 1983-84; safety busing philosophy; staffing, class size and length of school day at all education levels; enrollment projections; guidelines and criteria for closing schools; high school curricu-

lum — computer expansion, require more mandated courses for graduation; development of high-level, districtwide mathematics program; improved teacher evaluations and high school counseling program; possible reduction of class size with the elimination of art, music and physical education at the elementary level; and operation of the athletic concept with alternative funding.

It is suggested that the following topics also be discussed at this workshop:

- Increasing resource materials in school libraries and media centers.
- Philosophy of student-operated radio station.
- Restructuring of administrative duties and staffing at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP).
- Future direction of the Talented and Gifted program.
- Short-term instructional goals while implementing the long-range Instructional Skills Program.

• Better use of community relations department to help educate and communicate with the public and to get residents involved with the district.

BOARD PRESIDENT Tom Yack said one of his top priorities is to help increase communication between the board and administration.

It is no secret that Yack, and other board members, were unhappy when they learned the administration proceeded to print the recently revised attendance policy at the CEP in the students' handbook before the board gave final approval to the new rules.

These things happen when communication lines break down between the board, administration and the community.

Now is Yack's chance to bridge that communication gap when these meetings begin.

It is imperative the board take control of these issues, develop common directions and philosophies, and make sure administration implements these concepts throughout the district.

Headlee's big problem: GOP women

DICK HEADLEE has a problem with the women's vote. I have detected it myself in listening to comments women volunteer about the Republican candidate for governor. They are really scared of the Mormon father of nine who opposes the federal Equal Rights Amendment.

The Headlee campaign also perceives it has a problem, and last week state Sen. John Engler of Mt. Pleasant put together a meeting with Headlee and Republican women in state government.

State Reps. Ruth McNamee of Birmingham, Sylvia Skrel of Livonia and Shirley Johnson of Royal Oak were there.

"HE DOESN'T allude to women in the work force (in speeches)," said McNamee afterwards.

"There are women who work because they have to — heads of single-parent households, trying to put youngsters through school or college.

"Forget ERA and abortion. He has to understand there are a large group of women in the work force, recognize and have empathy with them."

Skrel used the meeting to push an idea for a bill. It would allow working parents a partial deduction of day-care expenses from taxable income under the state income tax. Day care, she contends, should be a legitimate expense in the earning of a living, just like mileage.

ONE OF HEADLEE'S problems, they found, is that he is reluctant to talk about his own record as president of Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Co. They were impressed by his company's:

• Female executives. Eleven women are at the assistant vice president, manager and director level, including Loretta Abrams, assistant vice president for credit administration, and Lee Zohrob, assistant vice president and associate general counsel.

• Allowing "flextime," whereby women employees may modify their own schedules to accommodate their families as long as they put in their required hours.

They were also impressed by the day-care center for Headlee campaign workers and the fact that the organizational brain in his headquarters is campaign manager Mari Egbert.

Said Johnson: "He took it for granted that it was good business to do those things."

Added Skrel: "Why, oh why, didn't you let us know?"

HEADLEE MADE a point of saying his party has a strong record of placing women in high positions in government: the only two women senators, the first woman Supreme Court justice, the only woman on the Michigan Supreme Court, the only major party woman candidate for the state high court in 1982.

Interesting, but it doesn't reflect on Dick Headlee, one way or the other.

Skrel pounded home the message that Headlee must talk about more than jobs; he must talk about "jobs for men and women."

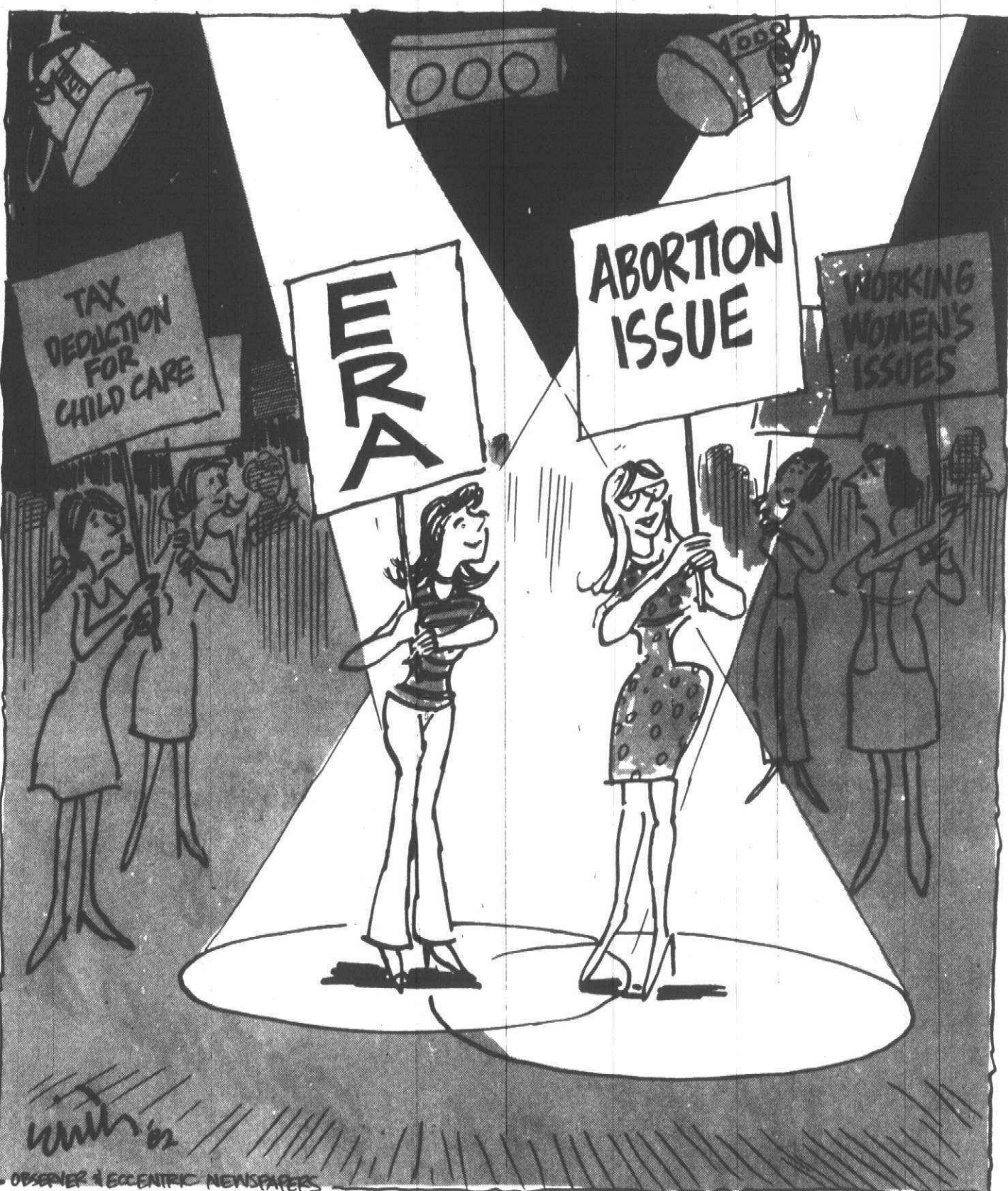
For some women, the sun rises and sets on the issues of ERA and abortion. Others, however, are concerned about issues of civil service, moving up into management, day care, flextime and what Skrel calls "comparable worth."

The last refers to "the effort to raise wages for female-dominated jobs," said Skrel. "Unlike 'equal pay for equal work,' it reaches wage inequities associated with occupational segregation and allows us to compare different jobs which share comparable skills, efforts and responsibilities."

High-level secretaries and registered nurses should be rubbing their hands at that one.

NOW WE COME to the bottom line. Are these Republican women convinced that Headlee is sensitive to the problems of working women? McNamee summed it up:

"He convinced me in some areas. In others, I'll have to follow up."



Caving in to Sims

Ford has a poorer idea

FOR THE PAST several years, the daily prints, magazines and airwaves across the nation have been filled with the message: "Ford has a better idea."

Now The Stroller has reason to wonder if it is true.

When William Clay Ford, owner of the Detroit Lions and a bigwig in the Ford Motor Co., bowed to the Lions' star running back, Billy Sims, and gave him a personal interview to get him back in the fold, he could have set a dangerous precedent.

By agreeing to Sims' demands, Ford bypassed his general manager and all the others who have a voice in the conduct of the football business. In fact, they also bypassed the players' association. And this could have some telling effects around the entire National Football League.

WOULD FORD have bowed to a workman on the assembly line if he were dissatisfied with his wages or working conditions? You can bet the demand would have been sent through channels. The union, the personnel office and the plant manager would have stepped into the picture.

And if it had been any other player, chances are he also would not have been given a personal interview by the owner.

But when Ford catered to his running back, who was complaining over what was termed a handshake in good faith, he opened the door for all sorts of trouble.

He made a hero out of Sims, and it would only be natural if the running back would take on a haughty air and feel a bit above the other players.

In that case, the players could revolt in a manner that would be detrimental to all concerned. The linemen could refuse to clear the path for Sims and let him attempt to pick up yardage alone. It has been done many times previously — the men who do the blocking sort of lay down on the job.

And Sims, left alone to gain ground around the ends or off the tackles, would have a most difficult time picking up yardage.

Then what? The team would falter. Sims would be reduced to just another back, and even the franchise would suffer.

MORE THAN THAT, Ford's action could cause the players union to step in and handle the problems of its members, and Ford would have a real battle on his hands.

It all seems rather strange that he would yield to a player who already was receiving a salary estimated at \$450,000 annually. He could have forced Sims' hand and asked him to go back to Texas, like many of the other owners would have done. But Ford yielded and made a hero out of a disgruntled player.

It will be most interesting to see what will happen when the real struggles begin down on the playing field, for Ford has set a dangerous precedent. Already two players have left the squad.

LEARNING OF Ford's capitulation, The Stroller turned back the pages to the time some years ago when one of the Tigers came into the office to talk contract with Frank Navin, owner of the baseball club.

As they began to talk, the player introduced his companion, informing Navin he would serve as the player's agent.

Navin sat silent. Then, as a strong-willed owner would do, he ordered them both out of the office. He warned the player that if he wanted to continue as a member of the team, he would have to come back alone to discuss his contract.

That ended what had looked like a battle of wits.

But there was none of Navin's attitude in William Clay Ford. He capitulated to the wishes of a player. Do you think Ford had a better idea?

Bendix's fate doesn't faze Main Street

MIDNIGHT OIL is burning in the headquarters of Bendix Corp. on Civic Center Drive in Southfield. Tension is in the air.

A few blocks away, kites are flying in a city park. Antique enthusiasts attend a show in the city's Civic Center. Theater patrons rush to a movie at the Prudential Town Center.

Bendix is battling for its corporate survival. An aggressive acquisition program has backfired. Bendix wanted to purchase the stock of the Martin Marietta. Now Martin Marietta has turned around and claims it will purchase enough shares to control Bendix.

Corporate giant United Technologies has entered the fray and is also trying to purchase Bendix stock. As The Wall Street Journal says of Bendix, "the predator has become the prey."

Yet life in Southfield continues undisturbed. People are more interested in a healing the wounds after ending a teacher strike that delayed the start of school.

The fate of Bendix has no effect on the daily lives of those living in Southfield.

THIS POINTS out the curious relationship which exists between suburban communities and major corporations housed in those communities. Besides Bendix, Southfield is also the headquarters of Federal Mogul, American Motors and Eaton. Other suburban communities also house major corporations including Kmart and Rockwell International in Troy, Burroughs in Plymouth and Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance in Farmington Hills.

In addition, top executives for automobile companies and their suppliers live throughout the suburban area.

These corporations and their executives have little effect on suburban communities. Most local leadership is provided by professionals and the proprietors of small businesses.

CARL STODDARD, editor of the Southfield Eclectic, says people in Southfield would be interested in the fate of Bendix if there were fear the company would leave, taking jobs and tax dollars. That fear is not present; thus, there is not much interest in Bendix.

"Two communities (business and residential) coexist in Southfield, but they do not co-mingle," Stoddard says.

