Canton pundits predict millage hike

Canton officials received an "A-plus" from the township's auditors last week. However, predictions indicate taxpayers will see a millage increase next

At a board meeting last week, trustees were told the township is in financially "good shape as of Dec. 31, 1984," said Bruce Berend, of Plante and Moran. He said that among 50 munici-

palities the firm audits, only Canton and one other community steered clear of potential financial liabilities.

Most township officials credit the excellent review to Mike Gorman, the finance director who plans to take a position with the City of Wayne in July.

Basically Canton is in a good financial situation, because we are spending less than we are taking in," Gorman said. "But I think the township will have to raise the millage for 1986, because they have not increased the gen

eral fund in 41/2 years, and it costs

"The police fund will probably have to increase too," Gorman said. "But, in this case, we tried to set money aside knowing that they will have more people (in the police department) at a later

Presently, the township is taxing the residents 2 mills for the general fund, 4.07 mills for police and 3.06 mills for the fire department

bad news by reminding the trustees that Federal Revenue Sharing funds definitely expire in September 1986. The expiration may be sooner, because President Reagan presently is proposing to eliminate the program entirely, effective at the end of the cur-

rent entitlement period, Sept. 30, 1985. The township will avoid dramatic effects from this, because it hasn't used the funds for operating costs. The federal money was spent on purchasing



Head-on collision woman

A 19-year-old Westland woman was killed in a head-on collision on Cherry Hill Road near Sheldon Wednesday. It was Canton's third traffic fatality of All have occurred on the same road.

Sally L. Lang, a 1984 honors graduate from Westland's John Glenn High School, reportedly was en route to classes at Eastern Michigan Universi-At about 11:30 a.m. she was traveling

west in a Chevy Chevette on Cherry Hill west of Sheldon when an eastbound Mercury Cougar driven by Delores Wiacek of Canton, left the roadway on the right shoulder.

'Upon re-entry on the paved portion of the road, she abruptly crossed the center line in the westbound lane," said Canton police Lt. Alex Wilson.

The speed limit on the two-lane highway is 45 mph. As of Friday afternoon, Wiacek had not yet given police an explanation for the accident. Alcohol or drug involvement are not suspected. Wiacek was driving with her 3-year-old daughter, but neither received immediate medical treatment, Wilson said. Canton rescue units found Lang.

Victim of drunk driving accident warns students

Strong arms helped support Brian Moore as he made his way to the podium Tuesday to address an assembly of more than 1,000 teen-agers and adults at the kickoff workshop for "Project Graduation" in Roma's of Livonia.

The 24-year-old Livonian spoke slowly and deliberately when he told of the events that left him paralyzed seven years ago when as a 17-year-old Bentley High School student he and two friends over a Memorial Day weekend got into a car after a drinking spree and crashed.

'My two friends both had minor cuts; talk. Andy was knocked out; and Tom suffered a shoulder injury. I was cut up real bad and unconscious for more than nine months," said Moore, who is now in a wheelchair.

Maybe my true story can exemplify what drinking and driving will do to you. It's not worth it. Let me tell you."

Moore's personal testimony touched most who attended the program which was designed to encourage youngsters to have a safe alcohol-and-drug-free prom and graduation season. The audience included students from 250 high schools throughout Wayne, Oakland,

Macomb, Washtenaw and Monroe

MARK STUART, a 17-year-old senior at Livonia's Stevenson High School, said "to see how hard hit Brian was is an example that reinforces the (program's goal) to get others to commit themselves against drinking and driving." Stuart was one of seven Stevenson students attending who attended the workshop. He is a member of SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving), one of the program's sponsoring groups.

Another student, Robin Rhodes, 17, a senior at Ann Arbor's Huron High School, was also inspired by Moore's "It made me think a lot of my

friends," Rhodes said. "Most of my friends are drinking orientated. I guess it's a fact of school life. And it's true, you always think, it'll

never happen to you, just like what Brian said. It will make me think twice." Moore told the students and schoolrelated adults in the audience of his struggles to regain his mobility. "I still have a way to go," Moore said.
"I'm confident I'll walk fine again

someday," he said.



bleeding because of irritation at sites where the aspirin particles come in contact with the stomach's lining. This problem is overcome by using forms of aspirin that are coated and which therefore do not dissolve in the stomach. Not as well known is the fact that aspirin can

cause bruising over the back of the hands and wrists. These areas are subject to inapparent trauma throughout the day. Blood platelets and capillaries interact to prevent subsequent bruising; aspirin interferes with this interaction. Fortunately only the skin is included in this problem and there is no need to be concerned that similar bleeding is occuring in the brain, lungs, liver or kidney.