To a certain extent, that same relationship exists in most suburban communities. I remember a few years ago when William Agee, chairman of Bendix, and his wife were "honorary" co-chairpersons of the annual fund-raising drive at The Community House in Birmingham.

Mr. and Mrs. Agee politely met all of the locals who attended a fund-raising event. They looked like a happily married couple as they greeted the guests. After they put in their obligatory hour, they departed.

A few weeks later it was revealed that Mr. and Mrs. William Agee were not so happily married. He was in the process of a divorce, and his relationship with Bendix vice president Mary Cunningham was disclosed.

That appearance was the extent of Agee's participation in the Birmingham fund drive.

WHY DO major corporations play so small a role in local affairs?

Perhaps corporate life takes up so many working hours that there's not much time left for the community.

Corporations also frequently transfer executives. Psychologically, it's difficult for corporate families to put roots into a community only to be moved again. Thus, executives keep their distance from their communities.

Corporations no longer expect executives to be active in community activities, as they did a few years ago. That was a "frill" eliminated by the recession.

Whatever the reason, a peculiar relationship exists between suburbs and major companies residing in the suburbs. What's important on Wall Street is not important on Main Street.

No. 5, who sent these employees to the emergency Oakwood Hospital and not let them go home to their own doctor?

No. 6, why was the third employee given the same time off with pay when there was nothing wrong with her?

No. 7, Supervisor James Poole was questioned on Sept. 7 if the doctor at Oakwood Hospital had sent the employees back with a disability. He said, "No."

Whose authority was used to pay these people for sick time? There was no medical restriction. The problems seem to be solvable in-house and not brought before the public. The board can put our money to better use.

No. 8, the supervisor is the tax assessor for the township. He has delegated this authority to Wayne County, and the treasurer has the day-to-day work for any questions. But he hasn't given her any personnel to handle the extra work. The treasurer is the tax collector, not the assessor.

No. 9, if conditions are as bad as the employees say they are in the treasurer's office, why did a former employee ask for her job back and now is back to work?

I hope the "management team" will give the treasurer, Maria Terlini, the proper manpower and support that she deserves, or maybe we need a new team.

Clift and Monroe — and Clark Gable, to a lesser degree — essentially played themselves in "The Misfits," which is part of what makes it such a fine film. Huston's no-nonsense directorial style, wherein he allows his stars to carry the burden and create the essence of the film, accounts for the rest of the film's flair and ultimate success. Bonstelle opening with drama 'Eden'

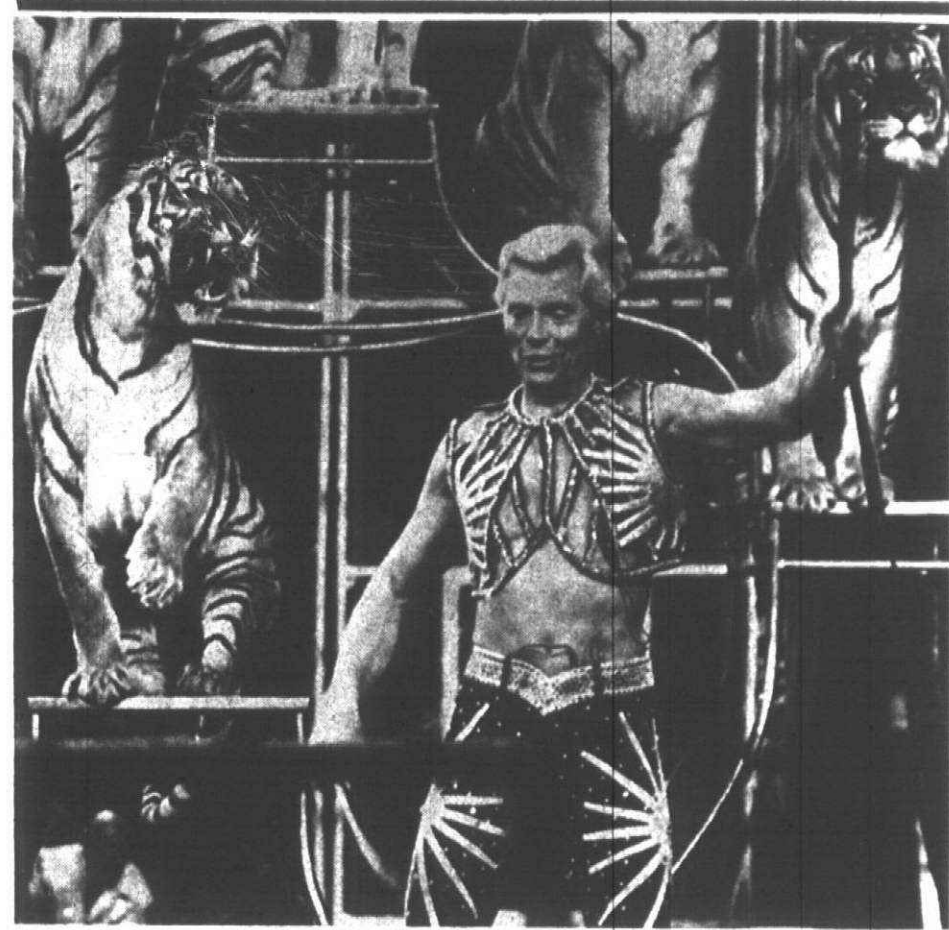

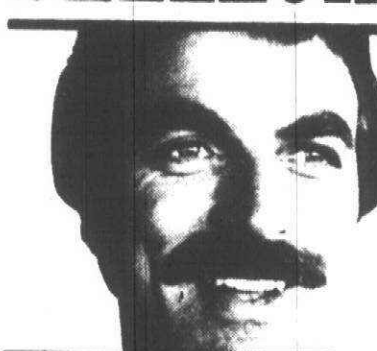

Dems rescue 'prevailing wage'

Democrats in the Michigan Senate last week beat down a Republican attempt to wipe the "prevailing-wage" requirement out of construction contracts financed with local-government help.

"The prevailing wage is really putting a damper on economic development," argued Sen. Robert VanderLaan, R-Kentwood, author of the amendment.

"To eliminate the notion of prevailing wage," answered Sen. Doug Ross, R-Southfield, "all of us will find ourselves buying from companies which pay the lowest wages."

IN AN 18-13 vote — two shy of the needed 20 — the Senate rejected VanderLaan's amendment to a bill aimed at giving the state Labor Department authority to enforce the prevailing-wage requirement. Seven senators were absent.

The main bill requires that the prevailing wage be paid by all contractors and sub-contractors working on projects financed by local economic development corporation (EDC) bonds. No vote was taken on the main bill, HB 4719, sponsored by Rep. Joe Conroy, D-Flint.

Supporting the VanderLaan amend-

ment were Republicans Donald Bishop of Rochester and R. Robert Geake of Northville.

Opposed was Ross. Missing for the vote were Democrats Jack Faxon of Southfield, William Faust of Westland and Dana Wilson of Ferndale.

VANDERLAAN said the Michigan definition of "prevailing wage" is about 20 percent higher than the federal definition.

The Senate GOP leader contended the state prevailing wage is "adding 15 to 25 percent to the cost of construction, especially outstate." He said five projects were halted in Midland and Saginaw because companies balked at the state prevailing wage, which is largely a union-contract wage rather than an average wage.

"The prevailing wage has negated the effect of the Economic Development Act," said VanderLaan, arguing that the money saved by using lower-interest EDC bonds is eaten up by labor costs.

"To give people high wage rates rather than jobs is wrong," he said.

SEN. JOHN KELLY, D-Detroit, was first to reply.

"Labor costs are only 16 percent of total construction costs in the country," Kelly said. On that basis, Michigan's prevailing wage may be 20 percent

higher than other states, but as a percentage of total construction costs, the wage differential is only 3-4 percent.

"The entire EDC act hasn't served its purpose," he said, citing national reports of EDC bonds being used to help fast-food restaurants at freeway interchanges.

Kelly said EDC bonds, which are exempt from federal income taxation, and tax breaks for new businesses shift the burden of taxation from corporations to people.

VanderLaan shot back: "To create a dichotomy . . . to conjure up anti-business feeling . . . is out of date. To dredge up class warfare is to beat a dead horse."

ROSS APPROACHED the issue from the beginning.

"In private contracts, wages are determined by people buying and selling labor," he said, with government's role limited to determining a minimum wage.

League preserves art of story telling

The old art of storytelling is alive and well.

This reassuring statement comes from Linda Aldrich of Plymouth, president of the Detroit Story League. She describes the league as a service organization.

Members offer their services to children of all ages in hospitals, in public and church schools, in camps, and in libraries.

Aldrich's storytelling skills are come into effective use in her first-grade classroom in the Clarenceville School District. She has attentive listeners among the fifth-graders in the Novi schools when they spend a week at camp. And when she returned to her hometown of Vermontville, Mich., she discovered that a senior citizens group was enthralled by a good story.

Through stories the teller challenges others to laugh, to be happy, to be brave, to be comforted, to travel in faraway places, to know interesting and great people of every race and creed.

THE DETROIT Story League was founded 70 years ago by Mary Conover of the Detroit Children's Library. It is a branch of the central division of the National Story League.

"The central division stretches from Michigan to Texas," said Aldrich. "There also are eastern and western divisions."

The national organization began in the summer of 1903 in Knoxville, Tenn.

More than 2,000 teachers from all sections of the country had gathered for a conference. Each evening a few teachers congregated on the lawn of the university and told stories. The meetings grew from attendance of several dozen to several hundred.

At their last meeting they organized into a Story Tellers' League which afterwards became the National Story League.

Its one fundamental purpose was to discover in the world's literature, history and life, the best stories. They would tell them to the young people with love and sympathy.

ALDRICH said members of the league collect stories.

Some use poetry. Some use gestures. Some sit quietly and use a conversational tone of voice.

She utilizes many-pocketed aprons for some of her stories. She has a grandma's apron, poetry apron.

The storytellers share stories. She

has about 20 in her collection.

"I memorize my stories; a good story is worth memorizing. I have seen a storyteller take a three-paragraph story and elaborate on it," she said.

They always are looking for new stories, buying out-of-print books and adding to their libraries. She said some very old stories have been revived. With artwork they have become best sellers among the new books for children.

Conventions present opportunities for sharing stories from all over the world. She says some wonderful tales have come from Africa.

One of their members collects southern ghost stories.

LGUE members have taped stories for the blind and for radio programs.

Aldrich said television and picture books have not taken away children's interest in a good story. "They love the opportunity to use their imagination."

The national group chooses a central theme for each year. This year it is "Memories." In keeping with this, the Detroit Story League will have "Golden Rule Days" for its September theme.

Saturday, Sept. 18 in the Farmington Community Center. The center is at 24705 Farmington Road, north of 10 Mile.

Aldrich said the professional storytellers have their own organization. It is the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Story Tellers.

Charles Laughton, great professional story teller, said, "I like stories better than anything else that is made by man."

Members of the story league agree with this quote from Laughton's book, "Tell Me a Story."

Forge links English town, Detroit

SNOWHILL WAS JUST another picturesque English village when I first drove into it, with my friend Vera Schad at the wheel beside me. I had no way of knowing then that another old friend came from here.

For 300 years, Snowhill was the home of the blacksmith shop that I have visited so often at Greenfield Village in Dearborn. It stood on that empty lot at the curve of the street, where flower gardens now bloom.

A tiny sign on the adjacent building reads "The Old Forge."

I came to Snowhill in Gloucestershire to visit Hans and Vera Schad, who once managed the well-known Shakespeare Hotel half-an-hour's drive north in Stratford-Upon-Avon, and now manage the Snowhill Arms. A few minutes in the peaceful atmosphere of Snowhill, and you would understand why they left the beam-and-plaster elegance of the Shakespeare for the noise and hard work of a village pub.

From the pub you can walk left around the village church or right around the village church; either way you end up on the single street of Snowhill, the road winding up hill and disappearing into countryside again.

The Cotswolds are full of hamlets like this, each built of the Cotswold stone on which they stand,

straight-sided, two-story buildings of large, square-cut stone, with steep stone roofs and dry stone fences. The English have a wonderful way with flowers, so roses often climb the stone houses and their stone-terraced gardens.

PUBS LIKE THE Snowhill Arms have always been the center of English village life and they still draw standing-room-only crowds almost every afternoon and evening. There are no hotel accommodations at the Arms, but locals come from 15 miles around to play darts and skittles under the beamed ceiling of the pub.

Hans serves pints of beer as fast as he can pull the pump. Vera and her daughter cook "pub meals" in the adjacent kitchen: cottage pie, steak and chips, lasagna, roast beef sandwiches.

Hans always reserves a center booth for local people, who come in after dinner for a drink. Mr. Williams, with his shock of white hair, has been a familiar sight in town for years. His photograph is on the front of a AAA brochure there on the wall; the picture made Snowhill briefly famous.

Sheila Wilkes, a young woman who sometimes helps out at the Arms, was born in Springhill Cottage, and her grandmother was born there before her. The young man leaning against the bar goes back many generations in Rose Cottage; Charles Keyte invented a sewing machine there, now displayed in the British Science Museum in Kensington.

JUST ANOTHER delightful English village I would have sworn, with no connection to my life, until I heard about the old blacksmith shop. I was standing behind the pub, where a skittles (bowling) alley recently was opened, telling young Angie Schad about Greenfield Village.

"I've seen buildings like these before," I said. "There is a cottage and a blacksmith shop in a restored village in Dearborn."

"I think the blacksmith shop came from here," she said. There it was on the pub wall, the story about a forge built in Snowhill in the early 1600s and purchased by Henry Ford 300 years later. The Greenfield Village cottage comes from another hamlet called Chedworth.

The Arms is one of 17 pubs and inns owned by Donnington Brewery, one of thousands of friendly neighborhood gathering places in England. 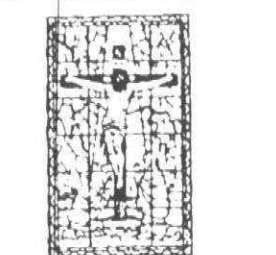

Meeting to teach youngsters dangers of drugs

When Debbie Kelbert discovered that a pre-teen boy of her acquaintance had been offered a chance to try marijuana, she decided something should be done.

The Farmington Hills resident reasoned that youngsters 10 and up should be taught something about drugs to be able to protect themselves from this plague of modern society.

She got to work. The result will be a meeting on drugs for youngsters in fourth grade and above and their parents to be held at 6:30 p.m. Sunday in Kenwood Church of Christ, 20200 Meriman, just south of Eight Mile, Livonia.

Special guests will be two Detroit police officers, Sgt. Edward Gulowski and patrolman Charles Albright. To be shown will be two films, "Fat Albert" and "Dead is Dead."

The officers will answer questions and display common drugs and drug

paraphernalia.

"I have three youngsters who are not aware of what marijuana looks like or what it does," continued Kelbert. "I wouldn't want them get mixed up with drugs due to ignorance."

Susann Dibble of Livonia, a substitute teacher in the Livonia schools, explained that she is hoping to get a good look at some drugs, so she'll know if drugs are being used in school.

"My kids see things like syringes left in the park when we go there," she noted, adding, "We're losing a lot of teens through drug deaths."

Both acknowledged that parents often have little information about substances being abused. For this reason not only are youngsters encouraged to bring their friends to the free drug seminar, parents are invited to accompany their children.

The event will be held during the meeting time of the Jet Cadets, a group

of fourth-, fifth- and sixth-grade boys and girls. Its sponsors are Mrs. Kelbert and her husband Dan, and Al and Jan Johnston of Farmington Hills. Their children are cadets along with the Dibble's son Steven.

Parents who find it necessary to bring along their younger children may place them during the meeting in a church activity group for children of their own age. These could be the Space Cubs for 4- and 5-year-olds or the Whirlbirds for those in first, second and third grades.

A nursery is also available.

In their weekly Sunday night meetings the Jet Cadets do crafts, sing, play games, take trips, have Bible lessons and parties. They have also fasted to understand hunger, and passed out brochures for the drug meeting. They are a service squad of church church, cleaning pews and doing other tasks.

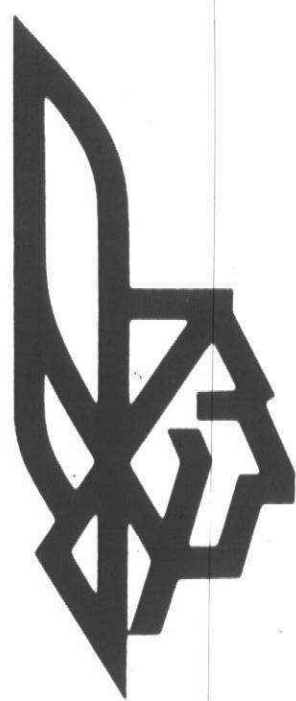
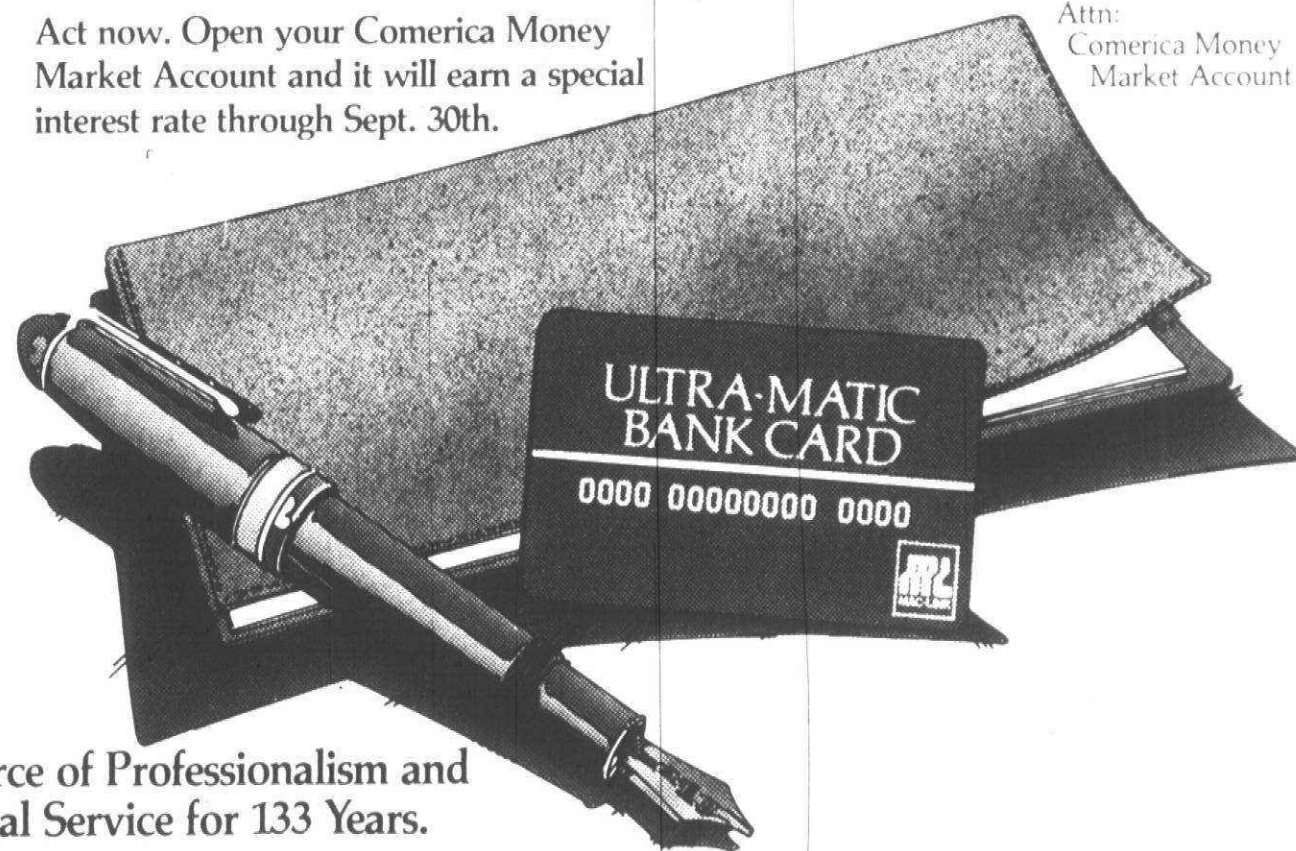

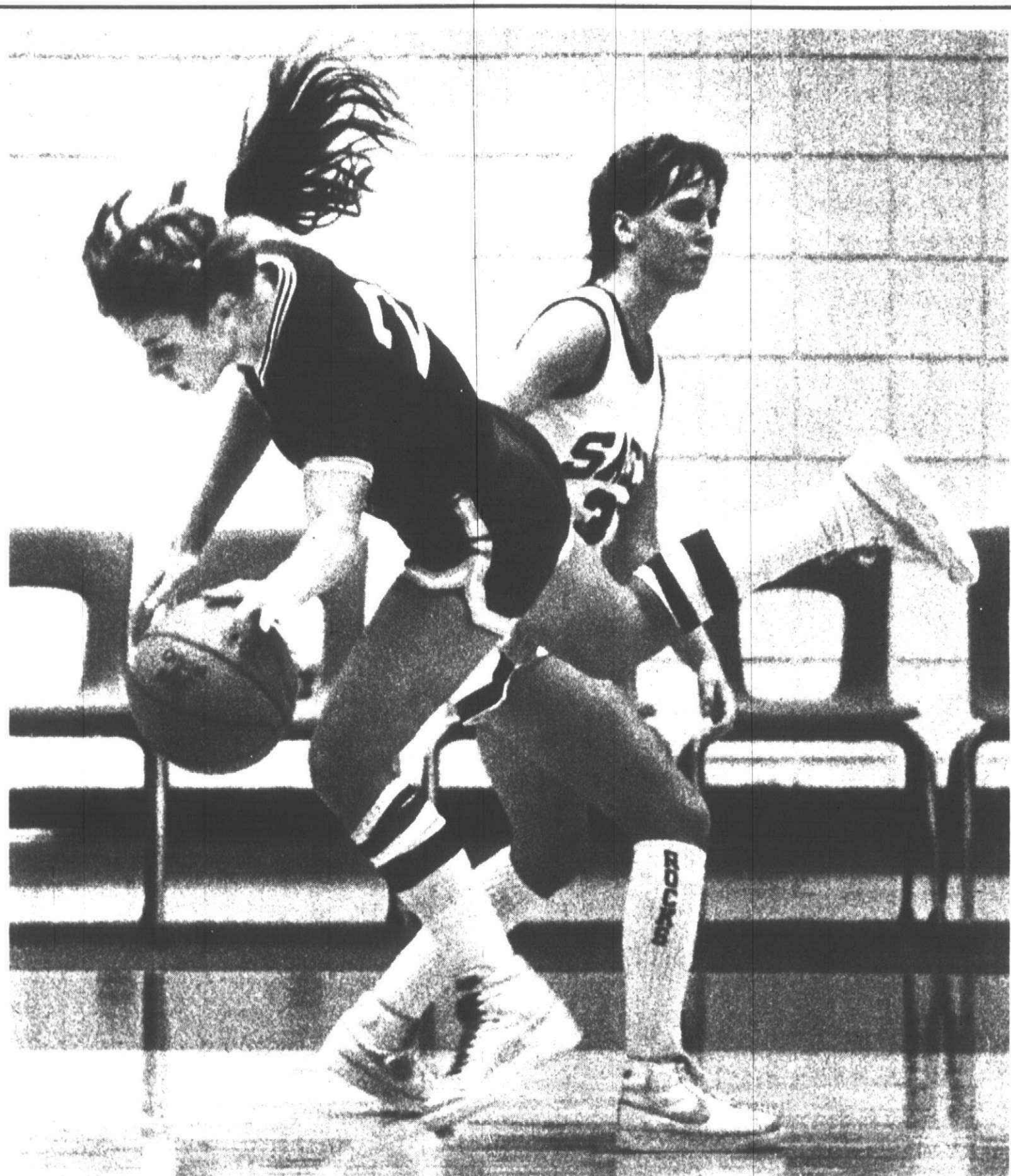

Canton cagers win first Salem defense stops RU

It wasn't a great game for the Rocks, but coach Bob Blohm felt it was a "pretty solid game. We had a great third quarter. Our second and third quarters have been good."