At present there is no way to prevent hand and wrist bruising short of stopping aspirin therapy. In my experience, most patients feel that the relief the aspirin provides greatly outwelghs the nconvenience attendant with its use.

'The Beniker Gang' has all the warmth of family classics

How long since you saw a "G" movie that was neither animated nor a Disney true-life adventure? Thirty years?

I bet you thought they didn't make movies like that any more. Well, you were right until "The Beniker Gang" opened recently.

"The Beniker Gang" is not an old-style Cagney gangland movie. It is an engaging comedy about five young people who have no one but each other. In spite of its "goodie-two-shoes" aura and its "G" rating, the film is mature and should appeal to all age

The gang is led by Arthur Beniker (Andrew McCarthy), an 18year-old orphan who works in the kitchen of the Esther Watson Memorial Home for Orphaned and Abandoned Children in New Jersey. His dour supervisor, Mrs. O'Malley (Paddy Croft), looks like a refugee from a Dickensian orphanage who was cleaned up

But Arthur is able to sweet-talk Mrs. O'Malley with the wise sayings of his dear old Aunt Ida. In fact, Arthur is pretty glib all around and is able to sweet-talk readers in the 437 newspapers that syndicate his "Dear Lola" advice column.

But don't tell because only the gang knows that Arthur is Lola

WHO PLAYS THESE gang members? Three very attractive and talented youngsters and one grown-up who doesn't look it. Twenty-one-year-old Jeff Alan-Lee is James, the quietest member of the gang, who spends most of his time hiding in a blanket-like bag.

Jennie Dundas is Cassie, short for Cassandra, only gal in the gang, which also includes Charlie Fields as mischievious Edmund

and eight-year-old Danny Pintauro as Ben, who eats paper.

All five members of "the Beniker Gang" are "inmates" of the Watson Orphan Home, four because they are committed as wards of the court. Only Arthur is free to leave. He remains, however, because the other four are the only "family" he has ever known.

Complications ensue when the gang's new hometown looks askance at five kids living on their own without a guardian.

The five young people portraying the Beniker gang are five accomplished, experienced performers you've probably seen before. Dundas appeared in "Hotel New Hampshire," "Mrs. Soffel" and in the title role of the NBC mini-series "Little Gloria, Happy at Last."

IN ADDITION TO his continuing role in "As the World Turns," Pintauro is the youngster who salutes the TWA pilot on national television. Although Alan-Lee's appearance in "Ghostbusters" wound up on the cutting-room floor, he has numerous stage and TV credits and has appeared with the Michigan Opera Theater in

Fields made his motion picture debut in "The Beniker Gang" following numerous television appearances and an Emmy nomina-tion in "The Demon Murder Seed." McCarthy made his movie debut, in a role quite different from Arthur Beniker, in "Class" with Jacqueline Bisset.

Such an impressive list of credits reflects a lot of talent and experience, and their acting is uniformly excellent. The five have sufficient enthusiasm and naturalism to project just what the film is about, young people determined to make their own way through guile and charm but never harm or nastiness.

The film's pacing is a bit slow and uneven, particularly at the beginning. Its conclusion overdoes our patience with happy endings. In spite of that, touching moments, low-key humor and five engaging performers amuse and entertain you with antics as "The Beniker Gang."



Fast Freddie recovers, eyes Observerland meet

Fred Owens missed a lot of his last football season this year at Redford Bishop Borgess because of an injury but still got a University of Wisconsin scholarship.

He's recovered now and running smoothly for the Spartan track team. So smoothly, in fact, that he's established 2 new school records in his best events - the 100 and 200 meter sprints.



Class Teaches You How To Be A Do-It-Yourself Contractor

It is not, says course instructor Carl Heldmann, a do-it-yourself course in plumbing and roofing. In stead, he says it's just the opposite. Heldmann, a Syracuse, N.Y. native who has lived in Charlotte since 1969, served as his own contractor in building a Village of Raintree home in the early 1970s. He became a contractor in 1974 and says he has been building houses ever since, with the exception of two years at the worst of the 1981-83 housing recession. He also recently joined the sales staff of Thies Realty & Mortgage Co. in Charlotte.

Heldmann, who offers a variety of seminars through his Michigan School of Home Building, Inc. has written three paperback books to help do-ityourself contractors, persons interested in building log homes and those who want to do home renovations. All are on sale at local bookstores for \$7.95 to \$9.95, he says, and some hardware stores also handle them.