"And our defense was pretty nice tonight."

The middle quarters were indeed the difference, as Salem got its game in gear and blasted the Panthers, 14-7 in the second and 17-2 in the third.

"We outscored them 31-9 (in those two quarters)," Blohm said. "That's pretty good."

AND THAT'S an understatement. RU, which has started the season with a schedule designed by Satan, led 11-10 after one quarter.

By the start of the fourth, the score was 41-20, Salem.

Jacque Merrifield topped the Rocks with 13 points. Pam McBride added a dozen, and Ann Glonski netted 10.

Center Kathy Storvis led all scorers, pouring in 15 for RU. The Panthers played Redford St. Agatha (a Class C state title favorite) and powerhouse Livonia Bentley last week and go against Redford Bishop Borgess, Plymouth Canton, North Farm-

ington, Trenton and Garden City in their next five games.

Few teams can survive a schedule like that, and RU hasn't. The Panthers are 0-3.

Salem is 3-0 and counting. The Rocks entertain a tall Walled Lake Western team at 7:30 p.m. tonight.

It finally came. After two difficult losses, the Canton cagers broke loose Tuesday night in a romp over Northville at Northville.

It was the Chiefs' first win of the season and the first of coach Phyllis Cunningham's career as the Canton coach. Cunningham became head coach this season after Mike McCauley resigned.

"I'm overdue," Cunningham said. "It feels real nice. The girls played a super game — excellent defense. They held (Northville) to eight points in the first half and none in the third quarter."

It was a welcome win for Canton, after a 17-point loss to city rival Plymouth Salem in the season opener and a two-point defeat to Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA) foe Walled Lake Central.

The victory evened Canton's league record at 1-1.

"They're not a strong ball club," Cunningham said of Northville. "They only

have two or three girls back with any experience."

BUT THE CHIEFS are in the same shape, with only one returning starter and two players with extensive experience. Guard Sue Gerke, the lone starter back from last year's team, nearly outscored the Mustangs single-handedly, notching 19 points. Guard Lou Ann Hamblin contributed 12.

But it was defense that did the job, as Canton raced to an 11-4 lead after one quarter, extending it to 29-8 at the half. By the end of three quarters it was a blowout, as the Chiefs outpointed Northville, 16-0, for a 45-8 advantage.

Rebounding also played a key role for Canton, with Missy Aiken grabbing 12 to go with her nine points. Four of Aiken's rebounds came at the offensive end of the court, as the Chiefs pulled down 14 offensive boards.

"I REALLY didn't know what to compare us to, after the first two games," Cunningham said. "Were we playing really excellent teams, or were we just not playing up to our potential?"

After walloping a weak Northville team, Cunningham still isn't sure how good her team is. She'll find out, though, in the weeks to come.

Canton travels to Farmington Thursday for a 7:30 p.m. WLAA contest. Farmington lost to Northville in the season's first week.

'The Game' is here

Coach Tom Moshimer ambled across the field, glancing back over his shoulder every minute or so at the team in red.

"They may try something different," the Plymouth Salem football coach said. "But, hopefully, it won't be anything we can't handle."

Again he looked back at the team in red. "There," he said with a sly grin. "They're working against the wishbone now."

Which could be expected. Because the team in red — Plymouth Canton — was preparing for the biggest game in its history. On Friday, the Chiefs are to hammer helmets against the school it shares a practice field with.

Moshimer's Rocks.

IT WAS AN odd sight Monday afternoon. Thoughts of Bo Schembechler closing practices before Michigan's big game with Ohio State seemed ridiculous. Here were two teams preparing to play each other on the same field, less than 50 yards apart.

"They moved down on the west end, and we moved up on the east end of the field a little more," said Canton coach Richard Barr. "It's funny, because we can kind of see what they're doing, and he can kind of see what we're doing."

There were adjustments. As Barr lined up his defensive unit to practice against a wishbone offense (which is what Salem runs), he lined up the players not taking part in the session between his team and the Salem squad, to act as a screen.

"That's so he couldn't see what defenses we were running," Barr said smiling.

SECRECY IS not a vital concern to either coach. They know each other pretty well: Barr served as a Salem assistant under Moshimer for eight years be-

fore taking over at Canton two years ago.

"I don't think we're the same type of coach," Barr said. "Our philosophy on the field is different. I might tend to do the crazier thing, but then I'm not as experienced as he is."

But Canton has not shared Salem's football success. Barr has recorded 1-8 and 2-7 seasons in his tenure as the Chiefs' coach. Salem has had just one losing season in the last six.

That record, combined with what looks like a deep and talent-laden '82 squad, makes Moshimer's Rocks Friday's favorites. But other factors could weigh heavily on the game's outcome.

"THE EMOTIONAL edge is on their side," Moshimer said. "I think everyone is probably going to pick us to win, and that's going to benefit them."

"That's the great equalizer — emotion. And it will benefit Canton more."

Emotions can carry a team to great heights, it's true. But often an emotional high can burn a team out as well. It can use up a team's energy too fast, so that by the fourth quarter the players are spent.

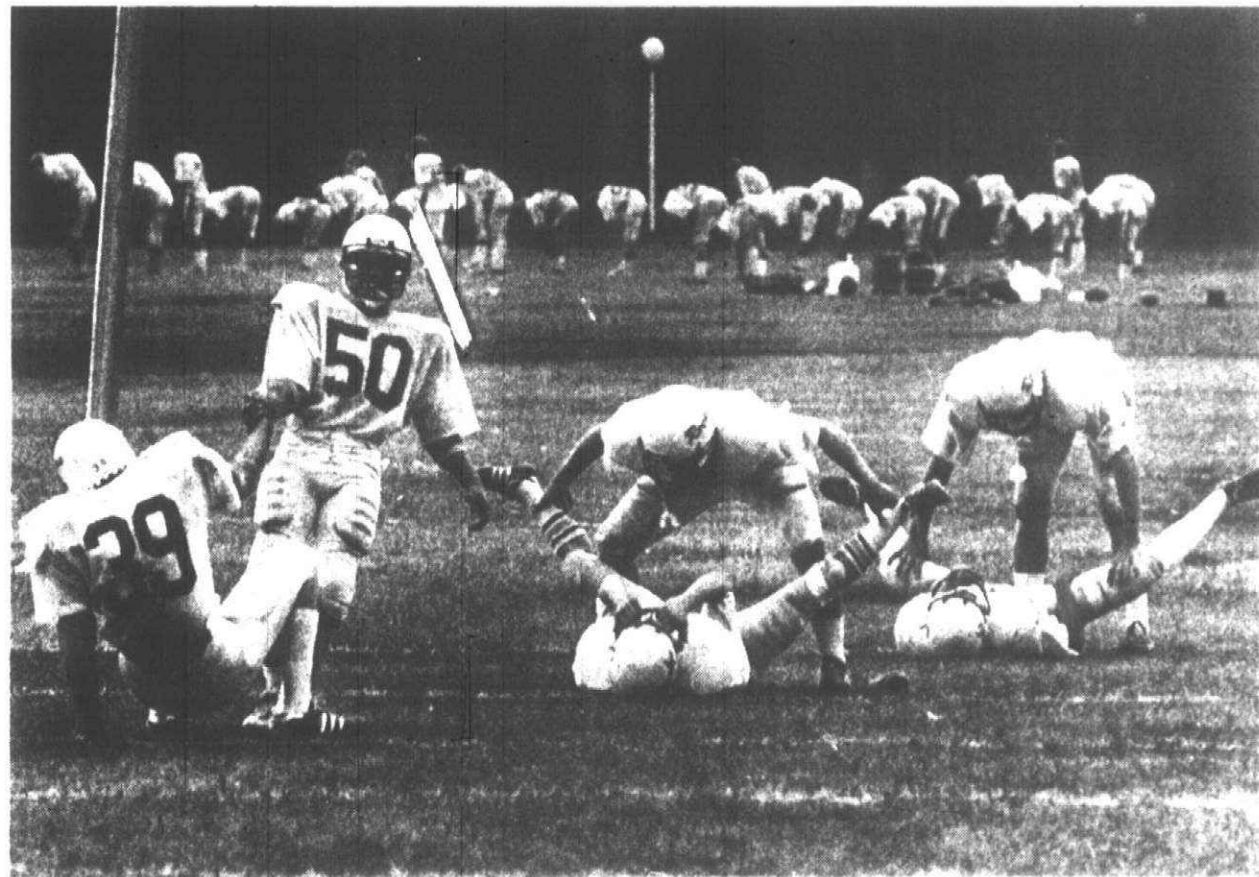
Moshimer knows this. "It's been kind of quiet," he said of the practice sessions. "But that's the way I like it. We're taking a low-key approach to the game."

That's a strategy he can afford to take. He needn't whip his team into a frenzy. The Rocks are deep enough to wear down the not-as-deep Chiefs.

Barr also learned something in his first game last week, a 14-12 victory over Livonia Bentley. A number of his players went both ways and were worn out by the last quarter.

Barr vows that won't happen against Salem, promising "more substitutions."

Herald-Journal reported that eight Skaneateles (that's pronounced Skinny-at-las) High School coaches resigned only days before the opening of fall practice rather than persevere in an athletic department directed by a guy named Frank Barton.

Seems the coaches in this Finger Lakes community were fingering Barton as one who, among other things, criticized coaches in front of students, was unavailable during school hours and used foul language toward coaches with students present, according to the story.

Barton, who wasn't shying away from the controversy, had his supporters. The board of education was to meet that very evening about the Barton situation, and it promised

to be a stormy session.

What happened? Who knows. I was hundreds of miles away by the time the next Herald-Journal hit the streets.

Also in the Syracuse paper, I read the disappointing news that the town's Triple A minor league baseball team, the Chiefs, drew only 1,521 fans at home in an 8-5 victory over Richmond the previous night.

FARTHER ALONG the throughway, in the little town of Monhonasen, the problem was not enough Monhonasen players to field a team at the local high school. It was announced in the Schenectady Gazette that poor little MHS was dropping the activity for the third time in the last 10 years.

"John Los (former Monhonasen coach) aged 15 years in the seven he was head coach, but he couldn't make the program work," wrote Larry Serrell in the back pages of the Gazette.

"We simply didn't get enough players," Los said in the column. "... It was always a matter of small turnouts. I don't like to ask people to play. Football is a hard enough sport to handle when you like it."

ENOUGH ALREADY with the small towns, I said, as I bought a copy of the New York Post, drawn no doubt by the four-decker headline, "NAME TENNIS ACE IN DRUG DEAL," wrapped as it was around a photograph showing a side-frontal view of Dolly Parton.

"(Vitas) Gerulaitis tried to buy 20G coke, claims federal witness, Page Three," explained a smaller headline. The story itself said "The international tennis ace never scored, according to evidence at the trial."

Dolly, by the way, was scheduled to have surgery for a "major gynecological disorder" in a New York hospital that day.

Another Post spread caught my eye. "GOLF GIRL IN LOVE TANGLE" screamed the headline in inch-and-a-half-high letters. "Star player Jan (Stephenson) sobs as she tells of boy-friends and bust-ups," proclaimed another head.

A large photograph showed a horizontal Jan, perhaps reflecting on one of those "bust-ups," curled up with a book.

Also reading the Post, I learned why certain writers are trying to keep Enos Slaughter, former Cardinal and Yankee great, out of the Baseball Hall of Fame. Interesting.

BOSTON HAS the Red Sox, street cars and an excellent newspaper called the Boston Globe.

In a special college football section, the banner headline — "Clemson: The paws that refreshes" — rested over a graphic in which big black paw prints were placed over pennants from Oklahoma, Alabama, Notre Dame and USC, meaning that the Tigers stepped over those powerhouses en route to the top in 1981.

There was also a long story about football at Northwestern University. "Northwestern: It's the greatest team of all time," the headline said.

"You like football? Don't come to Evanston. Not now," said the writer, commenting on the team. "Want to buy a drink in Evanston? Take a flying leap into Lake Michigan, buddy!" was not beyond the powers of his rhetoric when describing the town.

Week 2: Area grid rivals collide

In football, the first week is always the toughest.

At least for us, the prognosticators. We try and pick the winners without any solid information to base it on. We combine what coaches tell us, the team's record from the previous year and how many lettermen return, together with a gut feeling, before selecting who we think will win.

That formula worked in nine of 11 games for Risak last week. Emons was wrong three times. Both missed the Livonia Clarenceville/Carleton Airport and Redford Bishop Borgess/Riverview games. Emons selected Livonia Bentley to tip Plymouth Canton. Risak disagreed, choosing the Chiefs. The Chiefs won.

POINT SPREADS by both predictors were surprisingly close, considering it was the first game of the season. Risak nailed two games right on the nose, selecting Plymouth Salem by 12 over North Farmington (Salem won, 12-0), and Canton over Bentley by two (final: 14-12).

Emons also hit the point spread on the Salem-Romulus contest. Emons and Risak tied on the Livonia Stevenson/Redford Union game — Risak said Stevenson by six, Emons picked the Spartans by eight. Final: Stevenson 14, RU 7.

Whether we can keep up that torrid pace (Risak, 84.8 percent correct; Emons, 72.8 percent) remains to be seen. There are some big games this week, and here's how we pick 'em.

PLYMOUTH SALEM vs. PLYMOUTH CANTON, 7:30 p.m. Friday at CEP Field — Well, there's a first time for everything, and this is one of them. Friday will mark the first time Salem and Canton will meet on the gridiron. An interesting confrontation, packed with emotion.

The talent edge certainly goes to Salem, which is deep at all positions, including quarterback with Dave Haut and Pete Steyaert. Both threw long passes in Salem's win over North, an unusual way for the run-oriented Rocks to win. Watch Salem's No. 80, tight end Dave Houle. He may be the difference.

Canton emerged as a big-play team in its win over Bentley. The Bulldogs outgained the Chiefs, but couldn't outscore them. Pat Murphy is an able passer for Canton, as he showed with two TD passes last week.

Everyone expects Salem, but the emotion edge goes to Canton, the underdog. And emotions can play a major role in this type of game.

Not enough of a role, both Risak and Emons agree. Emons says Salem by 13; Risak figures it will be closer (six points), but Salem still the winner.

LIVONIA STEVENSON at LIVONIA FRANKLIN, 2 p.m. Saturday — This is a big matchup, the best of the week, between two teams figured to be contenders in their respective leagues.

Stevenson opened with a tough win over Redford Union, while Franklin blasted Livonia Churchill. A 14-point third quarter, both touchdowns scored by Karl Hill, sparked Stevenson. Hill and running mate Tom Hamill combined for 166 yards on the ground (Hill 114 and Hamill 52). Spartan quarterback Pete Rose is experienced and able.

Franklin's defense forced six turnovers, and quarterback Rich Popp threw for one touchdown and ran for another in the win over Churchill.

This is a tight game all the way. Risak thinks Franklin's got the experience and the horses to pull out a seven-point victory. Emons also likes Franklin, but thinks it will be decided in overtime by a field goal.

BISHOP BORGESS at REDFORD UNION, 7:30 p.m. Friday — Both teams lost tough openers last week by seven points. Borgess' loss was a heart-breaker, since the Spartans had their chances and, omitting any one of four plays, would have won.

Riverview scored on a 92-yard kickoff return in the first quarter, a 6-yard pass following an interception late in the second and on a 19-yard drive after a fumbled punt in the third.

Still, Borgess only trailed by one, 21-20, at that point. Chuck Gregory raced 46 yards for TD and Steve Staron fired a pair of scoring passes, 53 yards to Jim McDonald and 26 yards to Kendall Cobb, to keep the Trojans in the hunt.

The turning point came in the fourth

quarter. Staron connected with Larry Corona on a 50 yard bomb, but before reaching the end zone Corona fumbled. The ball bounced through the end zone, giving Riverview possession.

The Pirates then drove 80 yards for the clinching touchdown.

RU had a 95-yard scoring drive against Stevenson in the second quarter, with Keith Manus scoring from a yard out. But an interception return for one touchdown and a 63-yard run for another beat the Panthers.

Both teams are young: RU has 14 juniors and a sophomore on the team, and Staron is just a sophomore for Borgess. It should be a wide-open game.

Emons goes with RU by six. Risak figures the Panthers will make fewer mistakes and chooses them by nine.

CATHOLIC CENTRAL vs. YPSILANTI, 7 p.m. Saturday at Livonia Bentley — Once again, Ypsilanti is ranked in many statewide polls. So is Detroit Catholic Central for that matter.

But the Shamrocks, winners over Traverse City last Saturday in the Pontiac Silverdome, are the favorites here. A diversified offense and solid defense are the reasons. Ypsilanti raced to a 36-20 victory over Lincoln Park in the season's first week.

Emons swears that CC has Ypsilanti's number and picks the Shamrocks by 11. Risak also chooses CC, but by nine.

REDFORD ST. AGATHA at ALLEN PARK CABRINI, 7:30 p.m. Saturday — The Aggies were big favorites over Dearborn St. Alphonsus last week, but went to overtime before winning, 6-3. Cabrini manhandled Richmond, 32-3, in its opener.

Risak thinks Cabrini, a Catholic C-D League qualifier a year ago, will top St. Agatha by nine. Emons picks the Aggies by seven in overtime.

WARREN TOWER at LIVONIA BENTLEY, 7:30 p.m. Friday — Bentley outdid Canton in nearly all statistics except the score. It's a tough way to lose the season's opener. Warren Tower started off with a 28-6 lambasting of Roseville.

Bentley is on its home turf, but lost there last week, and Emons thinks the Bulldogs will lose there again, by sev-

en. Risak goes with the home team: Bentley by seven.

NORTHVILLE at WESTLAND JOHN GLENN, 7:30 p.m. Friday — Northville routed Redford Thurston last week, 28-0. Glenn pounded Waterford in the Silverdome, 24-6. Todd Jennings was the difference for the Rockets: His 171 yards rushing, two touchdowns, three extra points and a field goal buried Waterford.

But Northville has its own one-man attack in Andy Dimitroff. Injured a year ago, Dimitroff returned with a vengeance, rushing for 171 yards against Thurston.

Risak likes Glenn at home by 13. Emons backs the Rockets by the same spread.

GARDEN CITY at ROMULUS, 7:30 p.m. Friday — The new team in town, the Garden City Cougars, grounded Melvindale, 21-13, last week while Romulus toppled Willow Run, 22-8. Garden City can pass or run and is a dark horse in the Northwest Suburban League race.

Emons likes Garden City by 14. Risak takes the Cougars by nine.

Resident disputes editorial piece

To the editor:
After reading your editorial of Sept. 13, I think you need to be informed of some items.

First, the treasurer is the only department head that is without a deputy or head clerk, or supervisor. The building department has a head clerk, the recreation department has a director, supervisor and superintendent. The planning department has a planner and an assistant.

The police and fire department have chains of command. Even Clerk John Flodin has the finance department to handle some of his work. The finance department has a deputy and a head clerk, but the treasurer has no one.

The treasurer has a deputy who gets no pay and doesn't work. The treasurer budgeted in her budget for a full-time deputy or manager. When she took her choice to the board, the board turned her down. Now they want to restructure her department, and give her a manager. Why didn't they listen to her before?

Secondly, how do you know "Sterlini is a poor manager." Where do you get your information from? Do you have a "deep throat" at Township Hall? That sounds libelous, unless you can prove it.

You have made a judgment, and you haven't heard her side of it yet.

As a taxpayer in Canton, I think our elected officials, "the management team," should stick together to iron out management/employee problems.

I agree with Deana Salhaney's letter (on Sept. 13). If the board and supervisor can't handle the job without trying

to make one of the "team" a scapegoat, maybe we need some new people in their jobs.

Thirdly, the employees state that the problem has been going on for months. Why didn't they take action before this? What was their union, and our personnel director, doing about the problem — sitting on their hands?

No. 4, If the emotional problems of two of the women were so bad for so long, why didn't they go to their own doctors before now?

No. 5, who sent these employees to the emergency Oakwood Hospital and not let them go home to their own doctor?

No. 6, why was the third employee given the same time off with pay when there was nothing wrong with her?

No. 7, Supervisor James Poole was questioned on Sept. 7 if the doctor at Oakwood Hospital had sent the employees back with a disability. He said, "No."

Those authority was used to pay these people for sick time? There was no medical restriction. The problems seem to be solvable in-house and not brought before the public. The board can put our money to better use.

No. 8, the supervisor is the tax assessor for the township. He has delegated this authority to Wayne County, and the treasurer has the day-to-day work for any questions. But he hasn't given her any personnel to handle the extra work. The treasurer is the tax collector, not the assessor.

No. 9, if conditions are as bad as the employees say they are in the treasurer's office, why did a former employee ask for her job back and now is back to work?

I hope that the "management team" will give the treasurer, Maria Sterlini, the proper manpower and support that she deserves, or maybe we need a new team.

Films diversified in the late-1960s and early-1970s in hopes of reaching every potential moviegoer. There was nothing altruistic about the movement. Filmmakers simply realized that previously untapped market groups could be enticed to come and pay their \$2 or \$3 for a movie. It probably began with the appeal to youth of "The Graduate" in 1967 and intensified with the counter-culture-draw of "Easy Rider" two years later. At any rate, by the '70s, most films were aimed at some distinct target audience. There were more

youth and counter-culture films, films for and about unmarried women, senior-citizen films, gay films and, of course, black films. One of the first black films, and perhaps the best of a long line, was "Shaft." Richard Roundtree plays the slick private eye, and he brings to the role a believability missing from all the "Shaft" spinoffs and sequels. Isaac Hayes wrote the music.

"A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" (1966), 8 p.m. Wednesday on Ch. 50. Originally 99 minutes.

"Everybody ought to have a maid," seems to be the rallying cry of film fanatics who number this movie among their favorites. To be sure, that song from the film, as well as many others, recommend this Richard Lester picture with the Stephen Sondheim score. But both director and composer have difficulty maintaining that charm for the duration of the film. "Funny Thing" has as many low points as highs; still, it's a film worth seeing at least once. Zero Mostel, Phil Silvers and Jack Gilford star.

Bonstelle opening with drama 'Eden'

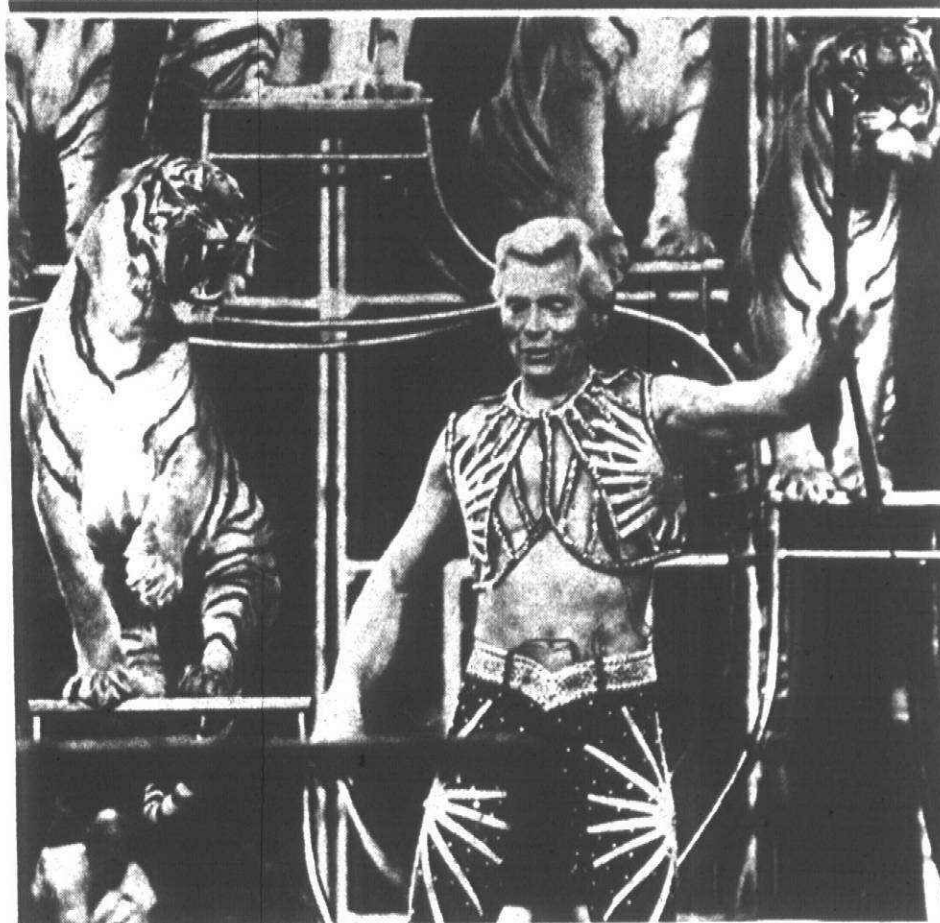
The Bonstelle Theatre at Wayne State University in Detroit opens its season Oct. 1 with "Eden," an award-winning drama by Horace E. (Steve) Carter, Jr. Performances are at 8 p.m. Fridays-Saturdays and 2 p.m. Sundays through Oct. 10.

Set in a mid-Manhattan apartment building in the 1920s, "Eden" explores the intra-racial conflicts between the blacks of America and those transplanted from the West Indian islands.

Dwelling across the hall from one another are a West Indian family of six — mother, father, two sons and two

daughters — and a middle-aged widow and her nephew. When a romance develops between the nephew and the younger of the West Indian daughters, her father, an ardent follower of Marcus Garvey (the first influential Black Nationalist), refuses to condone their relationship.

Although he does not appear as a character in "Eden," Garvey figures significantly in the action of the play. His philosophy is represented by the character of Joseph Barton, the autocratic patriarch of the West Indian family.

Use the right tools when reroofing house

Reroofing your house an impossible task? Not at all.

With planning, patience, the right tools, and some easy-to-follow safety precautions, reroofing your house can be a less expensive, satisfying project for the do-it-yourselfer.

First, make a visual inspection from the ground. Walk around the house, checking for damaged shingles or those that have aged or have lost their original luster.

Also check for corroded or obstructed gutters and valleys, loose or rusted flashing, damage or wear along ends and ridges and signs of water seepage under the eaves. It may help to use binoculars to see those very high or difficult-to-see spots.

YOUR NEXT STEP should be to pull or pound down any protruding nails, and nail down any loose shingles. Replace any missing or broken shingles and damaged gutters and drip caps at the eaves.

If you've determined you house needs a new roof, first sweep the area clean of any debris or loose mineral granules. If there are more than two layers of roofing on the roof or if the old roof is in very bad repair, tear off the old shingles to the wood deck.

Adding new felt, then the shingles. You may be able to put a third layer of new shingles on your roof. Check with your local government to be sure the housing code allows a third layer.

wear a safety rope or harness that has been well secured to an immovable object on the opposite side of the roof.

Be sure to keep extra tools and shingles well out of the work area when not in use. Warn others to stay away from the grounds around the eaves because shingles or tools could slide off the roof and injure someone.

USE AN EXTENSION ladder at least two feet longer than the height of the eaves, and make sure it has safety feet that grab and hold firmly. Never use a

ladder near power lines, and don't forget to tie it off at the eaves and with stake and line at the ground.

Now you're ready to start the hard work. Applying the shingles, nailing them down, adding the flashing, shingling the valleys, hips and ridges and around the chimney.

It's important to follow the manufacturer's application instructions, found on the shingle wrappers, which differ from one type of roofing to another.

It's long, hot, hard work, but reroofing your house yourself can save you money.

Q. We have a formal dining room that is used for occasional entertaining. It seems like wasted space, yet we do want room for entertaining. What could we do with this space to make it more versatile?

A. Consider using two smaller pedestal-base tavern tables pushed together for use as a full size dining table. Pulled apart one may be used as a game table and the other can serve as the breakfast table.

Q. Our older home needs work to cover cracked and damaged ceilings.

We considered suspended ceilings, but they didn't seem appropriate for formal living areas.

A. Don't give up on suspended ceilings. There are now styles on the market made to resemble regular ceilings. The color matched grid is part of the ceiling pattern.

Q. My kitchen desk is continually cluttered and disorganized. I don't have room for a file cabinet.

A. We've seen printer's type cases put to use separating bills, menus and meeting dates.

Buyer's market? Lifestyles influence decisions

You get a very lonely feeling sometimes, sitting and talking with a banker.

But if you are one of the millions of persons thinking of borrowing some money for remodeling your home this year, one thing is for sure: You are not alone.

You and your neighbors across the country will spend a total of \$34 billion on remodeling by year's end, according to Census estimates. But some economists place the figure at closer to \$50 billion.

We have become accustomed to upgrading our lives, and since World War II this has meant moving into larger homes, into better neighborhoods.

But high land prices, high interest rates and inflation have made new housing unaffordable to many. For example, high land prices and inflation have pushed the average price of a new home up to the \$70,000 range.

And, a \$60,000 mortgage at the common interest rate of 9 percent only a dozen years ago, meant monthly payments of only \$483. An income of about \$35,000 per year could support that.

But at an interest rate of 17 percent, a \$60,000 mortgage will demand monthly payments of \$856, and it takes an income of more than \$51,000 a year to pay that.

So we are looking the old place over and re-evaluating, and we are upgrading by fixing up.

THE UPGRADING isn't only a matter of making it more luxurious. It is more a matter of changing to fit our changing lifestyles. And just about everyone's lifestyle changes in 15 years.

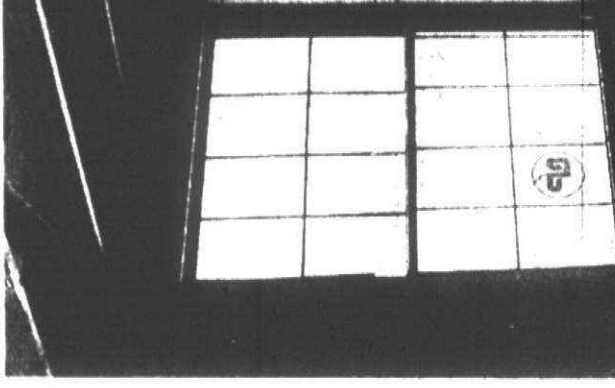

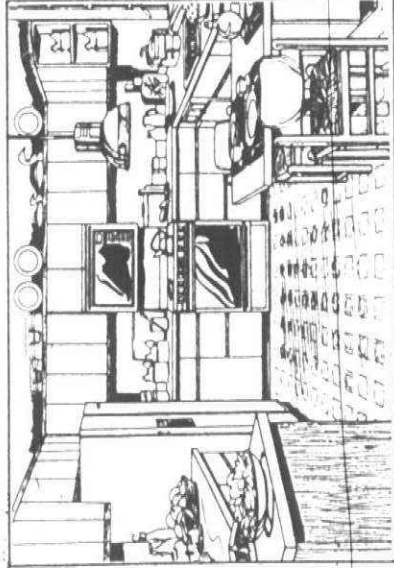

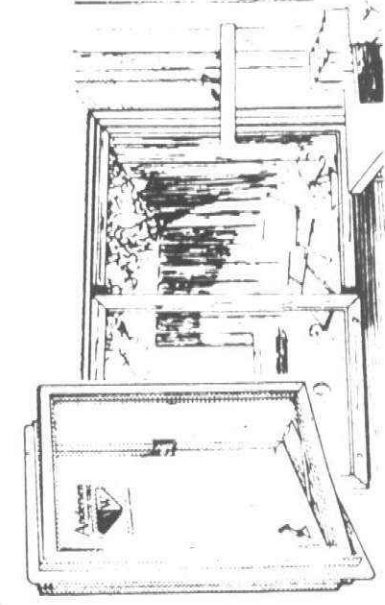

Fall grounds care

Revel in foresight or despair in hindsight

Lush lawns, sturdy shrubs and freely flowering plants get their growing good looks next spring from the gardener's careful attentions this autumn. More than at any other season, your garden-scale fall serves the attention of its annual fall sprucing-up to preserve it throughout the unpredictable ravages of the winter ahead, as well as preparing it for the first growth and bloom of spring.

Now is the time to mulch, feed, water and rake. If the crisp cool air and crunch of leaves are insufficient to lure you to the autumnal outdoors. Consider the prospective pleasures of a cleaner and healthier garden than ever, green and blooming with the first crocus and daffodils next Spring.

Start your fall gardening plan with the basics underfoot. Now is the ideal time to seed and feed your lawn to thicken-up sparse areas, fill in bald spots and generally do your best to get the green carpet in shape. Begin by thoroughly raking your lawn to clean up leaves, clippings and thatch. If the grass seems especially matted, and/or messy, consider renting a power rake from your garden center to help you do a thorough job. After raking, level off any low spots that may collect water or prove hazardous underfoot. Simply cut and root back and sod, add soil to make the ground level, then replace the sod.

NOW YOUR LAWN is ready for a layer

upkeep and decide between deciduous or evergreen varieties.

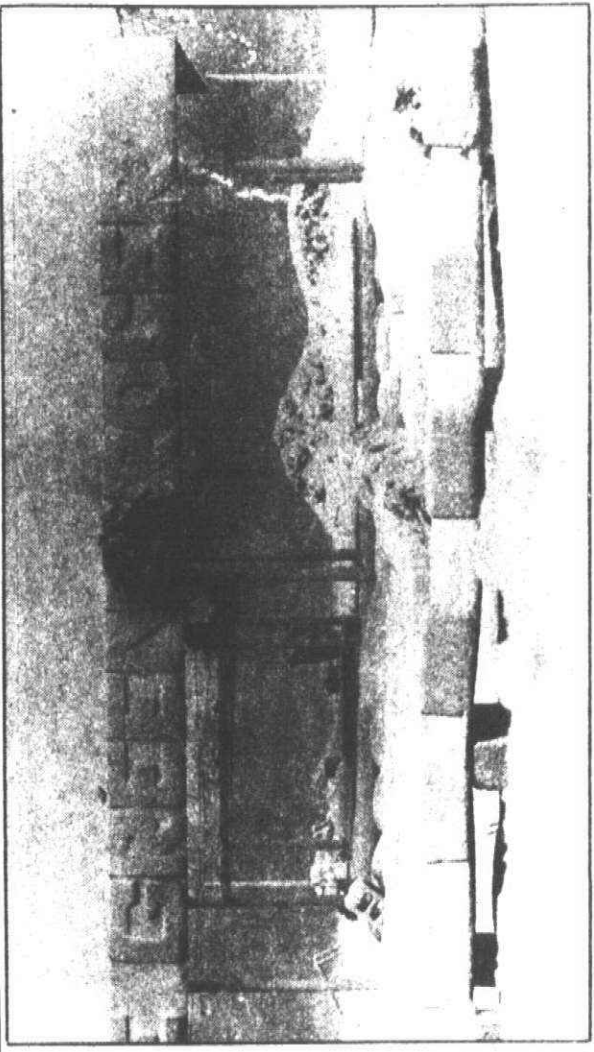
DECIDUOUS SHRUBS are generally faster growing and ideal for summer privacy screens since they fill in quickly. Many also offer a bonus of profuse flowers in spring or summer. Since, however, they lose their leaves each fall, their privacy potential is less during cold months and they require some clean-up.

Evergreens may be broadleaf like azalea, holly, firethorn and such or narrowleaf junipers, yews, pines and so on. Broadleaf

evergreens make showy specimens but generally are not hardy in colder regions. Check with your local nurseryman.

Plants that require winter protection or a sheltered location may not suit your needs. Narrow evergreens may be as low and trailing as a ground cover or grow taller than a two-story house. Consider your use and location carefully and consult your nurseryman before choosing plants. You can plant bushes even in late autumn. Just be sure they are well-watered.

Use the right tools when reroofing house

Reroofing your house an impossible task? Not at all.

With planning, patience, the right tools, and some easy-to-follow safety precautions, reroofing your house can be a less expensive, satisfying project for the do-it-yourselfer.

First, make a visual inspection from the ground. Walk around the house, checking for damaged shingles or those that have aged or have lost their original luster.

Also check for corroded or obstructed gutters and valleys, loose or rusted flashing, damage or wear along ends and ridges and signs of water seepage under the eaves. It may help to use binoculars to see those very high or difficult-to-see spots.

YOUR NEXT STEP should be to pull or pound down any protruding nails, and nail down any loose shingles. Replace any missing or broken shingles and damaged gutters and drip caps at the eaves.

If you've determined you house needs a new roof, first sweep the area clean of any debris or loose mineral granules. If there are more than two layers of roofing on the roof or if the old roof is in very bad repair, tear off the old shingles to the wood deck, adding new felt, then the shingles.

You may be able to put a third layer of new shingles on your roof. Check with your local government to be sure the housing code allows a third layer.

If you are removing existing shingles, you'll need waterproof tarps or large pieces of plastic should rain come up before you have put on the new shingles.

Estimating the amount of new roofing shingles you'll need is simple. Asphalt shingles are sold in squares (the amount of material necessary to cover 100 square feet). Squares are judged by weight, so 240-pound roofing means the amount of roofing that covers one square weighs 240 pounds.

A simple roof with unbroken planes, such as a ranch-style house, can be measured along each eave and rake. Then multiply the length times the width to get the number of square feet. Add the various areas and allow an extra 10 percent for waste. Divide the total by 100 to find the total number of squares you'll need.

IF YOUR ROOF planes are broken up by dormers, extensions or other architectural features, ask your local building supply dealer for assistance.

The tools you'll need to reroof your house are those found in most do-it-yourself workshops: Broom, carpenter's apron, caulking gun, chalkline, chisel and saw, flat shovel, hammer or roofer's hatchet, ladder and scaffolding, putty knife, painting trowel or brush, safety goggles, tape ruler and a utility knife.

Wear rubber-soled shoes and always work on a completely dry roof. Always

wear a safety rope or harness that has been well secured to an immovable object on the opposite side of the roof.

Be sure to keep extra tools and shingles well out of the work area when not in use. Warn others to stay away from the grounds around the eaves because shingles or tools could slide off the roof and injure someone.

USE AN EXTENSION ladder at least two feet longer than the height of the eaves, and make sure it has safety feet that grab and hold firmly. Never use a

ladder near power lines, and don't forget to tie it off at the eaves and with stake and line at the ground.

Now you're ready to start the hard work. Applying the shingles, nailing them down, adding the flashing, shingling the valleys, hips and ridges and around the chimney.

It's important to follow the manufacturer's application instructions, found on the shingle wrappers, which differ from one type of roofing to another.

It's long, hot, hard work, but reroofing your house yourself can save you money.

Q. We have a formal dining room that is used for occasional entertaining. It seems like wasted space, yet we do want room for entertaining. What could we do with this space to make it more versatile?

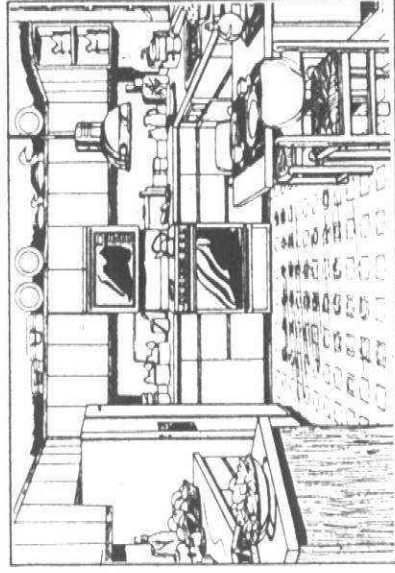

Energy efficiency means comfort year-round

Would you like to significantly increase your house's energy efficiency and comfort this winter? You can, by taking a few simple steps.

Energy experts agree that one of the best ways to reduce energy usage is to make sure your house is properly insulated.

Your attic is one of the first places you should check to see if you have enough insulation. If you attic is unfinished and unfloored, but has some beams to walk on, you can easily find the R-value of the existing insulation. It will be printed on the top or bottom of the batts.

If you existing attic insulation is loose fill, you will need to measure the depth of the insulation between the framing members. If the insulation is fiber glass, you can use the following guidelines to determine the approximate R-value. Other types of insulation may yield different R-values.

Depth of loose fill Minimum Insulation	R-value
three inches	R-7
six inches	R-14
nine inches	R-21

ONCE YOU KNOW how much insulation you have, you can determine how much more you need. Just subtract the R-value of the existing insulation from the recommended R-value for Michigan.

The first few inches of insulation save

be much higher than the savings from insulating.

A professional contractor can give you a free cost estimate and help you determine if additional wall insulation is feasible.

Next, check for adequate insulation under floors, in crawl spaces and next to foundation walls. Consider insulating in these areas. However, if you keep your basement at room temperature, there is little point in insulating your floor or heating ducts.

IN ADDITION to insulating your house, you can also gain energy efficiency with a few simple improvements.

Heated and cooled air can escape from your house through cracks around doors and windows. You can stop drafts along these areas with caulking and weatherstripping.

Several additional steps require only a slight change in the way you do things at home.

For example, set the thermostat at 65 degrees in winter, five degrees lower when sleeping or away, and 78 degrees in summer.

If you are elderly or have blood circulation problems, you may need to keep your thermostat set above 65 degree in the winter.

Lower the water heater thermostat to 120 degrees. Make sure clothes dryers and dish washers are fully loaded before using

them. It is counter productive to overstuff your clothes dryers, but it's difficult to overfill a dish washers.

Turn on lights only when and where you need them. If you have an inside light that's on long hours, such as in a kitchen or workroom, consider installing a fluorescent light.

The initial cost will be higher, but you'll save energy. Fluorescent lights "pay for themselves" in lower energy usage.

tered and protected from drying winds and sun. Mulching the bases of new bushes also helps to protect delicate root systems and retain water.

Trees also offer a wide variety of size and shape, flowers and fruit, even the density of their shade and resistance to weather and disease. Some like redbud and flowering crab make handsome accents in front of your home. Others like dogwood or birch are ideal to plant in clumps and create your own personal grove. Or, you may prefer an old, shady favorite like maple. Whatever your preference, get the advice of your local nursery to ensure success.

But by all means, use trees in your landscaping plan. They are, in fact, the center around which your other shrubs and plantings must fit and therefore basic to any good garden plan. Like bushes, you can safely plant trees in autumn but they must be staked, mulched and deeply watered to assure a healthy start.

Use the same protection pointers for established shrubs and trees. Mulch the bases with leaves or straw. Stake deciduous trees with cord — never wire — to protect them from wind and wrap tender trunks to prevent bark damage from sun or insects. Water all shrubs and trees deeply and often until the ground freezes. This allows them to store up moisture for the months ahead. Where weather is extreme or plants are especially tender, sew up a canvas screen for added protection. You can do this easily by stapling fabric to stakes around your plant. Never wrap the shrub itself since that inhibits air circulation and can smother your plant.

AUTUMN IS ALSO the time to plan ahead for next spring's first blooms. Nothing is as exciting for even the occasional gardener as the first crocus or jonquil, followed triumphantly by hyacinths, tulips and lilies. Since these hardy bulbs must be planted in the fall, you must take time now to clear a planting area and plan for that first show of color. For best effect, plant bulbs in clusters of at least six to eight plants or more and stick to one variety.

How your yard is landscaped can play an important role in your home's energy consumption.

Up to 30 percent of your home heating cost is a result of air infiltration, according to the Department of Energy. This can be lessened considerably by careful planting of trees and shrubs.

A thick line of evergreen trees located north and west of your house will provide an effective windbreak during the winter. Evergreens should not need frequent replanting, repair or upkeep. And they add charm to your property, while helping to keep energy costs down.

In the summer, energy costs will be lower if you have leafy trees on the south, east and west sides of the house. They're the world's best air conditioners — with no fuel required. And almost every family enjoys a relaxing evening spent under shade trees.

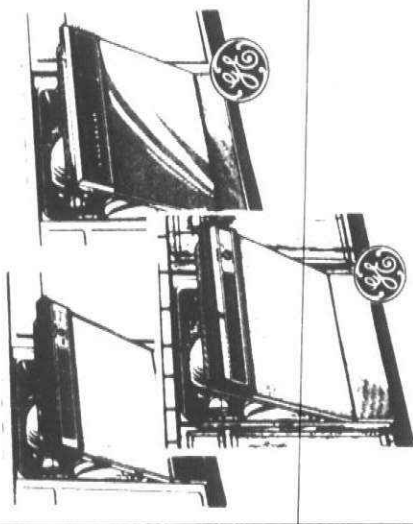

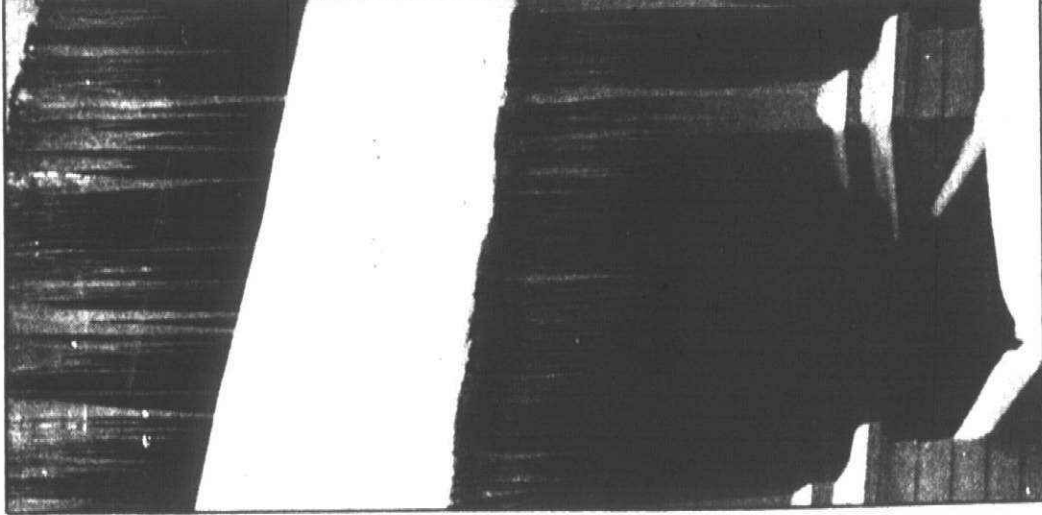
Paint needn't be a stain on a house's reputation

Today's energy conscious homeowner should be aware of a new type of paint designed to help keep heat and moisture inside where it's needed and to protect interior and exterior paint as well. This latex vapor barrier goes on like paint to help insulation become more effective.

With the last spring thaw many of us saw wet siding with blistering and peeling paint. Some of us may have even suffered stained or sagging ceilings. This moisture looks like an exterior defect in siding or roofing, but is usually caused by moisture from inside trapped and frozen within exterior walls. Every home has moisture from bathrooms, laundry, dishwashing and cooking, which in the proper proportion contributes to your family's health. In winter's drastic temperatures the right balance becomes upset and can result in damage. An effective latex vapor barrier guards against exterior paint failure and related damage.

Valuable heat loss occurs when insulation becomes wet. Just as wet winter clothing draws out body heat, wet insulation loses its heat retaining effectiveness. A latex vapor barrier applied to the warm side of exterior walls helps keep insulation dry. One product tested showed a 20 percent less heat loss through coated walls compared to uncoated.

The fast-drying vapor barrier may be used over previously painted surfaces or as a primer for wallboard or plaster. One contractor primed all interior walls of his



own new home for extra protection. Brush, roll or spray it just like a latex wall paint. Top coat with alkyd or latex interior paint or enamel.

Paint is the most practical and economical way to install a continuous vapor barrier that works. It is not subject to breaks around electrical outlets or plumbing like other materials. Of course, it gives direct protection to plaster or dry wall while permitting decorating freedom.

When buying insulating latex vapor barrier, as with any paint or stain, check the label guarantee. Use a dealer who works with professional painters. He'll have the latest product developments and know how they perform. Most professional painters choose a brand for easy application and satisfactory results. Price is a secondary factor. Let that be your guide, too. If time and money are at a premium, begin warming your home with paint one room at a time.

Another way to eliminate exterior cracking, peeling or blistering is to use stain instead of paint. Stains soaking into the wood plus natural weathering mellows the color to a rustic low maintenance finish.

These are traditional oil base stains in

rich pigments designed to hide the previous color and grain in only one coat. Newer acrylic latex stains provide the same easy water clean up and durability associated with latex products. Some colors of acrylic latex stains appear better on woods that don't "bleed" like redwood and cedar. Your dealer can assist you in selecting the appropriate color and stain. Versatile stains can be used on rough and smooth siding, shakes, shingles, fascia and soffits.

For the beauty of natural wood semi-transparent stain is the very best finish. The wood's natural beauty is enhanced by colorful accents along the grain and texture. Protect and beautify the new wood, rough or smooth siding, decks, fences and outdoor furniture with semi-transparent stain. Bring stain indoors to give a rustic touch to unfinished interior paneling, beams and wood ceiling.

There are interior coverings for almost any surface. A variety of paints cover interior surfaces ranging from wall board to brick.

Unlike exterior painting you must live daily with the results of your interior painting job. It's important to avoid mistakes at the outset by choosing the appropriate coating and applying it properly.

The two basic types of interior paint—primers and finish coats—are designed specifically for woods, metal or masonry

Spotlight is on the kitchen — counter, sink and stove

If you're turning your home improvement energies to the kitchen, there's one job you can undertake that will make a big difference in the way your kitchen looks.

One of the chief reasons some kitchens are dreary and difficult to work in is poor lighting. That's because most kitchens were built with a single, centrally located light fixture on the ceiling. This fixture may be sufficient to light the entire kitchen. However, standing between the light and a counter can create a shadow.

To eliminate shadows on work surfaces and generally brighten your kitchen, the installation of track lighting can be a productive home improvement. Track lighting's obvious advantage over a single, centrally located ceiling fixture is that the lights can be moved so that the beams shine directly on your counters and tables.

Installing track lights is a relatively simple task for the homeowner who is equipped with a complete set of instructions and the right tools.

Before beginning any work, turn off the circuit that powers your kitchen light. When the power is off, remove the old cover from the ceiling light and replace it

with the canopy cover that is provided with track lights.

Canopy covers are slotted to accept the track and, because the holes on the canopy do not always match the ceiling box, an adjustable box adaptor ring with a variety of adjustable hold combinations is provided.

Before screwing the canopy cover into place, connect its wires to the ceiling fixture wires. This is done by capping the similar colored wires — white to white, black to black and so forth.

After the canopy cover is securely in place, slide the track into the box opening and mark the ceiling with a pencil where the holes should be drilled for toggle bolts to anchor the track. Drill the holes for the toggle bolts, replace the track and screw the toggles into the ceiling.

With the track attached to the ceiling, you're ready to snap the light units into place. Insert them into the channel and slide them along to the point where they will shed the most light on your work surface.

Swivel and tip the lights to the best angles and then secure the lights in place with the locking levers that are provided.

vents and other needs. Vinyl backings differ. There are no all-purpose products for this job.

- If you are installing your new flooring over old vinyl, make sure the new flooring you select can be laid over these surfaces. Heavily embossed and/or cushioned vinyl will probably have to be picked up.

People who have ignored this precaution have found that their new vinyl flooring starts to sink while the embossing from the old flooring starts to surface.

- Lay vinyl in areas where the temperature stays above 50 degrees. Once the temperature drops below that, the vinyl will stiffen and crack.

- Select a dry, and if possible, warm day for this job. The room temperature should be 70 degrees for 24 hours prior to the installation, and remain at that temperature for 48 hours after the job is done.

- If you are laying the vinyl directly over cement, make sure it is alkaline free, sanded smooth, bone dry and if need be, sealed. And, before you buy your flooring, make sure it can be laid over cement. Some cannot under any conditions.

- Before you begin, make sure that the surface of the floor beneath your new vinyl is free of dirt, grease and wax.
- Follow directions.

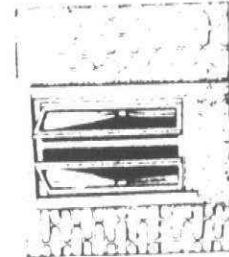

If you are like most happy gardeners who find their own bit of heaven in the green and leafy world, the end of the outdoor gardening season is a disappointment that can only be tempered by a lush and blooming indoor jungle.

Or you may have a purple thumb and would just like to have a few pots of greenery to help fight the winter doldrums. Whether you are an avid green thumb, an occasional gardener or less, fall is the perfect season to spend a little extra time and attention on your household collection.

Since so many houseplants spend the summer on sunporches, patios and the like, start your indoor gardening by moving this greenery inside. Despite the fact that many plants stay green until the first frosts, houseplants simply are not that tough. Bring them in when nighttime temperatures dip as low as 50° F. This gives them time to adjust to their new climate before the furnace starts running and drying out the inside air.

The big move indoors will also be easier if you plan ahead. Besides sparing you a last minute trip in the dark in robe and slippers, you will be much less likely to forget any plants and can also reserve some space for them inside.

Your plants have undoubtedly grown large and lush in the outdoors and will often need repotting. Everything should be checked for bugs, washed down, sprayed

with insecticide and isolated from other house plants for several days.

IN THEIR ANNUAL autumn haste to bring in the tenderest plants, many gardeners tend to overlook a lot of growers thought of primarily as outdoor growers when, in fact, they can be real scene-stealers inside too. And of course, it's a great way to winter-over old favorites and have a head start on spring.

Geraniums can handle life indoors as can fuschias, lantana and agapanthus. Don't expect a lot of bloom but do enjoy their variant foliage.

Since most plants are quite sensitive to the seasons and enter a dormant time in the winter months, you should begin to ease up on fertilizing. Remember also that the sun sinks lower in the sky and its light is more direct on windows.

Perhaps the greatest hazard to indoor gardening is dry air, even more of a problem when furnaces and fireplaces are used once again. A humidifier is ideal. You can also set plants in saucers with pebbles and water added as necessary.

Misting with a spray bottle is also helpful. Other plants like Swedish ivy, philodendron, dracaena and many palms aren't nearly as fussy as long as they are properly watered. Scheffleras are terrific inside, just watch for spider mites.

It is specially formulated to retain bright-

ness and texturing while drying out. Most brands permit you to create your own texture design and add architectural interest. Should you decide to paint over a textured wall, simply use latex or oil-based paint.

Applying paint or stain is actually the easiest part of your home decorating project. The surface preparation is the burden of your labor and it pays off in the quality of results. Another important aspect is color selection. The dozens of paint and stain color choices can be overwhelming. Consult decorating magazines and books for a variety of creative ideas that allow you to really express yourself.

Proper treatment keeps you out of the gutter

Defective guttering discovered during a seasonal inspection may be covered by warranty.

One brand of white enameled aluminum guttering will be replaced the first year if the finish blisters, peels, chips or cracks. And for the following 14 years, this product and its professional installation are in warranty at a pro-rated basis. The warranty may be passed along to the next resident of the house.

Fall check-up includes cleaning out debris, sealing aluminum joints or soldering steel and checking nails for rust. Paint, priming galvanized units in need. Hangers, located every 24 inches, should be adjusted for proper fit and slope.

Do not use aluminum gutter guards with steel gutters; there is a vinyl product available which work better.

Improper roof drainage may be caused by too few downspouts. Formula to determine the proper number is 1 square inch of downspout cross-sectional area per 1 sq ft. of roof surface. In areas with severe weather, note that the design of corrugated-style pipe allows expansion with less

chance of splitting when trapped water freezes.

Special wire baskets at the opening of each outlet keeps leaves and tennis balls from going down, and splashblocks or tiles at the other end save trouble at foundation-level.

To see if gutters are properly positioned, place a yardstick down the roof slope to make sure that the out-side edge of the gutter is below the yardstick.

Rain runoff simply falls into the gutter, but shading snow becomes wedged across a too-high gutter. The resulting "ice dam" makes moisture back up under shingles and through the roof.

For houses under construction, one manufacturer now offers a membrane shield for use as an underlayment along a six-foot edge of roof to prevent ice damage.

Serving a similar purpose on established roofs is a heating cable in 25-foot sections. Five units plug together and connect to a 6-foot power supply cord. The cable is mounted by special clips in zigzag fashion allowing three feet of cable per foot of roof edge. Prestest the cable prior to installation.

Chimney sweep keeps you one flue up on rest

The heatbreak and expense of fire could result from a chimney coated with creosote, the condensed wood smoke which adheres to chimney walls. The highly flammable material creates dangerous burning debris and sparks which shoot out of a chimney and may set a house ablaze.

Creosote accumulation is often caused by burning large loads of wood in an enclosed space. Smaller fires with plenty of air slow down the rate of accumulation. Although you have to add wood more often to smaller fires, the total amount of wood burned and the heat produced will be about the same.

To inspect for creosote accumulation, look for a sticky black build-up on the walls by peering down the chimney from the rooftop and up the chimney from inside during daylight hours.

If creosote has a hard tar glaze, a deposit only one-quarter inch thick can fuel the open-fire charm of a fireplace without the chimney sweep.

Chimney sweeps, like any other service professionals, know their business better than the average do-it-yourselfer. They can clean more thoroughly, in a shorter period of time, than can most professionals. Don't play with fire. Inspect your chimney and call a chimney sweep if necessary.

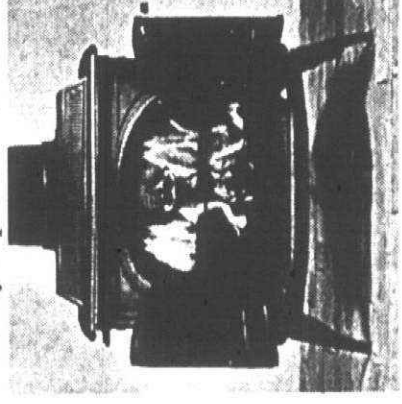

Pillow talk

Have you had your fill of fiber or just getting down off the rack?

Do most consumers know relatively little about the pillows they sleep on? Keep their pillows far too long? Lack the information needed to shop intelligently for new pillows?

If you answered yes, you agree with the conclusions of a recent survey of consumer attitudes toward pillows. To help consumers make smart pillow-buying decisions, the following will answer the most-asked pillow questions.

Q. How can I tell when it is time to replace a pillow?

A. When the pillow becomes permanently flat, lumpy or matted and no longer comfortable and healthy/hygiene reasons.

Q. What types of bed pillows are there?

A. Three types are available: those filled with down or feathers and down, those filled with polyester fiberfill. Several grades of quality within each group affect the price.

Q. How does each filling perform?

A. Down pillows are soft and warm, fluffy and resilient, and last a long time. They may mildew, however, or develop an odor in a warm and humid environment.

or if they become soaked with perspiration. Foam pillows are firm; when they start to deteriorate, they can develop an unpleasant odor.

Q. How should I select a new pillow?

A. Take the touch test — touch a pillow, hug it, scrunch it. The pillow should be comfortable, buoyant, resilient. Then read the label for information on filling, performance and care.

Q. How should I care for a pillow?

A. Refluff your down or fiberfill pillow every morning because sleeping comfort comes from the air trapped in the pillow filling. Down pillows should be washed occasionally, but they take a long time to dry.

A quality synthetic pillow can be machine-washed and machine-dried quickly for lasting freshness. Be guided by the information on the label.

Q. How much should a pillow cost and how long should it last?

A. A down pillow can cost from \$50 to \$100 and can last many years. A top-quality foam rubber pillow can cost \$15 to \$20 and might last 10 years. A top-quality synthetic pillow starts at \$15 to \$20 and usually retains its resiliency for seven years.

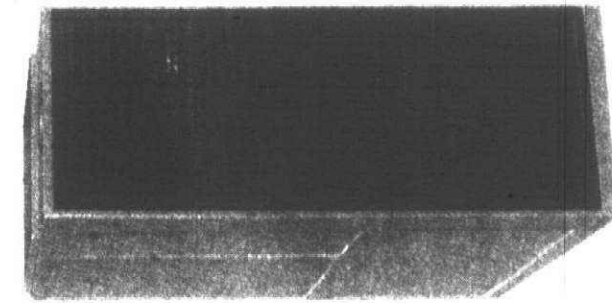
